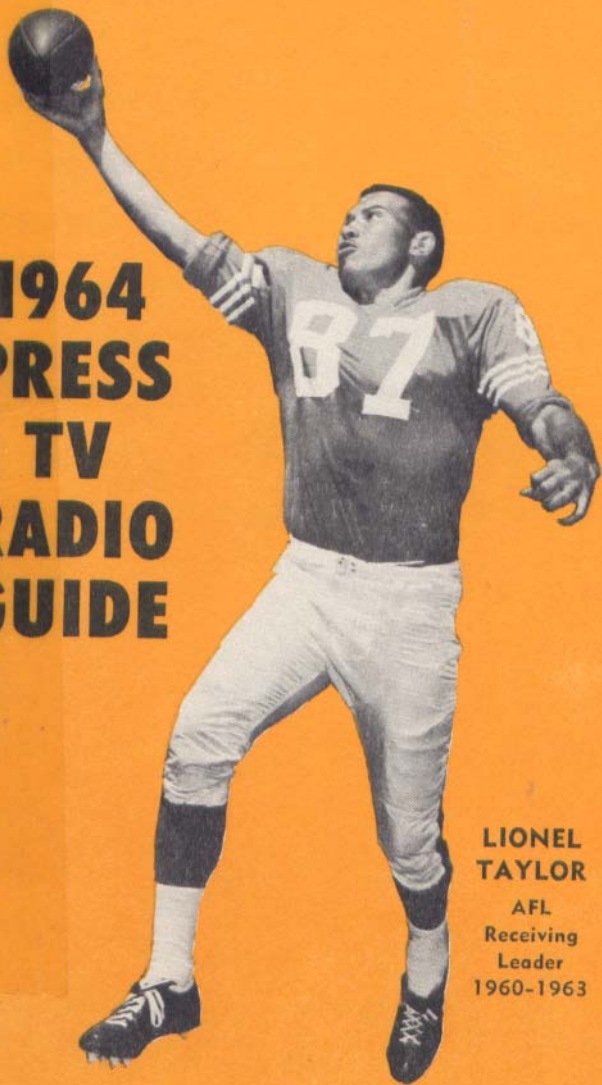

**Calvin W. Kunz, Jr.**

President  
The Denver Broncos

The future of professional football in Denver, capital of Colorado and economic giant of the vast Rocky Mountain area, is assured. The fact that this is so can be credited almost wholly to Calvin W. Kunz, Jr., president of the Broncos, and the small group of civic-minded Denver businessmen who have pledged themselves to the perpetuation of top-flight professional sports in their home city.

Kunz, an energetic, enthusiastic former Marine colonel, has displayed an active interest in the professional sports scene for many years. He first was a director in the original Rocky Mountain Empire Sports, Inc., operator of the Denver Bears at a time when that baseball team was the top drawing club in the entire minor league scene.

Kunz and his present associates took over the corporation in the spring of 1961 at a time when transfer of the franchise from Denver appeared imminent. That the Broncos and Bears have made such giant strides in just a little over three years is not only a little short of amazing, but it is also a credit to the dynamic, untiring efforts of Kunz.

Even though Cal owns his own corporate farming-marketing business, he has devoted a preponderance of his time in the last three and one-half years to the operation of the Broncos and Bears. It goes without saying that Kunz, as operator of the only combined football-baseball professional sports enterprise in America, is now recognized as one of the nation's foremost sports personalities.

A graduate of the University of Denver and Harvard Business School, Kunz served 39 months in the South Pacific during World War II. He participated in the historic and bloody battles at Guadalcanal, Bougainville, Guam and Iwo Jima.

After the war, Cal assumed the presidency of the business he now runs, a business that involves corporate farming in Arizona and marketing in the eastern United States.

But his native community benefits most from his dedication to sports in Denver and his operation of the Bears and Broncos.

Cal and his wife, Missy, have three daughters.

## JACK FAULKNER

General Manager - Head Coach

When they write the sports history books and insert the chapter on the Denver Broncos, there is little question that the year 1962 will stand out as a memorable one, the year that Bronco football fortunes were rejuvenated at a time when such a resurgence was an absolute "must."

The man behind that big year, the man whose name will always be indelibly etched on the Broncos honor roll is Jack Faulkner, head coach and general manager of the Broncos.

Starting his third season in 1964 as head man with the Broncos, the 38-year-old Faulkner supplies youth and enthusiasm along with the experience he has gained through years of service in the coaching profession. It is a rare combination and one that suits him perfectly for the team strategist — businessman — public relations role he must fill.

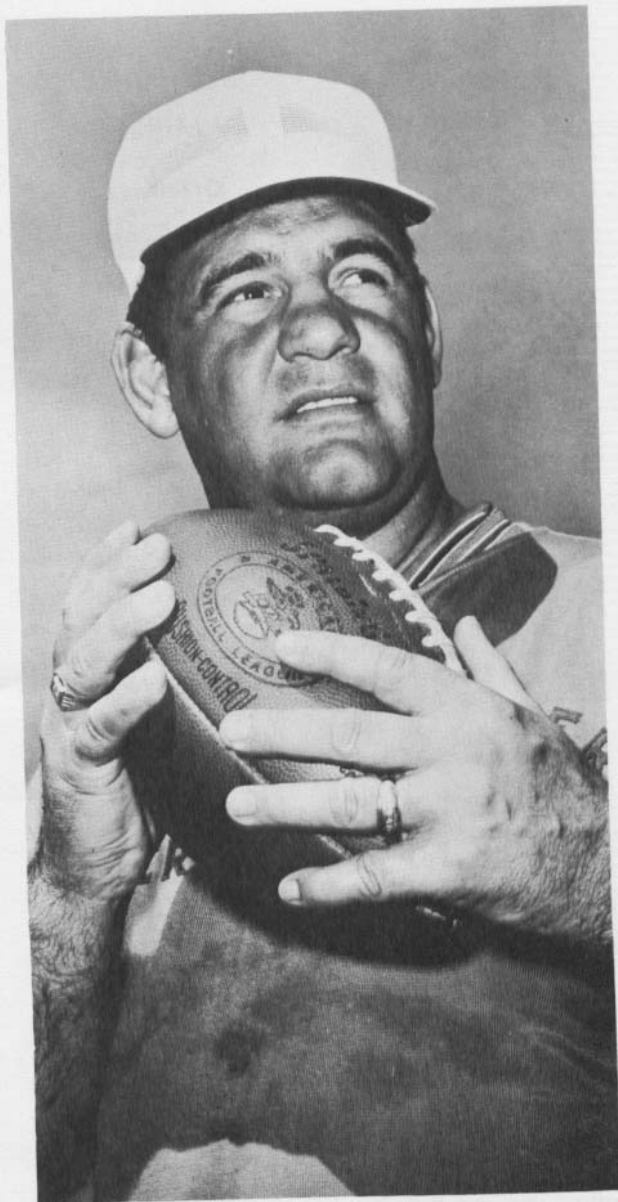
Faulkner, who came to Denver in January, 1962, after a much publicized screening by the Broncos management of coaching candidates from every corner of the nation, startled the football world with his fantastic "in-just-one-year" job of lifting the Broncos from the doldrums of the American Football League to the status of a league power to be reckoned with.

That year, 1962, brought the Broncos a 7-7 record in AFL play and 175,413 total home attendance, more than had seen the Broncos play in the 1960 and 1961 seasons combined. It brought Faulkner "AFL Coach of the Year" awards from both Associated Press and United Press International and the recognition from his own state of turning in "The Sports Achievement of the Year" for 1962. Not only was the tireless Faulkner a magician with the Broncos on the field, he also proved to be a top-notch public relations asset in speaking appearances throughout the state.

Born in Youngstown, Ohio, on April 4, 1926, Faulkner saw duty with the U.S. Marines during World War II and participated in the bloody battles of Saipan and Okinawa. He finished his high school education after the war and then enrolled at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. It was there that he first came in contact with Sid Gillman, who at that time was his Miami football coach. Faulkner also lettered in baseball and track at Miami.

Professionally, Jack first joined Gillman as an assistant coach at the University of Cincinnati. Faulkner moved with Gillman to the Los Angeles Rams in 1955, then to the Los Angeles Chargers and on to San Diego when the Chargers moved to that southern California border city. The Gillman-Faulkner working relationship was finally culminated in 1962, when Jack accepted the Denver job, and the traditional rivalry between the teacher and the student that ensued has now developed into one of the top feuds in the American Football League.

Jack and his wife, Betty, have two children, Cathy 12, and Jon, 2.

The personable redhead from Macomb, Ill., is now in his second season as chief overseer of the Broncos offensive line play after building formidable offensive lines for the Boston Patriots and the Buffalo Bills.

Immediately after graduation from Western Illinois University in 1950, the 6-0, 215 pound Miller became head football coach at Astoria, Ill. High School where he stayed for 2 years. He then moved to Canton High as line coach and thence to Carthage High School.

Returning to Western in 1957 to study toward a Master's Degree, he became line coach under Lou Saban where he began a long association. Winning 21 of 26 games including a 16-game winning streak, they climaxed this by moving to the Patriots in 1960. After Saban moved to Buffalo in 1962 as head coach, Red joined him there and the team, after a horrendous 0-5 start, finished up with a 7-6-1 record.

Red and his wife, Nancy Sue, have been married 12 years. They have two children, Stephen Michael, 9, and Lana Sue, 7.



**Mac Speedie**  
**Offensive  
End Coach**

Mac Speedie is in his third year as Denver's offensive end coach, after two highly successful seasons with the Houston Oilers. His work in developing their receivers enabled Houston to win league titles both years.

Speedie, 44, was born in Odell, Ill., but was raised in Salt Lake City and starred at the University of Utah where he was an All-Conference end for three seasons in the immediate pre-World War II years.

After serving in the Army, he joined the Cleveland Browns where he played from 1946-53. He led the old All-America Conference in receptions from 1946-49 and the NFL in 1952. He then went to Canada and was with Regina in 1954-55, and Vancouver in 1956.

Mac and his wife live in Broomfield, Colo., and have two children.



**Ray Malavasi**  
**Defensive  
Line Coach**

Although not unique, Ray Malavasi makes the unusual change of assignments from finding talent, as Denver's Personnel Director for the past two years, to that of building and teaching talent as the Broncos new defensive line coach this year.

Ray was born Nov. 8, 1930, at Clifton, N. J. He earned many All-State honors while playing high school ball and then entered the United States Military Academy at West Point in 1949.

In 1951 he switched to Mississippi State and received his degree in civil engineering in 1952. After one season with the Philadelphia Eagles, Malavasi entered the Army and coached and played football at Fort Belvoir, Va. He holds the reserve rank of captain.

After service he became an assistant coach at Mississippi State and went to Minnesota in a similar capacity for two years. From there he went to Memphis State for three seasons and then to Wake Forest for a year in 1961.

Ray is married to the former Mary Fleming and they have five children.



**George Dickson**  
**Defensive  
Backfield Coach**

A new addition to the Broncos coaching staff, George Dickson is certainly not new to the rigors of the coaching wars in either college or professional ball.

George started his coaching career in 1951 after graduating from Notre Dame the preceding year. He was a member of Frank Leahy's undefeated national championship team in 1949.

He coached at his Alma Mater in 1954 and 1955 and at Marquette in 1956. The following year, he migrated to the West when he spent a year with Southern California and three years at College of Pacific.

His last two years were with Bud Wilkinson at Oklahoma after a year with the Oakland Raiders in 1961.

He was born in Boston, Mass., and is single.

Seventeen years of coaching and a working relationship with over 75 percent of the coaches in the country are Bill Meek's qualifications as Denver's new talent scout.

A graduate of the University of Tennessee, Meek began his coaching career while in the Army, serving as head mentor of the Ft. Benning team in 1945. In two years with the Army team, he lost only one game.

In 1947, he joined the coaching staff of the University of Maryland, and, in 1951 gained his first head coaching assignment with Kansas State. Four years later, he accepted the head job with the University of Houston to remold its young club. He promptly produced a league title his second year.

Bill continued to accept challenges and rebuild young teams, and, in 1957, took over the number one job at Southern Methodist University. By November of 1958, he succeeded in bringing the Mustangs back into the national football limelight.

Meek spent a total of five years with SMU, leaving the University in 1961 to go into private business in Dallas.

He is married, has four children, and makes his home in Dallas during the off-season.

## BRIEF BRONCO HISTORY

Denver was a charter member of the American Football League, one of the five original cities. The present owners, a group of prominent Denver business men and civic leaders headed by Calvin W. Kunz, Jr., took over the operation of the club on June 1, 1961, and hired the present General Manager and Head Coach Jack Faulkner in early 1962. Faulkner led the Broncos to the runner-up post in the Western Division in 1962 and earned for himself the title of Coach of the Year by both AP and UPI.

Rocky Mountain Empire Sports, Inc., operating company, is unique in that it operates the Denver Bears baseball team of the Pacific Coast League and owns Bears Stadium. Thus, the Broncos are the only pro football team which owns its own stadium. Bears Stadium seats 34,264 for football and 25,000 for baseball.

Other owners include Gerald H. Phipps, contractor, chairman of the board; Ed Hirschfeld, printing company executive; Walter Emery, Bank President; Charles W. Schoelzel, vice-president brokerage house; Allan R. Phipps, attorney; Ben F. Stapleton, Jr., attorney; Robert Person, president, utility company.

Joined Broncos for try-out in 1960 on recommendation of his brother, Bill, who was traded to Boston shortly thereafter . . . Earned Master's Degree at Colorado State College . . . Works for Denver Distributing Company in off-season . . . Married (Linda) . . . One son . . . Born Oct. 4, 1935 at Clay Center, Kansas.**

**ALFRED FREDDIE DENSON — Split End — 22 . . . 6-3 . . . 220 . . . Jacksonville, Fla. . . . Florida A & M — A rookie with the "can't miss" label for future stardom . . . Small College All-America (1963) . . . All Conference (1961 thru '63) . . . Teammate of Bronco Hewritt Dixon for two years . . . In a backfield considered to be the fastest in the nation . . .
