Gerald H. Phipps

Chairman of the Board



Gerry Phipps has been an integral part of the Denver sports scene for more than two decades — two decades which saw the metropolitan area attain major league status and nationwide recognition.

In 1947, he became part of the organization that brought the Denver Bears here as members of the old Western League. The Bears, during the years which immediately followed that move, set minor league baseball attendance records which stood unchallenged for many years.

In 1961, one year after big league professional football had arrived here in the form of the Denver Broncos of the American Football League, Phipps became a major owner.

Four years later, he and his brother, Allan, became virtually the sole owners of the club and he assumed duties as board chairman. In 1966, with the consolidation of the two major leagues announced effective 1970, Denver joined the select handful of cities honored with a franchise in the combined leagues.

It was the culmination of hard work—and long-held dreams.

Now, 20 years after Gerry Phipps first found himself involved in Denver's sports picture, the dreams figure fair to become reality — much to the delight of the metropolitan area's sports and civic minded enthusiasts.

Phipps, 52, is a member of the Denver Country Club, the Denver Athletic Club, Denver Club, Cherry Hills Country Club and the Williams Club of New York.

He was born March 4, 1915, in Denver to Lawrence C. and Margaret Rogers Phipps and received his bachelor's degree from Williams College in 1936.

He was employed by the Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad from then until he entered the Navy as an Ensign in May, 1942.

Following his separation from the service in 1945, he was employed by a general contracting firm in Denver until 1952, when he formed his present company. In 1958, he was elected vice-president and treasurer of California Electric Power Co. and when that company merged with Southern California Edison Company late in 1963, he was named a director of the latter. He is a past president of the Associated Building Contractors of Colorado, Inc., and a director of The First National Bank of Denver.

Phipps was married in New York City on Sept. 24, 1937, to the former Janet Alice Smith. They have three daughters.

President



Allan R. Phipps manages to mesh a long-standing interest in sports with various other widespread community participations.

At Williams College, where he received his bachelor's degree, he was a member of the tennis and swimming teams. As president of Empire Sports, Inc., he has been in the forefront of professional sports activities here.

Phipps, 54, is also a partner in the law firm of Hughes & Dorsey; active in key non-candidate roles in the Republican party, including a stint as chairman of the GOP State Finance Committee, and serves on the governing boards of numerous organizations.

His posts include those of trustee of the University of Denver, the Denver Museum of Natural History, the Denver Symphony Society and Graland Country Day School.

Phipps was Alumni Trustee of Williams College and is chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Winter Park Recreational Association and a member of the Board of Managers of St. Luke's Hospital in Denver.

In addition to his bachelor's degree from Williams in 1934, he received a master's degree from Oxford University in 1936 and a law degree from the University of Denver in 1937.

Phipps is a member of Phi Beta Kappa. He served in World War II as a Lieutenant Commander, U. S. Naval Reserve, in the Pacific Theater.

He is a director of the Denver Tramway Corporation, Cherry Creek National Bank, South Denver National Bank, Belcaro Realty Investment Company, International Realty Company and the Highlander Hotel Corporation.

Phipps was admitted to the Colorado bar in 1938 and joined Hughes & Dorsey in 1946.

He is married to the former Clara Mitchell Van Schaack, and has two sons and a daughter.

Kansas City defeated Buffalo, 31-7 (At Buffalo)

Lou Saban

General Manager — Head Coach

Lou Saban, AFL Coach-of-the-Year in 1964 and 1965 as skipper of the Buffalo Bills, is the new chief executive of the rebuilding Denver Broncos. Saban signed a 10-year pact in December, after spending the 1966 season as coach of the collegiate Maryland Terrapins.

"The challenge of directing the Denver Bronces is the most stimulating assignment I have undertaken during the years I have been

associated with football," Saban said. "Our goals are two-fold. We want to build a solid organization . . . and we want to win football games. The two go hand in hand. They can be accomplished."

At Buffalo, Saban transformed an also-ran into a winner. When the Bills finished last in the AFL's Eastern Division in 1961, Lou was elevated from Director of Player Personnel to Head Coach. Saban produced a winning team his first year. The next season, 1963, the Bills moved up to second place in their division. In 1964 and 1965, the Saban-coached Bills won both their divisional title and the over-all AFL championship.

The 45-year-old Bronco GM-Coach began his professional coaching career in 1960, when the AFL came into being. He directed the Boston Patriots in 1960 and for the first five games of the 1961 campaign. His won-lost record for five-plus seasons is 43-29-3. After winning the AFL title for the second straight time at Buffalo in 1965, Saban decided to return to the college coaching ranks at Maryland. However, Bronco owners Gerald and Allan Phipps persuaded Lou to return to the AFL in the dual capacities of General Manager and Head Coach a year later.

A single wing quarterback at the University of Indiana, Saban was the Hoosiers' captain and most valuable player in 1942, as well as an All-Big Ten selection. An almost sure bet for All-America honors the following year, as a senior, Saban found the military taking prior claim. And, in due course, he was commissioned a First Lieutenant in the Army's O.S.S.

After completing language school at Fort Benning, Georgia, Lou was assigned to the China-Burma-India theater of operations as a student of the Chinese language (Mandarin dialect).

Three and a half years later, Saban received his honorable discharge and signed a professional football contract with the Cleveland Browns in the newly-formed All-American Conference.

It was the start of one of sports' most successful sagas. During the four years Saban played for the Browns, they won four league championships. Lou captained the Browns each season. Twice, in 1948 and 1949, he was an All-League linebacker selection.

When the AAC folded and merged with the NFL, Saban retired as a player. From there on, with the exception of 1956 when he entered the insurance business, Lou has been in the coaching profession.

From 1950 through 1952, Saban was head coach at Case Institute of Technology. From there he went to the University of Washington as an assistant coach. Lou joined the staff at Northwestern in 1954 as an assistant for the Wildcats, and the following year became their head coach.

After his brief tenure in the insurance business in 1956, Saban returned to football the following year as head coach at Western Illinois. In 1958 and again in 1959, Lou's Leathernecks won conference championships. The latter year his club was undefeated and ranked second in the nation among small colleges.

Saban returned to pro football in 1960 as head coach of the Boston Patriots in the new AFL.

Lou and his wife, Lorraine, who were married in 1947, have four children . . . Tom, Barbara, Patricia and Christine.

Hunter Enis

Offensive Backfield Coach

A quarterback with the Denver Broncos during part of the 1962 season, Hunter Enis, 30, is the youngest member of Lou Saban's coaching staff.

A native of Fort Worth, Texas, Enis entered Texas Christian University after graduating from Polytechnic High School at Fort Worth in 1955. He went on to star at quarterback for the Horn Frogs, guiding them to the Southwest Conference Championship in 1958.

After receiving his B.A. Degree in math and geology in 1959, Enis signed with the old Chicago Cardinals. Released after five games, Hunter returned to TCU as an assistant coach and to work on his Master's Degree.

He signed on with the Dallas Texans of the American Football League in 1960, and moved on to the San Diego Chargers in 1961. He coached and studied at TCU in the off-season.

In 1962, Hunter was traded to the Broncos and played in seven league games before being dealt to the Oakland Raiders.

He completed work on his Master's Degree during the off-season and decided to retire and accepted a full-time job at TCU.

A veteran of six years of Air Force reserve training, Enis is married. He and his wife, Gloria, have a daughter, Jill, who is three, and a boy, James Hunter, born this spring.

William "Whitey" Dovell

Offensive Line Coach

Whitey Dovell, 40, joins the Denver Broncos this season after 15 years at the University of Maryland as an assistant coach.

Born in Newark, N. J., Dovell in-

terrupted his high school education for Uncle Sam's benefit during World War II, enlisting in the Seabees in 1944. He saw action in the Pacific Theater and received his honorable discharge in 1946.

After completing his high school education at Central High in Newark in 1947, Dovell entered Maryland and played varsity football under the late Jim Tatum. Whitey was an offensive guard. He participated in three bowl games, playing in the Gator Bowl twice and in the Sugar Bowl once.

After receiving his degree in Physical Education in 1951, Dovell stayed on with Maryland as freshman coach the following three years. He moved up to the varsity in 1955 as offensive line coach, a job he held through the 1966 season.

During his 15 years at Maryland, Whitey saw 22 of his players

go on to play professional ball, including Stan Jones, an All-America lineman at Maryland in 1953 and current defensive line coach for the Broncos.

Dovell and his wife, Claire, have three children, Audrey 9, Patricia 7, and Lisa 5.



Dick MacPherson

Defensive Backfield Coach

Another of Lou Saban's assistants at Maryland last year, MacPherson, 36, will be embarking on his first venture as a pro coach. He was one of the first assistants Saban hired in assembling his staff.



MacPherson has a Master's Degree from the University of Illinois. He also was a scholar-athlete at Springfield College in Massachusetts, where he received a B.A. in Physical Education.

His coaching experience is impressive, and spans from Illinois, where he was assistant freshman coach in 1958, to a stint at the University of Maryland, where he worked with the defensive backs last year.

In between, Dick coached at Massachusetts as line coach in 1959 and 1960, then moved on to the University of Cincinnati to coach the line and defensive backs from 1961 through 1965.


A native of Old Town, Maine, MacPherson attended Old Town High School, graduating in 1948. He spent two years at Maine Maritime Academy, then served with the U. S. Air Force from 1950 to 1954.

Upon receiving his honorable discharge, he enrolled at Springfield College and proceeded to win varsity letters in football and wrestling. As a footballer, he played center and linebacker.

Stan Jones

Defensive Line Coach





Born in Altoona, Pa., Jones lettered for three years at the University of Maryland, gaining All-America honors as a guard in 1953, as well as being named Lineman of the Year.

After receiving his degree in Physical Education in 1954, Jones began a long and illustrious career with the Chicago Bears. He was with Chicago for 12 years, then ended his playing days with the Washington Redskins last year.

As an offensive guard with the Bears, Jones was All-NFL in 1955 and 1956, and again in 1959 and 1960. He was also a member of the West team in the Pro Bowl seven times.

Jones demonstrated his versatility in 1963 by moving from offense to defense. He played fulltime at defensive tackle for the next four years.

Stan and his wife, Darlis, have been married for 12 years and have two boys, Sherrill and Kevin.

Sam Rutigliano

Receiver Coach

Sam Rutigliano, 35, makes his first venture into professional football, serving as receiver coach for the Denver Broncos. He moves into the AFL with a background of 12 years coaching experience.



Rutigliano holds a B.A. degree from Tulsa University, where he also won three letters in football. In 1959, he received his M.A. degree from Columbia.

Sam started his coaching career as head coach at Lafayette High School in New York City in 1956. After three years, he moved on to become head coach at Greenwich High School in Connecticut in 1959.

Three years later, in 1962, he returned to New York State to coach at Chappaqua High School.


Rutigliano was named backfield coach at the University of Connecticut in 1964. He joined Saban at Maryland last year to handle the receivers.

Sam is a native of Brooklyn, N.Y. He graduated from Erasmus Hall High School in Brooklyn, where he was an outstanding offensive end. His senior year he was named to the All-Metropolitan New York City

Rutigliano is married to the former Barbara Abe. They have three children, Paul 11, Alison 2, and Kerry, who was born this past winter.

Fred Gehrke

Director of Player Personnel



Broncos in January, 1965. He has proven to be an outstanding asset to the organization.

Gehrke, a native of Salt Lake City, Utah, was an all-professional halfback with the world champion Cleveland Rams in 1945. Later, as a member of the Los Angeles Rams, he served as a player-coach in 1948 and 1949 and then concluded his active playing career in 1950. He first started his pro career with the Rams in 1940 and then played with the Los Angeles Bulldogs in the wartime Pacific Coast League from 1941 through 1944. He previously was an outstanding scholarathlete at Utah in 1937, 1938 and 1939.

Gehrke remained close to the game after his retirement and did color commentary with Tom Harmon on radio and television football broadcasts for the next 13 years. Gehrke is married and has two daughters, Bonnie 18, and Cathy 17.

- August 14—First American Football League organizational meeting held in Chicago. Denver, with Bob Howsam as its principal owner, named as a charter member along with New York, Dallas, Los Angeles, Minneapolis and Houston.
- November 22-First player selection draft held through 32 rounds. Denver's first pick is Roger LeClerc, center, Trinity.
- November 30-Joe Foss named American Football League commis-
- December 1-Dean Griffing named general manager of the Broncos.
- December 2—Second player selection draft of 20 rounds held.

1960

- January 1—Frank Filchock named first head coach of the Broncos.
- January 30-Denver placed in AFL's western division with Dallas, Oakland and Los Angeles.
- Spring-Frank Tripucka and Chuck Gavin, with Canadian experience, and NFL veteran, Bud McFadin, coming out of retirement, join squad. Also joining squad is unknown Gene Mingo, without college experience, who later proves to be one of the game's great placekickers.
- June 9-AFL signs five-year television contract with the American Broadcasting Company.
- July-First Bronco training camp opens at Colorado School of Mines.
- July 29-First annual intra-squad game played at Colorado School of Mines.
- September 9-After losing all five pre-season exhibition games, the Broncos become the first AFL victor when they defeat the Patriots in Boston in history's first AFL game, 13-10. Attendance-
- September 23-Lionel Taylor, a cut of the Chicago Bears, plays first game for Broncos in New York. He is destined to become the league's greatest pass receiver.
- October 2-Broncos play first home game in Bears Stadium, defeat Oakland, 31-14, before crowd of 18,372.
- November 27-Broncos, down 38-7 late in the third quarter, stage historic 31-point rally to tie Buffalo, 38-38.
- December—Offensive End Lionel Taylor, Defensive Tackle Bud McFadin and Safety Goose Gonsoulin all named to first official all-AFL

1961

- May 26-Bob and Lee Howsam, original principal owners of the Broncos, sell their stock to a new syndicate headed by Cal Kunz and Gerry Phipps.
- June 1-Cal Kunz named president and operating head of Empire Sports.
- December—Lionel Taylor sets professional record with 100 pass receptions for season. Taylor and Bud McFadin named to all-AFL team.
- December-Frank Filchock fired as Broncos head coach.

1962

- February 1-Jack Faulkner hired as Broncos head coach.
- July 1—Dean Griffing fired as Broncos general manager. Faulkner named to dual post as head coach and general manager.
- July—Public burning ceremonies of Broncos' notorious vertically striped socks at Broncos' intra-squad game.
- August 24—Broncos defeat Dallas Texans, 27-24, in Fort Worth in first overtime game played by the Broncos. It was also Denver's first win over the Texans.
- September 7—Broncos open regular season with 31-21 win over defending western division champion San Diego before turnaway crowd at historic D.U. Stadium.
- October 21—Broncos defeat Houston, 20-10, before 34,496 at Bears Stadium, largest crowd ever to see a sports event in Denver. Season record upped to 6-1 with win.
- December—Jack Faulkner named coach of the year in the AFL. Gene Mingo set professional field goal record of 27 in a season. Eldon Danenhauer, Lionel Taylor, Goose Gonsoulin and Bob Zeman named to the official all-AFL team.

1963

- July 18—Bronco rookies defeat Houston rookies, 17-14, before 6500 in Colorado Springs in first pro rookie game ever played.
- August—Charlie Mitchell, Tom Janik and Tom Nomina, all future Broncos, play in College All-Star game in Chicago.
- September 16-Frank Tripucka retires.
- October 13—John McCormick injured in Houston game. Will not play again until the 1965 season.
- Season—Fourteen rookies play regularly as Broncos start a youth rebuilding program. Tops among the rookies are Mickey Slaughter, Billy Joe, Charlie Mitchell, Willie Brown and Hewritt Dixon.

- February 1—Record early-season ticket sale passes 15,000 for the 1966 season.
- March—Governor Love signs into law legislative act creating a metropolitan stadium district. Voters of a four-county metropolitan region will vote on building a multi-million dollar all-purpose metropolitan stadium before March, 1967. One of provisions of the bill is that major potential tenants of the stadium, including the Denver Bears and Denver Broncos, must sign a 10-year lease before the stadium bill goes to a public vote. Bronco owners Gerry and Allan Phipps will agree to this stipulation, thus assuring the permanency of the Broncos franchise in Denver with the passage of the stadium bill by the voters.
- May 1—Broncos announce plans to train at the Colorado School of Mines in Golden for the second straight year.

- July 8—Bronco rookies Floyd Little, Tom Beer, Frank Richter, Mike Current and Tom Francisco slated to play in Coaches All-America Game in Atlanta. Denver has more participants in the game than any of the 26 teams in AFL and NFL.
- August 4—Floyd Little, Pete Duranko, Tom Beer and George Goeddeke scheduled to play in Chicago All-Star game vs. Green Bay Packers.

BRONCO 1967 PREVIEW

The 1967 season actually began in 1966 for the Denver Broncos. On December 19, 1966, after seven seasons of going without a winner on the gridiron, Bronco owners Gerry and Allan Phipps decided to put a proven winner in charge. They hired Lou Saban as General Manager and Head Coach.

Saban, the former Cleveland Browns star who directed the Buffalo Bills to AFL championships in both 1964 and 1965, signed a 10-year contract as the man in charge of Denver Bronco fortunes.

"The challenge of directing the Broncos, both on the field and off," said Saban, "is the most stimulating assignment I have undertaken during the years I have been associated with football. Our goals are two-fold. We want to build a solid organization . . . and we want to win football games. The two go hand in hand, and they can be accomplished."

Denver's new boss immediately backed up his words with deeds. In a few short months, he could point to the following accomplishments.

- 1. Recruited an all-new coaching staff, and revamped the Bronco front office setup.
- 2. Moved the Bronco organization to new, modern offices in suburban Denver.
- 3. Supervised the construction of a permanent practice field and a locker room-meeting room building adjacent to the new offices.
- 4. Via trades, acquired defensive lineman Dave Costa, offensive linemen Rex Mirich and Mitch Dudek, and tight end Bill Cronin.
- 5. Conducted a Denver common draft that the New York TIMES called one of pro football's best, then (by early June) signed 18 of the 19 men selected, including three-time Syracuse All-America Floyd Little, Denver's No. 1 choice.
- 6. Engineered one of pro football's major off-season swaps, sending halfback Abner Haynes, linebacker Jerry Hopkins, defensive end Danny LaRose and a future draft choice to the Miami Dolphins for fullback Cookie Gilchrist, offensive guard Ernie Park and quarterback George Wilson, Jr.

Though quick to point out that some personnel changes will be required, Saban feels that he has a solid nucleus around which to build.

"In addition to some proven veterans," Lou opined, "Denver has a number of talented youngsters who should improve . . . sophomores and third and fourth year men. Don't forget, the Broncos had the youngest team in either league last year with an average of just 3.3 years playing experience per player."

Heading into summer camp, Saban looks at the Bronco prospects this way:

Offensively, Denver trailed all other AFL teams in rushing, passing and scoring last season. Thus, Lou knows that he has a job on his hands kindling some offensive power. The key quarterback post is up for grabs, but Saban feels that receivers such as Al Denson, Bob Scarpitto, Lionel Taylor, rookie Tom Beer and others give the Rocky Mountan entry plenty of pass-catching potential. Rookie Little and a heavier Wendell Hayes could give the running game a major shot in the arm. In the line, Saban could make a number of adjustments. "You can't run or pass unless the men up front do a job," Lou offered.

Defensively, the new Denver GM-coach also seeks improvement. However, Lou's current assessment finds the defense ahead of the offense.

Though Denver was No. 8 among AFL teams in rushing defense a year ago, the Broncos were No. 3 in pass defense and No. 6 in total defense. Saban would like a better inside pass rush up front, and he hopes that his deep defenders develop into better ball hawks. Denver intercepted just 13 enemy passes a year ago, well below the league average.

On the offense, the interior line situation is far and away Saban's major concern.

Tackles Bob Breitenstein and Lee Bernet, center Larry Kaminski and guard Jerry Sturm were all starters a year ago, and will be men to beat when camp opens. However, Bernet will open at right guard. Soph Pat Matson and rookie George Goeddeke will vie with Park at left guard. Former Oakland Raider Mirich and rookie Mike Current

will try to unseat Sturm at the left tackle position. The retirement of guard John Gonzaga leaves one sure opening in the line.

In the receiving department, Denver's long suit, MVP Denson, Taylor and Scarpitto are proven performers. Taylor ranks as the AFL's

No. 1 all-time pass-grabber.

With a view toward taking better advantage of the 210-pound Denson's speed and range, Saban will open camp with Al at an outside receiving post. The former Grambling star will vie with Taylor, Scarpitto, sophomore Eric Crabtree and newcomers for a pass-catching job. Cronin, acquired from Miami, and rookie Beer will try to fill the bill at tight end. Denson will be in the wings, if the tight end candidates falter.

In the backfield, Saban knows that he doesn't have the "big man" at quarterback. With the retirement of John McCormick, second year men Max Choboian and Scotty Glacken and former Buffalo cab squadder Mailon Kent head the list of candidates, and Lou hopes that one of the trio will step out of the pack by the time the whistle blows for regular season play. George Wilson, Jr. could help, too.

"Remember," Saban pointed out, "that it has been proven that it takes time for quarterbacks to develop in professional football. We

have high hopes that one of our men can come through.'

Little will battle veteran Charlie Mitchell for the running halfback position and, if the former Syracuse great lives up to advance billing, the vet will have to go all out. Hayes, at 225 pounds and playing at the fullback position, could improve on his 1965 and 1966 performances. However, Wendell will have a major challenge on his hands warding off the returning Gilchrist, one of the AFL's best for a number of years. If Cookie makes a comeback, Hayes could see duty at the running halfback position.

The departure of tackle Ray Jacobs for Miami leaves one definite opening in the defensive line, where Saban will begin camp by testing a few changes. Talented Max Leetzow moves from the right side to left end, while second year man Bill Keating shifts to right end from a tackle post. Sophomore Larry Cox is the front-runner at one tackle post, and Saban hopes that veteran acquisition Dave Costa can make

the grade at the other interior spot.

Carl Cunningham heads the cast of rookie linemen. Rookie All-

America Pete Duranko could also get a shot in the line.

The final result of John Bramlett's off-season shoulder operation will be a major factor in Denver's over-all linebacking situation. Healthy, Bramlett is one of the AFL's best. Gene Jeter, at the left side, is the other returning starter. The departure of Hopkins leaves an opening at middle linebacker. Rookies Duranko and John Huard are hopefuls.

Lonnie Wright and veteran Goose Gonsoulin, the AFL's all-time pass interception leader, return at the safety positions. However, John Griffin, injured part of the 1966 season, is ready to challenge. Bob Richardson, back off the injured list, and a heavier Nemiah Wilson could bag the cornerback spots, though Goldie Sellers and Lew Scott have experience. Speedster Jim Summers leads the newcomers.

With Scarpitto on hand, the punting should again be excellent. Bob established a new AFL standard a year ago by logging a 45.8 average. Placekicker Gary Kroner, improved in 1966, will have to

ward off rookie challenges.

Sellers, Wilson and company gave Denver one of the league's best punt and kickoff return contingents in 1966. Sellers paced the league in punt returning. The addition of Little, considered the best punt and kickoff returner in the college ranks last season, should add additional wallop.

Saban feels that the AFL races should be dandy ones in both divisions.

Says Lou: "In the West, Kansas City is certainly the team to beat, though Oakland came on fast as the 1966 season progressed. We hope to be a factor. In the East, defending champion Buffalo has strengthened itself since the '66 campaign ended. Boston, with Jim Nance, was in the race right down to the wire last fall and a healthy Joe Namath makes New York tough any weekend."

NEW DENVER BRONCO OFFICES, FACILITIES

The Denver Broncos, rebuilding in almost every manner, will operate from all new administrative and practice facilities in 1967.

On March 1, the Broncos moved to new offices, taking over the top floor of the recently-constructed Lucas Building at 181 East 56th Avenue in suburban Denver. The offices house both the coaching and administrative staff. (The Ticket Office remains at Bears Stadium.)

The new practice field is directly adjacent to the offices, has been completely sodded and will be ready for use when camp opens in July. A 100-yard practice gridiron is flanked by additional practice areas. Some 128,000 square feet of windsor sod was used to complete the area.

The "Bronco Fieldhouse," on the opposite side of the practice field from the administrative offices, completes the compact and vastly-improved Bronco physical setup. The one-story structure features player and coaches locker room and shower facilities, a training room, equipment rooms and player meeting rooms. The building will be ready for use when the Broncos report for pre-season practice in July.

A 15-point fourth quarter wiped out a 10-9 Bronco lead, enabling the Boston Patriots to defeat the Broncos in their home opener, 24-10. Until the fourth period, the game had been a rousing defensive battle, with the magic toe of Gino Cappelletti punching through three field goals to keep the Pats in the game. The Broncos carried their narrow halftime lead through a scoreless third quarter, but the timely passing of Babe Parilli and the power running of Jim Nance and Larry Garron pushed the Pats out in front to stay, with Garron going over from two yards out with just over 12 minutes to play. Nance iced the game for the Beantowners with a seven-yard dash 10 minutes later. The Broncos' lone touchdown came on an 11-yard pass in the second quarter from John McCormick to Bob Scarpitto. Boston could only manage 43 yards rushing, and big Jim Nance, the league's rushing leader, was held to a scant 20 yards in 11 rushes. A total of 12 fumbles were produced in the game . . . six on each side, to set an AFL record. Four times the forward thrust of the Bronco line forced quarterback Babe Parilli to fumble, while at the same time dropping him for losses on five other occasions. The game knocked Boston out of the Eastern Division lead, and eventually may have cost the Pats the division championship.

The Bills scored again early in the fourth stanza, bringing the score to 38-7, before the Denverites came on to make a game of it. Flanker Bob Scarpitto, who had his finest game of the season and one of the finest of his career, was the chief thorn in the Bills' side. Scarpitto caught scoring pitches of 28 and 11 yards from McCormick to make the score respectable. He had scored Denver's first touchdown in the second quarter on a beautifully executed 62-yard strike from McCormick. Scarpitto also snared a two-point conversion toss, thus accounting for 20 of the Broncos' 21 points. Mc-Cormick's 13 completions for 328 yards was another bright spot for Denver in otherwise bleak finish of the 1966 season.

The combination of quarter-back Mickey Slaughter and John McCormick completed only two of 15 passes attempted for minus one yard, while the ground attack managed 43 yards. Meanwhile, veteran George Blanda fired three touchdown passes and Ode Burrell slashed his way for 89 of the 229 yards the Oilers picked up on the ground.

Oct. 2, 1966—At Denver Denver 40, Houston 38

Gary Kroner's second 46-yard field goal of the day, this one with only 27 seconds remaining in the game, brought self-respect and the first win of the season to the Broncos as they nipped the Houston Oilers in one of the wildest games ever seen at Bears Stadium, 40-38. It was poetic justice that Denver's first win came at the hands of a club, who just one month earlier embarrassed Denver in a no-firstdown, 45-7 Houston win. The game was a slugging scoring match from the onset, as the two clubs slashed each other with long scoring strikes that included a 100-yard kickoff return by Goldie Sellers, a 63-yard aerial bomb from John McCormick to Al Denson and a 79 scoring pitch from George Blanda to Charlie Frazier. In fact, Blanda must have wondered after the game what you have to do to win. He accounted for all of the Oilers' scoring, booting five extra points and a field goal, as well as tossing five touchdown passes. On this day everyone seemed to be a star. McCormick cooly victimized the Oiler secondary for 212 yards and two touchdowns. The offensive line afforded great protection, while the shifty running of Wendell Hayes and Abner Haynes kept the Houston defense off balance. Although the Bronco defense permitted 38 points, it was the defense's almost unbelievable goal line stand of holding the Oilers four times from one-yard away, late in the game, that enabled Kroner's last-second heroics. Gary kicked a total of four field goals.

The key on defense will be how several of the Jets' youngsters come through, but veteran linebacker Larry Grantham, defensive end Verlon Biggs and an all-veteran secondary already make New York tough on defense.

1967 OUTLOOK

With a new house (\$27 million San Diego Stadium) and plenty of action (record season-ticket sale to surpass 25,000), the 1967 San

Diego Chargers are pointing to a jackpot season.

Capturing titles once was as routine for San Diego as catching passes is for Lance Alworth. The Chargers won the American Football League's Western Division crown five out of six years before tumbling into third place (7-6-1) in 1966. Was the skid temporary? Has the competition grown too strong? Can the Chargers be recharged in 1967?

Coach Sid Gillman put these questions into his pipe during an active off-season. "Basically, we have a fine football team," said the veteran coach of 33 years. "What we need is more consistent effort and execution. The talent is there." Gillman believes the Chargers solved their defensive problems of 1966 by trading for end Tom Day (from Buffalo) and linebacker Johnny Baker and tackle Scott Appleton (from Houston) and by drafting human tower Ron Billingsley (6-8, 260 from Wyoming).

flanker Lance Alworth and halfback Paul Lowe.

And it may be only day-dreaming, but Gillman thinks he has an ace up his sleeve in 1967. Predicts Sir Sidney: "That beautiful new stadium should inspire every Charger to a great year."
