Gerald H. Phipps

Chairman of the Board



A member of one of Colorado's pioneer families, Gerry Phipps has been a sports enthusiast all of his life. But it is doubtful that the 50-year-old president of Gerald H. Phipps Inc. Construction Company ever dreamed he would be so closely associated with the professional sports world as he has been since February 15, 1965, the day that he and his brother, Allan, purchased control of the Broncos and Denver Bears baseball team. And the sensational season ticket drive that followed was, at least partly, due to the personal popularity of the Phipps brothers, and the public's way of saying "Thank You" from an enthusiastic city.

Gerry has been a member of the board of directors of Empire Sports since 1947 but has become actively involved with the operation of the Bears and Broncos only in the last year.

A member of the Denver Country Club, the Denver Athletic Club, Denver Club, Cherry Hills Country Club and the Williams Club of New York, Gerry is a native Denverite.

Gerry was born March 4, 1915, to Lawrence C. and Margaret Rogers Phipps and earned his A.B. degree from Williams College, Williamstown, Mass., in 1936.

He was employed by the Denver and Rio Grande Western Railroad from then until he entered the Navy as ensign in May, 1942.

Following his separation from the service in 1945, he was employed by a general contracting firm in Denver until 1952, when he formed his present company. In 1958, he was elected Vice-President and Treasurer of California Electric Power Co. He is a past president of the Associated Building Contractors of Colorado, Inc., and a director of the First National Bank.

Gerry was married in New York City on Sept. 24, 1937, to the former Janet Alice Smith and they have three daughters.

Allan R. Phipps

President



Allan R. Phipps, 52, and like his brother Gerry, a native of Denver, is a man of many achievements. A partner in the Denver law firm of Hughes and Dorsey, Phipps received a bachelor's degree from Williams College in 1934, a master's degree from Oxford University (England) in 1936 and law degree from the University of Denver in 1937.

A Phi Beta Kappa, he was admitted to the Colorado Bar in 1938. He joined Hughes and Dorsey in 1956. He is also a director of the Denver Tramway Corporation, Cherry Creek National Bank, Belcaro Realty Investment Company, International Realty Company and Highlander Hotel Corporation.

Although he has never run for public office, he has been active in Republican party affairs for many years and served as chairman of the Colorado GOP finance committee from 1952 through 1955.

He is also a trustee of Williams College, the University of Denver, the Denver Museum of Natural History, Denver Symphony Society and Graland Country Day School. He also is chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Winter Park Recreational Association and board manager of St. Luke's Hospital in Denver. During the war, he served in the U. S. Naval Reserve from 1942 to 1946, attaining the rank of lieutenant commander.

Like his father, the late U. S. Senator Lawrence Cowle Phipps, and other members of his family, Allan shuns publicity and frequently makes anonymous financial contributions to various worthy causes. But he and his brother could not escape the publicity resulting from the sale of the Broncos franchise last February and since that time both have become even more popular public figures.

Allan is married to the former Clara Mitchell Van Schaack. He has two sons and a daughter.

Mac Speedie

Head Coach



There are a variety of reasons for the new and healthy air of optimism that prevails in the Denver Broncos football camp for the 1965 season. But one of the major reasons is the presence of Coach Max Speedie, who already has won the unified support and confidence of the Bronco owners, his fellow coaches, the Denver players, the Bronco staff, the press and, most important, the large legion of Denver fans since he took over the head coaching job under the most difficult circumstances last October 5.

Speedie, 45, a native of Odell, Ill., inherited a football team that had not won a league game in 14 starts and was winless in its first four games of 1964. It took Mac and his staff just one week—until the first game under the new command—to change that situation. The Broncos upset Kansas City, 33-27, in Mac's first game, and although they managed only one more win and one more tie in the next nine games, they came within a whisker of winning four or five more games and generally earned the reputation of being a vastly improved team and one of the hardest hitting, most spirited teams in the American Football League.

But Mac did more than just engineer an improved performance from his football team. He wasted no time in emphasizing to the fans the important part they played in a winning football situation and immediately threw all practice sessions open to the public, something that hadn't been done before. When the vociferous Denver crowd spontaneously gave birth to the "Go, Broncos, Go" chant in the Kansas City game, Mac even turned to the crowd to lead the cheers. He has made a big hit in numerous off-season speaking appearances throughout the Denver and Colorado area.

Speedie was raised in Salt Lake City and was an all-Skyline Conference end at the University of Utah in 1939, 1940 and 1941. A 1942 graduate of the University of Utah, he was considered one of the finest football players ever to attend Utah, a school that has produced many fine football names.

After serving in the United States Army during World War II, Mac embarked on an illustrious playing career in professional football that began with the Cleveland Browns in 1946 and ended with Vancouver in Canada in 1955. Mac was with the Browns in first the All-American Conference and then the National Football League through the 1952 season and, during this period, was named to the all-league team six of seven years. He led his league in pass receptions five times in those seven years. Speedie played at Regina in 1953 and 1954 before completing his career in Vancouver.

He began his coaching career with the Houston Oilers as end coach in 1960 and 1961 and then joined the Denver staff as offensive end coach before the 1962 season.

Mac and his wife, Lynn, have a new home in southeast Denver. Their son, Mike, 19, is currently a sophomore at the University of Utah, where he is a varsity football candidate in 1965. The Speedies also have a daughter, Rebecca, 10.

James H. Burris

Executive Vice-President

Head of the Empire Sports Inc. organization, which operates both the Denver Broncos and the Denver Bears baseball team, is James H. Burris. He was appointed to the newly-created position of executive vice-president in late May, 1965, an appointment that was met with wide acceptance in the Denver area.

Born October 5, 1922, in New Castle, Indiana, Burris attended Coffeyville, Kans., Junior College, the University of Georgia and the University of Missouri School of Journalism. A veteran of three years service in the U. S. Army during World War II, Burris has served in such widely-varied capacities as a sports writer on the Coffeyville, Kans., Daily Journal (1941-42), athletic publicity director at Missouri (1945-46), writer for the Sporting News (1947) and publicity and promotion director for the American Legion national baseball program (1948-50).

Burris joined the American Association as secretary and director of the league's Service Bureau in 1950 and held that post until November, 1960, when he was named the 11th president of the American Association. He later served as a special assistant to Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick (1963) and president of the Texas League (1964) before joining Empire Sports in January, 1965, as general manager of the Bears.

Jim and his wife, Mary Jane, live in suburban Lakewood and have six children—Bobby 14, Barbara 13, Susan 10, Billy 8, Theresa 6 and Patrice 5.



Fred Gehrke

Director of Player Personnel

Fred Gehrke, 46, a former football star at the University of Utah and with the Cleveland Browns and Los Angeles Rams, was named to the post of player personnel director of the Broncos in January, 1965. He has proven to be an outstanding asset to the organization.

Gehrke, a native of Salt Lake City, Utah, was an all-professional halfback with the world champion Cleveland Rams in 1945. Later, as a member of the Los Angeles Rams, he served as a player-coach in 1948 and 1949 and then concluded his active playing career in 1950. He first started his pro career with the Rams in 1940 and then played with the Los Angeles Bulldogs in the wartime Pacific Coast League in 1941 through 1944. He previously was an outstanding scholar-athlete at Utah in 1937, 1938 and 1939.

Gehrke remained close to the game after his retirement and did color commentary with Tom Harmon on radio and television football broadcasts for the next 13 years. He also served as administrator of publications for the Northrup Aircraft Corp. from 1940 until 1963 and was general manager of the May Co. department store in the world's largest shopping center, Topanga Plaza in Los Angeles, before joining the Broncos in 1965.

Gehrke is married and has two daughters, Bonnie 17, and Cathy, 16.



Bob (Red) Miller

Offensive
Line Coach

The personable redhead from Macomb, Ill., is now in his third season as chief overseer of the Broncos offensive line play after building formidable offensive lines for the Boston Patriots and the Buffalo Bills.

Bob was born Oct. 31, 1927, and grew up loving football from his earliest memory. After high school graduation he attended Western Illinois University where, between football seasons, he earned a B.S. in Education in June, 1950. He was a four-year letterman at offensive guard and linebacker and was voted Western's Most Valuable Player over three consecutive seasons and capped his career by being named to the Little All-America in his senior year.

Immediately after graduation the 6-0, 215 pound Miller became head football coach at Astoria, Ill. High School where he stayed for 2 years. He then moved to Canton High as line coach and thence to Carthage High School.

Returning to Western in 1957 to study toward a Masters Degree, he became line coach under Lou Saban where he began a long association. Winning 21 of 26 games including a 16-game winning streak, they climaxed this by moving to the Patriots in 1960. After Saban moved to Buffalo in 1962 as head coach, Red joined him there and the team, after a horrendous 0-5 start, finished up with 7-6-1 record.

Red and his wife, Nancy Sue, have been married 13 years. They have two children, Stephen Michael, 10, and Lana Sue, 8.



Bus Mertes

Offensive
Backfield Coach

The only new member of the Denver Broncos coaching staff for 1965 is Bus Mertes, who will have the job of offensive backfield coach. Mertes, 45, joined the Bronco staff in April, 1965, after a long gridiron career as a player and a coach.

A 1942 graduate of the State University of Iowa, Mertes followed his Hawkeye football days with the Iowa Pre-Flight teams of 1942, 1943, and 1944. Then the backfield star began a five-year professional playing career in 1945 that took him to Chicago Cardinals, Los Angeles Dons, Baltimore Colts and New York Giants.

His coaching career began at Bradley University in 1950 through 1952. Then he was backfield coach at Kansas State for two seasons before taking over the head job with the Wildcats in 1955. He coached there five seasons before becoming head coach at Drake University in Des Moines in 1960. He stayed there until joining the Broncos last spring. His 1962 Bulldogs compiled an 8-2 record, tying the Drake school record, set in 1937, for wins in one season.

Possessing a keen sense of humor and always ready with the quip, Mertes has proven to be a popular addition to the Denver staff. He and his wife, Pauline, have five children, Mike 15, Sally 12, Kelly 10, Ann 6, and Mary 4.



Ray Malavasi

Defensive
Line Coach



Proving his versatility, Ray Malavasi made the unusual change of assignments from finding talent, as Denver's Personnel Director in 1962 and 1963, to that of building and teaching talent as the Broncos defensive line coach in 1964. Malavasi's efforts in the new job were reflected in the vigorous late-season defensive play of the 1964 Broncos.

Ray was born Nov. 8, 1930, at Clifton, N.J. He earned many All-State honors while playing high school ball and then entered the United States Military Academy at West Point in 1949. A dogged and determined lineman, he won honorable mention on several All-Americans in 1950.

In 1951 he switched to Mississippi State and received his degree in civil engineering in 1952. After one season with the Philadelphia Eagles, Malavasi entered the Army and coached and played football at Fort Belvoir, Va. He holds the reserve rank of captain.

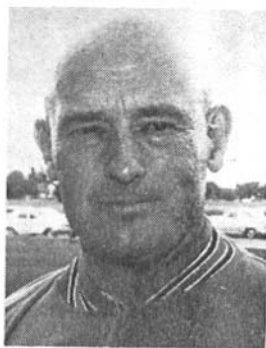
After service he became an assistant coach at Mississippi State and went to Minnesota in a similar capacity for two years. From there he went to Memphis State for three seasons and served as defensive line coach.

He was named chief assistant to Coach Billy Hildebrand at Wake Forest in 1961, a post he held until he joined the Broncos staff.

Ray is married to the former Mary Fleming and they have five children.

George Dickson

Defensive
Backfield Coach



George Dickson, who joined the Broncos coaching staff before the 1964 season, is a veteran of the coaching wars in both college and professional ball.

George started his coaching career in 1951 after graduating from Notre Dame the preceding year. He was a member of Frank Leahy's undefeated national championship team in 1949, playing halfback and quarterback. He was also middleweight and light heavyweight boxing champion for the "Fighting Irish."

He coached at his Alma Mater in 1954 and 1955 and at Marquette in 1956. The following year, he migrated to the West where he spent a year with Southern California and three years at College of Pacific.

In 1961, he joined the staff of the Oakland Raiders. Although the Bay team wasn't a winner that year, Dickson was instrumental in molding the Oakland secondary into the third finest defensive unit in the league.

He spent 1962 and 1963 with Bud Wilkinson at Oklahoma.

Dickson was a paratrooper during World War II with the 101st Airborne Division participating in the air drop on D-Day in Normandy, besides fighting in the Battle of the Bulge.

He was born in Boston, Mass., and is single.

1959

August 14—First American Football League organizational meeting held in Chicago. Denver, with Bob Howsam as its principal owner, named as a charter member along with New York, Dallas, Los Angeles, Minneapolis and Houston.

November 22—First player selection draft held through 32 rounds. Denver's first pick is Roger LeClerc, center, Trinity.

November 30—Joe Foss named American Football League commissioner.

December 1—Dean Griffing named general manager of the Broncos.

December 2—Second player selection draft of 20 rounds held.

1960

January 1—Frank Filchuck named first head coach of the Broncos.

January 30—Denver placed in AFL's western division with Dallas, Oakland and Los Angeles.

Spring—Frank Tripucka and Chuck Gavin, with Canadian experience, and NFL veteran, Bud McFadin, coming out of retirement, join squad. Also joining squad is unknown Gene Mingo, without college experience, who later proves to be one of the game's great placekickers.

June 9—AFL signs five-year television contract with the American Broadcasting Company.

July—First Bronco training camp opens at Colorado School of Mines.

July 29—First annual intra-squad game played at Colorado School of Mines.

September 9—After losing all five pre-season exhibition games, the Broncos become the first AFL victor when they defeat the Patriots in Boston in history's first AFL game, 13-10. Attendance—21,597.

September 23—Lionel Taylor, a cut of the Chicago Bears, plays first game for Broncos in New York. He is destined to become the league's greatest pass receiver.

October 2—Broncos play first home game in Bears Stadium, defeat Oakland, 31-14, before crowd of 18,372.

November 27—Broncos, down 38-7 late in the third quarter, stage historic 31-point rally to tie Buffalo, 38-38.

December—Offensive End Lionel Taylor, Defensive Tackle Bud McFadin and Safety Goose Gonsoulin all named to first official all-AFL team.

1961

May 26—Bob and Lee Howsam, original principal owners of the Broncos, sell their stock to a new syndicate headed by Cal Kunz and Gerry Phipps.

June 1—Cal Kunz named president and operating head of Empire Sports.

December—Lionel Taylor sets professional record with 100 pass receptions for season. Taylor and Bud McFadin named to all-AFL team.

December—Frank Filchock fired as Broncos head coach.

1962

February 1—Jack Faulkner hired as Broncos head coach.

July 1—Dean Griffing fired as Broncos general manager. Faulkner named to dual post as head coach and general manager.

July—Public burning ceremonies of Broncos' notorious vertically striped socks at Broncos' intra-squad game.

August 24—Broncos defeat Dallas Texans, 27-24, in Fort Worth in first overtime game played by the Broncos. It was also Denver's first win over the Texans.

September 7—Broncos open regular season with 31-21 win over defending western division champion San Diego before turnaway crowd at historic D.U. Stadium.

October 21—Broncos defeat Houston, 20-10, before 34,496 at Bears Stadium, largest crowd ever to see a sports event in Denver. Season record upped to 6-1 with win.

December—Jack Faulkner named coach of the year in the AFL. Gene Mingo set professional field goal record of 27 in a season. Eldon Danenhauer, Lionel Taylor, Goose Gosoulin and Bob Zeman named to the official all-AFL team.

1963

July 18—Bronco rookies defeat Houston rookies, 17-14, before 6500 in Colorado Springs in first pro rookie game ever played.

August—Charlie Mitchell, Tom Janik and Tom Nomina, all future Broncos, play in College All-Star game in Chicago.

September 16—Frank Tripucka retires.

October 13—John McCormick injured in Houston game. Will not play again until the 1965 season.

Season—Fourteen rookies play regularly as Broncos start a youth rebuilding program. Tops among the rookies are Mickey Slaughter, Billy Joe, Charlie Mitchell, Willie Brown and Hewritt Dixon.

October 26—Paid attendance of 20,377 for Broncos-Jets game at the Polo Grounds largest crowd for an AFL game in that stadium.

December—Billy Joe named AFL rookie of the year. Goose Gosoulin only Bronco to make the all-AFL team. Lionel Taylor wins fourth straight pass receiving title.

1964

January—Broncos and Jets complete historic nine-player trade, largest ever made in the AFL. Broncos send Gene Prebola, Wahoo McCDaniel, Gordy Holz and Bob Zeman to Jets for Dick Guesman, Ed Cooke, Charlie Janerette, Jim Price and Sid Fournet.

January 29—AFL signs five-year television contract with the National Broadcasting Company for a record \$36,000,000.

August—Matt Snorton and Ray Kubala, Bronco signees, play in College All-Star game.

August 14—Broncos obtain quarterback Jack Lee from Houston in unique "lend-lease" trade for Bud McFadin, No. 1 draft choice and cash.

September 12—Jets and Broncos open the regular season in New York's Shea Stadium before a record crowd of 53,190 (45,665 paid).

October 4—Jack Faulkner fired as head coach.

October 5—Mac Speedie accepts appointment as interim head coach.

October 11—Broncos win first game under Mac Speedie by defeating Kansas City, 33-27. "Go, Broncos, Go" chant is born.

December 12—Mac Speedie named permanent head coach.

December—Jim Fraser wins third straight punting title. Willie Brown named to all-AFL team. Broncos sign high draft choices Bob Breitenstein (Tulsa) and Gerry Bussell (Georgia Tech), both No. 1 picks of NFL teams.

1965

January 16—AFL meeting in Houston. Cal Kunz gives first public indication that all may not be well with Bronco franchise in Denver.

January 27—Broncos obtain Abner Haynes, all-time AFL rushing leader, in trade with Kansas City for Jim Fraser.

February 11—Fight to retain control of franchise breaks into public focus. Gerald and Allan Phipps are pitted against "Voting Trust" made up of six principal Empire Sports stockholders and headed by Cal Kunz.

February 15—Gerald and Allan Phipps purchase 52 percent of the stock of Empire Sports, thus giving them virtually 100 percent ownership and saving the Bronco franchise for Denver.

February 16—Fabulous season ticket drive begins with sale of 143 season tickets, a Denver record at that time.

February 24—Cookie Gilchrist, gridiron great, obtained from Buffalo in a trade for Billy Joe.

March 5—Record sale of 941 season tickets in one day.

April 1—Season ticket drive goal of 20,000 sales reached. Figure to reach 22,000 by May 1.

May 17—Allan Phipps named president of Empire Sports, Inc. Gerry Phipps re-named Chairman of the Board. Richard S. Kitchen, Sr., and Robert T. Person named to the board of directors.

May 29—Jim Burris, Bears general manager, named executive vice-president of Empire Sports Inc., a position carrying with it the duties normally associated with those of a football general manager.

August 6—Bob Breitenstein plays in College All-Star game in Chicago.

August 20—Jim Burris added to the board of directors of Empire Sports, Inc.

THE FABULOUS SEASON TICKET DRIVE OF 1965

No story of the 1965 Denver Broncos would be complete without prominent mention of the factor that is most certain to change the football atmosphere in Denver not only this season but for many years to come—the greatly increased attendance that is already assured because of the fabulous, stupendous, fantastic (you pick your own superlative) season ticket success of the Broncos last spring.

Rarely, if ever before, have fans in any city in any sport shown their appreciation for a sports enterprise to the extent that Denver and Colorado fans rallied behind the Broncos this spring. It was largely a spontaneous burst of appreciation shown in the most tangible way possible, by cash-in-hand support at the box office, to the Phipps brothers, Gerry and Allan, who in turn had shown their faith in their city by purchasing the Bronco franchise, along with the Denver Bears of the Pacific Coast League in baseball, and Bears Stadium, on February 15. The purchase had been made from a voting trust made up of several members of the board of directors of Empire Sports, Inc., including former club president Cal Kunz. Just when it looked as though the Broncos were on their way out of Denver, the day was saved by the action of the Phipps brothers.

The very next day, the mad rush to the ticket office was on and, for days, Bronco season ticket sales dominated the sports pages and captured the fancy of every sports fan in the area. On February 16, 143 season tickets were sold, a new club record at the time. Within two weeks, the pace had jumped to better than 800 a day and an all-time high of 941 sales was recorded on March 5.

When the Phipps brothers gained control of the Broncos, 1965 season ticket sales stood at 3347. By March 1, the 1964 season ticket total of 7996 had been surpassed. On March 16, the campaign passed the 1964 average attendance figure of 16,894. The primary goal of 20,000, set at the start of the official campaign, was reached on April 1. Reached on May 17 was 22,155, the same figure as the largest crowd to see the Broncos in Bears Stadium in 1965.

In their best previous year in 1962, the Broncos averaged 25,059 paid admissions. This figure may well be reached in 1965 season ticket sales, inasmuch as sales will be continued until just before the start of the regular season. Just how significant this all becomes can perhaps be better recognized when it is considered that the total season ticket sales for all five previous years of operation in Denver combined totalled only 29,258.

If the Broncos should reach their 25,000 figure, they could well end up second in the American Football League in season ticket sales this season. New York, playing in new and spacious Shea Stadium, will top the league with 40,000 or more season ticket holders. Buffalo, defending league champion, will be right around 25,000. No other club appears to be a threat to the top three of New York, Buffalo and Denver.

While much of the season-ticket buying this year in Denver was the reflection of a spontaneous burst of enthusiasm by the grateful fans of a grateful city and state, due credit must also be given to the organized part of the campaign. In ordinary years, the organized

sales campaign put together by a group of dedicated volunteers would have been considered a roaring success with highly gratifying results. Headed by Denver construction executive Nick Petry, the formal part of the drive perhaps accounted for 7000 sales. The Denver Bronco Quarterback Club, along with three satellite clubs in the Denver suburban areas that were organized during the ticket drive, accounted for more than 5000 sales.

Perhaps the most significant part of the drive that it was a response of the individual fan, and not the reflection of a mass "sand-bagging" operation aimed at large business and industry. When Petry officially opened the formal drive on February 23, he pointed out: "I would rather sell one ticket each to 1000 fans than 1000 tickets to one firm. If the weather is bad or the team is not doing well, the individual fan who has paid out his own money is more likely to see the game and also to renew his tickets for another season. What we really want to do is to convince companies not to buy tickets for their employees but instead to make it as easy as possible for these employees to purchase tickets, if they wish them."

To most veteran observers, this sounded idealistic, but also impractical. But as the drive unfolded, Petry's idea worked exactly as he outlined it. In the entire sales campaign, not one single order was for more than 100 tickets.

But industry did play a vital part in the ticket drive. Twenty-three companies in the Denver area, most of them with large numbers of employees on their payrolls, introduced either payroll deduction plans or credit union financing for employees who wanted Bronco season tickets.

Then to make it even easier for the average fan, the no-interest, no-charge bank loan was introduced. First adopted and designed by the Peoples Bank of suburban Aurora, it later was copied by 18 other financial institutions in the Denver area. Now requests for information on this unique bank-financing plan for season ticket purchases have come into both the Broncos office and the Peoples Bank from all over the country.

The most skeptical sports observers also are quick to admit now that the Bronco ticket success of the last few months has perhaps changed the atmosphere of the Colorado sports picture for all time to come. For the first time, Denver and Colorado fans have responded to a major league sports venture in a major league way and there is no telling what new avenues may be opened on the Colorado sports scene in the future. For instance, a \$10-a-plate Colorado Sports Hall of Fame banquet in April drew 1450 patrons after the closest sponsors of the banquet had originally predicted not more than 700 would attend a function in Denver at that price.

So February 15, 1965, and the two months that followed may always be regarded as the "turning point months" in Colorado's sports history. It is certain that this will be so for the Broncos, who were the happy heroes of a classic "rags to riches" story.

TELEVISION

Most games that the Denver Broncos play in 1965 will be telecast over the facilities of the National Broadcasting Company and those road games that are televised will be seen in Denver over Station KOA-TV (Channel 4). With the exception of the October 10 game, all of the Denver Broncos telecasts will be on a regional basis, meaning that they will be seen in the Denver network area (if not blacked out) and in the network area of the opposition team.

The Denver network area includes all of the states of Colorado, Utah, Wyoming and Montana, most of Idaho, and parts of Nebraska, South Dakota and possibly New Mexico.

The October 10 game will be televised on a coast-to-coast basis, if any team except the Los Angeles Dodgers or the San Francisco Giants is participating in the baseball World Series. If the Dodgers or Giants are in the World Series, thus forcing a World Series game in Los Angeles or San Francisco on October 10, the Denver-Kansas City game will not be telecast.
