Two members of the front office staff, who joined the Orioles prior to the first season in Baltimore ('54), have remained with the club throughout its 35 year history: **Joe Hamper**, vice president/finance and **Joe Codd**, assistant ticket manager.

BIRDS' FIRST GAME IN BALTIMORE IN '54

The modern American League Orioles made their Baltimore debut in Memorial Stadium on Apr. 15, 1954 before a crowd of 46,354 including Vice President Richard M. Nixon who threw out the first ball. Behind the seven hit pitching of Bob Turley who fanned nine, the Orioles of Jimmy Dykes defeated Paul Richards' White Sox, 3-1, in Baltimore's first American League game in 52 years. Chico Carrasquel, the Chicago shortstop, was the first to bat in the new stadium and singled off Turley.

Clint Courtney won the distinction of hitting the first home run in the brand new stadium (built on the site of the previous municipally owned ballpark used by the International League O's). It was a bases empty blast off Virgil Trucks who also yielded a solo homer to Vern Stephens in the fourth and was the losing pitcher.

The Birds' starting lineup in that game was: Bobby Young, 2b: Eddie Waitkus, 1b; Gil Coan, cf; Vic Wertz, rf; Sam Mele, If; Stephens, 3b; Billy Hunter, ss; Courtney, c and Turley, p.

LEGACY

Edward Bennett Williams (1920–1988), renowned the world over as both an attorney and a sportsman, owned the Orioles and served as board chairman from November 1979 until he died last August 13 at the age of 68 after a courageous 11 year battle against cancer.

Under Ed Williams' stewardship as Orioles' owner, the club experienced an unprecedented explosion of enthusiasm, loyalty and love. One of the personal high points of his life was bringing home to Baltimore the world championship in 1983. He loved the community, and had the highest admiration and respect for the spirit of the Orioles fans.

Prominent among his many accomplishments in law and sports, was his action that guaranteed the Orioles would remain in Baltimore well into the 21st century by honoring his commitment to sign a long-term lease at the planned new downtown stadium.

When that state-of-the-art baseball-only facility is completed at Camden Yards in 1992, it will stand as Ed Williams' lasting contribution to the Orioles, their fans and the entire State of Maryland. Without his vision, and his whole hearted support, it could not have happened.

Personally, he was a life-long champion of equality and justice. He led the successful effort to integrate the Washington, D.C. Bar Association, and he was in the forefront of affirmative action in baseball, and, as president of the Redskins, in football as well.

Edward Bennett Williams' life, with his unrelenting dedication to winning, symbolized the Orioles's commitment to excellence, both on and off the field.

ORIOLES SALE

Agnes Neill Williams, who succeeded her late husband as chairman of the board of the Orioles, announced last December 6 that agreement had been reached to sell the Orioles for approximately \$70 million to a group of investors with three things in common: a love of baseball, an association with the Baltimore area, and degrees from Yale University Law School.

This group of three includes: private investor **Eli Jacobs**, 51, who is to be the principal shareholder; current Orioles President **Larry Lucchino**, 43; and Westminster, MD native **R. Sargent Shriver**, 72, a practicing attorney who is also president of Special Olympics International.

Before the sale becomes official, it must be evaluated by an eight person owners' committee, and then approved by at least three-fourths of the American League franchises (11 of 14) and a majority of the National League clubs (7 of 12). A final vote was expected to be taken at the next major league meeting in Ft. Lauderdale on March 10, or at a special meeting shortly thereafter

At a get-together with reporters from the Baltimore Evening Sun and The Sun on December 8, two days after the agreement was announced, Mr. Jacobs, a 6'3" former sandlot 3rd baseman stated that:

(1) He is committed to keeping the ballclub in Baltimore. "We're expecting to be in Baltimore forever. Larry (Lucchino) talks about being here into the 22nd century . . . it's unthinkable to move outside of Baltimore," and

(2) He will rely on management to run the club on his behalf.

3) "Our commitment is to build a winning team in Baltimore, and we're going to do it the old fashioned way, one step at a time . . . Investment objectives will come second."

Mr. Jacobs whose company, E.S. Jacobs & Co., is headquartered in New York City, is chairman of the board of Memorex-Telex, the second largest manufacturer of computer peripheral equipment in the world, and reportedly owns a controlling interest in companies whose annual revenues exceed \$5 billion

He has had extensive business ties to Baltimore and Maryland, and currently serves on the board of directors of the Times-Mirror Company, owner of the Baltimore Sunpapers.

Mr. Jacobs, born Oct. 5, '37 in Cambridge, MA, grew up in Newton, west of Boston, an ardent Red Sox fan . . . He is a graduate of Phillips Academy, Andover, MA and Yale College (class of '59) as well as Yale University Law School . . . As an undergraduate he served as managing editor of the Yale Daily News . . . During a two year tour of duty in the U.S. Army, he was stationed for a considerable period at Ft. Holabird in Baltimore.

Mr. Lucchino, who earned a degree at Princeton before graduating from law school at Yale, will continue to serve as the Orioles president and chief executive officer (see his biography on page xx).

Mr. Shriver, a long-time Orioles fan who now lives in Potomac, MD, was the first executive director of the Peace Corps, from its inception in '61 during the administration of his brother-in-law, President John F. Kennedy, until '66. He served as U.S. Ambassador to France from '68 to '70, and in '72 ran as the Democratic nominee for the vice-presidency.

ORIOLES OFFICERS

LAWRENCE LUCCHINO, 43 (9/6/45) was appointed acting president by Edward Bennett Williams in May, 1988, and succeeded him as the club's chief executive following Mr. Williams' death.

Prior to becoming president, a position he will continue to hold when the new ownership group assumes control of the franchise, he had been vice-president/general counsel and a member of the board, beginning in 1979 when Williams purchased the ballclub.

During his 10 years as an Orioles officer, he held wide ranging responsibilities that included: developing and coordinating the company's marketing policy; negotiating major business and player contracts; serving as the Orioles' principal representative in ongoing negotiations with the Maryland Stadium Authority regarding the new downtown ballpark, and representing the club at American League and major league meetings.

He is a partner at **William & Connolly**, the firm founded by Mr. Williams, where he has specialized in sports law and litigation. Larry was also secretary/general counsel and a member of the board of directors of the Washington Redskins from '78 thru '85.

Born and raised in Pittsburgh, PA, he was all-city in basketball and a second baseman on the city championship baseball team at Taylor Allderdice High School (Class of '63). He graduated cum laude from Princeton University in '67, and was a '72 graduate of Yale University Law School.

While at Princeton, he was a varsity basketball letterman on two lvy League championship teams, coached by **Butch Van Breda Kolff.** As a sophomore, he was a teammate of U.S. Senator **Bill Bradley** who led the team to the Final Four tournament.

In Larry's senior year, the Tigers were 23-3, the best record in Princeton basketball history. He has had the unique sports distinction of receiving a World Series ring (Orioles '83), a Super Bowl ring (Redskins '83) and an NCAA "Final Four" watch (Princeton '65).

He is a member of the Bar of the District of Columbia, California and Pennsylvania. He is a bachelor.

O'S ARE YOUNGEST TEAM IN MAJORS

The O's opened '89 spring training with the youngest roster in the major leagues, and the team's youngest in 24 years.

The average age of the Orioles on the major league roster was 26 years, one month, a shade younger than AL East division rivals Toronto (26 years, 6 months) and Milwaukee (26-9).

At the other end of the spectrum, Houston ranked last with an average of 28 years, 11 months. Three AL teams: Boston, Detroit and New York, were tied for next-to-oldest at 28 years, 8 months.

Williams to succeed Hank Peters as Orioles' vice president & general manager/baseball operations at a dramatic Memorial Stadium press conference on Nov. 10, '87. It was a day of several significant personnel appointments that marked, in Mr. Williams' words, "the end of the beginning" of the Orioles' rebuilding program. Roland is now into his 2nd hectic season as chief engineer of that project.

Roland's baseball career dates back some 38 years to 1951, when he was appointed general manager of the Hartford Braves in the Eastern League following a 4-year tour of duty in the U.S. Coast Guard . . . At the end of that season he was promoted to the parent Boston Braves, where he worked for **John Mullen** (now with Atlanta Braves) . . . In '53, Roland accompanied the Braves' franchise to Milwaukee.

In Dec. '60, former Braves Manager **Fred Haney** became the 1st California Angels' general manager, and less than a month later, Roland joined him as scouting and farm director.

On Sep. 14, '70, he was appointed director of (major league) player personnel for the White Sox who were well on their way to a 56-106 final record season . . At the same time, the Sox hired, at his urging, his former Angels' organization colleague, **Chuck Tanner**, as manager. At their 1st winter meeting, the 2 newcomers moved 16 players in the 1st 18 hours of the convention in Los Angeles.

In their 1st 2 full seasons, the **Hemond/Tanner** combine brought the Sox in 3rd ('71) and 2nd ('72). The Sox went 87-67 in '72 and Roland won the 1st of his 2 "major league executive of the year" awards.

He became a vice president in July '73, in the **John Allyn** administration, then worked with **Bill Veeck** from Dec. '75, when the latter bought the club, until Jan. '81 . . . After **Jerry Reinsdorf** and **Eddie Einhorn** purchased the tranchise from **Veeck**, they promoted him to executive vice president for baseball operations.

Roland earned his 2nd "major league executive" trophy in '83 after his White Sox won the Western Division championship by a record 20 games (biggest winning margin in either league since the divisional system was adopted in '69).

He was replaced in Oct. '85 by **Ken Harrelson**, but remained with the Sox in a consulting capacity for a time as "special assistant to the chairman and presideht." Seven months later, in May '86, he joined the commissioner's office and remained there thru 2 baseball seasons before joining the Orioles.

Personal: Born Oct. 26, '29 in Central Falls, Rhode Island . . . His mother was French-Canadian, and his father's family is of French descent.

Married Margo Quinn Nov. 8, '58 . . . They have 5 children: Susan (1/3/60), Tere (12/27/61), Robert (4/20/64), Jay (12/11/65), and Ryan (12/11/72)

(12/11/72). The Hemonds are truly a baseball family. **Margo's** father was **John Quinn**, a major league g.m. for 28 seasons—1st with the Braves for 14 years (Boston & Milwaukee), then with the Phillies for 14 more (to '72) . . . **Quinn** won 3 pennants with the Braves ('48, '57, '58) . . . Born in '08, he went to work in '32 with the Red Sox, who were then operated by his father.

In addition to **Margo**, **John Quinn's** children include: **Susan**, who worked for the Angels and was **Roland's** secretary for a number of years; **Bob**, the Yankees' general manager, and **Jack**, president of the St. Louis Blues hockey team.

ROBERT R. AYLWARD, 35 (5/23/53), is the Orioles vice president/ business affairs charged with implementing the club's marketing and sales programs, maintaining liaison with Baltimore City on issues relating to Memorial Stadium, and administering the club's broadcast policy. He was one of the principal organizers of the very successful "Orioles Designated Hitters," the volunteer group, created in 1980, that represents the club in the sale of season tickets.

He currently spends most of his time working with representatives of the Maryland Stadium Authority and the HOK architectural firm on the design of the new hallbark.

Aylward is a graduate of Vanderbilt University (Nashville, TN) and also attended Ohio University (Athens) where he was enrolled in the graduate program for sports administration. He first joined the Orioles as an intern in the ticket department while at Ohio University, and has been here ever since except for one year ('77) spent with the Columbus, OH Clippers, then the Pirates AAA farm club in the International League.

He grew up in Pace, MS, and attended McCallie School in Chattanooga, TN where he played baseball and was team captain, mvp and all-city in basketball his senior year. He is married to the former **Elizabeth (Betsy) Hoppes** who also attended Vanderbilt and earned a PhD in psychology from Cornell University. . . . The Aylwards have a daughter, **Laura** (5/7/85).

JOSEPH P. HAMPER JR., 63 (1/28/26), vice president/finance, is the Orioles most senior staff member . . . He is now in his 36th year with the ballclub, since he was hired as an accountant in February 1954. He became controller in 1958 and a vice president in Oct. 1966. He is treasurer of the Baltimore Orioles Foundation, and was secretary of the company under previous ownership, from 1966 thru 1979.

He also served as executive vice president of the Baltimore Bays (North American Soccer League), a wholly owned subsidiary of the Orioles from 1967 through 1969.

A certified public accountant, Hamper has attended the Johns Hopkins University . . . During World War II, he was an infantryman in the U.S. Army, and spent three months as a prisoner of war in Germany. He is a bachelor and lives in Phoenix, MD, north of Baltimore.

CALVIN HILL, 42 (1/2/47), a Baltimore native, was appointed vice president/administrative personnel on November 10, '87. He first joined the Orioles in July, '87 when **Edward Bennett Williams** appointed him to the board of directors.

He is a graduate of the Riverdale Country School in New York City and of Yale University, and also attended Southern Methodist University's Perkins School of Theology . . . He currently serves as chairman of the Yale University Council's Committee on Athletics and on the executive committee of the university's development board. He is also a member of the board of the Riverdale Country School.

Hill was a standout running back at Yale and in the National Football League with the Dallas Cowboys, Washington Redskins and Cleveland Browns. He was the Cowboys first round draft choice the year he graduated from Yale ('69), and in his first season earned both NFL Rookie of the Year and All Pro honors. During his pro career which spanned 13 seasons, from 1969 thru 1981, he played in four pro bowls and two Super Bowls.

ROBERT J. FLANAGAN, 32 (4/28/56), is secretary-treasurer and a member of the executive committee of the board of directors. He is responsible directly to the chairman of the board on fiscal matters affecting the Orioles

Flanagan is a native of Summit, N.J. and a 1974 graduate of Summit High School where he was a classmate of Kansas City Royals outfielder Willie Wilson. He graduated from Georgetown University's School of Business Administration in 1978, and remains active on the school's behalf as a member of the alumni board of governors. While an undergraduate, he served as the president of Alpha Sigma Nu, the National Jesuit Honor Society. In December 1985, he earned an M.S. Degree in Taxation at the American University Kogod School of Business.

Flanagan is a certified public accountant and a member of the D.C. Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Before joining the Orioles, he spent three years with Arthur Anderson & Co. in Washington.

He and his wife, Liz, were married November 26, 1983. They live in Bethesda, MD with their son, Patrick (4/8/88).

LOUIS I. MICHAELSON, 51 (6/1/37), vice-president for sales is responsible for implementing season ticket and group sales strategies and for directing and administering the Designated Hitter program. He has also coordinated the development of Orioles baseball stores in Washington, DC; Seabrook, MD and York, PA.

Lou joined the Orioles in '83 after 16 years with the Social Security Administration. However, his association with the ballclub began in October '79 when he became a charter member of a brand new organization called the Orioles Designated Hitters . . . He went on to earn the top sales award in each of the DHs first 4 years.

He is a member of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, and is a former vice president and director of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation of Maryland. He is also a past president of B'nai B'rith, State of Maryland, and has served as a governor of B'nai B'rith, Southeastern U.S.

The O's did win that game, 3-1 over the White Sox (see also "O's first game in Baltimore," page 3).

FARM SYSTEM—1988

Rochester's first Governor's Cup (AAA International League championship) since '74, 2 individual league batting titles, and Hagerstown's three 50 base stealers highlighted the Orioles '88 minor league season. And, while the Red Wings were the only Orioles' farm club to advance to post-season, both Hagerstown (Carolina, A) and Erie (NY-Penn, A) weren't eliminated from their respective races until the final day of the season. The O's 5 farm teams combined for a 295-278 (.515) record, 12th among the 26 major league clubs.

Rochester's 77-64 record was the club's best since '76. The Wings defeated Tidewater, 3 games to 1 in the best-of-5 IL championship series. In the process, Rochester held the Mets to 8 runs in 4 games. The O's advanced to the Triple A Alliance Championship series, but lost 4 games to 2 to Indianapolis (Expos) of the American Association. The Wings won the first 2 games of the series allowing only 2 runs, but lost the next 4.

Red Wings' manager **Johnny Oates** (named as a coach for the Orioles on Oct. 4) was named "Manager of the Year" in the International League as selected by league managers, players and media. The same group selected 3B **Craig Worthington** the league's "Most Valuable Player" and OF **Steve Finley** "Rookie of the Year."

Worthington was 2nd in the league in rbi (73) and tied for 2nd in homers (16). Finley, after starting the season at Class A Hagerstown, became Rochester's first league batting champion since Rich Dauer in '76. Finley's .314 average was 18 points higher than the next qualifying hitter. His 143 hits also led the league.

RHP **Bob Milacki** led the league in complete games (11), the most in the International League since '84. He was also 4th in the IL in ERA (2.70), tied for first in shutouts (3), and tied for 3rd in wins (12). Both he and **Finley** were selected for the Triple A All-Star game played in Buffalo in July.

RHP **Pete Harnisch** was promoted from Class AA Charlotte to Rochester in July and on Aug. 14 he tied a Rochester club record with 17 strikeouts in a 2-0 win over Toledo. Including post-season, he made 9 starts at Rochester and threw 4 shutouts, 2 in post-season. He was also 3rd in the Southern League in strikeouts (141) despite July promotion. Managers of the SL named him the league's top prospect according to Baseball America.

Charlotte (69-75) boasted the Southern League's only .300 hitter in **Butch Davis.** The former Pittsburgh Pirate and Kansas City Royal batted .301 to give him the SL batting crown. He was also 2nd in the league in rbi (82) and 3rd in GWRBI (12). OF **Rafel Skeete** led the league in runs scored (89) and was 2nd in stolen bases (50). OF **Gerry Holtz** led the SL in triples (8) and was 2nd in on base pct. (.412, BB-82). LHP **Gordon Dillard** was 2nd in the league in era (2.19) & RHP **Paul Thorpe** had a league-high 64 app's.

Hagerstown (79-61) lost to Prince William (Yankees) on the final day of the season, keeping the Suns from the 2nd half title in the Carolina League's Northern Division. The Suns finished one game behind Lynchburg (Red Sox).

STOLEN BASES . . . Three Suns—Don Buford Jr. (77), Walt Harris (53) and Larry Mims (52) finished 1-2-3 in the Carolina League in stolen bases. Hagerstown and the Osceola Astros of the Florida State League became the first two minor league teams with three 50 base stealers since '76 when Danville (Dodgers) of the Midwest League also had 3 . . . And, that's only half the story . . Defensing the stolen base is the other half. The Suns trio of catchers Mike Eberle, Louis Paulino and Craig Faulkner threw out 65 of 135 attempted stealers (48%), highest ratio in the Carolina League.

While **Finley** and **Davis** won batting titles at AAA and AA levels, Hagerstown's IB **Dave Bettendorf** finished 2nd in the Carolina League (A) in batting (.327), 11 points behind leader **Bernie Williams** of Prince William. LHP **Brian DuBois** and RHP **Mike Sander** tied for the CL lead with 14 wins apiece.

Erie (46-31) lost to Jamestown, 2-1 in 10 innings on the final day of the regular season and finished 1 1/2 games behind the Expos, who captured the NY-Penn League's Western Division. OF **Terry Brown**, the Orioles' 18th selection in the '87 free agent draft out of the University of Southern California, was first in the league in rbi (49), 2nd in home runs (13) and 5th in batting (.319). RHP **Dave Miller** was 3rd in the league in ERA (1.37) and completed 7 of his 11 starts while holding opponents to a .166 average (296-49).

Bluefield posted only 24 wins (they were 24-47) in the Appalachian League (Rookie), but one of them, its first of the year, provided national attention. The Bluefield O's won that game, 3-2 over Burlington (Indians) in a game that stretched over 27 innings and consumed some 8 hours and 15 minutes. It began on June 24 at 7:12 p.m. and ended on June 25 at 3:27 a.m. It is believed to be the 2nd longest game in professional history.

The major league draft is held annually at baseball's winter meetings, and is followed with a separate selection by National Association clubs from class AAA to A levels. . . Until 1958, major league clubs could draft players within a range between \$15,000 (for AAA players) and \$2,000 (for class D players) . . . In 1958 the price for big league drafts rose to \$25,000 and in 1985 it became \$50,000.

However, in 1959, a first-year player draft at the big league level was set up to discourage the payment of inordinately large bonus payments to free agents. The new rule provided that first-year players could be selected at the major league level (if not protected on a major league team's 40 man roster) for \$12,000. In 1961, an even lower draft price was set up for more recent first-year players. That figure was \$8,000.

That year, incidentally, the Baltimore organization set a record of sorts by being relieved of 19 eligible first year players (seven during the big league selections and 11 more during the minor league draft). In 1965, the first year player draft began to lose its significance and then disappeared in 1970.



GRAND SLAM NOTES

O's Lead Majors Over Last 8 Years: Although they have hit only 3 grand slams in the last 2 seasons, the Orioles have hit 46 in the last 8 years (starting '81), 10 more than any other major league club (Boston-36 is next).

Eddie Murray has not hit a slam since '86, but has 14 in his 10-year career and ranks tied for 8th on baseball's all-time list with Gil Hodges. He is first among active players.

Thru the Years: Although the Orioles allowed a club record 7 grand slams in '88 and have allowed 13 the last 2 seasons, the O's have "outslammed" their opponents 133-84 over the last 35 years (including a 72-38 advantage at Baltimore).

Three in One Game: The Orioles and Texas set a major league record on Aug 6, '86 when the two teams combined to hit three grand slams in Texas' 13-11 win at Memorial Stadium (the record was equalled on June 3, '87, Hou. vs. Chi.). Jim Dwyer and Larry Sheets hit grand slams for the O's, both in the6... Jun. 10, '59—Cleveland [Colavito-4, B. Martin, Minoso] 4th inning. It marked only the 5th time in major league history that one club grand slams in one game. Toby Harrah hit Texas' slam.

Gentile Hit 5 in '61: Jim Gentile set an American League record and tied the major league standard in '61 when he hit 5 bases loaded home runs. The only prior player to reach that total was the Cubs' Ernie Banks in '55. In '87, Don Mattingly of the Yankees broke that record by hitting 6 grand slams.

GRAND SLAM NOTES (Cont.)

Two in a Game: Only 7 players have hit two grand slams in one game in baseball history and only 3 have hit them on consecutive at-bats. In both situations, two of them were Orioles: **Gentile** hit two in a row at Minnesota on May 9, '61 (Metropolitan Stadium off Pete Ramos and Paul Giel), and Frank Robinson did the same on June 26, '70 at RFK Stadium in Washing-

ton (off Joe Coleman, Jr. and Joe Grzenda). Post-Season Slams-Slugging Pitchers: Only two pitchers have ever hit grand slam home runs in post-season play. Both were Orioles at the time, and both did it in 1970. In game one of the '70 ALCS, **Mike Cuellar** hit one off the Twins' Jim Perry (at Minny) and in the 3rd game of the World Series vs. the Reds, Dave McNally found the range off Wayne Granger (at Baltimore).

The blast by Cuellar was the only ALCS grand slam ever until Don Baylor hit one for the Angels vs. Milwaukee in '82 (off **Moose Haas**) . . . Only two bases loaded homers have ever been hit in NLCS play: the Dodgers' Ron

Opponents: Seven opponents have hit two career slams each against the O's. Cey and Dusty Baker in '77. . Three have hit two at Memorial Stadium: Roy Sievers (Was.), Moose Skowron (N.Y.), Mike Epstein (Was.). There have been 10 alien pitchers to throw up two grand slams each to Baltimore

Orioles "Gophers:" Among Orioles pitchers, Milt Pappas was the most generous. He gave up 6 bases loaded homers during his tenure in Baltimore. Dave McNally and Scott McGregor, are next in line with 4 apiece. On the other hand, Jim Palmer never allowed a slam in 558 games spanning nearly 4,000 innings. Among current O's, six have allowed one grand slam each: Pete Harnisch (Rice); John Habyan (G. Bell); Jose Mesa (Mattingly); Pete namisch (Floe), John Habyan (G. Bell), Jose Mesa (Mahingy), Jay Tibbs (Tartabull); Mark Thurmond (Hubie Brooks) and Mike Morgan (C. Ripken).

Notes on 20-Game Winners

Although the Orioles have had only one in the past 8 years Baltimore pitchers have produced 23 20-game seasons in the past 21 years (starting '68), far and away the most in the majors over that

From '68 thru '80, a span of 13 years, at least one Oriole pitcher accumulated 20 or more victories to set a major league record. The old standard was 12 by the New York Giants from '03 to '14, a mark period. single-handedly assured by Christy Mathewson who won 20+ in

In 1971 four Baltimore pitchers reached the 20-win plateau. The each of those years. only other foursome in the entire history of major league baseball to have achieved the feat was a quartet from the 1920 White Sox (51 years earlier): **Urban "Red" Faber**-23, **Claude Williams**-22, **Dickle** Kerr-21 and Ed Cicotte-21. Despite that achievement, the White Sox finished second that year, two games behind Cleveland.

The four Orioles all won their 20th games within 6 days: McNally was the first on 9/21; then in a series in Cleveland, the other three joined him: Cuellar (9/24—first game-clinched division title), Dobson

(9/24—2nd game), and Palmer (9/26). Stone was the earliest 20-game winner in club history, winning his 20th game on August 19 en route to a team record 25 victories in '80. Three other Orioles' hurlers have recorded their 20th wins in August McNally (8/25) and Cuellar (8/27) in '71 and Palmer (8/30) in '75.

The first Oriole to win 20, and the only one in the club's first 14 seasons in Baltimore ('54 thru '67) was lefthander Steve Barber in 63

The Gold Glove Awards were initiated in '57 by the Rawlings Sporting Goods Company to acknowledge individual defensive excellence by vote of managers and coaches in each league. Selection is based on a player's overall defensive ability, not simply on his fielding percentage.

Midway through the season, the Orioles were stunned twice by tragen On August 13, Orioles Chairman and President Edward Bennett W. liams passed away after a long and courageous fight against cancer & owner of the club since '79, Williams gave the fans what no one before ha given them—a lengthy formal commitment to keep the Orioles in Baltimore A little more than a month prior to Williams' death, the Orioles lost the beloved trainer Ralph Salvon due to complications following heart surgery

To a large extent, it was the fans that buoyed the '88 season. The Orioles final home attendance mark of 1,660,738 was the 4th best in baseball history for a team with 100 losses. This from fans who didn't see a win at Memora Stadium until a month into the season, May 2, a night when 50,402 fans file: the park to welcome the Orioles back off a road trip which had finished off: 1-21 April, the worst month in modern major league history.

It was that night, in a dramatic pre-game announcement, Governor William Donald Schaefer electrified the throng at Memorial Stadium when he announced that Edward Bennett Williams and the Maryland Stadiun Authority had agreed on a 15-year lease for a new ballpark. Construction, he said, was to begin perhaps in time for the Orioles to begin playing at the Camden Yards site in '92.

On the field, too, a building process was about to begin. From the begin ning of May extending thru the day after the season, the Orioles traded $\boldsymbol{\alpha}$ released six players 30 years of age or older. The average age of the dut went from 29 years in April to 26 in October. Orioles' number one draft po last June, Gregg Olson, and other recent draft picks, Pete Harnisch and Bob Milacki, all made their major league pitching debuts for the Orioles September and caused a stir. They were a combined 3-2 (2.57, IP-49, ER

Orioles' management began a series of acts that would clearly demon strate that the organization was changing direction: a hard-line evaluation of all minor league scouts that would lead to numerous changes; added per sonnel in the Orioles' player development office; a new, modern sprin; training site for the O's minor leaguers; beefed up in-season training facilitie for the major league club; the signing of 17 of the Orioles' top 20 dra choices, the addition of their first-ever conditioning coach, and the signing $\boldsymbol{\theta}$ Cal Ripken Jr. to a three-year contract on July 27.

Four teams were responsible for the 21 defeats: Cleveland beat the O's 7 times; Kansas City 6; Milwaukee 5 and Minnesota 3 . . The Orioles also had six 4-game losing streaks and a 5-game streak . . ORIOLES VS. OPPONENTS

VS. BOSTON ('88: 4-9, Lifetime: 281-311, .475) . . . The Orioles won their first 2 games against the Sox (after going 1-12 in all of '87), and 3 of the first 5, then dropped 7 of the last 8 . . . It was the 5th straight time the Sox had won the season series. During that period, beginning '84, the O's are 20-45 (.308), and over the past 2 seasons they're only 5-21 (.192).

The Sox eliminated the O's officially from the pennant race on Sep. 5 (3rd earliest ever for Birds) while vaulting into first place for the 1st time all year (except for early season).

The Red Sox ranked as the **only** A.L. opponent with a lifetime winning record against the Orioles from June 1979 until last year when both the Yankees and Indians also joined the winners circle . . . However, the Sox still boast the best lifetime record in the A.L. vs. Baltimore (see above) . . . It has been more than 16 years (since Sep. 20, '72 when they were 184-183) that the Birds have held a career edge vs. the Bosox.

The O's still claim a lifetime winning record at Memorial Stadium against all opponents, but the Sox are also challenging that distinction . . . Approaching 1989, the O's edge on 33rd Street is only 150-148 against the Carmines; this as the result of a 8-26 log at home vs. Boston over the past 5 summers (start '84).

At Fenway Park the O's were only 1-5, but that was an improvement over the 0-6 of '87 . . . When **Jose Bautista** decisioned **Roger Clemens** in the O's 1st game of the year at Boston (6/24), a 7-game losing streak in the legendary Fens was thereby terminated, but the O's have still captured only one of their last 13 games there since **Mike Boddicker** beat **Bob Stanley** on Sep. 30, '86 . . . The Birds have also dropped 13 of their last 15 in the Hub City . . . Lest you forget, the aforementioned **Bautista** victory was the last game the Red Sox were to lose at home to anybody until Aug. 13 after the streak had reached 24.

BIZARRE FINISH: The O's won in 9th inning sudden death on Sep. 7 against a 5-man infield . . . With the score tied (on a bloop hit by Bill Ripken) off Bob Stanley after Lee Smith had left with a "crick" in his neck, Manager Joe Morgan brought leftfielder Mike Greenwell in as a 3rd fielder on the left side of the infield (between shortstop Jody Reed and the 2nd base bag).

Cal Ripken followed with a 2-out grounder to Reed who shoveled to Barrett to start a double play, but Bill Rip was in the baseline & Barrett's throw to 1st was slightly off target. The play could still have been made, however, had 1st baseman Todd Benzinger not dropped the ball as the winning run scored.

It was the first time Sox had lost all year when leading going into the 9th (they'd gone 71-0), and it was the 6th time in the O's last 8 victories that they had rallied to win in their last at bat.

RED SOX BATTING: The Red Sox hit .299 (451-135) against the O's in '88 after batting .385 (213-82) against them in '87 . . . Over the past two campaigns, the Sox 26 game average is .327 (664-217), and the Sox' on-base percentage vs. the Orioles these past 2 seasons has been .395 (1050-415). In '88, they outscored the Birds comfortably by 77-42.

The Sox' 23 hits in Baltimore on June 19 were the most ever by a visiting team at Memorial Stadium, and the combined total of 37 safeties in the game was an A.L. high for '88 . . . Everyone in Boston's offensive lineup had at least one hit and one run scored.

In '88, **Greenwell** had more impact against the O's than any other player in the league . . . He batted .400 (50-20), led all opponents in rbi (17 in 13 games), tied with **Kent Hrbek** for most homers against the O's (5) and also tied for most hits (20) . . . He also topped all enemies in slugging percentage (.820, ab-50, tb-41) and extra-base hits (10) . . . It was also against the O's that he hit for the cycle, at Fenway on Sep. 14 . . . All 4 hits that night were at the expense of **Bautista** (to be fair, the triple should have been caught).

Marty Barrett hit a swarthy .373 (51-19) against the O's but watched his career average against them dip a point from .379 to .378 (246-93). He remains the top career hitter vs. the Birds among all actives (100 ab min.) . . . In '87, Marty hit .529 (51-27) in 13 games, believed to be the highest one season average ever (min. 30 at bats) against Baltimore . . .

Barrett also led all opponents in runs (16) and hits (27) that year . . . Over the past 2 seasons his on-base percentage in is .500 (116-58). He also stole home, solo style, against the Birds on June 16 in Baltimore . . . He was the first Carmine to do so (not as part of double steal) since **Tommy Harper** in '70 (according to our records no Oriole has done it since **Ron Hansen** in '60)

Nobody had stolen home in any manner for the Sox since **Gary Allanson** in '80... **Barrett** & shortstop **Reed**, who batted .381 (21-8) vs. the O's, also collaborated on a hidden ball maneuver that embarrassed **Jim Traber** at 2nd base on Sep. 5.

Barrett is one of 3 Carmines who rank in the top 10 actives in lifetime batting vs. the O's (min. 100 at bats), excluding **Greenwell** who is 6 at bats shy of the qualifying minimum (.426, 94-40). **Wade Boggs** is 3rd at .347 (317-110), well below his .356 (3913-1392) career mark vs. all comers, and Jim Rice ranks 10th at .327 (648-212) . . . See that list on page 63.

Rice also leads the league's actives in career homers (38) and rbi (131) vs. the O's . . . He has done it all in 166 games . . . One of his 2 homers last year vs. the O's was a grand slam off Pete Harnisch in the latter's big league debut at Boston Sep. 13 . . . He ranks 6th in homers on the O's all-time opponents list, headed by Harmon Killebrew's 70 (see page 114). Dwight Evans is runner-up among actives with 117 rbi against the O's and is 3rd with 26 homers (Tony Armas who was active at the end of '88 has 28).

Both **Ellis Burks** (6/10/87 at Bal.) and **Boggs** (6/29/87 at Bos.) had career high 7 rbi games against the O's in '87.

RED SOX PITCHING: Wes Gardner's efficiency against the O's was impressive. His 0.90 era (ip-20, er-2) was 2nd best among pitchers who worked 20 or more innings against the O's (Cleveland's **Greg Swindell** led

Mike Smithson at 3-0 in 4 starts was one of 10 to notch 3 wins against the Birds (nobody had more) . . . He is now 8-7 lifetime (2-5 at Baltimore) . . . Lee Smith, in his first A.L. season, saved 3 games in 5 appearances against the O's and yielded only one earned run in 6.1 innings (1.42).

The Red Sox' 2 ace starters didn't fare as well. **Roger Clemens** was hot and cold in a pair of starts and went 1-1... After pitching a shutout in his first effort (a 9-hit, 148-pitch outing at Baltimore on June 18), he lasted only 2.1 innings 8 days later at Fenway where he was touched for 7 hits and 6 runs (5 earned) and lost in the oft-mentioned **Jose Bautista** game.

That defeat snapped a string of 6 straight successes for **Clemens** against the O's . . . The big blow against him was Traber's 2-run, bases-loaded double. It was Traber's 5th straight bases loaded safety . . . Overall the O's batted .372 against him in 11.1 innings (49-16) . . . He has a 6-2 career record vs. the O's, and has won 4 in a row at Memorial Stadium (4-1 lifetime).

Bruce Hurst was 1-0 in 3 starts, but he also yielded more than a hit an inning (ip-20.2) and the O's had a .295 (ab-78, h-23) average against him. He leaves the league with a 7-4 log vs. Baltimore . . . Oil Can Boyd like Clemens has won his last 4 decisions at Baltimore and is 4-1 there lifetime.

Mike Boddicker pitched in only one game against his former teammates. He beat **Bautista** with a 7-inning effort at Boston Sep. 14 (the night **Greenwell** hit for the cycle) . . . He was 0-0 in one start against the Red Sox for the O's and is 4-5 lifetime vs. the Carmines.

ORIOLES BATTING: The Birds' .267 average (439-117) against the Bosox was their highest against a single club in '88 . . Terry Kennedy has a 2-year .386 (57-22) average vs. the Red Sox . . Traber led the O's in rbi (8) while batting .385 (52-20) against Boston pitching (no homers) . . . He provided instant victory with an 11th inning single on June 17, and contributed significantly to another victory with a bases-loaded double off Clemens in Batter on June 24

Boston on June 24.

Eddie Murray leaves the A.L. with a .300 bat mark (566-170) vs. the Sox, thanks to a .419 average last year (43-18) . . . His on-base percentage was thanks to a .419 average last year (43-18) . . . His on-base percentage was .527 (55-29) in the season series . . . Eddie hit 29 homers and had 89 rbi in .148 games vs. Boston . . Eddie's 29 homers are the most by an active player against the Red Sox.

Cal Ripken, who has played in all 91 games against the Bosox since he joined the club for good in August '81, batted only .170 (47-8) . . . His 8 career homers against Boston pitching is a low vs. one opponent . . . Brady Anderson hit .176 (17-3) in 6 games after coming over from the Red Sox (Pawtucket) along with Curt Schilling in the Boddicker deal on July 30.

VS. BOSTON (Cont.)

ORIOLES PITCHING: The O's era was 5.37, but it was more than 2 runs a game better than their '87 era vs. the Red Sox, the Birds worst ever against one club (7.58). Baltimore lost 12 of the 13 games that year . . . **Schilling,** who had spent his first 2 las seasons in the Red Sox system, made his first 2 big league appearances against that organization Sep. 7 and 12 . . . He was 0-1 in those 2 encounters.

Harnisch also made his big league debut vs. the Red Sox, on Sep. 13 (just a few hours after he joined the club) . . . A 3rd inning slam by **Rice** led to his demise, but right after that big blow he retired the next 10 hitters in order.

Jay Tibbs was 0-1 in 2 starts, but on June 17 retired 17 straight batters and 21 of his last 22 before retiring ... Dave Schmidt won in 11 on a Traber safety ... To show how scarce victories vs. Boston have been lately, the 2 leading winners on the current roster are Schmidt and John Habyan, each of whom has 2 career victories vs. Boston ... Bautista and Schmidt are the only current O's to have ever won a game in Fenway (one each) ... Mike Morgan is still looking for his first career win against the Carmines ... He's C-6.

VS. CALIFORNIA ('88: 5-7, Lifetime: 213-165, .563) . . . The O's lost a season series to the Angels for the 1st time in 10 years, since '78 . . . The O's had won 7 season sets and tied 2, beginning '79 . . . However, Baltimore still maintains a substantial margin over the past decade (74-46, .617) against the Angels (excluding 3-1 in '79 ALCS).

Over the past 2 seasons the clubs have played 24 games and 18 of them have been decided by one or 2 runs (O's are 11-7) ... One of the highlights of a lackluster season series between 2 losing clubs was a May 19 doubleheader in Baltimore when the A.L. records for most double plays by both teams in one game (9) and in a twin bill (12) were tied. The Birds gidp'd 5 times in the lidlifter.

O's Have Lifetime Winning Record In All West Coast Ports

Despite their 7-11 record on the West Coast in '88, the O's have maintained a winning record lifetime against all of the West Coast clubs in their Pacific ports of call ... Overall the O's are 216-180 out west (regular season only); at California (Anaheim & L.A.) 98-94, at Oakland 73-58, and at Seattle 45-28 (including 5-1 in '69 at Sicks' Stadium).

On May 17-18-19 the Angels took 2 of 3 to win their first series in Baltimore since July '82...

ANGELS BATTING: The Angels outscored the O's 48-40 . . . Wally Joyner was the club's leading regular in the season series at .326 (46-15) and led in rbi (8) . . . Lifetime, he's batting .312 (144-44) . . Tony Armas' 28 career homers against Baltimore are 2nd among actives only to Jim Rice's 38 . . .

Lance Parrish has hit 20 homers & driven in 58 runs in 106 lifetime games . . .

ANGELS PITCHING: Mike Witt wasn't the most successful pitcher vs. the O's last year, but he was the hardest working . . . He was 2-2 in 4 starts (most by an O's opponent), pitched the most complete games (3) and innings (32.1) and walked the most O's (17) . . . Lifetime, Witt is 6-11 against the Orioles , 1-6 in Baltimore, and the Angels are 8-18 in games he has started vs. the O's

... Witt's lone victory in Memorial Stadium was on Aug. 28, '81 at **Steve Stone's** expense ... In one start last year, on May 18 at Baltimore, he was charged with 2 wild pitches and a career high 8 walks (2 int.).

Bert Blyleven, 18-14 lifetime, is tied with Tommy John (18-17) for most career wins vs. the O's among active pitchers (assuming John is active in '89) . . . Frank Tanana is right behind (17-14) . . . In '88 Blyleven was 0-2 in 3 starts with a 13.11 era (ip-11.2, er-17) . . . He gave up 6 horners and the O's batted .360 (50-18) off him . . . Over the last 2 years in 7 starts, Blyleven has given up 37 earned runs, 47 hits and 14 homers in 43 innings (era 7.74), walked 18 and fanned 27 while going 2-3.

Bryan Harvey was 2-0 with a save in 4 appearances and didn't allow an earned run in 7.2 innings while holding the O's to a .160 average (25-4) . . . **Chuck Finley**, in 3 years with the Angels, has allowed the O's only 3 earned runs in 25.1 innings (era 1.07) . . . He's 1-1 lifetime.

ORIOLES BATTING: Two Orioles' backstops, **Terry Kennedy** (.364, 22-8) and **Mickey Tettleton** (.381, 21-8), were the O's leading hitters in the '88 season series . . . Native Southern Californian **Rene Gonzales** hit .310 (29-9).

Eddie Murray completed his 12th year in the A.L. having played in all 140 regular season games vs. the Angels after joining the club in '77... He finished with a .330 average (525-173), 28 homers and 105 rbi, not including his hold of the season of the s

ORIOLES PITCHING: Dave Schmidt was the only multiple winner against the Angels (2-1) in 4 games, including 2 starts, while holding California to a .220 average (59-13) . . . He is also the biggest career winner among current Orioles vs. California (7-3) and has a 4-1 mark with 2 saves lifetime in Angelogin Stadium.

Tom Niedenfuer saved 4 of the O's 5 wins against the Angels despite a yield of 6 earned runs in 6.2 innings . . . The Angels hit .367 (30-11) against him . . . Jeff Ballard who didn't pitch against the Angels in his rookie year, '87, was 0-2 last year.

VS. CHICAGO ('88: 4-7, Lifetime: 282-245) . . . The year 1988 marked only the 4th time in the last 21 years the White Sox had won a season series from the O's, who have won 15 and tied 2 in that period.

The O's were 0-21 when they moved into Chicago on April 29 and finally ended the longest losing streak ever at the start of a season with a 9-0 victory ... See "Happy Day" below ... That victory was the O's 7th straight over a 2-year period at Comiskey (they'd gone 6-0 in '87 there), and even now they are 8-4 over the past 2 years in Chicago ... That historic victory was also the Birds' 9th win in their last 10 games against the White Sox, so, despite the decisive loss of the season series, the O's have still won 12 of the last 20 vs. the Pale Hose.

Ellie Hendricks was ejected for the 1st time in his career in a game against the White Sox, by Ken Kaiser on July 19 in Baltimore . . .

HAPPY DAY: It was a Friday night in Chicago. **Mark Williamson** was making only his 3rd big league start and his 5th in some 242 professional appearances . . . He went on to pitch 3-hit ball over 6 scoreless innings, then **Dave Schmidt** allowed only one hit over the last 3 stanzas to seal the victory.

Eddie Murray's 1st inning homer off Jack McDowell turned out to be the game-winner, and Cal Ripken went 4-for-5, but there was a casualty. Brother Bill was beaned by John Davis while squaring to bunt in the 7th and had to be removed on a stretcher . . . He was back in the lineup 3 days later after recovering from a slight concussion.

Sitting in the stands that night was O's G.M. Roland Hemond, wearing the same suit he'd worn while g.m. in Chicago the day in '83 that the White Sox clinched the Western Division championship. That suit had been on exhibit in a display case in the Comiskey Park offices until owners Jerry Reinsdorf and Eddie Einhorn had sent it to Roland in Minnesota a couple days earlier.

At precisely 11:12 p.m. Baltimore time on April 29 that horrible ordeal finally ended, allowing WiYY-FM disc jockey **Bob Rivers** to return home after an 11-day studio vigil that began when he vowed to remain on the air until the Orioles won a game.

RAINOUTS/STANFORD CONNECTION: Two games were rained out (May 16 & July 20), both in Baltimore and only the first was made up . . . The July 20 game was to have featured Stanford University's top 2 lifetime winners—Jeff Ballard (37 wins) and Jack McDowell (35 wins) . . . Ballard holds the school record for most career innings (428) while McDowell is the strikeout leader (337).

They were teammates in '85 when Stanford finished 5th in the USA and had the highest winning percentage in the school's history (47-15, .758) . . . Orioles outfielder **Pete Stanicek** was also on that team. **Ken Williams** of the White Sox also attended Stanford, but played only football there . . . In the event you've just returned from outer space, Stanford has won the last 2 national championships and their coach, **Mark Marquess**, directed the U.S. team to an Olympics Gold Medal last summer in Seoul.

VS. CHICAGO (Cont.)

WHITE SOX BATTING: Mark Salas batted .450 (20-9) vs. the O's in '88 . . . Carlton Fisk has hit 21 homers and driven in 93 runs in 182 lifetime games against the Orioles . . . Over the last 3 years, Harold Baines has averaged .344 (125-43) against Baltimore pitching.

WHITE SOX PITCHING: The White Sox maintained a 3.03 era vs. the O's...

Bill Long was 2-0 in 4 appearances, including one start, and had a 1.10 era
(ip-16.1, er-2)... Melido Perez on the other hand was also 2-0, in 3 starts, despite the fact the O's hit .306 as a team (61-19) against him...

Bobby Thigpen played a significant role in 5 of the 11 games, picking up a loss and 4 saves in 6 appearances . . . **Dave LaPoint**, 0-1 in 2 starts, had never pitched against the O's until last year.

ORIOLES BATTING: Though the O's batted only .228 as a team, there were 3 who prospered against Sox pitching ... **Cal Ripken** hit .417 (36-15), scored 10 runs, hit 3 homers and drove in 8 runs . . . When you add 13 walks to his totals, his on-base percentage vs. Chicago was an awesome .571 (49-28).

Cal's .316 (313-99) average and his 22 home runs against the Pale Hose are career highs vs. one opponent, and his 63 rbi are tied for that distinction (also vs. Milwaukee) . . . He has driven in 54 runs in his last 59 regular season games vs. the White Sox, beginning opening day '84.

Chicago area native **Stanicek** batted .351 (37-13) and **Fred Lynn** .429 (14-6) vs. Chicago in '88 . . . **Eddie Murray** leaves the league having hit a career-high 31 home runs against both the White Sox and Tigers.

Larry Sheets, in '87, hit .556 (23-13) at Comiskey Park with 9 rbi in 6 games, and became the first left-hander since '70 to hit a ball over the roof ... Last year he batted .136 (22-3) with one rbi in Chicago. After batting .397 (73-29) overall vs. the White Sox lifetime thru '87, he went 5-for-39 (.128) in '88... His lifetime figure took a dip to .304 (112-34).

ORIOLES PITCHING: Losing streak snapper **Williamson** has seen limited action vs. Chicago in 2 A.L. seasons, but has done well when given the chance . . . He's 2-0 with 2 saves and a 1.08 era (ip-16.2, h-5, er-2) . . . **Schmidt,** the other April 29 pitching hero and a former White Sox pitcher, is 2-2 with 4 saves and a 2.34 era (ip-59.1, h-49, er-17).

The only other current O's pitcher with 2 lifetime wins against the ChiSox is **Mike Morgan**, who is 2-3 . . . Last year he was 0-1 and the Sox hit .419 against him (31-13).

VS. CLEVELAND ('88: 4-9, Lifetime: 295-298) . . . By winning the first 9 games of the season series, the Indians moved ahead of the O's in their lifetime rivalry for the first time since June '79 . . . The Tribe clinched the season series by April 17 after going 7-0 vs. the Birds in a 10-day stretch

starting April 8.

It wasn't until July 28 in their final appearance of the year at Cleveland Stadium that the Orioles finally broke into the win column, and went on to capture the final 4 games of the season series.

The game of Apr. 16 in Baltimore with the Indians was the coldest of the year for the O's . . . It was 41 degrees at game time . . . The Tribe collected 20 hits enroute to a 12-1 win at Cleveland on Apr. 9 for **Tom Candiotti.**

Until that July 28 breakthrough, the O's had dropped 11 straight to the Indians and 15 of the last 17 . . . The losing streak was not the Birds longest against Cleveland . . . In '54, Baltimore's 1st year back in the league, they once lost 17 in a row while going 3-19 on the year to the Tribe . . . The O's were also, incidentally, 3-19 in '55 and 5-17 in '56. So after 3 years in the league, the Orioles trailed the Indians 11-55 . . . But enough of ancient history, already.

The O's were outscored 6-28 while dropping 4 straight in Cleveland April 8 thru 11, and during the first 9 games had scored only 14 runs compared to the Tribe's 55 . . . Over the last 4 games , however, the Birds maintained a 23-7 edge in scoring.

The Red Sox (currently 311-281, .525) ranked as the **only** A.L. opponent with a lifetime winning record against the Orioles from June 1979 until last year, when both the Yankees (301-294, .506) and Indians (.503) also gained that distinction . . .

The O's played in the Cleveland home opener in each of the last 2 years and drew a total of 118,278: '87—64,540 (the biggest regular season crowd in O's history), '88—53,738 (the Birds largest draw of the year).

bats, ranks 4th in lifetime batting vs. the O's . . . His .344 average (122-42) has been constructed over 32 games during which he's homered 12 times and driven in 24 runs (see page 63 for top career hitters vs. O's).

Mel "Bye Bye" Hall has also feasted off Baltimore pitching and has a .319 (141-45) career average to show for it, though he's hit only 2 home runs in 45 games . . . Old Orioles' nemesis (and an old Oriole, as well) Ron Washington has a .325 career mark (114-39) after batting .400 (20-8) last

Joe Carter, on the other hand, has struggled throughout his career against the O's... He's batting only .215 (209-45) after 52 career games with 9 homers and 25 rbi. Pete O'Brien (45-15), Oddibe McDowell (24-8) both hit .333 vs. the O's last year for Texas, but both have had their troubles in the past . . they are batting only .227 (251-57) and .208 (125-26) vs. the O's lifetime.

and Greg Swindell was 2-1 with an 0.76 era, lowest among all starters with 20 or more innings against the O's . . . Scott Bailes absorbed 2 of the Indians' 4 losses while winning once.

Swindell who pitched a shutout in his only previous outing vs. the O's (in '87) has yielded only 2 earned runs in 32.2 lifetime innings (0.55), and is 3-1.

Farrell held the O's to a .211 average in his 2 starts (57-12) ... Candiotti has been up-and-down against Baltimore since joining Cleveland 3 years ago ... In '86 he had an 0.39 era (ip-23.1, er-1), then it ballooned to 7.13 (ip-17.2, er-14) in '87 before settling back to 1.50 (ip-18, er-3) last year ... Over that 3-year span he's 4-3 with a 2.75.

Doug Jones saved 3 games in 3 appearances while allowing only 2 of 15 batters to reach safely. and allowed no runs . . . In 2 seasons, he has saved 5 games vs. the O's in 10 relief efforts.

ORIOLES BATTING: Joe Orsulak (.366, 41-15) and Larry Sheets (.357, 42-15, 3 hr, 7 rbi) excelled against the Indians ... Sheets is now batting .301 lifetime (123-37) and has hit 12 of his 77 homers off Cleveland pitching, easily the most against a single opponent . . . His 30 rbi against both the Indians and A's are also highs.

Eddie Murray hit .315 (556-175) vs. the Indians with 24 homers & 99 rbi in 150 games . . Cal Junior has had more trouble offensively with the Indians than any other club in the league . . . Last year he hit only .091 (44-4) with one homer and 3 rbi in 13 games to lower his lifetime average to .238 (344-82) . . . Phil Bradley has a .318 average (170-54) against the Indians.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Oswald Peraza earned the O's 1st 2 wins over Cleveland within a 5-day period . . . On July 28 he went a career high 8.1 innings to win at Cleveland, 5-2 over Scott Bailes, despite a dropped fly ball in the outfield and 3 Orioles runners being thrown out at 2nd or 3rd base . . . Then, on Aug. 2 in Baltimore, he pitched his 1st career complete game to beat Bailes again, by the same score . . . In those 2 games, he worked 17.1 innings and allowed only 4 earned runs (2.08 era) . . . Scott McGregor was the O's only multiple loser at 0-2.

Mike Morgan, 3-6 lifetime vs. Cleveland, pitched a 9-inning 2-hitter at Baltimore on Apr. 16, but wasn't a pitcher of record in a game won by the Indians in 11, 1-0 . . . Swindell went 10+ to get the victory and Jones earned a save . . . Dave Schmidt is 4-4-2 lifetime vs. Cleveland.

VS. DETROIT ('88: 5-8, Lifetime: 305-294) . . . Over the last 3 years the O's have gone 10-29 vs. the Tigers and are 10-30 (.250) starting the last day of the '85 season . . . In '88 the O's won 3 of the first 4 games, then lost 7 of the last 9 . . . It was the 4th straight year the Tigers had won the season series.

The O's lost their 100th game of the year in the 1st game of a doubleheader on Sep. 25 (Jack Morris over Mark Williamson). It was the 34th anniversary of their only previous 100th loss (9/25/54) . . .

When the Orioles took 2 of 3 games from the Tigers in Baltimore June 6-7-8, it was their 1st series victory against an Eastern Division team since Apr. 10-11-12, '87 at Cleveland.

VS. DETROIT (Cont.)

TIGERS BATTING: Pat Sheridan, Tom Brookens and Fred Lynn each hit grand slams against the O's (3 of a club record 7 yielded by the Birds in '88) ... Sheridan (June 8 in Bal) and Chambersburg, PA native Brookens (June 14 in Det) each had 4 hit/6 rbi games at the O's expense ... On his big night, Sheridan also hit a 2-run homer and accounted for 10 total bases.

Both **Brookens** and **Alan Trammell** hit .343 (35-12) vs. the O's, and **Darrell Evans** hit 4 home runs, but the most productive Tiger against the Birds was **Lynn** who appeared in only the last 7 games of the season series, but drove in 9 runs . . .

In his 1st game against his former teammates, on Sep. 16 at Det., Fred hit a sudden death 2-run homer right after a single by Luis Salazar had ended an 18-minute rain delay . . . In the top of the 9th, just before the rain, the O's had gone ahead by one run primarily because of 2 errors by shortstop Salazar, and a misjudged fly ball by Lynn. . . . In Baltimore, 9 days later, Lynn hit a 9th inning slam . . . It was the 14th home run he had hit in the 9th inning since the start of '85.

Matt Nokes, in 2 years plus one game in '86, has already hit 8 home runs off Baltimore pitching while maintaining a .329 (82-27) career average vs. the O's . . . **Larry Herndon's** .333 (213-71) lifetime mark vs. Baltimore ranks 7th among actives (if he is still active).

TIGERS PITCHING: Doyle Alexander had another big year at the Orioles' expense... He was 3-0 and is now 13-5 lifetime since the O's traded him to the Yankees in the 10-player deal in June '76... He's 9-1 during the 80's with a 2.54 era (ip-109.2, er-31).

Frank Tanana, 0-2, is 17-14 lifetime vs. the O's . . . He is 3rd among actives in career victories behind Tommy John (18-17), assuming again that he is still active, and Bert Blyleven (18-14) . . . He is tied with Blyleven for most losses behind John . . . Frank is 5-3 against Baltimore since joining the Tigers.

Eric King didn't face the O's last year, but his career stats against them are worth listing . . . In 9 appearances he is 3-0 with 2 saves, has fanned 38 in 41 innings hand has held the Birds to a .110 average (136-15) while compiling a 1.32 era (ip-41, er-6).

Jack Morris, 1-1, hurled a 1-hitter to beat the O's in Baltimore Sep. 25th (their 100th defeat), 2-1 . . . He's 11-10 lifetime but only 6-8 over the last 7 seasons . . . In Baltimore, **Morris** is 8-6 lifetime but has won 5 of his last 6 decisions here.

Jeff Robinson beat the O's June 15th with a 5-hit shutout, 1-0, on a sac fly by **Dave Bergman** that made a loser of **Mike Boddicker.... Guillermo Hernandez** appeared in 7 games and was 1-1-1 while holding the O's to a .150 average (20-3)... **Walt Terrell** is 5-2 lifetime against the Birds.

ORIOLES BATTING: Mickey Tettleton batted .360 (25-9) and hit 3 home runs, 2 of them in one game on June 13th (from each side of the plate) . . . The 2nd smash was a 3-run sudden death blast in the 9th inning off Hernandez, who hadn't yielded a run in more than a month . . .

Brady Anderson enjoyed his 1st 4-hit game in the majors on Sep. 16 at Tiger Stadium. He also registered his only 3-hit game against the Tigers, on opening day for the Red Sox at Fenway. Overall, he batted .333 (39-13) vs. Detroit (.348, 23-8, for the O's).

Eddie Murray finished on a high note against the Tigers . . . He batted .367 (49-18) with 4 homers and 12 rbi in the 13 games . . . Lifetime he hit 31 homers (tied with Chicago for most vs. one club) and had 98 rbi in 160 games . . . His 19 homers at Tiger Stadium were the most he hit in a ballpark on the road . . . This despite the fact that his .250 average (611-153) was his lowest vs. one club.

Bill Ripken's .288 average (52-15) against the Tigers is his 2nd best, but 6 of his teammates are batting .200 or below lifetime: Ken Gerhart (.190, 42-8), Rene Gonzales (.086, 35-3), Terry Kennedy (.175, 57-10), Carl Nichols (.125, 8-1), Joe Orsulak (.098, 41-4), and Larry Sheets (.200, 125-25).

ORIOLES PITCHING: Bob Milacki, just up from an exceptional season with Rochester (12-8), made a sensational major league debut at Detroit on Sep. 18 . . . He pitched one-hit ball for 8 innings (walked 4 and fanned 4), and left with a 2-0 lead following a 1:17 rain delay in the top of the 9th . . . Niedenfuer finished up to preserve the victory . . . Milacki threw 106 pitches and allowed only one runner to get to 2nd base.

Next time out, 5 days later against the Tigers in Baltimore, the rookie from Lake Havasu, AZ, pitched almost as well but wasn't as fortunate with his relief help . . . He had a 3-1 lead in the 9th but gave up a leadoff homer to **Nokes**. **Niedenfuer** relieved him at that point, then blew the save opportunity. The latter became the winner himself in the bottom half on a throwing error by **Nokes**. In 2 games vs. the Tigers, **Milacki's** era was a spiffy 1.13 (ip-16, h-6, erc?)

No current Orioles pitcher has more than one lifetime win against the Tigers . . **Niedenfuer,** now with Seattle, appeared in 5 games and played a significant role in each . . . He was 2-1 with 2 saves with a 9.00 era (ip-5, er-5).

VS. KANSAS CITY ('88: 0-12, Lifetime: 125-107) . . . During the Orioles' 35 years back in the A.L., '54 thru '88, one team has swept a season series only 3 times in the major leagues (excluding the strike shortened '81 season), and the Birds have been involved in all 3 instances:

1970—Baltimore-12, Kansas City-0 1978—Baltimore-11, Oakland-0 1988—Kansas City-12, Baltimore-0

The Royals avenged the O's sweep of '70, but their current winning streak (13 in a row) is 10 shy of the Birds major league record 23 consecutive victories over the Royals . . . The O's lost the 1st game ever played between the 2 clubs (May 9, '69, **Dick Drago** over **Dick Hall**), then won the last 11 that season and all 12 the following year.

Since the end of that 23-game skein, the Royals hold a 106-102 edge in the rivalry . . . The Royals are 55-49 during the 80s.

The Royals scored 9 runs in the 1st inning on Apr. 22 at K.C. and registered a club record 7 straight hits (the first 6 off Mike Morgan) . . . The game of July 30 played in Baltimore where the temperature was a record 103 degrees. The 2 clubs threw a total of 353 pitches in a game that went 3:46, thanks in some measure to 11 KC walks, but the Royals won anyway, 8-7

The statistics from the '88 season series were as one-sided as the won-lost records of the 2 clubs . . . The Royals hit .313 (438-135) to the Orioles' .196 (397-78), outscored the Birds 72-34, and their 2.35 era (ip-111, er-29) was less than half of the O's pitching staff's 5.50 (ip-106.1, er-65).

ROYALS BATTING: Frank White led the Royals in batting with a .419 (43-18). His career average vs. Mike Morgan is an awesome (.500, 30-15) . . . K.C.'s biggest run producers were Danny Tartabull (16 rbi, 3 hr) and Bo Jackson (.333, 45-15, 4 hr, 13 rbi). Tartabull hit a slam off Jay Tibbs on Aug. 11 in Royals Stadium . . Jackson was much improved over his performance vs. the O's as a rookie in '87 (.219, 32-7, 0 hr, 0 rbi), and cut his strikeout total from 17 to 7.

Kurt Stillwell batted .392 (51-20), and Kevin Seitzer illustrated an amazing flare for consistency. In '87, his rookie year, he batted .356 (45-16) ... Last year he hit .364 (44-16) ... Bill Buckner has a .388 (103-40) lifetime average at Memorial Stadium.

Willie Wilson stole 5 bases in as many tries and has now swiped 43 in 50 attempts lifetime vs. the O's (86%), slightly better than his overall rate of 84% (sb-564, cs-107) . . . George Brett is hitting .317 lifetime vs. the O's (593-188), and .312 (7691-2399) against the world.

Pat Tabler ranks 6th among all active Orioles opponents with a career .339 (257-87) . . . "Mr. Bases Loaded" won a game in sudden death at K.C. on Aug. 9 with a 3-run double . . . The Royals had trailed by 2 . . . Lifetime with 3 men on Tabler is batting .579 (64-37) with 87 rbi . . . He was 5-for-5 in that situation after joining the Royals from Cleveland last year, and 8-for-9 on the season.

ROYALS PITCHING: Bret Saberhagen went 3-0 in 3 starts, had a 1.50 era (ip-24, er-4)... The O's batted .188 against him (85-16)... The year before Saberhagen was 0-2 vs. the O's who hit .317 (.60-19)... Lifetime, he is 5-4... Charlie Leibrandt fanned a career-high 11 batters while pitching a 4-hitter vs. the O's on July 31 at Baltimore... He was 1-0 in 2 starts and held Orioles' batters to a .193 average (57-11)... Lifetime, he's 5-3.

Matt Gubicza was 2-0 in 3 starts and held Baltimore batters to a .165 average (79-13). Two former Cincinnati Reds, Ted Power and Jeff Montgomery, were both 2-0 in relief . . . Montgomery earned his victories in the final 2 Orioles-Royals games, in K.C., Aug. 10 & 11.

VS. KANSAS CITY (Cont.)

ORIOLES BATTING: Rick Schu hit .313 (16-5) and Fred Lynn .333 (15-5), but 13 of the 20 O's who batted against K.C. last year batted less than .200 . Eddie and Cal each drove in 8 runs . . . Cal hit 5 of the O's 10 homers and Eddie hit 3 . . . Cal's .284 lifetime average (324-92) is the highest among current Orioles . . . His 5 career homers off Saberhagen are a career high vs one pitcher.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Jose Bautista, Tom Niedenfuer, and Mark Thurmond were all 0-2... Mike Morgan, 3-8 lifetime vs. K.C., started twice in K.C., pitched only 1/3 of an inning and allowed a total of 9 earned runs in the 2 assignments.

VS. MILWAUKEE ('88: 4-9, Lifetime: 166-110, .601) . . . The O's lost the first 5 games of the season series, then the 2 clubs split the last 8 . . . The Birds, who had lost the first 9 games against the Brewers in '87, are 6-20 against them over the past 2 years, and 7-24 beginning Sep. 21, '86 . . . Despite all this, the O's lifetime .601 percentage vs. Milwaukee (including Seattle '69) is their best against an Eastern team.

At Milwaukee, the O's are 74-60 vs. the Brewers, but have gone only 3-14 there starting Sep. 24, '86 . . . That stretch included an 11-game losing streak at County Stadium that was snapped when **Jeff Ballard** hurled his first big league shutout, a 3-hitter on Aug. 13. It was Jeff's 25th birthday and it was also the night **Edward Bennett Williams** passed away in Washington.

ODDS AND ENDS: The temperature was 67 degrees on opening day, one of the balmiest in club history . . . The crowd for that game was 52,395, the largest in club history for a regular season home game . . . The 12-0 pasting absorbed by the O's in that game tied the A.L. record for largest margin of victory/defeat in an opening game shutout . . . It was only the 2nd time the O's had ever been blanked in an opener (1st at home) . . . The other was the 1st game ever played by the club, in Detroit in '54.

When the O's lost to Milwaukee on April 21, it marked the 13th time in 15 games the temperature had been in the 40s at the start . . . On Aug. 7, the O's lost again to the Brewers, this time in Baltimore . . . It was the 15th time in the last 18 playing dates at Memorial Stadium when the first-pitch temperature was 89 or more.

BREWERS BATTING: Rob Deer had a most productive year at the O's expense . . . He hit .391 (46-18) with 7 extra-base hits, including 2 homers, a club leading 12 rbi, and 12 of his 153 strikeouts, most by an O's opponent.

Greg Brock had a .348 (46-16) average against the O's and a 46% (56-26) on-base percentage (bb-8, hp-2) . . . Jim Adduci, the former Yokohama (Taiyo) Whale, went 6-for-13 (.462) . . . Paul Molitor stole 6 bases in 6 tries against the O's, and is now 26-for-29 (90%) lifetime.

BREWERS PITCHING: Chris Bosio went the route twice in 2 starts, was 2-0 had had a 1.42 era (ip-19, er-3) in 3 appearances . . . Mike Birkbeck went 2-0 as well (in 2 starts, 2 appearances). He is 4-0 lifetime vs. the O's (including a win in his major league debut on Sep. 28, '86), and 12-13 in the A.L.

Ted Higuera was 2-1, fanned 21 and walked only 4 in 21.1 innings spread over 3 starts... over the past 2 years Higuera has gone 4-2 while holding the O's to a .205 average (171-35).

In '88 **Dan Plesac** saved 3 games in his 5 appearances against the O's while not allowing a run... The O's have batted .130 (46-6) against him over the last 2 seasons in 9 appearances, including 6 saves... **Juan Nieves** who went 2-0 in '87 with a no-hitter vs. Baltimore, was 1-1 last year in 3 appearances (2 starts) with a 7.62 era (ip-13, er-11).

ORIOLES BATTING: Mickey Tettleton hit .400 (20-8) and Joe Orsulak .350 (40-14) ... Cal Ripken hit 3 homers, and Eddie Murray drove in 11 runs in 13 games ... Eddie wound up with a .316 career average vs. the Brewers (567-179) ... He hit 30 homers, surpassed only by his 31 against both Chicago and Detroit, and drove in 105 runs vs. both the Brewers and Angels, his top figure against individual clubs.

Bill Ripken's .296 (81-24) career average vs. the Brewers is his best . . . Brother **Cal** is batting .283 (368-104) . . . **Phil Bradley** is batting .317 (142-45) against Milwaukee.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Ballard (see paragraph #2 above) was 1-1, but held the Brewers to a .196 (51-10) average while compiling a 1.29 era (ip-14, er-2) ... Jose Bautista (1-1) held Milwaukee to a .197 average (76-15) and had a 1.37 era (ip-19.2, er-3).

Bautista and **Mike Morgan** combined to pitch complete games in both ends of a doubleheader on Aug. 5 in Baltimore. It was the only time all year the O's put complete games together back-to-back . . . **Morgan's** 7 wins vs. the Brewers are a career high (he's lost 6) . . . **Mike Boddicker** went 0-2 vs. the Brewers.

VS. MINNESOTA ('88: 3-9, Lifetime: 203-171 vs. Min. only) . . . The O's have gone 8-16 vs. the Twins while losing the last 2 season series . . . Prior to that, the Birds had won 7, lost one and tied 2 over a 10-year span from '77 thru '86 . . . The 9 victories against the O's were the most in 21 years since they went 10-8 vs. the Birds in '67 . . . The Twins beat the O's in Memorial Stadium, 4-3, on the hottest July 16 ever recorded in Baltimore (103 degrees).

AMERICA'S TEAM: The O's lost their A.L. record 21st straight game in Minny on Thu. Apr. 28... On that day only, stations in New York City, Chicago, San Antonio, Cincinnati, Indianapolis, Portland (OR), and Charlotte joined the O's-WBAL radio network to hear history being made.

TWINS BATTING: Randy Bush led all Orioles' opponents in both batting average—.481 (27-13) and on-base percentage—.617 (37-23, bb-8, hp-2) ... He hit 3 homers and drove in 11 runs in 10 games, exactly doubling his home run and rbi totals accumulated over 40 previous career games vs. the O's

Kirby Puckett batted .375 (48-18) with 3 homers and 8 rbi to raise his lifetime average against the O's to .321 (218-70) . . . His lifetime average in the A.L. is .320 (3209-1028) . . . Others who hit well against the O's last year were: **Al Newman**—.421 (21-9) and **Dan Gladden**—.344 (32-11).

Kent Hrbek hit 5 home runs against Balmer pitching, tying him for the lead among all opponents with Boston's **Mike Greenwell** . . . He hit all 5 in 4 straight games vs. the O's, Apr. 26–27–28 (in Minny) and May 5 in Baltimore, including 2 on Apr. 26 . . . They were the first 5 homers he hit all year after going without one in his first 57 at bats . . . In 3 games at the Dome, Apr. 26–27–28, he went 7-for-11 (hit 4 hrs) and raised his average from .222 to

Lifetime, **Hrbek** has hit 19 homers and 54 rbi in 80 games vs. the O's on a .250 average (304-76) **Gary Gaetti,** who has also appeared in 80 games vs. the Birds, is batting .303 (294-89) with 12 homers & 42 rbi.

TWINS PITCHING: Cy Young winner **Frank Viola** was 3-0 vs. the O's in '88 and held the O's to a .188 average (69-13) while compiling a 1.80 era (ip-20, er-4) . . . He has now won 5 straight over the Birds since his last loss to them on July 17, '86. Lifetime he's 9-5 . . . **Allan Anderson** was also 3-0 in 3 starts, his first 3 lifetime decisdions vs. the O's.

Jeff Reardon, against whom the O's batted .130 (23-3), saved 3 games in 5 appearances . . . He's 1-1 with 5 saves in 9 appearances during his 2 A.L. seasons.

ORIOLES BATTING: Cal Jr. batted .390 (41-16) against the Twins last year with no homers, 7 rbi, 10 walks and had a .500 (52-26) on-base percentage. His .347 (323-112) career average against Minnesota is his highest vs. one club . . He has never missed a game vs. the Twins since he joined the O's in Aug. '81 (84 games) . . . Has hit 14 homers in the Twin Cities (9 in Dome and 5 at old Metropolitan Stadium), a career high (his high for one ballpark is 10 at Comiskey Park).

Cal has hit over .300 vs. the Twins every year but one: '82—.326, '83—.367, '84—.313, '85—.340, '86—.340, '87—.261, '88—.391 . . . He has had 3 five-hit games in his career, 2 of them vs. the Twins at the Dome (Sep. 3, '83 & May 5, '85) . . . In the first of those 2 games, he tied or broke 4 club records in a 13-0 Orioles rout, among them most total bases, game (13, tied) . . . Lifetime, he has driven in 33 runs in 42 games at the "Hump."

Larry Sheets has a .318 (110-35) career average against the Twins . . . On May 4th in Balmer, he tied the game in the 9th with a sac fly off **Reardon**, then won it in the 11th with a double of **Keith Atherton**. On July 22, he hit a 442' homer in Minny off **Juan Berenguer** . . . **Phil Bradley's** .325 average (169-55) vs. Minnesota is his high vs. one opponent as are his 28 rbi.

VS. MINNESOTA (Cont.)

Eddie Murray batted .313 (505-158) lifetime vs. Minnesota with 29 homers & 96 rbi in 134 games . . . Eddie homered in each of his last three '88 at bats against Bert Blyleven . . . In 17 games vs. the Twins at Memorial Stadium, Fred Lynn hit 10 home runs and drove in 28 . . . While playing for the Orioles in 36 games against the Twins (home and road), he hit 16 homers and drove in 41 runs.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Only 3 pitchers on the current staff have ever beaten the Twins: Mike Morgan (5-5, 1-1 last year), Dave Schmidt (3-1-2) and Mark Williamson (1-0) ... Williamson, in 7 career appearances, has pitched 13 innings vs. Minnesota and allowed only one earned run (0.69 era). Morgan's win over the Twins in relief on July 23 at the Dome was his first anywhere since Sep. 25, '87.

VS. NEW YORK (188: 3-10, Lifetime: 294-301) . . . The O's went 2-2 in the first 4 games against the Yankees, then lost 7 in a row and 8 of the last 9 . . . It was the 6th straight year the Birds had dropped the season series to the Bombers (starting 183) . . . During that period the O's are 23-55 (.295), and over the last 4 campaigns their record is 12-40 (.231).

BEST RECORD VS. THE YANKEES: From Sep. '70 to 'Sep '87, the O's bore the distinction of being the only team in the A.L. with a lifetime winning record vs. the Yankees. That dominance reached its climax on June 21, '83 when Baltimore's record against them was 26 games over .500 at 272-246 . . . Since then it's been 22-55.

However, the Orioles can still claim the best career won-lost percentage against the Yankees at .494 . . . Detroit ranks 2nd at .491 (810-841) and the Milwaukee (only) Brewers 3rd at .479 (128-139).

The O's generally dominated the rivalry over a 19-year period from '64 thru '82, particularly in the 4 seasons from '65 thru '68 when they went 54-18 (.750) vs. New York, including 30-8 in the Bronx.

In the early days the Yankees built up a huge surplus in wins. For example, the O's were 8-36 (.182) after their first 2 years in the league ('54-'55) and were only slightly improved at 34-76 (.309) thru the first 5 seasons ('54 thru '58).

At Yankee Stadium, the O's are 130-150 (.464), and also rank as the most successful of Yankees' opponents lifetime, despite a 1-5 mark in '88, and an 8-24 record there over the last 5 seasons (starting '84). The Oakland (only) A's (.412, 49-70) and Detroit Tigers (.410, 253-364) are 2nd and 3rd respectively.

The O's were 91-100 in old Yankee Stadium, are 39-50 in the facility since its renovation was completed (reopened in '76), and went 9-9 while playing the Yankees in Shea Stadium ('74–'75).

From '65 thru '68 Yankee Stadium was the O's 2nd favorite place to play . . . During that period, they were 30-8 in NYC, including 10-1 in '65.

THE LONGEST GAME: The O's & Yankees played the 2nd longest major league game of the year, by time on June 4 in Baltimore . . . It started at 7:36 p.m. and ended at 1:22 a.m. some 5:46 (and 14 innings) later . . . It was also the longest game in Orioles history, by time, and the ending was the latest ever at Memorial Stadium.

The finish was sudden and unexpected . . . Entering the home 14th the O's trailed by 2, but loaded the bases in the bottom half off **Hipolito Pena** before he struck out both **Mickey Tettleton** and **Fred Lynn**. At that point, **Cecilio Guante** came on to face **Cal Ripken** . . . **Cal** hit a shot to **Mike Paliarulo** at 3rd . . . **Pag** made a fine stop, spun and threw from his knees . . . The throw skipped past 1st baseman **Gary Ward**, bounced off the television pit railing and skidded into right field as all 3 O's runners crossed,

giving the Birds a 7-6 victory . . . The play was ruled as an E-5 all the way.

ODDS AND ENDS: The Yankees stole 5 bases in one game on June 3 in Baltimore, 3 by Rickey Henderson and 2 by Claudell Washington Mike Boddicker's complete game victory on June 10 was the O's first against anybody in 86 games, since Sep. 4, '87.

YANKEES BATTING: Jack Clark, in his lone A.L. season, made a telling impression on the O's... They walked him 19 times (and hit him once) in 58 plate appearances spread over 13 games . . . Still he managed to hit 3 homers and drive in 9 runs, and he had a whopping .534 (58-31) on-base pct.

Don Mattingly who appeared in only 7 games (and only 13 over the past 2 seasons), is batting .311 lifetime vs. the O's (241-75) with 13 homers and 57 rbi in only 63 games . . . His lifetime mark against all comers is .327 (3391-1109).

Ken Phelps has enjoyed a productive time against Baltimore over the past several seasons . . . Last year for the Mariners & Yankees combined he batted .417 (24-10) with 4 homers & 7 rbi in 10 games . . . Over the last 3 years, he has gone 25-for-82 (.305) in 30 games, and 12 of his 25 hits have been home runs . . . In that span he's had 23 rbi.

Don Slaught hit .318 (22-7) in limited service for the Yankees against the O's . . . He's batting .331 (172-57) lifetime vs. the Birds, 8th among all active opponents. **Dave Winfield** is a .287 lifetime hitter vs. the O's (383-110) with 19 homers & 65 rbi in 97 games.

Rickey Henderson's career numbers vs. the O's are legendary . . . He's batting .343 (385-132), has drawn 81 walks (in 103 games), has a .456 on-base percentage (468-213, including 2 sf, 0 hp), and has stolen 73 bases in 83 attempts (88%).

YANKEES PITCHING: Richard Dotson enjoyed a successful season vs. the O's . . . He was 3-0 in 3 starts (2.11 era, ip-21.1, er-5) and held the Birds to a collective .215 average (79-17) . . . Dotson is now 10-8 lifetime, not including his loss in the '83 ALCS . . . Charles Hudson is 0-1 in regular season competition vs. the O's ('87), but is 0-3 lifetime if you include losses in games #2 and #5 in the '83 World Series while he was with Philadelphia.

The only other pitcher with multiple '88 decisions in the season series was **Rick Rhoden**, who was 1-1 . . . He was 3-1 in 2 A.L. seasons . . . **Rhoden**, incidentally, became the first pitcher to start at dh since the rule was initiated in '73 . . . It was on June 11 in New York . . . He was 0-for-1 with a sac fly in 2 trips, both against **Jeff Ballard**.

Ron Guidry was 1-0, and went 11-9 lifetime against Baltimore in a Yankees' uniform (assuming he won't return in '89) . . . His '88 victory on Sep. 27 in Balmer, was his 1st at the O's expense in 3 years (since Sep. 28, '85) . . . Dave Righetti over the past 3 seasons has won/saved 14 of the Yankees 28 wins against the Birds (w-1, sv-13) . . . During the last 4 seasons vs. Baltimore, he's 2-0 with 16 saves in 23 appearances.

ORIOLES BATTING: The 6 current Orioles with the best lifetime averages against the Yankees, after last year, were Carl Nichols (.444, 18-8), Rene Gonzales (.358, 53-19), Joe Orsulak (.355, 31-11), Rick Schu (.350, 20-7), Ken Gerhart (.318, 66-21), and Phil Bradley (.310, 168-52).

Speaking of **Nichols**, the O's rookie, a catcher by trade, caused **Mattingly** some frustration late last season while playing the outfield (rf) for only the 2nd time in the majors . . . The date was Sep. 27. First he threw **Mattingly** out trying to stretch a single into a double, then later made a sensational diving catch to rob him of a hit.

Eddie Murray had a .269 career average against the Yankees (576-155) with 25 homers & 81 rbi in 153 games . . . Cal Junior is batting .268 (347-93) with 12 homers & 47 rbi in 78 games.

ORIOLES PITCHING: The pitching highlight of the season series from the Orioles' standpoint was rookie **Bob Milacki's** 3-hit 132 pitch shutout on Sep. 28 in which he walked only 2 and fanned 10 . . . It was the last of his 3 straight impressive starts in 3 big league tries after coming up from Rochester in September (his Orioles' era was 0.72, ip-25, er-2).

Milacki and Dave Schmidt (w-2, I-3, sv-3) are the only 2 current Orioles with a lifetime win over New York, and the only one with a career win at Yankee Stadium is Mike Morgan who is 2-8 there . . . Both his wins in the Bronx were as a Yankee . . . He's never beaten the Bombers, against whom he is 0-7.

Jay Tibbs, Mark Williamson, Jeff Ballard and Jose Bautista are all 0-2 lifetime vs. New York.

VS. OAKLAND ('88: 4-8, Lifetime: 141-113, .555, Oakland only)... The O's lost the season series to the A's for only the 2nd time in the past 12 years. During that period, the Birds have won 9 and tied one... Despite a 2-4 record at Oakland last year, the O's are 73-58 lifetime in 21 seasons at the Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum since the A's moved to the Bay Area in '68.

VS. OAKLAND (Cont.)

A's FIRST GAME IN OAKLAND: The Orioles were the visiting club for the A's first game ever in Oakland on April 17, 1968 (after the franchise moved from KC following the 1967 season).

Dave McNally pitched a 2-hitter to beat **Lew Krausse**, 4-1. **Boog Powell** hit the first home run in the Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum while driving in the game winning run (both in the 2nd inning) . . . **Mark Belanger**, **Brooks Robinson**, and the A's **Rick Monday** also homered in that game before a paid audience of 47,233.

A's BATTING: Carney Lansford batted .471 (34-16) vs. the O's, and was 12-for-23 against them during 6 games in May . . . During 6 seasons with the A's he has fashioned a .330 average (233-77) against Baltimore . . . Lifetime he's at .284 (402-114).

Mark McGwire batted .383 (47-18) last year vs. the O's with 3 doubles, 4 homers and a club leading 10 rbi . . . In just over 2 A.L. seasons, McGwire is batting .316 (98-31), has hit 9 homers, and has driven in 22 runs against the Birds in 27 games.

Jose Canseco ('88: .265, 49-13, hr-4, rbi-8), in 38 lifetime games, has 7 homers, 21 rbi and 40 strikeouts, and has batted .238 (147-35) . . . Dave Henderson went 16-for-45 in the season series last year with 9 extra base hits (2bh-6, hr-3) . . . His lifetime average of .354 (198-70) vs. the O's is 2nd among actives only to Marty Barrett's .378 (246-93).

Glenn Hubbard drove in the game winner in 3 straight Oakland victories (not 3 straight games) over the O's on Aug. 17, 27, 28... Walt Weiss hit his 1st big league homer on May 15, '88, in Memorial Stadium off Mark Williamson.

A's PITCHING: Storm Davis (2-0), Curt Young (2-0) and Bob Welch (2-1) were all multiple winners against the O's last year and both Dennis Eckersley and Eric Plunk saved 2 games . . . On the other hand, the A's 20-game winner Dave Stewart (21-12) was 0-2 in 2 starts with a 5.82 era (ip-17, er-11).

Davis who had pitched for the O's organization for 8 years ('79 thru '86), had never worked against his former teammates until Aug. 16, the night of the day that clubowner Edward Bennett Williams was buried . . . He beat Jay Tibbs (see below under "O's Pitching") that evening (his 1st appearance in Balmer since '86) and again 10 days later in Oakland.

Ironically, **Davis** made his big league debut in Baltimore against the A's . . . It was on Apr. 29, '82 when he came on with the score tied, the bases loaded and nobody out in the top of the 9th . . . All 3 runners scored.

Young has beaten the O's 5 straight times over the past 2 years since his last loss to them on May 24, '87 . . . In Baltimore he is 5-0 lifetime with a 2.80 era (ip-35.1, er-11) in 6 games (5 starts) . . . Lifetime he is 6-2.

Stewart was off to an 8-0 start until the O's knocked him off on May 13 (one short of club record at start of season, set by Paul Lindblad in '75)... That night, also, Stewart's 57.1 consecutive homerless inning string came to an end, compliments of Eddie Murray and Fred Lynn, back-to-back... Stewart hasn't beaten the O's since he shut out John Habyan on Aug. 29, '86 in Oakland... He has since dropped 4 straight to the Birds... Lifetime he is 2-5.

Mike Boddicker beat him again 10 days later on May 23 at Oakland . . . At that point, Stewart was 8-3 and 2 of his losses had been to the O's . . . Though he has gone only 2-4 vs. Baltimore since joining the A's, he's held the O's to a collective .226 (190-43) average in that 3-year span.

Welch won his first 2 starts vs. the O's, allowing only one run in 17 innings . . . In his 3rd start against them, on Aug. 18, he was charged with a career high 9 runs in 3.1 innings (9 hits, 5 walks), losing to **Jeff Ballard**, 10-1 . . . Reliefer **Greg Cadaret** had no decisions or saves in 3 appearances, but held the O's to a .174 average (23-4).

Eckersley has been a sensation since becoming a reliever over the last 2 years (10-6 with 61 saves in 114 appearances and a 2.77 era, ip-188.1, er-58) . . . Against Baltimore, however, the results have been relatively modest: 0-2 with 2 saves in 5 appearances and an 8.21 era (ip-7.2, er-7).

Mike Moore was 0-1 in 4 appearances (3 starts) though he held Baltimore batters to a .213 average (80-17) . . . He's now 7-8 lifetime, but has won 4 of his last 5 decisions against the O's.

ORIOLES BATTING: The A's outhit the O's .283 to .234 and outscored them 64 to 41 . . . **Eddie Murray** wound up with a .298 (493-147) average vs. Oakland with 28 homers and 92 rbi in 140 games . . . His 18 home runs at the Coliseum were 2nd only to the 19 he smacked at Tiger Stadium among A.L. road stadia.

Rick Schu is batting .368 (19-7) in limited exposure . . . Former Athletic Mickey Tettleton went 3-for-21 (.143) . . . Larry Sheets who took a .306 career average vs. the A's into the season, also hit .143 (35-5) and watched his career average dip 50 points to .266 (143-38) . . . Phil Bradley's career average against the A's is .307 (166-51) . . . Cal Ripken's .244 average (348-85) vs. the A's is his 2nd lowest (.238 vs. Cleveland, 344-82).

ORIOLES PITCHING: Dave Schmidt had no decisions vs. the A's last year, but lifetime he is undefeated at 4-0 with 2 saves . . . Tom Niedenfuer saved 3 of the O's 4 wins in the season series last year.

Tibbs was 1-3 vs. Oakland . . . When he defeated **Stewart** on May 13, the O's were 5-29, but had won all 3 games **Jay** had started . . . On Aug. 16 while losing to **Davis** in Baltimore, **Tibbs** threw 162 pitches . . . Since we've been counting pitches in the press box at home (starting '78), that is the 2nd highest reading ever for one hurler (**Bob Owchinko**, Cle., 187 on Oct. 4, '80).

Jeff Ballard, in his only '88 appearance vs. the A's, pitched a complete game 4-hitter on Aug. 18, using 142 pitches, enroute to a 10-1 win over **Welch. Jeff** is 2-1 lifetime.

VS. SEATTLE ('88: 7-5, Lifetime: 83-51, .619) . . . This was the only season series won by the Orioles in '88 (they tied Texas) . . . It took 4 wins in the last 5 games between the 2 clubs to make it possible . . . In 12 years, the O's have lost a season set only once ('87) to the Mariners . . . They've won 8 and tied 3.

Despite this predominance and the fact that their lifetime record vs. the Mariners is their best against a current franchise, the O's are only 23-25 against Seattle over the past 4 seasons.

When the O's beat the M's on May 21–22, it marked the first back-to-back victories for the Birds since Sep. 27–28, '87, and it was the first time the O's had captured a series against anybody since Sep. 3–4–5, '87 (vs. Oak.).

BIG SCORE: The O's set a season high in runs when they mashed the M's, 12-5, on May 31 . . . **Larry Sheets** and **Joe Orsulak** led the 16-hit attack with 4 safeties apiece.

PITCHING PERFECTION: Mark Langston and Jose Bautista hooked up in a scintillating pitching duel in Seattle Sep. 3 that took only 1:45, the shortest 9 inning game of the year in the majors . . . Langston hurled a 3-hitter and Bautista, who threw only 70 pitches in his 8-inning (cg) stint, allowed only 4 hits . . The only run of the game scored on 6th inning doubles by Jim Presley and Mickey Brantley.

LATE INNING WINS: The O's swept a doubleheader from the M's, both in sudden death fashion in Baltimore on Aug. 24. Then in the next game between the 2 clubs, on Sep. 2 at the Kingdome, won again with a 9th inning rally, giving them 3 straight last-inning wins vs. Seattle).

In the doubleheader, the 1st one swept by the O's since Sep. 24, '84, Larry Sheets homered in the 9th inning of the opener, and Joe Orsulak ended the nightcap with a 12th inning sac fly . . . Orsulak also drove in the game-winner on Sep. 2 with a single in the 9th.

MARINERS BATTING: The M's batted only .232 (392-91) vs. the O's, but, alas, that's precisely what the O's hit against the M's (392-91) . . . However, Baltimore did outscore Seattle by a 49-40 margin.

There weren't many highlights offensively for the Mariners Henry Cotto hit .303 (33-10) to lead the regulars, Brantley led his club in rbi vs. the O's with 6, and Ken Phelps who was traded to the Yankees in mid-season (for Jay Buhner), led in homers with 2 while playing in 6 games.

All Star 2nd baseman **Harold Reynolds** batted only .162 (37-6) though he's batting .289 lifetime (114-33) ... **Jim Presley,** who's hitting .241 lifetime (199-48), batted only .162 vs. the O's last year (37-6).

VS. SEATTLE (Cont.)

Steve Balboni, who split the season between Kansas City & Seattle, continued to struggle against the Birds, and is now batting .191 lifetime (194-37) with 10 homers in 61 games.

Alvin Davis has a .235 career average (217-51) against the O's with 5 homers & 18 rbi in 58 games, but Dave Valle is batting .429 (49-21), though in only 12 games.

MARINERS PITCHING: Mark Langston (3-0) earned 3 of the M's 5 wins against the O's in 4 starts (including one no-decision) . . . He had a 1.44 era (ip-31.1, h-20, er-5), fanned 23, walked 11, and held Orioles batters to a .189 average (106-20) . . . Langston is now 7-4 lifetime and has won 6 straight decisions over the Birds since he last lost to them on May 18, '87.

ORIOLES BATTING: The O's offensive efforts against the Mariners were modest . . . However, **Joe Orsulak** was most impressive at .419 (31-13) with 3 of his (8) homers . . . **Larry Sheets** batted .300 (40-12), and has a career .319 (135-43) vs. the Mariners, his highest average against a single opponent . . .

Eddie Murray finished his A.L. career with a .305 (495-151) average, 16 homers & 85 rbi in 132 lifetime games vs. the Mariners . . . The Ripken brothers both struggled against Seattle pitching . . Cal hit .222 (45-10) (he's batting .274 lifetime vs. M's) and Bill batted .120 (25-3) . . .

ORIOLES PITCHING: Mark Williamson was the only multiple winner for the O's at 2-1 in '88 . . . In 10 lifetime appearances vs. the Mariners, he has a 2.36 (ip-26.2, er-7) . . . His loss, on May 20, was his 1st major league complete game.

Tom Niedenfuer was 1-0 with 3 saves in 5 appearances, did not give up a run, and held the M's to an .086 average (18-1).

Greg Olson, the O's #1 '88 draft selection who joined the club on Sep. 2 in Seattle, made his debut that night, and picked up the victory . . . He came on at the start of the 8th with the O's down 3-1, fanned **Balboni**, his 1st big league batter and got out of the inning unscathed . . . The O's scored 3 in the top of the 9th, then **Niedenfuer** finished up and got the save.

VS. TEXAS ('88: 6-6, Lifetime: 115-77, .599 Texas only) . . . The O's won-lost percentage against the Washington Senators/Texas Rangers combined (250-158, .644) is their best vs. one franchise . . . Against the Rangers only, the Orioles' .599 is 2nd only to their .619 (83-51) vs. Seattle.

At Texas the O's are 62-35 (.639), their top percentage on foreign soil (current ballparks only) . . . In the 17 seasons since the Rangers left Washington, the O's have won 10 season series, lost 3 and tied 4 . . . Despite the Orioles' recent adversity, they are 55-29 (.655) against the Rangers during the past 7 years.

Though outscored by the Rangers 69-59, the Orioles went 6-6 in the series, and won the season set from the Mariners . . . They had a losing record against the 11 other clubs.

"Fantastic Fans" Night was the biggest day of the year in many ways for the O's . . . it was May 2nd and the club was returning from a road trip with an overall 1-23 record . . . It started early in the morning with remote appearances on the Today Show at Memorial Stadium with Willard Scott by Mayor Curt Schmoke, Brooks, and Frank as well as General Manager Roland Hemond.

At noon the O's announced the release of **Scott McGregor**, and at 4 o'clock the classy lefthander held a highly emotional press conference.

Then, after several hours of negotiation between representatives of the Maryland Stadium Authority and the Orioles, **Governor William Donald Schaefer** and Orioles owner **Edward Bennett Williams** came to the ballpark and shook hands on a new stadium agreement calling for a 15-year lease plus a 5-year option.

Just before game time, **Governor Schaefer** trotted out on the field to make the very dramatic announcement regarding the new ballpark to some 50,402 who had come out to welcome the O's home despite the 1-23 record ... The size of the crowd drew the attention of the entire country. During the early innings, the governor, stadium authority representatives and Orioles' officials held a makeshift press conference in the media dining room behind the press box.

Then, behind **Jay Tibbs**, the O's pounded out 10 hits off **Guzman** and 3 other pitchers to beat the Rangers, 9-4, for their 1st home victory of the season . . . It was, for one night, just like old times . . . It was also the last time that **Edward Bennett Williams** would ever see his Orioles play in person . . . He passed away just over 3 months later on Aug. 13.

RANGERS BATTING: The Rangers hit .290 (410-119) as a club in 12 games vs. the O's . . . Their top hitters were **Geno Petralli** at .364 (22-8) and Stanford **Steve Buechele** at .353 (34-12), a pace that boosted his lifetime mark against the O's to .230 (113-26).

Ruben Sierra was the top rbi producer with 8 in 12 games and over the past 2 years has 19 in 24 games. **Pete Incaviglia** has hit 8 homers & 23 rbi in 30 games lifetime vs. Baltimore.

Three ex-Rangers (as of '89) all hit .333 against the O's in '88 while still playing for Texas: **Pete O'Brien** (45-15), **Oddibe McDowell** (24-8), and **Larry Parrish** (30-10) ... **Buddy Bell** returns to the A.L. and to the Rangers for the 1st time since they traded him to Cincinnati in July '85 ... At the time he left the A.L., **Bell** was batting .284 lifetime (7253-2061) against the league and .243 (621-1501) vs. the O's.

Jim Sundberg has a .305 career average (430-131) in 131 games . . . Julio Franco is hitting .302 (295-89) in 75 games.

RANGERS PITCHING: Jose Guzman went 3-1 in 4 starts vs. the O's while striking out 23 in 26.1 innings . . . He lost his 1st start May 2nd (see "Fantastic Fans" Night above), and at that point was 0-4 lifetime . . . He has since won 3 in a row . . . He gave up 5 of the 14 homers yielded by Texas pitchers to Baltimore batters.

Charlie Hough was 1-1 and is 4-9 lifetime against the Birds... He is now 0-5 lifetime in 7 starts at Memorial Stadium where his era is 4.83 (ip-41, er-22)... He hadn't allowed a home run on the road all year, thru 71.2 innings, until Jim Traber & Ken Gerhart connected back-to-back in Balmer on July 9.

Nolan Ryan returns to the A.L. after 10 years . . . He is 5-13 lifetime against the Orioles, pitched one no-hitter against them (for the Angels at Anaheim June 1, '75), and has a 3.86 era (ip-147.2, er-63) while fanning more than one Oriole an inning (166 k's).

Paul Kilgus, 1-2 in '88, is 1-4 lifetime . . . Bobby Witt appeared in only one game and gave up only 5 hits, but he also walked 10 in 8 innings while losing , 2-1, to Jose Bautista in Balmer on July 10 . . . Ray Hayward made his A.L. debut in Baltimore on May 3 and also earned his 1st major league win, over Mike Boddicker.

ORIOLES BATTING: Cal Ripken hit .304 (46-14) with 3 homers & 7 rbi and is now batting .313 (332-104) lifetime against the Rangers . . Cal has never missed a game against the Rangers since he joined the O's in Aug. '81 (84 games) . . . Eddle Murray finished at .285 (478-136) with 17 homers (10 of them at Arlington) and 80 rbi in 125 games.

Keith Hughes (.462, 13-6) and Joe Orsulak (.357, 14-5) did well in cameo appearances . . . Rick Schu batted only .152 (33-5) but one of those hits was his 1st career grand slam on July 2 off Kilgus at Texas which helped make the O's a 7-4 winner . . . Phil Bradley is batting .321 lifetime (170-61) against the Rangers.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Jay Tibbs was 2-0 (see "Fantastic Fans" Night above) and **Jeff Ballard** was 0-2 . . . In 2 starts, **Ballard** he worked only 4.2 innings and gave up 8 earned runs (15.43 era) . . . **John Habyan**'s only '88 victory (and his only decision) was at the Rangers' expense on July 2 at Texas . . . He's 3-0 lifetime against Texas.

VS. TORONTO ('88: 5-8, Lifetime: 84-69, .549) . . . The Jays won the season series for the 4th time in the last 5 years . . . During that period (starting '84) they are 42-22, .656.

At Memorial Stadium last year, however, the O's were 4-2 and are now 49-28(.636) lifetime at home against the Jays despite going only 13-19 these past 5 seasons.

It's a different story at Exhibition Stadium . . . The Orioles have dropped 12 of their last 13 games there, and have gone 11-27 (.289) in the Jays' original ballpark beginning '83 (6 years) . . . Lifetime, the O's are 35-41 in Toronto.

VS. TORONTO (Cont.)

BLUE JAYS BATTING: The Jays outhit the O's .278 to .220 and outscored them 56-43 . . . The Blue Jays' keystone combination, Tony Fernandez and Manny Lee, were consistently devastating against Baltimore. Lee hit .353 (34-12) in 10 games and Fernandez .351 (57-20) in 13 . . . Fernandez has hit Orioles' pitching at a .398 clip (113-45) over the last 2 years, and has a .329 (219-72) lifetime average, 9th among active opponents.

George Bell has driven in 28 runs in the 25 games he's played against the O's over the past 2 years . . . He has 49 rbi and 17 homers in 68 games career games vs. Baltimore.

Fred McGriff hit 4 homers vs. the O's last year while batting .318 (44-14) A couple of veteran Orioles tormentors struggled in the season series Ernie Whitt batted only .156 (32-5) and Jesse Barfield hit only .205 (44-9) with just one home run and 3 rbi . . . Lifetime, he is still batting .304 (260-79) with 17 homers & 43 rbi in 82 games.

BLUE JAYS PITCHING: Dave Stieb was 2-0 last year, allowing only 2 earned runs in 15 innings over 2 starts (1.20 era) and held the O's to a collective .104 average (48-5) . . . Stieb, who is 5-7 lifetime, earned both his victories in Toronto . . . They were his first 2 decisions against the O's since he beat Jim Palmer on Apr. 18, '84 . . . He has never won a game in Baltimore, where he is 0-4.

On Sep. 30 in Toronto, for the 2nd time in 2 starts, Stieb watched a no-hitter vanish with 2 out in the 9th inning . . . This time it was a bloop single by **Jim Traber**, beyond the reach of 1st baseman **Fred McGriff** . . . In Stieb's last previous start, Cleveland's Julio Franco had played the spoiler with a bad-hop base hit.

Jim Clancy, now with the Astros, was 3-1 in 4 starts vs. the O's Lifetime he is 14-12. He won 6 of his last 7 decisions vs. Baltimore, and 4 of his 11 A.L. shutouts have been at the expense of the Orioles

In Baltimore, Clancy once put together a string of 27 consecutive scoreless innings . . . The streak began Aug. 4, '84 and ended June 12, '87 . He's only 6-7 lifetime on 33rd Street (3 of those wins were shutouts), but was 0-5 at the start of his career (he didn't win his 1st game here until June 5,

Mike Flanagan held the O's to a .220 average (50-11), but was 0-2 against them in 2 starts . . . His lone career victory vs. the O's occurred in Toronto (over Jose Mesa) on Sep. 15, '87 . . . At the time he was traded to the Blue Jays (Aug. 31, '87 for Mesa and Oswald Peraza), he was 17-7 lifetime against Toronto, making him the biggest winner ever vs. the Jays.

Tom Henke faced only 6 Orioles batters last year in 2 appearances, but picked up 2 saves . . . In 16 career outings vs. Baltimore, Henke is 3-1 with 6 saves ... John Cerutti, 1-1-1 last year, has held the O's to a .213 (108-23) average over the past 2 years . . . Lifetime, he's 4-1-1 . . . Jimmy Key has won 3 straight from the O's since losing 5 in a row in '85-'86 . . . Lifetime, he's 5-6.

ORIOLES BATTING: A couple of newcomers enjoyed the most success offensively against the Jays . . . Rick Schu batted .345 (29-10) and Joe Orsulak .357 (19-7) . . . Cal Ripken batted .289 (38-11) with one homer & 7 rbi, and had an on-base percentage of .460 (50-23, including 11 walks and a hit by pitch) . . . Lifetime, he's batting .263 (334-88) with 12 homers & 48 rbi.

Eddie Murray leaves the league having batted .295 (581-153) with 25 homers & 89 rbi in 140 games vs. Toronto . . . Larry Sheets has hit .295 (122-36) lifetime against the Jays also . . . Phil Bradley has a .323 career average (167-54).

ORIOLES PITCHING: Jeff Ballard was the O's workhorse against the Jays, . The Stanford University product started twice against having gone 2-2. Amherst's John Cerutti, and once against Harvard's Jeff Musselman. In his final outing against the Jays, he was the victim of Stieb's one-hitter (Sep. 30)

Dave Schmidt, the only Oriole to beat the Blue Jays (1-0) in '87, was 1-1 in '88 . . . Jay Tibbs was 1-2 vs. Toronto last year.

ALL-STAR GAME NOTES

1988: Shortstop Cal Ripken Jr. was the only Oriole on the '88 all-star team. For the first time since '83, **Ripken** wasn't elected to start by the fans, but was named to start by A.L. manager Tom Kelly, replacing injured Alan Trammell. Ripken played 81/2 innings and was 0-for-3, with a walk. He grounded out twice, and flied out to right on fan interference. The A.L. won 2-1 at Cincinnati in the 59th all-star

All-Star Starts: Ripken and NY's Dave Winfield are the only 2 A.L. players to start the last 5 all-star games ('84-'88). Ripken started his 5th straight, and only one shortstop in major league history has had more consecutive all-star game starts: Ozzie Smith has started the last 6. Only 2 other shortstops in major league history have started more years in an all-star game: **Joe Cronin**, Bos.-Wash.-7 and Smith-6. Cincinnati's **Dave Concepcion** also started 5 years.

Ripken's 5 straight starts tie **Brooks Robinson** for the most consecutive starts by an Oriole. **Brooks** started 5 straight, '64-'68.

ORIOLES ALL STAR GAME NOTES (Cont.)

Elected Starts: Cal and Brooks share the club mark for most consecutive elected starts (4). Sixteen Orioles have been elected to start in the 19 years of fan voting. In addition to Cal and Brooks, Orioles who have been elected to starting berths are Boog Powell ('70-'71), Frank Robinson ('70-'71), Bobby Grich ('76), Ken Singleton ('81), Eddie Murray ('85) and Terry Kennedy ('87).

Selection of the starting team was returned to the fans in '70 under the sponsorship of the Gillette Company, in cooperation with Major League Baseball. Following the ballot box "stuffing" incident in Cincinnati in '57, responsibility was entrusted to major league players for 12 years ('58 thru '69). In '87, USA Today began sponsorship of the fan balloting.

All-Star Game Saves: The A.L. has won only 7 of the last 35 all-star games (beginning '58), but it's been Oriole relievers who have saved 4 of those victories: **Billy O'Dell** ('58-'59), **Milt Pappas** ('62) and **Don** Aase ('86).

Orioles All-Star MVPs: Three Orioles have won MVP honors in all-star competition: Billy O'Dell ('58), Brooks Robinson ('66) and Frank Robinson ('71).

O'Dell, the former Orioles' left-hander who also pitched for the Giants, Braves and Pirates, hurled the last 3 innings of the only all-star game ever played in Baltimore and retired all 9 batters he faced to

protect a one-run lead, thus giving the A.L. a 4-3 win.

Brooks won the '66 Arch Ward Memorial Trophy on the strength of a 3-for-4 effort at bat (including a triple) and an 8-for-8 performance

afield. He was the first player from a losing team to be so honored.

Frank's 4th inning home run at Detroit in '71 put the A.L. on top to stay and earned him MVP honors. It was the first all-star victory since '62 for the A.L., which did not win again until '83.

ORIOLES POST-SEASON NOTES

ALCS: The O's hold several ALCS/LCS records including: Most ALCS (7, in 20 year history of divisional play), Most ALCS won (5), Most ALCS games won (18). Their LCS W-L percentage (.692, 18-8), is also a record.

The O's won the first 10 ALCS games they played (including the first 9 ever played) . . . They swept the Twins twice ('69-'70) and A's ('71) in the first 3 ALCS, then won game #1 against Oakland in '73 before losing the 2nd game that year . . . The Orioles are 9-4 at home and on the road.

WORLD SERIES: Baltimore has gone 3-3 in 6 WS, but has a .576 pct. in games (19-14) . . . The Birds are 10-7 at home and 9-7 on the road.

POST-SEASON TOTAL: In 59 post-season games, the O's are 37-22 (.627). They are 19-11 at home and 18-11 away.

ATTENDANCE: In 26 ALCS games, the O's have played to 1,020,384, an average of 39,246. They've played 13 of those at home and have drawn 548,443 (average 42,188).

In 33 WS games attendance has totaled 1,769,179 (average 53,611). At home for 17 WS dates the Birds have pulled 877,518 (average 51,619).

The Orioles 59 total post-season games have attracted 2,789,563 (average 47,281). At Memorial Stadium there have been 30 post-season events which have drawn a total of 1,425,961 (average 47,514).

The 3 biggest crowds to watch the O's in a WS were games 5,4, & 3 (67,064; 66,947 and 65,792) of '83, all at Philadelphia. The largest attendance for a WS game in Baltimore was 54,458 for game #4 (final game) vs. Dodgers in '66.

The biggest house for an Orioles LCS game was 52,787 for game #1 at Baltimore vs. the Angels in '79 (the "Tonight, Let it be Lowenstein" game).

ORIOLES WORLD SERIES SHARES BY YEAR

Since 1960 (the first year they qualified for a share), the O's have finished in the first division 21 times in 29 seasons, thereby qualifying in all but 8 years ('62, '67, '78, '84, '85, '86, '87, '88) for a share of the WS pool (combined since '69 with the LCS). (Cont. on page 84.)

THE ORIOLES—PAST AND PRESENT

Major League Baseball returned to the City of Baltimore in 1954 after an absence of more than half a century.

The transfer of the St. Louis Browns to Baltimore represented the first inter-city shift of an American League club in 52 seasons. Ironically, it was Baltimore that had been victimized in the last previous move. The Orioles, a charter franchise in the new league in '01, moved to New York under shadowy circumstances for \$18,000 after the 1902 season. There, they were renamed, first the "Highlanders", then later—gasp! —the "Yankees"

Thirty five seasons have elapsed since the Orioles set up shop at 33rd & Ellerslie. During 31/2 decades they have finished first 8 times, captured 6 American League pennants and won 3 World Series. They've also been runners-up 8 times, and have wound up in the 1st division 21 times (all in the last 29 years) . . . The Orioles have enjoyed 25 winning seasons, including, at one stretch, 18 in a row from '68 thru '85.2

The O's maintained the winningest record in the majors from '57 thru '87, a stretch of 31 years, but it was really from '60, when they nearly won their 1st pennant, thru '83, when they captured their last, that they dominated major league baseball.

During that 24 year period, they were 612 games over .500 (2206-1594), .581) and held a 991/2 game edge over the major' 2nd best club of that era, the Yankees.

IN THE BEGINNING

A winning tradition is not peculiar to the modern Orioles, however. It took root in Baltimore a long time ago. There are no fewer than 20 former Orioles players in the Baseball Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, and 14 of them played here before 1954 (see page 94).

The history of professional baseball in Baltimore dates back 116 years to 1872, when the city was represented in the National Association, an important forerunner of today's major leagues

Baltimore's baseball heritage was richly embellished in the formative

- -A left-hander named Matt Kilroy, who won 46 games for the American Association O's in 1887;
- -Three straight National League pennant winners ('94, '95, '96), a team that would ultimately produce 6 Hall of Famers3;
- -The manager of that championship team, an innovative man named Ned Hanlon, who with the help of his talented athletes did much to shape the
- future of baseball strategy4 -Legendary all-time greats Babe Ruth, Lefty Grove, and John McGraw to name a few;
- Jack Dunn, whose name has long been synonymous with baseball in Baltimore. An infielder and pitcher with the city's original A.L. franchise, Dunn subsequently owned and managed the International League Orioles for 22 eventful seasons from 1907 thru 1928.

Among his many achievements: signing Ruth to his first professional contract, and winning 7 straight pennants from 1919 thru 1925⁵. It was the Dunn family that kept professional baseball alive and well in Baltimore during most of those 51 years between big league franchises6;

-And, by a crowd of 52,833 that attended a Little World Series game at Municipal Stadium (on the same site as Memorial Stadum) between the Orioles and Louisville Colonels on Oct. 9, 1944. That same afternoon in St. Louis, the Cardinals and Browns played the decisive 6th game of the World Series before a crowd that was 20,203 smaller at Sportsman's Park (att: 32,630).7

RETURN TO THE MAJORS

Officially the American League returned to Baltimore on Sep. 29, 1953. That was the day American League owners, meeting in New York, unanimously approved the purchase of a controlling interest in the St. Louis Browns from previous owner Bill Veeck by a group of Baltimore negotiators, led by Mayor Tommy D'Alesandro Jr. ("Old Tommy") and attorney Clarence Miles, who became the club's first president. The purchase price was \$2 475 000

Unfortunately, only the name on the uniforms had changed. In 1954, the Orioles were merely the Browns transplanted. They were essentially the same team that had finished in the 2nd division for so many years in St. Louis (see "St. Louis Browns" below).

The Birds, under the likable veteran manager Jimmy Dykes⁹, lost 100 games that season while winning only 54. But, as poor as that record was, it wasn't bad enough to finish last. Happily, that dubious honor belonged to the Philadelphia A's with a record of 51-103.

The Orioles' escape from the basement that year allowed them to maintain a notable distinction for 32 years. They had never finished last until the string finally ran out in 1986.

THE START OF SOMETHING BIG

The Orioles took the first big step in the right direction on Sep. 14, 1954 when they hired White Sox Manager Paul Richards to come aboard as both manager and general manager, succeeding Dykes and Arthur Ehlers 10. Richards, a native of Waxahachie, Texas, and a catcher for the World Champion Detroit Tigers in '45, was a highly regarded strategist and a fine handler of pitchers. In Baltimore, he also became an aggressive administrator.

Not long after he arrived, Richards engineered a 17-player deal with the Yankees, probably the biggest in baseball history (see page 34 for details). The O's gave up Bob Turley, Don Larsen, shortstop Bill Hunter and 5 others. Among the 9 who came to Baltimore were two who proved to be very special: Gus Triandos, the Orioles' first legitimate long ball threat, and a slick fielding, crowd-pleasing shortstop named Willy Miranda. Those two helped keep the fans happy during those early years while the club struggled toward legitimacy.

In '55, Richards kept the revolving door well greased. A total of 54 players wore the black and orange that year, including 23 pitchers. While 'Tall Paul" was wheeling and dealing at the major league player level, his farm department (Jim McLaughlin and Harry Dalton) was pursuing young amateur talent at a relentless pace all over the country.

Among those prospects was a kid from Little Rock, named Brooks Robinson, who would develop into the best fielding 3rd baseman of all-time, and would spend 23 seasons in an Orioles uniform before moving on to the Hall of Fame in Cooperstown.

Gradually, the Orioles began to improve. In 1957, Richards' 3rd season in Baltimore, the Birds finished at .500 (76-76) for the first time. In 1960, with a club comprising 10 regulars in their 20's, 7 of them rookies, the Birds nearly won their first pennant.11

Richards was particulary adept at reconstructing the careers of fading veterans¹² and developing young pitchers. During his reign, the Orioles became famous for the "Kiddie Korps", a passel of hard-throwing youngsters who pitched in Baltimore from the mid-50s to the early 60s13.

THE NEXT STEP UP

In the fall of '58, the Orioles hired the Yankees' highly respected farm director Lee MacPhail as general manager, replacing Richards 14 who nevertheless remained as field manager (until Sep. '61). MacPhail improved the fiscal and administrative efficiency of the operation and increased the productivity of the club's minor league system . . . He also made some brilliant deals. 15

After the near miss of '60, the Orioles set a club record with 95 wins in '61 while Diamond Jim Gentile, acquired the year before from the Dodgers, gave Orioles fans an unprecedented show of power and production (46 home runs, including a major league record-tying 5 grand slams, and 141

In '64, another near miss under the direction of "Manager of the Year" Hank Bauer. The Birds finished 3rd, but only 2 games back of the pennantwinning Yankees and produced their first American League MVP—Brooks

MacPhail left the Orioles after the '65 season to join Baseball Commis-Robinson. sioner William D. "Spike" Eckert as his principal advisor; but not before negotiating what was arguably the most important trade in the ballclub's history. It was the deal that brought National League superstar **Frank Robin**son from Cincinnati in exchange for the best pitcher the Orioles had ever had to that point, Milt Pappas1

THE LAND OF PLEASANT LIVING

Just before MacPhail departed, Jerry Hoffberger and his family 18 acquired a controlling interest in the franchise. The Hoffbergers owned the Baltimore-based National Brewing Company, and their highly successful. advertising theme for many years was based on the concept that the Chesapeake Bay area was "The Land of Pleasant Living"

That was surely true for the Orioles who went on to enjoy a golden age of on-the-field prosperity. Over the next 6 seasons, the Orioles would win four pennants and in a period of 9 years would finish first six times. 19

Hoffberger brought Frank Cashen from the brewery to serve as executive vice president, and promoted the club's talented farm director, Harry Dalton, to run the baseball program.

In '66, the Orioles not only won their first pennant, under Hank Bauer, they shocked the baseball world by sweeping the heavily favored Dodgers in four straight. Frank Robinson, in his first A.L. season, won the Triple Crown (.316, 49 hr, 122 rbi), and was MVP of both the American League and the

It had taken a player of Frank's stature to put the O's over the top, but World Series. the club was already blessed with considerable talent; players like Brooks Robinson and Luis Aparicio who would later join Frank in the Hall of Fame, long ball hitting 1st baseman Boog Powell, rookie 2nd baseman Dave Johnson, perennial gold glove centerfielder Paul Blair, and a couple of pitchers named Jim Palmer and Dave McNally, still the top 2 winners in Orioles history. All but Frank and Aparicio were products of the O's fertile

The O's slumped badly in '6720 and were going nowhere in '68 at the Allfarm system. Star break when Dalton replaced Bauer with his longtime associate, Earl Weaver. The feisty 5'8" St. Louisan had enjoyed a remarkable career as a manager in the O's farm system. Over the next 141/2 years he would experience even greater success at the major league level.

Having added the ultimate leadoff man (Don Buford), and a talented lefthanded pitcher (Mike Cuellar), and having replaced one gold glover for another at shortstop (Mark Belanger for Aparicio), the O's would reign over the American League for the next 3 years.

In '69, '70 & '71, they became only the 3rd club in history to win 100 or more games for three straight years²¹. They won the division title by 19, 15, and 12 games, and swept the first 3 American League Championship Series, 3 games to none²², over the Twins twice and A's once.

Following a humiliating loss to the New York Mets in the '69 World Series, the O's bounced back in '70 and took the Cincinnati Reds in a 5 game series that that was thoroughly dominated by the brilliance of Brooks Robinson.

In '70, the O's had three 20-game winners (McNally, Palmer & Mike Cuellar); the next year they had 4 (add Pat Dobson), a feat that had occurred only once before in major league history²³

THAT OLD GANG OF MINE

After the Orioles lost a heartbreaking 7-game World Series to the Pirates in '71, **Dalton** left the ballclub to run the California Angels, and Executive VP Cashen added player personnel decisions to his job description.

After their 4 pennants in 6 seasons, the O's began to perform some major surgery. Frank Robinson was traded and, a year later, so were Dave Johnson, Buford and others.

The '72 season was grim but with youngsters like Bobby Grich, Don Baylor, Al Bumbry and Richie Coggins joining forces with Boog, Blair, **Brooks**, and all those talented starters²⁴, the O's regained the division championship in '73, and defied the odds to win it again in '74.

On Aug. 28, '74, the O's were in 4th place, 8 games behind the first-place Red Sox. When the smoke had cleared 5 weeks later, the O's, who had gone 28-6 during that stretch, were on top of the heap, a shade ahead of the 2nd place Yankees, and a full 8 games up on the 3rd place Bosox.

THE PETERS PRINCIPLE

Cashen, who had acquired Ken Singleton, Mike Torrez and Lee May in a couple of glittering trades the previous winter, returned to the beer business after the '75 season²⁵. He was replaced by the widely respected & highly capable career baseball executive, Hank Peters, who had most recently served as president of the National Association (the minor leagues).

Not long after his arrival, Peters shook up the Orioles, trading for the flamboyant long-ball hitting **Reggie Jackson**²⁶. But of more long term significance was the 10-player deal he constructed with the Yankees in June '76. Three of the 5 players acquired in that deal contributed greatly to the Orioles many successes over the next decade: Rick Dempsey, Tippy Martinez and Scott McGregor.27

The Orioles remained competitive well into the 80s despite serious losses from the new free agent re-entry system adopted in '7628. Peters' Yankee deal, plus a fine farm system harvest in the early 70s which produced Eddie Murray, Mike Flanagan and Rich Dauer among others, helped the cause immeasurably (from '76 thru '83, the O's won 2 golds and 5 silvers in 8

THE BALTIMORE-WASHINGTON CONNECTION

In '79, right after the O's had lost a second 7-game World Series to the Pirates, the internationally renowned Washington attorney, Edward Bennett Williams, purchased the ballclub in its entirety.

Williams brought with him a new regional marketing concept designed to expand the Orioles appeal over a wider geographic area. The plan was to add metropolitan Washington and states to the south to a drawing area that had been basically limited to Maryland and parts of Pennsylvania and Dela-

The program has met with popular acceptance by baseball fans all over "Birdland." Despite the Orioles' below-average performance on the field these past 5 seasons, attendance at Memorial Stadium has averaged 1,930,000 per year.

In the first four years of the Williams-Peters administration, the O's nearly captured 3 pennants though they had to settle for one. They won 100 games in '80 and finished 2nd, 3 games back of the Yankees; played the Brewers for the division championship on the final day of the '82 season and lost; then won it all in '83.

There were some remarkable achievements during that period. In '80, for example, there was a 5-game series against the Yankees in Baltimore that drew 249,605, the largest turnout in history for a single series.

Then, there was '82 when the O's went 33-10 (starting Aug. 10) down the stretch to tie the Brewers on the next-to-last day of the season by beating them in 3 straight pressure-packed games at Memorial Stadium. On the climactic day, however, the Brewers won big, to clinch their first division championship.

Yet, despite that crushing defeat, most of the crowd of over 51,000 remained in their seats for a full 45 minutes afterward. They stayed to applaud the players for their down-to-the-wire effort and to say goodbye to the manager, Earl Weaver, whose retirement had officially begun at game's end.

ORIOLES—PAST AND PRESENT (Cont.)

The emotion expressed so warmly and spontaneously by those loyal Orioles fans made it difficult to tell, in the dusk of that autumn afternoon, who had won the game and who had lost.

It was in '82 also that the son of the Orioles 3rd base coach, Cal Ripken Jr., took his place in the Orioles starting lineup, a position he has not relinquished since-even for one game, and joined with Eddie Murray, the Orioles all-time home run champion, to form an awesome 1-2 punch.

3RD WORLD TITLE

Joe Altobelli, a veteran of many years in the Orioles organization before taking a 6-year sabbatical in '77, returned to manage the Birds to their 3rd world title in '83.

They won the division by 6 games, then beat the White Sox at Comiskey Park in game #4 on a dramatic 10th inning home run by the newest Oriole, Tito Landrum, that broke a scoreless tie29

Mike Boddicker was the playoff MVP for his 14-strikeout 4-0 win in game #2 after the O's had dropped the opener. The gritty right-hander repeated the process in the 2nd game of the World Series with a 3-hitter against the

After splitting the first 2 games of the World Series in Baltimore against the Phillies.30 Phillies, the action moved 90 miles north to Veteran's Stadium where the National League champions boasted the best home record in baseball. But, the Orioles swept the 3 games in Philadelphia, then cruised happily home down 195 with their 3rd world title in hand.

In the decisive 5th game, Rick Dempsey homered to clinch the World Series MVP award and Eddie Murray hit 2 electrifying home runs while Scott McGregor was blanking the Phillies on 5 hits.

The 1983 champions boasted 2 dominating players in Murray and Ripken and excellent pitching, but most observers credited the club's many "role" players with making the difference, for getting the most out of their abilities while submerging their own egos in the interest of winning.31

CHANGES

Since that world championship season, the Orioles have experienced a series of lean years. Those unaccustomed setbacks led to a series of personnel decisions by Edward Bennett Williams in the fall of '87 that signaled the start of a massive and fundamental rebuilding project. That program is now accelerating under the leadership of the men to whom Ed Williams assigned the task before he died last August.

MEMORIAL STADIUM—A BRIEF HISTORY

Construction of Baltimore Memorial Stadium began on the site of old Municipal Stadium in 1949. A single deck concrete grandstand with no roof was completed in '50 with 20,000 chair seats1, and home plate was moved from its original location (in what is now left field) to its present position. The stadium's external trappings were left unchanged. It was not yet a major league ballpark.

However, it was that facility which was officially dedicated and re-named "Memorial Stadium" when Mayor Tommy D'Alesandro Jr. ("Old Tommy") threw out the first ball for the International League Orioles '50 opener (Apr. 20).2

Soon after that dedication, plans to improve the stadium further, to satisfy major league requirements, were suspended when a second bond issue was defeated.

Finally in '53, bond loans were approved, and work began anew. Despite the construction, the I.L. Orioles continued to play there thru '53, as did the Baltimore Colts when they emigrated from Dallas (Texans) that same year.

Essentially the new stadium, seating capacity approximately 47,700, was completed in October '53, but refinements continued thru the spring of '54, the modern American League Orioles' first season in Baltimore. The cost of the project, built on 283/4 acres of city-owned property (and financed by 2 bond issues), was \$6 million.

Original Municipal Stadium

The original Municipal Stadium, completed in '24, was built expressly for football. However, when old Oriole Park (NW corner of Greenmount Ave. & 29th St. intersection), owned by the Dunn family, burned down on the night and early morning of July 3-4, '44, Municipal Stadium became, of neccesity, the new home of the Orioles.

MEMORIAL STADIUM (Cont.)

During a hastily scheduled 2-week road trip, the stadium was made ready for baseball. Later that year, the Orioles went on to win the International League pennant, then captured the Little World Series. One of those games, against the Louisville Colonels (American Association), drew an astonishing 52,833 which remained a Baltimore baseball attendance record until the '66 World Series.3

Changing Dimensions

Thru the years, the playing field has undergone significant dimensional changes. Inside the cavernous ballpark that greeted Orioles fans on opening day '54, home plate to dead center field measured 450'.3

Since then the outfield boundaries have been altered 4 times ('56, '59, '62 & '76), gradually reducing the distance to straightaway center 45' to 405', and the power alleys accordingly.4

Stadium Improvements

Originally the Orioles' dugout was on the first base side, and there was an 8' wall separating the front row of the boxes from the field. Baltimore led the world in foul territory⁵. That situation was rectified in '61 with the construction of field box seats (2,600 of them), which necessitated building new dugouts. It was then that the home team moved to the 3rd base side.

In '64, 4 additional upper deck sections were added, increasing the capacity by another 2,600. In '70 (mid-season), a new scoreboard (now known as the old scoreboard) was installed and the original, squirrel-infested structure demolished.

Subsequently, the splintery wooden benches (without backs) that covered the entire second deck were replaced by chairs and metal benches with back rests, and a 35th row was added.

In '80, 6 new towers, housing a new ticket window and additional ticket office space, storage areas and rest rooms, were completed.

In '85, new, badly needed Orioles administrative offices were constructed, and a large new state-of-the-art video board (Diamond Vision by Mitsubishi) was added in right-center field as a dramatic and colorful complement to its 15-year-old cousin in left center.

During the last 33 seasons, the contraction of the outfield distances and greater emphasis on the long ball have resulted in a 5-fold increase in homer run production at Memorial Stadium (235 in 82 games last year, 2.87/game).

NEW DOWNTOWN BALLPARK

A new downtown, open air, natural grass, state-of-the-art baseball only facility, seating approximately 50,000 is scheduled to be completed by opening day 1992

It will be built on an 85 acre tract, the site of the old Baltimore & Ohio (B & O) Camden Yards rail center . . . The property is bounded by Camden Street (N), Russell St. (W), Ostend Street Viaduct (S) and I395/Howard Street (E).

It was in Apr. '87 that the Maryland State Legislature authorized the Maryland Stadium Authority (MSA), under the direction of Chairman Herbert J. Belgrad, to proceed with planning a major professional sports complex, comprising two separate stadiums on the Camden Yards site . . . Construction of the baseball park was contingent upon the Orioles signing a long term lease. The football stadium would be built within these same 85 acres, only if the National Football League awards Baltimore another franchise to replace the Colts.

Just over a year later, the Orioles committed to that long term lease (15 years). In a dramatic pre-game announcement at "Fantastic Fans" Night in Memorial Stadium last May 2nd, Maryland Governor William Donald Schaefer told a crowd of more than 50,000 that the Orioles and MSA had reached an agreement that would bind the Orioles to Baltimore, at the very least, until 2006. One of the Orioles fans at the ballpark that night was a man who made that agreement and the new ballpark possible. It would be the last time he would ever see his Orioles play. His name was Edward Bennett Williams.

Before construction can begin, the MSA must clear the site of the 26 business enterprises now occupying the property. That process should be under way by October, and actual ground breaking could begin by next

Though the design is not complete, the Orioles, MSA and the stadium architects (Hellmuth, Obata & Kassabaum, "HOK" of Kansas City) agreed in February to retain the huge eight story, 1,016 foot long (though only 51 feet wide from wall to wall inside) B & O Warehouse.

It is too early to tell exactly where the warehouse will be with respect to the playing field. However, it will be in right field, will run roughly parallel to the 3rd base line, and will be totally integrated with the rest of the ballpark. . How close in, or how far out it will be, is still to be determined.

Club President Larry Lucchino emphasized that the club and MSA wanted to retain the warehouse chiefly because it will add another key element in helping to establish a traditional look and flavor . . . "This will not be a cookie-cutter stadium, like so many others," Lucchino has said, "The warehouse will enhance the quality of the park, and give us an old-fashioned feel that we all think is important to the project. It is all part of the plan to provide a ballpark with old-time character and intimacy blended with modern sightlines and conveniences.

The building will provide unique architectual opportunities as well as functional space for executive offices (for both the Orioles and MSA), Orioles ticket offices, and a variety of hospitality and food serving facilities for use by fan groups. An Orioles Hall of Fame and museum, an extension of the Orioles exhibits on display at the Babe Ruth Birthplace two blocks away, is another possibility for the warehouse.

And, speaking of the Babe, let it be known, that the immortal George Herman Ruth, native of this "Monumental City," once lived on the 2nd floor of a bar owned by his father, and located in what will be centerfield at the new Camden Yards ballpark in downtown Balmer.

THE ST. LOUIS BROWNS

The St. Louis Browns, the franchise from which the current Orioles descend, originated in Milwaukee in '01, the American League's first season. Before the '02 season began, the franchise had moved to St. Louis. It was after that same campaign that the original A.L. Orioles went to New York.1

The Browns, who took the name that originated with St. Louis teams in the late 1800s,² played 52 seasons ('02-'53) in St. Louis and were probably the most consistently bad club in major league history. They were 3,416-4,465, .4333 (that's more than 1,000 games under .500); wound up in the 2nd division (5th thru 8th) 40 times; won just one pennant ('44, a war year), and finished 2nd only twice ('02 & '22).

George Sisler, one of 12 Hall of Famers who played and/or managed for the Browns4, was almost certainly the club's all-time best (and most significant) player. He would do credit to any franchise. In 13 seasons with the Brownies ('15 thru '27), he twice hit over .400 ('20-.407, '22-.420) and had a career average of .340.

Another outstanding contributor was outfielder Ken Williams. He is not in the Hall of Fame, but he hit over .300 nine times in 10 St. Louis seasons and in '22 batted .332 with 34 doubles, 39 homers and 155 rbi. He was the home run champion that year with 4 more than Babe Ruth, and was the first ever to join the so-called "30-30" club-30 or more steals and 30 or more homers in the same year.

As you can see, '22 was a big year for both Sisler and Williams and the Browns set a club record for wins-93 (it was the only time in the history of the franchise that they reached the 90 victory level). They finished 2nd, one game back of the Yankees.

ST. LOUIS BROWNS (Cont.)

Despite the heroics of Sisler and Williams, however, when fans recal the Browns, they probably think first of a couple of guys named Gray and Gaedel.

Pete Gray, who had only one arm (his left), appeared in 77 games for the Browns in '45 (the last wartime season) at the age of 28. He batted .213 (234 51) with no homers and 13 rbi, and never returned to the big time. 5

The appearance of Eddie Gaedel, at 3'7" and 65 pounds, was a product of club owner Bill Veeck's creative genius . . . The 26-year old midget was signed in '51 as a pinch hitter and, in his only plate appearance, he did what he was paid for, he drew a walk.

As a surprise pinch hitter for leadoff batter Frank Saucier in the home half of the 1st inning, little Eddie was walked on 4 pitches by Detroit pitcher Bob Cain, then promptly replaced by pinch runner Jim Delsing⁶

The '44 A.L. pennant winners went 89-65 to finish one game ahead of the Tigers. They lost the World Series in 6 games to their hometown rivals, the Cardinals, in one of 3 World Series, played entirely in one stadium7 (Sports man's Park was the regular season home of both clubs). The Browns won games #1 and #3 behind Denny Galehouse and Jack Kramer respectively. The Browns' only home run in the series was hit by 1st baseman George McQuinn.

In June '51, Bill DeWitt, who had been with the Browns since '16 (when Branch Rickey was gm), and his brother, Charles, sold their controlling interest to Bill Veeck. He operated the club for the next 21/2 seasons. Twice in '53, Veeck attempted to bring the franchise to Baltimore himself, but could not get the necessary approval from American League owners . . . Subsequently (Sep. 29, '53), he sold his holdings to a group of Baltimore businessmen and the transfer was approved unanimously.

The Browns are gone from St. Louis, but not forgotten. The St. Louis Browns Fan Club, organized by Maryville College Professor Bill Borst in 1984, is alive and well. The members have even established a club hall of fame on the campus at Maryville (in St. Louis).

THE ORIOLES HALL OF FAME

The new Veterans Committee, organized to honor deserving former Orioles who had been overlooked in past voting, held its 1st election in December and chose relief pitcher Stu Miller and long-ball hitting 1st baseman Jim Gentile for induction into the Orioles Hall of Fame.

The annual regular Orioles Hall of Fame balloting, held in late February, produced another winner, Dick Hall, the tall (6'61'2") righthander with unerring control, who pitched 9 years in Baltimore.

The 3 players chosen bring the number of members to 19.

The Veterans Committee comprises 16 selected senior representatives from the sports media, the Oriole Advocates and the Orioles front office staff It was the committee's function to consider the qualifications of players who had spent the equivalent of at least 3 seasons with the Orioles, and who

had been retired from baseball for a minimum of 20 years . . . Support from at least 75% of members is needed to elect

"It was our feeling," said Burke Barrett, chairman of the Orioles Hall of Fame Committee, "that several of the Orioles from the early days were passed over, sometimes unfairly, because the voters were not as familiar with their achievements at they were with those from more recent teams. The veterans system was adopted to repair that injustice.

This procedure is similar to the one that has been used by the Baseball of Fame at Cooperstown for many years.

The constituency for the regular Orioles Hall of Fame balloting, which also requires 75% of the votes cast to elect, involves approximately 80 representatives, also from the media, the Oriole Advocates (who have been with that organization for at least 5 years) and the Orioles office . . . Candidates must have been with the ballclub for at least 3 years and must be removed from the capacity in which they are being considered for at least one year.

Stu Miller, the little right-hander with the big head fake, who saved 92* games in 5 years ('63 thru '67) with the Orioles, was a master at changing speeds. The retired 61-year-old Cameran Park, CA (30 miles from Sacramento in the foothills of the Sierras) resident is still the Orioles' all-time leader in era (2.37), and ranks 2nd in saves, 13 behind Tippy Martinez (105). However, Stu averaged better than 18 saves per year while Tippy's average was just under 10 over 11 Baltimore seasons.

He was the 1st pitcher ever to be chosen "Most Valuable Oriole" ('63), and he and Jim Palmer still share the distinction of being the only pitchers to have won that award twice (also '65) . . . In '63, Stu was 5-8 with 25 saves and a 2.24 era and was chosen A.L. "Fireman of the Year". That year, also, he set the club and league records for appearances (71) and games finished (59), though they have since been surpassed. His 14 wins in relief in '65 are still a club standard.

Miller who had 38 wins to go with his 92 saves for the O's was already 35 and had 11 years major league experience when he came to Baltimore with catcher John Orsino and lefthanded pitcher Mike McCormick from the Giants in the Dec. '62 deal for pitchers Billy Hoeft and Jack Fisher. Lee MacPhail was the general manager who negotiated that trade.

The 54-year-old Gentile represented another steal by G.M. MacPhail who purchased his contract conditionally from the Dodgers organization (St. Paul, American Association) in '60 . . . Jim averaged 31 homers and nearly 100 rbi in four seasons with the Orioles from '60 thru '63 . . . His 398 rbi as an Oriole were the most ever accumulated by anyone in his first 4 seasons with the club, and only Frank Robinson hit more homers (126 to 124) in his first 4 years with the Birds.

As a rookie, Jim batted .292, hit 21 homers and drove in 98 runs . . . The next year, '61, he walloped 46 homers, drove in 141 (still a club record), batted .302, and hit a major league record-tying 5 grand slams (tied Ernie Banks, but Don Mattingly surpassed them both in '87 with 6). On May 9, '61 in Minnesota's new Metropolitan Stadium, Jim became the 1st player ever to hit bases-loaded homers on consecutive at bats.

Hall, 58, who was charged with only one wild pitch during his entire big league career that spanned 19 seasons, was 65-40 with 58 saves in 342 appearances with an excellent 2.89 era for the O's over 2 tours of duty ('61-'66, '69-'71). He was a notorious Yankees beater when they were consistent winners. From '61 thru '66, he was 9-3 with 8 saves and a 2.41 era against the Bombers.

He also won the 1st ALCS game ever played (in '69 vs. the Twins) and saved a game in both the '70 and '71 World Series . . . Dick, who resides in Timonium and has spent most of his life in the Baltimore area, issued only 23 un-intentional walks in 462 innings during his last 7 big league seasons, an average of less than half a walk every 9 innings.

The Orioles Hall of Fame was conceived by the Oriole Advocates, with the cooperation and encouragement of the Orioles, at the suggestion of 2 past presidents—the late Allen Barrett and Jack Buckley. The Advocates continue to administer the annual elections.

-The number of saves Miller accumulated as an Oriole depends on which save rule is applied: the '69, '73 or '75 versions . . . The Baseball Encyclopedia credits him with 100 during his Orioles years by applying the '69 rule. We used the current one ('75) to make the comparison with Tippy Martinez' total more valid.

ORIOLES ENSHRINED AT COOPERSTOWN

Six "modern" ('54-'87) Orioles have been elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, New York-5 of them in a 4-year period from 1982 thru 1985 (year of induction and percentage of votes received are in parenthesis):

Robin Roberts ('76, 87%) Frank Robinson ('82, 89%) Brooks Robinson ('83, 92%) George Kell ('83, Veterans Committee Selection) Luis Aparicio ('84, 85%) Hoyt Wilhelm ('85, 84%)

Two of the above, Brooks and Frank Robinson were chosen in their 1st year of eligibility, a distinction that only 19 of 202 Hall of Fame members can claim (including '89 inductees Johnny Bench and Carl Yastrzemski).

Fourteen others who played and/or managed for the Orioles during the early days of Baltimore's rich baseball heritage are also enshrined in the Hall (position in parenthesis):

Frank "Home Run" Baker (3b) Roger Bresnahan (c) Dan Brouthers (1b) Wm. "Candy" Cummings (p) Robert M. "Lefty" Grove (p) Rogers Hornsby (2b) Hughie Jennings (SS)

"Wee Willie" Keeler (of) Joe Kelley (of-if) Rube Marquard (p) Joe "Iron Man" McGinnity (p) John McGraw (3b, mgr) Wilbert Robinson (c, mgr) George Herman "Babe" Ruth (p. of)

FOUR MORE: There are 4 additional Hall of Famers who have represented Baltimore ballclubs, only one a player. He was right-handed pitcher Charles "Chief" Bender who was selected to the Hall on the strength of his 206-111 lifetime record with Connie Mack's Philadelphia A's, not on what he did in Baltimore. He was here for only one summer, 1914, and while pitching for the Terrapins in the ill-fated Federal League, compiled a forgettable 4-16 record.

The other 3 worked for the Orioles in non-playing capacities. George Weiss, who immortalized himself as a general manager of the Yankees, served part of his apprenticeship as an International League Orioles g.m.

Luke Appling, a legendary shortstop for the White Sox, coached for the O's under Manager Billy Hitchcock for one year ('63); and, the late Burleigh Grimes, the famed spitball pitcher who won 270 games in the majors, scouted for the Orioles from 1960 thru 1971.

NOTES: John McGraw had a .334 lifetime batting average in 16 big league seasons, but was elected to the Hall of Fame primarily because of his achievements as a manager with the Giants . . . Rube Marquard pitched only 27 innings for the Orioles, all in 1929, but he lived here for nearly 60 years before he died in '80.

Baltimore-born Babe Ruth signed his first pro contract with Jack Dunn Sr. in 1914, and made his debut with the Orioles (I.L.) that year as a pitcher. He was, of course, elected to the Hall as an outfielder.

Other native Marylanders in the Hall of Fame include Baker (Trappe). Grove (Lonaconing), and 3 who never played for the Orioles: Jimmie Foxx (Sudlersville), Judy Johnson (Snow Hill) and Al Kaline (Balmer).

RULES OF INTEREST

TRADING AND WAIVER REGULATIONS: Player assignments may be made within a major league or between major leagues without waivers at any time **except** between August 1 and the day following the final day of the regular season (5 p.m. et). Thus, July 31 has replaced June 15 as the trade

Waivers are required for assignments to National Association clubs at all times except for optional assignments within 3 years of the date the player first reported to the major leagues.

FREE AGENCY: Six years major league service required for eligibility . . . Re-entry draft has been abolished.

By Dec. 7, player's former club must offer to arbitrate or it becomes ineligible to sign player . . . By Dec. 19, player must accept offer or on Jan. 9 former club becomes ineligible to sign the player until May 1.

RULES OF INTEREST (Cont.)

SALARY ARBITRATION: Three years major league service required for eligibility . . . Maximum cut rules do not apply if, in immediately preceding year, player won arbitration increase of over 50%.

TERMINATION PAY: One full season's pay if player released opening day or later. Thirty days pay for player who is released on the 16th day before opening day or earlier. If player is released after that 16th day prior to opening day he receives one additional day's pay (over the 30 days) for each additional day. In other words, if he were released the day before opening day, player would receive 45 days pay.

SUSPENDED GAME RULE: A game terminated for any of the following reasons will be a suspended game IF it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e. 4-1/2 or 5 innings):

- (1) A curfew imposed by law
- Darkness where local law prohibits turning on the lights or where lights (2) A pre-arranged time limit are not available.

Light Failure: A game terminated by light failure or malfunction of a mechanical device under the control of the home club will be a suspended game anytime after it starts.

Inning in Progress (added in '80): If weather forces the termination of a legal game while an inning is in progress, it will become a suspended game if either of the following conditions exists:

- (1) The visiting team has scored one or more runs to tie the game, and the
- The visiting team has scored one or more runs to take the lead and the home team has not tied the score or retaken the lead.

Note: If a legal game is tied when called because of weather and neither of the above situations prevails, it is a tie game and must be replayed in its entirety.

Procedures for Resumption of Play: Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next single game between the two clubs on the same ground. If that is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in A.L. Regulation 5.2 (c).

CURFEW: The American League curfew provides that no inning may start after 1:00 a.m., but any inning that begins prior to 1 a.m. may be played to completion. Curfews shall be waived for the final series of the season in each of the parks of the contesting teams. There is no other curfew in the

SAVE RULE: Credit a pitcher with a save when he is the finishing, but not the winning pitcher, and when he qualifies under one of the following

- (1) He enters the game with a lead of no more than 3 runs and pitches for at conditions
- (2) He enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at bat or
- (3) He pitches effectively for at least 3 innings regardless of his club's lead.

The current rule was adopted in 1975. Saves became official for the first time in '69. The original rule was amended in '73 and revised again in '75.

BATTING/ERA TITLE QUALIFICATIONS: 502 or more plate appearances/162 ROOKIE AWARD QUALIFICATIONS: A player is considered a rookie unless,

during a previous season or seasons, he has: (1) exceeded 130 at bats or 50 innings pitched in the major leagues, or

- (2) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a big league

CONSECUTIVE GAME STREAKS: A consecutive-game hitting streak shall no be terminated if all the player's plate appearances (one or more) result in walk, hit by pitch, defensive interference or a sacrifice bunt. The streak sha terminate, however, if the player has a sacrifice fly and no hit.

The player's individual consecutive-game hitting streak shall t determined by the consecutive games in which the player appears and is n determined by his club's games.

ORIOLES "DESIGNATED HITTERS" CELEBRATE 10TH ANNIVERSARY

The Orioles "Designated Hitters" are a group of volunteers, businessmen and women from the Baltimore-Washington areas, who sell Orioles season tickets on the club's behalf. This year marks the tenth anniversary for the highly successful DHs.

The organization was created in 1980, and in its first five years of operation, the Orioles season ticket sale ballooned by over 700%, from 1,623 to a record 11,738 in 1984. Since then, the sale has leveled off somewhat, but there are high hopes that this year the total will reach 10,500 (the season ticket selling season continues thru opening day).

To qualify for membership in the "Designated Hitters," candidates must meet demanding sales minimums according to a formula based on a blend of new sales and renewals, and everyone must requalify each year.

In '88, the leading sales person was Sally McGraw.

There are no salaries or commissions given to "DHs," but there are plenty of perks. This year those whose early sales were particularly brisk were treated to a winter getaway to Puerto Rico.

All qualifiers are eligible for the annual spring junket to South Florida while the Orioles are training in Miami. Then, during the season, leading "DHs" will qualify for baseball trips to the All-Star Game and World Series.

Patterned after the Kansas City Royals' highly successful "Royal Lancers," the "Designated Hitters" organization was actually founded in Septems ber 1979 by then Baltimore City Mayor William Donald Schaefer and a select group of Baltimoreans working closely with the Orioles front office.

The concept was to attract talented people from the business community to serve as the ballclub's principal season ticket sales representatives. The

results have been dramatic. Along with former Mayor (now Governor) Schaefer, the "founding fathers" of the "Designated Hitters" included: Owen Daly, Bill Beasman and Chris Hartman; the Orioles' Vice President for Business Affairs Bob Aylward; Executive Director of Sales and Tickets Lou Michaelson, and former club Vice President Al Harazin, now senior vice president for the New York Mets.

The "DHs" have their own officers and board of directors, as well as an active social program. The "DH" Board: Mike Duvall, President; Frank Trommer, Howard Weinberg, Jake Jacobson, Leslie Bowyer, Natalia Leimkuhler and Lou Hurwitz.

ORIOLE ADVOCATES

The Oriole Advocates, Inc. is a unique non-profit organization, dedicated to promoting and stimulating interest in the game of baseball at both the amateur and professional levels. Founded in July, 1960, the Advocates will celebrate their 29th anniversary this summer.

Membership comprises some 75 men and women, drawn from a broad cross-section in the Baltimore area.

Through the years, the Advocates have made substantial financial donations to worthy causes, primarily to baseball-oriented youth organizations; have played a key role in the restoration of Babe Ruth's birthplace at 216 Emory Street and its conversion into the Babe Ruth/Orioles Museum; and, in 1977, established the Orioles Hall of Fame. (See page 92).

The organization has also served as an essential right arm to the Orioles' Public Relations and Marketing Departments. In that connection, the Advocates initiated the popular "Junior Orioles" program (low cost tickets for kids) back in 1963, then administered it for 25 years. Membership in that program rose from 75 youngsters the first year to a record 20,000 in 1977

Last year "Junior Orioles" was replaced by the "Birdwatchers Fan Club", a slightly different concept (see page 15). The Advocates will continue to participate in the program known this year as the Baltimore Sun Fantastic Fans Club, in cooperation with the Baltimore Sun and the Orioles.

The Advocates also serve as distributors of Orioles souvenirs on "giveaway" days at the ballpark, assuring that all eligible fans get the items to are entitled.

The Orioles Advocates don't get paid for anything they do. They are all volunteers, constantly demonstrating the importance of competence and dedication whenever there is a job that must be done.

JOE ANGEL

A native of Colombia, South America, Joe Angel begins his 10th year of broadcasting major league baseball, his 2nd with the Orioles. The 41-yearold Angel has over 20 years of broadcasting experience, six years of calling major league baseball on radio including three seasons ('76-'78) for the San Francisco Giants on station KSFO and three years ('84-'86) for the Minne sota Twins on WCOO radio. He also handled television play-by-play for the Oakland A's for two seasons ('80-'81) on KPIX-TV.

REX BARNEY

Rex returns for his 6th season with Home Team Sports. Known as the "Voice of Memorial Stadium" since '70, he will continue to handle the stadium's public address announcing.

Rex, who also served as the press box announcer for the Baltimore Colts from '69 to '83, has hosted a variety of radio sports shows in Baltimore. He presently has a daily report on WBAL-AM, and will host that station's sports talk show through the baseball season.

A former major league pitcher himself, Barney played with the Brooklyn Dodgers for six seasons ('43, '46-'50) and this June will be inducted into the Brooklyn Dodgers' Hall of Fame. He appeared briefly with the Dodgers in '43 before being called into the service for three years of military duty. He returned to the Dodgers in '46 and compiled a career record of 35-31. His best season came in '48, when he won 15 games, including a 2-0 no-hit victory over the New York Giants.

He began his broadcasting career in '52 in New York City. He did Mutual Radio's Game of the Day from '55 to '57, and also broadcast games in the New York area for WOR-TV.

In '82 and '83, he served as color commentator for 16 Orioles' telecasts on subscription television. A native of Omaha, Nebraska, Rex resides just a half-mile from Memorial Stadium.

TOM DAVIS

Baltimore native Tom Davis will host the HTS pre- and post-game show and provide in-game score updates, duties he has handled the past 4 seasons for HTS. He has handled various on-air assignments for HTS including play-by-play for the Orioles and college basketball, in-studio talk shows, pregame host of hockey telecasts, coverage of the Washington Redskins, boxing and college football. Last year he covered the Summer Olympics for NBC Radio.

The 41-year-old Davis has spent 18 years on the Baltimore sports scene. He has been named "Baltimore Sportscaster of the Year" in '78, '84 and '85. Davis gained national exposure with ABC-TV as a sideline reporter during United States Football League telecasts and with the Mutual Broadcasting System as a sports anchor and college football play-by-play man.

Davis also has handled play-by-play of several NFL games for NBC-TV as well as NBC and Mutual Radio.

A graduate of the University of Baltimore, Davis began his career as a sports reporter at WBAL radio in '71. He later worked as a part-time sports anchor at WJZ-TV and WBAL-TV and can still occasionally be seen on WBAL on weekends. In '75, he began anchoring the sports on WCBM radio and was there for 12 years. During his early years at WCBM, Davis handled the play-by-play of Baltimore Colts pre-season games and filled in during a number of regular season games.

He can currently be heard mornings on WQSR radio. He and his wife, Linda, have two children. They reside in Baltimore.

JOHN LOWENSTEIN

JON MILLER

With his reputation as one of baseball's best broadcasters rapidly circulating across this country, Jon spread his talents overseas during the off-season to Japan where he served as play-by-play commentator on ESPN's telecasts of the games between a team of American Major League All-stars and an allstar aggregation from the Japanese Central and Pacific Leagues.

Jon begins his 7th season on the Orioles' radio network. His major league baseball experience includes three years as radio play-by-play announcer for the Boston Red Sox ('80-'82) and radio and television with the Texas Rangers in '78 and '79 and with the Oakland A's in '74. He broadcast his first major league game at age 22 with the A's.

During the last 3 seasons, Jon was granted a leave of absence from several Oriole games to call the action for NBC-TV's Saturday afternoon coverage of major league baseball.

Jon has an extensive background in basketball, soccer and hockey during his 17 years in broadcasting. He did 10-15 games a season for the NBA's Golden State Warriors from 1979-82 and prior to that, was the voice of University of San Francisco basketball for 5 years. He has also announced MISL games for the San Jose Earthquakes and did both television and radio for the Washington Diplomats of the North American Soccer League in '77. He's broadcast soccer for the CBS, TVS and Satelcast networks.

A renowned mimic, Jon can be heard to imitate such outstanding baseball announcers as Al Michaels, Vin Scully and Chuck Thompson during breaks in the action (rain delays, etc.). Popular on the banquet circuit in the off-season, Jon attended numerous such functions across the country last winter and was an important part of the Orioles Winter caravan.

In '86, he was named "Baltimore's Best Radio Sportscaster" by Baltimore Magazine and "Best Play-by-Play Broadcaster" by Washingtonian

A native of the San Francisco Bay area, Jon now lives in Cockeysville, Magazine. MD with his wife, Janine, and their children Michelle, Holly, Emily and Alexander.

JIM PALMER

Broadcasting: Jim's assignment at WMAR will be his first fulltime as a television play-by-play broadcaster, but he's not exactly a rookie in the field. For the past 12 years Jim has been doing baseball color for ABC (starting '78). He will continue to work with partners Al Michaels and Tim McCarver on ABC in this final year of the networks's baseball contract (ABC-TV will do 8 Thursday night games between June 8 and July 27 in addition to the '89 . . He has also done color work as well as occasional play-by-play in the past for Home Team Sports Orioles broadcasts.

He's not a stranger to his partner, Brooks Robinson, either . . . They played together for the better part of 13 years ('65-'77); both their numbers have been retired by the Orioles; both played their entire careers with the same club and both are, of course, in the Orioles Hall of Fame.

Whether Jim joins Brooks in the Baseball Hall of Fame at Cooperstown remains to be seen. He becomes eligible for consideration by the BBWAA at the end of this year (he retired in '84) . . . Note: To the best of our knowledge, the Tigers' television partners, George Kell and Al Kaline, are the only baseball broadcast team with 2 Hall of Famers.

Pitching Distinctions: Unquestionably, the finest pitcher in the Orioles' 35-year history, Jim holds many club records including: most wins (258), losses (152), games (558), innings (3947.2), shutouts (53), complete games (211), strikeouts (2212) and walks (1311).

He won 20 games 8 times, earned 3 Cy Young Awards, started and won the pennant-clinching game 4 times ('66, '69, '70, '71), and was 8-3 in post-season play while pitching for the O's over a span of 20 years ('65 thru

During his entire career, he never gave up a grand slam home run in regular or postseason play. (little known fact: Johnny Bench hit one off him in the International League during Jim's brief stint with Rochester in '68).

Last Hurrah: Made his final start, at Chicago, Apr. 23, '84, but did not get a decision. Pitched in his last game as an Oriole, in relief, at Memorial Stadium on May 12, '84 against Oakland, but again was not a pitcher of record . His final career victory was in game #3 of the '83 World Series at Philadelphia (see post-season below). Earned his 268th and last regular season win on Sep.30, '83, a 3-2 win over the Yankees at Baltimore in the 2nd game of a doubleheader.

Lifetime Victories/20-Win Seasons: Jim ranks 27th on the all-time list in . he is one of only 3 pitchers in the 88-year history of the A.L. to have won 20 or more games in 8 or more seasons along with Lefty Grove (8, last time in '35) and Walter Johnson (12, last time in '25). The last major leaguer to do it was Warren Spahn (13 times, the last in '63).

Only 6 who have worked exclusively in the 20th century have won 20 or more 8 times, and in the entire history of the major leagues, Jim is one of only 16. He put that string together over a 9-year period from '70 thru '78 (was 7-12 in '74). He was 176-97 with a 2.54 era during that 9-season stretch.

Earned Run Average: His 2.8568 era is 4th on the all-time list (since era became an official statistic, '12 in NL and '13 in AL) among pitchers with 3,000 or more innings, behind: (1) Walter Johnson—2.37; (2) Grover C. Alexander—2.56; and (3) Whitey Ford—2.74. He ranks just ahead of #5 Tom Seaver (2.8626) . . . He twice led the league ('73 & '75), and was in the loop's "top 5" 10 times.

Pennant Clinchers: He went the route to win the games that clinched the O's 1st 4 pennants ('66, '69, '70, '71) . . . Since then, Scott McGregor ('79) and Tippy Martinez ('83) have added their names to the list.

Postseason: His overall record in 17 post-season appearances, including 15 starts, was 8-3 with a 2.61 era (ip-124.1, er-36)

In '66, he became the youngest ever to pitch a World Series shutout when, at the age of 20 years-11 months-21 days, he blanked the Dodgers' Sandy Koufax, 6-0, on 4 hits (LA made 6 errors) in game #2 at Dodger Stadium . . . That was Koufax' final major league appearance.

In '83 Jim became the 1st (he remains the only) pitcher in history to have won a World Series game in each of 3 decades . . . In that game (#3 at Philadelphia), he bested Steve Carlton after hurling 2 scoreless innings in relief of Mike Flanagan.

He shares with 5 others the major league record for most league championship series victories (4), and holds the record for most lcs complete games (5) by himself . . . He and Nolan Ryan are tied for most career lcs strikeouts (46), while he and former teammate Mike Cuellar have walked the most in alcs competition (19).

Cy Youngs: Jim is one of only 4 to have won as many as 3 Cy Youngs ('73, '75, '76) . . . Steve Carlton has won 4 and both Seaver and Koufax have earned 3 . . . The award has been presented since '56, with individual league awards beginning in '67 . . . Jim, Koufax, Denny McLain and Roger Clemens are the only ones to have earned the award in consecutive

Personal: Jim has been an activist on behalf of the Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation for nearly 2 decades, serving much of that time as its national sports chairman . . . He has been the sports representative for Jockey Underwear since the spring of '80 . . . In '83, he was the sports recipient of the American Image Award, sponsored by the Male Apparel Industry and the Men's Fashion Association of America.

He has attended both Arizona State and Towson State Universities . . . He has 2 daughters: Jamie Michelle (11/16/66) and Kelly Christina (6/5/69).

MEL PROCTOR

Mel is in his 17th year as a broadcaster, 6th as the Orioles' play-by-play announcer for Home Team Sports. Mel, who handles a variety of on-air assignments for HTS including play-by-play for Washington Bullets basketball telecasts and college football, is one of the busiest broadcasters in the

In addition to his work with HTS, he can be heard calling NFL games for NBC television and radio, college football and pro and college basketball for Turner Broadcasting. He also does selected Bullets games for Channel 20 in Washington, D.C. (those not televised by HTS).

In '86, Mel took a short break from Orioles baseball to handle play-byplay of TBS's coverage of the United States men's basketball team in the Goodwill Games in Spain.

He began his career as sports director at the CBS-TV affiliate in Hawaii (KGMB) from '73 until '78. While there, he worked the microphone for Hawaii Islanders (AAA) baseball, University of Hawaii football and basketball, and did one season for the Hawaiians of the World Football League.

He came to work in the Nation's Capital for the first time in '78 when he began a five-year stint as play-by-play announcer for Washington Bullets basketball on flagship station, WTOP-AM. During the Bullets' off-seasons, Mel worked in Arlington, Texas as the TV and radio voice of the Texas Rangers. In '82 and '83, he supplemented his work with the Bullets by doing college basketball games for NBC-TV for two seasons.

For two seasons ('83-'84 and '84-'85), Mel served as the play-by-play man for the NBA's New Jersey Nets. At that time, he also began providing the commentary for the NFL "Game of the Week" for the Mutual Broadcasting System.

A native of Denver, CO, Mel resides in Columbia, MD with his wife, Julie, and their children, Bill and Maile.

BROOKS CALBERT ROBINSON JR.

HALL OF FAME: See page 93-94.

PERSONAL: Brooks is doing color commentary on the Orioles' television for the 12th straight year. He is also active as vice-president of Shapiro, Robinson and Associates* and as a special assistant with Crown Central Petroleum Company.

*Shapiro, Robinson and Associates is a company which provides athletes comprehensive counseling and support in their professional, financial and personal lives.

Brooks' uniform #5 was officially retired on opening day, '78, the year after he retired. Frank Robinson's #20, Earl Weaver's #4, Jim Palmer's #22 and Eddie Murray's #33 are the only other numbers that have been retired by the Orioles.

BIG LEAGUE CAREER: Brooks officially spent 20 years and 72 days as a player in the American League, spanning 23 seasons.

He played in 2,896 major league games, all of them with the Orioles, 8th on the all-time list (Pete Rose leads at 3,562).

Only Carl Yastrzemski (3,308) and Ty Cobb (3,033) have played more American League games, and only 3 others in history have played more with one franchise: Yastrzemski (3,308), Hank Aaron (3,076) and Stan Musial (3,026)

Durability: Played in 97% of all Orioles games from July 9, '59 (when he returned from the minors for the last time) thru May 16, '76, a period of more than 161/2 years . . . Played at least 153 games in 14 of 15 years from '60 thru '75).

In the Orioles' 35-year history, only three other third basemen have played as many as 200 games at third base (Doug DeCinces-792, Rich Dauer-242, Floyd Rayford-203).

Opening Days: Started 20 consecutive opening day games for the Orioles from '57 thru '76 and batted .316 (79-25) with 6 home runs and 17 rbi

Home Runs/RBI: Led A.L. in rbi (118) in '64 and also achieved career high of 28 home runs that year . . . Hit 17 or more homers nine times, 11 or more 11 times . . . His last year in double figures was '71 when he hit 20 . . . Holds the record for most lifetime homers in Memorial Stadium (139) . . . Had 6 career grand slams, 4 of them in Baltimore.

Hitting: Hit most home runs (37) and drove in most runs (167) against the Red Sox . . . Twice put together strings of 8 straight hits: July 10 thru 15, '60 and Aug. 21 thru 23, '63 . . . Holds A.L. record for most sacrifice flies, career

Holds club records for games, at bats, runs, hits, doubles, triples, total bases, rbi and extra base hits . . . Has one-season mark for games (163, '61 & '64) and at bats (668, '61).

Fielding: Committed only 263 errors in 9,165 chances at 3rd base for a lifetime fielding percentage of .971 . . . Appeared in a total of 29 games at 2nd base (24) and shortstop (5) and committed only one boot in 31 tries . . . Did not play anywhere defensively but at 3rd base after '63.

All Star Games: Played in 18 consecutive all-star games from '60 thru '74 (including two per year in '60, '61, '62) . . . Had lifetime average of .289 (13-for-45).

Selected "mvp" in 1966 at St. Louis when he had three hits, including a home run, while handling eight chances in the field . . . Also homered in '67 game at Anaheim . . . Was also a serious contender for the award in '64 (at Shea Stadium) and '70 (at Cincinnati), when he went 2-for-3, hit a triple, scored a run, and drove in two others.

Hit three triples in all-star play and didn't make an error in 43 fielding chances

Was elected to starting lineup in Gillette-sponsored fan vote four times ('71, '72, '73, '74) after selection was returned to fans in '70 . . . Led A.L. players in votes in '71 (1,110,469) . . . Started a total of 11 games . . . Had last hit in '71 game at Detroit.

Post Season: Played first 39 post season games in which the Orioles were involved, and batted a composite .303 (44-for-145) -. 348 in 1 ALCS games and .263 in 21 WS games.

WS: Homered in first WS at bat in first inning against Dodgers (at Dodger Stadium) in '66 immediately following Frank Robinson's two-run homer (both were off Don Drysdale).

Was landslide "mvp" in '70 vs. Reds . . . Hit .429 (9-for-21) and was brilliant on defense . . . His nine hits tied record for most hits in five-game series . . . He also contributed six rbi, two doubles, and two homers . . . Erred on first fielding chance then handled 23 more flawlessly, many of them brilliantly . . . Stole at least two hits each from Johnny Bench and Lee May . It was during the series that Lee gave him the nickname "Hoover" (as in vacuum cleaners) . . . Made three errors in '76 world series chances

ALCS: Had .486 average (18-for-37) after first three championship series (O's swept them all in three straight games) . . . His lone hit in last CS in '74 was a first game homer off Oakland's "Catfish" Hunter.

Major League Lifetime Records, 3B: Highest fielding percentage, 100 or more games (.971) ... Most seasons (23) ... Most games (2,687) . . . Most putouts (2,697) chances accepted, excluding errors (8,902). Most assists (6,205) . . . Most double plays (618) . . . Most seasons leading league in games (8) . . . Most seasons leading league in assists (8).

American League Lifetime Records: Most seasons leading league in fielding (11) . . . Most seasons leading league in chances accepted, excluding errors (8 tie) . . . Most games season (163, '61 & '64).

Nothing is Forever: His 268th and last home run provided one of the most emotional experiences in Orioles' history. It was Apr. 19, '77 at Memorial Stadium, the O's trailed the Indians, 5-2, in the 10th. With one out and runners on 1st and 2nd, Lee May singled in a run. The O's now trailed by 2 as Brooks came to the plate as a pinch-hitter for Larry Harlow. He ran the count to "3 & 2", fouled off a number of pitches, then hit a home run into the left field stands off reliever Dave LaRoche to win the game, 6-5. There were only 4,826 fans at the ballpark that night, but none of them will ever forget the

Signed for '77 as player-coach, but became coach exclusively on Sunday, Aug. 21, when he went on the voluntarily retired list (in Minnesota) to make room on the roster for catcher Rick Dempsey who was returning to duty after 6 weeks on the disabled list.

An Orioles' record regular season crowd of 51,798 attended "Thanks Brooks" Day on Sunday, Sep. 18, '77, against the Red Sox to pay tribute to the most important and beloved Oriole of modern times.

Take a minute to review some of the highlights of Eddie Murray's achievements during 12 seasons in Baltimore, and you'll understand why we are retiring his Orioles uniform #33. He's earned it!

He becomes only the 5th to have been accorded that honor during the modern Orioles 35 seasons in the American League:

#4 Earl Weaver, mgr ('82) #20 Frank Robinson, of ('72) #22 Jim Palmer, rhp ('85) #5 Brooks Robinson, 3b ('77) #33 Eddie Murray, 1b ('89)

He led the club in rbi 8 times in the last 9 years (& 9 times in 12), in home runs for 7 of the past 9 seasons, and in batting average in 6 of the last 8. He won the Orioles "triple crown" 5 times, and earned the Lou Hatter "Most Valuable Oriole" award a record 7 times.

After 12 years with the Orioles, Eddie ranks 1st in club history in home runs (333) and total bases (3,421) . . . He is 2nd to Brooks Robinson in at bats (6,245), runs (1,048), hits (2,021), doubles (351), extra-base hits (709), rbi (1,190) and game-winning rbi (166) . . . He has the 4th highest career batting average (.295) an Oriole has ever recorded.

Eddie is 3rd in games played (1,820) behind Brooks and Mark Belanger . . . He missed only 61 games in 12 years, an average of only 5 per season . . . When the Orioles play the California Angels and the Detroit Tigers this year, they'll be doing so without Eddie Murray for the 1st time in 13 years, since '76 . . . He never missed a game against either club.

Since he came up to the majors in '77, he has hit more home runs (333) than any other American Leaguer (Jim Rice-331), and, during the 80's, he has led the league in both home runs (254) and rbi (908) . . . His 117 gwrbi in this decade tops the A.L. and is 2nd in the majors only to Keith Hernandez'

He already ranks 2nd all-time in home runs by a switch hitter (333) to Mickey Mantle's 536, and is 3rd behind Mantle (1,509) and Ted Simmons His consistency from both sides has been remarkable considering that Eddie, a natural right-hander, didn't convert until '75. Actually, he has been slightly more effective from the left side [.298 avg., 4664-139, .507 slugging pct, one home run/20 at bats] than the right [.288 avg., 2181-629, .485 slugging pct, one home run/21 at bats].

Eddie has almost always been at his best in pressure situations. His lifetime average with the bases loaded is a powerful .412 (148-61), and his 14 grand slam home runs represent a high among active players. He ranks 8th on the all-time list (tied with the late Gil Hodges).

With runners in scoring position, he has a .302 (602-182) career mark . Over 12 seasons, he drove in 409 tying/go ahead runs, and led the club in that area for 7 of the last 9 years.

He did a lot off the field, too . . . In Aug. '85, for example, Eddie made a generous donation of more than a quarter million dollars to fund an Outward Bound Camp program in Baltimore's Leakin Park, in honor of his mother who had died the previous year. The Carrie Murray Outdoor Educational Campus, which serves as a base for the Chesapeake Bay Outward Bound program, was officially dedicated last September.

The goal of that project is to offer every school child within the City of Baltimore, as well as around the State of Maryland, the opportunity to participate in a program which stresses personal challenge, self-control, and intergroup relations while providing an enjoyable camping experience.

He was a co-founder with Cal Ripken Jr. of the "Because We Care" Program through which tickets they purchased were donated to worthy charitable groups . . . Additionally, he bought and distributed large quantities of tickets for disadvantaged youngsters.

Through the years, he has also worked on behalf of: United Cerebral Palsy, Sickle Cell Anemia, the American Red Cross, United Way, Johns Hopkins Hospital's Children's Center, the New Holiness Refuge Church, and the Park Heights Academy, which dedicated a classroom in his honor. On his own time, he also counseled Baltimore City youngsters on the importance of discipline and remaining in school.

This young man, one of 12 Murray children, has accomplished much over these past 12 years, and we were privileged to witness those achievements . . . He was a dominant player in our league and on our team, and it is entirely appropriate to provide that no other Oriole will ever wear #33 again.

Thanks for everything, Eddie. The Orioles organization, and Orioles' fans everywhere, wish you well.

ORIOLES TRAINERS

Richie Bancells (33, Nov. 11, '55) is starting his 2nd season as the O's head trainer, his 6th year with the big club and his 13th with the Orioles' organization. Immediately before coming to Baltimore, Richie spent 4 years ('80-'83) in Rochester as the Red Wings' head trainer and traveling secretary. . . . During that time he also assisted his predecessor, the late Ralph Salvon, every spring at the Orioles' Miami training camp.

A Key West native, Richie is a graduate of Miami's Biscayne College (now St. Thomas University), and earned an M.S. in physical education from Eastern Kentucky University (Richmond, KY) . . . He is certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA).

He 1st joined the Baltimore organization as assistant trainer with the Miami Orioles (Class A, Florida State League) in '77, then served as head trainer for the Bluefield, WV Orioles (Appalachian Rookie League) the next 2 years ('78–'79) before moving on to Rochester in '80.

He and his wife, **Carol**, have 2 children: **Christopher** (July 8, '80) and **Andrea** (Aug. 18, '85). **Carol** is also a graduate of Biscayne College, where she received a degree in theology and education.

Jamie Reed (29, June 15, '59), is beginning his 1st full year as the Orioles' assistant trainer, but this will be his 8th season in the organization. He joined up, as head trainer for the Bluefield (WV) Orioles (Rookie Appalachian League) in '82, right after taking a degree in sports medicine at East Carolina University (Greenville, NC).

Jamie moved up the ladder quickly, first to Hagerstown (Carolina) in '83, then to Charlotte (Southern) in '84 . . . The following year ('85) he became head trainer/traveling secretary for the Red Wings in Rochester and remained there thru last season. He came up to the Orioles to assist **Richie Bancells** last September following the Little World Series (Triple Alliance Classic), which the Red Wings lost in 6 games to the Indianapolis Indians (American Association).

Jamie, who is certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA), spent much of the past winter (Oct. 15 thru Dec. 31) as trainer for the U.S. Naval Academy's basketball team, a position he had filled twice before during the baseball offseason . . . He's also worked as a trainer in the Venezuelan Winter League.

Though born in Baltimore, Jamie grew up in Annapolis. He was a '77 graduate of St. Mary's High School where he played varsity football and lacrosse.

He and his wife **Jean**, an Annapolis native who is also a graduate of St. Mary's High and East Carolina University, have 3 children: **Zachary** (Nov. 10, '83), **Rebecca** (Apr. 16, '86) and **Rachel** (Nov 29, '88) . . . The Reeds now live in Baltimore.

ORIOLES' STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH

Allan (Al) Johnson (33, Dec. 16, '55) joined the Orioles from West Virginia University where he was responsible for administering the strength and conditioning programs for all 19 of the sports in which the Mountaineers participate. He is one of only 4 full-time strength & conditioning coaches in major league baseball (the White Sox, A's & Phillies are the only others to have them).

Born the youngest of 11 children (8 brothers, 2 sisters) in Parkersburg, WV, AI was all-state in the discus and as a football offensive guard and center at Parkersburg High School . . . He was all-conference in both sports during 3 years at West Virginia Tech (Charleston) before transferring to Glenville State College, where he graduated in '79.

After 2 years as head football and assistant track and baseball coach at Federal Hocking High School in Stewart, OH (just over the WV border), he went to West Virginia University as a graduate assistant, and a year later was named head strength/conditioning coach.

During his 7 years in Morgantown, the 19 sports in which he was involved won 78% of all their sports contests . . . At West Virginia, Al was instrumental in completing the computerization of athletic fitness assessments on all 343 intercollegiate athletes on the campus, and in the construction of a new 7,000-square foot conditioning center. As his last official act at WVU, he accompanied the football team to the Fiesta Bowl where the Mountaineers lost to Notre Dame for the national championship.

He and his wife, Jan, have one son: Adam (Apr 16, '87).

Ralph Salvon, who spent the last 23 years ('66-'88) as an Orioles Trainer, passed away last July at the age of 60.

Known affectionately as "Ralphie" by one and all, he was a friend and confidant of virtually everyone who played or worked here during his long tenure with the Orioles.

He is gone, but won't be forgotten. A new restaurant opening this spring in Baltimore County will be called "Ralphie's Diner" by his good friends Hersh and Michael Pachino, and, when the new ballpark opens in '92, the state-of-the-art training facility will be named after him.

HALL OF FAME: He was elected to the Hall of Fame at Cooperstown in '82 along with Hank Aaron after being named on 89% of the ballots cast (370-415). That was the 1st of 4 straight years during which a former Oriole was named to the Hall. Frank is one of only 18 to have been elected to the Hall in his 1st year of eligibility (that list includes former teammate Brooks Robinson.)

Frank was 2nd of 6 O's to be so honored (date of election in paren): Robin Roberts ('76), Brooks Robinson ('83), George Kell ('83), Luis Aparicio ('84) and Hoyt Wilhelm ('85). In their official Hall of Fame portraits, Frank & Brooks are the only 2 of the above wearing Orioles' uniforms.

MANAGING/COACHING

Frank has managed the Cleveland Indians ('75-'77), Rochester Red Wings ('78), San Francisco Giants ('81-'84) and Orioles ('88-), as well as the Santurce Crabbers in the Puerto Rican League for 7 winters and the Culiacan Club in the Mexican Pacific Winter League ('77-'78).

ORIOLES: Frank replaced **Cal Ripken** on Apr. 12, '88, becoming the Orioles 8th manager (excluding interim manager **Luman Harris**, who in Sep. '61 filled out **Paul Richards'** final year).

He took over with the club at 0-6, and lost his first 15 games until the club snapped its record start-of-the-season losing streak at 21 (Apr. 29) . . . His overall record was 54-101 . . . After the first 15 games, it was 54-86 (starting Apr. 29).

Twice during the year he handed the reins to **Ellie Hendricks** because of a bad back . . . Frank missed 4 games from May 18 thru 20 (O's were 1-3) after being hospitalized, then missed 2 weeks from July 15 thru 28 during which he underwent surgery for the removal of a ruptured disc by club orthopedist, **Dr. Charles Silberstein** (O's were 3-8 in that span) . . . The cumluative record during Frank's absence was 4-11.

Over the past winter, Frank reassembled his coaching staff, retaining only one of the coaches he inherited last year. That was **Ellie Hendricks**, whose relationship with Frank dates back to '68 when both played for the Orioles.

FRANK ROBINSON (Cont.)

He asked **Cal Ripken Sr.**, whom he replaced as manager in April, to return as 3rd base coach; hired **Tom McCraw** with whom he had played and/or worked in Anaheim, Cleveland, and San Francisco, as his batting coach; grabbed **Johnny Oates**, another former Orioles' teammate, from Rochester where he had managed the Red Wings to the Governor's Cup, and appointed, as pitching coach, **Al Jackson**, the highly regarded former minor league pitching instructor in the acclaimed New York Mets' system (**McCraw** was also in the Mets' system before joining the O's).

At the time he took over the ballclub last spring, he was functioning for the 1st time in his career as a front office official with the title, special assistant to the president (**Edward Bennett Williams**).

This is Frank's 2nd tour of duty with the O's since he played here ('66 thru '71).

He returned as a coach in '78, but spent most of that season managing in Rochester before moving back to Baltimore as a coach in '79 and '80. In the pennant-winning year '79, he was credited with helping to improve substantially the quality of the club's defense. In '80 he replaced **Jim Frey** (who left to manage the K.C. Royals) as the O's batting and 1st base coach . . . Frank, himself, departed in '80 to manage the San Francisco Giants.

Frank came back to Balmer 5 years later in '85, after nearly 4 seasons in San Francisco and a short stint ('84) as a coach with the Milwaukee Brewers (Harry Dalton hired him for Milwaukee the day after he was let go by the Giants . . . Frank had also worked with Dalton in Baltimore and Anaheim) . . .

For the next 3 seasons, he served as bench/outfield coach under 3 managers: **Joe Altobelli** ('85), **Earl Weaver** ('85-'86) and **Cal Ripken** ('87), before his appointment as special assistant to the president in October '87.

SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS: Named manager Jan 14., '81, replacing Dave Bristol (who in turn had replaced Joe Altobelli), and led the club to its 1st winning seasons since Altobelli did it in '78. The years '81 & '82 were the Giants' 1st winning seasons back-to-back in a decade. In '83 and '84, however, the club dipped below .500, and on Aug. 4, '84, Frank was dismissed in favor of interim skipper Danny Ozark.

During his tenure in San Francisco 2 former O's players served on his staff: **Don Buford** (now the O's director of field operations/instruction) and **Herm Starrette** (O's '88 pitching coach), as well as **McCraw** (the O's '89 batting coach).

Doc Edwards managed the Wings in '79.

CLEVELAND INDIANS ('74–'77): Frank joined the Indians as a player on Sep. 12, '74, from California in a trade. Then, 3 weeks later, on Oct. 4, the day after the season ended, he was named the first black major league manager in baseball history, replacing **Ken Aspromonte**.

Frank made a dramatic debut as playing manager on Apr. 8, '75, before some 55,000 opening day fans at Cleveland Stadium. In his 1st at bat of that 1st game (he was dh, batting 2nd), Frank homered off **Doc Medich** (later that inning, ex-Oriole teammate **Boog Powell** also homered).

The Indians won the game, 5-3, and Frank's effort was voted "most memorable moment" in Tribe history by Cleveland fans during baseball's observance of the U.S. bicentennial celebration.

FRANK ROBINSON (Cont.)

In that 1st year, the Indians fell to 15 games below .500 by late June, but rallied and wound up 4th, just one game under The next season, '76, they finished 3 games over . . . However, after a slow '77 start, Frank was released on June 19 and succeeded by Jeff Torborg.

For the rest of that year he coached with the Angels under Manager Dave Garcia, who had been his 3rd base coach in Cleveland in '75-'76.

PLAYING CAREER

MAJOR LEAGUE LEADER: He played for 21 seasons in the majors and is among the top ranking players of all time in 10 categories.

His 586 home runs represent the 4th highest figure in major league history behind Hank Aaron (755), Babe Ruth (714) and Willie Mays (660) ... See "500 Home Run Hitters on page xx.

In addition, Frank ranks high in the following: games-2,808 (12th) . . . at bats-10,006 (14th) . . . runs-1,829 (10th) . . . hits-2,943 (20th) . . . doubles-528 (18th) . . . rbi-1,812 (12th) . . . total bases-5,373 (8th) . . . walks-1,420 (18th) and hit by pitches-198 (3rd) behind Don Baylor-267 and Ron Hunt-243.

"MVP", BOTH LEAGUES: He is the only player ever to win BBWAA "MVP" award in both leagues . . . He won the N.L. award in '61 and the A.L. in '66 . . . In addition, he was "MVP" in the '66 World Series and '71 All-Star game.

TRIPLE CROWN: Is one of only 11 players to have won the "Triple Crown" (accomplished 13 times, 2 each by Ted Williams and Rogers Hornsby) Frank did it in '66 with the O's. He, Mantle ('56) and Carl Yastrzemski ('67) are the only Triple Crown winners in the past 41 years (since Williams' second in '47).

HOME RUNS

He hit 343 in the N.L. and 243 in the A.L... 388 were hit off righthanders and 198 off lefthanders.

VS. N.L. OPPONENTS: Astros (Colts)-11 . . . Braves-54 . . . Cardinals-46 . Cubs-54 . . . Dodgers-42 . . . Expos-0 . . . Giants-49 . . . Mets-12 . . . Padres-1 . Phillies-38 . . . Pirates-34 . . . Reds-2.

33 PARKS: Frank holds the major league record for hitting home runs in most ballparks (33), including both regular season and World Series play . . . Hank Aaron is second at 32.

Among those, Crosley Field in Cincinnati (176) and Memorial Stadium . There were four stadia in which he (103) rank one-two in frequency . . . There were four stadia in which he played but did not hit a home run: Houston's Astrodome, Montreal's Expos Stadium, Sicks' Stadium in Seattle ('69 only) and Busch Stadium in St. Louis.

In regular season play Frank homered in 32 parks. His 33rd was Pittsburgh's Three Rivers in the '71 World Series . . . Aaron homered in 31 parks in regular season but added Yankee Stadium in the '57 World Series.

GRAND SLAMS: Hit a total of seven slams, five of them in the N.L. . . . His only two bases loaded homers in the A.L. were hit in successive innings on Aug. 20, '70 at R.F.K. Stadium in Washington off Senators' Joe Coleman and Joe Grzenda . . . Frank, Jim Gentile and Jim Northrup are the only ones ever to hit slams in successive plate appearances, though a total of seven have hit

2 OR MORE/GAME: Hit two or more homers in a game 54 times (ranks 5th in major league history) . . . Hit three in a game for Reds at Crosley Field vs. St. Louis on Aug. 22, '59 . . . Had 16 two-homer games for O's.

HR ODDS AND ENDS: Hit his first at Wrigley Field off the Cubs' Paul Minner on Apr. 28, '56 and his last at Anaheim Stadium on July 6, '76 off the Angels' Sid Monge . . . Hit most off N.L. righthander Larry Jackson (10) . . . Hit the first homer and scored the first run in ALCS history, in game #1 in '69 at Baltimore off the Twins' Jim Perry.

HRS-ORIOLES: Hit his 500th major league homer in Baltimore in the 2nd game of a twi-night doubleheader against the Tigers' lefthander Fred Scherman Sep. 13, '71. At the time, he ranked 11th on the all-time list just behind Harmon Killebrew who had reached that milestone earlier that year After leaving Baltimore, Frank jumped past Killebrew, Mel Ott, Ernie Banks, Eddie Mathews, Ted Williams, Jimmie Foxx and Mickey Mantle.

Frank became the first (and only) player ever to hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium on May 8, '66 (second game) when he blasted a Luis Tiant (Cleveland) offering over the left field stands.

He set a major league record by hitting ten home runs in the month of April '69, but that mark has since been pushed to 11 by Willie Stargell, Mike Schmidt and Graig Nettles.

Set a club record with 49 homers in '66 . . . Also set marks that year for most homers by an Oriole against one opponent (11 vs. Det.) and most home runs, Memorial Stadium (27).

OTHER CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

LAST GAME AS A PLAYER: Frank played in his last game as a player on Sep. 18, '76 at Cleveland vs. Baltimore. He put himself in as a pinch-hitter for Frank Duffy in the 8th inning and singled in a run off Rudy May.

ALL-STAR GAMES: Appeared in 11 all-star games as a player (six with Cincinnati, four with Baltimore and one with California) and served as a coach in '76 while managing for Cleveland . . . Was "MVP" in '71 game at .. Hit a 2-run homer off Dock Ellis to put A.L. ahead to stay in 3rd inning (Reggie Jackson hit another with one on off Ellis in same inning).

Hit .250 (24-6) in all-star play with two home runs . . . Went 3-for-3 for the N.L. in '59 (at L.A. Coliseum) and homered off Early Wynn.

WORLD SERIES: Hit two key homers in '66 vs. Dodgers, both off Don Drysdale, to win Sport Magazine sports car . . . Hit his first in the opening inning of game #1 at Dodger Stadium with Russ Snyder aboard (Brooks followed immediately with another and the O's led 3-0 before the Dodgers batted) . . . O's won the game 5-2 . . . In game #4 his 4th inning inning solo provided the only run as the O's completed their sweep behind **Dave** McNally.

In '71, game #6 vs. Pittsburgh in Baltimore, Frank's base running in the 10th inning allowed the O's to tie the series at three games apiece. drew a one out walk, and despite ailing legs and sore Achilles Tendon, went from first to third on Merv Rettenmund's single up the middle just evading Richie Hebner's tag with a head first slide . . . Then, he scored on Brooks' short sac fly to Vic Davalillio in center.

CINCINNATI: Spent ten full years with the Reds after three seasons in their farm system. Was N.L. "Rookie of the Year" in '56 . . . Tied league record for homers by a rookie (38, set by Wally Berger of the Braves), and set a rookie mark by being hit by pitched balls 20 times.

Won a Gold Glove in '58 . . . Led the N.L. three straight years in slugging percentage ('60-'61-'62) . . . Won N.L. "MVP" in '61 . . . Set personal career highs in '62 in average (.342), hits (208), doubles (51) and rbi (136) N.L. record by leading in hit by pitcher for six straight years ('60 thru '65).

BALTIMORE: O's won four A.L. pennants and two world championships during his six years in Baltimore.

Won Triple Crown and MVP awards in A.L. and World Series in '66 . . . In addition to leading the league in average (.316), home runs (49) and rbi (122), he also paced the loop in total bases (367), runs (122) and slugging (.637).

Was batting .337 in late June '67 when he sustained serious injury in a second base collision with the White Sox' Al Weis . . . Missed a month and suffered from double vision for a year and a half afterward . . . Though he wound up with a .311 average that year, he slipped to .268 (with 15 homers and 52 rbi) in '68 while still recovering from that injury, compounded by an attack of mumps and a muscle tear in his right shoulder.

He returned to form the following spring and helped lead the O's to three straight pennants in '69, '70 and '71.

LONG HOME RUNS/MEMORIAL STADIUM

The longest "measured" home run ever hit in Memorial Stadium was a 471' drive by Harmon Killebrew on May 24, 1964 off Milt Pappas over the hedge in left-center field.... This exceeded by two feet the only other blast that has ever cleared the hedge... That was one by Boog Powell 469' to the same area off Boston's Don Schwall on June 22, 1962. Aside from these there have been three balls hit into the hedge (approximately 450'), by Mickey Mantle in 1954, by Powell in 1965 and by Frank Robinson in 1967.

Frank Robinson is the only player to have hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium. In the second game of a doubleheader with Cleveland on May 8, 1966, Frank hit a Luis Tiant offering over the left field stands and into the parking lot beyond, a drive that measured 451' on the fly and rolled to a stop 540' away from home plate.

Following his trade to the Dodgers in Dec. '71, Frank's uniform #20 was retired. He was the first Oriole player to be so honored . . . In '77, he and Brooks became the first players to be inducted into the new Orioles Hall of Fame, originated by the Oriole Advocates in cooperation with the ballclub.

DODGERS-ANGELS: After one year ('72) in Los Angeles where he played for Walter Alston, Frank was traded to the Angels. At Anaheim he played nearly 2 years under Bobby Winkles and Dick Williams.

Graduated from McClymonds High PERSONAL: One of 11 children . School (Oakland) . . . Was basketball teammate of Bill Russell and played baseball there with Vada Pinson, Willie Tasby and Charlie Beamon Hobbies: movies, music and Lakers basketball games . . . Attended Xavier University in Cincinnati.

Frank and his wife, the former Barbara Anne Cole, were married Oct. They have 2 children: Frank Kevin (9/8/62) and Nichelle 28, '61 . (8/24/65) . . . Barbara is a real estate agent in the Bel Air area.

MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER

BALTIMORE ORGANIZATION: When he 1st joined the Orioles in '68, Ellie had spent 9 seasons in the minor leagues . . . During the 21 years that have elapsed since, Ellie has been with Baltimore just over 191/2 seasons.

He played for the Cubs during the last 6 weeks of '72 (Tommy Davis deal) before returning the the O's over the winter . . . Then he logged 11/2 years in the Yankees' organization from June '76 thru the '77 season, before rejoining the Orioles again.

MANAGERIAL DEBUT '88: Ellie twice substituted for Frank Robinson as manager last season when the latter was hospitalized with a bad back Ellie managed 4 games from May 18-20 (1-3), then took over again for 2 weeks from July 15 thru 28 (3-8) . . . His cumulative record during Frank's 2 absences was 4-11.

COACHING: Ellie is entering his 13th year as the O's bullpen coach since his appointment to that position in '77 during **Earl Weaver's** 1st tour of duty.

Player-Coach: Twice during this span he's served as player-coach. '78 he was activated on May 18, replacing Gary Roenicke who had been sent down, and remained on the roster for the balance of the year in the dual

In 13 games that year he hit .333 (18-6), and, in his one career pitching capacity stint, compiled an 0.00 era, thus leading the club, in a sense, in both categories (to be fair, he was tied in era with Dave Ford, who pitched 15 scoreless innings).

His pitching career took place on June 26 in Toronto, where the O's were absorbing a 24-10 pasting . . . He worked 2.1 innings, allowed no runs, one hit and one walk while putting an end to the carnage inflicted upon 4 predecessors (Mike Flanagan, Joe Kerrigan, Tippy Martinez, and outfielder Larry Harlow). Don Stanhouse then pitched the 9th and also held the Jays scoreless.

In '79 he coached exclusively all year until Sep. 1 when the roster expanded to 40 players . . . He made only one appearance, his last in the major leagues, at Detroit on Sep. 19, and went 0-for-1 . . . He was not eligible for postseason play.

All Star: He was the A.L.'s batting practice catcher and bullpen coach for the '82 all-star game in Montreal.

YANKEES '76-'77: In '76, he played in 26 games for the Yankees after the June 15 trade from Baltimore and batted .210 (57-12).

Spent '77 shuttling between New York and Syracuse. He played in only 10 games for the Yankees and was not eligible for post-season play.

ORIOLES '68-'76: Ellie had been with the O's for nearly 9 full years when he was traded to the Cubs for Tommy Davis in Aug. '72 . . . However when the season ended, he was reacquired by Baltimore.

100 Games/Year: Played in more than 100 games in each of the O's 3 pennant-winning seasons of '69-'70-'71 ... He and Andy Etchebarren more or less split the regular catching job from '68 thru '71

ELROD HENDRICKS (Cont.)

Weaver/Lane: Earl Weaver and Frank Lane were instrumental in convincing the O's to draft him from the Angels' AAA Seattle affiliate in Nov. Played for Weaver in Puerto Rico previously and Lane had scouted him in Mexico.

ALCS/WS: He compiled a .273 (66-18) average in 23 post-season games for the O's and Yankees (comprising five league championship series and four World Series)

'70 WS: Hit .364 (11-4) against the Reds with a home run and double and contributed significantly to the O's wins at Cincinnati in games #1 and #2.

In the opener, the Reds jumped out 3-0, but Ellie tied it in the 5th with a home run off Gary Nolan and the O's went on to win on Brooks' homer in the 7th . . . There was a play in the Cincinnati 6th in which Ellie was involved and that was as important as the home run.

"Carbo-Burkhart" Incident: One inning after Ellie had tied the game with his home run, the Reds had Bernie Carbo on 3rd representing the lead run, and only one out (Brooks had retired Lee May leading off the inning on a sensational play).

Pinch-hitter Ty Cline then chopped a high bouncer in front of the plate As Ellie went out and grabbed it, Carbo headed home, Ellie dove and tagged Carbo a few feet up the line and umpire Ken Burkhart, who had been spun around by the runners as they converged so that his back was to the play, called Carbo out.

Films later revealed that Ellie had tagged Carbo with one hand while holding the ball in the other, and that Carbo had missed the plate.

PUERTO RICO: Ellie played for Santurce in the Puerto Rican Winter League each year from '60-'77, except in '71 when the O's went to Japan . . . His 112 homers in that loop rank him 2nd on the all-time list to former St. Louis Browns outfielder Willard Brown (120).

MINORS: He enjoyed his best minor league seasons in Jalisco in the Mexican League (AAA) where he hit 109 homers in 4 years and was known as the "Babe Ruth of Mexico" . . . In last season there ('67), he led the league in homers (41) and was 2nd in rbi (112).

He started his career in the Milwaukee Braves' organization ('59-'60), then spent 2 years at Winnipeg in the Cardinals' system ('62-'63) before

PERSONAL: One of the most popular personalities ever to wear an Orioles uniform . . . He is very active in community projects in the Baltimore area . Speaks fluent Spanish . . . Plays the flute.

Received the first "Jack Dunn Memorial Service Award," named after the late Orioles executive and presented by the Maryland Professional Baseball Players Association in January '88 at the 35th Annual Tops in Sports Banquet Ellie received the award for his "many selfless years of service to the

community." He was also selected the first "Man of the Year" by the Baltimore chapter of the National Conference of Christians and Jews in Feb. '83 in recognition of his outstanding service to the community.

He has operated a 2-week baseball camp for youngsters the past 7 summers at McDonogh School in Owings Mills.

He and his wife, Merle, were married Jan. 14, '70 and are the parents of two sons: Ryan (8/3/72) and Ian Christopher (11/28/76). They have lived in the Randallstown area, near Baltimore, since the early 70s.

Has 4 children by a previous marriage: Abegail (7/13/62), Elrod Jr. (4/7/64), Elroy (10/17/65) and Berecia (8/25/67).

COACHING CAREER: His playing career ended on Apr. 13, '70, and in the 19 years since he has served as a minor league coach or manager in the Mets' system for all but 3 years (his 3 years with Red Sox, see above).

He has served as the Mets' roving minor league pitching instructor for a combined total of 12 years including the last 4. Also had that role from '70-'75, '80, and '82... He also managed in the Appalachian League in '76 (Marion) and '81 (Kingsport) and was a coach at Tidewater in the International League, '83-'84.

THE RIPKENS AND OTHER FAMILIES

FIRSTS: In '87, Cal Senior became the 1st father ever to manage 2 sons simultaneously in major league baseball history-regular season. Among those who have managed one son are Connie Mack (son Earle, '10, '11, '14), and Yogi Berra (son Dale '84 & '85).

The 1st time the Ripken trio hooked up professionally was in spring training '86. Cal Junior and Bill were teamed at the keystone for an exhibition split squad game at Ft. Myers on Mar. 15 and the manager of that team was Cal Senior.

THREE FROM SAME CLAN: Three members of the same family in the same uniform at the same time is a rarity, matched only 3 times before in baseball history. 1973—Jose, Hector & Tommy Cruz for St. Louis; 1963—Felipe, Matty and Jesus Alou for San Francisco; 1876—George, Sam & Harry Wright for Boston in the National League (Harry, a Hall of Famer, was the manager and pitched briefly; George was an outfielder-70 games in '76-and Sam, a shortstop, appeared in only 2 games that year. We're assuming they were all in uniform together).

TOGETHERNESS: Cal Junior was a 2nd round pick in the June '78 draft while younger son, **Bill**, was chosen on the 11th round in June '82. **Cal Sr.** & **Jr.** have been teammates in spring training as well as in regular season for the last 8 years (starting '81).

VI & THE REST OF THE RIPKENS: The lady who has made the Ripken story possible is VI (short for Violet), who was honored in Jan. '88 at the annual Tops in Sports baseball dinner as Maryland's "First Lady of Baseball." The award was presented by Governor William Donald Schaefer.

Vi and Senior have been married 31 years (Nov. 20, '57). Their 4 children, in order of appearance: Ellen Leigh (3/22/59), Cal Jr. (8/24/60), Fred (11/25/61), and Bill (12/16/64). Ellen is a payroll clerk in the treasury department of the Harford County government (Aberdeen is in Harford Cty.), and Fred, a motorcycle mechanic by trade, recently opened his own business in Joppa, MD called "Rip's Performance Center, Inc."

Cal Senior has 2 older brothers, **Oliver** and **Bill**. The latter was once a Brooklyn Dodger farmhand.

PRO CAREER

COACHING: Cal has spent 11 years on the O's coaching staff, 91/2 as 3rd base coach . . . He joined the staff in '76, replacing **George Staller** who had retired at the end of the previous season. Cal served as bullpen coach until June 27, '77 when he took over at 3rd base after **Billy Hunter** left to manage the Texas Rangers.

MANAGING: Has managed for 14 and a fraction seasons in professional baseball, all in the Orioles' organization. His 13 plus years as a manager in the Birds' farm system ('61-'74) represents the longest tenure of any minor league skipper in Orioles history . . . **Earl Weaver** and **Joe Altobelli** are tied for 2nd in that category, each having managed 11 years for the Birds in the minors . . . During that span, Cal managed at all levels except "rookie" league.

Following the '86 season he replaced **Earl Weaver** to become only the 7th "non-interim" manager in the club's 34-year history (excluded are **Luman Harris** who finished out the '61 season after **Paul Richards** resigned in late August, and Cal, himself, who bridged the gap for one game between **Joe Altobelli** and **Earl Weaver** in '85).

Cal was replaced by **Frank Robinson** on Apr. 12, '88 after the O's lost the first 6 games of the season (a streak that went to 21 before it ended) . . . His overall record as manager was 68-101, .402.

He began his managing career at Leesburg, FL on June 7, '61 as a replacement for **Billy DeMars**, who had just been promoted to a Class B league. After 10 weeks on the job, he was rushed to Rochester (Aug. 17) for emergency duty as a catcher, and was replaced at the Leesburg helm by **Ray Scarborough**, then a scout for the O's.

Cal had only 2 losing records in the minors: in '62, his first full season as a manager and his last as a player, and in '67 at Miami.

He won the 1st of 2 pennants at Aberdeen, SD by 12 games in '64 with a club that included 7 players who would ultimately play in the majors: Jim Palmer, Lou Piniella, Mark Belanger, Andy Etchebarren, Eddie Watt, Dave Leonhard and Mike Fiore.

That '64 club went 81-34 and Cal was the Northern League's Manager of the Year . . . Former Orioles' 3rd base coach, **Jimmy Williams**, managed at Grand Forks, ND in the same league for the Dodgers that year.

He finished 1st again in '72 at Asheville in the AA Southern League . Preceded **Joe Altobelli** at Rochester in in '69 & '70.

EJECTIONS: In '87, his one full season as the O's manager, Cal was ejected 8 times. **Durwood Merrill** & **Greg Kosc** got him twice and the **Larry Barnett-Kosc-Rocky Roe-Tim Tschida** crew accounted for 5 of the 8 dismissals.

Cal Jr., incidentally, experienced his 1st & only career ejection on Sep. 25, '87 at Baltimore vs. the Yankees. The umpire was Tim Welke, who also threw Cal Sr. out of a home game on July 26 that year . . . Bill has not been expelled from a major league game at this writing.

Senior has now been ejected 24 times in the big leagues, 16 of them as 3rd base coach. **Dale Ford** and the late **Bill Kunkel** have been his most frequent ejectors, 3 times each, but **Merrill, Kosc,** and **Mark Johnson** are close behind with 2 apiece.

SCOUTING: In '75, he turned to scouting, primarily at the professional level, but he also did some free agent scouting and served as a "trouble shooter" in the farm system.

In '71, the O's were 12-2-4 on a 31 day tour and went 8-0 with 3 ties against the Giants who had just captured their 7th straight Japan championship. The O's left on the month long junket just 3 days after losing a 7-game World Series to the Pirates.

The Birds earned the '84 trip by beating the Phillies in the '83 World Series . . . Despite a 5th place '84 finish, the O's went 4-1 in the first 5 games against the '84 Japan Champion Hiroshima Carp, and 4-1 as well vs. the sponsoring Tokyo Giants. Their overall record was 8-5-1.

Despite the fact he spent the first 6 weeks of the season at Rochester (recalled May 19), Jeff tied for the club lead in wins (8) with **Dave Schmidt**, and topped all O's pitchers in complete games (6) . . . He was the only left-handed starter to win a game for the Birds.

The club went 10-15 in his 25 starts (and is 15-24 over 39 starts during his 2 A.L. seasons), and was also held to 2 or fewer runs in 10 of those 25 openings, including his final appearance of the year at Toronto when **Dave Stieb** nearly no-hit the O's and wound up with a one-hit, 4-0 victory . . . The O's scored an average of 3.84 runs in each of his starts, compared to the 5.71 runs they averaged for him in '87.

Became only the 2nd Oriole in the last 3 years to pitch 2 consecutive complete game wins when he blanked the Brewers on a 3-hitter, 5-0, at Milwaukee on Aug. 13, then downed the A's on a 4-hitter, 10-1, on Aug. 18 . . . The only other Oriole to do it in that time was **Eric Bell** in July, '87.

Ironically, Ballard, known as a control pitcher, walked 7 and 5 batters respectively in those 2 games, more than in any of his other 23 starts... He issued a total of only 6 walks in his first 6 starts, following his recall in mid-May.

The Aug. 13 win in County Stadium was a major milestone . . . It was his 1st major league shutout, and his only road win of the season . . . Jeff was 1-8 on the road (era-5.17, ip-71.1, er-41), and 7-4 (era-3.73, ip-82, er-34) at home . . . The year before he was 0-7 at home and 2-1 on foreign soil . . . Thus, he's 7-11 lifetime at Memorial Stadium, and 3-9 on the road.

The biggest deficit the O's have ever overcome to win a ballgame is 8. trailed the Carmines at Boston on Sep. 2, '56 by 0-8 after 21/2 innings, but came back to win 11-10 with a 3-run rally in the top of the 9th. The winner was **Billy Loes** and the gwrbi was produced by the late Bob Nieman.

The biggest lead they've blown (and lost the game) is also 8, the same year. They led the Indians 9-1 after 3% at Cleveland on June 27, '56, but lost 12-11 in 11 innings. Hal Brown took the loss.

The major league record for coming from behind is 12, on June 11, '11 by the Tigers who spotted the White Sox a 13-1 lead before storming back to win 16-15.

In recent years, the most dramatic winning rally was staged by the Indians at leveland on Sep. 28, '84. They were down to the Twins 10-0 after 3 innings, but won 11-10. The Twins were in the midst of a 10-game losing streak at the time.

Ranked 3rd in the league with a career high 102 walks (Wade Boggs-125, **Jack Clark**—113) . . . Tied for A.L. lead (with **Chili Davis**) in sac flies (10) . . . Also led O's in runs (87) and was 2nd to **Murray** in homers (23 to 28), rbi (81 to 84) and doubles (25 to 27).

Led major league shortstops in homers & rbi for the 5th time in 6 years (Alan Trammell led in both categories in '87) . . . Hit 7 home runs in 17 games right after agreeing to a new 3-year contract on July 27, then hit only 2 more in his last 45 games, and one in his final 33 games (including a career high 29 straight from Aug. 28 thru Sep. 28).

Was batting .316 on May 8 . . . Over the rest of the season, Cal hit .254 (477-121) . . . His 2nd half average high was .278 on Aug. 5 . . . Batted .216 (102-22) from the start of September thru the end of the season.

CAL RIPKEN JR. (Cont.)

Previously, the 3 longest streaks in Orioles' history were by **Brooks Robinson** (463), **Eddie Murray** (444), and **Billy Gardner** (361).

Cal has played every Orioles' game for the last 6 full seasons . . . Other Orioles who have played every game: **Brooks** and **Eddie Murray**—4 times, **Gardner** and **Bobby Grich**, once each.

CONSECUTIVE INNINGS: His streak of 8,243 straight innings, believed to be the longest of its kind in major league history, ended Sep. 14, '87 at Toronto when he didn't take the field for the bottom of the 8th in an 18-3 Toronto victory (**Ron Washington** replaced him at shortstop) . . . That was the game in which the Jays hit a major league record 10 home runs.

The innings streak had begun June 5, '82 at Minnesota (6 days and 5 games after the start of his consecutive games string) . . . The day before, June 4, **Jim Dwyer** pinch hit for him in the 9th, also at Minny. The 82 postseason innings he played in '83 are **NOT** included in the figures above.

During his 1,088 consecutive games string, the O's have played some 10,925 innings, and Cal has played in 10,907 of them (99.84%) . . . In other words, he has missed only 18 innings in that time: June 4, '82 (1); Sep. 14, '87 (2); Sep. 25, '87 (8); June 19, '82 (2), and Oct. 2, '88 (5).

At the time that both his games and innings streaks began, Cal was playing 3rd base . . . He moved to shortstop July 1, '82 . . . Thus, since that transition, he has missed only 17 innings defensively.

Noted baseball researcher **L. Robert Davids** determined that the previous leaders in the consecutive innings category were a couple of former Carmines who played in Boston in the early 1900s—**Buck Freeman** and **Candy LaChance. Freeman**, a 1st baseman, played every inning over some 534 games (Jul 28, '01 to Jun 5, '05) and outfielder **LaChance** missed nary a canto over a span of 424 games (May 23, '02 to Apr. 28, '05) . . . They were Old Oriole **Lou Gorman's** kind of guys.

Rip, whose inning streak ran for 51/2 seasons, was the 1st to have played every inning for at least 2 years since **Rudy York** in '40-'41... In addition to Rip & **Freeman**, only one other major leaguer has played every inning for at least 3 years (not consecutive). That was **Mickey Vernon** in '42, '47 & '53 with the Pesky Nats... The only other Oriole to play every inning in one season was **Eddie Murray** in '84 (including 3 games as dh).

MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

7-YEAR LEADER: He and hall of famer **Ernie Banks** are the only 2 shortstops in history to have hit 20 or more homers 7 straight seasons . . . **Banks** did it from '55 thru '61.

Over these past 7 years he's hit 183 homers, 9th among current actives behind: **Dale Murphy** (242), **Mike Schmidt** (228), **Eddie Murray** (200), **Dwight Evans** (196), **Dave Winfield** (190), **Andre Dawson** (188), **Darrell Evans** (187), **Tom Brunansky** (185).

Has scored 712 runs over the past 7 years, one of 6 to have averaged 100 runs a year over that stretch beginning '82 along with: Rickey Henderson (809), Dale Murphy (737), Tim Raines (724), Dwight Evans (718), and Wade Boggs (710).

Only **Murphy** (472), and **Dwight Evans** (450) have had more extra-base hits these past 7 seasons than Rip (443).

GIDP: Bounced into only 10 double plays in '88, his all-time low for a full season . . . He holds the club record for one season (32 in '85), but his career total of 140 is a long way from **Brooks Robinson's** 297.

TOP 10: Is a ranking leader in the following Orioles' offensive categories: runs (713, 6th), hits (1,236, 8th), doubles (236, 5th), triples (24, 7th), home runs (183, 4th), total bases (2,069, 6th), rbi (651, 5th), extra-base hits (43, 5th), and gwrbi (84, 5th).

CYCLE: He and **Brooks Robinson** are the only Orioles ever to hit for the cycle in the club's 35 Balmer seasons. Rip did it in Texas on May 6, '84. Homered off **Dave Tobik** on final at bat to complete the job . . . Went 4-for-5 with 2 rbi . . . **Brooks** cycled at Chicago on July 15, '80.

IN THE CLUTCH: Hit .269 (130-35) and drew 35 walks with runners in scoring position in '88, and now has a .286 (1062-304) lifetime average in that category.

Ranks 17th on the major league career gwrbi list with 84 despite the fact that his career didn't start in earnest until '82, and the rule went into effect in '80... Everyone in front of him on the gwrbi list has been playing regularly at least as far back as '80.

Lifetime with the bases full, he's hitting .256 (78-20).

VS. OPPONENTS: See "Orioles vs. Opponents" section, pp. 46–62, for more details, particularly "O's vs. Twins", pp. 55) . . . Has never missed a game against the Red Sox (91), Twins (84) and Rangers (84) . . . Has career high .347 (323-112) average against the Twins , and also owns .300+ lifetime marks against: Chicago (.316, 313-99) and Texas (.313, 332-104).

Has hit 15 points higher on the road (.287, 2281-655) than at home (.273, 2128-581).

His 22 home runs against the White Sox, and his 63 rbi vs. the White Sox (85 games) and the Brewers (94 games) are all career highs . . . His 8 homers and 38 rbi in 91 games against the Red Sox are lifetime lows.

Cal led that team in batting (.500, 14-7, 2bh-2, hr-2, rbi-6) while splitting the shortstop assignment with the Cardinals' Ozzle Smith.

EJECTION: His only ejection occurred on Sep. 25, '87 in Baltimore in a game vs. the Yankees . . . He was thumbed by **Tim Welke** in the 1st inning on a balls & strikes dispute (see **Cal Sr.'s** biog for more on this subject).

FIELDING

In '88, Cal led the league in putouts (284); was 2nd to the ChiSox' Ozzie Guillen in total chances (785 to 863), 2 chances ahead of the Angels' Dick Schofield; and was 3rd in assists (480) behind Guillen (570) and Schofield (492) . . . With 21 errors he ranked 4th (Dale Sveum led with 27) and was 8th among 12 qualifiers (108 games minimum) in percentage at .973 . . . Schofield was the pacesetter at .983.

He has led the A.L. in assists 4 times (in the last 6 years), putouts 3 times, total chances twice and double plays 3 times... He has also led the league's shortstops in games 4 times (**Tony Fernandez** led in '85-162, and '86-163).

Since taking over at shortstop on July 1, '82, he has missed only 18 innings defensively . . . Has played 1,076 games at shortstop for the O's, 2nd to **Mark Belanger's** 1,897 . . . **Luis Aparicio** ranks 3rd in that category (713).

ASSISTS RECORD: In '84 he established an A.L. record with 583 assists, breaking **Roy Smalley's** '79 mark of 572. That year, he also led major league shortstops in assists as well as in total chances (906).

TOTAL CHANCES: His 880 successful total chances (net chances) in '84 (excluding errors) were the most by an A.L. shortstop since the Twins' **Leo Cardenas** handled the same number in '69. The only major league shortstop to have handled more net chances in one season since World War II was the Cardinals' **Ozzie Smith** (909 in '80). The major league record is 984 by the Giants' **Dave Bancroft** ('22).

He led league in net chances in both '83 & '84, and was edged by one chance in '85 (by **Tony Fernandez**, Toronto) . . . Finished 3rd in '86 and 2nd last year.

3RD BASE: Played both 3rd and short after 1st coming up in August '81, but started '82 as O's regular 3rd baseman . . . In 77 games at 3rd ('81-6, '82-71), has a .971 percentage (TC-232, E-7).

Played there the last time July 8, '82 at Seattle, after starting game at shortstop . . . Started last time at 3rd on June 30, '82 in Baltimore vs. Cleveland.

ERRORLESS GAMES: Had a string of 37 straight errorless games at short in '87 (June 28 thru Aug. 9), and a 44-game errorless string at 3rd base in '82 (Apr. 24 thru June 14).

MAJOR HONORS AND AWARDS

ALL-STAR GAMES: Has been the A.L.'s starting shortstop for the past 5 years ... Was elected to A.L.'s starting lineup for 4 straight years ('84 thru '87), a record for junior circuit shortstops, then replaced the injured **Alan Trammell** last year after finishing 2nd to him in the voting ... The only other at that position to have started more games is the Cardinals' **Ozzie Smith** (6, '83–'88). Another Cardinal, **Marty Marion** ('43–'47) was also a 5-time starter.

Cal and **Brooks Robinson** ('71 thru '74) are the only 2 Orioles to have been elected starters 4 times . . . In terms of total starts, **Brooks** tops the O's with 11.

Cal received more votes than any other American League player in both '85 (1,398,901) and '86 (1,486,806), edging runner-up **George Brett** each year. In '86, he was 2nd in the majors behind the Mets' **Darryl Strawberry** (1,619,511).

He was 3rd in '84 behind #1 **Brett** and #2 **Lance Parrish**, but beat out **Trammell** for the starting nod at short. Cal made his all-star debut in '83 as a defensive replacement for **Robin Yount** after being appointed to the squad.

He's 2-for-15 in 6 games . . . His 1st hit was a single off **Nolan Ryan** at Minnesota in '85 . . . His 2nd was also a single, off the Cubs' **Rick Sutcliffe** in '87 at Oakland.

"MOST VALUABLE ORIOLE": Was co-winner of the Lou Hatter "MVO" award with Eddie Murray in both '83 & '88; has finished 2nd twice ('85, '86) and 3rd three times ('82, '84, '87) in 7 full seasons.

Was runner-up to **Murray** '85 and to **Don Aase** in '86 . . . Was outpolled by **Murray** and **Jim Palmer** in '82; by **Murray** and **Mike Boddicker** in '84, and by **Larry Sheets** & **Murray** in '87.

MOST VALUABLE PLAYER, '83: Rip shaded teammate Eddie Murray, 322 to 290 as O's finished 1-2 in balloting . . . That wasn't unprecedented for the O's, however. In '66, Frank, Brooks and Boog were 1-2-3 (and Luis Aparicio was 9th).

Cal & **Eddie** were the only players listed on every '83 ballot. Cal's vote: 1st-15, 2nd-9, 3rd-3, 4th-1 (system: 1st place-14 points, 2nd-9 points, 3rd-8, 4th-7, etc.).

Became first to win "Rookie" and MVP honors in back-to-back years. Fred Lynn, of course, had done him one better in '75 by capturing both awards in the same year.

"ROOKIE OF THE YEAR": In '82 he registered 132 points (5-3-1 system) to beat out Twins' **Kent Hrbek** (90 points), the only other player named on all ballots. **Wade Boggs** was 3rd (101/2 points). Rip polled 24 1sts and 4 2nds while **Hrbek** received 4 1sts, 23 2nds and a 3rd.

He was the 5th Oriole to win BBWAA "Rookie" honors: Ron Hansen ('60), Curt Blefary ('63), Al Bumbry ('73) and Eddie Murray ('77).

"PLAYER OF THE YEAR": Chosen Major League "Player of the Year" in '83 by The Sporting News, and A.L. "Player of the Year" by both TSN and Baseball America.

OTHERS: Picked as shortstop on A.P. Major League All-Star, TSN A.L. All-Star and TSN/Hillerich & Bradsby "Silver Slugger" Teams (to outstanding offensive players at each defensive position) each of 4 straight years ('83 thru

PREVIOUS HIGHLIGHTS BY YEAR

1987 SEASON: Became the 1st Oriole, other than Eddie Murray, to lead the club in rbi during the 80s... Ken Singleton was the last, in '79 (In '86 Cal was the 1st to lead the O's in homers—other than Murray—since Singleton '79)... Led club with 40 tying/lead runs while batting .297 (149-44) with men in scoring position.

Led A.L. shortstops in assists (480) for the 4th time in last 5 years (See "Fielding") . . . Became 1st A.L. shortstop to be elected to starting team 4 straight years . . . Finished 3rd in O's "MVO" vote behind **Larry Sheets** and **Murray**.

During 6-game stretch from Apr. 29 thru May 6, Cal went 9-for-25 and all 9 hits were for extra bases (2b-4, 3b-1, hr-4).

1986 SEASON: Led major league shortstops for 4th straight year in homers (25), rbi (81), runs (98) and slugging (.461) . . . Was 2nd in fielding pct. to Jays' **Tony Fernandez** (.982 to .983) . . . Tied for league lead with Yankees' **Don Mattingly** in gwrbi (15).

Was 1st other than **Murray** to lead club in homers since **Ken Singleton** in '79 (**Eddie** had led 6 straight years) . . . Was 2nd in MVO vote to **Murray**. . . Led club in runs, hits, doubles, homers, total bases (289) and in tying & see shoot by (33).

1985 SEASON: Set career highs in runs (116) and rbi (110) . . . Was 2nd to **Rickey Henderson** (146) in A.L. in runs . . . Scored over 100 runs for 3rd straight year . . . Was 1st or 2nd among O's in 12 different offensive categories.

Hit .282 overall, but batted .321 (165-53) with men in scoring position. Tied **Eddie Murray** for club lead in gwrbi (15). Set club record with 32 gidp's, eclipsing **Brooks Robinson's** '60 total (29). Led A.L. shortstops in putouts and double plays.

1984 SEASON: Batted over .300 for 2nd straight year (.304) . . . Set A.L. record in assists (583) . . . Went as long as 3 games without a hit only once . . Led O's regulars with men in scoring position (.311, 148-46) . . . Batted .355 (242-86) over 60 games from June 27 thru Sep. 1.

Hit .372 (258-96) with 16 homers and 41 rbi over 63 games from Sep. 1, '83 thru May 9, '84 . . . Led major league shortstops in chances with 908 and net chances (880), most in A.L. since **Chico Cardenas** in '69.

1983 Season: Was A.L. MVP and TSN "Player of the Year" and shared "MVO" laurels with Eddie Murray. Played on A.L.'s 1st winning all-star team since '71 and also played on winning team in both ALCS & World Series.

Led majors in hits (211) and doubles (47); was 2nd with 76 extra-base hits to the Expos' **Andre Dawson** (78), and, with 343 total bases, was runnerup to major league leader **Jim Rice** (344) . . . Cal led the A.L. with 121 runs.

Led A.L. shortstops in assists, chances and double plays. His .318 average was 3rd in club history behind **Ken Singleton's** .328 in '77 and **Bob Nieman's** .322 in '56.

Stretch Run: During 44 games from Aug. 13 thru Sep. 25, a period in which the O's went 34-10 to win the Eastern Division championship, Rip ht .391 (192-75) with 14 doubles, 9 homers, 30 rbi and 40 runs scored.

Postseason: Batted a combined .273 (33-9) in 9 postseason games Drove in O's only run in 9th inning ALCS game #1, won by LaMarr Hoyt, 2-1. Made final putout of WS when he caught Garry Maddox' line drive in bottom of 9th of game #5.

1982 SEASON: Led all major league rookies in doubles (32), homers (28), rbi (93), total bases (284), gwrbi (11, tie with Von Hayes), games (160), at bats (663, led A.L.) and runs (90).

Missed only 3 games all year, none after May 29th (the day before his games streak started) . . . Played 44 straight errorless games at 3rd base from Apr. 24 thru June 14 . . . Registered his 1st big league stolen base the hard way, stealing home on the front end of a double steal with Lenn Sakata off Rangers' Jon Matlack on May 31 at Baltimore.

Slow Start: After a glittering opening day on which he went 3-for-5 with his 1st big league double, homer (off KC's Dennis Leonard) and rbi, Rip plunged into deep slump (55-4) . . . He was batting only .117 (60-7) on May 1st after 18 games on the year . . . And over 2 seasons, he was hitting just .121 lifetime (99-12) in 41 major league games.

Also led S.L. 3rd basemen in fielding (.933, e-28, tc-415) . . . Helped Caguas win Puerto Rican title that winter.

Chosen as shortstop on Topps' Class A all-star team, though he played more games at 3rd (58) than shortstop (52) . . . Led Florida State League in doubles (28).

Signed by the late Dick Bowie in '78 and played mostly shortstop that season at Bluefield . . . Played in Florida Instructional League after both '78 and '79 season.

AMATEUR BACKGROUND: Pitched and played short at Aberdeen (MD) High (graduated '78) . . . Was 7-2 with an 0.70 era as a senior with 100 strikeouts in 60 innings while winning Harford County bat title at .492 with 29 rbi in 20 games. Pitched 2-hitter and fanned 17 to win '78 Maryland Class A baseball championship.

Was voted American Amateur Baseball Congress (AABC) "Graduate of the Year" in '86, an honor won previously by Eddie Murray ('84) and many other prominent major leaguers.

Also earned 2 letters in soccer . . . Was team captain and both an all-county and all-metro selection . . . Played Little League, Babe Ruth and Mickey Mantle League baseball . . . Led Putty Hill, MD, team to Mickey Mantle World Series in Sherman, Texas (lost in a best-of-3 competition).

COMMUNITY: Supports the community actively and in a variety of ways. Recently, he and wife, Kelly, contributed \$250,000 to the City of Baltimore to establish an adult literacy program . . . The City has pledged to match that donation thru a corporate fund-raising program (the O's were the 1st corporate contributor).

Cal is also active on behalf of the University of Maryland Hospital's Shock Trauma Center, The Johns Hopkins Hospital Children's Center, the Baltimore School for the Performing Arts, the Bryn Mawr School (Baltimore), and the Harford Center, a day-care facility for retarded citizens.

He continues to donate 25 tickets for every Orioles' home game to "Because We Care," a program he and Eddie Murray initiated several years ago.

In prior years, he has supported the Harford County Humane Society, and has served as honorary chairman of the American Lung Association's anti-smoking drive, of the Easter Seals and March of Dimes campaigns, and of the United Way Softball Marathon.

He has been the regional spokesman for the Middle Atlantic Milk Marketing Association, and has also worked on behalf of Project Survival, and the Baltimore Symphony.

PERSONAL: Cal and the former Kelly Geer were married Nov. 13, '87 They honeymooned in England and Italy . . . Kelly, from Cockeysville, MD, and Dulaney High School, is a University of Maryland graduate . Senior was best man, brothers Bill and Fred were ushers, and sister, Ellen, was a bridesmaid to Kelly.
