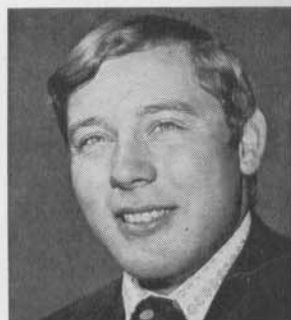

ON THE COVER

The 1972 press guide cover of the Broncos depicts "something old and something new" in Denver's pro football history. Floyd Little, familiar Number 44, rushed for 1,133 yards in 1971 to win the National Football League rushing title, while the Broncos' new head coach, John Ralston (top), is readying his forces for the upcoming season. Ralston took his Stanford charges to two Rose Bowl victories, and hopes to get the Broncos into another "Bowl" in the very near future. The artist for this year's press guide is Bronco defensive back Randy Montgomery, who majored in art at Weber State University.

A Quick Glance

There really aren't any superstitious people connected with the Denver Bronco football program, but no one is overlooking the fact the Broncos are still looking for their first winning season, and that the 1972 campaign will give them their 13th try at that elusive goal.

Denver followers feel they have more than lucky number 13 going for them this season, too. Most importantly, there is a completely new atmosphere surrounding the Bronco camp, created by new Head Coach and General Manager John Ralston who took over the helm in Denver after a highly successful collegiate career at Utah State and Stanford. At the latter school, Ralston guided the Indians out of the doldrums to eight consecutive winning seasons and back to back upset wins over Ohio State and Michigan in the prestigious Rose Bowl.

And there is no way of assessing Denver's outlook without making mention of the injuries which decimated the squad in 1971. Most observers feel the Broncos will make a bona fide run at a break-even season if all of last year's casualties return at full speed and if the team can escape the crippling injuries suffered last year. Every team must face the injury situation, but in 1971, Denver lost both defensive ends, the starting quarterback, a starting tackle-guard, and the starting center for the season.

Offensively, there will be three veteran quarterbacks on hand when camp opens, which, in itself, is a first for Denver. Steve Ramsey, who performed creditably in the last five games as the starter; Don Horn, who went out with a shoulder separation; and John Stofa, veteran, but injury-prone player acquired from Miami, will be the men most likely to battle for the job. And there is Floyd Little, the best running back in professional football last season with 1,133 yards who, by himself, makes Denver's running attack better than the norm.

Defensively, the team is pretty solid, and needs only more consistent linebacking to become one of the very best defensive units in the business. This unit set new team standards in pass defense last year, and the front four spearheaded a pass rush that led the NFL in dropping the quarterback.

Coach Ralston Says:

"We will have a positive approach in everything we do. I know I have a lot of learning to do, but I intend to have a flexible program here and to make intelligent decisions.

"Our goal is winning the Super Bowl. There's no question that we'll make it, the only thing we don't know is how long it will take.

"I must emphasize that all of our impressions regarding the Bronco personnel at this point are those gained from watching film.

"Obviously, the offense must be improved, as a team just has to score more touchdowns to be a winner in professional football. Although the rushing game of the Broncos was excellent last season, I feel we must have more of a balance between the running and passing games. While trying to accomplish the desired balance and unpredictable aspects of our offense, we must still make certain that Floyd Little gets the football.

"Defensively, I am very impressed with some of our players, and we have the ingredients of a fine squad, although we need much more consistent play and fewer mistakes from our linebackers. We naturally hope that Rich Jackson and Pete Duranko can come back after knee surgery. If they do, we will have a real battle for the four 'down' linemen spots with those two plus Paul Smith, Dave Costa, Lyle Alzado, Tom Domres and Jerry Inman. Our secondary played very well last season, and there's no reason to expect anything but continued improvement from that group."

Gerald H. Phipps

Chairman of the Board



Gerry Phipps has been an integral part of the Denver sports scene for nearly 26 years — a time which saw the metropolitan area attain major league status and nationwide recognition.

In 1947, he became part of the organization that brought the Denver Bears here as members of the old Western League. The Bears, during the years that immediately followed that move, set minor league baseball attendance records that stood unchallenged for many years.

In 1961, one year after big league professional football had arrived in the form of the Denver Broncos of the American Football League, Phipps became a major owner and assumed duties as board chairman.

Four years later, he and his brother, Allan, became virtually the sole owners of the club.

Phipps, 57, is a member of the Denver Country Club, the Denver Athletic Club, Denver Club, Cherry Hills Country Club and the Williams Club of New York.

He was born March 4, 1915, in Denver to Lawrence C. and Margaret Rogers Phipps and received his bachelor's degree from Williams College in 1936.

He was employed by the Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad from then until he entered the Navy as an Ensign in May, 1942.

Following his separation from the service in 1945, he was employed by a general contracting firm in Denver until 1952, when he formed his present company, Gerald H. Phipps, Inc. In 1958, he was elected vice-president and treasurer of California Electric Power Co. and when that company merged with Southern California Edison Company late in 1963, he was named a director of the latter. He is a past president of the Associated Building Contractors of Colorado, Inc., and a director of The First National Bank Corporation, The First National Bank of Denver, Western Federal Savings and Loan Association, and the Denver and Rio Grande Western Railroad. He is also a trustee of Colorado College.

Phipps was married in New York City on September 24, 1937, to the former Janet Alice Smith. They have three daughters.

Allan R. Phipps

President



Allan R. Phipps manages to mesh a long-standing interest in sports with various other widespread community participations.

At Williams College, where he received his bachelor's degree, he was a member of the tennis and swimming teams. As president of Empire Sports, Inc., he has been in the forefront of professional sports activities.

Phipps, 59, is also a partner in the law firm of Hughes & Dorsey; active in key non-candidate roles in the Republican party, including a stint as chairman of the GOP State Finance Committee, and serves on the governing boards of numerous organizations.

His posts include those of President of the Denver Museum of Natural History and Acting Director, and Trustee of the University of Denver, of the Denver Museum of Natural History, of the Denver Symphony Society and of the Graland Country Day School.

Phipps was Alumni Trustee of Williams College and is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Winter Park Recreational Association and of the Board of Managers of St. Luke's Hospital in Denver.

In addition to his bachelor's degree from Williams in 1934, he received a degree in Jurisprudence from Oxford University in 1936 and a law degree from the University of Denver in 1937.

Phipps is a member of Phi Beta Kappa. He served in World War II as a Lieutenant Commander, U. S. Naval Reserve, in the Pacific Theater.

He is a director of Cherry Creek National Bank, South Denver National Bank, Belcaro Realty Investment Company, Highlander Hotel Corporation, and Van Schaack Corporation.

Phipps was admitted to the Colorado bar in 1938 and joined Hughes & Dorsey in 1946.

He is married to the former Clara Mitchell Van Schaack, and has two sons and a daughter.

John Ralston

General Manager-
Head Coach



Challenges have been a part of John Ralston's coaching career. So the one facing the new Denver Broncos' Head Coach and General Manager will not be met with uncertainty or hesitation.

"We definitely feel we have an outstanding man. Everything about him is impressive and his record at Utah State and Stanford speaks for itself," said Gerald H. Phipps, Chairman of the

Board of Rocky Mountain Empire Sports, Inc.

Ralston came to the Broncos January 5, 1972 from Stanford fresh from his second consecutive Rose Bowl victory over nationally ranked Big Ten representatives, Ohio State and Michigan, respectively.

The 1972 Bowl win climaxed an illustrious coaching career at Stanford that began on January 18, 1963 when Ralston was named to take over the head coaching job of the Indians. In nine seasons at the Stanford helm, Ralston captured two Pacific Eight titles, compiled an impressive 54-36-3 record, and reeled off eight straight winning campaigns.

But the winning tradition was nothing unusual for Ralston, who went to Stanford from Utah State University. At Utah State, John recorded a four-year mark of 31-11-1, as the Aggies were co-champions of the Skyline Conference in two of those years and played in the Sun and Gotham Bowls.

Ralston, 45, also was head coach of the West team in the 1965, 1966 and 1967 Shrine games. But his outside activities did not stop there. He has coached at the Hula Bowl, served on the Peace Corps' 21-man Athletic Committee, officiated at several clinics, and fills his off-season calendar with countless speaking engagements.

Ralston is known for his Pro-type football, and this has helped several of his players to gain fame in the professional ranks. They include AFC Rookie-of-the-Year Jim Plunkett, Randy Vataha, Denver kicker Jim Turner, Blaine Nye, Merlin Olsen, Clark Miller and Lionel Aldridge.

After first gaining coaching experience as a student assistant in spring practice at California in 1951, Ralston served as an assistant at Mount Diablo High School in Concord, Calif. from 1951 to 1952. John then was appointed head coach at San Lorenzo High School in 1953 and remained there for two years. In 1956 he returned to California and served through 1958 as an assistant coach in various areas.

Born in Oakland, Calif., April 26, 1927, Ralston attended elementary and high schools in Norway, Mich. John served two and one-half years with the U. S. Marine Corps during and after World War II, before entering the University of California at Berkeley, where he graduated in 1951. Ralston played linebacker on two of Cal's Rose Bowl teams.

Ralston and his wife, Patty, were married in 1951 and they are the parents of three children — twin daughters, Terry and Sherry, now attending Utah State, and a son, Larry, a 1972 high school graduate.

Joe Collier

Defensive
Coordinator

In his first move in putting together an assistant coaching staff, John Ralston hired Joe Collier as the Broncos' defensive coordinator. He will also handle the cornerbacks and safeties.

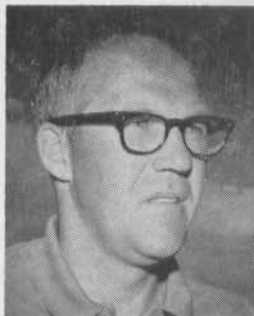
Collier, 40, is the lone holdover from the Lou Saban staff. Joe joined the Broncos in January of 1969, after serving two-plus seasons as head coach of the Buffalo Bills.

Born in Rock Island, Ill., Collier was graduated from Rock Island High. He attended Northwestern University and lettered three years as an end. In 1953, he captained the Wildcats and was named all-Big Ten. He played in the post-season Senior Bowl and East-West Shrine games.

Joe was drafted by the New York Giants but elected to bypass pro football as a player. He served in the Army from 1954-56 prior to joining the coaching staff at Western Illinois as a graduate assistant in 1957.

A year later he became a full-time member of the staff, serving under Lou Saban. He moved with Saban to Boston in 1960 and on to Buffalo two years later. Joe was named head coach of the Bills in 1966.

He and his wife, Shirley, have three children: Julie, 14; Lisa, 12; and Joel, 8.



Max Coley

Offensive
Coordinator

To guide the important area of the Bronco's offense, John Ralston named Max Coley offensive coordinator.

Max comes from the Pittsburgh Steelers where he was offensive backfield coach for the past three years. Coley will also handle the offensive backfield for Denver.

Coley, 44, is a native of Tulsa, Okla., and he split his college career between Northeastern Oklahoma A&M and San Jose State, where he graduated from in 1950.

After coaching stints in the California high school system, and at his alma mater, Coley spent ten years as offensive backfield coach at the University of Oregon before joining the Steelers in 1969.

At Oregon, Max helped develop one of the nation's most productive college offensive units, and during his tenure with the Ducks, they averaged better than 300 yards and three TDs per game.

Coley and his wife, Ann, have four children: Max Lynn, Rick, Debra Ann and Melinda Jane.



Bob Gambold

Linebacker Coach

Taking over the linebacking duties in 1972 is Bob Gambold, 42, who was a Ralston aide at Stanford the last nine years.

Gambold served as defensive coordinator and linebacker coach at Stanford, after completing a two-year stint with Tommy Prothro at Oregon State. Bob also has had coaching assignments at Washington State for five years and at Everett (Wash.) Junior College.

A native of Longview, Wash., Gambold is a 1951 graduate of Washington State, where he was a standout quarterback and a varsity basketball player. Following graduation, he served his alma mater as freshman football coach and basketball coach.

Gambold then served two years as a quarterback in the pros with Philadelphia in '53 and Chicago's Cardinals in '54.

Gambold and his wife, Dawn, have four children: Valerie, 20; Robin, 19; Barry, 15; and Victoria, 14.



Richard 'Doc' Urich

Defensive
Line Coach

The defensive coaching staff of John Ralston was completed when Richard 'Doc' Urich joined the Broncos in late January of 1972.

Urich, 43, coached the defensive line in 1971 for the Buffalo Bills, after spending 1969 and 1970 as head football coach at Northern Illinois University. He also is the former head coach at the University of Buffalo.

A 1951 graduate of Miami (O.) University where he was a standout end, Doc counted such grid names as Paul Dietzel, Carmen Cozza, Ara Parseghian and Bo Schembechler among his teammates, and was coached by Sid Gillman and Woody Hayes.

Following graduation, Urich launched his coaching career at Massillon (Ohio) High School before returning to his alma mater. He then joined Parseghian's staff at Northwestern for eight years before the entire staff made the transition to Notre Dame in 1964.

Urich and his wife, Pat, have two children: Cynthia, 20, and Danny, 17.



Jerry Frei

Offensive
Line Coach

After serving five years as head coach at Oregon, Jerry Frei joined the Denver staff as offensive line coach.

A 1948 graduate of Wisconsin, Jerry joined the Oregon staff and spent 12 years under Len Casanova before being named head coach in 1967. His Duck teams made steady improvements and in 1970 Oregon took second place in the Pacific Eight Conference. He was named UPI "Coach of the Week" twice during 1970 after beating Southern California and Air Force.

After college graduation, Frei, 48, moved to coaching at the high school level in Oregon. In 1952 he entered the college ranks as line coach at Willamette University until 1955 when he joined the Oregon staff.

At Wisconsin, Jerry lettered three years as a lineman, where he played beside such greats as Pat Harder, the late Dave Schreiner and Elroy Hirsch.

Jerry and his wife, Marion, have five children: David, 24; Judy, 21; Terry, 17; Susan, 13, and Nancy, 10.



Dick Coury

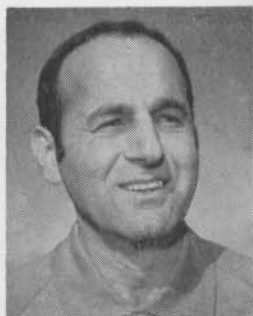
Wide Receiver
Coach

Former Cal State-Fullerton head coach, Dick Coury will handle the Broncos wide receivers in 1972. Coury came from Cal State-Fullerton after completing three years as its head coach. At Cal State-Fullerton, Coury became the school's first head coach and in 1971 the team recorded a 7-4 record including a victory over Fresno State in the Mercy Bowl.

A 1951 graduate of Notre Dame, Coury launched an impressive coaching career at the high school level in 1953 in Santa Ana, Calif., and in 1965 joined the staff at Southern California where he served three seasons as John McKay's chief defensive aide. During that time, Southern Cal went to three straight Rose Bowl games, and were National Champions in 1967.

After serving a short time with the Pittsburgh Steelers, Coury returned to California to become head coach at Cal State-Fullerton, when the school added football at the intercollegiate level.

Coury and his wife, Bonnie, have seven children: Mike, 17; Richard, 16; Steve, 15; Robert, 14; Cathy, 12; Linda, 10, and Tim, 9.



Myrel Moore

Special Teams
Coach

John Ralston completed his assistant coaching staff by naming Myrel Moore, former assistant at the University of California at Berkeley, to coach the Broncos' special teams.

Moore will also assist Jerry Frei in the handling of the offensive line.

Moore, 37, was a member of Ray Willsey's staff at California since 1964. He served Willsey as offensive and defensive coordinator, at different times during his California stay.

He went to Cal-Berkeley from Santa Ana Junior College where he served as head coach in 1963. He was at Santa Ana J.C. since 1959 as an assistant coach.

The youngest member of the Broncos coaching staff is a former All-Conference end and Small-College All-American at Cal-Davis, where he graduated in 1958. He played for the Washington Redskins as a defensive back in 1958.

Myrel and his wife, Jackie, have two children: Michelle Rene, 12, and Michale Damon, 8.



Fred Gehrke

Assistant General Manager
Player Personnel Director

Fred Gehrke, 54, a workhorse for the Bronco organization since January of 1965, has added the title of assistant general manager to his player personnel duties in '72.

A former star football player at Utah, Gehrke concluded his active playing career in 1950 with the L.A. Rams, after being an all-pro with the world-champion Cleveland Rams in 1945. He started his pro career with the Rams in 1940 and then played with the Los Angeles Bulldogs in the wartime Pacific Coast League from 1941 through 1944. During that time he also worked in the Engineering Design Division of the Northrup Aircraft Co. A technical artist, he is responsible for the helmet design presently worn by the Los Angeles Rams. Previously he was an outstanding scholar-athlete at Utah in 1937, 1938 and 1939. Also, he held the record in the javelin and was the conference diving champion for 3 years.

Gehrke remained close to the game after his retirement and did color commentary with Tom Harmon on radio and television football broadcasts for 13 years. Gehrke has five children — four daughters and a son. Fred and his wife, Jean, live in Arvada.



Carroll Hardy

Director of Scouting

Carroll Hardy, 39, assumed the duties of Director of Scouting in June of 1970. He is responsible for assessing the talent of hundreds of college athletes that become eligible for the pros each year, and deciding which of them can play football professionally.

Hardy has long been considered one of the greatest athletes produced by Colorado since winning a modern record of 10 letters at the University of Colorado (four each in football and baseball and two in track.)

After his graduation from the U. of Colorado in 1955 with a degree in education, Carroll signed a baseball contract with the Cleveland Indians and was drafted in the third round by football's San Francisco 49ers, and played that year as a wide receiver and a running back.

The '56 and '57 seasons were spent in the Army, but he returned to Cleveland in 1958 and was used as an outfielder until 1960 when he was traded to the Red Sox. In 1961 Carroll became the only man ever to pinch hit for Ted Williams.

The year 1963 found Hardy with the expansion Houston Colt 45's, where he remained until 1965 when he was traded to Minnesota. During the fall of '65 he became associated with the Broncos as a scout.

In 1969 Carroll became assistant ticket manager for the Broncos and held the position until being named to his new post. Hardy and his wife, the former Janice Mitchell, were married in 1956 and have three children—Jay, 15; Jill, 14, and Lisa, 11. They reside in Boulder.



Allen Hurst

Trainer

The duties of trainer fall on the shoulders of Allen Hurst, a man who has been in the business since he was 15.

Hurst, 31, was born in Houston, Texas, and took up training in his freshman year in high school. After his graduation in 1959, he accepted a four-year scholarship to train at Texas Christian University.

During his stint as student trainer at TCU, he commuted to Houston where he was on the staff of the Oilers. While with the Oilers training staff, Houston played in the AFL Championship Games of 1960, 1961, and 1962.

He was graduated from TCU in 1963 with a degree in physical education and a minor in biology. He then joined the Broncos and has been in the post of head trainer since.

Allen and his wife, Patsy, were married in 1963 and live in Lakewood. They are parents of a son, Gregory, born in 1971.

Hurst is assisted by Dave Kendall, 29, former trainer at University of Pacific.



Larry Elliott

Equipment Manager

Responsible for handling the large amount of equipment needed by a professional football team is Larry Elliott, 35, a native of Seneca, Kan.

Larry began his career in athletics at the age of 13 when his parents moved the family to Colorado. At St. Mary's High School in Colorado Springs, he won a total of 10 varsity letters in football, basketball and baseball. A number of scholarship offers in both football and baseball followed his graduation in 1955, but Larry opted for the Air Force.

During his four years in the service at such spots as Hawaii, Guam, The Philippines, Japan and Tripoli, athletics were not forgotten. While stationed at Tripoli's Wheelus Air Force Base he won All-European honors as a third baseman.

Following his discharge from the service, Elliott worked as an assistant manager of a finance company, bookkeeper and as assistant athletic equipment manager for the Air Force Academy. He was recommended for the Bronco position in 1965 by Air Force Academy equipment manager Artus Smith; a position he has held since.

Elliott and his wife, Margaret, who reside in Lakewood, were married in 1959 and have five children—Timothy, 12; Troy, 10; Thomas 8; Terry, 5, and Tammie, 3.

He is helped by Ronnie Bill, 33, assistant to Elliott since 1969.

Position by Position

THE OFFENSE

Ralston promises a more varied and balanced attack with added emphasis on the passing game. Number one draft choice Riley Odoms becomes one of the prime figures in the plan, as do Denver's three veteran quarterbacks, Steve Ramsey, Don Horn and John Stofa. Floyd Little is coming off his greatest season when he led the entire NFL in rushing to bolster a strong running game, and the offensive line could be a fine unit if all injured troops return. The receivers could use some help to give the Broncos some depth and perhaps more speed. Jim Turner proved why he is one of the best, if not THE best place kicker in the business, but Denver's offense is going to have to turn field goals into touchdowns before the Broncos become consistent winners.

QUARTERBACKS

A vastly improved offense of last season will get a major overhaul as Ralston installs his style of attack. For the first time, the Broncos will have three veteran quarterbacks as camp opens. They are STEVE RAMSEY, DON HORN and JOHN STOFA. Ramsey finished the 1971 season as the starter when Don Horn suffered a shoulder separation in the eighth game. Ramsey was impressive at times, especially in directing Denver to a 22-10 win over Pittsburgh when the Steelers were tied for the Central Division lead. Ramsey, now in his third season, has perhaps the quickest release in football, and many feel he is one of the up and coming quarterbacks in the league. Horn, who started every game until his injury, has some excellent credentials. Was a number one draft choice by Green Bay, an NCAA-leading passer at San Diego State, and holds Green Bay's single game passing record. Horn is coming off knee surgery to go along with his shoulder separation, but claims he is in best physical condition since originally hurting his knee six years ago. Has all the tools to be a fine player. Stofa is also a solid candidate for the starting job. He was a starter at both Cincinnati and Miami until injuries felled him at both places. Was the Dolphin starter until his ankle was broken in game against Denver, and Bob Griese took over and has been an all-pro. Great leadership qualities. BOB STEWART is back for another look, and heads the list of free agent candidates to make the team, along with MIKE ERNST, from Cal State-Fullerton.

RUNNING BACKS

All conversation starts and stops with FLOYD LITTLE. Playing behind an improved offensive line, Floyd led all rushers in pro football with 1,133 yards, his personal best and a Bronco record. Although standing 5-11, 198, Floyd showed his durability by toting the ball 284 times, by far the most in the NFL last season. BOBBY ANDERSON will be back after missing the final game with a shoulder separation and will battle JOE DAWKINS and CLEM TURNER for the other running back spot. FRAN LYNCH returns to back up Little, but can play either running back spot. TOM BOUGUS, LOU HARRIS and BOB WARNER are draftees with a shot at making the club. Overall, running game is rated good, and one of Denver's strong suits.

WIDE RECEIVERS

Developed into a problem area last year with injuries to veterans BILL VAN HEUSEN and JACK GEHRKE. Van Heusen has now had his seventh knee operation, and Gehrke his first and both are questionable. Rookie DWIGHT HAR-

RISON showed flashes of greatness last season, but needs to become a much more consistent player before Broncos can take full advantage of his blazing speed and great jumping ability. Veteran JERRY SIMMONS settled into a starting job and played well, and will open the campaign at one of the starting spots. The draft produced JIM KRIEG from Washington in the 5th round and LARRY BRUNSON from Colorado in the 11th. Both are small (Krieg is 5-9, 172 and Brunson is 5-10, 168), but both have 4.4 speed, and Brunson has been clocked seven times in 9.5 for the hundred yard dash as a member of the CU track team. Veteran JOHN EMBREE returns after being released a year ago to head the group of free agent candidates.

TIGHT ENDS

Probably the best fortified position on the team. BILLY MASTERS had a fine season in 1971, catching 27 passes for 382 yards to rank second among the receivers. He also gained 71 yards on seven rushes and provided excellent blocking. Rookie RILEY ODOMS, at 6-4, 238, is rated a "can't miss" prospect and was Denver's first round draft choice. JOHN MOSIER, going into his third year, played well in relief of Masters in 1971 and is rated an excellent prospect.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Somewhat of an unknown quantity for the coming season. Last year, injuries hit several offensive linemen, but they still had the best season ever. Veteran MIKE CURRENT should be a fixture at one tackle spot, but with the retirement of Roger Shoals, the other side may be inherited by MARV MONTGOMERY, Denver's first draft pick in 1971, who saw very little action last year. SAM BRUNELLI, a starter in 1970, missed most of last season with a broken leg, and can play either tackle or guard. GEORGE GOEDDEKE, himself an injury victim for two games last year, can play a guard spot he occupied for several seasons as a starter, or at center where he performed admirably last year after veteran LARRY KAMINSKI suffered a broken leg. Second year man LARRON JACKSON was the surprise last year as a rookie, and played very well at guard after Goeddeke moved to center. Guard MIKE SCHNITKER, a starter until a bad knee sidelined him late in the season, is also a strong candidate for a starting berth if fully recovered. JEROME KUNDICH (13th) from Texas El Paso is the only offensive lineman drafted and is a guard candidate. Returning second year men TOMMY LYONS and TOM BEARD can also play guard and tackle, respectively, although they are primarily centers. If everyone returns healthy, this could be one of the long suits for the Broncos. The offensive line, despite injury problems, played well enough in 1971 to enable Denver to set several rushing records, and a new mark for protecting the passer.

DEFENSE

The veteran Denver defense has been the trump card in the Denver deck for several seasons. Again, the injury situation prevented this unit from being truly outstanding. In spite of the loss of both defensive ends (Rich Jackson and Pete Duranko), and a shuffling of linebackers, the Bronco defenders set records for several areas of pass defense, and led the entire NFL in getting to the enemy quarterback. All hands appear ready to go in 1972 and Denver should continue to be one of the best defensive teams in the business.

DEFENSIVE LINE

With the return of All-pro RICH JACKSON and veteran PETE DURANKO, this unit will rate with any in football. PAUL SMITH needs only for the team to have a winning

record to receive the acclaim due him for his proficiency as a defensive lineman. Veteran DAVE COSTA ranks right up there with the best of them, and rookie LYLE ALZADO performed so well at end following Duranko's injury last year, it will be difficult keeping him out of the lineup. Veterans TOM DOMRES and JERRY INMAN also have fine credentials and performed well in 1971, giving the Broncos seven excellent, veteran players. Rookies RICHARD WILKINS (10th from Maryland State) and HAROLD PARMENTER (15th from U. of Mass.) are the drafted players who will battle the veterans for jobs.

LINEBACKERS

Somewhat of a problem area because of average speed. Solid against the rush, the unit improved on pass defense last year and came up with eight interceptions. Veterans FRED FORSBERG, CHIP MYRTLE and OLEN UNDERWOOD finished the season as starters, but will be pressed by veterans Al. ANDREWS, obtained in April from Buffalo for David Washington, BILL McKOY and KEN CRITER. CARTER CAMPBELL, who played at defensive end last season, will be tried at one of the outside spots because of his range and quickness. Linebackers were picked in the third and fourth rounds of the draft (Denver had no choice in the second round), and resulted in BILL PHILLIPS and TOM GRAHAM. Phillips is a 6-3, 245-pound prospect who was an All-America guard as a junior at Arkansas State. He became a linebacker as a senior but a broken ankle in the first game forced him to sit out the season. Graham, a product of Oregon, also has good size at 6-3, 236, and reportedly has the speed to play outside.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

A good, veteran unit gives the Broncos excellent secondary play. Veterans BILL THOMPSON and LEROY MITCHELL are considered as good a pair of cornerbacks as there is in the game. Veteran GEORGE SAIMES will be back for his ninth season at free safety and CHARLIE GREER at the strong safety spot. Veterans BUTCH BYRD, CORNELL GORDON and RANDY MONTGOMERY will battle rookies FLOYD PRIESTER (9th from Boston U.) and RANDY McDOUGALL (12th from Weber State) as well as McKINNEY EVANS, a rookie last year who didn't play due to a wrist injury.

PUNTING

Veteran BILL VAN HEUSEN is the Bronco punter until someone can take the job away from him. Although going through his sixth knee operation in pre-season camp last year, Bill still came back to average 41.8 yards on 76 punts. Since last season, he had his seventh knee operation, but he still looks like Denver's punter with no real challengers on deck. Has averaged 42.7 yards on 276 career punts as a Bronco.

PLACE KICKING

In what might be looked upon as one of Denver's finest trades, JIM TURNER has established himself as one of the best in the business. He holds numerous kicking records, and last season became the tenth leading all-time scorer in professional football. He booted 93 points in his first season as a Bronco, despite the fact Denver gave him only 18 PAT opportunities. He hit them all to run his consecutive string of PATS to 140, the longest going by an active player. His last miss came in 1967 as a New York Jet. Jim showed tremendous consistency in his field goal kicking, finishing the year with 25 of 38 successes, and a six-for-eleven mark from outside the 40-yard line. Can also handle kickoffs.

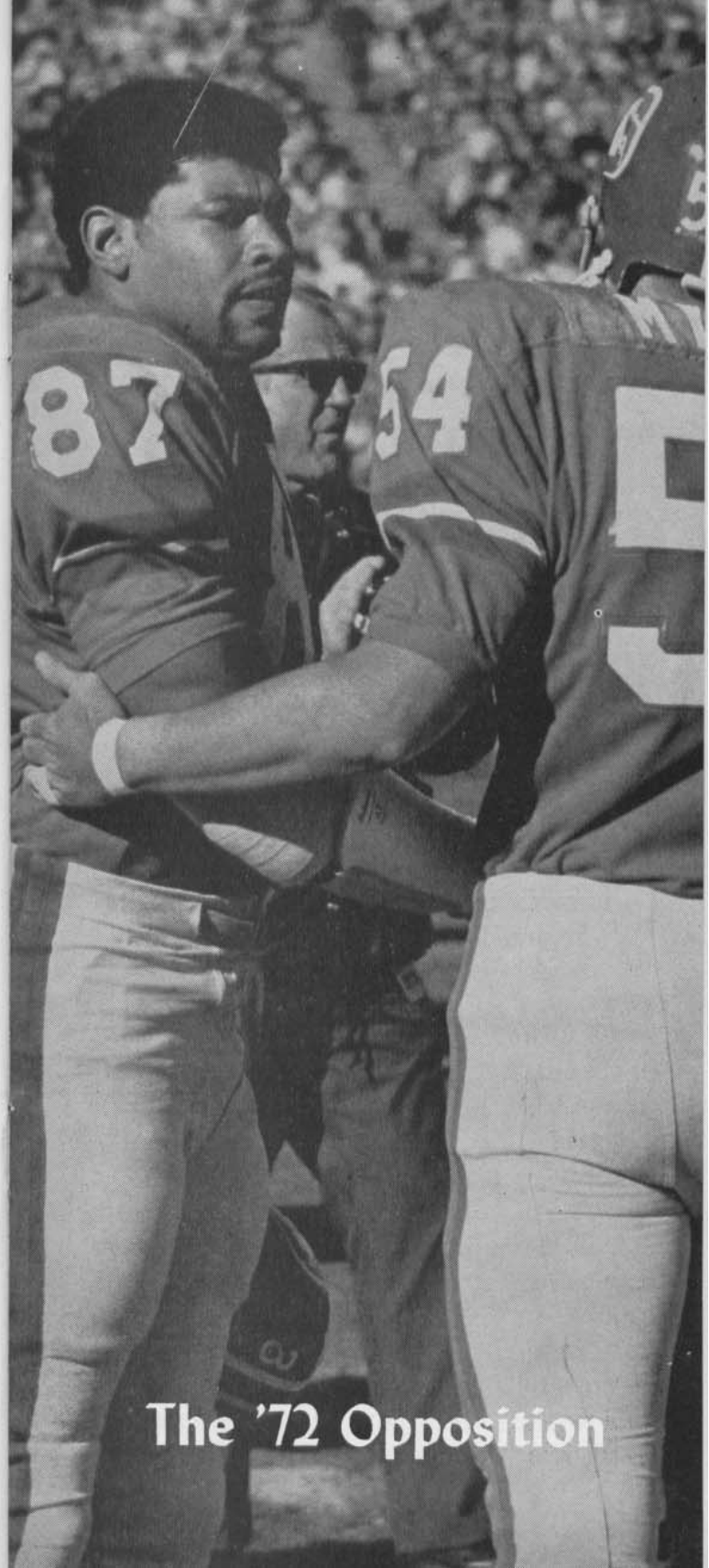

 January—Richard Jackson and Floyd Little make starting lineups for American Conference in first AFC-NFC Pro Bowl game.
 Jan. 25—Veteran quarterback Steve Tensi announces retirement from professional football.
 Jan. 28—Broncos get quarterback Don Horn from Green Bay in exchange for defensive end Alden Roche and an exchange of first round draft positions.
 March 26—Veterans report to Bronco training camp for first off-season camp.
 April 1—Rookies and free agents report for four-day early camp.
 April 19—Marv Montgomery, Denver's number one draft choice, signs his 1971 contract.
 May 12—Broncos stop sale of season tickets at record 47,500.
 Sept. 19—Broncos open season with 10-10 tie against eventual Super Bowl entry, Miami, before first of seven sell-out crowds at Mile High Stadium.
 October 24—Denver coach Lou Saban and Broncos down Cleveland, 27-0, on same field Saban starred as all-star linebacker in Cleveland. It was first time Browns were shut-out since 1952. It was also to be Saban's last victory as Bronco coach.
 November 17—Lou Saban resigns as head coach of Broncos, a position he had held for five years. Offensive line coach Jerry Smith is named interim head coach. Saban, in December, resigns as General Manager to return to Buffalo Bills as head coach.
 December 19—Floyd Little compiles 79 yards against Raiders in Oakland to finish as pro football's top runner with 1,133 yards. Little also becomes first Bronco to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a season.

Season ticket holders renewed 46,500 of the 47,500 available season tickets, and further exercised their option for 8,000 additional tickets, thus assuring Denver of its third straight year of sell-outs.
 March 16—Cal Poly at Pomona is reported to be the pre-season training site for the Broncos. Camp is to open July 19.
 April 5—Long-time Rocky Mountain Empire Sports employee Earl Hartman dies of cancer. Hartman is Treasurer of Empire Sports and Business Manager of the Broncos at the time of his death.
