A Quick Glance

With the NFL's most loyal and optimistic fans rewarded with the long-awaited winning season, the Denver Broncos launch on phase two of their goal-setting program in 1974 with their sights set on a playoff berth, presumably meaning a championship of the AFC West along the way.

And for the first time in the 14-year history of the Denver franchise, most followers of Bronco football fortunes feel that the players needed to achieve championship ambitions are already in uniform.

The change in the Denver fortunes since the arrival of positive thinking John Ralston in 1972 have been dramatic. First came the turn-around in attitude capped by Denver winning its final two games of Ralston's rookie season . . . a first in Denver. Then, with the ranks of the doubters dwindling, the Broncos fashioned their first winning season last year by posting a 7-5-2 mark which included seven straight weeks without a loss. The 1973 campaign was capped with a "play-off" appearance in Oakland in the last week of the season, with the winner taking all the marbles, and the Broncos winding up four points shy of the Raiders.

Now, when Ralston . . . the AFC Coach of the Year in '73 . . . claims his squad is ready to accept its responsibility as a bona fide contender, it only puts added pressure on the Bronco ticket office where a waiting list for season tickets passed the 17-thousand mark last March.

Although Ralston is constantly interested in upgrading his squad personnel, the coming season appears to be one where the job is to get the right people in the right positions and the right combinations on the field, rather than the familiar search for better players which had been the usual approach in the past.

The defense has solidified a great deal over the past two years, and simply starting over in camp with the same people who survived a shaky start in '73 only to improve weekly into a strong finish, should provide a much improved unit. The switch to more zone coverage is still not complete, but the inspired play of all-pro Paul Smith, the addition of linebackers Ray May and Bill Laskey, the ease in which veteran Bill Thompson made the change to strong safety, and the emergence of rookies Barney Chavous and Calvin Jones into 14-game starters, lends lots of optimism to this side of the line of scrimmage.

Offensively, the unit led by Charley Johnson returns, and this group spearheaded an attack that scored 41 touchdowns, led the AFC in pass offense, and was third in total offense. More depth appears in the offensive line, and a bevy of fine running back prospects are ready to challenge starters Floyd Little and Joe Dawkins.

One of the biggest battles of pre-season play may develop over the backup quarterback job between veteran Steve Ramsey and second-year pro John Hufnagel who spent 1973 on the inactive list but was impressive in practice sessions.

Coach Ralston Says:

"There's no question as to our goal for 1974. Our squad is determined to be a playoff team and we think we have the personnel to attain that goal. Although we are always interested in upgrading our squad, there's no question in our minds that we have the people on the 1974 squad to go all the way.

"We don't expect any wholesale personnel changes, but fans might see some shuffling of positions as our main job as coaches will be to find the right combinations, particularly on defense, that will make the Denver Broncos a championship squad.

"Although we came up five points short of making the playoffs last season, it was a good year for us and we think we now have the broad base needed so we can continue to build and to improve. Our seven-game unbeaten string in the middle of the 1973 season was just the tonic we needed to get us around the corner in the attitude department, and we now feel we have a talented, dedicated and confident team.

"We can't ask the offense to be much better, although we will have some interesting battles for jobs. Second year guard Paul Howard impressed us a great deal during his rookie season, and veteran George Goeddeke will be back after missing almost two full seasons to give us some real competition in that offensive line. The 41 touchdowns scored last season (38 by the offense, three by the defense . . . and a safety by the special teams) doesn't need a great deal of improvement. But, as everyone knows, a team never stays the same. It either improves or slips backward, and we'll be seeking ways to get even more points on the board.

"Defensively, we feel that just starting over in camp will make us much improved. We had several new people join us as the season progressed, and we experimented with several combinations. Actually we were a good defensive unit down the stretch, and we feel we can be formidable with the same people just by doing all of our experimenting in the pre-season so that when we start playing for keeps, we'll have it all together.

"There's no question that we matured as a team in 1973, and that our squad knows what is needed to be a championship team. The attitude is outstanding and there are several new players we feel can make a contribution. In other words, all the ingredients are there for a championship season, something the loyal fans of Denver so richly deserve and something our players are dedicated to providing."

Gerald H. Phipps

Chairman of the Board



With nearly 28 years of participation in the Denver sports scene, Gerald H. Phipps has seen the Rocky Mountain area receive major league sports status.

In 1947, he became part of the organization that brought the Denver Bears here as members of the old Western League. The Bears, during the years that immediately followed that move, set minor league baseball attendance records that stood unchallenged for many years.

In 1961, one year after big league professional football had arrived in the form of the Denver Broncos of the American Football League, Phipps became a major owner and assumed duties as board chairman.

Four years later, he and his brother, Allan, became virtually the sole owners of the club.

Phipps, 59, is a member of the Denver Country Club, the Denver Athletic Club, Denver Club, Cherry Hills Country Club, Rolling Hills Country Club, Broadmoor Golf Club of Colorado Springs, and the Williams Club of New York.

He was born March 4, 1915, in Denver to Lawrence C. and Margaret Rogers Phipps and received his bachelor's degree from Williams College in 1936.

He was employed by the Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad from then until he entered the Navy as an Ensign in May, 1942.

Following his separation from the service in 1945, he was employed by a general contracting firm in Denver until 1952, when he formed his present company, Gerald H. Phipps, Inc. In 1958, he was elected vice-president and treasurer of California Electric Power Co. and when that company merged with Southern California Edison Company late in 1963, he was named a director of the latter. He is a past president of the Associated Building Contractors of Colorado, Inc., a director and member of the Executive Committee of The First National Bank of Denver and a director of The First National Bancorporation, Western Federal Savings and Loan Association, Rio Grande Industries, and the Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad. He is also a trustee of Colorado College. Mr. Phipps is also on the Board of Directors of the Denver Chamber of Commerce.

Phipps was married in New York City on September 24, 1937, to the former Janet Alice Smith. They have three daughters, and eight grandchildren.

President



Allan R. Phipps, President of the Broncos, has been an active member of the Denver sports and cultural community for a number of years.

At Williams College, where he received his bachelor's degree, he was a member of the tennis and swimming teams.

Phipps, 61, is also a partner in the law firm of Hughes & Dorsey; active in key non-candidate roles in the Republican party, including a stint as chairman of the GOP State Finance Committee, and serves on the governing boards of numerous organizations.

His posts include those of President of the Denver Museum of Natural History and Trustee of the University of Denver, of the Denver Museum of Natural History, of the Denver Symphony Society and of the Graland Country Day School.

Phipps was Alumni Trustee of Williams College and is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Winter Park Recreational Association and of the Board of Managers of St. Luke's Hospital in Denver.

In addition to his bachelor's degree from Williams in 1934, he received a degree in Jurisprudence from Oxford University in 1936 and a law degree from the University of Denver in 1937.

Phipps is a member of Phi Beta Kappa. He served in World War II as a Lieutenant Commander, U. S. Naval Reserve, in the Pacific Theater.

He is a director of Cherry Creek National Bank, South Denver National Bank, Belcaro Realty Investment Company, Highlander Hotel Corporation, and Van Schaack Corporation.

Phipps was admitted to the Colorado bar in 1938 and joined Hughes & Dorsey in 1946.

He is married to the former Clara Mitchell Van Schaack, and has two sons, a daughter, and two grandchildren.

John Ralston

General Manager-
Head Coach



It took John Ralston just two years to turn the Denver Broncos into a winner—a feat never before accomplished in the club's 14-year history. The Broncos ended the 1973 campaign with a 7-5-2 mark and tied with Kansas City for second place in the tough Western Division of the AFC.

Ralston, himself, gained some well-deserved honors after the 1973 season, his second in the NFL. Ralston was named American Football Conference Coach-of-the-Year by UPI, AP, the Kansas City 101 Committee and by the Pro Football Writers of America.

There have been steady advances for the Broncos since Ralston joined the team as head coach and general manager in January of 1972. Denver climbed from the division cellar in John's first season and finished with a 5-9 record.

Then after starting with a 1-3 mark in 1973, the Broncos were defeated just twice in the final ten games of the NFL season. In fact, the Denver franchise faced a play-off berth if the Broncos would have been on top of the Oakland Raiders in the final game of the season. However, Oakland edged the Broncos, 21-17, to win the division title and a playoff berth.

Ralston's next goal is evident — a playoff berth for the Broncos.

John joined the Broncos from Stanford after two Rose Bowl victories over impressive Big Ten competition. He began his Stanford stint on January 18, 1963. In nine seasons at the helm, he captured two Pacific Eight titles, while compiling an impressive 54-36-3 record. He reeled off eight straight winning campaigns, but winning was nothing unusual for him.

Before the Stanford job, Ralston was head coach at Utah State, where he held a 31-11-1 mark on four years. The Aggies were co-champions of the Skyline Conference in two of those years and the team played in the Sun and Gotham Bowls.

Ralston was also the head coach of the West team in the 1965, 1966 and 1969 Shrine games. But his outside activities did not stop there. He has coached at the Hula Bowl, served on the Peace Corps' 21-man Athletic Committee, officiated at several clinics, and fills his off-season calendar with countless speaking engagements.

After first gaining coaching experience as a student assistant in spring practice at California in 1951, Ralston served as an assistant at Mount Diablo High School in Concord, Calif. from 1951 through 1952. John then was appointed head coach at San Lorenzo High School in 1953 and remained there for two years. In 1956 he returned to Cal and served through 1958 as an assistant coach in various areas.

Born in Oakland, Calif., April 26, 1927, Ralston attended elementary and high schools in Norway, Mich. He served two and one-half years with the U.S. Marine Corps during and after World War II, before entering the University of California at Berkeley, where he graduated in 1951. Ralston was a linebacker on two of Cal's Rose Bowl teams.

He and his wife, Patty, were married in 1951, and they are the parents of three children — twin daughters, Terry and Sherry, and a son, Larry.

Joe Collier

Defensive
Coordinator

In his first move in putting together an assistant coaching staff, John Ralston hired Joe Collier as the Broncos' defensive coordinator.

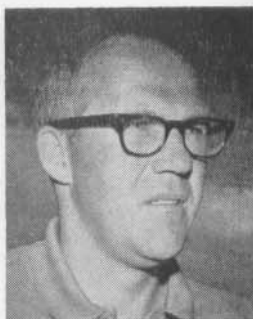
Collier, 42, was the lone holdover from the Lou Saban staff. Joe joined the Broncos in January of 1969, after serving two-plus seasons as head coach of the Buffalo Bills.

Born in Rock Island, Ill., Collier was graduated from Rock Island High. He attended Northwestern University and lettered three years as an end. In 1953, he captained the Wildcats and was named all-Big Ten. He played in the post-season Senior Bowl and East-West Shrine games.

Joe was drafted by the New York Giants but elected to bypass pro football as a player. He served in the Army from 1954-56 prior to joining the coaching staff at Western Illinois as a graduate assistant in 1957.

A year later he became a full-time member of the staff, serving under Lou Saban. He moved with Saban to Boston in 1960 and on to Buffalo two years later. Joe was named head coach of the Bills in 1966.

He and his wife, Shirley, have three children; Julie, 16; Lisa, 14; and Joel, 10.



Max Coley

Offensive
Coordinator

The record speaks for itself as far as Max Coley's presence is concerned on the Bronco staff. After joining Denver as offensive coordinator in 1972, his area showed marked progress.

In his first year, Coley's offensive unit upped the TD production from 18 (in 1971) to 38 in 1972 and to 41 in 1973.

Max came from the Pittsburgh Steelers where he was offensive backfield coach for three years. Coley also handles the offensive backfield for Denver.

Max, 46, is a native of Tulsa, Okla., and he split his college career between Northeastern Oklahoma A&M and San Jose State, where he graduated from in 1950.

After coaching stints in the California high school system, and at his alma mater, Coley spent ten years as offensive backfield coach at the University of Oregon before joining the Steelers in 1969.

At Oregon, Max helped develop one of the nation's most productive college offensive units, and during his tenure with the Ducks, they averaged better than 300 yards and three TDs per game.

Coley and his wife, Ann, have four children: Max Lynn, Rick, Debra Ann and Melinda Jane.



Bob Gambold

Defensive Backfield
Coach

Bob Gambold, 44, a Ralston aide at Stanford for nine years, is Denver's defensive backfield coach.

Gambold served as defensive coordinator and linebacker coach at Stanford, after completing a two-year stint with Tommy Prothro at Oregon State. Bob also has had coaching assignments at Washington State for five years and at Everett (Wash.) Junior College.

A native of Longview, Wash., Gambold is a 1951 graduate of Washington State, where he was a standout quarterback and a varsity basketball player. Following graduation, he served his alma mater as freshman football coach and basketball coach.

Gambold then served two years as a quarterback in the pros with Philadelphia in '53 and Chicago's Cardinals in '54.

Gambold has four children: Valerie, 22; Robin, 21; Barry, 17; and Victoria, 16. Bob and his wife, Shirley, live in west Denver.



Richard 'Doc' Urich

Defensive
Line Coach

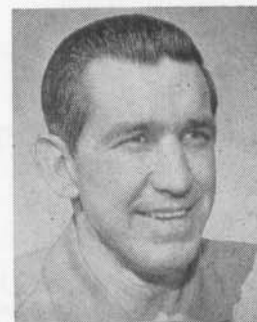
Guiding the Broncos' defensive line is Richard "Doc" Urich. He joined the Broncos in 1972.

Urich, 45, coached the defensive line in 1971 for the Buffalo Bills, after spending 1969 and 1970 as head football coach at Northern Illinois University. He also is the former head coach at the University of Buffalo.

A 1951 graduate of Miami (O.) University where he was a standout end, Doc counted such grid names as Paul Dietzel, Carmen Cozza, Ara Parseghian and Bo Schembechler among his teammates, and was coached by Sid Gillman and Woody Hayes.

Following graduation, Urich launched his coaching career at Massillon (Ohio) High School before returning to his alma mater. He then joined Parseghian's staff at Northwestern for eight years before the entire staff made the transition to Notre Dame in 1964.

Urich and his wife, Pat, have two children: Cynthia, 22, and Danny, 19.



Jerry Frei

Offensive
Line Coach

After serving five years as head coach at Oregon, Jerry Frei joined the Denver staff as offensive line coach in 1972.

A 1948 graduate of Wisconsin, Jerry joined the Oregon staff and spent 12 years under Len Casanova before being named head coach in 1967. His Duck teams made steady improvements and in 1970 Oregon took second place in the Pacific Eight Conference. He was named UPI "Coach of the Week" twice during 1970 after beating Southern California and Air Force.

After college graduation, Frei, 50, moved to coaching at the high school level in Oregon. In 1952 he entered the college ranks as line coach at Willamette University until 1955 when he joined the Oregon staff.

At Wisconsin, Jerry lettered three years as a lineman, where he played beside such greats as Pat Harder, Dave Schreiner and Elroy Hirsch.

Jerry and his wife, Marion, have five children: David, 26; Judy, 23; Terry, 19; Susan, 15; and Nancy, 12.



Kay Dalton

Wide Receiver
Coach

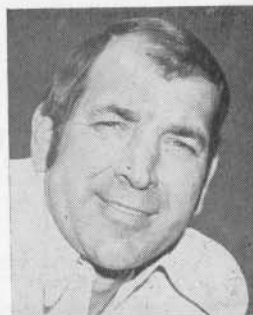
Kay Dalton, who had spent 1973 as a special assistant in the Broncos' scouting department, is the team's new wide receiver coach.

Dalton, 42, who had served with the offensive football staff at the University of Colorado, joined the Bronco staff in August of 1973.

Dalton's coaching experience, in addition to his two seasons at Colorado, include head coaching jobs at Trinidad J.C., and Western State at the collegiate level, and with the Montreal Alouettes in the Canadian Football League.

A native of Moab, Utah, Dalton is a 1954 graduate of Colorado State and was offensive coordinator for the British Columbia Lions from 1969-70, prior to joining the CU staff in 1971.

Kay and his wife, Phyllis, live in Boulder with their three children, Mary Lou, 15; Sharon Kay, 13; and Keith, 11.



Myrel Moore

Linebacker and
Special Teams Coach

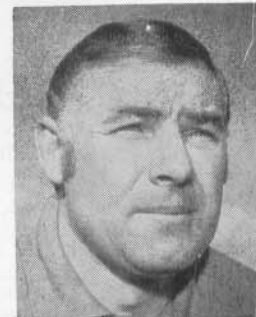
Myrel Moore, former assistant at the University of California at Berkeley, will coach the Broncos' special teams again in 1973, and will add duties as linebacker coach.

Moore, 39, was a member of Ray Willsey's staff at California since 1964. He served Willsey as offensive and defensive coordinator, at different times during his California stay.

He went to Cal-Berkeley from Santa Ana Junior College where he served as head coach in 1963. He was at Santa Ana J.C. since 1959 as an assistant coach.

The youngest member of the Broncos coaching staff is a former All-Conference end and Small-College All-American at Cal-Davis, where he graduated in 1958. He played for the Washington Redskins as a defensive back in 1958.

Myrel and his wife, Jackie, have two children: Michelle Rene, 14, and Michale Damon, 10.



Fred Gehrke

Assistant General Manager
Player Personnel Director

Fred Gehrke, 56, a workhorse for the Bronco organization since January of 1965, has added the title of assistant general manager to his player personnel duties.

A former star football player at Utah, Gehrke concluded his active playing career in 1950 with the L.A. Rams, after being an all-pro with the world-champion Cleveland Rams in 1945.

He started his pro career with the Rams in 1940 and then played with the Los Angeles Bulldogs in the wartime Pacific Coast League from 1941 through 1944.

During that time he also worked in the Engineering Design Division of the Northrup Aircraft Co. A technical artist, he is responsible for the helmet design presently worn by the Los Angeles Rams. He received the first Dan Reeves award from the Hall of Fame in 1972 for his helmet design idea. Previously he was an outstanding scholar-athlete at Utah in 1937, 1938 and 1939. Also, he held the record in the javelin and was the conference diving champion for 3 years.

Gehrke remained close to the game after his retirement and did color commentary with Tom Harmon on radio and television football broadcasts for 13 years. Gehrke has five children — four daughters and a son. Fred and his wife, Jean, live in Arvada.



Carroll Hardy

Director of Scouting

Carroll Hardy, 41, assumed the duties of Director of Scouting in June of 1970. He is responsible for assessing the talent of hundreds of college athletes that become eligible for the pros each year, and deciding which of them can play football professionally.

Hardy has long been considered one of the greatest athletes produced by Colorado since winning a modern record of 10 letters at the University of Colorado (four each in football and baseball and two in track.)

After his graduation from the U. of Colorado in 1955 with a degree in education, Carroll signed a baseball contract with the Cleveland Indians and was drafted in the third round by football's San Francisco 49ers, and played that year as a wide receiver and a running back.

The '56 and '57 seasons were spent in the Army, but he returned to Cleveland in 1958 and was used as an outfielder until 1960 when he was traded to the Red Sox. In 1961 Carroll became the only man ever to pinch hit for Ted Williams.

The year 1963 found Hardy with the expansion Houston Colt 45's, where he remained until 1965 when he was traded to Minnesota. During the fall of '65 he became associated with the Broncos as a scout.

In 1969 Carroll became assistant ticket manager for the Broncos and held the position until being named to his new post. Hardy and his wife, Janice, were married in 1956 and have three children — Jay, 17; Jill, 16; and Lisa, 13. They reside in Boulder.



Allen Hurst

Trainer

The duties of trainer fall on the shoulders of Allen Hurst, a man who has been in the business since he was 15.

Hurst, 33, was born in Houston, Texas, and took up training in his freshman year in high school. After his graduation in 1959, he accepted a four-year scholarship to train at Texas Christian University.

During his stint as student trainer at TCU, he commuted to Houston where he was on the staff of the Oilers. While with the Oilers training staff, Houston played in the AFL Championship Games of 1960, 1961, and 1962.

He was graduated from TCU in 1963 with a degree in physical education and a minor in biology. He then joined the Broncos and has been in the post of head trainer since.

Allen and his wife, Patsy, were married in 1963 and live in Lakewood. They are parents of sons Gregory, 3, and Justin, 2.

Hurst is assisted by Dave Kendall, 31, former trainer at the University of Pacific.



Larry Elliott

Equipment Manager

Responsible for handling the large amount of equipment needed by a professional football team is Larry Elliott, 37.

Larry began his career in athletics at the age of 13 when his parents moved the family to Colorado. At St. Mary's High School in Colorado Springs, he won a total of 10 varsity letters in football, basketball and baseball. A number of scholarship offers in both football and baseball followed his graduation in 1955, but Larry opted for the Air Force.

During his four years in the service at such spots as Hawaii, Guam, The Philippines, Japan and Tripoli, athletics were not forgotten. While stationed at Tripoli's Wheelus Air Force Base he won All-European honors as a third baseman.

Following his discharge from the service, Elliott worked as an assistant manager of a finance company, bookkeeper and as assistant athletic equipment manager for the Air Force Academy. He was recommended for the Bronco position in 1965 by Air Force Academy equipment manager Artus Smith; a position he has held since.

Position-By-Position

THE OFFENSE

The true mark of a good offense can best be measured in touchdowns produced, and in this regard the Bronco forecast for 1974 is very bright.

After a TD production of just 18 in 1971, John Ralston came upon the Denver scene and helped bring a grand change which saw the team cross the goal line 38 times in 1972 and 41 in 1973, the latter for a club mark. The record of 41 represented a balanced attack as 16 of the touchdowns came via rushing, 22 by the pass and three by returns.

QUARTERBACKS

It was not by accident that the Broncos offense improved with the acquisition in 1972 of CHARLEY JOHNSON, a veteran of 13 NFL campaigns. Johnson has had post-season knee surgery, but is expected to be full go again by the summer. Johnson was named UPI's all-AFC first team quarterback after completing 184 of 346 passes good for 2,465 yards. A stiff battle is expected to develop for the back-up spot. Vet STEVE RAMSEY and second-year pro JOHN HUFNAGEL will undoubtedly see most of the pre-season action at QB. Ramsey is entering his fifth season, and was the back-up to Johnson all of 1973. When Charley was hurt during the Jets' game, Steve came in and promptly threw a 76-yd. TD toss to Haven Moses to ice the game. Hufnagel was inactive the entire 1973 season, but was impressive during trial times in the '73 pre-season. DONALD GRAY from Cal State at Northridge is a free agent.

RUNNING BACKS

Possibly the most fortified position on the Bronco team, as the incomparable FLOYD LITTLE combines with fullback JOE DAWKINS to give Denver a most explosive rushing game. Together in 1973, these two provided an overall yardage mark of 2,437 (combining rushing and receiving). Little is pro football's 11th all-time rusher, and the last two seasons has scored 13 TDs each year, the team record. Ready, willing and very able are the back-up personnel OTIS ARMSTRONG, Denver's Number One choice in 1973, and BOBBY ANDERSON, also a previous Number One. When one adds reliable FRAN LYNCH plus impressive OLIVER ROSS, a second year runner, it's easy to see why Denver is in great shape for running backs. STEVE BUCHANAN (11th round) was the sole rusher drafted, but rookie fullback JON KEYWORTH was obtained in a trade with Washington.

WIDE RECEIVERS — TIGHT ENDS

Two of the four Broncos who participated in the Pro Bowl come from this group. Tight end RILEY ODOMS, in only his second season, led the Broncos in receptions with 43 catches good for 629 yards and seven touchdowns. Riley was also a consensus selection to the all-AFC team and made several all-pro squads. The other participant was HAVEN MOSES, the top deep threat as a wide receiver. MOSES caught 28 passes, eight for touchdowns. JERRY SIMMONS, the other starting wide receiver, averaged 19.2 yards per catch in his finest season last year. He continued to be one of the game's fine blockers and thus held off the strong

challenge of vet GENE WASHINGTON for a starting role. Washington came to Denver from Minnesota and caught 10 aeriels, three for scores. Perhaps the best all-around athlete on the squad is BILL VAN HEUSEN. Also, the third ranked punter in the NFL last season, Billy saw spot duty as a wide receiver, catching eight including a 62-yard TD against Houston. BILLY MASTERS yielded his tight end starting role to Odoms, but still saw considerable action, and remains an excellent blocker. Promising young veterans JEFF BAKER and MARV FRAZIER hope to crack the active list this year, while BOYD BROWN (17) is the lone tight end draft choice, while JOHN WINESBERRY (6) was the wide receiver selected. Free agents include TOMMY STRAHAN, ART MILLER and CEPHUS WEATHERSPOON.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Probably the most underrated, and definitely the most under publicized unit on the Bronco team. This line allowed enemy players to get to Bronco signal-callers just 27 times, ranking only behind Miami and Cincinnati in that department. MIKE CURRENT, who has now started 84 straight games at right tackle, is the senior member of the starting group. He teamed with MARV MONTGOMERY, a first round choice in 1971 at tackle, while LARRON JACKSON and TOMMY LYONS held down the guard spots with veteran BOBBY MAPLES at center. When a broken leg sidelined Montgomery, Jackson moved to left tackle, and was replaced at guard by MIKE SCHNITKER, and the Bronco offense hardly missed a beat. Montgomery had a bone graft performed on his leg in May, and it is hoped he'll be ready for the regular season. Second year guard PAUL HOWARD plus versatile GEORGE GOEDDEKE will challenge along the line for starting duty. TOM HUMPHREY and MIKE ASKEA, both young performers, provide backup help, while drafted linemen include impressive CLAUDIE MINOR (3) and DARELL AUSTIN (16). Long-time Bronco center LARRY KAMINSKI retired after 1973. Free agents are LeFRANCIS ARNOLD, a guard, and R. W. HICKS, a center.

THE DEFENSE

The forecast for an improved defense is strong in Broncoland for 1974. With the mid-season addition of Ray May at one linebacker spot in 1973 plus good back-to-back drafts, John Ralston feels the Denver defense is a training camp away from being one of the better units around the NFL. The Broncos in 1973 embarked on more zone defense and admittedly it took several weeks for the transition.

DEFENSIVE LINE

Pro bowler PAUL SMITH and LYLE ALZADO anchor an improving and young defensive line. The Broncos slipped a bit in the number of sacks recorded (36), but this still was fifth in the AFC. Smith was again selected by his teammates as the top defensive star on the team, while recording 11 sacks, 106 tackles and 40 QB harrassments. Smith and PETE DURANKO hold down the tackle posts, while second year pro BARNEY CHAVOUS combines with Alzado at the ends. Chavous improved week-by-week and is being counted upon for years to come. Good young prospects provide the back-up help, as ED SMITH, JOHN GRANT and newcomer CARL WAFER (2) are set for 1974, as is veteran JERRY INMAN. All in all, this group should get better and better each week, and the maturing of the young people present will help considerably.

LINEBACKERS

Undoubtedly, this unit underwent the most change and still showed improvement from season's beginning to end. Unfortunately, injuries played a large part in the shuffling of personnel, but the biggest events in 1973 were the trades which brought two starters to Denver in BILL LASKEY and RAY MAY. Both former Baltimore Colts, Laskey was the first acquisition, and promptly moved into a starting job on the strong side. Bill was injured in late November, and second year man TOM JACKSON played well in relief. It is expected a strong battle will develop during the summer for the spot. May was a fixture on the weak side after he came from the Colts. TOM GRAHAM, beginning his third season, performed well in the middle, and will get added help from RANDY GRADISHAR, Denver's top choice of 1974. MIKE SIMONE, CHIP MYRTLE, JIM O'MALLEY, and KEN CRITER are all veterans and give Denver good depth for the first time in many years. LARRY CAMERON (12) was the other drafted linebacker, while SCOTT SPRATFORD, ED CLIFFORD and RALPH COLEMAN are free agents.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

A top quality unit makes up this category, as Denver will try to improve an already good record of 1973 which saw only 16 touchdown passes thrown against the Broncos. BILL THOMPSON moved from cornerback to strong safety last season and performed so well many believe he is of all-pro caliber now. CHARLES GREER moved from strong to weak safety, and saw action along with veterans MAURICE TYLER and JOHN PITTS. Thompson is the cream of the group, as 1973 saw the six-year pro intercept three passes one for a TD, and recover a fumble against Oakland returning it 80 yards for six points. At cornerback, CALVIN JONES, at 5-7, 170, performed very well for a rookie 15th round draft choice. Jones displayed his fine jumping ability in defending successfully against taller foes. On the other side, LEROY MITCHELL will receive a stiff challenge from former Pittsburgh Steeler JOHN ROWSER. Rowser was obtained in a trade for two 1974 draft choices. Thompson and Jones were the only two players of this group to start all 14 games, so this unit obviously was slowed by the continual shuffle of personnel in 1973. Draft choices OZELL COLLIER (4), CHARLIE JOHNSON (10) and RICH MARKS (14) will get a good look in camp, along with free agents JIM TOMLIN, CB, JAMES RAY, S, and RON WYATT, S.

PLACEKICKING

JIM TURNER went over 100 points for the first time as a Bronco in 1973, collecting 106 points. That gives Jim 993 career points, which makes him the seventh leading scorer in the history of pro football. As a field goal kicker, Turner rates with the very best of all time. He made 22 of 33 last season, not missing from within the 30-yard line. He also owns the longest active string of successful PATs with his mark of 211 and counting. The NFL record is 234. Turner also handles the kickoffs.

PUNTING

BILL VAN HEUSEN just seems to get better and better with each season. A veteran of seven knee operations, Bill had his best season in 1973 as a pro, averaging 45.1 yards to finish with the third best mark in the NFL. Van Heusen unloaded punts of 72 and 78 yards last season for career highs. Bill also doubles as a wide receiver, where he caught eight balls last year for 149 yards. LARRY STEELE and PETE BERKSON are free agent candidates.

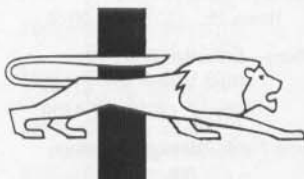

- August 14 — First American Football League organizational meeting held in Chicago. Denver, with Bob Howsam as its principal owner, named as a charter member along with New York, Dallas, Los Angeles, Minneapolis and Houston.
- November 22 — First player selection draft held through 32 rounds. Denver's first pick is Roger LeClerc, center, Trinity.
- November 30 — Joe Foss named American Football League Commissioner.
- December 1 — Dean Griffing named general manager of the Broncos.
- December 2 — Second player selection draft of 20 rounds held.

- January 1 — Frank Filchok named first head coach of the Broncos.
- January 30 — Denver placed in AFL's western division with Dallas, Oakland and Los Angeles.
- Spring — Frank Tripucka and Chuck Gavin, with Canadian experience, and NFL veteran, Bud McFadin, coming out of retirement, join squad. Also joining squad is unknown Gene Mingo, without college experience, who later proves to be one of the game's great placekickers.
- June 9 — AFL signs five-year television contract with the American Broadcasting Company.
- July — First Bronco training camp opens at Colorado School of Mines.
- July 29 — First intra-squad game played at Colorado School of Mines.

- December — Offensive End Lionel Taylor, Defensive Tackle Bud McFadin and Safety Goose Gonsoulin all named to first official all-AFL team.

1961

- May 26 — Bob and Lee Howsam, original principal owners of the Broncos, sell their stock to a new syndicate headed by Cal Kunz and Gerry Phipps.
- June 1 — Cal Kunz named president and operating head of Empire Sports.
- December — Lionel Taylor sets professional record with 100 pass receptions for season. Taylor and Bud McFadin named to all-AFL team.
- December — Frank Filchok released as Broncos head coach.

1962

- February 1 — Jack Faulkner hired as Broncos head coach.
- July 1 — Dean Griffing released as Broncos general manager. Faulkner named to dual post as head coach and general manager.
- July — Public burning ceremonies of Broncos' notorious vertically striped socks at Broncos' intra-squad game.
- August 24 — Broncos defeat Dallas Texans, 27-24, in Fort Worth in first overtime game played by the Broncos. It was also Denver's first win over the Texans.
- September 7 — Broncos open regular season with 31-21 win over defending western division champion San Diego before turnaway crowd at D.U. stadium.
- October 21 — Broncos defeat Houston, 20-10, before 34,496 at Bears Stadium. Season record upped to 6-1 with win.
- December — Jack Faulkner named coach of the year in AFL. Gene Mingo set professional field goal record of 27 in a season. Eldon Danenhauer, Lionel Taylor, Goose Gonsoulin and Bob Zeman named to the official all-AFL team.

1963

- July 18 — Bronco rookies defeat Houston rookies, 17-14, before 6500 in Colorado Springs in first pro rookie game ever played.
- August — Charlie Mitchell, Tom Janik and Tom Nomina, all future Broncos, play in College All-Star game in Chicago.
- September 16 — Frank Tripucka retires.
- October 13 — John McCormick injured in Houston game. Will not play again until the 1965 season.
- Season — Fourteen rookies play regularly as Broncos start a youth rebuilding program. Tops among the rookies are Mickey Slaughter, Billy Joe, Charlie Mitchell, Willie Brown and Hewritt Dixon.
- December — Billy Joe named AFL rookie of the year. Goose Gonsoulin only Bronco to make the all-AFL team. Lionel Taylor wins fourth straight pass receiving title.

- January 27 — Broncos obtain Abner Haynes, all-time AFL rushing leader, in trade with Kansas City for Jim Fraser.
- February 11 — Fight to retain control of franchise breaks into public focus. Gerald and Allan Phipps are pitted against "Voting Trust" made up of six principal Empire Sports stockholders and headed by Cal Kunz.
- February 15 — Gerald and Allan Phipps purchase 52 percent of the stock of Empire Sports, thus giving them virtually 100 percent ownership and saving the Bronco franchise for Denver.
- February 16 — Fabulous season ticket drive begins with sale of 143 season tickets, a Denver record at that time.
- February 24 — Cookie Gilchrist, gridiron great, obtained from Buffalo in a trade for Billy Joe.
- March 5 — Record sale of 941 season tickets in one day.
- April 1 — Season ticket drive goal of 20,000 sales reached. Figure to reach 22,000 by May 1.
- May 17 — Allan Phipps named president of Empire Sports, Inc. Gerry Phipps re-named Chairman of the Board. Richard S. Kitchen, Sr., and Robert T. Person named to the board of directors.
- May 29 — Jim Burris, Bears general manager, named executive vice-president of Empire Sports, Inc., a position carrying with it the duties normally associated with those of a football general manager.
- August 20 — Jim Burris added to the board of directors of Empire Sports, Inc.
- October 3 — Broncos defeat New York, 16-13, before a then overflow crowd of 34,988.
- December 12 — Lionel Taylor makes the 500th catch of his career in game against Boston to become the first AFL player to top this figure.
- December 12 — Broncos conclude home season with total attendance of 219,786, an average of 31,398 per game. Both the total and average attendance were American Football League western division records. Six of seven home crowds topped the 30,000 mark.

One of provisions of the bill is that major potential tenants of the stadium, including the Denver Bears and Denver Broncos, must sign a 10-year lease before the stadium bill goes to a public vote. Bronco owners Gerry and Allan Phipps will agree to this stipulation, thus assuring the permanency of the Bronco franchise in Denver with the passage of the stadium bill by the voters.
- June 8 — Merger of American and National Leagues announced. Season ticket sales surge forward as enthusiastic fans crowd box office.

- November 6 — Broncos stage upset victory (17-10) over Eastern Division leader Boston in last 11 seconds with spectacular 65-yard scoring pass from quarterback Max Choboian to Al Denson.
- December — John Bramlett, Goose Gosulin, Bob Scarpitto and Jerry Sturm chosen to play in AFL All-Star contest in January.
- December 19 — Lou Saban signs a 10-year contract as General Manager and Head Coach of the Denver Broncos.

- July 8 — Bronco rookies Floyd Little, Tom Beer, Frank Richter, Mike Current and Tom Francisco play in Coaches' All-American Game in Atlanta. Denver has more participants in the game than any of the 26 teams in AFL and NFL.
- August 4 — Floyd Little, Pete Duranko, Tom Beer and George Goeddeke play in Chicago All-Star game vs. Green Bay Packers.
- August 5 — Broncos defeat Detroit Lions 13-7 in pre-season game at DU for AFL's first win over the NFL.
- August 15 — Quarterback Steve Tensi acquired from San Diego for first round draft choices in both 1968 and 1969.
- September 3 — Bronco season ticket figure winds up at a (then) record 24,650.
- September 24 — Denver establishes a Bears Stadium one-game attendance record as 35,565 watch the Jets prevail over the Broncos 38-24.
- December — Broncos win two of final four games, defeating both Buffalo and New York on the road.
- December — Broncos close out season by establishing a new home attendance record of 231,801, an average of 33,114 per game.
- December — Floyd Little paces AFL in punt returning with a 16.9 average. Bob Scarpitto repeats as punt leader with a 44.9 norm. Flanker Al Denson selected All-League in player balloting.

- May 7 — Bobby Anderson, #1 draft choice in common draft held January 27, signs contract with Denver Broncos.

- July — Season ticket sales continue to set a record. Approximately 41,000 were sold by first week in July. This is over 9,000 more than the 1969 season ticket sales which were 31,936.

- September 27 — Broncos open home season before record Mile High Stadium crowd of 50,705 with 16-13 win over Steelers.

- March 26 — Veterans report to Bronco training camp for first off-season camp.
- April 1 — Rookies and free agents report for four-day early camp.

- October 22—Denver, 1-4 going into Raider game on West Coast, surprises Oakland with a 30-23 win, the first victory over the Raiders in a decade. Johnson completes 20 of 28 passes for 361 yards and two TDs.
- October 29—Floyd Little is given his "day" at Mile High Stadium before a sell-out crowd. In pre-game ceremonies, Little receives numerous gifts including a boat. However, Broncos are unable to whip Cleveland as Browns win, 27-20. Floyd's day was in honor of his winning NFL rushing championship in 1971.
- November 12—The L.A. Coliseum is the setting for the Broncos' 16-10 win over the Rams. A strong defense shut off the LA running game was the fourth largest crowd (65,398) ever to watch Broncos is on hand.
- December 3—Broncos lose 24-21 decision to Chiefs before 66,725, third largest crowd to view Denver.
- December 10—San Diego is on short end of 38-13 score played at Mile High Stadium with the temperature at kickoff reportedly nine degrees. This is the coldest kickoff ever for a Denver team.
- December 17—Denver whips New England, 45-21, to end season with 5-9 mark, good enough to escape the fourth spot in the AFC West. This victory also is first time Denver ends seasons with two consecutive wins, setting the stage for 1973.

1973

- January 30—Otis Armstrong, all-star running back from Purdue, is Denver's first round selection in annual draft. Armstrong carries several Big Ten rushing records with him.
- March 3—Season ticket holders renew 47,800 of 48,000 season tickets to assure Denver again of having no public sale of season ducats. Season ticket holders asked for additional 11,000 tickets — if they become available.
- March 23—Otis Armstrong, Denver's top choice in recent draft, signs with Broncos. He thus becomes the third number one choice of the Broncos to be in backfield. The others are Floyd Little and Bob Anderson.
- July 17—With very few off-season trades under his belt, John Ralston returns his team to Pomona, Calif., to open pre-season camp.
- September 16—Floyd Little scores three touchdowns as Denver downs Cincinnati to start the 1973 season—the year the Broncos become winners. The final tally of the Mile High Stadium encounter is 28-10.
- October 14—After suffering three losses in the first four games, Denver needs a victory badly this afternoon in Houston. After the Oilers jump to a 20-10 edge in the first half, the Broncos offense gets going and Denver prevails, 48-20. Charley Johnson also becomes the 18th quarterback in pro football history to go over 20,000 yards lifetime as he connects for 214 yards plus three TDs to Haven Moses.
- October 22—With "Orange Monday" banners waving, the Broncos perhaps play the most important game to date in the club's history against Oakland on national television. Denver comes back to knot the contest, 23-23, on a 35-yard field goal by Jim Turner. This tie is described by many as the game the Broncos "turned the corner."

- November 25—Denver defeats Kansas City, 14-10, on two Charley Johnson to Haven Moses passes to take over first place in the AFC West with three games to go. The win moved the Broncos to 6-3-2—the six victories the second best mark ever for a Denver team to date.
- December 9—Denver 42, San Diego 28! The Broncos are winners at last, as Denver clinches the team's seventh victory of the season, assuring the club of a winning year. Jim Turner contributed 16 points in San Diego.
- December 16—A tie or loss would do no good in this afternoon's game in Oakland. A win would give the Broncos the Western Division title in the AFC, but the Broncos lose 21-17.

1974

- January—Four Broncos, Floyd Little, Haven Moses, Riley Odoms and Paul Smith, are invited to play in the Pro Bowl, giving Denver good representation.
- In addition, John Ralston is named AFC Coach of the Year for guiding Denver to its first winning season ever. Odoms, incidentally, is named All-Pro by NEA.
- Additional honors go to Charley Johnson on offense and Paul Smith on defense for being the team's most valuable players as voted by their teammates. These two men are the 1973 winners of the Earl Hartman Memorial awards.
- January 29-30—The Broncos draft with defense in mind as three of the team's first four choices are defenders paced by Ohio State linebacker Randy Gradishar. Gradishar later signs a multi-year contract.
- March 1—The Broncos announce a six-game pre-season schedule, the most games ever slated for the pre-season by Denver.
- March—Only 165 of the 48,000 season tickets sold are not renewed for 1974. Denver then sells an additional 1,000, bringing the total number of season tickets sold to 49,000.
- April 18—The Denver Chamber of Commerce releases survey compiled by Dr. Charles P. Rahe at the University of Colorado. The report entitled, "Economic Impact of the Denver Broncos Football Organization on the Metropolitan Economy", points out that, in 1973, over \$6 million of new money was brought into the metro area by the Broncos.

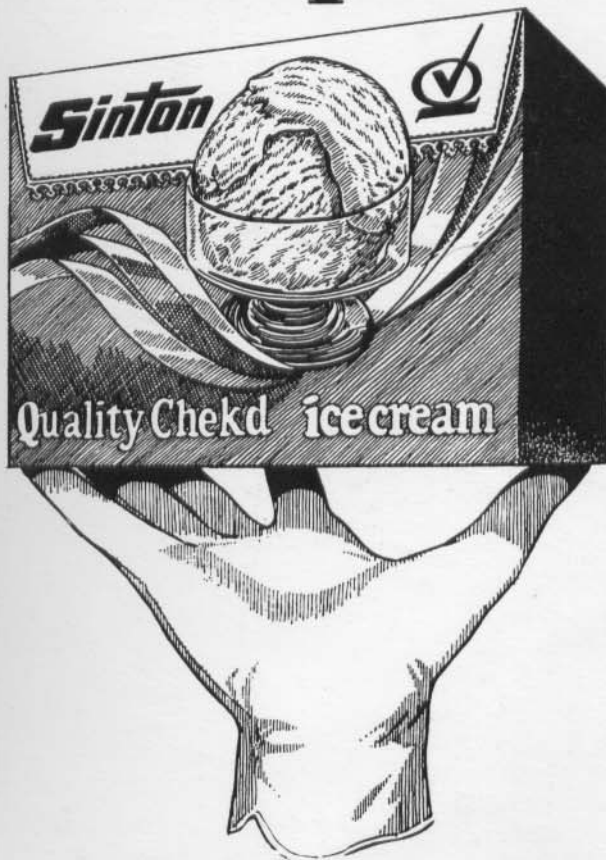
