BRONCO 1969 PREVIEW

If the Denver Broncos show the same improvement in 1969 that they did in 1968, Bronco fans will be happy.

Denver was 3-11 in 1967, the year that new General Manager and Head Coach Lou Saban began his rebuilding program, and 5-9 despite a rash of injuries last fall. A continuation of the same improvement factor would make the Broncos a happy 7-7 in 1969.

The improvement to 5-9 in 1968 was accomplished despite major injuries to quarterback Steve Tensi and star receiver Al Denson (both suffered broken left collarbones twice), plus assorted injuries to Floyd Little and others. Looking ahead to 1969, Bronco fans find it hard to believe that their club could be hit as hard in the injury department again.

Saban, who has kept the Bronco emphasis on youth, feels that Denver enters the '69 training camp with a solid defensive line and quality outside receiving on offense. All-League end Rich Jackson and tackle Dave Costa anchor the defensive line. A healthy Denson should team with soph Billy Van Heusen and tight end Tom Beer to provide provide quality pass receiving.

Saban believes that Little is a potential star at one running back position, and he indicates that considerable improvement has been made in the offensive line. Defensively, John Huard has developed into a capable middle linebacker.

The major trouble area is the defensive secondary, particularly the cornerback positions. The Broncos would also like improvement at the outside linebacker posts. Offensively, Denver needs a big running back to team with Little.

And, the key quarterback position will find a healthy Tensi dueling second-year man Marlin Briscoe and former Canadian star Pete Liske. The Broncos signed Liske on June 1 after the former Penn State quarterback's option with Calgary of the CFL had expired.

"The big question mark area has to be quarterback," Saban said. "A team is never any better than its quarterback. With Steve, Marlin and Pete we have an interesting, and competitive, situation. We like that. We just hope that one of the three can come through and do the job for us."

Saban hopes that the claim to fame in 1969 is a winning team.

THE OFFENSE

Improvement at the quarterback position is the key to needed Bronco offensive improvement in 1969. With Steve Tensi riddled by shoulder injuries and Marlin Briscoe a rookie, Denver had spotty quarterbacking, and a resultant spotty offense, in 1968. The lack of offensive prowess put additional stress on the defense, especially early in the season. The offensive strong points are solid receiving from Al Denson and Billy Van Heusen, and a talented runner in Floyd Little. The offensive line needs just a shade of help, but a running back to team with Little is a must.

QUARTERBACKS

Someone must come through, if the Broncos are to continue their climb up the pro football ladder. Steve Tensi, Marlin Briscoe and Pete Liske will all be given every chance to win the No. 1 job. Based upon experience, Tensi is the man to beat. Steve played in seven games last season, and the Broncos won four. It was Tensi who quarter-backed the Broncos to their triumph over the Jets. During his limited appearances, Steve completed 48 of 119 passes for 709 yards and five touchdowns. Briscoe, an exciting scrambler, connected on 93 of 224 tosses for 1,589 yards and 13 TDs. Marlin engineered last second wins over both Miami and Buffalo. Liske, a 27-year-old four-year veteran of Canadian play, led Calgary to a Western Conference title in 1967 and its first Grey Cup berth in 19 years last fall. In four seasons, he completed 843 of 1,490 passes for 12,836 yards and 95 touch-

Pete holds a batch of CFL records. He signed with the Broncos this past June. Draftees Alan Pastrana [No. 11] and taxi man Joe DiVito are the other main challengers at the present time. If Tensi can perform the way that he did against the World Champion Jets last fall, Bronco quarterbacking will be solid.

RUNNING BACKS

Floyd Little, the only player in the AFL to rank in the league's Top Ten in rushing and as a punt and kickoff returner in 1968, is solid at one position. Little rushed for 584 yards last fall, although he missed three games with an ankle injury. He set an all-time Bronco one-game record with 147 yards from scrimmage against the Boston Patriots. Little moved the ball 1,825 yards for the Broncos as a ball-carrier, receiver and on punt and kickoff returns. But, Floyd needs some help. Saban hopes that either returnees Brendan McCarthy or Garrett Ford, or draftees Mike Coleman (No. 6b) or Henry Jones (No. 9), will be able to come through at the fullback position . . . and team with Little to give the Broncos a one-two running punch. Third-year man Fran Lynch, soph Terry Erwin and rookies Frank Quayle (No. 5) and Wandy Williams (No. 6a) all seek a spot on the roster. If someone can step out of the pack and team with Little, the Broncos will be improved.

RECEIVERS

With a healthy Al Denson, outside receiving should be Denver's long suit on the offense. An All-Leaguer in 1967, when he snared 46 passes for 899 yards, Denson suffered a broken collarbone in the 1968 opener and missed half of the season. Still, he caught 34 aerials for 586 yards in just eight games to almost catch Eric Crabtree (35 for 601 yards) for the team lead. Denson and soph Billy Van Heusen should give Denver a solid outside receiving duo. Van Heusen topped the outside receivers with an 18.6-yard average on 19 catches as a rookie last season. Versatile Mike Haffner, who doubled as a tight end last year, returnee Jimmy Jones and rookie John Sias (No. 13) lead the other jobseekers at flanker and split end. Tom Beer almost doubled his pass catching output (11 to 20) at tight end in 1968. Haffner, Curt Lucas and others will challenge. If all departments were as solid as receiving, Denver would be a sure winner.

OFFENSIVE LINE

If Denver makes the same progress up front in 1969 that it did in 1968, the situation will be a pleasant one. Sam Brunelli and Mike Current are now solid at the tackle positions, and George Goddeke has a stranglehold on the left guard spot. Tom Beer is a solid blocker at tight end. That makes the set-up a lot more workable than at this time a year ago. The major problem spot is right guard, where Saban hopes that former defensive lineman Bob Young can make it. Excenter Walter Highsmith, former minor leaguer Myron Bayless, rookie Errol Kahoun (No. 15) and soph Bob Vaughan also have a shot. Larry Kaminski will have to ward off Jay Bachman and Bob Hendrix at center. Wallace Dickey and George Gaiser will try to get into the picture at tackle. If the problem at right guard is solved, the Broncos will be competitive.

DEFENSE

The Broncos didn't do a bad job against the run in 1968, due to considerable improvement in the defensive line. However, despite getting to the passer twice as often in 1968 as in 1967, inexperience and some deficiencies in the secondary and at the outside linebacking positions resulted in opponent TD passes and over-all defensive problems. The inability of the Bronco offense to mount sustained drives, or put points on the scoreboard, also put additional stress on the defense. Tackle and captain Dave Costa and end Rich Jackson rank with the AFL's best. But, improvement in the secondary, particularly at the corners, is mandatory.

DEFENSIVE LINE

The line is the defensive strongpoint, as evidenced by the fact that Denver did not draft a defensive lineman. End Rich Jackson, a thorn in the side of Joe Namath and others in 1968, was a solid All-

Leaguer who could bid for All-Pro honors this season. Tackle Dave Costa, the defensive captain, has been an all-star for the past two seasons. Sophomore Paul Smith and third-year man Pete Duranko should wage a dandy duel for the other end post. Ditto Jerry Inman and Rex Mirich for the second tackle post. Veteran Larry Cox and some free agents will try to break in, but it will take some quality work to unseat any of the top six. Overall, the Bronco defensive line compares well with the best in the AFL.

LINEBACKERS

Middle linebacker John Huard, who begins his third season, came along well in 1968 and will be hard to outdistance for the center position. Fred Forsberg, who also plays the outside, and rookie Al Giffin (No. 7), will try. At the outside positions, where vets Carl Cunningham, Chip Myrtle and Frank Richter are the leaders, there are a number of applicants. Second-year man Gordon Lambert, former minor leaguers Jesse Chavis and Jeff Kuhman and draft choices Mike Schnitker (No. 4a) and Gary Crane (No. 14) have the best chance to break in. Former Canadian performer Billy Ray Locklin will also give it a try. This is the year of decision for most of the third-year linebackers — Huard, Cunningham, Myrtle and Richter. Saban wants a better job, particularly at the outside posts.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

Since Denver drafted cornerbacks with three of its first four selections in the Common Draft, the main Bronco problem is somewhat obvious. The difficulty in the secondary, and most specifically at the corners. Drake Garrett and Charley Greer played the corners in 1968. Greer is likely to be moved to a safety position, if rookies and newcomers pan out at the corners. With experience, Garrett may improve. With the number of contenders for jobs, he probably will have to. Grady Cavness (No. 2), Bill Thompson (No. 3) and Ed Hayes (No. 4b) are the top draftees who will be bidding for corner positions. Jimmy Smith (No. 10) and Billy Woods (No. 16) will also challenge for posts, as will former Canadian star Phil Brady. Strong safeties Pete Jaquess and Gus Hollomon and free safetymen Jack Lentz and Tom Oberg will duel. Draftee Wes Plummer (No. 12) and others will challenge at the safety positions. "This is our major problem area," says Saban of the secondary. "We must have improvement."

PUNTING

Billy Van Heusen took over from popular and productive Bob Scarpitto in 1968 and did a bang-up job. Billy ranked second in the AFL with a fine 43.8 average that included a 68-yard boot. Joe Di Vito could be a back-up man. Punting should again be solid for the Broncos.

PLACEKICKING

Bobby Howfield, the British soccer-style booter, improved throughout the 1968 season and will be difficult to unseat. Bobby made nine of 18 field goal attempts last season, hit 30 for 30 on PATs, and did an excellent job on kickoffs. There is no question about his range on field goal tries, but Saban and his aides would like more consistency. Newcomers Paul Romano and Joe Hightower are the current leading challengers. With experience, Howfield has a chance to develop into one of the best.

PUNT AND KICKOFF RETURNS

In Floyd Little, Denver has one of pro football's top punt and kickoff return men. As a rookie, Floyd was first in the AFL in punt returns and third in kickoff returns. Last season, Little ranked second in kickoff returns (with a 25.0 average to 25.1 for George Atkinson of Oakland) and fourth in punt returns. If others can step to the fore, Saban would like to give Floyd some relief in one department of returning or the other. Vets Drake Garrett, Charley Greer and Gus Holomon and rookie draftees Bill Thompson, Ed Hayes and Billy Woods all have credentials. Denver should again be potent in kickoff and punt returning.

Gerald H. Phipps

Chairman of the Board



Gerry Phipps has been an integral part of the Denver sports scene for more than two decades — two decades which saw the metropolitan area attain major league status and nationwide recognition.

In 1947, he became part of the organization that brought the Denver Bears here as members of the old Western League. The Bears, during the years which immediately followed that move, set minor league baseball attendance records which stood unchallenged for many years.

In 1961, one year after big league professional football had arrived here in the form of the Denver Broncos of the American Football League, Phipps became a major owner.

Four years later, he and his brother, Allan, became virtually the sole owners of the club and he assumed duties as board chairman. In 1966, with the consolidation of the two major leagues announced effective 1970, Denver joined the select handful of cities honored with a franchise in the combined leagues.

It was the culmination of hard work—and long-held dreams.

Now, more than 20 years after Gerry Phipps first found himself involved in Denver's sports picture, the dreams are becoming reality — much to the delight of the metropolitan area's sports and civic minded enthusiasts.

Phipps, 54, is a member of the Denver Country Club, the Denver Athletic Club, Denver Club, Cherry Hills Country Club and the Williams Club of New York.

He was born March 4, 1915, in Denver to Lawrence C. and Margaret Rogers Phipps and received his bachelor's degree from Williams College in 1936.

He was employed by the Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad from then until he entered the Navy as an Ensign in May, 1942.

Following his separation from the service in 1945, he was employed by a general contracting firm in Denver until 1952, when he formed his present company. In 1958, he was elected vice-president and treasurer of California Electric Power Co. and when that company merged with Southern California Edison Company late in 1963, he was named a director of the latter. He is a past president of the Associated Building Contractors of Colorado, Inc., and a director of The First National Bank of Denver and The Western Federal Savings and Loan Association.

Phipps was married in New York City on Sept. 24, 1937, to the former Janet Alice Smith. They have three daughters.

Lou Saban

General Manager — Head Coach



Lou Saban, the man who has the Denver Broncos climbing up the ladder, begins his third season as chief executive of pro football's Rocky Mountain entry. He signed a 10-year contract as General Manager and Head Coach in December, 1966.

Saban's first two-seasons were transitional years. They were also years marked by progress.

Following a 3-11 year in 1967 that saw the new Bronco boss bring in new players by the score, Denver jumped to 5-9 last season despite key injuries to quarterback Steve Tensi, receiver Al Denson and running back Floyd Little. Saban, a former two-time AFL Coach-of-the-Year at Buffalo in 1964 and 1965, feels that he has a solid working nucleus for the years ahead.

"If we can steer clear of the type of injuries we experienced a year ago," Saban said, "we feel that we can improve over our 1968 record. We know that we'll be a better football team. We hope this pays off in the victory column."

Saban and his staff have been busy off the field, as well as on. During the winter of 1967-68, the Bronco organization was in the forefront of a drive that saw Bronco fans raise \$1.8 million for the purchase of Bears Stadium by the city, allowing for subsequent renovation and expansion of the facility to 50,000 seats for 1968. The successful drive and a \$3 million revenue bond issue netted the current Denver Mile High Stadium.

At Buffalo, Saban transformed an also-ran into a winner. When the Bills finished last in the AFL's Eastern Division in 1961, Lou was elevated from Director of Player Personnel to Head Coach. Saban produced a winning team his first year. The next season, 1963, the Bills moved up to second place in their division. In 1964 and 1965, the Saban-coached Bills won both their divisional title and the over-all AFL championship.

The 47-year-old Bronco GM-Head Coach began his professional coaching career in 1960, when the AFL came into being. He directed the Boston Patriots in 1960 and for the first five games of the 1961 season. After winning the AFL title for the second straight time at Buffalo in 1965, Saban decided to return to the college coaching ranks at Maryland. However, Bronco owners Gerald and Allan Phipps persuaded Lou to return to the AFL in the dual capacities of General Manager and Head Coach a year later. His won-lost record for six-plus seasons is 46-40-3.

A single wing quarterback at the University of Indiana, Saban was the Hoosiers' captain and most valuable player in 1942, as well as an All-Big Ten selection. An almost sure bet for All-America honors the following year, as a senior, Saban found the military taking prior claim. And, in due course, he was commissioned a First Lieutenant in the Army's O.S.S.

After completing language school at Fort Benning, Georgia, Lou

was assigned to the China-Burma-India theater of operations as a student of the Chinese language (Mandarin dialect).

Three and a half years later, Saban received his honorable discharge and signed a professional football contract with the Cleveland Browns in the newly-formed All-America Conference.

It was the start of one of sports' most successful sagas. During the four years Saban played for the Browns, they won four league championships. Lou captained the Browns each season. Twice, in 1948 and 1949, he was an All-League linebacker selection.

When the AAC folded and merged with the NFL, Saban retired as a player. From there on, with the exception of 1956 when he entered the insurance business, Lou has been in the coaching profession.

From 1950 through 1952, Saban was head coach at Case Institute of Technology. From there he went to the University of Washington as an assistant coach. Lou joined the staff at Northwestern in 1954 as an assistant for the Wildcats, and the following year became their head coach.

After his brief tenure in the insurance business in 1956, Saban returned to football the following year as head coach at Western Illinois. In 1958 and again in 1959, Lou's Leathernecks won conference championships. The latter year his club was undefeated and ranked second in the nation among small colleges.

Saban returned to pro football in 1960 as head coach of the Boston Patriots in the new AFL.

Lou and his wife, Lorraine, who were married in 1947, have four children . . . Tom, Barbara, Patricia and Christine.

William "Whitey" Dovell

Offensive Line Coach

Whitey Dovell, 42, joined the Denver Broncos after 15 years at the University of Maryland as an assistant coach.

Born in Newark, N. J., Dovell interrupted his high school education for Uncle Sam's benefit during World War II, enlisting in the Seabees in 1944. He saw action in the Pacific Theater and received his honorable discharge in 1946.

After completing his high school education at Central High in Newark in 1947, Dovell entered Maryland and played varsity football under the late Jim Tatum. Whitey was an offensive guard. He participated in three bowl games, playing in the Gator Bowl twice and in the Sugar Bowl once.

After receiving his degree in Physical Education in 1951, Dovell stayed on at Maryland as freshman coach the following three years. He moved up to the varsity in 1955 as offensive line coach, a job he held through the 1966 season.

During his 15 years at Maryland, Whitey saw 22 of his players go on to play professional ball, including Stan Jones, an All-America lineman at Maryland in 1953 and current defensive line coach for the

Dovell and his wife, Claire, have three children, Audrey, 11, Patricia 9, and Lisa 7.

Sam Rutigliano

Offensive Receiver Coach

Sam Rutigliano, 37, serves as receiver coach for the Denver Broncos. He moved into the AFL two years ago with a background of 12 years coaching experience.

Rutigliano holds a B.A. degree from Tulsa University, where he also won three letters in football. In 1959, he received his M.A. degree from Columbia.

Sam started his coaching career as head coach at Lafayette High School in New York City in 1956. After three years, he moved on to become head coach at Greenwich High School in Connecticut in 1959.

Three years later, in 1962, he returned to New York State to coach at Chappaqua High School.

Rutigliano was named backfield coach at the University of Connecticut in 1964. He joined Saban at Maryland in 1966 as coach of receivers.

Sam is a native of Brooklyn, N.Y. He graduated from Erasmus Hall High School in Brooklyn, where he was an outstanding offensive end. His senior year he was named to the All-Metropolitan New York City team.

Rutigliano is married to the former Barbara Abe. They have three children, Paul 13, Alison 4, and Kerry 2.

Hunter Enis

Offensive Backfield Coach

A quarterback with the Denver Broncos during part of the 1962 season, Hunter Enis, 32, is the youngest member of Lou Saban's coaching staff.

A native of Fort Worth, Texas, Enis entered Texas Christian University after graduating from Polytechnic High School at Fort Worth in 1955. He went on to star at quarterback for the Horn Frogs, guiding them to the Southwest Conference Championship in 1958.

After receiving his B.A. Degree in math and geology in 1959, Enis signed with the old Chicago Cardinals. Released after five games, Hunter returned to TCU as an assistant coach and to work on his Master's Degree.

He signed on with the Dallas Texans of the American Football League in 1960, and moved on to the San Diego Chargers in 1961. He coached and studied at TCU in the off-season.

In 1962, Hunter was traded to the Broncos and played in seven league games before being dealt to the Oakland Raiders.

He completed work on his Master's Degree during the off-season and decided to retire and accepted a full-time job at TCU.

A veteran of six years of Air Force reserve training, Enis is married. He and his wife, Gloria, have a daughter, Jill, who is five, and a boy, James Hunter, age two.





Stan Jones

Defensive Line Coach

Stan Jones, 37, one of the leading linemen in the National Football League for 13 years, serves as defensive line coach for Denver Head Coach and General Manager Lou Saban.



Born in Altoona, Pa., Jones lettered for three years at the University of Maryland, gaining All-America honors as a guard in 1953. He was also named Lineman of the Year.

After receiving his degree in Physical Education in 1954, Jones began a long and illustrious career with the Chicago Bears. He was with Chicago for 12 years, then ended his playing days with the Washington Redskins in 1966.

As an offensive guard with the Bears, Jones was All-NFL in 1955 and 1956, and again in 1959 and 1960. He was also a member of the West team in the Pro Bowl seven times.

Jones demonstrated his versatility in 1963 by moving from offense to defense. He played fulltime at defensive tackle for the next four years.

Stan and his wife, Darlis, have been married for 14 years. They have a girl, Sherrie, 13, and a boy, Kevin, 11.

Dick MacPherson

Defensive Linebacker Coach

Dick MacPherson, 38, moved from Maryland to the professional ranks with Lou Saban following the 1966 season. With the addition of Joe Collier to the Bronco coaching staff this year, Dick is now the linebacker coach, after having coached the defensive backs for the past two years.



MacPherson has a Master's Degree from the University of Illinois. He also was a scholar-athlete at Springfield College in Massachusetts, where he received a B.A. in Physical Education.

His coaching experience is impressive, and spans from Illinois, where he was assistant freshman coach in 1958, to a stint at the University of Maryland, where he worked with the defensive backs.

In between, Dick coached at Massachusetts as line coach in 1959 and 1960, then moved on to the University of Cincinnati to coach the line and defensive backs from 1961 through 1965.

A native of Old Town, Maine, MacPherson attended Old Town High School, graduating in 1948. He spent two years at Maine Maritime Academy, then served with the U. S. Air Force from 1950 to 1954.

Upon receiving his honorable discharge, he enrolled at Springfield College and proceeded to win varsity letters in football and wrestling. As a footballer, he played center and linebacker.

Dick and his wife, Sandra, have been married for 11 years and have two girls, Maureen 9 and Janet 6.

Joe Collier

Defensive Backfield Coach



The newest addition to the Bronco staff is Joe Collier, 37, who was named defensive backfield coach in January of 1969. He came to Denver

from the Buffalo Bills where he served as head coach for two-plus

Joe was born in Rock Island, III., and was graduated from Rock Island High. He attended Northwestern University and lettered three years at offensive end. In 1953, he captained the Wildcats and was named to the All-Big Ten team. Post season he played in the Senior Bowl and East-West Shrine Game.

He was drafted by the New York Giants, but elected to by-pass pro ball. Joe served in the Army from 1954-56 prior to joining the coaching staff at Western Illinois as a graduate assistant in 1957.

A year later he became a full-time member of the staff, serving under Head Coach Lou Saban. He moved with Saban to the Boston Patriots in 1960 and on to the Buffalo Bills two years later. Joe was named Buffalo head coach in 1966 when Saban shifted to the college field.

Collier and his wife, Shirley, have three children—Julie, 11, Lisa, 10, and Joel, 5.

Fred Gehrke

Director of Player Personnel



Fred Gehrke, 51, a former football star at the University of Utah and with the Cleveland Browns and Los Angeles Rams, was named to the post of player personnel director of the

Broncos in January, 1965. He has proven to be an outstanding asset to the organization.

Gehrke, a native of Salt Lake City, Utah, was an all-professional halfback with the world champion Cleveland Rams in 1945. Later, as a member of the Los Angeles Rams, he served as a player-coach in 1948 and 1949 and then concluded his active playing career in 1950. He started his pro career with the Rams in 1940 and then played with the Los Angeles Bulldogs in the wartime Pacific Coast League from 1941 through 1944. Previously he was an outstanding scholarathlete at Utah in 1937, 1938 and 1939.

Gehrke remained close to the game after his retirement and did color commentary with Tom Harmon on radio and television football broadcasts for 13 years. Gehrke has two daughters, Bonnie 20, and Cathy 19. Fred and his wife, Jean, live in Arvada.

One of provisions of the bill is that major potential tenants of the stadium, including the Denver Bears and Denver Broncos, must sign a 10-year lease before the stadium bill goes to a public vote. Bronco owners Gerry and Allan Phipps will agree to this stipulation, thus assuring the permanency of the Broncos franchise in Denver with the passage of the stadium bill by the voters.

game in Atlanta.

September 19—Ray Ma'avasi named Head Coach of the Broncos, replacing Mac Speedie who resigned the previous day.

October 2—Broncos defeat Houston 40-38 on a 46-yard field goal by Gary Kroner in last 27 seconds of game for first victory of 1966 season

November 6—Broncos stage upset victory (17-10) over Eastern Division leader Boston in last 11 seconds with spectacular 65-yard scoring pass from quarterback Max Choboian to Al Denson.

The Bronco home opener saw the Boston Patriots take advantage of key Denver errors to hand the home team its third straight loss of the young season, 20-17. The diminutive Briscoe made his pro debut with 9:52 remaining in the game, immediately connected on a 22-yard pass to Eric Crabtree, and later scrambled 12 yards for a Bronco TD. The Bronco defenders, led by Rich Jackson and Drake Garrett, had a respectable day. But, the lack of offensive thrust and key mistakes extended the Bronco skein of setbacks.

Roaring to their most convincing triump of the season, the Broncos scored 14 quick points and went on to blitz the Patriots 35-14. The win gave the Rocky Mountain team four victories in five tries. Steve Tensi passed to Tom Beer for a touchdown the first time Denver took possession of the football. After holding the Pats, Denver used mostly an overland attack to grab a second TD. Tensi and running back Floyd Little both enjoyed their finest afternoons of the campaign. Tensi completed 11 of 17 passes for 206 yards and a pair of scores, the second a 51-yarder to rookie Billy Van Heusen. Little, who sprinted 55 yards for the clinching Bronco tally, rushed for over 100 yards for the second straight week. His 147 yard total (on 30 carries) shattered Cookie Gilchrist's Denver one-game rushing standard. Linebacker John Huard, who was later named AFL Defensive Player-of-the-Week for his efforts, took part in 14 tackles and led a rugged Bronco defense.

Beathard subsequently connected with Woody Campbell on a key third down situation, and then hit Haik with a 50-yard bomb for the clinching score. The Oilers added another TD on a pass interception and cruised to victory. Tensi was injured in the second quarter, after delivering his first completion of the contest.

1969 OUTLOOK

The Chiefs will enter 1969 with a solid foundation and must be considered a strong contender for the Western Division title . . . The most significant changes for 1969 are the shift of tight end Fred Arbanas to tackle, and the moving of Curtis McClinton from fullback to tight end. Stram feels the moves will prolong the careers of both players and give the Chiefs attack more versatility . . . One of the prerequisites for a contending team is an established quarterback. In Len Dawson the Chiefs have one of the most accomplished field generals in the game. He is the AFL's all-time passing leader, and last year annexed his fourth passing title in seven years . . . Garrett was also the Chiefs leading pass receiver with 33 catches . . . Last season the Chiefs were forced to use twice as many rushing plays as pass plays due to the many injuries to the receiving corps. This year the Chiefs should have a more balanced attack with the anticipated return of wide receiver Otis Taylor, who missed eight games due to injuries . . . Defensively the Chiefs should be as strong as last year when they led the AFL in nine categories, including fewest points allowed (170), fewest touchdowns (18), and interceptions (37) . . . Fran Lynch, subbing for the injured Floyd Little, scored a pair of Denver TDs on four- and six-yard bursts . . . Rich Jackson, badgering Namath all day, actually defensed five passes from his defensive end position. Weeb Ewbank said: "We just couldn't stop Jackson." Crabtree led the Bronco receivers with five catches for 148 yards. Namath completed 20 of 41 tosses for 341 yards, but the Broncos intercepted five tosses. Charlie Greer picked off two, and John Huard, Pete Jaquess and Jack Lentz got one each.
