TWO ORIGINAL JOES

Two Orioles staffers joined the front office prior to opening day 1954, and have remained with the club during all of its 37 seasons: **Joe Hamper** and **Joe Codd**...Hamper officially retired Feb 1 as vp/finance, but continues to serve the organization in an advisory capacity while Codd, 75, remains as an assistant ticket manager.

OWNERSHIP OF THE ORIOLES

On Dec 6, '88 **Agnes Neil Williams**, who succeeded her late husband, **Edward Bennett Williams**, as Orioles board chairman, announced that agreement had been reached to sell the Orioles for approximately \$70 million to a group of investors with three things in common: a love of baseball, an association with the Baltimore area, and degrees from Yale University Law School. The ownership group was approved unanimously by Major League Owners on April 18, '89, and the transaction was completed on June 26, '89.

The group of three was headed by **Eli Jacobs**, principal shareholder and chairman, and included Orioles' President **Larry Lucchino** and Maryland native **R. Sargent Shriver**.

ELI JACOBS



Mr. Jacobs, 53, (10/5/37), the club's principal owner and chairman, was appointed to Major League Baseball's Executive Council soon after the acquisition of the club was approved.

Although he prefers to rely on management to run the club on his behalf, Mr. Jacobs has taken an active role in the design and planning of the Orioles new ballpark at Camden Yards.

The former sandlot third baseman is Chairman of Memorex-Telex, the world's second largest manufacturer of computer peripheral equipment, and owns a controlling interest in com-

panies whose annual revenues exceed \$5 billion.

Mr. Jacobs was born in Cambridge, Massachusetts, grew up in Newton, west of Boston, and was, of course, an ardent Red Sox fan. One of his biggest disappointments came as a nine-year-old when the Cardinals defeated the Sox in the 7th game of the '46 World Series.

He is a graduate of Phillips Academy, Andover, and Yale College ('59) as well as Yale Law School ('64). As an undergraduate he served as the managing editor of the Yale Daily News.

LARRY LUCCHINO



Larry, 45 (9/6/45), was appointed acting president of the Orioles by **Edward Bennett Williams** in May, 1988, then succeeded him as the club's chief executive following **Mr. Williams'** death on August 13, 1988.

Prior to becoming president, he had been vice-president/general counsel and a member of the board, beginning in 1979 when **Williams** purchased the ballclub.

During his 12 years as an Orioles officer, he has held wide-ranging responsibilities that have included: participating in player acquisitions

and front office reorganization; developing and coordinating the company's marketing policy; negotiating major business and player contracts; serving as the Orioles' principal representative in negotiations with the Maryland Stadium Authority regarding the new downtown ballpark; and representing the club at American League and major league meetings. He has also served on Major League Baseball's Baseball Operations and Player Development Contract Negotiation Committees.

He is a partner at **Williams & Connolly**, the firm founded by **Mr. Williams**, where he specialized in sports law and litigation. Larry was also secretary/general counsel and a member of the board of directors of the Washington Redskins from '78 thru '85.

Born and raised in Pittsburgh, PA, he was all-city in basketball and a second baseman on the city championship baseball team at Taylor Allderdice High School (Class of '63). He graduated cum laude from Princeton University in '67, and was a '72 graduate of Yale University Law School.

While at Princeton, he was a varsity basketball letterman on two Ivy League championship teams, coached by **Butch Van Breda Kolff**. As a sophomore, he was a teammate of U.S. Senator **Bill Bradley** who led the team to the Final Four tournament.

In Larry's senior year, the Tigers were 25-3, the best record in Princeton basketball history. He has had the unique sports distinction of receiving a World Series ring (Orioles '83), a Super Bowl ring (Redskins '83), and an NCAA "Final Four" watch (Princeton '65).

R. SARGENT SHRIVER



Sargent Shriver (11/9/15) is a native of Westminster, who now lives in Potomac on the Maryland side of the District Line.

He originated and directed the Peace Corps, from its inception in '61 during the administration of his brother-in-law, President John F. Kennedy, until '66.

Subsequently, he created the office of Economic Development and originated government programs such as Head Start, Job Corps, VISTA Volunteers, Foster Grandparents and other government initiatives.

He served as ambassador to France from '68 to '70, and in '72 ran as the Democratic Party's nominee for vice-president. Today Sargent Shriver is chairman of the board of Special Olympics International.

SENIOR EXECUTIVES

ROLAND HEMOND



Roland, 61 (10/26/29), begins his fourth season as executive vice president/general manager. Certainly one of the more active participants in baseball's trade market, Hemond has negotiated 123 trades involving 339 players during his baseball career. He concluded 17 trades in his first 17 months with the Orioles, and is now up to 28 (thru 2/20/91) since he was named to succeed Hank Peters as Orioles vp/gm on Nov 10, '87.

He, club President **Larry Lucchino** and Assistant General Manager **Doug Melvin** were the principal architects

of the Orioles 32 1/2 game improvement in '89, the 3rd greatest jump in major league history.

That was an achievement with which he was already familiar. The energetic Frenchman, a three-time winner of Major League Baseball's Executive of the Year award ('72, '83, '89), has now engineered three of the big league's best turnarounds since divisional play began in '69.

As general manager of the Chicago White Sox, Hemond's '71 club improved 23 games over the previous year and his '77 team climbed 26 games above the '76 White Sox.

Roland's career dates back some 40 years to 1951, when he joined the front office of the Eastern League's Hartford Chiefs following a 4-year tour of duty in the U.S. Coast Guard. At the end of that season he was promoted to the parent Boston Braves, where he worked for **John Mullen** (now with the Atlanta Braves). In '53, Roland accompanied the Braves' franchise move to Milwaukee.

In December, '60, former Braves Manager **Fred Haney** became the first California Angels' general manager, and less than a month later, Roland joined him as scouting and farm director.

On Sep 14, '70, he was appointed director of (major league) player personnel for the White Sox who were well on their way to a 56-106 final season record. At the same time, the Sox hired, at his urging, his former Angels' organization colleague, **Chuck Tanner**, as manager. At their first winter meeting, the 2 newcomers moved 16 players in the first 18 hours of the convention in Los Angeles.

In their first 2 full seasons, the **Hemond/Tanner** combine brought the Sox in third ('71) and second ('72). The Sox went 87-67 in '72, and Roland won his 1st executive of the year award.

He became a vice-president in July, '73, in the **John Allyn** administration, then worked with **Bill Veeck** from December, '75, when the latter bought the club, until January, '81. After **Jerry Reinsdorf** and **Eddie Einhorn** purchased the franchise from Veeck, they promoted him to executive vice-president for baseball operations.

Roland earned his second top executive trophy in '83 after his White Sox won the Western Division by a record 20 games (biggest winning margin in either league since the divisional system was adopted in '69).

He was replaced in October, '85, by **Ken Harrelson**, but remained with the Sox in a consulting capacity for a time as "special assistant to the chairman and president." Seven months later, in May '86, he joined the commissioner's office and remained there thru two baseball seasons before joining the Orioles.

Roland was born in Central Falls, Rhode Island. His mother was French-Canadian and his father's family is of French descent.

He and his wife, the former **Margo Quinn**, were married on Nov 8, '58. They have 5 children: **Susan** (1/3/60), **Tere** (12/27/61), **Robert** (4/20/64), **Jay** (12/11/65), and **Ryan** (12/11/72). The Hemonds are truly a baseball family. **Margo**'s father was **John Quinn**, a major league g.m. for 28 seasons—first with the Braves for 14 years (Boston and Milwaukee), then with the Phillies for 14 more (to '72). While with the Braves, **Quinn** won 3 pennants ('48,'57,'58). Born in '08, he went to work in '32 with the Red Sox, who were then operated by his father.

In addition to **Margo**, **John Quinn**'s children include: **Susan**, who worked for the Angels and was Roland's secretary for a number of years; **Bob**, the Cincinnati Reds' general manager; and **Jack**, president of the St. Louis Blues hockey team and former baseball general manager of the Hawaii Islanders and Vancouver Mounties of the Pacific Coast League.

Two of Roland's children, **Susan** and **Bob**, are also in baseball. Susan is the associate director for some ESPN baseball telecasts and also freelances on other major tv sports events. Bob works for the Wichita Wranglers in the Texas League.

1990 MINOR LEAGUE ROUNDUP

For the 1st time since 1976, the Orioles claimed 2 minor league championships in 1990 as Rochester won the International League (AAA) title and Frederick won the Class A Carolina League trophy. The Orioles' 5 minor league teams finished with a 317-308 (.507) record, 12th best in the majors.

Rochester, an Orioles' affiliate since 1961, won 89 games, most since 1953 when they were 97-57 as part of the St. Louis Cardinals' farm system.

The O's and Los Angeles Dodgers each placed a major league-high 5 players on the **Baseball America** list of Top 10 Triple A and Double A prospects in an annual survey of minor league managers. The Oriole farmhands mentioned were **David Segui**, **Leo Gomez**, **Chris Holles**, **Luis Mercedes**, and **Mike Mussina**, the club's 1st round draft choice in 1990.

Rochester (89-56) won the International League's Eastern Division, then defeated Columbus (Yankees) to claim a record 9th Governor's Cup

DOUG MELVIN



Doug, 38 (8/8/52), is a native of Chatham, Ontario (which also produced Hall of Famer and 284-game winner **Fergie Jenkins**). This is his 20th year in professional baseball, his 6th with the Orioles.

He was named special assistant to Orioles President **Edward Bennett Williams** and Executive Vice-President **Hank Peters** on Feb 11, '86. A year and a half later, he became director of player personnel in charge of minor league operations and for the past 3 seasons has served as assistant general manager/director of player personnel.

His pro playing career began in '72 when he was signed by the Pittsburgh Pirates as a righthanded pitcher. Doug pitched in the Bucs' system for 2 years ('72-'73) and spent 4 more in the Yankees' chain ('75-'78) after sitting out 1974 with a leg injury. The Pirates released him after the '73 season, but he was re-signed by then Yankees Scouting Director **Pat Gillick** (a former Orioles system pitcher and currently gm at Toronto).

In 6 pro seasons, Melvin was 29-19 with a 3.43 era (ip-520, er-198). He was 16-4 combined over his last 2 seasons ('77-'78) at West Haven (Class A, Eastern). In '76 at Ft Lauderdale (Class A, Florida State), he was 5th in the league in era (2.41) despite a losing record (6-7).

After his playing career ended, he pitched batting practice for the Yankees for one season, then spent the next 6 years building a solid reputation in the Yankees baseball organization.

There was no baseball at Ontario's Chatham Kent Secondary School, but Doug played football, basketball and hockey, and was subsequently elected to the school's athletic hall of fame. He still holds the school's basketball record of 55 points in a single game. Among his high school opponents were **Mark** and **Marty Howe**, sons of Hockey Hall of Famer **Gordie Howe**.

He and his wife, **Ellen**, live in Columbia, MD, and have 2 children: **Ashley** (4/18/83) and **Cory** (7/9/86).

Like Father, Like Son

Eight players in the Orioles organization have fathers who played in the major leagues: **Damon Buford** (Don), **Tony Chance** (father, Bob), **Roberto Clemente Jr** (father, Roberto), **Robert Kessinger** (father, Don), **Jeff McKnight** (father, Jim), **John O'Donoghue** (father, John), **Pete Rose II** (father, Pete), and **David Segui** (father, Diego).

Additionally, Orioles farmhand **Greg Zaun** is the nephew of former Orioles catcher **Rick Dempsey**.

CLYDE KLUTTZ MEMORIAL AWARD

Named in honor of the former Orioles director of player development who died in May 1979, the Clyde Klutzz Memorial Award has been presented annually to the Baltimore organization player "who best exemplifies Clyde's integrity, desire, dedication and loyalty to the game of baseball and to the Baltimore Orioles."

Clyde had spent 41 years in baseball when he died at the age of 61.

title. In the Alliance Classic, Rochester fell to Omaha (Royals) for the AAA crown, 3 games to one.

The Red Wings were the top hitting team in the International League with a .273 batting average. Their 735 runs were also the best in the IL, while they finished 2nd with 104 stolen bases.

The Wings' **Greg Biagini** was named IL Manager of the Year, the 3rd different Rochester skipper to cop the award in the last 5 years (joining **John Hart** in '86 and **Johnny Oates** in '89).

3B **Leo Gomez** and C **Chris Hoiles** were named to **Baseball America's** Triple A All-Star team. **Gomez** led the IL with 97 rbi and 97 runs scored, becoming the 1st IL player with at least 90 runs and 90 rbi since **Randy Milligan** for Tidewater (Mets) in '87.

1B **David Segui**, an IL all-star, was leading the league in batting (.336) when he was recalled for the 2nd time by the Orioles in August and missed out on qualifying for the batting title by 37 plate appearances.

Frederick (74-62) won both halves of the Carolina League championship (39-31 and 35-31) and defeated Kinston (Indians) for the CL championship. General Manager **Keith Lupton** was voted the CL's Top Executive and **Wally Moon** was Manager of the Year. The Keys were 2nd in the CL with a .268 team batting average and 2nd with a 3.16 team era. RHP **Mike Oquist** led the CL with 170 strikeouts and was 7th with a 2.81 era. RHP **Todd Stephan** finished the season with 32 consecutive scoreless innings pitched.

Bluefield (Rookie) closed strong, playing .600 ball (24-16) from July 23 until the end of the season, fashioned a 38-32 record and finished 4th in the Appalachian League. C **Greg Zaun** led the Orioles with a .310 batting average, 10th in the league.

Hagerstown (AA) remained in the Eastern League race despite a final 67-71 record. The Suns finished in 6th place, but were only 4½ games away from a playoff berth. The Suns were EL team leaders with a .267 batting average, 144 stolen bases and a 3.17 era. **Luis Mercedes** led the league with a .334 batting average, his 2nd consecutive batting title (won Carolina League crown when he hit .309 for Frederick in '89).

Wausau (49-87), the Orioles' 2nd Class A club, used 48 players during the year. Two of them made the Midwest League's mid-season All-Star team, RHP **Tommy Taylor** and IF **T.R. Lewis**.

BABE RUTH BIRTHPLACE/BASEBALL CENTER

Located at 216 Emory Street, the Babe Ruth Birthplace/Baseball Center is just 6 blocks west of Baltimore's Inner Harbor, and only 2 blocks from the new downtown ballpark in Camden Yards.

The museum was officially established in 1971 as an historic landmark and shrine to commemorate the birthplace of perhaps the most famous and most popular American athlete of all time. It was expanded in 1983 to become the official **Baltimore Orioles Museum**.

The BRB/BC is open daily: 10 to 5, April to October and 10 to 4 from November to March. As the second largest baseball museum in America, the Birthplace sports over 26 exhibits on the Orioles, the Babe and Maryland baseball history.

And, it will soon be getting bigger. By the All-Star Game of 1993, scheduled for the Baltimore's new downtown ballpark, a second museum building will open at Emory & Portland Streets, cater-corner to the BRB/BC. The new facility will feature an expanded Orioles Museum, exhibits on Maryland's Negro Leagues and amateur baseball, and a large replica of the inside of Memorial Stadium in the grand reception area.



A total of 82 have played the "hot corner" for the O's during their 37 Baltimore seasons. Brooks appeared in a major league record 2,871 games there, but only two others have played more than 300 games in an Orioles uniform at 3rd base: Doug DeCinces (792) and Craig Worthington (302)...Rich Dauer (242) and Floyd Rayford (204) played 200+ games at the position for the Birds.

Since DeCinces was traded to California prior to the '82 season, 31 Orioles have tried their hands at that position.

GRAND SLAM NOTES

O's lead the Majors since '80: The Orioles have belted 53 grand slams starting with '80, 10 more than any other club (the Red Sox are next with 43, followed by the Angels with 40 and the Yankees with 39).

Thru the Years: The O's have "outslammed" their opponents 137-87 over the last 37 years (including a 73-40 advantage at Baltimore).

Three in One Game: The Orioles and Texas set a major league record on Aug. 6, '86 when the two teams combined to hit three grand slams in Texas' 13-11 win at Memorial Stadium (the record was equalled on June 3, '87, Hou. vs. Chi.). **Jim Dwyer** and **Larry Sheets** hit grand slams for the O's, both in the 4th inning. It marked only the 5th time in major league history that one club has hit 2 grand slams in a single inning. It was the 4th time the O's had hit 2 grand slams in one game. **Toby Harrah** hit Texas' slam.

Two in a Game: Only 7 players have hit two grand slams in one game in baseball history and only 3 have hit them on consecutive at-bats. In both situations, two of them were Orioles: **Gentile** hit two in a row at Minnesota on May 9, '61 (Metropolitan Stadium off **Pete Ramos** and **Paul Giel**), and **Frank Robinson** did the same on June 26, '70 at RFK Stadium in Washington (off **Joe Coleman, Jr.** and **Joe Grzenda**).

Gentile Hit 5 in '61: **Jim Gentile** set an American League record and tied the major league standard in '61 when he hit 5 bases loaded home runs. The only prior player to reach that total was the Cubs' **Ernie Banks** in '55. In '87, **Don Mattingly** of the Yankees broke that record by hitting 6 grand slams.

Post-Season Slams-Slugging Pitchers: Only two pitchers have ever hit grand slam home runs in post-season play. Both were Orioles at the time, and both did it in 1970. In game one of the '70 ALCS, **Mike Cuellar** hit one off the Twins' **Jim Perry** (at Minny) and in the 3rd game of the World Series vs. the Reds, **Dave McNally** found the range off **Wayne Granger** (at Baltimore).

The blast by **Cuellar** was the only ALCS grand slam ever until **Don Baylor** hit one for the Angels vs. Milwaukee in '82 (off **Moose Haas**)... Only two bases loaded homers have ever been hit in NLCS play: the Dodgers' **Ron Cey** and **Dusty Baker** in '77.

Opponents: Seven opponents have hit two career slams each against the O's. Nobody has hit more... Three have hit two at Memorial Stadium: **Roy Sievers** (Was.), **Moose Skowron** (N.Y.), **Mike Epstein** (Was.). There have been 13 alien pitchers to throw up two grand slams each to Baltimore batters.

Orioles "Gophers": Among Orioles pitchers, **Milt Pappas** was the most generous. He gave up 6 bases loaded homers during his tenure in Baltimore and allowed 9 overall in his major league career, tying Jerry Reuss (1969-90) and Ned Garver (1948-61) for most career slams allowed in the majors. **Dave McNally** and **Scott McGregor**, are next in line with 4 apiece. On the other hand, **Jim Palmer** never allowed a slam in 558 games spanning nearly 4,000 innings.

Notes on 20-Game Winners

Although the Orioles have had only one in the past 10 years, Baltimore pitchers have produced 23 20-game seasons in the past 23 years (starting '68), substantially more than any other major league club (Oakland is next with 14).

From '68 thru '80, a span of 13 years, at least one Oriole pitcher accumulated 20 or more victories to set a major league record. The old standard was 12 by the New York Giants from '03 to '14, a mark single-handedly assured by **Christy Mathewson** who won 20+ in each of those years.

In 1971 four Baltimore pitchers reached the 20-win plateau. The only other foursome in the entire history of major league baseball to have achieved the feat was a quartet from the 1920 White Sox 3 years earlier: **Urban "Red" Faber**-23, **Claude Williams**-22, **Dick Kerr**-21 and **Ed Cicotte**-21. Despite that achievement, the White Sox finished second that year, two games behind Cleveland.

The four Orioles all won their 20th games within 6 days: McNally was the first on 9/21; then in a series in Cleveland, the other three joined him: **Cuellar** (9/24—first game-clinched division title), **Dobson** (9/24—2nd game), and **Palmer** (9/26).

Stone was the earliest 20-game winner in club history, winning his 20th game on August 19 en route to a team record 25 victories in '70. Three other Orioles' hurlers have recorded their 20th wins in August: **McNally** (8/25) and **Cuellar** (8/27) in '71 and **Palmer** (8/30) in '75.

The first Oriole to win 20, and the only one in the club's first 10 seasons in Baltimore ('54 thru '67) was lefthander **Steve Barber** '63.

BIGGEST LIFETIME WINNERS/LOSER VS. O's

WINNERS: Though he has been retired for 22 years ('67), **Whitey Ford**, the Yankee Hall of Famer, still holds the distinction of having beaten the Orioles more than anyone else. He was 30-16 against the Birds.

Ford was one of 12 pitchers to have posted 20 or more lifetime wins against the O's in 37 Baltimore seasons. The others: **"Catfish" Hunter** (26-24), **Mickey Lolich** (25-19), **Billy Pierce** (23-11), **Early Wynn** and **Frank Sullivan** (both 21-8), **Jim Kaat** (21-21), **Earl Wilson** (20-9), **Luis Tiant** (20-22), **Jim Perry** (20-22), **Camilo Pascual** (20-23) and **Bert Blyleven** (20-14), the only active pitcher. Detroit's **Frank Tanana** is 19-17 lifetime.

LOSERS: **Hunter**, the 2nd biggest winner vs. Baltimore (26), is also the biggest lifetime loser (24) ... At one time **"Catfish"** had a 23-16 lifetime record vs. the O's, but then lost 8 of his last 11 decisions against them from '76 thru '79.

There have been 4 other 20-game losers: **Tiant** and **Jim Perry** (22 each), **Fritz Peterson** (14-21), and **Kaat** (21) ... Other big losers were **Lolich** (19), **Gaylord Perry** (12-19) and **Sam McDowell** (9-19) ... From a percentage standpoint, **Jim Colborn**, formerly of Brewers, Royals and Mariners, with a .150 (3-17) and **Rudy May** at .167 (3-15) rank near the bottom of the list.

Others who've had little success against Baltimore include: **Geoff Zahn** (2-11), **Matt Keough** (1-8), **Milt Wilcox** (4-12), **Jim Beattie** (3-11) and **Mike Caldwell** (3-9).

Among actives, **Tanana** (17) and **Nolan Ryan** (16) are the biggest losers. **Blyleven** is 3rd (14).

THREE STRAIGHT PENNANTS

The Orioles' 3 straight pennants '69-'70-'71 were not unprecedented in Baltimore baseball history. The National League Orioles won 3 straight pennants '94-'95-'96. Six of their number ultimately were elected to the Hall of Fame: John McGraw, Wilbert Robinson, Hughie Jennings, Willie Keeler, Dan Brouthers and Joe Kelley.

ORIOLES FIRST GAME IN BALTIMORE

The modern American League Orioles made their Baltimore debut in Memorial Stadium on Apr 15, 1954 before a crowd of 46,354 including Vice President **Richard M. Nixon** who threw out the first ball. The Birds had opened the season in Detroit where they split a 2-game series against the Tigers. Behind the 7-hit pitching of **Bob Turley** who fanned 9 and went the route, **Jimmy Dykes' Orioles** defeated **Paul Richards' White Sox**, 3-1, in Baltimore's first AL home game in 52 seasons.

Chico Carrasquel, the White Sox' shortstop, was the first to bat in the new stadium and he singled off Turley.

Clint Courtney won the distinction of hitting the first home run in the brand new stadium (built on the site of the previous municipally owned ballpark used by the International League O's as well as the Colts). It was a bases empty blast off **Virgil Trucks** who also yielded a solo homer to **Vern Stephens** in the 4th and was the losing pitcher.

RULES OF INTEREST

TRADING AND WAIVER REGULATIONS: Player assignments may be made to another major league club **without waivers** at any time **except** between August 1 and the day following the final day of the regular season (5 p.m. et).

Waivers are required for assignments to National Association clubs at all times **except** for optional assignments within 3 years of the date the player first reported to the major leagues. One year shall be deducted from the above three-year period for each season in which the player may have been charged with an option prior to first reporting to a major league club during a championship season.

FREE AGENCY: Six years major league service required for eligibility. Re-entry draft has been abolished.

By Dec 7, player's former club must offer to arbitrate or it becomes ineligible to sign player...By Dec 19, player must accept offer or on Jan 9 former club becomes ineligible to sign the player until May 1.

SALARY ARBITRATION: Three years major league service required for eligibility...Maximum cut rules do not apply if, in immediately preceding year, player won arbitration increase of over 50%. In addition, effective in '91 and thereafter, a player with at least 2 but less than 3 years of ML service, shall be eligible for salary arbitration, if

(a) he has accumulated at least 86 days of service during the immediately preceding season, and

(b) he ranks in the top 17% in total service in the class of players who have at least 2 but less than 3 years of ML service, however accumulated, but with at least 86 days of service accumulated during the immediately preceding season.

TERMINATION PAY: One full season's pay if player released opening day or later. Thirty days pay for player who is released on the 16th day before opening day or earlier. If player is released after that 16th day prior to opening day he receives 45 days pay.

SAVE RULE: Credit a pitcher with a save when he is the **finishing**, but not the **winning** pitcher, and when he qualifies under one of the following conditions:

(1) He enters the game with a lead of no more than 3 runs and pitches for at least one inning, or

(2) He enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at bat, or on deck, or

(3) He pitches effectively for at least 3 innings regardless of his club's lead.

The current rule was adopted in 1975. Saves became official for the first time in '69. The original rule was amended in '73 and revised again in '75.

BATTING/ERA TITLE QUALIFICATIONS: 502 or more plate appearances/162 or more innings pitched.

ROOKIE AWARD QUALIFICATIONS: A player is considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has

(1) exceeded 130 at bats or 50 innings pitched in the major leagues or

(2) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a big league club(s) prior to Sep 1 (time on the disabled list does not count).

CONSECUTIVE-GAME STREAKS: A consecutive-game hitting streak shall not be terminated if all the player's plate appearances (one or more) result in a walk, hit by pitch, defensive interference, or a sacrifice bunt. The streak shall terminate, however, if the player has a sacrifice fly and no hit.

The player's individual consecutive-game hitting streak shall be determined by the consecutive games in which the player appears and is not determined by his club's games.

SUSPENDED GAME RULE: A game terminated for any of the following reasons will be a suspended game if it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e. 4-1/2 or 5 innings):

- (1) A curfew imposed by law.
- (2) A pre-arranged time limit.
- (3) Darkness where local law prohibits turning on the lights where lights are not available.

Light failure: a game terminated by light failure or malfunction of a mechanical device under the control of the home club will be a suspended game **anytime after it starts**.

Inning in Progress (added in '80): If weather forces the termination of a legal game while an inning is in progress, it will become a suspended game if either of the following conditions exists:

- (1) The **visiting team** has scored one or more runs to tie the game and if the **home team** has not scored.
- (2) The **visiting team** has scored one or more runs to take the lead and the **home team** has not tied the score or retaken the lead.

Note: If a legal game is **tied** when called because of weather and neither of the above situations prevails, it is a **tie game** and must be replayed in its entirety.

Procedures for Resumption of Play: Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next single game between the two clubs on the **same ground**. If that is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in AL Regulation 5.2(c).

CURFEW: The American League curfew provides that no inning may start after 1:00 a.m., but any inning that begins prior to 1 a.m. may be played to completion. Curfews shall be waived for the final series of the season in each of the parks of the contesting teams. There is no other curfew in the American League.

TRIPLE PLAYS

The Orioles pulled off the 10th triple play in club history last Aug 8 at Oakland. It was a 1-6-3 started by **Jeff Ballard** who was facing the A's **Willie Randolph**, with **Terry Steinbach** on 2nd and **Walt Weiss** on 1st in the 7th inning. Randolph lined to Ballard who threw to Cal Ripken to double off Steinbach. Cal then threw to 1st baseman **Sam Horn** triple off Weiss.

Ballard was also on the mound when the O's executed their last triple play on June 15, '89, at home against the Yankees. He and **Mike Cuellar** are the only Orioles pitchers to have been on the mound for a triple play.

Prior to '89, the Orioles had gone 10 years without a triple play. The others:

Jun 10, '79 at Bal: "gitp" Buddy Bell; 5-4-3 (DeCinces, Dauer, Murray)

Sep 9, '78 at Tor: "gitp" Rick Cerone; 5-4-3 (DeCinces, Dauer, Murray)

Jun 3, '77 at KC: John Wathan hit a sac fly to Pat Kelly in right. Fred Pate was caught off 1st and was out, Kelly to Mark Belanger to Billy Smith (2b) back to Belanger. Belanger then noticed Dave Nelson standing off 3rd base. He ran at him and tagged him out, completing the rare (if not unique) game-ending triple play and giving the O's a 7-6 win. The play went 9-6-4-6.

Sep 29, '73 at Det: "gitp" Frank Howard; 5-4-3 (B. Robinson, Grich, Crowley)

Jul 7, '73 vs Oak at Bal: "gitp" Gene Tenace; 5-4-3 (B. Robinson, Grich, Cabell).

Aug 6, '69 vs KC at Bal: "gitp" Eliseo Rodriguez; 5-4-3 (B. Robinson, D. Johnson, Powell).

Apr 9, '59 at Was: line drive by Ed Fitzgerald; 3-6-3 (Boyd, Carrasquel, Boyd)

Aug 3, '55 vs KC at Bal: "gidp" Art Ceccarelli, then runner was thrown out at home; 3-6-2 (Triandos, Miranda, H. Smith).

The Orioles have themselves hit into 13 triple plays in 37 seasons. The most recent victim was Gary Roenicke against Oakland at Baltimore on May 7, '79. He grounded to 3rd baseman Wayne Gross who started an around the horn, 5-4-3, triple play.

On 4 of the 13 occasions when the opposition has executed a triple play against the Orioles, Brooks Robinson has been the batter. He bounced into one, lined into another, and 2 were "gidps" with a runner subsequently being thrown out between third and home.

Cal Ripken climaxed a record-setting season by winning the **Louis M. Hatter** Most Valuable Oriole Award, presented annually by the Sports Boosters of Maryland Inc. It was Cal's 3rd MVO Trophy, but his first as an outright winner. He and **Eddie Murray** shared the honor in both 1983 and 1988.

Others who have won 3 or more MVO awards: **Murray** (7); **Brooks Robinson** (4), **Frank Robinson** and **Ken Singleton** (3 each).

The Sports Boosters initiated the MVO trophy back in 1954, the Orioles' 1st season in Baltimore. Several years ago they renamed the award in memory of the late **Lou Hatter**, the distinguished and lovable "dean" of Baltimore baseball writers, who spent 27 years writing Orioles baseball for the **SUN**.

Others: **Paul Blair** & **Mike Belanger** (8 each); **Jim Palmer & Bobby Grich** (4 each); **Dave Johnson** & **Murray** (3 each), and **Luis Aparicio** (2, 9 total).

Since '57: The Gold Glove Awards were initiated in '57 by the Rawlings Sporting Goods Company in cooperation with The Sporting News. They acknowledge individual defensive excellence by vote of managers and coaches in each league. Selection is based on a player's overall defensive ability, not simply on fielding percentage.

BIRDS BIGGEST DEAL

In Nov-Dec 1954, the Orioles and Yankees engineered a 17-player deal, one of the largest in baseball history. General Manager Paul Richards sent the following players to New York: pitchers Mike Blyzka, Don Larsen and Bob Turley; catcher Darrell Johnson, 1st baseman Dick Kryhoski, shortstop Billy Hunter and outfielders Ted del Guercio and Jim Fridley.

The Birds in turn acquired the contracts of: pitchers Harry Byrd, Jim McDonald and Bill Miller; catchers Hal Smith and Gus Triandos, 2nd baseman Don Leppert, 3rd baseman Kal Segrist, shortstop Willy Miranda and outfielder Gene Woodling.

1990 SEASON SUMMARY

FINAL OVERALL RECORD: 76-85

5th in AL East, 11 1/2 GB

A span of 15 days—during which they lost to the disabled list the leading hitter (Bill Ripken), top home run hitter (Randy Milligan), winningest pitcher (Dave Johnson) and most active reliever (Mike Williamson)—dragged the Orioles down to their worst August in 12 years and forced them into an early exit from the American League East pennant chase.

The Orioles entered August in 3rd place, only 4 games out of 1st, when the injury onslaught began. First, Bob Milacki (right shoulder strain) went down on July 31. He was followed by Bill Ripken (stress fracture of right foot), Aug 4; Milligan, Aug 7 (separated right shoulder); Johnson (lower back strain) and Williamson (fractured right ring finger), both Aug 18. The club was further debilitated when Gregg Olson, Craig Worthington, Ron Kittle and rookie David Segui also missed playing time with injuries. When the month finally ended, the O's limped home 9-18. It was the 2nd worst August in club history ahead of only the 7-12 mark in '54, the O's 1st season in Baltimore. By Sep 5, they were 15 1/2 games out of 1st place.

The story doesn't end there, however.

Three rookies in the starting rotation—Ben McDonald, Jose Mesa, and Anthony Telford—became the focus of attention in the final month, and the trio gave Orioles fans a reassuring look at a promising future. Behind the 3 young arms—all under 25 years old—the Orioles won 16 of the last 26 games after Sep 7. The Oakland Athletics were the only major league team that won more games the final 4 weeks. The Orioles were 12-3 in the last 15 games the aforementioned rookies took the mound.

The O's also closed out of the season going 11-4 while allowing more than 3 runs only 4 times. And in the final series of the season, they took a small measure of revenge against Toronto by taking 2 of 3 games and helped eliminate the Blue Jays who finished 2 games behind AL East champion Boston. It was Toronto, remember, that burst the Orioles bubble in 1989 on the final weekend of the season.

While their 85 losses were 10 more than in 1989, the Orioles continued to distance themselves from the infamous 1988 season which included a club record 107 losses. In the subsequent 2 seasons, the O's have gone 163-160. Of the 113 times a major league club has lost 100 or more games in a season, only 12 other times has one of those teams rebounded to play .500 or better over the next 2 seasons.

Two facts seem to go hand-in-hand with the O's improvement in 1989 and 1990: (1) the O's have walked 230 more times than their opponents the best ratio in the major leagues, and (2) they have committed a total of only 180 errors, 2 fewer than any major league club has ever made in back-to-back seasons (the '87-'88 Twins made 182 errors).

Though no one is likely to diminish the importance of the progress made by the Orioles' young pitchers, 1990 may well be better remembered as "The Year of the Streaks." There were plenty of them, most belonging to Cal Ripken.

Cal's consecutive game streak reached 1,411 at the end of the season and he now trails only Lou Gehrig's total of 2130. On June 12, Cal played his 1,308th consecutive game and moved into 2nd place on the all-time list ahead of Everett Scott (Yankees-Red Sox, 1918-25) who played all 1,307 games of his streak at shortstop. One month later, Cal played his 1,308th consecutive game at shortstop (the first 27 games of his streak were as a 3rd baseman) and broke Scott's record for most consecutive games at one position.

But in 1990 when someone asked, "How long is Cal's streak now?", the question probably was aimed at yet another record breaking streak. While putting together the finest defensive season ever by a shortstop (only 3 errors and a .996 fielding average), Cal crafted streaks of 95 errorless games and 431 errorless chances, both all-time marks for a shortstop.

And there was more. Cal's streak of 20-homer seasons reached nine, longest ever by a shortstop and making him one of only 12 players in major league history to hit 20 or more in his 1st 9 full seasons. He and Dale Murphy (Atlanta/Philadelphia) are the only 2 players to hit 20 or more homers in each of the last 9 years.

Relief ace Gregg Olson got into "streaking" as well. Between Aug 4, '89 and May 4, '90, Olson strung together 41 consecutive scoreless innings, matching the 13th longest streak in major league history and believed to be the longest ever by a reliever. It was also the longest in the AL since 1968, when Luis Tiant also had a streak of 41 with Cleveland.

WINS AND LOSSES: The Orioles were 7-6 on April 23, but lost their next 5 games and didn't get above .500 the rest of the year...They did get back to .500 3 times, the 1st occasion on June 9 (28-28), thanks to an 11-4 spurt which saw them go from 7th place to 3rd place...The Orioles, however, lost 17 of their next 24 to fall to 35-45 on July 6...At that point the Orioles won the final 2 games before the All-Star break at Chicago, then went 16-8 to start the 2nd half, the best start of any major league club.

That rush left the O's 53-53 on Aug 3, the last time they would reach the break-even mark...Their best July since 1983 (17-11) was followed by the 2nd worst August in club history (9-18)...Between Aug 4 and Sep 5, the Birds lost 22 of 29 to go from 4 1/2 gb to 15 1/2 gb...The O's went 16-10 to close out the season, the most wins they've recorded after Sep 1 since 1983.

ARTIFICIAL SURFACE: The Orioles were 11-14 in the AL ballparks with artificial turf, the 6th time in the last 7 years they've had a losing record on the carpet...In '90, the O's were 2-4 at Seattle, 4-2 at Kansas City, 2-5 at Toronto, and 3-3 at Minnesota.

The O's lifetime mark on the carpet is 185-202 (.478)...The O's are 178-198 (.473) in the AL stadiums (Chicago, 27-24, from '68 thru '75; Kansas City, 43-60; Minnesota, 22-32; Seattle, 46-33; Toronto, 40-49 (35-41 at Exhibition Stadium and 5-8 at SkyDome); and 7-4 in four World Series ('70 Cincinnati, 2-0; '71 Pittsburgh, 0-3; '79 Pittsburgh, 2-1; '83 Philadelphia, 3-0).

BATTING: The Orioles walked a major league high 660 times. Only 3 AL teams in the last 29 years (since 1962) have walked more: '70 Orioles (717), '71 Orioles (672), and the '86 Angels (671)...The O's received 123 more walks than they allowed, 3rd best ratio in the majors behind Pittsburgh (169) and Oakland (157)...The O's were last in the AL in total bases (2002) and finished in the bottom 3 of the AL in 7 other categories, including batting (.245-13th), hits (1328-13th), doubles (234-12th), triples (22-12th), rbi (623-12th), sacrifice flies (41-12th), and slugging (.370-13th)...The Orioles' .243 average with runners in scoring position was 5th lowest in the majors.

The O's left 1,230 runners on base, the 3rd highest amount in the majors behind Philadelphia (1,242) and Boston (1,233)...It was the 3rd most in

club history behind 1970 (1,262) and 1973 (1,239)...The O's team batting mark was above .250 only 7 days all season and never after Aug 3...The O's were 42-9 when they got 10 or more hits, but were 6-24 when held to 5 hits or less.

The Orioles batted .235 at home, lowest in the AL...O's .255 average on the road marked the 10th time in the last 11 years, that the O's have batted higher on the road than at home.

BY MONTH: 9-11...May 12-15...June 13-15...July: 17-11...Aug 9-18...September: 14-14...October: 2-1.

April: O's failed to achieve a winning record in April for the 5th straight year...April is the only month in which the O's have an overall losing record (315-321)...Oriole starters were least affected by the delay in the start of the season thru the 1st month and worked the most innings in any starting staff in the AL...The starters went 6 or more innings in the final 13 games of April, the O's longest stretch of 6+ inning performance since 1983...**Brady Anderson**, with only 13 at bats, was the lone Oriole over .300 (.308/13-4).

May: O's 12-15 record was only their 2nd losing record in May in the last 14 years...O's reached June 1 with a 21-26 record; only 6 other times in club history had they reached that date with a worse record...O's put together back-to-back wins only twice during the month...**Joe Orsulak** (.333, 78-26) led the hitters.

June: O's had a losing record in June for the 5th time in the last 4 years...**Randy Milligan** batted .327 (101-33) during the month and produced 8 homers and 24 rbi...**Tim Hulett** came off the disabled list June 12 and batted a club-high .375 (40-15), and **Cal Ripken** had his best month at .309 (110-34)...**Dave Johnson** was 4-1 (3.23) for the month.

July: O's 17 wins in July were their most for that month since 1983...0 errors in July were their fewest in any month...O's 3.88 era in July was their best, as were their homer (32) and run (134) totals...**Brady Anderson** batted .500 (30-15) for the month and **Mike Devereaux** .333 (9-32)...**Bill Ripken** batted .329 (76-25)...**Mark Williamson** was 4-1 and **Ben McDonald** 3-0, while **Gregg Olson** had his best month with 9 saves.

August: The Orioles suffered thru a 9-18 month, the 2nd worst August in club history, better only than the 7-25 record they posted in 1954...O's were in double figures in hits only 4 times in 27 games all month...**Bill Ripken**, missed 2 weeks on the disabled list, but returned to hit a club-high .351 (37-13)...**Steve Finley** was the only other Oriole over .300 (78-24, .308)...The O's were out-homered 35-16 and the club era of 4.70 was the highest for one month.

Sep/Oct: The Orioles went 16-15, their most wins after Sep 1 since 1983...Of the O's 16 wins, 8 came from rookies **Ben McDonald**, **Joe Mesa**, and **Anthony Telford**...**Bob Melvin** batted a club-high .315 (54-17), and **Chris Hoiles** was 6-for-14 (.429) before being struck down by a shoulder injury on Sep 22...**Sam Horn** hit 4 homers and knocked in a club-high 19 runs.

CLOSE GAMES/EXTRA INNINGS: The O's were involved in 61 games decided in the 7th inning or later (31-32), most such games in the AL...In a 7-day span, June 17-23, the Orioles lost 5 one-run games, the 1st time in club history that happened...The O's were a major league-best 13-4 in extra innings, including 9-1 at home...Over the last 3 seasons the O's have gone 29-11 in overtime, the **best record in the majors**.

The Orioles won 13 games in "sudden death," most since 1974 when they won 14...O's were 22-19 in games decided in the last at bat...On Sep 14 at Toronto, the Orioles lost 3 straight games in "sudden death" for the 1st time since Aug 27-29, '65 when they dropped 3 in a row to the Washington Senators...Of the last 21 times the O's have lost in their opponents' last at bat, 6 have been at the hands of the Blue Jays.

DAYS IN EACH PLACE: 1st (1); 2nd (2); 3rd (47); 4th (13); 5th (72); 6th (33); 7th (7)...The O's spent only one day in 1st place, Opening Day...After the 2nd day of the season the Birds never got any higher than 3rd place...Their longest stay in any one spot was a 37-day run in 3rd place, from July 21-Aug 26, but the O's fell out of 3rd place on Aug 27 and never returned...Since spending every day of the 1988 season in last place, the O's have spent only 7 days there since.

This was only the 3rd time in 37 seasons the O's have finished 5th ('84 and '57)...The Orioles biggest deficit was 15-1/2 gb, on several days, the latest coming Sep 8...The Orioles were officially eliminated from the race on Sep 17.

DESIGNATED HITTERS: The Orioles designated hitters batted a league low .211 (587-124), lowest by an Oriole club since the dh rule was instituted in '73...The Orioles used 15 different dh's in the starting lineup, the most in club history...O's dh's were last with 65 rbi (2nd lowest in club history behind 60 in '87), but led the league with 88 walks (tied with California) and 169 strikeouts...O's 19 homers were 6th most in the league...**Sam Horn** was 3rd in slugging (.495) among dh's with 100 or more at bats trailing only **Ivan Calderon** of Chicago (.527) and KC's **George Brett** (.500).

DOUBLEHEADERS: The O's played 3 doubleheaders and split them all: July 13 at home vs Minnesota, July 28 at Kansas City and Sep 30 at Cleveland...The O's have played 525 twinbills and are 149-117-259...However, the O's have swept only 2 of their last 26 doubleheaders (2-10-14)...O's are 1-0-5 since they were swept, Aug 1, '89 at Boston.

FIELDING: The Orioles' 93 errors were 3rd fewest in the majors behind Toronto (.86) and Oakland (.87), and all 3 ranked among the top 5 lowest figures in major league history (see table below)...In 1989, the Orioles' .9860 fielding mark was a major league record, but in 1990, Toronto eclipsed it by .0001 at .9861.

The O's have made only 180 errors over the last 2 seasons (93 in 1990, 87 in 1989), 2 fewer than any major league club has ever made over 2 seasons: '87-'88 Twins made 182...The Orioles played 91 errorless games, 3rd most in club history and 2 shy of the club record of 93 set in 1989...The O's had a major league low 5 passed balls, one shy of the club record set in 1985.

On July 22, the Orioles were within one out of tying the club record for most consecutive errorless games, but leftfielder Joe Orsulak committed an error with 2 out in the 9th inning, ending the string at 9 error-free games...The Orioles allowed 54 unearned runs, 3rd fewest in the AL behind Toronto (41) and Chicago (52)...Orioles outfielders finished 2nd in fielding among AL outfields with a .985 pct., behind Minnesota (.987)...O's outfielders had 28 more chances than any other outfield.

Individual: **Cal Ripken** enjoyed the finest season ever for a major league shortstop and established 9 major league fielding records while making only 3 errors all season (for more details see his biography)...Brother **Bill Ripken** committed a career-low 8 errors...Over the past 2 seasons, Bill has a .986 fielding pct. HOME RUNS: The Orioles were 6th in the AL in homers with 132...their 132 homers, 90 were solos, accounting for 68 percent of the homers, the highest in the majors...The O's hit 21 two-run homers and 18 three-run shots and 3 grand slams...During one stretch, June 9-27, the Orioles hit 45 homers, 37 solo...The Orioles had hit 96 home runs thru their 1st 106 games, but after the club's leader **Randy Milligan** went down with an injury on Aug 7, the O's hit only 36 in their final 51 games...The O's hit more than 2 homers in a game only 5 times including a season-high 4 on 2 occasions...The O's hit only 58 homers on the road, fewest since 1973 (56)...The O's allowed 161, 2nd most in club history and 2nd most in the majors behind Cleveland's 163...The only season the Birds allowed more was 1987 when they tossed up a major league record 226.

Memorial Stadium: There were 156 home runs hit at Memorial Stadium (Opp-82, O's-74)...Only 2 other major league stadiums host more: Toronto (175) and Detroit (167)...Atlanta was 4th with 155...None of the top 6 years in home run production have occurred since '85.

Grand Slams: The Orioles hit 3, including 2 by pinch hitters...**Sam Horn**, Sep 14 at Toronto off **Duane Ward** and **Phil Bradley**, July 13 at home off Minnesota's **John Candelaria**, had the pinch-hit blasts...**Mike Devereaux** on July 23 at Detroit, off **Clay Parker**, belted the other...The Orioles have now hit 53 grand slams since the start of 1980, 10 more than any major league club in the same span...The Orioles allowed 1 grand slams in 1990, to **Mike Macfarlane** (KC) off **Pete Harnisch** on Aug 4, and **Harold Reynolds** (Sea) off **Kevin Hickey** Sep 5 at Bal.

Inside the Park: On June 8 at Memorial Stadium, **Phil Bradley** connected for an inside-the-park homer vs New York's **Greg Cadaret**...It was the 18th inside-the-park home run in team history, the 1st since **A. Bumby** hit one at Chicago, Aug 21, '76...The O's had gone 2,148 games in between...It was the 1st one at Memorial Stadium since **Bumby** did it vs NY on Apr 19, '74.

MEMORIAL STADIUM/ROAD RECORDS: The Orioles went 11-4 in their last 15 home games to go 40-40, 1st time in club history the O's finished exactly .500...The Orioles enter their final season at 33rd Street with a 1654-1262, .567, all-time record there (not included in the win-loss percentage are 9 ties)...O's 36-45 road record was the 6th straight season the O's have had a losing mark away from home...The O's were 9-4 on the road May 25-June 7, most wins for the Birds on one trip since 1986.

PINCH HITTERS: Orioles pinch hitters hit 2 grand slams (by **Phil Bradley** and **Sam Horn**), the 12th and 13th in club history and the 1st since **Ken Singleton** hit one Sep 1, '84 at Seattle...Overall, the O's hit 5 pinch-homers, 2nd in the AL...O's pinch hitters were 5th in average (.235, 13 points above the league mark)...They were 3rd in rbi (27) and 2nd in slugging percentage (.374).

Individually, Horn's .444 batting average (9-4) was tops among AL players with 10 or more plate appearances and his 2 pinch-homers (both off Toronto's **Duane Ward**) were tied for the AL lead with **Matt Nokes** and **Steve Balboni** of the Yankees...**Brady Anderson** was one of only 7 AL pinch hitters with 20 or more plate appearances to hit over .300 (.333, 18-6)...**Steve Finley** was 0-for-12, the most at bats in the AL without a pinch hit.

PITCHING: The Orioles' staff finished with 10 complete games and 5 shutouts, both fewest in the club's history...The Orioles were 9th in the AL in era with a 4.04 mark, 3rd in the AL East, and just behind last year's 4.00 era...The Orioles suited up 22 pitchers, 16 began the season with less than 2 years major league experience, and 13 had fewer than 10 career wins.

The O's pitching staff fanned 10 or more in a game only 6 times and have done it only 9 times over the past 2 years (**Nolan Ryan** has had 26 such games the last 2 seasons)...**Pete Harnisch**'s 10 strikeouts on June 9 vs New York is the only occasion in the last 327 games in which an individual Oriole reached double figures...O's staff era didn't get below 3.79 all season...O's 34 wild pitches were the fewest in the AL.

Starters: The Orioles starters were 52-62 with a 4.35 era (10th in the AL) in 949.1 innings (h-987, er-459)...O's employed 11 starters.

Bullpen: The bullpen was 24-23 with a 3.52 era (4th in the AL) in 486 innings (h-458, er-190)...O's converted 43 of 63 save opportunities (68 percent)...Only 3 teams in the majors had more blown saves-Cubs (23), Red Sox (23) and Mariners (22)...The O's bullpen was tied for 12th place in the majors in the Rolaids Team Bullpen Standings with 91 points (tied with the Yankees)...The Rolaids system: sv +3 pts, win +2, loss -2, blown sv -2.

ROOKIE PITCHERS: The Orioles had 4 rookie pitchers on their roster before the Sep 1 callup date and the 4 rookies (**Ben McDonald**, **Curt Schilling**, **Anthony Telford** and **Jose Mesa**) finished the season a combined 15-12 with a 3.08 era (ip-247.2, h-206, er-85)...Among the top 6 toughest rookie pitchers to hit, 3 were Orioles: **McDonald**, .205; **Mesa**, .218 and **Schilling**, .229...**Anthony Telford**, in his major league debut, Aug 19, held the AL champion Oakland Athletics to one hit over 7 innings.

ROSTER: The Orioles began the season with 27 players whose average major league service was 2.8 years per player, lowest in the majors...Overall, they used 47 players, 3rd behind 1955 (54) and 1956 (48)...The 47 actually played for the Orioles, excluding LHP **Brian DuBois**, who did not appear in a game from the time he was claimed on waivers from Detroit, Aug 29, until he was placed on the 60-day disabled list, Sep 5.

The Orioles employed 21 pitchers and 26 position players...The 21 pitchers were 2 shy of the club record, 23 set in '55 and matched in '56...Only 10 players were on the active roster all year...The O's used 121 different starting lineup combinations.

SERIES PLAY: The Orioles went 19-28-3 in series play, but were 5-3-1 in 4-game series...Between June 12 and Sep 17, the Orioles lost 13 straight series to A.L. East teams.

TYING AND LEAD RBI: C. Ripken-39; Milligan-25; Tettleton-22; Orsulak-18; Devereaux-16; Melvin-15; Worthington-13; Horn-13; Bradley-12; Finley-11; B. Ripken-11; Anderson-8; Hoiles-4; Komminsk-3; Segui-3; Hulett-3; McKnight-2; Gonzales-2; Nixon-1; Gomez-1; Kittle-1; Walker-1.

WINNING/LOSING STREAKS: The Orioles longest win streaks were 6 and 5 games, both in the 2nd half of the season...O's won 6 straight, Sep 18-24 (the first 6 games after they were officially eliminated from the race, Sep 17)...The Orioles lost 5 or more in a row 5 times, including a season-high 6 straight, Aug 31-Sep 5.

ORIOLES TRIPS TO JAPAN, '71 & '84

The Orioles have made 2 trips to Japan, both sponsored by the Yomiuri Shimbun, Japan's largest newspaper and owner of the Tokyo Giants.

In '71, the O's were 12-2-4 on a 31-day tour all over Japan, including an 8-0 record with 3 ties head to head against the Giants who had just captured their 7th straight Japan championship, led by 2 of the country's greatest all-time players, **Sadaharu Oh** and **Shigeo Nagashima**. The O's left on that month-long junket just 3 days after losing a 7-game World Series to the Pirates.

The Birds earned the '84 trip by beating the Phillies in the '83 World Series. Despite a 5th place '84 finish, the O's went 4-1 in the first 5 games, all against the Japan Champion Hiroshima Toyo Carp, and 4-1 as well against the sponsoring Tokyo Yomiuri Giants. Overall on that trip the O's were 8-5-1, having gone 0-3-1 against Japanese All-Star teams.

In the fall of '86, **Cal Ripken Jr** represented the Orioles on a team of major league all-stars that went 5-1 vs. an all-star aggregation from the Japanese Central and Pacific Leagues. Cal led the major leaguers in batting with a .500 average (14-7) while platooning at shortstop with **Ozzie Smith** of the Cardinals...See his bio for more details.

Glenn Davis has gone to Japan twice on major league all-star trips, once with Cal in '86 and again last fall ('88).

ORIOLES VS OPPONENTS

VS BOSTON ('90: 4-9, Lifetime: 291-327, .471)...It isn't a pretty story...The Red Sox captured the season series for the 7th straight year (starting '84), and they did it convincingly...During that period, the Birds are 30-61 (.330) vs Boston and over the past 4 seasons they've been even worse (15-37, .288).

In '90 Boston out-hit (.282 to .253), out-scored (60-51), out-homered (11-6) and out-pitched (3.52 to 4.43) the Orioles.

The Sawx remain the club with the best lifetime record vs Baltimore and one of only 3 teams in the AL with a lifetime winning record against the O's (along with Cleveland and New York). The last time the O's led in the lifetime victory column was in '72 at 184-183...Since then the Birds have won 107, the Carmines 144.

At Memorial Stadium where the Birds hold a winning record over every opponent, their mark against Boston is a tenuous 157-154...No opponent has enjoyed a lifetime record of .500 or better on 33rd Street since Cleveland entered the '73 season at 87-87.

At the Fenway House of Horrors where they were 1-5 in '90, the O's have gone 4-22 (.154) since **Mike Boddicker** beat **Bob Stanley** on Sep 30, '86. They haven't won a series in Boston since June 20-23, '86.

It is not surprising considering all of the above that it has been the Sox who officially eliminated the Orioles from pennant contention in 3 of the last 5 seasons ('86, '88 & '90).

Ah, but the news is not all bad. Don't forget, it was the Orioles who knocked the Red Sox off their 1st place perch on Sep 19 (the 1st time they'd been out of first since July 30).

And, remember also, that it was the O's who snapped **Roger Clemens**' 7-game winning streak on June 18, after they ko'd the Carmines' ace in the 2nd (it isn't necessary to mention that only 3 of the 6 runs charged to him were earned)...It was the 1st time he had lost at Memorial Stadium since June 27, '84.

And, the Birds are working on a 2-game winning streak, having captured the last 2 games of the season series on Sep 18, 4-1 behind **Jose Mesa** (save by **Curt Schilling**, 3-run homer by **David Segui**) and Sep 19, 8-3 behind **Anthony Telford** (save by **Olson**, 3-run homer by **Sam Horn**).

Record Crowds: The attendance for the 4 Orioles-Red Sox games in Baltimore June 15-16-17-18 drew 167,456, a record for a 4-date series at Memorial Stadium.

Winning/Losing Ugly: On Aug 20 at Boston the Sox prevailed, 2-1, a score befitting the fact that pitchers on each side combined to 4-hit the opposition. It says nothing, however, about the 15 walks issued by the starters **Pete Harnisch** (8) and **Greg Harris** (7)...The game turned on the failure of 2 Orioles pitchers (**Harnisch** and **Ballard**) to cover first base in timely fashion.

Dwight Evans has been a credit to the game during his long career and the Orioles should profit greatly from his presence, but simply guaranteeing his absence from the Red Sox lineup was sufficient reason to sign him to a Baltimore contract. Last June on their 1st trip to Boston the O's might have swept the 3-game series with a little bit of luck. Instead, they were swept, largely because of Dewey Evans.

In the opener (Fri, Jun 22), a 7th inning rbi single by **Tony Pena** and a couple of Baltimore runners thrown out at 3rd and at home contributed significantly to a 4-3 Boston victory. Evans took care of the next two days by himself.

On June 23 the O's led in the 10th thanks to a **Mickey Tettleton** home run, but Evans responded in a hurry in the bottom half with a two-run "sudden death" homer off **Gregg Olson**. It was the 1st home run off Olson since Evans himself had connected, also at Fenway, on Apr 15, '89...At that point, Olson had yielded 3 home runs in his career, 2 by Evans and one by **Steve Balboni** (**Mark McGwire** and **Carlos Baerga** have since added their names to the list).

The next day's game was scoreless thru 6 1/2 when Evans took over driving in both runs with a 7th inning home run and an 8th inning sac fly in a 2-0 victory...They were just 2 of the 4 games in which he drove in the game winning run against the Birds in '90.

Among actives at the end of the '90 season, Evans led all Orioles opponents in career homers (31), rbi (136) and games (217) while batting .284 (764-217).

Boston Batting: The Red Sox' dominance in this season series is reflected by the fact that, in addition to Evans' contributions over the years, the top 3 lifetime hitters in the league against Baltimore (100 at bats minimum) are Carmines: **Mike Greenwell** (.367, 169-62) though he hit only .250 (56-14) in '90, **Marty Barrett** (.363, 284-103), and **Wade Boggs** (.344, 424-146)...**Ellis Burks** ranks 10th at .328 (195-64).

Boston Pitching: **Mike Boddicker** was 4-0 in 4 starts against the O's and heads to Kansas City with a lifetime record of 5-1...His only loss to the O's since he was traded to Boston was a 12-4 defeat on Apr 15, '89 at Fenway at the hands of **Jeff Ballard**. It was Mike's victory over **Ben McDonald** on Sep 17 that eliminated the O's from the division race...Mike pitched a league high 30 innings against the O's, walked 12 and fanned 23.

Greg Harris was 3-1 in 4 '90 starts, and held the O's to a .210 average (100-21)...He walked 15 and fanned 18 in 27 innings...His lone loss to the O's resulted from a 3-run homer off the bat of **Sam Horn** on Sep 19 in Baltimore.

Roger Clemens was 0-1 (his June 18 loss is detailed above)...His other start, on June 23 at Boston, produced a no decision despite a 9-inning, 138-pitch effort (the game that **Evans** won with a 10th inning homer that made **Jeff Gray** the beneficiary)...The O's batted .302 (43-13) against the Boston exterminator...He is 7-3 lifetime against the Birds.

Matt Young [2-0, average against .183 (71-13)] excelled against the O's despite his 8-18 record overall with Seattle...**Gray** was 1-0 with 2 saves in 5 appearances while not allowing a run in 5.1 innings. He held the O's to 3 hits in 18 trips, walked only one and fanned 8.

Dennis Lamp has been around awhile, and has saved 4 games against the O's, but has never beaten them. He's 0-4 lifetime...On the other hand, **Wes Gardner**, released during the off-season, improved his career mark to 5-0 against Baltimore after beating them on June 15.

Baltimore Batting: **Cal Junior** hit .423 (52-22) in the season series and is now batting .285 (466-133) lifetime vs Boston. **Joe Orsulak** hit .324 (34-11). **Brady Anderson**, in limited exposure, went 6-for-16 (.375). **Tim Hulett** batted .368 (19-7) and **Horn**, another former Carmine, drove in 6 runs including 3 to beat **Harris** on Sep 19 despite a .211 (19-4) average.

Craig Worthington (.154, 26-4), **Mike Devereaux** (.172, 29-5), **Chris Hoiles** (.182, 22-4) and **Steve Finley** (.196, 46-9) were among those who enjoyed little success against Red Sox pitching.

Baltimore Pitching: The winners (one each) were: **Dave Johnson**, **Jose Mesa**, **John Mitchell** (1-1), and **Anthony Telford**...**Jeff Ballard**, **Pete Harnisch**, and **Ben McDonald** were all 0-2.

The only O's pitchers with as many as 2 career wins over the Sox are **Johnson** (2-1) and **Ballard** (2-4). In '90 Ballard was roughed up by Boston batters for a .406 average (64-26).

McDonald has only failed to pitch into the 6th inning twice in 15 big league starts, both times against Boston...Ben's era against the Red Sox is 11.05 (ip-7.1, h-9, er-9, w-0 l-0)...Against the rest of the league, he is 9-3 with a 2.28 (ip-118.2, er-30).

VS CALIFORNIA ('90: 7-5, Lifetime: 226-178, .559)...The O's start the '91 season with a 4-game winning streak against California extending from last year (starting Aug 12 at Anaheim)...Over the last 12 years, the Birds have dropped only one season set to the Angels ('88: 5-7)...In that period, starting '79, they have won 8, and tied 3.

In '90 both clubs batted .255 against each other...Despite the O's edge in victories, the Angels out-scored the O's 50-48, out-homered them 14-5, and out-pitched them 3.31 to 3.62.

Weird: On Sep 7 in Baltimore, Angels lefty **Bob McClure** was charged with walking pinch-hitter **Joe Orsulak** even though he never threw a pitch to the lefthand hitting Orsulak...It was in the 7th inning of a tie game that the strange situation developed...McClure was facing **Bill Ripken** who produced a would be tie-breaking sac fly except that on the play, McClure, who has an excellent move to 1st, was charged with a balk.

VS CALIFORNIA (cont)

The play didn't count, and Bill returned to the plate. The count went 2-0, at which point righthander **Mike Fetters** relieved McClure, and Orsulak batted for Bill. Fetters completed the walk to Orsulak, but it was charged to his predecessor, McClure...Two batters later, Sam Horn's 3-run homer put the game out of reach.

In that game **Ben McDonald** defeated **Joe Grahe**...The last time those two had faced each other, Grahe was the winner for the University of Miami against Ben, then pitching for LSU.

Weird, Too: The Orioles had 4 runners thrown out at the plate in the Sep 7-8-9 series at Baltimore, but the Birds swept the 3-game series.

California Batting: **Brian Downing** hit 14 home runs on the year, 4 of them against the Orioles in only 22 at bats while batting .364 (8 hits) as driving in a club high 10 runs...The leading hitter in the AL vs Baltimore's pitching (minimum 25 at bats) was youngster **Kent Anderson** who batted .462 (26-12).

The veteran **Lance Parrish** also did some damage with a .371 (35) average and 3 homers...He was working on another home run, a would-be 3-run shot, that probably would also have been a game-winner in the 8th inning of a tie game on Apr 30, but **Steve Finley** took it away with a fine leaping catch over the fence. Four innings later, **Brady Anderson** won it with a "sudden death" single.

Devon White had the lowest average among all Orioles' opponents with at least 25 at bats...The switch-hitting outfielder batted only .103 (.34)...**Jack Howell** ranked 3rd from the bottom at .111 (27-3).

California Pitching: **Bert Blyleven** was 1-0 in 3 starts (era 0.8 ip-18.2, r-er 5-1) to become a 20-game winner lifetime vs the O's at 20... (not counting his World Series victory in relief for Pittsburgh, game 7 '71), making him the biggest active winner vs. Baltimore...**Frank Tanana** is second (19-17)...Blyleven is 11-7 at Memorial Stadium.

In '87 and '88 combined, Blyleven yielded 14 home runs in 43 innings, but hasn't thrown a single gopher ball to O's batters over the last 2 seasons spanning 31.2 innings.

Jim Abbott, who earned his 1st big league victory at the O's expense on Apr 24, '89, was 1-0 in one start last year and is 2-0 lifetime...**Chris Finley**, 2-0 in '90 in 3 starts, held the O's to a .190 average (84-16)...He is 4-1 lifetime.

Mark Langston, who went into the season with an 8-game winning streak intact vs the Orioles, did not fare well in the season series. He was 0-2 in 2 starts and 24 of the 48 batters he faced over 8.2 innings reached safely (ab-37, h-13, avg-.351, bb-11). His era vs Baltimore was 12.46 (2-0)...He's 9-6 lifetime...**Mark Eichhorn** was 0-2 with a save in 4 relief efforts.

Baltimore Batting: **Bill Ripken** hit .346 (26-9) against the Angels while brother **Cal** batted only .156 (45-7)...Three of Cal's hits, however, were home runs...In spot duty, **David Segui** (9-4, .444), **Jeff McKnight** (12-6, .500), and **Rene Gonzales** (.368, 19-7) had a fine time.

Steve Finley enjoyed three 4-hit games in '90, two of them against the Angels, Aug 11 & Sep 7.

Baltimore Pitching: Seven different Orioles pitchers won one game apiece...**Jeff Ballard**, on the debit side, was 0-2...The Angels batted .350 against him (55-19).

Gregg Olson was 0-1 with 2 saves while holding the Angels to a .13 average (28-4)...However, it was the Haloes who snapped Gregg's scoreless string of 29 consecutive appearances and 41 innings on May 7 in the Big A...Despite the yield, he saved the win for **Jay Tibbs**. Prior to that, he hadn't allowed a run since July 31, '89.

Ben McDonald won his only start, holding California to 4 hits in 27 at bats (.148 average).

VS CHICAGO ('90: 6-6, Lifetime: 294-257, .534)...After dropping the first 6 games of the year to the White Sox (extending their losing streak to 8 games against the Pale Hose), the Orioles bounced back to win the last 6 games of the season series.

The Sox out-hit the O's .237 to .210 but the Birds out-scored them 45-42.

Four-Game Sweep: When the Sox blew into town in late July (19 thru 22) for a 4-game series, they'd gone 22-4 in their last 26 games on the road, but the O's swept the set...It was the 1st time the Birds had won all 4 games in a series since they did it to the White Sox 4 years earlier (7-24-27/86).

O's Last Game at Old Comiskey: The Orioles played their last game at venerable Comiskey Park on Sunday, July 8, the day before the All-Star break, and won it, 6-4, on a 2-out, 2-run double by **Mike Devoreaux** in the top of the 11th off relief ace **Bobby Thigpen**, who took the loss...It was an uphill battle all the way for the O's, who had battled back to tie on 3 different occasions (Devoreaux had tied it once and **Randy Milligan** twice).

The winner was **Mark Williamson** who had been the winning pitcher there in '88 when the O's snapped their 21-game losing streak and **Gregg Olson** earned a save...The O's were 127-146 lifetime at old Comiskey.

Chicago Batting: **Lance Johnson** hit .354 (48-17) against the O's in '90 and now boasts a lifetime .349 average (86-30)...**Dan Pasqua** batted .344 (32-11) with 3 homers and 11 rbi in 11 games.

Cory Snyder, in his last year at Cleveland, struggled though much of '90, but he continued to torment the Orioles, batting a respectable .296 (27-8) in the season series...Lifetime, he's batting .333 (189-63) with 16 homers and 33 rbi in 49 games. At Memorial Stadium he is hitting .370 (92-34) with 10 home runs in 24 games.

Robin Ventura, who made his big league debut and registered his 1st hit in Baltimore on Sep 12, '89, had a rough go against the Birds in '90. He batted only .146 (41-6) and made 5 errors at 3rd base in 11 games...**Sammy Sosa** fared even worse, going 5-for-46 (.109)...**Ron Karkovice** has only 3 hits in 31 lifetime trips vs. Baltimore pitching (.097).

Chicago Pitching: **Thigpen** was 0-2 (he lost 6 games all year) with 5 saves in 7 appearances...Over the last 3 years, he's 0-3, but has saved 12 games in 18 appearances vs. Baltimore...**Barry Jones** was another pitching mystery the O's were unable to solve...He held them to a .188 average (32-6) in 6 relief appearances while going 2-0.

Baltimore Batting: Not much to write home about. **Joe Orsulak** had the only presentable average among regulars at .311 (45-14) and also led the club with 10 rbi in 11 games...Despite a .196 average (46-9), **Randy Milligan** made his presence felt. He contributed a "sudden death" 2-out 10th inning single on July 20 to win the 2nd game in that 4-game sweep, had 4 hits in the July 22nd victory, and drove in 7 runs in the series.

Cal Junior hit only .140 (43-6), but during his career has hit 23 home runs off Chicago pitching, a personal high vs one opponent (he's hit 22 against Oakland)...**Craig Worthington** batted .091 (22-2).

Baltimore Pitching: **Mark Williamson** (see "Four-Game Sweep" above) has excelled consistently against the Sox...He was 2-0 in 4 outings a year ago and the Sox batted only .065(31-2) against him. He now has a 4-1 career record with 3 saves and an impressive 1.53 era (ip-35.1, er-6).

John Mitchell's first 2 wins as an Oriole were over the White Sox while they were particularly hot (July 7 and 19)...He yielded only 2 earned runs in 16.2 innings (1.08)...In his July 19 win, Mitchell went 8.2 innings and threw only 93 pitches...**Gregg Olson**, who saved 3 wins (including both of Mitchell's) in 4 appearances, faced only 10 White Sox batters and retired all of them.

Ben McDonald, in his 1st big league start on July 21, threw a 4-hit shutout and used only 85 pitches while decisioning fellow former All-American **Jack McDowell**, who also went the route, 2-0. It was the 1st of only 2 Orioles games all year in which both starters pitched complete games (McDonald vs. **Jack Morris** Sep. 12). Nobody on either side reached base after the 4th inning. McDonald retired the last 16 batters and McDowell the final 14 hitters.

VS CLEVELAND ('90: 6-7, Lifetime: 308-311, .498)...The Indians remain one of 3 clubs in the league with lifetime winning records against the Orioles (along with Boston and New York)...They retook the lead in '88 after the O's had held the edge for nearly 9 years (starting June '79).

When you consider that in Baltimore's 1st 3 years back in the league ('54, '55 & '56) the club went 11-55 vs. the Indians (3-19, 3-19, 5-17), it's amazing the O's are even close...It took them 25 years to draw even with the Tribe.

VS CLEVELAND (cont)

Odds and Ends: In 2 games at Baltimore on Aug 25 & 26, the Indians scored 19 runs and batted .370 (81-30)...A rare midweek day game (Jul 28) at Baltimore drew a stunning 33,449...**Cal Ripken** celebrated his 30th birthday by driving in 3 runs including the game winner on an 11th inning sac fly at Baltimore on Aug 24...Cleveland pinch hitters were 5-for-7 in the season series.

Indians Batting: The "Governor" (**Jerry Browne**) enjoyed a big year against the Birds...He not only hit .409 (44-18) in 11 games with 11 home runs, but also drew 8 walks and had a .500 on-base percentage (52-26)...Twice he had 4 hits in a game against the Birds...Lifetime he is batting .311 (140-46).

Mitch Webster hit only .162 in 11 games against Baltimore (37-6). **Carlo Baerga** hit 7 home runs in the A.L. spread over 312 at bats last year, but in only 17 at bats at Memorial Stadium. Overall vs the O's he is .333 (39-13) with 11 rbi in 12 games.

Rookie sensation **Alex Cole** did something on Sep 27 that no one in the American League has accomplished in 2 years, steal a base off the righthander **Dave Johnson** (1 sb in 11 attempts thru '90). Ironically, the steal came on a pitchout.

Indians Pitching: **Eric King** has long been an Orioles nemesis, and though he was only 1-0 against the O's in 4 starts with Chicago, last year was no exception...He held the Birds to a .181 average (83-15)...The career average against him is .154 (318-49).

Relief ace **Doug Jones** was 3-0 with one save in 4 appearances, but earned two of his wins after blowing save opportunities (6/19 @ Cle, 6/26 @ Bal)...Lifetime he's 4-0 with 8 saves against the Orioles.

The Birds hit .340 (100-34) with 4 home runs in 25 innings against **Greg Swindell**, but he was 1-1 in 4 starts and is 5-3 lifetime...**Steve Olin** was 1-0 in 5 relief appearances and didn't allow a run over 11.2 innings while holding the O's to a .175 average (40-7) and striking out 11.

Figure this one out. **Jesse Orosco** held the Birds to a .214 average (28-1) and didn't walk a batter while fanning 7 in 5 appearances over 11 innings...His era vs Baltimore, however, was 6.14 (5 earned runs)...The gopher balls had something to do with it...He was 0-1 with no saves.

Sergio Valdez held the O's to a .204 average (54-11), but walked 13 and allowed a total of 10 runs (only 5 earned) while going 0-2 in 5 appearances including 2 starts.

Orioles Batting: **Mike Devereaux** drove in 9 runs in 13 games against the Tribe (most by an Oriole) and hit 3 of his 12 homers off Cleveland pitching...**Tim Hulett** hit .414 (29-12), and **Bill Ripken** batted .381 (16-16).

Both **Randy Milligan** and **Mickey Tettleton** had 58% on-base percentages against the Tribe...Milligan hit .435 (23-10) with 8 walks (on-base 31-18) and Tettleton drew 16 free passes to go with a .296 average (27-8), reaching 26 times in 45 plate appearances.

On the debit side, **Sam Horn** hit only .056 (18-1) and **Joe Orsulak** (.13-23-4).

Orioles Pitching: **Ben McDonald** shut out the Indians on 3 hits, 2 on Sep 28, one of only 3 complete game shutouts by the O's all year (McDonald had 2 of them and **Bob Milacki** the other). It was the only '90 appearance against the Indians by Ben, who had made his major league debut vs the Tribe in relief on Sep 6, '89, threw one pitch to **Cor Snyder** and got him to bounce into an inning-ending double play.

Gregg Olson wasn't his usual effective self against the Indians. Though he was 1-1 with 3 saves in 6 appearances, he allowed Cleveland 9 hits in 27 trips and blew both a tie and a save opportunity.

Pete Harnisch was 1-2 in 3 starts, after yielding 11 earned runs and 15 homers in 19.2 innings...However, in one of those starts, on June 20, he pitched a masterpiece while expending only 84 pitches in 8 innings...He won 3-1 though the O's stranded 14 baserunners. **Milligan's** 9th inning homer off **Orosco** made the difference.

VS DETROIT ('90: 6-7, Lifetime: 321-305, .513)...After 314 games between the Orioles and Tigers at Tiger Stadium, the 2 clubs are tied at 157 wins apiece...The Bengals came from behind to capture the season series by winning 4 of the last 5 games....The O's are only 26-40 (.394) vs

Detroit starting the last day of the '85 season, but are 16-10 since start of '89 (8-5 in each locale).

Belated Home Opener: The O's Thu, Apr 19 opener drew 49,288 who watched the Tigers issue 8 walks (all in the 1st 4 innings) and commit 4 errors as the Birds triumphed, 4-2, behind hometown boy **Dave Johnson** (the 1st local to start a home opener for the O's).

In that 4-game series, of which the O's won 3, the Tigers staff walked 35 hitters in 37 innings...Appropriately, the Birds won the finale (Sun, 4/22) when **Mike Henneman** walked **Brady Anderson** with the bases loaded in the 12th inning to force home the decisive tally...Anderson had a single and 4 walks that afternoon.

Tigers Batting: **Cecil Fielder** enjoyed only fair success against the O's in '90 considering his overall accomplishments...He hit 3 of his 51 home runs and drove in 7 of his 132 rbi while batting .214 (42-9) in the 13 games, against .277 on the season...Lifetime Fielder is batting only .182 (88-16) in 31 games, with 5 homers and 12 rbi.

There were no write-home-about offensive contributions by Tigers hitters over the whole season series though rookie **Travis Fryman** hit .400 (15-6) with 2 homers, and veteran **Mike Heath** batted .320 (25-8)...**Larry Sheets** hit 2 homers in July at Detroit, one of them (on 7/25) an 8th inning game winner off **Mark Williamson** (**Bob Milacki** was the loser)...**Dave Bergman** has struggled against the O's throughout much of his career...He's hitting .203 (138-28).

Tigers Pitching: **Frank Tanana**, among active AL pitchers, is the 2nd biggest winner lifetime against the O's (19, behind **Burt Blyleven**'s 20) and the biggest loser (17)...Tanana along with **Dan Petry** (13) and **Jack Morris** (12) gave the Tigers 3 of the top 5 career winners in the league vs Baltimore until Morris moved on to Minnesota.

Jerry Don Gleaton held the Orioles scoreless in 8 appearances (ip-7.1) while limiting the O's to a .115 average (26-3)...Relief ace **Mike Henneman**, however, didn't fare quite so well...The Birds batted .333 (45-15) against him...Henneman was 1-1 with 2 saves in 9.1 innings over 8 appearances...**Kevin Ritz** worked only 5 innings over 2 starts and was 0-2.

Orioles Batting: **Steve Finley** was the only regular to hit over .300 vs Detroit (.333, 39-13), but **Mike Devereaux** contributed 3 of his season total 12 home runs and **Cal Ripken** had 10 rbi in the 13 games...Devereaux enjoyed a big game at Tiger Stadium on July 23 when he connected for his 1st career grand slam, off **Clay Parker**, then tripled with 2 aboard, ending the day with 6 rbi.

Mickey Tettleton (.194, 31-6 with 16 strikeouts) and **Sam Horn** (.121, 33-4 with 11 k's) experienced season-long problems vs Detroit pitching.

Orioles Pitching: **Dave Johnson** was 3-0 in the season series including the aforementioned home opening day victory...He scattered 28 hits over 25 innings in 4 starts to offset the Tigers .295 average (95-28) against him.

Perhaps Dave's best effort was on Sep 11, a game in which he did not get a decision. He left after 7 innings with a 6-hitter and a 1-0 lead...The O's ultimately lost 2-1 when **Gregg Olson** gave up a decisive 2-run double to **Alan Trammell** (the defeat was charged to **Curt Schilling**).

Olson, despite that effort, held the Tigers to 3 hits in 22 trips (.136) and was 1-0 with 2 saves in 5 outings while not being charged with a run in 7.1 innings.

Ben McDonald's only effort against the Tigers was an impressive one...He pitched a 3-hit complete game on Sep 12 to beat **Morris**, 2-1, on a 2-run rally in the 8th inning that included a game-tying 1st major league homer by **Jeff McKnight** off Morris (who also pitched a complete game), and a bases-loaded rbi single by **Cal Ripken**.

Bob Milacki, 1-1 in '90, has excelled against the Tigers since he came up late in '88...Lifetime he's 5-2 with a 2.47 era (ip-65.2, er-18) and has held the Tigers to a .162 average (222-36)...In Detroit, Milacki's figures, despite 2 so-so outings there in '90, are remarkable...He's 3-1 in 5 starts with a 1.86 era (ip-38.2, er-8), and has held the Tigers to a .127 average (126-16).

Jay Aldrich was 0-2 in 3 relief appearances after a yield of 7 runs (5 earned) in 2.2 innings.

VS KANSAS CITY ('90: 8-3, Lifetime: 139-116, .545)...Royals Stadium was the only artificial turf park in the league where the Orioles had a winning record (4-2) in '90...In the 3 other fast-track arenas, they were 7-12.

The O's dominated the season series in virtually every category. They batted .290 against the Royals, their highest average against one opponent, and topped KC (.240) by 50 points. They also out-scored the Royals 68-43, out-homered them 12-9 and while recording their lowest average against a single team, out-pitched them 2.91 to 5.47.

Since the O's snapped their 15-game losing streak to the Royals on Aug 12, '89 (in 15 innings at KC), **Gregg Olson** the winner over Steve Farr, the Birds have bounced back to go 14-7 against them, including 6-4 at Royals Stadium and 8-3 at Baltimore...They had dropped 8 in a row at KC in Balmer and 7 in the Truman Complex.

That long losing streak did not quite match the big league record for consecutive victories by one team over another...That distinction belongs to the O's, who whipped the Royals 23 straight times in '69 and '70, their 1st 2 years in the league.

Season Sweeps: During the Orioles' 37 years in the AL there have been 4 sweeps of a season series (excluding strike-torn '81)...The O's have been involved in 3 of those:

1970: Baltimore-12, Kansas City-0
1978: Baltimore-11, Oakland-0
1988: Kansas City-12, Baltimore-0
1990: Oakland-12, New York-0

Odds and Ends: The Orioles are 43-60 (.417) at Royals Stadium lifetime...The only other sites where they have worse percentages are Toronto's SkyDome (5-8, .385) and HHH in Minny (22-32, .407), all of them covered with ersatz turf.

The Royals, once so consistently speed and stolen base oriented, swiped only one base (**Willie Wilson**) in 5 tries against Baltimore last year.

It was against the Royals that **Cal Junior's** major league errorless game (95) and chances record (431) ended at KC in the 1st game of a double header on July 28 when he misplayed a ground ball off the bat of rookie outfielder **Jeff Schulz**.

Fight Night: It wasn't much, even as baseball fights go, but it stirred up the blood a little...On Aug 3 in a game the O's would win 14-1, **Steve Crawford** hit **Brady Anderson** with a pitch (presumably for stealing a base earlier with the O's up by a big margin)...Anderson stormed the mound, precipitating a benches-emptying brawl, and was ejected.

In the next inning, the O's **John Mitchell** threw behind **Kevin Seitzer** and it started all over again...Mitchell was thumbed...It was the 1st such incident for the O's since **Rick Dempsey** and **Ken Dixon** got into it with White Sox 3rd base coach **Doug Rader** and pitcher **Gene Nelson**, 4 years earlier.

Royals Batting: **Gerald Perry** hit .368 (38-14) to lead KC regulars (.25 at bats minimum)...**Mike Macfarlane** batted .348 (23-8) and hit his 1st career slam, on Aug 4 off **Pete Harnisch** in Baltimore...**Willie Wilson** went 8-for-20 (.400) and is now batting .301 lifetime (511-154).

George Brett, a .312 career hitter (690-215) in 182 games vs the Orioles, has driven in 108 runs against them, second only to **Dewey Evans** (136) among actives...**Carlton Fisk** is next at 104...Brett has hit 26 homers...Only Evans (31) and **Kent Hrbek** (29) have hit more. California's **Lance Parrish** has also hit 26.

Kevin Seitzer, consistently troublesome in the past, fared none too well in the season series...He hit only .143 (49-7), and contributed 4 of KC's 10 errors...Seitzer's career mark against the Birds dipped from .329 to .280 (189-53)...**Bob Boone** was 0-for-13.

Jose Tartabull had only 5 hits in 23 at bats (.217), but 3 of the safeties were home runs...**Bo Jackson** played in only 4 games and went 5-for-13 without a home run or rbi...**Jim Eisenreich** had a rare 3 triples (as well as 3 doubles) among his 11 hits off Baltimore pitching.

Kirk Gibson has a .296 (280-83) career average vs Baltimore with 16 homers and 53 rbi...He did most of his damage his last 2 years in the league ('86-'87)...During that period he hit 10 homers and drove in 28

runs in 22 games...In '86, he drove in 19 runs against the O's, most by anyone since the AL went to balanced scheduling in '79.

Royals Pitching: **Mike Boddicker** was 4-0 in 4 starts with Boston against the O's, and heads to Kansas City with a lifetime record of 5-1...His only loss to the O's since he was traded to Boston was a 12-4 defeat on Apr 15, '89 at Fenway at the hands of **Jeff Ballard**...Mike pitched a league high 30 innings against the O's, walked 12 and fanned 23.

The O's finally beat old teammate **Storm Davis**, who entered the season with a 4-0 career mark against them. In fact, they beat him twice while batting .425 (40-17) in 2 starts (8 innings total).

Other two-time losers (both 0-2) were **Steve Farr** (.353 average against, 34-12), and **Tom Gordon** who pitched a total of only 5 innings in 2 starts and was racked for 4 home runs and a .556 average (27-15)...All 4 of the home runs were hit on Aug 3 in the first 3 innings at Baltimore (2 by **Cal Junior** who had 4 rbi as did **Joe Orsulak**) in a 14-1 victory for **John Mitchell** (on "fight night", see above). Gordon's era vs. the O's was 21.60 (12 er). Another who did not pitch well against the O's was reliever **Mark Davis**. He saved one game in 3 appearances, but allowed 7 runs to score (including inherited) over a span of only 5.1 innings...He and Storm had identical eras vs Baltimore: 10.13.

When **Mel Stottlemyre Jr** pitched against the O's on Aug 3, it marked the 5th time in the last 9 games that either he or his brother **Todd** (Toronto) had worked against the Orioles...The Stottlemyres combined to shut out the O's for 10.2 consecutive innings over a 2-day period (July 29-30)...Mel blanked the O's over the last 6 innings one day, and Todd for the first 4.2 the following evening.

Bret "Cy Young" Saberhagen started only once all year vs the O's, on opening day (see below), and did not get a decision while working 6 6 innings...It was the 6th year in a row that the defending "Cy" has not won an opener in the American League.

Opening Day: **Sam Horn**, playing his 1st regular season game for the O's, made a big opening day impression at KC. He hit two 3-run homers (off **Bret Saberhagen** and **Steve Farr**)...The 1st put the O's ahead early and the 2nd tied the score at 6-6 in the 7th.

The O's ultimately won in the 11th when **Joe Orsulak** scored from 1st after **Tartabull** misplayed **Cal Ripken's** single for an error. Tartabull recovered quickly, and the play at the plate was very close.

Gregg Olson came on in the 11th to retire the side in order and save the win for **Jay Aldrich**...Olson made a sensational play for the final out on Brett's high hopper over his head. He quickly backed off the mound, grabbed the ball, pirouetted, fell down, then threw Brett out from his knees.

Orioles Batting: Horn didn't stop tormenting the Royals after opening day...He wound up playing in 8 games, batting .429 (28-12), hitting 4 home runs and driving in 11 runs...**Cal Jr** drove in 12 runs in the 11 games and reached base 24 times in 50 trips (12 walks, 1 hp) for a .480 on-base percentage...**Brother Bill** batted .433 (30-13).

Orioles Pitching: **Dave Johnson** was 2-0 in 2 starts, yielded only 2 earned runs in 12.2 innings (1.42 era) and held the Royals to a .156 average (45-7)...**John Mitchell**, also 2-0, beat **Gordon** twice while limiting the KCs to 1 earned run in 13.2 innings (0.66).

Olson was almost unhittable...In 5 appearances, he earned 5 saves, gave up no runs and only one hit (in 18 trips, .056) and walked only 2...**Pete Harnisch** had his troubles...He was 1-1 with a less than lucky 7.11 era (ip-12.2, er-10) in 3 starts.

Five current Orioles pitchers have each won once lifetime at KC: **Olson**, **Mark Williamson**, **Johnson**, **Mitchell** and **Ben McDonald**. No O's hurler has more Royals Stadium victories, unless **Mike Flanagan** and/or **Jim Palmer** make the club.

VS MILWAUKEE ('90: 7-6, Lifetime: 180-122, .596)...The O's were 9-29 (.237) against the Brewers from late '86 to mid '89, but since then (starting 8/21/89) they've gone 12-7 (.632)...The Birds' record against the franchise (including Seattle '69, 9-3) is their best against an eastern team, and 2nd overall to the 267-145, .648 log against the Washington Senators/Texas Rangers.

MILWAUKEE (cont)

Even if you subtract the Brewers' one year in Seattle and the Rangers' 12-year history as the Pesky Nats II, the result is the same...[1] O's vs Texas franchise only (132-84, .611) and [2] O's vs Milwaukee franchise only (171-119, .590).

At Milwaukee the Orioles have gone 87-68, .561 lifetime (including 2-4 vs the White Sox there in the late 60s)...The only other 2 ballparks in which they've played more successfully are Arlington Stadium (70-39, .642) and the Seattle Kingdome (46-33, .582).

Nine of the 13 games in the '90 were decided by one or two runs and 10 by one by 3 or fewer runs.

Brewers Batting: **Robin Yount** is one of 4 actives with 100+ rbi vs the O's...He's driven in 103 in 17 seasons and ranks behind: **Dwight Evans** 136, **George Brett** 108, and **Carlton Fisk** 104...Yount is batting .273 with 20 home runs in 206 games.

In '90, **Billy Spiers** led the regulars against the O's at .364 (44-11) followed by **B.J. Surhoff** at .346 (52-18).

Brewers Pitching: **Teddy Higuera**, who left 2 games against the Orioles early after aggravating a groan injury, was 1-1 in 4 starts, and 6-7 lifetime.

At Memorial Stadium in 9 career starts, he is 1-5. His only career victory in Baltimore was a 12-0 opening day victory over **Mike Boddicker** '88...He's pitched 3 complete games in Baltimore, including last time on Sep 23, when he went the route only to lose on **Bob Melvin's** 10th inning sudden death sac fly...His era in Balmer is 2.90 (ip-59-er-19).

Ron Robinson, who made his AL debut vs the O's on June 12 at Baltimore (no decision), had a 7-game winning streak snapped by the Birds, 3-2 on Sep 21 despite a route-going 4-hitter (3 of the runs against him were unearned)...Robinson was 1-1 in 3 starts, pitched 2 complete games and held the O's to a .195 average (77-15) while limiting them Birds to 10 earned runs in 22 innings (1.23 era).

Jaime Navarro was 2-0 vs the O's in '90, and is now 3-0 during his short career in 3 starts with a .205 average against (83-17).

Chris Bosio started twice in '90 but had no decisions, worked only 1.1 innings total, and yielded 9 earned runs (era 12.15)...The O's hit .412 against him (34-14)...He's 4-2 lifetime.

Kevin Brown, secured from the Mets in the **Charlie O'Brien** deal, made his 1st AL start vs the O's on Sep 22 at Memorial Stadium, but was done in by **Mike Devereaux**' 3-run homer...It was his only appearance against the Birds.

Baltimore Batting: **Devereaux** appeared in only 4 games against the Brewers, but made his limited playing time count...He went 7-for-14 with 3 homers and 2 doubles...**Randy Milligan** hit .345 (29-10) and **Craig Worthington** .351 (37-13).

Joe Orsulak (.152, 33-5) and **Steve Finley** (.179, 39-7) didn't excel against the Brewers in '90.

Baltimore Pitching: **Jeff Ballard**'s victory in the 10th on Sep 23 over **Higuera** (after **Ben McDonald** had held them to one run in 9 innings) was his first major league win in relief.

Gregg Olson made the most of his 5 appearances...He was 1-0 with 4 saves...In 10 career appearances, he's 1-0 with 7 saves.

VS MINNESOTA ('90: 6-6, Lifetime: 302-250)...The Orioles have a lifetime winning record in Minnesota (143-133), but they have not been so fortunate at the Metrodome where they are 22-32 (.407)...

Since winning the first 2 games in Minny in '87, the O's are 5-17 including 3-3 last year...In 9 years there, the O's have had a winning record only once ('83: 5-1)...In only one road ballpark do they have a worse record (by percentage), at Toronto's new SkyDome where they are 5-8, .385. Before breaking even with the Twins last year, the O's had gone 12-20 from '87 thru '89.

Twins Batting: The Twins hit 17 homers in 12 games, 10 of them by their 2 principal Orioles nemeses, **Kent Hrbek** and **Kirby Puckett**.

If there were an award for the "opponent of the year," **Hrbek** would have been a good bet in '90. He hit 6 homers in the season series, tying

Oakland's **Mark McGwire**, for most against the O's in '90; batted .415 (41-17); drove in 10 runs in 12 games; scored 11 runs; had 6 doubles; a 1.000 slugging percentage (ab-41, tb-41), and a .510 on-base percentage (49-25, 7 bb & 1 hp).

But it didn't just start last year...Hrbek has hit 29 career homers off Baltimore pitching (in only 102 games), 2nd among actives to **Dwight Evans** (31 in 217 games)...In his last 34 games against the Birds, Hrbek has hit 15 long balls.

Kirby Puckett has also enjoyed a productive career against the O's. Last year he had 4 homers [2 two-homer games, 5/28 (Min) & 7/15 (Bal)] and 11 rbi...Lifetime, he's hit 14 home runs in 74 games vs Baltimore while batting .321 (308-99).

In one 4-game series (7/12-15) the 2 clubs hit 15 homers, the Twins 9 and the O's 6.

Twins Pitching: **Allan Anderson**, 1-2 in '90, had won 6 in a row from the Orioles going into the season, but the Birds won the 1st 2 decisions...Lifetime Anderson is 7-2...**Roy Smith**, who was released during the winter, remains undefeated with a 4-0 career record.

Jack Morris was 1-1 in 3 starts...Overall, he's 198-150 in the AL but only 12-13 against the O's for the Tigers...Over the last 2 years, the Birds have batted only .212 (132-28) vs Morris, but are 3-1 against him...During the last 9 years, he is 7-11...He's lost 3 straight decisions to the O's.

Orioles Batting: The Orioles answered **Kent Hrbek** with **Randy Milligan** who hit 6 homers against the Twins, drove in 11 runs and batted .361 (36-13)...He reached 22 times in 46 appearances (.478) and had a .944 slugging percentage (ab-36, tb-34)...Randy's 7 homers & 16 rbi vs Minnesota are career highs.

Bill Ripken batted a robust .412 (17-7), his best average against one club...**Cal Junior**, who has never missed a game against the Twins (108 games) is batting .329 lifetime (413-136) vs the Twins, his only .300 plus average against a single opponent.

The Metrodome has been a favorite of Cal's through the years...He is batting .365 (211-77) there with 12 homers and 42 rbi in 54 games...He's also hit 12 at Comiskey and 11 at Detroit...Cal has had three 5-hit games during his career, 2 of them at HHH (Sep 3, '83 & May 5, '85)...It was in the 1st of those games that he tied or broke 4 club records in a 13-0 Orioles rout, among them most total bases, game (13, tied).

Mike Devereaux is batting .322 (59-19), his best average lifetime, and **Joe Orsulak's** 2 homers (one a 3-run shot off **Juan Berenguer**), produced 4 runs in the O's 10-2 win over **Kevin Tapani** on May 22.

Phil Bradley won 2 games in 2 days on July 13 and 14 as a pinch hitter just off the disabled list...In the 1st game of a doubleheader on the 13th, he hit a grand slam off **John Candelaria** in the 8th to offset the Twins 5-4 lead, then the next day pinch-singled home the winning run in the bottom of the 11th.

Orioles Pitching: **Mark Williamson**, who was 3-0 in 4 appearances last year and didn't allow a run in 11.1 innings, held Minny to a .132 (38-5) average...Lifetime Williamson is 4-1 with an 0.70 era (ip-25.2, h-14, er-2).

Dave Johnson, on July 13 (2nd game) in Baltimore, retired 27 of the last 29 Twins he faced in a complete game effort, but lost 3-1, after the first 4 batters he faced reached safely, one of them **John Moses** who hit a 2-run homer which was enough by itself. Dave threw 33 pitches in the 1st inning and only 83 over the last 8...He is 2-1 lifetime with a 2.40 (ip-30, er-8) vs Minnesota.

The O's rookie ace **Ben McDonald** has pitched only one inning against the Twins in one appearance...**Bob Milacki** who threw a 100 pitch 3-hit shutout against Minnesota in '89 (4/23) while facing the minimum 27 batters, shut them out again on 3 hits in '90 (June 30), this time at Minny...He went 6.1 innings, also at Minnesota on May 29, to pick up a 5-1 win, but he lost twice in Baltimore, failing to get thru the 1st inning in one (May 21) and the 2nd inning in the other (July 15)...Lifetime he is 3-3.

VS NEW YORK ('90: 6-7, Lifetime: 308-313, .496)...The Orioles have lost 7 of the last 8 season series to the Yankee starting '83. During that period they've gone 37-67 against New York...On the other hand, the O's are 14-12 these past 2 years after going 23-55 from '83 thru '88.

VS NEW YORK (cont)

In '90 the Yankees out-hit (.267-.243), out-scored (60-50), out-homered (17-14) and out-pitched, by more than a run a game (3.48-4.58). The Yankees haven't lost a season series in Baltimore since '82, and in the past 6 years, they've gone 27-12 at Memorial Stadium.

Best Lifetime Record: However, despite recent setbacks, the Birds still boast the AL's best lifetime record against the Bombers...The (only) A's are close behind (134-140, .489) and the Brewers (excluding Seattle Pilots) are a nearby 3rd (142-151, .485).

From Sep '70 to Sep '87, the O's bore the distinction of being the team in the league with a lifetime winning record against the Yankees...That dominance reached its climax on June 21, '83 when Baltimore's record was 26 games over .500 at 272-246...Since then, the Birds have won 36, the Yankees 67.

The Orioles generally dominated the rivalry over a 19-year period '64 thru '82, particularly in the 4 seasons from '65 thru '68 when they went 54-18 (.750) vs New York, including 30-8 at Yankee Stadium.

In the early days of the Orioles franchise, the Yankees built up a huge surplus in wins. The O's were 8-36 (.182) after their 1st 2 years in the league ('54-'55), and were only slightly improved, at 34-76 (.309), in the 1st 5 seasons ('54-'58).

At Yankee Stadium: where they were 3-3 in '90, the Birds also rank the top...They are 138-155 (.471) lifetime in The Bronx, just ahead of the Blue Jays (41-48, .461) and the Oakland (only) A's (60-71, .458) who were 6-0 in NYC in '90.

The Birds were 91-100 in old Yankee Stadium, and have since gone 47-61 in the renovated facility (starting '76).

Longest/Latest Game in Balmer: On June 4, '88 in Baltimore they beat the Yankees, 7-6, in 14 innings...The game, which began at 7:30 pm and didn't end until 1:22 am, consumed 5:46, making it both the longest and latest game in Memorial Stadium history. The O's were down with the bases loaded and 2 out when **Cal Ripken** hit a shot to 3rd base. **Mike Pagliarulo** made a fine stop, spun and threw to 1st, but the throw skipped past **Gary Ward** and all 3 runners crossed.

Fast Start: On Sep 25 in New York, the 1st 8 Yankees batters hit safely off **Anthony Telford** and **Mickey Weston** to tie an AL record...The previous occurrences were in '54 and '60, and the O's were the victim in both cases...The Yanks scored 8 in that opening canto en route to a 15-3 victory.

Yankees Batting: The rookie **Kevin Maas** hit .448 (29-13) with 2 (of 21) home runs...Among O's opponents (25 at bats minimum) only the Angels' **Kent Anderson** hit for a higher average (.462)...**Jesse Barfield** also had a big year against the Birds...He batted .425 (40-17), hit 10 homers, drove in 14 runs in 12 games and walked 10 times...Barfield is a .301 (345-104) lifetime hitter vs Baltimore.

Jim Leyritz experienced a memorable big league debut in Baltimore on June 8...He came on as a pinch hitter with 2 out in the 9th, fought a pitch after pitch from **Gregg Olson**, then delivered a clutch game-tying single...A half-inning later, however, hero turned to goat...He went in to play 3rd base, and after the O's loaded the sacks on 3 walks from **Alan Mills**, also making his debut, Leyritz fielded a ground ball off the bat of **Phil Bradley**, and threw wildly to the plate, allowing the winning run to score. Leyritz hit .400 (15-6) against the Birds in 6 games.

Steve Sax batted .348 (46-16) and stole 5 bases in 5 tries, and **Matt Nokes** batted .357 (28-10) after coming over from Detroit.

Roberto Kelly batted only .163 (49-8) while playing in all 13 games and fanned 19 times...**Mel Hall** (.185, 27-5), **Deion Sanders** (16-1, .063), **Brian Geren** (.091, 11-1), **Alvaro Espinoza** (.133, 30-4), and **Steve Balboni** (.176, 17-3) struggled noticeably...Balboni has one of the lowest averages against the Orioles among all opponents with 100 or more career at bats (.207, 232-48)...But, he was also the 1st, and one of only 4 currently, to have hit a home run off **Gregg Olson**, back in '89 (others: **Dwight Evans**, 2, **Mark McGwire** and **Carlos Baerga**, one each).

Yankees Pitching: **Dave Righetti** saved 5 wins in 6 appearances...He goes to San Francisco with a 5-4 record and 27 saves against the O's...**Le Guetterman** had no decisions or saves, but he was highly effective...He

faced 36 Orioles batters in 7 appearances, and retired 33 of them (2-for-35, .057, and one walk).

The rookie **Alan Mills** worked only 3 innings against the O's spread over 3 appearances, but that was enough to go 0-2...12 of the 19 batters he faced reached safely...The Orioles hit .340 (47-16) against **Dave LaPoint** who was 1-1, and .324 (34-11) off **Chuck Cary** (1-1).

On Aug 28 **Mike Witt**, also 1-1, won his 1st game in Baltimore in exactly 9 years when he won going away, 11-3, over **Jose Mesa**...His last previous victory at Memorial Stadium was on Aug 28, '81 over **Steve Stone**...Lifetime, Witt is 8-14 overall, and 2-6 in 11 starts in Baltimore..

Orioles Batting: **Randy Milligan** played in only 6 games but batted .409 (22-9), hit 4 homers and drove in 9 runs...Randy became only the 3rd Oriole in history to hit 3 homers in a game at Memorial Stadium, along with **Bobby Grich** and **Juan Beniquez**, on June 9 when he connected twice off **Andy Hawkins** and once off **Chuck Cary**, driving in 6 runs in a 10-1 win. Lifetime, Randy is batting .362 (58-21) vs New York.

Cal Ripken hit only .196 (51-10), but of his 2 home runs was a decisive 10th inning drive off **Mills** at New York on Sep 24. **Brother Bill** added a 2-run double to provide some insurance in the 6-3 victory.

Steve Finley hit .342 (38-13) and stole 4 bases in as many tries...His .313 (48-15) career average is a personal high against one team...**Phil Bradley** hit the Orioles' 1st inside-the-park homer in 14 years, in Baltimore off **Mike Witt** on June 8...It was the 1st inside homer by any club at Memorial Stadium in 16 seasons (since '74).

Seven Orioles hit .200 or less against the Yankees in '90: **Brady Anderson**, **Mike Devereaux**, **Sam Horn**, **Bob Melvin**, **Joe Orsulak**, **Cal Junior** and **Mickey Tettleton**.

Orioles Pitching: **Pete Harnisch** went 2-0 in 2 starts while pitching a club-high 17 innings against the Bombers who hit only .150 (60-9) against him and scored only 2 runs...Pete's 6-1 complete game victory on Aug 30 averted the Yankees 1st 4-game series sweep at Memorial Stadium since 1955.

Jeff Ballard and **Anthony Telford** both went 0-2 and though **Gregg Olson** picked up 3 saves in 5 appearances, the Yankees batted .346 (26-9) against him.

VS OAKLAND (90: 4-8, Lifetime: 311-244, .560)...The O's held their own in Oakland (3-3) but were only 1-5 against the AL champs at Memorial Stadium...Overall the O's have dropped 12 of the last 16 games starting July 20, '89, and are 21-34 starting Aug 19, '86.

At Oakland the Orioles are 77-66 lifetime (excluding 3-3 in ALCS), their 4th best record in an alien park (behind Texas, Seattle and Milwaukee).

A's First Game in Oakland: The Orioles were the visiting club for the A's 1st game in Oakland on Apr 17, '68...**Dave McNally** pitched a 2-hitter to beat **Lew Krausse**, 4-1...**Boog Powell** hit the 1st home run in the Coliseum while driving in the game-winning run in the 2nd inning...**Mark Belanger**, **Brooks Robinson**, and the Athletics' **Rick Monday** also homered in that game before a crowd of 47,233.

Athletics Batting: The A's out-scored the O's 47-30, and out-hit the O's by 18 points, but still batted only .232 (393-91)...**Mark McGwire** was the most productive A's batter in the season series with 6 homers and 16 rbi...He tied **Kent Hrbek** for most homers vs the O's and **Kelly Gruber** for most rbi.

McGwire has hit 19 home runs in 51 career games vs the O's, and is batting .283 (184-52) with 46 rbi...He's hit 12 of the homers, and driven in 32 runs in 24 games lifetime at Memorial Stadium (he's also hit 12 at Tiger Stadium), and is batting .323 (93-30). On Aug 19 McGwire became the 1st ever (now 1 of 2 with **Carlos Baerga**) to hit a home run off **Gregg Olson** in Baltimore.

AL mvp **Rickey Henderson** batted only .200 (30-6) against the O's, but his lifetime figures for 121 games are still exceptional: avg-.325 (449-146), hr-10, rbi-42, bb-92, sf-2, sb-79, cs-10 (89%), on-base percentage-.438 (543-238)...**Dave Henderson** is batting .331 (284-94).

Jose Canseco played a modest role in the season series, batting .255 (47-12) with 2 homers and 7 rbi in 12 games...**Mike Gallego** hit .091 (22-2), and has a .096 (73-7) lifetime average in 38 games, lowest among all opponents with at least 20 career at bats against the Birds...Former

Oriole **Jamie Quirk** has a .126 (103-13) career mark vs the O's, low among actives with 100 or more at bats.

Terry Steinbach had the distinction of breaking up 2 no-hit bids Orioles rookies in '90, both in the 5th inning—at Oakland Aug 8 against **Ben McDonald**, and on Aug 19 vs **Anthony Telford**, in his debut (below under "Baltimore Pitching"), at Memorial Stadium...Walt Weiss batting .348 (46-16) lifetime at Memorial Stadium, but only .200 (.000) against the Birds at the Coliseum.

Athletics Pitching: **Bob Welch**, who won his 20th game of the year Baltimore Aug 17, was 3-0 against the O's with a 1.78 era (ip-6)...Over the last 2 years, the O's have batted only .195 (15-16) against the AL's latest Cy Young Award winner.

Dave Stewart, in his lone '90 start against the O's on Apr 24, beat the **Johnson** to snap a 3-game losing string in Balmer where he's now lifetime...Overall, Dave is 4-6 against the O's.

On Apr 26 the O's scored a moral victory against **Dennis Eckersley**. **Steve Finley** got a base hit when **Felix Jose** lost his drive to left in lights...That snapped a string of 19 straight Orioles that Eckersley had retired since **Joe Orsulak** singled off him on 8/28/88 at Oakland...But another Oriole reached safely (excluding errors) off Eck the rest of the year so the Birds are now 1-for-35 with no walks against the A's ace relief in just over 2 years...In the last 2 seasons, he's worked in 9 games against the O's, allowed no runs and has earned 8 saves.

Both **Gene Nelson** and **Mike Moore** were 2-1, but they got there in different directions...Nelson had an 0.93 era and held the Orioles to hits in 30 trips (.067) in 6 relief efforts...Moore had a 4.34 era and the hit .294 (68-20) against him in 3 starts...**Rick Honeycutt** (ip-3.1), **Klink** (ip-6.1), **Todd Burns** (ip-2), and **Reggie Harris** (ip-2), Eckersley, all had 0.00 eras vs Baltimore in '90, though they had no saves or decisions.

The A's big loser was **Scott Sanderson** who was 0-2 in as many starts, gave up 14 hits in 42 trips (.333).

Orioles Batting: **Cal Junior** was the O's most productive hitter in the season series...He hit 5 (of his 21) home runs and drove in 7 while batting .286 (49-14)...His 22 career homers vs Oakland are 2nd only to his lifetime high of 23 against the White Sox...**Bob Melvin** has a .308 (39-12) career average off A's pitching.

The O's lost **Randy Milligan** (left shoulder) for the season after collided with **Ron Hassey** in a play at the plate on Aug 7 at the land...Milligan was 1-for-17 (.059) against the A's in '90...**Brady Anderson** hit .115 (26-3) in the season series and **Mike Devereaux** has a .163 (.000) career mark vs Oakland.

Orioles Pitching: **Anthony Telford**, 24, pitched a 1-hit shutout over 7 innings in his big league debut, in Baltimore, on Aug 19, and left with a 3-0 lead...A couple of 23-year olds, **Curt Schilling** and **Gregg Olson** relieved him and preserved the victory, though **McGwire's** 2-run home in the 9th off Olson made it close.

Olson has saved 6 and lost 1 in 9 appearances against the A's...The biggest winner lifetime vs Oakland is **Jeff Ballard**, who is 32-12 and experienced the perfect relief inning in support of **Ben McDonald** on Aug 8...He came on in the 7th with runners on 1st and 2nd and none out to face **Willie Randolph**. He threw one pitch and Randolph lined it back to Jeff who started a 1-6-3 triple play...Olson ultimately relieved Ballard and got the save for McDonald.

Ten days later (8/18) **McDonald** started again against Oakland, this time at home, and sustained his 1st loss in the big leagues after winning his 1st 6 decisions (beginning '89).

VS SEATTLE ('90: 3-9, Lifetime: 92-66, .582)...The Mariners totally dominated the season series...They out-hit the O's by more than 10 points (.297 (417-124) to .195 (390-76)), out-scored them 63 to 37, out-homered them 11-5 and their era in the season series was nearly twice as good as the Orioles (.260-5.19)...The Orioles .195 average, incidentally, was their lowest vs one club in a season in recorded history. It was only the 2nd time in 14 years the M's had captured a season series from Baltimore...Despite all this, the O's lifetime record against Seattle

remains their 3rd best overall, behind Texas and Milwaukee...The Birds' road record in Seattle (48-33, .582) is 2nd only to their 70-39 log at Texas (.642).

The O's record at home and away vs the Mariners is exactly the same (46-33)...Over the last 4 years the O's are 8-16 in Baltimore against the Mariners...The Birds are only 3-9 over the last 2 years at Memorial Stadium, and have gone 1-6 starting 7/19/89.

At the Kingdome on May 4 these 2 clubs played the longest 9-inning game in Mariners' history (3:54)...The O's came from behind 3 times and finally won it 9-8 with a 3-run rally in the 8th.

Live with Five: When the 2 Griffey's and 3 Ripkens were in uniform for the game of Sep 3 in Baltimore, it was deja vu Sep 18, '73 when 2 of the Alous (Felipe & Matty) suited up for Montreal to play the Cardinals who countered with 3 Cruz's (Hector, Jose & Tommy).

Mariners Batting: The Griffey's batted a combined .438 (64-28) against the O's in '90...Senior batted .538 (13-7) with 5 rbi in 3 games and Junior hit .412 (51-21) with 2 homers & 9 rbi in 12...Griffey the Younger has a .391 (92-36) lifetime average in 24 games vs Baltimore, the highest among all active opponents with 90 or more at bats against them.

Harold Reynolds hit a less flashy .267 (45-12) in the season series, but was even more productive...He scored 12 times and drove in 10...Reynolds enjoyed a particularly big day on Sep 5...Not only was he honored by the President at the White House (as his 195th "point of light") for all he has done for youth in the Seattle area, he also drove in 5 runs in a 9-5 victory for the Mariners, and hit his 1st career grand slam...That was only his 10th career major league homer, but his 2nd in the last 3 days at Baltimore (one from each side of the plate), and only his 4th lifetime on the road.

In total, 8 of the 16 M's who batted against the Orioles in '90 hit .300 or better, including **Greg Briley** (.351, 37-13) with 3 homers and 9 rbi and **Alvin Davis** who hit .304 (46-14) and walked 11 times...**Omar Vizquel** went 8-for-22 (.364).

On May 6 3rd Baseman **Edgar Martinez** committed 4 errors that led to 4 unearned runs, but the M's won it 5-4 thanks to **Griffey Junior's** 4-for-4 and **Reynolds** who drove in the tie-breaker in the 8th.

Dave Valle, who went into the season with a career .377 (69-26) average against the O's, has been taken off the nemesis list after going 3-for-20 (.150), though he's still batting .326 vs the Birds (89-29)...**Pete O'Brien** batted .162 (37-6)...He's hitting only .212 (340-72) lifetime.

Mariners Pitching: On Aug 13-14-15, 3 Mariners' pitchers did the impossible...**Brian Holman**, **Matt Young** and **Randy Johnson** pitched consecutive complete games (at Seattle), all against the O's...They won 2 of 3 (Holman lost).

With the 2.60 era the staff mustered in the 12 games, there were more than a few standouts...**Eric Hanson** was 2-0 in 2 starts, and held the O's to a .135 (52-7) average, lowest among all opponents who worked at least 15 innings against the O's...**Johnson** was 1-0 in 3 starts and a .175 average against (80-14), but did yield 9 runs (4 earned) in 21.1 innings...**Matt Young** [2-0, average against .183 (71-13)] excelled despite his 8-18 overall record, as did **Mike Schoeler** who appeared in 4 games, pitched 4 innings and picked up 4 saves.

Orioles Batting: **Joe Orsulak** was the top hitting regular at .296 (27-8) and **Bob Melvin** hit .280 (25-7)...**Craig Worthington** batted only .154 (39-6), but drove in a club leading 8 rbi...**Mickey Tettleton** was 2-for-33 (.061) against the M's with no homers or rbi and 18 strikeouts.

Bill Ripken has hit 9 homers in the big leagues, 3 of them off the M's...**Rene Gonzales** has hit 2 of his 5 career homers against Seattle...**Sam Horn** is hitting only .212 against Seattle (52-11), but 5 of his 11 hits have been home runs.

Orioles Pitching: The only Orioles winners in the season series were **Kevin Hickey** and **Mark Williamson**, both in relief, and **Ben McDonald** who pitched 4-hit ball for 8.2 innings on Aug 13 in the Kingdome to beat **Holman**, 3-2, with a save from **Gregg Olson**.

Olson didn't give up a run in 4 appearances and picked up a couple of saves...**Dave Johnson** was 0-2, had an 8.56 era (ip-13.2, er-13) and the M's hit .373 (59-22) against him...**Pete Harnisch** was also 0-2...He yielded 18 walks and yielded 28 hits in 93 at bats (.301) over 24 innings...The O's biggest winner lifetime against Seattle is **Jeff Ballard** at 4-5.

VS TEXAS (90: 8-4, Lifetime, incl Was: 267-145, .648)...Since the O's moved to Texas in '72, the O's are 132-84 (.611) against the franchise...has been their best against any club...The same goes for their efforts in Arlington where the Birds are 70-39, .642.

Even during the last 4 seasons in which the O's have finished below .500, they have gone 30-18 (.600) against the Rangers...In 19 seasons the Birds have lost the season series only 3 times.

The O's out-scored the Rangers in '90 by a margin of 74-45, and out-pitched them by better than a run and a half a game (3.67 to 5.26)...74 runs were a high vs one opponent in '90...The O's scored 48 runs in their 1st 2 series (6 games) against the Rangers, all in May. That series included a 13-1 blowout at home on May 18 when the Birds mounted a season high 17-hit attack featuring 7 runs and 8 straight hits in the 9th inning off **Bobby Witt**, **Joe Orsulak** and **Mickey Tettleton** each having 2 hits and **David Segui** drove in 4 runs.

Presidential Visit: President Bush attended only one Orioles game against the Rangers on July 16 in Baltimore. His son George is a general partner of the Texas club...The Birds won on **Kenny Rogers**' base-loaded walk to **Mickey Tettleton** in the bottom of the 9th after the O's executive had left...The O's are 4-1 in games that President Bush attended (3-1 at Memorial Stadium).

Rangers Batting: **Rafael Palmeiro**, who finished 3rd in the A.L. batting race at .319, hit .438 (48-21) against the O's with 3 homers and 14 hits in 12 games...Lifetime, he is batting .378 (90-34) in 2 A.L. seasons...Among opponents with 30 or more career at bats, only **Ken Griffey Jr.** (.392-36) has a higher average vs Baltimore.

Julio Franco has been consistently effective against the O's over 10 years...He batted .316 (38-12) last year, and has a .305 (374-114) average. However, 9 of the 18 players who batted against the Orioles in '90 are below .200, including **Ruben Sierra**'s .156 (45-7). Lifetime, he is batting only .218 (197-43)...The Rangers also had their problems afield...They committed 15 errors in the 12-game season series.

Rangers Pitching: **Bobby Witt** was 2-2 in 4 starts and worked 26.1 innings [only **Mike Boddicker** (30) worked more vs the O's]...He faced 26.1 innings, he allowed 45 base-runners (h-28, hb-1, bb-16). Witt, who lost his first 2 starts, came back to win his last 2 to snap a 5-game losing streak...Lifetime he's 4-5...On May 18 at Baltimore, Witt gave up 10 hits and 9 runs in 4.1 innings (see more below under "Baltimore Batting").

Charlie Hough (1-1 in '90 and 6-11 lifetime), who took 9 years to win a game in Baltimore (in '89), has now won 2 straight at Memorial Stadium, where he is 2-6 lifetime.

Nolan Ryan who didn't pitch at all against the O's last year, is 5-5 lifetime. He hasn't beaten them in 13 years (since Apr 20, '76 in California at Anaheim)...Only **Frank Tanana** (19-17) has lost more games to Baltimore among active pitchers...Ryan has dropped 9 in a row.

At Memorial Stadium, where he has lost 7 straight (in 8 starts), he has won since May 18, '75 (2 weeks before his no-hitter against the Birds at Anaheim)...Ryan is 3-10 lifetime in Baltimore with a 6.42 era (ip-47, er-34)...He has fanned 10 or more Orioles in game 10 times with a high of 13 twice...Ryan has only beaten the Astros and Angels 3 times, but the clubs with which he spent a substantial stretch...Otherwise his low victories against one opponent is 5 vs both Tor (5-5) and the Orioles.

Kevin Brown went up against **Pete Harnisch** 3 times in '90 and came away a loser each time...He walked 15 in 19 innings and the O's put men on the bases in that time...All 3 of the principal workhorses against the O's—**Witt** (ip-26.1), **Hough** (ip-21.1) and **Brown** (19)—had eras over 5.00 vs the O's.

Orioles Batting: **Orsulak** batted .429 (42-18) in the season series, scored 11 times, hit 3 homers and drove in 13 runs in 11 games...Joe batting .375 (72-27) lifetime vs the Rangers...That's a career high, as are his 4 homers...**Tettleton**'s 12 homers and 30 rbi are also highs against one opponent.

Cal Junior went only 6-for-42 (.143) but is still batting .290 lifetime (424-123).

Orioles Pitching: **Pete Harnisch** was 3-0 with a 1.99 era (ip-22.2, er-17) while holding the Rangers to a .171 average (76-13) with no

homers...In case you missed it above, all 3 of his wins were at the expense of **Kevin Brown**...Lifetime, He is 4-0 against Texas.

Pete's effort of July 17 at Baltimore was particularly noteworthy. He worked 8.2 innings, retired 22 straight Texans at one point, was clocked as high as 93 mph, and left with a 5-1 lead...**Gregg Olson** gave up a 2-run single to **Rafael Palmeiro** before preserving the victory.

Olson was 2-0 with 2 saves and held the Rangers to a .143 average (28-4)...Lifetime he's 3-0 with 5 saves and has never been charged with an earned run in 13 appearances (ip-15).

VS TORONTO (90: 5-8, Lifetime: 96-83, .536)...The Blue Jays have dominated the Orioles in recent years, but the O's enjoyed a degree of retribution by defeating Toronto twice in the final (3-game) series of the year, to facilitate their elimination from the division title race.

The O's have lost 5 of the last 7 season series to the Jays, starting '84, and have gone 34-56 (.378) in that time...Over the last 4 seasons, the O's are 18-34 (.346).

At Toronto it gets even worse...The O's are 6-20 (.231) in the last 4 seasons, but a somewhat more competitive 5-8 (.385) in 2 years at the SkyDome...Overall, the Orioles are 40-49 (.449) in Toronto since the Jays were founded in '77...Only in Boston, have the Orioles played less successfully (.436).

The Jays out-hit the O's .292 to .247, and out-pitched them by a full run a game (4.00 to 5.00)...The only club to post a higher batting average against Baltimore in '90 was Seattle (.297).

Down to the Wire: Those 3 games in Baltimore in October marked the 5th time since the start of divisional play in '64 that the Orioles' final series has had a direct bearing on the outcome of the AL East race.

The other years: 1974-O's won game #161 at Detroit to clinch the division; 1977-The Red Sox eliminated the O's at Boston in #160, then the O's canceled the Red Sox' championship bid the next day as the Yankees clinched; 1982-The O's tied the Brewers for 1st in #161 (having won the 1st 3 games of the series), then lost to them in #162; 1989-The Jays eliminated the O's in #161, having won the 1st 2 games of that decisive final set.

Lest we forget, back before the ALCS, the O's went to the final series one time, game #161 in 1964, before they were eliminated by the Yankees. The Birds finished 3rd, 2 games back...The White Sox were runners-up, only one game out.

Jays Eliminated: The Jays, who had split the 1st 2 games at Baltimore, entered the final day one game back of the Red Sox...Though the Orioles' victory in that final game would have eliminated the Jays even if the Sox had lost, the race ended in Boston when **Tom Brunansky** made his dramatic catch in Fenway Park's right field corner.

That fact was revealed dramatically to everyone at Memorial Stadium, including the Toronto club, on the Diamond Vision screen without voice narration during the 8th inning of the Orioles-Blue Jays game...An inning later, **Mickey Tettleton** ended the season officially with a game-winning home run off **Tom Henke** in the bottom of the 9th.

9th Inning Agony: Speaking of the 9th inning, the Jays provided the worst horror story of the year for Orioles fans by beating them 4 times in the 9th inning during a stretch of 5 games between the 2 clubs late in the year:

Sep 14 (@Tor)-The O's, who had come from 3 runs back with a 6-run 6th (4 on a **Sam Horn** slam) led 7-5 in the 9th, but the Jays rallied with 3 off **Gregg Olson**. After **Fred McGriff** walked on a controversial ball-4 call by plate umpire **John Shulock** on a 2-out, 3-2 pitch, a 2-run single by pinch-hitter **Rance Mulliniks** tied it and a pinch single by **John Olerud** won it.

Sep 15 (@Tor)-Leading 3-1 in the 9th, the O's lost when **Kelly Gruber** hit a 3-run homer off **Curt Schilling** with nobody out.

Sep 16 (@Tor)-The O's had tied the game at 5 on **David Segui**'s 2-run shot, his 1st big league homer, in the 8th, but **George Bell**'s rubber to right off **Olson** in the bottom of the 9th ended it.

Oct 2 (@Bal)-The O's beat the Jays on Oct 1 to snap the string of 9th inning losses to them at 3 straight, but the next day **Fred McGriff** homered in the top of the 9th with 2 out and none on off **Dave Johnson** to break a 1-1 tie and Toronto went on to win, 2-1.

VS TORONTO (cont)

The Jays, in their last 16 victories over the Orioles, have won 6 of them in their last at bat.

Blue Jays Batting: **Kelly Gruber** drove in 16 runs (tied with **McGwire** for most by an O's opponent), hit 4 homers and batted .54-19 against the O's while enjoying his best big league season...Gruber's career average is .328 (174-57).

Pat Borders (.423, 26-11), Olerud (.367, 30-11, hr-3) and Mookie Wilson (.356, 59-21) also excelled in the season series. Wilson in 2 AL seasons has batted .360 (86-31) vs Baltimore.

Olerud, the former Washington State All-American, had a couple of hits against 2 Orioles who not only achieved that distinction in college but were 1st round draft picks as well. In addition to his game-winning single off **Olson** on Sep 14 (see above), he added a 2-run shot that the Jays ahead in the 8th inning of the season's last game of **McDonald**.. The O's came back to win that one, however (see above under "Jays Eliminated").

After a big year against the O's in '89 (he led opponents in batting and rbi-16), **George Bell** had an uneventful '90 (.275 with 2 hrs & 1 rbi).

Devon White had the lowest average among all Orioles' opponents with at least 25 at bats...The switch-hitting outfielder batted only .103 with California, and is hitting .220 lifetime vs Baltimore (159-35). **Tabler** had an off-year also against the Birds in '90 while with KC, went 1-for-15, but maintains a .329 lifetime average (304-100).

Joe Carter has a .236 career average (259-61) vs Balmer with 12 home runs and 34 rbi in 65 games...However, he's best remembered by the O's not so much for his considerable power, but for a stunning, game-winning "sudden death," rbi bunt base hit in the bottom of the 9th inning in Cleveland on May 28, '89.

Blue Jays Pitching: **Dave Stieb**, who went 1-1 against the O's in '89, finally won a game in Baltimore where he is now 1-5 lifetime. It was the last AL park in which he had never won.

The date was August 1 and the outlook wasn't promising for Stieb, who threw 40 pitches in the 1st inning and gave up 4 runs (of 1st 15 pitches, 13 were balls)...However, he pitched shutout ball from the 2nd thru 6th, then **Jim Acker** and **Tom Henke** held the O's at bay over the last 3 innings...In the meantime, the Jays scored 7 runs off 3 O's pitchers. Baltimore, Stieb has allowed 42 earned runs in 90 innings (era 4.20).

Stieb is 6-10 lifetime overall vs the O's, his lowest victory total vs the club....**Mike Flanagan** was 1-0 in his only start against his former teammates, and is 2-3 lifetime, but 0-2 at Baltimore since leaving here in the middle of '87.

Rookie **Willie Blair** appeared in only 3 games against Baltimore and pitched only 2 innings, but he was 2-0...He was the pitcher of record both Sep 14 and 15 when the Jays won in "sudden death."

Over the last 2 years, **Henke** has held the O's to a .175 average (10-10)...He was 1-1 with 3 saves in '90 and is 5-2 with 10 saves lifetime.

Either **Mike Stottlemyre Jr** (KC) or his brother, **Todd** (Tor), worked in 9 Orioles games from July 27 to Aug 3. They also combined to beat the O's for 10.2 consecutive innings over a 2-day period (July 29-30)...Todd shut out the O's over the last 6 innings on the 29th, and Todd finished the first 4.2 the following evening.

Orioles Batting: **Sam Horn** hit 2 pinch-hit home runs in '90, and 1 of them were off **Duane Ward**, one of them a grand slam (Sep 14). **Ripken** batted .316 (38-12) and **Brother Cal** led the club with 3 home runs and 9 rbi while hitting .288 (52-15).

On Sep 15 at the SkyDome, Bill and Cal hit solo homers off **David Wells** in the 5th inning. It was the 1st time brothers had homered in the same inning in 28 years (since '62) when **Tommy and Hank Aaron** combined. Cal's homer was historic in another way as well, it was #214 at shortstop, setting an AL mark for that position.

In limited exposure, rookies **David Segui** batted .455 (11-5) and hit 1st homer in the majors (Henke—see above under "Sep 16"), and **McKnight** hit .385 (13-5).

Lifetime, the club's top spokesmen against the Jays are **Joe Orsulak** (.355, 62-22) and **Randy Milligan** (.346, 52-18)...The other end of the

spectrum is represented by **Mike Devereaux** who is hitting only .176 lifetime (85-15) against Toronto.

Orioles Pitching: **Jose Mesa**, who came to the O's in the **Flanagan** trade in '87, won both his '90 starts against the team that brought him into the baseball world. He held the Jays to a .204 (49-10) average in those 2 outings...**Gregg Olson** was 1-1 with 4 saves in 7 appearances, though the Jays batted .300 against him (30-9).

Ben McDonald, who picked up his 1st big league victory in relief over Toronto on the last day of the '89 season, is now 2-0, having beaten the Jays' **John Cerutti** on July 31...He almost won another on the final day of the season... Leading 1-0 in the 8th, Ben gave up a 2-run homer to **Olerud**, and left an inning later with the score tied at 2 in favor of **Olson**, who won the season's finale on **Tettleton**'s sudden death homer.

ALL-STAR GAME NOTES

Shortstop **Cal Ripken** and pitcher **Gregg Olson** were the Orioles representatives at the 61st All-Star game played at Chicago's Wrigley Field. Ripken received 1,202,202 votes, nearly 150,000 more than were cast for runner-up **Ozzie Guillen** of Chicago.

In the AL's 2-0 win, Cal, batting 4th, went 0-for-2 and handled 2 chances short before he came out for a pinch-hitter in the 6th inning. Olson did not pitch.

Consecutive All-Star Starts: Ripken started his 7th straight All-Star game, 2 more than any other player in Orioles history (**Brooks Robinson** started 5 straight times, '64-'68). Cal has been the elected starter for 6 of those games, and in one he replaced the electee (**Alan Trammell**) who was injured.

Only one other shortstop in major league history has made more consecutive starts: **Ozzie Smith** who has started the last 8 for the NL. Cal is the only AL player to have been in the AL's opening lineup the last 10 years. He and the late **Joe Cronin** (Red Sox & Senators) share the AL mark for most years starting at short (not necessarily in order) at 7.

Elected Starts: **Brooks** holds the club standard with 10 elected starts, including 5 in a row ('64-'68) when the players selected the starting team. After the balloting was returned to the fans (1970), Brooks was picked 4 more times to the starting club. Cal has been chosen 6 times under the fan selection format.

Eight different Orioles have been elected starters in the 21 years of fan voting. In addition to **Cal** and **Brooks**, Orioles who have been chosen to starting berths are **Boog Powell** and **Frank Robinson** (2 each), and **Bobby Grich**, **Ken Singleton**, **Eddie Murray** and **Terry Kennedy** (once each).

All-Star Appearances: Cal's 7 All-Star selections tie **Eddie Murray** for 2nd in Orioles history behind **Brooks'** 15 (in consecutive years).

Three other shortstops in major league history have been on the All-Star team more often than Cal: **Ozzie Smith** (10, '81-'90), **Luis Aparicio** (AL, '58-'63, '70-'71), and **Pee Wee Reese** (NL-8, '42, '47-'53). **Joe Cronin** (AL) and **Dave Concepcion** (NL) were also selected 7 times (Note: Aparicio actually played in 10 All-Star games over 8 years, 2 each in '59 and '62. There were 2 games played each year from '59 thru '62).

Voting History: Traditionally, the All-Star voting was entrusted to the fans but after the '57 ballot box stuffing incident in Cincinnati, the responsibility for picking the starting team was passed to the players for 12 years ('58 thru '69).

Selection of the starters returned to the public in '70 through the courtesy of the Gillette Company in cooperation with Major League baseball. For the last 5 years ('87 thru '91) USA Today has sponsored the balloting process.

All-Star Game Saves: Orioles relievers have saved 4 of the AL's last 9 victories in the last 37 All-Star games (beginning '58): **Billy O'Dell** ('58-'59), **Milt Pappas** ('62) and **Don Aase** ('86).

Orioles All-Star MVPs: Three Orioles have won mvp honors in all-star competition: **Billy O'Dell** ('58), the former O's lefthander who later pitched for the Giants, Braves and Pirates, hurled the last 3 innings of the only All-Star game ever played in Baltimore. He retired all 9 batters he faced to protect a one-run lead, giving the AL a 4-3 win before a Memorial Stadium crowd of 48,829.

Brooks won the '66 **Arch Ward** Memorial Trophy on the strength of a 3-for-4 including a triple and an 8-for-8 performance afield. He was the first player from a losing team to be so honored.

Frank's 4th inning homer at Detroit in '71 put the AL on top to stay and earned him mvp honors. It was the 1st All-Star victory since '62 for the AL, which did not win again until '83. . . . Now the junior circuit is on a bit of a streak, having won 3 in a row and 5 of the last 8.

Orioles All-Star Homers: Three O's have homered in all-star play: **Brooks** (7/11/67 at Anaheim off **Fergie Jenkins**, none on; **Frank** (7/13/71 at Detroit off **Dock Ellis**, one on) and **Ken Singleton** (8/9/81 at Cleveland off **Tom Seaver**, none on).

ORIOLES POST-SEASON NOTES

ALCS: The Orioles' 18-8 (.692) in ALCS games is an LCS record.

The O's won the first 10 ALCS games they played (including the first 9 ever played) . . . They swept the Twins twice ('69-'70) and A's ('71) in the first 3 ALCS, then won game #1 against Oakland in '73 before losing the 2nd game that year . . . The Orioles are 9-4 at home and on the road.

WORLD SERIES: Baltimore has gone 3-3 in 6 WS, but has a .576 pct. in games (19-14) . . . The Birds are 10-7 at home and 9-7 on the road.

POST-SEASON TOTAL: In 59 post-season games, the O's are 37-22 (.627). They are 19-11 at home and 18-11 away.

ATTENDANCE: In 26 ALCS games, the O's have played to 1,013,997, an average of 39,000. They've played 13 of those at home and have drawn 544,691 (average 41,899).

In 33 WS games attendance has totaled 1,769,179 (average 53,611). At home for 17 WS dates the Birds have pulled 877,518 (average 51,619).

The Orioles 59 total post-season games have attracted 2,783,176 (average 47,172). At Memorial Stadium there have been 30 post-season events which have drawn a total of 1,422,209 (average 47,407).

The 3 biggest crowds to watch the O's in a WS were games 5,4, & 3 (67,064; 66,947 and 65,792) of '83, all at Philadelphia. The largest attendance for a WS game in Baltimore was 54,458 for game #4 (final game) vs. Dodgers in '66.

The biggest house for an Orioles LCS game was 52,787 for game #1 at Baltimore vs. the Angels in '79 (the "Tonight, Let it be Lowenstein" game).

**The O's voted 29 full shares in '83 . . . The Phillies' (losers') share in '83 was \$44,473.31. They, too, voted 29 full shares.

Note: In '90 the World Champion Reds earned \$112,533.70 per share (32 full shares), short of the record set the previous year by the Oakland A's whose winning share was \$114,252.11 (29 shares). The Athletics losing share in '90 was \$68,960.54 (33 full shares), well shy of their record losers share in '88 (\$86,220.89, 34 shares).

THE ORIOLES—PAST AND PRESENT

Major League Baseball returned to the City of Baltimore in 1954 after absence of more than half a century.

The transfer of the St. Louis Browns to Baltimore represented the big inter-city shift of an American League club in 52 seasons. Ironically, it was Baltimore that had been victimized in the last previous move. The O's, a charter franchise in the new league in '01, moved to New York under shabby circumstances for \$18,000 after the 1902 season. There, they were renamed, first the "Highlanders", then later—gasp!—the "Yankees".

Thirty-six seasons have elapsed since the Orioles set up shop at 33rd & Ellerslie. During that time they have finished first 8 times, captured 6 American League pennants and won 3 World Series. They've also been runners up 9 times, and have placed in the 1st division 22 times (all in the last 30 years). During those last 3 decades they have the best won-lost percentage in major league baseball (.555, see p. 18 for more details). The Orioles have enjoyed 26 winning seasons, including, at one stretch, 18 in a row from '83 thru '85.²

The O's maintained the winningest record in the majors from '57 thru '87, a stretch of 31 years, but it was really from '60, when they nearly won their 1st pennant, thru '83, when they captured their last, that they dominated major league baseball.

During that 24 year period, they were 612 games over .500 (2206-1594) and held a 99½ game edge over the majors' 2nd best club of that era, the Yankees.

IN THE BEGINNING

A winning tradition is not peculiar to the modern Orioles, however. It took root in Baltimore a long time ago. There are no fewer than 21 former Orioles players in the Baseball Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, and 15 of them played here before 1954 (see page 109).

The history of professional baseball in Baltimore dates back 118 years to 1872, when the city was represented in the National Association, an important forerunner of today's major leagues.

Baltimore's baseball heritage was richly embellished in the formative years by:

—A left-hander named **Matt Kilroy**, who won 46 games for the American Association O's in 1887;

—Three straight National League pennant winners ('94, '95, '96), a team that would ultimately produce 6 Hall of Famers³;

—The manager of that championship team, an innovative man named **Ned Hanlon**, who with the help of his talented athletes did much to shape the future of baseball strategy⁴;

—Legendary all-time greats **Babe Ruth**, **Lefty Grove**, and **John McGraw** to name a few;

—**Jack Dunn**, whose name has long been synonymous with baseball in Baltimore. An infielder and pitcher with the city's original A.L. franchise, Dunn subsequently owned and managed the International League Orioles for 22 eventful seasons from 1907 thru 1928.

Among his many achievements: signing **Ruth** to his first professional contract, and winning 7 straight pennants from 1919 thru 1925⁵. It was the Dunn family that kept professional baseball alive and well in Baltimore during most of those 51 years between big league franchises⁶.

—And, by a crowd of 52,833 that attended a Little World Series game at Municipal Stadium (on the same site as Memorial Stadium) between the Orioles and Louisville Colonels on Oct. 9, 1944. That same afternoon in St. Louis, the Cardinals and Browns played the decisive 6th game of the World Series before a crowd that was 20,203 smaller at Sportsman's Park (at 32,630).⁷

RETURN TO THE MAJORS

Officially the American League returned to Baltimore on Sep. 29, 1953. That was the day American League owners, meeting in New York, unanimously approved the purchase of a controlling interest in the St. Louis Browns from previous owner **Bill Veeck** by a group of Baltimore negotiators, led by Mayor **Tommy D'Alesandro Jr.** ("Old Tommy") and attorney **Clarence Miles**, who became the club's first president. The purchase price was \$2,475,000.

Unfortunately, only the name on the uniforms had changed. In 1954, the Orioles were merely the Browns transplanted. They were essentially the same team that had finished in the 2nd division for so many years in St. Louis (see "St. Louis Browns" below).⁸

The Birds, under the likable veteran manager **Jimmy Dykes**⁹, lost 100 games that season while winning only 54. But, as poor as that record was, it wasn't bad enough to finish last. Happily, that dubious honor belonged to the Philadelphia A's with a record of 51-103.

The Orioles' escape from the basement that year allowed them to maintain a notable distinction for 32 years. They had never finished last until the string finally ran out in 1986.

THE START OF SOMETHING BIG

The Orioles took the first big step in the right direction on Sep. 14, 1954 when they hired White Sox Manager **Paul Richards** to come aboard as both manager and general manager, succeeding **Dykes** and **Arthur Ehlers**¹⁰. **Richards**, a native of Waxahachie, Texas, and a catcher for the World Champion Detroit Tigers in '45, was a highly regarded strategist and a fine handler of pitchers. In Baltimore, he also became an aggressive administrator.

Not long after he arrived, **Richards** engineered a 17-player deal with the Yankees, probably the biggest in baseball history (see page 134 for details). The O's gave up **Bob Turley**, **Don Larsen**, shortstop **Bill Hunter** and 5 others. Among the 9 who came to Baltimore were two who proved to be very special: **Gus Triandos**, the Orioles' first legitimate long ball threat, and a slick fielding, crowd-pleasing shortstop named **Willy Miranda**. Those two helped keep the fans happy during those early years while the club struggled toward legitimacy.

In '55, **Richards** kept the revolving door well greased. A total of 54 players wore the black and orange that year, including 23 pitchers. While "Tall Paul" was wheeling and dealing at all levels, his farm department (**Jim McLaughlin** and **Harry Dalton**) was also pursuing young amateur talent at a relentless pace all over the country.

Among those prospects was a kid from Little Rock, named **Brooks Robinson**, who would develop into the best fielding 3rd baseman of all-time, and would spend 23 seasons in an Orioles uniform before moving up to the Hall of Fame in Cooperstown.

Gradually, the Orioles began to improve. In 1957, **Richards'** 3rd season in Baltimore, the Birds finished at .500 (76-76) for the first time. In 1960, with a club comprising 10 regulars in their 20's, 7 of them rookies, the Birds nearly won their first pennant.¹¹

Richards was particularly adept at reconstructing the careers of fading veterans¹² and developing young pitchers. During his reign, the Orioles became famous for the "Kiddie Korps", a passel of hard-throwing youngsters who pitched in Baltimore from the mid-50s to the early 60s.¹³

THE NEXT STEP UP

In the fall of '58, the Orioles hired the Yankees' highly respected farm director **Lee MacPhail** as general manager, replacing **Richards**¹⁴ who nevertheless remained as field manager (until Sep. '61). **MacPhail** improved the fiscal and administrative efficiency of the operation and increased the productivity of the club's minor league system . . . He also made some brilliant deals.¹⁵

After the near miss of '60, the Orioles set a club record with 95 wins in '61 while **Diamond Jim Gentile**, acquired the year before from the Dodgers, gave Orioles fans an unprecedented show of power and production (46 home runs, including a major league record-tying 5 grand slams, and 141 rbi).¹⁶

In '64, another near miss under the direction of "Manager of the Year" **Hank Bauer** who replaced **Billy Hitchcock** that season. The Birds finished 3rd, but only 2 games back of the pennant-winning Yankees and produced their first American League MVP—**Brooks Robinson**.

MacPhail left the Orioles after the '65 season to join Baseball Commissioner **William D. "Spike" Eckert** as his principal advisor; but not before negotiating what was arguably the most important trade in the ballclub's history. It was the deal that brought National League superstar **Frank Robinson** from Cincinnati in exchange for the best pitcher the Orioles had ever had to that point, **Milt Pappas**.¹⁷

THE LAND OF PLEASANT LIVING

Just before **MacPhail** departed, **Jerry Hoffberger** and his family acquired a controlling interest in the franchise. The Hoffbergers owned the Baltimore-based National Brewing Company, and their highly successful advertising theme for many years was based on the concept that the Chesapeake Bay area was "The Land of Pleasant Living."

That was surely true for the Orioles who went on to enjoy a golden age of on-the-field prosperity. Over the next 6 seasons, the Orioles would win 100 pennants and in a period of 9 years would finish first six times.¹⁹

Hoffberger brought **Frank Cashen** from the brewery to serve as executive vice president, and promoted the club's talented farm director, **Harry Dalton**, to run the baseball program.

In '66, the Orioles not only won their first pennant, under **Hank Bauer**, they shocked the baseball world by sweeping the heavily favored Dodgers in four straight. **Frank Robinson**, in his first A.L. season, won the Triple Crown (.316, 49 hr, 122 rbi), and was MVP of both the American League and the World Series.

It had taken a player of **Frank's** stature to put the O's over the top, but the club was already blessed with considerable talent; players like **Brooks Robinson** and **Luis Aparicio** who would later join **Frank** in the Hall of Fame, long ball hitting 1st baseman **Boog Powell**, rookie 2nd baseman **Dave Johnson**, perennial gold glove centerfielder **Paul Blair**, and a couple of pitchers named **Jim Palmer** and **Dave McNally**, still the top 2 winners in Orioles history. All but **Frank** and **Aparicio** were products of the O's fertile farm system.

The O's slumped badly in '67²⁰ and were going nowhere in '68 at the All Star break when **Dalton** replaced **Bauer** with his longtime associate, **Earl Weaver**. The feisty 5'8" St. Louisan had enjoyed a remarkable career as a manager in the O's farm system. Over the next 14½ years he would experience even greater success at the major league level.

Having added the ultimate leadoff man (**Don Buford**), and a talented left-handed pitcher (**Mike Cuellar**), and having replaced one gold glover to another at shortstop (**Mark Belanger** for **Aparicio**), the O's, with **Dalton** at the controls of the baseball operation, would reign over the American League for the next 3 years.

In '69, '70 & '71, they became only the 3rd club in history to win 100 or more games for three straight years.²¹ They won the division title by 19, 15, and 12 games, and swept the first 3 American League Championship Series, 3 games to none²², over the Twins twice and A's once.

Following a humiliating loss to the New York Mets in the '69 World Series, the O's bounced back in '70 and took the Cincinnati Reds in a 5 game series that was thoroughly dominated by the brilliance of **Brooks Robinson**.

In '70, the O's had three 20-game winners (**McNally**, **Palmer** & **Mike Cuellar**); the next year they had 4 (add **Pat Dobson**), a feat that had occurred only once before in major league history²³.

THAT OLD GANG OF MINE

After the Orioles lost a heartbreaking 7-game World Series to the Pirates in '71, **Dalton** left the ballclub to run the California Angels, and Executive VP **Cashen** added player personnel decisions to his job description.

After their 4 pennants in 6 seasons, the O's began to perform some major surgery. **Frank Robinson** was traded and, a year later, so were **Dave Johnson**, **Buford** and others.

The '72 season was grim but with youngsters like **Bobby Grich**, **Don Baylor**, **Al Bumbry** and **Richie Coggins** joining forces with **Boog**, **Blair**, **Brooks**, and all those talented starters²⁴, the O's regained the division championship in '73, and defied the odds to win it again in '74.

On Aug. 28, '74, the O's were in 4th place, 8 games behind the first-place Red Sox. When the smoke had cleared 5 weeks later, the O's, who had gone 28-6 during that stretch, were on top of the heap, a shade ahead of the 2nd place Yankees, and a full 8 games up on the 3rd place Bosox.

THE PETERS PRINCIPLE

Cashen, who had acquired **Ken Singleton**, **Mike Torrez** and **Lee May** in a couple of glittering trades the previous winter, returned to the beer business after the '75 season.²⁵ He was replaced by the widely respected & highly capable career baseball executive, **Hank Peters**, who had most recently served as president of the National Association (the minor leagues).

Not long after his arrival, **Peters** shook up the Orioles, trading for the flamboyant long-ball hitting **Reggie Jackson**.²⁶ But of more long term significance was the 10-player deal he constructed with the Yankees in June '76. Three of the 5 players acquired in that transition contributed greatly to the Orioles many successes over the next decade: **Rick Dempsey**, **Tippy Martinez** and **Scott McGregor**.²⁷

The Orioles remained competitive well into the 80s despite serious losses from the new free agent re-entry system adopted in '76.²⁸ **Peters'** Yankee deal, plus a fine farm system harvest in the early 70s which produced **Eddie Murray**, **Mike Flanagan** and **Rich Dauer** among others, helped the cause immeasurably (from '76 thru '83, the O's won 2 golds and 5 silvers in 8 years).

THE BALTIMORE-WASHINGTON CONNECTION

In '79, right after the O's had lost a second 7-game World Series to the Pirates, the internationally renowned Washington attorney, **Edward Bennett Williams**, completed the purchase of the ballclub in its entirety.

Williams brought with him a new regional marketing concept designed to expand the Orioles appeal over a wider geographic area. The plan was to add metropolitan Washington and states to the south to a drawing area that had been basically limited to Maryland and parts of Pennsylvania and Delaware.

The program has met with popular acceptance by baseball fans all over "Birdland." Despite the Orioles' below-average performance on the field in 4 of the past 5 seasons, attendance at Memorial Stadium has averaged over 2 million per year in that period.

In the first four years of the **Williams-Peters** administration, the O's nearly captured 3 pennants though they had to settle for one. They won 100 games in '80 and finished 2nd, 3 games back of the Yankees; played the Brewers for the division championship on the final day of the '82 season and lost; then won it all in '83.

There were some remarkable achievements during that period. In '80, for example, there was a 5-game series against the Yankees in Baltimore that drew 249,605, the largest turnout in history for a single series.

Then, there was '82 when the O's went 33-10 (starting Aug. 10) down the stretch to tie the Brewers on the next-to-last day of the season by beating them in 3 straight pressure-packed games at Memorial Stadium. On the climactic day, however, the Brewers won big, to clinch their first division championship.

Yet, despite that crushing defeat, most of the crowd of over 51,000 remained in their seats for a full 45 minutes afterward. They stayed to applaud the players for their down-to-the-wire effort and to say goodbye to the manager, **Earl Weaver**, whose retirement had officially begun at game's end.

The emotion expressed so warmly and spontaneously by those loyal Orioles fans made it difficult to tell, in the dusk of that autumn afternoon, who had won the game and who had lost.

It was in '82 also that the son of the Orioles 3rd base coach, **Cal Ripken Jr.**, took his place in the Orioles starting lineup, a position he has not relinquished since—even for one game, and joined with **Eddie Murray**, the Orioles all-time home run champion, to form an awesome 1-2 punch.

THE LAST HURRAH—FOR AWHILE

Joe Altobelli, an old Orioles organization veteran who'd been on a 6-year sabbatical, replaced **Earl Weaver** in '83, and right off the bat led the club to that elusive 3rd world championship.

They won their division by 6 games, then defeated the White Sox at Comiskey Park in a decisive Game #4 of the ALCS, breaking a scoreless tie on a dramatic 10th inning home run by the newest Oriole, **Tito Landrum**.²⁹

The Orioles, who had never lost the first game of a post-season event, dropped both of them in '83³⁰, and each time a gritty complete game effort by **Mike Boddicker** in game #2 restored the balance.

After splitting the first 2 World Series games in Baltimore, the action shifted 90 miles north to Veterans Stadium where the Phillies boasted the best home record in the National League . . . But, the Orioles swept the 3 Philadelphia games, then cruised happily home down I-95 with their 3rd world title in hand.

ORIOLES HISTORY (Cont.)

In the 5th and final game, **Rick Dempsey** homered and doubled to clinch the World Series "mvp" award, and **Eddie Murray** hit 2 electing home runs while **Scott McGregor** was blanking the Phillies on 5 hits.

The 1983 champions boasted 2 dominating players in **Murray** and **Ripken**, and excellent pitching. But, most observers credited the club many "role" players with making the difference, for getting the most out of their abilities while submerging their own egos in the interest of winning.⁷

RECONSTRUCTION

After that world championship, the Orioles' success on the field went into decline. The '84 and '85 seasons were modest, though winning ones, but from '86 thru '88 their record was the worst in the American League (.291, .400), and 2nd in the majors to the Atlanta Braves (186-295, .387). This unaccustomed series of setbacks bottomed out in '88 when the Orioles went 0-21 at the start of the season, and ultimately lost a club record 17 games.

By then, however, the Orioles' reconstruction plan had already begun earnest. **Edward Bennett Williams** had signaled the start of the massive rebuilding project with a series of personnel decisions during the fall of '87. He replaced **Hank Peters** and Farm Director **Tom Giordano** with **Roland Hemond** and **Doug Melvin**, and brought **Frank Robinson** into the policy-making process. The following May he appointed as president **Larry Lucchino**, a long-time associate who had been a club vice president as well as the general counsel during most of **Williams'** tenure as club owner.

At the same time, **Williams** renewed his commitment to restore the club to its customary level of competitiveness by redeveloping the farm system, and returning to fundamentals. When he passed away in August '88, the pieces were in place for an orderly takeover by **Eli Jacobs'** new ownership group which is equally dedicated to a bright Orioles future.

The Orioles' success in '89, going down to the final weekend before conceding the division championship to Toronto, was as surprising as it was exciting. No one in the organization expected that kind of dramatic improvement so quickly, just as no one thought that the reconstruction project was nearing completion.

There is still much work to be done, and there is never a guarantee of success in baseball. However, the club's commitment to fundamentals and to a strong farm system, and the acquisition of key players to fill in the gaps, provides encouragement that Orioles will soon again take their place among the consistent contenders.

EPILOGUE

Despite the club's problems through much of the late eighties, the Orioles still bear two very proud distinctions:

They have been the winningest team in baseball since the start of divisional play in '69, and they have also compiled the game's best won-loss record over the last 31 years.*

FOOTNOTES

1—John McGraw, who had earlier starred for the N.L. Orioles in the 90s, was manager and part-owner of the A.L. O's until July of '02, when he departed abruptly for New York to manage the N.L. Giants. His right-hand man and business partner, Wilbert Robinson, took over the reigns for the balance of the season.

McGraw was an obvious villain in this piece. Not only did he sell his stock in the club to the owners of the Giants, but he took several Orioles with him to New York (in mid-season, yet).

2—The Yankees are the only club that has ever produced a longer string of consecutive winning seasons—39, from '26 thru '64.

3—John McGraw, Wilbert Robinson, Hughie Jennings, Willie Keeler, Dan Brouthers and Joe Kelley are all in the Hall of Fame. Those 3 straight pennant winners batted, as a team, .343, .327 and .328.

4—The Orioles of the 1890s are credited with inventing the "squeeze play", and the "Baltimore chop"; and for developing the "hit and run" to a science. They reportedly were the first to slope the base lines so that bunted balls would not roll foul. It is also said that they helped establish the custom of taking spring training in a warm climate.

They were also known, as well, for their team play, place-hitting and aggressive base running. They had a reputation for playing despite injuries and their "never say die" attitude on the field. The expression "Old Oriole" is still widely used to describe a player with those qualities.

5—Hall of Famer Lefty Grove played for the O's during that period, as did many other future big leaguers. In the final year of that remarkable stretch, the Birds had a trio of pitchers—Tommy Thomas, George Earnshaw and Jack Ogden—who won, respectively, 32, 29 and 28 games.

6—His grandson, Jack Dunn III, carried on the family baseball tradition as a minor league player, manager, and club owner, and then for 34 years as an executive for the major league Orioles before his untimely death in June 1987 at the age of 65.

7—Old Oriole Park, at 29th St. and Greenmount Ave., had been the Orioles' home for many years, but it burned down on July 4th eve in '44. Municipal Stadium, heretofore a football-only facility, was rapidly converted for baseball, and it was there that the International League Orioles won what would be their last minor league pennant that very same year ('44). It remained the home of the Orioles until major league baseball returned to the city 10 years later, and the new ballpark was completed on the Municipal Stadium site.

8—Third Baseman Vern Stephens was the Orioles home run leader that year. He hit 8 and the whole team together produced only 52 all season (19 of them in what was then a cavernous Memorial Stadium).

The brightest prospect was hard-throwing "Bullet Bob" Turley who went 14-15 under difficult circumstances and led the league in strikeouts. World Series hero-to-be Don Larsen was also on that team. He was 3-21.

9—Dykes and GM Arthur Ehlers both came from the Philadelphia A's, for whom Dykes had managed the previous 3 years after succeeding Connie Mack in that capacity ('51). Mr. Ehlers remained with the club as a scouting supervisor and was instrumental in signing Brooks Robinson.

10—Richards came to Baltimore immediately and replaced Ehlers, who remained with the club in a significant scouting capacity. Dykes, however, finished the season as field manager.

11—The O's were in a virtual tie for 1st with the Yankees on Sep. 15, '60, the day before a crucial 4-game series began in New York. The Yankees swept that series, thus ending the Orioles dream.

12—Invariably, Richards was able to coax impressive efforts from seemingly washed up hurlers. He taught most of them his pet weapon—the "slip pitch", an off-speed delivery with a sinking action. Among those past-prime vets who profited from Paul's instruction were Bill Wight, Hal Brown, Connie Johnson, Ray Moore, Jim Wilson and Arnie Portocarrero.

13—The "Kiddie Korps" names included Billy O'Dell, Milt Pappas, Jerry Walker, Wes Stock, Jack Fisher, Chuck Estrada and Steve Barber. Barber, incidentally, was the first of 24 Orioles 20-game winners ('63).

14—Richards left to become general manager of the newly created Houston franchise. His right-hand man and 3rd base coach, Luman Harris, finished out the season, then Billy Hitchcock was appointed to the job in '62. Two years later the old Yankee, Hank Bauer, took over.

15—Among the 17 former O's players in the Orioles Hall of Fame, 8 came from outside the organization, and 5 were acquired by MacPhail: Jim Gentile, Stu Miller, Luis Aparicio, Dick Hall and Frank Robinson.

16—Gentile shared the major league record with the Cubs' Ernie Banks until the Yankees' Don Mattingly hit 6 grand slams in '87.

17—The O's also sent the Reds outfielder Dick Simpson and reliever Jack Baldschun, both of whom had been acquired during the off-season and had never played a game for the Orioles.

18—Clarence Miles and Clyde Morris were the original authority figures of ownership when the club returned to Baltimore. Later, other local leaders—James Keely, Joseph A.W. Iglehart and Zany Krieger ran the boardroom at various times until Hoffberger took over late in '65.

19—They won pennants in '66, '69, '70 & '71 and division titles in '73 & '74 (before losing to the Oakland A's both times in the ALCS).

20—The O's tied for 6th with the pesky Nats from Washington in '67 (in a 10-team league).

21—The O's won 109-108-101 games in those 3 seasons, matching the Philadelphia A's ('29-'30-'31) and St. Louis Cardinals ('42-'43-'44).

22—The O's were 10-0 in ALCS clashes until losing game 2 in the '73 playoffs vs. Oakland.

23—The White Sox had four 20-game winners in '20, but didn't win the pennant: Red Faber, Dickie Kerr, Ed Cicotte and Claude Williams.

24—Among them, Palmer, McNally and Cuellar combined for 16 twenty-win seasons for the O's: Palmer 8, McNally 4 and Cuellar 4 each.

25—But he didn't stay long. Bitten by the baseball bug during his tenure with the O's, Frank joined the commissioner's office as administrator to Bowie Kuhn in '79, then hooked up with the Mets as executive vice president/general manager in '80.

26—The O's sent Don Baylor and pitchers Mike Torrez and Paul Mitchell to the A's for Jackson and a pair of hurlers, Ken Holtzman and Bill Van Bommel.

27—Rudy May and Dave Pagan also came to the O's. The Birds gave up Ken Holtzman, Doyle Alexander, Grant Jackson and Ellie Hendricks.

28—The O's lost Wayne Garland, Bobby Grich, Reggie Jackson and Royle Stillman, all to re-entry after the '76 season alone; then Dick Drago, Ross Grimsley and Elliott Maddox left thru the same window the next year.

29—Landrum had joined the club on Aug. 31 as the player-to-be-named later in the deal that sent Floyd Rayford to the Cardinals June 13. The O's scored 2 more runs in that inning and won, 3-0. Tippy Martinez was the winner and Britt Burns took the loss.

30—In 11 previous post-season events (6 ALCS & 5 WS), the O's had won the opening game each time. In '83 they dropped both openers.

31—The best example of success in role playing was in left field, where 3 players (John Lowenstein, Gary Roenick and Benny Ayala) combined to hit .292 with 35 homers and 131 rbi (only while playing left field).

THE ST. LOUIS BROWNS

The St. Louis Browns, the franchise from which the current Orioles descend, originated in Milwaukee in '01, the American League's first season. Before the '02 season began, the franchise had moved to St. Louis. It was after that same campaign that the original A.L. Orioles went to New York.¹

The Browns, who took the name that originated with St. Louis teams in the late 1800s,² played 52 seasons ('02-'53) in St. Louis and were probably the most consistently bad club in major league history. They were 3,416-4,465, .433³ (that's more than 1,000 games under .500); wound up in the 2nd division (5th thru 8th) 40 times; won just one pennant ('44, a war year), and finished 2nd only twice ('02 & '22).

George Sisler, one of 12 Hall of Famers who played and/or managed for the Browns⁴, was almost certainly the club's all-time best (and most significant) player. He would do credit to any franchise. In 13 seasons with the Browns ('15 thru '27), he twice hit over .400 ('20-.407, '22-.420) and had a career average of .340.

ST. LOUIS BROWNS (Cont)

Another outstanding contributor was outfielder **Ken Williams**. He is in the Hall of Fame, but he hit over .300 nine times in 10 St. Louis seasons and in '22 batted .332 with 34 doubles, 39 homers and 155 rbi. He was the home run champion that year with 4 more than **Babe Ruth**, and was the first ever to join the so-called "30-30" club—30 or more steals and 30 or more homers in the same year.

As you can see, '22 was a big year for both **Sisler** and **Williams** and the Browns set a club record for wins-93 (it was the only time in the history of the franchise that they reached the 90 victory level). They finished 2nd, one game back of the Yankees.

Despite the heroics of **Sisler** and **Williams**, however, when fans recall the Browns, they probably think first of a couple of guys named **Gray** and **Gaedel**.

Pete Gray, who had only one arm (his left), appeared in 77 games for the Browns in '45 (the last wartime season) at the age of 28. He batted .213 (245) with no homers and 13 rbi, and never returned to the big time.⁵

The appearance of **Eddie Gaedel**, at 3'7" and 65 pounds, was a product of club owner **Bill Veeck's** creative genius . . . The 26-year old signed in '51 as a pinch hitter and, in his only plate appearance, he did what he was paid for, he drew a walk.

As a surprise pinch hitter for leadoff batter **Frank Saucier** in the home half of the 1st inning, little **Eddie** was walked on 4 pitches by Detroit pitcher **Bob Cain**, then was promptly replaced by pinch runner **Jim Delsing**.

The '44 A.L. pennant winners went 89-65 to finish one game ahead of the Tigers. They lost the World Series in 6 games to their hometown rivals, the Cardinals, in one of 3 World Series, played entirely in one stadium? (Sportsman's Park was the regular season home of both clubs). The Browns won games #1 and #3 behind **Denny Galehouse** and **Jack Kramer** respectively. The Browns' only home run in the series was hit by 1st baseman **George McQuinn**.

In June '51, **Bill DeWitt**, who had been with the Browns since '16 (when **Branch Rickey** was gm), and his brother, **Charles**, sold their controlling interest to **Bill Veeck**. He operated the club for the next 2 1/2 seasons. Twice in '53, **Veeck** attempted to bring the franchise to Baltimore himself, but could not get the necessary approval from American League owners . . . Subsequently (Sep. 29, '53), he sold his holdings to a group of Baltimore business men and the transfer was approved unanimously.

The Browns are gone from St. Louis, but not forgotten. The St. Louis Browns Fan Club, organized by Maryville College Professor **Bill Borst** in 1984, is alive and well. The members have even established a club hall of fame on the campus at Maryville (in St. Louis).

ST LOUIS BROWNS HALL OF FAME

The Browns Fan Club created a St. Louis Browns Hall of Fame at the Maryville College Library in 1985, and since then has elected the following 22 members (Baseball Hall of Famers in **boldface**):

BOBBY YOUNG THE FIRST

The late Bobby Young, native of Granite, MD near BWI Airport, was the 1st to bat in a regular season game for the modern A.L. Orioles. He grounded out leading off the 1st inning at Detroit on Apr 13, '54.

MEMORIAL STADIUM—A BRIEF HISTORY

(1954-1991)

Construction of Baltimore Memorial Stadium began on the site of old Municipal Stadium in 1949. A single deck concrete grandstand with no roof was completed in '50 with 20,000 chair seats¹, and home plate was moved from its original location (in what is now left field) to its present position. The stadium's external trappings were left unchanged. It was not yet a major league ballpark.

However, it was that facility which was officially dedicated and re-named "Memorial Stadium" when Mayor **Tommy D'Alesandro Jr.** ("Old Tommy") threw out the first ball for the International League Orioles '50 opener (Apr. 20).²

Soon after that dedication, plans to improve the stadium further, to satisfy major league requirements, were suspended when a second bond issue was defeated.

Finally in '53, bond loans were approved, and work began anew. Despite the construction, the I.L. Orioles continued to play there thru '53, as did the Baltimore Colts when they emigrated from Dallas (Texans) that same year.

Essentially the new stadium, seating capacity approximately 47,700, was completed in October '53, but refinements continued thru the spring of '54, the modern American League Orioles' first season in Baltimore. The cost of the project, built on 28 3/4 acres of city-owned property (and financed by 2 bond issues), was \$6 million.

Original Municipal Stadium

The original Municipal Stadium, completed in '24, was built expressly for football. However, when old Oriole Park (NW corner of Greenmount Ave. & 29th St. intersection), owned by the Dunn family, burned down on the night and early morning of July 3-4, '44, Municipal Stadium became, of necessity, the new home of the Orioles.

During a hastily scheduled 2-week road trip, the stadium was made ready for baseball. Later that year, the Orioles went on to win the International League pennant, then captured the Little World Series. One of those games, against the Louisville Colonels (American Association), drew an astonishing 52,833 which remained a Baltimore baseball attendance record until the '66 World Series.³

Changing Dimensions

Thru the years, the playing field has undergone significant dimensional changes. Inside the cavernous ballpark that greeted Orioles fans on opening day '54, home plate to dead center field measured 450'.⁴

Since then the outfield boundaries have been altered 4 times ('56, '59, '62 & '76), gradually reducing the distance to straightaway center 45' to 405', and the power alleys accordingly.⁵

Stadium Improvements

Originally the Orioles' dugout was on the first base side, and there was an 8' wall separating the front row of the boxes from the field. Baltimore led the world in foul territory.

That situation was rectified in '61 with the construction of field box seats (2,600 of them), which necessitated building new dugouts. It was then that the home team moved to the 3rd base side. The bullpens, originally in the left and right field corners (in plain view), were moved behind the fences.

In '64, 4 additional upper deck sections were added, increasing the capacity by another 2,600. In '70 (mid-season), a new scoreboard (now known as the old scoreboard) was installed and the original, squirrel-infested structure demolished.

Subsequently, the splintery wooden⁶ benches (without backs) that covered the entire second deck were replaced by chairs and metal benches with back rests, and a 35th row was added.

In '80, 6 new towers, housing a new ticket window and additional ticket office space, storage areas and rest rooms, were completed.

In '85, new, badly needed Orioles administrative offices were constructed, and a large new state-of-the-art video board (Diamond Vision by Mitsubishi) was added in right-center field as a dramatic and colorful complement to its 15-year-old cousin in left center.

MEMORIAL STADIUM (Cont)

1—The original structure had nothing but bench-type seats.
 2—The present facade and marquis over the main entrance were not erected until '53. A 2nd effort on Memorial Day '55 during a doubleheader vs. Boston.
 3—The 6th game of the '44 World Series (Browns vs. Cardinals) played that same day drew only 31,630... See "St. Louis Browns" below.
 4—Left and right-center were 447' from home plate... There was no "temporary" fence during the first 2 years, just the permanent walls plus a hedge (protected by a wire fence) that filled in the open end of the horseshoe.

In '55, O's centerfielder Chuck Diering immortalized himself by hauling in a Mickey Mantle base hit with his back to the plate just before crashing into the hedge in deepest center field.
 5—In '54 only 42 home runs were hit in 77 games at the stadium (a mere 19 by the O's), roughly one every 2 games... During the O's 1st 7 seasons here (thru '60), the Baltimore ballpark ranked last in the majors in home runs each year.

By 1988, the contraction of the outfield distances and greater emphasis on the long ball had resulted in a 5-fold increase in home run production at Memorial Stadium (235 in 82 games in '88).

NEW DOWNTOWN BALLPARK TO OPEN IN '92

Excavation for the new baseball-only downtown Baltimore ballpark began January 1990 on an 85 acre site known as Camden Yards, a few blocks west of the Inner Harbor. The 46,500 seat facility is targeted for completion in time for opening day 1992.

Designed by Helmut Obata & Kassabaum (HOK) of Kansas City with considerable input from the Orioles and the owner of the facility, the Maryland Stadium Authority (MSA), the new ballpark will be state-of-the-art in its functions yet unique, old fashioned and intimate in its architectural design, blending into the urban context of downtown Baltimore.

It will take its image from baseball parks built in the early 20th century, featuring steel (not concrete) trusses, an arched brick facade, a sun roof over the gentle slope of the upper deck, and an asymmetrical playing field. The cost of the facility is projected at \$105.4 million.

Location/Access

The ballpark will be bounded by Russell (west), Camden (north), and Howard (east) streets, and by Martin Luther King Boulevard (south).

It will be easily accessible to I-95, I-395 and the Baltimore-Washington Parkway which in turn lead directly to all major roadways in the Baltimore area.

Virtually all city bus lines provide service to Camden Yards which will also be a stop on the new light rail system. Commuter trains to and from Washington and Frederick operate from the MARC Station located on the site, and the Baltimore subway is only a few blocks from Camden Yards.

Parking

Access to nearby parking will be far greater than it is currently around Memorial Stadium. On the new site there will be approximately 5,000 non bumper-to-bumper parking spaces, to the south of the ballpark. An additional 20,000 spaces will also be available in downtown public parking lots within easy walking distance.

Playing Field

As indicated above, the outfield dimensions will not be symmetrical... From home plate to the rightfield foul pole will be 319', while in left the distance along the line will be 335'... The field will be 16' below street level.

A 25' high wall extending 100' from the rightfield corner into right center will accommodate a scoreboard featuring game in progress information and, a throwback to the good old days, out-of-town scores permanently posted. In leftfield there will be a 7' wall with seats above. For the sake of comparison, the permanent walls at Memorial Stadium in both right and left field are 14' high while the temporary fences measure 7' from top to bottom.

To straightaway center the distance will be 400', but the deepest part of the playing field, in left-center, will be 410' from home plate. In addition to the rightfield scoreboard mentioned above, a video board will be positioned high behind the centerfield stands.

Both bullpens will be located beyond the fences in left-centerfield, but raised 3' above field level so that fans can identify the pitchers as they warm up.

A sophisticated new state-of-the-art drainage system will be installed beneath the natural grass playing field, a feature that should prevent some rain outs, reduce the frequency and shorten the length of rain delays, and substantially improve the footing in both the infield and outfield... The turf, incidentally, is already being custom grown on the Eastern Shore of Maryland according to longtime Orioles' Groundskeeper Pat Santarone's specifications.

Seating

The 46,500 seats with no obstructions will include some 2,000 modestly priced bleacher seats. An estimated 72 private box suites, and approximately 5,000 "club" seats will be offered to subscribers on a long term basis.

There will be three levels of seating: (1) Lower Deck; (2) Mezzanine, where club seats and private boxes with patios will be located, and

NEW DOWNTOWN BALLPARK (Cont)

(3) Upper Deck....Nearly 500 seats, located on all levels and in all price categories, will be set aside for use by the handicapped. An effort has been made to locate the stands as close to the field as possible to create a feeling of intimacy.

The height of the upper deck will be low, relative to other stadiums, and the slope will be more gradual than at Memorial Stadium (31 degrees compared to 33 degrees on 33rd Street).

Leg room will be considerably more generous at Camden Yards than at Memorial Stadium...Tread width will be 32 to 33 inches throughout the ballpark. In the Orioles present home, that width is as narrow as 28 inches in the mezzanine, and 26 inches in many other areas.

Seats will be generally wider as well, from 19 to 21 inches, compared with 16 to 19 inches at Memorial Stadium. The new chairs will be made of durable, modern plastic materials, but will have slats in the back like older ballpark seats, to permit air flow. Chairs at the end of every row will be fitted with arm rests and cast within the iron support of each will be a replica of the Orioles' 1892 logo.

Fans will move up and down thru the ballpark via ramps, escalators and stairs. Elevators will also be distributed around the facility for use by disabled fans. Restrooms will be vastly expanded and improved.

The Warehouse

The landmark B & O Railroad warehouse, 1016' long and 51' wide, will be preserved as will the historic Camden Station (beyond centerfield at Howard & Camden Sts.). The warehouse will provide office space for the Orioles and the Maryland Stadium Authority, and much more. Special rooms for pre-game group entertainment and a public cafeteria for those who want to eat dinner before the game are in the plans. So are an extension of the Babe Ruth Birthplace/Baseball Center, just a few blocks away on Emory Street, and a home for the Maryland Sports Hall of Fame.

The warehouse, behind right field, runs roughly parallel to the 3rd baseline. It will be separated from the baseball facility by a 60' corridor, and will be within home run range of the most powerful hitters. A 460' blast down the rightfield line would hit the warehouse.

Concessionaire

ARA-Martins, the concessionaire at Memorial Stadium for the past 8 years (including '91), will also operate the concessions at the new ballpark. The ARA people have been part of the design process since the very beginning of the project, and are planning larger, more modern stands, spread evenly thru the ballpark. These state-of-the-art facilities will enable them to offer quicker, and more efficient service as well as a vastly expanded food and beverage menu.

Project Background

In April '87 the Maryland State Legislature authorized the Maryland Stadium Authority, under the direction of Chairman Herbert J. Belgrad, to proceed with planning a major professional sports complex, comprising two separate stadiums on the Camden Yards site.

Construction of the baseball park was contingent upon the Orioles signing a long term lease. The football stadium would be built, within the 85 acre site, only if the National Football League awards Baltimore a franchise to replace the departed Colts.

On May 2, 1988, the Orioles committed to that long term lease (15 years). In a dramatic pre-game announcement at Memorial Stadium that evening on "Fantastic Fans" Night, **Maryland Governor William Donald Schaefer** told a crowd in excess of 50,000 that the Orioles and the MSA had reached agreement that day that would bind the Orioles to Baltimore, at the very least, until 2006.

Among the fans there that night was a man who had made that agreement and the new ballpark possible. His name was **Edward Bennett Williams**. It would be the last time he would see his ballclub play.

The MSA began acquiring the property in the Camden Yards area soon after that, and in June '89 initiated the asbestos removal and demolition processes to clear the site for excavation and construction.

Camden Yards, A Brief History

The B & O Railroad, intent on reclaiming the trade that had made Baltimore the 2nd largest city in the country during the early 1820s, began in 1828 to build a rail line that would eventually extend to the Ohio Valley. It was a project they hoped would nullify the economic losses suffered by this area, as the result of competition from the Erie Canal which opened in 1825.

Progress was slow but steady...Steam locomotives replaced horses in 1832 and passenger service from Baltimore to Washington, out of Mt Clare Station now the site of the B&O Railroad Museum just a few blocks from Camden Yards, commenced in 1835. Twenty five years later, in 1852, when the construction of Camden Station began, the B & O's Ohio Valley line had reached Wheeling, WV...

The Camden depot was completed in 5 years and by that time freight facilities on the site just below Camden Street had also been opened. At the time of its dedication Camden Station was the largest of its kind in the world.

Since the B & O owned the only rail line to Washington, every U.S. president from 1857 to 1873 passed through Camden Station enroute to the Capital. In that period, trains arriving at other stations in Baltimore and bound for Washington had to be drawn by horse through the city to Camden Station (steam engines weren't allowed on the streets).

During the Civil War, Camden Yards reportedly served as as an "underground railway" station transporting freed slaves to the north. In 1863, **President Abraham Lincoln** passed thru en route to Gettysburg to dedicate the battlefield cemetery. Two years later his funeral train stopped at Camden Yards where his casket was transferred to City Hall to lay in state for 4 hours before continuing the journey that would ultimately wind its way to Springfield, IL.

After the Civil War, the Camden section developed into a busy manufacturing area as well as a railroad center, and by the last decade of the 1890s business was booming. The Howard Street Tunnel which joined Mt Royal and Camden stations was finished in 1895, and in 1898 *The Warehouse* was built as part of a major expansion of the freight facilities. The 8-story structure could handle 60 freight cars on one side, and 100 wagons on the other, all at the same time.

Camden Yards continued to prosper well into the 20th century, and the depot never looked better than in 1912 when the B&O spent one million dollars to spruce it up prior to the Democratic National Convention held in Baltimore that summer. It was during that convention that Woodrow Wilson was nominated on the 46th ballot.

After World War II, however, railroads gradually lost their supremacy with the rapid development of the airline industry and the construction of the interstate highway system. The baggage building adjacent to

RUTH'S CAFE

During the early 1900s (from 1906-1912) Babe Ruth's father operated Ruth's Cafe on the ground floor of the family residence, located at Conway Street & Little Paca. It was one of at least five saloons owned or managed by the elder Ruth (George Herman Sr.) at one time or other in this working class Camden area neighborhood. Nickel beer and 10 cent soup prepared by the Babe's mother at lunchtime were specialities of the house.

The significance of the house/saloon at 406 Conway Street is simply that it was located in what will soon be centerfield at the new downtown ballpark. A Frederick, MD archeological firm, Christopher Goodwin & Associates, with help from the Babe's 90-year old sister, Mary "Mamie" Ruth Moberly, located the remains of the house beneath the asphalt at the loading docks of the former B. Green Warehouse.

The Babe didn't spend a lot of time at the house actually. During that period he lived at St. Mary's Industrial School in West Baltimore where he was dispatched at the age of seven.

It was at St Mary's that he was ultimately signed to his first pro contract by Jack Dunn Sr in 1914. He made his professional debut with the International League Orioles soon after, but in July of that year his contract was sold to the Boston Red Sox, and the rest, as they say, is history.

the Station closed in '71, the warehouse in '74 and by '80 Camden Station handled only commuter trains between Baltimore and Washington. However, those commuter trains, operated by MARC, continue to run, and will be an important element in the transportation system serving the new ballpark.

Camden Yards has played a significant role in Baltimore's history and in economic development over the last 125 years, serving first and foremost as a rail center, then for a time as a manufacturing and industrial park. Soon it will take on a new and exciting role, as the regional hub of major league baseball.

ORIOLES ENSHRINED AT COOPERSTOWN

Jim Palmer, when he was selected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1990 (with Joe Morgan), became the 7th modern Oriole to be chosen, the 6th in the last 9 years...He was also the 3rd Oriole, along with Frank and Brooks Robinson, to be selected in his 1st year of eligibility...They are 3 of only 22 1st ballot electees (including Rod Carew in '91) among the 209 Hall of Fame members.

Jim polled 92.6% of the total vote (411 of 444 ballots cast), the highest percentage ever by an Oriole, and 2nd among Hall of Fame pitchers only to the legendary Bob Feller (93.75% in '62).

Jim, Frank and Brooks are the only three Hall of Famers wearing modern Orioles uniforms in their official busts/portraits.

Three More: There are 3 additional Hall of Famers to have represented the Orioles though not as players: George Weiss, who immortalized himself as a general manager of the Yankees, served part of his apprenticeship as an International League Orioles general manager; the late Luke Appling, a legendary hitter/shortstop for the White Sox, coached one year under Birds' Manager Billy Hitchcock, and the late Burleigh Grimes, the famed spitball pitcher who won 270 games in the majors, scouted for the Orioles from '60 thru '71.

Notes: John McGraw had a .334 lifetime batting average in 16 big league seasons, but was elected to the Hall of Fame primarily because of his achievements as a manager...The same is true of his buddy, Wilbert Robinson. Rube Marquard pitched only 30 innings for the Orioles, all in '27.

Baltimore-born Babe Ruth signed his first pro contract with Jack Dunn Sr in '14, and made his debut with the Orioles (I.L.) that year as a pitcher...Chief Bender was based in Baltimore twice...He pitched both for the '27 Orioles (g-18, w-6, 1-3) and the '15 Baltimore Terrapins (w-4, l-16) in the ill-fated Federal League.

Other native Marylanders in the Hall of Fame include "Home Run" Baker (Trappe), Grove (Lonaconing), and 3 others who never played for the Orioles: Jimmie Foxx (Sudlersville), Judy Johnson (Snow Hill) and Al Kaline (Balmer).

THE ORIOLES HALL OF FAME

The newest member of the Orioles Hall of Fame is a former righthanded pitcher named H. Harold "Skinny" Brown (whatever you do, don't call him by his given 1st name, Hector). He pitched 8 years for the Orioles from '55 to '62, and at the time he was traded to the Yankees, was 2nd only to Milt Pappas, in lifetime victories for the Birds.

Though there were pitchers with better arms on the Orioles staff during his tenure here, there were none who were grittier, smarter, or exhibited better control. Skinny, acquired by Paul Richards from the Pacific Coast League, was 62-48 for the O's.

He spent most of his time in Baltimore while the club was building for the future, when victories were hard to come by, but during the Birds'

THE ORIOLES HALL OF FAME (Cont)

1st 2 winning seasons ('60 and '61), he was one of their biggest assets (12-5 in '60 and 10-6 in '61). He also served as a highly respected member to the "Kiddie Korps," the flock of youngsters who pitched for Richards in the late fifties.

In '61, the then 36-year old veteran set an Orioles record that remains a standard for one season, 36 consecutive scoreless innings. He is also one of 5 Orioles pitchers to have recorded 3 straight complete game shutouts.

There were many other highlights as well. Like the day in '55 he pitched an 8-inning no-hitter against the Indians, striking out 10 along the way. That effort doesn't appear in the record books because he came into the game in relief of starter **Bill Wight** who had given up 5 runs without retiring a batter in the opening inning. The Indians ultimately won the game, 5-1, behind their ace of that day, **Herb Score**.

In a '61 game against the Yankees, Brownie gave up a 1st inning home run to **Mickey Mantle** then no-hit the Bombers the rest of the way to win, 4-1. In '57, he was one of 4 Orioles starters (**Billy Loes**, **Connie Johnson** and **Ray Moore**) who collaborate to throw 4 straight complete game shutouts to tie an AL record (since broken by the '74 O's who stretched the record to 5).

In his '52 big league debut with the White Sox, Brown not only defeated Hall of Famer **Bob Feller**, he homered off him as well.

He still ranks 11th on the Birds' all-time win list and 10th in innings pitched. During his entire career with the Red Sox Yankees and Cubs as well as the Orioles and White Sox, Brown issued only 389 bases on balls in 1,681 innings, an average of just over 2 per 9 innings.

Brownie, 66, still lives in Greensboro, NC with his wife, **Maxine**, where he remains active as a partner in the McBrane-Brown Fuel Oil Company.

The newest Orioles Hall of Famer was chosen by the veterans committee, a group of 16 senior representatives from the sports media, the Oriole Advocates and the Orioles front office. To be eligible for veterans committee selection, the candidate must have ceased serving in the capacity of consideration for at least 20 years.

The veterans committee was formed in '89 in an effort to offset any injustices inflicted on those who might have been passed over unfairly by voters not familiar with the extend of their contributions to the Orioles. Three others had earlier gained admission to the Orioles Hall of Fame by the veterans vote: **Stu Miller**, **Jim Gentile** and **Hank Bauer**.

The regular Orioles Hall of Fame vote by a constituency of some 80 sports media, Oriole Advocate and Orioles front office personnel produced no winners this year.

The election procedures in both elections are based on those used by the National Baseball Hall of Fame, requiring mention on 75% of ballots cast. Candidates, to be eligible for either selection process, must have served a minimum of 3 full years with the Orioles.

To be eligible for the regular election a player, manager or coach must have ceased serving in the position for which he was nominated for at least one year.

The Orioles Hall of Fame was conceived in '77 by the Oriole Advocates at the suggestion of two former past presidents, **Allen Barrett** and **Jack Buckley**, both of whom have passed away in recent years...The Advocates continue to administer the annual elections, this year under the direction of Hall of Fame Committee chairman **Dan March**.

ORIOLE ADVOCATES

The Oriole Advocates, Inc is a unique non-profit organization, dedicated to promoting and stimulating interest in the game of baseball at both the amateur and professional levels. Founded in July, 1960, the Advocates celebrated their 30th anniversary last year.

Membership comprises some 75 men and women, drawn from a broad cross-section in the Baltimore area.

Through the years, the Advocates have made substantial financial donations to worthy causes, primarily to baseball-oriented youth organizations; have played a key role in the restoration of **Babe Ruth's** birthplace at 216 Emory Street and its conversion into the Babe Ruth/Baseball Center and in 1977, established the Orioles Hall of Fame (see page 108).

The organization has also served as an essential right arm to the Orioles' Public Relations and Marketing Departments. In that connection, the Advocates initiated the popular "Junior Orioles" program (low cost tickets for kids) back in 1963, then administered it for 25 years. Membership in that program rose from 75 youngsters the first year to a record 20,000 in 1977.

The "Junior Orioles" Program in recent years has evolved into the "Baltimore Sun Fantastic Fans Club" (see page 14), but the Advocates continue to play a dominant role in its operation. The Advocates also serve as distributors of Orioles souvenirs on "giveaway" days at the ballpark, assuring that all eligible fans get the items to which they are entitled.

The Oriole Advocates don't get paid for anything they do. They are all volunteers, constantly demonstrating the importance of competence and dedication whenever there is a job to be done.

ORIOLES "DESIGNATED HITTERS"

The Orioles "Designated Hitters" are a group of volunteers, business men and women from the Baltimore-Washington areas, who sell Orioles season tickets on the club's behalf. This year marks the 12th year for the highly successful DHs.

The organization was created in 1980, and in its first five years of operation, the Orioles' season ticket sales ballooned by over 700%, from 1,623 to 11,738 in 1984. Last year's season ticket total of 15,024 marked an all-time high.

To qualify for membership in the "Designated Hitters," candidates must meet demanding sales minimums according to a formula based on a blend of new sales and renewals, and everyone must requalify each year.

In '90, the leading sales person was **Gordon Kennard**. All qualifiers are eligible for the annual spring junket to Florida while the Orioles are training. Then, during the season, leading DHs will qualify for baseball trips to Seattle, Chicago, and Minneapolis.

Patterned after the Kansas City Royals' highly successful "Royal Lancers," the "Designated Hitters" organization was actually founded in September, 1979, by then Baltimore City Mayor **William Donald Schaefer** and a select group of Baltimoreans working closely with the Orioles' front office.

The concept was to attract people from the business community to serve as the ballclub's principal season ticket sales representatives. The results have been dramatic.

Along with former Mayor (now Governor) **Schaefer**, the "founding fathers" of the "Designated Hitters" included: **Owen Daly**, **Bill Beasman** and **Chris Hartman**; the Orioles' Vice President for Business Affairs **Bob**

Aylward: Vice President of Sales **Lou Michaleson**, and former club Vice President **Al Harazin**, now senior vice president for the New York Mets.

REX BARNEY

The one-time Dodger righthander, who has served as the Orioles' public address announcer since the early seventies, is now in his 8th season with Home Team Sports. He also does a daily report on WBAL-AM, the club's flagship radio station.

Rex pitched for the Dodgers in Brooklyn for 6 seasons ('43, '46-'50) before they moved west, and was inducted into the Brooklyn Dodgers Hall of Fame in June '89.

He made his major league debut in '43 just before being called into military service...After 3 years in the US Army, much of it spent in the European theatre, he returned to the National League in '46 and went on to compile a 35-31 career record.

In '48, his best season, Rex went 15-13, pitched 246.2 innings, yielded only 193 hits, walked 122 and fanned 138. He had a 3.10 era that year, appeared in 44 games, started 34 and complete 12. The highlight of the season was a no-hitter against the hated Giants at the Polo Grounds on Sep 9.

He began his broadcasting career in '52 in New York, was a play-by-play announcer for Mutual Radio's "Game of the Day" from '55 to '57, and also did games in the New York area for WOR-TV. A native of Omaha, Rex has lived in the Baltimore area since 1964 and currently resides just a few blocks from Memorial Stadium.

TOM DAVIS

Baltimore native Tom Davis has been with Home Team Sports since '84, the station's first season on the air...He hosts the Orioles pre and post-game shows, and provides in game interviews and score updates as well as "The Orioles Report." In between, he munches on a hot dog or two and on any other goodies that friends and fans bring to the ballpark for this well known gourmand's enjoyment.

The 43-year old Davis has been a sportscaster in Baltimore for 20 years, and is a 5-time winner of the Maryland Sportscaster of the Year Award ('78, '84, '85, '89 & '90).

Tom's assignments for HTS have included play-by-play for the O's and college basketball, as well as coverage of hockey, boxing and Redskins football. He also serves as a host on HTS talk & interview shows. He has gained national exposure doing NFL radio play-by-play and sideline reporting for NBC radio and television, ABC-TV and the Mutual Broadcasting System.

He currently does a morning sport show with WQSR-AM (105.7). Since beginning his professional career with WBAL Radio in '71, Tom has also worked for WJZ-TV, WBAL-TV and WCBM Radio.

A Calvert Hall and University of Baltimore graduate, Tom lives in Baltimore County with his wife, Linda, and children Malinda and Tad.

KEN LEVINE

An award-winning scriptwriter, this is Ken Levine's 1st season on the Orioles' radio broadcast team. Levine succeeds Joe Angel who accepted a position to call games on radio for the New York Yankees. Ken, 40, comes to the Orioles after an interesting 3 seasons doing minor league baseball (Syracuse in '88 and Tidewater in '89 and '90) in the International League. He also filled in on California Angels radio broadcasts in '90 and for the Toronto Blue Jays in '89 and '90.

Ken decided to pursue a broadcasting career after he had already established himself with writing credits on such television shows as "M*A*S*H" and "Cheers."

In 1975, his scriptwriting career took root with a story for "The Jeffersons." In his career, he has received nominations for 5 Emmy Awards and 6 Writers Guild Awards. He won each award for an episode of "Cheers" in '82.

In addition, Ken currently writes for "Wings" and serves as a contributing writer on "The Simpsons." Aside from his television-writing proficiency, in '85, Ken was a co-writer of the movie "Volunteers," with Tom Hanks, and was a non-credited co-writer (re-write) of the hit movie "Jewel of the Nile" with Michael Douglas, Kathleen Turner, and Danny DeVito.

Ken's broadcasting career began while he was a student at UCLA, doing Bruins sports on radio in Los Angeles, '68-'72. He was a disc jockey between '71-'74, following his graduation, before turning his attention to script writing.

He was born, grew up and still lives in Los Angeles...He and his wife Deborah have 2 children: Matthew and Diana.

JOHN LOWENSTEIN

Former Orioles outfielder John Lowenstein has been doing color on Home Team Sports' baseball broadcasts for the last 7 years. He played his last game for the O's on May 4, '85, and before the month was out began his television career two flights up in the HTS broadcast booth.

John's major league career began in 1970 with the Cleveland Indians and spanned 16 seasons with 3 American League clubs, the last 7 in Baltimore.

"Brother Lo," as he was known affectionately during his playing days was a key member of the Orioles' "leftfield combine" in '82 and '83 along with Gary Roenicke and to a lesser degree Benny Ayala. In '82 O's leftfielders combined for a .283 average (608-172), 41 homers and 123 rbi and the following year, the world championship season, .292 (612-179), 35 homers and 131 rbi.

His most memorable hit in an Orioles uniform was a game ending homer (10th inning) in the first game of the 1979 ALCS off the Angels' John Montague.

John was born and grew up in Wolf Point, Montana (1/27/47), but he and his wife, Barbara, now live in Las Vegas and Baltimore.

JON MILLER

One of baseball's best announcers, Jon is also one of the game's most versatile. Not only will he do play-by-play for the Orioles on WBAL radio and national games on ESPN, he has also joined Jim Palmer and Brooks Robinson on the Orioles WMAR-TV network.

Jon's ability is anything but a secret around the country. This will be his 6th season of regular nationwide exposure, including 4 seasons of play-by-play on NBC-TV's Saturday afternoon coverage and '90-91 on ESPN.

He further enhanced his national reputation by winning an ACE Award, emblematic of cable television excellence, in award ceremonies held in early January at Los Angeles. He was chosen for his play-by-play work last year on ESPN Sunday Night Baseball. Palmer was also nominated, for his role as an analyst on ESPN's Friday night games.

In 1991, Jon will work with **Ken Levine** in the radio booth. In 8 previous seasons here, he has shared the mike with **Tom Marr**, **Jack Wiers**, **Joe Angel**, **Chuck Thompson**, and **Charlie Slowers**.

His major league baseball experience includes three years as radio play-by-play announcer for the Boston Red Sox ('80-'82), radio and television with the Texas Rangers in '78 and '79 and with the Oakland A's in '74. He broadcast his first major league game at age 22 with the Athletics.

Jon has had an extensive background in basketball, soccer, and hockey during his 18 years in broadcasting. He did 10-15 games a season for the NBA's Golden State Warriors from 1979-82 and prior to that, was the voice of University of San Francisco basketball for 5 years. He has also done Major Indoor Soccer League (MISL) games for the San Jose Earthquakes and did both television and radio for the Washington Diplomats of the North American Soccer League in '77. He broadcast soccer play-by-play for the CBS, TVS and Satelcast networks.

A renowned mimic, Jon convincingly imitates such outstanding baseball announcers as **Al Michaels**, **Vin Scully**, and **Chuck Thompson** during breaks in the action (rain delays, etc.), or on the banquet circuit.

In '86, he was named "Baltimore's Best Radio Sportscaster" by Baltimore Magazine and "Best Play-by-Play Broadcaster" by Washington Magazine.

A native of the San Francisco Bay area, Jon now lives in Cockeysville, MD with his wife, **Janine**, and their children **Michelle**, **Holly**, **Emilie**, and **Alexander**.

JIM PALMER

At the 11th hour Jim accepted an invitation from the Orioles to come to spring camp as a non-roster player. If he should make the 25-man cut, he would, of course become the 1st Hall of Famer ever to make a successful comeback.

1990, Big Year for the Palmers: Jim reached the pinnacle of his baseball career when he was elected to baseball's Hall of Fame on 1st ballot in January, '90, and received a higher percentage of votes (411 out of 444 ballots cast, or 92.5 per cent) than any pitcher except Bob Feller (93.75 per cent). See page 108 for more on Hall of Fame. It was an exceptional year all-around for the 45-year old Hall of Famer who married the former **Joni Pearlstone** on Apr 7 and later received a nomination for an ACE award, cable television's reward for excellence, for his work as an analyst on ESPN's Friday Night Baseball.

Broadcasting: In 1991, Jim will return to the role of color commentator sharing the duties with **Brooks Robinson**. Jim and Brooks were teammates on the O's for the better part of 13 years ('65-'77); both their uniform numbers were retired; both played their entire careers with the Orioles and, of course, both were elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in their 1st year of eligibility (Brooks in '83).

Jim had done play-by-play occasionally for Home Team Sports and in '89 and '90 for the Orioles Television Network. He had 13 years experience as an analyst on ABC-TV (ending in '89) and on ESPN in '90. The Orioles and Detroit Tigers (**George Kell** and **Al Kaline**) have baseball's only Hall of Fame announcing crews.

Pitching Distinctions: Unquestionably, the finest pitcher in the Orioles' 36-year history, Jim holds many club records including most wins (268), losses (152), games (558), innings (3947.2), shutouts (53), complete games (211), strikeouts (2212), and walks (1311).

He won 20 games 8 times, earned 3 Cy Young Awards, went the route to win the pennant-clinching game 4 times ('66, '69, '70, '71), and was 8-3 in post-season play while pitching for the O's over a span of 20 years ('65 thru '84).

During his entire career, he never gave up a major league grand slam home run in regular or post-season play (little known fact: **Johnny Bench** hit one off him in the International League during Jim's brief stint with Rochester in '67, and **Freddie Patek** hit a no-counter in an exhibition game for the Royals at Ft Myers, FL).

Last Hurrah: Made his final start, at Chicago, Apr. 23, '84, but did not get a decision. Pitched in his last game as an Oriole, in relief, at Memorial Stadium on May 12, '84 against Oakland, but again was not a pitcher of record...His final career victory was in game #3 of the '83 World Series at Philadelphia (see post-season below). Earned his 268th and last regular season win on Sep 30, '83, a 3-2 win over the Yankees at Baltimore in the 2nd game of a doubleheader.

Lifetime Victories/20-Win Seasons: Jim ranks 27th on the all-time list in victories...He is one of only 3 pitchers in the 90-year history of the A.L. to have won 20 or more games in 8 or more seasons along with **Lefty Grove** (8, last time in '35) and **Walter Johnson** (12, last time in '25). The last major leaguer to do it was **Warren Spahn** (13 times, the last in '63).

Only 6 who have worked exclusively in the 20th century have won 20 or more 8 times, and in the entire history of the major leagues, Jim is one of only 16. He put that string together over a 9-year period from '70 thru '78 (was 7-12 in '74). He was 176-97 with a 2.54 era during that 9-season stretch.

Earned Run Average: His 2.8568 era is 4th on the all-time list, since era became an official statistic ('12 in NL and '13 in AL) among pitchers with 3,000 or more innings, behind: (1) **Walter Johnson**-2.37; (2) **Grover C. Alexander**-2.56; and (3) **Whitey Ford** -2.74. He ranks just ahead of #5 **Tom Seaver** (2.862)...He twice led the league ('73 & '75), and was in the loop's "top 5" 10 times.

Pennant Clinchers: He went the route to win the games that clinched the O's 1st 4 pennants ('66, '69, '70, '71)...Since then, **Scott McGregor** ('79) and **Tippy Martinez** ('83) have joined him.

Post-Season: His overall record in 17 post-season appearances, including 15 starts, was 8-3 with a 2.61 era (ip-124.1, er-36).

In '66, he became the youngest ever to pitch a World Series shutout when, at the age of 20 years-11 months-21 days, he blanked the Dodgers' **Sandy Koufax**, 6-0, on 4 hits (LA made 6 errors) in game #2 at Dodger Stadium...That was Koufax' final major league appearance.

In '83 Jim became the 1st (and remains the only) pitcher in history to have won a World Series game in each of 3 decades...In that game (#3 at Philadelphia), he bested **Steve Carlton** after hurling 2 scoreless innings in relief of **Mike Flanagan**.

He is tied for 2nd (with 5 others) with 4 LCS victories. Oakland's **Dave Stewart** took over the lead with his 5th win in '90. Jim holds the record by himself for most LCS complete games (5)...He and **Nolan Ryan** are tied for most career LCS strikeouts (46), while he and former teammate **Mike Cuellar** have walked the most in ALCS competition (19).

Cy Youngs: Jim is one of only 4 to have won as many as 3 Cy Youngs ('73, '75, '76)...**Steve Carlton** won 4 and both **Seaver** and Koufax earned 3...The award has been presented since '56, with individual league awards beginning in '67...Jim, Koufax, **Denny McLain**, and **Roger Clemens** are the only ones to have earned the award in consecutive seasons.

Personal: He has been an activist on behalf of the Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation for nearly 2 decades, serving much of that time as its national sports chairman...He has been the sports representative for Jockey Underwear since the spring of '80...In '83, he was the sports recipient of the American Image Award, sponsored by the Male Apparel Industry and the Men's Fashion Association of America.

Born 10/15/45 in New York City, Jim attended both Arizona State and Towson State Universities...He has 2 daughters, **Jamie Michelle** (11/16/66) and **Kelly Christina** (6/5/69).

MEL PROCTOR

Mel is in his 19th year as a broadcaster, 8th as the Orioles' play-by-play announcer for Home Team Sports. Mel, who handles a variety of on-air assignments for HTS including play-by-play for Washington Bullets basketball telecasts and boxing, is one of the busiest broadcasters in the business.

In addition to his work with HTS, Mel has described NFL games for NBC television and radio, college football, and pro and college basketball for Turner Broadcasting. He also does selected Bullets games for Channel 20 in Washington, D.C. (those not televised by HTS).

In '86, Mel took a short break from Orioles baseball to handle TBS' play-by-play of the United States men's basketball team in the Goodwill Games in Spain and was part of the broadcast crew doing the Goodwill Games from Seattle in '90.

He began his career as sports director at the CBS-TV affiliate in Hawaii (KGMB) from '73 until '78. While there, he worked the microphone for Hawaii Islanders (AAA) baseball, University of Hawaii football and basketball, and did one season for the Hawaiians of the World Football League.

He came to work in the Nation's Capital for the first time in '78 when he began a five-year stint as play-by-play announcer for Washington Bullets basketball on flagship station, WTOP-AM. During the Bullets' off-seasons, Mel worked in Arlington, Texas as the TV and radio voice of the Texas Rangers. In '82 and '83, he supplemented his work with the Bullets by doing college basketball games for NBC-TV.

For two seasons ('83-'84 and '84-'85), Mel served as the play-by-play man for the NBA's New Jersey Nets. At that time, he was also doing the Mutual Broadcasting System's NFL "Game of the Week."

A native of Denver, CO, Mel resides in Ellicott City, MD with his wife, Julie, and their children, Bill and Maile.

BROOKS CALBERT ROBINSON JR.

Hall of Fame: See page 108

Personal: Brooks is doing color commentary on the Orioles' television for the 14th straight year. He is also active as vice-president of Shapiro, Robinson and Associates and as a special assistant with Crown Central Petroleum Company.

A native of Little Rock, AR, Brooks was born 5/18/37.

Brooks and his wife, Connie, a former United Airlines flight attendant whom Brooks met on an Orioles' charter flight (KC to Boston) in '59, have been married 30 years. They live in Lutherville, MD (north of Baltimore). The Robinsons have four children: **Brooks David** (7/24/61), **Chris** (2/22/63), **Michael** (3/11/64) and **Dianne** (2/22/68).

Big League Career: Brooks officially spent 20 years and 72 days as a player in the American League, spanning 23 seasons.

He played in 2,896 major league games, all of them with the Orioles, 8th on the all-time list (**Pete Rose** leads at 3,562). Only **Carl Yastrzemski** (3,308) and **Ty Cobb** (3,033) have played more American League games, and only 3 others in history have played more with one franchise. **Yastrzemski** (3,308), **Hank Aaron** (3,076), and **Stan Musial** (3,026).

Durability: Played in 97% of all Orioles games from July 9, '59 (when he returned from the minors for the last time) thru May 16, '76, a period of more than 16 1/2 years...Played at least 153 games in 14 of 15 years from '60 thru '75.

In the Orioles' 37-year history, only 4 other 3rd basemen have played as many as 200 games at that position (**Doug DeCinces**-792, **Craig Worthington**-302, **Rich Dauer**-242, and **Floyd Rayford**-203).

Opening Days: Started 20 consecutive opening day games for the Orioles from '57 thru '76 and batted .316 (79-25) with 6 home runs and 17 rbi.

Home Runs/RBI: Led AL in rbi (118) in '64 and also achieved career high of 28 home runs that year...Hit 17 or more homers nine times, 11 or more 11 times...His last year in double figures was '71 when he hit 20...Ranks 2nd for most lifetime homers in Memorial Stadium (139)...Had 6 career grand slams, 4 of them in Baltimore.

Hitting: Hit most home runs (37) and drove in most runs (167) against the Red Sox...Twice put together strings of 8 straight hits: July 10 thru 15, '60 and Aug. 21 thru 23, '63...Holds AL record for most sacrifice flies, career (114).

Holds club records for games, at bats, runs, hits, doubles, triples, total bases, rbi, and extra base hits...Has one-season mark for games (163, '61 & '64) and at bats (668, '61).

Fielding: Committed only 263 errors in 9,165 chances at 3rd base for a lifetime fielding percentage of .971, earning 16 Gold Gloves in the process. Still, even the best have moments to forget, such as the time Brooks made 3 errors in one game. See next paragraphs for details on Gold Gloves and his memorable (?) game on defense.

Appeared in a total of 29 games at 2nd base (24) and shortstop (5) and committed only one error in 31 chances. Played exclusively at 3rd base, '63-'77.

Gold Gloves: The quintessential 3rd baseman of all time, Brooks won Gold Gloves in 16 consecutive seasons, '60 through '75. The string was snapped by Detroit's **Aurelio Rodriguez** (who later played for the Orioles) in '76. While Brooks was active, the only other American Leaguers to win the award at the hot corner were Boston's **Frank Malzone** ('57 through '59) and New York's **Graig Nettles** ('77).

Believe It or Not: On July 28, '71 against Oakland, Brooks shocked the baseball world by making 3 errors, not just in the game, but in the same inning. There was no score when the Athletics batted in the 5th inning. With 2 outs and the bases empty, **Mike Cuellar** walked

John "Blue Moon" Odom. After a Bert Campaneras bunt, Brooks threw the ball away for his 1st miscue. The next batter, George Hendrick, hit a grounder to Brooks who bobbled the ball, then threw wildly to 1st base. On the play, Odom and Campaneras scored. However, all was quickly forgotten when Frank Robinson belted a 3-run homer in the 9th inning, lifting the O's to a 3-2 sudden death victory.

All-Star Games: Played in 18 consecutive all-star games from '60 thru '74 (including two per year in '60, '61, '62)...Had lifetime average of .289 (13-for-45).

Selected "MVP" in 1966 at St. Louis when he had three hits, including a home run, while handling eight chances in the field...Also homered in '67 game at Anaheim...Was also a serious contender for the award in '64 (at Shea Stadium) and '70 (at Cincinnati), when he went 2-for-3, hit a triple, scored a run, and drove in two others.

Hit three triples in all-star play and didn't make an error in 43 fielding chances.

Was elected to starting lineup in Gillette-sponsored fan vote four times ('71, '72, '73, '74) after selection was returned to fans in '70...Led AL players in votes in '71 (1,110,469)...Started a total of 11 games...Had last hit in '71 game at Detroit.

Post-Season: Played first 39 post-season games in which the Orioles were involved, and batted a composite .303 (44-for-145)—.348 in 18 ALCS games and .263 in 21 WS games.

World Series: Homered in first WS at bat in first inning against Dodgers (at Dodger Stadium) in '66 immediately following Frank Robinson's two-run homer (both off Don Drysdale).

Was landslide "MVP" in '70 vs. Reds...Hit .429 (9-for-21) and was brilliant on defense...His nine hits tied record for most hits in five-game series...He also contributed six rbi, two doubles, and two homers...Erred on first fielding chance then handled 23 more flawlessly, many of them brilliantly...Stole at least two hits each from Johnny Bench and Lee May...It was during the series that Lee gave him the nickname "Hoover" (as in vacuum cleaners)...Made three errors in 76 WS chances.

ALCS: Had .486 average (18-for-37) after 1st three championship series (O's swept all in three straight games)...His lone hit in last LCS in '74 was a 1st-game homer off Oakland's "Catfish" Hunter.

Nothing is Forever: His 268th and last home run provided one of the most emotional experiences in Orioles' history. It was Apr. 19, '77 at Memorial Stadium, the O's trailed the Indians, 5-2, in the 10th. With one out and runners on 1st and 2nd, Lee May singled in a run. The O's now trailed by 2 as Brooks came to the plate as a pinch-hitter for Larry Harlow. He ran the count to 3 & 2, fouled off a number of pitches, then hit a home run into the left field stands off reliever Dave LaRoche to win the game, 6-5. There were only 4,826 fans at the ballpark that night, but none of them will ever forget the moment.

Signed for '77 as player-coach, but became coach exclusively on Sunday, Aug 21, when he went on the voluntarily retired list (in Minne-

sota) to make room on the roster for catcher Rick Dempsey who was returning to duty after 6 weeks on the disabled list.

An Orioles' record regular season crowd of 51,798 attended "Thanks Brooks" Day on Sunday, Sep 18, '77, against the Red Sox to pay tribute to the most important and beloved Oriole of modern times.

CHUCK THOMPSON

In a case of back to the future, Chuck Thompson returns to the Orioles Radio Network in '91, doing 81 games while Jon Miller is working television.

Chuck, one of baseball's enduring breed of announcers inexorably connected with one team, is the embodiment of the Orioles. His career parallels the history and success of this franchise.

Technically, he has been retired from Orioles radio since the conclusion of the '82 season, but by doing television ('83-'89) and filling in on radio ('89 and '90), another generation of Orioles fans has had the pleasure of listening to the best plying his craft.

Chuck was a veteran announcer before arriving in Baltimore, having started his career in 1939 at WEEU in Reading, PA. From there he went to Philadelphia's WIBG in 1942 to do Temple University football.

During World War II, Chuck served in the Army and saw action in 3 major European campaigns. After the war, he returned to Philadelphia, doing radio for the Phillies, Athletics, Warriors, Eagles, and Rockets (hockey).

In 1949, Chuck came to Baltimore where he became the voice of the International League Orioles, All-America Conference Colts, the Bills, and Navy football.

Then, in '55, Chuck joined the National Brewing Company's team of announcers and during a 24-year association, he did American League Orioles games in '55-'56 and again from '62-'78. In between, he was the radio voice of the Washington Senators, '57-'61.

For 2 seasons, '59-'60, he was on television doing NBC-TV's Game of the Week. Also in '60, he described the World Series between the Pirates and Yankees and is remembered for his call of Bill Mazeroski's famous Game 7, 9th-inning home run to win the championship for Pittsburgh.

He has been named the outstanding broadcaster in Maryland by the National Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association on numerous occasions.

Chuck, equally acclaimed as the announcer for the Baltimore Colts, called the classic overtime playoff contest for the NFL title between the Colts and the New York Giants in December, '58; the Colts-Packers overtime playoff game in '65 (on CBS-TV) for the NFL's Western Division championship and the O's World Series games in '66, '69, '70, and '71.

He is a golfing and fishing enthusiast and his wife, **Betty**, is an outstanding cook. Chuck has 3 children and 5 grandchildren.

ORIOLES TRAINERS

Richie Bancells (35, 11/11/55) is beginning his 4th year as the O's head trainer, his 8th with the big club, and 15th in the Orioles organization. Immediately prior to Baltimore, Richie spent 4 years ('80-'83) at Rochester as the Red Wings' trainer/road secretary... During that time, he also assisted his predecessor, the late **Ralph Salvon**, each spring at the O's spring camp in Miami.

A Key West native, Richie is a graduate of Miami's Biscayne College (now St Thomas University), and earned an MS in physical education from Eastern Kentucky University (Richmond, KY)...He is certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA).

Richie initially joined the Baltimore organization as assistant trainer with the Miami Orioles (Class A, Florida State Lge) in '77, then served as head trainer for the Bluefield (WV) Orioles (Appalachian Rookie Lge) the next 2 years ('78-'79) before moving on to Rochester in '80. He and his wife, **Carol**, have 2 children: **Christopher** (7/8/80) and **Andrea** (8/18/85). Carol is also a graduate of Biscayne College, where she earned a degree in theology and education.

Jamie Reed (31, 6/15/59) is beginning his 3rd full year as Orioles' assistant trainer, but this will be his 10th season in the organization. He joined up as head trainer for the Bluefield Orioles (Rookie, Appalachian) in '82 after taking a degree in sports medicine at East Carolina University (Greenville, NC).

Jamie moved up the ladder quickly, first to Hagerstown (Carolina Lge) in '83, then to Charlotte (Southern) in '84. The following year ('85) he became head trainer/traveling secretary for the Red Wings, and remained at Rochester for 4 years...He was promoted to Baltimore in Sep '88.

Jamie who is certified by NATA, has also worked as a trainer in the Venezuelan Winter League and spends his winters looking after the aches and pains of US Naval Academy basketball players.

Though born in Baltimore, Jamie grew up in Annapolis. He was a '77 graduate of St Mary's High School where he played varsity football and lacrosse.

He and his wife, **Jean**, an Annapolis native, who is also a graduate of both St Mary's High and East Carolina University, have 3 children: **Zachary** (11/10/83), **Rebecca** (4/16/86) and **Rachel** (11/29/88)...The Reeds now live in Baltimore.

ORIOLES STRENGTH/CONDITIONING COACH

Allan (Al) Johnson (35, 12/16/55) joined the Orioles from West Virginia University where he administered the strength and conditioning programs for all 19 sports in which the Mountaineers compete...He went to WVU as a graduate assistant in '82, and a year later was named head strength/conditioning coach.

During his 7 years at Morgantown, the teams with which he was involved won 78% of their events. Al was instrumental in completing the computerization of athletic fitness assessments on all intercollegiate athletes on the campus (nearly 350), and in the construction of a new 7,000 square foot conditioning center. As his last official act at WVU, Al accompanied the football team to the Fiesta Bowl where the Mountaineers lost to Notre Dame for the national championship.

Al has implemented a year-round strength and conditioning program for all players in the Orioles organization. In addition, he conducts clinics, seminars and conventions across the country. In '87 he was named the National Strength Coaches Association's Eastern Regional National Strength Coach of the Year...He and his wife, **Jan**, have one son: **Adam** (4/16/87).

Frank is one of 7 modern Orioles to have been chosen (see Hall of Fame on page 109), and one of 3 wearing an O's uniform in his official portrait (along with **Brooks** and **Palmer**).

MANAGER OF THE YEAR, '89: After directing his team to a 32 1/2 game improvement over '88 and matching the '36 Boston Braves for the 3rd biggest one year improvement in modern history, Frank enjoyed a rare distinction. He won all 4 of the major American League "Manager of the Year" awards—BBWAA, The Sporting News, AP and UPI...He was the 5th Orioles skipper to have won at least one of the above, but the 1st to capture the BBWAA trophy which was initiated only in '85. Other Orioles managers to be honored: **Joe Altobelli**, **Hank Bauer**, **Paul Richards** and **Earl Weaver**...See "Orioles Award Winners" on page 41.

ORIOLES: Frank replaced **Cal Ripken** on Apr 12, '88, becoming the Orioles' 8th manager (excluding interim managers **Luman Harris** in '61 and **Ripken** (1 game) in '85)...He took over with the club at 0-6 and lost

his 1st 15 games until the O's snapped its record start-of-the-season losing streak at 21 (Apr 29)...Frank's overall record that year was 54-101. Twice during that year he handed the reins to **Ellie Hendricks** because of a bad back...Frank was hospitalized and missed 4 games from May 18 thru 20 (O's were 1-3), then was sidelined for 2 weeks from July 15 thru 28 while undergoing successful surgery for the removal of a ruptured disc by Dr Donald Long. The club's cumulative record during that period was 4-11.

After the '88 season, Frank reassembled his coaching staff, retaining only one of those he'd inherited. That was **Hendricks**, whose relationship with Frank dates back to '68 when both played for the Orioles.

He asked **Cal Ripken Sr**, the man he replaced as manager in April, to return as 3rd base coach; hired **Tom McCraw** with whom he had played and/or worked in Anaheim, Cleveland and San Francisco, as his batting coach; brought up **Johnny Oates**, another former Orioles teammate, from Rochester where he had just managed the Red Wings to the Governor's Cup, and appointed as pitching coach, **Al Jackson**, the highly regarded former minor league pitching instructor in the acclaimed New York Mets system (**McCraw** was also in the Mets' system before joining the O's).

At the time he took over the ballclub in Apr '88, Frank was working as a front office official for the 1st time in his career with the title, special assistant to the president (**Edward Bennett Williams**).

This is Frank's 2nd tour of duty with the O's since he played here ('66 thru '71).

He returned as a coach in '78, but spent most of that season managing in Rochester before moving back to Baltimore again as a coach in '79 and '80. In the pennant winning year ('79), he was credited with helping to improve substantially the quality of the club's defense. In '80 he replaced **Jim Frey** (who left to manage the KC Royals) as the O's batting and 1st base coach. Frank, himself, departed in '80 to manage the San Francisco Giants.

Five years later ('85) he came back to Baltimore after 4 years in San Francisco and a short stint ('84) as a coach with the Milwaukee Brewers (**Harry Dalton** hired him for Milwaukee the day after he was let go by the Giants. Frank had also worked with Dalton in Baltimore and Anaheim).

For the next 3 seasons, he was a bench/outfield coach under 3 managers: **Joe Altobelli** ('85), **Earl Weaver** ('85-'86) and **Cal Ripken** ('87), before his appointment as special assistant to the president in October '87.

SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS: Named manager Jan 14, '81, replacing **Dave Bristol** (who in turn had followed **Joe Altobelli**), and led the club to its 1st winning season since Altobelli did it in '78. The years '81 & '82 were the Giants' 1st consecutive winning seasons in a decade. In '83 and '84, however, the club dipped below .500, and on Aug 4, '84, Frank was dismissed in favor of interim skipper **Danny Ozark**.

During his tenure in San Francisco, 2 former O's players served on his staff: **Don Buford** (now the O's director of field operations/instruction) and **Herm Starrett** (O's '88 pitching coach), as well as **McCraw** (the O's current batting coach).

ROCHESTER RED WINGS ('78): He started the season as an O's coach, but after **Ken Boyer** left the Wings to manage the St Louis Cardinals (Apr 28), Frank replaced him at Rochester (May 9) and went 58-64 the rest of the way before returning to Baltimore the following season.

CLEVELAND INDIANS ('74-'77): Frank joined the Indians as a player on Sep 12, '74 from California in a trade. Then, 3 weeks later, on Oct 4, the day after the season ended, he was named the first black major league manager in baseball history, replacing **Ken Aspromonte**.

IN UNIFORM

FRANK ROBINSON (Cont.)

He made a dramatic debut as playing manager on Apr 8, '75 before some 55,000 opening day fans at Cleveland Stadium. In his 1st at bat of the 1st game (he was dh, batting 2nd), Frank homered off Doc Medich (later that inning, ex-Oriole teammate **Boog Powell** also homered).

The Indians won the game, 5-3, and Frank's effort was voted "most memorable moment" in Tribe history by Cleveland fans during baseball's observance of the US bicentennial celebration.

In that 1st year, the Indians fell to 15 games below .500 by late June, but rallied and wound up 4th, just one game under. The next season, '76, they finished 3 games over. However, after a slow '77 start, Frank was released on June 19 and was succeeded by **Jeff Torborg**. For the rest of that year, he coached with the Angels under Manager **Dave Garcia**, who had been his 3rd base coach in Cleveland in '75-'76.

PLAYING CAREER

MAJOR LEAGUE LEADER: He played for 21 major league seasons and is among the top ranking players of all time in 10 categories. His 586 home runs represent the 4th highest figure in major league history.

In addition, Frank ranks high in the following: games-2,808 (12th); at bats-10,006 (14th); runs-1,829th (10th); hits-2,943 (20th); 2bb-528 (18th); rbi-1,812 (12th); total bases -5,373 (8th); walks-1,420 (18th), and hit by pitches-198 (3rd) behind **Don Baylor**-267 and **Ron Hunt**-243.

MVP, BOTH LEAGUES: He is the only player ever to win the BBWAA MVP award in each league...He was the choice in the NL in '61 and the AL winner in '66. In addition, he was MVP in the '66 World Series and the '71 All-Star game.

TRIPLE CROWN: Is one of only 11 players to have won the Triple Crown (accomplished 13 times, 2 each by **Ted Williams** and **Roger Hornsby**). Frank did it in '66 with the O's. He, **Mantle** ('56) and **Carl Yastrzemski** ('67) are the only players to have captured the Triple Crown in the past 43 years (since **Williams**' 2nd in '47).

HOME RUNS

He hit 343 in the NL and 243 in the AL...Hit 388 off righthanders and 198 against lefties.

VS NL OPPONENTS: Astros (Colts)-11; Braves-54; Cardinals-46; Cubs-54; Dodgers-42; Expos-0; Giants-49; Mets-12; Padres-1; Phillies-38; Pirates-34; Reds-2.

VS AL OPPONENTS: Angels-14; A's-20; Brewers (Pilots)-14; Indians-25; Orioles-6; Rangers (Senators)-31; Red Sox-37; Royals-15; Tigers-28; Twins-22; White Sox-17; Yankees-14.

33 PARKS: Franks holds the major league record for hitting home runs in most ballparks (33), including both regular and post-season play. **Hank Aaron** ranks 2nd at 32.

Among those, Crosley Field in Cincinnati (176) and Memorial Stadium (103) rank one-two in frequency for obvious reasons. There were 4 stadia in which he played, but did not hit a home run: Houston's Astrodome, Montreal's Olympic Stadium, Sicks' Stadium in Seattle (69 only) and Busch Stadium in St Louis.

In regular season play Frank homered in 32 parks. His 33rd was Pittsburgh's Three Rivers in the '71 World Series.

GRAND SLAMS: Hit a total of 7 slams, 5 of them in the NL. His only 2 bases loaded AL homers were hit in successive innings on Aug 20, '70 at RFK Stadium in Washington off Senators' **Joe Coleman** and **Joe Grzenda**. Frank, **Jim Gentile** and **Jim Northrup** are the only ones ever to hit slams in successive plate appearances, though a total of 7 have hit 2 in a game.

2 OR MORE/GAME: Hit 2 or more in a game 54 times (ranks 5th in major league history). Hit 3 in a game for Reds at Crosley Field vs Cardinals on Aug 22, '59. Had 16 2-homer games for O's.

HR ODDS AND ENDS: Hit his 1st at Wrigley Field off the Cubs' **Paul Minner** on Apr 28, '56 and his last at Anaheim Stadium on July 6, '76 off the Angels' **Sid Monge**. Hit most off NL righthander **Larry Jackson** (10). Scored the 1st run in ALCS history in game #1 in '69 at Baltimore, and also hit the 1st homer off the Twins' **Jim Perry**.

HRS-ORIOLES: Hit his 500th major league homer in Baltimore in the 2nd game of a twi-night doubleheader against the Tigers' lefthander **Fred Scherman** Sep 13, '71. At the time, he ranked 11th on the all-time list just behind **Harmon Killebrew** who had reached that milestone earlier that year. After leaving Baltimore, Frank moved past Killebrew, **Mei Ott**, **Ernie Banks**, **Eddie Mathews**, **Ted Williams**, **Jimmie Foxx** and **Mickey Mantle**.

LONG HOME RUNS/MEMORIAL STADIUM

The longest "measured" home run ever hit in Memorial Stadium was a 471' drive by **Harmon Killebrew** on May 24, 1964 off **Milt Pappas** over the hedge in left-center field. . . . This exceeded by two feet the only other blast that has ever cleared the hedge. . . . That was one by **Boog Powell** 469' to the same area off Boston's **Don Schwall** on June 22, 1962. Aside from these there have been three balls hit into the hedge (approximately 450'), by **Mickey Mantle** in 1954, by **Powell** in 1965 and by **Frank Robinson** in 1967.

Frank Robinson is the only player to have hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium. In the second game of a doubleheader with Cleveland on May 8, 1966, Frank hit a Luis Tiant offering over the left field stands and into the parking lot beyond, a drive that measured 451' on the fly and rolled to a stop 540' away from home plate.

He set a major league record by hitting 10 home runs in the month of Apr '69, but that mark has since been extended to 11 by **Willie Stargell**, **Mike Schmidt** and **Graig Nettles**.

Set a club record with 49 homers in '66. Also set marks that year for most homers by an Oriole against one opponent (11 vs Det) and most home runs, Memorial Stadium (27).

OTHER CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

LAST GAME AS A PLAYER: Frank played in his last game as a player on Sep 18, '76 at Cleveland vs Baltimore. He put himself in as a pinch-hitter for **Frank Duffy** in the 8th inning and singled in a run off **Rudy May**.

ALL-STAR GAMES: Appeared in 11 All-Star games as a player (6 with Cincinnati, 4 with O's and one with California) and served as a coach in '76 while managing for Cleveland. Was MVP in '71 game at Detroit. hit a 2-run homer off **Dock Ellis** to put AL ahead to stay in 3rd inning (**Reggie Jackson** hit another with one off Ellis in the same inning).

Hit .250 (24-6) in All-Star play with 2 homers. Went 3-for-3 for the NL in '59 at LA Coliseum and homered off **Early Wynn**.

WORLD SERIES: Hit 2 key homers in '66 vs Dodgers, both off **Don Drysdale**, to win SPORT Magazine sports car. Hit his 1st in the opening of game #1 at Dodger Stadium with **Russ Snyder** aboard (**Brooks** followed immediately with another and the O's led 3-0 before the Dodgers batted). O's won the game 5-2. In game #4 his 4th inning solo provided the only run as the O's completed their sweep behind **Dave McNally**.

In '71 game #6 vs Pittsburgh in Baltimore, Frank's baserunning in the 10th inning allowed the O's to tie the series at 3 games apiece. He drew a one out walk, and despite ailing legs and a sore Achilles tendon, went from 1st to 3rd on **Merv Rettenmund**'s single up the middle just evading **Richie Hebner**'s tag with a head first slide. Then, he scored on **Brooks**' short sac fly to **Vic Davalillo** in center.

CINCINNATI: Spent 10 full years with the Reds after 3 seasons in their farm system. Was NL Rookie of the Year in '56. Tied league record for homers by a rookie (38, set by **Wally Berger** of the Braves), and set a rookie mark by being hit by pitched balls 20 times.

Won Triple Crown and MVP awards in AL and World Series in '66. In addition to leading the league in average (.316), home runs (49) and rbi (122), he also paced the loop in total bases (367), runs (122) and slugging (.637).

Was batting .337 in late June '67 when he sustained serious head injury in a 2nd base collision with the White Sox' **Al Weis**. Missed a month and

suffered from double vision for a year and a half afterward. Though he wound up with a .311 average that year, he slipped to .268 (with 15 homers and 52 rbi) in '68 while still recovering from that injury, compounded by an attack of mumps and a muscle tear in his right shoulder. Frank returned to form the following spring and helped lead the O's to 3 straight pennants in '69, '70 & '71.

Following his trade to the Dodgers in Dec '71, Frank's uniform #20 was retired. He was the 1st Oriole to be so honored. In '77 he and Brooks became the 1st players to be inducted into the new Orioles' Hall of Fame, originated by the Oriole Advocates in cooperation with the Orioles.

DODGERS-ANGELS: After one year ('72) in Los Angeles where he played for **Walter Alston**, Frank was traded to the Angels. At Anaheim he played nearly 2 years under **Bobby Winkles** and **Dick Williams**.

PERSONAL: One of 10 children. Graduate from McClymonds High School (Oakland). Was basketball teammate of **Bill Russell** and played baseball there with **Vada Pinson**, **Willie Tasby** and **Charlie Beaman**. Hobbies: movies, music and Lakers basketball games. Attended Xavier University in Cincinnati.

Frank and his wife, the former **Barbara Ann Cole**, were married Oct 28, '61. They have 2 children: **Frank Kevin** (9/8/62) and **Nichelle** (8/24/65). Barbara is a real estate agent in the Bel Air/Beverly Hills area. Several years ago she sold a house to "Magic" Johnson, then sold his old house. **Nichelle** worked in the Orioles pr department for several years.

MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER

BALTIMORE ORGANIZATION: This year will be the 23rd season opener for Elrod in an Orioles uniform, most in club history (Brooks **Robinson** spent 21)...Since '68, Elrod has been with the O's for all but 1-1/2 of 23 seasons.

He played for the Cubs during the last 6 weeks of '72 (Tommy Davis deal) before returning the O's over the winter...Then he logged 1-1/2 years in the Yankees' organization from June '76 thru the '77 season, before rejoining the Orioles again. Posted a .990 career fielding average.

MANAGERIAL DEBUT '88: Ellie twice substituted for **Frank Robinson** as manager in '88 when the latter was hospitalized with a bad back...Ellie managed 4 games from May 18-20 (1-3), then took over again for 2 weeks from July 15 thru 28 (3-8)...His cumulative record during Frank's 2 absences was 4-11.

COACHING: Ellie is entering his 15th year as the O's bullpen coach since his appointment to that position in '77 during Earl Weaver's 1st tour of duty.

Player-Coach: Twice during this span he's served as player-coach...In '78 he was activated on May 18, replacing **Gary Roenicke** who had been

sent down, and remained on the roster for the balance of the year in the dual capacity.

In 13 games that year he hit .333 (18-6), and, in his one career pitching stint, compiled an 0.00 era, thus leading the club, in a sense, in both categories (to be fair, he was tied in era with **Dave Ford**, who pitched 15 scoreless innings).

His pitching career took place on June 26 in Toronto, where the O's were absorbing a 24-10 pasting...He worked 2.1 innings, allowed no runs, one hit and one walk while putting an end to the carnage inflicted upon 4 predecessors (Mike Flanagan, Joe Kerrigan, Tippy Martinez, and outfielder **Larry Harlow**). **Don Stanhouse** then pitched the 9th and also held the Jays scoreless.

In '79 he coached exclusively all year until Sep 1 when the roster expanded to 40 players...He made only one appearance, his last in the major leagues, at Detroit on Sep 19 and went 0-for-1...He was not eligible for post-season play.

All-Star: He was the AL's batting practice catcher and bullpen coach for the '82 All-Star game in Montreal.

YANKEES '76-'77: In '76, he played in 26 games for the Yankees after the June 15 trade from Baltimore and batted .210 (57-12).

Spent '77 shuttling between New York and Syracuse. He played in only 10 games for the Yankees and was not eligible for post-season play.

ORIOLES '68-'76: Ellie had been with the O's for nearly 9 full years when he was traded to the Cubs for **Tommy Davis** in Aug. '72...However, when the season ended, he was reacquired by Baltimore.

100 Games/Year: Played in more than 100 games in each of the O's 3 pennant-winning seasons of '69, '70, '71...He and **Andy Etchebarren** more or less split the regular catching job from '68 thru '71.

Weaver/Lane: **Earl Weaver** and **Frank Lane** were instrumental in convincing the O's to draft him from the Angels' AAA Seattle affiliate in Nov. '67...Played for **Weaver** in Puerto Rico previously and **Lane** had scouted him in Mexico.

ALCS/WS: He compiled a .273 (66-18) average in 23 post-season games for the O's and Yankees (comprising five league championship series and four World Series).

'70 WS: Hit .364 (11-4) against the Reds with a home run and double and contributed significantly to the O's wins at Cincinnati in games #1 and #2.

In the opener, the Reds jumped out 3-0, but Ellie tied it in the 5th with a home run off **Gary Nolan** and the O's went on to win on **Brooks**' homer in the 7th...There was a play in the Cincinnati 6th in which Ellie was involved and that was as important as the home run.

"Carbo-Burkhart" Incident: One inning after Ellie had tied the game with his home run, the Reds had **Bernie Carbo** on 3rd representing the lead run, and only one out (**Brooks** had retired **Lee May** leading off the inning on a sensational play).

Pinch-hitter **Ty Cline** then chopped a high bouncer in front of the plate...As Ellie went out and grabbed it, **Carbo** headed home. Ellie dove and tagged **Carbo** a few feet up the line and umpire **Ken Burkhart**, who had been spun around by the players as they converged so that his back was to the play, called **Carbo** out.

Films later revealed that Ellie had tagged **Carbo** with one hand while holding the ball in the other, and that **Carbo** had missed the plate.

EARLY CAREER

PUERTO RICO: Ellie played for Santurce in the Puerto Rican Winter League each year from '60-'77, except in '71 when the O's went to Japan...His 112 homers in that loop rank him 2nd on the all-time list to former St. Louis Browns outfielder **Willard Brown** (120).

MINORS: He enjoyed his best minor league seasons in Jalisco in the Mexican League (AAA) where he hit 109 homers in 4 years and was known as the "Babe Ruth of Mexico"...In last season there ('67), he led the league in homers (41) and was 2nd in rbi (112).

ELROD HENDRICKS (Cont.)

He started his career in the Milwaukee Braves' organization ('58-'60), then spent 2 years at Winnipeg in the Cardinals' system ('62-'63) before going to Mexico.

PERSONAL: One of the most popular personalities ever to wear an Orioles uniform...He is very active in community projects in the Baltimore area...Speaks fluent Spanish...Plays the flute.

Chosen "Man of the Year" by the Orioles Advocates in '89. Received the first "Jack Dunn Memorial Service Award," named after the late Orioles executive and presented by the Maryland Professional Baseball Players Association in Jan. '88 at the 35th Annual Tops in Sports Banquet...Elle received the award for his "many selfless years of service to the community."

He was also selected the first "Man of the Year" by the Baltimore chapter of the National Conference of Christians and Jews in Feb. '83 and the Special Olympics "Man of the Year" in '87.

He received Towson State University's Distinguished Black Marylander Award in a ceremony sponsored by the university's Office of Minority Affairs.

He has operated two 3-week baseball camps for youngsters the past 9 summers at McDonogh School in Owings Mills.

He and his wife, **Merle**, were married Jan. 14, '70 and are the parents of two sons: **Ryan** (8/3/72) and **Ian Christopher** (11/28/76). They have lived in the Randallstown area, near Baltimore, since the early '70s.

Has 4 children by a previous marriage: **Abegail** (7/13/62), **Elrod Jr.** (4/7/64), **Elroy** (10/1/65), and **Berecia** (8/25/67).



PITCHING COACH: Al went to Japan last fall as pitching coach for the Major League All-Stars. In 1989, he became the Orioles' 7th pitching coach; the 5th in a 5-year span...This is his 2nd assignment as a major league pitching coach...He held that post between '77-'79 with the Red Sox under **Don Zimmer**.

COACHING CAREER: His playing career ended on Apr 13, '70...Following that, he has served as a minor league coach or manager in the Mets system for 16 years, spent 3 years with the Red Sox (see above) and 2 with the O's.

While in the Mets' system, he was a roving minor league pitching instructor for a combined total of 12 years, '70-'75, '80, '82 and '85-'88...He managed in the Appalachian League in '76 (Marion) and '81 (Kingsport) and was a coach at Tidewater in the International League, '83-'84.

THREE FROM SAME CLAN: Three members of the same family in the same uniform at the same time is a rarity, matched only 3 times before in baseball history: 1973-**Jose, Hector & Tommy Cruz** for St. Louis; 1963-**Felipe, Matty & Jesus Alou** for San Francisco; 1876-**George, Sam & Harry Wright** for Boston in the National League (**Harry**, a Hall of Famer, was the manager and pitched briefly; **George** was an outfielder-70 games in '76; and **Sam**, a shortstop appeared in only 2 games that year. We're assuming they were all in uniform together).

MANAGING: Has managed for 14 and a fraction seasons in professional baseball, all in the Orioles' organization. Following the '86 season he replaced **Earl Weaver** to become only the 7th "non-interim" manager in the club's 34-year history (excluded are **Luman Harris** who finished out the '61 season after **Paul Richards**

resigned in late August, and Cal, himself, who bridged the gap for one game between **Joe Altobelli** and **Earl Weaver** in '85.

Cal was replaced by **Frank Robinson** on Apr 12, '88, after the O's lost the first 6 games of the season (a streak that went to 21 before it ended)...His overall record as manager was 68-101, .402.

He began his managing career at Leesburg, FL on June 7, '61, as a replacement for **Billy DeMars**, who had just been promoted to a Class B league. After 10 weeks on the job, he was rushed to Rochester (Aug 17) for emergency duty as a catcher, and was replaced at the Leesburg helm by **Ray Scarborough**, then a scout for the O's.

Cal had only 2 losing records in the minors: In '62, his 1st full season as a manager and his last as a player, and '67 at Miami.

He won the 1st of 2 pennants at Aberdeen, SD by 12 games in '64 with a club that included 7 players who would ultimately play in the majors: **Jim Palmer**, **Lou Piniella**, **Mark Belanger**, **Andy Etchebarren**, **Eddie Watt**, **Dave Leonhard**, and **Mike Flore**.

That '64 club went 81-34, and Cal was the Northern League's Manager of the Year...Former Orioles' 3rd base coach, **Jimmy Williams**, managed at Grand Forks, ND in the same league for the Dodgers that year. He finished 1st again in '72 at Asheville in the AA Southern League...Preceded **Joe Altobelli** at Rochester in '69 & '70.

EJECTIONS: Senior has been ejected 28 times in the big leagues, 20 as 3rd base coach and 8 as a manager (all in '87)...Dale Ford, Mark Johnson, and the late Bill Kunkel have been his most frequent ejectors, 3 times each...Tied for 2nd at 2 apiece are **Rocky Roe**, **Durwood Merrill**, and **Greg Kosc**.

During Cal's full year as manager in '87, the umpiring team of **Larry Barnett-Kosc-Roe** and **Tim Tschida** accounted for 5 of his 8 dismissals.

SCOUTING: In '75, he turned to scouting, primarily at the professional level, but he also did some free agent scouting and served as a "trouble shooter" in the farm system.

PLAYING CAREER: Rip was a catcher in the O's organization although he also played some 3rd base and outfield and even pitched. He enjoyed his best year under **Earl Weaver** at Fox Cities (Appleton, WI) in '60. He became a player-manager the following year.

His .333 (18-6) average as a pinch-hitter was 3rd in the AL among those with 20 or more plate appearances.

Sore left shoulder prevented him from playing defensively until Apr 29, but he made the most out of his dh and ph appearances that month going 4-for-10 (.400) with 6 walks and 2 "sudden death" game-winning rbi: a bases-loaded walk off Detroit's **Mike Henneman** (one of his 4 walks that game) on Apr 22 and a single off California's **Mike Witt** on Apr 30.



Milwaukee's **Ted Higuera**...That win was his 1st at Memorial Stadium in over a year (since Sep 20, '89).

Began the season as the O's #2 starter...O's scored 12 runs in his first 7 starts (while he went 0-5, 3.92)...Had no decision in next start before winning at Texas in his 9th start...Following that victory, he went 6-4 in next 6 starts and moved to the bullpen with a 1-9 record and a 5.28 era to begin the month of July.

Made the 1st relief appearance of his career on July 3 at Texas, after 8 ML starts...The remainder of the season he made 29 appearances, 27 in relief.

Was 1-10 (5.09, ip-97.1, h-115, er-55) in 17 starts and 1-1 (4.50, ip-36, h-37, er-18) in 27 relief app's...O's scored 23 runs in his 10 losses as a starter. Quickest to Reach 8 Wins: Continued hot thru his 1st 11 starts and on June 5 was 9-1 (2.12, ip-72.1, h-70, r-18, er-17, bb-18, so-18)...Only loss came at home to Seattle's **Scott Bankhead**, 6-5...Handed Oakland's **Dave Stewart** his 1st loss (after a 6-0 start) at home on May 11, 6-2, to tie Stewart for AL victory lead...Win #8 at Cleveland, 5-2 on May 26, pushed the Orioles into 1st place, beginning a stretch of 98 straight days in the top spot...Reached 8 wins quicker than any pitcher in Orioles' history.

The O's scored 198 runs in his 35 starts, 5.7 runs per start, best on the staff...O's had 11 games when they hit 3 or more homers—8 came with Ballard on the mound.

Tied with **Dennis Eckersley** and teammate **Gregg Olson** for 6th place in the BBWAA's Cy Young voting (3 points apiece).

1988 SEASON: Although he wasn't recalled from Rochester until May 19, tied for the O's lead in wins (8) with **Dave Schmidt**, and topped all O's pitchers in complete games (6)...He was the only lefthanded starter to win a game for the Birds.

Was the only Oriole to pitch 2 consecutive complete game wins when he blanked the Brewers on a 3-hitter, 5-0, at Milwaukee on Aug 13, then downed the A's on a 4-hitter, 10-1, on Aug 18...His best month was August when he was 3-2 (era-2.20, ip-45, er-11).



Davis was honored with the Giamatti award for his charitable works in Houston and his hometown of Columbus, GA, including the Carpenter's Way Ranch, heretofore known as the Glenn Davis Home for Boys and Teresa Davis Home for Girls, in Columbus...The Orioles' Cal Ripken won the 1st award in 1990...For more details see below under "The Carpenter's Way Ranch".

In making the announcement of the Gehrig award, Robert J. Miller, executive president of the fraternity said, "Davis is the type of admirable professional who stands out as a humanitarian in an era of self interest."

JAPAN: He has twice gone to Japan with a major league all-star team to play a comparable group of Japanese professionals from the Central and Pacific Leagues ('86 & '90)...In '86 he batted .278 (18-5) with 2 homers & 5 rbi for a club that went 6-1 (Cal Ripken was a teammate)...Last year, he hit .250 (20-5) with one home run and 4 rbi...In that most recent tour, the Americans went 3-4 with 1 tie.

1990 AND MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER

HOME RUNS: In his career, has averaged one home run every 18.3 at bats, the 11th best average in the majors (minimum 100 career homers). That breaks down to one home run every 16.02 at bats away from the Astrodome and one every 21.19 at the Dome. Since Davis' career began in 1984, the Astrodome has been the 2nd toughest stadium in which to hit a home run, trailing only St. Louis (559 to 600).

Is one of 11 active major leaguers with three 30+ homer seasons.

Multi-Homer Games: Had two 2-homer games and a 3-homer game in '90...Has had 10 multi-homer games, none at the Astrodome.





Made 121 starts for the Red Sox, all from the designated hitter spot due to a bone spur in his lower back...Although his 13 homers snapped a string of 9 straight 20+ homer seasons, 10 of those homers tied the score or put Boston ahead...His last 7 homers put the Sox ahead (see below under "Late Homers").

Of his 63 rbi, 29 were game-tying or go-ahead, including a club-high 12 after the 7th inning...Had 14 gwrbi, 2 in final pennant-clinching series against Chicago, Oct 1-3, and 4 in 10 games against the Orioles.

Was on the disabled list, July 14-30, but returned to hit .306 (85-26) after Aug 24 in his last 24 games to raise his average from .236 to .249.

MISCELLANEOUS: Batted .484 (31-15) with one homer and 10 rbi in 8 games vs Detroit...Came up with the bases loaded 21 times and went 4-for-14 (.286) with 4 walks and 3 sac flies...Batted .270 (122-33) with men in scoring position...His 445 at bats as a dh were 3rd most in the league.

Opening Day: Has hit 5 Opening Day home runs, one shy of the AL record shared by **Brooks Robinson**, **Carl Yastrzemski** and **Babe Ruth**...**Frank Robinson** holds the major league record of 8.

Fireworks: Has hit 5 home runs on July 4 (he's hit .333, 51-17, hr-5, rbi-13 on Independence Day), including his lone inside-the-park effort (1988 at KC off **Ted Power**).

Favorite Targets: Hit 7 career homers off former Oakland A's pitcher **Steve McCatty**, most off one pitcher...Others who have been hit frequently by Dwight include: Oakland's **Mike Moore** (6); **Jim Slaton**, who spent most of his 16 years with Milwaukee (6); **Jim Clancy** (5); **Dennis Martinez** (5); and **Jack Morris** (5)...Other active pitchers who have been favorites are: **Dennis Eckersley** (4); **Dan Petry** (4); **Scott Bailes** (4); and **Charlie Hough** (4).

FIELDING, 8 GOLD GLOVES: Has won 8 Rawlings Gold Glove Awards...Since award began in 1957, only 3 outfielders have won more: Roberto Clemente (12), Willie Mays (12) and Al Kaline (10)...Paul Blair, Gary Maddox and Andre Dawson also have won 8...Dwight won the award in 1976-78-79-81-82-83-84-85.

Last played defensively Aug 2, '89, right field vs the Orioles at Fenway...Has 151 career outfield assists with a high of 15 in '75-'76-'79...Has played 143 games at 1st base (tc-1169, e-19) all coming in '87-'88...Last played 1b July 16, '88...His career fielding mark as an outfielder (.9872, tc-1463, e-57), is 12th among active major league outfielders (min. 500 games)...Played in 1,970 major league games before his 1st infield appearance at 1st base on May 20, '87.

POST-SEASON: In 2 World Series appearances he has a .300 career average (50-15) with 14 rbi in 14 games...In '86 he drove in 13 post-season runs, including a Red Sox record 9 in the World Series...Homered off the Mets' **Dwight Gooden** and **Ron Darling** in the series and California's **Don Sutton** in the LCS...In game #7 loss to the Mets, his homer off Darling put Sox up 1-0 and his 2-run double in the 8th cut a Mets' 6-3 lead to one run...In '75 series, in losing effort against the Reds, the 23-year-old Evans hit a game-tying homer in the 9th inning of game #3, a 2-run triple in game #4 and made a game-saving catch in game #6 in rf corner at Fenway on a drive hit by **Joe Morgan**.





Joined the Orioles at mid-season, made 6 relief appearances before moving into the rotation and then became the 1st Oriole ever to win his 1st 5 major league starts and 1st 6 major league decisions...First major leaguer to win his 1st 5 starts since the Dodgers' Fernando Valenzuela, who won his 1st 8 in 1981.

Among AL pitchers with 100+ innings pitched, McDonald was:

-5th in the AL in era (2.43);

-1st in fewest base runners per 9 innings (9.33);

-2nd in lowest batting average against (.205) behind Nolan Ryan (.188). Held lefthanders to a .181 (216-39) average, lowest in the AL...Opposition batted .128 (78-10) with men in scoring position.

Was named AL's best pitching prospect in a poll of league managers by The Toronto Sun.

In his 15 starts, he allowed 2 earned runs or less 11 times; 5 hits or less 10 times; and pitched 7 or more innings 11 times.

Led all AL rookies in era, tied for 1st in complete games (3, with KC's Kevin Appier) and 2nd in winning pct (.615, behind Chicago's Scott Radinsky, .857).

SLOW START: Suffered a pulled left lateral oblique muscle (muscle connecting ribs to pelvis) while trying to field a ground ball in an exhibition game on Apr 5 against Atlanta at Miami Stadium...Went on the disabled list the next day and didn't pitch again until Apr 24 on a rehabilitation assignment at Hagerstown. Continued pitching at Hagerstown and Rochester on his rehab assignment until he was activated and optioned to Rochester on May 22.

IT SEEMS IT WAS THE SEAMS: While pitching at Rochester, he developed a series of persistent blisters on the middle finger of his pitching hand...It was believed the higher seams on the International League ball led to the problem...Orioles General Manager Roland Hemond sent

a dozen major league balls to Rochester and McDonald pitched a simulated game in the bullpen with the ML balls...The blister did not reappear and he was recalled by the Orioles on July 3.

FIRST ML START: Became the 4th Oriole ever to throw a shutout in his first ML start when on July 21 he pitched a 4-hitter at home beating Chicago, 2-0...Threw 85 pitches, struck out 5 and walked one...Joined Tom Phoebus (Sep 15, '66); Dave McNally (Sep 26, '62) and Charlie Beaman (Sep 26, '56) as the only Orioles to throw a shutout in 1st ML start (note: Phoebus did it in each of his 1st 2 starts)...Was the youngest Oriole (at 22 years/8 months) to throw a shutout since **Storm Davis** (21 years/6 months) in 1983.

WIN STREAK: Was 5-0 after his 1st 5 starts (1.72, ip-36.2, h-25, er-7) with wins over Chicago (2-0 on July 21), Kansas City (9-2 on July 27), Toronto (6-4 on July 31), Oakland (4-1 on Aug 8) and Seattle (3-2 on Aug 13).

LOSS STREAK: Suffered his 1st major league loss at home against Oakland on Aug 18, 3-1 to **Gene Nelson** in his 6th start...Lost his next 3 starts while the O's scored 6 runs in those 4 starts...Was 0-4 (5.04, ip-25, er-14) during the loss streak...Broke loss streak with a 6-2 win over California on Sep 7.

STRONG FINISH: Went 3-1 in his last 6 starts (1.90, ip-47.1, h-30, er-10)...Went 8 or more innings in 5 of his last 6 starts, including a 3-hit, 2-1 win over Detroit's **Jack Morris** and his 2nd 4-hit shutout, 2-0 at Cleveland...Allowed more than 5 hits only once during that span.

MISCELLANEOUS: Had a 0-2, 11.05 era in 2 starts against the Red Sox and 8-3 (1.86) against the rest of the AL...O's scored 3 runs or less in 11 of his 15 starts.

1989 HIGHLIGHTS

#1 DRAFT PICK: Was the 1st player selected in the baseball's free agent draft June 5...First time O's have had the top pick...It marked the 1st time in the history of the draft (since 1965) that a team had the selected 1st while in 1st place...Ben received the highest rating ever for a pitcher by the major league baseball scouting bureau...Signed with the Orioles Aug 19.

PRO DEBUT: Four days after signing with the Orioles, he made his pro debut with 3 innings on Aug 23, pitching for the Class A Frederick (MD) Keys at home against Winston-Salem (Cubs) in the Carolina League (ip-3, h-5, r-1, er-1, bb-0, so-2)...Approximately 6,500 fans attended his debut at Frederick. His other minor league appearance came Aug 27 at Frederick against Durham (Braves) and he worked 6 innings (h-5, r-1, er-1, bb-0, so-8)...Threw 55 pitches (47 strikes/8 balls), including 34 straight strikes at one point.

'89, ML DEBUT: Recalled by the Orioles on Sep 1...Made his major league debut at home vs Cleveland on Sep 6 and on 1st pitch he got **Cory Snyder** to hit into a double play...Earned 1st major league win on the last day of season with one scoreless inning at Toronto in O's 7-5 triumph...Allowed his 1st major league homer at Texas to **Pete Incaviglia** on Sep 8.

Played for the Orioles instructional league team in Sarasota and was 1-0 (4.09, ip 11, h-12, er-5, bb-4, so-7) in 3 games, one start.

AMATEUR CAREER

GOLDEN SPIKES AWARD: Was the recipient of amateur baseball's highest individual honor in 1989—the Golden Spikes Award presented annually by the U.S. Baseball Federation, the governing body for amateur baseball in the United States, to the nation's most outstanding amateur player.

COLLEGE: Grew up 12 miles from Louisiana State University and originally attended LSU on a basketball scholarship...Played basketball and baseball for 2 years, baseball only in his final year (junior year)...As a junior, was Baseball America's College Player of the Year and ESPN's co-Player of the Year with University of Texas outfielder **Scott Bryant**...Was 14-4 with 4 saves and a 3.49 era. He fanned 202 batters in 152 innings while helping lead LSU to a 52-15 regular season record and a berth in the College World Series.

Set LSU strikeout record for season and career (373). Established Southeastern Conference record with a streak of 44.2 consecutive scoreless innings...Struck out 15 of 19 batters he faced in a win over Stephen F. Austin on Mar 24.

BEN MCDONALD (cont)

One month earlier, he shut out Oklahoma State at the New Orleans Superdome, the 1st time the Cowboys had been blanked since '85. In his 3-year career at Louisiana State, McDonald was 29-14 with 6 saves, and fanned 373 batters in 308.1 innings...Two time All-American.

OLYMPICS: During the 1988 Olympic Games in Seoul, Korea, McDonald threw complete game wins over Puerto Rico (7-2) and Korea (5-3, 11 Ks) while leading the USA to the Gold Medal.

Olympic stats: 2-0, g-2, era-1.00, ip-18, h-16, er-2, bb-4, so-17...Was 6-2 during the pre-Olympic tour, including 16 innings of shutout ball at the World Amateur Baseball Championships at Grosseto, Italy...Was the team's 2nd leading hurler behind the Angels' Jim Abbott.

HIGH SCHOOL: Was all-state as a football placekicker and punter, basketball center as well as a pitcher and 1st baseman at Denham Springs (LA) High School...McDonald compiled a 33-7 career high school mark. Following his senior season in 1986, he was selected on the 20th round by the Atlanta Braves in the June free agent draft. He chose to attend LSU instead.

His final 3 homers came against lefthanders at home, Aug 2 off Kansas City's **Pete Filson**, Aug 18 off Oakland's **Curt Young** and Sep 8 off California's **Chuck Finley**.

AT BAT: Enjoyed batting success in May and September...Hit .321 in May (.56-18) and .319 in September (47-15)...Had five 3-hit games...He drove in 3 runs in a game, May 25, at Texas...From Aug 2 until the end of the season, Oct 3, he did not go hitless in consecutive games.

Allowed only one run in his 1st 21 app's (0.26, ip-34, h-15) thru June 7 while converting his 1st 14 saves...Continued strong thru Aug 18, (47 games) allowing only 34 hits and 7 earned runs in 59 innings (1.07).

LIFE AFTER THE STREAK: After finally allowing a run on May 7, he went another 12 appearances (17.2 innings) before yielding another on June 8 vs the Yankees in his 1st blown save. Until that game, he had allowed only one run over his last 60.2 innings.

Cover Explanation

The Memorial Stadium caricature on the cover, by the talented Lancaster, PA illustrator **Bot Roda**, contains a few items that might require some explanation.

The 15-star, 15-stripe American Flag is a replica of the one that flew over Ft McHenry that night in 1814 when Francis Scott Key wrote those immortal words. The replica has often been flown from our centerfield flag pole.

The flag that says "Here" (behind the leftfield stands) shows the point at which **Frank Robinson's** home run of May 8, '66 left the premises. That blast, off Cleveland's **Luis Tiant**, remains the only one that has ever been hit completely out of this ballpark.

That figure lying on the ground near 3rd base with a ball in his glove is, of course, **Brooks Robinson** after making one of the many sensational plays for which he was so famous.

THE RIPKEN BROTHERS

BROTHERS AT THE KEYSTONE: Cal and Bill Ripken are the 5th set of brothers to form a 2nd base-shortstop combination in major league history: **Granny and Garvin Hamner** of the 1945 Phillies; **Lou and Dino Chiozza** of the 1935 Phillies; **Milt and Frank Bolling** of the 1958 Tigers and **Eddie and Johnny O'Brien** of the 1953-55-56 Pirates.

Since Bill broke into the major leagues in 1987, the two Ripkens have now played in 451 games together; started 428 games and turned 202 double plays...Prior to the Ripkens, the most any brother double play combination had ever played side-by-side in the majors were Pittsburgh's **O'Brien** twins who appeared in approximately 100 games together.

Fewest Errors ever by a DP Combo: Cal and Bill accounted for a total of only 11 errors in 1990...That amounted to the fewest total errors in major league history by a qualifying keystone combination (i.e. both infielders qualifying for the fielding title by each playing 2/3 of a club's scheduled games).

The next 2 lowest totals were also set in 1990: Toronto's **Tony Fernandez** and **Manny Lee** (13 errors) and St. Louis' **Ozzie Smith** and **Jose Oquendo** (15)...Before that, the lowest total was 16 errors by Philadelphia's **Larry Bowa** and **Manny Trillo** in '79 and Cincinnati's **Dave Concepcion** and **Joe Morgan** in '77.

In '88, the 2 participated in 229 double plays, only once Orioles' history has there been more ('74 **Grich/Belanger**-232). That season the 2 also topped all keystone combinations in total chances (1,546).

On Aug 2, '89, Bill had a career-high 4 hits and Cal had 3 to help the Orioles overcome a 6-0 deficit and win 9-8...Unofficial research by **Al Kermisch** reveals the probability that only once has a brother combination surpassed that total...On June 25, '32, **Paul** (3) and **Lloyd Waner** (5) combined for 8 hits in a game for the Pirates.

In '90 he was one of 3 major leaguers to play in all of his team's games, along with **Roberto Kelly** (NYY) and **Joe Carter** (San Diego)...Cal led the league's shortstops in games for the 6th time to set an AL record (**Luis Aparicio** had led 5 times) and tie the major league standard (more under "Ironman").

TALLEST: Is the tallest ever to play shortstop regularly in the majors...**Ray Busse** (Houston, '71-'74), and former Orioles **Enos Cabell** and **Jamie Quirk**, are among 7 others 6'4" tall who have played some shortstop.

1990 SEASON

Here are some of Cal's accomplishments during this remarkable, record-breaking year:

- Won the **Lou Hatter** Most Valuable Oriole award outright for the 1st time after sharing it with **Eddie Murray** twice before.
- Broke at least 11 major league or AL records.
- Created an all-time standard for consistency at shortstop by committing only 3 errors in 161 games (681 total chances) for a major league record percentage of .996...See "Fielding" below.
- Set major league marks for consecutive errorless games (95) and consecutive chances without error (431).
- Was the AL's starting shortstop in the All-Star game for the 7th straight year, a league record and surpassed only by **Ozzie Smith's** 8 straight starts for the NL.
- Became the most prolific home run hitting shortstop in AL history (217 while playing the position, 223 lifetime), surpassing the late **Vernon Stephens** (213)...Note: **Ernie Banks** holds the major league record for shortstops at 293.
- Broke the 20 barrier in home runs for the 9th straight year, extending his major league record for shortstops (**Ernie Banks**, the previous record-holder, did it 7 straight times while playing that position)...Cal is one of only 12 major leaguers to have hit 20 or more in each of his

1st 9 full seasons...He and the Phillies' **Dale Murphy** are the only actives who hold that distinction ('82 thru '90).

SLOW START: Nothing seemed to go right for Cal at the plate until the middle of June. The O's had played more than a third of their games (59) when Cal was dropped to 6th in the order (from the #3 position) on June 13. Thru that date he was batting only .209 (220-46) with 7 homers and 30 rbi. Over the rest of the season (102 games), he hit .274 (380-104) with 14 home runs and 54 rbi.

It was the 4th time he's been victimized by a bad beginning. In '82 (his 1st full year) he was 7-for-60 (.117) in his 1st 18 games; in '88 Cal went 2-for-43 (.047) in his 1st 12 games (including an 0-for-29 stretch, his longest career hitless string), and in '89 was 4-for-36 after 9 games.

BATTING HIGHLIGHTS: Despite his early troubles, Cal led the O's in runs (78), hits (150), doubles (28, tied with **Brother Bill**), triples (4), homers (21), rbi (84), walks (82, 10th in AL), and intentional walks (18, 2nd in league to **Wade Boggs** 19).

He was also tops on the team with 39 game-tying/go-ahead rbi (11 in the 7th inning or later). **Randy Milligan** was 2nd with 25. Cal was also credited with a club-leading 16 game-winning rbi. He drove in the game's decisive run in 10 of the O's last 28 victories (beginning July 28, 2nd game).

Hit only .204 (167-34) with runners in scoring position, and batted .222 (27-6) with the bases loaded...He went 1-for-17 in that situation at the start, then 5-for-10 from then on...See "In the Clutch" and "Bases Loaded" under "Major League Highlights" below for more details.

From June 14 thru July 5, he hit safely in 18 of 20 games and batted .383 (81-31), raising his average from .209 to .256...He drove in 4 runs on Aug 3 vs KC and had a pair of 2-homer games: May 12 at Oakland and Aug 3 at Baltimore vs. KC.

Cal had 10 3-hit games, most by an Oriole and including 4 straight games from June 21 thru 24 during which he went 12-for-16. Cal also enjoyed the Orioles' longest batting streak (12 games, Sep 8 thru 21).

Hit for his lowest average for a full season in the AL and his 21 homers tied for his lowest total in his 9 full campaigns.

Cal led all major league shortstops in home runs, but was 2nd in rbi to the Tigers' **Alan Trammell** (89)...Cal has been the big league leader at his position in homers 7 times in the last 8 years (exception: Trammell '87), and in rbi 6 of the last 8 years (exceptions: Trammell '87 & '90).

On Sep 15 at Toronto, he and **Bill** became the first brothers to hit homers in the same inning since **Hank** and the late **Tommy Aaron** collaborated 28 years earlier in 1962 for the Braves...The victim of both Ripken clouts was the Jays' **David Wells**.

MEN ON BASE: Overall despite his club leading totals in key runs driven in, Cal batted only .204 (167-34) with runners in scoring position, and hit just .227 (27-6) with the bases loaded (see "Bases Loaded" below under "Career Highlights").

SEPTEMBER: Went 1-for-25 at the start of September and would up with a .215 (121-26) average for Sep-Oct...He hit only .198 (101-20) in '89 and .216 (102-22) in '88 during Sep-Oct...So, he's batting only .210 (324-68) during that time frame over the last 3 years.

IRONMAN

Consecutive Games: The 1,411-game streak began May 30, '82, the day after **Floyd Rayford** started in his place at 3rd base in the 2nd game of a doubleheader vs. the Blue Jays at Baltimore. It has been the longest streak in the majors since **Dale Murphy's** 740-game skein ended July 9, '86.

LONGEST O'S STREAKS: The 3 longest streaks previous to Cal's in Orioles history were by **Brooks Robinson** (463), **Eddie Murray** (44) and **Billy Gardner** (361)...Cal, who has played in every Orioles game in each of the last 8 years, is one of 5 Orioles to have played every game in a season at least once: **Brooks** and **Murray** 4 times, **Gardner** and **Bobby Grich**, once each.

MOST AT ONE POSITION: Beginning July 1, '82, Cal has played 1,384 consecutive games at short, more than anyone has ever played at a single position...For the first month of the streak, Cal was primarily a 3rd baseman...He made his last start there on June 30, '82.

Everett Scott, also a shortstop who played most of his big league career (14-26) with the Red Sox and Yankees, held the previous record for most consecutive games at one position (1,307)...**Scott**, incidentally, played 109 games for **Jack Dunn's** International League O's, and batted .335 with 11 home runs in '27...Note that Scott's streak, surpassed by Cal in '90, remains the 3rd longest all-time regardless of position.

Innings: During his current 1,411-game string, the Orioles have played 13,887 regular season innings, and Cal has played a part in 13,826 of them (99.6%)...He has exited before the final out only 19 times during the streak, including 11 early-outs in '90 during which he played 1,446 of a possible 1,476 innings.

Consecutive Innings Record: His streak of 8,243 straight innings (spanning 904 games) is believed to be the longest of its kind in major league history. It began **June 5, '82** (6 days and 5 games after the start of his consecutive games string) at Minnesota. The day before (June 4), **Jim Dwyer** had pinch hit for him in the 9th inning, also at Minnesota...The 82 post-season innings he played in '83 are NOT included in these figures.

The innings streak ended **Sep 14, '87** in Toronto when he didn't take the field for the bottom of the 8th in an 18-3 Toronto walkover (**Ron Washington** replaced him defensively)...That was the game in which the Jays hit a major league record 10 home runs.

Noted baseball researcher **L. Robert Davids** determined some years ago that the previous leaders in the consecutive innings category were a couple of former Red Sox who played in the Hub City during the early 1900s—**Buck Freeman** and **Candy LaChance**. **Freeman**, a 1st baseman, played every inning over some 534 games (7/28/01-6/5/05), and out-fielder **LaChance** missed nary a canto over a span of 424 games (5/23/02 to 4/28/05).

Rip, whose innings streak covered some 5 1/2 seasons, was the 1st to have played every inning for at least 2 straight years since **Rudy York** with the Tigers in '40-'41...In addition to Cal & **Freeman**, only one other major leaguer has played every inning for at least 3 years (not necessarily consecutive).

...That was "Marcus Hook" **Mickey Vernon** in '42, '47 & '53 with those pesky Nats...The only other Oriole to play every inning in one season was **Eddie Murray** in '84 (including 3 games as dh).

FIELDING

In '90, Cal was 4th in the A.L. in putouts, assists, total chances and double plays...Why didn't he rank higher in those categories considering he played every game? Perhaps, the fact that the Orioles led the league in outfield putouts explains it best.

He has led league shortstops in putouts 3 times, assists 5 times (in the last 8 years), total chances 3 times and double plays 4 times.

HIGHEST PERCENTAGE/FEWEST ERRORS: Cal's .996 fielding percentage and 3 errors shattered the previous records set only a year earlier by Toronto's **Tony Fernandez** (.992, 6 errors)...In '89 Cal finished close behind Fernandez with a .990 percentage (8 errors) while leading the league in chances, putouts, assists and double plays. The average regular shortstop has committed 18 errors annually over the past 5 seasons.

CONSECUTIVE ERRORLESS GAMES/CHANCES: After fumbling a ground ball on April 13 in the 3rd game of the season, Cal went 95 games and 431 chances before committing his 2nd miscue (ground ball miff also) 3 1/2 months later, on July 28 (1st game) at K.C. The victims of that remarkable run were:

•**Eddie Brinkman's** AL marks of 72 consecutive errorless games (in '72) and 331 straight errorless chances in one season ('72) both perished...Brinkman had also held the AL mark for highest fielding percentage (.990) until **Fernandez** broke it in '89.

•**Buddy Kerr**, a scout for the Mets who watches a lot of games in Baltimore, held the previous big league mark for consecutive chances accepted league without error (383, '46 & '47 for NY Giants), and

•**Kevin Elster**, the Mets shortstop, whose 88 games in a row without error in '88 and '89 were downgraded from a major league to a NL record.

Cal made his 3rd and final '90 error, a wild throw, on Sep 1 at Milwaukee, then played the last 30 games of the year without any further miscues...His longest errorless string before 1990 was 47 games (239 chances) from Aug 5 thru Sep 23, '89...He had a 37-game streak at short in '87 (June 28 thru Aug 9), and a 44-game skein at 3rd base in '82 (Apr 24 thru June 14).

ASSISTS RECORD: In '84 he established an A.L. record with 583 assists, breaking **Roy Smalley's** '79 mark of 572. That year, he also led major league shortstops in total chances (906).

NET CHANCES: His 880 successful total chances (net chances, excluding errors) in '84 were the most by an A.L. shortstop since the Twins' **Leo Cardenas** handled the same number in '69.

The only major league shortstop to have handled more errorless chances in one season since World War II was the Cardinals' **Ozzie Smith** (909 in '80).

Cal has led league in net chances 3 times ('83-806, '84-880, '89-807); finished 2nd twice ('85 when **Fernandez** beat him out for league leadership by one chance, 761 to 760, & '88), and 3rd once ('86).

CAL RIPPEN JR (cont).

3B TO SS: Played both 3rd and short after 1st coming up in August '81, but started '82 as O's regular 3rd baseman...In 77 games at 3rd (81-6, '82-71), he has a .971 percentage (tc-232, e-7). Played there the last time July 8, '82 at Seattle, after starting game at shortstop...Started for the last time at 3rd on June 30, '82 in Baltimore vs Cleveland.

Since moving permanently to shortstop in '82, Cal has played with 22nd basemen and 29 3rd basemen.

ON TARGET: During his last 356 games beginning Aug 26, '88 (an inning after he'd thrown a ball away at Oakland), Cal has made 1,067 throws for the record (i.e. assists), and only 3 have gone awry for errors.

ALL-STAR GAMES: Has opened at shortstop for the A.L. for the past 7 seasons, the elected starter in 6 of those instances ('84 thru '87, '89-'90), a record for consecutive starts by an A.L. shortstop. **Ozzie Smith**, who has started the last 8 games, holds the N.L. record. For total starts at short, not necessarily consecutive, Cal is tied with the late Joe Cronin who also opened in 7 games for the Red Sox and Senators...Luis Aparicio started 6 times.

In '88, Cal finished 2nd in the voting to the Tigers' Alan Trammell, but started anyway when the Detroit star had to withdraw because of injury. Cal's 7 starts in a row are also a club record (for any position). Brooks once started 5 straight from '64 thru '68, but still holds the Orioles' standard for most overall starts (10 years, 11 games—2 in '61).

Rip Junior has twice led the A.L. in votes—'85 (1,398,901) and '86 (1,486,806)

He made his debut in '83 as a defensive replacement for starter Robin Yount after being appointed to the squad...He's 3-for-20...He doubled off Montreal's Tim Burke at Anaheim in '89; singled off Nolan Ryan at Minnesota in '85, and off Rick Sutcliffe at Oakland in '87...Note all 3 hits have come in A.L. parks.

ARTIFICIAL TURF: Batted .303 (89-270) on artificial turf in '90 (.241 on the real stuff, 123-for-511), and now has a career carpet average of .302 (881-266) in Royals Stadium, the Metrodome, the Kingdome, and the Sky Dome combined. **Brother Bill** hit .389 (54-21) on ersatz grass last year.

CYCLE: Opponents have hit for the cycle 5 times against the Orioles (see page 23), but only 2 O's have performed that trick in 36 seasons, Brooks Robinson and Cal...Rip did it in Texas May 6, '84...He homered off Dave Tobik in his final at bat to complete the job...He went 4-for-5 that day with 2 rbi...Brooks cycled at Chicago July 15, '60.

IN THE CLUTCH: Cal, who drove in a club high 39 tying/lead runs in '90, has finished 1st (4 times) or 2nd (5 times to Eddie Murray) on the club in each of his 9 full seasons...His year-by-year totals: '82-36 (#2); '83-33 (#2); '84-25 (#2); '85-40 (#2); '86-33 (#1); '87-40 (#1); '88-26 (#2); '89-37 (#1), '90-39 (#1)...Total: 309.

His 16 gw RBI (the now defunct statistic) also led the club in '90 and raised his career total to 114, 4th on the O's all-time list (see leaders on page 19).

With men in scoring position, he batted only .204 (167-34) in '90, but is still hitting a respectable .273 (1394-380) lifetime in that situation.

BASES LOADED: With the bases loaded, Cal is batting .231 (117-27) lifetime. Until he hit safely in 5 of his last 10 trips at the end of '90, he'd been thru a 4 1/2 year trauma with 3 men aboard. Beginning at the start of '86 and extending to late July '90, he'd gone 5-for-55 in bases loaded situations, including 2-for-31 from the beginning of '89 to July '90, and 1-for-17 from the start of '90.

HOME RUNS: Has been remarkably consistent in annual home run production... His totals in 9 full years, starting '82, are: 28, 27, 27, 26, 25, 27, 23, 21, 21...His annual average is 25 even...Went 40 games without a home run in '89 (Apr 10 thru May 28), and 29 games between homers once in '88.

VS OPPONENTS: See "Orioles vs Opponents" section, pp 57-73, and Orioles individual hitting, p83, for more details...Has never missed a game against the Red Sox (117), Twins (108) and Rangers (108)...Has career high .329 average (413-136) against the Twins, the only club against which he has batted .300 lifetime. Has homered most (23 times) vs Chicago though he didn't connect against the Pale Hose in '90...He's hit 22 homers against Oakland, but his 48 rbi and .249 average vs the A's are his lowest figures against a single opponent.

Cal's 77 rbi vs Milwaukee are a high vs one club, followed by 75 vs Chicago...His 11 home runs against the Red Sox and 10 against the Rangers are lifetime lows.

On the road, he has homered 112 times total, 12 each at Minnesota Metrodome and Tiger Stadium...He finished with 10 homers at old Comiskey Park...Under roof in Minneapolis, he is batting .365 (211-77) with 42 rbi and 24 extra-base hits (2b-12) in 54 games.

RBI/EXTRA BASEHITS: Cal starts the '91 season with the distinction of having driven in more runs and having amassed more extra basehits than any player in the AL over the past 9 seasons (starting '82)...His 828 rbi in that span are 10 more than AL runner up **Dwight Evans**' 817, and his 547 extra basehits lead Evans by 12 (534)...See chart above.

JAPAN TRIPS: Has a cumulative .353 average (68-24) on 2 trips to Japan...Cal accompanied the Orioles on a 14-game trip in '84 and batted .315 (54-17) with 4 homers and 9 rbi as the O's went 8-5-1...Two years later, in '86, he accompanied a U.S. Major League All-Star team that went 6-1 against an assortment of all-stars from Japan's Central and Pacific Leagues...Cal led that team in batting (.500, 14-7, 2b-2, hr-2, rbi-6) while splitting shortstop chores with the Cardinals' **Ozzie Smith**.

EJECTIONS: Has been ejected twice, both times in Baltimore: Sep 25, '87 by **Tim Welke** (vs Yankees) and Aug 7, '89 by **Drew Coble** (vs Minnesota)...In the latter case, he was thrown out in the 1st inning with an 0-2 count on him after the 1st 2 Orioles batters had been called out on strikes...**Brother Bill** has been tossed twice, both in '90, and **Cal Sr** has been ejected a family high 28 times (see Senior's biography).

CAL RIPKEN JR (Cont.)

ON THE ROAD: He has hit better on the road than at home in 8 of his 9 full seasons, including '90 when he hit .287 on the road and .213 at Memorial Stadium. That explains why he's batting .285 (2915-830) lifetime away from home and .264 (2740-722) at Memorial Stadium.

GIDP: Bounced into 12 (10 less than in '89) to boost his career total to 174, still a long way from the club record of 297 held by Brooks Robinson...Cal does, however, hold the club mark for one season, 32 in '85.

MAJOR HONORS AND AWARDS

BART GIAMATTI "CARING AWARD": In '89 Cal was the 1st winner of this prestigious new honor, created by the Baseball Alumni Team (BAT) in honor of the late Baseball Commissioner who died Sep 1, '89.

At the time of the announcement, BAT Chairman **Ralph Branca** said, "Just as **Bart Giamatti** was a caring person, so is Cal Ripken Jr. Giamatti's devotion to baseball and education is mirrored in the things that Cal has done." Cal who has been a major community contributor for many years, had earlier joined with his wife, **Kelly**, to pledge \$250,000 to create an adult learning center in Baltimore (see "Community" below).

The award was presented the following month in New York by Giamatti's successor as commissioner, **Fay Vincent**...The '90 winner was **Glenn Davis** for the work he and his wife, **Theresa**, have done for disadvantaged children.

MOST VALUABLE ORIOLE: In his 9 full years, he's won three **Lou Hatter** Maryland Sportsboosters "MVO" awards [once outright ('90) and twice as co-winner with **Eddie Murray** ('83 & '88)]; finished 2nd 3 times ('85, '86, '89) and 3rd 3 times ('82, '84, '87).

Was runner-up to **Murray** in '85, to **Don Aase** in '86, and to **Gregg Olson** in '89...Was outpolled by **Murray** and **Jim Palmer** in '82; by **Murray** and **Mike Boddicker** in '84, and by **Larry Sheets** and **Murray** in '87.

MOST VALUABLE PLAYER, AL: In '83, he shaded teammate **Eddie Murray**, 322 to 290, to win the award as Orioles finished 1-2 in balloting...That wasn't unprecedented, however. In '66, **Frank Brooks** and **Boog** were 1-2-3 (and **Luis Aparicio** was 9th)...Cal & Eddie were the only players listed on every '83 ballot.

Became the first to win "Rookie" and "MVP" honors in back-to-back years...**Fred Lynn**, of course, had done him one better in '75 by capturing both awards in the same year.

In '89, Rip finished 3rd in the BBWAA balloting with 216 votes, behind **Robin Yount** (256) and **Ruben Sierra** (228).

ROOKIE OF THE YEAR: In '82, he registered 132 points (5-3-1 system) to beat out Twins' **Kent Hrbek** (90 points), the only other player named on all ballots. **Wade Boggs** was 3rd (10 1/2 points). Rip polled 24 1sts, and 4 2nd while **Hrbek** received 4 1sts, 23 2nd and a 3rd.

Cal is one of 6 Orioles to have won BBWAA "Rookie" honors along with: **Ron Hansen** ('60), **Curt Blefary** ('63), **Al Bumbry** ('73), **Eddie Murray** ('77) and **Gregg Olson** ('89).

PLAYER OF THE YEAR: Was chosen Major League Player of the Year in '83 by TSN, and A.L. Player of the Year by both Baseball America and TSN.

Others: Has been picked for each of the following all-star teams 5 times (all '83 thru '86 & '89): A.P. Major League All-Star team; TSN A.L. All-Star team and TSN/Hillerich & Bradsby "Silver Slugger" teams (given to most productive offensive players at every defensive position)...Was honored by the Washington Touchdown Club in January '90.

PREVIOUS HIGHLIGHTS BY YEAR

1989 SEASON: Led major league shortstops in both homers and rbi for the 6th time in last 7 years (exception: '87-**Alan Trammell**), and enjoyed a fine defensive season...His .9902 fielding percentage just missed (.0002) matching **Eddie Brinkman**'s long-standing AL record for highest percentage, but Toronto's **Tony Fernandez** did erase the Brinkman standard with a .992 (tc-741, e-6)...Cal made only 8 errors in a league leading 815 chances, and put together a career high 47 consecutive errorless game streak (239 tc).

Was named the "smartest player" in the AL in a Toronto SUN survey of managers, and finished second in the **Lou Hatter** MVO vote to **Greg Olson**. Was named to 3 all-star teams (AP major league, USA Today and TSN AL) and won his 5th Silver Slugger Award (TSN) as the most productive shortstop in the league.

Started slowly (36-4), but reached a season high of .313 on May 18...He was last at or above .300 (.301) on June 5 (216-65), then batted .235 (430-101) the rest of the way...Went 40 games without a home run from Apr 10 (**Frank Viola**) until May 29 (**Nolan Ryan**)...That was the longest homerless streak of his career.

Led the club in hits (166), doubles (30) and rbi (93) and was 2nd to **Mickey Tettleton** in homers (26 to 21)...Combined with **Brother Bill** for 7 hits (Cal-3 and Bill-4) on Aug 2, the night the O's came from a 6-0 deficit at Boston to win after losing 13 of their last 14 games.

According to **Al Kermisch**, the only brother combo to surpass that combined total was the **Waners** (**Paul** and **Lloyd**) who had 3 and 5 respectively for the Bucs on June 25, '32.

1988 SEASON: Shared "MVO" honors with **Eddie Murray** for the 2nd time...Ranked 3rd in the league with a career-high 102 walks (**Wade Boggs**-125, **Jack Clark**-113)...His hit total declined for the 5th straight year, and also had a career-low 49 extra basehits.

Hit 7 homers in his first 17 games after agreeing to a 3-year contract on July 27...Was only 2-for-43 (.047) after the 1st 12 games of the season (thru Apr 17), including an 0-for-29, the longest hitless streak of his career...Starting Apr 19, however, he launched one of his hottest streaks...Hit safely in 16 of the next 17 games, and batted .527 (55-29) while raising his average from .047 to .316 on May 8...His on-base percentage in that 17-game span was .653 (75-49).

1987 SEASON: Became the 1st Oriole other than **Murray** to lead the club in rbi during the 80s...**Ken Singleton** was the last, in '79...Led club with 40 tying/lead runs driven in and batted .295 (149-44) with runners in scoring position despite a career low .252 average overall.

After leading big league shortstops in homers, rbi, runs and slugging for 4 straight years, he finished 2nd in all 4 categories to the Tigers' **Alan Trammell** (hr-28, rbi-105, r-109, slug-.551). However, Cal did win election to the starting All-Star team.

Was batting .326 (144-47) thru May 16 with 8 homers and 34 rbi in 36 games, but hit only .229 (480-110) the rest of the way with 16 homers and 64 rbi in his last 126 games...During 6-game stretch from Apr 29 thru May 6, Cal went 9-for-25, and all 9 hits were for extra bases (2b-4, 3b-1, hr-4).

1986 SEASON: Tied for league lead with **Don Mattingly** in gwrbi with 15...Led A.L. shortstops for 4th straight year in homers, rbi, runs and slugging (.461)...Was 2nd in fielding percentage to **Tony Fernandez** at shortstop, .982 to .983.

Was 1st other than **Murray** to lead club in homers (25) since **Singleton** in '79...**Eddie** had led 6 straight years...Led club in runs, hits, doubles, homers, total bases (289) and in tying/go-ahead runs driven in (33), yet finished 2nd to **Murray** in the "MVO" vote.

1985 SEASON: Was 2nd to **Rickey Henderson** in runs scored (146 to 116)...It was 3rd straight year he'd scored over 100 runs...Hit .282 overall, but had a .321 (165-53) average with men in scoring position...Was 1st or 2nd on the club in 12 offensive categories, and tied **Murray** in gwrbi (15)...Finished 2nd to **Eddie** in "MVO" vote...Set club record with 32 gipds.

1984 SEASON: Batted over .300 for 2nd straight year...Set A.L. record for assists by a shortstop (583)...Went as long as 3 games without a hit only once...Batted .311 (148-46) with runners in scoring position to lead club...Hit .355 (242-86) over 60 games from June 27 thru Sep 1.

From Sep 1, '83 thru May 9, '84, Cal hit .372 (258-96) with 16 homers and 41 rbi over 63 games...Led major league shortstops in chances with 908 and net chances (880), most in A.L. since **Leo Cardenas** in '69.

1983 SEASON: Was A.L. "MVP" and TSN "Player of the Year," and shared "MVO" laurels with **Murray**...Played on A.L.'s 1st winning All-Star team

since '71, and also played on the winning team in both the ALCS & World Series.

Led majors in hits with a club record 211 and doubles (47); was 2nd with 76 extra-base hits to the Expos' **Andre Dawson** (78), and, with 343 total bases, was runner-up to major league leader **Jim Rice** (344)...Cal led the A.L. with 121 runs, just one off **Frank Robinson**'s club record set in '66...His .318 average was 3rd highest in club history behind **Ken Singleton**'s .328 in '77 and **Bob Nieman**'s .322 in '56.

Stretch Run: During 44 games from Aug 13 thru Sep 25, a period in which the O's went 34-10 to win the Eastern Division Championship, Cal hit .391 (192-75) with 14 doubles, 9 homers, 30 rbi and 40 runs scored.

Post-Season: Batted a combined .273 (33-9) in 9 post-season games...Drove in O's only run in 9th inning of ALCS #1, won by **LaMarr Hoyt**, 2-1...Made final putout of WS when he caught **Garry Maddox**' line drive in bottom of 9th, Game #5.

1982 SEASON: Led all major league rookies in doubles, homers, rbi, total bases (284), gwrbi (11, tied with **Von Hayes**), games (160), at bats (663, led A.L.) and runs.

Missed only 3 games all year, none after May 29th (his games streak began the following day)...Played 44 straight errorless games at 3rd base from Apr 24 thru June 14...Stole his 1st big league base the hard way, stealing home on the front end of a double steal with **Lenn Sakata** off the Rangers' **Jon Matlack** on May 31 in Baltimore.

Slow Start: After a glittering opening day on which he went 3-for-5 with his 1st big league double, homer (off KC's **Dennis Leonard**) and rbi, he plunged into a deep slump (55-4)...He was batting only .117 (60-7) on May 1st after 18 games...His career big league average over 2 seasons was at that point .121 (99-12) in 41 games.

Start of Something Big: The next day, May 2, he picked up a pair of scratch hits, and was beaned by fellow rookie **Mike Moore**...He missed only one game after the beaning, however, and batted .281 (538-151) from May 2 to the end of the season.

1981 SEASON: Recalled from Rochester Aug 8 right after the major league player strike was settled...Made big league debut as pinch runner Aug 10 for **Singleton** in Baltimore against the Royals...His 1st hit was a single off Chicago's **Dennis Lamp** on Aug 16, also at Memorial Stadium. Played in 12 games at short (9 starts) and 6 at 3rd...After Sep 11, he didn't make a plate appearance, and appeared in only 2 games.

Rochester: Despite his early recall from Rochester, he was voted "Rookie of the Year" in the International League, and was named to the loop's All-Star team at 3rd base...In survey of I.L.'s managers and coaches, Rip was picked as top major league prospect in the league (**Von Hayes** was 2nd)...Played in 85 games at 3rd for Red Wings and 35 at shortstop (primarily when **Bob Bonner** was injured).

Winter Ball: Led Puerto Rican League in rbi (49) after '81 season, and was "MVP" on the Caguas club, managed by then-Orioles' pitching coach **Ray Miller**.

MINORS, '78-'80: Was Southern League's All-Star 3rd baseman '80 and tied for league lead in games...One of 2 Charlotte players that year to break club's home run record...Rip had 25 and **Drungo Hazewood** had 28...Cal had homered only 8 times in his 2 previous pro seasons combined...He also led S.L. 3rd basemen in fielding (.933, tc-415, e-28). Helped Caguas win Puerto Rican title after the '80 season (the 1st of his 2 seasons in Caribbean winter ball).

In '79 he was picked as shortstop on Topps' Class A All-Star team, though he played more games at 3rd (58) than at shortstop (52)...Led Florida State in doubles that year.

Was signed by the late **Dick Bowie** in '78, and played mostly shortstop that summer in Bluefield...Played in Florida Instructional League after both '78 and '79 seasons.

AMATEUR BACKGROUND: Pitched and played short at Aberdeen (MD) High (graduated '78)...Was 7-2 with an 0.70 era as a senior with 100 strikeouts in 60 innings...He also won Harford County bat title (.492) and had 29 rbi in 20 games...Pitched a 2-hitter and fanned 17 to win '78 Maryland Class A baseball championship game.

Was voted American Amateur Baseball Congress (AABC) "Graduate of the Year" in '86, an honor won previously by **Eddie Murray** ('84) and many other prominent major leaguers.

Also earned 2 letters in soccer...Was team captain and both an all-county and all-metro selection...Played Little League, Babe Ruth and Mickey Mantle League baseball...Led Putty Hill, MD team to Mickey Mantle World Series in Sherman, TX (lost in a best of 3 competition).

COMMUNITY: Cal supports the community actively and in a variety of ways... See "Bart Giampatti Caring Award" under "Major Honors and Awards" above.

Last year, he and wife, **Kelly**, contributed \$250,000 to the City of Baltimore to establish an adult literacy program facility...It opened at 2435 North Calvert Street in July...At full capacity, the **Ripken Learning Center** will annually serve 240 students within the City...The program fits nicely into **Mayor Kurt Schmoke's** "The City that Reads" campaign.

Cal is also active on behalf of the University of Maryland Hospital's Shock Trauma Center, the Johns Hopkins Hospital's Children's Center, the Baltimore School for the Performing Arts, the Bryn Mawr School (Baltimore), and the Harford Center, a day-care facility for retarded citizens.

He continues to donate 25 tickets for every Orioles' home game to "Because We Care," a program he and **Eddie Murray** initiated several years ago.

In prior years, he has supported the Harford County Humane Society; has served as honorary chairman of the American Lung Association's anti-smoking drive; The Easter Seal and March of Dimes campaigns, and the United Way Softball Marathon.

He has been the regional spokesman for the Middle Atlantic Milk Marketing Association, and has also worked on behalf of Project Survival, and the Baltimore Symphony.

Is also serving on the 4-H Learn and Earn Steering Committee for a 2-year period ('90-'91). The steering committee helps in planning, operation and evaluation of this innovative 4-H youth entrepreneurship project.

PERSONAL: Cal and the former **Kelly Geer** were married Nov 13, '87...Cal Senior was best man, brothers **Bill** and **Fred** were ushers, and sister **Ellen** was a bridesmaid...**Kelly**, from Cockeysville, MD is a graduate of Dulany High School and the University of Maryland...The Ripkens have a daughter, **Rachel Marie**, born Nov 22, '89.

His minor league career record is 19-5 (era-2.53, ip-213.1, h-168, er-47, bb-59, so-191) in 41 games, 31 starts with 4 complete games and one shutout.

TASTE OF ML: Following the O's game of July 22, he pitched for Hagerstown at Memorial Stadium in a regular-season Eastern League game against Reading (Phillies) in a rare major league/minor league doubleheader...It didn't take him long to get noticed as he hurled the Suns to a 3-hit 2-1 victory (ip-9, bb-2, so-4) in just 1:57.

Although he began the season in Class A, he shot upon the major league scene like a lightning bolt, stunning the defending World Series champion Oakland Athletics in his debut, Aug 19.

1990 SEASON SUMMARY

Led the Orioles in relief innings pitched for the 3rd time in the last 4 seasons ('87-'89-'90) despite missing the last 6 weeks with a fractured right ring finger and the 1st 2 weeks with a pulled muscle in his left hip. The injury to his finger occurred against Oakland on Aug 18 when he stumbled off the mound after throwing a pitch to **Walt Weiss** and landed on his finger when he tried to maintain his balance...He went on the disabled list the following day and did not return to the lineup the rest of the season.

Was 2nd in the AL in relief innings pitched at the time of his injury.

Put together the Orioles' longest winning streak, 7 games (May 12-July 20), since **Jim Palmer** had an 11-game streak, June 7-Sep 4, '82...Over a 6-game stretch, July 8-20, he was 4-0 and didn't allow a run in 13.2 innings. In his 1st 38 games thru July 20, he had allowed only 13 runs (9 earned) in 65 innings, a 1.25 era...Between May 22 and July 20 he allowed only 3 earned runs and 24 hits in 46 innings and was 6-0...Included in that stretch was a streak of 22.1 scoreless innings (for more details see below under "Scoreless Streak").

Followed the scoreless streak by allowing runs in 8 of his next 9 appearances, July 23-Aug 12, (ip-17, h-24, r-12, era-6.35)...Was tagged for a home run in 5 consecutive games, July 25-28-30, Aug 1-4.

After the scoreless streak ended on July 23, he allowed 26 hits and 12 earned runs in his last 20 innings (5.40) before the season-ending injury. His 2 longest outings of the season came in back-to-back appearances, May 22 (vs Minn) and May 26 (at Texas) when he went 4 scoreless innings on both occasions...In the latter game at Texas, he retired all 12 batters faced in the O's 7-5 win.

SCORELESS STREAK: His streak of 22.1 consecutive scoreless innings, June 17-July 23 spanning 13 appearances, was the 2nd longest in the AL last year to Boston's **Roger Clemens**' string of 26...Williamson's streak was snapped July 23 at Detroit when, after retiring the 1st batter he faced to close out the inning, he allowed back-to-back doubles (Alan Trammell and Cecil Fielder) the following inning.

AMONG RELIEVERS: Among AL relievers, he was tied for 3rd in win pct. (.800); tied for 4th in wins (8); 7th in era (2.21) and 12th in batting average against (.215).

TOUGH TO HIT: Seven teams hit less than .200 against him: Boston (.059); Chicago (.065); Cleveland (.083); Minnesota (.132); Texas (.179); New York (.182); and the AL champion Oakland A's (.105), who collected only 2 hits and 0 runs in 6.2 innings...**Wade Boggs'** homer was Boston's

only hit against him in 5.1 innings...Righthanders batted .209 (163-34) and lefties .223 (139-31).

MISCELLANEOUS: Has a current string of 12.1 scoreless innings against Minnesota since last allowing a run against them July 26, '89...His wild pitch May 17 at Chicago is the only one he has thrown in his last 215.1 innings (since Sep 9, '88).

Between May 17 and July 18, while the O's were 38-19, he was 6-0 with 3 saves (1.89 era, ip-47.2, h-37, r/er-10)...Had a 6-game win streak, May 18-July 15.

On May 30-31 he became the 1st Oriole to win games on back-to-back days since **Tippy Martinez** in August, '83...On Sep 29-30, he lost the 1st 2 games of the season-finale series at Toronto, becoming the 1st Oriole to lose on back-to-back dates since **Don Aase** in August, '86.







—On the automobile he received when 1st coming to the Blue Jays (all Toronto players are given Blue Jays rental cars to use during the season)...I could tell it had been **Phil Niekro's** rental car, I found his false teeth in the glove compartment."

—When the Orioles Bird fell off the dugout in 1986 he advised, "Take 2 worms and call me in the morning."

—A '79 **Cy Young** Award winner, Flanny devised the following Cy Young Glossary in 1980 when teammate **Steve Stone** was on his way to winning the award...Since he had just won the award, Mike was Cy Young. Teammate **Jim Palmer** was Cy Old, Stone was Cy Present, **Scott McGregor** Cy Future, **Storm Davis** was Cy Clone (clone of **Jim Palmer**)...Cy-Bex (a rehab instrument) was a pitcher who had been hurt and Cy-Anarah (Sayonara) was the term used when a pitcher's career was finished.

—On the SkyDome's retractable roof: "I wish it had retractable fences".

—On teammate **Mike Boddicker's** fastball after Boddicker had just pitched a game at Exhibition Stadium: "We had him throwing 88 miles per hour on the radar gun, but with the Canadian exchange rate it was only 83."

—Some of his better nicknames: **Ruben Scare-ya (Sierra)**, **Jose** Don't-make-a-mistake-o (**Canseco**) and Tony Obsolete-o (when former major leaguer **Tony Solaito** was released).

—On the difference between spring training on the West Coast as opposed to the East Coast: "No armed guards in the parking lots".





Jim's comeback attempt is the first ever by a Major League Baseball Hall of Famer. However, it has been done twice in hockey and almost once in basketball. No NFL player has ever tried a comeback after being elected to the Football Hall of Fame.

Guy Lafleur is an active player in the NHL with the Quebec Nordiques as well as a Hockey Hall of Famer. He retired in '84 after a long career with Montreal and was voted into the Hall of Fame in the summer of '88. That fall he made his comeback with the New York Rangers. **Gordie Howe** retired from the Detroit Red Wings in '71 and was elected to the Hall in '72 (hockey has occasionally waived its 3-year waiting period). In '73 he made a comeback in the WHA to play with his sons **Mark** and **Marty**. He returned to the NHL when his club, the Hartford (then New England) Whalers came into the league following the WHA-NFL merger.

Boston's **Bod Cousy** retired from the NBA Celtics in '63, but came back to play for the Cincinnati Royals in '69-'70. However, he wasn't elected to the Basketball Hall of Fame until May '70, so it's all kind of academic.





The major league draft is held annually at baseball's winter meetings, and is followed with a separate selection by National Association clubs from class AAA to A levels. . . . Until 1958, major league clubs could draft players within a range between \$15,000 (for AAA players) and \$2,000 (for class D players) . . . In 1958 the price for big league drafts rose to \$25,000 and in 1985 it became \$50,000.

However, in 1959, a first-year player draft at the big league level was set up to discourage the payment of inordinately large bonus payments to free agents. The new rule provided that first-year players could be selected at the major league level (if not protected on a major league team's 40 man roster) for \$12,000. In 1961, an even lower draft price was set up for more recent first-year players. That figure was \$8,000.

That year, incidentally, the Baltimore organization set a record of sorts by being relieved of 19 eligible first year players (seven during the big league selections and 11 more during the minor league draft). In 1965, the first year player draft began to lose its significance and then disappeared in 1970.

The Orioles will, however, play the Yankees at Miami's Joe Robbie Stadium on Saturday, Mar 30 and Sunday, Mar 31. The O's will also host the Boston Red Sox at RFK Stadium on Saturday, Apr 6 and Sunday, Apr 7.

The Orioles have played 7 games at Joe Robbie Stadium over the last 3 seasons and have drawn the 2 largest crowds ever to see a major league spring training game in Florida. The O's and the Yankees drew 26,417 on March 25, '89 and 24,597 saw the O's host the Mets last Apr 1.

Since they began playing at both sites in 1988, the Orioles have averaged 20,900 in the 7 games at Joe Robbie Stadium and 29,875 in 4 games at RFK Stadium.

This year's schedule calls for the Orioles to play 23 games against American League teams, most in club history.

Baltimore's Other Ironman

Shortstop Cal Ripken may have the 2nd longest playing streak in major league history, but unbeknown to most, there is an even longer one in progress right here at Memorial Stadium.

That streak belongs to the Orioles' field attendant Ernie Tyler who has gone 2,489 games without missing a pitch from his stool situated just to the 3rd base side of home plate, just in front of the screen. Ernie's incredible string began on opening day (Apr 19) 1960 when the O's hosted and defeated the Washington Senators (those pesky Nats). Barring rain, Ernie will reach the 2,500 game mark on Wed, May 1 when the O's host the Mariners at 7:35.

Ernie, incidentally, is the father of Jimmy and Freddie Tyler, the two Orioles' equipment managers.

Coming From Behind

The biggest deficit the O's have ever overcome to win a game is 8 runs. They trailed the Carmines at Boston Sep 2, '56 by 0-8 after 2 1/2 innings, but came back to win 11-10 with a 3-run rally in the top of the 9th. The winner was Billy Loes and the winning run was produced by the late Bob Nieman.

The biggest lead they've blown (and lost the game) is also 8, the same year. They led the Indians 9-1 after 3 1/2 at Cleveland on June 27, '56, but lost 12-11 in 11 innings. The loser was Hal Brown.

The major league record for coming from behind is 12, on June 11, '11 by the Tigers who spotted the White Sox a 13-1 lead before storming back to win 16-15.


