

Memo to The Press



A Quick Glance

There's a definite note of optimism in the Denver Bronco camp this year, as everyone from Head Coach and General Manager Lou Saban to returning taxi-squad members of last season, feels the Broncos are ready to make a serious challenge in the tough Western Division of the American Football Conference.

This is not to say there are not the usual "if's" involved. For instance: IF Don Horn, the newly acquired quarterback from Green Bay can make the team go; IF several key players (Billy Thompson, Sam Brunelli, Booker Edgerson, to name a few) recover from corrective surgery to full speed; IF one or more drafted rookies can become instant players; and IF the injury bug can bypass the Bronco camp in 1971.

Granted, these are "if's" that concern all head coaches. But, perhaps for the first time, there appears to be some depth at most positions this season, and Saban and his charges are ready and rarin' to go.

Offensively, Horn is obviously a key figure. If he can establish himself as the leader and throw the ball as well as his credentials would indicate, look for a vastly improved offense. If Horn can come through, much of the pressure would be taken off Floyd Little, a true super star who led the AFC in rushing last season. Also, consistency at quarterback would also alleviate some of the pressure from a harassed corps of receivers who, collectively, did not have a good year in 1970.

Defensively, the team appears pretty well set, although there will be some interesting battles taking place pre-season at the linebacker and cornerback slots.

The defensive line, anchored by all-pro end Richard Jackson and co-captain Dave Costa, should make its mark as one of the finest in all of football. This group dropped enemy quarterbacks 50 times in 1970 for a club record.


COACH SABAN SAYS:

"This is the year we've got to start moving in the direction of a winning season, something Denver Bronco fans have never enjoyed. We were very close last year, but evidently we weren't quite tough enough to maintain our fast start. This year we feel that we have enough quality players, granting some are rookies, to make up some of the ground we need to become a winner.

"Defensively, we hope to be improved, although we were happy with the overall play of this unit which set 15 new Bronco records. It's no secret that the offense must be a lot better and we think our new people will make a big difference. Don Horn, of course, is the man we're looking to to lead us out of the woods. Marv Montgomery, a 255-pound offensive tackle whom we drafted number one, will get lots of early work as will John Kohler, a 260-pounder whom we drafted third a year ago but didn't report to camp.

"We hope that these men, along with Dwight Harrison, a wide receiver with blazing speed and great jumping ability, will give us the boost we need. Our running game, led by Floyd Little, Bobby Anderson, Willis Crenshaw and Clem Turner, is our strong suit, and probably will continue to be.

"Rich Jackson, Dave Costa, Paul Smith and Pete Duranko up front form as good a defensive line as there is, so we will be tough and aggressive again, defensively. Overall, we hope this is the year a winner comes to Denver."

Gerald H. Phipps

Chairman of the Board



Gerry Phipps has been an integral part of the Denver sports scene for nearly 25 years — a time which saw the metropolitan area attain major league status and nationwide recognition.

In 1947, he became part of the organization that brought the Denver Bears here as members of the old Western League. The Bears, during the years which immediately followed that move, set minor league baseball attendance records which stood unchallenged for many years.

In 1961, one year after big league professional football had arrived in the form of the Denver Broncos of the American Football League, Phipps became a major owner and assumed duties as board chairman.

Four years later, he and his brother, Allan, became virtually the sole owners of the club.

Phipps, 56, is a member of the Denver Country Club, the Denver Athletic Club, Denver Club, Cherry Hills Country Club and the Williams Club of New York.

He was born March 4, 1915, in Denver to Lawrence C. and Margaret Rogers Phipps and received his bachelor's degree from Williams College in 1936.

He was employed by the Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad from then until he entered the Navy as an Ensign in May, 1942.

Following his separation from the service in 1945, he was employed by a general contracting firm in Denver until 1952, when he formed his present company. In 1958, he was elected vice-president and treasurer of California Electric Power Co. and when that company merged with Southern California Edison Company late in 1963, he was named a director of the latter. He is a past president of the Associated Building Contractors of Colorado, Inc., and a director of The First National Bank Corporation, Western Federal Savings and Loan Association, and the Denver and Rio Grande Western Railroad. He also is a trustee of Colorado College.

Phipps was married in New York City on Sept. 24, 1937, to the former Janet Alice Smith. They have three daughters.

Allan R. Phipps

President



Allan R. Phipps manages to mesh a long-standing interest in sports with various other widespread community participations.

At Williams College, where he received his bachelor's degree, he was a member of the tennis and swimming teams. As president of Empire Sports, Inc., he has been in the forefront of professional sports activities.

Phipps, 58, is also a partner in the law firm of Hughes & Dorsey; active in key non-candidate roles in the Republican party, including a stint as chairman of the GOP State Finance Committee, and serves on the governing boards of numerous organizations.

His posts include those of trustee of the University of Denver, the Denver Museum of Natural History, the Denver Symphony Society and Graland Country Day School.

Phipps was Alumni Trustee of Williams College and is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Winter Park Recreational Association and of the Board of Managers of St. Luke's Hospital in Denver.

In addition to his bachelor's degree from Williams in 1934, he received a degree in Jurisprudence from Oxford University in 1936 and a law degree from the University of Denver in 1937.

Phipps is a member of Phi Beta Kappa. He served in World War II as a Lieutenant Commander, U. S. Naval Reserve, in the Pacific Theater.

He is a director of Cherry Creek National Bank, South Denver National Bank, Belcaro Realty Investment Company, International Realty Company, Highlander Hotel Corporation, and Van Schaack Corporation.

Phipps was admitted to the Colorado bar in 1938 and joined Hughes & Dorsey in 1946.

He is married to the former Clara Mitchell Van Schaack, and has two sons and a daughter.

Lou Saban
Head Coach
General Manager



Twenty-five years ago Lou Saban began a professional football career which few can copy. It has included two years as an all-league line-backer with the Cleveland entry in the All America Conference and, as a head coach, two American Football League Championships.

In his fifth year as General Manager and Head Coach, Lou hopes this will be the year that his Broncos turn the corner toward a consistent winning formula.

With the addition of quarterback Don Horn and kicker Jim Turner, there is optimism in the Denver camp that this will be the year that has long been awaited. Saban's rebuilding program started in 1967 and has made steady gains along the way.

"We've stressed youth, and have had to pay the price for growing pains," Saban commented. "We're very happy with our recent draft. I think we helped ourselves in the areas we needed help the most."

At Buffalo, Saban transformed an also-ran into a winner. When the Bills finished last in the AFL's Eastern Division in 1961, Lou was elevated from Director of Player Personnel to Head Coach. Saban produced a winning team his first year. The next season, 1963, the Bills moved up to second place in their division. In 1964 and 1965, the Saban coached Bills won both their divisional title and the over-all AFL Championship.

The 49-year-old Bronco GM-Head Coach began his professional coaching career in 1960, when the AFL came into being. He directed the Boston Patriots in 1960 and for the first five games of the 1961 season. After winning the AFL title for the second straight time at Buffalo in 1965, Saban decided to return to the college coaching ranks at Maryland. However, Bronco owners Gerald and Allan Phipps persuaded Lou to return to the AFL in the dual capacities of General Manager and Head Coach a year later. His won-lost record for eight plus seasons is 60-66-2.

An all Big Ten player at Indiana, Lou's collegiate coaching stops were at Case Institute of Technology, Washington, Northwestern and Western Illinois. The U.S. Army took him from college as a senior. He was commissioned a First Lieutenant and completed language school. He was then assigned to the China-Burma-India theater of operations as a student of the Chinese language (Mandarin dialect). Following his discharge, he signed with the Cleveland Browns in the newly formed All-America Conference.

It was the start of one of sports' most successful sagas. During the four years Saban played for the Browns, they won four league championships. Lou captained the Browns each season. Twice, in 1948 and 1949, he was an All-League line-backer selection.

Lou and his wife, Lorraine, who were married in 1947, have four children . . . Tom, Barbara, Patricia and Christine.

Joe Collier

Defensive Backfield Coach



Joe Collier, 39, was named defensive backfield coach in January of 1969. He came to Denver from the Buffalo Bills where he served as head coach for two-plus seasons.

Joe was born in Rock Island, Ill., and was graduated from Rock Island High. He attended Northwestern University and lettered three years at offensive end. In 1953, he captained the Wildcats and was named to the All-Big Ten team. Post season he played in the Senior Bowl and East-West Shrine Game.

He was drafted by the New York Giants, but elected to by-pass pro ball. Joe served in the Army from 1954-56 prior to joining the coaching staff at Western Illinois as a graduate assistant in 1957.

A year later he became a full-time member of the staff, serving under Head Coach Lou Saban. He moved with Saban to the Boston Patriots in 1960 and on to the Buffalo Bills two years later. Joe was named Buffalo head coach in 1966 when Saban shifted to the college field.

Collier and his wife, Shirley, have three children — Julie, 13, Lisa, 12, and Joel, 7.

Stan Jones

Defensive Line Coach



Stan Jones, 39, one of the leading linemen in the National Football League for 13 years, serves as defensive line coach for Denver Head Coach and General Manager Lou Saban.

Born in Altoona, Pa., Jones lettered for three years at the University of Maryland, gaining All-America honors as a guard in 1953. He was also named Lineman of the Year in the nation.

After receiving his degree in Physical Education in 1954, Jones began a long and illustrious career with the Chicago Bears. He was with Chicago for 12 years, then ended his playing days with the Washington Redskins in 1966.

As an offensive guard with the Bears, Jones was All-NFL in 1955 and 1956, and again in 1959 and 1960. He was a member of the West team in the Pro Bowl seven times.

Jones demonstrated his versatility in 1963 by moving from offense to defense. He played fulltime at defensive tackle for the next four years.

Stan and his wife, Darlis, have been married for 15 years. They have a girl, Sherrie, 15 and boys, Kevin, 13, Tony, 13.

Hunter Enis

Offensive Backfield Coach

A quarterback with the Denver Broncos during part of the 1962 season, Hunter Enis, 34, is the youngest member of Lou Saban's coaching staff.

A native of Fort Worth, Texas, Enis entered Texas Christian University after graduating from Polytechnic High School at Fort Worth in 1955. He went on to star at quarterback for the Horn Frogs, guiding them to the Southwest Conference Championship in 1958.


After receiving his B.A. degree in math and geology in 1959, Enis signed with the old Chicago Cardinals. Released after five games, Hunter returned to TCU as an assistant coach and to work on his Master's degree.

He signed on with the Dallas Texans of the American Football League in 1960, and moved on to the San Diego Chargers in 1961. He coached and studied at TCU in the off-season.

In 1962, Hunter was traded to the Broncos and played in seven league games before being dealt to the Oakland Raiders.

He completed work on his Master's degree during the off-season and decided to retire and accepted a full-time job at TCU.

A veteran of six years of Air Force reserve training, Enis is married. He and his wife, Gloria, have a daughter, Jill, 7, and a boy, James Hunter, 4.



Jerry Smith

Offensive Line Coach

Jerry Smith assumes the role of the newest member of the Bronco coaching staff, but the 40-year-old Dayton, Ohio native is not a stranger to the professional coaching ranks.

Smith spent the last two seasons on the coaching staff of the New Orleans Saints, and this fall starts his 12th year as a pro teacher. Smith broke into the pro coaching ranks in 1960 with the Boston Patriots as defensive line and linebacker coach. In 1961, Jerry's Boston line was first against the run in the league. In 1962, Smith moved with Lou Saban from Boston to Buffalo as line and linebacker coach. He remained with the Bills until he joined the Saints in 1968.

Smith was an All-Big Ten tackle at Wisconsin and played in the East-West Shrine game. Smith was drafted and played guard for the San Francisco 49ers in 1952 and 1953 seasons, before entering the military service. In 1956 he returned to pro football with the 49ers and the Green Bay Packers. His initial coaching job was at the University of Dayton in 1959 as line coach.

Jerry and his wife, Shirley, have four children, Diane, 10, Jeffrey, 9, Brian, 8, and Meghan, 6.



William "Whitey" Dovell

Special Teams, Tight End
Coach

Whitney Dovell, 44, joined the Denver Broncos after 15 years at the University of Maryland as an assistant coach.

Born in Newark, N.J., Dovell interrupted his high school education for Uncle Sam's benefit during World War II, enlisting in the Seabees in 1944. He saw action in the Pacific Theater and received his honorable discharge in 1946.

After completing his high school education at Central High in Newark in 1947, Dovell entered Maryland and played varsity football under the late Jim Tatum. Whitey was an offensive guard. He participated in three bowl games, playing in the Gator Bowl twice and in the Sugar Bowl once.

After receiving his degree in Physical Education in 1951, Dovell stayed on at Maryland as freshman coach the following three years. He had the only undefeated frosh team in school's history. He moved up to the varsity in 1955 and in 12 seasons coached the offensive line, receivers, defensive line and linebackers.

During his 15 years at Maryland, Whitey saw 22 of his players go on to play professional ball, including four offensive linemen off one team.

Dovell and his wife, Claire, have three children — Audrey 13, Patricia 11, and Lisa, 9.



Fred Gehrke


Director of Player Personnel

Fred Gehrke, 53, a former football star at the University of Utah and with the Cleveland Rams and Los Angeles Rams, was named to the post of player personnel director of the Broncos in January, 1965.

Gehrke, a native of Salt Lake City, Utah, was an all-professional halfback with the world champion Cleveland Rams in 1945. Later, as a member of the Los Angeles Rams, he served as a player-coach in 1948 and 1949 and then concluded his active playing career in 1950.

He started his pro career with the Rams in 1940 and then played with the Los Angeles Bulldogs in the war-time Pacific Coast League from 1941 through 1944. During that time he also worked in the Engineering Design Division of the Northrup Aircraft Co. a technical artist, he is responsible for the helmet design presently worn by the Los Angeles Rams. Previously he was an outstanding scholar-athlete at Utah in 1937, 1938 and 1939. Also, he held the record in the javelin and was the conference diving champion for 3 years.

Gehrke remained close to the game after his retirement and did color commentary with Tom Harmon on radio and television football broadcasts for 13 years. Gehrke has five children — four daughters and a son. Fred and his wife, Jean, live in Arvada.



Carroll Hardy

Director of Scouting



Carroll Hardy, 38, assumed the duties of Director of Scouting in June of 1970. He is responsible for assessing the talent of hundreds of college athletes that become eligible for the pros each year, and deciding which of them can play football professionally.

Hardy has long been considered one of the greatest athletes produced by Colorado since winning a modern record of 10 letters at the University of Colorado (four each in football and baseball and two in track.)

After his graduation from the U. of Colorado in 1955 with a degree in education, Carroll signed a baseball contract with the Cleveland Indians and was drafted in the third round by football's San Francisco 49ers, and played that year as a wide receiver and a running back.

The '56 and '57 seasons were spent in the Army, but he returned to Cleveland in 1958 and was used as an outfielder until 1960 when he was traded to the Red Sox. In 1961 Carroll became the only man ever to pinch hit for Ted Williams.

The year 1963 found Hardy with the expansion Houston Colt 45's, where he remained until 1965 when he was traded to Minnesota. During the fall of '65 he became associated with the Broncos as a scout.

In 1969 Carroll became assistant ticket manager for the Broncos and held the position until being named to his new post. Hardy and his wife, the former Janice Mitchell, were married in 1956 and have three children—Jay, 14; Jill, 13 and Lisa, 10. They reside in Boulder.



Allen Hurst

Trainer

The duties of trainer fall on the shoulders of Allen Hurst, a man who has been in the business since he was 15.

Hurst, 30, was born in Houston, Texas, and took up training in his freshman year in high school. After his graduation in 1959, he accepted a four-year scholarship to train at Texas Christian University.

During his stint as student trainer at TCU, he commuted to Houston where he was on the staff of the Oilers. While with the Oilers training staff, Houston played in the AFL Championship Games of 1960, 1961, and 1962.

He was graduated from TCU in 1963 with a degree in physical education and a minor in biology. He then joined the Broncos and has been in the post of head trainer since.

Allen and his wife, the former Patsy Jean Schuler, were married in 1963 and live in Lakewood.

Hurst is assisted by Dave Kendall, 28, former trainer at University of Pacific.

Larry Elliott

Equipment Manager



Responsible for handling the large amount of equipment needed by a professional football team is Larry Elliott, 34, a native of Seneca, Kansas.

Larry began his career in athletics at the age of 13 when his parents moved the family to Colorado. At St. Mary's High School in Colorado Springs, he won a total of 10 varsity letters in football, basketball and baseball. A number of scholarship offers in both football and baseball followed his graduation in 1955, but Larry opted for the Air Force.

During his four years in the service at such spots as Hawaii, Guam, The Philippines, Japan and Tripoli, athletics were not forgotten. While stationed at Tripoli's Wheelus Air Force Base he won All-European honors as a third baseman.


Following his discharge from the service, Elliott worked as an assistant manager of a finance company, bookkeeper and as assistant athletic equipment manager for the Air Force Academy. He was recommended for the Bronco position in 1965 by Air Force Academy equipment manager Artus Smith; a position he has held since.

THE 1971 CAMPAIGN

A Position by Position Analysis

GENERAL

A lot of people feel the Denver Broncos might be ready to make a run at the leaders in 1971, the fifth year in Lou Saban's rebuilding program in the Mile High City. In fact, there are several NFL teams who would attest to the fact the Broncos were more than competitive last year, although the 5-8-1 record was a disappointment after a 4-1 early start.

Last season Denver's biggest loss was by 16 points, and the Broncos held late leads over Oakland and San Francisco before letting the two divisional winners off the hook in the waning moments of the two games. And, of course, there was the early season win over the then-defending World Champion Kansas City team . . . only the second success over the Chiefs in the long series.

The Broncos are dedicated to making a legitimate run at a winning season in 1971, something that has eluded Denver teams the past eleven years, and players and coaches alike feel that if they get away from the starting gate anything like they did last season, they won't fold in the stretch again.

THE OFFENSE

This unit has undergone a major revision, and although no one wants to heap pressure on a quarterback who has yet to don a Bronco uniform, it's no secret that the impact newly acquired DON HORN might have on the Bronco offense will pretty well set the tone for 1971. Offensive tackle ROGER SHOALS, obtained in a trade with Detroit, and rookie tackles MARV MONTGOMERY (6-6, 255) and JOHN KOHLER, (6-6, 260) could add a new look to the forward wall. If that unit can improve, fans might see FLOYD LITTLE and BOBBY ANDERSON in the same backfield on occasion, a move which would certainly add another dimension to the attack. Whatever the combination, consistency is the password for this season and improvement is expected barring serious injury.

QUARTERBACKS

There's no question but what DON HORN is a key figure in the plans. He comes from Green Bay and was that club's first draft choice in 1967. He has the credentials and the arm, played behind Bart Starr and holds Green Bay's single game passing record. AL PASTRANA, who went all the way from the cab squad to the starting job last season, will battle Horn, as will STEVE RAMSEY, acquired from New Orleans, free agent candidate GARY BEBAN, 13th round draftee CRAIG BLACKFORD, and free agent MIKE CONNER. Coach Lou Saban hopes one will emerge as THE Denver quarterback after Pastrana, STEVE TENSI, and PETE LISKE all had shots at the number one job last season.

RUNNING BACKS

FLOYD LITTLE. That's enough right there to convince anyone Denver's running game is in good shape. Floyd, although playing behind an offensive line riddled with injuries, and playing the final two games of the season with a broken bone in his back, appeared in all 14 games in 1971 and won his first conference rushing title with 901 yards. The steady improvement of last year's top draft choice, BOBBY ANDERSON, gives the Broncos as good a one-two punch as

there is in football. Veteran WILLIS CRENSHAW is a superb blocker although he didn't have a great year running the ball, and CLEM TURNER came into his own when injuries slowed Crenshaw for three games. Add to this quartet durable FRAN LYNCH who can play both running back spots and you have the group that finished fifth in the AFC rushing department in '70. LAWRENCE JAMES of Norfolk State, the only running back drafted by Denver, could press the veterans.

RECEIVERS

On the surface, this looms as possible problem area as Denver will be counting on four veterans who survived so-so seasons last year and some rookies. Veteran Al Denson is gone (traded to Vikings), but wide receivers MIKE HAFFNER, BILLY VAN HEUSEN, JOHN EMBREE and JERRY HENDREN return. WALTER "The Flea" ROBERTS, obtained in a June trade from Washington, will also have a shot at the wide receiver job. Haffner and Van Heusen were slowed somewhat last season due to knee surgery, but appear ready to regain their 1969 form. Hendren didn't catch a ball last year as a rookie, but has the talent to blossom into a top performer this year. Embree, the fastest of the lot, showed considerable promise in '69, but had an off-season in 1970. The rookies include number two choice DWIGHT HARRISON, a high-jumping speed merchant who was the Lone Star Conference "Receiver of the Decade." FLOYD FRANKS, who was Archie Manning's top receiver at Mississippi, could be a find, as might speedy CARLIS HARRIS from Idaho State. Tight end returnees feature JIM WHALEN, BILLY MASTERS and JOHN MOSIER. Whalen was the starter last season, but will have to go all out to hold off the expected challenge from Masters.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Not one of the long suits for the Broncos in 1970, this unit received much of the off-season attention. Tackle Roger Shoals at 6-4, 260, and a nine year veteran from Detroit, should be of immediate help, and combined with veteran MIKE CURRENT (6-4), and rookies MARV MONTGOMERY (6-6), JOHN KOHLER (6-6) and TOM BEARD (6-6), could give Denver a new look up front. Veterans are Current, tackle SAM BRUNELLI (who will be trying to come off a knee injury), guards GEORGE GOEDDEKE and MIKE SCHNITKER, and center LARRY KAMINSKI. Second year man STEVE ALEXAKOS will be pressing at guard, and free agent GEORGE GAISER is coming back from knee surgery and could be a factor. Apparently this unit has gone from being undermanned to fairly deep at all spots, and although much of the talent is young, the offensive line could turn out to be a solid, and certainly good-sized, unit.

DEFENSE

Undoubtedly the strongest part of the Bronco squad in 1970, as the defensive unit was third in all of pro football against the rush, and third in the AFC in total defense. Led by All-Pro defensive end RICHARD JACKSON, the Broncos set 15 club records, including nailing enemy quarterbacks 50 times, second only to the Rams in both leagues. Injuries in the defensive backfield, especially at cornerback, hurt in the late going, but all hands appear ready to go in 1971.

DEFENSIVE LINE

This unit should rate with any in professional football. RICH JACKSON, a unanimous all-pro selection at end, along with captain DAVE COSTA and PAUL SMITH at tackles, and PETE DURANKO at the other end and backup man JERRY

INMAN, are all established, solid, performers. Returning squadman WALT BARNES, along with draft choices LYLE ALZADO (no. 4), ROGER ROITSCH (no. 11) and STEVE THOMPSON (no. 16), will vie for spots on the squad. If this unit can avoid injury, it might become known as the best in the business.

LINEBACKERS

Adequate is the word that probably best sums up the situation. Veteran FRED FORSBERG moved into the middle last year and performed so well that three-year starter John Huard was traded. DAVE WASHINGTON, 6-5, 227, should be a standout in his sophomore season. Seven-year veteran OLEN UNDERWOOD, a starter for Houston last season, might have the inside track on the other outside spot vacated when Carl Cunningham was dealt to Detroit. Underwood will have to battle returnees BILL BUTLER, CHIP MYRTLE, BILL MCKOY, and KEN CRITER. Free agent BOB GEDDES also looks like a solid contender while the draftees are DOUG ADAMS and JOHN HANDY.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

Just when it appeared this phase of the game was in the best shape in Bronco history, injuries felled three cornerbacks last season and the scramble was on. Third-year pro BILL THOMPSON will be one of the best in the business if he bounces back from knee surgery. He'll probably team with veteran LEROY MITCHELL, acquired in a trade with Houston, to give Denver a premier pair of corners. Last year's rookie RANDY MONTGOMERY was a comer with great speed but sat out the season with ankle surgery. The medics also put the knife to veteran BOOKER EDGERSON and DRAKE GARRETT who are questionable. Veteran CORNELL GORDON will be back at corner and will battle with fine rookie prospects CLEOPHUS JOHNSON and HAROLD PHILLIPS. Veteran PAUL MARTHA retired thus leaving another vet GEORGE SAIMES the top candidate at free safety, but he will receive competition from several rookies. Veteran CHARLES GREER and converted corner BOB WADE look to be the leaders at the strong safety. Barring injuries, this could be one of Denver's strong suits in 1971.

PUNTING

Veteran BILL VAN HEUSEN will be the Bronco punter until someone can take the job away from him. Although several knee operations over the years have hampered Bill some, he still averaged 42.9 yards on 87 punts last season. BOBBY ANDERSON also punts, and they will be challenged by draftee JACK SIMCSAK (no. 17) and free agent JIM POCIAC.

PLACEKICKING

A trade has brought veteran kicker JIM TURNER into the Bronco fold, and Turner is expected to add consistency to the Denver attack. Turner ranks number 13 among all-time scorers in the NFL. He will battle draftee Jack Simcsak and free agent Jim Pociak for the job. DAVE WASHINGTON, linebacker, is leading candidate to handle kickoff duties.

One of team's most exciting players and a fan favorite, Bobby had outstanding rookie season in 1970, evidenced by the fact he was team's second leading rusher though he didn't start. Played behind AFC's leader Floyd Little. A versatile player, Bobby also caught nine passes, returned 21 kickoffs (team leader), and completed four of seven passes. Was team's fourth leading scorer. Second first round draft choice ever signed by Broncos. Twice won All-Big Eight first team honors while at Colorado. Named first team All-America in most polls senior year. Named MVP of 1969 Liberty Bowl when he set CU record of 354 yards rushing on 35 carries in team's win over Alabama. Holds 18 CU grid records. MVP in 1970 Hula Bowl Game (played quarterback). Active member of Fellowship of Christian Athletes. In pre-pro career, played on only one losing team in sports of football, basketball and baseball. Could team with Little in backfield this season which would add new dimension to Bronco attack.

History and public relations major . . . Now lives in Denver . . . Toured Viet Nam early in '70 with a pro football entourage

1970 BRONCOS SET NEW NFL RECORD

Last season the Denver Broncos eased into a new
National Football League record in one of the oldest cate-
gories on the books. Denver returned 63 opponent punts in
1970 for 556 yards. The Cleveland Browns held the NFL re-
cord for most punt returns in one season with 61 returns in
the 1954 season. The 1950 Chicago Bears returned 60, and
the 1969 Los Angeles Rams returned 58 for the previous
highs. The 556 yards gained on the 63 returns last year by
the Broncos topped all 26 teams in professional football,
but was considerably short of the NFL record of 781 set by
the 1948 Chicago Bears.



1970 in Review

1970 SEASON IN REVIEW

The 1970 Denver Bronco football team offered its followers the full spectrum of emotion as the team swept to victory in the first three games, led the league for nearly half of the season, registered its second-ever victory over the Kansas City Chiefs, the then-defending World Champions, then saw it all slip away as the Broncos could muster only a win and a tie in the last eight games.

But while the October thoughts of a championship in the Mile High City quietly changed to a mood of frustration, Head Coach and General Manager Lou Saban was steering his charges into the position of a challenger, hopefully for the 1971 campaign. And even though the 1970 record of 5-8-1 was identical to that posted the previous season, closer examination of that record lends a note of optimism to the future.

First of all, the defense was superlative, especially before a knee injury to cornerman Bill Thompson triggered a rash of similar injuries to the secondary. There were 15 new club records for defensive prowess, including the fewest total points allowed, fewest total yards, first downs, touchdown passes, rushing yards, and the fact the Bronco front four spear-headed an attack which dropped opponent quarterbacks 50 times.

After downing Buffalo and Pittsburgh, the Broncos scored what probably stands as their biggest win to date by overwhelming the Kansas City Chiefs, 26-13 in a game which saw Lenny Dawson manage only 33 net yards passing.

Floyd Little, one of the game's genuine superstars, won his first conference rushing title with 901 yards, but had to play the final two games with a hairline fracture of a small bone in his back. That's noteworthy, because it was the first season in his career that Little had appeared in every regular season game (he also appeared in every pre-season game). Much of Floyd's success can be attributed to Bobby Anderson, the Bronco's first draft choice a year ago, and who played in relief of Little. So successful was this tandem that Bobby finished as the team's second leading rusher, and the Broncos as the fifth best in the league in that category.

Defensively, Richard Jackson was named to virtually every all-pro team after a spectacular campaign from his defensive end position. Jackson, along with co-captain Dave Costa, rapidly improving Paul Smith and Pete Duranko, led the defensive charge that limited opponents to less than 100 rushing yards ten times in the fourteen league games. The best effort was an 18-yard yield to Pittsburgh in the home opener.

Although no one likes to measure success in negative terms, it is significant that Denver's worst defeat in 1971 was by 16 points, a far cry from the "old days" in Bronco grid annals. And, aside from the big win over Kansas City, it must be noted that Denver held late game leads over San Francisco and Oakland . . . both divisional winners . . . before letting the two off the hook in the late going.

Perhaps the most impressive aspect of the season was the way Bronco fans responded to the improved brand of football by the Denver squad. The total for seven home games of 355,739 was a new record by nearly 30-thousand. The average home crowd of 50,820 was several hundred more than capacity, and the single game mark of 51,001 came against Cleveland on the last day of a 5-8-1 season.





1959

- August 14—First American Football League organizational meeting held in Chicago. Denver, with Bob Howsam as its principal owner, named as a charter member along with New York, Dallas, Los Angeles, Minneapolis and Houston.
- November 22—First player selection draft held through 32 rounds. Denver's first pick is Roger LeClerc, center, Trinity.
- November 30—Joe Foss named American Football League commissioner.
- December 1—Dean Griffing named general manager of the Broncos.
- December 2—Second player selection draft of 20 rounds held.

1960

- January 1—Frank Filchock named first head coach of the Broncos.
- January 30—Denver placed in AFL's western division with Dallas, Oakland and Los Angeles.
- Spring—Frank Tripucka and Chuck Gavin, with Canadian experience, and NFL veteran, Bud McFadin, coming out of retirement, join squad. Also joining squad is unknown Gene Mingo, without college experience, who later proves to be one of the game's great placekickers.
- June 9—AFL signs five-year television contract with the American Broadcasting Company.
- July—First Bronco training camp opens at Colorado School of Mines.
- July 29—First intra-squad game played at Colorado School of Mines.
- September 9—After losing all five pre-season games, the Broncos become the first AFL victor when they defeat the Patriots in Boston in history's first AFL game, 13-10. Attendance—21,597.
- September 23—Lionel Taylor, a cut of the Chicago Bears, plays first game for Broncos in New York. He is destined to become one of the league's greatest pass receivers.

- November 27—Broncos, down 38-7 late in the third quarter, stage historic 31-point rally to tie Buffalo, 38-38.
- December—Offensive End Lionel Taylor, Defensive Tackle Bud McFadin and Safety Goose Gonsoulin all named to first official all-AFL team.

- May 26—Bob and Lee Howsam, original principal owners of the Broncos, sell their stock to a new syndicate headed by Cal Kunz and Gerry Phipps.
- June 1—Cal Kunz named president and operating head of Empire Sports.
- December—Lionel Taylor sets professional record with 100 pass receptions for season. Taylor and Bud McFadin named to all-AFL team.
- December—Frank Filchock released as Broncos head coach.

1962

- September 7—Broncos open regular season with 31-21 win over defending western division champion San Diego before turnaway crowd at D.U. stadium.
- October 21—Broncos defeat Houston, 20-10, before 34,496 at Bears Stadium. Season record upped to 6-1 with win.
