CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD

EDGAR F. KAISER, JR. Chairman Of The Board



Edgar F. Kaiser, Jr., 38, is chairman and chief executive officer of Kaiser Resources Ltd., a privately-owned, diversified Canadian energy company, and the parent company of Kaiser Oil U.S. Ltd., headquartered in Denver, Colorado.

He is also a director of the Toronto-Dominion Bank, Daon Development Corporation, B.C. Coal Ltd. and its parent, British Columbia Resources Investment Corporation. In addition, Mr. Kaiser is a trustee of the California Institute of Technology and vice chairman of the Henry J. Kaiser Family Foundation, and is the grandson of the late construction

industrialist, Henry J. Kaiser.

A graduate of Stanford University in 1965, Mr. Kaiser received his MBA from Harvard University in 1967. During 1967 and 1968 he served in Viet Nam. After leaving Viet Nam, he became a White House Fellow under President Lyndon Johnson and then, in 1969, became special assistant to the U.S. Secretary of the Interior, Walter J. Hickel.

Following this period in Washington, Mr. Kaiser joined the Kaiser group of companies.

Mr. Kaiser was born in Portland, Oregon in 1942. He is a member of the Canada-Japan Business Cooperation Committee and the Stanford Research Institute International Council. He is a former director of The American Iron and Steel Institute and The International Iron and Steel Institute. Mr. Kaiser was the recipient of the 1978 Golden Plate Award for outstanding achievement. He is also active in many local, regional and national civic programs.



GENERAL MANAGER

GRADY ALDERMAN General Manager



Grady Alderman, who has spent 20 years in professional football as a player, administrator and broadcaster, brings that experience as well as a solid foundation in business and management to his new post as General Manager of The Denver Broncos.

Alderman assumes his new post after having spent the past two years as Director of Planning and Development for the Minnesota Vikings.

Alderman's business background is almost as long as his playing career. He was drafted by the Detroit Lions in 1960 after an outstanding collegiate career at the University of Detroit, then went to the Vikings in the expansion draft in 1961.

He became an offensive tackle at Minnesota and embarked on a long and distinguished playing career that saw him play in six Pro Bowls and three Super Bowls and serve as offensive team captain for eight years before his retirement following the 1974 season.

During much of that time he had also been working as an accountant with the accounting firm of Deloitte, Haskins & Sells. He joined that firm in 1963 and stayed with it through 1979.

During that time he completed the requirements for, and received, his CPA certificate (in 1970) and was a manager at the firm's Bloomington, Minn., office at the time he left to join the Vikings front office in 1979.

After his retirement as an NFL player, Alderman became a broadcaster working as color commentator on Vikings broadcasts from 1976 through the 1980 season. He also provided color commentary for the telecast of the 1980 Holiday and Japan Bowl all-star games.

A Michigan native, Alderman was born in Detroit (12/10/38) and graduated from Madison Heights High School in 1956. He earned his BS in accounting from the University of Detroit in 1961.

During his collegiate playing career, he was named the University of Detroit's outstanding lineman, and was an All-Catholic All-American in 1959. He played in the Gem City Bowl All-Star Game in 1959 and was named the game's outstanding lineman.

Grady and his wife, Nancy, are the parents of two children, son Robbie (11/16/66) and daughter Christy (8/28/69).

An active sportsman, Alderman lists his hobbies as fishing, hiking, racquetball, golf, motorcycling and snowmobiling.

HEAD COACH

DAN REEVES Head Coach



Dan Reeves, at age 37, becomes the ninth head coach in the history of The Denver Broncos. He also becomes the youngest head coach in The National Football League.

Recognized as one of the most successful offensive coaches in the NFL, Reeves has spent his entire professional career, both as a player and as a coach, with the Dallas Cowboys. He was offensive coordinator for the Cowboys for the past three seasons, years when the Dallas offense has been consistently at or near the top of the NFL.

Last season, for example, Dallas' multiple attack produced 454 points

and 60 touchdowns, both high marks in the NFL in 1980.

Reeves had been a member of the Dallas coaching staff since 1970, when he undertook the difficult dual role of player-coach for two seasons. He was fulltime offensive backfield coach in 1972, but spent the 1973 season in private business before rejoining the staff, again as backfield coach, in 1974.

In 1977 he took on the job of offensive coordinator where his duties included coaching the quarterbacks and wide receivers.

A native of Americus, Ga. (1/19/44), Reeves began his career as a free agent running back in 1965. He had been a quarterback at the University of South Carolina as a college player and was inducted into South Carolina's Hall of Fame four years ago.

An all-purpose offensive back during his eight seasons (1965-72) on the Dallas roster, Reeves finished his career as the Cowboys' fifth all-time leading rusher, despite a series of knee injuries that slowed him in the later stages of his career.

He rushed for 1,990 yards and 25 TDs and caught 129 passes for 1,693 yards and 17 TDs.

Because of his collegiate QB background, Reeves was also a respected halfback option passer, completing 30 such attempts for a pair of TDs during his career. In addition, he returned some kickoffs and punts along the way, and played in the NFL championship games of 1966, 1967 and 1970.

Reeves and wife Pam are the parents of three children, daughters Dana (9/19/65) and Laura (9/21/70), and son Lee (11/4/67).



ASSISTANT COACHES

JOE COLLIER Defensive Coordinator



The senior member of the Denver Broncos' coaching staff, Joe Collier was the first coach hired by Dan Reeves when the latter took over as head coach of the Broncos. Recognized as the mastermind of Denver's strong defensive unit, Collier begins his 13th season with the Broncos in 1981.

Collier was on Lou Saban's staff at Western Illinois from 1957 through

1959, then moved with Saban to the Boston Patriots of the American Football League in 1960-61, and on to Buffalo in 1962.

He served as head coach of the Bills in 1966-67-68, then rejoined Saban's staff with the Broncos in 1969.

Collier was an All-Big Ten selection as an end during his college days at Northwestern, and played in the Senior Bowl and the East-West Shrine game. Drafted by the New York Giants, he chose instead to spend the next two years in the Army, after which he joined the coaching ranks at Western Illinois.

Joe and his wife, Shirley, have three children, Julie, Lisa, and Joe.

ROD DOWHOWER Wide Receivers



Rod Dowhower assumes the role of wide receivers coach for the Broncos in 1981, having served as the club's offensive coordinator in his return to pro football last season.

Formerly head coach at Stanford University, Dowhower led the Cardinals to a 5-5-1 record in 1979, after having been offensive coordinator there in 1977-78.

He began his career as a quarterback and receivers coach at San Diego State in 1966-67 and was the offensive coordinator from 1968-72. Dowhower then went to St. Louis in the NFL, where he coached the quarterbacks and receivers for one year before returning to college coaching in 1974 at UCLA.

Dowhower served as offensive coordinator there in 1974-75 and spent 1976 in the same capacity at Boise State.

An Ord, Nebraska native, he has a bachelor's degree from San Diego State, where he played college football, and a master's degree from U.S. International University.

Dowhower earned All-Coast and small college All-America honors as a quarterback at San Diego State in 1964.

Rod and his wife Nancy have two sons, Brian and Deron.

JERRY FREI Offensive Line

Jerry Frei returns to the Denver Bronco coaching ranks in 1981, following three seasons as the Chicago Bears' offensive line coach (1978-80) and two in the same capacity at Tampa Bay (1976-77). Frei's previous coaching stint with the Broncos was from 1972-75.

Frei spent 12 years as a collegiate assistant coach at the University of Oregon from 1955 through 1966.

He succeeded Len Casanova as the Ducks' head coach in 1967. Although Oregon compiled a 22-29-2 record during his five years as head coach, the Ducks' 1970 record of 6-4-1 was good enough for second place in the Pac-Eight. That finish remains Oregon's highest conference finish.

Frei was an offensive lineman on the standout Wisconsin teams of 1942, 1946 and 1947. He is a 1948 graduate of the University of Wisconsin.

His first collegiate coaching experience came from 1952-54 at Willamette University.

Jerry and his wife Marion have five children, sons David and Terry, and daughters Judy, Susan, and Nancy.



REED JOHNSON Special Teams

Reed Johnson, who for the past eight years was a talent scout for the Dallas Cowboys, is the new special teams coach of the Broncos.

Prior to his stint with the Cowboys, Johnson was an assistant coach at the University of New Mexico for three seasons and at Oklahoma State and Tulsa University for one season at each school.

Johnson, a graduate of the University of Colorado, played in the Buffaloes' defensive backfield for four years and concluded his playing career at CU in 1961 as a member of the school's Big Eight championship squad that season.

In addition, he coached high school football in Texas for five seasons, including four at Highland Park High School in Dallas. Johnson's Highland Park team won the Texas Four-A state championship in 1967.

STAN JONES Defensive Line

One of the leading linemen in the National Football League in his playing days, Stan Jones is marking his 28th consecutive year in pro football in 1981.

This is the 11th season as defensive line coach of the Broncos for Jones, who is on his second tour of duty in the Mile High City.

Jones served on the Bronco staff under Lou Saban from 1967 to 1971, and spent the next four years with Saban in Buffalo. He rejoined the Broncos in 1976 and was the second assistant retained by Dan Reeves for 1981.



Jones was an All-American tackle at Maryland in 1953 and was named the nation's Lineman of the Year. In 1977, he was named to the Atlantic Coast Conference's 25-year All-Star team. He has been honored by the Maryland Alumni Association as Man of the Year, and is a member of Pennsylvania's Sports Hall of Fame.

He played 12 years with the Chicago Bears and one with the Washington Redskins, gaining All-Pro honors as an offensive guard four times and appearing in seven Pro Bowls.

Stan and his wife, Darlis, have a daughter, Sherrie, and two sons, Kevin and Tony.

CHARLIE LEE Running Backs

The youngest coach on the Denver staff is Charlie Lee, 36, who joins the Broncos as running back coach from the University of Texas at Austin. Lee tutored the Longhorn wide receivers for the past four seasons.

Prior to his experience at Texas, Lee coached at Arizona from 1974-76 and at Northwest Missouri State in 1973.

He was a highly successful prep coach at Kansas City (Missouri) Central High School for five years.

Lee was a leading scorer and rusher at Northern Arizona, and twice earned honorable mention to the Little All-America teams.

Charlie's wife, Bonnie, is a speech pathologist, and they have a son, Charles, Jr.



RICHIE McCABE Defensive Backs

A veteran professional coach and a former American Football League All-Star, Richie McCabe enters his fourth season as the Broncos' defensive backfield coach in 1981.

In 1977, McCabe was the defensive coordinator for the Buffalo Bills, where his pro coaching career had begun in 1966. He was on the Oakland Raiders' staff in 1969 and 1970, before moving to Cleveland for a five-year stint. He rejoined the Bills in 1976.

McCabe was a 22nd round draft choice of the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1955, and played four years with the Steelers and one with the Washington Redskins. He joined the Bills as a player in 1960, when he was named to the All-AFL team.

A native of Pittsburgh, he was a two-way starter for the Pitt Panthers. Richie and his wife, Judith, have two daughters, Kelly and Erin.



NICK NICOLAU Special Assistant

A veteran of 20 years as a coach in college and with the Canadian Football League, Nick Nicolau assumes new duties as the Broncos' special assistant in 1981. He was on the staff of the New Orleans Saints last season.

Nicolau was a running back at Southern Connecticut College and coached there in 1960. He went to Springfield (Mass.) in 1961 and



Bridgeport (Conn.) from 1962-64 as an assistant coach and was head coach at Bridgeport from 1965-69.

Nicolau was an assistant at Massachusetts in 1970. Connecticut 1971-72, Kentucky 1973-75 and Kent State 1976. He joined the Hamilton Tiger-Cats as backfield coach in 1977 and held that post with the Montreal Alouettes in 1978-79.

Nicolau and his wife, Eleanor, have four daughters, Tracy, Shari, Vickie and Wendy, and two sons, Duane and Randy.

FRAN POLSFOOT

Tight Ends

Nineteen-eighty-one is a milestone year for Fran Polsfoot, as he will be coaching his 20th season in the NFL this year. This is Polsfoot's fifth season on the Broncos' staff, and this year he will concentrate on coaching the club's tight ends. Polsfoot coached all the receivers for his first four seasons in Denver.

He has been in the pro ranks since 1962 when he began a six-year hitch with the St. Louis Cardinals, following that as a member of the Houston Oilers' staff from 1968-71.

Polsfoot spent the next three years with the Cleveland Browns before rejoining the Oilers for 1975-76.

A native of Monsanto, Washington, Polsfoot is a graduate of Washington State, where he played end for the Cougars.

Fran and his wife, Mary, have a daughter, Sally, and a son, Tommy.



BOB ZEMAN

Linebackers

An American Football League All-Star as a Bronco defensive back in 1962, Zeman enters his fourth season as Denver's linebacker coach in 1981.

Zeman was the defensive backfield coach of the Oakland Raiders from 1971 through 1977.

He started his AFL playing career with the San Diego Chargers in 1960 and 1961, and came to the Broncos in a trade in 1962. After two seasons in Denver, he went to the New York Jets as a part of the historic nine-player trade in 1964. He concluded his career with the Chargers in 1965-1966.

A 1954 prep All-American in his home town of Wheaton, Illinois, Zeman went on to become the co-captain for Wisconsin's 1959 Big Ten Champions. Before joining the Raiders in 1971, he coached at Wisconsin in 1970 and Northwestern in 1968-69.

Zeman and his wife, Kathy, have three sons and a daughter, Clarke, Eddie, Donnie, and Jennifer.



ADMINISTRATION

JOHN BEAKE

Director of Player Personnel

This marks John Beake's third season as a member of the Denver Broncos and his first as the club's Director of Player Personnel.

Beake is in charge of keeping tabs on all veteran players in the NFL, which entails recording players' movements such as trades and waivers, and he also is involved in both the evaluation and the acquisition of new players.

He was Director of Pro Personnel for his first two seasons with the Broncos.

An assistant coach for the Kansas City Chiefs from 1968 through 1974, Beake was the offensive backfield coach for the New Orleans Saints in 1976-77.

On the college level, he coached at Penn State in 1961-62 and was the offensive coordinator at Colorado State University in 1975.

He has a degree from Trenton State College in New Jersey and a master's degree from Penn State.

Beake and his wife, Marcia, have three children, Jerilyn, Chip, and Christopher, and the family makes its home in Fort Collins.



CARROLL HARDY

Director of Scouting/Chief Scout

Carroll Hardy begins his 18th year in the Bronco organization in 1981.

Hardy's responsibilities are in the area of player personnel, with particular emphasis on the college draft and scouting. He also works with the pro scouting department, playing an active role in evaluating talent and in the acquisition of free agents.

Hardy has long been considered one of the greatest athletes produced by Colorado since winning a modern record of 10 letters at the University of Colorado (four each in football and baseball and two in track).

After graduating from Colorado in 1955 with a degree in education, Carroll signed a baseball contract with the Cleveland Indians and was drafted in the third round by football's San Francisco 49ers, playing that season as a wide receiver and running back.

After spending 1956 and 1957 in the Army, he returned to the Indians in 1958. He played in the outfield for the Indians until 1960, when he was traded to the Boston Red Sox. That year, Carroll became the only man ever to pinch hit for Ted Williams.

Hardy remained in baseball until the fall of 1965, when he joined the Broncos as a scout. He became assistant ticket manager for the club in 1969, and assumed the duties of scouting in 1970. He was Director of Player Personnel from 1977 through 1980.

In recognition of his great athletic career in baseball, football, and track, Hardy was inducted into the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame on February 19, 1979.



A native of South Dakota, Hardy also is a member of the South Dakota Sports Hall of Fame.

A resident of Boulder, Hardy and his wife, Janice, have three children, Jay, Jill, and Lisa.

BOB HURLEY Treasurer

Bob Hurley was promoted to the position of club Treasurer in 1981, after having served as the Broncos' accountant from 1977 through 1980.

In his position as the organization's Treasurer, Hurley oversees all financial activities of the Denver Broncos.

A native of Denver, Hurley graduated from Regis High School and the University of Colorado. Before joining the Broncos he served as a Corporate Development Officer at the First National Bank of Denver for over five years.

Bob and his wife, Sallie, are the parents of three children, sons Ryan and Daniel, and daughter Erin, and the family lives in Denver.



GEORGE McFADDEN Director of Public Relations

George McFadden begins his third season with the Broncos after having joined the club the day before the 1979 regular season began. He joined the Broncos as Director of Promotions, and was later named Director of Public Relations succeeding the late Bob Peck.

Although relatively new to Denver, McFadden is no rookie in the NFL. Before coming to Colorado he was Public Relations Director of the San Francisco 49ers for 14 years, then sandwiched an eight-month period as special events promotions manager for the Adolph Coors Co., in Golden, Colo., between the San Francisco and Denver assignments.

McFadden, a graduate of the University of New Mexico, was Sports Information Director for his alma mater for 13 years and was second vice-president of The College Sports Information Directors in America (COSIDA) before resigning to join the pro ranks in 1965.

George and wife, Wanda, live in Arvada.



GAIL STUCKEY Ticket Manager

Gail Stuckey begins his seventh season as the Broncos Ticket Manager in 1981.

A San Diego native, he joined the Broncos in 1975 after serving ten years as assistant ticket manager for the San Diego Chargers. He began his tenure with the Chargers in 1965.

Stuckey attended San Diego State University, where he played baseball and basketball and is a veteran of a four-year stint in the United States Air



Force, stationed in Germany.

Gail and his wife, Pat, have two daughters, Lynette and Gail Rene.

JIM SACCOMANO Publicity Director

Denver native Jim Saccomano is in his fourth year as a member of the Denver Broncos organization.

He is a graduate of Metropolitan State College in Denver and has a master's degree in journalism from the University of Colorado.

Prior to joining the Broncos, Saccomano worked for three seasons as Director of Public Relations for the Denver Bears baseball team, and also spent three years in Denver broadcasting as a sports reporter. He is a veteran of the United States Army.

Jim and his wife, Jo Ann, have two children, Jennifer and Jeffrey, and reside in Adams County.



LARRY ELLIOTT Equipment Manager

Larry Elliott has served the Broncos as Equipment Manager since 1965, this year adding pre-season training camp arrangements and road game lodging to his areas of responsibility.

An outstanding athlete in his own right, Elliott was a ten-letter winner at St. Mary's High School in Colorado Springs. He declined scholarship offers in both football and baseball to enlist in the Air Force. While stationed at Tripoli's Wheelus Air Force Base, he won All-European honors as a third baseman.

Elliott has served as the coach of the Broncos basketball team, which travels throughout the Rocky Mountain area to play benefit games for worthy causes.

Larry and his wife, Margaret, live in Lakewood with their five children—Timothy, Troy, Thomas, Terry, and Tammie.




STEVE ANTONOPULOS Head Athletic Trainer

Moving up to the position of Head Athletic Trainer in 1981 is Steve Antonopoulos, who was Director of Rehabilitation last season and the Broncos' Assistant Trainer for four years previously. This is his sixth year with the team.

Antonopoulos came to the Broncos from Fort Hays (Kansas) State, where he was the chief athletic trainer and an instructor in the physical education department for three years.





Once again came out of a reserve role to reestablish himself as Denver's starting quarterback for most of the 1980 season. After six games, and with the club at 3-3, Morton replaced an ailing Matt Robinson and started every game from there on except the finale against Seattle. Actually played in 12 games, started in nine. For the year he completed 183 of 301 pass attempts for 2,150 yards and 12 TDs. He threw 13 interceptions. His first start of the 1980 season was against Kansas City at Mile High Stadium, a game in which he completed 18 of 32 pass attempts for 199 yards and two TDs in a losing cause as the Broncos went down, 23-17. Best single game of the 1980 season was the second game against Oakland in which he completed 18 of 30 passes for 338 yards and a TD. Morton's 1980 performance ranked him third (behind Brian Sipe and Dan Fouts) among AFC passers and 10th in the entire NFL. Has played in 190 games in his 16 years to date and his career figures now stand at 3,384 passes attempted, 1,810 completed (53.4%) for 24,520 yards. He has thrown for 162 TDs and 166 interceptions. Even though he has been a Bronco for just four seasons, Morton is second in the Denver record book (behind Frank Tripuka) in number of passes attempted (1,192) and first in completions (664), first in yards gained (8,507) and first in number of TD passes (53). On a total career level, Morton ranks 16th in NFL annals for number of passes attempted, ranks 15th in number completed, and ranks 16th in total passing yardage. Among quarterbacks still active in the NFL, Morton ranks third (behind Jim Hart, 4,704, and Bob Griese, 3,429) in passes attempted, third (Hart, 2,387; Griese 1,926) in completions, and third (Hart, 32,154; Griese, 25,092) in total passing yardage. Interception avoidance is one of his strong points. His percentage of .040 is the best in Bronco history, and, in 1978, he had a streak of 144 consecutive passes without an interception. Was a first-round draft choice of the Dallas Cowboys prior to the 1965 season, spent nine full seasons with Dallas before being traded to the New York Giants six games into the 1974 season. Played eight games with New York in 1974 and the 1975 and 1976

seasons before joining the Broncos prior to the 1977 season. Was AFC Player of the Year after the 1977 season.

COLLEGE: Was college consensus All-America at the University of California at Berkeley where he played for current Kansas City coach Marv Levy. Earned three football letters and two in baseball. Good enough baseball player to get a bonus offer to sign, but turned it down in favor of football. Graduated with a degree in speech.

Contemplated retirement after last season, but, with the arrival of Coach Dan Reeves and a new offensive philosophy, decided to return for at least the 1981 season. By doing so he remains the second-leading active pass receiver in the AFC (Harold Jackson, New England, is the leader, but most of his career was spent in the NFC) with a career total of 433 catches for 7,875 yards and 55 TDs. In his nine seasons as a Bronco, Moses has caught 287 passes to rank third (behind Lionel Taylor, 543, and Riley Odoms, 346) among Bronco all-time receivers. His Bronco yardage, 5,204, is second only to Taylor's 6,872, and his 43 TD catches as a Bronco put him just one behind Taylor in the Denver book. 





A starting safety on the University of Georgia's '80 national championship team, he played for the Bulldogs from '76-'80 (redshirted in '77), earning three letters, all-conference honors, and second team UPI All-America mention while in school. In '79 led the Southeastern Conference with six pass interceptions and established a new school record with three interceptions vs. Georgia Tech. A freshman in '76, he did not play in '77, but became a starting defensive back from '78-'80 and was a punt return specialist for the Terrapins as well. Intercepted six passes (two in each season) and returned 56 punts for the Terps. Punt return average was 8.2 as a junior and 7.5 as a senior. Born in Cumberland, Maryland, went to Fort Hill (Cumberland) H.S., where he earned seven letters (four in track, two in football, and two in football). Captained state championship prep squad, made all-state at halfback, and one year rushed for 1,677 yards and scored 32 TDs and 200 points. 6-3, 230 DOB: August 14, 1958

1980 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The Denver Broncos set the following records in the 1980 season:

Best completion percentage: 56.1 is a new record (55.9 in 1974 was previous high).

First downs passing: 158 is second to 1962 total of 177.

Best net punting average: 35.9 (33.7 in 1977 was previous high).

*Most net yards passing, single game: 431 yards vs. Oakland, 12/14 was second highest total ever (459 vs. Kansas City on 11/18/74 is record).

INDIVIDUAL

Some of the more significant individual season and career marks posted by members of the 1980 Broncos include:

Quarterback Craig Morton became the Denver career leader in passing yardage (8,749—previous record was 7,651 posted by Frank Tripucka), most pass completions (664—previous record was 662 by Tripucka), and most touchdown passes (53—previous record was 52 by Charley Johnson). Morton completed a career high 60.8 percent of his passes. At the conclusion of 16 NFL seasons, Morton now has attempted 3,384 passes, completed 1,810 (53.5 percent for 24,520 yards, 162 TDs and 166 interceptions).

Kicker Fred Steinfort kicked 26 of 34 field goals for a 76.5 percentage, highest in team history—previous record was 72.4 per cent by Jim Turner in 1975. Steinfort's 110 points scored were most by a Bronco since 1962 and third highest season total ever (Gene Mingo scored 137 points in 1962 and 123 in 1960). His season field goal total of 26 is second highest ever (Mingo kicked 27 in 1962). In addition, Steinfort twice kicked four field goals in one game (at Cleveland 10/5 and at Seattle 12/21), second best field goal performance ever (Mingo kicked five vs. San Diego 10/6/63). Steinfort kicked five field goals over 50 yards in distance (57, 55 and 55, all of which are Denver's longest ever, 53 and 51), equaling Mingo's **career** total of five (1960-64). He kicked 55 and 53-yarders at Seattle 12/21, tying several in NFL record book for most field goals over 50 yards in one game.

Wide receiver Haven Moses scored four touchdowns to hike his Denver career total to 44, tying Lionel Taylor for second place all-time (Floyd Little scored 54 from 1967-75).

Kickoff returner Larry Brunson returned 40 kickoffs, second highest Denver season total ever (Rick Upchurch also had 40 in 1975; record of 47 was set by Odell Barry in 1964).

Linebacker Randy Gradishar returned an interception 93 yards for TD at Cleveland (10/5), longest scoring return in Denver history and most yards on interception returns by a Bronco in one game.

Defensive end Rulon Jones recorded 11½ sacks, most ever by a Denver rookie.

1980 NFL PAID ATTENDANCE IS RECORD 13,392,230 FOR HIGHEST AVERAGE EVER OF 59,787 FOR 224 GAMES

Official National Football League figures reveal that the NFL set a paid attendance record during the 1980 season.

Total paid attendance for 224 regular season games was 13,392,230 for an average of 59,787, the highest in the league's 61-year history. This season's total bettered the previous mark of 13,182,039 set in 1979. The 1980 record total represents 92.43 percent of stadium capacity.

Paid attendance at all NFL games—including preseason, regular and postseason—surpassed 16 million for the third year in a row. The total for 291 games was 16,824,762 for an average of 57,817.

Paid attendance for 10 postseason games was 625,065, topped by the 78,245 tickets sold for the Oakland at Cleveland AFC Divisional Playoff game on Jan. 4. Super Bowl XV drew a sellout crowd of 76,135 at the Louisiana Superdome in New Orleans.

The Detroit Lions led the NFL in home paid attendance with 634,204, followed by Cleveland's 623,351 and the New York Giants' 604,918. Eight other teams went over the 500,000 mark: Denver 595,440, Buffalo 592,008, Tampa Bay 566,347, Philadelphia 562,239, Los Angeles 541,592, Seattle 511,767, Chicago 506,283 and Dallas 506,281.

In the eighth season in which NFL games were made available to local television after selling out 72 hours in advance of kickoff, 146 of 224 games (65.1 percent) were telecast in the home team area. No-shows totalled 958,887 (7 percent).

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS (CONTINUED)

1971

JANUARY—Richard Jackson named to official National Football League all-star team. **JANUARY**—Richard Jackson and Floyd Little make starting lineups for American Conference in first AFC-NFC Pro Bowl game. **MARCH 26**—Veterans report to Bronco training camp for first off-season camp. **APRIL 19**—Marv Montgomery, Denver's number one draft choice, signs his 1971 contract. **MAY 12**—Broncos stop sale of season tickets at record 47,500. **SEPTEMBER 19**—Broncos open season with 10-10 tie against eventual Super Bowl entry, Miami, before first of seven sell-out crowds at Mile High Stadium. **OCTOBER 24**—Denver coach Lou Saban and Broncos down Cleveland 27-0, on same field Saban starred as all-star linebacker in Cleveland. It was first time Browns were shut-out since 1952. It was also to be Saban's last victory as Bronco coach. Attendance was 75,674, largest crowd to date to view Denver. **NOVEMBER 17**—Lou Saban resigns as head coach of Broncos, a position he had held for five years. Offensive line coach Jerry Smith is named interim head coach. Saban, in December, resigns as General Manager to return to Buffalo Bills as head coach. **DECEMBER 19**—Floyd Little compiles 79 yards against Raiders in Oakland to finish as pro football's top runner with 1,133 yards. Little also becomes first Bronco to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a season.

1972

JANUARY 5—John Ralston, successful head coach at Stanford, is announced as Denver's new head coach. He later adds the title of General Manager. **FEBRUARY 28**—Broncos' Number One draft pick, Riley Odoms, TE, from Houston, inks multi-year contract. **MARCH 16**—For the first time in the history of Denver professional football, there will be no public sale of season tickets, it is reported. Season ticket holders renewed 46,500 of the 47,500 available season tickets, and further exercised their option for 8,000 additional tickets, thus assuring Denver of its third straight year of sell-outs. **APRIL 5**—Long-time Rocky Mountain Empire Sports employee Earl Hartman dies of cancer. Hartman is Treasurer of Empire Sports and Business Manager of the Broncos at the time of his death. **JULY 19**—Broncos open summer camp at Cal Poly at Pomona (Calif.) as rookies report for physicals. **AUGUST 16**—Charley Johnson, NFL veteran quarterback, becomes a Bronco as Ralston trades third round choice to Houston. Johnson will become Denver's most accurate passer (.555) in the upcoming season. **OCTOBER 29**—Floyd Little is given his "day" at Mile High Stadium before a sell-out crowd. In pre-game ceremonies, Little receives numerous gifts including a boat. However, Broncos are unable to whip Cleveland as Browns win, 27-20. Floyd's day was in honor of his winning NFL rushing championship in 1971. **DECEMBER 10**—San Diego is on short end of 38-13 score played at Mile High Stadium with the temperature at kickoff reportedly nine degrees. This is the coldest kickoff ever for a Denver team.

1973

JANUARY 30—Otis Armstrong, all-star running back from Purdue, is Denver's first round selection in annual draft. **MARCH 3**—Season ticket holders renew 47,800 of 48,000 season tickets to assure Denver again of having no public sale of season tickets. Season ticket holders asked for additional 11,000 tickets—if they become available. **OCTOBER 14**—Charley Johnson also becomes the 18th quarterback in pro football history to go over 20,000 yards lifetime as he connects for 214 yards plus three TDs to Haven Moses in a 48-20 win at Houston. **OCTOBER 22**—With "Orange Monday" banners waving, the Broncos perhaps play the most important game to date in the club's history against Oakland on national television. Denver comes back to knot the contest, 23-23, on a 35-yard field goal by Jim Turner. **NOVEMBER 25**—Denver defeats Kansas City, 14-10, on two Charley Johnson to Haven Moses passes to take over first place in the AFC West with three games to go. The win moves the Broncos to 6-3-2—the six victories the second best mark ever for a Denver team to date. **DECEMBER 9**—Denver 42, San Diego 28! The Broncos are winners at last, as Denver clinches the team's seventh victory of the season, assuring the club of a winning year. Jim Turner contributed 16 points in San Diego. **DECEMBER 16**—A tie or loss would do no good in this afternoon's game in Oakland. A win would give the Broncos the Western Division title in the AFC, but the Broncos lose 21-17.

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS (CONTINUED)

1974

JANUARY—Four Broncos, Floyd Little, Haven Moses, Riley Odoms and Paul Smith, are invited to play in the Pro Bowl, giving Denver good representation. In addition, John Ralston is named AFC Coach of the Year for guiding Denver to its first winning season ever. Odoms, incidentally, is named All-Pro by NEA. Additional honors go to Charley Johnson on offense and Paul Smith on defense for being the team's most valuable players as voted by their teammates. These two men are the 1973 winners of the Earl Hartman Memorial awards. **JANUARY 29-30**—The Broncos draft with defense in mind as three of the team's first four choices are defenders paced by Ohio State linebacker Randy Gradishar. **MARCH 1**—The Broncos announce a six-game pre-season schedule, the most games ever slated for the pre-season by Denver. **MARCH**—Only 165 of the 48,000 season tickets sold are not renewed for 1974. Denver then sells an additional 1,000, bringing the total number of season tickets sold to 49,000. **APRIL 18**—The Denver Chamber of Commerce releases survey compiled by Dr. Charles P. Rahe at the University of Colorado. The report entitled, "Economic Impact of the Denver Broncos Football Organization on the Metropolitan Economy," points out that, in 1973, over \$6 million of new money was brought into the metro area by the Broncos. **AUGUST 31**—The Broncos defeat the New England Patriots, 27-21, in Spokane, Wash. for the team's fourth victory of the summer, the most wins by a Denver team in pre-season.

SEPTEMBER 10—Denver voters pass a \$25 million bond issue to expand and improve Mile High Stadium to over 75,000 seats. The stadium was projected to be finished in time for the 1976 regular season. **SEPTEMBER 22**—The Broncos and the Pittsburgh Steelers play in the first regular season overtime game as a 35-35 score was present at the end of regulation play. Neither team scored in the sudden death period. **NOVEMBER 28**—Before a television audience estimated at 35 million, the Broncos riddle the Detroit Lions 31-27 on Denver's first Thanksgiving Day game in Detroit. **DECEMBER 8**—Denver assures itself of the team's second consecutive winning season and Otis Armstrong sets a single game rushing mark of 183 yards as the Broncos down Houston 37-14. **DECEMBER 15**—Although Denver loses at San Diego, Otis Armstrong finishes the season with 1407 yards and the NFL rushing title becoming one of a half dozen players ever to average more than 100 yards per game in pro football.

1975

JANUARY—Otis Armstrong and Riley Odoms represent the Broncos in the annual Pro Bowl game in Miami, Fla. Additional honors go to Armstrong as he is voted the top offensive player on the team. Tom Jackson was voted the top Defender and Ken Criter the top Specialist. **FEBRUARY**—Expansion of Mile High Stadium begins which will provide 63,500 capacity for the 1976 season and an ultimate capacity of 75,000 in 1977. **SEPTEMBER 29**—The Broncos defeat Green Bay, 23-13, for their first victory ever on Monday Night Football. **OCTOBER 5**—Playing before the largest crowd ever to witness a Broncos game, 79,864, Denver falls to O. J. Simpson and the Buffalo Bills, 38-14, at Buffalo. **DECEMBER 14**—Playing his last home game as a Denver Bronco, Floyd Little goes out with a bang. The club's first No. 1 draft choice to sign, Little rushes for 56 yards and one TD, catches five passes for 94 yards, including a 66-yard touchdown, to lead the Broncos to a 25-10 win over Philadelphia. Little winds up his career as the seventh all-time rusher in the NFL with 6,323 yards.

1976

JANUARY 26—Tight end Riley Odoms and linebacker Randy Gradishar are the Broncos representatives in the Pro Bowl in New Orleans. For Odoms, it is the third straight year he has played in the game, while Gradishar, making his first appearance, keeps alive the string of John Ralston's first draft choices playing in the game after their second year in the league. **MARCH 28**—Quarterback Charley Johnson announces his retirement from the National Football League after a 15-year career. Johnson, who led the club to its only two winning seasons in history in 1973 and 1974, will remain with the team as a scout and quarterback coach. **APRIL 21**—Season ticket sales are cut off at 62,215, assuring the Broncos of their seventh straight sellout season. **JUNE 27**—Lyle Alzado is one of three finalists for the man of the Year Award and Rich Upchurch is honored as the American Conference Offensive Rookie of the Year by the NFL

Players Association at its annual banquet in Chicago. **SEPTEMBER 19**—In the expanded Mile High Stadium, the Broncos whip the Jets, 46-3, before 62,669 fans, the largest crowd ever to witness a sporting event in the state of Colorado. The record will fall for each of the next three home games, the final mark being 63,431 against Oakland on October 17. **SEPTEMBER 26**—Rick Upchurch ties an NFL record by returning two punts for touchdowns in a 44-13 win over the visiting Cleveland Browns. **OCTOBER 3**—The Broncos tie a club record by winning their third game in a row, 26-0, over the San Diego Chargers. The Broncos will match the streak again later in the season. The shutout is the third in Denver's history. **OCTOBER 24**—Rick Upchurch ties an NFL record with his fourth punt return touchdown of the season in a 35-26 win over Kansas City. **NOVEMBER 7**—With two field goals and six extra points, Jim Turner becomes the fifth player in pro football history to surpass 1,200 points in a 48-13 win over Tampa Bay. **NOVEMBER 14**—The Broncos blank San Diego, 17-0, for Denver's second shutout of the season, a figure matching the team's total in its first 16 years of play. **DECEMBER 12**—The Broncos stop Chicago, 28-14, for their ninth win of the season, highest total in Denver history. Otis Armstrong rushes for 116 yards to reach 1,008 for the season, his second 1,000-yard year in his career. **DECEMBER 18**—Fred Gehrke, long-time Bronco administrator, is named general manager as the club divides duties of head coach and general manager for the first time since 1967.

1977

JANUARY 17—Rick Upchurch and Otis Armstrong are the Bronco participants in the annual AFC-NFC Pro Bowl in Seattle, won by the AFC. **24-14. JANUARY 31**—John Ralston resigns as Head Coach of the Denver Broncos. **FEBRUARY 1**—Robert (Red) Miller, a former Bronco assistant coach, is named as the team's eighth head coach. **FEBRUARY 4**—Carroll Hardy, director of scouting for the Broncos, is named director of player personnel. **FEBRUARY 7**—Former Bronco great Floyd Little is inducted into the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame. **MARCH 13**—Ticket Manager Gail Stuckey announces that only 449 of 62,215 season tickets sold in 1976 were not renewed for 1977. Sales of additional tickets available because of stadium expansion. **APRIL 7**—In a Denver Post series by Irv Moss, it is revealed that the Broncos generated revenues of more than \$891,000 for the city of Denver in 10 home games in 1976, making the Broncos the top producer of revenue for the city of Denver among tenants of special events facilities. **MAY**—A pair of off-season camps, one for rookies and free agents and the other for veterans, get the 1977 Broncos acquainted with new coach Red Miller and his staff. **JUNE 12**—Lyle Alzado is named winner of the National Football League Players Association's Byron (Whizzer) White Award as the group's Man of the Year. Rick Upchurch is honored at the same Chicago banquet as the NFL's top punt returner. **SEPTEMBER 18**—The Broncos open their season before a record crowd of 75,007 in Mile High Stadium, shutting out the St. Louis Cardinals, 7-0. **OCTOBER 16**—Pushing their season record to 5-0, the Broncos use seven interceptions and a touchdown pass to kicker Jim Turner to trounce the defending world champion Oakland Raiders, 30-7. **NOVEMBER 27**—In a showdown of the two best records in the NFL, the Broncos get a 73-yard interception return for a touchdown by Tom Jackson to dump Baltimore, 27-13, and run their record to 10-1. **DECEMBER 4**—With a 24-14 win at Houston, the Broncos clinch a playoff berth, first in the club's history. Later in the day, the Broncos clinch the AFC Western Division championship when the Raiders fall to the Los Angeles Rams. **DECEMBER 18**—The Broncos lose to Dallas in the regular season finale, 14-6, but post the best record in the history of the franchise, 12-2, tied with Dallas for the best in the NFL. **DECEMBER 24**—Before the largest crowd ever to watch a sporting event in the state of Colorado, 75,011, the Broncos stop the Pittsburgh Steelers in the first round of playoff action, 34-21.

1978

JANUARY 1—"The miracle has happened," said KOA sports director Bob Martin. "The Broncos are going to the Super Bowl." In a hard-fought game at Mile High Stadium, the Broncos dethrone the Raiders, 20-17, for the AFC championship and a trip to the Super Bowl in New Orleans. **JANUARY 15**—"We'll be back" and "We love our Broncos" the Denver faithful chant as the Broncos fall to the Cowboys, 27-10, in the Super Bowl. **JANUARY 23**—Lyle Alzado, Randy Gradishar, Tom Jackson, Billy Thompson and Louis Wright represent the Broncos in the Pro Bowl, the largest

Denver contingent in history. **MARCH**—Only 143 season tickets are not renewed, a new all-time low, according to ticket manager Gail Stuckey. **MAY**—Denver again holds two mini-camps to get a jump on July training camp in Fort Collins. **SEPTEMBER 3**—Broncos open defense of title by beating Oakland, 14-6 in Mile High Stadium. **OCTOBER 29**—Broncos beat Seattle, 20-17 in overtime, becoming the first NFL team ever to participate in three overtime contests in one season. **DECEMBER 3**—Broncos win by 21-6 score at Oakland, holding the Raiders without a touchdown for the second time in the season, and moving within one game of AFC West crown. **DECEMBER 10**—Denver downs Kansas City, 24-3, winning second straight division championship, as QB Craig Morton goes 19-for-22 with 16 straight completions, both second best all-time NFL marks. **DECEMBER 30**—Denver loses in the playoffs to eventual Super Bowl champion Pittsburgh Steelers, 33-10.

1979


JANUARY 29—Broncos are represented by an all-time high of seven players in the NFL Pro Bowl, including Lyle Alzado, Randy Gradishar, Tom Jackson, Riley Odoms, Bill Thompson, Rick Upchurch, and Louis Wright. **MARCH**—Only 161 season tickets are not renewed, according to Ticket Manager Gail Stuckey, virtually assuring the Broncos of their tenth straight sellout season. **MAY**—Denver again gets ready for the coming season with two mini-camps at the club's Denver facility. **SEPTEMBER 16**—Broncos beat Atlanta in overtime, 20-17, sixth overtime contest in team history. **OCTOBER 7**—Denver shuts out San Diego, 7-0, marking first time ever for Broncos to record two shutouts in one season. Denver had opened the campaign with 10-0 win over Cincinnati. **NOVEMBER 11**—Rick Upchurch becomes the all-time pro football record holder in career punt return yardage. He set the record vs. New England, surpassing the late Emlen Tunnell's total of 2,209 yards. Upchurch concluded 1979 play with 2,288 career punt return yards. **DECEMBER 17**—San Diego defeats Denver by a 17-7 margin on final Monday night game of the season, winning Western Division title in the process. However, Denver clinched a playoff berth for the third straight year. **DECEMBER 23**—Denver loses in wild card playoff game at Houston, 13-7.

1980

JANUARY 27—The Broncos are represented in the Pro Bowl game by Randy Gradishar, Tom Jackson, Rick Upchurch, and Louis Wright. **MARCH**—Ticket Manager Gail Stuckey announces that only 146 season tickets are not renewed for 1980, virtually assuring the club of its 11th consecutive sellout campaign. **MAY**—Broncos hold rookie and veteran mini-camps in Denver. **SEPTEMBER 14**—Denver defeats Dallas, 41-20, the first Bronco victory over the Cowboys in regular season history. **OCTOBER 5**—Randy Gradishar returns interception 93 yards for a touchdown vs. Cleveland, the longest such return in team history and the NFL's longest for 1980 season. **OCTOBER 13**—Fred Steinfort kicks 57-yard field goal, tying record for third-longest kick in NFL history. **DECEMBER 21**—Steinfort kicks 53 and 55-yard field goals, becoming just sixth man in NFL history to kick two field goals from beyond 50 yards.

1981

JANUARY—Fred Steinfort is named by Pro Football Weekly as that publication's Golden Toe Award winner for the 1980 season, having tied for the league lead with 26 field goals. **FEBRUARY 25**—At a news conference at the Broncos' complex, Edgar F. Kaiser, Jr. is introduced as the new owner of the Denver Broncos, having purchased the club from principal owners Gerald H. Phipps and Allan R. Phipps. **MARCH 10**—Grady Alderman is named new General Manager of the Broncos and Dan Reeves is named as the new Head Coach. Alderman came to the Broncos from the Minnesota Vikings, where he was Director of Planning and Development. Reeves came to Denver from the Dallas Cowboys, where he had been offensive coordinator. **MARCH**—Ticket Manager Gail Stuckey announces that the Broncos are sold out for their 12th consecutive season. **MAY**—Denver again holds both rookie and veteran mini-camps, followed by a quarterback school, all in preparation for the July 14 opening of training camp in Fort Collins.

MILE HIGH STADIUM

Mile High Stadium, home of the Denver Broncos, once again was filled for every home date during the 1980 National Football League regular season. The Broncos brought their consecutive regular season sellout streak to 80 games and concluded 11 years of sellouts at Mile High Stadium.

Expansion of the stadium, begun in 1975, was completed for the 1977 season to give the Broncos the seventh largest home facility in the league.

Denver voters passed a \$25 million bond issue in 1974 to expand and improve the stadium from its capacity of 51,706 to 75,103. The stadium held 63,532 for the 1976 season, halfway through the project.

Making Mile High Stadium unique, however, is its movable east stands. The east stands move in a single section which, when fully extended, is in a horseshoe configuration for football. When the section is retracted, the stadium is in position for baseball.

The dynamics involved in the move are fascinating. First, bear in mind that the east stands section is a three-tiered structure, 535 feet long, 135 feet tall and 200 feet deep, weighing nearly nine million pounds. Second, the stands must be moved a distance of 145 feet.

How is it done? The answer, says DMJM-Phillips-Reister, the engineering-architectural firm in charge of the project, is water.

More than 90,000 square feet of runways serve as the operating surfaces over which the stands will move. Water is pumped onto the runways and form a .003 inch sheet upon which the stands rest. Hydraulic rams then push the stands forward at the rate of three feet per minute, making the move last somewhere around two hours.

Originally called Bears Stadium, the facility was built in 1948 for the Denver Bears of baseball's old Western League, with long-range plans to utilize it for football as well. When Denver became a charter member of the American Football League in 1959, the south stands (8,100 seats) and portable east stands (9,616 seats) were added to give a capacity of 34,657 for football.

After Denver voters turned down a stadium bond issue to build an all-purpose metropolitan stadium in 1967, a non-profit group began a fund-raising drive with the goal of purchasing the stadium for the city.

In February of 1968, the group bought the stadium from Rocky Mountain Empire Sports for \$1.8 million and presented it to the city of Denver. A 16,000-seat upper deck was immediately constructed over the west stands, raising the capacity to over 50,000 for the 1968 season. In December of 1968, the stadium was renamed Denver Mile High Stadium.

B. Home: NFC West #2, NFC West #4; Away: NFC West #1, NFC West #3. Total 4 games.

C. One game with each of the two other second place teams in the AFC and each of the two other third place teams in the AFC. Home: AFC East #2, AFC Central #3; Away: AFC East #3, AFC Central #2. Total: 4 games.

THIRD PLACE TEAM IN AFC WEST:

B. Home: NFC West #1, NFC West #3; Away: NFC West #2, NFC West #4. Total: 4 games.

C. One game with each of the two other second and third place teams in the AFC — Home: AFC East #3, AFC Central #2; Away: AFC East #2, AFC Central #3. Total: 4 games.

FOURTH PLACE TEAM IN AFC WEST:

B. Home: NFC West #2, NFC West #4; Away: NFC West #1, NFC West #3. Total: 4 games.

C. One game with each of the other first place and fourth place teams in the AFC — Home: AFC East #4, and AFC Central #1; Away: AFC East #1, AFC Central #4. Total: 4 games.

FIFTH PLACE TEAM IN AFC WEST:

B. One game with each of teams #1-4 of the four-team division in the AFC—Home: AFC Central #2, AFC Central #4; Away: AFC Central #1, and AFC Central #3. Total: 4 games.

C. Home-and-home games with the other fifth place team in the AFC—Home: AFC West #5; Away: AFC East #5. Total: 2 games.

D. One game with each of the fifth place teams in the NFC—Home: AFC East #5; Away: NFC Central #5. Total: 2 games.

Broncos Radio Network

For the twelfth consecutive season, Denver's 50-thousand watt station KOA (850) will serve as the flagship station for a Denver Broncos game broadcast network that will cover the states of Colorado, Arizona, Idaho, Nebraska, New Mexico, South Dakota, Utah and Wyoming.

Bob Martin, radio "voice" of the Broncos since 1964, will again be calling the play-by-play account of the games, with Larry Zimmer, who joined the broadcast team in 1971, again doing the color commentary.

Martin was named Colorado Sportscaster Of The Year for the twelfth consecutive year in 1980.
