ON THE COVER

The 1973 press guide cover of the Broncos depicts Denver's team attitude toward the upcoming National Football League campaign. The picture was taken during the Broncos' 1972 finale against New England, in which John Ralston's crew won handily, 45-21. The victory, along with the Broncos' fast finish last year, is what the 1973 season is being built upon and Denver hopes to pick up where it left off in 1972 . . . winning football games.

A Quick Glance

Whether it be the eternal optimism of Denver Bronco fans, the strong finish by the 1972 Bronco squad, the prevalence of the John Ralston positive attitude, or a combination of all three . . . there is genuine enthusiasm in the Mile High City as the 1973 pro football season approaches.

The old cry of "wait'll next year" has become "this just might be the year we've been waiting for" among the Denver faithful, as "sophomore" Head Coach and General Manager John Ralston fields his second squad in the NFL.

Last season, Denver scored 38 touchdowns, an improvement of 20 from the previous year, and the pass offense finished second only to Joe Namath and the Jets in the American Conference. For the first time in more years than most fans can remember, the Broncos will go to camp knowing who the starting quarterback will be. Veteran Charley Johnson, acquired in a pre-season trade in 1972, became the most accurate passer in Bronco history, and is being counted upon as THE Denver quarterback.

Defensively, there will probably be a few changes in order. Although this unit was plagued by injury and change in 1972, the defenders still finished second in the AFC against the rush. Ralston received superior play from Paul Smith and Lyle Alzado up front, with Smith being a Pro Bowl selection. Although the other two spots were manned by several people due to injury, Denver still led the AFC in quarterback sacks with 41. Ralston indicated there would be a departure from the basic "bump and run" pass defense to more of a zone look.

The Ralston regime has established a solid base, and a projection of the improvement shown in 1972 would indicate that winning ways are due in Denver.

Coach Ralston Says:

"We feel we are definitely on the right track, and will continue to have a positive approach in everything we do. We feel we have established a strong base, one on which we can build a winning football team in Denver.

"Our goal remains unchanged: winning the Super Bowl. As we stated in coming to Denver, there's no question that we'll make it, the only thing we don't know is how long it will take.

"All the signs are optimistic. We finished strong in 1972 winning our final two games, and we should resume that improvement when we open camp this year. We are probably still shy in a couple of spots, but the total personnel picture was upgraded, and the coaching staff is much further along this year having operated at the professional level for a full year now. We worked very hard at establishing a more balanced offense last year, and our offensive coaches did a great job. We more than doubled our touchdown production from the previous year, and became a must less predictable team. Our pass offense really jelled the last half of the season, and although we can never become complacent, we certainly feel we're on the right track in that phase of the game. The defense will undergo the most change this year in all probability. We want to utilize much more zone coverages in our defensive plans.

"The player attitude is an area in which we place a great deal of emphasis. We feel we made progress in this department, but the change to a completely positive attitude

is not finished.

"We are also very aware of the fact that nearly onethird of our squad as it stood at the end of the season was
not with us in camp at Pomona last summer. We should be
able to get away to a much faster start this year, and hope
to get all of the experimenting out of the way early so when
the league season opens, the Denver Broncos will be a
team with which to be reckoned."

Gerald H. Phipps

Chairman of the Board



With nearly 27 years of participation in the Denver sports scene, Gerald H. Phipps has seen the Rocky Mountain area receive major league sports status.

In 1947, he became part of the organization that brought the Denver Bears here as members of the old Western League. The Bears, during the years that immediately followed that move, set minor league baseball attendance records that stood unchallenged for many years.

In 1961, one year after big league professional football had arrived in the form of the Denver Broncos of the American Football League, Phipps became a major owner and assumed duties as board chairman.

Four years later, he and his brother, Allan, became virtually the sole owners of the club.

Phipps, 58, is a member of the Denver Country Club, the Denver Athletic Club, Denver Club, Cherry Hills Country Club, Rolling Hills Country Club, Broadmoor Golf Club of Colorado Springs, and the Williams Club of New York.

He was born March 4, 1915, in Denver to Lawrence C. and Margaret Rogers Phipps and received his bachelor's degree from Williams College in 1936.

He was employed by the Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad from then until he entered the Navy as an Ensign in May, 1942.

Following his separation from the service in 1945, he was employed by a general contracting firm in Denver until 1952, when he formed his present company, Gerald H. Phipps, Inc. In 1958, he was elected vice-president and treasurer of California Electric Power Co. and when that company merged with Southern California Edison Company late in 1963, he was named a director of the latter. He is a past president of the Associated Building Contractors of Colorado, Inc., a director and member of the Executive Committee of The First National Bank of Denver and a director of The First National Bancorporation, Western Federal Savings and Loan Association, Rio Grande Industries, and the Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad. He is also a trustee of Colorado College.

Phipps was married in New York City on September 24, 1937, to the former Janet Alice Smith. They have three daughters.

Allan R. Phipps

President



Allan R. Phipps, President of the Broncos, has been an active member of the Denver sports and cultural community for a number of years.

At Williams College, where he received his bachelor's degree, he was a member of the tennis and swimming teams.

Phipps, 60, is also a partner in the law firm of Hughes & Dorsey; active in key non-candidate roles in the Republican party, including a stint as chairman of the GOP State Finance Committee, and serves on the governing boards of numerous organizations.

His posts include those of President of the Denver Museum of Natural History and Acting Director, and Trustee of the University of Denver, of the Denver Museum of Natural History, of the Denver Symphony Society and of the Graland Country Day School.

Phipps was Alumni Trustee of Williams College and is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Winter Park Recreational Association and of the Board of Managers of St. Luke's Hospital in Denver.

In addition to his bachelor's degree from Williams in 1934, he received a degree in Jurisprudence from Oxford University in 1936 and a law degree from the University of Denver in 1937.

Phipps is a member of Phi Beta Kappa. He served in World War II as a Lieutenant Commander, U. S. Naval Reserve, in the Pacific Theater.

He is a director of Cherry Creek National Bank, South Denver National Bank, Belcaro Realty Investment Company, Highlander Hotel Corporation, and Van Schaack Corporation.

Phipps was admitted to the Colorado bar in 1938 and joined Hughes & Dorsey in 1946.

He is married to the former Clara Mitchell Van Schaack, and has two sons and a daughter.

John Ralston

General Manager-Head Coach

When John Ralston transferred his coaching responsibilities from Stanford to the Denver Broncos in 1972, a positive approach accompanied him.



And that positive approach helped Denver to make progress last season. The Broncos were a team that got better with each week and finished strongly by winning the final two games of the season—a feat never before accomplished by a Denver team.

A 5-9 record is not that impressive, and Ralston already has plans to turn that mark around this year, but the performance was good enough for the Broncos to escape a fourth place finish in the AFC Western Division for the first time since 1962.

Ralston came to the Broncos January 5, 1972 from Stanford fresh from his second consecutive Rose Bowl victory over nationally ranked Big Ten representatives, Ohio State and Michigan, respectively.

The 1972 conclusion climaxed an illustrious coaching career at Stanford that began on January 18, 1963 when Ralston was named to take over that head coaching job. In nine seasons at the Stanford helm, Ralston captured two Pacific Eight titles, compiled an impressive 54-36-3 record, and reeled off eight straight winning campaigns.

But the winning tradition was nothing unusual for Ralston, who went to Stanford from Utah State University. At Utah State, John recorded a four-year mark of 31-11-1, as the Aggies were co-champions of the Skyline Conference in two of those years and played in the Sun and Gotham Bowls.

Ralston also was head coach of the West team in the 1965, 1966 and 1969 Shrine games. But his outside activities did not stop there. He has coached at the Hula Bowl, served on the Peace Corps' 21-man Athletic Committee, officiated at several clinics, and fills his off-season calendar with countless speaking engagements.

After first gaining coaching experience as a student assistant in spring practice at California in 1951, Ralston served as an assistant at Mount Diablo High School in Concord, Calif. from 1951 to 1952. John then was appointed head coach at San Lorenzo High School in 1953 and remained there for two years. In 1956 he returned to California and served through 1958 as an assistant coach in various areas.

Born in Oakland, Calif., April 26, 1927, Ralston attended elementary and high schools in Norway, Mich. John served two and one-half years with the U.S. Marine Corps during and after World War II, before entering the University of California at Berkeley, where he graduated in 1951. Ralston played linebacker on two of Cal's Rose Bowl teams.

Ralston and his wife, Patty, were married in 1951, and they are the parents of three children.

Joe Collier

Defensive Coordinator

In his first move in putting together an assistant coaching staff, John Ralston hired Joe Collier as the Broncos' defensive coordinator. He also handles the cornerbacks and safeties.

Collier, 41, is the lone holdover from the Lou Saban staff. Joe joined the Broncos in January of 1969, after serving two-plus seasons as head coach of the Buffalo Bills.

Born in Rock Island, III., Collier was graduated from Rock Island High. He attended Northwestern University and lettered three years as an end. In 1953, he captained the Wildcats and was named all-Big Ten. He played in the post-season Senior Bowl and East-West Shrine games.

Joe was drafted by the New York Giants but elected to bypass pro football as a player. He served in the Army from 1954-56 prior to joining the coaching staff at Western Illinois as a graduate assistant in 1957.

A year later he became a full-time member of the staff, serving under Lou Saban. He moved with Saban to Boston in 1960 and on to Buffalo two years later. Joe was named head coach of the Bills in 1966.

He and his wife, Shirley, have three children; Julie, 15; Lisa, 13; and Joel, 9.

Max Coley

Offensive Coordinator

To guide the important area of the Bronco's offense, John Ralston named Max Coley offensive coordinator in 1972.

In his first year, Coley's offensive unit upped the TD production from 18 (in 1971) to 38.

Max came from the Pittsburgh Steelers where he was offensive backfield coach for three years. Coley also handles the offensive backfield for Denver.

Max, 45, is a native of Tulsa, Okla., and he split his college career between Northeastern Oklahoma A&M and San Jose State, where he graduated from in 1950.

After coaching stints in the California high school system, and at his alma mater, Coley spent ten years as offensive backfield coach at the University of Oregon before joining the Steelers in 1969.

At Oregon, Max helped develop one of the nation's most productive college offensive units, and during his tenure with the Ducks, they averaged better than 300 yards and three TDs per game.

Coley and his wife, Ann, have four children: Max Lynn, Rick, Debra Ann and Melinda Jane.



Bob Gambold

Linebacker Coach

Bob Gambold, 43, a Ralston aide at Stanford for nine years, is Denver's linebacker coach.

Gambold served as defensive coordinator and linebacker coach at Stanford, after completing a two-year stint with Tommy Prothro at Oregon State. Bob also has had coaching assignments at Washington State for five years and at Everett (Wash.) Junior College.

A native of Longview, Wash., Gambold is a 1951 graduate of Washington State, where he was a standout quarterback and a varsity basketball player. Following graduation, he served his alma mater as freshman football coach and basketball coach.

Gambold then served two years as a quarterback in the pros with Philadelphia in '53 and Chicago's Cardinals in '54.

Gambold and his wife, Dawn, have four children: Valerie, 21: Robin, 20; Barry, 16; and Victoria, 15.



Richard 'Doc' Urich

Defensive Line Coach

Guiding the Broncos' defensive line in 1973 is Richard "Doc" Urich. Doc's first year in Denver (1972) saw the Broncos again lead the AFC in QB sackings.



Urich, 44, coached the defensive line in 1971 for the Buffalo Bills, after spending 1969 and 1970 as head football coach at Northern Illinois University. He also is the former head coach at the University of Buffalo.

A 1951 graduate of Miami (O.) University where he was a standout end, Doc counted such grid names as Paul Dietzel, Carmen Cozza, Ara Parseghian and Bo Schembechler among his teammates, and was coached by Sid Gillman and Woody Hayes.

Following graduation, Urich launched his coaching career at Massillon (Ohio) High School before returning to his alma mater. He then joined Parseghian's staff at Northwestern for eight years before the entire staff made the transition to Notre Dame in 1964.

Urich and his wife, Pat, have two children; Cynthia, 21, and Danny, 18.



Jerry Frei

Offensive Line Coach

After serving five years as head coach at Oregon, Jerry Frei joined the Denver staff as offensive line coach in 1972.

A 1948 graduate of Wisconsin, Jerry joined the Ore-

gon staff and spent 12 years under Len Casanova before being named head coach in 1967. His Duck teams made steady improvements and in 1970 Oregon took second place in the Pacific Eight Conference. He was named UPI "Coach of the Week" twice during 1970 after beating Southern California and Air Force.

After college graduation, Frei, 49, moved to coaching at the high school level in Gregon. In 1952 he entered the college ranks as line coach at Willamette University until 1955 when he joined the Oregon staff.

At Wisconsin, Jerry lettered three years as a lineman, where he played beside such greats as Pat Harder, Dave Schreiner and Elroy Hirsch.

Jerry and his wife, Marion, have five children: David, 25; Judy, 22; Terry, 18; Susan, 14; and Nancy, 11.



Wide Receiver Coach

Former Cal State-Fullerton head coach, Dick Coury, 43, will handle the Broncos wide receivers in 1973. Coury came from Cal State-Fullerton

after completing three years as its head coach. At Cal State-Fullerton, Coury became the school's first head coach and in 1971 the team recorded a 7-4 record including a victory over Fresno State in the Mercy Bowl.

A 1951 graduate of Notre Dame, Coury launched his coaching career at the high school level in 1953 in Santa Ana, Calif., and in 1965 joined the staff at Southern California where he served three seasons as John McKay's chief defensive aide. During that time, Southern Cal went to three straight Rose Bowl games, and were National Champions in 1967.

After serving a short time with the Pittsburgh Steelers, Coury returned to California to become head coach at Cal State-Fullerton, when the school added football at the intercollegiate level.

Coury and his wife, Bonnie, have seven children: Mike, 18; Richard, 17; Steve, 16; Robert, 15; Cathy, 13; Linda, 11, and Tim, 10.



Myrel Moore

Special Teams Coach

Myrel Moore, former assistant at the University of California at Berkeley, will coach the Broncos' special teams again in 1973.

Myrel will also assist Jerry Frei in the handling of the offensive line.

Moore, 38, was a member of Ray Willsey's staff at California since 1964. He served Willsey as offensive and defensive coordinator, at different times during his California

He went to Cal-Berkeley from Santa Ana Junior College where he served as head coach in 1963. He was at Santa Ana J.C. since 1959 as an assistant coach.

The youngest member of the Broncos coaching staff is a former All-Conference end and Small-College All-American at Cal-Davis, where he graduated in 1958. He played for the Washington Redskins as a defensive back in 1958.

Myrel and his wife, Jackie, have two children: Michelle Rene, 13, and Michale Damon, 9.



Assistant General Manager Player Personnel Director

Fred Gehrke, 55, a workhorse for the Bronco organization since January of 1965, has added the title of assistant general manager to his player personnel duties.

A former star football player at Utah, Gehrke concluded his active playing career in 1950 with the L.A. Rams, after being an all-pro with the world-champion Cleveland Rams in 1945.

He started his pro career with the Rams in 1940 and then played with the Los Angeles Bulldogs in the war-time Pacific Coast League from 1941 through 1944.


During that time he also worked in the Engineering Design Division of the Northrup Aircraft Co. A technical artist, he is responsible for the helmet design presently worn by the Los Angeles Rams. He received the first Dan Reeves award from the Hall of Fame in 1972 for his helmet design idea. Previously he was an outstanding scholar-athlete at Utah in 1937, 1938 and 1939. Also, he held the record in the javelin and was the conference diving champion for 3 years.

Gehrke remained close to the game after his retirement and did color commentary with Tom Harmon on radio and television football broadcasts for 13 years. Gehrke has five children — four daughters and a son. Fred and his wife, Jean, live in Arvada.

Carroll Hardy

Director of Scouting

Carroll Hardy, 40, assumed the duties of Director of Scouting in June of 1970. He is responsible for assessing the talent of hundreds of college athletes that become eligible for the pros each year,

and deciding which of them can play football professionally. Hardy has long been considered one of the greatest athletes produced by Colorado since winning a modern record of 10 letters at the University of Colorado (four each in football and baseball and two in track.)

After his graduation from the U. of Colorado in 1955 with a degree in education, Carroll signed a baseball contract with the Cleveland Indians and was drafted in the third round by football's San Francisco 49ers, and played that year as a wide receiver and a running back.

The '56 and '57 seasons were spent in the Army, but he returned to Cleveland in 1958 and was used as an outfielder until 1960 when he was traded to the Red Sox. In 1961 Carroll became the only man ever to pinch hit for Ted

The year 1963 found Hardy with the expansion Houston Colt 45's, where he remained until 1965 when he was traded to Minnesota. During the fall of '65 he became associated with the Broncos as a scout.

In 1969 Carroll became assistant ticket manager for the Broncos and held the position until being named to his new post. Hardy and his wife, Janice, were married in 1956 and have three children-Jay, 16; Jill, 15, and Lisa, 12. They reside in Boulder.

Allen Hurst

Trainer

The duties of trainer fall on the shoulders of Allen Hurst, a man who has been in the business since he was 15.

Hurst, 32, was born in Houston, Texas, and took up training in his freshman year

in high school. After his graduation in 1959, he accepted a four-year scholarship to train at Texas Christian University.

During his stint as student trainer at TCU, he commuted to Houston where he was on the staff of the Oilers. While with the Oilers training staff, Houston played in the AFL Championship Games of 1960, 1961, and 1962.

He was graduated from TCU in 1963 with a degree in physical education and a minor in biology. He then joined the Broncos and has been in the post of head trainer since.

Allen and his wife, Patsy, were married in 1963 and live in Lakewood. They are parents of sons Gregory, 2, and

Hurst is assisted by Dave Kendall, 30, former trainer at the University of Pacific.



Larry Elliott

Equipment Manager

Responsible for handling the large amount of equipment needed by a professional football team is Larry Elliott,

Larry began his career in athletics at the age of 13 when

his parents moved the family to Colorado. At St. Mary's High School in Colorado Springs, he won a total of 10 varsity letters in football, basketball and baseball. A number of scholarship offers in both football and baseball followed his graduation in 1955, but Larry opted for the Air Force.

During his four years in the service at such spots as Hawaii, Guam, The Philippines, Japan and Tripoli, athletics were not forgotten. While stationed at Tripoli's Wheelus Air Force Base he won All-European honors as a third baseman.

Following his discharge from the service, Elliott worked as an assistant manager of a finance company, bookkeeper and as assistant athletic equipment manager for the Air Force Academy. He was recommended for the Bronco position in 1965 by Air Force Academy equipment manager Artus Smith; a position he has held since.

Elliott and his wife, Margaret, who reside in Lakewood, were married in 1959 and have five children-Timothy, 13; Troy, 11; Thomas, 9; Herry, 6, and Tammie, 4.

He is helped by Ronnie Bill, 34, assistant to Elliott since 1969.

While gaining a reputation as a cautious trader and one not prone to making wholesale changes, Head Coach and General Manager John Ralston, in a subtle manner, instituted more roster changes in his rookie season than most fans realize. In fact, for the 1972 finale, the Bronco roster of 40 players included 12 who had not been with the team when training camp opened. Ralston has indicated that this upgrading of personnel will continue, although at an obviously slower pace. The offense was revitalized behind the quarterbacking of veteran Charley Johnson, and now the defense will get the lion's share of attention as Ralston's staff much more confident with one year behind it, will work on shoring up the defense which allowed far too many touchdowns in 1972 to enable Denver to be a contender.

There is a good blend of veteran players and youth on the '73 squad, and the 1973 draft appears to have brought more bona fide pro candidates into camp than in the past

several years.

THE OFFENSE

Although Ralston and his offensive aides will never be satisfied short of perfection, the Bronco offense came through as advertised . . . diverse, balanced, unpredictable and potent. The 38 touchdowns, 17 rushing, 19 passing, and two on returns, prove the point after a total TD production of 18 in 1971. The offensive line played solidly through the last half of the season, new receivers Rod Sherman and Haven Moses excelled, and Floyd Little was again superb, but then Bronco fans will quickly add he is always superb. The addition of number one draft choice Otis Armstrong should even boost an already solid running game.

QUARTERBACKS

What a difference a year makes! For the first time in the memories of most Bronco fans. Denver has a starting quarterback going into the season. CHARLEY JOHNSON, heading into his 13th pro season, set a Denver single season accuracy record in passing after taking over as the starter in the sixth game. In fact, that sixth game was against Oakland, the then-leading pass defense team in the NFL. Charley hit 20 of 28 for 361 yards in a magnificent debut won by Denver. Charley claims that this will be the first year in recent history he hasn't been recovering from surgery and is looking forward to a banner season. STEVE RAMSEY, who started five games is still very much a factor and has a bright future. MIKE ERNST, who spent his rookie season on the taxi squad, has an exceptionally strong arm and could make his presence felt. JOHN HUFNAGEL, a 14th round draft choice from Penn State, will be the prime rookie candidate.

RUNNING BACKS

The incomparable FLOYD LITTLE returns for his 7th season, although he is coming off knee surgery for the first time in his pro career. Playing the final two games of 1972 with torn knee cartilage, and not playing the part of the workhorse as in the past, Floyd still rushed for 859 yards last season. The big improvement in Floyd's statistics showed in the touchdown department as he set a Bronco single season record with 13, 9 rushing and 4 as a receiver. In fact, he caught 28 passes for 366 yards, both figures being personal season highs. BOBBY ANDERSON is also coming off knee surgery, but was replaced very adequately last season by JOE DAWKINS, who gained 243 yards on 56 carries as a late season starter. Dawkins also averaged over 13 yards per catch on 18 receptions and just may not yield his starting status. Veteran FRAN LYNCH enjoyed another

fine season, averaging just under 5 yards a carry in a reserve role. OTIS ARMSTRONG, holder of most Purdue and Big Ten rushing records, and the Broncos' first round draft choice, wears the "can't miss" label, and gives Ralston several combinations of backs he can use. Armstrong, with a 4.4 speed will be the team's fleetest player and will also see kickoff and punt return duty. ED WHITE (13b) and OLIVER ROSS (16a) are other draftee running backs.

WIDE RECEIVERS

A position that went from being a problem area early last year to a very adequately manned position by the end of the '72 season . . . and, in fact, maybe a plus. Ralston dealt for veterans ROD SHERMAN and HAVEN MOSES in 1972, with Sherman responding by leading the team in receiving with 38 catches for 661 yards. Moses, who became a late season starter when JERRY SIMMONS injured a shoulder, responded with five touchdown catches in the last three games. Moses has the size to play the bump-and-run and has good outside speed. Simmons was enjoying his best year as a pro when he was injured, and should battle Sherman and Moses for a starting job. Returning squadmen include JIM KRIEG, TONY HARRIS, and MATT MASLOWSKI. They will battle with rookie AL MARSHALL, a 10th round choice from Boise State. Rookie free agent MARVIN FRA-ZIER from Cheyney (Pa.) St. was impressive in the March camp. Punter-wide receiver BILL VAN HEUSEN, a five-year veteran, can't be overlooked.

TIGHT ENDS

Although small in numbers, this is probably one of the best fortified positions on the team. Veteran BILLY MASTERS and 2nd year man RILEY ODOMS alternated as "messengers" last season. Odoms was Denver's first-round draft choice last year and was rated about even with Masters the latter owning a distinct advantage in experience. Both played well with Masters being the team's third leading receiver with 25 catches for 393 yards. Odoms caught 21 for a fine 15.2-yard average. KEN MORGAN, drafted in the 17th round will vie for a spot on the roster.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Another area that showed great improvement throughout the 1972 season, despite injury. The tackle spots will be manned by veterans MIKE CURRENT (who has started 70 consecutive games at right tackle) and MARV MONTGOM-ERY, a 3rd year man whom many consider one of the brightest prospects in the NFL. At guards, veterans LARRON JACKSON, TOMMY LYONS, MIKE SCHNITKER and GEORGE GOEDDEKE can play in almost any combination. Goeddeke is coming off knee surgery which sidelined him for 12 games a year ago. Goeddeke is also the most versatile of the linemen, being able to step in at guard, center or tackle. Veterans LARRY KAMINSKI and BOBBY MAPLES are proven centers, with Maples being a fine long snapper. Veterans RICK SHARP and BILL COTTRELL also return and will duel draftees PAUL HOWARD (3a), MIKE ASKEA (7a), for guard and tackle slots while KEN MUHLBEIER (16b) is the only drafted center. If everyone stays healthy the Denver offensive line could become one of the better units in the AFC, although continued improvement in pass protection will be in order. Also, Ralston will need full recuperation by Goeddeke, Lyons, Schnitker, and Jackson, all of whom have had knee surgery in the last year.

DEFENSE

Long the trump card in the Denver deck, the defense will probably undergo some change this season. Gone are long-time pillars Rich Jackson and Dave Costa, but there is still a fine nucleus around which to build. The defense did allow too many touchdowns according to the coach's as-

sessment, but the front four again led the AFC in quarterback sacks, and Denver ranked 2nd in the conference in defending the rush.

DEFENSIVE LINE

There are definitely two All-pro candidates playing in the defensive line. Tackle and co-captain PAUL SMITH was a pro bowl performer last year, and end LYLE ALZADO wasn't far off the pace. The two started every game for the Broncos and teamed with PETE DURANKO, TOM DOMRES and JOHN HOFFMAN in getting to the enemy quarterbacks 41 times, tops in the AFC. All are back, although Domres had knee surgery, as did veterans JERRY INMAN and WALT BARNES who should be ready to go. Denver's 2nd round draft choice BARNEY CHAVOUS rates a good chance at cracking the lineup as does JOHN WOOD (3b). JOHN GRANT (7b), ELTON BROWN (11), and ED SMITH (13a) are all big strong candidates who, along with returning squadman FEST COTTON, should drum up some fierce competition in training camp.

LINEBACKERS

Unquestionably somewhat of a problem area, although a position that showed promise at times in the last half of the 1972 season. Rookie TOM GRAHAM came on to win the middle backer job midway through the year and was responsible for many resounding collisions, a pair of interceptions and good hustle which offset the usual first year errors. Many feel Graham will be a great one. Veterans CHIP MYRTLE, FRED FORSBERG, BOB GEDDES, KEN CRITER and MIKE SIMONE also return to lend considerable experience to the group and the expected return of DON PARISH will be a big boost. Vet CARL WINFREY, obtained via trade from Pittsburgh in May, is also in the picture. TOM JACKSON, 4th round draftee, is considered a fine prospect, and joins JIM O'MALLEY (12) as the drafted candidates.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

A good, veteran group provides an excellent nucleus around which Ralston hopes to reshape his defense. With more emphasis on zone defense, some minor shuffling of positions within the group could occur. BILL THOMPSON, LEROY MITCHELL and CHARLES GREER are all exceptional tacklers and Ralston feels all can make the transition easily. Many feel that Thompson is ready to establish himself as one of the premier defenders in the NFL. Returnees RANDY MONTGOMERY, STEVE PRECE and DENNIS PETE also figure into the plans, and there is a good influx of young players including draftees CHARLES McTORRY (5th), LYLE BLACKWOOD (9th) and CALVIN JONES (15).

PLACE KICKING

JIM TURNER . . . 8th leading career scorer in NFL history. It doesn't take many adjectives to convince anyone that Bronco kicking is in great hands. Jim booted 97 points last season to boost his career total to 887, passing Don Hutson and Bobby Walston along the way from 10th to 8th. He also has the longest consecutive string of PATs of any active player with 171 straight. Perhaps the most consistent kicker in the game, Jim has connected 198 times in 32s field goal attempts for a 61.3 completion percentage. Also handles kickoffs, with PAUL SMITH his backup. Turner had surgery on his big toe on kicking foot during off-season.

PUNTING

Veteran BILL VAN HEUSEN is the Bronco punter, and through six seasons, no one has taken the job away from him. Although he went through his seventh knee operation a year ago, Bill still averaged 40.1 yards on 60 punts. That's a good mark, but lowered his career average to 42.5 on 336 punts.





December — Jim Fraser wins third straight punting title, Willie Brown named to all-AFL team. Broncos sign high draft choices Bob Breitenstein (Tulsa) and Gerry Bussell (Georgia Tech), both No. 1 picks of NFL teams.

1965

January 16 - AFL meeting in Houston, Cal Kunz gives first public indication that all may not be well with Bronco franchise in Denver. January 27 - Broncos obtain Abner Haynes, all-time AFL rushing

leader, in trade with Kansas City for Jim Fraser.

February 11 - Fight to retain control of franchise breaks into public focus. Gerald and Alan Phipps are pitted against "Voting Trust" made up of six principal Empire Sports stockholders and headed by Cal Kunz.

February 15 - Gerald and Allan Phipps purchase 52 percent of the stock of Empire Sports, thus giving them virtually 100 percent ownership and saving the Bronco franchise for Denver.

February 16 - Fabulous season ticket drive begins with sale of 143 season tickets, a Denver record at that time.

February 24 — Cookie Gilchrist, gridiron great, obtained from Buffalo in a trade for Billy Joe.

March 5 - Record sale of 941 season tickets in one day.

April 1 - Season ticket drive goal of 20,000 sales reached. Figure to reach 22,000 by May 1.

May 17 - Allan Phipps named president of Empire Sports, Inc. Gerry Phipps re-named Chairman of the Board, Richard S. Kitchen, Sr., and Robert T. Person named to the board of directors.

May 29 — Jim Burris, Bears general manager, named executive vicepresident of Empire Sports, Inc., a position carrying with it the duties normally associated with those of a football general manager.

August 20 — Jim Burris added to the board of directors of Empire Sports, Inc.

October 3 - Broncos defeat New York, 16-13, before a then overflow crowd of 34,988.

December 12 - Lionel Taylor makes the 500th catch of his career in game against Boston to become the first AFL player to top this figure.

December 12 - Broncos conclude home season with total attendance of 219,786, an average of 31,398 per game. Both the total and average attendance were American Football League western division records. Six of seven home crowds topped the 30,000 mark.

December - Tackle Eldon Danenhauer, Split End Lionel Taylor and Fullback Cookie Gilchrist named to the all-AFL team, thus giving the Broncos more all-star players on their offensive unit than any other AFL team. John Bramlett named second in rookie of the year voting in at least two polls. Lionel Taylor wins fifth pass receiving crown and Abner Haynes wins league kickoff return championship.

1966

February 1 - Record early-season ticket sale passes 15,000 for the 1966 season.

March — Governor Love signs into law legislative act creating a metropolitan stadium district. Voters of a four-county metropolitan region will vote on building a multi-million dollar all-purpose metropolitan stadium before March, 1967. One of provisions of the bill is that major potential tenants of the stadium, including the

June 8-Merger of American and National Leagues announced, Season ticket sales surge forward as enthusiastic fans crowd box office.

July 9 - Fred Forsberg and Pat Matson play in Coaches' All-America game in Atlanta.

September 19 - Ray Malavasi named Head Coach of the Broncos, replacing Mac Speedie, who resigned the previous day.

October 2 - Broncos defeat Houston 40-38 on a 46-yard field goal by Gary Kroner in last 27 seconds of game for first victory of 1966 season.

November 6 - Broncos stage upset victory (17-10) over Eastern Division leader Boston in last 11 seconds with spectacular 65-yard scoring pass from quarterback Max Choboian to Al Denson.

December - John Bramlett, Goose Gonsoulin, Bob Scarpitto and Jerry Sturm chosen to play in AFL All-Star contest in January.

December 19 - Lou Saban signs a 10-year contract as General Manager and Head Coach of the Denver Broncos.

1967

January — Broncos acquire defensive tackle Dave Costa from Buffalo for a draft choice.

February — Gerald Phipps named Chairman of American Football League Executive Committee.

March 1 - Broncos move to new suburban executive offices with adjacent practice field and locker room facilities for both pre-season and regular season training.

March 7 — Metropolitan Denver voters turn down stadium bond issue, but Bronco fans immediately organize for fund raising drive to improve Bears Stadium and keep Broncos in Denver.

May 17 - Floyd Little, Denver's No. 1 draft choice, signs with Broncos. Little becomes the first No. 1 choice to sign with Denver in the history of club.

May 24 - Cincinnati awarded 10th American Football League fran-

chise. Will begin play in 1968.

July 8 - Bronco rookies Floyd Little, Tom Beer, Frank Richter, Mike Current and Tom Francisco play in Coaches' All-American Game in Atlanta. Denver has more participants in the game than any of the 26 teams in AFL and NFL.

August 4 - Floyd Little, Pete Duranko, Tom Beer and George Goeddeke play in Chicago All-Star game vs. Green Bay Packers.

August 5 - Broncos defeat Detroit Lions 13-7 in pre-season game at DU for AFL's first win over the NFL.

August 15 - Quarterback Steve Tensi acquired from San Diego for first round draft choices in both 1968 and 1969.

September 3 - Bronco season ticket figure winds up at a (then) record 24,650.

September 24 - Denver establishes a Bears Stadium one-game attendance record as 35,565 watch the Jets prevail over the Broncos 38-24.

December - Broncos win two of final four games, defeating both Buffalo and New York on the road.

December - Broncos close out season by establishing a new home attendance record of 231,801, an average of 33,114 per game.

December - Floyd Little paces AFL in punt returning with a 16.9 average. Bob Scarpitto repeats as punt leader with a 44.9 norm. Flanker Al Denson selected All-League in player balloting.

1968

January - Flanker Al Denson, defensive tackle Dave Costa, center Larry Kaminski and cornerback Nemiah Wilson participate in AFL All-Star game. Lou Saban and staff coach the West stars.

February — Civic drive to raise \$1.8 million ends successfully and City of Denver receives stadium as a gift after purchase of the facility from Empire Sports, Inc. by non-profit group. Construction begins

September 21 - Broncos move into new administrative building at 5700 Logan Street.

September - Denver will open 1969 home season in 50,000-seat Bears Stadium.

October 13 - Broncos defeat eventual World Champions New York Jets 21-13 in Shea Stadium before 62,052 fans.

November 10 - Denver sets all-time one-game home attendance record by playing before capacity crowd of 50,002 against the Oakland Raiders.

December 14 - Bears Stadium is officially re-named Denver Mile High Stadium.

1969

January 19 - Dave Costa, Rich Jackson and Floyd Little participate in AFL All-Star Game in Jacksonville, Florida.

April 1-Lou Saban elected to Board of Directors of Empire Sports, Inc. May 10 - Announcement by Commissioner Rozelle that Baltimore, Cleveland and Pittsburgh of the National Football League will join the American Conference of the National Football League in

May 13-Broncos set all-time season ticket sale with figure of 27,413, which is 65 more than the 1968 season sale. Figure is expected to hit 30,000 before regular season opens.

September 21 - Denver Broncos win over 1969 World Champion New York Jets (21-19).

September 21 - Denver sets all-time one-game home attendance record by playing before capacity crowd of 50,583 against the New York Jets.

October 19 - Little rushes for 166 yards against Cincinnati, at Cincinnati . . . Top single game rushing effort by running back in either leaque.

November 2 - Denver shuts out the San Diego Chargers at Denver Mile High Stadium (13-0) . . . First shutout for Broncos in 10year history in AFL.

December - Floyd Little and Rich Jackson named to first team All League.

December - Bill Thompson (rookie) tops AFL list in punt and kickoff returns . . . First player in 10-year history of AFL to ever hold both titles.

1970

January - Lou Saban head coach of the North team in Senior Bowl at Mobile, Alabama. Game ended in 37-37 tie.

January 17 - Lou Saban head coach of victorious West team in All-Star game at Houston, Texas. (West 26, East 3.)

January 17 - Rich Jackson, Dave Costa, Floyd Little, Mike Current and George Goeddeke play in All-Star game on West team.

May 7 - Bobby Anderson, #1 draft choice in common draft held January 27, signs contract with Denver Broncos.

June 15 - Val Pinchbeck, Jr., Director of Public Relations for the Denver Broncos the last three years, appointed Assistant to the President of the American Football Conference in New York.

July - Season ticket sales continue to set a record. Approximately 41,000 were sold by first week in July. This is over 9,000 more than the 1969 season ticket sales which were 31,936.

September — Season ticket sale hits record number of 43,584. September 27 - Broncos open home season before record Mile High

Stadium crowd of 50,705 with 16-13 win over Steelers.

October 4 — Broncos win over defending World Champion Kansas City Chiefs, 26-13, to boost record to 3-0.

November 15 — Addition of north stand bleacher section enables new Mile High Stadium record of 50,959 to see Broncos lose narrow decision to Oakland, 24-19, in final two minutes of play.

November 22 - Second largest crowd ever to see Broncos in action on hand in New Orleans. Denver wins, 31-6, before 66,837.

December 20 - Record crowd of 51,001 for final game of season as Cleveland Browns stop Denver, 27-13.

December 20 - Floyd Little gains 44 yards to win American Conference rushing title with 901 yards. It was first rushing crown and first season Little played in all 14 games.

January - Richard Jackson named to official National Football League all-star team.

January - Richard Jackson and Floyd Little make starting lineups for American Conference in first AFC-NFC Pro Bowl game.

January 25 — Veteran quarterback Steve Tensi announces retirement from professional football.

January 28 - Broncos get quarterback Don Horn from Green Bay in exchange for defensive end Alden Roche and an exchange of first round draft positions.

March 26 - Veterans report to Bronco training camp for first offseason camp.

April 1 - Rookies and free agents report for four-day early camp. April 19 - Mary Montgomery, Denver's number one draft choice,

signs his 1971 contract. May 12 - Broncos stop sale of season tickets at record 47,500.

September 19 - Broncos open season with 10-10 tie against eventual Super Bowl entry, Miami, before first of seven sell-out crowds at Mile High Stadium.

October 24 - Denver coach Lou Saban and Broncos down Cleveland 27-0, on same field Saban starred as all-star linebacker in Cleveland. It was first time Browns were shut-out since 1952. It was also to be Saban's last victory as Bronco coach. Attendance was 75,674, largest crowd to date to view Denver.

November 17 - Lou Sabin resigns as head coach of Broncos, a position he had held for five years. Offensive line coach Jerry Smith is named interim head coach. Saban, in December, resigns as General Manager to return to Buffalo Bills as head coach.

December 19 - Floyd Little compiles 79 yards against Raiders in Oakland to finish as pro football's top runner with 1,133 yards. Little also becomes first Bronco to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a season.

1972

January 5 - John Ralston, successful head coach at Stanford, is announced as Denver's new head coach. He later adds the title of General Manager.

February 28 - Broncos' Number One draft pick, Riley Odoms, TE,

from Houston, inks multi-year contract.

March 16 - For the first time in the history of Denver professional football, there will be no public sale of season tickets, it is reported. Season ticket holders renewed 46,500 of the 47,500 available season tickets, and further exercised their option for 8,000 additional tickets, thus assuring Denver of its third straight year of sell-outs.

March 16 - Cal Poly at Pomona is reported to be the pre-season training site for the Broncos. Camp is to open July 19.

April 5 - Long-time Rocky Mountain Empire Sports employee Earl Hartman dies of cancer. Hartman is Treasurer of Empire Sports and Business Manager of the Broncos at the time of his death.

July 19-Broncos open summer camp at Cal Poly at Pomona (Calif.) as rookies report for physicals.

August 16-Charley Johnson, NFL veteran quarterback, becomes a Bronco as Ralston trades third round choice to Houston. Johnson will become Denver's most accurate passer (.555) in the upcoming season.

August 27-John Ralston gets first victory in pro ranks as Broncos come from behind to down San Francisco, 27-24, in pre-season action. Win came at right time as Denver had trained the previous week at Ralston's former place of employment, Stanford, in Palo Alto, Calif.

October 22-Denver, 1-4 going into Raider game on West Coast, surprises Oakland with a 30-23 win, the first victory over the Raiders in a decade. Johnson completes 20 of 28 passes for 361

yards and two TDs.

October 29-Floyd Little is given his "day" at Mile High Stadium

before a sell-out crowd. In pre-game ceremonies, Little receives numerous gifts including a boat. However, Broncos are unable to whip Cleveland as Browns win, 27-20. Floyd's day was in conor of his winning NFL rushing championship in 1971.

November 12-The L.A. Coliseum is the setting for the Broncos' 16-10 win over the Rams. A strong defense shut off the LA running game was the fourth largest crowd (65,398) ever to watch Broncos is on hand.

December 3 - Broncos lose 24-21 decision to Chiefs before 66,725,

third largest crowd to view Denver.

December 10-San Diego is on short end of 38-13 score played at Mile High Stadium with the temperature at kickoff reportedly nine degrees. This is the coldest kickoff ever for a Denver team.

December 17-Denver whips New England, 45-21, to end season with 5-9 mark, good enough to escape the fourth spot in the AFC West. This victory also is first time Denver ends seasons with two consecutive wins, setting the stage for 1973.

1973

January 30-Otis Armstrong, all-star running back from Purdue, is Denver's first round selection in annual draft. Armstrong carries several Big Ten rushing records with him.

March 3—Season ticket holders renew 47,800 of 48,000 season tickets to assure Denver again of having no public sale of season ducats. Season ticket holders asked for additional 11,000 tickets - if they become available.

March 23-Otis Armstrong, Denver's top choice in recent draft, signs with Broncos. He thus becomes the third number one choice of the Broncos to be in backfield. The others are Floyd Little and Bob Anderson.

July 18-With very few off-season trades under his belt, John Ralston returns his team to Pomona, Calif., to open pre-season camp.
