100 WINS

The Orioles won more than 100 games in each of 3 straight seasons—'69 (109), '70 (108) and '71 (101). Only two other clubs have achieved that feat in the history of major league baseball: the Philadelphia A's of '20-'30-'31 (104-102-107) and the St. Louis Cardinals in '42-'43-'44 (106-105-105).

O'S RECORD IS BEST IN MAJORS

Over the Last 30 Years ('57 thru '86)

During the last 30 years ('57 thru '86), the Orioles have won more games than any other club in the major leagues and have also compiled the best won-lost percentage.

Over those 3 decades the O's are 2671-2073 (.563) which gives them a 22 game lead over the 2nd place Yankees and a 691/2 game lead over the 3rd place Dodgers. This, despite the fact the O's have fallen a composite 3 games under .500 over the past 3 seasons.

In the first 2 Baltimore seasons ('54 & '55), the Orioles were 111-197 (.360). They improved to 69-85 (.448) in '56 and really began to jell in '57 (76-76), their first .500 season in Baltimore.

ORIOLES RANK 2ND ONLY TO YANKEES DURING THE EIGHTIES

During the 7 seasons that Edward Bennett Williams has owned the Orioles, i.e. the decade of the "eighties", the O's rank 2nd only to the Yankees in won-lost percentage and are 3rd in total wins behind the Yankees and Tigers. EDWARD BENNETT WILLIAMS

Edward Bennett Williams, a world-renowned Washington attorney, is in his 8th season as the Orioles' owner-chairman-president since buying the ballclub November 1, '79.

In his first four years in that capacity the O's logged three 2nds and a world championship. Over the last three seasons the results have not been as rewarding despite the vigorous and dynamic efforts of **Mr. Williams** and his able general manager **Hank Peters.**

However, be assured, to **Mr. Williams** losing will never be an acceptable alternative. The 66-year old Hartford, Connecticut native has been a winner throughout a brilliant career that has spanned some 40 years in the courtroom and has included 20 years as president of the Washington Redskins.

Mr. Williams, the founder and senior partner of the Washington law firm, Williams & Connolly, was a 1941 summa cum laude graduate of Holy Cross College. He served in the U.S. Air Force during World War II. He attended Georgetown University Law School where he graduated in 1945 and was admitted to the D.C. Bar. He has been a Washington-area resident ever since

The father of seven children (Joe, Ellen, Bennett, Ned, Dana, Tony and Kimberly), he lives with his wife, the former Agnes Anne Neill (also a Georgetown University Law School graduate), and family in Potomac, Maryland.

Mr. Williams taught Criminal Law and Evidence at **Georgetown Law School** from 1946 to 1958; was guest professor of American Criminal Law at the **University of Frankfurt** in West Germany in '54; and, in 1971, was visiting lecturer at **Yale University Law School** where he taught Constitutional Litigation. He holds honorary degrees from 14 universities.

He was chairman of the American Bar Association Special Committee on Crime Prevention and Control from 1970 to 1972. In 1966 the D.C. Bar Association presented him with its "Lawyer of the Year" award ... He is a fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers and was a member of its Board of Regents from 1968 to 1972.

By appointment of the Chief Justice of the United States in March 1965, Mr. Williams served on the U.S. Judicial Conference Advisory Committee on Federal Rules of Evidence until 1974 and, from 1971 to 1974, on the Chief Justice's Committee on Court Facilities and Design.

From 1971 to 1978 he served as chairman of the Judicial Nominating Commission for the Sixth Judicial Circuit of Maryland.

By appointment of President Gerald Ford, Mr. Williams served on the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board in 1976 and 1977. In 1977 President Jimmy Carter appointed him a consultant to the National Security Agency (NSA). In November 1980, President-elect Ronald Reagan appointed Mr. Williams as one of three prominent Democrats to serve on the Foreign Policy Advisory Board to assist in the presidential transition. From 1982 to 1985, he again served on the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board, and is presently General Counsel to the Board.

Mr. Williams was treasurer of the **Democratic National Committee** from 1974 to 1977; has served as general counsel of **Georgetown University** since 1949; is chairman of the board of trustees of **Holy Cross College**, and is general counsel of the **Motion Picture Association of America**.

HENRY J. (HANK) PETERS

Hank Peters has been the Orioles' executive vice-president/general manager for the past 11 seasons, since he signed the first of three five year contracts in November 1975 . . . At that time, he replaced **J. Frank Cashen**, who had resigned to join the Carling National Brewery.

Hank's contract was extended for another five years (thru '84) after the '79 season and was extended again 3 years ago for another 5 year term (thru '89).

A veteran of 40 years in professional baseball, Hank has twice earned major league "Executive of the Year" honors ('79, '83) from THE SPORTING NEWS, and won UPI's major league executive award in '79 as well.

The 62-year old (Sep. 16, '24) St. Louis native has shown an amazing ability to adjust to the abrupt and rapid changes that have affected player-management relations during the past several years . . . It has been an invaluable asset.

Hank came to Baltimore after four years as president of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues (the governing body of minor league baseball). Before accepting that position in December 1971, Hank has spent five years with the Cleveland Indians as vice-president for player personnel.

Prior to that, he had worked with the Kansas City A's for a decade. During his tenure there, he had the distinction of being the last general manager appointed by club-owner **Charles O. Finley** (who later became his own g.m.). He has also worked with the St. Louis Browns and Cincinnati Reds.

He first broke into baseball in 1946 after serving three years in the U.S. Army in World War II during which he was stationed in England, Germany and Czechoslovakia.

He got his start with the hometown Browns in the minor league department, working for Farm Director **Jim McLaughlin**, who later served the Orioles in the same capacity (and still lives in Baltimore), and **Bill DeWitt**, the general manager.

When the franchise was moved to Baltimore in October 1953, Hank took a job as general manager of the independent Burlington, Iowa club in the Class B Three-I League.

After the 1954 season, he joined the new Kansas City A's (who had just moved from Philadelphia) as farm director. He remained in that position thru 1960. In early 1961, following a disagreement with owner **Finley**, Hank resigned and spent the balance of the season working again for **DeWitt** (then g.m. at Cincinnati), as farm director of the Reds who went on to win the N.L. pennant that season.

However, in December 1961, he returned to the A's as assistant general manager/farm director. In 1965, he was appointed general manager. During his tenure such future stars as Hall of Farner "Catfish" Hunter, Bert Campaneris, Reggie Jackson, Sal Bando, Joe Rudi, Rick Monday, Gene Tenace and Rollie Fingers were signed and developed in the A's Farm system.

Hank moved to Cleveland in 1966 as a vice-president for player personnel and remained there until he was elected to succeed the retiring National Association President **Phil Piton** in December 1971 . . . At the time, the National Association was headquartered in Columbus, Ohio, but in September 1973, Hank moved the office to its present site in St. Petersburg, Florida.

He and his wife, **Dottie**, whom he met while both were working for the Browns, have been married 36 years . . . They have two children: **Sharon** and **Steven**, and two grandchildren: **Shannon Nicole Torrez**, born Dec. 12, '80, and **Christopher Henry Peters**, born Oct. 16, '83, the day the Orioles won the 1983 World Series.

PRESIDENTIAL VISITS

The Orioles are 0-4 in games in which a President has thrown out the first ball at Memorial Stadium. The O's are 0-3 with President Ronald Reagan present (1st game of '83 World Series and home openers in '84 & '86). They also lost the only game President Jimmy Carter attended, the seventh game of the '79 World Series. No other Presidents have visited Memorial Stadium, although in the first game the O's ever played in Baltimore in '54, Richard Nixon threw out the first ball as Vice President under President Dwight Eisenhower. The O's did win that game, 3-1 over the White Sox (see also "O's first game in Baltimore").

Six different Orioles have hit 30 or more home runs in a season 15 different times. Eddie Murray and Boog Powell have each done it 4 times, tying the club's all-time high. Frank Robinson accomplished the feat three times, Jim Gentile twice and Gus Triandos and Ken Singleton once each. GRAND SLAM NOTES

O's Led Majors Last 6 Years: The O's have led the major leagues (or tied for the lead) in grand slams in each of the past six years: '81 (5); '82 (8); '83 (8-tied with Angels); '84 (8); '85 (7); '86 (7-tied with Angels, Red

In that span, the O's have hit 43 grand slams while the Angels rank 2nd with 30 followed by Boston (23) and Pittsburgh (20). Over the six years, 0's pitchers have yielded only 14 bases loaded home runs, including 2 in '86.

Three in One Game: The Orioles and Texas set a major league record on Aug. 6, '86 when the two teams combined to hit three grand slams in Texas' 13-11 win at Memorial Stadium. Jim Dwyer and Larry Sheets hit grand slams for the O's, both in the 4th inning. It marked only the 5th time in major league history that one club has hit 2 grand slams in a single inning. It was the 4th time the O's had hit 2 grand slams in one game. Toby Harrah hit Texas' slam.

Eddie Murray has already hit 14 grand slams in his 10-year career and ranks tied for 8th on baseball's all-time list with Gil Hodges. He is 2nd among active players trailing only Dave Kingman (16). Eddie's lifetime average of one grand slam every 93.68 games (14 in 1,499 gms) is the best in major league history (among those with at least 10 grand slams) ranking just ahead of Lou Gehrig (1/94.08, 23 in 2,164 gms).

Thru the Years: In 33 years ('54-'86), the O's have "out-slammed" their opponents 130-71 (including a 70-32 advantage at Baltimore).

Gentile Hit Record 5 in '81: Jim Gentile set an American League record and tied the major league standard in '61 when he hit 5 bases loaded home runs. The only prior player to reach that total was the Cubs' Ernie Banks in '55.

Two in a Game: Only 7 players have hit two grand slams in one game in baseball history and only 3 have hit them on consecutive at-bats. In both situations, two of them were Orioles: Gentile hit two in a row at Minnesota on May 9, '61 (Metropolitan Stadium off Pete Ramos and Paul Giel), and Frank Robinson did the same on June 26, '70 at RFK Stadium in Washington (off Joe Coleman, Jr. and Joe Grzenda).

Another Oriole who came close was Brooks Robinson who, in 1962 on May 6 (Dodger Stadium) and May 9 (Memorial Stadium), hit bases loaded homers in back-to-back games.

Post-Season Slams-Slugging Pitchers: Only two pitchers have ever hit grand slam home runs in post-season play. Both were Orioles at the time, and both did it in 1970. In game one of the '70 ALCS, Mike Cuellar hit one off the Twins' Jim Perry (at Minny) and in the 3rd game of the World Series vs. the Reds, Dave McNally found the range off Wayne Granger (at Baltimore).

The blast by Cuellar was the only ALCS grand slam ever until Don Baylor hit one for the Angels vs. Milwaukee in '82 (off Moose Haas) Only two bases loaded homers have ever been hit in NLCS play: the Dodgers' Ron Cey and Dusty Baker in '77.

Opponents: Seven opponents have hit two career slams each against the O's. Nobody has hit more . . . Three have hit two at Memorial Stadium: Roy Sievers (Was.), Moose Skowron (N.Y.), Mike Epstein (Was.).

There have been 10 alien pitchers to throw up two grand slams each to Baltimore batters, including three still active: Aurelio Lopez (Det.) to John Lowenstein ('83) and Mike Young ('84), both at Detroit; Don Aase (Cal.) to Lee May ('79) and Doug DeCinces ('81), both at Baltimore; Lamarr Hoyt (Chi.) to Terry Crowley ('80) and DeCinces ('81), both at Baltimore.

Orioles "Gophers:" Among Orioles pitchers, Milt Pappas was the most generous. He gave up 6 bases loaded homers during his tenure in Baltimore while Dave McNally was victimized 4 times. One the other hand, Jim Palmer never allowed a slam in 558 games spanning nearly 4,000 innings. Among current O's, Don Aase, Ken Dixon, Mike Flanagan and Scott McGregor are tied for having given up the most—2.

OPENING DAY

The Orioles are 20-13 on opening day, but have lost 3 of their last 4 beginning with a 7-2 loss at home to Kansas City in '83. Prior to that, the O's had won 11 of 13 openers beginning in '70, including 7 straight ('70–'76).

For the past 6 years the Orioles have opened the season at home and although they have gone 3-3 in those games, they are 21-12 overall in home openers. Opening day in Baltimore has drawn over 50,000 in seven of the last 8 seasons.

Notes on 20-Game Winners

Although the Orioles have had only one in the past 6 years, Baltimore pitchers have produced 23 20-game seasons in the past 19 years (starting '68), far and away the most in the majors over that period.

From '68 thru '80, a span of 13 years, at least one Oriole pitcher accumulated 20 or more victories to set a major league record. The old standard was 12 by the New York Giants from '03 to '14, a mark single-handedly assured by Christy Mathewson who won 20+ in each of those years.

In 1971 four Baltimore pitchers reached the 20-win plateau. The only other foursome in the entire history of major league baseball to have achieved the feat was a quartet from the 1920 White Sox (51 years earlier): Urban "Red" Faber-23, Claude Williams-22, Dickie Kerr-21 and Ed Cicotte-21. Despite that achievement, the White Sox finished second that year, two games behind Cleveland.

The four Orioles all won their 20th games within 6 days: McNally was the first on 9/21; then in a series in Cleveland, the other three joined him: Cuellar (9/24-first game-clinched division title), Dobson (9/24-2nd game), and Palmer (9/26).

Stone was the earliest 20-game winner in club history, winning his 20th game on August 19 en route to a team record 25 victories in '80. Three other Orioles' hurlers have recorded their 20th wins in August: McNally (8/25) and Cuellar (8/27) in '71 and Palmer (8/30) in '75.

The first Oriole to win 20, and the only one in the club's first 14 seasons in Baltimore ('54 thru '67) was lefthander Steve Barber in 63

NO-HITTERS BY OPPONENTS

Two no-hitters have been pitched against the Orioles in the 33 years they have been back in the A.L., both by California Angels pitchers: Bo Belinsky was the first, on May 5, '62, at Dodger Stadium, winning 2-0 over his former minor league roommate Steve Barber. . . . On June 1, 1975, Nolan Ryan no-hit the O's at Anaheim Stadium, defeating Ross Grimsley, 1-0.

Memorial Stadium's "Diamond Vision" Scoreboard by Mitsubishi stands 25'7" by 33'3". Included among its many capabilities are instant replays, video features, closeups, full color message board displays and animations. It is operated by a staff of 8 under the direction of Game Communications Director Charles Steinberg, DDS.

There are now 16 four color video replay boards in major league ball parks ("Diamond Vision" unless otherwise indicated): Atlanta, Chicago White Sox, Cincinnati (Sony), Houston, Los Angeles, New York Mets, New York Yankees, Oakland, Philadelphia (Panasonic), Pittsburgh, San Diego, San Francisco (Sony), Seattle, St. Louis (Stewart-Warner) & Texas.

The "black & white" board in left center field has been in use since the middle of the 1970 season.

MOST VALUABLE ORIOLES

This award is presented annually by the Sports Boosters of Maryland to the most valuable Oriole player by vote of sportswrites and broadcasters who cover the team on a regular basis.

The 1986 winner was reliever Don Aase. It was the first time: pitcher has won the award since Mike Cuellar was a co-winner in 1974. Oriole first baseman Eddie Murray had been selected "MW" in each of the 5 previous years ('81-'85), including a tie with Cal Ripken in '83.

Aase received 16 of a possible 20 first place votes while amassing 89 points in the 5-3-1 scoring system. Cal Ripken was 2nd in the voting with 4 first place votes and 68 total points. Murray finished 3rd with 12 points, Fred Lynn 4th with 7 points and Larry Sheets 5th with 2

Notes: For the 2nd straight year and the 4th in the last 7, the Orioles failed to win a Gold Glove in '86.

Despite the recent drought, the Orioles have won a total of 48 Gold Gloves since the inception of the award in '57, most in the majors. St Louis, which had 2 winners last season, is 2nd with 44. Others among the leaders are Cincinnati-37, New York Yankees-36, Pittsburgh-33 Philadelphia-32 and Boston-31.

Eddie Murray is the only Oriole to win a Gold Glove since '79 having wor 3 consecutive, '82-'84. Only George Scott and Vic Powers (7 each) have won the award more times among American League first basemen. The only Baltimore first baseman to win a Gold Glove, Eddie is the seventh Oriole to win at least three.

Other Orioles who have been multiple winners are: Brooks Robinson-16 (tied with Jim Kaat for the most ever by one player); Paul Blair and Mark Belanger-8 each; Jim Palmer and Bobby Grich-4 each; Dave Johnson-3; and Luis Aparicio-2.

The Gold Glove Awards are presented by The Sporting News in cooperation with Rawlings Sporting Goods Companys to those players considered to be the best at their positions by vote of league managers and coaches. Selection is based not only on consistency (i.e. fielding percentage) but also range, overall ability and effectiveness.

REVIEW OF THE ORIOLES '86 SEASON

A precipitous slump that spanned the last 2 months of the 198 season, during which the O's went 14-42 (.250), brought an about end to 2 long and distinguished steaks that had provided Orioles 181 with bragging rights for many years.

A string of 18 consecutive winning seasons, 2nd longest in bases history, suddenly ended as did the distinction of never having finishe in last place. Now only the K.C. Royals among the 26 major leage clubs can make that claim.

For the Orioles, summer peaked on Tuesday, August 5 when, after victory over the Texas Rangers in Baltimore, the 2nd place Bits pulled to within 2½ games of division leading Boston. It was to closest any club would come after June 1 to the Red Sox (who to over the A.L. lead permanently on May 14).

At that point the O's were 59-47, had gone 18-9 in the last mort (starting July 5), and were 13-6 after the All-Star break. Things were looking good, but not for long.

Winter began to set in the following night (August 6). It was a memorable game that produced 3 grand slam home runs for the first timer major league history (2 by the O's and one by the Rangers—se "Grand Slams" below), including 2 in the same inning (Larry Sheet and Jim Dwyer). And, it was a game in which the O's, trailing 60 scored 9 times in the 4th inning and went on to take an 11-6 lead after 6 innings. From that point on the season went straight downhill.

The Birds lost that game, 13-11, and went on to drop 42 of their last 56 games (3 out of every 4). During this prolonged slump (2nd severity only to a 9-42 stretch late in '54, the O's 1st year in Baltimore the O's dropped from 2nd to 7th place and from 2½ to 22½ game back of the Bosox. That was the farthest the O's have been out of fits place in exactly 30 years ('56).

The monumental skid reached its nadir over a two-day period in late August (8/28-29) at Oakland where the O's played back-to-back make-up doubleheaders (created by 2 earlier rain outs in Baltimore and dropped all 4 games.

Ironically, in the first of those twin bills, the club's landslide '86 my. **Don Aase**, who demolished the old club record with 34 saves an who had a hand in 55% of the O's victories, was the losing pitcher "sudden death" in both games. He became the first pitcher in the club's history to lose twice in one day. For the Orioles and their fam those were the 2 longest days in the 2 longest months in memory.

NOTES: The O's suffered their earliest official elimination from the pennant race (Sep. 16) since 1967 and settled into last place for got on Sep. 25.

Their 73-89 (.451) record was the club's 4th worst of all-time (b₁ pct.) exceeded only by the first 3 teams to represent Balmer in the American League's modern era: '54 (54-100, .351); '55 (57-97, .370 and '56 (69-85, .448), their first 3 years in Balmer.

Early on there were some memorable efforts, particularly during a month-long stretch (May 10 thru June 8) when the O's jumped from 12-14 to 13 over .500 (a season high) at 33-20. That 21-6 spur vaulted the Birds from 6th to 2nd place, though they gained only 2½ games on the Red Sox during that entire period.

ARTIFICIAL TURF: In '86, the Orioles were 14-11 (.560) of artificial turf (Kansas City, 3-3; Minnesota, 3-3; Seattle, 3-3; Toronto, 5 2) tied for 2nd in the league with Oakland behind leader New York (19 7, .731).

Baltimore's lifetime record on carpet is 149-140 (.516). The O's at 142-136 (.511) in A.L. stadiums (Chicago, 27-24 from '68 thru '75, Kansas City, 32-47; Minnesota, 15-15; Seattle, 34-21; Toronto, 34-29, and 7-4 in 4 world series ('70 Cincinnati, 2-0; '71 Pittsburgh, 0-3; '79 Pittsburgh, 2-1; '83 Philadelphia, 3-0).

BATTING: The Orioles batted .258 (1425/5524), 8th in the A.L. Or Aug. 7, the O's were batting .267, 5th in the league, and had aver aged 4.8 runs per game thru 108 games, but in their final 54 games the O's batted only .240 and scored an average of only 3.6 runs per game.

For the year, the O's scored 3 runs or less 74 times (12-62), 2 runs or less 48 times (6-42) and one run or less 29 times (2-27)... The O's scored 3 runs or less in 33 of their final 54 games. The O's scored nearly 20% of their runs in only 11 games (136 of 708 runs).

The O's were 11th in runs scored (708). They were shut out 13 times, tying Seattle and Chicago for the A.L. lead. It was the most the O's had been shut out since '76 (16) and more than doubled the '85 total (7).

The O's were 6th in the A.L. in home runs (169), 45 less than they hit in '85. They did, however, tie for the major league lead in grand slams (see "Grand Slams") . . The O's led the majors with 159 gidp's and set a club record, breaking the old mark of 158 in '80.

Baltimore's 205 extra base hits, their fewest since '77, were 12th in the league. They finished 12th in doubles and WERE LAST IN THE LEAGUE IN TRIPLES SETTING A MAJOR LEAGUE RECORD FOR FEWEST TRIPLES IN A SEASON (13). The old record was 17 held by 6 other clubs. There were 13 triples hit at Memorial Stadium in '86, and only 2 were hit by the Orioles (Alan Wiggins vs. Minn on May 14 and Eddie Murray on the last day of the season, Oct. 5 vs. Det.)

With Runners in Scoring Position: The Orioles batted .248 (325/1309) with runners in scoring position, exactly 40 points lower than their average in '85. The Orioles' leading hitters with runners in scoring position were: Eddie Murray, .366 (45/123); Juan Beniquez, .315 (23/73); Larry Sheets, .307 (23/75); Juan Bonilla, .286 (18/63); Fred Lynn, .267 (23/86); Cal Ripken, .260 (38/145).

Tie and Lead Runs Produced: Ripken, 33; Lynn, 24; Sheets, 20; Murray, 18; Traber 14; Dwyer, 13; Beniquez, 11; Shelby, 11; Lacy, 10; Young, 10; Dempsey, 9; Bonilla, 7; Rayford, 6; Stefero, 2; Gerhart, 2; Jones, 2; Gutierrez, 1.

close games: The O's were 20-17 (.541) in 1-run games, 3rd in the A.L. behind Boston (24-10, .706) and California (28-16, .636). It was the 23rd time in 33 Baltimore seasons that the O's have had a winning record in such games, but their first since '83.

Baltimore was 14-19 in 2-run games, 11th in the A.L. The O's were 34-36 (.486) in 1- and 2-run games combined, 8th in the A.L.

DAY/NIGHT: The O's had the A.L.'s 4th best record in day games (26-23, .531) despite losing 10 of their last 14. They had the A.L.'s worst record in night games (47-66, .416), their first losing record at night since '62. It was their 3rd worst record ever in night games.

DAYS IN EACH POSITION: First (0); 2nd (25); 3rd (53); 4th (26); 5th (33); 6th (27); 7th (14).

DESIGNATED HITTERS: Orioles' designated hitters topped the league with a .298 average (184/617), highest by an Oriole club since the DH rule was instituted in '73. The O's were 20 points higher than the next closest team (NY, .278) and 42 points higher than the league average for '86 (.256). Oriole DH's had batted only .219 (133/607) in '84 and .232 (142/613) in '85.

O's DH's also led the league in hits (184), total bases (307), gidp's (24) and slugging (.498). They were 5th in hrs (29), 2nd in extra base hits (62), tied for 5th in rbi (97) and struck out 92 times, only K.C. struck out less.

Larry Sheets was the O's most active DH appearing in 58 games and he was tied for 2nd in the A.L. in batting (.302, 62/205, HR-10, RBI-41) among DH's who appeared in 50 or more games. Four other Orioles also batted over .300 as a DH: Eddie Murray, .356 (21/59, HR-1, RBI-4) Jim Dwyer, .343 (24/70, HR-6, RBI-19); Juan Beniquez, .333 (13/39, HR-3, RBI-4); and Jim Traber, .316 (24/76, HR-5, RBI-12)

DOUBLEHEADERS: The O's participated in only 3 double-headers, establishing a club record for fewest in a season. For comparison's sake: in '55 the O's played a club record 32 doubleheaders. For the 2nd straight year the O's failed to win a doubleheader, the only 2 seasons in the club's history that has occurred. The Birds lost 2 twin bills to Oakland on successive days and split one at Toronto giving them a 1-5 record in doubleheader games. Only Minnesota (0-4) had a worse record in the A.L. The O's have not won a doubleheader since Sep. 24, '84 when they took 2 from the Yankees at home. The O's have played 8 twinbills since and are 0-4-4.

FIELDING: The Orioles finished the season tied for 10th in the A.L. in fielding with a .978 pct. (TC-6096, E-135). Both the fielding pct. and the 135 errors were the worst since '59.

ORIOLES 1986 SEASON SUMMARY (Cont.)

The '86 season marked the 2nd straight year that the O's defense has strayed from the norm. In '85, the O's finished tied for 8th in fielding (.979, TC-6127, E-129). In the 24 seasons prior to '85, the 0's had finished first or 2nd in the league 19 times, 3rd twice, 4th once and 5th twice.

The O's were tied for 3rd in the league in double plays and Oriole catchers committed only 7 passed balls, fewest in the league.

Cal Ripken led all major league shortstops in assists (482) and wa 2nd in the A.L. in fielding pct. (.982, TC-735, E-13) behind Toronto's Tony Fernandez (.983, TC-752, E-13). Ripken was also 2nd in double plays with 105 behind Boston's **Spike Owen** (133).

Rick Dempsey was charged with only 2 passed balls, fewest in the league among catchers who caught at least 50 games. Mike Boddicker was 4th in the A.L. in assists (36) and 2nd in total chances (67) behind Cleveland's Tom Candiotti (71). Boddicker was tied for 3rd in putouts (28).

The O's used 10 different 3rd basemen and they combined to make 40 errors. Only Milwaukee's 3rd basemen made more in the A.L. (42) **Floyd Rayford** set a club record for most errors in a game when he made 4 at Cleveland on Apr. 21. He also tied an A.L. record for most errors in a game by a 3rd baseman. The O's had 5 different 2rd basemen play in at least 10 games.

HOME AND AWAY: The O's lost their last 7 home games and 20 of their last 28 to finish with a 37-42 record at Memorial Stadium, ther first losing home record since '72 and only the fifth in club history. Twice the O's lost 7 straight home games (June 16–29 and Sept. 21 thru the end of the season). It was the first time since '72 the O's have lost as many consecutive games at home.

The O's were the only A.L. club with a losing mark at home and one of only three major league clubs (Pittsburgh, 31-50, and Montreal, 36-44). The O's were victims of 5 series sweeps at home during the year They were 36-47 in away games, the 2nd straight year they have been below .500 on the road, but only the 3rd time in the last 19 seasons (starting '68).

GRAND SLAMS: The O's hit 7 grand slams, tying for the major league lead with Boston and California. It marked the 6th straight season the O's have led or tied for the major league lead in grand slams ('81 thru '86). The Orioles have hit 43 grand slams during that span, 13 more than the closest team (California, 30).

The Orioles and Texas Rangers set a major league record on Aug. 6 when the two teams combined to hit three grand slams in Texas' 13-11 win at Memorial Stadium. **Jim Dwyer** and **Larry Sheets** hit the grand slams for the O's, both in the 4th inning. It marked only the 5ti time in major league history that one club has hit 2 grand slams in a single inning. It was the 4th time the O's had hit 2 grand slams in one game. **Toby Harrah** hit Texas' grand slam.

Eddie Murray tied for the A.L. lead with 2 grand slams giving him 14 lifetime, tied for 8th on the all-time list with **Gil Hodges** and 2nd among active players behind **Dave Kingman** (16).

INJURIES: The Orioles went on the disabled list 12 times in '86, believed to be a club record . . . By June 2, six players had already done time on the DL. **Tippy Martinez** was assigned to the list 3 different times and **Eddie Murray** was DL'd for the first time ever in his big league career. Due to injuries to **Murray** and **Fred Lynn**, the **Murray-Lynn-Cal Ripken** trio were in the starting lineup together only 79 times.

By position, the list claimed 5 pitchers, a total of 7 times (Mike Boddicker, Storm Davis, Mike Flanagan, Dennis Martinez and Tippy Martinez—3), 3 infielders (Jackie Gutierrez, Eddie Murray and Floyd Rayford) and one outfielder (Fred Lynn).

Boddicker—torn ligament middle finger of right hand while pitching April 19 . . . Returned May 10, but had trouble with the finger the rest of the year. Despite the pain, he started 33 games.

Davis—DL'd from July 4–22 with strained muscles in right hip, then went out for the year on Sep. 3 when he tore ligaments in right ankle covering 1st base.

Flanagan—tendinitis left elbow, DL'd May 31 to June 19.

Gutierrez—was stricken with Chicken Pox and was out of action from May 14 to June 20.

Lynn—missed a total of 49 games because of an assortment of injuries that included a strained right wrist (June 3), Laryngitis (June

13), severely sprained right ankle for which he was DL'd in June, and a strained right shoulder which bothered him over the last 7 weeks of the season.

D. Martinez—went on the DL with sore right shoulder May 3 and did not pitch again for the O's. He was traded to Montreal on June 16 for a "ptbnl".

T. Martinez—an inner ear infection that left him dizzy and disoriented put him on the list from Apr. 25 to May 28... Less than a month later he returned to the DL with a sore left shoulder (June), was activated July 4, but went back on 13 days later with recurrence of the shoulder problem and was laid up for the rest of the season.

Murray—pulled his left hamstring in Minnesota July 3, aggravated it on July 6 and went on the list July 17 . . . He missed a total of 25 games before being re-activated Aug. 7. Fortunately for the O's, they were 16-9 in those 25 games.

Rayford—chipped a bone in his left thumb in spring training on March 28 and subsequently went on the DL from Apr. 5–21.

Sheets—a pulled right rib cage muscle disabled him from June 30—July 17.

Others who missed some work because of injury included **Don Aase** (strained back Aug. 6—missed a week); **Lee Lacy** (started only 6 of the O's last 32 games because of a rib cage muscle pull); **Nate Snell** (sat out 5 days after being hit by line drive June 5); and **Rick Dempsey** (missed last 3 games after undergoing surgery Oct. 2 for removal of bone chips from right elbow).

LATE INNING WINS: The O's were 17-14 in games decided in a club's last at bat. They came from behind to win 36 times (12 fewer than '85) and were 23-24 in games decided in the 7th inning or later. Baltimore lost 11 games after they had been leading in the 7th inning or later. They had 8 such losses after Aug. 5.

The O's won only 4 games in "sudden death" at Memorial Stadium, tied with '67 as their 2nd lowest total (they had only 3 in '84). The O's were beaten in "sudden death" 6 times on the road including 3 times by Texas and twice in one day at Oakland, Aug. 28 when **Don Aase** became the first Oriole to ever lose both ends of a doubleheader. He was beaten, 5-4, on a 2-out, 2-run homer by **Dave Kingman** in the 9th inning of the first game and 8-7 on a 2-out, 2 run triple by **Carney Lansford** in the 9th inning of the 2nd game.

The O's finished 9th in the A.L. in extra inning games (5-6, .455). It was their 3rd consecutive season with a losing record in extra inning games, but only their 7th in the last 23 seasons.

LINEUPS: The Orioles used 141 different lineups during the season and employed 9 different leadoff hitters. **John Shelby** was the most traveled Oriole in the lineup, batting in 7 different spots (every spot but 4th and 5th).

MANAGERIAL CHANGE: On Sep. 9, it was announced by the Orioles that Earl Weaver would not return as manager of the Orioles in '87. Weaver remained with the O's through the rest of the season and on the day after the regular season, Cal Ripken, Sr. was named the Orioles skipper for '87.

MONTH-BY-MONTH: April: 10-10 (5-4 at home); **May:** 18-8 (10-3 at home); **June:** 11-17 (4-11 at home); **July** 16-11 (9-4 at home); **Aug.:** 10-19 (5-8 at home); **Sep.:** 8-20 (4-9 at home); **Oct.:** 0-4 (0-3 at home).

pinch-HITTING: Oriole pinch hitters were 7th in the A.L. in batting at .253, (43/170), an increase of 67 points over the previous year when they batted only .186. The league average for pinch hitters was .249. Oriole pinch hitters were the 2nd busiest in the league with 200 plate appearances behind Minnesota's 214. Oriole PH's had led the league in that department the last 2 seasons. The O's led the league in doubles (11), were 2nd in rbi (34) and 3rd in hrs (5) and walks (23).

Jim Dwyer hit 3 pinch hrs, all between May 12 and June 19, to tie the club record for most in a season (held by 3 others). Dwyer's 3 pinch hrs gave him 7 lifetime as an Oriole tying **Benny Ayala** for all-time Oriole record. His nine pinch hits moved him into 2nd place on the O's all-time pinch hit list with 36 trailing only **Terry Crowley** (79).

Dwyer was tied for the league lead in pinch hrs with Detroit's Larry Herndon, 1st in doubles (4), walks (7) and total bases (22) and 2nd to Herndon in rbi (12-11). Dwyer finished the season on a 1/22 slump as a pinch hitter.

With a .474 mark (9/19), Juan Beniquez had the A.L.'s 2nd highest

average among pinch hitters with a minimum of 20 plate appearances. Only **Ron Hassey**, who hit .566 (10/18) with NY and Chi. It a higher average. **Beniquez's** average was the 2nd highest in 0th history among pinch hitters with a minimum of 20 plate appearance in a season (**Gene Woodling** hit .526, 10/18 in '59). **Beniquez** half straight pinch hits at one point, one shy of the club record set by **Bu** (**Rocky**) **Johnson** in '64.

A total of 19 players were used as pinch hitters throughout the year

PITCHING: For the 2nd straight year, Oriole pitching number were unusually high. The O's 4.30 staff era, 10th in the A.L. wash 2nd highest in the club history surpassed only by the 4.38 in 85 was only the 4th season ever the O's finished with an era above 4.00

The 10th place finish was the lowest the O's have ever placed in in the A.L. Oriole hurlers also allowed 1,451 hits and 760 runs, to 2nd in club history behind the '85 staff (H-1480, R-764). Opponents 177 hrs, most ever, breaking the old mark of 160 set in '85.

In addition, the O's 17 complete games were their fewest ever the previous low was 23 in '66). Only three A.L. clubs had less (Toron 16, Texas 15, New York 13).

The O's finished with 6 shutouts (only 2 complete game shutout both by **Scott McGregor**), tying the '85 and '54 clubs. Only Seal with 5, had less, while Boston and Minnesota also finished with 6.0 a more positive note, Oriole pitchers fanned 954, 4th highest total the club's history and most since '68.

Oriole starters were 54-69 with a 4.42 era (IP-992.2, ER-487) whith the bullpen was 19-20 with 39 saves in 52 opportunities and a 4.0 era (IP-444, ER-200). The total of 39 saves was the 2nd highest Oriole history (behind 41 in '80). After Aug. 5, while the Orioles we 14-42, the O's era was 5.05 (IP-493.1, ER-277) raising the over mark from 3.91 to its season ending 4.30. During that 56-game alapse, Oriole righthanders (Mike Boddicker, Storm Davis, Karlon Dixon and John Habyan) were 3-19 in their last 33 starts with combined 5.86 era (IP-173.2, ER-113).

Overall, O's starters failed to complete 5 innings on 40 occasion (they were 6-34) and did not get thru 4 innings in 27 starts (they we 4-23). The O's gave up 102 1st inning runs, more than they yielded any other inning and scored only 65. **Mike Boddicker** led the st giving up 28 first inning runs, followed by **Scott McGregor** (27), **Kt Dixon** (18), **Mike Flanagan** (13), **Storm Davis** (10), **John Haby** (4), **Rich Bordi** & **Eric Bell** (1). O's trailed after the first inning 41 time and were 11-30 in those games. Opponents scored first in 103 of 15 games

STREAKS: The Orioles longest win streak was 6 (May 10–15) at their longest losing streak was 7 (Aug. 24–29). It was their longe losing streak since they dropped 8 in a row in '83.

ORIOLES VS. OPPONENTS

VS. BOSTON ('86: 4-9, Lifetime: 276-290): The O's lost the season series the 3rd straight year and for the 4th time in the last 5 years . . . The Red Stare the only A.L. team with a lifetime winning record vs. Baltimore, thoughth Indians are close at 283-284.

Over the past 3 seasons the Red Sox have been particularly effective Memorial Stadium where they are 16-4, including 14-2 starting Sep. 21, % The O's have made out a little better in the recent past at Fenway Park when they are 16-10 over the past 4 seasons . . . The O's last 2 wins vs. the Carmines in Baltimore were both in the Birds' final game at home against the Sox, in '85 and '86.

There were 5 former Red Sox with the Orioles in '86: Don Aase, Jua Beniquez, Jim Dwyer, Jackie Gutierrez and Fred Lynn. The Gutierrez Sammy Stewart trade of Dec. 17, '85 was the first between the two clubs' 25 years since outfielders Willie Tasby and Gene Stephens swapped un forms in 1960.

O's reliever **Tony Arnold** who came up in the 2nd half of the season was a teammate of both **Spike Owen** and **Calvin Schiraldi** at the University of Texas (**Roger Clemens** came the semester after **Tony** signed with O's I June '81). The lights went out for 22 minutes during the game of Sep. 11 a Baltimore, but it wasn't un-precedented . . . In one Yankee series during particularly humid stretch in '78, there were 4 power failures.

Cy Young and MVP awards winner **Clemens** fell one win short of tying the A.L. standard of 16 straight wins at the start of the season (15), held jointly by the O's **Dave McNally** ('69) and Cleveland's **Johnny Allen** ('37) . . . See more on **Clemens** below under "Red Sox Pitching".

RED SOX BATTING: Wade Boggs, the A.L. batting champ at .357 hit .442 (43-19) vs. the O's and now has a .341 career mark against Baltimore (226-77), still shy of his lifetime average in the A.L. (.352, 2778-978).

The most productive Red Sox hitter over the past 2 years against the O's has been **Dwight Evans** whose 18 rbi and 5 homers vs. Baltimore this year were 2nd among all opponents to the Tigers' **Kirk Gibson** (19 rbi, 6 hr). He batted .364 (44-16), and in '85 & '86 combined drove in 31 runs in 26 games, batted .362 (94-34) and hit 8 home runs.

Bill Buckner's 3-year average vs. the O's is .310 (158-49), but he's been 2 different hitters in that time against the Birds. At Baltimore, **Buckner** has batted .432 (88-38), but at Fenway he has hit only .157 (70-11).

Jim Rice had a .396 average vs. the O's in '86 (53-21) with 11 rbi and 2 homers in 13 games . . . Lifetime, **Rice** has hit .335 (585-196) vs. Baltimore pitching with 36 home runs and 116 rbi in 149 games.

Marty Barrett has a .326 (144-47) career average vs. the O's . . . Tony Armas is batting nearly 100 points lower (.228, 351-80) than Barrett but over the last 7 years has driven in 64 runs and hit 25 homers against the Birds in 73 games.

Dave Henderson, who hit .387 (31-12) vs. the O's while splitting the season between Seattle and Boston, has a lifetime average of .358 (151-54) at the Orioles expense, 2nd only to **Don Slaught's** .362 (130-47), among active batters with 100 or more at bats against the O's.In that category, 4 Red Sox (**Henderson-1**, **Boggs-6**, **Rice-7** and **Barrett-9**) rank in the top 10.

RED SOX PITCHING: Clemens was 3-0 in 4 starts (no complete games) gave up 21 hits and 9 earned runs, walked 9 and fanned 23 in 23.2 innings... The only two home runs he yielded to the O's were by **Eddie Murray** in the same game (June 27 at Baltimore). All of his wins were at the expense of **Ken Divon**.

In his final outing against the O's on Oct. 1 designed as a tuneup for post-season, **Clemens** left the game in the 2nd inning after a shot off the bat of **John Stefero** hit him above the right elbow. He didn't pitch again until game 1 of the ALCS on Oct. 7.

Al Nipper was 2-0 in 2 starts despite a 5.11 era (ip-12.1, er-7), while **Bob Stanley** was 0-1 but saved 3 games despite an 8.59 era vs. the O's (7 er in 7.1 inn) and the fact that the O's batted .459 against him (37-17) . . . **Schiraldi,** on the other hand, was 1-0 with a save in 4 appearances, didn't allow an earned run in 8 innings and checked O's batters on a .107 average (28-3).

"Oil Can" Boyd was 1-0 in 2 starts, that win at Baltimore where he is 4-1 lifetime with a 2.45 era (ip-36.2, h-30, er-10) . . . He has pitched 2 of his 6 major league shutouts at Memorial Stadium.

ORIOLES BATTING: The O's hit .313 (224-70) at Fenway where they were 3-3, but only .244 (246-60) at home where they were 1-6 . . . The O's most prolific hitter in Boston was **John Shelby** at .421 (19-8). In his last 14 games at Fenway Park John has gone 22-for-58 (.379) and has a lifetime .322 average there (90-29, G-24, RBI-15).

Eddie Murray batted .417 (48-20) against the A.L. champions and had a .525 on-base percentage (59-31) thanks to 11 walks. He's now hitting .292 (474-143) lifetime vs. Boston.

The O's top career hitters vs. the Red Sox are Floyd Rayford (.354, 79-28), Lee Lacy (.309, 68-21), Murray, and Mike Young (.292, 137-40) whose 27 rbi against the Carmines are a career high . . . Young hit .350 against them in '86 (40-14).

Three former Birds (Beniquez, Juan Bonilla and Stefero) combined to bat .388 off Boston pitching (67-26) in '86.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Nobody had more than one win vs. the Sox and the aformentioned **Dixon** (0-3) was the only multiple loser. He worked in 5 games, 4 of them starts.

Mike Boddicker has a rather remarkable distinction vs. Boston. He has pitched all of the Orioles' last 5 complete games in the rivalry, starting Sep. 5, '83 . . . Mike is 4-5 lifetime and has never beaten the Bosox in Baltimore (0-4): He's 4-1 at Fenway.

Mike Flanagan's no decision start vs. the Sox on Sep. 8 was his first

Gary Pettis who entered the season with a .164 lifetime mark (55) batted .324 (37-12) against the O's which boosted his career figure to a mo presentable .228 (92-21)

ANGELS PITCHING: Kirk McCaskill (4-0), who led all opponents in with innings (34), walks (15) and strikeouts (24), and Mike Witt (1-2) account for 7 of the 12 Angels decisions in the season series

McCaskill is one of 3 pitchers to have beaten the O's 4 times since to A.L. adopted balanced scheduling in '79, along with John Butcher (Twis '84) and Joe Cowley (Yankees '85). Pat Dobson holds the post-expanse record with 5 wins vs. Balmer for Cleveland in '76

McCaskill compiled a 2.38 era in his 4 starts which included 2 compe games (ip-34, er-9, bb-15, so-24) and held the O's to a .164 (116-19) du average.

CHICAGO BATTING: Wayne Tolleson hit .385 (26-10) vs. the O's and whacked 2 of his season total of 3 home runs off Scott McGregor. Lifetime, Tolleson is a .316 (95-30) hitter vs. Baltimore and 3 of his 7 career homers have been hit off O's pitching.

Bobby Bonilla (.389, 18-7), Greg Walker (.345, 29-10) and Harold Baines (.326, 43-14) also prospered against the Orioles in '86.

CHICAGO PITCHING: No Chicago pitcher won more than one game, but 2 of them went 0-2-Floyd Bannister and Joe Cowley. Bannister has lost 6 straight decisions to the O's, including one in the '83 ALCS, since his last victory against them on Aug. 11, '83. Bannister is 6-8 lifetime (regular season). Cowley had a 9.90 era (ip-10, er-11) to go with his 0-2 record, following a 4-0 mark with a 2.76 era (ip-26, er-8) while with the Yankees in '85.

Reliever Bob James was 0-1 with a save in 4 appearances during which he yielded 8 earned runs in 3.1 innings (21.60 era) and was touched for a .500 average by O's hitters (18-9) . . . Richard Dotson, 1-1 in '86, has lost 6 of his last 8 decisions to Baltimore including '83 ALCS

BALTIMORE BATTING: Eleven of the 16 Orioles who had at least 2 at bats against Chicago in '86 batted .296 or better. Tops among them were Larry Sheets (.360, 25-9), Juan Bonilla (.341, 41-14) and Fred Lynn (37-13). Rick Dempsey was the Birds' home run leader vs. the Sox with 3.

Lee Lacy has a .354 (82-29) 2-year average vs. Chicago; Cal Ripken Witt fanned 23 in 22.2 innings, but his era was 4.76 (h-19, er-12) and has a career high 16 homers off Chisox pitching and is batting .315 (232-73) and both Larry Sheets (.316, 38-12) and Fred Lynn (.305, 374-114) have both hit over .300 lifetime against Chicago.

The most productive hitter for the Tribe, **Cory Snyder**, played in only games vs. the O's but led the club in both homers (4) and rbi (8) while bating .357 (28-10). BALTIMORE BATTING: Rookie **Jim Traber** batted .375 (24-9) and **Lee Laq** (.356, 45-16) were the top hitters for the O's in the season series, but the key to the Indians' success, perhaps, was the fact that they held both **Cal Ripken** (.140, 50-7) and **Fred Lynn** (.167, 36-6) in check.

Aside from **Traber,** 5 other Orioles are batting .299 or over lifeting against the Tribe: **Eddie Murray** (.338, 453-153), **Jackie Gutierrez** (.337, 86-29), **Lee Lacy** (.324, 71-23), **Larry Sheets** (.304, 46-14) and **Lynn** (.29, 492-147).

BALTIMORE PITCHING: Ken Dixon (2-1, 2.33 era) was the only multiple winner vs. the Tribe in '86. He had half the O's wins vs. Cleveland, and is now 3-1 lifetime with a 2.23 era (ip-44.1, er-11). Both Mike Flanagan (0-3) and Mike Boddicker (0-2) were big losers. The Indians batted .333 (66-22) of Flanagan in '86

Boddicker is 0-3 vs. the Indians since going 3-0 against them during his 20-win season in '84... The last of those victories was on Aug. 8, '84. **Scot McGregor** who at 10-10 is both the biggest winner and loser among current. O's vs. Cleveland has dropped 7 straight to the Indians since his last win, on Aug. 4, '83 over **Bud Anderson.**

Don Aase has a career-high 8 wins against Cleveland but his 5.72 eavs. the Tribe is also a high vs. a single opponent (ip-66, er-42).

VS. DETROIT ('86: 1-12, Lifetime: 296-277) . . . The O's 1-12 (.077) record against the Tigers tied for the worst ever against an opponent in a seasor series (by percentage). The Birds were also 1-12 against the Yankees in '85, and, back in '62, experienced an horrendous 2-16 season against the Tigers.

The O's only win occurred on June 24 at Detroit, 2-1, in 10 innings with Don Aase beating Bill Campbell. Starters Scotty McGregor and Eric King combined with the aformentioned relievers to pitch 3-hitters. The decisive run crossed on a Tom O'Malley 2-out single in 10th.

The Tigers became only the 2nd team ever to go undefeated in a season at Memorial Stadium (7-0) at Memorial Stadium. The Rangers went 5-0 in

Detroit has won 8 in a row overall over the O's (since the June 24 defeat and has also captured 8 straight on 33rd Street since **Aase** decisioned **Bill Scherrer** on the next to last day of '85 season (Oct. 5). The Tigers have also gone 21-7 in Balmer starting Sep. 21, '82. Contrary to what **Bill Brown** has often said, hopefully, time will dim the glory of the Bengals deeds.

The Tigers dominated in every phase. They out-hit the O's .299 to .200, out-scored them by a whopping 86 to 35 and out-pitched them 2.52 to 6.29.

In '85 the O's hit 26 home runs off Detroit pitching. Last year they could produce only 11 total, including just one in homer-cozy Tiger Stadium. None-theless, in the last 2 years the O's have hit 37 and the Tigers 41 homers, a total of 78 in the last 26 games between the 2 clubs.

DETROIT BATTING: Kirk Gibson hit 6 home runs and drove in 19, both highs among Orioles' opponents (**Dwight Evans** had 5 and 18 for 2nd place in 40

each category) . . . As a matter of fact, it was the most rbi by one player vs. the O's since the A.L. went to balanced scheduling in '79.

Gibson who hit .385 (52-20) was just one of 11 (out of 20 Detroit batters) to hit .300 or more vs. Balmer pitching. Lifetime Gibson is batting .302 (242-73) and Johnny Grubb .318 (170-54), but the top career hitter among current Bengals is Larry Herndon who batted .393 (28-11) vs. the O's in '86 and is hitting .333 (189-63) lifetime.

DETROIT PITCHING: The rookie **Eric King** had a sensational debut against the O's. In 5 appearances, including 2 starts he was 3-0 with an 0.69 era and held the O's to a .105 average (86-9). He fanned 23 in 26 innings and allowed only 2 earned runs.

Jack Morris, Frank Tanana, and Walt Terrell each went 2-0 ... Morris evened his career record at 8-8. but is 3-6 in the last 5 years. Tanana had a 0.64 era (ip-14, er-1) in 2 starts and held the O's to a .167 average (48-8) while boosting his career record to 16-11 vs. Baltimore ... He and the Twins' Bert Blyleven, also 16-11, are tied for most career wins agains the O's among actives.

Dan Petry who had no record in 2 starts has beaten the Birds in 7 of his last 8 decisions and is 11-7 lifetime. Willie Hernandez was touched for 4 runs in 7 innings (5.14 era) over 5 appearances, but came away with a victory and 3 saves.

ORIOLES BATTING: The Tigers held Eddie Murray (.245, 0 hr, 2 rbi) and Cal Ripken (.224, 1 hr, 2 rbi) in check and Fred Lynn appeared in only 2 games against the Tigers, none in Detroit where he has driven in 50 runs in 64 games at Tiger Stadium. Lifetime vs. the Bengals, Lynn is batting .314. (481-151). The O's top hitter in '86 was Jim Dwyer (.333, 15-5) who saw only limited duty. Jim has a .307 career mark (163-50) vs. Detroit.

Murray, for the last 3 years, has been held to a .196 average (143-28) by Detroit pitchers. Last year he failed to hit a home run at Tiger Stadium where he has been most prolific in the past (17, more than in any other road ballpark). Eddie's .241 career average against Detroit (510-123) is his lowest against one opponent, but his 27 homers are a career high (also has hit 27 ys. Brewers).

Rick Burleson has a career high 134 hits vs. Detroit, and, starting Aug. 13, '80, has batted .348 (69-24) against the Tigers.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Though the Tigers were the only club against which he did not record a save in '86, Aase was the only Oriole to get a win over Detroit (see above). **Scott McGregor** was 0-3 and **Mike Flanagan** 0-2.

McGregor has beaten Detroit only once since Sep 18, '80. That was on Oct. 4, '85 over Petry . . . He has lost 8 of his last 9 decisions to the Tigers and is 3-10 since winning 10 of his first 11 lifetime decisions against them. At 13-11 he is both the biggest winner and loser against the Tigers on the current O's staff. Flanagan is 12-10 lifetime.

Ken Dixon is only 0-1 in 2 full seasons vs. Detroit but has held Tiger batters to a .200 average (105-21).

VS. KANSAS CITY ('85: 6-6, Lifetime: 116-92) . . . The O's have won only 2 season series against the Royals in the last 11 years ('81 & '83) . . . In that period, starting '76, they've won 2, lost 4 and tied 5 times . . . During the 7 years of the 80's, the 2 clubs are 40-40.

In '86, despite the even split of 12 games, K.C. out-hit (.257-.234), out-scored (55-42) and out-pitched (3.14-4.38) the O's.

The O's last place finish in '86 leaves the Royals as the only club in the major leagues that has never wound up in the cellar.

18 YEAR RIVALRY: The Orioles still hold a 24 game edge in the rivalry that began in '69 and are 67-38 vs. the Royals in Baltimore (.638) . . . The O's edge was constructed primarily in '69 & '70 when they beat the fledgling Royals in 23 of 24 outings, including a major league record 23 consecutive times after **Dick Drago** beat **Dick Hall** on May 9, '69 in the first game ever between these 2 clubs.

Since that streak ended, the O's advantage is only 93-91.

K.C. CARPET: The O's have gone 13-11 at Royals Stadium the last 4 years, but are only 32-47 since the new ballpark opened in '73 . . . Prior to that the O's were 17-7 against the Royals in old Municipal Stadium.

ROYALS BATTING: Willie Wilson hit .346 (52-18) against the O's in '86 and over the past 2 seasons has hit .358 (106-38) against Baltimore pitching.

VS. KANSAS CITY (Cont.)

Lifetime he owns a .301 mark (362-109) vs. the O's, and has stolen 36tm in 42 attempts (.857).

Two others who have excelled throughout their careers against the are Hal McRae and Jim Sundberg who hit .345 (29-10) and .333 (36-12), the O's respectively in '86. Lifetime, McRae has a .294 average (479-11) not including his 5-for-11 effort with the Reds in the '70 World Series Sundberg has a .303 (433-131) career mark vs. Baltimore.

George Brett is batting .317 (511-162) against the O's lifetime but the last 6 years has been held to .237 (219-52) . . . Steve Balboni leth Royals last year in both home runs (4) and rbi (8) against the O's. Juz Beniquez has a .337 (371-125) career average vs. the O's.

ROYALS PITCHING: Danny Jackson went 2-0 and yielded only one earn run in 13 innings (0.69 era) over 2 starts while O's hitters pounded him a .163 clip (43-7). He's 4-2 lifetime . . . Charlie Leibrandt was 3-0 going last year but dropped both decisions to the O's in '86 while the O's bas .333 (60-20) against him.

When **Bret Saberhagen** was 20-6 in '85, he was 0-2 vs. the 0's by year he was 7-12 overall but went 1-0 against Baltimore . . . Lifetime, help held 0's batters to a .227 average (141-32).

Dan Quisenberry was 0-1 last year with no saves in 4 appearance Lifetime he is 2-3 with 15 saves in 38 appearances and has a 2.35 at (ip-57.1, er-15). He's held the O's to a .233 average (210-49).

ORIOLES BATTING: Larry Sheets (.381, 21-8) and Cal Ripken (.333, 42-1) led the O's against K.C. in '86... Fred Lynn hit only .200 (40-8) but 4dh safeties were home runs.

The only current Oriole with a .300+ career average vs. K.C. is Javi Gutierrez (.337, 69-23). Rick Burleson, beginning July 16, '80, has hit 3: (84-31) against the Royals. Has career high tying .298 average vs. the Rox (346-103) . . . Also has a .298 mark against Oakland.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Don Aase who was 1-0 with 3 saves in 5 appearant last year has been particularly effective against the Royals lifetime. He's with 5 saves and a 2.40 era (ip-82.1, er-22). **Scott McGregor** (9-10) a **Mike Flanagan** (9-14) are the O's biggest current lifetime winners vs 1 Royals and **Flanagan** the biggest loser.

Last year **Mike Boddicker** at 2-0 was the Birds only multiple win against the Royals, while **Ken Dixon** (1-2) and **McGregor** (0-2) were by multiple losers.

VS. MILWAUKEE ('86: 6-7, Lifetime: 160-90) . . . The O's led 6-2 in season series then lost the last 5 games, including 4 at Milwaukee Septhru 28 . . . At Baltimore, the O's were 4-2 and have now gone 24-6 (.800) the Brewers at Memorial Stadium starting Oct. 1, '82.

Lifetime at Memorial Stadium the O's are 83-40 (.673) against the Beers, and, at County Stadium, they're 72-49 (.595).

Overall against the Brewers, the O's hold a 43-23 (.652) edge beginn Sep. 20, '81 . . . Since the start of the franchise (in Seattle '69) the O's 160-90 (.640) against the Brewers, their 2nd best record vs. one opport (#1 = 72-38, .655 vs. Mariners).

The only club with more errors at 3rd base last year than the Orioles by 10 different players was the Brewers whose five 3rd baseman commit 42 miscues at the hot corner.

BREWERS BATTING: Jim Gantner was batting only .194 lifetime vs. the lafter his first 7 years in the A.L. (thru '84) . . . In the last 2 years, however, has belted Baltimore pitching at a .384 clip (73-28) and has boosted career mark to .242 (284-69). Paul Molitor batted only .138 (29-4) in '861 the Birds.

BREWERS PITCHING: Teddy Higuera's first career win against the O'si Sep. 25 at County Stadium was his 20th victory of '86, making him only 12nd Mexican ever to become a 20-game winner in the majors (3 days at Countryman Fernando Valenzuela won his 20th for the 1st time). Higue would have been the 1st if he had beaten the O's on Sep. 19 in Baltimo but he lost to Ken Dixon, 3-1.

Bill Wegman is only 7-12 in the major leagues, but he's 3-1 lifetimes the Orioles. The only multiple winner vs. the O's in '86 was rookie lefthand **Dan Plesac** who was 2-1.

ORIOLES BATTING: Eddie Murray is the O's top career hitter vs. Milwauk at .327 (465-152) and his 27 home runs against the Brewers are a care high (has also hit 27 vs. Detroit). **Jim Dwyer** is also a .300 + lifetime hittery Milwaukee (.315, 108-34).

ORIOLES PITCHING: The O's staff put together a 2.98 era against the Brewers last year. **Scott McGregor**, at 11-7, is the current O's biggest winner against Milwaukee while **Mike Flanagan**, 9-10, is the biggest loser.

McGregor who lost 5 of his first 6 lifetime decisions against Milwaukee has since won 10 of 12.

Ken Dixon was only 1-2 vs. the Brewers but had a 1.88 era (ip-24, h-19, er-5, so-19). Lifetime he's 2-2 with a 2.08 (ip-39, er-9), his best era against one opponent.

He pitched his only big league shutout vs. the Brewers when he blanked **Higuera** Sep. 17, '85 at Baltimore. A year and 2 days later he had another shutout going against **Higuera** with 2 down in the top of the 9th at Baltimore, but a solo homer by **Earnie Riles** spoiled it. However, **Ken** finished with a 3-1 complete game win.

Mike Boddicker's 6-3 career record with a 2.71 era (ip-79.2, er-24) includes a 5-1 mark at Memorial Stadium . . . Don Aase in 4 appearances against the Brewers as an Oriole has not allowed a run (6 innings) and has picked up 4 saves in the process.

VS. MINNESOTA ('86: 8-4, Lifetime: 195-155 vs. Twins only) . . . In last 10 years the O's have lost only one season series to the Twins. That was in '84. In that period, starting '77, the O's are 7-1-2 against Minny in season sets. Lifetime, they are 14-6-6 in season series since the Minnesota franchise was born ('61).

The O's were 10-8 against **Ray Miller** over parts of 2 seasons . . . In '88 the O's out-hit the Twins (.284 to .233), and out-scored them (64-51), though Minnesota held the edge in homers (20-18).

TWINS BATTING: Both Gary Gaetti and Kirby Puckett have had good success against the O's. Gaetti was a .349 (43-15) hitter in '86 and is batting .318 lifetime (211-67) . . . Puckett batted .320 (50-16) in the season series and has a .341 career average vs. Baltimore (123-42).

Though the O's held **Kent Hrbek** to a .190 average (42-8) last year, he led the Twins in both homers (4) and rbi (9) against Baltimore.

TWINS PITCHING: Bert Blyleven (2-0 in '86) and the Tigers. Frank Tanana are both 16-11 lifetime vs. the O's and thus share the distinction of being the biggest winners against the Birds among active pitchers. **Tommy John** (15-17), the biggest loser, is only one victory behind them.

Despite **Blyleven's** success vs. the O's, **Fred Lynn** (.389, 36-14), **Cal Ripken** (.379, 29-11) and **Eddie Murray** (.368, 38-14) have hit him very well over the years.

Neal Heaton started twice vs. the O's after joining the Twins, gave up only 2 runs in 17 innings and was 0-2. He was beaten both times by 1-0 scores, all within 13 days (July 6 & 19), by **Ken Dixon** and **Mike Flanagan**.

Frank Viola was 1-3 . . . He, Jose Guzman (Texas) and Jimmy Key (Toronto) were tied for most losses against the O's. Viola who pitched 2 complete games in 4 starts had a 6.06 era (ip-32.2, er-22). Only Kirk McCaskill pitched more innings (34) against Baltimore. Viola's lone victory was a route-going effort on July 5 in which he decisioned Mike Flanagan, 7-6, on 11 hits . . . Flanagan also pitched a complete game.

BALTIMORE BATTING: Fred Lynn's lifetime .328 average (461-151) against Minnesota, his 31 homers and 106 rbi are all career highs against one opponent. Over his last 26 games vs. the Twins, starting Aug. 2, '84, he has hit 10 homers and driven in 28 runs. He hit 9th inning homers in 3 straight games against Minny May 10–11–12, '85, at Baltimore, 2 of them "sudden death" game-winners.

Others with .300+ career bat marks against Minny are: **Cal Ripken** whose .356 average (236-84) average vs. Minny is a career high; **Eddie Murray** (.310, 410-127), and **Alan Wiggins** (.325, 40-13).

Ripken who batted .450 (40-18) against them in '86 has never hit below .300 in one season vs. Minnesota ('82-.326, '83-.367, '84-.313, '85-340). He has had three 5-hit games in his career, 2 of them vs. the Twins at HHH, May 5, '85 & Sep 3, '83. In the latter game, he tied or broke 4 club records in a 13-0 Orioles rout. Among the records tied that day was most total bases (13) Lifetime, Rip has driven in 27 runs in 30 games at the "Hump", and has 48 rbi in 60 career games vs. Minnesota overall.

BALTIMORE PITCHING: Don Aase was at his brilliant best against the Twins last year . . . He had 6 saves in 6 appearances, didn't allow a run in 11

innings, and held the Twins to a .086 (35-3) average and 5 total baserum Lifetime, Don is 7-2 with 7 saves, and has saved 7 of the O's last 9 m against Minny.

Ken Dixon (3-0) was the O's most effective starter . . . He had a 1998 (22.2 ip, 5 er) and held the Twins to a .187 (75-14) average in 3 starts.

Flanagan who once won 14 straight games vs. the Twins (from Ma) '77 until Apr. 7, '84) is 16-6 lifetime though he was only 1-2 in '86... In Boddicker who has worked more innings vs. the Twins (97.2) than again any other A.L. club was 2-1.

Tippy Martinez has thrown only one home run ball in 37 lifetime gare

VS. NEW YORK ('86: 5-8, Lifetime: 288-281) . season series for the 4th straight year (starting '83) during which time to hold a 35-17 edge (.673) edge over the O's.

Beginning June 23, '84 the Yankees have compiled an even my impressive mark against the Birds (26-8, .765), and in Baltimore the Yarie have gone 13-2 (.867) starting Sep. 15, '84.

However, the Orioles remain the only A.L. team with a lifetime wm record against the Bombers (288-281, .506)). Next in rank are the Mha kee Brewers (Milwaukee only) at .477 (115-126), followed by Detroit at 4

AT YANKEE STADIUM: The O's were 4-2 at Yankee Stadium after hair gone 0-7 there in '85. The Birds' sweep of the 3-game series in NYC, Ju 6-7-8 (climaxed by the 18-9 win in the finale-see below under 1 Longest Game") snapped a string of 10 straight losses that began in & 1984 in the "House that Ruth Built"

As a team the O's batted .326 (227-74), scored 42 runs and hit homers in the 6 games at New York.

Heroes in the O's resurgence at New York were Lee Lacy (3 hrs in or game-see below), John Shelby (.368 avg., 7-for-19, including 2 doubles). homers, and a team leading 9 rbi in 5 games in the 2 series at NYC) and Dr Aase (3 saves in 4 appearances).

Lifetime, the O's are 128-139 (.479) in the Bronx, the best lifetime reor there by any visiting club. The next highest percentage is Detroit's 4 (250-354), followed by the Oakland A's-regular season only (.411, 44-63). the new Yankee Stadium which opened in '76 the O's are 37-39.

SEASON SERIES MISCELLANY: In the season series the O's out-hit (.274) .260), and out-homered (18 to 17) the Yankees who held a 62 to 60 edge runs and 4.23 to 4.58 advantage in the pitching department. A total of players saw action in the 13 games, 39 Yankees (incl. 16 pitchers) and 340 (incl. 14 pitchers).

YANKEES PITCHING: Dave Righetti played a key role in all but one of the Yankees' 8 wins against the O's. In 8 appearances he was 1-0 with 6 saves and an era of 1.59 (ip-11.1, er-2) . . . In the last 2 seasons, Righetti is 2-0 with 9 saves in 14 appearances. When he blew a save in Baltimore on Sep. 23, it was his first failure since July 1 after converting 24 straight opportunities. Cal Ripken's home run off Righetti that day was one of only 4 he yielded all year (Rob Deer, Wally Joyner & George Bell).

Dennis Rasmussen, the Yankees' biggest winner at 18-6, was 2-0 vs. against Minnesota, spanning 55.1 innings . . . That blow was by the O's in 2 starts with a 1.72 era (ip-15.2, er-3) . . . Bob Tewksbury was 2-1

Brunansky at HHH July 4, '84.

Ron Guidry went 0-1 and is now 10-8 lifetime. In '86 the O's batted .435 (23-10) against Guidry in his one start against them.

ORIOLES BATTING: Four days after Lacy hit his 3 homers at Yankee Stadium, Juan Beniquez followed suit against the Bombers in the opening game of a series in Baltimore (June 12) . . . There have been 13 three-homer games in O's history, these 2 in back-to-back games (in effect) vs. New York.

Overall, the top hitter in the series was Beniquez (.385, 26-10), but Mike Young (.343, 35-12), Ripken (.321, 53-17) and Alan Wiggins (.320, 25-8) also enjoyed some success at the Yankees' expense. Young went 8-for-19 (.421) at Yankee Stadium in '86.

The two current Orioles with the best lifetime averages against New York are a couple of former Carmines: Jackie Gutierrez (.292, 96-28) and Fred Lynn (.285, 418-119).

ORIOLES PITCHING: Mike Boddicker was the O's only multiple winner against the Yankees at 2-1 . . . He is now 7-4 lifetime vs. the Bombers, 4-0 at Memorial Stadium.

On the losing side, Scott McGregor was 1-3. He is now 7-14 lifetime and has lost 9 of his last 10 decisions to the Yankees. Since he defeated Dave Righetti on Sep. 6, '82 at New York, he has logged only one victory over the Yankees. That was June 6, '86 over Guidry, and it snapped a 6-game losing streak vs. N.Y. Five of his 7 career wins over the Bombers have been shutouts.

Mike Flanagan's loss to the Yankees Sep. 24, '86 (to Rasmussen) snapped a 6-game win streak. It was the first time he'd been beaten by New York since Tommy John defeated him on Aug. 15, '80. Mike who is 12-8 lifetime is first in career wins over the Yankees among actives.

He has been very streaky against them throughout his career. After starting with a 1-2 record, he beat them 5 straight, then lost 5 in a row before the aforementioned 6 game win skein.

Don Aase made 7 appearances in the season series and went 0-0 with 4 saves. He has saved 5 of the O's 6 wins against the Yankees over the last 2 seasons, and his 10 career saves at the Bombers' expense are a career

VS. OAKLAND ('86: 5-7, Lifetime: 130-100 vs. Oak. only) . . . The Orioles dropped the season series to the A's for the first time since '76. From '77 thru YANKEES BATTING: The 2 most productive Yankee batters in the seasons '86, the O's are 8-1-1 against the A's, and have a 74-43 (.632) edge in

At Oakland the O's were 3-5 (including 2 games rained out in Balmer and made up at the Coliseum . . . see "6 Game Series" below). Despite the losing Rickey Henderson experienced only modest success (for him) vs. th record in '86, the Birds have gone 67-52 (.563) lifetime in the East Bay area,

VS. OAKLAND (Cont.)

SIX GAME SERIES: The O's played the first 6 game series in their 33 ps history, Aug. 28–31, in Oakland. It was necessitated by back-to-backrame of the last 2 scheduled O's-A's games in Baltimore (Aug. 20 and 21).

The Birds salvaged only one of those games (the next to last, Sat, Ng. 30) thanks to a great piece of relieving by **Odell Jones** who protected so lead and allowed only one hit over the last 4.1 innings while striking out?

At the start of the set the O's dropped consecutive doubleheaders. Thu. and Fri. (8/28–29), and the Birds' MVP **Don Aase** had the misloture becoming the first Oriole ever to lose both ends of a doubleheader on same day. That ignominy befell him the first day in town, and to make it was both defeats occurred in "sudden death", and both were save opportune... **Wes Stock** is the only pitcher to have won 2 garnes in one day in Orioles uniform. He did it at Cleveland back near the turn of the centre (5/26/63).

In game one, a 2-out homer by **Dave Kingman** with one on (ab) **Carney Lansford** and **Jose Canseco** had struck out) gave the Asas win. In the nightcap **Lansford's** 2-run triple produced anothe come-from-behind win, 8-7.

After losing the 2nd doubleheader, the O's dropped into last place at the all-star break for the first time since the inception of divisional play in this was not the first time the O's had dropped twin bills in successive days had happened twice before but not since May '57.

A'S BATTING: Tony Phillips was a one-man show in Baltimore during the first '86 visit, May 16–18. He went 10-for-13 in the series, became the is Oakland representative ever to hit for the cycle on the 16th, going 5-for-5 in night, and had 7 straight hits at one stretch. In the only other 2 games in played against the O's in '86, Phillips went 0-for-10 (he was out much of the 2nd half with injuries).

Phillips (.435, 23-10), and Alfredo Griffin (.354, 48-17) were the top hitters against the O's but Lansford (11 rbi) and Canseco (10 rbi) were to most productive. During his 2 years in Oakland, Griffin has a .348 average (92-32) vs. Baltimore.

Reggie Jackson has hit 40 career homers vs. the O's (including 2 in the '71 ALCS), tops among actives, though he has not hit one in his last 2 games against the Birds, since July 25, '83 (off Mike Boddicker a California). He ranks tied for 3rd with Al Kaline on the all-time list vs. the 0s behind Harmon Killebrew (70) and Mickey Mantle (44).

A'S PITCHING: Moose Haas beat the O's in Baltimore on May 16 for only to 2nd time in his career. He's 6-8 overall against the Birds, but only 2-4 in the home town. That win gave him a 7-1 overall record and the major league lead in wins, but injuries prevented him from winning another game the rest of the season.

Dave Stewart in 3 appearances including 2 starts (one cg shutout) wa 2-0 with an 0.46 era (ip-19.2, er-1) . . . **Chris Codiroli** went 0-2.

0'S BATTING: The O's top hitters against the A's lifetime are: **John Shelb**₁ (.308, 107-33), **Eddie Murray** (.306, 408-125) and **Alan Wiggins** (.326, 46-15)... In '86, **Murray** hit .381 (42-16) and drove in 15 runs in 12 games **Larry Sheets** led the O's with 4 homers and batted .350 (40-14)

0'S PITCHING: Scott McGregor, now 11-3 lifetime vs. the A's, has beater them 8 straight times since his last loss on Aug. 22, '81 (at Oakland) when he was beaten by **Rick Langford**, 2-0. He has a 6-0 career record against the A's at Memorial Stadium.

Mike Flanagan was 0-0 in 2 starts and is still 15-5 lifetime and 10-1 at the Coliseum. His only career loss at the Coliseum was on Aug. 25, '85, a defeat that marred his heretofore perfect 10-0 record. **Mike's** era at Oakland is a stunning 2.33 (ip-109, h-80, er-28) . . . At home against the Athletics, **Mike's** only 5-4 with a 5.43 (IP-69.2, ER-42).

Though he has a losing lifetime record (3-5) against Oakland and is 1-4 over the last 2 years, **Mike Boddicker** has a 2.84 career era (IP-63.1, ER-21) vs. the A's. **Aase** has a 2.41 (IP-93, ER-25) despite his '86 problems against Oakland.

VS. SEATTLE ('85: 6-6, Lifetime: 72-38) . . . The O's have never lost a season series to the Mariners against whom they are 7-0-3 in the decade the M's have been in the league. However, the 2 clubs have tied at 6-6 in each of the last 2 seasons.

Overall, the O's .655 (72-38) percentage against Seattle is their best against a single opponent. At Baltimore the O's have maintained a 38-17 (.691) advantage over the M's (also Birds' best vs. one club) . . . The Mariners have won only 3 of 20 series played at Memorial Stadium. They lost their first 14 games there, until former Oriole **Mike Parrott** beat **Sammy Stewart** July 25, '79. Since that time, the O's edge has been 24-17 (.585).

At the Kingdome, the Orioles have a 34-21 advantage (.618).

O'S ON WEST COAST: For the Orioles, 1986 was their first losing season on the west coast since '77 . . . They went 8-12 in the three Pacific ports of call to snap a string of 9 straight years in which they had posted a cumulative .500

or better record.

Over that period ('77 thru '85) the O's had logged a combined 87-52 (626) regular season record while visiting in California and Washington. In '86 the O's were: 2-4 at California, 3-5 at Oakland and 3-3 at Seattle. Over the past 10 years the O's still have highly respectable records in the 3 ballparks: California (30-23), Oakland (33-23) & Seattle (32-18) for a total of 95-64 (.597). MARINERS BATTING: The top 2 Seattle hitters were, interestingly enough, Dave Henderson (.417, 24-10) and Spike Owen (.360, 25-9), both of whom were traded to Boston on August 19.

The only Mariner who stuck it all year and hit over .300 was **Harold Reynolds** (.318, 44-14). **Ken Phelps** hit 4 of his 24 homers against the O's and tied **Bill Presley** for the anti-Baltimore rbi lead with 9.

MARINERS PITCHING: Mike Moore was 3-1 vs. the O's in 4 starts and all 3 wins were at the expense of Ken Dixon (who also lost 3 times to Roger Clemens). Moore hurled 2 complete games and registered a 2.87 era (ip-31.1, h-32, er-10). Moore is now 6-7 lifetime, but in the last 2 years has gone 5-2 with a 2.26 era (ip-59.2, er-15) and held Orioles batters to a .223 average (220-49).

Mike Morgan did something in a Seattle uniform last year he hadn't ever done for any previous club—beat the Orioles. It took a little more than 8 years since he broke into pro ball at the major league level in '78 for Charlie Finley's Oakland A's and lost both his first 2 starts to the O's (June 11 & 17). His victory was a complete game, 6-2 win over Mike Boddicker September 6 at Memorial Stadium. He is now 1-8 lifetime vs. the Birds.

Mark Langston was 1-2 in 3 starts, and had a monstrous 9.22 era (ip-13.2, er-14) while O's batters combed him for a .397 average (63-25).

ORIOLES BATTING: Despite a .294 (428-126) team-wide average against the Mariners who hit only .254 (402-102) vs. the Orioles, the O's scored only one less run than the M's (51 to 50).

Eight of the 18 O's who came to bat against Seattle pitching batted over 300 in '86, led by **Cal Ripken** (51-18) and **Mike Young** (34-12), both of whom hit .353 in the season series. **Eddie Murray** batted .349 (49-17) without a home run. **Young** went 7-for-15 (.467) in the Kingdome last year.

Larry Sheets (.339, 59-20), **Ripken** (.306, 242-74) and **Murray** (.304, 405-123) all sport .300+ career averages vs. Seattle.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Mike Boddicker was 2-2 with a 4.56 era (ip-25.2, er-13) vs. Seattle and the M's batted .300 (100-30) against him last year, but lifetime he is 5-2.

He was a perfect 5-0 and had a career 1.33 era vs. Seattle (ip-47.1, er-7) before his last 2 starts against them in '86, on Aug. 27 and Sep. 6. Then he lost both and was roughed up for 8 earned runs in 9.1 innings to boost his lifetime era to 2.37 (ip-57, er-15), still his best against one club.

Ken Dixon beat Morgan in his first '86 effort vs. the M's, then lost 3 in a row to Moore. He's 2-3 lifetime . . . Mike Flanagan was 0-0 but is 9-4 lifetime, and is the biggest winner against Seattle among current O's . . Scott McGregor is 7-5.

VS. TEXAS ('86: 5-7, Lifetime: 102-66, Texas only.) . . . The O's lost the season series to the Rangers for the first time since '77, and for only the 3rd time since the Senators became the Rangers in '72.

In that 15 year period, the O's have won 9, lost 3 and tied 3. The Rangers by winning 7 of the 12 games put an end to the O's dominance over the previous 4 years ('82: 9-3, '83: 9-3, '84: 9-3, '85: 10-2) during which they had gone 37-11 (.772).

VS. TEXAS (Cont.)

Despite their 2-4 record at Arlington in '86, the O's have marter lifetime 57-28 (.671) log in Texas, their best (by percentage) in any torg.

The Rangers have the distinction of being the first of only 2 teams: undefeated over a whole season at Baltimore. They were 5-0 in '77 to at Memorial Stadium.the Rangers (excl. D.C.) are a respectable 3845 despite going only 8-22 over the last 6 seasons (3-3 in '86), including strike-shortened '81.Up to that time (thru '80) the Rangers were then visiting club in the A.L. with a winning record in Baltimore (30-23).

3 GRAND SLAMS: Wednesday, Aug. 6 was a day that will live in infamys as the Orioles are concerned. It is also a day that will live in the base record books.

It was a game in which, for the first time ever, 3 grand slams was (Toby Harrah, Larry Sheets and Jim Dwyer)... It was the 5th fm history that teammates have hit slams in the same inning (Sheets: Dwyer). For Harrah, it was slam #5 (not including the one held it Doubleday Field in Cooperstown just 2 days earlier against the Royalsm annual Hall of Fame exhibition). For the 2 Orioles contributors it was slam.

This was a wild game, ultimately won by the Rangers 13-11, at marked the beginning of the O's disastrous end of season 14-42 plunge last place. Ten pitchers (5 by each side) saw action (with little distinctional threw a combined total of 346 pitches (Texas-170, O's 176). The Range walked 10, including 7 by starter **Bobby Witt.**

Texas mauled O's starter **Ken Dixon**, who didn't retire a batter in the was **Harrah's** victim, and the visitors led 6-0 after 3 innings. Then in home 4th, the O's erupted for 9 big ones in an inning that included is slams and 5 walks to take the lead. They padded that advantage on **Lacy's** 2-run homer in the 6th to make it 11-6 but the game wasn't over. Rangers rallied for 6 in the 8th to go ahead against eventual loser **Rich** and scored once more in the 9th.

The official time of game was 3:42, and that doesn't include the 1:13 delay at the start. The game did not actually end until 12:30 A.M. The 13 and 19 hits were the most ever registered by the Rangers against Baltim Earlier in the season, Apr. 19 in Balmer, the O's-Rangers played a 3 9-inning game, the longest in Rangers history, but only 2 minutes longer the Aug. 6 debacle.

That game also marked the end of a particularly awesome home display by the O's who over the span of 22 innings (Aug. 4, 5 & 6) it home runs.

RANGERS BATTING: The top hitters against Baltimore in '86, among regulars, were 2 departed Rangers—Gary Ward (.462, 26-12) and % Harrah (.400, 35-14). Ward was actually the leading hitter in the league the O's among all hitters with 25 or more at bats. Pete Incaviglia batted .200 (40-8) and fanned 12 times but also paced the Rangers with 3 how and 9 rbi against the O's.

Oddibe McDowell continued to struggle vs. the Orioles against with he is hitting .162 (68-11) in 2 seasons... Catcher Don Slaught, on the other hand, had another good year at the plate against Baltimore (.341, 41-14) a is hitting .362 lifetime (130-47) vs. the O's. That's the highest average by active opponent with 100 or more lifetime at bats against Baltimore ... veteran Tom Paciorek is a .302 lifetime hitter against the Birds (199-60).

RANGERS PITCHING: Three Ranger relievers—Greg Harris, Dale Mohort and Jeff Russell—had a combined 0.00 era vs. the O's and were 4-0 wit saves while pitching an aggregate of 21.1 innings. Harris and Russell vs each 2-0 and Mohorcic saved 2.

Jose Guzman, on the other hand, was 0-3 with a 6.00 era in 4 sta (ip-21, h-24, er-14) . . . He was tied with **Frank Viola** (Twins) and **Jimmy** (to Blue Jays) for most losses to the '86 O's . . . **Charlie Hough** was 0-1 and now 2-6 lifetime.

ORIOLES BATTING: Over the last 2 years **Mike Young** has driven in 22 ru in 17 games against the Rangers while batting .387 (62-24) with 6 doub and 4 home runs. Lifetime, he has a .338 average (77-26), a career high.

Jim Dwyer over the last 3 years has hit Texas pitching at a .442 (43-19) and has raised his career average vs. the Rangers from .174 to .3 (89-27) in that span . . . Last year, though Jim had only 15 at bats against Rangers, he tied Eddie Murray for the club rbi lead (9) in the season series

They are just two of 6 current O's with career averages over .300: **Lee Lacy** (.347, 75-26), **Cal Ripken** (.335, 236-79), **Fred Lynn** (.301, 412-124) and **Jim Traber** (.364, 22-8) ... **Ripken**, one of 2 Orioles to have hit for the cycle in the O's 33 A.L. seasons along with **Brooks Robinson**, performed that feat at Arlington Stadium May 6, '84, homering off **Dave Tobik** on his last time at bat.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Two '86 Orioles pitchers remain un-beaten life-time against Texas: the departed **Storm Davis** (to San Diego for **Terry Kennedy**) and **Mike Boddicker. Davis** was 3-0 last year and left the American League with a 10-0 record, and a 2.07 era (ip-113, er-26). He held Rangers hitters to a .204 average (401-82) lifetime.

Boddicker is 7-0 with a 2.49 era (ip-72.1, er-20) . . . Others with outstanding career figures vs. Texas are: **Tippy Martinez** (6-1 with 10 saves and a 2.55) and **Scott McGregor** (8-2) who won his first 6 career decisions against the Rangers . . **Boddicker** and **Tippy** are both 4-0 at Texas and the latter has saved 7 games there.

Don Aase in 2 seasons with the O's has allowed only one earned run in 14.1 innings (0.63 era) Last year he did not yield an earned run in 8 innings, but lost a game on April 11 when 2 errors (one by **Aase** himself) led to 2 unearned tallies and a 5-4 defeat.

Vs. TORONTO ('86: 8-5, Lifetime: 78-49) . . . After going 8-17 the previous 2 years while losing both season series the O's captured the set for the 8th time in the 10 year history of the rivalry. The O's established the edge by winning 5 of 7 games at Toronto while splitting 6 games at home.

The Orioles out-hit (.269 to .217), out-pitched (3.08 to 4.45) and out-scored (61 to 49) the Jays.

Though the O's are only 8-11 at Memorial Stadium against the Jays the past 3 years, they nevertheless hold a lifetime 44-20 (.688) advantage in Baltimore, 2nd only to their home record against the Mariners (38-17, .691). At Toronto the O's are a more modest 34-29, .540.

MEMORABLE MOMENTS: There have been many memorable moments in the O's-Blue Jays rivalry over the past decade including the "Earl Weaver Forfeit" on Sep. 15, '77 and the 24-10 pasting the Jays handed the O's in Toronto June 26, '78 (the night **Ellie Hendricks** and **Larry Harlow** pitched).

However, for the Orioles, the one that stands out above the rest was the "3 Pickoff Game" in Baltimore Aug. 24, '83. The O's were down 3-1 with 2 on and 2 down in the 9th when they suddenly tied the score on rbi singles by Benny Ayala and Al Bumbry to force the game into overtime.

Because of extensive offensive maneuvering in the bottom of the 9th, the O's took the field in the 10th with strangers at 3 positions. **John Lowenstein** was at 2nd base, **Gary Roenicke** at 3rd, and **Lenn Sakata** was catching.

Cliff Johnson led off the 10th with a home run off Tim Stoddard that put the Jays back on top. When Barry Bonnell followed with a single, Tippy Martinez came on and proceeded to get out of the inning without retiring a

First, he picked off **Bonnell**, then walked **Jesse Barfield** and picked him off, and then gave up a single to **Willie Upshaw** before picking him off as

Cal Ripken led off the O's 10th with a game-tying homer and 2 outs later with 2 on, the veteran (of one inning) backstop Sakata gave the O's a "sudden death" 7-4 win with with a 3-run homer off Joey McLaughlin.

The next night the 2 clubs were scoreless until **Bonnell** homered in the 10th. However, the Birds bounced back again on singles by **Joe Nolan** and **Bumbry** and a game-winning 2-run double by **Dan Ford** to win again in "sudden death". **Tippy** was the winning pitcher in both games.

BLUE JAYS BATTING: The top hitting regulars in the season series were **Lloyd Moseby** (.286, 49-14) and **Jesse Barfield** (.280, 50-14). The latter also led the Jays in homers (4) and rbi (10) vs. the O's. Lifetime, **Barfield** has a .321 career average vs. the O's (168-54).

On the other side of the coin, Willie Upshaw (.122, 49-6), Ernie Whitt (.118, 17-2), Buck Martinez (.000, 15-0), Garth lorg (.188, 16-3), Rance Mulliniks (.200, 25-5), Cliff Johnson (.182, 22-4), and Cecil Fielder (.077, 13-1) all hit .200 or below. However, Johnson did hit 2 homers vs. the O's giving him 20 lifetime (a career high vs. one opponent), including 13 in Baltimore.

VS. TORONTO (Cont.)

BLUE JAYS PITCHING: Jim Clancy (2-1 overall in '86 vs. O's) was protein the most effective pitcher to work in Memorial Stadium in '86... He state! games, won them both, pitched 18 innings and didn't allow a run, barkin Ken Dixon (4/27) and Scott McGregor (8/12). Clancy has a string o'd consecutive scoreless innings alive in Baltimore, starting with the 7th mm on Aug. 4, '84.

Lifetime, he is 4-6 at Baltimore and 3 of his 4 victories have been shutted (add 4/17/83). Overall, he has pitched 10 shutouts in the A.L. and 4 of the have been against the Orioles (one at Toronto). His lifetime mark vs. the 0st 9-11 with 10 complete games.

Dave Stieb was 0-0 vs. the O's in '86 and is 3-7 lifetime. Except for 2/3 of one inning in Baltimore on Apr.26, **Tom Henke** wor have had a 2.77 era (instead of the 3.35 he wound up with). In that gament started the 8th inning with the score tied at 5 and he fanned 2 of the first batters. After that the next 6 hitters reached safely and he was ultimated charged with 6 runs in the inning as well as the loss.

Rookie sensation **Mark Eichhorn** appeared in 6 games vs. the 0's, $\frac{1}{2}$ 1-0, and allowed only one earned run in 12.2 innings while holding the 0's a .163 average (43-7).

ORIOLES BATTING: Fred Lynn hit .413 against the Jays in '86 (46-19) at Lee Lacy .378 (45-17), but Cal Ripken who batted only .241 (54-13) intereason series led the O's with 10 rbi in the 13 games. Rick Burleson hit .45 (35-16) vs. the Jays in '86 and is batting .364 (80-32) against them since the start of '81.

Jim Dwyer has a .311 (148-46) career average vs. the Blue Jays at career high 8 home runs and 26 rbi . . . has hit 7 of those home runs? Exhibition Stadium (in only 84 lifetime at bats there). Lee Lacy is batting .32 (67-22) and Eddie Murray .307 (427-131) . . . Eddie's 23 homers and 81% are 2nd only among all Blue Jays opponents (active or retired) to Jim Rice 30 home runs and 89 rbi.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Mike Flanagan (17-7) and Scott McGregor (13-6) at the American League's 2 biggest winners lifetime against Toronto since to Jays' first season, '77. Flanagan who has also pitched more innings to Toronto than any other pitcher has a 2.77 career era (ip-208, er-64). Here 11-2 against the Jays at Memorial Stadium. McGregor whose era is a career low 2.87 (ip-153.2, h-49) once beat the Toronto 7 straight times and was 92 against them before going 4-4 over the last 3 years.

Flanagan, 2-1 in '86, held the Jays to a .208 average (101-21) . . . The only other multiple winner was **Mike Boddicker** (2-0), while **Don Aase** wa 1-1 with 3 saves in 6 appearances.

BIRDS AND THE BROWNS

The Baltimore Orioles were charter members of the American League when t began operation in 1901. However, after two seasons, the club was moved to New York where it ultimately became known as the New York Yankees.

The franchise from which the current Orioles descend came into the A.L. in 1901 representing Milwaukee, but in '02 was transferred to St. Louis and named the Browns. In 52 seasons ('02 thru '53) the Browns were, perhaps, the most unsuccessful team in major league history. They were 3,416-4,465 (.433) and finished in the 2nd division 40 times. They won their only pennant in '44 then lost the world series in 6 games to their home town rivals, the Cardinals.

In June, 1951, Bill and Charles DeWitt sold their controlling interest to Bill Veeck who operated the club for the next 2½ seasons. On September 29, 1953, he sold his shares to a group of Baltimore businessmen who brought major league baseball back to this city after a 51-year lapse.

OVERALL RANK: In both overall attendance and average, the Orioles ranked 6th in the A.L. and 9th in the majors . . . The O's averaged 24,977 per home date, 4th highest in club history.

BIG CROWDS: The O's attracted 52,292 to the home opener against the Indians on Apr. 7, the largest regular season crowd in the club's history, bettering the old mark of 51,956 set on opening day '82 against the Royals. In '86, the O's drew between 20,000 and 29,999, 38 times; between 30,000 and 39,999 on 13 occasions and 40,000 or more on 6 dates.

100,000+ SERIES: The O's drew 166,752 to a 4-date series against the Yankees, June 12-15, the largest 4-date series in the club's history surpassing the old record of 154,835 set July 8-11, '77 vs. the Yankees. Memorial Stadium was host to 4 other series which attracted 100,000 or more. In 32 years, the club has played to a total of 52 series attracting 100,000 + fans, 41 of them in the last 8 years, starting in '79.

ALL-STAR GAME NOTES

1986: Oriole reliever Don Aase was called on to protect a one-run lead in the 9th inning with one out and runners on 1st and 3rd. Aase induced San Francisco's Chris Brown to hit into a game-ending double play as the American League held on for a 3-2 win at the Astrodome on July 15, in the 57th all-star game. While the A.L.'s win was only their 6th in the last 33 games (beginning '58), it has been Oriole relievers who have saved 4 of those victories: Billy O'Dell ('58, 59), Milt Pappas ('62) and Aase.

Joining Aase on the all-star team were Cal Ripken, Jr., who was making his 4th all-star game appearance, 3rd as a starter, and Eddie Murray, who was at his 7th all-star game, 6th as a reserve. With 1,486,806 votes, Ripken was the leading vote getter in the A.L. and 2nd overall to NY Met Darryl Strawberry (1,619,511). Ripken received more than a million more votes than the next closest A.L. shortstop (Alan Trammell, 391,117).

Ripken was 0-for-4 with two strikeouts. Murray, bothered by a sore

left hamstring, did not play. Elected Starters: Ripken joined Brooks Robinson as the only 2 Orioles to be elected to start 3 consecutive all-star games. Brooks was elected to the starting lineup 4 straight times ('71-'74). Fourteen

Orioles have been elected to start in the 17 years of fan voling addition to **Ripken** and **Brooks**, Orioles who have been elected starting positions are **Boog Powell** ('70, '71), **Frank Robinson** ('71), **Bobby Grich** ('76), **Ken Singleton** ('81) and **Murray** ('85)

Selection of the starting team was returned to the fans in '70 use the sponsorship of the Gillette Company in cooperation with Na League Baseball. Following the ballot box "stuffing" incident in connati in '57, responsibility was entrusted to major league playes 12 years ('58 thru '69).

Brooks won the '66 Arch Ward Memorial Trophy on the strength a 3-for-4 effort at bat (including a triple) and an 8-for-8 performant afield. He was the first player from a losing team to be so honored

Frank's fourth inning home run at Detroit in '71 put the A.L. onto to stay and earned him "mvp" honors. It was the first all-star vide since '62 for the A.L. which did not win another all-star game until 8

ORIOLES POST-SEASON NOTES

ALCS: The O's hold many ALCS/LCS records including: Most LCS (7, in 16 year history of divisional play), Most LCS won (5), Most LCS games (26), Most LCS games won (18), and Most LCS games hosted (13) . . . Their w-leprenetage (.692, 18-8), is surpassed only by the Tigers (.750, 6-2), Mets (714, 10-4) and Red Sox (.700, 7-3).

The O's won the first 10 ALCS games they played (including the first 9 ever played) . . . They swept the Twins twice ('69-'70) and A's ('71) in the first 3 ALCS, then won game #1 against Oakland in '73 before losing the 2nd game that year . . . The Orioles are 9-4 at home and on the road.

WORLD SERIES: Baltimore has gone 3-3 in 6 WS, but has a .576 pct. in games (19-14) . . . The Birds are 10-7 at home and 9-7 on the road.

POST-SEASON TOTAL: In 59 post-season games, the O's are 37-22 (.627). They are 19-11 at home and 18-11 away.

ATTENDANCE: In 26 ALCS games, the O's have played to 1,020,384, an average of 39,246. They've played 13 of those at home and have drawn 548,443 (average 42,188).

In 33 WS games attendance has totaled 1,769,179 (average 53,611). At home for 17 WS dates the Birds have pulled 877,518 (average 51,619).

The Orioles 59 total post-season games have attracted 2,789,563 (average 47,281). At Memorial Stadium there have been 30 post-season events which have drawn a total of 1,425,961 (average 47,514).

The 3 biggest crowds to watch the O's in a WS were games 5,4, & 3 (67,064; 66,947 and 65,792) of '83, all at Philadelphia. The largest attendance for a WS game in Baltimore was 54,458 for game #4 (final game) vs. Dodgers in '66.

The biggest house for an Orioles LCS game was 52,787 for game #1 at Baltimore vs. the Angels in '79 (the "Tonight, Let it be Lowenstein" game).

ORIOLES WORLD SERIES SHARES BY YEAR

Since 1960 (the first year they qualified for a share), the O's have finished in the first division 21 times in 27 seasons, thereby qualifying in all but 6 years (62, 67, '78, '84, '85, '86) for a share of the WS pool (combined since '69 with the LCS). (Cont. on page 192.)

MEMORIAL STADIUM—A BRIEF HISTORY

Construction of Baltimore Memorial Stadium began on the sted Municipal Stadium in 1949. However work was suspended for lack dist cient fund authorization in the early 50's, and didn't resume until 1953

Despite the construction the International League Orioles continued play their home games here on 33rd Street (thru '53) as did the new 8 more Colts franchise when it emigrated from Dallas (Texans) prior to the III football season

Essentially the new stadium was completed in October 1953, but the ments continued on thru the spring of 1954, the American League 00 first season in Baltimore.

The original Municipal Stadium was built expressly for football and a completed in 1924. However, when old Oriole Park (29th Street and Ger mount Avenue) which was owned by the Dunn family burned down on night and early morning of July 3-4, 1944, it became of necessity them. home of the Baltimore Orioles.

During a hastily scheduled two week road trip, Municipal Stadunia made ready for baseball with home-plate in what is now center field to that year, the Orioles went on to win the Little World Series and for one those games against the Louisville Colonels, drew an astonishing 528 while the real World Series (between the Cardinals and Browns) in Sor man's Park, St. Louis was drawing a paltry 31,630.

Memorial Stadium was built for \$6 million on 283/4 acres of city own property and financed by two bond issues.

Over the years there have been significant changes made. For example, in '54 the distance from home plate to the fence in dead center was 49 That has been whittled down gradually to its present 405'


The Orioles dugout was initially on the first base side, but when some 2,600 field boxes were installed in front of the original boxes in '61 m dugouts had to be built and the home team moved over to 3rd base. Provi that construction, there was an 8' wall between the front row of the box and the field, and Baltimore led the world in foul territory.

In 1964 four additional upper deck sections were added, increasing capacity by another 2,600 seats. In 1970 (mid-season) a new scorebox (now known as the old scoreboard) was installed and the original squim infested structure demolished.

Subsequently, the old splintery wooden benches (without backs) we replaced by chairs and non-wooden benches with back rests and a 35thm was added to the upper deck.

In 1980, six new towers, housing a new ticket window and additor ticket office space, storage areas and rest rooms, were completed.

Then in 1985, construction was completed on new and badly needs Orioles administrative offices, and a large new state of the art video box (Diamond Vision by Mitsubishi) was added in right-center field as a drama and colorful complement to its 15 year old cousin in left center.

FARM SYSTEM-1986

Baltimore's five farm teams finished with a composite record of 250 (.559), the 2nd best record in the majors in '86 behind the Mina kee Brewers (361-263, .579). It was the fourth best record in the 33-year history and best since '76. Over the past 24 seasons, the minor league organization record is 8100-7389 (.523). During time, the O's have been selected as the Topps "Baseball Organization of the Year" three times ('61, '71 and '72).

Three of the Orioles minor league clubs qualified for post-sease play and all three advanced to their respective championship rough only to lose. Rochester advanced to the finals of the International League playoffs, downing Pawtucket 3 games to one in the bestell semi-finals, but fell to Richmond 3 games to 2 in the finals.

Hagerstown, which won both the first and 2nd halves of the Can lina League's Northern Division, lost to Winston-Salem 3 games low in the league championship series. Newark finished 2nd in the Nork-Penn League's McNamara Division and qualified for a "wit card" berth in the league's playoffs. The Orioles stunned Oneonta to team with the best record in the league, in a one-game playoff at advanced to the league's championship round. Once there, however they lost 2 straight to St. Catherines in the best-of-3 championship round.

Rochester (75-63) finished with their best mark since '76, only the third winning season since then. The Red Wings attracted 308.80 fans and led the International League in attendance gain with a increase of more than 100,000 over '85. Rochester Manager John Hart was named the league's manager of the year. CF Ken Gerhart led the league in home runs (28), the most by a Red Wing since Ten Crowley led the IL with 30 in '77. Gerhart also led the league in the bases (232). Luis DeLeon earned a league-high 12 saves. Rochest also led the league in fielding (.976), home runs (129), slugging (.48) and posted the best home record in the IL (43-25, .632).

Charlotte (71-73) finished fourth in the Southern League's Eastern Division. The O's were led by 1B Chris Padget, who hit for a charcord .324 average. 3B-OF Tom Dodd drove in a club record in runs, in 105 games before he was promoted to Baltimore in Augus Overall, Dodd led the organization in home runs (31) and rbi (108) LHP Eric Bell led the Southern League in earned run average (3.05) and was 9-6 at Charlotte before his promotion to Rochester in law June. He led the organization in wins (16) adding 7 wins at Rocheste Padget, Dodd and Billy Ripken were named to the SL all-star team.

Hagerstown (91-48) improved 26 games over their '85 finish (65 72). Their record was 3rd best in the minor leagues. The Suns brown 19 club and individual records including most wins in a season 36 Craig Worthington led the Carolina League with a club record 165 rbi, the league's 2nd highest total in the last 19 years, and with 16 game winning rbi. Pete Stanicek finished 4th in the league in batting with a .317 average while leading the league in runs (116) and stolen bases (77), both club marks. His 77 steals were 6th best in all d baseball. Stanicek, Worthington and OF Sherwin Cijntje were a named to the all-star team.

LHP **Jeff Ballard** won the league's earned run average crown posting a club record 1.85 mark and was 9-5 before he was promoted to Charlotte and eventually Rochester. RHP **Chester Stanhope** led for 2nd in the league in wins (14), a club record. RHP **Scott Stransk** saved 19 games for the Suns before his promotion to Charlotte and eventually Rochester. He saved 29 games total.

Newark (41-37) reached the championship round of the NY/Pen League playoffs for the 3rd time in the last 4 years. LHP Gordon Beatty led the league in wins (11), complete games (8) and inning pitched (119.1). RHP Doug Cinnella finished the season with a 25 record, but both wins were no hitters: 1-0 over Oneonta on July 23 and 3-0 over Auburn on Aug. 3. DH Frank Bellino and RHP Alan Koonce were named to the league's all-star team.

Bluefield (39-29) was led by the OF **Ken Adderly,** who was named to the Appalachian League all-star team.

The major league draft is held annually at baseball's winter meetings. and followed with a separate selection by National Association clubs from class All to A levels . . . Until 1958 major league clubs could draft players within a ram between \$15,000 (for AAA players) and \$2,000 (for class D players) . . . In 182 the price for big league drafts rose to \$25,000.

However, in 1959, a first year player draft at the big league level was set up discourage the payment of inordinately large bonus payments to free agents. In new rule provided that first year players could be selected at the major league lea (if not protected on a major league team's 40 man roster) for \$12,000. CLYDE KLUTTZ MEMORIAL AWARD

Named in honor of the Orioles' director of player development who died in May, 1979, the CLYDE KLUTTZ MEMORIAL AWARD is presented annually to the Baltimore organization player "who best exemplified Clyde's integrity desire, dedication, and loyalty to the game of baseball and the Baltimore Orioles." Clyde had spent 41 years in baseball when he passed away at the age of 61

ORIOLES HALL OF FAME

The Orioles Hall of Fame, created in 1977 to honor those who have made exceptional contributions to the franchise since Baltimore returned to the major leagues in 1954, comprises 14 members. In all likelihood there will be up to two more members when the results of the annual late winter election

The Orioles Hall of Fame was a creation of the Oriole Advocates and the brain child of a couple of their distinguished past presidents, Allen Barrett and Jack Buckley, back in 1977. That organization continues to administer the annual election. This year the president of the Oriole Advocates Hall of Fame Committee is Ray Weinstein.

To become a member, a candidate must be mentioned on 75% of the ballots cast by selected sports reporters and Orioles officials as well as veteran members of the Oriole Advocates. To qualify for nomination, he must have spent at least three seasons with the Orioles and must be one year removed from the capacity in which he is being considered.

ORIOLES ENSHRINED AT COOPERSTOWN

Appling, a Hall of Fame shortstop for the White Sox, who coached for the O's one year ('63). And, the late Burleigh Grimes, the famed spitball pitcher who won 270 games in the majors and who scouted for the O's from 1960-1971

NOTES: John McGraw had a .334 lifetime batting average in 16 big league seasons, but was elected to the Hall of Fame primarily because of his achievements as a manager. . . . Rube Marquard pitched only 27 innings for the Orioles ('29), but he lived here for nearly 60 years before he died in '80.." Chief" Bender did most of his pitching for the Philadelphia A's for whom he was 206-111 . In his one full year in Baltimore, pitching for the Outlaw Federal League Terrapins, he was only 4-16.

Baltimore-born Babe Ruth signed his first pro contract with Jack Dunn Sr. in 1914 and made his debut with the Orioles that year as a pitcher. He Other native was, of course, elected to the Hall as an outfielder Marylanders in the Hall of Fame include Baker, Grove, and three who never played for the Orioles: Jimmie Foxx (Sudlersville), Judy Johnson (Snow Hill) and Al Kaline (Balmer).

RULES OF INTEREST

TRADING AND WAIVER REGULATIONS: Player assignments may be may within a major league or between major leagues without waivers at a time except between August 1 and the day following the final day of the regular season (5 p.m. et). Thus, July 31 has replaced June 15 as the table deadline.

Waivers are required for assignments to National Association clubs at times **except** for optional assignments within three years of the date to player first reported to the major leagues.

FREE AGENCY: Six years major league service required for eligibility Reentry draft has been abolished.

By Dec. 7, player's former club must offer to arbitrate or it becomes eligible to sign player . . . By Dec. 19, player must accept offer or on Jan former club becomes ineligible to sign the player until May 1.

SALARY ARBITRATION: Three years major league service required for equility . . . Maximum cut rules do not apply if, in immediately preceding years player won arbitration increase of over 50%.

TERMINATION PAY: One full season's pay if player released opening day later. Thirty days pay for player who is released on the 16th day bein opening day or earlier. If player is released after that 16th day prior opening day he receives one additional day's pay (over the 30 days) for each additional day. In other words, if he were released the day before opening day, player would receive 45 days pay.

SUSPENDED GAME RULE: A game terminated for any of the following reasons will be suspended game **IF** it has progressed far enough to be a official game (i.e. 4-1/2 or 5 innings):

- (1) A curfew imposed by law
- (2) A pre-arranged time limit
- (3) Darkness where local law prohibits turning on the lights or where light are not available.

Light Failure: A game terminated by light failure or malfunction diamechanical devise under the control of the home club will be a suspendit game anytime after it starts.

Inning in Progress (added in '80): If weather forces the termination of legal game while an inning is in progress, it will become a suspended game either of the following conditions exists:

- The visiting team has scored one or more runs to tie the game, and the home team has not scored.
- (2) The visiting team has scored one or more runs to take the lead and the home team has not tied the score or taken the lead.

Note: If a legal game is **tied** when called because of weather and neitre of the above situations prevails, it is a **tie game** and must be **re-played interty.**

Procedures for Resumption of Play: Suspended games shall be resumed the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next single game between the two clubs on the **same ground.** If that is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in A.I. Regulation 5.2 (c).

CURFEW: No inning may start after 1:00 A.M., but any inning that begit prior to 1 A.M. may be played to completion. Curfews shall be waived for the final series of the season in each of the parks of the contesting teams.

SAVE RULE: Credit a pitcher with a save when he is the **finishing**, but not the **winning** pitcher, and when he qualifies under one of the following conditions:

- (1) He enters the game with a lead of no more than 3 runs and pitches for a least one inning, or
- (2) He enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at bat a on deck, or
- (3) He pitches effectively for at least 3 innings regardless of his club's lead.

The current rule was adopted in 1975. Saves became official for the fig time in '69.. The original rule was amended in '73 and revised again in '75.

BATTING/ERA TITLE QUALIFICATIONS: 502 or more plate appearances/162 or more innings pitched.

RULES OF INTEREST (Cont.)

ROOKIE AWARD QUALIFICATIONS: A player is considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has:

(1) exceeded 130 at bats or 50 innings pitched in the major leagues, or
 (2) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a big league club(s) prior to Aug. 31.

CONSECUTIVE GAME STREAKS: A consecutive-game hitting streak shall not be terminated if all the player's plate appearances (one or more) result in a walk, hit by pitch, defensive interference or a sacrifice bunt. The streak shall terminate, however, if the player has a sacrifice fly and no hit.

The player's individual consecutive-game hitting streak shall be determined by the consecutive games in which the player appears and is not determined by his club's games.

ORIOLE ADVOCATES

The Oriole Advocates, Inc., a non-profit organization dedicated to promoting and stimulating interest in the game of baseball at both the amateur and professional levels, was unique when it was created in July, 1960 and remains so today, 27 years later.

The membership of the Advocates comprises some 75 men and women drawn from a broad cross-section in the Baltimore area.

Through the years, the Advocates have made substantial financial contributions, primarily to youth organizations; have played a leading role in the restoration of Babe Ruth's birthplace at 216 Emory Street, and its conversion into a Babe Ruth and Orioles Museum; and, in 1977, established the Orioles "Hall of Fame."

The organization has also served as an essential right arm of the Orioles' Public Relations and Marketing Departments. Probably the biggest contribution of all in that area has been the formation and annual administration of the "Junior Orioles" program.

Originated in '63 with an enrollment of 75 youngsters, the Junior Orioles grew to a record 20,000 members by '77. It is a high-quality "knothole" program, and a huge undertaking requiring much care, time and effort.

Among a wide variety of other activities, the Oriole Advocates also serve as distributors of Orioles souvenirs on "giveaway" days at the ballpark, assuring that all eligible fans receive the items to which they are entitled.

The Oriole Advocates don't get paid for anything they do. They are all volunteers, constantly demonstrating just how important are the qualities of competence and dedication.

The organization's 1987 officers: President—Burke L. Barrett . . . 1st Vice President—Jack Gray . . . 2nd Vice-President—Daniel J. March . . . Treasurer—Wayne L. Heckrotte . . . Secretary—Robert V. Bates . . . Immediate Past President—Peck Minder . . . The Board of Directors includes: Fred J. Adkins, Bernard B. Lochte, Ray Weinstein.

Among the major committee chairmen are: **Thomas Hessenauer** (Junior Orioles), **Lochte** (Membership), **Weinstein** (Hall of Fame), and **Frederick S. Goodwin** (Special Events & Special Ass't to the President).

ORIOLES "DESIGNATED HITTERS"

The Orioles "Designated Hitters" have been selling Orioles season tickets for the past eight years (starting '80) and, in that period, the pre-season sale has jumped dramatically from 1,623 in '79 to a more than 11,000. Final 1987 figures will not be available until well after this media guide has gone to press since the season ticket "selling season" continues right up to opening day.

Membership in the "DH's" is expected to comprise about 65 members in '87; men and women who live and work within the Orioles drawing area (Birdland).

To achieve membership candidates must meet required sales minimums. The formula is based on a blend of new sales and renewals, and everyone must requalify each year.

In '86, Glenn Babcock, Jennifer Sclafani and Howard Weinberg were the leading veteran members in sales while Valerie Stewart and Lou Hurwitz were "co-rookies of the year."

Incentives for members this year include: the annual weekend outing to the O's spring training headquarters in Miami and a special custom "DH" blazer for all qualifiers.

And, for those at the very top of the sales ladder, mid-summer unless both the All-Star Game in Oakland and to the Orient (Hong Kong Jacob

The "Designated Hitters" organization, patterned after the Kansas Royals' highly successful "Royal Lancers," was founded in September 1 by then Baltimore City Mayor William Donald Schaefer and a select one of Baltimoreans working closely with the Orioles front office.

The idea was to enlist the talents of successful people from the business. community to serve as the main season ticket sales force in an effort expand the Orioles season ticket base. In 8 short years, should the 187 pg be met, the O's season ticket sales will have increased more than 700%

Along with former Mayor Schaefer, the "founding fathers" of the "Des nated Hitters" included: Owen Daly, Bill Beasman and Chris Hartman Orioles' vice-president for business affairs Bob Aylward; executive diese of sales and tickets Lou Michaelson, and former club vice-president Harazin, now senior vice-president for the New York Mets.

The Orioles "Designated Hitter" coordinator is Vince Dunbar. In addition the "DH's" have their own officers (President-Glenn Babcock) and boards directors, as well as their own by-laws, newsletters, and social programs

His major league baseball experience also includes radio and television with the Texas Rangers in '78 and '79 and with the Oakland A's in '74. He broadcast his first major league game at age 22 with the A's.

During the '86 season, Jon was granted a leave of absence from several Oriole games to call the action for NBC-TV's Saturday afternoon coverage of major league baseball.

Jon has an extensive background in basketball, soccer and hockey during his 15 years in broadcasting. He did 10-15 games a season for the NBA's Golden State Warriors from 1979-82 and prior to that, was the voice of University of San Francisco basketball for 5 years. He has also announced MISL games for the San Jose Earthquakes and did both television and radio for the Washington Diplomats of the North American Soccer League in '77. He's broadcast soccer for the CBS, TVS and Satelcast networks.

A renowned mimic, Jon can be heard to imitate such outstanding baseball announcers as Al Michaels, Vin Scully and Chuck Thompson during breaks in the action (rain delays, etc.). Popular on the banquet circuit in the off-season, Jon attended numerous such functions across the country last

MEL PROCTOR

Mel is in his 15th year as a broadcaster, 4th as the Orioles' play-by-play announcer for Home Team Sports. Mel, who handles a variety of on-air assignments for HTS including play-by-play for Washington Bullets basketball telecasts and college football, is one of the busiest broadcasters in the husiness

In addition to his work with HTS, he can be heard calling NFL games for NBC television and radio, college football and pro and college basketball for Turner Broadcasting. He also does selected Bullets games for Channel 20 in Washington, D.C. (those not televised by HTS).

Last summer, Mel took a short break from Orioles baseball to handle play-by-play of TBS's coverage of the United States Men's basketball team in the Goodwill Games in Spain.

He began his career as sports director at the CBS-TV affiliate in Hawaii (KGMB) from '73 until '78. While there, he worked the microphone for Hawaii Islanders (AAA) baseball, University of Hawaii football and basketball, and did one season for the Hawaiians of the World Football League.

He came to work in the Nation's Capital for the first time in '78 when he began a five-year stint as play-by-play announcer for Washington Bullets basketball on flagship station, WTOP-AM. During the Bullets' off-seasons, Mel worked in Arlington, Texas as the TV and radio voice of the Texas Rangers. In '82 and '83, he supplemented his work with the Bullets by doing college basketball games for NBC-TV for two seasons.

BROOKS CALBERT ROBINSON JR.

HALL OF FAME: See page 77.

PERSONAL: Brooks is doing color commentary on the Orioles' televisor network with Chuck Thompson for the 10th straight year. He is also active a vice-president of Shapiro Robinson and Associates* and as a special assistant with Crown Central Petroleum Company.

Brooks and his wife, **Connie**, a former United Airlines flight attendar whom Brooks met on a Orioles' charter flight (K.C. to Boston) in '59, has been married for 26 years. They live in Lutherville, MD (north of Baltimos with their four children: **Brooks David** (7/24/61), **Chris** (2/22/63), **Michal** (3/11/64) and **Dianna** (2/22/68).

Brooks' uniform #5 was officially retired on opening day, '78, the year after he retired. Frank Robinson's #20, Earl Weaver's #4 and Jim Palmer's #22 are the only other numbers that have been retired by the Orioles.

BIG LEAGUE CAREER: Brooks officially spent 20 years and 72 days as a player in the American League, spanning 23 seasons.

He played in 2,896 major league games, all of them with the Orioles, & on the all-time list (**Pete Rose** leads at 3,562).

Only Carl Yastrzemski (3,308) and Ty Cobb (3,033) have played more American League games, and only 3 others in history have played more whone franchise: Yastrzemski (3,308), Hank Aaron (3,076) and Stan Musia (3,026).

Durability: Played in 97% of all Orioles games from July 9, '59 (when he returned from the minors for the last time) thru May 16, '76, a period of more than 16 ½ years . . . Played at least 153 games in 14 of 15 years from '60 thru '75).

In the Orioles' 33-year history, only three other third basemen have played as many as 200 games at third base (**Doug DeCinces**-792, **Rich Dauer**-242, **Floyd Rayford**-203).

Opening Days: Started 20 consecutive opening day games for the Orions from '57 thru '76 and batted .316 (79-25) with 6 home runs and 17 rbi.

Home Runs/RBI: Led A.L. in rbi (118) in '64 and also achieved career high of 28 home runs that year . . . Hit 17 or more homers nine times, 11 or more 11 times . . . His last year in double figures was '71 when he hit 20 . . . Hods the record for most lifetime homers in Memorial Stadium (139) . . . Had 6 career grand slams, 4 of them in Baltimore.

Hitting: Hit most home runs (37) and drove in most runs (167) against the Red Sox . . . Twice put together strings of 8 straight hits: July 10 thru 15, '60 and Aug. 21 thru 23, '63 . . . Holds A.L. record for most sacrifice flies, career (114).

Holds club records for games, at bats, runs, hits, doubles, triples, tolabases, rbi and extra base hits... Has one-season mark for games (163, '61 & '64) and at bats (668, '61).

It was Apr. 19, '77 at Memorial Stadium, the O's trailed the Indians, 5-2, in the 10th. With one out and runners on 1st and 2nd, **Lee May** singled in a run. The O's now trailed by 2 as Brooks came to the plate as a pinch-hitter for **Larry Harlow**. He ran the count to "3 & 2", fouled off a number of pitches, then hit a home run into the let field stands off reliever **Dave LaRoche** to win the game, 6-5. There were only 4,826 fans at the ballpark that night, but none of them will ever forget the moment.

Signed for '77 as player-coach, but became coach exclusively on Sunday, Aug. 21, when he went on the voluntarily retired list (in Minnesota) to make room on the roster for catcher **Rick Dempsey** who was returning to duly after 6 weeks on the disabled list.

An Orioles' record regular season crowd of 51,798 attended "Thanks Brooks" Day on Sunday, Sep. 18, '77, against the Red Sox to pay tribute to the most important and beloved Oriole of modern times.

CHUCK THOMPSON

A veteran of 45 years of broadcasting, Chuck Thompson is in his 28th season as a play-by-play announcer for the Orioles. At the end of the '82 season, Chuck decided to curtail his broadcast schedule and in '87 he'll team once again with Brooks Robinson to do games on television only.

Chuck began his announcing career in 1939 at WEEU in Reading, PA... Three years later he became a staff announcer for WIBG in Philadelphia, where he covered Temple University football.

CHUCK THOMPSON (Cont.)

After seeing combat in three major European campaigns for the US Army in World War II, he returned to Philadelphia to describe the action of the US Phillies and A's, Warriors, Eagles and Rockets (ice hockey).

He came to Baltimore in 1949 to do play-by-play for the International League Orioles, the Baltimore Bullets, U.S. Naval Academy football and the Colts in the All-America Conference.

In 1955, Chuck joined the National Brewing Company's team of announcers and during 24 years of that association did American League Orioles baseball for 19 years ('55-'56 and '62 thru '78), Colts footbal, Wasington Senators baseball ('57-'61) and the NBC-TV "Game of the Week ('59-'60).

He has been named the outstanding sportscaster in Maryland by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association on numerous coasions. A golfing and fishing enthusiast, Chuck has 3 children and 5 grandel dren. He resides in Timonium.

JACK WIERS

A newcomer to Baltimore, Jack Wiers begins his first year on the Originar radio broadcast team. With 14 years of experience in radio and televism behind him, Jack comes to the Orioles from KKUA radio in Honolulu, Hawaii where he had been the voice of the Hawaii Islanders, the Pittsburgh Praise affiliate in the Pacific Coast League (AAA), for the past three years.

In addition to his work with the Islanders, he had also served as the sport anchor and executive sports producer at KHON-TV in Honolulu since 1981

He began his broadcasting career in '73 as the radio/tv voice of the baseball, football and basketball teams at Southern Illinois University in Carbondale, before graduating in '75 (three years after Oriole outfielder Jm Dwyer).

In the six years that followed before he left the mainland for Hawaii, Jao had stints as television sports anchor at WTWO-TV in Terre Haute, Indiana WOC-TV in Davenport, Iowa and WQAD-TV in Moline, Illinois. BIGGEST LIFETIME WINNERS/LOSER VS. 0's

WINNERS: Though he has been retired for 20 years ('67), **Whitey Ford**, the Yankee Hall of Famer, still holds the distinction of having beaten the Orides more than anyone else. He was 30-16 against the Birds.

Ford was one of 11 pitchers to have posted 20 or more lifetime was against the O's in 33 Baltimore seasons. The others: "Catfish" Hunter (26-24), Mickey Lolich (25-19), Billy Pierce (23-11), Early Wynn and Frank Sullivan (both 21-8), Jim Kaat (21-21), Earl Wilson (20-9), Luis Tiant (20-21), Jim Perry (20-22) and Camilo Pascual (20-23).

Among currently active pitchers, the biggest winners against the O's are **Bert Blyleven** and **Frank Tanana** (both 16-11) followed by **Tommy John** (15-16).

LOSERS: Hunter, the 2nd biggest winner vs. Baltimore (26), is also the biggest lifetime loser (24) . . . At one time "Catfish" had a 23-16 lifetime record vs. the O's, but then lost 8 of his last 11 decisions against them from '76 thru '79.

There have been 4 other 20-game losers: Tiant and Jim Perry (22 each), Fritz Peterson (14-21), and Kaat (21) . . . Other big losers were Lolich (19), Gaylord Perry (12-19) and Sam McDowell (9-19) . . . From a percentage standpoint, Jim Colborn, formerly of Brewers, Royals and Mariners, with a .150 (3-17) and Rudy May at .167 (3-15) rank near the bottom of the list.

Others who've had little success against Baltimore include: Geoff Zahn (2-11), Matt Keough (1-8), Milt Wilcox (4-12), Jim Beattie (3-11) and Mike Caldwell (3-9).

Among actives, **John** is the biggest loser (16). **Jim Slaton** (11-13), assuming he pitches in the A.L. in 87, is next followed by **Beattie, Blyleven**, and **Tanana** (11 each).

(Luman Harris who finished out the '61 season after Paul Richards resigned in late August, and Cal himself who bridged the gap for one game between Joe Altobelli and Earl Weaver in 85 were both interim skippers.)

RTHER & SONS: The Orioles 1987 spring training camp will feature 3 members of the same family in uniform, a rarity matched, perhaps, only once in baseball history. That would have been 1963 when all 3 of the baseball playing Alou brothers (**Felipe, Matty** and **Jesus**) all trained with the Giants, and, in fact, played for San Francisco that season.

To the best of our knowledge, this will be the first time a major league manager has had two of his own sons in camp the same year. Last spring the trio suited up for the same split squad exhibition game (at Ft. Myers) March 15 against the Royals when **Billy** was called up temporarily from the O's minor league camp.

Cal Junior was a 2nd round pick in the June '78 draft while younger son, Billy, was chosen on the 11th round in June '82.

Cal Sr. & Cal Jr. have been teammates in spring training as well as in regular season for the last 6 years (starting '81) . . . There have been other such father-son relationships:

Connie (manager) and Earle (player) Mack (McGillicuddy), Philadelphia A's ('10, 11, '14). For many years after that, Earle served as a coach for his father.

Jim (coach) and Mike (player) Hegan, New York Yankees ('64, '66, '67, '73)

Yogi (manager) and Dale (player) Berra, New York Yankees ('84, '85).

This year, perhaps, **Hal McRae** and his son, **Brian**, will both play for the same team (K.C. Royals), a first in baseball history as far as we know.

COACH: Cal spent 11 years on the O's coaching staff, the last 9-1/2 as 3rd base coach . . . He joined the staff in '76, replacing **George Staller** who had retired at the end of the previous season. Cal served as bullpen coach until June 27, '77 when he took over as 3rd base coach after **Billy Hunter** became manager of the Texas Rangers.

Cal was ejected 16 times during his 9-1/2 years tenure as 3rd base bach, including 4 times last year.

MANAGING: He managed for 13 plus seasons in the Orioles' farm system, '61-'74, which represents the longest tenure of any minor league skipper in Orioles history . . . Earl Weaver and Joe Altobelli are tied for 2nd, having managed 11 years each in the Birds' farm system . . . During that span, Cal managed at all levels except "rookie" league.

In 2 seasons as a player-manager he had a losing record both times, but, after retiring as a player following '62, Cal finished below .500 only once in 12 tries.

MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER: When he first joined the O's in '68, Ellie had sper nine seasons in the minors . . . During the 20 years that have elapsed since then, he has been with Baltimore for nearly 17-1/2.

He played for the Cubs during the last 6 weeks of '72 (**Tommy Davis** deal) before returning to the O's that winter, then logged 1-1/2 years in the Yankees organization from June '76 thru the '77 season, before rejoining the Birds.

COACH: Ellie was appointed bullpen coach in Nov. '77 . . . He also served as a player-coach for parts of the '78 and '79 seasons and has supervised the off-season workouts the last 8 winters for players living in the Baltimore area.

He was the American League's batting practice catcher and bullpen coach for the '82 all-star game in Montreal.

'78 BATTING/ERA LEADER: 'In 13 games Ellie batted .333 (18-6) and in his one career pitching stint he compiled a 0.00 era, thus leading the club in both categories (actually he tied **Dave Ford** in era . . . **Ford** pitched 15 scoreless innings in Sep.)

His pitching career took place in Toronto on June 26 where the O's were absorbing a 24-10 pasting by the Blue Jays . . . Ellie worked 2.1 innings, allowing no runs, one hit and one walk while putting an end to the carnage that had been inflicted on four predecessors (Mike Flanagan, Joe Kerrigan, Tippy Martinez and outfielder Larry Harlow) . . . Don Stanhouse then pitched the final inning and, inspired by Ellie's effort, he too, held the Blue Jays scoreless.

YANKEES '76-'77: In '76, Ellie played in 26 games for the Yankees after the June 15 trade from Baltimore and batted .210 (57-12).

Ellie spent '77 shuttling between New York and Syracuse. He played in only 10 games for the Yankees and was not eligible for post-season play.

ORIOLES '68–'76: Ellie had been with the O's for nearly 9 full years when he was traded to the Cubs for **Tommy Davis** in Aug. '72 . . . However when the season ended, he was reacquired by Baltimore.

100 Games/Year: Ellie played in more than 100 games in each of the O's 3 pennant-winning seasons of '69-'70-'71 . . . He and Andy Etchebarren more or less split the regular catching job from '68 thru '71.

Weaver/Lane: Earl Weaver and Frank Lane were instrumental in convincing the O's to draft him from the Angels' AAA Seattle affiliate in Nov. '67... Ellie had played for Weaver in Puerto Rico previously and Lane had scouted him in Mexico.

ALCS/WS: He compiled a .273 (66-18) average in 23 postseason games for the O's and Yankees (comprising five league championship series and four World Series).

'70 WS: Ellie hit .364 (11-4) against the Reds with a home run and double and contributed significantly to the O's wins at Cincinnati in games #1 and

In the opener, the Reds jumped out 3-0, but Ellie tied it in the 5th with a home run off **Gary Nolan** and the O's went on to win on **Brooks**' homer in the 7th... There was a play in the Cincinnati 6th in which Ellie was involved and that was as important as the home run . . . See "Carbo-Burkhart Incident" below.

"Carbo-Burkhart" Incident: One inning after Ellie had tied the game with his home run, the Reds had Bernie Carbo on 3rd representing the lead run, and only one out (Brooks had retired Lee May leading off the inning on a sensational play).

Pinch-hitter **Ty Cline** then chopped a high bouncer in front of the plate ... As Ellie went out and grabbed it, **Carbo** headed home, Ellie dove and tagged **Carbo** a few feet up the line and umpire **Ken Burkhart**, who had been spun around by the runners as they converged so that his back was to the play, called **Carbo** out.

Films later revealed that Ellie had tagged **Carbo** with one hand while holding the ball in the other, and that **Carbo** had missed the plate.

PUERTO RICO: Ellie played for Santurce in the Puerto Rican Winter League each year from '60–'77, except in '71 when the O's went to Japan . . . His 112 homers in that loop rank him 2nd on the all-time list to former St. Louis Browns outfielder **Willard Brown** (120).

He has managed the Cleveland Indians ('75-'77), Rochester Red Wings (78) and San Francisco Giants ('81-'84), as well as the Santurce Crabbers in the Puerto Rican League for 8 winters and the Culiacan club in the Mexican Pacific Winter League ('77-'78).

Made a dramatic debut as playing manager on Apr. 8, '75, before some 55,000 opening day fans at Cleveland Stadium. In his 1st at bat of that 1st game (he was dh, batting 2nd), Frank homered off Doc Medich (Boog Powell later homered in the same half-inning).

The Indians went on to win, 5-3 and that effort was voted "most memorable moment" in Tribe history by fans during baseball's observance of the U.S. Bicentennial celebration.

In that 1st year, the Indians fell to 15 games below .500 by late June, but rallied and wound up 4th, just one game under . . . The next year, '76, they were 3 over. However, after a slow start in '77, Frank was released and succeeded by Jeff Torborg.

Frank became a big league coach for the 1st time after the Indians let him go as manager in '77. He joined Dave Garcia who had been his 3rd base coach at Cleveland ('75-'76) and was then managing the Angels.

He returned to Baltimore and coached for the O's for part of '78 and all of '79 and '80. During that period, he was responsible for vastly improving the quality of the O's outfield defense, and in '80 replaced Jim Frey (who left to manage the K.C. Royals) as the O's batting and 1st base coach

After being released by the Giants in '84, he served the Milwaukee Brewers as batting coach.

SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS: Was named manager Jan. 14, '81 replacing Dave Bristol (who had in turn replaced Joe Altobelli) and led the club to its first

winning seasons since Altobelli did it in '78 and the first backtober winning seasons in a decade ('81 & '82) . . . After finishing 3rd in '82 to Giants dipped below .500 in '83 and '84 and on Aug. 4, '84, Frank wa dismissed in favor of Danny Ozark who was named interim skipper.

During his tenure with the Giants, two former O's served on his coache staff-Don Buford and Herm Starrette.

ROCHESTER '78: Started the season as an O's coach, but after the late Ken Boyer was named manager of the St. Louis Cardinals (Apr. 28), Frank replaced him (May 9) at the Red Wings' helm.

He was 58-64 at Rochester which finished 6th. Doc Edwards was hired to manage the Wings in '79, and Frank returned to the O's as a coath helping the O's to an A.L. pennant.

CLEVELAND '75-'76-'77: Joined the Indians as a player on Sep. 12, 74 from California in trade that ultimately sent Rusty Torres and Ken Suarezh the Angels . . . Then 3 weeks later, on Oct. 4, the day after that season ended he was named the first black major league manager in baseball history replacing Ken Aspromonte.

MAJOR LEAGUE LEADER: He played for 21 seasons in the majors and a among the top ranking players of all time in 10 categories.

His 586 home runs represent the 4th highest figure in major leans history behind Hank Aaron (755), Babe Ruth (714) and Willie Mays (60) . Harmon Killebrew (573) and Reggie Jackson (548) are 5th and 6th respectively.

TRIPLE CROWN: Is one of only 11 players to have won the "Triple Crown" (accomplished 13 times, 2 each by Ted Williams and Rogers Hornsby) Frank did it in '66 with the O's. He, Mantle ('56) and Carl Yastrzemski (67) are the only Triple Crown winners in the past 39 years (since Williams' second in '47).

Among those, Crosley Field in Cincinnati (176) and Memorial Stadium (103) rank one-two in frequency . . . There were four stadia in which he played but did not hit a home run: Houston's Astrodome, Montreal's Expos Stadium, Sicks' Stadium in Seattle ('69 only) and Busch Stadium in St. Louis

In regular season play Frank homered in 32 parks. His 33rd was Pittsburgh's Three Rivers in the '71 World Series . . . Aaron homered in 31 parks in regular season but added Yankee Stadium in the '57 World Series.

GRAND SLAMS: Hit a total of seven slams, five of them in the N.L. . . . His only two bases loaded homers in the A.L. were hit in successive innings on Aug. 20, '70 at R.F.K. Stadium in Washington off Senators' Joe Coleman and Joe Grzenda . . . Frank, Jim Gentile and Jim Northrup are the only ones ever to hit slams in successive plate appearances, though a total of seven have ht

2 OR MORE/GAME: Hit two or more homers in a game 54 times (ranks 5th in major league history) . . . Hit three in a game for Reds at Crosley Field vs. \$L Louis on Aug. 22, '59 . . . Had 16 two-homer games for O's.

HR ODDS AND ENDS: Hit his first at Wrigley Field off the Cubs' Paul Minner on Apr. 28, '56 and his last at Anaheim Stadium on July 6, '76 off the Angels' Sid Monge . . . Hit most off N.L. righthander Larry Jackson (10) . . . Hit the first homer and scored the first run in ALCS history, in game #1 in '69 at Baltimore off the Twins' Jim Perry.

HRS-ORIOLES: Hit his 500th major league homer in Baltimore in the 2nd name of a twi-night doubleheader against the Tigers' lefthander Fred Scherman Sep. 13, '71. At the time, he ranked 11th on the all-time list just behind Harmon Killebrew who had reached that milestone earlier that year After leaving Baltimore, Frank jumped past Killebrew, Mel Ott, Ernie Banks, Eddie Mathews, Ted Williams, Jimmy Foxx and Mickey Mantle.

Frank became the first (and only) player ever to hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium on May 8, '66 (second game) when he blasted a Luis Tiant (Cleveland) offering over the left field stands into the parking lot beyond The drive measured 451' on the fly and rolled to a stop 540' away from the plate (the longest measured home run in Memorial Stadium history was hit by Killebrew 471' on the fly to center off Milt Pappas on May 24, '65).

He set a major league record by hitting ten home runs in the month of April '69, but that mark has since been pushed to 11 by Willie Stargel, Mike Schmidt and Graig Nettles.

Set a club record with 49 homers in '66 . . . Also set marks that year for most homers by an Oriole against one opponent (11 vs. Det.) and most home runs, Memorial Stadium (27).

LAST GAME AS A PLAYER: Frank played in his last game as a player on Sep. 18, '76 at Cleveland vs. Baltimore. He put himself in as a pinch-hitter for Frank Duffy in the 8th inning and singled in a run off Rudy May.

ALL-STAR GAMES: Appeared in 11 all-star games as a player (six with Cincinnati, four with Baltimore and one with California) and served as a coach in '76 while managing for Cleveland . . . Was "MVP" in '71 game at . Hit a 2-run homer off Dock Ellis to put A.L. ahead to stay in 3rd Inning (Reggie Jackson hit another with one on off Ellis in same inning).

Hit .250 (24-6) in all-star play with two home runs . . . Went 3-for-3 for the N.L. in '59 (at L.A. Coliseum) and homered off Early Wynn.

WORLD SERIES: Hit two key homers in '66 vs. Dodgers, both off Don Drysdale, to win Sport Magazine sports car . . . Hit his first in the opening Inning of game #1 at Dodger Stadium with Russ Snyder aboard (Brooks followed immediately with another and the O's led 3-0 before the Dodgers . O's won the game 5-2 . . . In game #4 his 4th inning inning solo batted) . provided the only run as the O's completed their sweep behind Dave

In '71, game #6 vs. Pittsburgh in Baltimore, Frank's base running in the 10th inning allowed the O's to tie the series at three games apiece drew a one out walk, and despite ailing legs and sore Achilles Tendon, went from first to third on Merv Rettenmund's single up the middle just evading Richie Hebner's tag with a head first slide . . . Then, he scored on Brooks' short sac fly to Vic Davalillio in center.

CINCINNATI: Spent ten full years with the Reds after three seasons in their farm system. Was N.L. "Rookie of the Year" in '56 . . . Tied league record for homers by a rookie (38, set by Wally Berger of the Braves), and set a rookie mark by being hit by pitched balls 20 times.

Won a Gold Glove in '58 . . . Led the N.L. three straight years in slugging percentage ('60-'61-'62) ... Won N.L. "MVP" in '61 ... Set personal career highs in '62 in average (.342), hits (208), doubles (51) and rbi (136) . N.L. record by leading in hit by pitcher for six straight years ('60 thru '65).

LONG HOME RUNS/MEMORIAL STADIUM

The longest "measured" home run ever hit in Memorial Stadium was a 471' drive by Harmon Killebrew on May 24, 1964 off Milt Pappas over the hedge in left-center field... This exceeded by two feet the only other blast that has ever deared the hedge... That was one by Boog Powell 469' to the same area off Boston's Don Schwall on June 22, 1962. Aside from these there have been three balls hit into the hedge (approximately 450'), by Mickey Mantle in 1954, by Powell in 1965 and by Frank Robinson in 1967.

Frank Robinson is the only player to have hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium. In the second game of a doubleheader with Cleveland on May 8, 1966, Frank hit a Luis Tiant offering over the left field stands and into the parking lot beyond, a drive that measured 451' on the fly and rolled to a stop 541' away from home plate.

Was batting .337 in late June '67 when he sustained serious injury in a second base collision with the White Sox' Al Weis . . . Missed a month and suffered from double vision for a year and a half afterward. wound up with a .311 average that year, he slipped to .268 (with 15 homes and 52 rbi) in '68 while still recovering from that injury, compounded by a attack of mumps and a muscle tear in his right shoulder.

He returned to form the following spring and helped lead the 0's to three straight pennants in '69, '70 and '71

Following his trade to the Dodgers in Dec. '71, Frank's uniform #20 was retired. He was the first Oriole player to be so honored . . . In '77, he are Brooks became the first players to be inducted into the new Orioles Hall of Fame, originated by the Oriole Advocates in cooperation with the balloub

DODGERS-ANGELS: After one year ('72) with the Dodgers, Frank was traded to the Angels with infielders Billy Grabarkewitz and Bobby Valentine and pitchers Bill Singer and Mike Strahler in deal for infielder Ken McMuller and Andy Messersmith. (Dec. 2, '71).

PERSONAL: One of 11 children . . Graduated from McClymonds Hot School (Oakland) . . . Was basketball teammate of Bill Russell and player baseball there with Vada Pinson, Willie Tasby and Charlie Beamon Hobbies: movies, music and Lakers basketball games . . . Attended Xave University in Cincinnati.

Williams served as first base coach during his 1sts years with the O's.

BALTIMORE ORGANIZATION: Jimmy became a manager in the O's fam system in '78 and guided clubs to the playoffs in each of his three seasons including a pair of league championships.

In '80, he led the O's class AA team at Charlotte to the Southern League, crown . . . The O's won the Eastern Division first half before rebounding inteplayoffs to beat Savannah, three games to none, and Memphis, three games to one, for the title. In '79, Charlotte also won the first half title but was eliminated by Columbus, GA in the first round of the playoffs

DON AASE (Cont.) 1986 AND MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER

ARM INJURY/RECOVERY: Went on disabled list June 3, '82 with "muscular strain", but was re-instated June 26... On July 17, however, he came out a game in Cleveland with a right arm that felt "like it was on fire from the elbow down".

On Oct. 18, **Dr. Lewis Yocum** performed surgery which included transplantation of a tendon from his left wrist to his right elbow . . . Did not pick up a baseball for next 9 months, then embarked on a long and gradual program in which he ultimately began throwing on the side and eventually worked up to 3/4 speed . . . However, he did not pitch competitively again until spring training of '84.

When he pitched on June 18, '84 vs. the Rangers at Anaheim, it was its 1st major league regular season game in one year, 11 months . . . He stants the season on the DL, then went to Redwood in the California League Maj 10 for "injury rehabilitation" . . . Returned to Angels May 30 and was activated June 13.

Did not allow a run in his 1st 4 appearances . . . Never pitched 2 days in a row during that '84 season . . . Worked his longest stint (4.1 innings) on he last appearance of year (Sep. 25 at K.C.).

Had one other major injury earlier in his career . . . Developed tendinish right elbow while still in minors during '75 season . . . Condition worsened in '76 (scrubbing Red Sox plan to promote him) and he did not pitch over the last 2 months.

RELIEVING/STARTING: Was a starting pitcher originally and continued in that role during his 1st and 2nd seasons in the majors . . . Began relieving 2nd half of '79 season for Angels, but returned to starting rotation the following spring.

Became exclusively a relief pitcher on Aug. 3, '80 (has not started single... As a starter his career figures are: 30-32, with a 4.25 era (IP-559, ER-264) over 91 games. In relief he has appeared in 234 games, gone 31-22 (585) with 75 saves and a 3.03 era (IP-398, ER-134).

In '82, before he was beset by elbow injury, jumped off to a 3-1 record with 2 saves and a 0.67 era (IP-27, ER-2) in 10 games . . . Despite the abbreviated '81 season, earned 11 saves, then a career-high, in his first full season as a reliever.

In both '79 and '80 he opened the season as a starter and moved to the bullpen in the 2nd half . . . Was 8-9 as a starter in '79 and only modestly successful in relief (1-1, 1 sv, 6.30 era).

In '80, however, after going 5-13 with a 4.90 era as a starter, he was 3-0 with 2 saves and an era of 2.08 in 19 relief appearances . . . That success triggered his permanent assignment to the bullpen.

Was Angels' Ione winner in '79 ALCS vs. O's... Beat **Don Stanhouse** in game #3 at Anaheim... Held O's to one run in last 4 innings, but was behind 3.2 until Angels ralled for 2 runs in the bottom of the 9th.

In '78, his 1st full year with California, was 8-8 thru Aug., then went 3-0 in Sep. . . That effort gave him 6-1 Sep.—Oct. record after less than 2 full seasons in the majors.

BOSTON RED SOX: Was called up to the Red Sox July 26, '77 (from Pawtucket) in the midst of a pennant race and went 6-2 the rest of the way, all as a starter.

His first 2 big league efforts were highly notable . . . In his debut, the day he was promoted to the Carmines, he fanned 11 Brewers (still a career high) enroute to a 4-3 complete game win . . . The next time out, July 31, he pitched a 3-hit 1-0 shutout against the Angels in his native Orange County.

Has been plagued by lack of support over the past 3 seasons . In his last 70 starts, beginning May 15, '84, O's have scored 2 runs or less 24

In '80, although he missed no time, his performance was diminished by a sore left shoulder that developed in late June. In WS vs. Pirates, Mike won the opener, 5-4, after being staked to a \$0 lead in 1st... Lost 5th game at Pittsburgh though he trailed only 2-1 when he left for a pinch hitter. Pirates went on to win 7-1... Was one of 5 relievers to pitch in 9th inning of 7th game won by Bucs, 4-1.

CY YOUNG/OTHER AWARDS: After going 23-9 in '79, was landslide winnerd BBWAA award, capturing 26 1sts and 2 2nds among 28 ballots cast for a total of 136 points (5-3-1) ... Was only one named on all ballots and was related of Yankee lefties Tommy John (1 first, 51 points) and Ron Guidry (1 first, 26 points).

That was one of 6 Cy's won by O's in 12-year period from '69 thru'80... See list under "Awards" on page 25.

That year he was also named A.L. "pitcher of the year" by TSN and was picked as top southpaw on TSN, AP and UPI All-Star teams . . . Was 6th in "mvp" balloting (highest ranking pitcher) and was named graduate of the year by both Junior American Legion and Babe Ruth programs.

NEAR NO-HITTER—'78: Is one of 8 Oriole pitchers over the past 33 years deprived of a no-hitter in the 9th inning . . . On Sep. 26, '78 in Baltimore he had 2 down in the 9th when Cleveland's Gary Alexander homered into the low rows of the rightfield seats. He then gave up 2 singles before Don Stanhouse came on to preserve the victory.

The other victims: Bob Turley-'54; Don Ferrarese-'56; Dave McNaly and Mike Cuellar-both in '69; Jim Palmer-'73; Wayne Garland-'74; and Storm Davis-'83.

POST-SEASON: Has .407 average (54-22) in 15 post-season games, including .517 (29-15) in 2 ALCS (8 games) . . . Was "mvp" in '82 ALCS in losing cause against Milwaukee, after batting .611 (18-11) . . . Has hit safely in all 8 ALCS games he's played . . . Hit his one ALCS homer off **Jim Slaton** in '82.

Hit a 3-run homer in game #6 of '75 WS (the "Carlton Fisk" game) which gave Boston a 3-0 lead in 1st inning . . . Fisk's homer won it in the 12th.

PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

1985: Led the majors with six 9th inning homers, including 3 "sudden death" blasts . . . Hit 3 consecutive 9th inning hrs in 3-game series with Minnesota in Baltimore, May 10–12, including 2 straight "sudden death" game-winners.

Solo homer off **Ron Davis** gave O's 6-5 win on May 10 and 3-run homer the next night off **Curt Wardle** brought O's a 4-2 win. Became the 3rd player in Orioles history to produce consecutive "sudden death" game winning rbi joining **Dick Kryhoski** ('54) and **John Stefero** ('83).

Helped the O's get off to their best April since '70 (12-7) with a club-high .319 (72-23) average that month . . . Was leading the O's in homers at the all-star break with 16, but due to injuries missed 31 games in the 2nd half while hitting only 7 more home runs . . . Struck out career-high 100 times.

1984: At start of season moved to rightfield while Angel teammate Gary Pettis played center. . . Started 78 games in rightfield and 59 in center, but played center in 27 of his last 29 starts after Pettis slumped.

Set Angels' club record when he drove in at least one run in 10 consecutive games, Aug. 28–Sep. 8 (3 shy of A.L. record) . . . Hit 3 of his 23 homers off **Mike Boddicker** (including 2 in one game at Cal. on May 26) . . .

FRED LYNN (Cont.)

Had most productive stretch from Aug. 28–Sep. 15 over 15 games during which he hit 8 hrs, 4 doubles, drove in 23 runs and batted .386 (57-22).

1983: An early season groin pull and an injury to his left wrist late in the campaign limited his service to 117 games, but still hit 22 homers... Didn't play after Sep. 8 because of wrist . . . Angels were 13-32 in games he missed.

Had 17 rbi in 11 games, Apr. 15–29 . . . Scored at least one run in 8 straight games, May 27–June 7 . . . Had 5 gwrbi in an 11-game span, May 20–June 3.

1982: Raised average 80 points from .219 of '81 to .299 . . . Snapped a year-long home run drought on May 16 when he connected off Cleveland's John Denny . . . It was his first in 90 games, since May 1, '81 . . . Hit 1st career slam, July 15 at Cleveland off Rick Waits.

From June 25–July 26, drove in 34 runs in 24 games . . . Had 30 rbi and an 18-game hitting streak in July . . . Hit 7 homers and drove in 22 over 13 games from July 5–20 After a slow 1st half (.274, HR-6, RBI-22, G-77), batted .329 with 15 hrs and 64 rbi in 61 games in 2nd half . . . Cracked a rib running into wall while making a great catch in Detroit on Sep. 1.

Damaged left knee trying to break up double play vs. Detroit, May 8... Had recovered sufficiently to play in All-Star Game in Cleveland in Aug., but re-injured same knee (also breaking up a dp) shortly afterward and didn't start after Sep. 11... Underwent arthroscopic surgery (by **Dr. Lewis Yocum**) on Sep. 23.

1980: In final year with Red Sox he won his 3rd straight "Gold Glove" (and 4th overall) and batted .300 for 4th time . . . Hit for cycle on May 13 vs. Twins at Fenway (4 rbi) . . . Drove in 19 of 26 runners from 3rd base with less than 2 out (.731) . . . Stole 12 bases in 12 attempts . . . Missed last 37 games with a broken toe on right foot (the result of a foul tip).

During his 6-year (plus one month) Red Sox career he batted .308 (944/3062) and averaged 20 hrs, 85 rbi.

1979: His finest all around year . . . Led A.L. with .333 average and .637 slugging pct. (1st player to lead in both departments since Tony Oliva in 71) . . . Ranked in top 4 in runs (116), doubles (41), homers (39), rbi (122), total bases (338) and on base percentage (.426).

Set career highs in runs, hits, homers, rbi, walks, total bases, slugging, on-base pct., and average and had 82 extra-base hits.

Won August "player of month" honors on strength of .416 average, 10 hrs, 25 rbi and an .820 slugging pct. in 27 games and warmed up for August by hitting .395 in July.

Tied career high with 20-game hitting streak, won his 3rd "Gold Glove" batted .387 with men on base and hit a 2-run homer in the All-Star Game.

1978: Had more walks than strikeouts for the first time, 75 bb and 50 so (he's done it 3 times overall) . . . Had 58 extra-base hits . . . Went 5-for-5 vs. Seattle, Aug. 28 and won his 2nd "Gold Glove" and 1st of 3 straight.

1977: An injury to his left ankle in spring training forced him to miss the 1st 27 games of the season . . . Upon his return, May 13, he homered vs. Seattle in each of his 1st 2 swings . . . Despite the injury which troubled him thrumuch of the season, had 52 extra-base hits.

1976: Was sidelined 6 times by injuries, but still hit .314 and had 32 doubles, though his home run total dropped from 22 to 10 . . . Stole a career-high 14 bases . . . Led A.L. in all-star balloting.

Went to USC on football scholarship and was a teammate of Lynn Swann freshman year, but then switched exclusively to baseball.

Played baseball, basketball, and football at El Monte (CA) High School and also played Little League and Pony League baseball. **Willie Mays** was his favorite player while growing up.

PERSONAL: Resides in Rancho Mirage, CA . . . An avid freshwater fisherman. Had bass pond built at his home to study the living habits of fish . . . He and his wife **Natalie** were married in October, '86 . . . Fred is the father of 2 children **Jason Andrew** (3/16/78) and **Jennifer Andrea** (10/6/79), from a previous marriage.

Was disabled 3 different times and was on the active roster for only 53 games all season . . . Spent the entire 2nd half on the disabled list with a sore left shoulder. It was the 3rd straight year he has been bothered by pain in that area. Last appearance was July 13 at Chicago in 0's 7-0 loss.

First went on the list Apr. 25 after suffering from dizziness and a loss of balance, a condition that originally occurred while he was on the mound against Texas at home on Apr. 19 . . . A battery of tests revealed an inner ear infection.

Returned to active duty May 28 and made 8 appearances (including his lone save of '86 on June 8 in O's 18-9 win at N.Y.) before going on dl again on June 27 with what was later diagnosed as a deterioration of the rotator cuff.

Re-activated July 4, but made only 2 appearances before returning to dl for 3rd time with re-occurring soreness in shoulder.

SURGERY: Subsequently, Tippy decided to undergo arthroscopic surgery on his left shoulder and the operation was performed in August by **Dr. James Andrews** at the Hughston Clinic in Columbus, GA . . . Went thru extensive off-season rehabilitation program.

MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER

AMONG ACTIVE MAJOR LEAGUE LEADERS: Despite making only 63 appearances with 3 wins and 5 saves over the past 2 seasons, Tippy ranks among the active major league relief pitchers in: saves (115, 14th behind leader Bruce Sutter-286); relief wins (55, 13th behind leader Goose Gossage-92) and relief appearances (541, 10th behind leader Kent Tekulve-853).

ORIOLES ONLY: Since the Yankees traded him to the O's in June '76, Tippy has gone 52-40 (.565) with 105 saves, compiled a 3.45 era (IP-753, H-665, ER-289), walked 366 and fanned 574.

LIFETIME SAVES FOR (0'S ONLY): 15-Mike Flanagan & Dennis Martinez . . . 14-Scott McGregor . . . 11-Jim Palmer . . . 10-Mike Boddicker . . . 8-Storm Davis . . 6-Steve Stone . . . 5-Rudy May & Sammy Stewart . . . 4-Ross Grimsley . . 2-Dave Ford & Bill Swaggerty . . . 1-Don Aase, Ken Dixon, Dick Drago, John Flinn, Joe Kerrigan, Dyar Miller, Dave Pagan and Allan Ramirez.

BY-MONTH, LIFETIME (W-L-S, G): Apr. (4-9-9, 67) . . . May (9-7-22, 90) June (12-6-19, 97) . . . July (11-5-25, 84) . . . Aug. (10-8-14, 103) . . . Sep.-Oct. (9-7-26, 102).

STARTS: He has started only 2 games in 543 major league appearances, both losing efforts for the Yankees in '75: to Boston July 27 and to California Aug. 24.

SUDDEN DEATH: Has won 33 games lifetime at Memorial Stadium, 18 of them in "sudden death"... Has lost only 4 on the road in "sudden death".

VS. YANKEES: Though he has no wins and only one save against the Yankees over the past 2 seasons, still has more wins (9), losses (6), saves

(17), appearances (64) and innings (94.2) against the club with which he both signed originally and broke into the majors . . . His career era vs. N.Y. is 2.56 (FR-27)

During a 3-season stretch (between losses to the Bombers on June 23, '81 and June 23, '84), Tippy went undefeated while winning 3 and saving 11 over 22 appearances during which his era was a nifty 0.49 (IP-36.2, ER-2).

He also went 19 games in a row without allowing the Yankees an earned run (spanning 30.2 innings) . . . It began when he gave up a run on Sep. 26, 81. He did not yield another to them until June 22, '84.

COPHER BALLS: Has given up only 52 home run balls in 831 innings, one every 16 innings . . . Although he has yielded 28 in the last 4 seasons covering 263 innings (1 every 9 innings), he was extremely stingy in prior years: '74-0; '75-2; '76-1; '77-2; '78-4; '79-0; '80-5; '81-4; '82-6.

Has thrown 12 "gophers" to the Tigers lifetime, but only one to the Twins (Tom Brunansky-7/4/84 at HHH) and to the A's (Wayne Gross-5/8/83 at Bal.)

In his limited work in '86, he gave up only one homer, to Texas rookie Pete Incaviglia, his 1st as a pro.

Tippy had never given up 2 homers in a game until Apr. 9, '83 when he yielded his only grand slam, to **George Vukovich**, at Cleveland Stadium, then gave up a back-to-back solo blast to **Julio Franco** . . . He has since yielded 2 homers in same game 2 additional times (both in '84).

He once had a string of 65 straight homerless appearances (IP-123.2) over nearly 2 full years, between May 23, '78 and April 19, '80 when the White Sox' **Marv Foley** broke the string (a 12th inning game-winner in Baltimore) . . . He also went 55 games without serving up a home run ball from May 20, '76 to July 26, '77.

POST-SEASON: Has a 1.74 post-season era in 8 appearances (IP-10.1, ER-2)
... Was 1-0 with 2 saves in '83 over 5 games and allowed only one earned run in 9 innings.

His victory in game #4 of the ALCS at Chicago was at the expense of **Brit Burns** and was made possible by **Tito Landrum's** 10th inning homer (O's later scored 2 more runs, and won 3-0) . . . Tippy is thus one of only 3 Orioles pitchers to have clinched a pennant. The others: **Jim Palmer** (4) and **Scott McGregor** (1, '79).

He also saved games #3 and #4 of the '83 World Series, both at Philadelphia . . . In '79, he didn't pitch in the ALCS, but did relieve in 3 WS games (2, 5, 7).

PICKOFFS: Though Tippy has not been a major pickoff specialist (like **Mike Flanagan** and **Scott McGregor**) during his big league career, he will long be remembered for picking 3 Toronto runners (**Barry Bonnell, Dave Collins,** and **Willie Upshaw**) in the 10th inning on Aug. 24, '83 in Baltimore. To that time he had not picked off a runner since June 29, '77.

That classic was chosen in '85 by Orioles fans as one of the top 5 most memorable Orioles games ever, in a contest run by the Babe Ruth Museum

... The O's battled from behind to win for Tippy on a home run by **Lenn Sakata** who was making his 1st and only major league appearance as a catcher ... See details under vs. Toronto (page 49).

PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

1985: Failed to lead the O's in saves for the 1st time in 5 years... Though he was never on the disabled list, he did suffer from time to time with a sore shoulder as he tried to snap back from shoulder problems that had sidelined him in September of the previous year.

1984: Bothered much of the season with troubled left shoulder, but still led club in saves (17) for the 4th straight year . . . Appeared in only one game after Sep. 8 and because of his injury did not accompany the O's to Japan in October.

On June 22, thru his 1st 29 appearances, he was 3-4 with 10 saves, a 3.26 era and had given up only 2 homers . . . After that he was 1-5 with 7 saves and a 4.64 era and threw 7 "gopher balls" . . . Was tied for 2nd in A.L. with 13 wild pitches behind **Jack Morris** (14).

Lost 5 games to 3 teams that had never beaten him previously (Toronto and Seattle twice, Texas, once) . . . It was only the 2nd time he'd had a losing record in his pro career.

1983: Enjoyed his best big league season, despite missing 3 weeks with an

appendicitis . . . Set career highs in saves (21), innings (103.1) and strikeouts (81) . . . Finished 5th in the A.L. Rolaids Relief Award competition. . . Picked for all-star game, but did not play . . . Had career best 2.32 era in 65 games.

After June 19, though he was out of action from July 9 thru 30 (did not pitch at all during July) recovering from appendectomy, he went 5-0 with 12 saves and a 1.31 era IP-60.2, ER-9) in 37 games.

PENNANT SURGE: During the O's 44-game sprint to the A.L. East title (34-10, Aug. 13 thru Sep. 25), was 4-0 with 10 saves in 23 appearances and had a 1.82 era (IP-34.2, ER-7).

1982: Was 2nd in the A.L. in appearances with a career-high 76 to Seattle rookie **Ed Vande Berg** and set a club mark for a lefthander with 16 saves. Was 0-3 with 2 saves and a 7.89 era (IP-14.2, H-17, ER-13) thru May 8... in 64 appearances thereafter, he was 8-5 with 14 saves and a 2.58 era (IP-80.1, H-64, ER-23).

Saved both ends of a doubleheader vs. the Yankees on Sep. 14. Tippy saved another against N.Y. the following day, giving him 3 in a row.

Experienced the best month of his career in July during which he did not allow a run in 16 appearances totaling 19 innings while surrendering only 6 hits plus 3 walks and striking out 22 . . . In that span he was 2-0 with 5 saves and 7 "holds" and was voted A.L. "player of the month".

During the week of July 19–25, was 1-0 with 2 saves while pitching 9 scoreless innings in 6 games to earn a share of A.L. "player of the week" honors with **Robin Yount.**

1981: Was 2-2 with 9 saves in 21 games before the strike, but only 1-1 with 2 saves in 16 2nd half appearances . . . Didn't allow a run in a stretch of 12 games spanning 15.2 innings from Apr. 27 to May 24.

1980: Was 2nd in saves to **Tim Stoddard,** who set what was then a dub record with 26 saves . . . Had a string of 10 straight scoreless appearances from July 23 thru Aug. 23.

1979: Retired 23 straight Oakland batters on July 23 at Baltimore. After walking 1st batter he faced, he pitched 7.2 perfect innings and earned the win on a **Pat Kelly** slam.

Over 5 straight appearances starting July 23, he yielded only one hit and no walks and retired 36 of 38 batters faced . . . Also set down 18 of 19 hitters in consecutive appearances, June 22 & 23, both vs. Detroit, and won both in "sudden death" . . . Did not pitch in ALCS, but did relieve in 3 WS games (2, 5, 7).

1978: Hampered by tendinitis and finished with the 2nd highest era of his career (4.83) . . . Went 26 days between appearances, Sep. 2 to 26 . . . All 3 of his '78 losses were to the Yankees.

Joined Yankees for 1st time in Aug. '74 then almost made the club at the start of '75... However, an injury to **Dick Tidrow** (rhp) necessitated adding another righthander to the staff instead... Won the James Dawson Award as the top rookie in the Yankees' '75 spring camp.

Was recalled from minors July 16, '75 and went on to lead the staff in saves (8) . . . N.Y.'s **Sparky Lyle** was 5-7 with only 6 saves that year.

AMATEUR BACKGROUND: Played football, basketball and baseball at LaJunta (CO) High School and was drafted as an outfielder by the Washington Senators after his senior year on a late round in June '69, but chose to attend Colorado State.

BIRDS' FIRST GAME IN BALTIMORE IN '54

The modern American League Orioles made their Baltimore debut in Memorial Stadium on Apr. 15, 1954 before a crowd of 46,354 including Vice President Richard M. Nixon who threw out the first ball. Behind the seven hit pitching of Bob Turley who fanned nine, the Orioles of Jimmy Dykes defeated Paul Richards' White Sox, 3-1, in Baltimore's first American League game in 52 years. Chico Carrasquel, the Chicago shortstop, was the first to bat in the new stadium and singled off Turley.

Clint Courtney won the distinction of hitting the first home run in the brand new stadium (built on the site of the previous municipally owned ballpark used by the International League O's). It was a bases empty blast off Virgil Trucks who also yielded a solo homer to Vern Stephens in the fourth and was the losing pitcher.

The Birds' starting lineup in that game was: Bobby Young, 2b: Eddie Waitkus, 1b; Gil Coan, cf; Vic Wertz, rf; Sam Mele, lf; Stephens, 3b: Billy Hunter, ss; Courtney, c and Turley, p.

In his 5th full season, he extended his consecutive games streak to 765 (10th longest all time) and his consecutive innings string to 6,937 (longest all time) . . . See details under "Ironman" below.

It was the 4th straight season he has led major league shortstops in: home runs (25), rbi (81), runs (98), and slugging pct. (.461) and, for the 3rd time in 4 years, in assists (482) . . . Finished 2nd by .001 in fielding pct (.982 to .983) to Toronto's Tony Fernandez . . . See "Fielding" below.

Tied for the A.L. lead in gwrbi (15) with Toronto's George Bell and the Yankees' Don Mattingly. He led the O's in at least 8 categories: at bats, runs, hits, doubles, homers, total bases (289), and in tying & go-ahead rbi (33).

Over the last 4 years, he has led A.L. in extra base hits and ranks 2nd in majors: Dale Murphy, Atl. (276); Ripken (271); Mattingly, NYY (264); Schmidt, Pha. (258), Rice, Bos. (245)

In that same span, starting '83, he is 3rd in A.L. in doubles with 151 behind: Boggs, Bos. (164) and Mattingly (160).

JAPAN TRIP(S): Made his 2nd trip to Japan last fall with a U.S. Major League All-Star Team that went 6-1 against a team of all-stars from Japan's Central and Pacific Leagues . . . Cal led the team in hitting (.500, 14-7, 2bh-2, hr-2, rbi-6) while splitting shortstop duties with the Cardinals' Ozzie Smith.

Pirates' catcher Tony Pena was elected "mvp" after catching all but 6 innings on the tour (the only other catcher was Rich Gedman who was injured early on the trip.). Blue Jays outfielder Jesse Barfield led the Americans with 4 homers and 9 rbi while batting .450 (20-9).

Cal accompanied the Orioles on a 14-game trip in '84 and batted .315 (54-17) with 4 homers and 9 rbi as the O's went 8-5-1.

ORIOLES TOP 10: Already ranks 2nd in games played at shortstop for the O's (793), having passed **Luis Aparicio** (713) in '86 . . . **Mark Belanger** played in 1897 games at that position for the O's.

Also ranks in top 10 in following 10 categories: runs (529-9th), hits (927-9th), doubles (183-9th), triples (20-8th tie), home runs (133-7th), total bases (1549-9th), rbi (472-9th), gwrbi (69-7th), extra base hits (336-7th), and batting average (.289, 7th) See "Orioles Career Batting Leaders" (page 8).

ODDS AND ENDS: Had a career high tying 17 game batting streak in June and finished the season with a 9 game string in tact . . . His club record string of 3 consecutive 100 runs seasons ended when he fell two short of the century mark.

Reached a late-season high of .307 on July 27 and a late-season low of .275 on Sep. 25 . . . Stole 2 of his 4 bases in one inning, at Oakland on Aug. 28 (2nd game) with **Bill Krueger** on the mound . . . **Lee Lacy** stole home and **Juan Beniquez** also swiped a base in that same canto.

Was 2nd in O's "mvp" vote behind **Don Aase** . . . Was 1st, other than **Eddie Murray**, to lead club in homers since **Ken Singleton** in '79. **Eddie** had led for 6 straight years.

1986 AND MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

IRONMAN-GAMES: His 765 game string began May 30, '82 (better than 4-1/2 seasons ago), the day after he sat out the 2nd game of a doubleheader vs. Toronto at Baltimore (**Floyd Rayford** subbed for him at 3rd base).

It has been the longest active streak in the majors since **Dale Murphy** sat out a game last July 9, snapping his skein at 740. Ironically, **Murphy** missed only that one game all year so has played in 817 of the last 818 Braves games.

The 3 longest previous streaks in O's history were by: **Brooks Robinson** (463), **Eddie Murray** (444), and **Billy Gardner** (361).

IRONMAN-INNINGS: His string of 6,937 consecutive innings is believed to be the longest streak of its kind in major league history. It started on June 5, '82 at Minnesota (6 days and 5 games after the start of his consecutive games streak). The day before, June 4, **Jim Dwyer** had pinch-hit for him in the 9th inning, also at Minny. The 82 post-season innings he played in '83 are **NOT** included in the figures above.

At the time, both the games and innings strings began, he was playing 3rd base. He moved to shortstop July 1, '82. Thus, since that transition, he has not missed as much as a play at short.

Baseball researcher **L. Robert Davids** opines that Rip has erased the records of a couple of former Carmine Hose, who played in Boston in the early 1900s, the venerable **Buck Freeman** and **Candy LaChance.**

Freeman, a 1st baseman, played every inning over some 534 games (July 28, '01 to June 5, '05), and **LaChance,** an outfielder, didn't miss an inning in '02-'03-'04, extending his string to 424 games before sitting down on Apr. 28, '05. Both players, incidentally, were originally signed for the Red Sox by **Ed Kenney**.

Rip is the 1st big leaguer to have played in every inning for at least 2 consecutive years since **Rudy York** of the Tigers in '40 & '41. That's the same man who once nearly burned down the old Kenmore Hotel in Boston while smoking in bed.

In addition to Ripken, **LaChance & Freeman**, only one other major league player has not missed an inning in 3 seasons (not consecutive). That was **Mickey Vernon** in '42, '47 & '53 with the Pesky Gnats. Only 9 have done it over 2 seasons (not necessarily consecutive).

Four other O's have played in every game of a season: **Brooks**-4, **Eddie-**3, **Gardner** and **Bobby Grich**-once each. However, **Murray** is the only other to have played every inning in a season ('84 including 3 games as dh).

His monthly career highs include: **8 homers**, Sep.-Oct. '85 & Apr. '84; **23 rbi**, Sep.-Oct. '85, and **.385 average** (143-55) in Sep.-Oct. '83.

FIELDING: Enjoyed his best year defensively in '86 from standpoint of consistency with .982 percentage (PO-240, A-482, E-13, TC-735). Had same number of errors as leader **Tony Fernandez**, but handled 17 fewer chances. He led majors in assists (482) and was 2nd (to **Spike Owen**) in double plays (105 to 133).

ASSISTS RECORD: In '84 he was credited with an A.L. record 583 assists, breaking Roy Smalley's '79 mark of 572. That year he also led major league shortstops in assists as well as in total chances (906), putouts (297) and double plays (122).

TOTAL CHANCES: His 880 successful total chances in '84 (excluding errors) were the most by an A.L. shortstop since the Twins' Leo Cardenas handled the same number in '69. The only major league shortstop to have handled more net chances in one season since World War II was the Cardinals' Ozzie Smith (909 in '80). The major league record is 984 by the Giants' Dave Bancroft ('22).

He's led the league in net chances in both '83 and '84, and was edged by one chance in '85 (by **Fernandez**). In '86 with 722, he finished 3rd behind: **Spike Owen** (746), and **Fernandez** (739). **Ozzie Guillen** was 4th (720).

3RD BASE: Played both 3rd and short after coming up in August '81, but started '82 season as O's regular 3rd baseman . . . Has played 77 games at 3rd ('81-6, '82-71) and has .970 percentage (TC-232, E-7).

Played there for the last time on July 8, '82 at Seattle after starting game at shortstop (**Bob Bonner** replaced him at ss) . . . His last start at 3rd base was on June 30, '82 home against Cleveland.

ERRORLESS GAMES: Had a string of 37 straight errorless games at short last year from June 28 thru Aug. 9, his longest at that position . . . In '82, he put together a stretch of 44 straight errorless games at 3rd base (Apr. 24 thru June 14).

CYCLE: He and **Brooks Robinson** are only 2 Orioles ever to hit for cycle in the club's 33 years in Balmer. Rip did it at Texas on May 6, '84 . . . Homered off **Dave Tobik** on final at bat to complete the job . . . Went 4-for-5 with 2 rbi . . . **Brooks** cycled at Chicago on July 15, '60.

IN THE CLUTCH: Has a career .288 average (782-225) with men in scoring position . . . Ranks tied for 20th on the major league gwrbi list (64) since it became an official statistic in 1980 despite the fact that his big league career did not begin until late 1981, and he didn't become a regular until 1982. . . . Everybody else in the top 20 has been a regular starting 1980 or before.

HOME RUNS: Has been amazingly consistent in annual home run production. His totals in 5 full years, starting '82: 28, 27, 27, 26 and 25 . . . See "Individual Batting, 1986 & Lifetime" on page 59 . . . See also "O's Lifetime Home Runs in each Park" on page 62.

In each of the last 2 years Cal has received more votes than any other A.L. player, and in each year **George Brett** was the runner-up... Last year with 1,486,806 votes, he was 2nd in the majors only to **Darryl Strawberry** (1,619,511).

In '85 Cal tallied a league leading 1,398,901 and in '84 drew 1,442,082 votes while beating out **Alan Trammell** at short and finishing 3rd in the overall A.L. election behind **Brett** (#1) and **Lance Parrish** (#2). He made his All-Star debut in '83 as a defensive replacement for **Robin Yount** after being appointed to the squad.

In the '86 game won by the A.L., 3-2, at Houston, Rip took an 0-for-4, and is now 1-for-10 lifetime . . . That hit was a single off **Nolan Ryan** at Minnesota in '85.

A.L. "MVP", '83: Rip shaded teammate Eddie Murray, 322 to 290 as O's finished 1-2 in balloting. This wasn't un-precedented in O's history. In 1966, Frank, Brooks and Boog were 1-2-3 and Luis Aparicio was 9th.

Cal & **Eddie** were the only players listed on every '83 ballot. Cal's vote: 1st-15, 2nd-9, 3rd-3, 4th-1 (system: 1st place-14 points, 2nd-9 points, 3rd-8, 4th-7 etc.).

Became first player ever to win "Rookie" and "MVP" honors back-to-back . . . Fred Lynn, of course, had done him one better by winning both in same year ('75).

"ROOKIE OF THE YEAR": In '82 he registered 130 points to beat out Twins' Kent Hrbek (90 points), the only other player named on all ballots. Wade Boggs was 3rd. Rip polled 24 1sts and 4 2nds.

He was the 5th Oriole to win BBWAA "Rookie" honors: Ron Hansen ('60), Curt Blefary ('63), Al Bumbry ('73) and Eddie Murray ('77).

"MOST VALUABLE ORIOLE": Was co-winner of "MVO" award with Eddie Murray in '83, has finished 2nd twice and 3rd twice in 5 full seasons. Was runner-up to Murray in '85 and to Don Aase in '86... Was 3rd in '82 behind Murray and Jim Palmer, and in '84 behind Murray and Mike Boddicker.

"PLAYER OF THE YEAR": Chosen Major League "Player of the Year" in '83 by The Sporting News, and A.L. "Player of the Year" by both TSN and Baseball America.

OTHERS: Picked as shortstop on A.P. Major League All Star Team, TSN A.L. All Star Team and TSN/Hillerich & Bradsby "Silver Slugger" Teams (to outstanding offensive players at each defensive position) each of last 4 years ('83 thru '86).

PREVIOUS HIGHLIGHTS BY YEAR

1985 SEASON: Set career highs in runs (116) and rbi (110) . . . Was 2nd to **Rickey Henderson** (146) in A.L. in runs . . . Scored over 100 runs for 3rd straight year . . . Was 1st or 2nd among O's in 12 different offensive categories.

1983 SEASON: Was A.L. "MVP" and TSN "Player of the Year" and shared "MVO" laurels with **Eddie Murray.** Played on A.L.'s first winning All-Star team since '71 and also played on winning team in both ALCS & World Series.

Led Majors in hits (211) and doubles (47); led A.L. in runs (121) and extra base hits (76, 2nd to Expos' **Andre Dawson**) . . . Was 2nd in majors in total bases to Boston's **Jim Rice** (343 to 344).

Led A.L. shortstops in assists, chances and double plays. His .318 average was 3rd in club history behind **Ken Singleton's** .328 in '77 and **Bob Nieman's** .322 in '56.

Stretch Run: During 44 games from Aug. 13 thru Sep. 25, a period in which the O's went 34-10 to win the eastern division championship, Rip hit .391 (192-75) with 14 doubles, 9 homers, 30 rbi and 40 runs scored.

ALCS/WS: Batted a combined .273 (33-9) in 9 post-season games . . . Drove in O's only run in 9th inning ALCS game #1, won by Lamarr Hoyt, 2-1. Made final putout of WS when he caught Garry Maddox' line drive in bottom of 9th of game #5.

Missed only 3 games all year, none after May 29th (the day his games streak started) . . . Played 44 straight errorless games at 3rd base from Apr. 24 thru June 14 . . . Registered his first big league stolen base the hard way, stealing home on the front end of a double steal with **Lenn Sakata** off Rangers' **Jon Matlack** on May 31 at Baltimore.

Slow Start: After a glittering opening day on which he went 3-for-5 with his 1st big league double, homer (off KC's **Dennis Leonard**) and rbi, Rip plunged into deep slump (55-4). He was batting only .117 (60-7) on May 1st after 18 games on the year . . . And over 2 seasons, he was hitting just .121 lifetime (99-12) in 41 major league games.

Start of Something Big: The next day, May 2, he picked up a pair of scratch hits and was beaned by fellow rookie, **Mike Moore**, but missed only one game. His comeback began in earnest May 6 . . . He hit .281 (538-151) from May 2 to the end of the season.

1981 SEASON: Recalled from Rochester Aug. 8 right after the major league player strike was settled ... BABE RUTH BIRTHPLACE/ORIOLES MUSEUM

Birthplace of the game's most prodigous performer, George Herman "Babe" Ruth in 1895, this historic rowhouse, located at 216 Emory Street in downtown Baltimore, features a variety of film clips on Ruth and the Orioles, as well as photo displays and memorabilia on the Babe, the Birds and Maryland greats such as Al Kaline, Jimmy Foxx, Lefty Grove and Home Run Baker.

The Babe Ruth House was rescued from the wrecker's ball by civic leaders and sports fans in '67. A non-profit foundation was formed and the Babe's birthplace and three adjoining rowhouses were renovated and opened to the public in '74 as the

Babe Ruth Birthplace Museum.

In '82, a 2nd renovation was undertaken which broadened the theme of the Babe Ruth House to include Orioles history as well. In May '83, five months after closing its doors for its 2nd face-lifting, the Babe Ruth Birthplace/Official Orioles Museum re-opened to the public. The museum is open year round at a small cost to
