

CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD

EDGAR F. KAISER, JR. Chairman Of The Board



Edgar F. Kaiser, Jr. is chairman and chief executive officer of Kaiser Resources Ltd., a privately-owned international coal marketing company, and of its subsidiary, Kaiser Oil (U.S.) Ltd., an oil and gas exploration company headquartered in Denver, Colorado.

Mr. Kaiser, 39, was elected in 1978 as chairman and chief executive officer of the British Columbia based coal corporation then known as Kaiser Resources Ltd., and since renamed B.C. Coal Ltd., after serving as president and chief executive officer. As well, he served as chairman and chief executive officer of

Kaiser Steel Corporation. His operational experience includes assignments with other Kaiser companies in cement, automotive, mining, steel, engineering and construction businesses in many parts of the world. He is a director of Daon Development Corporation. He also is a trustee of the California Institute of Technology and is chairman of the board of trustees of the Henry J. Kaiser Family Foundation.

Mr. Kaiser is active on the Canada-Japan Business Cooperation Committee as well as serving on several government, civic and charitable committees and organizations.

Mr. Kaiser was born in Portland, Oregon in 1942. He received his B.A. from Stanford University in 1965 and an M.B.A. from Harvard University in 1967. After a year and a half in Vietnam with the Agency for International Development, he served President Lyndon B. Johnson in 1968 as a White House Fellow and during 1969 was assistant to the U.S. Secretary of the Interior, Walter J. Hickel.



GENERAL MANAGER

GRADY ALDERMAN General Manager

Grady Alderman presided over a very successful year of transition in 1981, as the Broncos posted a 10-6 record in Alderman's first year as general manager of the NFL club.

He came to Denver with 20 years of experience in professional football as a player, administrator, and broadcaster, as well as a solid foundation in business and management.

Alderman assumed his new post after having spent the previous two seasons as Director of Planning and Development for the Minnesota Vikings.

Alderman's business background is almost as long as his playing

career. He was drafted by the Detroit Lions in 1960 after an outstanding collegiate career at the University of Detroit, then went to the Vikings in the expansion draft in 1961.

He became an offensive tackle at Minnesota and embarked on a long and distinguished playing career that saw him play in six Pro Bowls and three Super Bowls and serve as offensive team captain for eight years before his retirement following the 1974 season.

During much of that time he had also been working as an accountant with the accounting firm of Deloitte, Haskins & Sells. He joined that firm in 1963 and stayed with it through 1979.

During that time he completed the requirements for, and received, his CPA certificate (in 1970) and was a manager at the firm's Bloomington, Minn., office at the time he left to join the Vikings front office in 1979.

After his retirement as an NFL player, Alderman became a broadcaster working as color commentator on Vikings broadcasts from 1976 through the 1980 season. He also provided color commentary for the telecast of the 1980 Holiday and Japan Bowl all-star games.

A Michigan native, Alderman was born in Detroit (12/10/38) and graduated from Madison Heights High School in 1956. He earned his BS in accounting from the University of Detroit in 1961.

During his collegiate playing career, he was named the University of Detroit's outstanding lineman, and was an All-Catholic All-American in 1959. He played in the Gem City Bowl All-Star Game in 1959 and was named the game's outstanding lineman.

Grady and his wife, Nancy, are the parents of two children, son Robbie (11/16/66) and daughter Christy (8/28/69).

An active sportsman, Alderman lists his hobbies as fishing, hiking, racquetball, golf, motorcycling and snowmobiling.

HEAD COACH

DAN REEVES Head Coach



When Dan Reeves assumed command of the Denver Broncos coaching staff last year, he did so as the youngest coach in the National Football League, at age 37. His first year at the Denver helm produced an impressive 10-6 record with a Broncos team that barely missed participation in 1981 playoff action.

This was accomplished despite a late start for Reeves and his staff, in addition to the implementation of a new offensive system which he brought to the Broncos from Dallas.

Recognized as one of the most successful offensive coaches in the NFL, Reeves had spent his entire

professional career, both as a player and as a coach, with the Dallas Cowboys. He was offensive coordinator for the Cowboys for three seasons, years when the Dallas offense was consistently at or near the top of the NFL.

Reeves had been a member of the Dallas coaching staff since 1970, when he undertook the difficult dual role of player-coach for two seasons. He was full-time offensive backfield coach in 1972, but spent the 1973 season in private business before rejoining the staff, again as backfield coach, in 1974.

In 1977, he took on the job of offensive coordinator where his duties included coaching the quarterbacks and wide receivers.

A native of Americus, Ga. (1/19/44), Reeves began his pro career as a free agent running back in 1965. He had been a quarterback at the University of South Carolina as a college player and was inducted into South Carolina's Hall of Fame five years ago.

An all-purpose offensive back during his eight seasons (1965-72) on the Dallas roster, Reeves finished his career as the Cowboys' fifth all-time leading rusher, despite a series of knee injuries that slowed him in the later stages of his career.

He rushed for 1,990 yards and 25 TDs, and caught 129 passes for 1,693 yards and 17 TDs.

Because of his collegiate QB background, Reeves was also a respected halfback option passer, completing 30 such attempts for a pair of TDs during his career. In addition, he returned some kickoffs and punts along the way, and played in the NFL championship games of 1966, 1967 and 1970.

Reeves and wife Pam are the parents of three children, daughters Dana (9/21/65) and Laura (9/19/70), and son Lee (11/4/67).



ASSISTANT COACHES

MARVIN BASS

Special Assistant

With nearly 40 years experience as a coach and administrator in college and professional football, Marvin Bass joins the Denver Broncos coaching staff as a special assistant in 1982.

Bass came to Denver from the Canadian Football League, where he had been defensive coordinator of the Calgary Stampeders from 1978-1981.



A native of Norfolk, Virginia who was an All-America at William and Mary in 1942, he elected to go into college coaching after graduation and joined the staff at his alma mater in 1944.

In addition to William and Mary, Bass coached on the college level at North Carolina, Georgia Tech, South Carolina, and the University of Richmond. While head coach at South Carolina Bass coached Dan Reeves, who was the starting quarterback for the Gamecocks.

On the pro level, he was on the Buffalo Bills staff from 1969-71 and spent two years with the Birmingham franchise in the World Football League, including one season as head coach (1975). After the WFL ceased operations Bass rejoined the Buffalo Bills, this time as Director of Pro Scouting from 1975-77, prior to moving to Calgary in 1978.

Marvin and his wife, Audrey, have one son, Wallace, and two grandsons, Lee and Rhett.

JOE COLLIER

Assistant Head Coach/Defense

The senior member of the Denver Broncos' coaching staff, Joe Collier was promoted to the position of assistant head coach/defense during the off-season. Recognized as the mastermind of Denver's strong defensive unit, Collier begins his 14th season with the Broncos in 1982.

Collier was on Lou Saban's staff at Western Illinois from 1957 through 1959, then moved with Saban to the

Boston Patriots of the American Football League in 1960-61, and on to Buffalo in 1962.

He served as head coach of the Bills in 1966-67-68, then rejoined Saban's staff with the Broncos in 1969.

Collier was an All-Big Ten selection as an end during his college days at Northwestern, and played in the Senior Bowl and the East-West Shrine game. Drafted by the New York Giants, he chose instead to spend the next two years in the Army, after which he joined the coaching ranks at Western Illinois.

ROD DOWHOWER

Offensive Coordinator/Wide Receivers

Rod Dowhower is in his third season as the Broncos' offensive coordinator in 1982, and for the second straight year he will coach the club's wide receivers as well.

Formerly head coach at Stanford University, Dowhower led the Cardinals to a 5-5-1 record in 1979, after having been offensive coordinator there in 1977-78.

He began his career as a quarter-

back and receivers coach at San Diego State in 1966-67 and was the offensive coordinator from 1968-72. Dowhower then went to St. Louis in the NFL, where he coached the quarterbacks and receivers for one year before returning to college coaching in 1974 at UCLA.

Dowhower served as offensive coordinator there in 1974-75 and spent 1976 in the same capacity at Boise State.

An Ord, Nebraska native, he has a bachelor's degree from San Diego State, where he played college football, and a master's degree from U.S. International University.

Dowhower earned All-Coast and small college All-America honors as a quarterback at San Diego State in 1964.

Rod and his wife Nancy have two sons, Brian and Deron.



Jerry Frei returned to the Denver Bronco coaching ranks in 1981, following three seasons as the Chicago Bears' offensive line coach (1978-80) and two in the same capacity at Tampa Bay (1976-77). Frei's previous coaching stint with the Broncos was from 1972-75, making the 1982 campaign his sixth in Denver.

Frei spent 12 years as a collegiate

assistant coach at the University of Oregon from 1955 through

He succeeded Len Casanova as the Ducks' head coach in 1967. Oregon compiled a 22-29-2 record during his five years as head coach, and the Ducks' 1970 record of 6-4-1 was good enough for second place in the Pac-Eight. That finish remains Oregon's highest conference finish to date.

Frei was an offensive lineman on the standout Wisconsin teams of 1942, 1946 and 1947. He is a 1948 graduate of the University of Wisconsin.

His first collegiate coaching experience came from 1952-54 at Williamette University.

Jerry and his wife Marion have five children, sons David and Terry, and daughters Judy, Susan, and Nancy.



STAN JONES

Defensive Line

One of the leading linemen in the National Football League in his playing days, Stan Jones is marking his 29th consecutive year in pro football in 1982.

This is the 12th season as defensive line coach of the Broncos for Jones, who is on his second tour of duty in the Mile High City.


Jones served on the Bronco staff under Lou Saban from 1967 to 1971,

spent the next four years with Saban in Buffalo, then rejoined the Broncos in 1976.

Jones was an All-American tackle at Maryland in 1953 and was named the nation's Lineman of the Year. In 1977, he was named to the Atlantic Coast Conference's 25-year All-Star team. He has been honored by the Maryland Alumni Association as Man of the Year, and is a member of Pennsylvania's Sports Hall of Fame.

He played 12 years with the Chicago Bears and one with the Washington Redskins, gaining All-Pro honors as an offensive guard four times and appearing in seven Pro Bowls.

Stan and his wife, Darlis, have a daughter, Sherrie, and two sons. Kevin and Tony.



A veteran professional coach and a former American Football League All-Star. Richie McCabe enters his fifth season as the Broncos' defensive backfield coach in 1982.

In 1977, McCabe was the defensive coordinator for the Buffalo Bills, where his pro coaching career had begun in 1966. He was on the Oakland Raiders' staff in 1969 and 1970, before moving to Cleveland for

a five-year stint. He rejoined the Bills in 1976. McCabe was a 22nd round draft choice of the Pittsburgh

Steelers in 1955, and played four years with the Steelers and one with the Washington Redskins. He joined the Bills as a player in 1960, when he was named to the All-AFL team.

A native of Pittsburgh, he was a two-way starter for the Pitt Panthers. Richie and his wife, Judith, have two daughters. Kelly and Erin.



Running Backs

Nick Nicolau this year assumes the duties of running back coach for the Broncos, after having served as the club's special assistant on the coaching staff in 1981. A veteran of 20 years as a coach in college and professional football, he was on the staff of the New Orleans Saints in 1980.

Nicolau was a running back at Southern Connecticut College and coached there in 1960. He went to





Springfield (Mass.) in 1961 and Bridgeport (Conn.) from 1962-64 as an assistant coach and was head coach at Bridgeport from 1965-69



A native of Monsanto, Washington, Polsfoot is a graduate of Washington State, where he played end for the Cougars.

He played pro football with the Chicago Cardinals from 1950-52 and with the Washington Redskins in 1953, earning a berth in the NFL's second annual Pro Bowl game following the 1951 season.

An American Football League All-Star as a Bronco defensive back in 1962, Zeman enters his fifth season as Denver's linebacker coach in 1982.

Zeman was the defensive backfield coach of the Oakland Raiders from 1971 through 1977.

He started his AFL playing career with the San Diego Chargers in 1960 and 1961, and came to the Broncos in a trade in 1962. After two seasons in

Denver, he went to the New York Jets as a part of the historic nineplayer trade in 1964. He concluded his career with the Chargers in 1965-66.

A 1954 prep All-American in his home town of Wheaton, Illinois, Zeman went on to become the co-captain for Wisconsin's 1959 Big Ten Champions. Before joining the Raiders in 1971, he coached at Wisconsin in 1970 and Northwestern in 1968-69.

An assistant coach for the Kansas City Chiefs from 1968 through 1974, Beake was the offensive backfield coach for the New Orleans Saints in 1976-77.

On the college level, he coached at Penn State in 1961-62 and was the offensive coordinator at Colorado State University in 1975. Beake coached on the high school level for six years prior to joining the Penn State staff in 1961.

He has a degree from Trenton State College in New Jersey and a master's degree from Penn State.

Beake and his wife, Marcia, have three children, Jerilyn, Chip, and Christopher, and the family makes its home in Fort Collins.

CARROLL HARDY

Coordinator of College Scouting

Carroll Hardy begins his 19th year in the Bronco organization in 1982.

Hardy's responsibilities are in the area of the college draft and scouting. He also works with the pro scouting department, playing an active role in evaluating talent and in the acquisition of free agents.

Hardy has long been considered one of the greatest athletes produced by Colorado since winning a modern

record of 10 letters at the University of Colorado (four each in football and baseball and two in track).

After graduating from Colorado in 1955 with a degree in education, Carroll signed a baseball contract with the Cleveland Indians and was drafted in the third round by football's San Francisco 49ers, playing that season as a wide receiver and running back.

After spending 1956 and 1957 in the Army, he returned to the Indians in 1958. He played in the outfield for the Indians until 1960, when he was traded to the Boston Red Sox. That year, Carroll became the only man ever to pinch hit for Ted Williams.

Hardy remained in baseball until the fall of 1965, when he joined the Broncos as a scout. He became assistant ticket manager for the club in 1969, and assumed the duties of scouting in 1970. He was Director of Player Personnel from 1977 through 1980.

In recognition of his great athletic career in baseball, football, and track, Hardy was inducted into the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame on February 19, 1979.

A native of South Dakota, Hardy also is a member of the South Dakota Sports Hall of Fame.

A resident of Boulder, Hardy and his wife, Janice, have three children, Jay, Jill, and Lisa.

REED JOHNSON Coordinator of Pro Scouting

Reed Johnson, who spent eight seasons as a talent scout for the Dallas Cowboys before coming to Denver in 1981 as special teams coach, this year becomes Coordinator of Pro Scouting for the Broncos.

Johnson coordinates the activities of Denver's pro scouts, with emphasis in the area of free agent acquisitions.

Prior to his stint with the Cowboys, Johnson was an assistant coach at the University of New Mexico for three seasons and at Oklahoma State and Tulsa for one season at each school.

A graduate of the University of Colorado, Johnson played in the Buffalos' defensive backfield for four years. He concluded his playing career at CU in 1961 as a member of the school's Big Eight championship squad that season.

In addition, he coached high school football in Texas for five seasons, including four at Highland Park High School in Dallas, where Johnson himself had played on a state championship team

ROBERT M. HURLEY Treasurer

Robert M. (Bob) Hurley was promoted to the position of club Treasurer in 1981, after having served as the Broncos' accountant from 1977 through 1980.

In his position as the organization's Treasurer, Hurley oversees all financial activities of the Denver Broncos.

A fifth generation native of Denver, Hurley graduated from Regis High School and the University of

Colorado, where he received a BS degree in finance. Before joining the Broncos he served as a Corporate Development Officer and National Loan Officer at the First National Bank of Denver.

CHARLIE LEE

Director of Public Relations

Moving into the administrative field as Director of Public Relations in 1981 is Charlie Lee, who joined the Broncos last year as the team's running back coach.

Charlie came to Denver from the University of Texas at Austin, where he tutored the Longhorns' wide receivers from 1977-80.

Prior to his experience at Texas. Lee coached at Arizona from 1974-76

and at Northwest Missouri State in 1973. He began his coaching career as a highly successful prep coach in football and track at Kansas City (Missouri) Central High School for five years. His track teams won five consecutive state titles.

Lee was a leading scorer and rusher at Northern Arizona, and twice earned honorable mention to the Little All-America teams. He is a 1968 graduate of Northern Arizona with a BS degree in education and is working toward a master's degree in secondary school administration.

STEVE ANTONOPULOS


Head Athletic Trainer





Steve DeBerg was acquired from San Francisco in exchange for a future draft choice less than one week before the 1981 regular season began. Robert L. Craig Morton had his finest professional season in 1981 and set several records in the process, finishing as the NFL's secondranked passer with a rating of 90.5, tied with San Diego's Dan Fouts and trailing only Cincinnati's Ken Anderson. As the starting quarterback from the beginning of the season, Morton set new personal highs in attempts (376), completions (225), yardage (3,195, his first 3,000 yard season and a new Denver record), and touchdowns (21, matching his 1969 total at Dallas). He completed 59.8 percent of his attempts, a figure surpassed only by his 60.8 mark of the previous year. Among his many 1981 highlights were back-to-back four-touchdown performances against Baltimore and San Diego, and his passing statistics in the first San Diego game were the NFL's single-game best of the season: 17 completions in 18 attempts for 308 yards and four touchdowns. The oldest player in pro football and the only 18-year man in the NFL. Morton comes into the 1982 campaign ranked among the game's legends. He is 12th all-time in career attempts (3,760) and completions (2,035), 16th in touchdowns (183), and 11th in passing yardage (27,715). Jim Hart of the St. Louis Cardinals is the only active quarterback ranked ahead of Morton in all of those categories. Even though he has been a Bronco for just five seasons, Morton is the Broncos' career passing leader in virtually all departments. Interception avoidance has been one of his strong points. Craig's percentage of .039 is the lowest in Denver history, and in 1978 he had a streak of 144 consecutive passes without an interception. Morton was voted the AFC Player of the Year after the 1977 season, in which he led the Broncos to the Super Bowl. A number one draft choice of the Dallas Cowboys in 1965, Morton spent nine full seasons in Dallas before being traded to the New York Giants six games into the 1974 campaign. He played eight games with New York in 1974 and was the Giants' quarterback in 1975 and 1976, before joining the Broncos prior to Denver's AFC championship season in 1977. Last year he was reunited with Dan Reeves who was a teammate of Morton's for eight seasons in Dallas.

COLLEGE: Craig was a consensus All-America at the University of California at Berkeley, where he played for current Kansas City coach Marv Levy. He earned three football letters and two more in baseball. Morton was a good enough baseball player to get a bonus offer to sign, but turned it down in favor of football. He graduated from Cal with a degree in speech.

PERSONAL: Craig and his wife Susan have two children, son Michael (10/4/79) and daughter Mary McKenna (5/5/82). He has many interests, including the oil business, which occupy his offseason time. Riley Odoms had another productive season in 1981, catching 38 passes for 516 yards and five touchdowns, averaging 13.6 yards per reception. He missed one game (Kansas City) due to injury. His best single-game performance last year was at Kansas City, when he caught seven passes for 74 yards. The only Denver offensive player to participate in four NFL Pro Bowl games, Odoms has been a model of consistency in his decade with the Broncos, having caught 30 or more passes for nine consecutive years. Dave Preston last year became the first Denver back since Otis Armstrong in 1976 to account for over 1,000 total yards rushing and receiving. Preston carried the ball 183 times for 640 yards, second highest total on the team, and he caught 52 passes for 507 yards and a 9.8 average. Tony Reed came to the Broncos in a trade with Kansas City on draft day, 1981 and caught the ball very well in a reserve role at running back. Reed caught 34 passes for 317 yards, a 9.3 average, trailing only Dave Preston in receptions by a Denver back. He was Denver's third leading rusher with 156 yards in 1981, playing in all but one of Denver's games last year. Fred Steinfort was Denver's leading scorer in 1981 with 87 points, hitting on 17 of 30 field goal attempts and converting 36 points after touchdowns. He had an early-season slump but rebounded strongly in the second half, hitting on 12 of his final 14 attempts. In 1980 he kicked 26 of 34 field goals attempted for a 76.5 success record, the highest in Denver history. His 110 points

scored in 1980 were the most by a Bronco since 1962, and Steinfort's field goal total of 26 is the second highest in team history (Gene Mingo kicked 27 in 1962). He has twice kicked four field goals in one game (at Cleveland, 10/5/80, and at Seattle, 12/21/80), and has kicked five longer than 50 yards, with the longest being 57 against Washington in 1980, ranking as a team and personal record. At Seattle in 1980 Fred kicked 55 and 53-yard field goals, tying several players in the NFL record book for most field goals of more than 50 yards in a single game. Bob Swenson came back from a year on injured reserve to have an outstanding season in 1981, making the AFC Pro Bowl team and being named All-Pro according to AP, NEA, and The Sporting News. He was Denver's second leading tackler with 145. trailing only fellow Pro Bowler Randy Gradishar. Swenson was in on a significant number of big plays last year, including three interceptions, three fumble recoveries, and three quarterback sacks. Billy Thompson, starting his 14th season in 1982, has been a Bronco longer than any other player in Denver history. He enters his 14th year after a 1981 campaign which earned him his third Pro Bowl appearance and a berth on the UPI All-AFC team. Since being a third round draft choice out of Maryland State (now Maryland-Eastern Shore) in 1969, he has started 142 consecutive regular season games, a team record and one of the longest consecutive game streaks currently running in the NFL. Last year he intercepted four passes, giving him a career total of 40 (second in the Denver record book to Goose Gonsoulin, who had 43), and he recovered two fumbles to give him a total of six turnovers. Thompson is the only player in NFL history to return four fumbles for touchdowns during a career. Billy now has accounted for 61 turnovers as a professional, and he has returned seven of them for scores. He recorded 91 tackles from his strong safety position last year, tops among Denver defensive backs, and again served as defensive captain, sharing that role with Randy Gradishar. As a rookie in 1969 Thompson led the American Football League in both punt returns and kickoff returns, the only player in pro football history to do so. Thompson has been voted All-AFC four times (1977, 1978, 1979, and 1981) and went to the Pro Bowl following the 1977, 1978, and 1981 seasons.

COLLEGE: Billy had a brilliant career at Maryland State. He was selected AII-CIAA three times as a defensive back and was MVP as a senior, twice earning NAIA AII-America honors. He played in the College AII-Star game in 1969. Billy also made AII-CIAA three times as a baseball center fielder and graduated with a degree in physical education and biology.

Rick Upchurch missed three games because of a sprained knee last year but still caught 32 passes for 550 yards and a 17.2 average, including three for touchdowns. Going into his eighth professional season, he now has caught 201 passes for 3,323 yards (a 16.5 average) and 19 TDs. He ranks sixth in number of catches and touchdowns in the Denver record book, and is fifth in yardage. He had two 100-yard games in 1981, catching five for 138 yards at Kansas City and six for 102 yards and two TDs at Chicago in the season finale. Upchurch's best pro game in number of catches came in 1979 against Kansas City (10/14/79). when he had eight receptions. His longest career reception came in the first game of his rookie year against Kansas City, when he caught a 90-yard TD pass. In that game he caught three passes for 153 yards, had 88 yards on three kickoff returns, 30 yards on a punt return, and 13 more on a flanker reverse. At game's end Upchurch had totaled 284 yards in handling the ball eight times, an average of 35.5 per touch. The NFL's all-time leading punt returner, Upchurch has gained 2,714 yards and averaged 11.8 yards per return in his career, taking six in for scores. He led the NFL in punt return average in both 1976 and 1978, both times with a 13.7 average. In 1976 he tied the NFL record for punt returns for TDs in a season (four) and in a game (two). A Pro Bowler in 1976, 1978, and 1979, Rick was named All-NFL each of those years and set a record with a 67-yard kickoff return against Dallas in Super Bowl XII. His 2,355 yards on kickoff returns for the Broncos trail only Floyd Little, who had 2,523 in his Denver career.

Steve Watson had a brilliant season in 1981, leading the AFC in pass reception yardage with 1,244 and, with Atlanta's Alfred Jenkins, pacing the entire league in reception touchdowns with 13. Watson's rise to prominence was one of the most remarkable stories in the NFL last year as the third year free agent from Temple moved into the Denver starting lineup in the second week of the season and rewrote the Bronco record books. He caught 60 passes and set new team records for reception yards (the previous record was 1,235, set by Lionel Taylor in 1960) and TDs (the previous record was 12 by Taylor in 1960). His 13 TDs tied the single season total recorded by Floyd Little in 1972 and 1973. Watson's career per catch average now is 20.5 over three seasons, which equals the top mark among all-time Denver receivers (set by Billy Van Heusen, 1968-76). Watson was named All-AFC by UPI, earned a trip to the Pro Bowl, and was voted the club's offensive MVP by his teammates. He had five 100-yard games, with his high yardage total of 182 coming on five catches against Detroit. Steve caught at least one pass in every game and had his pro high of eight for 178 yards against San Diego in Denver. He caught a 95-yard TD pass from Craig Morton against the Lions and a 93-yarder in that Chargers game, later setting yet another record with an 86-yard reception against Kansas City, which is the longest non-scoring pass in Bronco history. He caught three TD passes against Baltimore, scored twice in three other games, and had a streak of at least one TD pass in five straight games. Not drafted, Watson signed with Denver in 1979 and has played in every Bronco game since then, being used primarily as a special teams player until last year.

COLLEGE: Steve was a four-year letterman at wide receiver for Temple and was selected to the All-East team, playing in the East-West Shrine Game to close out his college career. He also won three letters and two conference championships as a long jumper, graduating with a degree in parks administration.



In 1981 Willhite made honorable mention All-America according to AP, The Sporting News, and The Football News, also earning first team All-Pacific Coast Athletic Association. He capped his college play with appearances in the East-West Shrine Game and the Olympia Gold Bowl, Willhite had 12 100-yard games in two years, and as a senior caught 18 passes for 124 yards in the California Bowl. He had his longest career run against Fresno State, a 74-yard touchdown jaunt. He scored 28 career TDs in just two seasons. As a junior Willhite was the only player nationally ranked in rushing (14th), pass receiving (9th), scoring (10th), and all-purpose running (6th), being named as the PCAA's offensive player of the year in 1980. He also was first team All-PCAA and honorable mention All-America (AP, The Sporting News) that year. He did not play organized football until his freshman year at

American River JC in Sacramento, Calif. In his two seasons there he rushed for over 1,400 yards and caught over 60 passes for 1,350 yards. He was named his team's MVP each year in his college career, also lettering four times in track as a sprinter. He was a recreation major at San Jose State. Born in Sacramento, Gerald graduated from Cordova HS in Rancho Cordova, Calif., where he lettered in track and wrestling. His brother Kevin, Parade Magazine's high school football player of the year in 1981, is entering Oregon State this September. Gerald's hobbies include fishing and horseback riding.



1981 NFL PAID ATTENDANCE IS RECORD 13,606,990 FOR HIGHEST AVERAGE EVER OF 60,745 FOR 224 GAMES

Official National Football League figures revealed that the NFL set a paid attendance record during the 1981 season.

Total paid attendance for 224 regular season games was 13,606,990 for an average of 60,745, the highest in the league's 62-year history and the first time the average has exceeded 60,000 in any season. The 1981 total bettered the previous record of 13,392,230 set in 1980. The 1981 record total represents 93.80 percent of NFL stadia capacity.

Paid attendance at all NFL games—including preseason, regular and postseason—surpassed 17 million for the first time. The total for 291 games was a record 17,223,212 for an average of 59,186.

Paid attendance for 10 postseason games was 637,763. The largest postseason crowd was the 81,270 that attended Super Bowl XVI at the Pontiac Silverdome and saw NFC Champion San Francisco defeat AFC Champion Cincinnati 26-21 for the NFL Championship and the Vince Lombardi Trophy.

The Detroit Lions led the NFL in home paid attendance with 612,635, followed closely by Buffalo with 612,276. Also over 600,000 were Cleveland at 611,884 and the New York Giants 604,294. Nine other teams exceeded 500,000, including Denver 596,344; Philadelphia 566,289; Tampa Bay 558,678; Los Angeles 538,407; Miami 512,645; Kansas City 512,505; Seattle 510,616; Dallas 508,352; and Chicago 507,163.

In the ninth season during which NFL games were made available to local television after selling out 72 hours in advance of kickoff, 160 of 224 regular season games were televised in the home team area. No-shows totaled 943,767 (7 percent).



SEPTEMBER 19 - Broncos open season with 10-10 tie against eventual Super Bowl entry, Miami, before first of seven sell-out crowds at Mile High Stadium. OCTOBER 24 — Denver coach Lou Saban and Broncos down Cleveland 27-0, on same field Saban starred as all-star linebacker in Cleveland. It was first time Browns were shut-out since 1952. Season ticket holders asked for additional 11.000 tickets-if they become available OCTOBER 14-Charley Johnson also becomes the 18th quarterback in profootball history to go over 20,000 yards lifetime as he connects for 214 yards plus three TDs to Haven Moses in a 48-20 win at Houston. OCTOBER 22 - With "Orange Monday" banners waving, the Broncos perhaps play the most important game to date in the club's history against Oakland on national television. Denver comes back to knot the contest, 23-23, on a 35-yard field goal by Jim Turner. NOVEMBER 25 - Denver defeats Kansas City, 14-10, on two Charley Johnson to Haven Moses passes to take over first place in the AFC West with three games to go. The win moves the Broncos to 6-3-2 — the six victories the second best mark ever for a Denver team to date DECEMBER 9 - Denver 42. San Diego 28! The Broncos are winners at last, as Denver clinches the team's seventh victory of the season, assuring the club of a winning year Jim Turner contributed 16 points in San Diego. DECEMBER 16 - A tie or loss would do no good in this afternoon's game in Oakland A win would give th Broncos the Western Division title in the AFC, but the Broncos lose 21-17

1974

JANUARY - Four Broncos, Floyd Little, Haven Moses, Riley Odoms and Paul Smith, are invited to play in the Pro Bowl, giving Denver good representation. In addition, John Ralston is named AFC Coach of the Year for guiding Denver to its first winning season ever. Odoms, incidentally, is named All-Pro by NEA. Additional honors go to Charley Johnson on offense and Paul Smith on defense for being the team's most valuable players as voted by their teammates. These two men are the 1973 winners of the Earl Hartman Memorial awards. JANUARY 29-30 - The Broncos draft with defense in mind as three of the team's first four choices are defenders paced by Ohio State linebacker Randy Gradishar. MARCH-Only 165 of the 48,000 season tickets sold are not renewed for 1974. Denver then sells an additional 1,000, bringing the total number of season tickets sold to 49,000. SEPTEMBER 10 - Denver voters pass a \$25 million bond issue to expand and improve Mile High Stadium to over 75,000 seats. The stadium was projected to be finished in time for the 1976 regular season. SEPTEMBER 22 - The Broncos and the Pittsburg Steelers play in the first regular season overtime game as a 35-35 score was present at the end of regulation play. Neither team scored in the sudden death period. NOVEMBER 28 — Before a television audience estimated at 35 million, the Broncos riddle the Detroit Lions 31-27 on Denver's first Thanksgiving Day game in Detroit. DECEMBER 8-Denver assures itself of the team's second consecutive winning season and Otis Armstrong sets a single game rushing mark of 183 yards as the Broncos down Houston 37-14.

DECEMBER 15—Although Denver loses at San Diego. Otis Armstrong finishes the season with 1407 yards and the NFL rushing title becoming one of a half dozen players ever to average more than 100 yards per game in profootball.

1975

JANUARY — Otis Armstrong and Riley Odoms represent the Broncos in the annual Pro Bowl game in Miami, Fla. Additional honors go to Armstrong as he is voted the top offensive player on the team. Tom Jackson was voted the top Defender and Ken Criter the top Specialist. FEBRUARY — Expansion of Mile High Stadium begins which will provide 63,500 capacity for the 1976 season and an ultimate capacity of 75,000 in 1977. SEPTEMBER 29 — The Broncos defeat Green Bay, 23-13, for their first victory ever on Monday Night Football. DECEMBER 14 — Playing his last home game as a Denver Bronco, Floyd Little goes out with a bang. The club's first No. 1 draft choice to sign, Little rushes for 56 yards and one TD. catches five passes for 94 yards, including a 66-yard touchdown, to lead the Broncos to a 25-10 win over Philadelphia. Little winds up his career as the seventh all-time rusher in the NFL with 6,323 yards.

1976

JANUARY 26-Tight end Riley Odoms and linebacker Randy Gradishar are the Broncos representatives in the Pro Bowl in New Orleans. For Odoms, it is the third straight year he has played in the game, while Gradishar, making his first appearance, keeps alive the string of John Ralston's first draft choices playing in the game after their second year in the league. MARCH 28 - Quarterback Charley Johnson announces his retirement from the National Football League after a 15-year career. Johnson led the club to its first two winning seasons in 1973 and 1974. APRIL 21 - Season ticket sales are cut off at 62,215, assuring the Broncos of their seventh straight sellout season. JUNE 27 - Lyle Alzado is one of three finalists for the man of the Year Award and Rick Upchurch is honored as the American Conference Offensive Rookie of the Year by the NFL Players Association at its annual banquet in Chicago. SEPTEMBER 19 - In the expanded Mile High Stadium, the Broncos whip the Jets, 46-3, before 62,669 fans, the largest crowd ever to witness a sporting event in the state of Colorado. The record will fall for each of the next three home games, the final mark being 63,431 against Oakland on October 17. SEPTEMBER 26 - Rick Upchurch ties an NFL record by returning two punts for touchdowns in a 44-13 win over the visiting Cleveland Browns. OCTOBER 24 - Rick Upchurch ties an NFL record with his fourth punt return touchdown of the season in a 35-26 win over Kansas City, NOVEMBER 7-With two field goals and six extra points, Jim Turner becomes the fifth player in pro football history to surpass 1,200 points in a 48-13 win over Tampa Bay. NOVEMBER 14 - The Broncos blank San. Diego, 17-0, for Denver's second shutout of the season, a figure matching the team's total in its first 16 years of play. DECEMBER 12 - The Broncos stop Chicago, 28-14, for the ninth win of the season, highest total in Denver history. Otis Armstrong rushes for 116 yards to reach 1,008 for the season, his second 1,000-yard year in his career. DECEMBER 18-Fred Gehrke, long-time Bronco administrator, is named general manager as the club divides duties of head coach and general manager for the first time since 1967

1977

JANUARY 17—Rick Upchurch and Otis Armstrong are the Bronco participants in the annual AFC-NFC Pro Bowl in Seattle, won by the AFC. 24-14. JANUARY 31—John Ralston resigns as Head Coach of the Denver Broncos. FEBRUARY 1—Robert (Red) Miller, a former Bronco assistant coach, is named as the team's eighth head coach. FEBRUARY 4—Carroll Hardy, director of scouting for the Broncos, is named director of player personnel. FEBRUARY 7—Former Bronco great Floyd Little is inducted into the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame. MARCH 13—Ticket Manager Gail Stuckey announces that only 449 of 62.215 season tickets sold in 1976 were not renewed for 1977. Sales of additional tickets available because of stadium expansion. APRIL 7—In a Denver Post series by Irv Moss, it is revealed that the Broncos generated revenues of more than \$891,000 for the city of Denver in 10 home games in 1976, making the Broncos the top

producer of revenue for the city of Denveramong tenants of special events facilities. JUNE 12 - Lyle Alzado is named winner of the National Football League Players Association's Byron (Whizzer) White Award as the group's Man of the Year. Rick Upchurch is honored at the same Chicago banquet as the NFL's top punt returner. SEPTEMBER 18 — The Broncos open their season before a record crowd of 75,007 in Mile High Stadium, shutting out the St. Louis Cardinals, 7-0. OCTOBER 16 - Pushing their season record to 5-0, the Broncos use seven interceptions and a touchdown pass to kicker Jim Turner to trounce the defending world champion Oakland Raiders, 30-7. NOVEMBER 27 - In a showdown of the two best records in the NFL, the Broncos get a 73-yard interception return for a touchdown by Tom Jackson to dump Baltimore, 27-13, and run their record to 10-1. DECEMBER 4 — With a 24-14 win at Houston, the Broncos clinch a playoff berth, first in the club's history. Later in the day, the Broncos clinch the AFC Western Division championship when the Raiders fall to the Los Angeles Rams. DECEMBER 18 - The Broncos lose to Dallas in the regular season finale, 14-6, but post the best record in the history of the franchise, 12-2, tied with Dallas for the best in the NFL. DECEMBER 24 - Before the largest crowd ever to watch a sporting event in the state of Colorado. 75.011, the Broncos stop the Pittsburgh Steelers in the first round of playoff action, 34-21

1978

JANUARY 1- "The miracle has happened," said KOA sports director Bob Martin "The Broncos are going to the Super Bowl" In a hard-fought game at Mile High Stadium, the Broncos dethrone the Raiders, 20-17, for the AFC championship and a trip to the Super Bowl in New Orleans. JAN-UARY 15 -- "We'll be back" and "We love our Broncos" the Denver faithful chant as the Broncos fall to the Cowboys 27-10 in the Super Bowl JANUARY 23 - Lyle Alzado, Randy Gradishar, Tom Jackson, Billy Thompson and Louis Wright represent the Broncos in the Pro Bowl, the largest Denver contingent in history. MARCH - Only 143 season tickets are not renewed, a new all-time low, according to ticket manager Gail Stuckey SEPTEMBER 3-Broncos open defense of title by beating Oakland, 14-6 in Mile High Stadium. OCTOBER 29 — Broncos beat Seattle, 20-17 in overtime, becoming the first NFL team ever to participate in three overtime contests in one season. DECEMBER 3-Broncos win by 21-6 score at Oakland, holding the Raiders without a touchdown for the second time in the season, and moving within one game of AFC West crown. DECEMBER 10-Denver downs Kansas City, 24-3, winning second straight division championship, as QB Craig Morton goes 19-for-22 with 16 straight completions, both second best all-time NFL marks. DECEMBER 30 - Denver loses in the playoffs to eventual Super Bowl champion Pittsburgh Steelers, 33-10.

1979

JANUARY 29 - Broncos are represented by an all-time high of seven players in the NFL Pro Bowl, including Lyle Alzado, Randy Gradishar, Tom Jackson, Riley Odoms, Bill Thompson, Rick Upchurch, and Louis Wright. MARCH - Only 161 season tickets are not renewed, according to Ticket Manager Gail Stuckey, virtually assuring the Broncos of their tenth straight sellout season. OCTOBER 7 - Denver shuts out San Diego, 7-0, marking first time ever for Broncos to record two shutouts in one season. Denver had opened the campaign with 10-0 win over Cincinnati. NOVEMBER 11 - Rick Upchurch becomes the all-time pro football record holder in career punt return yardage. He set the record vs. New England, surpassing the late Emlen Tunnell's total of 2.209 yards. Upchurch concluded 1979 play with 2,288 career punt return yards. DECEMBER 17-San Diego defeats Denver by a 17-7 margin on final Monday night game of the season. winning Western Division title in the process. However, Denver clinched a playoff berth for the third straight year. DECEMBER 23 - Denver loses in wild card playoff game at Houston, 13-7.

1980

JANUARY 27—The Broncos are represented in the Pro Bowl game by Randy Gradishar. Tom Jackson, Rick Upchurch, and Louis Wright. MARCH—Ticket Manager Gail Stuckey announces that only 146 season tickets are not renewed for 1980, virtually assuring the club of its 11th

consecutive sellout campaign. SEPTEMBER 14 — Denver defeats Dallas, 41-20, the first Bronco victory over the Cowboys in regular season history OCTOBER 5 — Randy Gradishar returns interception 93 yards for a touchdown vs. Cleveland, the longest such return in team history and the NFL's longest for 1980 season. OCTOBER 13 — Fred Steinfort kicks 57-yard field goal, tying record for third-longest kick in NFL history DECEMBER 21 — Steinfort kicks 53 and 55-yard field goals. becoming just sixth man in NFL history to kick two field goals from beyond 50 yards.


1981

JANUARY - Fred Steinfort is named by Pro Football Weekly as that publication's Golden Toe Award winner for the 1980 season, having tied for the league lead with 26 field goals. FEBRUARY 25 - At a news conference at the Broncos' complex, Edgar F, Kaiser, Jr. is introduced as the new owner of the Denver Broncos, having purchased the club from principal owners Gerald H Phipps and Allan R. Phipps. MARCH 10-Grady Alderman is named new General Manager of the Broncos and Dan Reeves is named as the new Head Coach. Alderman came to the Broncos from the Minnesota Vikings, where he was Director of Planning and Development Reeves came to Denver from the Dallas Cowboys, where he had been offensive coordinator. MARCH - Ticket Manager Gail Stuckey announces that the Broncos are sold out for their 12th consecutive season. SEPTEMBER - Craig Morton throws four touchdown passes in each of two consecutive games, vs. Baltimore and San Diego, a first in franchise history Wide receiver Steve Watson ties a team record with three touchdown receptions against the Colts on September 20. NOVEMBER 22 - Watson catches a touchdown pass at Cincinnati to set a new team record with 13 TD catches in one season. DECEMBER 20 - Watson gains 82 yards on receptions at Chicago, establishing a new Bronco single season mark with 1,244 reception yards. Denver finishes with a 10-6 record for the third time in four seasons. Individually, Morton set single season records for yards gained (3.213), yards passing (3.195), and average gain per play (8.37), while Watson led the AFC in reception yardage and in touchdown receptions (13).

1982

JANUARY 31—The Broncos are represented in the Pro Bowl game by Randy Gradishar. Bob Swenson. Bill Thompson, and Steve Watson. MARCH—Ticket Manager Gail Stuckey announces that only 49 season ticket accounts have not been renewed for 1982, virtually assuring the Broncos of their 13th consecutive sellout season in Mile High Stadium.

MILE HIGH STADIUM

Mile High Stadium, home of the Denver Broncos, once again was filled for every home date during the 1981 National Football League regular season. The Broncos brought their consecutive regular season sellout streak to 88 games and concluded 12 years of sellouts at Mile High Stadium.

Expansion of the stadium, begun in 1975, was completed for the 1977 season to give the Broncos the seventh largest home facility in the league.

Denver voters passed a \$25 million bond issue in 1974 to expand and improve the stadium from its capacity of 51,706 to 75,123. The stadium held 63,532 for the 1976 season, halfway through the project.

Making Mile High Stadium unique, however, is its movable east stands. The east stands move in a single section which, when fully extended, is in a horseshoe configuration for football. When the section is retracted, the stadium is in position for baseball.

The dynamics involved in the move are fascinating. First, bear in mind that the east stands section is a three-tiered structure, 535 feet long, 135 feet tall and 200 feet deep, weighing nearly nine million pounds. Second, the stands must be moved a distance of 145 feet.

How is it done? The answer, says DMJM-Phillips-Reister, the engineering-architectural firm in charge of the project, is water.

More than 90,000 square feet of runways serve as the operating surfaces over which the stands will move. Water is pumped onto the runways and form a .003 inch sheet upon which the stands rest. Hydraulic rams then push the stands forward at the rate of three feet per minute, making the move last somewhere around two hours.

Originally called Bears Stadium, the facility was built in 1948 for the Denver Bears of baseball's old Western League, with longrange plans to utilize it for football as well. When Denver became a charter member of the American Football League in 1959, the south stands (8,100 seats) and portable east stands (9,616 seats) were added to give a capacity of 34,657 for football.

After Denver voters turned down a stadium bond issue to build an all-purpose metropolitan stadium in 1967, a non-profit group began a fund-raising drive with the goal of purchasing the stadium for the city.

In February of 1968, the group bought the stadium from Rocky Mountain Empire Sports for \$1.8 million and presented it to the city of Denver. A 16,000-seat upper deck was immediately constructed over the west stands, raising the capacity to over 50,000 for the 1968 season. In December of 1968, the stadium was renamed Denver Mile High Stadium.



SCHEDULING

The Master NFL schedule, as it applies to the Denver Broncos (and also to the other AFC West teams) for 1983 is as follows:

EACH TEAM:

A. Home-and-home games with the four teams in the AFC West (Denver, Kansas City, Oakland, San Diego, and Seattle). Total: 8 games.

B. One game with teams #1-4 (referring to placings) in a division of the other conference. In 1983, this will be the NFC East. Sites will depend upon order of finish within the divisions (see subsequent notes). This step does not apply to the fifth place team in the AFC West.

FIRST PLACE TEAM IN AFC WEST:

B. *Home and away: One game each against NFC East #1, NFC East #2, NFC East #3, NFC East #4. Total: 4 games.

C. One game with each of the two other first place teams in the AFC and each of the two other fourth place teams in the AFC. Home: AFC East #1. AFC Central #4. Away: AFC East #3, AFC Central #1. Total: 4 games.

SECOND PLACE TEAM IN AFC WEST:

B. *Home and away: One game each against NFC East #1. NFC East #2. NFC East #3, NFC East #4. Total: 4 games.

C. One game with each of the two other second place teams in the AFC and each of the two other third place teams in the AFC. Home: AFC East #2, AFC Central #3. Away: AFC East #3. AFC Central #2. Total: 4 games.

THIRD PLACE TEAM IN AFC WEST:

B. 'Home and away: One game each against NFC East #1, NFC East #2, NFC East #3, NFC East #4. Total: 4 games.

C. One game with each of the two other second place teams in the AFC and each of the two other third place teams in the AFC. Home: AFC East #3, AFC Central #1. Away: AFC East #2, AFC Central #4. Total: 4 games.

FOURTH PLACE TEAM IN AFC WEST:

B. *Home and away: One game each against NFC East #1, NFC East #2, NFC East #3, NFC East #4. Total: 4 games.

C. One game with each of the two other first place teams in the AFC and each of the two other fourth place teams in the AFC. Home: AFC East #4. AFC Central #1. Away: AFC East #1, AFC Central #4. Total: 4 games.

FIFTH PLACE TEAM IN AFC WEST:

B. One game with each of teams #1-4 of the four team division in the AFC. Home: AFC Central #1, AFC Central #3. Away: AFC Central #2, AFC Central #4. Total: 4 games.

C. Home-and-home games with the other fifth place team in the AFC. Home: AFC East #5. Away: AFC East #5. Total: 2 games.

D. One game with each of the fifth place teams in the NFC. Home: NFC East #5. Away: NFC Central #5. Total: 2 games.

*For interconference games between teams 1 through 4 in a division, sites will be assigned so that those teams will not play a second consecutive home or road game with the interconference opponents played in 1980. when the same divisions were last paired (AFC East-NFC West, AFC Central-NFC Central, AFC West-NFC East).

Note: A "Proxy Team" is a team which played a 5th place schedule in 1980. If this team finishes 1 through 4 in a division in 1982, it will inherit the site priorities from the team in the division that finishes 5th.

Broncos Radio Network

For the thirteenth consecutive season, Denver's 50-thousand watt station KOA (850) will serve as the flagship station for the Denver Broncos game broadcast network.

Bob Martin, radio "voice" of the Broncos since 1964, will again be calling the play-by-play account of the games, with Larry Zimmer, who joined the broadcast team in 1971, again doing the color commentary.

Martin was named Colorado Sportscaster of the Year for the thirteenth consecutive year in 1981.

When making requests for working press credentials, please allow time for mailing. Press credentials are normally issued approximately 10 days before the game. Should transmission facilities be required, please arrange for same through local representatives.

WORKING PRESS: Admittance to the Broncos' press box is restricted to the WORKING PRESS ONLY. Credentials are marked with a row and seat number. Passes are non-transferable.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photographers are asked to take special note of the following conditions for use of press credentials, as set by the National Football League:

"This working credential is issued to an organization for the sole purpose of providing stadium access to an accredited individual who has a legitimate working function (media or game service) in connection with this game. It is non-transferable. Any unauthorized use of this credential subjects the bearer to ejection

from the stadium and prosecution for criminal trespass.

Any secondary non-editorial use of any picture, film/tape or drawing of the game taken or made by the accredited organization or individual to whom this credential has been issued (including but not limited to use in advertising, sales promotion or merchandising) is prohibited without prior specific written approval of the National Football League. Additionally, television stations are prohibited from making available game film or tape to any other organization even though the planned use may be editorial in nature without advance written permission from the NFL or one of its member clubs. Such film or tape may be aired only by the specific station or entity to whom this credential is issued.

Television stations filming or taping NFL games recognize that any films or tapes may only be used in connection with a regularly scheduled television newscast within a seven-day period following the game and the film clip or taped portion of each such showing will not exceed two (2) minutes in length.

Additionally, television stations agree not to use more than six (6) minutes of filmed or taped "same-day" highlights from NFL games on any regularly scheduled news programs (i.e. no more than six minutes of highlights on Sunday night). This is the only exception to the two-minute limitation.

Television stations wishing to use NFL film or tape in any other manner must obtain written permission for such usage from the National Football League.

Acceptance of the credential constitutes agreement by the bearer and his organization to abide by the foregoing conditions. Thank you for your cooperation."

Sideline photo passes will be tightly controlled by the Public Relations Department and are generally limited to photographers shooting for a daily newspaper, wire service, or magazine of national circulation on specific assignment.
