Gerald H. Phipps

Chairman of the Board



A member of one of Colorado's pioneer families, Gerry Phipps has been a sports enthusiast all of his life. But it is doubtful that the 50-year-old president of Gerald H. Phipps Inc. Construction Company ever dreamed he would be so closely associated with the professional sports world as he has been since February 15, 1965, the day that he and his brother, Allan, purchased control of the Broncos and Denver Bears baseball team. And the sensational season ticket drive that followed in 1965 was, at least partly, due to the personal popularity of the Phipps brothers, and the public's way of saying "Thank You" from an enthusiastic city.

Gerry has been a member of the board of directors of Empire Sports since 1947 but actively involved with the operation of the Bears and Broncos only in the last two years.

A member of the Denver Country Club, the Denver Athletic Club, Denver Club, Cherry Hills Country Club and the Williams Club of New York, Gerry is a native Denverite.

Gerry was born March 4, 1915, to Lawrence C. and Margaret Rogers Phipps and earned his A.B. degree from Williams College, Williamstown, Mass., in 1936.

He was employed by the Denver and Rio Grande Western Railroad from then until he entered the Navy as ensign in May, 1942.

Following his separation from the service in 1945, he was employed by a general contracting firm in Denver until 1952, when he formed his present company. In 1958, he was elected Vice-President and Treasurer of California Electric Power Co. He is a past president of the Associated Building Contractors of Colorado, Inc., and a director of the First National Bank.

Gerry was married in New York City on Sept. 24, 1937, to the former Janet Alice Smith and they have three daughters.

Allan R. Phipps

President



Allan R. Phipps, 53, and like his brother Gerry, a native of Denver, is a man of many achievements. A partner in the Denver law firm of Hughes and Dorsey, Phipps received a bachelor's degree from Williams College in 1934, a master's degree from Oxford University (England) in 1936 and law degree from the University of Denver in 1937.

A Phi Beta Kappa, he was admitted to the Colorado Bar in 1938. He joined Hughes and Dorsey in 1956. He is also a director of the Denver Tramway Corporation, Cherry Creek National Bank, Belcaro Realty Investment Company, International Realty Company and Highlander Hotel Corporation.

Although he has never run for public office, he has been active in Republican party affairs for many years and served as chairman of the Colorado GOP finance committee from 1952 through 1955.

He is also a trustee of Williams College, the University of Denver, the Denver Museum of Natural History, Denver Symphony Society and Graland Country Day School. He also is chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Winter Park Recreational Association and board manager of St. Luke's Hospital in Denver. During the war, he served in the U. S. Naval Reserve from 1942 to 1946, attaining the rank of lieutenant commander.

Like his father, the late U. S. Senator Lawrence Cowle Phipps, and other members of his family, Allan shuns publicity and frequently makes anonymous financial contributions to various worthy causes. But he and his brother could not escape the publicity resulting from the sale of the Broncos franchise last February and since that time both have become even more popular public figures.

Allan is married to the former Clara Mitchell Van Schaack. He has two sons and a daughter.

James H. Burris

Executive Vice-President
and General Manager



Head of the Empire Sports Inc. organization, which operates both the Denver Broncos and the Denver Bears baseball team, is James H. Burris. He was appointed to the newly-created position of executive vice-president in late May, 1965, an appointment that was met with wide acceptance in the Denver area.

Born October 5, 1922, in New Castle, Indiana, Burris attended Coffeyville, Kans., Junior College, the University of Georgia and the University of Missouri School of Journalism. A veteran of three years service in the U.S. Army during World War II, Burris has served in such widely-varied capacities as a sports writer on the Coffeyville, Kans., Daily Journal (1941-42), athletic publicity director at Missouri (1945-46), writer for the Sporting News (1947) and publicity and promotion director for the American Legion national baseball program (1948-50).

Burris joined the American Association as secretary and director of the league's Service Bureau in 1950 and held that post until November, 1960, when he was named the 11th president of the American Association. He later served as a special assistant to Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick (1963) and president of the Texas League (1964) before joining Empire Sports in January, 1965, as general manager of the Bears.

Jim and his wife, Mary Jane, live in suburban Lakewood and have six children—Bobby 15, Barbara 14, Susan 11, Billy 9, Theresa 7 and Patrice 6.

Mac Speedie

Head Coach



Head man of the Broncos is Mac Speedie, who will be in his second full season as a head coach in 1966 after taking over the slump-ridden Broncos in the fifth week of the 1964 season. Speedie has guided the Broncos in a steady building program in the last year and a half and, in so doing, has won the unified support and confidence of the Bronco owners, his fellow coaches, the Denver players, the Bronco staff, the press and, most important, the large legion of Denver fans.

Speedie, 46, a native of Odell, Ill., inherited a football team that had not won a league game in 14 starts and was winless in its first four games of 1964. It took Mac and his staff just one week—until the first game under the new command—to change that situation. The Broncos upset Kansas City, 33-27, in Mac's first game, and in the remainder of the 1964 season, they generally earned the reputation of being a vastly improved team and one of the hardest hitting, most spirited teams in the American Football League. The Broncos continued to build that reputation in 1965.

But Mac did more than just engineer an improved performance from his football team. He wasted no time in emphasizing to the fans the important part they played in a winning football situation and immediately threw all practice sessions open to the public, something that hadn't been done before. When the vociferous Denver crowd spontaneously gave birth to the "Go, Broncos, Go" chant in the Kansas City game, Mac even turned to the crowd to lead the cheers.

Speedie was raised in Salt Lake City and was an all-Skyline Conference end at the University of Utah in 1939, 1940 and 1941. A 1942 graduate of the University of Utah, he was considered one of the finest football players ever to attend Utah, a school that has produced many fine football names.

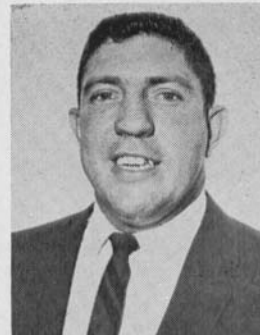
After serving in the United States Army during World War II, Mac embarked on an illustrious playing career in professional football that began with the Cleveland Browns in 1946 and ended with Vancouver in Canada in 1955. Mac was with the Browns in first the All-American Conference and then the National Football League through the 1952 season and, during this period, was named to the all-league team six of seven years. He led his league in pass receptions five times in those seven years. Speedie played at Regina in 1953 and 1954 before completing his career in Vancouver.

He began his coaching career with the Houston Oilers as end coach in 1960 and 1961 and then joined the Denver staff as offensive end coach before the 1962 season.

Mac and his wife, Lynn, have a new home in southeast Denver. Their son, Mike, 20, is currently attending the University of Utah. The Speedies also have a daughter, Rebecca, 11.

Ray Malavasi

Offensive
Line Coach



Proving his versatility, Ray Malavasi made the unusual change of assignments from finding talent, as Denver's Personnel Director in 1962 and 1963, to that of building and teaching talent as the Broncos defensive line coach in 1964. And now he makes another shift to the job of offensive line coach for the 1966 season.

Born Nov. 8, 1930, at Clifton, N.J., Ray entered the United States Military Academy at West Point in 1949. A dogged and determined lineman, he won honorable mention on several All-Americans in 1950.

In 1951 he switched to Mississippi State and received his degree in civil engineering in 1952. After one season with the Philadelphia Eagles, Malavasi entered the Army and coached and played football at Fort Belvoir, Va. He holds the reserve rank of captain. Before joining the Bronco staff, Malavasi's college coaching experience included assistant positions at Mississippi State, Minnesota, Memphis State and Wake Forest.

Ray is married to the former Mary Fleming and they have five children.



Bus Mertes

Offensive
Backfield Coach

Bus Mertes, 46, joined the Bronco staff in April, 1965, after a long grid-iron career as a player and a coach.

A 1942 graduate of the State University of Iowa, Mertes played with the Iowa Pre-Flight teams of 1942, 1943, and 1944. Then the backfield star began a five-year professional playing career in 1945 that took him to Chicago Cardinals, Los Angeles Dons, Baltimore Colts and New York Giants.

His coaching career began at Bradley University in 1950 through 1952. Then he was backfield coach at Kansas State for two seasons before taking over the head job with the Wildcats in 1955. He coached there five seasons before becoming head coach at Drake University in Des Moines in 1960. He stayed there until joining the Broncos.

Possessing a keen sense of humor and always ready with the quip, Mertes has proven to be a popular member of the Denver staff. He and his wife, Pauline, have five children, Mike 16, Sally 13, Kelly 11, Ann 7, and Mary 5.



Dale Dodrill
Defensive Line Coach

Dale Dodrill, 40, rejoined the Broncos coaching staff as defensive line coach in May, 1966. Dodrill was an assistant coach with the

first Bronco team in 1960 and remained as an assistant until after the 1963 season, when he resigned to enter the insurance business in suburban Lakewood.

Born in Kansas, Dodrill is a 1951 graduate of Colorado State University, where he was an all-conference lineman in 1949 and 1950. Although he played more offense than defense in college, he was strictly a defensive star for nine years with the Pittsburgh Steelers, playing middle defensive guard originally and then switching to middle linebacker as the general pro defensive alignments changed. An all-NFL star in several seasons, he retired after the 1959 season.

Dodrill and his wife, Janette, live in Lakewood and have two children, Garrett 10 and David 4.



Marv Matuszak
Defensive Backfield Coach

Marv Matuszak, 35, will be in his first full-time season of regular coaching in 1966. A former Tulsa University star who later

saw 11 years of professional football service in two leagues, Matuszak retired just before the start of the 1965 season and then served the Broncos as a part-time scout and a part-time assistant coach a year ago. He was named to the defensive backfield coaching post last winter by Head Coach Mac Speedie.

A journalism student at Tulsa, Matuszak was an all-NFL choice with the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1953 and with the San Francisco 49ers in 1957. He also saw service with the Baltimore Colts in his seven NFL seasons before moving to the Buffalo Bills in 1962 and 1963. He came to Denver for the 1964 season and his experienced line-backing work was a vital cog in the Denver defense that season.

Matuszak and his wife, Noreen, have two children, Delores 16 and Linda 11.

Fred Gehrke

Director of Player Personnel



Fred Gehrke, 47, a former football star at the University of Utah and with the Cleveland Browns and Los Angeles Rams, was named to the post of player personnel director of the Broncos in January, 1965. He has proven to be an outstanding asset to the organization.

Gehrke, a native of Salt Lake City, Utah, was an all-professional halfback with the world champion Cleveland Rams in 1945. Later, as a member of the Los Angeles Rams, he served as a player-coach in 1948 and 1949 and then concluded his active playing career in 1950. He first started his pro career with the Rams in 1940 and then played with the Los Angeles Bulldogs in the wartime Pacific Coast League in 1941 through 1944. He previously was an outstanding scholar-athlete at Utah in 1937, 1938 and 1939.

Gehrke remained close to the game after his retirement and did color commentary with Tom Harmon on radio and television football broadcasts for the next 13 years. Gehrke is married and has two daughters, Bonnie 18, and Cathy 17.

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS, DENVER BRONCOS

1959

August 14—First American Football League organizational meeting held in Chicago. Denver, with Bob Howsam as its principal owner, named as a charter member along with New York, Dallas, Los Angeles, Minneapolis and Houston.

November 22—First player selection draft held through 32 rounds. Denver's first pick is Roger LeClerc, center, Trinity.

November 30—Joe Foss named American Football League commissioner.

December 1—Dean Griffing named general manager of the Broncos.

December 2—Second player selection draft of 20 rounds held.

1960

January 1—Frank Filchock named first head coach of the Broncos.

January 30—Denver placed in AFL's western division with Dallas, Oakland and Los Angeles.

Spring—Frank Tripucka and Chuck Gavin, with Canadian experience, and NFL veteran, Bud McFadin, coming out of retirement, join squad. Also joining squad is unknown Gene Mingo, without college experience, who later proves to be one of the game's great placekickers.

June 9—AFL signs five-year television contract with the American Broadcasting Company.

July—First Bronco training camp opens at Colorado School of Mines.

July 29—First annual intra-squad game played at Colorado School of Mines.

September 9—After losing all five pre-season exhibition games, the Broncos become the first AFL victor when they defeat the Patriots in Boston in history's first AFL game, 13-10. Attendance—21,597.

September 23—Lionel Taylor, a cut of the Chicago Bears, plays first game for Broncos in New York. He is destined to become the league's greatest pass receiver.

October 2—Broncos play first home game in Bears Stadium, defeat Oakland, 31-14, before crowd of 18,372.

November 27—Broncos, down 38-7 late in the third quarter, stage historic 31-point rally to tie Buffalo, 38-38.

December—Offensive End Lionel Taylor, Defensive Tackle Bud McFadin and Safety Goose Gonsoulin all named to first official all-AFL team.

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS, DENVER BRONCOS (Continued)

1961

May 26—Bob and Lee Howsam, original principal owners of the Broncos, sell their stock to a new syndicate headed by Cal Kunz and Gerry Phipps.

June 1—Cal Kunz named president and operating head of Empire Sports.

December—Lionel Taylor sets professional record with 100 pass receptions for season. Taylor and Bud McFadin named to all-AFL team.

December—Frank Filchock fired as Broncos head coach.

1962

February 1—Jack Faulkner hired as Broncos head coach.

July 1—Dean Griffing fired as Broncos general manager. Faulkner named to dual post as head coach and general manager.

July—Public burning ceremonies of Broncos' notorious vertically striped socks at Broncos' intra-squad game.

August 24—Broncos defeat Dallas Texans, 27-24, in Fort Worth in first overtime game played by the Broncos. It was also Denver's first win over the Texans.

September 7—Broncos open regular season with 31-21 win over defending western division champion San Diego before turnaway crowd at historic D.U. Stadium.

October 21—Broncos defeat Houston, 20-10, before 34,496 at Bears Stadium, largest crowd ever to see a sports event in Denver. Season record upped to 6-1 with win.

December—Jack Faulkner named coach of the year in the AFL. Gene Mingo set professional field goal record of 27 in a season. Eldon Danenhauer, Lionel Taylor, Goose Gonsoulin and Bob Zeman named to the official all-AFL team.

1963

July 18—Bronco rookies defeat Houston rookies, 17-14, before 6500 in Colorado Springs in first pro rookie game ever played.

August—Charlie Mitchell, Tom Janik and Tom Nomina, all future Broncos, play in College All-Star game in Chicago.

September 16—Frank Tripucka retires.

October 13—John McCormick injured in Houston game. Will not play again until the 1965 season.

Season—Fourteen rookies play regularly as Broncos start a youth rebuilding program. Tops among the rookies are Mickey Slaughter, Billy Joe, Charlie Mitchell, Willie Brown and Hewritt Dixon.

October 26—Paid attendance of 20,377 for Broncos-Jets game at the Polo Grounds largest crowd for an AFL game in that stadium.

December—Billy Joe named AFL rookie of the year. Goose Gonsoulin only Bronco to make the all-AFL team. Lionel Taylor wins fourth straight pass receiving title.

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS, DENVER BRONCOS

1964

January—Broncos and Jets complete historic nine-player trade, largest ever made in the AFL. Broncos send Gene Prebola, Wahoo McDaniel, Gordy Holz and Bob Zeman to Jets for Dick Guesman, Ed Cooke, Charlie Janerette, Jim Price and Sid Fournet.

January 29—AFL signs five-year television contract with the National Broadcasting Company for a record \$36,000,000.

August—Matt Snorton and Ray Kubala, Bronco signees, play in College All-Star game.

August 14—Broncos obtain quarterback Jacky Lee from Houston in unique "lend-lease" trade for Bud McFadin, No. 1 draft choice and cash.

September 12—Jets and Broncos open the regular season in New York's Shea Stadium before a record crowd of 53,190 (45,665 paid).

October 4—Jack Faulkner fired as head coach.

October 5—Mac Speedie accepts appointment as interim head coach.

October 11—Broncos win first game under Mac Speedie by defeating Kansas City, 33-27. "Go, Broncos, Go" chant is born.

December 12—Mac Speedie named permanent head coach.

December—Jim Fraser wins third straight punting title. Willie Brown named to all-AFL team. Broncos sign high draft choices Bob Breitenstein (Tulsa) and Gerry Bussell (Georgia Tech), both No. 1 picks of NFL teams.

1965

January 16—AFL meeting in Houston. Cal Kunz gives first public indication that all may not be well with Bronco franchise in Denver.

January 27—Broncos obtain Abner Haynes, all-time AFL rushing leader, in trade with Kansas City for Jim Fraser.

February 11—Fight to retain control of franchise breaks into public focus. Gerald and Allan Phipps are pitted against "Voting Trust" made up of six principal Empire Sports stockholders and headed by Cal Kunz.

February 15—Gerald and Allan Phipps purchase 52 percent of the stock of Empire Sports, thus giving them virtually 100 percent ownership and saving the Bronco franchise for Denver.

February 16—Fabulous season ticket drive begins with sale of 143 season tickets, a Denver record at that time.

February 24—Cookie Gilchrist, gridiron great, obtained from Buffalo in a trade for Billy Joe.

March 5—Record sale of 941 season tickets in one day.

April 1—Season ticket drive goal of 20,000 sales reached. Figure to reach 22,000 by May 1.

May 17—Allan Phipps named president of Empire Sports, Inc. Gerry Phipps re-named Chairman of the Board. Richard S. Kitchen, Sr., and Robert T. Person named to the board of directors.

May 29—Jim Burris, Bears general manager, named executive vice-president of Empire Sports Inc., a position carrying with it the duties normally associated with those of a football general manager.

August 6—Bob Breitenstein plays in College All-Star game in Chicago.

August 20—Jim Burris added to the board of directors of Empire Sports, Inc.

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS, DENVER BRONCOS

(Continued)

October 3—Broncos defeat New York, 16-13, before overflow crowd of 34,988, largest sports crowd in Denver history. Game was seen on color TV back to the New York area and record crowd basked in 83 degree temperature under cloudless, brilliant blue skies.

December 12—Lionel Taylor makes the 500th catch of his career in game against Boston to become the first AFL player to top this figure. His career total of 508 receptions at the end of the season leaves Taylor second only to Ray Berry of Baltimore in the all-time professional pass-catching records.

December 12—Broncos conclude home season with total attendance of 219,786, an average of 31,398 per game. Both the total and average attendance were American Football League western division records. Six of seven home crowds topped the 30,000 mark.

December—Tackle Eldon Danenhauer, Split End Lionel Taylor and Fullback Cookie Gilchrist named to the all-AFL team, thus giving the Broncos more all-star players on their offensive unit than any other AFL team. John Bramlett named second in rookie of the year voting in at least two polls. Lionel Taylor wins fifth pass receiving crown in five years and Abner Haynes wins league kickoff return championship.

1966

January 10—Broncos trade tight end Hewritt Dixon to Oakland for linebacker Archie Matsos.

February 1—Record early-season ticket sale passes 15,000 for the 1966 season.

March—Governor Love signs into law legislative act creating a metropolitan stadium district. Voters of a four-county metropolitan region will vote on building a multi-million dollar all-purpose metropolitan stadium before March, 1967. One of provisions of the bill is that major potential tenants of the stadium, including the Denver Bears and Denver Broncos, must sign a 10-year lease before the stadium bill goes to a public vote. Bronco owners Gerry and Allan Phipps will agree to this stipulation, thus assuring the permanency of the Broncos franchise in Denver with the passage of the stadium bill by the voters.

May 1—Broncos announce plans to train at the Colorado School of Mines in Golden for the second straight year.

June 8—Merger of American and National Leagues announced. Season ticket sales surge forward as enthusiastic fans crowd box office.

PROFESSIONAL FOOTBALL IN DENVER

1966

Four factors dominate the professional football picture in mile-high Denver, Colorado, as the 1966 American Football League season approaches. Those factors are:

1. The overwhelming enthusiasm generated by Denver fans over the recent merger of the American and National football leagues and the prospect of head-to-head action against NFL as early as pre-season, 1967.
2. The prospects of an improved Broncos football team and a possible higher finish in the 1966 AFL campaign.
3. Continued fan interest, as can be evidenced by the sale of more than 19,500 season tickets by August 1 and the prospect of more than 20,000 sales for the second straight season.
4. The impending vote on a stadium bond issue, which, if passed by the voters, will give the Denver metropolitan area an ultra-modern, multi-purpose metropolitan stadium with a seating capacity of more than 50,000.

Just how well the Broncos do on the field in 1966 cannot be determined on these pages, but it is suffice to say that early reports from the summer training camp were most favorable and Coach Mac Speedie, in his second full season as head man of the Broncos, confidently expects an improved team in 1966 with much better results in the won-lost column.

And there is no question that the enthusiasm generated by the other vital factors in Denver's professional football picture in late-summer, 1966, may well play a contributing part to the Broncos' hoped-for improved play on the field.

It would be hard to imagine that anything could win more enthusiastic acceptance from thousands of sports fans than the AFL-NFL merger received in Denver. Season ticket sales, which had been more or less static for several weeks, spurted sharply for the next two weeks and almost 1000 sales directly attributable to the merger were added to the already-impressive season ticket total. Denver fans relish, in particular, the clauses of the merger agreement that will bring inter-league pre-season play in 1967 and a complete merger by 1970. But there were few facets, if any, of the entire merger picture that did not command the acceptance of the average Denver sports fan.

That the Broncos will have more large, enthusiastic crowds again in 1966 such as they enjoyed in every game in 1965 is already assured. A successful early-winter ticket campaign produced more than 15,000 season sales by February 1 and, although the selling pace slowed after that, the Broncos were past the 19,500 mark by August 1 and are considered a cinch to pass 20,000 season sales again in 1966. They are still considered a long-shot chance to pass the record 22,905 season sales in 1965. In 1965, the Broncos set a new western division season attendance mark with 219,786 total attendance, an average of 31,398 per home game.

But in spite of all the other exciting things that have been happening on the Denver professional football scene in the last two years, the stadium issue is foremost now in the minds of all interested metropolitan area citizens and rabid Bronco boosters as the 1966 season approaches. An act passed by the Colorado legislature in the 1966 session provided for the formation of a four county, metropolitan area stadium district with the voters of that district to be called to the polls in one year's time (before March, 1967) to approve or disapprove the construction of a modern, multi-purpose stadium that could cost up to \$20 million dollars and have a seating capacity of 50,000 or more.

A stadium commission that has been selected under the provisions of the legislative act is now busily determining the most feasible site for such a stadium. It must also contract for an engineering survey which will determine the type of construction that will be most practical. Then, the complete plans—including site, type of construction and cost—must be laid before the public for a decision, probably in a special election in late winter, 1967.

The Broncos' owners, Gerry and Allan Phipps, have already indicated they will agree to the provision of the bill which requests a 10-year lease to be signed by the Broncos for the use of the stadium before the bill is passed upon by the public. Thus, successful passage of the bill will assure the permanency of the Bronco franchise in Denver.

Since their purchase by the Phipps brothers on February 15, 1965, the Broncos have progressed in a way that would not have been considered possible 18 months ago. Likewise, events in the professional football world that would have been considered highly unlikely even a few months ago have transpired to make the future pro football picture a bright one. If the Broncos are given a further go-ahead by the successful passage of the stadium bill next winter, the recent successes and surprises should prove to be just the first bright chapters in a long and happy professional football story in Denver.

TELEVISION

Most games that the Denver Broncos play in 1966 will be telecast over the facilities of the National Broadcasting Company and those road games that are televised will be seen in Denver over Station KOA-TV (Channel 4). With the exception of the August 28 pre-season game, all of the Denver Broncos telecasts will be on a regional basis, meaning that they will be seen in the Denver network area (if not blacked out) and in the network area of the opposition team.

The Denver network area includes all of the states of Colorado, Utah, Wyoming and Montana, most of Idaho, and parts of Nebraska, South Dakota and possibly New Mexico.

The August 28 pre-season game at Bears Stadium will be telecast nationally (except for the blackout in the Denver area). It is one of two AFL pre-season games being telecast nationally by NBC-TV.
