

SEATING DIAGRAM



TWO ORIGINAL JOES

Two Orioles staffers joined the front office prior to opening day 1954, and have remained with the club through every one of its 38 seasons: Joe Hamper and Joe Codd. Hamper officially retired a year ago as vice president/finance, but continues to serve the ballclub in an advisory capacity, while Codd, 76, still comes to work regularly in the ticket office.

OWNERSHIP OF THE ORIOLES

On Dec 6, '88 **Agnes Neil Williams**, who succeeded her late husband, **Edward Bennett Williams**, as Orioles board chairman, announced that agreement had been reached to sell the Orioles for approximately \$70 million to a group of investors with three things in common: a love of baseball, an association with the Baltimore area, and degrees from Yale University Law School. The ownership group was approved unanimously by Major League Owners on April 18, '89, and the transaction was completed on June 26, '89.

The group of three was headed by **Eli Jacobs**, principal shareholder, and included Orioles' President **Larry Lucchino** and Maryland native **R. Sargent Shriver**.

ELI JACOBS



Mr. Jacobs, 54, the club's principal owner and chairman, was appointed to Major League Baseball's Executive Council soon after the acquisition of the club was approved.

Although he prefers to rely on management to run the club on his behalf, Mr. Jacobs has taken an active role in the design and planning of the Orioles new ballpark at Camden Yards.

Mr. Jacobs was born in Cambridge, Massachusetts, grew up in Newton, west of Boston, and was, of course, an ardent Red Sox fan. One of his biggest disappointments came as a nine-year-old when the

Cardinals defeated the Sox in the 7th game of the '46 World Series.

He is a graduate of Phillips Academy, Andover, and Yale College ('59) as well as Yale Law School ('64). As an undergraduate he served as the managing editor of the Yale Daily News.

LARRY LUCCHINO



Larry, 46, was appointed acting president of the Orioles by **Edward Bennett Williams** in May, 1988, then succeeded him as the club's chief executive following **Mr. Williams'** death on August 13, 1988.

Prior to becoming president, he had been vice-president/general counsel and a member of the board, beginning in 1979 when **Williams** purchased the ballclub.

During his 13 years as an Orioles officer, he has held wide-ranging responsibilities that have included: participating in player acquisitions and front office reorganization; developing and coordinating the company's marketing policy; negotiating major business and player contracts; serving as the Orioles' principal representative in negotiations with the Maryland Stadium Authority regarding the new downtown ballpark; and representing the club at American League and major league meetings.

He has also served on Major League Baseball's Baseball Operations and Player Development Contract Negotiation Committees, as well as on the American League's Cable Television Committee.

He is a partner at **Williams & Connolly**, the firm founded by **Mr. Williams**, where he specialized in sports law and litigation. Larry was also secretary/general counsel and a member of the board of directors of the Washington Redskins from '78 thru '85.

Born and raised in Pittsburgh, PA, he was all-city in basketball and a second baseman on the city championship baseball team at Taylor Allderdice High School (Class of '63). He graduated with honors from Princeton University in '67, and was a '72 graduate of Yale University Law School.

While at Princeton, he was a varsity basketball letterman on two Ivy League championship teams coached by **Butch Van Breda Kolff**. As a sophomore, he was a teammate of U.S. Senator **Bill Bradley**, who led the team to the Final Four in the NCAA tournament.

In Larry's senior year, the Tigers were 25-3, the best record in Princeton basketball history. He has had the unique sports distinction of receiving a World Series ring (Orioles '83), a Super Bowl ring (Redskins '83), and an NCAA "Final Four" watch (Princeton '65).

R. SARGENT SHRIVER



Sargent Shriver, 76, is a native of Westminster, who now lives in Potomac on the Maryland side of the District Line.

He originated and directed the Peace Corps, from its inception in '61 during the administration of his brother-in-law, President John F. Kennedy, until '66.

Subsequently, he created the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) and originated government programs such as Head Start, Job Corps, VISTA Volunteers, Foster Grandparents and other government initiatives.

He served as ambassador to France from '68 to '70, and in '72 ran as the Democratic Party's nominee for vice-president. Today Sargent Shriver is chairman of the board of Special Olympics International.

SENIOR EXECUTIVES

ROLAND HEMOND



Roland, 62, begins his fourth season as executive vice president/general manager. Certainly one of the more active participants in baseball's trade market, Hemond has negotiated 125 trades involving 404 players during his baseball career. He concluded 17 trades in his first 17 months with the Orioles, and is now up to 30 (thru Feb '92) since he was named to succeed Hank Peters as Orioles vp/gm on Nov 10, '87.

He, club President **Larry Lucchino** and Assistant General Manager **Doug Melvin** were the principal architects of the Orioles 32 1/2 game improvement in '89, the 3rd greatest jump in major league history.

That was an achievement with which he was already familiar. A three-time winner of Major League Baseball's Executive of the Year award ('72, '83, '89), he has now engineered three of the big league's best turnarounds since divisional play began in '69.

Hemond's '71 White Sox improved 23 games over the previous year and his '77 team climbed 26 games above the '76 White Sox.

Roland's career dates back some 41 years to 1951, when he joined the front office of the Eastern League's Hartford Chiefs following a 4-year tour of duty in the U.S. Coast Guard. At the end of that season he was promoted

to the parent Boston Braves, where he worked for the late late John Mullen. In '53, Roland accompanied the Braves' franchise to Milwaukee.

In December, '60, former Braves Manager Fred Haney became the first California Angels' general manager, and less than a month later, Roland joined him as scouting and farm director.

On Sep 14, '70, he was appointed director of (major league) player personnel for the White Sox who were well on their way to a 56-106 final season record. At the same time, the Sox hired, at his urging, his former Angels' organization colleague, Chuck Tanner, as manager. At their first winter meeting, the 2 newcomers moved 16 players in the first 18 hours of the convention in Los Angeles.

In their first 2 full seasons, the Hemond/Tanner combine brought the Sox in third ('71) and second ('72). The Sox went 87-67 in '72, and Roland won his 1st executive of the year award.

He became a vice-president in July, '73, in the John Allyn administration, then worked with Bill Veeck from December, '75, when the latter bought the club, until January, '81. After Jerry Reinsdorf and Eddie Einhorn purchased the franchise from Veeck, they promoted him to executive vice-president for baseball operations.

Roland earned his second top executive trophy in '83 after his White Sox won the Western Division by a record 20 games (biggest winning margin in either league since the divisional system was adopted in '69).

He was replaced in October, '85, by Ken Harrelson, but remained with the Sox in a consulting capacity. Seven months later, in May '86, he joined the commissioner's office and remained there through two baseball seasons before joining the Orioles.

Roland was born in Central Falls, Rhode Island. His mother was French-Canadian and his father's family is of French descent. Last October he was inducted into the Central Falls Hall of Fame. As part of the ceremony, city officials honored him by naming the city's largest athletic complex, Roland Hemond Park.

He and his wife, the former Margo Quinn, were married on Nov 8, '58. They have 5 children: Susan (1/3/60), Tere (12/27/61), Robert (4/20/64), Jay (12/11/65), and Ryan (12/11/72). The Hemonds are truly a baseball family. Margo's father was John Quinn, a major league g.m. for 28 seasons.

In addition to Margo, John Quinn's children include: Susan, who worked for the Angels and was Roland's secretary for a number of years; Bob, the Cincinnati Reds' general manager; and Jack, president of the St. Louis Blues hockey team and former baseball general manager of the Hawaii Islanders and Vancouver Mounties of the Pacific Coast League.

Three of Roland's children, Susan, Bob and Jay, are also associated with professional baseball. Susan is an associate director for some ESPN baseball telecasts and also freelances on other major tv sports events. Bob worked for the Wichita Wranglers in the Texas League in '89 & '90, and Jay is currently with the Frederick Keys as director of special projects.

TOM DAFFRON



Tom was named senior vice-president/assistant to the chairman in January '90. He came to the Orioles after 16 years as chief-of-staff to U.S. Senator William Cohen, R-Maine.

Following the fellowship, he spent three years on the staff of Senator Charles Percy, R-Illinois, before joining Cohen, then a member of the

House of Representatives, in 1973.

Tom, who earned degrees from Brown University and Columbia University's Graduate School of Journalism, has had a broad and varied work experience. In addition to his extensive background in federal government and two stints with the Wilmington *News-Journal*, he has been a reporter at the Miami *Herald*, has worked at the University of Chicago as associate director of public relations, and for a time was director of government and public relations for the International Paper Company in Maine. He was also a Peace Corps volunteer in Thailand.

A native of New York City, Tom and his wife, Margot, have three children: Thomas, Susan, and Cynthia.

1991 FARM SYSTEM IN REVIEW

The Orioles organization has experienced continued improvement in the farm system in each of the past 3 seasons, moving from a .468 winning percentage in '89, and a ranking of 21st among major league organizations to .507 in '90 (12th) and .517 in '91 (10th).

The improvement is largely based on a restocked farm system which has produced major leaguers from No 1 picks in '88 (RHP **Gregg Olson**), '89 (RHP **Ben McDonald**) and '90 (RHP **Mike Mussina**).

Even with its top players already in the majors, the farm system compiled its best record (354-331) since '87 and had 3 teams compete in post-season play: Hagerstown (AA), Kane County (A) and Gulf Coast (Rookie).

The Gulf Coast Orioles captured the league title, Kane County won the 2nd half Midwest League championship, while Rochester, Hagerstown, and Bluefield each finished second.

Kane County displayed a bit of "Orioles Magic" by reversing a 26-40 1st-half record and 7th place finish to a 1st place, 2nd half log of 42-27, a 14½ game turn around.

ROCHESTER (AAA): The Red Wings (76-68) finished 2nd, 3½ games off the pace set by the Pawtucket Red Sox. The Red Wings, who used 52 players in '91, appeared out of the IL pennant chase in early August when they fell 9½ games behind the PawSox. A late surge closed the gap to 5½ games.

In IL team stats, Rochester was 2nd in fielding (.975) and the pitching staff was 1st in strikeouts (902). Rochester was a league-best 45-27 at home.

Luis Mercedes (.334) fell just short of winning a 3rd straight batting title in 3 years, but he was named the IL Rookie of the Year. Teammate **Mike Mussina** (10-4, 2.87) earned the IL Most Valuable Pitcher award and both were named to the season-ending IL All-Star team.

Chito Martinez clubbed 20 home runs before moving up to the Orioles July 5, and still finished 2nd, only 1 behind the league leader (Rick Lancellotti-Paw). He was named the O's organization Player of the Month (June) and Player of the Year (**Clyde Kluttz** award). Mussina won the **Jim Palmer** Award as the system's top pitcher for '91.

Jeff Tackett threw out 49 of 94 would-be base stealers (52 percent).

HAGERSTOWN (AA): The Suns led the organization in wins (81) and had the Eastern League's best home record (48-22) but were beaten in the 1st round of the playoffs by Albany (Yankees), 3 games to 0. Hagerstown had a potent offense, leading the league in batting (.271), runs scored (704), hits (1284), walks (618), and on-base percentage (.357).

The pitching staff, led by **Arthur Rhodes** (7-4, 2.70), **Stacy Burdick** (11-4, 2.99), and **Pat Leinen** (10-6, 3.03), was 3rd in the league with a 3.28 era. Rhodes struck out 115 batters, 3rd best in the EL. **Rodney Lofton** led the O's organization (and the EL) with 56 stolen bases.

FREDERICK (A): The Keys, defending Carolina League champions, finished 4th in both halves of the season, yet had 7 players selected to the mid-season All-Star team.

Frederick pitchers led the CL in strikeouts (1050) as well as bases on balls (642). Keys batters were 2nd in hits (1189), doubles (195), and stolen bases (193).

Manny Alexander led the CL in hits (143), tied for 1st in runs (81) and was chosen the CL's most exciting player by Baseball America, in a survey of the league's managers. His .951 fielding percentage led all shortstops. **Baseball America** also selected him as the Orioles' top prospect among position players.

Damon Buford led his team in 8 offensive categories: total bases (199), doubles (25), RBI (54), sacrifices (7), walks (51), hit-by-pitches (10), strikeouts (92), and stolen bases (50).

KANE COUNTY (A): The Cougars accomplished an amazing turnaround, but were beaten in the opening round of the playoffs by 1st-half winner Madison (Oakland), 2 games to 0.

While the rest of the Orioles farm clubs enjoyed success at home, the Cougars posted a league-best 37-29 road record. No other team in the organization had a winning record on the road.

Kane County led the league in hits (1163) and was second in batting (.256).

Joe Borowski (7-2, 2.56) had 13 saves and 76 strikeouts in 81 innings. **Dave Paveloff** (6-1, 3.59) added 8 saves and had an outstanding ratio of 16 walks to 54 strikeouts in 52.2 innings.

The major league draft is held annually at baseball's winter meetings, and is followed with a separate selection by National Association clubs from class AAA to A levels. Until 1958, major league clubs could draft players within a range between \$15,000 (for AAA players) and \$2,000 (for class D players). In 1958, the price for big league drafts rose to \$25,000 and in 1985 it became \$50,000.

However, in 1959, a first-year player draft at the big league level was set up to discourage the payment of inordinately large bonus payments to free agents. The new rule provided that first-year players could be selected at the major league level (if not protected on a major league team's 40-man roster) for \$12,000. In 1961, an even lower draft price was set up for more recent first-year players. That figure was \$8,000.

That year, incidentally, the Baltimore organization set a record of sorts by being relieved of 19 eligible first-year players (seven during the big league selections and 11 more during the minor league draft). In 1965, the first-year player draft began to lose its significance and then disappeared in 1970.

DOUG MELVIN



Doug, 39 (8/8/52), is a native of Chatham, Ontario (which also produced Hall of Famer and 284-game winner **Fergie Jenkins**). This is his 21st year in professional baseball, his 7th with the Orioles.

He was named special assistant to Orioles President **Edward Bennett Williams** and Executive Vice-President **Hank Peters** on Feb 11, '86. A year and a half later, he became director of player personnel in charge of minor league operations and for the past 4 seasons has served as assistant general manager/director of player personnel.

His pro playing career began in '72 when he was signed by the Pittsburgh Pirates as a righthanded pitcher. Doug pitched in the Bucs' system for 2 years ('72-'73) and spent 4 more in the Yankees' chain ('75-'78) after sitting out 1974 with a leg injury. The Pirates released him after the '73 season, but he was re-signed by then Yankees Scouting Director **Pat Gillick** (a former Orioles system pitcher and currently gm at Toronto).

In 6 pro seasons, Melvin was 29-19 with a 3.43 era (ip-520, er-198). He was 16-4 combined over his last 2 seasons ('77-'78) at West Haven (Class A, Eastern). In '76 at Ft Lauderdale (Class A, Florida State), he was 5th in the league in era (2.41) despite a losing record (6-7).

After his playing career ended, he pitched batting practice with the Yankees and coordinated advance scouting reports for the major league coaching staff, then spent the next 6 years building a solid reputation in the Yankees baseball organization. He served as scouting director in '85.

There was no baseball at Ontario's Chatham Kent Secondary School, but Doug played football, basketball and hockey, and was subsequently elected to the school's athletic hall of fame. He still holds the school's basketball record of 55 points in a single game. Among his high school opponents were **Mark** and **Marty Howe**, sons of Hockey Hall of Famer **Gordie Howe**.

He and his wife, **Ellen**, live in Columbia, MD, and have 2 children: **Ashley** (4/18/83) and **Cory** (7/9/86).

FRANK ROBINSON

VITAL STATISTICS: Frank was born Aug 31, '35 in Beaumont, TX, but grew up in Oakland, CA...He now lives in Bel Air, CA and Baltimore.

This is his 40th year in professional baseball. His career has included 21 years as a player, and the equivalent of 9 1/2 seasons as a major league manager.

He is in his 17th season with the Orioles, for whom he has been player, coach, manager and front office official.

ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER: He was in his 4th season as manager of the Orioles in '91 when he was succeeded by **John Oates** on May 23 (record 13-24)...A short time later, he accepted the position of assistant general manager.

This is his 2nd stint in the Orioles' front office. In Apr '88, when he was named manager of the Orioles, he had been working as a special assistant to the president of the club, **Edward Bennett Williams**.

HALL OF FAME: Frank was elected to the Hall of Fame at Cooperstown in '82 along with **Hank Aaron** after being named on 89% of the ballots cast (370 of 415)...That was the 1st of 4 straight years in which at least one Oriole was elected.

He is one of only 23 to have been named to the Hall in his 1st year of eligibility. That list includes **Brooks Robinson** and **Jim Palmer**, and '92 1st ballot electee **Tom Seaver**.

Frank is one of 7 modern Orioles to have been chosen (see Hall of Fame on page 120), and one of 3 wearing an O's uniform in his official portrait (along with **Brooks** and **Palmer**).

LATEST FINISH

The latest a game has been completed at Memorial Stadium was 1:22 am on June 4, '88. The game went 14 innings and consumed 5:46. It ranks as the longest game by time in Orioles history. The O's won the game 7-6 by scoring 3 runs in the bottom of the 14th with 2 out, all on a throwing error by the Yankees' **Mike Pagliarulo**.

MANAGER OF THE YEAR, '89: After directing his team to a 32 1/2 game improvement over '88 and matching the '36 Boston Braves for the 3rd biggest one year improvement in modern history, Frank enjoyed a rare distinction. He won all 4 of the major American League Manager of the Year awards: BBWAA, The Sporting News, AP and UPI...He was the 5th Orioles skipper to have won at least one of the above, but the 1st to capture the BBWAA trophy which was initiated only in '85.

Other Orioles managers to be honored: **Joe Altobelli, Hank Bauer, Paul Richards and Earl Weaver...**See Orioles Award Winners on page 55.

ORIOLES: Frank replaced **Cal Ripken** on Apr 12, '88, becoming the Orioles' 8th manager (excluding interim managers **Luman Harris** in '61 and **Ripken** (1 game) in '85)...He took over with the club at 0-6 and lost his 1st 15 games until the O's snapped its record start-of-the-season losing streak at 21 (Apr 29)...Frank's overall record that year was 54-101.

Twice during that year he handed the reins to **Ellie Hendricks** because of a bad back...Frank was hospitalized and missed 4 games from May 18 thru 20 (O's were 1-3), then was sidelined for 2 weeks from July 15 thru 28 while undergoing successful surgery for the removal of a ruptured disc by **Dr Donald Long**. The club's cumulative record during that period was 4-11.

This is Frank's 3rd tour of duty with the O's, his 2nd since he played here ('66 thru '71).

He returned as a coach in '78, but spent most of that season managing in Rochester before moving back to Baltimore again as a coach in '79 and '80. During the pennant winning year ('79), he was credited with helping to improve substantially the quality of the club's defense. In '80 he replaced **Jim Frey** (who left to manage the KC Royals) as the O's batting and 1st base coach. Frank, himself, departed in '80 to manage the San Francisco Giants.

Five years later ('85) he came back to Baltimore after 4 seasons in San Francisco and a short stint ('84) as a coach with the Milwaukee Brewers (**Harry Dalton** hired him for Milwaukee the day after he was let go by the Giants. Frank had also worked with Dalton in Baltimore and Anaheim).

For the next 3 seasons, he was a bench/outfield coach under 3 managers: **Joe Altobelli** ('85), **Earl Weaver** ('85-'86) and **Cal Ripken** ('87), before his appointment as special assistant to the president in October '87.

SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS: Named manager Jan 14, '81, replacing **Dave Bristol** (who in turn had followed **Joe Altobelli**), and led the club to its 1st winning season since Altobelli did it in '78. The years '81 & '82 were the Giants' 1st consecutive winning seasons in a decade. In '83 and '84, however, the club

dipped below .500, and on Aug 4, '84, Frank was dismissed in favor of interim skipper **Danny Ozark**.

ROCHESTER RED WINGS ('78): He started the season as an O's coach, but after **Ken Boyer** left the Wings to manage the St Louis Cardinals (Apr 28), Frank replaced him at Rochester (May 9) and went 58-64 the rest of the way before returning to Baltimore the following season.

CLEVELAND INDIANS ('74-'77): Frank joined the Indians as a player on Sep 12, '74 from California in a trade. Then, 3 weeks later, on Oct 4, the day after the season ended, he was named the first black major league manager in baseball history, replacing **Ken Aspromonte**.

He made a dramatic debut as playing manager on Apr 8, '75 before some 55,000 opening day fans at Cleveland Stadium. In his 1st at bat of that 1st game (he was dh, batting 2nd), Frank homered off **Doc Medich** (later that inning, ex-Oriole teammate **Boog Powell** also homered).

The Indians won the game, 5-3, and Frank's effort was voted **most memorable moment** in Tribe history by Cleveland fans during baseball's observance of the US bicentennial celebration.

In that 1st year, the Indians fell to 15 games below .500 by late June, but rallied and wound up 4th, just one game under. The next season, '76, they finished 3 games over. However, after a slow '77 start, Frank was released on June 19 and was succeeded by **Jeff Torborg**. For the rest of that year, he coached with the Angels under Manager **Dave Garcia**, who had been his 3rd base coach in Cleveland in '75-'76.

PLAYING CAREER

MAJOR LEAGUE LEADER: He played for 21 major league seasons and is among the top ranking players of all time in 10 categories.

His 586 home runs represent the 4th highest figure in major league history.

In addition, Frank ranks high in the following: games-2,808 (12th); at bats-10,006 (14th); runs-1,829th (10th); hits-2,943 (20th); 2bh-528 (19th); rbi-1,812 (13th); total bases-5,373 (8th); walks-1,420 (18th), and hit by pitches-198 (3rd) behind **Don Baylor**-267 and **Ron Hunt**-243.

MVP, BOTH LEAGUES: He is the only player ever to win the BBWAA MVP award in each league...He was the choice in the NL in '61 and the AL winner in '66. In addition, he was MVP in the '66 World Series and the '71 All-Star game.

TRIPLE CROWN: Is one of only 11 players to have won the Triple Crown (accomplished 13 times, 2 each by **Ted Williams** and **Rogers Hornsby**). Frank did it in '66 with the O's. He, **Mantle** ('56) and **Carl Yastrzemski** ('67) are the only players to have captured the Triple Crown in the past 43 years (since **Williams**' 2nd in '47).

HOME RUNS

He hit 343 in the NL and 243 in the AL...Hit 388 off righthanders and 198 against lefties.

VS NL OPPONENTS: Astros (Colts)-11; Braves-54; Cardinals-46; Cubs-54; Dodgers-42; Expos-0; Giants-49; Mets-12; Padres-1; Phillies-38; Pirates-34; Reds-2.

VS AL OPPONENTS: Angels-14; A's-20; Brewers (Pilots)-14; Indians-25; Orioles-6; Rangers (Senators)-31; Red Sox-37; Royals-15; Tigers-28; Twins-22; White Sox-17; Yankees-14.

33 PARKS: Frank holds the major league record for hitting home runs in the most different ballparks (33), including both regular and post-season play. **Hank Aaron** ranks 2nd at 32.

Among those, Crosley Field in Cincinnati (176) and Memorial Stadium (103) rank one-two in frequency for obvious reasons. There were 4 stadia in which he played, but did not hit a home run: Houston's Astrodome, Montreal's Olympic Stadium, Sicks' Stadium in Seattle ('69 only) and Busch Stadium in St Louis.

In regular season play Frank homered in 32 parks. His 33rd was Pittsburgh's Three Rivers in the '71 World Series.

GRAND SLAMS: Hit a total of 7 slams, 5 of them in the NL. His only 2 bases loaded AL homers were hit in successive innings on Aug 20, '70 at RFK Stadium in Washington off Senators' **Joe Coleman** and **Joe Grzenda**. Frank, **Jim Gentile** and **Jim Northrup** are the only ones ever to hit slams in successive plate appearances, though a total of 7 have hit 2 in a game.

2 OR MORE/GAME: Hit 2 or more in a game 54 times (ranks 5th in major league history). Hit 3 in a game for Reds at Crosley Field vs Cardinals on Aug 22, '59. Had 16 2-homer games for O's.

HR ODDS AND ENDS: Hit his 1st at Wrigley Field off the Cubs' Paul Minn on Apr 28, '56 and his last at Anaheim Stadium on July 6, '76 off the Angels' **Monge**. Hit most off NL righthander **Larry Jackson** (10). Scored the 1st run in ALCS history in game #1 in '69 at Baltimore, and also hit the 1st homer off Twins' **Jim Perry**.

HRS-ORIOLES: Hit his 500th major league homer in Baltimore in the 2nd game of a two-night doubleheader against the Tigers' lefthander **Fred Scherman** on 13, '71. At the time, he ranked 11th on the all-time list just behind Harmon Killebrew who had reached that milestone earlier that year. After leaving Baltimore, Frank moved past Killebrew, Mel Ott, Ernie Banks, Eddie Mathews, Ted Williams, Jimmie Foxx and Mickey Mantle.

He set a major league record by hitting 10 home runs in the month of April but that mark has since been extended to 11 by **Willie Stargell**, **Mike Schmidt** and **Graig Nettles**.

Set a club record with 49 homers in '66. Also set marks that year for most homers by an Oriole against one opponent (11 vs Det) and most home runs in Memorial Stadium (27).

LONG HOME RUNS/MEMORIAL STADIUM

The longest "measured" home run ever hit in Memorial Stadium was a 471' drive by Harmon Killebrew on May 24, 1964 off Milt Pappas over the hedge in left-center field. It exceeded by two feet the only other blast that has ever cleared the hedge . . . That was one by Boog Powell '469 to the same area off Boston's Don Schwall on June 22, 1962. Also from these there have been three balls hit into the hedge (approximately 450') by Mickey Mantle in 1954, by Powell in 1965 and by Frank Robinson in 1967.

Frank Robinson is the only player to have hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium in the second game of the doubleheader with Cleveland on May 8, 1966. Frank hit a long Tiant offering over the left field stands and into the parking lot beyond, a drive that measured 451' on the fly and rolled to a stop 540' away from home plate.

OTHER CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

LAST GAMES AS A PLAYER: Frank played in his last game as a player on Sept. 18, '76 at Cleveland vs Baltimore. He put himself in as a pinch-hitter for **Frank Duffy** in the 8th inning and singled in a run off **Rudy May**.

ALL-STAR GAMES: Appeared in 11 All-Star games as a player (6 with Cincinnati, 4 with O's and one with California) and served as a coach in '76 while managing for Cleveland. Was MVP in '71 game at Detroit. hit a 2-run homer off **Dock Ellis** to put AL ahead to stay in 3rd inning (**Reggie Jackson** hit another with one out in the same inning).

Hit .250 (24-6) in All-Star play with 2 homers. Went 3-for-3 for the NL in '59 at LA Coliseum and homered off **Early Wynn**.

WORLD SERIES: hit 2 key homers in '66 vs **Dodgers**, both off **Don Drysdale** to win SPORT Magazine sports car. Hit his 1st in the opening inning of game 1 at Dodger Stadium with **Russ Snyder** aboard (**Brooks** followed immediately with another and the O's led 3-0 before the Dodgers batted). O's won the game 5-2. In game #4 his 4th inning solo provided the only run as the O's completed their sweep behind **Dave McNally**.

In '71 game #6 vs Pittsburgh in Baltimore, Frank's baserunning in the 10th inning allowed the O's to tie the series at 3 games apiece. He drew a one out walk, and despite ailing legs and a sore Achilles Tendon, went from 1st to 3rd on **Mike Rettenumund's** single up the middle just evading **Richie Hebner's** tag with head first slide. Then, he scored on **Brooks'** short sac fly to **Vic Davalillo** center.

CINCINNATI: Spent 10 full years with the Reds after 3 seasons in their farm system. Was NL Rookie of the Year in '56. Tied league record for homers by a rookie (38, set by **Wally Berger** of the Braves), and set a rookie mark by being hit by pitched balls 20 times.

Won Triple Crown and MVP awards in AL and World Series in '66. In addition to leading the league in average (.316), home runs (49) and rbi (122), he also paced the loop in total bases (367), runs (122) and slugging (.637).

Was batting .337 in late June '67 when he sustained serious head injury in a 2nd base collision with the White Sox' **Al Weis**. Missed a month and suffered from double vision for a year and a half afterward. Though he wound up with a .31 average that year, he slipped to .268 (with 15 homers and 52 rbi) in '68 while still recovering from that injury, compounded by an attack of mumps and muscle tear in his right shoulder.

Frank returned to form the following spring and helped lead the O's to 3 straight pennants in '69, '70 & '71.

Following his trade to the Dodgers in Dec '71, Frank's uniform #20 was retired. He was the 1st Oriole to be so honored. In '77 he and **Brooks** became the 1st players to be inducted into the new Orioles' Hall of Fame, originated by the Oriole Advocates in cooperation with the Orioles.

DODGERS-ANGELS: After one year ('72) in Los Angeles where he played for **Walter Alston**, Frank was traded to the Angels. At Anaheim he played nearly 2 years under **Bobby Winkles** and **Dick Williams**.

PERSONAL: One of 10 children. Graduate of McClymonds High School (Oakland). Was basketball teammate of **Bill Russell** and played baseball there with **Vada Pinson**, **Willie Tasby** and **Charlie Beaman**. Hobbies: movies, music and Lakers basketball games. Attended Xavier University in Cincinnati.

Frank and his wife, the former **Barbara Ann Cole**, were married Oct 28, '61. They have 2 children: **Frank Kevin** (9/8/62) and **Nichelle** (8/24/65). Barbara is a real estate agent in the Bel Air/Beverly Hills area. Several years ago she sold a house to "Magic" Johnson, then sold his old house. Nichelle worked in the Orioles pr department for several years.

Attendance Notes:

A crowd of 50,700 for the last major league game in Memorial Stadium history (10/6/91) enabled the O's to set a club record for highest home attendance in a season. The 2,552,753 final figure surpassed the previous record set in '89 by just 17,545.

Final Count: The total for all Orioles games in 38 seasons at Memorial Stadium was 51,268,097, including 1,422,209 for 30 post-season games.

2 Million, 3 Straight Years: The O's also tied a club standard by drawing 2 million plus for the 3rd straight year. The 1st time that happened was '83-'84-'85. It doesn't seem like that long ago when they set a record of another kind: most consecutive seasons drawing fewer than 1 million ('72, '73 & '74).

On the road, the O's had never drawn 2 million until '89, but now they have done so for 3 consecutive seasons.

100,000 Series: In '91 the O's played to more than 100,000 in 12 of 26 home series, another club best...Over the 38 seasons at Memorial Stadium, a total of 89 series drew over 100,000, 78 of them in the last 13 years (starting '79), and 33 in the last 3 years.

'91 Rankings: The Orioles' home attendance ranked 6th in the major leagues last year, 5th in the AL. Theirs was the 3rd highest in ML history for a team with 90 or more losses (St Louis-2,573,495 in '90 and California-2,555,016 in '83).

The Orioles' road attendance in '91 set a club record (2,129,408), though it ranked only 13th in the AL (ahead of Cleveland—2,076,105), and 16th in the majors.

Best Draws: The best out-of-town draws in '91 were the Detroit Tigers (254,266), helped immeasurably by the 147,972 that showed up for the 3-date final weekend. The Oakland A's were 2nd at 230,564.

PRESIDENTIAL VISITS

The Orioles are 4-2 with President George Bush on hand (3-2 at home). Last year the president attended only one game, but it was an historic occasion. He and Mrs. Bush brought with them Queen Elizabeth II of England and her husband, Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh. Unfortunately, the O's lost to the Oakland A's, 6-3. The distinguished party met the uniformed personnel from both clubs, waved to the crowd, and watched a few innings of the game.

Before President Bush, the Orioles' luck in front of chief executives was all bad, 0-4 (0-3 for Mr. Reagan and 0-1 for Mr. Carter).

On opening day '89, the O's set what is believed to be a major league record when they hosted, not one, but two incumbent presidents, each from a different part of the world—Mr. Bush and Hosni Mubarak of Egypt. President Bush and Canada's Prime Minister, Brian Mulroney have twice attended games together at the SkyDome in Toronto (including the All-Star Game in '91).

ORIOLE PARK AT CAMDEN YARDS

Oriole Park at Camden Yards, the beautiful new baseball-only facility in downtown Baltimore, was completed in essentially 33 months from the time the process of razing previous structures on the 85-acre parcel began June 28, '89 in the area known as Camden Yards.

The one-time railroad center is 12 minutes west by foot from the City's Inner Harbor, and only 2 blocks from the birthplace of baseball's most legendary hero, George Herman "Babe" Ruth (see "Ruth's Cafe" below).

The ballpark seats 48,041, and the project cost approximately \$105 million. It was designed by the Kansas City architectural firm of Helmut, Obata & Kassabaum (HOK) with direction and input from the Orioles and the State of Maryland, which owns and operates the facility through its agency, the Maryland Stadium Authority (MSA).

Oriole Park is state-of-the-art, yet unique, traditional and intimate in design. It blends with the urban context of downtown Baltimore while taking its image from baseball parks built in the early 20th century.

Steel, rather than concrete trusses, an arched brick facade, a sun roof over the gentle slope of the upper deck, an asymmetrical playing field and natural grass turf are just some of the features that tie it to those magnificent big league ballparks built in the early 1900s.

Ebbets Field (Brooklyn), Shibe Park (Philadelphia), Fenway Park (Boston), Crosley Field (Cincinnati), Forbes Field (Pittsburgh), Wrigley Field (Chicago) and The Polo Grounds (New York) were among the ballparks that served as powerful influences in the design of Oriole Park.

LOCATION/ACCESS

The ballpark is bounded by Russell and Camden Streets to the west and north, respectively; by Howard Street and the old B & O Warehouse on the east, and by Martin Luther King Boulevard to the south. On-site parking extends south to Ostend Street.

It is easily accessible to I-95, I-395 and the Baltimore-Washington Parkway, which in turn lead directly to all major roadways in the Baltimore area.

Oriole Park will also be served generously by 4 public transportation systems whose schedules will be customized to accommodate the needs of fans both before and after the game: MARC trains from Washington as well as from western and northern Maryland; the new Light Rail System (LRT) operating from Timonium, Baltimore County to Camden Yards (and later in the year to Glen Burnie, Anne Arundel County); 24 city bus lines plus special MTA game-day buses from 13 different park-and-ride locations, and the Baltimore Metro (subway).

PARKING

Once in the neighborhood, drivers will choose from among some 5,000 on-site non bumper-to-bumper spaces on the site (over 1,000 more than were available at Memorial Stadium), or some 20,000 additional (for night and weekend games) throughout the downtown, within a maximum of 20 to 25 minutes walking distance.

FIELD OF DREAMS

Sunken Treasure: The field is 16' below street level. As a result, half the fans walk down to their seats and the other half go up. The excavation also helps prevent Oriole Park from dwarfing the B&O Warehouse and the adjacent neighborhood, Ridgely's Delight.

Asymmetry & Such: There is nothing symmetrical about Oriole Park as the posted fence distances indicate. Oriole Park's deepest point is left of dead center (410') just as Fenway Park's (420') is to the right of the center line. Most existing major league playing fields are deepest in straightaway centerfield.

Though it is 15 feet shorter from home plate to the right field corner than down the left field line in the new ballpark, that difference is compensated by a 25' high wall, which extends 100' from the right field line toward center. The fence in the rest of the park is only 7' high, the same height as the temporary fences at Memorial Stadium.

According to studies made before construction began, the prevailing winds will be from the northwest, and will be of some aid to lefthanded pull hitters. Those whose power is to left field are on their own.

The Warehouse (see more below) beyond right field can be reached by a 460-foot drive if it hugs the rightfield line.

Prescription Athletic Turf (PAT) is a sophisticated irrigation and drainage system below a natural grass turf. It is designed to reduce frequency of rainouts while shortening the length of baseball's most exasperating feature, the rain delay.

The PAT system will make it possible to get the field ready for play within half an hour after the end of a heavy rain storm. It will automatically remove as many as 75,000 gallons of rainwater from the field in an hour.

PAT consists of a sand-base root zone, enclosed in a heavy plastic moisture barrier with an extensive drainage system through which a strong vacuum is applied to pull excess water from the field.

Conversely, when the field needs water, an irrigation process can be activated which provides moisture via both surface sprinklers and sub-irrigation mechanisms. The latter will permit watering even during a game. Both the drainage and irrigation features are triggered as needed by a special sensing system, or can be operated manually.

The sod used on the field is comprised of 3 types of Maryland Bluegrass grown at Oakwood Farms in Salisbury, on Maryland's Eastern Shore.

Scoreboards: There are 2 major electronic information centers in the ballpark to enhance enjoyment of the game. Two big boards are located in centerfield, one on top of the other:

- The new Sony JumboTRON video board (22'9" by 31'4"), which replaces the Mitsubishi Diamond Vision model that remains at Memorial Stadium, boasting an improved picture quality that is particularly apparent during day games and
- An equally new incandescent lamp, matrix "game in progress" board (3' by 272'), built by Daktronics, Inc (Brookings, SD) which will be placed on top of the JumboTRON.

The latter features a comprehensive statistics program, unsurpassed in the major leagues; a package that will provide, automatically, myriads of interesting facts and figures. It also has the capability for animation displays, and other crowd-pleasing features.

Mounted on top of the 2 boards is a large double-faced clock built by Maryland by Triangle Signs, that can be read from both inside the ballpark and in downtown Baltimore.

That main scoreboard system also supports 2 weathervane Oriole birds to show players and fans alike the direction of wind flow.

Embedded in the tall rightfield wall is another electronic board (also built by Daktronics) that provides a "good old days" feature missing from most current major league ballparks—permanently posted out-of-town scores. It will accommodate 16 games at one time, posting up-to-the-minute scores via a direct connection with "SportsTicker," the computerized service that tracks all big league games inning-by-inning.

There are, additionally, 2 auxiliary boards for the convenience of those who do not face the 2 big boards in center field.

The Bullpens are located in a terraced area in left center field, one behind the other. The front bullpen is raised 3' above field level, and the one in the back is 6' off the ground to allow fans to identify easily who is warming up in either bullpen.

Each of the 2 bullpens measures 80' by 30' and includes an 18' long heated dugout, a phone, water fountain, restroom, a cable tv hookup and, pitching mounds.

The Clubhouse Area below street level features large and modern locker rooms for home and visiting clubs, an extensive weight room, and brightly lit practice tunnels. The tunnels, each with 2 regulation mounds, can be used either by pitchers to warm up, or by batters, hitting into netting against pitching machines or live arms.

SEATING

There are no columns in the seating bowl of the ballpark, a fact that has drastically reduced obstructed views among the 48,041 green, contoured, slat-back plastic chairs.

Every aisle seat in the park bears an extra feature—a reproduction of the 100-year old logo used by the Baltimore Orioles of the 1890s, a National League team that won consecutive pennants in 1894-95-96.

Throughout the park, tread width (which translates to leg room) is 32" to 33". At Memorial Stadium, it measures as little as 24" in the mezzanine and 26" in many other areas.

In most of the viewing areas, seats will be generally wider (19-21") than Orioles fans are accustomed (16-19" at M.S.). On the club level, chairs will be even roomier (22").

Lower Stand: The lower deck comprises some 18,000 box seats between the foul poles, approximately 7,000 more than at Memorial Stadium. Behind the lower boxes are some 6,800 terrace box seats.

Seats in the lower stand are generally closer to the field. From the front row of seats to 1st and 3rd bases, for example, the distance is 45', roughly 20' closer to fair territory than on 33rd Street. From home plate to the screen measures 57' (4' more than at M.S.).

The Club Level (mezzanine) is a premium area available only to those who have purchased season tickets (and their authorized guests)...Club level stretches from the rightfield foul pole to just beyond the leftfield foul pole, and is accessible by escalators, elevators, stairs and ramps...There is waiter service available at the seats, and behind the seating area on the club level concourse is a climate controlled lounge with private dining and bar areas plus many other amenities.

At Club Level, also, are 72 luxury suites, each containing 10 to 14 seats...These suites can be leased on a yearly basis for between \$55,000 to \$95,000. In addition, there are 4 that are available for rent on an individual game basis. These special party suites can accommodate groups of up to 60 people.

The Upper Deck, which contains 25 rows of seats (the 1st 12 are boxes, the last 13 reserved seats), is neither as high, nor as steep as at Memorial Stadium which has 35 rows and a sharper slope (33 degrees compared to 31 at Oriole Park). A sun roof was constructed to cover half of the upper deck seating area.

General Admission/Bleachers: There are 9 sections of reserved seats in the leftfield upper stand, and 4 sections in a 1,700-seat, old fashioned bleacher section in center below the main scoreboard area.

Senior citizens and children, 12 and under, can purchase bleacher tickets to many Orioles home games for just \$1.

Concourses: On both the lower and upper concourses, fans will be struck by the bright, and open atmosphere that will accommodate an easy flow of pedestrian traffic. On the lower level, the main concourse is 17' wider than at Memorial Stadium (52' compared to 35'), and offers a wide view to surrounding streets thru arched openings.

Wheelchair Seating/Conveniences: There are in excess of 460 wheelchair seats in the new ballpark, more than 10 times the number available in the old one, and they are scattered throughout the facility in all seating areas.

A concept known as "enhanced integration" allows fans in wheelchairs to sit with friends and family. They will also have access to specially designed restrooms, ticket windows and concession stands.

The ramps between levels at the new ballpark have been designed so that those confined to wheelchairs can negotiate them under their own power, and there are even special wheelchair accessible facilities for those boarding MARC and Light Rail trains at the Camden Yards station.

OTHER SIGNIFICANT FEATURES

Sound System: At Memorial Stadium, most fans were no closer to the nearest loudspeaker than 300'-400'. At Oriole Park, no one will be more than 130' from one or more of the 1,000 speakers distributed around the ballpark.³

Hearing Impaired fans may tap into "hearing assistance channels" at their seats through the use of special receivers that will enable them to hear the public address announcements.

Bullpen Parks: Behind the bullpens in left center field is a 2,300 square foot area specially designed for pre-arranged, pre-game picnics...The space can accommodate up to 1,500 people.

Lights: There are 4 light towers, 160' above the ground; 3 on the upper deck sun canopy and one on the warehouse roof. They will accommodate a total of 706 metal halide lamps (each of 1500 watts), and will provide more light with 58 fewer fixtures than at Memorial Stadium. The lighting plan includes an optical system that reduces glare as well as spill lighting into the stands.

An emergency generator is in place to reactivate lights just seconds after a power outage occurs.

CONCESSIONAIRE

ARA Services, the Memorial Stadium concessionaire for the past 8 years, is also operating the concessions at Oriole Park.

ARA has been a part of the design process from the start. The result has been the construction and development of larger, more modern structures spread evenly thru the ballpark, that will provide quicker and more efficient service as well as a vastly expanded food and beverage menu. Among the new features are 3 deli bars, 2 on the main concourse and 1 on the upper deck.

ARA caters the club and private suite level, as well as the public private restaurant facilities in the ballpark complex.

THE WAREHOUSE

The 94-year-old landmark B&O Warehouse, beyond rightfield, is the longest building on the East Coast at 1,016' (but only 51' wide). It has been preserved and now provides unique office space for the Orioles. Roughly $\frac{1}{3}$ of the building at the south end remains unoccupied.

The Orioles' main ticket office will operate out of the northwest corner of the Warehouse (Conway and Eutaw Streets).

Two public facilities, a cafeteria (Pastimes) and a bar/lounge (Bambino) are located on the ground floor of the Warehouse, and on the 7th floor of the exclusive, members-only Camden Club.

The ballpark and Warehouse are separated by a 60' wide promenade extension of Eutaw Street.

PROJECT BACKGROUND

In April '87, the Maryland State Legislature authorized the creation of Maryland Stadium Authority, to proceed with financing and planning a major professional sports complex, comprising 2 separate stadiums on the Camden Yards site which had been selected over 22 others.

Construction of the baseball park was contingent upon the Orioles signing a long-term lease. The football stadium would be built, within the 85-acre parcel, only if the National Football League awards Baltimore a franchise to replace the departed Colts.

On May 2, '88, the Orioles committed to that long-term lease (15 years). In a dramatic pre-game announcement at Memorial Stadium that evening on "Fantastic Fans" Night, Maryland Governor **William Donald Schaefer** told a crowd in excess of 50,000 that the Orioles and the MSA had reached an agreement that day that would bind the Orioles to Baltimore until they replaced the departed Colts.

Among the fans there that night was a man who had helped make the agreement and the new ballpark possible, Orioles owner **Edward Bennett Williams**. It would be the last time he would ever see his ballclub play. He passed away 3 months later.

The MSA began acquiring the property in the Camden Yards area shortly after that, and in June '89, initiated the asbestos removal and demolition processes necessary to clearing the site for excavation and construction.

CAMDEN YARDS, A BRIEF HISTORY

The earliest event of historic interest in the Camden Yards area dates back to 1781-82 when the great French General Comte de Rochambeau and his forces camped there on the way to and from Yorktown, VA where they helped General George Washington overcome the British (General Cornwallis) in the final decisive battle of the Revolutionary War.

Nearly half a century later, in 1828, the B&O Railroad began construction of a rail line that would cross the Allegheny Mountains to the Ohio Valley. It was hoped that the new line would nullify the serious economic losses suffered in this area, as the result of the opening of the Erie Canal in New York State (1825)⁵.

During the long construction process, steam locomotives replaced horses (1832) and passenger service from Baltimore to Washington, out of Clare Station (now the site of the B&O Railroad Museum, a few blocks from Camden Yards) commenced in 1835.

Finally, by late 1852, 24 years and 379 miles later, the B&O's Ohio Valley line reached its destination, Wheeling, WV. It was in that year also that the construction of Camden Station⁶ began. Five years later, in 1857, it opened the ground floor of the family residence, located at Conway Street & Little Paca. It was one of at least 5 saloons owned or managed by the elder Ruth

By now, freight facilities, just below Camden Street, were also operational. The B&O was prospering, and Baltimore's population was growing dramatically.

Since the B&O owned the only rail line to Washington, every US president from 1857 to 1873 passed through Camden Station, enroute to or from the Capital. In that period, trains arriving at other stations in Baltimore, bound for Washington, had to be drawn by horse through the city to Camden Station (steam engines weren't allowed on the streets).

During the Civil War, Camden Yards played an historic role. On Apr 19, 1861, for example, Camden Station was witness to a confrontation between an angry mob of stone-throwing Southern sympathizers and a 220-man regiment of the 6th Massachusetts Infantry. The latter was part of a force of 75,000 Union troops ordered by **President Abraham Lincoln** to Washington to protect the Capital following the attack on Ft Sumter.

On Pratt Street just north of the station, the mob attempted to prevent the soldiers from entering the depot for the last leg of the trip, and in the fight that ensued, 4 soldiers and 12 civilians were killed and many more wounded. **These were the 1st casualties of the Civil War.**⁷

Camden Station also served, reportedly, as an important "underground railway" station, transporting freed slaves to the north.

President Lincoln made at least 3 historic trips through Baltimore and Camden Station:

(1) On his way to Washington for the inaugural after his election to the presidency, he slipped through the station earlier than intended to avoid crowds, after **Allan Pinkerton**, the 1st head of the US Secret Service who later founded a well-known detective agency, uncovered an assassination plot (Feb 23, 1861).

(2) Enroute to (and from) Gettysburg where he dedicated the battlefield cemetery in 1863 (Nov 19), and

(3) In 1865 (Apr 24), after his assassination, his funeral train stopped at Camden Yards where his casket was transferred to the rotunda at the Merchant's Exchange Building⁸. There his body lay in state for 4 hours before continuing the journey that would ultimately wind its way to Springfield, IL.

After the war between the states, the Camden section developed into a busy manufacturing area as well as a railroad center, and by the last decade of the 1890s, business was booming.

The Howard Street Tunnel which connected Mt Royal and Camden Stations, was finished in 1895 and, in 1898, **The Warehouse** was built as part of a major expansion of the yards' freight facilities. The 8-story structure could handle 60 freight cars on one side, and 100 wagons on the other, all at the same time.

Camden Yards continued to prosper well into the 20th century, and the depot never looked better than in 1912 when the B&O spent \$1 million to spruce it up prior to the Democratic National Convention in Baltimore that summer. It was during that convention that **Woodrow Wilson** was nominated on the 46th ballot⁹.

After World War II, however, railroads gradually lost their supremacy with the rapid development of the airline industry and the construction of the interstate highway system. The baggage building adjacent to the Station closed in 1971, the Warehouse in 1974, and by 1980 Camden Station was handling only commuter trains between Baltimore and Washington.

Those commuter trains continue to run (operated by MARC) and will be an important element in the transportation system serving the new ballpark.

Camden Yards has played a significant role in Baltimore's (and the nation's) history and its economic development over the last 135 years. It served first and foremost as a rail center, then for a time as a manufacturing and industrial park.

Now, it takes on a new and exciting role, as the hub of American League Baseball in the 5-state region comprising Maryland, Delaware, Southeastern Pennsylvania, Virginia and West Virginia, plus the District of Columbia.

RUTH'S CAFE

During the early 1900s ('06-'12), Babe Ruth's father operated Ruth's Cafe on the ground floor of the family residence, located at Conway Street & Little Paca. It was one of at least 5 saloons owned or managed by the elder Ruth

(George Herman Sr) at one time or other in this working class Camden neighborhood. Nickel beer and 10 cent soup prepared by the Babe's mom at lunchtime were specialties of the house.

The significance of the house/saloon at 406 Conway Street is simply that was located in what is now centerfield at Oriole Park. A Frederick archeological firm, Christopher Goodwin & Associates, with help from Babe's then 90-year-old sister, Mary "Mamie" Ruth Moberly, located remains of the house beneath the asphalt at the loading docks of the B. Green Warehouse.

The Babe didn't spend a lot of time at the house, actually. During that period when the Babe was between 11 and 17, he lived at St Mary's Industrial School in West Baltimore where he had been dispatched at the age of seven. It was at St Mary's that he was ultimately signed to his 1st pro contract with Jack Dunn Sr in 1914. He made his professional debut with the International League Orioles soon after, but in July of that year his contract was sold to the Boston Red Sox. And, you know the rest of the story.

Footnotes to Oriole Park at Camden Yards:

1-Among other facilities designed by HOK are: The New Comiskey Park in Chicago, and Joe Robbie Stadium in Miami.

2-There are nearly 4,500 obstructed view seats at Memorial Stadium. At Oriole Park, closer to 100 are obstructed, most by safety railings required by building regulations.

3-At Memorial Stadium, the speakers are all clustered in centerfield.

4-The MSA has led a spirited campaign to regain an NFL franchise for Baltimore. The league's decision on that issue could come as soon as October this year.

5-In the early 1820s, before the Erie Canal, Baltimore's trade volume had made it the 2nd largest city in the country.

6-Camden Station, now undergoing extensive renovation, is one of 3 structures in the Camden Yards area now listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The others are the Bromo Seltzer Tower (north of the ballpark on Eutaw), and the Marsh McLennan Building (Pratt & Howard), so designated because of its rare cast-iron front.

The Bromo Seltzer Tower, a replica of the tower atop the Palazzo Vecchio in Florence, was built in '11 by Captain Isaac Emerson whose company produced the then popular headache remedy.

A large replica of a Bromo-Seltzer bottle (51' high) was mounted on the top of the tower at one time, but was taken down in '36 for safety's sake. The building was given to the city of Baltimore some years ago by the Warf-Lambert Company.

7-The attack at Ft Sumter had produced no casualties.

8-The Merchants Exchange Building was later demolished, and the Custom House, at 40 S. Gay St, now occupies that site.

9-After winning the Democratic primary, Wilson defeated both the Republican incumbent, 340-pound William Howard Taft, and former president Theodore Roosevelt, in the general election. Roosevelt, a one-time Republican headed the Progressive (Bull Moose) Party ticket.

MEMORIAL STADIUM

33rd Street & Ellerslie Avenue (1954-1991)

For 38 years, it was home to the Baltimore Orioles who hosted more than 3,000 games there (3,036 to be exact, including 30 in post-season). They won some (1,706—more than their share), lost some (1,321—385 few) and, some ended in a tie (9).

The relationship between the Orioles and Memorial Stadium began officially on Apr 15, '54, and ended Oct 6, '91. In that time, some 51,268,000 paid to watch the Birds play baseball on 33rd Street (including post-season) in 2,746 playing dates.

Starting Up

After World War II, plans to erect a roof over the stands of the existing facility—known as Municipal Stadium—gave way to the realization that Baltimore would never get a major league franchise unless a new ballpark was built.

Construction of Baltimore's Memorial Stadium began on the site of the old in '49. A single deck concrete grandstand with no roof was completed

'50 with 20,000 chair seats (there were nothing but benches in the original facility), and home plate was moved from its original location in what was to become leftfield. But, the stadium's external trappings were left unchanged, and it was still far from big league.

Soon after that, plans for improving the stadium further, to satisfy major league requirements, were suspended after a 2nd bond issue was defeated.

Finally in '53, bond issues were approved and work began anew. Despite the construction, the IL Orioles continued to play there (thru '53), as did the Baltimore Colts (nee Texans) when they emigrated from Dallas that same year.

Essentially the new stadium, seating capacity approximately 47,700, was completed in Oct '53, but refinements continued thru the spring of '54, the modern AL Orioles' 1st season in Baltimore.

The cost of the project, built on 28 1/4 acres of city-owned property was \$6 million.

Original Municipal Stadium

Municipal Stadium, completed in '22, was built expressly for football¹. However, when old Oriole Park (nw corner of Greenmount Ave & 29th Street intersection), owned by the (Jack) Dunn family, burned down on the night and early morning of July 3-4, '44, Municipal Stadium became, of necessity, the new home of the Orioles.

During a hastily scheduled 2-week road trip, the stadium was made ready for baseball. Later that year, the Orioles won the IL pennant, then captured the Little World Series. One of those games, on Oct 9, against the Louisville Colonels (champions of the American Assoc), drew an astonishing 52,833.

That crowd was 21,000 larger than the real World Series game between the Browns and Cardinals had attracted that afternoon in St Louis, and remained a Baltimore baseball record until the '66 World Series. That turnout was an important catalyst for the City's dream of acquiring big league status.

Mammoth Cavern

When the Orioles played their 1st game at the new ballpark, it was a mammoth, impersonal cavern (outfielder Gil Coan said at the time, "To play that outfield right, you need 5 outfielders."). It was 450' from home plate to dead centerfield (left and right center were almost as deep), and much of the playing field was surrounded by a green concrete wall, ranging from 8' to 14' high².

The outfield boundaries were ultimately contracted 4 times ('56, '59, '62 & '76), gradually reducing the distance to straightaway center some 45' to 405', and the power alleys accordingly.³

Stadium Changes/Improvements

Originally, the Orioles' dugout was on the 1st base side, and there was an 8' wall separating the front row of the boxes from the field. Baltimore led the world in foul territory.

The O's moved to the 3rd base dugout at the All-Star break in '59, but it wasn't until '61 that the field box seats (2,600 of them) were installed (necessitating construction of new dugouts), giving the stadium a warmer, more intimate atmosphere. It was at that time that the bullpens, originally located in the right and left field corners (in plain view) were moved behind the outfield fence.

In '64, 4 additional upper deck sections were added, increasing the capacity by another 2,600. In '70 (mid-season) a new scoreboard was constructed (in left field), and the original, squirrel-infested model demolished.

Subsequently, the splintery wooden benches (without backs) that covered the entire 2nd deck were replaced by chairs and metal benches with back rests and a 35th row was added.

In '80, 6 new towers, housing a new ticket window, ticket office space, storage areas and rest rooms, were completed. The last major improvement was finished in '85 and comprised expanded Orioles office space

and a large new state-of-the-art video board (Diamond Vision by subishi) was added in right-center field.


1-It was the site of 2 Army-Navy games ('22 & '44), the latter of which determined the national championship, but by and large it was underutilized and became known as "lonely acres."

2-In '54, only 42 home runs were hit in 77 games at the stadium (a mere 11% of the O's). During the Birds' 1st 7 years there (thru '60), the Baltimore batters ranked last in the majors in homers every year.

3-By '87, the reduction of the outfield distances and greater emphasis on the long ball had resulted in a 5-fold increase in home run production at Memorial Stadium (235 in 82 games that year).

There were a total of 4,743 home runs hit at Memorial Stadium, 2,487 by the Orioles and 2,256 by the opposition...In 27,727 innings, 23,471 runners crossed home plate (O's-12,221, opponents-11,250-regular season only).

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION TO & FROM ORIOLE PARK

Baltimore METRO: The City's regional subway system, running from Owings Mills in northwest Baltimore County to downtown, is ideal for fans coming from Carroll and Baltimore Counties. Serving the corridors along I-795 and Maryland Routes 140 and Route 30, METRO provides more than 8,000 free parking spaces at stations along the way.

Two downtown stations, Lexington Market (Lexington & Eutaw) and Charles Center (Baltimore & Charles) are within a 5-10 minute walk of the ballpark. METRO passengers can also transfer to the LRT system at Howard and Lexington, or catch the Eutaw Street shuttle to complete the trip to Oriole Park's front door.

Light Rail (LRT): The brand new LRT will connect north central Baltimore County (Timonium), Baltimore City and northern Anne Arundel County (Glen Burnie) over a 22-mile stretch. LRT service from Timonium to Camden Yards, a 30-minute trip, will operate all season long. Additional service from Anne Arundel County will begin in late '92. There are 2 convenient LRT stations in the ballpark area: Pratt Street (just north of the park) and Camden Yards (immediately east of the Warehouse).

MARC Trains: Maryland's passenger railroad system operates trains to and from every game at several locations in and around the state, including:

From Washington, DC, and intermediate points (Prince George's, Montgomery, Howard, Anne Arundel & Baltimore Counties) via both the Camden and Penn Lines (CSXT & Amtrak corridors). The trip from Union Station to Camden Yards takes about 45 minutes.

From Frederick and Montgomery counties via the Brunswick Line (CSXT corridor), and from Cecil, Harford, and (northeast) Baltimore Counties via the Penn Line (Amtrak corridor).

Camden and Brunswick Line trains arrive at the new Camden Yards Terminal (east of the Warehouse), only a flyball away from Oriole Park.

Penn Line passengers arrive at Penn Station (North Charles St) where they can transfer to ballpark shuttle buses.

MTA BUSES: MTA offers direct service to the ballpark from 13 regional park-and-ride locations:

Additionally, 24 MTA bus routes provide regular service from all points in the Baltimore region (more than 5 times the number that served the Memorial Stadium area). Most of these routes pass within a few blocks of the ballpark's Camden Street entrances and are particularly convenient to those coming from within the beltway.

MTA Shuttle Buses operate between the more distant parking areas and the ballpark: east-west on Pratt & Lombard Streets and north-south along the Eutaw & Paca Street corridor.

Arrival/Departure Features: Special bus zones have been established right next to Oriole Park. In many instances, bus patrons will arrive and depart within 50' of a gate. These special zones will be closer than 95% of the on-site/adjacent parking spaces serving the ballpark.

BLUEFIELD (Rookie): The Orioles finished 2nd in the Appalachian League and as a club were 2nd in batting (.254). The pitching staff was also 2nd in the League with a 3.12 era.

Clayton Byrne, an Australian, led the team in hits (71), total bases (97), and batting average (.321). He was named to the Appalachian League All-Star team.

GULF COAST (Rookie): The Orioles had the organization's top record (35-24, .593) and won the league title. They also had the best home record (20-9) in the GCL. After earning a bye in the 1st round, the O's were defeated in the championship series by the Expos, 2 games to 1.

The Orioles led the league in on base percentage (.345) and walks (276) while the pitching staff ranked 3rd in era (2.97).

Duane Thomas led the league in home runs (10) and was 5th in rbi (32). He also led the team in total bases (77). **Rich Forney** was 7-0 with a 2.19 era. He tied for the league lead in wins. He and Thomas were named to the Gulf Coast League All-Star team.

INSIDE-THE-PARK HOME RUNS

On June 8, '90, Phil Bradley would hit the 11th (off Greg Cadaret) and last inside-the-park home run in Memorial Stadium history, the 10th by an Oriole, and the only inside homer by anyone in the stadium last 17 seasons as an AL ballpark. Bradley's drive was the 1st on 33rd Street since his childhood baby-sitter, Al Bumby, hit one off the Yankees' Steve Kline, Apr 19, '74.

In 38 seasons only one visiting player ever hit an inside-the-park home at Memorial Stadium. That was the Tigers' Bill Tuttle, on Jun 18, '55, off the O's Jim McDonald.

Bradley's remains the only inside-homer by an Oriole, home or away since Bumby connected in Chicago off Jesse Jefferson Aug 21, '76.

GRAND SLAM NOTES

O's lead the Majors since '80: The Orioles have belted 58 grand slams starting with '80, 10 more than any other club (the Red Sox are next with 48 followed by the Angels with 43 and the Yankees with 40).

Thru the Years: The O's have "outslammed" their opponents 142-90 over the last 38 years (including a 75-41 advantage at Baltimore).

Three in One Game: The Orioles and Texas set a major league record on Aug. 6, '86 when the two teams combined to hit three grand slams in Texas' 13-11 win at Memorial Stadium (the record was equalled on June 3, '87, Hou. vs. Chi). **Jim Dwyer** and **Larry Sheets** hit grand slams for the O's, both in the 4th inning. It marked only the 5th time in major league history that one club has hit 2 grand slams in a single inning. It was the 4th time the O's had hit 2 grand slams in the game. **Toby Harrah** hit Texas' slam.

Two in a Game: Only 7 players have hit two grand slams in one game in baseball history and only 3 have hit them on consecutive at-bats. In both situations, two of them were Orioles: **Jim Gentile** hit two in a row at Minnesota on May 9, '61 (Metropolitan Stadium off **Pete Ramos** and **Paul Giel**), and **Frank Robinson** did the same on June 26, '70 at RFK Stadium in Washington (off **Joe Coleman, Jr.** and **Joe Grzenda**).

Gentile Hit 5 in '61: Gentile set an American League record and tied the major league standard in '61 when he hit 5 bases loaded home runs. The only prior player to reach that total was the Cubs' **Ernie Banks** in '55. In '87, **Don Mattingly** of the Yankees broke that record by hitting 6 grand slams.

Post-Season Slams-Slugging Pitchers: Only two pitchers have ever hit grand slam home runs in post-season play. Both were Orioles at the time, and both did it in 1970. In game one of the '70 ALCS, **Mike Cuellar** hit one off the Twins' **Jim Perry** (at Minny) and in the 3rd game of the World Series vs. the Reds, **Dave McNally** found the range off **Wayne Granger** (at Baltimore).

The blast by **Cuellar** was the only ALCS grand slam ever until **Don Baylor** hit one for the Angels vs. Milwaukee in '82 (off **Moose Haas**) . . . Only two bases loaded homers have ever been hit in NLCS play: the Dodgers' **Ron Cey** and **Dusty Baker** in '77.

Opponents: Seven opponents have hit two career slams each against the O's. Nobody has hit more . . . Three have hit two at Memorial Stadium: **Roy Sievers** (Was.), **Moose Skowron** (N.Y.), **Mike Epstein** (Was.). There have been 13 alien pitchers to throw up two grand slams each to Baltimore batters.

Orioles "Gophers": Among Orioles pitchers, **Milt Pappas** was the most generous. He gave up 6 bases loaded homers during his tenure in Baltimore and allowed 9 overall in his major league career, tying **Jerry Reuss** (1969-90) and **Ned Garver** (1948-61) for most career slams allowed in the majors. **Dave McNally** and **Scott McGregor**, are next in line with 4 apiece. On the other hand, **Jim Palmer** never allowed a slam in 558 games spanning nearly 4,000 innings.

Notes on 20-Game Winners

Although the Orioles have had only one in the past 11 years, Baltimore pitchers have produced 23 20-game seasons in the past 24 years (starting '68), substantially more than any other major league club (Oakland is next with 14).

From '68 thru '80, a span of 13 years, at least one Oriole pitcher accumulated 20 or more victories to set a major league record. The old standard was 12 by the New York Giants from '03 to '14, a mark single-handedly assured by Christy Mathewson who won 20+ in each of those years.

In 1971 four Baltimore pitchers reached the 20-win plateau only other foursome in the entire history of major league baseball have achieved the feat was a quartet from the 1920 White Sox (8 years earlier): **Urban "Red" Faber**-23, **Claude Williams**-22, **Dick Kerr**-21 and **Ed Cicotte**-21. Despite that achievement, the White Sox finished second that year, two games behind Cleveland.

The four Orioles all won their 20th games within 6 days: McNamee was the first on 9/21; then in a series in Cleveland, the other three joined him: **Cuellar** (9/24—first game-clinched division title), **Palmer** (9/24—2nd game), and **Palmer** (9/26).

Stone was the earliest 20-game winner in club history, winning his 20th game on August 19 en route to a team record 25 victories in '80. Three other Orioles' hurlers have recorded their 20th wins in August: **McNamee** (8/25) and **Cuellar** (8/27) in '71 and **Palmer** (8/25) in '75.

The first Oriole to win 20, and the only one in the club's first seasons in Baltimore ('54 thru '67) was lefthander **Steve Barber** in '63.

After one of the finest seasons ever by a Major League shortstop, Cal Ripken was named unanimously as the '91 winner of the **Louis M. Hatter Most Valuable Oriole Award**, presented annually by the Sports Boosters of Maryland Inc.

It was Cal's 2nd consecutive MVO Trophy and the 4th of his career. Earlier he had twice shared the honor with **Eddie Murray** ('83 & '88).

The Sports Boosters initiated the MVO trophy back in 1954, the Orioles' 1st season in Baltimore. Several years ago they renamed the award in memory of the late **Lou Hatter**, the distinguished and lovable "dean" of Baltimore baseball writers, who spent 27 years writing Orioles baseball for the **SUN**.

The winner is selected by vote of press, radio and television reporters who cover the Orioles on a regular basis.

Leading the list is **Brooks Robinson** whose 16 tie him with former pitcher **Jim Kaat** for most won by a single player at any position (**Robert Clemente & Willie Mays** are tied for 3rd with 12 each). Others: **Paul Blair & Mark Belanger** (8 each); **Jim Palmer & Bobby Grich** (4 each); **Dave Johnson & Murray** (3 each), and **Luis Aparicio** (2 of the 9 he earned in his major league career).

Righthanded pitcher **Leslie "Buster" Narum** is the only Oriole ever to hit a home run in his 1st major league plate appearance. He entered a game in Detroit on May 3, '63 in relief of **Chuck Estrada**, and homered in the 4th inning off lefthanded **Don Mossi** with **John Orsino** aboard. It was to be for Buster, a long-time Orioles farmhand, his only at bat in a Baltimore uniform.

The Orioles went on to win the game, but Narum, who worked 2.2 scoreless innings was not a pitcher of record. The win went to **Wes Stock**.

That was the first of 7 appearances, all in relief, Narum made for the O's. He was 0-0 with 0 saves before being dealt to the Washington Senators.

The O's spent 43 of the season's 1st 74 days in last place...On June 22, they moved past Cleveland into 6th place and stayed there for all but one of the rest of the season...They spent 108 straight days in 6th place before moving into a 5th place tie with the Yankees on Sep 29.

STREAKS: Only once all season did the O's win more than 6 games on a 10-game stretch, that came June 22-July 1, when they went 8-2...Only 4 times all season did the O's win as many as 3 straight games (3 straight), 4 straight once and a season-high 5 straight one time, Aug 12-15. Conversely, the O's avoided any prolonged losing streaks...They were 0 of only 2 AL teams that didn't lose more than 6 straight games at least once during the season...The Red Sox and the O's longest losing streaks were 6 games apiece.

O'S 1ST EVER WITH FEWER THAN 100 E'S 3 STRAIGHT YEARS: The O's captured their 14th AL fielding title with a major league low 91 errors, 2nd fewest in club history...The Orioles also became the 1st team in major league history to make fewer than 100 errors in 3 straight seasons...The O's made 87 in '89 and 93 in '90.

The O's led the majors in fielding despite 19 errors by their 1st basemen, 2nd most in the AL...The O's also set 2 club records: most consecutive errorless games (13, Sep 12-26) and most errorless games in a season (97, beating old mark by 4)...The O's were 49-48 when they didn't make an error and 18-47 when they did.

CATCHER'S EFFICIENCY: Orioles catchers threw out 47 of 154 (.305) attempted base stealers, their best mark since '83 when **Rick Dempsey, Joe Nolan and John Steffero** threw out 40 of 129, a .310 mark. The '91 breakdown: **Hoiles** (24 caught stealing out of 73 attempts), **Melvin** (18 of 65), **Tackett** (0 of 3) and **Whitt** (5 of 13).

ORIOLES THIRD BASEMEN, BEST NUMBERS SINCE BROOKS: Orioles 3rd basemen—**Leo Gomez, Craig Worthington, and Tim Hulett**—combined for a .974 fielding percentage, best in the AL and the highest percentage by O's 3rd basemen since '72, when **Brooks Robinson** had a .976 mark.

BATTING: O'S TOUGHEST TO SHUT OUT IN AL: Although they were 12th in hitting (.254), and 10th in runs scored (686), the O's were the toughest team to shut out in the AL, blanked only 6 times, fewest by an Oriole team

UNDER JOHN OATES: Orioles went 54-71 (.432) when John was named manager May 23...He signed a 2-year contract to return as the O's skipper the day after the season ended.

DAYS IN EACH PLACE: 1st: 2nd (0); 3rd (3); 4th (2); 5th: 6th (123); 7th (43)...The O's

since '84...The O's struck out 974 times, most since '68 (1,019) and the 4th highest total in club history...The Orioles' 256 doubles were 5th in club history and their .401 slugging mark was bettered by only 4 other major league teams.

O's stole only 50 bases, their fewest since '82 (49)...Six major leaguers stole more than the O's: **Marquis Grissom**, Montreal (76), **Otis Nixon**, Atlanta (72), **Rickey Henderson**, Oakland (58), **Delino DeShields**, Montreal (56), **Roberto Alomar**, Toronto (53) and **Tim Raines**, White Sox (51). The O's .262 batting average on the road and .244 mark at home marked the 11th time in the last 12 years that the team has hit higher on the road than at home...The O's .252 average with men in scoring position was 13 points below the league average, but their .321 mark with the bases loaded was 30 points above the AL average.

HOME RUNS: The Birds finished 3rd in the majors in home runs with 170, the 8th highest total in club history...With slugger **Glenn Davis** returning from the disabled list in late August, the Orioles belted a major league-high 42 round trippers after Sep 1 and homered in 27 of their last 33 games.

The Orioles cleared the fence 37 times in September alone, the most they'd hit in one month since August, '87 (40)...The O's had 8 players with at least 10 home runs. Only one other major league club had as much balance; Texas also had 8 players in double figures...The O's increased their homer output almost 30 percent over '90, when they hit 132.

FALLING BEHIND: Forty-three times the Orioles fell behind by at least 3 runs before the 4th inning...Thirty-nine of those games were losses...The Orioles were outscored 134-67 in the 1st inning and 236-138 in the 1st 2 innings.

PITCHING: The staff's 4.59 era was the highest in the majors and the 2nd highest in club history, topped by only '87 (5.01)...While the 1534 hits allowed were also the 2nd most in club history and 3rd most in the majors, the 504 walks were 3rd fewest in the league.

O'S BULLPEN BUSIEST: The Orioles' bullpen threw a club record and major league-high 557.2 innings...The bullpen was 25-26 with 42 saves in 58 opportunities (.724) with the AL's 5th best era (3.45, ip-557.2, h-509,

er-214, bb-186, so-389)...The relievers contributed to a number of frequency records as well: tied ML record for most pitchers used no-hitter (4, July 13 at Oakland); tied ML record for most pitchers used a doubleheader (13, Aug 13 vs Texas) and set club record for most pitchers used in a shutout (5, Aug 2 at Chicago).

RELEASED HELP: Three key members of the Orioles' pitching staff—Mike Flanagan, Todd Frohwirth and Jim Poole, all are players who have been released. In relief, the trio had a combined 2.11 era (ip-230.2, bb-54, so-166) and held the opposition to a .205 batting average (814-167)...The rest of the Orioles' staff worked to a 5.05 era (ip-127.2, h-1367, er-689).

STARTERS: Overall, O's starters were 42-69 with the highest era in majors (5.29, ip-900, h-1025, er-529, bb-318, so-479)...Fifty-five times starters failed to go 5 innings (12-43)...The Orioles' season-opening starting rotation (Jose Mesa, Jeff Ballard, Dave Johnson and Jeff Robinson) had a total of 18 times in 78 starts...IN A ONE MONTH SPAN, Aug 12-Sep 11, the Orioles' got a glimpse of a solid starting staff when their top 3 starters—Bob Milacki, Mike Mussina and Ben McDonald—combined for a 2.84 (ip-131, er-42) and pitched at least into the 7th inning in 16 of the combined 18 starts. However, their record was only 6-6.

Until McDonald was shelved with a shoulder injury in September, the Orioles' starting rotation in August and September was the youngest in the majors, averaging 24 years, 2 months, just ahead of Atlanta and Cleveland (26 years, 4 months each)...The O's starting 5 during that span was McDonald (23 years old), Mesa (25), Mussina (22), Milacki (27) and Arthur Rhodes (21).

NO-HITTERS: On July 13 at Oakland, the Orioles beat Oakland 2-0 in the Orioles' 1st no-hitter since '69. Milacki, Flanagan, Mark Williamson and Gregg Olson combined for only the second 4-pitcher no-hitter in major league history. The other was by Oakland (Vida Blue, Glen Abbott, Paul Lindblad, and Rollie Fingers) on Sep 28, '75. Milacki started for the Orioles, but left after 6 innings when he was struck out on the right hand by a ball hit by Willie Wilson. Flanagan, Williamson and Olson each worked an inning.

On Aug 11, Chicago's Wilson Alvarez threw the 6th and last no-hitter in Orioles' history. The 24-year-old rookie was the youngest to throw a no-hitter since Oakland's Vida Blue in '70...Cal Ripken reached on a throwing error by catcher Ron Karkovice in the 7th inning, the closest the O's came to a base hit.

O'S PINCH HITTERS, DESIGNATED HITTERS LED LEAGUE IN HOMERS: Orioles designated hitters clouted a club record and AL-high 34 home runs, most in the league since Toronto hit 38 in '87...Oriole pinch hitters belted 7 pinch-hit home runs, tops in the AL and their most since '84...Oriole designated hitters also knocked in 105 runs, 2nd in the AL...One year earlier, O's DHs had 19 homers and 65 rbi.

Sam Horn led all lefthanded dh's with 21 homers...Horn also led all Orioles pinch hitters with 3 home runs, tying the club mark accomplished 4 other times, most recently by Jim Dwyer in '86...Oriole pinch hitters belted 7 grand slams (Joe Orsulak and Dwight Evans), the 14th and 15th in club history...There have been 5 pinch-hit grand slams in the AL over the past 2 years and the Orioles have hit 4 of them: Phil Bradley, Evans, Horn and Orsulak...The other was hit in '91 by former Oriole Mickey Tettleton.

O's pinch hitters batted .254, 5th in the AL...O's pinch hitters were led by Evans (.400, 25-10), who was 3rd in the AL in batting among pinch hitters with 20 or more games...His 10 pinch hits were the most by an Oriole since Terry Crowley and Lee May each had 11 in '80.

THE RIPKENS MOVE PAST THE TORRES: Since Bill broke into the major leagues in 1987, the two Ripkens have now played in 555 games together; started 526 games and turned 247 double plays....Prior to the Ripkens, the most any brother double play combo had ever played side-by-side in the majors were Pittsburgh's O'Brien twins (Eddie and Johnny) who appeared in approximately 100 games together with the Pirates in 1953-55-56....The Ripkens are the 5th set of brothers to play the keystone combination.

FROM THE LEFT SIDE: The Orioles left side of the infield, shortstops Cal Ripken and Juan Bell, and 3rd basemen Leo Gomez, Craig Worthington, and Tim Hulett combined for 58 home runs while making only 23 errors...Both represented the best totals in the majors.

DOUBLEHEADERS: The Orioles had the best record in the majors in doubleheaders, winning 2 and splitting one...The O's have played 529 doubleheaders and are 151-117-261...The O's are 3-0-6 in their last 9 doubleheaders since they were last swept, Aug 1, '89 at Boston.

MEMORIAL STADIUM: The Orioles were one of 4 major league clubs that won more games on the road than at home...O's were 33-48 at home, 34-47 on the road...Only Kansas City, California and Montreal also enjoyed more success on the road than at home...The Orioles' home mark was the 3rd worst in club history, ahead of only '55 (30-47) and '87 (31-51)...The Orioles leave Memorial Stadium with an all-time regular season record of 1687-1310-9 (1706-1321-9 if you include post-season games on 33rd Street).

ROOKIES: The O's used a total of 14 rookies...Leo Gomez (16) and Chito Martinez (13) combined for more homers than any other rookie teammates in the majors...Gomez led all major league rookies in homers...David Segui batted .278, 3rd among AL rookies (min. 81 games). Mike Mussina had the lowest era, 2.87, among the 29 major league rookies with at least 10 starts.

APRIL: For the 6th straight year, the O's were under .500 in April....The Birds reached .500 only twice all season, Apr 13 (2-2) and again for the final time on Apr 15 (3-3)....Cal Ripken hit .338 for the month, his teammates hit just .216....Glenn Davis homered in his last game, Apr 24 at Chicago before going on the disabled list with a neck injury on Apr 26

.... He missed the next 105 games On Apr 28, **Dwight Evans** homered off **Erik Hanson** of Seattle, becoming the 17th player in ML history to hit a homer in 20 consecutive seasons.

MAY : The O's 10-17 May in '91 matched '88 as their worst May '57...Cal batted .349 and **Mike Devereaux** .348...On May 15, the O's hosted **Queen Elizabeth II** and **Prince Philip** of England, President **Mrs. Bush**, but lost to Oakland, 6-3, despite **Randy Milligan**'s 2 home runs.

On May 23, with a 13-24 record, **John Oates** was named to replace **Robinson** as manager...In a poignant and memorable moment, May 30, O's beat Boston, 9-3, in Dwight Evans' return to Fenway...He received standing ovations in the game while another ex-Carmine, **Sam Horn**, hit a 3-run homer off **Jeff Gray** in the 8th inning to cinch the victory.

JUNE: The only month the O's didn't finish below .500, and surprisingly, they did it with a 5.01 era, their highest of any month all year...They closed out the month winning 10 of their last 15...Cal Ripken led the O's with a .371 average, and Milligan hit .341 with 6 homers...On June 17, the O's snapped Minnesota's 15-game win streak as they beat the Twins, 6-5, on Milligan's 2-out, 2-run double off **Rick Aguilera** in the bottom of the 9th inning...Two days later, June 19, on "Turn Back the Clock Day," the O's, down 4-3, scored 5 runs in the 9th off **Gregg Olson** (3 wild pitches and a throwing error) as 44,742 looked on in disbelief at an 8-4 loss.

On June 23, the O's swept a pair at KC, both in extra innings, as the 2 teams combined for 65 hits and 36 runs...The O's scored 4 in the top of the 10th on **Chris Hoiles**' grand slam in the 1st game to tie it before winning in 10 innings...In Game 2, the Royals scored 5 in the 9th to send it into overtime, before the O's won 9-8 in 12 innings.

JULY : The O's 17 losses in July were their most for that month in 2 years...Hoiles (.319) and Devereaux (.304) were the only Orioles over .300...Four Orioles, **Milacki**, **Flanagan**, **Williamson** and **Olson** combined to pitch the 5th no-hitter in team history and the club's 1st ever on the road, in a 2-0 win at Oakland July 13...On July 15, **Chito Martinez** hit a 2-run homer with 2 out in the 9th off AL save leader **Bryan Harvey**, giving the O's a 2-1 win at California...Horn fanned 6 times at KC, July 17, tying an ML record...On July 30, the Orioles dropped 3 veteran pitchers (**Jeff Ballard**, **Jeff Robinson** and **Paul Kilgus**) and added 3 rookie pitchers from Rochester (**Mike Mussina**, **Jim Poole** and **Stacy Jones**).

AUGUST : **Joe Orsulak** batted .384 (99-38), 2nd in the AL, and the best month by an Oriole since **Eddie Murray** hit .385 in May, '84...On Aug 2, the O's set a club record for most pitchers used in a shutout (5) as **Mike McDonald**, **Flanagan**, **Williamson**, **Poole** and **Olson** won at Chicago, 5-0...On Aug 11, Chicago rookie **Wilson Alvarez** threw a no-hitter in his 1st ML start as the Sox won 7-0 at Memorial Stadium...On Aug 13, the O's used 13 pitchers (7 in Game 1 and 6 in Game 2) in a sweep of visiting Texas, tying an ML record for most pitchers used in a twinbill...On Aug 14, rookie **Mussina** earned his 1st ML win, fanning 10, while fellow rookie **Chito Martinez** hit 2 homers as the O's beat Texas...In his 2nd game back off the DL, **Glenn Davis** tied his career-high with 5 rbi leading the O's to an 8-1 win, Aug 20, at Texas. On Aug 27, Orsulak's 21-game hitting streak, the longest in club history, was snapped.

SEPTEMBER-OCTOBER: The O's socked 37 homers in September, the most in a month since August, '87, but were 13-14...The Orioles lost a club record 5 games in October (1-5)...Cal Ripken was named AL Player of the Month for September after batting .349 with 8 homers and **Brady Anderson** hit .452 (42-19) in a limited role...On Sep 12 in a 6-5 loss to Cleveland, Orsulak tied a club record by throwing out 3 base runners from leftfield..On Sep 18, Cal Ripken became the 4th shortstop to hit 30 homers in a season when he connected off **Mike Gardiner** at Boston...**Juan Bell** had an error, Sep 27 at Detroit, snapped a club-record 13 consecutive errorless games...Mussina was 2-1 with a 1.66 era in 6 starts (ip-48.2, h-36, er-9) after Sep 1.

ORIOLES VS OPPONENTS

VS BOSTON ('91: 8-5; Lifetime: 299-332, .474)...For the 1st time since the world championship season of '83, the Orioles won the season series against the Red Sox.

During the 7 straight seasons of Boston domination ('84 thru '90), the Birds were 30-61 (.330) against the Sawx. From '87 thru '90, the O's record was even worse at 15-37 (.288).

Last year, the Orioles were 4-3 at Fenway where they'd gone 4-22 from late '86 thru '90.

The Orioles held a winning edge against every opponent at Memorial Stadium lifetime, but their advantage over the Red Sox was the most tenuous at 5 over .500 (161-156). The O's were +11 vs the Mariners and +12 against the Yankees.

Starting Sep 18, '90, the Orioles are suddenly more than respectable vs the Red Sox, having won 10 of the 15 games played between the 2 clubs.

Boston Batting: **Jack Clark**, in limited action, batted .480 (25-12) in the season series with 4 homers (all solos), 5 rbi, an on-base percentage of .594 (32-19) thanks to 7 walks, and a 1.000 slugging average (ab-25, tb-25)...**Wade Boggs** is batting .340 lifetime (471-160), some 5 points below his lifetime average against everybody.

Mike Greenwell is batting .351 (211-74) lifetime vs Baltimore... **Phil Plantier** struck out 10 times in 23 trips while batting .217 (5 hits).

Boston Pitching: **Mike Gardiner**, ex-Mariner up from Pawtucket, was 2-1 in 3 starts while the veteran **Danny Darwin** went 0-2... Gardiner's victory vs the Birds at Boston May 31 was his 1st win in the majors.

Jeff Reardon was not heavily involved...In 3 appearances, he saved one and held the O's to 2 hits in 12 trips, but both were home runs. He worked only 3 innings. **Jeff Gray** had no decisions or saves in 4 relief outings.

Roger Clemens broke even in 2 decisions, and is 8-4 lifetime, but if the truth be known, he has dropped 3 of his last 5 decisions over 6 starts against the O's starting June 26, '88...In his complete game win at Baltimore on Sep 26, he fanned 10 and walked none.

Clemens was 6-2 at Memorial Stadium with a 2.39 era (ip-64, er-17) and 63 strikeouts in 9 starts (3 cg)...Overall, he's 8-4 in 15 starts with an era of 2.56 (ip-102, er-29, so-80).

In the game he lost, at Boston on June 2nd, the 1st Orioles run scored on a triple by **Dwight Evans**, the old friend to whom he had paid tribute by wearing Dwight's Red Sox #24 during spring training.

Greg Harris fanned 14 in 17.1 innings, but also walked 13 while going 1-1.

Baltimore Batting: **Evans**, who batted .276 (29-8) with no homers and 2 rbi in 9 games, was greeted with 3 standing ovations in the space of 2 innings on May 30 when he returned to Fenway Park for the 1st time in a visiting club uniform: (1) when he took the field in the bottom of the 1st; (2) when he caught a fly ball for the 1st out in that half inning, and (3) when he came to bat in the top of the 2nd.

The Orioles' 17 homers off Boston pitching were the most they hit against a single opponent.

The O's overall batting leader in the season series was **Cal Junior** at .385 (52-20) with 4 homers and 9 rbi...Cal, incidentally, has never missed a game against the Red Sox since he 1st came up late in '81 (130 games)...**Randy Milligan** was right up there with a .356 (45-16) average, 5 homers and 9 rbi, and **Mike Devereaux**, who batted only .231 (52-12), drove in a club-leading 10 runs against Boston (2bh-2, hr-2).

Baltimore Pitching: The Orioles' most effective starter was a fellow who spent less than half the season with the club, **Roy Smith**. He was 2-0 in 2 starts (beat Clemens, 5-1, on June 2 at Boston with a 7-inning 4-hitter and help from **Mark Williamson**).

Neither **Todd Frohwirth** nor Williamson allowed the Carmines any runs in '91. Todd (1-0, 0 saves) pitched 10.1 scoreless innings spread over 6 appearances and held the Carmines to a .189 average (37-7). Williamson worked 8 shutout innings, was 1-0-1, and held them to 3 hits in 25 trips (.120 average). **Gregg Olson** appeared in 4 games, saved 3 of them and

allowed only 1 base-runner (hit) and no runs while facing a total of 10 Boston batters.

Jose Mesa (0-3) and **Dave Johnson (0-2)** sustained most of the damage for the O's. The Sox batted .392 (79-31) off Mesa and .359 (39-14) against Johnson...Mesa yielded 20 earned runs in 17.1 innings.

Mike Mussina pitched his 1st big league complete game Sep. 16 to give the Sox a 9-2 win over **Tom Bolton**, helped by 4 homers (2 by **Milligan**). **Hickey**, should he not pitch against the Red Sox again, can tell his grandchildren that he retired Wade Boggs 10 times in 11 lifetime appearances.

VS CALIFORNIA ('91: 6-6; Lifetime: 232-184, .558)...The Orioles' 12-13 record (.612) lifetime at Memorial Stadium against the Angels, was the 3rd best on 33rd Street (behind Texas/Washington-649 and Milwaukee/Seattle-.622).

At the same time, the O's also hold a modest winning edge at Anaheim, where they have gone 85-80 since the Angels moved there in '66 (excluding 1-1 in the '79 ALCS).

The Orioles have lost the season series to California only once since '87 and that was in '88...In that 13-year period, they've won 8 and tied 4.

California Batting: **Dave Gallagher**, the former Oriole, enjoyed an exceptional season against the O's...He went 5-for-5 on May 19 and hit his 1st home run in two years (off **Mark Williamson**). He finished with a .4 average (27-11) and led the club in rbi vs Baltimore (7)...Lifetime, Gallagher is batting .329 (70-23) at the O's expense.

Luis Sojo, the ex-Blue Jay, hit .370 (27-10) after going 1-for-13 for Toronto against the O's in '90.

Lance Parrish hit only one homer against the O's, but has hit 27 of the 15 times in his 39 trips...**Von Hayes** returns to the AL after 9 years with the Phillies. In 18 games against the Orioles, for the Indians (late '81 and all of '82), Hayes batted .523 (44-23) with 4 home runs and 21 rbi.

California Pitching: After going 2-0 in '91, Jim Abbott is now 4-4 lifetime vs the O's against whom he recorded his 1st major league victory on Apr. 24, '89.

Abbott and fellow Olympian ('88) **Ben McDonald** squared off last July 1 at Baltimore in a game that went pretty much Abbott's way. He led 5-2 when he left after 7 innings, and McDonald was touched for 3 homers. **Randy Milligan's** grand slam in the 8th off **Brian Harvey** made it close, but Abbott got the win and McDonald the loss.

Mark Langston, 2-0, is now 11-6 lifetime and has won 10 of his last 12 decisions vs the O's (both losses in that stretch were in '90).

Rookie righthander **Scott Lewis** had his trouble with the Birds in 2 starts. He was 0-2 and the O's batted .342 (38-13) against him.

Bert Blyleven was sidelined all season, but remains one of 2 active 20-game lifetime winners vs. the O's (20-14). The other is **Frank Tanana**.

Baltimore Batting: **Mike Devereaux** had a big year against California. He hit .405 (42-17) with 6 extra-base hits, including 3 homers, and stole 10 bases. **Cal Ripken** hit .313 (48-15) with one homer and 7 rbi. **Randy Milligan** hit only .182, but he drove in a club leading 9 runs (4 on the slam off Harvey).

Milligan's lifetime average vs the Angels is .188 (85-16)...In limited service, **David Segui** is a .389 lifetime hitter (18-7).

Chito Martinez drove in the late-inning gwrbi twice against the Angels within 10 days: a 2-run homer off **Harvey** in the 9th at Anaheim on July 15 and an a tie-breaking 7th inning solo off **Chuck Finley** in Baltimore on July 24.

Baltimore Pitching: The Orioles staff era in the season series was spiffy 2.74, more than a run a game better than their best against any other club...**Mesa** pitched the best game of his career, his 1st shutout, on May 6 at Anaheim. It was also the 1st of the Orioles' 8 complete games.

McDonald (2-1 in '91) is 3-1 lifetime vs the Angels with a 2.45 era (29.1 innings).

Bob Milacki has made 6 career starts vs the Angels and, though he is only 1-2, he has a 2.33 era (ip-38.2, er-10)...Last year, he earned his 1st win over California (July 24) and held the Angels to a .196 average (46-9) in 2 games (1 start).

Gregg Olson is 1-1 with 6 saves and a 1.83 era (ip-19.2, er-4) in 13 career appearances...**Todd Fehlwirth** didn't allow a run in 3 appearances, spanning 5.2 innings. He was 1-0 with one save, his 1st in the majors (July 24 at Cal), and held the Angels to a .211 average (19-4).

Jeffs Ballard (1-2) and **Robinson** (0-2) were 1-4 combined against the Haloes.

❖ ❖ ❖

VS CHICAGO ('91: 4-8; Lifetime: 298-265, .529)...The O's dropped their 1st 4 games against the Sox; an improvement over '90 when they lost the 1st 6 games of the season series...In Baltimore, the Sox went 5-1 in '91.

Bad Beginning: The Sox beat the O's 9-1 on the warmest (89 degrees) and last opening day at Memorial Stadium. The O's scored once in the 1st inning on a **Glenn Davis** double that plated **Cal Ripken**, then went scoreless over the last 17 innings of that 2-game series. **Jack McDowell** bested former Stanford teammate **Jeff Ballard** in the 1st confrontation ever between the two, striking out 10 in a route-going effort...The 7 runs charged to Ballard were the most ever yielded by an Orioles pitcher in an opening day game.

Sammy Sosa, who had gone 5-for-46 (.109) the previous year against the O's, hit 2 homers, drove in 5 runs and scored 3 times in that 1st game and in the 2nd, #9 hitter **Scott Fletcher** doubled home both Sox runs in a 2-0 triumph (Fletcher had 7 rbi after the 1st 4 games between the 2 clubs).

Three Sox pitchers [McDowell (cg), **Greg Hibbard** and **Bobby Thigpen**], meanwhile, were holding the O's to 1 run and 7 hits during games #1 and #2.

New Comiskey: The O's lost their 1st game at New "Cominsky" Park (as they say in Balmer) on Apr 22...Glenn Davis hit the O's 1st homer in the new stadium (again with Cal aboard) for a 2-0 lead in the 1st, but the Sox went ahead to stay in the 6th on a 2-run shot by **Frank Thomas** (Auburn) off former SEC rival **Ben McDonald** (LSU), the 1st by a home team player in their new ballpark. The blow was delivered on Ben's 106th and last pitch of the day.

Neither starting phenom, McDonald or rookie **Alex Fernandez**, pitched impressively, each having yielded 6 runs in his stint.

Ice Breaker: **Jeff Ballard** finally snapped the 4-game loss string on Apr 24 on a 6-hit, no-walk, 8-inning effort with help from **Gregg Olson**, 5-1. **Charlie Hough**, the loser, experienced an horrendous evening. He gave up 5 hits plus 5 walks and hit 2 batters in 3.2 innings.

Group Effort: The O's set a club record on Aug 2 when they shutout the Sox in Chicago with the help of 5 different hurlers, 3-0: McDonald (W), **Mike Flanagan**, **Mark Williamson**, **Jim Poole** and Olson.

That snapped an 8-game Sox winning streak during which they'd averaged 9 runs. The O's won the next day, too, for good measure.

No-Hitter: On Sunday, Aug 11, Venezuelan **Wilson Alvarez** in his 1st big league appearance of the year became the 2nd (and last) visiting player to pitch a no-hitter at Memorial Stadium [both raised in Spanish speaking cultures—the Brewers' **Juan Nieves**, from Puerto Rico, Apr 15, '87, was the other].

To make room on the roster for Alvarez, who was called up from AA Birmingham, the Sox sent **Ramon Garcia**, the winning pitcher the previous day, to the minors. Alvarez had pitched once previously in the majors, for Texas in '89, but had failed to retire a batter while giving up 3 hits and 3 runs.

This day, he was saved by centerfielder **Lance Johnson** who made a magnificent diving catch of **Chris Hoiles'** sinking liner in the 8th inning. There had been another close call in the 7th. **Ron Karkovice** made a tough play on a chopped grounder between the mound and the 3rd base line,

but threw high to 1st as Cal Ripken reached safely and continued on 2nd. It was called an error (rather than a hit & an error), and no one exception.

This was the last of 3 particularly difficult days for the O's. During previous two games (both Baltimore losses), Sox relievers had faced minimum 25 batters over a combined 8.1 innings of relief, and on Saturday the O's sustained one of their most painful losses.

They led 4-3 in the 7th until **Ozzie Guillen** hit his 1st home run in one year on the 1st pitch delivered by **Mike Flanagan**—with one above to put the Sox up to stay. He had last connected Aug 10, '90 off **Nolan Ryan**.

Happy Ending: On Monday, Aug 12, the Orioles, who had gone 4-5 since **Bob Melvin**'s hit in the 6th inning Saturday night, finally snapped that skein on a single by **Joe Orsulak** in the 1st.

Then, they battled back to tie twice (on solo homers by **Randy Milligan** in the 6th and by **Chris Hoiles** in the 9th) before winning in sudden death on a 3rd home run, this one by **Leo Gomez** in the 11th off **Donn Pall**. **John Oates** was ejected for the 2nd time (the other incident was 6 days earlier) when umpires **Jim McKean** (3rd base) and **Vic Voltaggio** (plate) contradicted each other. With **Randy Milligan** on 3rd, **Chito Martinez** 2nd, and one out, **Chris Hoiles** grounded to 3rd baseman **Robin Ventura** who ruled foul, but was overruled by Voltaggio. Whereupon, Ventura fielded the ball and tagged Milligan. McKean called him out though a replay indicated Randy had returned to the bag safely. The O's skipper put on a hat-kicker of a ruckus, and who could blame him—except McKean and Voltaggio?

Chicago Batting: Rookie **Frank Thomas** batted .444 (45-20) with extra-base hits (2b-6, hr-5), drove in 14 runs in 12 games and had a .52-27 on-base percentage (7 walks)...His 5 homers tied **Harold Baines** and **Jose Tartabull** for the '91 lead among O's opponents.

Carlton Fisk, despite his 43 years, batted .306 (36-11) in the season series...Lifetime he has hit 24 homers and driven in 111 runs over 200 games while batting .258 (722-186).

Johnson hit only .140 (43-6) in '91 and catcher Karkovice's career average vs the O's is .149 (47-7).

Chicago Pitching: McDowell was 2-1 in 4 starts. He gave up 28 hits in 26 innings, but fanned 26 and walked only 6 in that time...Five staffers were unscorched on over a combined 27 innings (innings in parentheses). **Brian Drahman** (5.2), **Hibbard** (8.0), **Melido Perez** (2.1) and **Scott Radinsky** (2.0).

Charlie Hough (1-1) is now 7-12 lifetime...He was 2-6 lifetime at Memorial Stadium (no decisions there in '91) where it took him 9 seasons to win his 1st game ('89)...Over the last 4 years, Thigpen is 0-3 with 16 saves in 20 appearances vs Baltimore.

Kirk McCaskill was 1-2 and is now even at 6-6 lifetime.

Baltimore Batting: The O's hit .210 (395-83) and scored only 39 runs in the season series, both lows against a single adversary. Eleven of the 18 Orioles who faced Chicago pitching in '91, batted .200 or lower.

Joe Orsulak was the only .300 hitter (.359, 39-14)...He's batted .333 (84-26) the last 2 seasons and now sports a lifetime average of .303 (132-40) vs Chicago...**Cal Ripken** drove in a club high 10 runs in 12 games.

Baltimore Pitching: **Mike Mussina**, 0-2, lost his 1st 2 big league starts (appearances) to the Pale Hose. He made his debut in Chicago Aug 4 and hooked up in a marvelous duel with Hough, allowing the only run of the game on a homer by Thomas in the 6th.

Mussina worked 7.1 innings and gave up only 4 hits while Hough pitched a complete game 5-hit shutout. Five days later, Mussina and Hough dueled again, but both were gone in the 4th, and Mike absorbed his 2nd defeat 7-4.

Olson boasts a lifetime 0.63 era vs the Sox, having allowed only one earned run in 15 appearances (ip-14.1) while going 1-0 with 7 saves. The Sox haven't scored on him since May 4, '89.

Williamson is another Orioles reliever who has excelled against Chicago...He is 4-1 with 3 saves and a 1.67 era (ip-37.2, er-7). It was Williamson, you'll remember, who beat the White Sox, 9-0, on Apr 29, '88 to snap that longest of all losing streaks at the start of a season (21).

Dave Johnson had absolutely no luck in the season series. In two starts he was 0-2, had a 20.25 era (ip-5.1, r-er 13-12) and the Sox' average against him was an even .500 (32-16). Lifetime, he's 0-4 and has yielded 24 earned runs in 25.1 innings.

❖ ❖ ❖

VS CLEVELAND ('91: 7-6; Lifetime: 315-317, .498)...The Indians are one of 3 clubs with a lifetime winning record over the Orioles, along with the Red Sox (332-299) and Yankees (321-313), but all visiting clubs were career losers at Memorial Stadium.

The Indians regained the lead in the 38-year rivalry in '88 after the O's had held the edge for nearly 9 years (starting June '79). The Tribe jumped out to a big lead in the Orioles 1st 3 years of operation ('54, '55, '56), going 55-11 in that time (19-3, 19-3, 17-5)...From that kind of start, it took the O's a quarter century to draw even.

Highlights: **John Oates** gained his 1st victory as O's skipper after 4 straight losses, on May 28, at the Tribe's expense. Both **Roy Smith**, the starter and winner, and **Todd Frohwirth** made impressive Orioles debuts that evening and **Randy Milligan** contributed the decisive blow, a 3-run homer off **Charles Nagy**.

On June 26 some 14 Indians batters came to the plate in the bottom of the 1st, precipitating a 9-run burst. At one stretch 10 of 11 hitters reached safely. **Jeff Ballard** was the victim of the onslaught, and in fact stayed on through the 3rd and was charged with a total of 10 runs. **Mike Flanagan** followed with 5 scoreless innings in the 10-4 loss.

Six of the 7 games played in Baltimore were decided by one run (O's were 4-3).

The Birds bounced into 5 double plays in the 1st 6 innings on Sep 13, but kept on ticking...A 3-run homer by **Mike Devereaux** off **Jeff Shaw** tied the game in the bottom of the 8th, then **David Segui** won it in the 9th on that phenomenon known only to Memorial Stadium, the ground ball lost in the lights by the 3rd baseman. This time the victim was rookie **Jim Thome**.

During the 10th inning at Baltimore on Sep 14, **Juan Bell** hit a pitch from **Eric Bell** to left field, where it was caught by **Albert Belle**.

An old Indians' weapon helped decide the game of Sep 22 at Cleveland in the Tribe's favor (last game of year between the 2 clubs). **Mark Lewis** dropped a successful squeeze bunt in the 9th inning off **Mike Mussina** that tied the game at 1-1. Then **Carlos Baerga** doubled home Lewis with the winning run. Mussina had protected a 1-0 lead for 8.1 innings...Two years earlier, back in May '89, **Joe Carter** dropped a 2-out bunt against **Mark Williamson** in the bottom of the 9th to beat the Birds.

Cleveland Batting: Belle enjoyed a most prosperous year against the O's. He batted .356 (45-16) in 12 games with 10 extra-base hits (2b-8, hr-2) and drove in 16...**Alex Cole** has stolen 9 bases in 10 tries against the O's, 7 of 8 last year.

The Tribe hit only 5 home runs in 13 games, lowest total among the O's 13 opponents...**Jerry Browne** is batting .325 (163-53) in 49 lifetime games against the Orioles.

Cleveland Pitching: Eric Bell, the 27-year-old ex-Oriole who had "Tommy John" surgery in '88 and was released by the Baltimore organization after the '90 season, came back to haunt his old teammates.

The lefthander, who was once charged with 5 cheap home runs in a spring training exhibition at **Joe Robbie** Stadium in Miami, was 2-0 in 3 appearances, held the Birds to one hit in 19 trips (.053) and allowed no runs in a cumulative 6.1 innings. It wasn't just the Orioles he impressed. Overall he was 4-0 in 10 outings with an 0.50 era.

Eric King didn't play a significant role in the season series, though he did limit the O's to 2 hits in 17 at bats. Over the course of his career, the Orioles

have batted .152 (335-51) against him...He is 7-1 with 2 saves against with a 2.10 era (ip-98.2, er-23).

Greg Swindell in his AL swan song (for now at least) was 2-0 in 3 starts vs Baltimore despite the fact that the Birds batted over .300 against for the 2nd straight year. During '90 and '91 the Birds were 59-for-180, off Swindell...He is 7-3 lifetime.

Steve Olin earned 2 saves in 3 innings over 3 appearances and didn't allow a run though the O's went 5-for-13 (.385) against him.

Baltimore Batting: **Cal Junior** hit .385 (52-20) in the season series with 10 extra-base hits (2b-5, hr-5) and 11 rbi...**Randy Milligan** also drove in 11 runs and hit 3 homers while batting .348 (46-16). Randy's lifetime average against the Tribe is .324 (105-34).

Joe Orsulak tied a club record on Sep 12 when he threw out 3 runs from leftfield, matching the standard set against the Yankees by **Shelby**. Despite his efforts, the O's lost that night in Baltimore, 6-5, also excelled offensively vs the Indians. He hit .333 (30-10) and is now sporting a .319 (119-38) career mark against the Tribe.

Rookies **Juan Bell** (11-0) and **Luis Mercedes** (14-1) went 1-for-25 between them.

Baltimore Pitching: Williamson is 6-2 with a save in 21 career performances against Cleveland...Frohwirth and **Gregg Olson** combined to pitch 15.1 scoreless innings while holding the Tribe to a .189 average (53-10). Frohwirth didn't allow a run in 9.1 innings spanning 4 appearances and **Gregg Olson** was as close to perfect as you can get. He worked 6 scoreless innings, and earned 6 saves in 7 appearances.

VS DETROIT ('91: 5-8; Lifetime: 326-313, .510)...The O's enjoyed a 166-152 lifetime advantage over the Tigers in 38 seasons at Memorial Stadium...At Tiger Stadium, the Bengals hold a scant 161-160 edge over the same period, beginning 1954.

Out of the Ordinary: On May 20 at Detroit, **Bob Milacki** allowed only one hit in the 1st inning but was charged with 5 runs thanks to 5 walks and a grand slam by **Pete Incaviglia**. Two days later, the Bengals jumped **Ben McDonald** for 6 runs in the 2nd. That game, incidentally, was **Frank Robinson's** last at the Orioles helm.

Cecil Fielder contributed heavily to that Tiger victory with 2 homers. On Sep 27, the day ex-Oriole Whiz Kid, 53-year-old **Jerry Walker** was named gm of the Tigers, **Cal Ripken** drove in 5 runs to fuel a 9-7 victory for the visitors. That was the 1st of a 3-game stretch in which Cal drove in 11 runs vs Detroit while going 8-for-14 with 2 doubles, a triple and 2 homers.

Last Weekend: In the last night game at Memorial Stadium (Fri, Oct 3), **Mickey Tettleton** homered in the 14th to give the Tigers the victory...The game ended at 12:13 and was followed by a gala fireworks show...The two clubs scored one each in the 2nd, and one each in the 13th (the O's on a **Leo Gomez** single) before Tettleton's final tie-breaker...**David Haas** gained his 1st big league victory that night.

The O's won for the last time at Memorial Stadium on Saturday, Oct 4, thanks in large measure to the final home run in ballpark history, a 2-run shot by **Chito Martinez** (off **Mark Leiter**) in the 6th...**Brady Anderson**'s 3-run triple put the game out of reach.

On Sunday the 6th, the game, which served as a kind of intermission between nostalgic pre and post-game ceremonies, was over almost before it started. That, thanks to a 4-run Tigers 1st inning, the product of 5 hits off starter Milacki and 2 Orioles misplays.

For the home folks, **Mike Flanagan**'s 9th inning walk-on was the highlight of the game...Mike relieved **Gregg Olson** with one out in the 9th and, as the last Oriole ever to pitch on 33rd Street, he fanned **Dave Bergman** and **Travis Fryman** to end the inning. Flanagan, a long-time favorite in Baltimore, was then accorded a standing ovation as he left the field.

However, it was long-time nemesis **Frank Tanana**, who went the route on a 4-hitter and came away with the distinction of being the last pitcher a

Memorial Stadium. Tanana had been the winner early in the year in the 1st game ever played at the new Comiskey Park, a 16-0 Tigers victory. The most inappropriate event of the day, considering his season-long magnificence, was Cal Junior bouncing into a double play that ended a 38-year era.

Details of the emotional 45-minute program which followed are listed on page xx.

Detroit Batting: Tettleton hit a club-leading 4 home runs while driving in 11...**Tony Phillips** batted .417 (48-20) and **Lou Whitaker** was the top run producer with 14 rbi in 12 games.

Cecil Fielder over the last 2 seasons has hit 95 homers while driving in 265 runs, but has been credited with only 6 home runs and 14 rbi against the Orioles. Last year, however, he did bat .327 (49-16) against Baltimore pitching, up from .214 (42-9) the year before.

Detroit Pitching: **Bill Gullickson**, the former Tokyo Giant who had never pitched against the Orioles before, was 2-0 in 3 starts.

Tanana now ranks as the top lifetime winner against the Orioles among active at 21-17, one (regular season) victory ahead of **Bert Blyleven** (20-14, not including a World Series victory over the Birds while with the Bucs in '79)...Tanana held the O's to a .204 average (54-11) while going 2-0.

Jerry Don Gleaton has held the O's scoreless for 2 years now, over a stretch of 11 appearances (14.1 innings) during which the O's have batted .143 against him (49-7)...**Walt Terrell**, who was 0-1 in '91, had a .474 average against (38-18).

Mark Leiter made consecutive starts vs the O's on Sep 30 & Oct 5 and fanned 20 Birds in 15.1 innings while splitting 2 decisions. Leiter, the former Orioles farmhand, missed 3 seasons ('86 thru '88) while undergoing 3 shoulder operations.

Baltimore Batting: Cal Ripken (see "Sep 27" above) hit 4 home runs, had 16 rbi and batted .322 (59-19) in the 13-game season series... Cal's 15 career home runs at Tiger Stadium are the most he's hit in a ballpark on the road...**Randy Milligan** batted .333 (27-9)...**Chris Hoiles**, the former Tiger, is hitting only .156 (32-5) against the Bengals.

Baltimore Pitching: Milacki went into the season with a 5-2 lifetime record, a 2.47 era and nearly 30 more innings pitched than hits allowed the Tigers in 10 appearances. Last year, however, was different...He was 0-3 in 4 appearances (3 starts) gave up 17 earned runs in 13.2 innings for an 11.20 era and the Bengals batted .361 (61-22) against him.

❖ ❖ ❖

VS KANSAS CITY ('91: 4-8; Lifetime: 143-124, .536)...The O's were 23-1 vs the fledgling Royals in '69 and '70, but since that time have gone 120-123 over the past 21 seasons.

The O's are only 46-63 at Royals Stadium since it opened in '73, but are 9-7 there beginning Apr 12, '89.

The Orioles lost 15 straight to the Royals from Aug 26, '87 thru Apr 11, '89, including all 12 games played in '88. That, however, doesn't approach the Orioles' big league record of 23 consecutive wins vs one opponent (the Royals in '69 & '70)...That streak started immediately after the Royals had beaten the Birds in the 1st game ever between the two clubs (5/9/69) when **Dick Drago** downed **Dick Hall**.

During the Orioles' 38 years in the AL there have been 4 sweeps of season series (excluding strike-torn '81). The O's have been involved in 3 of them:

1970: Baltimore-12, Kansas City-0

1978: Baltimore-11, Oakland-0

1988: Kansas City-12, Baltimore-0

1990: Oakland-12, New York-0

1991 Series: Five of the 12 games went to extra innings [including 3 in a row June 23 (2 games) and July 17, and 7 were decided by one or two runs.

Heartbreakers: On June 12 at Baltimore, the O's, who had lost 11-0 the night before, were down 8-1 early (i.e. were outscored 19-1 in 2 games)

when they launched a counter-attack climaxed by Dwight Evans' 10th inning solo homer that tied the game at 8-8. No happy ending, however. **Jose Tartabull**, who had amassed 5 rbi earlier in the game on a 2-run double and a 3-run homer, homered (solo) against the 10th to win it for the Royals.

The next night (6/13), the O's spotted KC a 4-0 lead, bounced back to then lost again, in the top of the 9th, on a 2-run blast by **Kirk Gibson**. A week later in KC (6/20), the Royals won in the bottom of the 10th on a single by **Brian McRae**.

Revenge: After a rainout on June 21, **Bob Milacki** (8 inn, 72 pitches) blanked the Royals 1-0 (beating **Tom Gordon**). It was the 1st 1-0 victory in nearly 5 years (since July 19, '86). The game's only crossed after a slumping **Cal Ripken** walked, stole 2nd, went to 3rd on a wild pitch and scored on a single by **David Segui**, son of former KC righthander **Diego**.

The following afternoon (Sun, Jun 23) the O's took 8:41 to sweep KC twice in extra innings during a makeup doubleheader.

In the opener, the O's trailed 5-0, then 8-4, but tied it in the top of the 9th on **Chris Hoiles'** 1st career slam. They won in the 10th when **Tim Hale** soloed and **Brady Anderson** followed with a 2-run shot.

All 3 of those home runs were at the expense of **Jeff Montgomery**, who had never allowed the O's an earned run in 18 previous career innings. Anderson scored 4 runs in that 11-8 victory and **Cal Ripken** snapped a 0-for-18 skid by hitting safely the last 4 times up.

In the nightcap, the O's held a commanding 8-3 lead going into the KC 9th, but the Royals exploded for 5 runs to tie off Olson (3 inherited runners and 2 of his own). **Joe Orsulak** interceded in the top of the 12th with a game-winning homer in what was probably the Orioles' biggest day of the season (certainly the longest).

Randy Milligan didn't get into that game until the 7th inning, but wound up with 4 hits, and **Juan Bell** picked up his 1st 3 major league rbi.

More Fireworks: Back in KC less than a month later (July 17), the Orioles blew an early 7-0 lead forged primarily by Milligan who drove in 5 of them. The Royals finally won at 1:06 am when **Bill Pecota** produced a game-winning single off Williamson in the bottom of the 15th. **Sam Horn** tied a big league record by striking out 6 times in an extra-inning game.

On Sep 6 in Baltimore, **Bret Saberhagen** started against the O's as the league's 2nd stingiest pitcher in home runs allowed (8 in 160+ innings). But the Birds hit 3 off him that night, including a 3-run shot by Horn.

Jim Poole earned his 1st big league victory in relief of the rookie **Mussina**.

Kansas City Batting: Tartabull was a one-man gang...He hit .52 (44-23) with 10 extra-base hits including 5 doubles and 5 homers and 1 rbi...He tied **Harold Baines** and **Frank Thomas** for most homers against the O's, and Baines for most hits (23). Only Baines had a higher average (.561, 41-23).

Tartabull has hit 8 home runs against Baltimore pitching the last 2 years. He is batting .330 (221-73) with 13 homers and 48 rbi in 59 games vs. the O's.

Mike Macfarlane hit .385 (26-10) in '91 and is now batting .350 lifetime (80-28)...**George Brett** has played 194 games against the Orioles and has a career bat mark of .307 (743-228) with 27 homers and 113 rbi...**Wally Joyner**, a .301 hitter in the AL last year, batted only .213 (47-10) against Baltimore pitching.

Kansas City Pitching: **Luis Aquino** wasn't particularly sharp, but went 2-0 in 4 games, including 2 starts...**Mike Boddicker**, 4-0 vs his former teammates the previous year for Boston, was 0-0 in one 7-inning stint for KC...Mike remains 5-1 lifetime.

Montgomery, whose aforementioned career scoreless innings streak (11 innings) vs the Birds came to an abrupt end on June 13, gave up 5 home runs all season, 4 of them to Orioles hitters. Nonetheless, he had 3 saves to go with one loss over 8 appearances despite a 6.39 era (ip-12.2, er-9).

Mark Davis picked up 2 wins in relief in back-to-back games (June 12-13) in Baltimore while pitching to only 8 batters and not yielding a run...**Storm Davis** lost once in 5 relief appearances... Storm is 4-3 lifetime against his former/present club, having lost his last 3 decisions against the O's. The Orioles batted .291 (79-23) off Saberhagen (1-1), who leaves the league with an 8-6 record against them.

Baltimore Batting: Hoiles hit .421 (19-8) and Cal .392 (51-20), while Milligan drove in 9 runs in 10 games (5 of them on July 17).

Horn, whose 8 homers vs the Royals are a career high against one opponent (he has 7 vs Seattle), hit 3 of them in '91 though he struck out 19 times in 40 at bats while batting only .225 (40-9).

Baltimore Pitching: Olson has a 1.32 lifetime era vs the Royals (ip-27.1, er-4) and is 3-1 with 8 saves in 21 appearances...**Todd Frohwirth**, like Olson, appeared in 7 games also (1-2, no saves).

KC hit .326 (43-14) against **Ben McDonald**, who was 0-0 in 2 starts. Williamson had a rough go against the Royals...He was 0-2 and yielded 15 hits, 10 runs (8 earned) in 10.1 innings spread over 6 appearances. He's 2-5 lifetime.

If **Kevin Hickey** doesn't pitch again in the AL, he'll be secure in the knowledge that he held future Hall of Famer **George Brett** hitless lifetime, i.e. 0-for-15 with no walks.

❖ ❖ ❖

VS MILWAUKEE ('91: 3-10; Lifetime: 183-132, .581)...The Orioles' record vs the Brewers (nee Pilots) is their 2nd best (Texas-Washington is 1st at .651, 276-148), but you certainly couldn't tell that from watching the 2 clubs play in '91.

Highlights: The O's registered one of their few triumphs in the Brewers' home opener on Apr 15, 7-2, after launching 3 home runs, including: **Glenn Davis'** 1st in the AL (off loser **Chris Bosio**) and **Sam Horn's** 3-run smash off rhp **Ed Nunez** who was brought in to face Sam.

On Apr 18, the O's lost in sudden death on a homer by **Robin Yount**, the 2nd batter faced by **Jose Bautista**...Earlier in the day, the O's had committed 3 errors, all by 1st baseman Davis.

The 1st series in Baltimore featured some unusual happenings:

- On Apr 26, there were 5 sacrifices (3 by Brewers) in a game won by the visitors.
- On Apr 27, **Gary Sheffield** drove in 2 runs on an infield hit. With **B. J. Surhoff** on 3rd and **Paul Molitor** on 2nd, he hit a tough chopper to **Craig Worthington** whose hurry-up throw pulled **Randy Milligan** off the bag. Molitor never stopped rounding 3rd and beat Milligan's late throw to the plate.
- On Apr 28, the O's won 5-4 after the Brewers (miraculously) scored only 3 times in the 3rd off **Ben McDonald** despite going 7-for-7 with a sacrifice during the inning. **Joe Orsulak** threw out a runner at 2nd and **Brady Anderson** nailed another at the plate.

On Aug 5 at Baltimore, the O's came back from a 5-0 deficit to tie but lost in the 9th on a double by Yount. During the year, the O's rallied from deficits of from 4 to 7 runs on 7 different occasions, but went on to win only 3 of those games.

The O's 13-5 win on Aug 6 matched their season high for runs in a game and their 17-hit attack was a seasonal high for a 9-inning game.

Milwaukee Batting: The Brewers' batted a robust .287 as a team despite the fact that **Franklin Stubbs** (.132, 38-5), **Dante Bichette** (.138, 29-4) and **Greg Vaughn** (.182, 33-6) were all off their feed.

Willie Randolph (.393, 28-11), **Sheffield** (.391, 23-9), **Surhoff** (.373, 51-19), **Darryl Hamilton** (.351, 37-13) and **Yount** (.326, 46-15) all excelled against Baltimore pitching.

Yount has played 218 games lifetime against the O's (Carl Yastrzemski is the all time leader at 340, followed by **Al Kaline** at 330)...His lifetime average is .276 (831-219) with 21 homers and 110 rbi.

Milwaukee Pitching: **Dan August** (2-0), **Jaime Navarro** (3-0) and **Bill Wegman** (2-0) combined for a 7-0 record vs the O's in '91 even though the

Birds hit a composite .299 (241-72) against the trio. Messrs. August, Navarro (6-0) and Wegman (7-1) are an amazing 18-1 lifetime at the *Ortiz* expense.

Wegman, whose career era vs the O's is a listless 4.73 (ip-64.2, er-34) in games despite the impressive won-lost record, picked up his 1st big league win in Baltimore on Sep 19, '85. He didn't win again at Memorial Stadium until his last appearance there, on Aug 16, '91. He was 2-1 on 33rd Street. Wegman didn't pitch against the O's from Aug, '88 until last season.

Baltimore Batting: The Orioles hit .278 (460-128) in the season series, their highest average against one opponent, but it didn't do them any good. They were outscored by only 5 runs (60 to 65) in the 13 games, but still lost 10 times in 13 tries.

Cal Ripken was the dominating hitter with a .364 (55-20) average, extra-base hits (2b-4, hr-5) and 14 rbi...His 91 rbi against the Brewers is a career high vs one opponent.

Rookie Juan Bell batted .333 (21-7) against the Brewers and .154 (18-51) rest of the league (188-29)...**Mike Devereaux**' .327 career average (36-116) against the Brewers is his best, and his 6 homers are also a career high.

Brady Anderson has struggled against the Brewers...He hit .107 last year (28-3) and is batting .176 lifetime (85-15).

Baltimore Pitching: **Bob Milacki** pitched well against the Brewers. He had a 3.20 era (ip-19.2, er-7) and held them to a .206 average (68-122) but was only 1-2.

Ben McDonald was 0-2 in 3 starts with a 7.36 era (ip-14.2, er-12) and the Brewers hit .400 (65-26) against him...**Todd Frohwirth** held Milwaukee scoreless in 6 innings over 4 appearances, and limited them to 2 hits in 12 at bats (.100).

❖ ❖ ❖

VS MINNESOTA ('91: 4-8; Lifetime: 306-258, .543)...The O's are still 10 games over .500 against the Twins (including original Senators) franchise, but the MetroDome has been nothing but a house of horrors for the Birds. They are 23-37 there (.383), their worst record in an active AL ballpark, and since winning their 1st 2 games at HHH in '87, have gone 6-22 including 1-5 in '91.

Highlights: The best thing that happened to the O's (against the Twins) was snapping the champs' 15-game win streak on June 17 at Baltimore. **Mark Williamson**, who snapped the Orioles' 21-game losing streak in '89, was the winner in relief.

The home team was trailing 3-5 in the 9th, got one back on a **Joe Orsulak** sac fly, then won it on **Randy Milligan's** game-ending, 2-run double off Minny's relief ace **Rick Aguilera**. Interestingly, it was **Cal Ripken** who scored the clincher after Skipper **Tom Kelly** walked him (the potential winning run) to pitch to Milligan...**David Segui** also won a game in sudden death for the Birds on Aug 23 with a 2-out, 9th inning single off **Tom Leach**.

On Aug 30, **Joe Orsulak** enjoyed a 5-for-5, with a walk and 3 rbi, while the Birds were mauling 3 Minnesota pitchers in an 11-5 victory for **Bob Milacki**. **Turn Back the Clock:** To celebrate the 25th anniversary of their 1st world championship season, the O's "turned back the clock" 25 years to 1966 on June 19. The crowd of 44,742 for the Wednesday afternoon game was bigger than any regular season home turnout in '66.

The current Orioles wore uniforms of the same design as the club had used a quarter century earlier during that 1st all-winning season, and several local alumni from that team took a pre-game bow, including long-time trainer **Eddie Weidner** who was just shy of his 89th birthday, plus batboys and basesweepers from that golden year.

Everything was going beautifully. The fans were into it and so were the O's who took a 4-3 lead in the 7th inning, and protected it through the 8th when **Mike Devereaux** leaped high over the fence to snatch a home run away from **Shane Mack**.

Then came the ugliest inning, if not in club history, certainly in **Gregg Olson's**.

Gregg retired the 1st hitter he faced to end the 8th inning, but the 9th was a different story. The 1st 3 hitters singled, tying the game. Then the Birds' often flawless reliever threw 3 wild pitches and committed a throwing error, all of which produced 5 Twins runs and a Minnesota victory. **It was the first (and only) game Olson would ever lose at Memorial Stadium.**

The last 11 Twins to face Olson dating back to June 4 in the Dome (when he faced 3 hitters and all reached safely) had gone 6-for-8 with 3 walks and had pinned 2 losses on the O's righthander. It was no wonder that after the game he threw his '66-style uniform in the clubhouse trash can.

Minnesota Batting: The Twins batted .305 (426-130) as a team in the 12 games. To nobody's surprise, **Kent Hrbek** (.333, 45-15; hr-2, rbi-9) and **Kirby Puckett** (.347, 49-17; hr-1, rbi-8) were the most productive Twins in the season series.

Hrbek has 31 career homers vs Baltimore, most by an active opponent (4 more than **George Brett** and **Lance Parrish**) and has driven in 87 runs in 113 games.

Puckett's career average in 86 lifetime games against the O's is .325 (357-116) with 15 homers and 60 rbi.

Shane Mack hit a lusty .333 (39-13) in '91, but **Rookie of the Year Chuck Knoblauch** batted only .194 (36-7).

Minnesota Pitching: **Jack Morris**, the St. Paul native pitching his 1st and only year for the Twins, went 3-0 against the Birds, and is now 15-13 lifetime. As a Tiger, he had lost 3 of his last 4 decisions vs Baltimore.

Kevin Tapani was 2-0 with a 1.23 era (ip-14.2, er-2) in 2 starts. Aguilera was 0-1 with 4 saves in 5 appearances. He had 2 ineffective outings (June 5 & 17) during which he yielded 5 earned runs in 2 innings. His other 3 appearances were flawless.

Scott Erickson won his club record 11th straight on June 18th, allowing only 1 hit (though he walked 6) in 6 shutout innings, but in his other start, on Aug 25 also in Baltimore, he was jumped for 6 runs in 4.1 innings while losing to **Mike Mussina**.

Baltimore Batting: **Cal Ripken** has always had a thing about the Twins and the Hump, and '91 was no exception. He batted .354 (48-17) in the season series with 7 doubles, a home run and 7 rbi, and hit .462 in the dome (26-12).

Lifetime, Cal, who has played in all 120 Orioles-Twins games since he joined the Birds late in '81, has a career average of .332 (461-153), his highest against one club. Under the big top, he has batted .376 (237-89) in 60 games with 12 homers, and 48 rbi, and has enjoyed 2 (of his 3) five-hit games in downtown Minneapolis.

David Segui is a .343 (35-12) career hitter vs Minny and **Mike Devereaux** has a .321 (106-34) lifetime figure...**Randy Milligan's** 8 home runs against the Twins are a career high.

Baltimore Pitching: **Todd Frohwirth** held the league batting leaders and ultimate world champions to an .071 average (28-2) in 6 appearances..

The Twins were a nightmare for Olson (see "Turn Back the Clock" above) in '91...He was, however, only one of 4 Orioles with quadruple digit (era) inflation against the world champions: Olson (15.75), **Arthur Rhodes** (21.00), **Anthony Telford** (12.00) and **Roy Smith** (11.12).

❖ ❖ ❖

VS NEW YORK YANKEES ('91: 5-8; Lifetime: 313-321, .494)...The Orioles have lost 8 of the last 9 season series vs the Yankees, starting '83 (exception: '89 8-5), and over that period are 42-75 (.359). During a 4-year stretch within that span ('85 thru '88), the O's were 12-40 against the Bombers, but over the past 3 seasons are almost even at 19-20.

At Memorial Stadium, the O's were only 18-34 (.346) over the last 8 years (starting '84), but were still 12 games over .500 lifetime at 164-152 (O's had winning record against all AL opponents during 38 seasons at Memorial Stadium).

Best Lifetime Record: Despite recent setbacks, the Orioles still boast the best lifetime anti-Yankee record in the AL. Their .494 percentage (313-321)

tops the Oakland (only) Athletics' .490 (140-146) and the Milwaukee Brewers' .485 (148-157).

From Sep '70 to Sep '87, the O's bore the distinction of being the only team in the league with a lifetime winning record against the Yankees. Dominance reached its zenith on June 21, '83 when Baltimore's record (272-246) was 26 games over .500. Since then, the Birds have won 75.

At Yankee Stadium, where they were 2-5 in '91, the Birds have quashed their league won-lost percentage leadership among visiting teams to the Toronto Blue Jays who are now 45-51 (.469). The O's are with a .467 percentage (140-160), followed by the Oakland (only) Athletics at .448 (64-79).

The O's were 91-100 in old Yankee Stadium, and have since gone 48-48 at the renovated facility (starting '76).

Longest/Latest Game in Balmer: On June 4, '88 in Baltimore, the O's beat the Yankees, 7-6, in 14 innings. The game, which began at 7:36 pm, didn't end until 1:22 am, consumed 5:46, making it both the longest game (time) and latest game in Memorial Stadium history.

The O's were down by 2 with the bases loaded and 2 out in the 14th when Cal Ripken hit a shot to 3rd base. Mike Pagliarulo made a fine stop, and threw to 1st, but the throw bounced past Gary Ward and all 3 runs scored.

Highlights: John Oates' May 24th debut as manager was something than a complete success. The Yankees won 7-1, the O's committed 3 errors (2 by, of all people, Cal Junior), there were 3 wild pitches, and the Birds didn't get their 1st hit for the new skipper until the 6th inning (they had 3 all night).

Mike Flanagan lost 2 decisions in a row May 25-26 and had a balk call on him in each game. The controversial 2nd balk call in the top of the 11th was the proverbial last straw. In the bottom of the inning, the likable lefthander drew his 1st ever ejection for ragging umpire John Shulock.

Sam Horn hit a monster into the right centerfield bleachers at Yankee Stadium on July 5 off Tim Leary. The 2-run shot, that sparked the O's to a win, traveled an estimated 480'. That was the night Chito Martinez made his big league debut, going 1-for-5, the hit a single his last time up, off Guetterman.

Bob Milacki, consistently effective against the Yankees since he last came up, pitched one of the Birds' 2 complete game shutouts of '91, in Baltimore on Sep 9 (a 5-hitter)...Milacki, incidentally, has played a role in 10 of the Orioles last 22 shutouts... Jose Mesa pitched the other against Seattle...See more on Milacki below under "Baltimore Pitching."

Three of the 4 series ended in sweeps. The O's swept the 3 games in Baltimore Sep 9-10-11, but were swept themselves in the 1st series in Baltimore in late May, and the last at New York in October.

New York Batting: The Kellys, rookie Pat and Roberto, batted .351 and .310 (42-13), respectively, and the latter led the Yankees with 11 rbi against the O's...On Sep 9 in Baltimore, Pat was charged with 2 errors, 11 rbi, and 11 rbi.

Jim Leyritz has had only limited exposure to Orioles pitching the last 2 years, but so far he likes what he's seen (.455, 22-10).

Steve Sax has hit .338 (160-54) against the O's since he came over from the Dodgers. The Birds held Jesse Barfield to .190 (21-4), some 105 points lower than his lifetime figure against the Orioles (.295, 366-108, hr. 22, rbi-57, g-113).

New York Pitching: Eric Plunk was 2-1 and Wade Taylor 0-2 in 6 starts. Plunk gained his 2 triumphs in back-to-back appearances (7/4 & 6)...The O's batted .340 (50-17) against Taylor...Former Oriole John Habyan relieved in 5 games against his former teammates and held them to a .111 average (27-3). He was 1-0 with no saves.

Baltimore Batting: Dwight Evans played little against the Yankees last year, but made the most of his opportunities...He was 7-for-11 (.636)...Horn batted .429 (28-12) and delivered 2 doubles plus 5 homers.

(including the tape measure drive mentioned above), and a club-leading 13 rbi in 11 games.

Rookies Leo Gomez (.344, 32-11) and Chito Martinez (.360, 25-9) both excelled against the Bombers, but Cal Ripken had only so-so success (.250, 56-14, hr-2, rbi-3) considering the way he tore the league apart in '91...Cal is hitting .257 lifetime (506-130).

Randy Milligan has the best career average against the Yankees among O's veterans (.315, 92-29).

Baltimore Pitching: Milacki, in 2 starts, held the Yanks to a .175 average (63-11)...Lifetime, he is 5-0 with a 2.20 era (ip- 65.1, er-16)...At Memorial Stadium, he was 3-0 with a 1.35 era (ip-40, er-6) against the Bombers from the Bronx.

Flanagan appeared in 8 games and was 0-3...He is now 13-14 lifetime vs the Yankees...Gregg Olson is 0-0 with 9 saves in 17 career appearances.

♦ ♦ ♦

VS OAKLAND ('91: 3-9; Lifetime: 314-253, .554)...It might have been an off year for the Athletics, but to the Orioles they still looked like champions. During the past 4 years the O's have gone 16-32 (.333) against the A's, and starting July 20, '89 they are 7-21 (.250) vs Oakland.

The A's outscored the O's in the 12 games by a 77-44 margin.

At Memorial Stadium, the Orioles were 159-119 (.572) vs the Philadelphia, KC and Oakland A's. Despite a 2-10 record against them in Baltimore the last 2 years, the Birds maintained a 74-67 edge (.525) over the Oakland (only) A's on 33rd Street.

The Orioles are 79-70 at the Oakland Coliseum, one of 6 road parks, currently in play, in which they hold a lifetime winning advantage. Those figures do not include their 3-3 mark at Oakland during 3 ALCS.

A's First Game in Oakland: The Orioles were the visiting club for the Athletics' 1st game in Oakland on Apr 17, '68...Dave McNally pitched a 2-hitter to beat Lew Krausse, 4-1...Boog Powell hit the 1st home run in the Coliseum while driving in the game-winning run in the 2nd inning...Mark Belanger, Brooks Robinson and the Athletics' Rick Monday also homered in that game before a crowd of 47,233.

Queen's Visit: On May 15 in Balmer, the O's and A's were witness to history in the making when Queen Elizabeth II of England and her husband, Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh, attended their 1st baseball game, accompanied by President and Mrs. George Bush.

The Royal and First Couples shook hands with the uniformed personnel from both clubs in the O's dugout, met some of the front office folk in the Orioles office and waved to the 32,000 fans in the seats before the game (the start of which was delayed 15 minutes until 7:50), then watched a few innings before departing at about 8:50.

Randy Milligan, apparently inspired by the royal visit, hit his 1st 2 homers of the year (both off Bob Welch), but that wasn't nearly enough as the A's prevailed, 6-3. The O's hit 7 home runs in the 1st 2 games of that series (5-14-15), but managed only a split.

4-Man No-Hitter: On Fri, July 13, four Orioles pitchers combined to pitch the Orioles 5th no-hitter, their 1st on the road. Bob Milacki (6), Mike Flanagan (1), Mark Williamson (1) and Gregg Olson (1) blanked the A's without a safety, 2-0. Milacki, who was struck on the hand by a batted ball (by Willie Wilson) during the 6th and came out after the inning, threw 80 of the 121 pitches it took that day to subdue the A's. Olson finished up by striking out Jose Canseco (called) and Baines (swinging) on breaking balls in the 9th.

It was the 7th time the A's have been no-hit since they moved to Oakland in '68...The loser was Eric Show. In one stretch that weekend (Fri thru Sun), the A's sent 46 straight players to the plate without getting a base hit (including 5 walks). Baines was the sandwich-a 6th inning single Friday and a 2nd inning safety on Sunday.

The next day, Canseco, who had struck out 3 times in the no-hitter, hit an Olson fast ball for a game-winning, 2-run single in the 11th after Gregg had trouble getting his curve ball over.

During that series, **Chris Hoiles** drove in a lead run in each of the 3 games held up as game-winners (Fri & Sat), and the other, on Sunday, in 11th, gave the O's a one-run lead that was nullified by Canseco a half-inning later.

Other Season Series Highlights: **Baines** enjoyed the biggest night of his career at Oakland on May 7 when he hit 3 homers (off **Ben McDonald**, **Dave Johnson** and **Jeff Robinson**), drove in 7 runs and set a club record with 14 total bases (he doubled and walked the other 2 times up). See below for more about Baines and his one-man, full-season show against the Birds.

Mark McGwire followed the next afternoon with 2 three-run homers (off spot starter **Flanagan** and the other off **Williamson**)...In that 2-game series at Oakland in early May, the A's outscored the O's 20-6, after the Indians had out-clubbed the Oaks in the 2 games immediately prior, by 35-12 margin.

On July 26 at home, the Orioles made a dramatic comeback from a 10 deficit to tie the game in a 6-run 7th inning featuring **Dwight Evans**' career grand slam off **Gene Nelson** (**Ernest Riles** had hit one earlier at Oakland). Unfortunately, the A's won it, 12-9, with 3 in the 9th.

Just back from the minors, **Joe Slusarski**, pitched a 2-hitter in his 1st league complete game to beat the O's, 9-1 on July 27...On May 14, also at Memorial Stadium, he had sustained his 1st big league loss.

The next day (7/28), the O's staked McDonald to a 3-0 lead. However, Canseco whom Ben had hit in the neck with a pitch in the 1st, blasted a 3-run homer to tie it in the 6th, and Rickey Henderson won it with an 8th inning solo, also off McDonald.

That 3-game late July series in July drew 141,619, which ranks as the largest turnout for a 3-date, 3-game series in Memorial Stadium history.

Oakland Batting: Baines was the Orioles' "mdo" in '91 (most destructive opponent). He led or tied for the lead among O's adversaries in batting (.561, 41-23), runs scored (15); homers (5), total bases (40) on-base percentage (.617) and rbi (17).

Rickey Henderson, whose string of 25 straight stolen bases against the Orioles was snapped by **Bob Melvin** on July 26 (**Rick Dempsey** had been the last Oriole to throw him out on Jun 13, '86), has left his mark in 111 lifetime games against the Orioles: average .325 (495-161), hr-12, rbi-44, bb-97, sf-2, hp-1, sb-cs 83-11 (88%).

McGwire enjoyed another productive year at the expense of the O's, if not against the rest of the league. He drove in 12 runs and has now accumulated 58 rbi in 63 lifetime games along with 21 home runs.

At Memorial Stadium, he drove in 35 runs and hit 12 homers in 30 games. He is one of only 3 batters (along with **Carlos Baerga** and **Mel Hall**) to have homered off Olson in the ballpark on 33rd Street.

Canseco enjoyed a relatively productive year against the Birds, but he has hit only 4 home runs over the last 2 seasons (24 games) off Baltimore's pitching.

With all the success the Athletics have enjoyed head-to-head in recent years with the Orioles, you'll be surprised to hear that the two hitters with the lowest lifetime averages (minimum 100 at bats) against the locals play for the green and gold: **Jamie Quirk**-.130 (115-15) and **Mike Gallego**-.135 (116-18).

Oakland Pitching: **Dennis Eckersley** hasn't allowed the O's a run in 3 years, and it's getting old. In that time, he's worked in 14 games, pitched 16.1 innings, saved 10 and held the O's to a .107 average (56-6). The last time the O's scored off him was on Aug 28, '88 in Oakland (the last game of that year between the 2 clubs).

Dave Stewart is now 5-6 after going 1-0 in both '90 and '91...The Orioles who had twice snapped his start-of-season win streaks, in '88 at 8-0 and '89 at 6-0, had beaten him 5 in a row. At Baltimore, Stewart is 2-4 lifetime. **Joe Klink** was 2-0 in 6 relief efforts and held the O's to 3 hits in 21 trips (.143).

Bob Welch is 4-0 against the O's these past 2 seasons. In '89 & '90 (his Cy Young year), he held the Orioles to an average against of .195 (159-31).

Last season, he was 1-0 in 3 starts, but his efficiency diminished noticeably—i.e. an average against of .311 (61-19). Lifetime he is 7-2.

Baltimore Batting: None of the regulars hit particularly well. **Cal Junior** batted only .227 (44-10), though he did bash 3 home runs... Cal's .247 (486-120) average against Oakland is his lowest vs one opponent, as is his rbi total (53), but his 25 homers off Athletics' pitching are tied for 1st (with Chicago).

Dwight Evans' 39 career homers against the A's franchise is his one-club high, and among current O's veterans, his .264 lifetime average (731-193) is tops...In limited exposure, **David Segui** is batting .292 (24-7) vs Oakland.

Baltimore Pitching: The A's hit .286 (427-122) off the O's, whose staff era was 5.99...Milacki, who pitched 6 innings of the aforementioned no-hitter to pick up his 1st career win against the A's, held them to a .158 average (38-6). He had 2 no decisions in his 3 starts.

Jose Mesa gave up only 1 hit (albeit a home run) in 1.1 innings of his only appearance against the A's, but wound up with a 33.75 era (5 er). "Those walks (5 of them) will kill you everytime."

In 16 lifetime appearances, Olson has gone 0-2, but has earned 8 saves.

❖ ❖ ❖

VS SEATTLE (91: 4-8; Lifetime: 96-74, .565)...The O's have exactly the same lifetime record at Memorial Stadium vs the Mariners as they have at the Kingdome (48-37).

Over the last 2 years the Mariners have dominated the rivalry, having won 8 straight series. The O's are only 7-17 against them in that time overall, including 3-9 at Memorial Stadium. They have lost 10 of their last 13 home games and starting Sep 5, '87, the Birds have gone 11-22 against the hard-charging Mariners in Balmer.

How times have changed since the fledgling M's lost the 1st 14 games they ever played at the now retired ballpark on 33rd Street.

Season Series Highlights: **Ken Griffey Jr** made a great over-the-head basket catch into the fence to rob **Chris Hoiles** of extra bases on Apr 30, but had to leave the game with a bruised kneecap.

Randy Johnson had a no-hitter for 5.2 innings on May 1 in Baltimore (the same night **Nolan Ryan** pitched his 7th career no-no, in Texas). **Bob Melvin** broke it up with a controversial scratch hit to 3rd baseman Edgar Martinez...The O's won that game, 2-1, in large measure because of a rare "victory on appeal." **Griffey Jr** would have scored the tying run in the 7th had not the Orioles alertly noted his premature departure from 3rd on Martinez' would-be sac fly, and taken the necessary steps.

At Seattle on May 11, **Henry Cotto** hit an inside-the-park homer made possible by the collision of **Mike Devereaux** and **Brady Anderson** while in hot pursuit of the drive. Baseball's longest pitching matchup ever, in terms of linear feet, occurred on May 12 when **Erik Hanson** (6'10") faced off with **Ben McDonald** (6'7").

On July 19, **Roy Smith** discovered a new fast diet plan. While expending only 72 pitches over a 7+ inning stretch, he dropped 7 pounds...The next night, rookie **Leo Gomez** had 9 assists at 3rd base, just 2 shy of the major league record, and **Jay Buhner** hit a mammoth homer an estimated 430' to centerfield.

The O's lost a tough one July 21, a day that the temperature read 101 in the press box and 115 on the field...They led 4-1 until young Griffey hit a game-tying 3-run homer off **Jeff Robinson** in the 5th. **Pete O'Brien** followed with a single and Robinson left in favor of **Mike Flanagan**, who threw a long fly ball that wound up being a decisive 2-run homer by **Alvin Davis**. **Chito Martinez** appeared to have made a leaping catch of the drive, but on his descent the ball was jostled loose and fell over the fence.

In the Kingdome on July 29, the M's broke a 4-4 tie with a 7-run 7th that featured 5 doubles, 4 of them in a row...That evening, **Juan Bell** hit his 1st major league home run (off Hanson). The following day, Griffey Junior hit a grand slam off Smith.

The O's at least drew last blood, on July 31, when Chris Hoiles' 2-run 11th inning single produced a 4-2 victory. That winning rally was set up in the

9th when the O's tied the game on a **Randy Milligan** fly ball that bounded in front of **Greg Briley** and skipped over his head for an rbi triple.

Seattle Batting: Griffey Junior, who drove in 13 runs in 12 games vs. batting .359 (39-14), is the leading career hitter against the O's among active with 100 or more at bats. His lifetime average is .382 (131-50). He hit 4 homers and driven in 30 runs in 36 career games against the O's.

Cotto went 8-for-19 (.421) in limited playing time with 3 home runs. **DeValle**, a long-time Orioles nemesis, is a career .330 hitter (106-35) vs. Baltimore. **Scott Bradley** was a .053 hitter (19-1) in the season series.

Seattle Pitching: Hanson (2-0) and **Bill Krueger** (2-1) combined for 2 wins against the O's but neither was particularly effective. The Both batted .304 (69-21) against Hanson (though he did strike out 17 in 7 innings) and .352 (54-19) off Krueger's slants. Hanson is 4-0 lifetime.

Rich DeLucia (2-1) was a legitimate 2-game winner and a workhorse boot. He allowed only 7 earned runs in 26.2 innings (2.36) and held the O's to a .221 average (95-21).

Baltimore Batting: **Dwight Evans**' .289 career mark (610-176) is best against a single opponent. **Cal Junior** hit 4 home runs off Seattle's pitching while batting .267 (45-12), and **Hoiles** hit .345 (29-10).

Baltimore Pitching: **Jeff Ballard**, **Dave Johnson**, **Bob Milacki**, **Greg Olson**, **Roy Smith** and **Todd Frohwirth** all had era of 6.97 or higher and the staff figure was 5.01 in the 12 games.

Ballard was 0-3 in 3 starts and a relief effort (era 7.90, ip-13.2, er-4)...Flanagan, on the other hand, except for the one home run he mentioned above, was flawless...He gave up only one run in 15 innings and held the M's to a .180 (50-9) average.

❖ ❖ ❖

VS TEXAS ('91: 9-3; Lifetime vs Tex-Wash: 276-148, .651)...No matter how you slice it, the Orioles' records against the Rangers-Senators (see above) the Rangers only (141-87, .618) and at Arlington Stadium (74-41, .643) are their best, respectively, against a (1) a single franchise, (2) a current club and (3) in an active stadium.

Over the last 3 years, the Birds have gone 26-10 (.722) and starting July '88, they are 28-10 (.737).

Nolan Ryan was the winning pitcher in all 3 Rangers wins over the Orioles in '91...When he beat the Birds on Apr 14 at Texas, it was for the 1st time in nearly 15 years...His last victory against the Birds, while he was pitching for the Angels, was on Apr 20, '76...In the meantime, he had lost 9 straight decisions to the Birds...His victory at Baltimore on Apr 20 was his 1st then since May 18, '75.

All that changed in '91, a 3-0 record improving his lifetime mark to 8-16 vs. Baltimore...Ryan came by his triumphs honestly. He held the O's to a 1.2 average (65-8) over 3 starts, fanned 26 in 19.1 innings (only 8 walks) and had a 1.40 era (3 earned runs).

Ryan and **Jeff Russell** fanned 12 Orioles on Apr 20 while registering the Rangers' 1st shutout at Memorial Stadium in 13 years (since Jul 17, '78).

Highlights: **Cal Junior** enjoyed a big day at Arlington on Apr 13 with 4 hits, 7 rbi, a triple and 2 home runs to lead the O's to an 11-4 rout. The O's won both ends of an Aug 13 doubleheader at Memorial Stadium enroute to a 4-game series sweep, their 1st against anyone at home in more than a year...In that set, the O's outscored the Rangers, 31-14...During the doubleheader, which consumed 7:45 and didn't end until 12:52 am, the O's used a total of 13 pitchers to tie a major league record shared by the Milwaukee Braves of '63 and the '77 San Diego Padres.

Mike Mussina picked up his 1st big league win on Aug 14, on his 3rd try...He gave up a 2-run homer to **Juan Gonzales** in the 1st, then pitched 7 scoreless innings, striking out 10, before **Jose Bautista** came on to mop up in that 10-2 win.

Chito Martinez was the O's big gun in that one. It was his 1st 2- home run game (4 rbi). Martinez & fellow rookie **Leo Gomez** combined to go 8-for-14 (.429) with 6 homers and 10 rbi during the last 2 games of that August series in Baltimore (Aug 14 & 15).

Mussina and **Jose Mesa** fanned a total of 19 Rangers in back-to-back games (8/14-15). **Mesa's** complete game on the 15th was the Orioles' 1st in nearly 3 months (May 17).

In the finale of that series (8/15), the Rangers, with a doubleheader coming up the following day in Cleveland, stayed with starter "Oil Can" **Boyd** through thick and thin...He was touched for 14 hits and 9 runs in 7 innings...The hit yield was the highest ever by a Texas pitcher in one game.

On Aug 20 in his 2nd day back from 4 months on the disabled list, **Glenn Davis** drove in 5 runs and homered off Boyd who suffered his 2nd disaster within a week (though he wasn't the loser in the 2nd game). In those 2 starts, Boyd gave up 22 hits and 15 earned runs in 12 innings. Boyd is 5-5 lifetime vs Baltimore.

Texas Batting: **Kevin Reimer** was the Texas leader in both homers (4) and rbi (11), and **Brian Downing** the average leader at .393 (28-11).

In 3 AL seasons, **Rafael Palmeiro** has batted .341 (132-45) with 24 rbi and 4 homers in 36 games against the O's...**Ruben Sierra**, on the other hand, has a lifetime average of only .229 (249-57) against Baltimore pitching with 10 homers and 35 rbi in 66 games.

Texas Pitching: See blurbs about Ryan and Boyd above...**Kenny Rogers** had an awful year against the Orioles...He was 0-3 in 4 games (2 starts), had an era of 9.58 (ip-10.1, er-11), an average against of .364 (44-16) and allowed 22 baserunners in 10.1 innings.

Baltimore Batting: **Cal Ripken**, who has played in all 115 Orioles-Rangers games since he joined the Birds in late '81, batted .409 (44-18) against Texas, scored 11 runs, drove in 13, and hit 2 homers (along with 3 doubles and a triple)...The Rangers are one of only 2 clubs the only club against which Cal has a lifetime .300 average (.301, 468-141). Minnesota is the other (.332, 461-153).

Joe Orsulak has a .355 (107-38) lifetime mark at the Rangers expense, and Chito Martinez made a lusty debut vs Texas pitching...He batted .522 (23-12) with 3 homers and 7 rbi in only 6 games.

Baltimore Pitching: **Dave Johnson** didn't enjoy a particularly solid season overall, but he was at his very best against the Rangers... In 3 appearances, including one start, he was 3-0, didn't allow an earned run in 12.1 innings, and limited Texas to a .179 average (39-7).

As a matter of fact, he, **Todd Frohwirth**, and **Mike Flanagan** combined to hold the Rangers scoreless over 23.2 innings. Frohwirth's average against was .107 (28-3).

Gregg Olson picked up 3 saves in 5 outings, but he did finally allow the Rangers an earned run, their 1st off him in his 3 AL seasons. Lifetime, Gregg is 3-0 with 8 saves in 18 games, with an 0.45 era (ip-20, er-1).

❖ ❖ ❖

VS TORONTO ('91: 5-8; Lifetime: 101-91, .526)...Over the last 5 years the O's are 23-42 (.354) against the Jays, and since they won their last pennant in '83, the Birds are not much better, at 39-64 (.379) over an 8-year span. At Toronto, the Orioles are 8-11 in 3 years at the SkyDome after going 1-12 during the final 2 seasons at Exhibition Stadium ('87-'88).

Down to the Wire: Since expansion began in '69, there have been 5 instances in which the Orioles' final series has had direct bearing on the outcome of the AL East race, including twice vs the Blue Jays:

1974-O's won game #161 at Detroit to clinch a tie for the division title, then the Brewers eliminated the 2nd place Yankees that night...1977-The Red Sox eliminated the O's at Boston in #160 (Fri), then the Orioles returned the compliment the following day, knocking out the Carmines as the Yankees clinched.

1982-The O's tied the Brewers for the lead, beating them in game #161, then lost the final game and the Brewers went on to win their only division championship.

1989-The Jays eliminated the O's in #161, having won the 1st 2 games of that decisive final series...1990-The Jays and O's split the 1st 2 games of the series at Baltimore and Toronto entered the final day trailing the Red Sox by one full game...The Orioles' victory in that game on **Mickey**

Tettleton's sudden death homer off Tom Henke would have derailed Jays' title quest anyway, but the Red Sox made it official earlier by winning their game on Tom Brunansky's dramatic catch in the right field corner at Fenway.

Only once before divisional play began did the O's go down to the wire. That was in 1964 when they won their last 2 games, vs Detroit, but were eliminated on the final Friday when the Yankees beat Cleveland. This year the O's were 3rd, 2 games back, one game behind the 2nd place White Sox who fell by the wayside on Saturday.

Highlights: Juan Guzman made his 1st 2 big league appearances, but starts, against the O's on June 7 (Baltimore) and June 15 (Toronto), and was 0-2 for his troubles. He was touched for 10 hits and 8 earned runs in 8.2 innings (era 8.31). After that, he went 10-1 with an era of 2.63.

In his only other start against the Birds, Guzman pitched his 1st career complete game (8/27), a 5-hitter, 8 strikeout, 6-1 win, and snapped 2 losing batting streaks: Orsulak's (21) and Cal Junior's (12). Bob Melvin was 5-for-5 with a home run and double and Mike Devereaux hit a 3-run home run as the O's beat Guzman the 2nd time.

The Blue Jays included 7 doubles and a 3-run homer by Joe Carter in a 8 run, 12 hit attack on June 16 at Toronto, but it wasn't enough. The Birds responded with 4 homers, featuring Joe Orsulak's first grand slam, and whipped the division champions, 13-8.

Roberto Alomar stole a career high 4 bases against the Birds' Jeff Robinson on June 8...The 1st (and only) Sunday night game in Memorial Stadium history was played on June 9 (ESPN). The Jays, behind Todd (3-0 vs. O's) Stottlemyre edging the Orioles, 3-2.

Two previously scheduled Sunday night attractions, in '81 and '90, were respectively, "struck" out and rained out.

Toronto Batting: Joe Carter batted .364 (55-20) against the Orioles, his triumphant return to the AL. He had 5 doubles, a triple and 4 home runs and tied Harold Baines for most rbi against the O's in '91 (17).

Pat Tabler has hit only .111 (27-3) vs the O's the last 2 years, but is still batting .323 (316-102) lifetime against them...**Kelly Gruber** is a .316 career hitter (206-65) at the O's expense... **Greg Myers**, on the other hand, is batting only .172 (58-10) lifetime off Baltimore pitching.

Dave Winfield has 20 career homers and 71 rbi in 112 career games against the O's.

Toronto Pitching: Stottlemyre's 3-0 record vs the O's was supported by a 1.23 era (ip-22, er-3) and a .192 (78-15) average against... The son of former Yankee righthander and longtime Mets' pitching coach Mel, is 5-4 lifetime...**Jimmy Key** was a less impressive 2-0 (the Birds hit .291 against him, 55-16). Key, who has an 8-7 lifetime against the O's, won his 100th career game, at Memorial Stadium on Aug 26.

Jack Morris, pitching his 1st and only year for the Twins, went 3-0 against the Birds, and is now 15-13 lifetime. As a Tiger, he had lost 3 of his final decisions vs Baltimore.

The O's batted .438 (32-14) against **David Wells**, who was 0-1 in 2 starts...**Tom Henke** saved 3 in 5 appearances...Over the last 3 years, he has held the Orioles to a .189 average (74-14). Lifetime, he is 5-2 with 11 saves.

Dave Stieb, who pitched only briefly in '91 and not at all against the Orioles, is 6-10 lifetime vs the O's, his lowest victory total against a single opponent...It took him until Aug 1, '90, to win his 1st (and only) game ever at Memorial Stadium, where he was 1-5 and had an era of 4.20 (ip-90, er-42).

To get that 1st win in Baltimore, Stieb had to survive a 40-pitch 1st inning (13 of his first 15 pitches were balls) during which he fell behind 4-0. He went 6 and won, 7-4, with relief help from **Jim Acker** and Henke.

Baltimore Batting: Rookie **Leo Gomez** was the most productive Oriole in the season series...He batted .313 (48-150 with 3 homers and 10 rbi). **Bill Ripken** batted .375 (24-9) vs Toronto while **Brother Cal** batted .255 (51-13) with a homer and 5 rbi. **Dwight Evans** batted .409 (22-9), but both **Chris Hoiles** (.048, 21-1) and **Randy Milligan** (.188, 32-6) struggled.

Baltimore Pitching: Not much to write home about as a staff era of 4.85 against Toronto would attest. **Bob Milacki** (1-1) fanned 18 and walked only 2 in 14.1 innings spread over 2 starts.

THE BABE RUTH MUSEUM

Located at 216 Emory Street, the Babe Ruth Birthplace and Baseball Center is just 6 blocks west of Baltimore's Inner Harbor and only 2 blocks from Oriole Park at Camden Yards. The Birthplace was officially established in 1971 as an historic landmark and shrine to commemorate the birthplace of the most famous and popular American athlete of all time. It was expanded in 1983 to become the official museum of the Baltimore Orioles. The Babe Ruth Birthplace is open daily: 10 to 5 (April through October) and 10 to 4 (November through March). On Orioles home game dates, the museum will remain open until 7 pm. The Birthplace is the second largest baseball museum in America, sporting over 26 exhibits on the Orioles, Babe Ruth and Maryland baseball history. And there's more to come, too. Just in time for the 1993 All-Star Game scheduled at Oriole Park at Camden Yards, a second museum building will open at Emory and Portland Streets, cater-corner to the Birthplace. The new 25,000 sq

RULES OF INTEREST

TRADING AND WAIVER REGULATIONS: Player assignments may be made to another major league club **without waivers** at any time except between Aug 1 and the day following the final day of the regular season (5 p.m. et).

Waivers are required for assignments to National Association clubs at all times **except** for optional assignments within 3 years of the date the player 1st reported to the major leagues. One year shall be deducted from the above 3-year period for each season in which the player may have been charged with an option prior to 1st reporting to a major league club during a championship season.

FREE AGENCY: Six years major league service required for eligibility. Re-entry draft has been abolished.

By Dec 7, player's former club must offer to arbitrate or it becomes ineligible to sign player...By Dec 19, player must accept offer or on Jan 9 former club becomes ineligible to sign the player until May 1.

SALARY ARBITRATION: Three years major league service required for eligibility...Maximum cut rules do not apply if, in immediately preceding year, player won arbitration increase of over 50%. In addition, effective since '91, a player with at least 2 but less than 3 years of ML service, shall be eligible for salary arbitration, if

- (a) he has accumulated at least 86 days of service during the immediately preceding season, and
- (b) he ranks in the top 17% in total service in the class of players who have at least 2 but less than 3 years of ML service, however accumulated, but with at least 86 days of service accumulated during the immediately preceding season.

TERMINATION PAY: One full season's pay if player released opening day or later. Thirty days pay for player who is released on the 16th day before opening day or earlier. If player is released after that 16th day prior to opening day, he receives 45 days pay.

SAVE RULE: Credit a pitcher with a save when he is the **finishing**, but not the **winning** pitcher, and when he qualifies under one of the following conditions:

- (1) He enters the game with a lead of no more than 3 runs and pitches for at least one inning, or
- (2) He enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at bat, or on deck, or
- (3) He pitches effectively for at least 3 innings regardless of his club's lead.

The current rule was adopted in 1975. Saves became official for the 1st time in '69. The original rule was amended in '73 and revised again in '75.

BATTING/ERA TITLE QUALIFICATIONS: 502 or more plate appearances/162 or more innings pitched.

ROOKIE AWARD QUALIFICATIONS: A player is considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has

- (1) exceeded 130 at bats or 50 innings pitched in the major leagues or
- (2) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a big league club(s) prior to Sep 1 (time on the disabled list does not count).

CONSECUTIVE-GAME STREAKS: A consecutive-game hitting streak shall not be terminated if all the player's plate appearances (one or more) result in a walk, hit by pitch, defensive interference, or a sacrifice bunt. The streak shall terminate, however, if the player has a sacrifice fly and no hit.

The player's individual consecutive-game hitting streak shall be determined by the consecutive games in which the player appears and is not determined by his club's games.

SUSPENDED GAME RULE: A game terminated for any of the following reasons will be a suspended game if it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e. 4-1/2 or 5 innings):

- (1) A curfew imposed by law.
- (2) A pre-arranged time limit.
- (3) Darkness where local law prohibits turning on the lights or when lights are not available.

Light failure: A game terminated by light failure or malfunction of a mechanical device under the control of the home club will be a suspended game **anytime after it starts**.

Inning in Progress (added in '80): If weather forces the termination of a legal game while an inning is in progress, it will become a suspended game if either of the following conditions exists:

- (1) The **visiting team** has scored one or more runs to tie the game, and if the **home team** has not scored.
- (2) The **visiting team** has scored one or more runs to take the lead, and the **home team** has not tied the score or retaken the lead.

Note: If a legal game is **tied** when called because of weather and neither of the above situations prevails, it is a **tie game** and must be replayed in its entirety.

Procedures for Resumption of Play: Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next single game between the 2 clubs on the **same ground**. If that is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in AL Regulation 5.2(c).

CURFEW: The American League curfew provides that no inning may start after 1:00 am, but any inning that begins prior to 1 am may be played to completion. Curfews shall be waived for the final series of the season in each of the parks of the contesting teams. There is no other curfew in the American League.

TRIPLE PLAYS

The Orioles have executed 10 triple plays, 2 of them in the last 3 years.

Jeff Ballard, the only Oriole pitcher to have actually participated in a triple play, has been the beneficiary in each of the last two. He and **Mike Cuellar** are the 2 hurlers in O's history to have profited twice from triple plays.

The one in June '89 was one of the few in baseball history in which brothers (**Cal** and **Bill Ripken**) took part. The triple play executed by the O's in '77 at KC was distinctive because it was a very rare game-ender. The list:

Aug 8, '90 at Oak: Line drive...Willie Randolph lined to Ballard... 1-6-3 (Ballard, C. Ripken, Horn).

Jun 15, '89 at Bal vs NY: Line drive...Steve Balboni lined to Cal Ripken...64-4 (C. Ripken, B. Ripken, Milligan).

Prior to '89, the Orioles had gone 10 years without a triple play.

Jun 10, '79 at Bal vs Cle: "gitp" Buddy Bell... 5-4-3 (DeCinces, Dauer, Murray)

Sep 9, '78 at Tor: "gitp" Rick Cerone; 5-4-3 (DeCinces, Dauer, Murray)

Jun 3, '77 at KC: Fly ball...John Wathan hit a sac fly to Pat Kelly in right. Fred Patek was caught off 1st and was out, Kelly to Mark Belanger to Billy Smith (2b), back to Belanger. Belanger then noticed Dave Nelson standing off 3rd base. He ran at him and tagged him out, completing the rare (if not unique) game-ending triple play and giving the O's a 7-6 win. The play went 9-6-4-6.

Sep 29, '73 at Det: "gitp" Frank Howard; 5-4-3 (B. Robinson, Grich, Crowley).

Jul 7, '73 at Bal vs Oak: "gitp" Gene Tenace; 5-4-3 (B. Robinson, Grich, Cabell).

Aug 6, '69 at Bal vs KC : "gitp" Eliseo Rodriguez; 5-4-3 (B. Robinson, D. Johnson, Powell).

Apr 9, '59 at Was: line drive by Ed Fitzgerald; 3-6-3 (Boyd, Carrasquel, Boyd).

Aug 3, '55 at Bal vs KC: "gidp" Art Ceccarelli, then runner was thrown out at home; 3-6-2 (Triandos, Miranda, H. Smith).

O'S HAVE HIT INTO 13

The Orioles have themselves hit into 13 triple plays in 38 seasons. The most recent victim was Gary Roenicke against Oakland at Memorial Stadium in Baltimore on May 7, '79. He grounded to 3rd baseman Wayne Gross who started an around the horn, 5-4-3, triple play.

On 4 of the 13 occasions when the opposition has executed a triple play against the Orioles, Brooks Robinson has been the batter. He bounced into one, lined into another, and 2 were "gidps" with a runner subsequently being thrown out between third and home.

ALL-STAR GAME NOTES

CAL'S GAME: In '91, **Cal Ripken** became the 4th Oriole to win an All-Star game mvp award when, in the 62nd All-Star Game on July 9 at Toronto's SkyDome, he went 2-for-3 with a 3-run homer off former teammate **Dennis Martinez** to lead the AL to a 4-2 win...See below for more details on previous O's mvp's.

In the home run hitting contest the day before the All-Star game, Cal incredibly hit 12 home runs at the SkyDome in 22 swings to lead the AL to a 20-7 pasting of the NL.

ALL-STAR STARTS: Ripken started his 8th straight All-Star game, becoming the 1st AL shortstop to start in an All-Star game 8 years (consecutive

or not), surpassing **Joe Cronin** who started 7 years for the Red Sox and **Senators** (1933-34-35-37-38-39-41) ... (**Luis Aparicio** started in 8 All-Star games, but they were only over 6 years (2 in 1959 and 2 in 1962)... **Ozzie Smith**, who has started the last 9 games, holds the NL record. Cal is the only player to start for the AL the last 8 years.

Cal extended his Orioles club record for most consecutive All-Star starts. **Brooks Robinson** is 2nd with 5, '64 thru '68, and still holds the Orioles standard for most overall starts (10 years, 11 games—2 in '61).

Cal has been the elected starter in 7 of his 8 starts ('84 thru '87, '89-'91). In '88, Cal finished 2nd in the voting to the Tigers' **Alan Trammell**, but started anyway when the Detroit star had to withdraw because of injury.

Eight different Orioles have been selected starters in 22 years of fan voting. In addition to Cal and Brooks, Orioles who have been chosen to starting berths are **Boog Powell** and **Frank Robinson** (2 each), and **Bobby Grich**, **Ken Singleton**, **Eddie Murray** and **Terry Kennedy** (once each).

ALL-STAR APPEARANCES: Cal's 9 All-Star selections are 2nd in Orioles history behind **Brooks**' 15 (in consecutive years). **Eddie Murray** ranks behind Cal with 7. Only one shortstop in Major League history has been an All-Star more years: **Ozzie Smith** with 11 ('81-'91).

VOTING HISTORY: Traditionally, the All-Star voting was entrusted to the fans, but after the '57 ballot box stuffing incident in Cincinnati, the responsibility for picking the starting team was passed to the players for 12 years ('58 thru '69).

Selection of the starters returned to the public in '70 through the courtesy of the Gillette Company in cooperation with Major League Baseball. For the last 5 years ('87 thru '91), *USA Today* has sponsored the balloting process.

ORIOLES ALL-STAR MVPs: Before Cal Ripken was chosen, the Orioles produced 3 other All-Star mvp's:

Billy O'Dell ('58), the former O's left-hander, hurled the last 3 innings of the only All-Star Game ever played in Baltimore. He retired all 9 batters he faced to protect a one-run lead, giving the AL a 4-3 win before a Memorial Stadium crowd of 48,829.

Brooks Robinson ('66) won his trophy in St Louis on the strength of a 3-for-4 effort including a triple and an 8-for-8 performance afield. He was the 1st player from a losing team to be so honored.

Frank Robinson's ('71) 4th inning homer at Detroit put the AL on top to stay, and earned him mvp honors. It was the AL's 1st All-Star victory since '62, and its last until '83... However, the junior circuit is now on a streak of its own, having won 4 in a row and 6 of the last 9.

ORIOLES ALL-STAR HOMERS: In '91, Cal became the 4th Oriole to homer in All-Star play joining Brooks (7/11/67 at Anaheim off **Fergie Jenkins**, none on; Frank (7/13/71 at Detroit off **Dock Ellis**, one on) and Ken **Singleton** (8/9/81 at Cleveland off **Tom Seaver**, none on).



ORIOLES POST-SEASON NOTES

ALCS: The Orioles are 18-8 (.692) in ALCS.

The O's won the first 10 ALCS games they played (including the first 9 ever played) ... They swept the Twins twice ('69-'70) and A's ('71) in the first 3 ALCS, then won game #1 against Oakland in '73 before losing the 2nd game that year ... The Orioles are 9-4 at home and on the road.

WORLD SERIES: Baltimore has gone 3-3 in 6 WS, but has a .576 pct. in games (19-14) ... The Birds are 10-7 at home and 9-7 on the road.

POST-SEASON TOTAL: In 59 post-season games, the O's are 37-22 (.627). They are 19-11 at home and 18-11 away.

ATTENDANCE: In 26 ALCS games, the O's have played to 1,013, 997, an average of 39,000. They've played 13 of those at home and have drawn 544,691 (average 41,899).

In 33 WS games attendance has totaled 1,769,179 (average 53,611). At home for 17 WS dates the Birds have pulled 877,518 (average 51,619).

The Orioles' 59 total post-season games have attracted 2,783,176 (average 47,172). At Memorial Stadium there have been 30 post-season events which have drawn a total of 1,422,209 (average 47,407.)

The 3 biggest crowds to watch the O's in a WS were games 5, 4 & 3 (67,064; 66,947 and 65,792) of '83, all at Philadelphia. The largest attendance for a WS game in Baltimore was 54,458 for game #4 (final game) vs. Dodgers in '66.

The biggest house for an Orioles LCS game was 52,787 for game #1 at Baltimore vs. the Angels in '79 (the "Tonight, Let It Be Lowenstein" game).

4 ORIOLES HAVE HOMERED 1ST TIME UP IN WORLD SERIES

Among the 21 players who homered in their first lifetime World Series plate appearances are the following four Orioles:

Brooks Robinson ('66 vs Dodgers), **Don Buford** ('69 vs Mets), **Doug DeCinces** ('79 vs Pirates), and **Jim Dwyer** ('83 vs Phillies).

EASY MAGIC NUMBER FORMULAS

This was suggested by veteran Baltimore *EVENING SUN* baseball writer, **Jim Henneman**: Add trailing club's losses to leading team's wins:

Subtract the sum from 162, then add one:

That is your magic number.

This one from a Baltimore baseball fan, **Michael McCoy**: Subtract the leader's wins and the trailing team's losses from 163, i.e.:

Magic Number = 163 - LW - TL.

THE ORIOLES—PAST AND PRESENT

Major League Baseball returned to the City of Baltimore in 1954 after an absence of more than half a century.

The transfer of the St Louis Browns to Baltimore represented the first inter-city shift of an American League club in 52 seasons. Ironically, it was Baltimore that had been victimized in the last previous move. The Orioles, a charter franchise in the league when it was founded in '01, moved to New York under shadowy circumstances for \$18,000 after the '02 season. There, they were renamed, 1st the "Highlanders," then later—gasp!—the "Yankees."

Some 38 seasons have elapsed since the Orioles set up shop at 33rd & Ellerslie. During that time, they have finished 1st 8 times, captured 6 American League pennants and won 3 World Series. They've also been runners-up 9 times, and have placed in the 1st division 22 times (all in the last 32 years). During these last 32 seasons, they have the best won-lost percentage in major league baseball (.549, see page 34 for more details). The Orioles have enjoyed 26 winning seasons, including, at one stretch, 18 in a row from '68 thru '85.

Though the O's have maintained the winningest record in the majors for the past 32 years, it was really from '60, when they nearly won their 1st pennant, thru '83, when they captured their last, that they dominated major league baseball.

During that 24-year period, they were 612 games over .500 (2206-1594), .581) and held a 99½ game edge over the majors' 2nd best club of that era, the Yankees.

IN THE BEGINNING

A winning tradition is not peculiar to the modern Orioles, however. It took root in Baltimore a long time ago. There are no fewer than 22 former Orioles players in the Baseball Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, and 15 of them played here before 1954 (see page 120).

The history of professional baseball in Baltimore dates back 120 years to 1872, when the city was represented in the National Association, an important forerunner of today's major leagues.

Baltimore's baseball heritage was richly embellished in the formative years by:

- A left-hander named **Matt Kilroy**, who won 46 games for the American Association O's in 1887;
- Three straight National League pennant winners ('94, '95, '96), a Team that would ultimately produce 6 Hall of Famers;
- The manager of that championship team, an innovative man named **Ned Hanlon**, who with the help of his talented athletes did much to shape the future of baseball strategy;
- Legendary all-time greats **Babe Ruth**, **Lefty Grove**, and **John McGraw** to name a few;
- **Jack Dunn**, whose name has long been synonymous with baseball in Baltimore. An infielder and pitcher with the city's original AL franchise, Dunn subsequently owned and managed the International League Orioles for 22 eventful seasons from 1907 thru 1928.

Among his many achievements: signing **Ruth** to his 1st professional contract, and winning 7 straight pennants from 1919 thru 1925. It was the **Dunn** family that kept professional baseball alive and well in Baltimore most of those 51 years between big league franchises;

- And, by a crowd of 52,833 that attended a Little World Series game at Municipal Stadium (on the same site as Memorial Stadium) between the Orioles and Louisville Colonels on Oct. 9, 1944. That same afternoon in St. Louis, the Cardinals and Browns played the decisive 6th game of the World Series before a crowd that was 20,203 smaller at Sportsman's Park (att: 31,630).

RETURN TO THE MAJORS

Officially, the American League returned to Baltimore on Sep 29, 1951. That was the day American League owners, meeting in New York, unanimously approved the purchase of a controlling interest in the St Louis Browns from previous owner **Bill Veeck** by a group of Baltimore negotiators, led by Mayor **Tommy D'Alesandro Jr.** ("Old Tommy") and attorney **Clarence Miles**, who became the club's 1st president. The purchase price was \$2,475,000.

Unfortunately, only the name on the uniforms had changed. In '54, the Orioles were merely the Browns transplanted. They were essentially the same team that had finished in the 2nd division for so many years in St Louis (see "St. Louis Browns" below).

The Birds, under the likable veteran manager **Jimmy Dykes**, lost 100 games that season while winning only 54. But, as poor as that record was, it wasn't bad enough to finish last. Happily, that dubious honor belonged to the Philadelphia A's with a record of 51-103.

The Orioles' escape from the basement that year allowed them to maintain a notable distinction for 32 years. They had never finished last until the string finally ran out in 1986.

THE START OF SOMETHING BIG

The Orioles took the 1st big step in the right direction on Sep 14, 1954 when they hired White Sox Manager **Paul Richards** to come aboard as both manager and general manager, succeeding **Dykes** and **Arthur Ehren**. **Richards**, a native of Waxahachie, Texas, and a catcher for the World Champion Detroit Tigers in '45, was a highly regarded strategist and a fine handler of pitchers. In Baltimore, he also became an aggressive administrator.

Not long after he arrived, **Richards** engineered a 17-player deal with the Yankees, probably the biggest in baseball history (see pxxx for details). The O's gave up **Bob Turley**, **Don Larsen**, shortstop **Bill Hunter** and 5 others. Among the 9 who came to Baltimore were 2 who proved to be very special: **Gus Triandos**, the Orioles' 1st legitimate long ball threat, and a slick fielding, crowd-pleasing shortstop named **Willy Miranda**. Those 2 helped keep the fans happy during those early years while the club struggled toward legitimacy.

In '55, **Richards** kept the revolving door well greased. A total of 54 players wore the black and orange that year, including 23 pitchers. While "Tall Paul" was wheeling and dealing at all levels, his farm department (**Jim McLaughlin** and **Harry Dalton**) was also pursuing young amateur talent at a relentless pace all over the country.

Among those prospects was a kid from Little Rock, named **Brooks Robinson**, who would develop into the best fielding 3rd baseman of all-time, and would spend 23 seasons in an Orioles uniform before moving up a level to the Hall of Fame in Cooperstown.

Gradually, the Orioles began to improve. In '57, **Richards**' 3rd season in Baltimore, the Birds finished at .500 (76-76) for the 1st time. In '60, with a club comprising 10 regulars in their 20's, 7 of them rookies, the Birds nearly won their 1st pennant.

Richards was particularly adept at reconstructing the careers of fading veterans and developing young pitchers. During his reign, the Orioles became famous for the "Kiddie Korps", a passel of hard-throwing youngsters who pitched in Baltimore from the mid-50's to the early 60's.

THE NEXT STEP UP

In the fall of '58, the Orioles hired the Yankees' highly respected farm director **Lee MacPhail** as general manager, replacing **Richards** who nevertheless remained as field manager (until Sep '61). **MacPhail** improved the fiscal and administrative efficiency of the operation and increased the productivity of the club's minor league system...He also made some brilliant deals.

After the near miss of '60, the Orioles set a club record with 95 wins in '61 while **Diamond Jim Gentile**, acquired the year before from the Dodgers, gave Orioles fans an unprecedented show of power and production (46 home runs, including a major league record-tying 5 grand slams, and 141 rbi).

In '64, another near miss under the direction of "Manager of the Year" **Hank Bauer** who replaced **Billy Hitchcock** that season. The Birds finished 3rd, but only 2 games back of the pennant-winning Yankees and produced their 1st American League MVP - **Brooks Robinson**.

MacPhail left the Orioles after the '65 season to join Baseball Commissioner **William D. "Spike" Eckert** as his principal advisor, but not before negotiating what was arguably the most important trade in the ballclub's history. It was the deal that brought National League superstar **Frank Robinson** from Cincinnati in exchange for the best pitcher the Orioles had ever had to that point, **Milt Pappas**.

THE LAND OF PLEASANT LIVING

Just before **MacPhail** departed, **Jerry Hoffberger** and his family acquired a controlling interest in the franchise. The **Hoffbergers** owned the Baltimore-based National Brewing Company, and their highly successful advertising theme for many years was based on the concept that the Chesapeake Bay area was "The Land of Pleasant Living."

That was surely true for the Orioles who went on to enjoy a golden age of on-the-field prosperity. Over the next 6 seasons, the Orioles would win four pennants and in a period of 9 years would finish first six times.

Hoffberger brought **Frank Cashen** from the brewery to serve as executive vice president, and promoted the club's talented farm director, **Harry Dalton**, to run the baseball program.

In '66, the Orioles not only won their 1st pennant, under **Hank Bauer**, they shocked the baseball world by sweeping the heavily favored Dodgers in 4 straight. **Frank Robinson**, in his 1st AL season, won the Triple Crown (.316, 49 hr, 122 rbi), and was mvp of both the American League and the World Series.

It had taken a player of **Frank's** stature to put the O's over the top, but the club was already blessed with considerable talent; players like **Brooks Robinson**, **Luis Aparicio** and **Jim Palmer** who would later join **Frank** in the Hall of Fame, long ball hitting 1st baseman **Boog Powell**, rookie 2nd baseman **Dave Johnson**, perennial Gold Glove centerfielder **Paul Blair**, and a couple of pitchers named **Jim Palmer** and **Dave McNally**, still the top 2 winners in Orioles history. All but **Frank** and **Aparicio** were products of the O's fertile farm system.

The O's slumped badly in '67 and were going nowhere in '68 at the All-Star break when **Dalton** replaced **Bauer** with his longtime associate **Earl Weaver**. The feisty 5'8" St. Louisian had enjoyed a remarkable career as a manager in the O's farm system. Over the next 14½ years he would experience even greater success at the major league level.

Having added the ultimate leadoff man (**Don Buford**), and a talented left handed pitcher (**Mike Cuellar**), and having replaced one Gold Glove for another at shortstop (**Mark Belanger** for **Aparicio**), the O's with **Dalton** at the controls of the baseball operation, would reign over the American League for the next 3 years.

In '69, '70 & '71, they became only the 3rd club in history to win 100 or more games for 3 straight years. They won the division title by 19, 15, and 12 games, and swept the first 3 American League Championship Series, 3 games to none, over the Twins twice and A's once.

Following a humiliating loss to the New York Mets in the '69 World Series, the O's bounced back in '70 and took the Cincinnati Reds in a 5-game series that was thoroughly dominated by the brilliance of **Brooks Robinson**.

In '70, the O's had three 20-game winners (**McNally**, **Palmer** & **Mike Cuellar**); the next year they had 4 (add **Pat Dobson**), a feat that had

occurred only once before in major league history, and hasn't happened since.

THAT OLD GANG OF MINE

After the Orioles lost a heartbreaking 7-game World Series to the Pirates in '71, **Dalton** left the ballclub to run the California Angels, and Executive VP **Cashen** added the responsibility for player personnel to his job description.

After their 4 pennants in 6 seasons, the O's began to perform some major surgery. **Frank Robinson** was traded and a year later, so were **Dave Johnson**, **Buford** and others.

The '72 season was grim but with youngsters like **Bobby Grich**, **Don Baylor**, **Al Bumby** and **Richie Coggins** joining forces with Boog, Blal, championship in '73, and defied the odds to win it again in '74. On Aug 28, '74, the O's were in 4th place, 8 games behind the 1st-place Red Sox. When the smoke cleared 5 weeks later, the O's, who had gone 28-6 during that stretch, were on top of the heap, a shade ahead of the 2nd place Yankees, and a full 8 games up on the 3rd place Bosox.

THE PETERS PRINCIPLE

Cashen, who had acquired **Ken Singleton**, **Mike Torrez** and **Lee May** in a couple of glittering trades the previous winter, returned to the beer business after the '75 season. He was replaced by the widely respected & highly capable career baseball executive, **Hank Peters**, who had most recently served as president of the National Association (the minor leagues).

Not long after his arrival, **Peters** shook up the Orioles, trading for the flamboyant long-ball hitting **Reggie Jackson**. But of more long term significance was the 10-player deal he constructed with the Yankees in June '76. Three of the 5 players acquired in that transition contributed greatly to the Orioles many successes over the next decade: **Rick Dempsey**, **Tippy Martinez** and **Scott McGregor**.

The Orioles remained competitive well into the 80's despite serious losses from the new free agent re-entry system adopted in '76. **Peters**' Yankee deal, plus a fine farm system harvest in the early '70's which produced **Eddie Murray**, **Mike Flanagan** and **Rich Dauer** among others, helped the cause immeasurably (from '76 thru '83, the O's won 2 golds and 5 silvers in 8 years).

THE BALTIMORE-WASHINGTON CONNECTION

In '79, right after the O's had lost a second 7-game World Series to the Pirates, the internationally renowned Washington attorney, **Edward Bennett Williams**, completed the purchase of the ballclub in its entirety.

Williams brought with him a new regional marketing concept designed to expand the Orioles appeal over a wider geographic area. The plan was to add metropolitan Washington and states to the south to a drawing area that had been basically limited to Maryland and parts of Pennsylvania and Delaware.

The program has met with popular acceptance by baseball fans all over "Birdland". Despite the Orioles below-average performance on the field in 5 of the past 6 seasons, attendance at Memorial Stadium has averaged over 2 million per year in that period.

In the 1st 4 years of the **Williams-Peters** administration, the O's nearly captured 3 pennants though they had to settle for one. They won 100 games in '80 and finished 2nd, 3 games back of the Yankees; played the Brewers for the division championship on the final day of the '82 season and lost; then won it all in '83.

There were some remarkable achievements during that period. In '80, for example, there was a 5-game series against the Yankees in Baltimore that drew 249,605, the largest turnout in history for a single series.

Then there was '82 when the O's went 33-10 (starting Aug 10) down the stretch to tie the Brewers on the next-to-last day of the season by beating them in 3 straight pressure-packed games at Memorial Stadium. On the climatic day, however, the Brewers won big, to clinch their 1st division championship.

Yet, despite that crushing defeat, most of more than over 51,000 fans remained in their seats for a full 45 minutes afterward. They stayed to applaud the players for their down-to-the-wire effort and to say goodbye to the manager, **Earl Weaver**, whose retirement had officially begun at game's end.

The emotion expressed so warmly and spontaneously by those loyal Orioles fans made it difficult to tell, in the dusk of that autumn afternoon, who had won the game and who had lost.

It was in '82 also that the son of the Orioles 3rd base coach, **Cal Ripken Jr.**, took his place in the Orioles starting lineup, a position he has not relinquished since—even for one game, and joined with **Eddie Murray**, the Orioles all-time home run champion, to form an awesome 1-2 punch.

THE LAST HURRAH — FOR AWHILE

Joe Altobelli, an old Orioles organization veteran who'd been on a 6-year sabbatical, replaced **Earl Weaver** in '83, and right off the bat led the club to that elusive 3rd world championship.

They won their division by 6 games, then defeated the White Sox at Comiskey Park in a decisive Game #4 of the ALCS, breaking a scoreless tie on a dramatic 10th inning home run by the newest Oriole, **Tito Landrum**. The Orioles, who had never lost the first game of a post-season event, dropped both of them in '83, and each time a gritty complete game effort by **Mike Boddicker** in game #2 restored the balance.

After splitting the 1st 2 World Series games in Baltimore, the action shifted 90 miles north to Veterans Stadium where the Phillies boasted the best home record in the National League...But, the Orioles swept the 3 Philadelphia games, then cruised happily home down 1-95 with their 3rd world title in hand.

In the 5th and final game, **Rick Dempsey** homered and doubled to clinch the World Series "mvp" award and **Eddie Murray** hit 2 electrifying home runs while **Scott McGregor** was blanking the Phillies on 5 hits.

The '83 champions boasted 2 dominating players in **Murray** and **Ripken**, and excellent pitching. But, most observers credited the club's many "role" players with making the difference, for getting the most out of their abilities while submerging their own egos in the interest of winning.

RECONSTRUCTION

After that world championship, the Orioles' success on the field went into decline...The '84 and '85 seasons were modest, though winning ones, but from '86 thru '91, a 6-year span, the O's lost more games than any club in the majors (194-291, .400)...This unaccustomed series of setbacks climaxed in '88 when the Orioles went 0-21 at the start of the season, and ultimately lost a club record 107 games.

By then, however, the Orioles' reconstruction plan had already begun in earnest...**Edward Bennett Williams** had signaled the start of the massive rebuilding project with a series of personnel decisions during the fall of '87. He replaced **Hank Peters** and Farm Director **Tom Giordano** with **Roland Hemond** and **Doug Melvin**, and brought **Frank Robinson** into the policy making process. The following May he appointed as president **Larry Lucchino**, a long-time associate who had been a club vice president as well as the general counsel during most of **Williams'** tenure as club owner.

At the same time, **Williams** renewed his commitment to restore the club to its customary level of competitiveness by redeveloping the farm system, and returning to fundamentals. When he passed away in August '88, the pieces were in place for an orderly takeover by **Eli Jacobs'** new ownership group which is equally dedicated to a bright Orioles future.

The Orioles success in '89, going down to the final weekend before conceding the division championship to Toronto, was as surprising as it was exciting, but no one in the organization expected that kind of dramatic improvement so quickly, just as no one thought that the reconstruction project was nearing completion.

There is still much work to be done, and there is never a guarantee of success in baseball. However, the club's commitment to fundamentals and to a strong farm system, and the acquisition of key players to fill in the gaps of talent, provides encouragement that the Orioles will soon again take their place among the consistent contenders as they enter a new era with a move to a beautiful downtown ballpark.

EPILOGUE

Despite the club's losing record in 5 of the last 6 seasons, the Orioles still bear 2 very proud distinctions:

They have been the winningest team in baseball since the start of divisional play in '69, and they have also compiled the game's best won-lost record over the last 32 years (see page 34).

THE ST LOUIS BROWNS

The St Louis Browns, the franchise from which the current Orioles descend, originated in Milwaukee in '01, the American League's 1st season. Before the '02 season began, the franchise had moved to St Louis. It was after that same campaign that the original AL Orioles went to New York. The Browns, who took the name that originated with St Louis teams in the late 1800s, played 52 seasons ('02-'53) in St Louis and were probably the most consistently bad club in major league history. They were 3,416-4,653 (.433 that's more than 1,000 games under .500); wound up in the 2nd division (5th thru 8th) 40 times; won just one pennant ('44, a war year) and finished 2nd only twice ('02 & '22).

George Sisler, one of 12 Hall of Famers who played and/or managed for the Browns was certainly the club's all-time best (and most significant) player. He would do credit to any franchise. In 13 seasons with the Browns ('15 thru '27), he twice hit over .400 ('20-.407, '22-.420) and had a career average of .340.

Another outstanding contributor was outfielder **Ken Williams**. He is not in the Hall of Fame, but he hit over .300 nine times in 10 St Louis seasons and in '22 batted .332 with 34 doubles, 39 homers and 155 rbi. He was the home run champion that year with 4 more than **Babe Ruth**, and was the 1st ever to join the so-called "30-30" club-30 or more steals and 30 or more homers in the same year.

As you can see, '22 was a big year for both **Sisler** and **Williams** and the Browns set a club record for wins-93 (it was the only time in the history of the franchise that they reached the 90-victory level). They finished 2nd, one game back of the Yankees.

Despite the heroics of **Sisler** and **Williams**, however, when fans recall the Browns, they probably think 1st of a couple of guys named **Gray** and **Gaedel**.

Pete Gray, who had only one arm (his left), appeared in 77 games for the Browns in '45 (the last wartime season) at the age of 28. He batted .218 (234-51) with no homers and 13 rbi, and never returned to the big time. The appearance of **Eddie Gaedel**, at 3'7" and 65 pounds, was a product of club owner **Bill Veeck**'s creative genius...The 26-year old signed in '51 as a pinch hitter and, in his only plate appearance, he did what he was paid for, he drew a walk.

As a surprise pinch hitter for leadoff batter **Frank Saucier** in the home half of the 1st inning, little **Eddie** was walked on 4 pitches by Detroit pitcher **Bob Cain**, then was promptly replaced by pinch runner **Jim Delsing**. The '44 AL pennant winners went 89-65 to finish one game ahead of the Tigers. They lost the World Series in 6 games played entirely in one

stadium (Sportsman's Park was also the regular season home of the Cardinals). The Browns won games #1 and #3 behind **Denny Galehouse** and **Jack Kramer**, respectively. The Browns' only home run in the series was hit by 1st baseman **George McQuinn**.

In June '51, **Bill DeWitt**, who had been with the Browns since '16 (when **Branch Rickey** was gm), and his brother, **Charles**, sold their controlling interest to **Bill Veeck**. He operated the club for the next 2½ seasons. Twice in '53, Veeck attempted to bring the franchise to Baltimore himself, but could not get the necessary approval from American League owners...Subsequently (Sep 29, '53), he sold his holdings to a group of Baltimore businessmen and the transfer was approved unanimously.

ST LOUIS BROWNS HALL OF FAME

The Browns are gone, but not forgotten. The St Louis Browns Fan Club, organized by Maryville College Professor **Bill Borst** in '84, is alive and well. In '85 the club even established a Browns Hall of Fame on the campus at Maryville (in St. Louis). The following 27 members have been elected since then (Baseball Hall of Famers in **boldface**):

Beau Bell (of), Harland Clift (3b), Johnny Berardino (if), Mark Christmas (3b), Bob Dillinger (3b), **Rick Ferrell** (c), Denny Galehouse (p), Ned Garver (p), Don Gutteridge (2b), "Baby Doll" Jacobson (of), Jack Kramer (p), Chet Laabs (of), George McQuinn (1b), Bob Muncrief (p), Bobo Newsom (p), **Satchell Paige** (p), Nelson Potter (p), Hank Sevareid (c), Luke Sewell (mgr), Urban Shocker (p), Roy Sievers (of-lb), **George Sisler** (1b-mgr), Vern Stephens (ss), George Stone (of), John Tobin (of), **Bobby Wallace** (ss-mgr), Ken Williams (of).

ORIOLES ENSHRINED AT COOPERSTOWN

Jim Palmer, selected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1990, was the 7th modern Oriole to be chosen, the 6th in a 9-year period (starting '82).

He was also the 3rd Oriole, along with **Frank** and **Brooks Robinson**, to be selected in his 1st year of eligibility...They are 3 of only 23 1st ballot electees (including '92 inductee **Tom Seaver**)* among the 211 Hall of Fame members.

Jim polled 92.6% of the total vote (411 of 444 ballots cast), the highest percentage ever by an Oriole, and 3rd among Hall of Fame pitchers behind **Seaver** (98.8%, 425 of 430), and the legendary **Bob Feller** (93.75% in '62). Seaver's percentage was the highest ever recorded in a Baseball Hall of Fame election.

Jim, Frank and Brooks are the only three Hall of Famers wearing modern Orioles uniforms in their official busts/portraits.

*The other player elected in '92, **Rollie Fingers**, was on the ballot for the 2nd time. He received 81.2% of the vote (349 of 430).

3 More: There are 3 additional Hall of Famers to have represented the Orioles, though not as players: **George Weiss**, who immortalized himself as a general manager of the Yankees, served part of his apprenticeship as an International League Orioles general manager; the late **Luke Appling**, a legendary hitter/shortstop for the White Sox, coached one year under Birds' Manager **Billy Hitchcock**, and the late **Burleigh Grimes**, the famous spitball pitcher who won 270 games in the majors, scouted for the Orioles from '60 thru '71.

Notes: **John McGraw** had a .334 lifetime batting average in 16 big league seasons, but was elected to the Hall of Fame primarily because of his achievements as a manager...The same is true of his buddy, **Wilbert Robinson**. **Rube Marquard** pitched only 30 innings for the Orioles, all in '27.

Baltimore-born **Babe Ruth** signed his 1st pro contract with **Jack Dunn** in '14, and made his professional debut with the Orioles (IL) that year as a pitcher...**Chief Bender** was based in Baltimore twice...He pitched both for the '27 Orioles (g-18, w-6, l-3) and the '15 Baltimore Terrapins (w-4, l-1) in the ill-fated Federal League.

Other native Marylanders in the Hall of Fame include **"Home Run" Baker** (Trappe), **Grove** (Lonaconing), and 3 others who never played for the Orioles: **Jimmie Foxx** (Sudlersville), **Judy Johnson** (Snow Hill) and **Kaline** (Balmer).

THE ORIOLES HALL OF FAME

Gene Woodling, the clutch-hitting outfielder who served 3 tours of duty with the Orioles (2 as a player and one as a coach), has been elected to the Orioles Hall of Fame for '92. He became the 23rd player or manager chosen since the hall was initiated in '77.

Woodling, from Medina, Ohio, came here 1st in '55 in the famed 17-player deal (see page 104) from the Yankees, for whom he had played in 5 World Series over 6 seasons. That 1st exposure to Baltimore didn't take, and he was traded to Cleveland in June.

After he returned to Baltimore just before opening day 1958, things were different, and over the next 3 years Gene became a major contributor plus a father confessor to the many young Orioles who were beginning to make their presence felt in the American League.

His best year in Baltimore was 1959, when he was chosen Most Valuable Oriole" after leading the club in batting (.300), rbi (77), doubles (22), total bases (200) and walks (78). Though he reached his 36th birthday during that season, he led the league at the break with a .344 average and was also chosen to play in the All-Star game for the 1st time in his career.

There was no better hitter when the game was on the line than Gene Woodling in his 2nd Baltimore tour, and he seemed to get better as he grew older. His pet hate in baseball was grounding into double plays, and perhaps for that reason he almost never did, even in his late 30s. Gene set career highs in games played (140) in each of his last 2 years with the Orioles.

In '60 he led the club in walks for the 3rd straight year, and in that season compiled a .398 on-base percentage. Perhaps the one at bat that best describes the toughness and concentration of Gene Woodling was the night in Aug of '60, when he was batting in the 3rd inning against the Indians' **Dick Stigman**. The O's were trailing 3-0, and the bases were

loaded when Stigman knocked Gene down with a high and inside pitch. He got up, dusted himself off, then hit the next pitch out of the ball park for what turned out to be a game-winning grand slam home run.

Gene went to the expansion Senators the following season, and batted .313 that 1st year ('60). He retired after the '62 season, which he split between the Senators and Mets. Later, he returned to the Orioles for a 4-year tour as 1st base and batting coach under his old Yankee teammate **Hank Bauer**, then the Orioles manager.

The newest Orioles Hall of Famer was chosen by the veterans committee, a group of some 25 senior representatives from the sports media, the Oriole Advocates and the Orioles front office. To be eligible for veterans committee selection, the candidate must have ceased serving in the capacity of consideration for at least 20 years.

The veterans committee was formed in '89 in an effort to offset any injustices inflicted on those who might have been passed over unfairly by younger voters not familiar with the extent of their contributions to the Orioles. Four other Orioles have gained admission to the O's Hall of Fame by veterans vote: **Stu Miller**, **Jim Gentile**, **Hank Bauer** and **Hal "Skinny" Brown**.

The regular Orioles Hall of Fame vote, by a constituency of some 80 people comprising sports writers and announcers, Oriole Advocates and Orioles personnel, produced no winners for the 2nd year in a row.

The procedures in both elections are based on those used by the National Baseball Hall of Fame, requiring mention on 75% of ballots cast. Candidates, to be eligible for either selection process, must have served a minimum of 3 full years with the Orioles.

To be eligible for the regular election, a player, manager or coach must have ceased serving in the position for which he was nominated for at least one year.

The Orioles Hall of Fame was conceived in '77 by the Oriole Advocates at the suggestion of 2 former presidents, **Allen Barrett** and **Jack Buckley**, both of whom have since passed away. The Advocates continue to administer the annual elections, this year under the direction of Hall of Fame Committee chairmen **Bob Bates**, DDS, and **Fred Goodwin**.

ORIOLE ADVOCATES

The Oriole Advocates, Inc is a unique non-profit organization, dedicated to promoting and stimulating interest in the game of baseball at both the amateur and professional levels. Founded in July, 1960, the Advocates will celebrate their 32nd anniversary this summer.

Membership comprises some 75 men and women, drawn from a broad cross-section in the Baltimore area.

Through the years, the Advocates have made substantial financial donations to worthy causes, primarily to baseball-oriented youth organizations; have played a key role in the restoration of **Babe Ruth's** birthplace

at 216 Emory Street and its conversion into the Babe Ruth/Oriole Museum; and in 1977, established the Orioles Hall of Fame (see page 12). The organization has also served as an essential right arm to the Orioles Public Relations and Marketing Departments. In that connection, the Advocates initiated the popular "Junior Orioles" program (low cost tickets for kids) back in 1963, then administered it for 25 years. Membership in that program rose from 75 youngsters the 1st year to a record 20,000 in 1977.

The "Junior Orioles" Program over the years has evolved into the "Orioles Fantastic Fans Club," sponsored by the *Baltimore Sun* (see page 22), but the Advocates continue to play a dominant role in its operation. The Advocates also serve as distributors of Orioles souvenirs on "giveaway" days at the ballpark, assuring that all eligible fans get the items to which they are entitled.

The Oriole Advocates don't get paid for anything they do. They are all volunteers, constantly demonstrating the importance of competence and dedication whenever there is a job to be done.

ORIOLES "DESIGNATED HITTERS"

The Orioles "Designated Hitters," now into their 13th season, are a group of volunteers, business men and women from the Baltimore-Washington areas, who sell Orioles season tickets on the club's behalf.

The organization was created late in '79, and in its first 5 years of operation, the Orioles' season ticket sales ballooned by over 700%, from 1,623 in '79 to 11,738 in '84. Last year's season ticket total of 17,400 marked an all-time high at Memorial Stadium. This season, the Orioles' 1st at Oriole Park, season sales are expected to exceed 25,000 seats.

To qualify for membership in the "Designated Hitters," candidates must meet demanding sales minimums according to a formula based on a blend of new sales and renewals, and everyone must requalify each year.

For the last 2 years ('90 & '91), the leading sales person has been **Gordon Kinnard**. All qualifiers are eligible for the annual spring junket to Florida while the Orioles are training. Then, during the season, leading DHs this year will qualify for baseball trips to Boston, and to San Diego for the All-Star Game.

Patterned after the Kansas City Royals' highly successful "Royal Lancers," the "Designated Hitters" organization was actually founded in September, 1979, by then Baltimore City Mayor **William Donald Schaefer** and a select group of Baltimoreans working closely with the Orioles' front office.

The concept was to attract people from the business community to serve as the ballclub's principal season ticket sales representatives. The results have been dramatic.

Along with former Mayor (now Governor) **Schaefer**, the "founding fathers" of the "Designated Hitters" included: **Owen Daly, Bill Beasman and Chris Hartman**; the Orioles' Vice President for Business Affairs **Bob Aylward** and former club Vice President **Al Harazin**, now executive vice president/general manager for the New York Mets.

The "DHs" have their own officers and board of directors, as well as an active social program. The "DH" Board: President—**Bill Michael**; **Steve Attman, John Augsberg, Greg Diethorn, Jack Hughes, Eamonn McGeady, Mike Pintzuk, Dev Slingluff and Howard Weinberg**.

HOME TEAM SPORTS is available to cable systems in the 6-state "Capital Region" (all of Maryland, Virginia, Delaware and DC, and parts of North Carolina, West Virginia and Pennsylvania).

HTS, owned and operated by Group W Satellite Communications, will televise 90 Orioles games this year including 5 spring training exhibitions (Mar 23, 26, 30, 31, & Apr 3), 70 home games and 15 on the road.

HTS also televises Caps Hockey and Bullets Basketball, plus many more major professional, collegiate and high school events of both national and regional interest.

WBAL RADIO will originate Orioles games for the 5th straight year under the current contract, and for the 27th time in the Birds' 39 Baltimore seasons...WBAL also carried the O's from '57 thru '78.

Baseball fans throughout much of Birdland and beyond will again be able to hear Orioles games on 2 powerful 50,000 watt am stations—WBAL Baltimore and WTOP (1500) in Washington. The rest of the 30-station network will service local markets within the Orioles' drawing area.

JOE ANGEL

Joe returns to the Orioles following a one-year stint in New York doing Yankees' radio. This is his 13th season as a play-by-play man in the major leagues, his 4th overall with the O's.

The 44-year old Colombia, South America native has more than 23 years broadcasting experience. Before coming to Baltimore in '88, he worked 3 seasons ('76-'78) for the San Francisco Giants on KSFO and 3 years ('84-'86) for the Minnesota Twins on WCCO. Earlier he had also done Oakland A's television ('80-'81) on KPIX-TV.

In addition to baseball, Joe did Stanford University football for 5 years and University of San Francisco basketball for 4. He has also served as a tv

sports anchor, hosted a radio talk show and filled in occasionally on San Francisco 49ers radio broadcasts.

Joe, a quarterback at Galileo High School in San Francisco where he was a teammate of **O.J. Simpson** (the team once lost 41 straight games), was born in Bogota in '47. Ten years later his family came to the US, 1st to Chicago, then 5 years later to the Bay Area.

Joe and his wife, **Antoinette**, now live in Rancho Murieta, CA (near Sacramento) with their 3 children: **Tony** (24), **Natalie** (16) & **Jonathan** (14).

REX BARNEY

The one-time Dodger righthander has worked with the Orioles in parts of 4 decades. He has served since the early 70s as the club's public address announcer, and in a variety of media and public relations capacities.

During the season, he does *Orioles Talk*, the daily Rex Barney Baseball Report on WBAL Radio, then fills in on that station's *Sportsline* show the rest of the year.

Rex pitched for the Dodgers in Brooklyn for 6 seasons ('43, '46-'50) before they moved west, and was inducted into the Brooklyn Dodgers Hall of Fame in June '89. He made his major league debut in '43 just before being called into military service...After 3 years in the US Army, much of it spent in the European theatre, he returned to the National League in '46 and went on to compile a 35-31 career record.

In '48, his best season, Rex went 15-13, pitched 246.2 innings, yielded only 193 hits, walked 122 and fanned 138. He had a 3.10 era that year, appeared in 44 games, started 34 and completed 12. The highlight of the season was a no-hitter against the hated Giants at the Polo Grounds on Sep 9.

He began his broadcasting career in '52 in New York, was a play-by-play announcer for Mutual Radio's "Game of the Day" from '55 to '57, and also did games in the New York area for WOR-TV. Rex was part of Home Team Sports' 1st Orioles crew that began doing games in '84 and remained with HTS until '90. A native of Omaha, Rex has lived in the Baltimore area since '64.

TOM DAVIS

Baltimore native Tom Davis has been with Home Team Sports since '84, the station's 1st season on the air...He hosts the Orioles pre- and post-game shows, and provides in-game interviews and score updates as well as "The Orioles Report." When time permits, he munches on a hot dog or two, and any other goodies that friends and fans bring to this well-known gourmand at the ballpark.

Since '89, he has hosted *Tom Davis' Sportsbeat* on HTS, Fox 45 and other cable outlets, and does a morning sports show on WQSR-FM (105.7) Radio. He also serves as a host on HTS talk & interview shows; has done play-by-play of O's games, and college basketball; and has covered hockey, boxing and Redskins football.

He has gained national exposure doing NFL radio play-by-play and sideline reporting for NBC Radio and Television, ABC-TV and the Mutual Broadcasting System.

Tom, who has been a sportscaster in Baltimore for more than 20 years, is a 5-time winner of the Maryland Sportscaster of the Year Award ('78, '84, '85, '89 & '90).

A Calvert Hall and University of Baltimore graduate, Tom lives in Baltimore County with his wife, **Linda**, and children **Malinda** and **Tad**.

SCOTT GARCEAU

He has an expanded role on the team's telecasts in 1992. The award-winning sports anchor on WMAR-TV, Channel 2 (the O's flagship station) adds play-by-play duties to his current role as host of "Orioles on Deck," the pre-game show.

Actually, he's been connected with Orioles telecasts since the early '80s, first as host of the pre-game show and, since '86, as a substitute announcer.

Part of the Baltimore sports scene since 1980, he arrived at WMAR-TV following stops in Marquette, Michigan (WLUC-TV, '72-'76) and Albuquerque, New Mexico (KGGM-TV, '76-'80). During his stay in Albuquerque, he did play-by-play on KOB radio of University of New Mexico football and basketball, and was named the state's Sportscaster of the Year in both '77 and '78. He later won the same award for the state of Maryland in '86.

In addition to Orioles games and his position as sports anchor at Channel 2, he has hosted the station's Sunday Night Sports Extra, and broadcast Loyola College basketball on radio since 1988-89. Before that, he did pre-season Colts games play-by-play on television ('81-'83) and was the radio voice of the Baltimore Stars in the USFL during their championship '85 season.

His break into the electronic media came as a 19-year old in 1971 at WJPD-AM, a 1,000 watt radio station in his hometown, Ishpeming Michigan.

A frequent banquet MC and speaker, he has taken roots in the community with his charitable work on behalf of the Johns Hopkins Children's Center, Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, Save-A-Heart, and by hosting a golf tournament for the benefit of Facets Boys Home in Harford Co.

He resides in Fallston, MD with his wife of 17 years, **Georgeanna**, and daughters **Kelly** (3-18-81) and **Danielle** (11-19-82).

JOHN LOWENSTEIN

Former Orioles outfielder John Lowenstein has been doing color on Home Team Sports' baseball broadcasts for the last 8 years. He played his last game for the O's on May 4, '85, and before the month was out began his television career in the HTS broadcast booth.

John's major league career—with the Indians, Rangers and Orioles—began in '70 at Cleveland and spanned 16 seasons, the last 7 in Baltimore "Brother Lo" as he was known affectionately during his playing days, was a key member of the Orioles' leftfield combine in '82 and '83 along with **Gary Roenicke** and, to a lesser degree, **Benny Ayala**.

In '82, O's leftfielders combined for a .283 average (608-172), 41 homers and 123 rbi and the following year, the world championship season, 29 (612-179), 35 homers and 131 rbi.

His most memorable hit in an Orioles uniform was a game-ending home (10th inning) in the 1st game of the '79 ALCS off the Angels' **John Montague**.

BASEBALL MOVIES AND THE ORIOLES

Two recent and highly successful baseball movies, each of which received Academy Award nomination, had an Orioles connection.

Ron Shelton, an infielder in the O's farm system from '67 to '71 who reached the AAA level at Rochester before retiring, wrote and produced **Bull Durham**, starring **Kevin Costner** and **Susan Sarandon**. His script was nominated in '88 for "best original screenplay."

Don Buford, the former great O's leadoff hitter now serving the club as manager at Hagerstown, was the technical adviser for *Field of Dreams* also starring **Costner** and one of five 1989 movies nominated for Best Picture.

John was born and grew up in Wolf Point, Montana (1/27/47), but he and his wife, **Barbara**, now make their permanent home in Las Vegas.

JON MILLER

One of Baseball's finest announcers, Jon this season he will do play-by-play for the Orioles on WMAR-TV and WBAL Radio, and will also describe the action for ESPN's national game on Sunday nights.

Jon's ability is hardly a secret around the country. This will be the 7th season of regular nationwide exposure (4 years with NBC-TV and the last 3 seasons, including '92, on ESPN).

He further enhanced his national reputation by winning an ACE Award, emblematic of cable television excellence, in January '91. He was chosen for his play-by-play work on ESPN in '90.

This year Jon is reunited with **Joe Angel**, his partner from '88 thru '90 at WBAL Radio. In 9 previous seasons in Baltimore, John has also shared the radio mike with **Tom Marr**, **Jack Wiers**, **Chuck Thompson**, **Charlie Slawes** and **Ken Levine**. On television, he's worked with a number of Hall of Famers—**Joe Morgan** (ESPN), **Jim Palmer** and **Brooks Robinson**.

His major league baseball career began at the age of 22 with the Oakland A's in '74. After that, he did radio and television for the Texas Rangers ('78-'79), before moving on to Boston where he spent 3 more years in the Red Sox radio booth ('80-'82). He joined the Orioles broadcast team in '83.

Jon has had an extensive background in basketball, soccer and hockey during his 19 years in broadcasting. He did 10-15 games a season for the NBA's Golden State Warriors ('79-'82) and prior to that did University of San Francisco basketball for 5 seasons.

ANNOUNCERS (Cont)

He has also done considerable soccer play-by-play—in the Major Indoor Soccer League (MISL) for the San Jose Earthquakes and for Washington Diplomats in the North American Soccer League ('77). A renowned mimic, Jon convincingly imitates such talented baseball announcers as **Al Michaels**, **Vin Scully** and **Chuck Thompson** during breaks in the action, and on the banquet circuit.

Jon was honored in '86 as "Baltimore's Best Radio Sportscaster" by Baltimore Magazine and "Best Play-by-Play Broadcaster" by Washington Magazine.

A native of the San Francisco Bay area, Jon now lives in Cockeysville, (northern Baltimore suburbs) with his wife, **Janine**, and their children, **Michelle**, **Holly**, **Emilie**, and **Alexander**.

JIM PALMER

Jim will join the HTS Orioles broadcast crew in '92 after 3 seasons at WMAR (Ch 2). He'll work up to 25 games, either play-by-play when **Proctor** is away on other assignments, or as a 2nd analyst (and 3rd in the booth).

Broadcasting: Jim, who did some occasional play-by-play work with the Orioles in the 80s, had 13 years experience as an analyst on ABC-TV (ending '89) and ESPN ('90)...He was nominated for an ACE award, cable tv's reward for excellence, after his one season at ESPN.

Baseball Hall of Fame: Jim reached the pinnacle of his baseball career when he was elected to baseball's Hall of Fame on the 1st ballot in January '90, and received a higher percentage of votes (411 out of 444 ballots cast or 92.5 per cent) than any pitcher except Bob Feller (93.75 per cent)...In that year, **Tom Seaver** surpassed them both with a 98.83 percentage (425 of 430), the highest ever recorded by a player, regardless of position.

Pitching Distinctions: Unquestionably, the finest pitcher in the Orioles' 38-year history, Jim is one of 5 whose uniform number (22) has been retired along with **Brooks** (5) and **Frank (20) Robinson**, **Earl Weaver** and **Eddie Murray** (33). He holds many club records including most wins (268), losses (152), games (558), innings (3948), shutouts (53), complete games (211), strikeouts (2212), and walks (1311).

He won 20 games 8 times, earned 3 Cy Young Awards, started and won the route to win the pennant-clinching game 4 times ('66, '69, '70, '71), and was 8-3 in post-season play while pitching for the O's over a span of 18 years ('65 thru '84).

During his entire career, he never gave up a grand slam home run in regular or post-season play (little known fact: **Johnny Bench** hit one off him in the International League during Jim's brief stint with Rochester in '67).

Last Hurrah: Made his final start, at Chicago, April 23, '84, but did not get a decision. Pitched in his last game as an Oriole, in relief, at Memorial Stadium on May 12, '84 against Oakland, but again was not a pitcher of record...His final career victory was in game #3 of the '83 World Series in Philadelphia (see post-season below).

Earned his 268th and last regular season win on Sep 30, '83, a 3-2 win over the Yankees at Baltimore in the 2nd game of a doubleheader.

Lifetime Victories/20-Win Seasons: Jim ranks 27th on the all-time list of career victories...He is one of only 3 pitchers in the 90-year history of the AL who have won 20 or more games in 8 or more seasons, along with **Lefty Grove** (8, last time in '35) and **Walter Johnson** (12, last time in '25). The last major leaguer to do it was **Warren Spahn** (13 times, the last in '63).

Only 6 who have worked exclusively in the 20th century have won 20 or more 8 times, and in the entire history of the major leagues, Jim is one of only 16. He put that string together over a 9-year period from '70 thru '78 (was 7-12 in '74). He was 176-97 with a 2.54 era during that 9-season stretch.

Earned Run Average: His 2.8564 era is 4th on the all-time list, since it became an official statistic ('12 in NL and '13 in AL) among pitchers with 3,000 or more innings, behind: (1) **Walter Johnson**-2.37; (2) **Grover C. Alexander**-2.56; and (3) **Whitey Ford**-2.74. He ranks just ahead of #5 **Tom Seaver** (2.8626)...He twice led the league ('73 & '75), and was in the top 5 "top 5" 10 times.

ANNOUNCERS (Cont)

Pennant Clinchers: Since Jim pitched the O's first 4 pennant clinchers, **Scott McGregor** ('79) and **Tippy Martinez** ('83) have added their names to the list.

Post-Season: His overall record in 17 post-season appearances, including 15 starts, was 8-3 with a 2.61 era (ip-124.1, er-36).

In '66, he became the youngest ever to pitch a World Series shutout when, at the age of 20 years-11 months-21 days, he blanked the Dodgers' **Sandy Koufax**, 6-0, on 4 hits (LA made 6 errors) in game #2 at Dodger Stadium...That was Koufax' final major league appearance.

In '83, Jim became the 1st (and remains the only) pitcher in history to have won a World Series game in each of 3 decades...In that game (#3 at Philadelphia), he bested **Steve Carlton** after hurling 2 scoreless innings in relief of **Mike Flanagan**.

He is tied for 2nd (with 5 others) with 4 LCS victories. Oakland's **Dave Stewart** took over the lead with his 5th win in '90. Jim holds the record by himself for most LCS complete games (5)...He and **Nolan Ryan** are tied for most career LCS strikeouts (46), while he and former teammate **Mike Cuellar** have walked the most in ALCS competition (19).

Cy Youngs: Jim is one of only 5 to have won as many as 3 Cy Youngs ('73, '75, '76)...**Steve Carlton** won 4, while Seaver, Koufax and **Roger Clemens**, a '91 winner, have earned 3 each...The award has been presented since '56, with individual league awards beginning in '67...Jim, Koufax, **Denny McLain**, and Clemens are the only ones to have earned the award in consecutive seasons.

Personal: He has been an activist on behalf of the Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation for 2 decades, serving much of that time as its national sports chairman...He has been the sports representative for Jockey Underwear since the spring of '80...In '83, he was the sports recipient of the American Image Award, sponsored by the Male Apparel Industry and the Men's Fashion Association of America.

Jim and his wife, the former **Joni Pearlstone**, were married Apr 7, '90 and live in Brooklandville, MD. Born 10/15/45 in New York City, Jim attended both Arizona State and Towson State Universities...He has 2 daughters, **Jamie Michelle** (11/16/66) and **Kelly Christina** (6/5/69).

MEL PROCTOR

Mel is in his 20th year as an announcer, and his 9th as the Orioles play-by-play voice for Home Team Sports. One of the busiest broadcasters in the business, he handles a variety of on-air assignments for HTS including play-by-play for the NBA's Washington Bullets. Mel also does Bullets basketball on WDCA (Ch 20) for games not carried by HTS.

Mel has also done basketball and boxing for Turner Broadcasting (last 2 years); Fiesta Bowl and NFL Football for NBC television and radio; college basketball for CBS-TV, and much, much more.

In '86, he took a short break from Orioles baseball to do men's basketball play-by-play for TBS from the Goodwill Games in Spain. Four years later he was part of the crew that covered Goodwill Games boxing in Seattle.

He began his career as sports director at the CBS-TV affiliate in Hawaii (KGMB) from '73 until '78. While there, he worked the microphone for Hawaii Islanders (AAA) baseball, University of Hawaii football and basketball, and did one season for the Hawaiians of the World Football League.

He came to work in the Nation's Capital for the 1st time in '78 when he began a 5-year stint as play-by-play announcer for Washington Bullets basketball on flagship station, WTOP-AM.

During the Bullets' off-seasons, Mel worked in Arlington, Texas as the radio voice of the Texas Rangers. In '82 and '83, he supplemented his work with the Bullets by doing college basketball games for NBC-TV.

For two seasons ('83-'84 and '84-'85), Mel served as the play-by-play man for the NBA's New Jersey Nets. It was during that time that he also worked the NFL "Game of the Week" radio broadcasts for the Mutual Broadcasting System.

A native of Denver, CO, Mel resides in Ellicott City, MD with his wife, Julie, and their children, Bill and Maile.

BROOKS CALBERT ROBINSON JR.

HALL OF FAME: See page 120.

PERSONAL: Brooks is doing color commentary on the Orioles' television for the 15th straight year. He is also active as vice-president of Shapiro and Associates and as a special assistant with Crown Central Petroleum Company.

A native of Little Rock, AR, Brooks, who will be 55 in May (5/18/37), lives with his wife of 31 years, Connie, in Baltimore and Southern California.

Brooks and Connie (nee Butcher), a former United Airlines flight attendant, met on an Orioles' charter flight (KC to Boston) in '59. They have four children: Brooks David, Chris, Michael and Dianne.

BIG LEAGUE CAREER: Brooks officially spent 20 years and 72 days as a player in the American League, spanning 23 seasons.

He played in 2,896 major league games, all of them with the Orioles, 8th on the all-time list (Pete Rose leads at 3,562).

Only Carl Yastrzemski (3,308) and Ty Cobb (3,033) have played more American League games, and only 3 others in big league history have played more with one franchise. Yastrzemski (3,308), Hank Aaron (3,076), and Stan Musial (3,026).

DURABILITY: Played in 97% of all Orioles games from July 9, '59 (when he returned from the minors for the last time) thru May 16, '76, a period of more than 16 1/2 years...Played at least 153 games in 14 of 15 years from '60 thru '75.

In the Orioles' 38-year history, only 4 other 3rd basemen have played as many as 200 games at that position (Doug DeCinces-792, Craig Washington-332, Rich Dauer-242, and Floyd Rayford-203).

OPENING DAYS: Started 20 consecutive opening day games for the Orioles from '57 thru '76 and batted .316 (79-25) with 6 home runs and 17 rbi.

HOME RUNS/RBI: Led AL in rbi (118) in '64 and also achieved a career high of 28 home runs that year...Hit 17 or more homers nine times, 11 or more 11 times...His 139 homers at Memorial Stadium rank 2nd only to Eddie Murray's 160...Had 6 career grand slams, 4 of them in Baltimore.

HITTING: Hit most home runs (37) and drove in most runs (167) against the Red Sox...Twice put together strings of 8 straight hits: July 10 thru 15, '60 and Aug. 21 thru 23, '63.

Holds club records for games, at bats, runs, hits, doubles, triples, total bases, rbi, and extra-base hits...Has one-season mark for games (163, '61 & '64) and at bats (668, '61).

FIELDING: Committed only 263 errors in 9,165 chances at 3rd base for a major league record lifetime fielding percentage of .971.

Appeared in a total of 29 games at 2nd base (24) and shortstop (5) and committed only one error in 31 chances. Played exclusively at 3rd base, '63-77.

GOLD GLOVES: Brooks won Gold Gloves in 16 consecutive seasons, '60 through '75. The string was snapped by Detroit's Aurelio Rodriguez (who later played for the Orioles) in '76. While Brooks was active, the only other American Leaguers to win the award at the hot corner were Boston's Frank Malzone ('57 through '59) and New York's Graig Nettles ('77).

Brooks shares the record for most Gold Gloves with former pitcher Jim Kaat.

Believe it or Not: On July 28, '71 against Oakland, Brooks shocked everyone by making 3 errors, not only in the game, but in the same inning. Those miscues contributed to 2 unearned runs, and Oakland continued to lead 2-0 into the bottom of the 9th.

However, all was quickly forgotten when Frank Robinson belted a 3-run homer off future Hall of Famer Rollie Fingers, lifting the O's to a 3-2 victory.

ALL-STAR GAMES: Played in 18 consecutive All-Star games from '60 thru '74 (including two per year in '60, '61, '62)...Had lifetime average of .289 (13-for-45).

Selected "mvp" in '66 at St. Louis when he had 3 hits, including a home run, while handling 8 chances in the field...Also homered in '67 game at Anaheim...Was a serious contender for the award in '64 (at Shea Stadium) and '70 (at Cincinnati), when he went 2-for-3, hit a triple, scored a run, and drove in two others.

Hit 3 triples in All-Star play and didn't make an error in 43 fielding chances.

Was elected to starting lineup in Gillette-sponsored fan vote 4 times ('71, '72, '73, '74) after selection was returned to fans in '70...Led AL players in votes in '71 (1,110,469)...Started a total of 11 games...Had last hit in '71 game at Detroit.

ANNOUNCERS (Cont)

Post-Season: Played 1st 39 post-season games in which the Orioles were involved, and batted a composite .303 (44-for-145)—.348 in 18 ALCS games and .263 in 21 WS games.

WS: Homered in 1st WS at bat in 1st inning against Dodgers (at Dodger Stadium) in '66, immediately following **Frank Robinson's** 2-run home (both off **Don Drysdale**).

Was landslide "mvp" in '70 vs Reds...Hit .429 (9-for-21) and was brilliant on defense. His 9 hits tied record for most in 5-game series. He also contributed 6 rbi, 2 doubles, and 2 homers. Erred on 1st fielding chance, then handled 23 more flawlessly, many of them brilliantly. He stole at least 2 hits each from **Johnny Bench** and **Lee May**, and it was then that May gave him the nickname "Hoover" (as in vacuum cleaners).

ALCS: Had .486 average (18-for-37) after 1st 3 championship series (0s swept all in 3 straight games)...His lone hit in last LCS in '74 was a 1st-game homer off Oakland's "Catfish" Hunter.

Major League Lifetime Records, 3B: Highest fielding percentage, 1000 or more games (.971)...Most years, league (23)...Most games (2,870)...Most chances accepted, excluding errors (8,902)...Most putouts (2,697)...Most assists (6,205)...Most double plays (618)...Most seasons leading league in games (8)...Most seasons leading league in assists (8)...Most seasons leading league in fielding percentage (11).

American League Lifetime Records: Most seasons leading league in fielding (11)...Most seasons leading league in chances accepted, excluding errors (8 tie)...Most games season (163, '61 & '64).

Major Awards: MVP, American League-'64. He finished 2nd (to Triple Crown winner **Frank Robinson**) in '66 and 3rd in both '60 and '65. **World Series:** '70. **All-Star Game:** '66. **Lou M. Nothing is Forever: His 268th and last home run provided one of the most emotional experiences in Orioles' history. It was Apr 19, '77 at Memorial Stadium, the O's trailed the Indians, 5-3, in the 10th, with one out and on.

Brooks came to the plate as a pinch hitter for **Larry Harlow**. He ran the count to "3 & 2", fouled off a number of pitches, then hit a home run into the left field stands off reliever **Dave LaRoche** to win the game, 6-5. There were only 4,826 fans at the ballpark that night, but none of them will ever forget the moment.

Signed for '77 as player-coach, but became coach exclusively on Sunday Aug 21, when he went on the voluntarily retired list (in Minnesota) to make room on the roster for catcher **Rick Dempsey** who was returning to duty after 6 weeks on the disabled list.

A crowd of 51,798, then an Orioles' record for a regular season game, attended "Thanks Brooks" Day on Sunday, Sep 18, '77, against the Red Sox to pay tribute to the most important and beloved Oriole of modern times.

CHUCK THOMPSON

Chuck Thompson, a long-time legend in our town, will again do roughly half of the Orioles games on radio in '92. He'll work with **Joe Angel** in the WBAL booth when **Jon Miller** is doing television.

Chuck, who has been here for nearly 45 years, actually retired from the business back in '88, but fortunately it didn't last. He isn't full time (and doesn't want to be), but in this case "a half a loaf" is a thousand times better than none for those of us who have the pleasure of listening to him play his craft.

Chuck was a veteran announcer before arriving in Baltimore, having started his career in '39 at WRAW in Reading, PA. From there, he went to Philadelphia's WIBG in '42 to do Temple University football.

During World War II, Chuck served in the Army and saw action in 3 major European campaigns. After the war, he returned to Philadelphia, doing radio for the Phillies, Athletics, Warriors, Eagles and Rockets (hockey).

In '49, Chuck came to Baltimore, where he became the voice of the International League Orioles, the All-America Conference Colts, the Bullets and Navy football.

In '55, he joined the National Brewing Company's team of announcers and during a 24-year association, he did American League Orioles games in '55-'56 and again from '62-'78. In between, he was the radio voice of the Washington Senators, '57-'61.

For 2 seasons, '59-'60, he was on television doing NBC-TV's Game of the Week. Also in '60, he described the World Series between the Pirates and Yankees and is remembered for his call of **Bill Mazeroski's** famous Game 7, 9th-inning home run which won the championship for Pittsburgh.

He has been named the outstanding broadcaster in Maryland by the National Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association on numerous occasions.

Chuck, equally acclaimed as the announcer for the Baltimore Colts, called the classic overtime playoff contest for the NFL title between the Colts and the New York Giants in December, '58; the Colts-Packers overtime playoff game for the NFL's Western Division championship in '65 (for CBS-TV), and the O's World Series games in '66, '69, '70 and '71.

He is a golfing and fishing enthusiast and his wife, **Betty**, is an outstanding cook. Chuck has 3 children and 5 grandchildren.

ORIOLES TRAINERS

Richie Bancells (36, 11/11/55) is beginning his 5th year as the O's head trainer, his 9th with the big club, and 16th in the Orioles organization. Immediately prior to Baltimore, Richie spent 4 years ('80-'83) at Rochester as the Red Wings' trainer/road secretary... During that time, he also assisted his predecessor, the late **Ralph Salvon**, each spring at the O's spring camp in Miami. He became the head trainer in '88.

A native of Key West, FL, Richie is a graduate of Miami's Biscayne College (now St Thomas University), and earned an MS in physical education from Eastern Kentucky University (Richmond, KY)...He is certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA).

Richie initially joined the Baltimore organization as assistant trainer with the Miami Orioles (Class A, Florida State Lge) in '77, then served as head trainer for the Bluefield (WV) Orioles (Appalachian Rookie Lge) the next 2 years ('78-'79) before moving on to Rochester in '80.

He and his wife, **Carol**, have 3 children: **Christopher** (7/8/80); **Andrea** (8/19/85); and **Timothy** (2/8/92), born shortly before spring training. Carol is also a graduate of Biscayne College, where she earned a degree in theology and education.

Jamie Reed (32, 6/15/59) is beginning his 4th full year as Orioles' assistant trainer, but this will be his 11th season in the organization. He joined up as head trainer for the Bluefield Orioles (Rookie, Appalachian) in '82 after taking a degree in sports medicine at East Carolina University (Greenville, NC).

Jamie moved up the ladder quickly, 1st to Hagerstown (Carolina Lge) in '83, then to Charlotte (Southern) in '84. The following year ('85) he became head trainer/traveling secretary for the Red Wings, and remained at Rochester for 4 years...He was promoted to Baltimore in Sep '88.

Jamie, who is certified by NATA, has also worked as a trainer in the Venezuelan Winter League and for the US Naval Academy basketball team.

Though born in Baltimore, Jamie grew up in Annapolis. He was a '77 graduate of St Mary's High School, where he played varsity football and lacrosse.

He and his wife, **Jean**, an Annapolis native, who is also a graduate of both St Mary's High and East Carolina University, have 3 children: **Zachary** (11/10/83), **Rebecca** (4/16/86) and **Rachel** (11/29/88)...The Reeds now live in Baltimore.

ORIOLES STRENGTH/CONDITIONING COACH

Allan (Al) Johnson (36, 12/16/55) joined the Orioles in '89 from West Virginia University, where he administered the strength and conditioning programs for all 19 sports in which the Mountaineers competed.

Johnson, a native of Parkersburg, WV and a '79 graduate of Glenville (WV) State College, went to WVU as a graduate assistant in '82. A year later, he was named head strength/conditioning coach after receiving his M.S. in physical education from WVU.

During his 7 years at Morgantown, the teams with which he was involved won 78% of their events. Al was instrumental in completing the computerization of athletic fitness assessments on all intercollegiate athletes on the campus (nearly 350), and in the construction of a new 7,000 square foot conditioning center. As his last official act at WVU, Al accompanied the football team to the Fiesta Bowl where the Mountaineers lost to Notre Dame for the national championship.

Al has implemented a year-round strength and conditioning program for all players in the Orioles organization. In addition, he conducts clinics, seminars and conventions across the country. In '87 he was named the National Strength Coaches Association's Eastern Regional National Strength Coach of the Year...He and his wife, **Jan**, have one son: **Adam** (4/16/87).

Named May 23, '91 as the 10th manager in Orioles history, John Oates is new only in terms of major league experience (his record is 54-71). However, he has had success as a manager in each of the rungs up the minor league ladder and has a fine reputation for organization and thoroughness. Now he has the opportunity to apply his methods at the major league level.

Oates made his ML debut as field leader when he took over for **Frank Robinson**, but he admitted beginning preparation for a managerial career while still an active player in a major league career which lasted between 1970-81 with Baltimore, Atlanta, Philadelphia, Los Angeles and New York (AL).

Oates served his apprenticeship by sitting near **Tommy Lasorda** of the Dodgers and constantly asking questions. Also, he benefitted from the

experience of **Cal Ripken Sr.**, the renowned master of teaching baseball "The Oriole Way."

1991 ORIOLES: After he acceded to the position of manager, the O's promptly lost 4 consecutive games (3 games each by a single run) and Oates lost 16 pounds...But, the team rebounded and won 5 of their next 6 games and went 20-19 heading into the All-Star break...His record for the year, 54-71, belied the fact the team improved simply by giving 14 rookies valuable major league experience.

Also, two hexes which started before he was promoted continued afterwards...The Orioles were 18-35 in games decided by one run, tying the '78 Indians for most 1-run defeats in the AL since the '68 White Sox set the league record with 44...Under Oates, the O's were 15-30 in 1-run games...Aside from close losses, the Birds had a habit of falling behind by 3 or more runs before the end of the 3rd inning...It happened 43 times (the O's lost 39 games, 34 times with Oates managing).

The day after the season ended, October 7, he signed a 2-year contract to manage the club through the 1993 season.

MANAGING/COACHING

Oates began his managerial career in the Yankees' farm system, and following a stint as a coach for the Chicago Cubs, he piloted Rochester (AAA) in 1988. His record in 3 seasons as manager in the minor leagues was 237-188 (.558).

In the Yankees' system, he guided Nashville (AA) to the Southern League championship in 1982 with 4-game series wins over Knoxville and Jacksonville. The following season, with Columbus (AAA) in 1983, Oates led the team to a regular-season crown, but lost in the playoffs to Tidewater.

EARLY ML DEBUT: His 1st experience as a major league manager came June 1-3, '90, when he substituted for **Frank Robinson** who had been suspended for 3 games...The O's played those 3 games at New York and beat the Yankees twice.

MANAGED MANAGERS: Two men who played for Oates on the 1983 Columbus Clippers make their major league managerial debuts in 1992: **Buck Showalter** of the New York Yankees and **Butch Hobson** of the Boston Red Sox.

'88 IL MANAGER OF THE YEAR: After a 16-year absence, Oates returned to the Orioles' organization and was named 1988 International League Manager of the Year after the Red Wings finished in 1st place in the Western Division, Rochester's 1st title since 1974...The Wings defeated Tidewater to advance to the Triple A Alliance Series where they lost to Indianapolis in 6 games.

COACHING: He was the Birds' 1st base coach, a post he held since 1989, when he was promoted to manager...His 1st coaching experience in the major leagues came with the Cubs, 1984-87, whom he served at various times as dugout, bullpen and 3rd base coach.

PLAYING CAREER

MAJOR LEAGUES: Played with 5 teams during 11 seasons in his major league career...In his 1st ML at bat, he singled, Sep 17, '70, at RFK Stadium off Washington's **Dick Bosman**, now the Orioles' pitching coach...He led all AL catchers with a .995 fielding percentage as a rookie with the O's in '72 and had a .992 fielding average for Atlanta in '74.

Had his best season in '75 when he was traded from Atlanta to Philadelphia early in the season...Became a starter for the Phillies, batting .286 in 90 games and was the team's Opening Day catcher in '76...But, on that day, he broke his collarbone in a 10th-inning home-plate collision with

Cincinnati's **Dave Parker**...Was sidelined until mid-June, long enough for **Bob Boone** to earn full-time status...Went to the Dodgers for 3 seasons ('77-'79) and played for the '77 and '78 NL Champions...It was there he began thinking seriously about managing. **Tommy Lasorda** called him "one of the most intelligent catchers in the game."

POST SEASON: Was on Phillies team which won NL East in '76 and lost to Cincinnati in the NLCS...Played on Dodgers' pennant-winning teams in '77 and '78 (although he did not appear in either NLCS against his former Philadelphia teammates)...In '78 Series against the Yankees, he appeared only in Game 5 and in 2 plate appearances off **Jim Beattie**, he walked as a pinch hitter and singled up the middle.

MINOR LEAGUES: Was originally drafted by the White Sox in '66, but he did not sign...Was drafted by the Orioles in '67 and played most of his minor league career under **Joe Altobelli** and **Cal Ripken Sr.**, except for one season under **Harry Malmberg**...He credits Ripken's influence for teaching him much of what he knows about catching.

PERSONAL: He and his wife, **Gloria**, have 3 children: **Lori** (6/25/71), **Andy** (3/5/76) and **Jenny** (11/14/78)...Was graduated from Virginia Tech with a degree in health and physical education in '68...Played 2 years of college baseball there...Elected to Tech's Sports Hall of Fame in '83...Was a high school teacher in previous off seasons, but currently manages the Virginia franchise of HA-LO Advertising Specialties, one of the largest advertising specialty companies in the nation.

PLAYING CAREER: Was signed by Montreal after his junior year in college at Iowa State...His best season was '74 at Kinston where he ranked 6th in the Carolina League with a .306 batting average...After 5 seasons as a 1st baseman-outfielder in the Expos system, '73-'77, he played in the Mexican League, '78-'82, and had a career batting average of .315 for Coahuila, Monclova and Ciudad Juarez...His finest season south of the border came in '81 (.348, 17, 90).

MANAGING/COACHING CAREER: Began managing immediately after his playing career...Started in Rookie ball with Bluefield in the Appalachian League in '83...Moved up to Class A Hagerstown in '85 and Charlotte (AA) in '86...Had his 1st winning season in '87 with Charlotte and won the 1st half title in the Southern League...That team featured current Orioles **Jeff Tackett** and **Bob Milacki**...After 3 years at Charlotte, he was again promoted to AAA Rochester...He was 64-76 in 2 seasons at Bluefield, 65-72 in one season at Hagerstown, 225-208 in 3 years at Charlotte and 237-197 in 3 years he was manager after leading at Rochester.

'87 TITLE: His '87 Charlotte Orioles finished 1st in the 1st half by one game with a 43-29 record...The club nearly repeated in the 2nd half, finishing 2nd, 1 1/2 games behind with a mark of 42-31...In the playoffs, the Orioles defeated Jacksonville (Expos), 3 games to 2, but lost in the finals to Birmingham (White Sox), 3 games to 1.

AT ROCHESTER: Finished 2nd, 1st and 2nd in 3 seasons with the Red Wings.

Manager Of The Year — '90: In his 2nd year in AAA, he led the Wings to an 89-56 record, and a 1st place finish by a whopping 21 1/2 game mar-

gin...He was elected Manager of the Year for the International League...The Red Wings defeated Columbus to win the Governors Cup for a 9th time (since it was initiated in 1933), then lost to Omaha in the All-World Series. Their 89 regular season wins were the most for a Rochester team since '53 when **Harry "The Hat" Walker's club** went 97-57.



MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER

BALTIMORE ORGANIZATION: This year Ellie will celebrate his 28th season opener in an Orioles uniform, most in club history (Brooks Robinson spent 21)...Since '68, Elrod has been with the O's for all but 1½ of 28 seasons.

He played for the Cubs during the last 6 weeks of '72 (Tommy Davis died before returning the O's over the winter)...Then he logged 1½ years in the Yankees' organization from June '76 thru the '77 season, before rejoining the Orioles again. Posted a .990 career fielding average.

MANAGERIAL DEBUT '88: Ellie twice substituted for Frank Robinson as manager in '88 when the latter was hospitalized with a bad back...He managed 4 games from May 18-20 (1-3), then took over again for 2 weeks from July 15 thru 28 (3-8)...His cumulative record during Frank's 2 absences was 4-11.

COACHING: This is Ellie's 16th season as the O's bullpen coach since his appointment to that position in '77 during Earl Weaver's 1st tour of duty.

Player-Coach: Twice during this span he's served as player-coach...In '78 he was activated on May 18, replacing Gary Roenicke who had been sent down, and remained on the roster for the balance of the year in the disabled list.

In 13 games that year he hit .333 (18-6), and, in his one career pitching stint, compiled an 0.00 era, thus leading the club, in a sense, in both categories (to be fair, he was tied in era with Dave Ford, who pitched 15 scoreless innings).

His pitching career took place on June 26 in Toronto, where the O's were absorbing a 24-10 pasting...He worked 2.1 innings, allowed no runs, one hit and one walk while putting an end to the carnage inflicted upon predecessors (Mike Flanagan, Joe Kerrigan, Tippy Martinez, and outfielder Larry Harlow). Don Stanhouse then pitched the 9th and also held the Jays scoreless.

In '79 he coached exclusively all year until Sep 1 when the roster expanded to 40 players...He made only one appearance, his last in the major leagues at Detroit on Sep 19 and went 0-for-1...He was not eligible for post-season play.

All-Star: He was the AL's batting practice catcher and bullpen coach for the '82 All-Star game in Montreal.

YANKEES '76-'77: In '76, he played in 26 games for the Yankees after the June 15 trade from Baltimore and batted .210 (57-12). Spent '77 shuttling between New York and Syracuse. He played in only 11 games for the Yankees and was not eligible for post-season play.

ORIOLES '68-'76: Ellie had been with the O's for nearly 9 full years when he was traded to the Cubs for Tommy Davis in Aug. '72...However, when the season ended, he was reacquired by Baltimore.

100 Games/Year: Played in more than 100 games in each of the O's 3 pennant-winning seasons of '69, '70, '71...He and Andy Etchebarren more or less split the regular catching job from '68 thru '71.

Weaver/Lane: Earl Weaver and Frank Lane were instrumental in convincing the O's to draft him from the Angels' AAA Seattle affiliate in Nov. '67...Played for Weaver in Puerto Rico previously and Lane had scouted him in Mexico.

ALCS/WS: He compiled a .273 (66-18) average in 23 post-season games for the O's and Yankees (comprising five league championship series and four World Series).

'70 WS: Hit .364 (11-4) against the Reds with a home run and double and contributed significantly to the O's wins at Cincinnati in games #1 and #2. In the opener, the Reds jumped out 3-0, but Ellie tied it in the 5th with a home run off Gary Nolan and the O's went on to win on Brooks' homer in the 7th...There was a play in the Cincinnati 6th in which Ellie was involved and that was as important as the home run.

Carbo-Burhart Incident: One inning after Ellie had tied the game with his home run, the Reds had Bernie Carbo on 3rd representing the lead run, and only one out (Brooks had retired Lee May leading off the inning on a sensational play).

Pinch-Hitter Ty Cline then chopped a high bouncer in front of the plate...As Ellie went out and grabbed it, Carbo headed home. Ellie dove and tagged Carbo a few feet up the line and umpire Ken Burkhardt, who had been spun around by the players as they converged so that his back was to the play, called Carbo out.

Films later revealed that Ellie had tagged Carbo with one hand while

holding the ball in the other, and that Carbo had missed the plate.

EARLY CAREER

PUERTO RICO: Ellie played for Santurce in the Puerto Rican Winter League each year from '60-'77, except in '71 when the O's went to Japan...His 112 homers in that loop rank him 2nd on the all-time list to former St. Louis Browns outfielder Willard Brown (120).

MINORS: He enjoyed his best minor league seasons in Jalisco in the Mexican League (AAA) where he hit 109 homers in 4 years and was known as the "Babe Ruth of Mexico"...In last season there ('67), he led the league in homers (41) and was 2nd in rbi (112).

He started his career in the Milwaukee Braves' organization ('59-'60), then spent 2 years at Winnipeg in the Cardinals' system ('62-'63) before going to Mexico.

COMMUNITY SERVICE: Was honored at special ceremonies prior to the final game at Memorial Stadium (10/6/91) for all he has done to benefit of both the Orioles and the community.

Chosen **Man of the Year** by the Oriole Advocates in '89...Received the first **Jack Dunn Memorial Service Award**, named after the late Orioles executive, and presented by the Maryland Professional Baseball Players Association in Jan. '88 at the 35th Annual Tops in Sports Banquet...The award was presented to him for his many selfless years of service to the community.

He was also selected the first **Man of the Year** by the Baltimore chapter of the National Conference of Christians and Jews in Feb. '83 and the Special Olympics **Man of the Year** in '87.

Ellie received Towson State University's **Distinguished Black Marylander Award** in a ceremony sponsored by the university's Office of Minority Affairs.

PERSONAL: One of the most popular personalities ever to wear an Orioles uniform...Speaks fluent Spanish...Plays the flute. Has operated two 3-week baseball camps for youngsters the past 10 summers at McDonogh School in Owings Mills.

He and his wife, **Merle**, were married Jan. 14, '70 and are the parents of two sons: **Ryan** (8/3/72) and **Ian Christopher** (11/28/76). They have lived in the Randallstown area, near Baltimore, since the early '70s.

Ellie has 4 children by a previous marriage: **Abigail** (7/13/62), **Elrod Jr.** (4/7/64), **Elroy** (10/1/65), and **Berecia** (8/25/67).

THE RIPKENS AND OTHER FAMILIES

FIRSTS: In '87, Cal Senior became the 1st father ever to manage 2 sons simultaneously in major league baseball history (regular season). Among those who have managed one son are **Connie Mack** (son **Earle**, '10, '11, '14) and **Yogi Berra** (son **Dale**, '84 & '85).

The 1st time the Ripken trio hooked up professionally was in spring training '86. **Cal Junior** and **Bill** were teamed at the keystone for an exhibition split squad game at Ft. Myers on Mar 15 and the manager of that team was Cal Senior.

THREE FROM SAME CLAN: Three members of the same family in the same uniform at the same time is a rarity, matched only 3 times before in baseball history: 1973-**Jose, Hector & Tommy Cruz** for St. Louis; 1963-**Felipe, Matty & Jesus Alou** for San Francisco; 1876-**George, Sam & Harry Wright** for Boston in the National League (**Harry**, a Hall of Famer, was the manager and pitched briefly; **George** was an outfielder-70 games in '76; and **Sam**, a shortstop appeared in only 2 games that year. We're assuming they were all in uniform together).

TOGETHERNESS: Cal Junior was a 2nd round pick in the June '78 draft while younger son, **Bill**, was chosen on the 11th round in June '82. Cal Sr. & Jr. have been teammates in spring training as well as in regular season for the last 11 years (starting in '81). None of the Ripkens has ever worked in another organization.

VI & THE REST OF THE RIPKENS: The lady who has made the Ripken story possible is **Vi** (short for **Violet**), who was honored in Jan '88 at the annual Tops in Sports baseball dinner as Maryland's **First Lady of Baseball**. The award was presented by **Governor William Donald Schaefer**.

Vi and Senior have been married 34 years (Nov. 20, '57). Their 4 children in order of appearance: **Ellen Leigh** (3/22/59), **Cal Jr.** (8/24/60), **Fred**

(11/25/61), and **Bill** (12/16/64). Cal Senior has 2 older brothers. **Oliver** and **Bill**. The latter was once a Brooklyn Dodgers farmhand.

PRO CAREER

COACHING: Cal has spent 14 years on the O's coaching staff, 12½ as 3rd base coach...He joined the staff in '76, replacing **George Staller** who had retired at the end of the previous season. Cal served as bullpen coach until June 27, '77, when he took over at 3rd base after **Billy Hunter** left to manage the Texas Rangers.

MANAGING: Has managed for 14 and a fraction seasons in professional baseball, all in the Orioles' organization. His 13-plus years as a manager in the Birds' farm system ('61-'74) represent the longest tenure of any minor league skipper in Orioles' history.

Earl Weaver and **Joe Altobelli** are tied for 2nd in that category, each having managed 11 years for the Birds in the minors...During that span, Cal managed at all levels except rookie league.

Following the '86 season he replaced Weaver to become only the 7th non-interim manager in the club's 34-year history (excluded are **Luman Harris** who finished out the '61 season after **Paul Richards** resigned in late August, and Cal, himself, who bridged the gap for one game between **Joe Altobelli** and Weaver in '85).

Cal was replaced by **Frank Robinson** on Apr 12, '88, after the O's lost the first 6 games of the season (a streak that went to 21 before it ended)...His overall record as manager was 68-101, .402.

He began his managing career at Leesburg, FL on June 7, '61, as a replacement for **Billy DeMars**, who had just been promoted to a Class B league.

After 10 weeks on the job, Cal was rushed to Rochester (Aug 17) for emergency duty as a catcher, and was replaced at the Leesburg helm by **Ray Scarborough**, then a scout for the O's.

Cal had only 2 losing records in the minors: In '62, his 1st full season as a manager and his last as a player, and '67 at Miami.

He won the 1st of 2 pennants at Aberdeen, SD by 12 games in '64 with a club that included 7 players who would ultimately play in the majors: **Jim Palmer**, **Lou Piniella**, **Mark Belanger**, **Andy Etchebarren**, **Eddie Watt**, **Dave Leonhard**, and **Mike Fiore**.

That '64 club went 81-34, and Cal was the Northern League's Manager of the Year.

He finished 1st again in '72 at Asheville in the AA Southern League.

EJECTIONS: Senior has been ejected 29 times in the big leagues, 21 as 3rd base coach and 8 as a manager (all in '87)...**Dale Ford**, **Mark Johnson**, and the late **Bill Kunkel** have been his most frequent ejectors, 3 times each...Tied for 2nd at 2 apiece are **Rocky Roe**, **Durwood Merrill**, and **Greg Kosc**.

During Cal's full year as manager in '87, the umpiring team of **Larry Barnett-Kosc-Roe** and **Tim Tschida** accounted for 5 of his 8 dismissals.

SCOUTING: In '75, he turned to scouting, primarily at the professional level, but he also did some free agent scouting and served as a "trouble shooter" in the farm system.

PLAYING CAREER: Rip was a catcher in the O's organization although he also played some 3rd base and outfield and even pitched. He enjoyed his best year under **Earl Weaver** at Fox Cities (Appleton, WI) in '60. He became a player-manager the following year.

STOLEN BASES: Has stolen 43 bases in his last 54 tries (79.6 percent) since the start of the '89 season...Only **Mookie Wilson** (46 of 54, 85.2 percent), **Roberto Alomar** (53 of 64, 82.8 percent), **Rickey Henderson** (200 of 234, 82.6 percent), **Henry Cotto** (47 of 57, 82.5 percent), **Julio Franco** (86 of 110, 80.0 percent) and **Willie Wilson** (68 of 85, 80.0 percent) have been tougher to throw out in the AL over the last 3 seasons (min. 50 attempts).

His ML career success rate is 75.7 percent (53 of 70)...For comparison's sake, the AL average over the same period of time was 67.3 percent (50 of 9027).

FAVORITE PARKS: Has done his best hitting at Detroit, 7-for-19, .368

'91 and 17-for-50, .340 in his career...Is batting .320 lifetime at Texas.

HOME/ROAD SPLIT: Batted .234 on the road last year compared to .254 at home...In 1990, he hit 121 points higher on the road than at home (.254 to .175), biggest difference on the club...In his career, he's batted .195 (.254) at Baltimore, and .238 (614-146) on the road.

PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

1990: Shoulder and ankle injuries limited him to 55 starts (11-1, 3.55 ERA-35)...Had AL's best stolen base success rate (minimum 15 steals) converting 88.2 percent (15 of 17)...Was successful in his final 13 attempts of the year, longest string by an Oriole since **Al Bumbry** swiped 15 straight without being caught between Aug 7, '79 and Apr 22, '80. Was 3rd in the AL among pinch hitters with 20 or more plate appearances (.333, 18-6).

Sore left shoulder prevented him from playing defensively until April, but he made the most out of his DH and PH appearances that month going 4-for-10 (.400) with 6 walks and 2 "sudden death" game-winning RBI.

Sprained his left ankle on June 8 during batting practice; was on the disabled list until July 20.

Played in the final 9 games of July and went 15-for-30 with 3 doubles, 3 triples, 2 homers and 9 RBI...Had his best series of the year, July 27-28 at KC when he helped the O's win 3 of 4 while going 8-for-14 with 3 doubles, a homer and 5 RBI.

Batted only .174 (155-27) in his final 50 games, dropping his average from .342 to final .231.

1989: Began the season as the O's leadoff hitter, but struggled in mid-May and, after starting 45 of the first 49 games, cracked the starting lineup only 20 times the remainder of the season.

Set club records for most stolen bases in April (8)...Through May 2, was leading the AL in doubles (10), was 5th in runs (20) and extra-base hits (13)...However, from that point on, he reached base only 58 times and had only 2 doubles in 69 games...Had 25 hits in April, only 30 the rest of the season...Batted .143 after May 17.

1988, ML DEBUT WITH RED SOX: Chosen in the spring as the AL East's top prospect by Baseball America...Started the season with Boston after batting .326 (86-28) in spring training...Was Boston's starting centerfielder in April while **Ellis Burks** was recovering from an ankle injury...Was the regular rightfielder for most of May.

Played in 41 of the Sox' 1st 49 games (all starts)...Went 3-for-5 on Opening Day against **Jack Morris** (then with Detroit), in his ML debut...Was batting .277 (112-31) on May 22 after 31 games, then went 3-for-36 (including 0-for-his-last-20) and was assigned to Pawtucket on June 4.

Pawtucket: Went 0-for-13 after reporting to Pawtucket (extending his hitless string to 0-for-33), then batted .312 (154-48) the rest of the way.

Orioles: Started 43 of 58 games after trade on July 30, all in centerfield...Hit



Helped by his 5 homers in September the Orioles led the Majors in homers the final month of the season, homering in 27 of their final 32 games...Batted .222 (135-30, hr-6, rbi-20) in 37 games after returning from DL.

1991 AND MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER

GAMES PLAYED: Has missed the equivalent of more than a full season over the last 2 years...Missed 60+ games in '90 with a rib cage injury...Prior to '90, he had played in 96% (779 of 813) of Houston's games from the time he was called up for good in '85 until the injury struck him in June '90.

PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

1990: Was leading the National League in homers on June 13 with 19 in his first 60 games before a rib cage injury sidelined him a week later for a little more than 2 months...Didn't return until the end of August and finished with his lowest home run total since '85...Failed to lead the club in home runs for the first time since '84.

Finished with the 6th best home runs to at bats ratio in the majors (minimum of 10 home runs) with a 14.86 mark...Hit his first 19 home runs over a span of 53 games (198 ABs), Apr 18-June 13.

They played baseball and football for **Storm's father, George Sr.** The team was state champion in '78 and '79.

Located in Columbus, GA, the ranch officially opened earlier this year on February 6...Funded largely on donations made by the Davises, the ranch is a 5200 square feet, built on 20 acres of rural farmland...It will initially house boys 8 to 15...Plans for a second girls home are under consideration.

IN THE COMMUNITY: In his first year in Baltimore last season, **Glenn** donated \$1,000 for each homer to four charitable organizations: The Maryland Food Bank, The Maryland Special Olympics, The Door (community based family center) and the The House of Ruth (home for battered women and children)...In addition, Davis contributed over \$20,000 toward Orioles tickets distributed to needy children who might otherwise might not be able to see a baseball game.

In '91, **Glenn** was the recipient of the 2nd Annual Bart Giamatti Caring Award at the Baseball Alumni Team (BAT) awards dinner in New York...**Davis** was honored for his charitable works in Houston and his hometown of Columbus, GA, including the Carpenter's Way Ranch. In Columbus, The Orioles' **Cal Ripken** won the first award in 1990.

Also in '91, he became the 36th winner of the annual Lou Gehrig Memorial Award given by the Phi Delta Theta national collegiate fraternity to the major leaguer who best fits the image and character of the Hall of Fame first baseman who was a member of the fraternity at Columbia University.

Began the season in the rotation, but after 9 starts was moved to the bullpen in late May and wound up second on the Royals' staff in appearances (51)...Was 2-5 (4.18, ip-51.2, h-57, er-24) in 9 starts and 1-4 with 2 saves (4.45, ip-62.2, h-83, er-31) in 42 relief appearances.

Was 2-1 (4.23) after 3 starts including a win in his 1st start vs NY on Apr 12 and a 5-hit, complete game shutout at Cleveland on Apr 23, his 1st shutout since Aug 30, '85 (for the Orioles at home over Seattle)...Had made 130 starts in between...It was his 100th Major League win.

Then went 0-4 over his next 6 starts and was moved to the bullpen on May 29...His last start came May 24 in a 3-2 loss at Minnesota.

Earned the 1st of 2 saves on June 19 with 3 scoreless innings at Texas, his 1st save since Apr 10, '84 vs the Royals...Lost to the Orioles in relief, in 2nd game of O's doubleheader sweep on June 23 at KC...On the season, however, he allowed only one earned run and 7 hits in 10 innings (0.90) vs the O's...Opponents batted .306 off him, including .335 by left-handed hitters.

relief...His teams have gone 137-92 (.598) in games he has started...He completed only 3 of 108 starts since leaving the Orioles in '86.

POST-SEASON: Has made 6 post-season starts with Orioles and A's and his teams are 3-3 in those games...In his 3 ALCS starts, didn't allow an earned run in his first 15.1 innings (4th inning of his 3rd start)...In '83 with the O's, he started game #4 of the ALCS at Comiskey Park and went into the 7th with the game scoreless...He yielded to **Tippy Martinez** and the O's scored 3 in the 10th to capture their 6th AL pennant.

In '88 with Oakland, he hooked up in a pitcher's duel with Boston's **Roger Clemens** and though neither got the decision, the A's won 43 in game #2 of their 4-game sweep of the Sox...In game #3 of the '89 LCS at Toronto, he took a 3-0 lead into the 4th but couldn't hold it and lost 7-3 to **Jimmy Key**.

Earned his lone post-season win in game #4 of the '83 World Series when he got credit for a 5-4 win over Philadelphia's **John Denny**...In '89 World Series, he lost twice to **Orel Hershiser** in games #2 and #5.



Lost his only start, 9-3 at Oakland on May 8 (ip-4, h-7, r-5, er-5, bb-1, so-2, hr-2)...His longest outing was 5 innings (h-2, r-0, bb-0, so-0) at Cleveland on June 26 in O's 10-4 loss...In 63 relief appearances, posted a 2.00 era (ip-94.1, h-77, er-21)

COMEBACK: His 1st appearance with the Orioles was Apr 8, more than 11 months since his last appearance, May 4, '90 for Toronto in a 3-1 loss to Detroit...In spring training, made the club on the strength of a 2-0 record and a 2.00 era (ip-18, h-9, er-4, bb-4, so-10) in 5 games.

MISCELLANEOUS: Issued only 19 unintentional walks in 98.1 innings, 1.7 per 9 innings, best ratio on the staff...When he saved the O's 9-3 win at Boston on May 30 it was his 1st since 1977...Worked one inning in the Orioles' 4-man no-hitter at Oakland on July 13.

MEMORIAL STADIUM FINALE: In one of the most memorable scenes from the final game at Memorial Stadium, Flanny entered the game with one out in the 9th inning and the O's trailing 7-1...With 50,700 fans shouting encouragement, as well as those in the Orioles' dugout, he struck out **Dave Bergman** and **Travis Fryman** and became the last Oriole to throw a pitch on 33rd Street...An emotional standing ovation followed.

In '91, was 0-5 at Memorial Stadium and lost his last 7 decisions there since his last win, Aug 27, '87...Was 80-46 overall there, including 0-2 while with Toronto.

- Perhaps the wittiest player to ever don an Orioles uniform, Mike long been known to keep clubhouses loose. With the help of Spillane's **Tim Kurkjian** below are some of Flanny's best material.
- On the automobile he received when 1st coming to the Blue Jays, Toronto players are given Blue Jays rental cars to use during season)... "I could tell it had been **Phil Niekro**'s rental car, I found false teeth in the glove department."
- When the Orioles Bird fell off the dugout in '86 he advised, "Take worms and call me in the morning".
- A '79 Cy Young Award winner, Flanny devised the following Cy Young Glossary in '80 when teammate **Steve Stone** was on his way to win the award...Since he had just won the award, Mike was Cy Young. Teammate **Jim Palmer** was Cy Old, Stone was Cy Present, Scott **Gregor** Cy Future, **Storm Davis** was Cy Clone (clone of Jim Palmer). Bex (a rehab instrument) was a pitcher who had been hurt. Cy-Anarah (Sayanarah) was the term used when a pitcher's career finished.
- On the SkyDome's retractable roof: "I wish it had retractable fences."
- On teammate **Mike Boddicker**'s fastball after Boddicker had pitched a game at Exhibition Stadium: "We had him throwing 88 mph per hour on the radar gun, but with the Canadian exchange rate it's only 83."
- Some of his better nicknames: **Ruben** Scare-ya (**Sierra**), **Jose** De-make-a-mistake-o (**Canseco**) and **Tony** Obsolete-o (when former teammate **Tony Solaito** was released).

PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

1990, A SHORT SEASON: Began the season as Toronto's #4 starter, won his 1st 2 starts, 7-1 over Texas on Apr 12 and 8-2 over the Orioles on April 17...Worked 5 innings both games, his longest outings of the season...Went 0-2 in his next 3 starts (era-8.71, ip-10.1, h-19, er-10) and released on May 8 when RHP **Steve Cummings** was recalled from Syracuse...Last appearance was a 3-1 loss to Detroit on May 4.

BLUE JAYS 1987-89: Went from the Orioles to the Jays on Aug 31, hours before the deadline to make him eligible for post-season...Blue Jays chartered a private jet to get him there...Acquired for pitchers **Jose Meireles** and **Oswald Peraza**...Named Toronto Pitcher of the Month in his 1st month with Jays that season...Had memorable 11-inning (no decision) performance Oct 3 at Detroit in the 161st game of the season which clinched a tie for the AL East title...Jays lost 3-2 in 13 and Tigers won again the following day to win crown.

In '88, led the Jays in starts (34, 10th in the AL), innings (211), and 2nd in wins (13, behind **Dave Stieb**-16)...Lost 6 of last 7 decisions after his start.

In '89, lefties batted .206 against him...Missed some time due to sore left shoulder and freak eye injury sustained in KC hotel room.

1987, ORIOLES: Lost 1st 5 decisions then went on dl in mid-May (elbow)...Earned 1st win July 18 at KC, snapping a personal 8-game losing streak, longest of career.

1986: Started the season opener and lost 6-4 to Cleveland's **Ken Schrom**...Was 1-5 thru first 3 months, 6-3 in July and August, but 0-3 in September.

1985: Missed 1st half with Achilles tendon injury suffered in January while playing basketball.

1984: Allowed 1st grand slam of career Aug 31 to Seattle's **Jim Presley**...Was 5-1 in June, but 1-5 in July.

1983: Jumped off to his fastest start ever going 6-0, best start by an Oriole since **Dave McNally** went 15-0 to open the '69 season. Injured ligaments in left knee in his next start on May 17 (1st gm) and was out the next 11 1/2 weeks...Returned Aug 7 and after losing 1st 2 starts, he went 6-1 during O's 34-10 stretch run, Aug 13 thru Sep 25...Beat Chicago in game #3 of '83 LCS, 11-3.

1982: Was only 8-10 on Aug 13, but won 7 of last 8 decisions including 7 in a row, Aug 17-Sep 19...His final victory of the year (Sep 19 vs Cle) was career win #100.

His pitching style is reminiscent of former relievers like **Dan Quisenberry, Kent Tekulve, and Dick Hyde**. He threw like Quisenberry when he signed, but after being influenced by Telkulve on television, he began to throw more submarine than sidearm. **Ellie Hendricks**, the O's veteran bullpen coach, says Todd reminds him mostly of Hyde.

1991 SEASON SUMMARY

After training with the Orioles in the spring, he started the season at Rochester and did not join Orioles until May 28. Nonetheless, he finished 2nd on the club in wins (7), played a major role in 10 (W-7, S-3) of the Orioles' 67 victories, and finished 2nd to **Cal Ripken** in the "Most Valuable Oriole" vote.

Held opponents to a .190 average (337-64) overall, and despite his late arrival, ranked 2nd in the AL in relief innings pitched (96.1), to the Blue Jays' **Duane Ward** (107.1)...Among AL relievers with 50 or more innings, his 1.87 era was runner-up to **Bryan Harvey**, California (1.60).

Allowed fewer than one baserunner per inning with both Rochester (in 14.2 innings) and Baltimore (94 in 96.1 innings)...

Nine times he pitched 3+ innings and didn't allow a run...Saved 3 wins in 5 opportunities...Inherited 18 leads and blew only 2, though he did allow the opposition to break 4 of 8 inherited ties.

Among the Orioles' 6 principal '91 relievers (20 or more appearances), he was 5th in inherited runner efficiency (pct. scored/# runners -# scored): 1-**Mike Flanagan** (26%, 46-12); 2-**Jim Poole** (27%, 26-7); 3-**Paul Kilgus** (30%, 33-10); 4-**Mark Williamson** (32%, 62-20); 5-**Frohwirth** (33%, 54-18); 6-**Greg Olson** (37%, 30-11).

He was impressive from the beginning. Made his Orioles debut the day he arrived (5/28) and appeared in 8 games his 1st 12 days with the club...Thru his 1st 6 appearances (5/28 thru 6/5), he faced 24 batters (7

innings) and didn't allow a legitimate base-runner. The only batter to reach in that period did so on a strikeout-passed ball...That streak ended when he walked Toronto's **Pat Tabler**, the 1st man he faced in his next outing.

Allowed only 7 of 51 1st batters (.137) to reach safely, and held them to a .109 average (46-5)...From Aug 13 thru Sep 29, he forged an 0.92 era in 39 innings spread over 19 appearances (er-4).

On July 11 at Oakland, he suffered an unusual calamity when he made consecutive throwing errors to 2nd base attempting to start a double play on successive ground balls by **Terry Steinbach** and **Mike Gallego**.

VS OPPONENTS: Yielded only 2 home run balls (a 3-run homer by **Danny Tartabull** June 12 at Memorial Stadium and a solo by **Kelly Gruber** on Sep 2 at the SkyDome).

Held 5 clubs scoreless: Bos, Cal, Cle, Mil & Tex.

Six teams batted below .200 against him, most notably the ultimate World Champion Twins who also led the league in hitting at .280, but batted only .071 (28-2) off the side-winding slants of Frohwirth.

Others who hit below .200: Bos-.189 (37-7); Cle-.188 (32-6); Det-.184 (38-7); Mil-.200 (20-2); Tex-.107 (28-3)...California (.211, 19-4) and Toronto (.207, 29-6) also had their hands full.

PHILLIES ORGANIZATION

Spent his entire pro career (7 full seasons) in the Philadelphia organization until the Orioles signed him as a 6-year free agent.

1990: Started the season in Philadelphia, but was assigned to Scranton-Wilkes Barre before the end of April, and did not return to the big leagues...Lost his only decision, to Montreal on Apr 17, and made his final N.L. appearance on Apr 25 against Cincinnati.

Appeared in more games (67) for Scranton and than any other AAA pitcher while leading the International League in saves (21)...Won or saved 30 of the Barons' 68 victories (44%)...Was named to the IL All-Star team for his efforts.

PINCH-HITTING: Led the AL and tied an Oriole record with 3 pinch-hit home runs...Tied mark accomplished 4 other times, most recently by **John Dwyer** in 1986...Tied for the AL lead in '90 with 2 pinch-homers...Also led all pinch-hitters with a .750 slugging mark.

In 2 years as an Oriole has a .333 (33-11) pinch-hit average with 5 homers and 14 rbi...Of his 5 pinch-homers, 3 have come against Toronto (Duane Ward-2, Tom Henke-1)...In '90, his .444 (9-4) average as a pinch-hitter was the AL's highest (min 10 PH apps).

SIX STRAIGHT Ks: In the O's 9-8, 15-inning loss on July 17 at KC, he struck out 6 times (consecutively) becoming the first non-pitcher in Major League history to strike out 6 straight times in one game...He tied the ML mark for most strikeouts in an extra inning game, accomplished 5 other times (St. Louis Browns' pitcher **Carl Weilman**, 6 straight in '13), California's **Rick Reichardt** in '66, California's **Billy Cowan** in '71, Boston's **Cecil Cooper** in '74 and Chicago Cubs' **Don Hoak** in '56.

MISCELLANEOUS: May be the only one sorry to see **Bret Saberhagen** go to the NL...Horn was 8-for-19 (.421) with 4 homers off him...Is 6-for-15 (.400) as an Oriole with the bases loaded.

FAVORITE PARK: His favorite park is Yankee Stadium where he is hitting .341 (44-15, hr-4) lifetime there in 14 games.

PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

1990: Averaged one rbi every 5.5 at bats, 7th best in the AL (min 200 ABs) and one homer every 15.6 ABs, 9th best in the AL (min 10 homers)...At Rochester and Baltimore combined, he hit 23 homers and had 71 rbi in 95 games (304 ABs).

Began spring training in the Orioles' minor league camp, but was promoted to the big league camp less than a week before the club came North...Was in the lineup immediately and enjoyed the greatest Opening Day and Orioles' debut in club history...Was 4-for-6 with 2 homers and 6

rbi on Apr 9 at KC.

Hit a 3-run homer off defending Cy Young Award winner **Bret Saberhagen** and another off **Steve Farr**...No other Oriole has had 6 rbi on Opening Day and **Brooks Robinson** is the only other Oriole to hit 2 Opening Day homers...The last time a major leaguer had 6 rbi on Opening Day was in 1986, Seattle's **Jim Presley**.

Despite great opener, he had only 3 homers and 79 ABs with the O's thru July 3...Missed most of May with a strained right shoulder (DL'd, May 8-29) and spent almost all of June at Rochester, June 3-July 2.

Returned July 3 and hit 11 homers in 164 ABs the rest of the season, including 5 in his first 13 games...Batted .310 (58-18) his first month back with the O's.

Started at first base on Apr 21 vs. Detroit, the first time in his ML career he started defensively... Played 10 games at first base, 9 starts...Had played defensively only once in his first 111 ML games.

Rochester '90: Spent 5 days at Rochester, May 24-29, on a rehab assignment...Returned in June for 13 games and had an incredible stay going 22-for-48 with 9 homers and 25 rbi...Hit 6 homers in a 4-game span, June 23-25...In his career has hit 60 homers in 265 games at Triple A.

The third is now a minor league hitting instructor in the Birds' farm system: **Richie Dauer**, a 2nd baseman for the Orioles' last 2 pennant winners ('79 & '83), Richie played here from late '76 thru '85.

It wasn't always thus. He did not hit his 1st pro home run until 10 games into his 3rd pro season (had played 142 games in o.b. to that point). Since then, he has homered once every 6.4 games (g-713, hr-112).

Has also fanned 100+ times in each of the last 4 seasons including 12 last year for Rochester (69) and the O's (51) combined.

VS OPPONENTS: Excelled against several clubs, most notably the Rangers...He batted .522 (23-12) with 3 homers and 7 rbi in 6 games vs Texas...Batted .353 (17-6) with 2 homers against California and .360 (25-9) off Yankees' pitching...See page 97 for his stats vs each opponent.

Went hitless in 12 trips against the Red Sox and batted only .167 (12-2) with no homers or rbi against Kansas City, the organization with which he'd spent his first 7 pro seasons.

MINOR LEAGUE CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

ASSISTS: During his last 3 seasons in the KC system, he averaged 20 outfield assists per year. He led the Southern League with 23 and 18 in '88 and '89 respectively, and was 2nd in the American Association in '90 with 18.

Married Angela Mahaffey in '88...They have 2 children: Drew Tyler (4/4/89) and Dalton Taylor (7/31/91).

Didn't win back-to-starts all year and only once did he win 2 straight decisions...Lone CG was May 17 vs. California, a 6-hit, 5-1 win...Was winless in his last 7 home starts (0-4)...

He and 4 other Oriole pitchers combined on an 8-hit shutout and a 3-1 win at Chicago on Aug 2 setting an O's record for most pitchers used in a shutout...Ben went 5.2 innings and **Mike Flanagan, Mark Williamson, Jim Poole** and **Gregg Olson** did the rest.

1990 HIGHLIGHTS

Joined the Orioles at mid-season, made 6 relief appearances before moving into the rotation and then became the first Oriole ever to win his first 5 major league starts and first 6 major league decisions...First major leaguer to win his first 5 ML starts since the Dodgers' **Fernando Valenzuela**, who won his first eight in 1981.

Among AL pitchers with 100+ innings pitched, **McDonald** was:

- 5th in the AL in era (2.43);
- 1st in fewest base runners per 9 innings (9.33);
- 2nd in lowest batting average against (.205) behind **Nolan Ryan** (.188);
- Held lefthanders to a .181 (216-39) average, lowest in the AL;

GOLDEN SPIKES AWARD: Was the recipient of amateur baseball's highest individual honor in 1989- the Golden Spikes Award, presented annually by the U.S. Baseball Federation, the governing body for amateur baseball in the United States, to the nation's most outstanding amateur player.

COLLEGE: Grew up 12 miles from Louisiana State University and originally attended LSU on a basketball scholarship...Played basketball and baseball for 2 years, baseball only in his final year (junior year)...As a junior was Baseball America's College Player of the Year and ESPN's Co-Player of the Year with University of Texas outfielder **Scott Bryant**...Was 14-4 with 4 saves and a 3.49 era. He fanned 202 batters in 152 innings while helping

lead LSU to a 52-15 regular season record and a berth in the College World Series.



THE ORIOLE WAY

Among the current 26 major league general managers are 8 with links to the Orioles. Lou Gorman (Red Sox), Al Harazin (Mets), John Schuerholz (Braves), Herk Robinson (Royals), Joe McIlvane (Padres), and, of course, Roland Hemond have all worked for the club in administrative capacities. Two others — Whitey Herzog (Angels) and Pat Gillick (Blue Jays) — played in the Orioles' organization. Herzog was an outfielder on the big league club ('61-'62) while Gillick was a pitcher in the Baltimore farm system from '59 to '63 (pitched for Earl Weaver for 3 seasons).

Four other former Orioles have stepped down from gm posts since last season: Frank Cashen (Mets), Harry Dalton (Brewers), Jim Frey (Cubs) and Hank Peters (Indians).

pitched to a 3.37 ERA (ip-120.1, h-125, er-45) and worked into the 7th inning or later 15 times while going 8-6.

Best stretch was 6 starts between Aug 13 and Sep 9 when he compiled to a 2.25 ERA (ip-44, h-39, er-11), but was only 2-2.

CAREER MISCELLANEOUS: Sixteen times in his career he has pitched into the 7th inning or later, allowed 2 runs or less, and not gotten a win (0-4, 12 no dec...)...Has been the starter in 10 of the O's last 22 shutouts starting in September, 1988...Is 10-3 after September 1.

PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

1989, ROOKIE WORKHORSE: Tied with Kansas City's **Mark Gubicza** and Oakland's **Dave Stewart** for the AL lead in games started (36)...Became the first rookie in 71 years to lead the AL in starts...Hadn't been done since '18 (Scott Perry of the Philadelphia Athletics).

Finished one shy of the AL record for most starts by a rookie held by Detroit's **Herman Pillette** in '22 and Minnesota's **Roger Erickson** in '78...His 243 innings were an Orioles record for a rookie, 47 more than any other major league rookie in '89, and 5th overall in the AL.

Led the O's staff in starts, innings, shutouts (2) and strikeouts (113)...After Aug. 1 went 9-3 (3.04) in 14 starts, only K.C.'s **Bret Saberhagen** and Oakland's **Storm Davis** won more games in the majors the last 2 months.

Finished the season with a 5-game win streak (2.33, IP-46.1, H-44, ER-12) over 7 starts and the O's won all 7 games.

On April 23 at home vs. Minnesota he became the 3rd pitcher in Orioles history to face the minimum 27 batters in a complete 9-inning game,

beating the Twins on a 3-hitter...The other 2 were **Jim Palmer** on May 12, '67 vs. New York and **Mike Flanagan** on May 3, '82 vs. Seattle.

1988, DAZZLING DEBUT: Recalled by Orioles from Rochester Sep 13 and got off to one of the finest starts in Orioles' history...Made 3 starts, the only 3 games the Orioles won after Sep 11 (19 games)...Opponents batted .110 (82-9).

His big league beginning (2-0, 0.72, IP-25, H-9, ER-2) is comparable to only 2 others in Orioles' history: **Dave McNally** was 3-0 (1.04, IP-26, ER-3) in '62-'63, and **Tom Phoebus** was 2-1 (1.23, IP-22, ER-3) in '66 after throwing shutouts in his first 2 starts.

Milacki's debut came at Detroit Sep 18...He combined with **Tom Niedenfuer** for a one-hit, 2-0 win, the 28th one-hitter in Orioles' history...Had no decision in next start at home against Detroit when bullpen failed him after he took a 3-1 lead into the 9th...In his 3rd start on Sep 28, he shut out the Yankees on 3 hits with a career high 10 strikeouts to all but knock the Yankees from the AL East race.

At Charlotte (AA), Rochester (AAA)-including playoffs-and with the O's, was a combined 18-11 (2.59, IP-264, ER-76) with 15 complete games in 35 starts...Led the entire organization in wins, innings, starts and complete games...Had only 5 complete games in his first 3 years of pro ball (74 starts).

EARLY CAREER: Won only 16 games his first 3 years in O's system, but went 11-9 at Charlotte in '87, his 4th year...Highlight of career came May 28, '87, when he carried a no-hitter into the 12th inning vs. Chattanooga, allowing just one hit and 3 walks in 13 innings to get the win.

AMATEUR CAREER: Played football, basketball, and baseball at Lake Havasu High School...Was all-state in baseball...Played in the National Sports Festival...Played one year at Yavapai Junior College (AZ).

PERSONAL: He and his wife, the former **Kimberly Mycick**, are the parents of a daughter, **Brittany Nicole** (5/19-90)...Bob is one of the O's biggest fishing enthusiasts.

1989: After getting only 83 major league at bats in 8 seasons in the Pirates and Mets organizations, he spent his 1st full season in the majors and had the Orioles best on-base percentage (.394) and 2nd best slugging mark (.458). Started slowly, hitting only .217 in O's 1st 31 games, then went 33-for-101 (.327) between May 12 and July 1 while O's went 30-16...Batted .340 (50-17) the final 15 games of the season during the pennant chase.

Hit 2 of the O's most dramatic home runs during the O's memorable season...At Boston on Aug 2 he delivered a 3-run homer off **Rob Murphy** to tie game at 6-6 after O's trailed 6-0...O's eventually won 9-8 to retain hold on 1st place over Red Sox...Also hit 2-run, 10th inning homer at Texas off **Jeff Russell** to give O's 4-2 victory on Sep 9.

Started the season and closed it out on high notes...Allowed only one run in his 1st 10 games (0.96, ip-9.1, h-6, er-1) thru May 8...Finished strong 7 of his last 9 app's were hitless and 10 of last 11 were scoreless.

1990: Set an Orioles' record with 37 saves, becoming the youngest in Major League history to get 30 or more saves...Was 4th in the majors, in saves and converted 88 percent of his save opportunities (37 of 42), also 4th best in the majors.

RIPKEN BROTHERS

Cal and Bill Ripken are the 5th set of brothers to form a 2nd base-shortstop combination in major league history: **Granny and Garvin Hamner** of the '45 Phillies; **Lou and Dino Chiozza** of the '35 Phillies; **Milt and Frank Bolling** of the '58 Tigers; and **Eddie and Johnny O'Brien** of the '53-'55-'56 Pirates.

Since Bill broke into the major leagues in '87, the Ripkens have played in 555 games together; started 526 games and turned 247 double plays...Prior to the Ripkens, the most any brother double play combination had ever played side-by-side in the majors were approximately 100 games by Pittsburgh's O'Brien twins.

Fewest Errors ever by a DP Combo: In '90, Cal and Bill accounted for a total of only 11 errors...That was the fewest errors in major league history by a qualifying (i.e. each playing 2/3 of their club's games at their respective positions) keystone combination.

The next lowest total is 13 in 1990: Toronto's **Tony Fernandez** and **Manny Lee** (13 errors combined). St. Louis' **Ozzie Smith** and **Jose Oquendo** have combined for only 15 miscues twice ('91 & '90)...Previously, the lowest total was 16 errors by Philadelphia's **Larry Bowa** and **Manny Trillo** in '79 and Cincinnati's **Dave Concepcion** and **Joe Morgan** in '77.

In '88, the Ripkens participated in 229 double plays. Only once in Orioles' history have there been more ('74 **Grich/Belanger**-232). That season the 2 brothers also topped all keystone combinations in total chances (1,546). **Triple Play:** On June 15, '89, vs New York, the 2 Rips teamed up on a triple play against the Yankees, the 1st by the Orioles in more than 10 years (see details on page 106).

Home Runs: On Sep 15, '90 at Toronto, Cal and Bill each homered...They became the 1st pair of brothers to hit home runs in the same game since **Graig (NY)** and **Jim Nettles (Det)** did it Sep 14, 1974...Both Bill and Cal homered in the 5th inning off **David Wells**...It was the 15th time brothers had homered in the same game and the 5th time it had been done in the same inning (1st since **Hank** and **Tommy Aaron** for Milwaukee on July 12, '62).

The pair has now combined for 268 homers in the major leagues... (9 by Bill). That figure ranks 10th all-time among brother combinations, 4 ahead of the **Torres** (Joe and Frank) and one behind the **Alou** brothers (Jesus, Felipe and Matty)...See page 67 for complete listings.

Biggest Game: On Aug 2, '89, Bill had a career-high 4 hits and Cal had 3 to help the Orioles overcome a 6-0 deficit and win 9-8...Unofficial research by **Al Kermisch** reveals the probability that only once has a brother combination surpassed that total...On June 25, '32, **Paul (3)** and **Lloyd Waner (5)** combined for 8 hits in a game for the Pirates.

BALTIMORE'S OTHER IRONMAN

Orioles shortstop **Cal Ripken** may have the 2nd longest playing streak in major league history at 1,573 consecutive games, but unbeknown to many there is an even longer game streak going in Baltimore.

That streak belongs to Orioles' field attendant **Ernie Tyler**, who worked the last 2,651 games played at Memorial Stadium from his stool, near the screen at Memorial Stadium. He will continue his ironman ways at Oriole Park.

Ernie's incredible streak began April 19, '60, the day the O's opened the season with a 3-2 win over the Washington Senators. Ernie, incidentally, is the father of **Jimmy** and **Freddy Tyler**, the Orioles' 2 clubhouse managers.

TALLEST: Is the tallest ever to play shortstop **regularly** in the majors...**Ray Busse** (Houston, '71-'74), and former Orioles **Enos Cabell** and **Jamie Quirk**, are among 7 others 6'4" tall who have played some shortstop.

1991 SEASON SUMMARY

Became the 2nd player in major league history to win a league Most Valuable Player, Major League Player of the Year (The Sporting News, AP and Baseball Digest), All-Star Game MVP and a Gold Glove in the same season. The only other player to accomplish the feat was Dodgers' shortstop **Maury Wills** in '62...Cal also won his 6th "Silver Slugger" Award given to the most productive offensive player at each position.

HISTORIC AL MOST VALUABLE PLAYER: Became the 1st player in American League history to win the MVP on a sub-.500 team and the 3rd player in major league history, joining a pair of Chicago Cubs, **Ernie Banks** ('58 and '59) and **Andre Dawson** ('87)...The Baseball Writers Association of America MVP Award has been awarded for 61 years, beginning in '31. Cal became the first mvp to play on a team with more than 85 losses...The O's were 67-95.

Cal, who also won the award in '83, became only the 20th player to win multi-mvp Awards, joining **Stan Musial**, **Joe DiMaggio**, **Ted Williams**, **Willie Mays**, **Mickey Mantle**, **Frank Robinson**, **Ernie Banks**, **Johnny Bench**, **Mike Schmidt**, **Yogi Berra**, **Roger Maris**, **Roy Campanella**, **Hank Greenberg**, **Jimmie Foxx**, **Hal Newhouser**, **Carl Hubbell**, **Joe Morgan**, **Dale Murphy** and **Robin Yount**. (For more information see "Previous Honors and Awards".)

Having won it in '83 and '91, Cal's span of 7 seasons between awards is the 2nd longest between MVPs in ML history. Only **Willie Mays**, who went 10 seasons ('54/'65) has gone longer between MVPs.

GOLD GLOVE: Won his 1st Rawlings Gold Glove...Although Cal becomes the 1st Oriole to win a Gold Glove since **Eddie Murray** in 1984, it is the 49th won all-time by the Orioles, most by an American League club...He is only the 4th American Leaguer in the last 24 years to win the mvp and Gold Glove in the same year, joining **Fred Lynn** in '75, **Robin Yount** in '82 and **Don Mattingly** in '85.

ML PLAYER OF THE YEAR: Became the 1st to win The Sporting News' Major League Player of the Year while playing on a losing club. The award was initiated in 1936...He also won it in '83, and is the 20th player to win the ML Player of the Year more than once...Cal also won the Associated Press' ML Player of the Year and Baseball America's AL Player of the Year.

Here are some of Cal's many accomplishments during his remarkable, record-breaking year:

- Became the 4th shortstop in ML history to hit 30 or more homers, joining **Ernie Banks**, **Vern Stephens** and **Rico Petrocelli**.
- Finished 3rd in the AL in homers (34), most by a shortstop in 22 years (Boston's **Rico Petrocelli**, 40 in '69)...Most homers by an Oriole since **Ken Singleton** hit 35 in '79.
- Became only the 10th player in American League history to hit more than 30 homers and strike out less than 50 times...The others: **Don Mattingly** (1985-86); **Ted Williams** (1941-46-47-49-57); **Joe DiMaggio** (1937-38-40-48-50); **Lou Gehrig** (1932-33-34-36-37); **Earl Averill** (1931-32-34); **Hal Trosky** (1934); **Al Rosen** (1953); **Al Simmons** (1929-30) and **Ken Williams** (1922).
- Became the 1st righthanded hitter in the AL to hit more than 30 homers and strikeout less than 50 times since **Al Rosen** in '53.
- Became one of 8 players in ML history to hit 20 homers in his 1st 10 full seasons (See chart below).
- Became the 21st all-time to hit 20+ home runs in 10 straight seasons joining 16 Hall of Famers.

- Led the major leagues with 85 extra-base hits (tied club record) and became only the 9th American Leaguer in the past 50 years to get 85 or more extra-base hits...The others: **Robin Yount** (87 in 1982); **Reggie Jackson** (86 in 1969); **Hal McRae** (86 in 1977); **Jim Rice** (86 in 1978); **Don Mattingly** (86 in both 1985-86); **Frank Robinson** (85 in 1966); **Ted Williams** (85 in 1949) and **George Brett** (85 in '79).
- Led the major leagues with club record 368 total bases...Only 6 other American Leaguers have had as many total bases in the last 50 years. They are **Jim Rice** (406 in 1978 and 369 in 1979); **Don Mattingly** (388 in 1986 and 370 in 1985); **Mickey Mantle** (376 in 1956); **Tony Oliva** (374 in 1964); **George Bell** (369 in 1987) and **Ted Williams** (368 in 1949).
- Became one of only 5 in Orioles' history to hit .300, with 30+ homers and 100+ rbi joining **Jim Gentile**, **Frank Robinson**, **Boog Powell** and **Eddie Murray**.
- Hit a career-high .323, 2nd highest in club history behind **Ken Singleton's** .328 in 1977.
- Led the ML with career-high 73 multi-hit games (2-hit, 55; 3-hit, 15; 4-hit, 3).
- Led ML shortstops in total chances (807), assists (529) and putouts (267) and was 2nd in fielding percentage behind St. Louis' **Ozzie Smith** (.987 to .986).
- Led the majors in road batting average (.358, 335-120)...Only **Kirby Puckett** (.362 in 1987) and **Carney Lansford** (.360 in 1989) have hit higher in the AL in the last 5 years.
- Was 2nd in the majors in **hits** (210, one shy of tying his own club mark for hits in a season, 211 in 1983), **doubles** (46, one shy of tying his own club record, 47 in 1983) and **slugging percentage** (.566, 47 points higher than his previous high, .519 in 1983).

BATTING: Led the Orioles in 14 offensive categories, virtually everything except triples, sac bunts and stolen bases...Was the only player in the AL to finish in the top 10 in hits, homers, average and rbi.

His average dipped below .320 only 3 days after the 2nd day of the season...Led the league in batting for 47 of 48 days, June 4-July 21.

Began torrid hitting from day one when he batted a career-high .380 in spring training...Hit .338 in April, while teammates managed just .216...On Apr 13 at Texas he drove in a career-high 7 runs while going 4-for-5 with 2 hrs and a triple.

Led the AL with a .371 average in June...His overall average reached as high as .362 on June 5, highest mark ever by an Oriole that late in the season...Reached 100 hits on June 28, earliest in club history...Scored a run in 10 straight games, June 22-July 1, one shy of club record held by **Frank Robinson**.

His .348 average at the all-star break was the highest ever by an Oriole and made him the 1st shortstop to lead either the AL or NL in hitting at the break since Cleveland's **Lou Boudreau** in 1948.

Suffered his only prolonged slump from July 13 thru Aug 5 when he batted .216 (88-19) over 22 games...Rebounded to hit .354 (99-35) the rest of August and .349 (106-37) in September when he was named AL Player of the Month (See "September" below).

Included in September was a span of 17 games between Sep 12-30, when he had 13 multi-hit games and batted .426 (68-29) to raise his average from .318 to .330...In 4 games, Sep 26-29 vs. Boston and Detroit, he went 10-for-18 with 3 homers and 13 rbi.

Finished with career-high 114 rbi, only one other Oriole has driven in more in the last 21 years (**Eddie Murray**, 124 in 1985 and 116 in 1980).

Reached safely on errors a club-high 17 times...Batted .315 (149-47) with men in scoring position, 111 points higher than in 1990 (.204)...Was 2nd on the club behind **Dwight Evans** (.354).

Batted .297 (229-68) on counts when he had 2 strikes, 2nd highest in the AL behind Milwaukee's **Willie Randolph** (.322).

Hit .370 (165-61) in the six AL East road parks including .469 (32-15) at Tiger Stadium...Batted over .300 in all but 3 AL parks (failed to do it in NY-.290; Chi-.261; and Oak-.174)...See below "Lifetime Batting in AL Parks".

SEPTEMBER: Was AL Player of the Month in September (.349, hr-8, rbi-27). Had batted a collective .209 in his previous 3 Septembers: 1988 (.216); 1989 (.198) and 1990 (.215)...Also shared AL Player of the Week, Sep 23-30, with **Rickey Henderson** when he batted .467, 30-14, hr-3, rbi-13).

AMONG SHORTSTOP: Outbatted the opposing shortstops 34-2, had almost twice as many rbi (114 to 58) and made half as many errors (22 to 11).

On Sep 18 when he homered at Fenway off Boston's **Mike Gardiner**, he became the 4th shortstop in ML history to hit 30 or more homers, joining **Ernie Banks**, **Vern Stephens** and **Rico Petrocelli**.

Only one shortstop in major league history—**Robin Yount** with 87 in '82—has had more than Cal's 85 extra-base hits in a season.

Became only the 2nd shortstop in major league history to hit .300+ with 30+ homers and 100+ rbi...The only previous shortstop to accomplish that feat was **Ernie Banks** and he did it twice: in 1958 and 1959.

His career-high 114 rbi were the most by a ML shortstop since **Yount** also had 114 in 1982...Cal led all major league shortstops in rbi and home runs...He has been the big league leader at his position in homers 8 times in the last 9 years (exception: **Alan Trammell** '87), and in rbi 7 of the last 9 years (exceptions: **Trammell** '87 & '90).

.300, 30 HRS, 100 RBI: Was one of only 3 in the majors to hit .300 with 30+ homers and 100+ rbi (**Frank Thomas** and **Danny Tartabull** were the others)...Only 9 other active righthanded hitters have done it.

ALL-STAR MVP: Became the 4th Oriole to win the All-Star Game mvp award when on July 9 at Toronto's SkyDome he went 2-for-3 with a single off '91 Cy Young Award winner **Tom Glavine** and a 3-run homer off former teammate **Dennis Martinez** to lead the AL to a 4-2 win...Other Orioles who have been All-Star Game mvp are: **Billy O'Dell** ('58), **Brooks** ('66) and **Frank** ('71)...Cal became only the 3rd AL shortstop to hit an All-Star Game home run, joining **Dick McAuliffe** ('65) and **Lou Boudreau** ('42).

In the home run hitting contest the day before the All-Star Game, Cal hit an incredible 12 home runs at the SkyDome in 22 swings to lead the AL to a 20-7 pasting of the NL. (See also "All-Star Games").

THE LAST OUT: Was the last player to bat in Memorial Stadium history when he bounced into a 5-4-3 double play off Detroit's **Frank Tanana** at 5:07 p.m. on Oct 6, 1991.

ORIOLES TRIPS TO JAPAN, '71 & '84

The Orioles have made 2 trips to Japan, both sponsored by the *Yomiuri Shimbun*, Japan's largest newspaper and owner of the Tokyo Giants.

In '71, the O's were 12-2-4 on a 31-day tour all over Japan, including an 8-0 record with 3 ties head to head against the Giants who had just captured their 7th straight Japan championship, led by 2 of the country's all-time players, **Sadaharu Oh** and **Shigeo Nagashima**. The O's left on that month-long junket just 3 days after losing a 7-game World Series to the Pirates.

The Birds earned the '84 trip by beating the Phillies in the '83 World Series. Despite a 5th place '84 finish, the O's went 4-1 in the first 5 games, all against the Japan Champion Hiroshima Toyo Carp, and 4-1 as well against the sponsoring Tokyo Yomiuri Giants. Overall on that trip the O's were 8-5-1, having gone 0-3-1 against Japanese All-Star teams.

In the fall of '86, **Cal Ripken Jr** represented the Orioles on a team of major league all-stars that went 5-1 vs an all-star aggregation from the Japanese Central and Pacific Leagues. Cal led the major leaguers in batting with a .500 average (14-7) while platooning at shortstop with **Ozzie Smith** of the Cardinals.

Glenn Davis has gone to Japan twice on major league all-star trips, once with Cal in '86 and again in '90.

IRONMAN

CONSECUTIVE GAMES: The 1,573-game streak (all starts) began May 30 '82, the day after **Floyd Rayford** started in his place at 3rd base in the 2nd game of a doubleheader vs the Blue Jays at Baltimore. The next closest active streak belongs to Toronto's **Joe Carter** (505)...During the consecutive games streak, the Orioles have played 14,301 innings and Cal played in 14,199 of them (99.3 percent). He has left a game early 34 times (15 times in '91). As a comparison, when **Lou Gehrig**'s streak had reached this point, he had not played a full game 48 times.

MOST AT ONE POSITION: For the 1st month of the streak, Cal was primarily a 3rd baseman...The 1st 27 games of the streak were at 3b...He made his last start there on June 30, '82.

Beginning July 1, '82, Cal has played 1,546 consecutive games at short, more than anyone has ever played at a single position...Lou Gehrig's longest streak at 1b was 885 straight games.

Everett Scott, also a shortstop who played most of his big league career ('14-'26) with the Red Sox and Yankees, held the previous record for most consecutive games at one position (1,307)...Scott, incidentally, played 10 games for **Jack Dunn**'s International League O's, and batted .335 with 11 home runs in '27...Note that Scott's streak, surpassed by Cal in '90, remains the 3rd longest all-time regardless of position.

While Cal has been starting at shortstop, the other 25 major league clubs have used a combined total of 371 starting shortstops. During his streak at shortstop, Cal has hit 251 home runs, driven in 904 and made 166 errors, while opposing shortstops have 56 homers and 568 rbi, while committing 238 errors.

LONGEST O'S STREAKS: The 3 longest streaks previous to Cal's in Orioles history were by **Brooks Robinson** (463), **Eddie Murray** (444) and **Billy Gardner** (361)...Cal, who has played in every Orioles game in each of the last 9 years, is one of 5 Orioles to have played every game in a season at least once: **Brooks** and **Murray**—4 times, **Gardner** and **Bobby Grich**, once each.

CONSECUTIVE INNINGS RECORD: His streak of 8,243 straight innings (spanning 904 games, '82-'87) is believed to be the longest of its kind in major league history. It began June 5, '82 (6 days and 5 games after the start of his consecutive games string) at Minnesota. The day before (June 4), **Jim Dwyer** had pinch hit for him in the 9th inning, also at Minnesota...The 82 post-season innings he played in '83 are NOT included in these figures.

The innings streak ended Sep 14, '87 in Toronto when he didn't take the field for the bottom of the 8th in an 18-3 Toronto walkover (Ron Washington replaced him defensively)...That was the game in which the Jays hit a major league record 10 home runs.

Noted baseball researcher L. Robert Davids determined some years ago that the previous leaders in the consecutive innings category were a couple of former Red Sox who played in the Hub City during the early 1900s—**Buck Freeman** and Candy LaChance. Freeman, a 1st baseman, played every inning over some 534 games (7/28/01-6/5/05), and outfielder LaChance missed nary a canto over a span of 424 games (5/23/02 to 4/28/05).

Rip, whose innings streak covered some 5½ seasons, was the 1st to have played every inning for at least 2 straight years since **Rudy York** with the Tigers in '40-'41...In addition to Cal & Freeman, only one other major leaguer has played every inning for at least 3 years (not necessarily consecutive)...That was "Marcus Hook" **Mickey Vernon** in '42, '47 & '53 with those pesky Nats...The only other Oriole to play every inning in one season was **Eddie Murray** in '84 (including 3 games as dh).

HOME RUNS: Of his 259 career home runs, 251 have been as a shortstop, most ever by an AL shortstop and 2nd in major league history behind **Ernie Banks**' all-time major league record of 293.

Is 4th all-time in O's history (see page 35 for club's all-time leaders) and needs 10 homers to become the top righthanded home run hitter in club history (trails **Brooks**, 268-259).

Hit 129 homers at Memorial Stadium, 4th in club history behind **Eddie Murray** (160), **Brooks** (138) and **Boog Powell** (133). Longest home run drought is 40 games, Apr 10-May 28 in 1989.

IN THE CLUTCH: After hitting .315 (149-47) with men in scoring position in '91, is now hitting .277 (1543-427) lifetime in that situation...Is 8-for-his last 16 with the sacks full...In 4½ years prior to that (since the start of '86 thru July '90) he had gone 5-for-55 in bases loaded situations...Lifetime, he is batting .244 (130-23).

Cal, who drove in a club high 41 tying/lead runs in '91, has finished 1st (5 times) or 2nd (5 times to **Eddie Murray**) on the club in each of his 10 full seasons...His year-by-year totals: '82-36 (#2); '83-33 (#2); '84-25 (#2); '85-40 (#2); '86-33 (#1); '87-40 (#1); '88-26 (#2), '89-37 (#1), '90-39 (#1), '91-41 (#1). Total: 350.

His 10 gwrbi (the now defunct statistic) also led the club in '91 and raised his career total to 124, 4th on the O's all-time list.

ORIOLES' TOP 10: He ranks among the top Orioles of all time in some 12 offensive categories...See "Orioles' Batting Leaders" page 35 for full details.

ALL-STAR GAMES: Started his 8th straight All-Star Game, becoming the 1st AL shortstop to start in an All-Star game 8 years (consecutive or not), surpassing **Joe Cronin** who started 7 years for the Red Sox and Senators (1933-34-35-37-38-39-41)...(Luis Aparicio started in 8, but it was only over 6 years (2 in 1959 and 2 in 1962)...Ozzie Smith, who has started the last 9 games, holds the NL record.

Cal became the 1st AL shortstop to make the all-star team 9 different years, surpassing **Aparicio** (8)...He is the only player to start for the AL the last 8 years.

Extended his Orioles club record for most consecutive all-star starts (**Brooks** is 2nd with 5, '64 thru '68, and still holds the Orioles' standard for most overall starts (10 years, 11 games—2 in '61.)

Cal has been the elected starter in 7 of his 8 starts ('84 thru '87,

'89-'91)...In '88, Cal finished 2nd in the voting to the Tigers' Alan Trammell but started anyway when the Detroit star had to withdraw because of injury.

Has twice led the AL in votes. In '85 (1,398,901) and '86 (1,486,806). He was 2nd in '91 to Seattle's **Ken Griffey Jr.** (2,248,396 to 2,060,109).

ON THE ROAD: In '91, he led the majors with a .358 (335-120) road batting average...Has a .292 (3250-950) lifetime average on the road, 26 points higher than he hit at Memorial Stadium (.266, 3055-812)...He has hit better on the road than at home in 9 of his 10 full seasons.

LIFETIME BATTING IN EACH AL PARK: Boston (.346, 254-88, hr-6, rbi-25)... California (.261, 238-62, hr-8, rbi-32)... Chicago, Old Comiskey (.303, 201-61, hr-10, rbi-35), New Comiskey (.261, 23-6, hr-1, rbi-8)... Cleveland (.269, 260-70, hr-12, rbi-36)... Detroit (.273, 260-71, hr-15, rbi-45)... ARTIFICIAL TURF: Batted .370 (100-37) on artificial turf in '91, (.315, 550-173, on the real stuff), and now has a career carpet average of .309 (981-303).

CYCLE: Opponents have hit for the cycle 5 times against the Orioles (see page 39), but only 2 O's have performed that trick in 38 seasons, Brooks Robinson and Cal...Rip did it in Texas May 6, '84...He homered off Dave Tobik in his final at bat to complete the job...He went 4-for-5 that day with 2 rbi...Brooks cycled at Chicago July 15, '60.

JAPAN TRIPS: Has a cumulative .353 average (68-24) on 2 trips to Japan...Accompanied the Orioles on a 14-game trip in '84 and batted .315 (54-17) with 4 homers and 9 rbi as the O's went 8-5-1...Two years later, in '86, he accompanied a U.S. Major League All-Star team that went 6-1 against an assortment of all-stars from Japan's Central and Pacific Leagues...Cal led that team in batting (.500, 14-7, 2b-2, hr-2, rbi-6) while splitting shortstop chores with the Cardinals' **Ozzie Smith**.

EJECTIONS: Has been ejected twice, both times in Baltimore: Sep 25, '87 by **Tim Welke** (vs Yankees) and Aug 7, '89 by **Drew Coble** (vs Minnesota)...In the latter case, he was thrown out in the 1st inning with an 0-2 count on him after the 1st 2 Orioles batters had been called out on strikes...**Brother Bill** has been tossed twice, both in '90, and Cal Sr has been ejected a family high 29 times (see Senior's biography).

GIDP: Bounced into 19 in '91 to boost his career total to 193, still a long way from the club record of 297 held by **Brooks Robinson**...Cal does, however, hold the club mark for one season, 32 in '85.

FIELDING

1991: Led AL shortstops in fielding percentage (.986) for the 2nd straight year; in putouts (267) for the 4th time; in assists (529) for the 6th time; total chances (807) for the 4th time and double plays (114) for the 5th time.

In '91, Cal made one error for every 73.4 chances...The remainder of the AL shortstops made one error every 33.6 chances...He was 4th in the majors in successful total chances per 9 innings (5.0) behind Cincinnati's **Barry Larkin** (5.2), Los Angeles' **Alfredo Griffin** (5.1) and Seattle's **Omeara Vizquel** (5.1).

Cal made only one error in his last 67 road games...On May 24 vs NY he committed 2 errors in one game for the 1st time since June 14, '87.

On May 5 he made his 1st error of the season, snapping a string of 53 straight errorless games, the 2nd longest streak of his career (see below for details of his longest, a ML record 95 games)...He also has a 47-game skein, Aug 5 thru Sep 23, '89.

Made 5 throwing errors in '91, but had made only 3 in 356 games prior to '91...Despite the 5 errant throws in '91, he has made only a total of 8 in his last 1,603 throws for the record (i.e. he's had 1,595 assists and only 8 throwing errors in that span).

LAST THREE SEASONS: Over the last 3 years, Cal has put together some incredible fielding numbers...He's averaged one error every 104 chances

while the rest of the regular Major League shortstops have averaged one error every 35 chances...Cal has 22 errors during the last 3 years, the other regular shortstops have averaged 46.

Cal has 80 more successful total chances than any other ML shortstop (Ripken-2279, Ozzie Guillen-2199) and has 5 fewer errors (Ripken-22, Spike Owen 27).

The top fielding shortstops the past 3 seasons: Ripken (TC-2301, E-22, .990)...Spike Owen (TC-1768, E-27, .985)...**Tony Fernandez** (TC-2232, E-35, .984)...Ozzie Smith (TC-1959, E-37, .981)...**Alan Trammell** (TC-1683, E-32, .981).

1990, AN ALL-TIME RECORD: Cal established 8 Major League fielding records in '90 including an all-time mark for highest fielding percentage and fewest errors by a shortstop, committing only 3 errors in 161 games (680 total chances) for a percentage of .996...Also set major league marks for consecutive errorless games (95) and consecutive chances without error (431).

After fumbling a ground ball on Apr 13 in the 3rd game of the season, Cal went 95 games and 431 chances before committing his 2nd miscue (ground ball muff also) 3½ months later, on July 28 (1st game) at K.C.

Cal broke the AL records of Detroit's **Eddie Brinkman** (72 consecutive errorless games and 331 straight errorless chances in '72)...He also shattered the ML marks of the NY Giants' **Buddy Kerr** (383 consecutive errorless chances in '46-'47) and the Mets' **Kevin Elster**, whose 88 games in a row without error in '88 and '89 were downgraded from a major league to an NL record.

ASSISTS RECORD: In '84 he established an A.L. record with 583 assists, breaking **Roy Smalley's** '79 mark of 572. That year, he also led major league shortstops in total chances (906).

NET CHANCES: His 880 successful total chances (net chances, excluding errors) in '84 were the most by an AL shortstop since the Twins' **Leo Cardenas** handled the same number in '69.

The only major league shortstop to have handled more errorless chances in one season since World War II is the Cardinals' **Ozzie Smith** (909 in '80).

3B to SS: Played both 3rd and short after 1st coming up in August '81, but started '82 as O's regular 3rd baseman...In 77 games at 3rd ('81-6, '82-71),

he has a .970 percentage (tc-232, e-7). Played there the last time July 8, '82 at Seattle, after starting game at shortstop...Started for the last time at 3rd on June 30, '82 in Baltimore vs Cleveland.

Since moving permanently to shortstop in '82, Cal has played with 2nd basemen and 29 3rd basemen.

PREVIOUS HONORS AND AWARDS

MOST VALUABLE PLAYER: Is the 1st Oriole to ever win 2 AL BBWAA Most Valuable Player awards, 10th in AL history to win more than one...Is one of only 3 active players to have won more than one mvp, joining Dale Murphy ('82 and '83) and Robin Yount ('82 and '89).

In '89, Rip finished 3rd in the BBWAA balloting with 216 votes, behind Yount (256) and Ruben Sierra (228).

In '83, he shaded teammate Eddie Murray, 322 to 290, to win the award as Orioles finished 1-2 in balloting...That wasn't unprecedented, however. In '66, Frank, Brooks and Boog were 1-2-3 (and Luis Aparicio has 9th)...Cal & Eddie were the only players listed on every '83 ballot.

Became the 1st to win "Rookie" and "MVP" honors in back-to-back years...Fred Lynn, of course, had done him one better in '75 by capturing both awards in the same year.

BART GIAMATTI "CARING AWARD": In '89, Cal was named the 1st winner of this prestigious new honor, created by the Baseball Alumni Team (BAT) in honor of the late Baseball Commissioner who died Sep 1, '89.

At the time of the announcement, BAT Chairman Ralph Branca said, "Just as Bart Giamatti was a caring person, so is Cal Ripken Jr. Giamatti's devotion to baseball and education is mirrored in the things that Cal has done." Cal, who has been a major community contributor for many years, had earlier joined with his wife, Kelly, to pledge \$250,000 to create an adult learning center in Baltimore (see "Community" below).

The award was presented the following month in New York by Giamatti's successor as commissioner, Fay Vincent...The '90 winner was Glenn Davis, for his work with youngsters while playing for the Astros in Houston.

MOST VALUABLE ORIOLE: In '91, he won his 4th Lou Hatter Maryland Sports Boosters "mvo" award, 2nd outright ('90-'91). He was co-winner with Eddie Murray ('83 & '88); finished 2nd 3 times ('85, '86, '89) and 3rd 3 times ('82, '84, '87).

ROOKIE OF THE YEAR: In '82, he registered 132 points (5-3-1 system) to beat out Twins' Kent Hrbek (90 points), the only other player named on all ballots. Wade Boggs was 3rd (10 1/2 points). Rip polled 24 1sts, and 4 2nd while Hrbek received 4 1sts, 23 2nd and a 3rd. Cal is one of 6 Orioles to have won BBWAA "Rookie" honors along with: Ron Hansen ('60), Curt Blefary ('63), Al Bumby ('73), Eddie Murray ('77) and Gregg Olson ('89).

PLAYER OF THE YEAR: Is now a 2-time winner Major League Player of the Year award given by TSN, and AL Player of the Year by both Baseball America and The Sporting News.

OTHERS: Has been picked for each of the following All-Star teams 6 times each (all '83 thru '86, '89, '91): Major League All-Star team; TSN A.L. All-Star team and TSN/Hillerich & Bradsby "Silver Slugger" teams (given to most productive offensive players at every defensive position).

PREVIOUS HIGHLIGHTS BY YEAR

1990 SEASON: Hit for his lowest average for a full season in the AL and his 21 homers were the least he's hit in his 10 full campaigns...Still led the Orioles in 9 offensive categories including runs (78), hits (150), doubles (28), triples (4), homers (21), rbi (84), walks (82), intentional walks (18), and game-tying or go-ahead rbi (39).

On June 13 after 59 games, Cal was dropped from #3 in the lineup to #6...Thru that date had been hitting only .209 (220-46) with 7 homers and 30 rbi. Over the rest of the season (102 games), he batted .274 (380-104) with 14 homers and 54 rbi.

This was the 4th time he's been victimized by a bad beginning. In '82 (his first full year) he was 7-for-60 (.117) in his first 18 games; in '88, Cal went

2-for-43 (.047) in his first 12 games; and in '89, he was 4-for-36 (.111) after 9 games.

Created an all-time standard for consistency at shortstop by committing only 3 errors in 161 games (681 total chances) for a percentage of .996. Also crafted streaks of 95 errorless games and 431 errorless chances, both all-time marks for a shortstop...See "Fielding" above.

On June 12, Cal played his 1,308th consecutive game and moved into 2nd place on the all-time list ahead of Everett Scott (Yankees-Red Sox, '18-'25).

1989 SEASON: Was named the "smartest player" in the AL in a Toronto SUN survey of managers, and finished 2nd in the Lou Hatter mvo vote to Greg Olson...He was last at or above .300 (.301) on June 5 (216-65), then batted .235 (430-101) the rest of the way...Went 40 games without a home run from Apr 10 (Frank Viola) until May 29 (Nolan Ryan)...That was the longest homerless streak of his career.

Led the club in hits (166), doubles (30) and rbi (93) and was 2nd to Mickey Tettleton in homers (26 to 21)...Combined with Brother Bill for 7 hits (Cal-3 and Bill-4) on Aug 2, the night the O's came from a 6-0 deficit at Boston to win after losing 13 of their last 14 games.

According to Al Kermisch, the only brother combo to surpass that combined total was the Waners (Paul and Lloyd) who had 3 and 5 respectively for the Bucs on June 25, '32.

1988 SEASON: Shared "MVO" honors with Eddie Murray for the 2nd time. Ranked 3rd in the league with a career-high 102 walks (Wade Boggs-125, Jack Clark-113)...His hit total declined for the 5th straight year, and also had a career-low 49 extra-base hits.

Hit 7 homers in his first 17 games after agreeing to a 3-year contract on July 27...Was only 2-for-43 (.047) after the 1st 12 games of the season (thru Apr 17), including an 0-for-29, the longest hitless streak of his career...Starting Apr 19, however, he launched one of his hottest streaks...Hit safely in 16 of the next 17 games, and batted .527 (55-29) while raising his average from .047 to .316 on May 8.

1987 SEASON: Became the 1st Oriole other than Murray to lead the club in rbi during the 80s...Ken Singleton was the last, in '79...Led club with 40 tying/lead runs driven in and batted .295 (149-44) with runners in scoring position despite a .252 average overall.

Was batting .326 (144-47) thru May 16 with 8 homers and 34 rbi in 36 games, but hit only .229 (480-110) the rest of the way with 16 homers and 64 rbi in his last 126 games...During 6-game stretch from Apr 29 thru May 6, Cal went 9-for-25, and all 9 hits were for extra bases (2b-4, 3b-1, hr-4).

1986 SEASON: Tied for league lead with Don Mattingly in gwrbi with 15...Led AL shortstops for 4th straight year in homers, rbi, runs and slugging (.461)...Was 2nd in fielding percentage to Tony Fernandez at shortstop, .982 to .983.

Was 1st other than Murray to lead club in homers (25) since Singleton in '79...Eddie had led 6 straight years...Led club in runs, hits, doubles, homers, total bases (289) and in tying/go-ahead runs driven in (33), yet finished 2nd to Murray in the "mvo" vote.

1985 SEASON: Was 2nd to Rickey Henderson in runs scored (146 to 116)...It was 3rd straight year he'd scored over 100 runs...Hit .282 overall, but had a .321 (165-53) average with men in scoring position...Was 1st or 2nd on the club in 12 offensive categories, and tied Murray in gwrbi (15)...Finished 2nd to Eddie in "mvo" vote.

1984 SEASON: Batted over .300 for 2nd straight year...Set AL record for assists by a shortstop (583)...Went as long as 3 games without a hit only once...Batted .311 (148-46) with runners in scoring position to lead club...Hit .355 (242-86) over 60 games from June 27 thru Sep 1.

From Sep 1, '83 thru May 9, '84, Cal hit .372 (258-96) with 16 homers and 41 rbi over 63 games...Led Major League shortstops in chances with 906 and net chances (880), most in AL since Leo Cardenas in '69.

1983 SEASON: Was AL mvp and TSN Player of the Year, and shared MVO laurels with Murray...Played on AL's 1st winning All-Star team since '71, and also played on the winning team in both the ALCS & World Series.

Led majors in hits with a club record 211 and doubles (47); was 2nd with 76 extra-base hits to the Expos' Andre Dawson (78), and, with 343 total

bases, was runner-up to major league leader **Jim Rice** (344)...Cal led the AL with 121 runs, just one off **Frank Robinson's** club record set in '66...His .318 average was 3rd highest in club history behind **Ken Singleton's** .328 in '77 and **Bob Nieman's** .322 in '56.

Stretch Run: During 44 games from Aug 13 thru Sep 25, a period in which the O's went 34-10 to win the Eastern Division Championship, Cal hit .301 (192-75) with 14 doubles, 9 homers, 30 rbi and 40 runs scored.

Post-Season: Batted a combined .273 (33-9) in 9 post-season games...Drove in O's only run in 9th inning of ALCS #1, won by **LaMar Hoyt**, 2-1...Made final putout of WS when he caught **Garry Maddox'** line drive in bottom of 9th, Game #5.

1982 SEASON: Led all major league rookies in doubles, homers, rbi, total bases (284), gwrb (11, tied with **Von Hayes**), games (160), at bats (660), and runs.

Missed only 3 games all year, none after May 29th (his games streak began the following day)...Played 44 straight errorless games at 3rd base from Apr 24 thru June 14...Stole his 1st big league base the hard way, stealing home on the front end of a double steal with **Lenn Sakata** off the **Rangers' Jon Matlack** on May 31 in Baltimore.

Slow Start: After a glittering opening day on which he went 3-for-5 with his 1st big league double, homer (off KC's **Dennis Leonard**) and rbi, he plunged into a deep slump (55-4)...He was batting only .117 (60-7) on May 1 after 18 games...His career big league average over 2 seasons was at that point .121 (99-12) in 41 games.

Start of Something Big: The next day, May 2, he picked up a pair of scratch hits, and was beaned by fellow rookie **Mike Moore**...He missed only one game after the beaning, however, and batted .281 (538-151) from May 2 to the end of the season.

1981 SEASON: Recalled from Rochester Aug 8 right after the major league player strike was settled...Made big league debut as **pinch runner** Aug 10 for **Singleton** in Baltimore against the Royals...His 1st hit was a single off Chicago's **Dennis Lamp** on Aug 16, also at Memorial Stadium.

Played in 12 games at short (9 starts) and 6 at 3rd...After Sep 11, he didn't make a plate appearance, and appeared in only 2 games.

Rochester: Despite his early recall from Rochester, he was voted "Rookie of the Year" in the International League, and was named to the loop's All-Star team at 3rd base...In survey of IL's managers and coaches, Rip was picked as top major league prospect in the league (**Von Hayes** was 2nd)...Played in 85 games at 3rd for Red Wings and 35 at shortstop (primarily when **Bob Bonner** was injured).

Winter Ball: Led Puerto Rican League in rbi (49) after '81 season, and was "mvp" on the Caguas club, managed by then- Orioles' pitching coach **Ray Miller**.

The biggest lead they've blown (and lost the game) is also 8, the same year. The O's led the Indians, 9-1, after 3 1/2 at Cleveland on June 27, '56, but lost 12-11 in 11 innings. The loser was **Hal Brown** on an 11th inning game-winning single by **Chico Carrasquel**.

The major league record for coming from behind is 12. It's been done twice: 1-on June 11, '11, by the Tigers who spotted the White Sox a 13-1 lead before storming back to win 16-15; 2-on June 15, '25, by the Philadelphia Athletics who trailed by 12 before rallying for a 17-15 victory.

The Orioles' starting lineup in that first Baltimore game: **Bobby Young** (2b), **Eddie Waitkus** (1b), **Gil Coan** (cf), **Vic Wertz** (rf), **Sam Mele** (lf), **Billy Hunter** (ss), **Courtney** (c) and **Turley** (p).

ORIOLES 1ST GAME ANYWHERE

The O's opened their 1st season, not in Baltimore, but in Detroit on Apr 13, '54 and lost to the Tigers, 3-0, **Steve Gromek** over **Don Larsen**. The following day, still in Detroit, the O's gained their 1st win as **Duane Pillette** went the route to beat **Ray Herbert**, 3-2...The distinction of driving in the O's 1st run ever went to outfielder **Sam Mele** with a single in the 1st inning.

From '59 thru '88, the Orioles trained and played their games in Miami. Last spring, however, the O's worked out in Twin Lakes Park, then played an abbreviated home schedule also in Sarasota at Ed Smith Stadium, home of the Chicago White Sox. It snapped a string of 32 straight years in which the O's had played their home schedule in Miami.

The Miami connection persists, however, because for the 5th straight exhibition season, the Birds will play a couple of games at Joe Robbie Stadium (Mar 28 & 29 vs Toronto). Last year the O's and Yankees attracted the 2 largest crowds ever to see a baseball game played in Florida: 67,654 on Mar 30 and 57,359 on Mar 31. This will also be the 5th straight spring the Orioles have played an exhibition at RFK Stadium in Washington.

ORIOLES TO HOST '93 ALL-STAR GAME

The 1993 All-Star Game will be played in Baltimore in July 1993 at Oriole Park in Camden Yards...It will be the 2nd Major League All-Star Game for the city, the 1st in 35 years (1958)...In the previous game, the A.L. defeated the N.L., 4-3, and the O's **Billy O'Dell** was the game's MVP after hurling 3 scoreless innings in relief to earn a save.

EARL WEAVER

Earl Weaver's distinguished achievements as the Orioles' Manager from mid-1968 through 1982, and again from June '85 through 1986 have made him a serious contender for election to the Baseball Hall of Fame.

He might not make it this year, but, if not, it's only a matter of time.

An Orioles Hall of Famer, Earl is also one of only 5 whose uniform number has been retired as a gesture of appreciation for all they have accomplished (along with **Brooks** and **Frank Robinson**, **Jim Palmer** and **Eddie Murray**).

His winning percentage as a manager (.583, 1480-1060) ranks 6th all-time, and he still holds the record for most American League Championship Series games managed (22) and won (15).

He won 3 straight pennants ('69-'70-'71), 5 division championships in 6 seasons, and in one stretch covering both his minor and major league career, he managed 24 consecutive winning ballclubs.

His 5 100-win seasons tie him for 2nd all-time with **Joe McCarthy**, behind **Connie Mack** (6).
