A Quick Glance

A "new" Denver Broncos football team will be out to make Colorado's Centennial Year a championship season. A year of frustration in 1975 saw the Broncos dip back under the .500 mark for the first time since 1972 on a blocked field goal at Miami with three seconds left in the season.

The "new look" will come about through the retirements of running back Floyd Little and quarterback Charley Johnson. Little, the National Football League's seventh all-time leading rusher, retired after nine seasons with the Broncos and 6,323 hard-earned yards. Johnson, who engineered Denver's only two winning years ('73 and '74), also hung up his jersey after last season.

On the plus side of the ledger will be the return of the legions of wounded from last year's injury-riddled squad. The most notable returnee is Otis Armstrong, who missed ten games with a leg injury after leading the NFL in rushing the previous year with 1,407 yards. All-in-all, 19 starters missed one or more games in 1975, a figure that even the most severe critics will admit inflicted more influence on the win-loss record than any other single factor.

Steve Ramsey, a six-year veteran from North Texas State, is the heir-apparent to the quarterback spot, and brings excellent credentials with him. A starter in seven games last year, Steve was a 55 per cent completion passer, and has performed brilliantly at times for Denver in the past five years.

Offensively, Denver slipped to 28 touchdowns last season, but the constant juggling of the offensive lineup was as responsible as anything, as three broken legs and a knee surgery in the offensive line alone made keeping the depth charts current a difficult assignment. The return of Armstrong, a season-long performance from Jon Keyworth in the manner in which he finished 1975, and the addition of veteran Jim Kiick to the ranks puts Denver in good shape for backs. Drafted rookies Lonnie Perrin and Jim Betterson will join with veterans Fran Lynch, Oliver Ross and Bobby Anderson for depth.

With All-Pro tight end Riley Odoms, and wide receivers Haven Moses, Bill Van Heusen, Rick Upchurch and Jack Dolbin, the quarterbacks shouldn't have any trouble finding an open target.

Defensively, the Broncos hope to pick up right from where they left off in 1975. In the final four games, Broncos opponents averaged just under 13 points per game. All-Pro tackle Paul Smith is back to top form and joins All-Pro-to-be Lyle Alzado, last year's rookie sensation Rubin Carter and veterans John Grant and Barney Chavous to give returning coach Stan Jones a solid nucleus.

The linebacking was easily the most improved group in last season's defensive turnaround. Middle backer Randy Gradishar was a Pro Bowl selection in his second year and teams with Joe Rizzo, Tom Jackson, Bob Swenson, Ray May and Jim O'Malley to give Denver more quality at this position than ever before.

The secondary, also hard-hit by injuries in '75, features strong safety Bill Thompson and cornerbacks Louis Wright and Calvin Jones. New acquisition Rick Volk will battle veteran John Rowser, Randy Polt and second round draft choice Kurt Knoff for the other safety spot.

Still a basically young team, the 1976 Broncos would appear to have the blend of youth, experience and quality players that go into the making of a contending football team.

John Ralston Says:

"We developed some problems last season that contributed to our dropping below the .500 mark for the first time since 1972. Some of them we can correct, but, obviously, there is little control we have over injuries and losing the number of players we did in 1975 was certainly a major factor.

"We approached last season feeling we were a potential playoff team, and this year we feel even more strongly that way. Last year we said the most important improvement we could make defensively would be to settle on a starting unit and let that unit play together with a minimum of change. Then we proceeded to have only four defensive players make it through the entire season. Linebackers Randy Gradishar and Tom Jackson, plus safety Bill Thompson and tackle Lyle Alzado were our only defensive players to escape injury. While depth is still a concern, we have the front line players on hand to enable us to play championship defense if we can avoid the injuries.

"In fact, to prove a point, we had most of our defense back intact for the last month of the season, and we limited our last four opponents to less than 13 points per game. In the important third down efficiency category, we went from 19th in 1974 to sixth last year in the NFL. We continued to play the run effectively, and our pass defense allowed an average of just one touchdown per game.

"Other than the constant juggling of lineups, the biggest problem our defense had was our offense. We turned the ball over 34 times on interceptions, 14 times on fumbles, and had our quarterback sacked 47 times. That's putting a lot of pressure on the defense. For instance, we turned the ball over 13 times inside of our 30-yard-line and four times inside of the ten. No one can expect to keep an NFL opponent off the scoreboard in those situations.

"Naturally, we'll be much better just having Otis Armstrong back. He is the premier draw runner in football, and having him in the game means we won't have to throw the ball so much on third down situations, particularly in our end of the field. This will cut down on the interceptions and sacks, and his mere presence will help our defensive field position.

"Bobby Maples will be back to anchor a solid offensive line. We'll move Claudie Minor over to the right side tackle spot and put Marv Montgomery back at his left tackle slot where he was performing up to Pro Bowl standards before he broke his leg at Pittsburgh two years ago. First round draft choice Tom Glassic could be of instant help at the guard spot, and the addition of Jim Kiick to the running back corps will help take the pressure off of Otis and Jon Keyworth, a twosome as good as any in the National Football League.

"Steve Ramsey appears ready to step in as a winning NFL quarterback, and has certainly served a productive apprenticeship behind the retired Charley Johnson the past several years. He's an accurate passer with a solid back-ground, and our receiving corps will be as good as anyone's.

"We expect the defense will be ready to pick up where it left off last season, and the offense to be explosive, built around a strong running game, and a potentially excellent pass game. It's up to the coaching staff to blend these talents into a solid game plan, and while we still plan to have the ability to score from anywhere on the field, we might be more of a percentage team, offensively, to give our defense a better situation regarding field position.

"The Denver Broncos will be definitely better in 1976, and we're looking forward to the challenge, particularly in view of the tremendous fan support we will enjoy in Denver with our expanded facility."

Gerald H. Phipps

Chairman of the Board



With nearly 30 years of participation in the Denver sports scene, Gerald H. Phipps has seen the Rocky Mountain area receive major league sports status.

In 1947, he became part of the organization that brought the Denver Bears here as members of the old Western League. The Bears, during the years that immediately followed that move, set minor league baseball attendance records that stood unchallenged for many years.

In 1961, one year after big league professional football had arrived in the form of the Denver Broncos of the American Football League, Phipps became a major owner and assumed duties as board chairman.

Four years later, he and his brother, Allan, became virtually the sole owners of the club.

Phipps, 61, is a member of the Denver Country Club, the Denver Athletic Club, Denver Club, Cherry Hills Country Club, Rolling Hills Country Club, Broadmoor Golf Club of Colorado Springs, and the Williams Club of New York.

He was born March 4, 1915, in Denver to Lawrence C. and Margaret Rogers Phipps and received his bachelor's degree from Williams College in 1936.

He was employed by the Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad from then until he entered the Navy as an Ensign in May, 1942.

Following his separation from the service in 1945, he was employed by a general contracting firm in Denver until 1952, when he formed his present company, Gerald H. Phipps, Inc. In 1958, he was elected vice-president and treasurer of California Electric Power Co. and when that company merged with Southern California Edison Company late in 1963, he was named a director of the latter. He is a past president of the Associated Building Contractors of Colorado, Inc., a director and member of the Executive Committee of The First National Bank of Denver and a director of The First National Bancorporation, Rio Grande Industries, and the Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad. He is a trustee of The Colorado College. Mr. Phipps is also on the Board of Directors of the Denver Chamber of Commerce.

Phipps was married in New York City on September 24, 1937, to the former Janet Alice Smith. They have three daughters and eight grandchildren.

Allan R. Phipps

President



Allan R. Phipps, President of the Broncos, has been an active member of the Denver sports and cultural community for a number of years.

At Williams College, where he received his bachelor's degree, he was a member of the tennis and swimming teams.

Phipps, 63, is also a partner in the law firm of Hughes & Dorsey; active in key non-candidate roles in the Republican party, including a stint as chairman of the GOP State Finance Committee, and serves on the governing boards of numerous organizations.

His posts include those of President of the Denver Museum of Natural History and Trustee of the University of Denver, of the Denver Museum of Natural History, of the Denver Symphony Society, of the Graland Country Day School, of the George W. Clayton College, and of Men's Assistance Center.

Phipps was Alumni Trustee of Williams College and is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Winter Park Recreational Association and of the Board of Managers of St. Luke's Hospital in Denver.

In addition to his bachelor's degree from Williams in 1934, he received a degree in Jurisprudence from Oxford University in 1936 and a law degree from the University of Denver in 1937.

Phipps is a member of Phi Beta Kappa. He served in World War II as a Lieutenant Commander, U. S. Naval Reserve, in the Pacific Theater.

He is a director of Cherry Creek National Bank, South Denver National Bank, Belcaro Realty Investment Company, Van Schaack Corporation, and Grassy Creek Coal Company.

Phipps was admitted to the Colorado bar in 1938 and joined Hughes & Dorsey in 1946.

He is married to the former Clara Mitchell Van Schaack, and has two sons, a daughter, and four grandchildren.

John Ralston

General Manager-
Head Coach



In 1975, John Ralston became the winningest coach in Broncos history. He wants more.

Ralston was far from satisfied with the team's 6-8 record last year, but the injury-plagued Broncos were just a blocked field goal away from the third straight .500 or better season in Denver history.

In four years as the Denver boss, John's record is 25-28-3, more wins than any Bronco coach before him. Under his guidance, the Broncos had their first two winning seasons ever, 7-5-2 in 1973 and 7-6-1 in 1974.

After the 1973 season, Ralston was named the American Football Conference Coach-of-the-Year by UPI and the Kansas City 101 Committee. And after the 1974 season, the entire Bronco coaching staff was honored by being named to coach the North squad in the annual Senior Bowl game in Mobile, Ala.

For 1976, Ralston has assigned himself duties as special teams coach, where he can truly apply his lifelong coaching philosophy that the head man is responsible for all decisions in the kicking game.

John joined the Broncos from Stanford after two Rose Bowl victories over impressive Big Ten competition. He began his Stanford stint on January 18, 1963. In nine seasons at the helm, he captured two Pacific Eight titles, while compiling an impressive 54-36-3 record. He reeled off eight straight winning campaigns, but winning was nothing unusual for him.

Before the Stanford job, Ralston was head coach at Utah State, where he held a 31-11-1 mark in four years. The Aggies were co-champions of the Skyline Conference in two of those years and the team played in the Sun and Gotham Bowls.

Ralston was also the head coach of the West team in the 1965, 1966 and 1969 Shrine games. But his outside activities did not stop there. He has coached at the Hula Bowl, served on the Peace Corps' 21-man Athletic Committee, officiated at several clinics, and fills his off-season calendar with countless speaking engagements, many in his role as a certified Dale Carnegie instructor.

Born in Oakland, Calif., April 26, 1927, Ralston attended elementary and high schools in Norway, Mich. He served two and one-half years with the U.S. Marine Corps during and after World War II, before entering the University of California at Berkeley, where he graduated in 1951. Ralston was a linebacker on two of Cal's Rose Bowl teams.

He and his wife, Patty, were married in 1951, and they are the parents of three children—twin daughters, Terry and Sherry, and a son, Larry.

Fred Gehrke

Assistant General Manager
Player Personnel Director

Fred Gehrke, 58, a workhorse for the Bronco organization since January of 1965, is the assistant general manager and director of player personnel.

A former star football player at Utah, Gehrke concluded his 11-year playing career in 1950 with the L.A. Rams, after being an all-pro with the world-champion Cleveland Rams in 1945.

During that time he also worked in the Engineering Design Division of the Northrup Aircraft Co. A technical artist, he is responsible for the helmet design presently worn by the Los Angeles Rams. He received the first Dan Reeves award from the Hall of Fame in 1972 for his helmet design idea. Previously he was an outstanding scholar-athlete at Utah in 1937, 1938 and 1939.

Gehrke remained close to the game after his retirement and did color commentary with Tom Harmon on radio and television football broadcasts for 13 years. He also served as the color man on the Bronco pre-season telecasts in 1975.

Gehrke has five children — four daughters and a son. Fred and his wife, Jean, live in Arvada.



Carroll Hardy

Director of Scouting

Carroll Hardy, 43, assumed the duties of Director of Scouting in June of 1970. He is responsible for assessing the talent of hundreds of college athletes that become eligible for the pros each year, and deciding which of them can play football professionally.

Hardy has long been considered one of the greatest athletes produced by Colorado since winning a modern record of 10 letters at the University of Colorado (four each in football and baseball and two in track.)

After his graduation from the U. of Colorado in 1955 with a degree in education, Carroll signed a baseball contract with the Cleveland Indians and was drafted in the third round by football's San Francisco 49ers, and played that year as a wide receiver and a running back.

The '56 and '57 seasons were spent in the Army, but he returned to Cleveland in 1958 and was used as an outfielder until 1960 when he was traded to the Red Sox. That year, Carroll became the only man ever to pinch hit for Ted Williams.

In 1969, after serving four years as a scout for Denver, Carroll became assistant ticket manager for the Broncos and held the position until being named to his new post. Hardy and his wife, Janice, were married in 1956 and have three children—Jay, 19; Jill, 18; and Lisa, 15. They reside in Boulder.



Joe Collier

Defensive
Coordinator

In his first move in putting together an assistant coaching staff in 1972, John Ralston hired Joe Collier as the Broncos' defensive coordinator.

Collier, 44, was the lone holdover from the Lou Saban staff. Joe joined the Broncos in January of 1969, after serving two-plus seasons as head coach of the Buffalo Bills.

Born in Rock Island, Ill., Collier was graduated from Rock Island High. He attended Northwestern University and lettered three years as an end. In 1953, he captained the Wildcats and was named all-Big Ten. He played in the post-season Senior Bowl and East-West Shrine games.

Joe was drafted by the New York Giants but elected to bypass pro football as a player. He served in the Army from 1954-56 prior to joining the coaching staff at Western Illinois as a graduate assistant in 1957.

A year later he became a full-time member of the staff, serving under Lou Saban. He moved with Saban to Boston in 1960 and on to Buffalo two years later. Joe was named head coach of the Bills in 1966.

He and his wife, Shirley, have three children: Julie, 18; Lisa, 16; and Joe, 12.



Max Coley

Offensive
Coordinator

The record speaks for itself as far as Max Coley's presence is concerned on the Bronco staff. After he joined Denver in 1972, his area showed marked progress.

Coley's offensive unit has produced 146 TDs in his four years in Denver, including a club record 41 touchdowns in 1973, and three of the top four marks in Bronco history overall.

Max came from the Pittsburgh Steelers where he was offensive backfield coach for three years. Coley also handles the offensive backfield for Denver.

Max, 47, is a native of Tulsa, Oklahoma, and he split his college career between Northeastern Oklahoma A&M and San Jose State, where he graduated in 1950.

After coaching stints in the California high school system and at his alma mater, Coley spent ten years as offensive backfield coach at the University of Oregon before joining the Steelers in 1969.

At Oregon, Max helped develop one of the nation's most productive college offensive units, and during his tenure with the Ducks, they averaged better than 300 yards and three touchdowns per game.

Coley and his wife, Ann, have four children: Max Lynn, Rick, Debra Ann and Melinda Jane.



Bob Gambold

Defensive Backfield
Coach

Bob Gambold, 47, a Ralston aide at Stanford for nine years, is Denver's defensive backfield coach.

Gambold served as defensive coordinator and linebacker coach at Stanford, after completing a two-year stint with Tommy Prothro at Oregon State. Bob also has had coaching assignments at Washington State for five years and at Everett (Wash.) Junior College.

A native of Longview, Wash., Gambold is a 1951 graduate of Washington State, where he was a standout quarterback and a varsity basketball player. Following graduation, he stayed at WSU as freshman football coach and basketball coach.

Gambold then played two years as a quarterback in the pros with Philadelphia in 1953 and Chicago Cardinals in 1954.

Gambold and his wife, Shirley, have seven children: Valerie, 24; Robin, 23; Cheri, 20; Barry, 19; Victoria, 18; Traci, 15; and Liesi, 8.



Stan Jones

Defensive Line



One of the leading linemen in the National Football League during his playing days, Stan Jones returns to Denver to coach the defensive line in 1976.

Jones, 44, had served on the Bronco staff under Lou Saban from 1967 to 1971, and had spent the last four years with Saban in Buffalo.

Jones was an All-American guard at the University of Maryland in 1953, and was named the nation's Lineman of the Year. He was recently honored by the Maryland Alumni Association as Man of the Year.

He spent 12 years with the Chicago Bears and one season with the Washington Redskins as a player, gaining All-Pro honors as an offensive guard in 1955-56-59-60. He was a member of the Pro Bowl team seven times. The last four years of his career he played defensive tackle.

Stan and his wife, Darlis, have a daughter, Sherrie, and two sons, Kevin and Tony.

Kay Dalton

Wide Receivers



Kay Dalton is entering his third season as coach of the Broncos wide receivers.

Dalton, 43, who had served with the offensive football staff at the University of Colorado, joined the Bronco staff in August of 1973 as a special assistant in the scouting department.

Dalton's coaching experience, in addition to his two seasons at Colorado, include head coaching jobs at Trinidad J.C. and Western State at the collegiate level, and with the Montreal Alouettes in the Canadian Football League.

A native of Moab, Utah, Dalton is a 1954 graduate of Colorado State and was offensive coordinator for the British Columbia Lions from 1969-1970, prior to joining the CU staff in 1971.

Kay and his wife, Phyllis, live in Boulder with their three children, Mary Lou, 17; Sharon, 15; and Keith, 12.

Myrel Moore

Linebackers



Myrel Moore, former assistant at the University of California at Berkeley, will coach the linebackers in 1976.

Moore, 41, was a member of Ray Willsey's staff at California since 1964, before joining Denver in 1972. He served Willsey as offensive and defensive coordinator at different times during his California stay.

He went to Cal-Berkeley from Santa Ana Junior College where he served as head coach in 1963. He was at Santa Ana J.C. since 1959 as an assistant coach.

Moore is a former All-Conference end and Small-College All-American at Cal-Davis, where he graduated in 1958. He played for the Washington Redskins as a defensive back in 1958.

Myrel has two children: Michelle Rene and Michale Damon.

Richard 'Doc' Urich

Offensive
Line Coach

After four years as defensive line coach, Richard "Doc" Urich makes the move to the offensive line in 1976.

Urich, 47, coached the defensive line for the Buffalo Bills in 1971 after spending the previous two seasons as head football coach at Northern Illinois University. He also is the former head coach at the University of Buffalo.

A 1951 graduate of Miami (Ohio) University where he was a standout end, Doc counted such grid names as Paul Dietzel, Carmen Cozza, Ara Parseghian and Bo Schembechler among his teammates, and was coached by Sid Gillman and Woody Hayes.

Following graduation, Urich coached at Massillon (Ohio) High School before returning to his alma mater. He then joined Parseghian's staff at Northwestern for eight years before the entire staff made the transition to Notre Dame in 1964.

Urich and his wife, Pat, have two children: Cynthia, 24, and Danny, 21.



Mike Giddings

Director of
Pro Scouting
and Assistant Coach

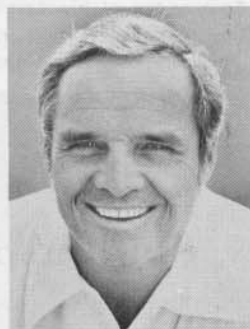
After serving as a special scout for the Broncos during the latter part of last season, Mike Giddings will fill the newly created position of Director of Pro Scouting in 1976. He will also help Doc Urich with the offensive line during training camp.

Giddings served as general manager and head coach of Hawaii of the World Football League in 1974 and 1975, and his team advanced to the semifinals of the WFL championships in 1974. As general manager, Giddings raised a million dollars to keep the team in Hawaii during the waning days of the league's existence.

Giddings, 42, previously served as linebacker coach for the San Francisco 49ers from 1968-1973, during which time the 49ers won three division titles.

He began coaching at the high school level in California, his teams winning a record 28 straight games in three years. After a year as head coach at Glendale Junior College, he joined John McKay's staff at USC in 1961 as defensive coordinator. In 1966 and 1967, Giddings was head coach at Utah.

At the University of California, Mike played football and baseball, and graduated with honors as a history major. He and his wife, Donna, have three children: Vicki, 21; Jacqui, 18; and Mike, 14.



Charley Johnson

Quarterbacks

The Broncos may have lost Charley Johnson, quarterback, but they gained Charley Johnson, Coach.

After 15 National Football League seasons, Johnson announced his retirement at the conclusion of the 1975 season and was promptly hired by John Ralston as a coach and scout.

Johnson, 37, will instruct the quarterbacks in training camp and help direct the Bronco offense from the press box on game days. He will also scout collegiate games during the fall.

The native of Big Spring, Texas, joined the Broncos in 1972 and guided the club to the first two winning seasons in its history, 7-5-2 in 1973 and 7-6-1 in 1974.

He ranks 13th on the all-time list in passes attempted (3,942) and passes completed (1,737), 14th in yards (24,410) and 17th in touchdown passes (170).

Johnson was originally drafted out of New Mexico State by St. Louis in 1959 and played for the Cardinals from 1961 to 1969. He then played for Houston for the next two seasons before coming to the Broncos in a trade.

Charley has his doctorate in chemical engineering, and also works as an engineer-salesman for Crawford Enterprises in Houston.

He and his wife, Barbara, have a son, Craig, and a daughter, Jill.



Allen Hurst

Trainer

Bronco trainer Allen Hurst enters his 14th season with the club this fall, already a 20-year veteran of his profession at the age of 35.

A native of Houston, Tex., Hurst took up training as a freshman in high school and served as student trainer while attending Texas Christian University. While at TCU, he also was on the staff of the Houston Oilers, who played in the American Football League championship games in 1960, 1961 and 1962.

Hurst was graduated from TCU in 1963 with a degree in physical education and a minor in biology, and immediately joined the Bronco staff as head trainer.

During the off-season, Allen is involved as an instructor in training clinics for high school coaches in the Denver area.

Allen and his wife, Patsy, were married in 1963 and live in Littleton. They have two sons, Gregory, 5, and Justin, 3.

Hurst is assisted by Steve Antonopoulos, 27, former trainer at Fort Hays (Kansas) State College.

Equipment Manager

Responsible for handling the large amount of equipment needed by a professional football team is Larry Elliott, 39.

Larry began his career in athletics at the age of 13 when his parents moved the family to Colorado. At St. Mary's High School in Colorado Springs, he won a total of 10 varsity letters in football, basketball and baseball. A number of scholarship offers in both football and baseball followed his graduation in 1955, but Larry opted for the Air Force.

During his four years in the service at such spots as Hawaii, Guam, The Philippines, Japan and Tripoli, athletics were not forgotten. While stationed at Tripoli's Wheelus Air Force Base he won All-European honors as a third baseman.

Following his discharge from the service, Elliott worked as an assistant manager of a finance company, bookkeeper and as assistant athletic equipment manager for the Air Force Academy. He was recommended for the Bronco position in 1965 by Air Force Academy equipment manager Artus Smith; a position he has held since.

Elliott and his wife, Margaret, who reside in Lakewood, were married in 1959 and have five children — Timothy, 16; Troy, 14; Thomas, 12; Terry, 9; and Tammie, 7.

Serving as assistant equipment manager is Ronnie Bill, 37, who has been on the staff since 1969.

Position-By-Position

THE OFFENSE

Now that Otis Armstrong is healthy again, the main order of business is finding a replacement for retired quarterback Charley Johnson. Steve Ramsey finished strongly in 1975 and leads the group of candidates on that basis. Boasting a backfield of Armstrong and Jon Keyworth, the best tight end in football and four outstanding wide receivers, the Bronco offense figures to bounce back from an off year. However, to make the resurrection a reality, the offensive line must come back from a series of injuries which sidelined three starters during 1975.

QUARTERBACKS

The retirement of Charley Johnson makes this an area of prime concern for the Broncos in 1976. STEVE RAMSEY seemingly has the inside track, having started six games last year and having been a spot starter from time to time over the past four seasons. If he can pick up where he left off in Miami last December (19-27, 235 yards), Ramsey is the man. If not, veteran JOHN HUFNAGEL is waiting in the wings. The former Penn State All-American started one game and played in four others in his third year with the club. Second-year man MIKE FRANCKOWIAK will also get a look this year. Franckowiak was originally drafted as a quarterback, but spent last season playing on the special teams. Draftee CRAIG PENROSE (4) led the nation in passing at San Diego State last season, and could be a factor in the Broncos plans. Free agent NORRIS WEESE from Mississippi, a World Football League veteran, rounds out the field of candidates.

RUNNING BACKS

A healthy OTIS ARMSTRONG teamed with JON KEYWORTH will give the Broncos an enviable 1-2 punch. Armstrong, who missed essentially 12 games last season with injuries, hopes to come back with a season similar to his 1,407 yards rushing in 1974. All indications are that he has fully recovered from the torn hamstring muscle which provided most of his — and the Broncos' — troubles last year. If anyone benefitted from Armstrong's injuries, it was probably Keyworth, who established himself as one of the league's emerging stars. The big fullback was forced to carry most of the offensive load, and responded to the challenge by leading the club in both rushing (725 yards) and receiving (42 catches). Floyd Little's retirement will give the team special concern over the depth here. Newly-acquired JIM KILICK, re-acquired BOBBY ANDERSON and veterans OLIVER ROSS and FRAN LYNCH will provide the support, with MIKE FRANCKOWIAK also a possibility. Rookies LONNIE PERRIN (5) and JAMES BETTERSON (8) could also work their way onto the squad.

RECEIVERS — TIGHT ENDS

The Broncos can't go wrong here — this is probably the team's greatest strength. With tight end RILEY ODOMS, Denver has the best in the business. 1975 was his third straight Pro Bowl season, as he caught 40 passes for 544 yards and three touchdowns. Backing him up is BOYD BROWN, a 17th round draft choice in 1974 who is another promising young performer. At wide receiver, the Broncos are blessed with four outstanding pass catchers. HAVEN MOSES and BILLY VAN HEUSEN are both coming into

their ninth pro seasons threatened by a pair of second-year men, RICK UPCHURCH and JACK DOLBIN. Moses had 29 catches, Van Heusen 15, Dolbin 22 and Upchurch 18, but the two youngsters are expected to make bigger contributions this year. Upchurch also led the team in kickoff and punt returns as a rookie, and in his first professional game against Kansas City he had 284 yards rushing, receiving and on kick returns.

OFFENSIVE LINE

This group was the hardest hit by injury last season, as two broken legs and a knee surgery decimated the ranks. BOBBY MAPLES, who did not miss a down in 1975, was a notable exception. He was named the Broncos MVP on offense, and will be back in his 12th pro season to anchor the line. PAUL HOWARD is secure at one guard spot, while TOMMY LYONS will battle first round draft choice TOM GLASSIC for the other. Lyons missed the last four games of 1975 with a broken leg. At the tackles, CLAUDIE MINOR has started every game for the Broncos in his two years in the league, while MARV MONTGOMERY will move back into a starting role on the other side to offset the loss of Mike Current in the expansion draft. PHIL OLSEN provides solid backup support at both center and guard, while STAN ROGERS and CARL SCHAUKOWITCH had occasional starting roles in their rookie seasons. Draftee JIM CZIRR (9a) will get a look at center.

THE DEFENSE

Despite having just as many injury problems as the offense, this unit jelled in 1975. Only three players started all 14 games in 1975 — Lyle Alzado, Randy Gradishar and Billy Thompson — and there were 29 lineup changes. Nonetheless, the defense held six of the Broncos' last seven opponents to 17 or fewer points, and hopes to take up where it left off for 1976. For the second year in a row, Denver defenders gave up just 14 touchdown passes, but it will be a part of the pass defense which gets a major look in summer camp. The Broncos had only 27 sacks and 16 interceptions last year, and must improve both totals to be truly respected in 1976. Only one of the first six draftees was a defensive player, safety Kurt Knoff, indicating that the club is pretty well set except for the defensive backfield. Just like the offense, healthy players can only make this group better in 1976.

DEFENSIVE LINE

The Broncos can choose from a number of established performers in this area. LYLE ALZADO made the transition from end to tackle smoothly and led the down linemen in tackles, ranking third on the team. He was the only player in the group to start all 14 games. Honored by his teammates as the defensive MVP, Alzado figures to be a strong candidate for post-season honors in 1976. PAUL SMITH and BARNEY CHAVOUS are set at the ends, while JOHN GRANT and RUBIN CARTER will vie for the other tackle spot. Veteran ED SMITH and rookie CHARLIE SMITH, the No. 2 draft choice in 1975, both hope to bounce back from injuries which kept them sidelined for the entire season last year. PHIL OLSEN also got in some playing time as a defensive tackle in 1975. Draftees ART GILLIAM (10) and RANDY MOORE (12) will try to find themselves spots on the roster.

LINEBACKERS

A solid nucleus of good young players helps to make this a strong group for the Broncos. Middle linebacker RANDY GRADISHAR, who concluded his second season by playing in the Pro Bowl, led the club in tackles while starting all 14 games. TOM JACKSON was second in tackles, playing both strongside and weakside linebacker. He figures to start at the weakside spot, while free agent JOE RIZZO has the inside track for the strongside position. Rizzo displaced RAY MAY, who was also troubled by injuries but figures to make a run at getting his starting role back. Also in the picture is BOB SWENSON, a free agent last year who came on to get a lot of playing time. Veteran JIM O'MALLEY played in all 14 games last season, and will see considerable action again this year. Five draftees will also come to camp with hopes of making the team: JIM LISKU (9b), GREG PITTMAN (11), LARRY EVANS (14), JOHN HUDDLESTON (16) and RANDY COZENS (17).

DEFENSIVE BACKS

The play of veteran BILLY THOMPSON and rookie LOUIS WRIGHT helped the Bronco defenders limit opponents to just 14 touchdown passes in 1975. Thompson, one of the top strong safeties in the league, and Wright, a rising superstar at cornerback, are firmly entrenched as starters while the other two spots could be up for grabs. CALVIN JONES started eight games at corner but missed six with injuries. He had started 28 straight over the previous two years. JOHN ROWSER, who moved from cornerback to free safety last year when Wright came back from an early season injury, will face a strong test from draftee KURT KNOFF (2) and new addition RICK VOLK for that spot this year. Veterans EARLIE THOMAS and RANDY POLTL signed as free agents last season and stepped right in to help plug the holes caused by injuries. Draftee DONNIE MCGRAW (13) is projected as a cornerback after a college career as an offensive running back.

PLACEKICKERS

Veteran kicker JIM TURNER is coming off his best year as a Bronco. Turner hit 21 of 29 field goals and scored 86 points to lead the Broncos, in the process becoming the No. 5 all-time scorer in NFL history with 1,147 points. He also kicked a pair of 53-yard field goals to tie the club record, one of the kicks coming with no time left and providing Denver with a 16-15 win over Cleveland. Veteran MIKE FRANCKOWIAK and draftees LONNIE PERRIN (5) and WILBUR SUMMERS (15) will all get looks as kickoff men.

PUNTING

Although BILLY VAN HEUSEN had an off year, he still has a 42.2 lifetime average and will be the Bronco punter until someone beats him out. Van Heusen averaged 39.8 on 63 kicks last year, including a long punt of 64 yards at Oakland. Draftee WILBUR SUMMERS (15) may give the Bronco veteran a go of it. Summers averaged 42.0 in his career at Louisville, and holds seven school records as a punter. STEVE RAMSEY and BOBBY ANDERSON are available for backup duties.

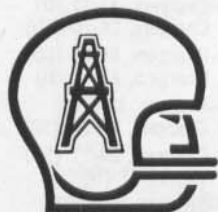

August 14 — First American Football League organizational meeting held in Chicago. Denver, with Bob Howsam as its principal owner, named as a charter member along with New York, Dallas, Los Angeles, Minneapolis and Houston.

November 22 — First player selection draft held through 32 rounds. Denver's first pick is Roger LeClerc, center, Trinity.

November 30 — Joe Foss named American Football League Commissioner.

December 1 — Dean Griffing named general manager of the Broncos.

December 2 — Second player selection draft of 20 rounds held.

1960

January 1 — Frank Filchuck named first head coach of the Broncos.

January 30 — Denver placed in AFL's western division with Dallas, Oakland and Los Angeles.

Spring — Frank Tripucka and Chuck Gavin, with Canadian experience, and NFL veteran, Bud McFadin, coming out of retirement, join squad. Also joining squad is unknown Gene Mingo, without college experience, who later proves to be one of the game's great placekickers.

June 9 — AFL signs five-year television contract with the American Broadcasting Company.

July — First Bronco training camp opens at Colorado School of Mines.

July 29 — First intra-squad game played at Colorado School of Mines.

September 9 — After losing all five pre-season games, the Broncos become the first AFL victor when they defeat the Patriots in Boston in history's first AFL game, 13-10. Attendance—21,597.

- January 5—John Ralston, successful head coach at Stanford, is announced as Denver's new head coach. He later adds the title of General Manager.
- February 28—Broncos' Number One draft pick, Riley Odoms, TE, from Houston, inks multi-year contract.
- March 16—For the first time in the history of Denver professional football, there will be no public sale of season tickets, it is reported. Season ticket holders renewed 46,500 of the 47,500 available season tickets, and further exercised their option for 8,000 additional tickets, thus assuring Denver of its third straight year of sell-outs.
- March 16—Cal Poly at Pomona is reported to be the pre-season training site for the Broncos. Camp is to open July 19.
- April 5—Long-time Rocky Mountain Empire Sports employee Earl Hartman dies of cancer. Hartman is Treasurer of Empire Sports and Business Manager of the Broncos at the time of his death.
- July 19—Broncos open summer camp at Cal Poly at Pomona (Calif.) as rookies report for physicals.
- August 16—Charley Johnson, NFL veteran quarterback, becomes a Bronco as Ralston trades third round choice to Houston. Johnson will become Denver's most accurate passer (.555) in the upcoming season.
- August 27—John Ralston gets first victory in pro ranks as Broncos come from behind to down San Francisco, 27-24, in pre-season action. Win came at right time as Denver had trained the previous week at Ralston's former place of employment, Stanford, in Palo Alto, Calif.
- October 22—Denver, 1-4 going into Raider game on West Coast, surprises Oakland with a 30-23 win, the first victory over the Raiders in a decade. Johnson completes 20 of 28 passes for 361 yards and two TDs.
- October 29—Floyd Little is given his "day" at Mile High Stadium before a sell-out crowd. In pre-game ceremonies, Little receives numerous gifts including a boat. However, Broncos are unable to whip Cleveland as Browns win, 27-20. Floyd's day was in honor of his winning NFL rushing championship in 1971.
- November 12—The L.A. Coliseum is the setting for the Broncos' 16-10 win over the Rams. A strong defense shut off the LA running game was the fourth largest crowd (65,398) ever to watch Broncos on hand.
- December 3—Broncos lose 24-21 decision to Chiefs before 66,725, third largest crowd to view Denver.
- December 10—San Diego is on short end of 38-13 score played at Mile High Stadium with the temperature at kickoff reportedly nine degrees. This is the coldest kickoff ever for a Denver team.
- December 17—Denver whips New England, 45-21, to end season with 5-9 mark, good enough to escape the fourth spot in the AFC West. This victory also is first time Denver ends seasons with two consecutive wins, setting the stage for 1973.

1973

- January 30—Otis Armstrong, all-star running back from Purdue, is Denver's first round selection in annual draft. Armstrong carries several Big Ten rushing records with him.

- March 3—Season ticket holders renew 47,800 of 48,000 season tickets to assure Denver again of having no public sale of season ducats. Season ticket holders asked for additional 11,000 tickets — if they become available.
- March 23—Otis Armstrong, Denver's top choice in recent draft, signs with Broncos. He thus becomes the third number one choice of the Broncos to be in backfield. The others are Floyd Little and Bob Anderson.
- July 17—With very few off-season trades under his belt, John Ralston returns his team to Pomona, Calif., to open pre-season camp.
- September 16—Floyd Little scores three touchdowns as Denver downs Cincinnati to start the 1973 season—the year the Broncos become winners. The final tally of the Mile High Stadium encounter is 28-10.
- October 14—After suffering three losses in the first four games, Denver needs a victory badly this afternoon in Houston. After the Oilers jump to a 20-10 edge in the first half, the Broncos offense gets going and Denver prevails, 48-20. Charley Johnson also becomes the 18th quarterback in pro football history to go over 20,000 yards lifetime as he connects for 214 yards plus three TDs to Haven Moses.
- October 22—With "Orange Monday" banners waving, the Broncos perhaps play the most important game to date in the club's history against Oakland on national television. Denver comes back to knot the contest, 23-23, on a 35-yard field goal by Jim Turner. This tie is described by many as the game the Broncos "turned the corner."
- November 25—Denver defeats Kansas City, 14-10, on two Charley Johnson to Haven Moses passes to take over first place in the AFC West with three games to go. The win moved the Broncos to 6-3-2—the six victories the second best mark ever for a Denver team to date.
- December 9—Denver 42, San Diego 28! The Broncos are winners at last, as Denver clinches the team's seventh victory of the season, assuring the club of a winning year. Jim Turner contributed 16 points in San Diego.
- December 16—A tie or loss would do no good in this afternoon's game in Oakland. A win would give the Broncos the Western Division title in the AFC, but the Broncos lose 21-17.

1974

- January—Four Broncos, Floyd Little, Haven Moses, Riley Odoms and Paul Smith, are invited to play in the Pro Bowl, giving Denver good representation.
- In addition, John Ralston is named AFC Coach of the Year for guiding Denver to its first winning season ever. Odoms, incidentally, is named All-Pro by NEA.
- Additional honors go to Charley Johnson on offense and Paul Smith on defense for being the team's most valuable players as voted by their teammates. These two men are the 1973 winners of the Earl Hartman Memorial awards.
- January 29-30—The Broncos draft with defense in mind as three of the team's first four choices are defenders paced by Ohio State linebacker Randy Gradishar. Gradishar later signs a multi-year contract.
- March 1—The Broncos announce a six-game pre-season schedule, the most games ever slated for the pre-season by Denver.
- March—Only 165 of the 48,000 season tickets sold are not renewed for 1974. Denver then sells an additional 1,000, bringing the total number of season tickets sold to 49,000.

April 18—The Denver Chamber of Commerce releases survey compiled by Dr. Charles P. Rahe at the University of Colorado. The report entitled, "Economic Impact of the Denver Broncos Football Organization on the Metropolitan Economy", points out that, in 1973, over \$6 million of new money was brought into the metro area by the Broncos.

August 31—The Broncos defeat the New England Patriots, 27-21, in Spokane, Wash. for the team's fourth victory of the pre-season. This marks the most wins by a Denver team in pre-season.

September 10—Denver voters pass a 25 million dollar bond issue to expand and improve Mile High Stadium to over 75,000 seats. The stadium was projected to be finished in time for the 1976 regular season. The expansion would come from double-decking the north stands and also the portable east stands.

September 22—The Broncos and the Pittsburgh Steelers play in the first regular season overtime game as a 35-35 score was present at the end of regulation play. Neither team scored in the sudden death period.

November 28—Before a television audience estimated at 35 million, the Broncos riddle the Detroit Lions 31-27 on Denver's first Thanksgiving Day game in Detroit.

December 8—Denver assures itself of the team's second consecutive winning season and Otis Armstrong sets a single game rushing mark of 183 yards as the Broncos down Houston, 37-14.

December 15—Although Denver loses at San Diego, Otis Armstrong finishes the season with 1407 yards and the NFL rushing title becoming one of a half dozen players ever to average more than 100-yards per game in pro football.

1975

January—Otis Armstrong and Riley Odoms represent the Broncos in the annual Pro Bowl game in Miami, Fla. Additional honors go to Armstrong as he is voted the top offensive player on the team. Tom Jackson was voted the top Defender and Ken Criter the top Specialist.

February—Expansion of Mile High Stadium begins which will provide 63,500 capacity for the 1976 season and an ultimate capacity of 75,000 in 1977.

September 29—The Broncos defeat Green Bay, 23-13, for their first victory ever on Monday Night Football.

October 5—Playing before the largest crowd ever to witness a Broncos game, 79,864, Denver falls to O. J. Simpson and the Buffalo Bills, 38-14, at Buffalo.

December 14—Playing his last home game as a Denver Bronco, Floyd Little goes out with a bang. The club's first No. 1 draft choice to sign, Little rushes for 56 yards and one TD, catches five passes for 94 yards, including a 66-yard touchdown, to lead the Broncos to a 25-10 win over Philadelphia. Little winds up his career as the seventh all-time rusher in the NFL with 6,323 yards.

1976

January 26—Tight end Riley Odoms and linebacker Randy Gradishar are the Broncos representatives in the Pro Bowl in New Orleans. For Odoms, it is the third straight year he has played in the game, while Gradishar, making his first appearance, keeps alive the string of John Ralston's first round draft choices playing in the game after their second year in the league.

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS, DENVER BRONCOS

March 28—Quarterback Charley Johnson announces his retirement from the National Football League after a 15-year career. Johnson, who led the club to its only two winning seasons in history in 1973 and 1974, will remain with the team as a scout and quarterback coach.

April 21—Season ticket sales are cut off at 62,215, assuring the Broncos of their seventh straight sellout season.

June 27—Lyle Alzado is one of three finalists for the Man of the Year Award and Rick Upchurch is honored as the American Conference Offensive Rookie of the Year by the NFL Players Association at its annual banquet in Chicago.
