Edward Bennett Williams Chairman of the Board and President

EDWARD BENNETT WILLIAMS

Edward Bennett Williams, the world-renowned Washington attorney, is in his 9th season as the Orioles' owner-chairman-president since buying the ballclub November 1, 1979.

In his first four years, the Orioles logged three 2nds and a world championship. Over the last four seasons, however, the results have been markedly different despite the vigorous and often dynamic efforts of Mr. Williams and his staff.

When last season ended and the Orioles had finished with a losing record for a second straight year, he wasted little time before demonstrating forcefully his contempt for losing.

RE-ORGANIZATION

Just two days (Oct. 6) after the club's final game, Mr. Williams relieved both **Executive Vice-President Hank Peters** and **Farm Director Tom Glordano** of their duties.

Little over a month later (Nov. 10) at a dramatic Memorial Stadium press conference, he made the following personnel appointments:

Hired Roland Hemond as vice president for baseball operations.

Re-signed Cal Ripken Sr. as his manager for 1988.

Installed **Doug Melvin** as director of (minor league) personnel.

Designated Hall of Famer Frank Robinson to succeed Melvin as special assistant to the president on baseball matters, and,

Named Baltimore native and former NFL running back **Calvin Hill** as vice president of administrative personnel.

At the end of that day, Mr. Williams announced that, "This is neither the beginning nor the end of our re-organization. It's the end of the beginning."

Over the next two weeks, the meaning of that statement was clarified repeatedly in a series of additional personnel changes made by **Hemond** and **Melvin**.

Former Washington Senator pitcher **Dick Bosman** was hired as minor league pitching coach . . . Former Orioles pitcher and coach **Herm Starrette**, 1987 Rochester Manager **John Hart** and Orioles' farm system coach **Minnie Mendoza** were named to the big club's coaching staff, joining incumbents **Ellie Hendricks** and **Terry Crowley** (replacing **Mark Wiley, Jimmy Williams** and **Frank Robinson**).

Former Oriole outfielder and long-time Baltimore resident **Joe Durham**, the first black player ever to hit a home run for the O's, was appointed community coordinator for baseball operations ... **Mike Pazik**, who had worked with **Hemond** in Chicago and had pitched for the Twins in the 70s, joined the organization as pitching coach at AA Charlotte.

And, **Grover "Deacon" Jones,** who played for the White Sox in the 60s and had coached in the National League for 10 of the last 11 years, became the Orioles' roving batting and base-running instructor.

When the smoke had cleared, the O's had made 12 significant staff changes in 15 very busy days.

Mr. Williams, 67, a Hartford, CT native who worked his first baseball job in the old Hartford ballpark that also gave **Roland Hemond** his start, has been a winner all his life. His brilliant career spans more than 40 years of, as he characterizes it, "contest living" in the courtroom, 20 years as president of the Washington Redskins and going on 10 years as the Orioles' owner and chief executive.

The founder and senior partner of the Washington law firm, Williams & Connolly, he was a 1941 summa cum laude graduate of Holy Cross College. He served in the U.S. Air Force during World War II, and then attended Georgetown University Law School where he graduated in 1945, and was admitted to the D.C. Bar. He has been a Washington area (Potomac, MD) resident ever since.

The father of seven children (Joe, Ellen, Bennett, Ned, Dana, Tony and Kimberly), he lives with his wife, the former Agnes Anne Neill (also a Georgetown University Law School graduate) in Potomac, Maryland.

Mr. Williams taught Criminal Law and Evidence at **Georgetown Law School** from 1946 to 1958; was guest professor of American Criminal Law at the **University of Frankfurt** in West Germany in '54; and, in 1971, was visiting lecturer at **Yale University Law School** where he taught Constitutional Litigation. He holds honorary degrees from 14 universities.

He was chairman of the American Bar Association Special Committee on Crime Prevention and Control from 1970 to 1972. In 1966 the D.C. Bar Association presented him with its "Lawyer of the Year" award ... He is a fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers.

By appointment of the Chief Justice of the United States in March 1965, Mr. Williams served on the U.S. Judicial Conference Advisory Committee on Federal Rules of Evidence until 1974 and, from 1971 to 1974, on the Chief Justice's Committee on Court Facilities and Design.

By appointment of President Gerald Ford, Mr. Williams served on the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board in 1976 and 1977. In 1977, President Jimmy Carter appointed him a consultant to the National Security Agency (NSA). In November 1980, President-elect Ronald Reagan appointed Mr. Williams as one of three prominent Democrats to serve on the Foreign Policy Advisory Board to assist in the presidential transition. From 1982 to 1985, he again served on the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board, and is presently General Counsel to the Board.

Mr. Williams was treasurer of the **Democratic National Committee** from 1974 to 1977; has served as general counsel of **Georgetown University** since 1949; is chairman of the board of trustees of **Holy Cross College**, and is general counsel of the **Motion Picture Association of America**.

ROLAND A. HEMOND

BORN: October 26, 1929 in Central Falls, Rhode Island.

FAMILY: Married **Margo Quinn** on Nov. 8, 1958 . . . Five children: **Susan** (1/3/60) . . . **Tere** (12/27/61); **Robert** (4/20/64); **Jay** (12/11/65), and **Ryan** (12/11/72).

His mother was French-Canadian and his father's family was of French descent.

Father-in-law was **John Quinn**, a major league general manager for 28 seasons—first with the Braves for 14 years (Boston and Milwaukee), then with the Phillies for 14 more (to 1972) . . . Won three pennants with the Braves ('48, '57, '58) . . . Born in 1908, **Quinn** went to work in '32 with the Red Sox who were then operated by his father.

John Quinn's children include Roland's wife Margo; sister-in-law Susan who worked for the California Angels (was Roland's secretary for several years), and his brothers-in-law Bob Quinn (Yankees' v-p for baseball administration) and Jack Quinn (formerly with Hawaii Islanders', now president of St. Louis Blues).

EARLY CAREER: Served a four year tour of duty with U.S. Coast Guard ('47-'51), and had planned to save money to study journalism at Providence College while in the CG... Following discharge, went to DeLand, FL to visit a cousin who was in spring training with a Pirates minor league club.

While in DeLand he met a blind World War I veteran who recommended him to the general manager of the Hartford Braves (Eastern League). That was in 1951 . . . Spent the season doing various jobs (everything from sweeping out the concession stands to handling the public address system), and was promoted at the end of the season to the parent Boston Braves , where he worked under **John Mullen** (now with Atlanta Braves).. In 1953 Roland went to Milwaukee with the franchise.

ROLAND HEMOND (Cont.)

In Dec. '60 former Braves Manager **Fred Haney** became the Los Angeles Angels' 1st general manager. Less than a month later, **Haney** hired Roland as scouting and farm director.

CHICAGO: He joined Sox on Sep. 14, 1970 as director of (major league) player personnel. At the same time, **Chuck Tanner** who had been associated with Roland in the Angels organization was hired to manage the club. It was **Tanner's** first big league managerial assignment... At their first winter meeting the two newcomers moved 16 players in the first 18 hours of the convention (at Los Angeles).

In their first two full seasons the Hemond/Tanner combine brought the Sox in 3rd (1971) and 2nd (1972) respectively. The Sox were 87-67 in '72, and Roland won the first of his two "Major League Executive of the Year" awards.

He became a vice-president in July 1973 (in the **John Allyn** administration); worked with **Bill Veeck** from Dec. '75 when the latter bought the club until January 1981 . . . Collaborated with **Veeck** in the famous "open for business" caper during the '75 convention at Hollywood, FL. They set up a table in the hotel lobby, had a "White Sox Hot Line" phone installed, and made 4 trades in the final 1½ hours of the convention.

Was appointed executive vice-president/baseball operations when **Jerry Reinsdorf** and **Eddie Einhorn** bought the club from **Veeck**.

Earned his second "Major League Executive of the Year" Award in '83 after his White Sox won the western division championship by a record 20 games (biggest winning margin in baseball since the divisional system was adopted in 1969).

Replaced in Oct. '85 by **Ken Harrelson,** but remained with the Sox in a consulting capacity for a time with the title "special assistant to the chairman and president."

He also served as the "general manager" on the U.S. Major League All Stars seven game tour of Japan in November 1986, and represented Major League Baseball in Australia in 1987 at the Claxton Shield Tournament (for the Australian adult team championship) in 1987.

He is the club's principal representative in the current negotiations with the Maryland Stadium Authority regarding the new baseball facility planned for "Camden Yards" in downtown Baltimore.

He was one of the principal organizers of the very successful "Orioles Designated Hitters," the volunteer group, created in 1980, that represents the club in the sale of season tickets.

Aylward is a graduate of Vanderbilt University (Nashville, TN) and also attended Ohio University (Athens) where he was enrolled in the graduate program for sports administration. He first joined the Orioles as an intern in the ticket department while at Ohio University, and has been here ever since except for one year ('77) spent with the Columbus, OH Clippers, then the Pirates AAA farm club in the International League.

He grew up in Pace, MS, and attended McCallie School in Chattanooga, TN where he played baseball and was team captain, mvp and all-city in basketball his senior year. He is married to the former Elizabeth (Betsy) Hoppes who also attended Vanderbilt and earned a PhD in psychology from Cornell University, She is a developmental psychologist with a private practice in Baltimore . . . The Aylwards have a daughter, Laura (5/7/85).

JOSEPH P. HAMPER JR., 62 (1/28/26), vice president/finance, is the Orioles most senior staff member . . . He is now in his 35th year with the ballclub, since he was hired as an accountant in February 1954. He became controller in 1958 and a vice president in Oct. 1966. He is treasurer of the Baltimore Orioles Foundation, and was secretary of the company under previous ownership, from 1966 thru 1979.

He also served as executive vice president of the Baltimore Bays (North American Soccer League), a wholly owned subsidiary of the Orioles from 1967 through 1969.

A certified public accountant, Hamper has attended the Johns Hopkins University . . . During World War II, he was an infantryman in the U.S. Army, and spent three months as a prisoner of war in Germany. He is a bachelor and lives in Phoenix, MD, north of Baltimore.

FARM SYSTEM-1987

The Orioles 5 minor league teams combined for a 310-257 (.547) record, the 4th best among the 26 major league clubs behind Milwaukee (370-256, .591), St. Louis (476-363, .567) and Houston (384-316, .549). It ranks as the 7th best record in Orioles history. All five of the O's minor league clubs finished with a winning record for the first time since '76. Over the past 25 seasons, the O's minor league organization record is 8410-7646 (.523). During that time, the O's have been selected as the Topps "Baseball Organization of the Year" three times ('61,'71 and '72).

Three of the Orioles clubs advanced to post-season play. Rochester (74-65) won 15 of its final 18 games to finish 3rd in the International League (AAA). The Red Wings were eliminated in the first round of the playoffs, 3 games to none by eventual champion Columbus (Yankees).

After winning the Southern League's Eastern Division (AA), Charlotte (85-60) fell in the league finals, 3 games to one to Birmingham (White Sox). The O's beat Jacksonville (Expos) 3 games to 2 in the first round of the league's playoffs, clinching the Eastern Division. Their overall record was the best in the 12 years that the O's have been affiliated with the franchise. Hagerstown (72-68) won the first half championship of the Carolina League's Northern Division (A), but fell to Salem (Pirates) in the first round of the league playoffs.

Rochester's Mike Kinnunen led the IL in saves (16) and Jeff Ballard was 2nd in wins (13) when they weren't pitching with the major league club. For the 2nd straight year, the Red Wings were the league's top defensive team, committing a league low 109 errors.

Charlotte's DH Tom Dodd, the Southern League's Most Valuable Player, led all minor league players with 127 rbi, the 2nd highest total in the 24-year history of the league. Dodd also led the league in slugging (.583) and set club records for home runs in a season (37), career home runs (82) and rbi (279). Pete Stanicek led the league in on-base pct. (.406) and Tom Magrann led all SL catchers by throwing out 22 of 38 (.579) would-be base stealers. RHP Bob Milacki entered the record books when he tossed a no-hitter for 11.1 innings on May 28 vs. Chattanooga. Milacki settled for a combined 1-hitter with Rich Rice and a 2-1 win. Dodd and 1B Dave Falcone were both named to the SL post-season all-star team.

Hagerstown's 3B Leo Gomez led the Carolina League in batting (.326, 466-152), doubles (38) and tied for the league lead in rbi (110). Gomez established club records for average, hits, rbi, walks (95) and multi-hit games (45). He was named Carolina League player of the week on 4 occasions. LHP Blaine Beatty (11-1, 2.52) was named CL pitcher of the year while averaging less than one walk per 9 innings. Another left-hander, Brian DuBois, picked off an amazing 33 runners and was not called for a balk all year (27 games, 155 innings).

Newark (42-32) was led by 3B Jack Voigt, the O's 9th round draft pick last June out of LSU. Voigt led the NY-Penn League in batting (.320, 219-70) and was named the league's "Star of Stars". He is the 3rd Oriole to win the award in the last 4 years. Voigt had a 23-game hitting streak, July 6-31. 2B **Don Buford Jr.** led the league in stolen bases (35) and runs (68) in 71 games. Voigt, Buford, 1B **Ernie Young,** OF Steve Finley, and OF Jeff Ahr were all named to the league's post-season all-star team.

Bluefield's DH Terry Brown led the Appalachian League in home runs (14). Brown was the O's 14th round pick out of USC. Another recent draft pick, John Wahlig, out of SW Missouri, topped the league in doubles (19). Brown, OF Tracy Pancoski and C Dan Simond were named to the year end all-star team. Simond threw out 33 of 78 base stealers (.423), the best percentage in the league. 1B Dave Bettendorf walloped a league-high three grand slams.

The major league draft is held annually at baseball's winter meetings, and is followed with a separate selection by National Association clubs from class AAA to A levels . . . Until 1958, major league clubs could draft players within a range between \$15,000 (for AAA players) and \$2,000 (for class D players) . . In 1958 the price for big league drafts rose to \$25,000 and in 1985 it became \$50,000.

However, in 1959, a first-year player draft at the big league level was set up to discourage the payment of inordinately large bonus payments to free agents. The new rule provided that first-year players could be selected at the major league level (if not protected on a major league team's 40 man roster) for \$12,000. In 1961, an even lower draft price was set up for more recent first-year players. That figure was \$8,000.

That year, incidentally, the Baltimore organization set a record of sorts by being relieved of 19 eligible first year players (seven during the big league selections and 11 more during the minor league draft). In 1965, the first year player draft began to lose its significance and then disappeared in 1970.

CLYDE KLUTTZ MEMORIAL AWARD

Named in honor of the Orioles' director of player development who died in May, 1979, the CLYDE KLUTTZ MEMORIAL AWARD is presented annually to the Baltimore organization player "who best exemplifies Clyde's integrity, desire, dedication, and loyalty to the game of baseball and the Baltimore Orioles." Clyde had spent 41 years in baseball when he passed away at the age of 61.

The winners of the Kluttz Award to date: 1979-Tom Eaton (2b); 1980-Cal Ripken, Jr. (3b); 1981-Victor Rodriguez (2b); 1982-John Shelby (of); 1983-Mike Boddicker (p); 1984-Al Pardo (c); 1985-John Habyan (p); 1986— Eric Bell (p). The 1987 winner will be announced in April.

FRANK ROBINSON

Born: Aug. 31, 1935 Height: 6'1"; Weight: 195 Batted, R; Threw, R Position: Outfield

Birthplace/Residence: Born in Beaumont, TX, but grew up in Oakland, CA... Now lives in Bel Air, CA (near Los Angeles).

Tenure: Beginning his 36th year in professional baseball including 31 + years in majors as player, manager, and coach. **Signed Originally with:** Cincinnati.



WITH ORIOLES: Frank is in his 13th season with the Orioles, his 1st out of uniform in his new capacity as "special assistant to the president."

HALL OF FAME: He was elected to the Hall of Fame at Cooperstown in '82 along with Hank Aaron after being named on 89% of the ballots cast (370-415). That was the 1st of 4 straight years during which a former Oriole was named to the Hall. Frank is one of only 15 to have been elected to the Hall in his 1st year of eligibility (that list includes former teammate Brooks Robinson.)

Frank was 2nd of 6 O's to be so honored (date of election in paren): Robin Roberts ('76), Brooks Robinson ('83), George Kell ('83), Luis Aparicio ('84) and Hoyt Wilhelm ('85). In his official portrait at Cooperstown, he is wearing a Baltimore uniform.

He has managed the Cleveland Indians ('75–'77), Rochester Red Wings ('78) and San Francisco Giants ('81–'84), as well as the Santurce Crabbers in the Puerto Rican League for 8 winters and the Culiacan club in the Mexican Pacific Winter League ('77–'78).

Made a dramatic debut as playing manager on Apr. 8, '75, before some 55,000 opening day fans at Cleveland Stadium. In his 1st at bat of that 1st game (he was dh, batting 2nd), Frank homered off **Doc Medich** (**Boog Powell** later homered in the same half-inning).

The Indians went on to win, 5-3 and that effort was voted "most memorable moment" in Tribe history by fans during baseball's observance of the U.S. Bicentennial celebration.

In that 1st year, the Indians fell to 15 games below .500 by late June, but rallied and wound up 4th, just one game under . . . The next year, '76, they were 3 over. However, after a slow start in '77, Frank was released and succeeded by **Jeff Torborg.**

Frank became a big league coach for the 1st time after the Indians let him go as manager in '77. He joined **Dave Garcia** who had been his 3rd base coach at Cleveland ('75–'76) and was then managing the Angels.

He returned to Baltimore and coached for the O's for part of '78 and all of '79 and '80. During that period, he was responsible for vastly improving the quality of the O's outfield defense, and in '80 replaced **Jim Frey** (who left to manage the K.C. Royals) as the O's batting and 1st base coach.

After being released by the Giants in '84, he served the Milwaukee Brewers as batting coach.

FRANK ROBINSON (Cont.)

SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS: Was named manager Jan. 14, '81 replacing Dave Bristol (who had in turn replaced Joe Altobelli) and led the club to its first winning seasons since Altobelli did it in '78 and the first back-to-back winning seasons in a decade ('81 & '82) . . . After finishing 3rd in '82, the Giants dipped below .500 in '83 and '84 and on Aug. 4, '84, Frank was dismissed in favor of Danny Ozark who was named interim skipper.

During his tenure with the Giants, two former O's served on his coaching staff— ${\bf Don\ Buford}$ and ${\bf Herm\ Starrette.}$

ROCHESTER '78: Started the season as an O's coach, but after the late **Ken Boyer** was named manager of the St. Louis Cardinals (Apr. 28), Frank replaced him (May 9) at the Red Wings' helm.

He was 58-64 at Rochester which finished 6th. **Doc Edwards** was hired to manage the Wings in '79, and Frank returned to the O's as a coach, helping the O's to an A.L. pennant.

CLEVELAND '75-'76-'77: Joined the Indians as a player on Sep. 12, '74 from California in trade that ultimately sent **Rusty Torres** and **Ken Suarez** to the Angels... Then 3 weeks later, on Oct. 4, the day after that season ended, he was named the first black major league manager in baseball history, replacing **Ken Aspromonte.**

PLAYING CAREER

MAJOR LEAGUE LEADER: He played for 21 seasons in the majors and is among the top ranking players of all time in 10 categories.

His 586 home runs represent the 4th highest figure in major league history behind **Hank Aaron** (755), **Babe Ruth** (714) and **Willie Mays** (660) ... **Harmon Killebrew** (573) and **Reggie Jackson** (563) are 5th and 6th respectively.

In addition, Frank ranks high in the following: games-2,808 (11th) . . . at bats-10,006 (14th) runs-1,829 (10th) . . . hits-2,943 (20th) . . . doubles-528 (17th) . . . rbi-1,812 (12th) . . . total bases-5,373 (8th) . . . walks-1,420 (16th) and hit by pitches-198 (3rd).

"MVP", **BOTH LEAGUES:** He is the only player ever to win BBWAA "MVP" award in both leagues . . . He won the N.L. award in '61 and the A.L. in '66 . . . In addition, he was "MVP" in the '66 World Series and '71 All-Star game.

TRIPLE CROWN: Is one of only 11 players to have won the "Triple Crown" (accomplished 13 times, 2 each by Ted Williams and Rogers Hornsby)... Frank did it in '66 with the O's. He, Mantle ('56) and Carl Yastrzemski ('67) are the only Triple Crown winners in the past 39 years (since Williams' second in '47).

HOME RUNS

He hit 343 in the N.L. and 243 in the A.L \dots 388 were hit off righthanders and 198 off lefthanders.

VS. N.L. OPPONENTS: Astros (Colts)-11 . . . Braves-54 . . . Cardinals-46 . . . Cubs-54 . . . Dodgers-42 . . . Expos-0 Giants-49 . . . Mets-12 . . . Padres-1 . . . Phillies-38 . . . Pirates-34 . . . Reds-2.

33 PARKS: Frank holds the major league record for hitting home runs in most ballparks (33), including both regular season and World Series play . . . **Hank Aaron** is second at 32.

Among those, Crosley Field in Cincinnati (176) and Memorial Stadium (103) rank one-two in frequency . . . There were four stadia in which he played but did not hit a home run: Houston's Astrodome, Montreal's Expos Stadium, Sicks' Stadium in Seattle ('69 only) and Busch Stadium in St. Louis.

In regular season play Frank homered in 32 parks. His 33rd was Pittsburgh's Three Rivers in the '71 World Series . . . **Aaron** homered in 31 parks in regular season but added Yankee Stadium in the '57 World Series.

GRAND SLAMS: Hit a total of seven slams, five of them in the N.L. . . . His only two bases loaded homers in the A.L. were hit in successive innings on Aug. 20, '70 at R.F.K. Stadium in Washington off Senators' **Joe Coleman** and **Joe Grzenda** . . . Frank, **Jim Gentile** and **Jim Northrup** are the only ones ever to hit slams in successive plate appearances, though a total of seven have hit 2 in one game.

2 OR MORE/GAME: Hit two or more homers in a game 54 times (ranks 5th in major league history) . . . Hit three in a game for Reds at Crosley Field vs. St. Louis on Aug. 22, '59 . . . Had 16 two-homer games for O's.

HR ODDS AND ENDS: Hit his first at Wrigley Field off the Cubs' Paul Minner on Apr. 28, '56 and his last at Anaheim Stadium on July 6, '76 off the Angels' Sid Monge . . . Hit most off N.L. righthander Larry Jackson (10) . . . Hit the first homer and scored the first run in ALCS history, in game #1 in '69 at Baltimore off the Twins' Jim Perry.

HRS-ORIOLES: Hit his 500th major league homer in Baltimore in the 2nd game of a twi-night doubleheader against the Tigers' lefthander Fred Scherman Sep. 13, '71. At the time, he ranked 11th on the all-time list just behind Harmon Killebrew who had reached that milestone earlier that year ... After leaving Baltimore, Frank jumped past Killebrew, Mel Ott, Ernie Banks, Eddie Mathews, Ted Williams, Jimmy Foxx and Mickey Mantle.

Frank became the first (and only) player ever to hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium on May 8, '66 (second game) when he blasted a **Luis Tiant** (Cleveland) offering over the left field stands.

He set a major league record by hitting ten home runs in the month of April '69, but that mark has since been pushed to 11 by Willie Stargell, Mike Schmidt and Graig Nettles.

Set a club record with 49 homers in '66 . . . Also set marks that year for most homers by an Oriole against one opponent (11 vs. Det.) and most home runs, Memorial Stadium (27).

LAST GAME AS A PLAYER: Frank played in his last game as a player on Sep. 18, '76 at Cleveland vs. Baltimore. He put himself in as a pinch-hitter for Frank Duffy in the 8th inning and singled in a run off Rudy May.

ALL-STAR GAMES: Appeared in 11 all-star games as a player (six with Cincinnati, four with Baltimore and one with California) and served as a coach in '76 while managing for Cleveland . . . Was "MVP" in '71 game at Detroit . . . Hit a 2-run homer off **Dock Ellis** to put A.L. ahead to stay in 3rd inning (**Reggie Jackson** hit another with one on off **Ellis** in same inning).

Hit .250 (24-6) in all-star play with two home runs . . . Went 3-for-3 for the N.L. in '59 (at L.A. Coliseum) and homered off **Early Wynn.**

WORLD SERIES: Hit two key homers in '66 vs. Dodgers, both off Don Drysdale, to win Sport Magazine sports car . . . Hit his first in the opening inning of game #1 at Dodger Stadium with Russ Snyder aboard (Brooks followed immediately with another and the O's led 3-0 before the Dodgers batted) . . . O's won the game 5-2 . . . In game #4 his 4th inning inning solo provided the only run as the O's completed their sweep behind Dave McNally.

In '71, game #6 vs. Pittsburgh in Baltimore, Frank's base running in the 10th inning allowed the O's to tie the series at three games apiece . . . He drew a one out walk, and despite ailing legs and sore Achilles Tendon, went from first to third on **Merv Rettenmund's** single up the middle just evading **Richie Hebner's** tag with a head first slide . . . Then, he scored on **Brooks'** short sac fly to **Vic Davalillio** in center.

CINCINNATI: Spent ten full years with the Reds after three seasons in their farm system. Was N.L. "Rookie of the Year" in '56... Tied league record for homers by a rookie (38, set by **Wally Berger** of the Braves), and set a rookie mark by being hit by pitched balls 20 times.

Won a Gold Glove in '58 . . . Led the N.L. three straight years in slugging percentage ('60–'61–'62) . . . Won N.L. "MVP" in '61 . . . Set personal career highs in '62 in average (.342), hits (208), doubles (51) and rbi (136) . . . Set N.L. record by leading in hit by pitcher for six straight years ('60 thru '65).

BALTIMORE: O's won four A.L. pennants and two world championships during his six years in Baltimore.

LONG HOME RUNS/MEMORIAL STADIUM

The longest "measured" home run ever hit in Memorial Stadium was a 471' drive by Harmon Killebrew on May 24, 1964 off Milt Pappas over the hedge in left-center field.

This exceeded by two feet the only other blast that has ever cleared the hedge. .. That was one by Boog Powell 469' to the same area off Boston's Don Schwall on June 22, 1962. Aside from these there have been three balls hit into the hedge (approximately 450'), by Mickey Mantle in 1954, by Powell in 1965 and by Frank Robinson in 1967.

Frank Robinson is the only player to have hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium. In the second game of a doubleheader with Cleveland on May 8, 1966, Frank hit a Luis Tiant offering over the left field stands and into the parking lot beyond, a drive that measured 451' on the fly and rolled to a stop 540' away from home plate.

FRANK ROBINSON (Cont.)

Won Triple Crown and "MVP" awards in A.L. and World Series in '66... In addition to leading the league in average (.316), home runs (49) and rbi (122), he also paced the loop in total bases (367), runs (122) and slugging (.637).

Was batting .337 in late June '67 when he sustained serious injury in a second base collision with the White Sox' **Al Wels** . . . Missed a month and suffered from double vision for a year and a half afterward . . . Though he wound up with a .311 average that year, he slipped to .268 (with 15 homers and 52 rbi) in '68 while still recovering from that injury, compounded by an attack of mumps and a muscle tear in his right shoulder.

He returned to form the following spring and helped lead the O's to three straight pennants in '69, '70 and '71.

Following his trade to the Dodgers in Dec. '71, Frank's uniform #20 was retired. He was the first Oriole player to be so honored . . . In '77, he and Brooks became the first players to be inducted into the new Orioles Hall of Fame, originated by the Oriole Advocates in cooperation with the ballclub.

DODGERS-ANGELS: After one year ('72) with the Dodgers, Frank was traded to the Angels with infielders **Billy Grabarkewitz** and **Bobby Valentine** and pitchers **Bill Singer** and **Mike Strahler** in deal for infielder **Ken McMullen** and **Andy Messersmith.** (Dec. 2, '71).

PERSONAL: One of 11 children . . . Graduated from McClymonds High School (Oakland) . . . Was basketball teammate of **Bill Russell** and played baseball there with **Vada Pinson, Willie Tasby** and **Charlie Beamon** . . . Hobbies: movies, music and Lakers basketball games . . . Attended Xavier University in Cincinnati.

Frank and his wife, the former **Barbara Anne Cole**, were married Oct. 28, '61 . . . They have 2 children: **Frank Kevin** (9/8/62) and **Nichelle** (8/24/65) . . . Barbara is a real estate agent in the Bel Air area.

TEN MILLION THE LAST 5 YEARS: The Orioles have drawn 10,029,112 at home over the last 5 seasons, an average of 2,005,822. Although they failed to reach 2 million for the 2nd straight year, the O's have averaged 1,904,435 over those 2 seasons while finishing 7th and 6th in the A.L. East. During the '86 and '87 seasons combined, Baltimore's 140-184 record is the worst in the A.L., but their combined attendance is 7th best in the league.

BIG CROWDS, SERIES: The Orioles largest home crowd of '87 came on opening day, Apr. 6, vs. Texas, when 51,644 were on hand. It was the 21st 50,000+ crowd in Orioles' history, 18 of which have come in the 80's. The O's drew between 30,000 and 39,999 on 10 occasions and 40,000 or more

On Apr. 10 at Cleveland, the Orioles played before 64,540, the largest crowd for a regular season road game in the club's history. The Orioles had two 100,000+ series at home, the largest coming July 23–26 when 141,172 attended a 4-game series vs. the Royals during the club's 11-game win streak. The O's were in 6th place, 14 games out of first at the time. In 34 years, the club has hosted 54 series of 100,000+ fans, 43 of them coming in the last 9 years, starting in '79.



O'S RECORD IS BEST IN MAJORS Over the Last 31 Years ('57 thru '87)

Despite the Orioles' combined 140-184 (.432) record over the past 2 seasons, they have, nevertheless, maintained the best winning percentager the major leagues over the past 31 years (1957 thru 1987). The edge over the 2nd place Yankees, however, is by a scant .00012. The Yankees have won 5 more games in this span, and lost 5 more as well.

Since the start of '57 (the first year they finished at .500), the O's are 2738 2168, .55809, compared to the Yankees' 2743-2173, .55797.

In their first 3 Baltimore seasons ('54-'55-'56), the Orioles were a composite 102 games under .500 at 180-282. It was in '57, under Manager General Manager Paul Richards' direction, that the club reached .500 for the first time (76-76) and really began to jell.

GRAND SLAM NOTES

O's Lead Majors Over Last 7 Years: For the first time since '80, the Orioles failed to at least tie for the major league lead in grand slams . . . Baltimore hit 2, both by Fred Lynn. Despite the shortage, the O's have belted 45 grand slams the last 7 years (starting '81) 11 more than any other major league club (California-34 and Boston-32 are next).

Eddie Murray failed to hit a grand slam in '87, the first season since '80 he hasn't hit one. He fell one shy of the AL record for most consecutive years with a slam-7, held by Vern Stephens, '44-'50. Eddie has already hit 14 grand slams in his 10-year career and ranks tied for 8th on baseball's all-time list with Gil Hodges. He is first among active players.

Thru the Years: Although the Orioles allowed a club record 6 grand slams in '87, 2 shy of the major league record, the O's have "outslammed" their opponents 132-77 over the last 34 years (including a 72-36 advantage at

Three in One Game: The Orioles and Texas set a major league record on Aug. 6, '86 when the two teams combined to hit three grand slams in Texas' 13-11 win at Memorial Stadium (the record was equalled on June 3, '87, Hou. vs. Chi.). Jim Dwyer and Larry Sheets hit grand slams for the O's, both in the 4th inning. It marked only the 5th time in major league history that one club has hit 2 grand slams in a single inning. It was the 4th time the O's had hit 2 grand slams in one game. Toby Harrah hit Texas' slam.

Gentile Hit 5 in '61: Jim Gentile set an American League record and tied the major league standard in '61 when he hit 5 bases loaded home runs. The only prior player to reach that total was the Cubs' Ernie Banks in '55. In '87, Don Mattingly of the Yankees broke that record by hitting 6 grand slams.

Two in a Game: Only 7 players have hit two grand slams in one game in baseball history and only 3 have hit them on consecutive at-bats. In both situations, two of them were Orioles: Gentile hit two in a row at Minnesota on May 9, '61 (Metropolitan Stadium off Pete Ramos and Paul Giel), and Frank Robinson did the same on June 26, '70 at RFK Stadium in Washington (off Joe Coleman, Jr. and Joe Grzenda).

Post-Season Slams-Slugging Pitchers: Only two pitchers have ever hit grand slam home runs in post-season play. Both were Orioles at the time, and both did it in 1970. In game one of the '70 ALCS, Mike Cuellar hit one off the Twins' Jim Perry (at Minny) and in the 3rd game of the World Series vs. the Reds, Dave McNally found the range off Wayne Granger (at Baltimore).

The blast by Cuellar was the only ALCS grand slam ever until Don Baylor hit one for the Angels vs. Milwaukee in '82 (off Moose Haas) . . . Only two bases loaded homers have ever been hit in NLCS play: the Dodgers' Ron Cey and Dusty Baker in '77.

There have been 10 alien pitchers to throw up two grand slams each to Baltimore batters, including three still active: Aurelio Lopez (Det.) to John Lowenstein ('83) and Mike Young ('84), both at Detroit; Don Aase (Cal.) to Lee May ('79) and Doug DeCinces ('81), both at Baltimore; LaMarr Hoy (Chi.) to Terry Crowley ('80) and DeCinces ('81), both at Baltimore.

Orioles "Gophers:" Among Orioles pitchers, Milt Pappas was the most generous. He gave up 6 bases loaded homers during his tenure in Baltimore Dave McNally and Scott McGregor, who gave up 2 in '87, are next in in: with 4 apiece. On the other hand, Jim Palmer never allowed a slam in 558 games spanning nearly 4,000 innings. Among current O's, following McGre gor, are Don Aase with 2, and Eric Bell, John Habyan, Jose Mesa and Tom Niedenfuer with one apiece.

From '68 thru '80, a span of 13 years, at least one Oriole pitcher accumulated 20 or more victories to set a major league record. The old standard was 12 by the New York Giants from '03 to '14, a mark single-handedly assured by Christy Mathewson who won 20+ in each of those years.

In 1971 four Baltimore pitchers reached the 20-win plateau. The only other foursome in the entire history of major league baseball to have achieved the feat was a quartet from the 1920 White Sox (51 years earlier): Urban "Red" Faber-23, Claude Williams-22, Dickle Kerr-21 and Ed Cicotte-21. Despite that achievement, the White Sox finished second that year, two games behind Cleveland.

The four Orioles all won their 20th games within 6 days: McNally was the first on 9/21; then in a series in Cleveland, the other three joined him: Cuellar (9/24-first game-clinched division title), Dobson (9/24-2nd game), and Palmer (9/26).

Stone was the earliest 20-game winner in club history, winning his 20th game on August 19 en route to a team record 25 victories in '80. Three other Orioles' hurlers have recorded their 20th wins in August McNally (8/25) and Cuellar (8/27) in '71 and Palmer (8/30) in '75.

The first Oriole to win 20, and the only one in the club's first 14 seasons in Baltimore ('54 thru '67) was lefthander Steve Barber in

Larry Sheets was chosen the Most Valuable Oriole for '87 by vote of sportswriters and broadcasters who cover the team on a regular basis. He received 9 of 12 first-place votes and amassed 53 points (5-3-1 system) to finish ahead of Eddie Murray (26 points, 2 firsts) and Cal Ripken (18 points, 1 first) . . . Dave Schmidt, Terry Kennedy and Bill Ripken also received mention.

Outfielders have been the most common winners over the 0's 34 years in Baltimore (37 players have been elected because of dua selections in 3 different seasons). Sheets' election represented the 13th time an outfielder has won the award.

REVIEW OF THE ORIOLES '87 SEASON

While the Orioles' 49-35 (.583) record vs. the A.L. West was the best in the league, their 18-60 (.231) mark vs. the Eastern clubs at new low as the worst record ever against one division in the employear history of divisional play (AL only). As a result, the Oriole finished with the 3rd worst record (67-95) in the club's 34-year histophening their only other 90 + loss seasons: '54 and '55, the club's face 2 years in Baltimore.

They were 11-54 (.169) against the 5 teams ahead of them in the standings, including 4-28 (.125) on the road. The O's won only on series against an AL East team all year, that coming at Cleveland & 10-12, and went their final 23 series vs. the East without winning on set.

Orioles bats exploded for a major league record 58 home runs the month of May, leading the O's to a 26-20 record (3rd, 4 GB)® May 28. Then came another record-setting month for the Birds, on this one wasn't pretty. From May 29 to July 5, the Orioles went 53 including 5-23 in June, the worst month in club history. Along the way they fell into 6th place on June 10 and stayed there for the remains of the season.

An 11-game win streak, their longest since '78, brought the 0's 45-53 and ½ game from 5th place Boston on July 26, but the rest the way Baltimore was able to win back-to-back games only 6 times straight wins 4 times and 3 straight once) while going 22-42 (.333), and point they lost 17 of 18, Sep. 7-26. The Orioles were eliminated Sep. 11, their earliest elimination in 31 years.

ARTIFICIAL TURF: The Orioles were 10-14 (.417) in the Aballparks with artificial turf (Kansas City 5-1; Minnesota 2-4; Seattle 3 and Toronto 0-6) giving them a 159-154 (.510) lifetime record on the carpet. The O's are 152-150 (.503) in the AL stadiums (Chicago 27-24, from '68 thru '75); Kansas City, 37-48; Minnesota, 17-18; Seattle, 37-24; Toronto, 34-35 and 7-4 in 4 World Series (7) Cincinnati, 2-0; '71 Pittsburgh, 0-3; '79 Pittsburgh, 2-1; '8) Philadelphia, 3-0).

BATTING: The Orioles batted only .228 (479-109) the final 15 games of the year, lowering their overall mark to .258, matching the '86 mark. They were tied with Chicago for 12th in the league, ahead@ only California at .252 . . . O's were 3rd in the majors in home rurs (211), but were in the bottom 2 in the AL in runs (13th-729); double (14th-219); triples (13th-20) and stolen bases (14th-69) and in the bottom 5 in hits (10th-1437) and total bases (10th-2329) O's had only 3 players hit over .280 and that includes Carl Nichols, who batted only 20 times. . O's scored 3 runs or less 69 times (10-59), 2 runs or less 39 times (2-37) and 1 run or less 20 times (0-20) ... Of the O's 729 runs, 333 (45.6%) were scored via the home run. As late as Sep. 18, the O's had more homers than doubles (the last team to do it was the '63 Twins)

It was the 24th time in 34 Baltimore record since '81 (21-7) . . seasons that the O's have had a winning record in such games Their 25 1-run wins were 3rd most in the league behind Toronto (27) and Detroit (26) . . . The O's were 8-13 (.381) in 2-run games making them 33-34 in 1- and 2-run games combined . . . The O's were 19-16 in games decided in a team's last at bat; 28-29 in games decided in . . Baltimore had 19 games decided in sudden the 7th inning or later . death, winning 8 at home and losing 11 on the road . The 8 "sudden death" wins are one more than they had in the '85 and '86 . . O's had season-high 4 games decided in seasons combined 'sudden death" fashion with Minnesota and were 2-2.

DAY/NIGHT: O's were 18-23 in day games, ahead of only Cleveland (19-37) and Texas (12-21) . . . It was their first losing record under the sun since '81 (13-18) . . . The O's were 49-72 at night, the most losses in the majors and most in club history.

DAYS IN EACH POSITION: First (2); Second (6); Third (11); Fourth (28); Fifth (18); Sixth (117); Seventh (0).

DESIGNATED HITTERS: Orioles designated hitters finished 12th in the league with a .235 mark (630-148), 3rd lowest ever by the 0's since the DH rule was instituted in '73 . . . Baltimore's DHs were 12th in hrs (17) and last in the league in rbi (60) . . . O's employed 14 different DHs . . . **Jim Dwyer's** .295 (122-36) average was the 3rd best in the AL among DHs with at least 75 ABs . . Milwaukee's **Paul Molitor** had the top average (.350), followed by Cleveland's **Pat Tabler** (.306) . . . **Mike Young** (.224, 161-36) was the Orioles busiest DH . . . Other O's who had at least 20 ABs as a DH were: **Alan Wiggins** (.236, 157-37); **Ray Knight** (.220, 50-11); **Pete Stanicek** (.270, 37-10); **Fred Lynn** (.100, 30-3) and **Larry Sheets** (.364, 22-8).

DOUBLEHEADERS: The Orioles went 0-3-1 in doubleheaders, extending their winless streak to 12 straight twinbills without a sweep ... Baltimore's last doubleheader win came Sep. 24, '84 when they took 2 at home from the Yankees ... The O's have gone 0-7-5 in doubleheaders since then ... The 4 doubleheaders played in '87 are the 2nd fewest in club history ... Baltimore played only 3 in '86 ... By comparison, the '55 O's played a club record 32 doubleheaders.

FIELDING: O's 111 errors tied Toronto as the 4th fewest in the majors and were 24 errors fewer than they made a year ago. That's a reduction of 18% . . . It is also the fewest since '82 . . . O's were tied for 4th in the AL fielding after finishing 8th in '85 and 10th in '86 . . . O's turned 174 double plays, tied with Chicago for the most in the AL.

O's greatest improvement came at 3rd base where they lowered their errors from 40 in '86 to 23 in '87 (Ray Knight-18, Rene Gonzales-2, Pete Stanicek-2 and Floyd Rayford-1) . . . O's have now used 30 3rd basemen since **Brooks** retired in '77.

Rookie John Habyan handled 32 chances without an error, only 4 other AL pitchers handled more chances without a flaw . . Orioles rookies Habyan, Eric Bell (24), Tony Arnold (22), Jeff Ballard (15) and Jose Mesa (2) combined to handle 95 chances without an error

... Mike Boddicker was tied for 2nd in the AL with Texas' Charlie Hough in assists (46) and 4th in total chances (66).

Terry Kennedy led AL catchers in games (142), starts (135), and assists (58) . . . Both his games and starts are Orioles records for a catcher . . . His 4 passed balls were the 2nd fewest among qualifying catchers (min. 81 games) and his .993 (TC-814, E-6) fielding mark was 3rd best. Opponents were successful on 145 of 202 (.718) attempted stolen bases . . . O's catchers threw out 39 of 180 (.217) runners.

Cal Ripken's 20 errors were 7 more than a year ago, but his .973 fielding pct. (TC-740, E-20) was the 2nd best of his 6-year career. He led all AL shortstops in assists (480) for the 4th time in the last 5 years. He was 2nd in total chances (740) and double plays (105) and was 6th in fielding . . . On Sep. 14 at Tor., Ron Washington became the first Oriole to play shortstop other than Ripken since '82.

Eddie Murray led all AL first basemen in total chances (1526) and double plays (146) and was 2nd in starts (156) and assists (145). He finished 5th in fielding (.993, TC-1526, E-10) among qualifiers (108 games).

Bill Ripken had the best fielding pct. among AL 2nd basemen who appeared in at least 50 games (.990, TC-298, E-3) . . . He didn't committ an error in his first 25 games.

Lee Lacy racked up 11 assists in only 80 games in the outlield average of one assist every 7.2 games, the best ratio in the AL...Ht 11 assists were the most by an Oriole since '73 when Paul Blair Market

the worst in club history (previous worst was 30-47, .390, in 55) at worst in the majors . . . Their 51 home losses equalled the most inter Lat 10 years (Sea. in '83 and Cal. in '80 also lost 51) . . the last 2 seasons combined, O's are 68-93 (.422) at home, when they had gone 617-404 (.604) in the previous 13 years . . . The Orioles' 36-44 (.450) road record was 10th in the league. It was to O's 3rd straight losing season on the road.

HOME RUNS: The Orioles became the only team in major lead history to both hit and allow 200 home runs in a season home runs, 11th most in major league history, were 3rd in the major behind Detroit (225) and Toronto (215) . . . The Cubs (209) and Gan (205) were also over 200. Only one other time in major league histor had there been a season when more than one team hit 200+ home runs and that was '85 when the O's and Tigers both did it . . . The 0 were 3 shy of the club record of 214 set in '85 (that figure is the highest in baseball history) . . . Offensively, they broke 5 major league team home run records and tied another . . . They hit 58 home runs May, most homers hit in one month in major league history . . . The also set records for most home runs in 11-12-13-14 consecutive games and tied the mark for most consecutive games with 2+0 more home runs (9) . . . The O's had 9 players with 10+ homers to only the 2nd time in the club's history ('85 was the other) and to players (Sheets, Murray) with 30+ for only the 3rd time (Powell and F. Robinson in '66 and '69).

The Orioles allowed a major league record 226 homers, breaking the old mark of 224 by Kansas City in '64 . . . The low point came or Sep. 14 at Toronto when the Blue Jays hit a major league record to home runs off O's pitching. Only 7 teams in major league history have allowed 200 or more hrs in a season—4 in the AL alone this year.

AT MEMORIAL STADIUM: There were a major league hig 235 home runs hit at Baltimore in '87 (O's-110, OPP-125), 4th highes total in major league history behind: 248-Wrigley Field (L.A. Angels '61); 239-Municipal Stadium (K.C. Athletics, '64) and 236-Municipal Stadium (Cleveland Indians, '70). On May 28 vs. California, Memorial Stadium home run records fell: most by both clubs (8) and most by Orioles (6). Over the last 3 years there have been 614 home runs hit at Memorial Stadium, more than any other park. Detroit is 2nd with 606.

GRAND SLAMS: For the first time since '80, the Orioles failed to at least tie for the major league lead in grand slams . . . Baltimore hit 2 both by **Fred Lynn** . . . Despite the shortage, the O's have belted 45 grand slams the last 7 years (starting '81) 11 more than any other major league club (California-34 and Boston-32 are next) . . . O's pitchers, allowed a club-record 6 grand slams, including 3 to the Red Sox . . **Eddie Murray** failed to hit a grand slam for the first season since '80, falling one shy of the AL record for most consecutive years with a slam-7, held by **Vern Stephens**, '44-'50.

INJURIES: Orioles players spent a total of 466 combined days during the season on the disabled list and that didn't include season-ending injuries to **Dave Schmidt, Ken Dixon** and **Billy Ripken** that occurred late in the season and didn't necessitate a move to the DL. The O's placed 13 players on the DL in '87 (including **Don Aase** twice), 25 in the last 2 seasons.

By position, the list claimed 7 pitchers (Don Aase, Mike Flanagan, Jack O'Connor, Tippy Martinez, Tony Arnold, Doug Corbett and Scott McGregor); 4 outfielders (Lee Lacy, Fred Lynn, Mike Young and Ken Gerhart) and one infielder (Rex Hudler).

Aase—Was on the DL for all but 22 days with sore right shoulder. He was active only from May 13 to May 27. **Dr. Lewis Yocum** performed arthroscopic surgery on July 30 to repair damaged and loose cartilage in the shoulder.

Arnold—A strained back kept him on the DL July 17-Sep. 5.

Corbett—Went on the DL with traumatic arthritis in left knee on Aug. 5 and announced his retirement upon his return on Aug. 19.

Flanagan—Faced only one batter at California on May 17 before leaving with pain in elbow. Missed from May 18 to July 17 with tendinitis in left elbow.

Gerhart—Suffered a hairline fracture of the right wrist when he was hit by a pitch from Cleveland's **Doug Jones** on Aug. 12. Was on the DL the rest of the season.

Hudler—Tore ligament in left thumb in exhibition game on March 14... Returned to action on May 28 with Rochester.

Lacy—Was on the DL, Apr. 18-May 8, with a strained right hamstring.

Lynn—Missed 43 games due to injury (sore right quadricep muscle, back spasms, sore left shoulder), mostly in the 2nd half . . . Was DL'd from July 23 to Aug. 5 with quad injury.

T. Martinez—Was placed on the DL on March 30, while recovering from '86 shoulder surgery, and was subsequently released on June 4 without being activated.

McGregor—Was on the DL with a stiff left shoulder from Aug. 8 to Sep. 5 . . . Appeared in only 3 games, all in relief, after his return.

O'Connor—Was disabled with tendinitis in left shoulder, June 13-July 28.

Young—Tore ligament in right thumb diving for line drive by **Don Mattingly** in exhibition game vs. Yankees on March 8 and went on DL March 23 . . . After rehab assignment at Rochester, returned to the Orioles May 13.

Others who missed some work due to injuries: **Bill Ripken** tore a ligament in his right ankle fielding a ground ball at Toronto on Sep. 15 and was out for the remainder of the year; **Dave Schmidt** was bothered by a bone spur in his left elbow and didn't pitch after Aug. 22 (was operated on by **Dr. Frank Jobe** on Sep. 8); **Ken Dixon** made only 2 starts the last 6 weeks due to stiffness in right shoulder; and **Ray Knight** missed 4 games, Apr. 29-May 4, when he collided with K.C.'s **Buddy Biancalana** sliding into 2nd base and suffered a mild concussion and a badly bruised throat.

Nieves threw the first ever no-hitter against the Orioles in Baltimore, beating the O's 7-0 . . . It was the 3rd pitched vs. the O's, first since June 1, '75 when Nolan Ryan did it . . . It was also the 5th no-hitter pitched in Baltimore, following 4 by the O's, the most recent by Jim Palmer on Aug. 13, '69 . . Nieves walked 5 and struck out 7 . . . CF Robin Yount saved the no-hitter with a diving catch of a drive hit by Eddie Murray for the last out of the game . . . On May 5 at Minnesota, Baltimore's Eric Bell became the 9th Oriole to lose a no-hitter in the 9th inning when Tom Nieto singled with none out . . . Twins scored 4 runs that inning, but Bell eventually won game, 5-4, with Ken Dixon getting the save.

PINCH-HITTING: Orioles pinch-hitters were 2nd in the AL with a .314 (86-27) average, highest in club history (the previous best was .286 in '62) . . . The 86 ABs were the fewest in Oriole history . . . O's PH'ers had batted 605 times combined the 3 previous years . . O's hit 5 pinch homers, all coming at home including 2 9th inning "sudden death" game-winners: **Jim Dwyer** off Oakland's **Dennis Eckersley** on Sep. 6 and **Fred Lynn** off California's **Chuck Finley** on Aug. 28.

Dwyer led the O's with 2 pinch homers, the 8th and 9th of his career tying him for 2nd among active major leaguers with SF's Candy Maldonado and Detroit's John Grubb behind Atlanta's Graig Nettles (11) . . Dwyer took over the Orioles all-time career record with his 8th on June 14 off Toronto's Tom Henke . . . He was the O's busiest pinch-hitter for the 3rd straight year (.292, 24-7, HR-2, RBI-7, BB-5) and was tied for 5th in the AL with 7 pinch rbi He finished the season with 82 career pinch hits, 3rd among active players . . Dwyer has 43 as an Oriole, trailing only Terry Crowley (79) on the O's all-time list . . . Lee Lacy (.333, 12-4) now,has 65 career pinch-hits, 7th among actives.

ptrching: The Orioles (5.01) and Indians (5.28) became only the 45th and 46th teams in major league history to post an era of over 5.00... Only one other team has done it in the last 31 years, the '62 Mets... Prior to '87, the O's had posted a combined 3.46 era (IP-46,876, ER-18,020) in the first 33 years of the franchise ('54-'86)... The O's had posted a team era of 3.39 from '54 thru '83, but over the last 3 years their era has been 4.56 IP-4,303.2, ER-2182)...O's era reached a high of 5.18 on July 10 after 86 games... In 88 games before the all-star break, Baltimore's era was 5.08 (IP-787.2, ER-445) while in the final 74 games it was 4.91 (IP-652, ER-356).

In addition to allowing a major league record 226 home runs, to Birds' staff also set O's club records for: most hits (1,555 bettering of mark of 1,480 in '85), most runs (880, old mark 764 in '85), higher opponents batting average (.277, old mark .270 in '85); and tied the marks for: fewest complete games (17, tying '86); and fewest shutten (6, tying 4 other years).

Orioles starters pitched the fewest innings in the AL (912) averaging only 5.2 innings per start (42-70, ERA-5.26, IP-912) ER-533)... As a result, the bullpen was the busiest in the league with 527.2 innings (25-25, ERA-4.60, IP-527.2, ER-270)... O's starter failed to complete 3 innings 35 times and failed to finish 5 innings 4 times... Relievers earned 30 saves (out of 63 opportunities)... The different pitchers owned at least one save... The bullpen blew a leads, 18 in the 7th inning or later... The O's lost 10 games in which they were leading in the 7th or later... The O's used 18 different pitchers (most since '67), 11 starters and 15 different relievers.

ROOKIES: O's rookie pitchers started 63 games this yes (Bell-29, Habyan-13, Ballard-14, Williamson-2, Mesa-5), 18 morth than any other major league club (Cubs-45)... The O's were 22-41 those games. O's rookie starters were a combined 15-32, [59, 18-323.2, ER-222). Overall, O's rookies were 27-40 with 3 saves and 5.22 era (IP-560.1, ER-325). The 26 wins by rookies led the mann (Pitt. was 2nd with 25)... Offensively, O's rookies batted 27, (712-196), 17 points above the team average.

ROSTER/LINEUPS: Of the 41 players employed by the Oriole (18 pitchers, 23 position players), 23 also played at Rochester. Only players were with the club all year (C. Ripken, Murray, Knight Kennedy, Sheets, Dwyer, Bell, Boddicker) ... Baltimore made or roster moves, 58 before Sep. 1 ... O's used 108 different-lineups.

history . . From July 12-26, the O's won 11 straight, 5th longes streak in club history and longest since '78 when the O's won 15 straight . . . But June 3-13, the Birds dropped 10 straight, 4th longes in club history and the longest since '58 when they lost 11 in a row... The Orioles had 4 losing streaks of 7 games or more.

ORIOLES VS. OPPONENTS

VS. BOSTON ('87: 1-12, Lifetime: 277-302) . . . The Red Sox have ranked as the **only** A.L. opponent with a lifetime winning record against the Orides since September 1978 . . . However, that distinction is now being challenged seriously by both the Yankees, who are 291-291, and the Indians, with a lifetime mark of 289-291 vs. Baltimore at the start of '88.

Though the O's have a winning lifetime record against every opponental Memorial Stadium, their edge over the Red Sox is only 3 games, 147-144.

The Red Sox captured the season series for the 4th straight year, and the O's 1-12 record against them matches their worst ever in a season series vs one club (they've also gone 1-12 vs. '87 Blue Jays, '86 Tigers and '85 Yankees) . . . The Birds lost the first 9 games of the series, before **John Habyan** decisioned **Bruce Hurst** in the first of a double header at Baltimore Sep. 18.

The Red Sox hit an astonishing .349 (473-165) in the 13 games (O's hit .273), and forged an incredible .419 on-base percentage. They also outscored the O's (99-51), and out-homered them (15-9). The O's era was more than double the Sox' (7.58 to 3.57).

The O's are 16-36 against Boston in the past 4 seasons (starting '84). At Memorial Stadium the O's are 5-22 (.185) vs. the "Sawx" in that period (and only 3-20 starting Sep. 21, '84).

At Fenway Park the O's were winless in '87 (0-6), have lost 7 in a row there since **Mike Boddicker** beat **Bob Stanley** on Sep. 30, '87, and have dropped 8 of their last 9 in the "Hub City". During the O's first series at Boston (Jun 29–30, Jul 1), they were outscored 33 to 14.

The Carmines hit .385 (213-82) and averaged 8+ runs during the 6 games at Fenway.

RED SOX BATTING: Eleven of the 21 Red Sox who batted against the O's in '87 hit over .300. The following 4 Red Sox were among the top 6 Orioles opponents with at least 25 at bats: Marty Barrett (#1), Wade Boggs (#4), Spike Owen (#5) and Mike Greenwell (#6) ... Barrett (.379) and Boggs (.35338) are the 2 actives with the best career batting averages against the

Orioles, 100 or more at bats. **Jim Rice** ranks 9th (.330) . . . (see more on **Rice** below, and see also list of top hitters vs O's on page 66).

Barrett's .529 (51-27) average in '87 was the highest against the Orioles (30 or more at bats) for at least the past 14 years and possibly ever (our research dates back only to '74 at the moment). He enjoyed two 4-hit games against the O's and 6 walks bloated his on-base pct. to .569 (58-33) Barrett also led all opponents in runs (16) and hits (27). Lifetime he's batting 379 (195-75) vs. the Birds.

Boggs hit .425 (40-17) with 13 rbi in 10 games. Lifetime he is batting .353 against the O's (266-94) and .354 vs. the world (3329-1178). Owen hit .415 (41-17), so the Sox' keystone combination (Barrett and Owen) combined for a sparkling .478 (92-44) . . . Greenwell (.412, 34-14) was the last of 4 Red Sox to hit over .400 against the O's in '87.

Both Rookie Ellis Burks (6/10 at Bal.) and Boggs (6/29 at Bos.) had career high 7 rbi games against the O's in '87.

Rice, a perrennial Orioles menace, was held to a .233 avg. (30-7), no homers and 5 rbi in 8 games. Nonetheless, he maintains a .330 (615-203) career mark against the O's with 36 homers and 121 rbi in 157 games . . . His 36 homers rank 6th on the Birds' all-time opponents list (see page xx for the top 10 list).

RED SOX PITCHING: Roger Clemens was 2-0 with a 1.00 era (ip-18, er-1) and held the O's to a .145 (62-9) average in two starts (both cgs)... During his 2 years as the league's Cy Young, he's gone 5-0 vs. Baltimore with a 2.38 (ip-41.2, er-11).

Bruce Hurst was the only Carmine to lose to the O's in '87, but he also was the Sox' biggest winner against them (3-1), and he threw 3 complete games in 4 starts . . . Lifetime, he's 6-4.

ORIOLES BATTING: Newcomer Terry Kennedy hit .441 (34-15), Lee Lacy .423 (26-11) and Cal Ripken .327 (49-16) . . . Lacy has a .340 (94-32) career average against the Sox.. Eddie Murray was limited to one home run and one rbi in 13 games while batting .224 (49-11).

ORIOLES PITCHING: John Habyan earned the O's only win (he was 1-1) while **Jeff Ballard** and **Tom Niedenfuer** were both 0-2 . . . The 7.58 team era against the Sox was the O's highest vs. one team since 1492 (that's 1492) . . . No one on the O's '87 staff had a winning lifetime record vs. Boston (e.g. **Boddicker** 4-5, **McGregor** 4-9, **Habyan** 2-2).

VS. CALIFORNIA ('87: 9-3, Lifetime: 208-158) . . . The O's haven't lost a season series to the Angels since 1978 . . . Since then they've won 7 times and tied twice . . . In that 9-year span they are 69-39 (.639) vs. the Cowboy's team (excluding 3-1 in '79 ALCS).

O's Have Lifetime Winning Record In All West Coast Ports

The O's are over .500 lifetime in Southern California (96-90, including 75-66 at Anaheim), the Bay Area (71-55) and in the great Pacific Northwest (37-24) . . . Figures in parenthesis are regular season only.

The Birds won 9 in a row from the Angels from May 16 thru Aug. 28 before Cal won the last 2 games of the year . . . This was the 2nd longest streak ever against the Halos. The O's won 12 regular season games in a row from them back at the turn of the decade (July 19, '79 thru Aug. 28, '80).

Their .279 average (437-122) was the Orioles' highest of the year against a single opponent (Cal hit .238) . . . Baltimore also outscored the Angels (61-50) while averaging 6+ runs per game, out-homered them (23-12) and outpitched them (3.77-4.04).

History was made in Baltimore on May 28 when the two clubs combined for 8 home runs, most ever in a Memorial Stadium garne . . . The O's hit 6 of those, most ever by the home team in the Monumental City . . . Willie Fraser was the victim of 4 of the blasts and DeWayne Buice was touched for 2. Both Larry Sheets and Mike Young connected twice, and Young's pair which tied the game in the 10th and won it in the 12th (both off Buice) in "sudden death" tied a big league record for most homers, game, in extra innings.

Speaking of home runs, in the 6 games at Anaheim (O's were 5-1) atte of 12 homers were hit, 11 by the Birds . . . In the 6 played in Balmer, the 0 hit 12 and the Angels 11, total 23 . . . Fred Lynn hit 5 homers in 10 game against the **Autrys** (4 at Anaheim).

Though the O's had a commanding edge in wins, the games were dose by and large . . . Nine of the 12 were decided by 2 or fewer runs (O's were).

ANGELS BATTING: Bob Boone (.351, 37-13) and Gary Pettis (.348, 238 were the top hitters against the O's . . . Pettis over the past two years hat gone 20-for-60 (.333) vs. O's pitching.

Bill Buckner batted a combined .303 (33-10) for the Bosox/Angels to D's and now has a .309 career average against them (191-59), 38 (99-39) at Memorial Stadium.

ANGELS PITCHING: Buice (see "history was made" above) appeared in a games vs. the O's in relief, worked 11 innings and was 0-3.

Mike Witt was 0-1 in 3 starts with a 6.91 era (ip-14.1, er-11) ... On Na 27, he experienced a nightmarish 4th inning during which he threw 40 pitches and gave up 4 runs (2 earned) on only one hit. Five Witt walks do some damage in that canto, as did an Angels error. Lifetime Witt is 48 against the Birds.

Dan Petry is only 1-1 vs. Baltimore in the last 3 years, but he is 124 lifetime and has won 8 of his last 10 decisions against the Orioles.

Kirk McCaskill was 0-1 in '87 in 2 starts after going 4-0 vs. the 0's the year before . . . Southpaw Chuck Finley was the "Dave Righetti of the West" the last two years as far as the 0's are concerned. Going into the sinning in Baltimore on Aug. 28, he had pitched 17.1 lifetime innings to Baltimore, all of them scoreless including 5.1 that night, over 5 appearances. Then Fred Lynn hit a game-winning "sudden death" homer to end the streak. His career era vs. the 0's now computes to 0.52 (ip-17.1, er-1).

ORIOLES BATTING: The Orioles' .279 average (437-122) was a high vs. one opponent . . . **Eddie Murray** has long been the O's big story against the Angels . . . Since joining the club in '77, he has played in all 133 Angels-O's games (incl. 5 ALCS in '79) and has batted .332 (431-143) with 25 homes and 101 rbi.

Over the last 4 years, in 48 games, **Murray** has batted .360 (175-63) with 12 homers and 48 rbi, and has reached safely against them at a .453 (212-96) rate.

Lynn had a .343 (35-12) average go to with his 5 homers against the Angels in '87 . . . Over the last 2 years he has battered Angels pitching at a .351 (77-27) pace.

ORIOLES PITCHING: The most successful Oriole in the season series was **Mark Williamson**, who went 3-1 in 5 relief appearances with a 2.84 (ip-12.2 er-4) . . . No other Oriole had more than one win . . . **John Habyan** was 1-0 in 3 appearances (one start) while holding the Angels to a .190 (42-8) average.

Scott McGregor became a 20-game (regular season only) lifetime winner vs. the Angels on May 16 at Anaheim (his lone '87 decision vs. Cal) . . . If you include his pennant-clinching shutout in game #4 of the '79 ALCS, he is 21-7 and has won 21 of his last 26 decisions against the Angels. In that stretch, he once strung together 12 straight wins (7/8/79 to 7/19/82). He also won 10 in a row at Anaheim (7/8/79 to 8/27/85) and is 13-4 there lifetime.

Vs. CHICAGO ('87: 8-4, Lifetime: 278-238) . . . The O's won 8 of the last 9 games between the 2 clubs, and captured the season series for the 15th time in the last 20 years (they've tied 2, and lost only 3 in that time). In that 2-decade period, the O's have gone 145-90 (.617) against the Pale Hose.

The Birds won all 6 games at Chicago (see "Comiskey Park" below), but won only 2 of the 6 games in Baltimore . . . From Aug. 18, '83 thru '87 (including '83 ALCS) the Orioles are 37-17 (.685) vs. Chicago.

The Sox pulled off their first series sweep (3 or more games) in Baltimore in nearly 21 years when they beat the Birds 3 in a row May 1-2-3. That hadn't happened since Sep. 16-17-18, '66. It was the first time the Chisox had even won a series in the Monumental City since Aug. '83, and the first time they'd won a game here since '85 (Sox were 0-6 in Memorial Stadium in '86).

HOME RUNS: A total of 45 home runs were hit in the 12 games, 26 by the Orioles and 19 by Chicago, including 8 by Eddie Murray... The record for home runs in a season series involving the O's is 46 (Bal. & Det., and Bal. & Cle., both in '85).

AT COMISKEY PARK: The O's batted .324 (216-70) in Chicago last year, scored 53 runs (Sox-28), an average of nearly 9 per game, and hit 17 homers in 6 games (Sox-7) . . . At home they scored only 20 times in the half dozen games they played against the Sox in Balmer (Sox scored 30). It was the 2nd time the O's had gone unbeaten in Chicago. They were 4-0 there in

On Saturday, May 9, the O's blasted the Sox, 15-6, tying a club record with 10 extra-base hits (2b-3, 3b-1, hr-6) . . . Larry Sheets (see below under "O's Batting") hit a ball over the outfield roof that night, becoming only the 42nd ever to do it; the first left-hander since '70, and only the second Oriole ever (Boog was the first in '66). Sheets hit .566 (23-13) at Corniskey with 9 rbi . . . Murray had 10 rbi in the 6 games there.

Only once before had the O's ever gone undefeated in Comiskey. That was in '78 when they were 4-0 with one game rained out (only 10 games total were scheduled then between inter divisional rivals).

The O's even won a game abbreviated to 5 innings in Chicago on July 8 (6-5) after 3 rain delays totaling 2:34.

WHITE SOX BATTING: Harold Baines batted .368 (38-14) with 3 homers & 10 rbi in 9 games . . . Carlton Fisk also drove in a club high 10 runs in the season set . . . Ivan Calderon batted .349 (43-15) and led the Sox in homers (4) vs. O's pitching.

WHITE SOX PITCHING: Alan Bannister was 2-0 in 2 starts with a 1.69 era (ip-16, er-3) to even his lifetime regular season record at 8-8 (he was 0-1 in 83 ALCS) . . . Nonetheless, Bannister has dropped 6 of his last 8 decisions to the O's (including ALCS) . . . The only multiple loser was Jose DeLeon (1.2)

ORIOLES BATTING: In addition to his 8 home runs, **Eddie Murray** hit 3 doubles, drove in 15 runs in the 10 games, including 4 game-winners, batted 318 (44-14), had a .932 slugging percentage (ab-44, tb-41) and thanks to 9 walks, compiled an on-base average of .434 (53-23).

Sheets (see above under "Comiskey Park") hit .486 (35-17) with 4 doubles, 4 home runs (2 game-winners) in the 10 games overall, and had a 943 slugging average (ab-35, tb-33). He is batting .397 lifetime (73-29) vs. the Pale Hose . . . Rookie **Ken Gerhart** batted .333 (27-9) with 3 homers, including 2 in a game at Chicago on July 22.

Cal Ripken has driven in 46 runs in his last 48 games against the White Sox, a stretch that began at the start of '84... His 19 home runs vs. the White Sox are a career high ... Junior has had notable success against Bannister ... He has a .368 (38-14) lifetime average vs. the Sox' left-hander with 5 doubles and 3 home runs.

Lee Lacy has a .340 career average vs. Chicago (100-34) and Fred Lynn is batting .302 (404-122).

ORIOLES PITCHING: Mike Griffin (2-0 vs. Chi.) earned his first 2 big league wins since 1981 when he beat the Sox on July 6 and 20, allowing only 2 earned runs over 11 innings in the 2 starts (1.64 era) . . . Mark Williamson was 1-0 with 2 saves in 4 appearances and held the Sox to an .063 batting average (32-2).

Probably the most impressive Orioles' effort vs. Chicago was **John Habyan's** scoreless, one-hit pitching in 6.2 scoreless relief innings on July 22 at Chicago. Trailing 5-3 when he came on to relieve **Mike Boddicker** in the 3rd, he was the ultimate winner, 10-5.

Biggest lifetime winners vs. Chicago among current Orioles are **Scott McGregor** (13-8) and **Mike Boddicker** (7-3).

VS. CLEVELAND ('87: 7-6, Lifetime: 291-289) . . . The season series has finished at 7-6 (or 6-7) 5 times in the last 7 years . . . The Indians record against the O's is 3rd best in the A.L. behind Boston (302-277) and New York (291-291). However, considering the O's start against the Tribe just after coming to Baltimore in '54, it's a wonder the Birds are ahead at all.

During the first 3 years the franchise was based in Baltimore, the O's were 11-55 overall and 3-30 in Cleveland Stadium ('54: 3-19, '55: 3-19, '56: 5-17). It took 25 years to go over .500 lifetime vs. the Indians. That occurred

on June 18, '79 and the O's have had a winning record ever since, thou they are only 2 games over at the start of the '88 season.

The Indians have been directly involved in the biggest regular season crowds the O's have ever drawn both at home and on the road (both into last 2 years). In Baltimore, the Indians were the opposition when a reco-52,292 showed up for opening day '86, and last year some 64,540 attended the Indians home opener against the O's, the most ever to watch the O'spe anywhere (regular season).

Ironically, the big turnout in last year's Cleveland opener represented a a hair under 50% of the total the two clubs would draw at the lakefront in games (129,921).

The O's sweep at Cleveland Stadium April 10-11-12 was their first d: series 3 games or longer in almost 8 years there (since June 18-19-20.7 . The O's executed a club record tying 5 double plays (all the ground): type) while edging the Tribe at Baltimore on Aug. 10, 4-3 . . . Two days later types while edging the Tribe at Baltimore on Aug. 10, 4-3 . . . the 2 clubs produced 7 homers (5 by the Indians including two each by Con Snyder and Joe Carter), one shy of the Memorial Stadium record.

Lee Lacy stole a grand slam from Brook Jacoby and a game from to Indians with a leaping catch against the right field fence in the 8th inningd the Tribe's home opener. At the time, the score was tied at 11, and the 0; ultimately won it 12-11 in 10 innings . . . Ray Knight's 2-out double off Emile Camacho was decisive . . . In that 1st lifetime game vs. the Indians, Knigh was 2-for-2 with a home run, double, 3 walks and 3 rbi (he wound up with .314 average, 51-16) . . . There were 3 extra-inning games in the season series (O's lost 2).

INDIANS BATTING: Cory Snyder hit .392 (51-20) and blasted 5 home run vs. the O's, but had a modest 6 rbi for his trouble . . . At Baltimore, Snyderic .556 (27-15), and—with 3 doubles, one triple and 4 homers—had a 1.18 slugging average (ab-27, tb-32). In his 2 A.L. seasons, Snyder has played 20 games vs. the O's, batted .380 (79-30), hit 9 homers and driven in 14

Pat Tabler continued to be a problem . . . He batted .327 (52-17) and let the Tribe in rbi vs. the O's (8) . . . Lifetime, Tabler is batting .341 (21473) against Baltimore (ranks 5th among actives with 100 or more at bats, 586

Joe Carter, on the other hand, batted only .200 (55-11) and fanned 13 times, although 4 of his 11 hits were home runs. Over the last 2 years, Carter has batted .178 (107-19) vs. Baltimore and his lifetime average is only .208

INDIANS PITCHING: Tom Candiotti (0-3) and Ken Schrom (0-2) were a combined 0-5 last year after going 4-0 (each 2-0) vs. the O's in '86 Candiotti's '86 era was 0.39 (ip-23.1, er-1) against the Birds, who hit only .136 (81-11) against him. Last season his era was 7.13 (ip-17.2, er-14) and the O's batted a sprightly .324 (74-24).

Schrom had a whopping 24.75 era (ip-4, er-11) in 2 '87 starts and the O's hit .500 against him (20-10) . . . Ex-Oriole Sammy Stewart had a vengeful weekend against his former teammates when he beat the O's twice in relief (July 28 & 30), both in 10 innings. They were his only '87 appearances against the Birds.

ORIOLES BATTING: The Ripken Brothers hit a combined .364 (77:28) against the Tribe, Bill-.346 (26-11) and Cal-.333 (51-17) ... Cal hit 6 home runs, drove in 18 runs and drew 11 walks that produced a .452 (62-28)

The Tribe limited **Eddie Murray** to a .204 average (54-11), but didn't hold him in check. He still responded with 15 rbi in the 13 games (3 homers) Lifetime against Cleveland, Murray is batting .323 (507-164) despite the '87 aberration . . . Ken Gerhart batted .333 (51-17) in the season series with 3

ORIOLES PITCHING: Rookies accounted for 5 of the O's 7 wins. Eric Bell was the O's most effective pitcher vs. Cleveland, and rookie Mark Williamson the busiest. Bell was 3-0 in 3 starts and Williamson was 2-2 with a save in 7 . Among current Orioles, Scott McGregor is both the biggest career winner and loser against Cleveland at 10-10.

VS. DETROIT ('87: 4-9, Lifetime: 300-286) . . . Over the last 2 years the O's have gone 5-21 vs. the Tigers and are 5-22 (.185) starting the last day of the '85 season.

In Baltimore, it's even worse . . . The Birds have lost 13 of their last 14 games to the Tigers at Memorial Stadium (1-5 in '87), also beginning Oct. 6, 85 (last game of year), and are 8-26 (.235) in Balmer commencing Sep. 21,

The O's first win of '87 vs. Detroit, June 20-21 (see "Slugfest I" below) at Memorial Stadium snapped a streak of 9 straight losses to the Tigers . . . In '86, the O's were 1-12 vs. the Bengals, tied for their worst record ever vs. one club (also 1-12 vs. '85 Yankees, '87 Red Sox and '87 Blue Jays).

Detroit dominated the series, maintaining a decisive edge in average (.291 to .222), runs (85 to 50), homers (28 to 15) and era (3.58 to 5.77) . The O's .222 average was their lowest against one opponent in '87 . . . They hit only .199 (236-47) at Tiger Stadium.

The O's split a critical 4-game series at Detroit the last week of the season, beating Jack Morris and Dan Petry, and losing to Frank Tanana & Walt .. The Tigers were 21/2 games back when the series opened and only one game behind when it ended . . . The 4 dates drew a modest 76,080 despite the importance of the games to the Tigers.

HOME RUNS: Over the last 3 years, 121 home runs have been hit in 39 Orioles-Tigers game, 69 by Detroit & 52 by the Birds . . . That total includes 46 in 13 '85 games, tied for most ever in a season series involving the O's (there were also 46 hit that year in O's-Indians season series).

SUSPENDED GAME: To show how tough it's been for the O's to beat the Tigers, it took them 2 days (Sat-Sun, 6/20-21) to snap their 9-game losing streak against them . . . The O's led 9-4 after 8 innings when the game was suspended at 1:02 a.m. Two rain delays had totaled 2:23, and the game was still in the bottom of the first at 10:23 . . . It took only 8 minutes the next afternoon to complete the box score.

This was the first suspension at Memorial Stadium since July 31, '78 (vs. Milwaukee) and the 14th in O's history (all in Baltimore) for one reason or other (mostly curfews).

SLUGFEST I: The regular game on Sun., June 21, won by Detroit 9-3, was a record setter for the Bengals. Their 12 extra-base hits (7 doubles, 5 homers) were the most ever in one game by an O's opponent . . . A total of 7 homers were hit in the game, one shy of the Memorial Stadium mark.

SLUGFEST II: Bill Madlock hit 3 homers on Sunday, June 28, and John Grubb, Matt Nokes & Madlock homered in succession in the 9th inning to tie the game, won in the 11th on Alan Trammell's "sudden death" safety. Victim of the 3 straight homers was Tom Niedenfuer, who had retired all 7 Tigers he faced the day before while earning the win in late relief.

TIGERS BATTING: Darrell Evans, Nokes & Madlock each hit 5 home runs vs. the O's and Kirk Gibson hit 4 . . . Evans also batted .370 (46-17) and walked 8 times. His on-base pct. was .455 (55-25) . . . Alan Trammell batted .333 (60-20), and drove in 10 runs including 3 gwrbi.

Larry Herndon, an Orioles nemesis since he came into the league, has a .337 career average against the Birds (202-68) . . . Gibson has hit 10 homers and driven in 28 runs over the last 2 seasons vs. Baltimore in only 22 games. His 19 rbi in '86 were the most against the O's since the league went to balanced scheduling (starting '79) . . . Gary Pettis over the last 2 years has had his problems offensively, but not with the O's against whom he's batted .333 (60-20) in that time.

TIGERS PITCHING: Walt Terrell was 3-1 vs. the O's last year and is 5-1 in 2 A.L. seasons (3-0 at Tiger Stadium) . . . Jack Morris, 2-1 in '87, is 10-9 lifetime though only 5-7 over the last 6 seasons.

Frank Tanana was 1-1 and is now 17-12 lifetime. He is tied for 2nd with Tommy John (17-17) in career wins vs. Baltimore among actives, one behind Bert Blyleven (18-12) . . . Over the last 2 years he has held O's batters to a .160 average (106-17) while compiling a 1.19 era (ip-30.1, er-4).

Doyle Alexander's only appearance vs. the O's was a complete game 6-hit shutout on Sep. 9 in Baltimore . . . Eric King has been a mystery to Orioles batters during his 2 A.L. seasons . . . In 9 appearances he is 3-0 with 2 saves, has fanned 38 in 41 innings and has held the Birds to a .110 average (136-15) while compiling a 1.32 era (IP-41, ER-6).

VS. DETROIT (Cont.)

ORIOLES BATTING: Eddie Murray has hit only .205 (195-40) over the last years against the Tigers, including .231 (52-12) last year . . . He has not his home run vs. the Bengals in over 2 years (29 games) since Sep. 16, 185 Detroit off Aurelio Lopez). The Tigers are the only club that did not yield home run to Murray in '87 . . . His lifetime .240 average (562-135) is his lowest vs. one club.

Despite the home run drought against the Bengals, **Murray's** 17 homes at Tiger Stadium represent the most he's hit in one ballpark on the road, at **Eddie's** 27 long balls overall against Detroit are only 3 off his high vs. one opponent (30, Chicago).

Fred Lynn, who batted .375 (32-12) with a club high 3 homers and 8th last year, has a .318 career average (513-163) with 25 homers and 101th He has driven in 56 runs in 70 lifetime games at Tiger Stadium.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Nobody won more than one game while both Ken Dixon and Mike Boddicker were 0-2 . . . Mike is 2-8 lifetime . . . John Habyan was 1-0 in 3 appearances (one start), had a 1.53 era (ip-17.2, erg) and held Tiger batters to a .197 average (66-13).

Scott McGregor (0-0 vs. Detroit in '87) has beaten the Tigers only one since Sep. 18, '80. That was on Oct. 4, '85... He has lost 8 of his last decisions to the Tigers and is 3-10 since winning 10 of his first 11 lifeting decisions against them. At 13-11, he is both the biggest winner and loser is

Don Aase didn't face Detroit in '87 but the year before he owned the only win over the Tigers. Despite the 3 straight home runs in Detroit on June 28, **Niedenfuer** was 1-0 with 2 saves in 6 appearances and held the Tigers to a .172 average (29-5).

VS. KANSAS CITY ('87: 9-3, Lifetime: 125-95) . . . The Orioles won the season series for the first time since '83 . . . They turned in their best record vs. the Royals since going 11-1 and 12-0 against them in '69 & '70 respectively.

The O's won 8 straight from the Royals from May 4 thru July 25. During the O's 11-game win streak that extended from July 12 thru July 25 they beat KC 7 times.

When the Orioles finished last (7th) in '86, it left the KC Royals as the only major league club that has never finished in the cellar.

19 YEAR RIVALRY: The O's hold a 30-game edge in the rivalry that began in '69 and are 71-40 (.640) at Memorial Stadium . . . That winning balance was constructed primarily in '69 & '70 when the O's defeated the fledgling Royals 23 times in 24 tries. The Royals downed the O's in the first game ever between the 2 clubs on May 9, '69 when **Dick Drago** defeated **Dick Hall** in Baltimore, then the Birds reeled off a major league record 23 straight wins.

Since that winning streak ended, the O's are 102-94 . . . In the 80s the Birds are 49-43 vs. KC.

AT ROYALS STADIUM: The O's are 18-12 in the last 5 years and 37-48 (.435) lifetime on the KC carpet since Royals Stadium opened in '73. That is the O's worst record, percentage wise, at any of the 13 ballparks on the road (worse than 17-21, .447, at HHH, and 130-158, .451 at Fenway).

The 4-game sweep engineered by the Orioles at KC July 16 thru 19 was their first ever at the Truman Complex . . . They had won a 3-game set there in 74.

The attendance for the O's 4-game series at KC July 16–19 was the biggest for a home series in Royals history (154,094) . . . Ironically, the previous record (141,112) for a series of 4 games in '82 (7/29–8/1) was also set when the Orioles were in town.

The last 8 games of the season series, 4 in each city, played to a total of 295,266, an average of 36,608.

ROYALS BATTING: Rookie **Kevin Seitzer** was the Royals' most productive hitter against the O's in '87 . . . He batted .356 (45-16) and led the club in homers (3) and rbi (8) . . . **George Brett** batted .366 (51-15) and boosted his lifetime average against the Orioles to .321 (552-177).

Willie Wilson hit .341 (44-15) and, over the past 3 years, has raked Baltimore pitching at a .353 clip (150-53) . . . Lifetime he's hitting .305

(406-124) against the O's . . . He has also stolen 38 bases in 45 attempts (.844) . . **Bo Jackson** hit .219 (32-7) and struck out 17 times (high among all O's opponents).

ROYALS PITCHING: It was Charlie Leibrandt who simultaneously stopped the O's 11-game winning streak vs. the A.L. and their 8-game skein against the Royals on July 26 at Baltimore . . . He threw a 2-hit shutout to beat Ken

Danny Jackson was 0-3 in 3 starts and is now 4-5 lifetime. Bret Saberhagen was 0-2, which puts his career record against the O's at 2-4. In 87 the O's hit .317 (60-19) as a team against him . . . Dan Quisenberry is 3-3 with 15 saves and a 2.25 era (ip-64, er-16) vs. the Birds.

ORIOLES BATTING: Cal Ripken led the Orioles regulars in the season series with a .333 (45-15) average and 10 rbi including 3 game-winners . . . Terry Kennedy (.314, 35-11), Ray Knight (.324, 37-12), and Lee Lacy (.316, 19-6) also hit .300 against the Royals.

Bill Ripken recorded his 1st major league hit on July 16 at Royals Stadium, a double (against Leibrandt) off the left center field wall that was only a foot from being his 1st home run as well . . . Three days later, also at KC, Bill hit his 1st home run in the majors, a 3-run shot off Bud Black. It was also his 1st homer of the year. He hadn't hit any for Rochester.

ORIOLES PITCHING: The O's staff fashloned a 2.93 era against the Royals, easily their best vs. one club. Eric Bell (2-0, 1.80, ip-20, er-4), Mike Boddicker (2-0, 2.86, ip-22, er-7), and Dave Schmidt (2-1, 2.08, ip-17.1, er-4) all excelled as starters, and Bell fanned 21 Royals in his 20 innings . . . Boddicker, 6-4 lifetime, held the Royals to a .195 (77-15) average.

Tom Niedenfuer was 1-0 with 3 saves in 4 relief appearances with an 0.00 era. He got a lot done in a short time, having worked a total of only 3 innings vs. K.C. . **Don Aase,** who appeared in only one game against the Royals last year without a decision or save, is 7-0 lifetime with 5 saves and a 2.47 era (ip-83.2, er-23).

Scott McGregor, who did not pitch against the Royals in 87, is the biggest lifetime winner & loser among current Orioles (9-10).

VS. MILWAUKEE ('87: 2-11, Lifetime: 161-101) . . . The O's lost the first 9 games of the season series, extending their loss streak vs. the Brewers to 10 straight. The string was snapped on Aug. 13 when **Fred Lynn's** grand slam off **Chris Bosio** at Baltimore propelled the O's to a 5-4 victory . . The winning pitcher was **Mike Boddicker**, with a save from **Tom Niedenfuer** . . All of this, despite a club record tying 15 strikeouts by Orioles hitters (**Bosio** had 12 k's by himself).

The O's still have a losing skein intact at County Stadium, where they have dropped 7 in a row (starting 9/28/86) and 9 of 10 (beginning 9/25/86) ... The Birds' lifetime record in Milwaukee has declined to a still presentable 77-55 (.583).

In Baltimore last year, the Birds went 2-5 against the Brewers but are still 85-45 (.654) at home lifetime. It's the O's best record vs. one opponent at Memorial Stadium.

Overall vs. the Brewers, the Orioles have gone 3-15 (beginning 9/21/86).

The Brewers were 16-1 on Apr. 26 right after beating the O's for the 6th time in as many '87 attempts... Despite losing 5 of 7 games in Baltimore last year, the O's are 26-11 (.703) against Milwaukee at Memorial Stadium starting Oct. 1, '82.

NO-HITTER: Juan Nieves' no-hitter in Balmer on Apr. 15 was the first ever by a Brewer, and the first by an opponent in Baltimore (both of the previous 2 by Angels' **Bo Belinsky** and **Nolan Ryan** were thrown on the West Coast). . . . It was the 5th no-hitter hurled at Memorial Stadium (all 4 of the O's no-hitters have been pitched in Baltimore). . . **Nieves** threw 128 pitches, walked 5 and fanned 7 (see more on **Nieves** below under "Brewers Pitching").

BREWERS BATTING: The Brewers out-hit the O's .292 to .233, outscored them 81 to 44 and out-homered them 19 to 9, even though the Birds had a 211-163 home run edge during the season.

Paul Molitor terrorized the O's just as he did everyone else . . . He batted .393 (56-22) in the season series, compiled a .443 on-base pct (61-27), had 9 extra-base hits (2bh-6, hr-3), drove in 10 runs and scored 12 in 13 games while stealing 4 bases in 5 attempts.

VS. MILWAUKEE (Cont.)

Other regulars who hit .300 or better against the O's were Glm Braggs—.300 (50-15), Bill Schroeder—.321 (28-9), B.J. Surhoff—30 (23-7) and Dale Sveum—.313 (48-15) ... Robin Yount led in rbi with 11 BREWERS PITCHING: Nieves was 2-0 in 3 starts with a 2.57 (ip-21, er-6) at 21 strikeouts in 21 innings ... Lifetime he is 3-0 at Memorial Stadium and the an 0.84 era to boot (ip-32.1, er-3) ... Ted Higuera was 2-1, completed at starts, fanned 23 in 26 innings and had a 2.42 earned run average ... He 3-3 lifetime. Dan Plesac made 4 relief appearances and picked up 3 sate ... The O's hit .148 (27-4) vs. Plesac, .192 (78-15) off Nieves and 20 (94-19) against Higuera.

Bill Wegman is 19-23 lifetime in the majors, but 4-1 against the O's.

ORIOLES BATTING: Bill Ripken led Orioles regulars with a .419 (31-13) average against the Brewers . . . He went 7-for-14 at County Stadium ...

Brother Cal batted only .229 (48-11), but led in rbi (9).

Eddie Murray hit only .240 (50-12) and was held to one home run and rbi. Still, his 28 lifetime homers vs. Milwaukee are 2nd only to the 30 he's hit only by 103 vs. Angels and 96 against Indians . . . Jim Dwyer is batting .313 (128-40) against the Brewers.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Mike Boddicker (1-0) was the only Oriole, other than Mike Flanagan, to beat Milwaukee in '87... Boddicker is 7-3 lifetime is the Brewers with a 2.79 era (ip-87, er-27), and is 6-1 against them a Memorial Stadium.

Eric Bell, Ken Dixon and Scott McGregor were all 0-2 and Flanagan was 1-2 . . . Don Aase who pitched only 1/3 inning vs. the Brewers in 87 has not allowed them a run in 5 appearances as an Oriole and has 4 saves to show for his effort. John Habyan had no decisions or saves, but in 2 releit efforts, he held the Brewers to an .080 average (25-2).

VS. MINNESOTA ('87: 5-7, Lifetime: 200-162 vs. Min. only) . . . The O's lost the season series for only the 2nd time in the last 11 years . . . In that period starting in '77, the O's have won 7, lost 2 and tied 2.

The O's scored only 22 runs in 6 games while going 2-4 at HHH. The opponent.

Near No-No: Eric Bell had a no-hitter going thru 8 innings at the Metrodome on May 5. Then all hell broke loose, and Bell, instead of registering the Orioles' 5th no-hitter, became the 9th Baltimore hurler to watch his no-hitter expire in the 9th inning. It was the 3rd time a Twin had played the role of spoiler (Cesar Tovar did it twice in '69, to Dave McNally and to Mike Cuellar)... See Bell's biog for list of other near no-no's.

With the O's leading 5-0 and none out in the 9th, **Greg Gagne** reached on a **Cal Ripken** error, then **Tom Nieto** blooped a single to left to spoil the no-hitter. **Bell** retired **Dan Gladden**, but **Steve Lombardozzi** singled to drive in Minny's first run and that ended the evening for **Bell**.

Four pitchers followed him to the mound. **Kirby Puckett** hit a 3-run homer, but with the tying and winning runs in scoring position, **Ken Dixon** finally retired **Roy Smalley**, the 10th Twin to bat in the inning, on a foul pop fly, preserving a 5-4 victory for **Bell**.

TWINS BATTING: Lombardozzi was the Twins top-hitting regular in the season series at .289 (38-11) . . . Puckett hit only .213 (47-10) but led the Twins in rbi (10 in 11 games) He is batting .306 (170-52) against the Orioles . . . Kent Hrbek has battled only .213 (80-17) vs. Baltimore the past 2 years.

Tom Brunansky had a bitter-sweet season series vs. the O's . . . At Baltimore, he hit .450 (20-9) with 9 rbi & 2 home runs in 6 games . . . At the Dome, he was 1-for-19 (.053) with no homers or rbi.

TWINS PITCHING: Bert Blyleven was 2-1 in 4 starts despite an era that was the highest among all pitchers who worked 18 or more innings vs. the O's in '87 (5.74 era, ip-31.1, er-20) and 8 home runs . . . At 18-12, Blyleven is the biggest winner lifetime against the O's among active pitchers . . . Frank Tanana (17-12) and Tommy John (17-17) are close behind.

Rookie **Les Straker** (1.26 era, ip-14.1, er-2) and **Frank Viola** (2.70 era, ip-23.1, er-7) were both 2-0 against the Birds . . . **Viola** is 6-5 lifetime . . . Relief

ace **Jeff Reardon** was 1-1 with 2 saves in 4 appearances, but endured a number of bone-chilling experiences along the way.

For example, on May 12 in Baltimore, **Reardon** came on in the 8th inning with the Twins up 7·3 and the bases loaded, and gave up a game-tying slam to **Fred Lynn**. An inning later he yielded another gopher, a game-ending 3-run shot to pinch-hitter **Larry Sheets**... On July 3, he had a 2-run lead with 2 out in 9th when **Sheets** singled home the tying runs... **Reardon** eventually won that one, however, on a **Lombardozzi** single in the bottom of the 11th

ORIOLES BATTING: Fred Lynn has done some beastly things to Twins pitchers over the years. His .327 average (490-160), 35 home runs and 118 rbi in 135 games are all career highs . . . In his last 34 games against Minny, Lynn has hit 14 homers and driven in 40 runs.

In Baltimore, **Lynn** has played 14 games against the Twins and accumulated 8 homers plus 24 rbi. In '87 he drove in 11 runs at Memorial Stadium in 4 games vs. Minnesota, including 6 on July 10 . . . In that game he hit 2 three-run homers (both off **Bert Blyleven**), each of which tied the game (O's ultimately won on **Sheets'** sf in 9th). Three of his 4 '87 homers off Twins pitching tied the game . . In one '85 weekend in Baltimore (May 10-11-12), he hit 9th inning home runs in 3 straight games vs. Minny, 2 of them "sudden death" game-winners.

In '87, **Lynn** hit .310 (29-9) with 4 homers and 12 rbi in only 8 games. He and **Eddie Murray** combined for 9 home runs vs. the world champions. Among those who had tough sledding vs. the Twins were **Ken Gerhart** (.088, 34-3) and **Terry Kennedy** (.147, 34-5).

For the first time ever, **Cal Ripken** failed to hit .300 against Minnesota ('82—.326, '83—.367, '84—.313, '85—.340, '86—.450). In '87 he batted .261 (46-12) with 2 homers and 5 rbi.

Cal has had 3 five-hit games in his career, 2 of them vs. the Twins at the Dome (Sep. 3, '83 & May 5, '85) . . . In the former game, he tied or broke 4 club records in a 13-0 Orioles rout, among them most total bases, game (13, tied). Lifetime, "Rip" has driven in 30 runs in 36 games at the "Hump" (and 53 in 72 career games overall).

Eddie Murray batted .348 (46-16) with 5 homers & 10 rbi in '87 . . . Lifetime, he's hitting .314 (456-143) . . . Larry Sheets, a .319 career hitter vs. the Twins (72-23), batted .355 (31-11) against them last year and won 2 games instantly with 9th inning heroics in Baltimore: on May 12-a home run off Reardon and on July 10-a sac fly against Juan Berenguer.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Bell won his near no-hitter but lost his 2 other starts. Nonetheless, he held Minnesota to a .181 average (83-15) . . . Dave Schmidt pitched a 2-hit shutout on July 12 at the expense of Joe Niekro, fanned 7 and walked none.

Tom Niedenfuer was 0-2 with no saves in 3 appearances. Both losses were in "sudden death" on the same weekend (July 3-Lombardozzi, 1bh; July 5-Hrbek, hr) . . . Scott McGregor, who was 1-1 in '87, is 12-8 lifetime. Ken Dixon went 4-0 with a save over the last 2 years against Minnesota while holding the Twins to a .191 average (89-17).

Don Aase didn't pitch against Minnesota in '87, but in '86 he earned 6 saves in 6 appearances and did not allow a run in 11 innings while holding the Twins to an .086 (35-3) average . . . Lifetime, he is 7-2 with 7 saves, and despite not facing Minny in '87, has still saved 7 of the O's last 14 wins against the Twins.

VS. NEW YORK ('87: 3-10, Lifetime: 291-291) . . . The O's lost the season series to the Yankees for the 5th straight year (starting '83) . . . Over that period, the Birds are 20-45 overall against New York (.308) . . . Starting June 23, '84, their record vs. the Bombers is 11-36 (.234). In Baltimore, beginning Sep. 15, '84, the Orioles have gone 4-17 (.190), including 2-4 in '87.

The O's lost the first 6 games vs. the Yankees last season, stretching their losing streak to 9 in a row against them . . . That skid was snapped by **Dave Schmidt** on June 24 when he beat **Ron Guidry** with a 94-pitch, 3-hit shutout. It was the O's first complete game at home all year.

LIFETIME: Despite the recent setbacks in their relationship, the O's still boast the best lifetime record in the A.L. against the Yankees (291-291). The closest runners-up are the Milwaukee (only) Brewers at 122-132 (.480) and the Detroit Tigers (802-836, .475).

VS. NEW YORK (Cont.)

The O's had a lifetime losing record vs. New York thru their first 13 seasons in the A.L., from 1954 until Sep. '70 when the Birds caught up (\$6) 3, '70 after **Jim Palmer** downed **Mel Stottlemyre**) and went ahead (**Me Cuellar** blanked **Steve Kline** 1-0 on Sep. 9, '70).

The Birds have been below .500 only once against the Bombers over the last 17 seasons since then, and that was for only one day (Oct. 3, '87) below tying it up again on the final day of the season.

Over the years, the O's have gone as far as 26 over .500. That milestone was reached on June 21, '83 (272-246) . . . The O's generally dominated the rivalry over a 19-year period from 1964 thru 1982, particularly in the seasons from 1965 thru 1968 during which they were 54-18 (.750) vs. New York, including 30-8 at Yankee Stadium.

In the early days the Yankees built up a huge surplus in wins for example, the O's were 8-36 (.182) after the first 2 years in the league ('54-'55) and only moderately better at 34-76 (.309) thru the first 5 seasors ('54 thru '58).

AT YANKEE STADIUM: Last year the O's were a paltry 1-6 in the Bronx (they are 5-15 there the past 3 years, and 7-19 the last 4), but still have the best lifetime record, among all visiting clubs, 129-145 (.471), in the "House that Ruth Built." The Oakland (only) A's (47-66, .416, regular season only) rank 2nd and the Tigers are 3rd (251-359, .411).

The O's who once went 30-8 at old Yankee Stadium from '65 thru '68 including 10-1 in '65, are 38-45 in the refurbished ballpark since it reopened in '76 (12 seasons). They were 91-100 in the original stadium, and 9-9 in Shea ('74--'75) during the reconstruction.

YANKEES BATTING: Don Mattingly appeared in only 6 games vs. the 0's and batted .333 (24-8), but his .307 (215-66) career average against Baltimore is far shy of his overall lifetime mark of .331 (2792-923).

Rickey Henderson played in only 3 games vs. Baltimore in '87 (200, 10-2, hr-1, rbi-2, sb-2, cs-0), but his impact on the O's lifetime has been as the following figures will attest: avg—347 (346-120), on-base pct.—457 (418-191, including 71 career walks), steals—63, caught—10, success ratio-86%.

In '85 alone, **Henderson's** numbers vs. the O's were legendary: avg. .460 (50-23), on-base pct.—.556 (63-35) and stolen bases—17 in 18 attempts . . **Dave Winfield** hit .327 (49-16) in 13 games last year with 4 homers and 10 rbi . . Lifetime, he is batting .287 lifetime (348-100), Newcomer **Don Slaught** has a .333 (150-50) career average vs. Baltimore.

YANKEES PITCHING: Tommy John, Dennis Rasmussen and Rick Rhoden each went 2-0 vs. the O's . . . John (17-17) and Frank Tanana (17-12) are 2nd among active pitchers in career wins vs. the O's . . . Bert Blyleven (18-12) is the biggest winner while John is the biggest loser . . Rasmussen, now with Cincinnati, went 4-0 vs. the O's these past 2 seasons . . Last year, the O's batted only .170 (42-6) against him.

Pat Clements and Dave Righetti combined for 7 saves in 9 appearances... Clements was 0-1 but saved 4 wins in 6 outings (top save total vs. O's) while Righetti had 3 saves in 3 tries... Righetti, over the last 2 years, has been involved in 10 of the Yankees 18 wins against the Birds (w-1, appearances.

Ron Guidry was 0-1 in his lone appearance (a start) . . . He is 0-2 the past 2 seasons and over that stretch the O's have batted .375 (48-18) against him his career . . . He started by going 5-1, then went 0-5, and 5-1 again until losing his last 2 decisions to the Birds.

Richard Dotson, 0-1 vs. the O's last year, has dropped 7 of his last 9 decisions to them (including '83 ALCS in which he was 0-1) . . . Regular season only, he's 7-8 lifetime.

ORIOLES BATTING: Eddie Murray was the O's leading regular in the season series at .348 (46-16), but a trio of rookies also stood out in limited exposure vs. the Bombers: **Pete Stanicek**—.364 (22-8), **Rene Gonzales**—.353 (17-6), and **Carl Nichols**—.600 (10-6).

The Orioles veteran with the highest lifetime average vs. New York is **Fred Lynn** (.281, 442-124) . . . **Murray** has a .275 (528-145) lifetime figure.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Tom **Niedenfuer** enjoyed some success vs. the Yankees with 2 saves in 3 appearances... **Mike Boddicker** was 0-2 despite a 2.70 era (ip-23.1, er-7) and 2 complete games in 3 starts... The Yankees hit only .160 (81-13) against him ... His career record is 7-6.

Scott McGregor, 7-15 lifetime, was 0-1 and has now lost 10 of his last 11 decisions to them since beating Righetti on Sep. 6, '82 . . . His last victory was at Guidry's expense on June 6, '86 . . . Five of his 7 wins over the Yankees have been shutouts . . .

Dave Schmidt's only appearance vs. New York in '87 was the above-mentioned 3-hit shutout on June 24 . . . When he left the O's, Mike Flanagan took with him a string of 6 wins in his last 7 decisions against the Yankees. He did not face them in an Orioles uniform in '87.

Don Aase didn't pitch against the Yankees last year, but in '86 he saved 4 and was 0-0 in 7 appearances... Despite his inactivity in the '87 season series, he has still saved 5 of the O's last 9 wins over 3 years against New York... His 10 career saves at the Bombers' expense are a career high.

VS. DAKLAND ('87: 7-5, Lifetime: 137-105) . . . The O's have lost only one season series in the last 11 years vs. Oakland ('86, 5-7) . . . They are 9-1-1 in that time

On their first '87 trip, the O's swept a 4-game series at Oakland (May 22-25) for the first time ever . . . It helped dim the memory of the Birds' last '86 junket to the East Bay Area when they lost 5 times in a 6-game series (8/28–31), including 4 games in one 2-day span.

The O's were 4-2 in Oakland in '87 and now hold a lifetime edge of 71-54 (.568) there.

The O's bullpen starred in the 4-game sweep . . . Ken Dixon earned 3 saves and Don Aase one . . . In the final game (May 25), Dixon led 4-3 in the 9th, but the bases were loaded and there was nobody out . . . He then fanned Jose Canseco, Mark McGwire and Luis Polonia in order to preserve the victory for starter Eric Bell. It was one of the most dramatic and positive moments of the season for the O's.

A'S FIRST GAME IN OAKLAND: The Orioles were the visiting club for the A's first game ever in Oakland on April 17, 1968 (after the franchise moved from KC following the 1967 season).

Dave McNally pitched a 2-hitter to beat Lew Krausse, 4-1. Boog Powell hit the first home run in the Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum while driving in the game winning run (both in the 2nd inning) . . . Mark Belanger, Brooks Robinson, and the A's Rick Monday also homered in that game before a paid audience of 47,233.

A'S BATTING: The A's outhit the O's, .289 to .251 . . . Rookie sensation Mark McGwire led the A's in the season series with 4 homers and 11 rbi in 12 games . . The leading hitter was Mike Davis (.400, 40-16), now with the Dodgers . . Alfredo Griffin, another who went to Los Angeles over the winter, batted .349 (43-15) in the season series, but set what is believed to be a record against the O's by being thrown out 6 times in 7 steal attempts.

Carney Lansford batted .360 (50-18), and during his 3 years in Oakland has hit .348 (135-47) against the Birds . . . Jose Canseco was limited to one home run and 3 rbi in the 12 games and fanned 12 times while batting .208 (48-10) vs. the O's . . . Newcomer Dave Henderson is the 3rd ranking hitter against the Orioles among active American Leaguers . . . His .35294 average (153-54) falls just behind Marty Barrett—.379 (195-74) and Wade Boggs—.35338 (266-94).

Reggie Jackson, who went 3-for-19 (.158) in 8 games vs. the O's with no homers and no rbi, ended with a .256 lifetime (723-185) average against the Birds with 114 rbi in 205 (regular season) games . . . He hit a total of 40 home runs (including 2 in the '71 ALCS) off Baltimore pitching, tying him with Al Kaline behind Harmon Killebrew (70) and Mickey Mantle (44) among the all-time leaders vs. the O's . . . However, after finding the range off Mike Boddicker at Anaheim on July 25, '83 with #40, he never hit another in his last 37 games against the Birds.

A'S PITCHING: Curt Young was 3-1 in the series in 4 starts. On the other hand, reliefer Dennis Eckersley was 0-2 as was Dave Stewart in 2 starts (despite holding the O's to a .185 average, 54-10) ... Stewart, who was 2-0 in '86, has a 1.59 era (ip-34, er-6) against the Orioles over the past 2 years to

go with a 2-2 record . . . Baltimorean **Moose Haas** was 0-1 and is 6-9 lifetime against the Birds, 2-4 in his hometown.

DRIOLES BATTING: Larry Sheets had 5 homers & 11 rbi in 11 games with batting .325 (40-13). **Jim Dwyer** hit .333 (27-9) and **Bill Ripken** 33 (7-for-20) . **Sheets'** .306 (108-33) career average against the A's is ahigh among current O's . . He has driven in 26 runs in 32 games lifetime is Oakland.

The A's, however, held **Cal Ripken** (.122, 49-6), **Fred Lynn** (.156, 328) and **Eddie Murray** (.205, 44-9) in check . . . **Cal's** .239 career average (301-72) against Oakland is his lowest vs. one opponent. Despite his \$\frac{1}{3}\$ lapse, **Murray** has a .296 career mark (452-134) vs. the Athletics.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Mike Boddicker went 3-1 in 4 starts vs. Oakland ands now 6-6 lifetime . . . Eric Bell was 1-2 in 3 starts . . . Scott McGregor didn have a decision vs. the A's in '87. And, it's probably a good thing because 4 appearances including 2 starts, the A's hit .471 (34-16) against him . . Scotty has won 8 straight from them since Rick Langford beat him on Aug 22, '81 . . . He is 6-0 lifetime against the A's at Baltimore, and 11-3 overall.

Mike Flanagan, who didn't pitch vs. Oakland in '87, took a 15-5 cares mark against the Athletics to Toronto (including 10-1 at Oakland).

VS. SEATTLE ('87: 4-8, Lifetime: 76-46) . . . The Mariners won a season series against the Orioles for the first time in their 11-year history . . . The 0's are 7-1 with 3 ties since the M's started in '77, but in the last 3 years, the Orioles are only 16-20 in games vs. Seattle (the 2 clubs were 6-6 in both '85 à '86).

The Orioles' .623 (76-46) lifetime percentage vs. the Mariners is their best against one opponent . . . The Mariners' sweep of the O's in Baltimore May 29-30-31 was their first ever of a series of 3 or more games duration . . . In that set they outscored the O's 27-8.

At Baltimore the Orioles are 39-22 lifetime (.639) against the Mariners despite going 1-5 in the 6 games in the Monumental City in '87.

The Mariners lost their first 14 games at Baltimore until ex-Oriole Mike Parrott decisioned Sammy Stewart on July 25, '79 . . . Since then the 0's edge at home is a modest 25-22 . . . At Seattle, Baltimore leads 37-24 (.607).

The Birds had one big day at the Mariners' expense . . . That was May 19 in the Dome when the O's routed Seattle 15-4 with a 19-hit attack (season record.

The beneficiary of all this was **Jeff Ballard**, who picked up his first big league win. The day before, **Mike Boddicker** pitched a 3-hit shutout ... Thereafter, the O's lost 8 of the last 10 to the M's.

Mike Morgan won't have the O's to kick around this year. After losing his first 8 lifetime decisions to the Birds, **Morgan** went 3-1 in his last 4 starts against the Birds, starting Sep. 6, '86 . . . In that stretch, which included 3 complete games, **Morgan** allowed only 6 earned runs in 34 innings (1.59 era).

The **Morgan** for **Ken Dixon** deal was only the 3rd between the 2 clubs in the M's 11-year history. The others: Dec. 7, '77—the inimitible outfielder **Carlos Lopez** and pitcher **Tommy Moore** came to the O's for pitcher **Mike Parrott**. And, on June 30, '83, the O's purchased the contract of infielder **Todd Cruz**.

MARINERS BATTING: The Mariners outscored the O's 75-55 in the 12 games, averaging 61/4 runs per game, and had a .300 team average (426-128), .300 in the Dome and .301 at Memorial Stadium. By contrast, the Orioles hit only .243 as a team in '87 vs. Seattle.

Eight of the 16 who batted against Baltimore pitching hit .300 or better ... Among them was **Dave Valle**, the #2 hitter in the league against the O's last year (25 or more at bats) at .474 (38-18), behind **Marty Barrett** (.529).

Ken Phelps hit only .227 (22-5) against the Birds, but 4 of his 5 hits were home runs . . . Over the past 2 years, 8 of his 15 safeties vs. Baltimore have gone out of the park . . . Phelps also drew 10 walks and his on-base percentage in the season series was a flashy .455 (33-15).

John Moses stole 7 bases (in 8 tries), most by an O's opponent, and he hit .342 (38-13) . . . **Harold Reynolds** stole 6 times vs. the Birds and was not thrown out . . . The now-departed **Phil Bradley** hit .347 (49-17) . . . His 17 hits included 10 for extra bases (2bh-6, 3bh-1, hr-3).

MARINERS PITCHING: Mark Langston was 3-1 to even his career record at 4-4 vs. Baltimore . . . In the last 2 seasons he is 4-3 against the Birds but his era is a lofty 6.55 (ip-43, er-32).

Mike Moore won his only start against the Birds and is now 7-7 lifetime
... Over the last 3 years, he is 6-2 and has held the O's to a .218 (252-55)

ORIOLES BATTING: Larry Sheets .326 (95-31) career average against the M's is his highest vs. one club ... Eddie Murray is batting .307 (450-139) lifetime vs. Seattle. Bill Ripken batted .375 (24-9) last year, but brother Cal hit only .163 (49-8).

Fred Lynn has hit 11 homers in the Dome, most by any current Oriole

Eddie Murray and Cal Ripken have each hit 7 there.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Mike Boddicker's only effort vs. Seattle was a 3-hit shutout (May 18) . . . He is 6-2 lifetime and his 2.05 (ip-66, er-15) era against the M's is his best vs. one opponent . . . **Jeff Ballard** earned his first big league win against the Mariners, but overall was 1-2 with a 9.45 era (ip-13.1, h-25, er-14) . . . Another rookie, **John Habyan**, went 0-2.

VS. TEXAS ('87: 7-5, Lifetime: 109-71, Texas only) . . . In the 16 years the Rangers have operated out of Texas, the O's have gone 10-3 in the season series with 3 ties . . . Over the last 6 years the O's hold a 49-23 (.681) advantage in games.

At Texas the O's hold a lifetime 60-31 (.659) edge, their best record in any foreign port.

O'S PASSED BALLS RECORDS PFFFT: The Rangers catching corps, captained by Geno Petralli, eliminated the Orioles from the passed balls section of the baseball record book . . . Back in '59 when knuckleballer Hoyt Wilhelm hurled for the O's (he won the A.L. era title that year), his backstops set the modern major league record for most passed balls season (49). That year, 3 O's catchers also tied the A.L. standard for most passed balls, inning (3; Gus Triandos, Joe Ginsberg and Charlie Lau).

Those records stood for nearly 28 years, until last season when the Rangers, featuring knuckleball pitcher **Charlie Hough**, were charged with an astounding 73 passed balls, and **Petralli** broke all previous modern individual barriers with 4 in one inning, 6 in one game and 35 in one season.

RANGERS BATTING: Ruben Sierra led the Rangers with 4 homers and 11 rbi in 12 games . . . Scott Fletcher was the top Texas hitter in the season series among regulars at .311 (45-14) and drove in 10 runs in 11 games . . . Oddibe McDowell, on the other hand, struggled for the third year in a row . . His lifetime average against the O's is only .178 (101-18).

RANGERS PITCHING: Bobby Witt went 2-0 in 2 starts, fanned 18 (and walked 12) in 13.1 innings and held O's hitters to a .180 average (50-9) . . . Witt tied a major league record on Aug. 2 by fanning 4 O's batters in one inning (Terry Kennedy reached after fanning on a Mike Stanley error) Paul Kilgus, conversely, was 0-2 with a 14.85 era (ip-6.2, er-11) and the O's batted .412 (34-14) against him.

Hough was 1-2 in 4 starts and fanned 29 in 32.2 innings (both highs by one pitcher vs. Baltimore in '87). Lifetime, he is 3-8 against the O's. At Memorial Stadium he is 0-4 in 6 starts with a 5.40 (ip-33.1, er-20)... On July 31 at Texas, Hough tied a Rangers record by yielding 4 homers in one game while dropping an 8-4 decision to John Habyan... Steve Howe made his 1st big league appearance in almost 2 years when he relieved in a game at Memorial Stadium on Aug. 7.

ORIOLES BATTING: Seven current Orioles are batting .296 or better against the Rangers (**Sheets, Dwyer, Knight, Lacy, C. Ripken, Lynn, Young**) . . . See page xx for more details . . . **Larry Sheets,** whose sac fly opening day in Baltimore gave the O's a 2-1 win over the Rangers, went on to bat .406 (32-13) vs. the Rangers with 6 home runs and 13 rbi in 10 games . . . He's batting .304 (69-21) vs. Texas lifetime.

Jim Dwyer has hit .444 (54-24) over the last 4 years vs. the Rangers . . . In that time, he's raised his career mark from .174 to its current .302 (100-32)

VS. SEATTLE (Cont.)

... Mike Young has driven in 25 runs in his last 23 games against the

Rip Jr., who has a lifetime .315 (286-90) average against Texas, is oned only 2 Orioles who have hit for the cycle in the 34-year history of the francise in Baltimore . . . He did it at Arlington Stadium on May 6, '84, homering of Dave Tobik on his final at bat. The other Oriole to cycle was Brook Robinson (in '60 at Chicago).

ORIOLES PITCHING: Mike Boddicker's perfect 7-0 record vs. the Ranges came to an end in '87 when he went 0-2 . . . **Don Aase,** in 3 Baltmore seasons, has allowed only 2 earned runs in 18 innings vs. the Rangers (1.0) era).

Ken Dixon was 3-0, fanned 21 in 19.2 innings and held the Rangers to a .192 average (73-14).

VS. TORONTO ('87: 1-12, Lifetime: 79-61) . . . The O's 1-12 record in the season series tied their worst ever . . . They were also 1-12 vs. the '85 Yankees, '86 Tigers & '87 Red Sox) . . . Though the Orioles won the series 85 in '86 (and captured 5 of the last 7), they are now 17-35 vs. the Jays starting Sep. 1, '83.

At home the Orioles were 1-6, and have gone 9-17 in Memorial Stadium the last 4 seasons against the Blue Jays. However, the O's still maintain a distinguished 45-26 (.634) slate on their home grounds since the rivalry began in '77 . . . In Toronto, where they were 0-6 in '87, the O's now have a losing lifetime record at 34-35.

Dave Schmidt, who later (June 24) snapped a 9-game loss streak vs the Yankees, broke the Jays 6-game string vs. the O's (the first 6 games of the season series) on June 14. He held Toronto to one earned run in 7.1 innings, winning 8-5, with a save from Luis DeLeon. After that the Jays won the final 6 games, so that skein is still intact at the start of '88. Schmidt's win also ended Toronto's club record 11-game win streak in the A.L.

THAT AWFUL GAME: Another in a long line of bizzare games between these 2 clubs was played at Toronto on Sep. 14 . . . The Jays won going away 18-3, after hitting a major league record 10 home runs (the 11 by both clubs tied a big league mark) on 21 hits (4th highest total ever vs. O's).

Their 57 total bases were the most ever by the Jays and most ever by anybody against the O's (they were 3 shy of the major league mark)... Toronto had 12 extra-base hits, tying the mark set by the Tigers earlier in the season (June 21 at Balmer). The Jays once had 11 extra-base hits in one game vs. the O's, also at Toronto (6/26/78—see below under "Other Awful Games..."

The home runs were hit by: Ernle Whitt—3, George Bell and Rance Mulliniks—2 each, Rob Ducey, Lloyd Moseby, and Fred McGriff, one each. Mike Hart (not the same one managing the Hagerstown Suns this year) hit the O's lone four-master.

It was also in that game that **Cal Jr.'s** consecutive innings string ended at 8,243 when his dad removed him in the bottom of the 8th. (see **Cal's** biog for more details).

OTHER AWFUL GAMES IN TORONTO: Among these were the "Earl Weaver Forfeit" on a wet and dreary Sep. 15, '77. The issue was, as Earl contended, whether the tarps in the left field bullpen, and the blocks that held them to the ground, constituting a potential hazzard to the leftfielder, should have been removed. The umpires, led by Marty Springstead, took the blocks away and rolled up one tarp but would not remove it from the bullpen; whereupon Weaver took his club off the field, never to return (until the following year).

On June 26, 1978 the Jays blasted the Orioles 24-10 (the most runs ever yielded by the O's) in a game that launched (and ended) the major league pitching careers of both **Ellie Hendricks** and **Larry Harlow.** The Jays lit up 6 pitchers for 24 hits including 11 for extra-bases . . . Another O's record was set that night for most runs scored by both clubs (34).

THE THREE PICKOFFS: Whenever Orioles fans grow morose over the sometimes humiliating history of their rivalry with the Blue Jays they think back to the legendary "3 pickoff game" on Aug. 24, '83. The O's were down 3-1 with 2 on and 2 down in the 9th when they suddenly tied the score on rbi singles by Benny Ayala and Al Bumbry to force the game into overtime.

Because of extensive offensive maneuvering in the bottom of the 9th, the O's took the field in the 10th with strangers at 3 positions. **John Lowenstein** was at 2nd base for the first time in 8 years, **Gary Roenicke** at 3rd base for the first time in the majors, and **Lenn Sakata** was catching for the first time since Little League.

Cliff Johnson led off the 10th with a home run off Tim Stoddard that put the Jays back on top . . . When Barry Bonnell followed with a single, Tippy Martnez came on and proceeded to get out of the inning without retiring a better.

First, he picked off **Bonnell**, then walked **Jesse Barfield** and picked him off, and finally after giving up a single to **Willie Upshaw**, he caught him leaning the wrong way as well . . . That game, incidentally, was voted by fans as one of the 5 most memorable in O's history in a vote initiated by the Babe Ruth Birthplace/Orioles Museum.

Cal Ripken opened the home 10th with a game-tying homer and 2 outs later with 2 on, the veteran backstop Sakata gave the O's a 7-4 "sudden death" win with a 3-run homer off Joey McLaughlin.

The next night the 2 clubs were scoreless until **Bonnell** homered in the 10th. However, the Birds bounced back again on singles by **Joe Nolan** and **Bumbry**, and a game-winning 2-run double by **Dan Ford** (off **Roy Lee Jackson**) to win again in "sudden death". **Tippy** was the winner in both.

At the time, the Jays were in the midst of losing 6 of 8 games overall, and all 6 losses developed in the 9th inning or later, effectively eliminating them from further pennant consideration. The O's, on the other hand, were in the process of going 34-10 (Aug. 13 to Sep. 25), a pace that would earn them an A I Fast title.

MIKE FLANAGAN, traded to the Jays on Aug. 31 for **Jose Mesa** and **Oswaldo Peraza**, is 17-7 lifetime vs. Toronto and has beaten them more than any other pitcher, active or retired. He has a 2.77 era (ip-208, er-64) against the Jays, and is 11-2 against them at Memorial Stadium.

Flanny opposed the O's at Toronto on Sep. 15 and pitched 8 shutout innings enroute to a, 6-2 win (his relief **Duane Ward** gave up both O's tallies). **BLUE JAYS BATTING:** The Jays out-hit the O's .299 to .245 and outscored them by a whopping 93 to 41... The two most explosive Blue Jays hitters were A.L. MVP **George Bell** and **Ernie Whitt**, each of whom hit 6 homers against the O's. **Bell** drove in 17 runs (4 of them gwrbi) and **Whitt** 12 (2 gwrbi). **Lloyd Moseby** chipped in with 13 rbi.

The top hitter was **Tony Fernandez** who batted .446 (56-25) with 10 extra-base hits (2b-6, 3b-2, hr-2) and 10 rbi ... Only **Marty Barrett** (.529) and **Dave Valle** (.474) hit for a higher average vs. the O's in '87 (25 or more at bats) ... **Kelly Gruber** hit .455 (22-10), **Nelson Liriano** .357 (28-10) and **Jesse Barfield** .333 (48-16) ... **Barfield** has a .324 career average against the Birds (216-70).

Juan Beniquez saw limited action (for both KC & Tor), but went 6-for-17 (.353) vs. Baltimore to boost his lifetime mark to .338 (388-131).

BLUE JAYS PITCHING: Toronto's 3.13 era against the O's was the best by an opponent . . . **Jim Clancy, Jimmy Key** and **John Cerutti** were each 2-0 and, though he beat them twice, **Mark Eichhorn** was the only Blue Jays pitcher to lose to the O's in '87 (June 14 at Balmer) . . Arnherst College alumnus **Cerutti** limited the O's to a .200 average (55-11).

Clancy, who hadn't been scored on in Baltimore for nearly 3 years, finally gave up a run after 27 consecutive scoreless Memorial Stadium innings. The streak began Aug. 4, '84 and ended June 12, '87.

Lifetime in Crab City, **Clancy** is 5-6 lifetime with 3 shutouts after an 0-5 start (he didn't win his 1st game in Baltimore until June 5, '83, beating **Storm Davis**). Overall, he is 11-11 with 11 complete games . . . He has pitched 11 shutouts in the big leagues, 4 of them vs. the O's.

Eichhorn in '86 held the O's to a .163 (43-7) average and an 0.71 era (ip-12.2, er-1) . . . Last year, the O's hit .412 (34-14) against him and his era was a none too spiffy 6.75 (ip-6.2, er-5) in 7 outings.

Dave Stieb appeared in only one game vs. the O's and pitched 7 impressive innings at Baltimore on Sep. 21, but left with the score at 1-1, and the Jays later won it for **Cerutti**. That kept **Stieb's** record intact. Memorial Stadium, where he is 0-4, remains the only ballpark in which he has never logged a victory. **Stieb**, who is 3-7 lifetime vs. the O's, hasn't had a decision against them since he beat **Jim Palmer** on Apr. 18, '84 at Toronto.

VS. TORONTO (Cont.)

Jimmy Key picked up his first wins as a starter vs. Baltimore and is not 2-5 in that capacity against Baltimore . . . Tom Henke in 6 appearances was 0-0 with 2 saves, fanned 10 and walked none in 6.1 innings.

ORIOLES BATTING: Jim Dwyer continued his consistent career performance vs. the Jays. He was 6-for-18 with 2 homers and now has a .313 (1665) lifetime average . . . His 10 home runs (7 at Toronto) and 31 rbi are but career highs vs. one opponent.

Eddie Murray was held to one homer and 2 rbi in 12 games Ripken Jr. was the top Oriole in both home runs and rbi with modest totals of 3 and 7 respectively.

The top average by a regular was Larry Sheets' .348 (46-16), thoughts had no homers & only 4 rbi . . . Sheets is batting .309 lifetime (997-30) Lee Lacy has a .315 (92-29) career mark and Murray is hitting .304 (473-144)x the Jays.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Mike Boddicker had a disastrous 0-4 record in 4 starts one shy of the club record (5) for most losses to one opponent, season shared by Don Larsen, Joe Coleman Sr., and Jim Wilson, all in the mid-50s. Boddicker had held George Bell to an .057 (35-2) lifetime average until Bell went 3-for-4 against him on Sep. 21 (now 5-for-39, .128) . . . Ken Dixon and John Habyan each went 0-2

Scott McGregor was 0-1 but has an impressive 13-7 lifetime record with a 2.86 era (ip-160.1, er-51), his lowest vs. one opponent lifetime saves vs. Toronto, both on the same night (Sep. 24, '77) at Exhibition He also has 2 Stadium . . . Dave Schmidt, the O's only winner against Toronto, was 1-0.

BIRDS' FIRST GAME IN BALTIMORE IN '54

The modern American League Orioles made their Baltimore debut in Memorial Stadium on Apr. 15, 1954 before a crowd of 46,354 including Vice President Richard M. Nixon who threw out the first ball. Behind the seven hit pitching of Bob Turley who fanned nine, the Orioles of Jimmy Dykes defeated Paul Richards' White Sox, 3-1, in Baltimore's first American League game in 52 years. Chico Carrasquel, the Chicago shortstop, was the first to bat in the new stadium and singled off Turley.

Clint Courtney won the distinction of hitting the first home run in the brand new stadium (built on the site of the previous municipally owned ballpark used by the International League O's). It was a bases empty blast off Virgil Trucks who also yielded a solo homer to Vern Stephens in the fourth and was the losing pitcher.

ALL-STAR GAME NOTES

1987: Both Cal Ripken Jr. and Terry Kennedy were in the A.L. starting lineup at Oakland in the 58th all-star game, and both players reached milestones. Ripken became the first A.L. shortstop to start 4 straight all-star games and only the 3rd ever (Ozzie Smith 5, '83-'87) and Marty Marion (4, '43-'47, no game in '45). Ripken and NY's Dave Winfield became the only 2 A.L. players to start the last 4 all-star games. Kennedy joined Ted Simmons as the only 2 catchers in baseball history to have started an all-star game for both leagues (Terry also started for the NL in '85). He became only the 2nd Oriole catcher ever to start (Gus Triandos started in '58 & '59).

With 1,511,103 votes, **Ripken** was 2nd in the A.L. voting behind Boston's **Wade Boggs** (1,529,819). **Ripken** had led in the voting up until the final week. He finished with 852,832 more votes than any other A.L. shortstop.

In the game, won by the National League, 2-0 in 13 innings, Ripken was 1-for-2 with a single and Kennedy was 0-for-2 with a strikeout, one of 17 in the game.

Elected Orioles Starters: Ripken joined Brooks Robinson as the only 2 Orioles to be elected to start 4 consecutive all-star games. Brooks was elected to the starting lineup '71 thru '74. Sixteen Orioles

have been elected to start in the 17 years of fan voting. In addition to Ripken and Brooks, Orioles who have been elected to starting positions are Boog Powell ('70,'71), Frank Robinson ('70,'7), Bobby Grich ('76), Ken Singleton ('81), Eddie Murray ('85) and Kennedy ('87).

Selection of the starting team was returned to the fans in '70 under the sponsorship of the Gillette Company in cooperation with Major League Baseball. Following the ballot box "stuffing" incident in Cincinnati in '57, responsibility was entrusted to major league players for 12 years ('58 thru '69). Last year, for the first time, USA Today began sponsorship of the fan balloting.

Orioles All-Star MVPs: Three Orioles have won "MVP" honors in all-star competition: Billy O'Dell ('58), Brooks Robinson ('66) and Frank Robinson ('71).

O'Dell, the former Orioles left-hander who also pitched for the Giants, Braves and Pirates, hurled the last three innings of the only all-star game ever played in Baltimore and retired all nine batters he faced to protect a one-run lead, thus giving the A.L. a 4-3 win.

Brooks won the '66 Arch Ward Memorial Trophy on the strength of a 3-for-4 effort at bat (including a triple) and an 8-for-8 performance afield. He was the first player from a losing team to be so honored.

Frank's fourth inning home run at Detroit in '71 put the A.L. on top to stay and earned him "mvp" honors. It was the first all-star victory since '62 for the A.L., which did not win another all-star game until '83.

ORIOLES POST-SEASON NOTES

ALCS: The O's hold many ALCS/LCS records including: Most LCS (7, in 19 year history of divisional play), Most LCS won (5), Most LCS games won (18). Their W-L percentage (.692, 18-8), is surpassed only by the Mets (.714, 10-4) and Red Sox (.700, 7-3).

The O's won the first 10 ALCS games they played (including the first 9 ever played) . . . They swept the Twins twice ('69-'70) and A's ('71) in the first 3 ALCS, then won game #1 against Oakland in '73 before losing the 2nd game that year . . . The Orioles are 9-4 at home and on the road.

WORLD SERIES: Baltimore has gone 3-3 in 6 WS, but has a .576 pct. in games (19-14) . . . The Birds are 10-7 at home and 9-7 on the road.

POST-SEASON TOTAL: In 59 post-season games, the O's are 37-22 (.627). They are 19-11 at home and 18-11 away.

ATTENDANCE: In 26 ALCS games, the O's have played to 1,020,384, an average of 39,246. They've played 13 of those at home and have drawn 548,443 (average 42,188).

In 33 WS games attendance has totaled 1,769,179 (average 53,611). At home for 17 WS dates the Birds have pulled 877,518 (average 51,619).

The Orioles 59 total post-season games have attracted 2,789,563 (average 47,281). At Memorial Stadium there have been 30 post-season events which have drawn a total of 1,425,961 (average 47,514).

The 3 biggest crowds to watch the O's in a WS were games 5,4, & 3 (67,064; 66,947 and 65,792) of '83, all at Philadelphia. The largest attendance for a WS game in Baltimore was 54,458 for game #4 (final game) vs. Dodgers in '66.

The biggest house for an Orioles LCS game was 52,787 for game #1 at Baltimore vs. the Angels in '79 (the "Tonight, Let it be Lowenstein" game).

ORIOLES WORLD SERIES SHARES BY YEAR

Since 1960 (the first year they qualified for a share), the O's have finished in the first division 21 times in 28 seasons, thereby qualifying in all but 7 years ('62, '67, '78, '84, '85, '86, '87) for a share of the WS pool (combined since '69 with the LCS). (Cont. on page 200.)

THE ORIOLES—PAST AND PRESENT

Major League Baseball returned to the City of Baltimore in 1954 after an absence of more than half a century.

The transfer of the St. Louis Browns to Baltimore represented the first inter-city shift of an American League club in 52 seasons. Ironically, it was Baltimore that had been victimized in the last previous move. The Orioles, a charter franchise in the new league in '01, moved to New York under shallowy circumstances after the 1902 season. There, they were re-named, list the "Highlanders", then later—gasp! —the "Yankees".

Some 34 seasons have elapsed since the Orioles set up shop on 33rd Street, and, for the last 31 of them, the Baltimore Club has maintained the best won-lost percentage in all of major league baseball (see page 20). This despite the losing efforts of the past 2 years.

During this span of just over 3 decades, the Orioles have finished first times, captured 6 American League pennants, and won 3 World Series They've also been runners-up 8 times, and have recorded 25 winning seasons, including, at one stretch, 18 in a row from 1968 thru 1985.²

IN THE BEGINNING

That winning tradition is not peculiar to the modern Orioles, however took root a long time ago. There are no fewer than 20 former Orioles playes in the Baseball Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, and 14 of them played here before 1954 (see page 94).

The history of professional baseball in Baltimore dates back 116 years to 1872, when the city was represented in the National Association, an important forerunner of today's major leagues.

Baltimore's baseball heritage was richly embellished in the formative years by:

- —A left-hander named Matt Kilroy, who won 46 games for the American Association O's in 1887:
- —Three straight National League pennant winners ('94, '95, '96), a team that would ultimately produce 6 Hall of Famers³;
- —The manager of that championship team, an innovative man named **Ned Hanlon**, who with the help of his talented athletes did much to shape the future of baseball strategy⁴;
- —Legendary all-time greats **Babe Ruth**, **Lefty Grove**, and **John McGraw** to name a few;
- —Jack Dunn, whose name has long been synonymous with baseball in Baltimore. An infielder and pitcher with the city's original A.L. franchise, Dunn subsequently owned and managed the International League Orioles for 22 eventful seasons from 1907 thru 1928.

Among his many achievements: signing **Ruth** to his first professional contract, and winning 7 straight pennants from 1919 thru 1925⁵. It was the **Dunn** family that kept professional baseball alive and well in Baltimore during most of those 51 years between big league franchises⁶;

—And, by a crowd of 52,833 that attended a Little World Series game at Municipal Stadium (on the same site as Memorial Stadium) between the Orioles and Louisville Colonels on Oct. 9, 1944. That same afternoon in St. Louis, the Cardinals and Browns played the decisive 6th game of the World Series before a crowd that was 20,203 smaller at Sportsman's Park (att 32,630).7

RETURN TO THE MAJORS

Officially the American League returned to Baltimore on Sep. 29, 1953. That was the day American League owners, meeting in New York, unanimously approved the purchase of a controlling interest in the St. Lous Browns from previous owner **Bill Veeck** by a group of Baltimore negotiators, led by Mayor **Tommy D'Alesandro Jr.** ("Old Tommy") and attorney **Clarence Miles**, who became the club's first president.

Unfortunately, only the name on the uniforms had changed. In 1954, the Orioles were merely the Browns transplanted. They were essentially the same team that had finished in the 2nd division for so many years in St. Louis (see "St. Louis Browns" below).⁸

The Birds, under the likable veteran manager **Jimmy Dykes**⁹, lost 100 games that season while winning only 54. But, as poor as that record was, it wasn't bad enough to finish last. Happily, that dubious honor belonged to the Philadelphia A's with a record of 51-103.

The Orioles' escape from the basement that year allowed them to maintain a notable distinction for 32 years. They had never finished last until the string finally ran out in 1986.

THE START OF SOMETHING BIG

The Orioles took the first big step in the right direction on Sep. 14, 1954 when they hired White Sox Manager **Paul Richards** to come aboard as both manager and general manager, succeeding **Dykes** and **Arthur Ehlers**¹⁰. **Richards**, a native of Waxahachie, Texas, and a catcher for the World Champion Detroit Tigers in '45, was a highly regarded strategist and a fine handler of pitchers. In Baltimore, he also became an aggressive administrator.

Not long after he arrived, **Richards** engineered a 17-player deal with the Yankees, probably the biggest in baseball history (see page 40 for details). The O's gave up **Bob Turley, Don Larsen,** shortstop **Bill Hunter** and 5 others. Among the 9 who came to Baltimore were two who proved to be very special: **Gus Triandos,** the Orioles' first legitimate long ball threat, and a slick fielding, crowd-pleasing shortstop named **Willy Miranda.** Those two helped keep the fans happy during those early years while the club struggled toward legitimacy.

In '55, Richards kept the revolving door well greased. A total of 54 players wore the black and orange that year, including 23 pitchers. While "Tall Paul" was wheeling and dealing at the major league player level, his farm department (Jim McLaughlin and Harry Dalton) was pursuing young amateur talent at a relentless pace all over the country.

Among those prospects was a kid from Little Rock, named **Brooks Robinson**, who would develop into the best fielding 3rd baseman of all-time, and would spend 23 seasons in an Orioles uniform before moving on to the Hall of Fame in Cooperstown.

Gradually, the Orioles began to improve. In 1957, Richards' 3rd season in Baltimore, the Birds finished at .500 (76-76) for the first time. In 1960, with a club comprising 10 regulars in their 20's, 7 of them rookies, the Birds nearly won their first pennant. ¹¹

Richards was particulary adept at reconstructing the careers of fading veterans 12 and developing young pitchers. During his reign, the Orioles became famous for the "Kiddie Korps", a passel of hard-throwing young-sters who pitched in Baltimore from the mid-50s to the early 60s 13.

THE NEXT STEP UP

In the fall of '58, the Orioles hired the Yankees' highly respected farm director **Lee MacPhail** as general manager, replacing **Richards**¹⁴ who nevertheless remained as field manager (until Sep. '61). **MacPhail** improved the fiscal and administrative efficiency of the operation and increased the productivity of the club's minor league system.

After the near miss of '60, the Orioles set a club record with 95 wins in '61 while **Diamond Jim Gentile**, acquired the year before from the Dodgers, gave Orioles fans an unprecedented show of power and production (46 home runs, including a major league record-tying 5 grand slams, and 141 and 50 production (46 home runs).

In '64, another near miss under the direction of "Manager of the Year" **Hank Bauer.** The Birds finished 3rd, but only 2 games back of the pennantwinning Yankees and produced their first American League MVP—**Brooks Pohinson**

MacPhail left the Orioles after the '65 season to join Baseball Commissioner William D. "Spike" Eckert as his principal advisor; but not before negotiating what was arguably the most important trade in the ballclub's history. It was the deal that brought National League superstar Frank Robinson from Cincinnati in exchange for the best pitcher the Orioles had ever had to that point, Milt Pappas¹⁶.

THE LAND OF PLEASANT LIVING

Just before **MacPhail** departed, **Jerry Hoffberger** and his family¹⁷ acquired a controlling interest in the franchise. The Hoffbergers owned the Baltimore-based National Brewing Company, and their highly successful advertising theme for many years was based on the concept that the Chesapeake Bay area was "The Land of Pleasant Living".

That was surely true for the Orioles who went on to enjoy a golden age of on-the-field prosperity. Over the next 6 seasons, the Orioles would win four pennants and in a period of 9 years would finish first six times. ¹⁸

Hoffberger brought Frank Cashen from the brewery to serve as executive vice president, and promoted the club's talented farm director, Harry Dalton, to run the baseball program.

In '66, the Orioles not only won their first pennant, under **Hank Bauer**, they shocked the baseball world by sweeping the heavily favored Dodgesh four straight. **Frank Robinson**, in his first A.L. season, won the Triple Crown (.316, 49 hr, 122 rbi), and was MVP of both the American League and he World Series.

It had taken a player of **Frank's** stature to put the O's over the top, but the club was already blessed with considerable talent; players like **Brooss Robinson** and **Luis Aparicio** who would later join Frank in the Hall of Fane long ball hitting 1st baseman **Boog Powell**, rookie 2nd baseman **Dave Johnson**, perennial gold glove centerfielder **Paul Blair**, and a couple of pitchers named **Jim Palmer** and **Dave McNally**, still the top 2 winners in Orioles history. All but **Frank** and **Aparicio** were products of the O's ferlie farm system.

The O's slumped badly in '67¹⁹ and were going nowhere in '68 at the Al-Star break when **Dalton** replaced **Bauer** with his longtime associate, **Earl Weaver.** The feisty 5'8" St. Louisan had enjoyed a remarkable career as a manager in the O's farm system. Over the next 141/2 years he would experence even greater success at the major league level.

Having added the ultimate leadoff man (**Don Buford**), and a talented lethanded pitcher (**Mike Cuellar**), and having replaced one gold glover for another at shortstop (**Mark Belanger** for **Aparicio**), the O's would reign over the American League for the next 3 years.

In '69, '70 & '71, they became only the 3rd club in history to win 100 or more games for three straight years²⁰. They won the division title by 19, 15, and 12 games, and swept the first 3 American League Championship Series, 3 games to none²¹, over the Twins twice and A's once.

Following a humiliating loss to the New York Mets in the '69 World Series, the O's bounced back in '70 and took the Cincinnati Reds in a 5 game series that that was thoroughly dominated by the brilliance of **Brooks Robinson**.

In '70, the O's had three 20-game winners (McNally, Palmer & Mike Cuellar); the next year they had 4 (add Pat Dobson), a feat that had occurred only once before in major league history²².

THAT OLD GANG OF MINE

After the Orioles lost a heartbreaking 7-game World Series to the Pirates in '71, **Dalton** left the ballclub to run the California Angels, and Executive VP **Cashen** added player personnel decisions to his responsibilities.

After their 4 pennants in 6 seasons, the O's began to perform some major surgery. **Frank Robinson** was traded and, a year later, so were **Dave Johnson**, **Buford** and others.

The '72 season was grim but with youngsters like **Bobby Grich**, **Don Baylor**, **Al Bumbry** and **Richie Coggins** joining forces with **Boog**, **Blait**, **Brooks**, and all those talented starters²³, the O's regained the division championship in '73, and defied the odds to win it again in '74.

On Aug. 28, '74, the O's were in 4th place, 8 games behind the first-place Red Sox. When the smoke had cleared 5 weeks later, the O's, who had gone 28-6 during that stretch, were on top of the heap, a shade ahead of the 2nd place Yankees, and a full 8 games up on the 3rd place Bosox.

THE PETERS PRINCIPLE

Cashen, who had acquired Ken Singleton, Mike Torrez and Lee May in a couple of glittering trades the previous winter, returned to the beer business after the '75 season²⁴. He was replaced by the widely respected & highly capable career baseball executive, Hank Peters, who had most recently served as president of the National Association (the minor leagues).

Not long after his arrival, **Peters** shook up the Orioles, trading for the flamboyant long-ball hitting **Reggie Jackson**²⁵. But of more long term significance was the 10-player deal he constructed with the Yankees in June '76. Three of the 5 players acquired in that deal contributed greatly to the Orioles many successes over the next decade: **Rick Dempsey, Tippy Martinez** and **Scott McGregor.**²⁶

The Orioles remained competitive well into the 80s despite serious losses from the new free agent re-entry system adopted in '76²⁷. Peters' Yankee deal, plus a fine farm system harvest in the early 70s which produced **Eddie**

Murray, Mike Flanagan and Rich Dauer among others, helped the cause immeasurably (from '76 thru '83, the O's won 2 golds and 5 silvers in 8 years).

THE BALTIMORE-WASHINGTON CONNECTION

In '79, right after the O's had lost a second 7-game World Series to the Pirates, the internationally renowned Washington attorney, **Edward Bennett Williams**, purchased the ballclub in its entirety.

Williams brought with him a new regional marketing concept designed to expand the Orioles appeal over a wider geographic area. The plan was to add metropolitan Washington and states to the south to a drawing area that had been basically limited to Maryland and parts of Pennsylvania and Delagraphics.

The program has met with popular acceptance by baseball fans all over "Birdland." Despite the Orioles' below-average performance on the field these past 4 seasons, attendance at Memorial Stadium has averaged over 2 million per year.

In the first four years of the **Williams-Peters** administration, the O's nearly captured 3 pennants though they had to settle for one. They won 100 games in '80 and finished 2nd, 3 games back of the Yankees; played the Brewers for the division championship on the final day of the '82 season and lost; then won it all in '83.

There were some remarkable achievements during that period. In '80, for example, there was a 5-game series against the Yankees in Baltimore that drew 249,605, the largest turnout in history for a single series.

Then, there was '82 when the O's went 33-10 (starting Aug. 10) down the stretch to tie the Brewers on the next-to-last day of the season by beating them in 3 straight pressure-packed games at Memorial Stadium. On the dimactic day, however, the Brewers won big, to clinch their first division championship.

Yet, despite that crushing defeat, most of the crowd of over 51,000 remained in their seats for a full 45 minutes afterward. They stayed to applaud the players for their down-to-the-wire effort and to say goodbye to the manager, **Earl Weaver**, whose retirement had officially begun at game's end

The emotion expressed so warmly and spontaneously by those loyal Orioles fans made it difficult to tell, in the dusk of that autumn afternoon, who had won the game and who had lost.

It was in '82 also that the son of the Orioles 3rd base coach, **Cal Ripken Jr.**, took his place in the Orioles starting lineup, a position he has not relinquished since—even for one game, and joined with **Eddie Murray**, who has since become the Orioles all-time home run champion, to form an awesome 1-2 punch.

3RD WORLD TITLE

Joe Altobelli, a veteran of many years in the Orioles organization before taking a 6-year sabbatical in '77, returned to manage the Birds to their 3rd world title in '83.

They won the division by 6 games, then beat the White Sox at Comiskey Park in game #4 on a dramatic 10th inning home run by the newest Oriole, **Tito Landrum**, that broke a scoreless tie²⁸.

Mike Boddicker was the playoff MVP for his 14-strikeout 4-0 win in game #2 after the O's had dropped the opener. The gritty right-hander repeated the process in the 2nd game of the World Series with a 3-hitter against the Phillies.²⁹

After splitting the first 2 games of the World Series in Baltimore against the Phillies, the action moved 90 miles north to Veteran's Stadium where the National League champions boasted the best home record in baseball. But, the Orioles swept the 3 games in Philadelphia, then cruised happily home down 195 with their 3rd world title in hand.

In the decisive 5th game, **Rick Dempsey** homered to clinch the World Series MVP award and **Eddie Murray** hit 2 electrifying home runs while **Scott McGregor** was blanking the Phillies on 5 hits.

The 1983 champions boasted 2 dominating players in **Murray** and **Ripken** and excellent pitching, but most observers credited the club's many "role" players with making the difference, for getting the most out of their abilities while submerging their own egos in the interest of winning.³⁰

CHANGES

Since that world championship season, the Orioles have experienced series of unaccustomed setbacks on the field. None of the problems to developed was caused by lack of effort, but the results the past 2 years at Edward Bennett Williams to make major personnel changes in his base ball operations

Earl Weaver, who had come out of retirement in mid-'85 to succeed Altobelli, was unable to right the ship, and a year and a half later Cal Ripken Sr., 30 years an Oriole, was appointed manager.

Then, at the end of last season, Williams replaced Hank Peters and Farm Director Tom Giordano with Roland Hemond and Doug Melvin. moved Frank Robinson from the field to an executive position, and made series of other moves to facilitate the Orioles' return to their customary conpetitiveness

POSTSCRIPT

Notwithstanding the adversity of recent seasons, there have been many encouraging highlights, the memories of which have kept Orioles' junkes happy during the long, cold off-season, and created optimism for the future.

Not the least of these, from an Orioles point of view, was the exciting spectacle of a father, Cal Ripken Sr., managing 2 of his very talented sors and watching both cavort about 2nd base as one of the rare brother comb nations at the keystone in major league history.31

FOOTNOTES

1—John McGraw, who had earlier starred for the N.L. Orioles in the 90s, was manager and part-owner of the A.L. O's until July of '02, when he departed abruptly for New York to manage he N.L. Glants. His right-hand man and business partner, Wilbert Robinson, took over the reigns to the balance of the season.

McGraw was an obvious villain in this piece. Not only did he sell his stock in the club to the one of the Giants, but he took several Orioles with him to New York (in mid-season, yet).

2—The Yankees are the only club that has ever produced a longer string of consecutive winning seasons-39, from '26 thru '64.

They were well known, as well, for their team play, place-hitting and aggressive base running. They had a reputation for playing despite injuries and their "never say die" attitude on the field... The expression "Old Oriole" is still widely used to describe a player with those qualities.

5—Hall of Famer Lefty Grove played for the O's during that period, as did many other future big leaguers... In the final year of that remarkable stretch, the Birds had a trio of pitchers—Tommy Thomas, George Earnshaw and Jack Ogden—who won, respectively, 32, 29 and 28 games.

6—His grandson, Jack Dunn III, carried on the family baseball tradition as a minor league player manager, and club owner, and then for 34 years as an executive for the major league Orioles before his untimely death last June at the age of 65.

7—Old Oriole Park, at 29th St. and Greenmount Ave., had been the Orioles' home for many year but it burned down on July 4th eve in '44. Municipal Stadium, a heretofore football-only facility was rapidly converted for baseball and it was there that the International League Orioles won what would be their last minor league pennant that very same year ('44). It remained the home of the Orioles unimajor league baseball returned to the city 10 years later, and the new ballpark was completed on the Municipal Stadium site.

8—Third Baseman Varn Stephens was the Orioles home run leader that year. He hit 8 and the whole team together produced only 52 all season (19 of them in what was then a cavernous Memors Stadium).

The brightest prospect was hard-throwing "Bullet Bob" Turley who went 14-15 under difficult circumstances and led the league in strikeouts. World Series hero-to-be Don Larsen was also on the team. He was 3-21

MEMORIAL STADIUM—A BRIEF HISTORY

Construction of Baltimore Memorial Stadium began on the site of old Municipal Stadium in 1949. A single deck concrete grandstand with no roof was completed in '50 with 20,000 chair seats', and home plate was moved from its original location (in what is now left field) to its present position. The stadium's external trappings were left unchanged. It was not yet a major league ballpark.

However, it was that facility which was officially dedicated and re-named "Memorial Stadium" when Mayor Tommy D'Alesandro Jr. ("Old Tommy") threw out the first ball for the International League Orioles '50 opener (Apr. 20).2

Soon after that dedication, plans to improve the stadium further, to satisfy major league requirements, were suspended when a second bond issue was defeated.

Finally in '53, bond loans were approved, and work began anew. Despite the construction, the I.L. Orioles continued to play there thru '53, as did the Baltimore Colts when they emigrated from Dallas (Texans) that same year.

Essentially the new stadium, seating capacity approximately 47,700, was completed in October '53, but refinements continued thru the spring of '54, the modern American League Orioles' first season in Baltimore. The cost of the project, built on 283/4 acres of city-owned property (and financed by 2 bond issues), was \$6 million.

Original Municipal Stadium

The original Municipal Stadium, completed in '24, was built expressly for football. However, when old Oriole Park (NW corner of Greenmount Ave. & 29th St. intersection), owned by the Dunn family, burned down on the night and early morning of July 3-4, '44, Municipal Stadium became, of neccesity, the new home of the Orioles.

During a hastily scheduled 2-week road trip, the stadium was made ready for baseball. Later that year, the Orioles went on to win the International League pennant, then captured the Little World Series. One of those games, against the Louisville Colonels (American Association), drew an astonishing 52,833 which remained a Baltimore baseball attendance record until the '66 World Series.3

Changing Dimensions

Thru the years, the playing field has undergone significant dimensional changes. Inside the cavernous ballpark that greeted Orioles fans on opening day '54, home plate to dead center field measured 450'.4

Since then the outfield boundaries have been altered 4 times ('56, '59, '62 & '76), gradually reducing the distance to straightaway center 45' to 405', and the power alleys accordingly.5

Stadium Improvements

Originally the Orioles' dugout was on the first base side, and there was an 8' wall separating the front row of the boxes from the field. Baltimore led the world in foul territory⁶. That situation was rectified in '61 with the construction of field box seats (2,600 of them), which necessitated building new dugouts It was then that the home team moved to the 3rd base side.

In '64, 4 additional upper deck sections were added, increasing the capacity by another 2,600. In '70 (mid-season), a new scoreboard (now known as the old scoreboard) was installed and the original, squirrel-infested structure demolished.

Subsequently, the splintery benches (without backs) that covered the entire second deck were replaced by chairs and metal benches with back rests, and a 35th row was added.

In '80, 6 new towers, housing a new ticket window and additional total office space, storage areas and rest rooms, were completed.

In '85, new, badly needed Orioles administrative offices were constructed, and a large new state-of-the-art video board (Diamond Vision by Mitsubishi) was added in right-center field as a dramatic and colorful comple ment to its 15-year-old cousin in left center.

1—The original structure had nothing but bench-type seats.

3—The 6th game of the '44 World Series (Browns vs. Cardinals) played that same day drew only 31,630 ... See "St. Louis Browns" below.

4—Left and right-center were 447' from home plate ... There was no "temporary" fence during the first 2 years, just the permanent walls plus a hedge (protected by a wire fence) that filled in the open end of the horseshoe.

In '55,0's centerfielder Chuck Diering immortalized himself by hauling in a Mickey Mantle blast with his back to the plate just before crashing into the hedge in deepest center field.

5—In '54 only 42 home runs were hit in 77 games at the stadium (a mere 19 by the O's), roughly one every 2 games ... During the O's 1st 7 seasons here (thru '60), the Baltimore ballpark ranked last in the majors in home runs each year.

During the last 33 seasons, the contraction of the outfield distances and greater emphass on the long ball have resulted in a 5-fold increase in home run production at Memorial Stadium (235 in 82 games last year, 2.87/game).

6— The bullipens were located within plain view in the left and right field corners (Detroit & Torontoare call that unch.)

THE ST. LOUIS BROWNS

The St. Louis Browns, the franchise from which the current Orioles descend, originated in Milwaukee in '01, the American League's first season. Before the '02 season began, the franchise had moved to St. Louis. It was after that same campaign that the original A.L. Orioles went to New York.1

The Browns, who took the name that originated with St. Louis teams in the late 1800s,² played 52 seasons ('02-'53) in St. Louis and were probably the most consistently bad club in major league history. They were 3,416 4,465, .4333 (that's more than 1,000 games under .500); wound up in the 2nd division (5th thru 8th) 40 times; won just one pennant ('44, a war year), and finished 2nd only twice ('02 & '22).

George Sisler, one of 12 Hall of Famers who played and/or managed for the Browns4, was almost certainly the club's all-time best (and most significant) player. He would do credit to any franchise. In 13 seasons with the Brownies ('15 thru '27), he twice hit over .400 ('20-.407, '22-.420) and had a career average of .340.

Another outstanding contributor was outfielder Ken Williams, not in the Hall of Fame, who hit over .300 nine times in 10 St. Louis seasons and in '22 batted .332 with 34 doubles, 39 homers and 155 rbi. He was the home run champion that year with 4 more than Babe Ruth, and was the first ever to join the so-called "30-30" club-30 or more steals and 30 or more homers in the

As you can see, '22 was a big year for both Sisler and Williams and the Browns set a club record for wins-93 (it was the only time in the history of the

franchise that their victory total reached the 90 level). They finished 2nd, one game back of the Yankees

Despite the heroics of Sisler and Williams, however, when fans recall the Browns, they probably think first of a couple of guys named Gray and

Pete Gray, who had only one arm (his left), appeared in 77 games for the Browns in '45 (the last wartime season) at the age of 28. He batted .213 (234-51) with no homers and 13 rbi, and never returned to the big time. 5

The appearance of Eddie Gaedel, at 3'7" and 65 pounds, was a product of club owner Bill Veeck's creative genius . . . The 26-year old midget was signed in '51 as a pinch hitter and, in his only plate appearance, he did what he was paid for, he drew a walk.

As a surprise pinch hitter for leadoff batter Frank Saucier in the home half of the 1st inning, little Eddie was walked on 4 pitches by Detroit pitcher Bob Cain, then promptly replaced by pinch runner Jim Delsing⁶

The '44 A.L. pennant winners went 89-65 to finish one game ahead of the Tigers. They lost the World Series in 6 games to their hometown rivals, the Cardinals, in one of 3 World Series, played entirely in one stadium7 (Sportsman's Park was the regular season home of both clubs). The Browns won games #1 and #3 behind Denny Galehouse and Jack Kramer respectively and the Browns' only home run in the series was hit by 1st baseman George

In June '51, Bill DeWitt, who had been with the Browns since '16 (when Branch Rickey was gm), and his brother, Charles, sold their controlling interest to Bill Veeck. He operated the club for the next 21/2 seasons. Twice in '53, Veeck attempted to bring the franchise to Baltimore himself, but could not get the necessary approval from American League owners . quently (Sep. 29, '53), he sold his holdings to a group of Baltimore businessmen and the transfer was approved unanimously.

The Browns are gone from St. Louis, but not forgotten. The St. Louis Browns Fan Club, organized by Maryville College Professor Bill Borst in 1984, is alive and well. The members have even established a club hall of fame on the campus at Maryville (in St. Louis).

1—They were the 1st and 2nd franchise moves in A.L. history . . . The next one occurred 52 years later when the Browns came east to Baltimore.

ORIOLES HALL OF FAME

The Orioles Hall of Fame was created in 1977 to honor those who have made exceptional contributions to the franchise since Baltimore returned to the major leagues in 1954. It now comprises 15 members, and, in all likelihood, another will be added when the votes from the annual late winter election are counted.

The Orioles Hall of Fame was conceived by the Oriole Advocates, with the cooperation of the Orioles, at the suggestion of a couple of past presidents-The late Allen Barrett (who passed away in February) and Jack Buckley, back in 1977. The Advocates continue to administer the annual election through their Hall of Fame Committee ('88 President-Bill Schofield).

ORIOLES HALL OF FAME (Cont.)

To become a member, a candidate must be mentioned on 75% of the ballots cast by selected sports reporters and Orioles officials as well as Oriole Advocates who have been regular members for a minimum of 5 years to qualify for nomination, he must have spent at least 3 seasons with the Orioles and must be at least one year removed from the capacity in which he se being considered. Only one new member can be chosen thru the regular election each year.

This year a special Veteran's Committee has been formed to consider for membership those players, coaches and managers who have been passed over in all previous regular elections, but who have nevertheless demonstrated unusual ability.

To be eligible, candidates must **not** have represented the ballclub in the category of consideration for at least the last 20 years. Support from 75% of the Veterans' Committee (drawn from among senior members of the Oriole Advocates, the media, the Babe Ruth/Orioles Museum and the Orioles from office) will be required to elect. No more than one candidate will be admitted per year.

FOUR MORE: There are 4 additional Hall of Famers who have represented Baltimore ballclubs, only one a player. He was right-handed pitcher **Charles** "**Chief" Bender** who was selected to the Hall on the strength of his 206-111 lifetime record with **Connie Mack's** Philadelphia A's, not on what he did in Baltimore. He was here for only one summer, 1914, and while pitching for the Terrapins in the ill-fated Federal League, compiled a forgettable 4-16 record.

The other 3 worked for the Orioles in non-playing capacities. **George Welss**, who immortalized himself as a general manager of the Yankess served part of his apprenticeship as an International League Orioles g.m.

Luke Appling, a legendary shortstop for the White Sox, coached for the O's under Manager Billy Hitchcock for one year ('63); and, the late Burleigh Grimes, the famed spitball pitcher who won 270 games in the majors, scouted for the Orioles from 1960 thru 1971.

NOTES: John McGraw had a .334 lifetime batting average in 16 big league seasons, but was elected to the Hall of Fame primarily because of his achievements as a manager with the Giants . . **Rube Marquard** pitched only 27 innings for the Orioles, all in 1929, but he lived here for nearly 60 years before he died in '80.

Baltimore-born **Babe Ruth** signed his first pro contract with **Jack Dunn Sr.** in 1914, and made his debut with the Orioles (I.L.) that year as a pitcher. He was, of course, elected to the Hall as an outfielder.

Other native Marylanders in the Hall of Fame include **Baker** (Trappe), **Grove** (Lonaconing), and 3 who never played for the Orioles: **Jimmie Foxx** (Sudlersville), **Judy Johnson** (Snow Hill) and **Al Kaline** (Balmer).

RIILES OF INTEREST

TRADING AND WAIVER REGULATIONS: Player assignments may be made within a major league or between major leagues **without waivers** at any time **except** between August 1 and the day following the final day of the regular season (5 p.m. et). Thus, July 31 has replaced June 15 as the trade deadline.

Waivers are required for assignments to National Association clubs at all times **except** for optional assignments within 3 years of the date the player first reported to the major leagues.

FREE AGENCY: Six years major league service required for eligibility Reentry draft has been abolished.

By Dec. 7, player's former club must offer to arbitrate or it becomes ineligible to sign player . . . By Dec. 19, player must accept offer or on Jan. 9 former club becomes ineligible to sign the player until May 1.

SALARY ARBITRATION: Three years major league service required for eligibility ... Maximum cut rules do not apply if, in immediately preceding year, player won arbitration increase of over 50%.

TERMINATION PAY: One full season's pay if player released opening day or later. Thirty days pay for player who is released on the 16th day before opening day or earlier. If player is released after that 16th day prior to opening day he receives one additional day's pay (over the 30 days) for each additional day. In other words, if he were released the day before opening day player would receive 45 days pay.

SUSPENDED GAME RULE: A game terminated for any of the following reasons will be a suspended game **IF** it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e. 4-1/2 or 5 innings):

(1) A curfew imposed by law

(2) A pre-arranged time limit

(3) Darkness where local law prohibits turning on the lights or where lights are not available.

Light Failure: A game terminated by light failure or malfunction of a mechanical device under the control of the home club will be a suspended game **anytime after it starts.**

Inning in Progress (added in '80): If weather forces the termination of a legal game while an inning is in progress, it will become a suspended game if either of the following conditions exists:

(1) The visiting team has scored one or more runs to tie the game, and the home team has not scored.

(2) The visiting team has scored one or more runs to take the lead and the home team has not tied the score or retaken the lead.

Note: If a legal game is **tied** when called because of weather and neither of the above situations prevails, it is a **tie game** and must be **replayed in its**

Procedures for Resumption of Play: Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next single game between the two clubs on the **same ground.** If that is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in A.L. Regulation 5.2 (c).

CURFEW: The American League curfew provides that no inning may start after 1:00 a.m., but any inning that begins prior to 1 a.m. may be played to completion. Curfews shall be waived for the final series of the season in each of the parks of the contesting teams. There is no other curfew in the American League.

SAVE RULE: Credit a pitcher with a save when he is the **finishing**, but **not** the **winning** pitcher, and when he qualifies under one of the following conditions:

(1) He enters the game with a lead of no more than 3 runs and pitches for at least one inning, or

(2) He enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at bat or

(3) He pitches effectively for at least 3 innings regardless of his club's lead.

The current rule was adopted in 1975. Saves became official for the first time in '69. The original rule was amended in '73 and revised again in '75.

RULES OF INTEREST (Cont.)

BATTING/ERA TITLE QUALIFICATIONS: 502 or more plate appearances/160 or more innings pitched.

ROOKIE AWARD QUALIFICATIONS: A player is considered a rookie unless during a previous season or seasons, he has:

exceeded 130 at bats or 50 innings pitched in the major leagues, or
 accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a big league club(s) prior to Sep. 1.

CONSECUTIVE GAME STREAKS: A consecutive-game hitting streak shall not be terminated if all the player's plate appearances (one or more) result in a walk, hit by pitch, defensive interference or a sacrifice bunt. The streak shall terminate, however, if the player has a sacrifice fly and no hit.

The player's individual consecutive-game hitting streak shall be determined by the consecutive games in which the player appears and is not determined by his club's games.

ORIOLES "DESIGNATED HITTERS"

The Orioles "Designated Hitters" are a group of volunteers, businessment and women from the Baltimore-Washington areas, who sell Orioles season tickets on the club's behalf.

The organization was created in 1980, and in its first five years of operation, the Orioles season ticket sale ballooned by over 700%, from 1,623 to record 11,738 in 1984. Since then, the sale has leveled off somewhat, but there are high hopes that this year the total will equal or surpass the 1987 figure of 10,512 (the season ticket selling season continues thru opening day).

To qualify for membership in the "Designated Hitters," candidates must meet demanding sales minimums according to a formula based on a blend of new sales and renewals, and everyone must requalify each year. Jim Muno, Orioles' "Designated Hitter" coordinator, estimates that 70 will reach the goals necessary for membership this year, and 20 of those will be charter members who have been on the "DH" scene since the beginning.

In '87, the leading sales person was **Lou Hurwitz**, followed by **Sally McGraw**.

There are no salaries or commissions given to "DHs," but there are plenty of perks. This year those whose early sales were particularly bisk were treated to a winter cruise in the Caribbean (early February).

All qualifiers are eligible for the annual spring junket to South Florida white the Orioles are training in Miami. Then, during the season, leading "DHs" will qualify for baseball trips to Boston, Chicago, Milwaukee and Seattle (white the O's are playing in those cities), as well as to the All-Star Game and World Series.

Patterned after the Kansas City Royals' highly successful "Royal Larcers," the "Designated Hitters" organization was actually founded in September 1979 by then Baltimore City Mayor **William Donald Schaefer** and a select group of Baltimoreans working closely with the Orioles front office

The concept was to attract talented people from the business community to serve as the ballclub's principal season ticket sales representatives. The results have been dramatic.

Along with former Mayor (now Governor) Schaefer, the "founding fathers" of the "Designated Hitters" included: Owen Daly, Bill Beasman and Chris Hartman; the Orioles' Vice President for Business Affairs Bub Aylward; Executive Director of Sales and Tickets Lou Michaelson, and former club Vice President Al Harazin, now senior vice president for the New York Mets.

The "DHs" have their own officers and board of directors, as well as an active social program. The "DH" Board: Glenn Babcock, President; Frank Trommer, Howard Weinberg, Jake Jacobson, Dennis Branger, Mike Duvall, Leslie Smalley, Eamonn McGeady and Mike McQuigg.

The Orioles season ticket sales figures for the past 9 years: '79—1,623 . . '80—4,018 . . '81—5,215 . . '82—5,430 . . '83—6,061 . . '84—11,738 . . '85—11,707 . . '86—11,145 . . '87—10,512.

ORIOLE ADVOCATES

The Oriole Advocates, Inc. is a unique non-profit organization, dedicated to promoting and stimulating interest in the game of baseball at both the amateur and professional levels. Founded in July, 1960, the Advocates will celebrate their 28th anniversary this summer.

Membership comprises some 75 men and women, drawn from a broad cross-section in the Baltimore area.

Through the years, the Advocates have made substantial financial donations to worthy causes, primarily to baseball-oriented youth organizations; have played a key role in the restoration of Babe Ruth's birthplace at 216 Emory Street and its conversion into the Babe Ruth/Orioles Museum; and, in 1977, established the Orioles Hall of Fame. (See page 94).

The organization has also served as an essential right arm to the Orioles' Public Relations and Marketing Departments. In that connection, the Advocates initiated the popular "Junior Orioles" program (low cost tickets for kids) back in 1963, then administered it for 25 years. Membership in that program rose from 75 youngsters the first year to a record 20,000 in 1977.

This year "Junior Orioles" will be replaced by the "Birdwatchers Fan Club", a slightly different concept (see page 18). The Advocates will continue to participate in the program, in cooperation with the Baltimore Sun and the Orioles.

The Advocates also serve as distributors of Orioles souvenirs on "give-away" days at the ballpark, assuring that all eligible fans get the items to which they are entitled.

The Orioles Advocates don't get paid for anything they do. They are all volunteers, constantly demonstrating the importance of competence and dedication whenever there is a job that must be done.

CHARLES L. (CHUCK) THOMPSON

Chuck Thompson, who announced his retirement in February, did baseball play-by-play for over 40 years. It all began soon after World War II, during which he saw combat in three different European campaigns (including the Battle of the Bulge), when he teamed up with Byrum Saam to describe Phillies and A's games on WIBG radio in the Philadelphia area

In 1949, he came to Baltimore to do International League Orioles base ball, as well as basketball and football. During the nearly 39 years he's spert on the shores of the Chesapeake Bay, he has become as much a Baltimore symbol as marble steps and crab cakes.

He has done major league Orioles broadcasts on radio, or tv or both for 28 seasons and during a stretch when he was employed by the National Brewing Company and Orioles games were sponsored by a rival brewery he logged 5 campaigns with the Washington Senators. While working games at Griffith Stadium, he also moonlighted for a couple of years on NBC's TV. "Game of the Week" All in all, that adds up to 40 distinguished seasons of baseball play-by-play.

Additionally, Chuck has worked five World Series beginning with the Yankees-Pirates classic of 1960. He was at the mike (radio) when Bill Mazeroski hit his decisive 7th game home run. Later he did the first 4 World Series in which the Orioles were involved: 1966, 1969, 1970 and 1971. For many years, he also did Baltimore Colts football to great acclaim.

Chuck Thompson had a number of things going for him as play-by-play announcer: he has a classic voice; has the ability to call the plays as they happened, unlike so many who have to wait until the action has stopped before they can give you the details, and he's a master of the ad lib. He's also a man widely regarded for his professionalism and his character by both his broadcasting peers and his listening audience.

Chuck was born in Palmer, Massachusetts, and grew up in Reading. Pennsylvania. He began his radio career, some 49 years ago in 1939 at WEEU Reading as a disk jockey.

Three years later he went to Philadelphia to become a staff announcer at WIBG and also did Temple University football

After the war, he returned to Philadelphia and resumed his career, doing A's and Phillies, Warriors, Eagles, and Rockets (hockey) games.

Chuck came to Baltimore to do play-by-play for the International League Orioles, Baltimore Bullets, Navy football and the Colts in the All-America

In 1955, Chuck joined the team of announcers who worked for the Baltimore based National Brewery. That association lasted for 24 years during which Chuck did A.L. Orioles baseball, Washington Senators baseball (1957 thru 1961), Colts football and NBC-TV Baseball ('59-'60).

In December 1958 he covered the Colts-Giants "Sudden Death" playoff game ("The greatest football game ever played," said Sports Illustrated), and a month later he was on the 18th green at Pebble Beach, CA to describe the Bing Crosby Golf Tournament for ABC-TV.

In 1965 he covered another "sudden death" playoff football game, this time for CBS-TV, the Colts-Packers tussle for the NFL's western division championship.

He has been named "outstanding sportscaster" in Maryland by the National Sportscasters/Sportscasters Association so many times we've lost count.

He is an excellent golfer, and an accomplished fisherman, but most of all he loves being around friends telling stories as only Chuck Thompson can tell them. He has three children and, at last count, five grandchildren.

ANNOUNCERS

A native of Colombia, South America, Joe Angel begins his 9th year of broadcasting major league baseball, his first with the Orioles. The 40-year-old Angel has over 20 years of broadcasting experience, including six years of calling major league baseball on radio, three seasons ('76-'78) for the San Francisco Giants on station KSFO and three years ('84-'86) for the Minnesota Twins on WCOO radio. He also handled television play-by-play for the Oakland A's for two seasons ('80-'81) on KPIX-TV.

JOE ANGEL (Cont.)

He has worked for 14 years in both radio and television in San Francisco area, including five years of Stanford University football, and four years of University of San Francisco basketball in addition to his work with the Giarts and A's. He has also served as a television sports anchor, a radio talk show host and has filled in occasionally on San Francisco 49ers radio broadcasts.

Angel, who quarterbacked on the same high school football team with O.J. Simpson (a team which at one point lost 21 straight garnes), was born Bogota, Colombia in '47. His family immigrated to Chicago ten years later and after five years, moved again to the Bay Area. It was there at Galleo High School in San Francisco that Angel played football with Simpson. Angal later attended City College of San Francisco.

He and his wife, Antoinette, reside in Rancho Murieta, CA (near Sagramento, CA) with their three children: Tony (20), Natalie (12) and Jonathan (10).

REX BARNEY

Rex returns for his 5th season with Home Team Sports. Known as the "Voice of Memorial Stadium" since '70, he will continue to handle the stadium's public address announcing, when it doesn't conflict with his HTS work.

Rex, who also served as the press box announcer for the Baltimore Cols from '69 to '83, has hosted a variety of radio sports shows in Baltimore.

A former major league pitcher himself, Barney played with the Brooklyn Dodgers for six seasons ('43, '46-'50). He appeared briefly with the Dodges in '43 before being called into the service for three years of military duty. He returned to the Dodgers in '46 and compiled a career record of 35-31. His best season came in '48, when he won 15 games, including a 2-0 nohly victory over the New York Giants.

He began his broadcasting career in '52 in New York City. He did Mutual Radio's Game of the Day from '55 to '57, and also broadcast games in the New York area for WOR-TV.

In '82 and '83, he served as color commentator for 16 Orioles' telecasts on subscription television. A native of Omaha, Nebraska, Rex resides just a half-mile from Memorial Stadium.

TOM DAVIS

Baltimore native Tom Davis will host the HTS pre- and post-game show and provide in-game score updates, duties he has handled the past 3 seasons for HTS. He has handled various on-air assignments for HTS including play-by-play for the Orioles and college basketball, in-studio talk shows, pregame host of hockey telecasts, coverage of the Washington Redskins, boxing and college football.

The 40-year-old Davis has spent 17 years on the Baltimore sports scene. He has been named "Baltimore Sportscaster of the Year" in '78, '84 and '85. Davis gained national exposure with ABC-TV as a sideline reporter during United States Football League telecasts and with the Mutual Broadcasting System as a sports anchor and college football play-by-play man.

For the past two falls he has handled play-by-play of several NFL games for NBC-TV as well as NBC and Mutual radio.

A graduate of the University of Baltimore, Davis began his career as a sports reporter at WBAL radio in '71. He later worked as a part-time sports anchor at WJZ-TV and WBAL-TV and can still occasionally be seen on WBAL on weekends. In '75, he began anchoring the sports on WCBM radio and has been there the past 12 years. During his early years at WCBM, Davis handled the play-by-play of Baltimore Colts pre-season games and filled in during a number of regular season games.

He can currently be heard mornings on WCBM. He and his wife, Linda, have two children. They reside in Baltimore.

JOHN LOWENSTEIN

Former Oriole John Lowenstein returns for his 4th season as color commentator for Home Team Sports. He played his last game for the Orioles on May 4, '85 and later that month began his sportscasting career calling the Orioles games on HTS. His insight and humor are key elements of the telecasts.

Lowenstein's major league career began in '70 with the Cleveland Indians. He remained with Cleveland until '78 when he was traded to the Texas Rangers. After one year at Texas, Lowenstein was sold to Baltimore where he spent seven years with the Orioles.

John compiled a .253 (3476-881) lifetime batting average in 1,368 big league games. His best season came in '82, when he batted .320 (322-103) with 24 home runs and 66 rbi in 122 games for the O's while platooning with Gary Roenicke. The duo combined to produce a .292 average (612-179) with 35 home runs and 131 rbi.

Jon Miller starts his 6th season on the Orioles' radio network after 3 years as a radio play-by-play announcer for the Boston Red Sox. His major league baseball experience also includes radio and television with the Texas Rangers in '78 and '79 and with the Oakland A's in '74. He broadcast his first major league game at age 22 with the A's.

During the last 2 seasons, Jon was granted a leave of absence from several Oriole games to call the action for NBC-TV's Saturday afternoon coverage of major league baseball.

Jon has an extensive background in basketball, soccer and hockey during his 16 years in broadcasting. He did 10-15 games a season for the NBA's Golden State Warriors from 1979-82 and prior to that, was the voice of University of San Francisco basketball for 5 years. He has also announced MISL games for the San Jose Earthquakes and did both television and radio for the Washington Diplomats of the North American Soccer League in '77. He's broadcast soccer for the CBS, TVS and Satelcast networks.

A renowned mimic, Jon can be heard to imitate such outstanding baseball announcers as Al Michaels, Vin Scully and Chuck Thompson during breaks in the action (rain delays, etc.). Popular on the banquet circuit in the off-season, Jon attended numerous such functions across the country last

winter including the annual Baseball Writers Association dinner in New York in January, and "Tops in Sports" in Baltimore.

In '86, he was named "Baltimore's Best Radio Sportscaster" by Baltimore Magazine and "Best Play-by-Play Broadcaster" by Washingtona Magazine.

A native of the San Francisco Bay area, Jon now lives in Cockeysville, MD with his wife, Janine, and their children Michelle, Holly, Emily and Alexander.

MEL PROCTOR

Mel is in his 16th year as a broadcaster, 5th as the Orioles' play-by-play announcer for Home Team Sports. Mel, who handles a variety of oreir assignments for HTS including play-by-play for Washington Bullets basket ball telecasts and college football, is one of the busiest broadcasters in the business.

In addition to his work with HTS, he can be heard calling NFL games for NBC television and radio, college football and pro and college basketbal for Turner Broadcasting. He also does selected Bullets games for Channel 20 in Washington, D.C. (those not televised by HTS).

In '86, Mel took a short break from Orioles baseball to handle play-by-play of TBS's coverage of the United States men's basketball team in the Goodwill Games in Spain.

He began his career as sports director at the CBS-TV affiliate in Hawai (KGMB) from '73 until '78. While there, he worked the microphone for Hawai Islanders (AAA) baseball, University of Hawaii football and basketball, and did one season for the Hawaiians of the World Football League.

He came to work in the Nation's Capital for the first time in '78 when he began a five-year stint as play-by-play announcer for Washington Bules basketball on flagship station, WTOP-AM. During the Bullets' off-seasons Mel worked in Arlington, Texas as the TV and radio voice of the Texas Rangers. In '82 and '83, he supplemented his work with the Bullets by dong college basketball games for NBC-TV for two seasons.

For two seasons ('83-'84 and '84-'85), Mel served as the play-by-play man for the NBA's New Jersey Nets. At that time, he also began providing the commentary for the NFL "Game of the Week" for the Mutual Broadcasting System.

A native of Denver, CO, Mel resides in Columbia, MD with his wife, Julie, and their children, Bill and Maile.

HALL OF FAME: See page 93-94.

PERSONAL: Brooks is doing color commentary on the Orioles' television for the 11th straight year. He is also active as vice-president of Shapiro, Robinson and Associates* and as a special assistant with Crown Central Petroleum Company.

Brooks and his wife, **Connie**, a former United Airlines flight attendant whom Brooks met on a Orioles' charter flight (K.C. to Boston) in '59, have been married for 27 years. They live in Lutherville, MD (north of Baltimore) with their four children: **Brooks David** (7/24/61), **Chris** (2/22/63), **Michael** (3/11/64) and **Dianna** (2/22/68).

Brooks' uniform #5 was officially retired on opening day, '78, the year after he retired. **Frank Robinson's** #20, **Earl Weaver's** #4 and **Jim Palmer's** #22 are the only other numbers that have been retired by the Orioles

BIG LEAGUE CAREER: Brooks officially spent 20 years and 72 days as a player in the American League, spanning 23 seasons.

He played in 2,896 major league games, all of them with the Orioles, 8th on the all-time list (**Pete Rose** leads at 3,562).

Only **Carl Yastrzemski** (3,308) and **Ty Cobb** (3,033) have played more American League games, and only 3 others in history have played more with one franchise: **Yastrzemski** (3,308), **Hank Aaron** (3,076) and **Stan Musial** (3,026).

Opening Days: Started 20 consecutive opening day games for the Orioles from '57 thru '76 and batted .316 (79-25) with 6 home runs and 17 rbi.

Home Runs/RBI: Led A.L. in rbi (118) in '64 and also achieved career high of 28 home runs that year . . . Hit 17 or more homers nine times, 11 or more 11 times . . . His last year in double figures was '71 when he hit 20 . . . Holds the record for most lifetime homers in Memorial Stadium (139) . . . Had 6 career grand slams, 4 of them in Baltimore.

Signed for '77 as player-coach, but became coach exclusively on Sunday, Aug. 21, when he went on the voluntarily retired list (in Minnesota) to make room on the roster for catcher **Rick Dempsey** who was returning to duty after 6 weeks on the disabled list.

An Orioles' record regular season crowd of 51,798 attended "Thanks Brooks" Day on Sunday, Sep. 18, '77, against the Red Sox to pay tribute to the most important and beloved Oriole of modern times.

THE RIPKEN FAMILY

Last year, Cal Senior became the first father ever to manage two sons simultaneously in major league baseball history-regular season. Among those who have managed one son are Connie Mack (son Earle, '10, '11, '14), and Yogi Berra (son Dale '84 & '85).

The first time the Ripken trio hooked up professionally was in spring training '86. Cal Junior and Bill were teamed at the keystone for an exhibition split squad game at Ft. Myers on March 15 and the manager of that team was Cal Senior.

Three members of the same family in the same uniform at the same time is a rarity, matched only 3 times before before in baseball history. 1973-Jose, Hector & Tommy Cruz for the Cardinals; 1963—Felipe, Matty and Jesus Alou for San Francisco; 1876-George, Sam & Harry Wright for Boston in the National League (Harry, a Hall of Famer, was the manager and pitched briefly; George was an outfielder, 70 games in '76, and Sam, a shortstop, appeared in only 2 games that year. We're assuming they were all in uniform together).

OTHER FAMILIES WITH 3 OR MORE IN MAJORS

Other families with 3 or more representatives in the big leagues, but not with same club at same time: Dick, Hank & Ron Allen; Clete, Cloyd & Ken Boyer; Arthur (Dad), John & Walter Clarkson; Amos, Frank & Lave Cross; Ed, Frank, Jim, Joe & Tom Delahanty; Dom, Vince & Joe DiMaggio; Dave, Marshall & Mike Edwards; John, Mike Tom Mansell; Jim, Mike & Steve O'Neill; Bob, Eddie & Ted Sadowski; Joe, Luke & Tommy Sewell.

Our research indicates that the Ripken boys are the 4th brother keystone act in modern big league history . . . Their predecessors: **Granny & Garvin** (**Wes**) **Hamner** for the Phillies (briefly in '45), the **O'Brien** twins, **Eddie** & Johnny for the Pirates (sporadically in '53, plus '55-'56), and Milt and Frank Bolling for the Tigers (briefly in '58).

Cal Junior was a 2nd round pick in the June '78 draft while younger son, Bill, was chosen on the 11th round in June '82. Cal Sr. & Jr. have been teammates in spring training as well as in regular season for the last 7 years (starting '81).

CAL RIPKEN SR. (Cont.)

The lady who has made the Ripken story possible is **Vi** (short for **Violet**), who was honored in January at the annual Tops in Sports baseball dinner as Maryland's "First Lady of Baseball." The award was presented by Governor **William Donald Schaefer**.

At **Cal Junior's** wedding last November 13, **Cal Senior** served as best man and **Bill** as an usher. Brother **Fred** was also an usher and sister **Ellen** was an attendant to the bride, **Kelly**.

Vi and Senior have been married 30 years (Nov. 20, '57). Ther 4 children, in order of appearance: Ellen Leigh (3/22/59), Cal Jr. (8/24/60), Fred (11/25/61), and Bill (12/16/64). Ellen is a payroll clerk in the treasury department of the Harford County Government (Aberdeen is in Harford Cty), and Fred is a motorcycle mechanic by trade.

Cal Senior has 2 older brothers, **Oliver** and **Bill.** The latter was once a Brooklyn Dodger farmhand.

MANAGING: Has managed for 14 and a fraction seasons in professional baseball, all in the Orioles' organization. His 13-plus years as a manager in the Birds' minor league organization ('61-'74) represents the longest tenue of any minor league skipper in Orioles' history . . . Earl Weaver and Joe Altobelli are tied for 2nd in that category, each having managed 11 years in the Birds' farm system . . . During that span, Cal managed at all levels except "rookie" league.

He began his managing career at Leesburg, FL on June 7, '61 as a replacement for **Billy DeMars**, who had just been promoted to a Class B league. After 10 weeks on the job, he was rushed to Rochester (Aug. 17) for emergency duty as a catcher, and was replaced at the Leesburg helm by **Ray Scarborough**, then a scout for the O's.

He had only 2 losing records: in '62, his first full season as a manager and his last as a player, and in '67 at Miami.

He won the 1st of 2 pennants at Aberdeen, SD by 12 games in '64 with a club that included 7 players who would ultimately play in the majors: Jim Palmer, Lou Piniella, Mark Belanger, Andy Etchebarren, Eddie Watt, Dave Leonhard and Mike Fiore.

That '64 club went 81-34 and Cal was the Northern League's "Manager of the Year" . . . Former Orioles' 3rd base coach, **Jimmy Williams**, managed at Grand Forks, ND in the same league for the Dodgers that year.

He finished 1st again in '72 at Asheville in the AA Southern League . Preceded **Joe Altobelli** at Rochester in in '69 & '70.

EJECTIONS: In his first season as the O's manager, Cal was ejected 8 times. **Durwood Merrill** & **Greg Kosc** got him twice and the **Larry Barnett-Kosc-Rocky Roe-Tim Tschida** crew accounted for 5 of the 8 dismissals.

Cal Jr., incidentally, experienced his first career ejection on Sep. 25 on a balls & strikes dispute in the 1st inning at Baltimore vs. the Yankees. The umpire was **Tim Welke**, who also threw Cal Sr. out of a home game on July 26

Cal has now been ejected 24 times during 10½ years in the big leagues, 16 of them as 3rd base coach. **Dale Ford** and the late **Bill Kunkel** have been his most frequent ejectors, 3 times each, but **Merrill**, **Kosc**, and **Mark Johnson** are close behind with 2 apiece.

SCOUTING: In '75, he turned to scouting, primarily at the professional level, but he also did some free agent scouting and served as a "trouble shooter" in the farm system.

PLAYING CAREER: Rip was a catcher in the O's organization although he also played some 3rd base and outfield and even pitched. He enjoyed his best year under **Earl Weaver** at Fox Cities (Appleton, WI) in '60. He became a player-manager the following year.

MISCELLANEOUS: Conducts clinics in off-season and makes frequent public appearances on behalf of the ballclub.

COACH: Ellie was appointed bullpen coach in Nov. '77 He also served as a player-coach for parts of the '78 and '79 seasons and has supervised the off-season workouts the last 9 winters for players living in the Baltimore area.

He was the American League's batting practice catcher and bullpen coach for the '82 All-Star game in Montreal.

'79 SEASON: He coached exclusively all year until Sep. 1, when the roster expanded to 40 players . . . He made only one appearance, in a game at Detroit on Sep. 19, and went 0-for-1 with a throwing error behind the plate... He was not eligible for post-season play.

YANKEES '76-'77: In '76, he played in 26 games for the Yankees after the June 15 trade from Baltimore and batted .210 (57-12).

Spent '77 shuttling between New York and Syracuse. He played in only 10 games for the Yankees and was not eligible for post-season play.

Weaver/Lane: Earl Weaver and Frank Lane were instrumental in convincing the O's to draft him from the Angels' AAA Seattle affiliate in Nov. Played for Weaver in Puerto Rico previously and Lane had scouted him in Mexico.

ALCS/WS: He compiled a .273 (66-18) average in 23 post-season games for the O's and Yankees (comprising five league championship series and four World Series).

'70 WS: Hit .364 (11-4) against the Reds with a home run and double and contributed significantly to the O's wins at Cincinnati in games #1 and #2.

In the opener, the Reds jumped out 3-0, but Ellie tied it in the 5th with a home run off Gary Nolan and the O's went on to win on Brooks' homer in the 7th . . . There was a play in the Cincinnati 6th in which Ellie was involved and that was as important as the home run.

"Carbo-Burkhart" Incident: One inning after Ellie had tied the game with his home run, the Reds had Bernie Carbo on 3rd representing the lead run, and only one out (Brooks had retired Lee May leading off the inning on a sensational play).

Pinch-hitter Ty Cline then chopped a high bouncer in front of the plate As Ellie went out and grabbed it, Carbo headed home, Ellie dove and tagged Carbo a few feet up the line and umpire Ken Burkhart, who had been spun around by the runners as they converged so that his back was to the play, called Carbo out.

Films later revealed that Ellie had tagged Carbo with one hand while holding the ball in the other, and that Carbo had missed the plate.

EARLY CAREER

PUERTO RICO: Ellie played for Santurce in the Puerto Rican Winter League each year from '60-'77, except in '71 when the O's went to Japan . 112 homers in that loop rank him 2nd on the all-time list to former St. Louis Browns outfielder Willard Brown (120).

MINORS: He enjoyed his best minor league seasons in Jalisco in the Mexican League (AAA) where he hit 109 homers in 4 years and was known as the "Babe Ruth of Mexico" . . . In last season there ('67), he led the league in homers (41) and was 2nd in rbi (112).

He started his career in the Milwaukee Braves' organization ('59-'60), then spent 2 years at Winnipeg in the Cardinals' system ('62-'63) before going to Mexico. ***

Bumbry's 2 inside-the-park blasts rank him 2nd on the O's all-time list behind Paul Blair (3, two at home).

The Orioles have made 2 trips to Japan, both sponsored by the Yomiuri Shimbun, Japan's largest newspaper and the owners of the Tokyo Giants.

In '71, the O's were 12-2-4 on a 31 day tour and went 8-0 with 3 ties against the Giants who had just captured their 7th straight Japan championship. The O's left on the month long junket just 3 days after losing a 7-game World Series to the Pirates.

The Birds earned the '84 trip by beating the Phillies in the '83 World Series . . . Despite a 5th place '84 finish, the O's went 4-1 in the first 5 games against the '84 Japan Champion Hiroshima Carp, and 4-1 as well vs. the sponsoring Tokyo Giants. Their overall record was 8-5-1.

In the fall of '86, Cal Ripken Jr. represented the Orioles on a team of American Major League All-Stars that went 5-1 against an All-Star aggregation from the Japanese Central and Pacific Leagues . . . Cal led the Americans in hitting with a .500 average (14-7) . . . See Ripken's biog for more details.

That was to be his only victory and one of only 7 appearances he would make during the '87 season, during which he was on the active list for only 23 days. This, after having appeared in a career-high 66 games and amassing a club record 34 saves the year before.

SHOULDER INJURY/SURGERY: Complained of a sore shoulder on April 8 following his 2nd appearance, then pitched only once more before going on disabled list Apr. 15.

Reactivated May 13, appeared in 4 games, and earned his only 2 saves of the season before going back on the injury list 2 weeks later (May 27). That marked the end of his '87 season.

Underwent arthroscopic surgery by Dr. Lewis Yocum at Centinela Hospital (Inglewood, CA) on July 30. Yocum, who had performed more complex surgery on Don in '82 (see "Arm Injury/Recovery" below), repaired lears in the labrum in a 40-minute procedure. The labrum is the band of fibro-cartilage that rings the shoulder socket.

1986 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

SIVES LEADER: His 34 saves easily eclipsed the old club mark of 26, set by Tim Stoddard in '80 . . . Aase ranked 2nd in A.L. behind Dave Righetti's 46 and 4th in majors (Todd Worrell-36, Jeff Reardon-35).

He had a hand in 40 of the O's 73 victories with either a save or a win (55%). His saves total was the highest ever for a pitcher on a last-place club, exceeding the Brewers' Ken Sanders' 31 in '71 . . . In the Rolaids Relief Competition (win & save-2 points each, loss-1 point), Aase had 73 points to finish 2nd behind Righetti (100 points) for A.L. laurels.

Established club mark for relief points (wins + saves) with 40, bettering old mark of 38 that had been held by Stu Miller since '65. Finished 58 games, one short of Miller's club record 59 ('63), and 3rd best in the A.L.

Broke club record for saves with his 27th on July 28, but had only 7 the rest of the season . . . Had a save and/or a win vs. each of the O's 13 opponents . . . Earned the Birds' only '86 victory against Detroit.

MOST VALUABLE ORIOLE: Was a landslide winner, having earned 16 of 20 1st place votes and a total of 89 points (5-3-1 system). Cal Junior was runner-up with the other 4 1st place votes & 68 total points Became only the 2nd relief pitcher to win the award (Stu Miller won in both '63 & '65) and the first pitcher of any description in 12 years (Mike Cuellar was co-winner with Paul Blair in '74).

ALL-STAR GAME SAVE: Saved the A.L.'s 3-2 win in the All-Star Game at Houston . . . Manager **Dick Howser** called on him to protect a one-run lead with one out in the 9th and runners on 1st and 2nd. Aase promptly induced San Francisco's Chris Brown to hit into a game-ending double play.

It was the 4th time in the last 6 A.L. victories (over 33 games starting '58) that an Oriole had gotten a save: Billy O'Dell-'58 & '59, & Milt Pappas-'62.

BAD DAY IN GREAT YEAR: Became first Oriole ever to lose twice in one day when he dropped both games of a doubleheader at Oakland on Aug. 28. Both losses were in "sudden death."

Lost 5-4 on a 2-out, 2-run homer by Dave Kingman in the 9th inning of the opener, and 8-7 on a 2-out 2-run triple by Carney Lansford in the 9th inning of the nightcap . . . Wes Stock is the only Oriole to have won 2 in one day (May 26, '63 at Cleveland).

Named A.L. "Pitcher of the Month" in May (1-0, 9 SVS, 0.69 ERA, IR13, ER-1) while O's enjoyed their best month of the year (18-8).

In a stretch of 19 appearances from Apr. 30 thru June 15, he allowed only one run (earned) in 23.2 innings (0.38 ERA) while picking up 14 saves and one win . . . At the end of that span, his era was 0.83 (IP-32.2, ER-3) and he was 2-2 with 18 saves.

TIDE TURNS: Thru Aug. 2, he was 4-3 and led majors with 28 saves (in 33 opportunities) . . . Then, he was sidelined with a strained back from Aug. 3-9 . . . In final 20 outings, starting Aug. 10, he was 2-4 with 6 saves (in 10 opportunities) and a 5.32 era (IP-23.2, H-26, R/ER-14, BB-8, SO-15).

PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

ARM INJURY/RECOVERY: Went on disabled list June 3, '82 with "muscular strain," but was reactivitated June 26 . . . On July 17, however, he came out of a game in Cleveland with a right arm that felt "like it was on fire from the elbow down."

On Oct. 18, **Dr. Lewis Yocum** performed surgery which included the transplantation of a tendon from his left wrist to his right elbow . . . Did not pick up a baseball for next 9 months, then embarked on a long, gradual program in which he ultimately began throwing on the side and eventually worked up to 3/4 speed . . . However, he did not pitch competitively again until '84 spring training.

When he appeared on June 18, '84 vs. the Rangers at Anaheim, it was his first regular season game in one year, 11 months . . . Did not allow a run in his first 4 appearances . . . Never pitched 2 days in a row during that '84 season . . . Worked his longest stint on his final appearance of the year (Sep. 25 vs. KC).

Had one other major injury early in his career . . . Developed tendinitis in right elbow while still in minors during '75 season . . . Condition worsened in '76 (scrubbing Red Sox plan to promote him), and he did not pitch over the last 2 months.

RELIEVING/STARTING: Was a starter originally, and continued in that role during his 1st and 2nd seasons in the majors... Began relieving in 2nd half of '79 for Angels, but returned to starting rotation the following spring.

1985: Led O's in saves (14) and games (54) . . . Converted 14 of 19 save opportunities . . . Struggled thru 1st 2 months . . . On June 9 gave up 7 hits & 7 runs while retiring only 2 batters in 9th inning against Boston . . . To that point he had a 6.83 era (IP-55.2, ER-11).

For the next 31/2 months, from June 12 thru Sep. 29, turned it completely around . . . In that span, he was 5-3 with 12 saves in 34 appearances and maintained a 1.78 era (IP-55.2, ER-11).

CALIFORNIA ANGELS: Was first Orange County native ever to play for Angels.

In '84, was one of only 3 A.L. hurlers to beat Tigers' Cy Young Award winner **Willie Hernandez**... Suffered only loss to Boston's **Bob Stanley**... Won his last 4 decisions.

In '82, before he was beset by elbow injury, jumped off to a 3-1 record with 2 saves and a 0.67 era (IP-27, ER-2) in 10 games . . . Despite the abbreviated '81 season, earned 11 saves, then a career high, in his first full season as a reliever.

In both '79 and '80 he opened the season as a starter and moved to the bullpen in the 2nd half . . . Was 8-9 as a starter in '79 and only modestly successful in relief (1-1, 1 sv, 6.30 era).

In '80, however, after going 5-13 with a 4.90 era as a starter, he was 3-0 with 2 saves and an era of 2.08 in 19 relief appearances . . . That success triggered his permanent assignment to the bullpen.

Overall, ranks 16th in the majors among active players . . . Of his 69 home runs with the Orioles, 16 have been game-winners and 8 have come in the 9th inning.

20 or More: Is one of 7 major leaguers with 20 or more homers in each of the last 6 years (Harold Baines, Tom Brunansky, Dwight Evans, Dale Murphy, Mike Schmidt, Cal Ripken Jr.).

Consistent: His feat of 4 straight 23-homer seasons is only the 15th time in major league history a-player has hit the same number of home runs over 4 straight seasons (2 or more homers in one season)... In fact, Lynn's feat is in a class with only one other player: Ken Boyer, St. Louis, hit 24 homers 4 straight years, '61-'64.

BATTING/SLUGGING: Ranks 10th among active players (min. 2000 at bats) in career slugging with a .495 (AB-5985, TB-2964) mark... Needs 45 runs and 14 rbi to reach 1,000 plateaus in each category ... Only 16 other active players currently have hit both marks ... Has 360 doubles, 16th among active players.

Has led the league in slugging twice: .566 in '75 and .637 in '79 . . . In best years has majored in extra-base hits, e.g.: '75-75; '78-56; '79-82; '82-60; '84-55 . . . Has had 32 or more doubles 6 times including highs of 47 in '75 and 42 in '79 . . . Led the A.L. in batting in '79 with a .333 avg.

VS. TWINS, ANGELS: Continued to wreck Twins pitching with 4 homers and 12 rbi in 12 games against the world champions . . . Hit 3 homers off Bert Blyleven . . . Has career highs in average (.327), home runs (35) and rbi (118) vs. Twins . . . As an Oriole has 13 homers and 36 rbi in 32 games against Minny and at Memorial Stadium has 8 homers and 23 rbi in 13 games . . . Overall, in his last 38 games vs. the Twins has 14 homers and 42 rbi

Hit 4 home runs at Anaheim in '87 . . . Has 6 homers and 10 rbi in 15 games at Anaheim since joining the O's from the Angels after the '84 season . . . (For more information see "Vs. Opponents" section p. 50–66.)

MAJOR AWARDS: Only player ever to win "MVP" and "Rookie of the Year" ('75) awards in the same season (**Cal Ripken** earned them in back-to-back seasons)... Has also been "MVP" in ALCS ('82) and All-Star game ('83)... Won 4 "Gold Gloves" ('75 as rookie, '78, '79, '80)... Twice chosen as A.L. "Player of the Month" (June '75 and Aug. '79).

Won total of 13 significant awards as a rookie, including AP & UPI "Athlete of the Year", Sport Magazine's "Pro Rookie of the Year", TSN A.L. "Player of the Year" & "Gold Glove."

Top vote-getter in '76 and leading write-in candidate in '75, his rookie year, but did not get enough votes to start.

Has hit 4 home runs (tied with **Ted Williams** for 2nd behind recordholder **Stan Musial's** 6), including the only grand slam in All-Star history. That was an '83 blast at Comiskey Park off San Francisco's **Atlee Hammaker** (3rd inn.) which sparked A.L. to a 13-3 win, snapping an 11-game losing streak ... Hit the others in '76 (off **Tom Seaver**), '79 (off **Steve Carlton**) and '80 (off **Bob Welch**).

Hit a 3-run homer in game #6 of '75 WS (the "Carlton Fisk game") which gave Boston a 3-0 lead in 1st inning . . . Fisk's homer won it in the 12th.

PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

1986: Missed 49 games with injuries (See above under "Major Injuries") and O's were 15-34 in those games . . . O's were 54-49 when he started, 19-40 when he didn't . . . Led club in slugging (.499), but was 45 plate appearances shy of qualifying among league leaders . . . Was 2nd on club to **Cal Ripken Jr.** in homers (23) and gwrbi (11).

Was the O's leading hitter and 5th in the A.L. after first 2 months with a .333 (150-50, HR-7, RBI-26) mark in 43 games . . . 1975: Led A.L. in runs (103), doubles (47, a rookie record) and slugging (.566, the 1st time a rookie had ever led that category), and helped propel Bosox to 1st pennant in 19 years while becoming 1st (and only) ever to win both "MVP" & "Rookie" awards... MISCELLANEOUS: Was 0-5 at home, and has now lost 7 straight home games since his last win, Sep. 7, '86, 8-0 over Seattle . . . Picked off career-high 10 base runners, including those scored as caught stealing (for more details see below under "Pickoffs") . . . O's were 4-11 in his 15 starts.

WINS AND LOSSES: Is 13-22 the last 2 seasons ('86-'87), but was the only pitcher in the major leagues with a record of .500 or better in each of the previous 8 seasons ('78-'85).

0'S ALL-TIME: On the O's all-time list is 4th in innings (2,124); 5th in wins (138), games (352), shutouts (23) and complete games (83); and 7th in strikeouts (894).

INJURIES: Went on the DL in '87 with tendinitis in left shoulder, the 3rd time he has been DL'd in his career, first since '84 . . . Underwent an extensive rehabilitation program during the off-season at Children's Hospital in Baltimore.

The '84 season ended early for him after he broke the ring finger on his pitching hand when he was struck by **Brian Downing's** ground ball in the 1st inning of a game on Aug. 28 at California... Had completely recovered by '85 spring training, but did not accompany the club on '84 fall tour of Japan.

Has had disabling arm problems several times . . . Weak muscles in his left shoulder bothered him for most of 2nd half of '82 and he worked just 82 innings after the All-Star break . . . Underwent a therapy and exercise program for the shoulder the following winter and enjoyed a banner '83 season.

In spring of both '79 and '80, was troubled by inflamed muscles in left elbow, but overcame malady thru therapy prior to spring of '81.

CONTROL: Last season walked an average of 3.69 batters per 9 innings, highest mark of his career . . . Still, has averaged 2.16 walks per 9 innings during career, ranking him 4th on 0's all-time list (min. 500 innings) behind **Dick Hall** (1.47), **Robin Roberts** (1.81) and **Hal Brown** (1.98) . . . In '83 was 2nd in the majors with a 1.56 mark and in '79 he led the A.L. at 1.18.

In one month-long stretch in '79, he pitched 46.1 consecutive walkless innings (June 29 to July 29) . . . Walked career-high 6 batters Sep. 9, '78 but beat Toronto, 4-0.

Cracked the 30-home run level for the 5th time in his career, a club record (only **Mike Schmidt**—14 and **Dale Murphy**—7 have done it more among actives) . . . Set an all-time Orioles career home run mark when he hit his 304th on Sep. 12 at Boston (off **Bruce Hurst**), surpassing the old standard held by **Boog Powell** since '69.

Became the first player in history to hit home runs from each side of the plate in consecutive games, on May 8 & 9 at Comiskey Park. Has now homered left-handed and right-handed in a game 8 times, 2 short of **Mickey Mantle's** major league record (see details below).

His .277 average was the lowest of his career, but over the last 2 months of the season (after July 30), he batted .299 (224-67) . . . Reached a season high .285 on Sep. 28, then went 2-for-24 over the last 6 games . . . His second half low was .264 on July 30 . . . Batted only .181 in April (83-15), the 2nd worst month of his career average-wise (see "By Month" below).

Finished 2nd in the balloting for Most Valuable Oriole to **Larry Sheets** (see MVO below) and tied **Cal Ripken** for most "key runs" driven in (-1, tie, lead, +2) with 56, including 37 tying and lead runs . . . His 15-game hitting streak from September 7 thru 22 was the longest of the year by an Oriole . . . Also had a 14-game streak from July 3 thru 19.

Drove in 28 runs in 25 games, July 3 to August 4, including 5 gamewinners . . . When he homered off **Dennis Rasmussen** (Yankees) at Baltimore on June 22, it snapped a string of 27 homerless games.

1987 AND CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

MOST VALUABLE ORIOLES AWARD: In 11 seasons has won a record 6 MVOs (runner-up Brooks Robinson won 4 times), finished 2nd 4 times ('77, '79, '80, '87) and 3rd once ('86) . . . Won 5 straight MVOs from '81 thru '85.

MOST VALUABLE PLAYER VOTES: Eddie has never won an A.L. MVP award, and, as a matter of fact, hasn't received a single mention the last 2 years. Nevertheless, he has earned more MVP votes during the 80s than any other A.L. player (1088): 2—Don Mattingly (850, 1 award) 3—George Brett (619, one award) 4—Rickey Henderson (572, no awards) . . . 5—George Bell (546, one award) . . . 6—Cecil Cooper (531, no awards) .

Eddie finished 2nd in '82 to **Robin Yount,** and 2nd in '83 to teammate **Cal Ripken** . . . He's also been 4th ('84), 5th twice ('81 & '85) and 6th ('80). **DURABILITY:** He's missed only 59 of 1720 games (including one tie) during

his 11 Baltimore seasons while playing 96½ percent of all the club's games (not including 20 of 20 post-season games).

His 444 consecutive-game streak which extended from Aug. 21, '77 to July 13, '80 is the 3rd longest in O's history behind **Cal Ripken's** current 927 and **Brooks Robinson's** 463. He played in 562 of 563 games from the time he joined the O's on opening day '77 until July 13, '80 when a bad-hop grounder hit him in the right eye.

Missed career-high 25 games in '86 because of injuries that forced him to the disabled list for the first time in his big league career.

In 11 years, he has never missed a game against either the California Angels (129 of 129 regular season plus 4 '79 ALCS) or the Detroit Tigers (147 of 147) . . . He's missed only once vs. Oakland (128 of 129).

ORIOLES TRIPLE CROWN: Has led the club in average, homers and rbi in the same season a club record 4 times ('81, '82, '84, '85), but in '87, for the first time ever, failed to lead the Orioles in any of the 3 triple crown categories.

Others who have earned the Orioles' triple crown distinction: **Frank Robinson**—twice ('66-'67), **Gus Triandos** ('55), **Jim Gentile** ('61) and **Boog Powell** ('63).

VS. OPPONENTS: See "Durability" above, and "O's vs. Opponents" on pages 50–66.

Highs '87: Highest Average—348 vs. Minnesota and New York (both 46-16) . . . Home Runs—8 vs. Chicago . . . RBI—15 vs. Chicago & Cleveland.

Highs Lifetime: Highest Average—.332 (482-160) vs. California . . . Home Runs—30 vs. Chicago . . . RBI—103 vs. California in 129 games.

EJECTIONS: Was tossed out of one game in '87, by **John Shulock** on May 25 at Oakland. It was his first in 4 years . . . He's been ejected 7 times during his A.L. career, twice each in '79 and '83 and once each in '81, '82 and '87 . . . The only umpire to run him more than once is **Ken Kaiser** (once in '82 and once in '83).

BATTING AVERAGE

His career low .277 average in '87 dropped his lifetime mark to .296, but he remains 4th on the all-time Orioles list (see page 23).

Has hit .300 or better 5 times and .294 & up in 8 of 11 seasons . . . Has paced the club in average (among qualifiers) 6 times: '79, '81, '82, '84, '85, '86.

HOME/ROAD: Batted only .263 (300-79) at home last year, forcing his career average at Memorial Stadium below .300 (.298, 3053-911), and leaving only 2 Orioles with .300 lifetime marks in Baltimore (**Frank Robinson**—.305, 1380-421; and **Tommy Davis**—.302, 834-252) . . Eddie hit .289 on the road in '87. He's a .294 (3889-939) lifetime batter on foreign soil.

1ST HALF/2ND HALF: Has traditionally hit better in the 2nd half as his .308 career average (2955-911) after the All-Star break would attest. His first half career mean is .286 (3287-939).

BASES LOADED: Is batting .429 lifetime (140-60) with the bases loaded, has hit 14 slams (see below) and has scored 182 of 531 runners on base in those situations (34.3%) . . . Last year, however, he hit only .111 (9-1) in bases-loaded situations while scoring only 6 of 36 runners (16.7%).

CLUTCH HITTING: Has a .305 (475-153) lifetime average with 246 walks and 216 strikeouts while batting with runners on 2nd and/or 3rd . . . Over the past 6 seasons ('82 thru '87), he has batted .333 (798-266) in that situation.

BY MONTH: Has hit .300 or more in Sep.-Oct. in 8 of 11 seasons, and has a .312 lifetime average (1303-407) in 342 Sep.-Oct. games with 66 homers and 235 rbi (regular season only).

His best months ever: average—.441 (68-30) in April, '82 . . . home runs—11 in June '78, . . . RBI—30 (in 30 games) in September '80, and 29 (in 28 games) in July '85 . . . EDDIE MURRAY (Cont.) HOME RUNS

Has led team in homers 7 times, but was edged by **Larry Sheets** last year, 31 to 30 . . . Set dub record for career homers (304) with his next-to-last home run of the year (Sep. 12 vs. **Bruce Hurst** at Baltimore), unseating **Boog Powell** who had held that distinction for nearly 18 years (since '69).

Eddie also set a career mark for homers at Memorial Stadium when he erased **Brooks Robinson's** old standard (138) early in the season . . . The record now stands at 151.

His 305 homers in 11 big league seasons, starting 1977, rank 4th in the majors in that span behind: 399—**Mike Schmidt**, 316—**Jim Rice** and 310—**Date Murphy**.

MULTI-HOME RUN GAMES: Had three 2-horner games in '87 and now has hit 2 (15) or 3 (3) homers in a game 18 times including his 2 home runs in the 5th and deciding game of the '83 World Series at Philadelphia off Charlie Hudson . . . That is one more than Frank Robinson's previous club record . Eddie's three 3-homer games match the club record shared by Boog Powell. No Oriole has ever hit more than 3 in one game.

HR/BOTH SIDES: Eddie has homered from each side of the plate in the same game 8 times, second in major league history only to Mickey Mantle's 10 (Reggle Smith is 3rd at 6)... In '87 he became the first ever to do it 2 games in a row when, in Chicago on May 8 and 9, he connected off Jose DeLeon and lefty Ray Searage the first day and against southpaw Joel McKeon and right-hander Bob James the second.

GRAND SLAMS: His string of at least one slam in 6 consecutive seasons ('81-'86) came to an end, one shy of the record (7) held by the late **Vern Stephens** ('44 thru '60), but his 14 lifetime are a club record, a major league mark for switch-hitters and tops among active players (regular season only). His 9 Memorial Stadium home runs with the bases loaded are also a record... See also "Bases Loaded Hitting" under "Average" above.

RUNS BATTED IN

Has led club in rbi 8 times in 11 seasons, including 7 in a row from '80 thru '86, but was 3rd in '87 with 91 behind **Cal Ripken** (97) and **Larry Sheets** (94).

Has averaged 101 rbi in 11 A.L. seasons . . . With 1106 lifetime, he ranks 2nd in club history behind **Brooks Robinson** (1357), having moved past former runner-up **Boog Powell** (1063) last year . . . Has driven in 100 or more 5 times, including 4 in a row ('82 thru '85). Both are club records.

His 1015 during his first 10 years in the majors ('77-'86) qualified him as one of only 19 to have reached the 1000 plateau in their first 10 seasons . . . Tops on that list is Orioles board member **Joe DiMaggio** (1,277).

Eddie ranks 3rd in the majors and 2nd in the A.L. in rbi during his 11 seasons with the O's, as well as during the past 10 years. In the 80s, he is tops in the A.L. and 2nd in the majors only to **Mike Schmidt.**

SWITCH-HITTING

Was a natural right-handed hitter, and continued to hit that way exclusively thru his first 2 pro seasons . . . He made the conversion in 1975 and 1976 under the tutelage of **Cal Ripken Sr.** and **Jim Schaffer**, now a coach with the Royals.

Ironically, he has hit better left-handed 7 times during his 11 years with the O's, and his lifetime average, slugging percentage and home run frequency are all better from the left side:

HR/SWITCH-HITTERS: Eddie ranks 3rd (305) lifetime among all switch hitters, past and present, behind: 1—**Mickey Mantle**—536, 2—**Reggie Smith**—314. **Ken Singleton** (246) is 4th and **Ted Simmons** (242) 5th.

Mantle had nine 30 home run seasons, most among switchers. Eddie is 2nd with 5 and Reggie Smith had 2. They are the only switch-hitters ever to reach that level more than once.

RBI/SWITCH-HITTERS: He already ranks 3rd all time in rbi by a switch hitter (1106) behind Mickey Mantle (1509) and Ted Simmons (1378), and ahead of #4 Reggie Smith (1092) and #5 Ken Singleton (1065).

In '80, he and **Ken Singleton** became only the 2nd pair of switch-hitting teammates to drive in 100 runs each in the same season in 50 years. The other due was **Smith/Simmons** for the Cardinals in '74.

FIELDING

Last year Eddie led A.L. first basemen in total chances (1526) for the 3rd time (also '78, '84) and double plays (146). He was 2nd in assists to (145 to 146), and 2nd in games (156 to 158), both times to the Rangers' **Pete O'Brien** . . . His .983 percentage (10 errors) was 6th among 11 qualifiers.

In addition to leading the league's first basemen in chances 3 times, he's finished 2nd on 4 other occasions ('79, '80, '81, '83).

Topped the league in percentage in both '82 (.9971, 4 e/1370 tc) and '81 (.999, 1 e/991 tc)... Played 113 consecutive errorless games from September 7, '80 until he erred on September 21, '81.

GOLD GLOVES: Won 3 straight awards as A.L.'s best defensive 1st baseman in '82, '83 and '84... Only **George Scott** (8) and **Vic Power** (7) have won more A.L. Gold Gloves at 1st base... Eddie is the only Orioles first baseman ever to win the award (see "Gold Glove Award" on page 38).

OTHER POSITIONS: Defensively, he's played 1st base exclusively starting April 10, '78 . . . He played 3 games at 3rd base in '78 (Apr. 7–8–9, first 3 games of the year) and 3 games in left field in '77.

JEWELS

ALL-STAR GAMES: Has been selected to the All-Star team 7 times, played in 5 games and gone 1-for-10. The hit was a double off rookie **Dwight Gooden** at San Francisco in '84... Was chosen to the team 6 straight times from '81 thru '86, once as a starter ('85) when he beat out **Rod Carew** in the fan balloting . . . He was also named to the squad in '78... See page 81 for more All-Star Game details.

POST-SEASON: Has a .247 composite average in 20 post-season games (73-18) with 5 homers and 13 rbi.

1979: Was leading hitter in the ALCS vs. California (.417, 12-5) and reached safely 10 times in 17 plate appearances . . . Hit a 3-run homer off **Mark Clear** in game #2 . . . Continued hot in the WS vs. Pirates, reaching 7 times in his first 8 plate appearances, and hit a home run off **Bert Blyleven** in the 2nd game . . . Then, he went 0-for-21 in the last 5 games.

1983: Went 0-for-8 in the first 2 games of the ALCS vs. Chicago, extending his post-season hitless string to 7 games (0-for-29) . . . He snapped the slump with gusto in game #3 at Chicago with a 3-run homer in the first inning off **Richard Dotson**, leading the O's to a 11-1 rout . . . Tied LCS record when he scored 4 runs in same game, and went 3-for-5 in the finale (#4).

Went 2-for-16 thru the first 4 games of the WS, then dominated the decisive 5th game, crushing 2 homers (a solo and a 2-run shot), one of them off the scoreboard in right field at Philadelphia's Veterans Stadium . . . Both were hit off **Charlie Hudson**. He went 3-for-4 that evening in the 5-0 victory behind **Scott Mcgregor** that produced a world championship . . . His 5 hits in the WS tied for the lead.

PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

1986: Missed a career-high 25 games when a pulled left hamstring sidelined him for a month from early July to early August . . . Went on the disabled list for the first time in the major leagues . . . Experienced career lows in at least 8 categories because of the involuntary time off, but led the club in batting (.305) for a record 6th time and in rbi (84) for the 7th year in a row (and 8th overall, '78 also), also a team record.

Ranked 4th in the league in on base percentage (.396, 578-229) . . . Hit 2 homers off Cy young Award winner **Roger Clemens** at Baltimore on June 27 . . . **Robin Yount** was the only other to homer twice in a game off **Clemens** . . Eddie also hit 2 homers off Brewers' 20-game winner **Ted Higuers** at Milwaukee on September 25.

1985: Won record 6th MVO award and drove in a career-high 124 rbi, finishing 2nd in A.L. to **Don Mattingly** (145) . . . Was among league leaders in: avg. (10th), hr (6th), runs (3rd), tb (5th), doubles (8th), on-base pct. (5th), slugging pct. (4th), gwrbi (5th, tied with **Cal Ripken**), and extra-base hits (5th).

Surpassed the 20 level in home runs for the 9th straight year, reached 30 for the 4th time and drove in 100+ runs for the 5th time. Tied the Twins' **Kent Hrbek** for the major league lead with 3 grand slams.

Enjoyed his biggest day in baseball on Aug. 26 at Anaheim in O's 17-3 win. Tied club records with 3 homers, 13 total bases and 9 rbi, all in the first 5 innings, while going 4-for-5... Had a 3-run homer in the 1st and an rbi single in the 2nd, both off **John Candelaria**. Then hit a solo homer in the 4th and a grand slam in the 5th, both off **Alan Fowlkes**.

Drew curtain calls, standing ovations and "Edd-eee" cheers from Angels fans . . . Flied deep to center and walked in his final 2 plate appearances.

1984: Led A.L. and tied for M.L. lead in gwrbi (19) and on-base pct. (.410). Led majors with 107 walks and 25 intentional passes.

Was among league leaders in avg. (8th), hr (9th), rbi (5th), total bases (299, 9th), and slugging pct. (10th). Led club in triple crown categories and slugging percentage; tied club record with 22-game hitting streak.

Played every inning of every game (Ripken was only other major leaguer to do so). Won record 5th "Most Valuable Oriole" award.

Played on same team with 4 major leaguers in high school: Gary Alexander (graduated '71), former Giant Rich Murray (his younger brother, graduated '74), Cardinals' shortstop Ozzie Smith, and former Twin Darrell Jackson (both '73 grads). Served as tri-captain with Smith and Jackson senior year. Played Little League, Babe Ruth, and Connie Mack baseball.

PERSONAL: One of 12 children. Has 4 brothers, all of whom have played pro baseball. The youngest brother, **Richard,** played 1st base in the Giants' and Royals' systems before retiring after the '85 season. Saw action with Giants in '80 and '83.

Older brothers **Venice** and **Leon** (also 1st basemen) played in Giants system. The eldest, **Charles**, an outfielder, hit 37 hr and had 119 rbi in California League in '64. Retired after reaching AAA level in Houston organization.

Charity: Has contributed extensively to the community, and earned the Orioles' nominations for the '84 and '85 Roberto Clemente Awards, given annually by Major League Baseball to the player who best exemplifies the game on and off the field.

The tallest of all time was Parson "Beacon" Nicholson, at 6'6", but he played only 10 games at short for the "Pesky Nats" in 1895 when they were in the National League.

Led O's in rbi (98) for first time. In fact, he was first O's rbi pacesetter, other than **Eddie Murray**, since **Ken Singleton** in '79 . . . Led club with 40 tying/lead runs driven in (tied **Murray** with 56 "key rbi" including tie, lead, -1 and +2).

Drew a career high 81 walks . . . Hit .297 (149-44) with men in scoring position (see "Clutch Hitting" below).

Led A.L. shortstops in assists (480) for the 4th time in the last 5 years (see "Fielding" below) . . . Became 1st A.L. shortstop to start 4 straight All-Star games (see "All-Star" below) Was 3rd in O's MVP balloting behind **Larry Sheets** and **Eddie Murray**.

Was hitting .326 (144-47) thru May 16, with 8 homers and 34 rbi in 36 games. The rest of the way, hit only .229 (480-110) with 16 homers and 64 rbi in 126 games . . . After intermission, his average high was .274 (Jul. 21), and his low .248 (Sep. 28–29).

One of 3 current actives with 25+ home runs in each of 6 straight seasons along with Mike Schmidt (9 straight) and Dale Murphy (6 in a row).

Has 394 extra-base hits in past 6 seasons, tops in the A.L. and 2nd in the majors behind **Murphy's** 409 . . . With 211 doubles, he is runner-up in the majors to **Wade Boggs** (218).

Scored 97 runs in '87, and has now scored 625 runs (average 104) over the past 6 seasons. He's one of 5 who has averaged 100+ runs in that period, beginning '82 (Rickey Henderson—691 (115), Dale Murphy—660 (110), Tim Raines—658 (110), Dwight Evans—622 (104).

TOP TEN: Has played 955 games at short, 2nd in the O's record book to **Mark Belanger's** 1897 (**Luis Aparicio** is 3rd at 713).

Is also a ranking member in the following categories: Runs—626 (8th), Hits—1084 (8th), Doubles—211 (7th), Triples—23 (7th tie with Murray), Home Runs—160 (6th), Total Bases—1821 (7th), RBI—570 (5th), Extra-Base Hits—394 (6th), GWRBI—78 (6th).

IRONMAN

CONSECUTIVE GAMES: His 927 consecutive games played represent the 6th longest all-time streak. It began May 30, '82, the day after **Floyd Rayford** had subbed for him at 3rd base in the nightcap of a doubleheader at Baltimore vs. the Blue Jays.

It's been the longest streak in the majors since **Dale Murphy's** 740-game skein ended on July 9, '86.

Previously the 3 longest streaks in O's history were by **Brooks Robinson** (463), **Eddie Murray** (444), and **Billy Gardner** (361) . . . Orioles who have played every game in at least one season: **Brooks**—4 times, **Murray**—3 times, **Gardner** and **Bobby Grich**, once each.

CONSECUTIVE INNINGS: His string of 8,243 straight innings, believed to be the longest of its kind in major league history, ended Sep. 14, '87 at Toronto when he did not take the field for the bottom of the 8th (**Ron Washington** replaced him at shortstop). That was the game in which the Jays hit a major league record 10 homers enroute to an 18-3 win.

He later missed 8 innings more, on Sep. 25, when **Tim Welke** ejected him in the bottom of the 1st inning of a game vs. the Yankees.

The streak began June 5, '82 at Minnesota (6 days and 5 games after start of his consecutive games string)... The day before, June 4, **Jim Dwyer** had pinch-hit for him in the 9th, also at Minny. The 82 post-season innings he played in '83 are **NOT** included in the figures above.

At the time both the games and innings streaks began, he was playing 3rd base. He moved to shortstop July 1, '82. Thus, since that transition, he has missed only 9 innings defensively at shortstop.

Noted baseball researcher **L. Robert Davids** has determined that Cal has long since erased the existing record for consecutive innings. The previous leaders were a couple of Red Sox who played in Boston in the early 1900s, **Buck Freeman** and **Candy LaChance** . . The Carmines' distinguished road secretary, **Jack Rogers**, remembers them well as a couple of guys who lived in South Boston and loved their beer. **Jack** recalls that they always greeted each other by saying, "Hi, neighbor, have a 'gansett."

Freeman, a 1st baseman, played every inning over some 534 games (7/28/01–6/5/05) and outfielder **LaChance** played in every inning over a period of 424 games (5/23/02–4/28/05).

Rip, whose inning streak ran for 51/2 seasons, was the first to have played every inning for at least 2 years since **Rudy York** in '40-'41... In addition to Cal, **LaChance**, and **Freeman**, only one other major leaguer has played every inning for at least 3 seasons (not consecutive). That was **Mickey Vernon** in '42, '47 & '53 with the Pesky Nats. The only other Oriole to play every inning in one season was **Eddie Murray** in '84 (including 3 games as dh).

He finished 2nd in percentage by .001 in fielding percentage (.982 to .983) to Toronto's Tony Fernandez in '86.

Since taking over at shortstop for the O's on July 1, '82, he has missed only 9 innings defensively.

ASSISTS RECORD: In '84 he established an A.L. record with 583 assists, breaking **Roy Smalley's** '79 mark of 572. That year, he also led major league shortstops in assists as well as in total chances (906).

TOTAL CHANCES: His 880 successful total chances in '84 (excluding errors) were the most by an A.L. shortstop since the Twins' Leo Cardenas handled the same number in '69. The only major league shortstop to have handled more net chances in one season since World War II was the Cardinals' Ozzie Smith (909 in '80). The major league record is 984 by the Giants' Dave Bancroft ('22).

He led league in net chances in both '83 & '84, and was edged by one chance in '85 (by **Tony Fernandez**, Toronto) . . . Finished 3rd in '86 and 2nd last year.

3RD BASE: Played both 3rd and short after first coming up in August '81, but started '82 as O's regular 3rd baseman . . . In 77 games at 3rd ('81-6, '82-71), has a .970 percentage (TC-232, E-7).

Played there the last time July 8, '82 at Seattle after starting game at shortstop . . . Started last time at 3rd on June 30, '82 in Baltimore vs. Cleveland.

ERRORLESS GAMES: Had a string of 37 straight errorless games at short in '87 (6/28 thru 8/9), and a 44-game errorless string at 3rd base in '82 (4/24 thru 6/14).

BATTING MISCELLANY

THE CYCLE: He and **Brooks Robinson** are the only Orioles ever to hit for the cycle in the club's 34 Balmer seasons. Rip did it in Texas on May 6, '84. Homered off **Dave Tobik** on final at bat to complete the job . . . Went 4-for-5 with 2 rbi . . . **Brooks** cycled at Chicago on July 15, '80.

IN THE CLUTCH: Hit .297 (149-44) with runners in scoring position in '87 and now has a .289 (931-269) lifetime average in that category . . . Ranks 17th on the career gwrbi list with 77 despite the fact that his career didn't start in earnest until '82 and the rule went into effect in '80 . . . Everyone in front of him on the gwrbi list has been playing regularly at least as far back as '80.

Has led O's in tying/go ahead rbi in each of last 2 years ('86-33, '87-40).

HOME RUNS: Has been amazingly consistent in annual home run production . . His totals in 6 full years, starting '82 are: 28, 27, 27, 26, 25, 27 See "Individual Batting, '87 & lifetime" on page 75 . . . See also "O's Lifetime Home Runs in Each Park," page 77.

VS. OPPONENTS: His .340 career average vs. Twins (282-96) is best vs. against one opponent . . . His .378 (148-56) lifetime average at the Metrodome is his best in one ballpark.

Other highs—Home Runs: 19 vs. Chicago . . . RBI: 57 vs. Milwaukee and 55 against Chicago . . . See page 75 for more details . . . See also "O's vs. Opponents" for notes on Cal's performances vs. each A.L. club.

ARTIFICIAL SURFACE: Has .310 lifetime average on A.L. artificial surfaces (600-186).

JAPAN TRIPS: He has a .353 average (68-24) in 2 trips to Japan. No wonder the Taiyo Whales (Yokohama, Central League) and, reportedly, 2 other Japanese teams, displayed interest in signing him last winter.

Made his 2nd trip to Japan in fall of '86 with a U.S. Major League All-Star Team that went 6-1 against an assortment of all-stars from Japan's Central and Pacific leagues . . . Cal led the team in hitting (.500, 14-7, 2bh-2, hr-2, rbi-6) while splitting shortstop duties with the Cardinals' Ozzie Smith.

Pirates' catcher **Tony Pena** was elected MVP after catching all but 6 innings on the tour (the only other catcher was **Rich Gedman** who was injured early on the trip). Blue Jays outfielder **Jesse Barfield** led the Americans with 4 homers and 9 rbi while batting .450 (20-9).

Cal accompanied the Orioles on a 14-game trip in '84 and batted .315 (54-17) with 4 homers and 9 rbi as the O's went 8-5-1.

MAJOR HONORS AND AWARDS

ALL-STAR GAMES: Has been elected to A.L.'s starting lineup for 4 straight years, a record for junior circuit shortstops... Only others at that position to have earned more starting nods are a couple of Cardinals: **Marty Marion** (5, '43–'47) and **Ozzie Smith** (5, '83–'87).

The only other Oriole with 4 consecutive starting assignments in All-Star competition was **Brooks Robinson** ('71 thru '74) . . . Last year, Cal 's vote total (1,511,103) ranked 2nd in the A.L. behind **Wade Boggs'** 1,529,819 and 5th in majors (**Ozzie Smith**—2,254,409, **Mike Schmidt**—1,818,905, **Eric Davis**—1,810,391 were 1-2-3 in N.L.).

Cal received more votes than any other American League player in both '85 (1,398,901) and '86 (1,486,806), beating out runner-up **George Brett** each year. In '86, he was 2nd in the majors behind the Mets' **Darryl Strawberry** (1,619,511).

He was 3rd in '84 behind #1 **Brett** and #2 **Lance Parrish**, but beat out **Alan Trammell** for the starting nod at short. Cal made his All-Star debut in '83 as a defensive replacement for **Robin Yount** after being appointed to the squad.

He's 2-for-12 in 5 games . . . His first hit was a single off **Nolan Ryan** at Minnesota in '85 . . . His 2nd was also a single, off the Cubs' **Rick Sutcliffe** last year in Oakland.

MOST VALUABLE PLAYER, '83: Rip shaded teammate Eddie Murray, 322 to 290 as O's finished 1-2 in balloting . . . That wasn't unprecedented for the O's, however. In '66, Frank, Brooks and Boog were 1-2-3 (and Luis Aparicio was 9th).

Cal & **Eddie** were the only players listed on every '83 ballot. Cal's vote: 1st-15, 2nd-9, 3rd-3, 4th-1 (system: 1st place-14 points, 2nd-9 points, 3rd-8, 4th-7, etc.).

Became first to win "Rookie" and MVP honors in back-to-back years. **Fred Lynn,** of course, had gone him one better in '75 by capturing both awards in the same year.

"ROOKIE OF THE YEAR": In '82 he registered 132 points (5·3-1 system) to beat out Twins' **Kent Hrbek** (90 points), the only other player named on all ballots. **Wade Boggs** was 3rd (10¹/2 points). Rip polled 24 1sts and 4 2nds while Hrbek received 4 1sts, 23 2nds and a 3rd..

He was the 5th Oriole to win BBWAA "Rookie" honors: Ron Hansen ('60), Curt Blefary ('63), Al Bumbry ('73) and Eddie Murray ('77).

"PLAYER OF THE YEAR": Chosen Major League "Player of the Year" in '83 by The Sporting News, and A.L. "Player of the Year" by both TSN and Baseball America.

"MOST VALUABLE ORIOLE": Was co-winner of MVO award with Eddie Murray in '83, has finished 2nd twice ('85, '86) and 3rd three times ('82, '84, '87) in 6 full seasons. Last year he finished behind **Sheets & Murray**.

Was runner-up to **Murray** in '85 and to **Don Aase** in '86 . . . Was out-polled by **Murray** and **Jim Palmer** in '82, and by **Murray** and **Mike Boddicker** in '84

OTHERS: Picked as shortstop on A.P. Major League All-Star, TSN A.L. All-Star and TSN/Hillerich & Bradsby "Silver Slugger" teams (to outstanding offensive players at each defensive position) each of 4 straight years ('83 thru '86).

PREVIOUS HIGHLIGHTS BY YEAR

1986 SEASON: Led major league shortstops for 4th straight year in homers (25), rbi (81), runs (98) and slugging (.461) . . . Was 2nd in fielding pct. to Jays' **Tony Fernandez** (.982 to .983) . . . Tied for league lead with Yankees' **Don Mattingly** in gwrbi (15).

CAL RIPKEN JR. (Cont.)

1984 SEASON: Batted over .300 for 2nd straight year (.304) . . . Set A.L. record in assists (583) . . . Went as long as 3 games without a hit only once . . . Led O's regulars with men in scoring position (.311, 148-55) . . . Batted .355 (242-86) over 60 games from June 27 thru Sep. 1.

Hit .372 (258-96) with 16 homers and 41 rbi over 63 games from Sep. 1, '83 thru May 9, '84 . . . Led major league shortstops in chances with 908 and net chances (880), most in A.L. since **Chico Cardenas** in '69.

1983 SEASON: Was A.L. MVP and TSN "Player of the Year" and shared MVO laurels with **Eddie Murray**. Played on A.L.'s first winning All-Star team since '71 and also played on winning team in both ALCS & World Series.

Stretch Run: During 44 games from Aug. 13 thru Sep. 25, a period in which the O's went 34-10 to win the eastern division championship, Rip hit .391 (192-75) with 14 doubles, 9 homers, 30 rbi and 40 runs scored.

ALCS/WS: Batted a combined .273 (33-9) in 9 post-season games . . . Drove in O's only run in 9th inning ALCS game #1, won by LaMarr Hoyt, 2-1. Made final putout of WS when he caught Garry Maddox' line drive in bottom of 9th of game #5.

1982 SEASON: Led all major league rookies in doubles (32), homers (28), rbi (93), total bases (284), gwrbi (11, tie with **Von Hayes**), games (160), at bats (598) and runs (90).

Missed only 3 games all year, none after May 29 (the day his games streak started) . . . Played 44 straight errorless games at 3rd base from Apr. 24 thru June 14 . . . Registed his first big league stolen base the hard way, stealing home on the front end of a double steal with **Lenn Sakata** off Rangers' **Jon Matlack** on May 31 at Baltimore.

Slow Start: After a glittering opening day on which he went 3-for-5 with his 1st big league double, homer (off KC's Dennis Leonard) and rbi, Rip plunged into deep slump (55-4). He was batting only .117 (60-7) on May 1 after 18 games on the year . . . And over 2 seasons, he was hitting just .121 lifetime (99-12) in 41 major league games.

Start of Something Big: The next day, May 2, he picked up a pair of scratch hits and was beaned by fellow rookie, Mike Moore, but missed only one game. His comeback began in earnest May 6 . . . He hit .281 (538-151) from May 2 to the end of the season.

He contributes 25 tickets for every Orioles home game to the "Because We Care" Program (**Eddie Murray** does too). This year he will serve as honorary chairman of the Easter Seals Volleyball Tournament.

Has also made significant contributions to: the Harford Center, a day-care facility for retarded citizens; the Harford County Humane Society, and to the School for the Performing Arts in Baltimore.

In prior years, has served as honorary chairman of the American Lung Association's anti-smoking campaign, of the Easter Seals and March of Dimes campaigns as well as for the United Way Softball Marathon.

He has been the regional spokesman for the Middle Atlantic Milk Marketing Association, and has also worked on behalf of Project Survival, the Baltimore Symphony, and the Johns Hopkins Hospital's Children's Center.

PERSONAL: Plays for the Orioles' basketball team during the off-season. Cal and the former **Kelly Geer** were married last November 13 . . . A total of 75 have played the "hot corner" for the O's during their 34 Baltimore seasons. Brooks appeared in a major league record 2,871 games there, but only 3 other Orioles have played 200 games at 3rd base for the Orioles: **Doug DeCinces** (792), **Rich Dauer** (242), and **Floyd Rayford** (204). . . . MAJOR LEAGUE DEBUT: Called up July 11 (Rick Burleson released to accommodate him on roster) . . . Made his debut that day and O's lost while he went 0-for-3 with a walk vs. Twins. However, Birds then won next 11 straight with him as starting 2nd baseman.

Played 58 straight games from July 11 to Sep. 15, when his season ended at Toronto after he tore lateral ligament in right ankle while fielding ground ball behind 2nd base (caught spikes in artificial turf) in 1st inning. This happened the day after Cal Junior's consecutive-inning string ended during the 18-3 rout by the Blue Jays, who hit a major league record 10 homers.

Until the day of his injury, O's went 28-29, .491 with Bill in starting lineup (excluding his final game because he was hurt in 1st inning). Without him, they were 39-66, .371 . . . From the All-Star break to Sep. 15, he ranked 3rd in the league in hits (72, tied with Robin Yount) behind Paul Molitor (89) and Kevin Seitzer (79).

Reached a high of .323 (127-41) on Aug. 14 . . . From Aug. 6 thru Sep. 15, a span of nearly 6 weeks, his average remained over .300 for all but 2 days. Hit safely in 44 of 58 games, and batted .330 (212-70) in 51 games from the All-Star break thru Sep. 9 . . . After his first 2 games, when he hit 7th and 9th, he batted exclusively in the #2 position.

Registered his first big league hit in his 3rd game after going 0-for-6 . . . It was a double high off left field fence at K.C., first time up on July 16 off Charlie Leibrandt. The drive missed being a home run by about a foot.

Hit his first home run 3 days later, also at K.C., on July 19 with 2 aboard off Bud Black. It was not only his first big league homer, it was his first of the year anywhere. He had not homered in 74 games at Rochester.

His 2nd (and last homer) was also a 3-run shot, on Aug. 22 at Seattle off Scott Bankhead. That day he went 3-for-3, had a double and sac fly as well as a homer, walked once and drove in 5 runs.

MAJOR LEAGUE FIELDING: Did an outstanding job at 2nd base Committed only 3 errors in 298 chances (.990 pct.) . . . Did not make his first error until his 26th game (Aug. 10). That was probably his most impressive game defensively. Despite the error (which was a tough one), he handled 15 chances that night and had been credited with 115 chances at the time the error was charged. The night he made his 2nd error, Sep. 7, Bill handled 12 other chances flawlessly.

That first boot was unique The Indians' Tommy Hinzo's sac bunt was literally kicked toward 1st base by Mark Williamson as Brett Butler went to 2nd. Bill picked up the ball on the run and tried to tag Hinzo before he reached first, but they collided (Hinzo's body and Bill's head) and the ball was jarred loose. An error had to be charged to account for Butler advancing from 2nd to 3rd after the ball came out of Bill's glove. He was stunned by the collision, but remained in the game.

Participated in 53 double plays, 38 of them in collaboration with his

MINORS/ROCHESTER: Beginning with Hagerstown where he hit .255 in '85, his average has improved every time he moved up in classification: Charlotte '86-.268, Rochester '87-.286, Baltimore '87-.309 . . . Batted .240 (1456-350) in 4 minor league seasons prior to '87.

Just before he was called up, he went 6-for-6 in a doubleheader vs. Columbus (July 7), and raised his average from .268 to .284 . . . That was part of a 9-for-10 stretch.

SPRING TRAINING: Batted .333 (12-4), had a .467 (15-7) on-base percentage and made no errors in spring exhibitions before he was assigned to the O's minor league camp on Mar. 23.

PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

FAMILY FIRST: The first time the Ripkens were united professionally was in a split-squad exhibition at Ft. Myers vs. the Royals on Mar. 15, '86. Bill had joined the club from the minor league complex just for the day and paired with Cal Junior at the keystone while Cal Senior managed the club. Another highlight of that spring training for Bill was a home run off the eventual O's MVP, Don Aase, in a "B" game.

INJURIES: Progress has been slowed by a series of injuries including tendinitis in right forearm, sore left shoulder, and 2 broken fingers in the minors, plus the torn ligament in the right ankle at the big league level last year. Played only 75 games in his first 2 years.

GENERAL: Began career as shortstop, but did play some 2nd and 3rd base in '85 at Hagerstown.

CHARLOTTE '86: In his first full season at the keystone, '86 at Charlotte, he was named to the Southern League All Star team and topped all 2nd basemen peers in games (141), chances (723), putouts (305), assists (395) and double plays (79) . . . Also had a string of 31 consecutive errorless games that year.

Missed only 3 games all year while leading the club and setting a career high in games played as well as average (.268) and 9 other categories Was 2nd on club to Chris Padgett in hits (142 to 152) . . . Was batting .276 until a 1-for-19 at the end brought him down to .268.

The biggest deficit the O's have ever overcome to win a ballgame is $8\dots$ They trailed the Carmines at Boston on Sep. 2, '56 by 0-8 after $2^{1/2}$ innings, but came back to win 11-10 with a 3-run rally in the top of the 9th. The winner was **Billy Loes** and the gwrbi was produced by the late Bob Nieman.

The biggest lead they've blown (and lost the game) is also 8, the same year. They d the Indians 9-1 after 3½ at Cleveland on June 27, '56, but lost 12-11 in 11 innings. Hal Brown took the loss.

The major league record for coming from behind is 12, on June 11, '11 by the Tigers who spotted the White Sox a 13-1 lead before storming back to win 16-15.

In recent years, the most dramatic winning rally was staged by the Indians at Cleveland on Sep. 28, '84. They were down to the Twins 10-0 after 3 innings, but won 11-10. The Twins were in the midst of a 10-game losing streak at the time

Richie Bancells (32), is already in his 12th season with the organization and his 5th with the big club. This is his first year as the Orioles' head trainer. Prior to coming to Baltimore in '84, Richie served as head trainer/traveling secretary for the Rochester Red Wings for 4 seasons, but began assisting Ralph Salvon in spring training as early as '80.

A Key West native, he is a graduate of Miami's Biscayne College (now St. Thomas University where the O's minor league clubs train), holds an M.S. in physical education from Eastern Kentucky University (Richmond, KY), and is certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association (N.A.T.A.).

Richie first joined the Baltimore organization as assistant trainer for the Miami O's (Florida State League) in '77, and served as head trainer at Bluefield (Appalachian League) in '78-'79.

He and his wife, **Carol**, have two children: **Christopher** (July 8, '80) and **Andrea** (Aug. 18, '85). They live in Joppa, MD (Harford County), north of Baltimore.

Ralph Salvon (60), the senior trainer in the American League, is now in his 23rd season in Baltimore since joining the O's as an assistant trainer in '66 (to **Eddie Weidner**). He was head trainer for 20 years, from '68 thru '87.

Ralph has been a baseball trainer for 36 years since graduating from **Gus Mauch's** Trainers School in '52, and has logged a total of 32 years in the Orioles organization, including one year-'53-with the Orioles' predecessors, the St. Louis Browns.

He worked in the farm system from '53 thru '61, then went to the Houston Astros for the next 4 years before returning in '66

SPRING TRAINING NOTES

This is the 30th consecutive spring that the Orioles have trained in Miami. Only 5 other clubs have been in their present spring homes for a longer period of time: Detroit (Lakeland since '46); St. Louis (St. Petersburg since 46); Philadelphia (Clearwater since '47); Cleveland (Tucson since '47) and Los Angeles (Vero Beach since '48).

Over the last 29 years, approximately 1.2 million fans have watched the Birds in exhibition games at Miami Stadium. Last year the Orioles drew 54,749 in 16 Miami Stadium dates, an average of 3,422. The permanent capacity at Miami Stadium is 9,548, but the Orioles and Yankees drew a standing-room-only crowd of 12,464 for a Sunday afternoon game on March 14, '65
