PRESIDENT AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

PAT BOWLEN President and Chief Executive Officer

A new era in Denver Broncos history began on March 23, 1984 when Pat Bowlen was introduced as the new majority owner of the National Football League team, which last year celebrated its 25th season in professional football.

He immediately put his own mark on the Broncos, establishing a solid administration and creating a positive atmosphere that was a major factor in Denver's 13-3 record and the AFC Western Division championship. His first Bronco team set franchise records for both victories (13) and consecutive wins (10), while leading the entire NFL in actual in-stadium attendance (585, 233)



Bowlen, 41, acquired 100% ownership of the Broncos in July of 1985. He is active in day to day operations of the football club.

Born in Prairie du Chien, Wis., he attended high school there and went on to the University of Oklahoma, where he earned degrees in both business (1965) and law (1968).

Bowlen has real estate and natural resource holdings in Alberta, as well as real estate holdings in Colorado, Arizona, and California.

He is President and Director of Batoni-Bowlen Enterprises Ltd. and Bowlen Holdings Ltd., both of Edmonton, as well as Bowlen Holdings, Inc., which is a California firm. Bowlen also is Chairman of the Board and Director of Hambledon Estates Limited.

In addition, he is President and Director of Landsea Oil and Gas Ltd., College Plaza Development Ltd., Renaissance Development Ltd., and B.B.M. Properties Ltd. Bowlen serves as a director for several firms, including Regent Drilling Limited of Edmonton.

An outstanding athlete in his own right, he has competed in the Ironman Triathlon—an event in which one must swim 2.4 miles, ride 112 miles on a bicycle, and run 26.2 miles, all consecutively—as well as in other triathlon races and several marathons.

Bowlen is a member of several clubs and societies, including the Young President's Organization, the Canadian and Edmonton Bar Associations, and the Law Society of Alberta.

In addition to his Denver home, he also maintains residences in Honolulu, Hawaii, and Edmonton, Alberta.



VICE PRESIDENT/HEAD COACH

DAN REEVES Vice President / Head Coach

Dan Reeves enters 1985 on the strength of a 13-3 record and the American Football Conference Western Division title in 1984, having earned Coach of the Year honors (Kansas City 101 Club, Pro Football Weekly, Sports Illustrated, Football News, College and Pro Football Newsweekly) for his efforts last year.

Reeves was named by Bronco President and Chief Executive Officer Pat Bowlen as a Vice President of the club on February 18.

Thus, the Denver mentor comes into 1985 with a broadened role after having presided over a campaign that saw his club set 13 team records, including most wins (13), most consecu-

tive wins (10), and most touchdowns scored (42).

The Broncos' 1984 playoff appearance was their second straight under Reeves, who guided the youngest club in the National Football League to the best record in franchise history. The Denver coach led his club to a 9-7 mark and a wild card playoff berth in 1983, finishing second in the UPI AFC coach of the Year voting in that campaign.

Reeves, who enters his fifth season at the Broncos' helm this year, was the youngest coach in the NFL when he assumed command of the club in 1981, guiding Denver to a 10-6 record and barely missing a playoff berth in that inaugural campaign.

In the strike-shortened 1982 season Denver finished 2-7, so Reeves enters the coming year with a record of 34-23 and a winning percentage of .596, which ranks eighth among active NFL coaches.

Recognized as one of the most successful offensive coaches in the NFL, Reeves spent his earlier professional career, both as a player and as a coach, with the Dallas Cowboys. He was offensive coordinator for the Cowboys for three seasons, years when the Dallas offense was consistently at or near the top of the NFL.

Reeves had been a member of the Dallas coaching staff since 1970, when he undertook the difficult dual role of player-coach for two seasons. He was full-time offensive backfield coach in 1972, but spent the 1973 season in private business before rejoining the staff, again as backfield coach, in 1974.

In 1977, he took on the job of offensive coordinator where his duties included coaching the quarterbacks and wide receivers.

A native of Americus, GA. (1/19/44), Reeves began his pro career as a free agent running back in 1965. He had been a quarter-back at the University of South Carolina as a college player and was inducted into South Carolina's Hall of Fame six years ago.

Reeves was an all-purpose offensive back during his eight seasons (1965-72) on the Dallas roster. He rushed for 1,990 yards and 25 TDs. and caught 129 passes for 1,693 yards and 17 TDs.

Because of his collegiate QB background, Reeves was also a respected halfback option passer, completing 30 such attempts for a pair of TDs during his career. In addition, he returned some kickoffs and punts along the way, and played in the NFL championship games of 1966, 1967, 1970, and 1971. He has played or coached in five Super Bowls.

Reeves and wife Pam are the parents of three children, daughters Dana (9/21/65) and Laura (9/19/70) and son Lee (11/4/67).


ASSISTANT COACHES

MARVIN BASS Special Assistant

With over 40 years experience as a coach and administrator in college and pro football, Marvin Bass this year returns to the position of special assistant. He served the Broncos in that capacity in 1982-83, and was the head offensive line coach last year.

Bass came to Denver from the Canadian Football League, where he had been defensive coordinator of the Calgary Stampeders from 1978-

1981.



In addition to William and Mary, Bass coached on the college level at North Carolina, Georgia Tech, South Carolina, and the University of Richmond. While head coach at South Carolina Bass coached Dan Reeves, who was the starting quarterback for the Gamecocks.

On the pro level, he was on the Buffalo Bills staff from 1969-71 and spent two years with the Birmingham franchise in the World Football League, including one season as head coach (1975). After the WFL ceased operations Bass rejoined the Buffalo Bills, this time as Director of Pro Scouting from 1975-77, prior to moving to Calgary in 1978.

Marvin and his wife, Audrey, have one son, Randy, and two grandsons. Lee and Rhett.

JOE COLLIER Assistant Head Coach/Defense

The senior member of the Denver Broncos' coaching staff, Joe Collier was promoted to the position of assistant head coach/defense prior to the 1982 campaign. Recognized as the mastermind of Denver's strong defensive unit, Collier begins his 17th season with the Broncos in 1985.

Collier is one of only five original AFL coaches still active in the NFL. He is the only active coach who has

spent all 25 years with AFL or AFC teams. Collier was on Lou Saban's staff at Western Illinois from 1957 through 1959, then moved with Saban to the Boston Patriots in 1960-61, and on to Buffalo in 1962.

He served as head coach of the Bills in 1966-67-68, then rejoined Saban's staff with the Broncos in 1969.

Collier was an All-Big Ten selection as an end during his college days at Northwestern, and played in the Senior Bowl and the East-West Shrine game. Drafted by the New York Giants, he chose instead to spend the next two years in the Army, after which he joined the coaching ranks at Western Illinois.

Joe and his wife, Shirley, have three children, Julie, Lisa and

Joe.

CHAN GAILEY Special Teams/Defensive Assistant

Chan Gailey is in his first season as the Denver Broncos special teams coach and defensive assistant, having come to the club from Troy State in Troy, Ala., where he was head coach from 1983-84, winning the NCAA Division II national championship last season.

Gailey began his coaching career as the defensive backfield coach at Troy State in 1976-77, before moving

on to the Air Force Academy as the Falcons' secondary coach in 1978. Gailey rose to the position of defensive coordinator with the Falcons in 1981, and returned to Troy State in 1983.

A native of Americus, Ga., Gailey earned 12 varsity letters at Americus High School before entering the University of Florida, where he earned his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1974. He earned three letters at Florida, two as a quarterback and one as a special teams player.

Gailey served as a graduate assistant at Florida in 1974 and 1975, with the Gators going to the Sugar Bowl in 1974 and the

Gator Bowl the following year.

Chan and his wife Laurie have two sons, Tate and Andrew.

ALEX GIBBS Head Offensive Line

Alex Gibbs is in his second year as offensive line coach for the Broncos, coming to the club from the University of Georgia, where he was offensive line coach in 1982-83.

Prior to moving to Georgia, he was the offensive coordinator at Auburn from 1979-81, also working as the offensive line coach and as quarterback coach during his tenure there.

Gibbs also is a former offensive coordinator and line coach at Ohio State (1975-7.8), and he has held coaching positions at West Virginia (1973-74), Kentucky (1971-72), and Duke (1969-70).

He began his career as the head coach at Mount Airy (N.C.) High School from 1966-68, where his teams won three conference championships and two state titles.

A graduate of Davidson College in 1963, Gibbs earned his master's degree from the University of North Carolina in 1964.

Alex is married (Woo) and has five children, daughter Sandy and sons Steve, David, Chuck and Mark.

STAN JONES **Defensive Line**

One of the leading linemen in the National Football League in his playing days, Stan Jones is marking his 32nd consecutive year in pro football

This is the 15th season as defensive line coach of the Broncos for Jones, who is on his second tour of duty in the Mile High City.

Jones served on the Bronco staff under Lou Saban from 1967 to 1971,





spent the next four years with Saban in Buffalo, then rejoined the Broncos in 1976.

Jones was an All-American tackle at Maryland in 1953 and was named the nation's Lineman of the Year. In 1977, he was named to the Atlantic Coast Conference's 25-year All-Star team. He has been honored by the Maryland Alumni Association as Man of the Year, and is a member of Pennsylvania's Sports Hall of Fame.

He played 12 years with the Chicago Bears and one with the Washington Redskins, gaining All-Pro honors as an offensive guard four times and appearing in seven Pro Bowls.

Stan and his wife, Darlis, have a daughter, Sherrie, and two sons, Kevin and Troy.

AL MILLER Strength/Conditioning

Al Miller joins the Broncos as the strength and conditioning coach in 1985, coming to Denver from the University of Alabama, where he held a similar position from 1982-84.

Prior to moving to Alabama Miller was the strength and conditioning coach at Northeast Louisiana in 1981 and Mississippi State in 1980. He spent 1979 in private business, after working as linebacker and strength



coach at Northwestern Louisiana in 1974-78. Miller coached on the high school and junior high school levels in 1969-73.

Miller, a native of El Dorado, Ark., received his master's and bachelor's degrees from Northeast Louisiana, graduating from the school in 1970.

Al and his wife Janis have a son, Carey Brian, and a daughter, Lisa.

MYREL MOORE Linebackers

Myrel Moore will be in his tenth season on the Denver Broncos' coaching staff in 1985, and this campaign will mark his eighth as the club's linebacker coach. He coached the linebackers in 1983-84 after having rejoined the Broncos as an offensive line coach in 1982.

His previous stint in Denver came from 1972-77. Moore coached the offensive line and special teams in

1972, then took over as linebacker coach the following year.

He was a tight end and linebacker at the University of California-Davis from 1954-56 and played defensive back for the Washington Redskins in 1957-58 before beginning his coaching career.

Moore joined the staff at Santa Ana JC in 1959 and became head coach in 1963 before moving on to the University of California, where he coached from 1964-71.

He was on the Oakland Raiders' staff in 1978-79 before returning to the Broncos as a scout in 1981.

Myrel is married (Sondra) and has four children, daughters Michelle, Meagan, and Mayce, and a son Michael.

NICK NICOLAU Running Backs

Nick Nicolau once again will coach Bronco running backs this year, having assumed that role in 1982 after joining the club as a special assistant the previous season.

A veteran of 27 years as a coach on every level-high school, small college, major college, and both the NFL and Canadian Football League-Nicolau came to Denver from the New Orleans Saints, where he coached in 1980.

He was Director of Player Personnel and running back coach at Montreal (CFL) in 1978-79, with the Alouettes winning the conference championship and playing in the Grey Cup both years.

Nicolau was a running back at Southern Connecticut State College and began his coaching career there in 1960 after coaching in high school for two years.

Nick graduated from Southern Connecticut after serving in the United States Marine Corps. He went on to earn a master's degree from Indiana University and a doctorate from Springfield College.

Nicolau and his wife Eleanor have four daughters, Tracy, Shari, Vickie, and Wendy, and two sons, Duane and Randy.

MIKE SHANAHAN Offensive Coordinator/Wide Receivers and Quarterbacks

Mike Shanahan is in his second season with Denver and his first as offensive coordinator, having come to the club from the University of Florida, where he was the offensive coordinator and assistant head coach in 1983.

Shanahan had been Florida's offensive coordinator since 1980, and in 1983 the Gators set an NCAA offensive record with 4,540 total yards, pro-

ducing a 9-2-1 mark. Starting quarterback Wayne Peace set a national mark under Shanahan's tutelage, completing 70.7 percent of his passes.

A native of Oak Park, III., Shanahan graduated from Eastern Illinois in 1974 and earned a master's degree there in 1975.

He began his coaching career at Oklahoma in 1975-76, serving as an offensive backfield and receivers coach for the Sooners.

Shanahan was Northern Arizona's offensive backfield coach in 1977 and served as offensive coordinator at Eastern Illinois in 1978 and at Minnesota in 1979.

Mike and his wife, Peggy, have two children, son Kyle and daughter Krystal, and the family makes its home in Aurora.

DOC URICH Tight Ends/Assistant Offensive Line

Doc Urich takes over as Denver's tight end and assistant offensive line coach after having rejoined the Broncos during the 1984 preseason as a special teams coach. He was Denver's defensive line coach from 1972-75, offensive line coach in 1976, and director of pro scouting in 1977.

Urich began his coaching career at Miami (Ohio), where he played from 1948-50. He was a coach for the Red-

skins in 1951-54 before moving on to coach at Northwestern from 1955-63 and Notre Dame in 1964-65. Urich was the head coach at the University of Buffalo in 1966-68 and at Northern Illinois from 1969-70. He moved on to the NFL Buffalo Bills in 1971, where he coached the defensive line prior to coming to Denver.

After his first stint with the Broncos, Urich joined the Washington Redskins as the defensive coordinator and line coach in 1978-80. He became Green Bay's defensive line coach in 1981 and held the

position through the 1983 season.

Urich and his wife Pat have a daughter, Cynthia, and a son, Danny.

CHARLIE WEST Defensive Backs

Charlie West, who concluded his NFL playing career as a Bronco defensive back in 1978-79, is in his third year as the club's defensive backfield coach in 1985.

West came to Denver from the University of California, where he coached outside linebackers and coordinated special teams in 1982. He spent the previous season as the defensive backfield coach at Macalester College in St. Paul, Minn.



He had a 12-year NFL career that began with Minnesota from 1968-73 and continued with Detroit from 1974-77 before West was traded to the Broncos.

A second-round draft choice from the University of Texas at El Paso, West won 10 letters at UTEP, where he was one of that school's greatest athletes, and was named All-America by The Sporting News.

He has the unique distinction of also having played professional baseball, spending the 1968 baseball season in the Cincinnati

Reds organization as an outfielder.

Charlie and his wife, Barbara, have two children, son Michael and daughter Sandra.

ADMINISTRATION

JOHN BEAKE General Manager

John Beake begins his seventh Denver Broncos campaign in his new role as the NFL club's General Manager, capping a 16-year career in professional football as both coach and administrator.

As General Manager, he is responsible for all day-to-day operations of club administration and concentrates his efforts in the area of contract negotiations, an area in which he has considerable experience.

John was Assistant General Manager in 1984 and was the Broncos' Director of Football Operations the previous year, so his new role is the culmination of a steady rise within the organization.

He joined the Broncos in 1979 as the Director of Pro Personnel and became Director of Player Personnel in 1981, having concentrated on the coaching aspects of the game prior to coming to Denver.

An assistant coach for the Kansas City Chiefs from 1968 through 1974, John was the offensive backfield coach for the New Orleans Saints in 1976-77.

On the college level, he coached at Penn State in 1961-62 and was the offensive coordinator at Colorado State University in 1975. John coached on the high school level for six years prior to joining the Penn State staff in 1961.

He has a degree from Trenton State College in New Jersey and a

master's degree from Penn State.

John and his wife, Marcia, have three children, Jerilyn, Chip, and Christopher, and the family makes its home in Fort Collins, Colo.

REED JOHNSON Coordinator of College Scouting

Reed Johnson, who enters his fifth season with the Denver Broncos in 1985, is the Coordinator of College Scouting for the NFL club and as such is in charge of Denver's entire scouting program.

He came to Denver as special teams coach in 1981 and served as Coordinator of Pro Scouting in 1982.

Johnson spent eight years as a scout for the Dallas Cowboys before coming to Denver. Prior to his stint

with Dallas, he was an assistant coach on the college level at New Mexico. Oklahoma State, and Tulsa.

A graduate of the University of Colorado, Johnson played in the Buffaloes' defensive backfield for four years and was a member of the school's Big Eight championship team in 1961.

He coached high school football in Texas for five seasons, including four at Highland Park High School in Dallas, where Johnson himself had played on a state championship team in 1957.

Reed has two daughters, Jill, 21, and Holly, 19. He and and his wife Peggy reside in Denver.

CARROLL HARDY Coordinator of Combine Scouting

Carroll Hardy, the Coordinator of Combine Scouting for the Broncos, begins his 22nd year with the club in 1985.

A 10-letter winner at the University of Colorado, Hardy is considered one of the greatest athletes ever to play in the state of Colorado.

He played pro football for the San Francisco 49ers and major league baseball with the Cleveland Indians, Boston Red Sox, Houston Astros, and

Minnesota Twins, in 1960 earning a niche in sports history by becoming the only man ever to pinch hit for Ted Williams.

A native of South Dakota, Hardy is a member of the Sports Halls of Fame in both South Dakota and Colorado.

Carroll and his wife, Janice, have three children, Jay, Jill, and Lisa, and make their home in Boulder.





Ray Alexander had a fine rookie season in 1984, catching eight passes for 132 yards and one touchdown. His first receptions as a professional came against San Diego (11/11), including one that set up the winning touchdown. Alexander caught his first scoring pass the next week against Minnesota (11/18), and followed that with a 41-yard reception against Seattle (11/25) that put Denver into position to tie the score before halftime. Bronco coaches were impressed with Alexander's ability to catch the football, noting that the receiver has "soft" hands. He joined the team five weeks into the season, after having been one of the last cuts of the 1984 training camp.

COLLEGE: Ray holds Florida A&M's career and single season receiving records, and he was a three-time Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference selection. Keith Bishop had another fine season as the Broncos' starting left guard in 1984, starting 14 of the 16 games in which he played. Bishop was unable to start twice due to a muscle tear in his right foot, although he continued to do all the long snapping in those contests. He was one of the key players in a line that allowed the fewest number of quarterback sacks (35) for Denver since the 1973 campaign. Bishop is recognized by Bronco coaches and

trainers as an unselfish player, and last year he was named as Denver's winner of the Ed Block Memorial Award for Courage. He missed the entire 1981 season with a torn tendon on the bottom of his right foot and was hampered by tendonitis of the knee throughout the 1982 campaign. Bishop is known for his aggressive attitude and is a hard worker, which is reflected in the consistency of his play. In addition to his starting guard role, Bishop is also the Bronco's long snapper in all kicking situations and is considered by Denver coaches to be the best in the NFL in that capacity. Bishop can bench press his body weight over 17 times and participated in NBC's World's Strongest Man contest in 1981, placing sixth overall and winning the sumo wrestling championship of the United States Sumo Wrestling Association in the process.

Billy Bryan had another outstanding season as the catalyst in Denver's offensive line in 1984 and once again started all 16 games,

Steve Busick had an outstanding season in 1984, leading the team in tackles with 195 in his first year as a starter at the right inside linebacker spot. He was one of only eight Broncos to start every game last season, a campaign in which he intercepted two passes, recovered a fumble, recorded a quarterback sack and tallied four passes defensed. Bronco coaches regard Busick as an intelligent, aggressive player who has developed well as a starter. Rubin Carter had another fine season in 1984, starting all 15 games in which he played. He missed the game at Detroit (10/7) due to a back injury suffered in practice. Carter posted 84 tackles, second among defensive lineman, recovered three enemy fumbles, and had three sacks. Considered by Denver coaches to be one of the better nose tackles in the NFL, Carter has missed only two games in his career, playing in 145 of the last 147 Bronco games. Since winning a starting job midway through his rookie year, he has started 133 games. Carter's career tackle total now is 972, while his career sack total is 28. He has recovered 14 fumbles overall, returning one for a touchdown against New England in 1979. John Elway last year took a major step forward in his development as an NFL quarterback, as the former Stanford All-American led the Broncos to a 12-2 record in his 14 regular season starts, finishing eighth among AFC passers with a 76.8 rating (214 completions in 380 attempts for 2,598 yards and 18 touchdowns). Not only was Elway's passing a factor in his leadership of the offense, but he finished third on the team in rushing with 237 yards on 56 carries, good for a 4.2 average. Elway tied the franchise record with five scoring passes in a single game (vs. Minnesota on 11/18) and established a personal pro high in completions with 26 against New England (11/4), also posting his only 300-yard game of the campaign against the Patriots (315). He had his best rushing performance as a Bronco in the team's final regular season game at Seattle, gaining 43 yards on nine carries in pacing Denver to the division title. Elway was not able to start two games due to injury and sat out one altogether (10/28 at Los Angeles Raiders). He worked very hard in the Bronco weight room during this off-season to build up his upper body, and is considered to be both heavier and stronger for the coming season. Elway started 10 games overall in 1983, including the first five before being replaced by Steve DeBerg and five more after DeBerg was injured at Seattle (11/6). Elway did not have impressive stats as a rookie, finishing 17th among AFC passers, but he carried a tremendous emotional burden all season, having come into the NFL as the most publicized college prospect since Joe Namath in 1965. John struggled for much of the season before putting outstanding performances back to back in December against Cleveland and Baltimore, both Denver wins and the latter of which clinched a playoff spot for the Broncos. He completed 16 of 24 for 284 yards and two touch-downs against the Browns and the following week brought Denver back from a 19-0 deficit with three fourth quarter scoring passes, leading the Broncos to a 21-19 win. He completed 23 of 44 for 345 yards in that game, all single game highs for his rookie year. Elway was the first player selected in the 1983 NFL draft and joined the Broncos by trade on 5/2/83. An exceptional pure passer, his talents were honed by the pro-style offense employed by Stanford.

COLLEGE: John concluded his college career with five major NCAA Division 1-A records and nine major Pac-10 marks. Elway completed 62.1 percent of his career passes (774 of 1,243, both NCAA highs) for 9,349 yards and 77 touchdowns, while setting an NCAA record for the lowest percentage of passes intercepted in a career (3.13 percent). He passed for over 200 yards in 30 of 42 games. As a senior, John was a consensus All-American and finished second in Heisman Trophy balloting while setting virtually every Pac-10 and Stanford career record for total offense and passing. In 1982 he passed for over 2,500 yards for an NCAA record third straight season capping his career as the East-West Shrine Offensive Player of the Game. He threw for two or more TDs in all but three games as a senior. As a junior Elway received All-America recognition and was named All-West Coast first team by UPI. John was the first sophomore ever named Pac-10 Player-of-the-Year and also the first sophomore ever named a first team All-American (The Sporting News). He compiled amazing 1980 statistics, completing 65.4 percent of his attempts for 2,889 yards and 27 TDS. In limited action as a freshman he completed 50 of 96 attempts for 544 yards, setting a school record for freshmen by hurling six TD passes. A two-sport star, John played baseball for the New York Yankees' Oneonta (N.Y.) single-A farm club in 1982, hitting for a .318 average and knocking in a team-high 24 runs batted in. He was the Yankees' first selection in the 1981 summer draft. He hit .349 with nine homers and 50 RBI in 49 games in his final college baseball season as a sophomore. Elway has a degree in economics from Stanford.

Steve Foley was one of only eight Broncos to start all 16 games last season, as the 10-year veteran intercepted six passes to tie Mike Harden for the team lead. He has a career total of 39 interceptions, which ties him for third in the league among active players and is the third highest total in team history behind Goose Gonsoulin (43) and Bill Thompson (40). Foley also scored his first pro touchdowns last year on a 40-yard interception return at Seattle (12/15) and a 22-yard fumble return on the first play from scrimmage against Green Bay (10/15) in a Monday night blizzard. He ranked second on the team and first among defensive backs in tackles with 167 and he broke up 10 passes. Ricky Hunley came to the Broncos by way of trade from Cincinnati in the middle of the 1984 campaign and played in the final eight games of the season, as well as in the playoff game against Pittsburgh, seeing most of his action on special teams. Cincinnati will receive three future draft choices from the Broncos in exchange for Hunley, who is considered to be a superb pro prospect whom the Broncos will look at outside as well as at the inside linebacker position which he played throughout his college career. Tom Jackson was named by his teammates as the Broncos' most inspirational player for the fourth consecutive season in 1984, a campaign in which he started every game and finished fourth on the team in tackles with 141. Last year Jackson also recorded six quarterback sacks and defensed 13 passes, the latter figure leading all club linebackers. He was named second team All-NFL by College and Pro Football Newsweekly and also earned All-AFC honors from

Butch Johnson recorded his professional highs in receptions (42), yards (587), touchdowns (six), and starts (nine) in 1984, his first

season with the Broncos. He came to Denver in a preseason trade with the Houston Oilers, who had acquired him several months earlier from the Dallas Cowboys. Johnson, who is going into his 10th NFL season, also established new personal single-game highs last season against New England (11/4) with nine catches for 156 yards, which was the best performance of any Bronco receiver during the 1984 regular season. He played in all 16 games for Denver and stretched his consecutive games played streak to 84, having missed only five games as a professional. Rulon Jones had his best season in 1984 as he led the team with 11 sacks and paced Denver's pass-rush unit to a club-record 57 sacks. Jones has registered 38 sacks in the last five years and has been the team leader in that department in two of the last three seasons. He led all defensive linemen in tackles last year with 105, blocked a field goal against Kansas City (9/23), and scored his first pro touchdown on a five-yard fumble recovery at Detroit (10/7). Rich Karlis had another fine season as the Broncos' placekicker in 1984, connecting on 21 of 28 field goal attempts and pacing the club in scoring with 101 points, the first 100-point season of his career. His field goal percentage of .750 brings his career mark to .803, the all-time Bronco record, and Karlis holds three of the four best single season percentages in club annals. Steve Watson had another tremendous season last year, catching his pro high of 69 passes (sixth in the AFC) for 1,170 yards (fourth in the AFC), averaging 17.0 yards per catch and scoring seven touchdowns while recording his third 1,000-yard campaign in the past four years. He now has caught passes for 4,102 yards in that time frame, a figure exceeded only by James Lofton of Green Bay (4,651). Watson combined with running back Sammy Winder to give Denver 1,000-yard performers in both receiving and rushing for the first time in franchise history-the Broncos were one of only three clubs to have that combination last year. Watson's sterling 1984 performance included three regular season 100-yard games and one more in the playoffs, giving him a career total of 16, and he comes into 1985 having caught at least one pass in 58 of his last 60 games. His career average per catch of 18.3 is the second highest figure in team history. In the Broncos' division playoff game against Pittsburgh (12/30) he caught his pro high of 12 passes for 177 yards. Watson was named by his teammates as Denver's offensive most valuable player last year, an honor which he also received in 1981 and 1983. Watson had a brilliant season in 1981, leading the AFC in reception yardage with 1,244 and pacing the entire NFL in reception touchdowns with 13. His rise to prominence was one of the NFL's most remarkable stories in 1981, as the former free agent from Temple moved into the starting lineup in the second week of the season and rewrote the Bronco record books. He caught 60 passes and set new team records for reception yards (the previous record was 1,235, set by Lionel Taylor in 1960) and TDs (the previous record was 12 by Taylor in 1960). His 13 TDs tied the Denver single season total recorded by Floyd Little in 1972 and 1973. He was named All-AFC by UPI and earned a trip to the Pro Bowl in 1981. Watson has had 16 100-yard games, with his high yardage total of 183 coming at Los Angeles against the Rams in 1982, also posting his single game regular season reception high of 10 in that contest. He has caught touchdown passes of 95 and 93 yards, and holds the Denver record for longest non-scoring reception with an 86-yard play against Kansas City in 1981. Steve caught three TD passes against Baltimore in 1981, scored twice in three other games, and had a streak of at least one TD pass in five straight games that year. Not drafted, Watson signed with Denver in 1979 and has played in every Bronco game since then, being used primarily as a special teams player until two years ago.

Gerald Willhite will move to the fullback position in 1985 and will also see action at Denver's H-back spot when the team goes to a one-back set. He had a fine season in 1984, ranking second on the club in rushing with a career-high 371 yards, third in reception yardage with 298, and his 200 yards in punt returns was the team high. Willhite had his career-best rushing performance against the Los Angeles Raiders (9/30) when he gained 82 yards on 21 carries, and then followed that with an 81-yard game against Detroit (10/7) in his only start of the season. Willhite, last year, had Denver's longest run from scrimmage (52 yards), longest punt return (35 yards) and kickoff return (40 yards), as well as the team's second longest reception (63 yards). As Denver's first-round draft choice in 1982, Willhite led the club in rushing with 347 yards, and he racked up 974 all-purpose yards in his strike-shortened rookie season.

Although he has played primarily in a backup role since arriving in Denver in 1982, Wilson's 11 interceptions in that time frame tie him with Steve Foley for second-highest on the team. In 1983 Wilson

started three of the 16 games in which he played when injuries forced a realignment of the defensive backfield. All five of Wilson's interceptions that year came during his three weeks as a starter, including a career-high three in Denver's 38-27 win over Seattle. Wilson was also second on the team in kickoff returns with 24 for 485 yards and a 20.2 average, and he also caught 12-yard pass in Denver's playoff loss to the Seahawks. Wilson joined the Broncos one game into the 1982 season and went on to play in eight games, starting three. He intercepted two passes in the 1982 campaign, one of which came in the closing seconds to secure a win over the Los Angeles Rams. Originally signed by Dallas as a free agent wide receiver, Wilson led the Cowboys in punt returns in 1979 while catching three passes for a 25.3 average. He converted to cornerback in 1980 and started 11 games there, intercepting four passes in the regular season and two more in the playoffs. He led the Cowboys that year in passes defended with 41 and started the first four games of 1981 before being displaced by Everson Walls, Wilson moved back to wide receiver in 1982, but was a late cut and subsequently joined the Broncos. He is an excellent athlete, as his pro experience on offense, defense, and special teams indicates. He has missed just one game in his pro career.

COLLEGE: Steve finished his four-year Howard University career as the Washington, D.C. school's all-time leading receiver and kick returner. Wilson caught 94 passes for 1,399 yards and 12 touchdowns, all Howard records. He earned All-Mid-Eastern Conference honors in 1978, and has a degree in marketing from Howard.

PERSONAL: Steve and his wife Cathy have a son, Ryen Anthony (11/2/82), and the family makes its home in Westminster, Colo. A Los Angeles native, he was raised in Durham, N.C., and graduated from Durham's Northern HS. Sammy Winder had an outstanding season in 1984, as the Southern Mississippi back rushed for over 1,000 yards and was tabbed as Denver's lone representative in the Pro Bowl. His 1,153 yards rushing ranked third in the AFC and 11th in the NFL, and was the second highest total in Bronco history. Winder was the first Bronco back since Otis Armstrong in 1976 to reach the 1,000-yard plateau, and he also set Denver records for number of attempts in a season (296) and in a single game (34 at Los Angeles Raiders, 10/28). Winder was second highest on the team in receptions as well, catching 44 passes for 288 yards, and his 1,441 total yards from scrimmage ranked second in the conference. He ran for two 100-yard games last season, bringing his career total to four, and had four more games in which he gained over 90 yards on the ground. Winder was also second on the team in touchdowns scored with six. Winder moved into a starting role in 1983, rushing for 757 yards despite missing two whole games and virtually all of another with a sprained ankle. He was ranked 12th in the AFC and his rushing total was the eighth highest in Bronco history. Winder's best day as a pro came that year at Houston, where he rushed 29 times for 165, the third highest single game total in Bronco history. He recorded his longest run from scrimmage as a pro with a 52vard jaunt at Houston. Two weeks earlier he had rushed for 119 yards against the Los Angeles Raiders, which was the first time since 1980 that a Bronco back had gone over 100 yards in a game. Winder was drafted by the Broncos in the fifth round in 1982 and he rushed for 259 in his strike-shortened rookie season.

COLLEGE: Sammy was an extremely productive player at Southern Mississippi, setting school career records for rushing attempts (736), rushing touchdowns (39), and points (234). The second all-time leading Southern Mississippi rusher, he gained 3,114 yards there and led the nation in scoring in 1980 with 20 TDs for 120 points. A two-time All-South Independent selection and honorable mention All-America, Winder had nine 100-yard games in his career and had a personal high of 175 rushing yards against Memphis State in 1981. He earned four college letters.

Ken Woodard had his best season as a pro last year and is expected to battle for a starting spot in 1985. Jim Wright split his 1984 playing time between the tight end and H-back positions, catching 11 passes for 118 yards and scoring a touchdown in the division-clinching win at Seattle (12/15). Louis Wright had another outstanding season in 1984, giving up only one touchdown pass in the regular season, and scoring his first touchdown since 1977. Wright was named All-NFL by the Sporting News and Pro Football Weekly and earned second team honors from the College and Pro Football Weekly and NEA. He made the Pro Football Weekly All-AFC squad and was a second team All-AFC selection by UPI, and was named most valuable defensive player by his teammates for the second time in the last three years. 

RONALD CRAIG (Ron) ANDERSON LB 6-1, 215 DOB: Sept. 16, 1962 Southern Methodist Draft Choice #10b



Ron Anderson played three seasons as an outside linebacker after starting his college career as a defensive back for Southern Methodist, where he was considered by coaches to be one of the strongest and quickest members of the Mustang defense. One of the best athletes on his college squad, Anderson recorded his career high of 59 tackles and three quarterback sacks as a senior, intercepting one pass and recovering a fumble. He played in every game over the last

three years and finished with a career total of 128 tackles and five sacks. A native of Morton, Tex., Anderson was a star athlete at Levelland HS in Levelland, Tex., where he lettered three times each in football and basketball, twice in track, and once in baseball. He was all-district two years in high school as a safety and tailback. During his prep career he averaged 6.3 yards per carry, seven tackles a game, and intercepted nine passes, also anchoring the high school 400 and 1600 meter relays. Ron is married (Margarita), and majored in business at SMU.

DALLAS CAMERON NT Miami (Fla.) 6-2, 245 DOB: Nov. 6, 1962 Draft Choice #7



Dallas Cameron saw action all along the defensive line for the University of Miami last year, including middle guard, tackle, and end, recording 31 total tackles and one quarterback sack. Cameron posted his season high of 11 tackles at Michigan and closed out his career with a total of 102 tackles, 66 unassisted, and two fumble recoveries. He ended his college career with an appearance as a starter against UCLA in the Fiesta Bowl. Regarded by Miami coaches as a player with

explosive quickness and tremendous upper body strength, Cameron earned three letters while playing for the Golden Hurricanes. A native of Lake City, S.C., he was a first-team all-state pick at offensive tackle as a senior at Melbourne (Fla.) HS, after having been a first-team all-Cape Coast selection at that position as a junior. As a prepster Cameron was a three-year two-way starter who earned all-conference honors on both sides of the ball during his final year of play, earning team most valuable player honors as well. A business management major at Miami, Dallas enjoys fishing as a hobby.

SIMON RAYNARD FLETCHER DE Houston 6-6, 245 DOB: Feburary 18, 1962 Draft Choice #2b



Simon Fletcher was a three-year starter at the University of Houston, where he posted career figures fo 142 unassisted tackles and 209 total, including 30 tackles for losses and 14 quarterback sacks. Fletcher also defensed 10 passes during a career in which he started 33 of the 37 games in which he played for the Cougars. In 1984 he was second on the team in tackles for losses (11 for 52 yards) and quarterback sacks (eight), despite playing the

last six games with a pinched nerve in his shoulder. Fletcher saw just seven minutes of varsity action in 1980 and was a redshirt in 1981 before moving into the Cougar starting lineup, where he played both right tackle (1982 and 1984) and right end (1983). His final college game was against Boston College in the Cotton Bowl. He earned letters in both football and track at Bay City HS in his native Bay City, Tex., and has an older brother who played football at Texas A & I.

HAROLD GLEN (Buddy) FUNCK, JR. QB 6-2, 192 DOB: March 22, 1963 New Mexico Draft Choice #10a



Buddy Funck was a two-year starter at New Mexico who passed for 2,497 yards and a 52.4 completion percentage for the Lobos, also rushing the ball for 1,118 yards. He scored 13 touchdowns on the ground and passed for 13 more, and his total career yardage figure of 3,685 is the sixth best ever in New Mexico history. An elusive runner, Funck rushed for 633 yards and eight scores as a junior, and that year had a combined yardage figure of 2,154, third best ever in Lobo annals.

He missed four full games and part of another as a senior due to a cracked fibular suffered against Colorado State, and his club was winless without him. Funck's best day was a 261-yard performance (210 passing, 51 rushing) at home against San Diego State in 1983, while his best rushing performance was a 113-yard effort against New Mexico State in 1984. His longest completion was a 77-yarder against UTEP. A native of Albuquerque who returned there for his college career, Funck grew up in Ft. Worth, Tex., and attended Ft. Worth's Richland HS, where he was all-area, second-team all-county, and the district's offensive most valuable player as a senior quarterback. He earned six prep letters, three in football, two in basketball and one in baseball.

WILLIAM DEWAYNE (Billy) HINSON G Florida 6-1, 270 DOB: January 8, 1963 Draft Choice #5



Billy Hinson is a strong, durable athlete who started every game of his senior year and closed out his college career with an appearance in the Blue-Gray game. Hinson played offensive guard in his last two years at Florida, after having switched between that position and middle guard on defense during his first two seasons with the Gators. Hinson lettered three times overall and started 12 games as a collegian. As a senior he was named by USA Today as offensive player

of the week (along with the rest of the Florida line) after the Auburn game. A native of Folkston, Ga., Hinson was a prep All-American and all-state as a senior at Hilliard HS in Hilliard, Fla., in addition to being the state weightlifting champion. He also lettered in track, specializing in the shot put. Billy is married (Dana), and likes lifting weights, hunting, and fishing.

Vance Johnson was the University of Arizona's key player at tailback over his four-year career, finishing fifth in school career scoring (168 points), sixth in receiving (78), and fourth in all-purpose running (3,442 yards). The Wildcats' gamebreaker, he was a first team all-Pac-10 selection at running back in 1982 after leading the league in kick-off returns with a 27.2 average (including a 93-yard touchdown jaunt), also pacing the club in rushing with 443 yards and four scores.

In 1983 Johnson posted the league high in touchdowns with 13, including 10 rushing. He made the Blue Chip Magazine 1981 freshman All-America second team, setting four school freshman records, including yards rushing (654), kickoff return yardage (592), and all-purpose yardage (1,557). He had his career high of 183 yards rushing against Fresno State in 1981. He twice led the team in rushing and at one point caught a touchdown pass in five straight games. As a senior Johnson posted his personal highs in reception yards (340), average per catch (13.1), and reception touchdowns (four), finishing his college career with 32 TDs (20 rushing, 11 receiving, one by kickoff return). Johnson closed out his career with appearances in the East-West Shrine Game (in which he caught seven passes and threw a touchdown pass) and the Senior Bowl. He possesses tremendous speed and was a great track athlete as well, capturing the 1982 NCAA long jump title with a 26'-111/2" effort and winning the 1984 Pac-10 long jump title, finishing second in the NCAA last year. Johnson has blazing speed and was an alternate in the long jump on the 1984 Olympic team, missing the team by just one inch. He finished fourth in the Pac-10 100meters in 1984 with a 10:28 mark and most recently was chosen to compete in the long jump with the American Olympic team in Monaco, France this spring, but decided to pass up the opportunity because of his football career. A native of Trenton, N.J., he was raised in Tucson, Az., and lettered twice in football and four times in track at Tucson's Cholla HS, where he scored 22 touchdowns as a senior and had a 9.1 yard rushing average while gaining 1,382 yards. He set school records in the long jump, high jump, 100 and 220-yard dashes, and was Arizona's state long jump champion in 1980. Johnson was all-state in football in 1980 as well. Vance was a commercial art major at Arizona.

DANIEL WALBRIDGE (Dan) LYNCH G 6-3, 265 DOB: June 21, 1962 Washington State Draft Choice #12



Dan Lynch started all 33 games over the last three seasons at Washington State, earning numerous All-America honors last year (AP, Football News, Football Writers of America second team, UPI honorable mention) and closing out his career with appearances in the East-West Shrine Game and the Senior Bowl, declining an invitation to play in the Blue-Gray Classic. Lynch played sparingly in 1980 as a freshman, was a reserve player in 1981, then became a starting guard in 1982,

earning the first of three consecutive Pac-10 All-Academic citations. In 1983 he was Pac-10 first team, UPI All-West Coast second team, AP All-America honorable mention, and received an extra year of eligibility because he had played in less than 20 percent of his team's games as a freshman. Thus, Lynch is one of the few players in college history to have played in two Senior Bowl games (following the 1983 and 1984 campaigns). Born in Rochester, Minn., Lynch graduated from Lewis and Clark HS in Spokane,

Wash., where he was selected all-Greater Spokane and all-state as a senior, also playing prep basketball and baseball. Dan's brother Pat was a teammate of his at Washington State, and his father is a neurosurgeon.

KELISCOTT McGREGOR TE Colorado State 6-6, 250 DOB: January 23, 1963 Draft Choice #4



Keli McGregor finished his Colorado State playing career with 153 receptions, second best total in CSU history and fifth in WAC career records. In 1984 he was a preseason All-American choice of several national publications, including Playboy Magazine, and he went on to catch 47 passes, tops on the team for the second straight season, good for 479 yards and three scores. As a senior he had seven catches for 105 yards vs. Wyoming, then caught eight for 62 yards the following

week against Utah. McGregor was named second-team All-WAC and earned second-team All-America honors (UPI). As a junior McGregor caught a school record 69 passes for 717 yards and two touchdowns on his way to second-team All-WAC honors and honorable mention All-America citation. In 1983 he had games of 12 catches for 120 yards (vs. Air Force Academy), 11 for 135 (vs. Utah), and nine for 132 (vs. San Diego State). He joined the Rams as a walk-on in 1981 and finished the season as the starting tight end, then caught 36 passes for 393 yards and three scores as a sophomore starter. McGregor was used as the "H-back" in CSU's single-back offense and caught at least one pass in 34 consecutive games during his college career, closing it out with appearances in the East-West Shrine Game and Japan Bowl. Keli is married (Lori). Born in Primghar, Iowa, McGregor lettered twice each in football and basketball at Lakewood HS in Lakewood, Colo., where he was named to all-city football and basketball squads in 1979, leading Lakewood to state grid runnerup honors that year. Keli's father, Brian, is one of Colorado's most successful prep coaches and is currently the head coach at Arvada West HS.

ERIC RILEY CB 5-11, 175 DOB: August 15, 1962 Draft Choice #8





Eric Riley started at both cornerback and safety during his Florida State career, finishing with 104 total tackles and five pass interceptions. He started as a safety in 1981, redshirted the following year, then performed at cornerback for the Seminoles, with his best season statistically coming in 1983. In that campaign Riley had his high marks in tackles (48), first hits (33), and interceptions (four), in addition to blocking a kick and recovering two fumbles. One fumble re-

covery came in the waning seconds and preserved a win over East Carolina, and it was against South Carolina that he blocked a field goal attempt and later recovered a blocked punt in the endzone for a touchdown. He defensed seven passes in each of the last two seasons. A track athlete as well, Riley was the Metro Conference 110 and 400 hurdle champion in 1983 and ran leg on the 1,600 meter relay that finished 11th in the nation at the 1982 NCAA championships. Eric participated in both football and track at Fort Myers HS in his native Fort Myers, Fla., and was a criminology major at Florida State.



Gary Rolle started 15 games during his Florida career and caught 25 passes for 319 yards and a 12.8 average. He caught nine each in his sophomore and senior seasons, including a 44-yarder vs. Mississippi State in 1982 which was his career longest. Rolle was named as one of 11 recipients of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame scholar-athlete awards as a senior, and was named academic All-conference as well. A very intelligent and articulate athlete,

he also earned academic All-Southeastern Conference honors in 1983. As a junior Rolle caught four passes for 36 yards vs. Mississippi State, his high reception game as a collegian. He began his career at West Point as a freshman in 1980, transferring to Florida in 1981. Born in Augsburg, Germany, Gary is a graduate of Carroll City HS in Miami, Fla., where he was a wide receiver and kickoff return man. He received Florida's highest ROTC award for combined excellence in the spring of 1983 and has been an honor student maintaining a 3.7 grade average while majoring in pre-med. Gary's father is a physician.

STEVEN EDWARD (Steve) SEWELL 6-3, 210 DOB: April 2, 1963 Draft Choice #1

RB Oklahoma



Steve Sewell was the most versatile athlete on the Oklahoma squad, starting all but a few games during his four-year career and establishing a reputation for great attitude and intelligence, as well as athletic ability. Sewell was equally adept as a runner and receiver in college and earned second-team All-Big Eight honors (AP, UPI) as a senior, rushing for 577 yards on 98 carries and catching 16 passes for 315 yards and a 19.7 average despite missing most of three games

due to a severe foot strain. A big play performer, Sewell scored seven touchdowns, five running and two via the pass. A slashing runner with the speed to go the distance, against Kansas State last year he became the only player in Oklahoma history to record more than 100 yards rushing and receiving in the same game, gaining 153 on the ground, including a 47-yard touchdown run, and 142 yards on six receptions, including a 79-yard scoring play. That performance earned him Big Eight player of the week honors. In OU's tie with Texas Sewell scored both TDs and caught five passes for 45 yards. He also demonstrated his big play capability against Colorado, scoring two touchdowns, one on a 68-yard pass play that broke open a tight contest. Against Iowa State Sewell gained 56 yards on a wingback reverse which he had suggested for insertion into the game plan. His career statistics show 170 carries for 1,113 yards (a 6.5 average), and 33 catches for 550 yards (a 16.7 average), and 14 TDs (10 rushing, four receiving). Sewell was voted the Don Key Award, the highest honor an OU player can receive. The award is given annually to the player who exhibits all the positive physical, academic, and mental traits of college football. Sewell played both halfback positions in the wishbone as well as wingback and tailback in the I formation, closing out his college career with appearances in the Orange Bowl and Senior Bowl. He also ran track as a sophomore at Oklahoma and was selected Academic All-Big Eight in 1982. A native of San Francisco, Calif., Sewell graduated from that city's Riordan HS, where he was All-Bay Area and all-league in a senior season which saw him rush for 1,000 yards. He earned three prep letters in football as a two-way starter (running back and safety), and lettered three more times in track, specializing in the long jump and relays. Steve is an avid movie buff.

DARYL DIMITRI SMITH 5-9, 180 DOB: May 8, 1963 Draft Choice #9




Daryl Smith was a three-year starter at cornerback for North Alabama and as a senior was named first team Kodak All-American, first team AP Little All-American, and first team Football News All-American as well, closing out his career with appearances in the Blue-Gray Classic and Senior Bowl. He blocked eight kicks in his career, including five punts, and had nine career interceptions for 31 yards. In 1983 Smith blocked punts in consecutive NCAA Division II playoff games

against Virginia Union and Central State (Ohio). Smith made 43 tackles as a senior, recovering two fumbles and breaking up eight passes while earning All-Gulf South Conference accolades. In his career at North Alabama Smith had 134 tackles, including 81 solo hits, and defensed 27 passes while leading UNA to a 33-7-4 record over those four years. Smith has outstanding speed and demonstrated that by earning all-state track honors as a prepster at Opelika HS in his native Opelika, Ala.

GAME-BY-GAME REVIEW

DENVER 20, CINCINNATI 17

DENVER, CO., Sept. 2—Denver opened the 1984 campaign with a 20-17 win over the Cincinnati Bengals. The Broncos received fine performances from quarterbacks John Elway and Gary Kubiak, as well as running back Sammy Winder. With Denver trailing 3-0 in the second quarter, Elway drove the team 75 yards in 10 plays to their first score—a 25-yard pass to Butch Johnson. The extra point attempt failed, giving the Broncos a 6-3 lead. On Cincinnati's next drive, cornerback Steve Wilson intercepted a Ken Anderson pass and returned it to the Denver 45. The Bengals took a 17-13 lead early in the fourth quarter on another one-yard TD run, this one by Larry Kinnebrew. The Broncos then set out on a 13-play, 75-yard drive behind Kubiak, who threw an eight-yard pass to Clarence Kay for the winning score with 9:34 remaining in the game. Cincinnati's next two drives ended with a fumble and a Karl Mecklenburg sack of Anderson on fourth down and ten, which preserved the win for Denver.

With only:28 on the clock, Karlis kicked his second field goal of the period, making the score 12-6 in favor of Los Angeles. In the third quarter, the Raiders pulled farther ahead with Allen taking it in from a yard out to make the score 19-6. Early in the fourth quarter, Denver struck back with a three-yard TD pass from Kubiak to Clarence Kay. With only 2:15 remaining in regulation, and Los Angeles driving toward another score, Allen fumbled at the Denver 16-yard line, and the Broncos recovery set off a frantic drive. Gary Kubiak passed nine straight times to bring the ball to the LA 29. On the tenth play of the drive, Kubiak dropped back to pass, and then took off with the ball on a 17-yard run, giving the Broncos a first down on the Raider's 12. SEATTLE 27, DENVER 24

DENVER, CO., Nov. 25-The Broncos lost to the Seahawks after Rich Karlis's field goal attempt, which would have sent the game into overtime, hit the right upright. The Seahawks got the ball back when Jacob Green recovered a Clarence Kay fumble on a controversial play and drove the ball to the Denver six-yard line, settling for a 28-yard field goal to put them up 27-17. Denver came roaring back as Elway engineered a five-play, 78-yard drive that ended with a four-yard scoring pass to Gene Lang. After the next Seattle drive stalled, the Broncos got the ball back on their own 37 with a little over two minutes remaining. Denver drove to the Seattle eight yard line, but with only:39 left on the clock, Karlis's attempt hit the upright. Seattle's Steve Largent racked up 191 yards on 12 catches in the game.



1979 WILD CARD PLAYOFF GAME

HOUSTON 13, DENVER 7

HOUSTON, Tex., Dec. 23-Toni Fritsch kicked two field goals to provide the margin of victory as the Houston Oilers played strong second half defense and defeated the Broncos, 13-7, earning the Oilers advancement in the American Football Conference playoffs.

Fritsch opened the scoring with a 31-yard first period field goal, but Denver came back to take a 7-3 lead on a seven-yard pass from Craig Morton to running back Dave Preston, an 80-yard drive that took the Broncos 13 plays.

Houston went ahead to stay on a three-yard burst by Earl Campbell at 14:14 of the second period. However, Campbell was injured on the play and did not return to action in the second half. Oiler quarterback Dan Pastorini and wide receiver Ken Burrough also left the contest due to injuries, both early in the second half, putting a severe crimp in the Houston attack. But the Broncos were able to move the ball for only 216 yards total offense, and the tenacious Houston defense sacked Morton six times for 40 yards in losses as the Oilers held on to win.

Linebacker Bob Swenson intercepted a Gifford Nielsen pass at the Oiler 26yard line midway through the fourth period, but two sacks of Morton led to a 50yard field goal attempt by Fred Steinfort. Steinfort's kick hit the upright, and the Oilers later drove for a second field goal by Fritsch, this one of 20 yards, providing the final victory margin.

Denver drove to the Houston 27 at the two minute mark, but the Oiler defense again rose to the occasion to stifle the threat and secure the win, eliminating the Broncos from the playoffs.

Denver cut the margin to 16-10 on a three-yard Dave Preston TD, but Gerela kicked another field goal to make the halftime margin 19-10. Denver threatened to come closer in the third period, but Turner's 29-yard field goal attempt was blocked, and Bradshaw's passing sealed Denver's fate early in the final stanza. The Steelers rolled to 425 yards total offense, with Bradshaw accounting for 272 through the air, 156 on ten receptions by Stallworth. The eventual World Champion Steelers limited the Broncos' ground game to just 87 yards in earning the right to play the Houston Oilers for the AFC crown the following week.

1978 SUPER BOWL XII

DALLAS 27, DENVER 10

NEW ORLEANS, La., Jan. 15-The Dallas Cowboys evened their Super Bowl record at 2-2 by defeating the Denver Broncos 27-10 before a sellout crowdol 76,400, plus 90 million television viewers, the largest audience ever to watcha sporting event. Dallas converted two pass interceptions by safety Randy Hughes and cornerback Aaron Kyle into 10 points and Efren Herrera addeda 35-yard field goal to give the Cowboys at 13-0 halftime advantage. The Denver offense had trouble getting untracked against the hard-hitting Cowboy defense. The Broncos lost three fumbles and were intercepted twice on their last five possessions of the first half. The Broncos came back momentarily at the outset of the third period. Craig Morton engineered a drive to the Cowbovs 30-yard line from where Jim Turner booted a 47-yard field goal to make the score 13-3. After an exchange of punts, Dallas wide receiver Butch Johnson made a spectacular diving catch in the end zone to complete a 45-yard pass from Roger Staubach to put the Cowboys ahead 20-3. However, the momentum swung back to the Broncos as Rick Upchurch returned the kickoff 67 yards to the Dallas 26. On the second play of the series, Norris Weese relieved Craig Morton at quarterback. Morton, who was intercepted only eight times during the regular season, had thrown a Super Bowl record four interceptions Weese guided the Broncos to a touchdown — a one-yarder by Ron Lytle — to cut the Dallas lead to 20-10 with 5:39 left in the third quarter. Dallas clinched the victory when running back Robert Newhouse threw a 29-yard touchdown pass to Golden Richards on an option play with 7:04 remaining in the game. It was the first pass thrown by Newhouse since the 1975 regular season. The Cowboys offense amassed 325 yards while the defense limited the Broncos to 156 in a game which saw the Cowboys control the ball 38:34 to Denver's 21:26. Roger Staubach completed 17 of 25 passes for 183 yards while Harvey Martin and Randy White, who were named Co-MVPs, led the Cowboys defense which recovered four fumbles and intercepted four passes.

1978 AFC CHAMPIONSHIP

DENVER 20, OAKLAND 17

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 1-Denver quarterback Craig Morton threw two touchdown passes to Haven Moses as the Broncos defeated the defending NFL Champion Oakland Raiders 20-17 and moved into their first Super Bowl. Morton, who was drafted and spent nine-and-a-half years with the Cowboys, would face his former Dallas teammates after completing 10 of 20 passes for 224 yards. It would be the second meeting in five weeks for these two teams -Dallas won 14-6 in the regular season finale as Morton played only the opening series due to a bruised hip. On a sunny, 18-degree day before 74,982 Denver partisans, the Raiders scored on their initial possession as Errol Mann kicked a 20-yard field goal to climax an 18-play drive. Morton hit Moses on their first scoring hookup two plays later on a 74-yard touchdown bomb, and the Broncos were on top to stay. Denver took advantage of two Oakland turnovers in the second half to win its second game in three meetings with the Raiders during the 1977 season. Defensive end Brison Manor recovered running back Clarence Davis' fumble at the Oakland 17 and running back Jon Keyworth scored from the 1-yard line to increase the margin to 14-3 in the third quarter. Oakland quarterback Ken Stabler hit tight end Dave Casper on the first of two scoring passes to narrow the lead to 14-10 with 39 seconds elapsed in the final period. But on Oakland's next possession, linebacker Bob Swenson intercepted a Stabler pass and ran to the Raiders' 14. Morton then threw 12 yards to Moses for the Broncos' final touchdown. Oakland finished the scoring on the next series as Stabler threw 17 yards to Casper for the game's last touchdown. Denver controlled the ball for the final 3:08 and gave Red Miller the AFC title in his first year as a head coach. Moses, a 10-year veteran, had five receptions for 168 yards. The Denver defense, which was No. 1 against the rush in the NFL during the regular season, held the Raiders to 94 vards on the ground.

The Denver victory set up a third game between the AFC Western Champion Broncos and the AFC Wild Card Raiders, who split two regular season games.

JANUARY 15—Broncos fall to the Cowboys, 27-10, in the Super Bowl. JANUARY 23—Lyle Alzado, Randy Gradishar, Tom Jackson, Billy Thompson and Louis Wright represent the Broncos in the Pro Bowl, the largest Denver contingent in history. MARCH—Only 143 season tickets are not renewed, a new all-time low. DECEMBER 3—Broncos win by 21-6 score at Oakland, holding the Raiders without a touchdown for the second time in the season, and moving within one game of AFC West crown. DECEMBER 10—Denver downs Kansas City, 24-3, winning second straight division championship, as OB Craig Morton goes 19-for-22 with 16 straight completions, both second best all-time NFL marks. DECEMBER 30—Denver loses in the playoffs to eventual Super Bowl champion Pittsburgh Steelers, 33-10.

1979

JANUARY 29—Broncos are represented by an all-time high of seven players in the NFL Pro Bowl, including Lyle Alzado, Randy Gradishar, Tom Jackson, Riley Odoms, Bill Thompson, Rick Upchurch, and Louis Wright.

MARCH—Only 161 season tickets are not renewed, virtually assuring the Broncos of their tenth straight sellout season. OCTOBER 7—Denver shuts out San Diego, 7-0, marking first time ever for Broncos to record two shutouts in one season. Denver had opened the campaign with 10-0 win over Cincinnati. NOVEMBER 11—Rick Upchurch becomes the all-time pro football record holder in career punt return yardage. He set the record vs. New England, surpassing the late Emlen Tunnell's total of 2,209 yards. DECEMBER 17—Denver clinches a playoff berth for the third straight year. DECEMBER 23—Denver loses in wild card playoff game at Houston, 13-7.

1980

JANUARY 27—The Broncos are represented in the Pro Bowl game by Randy Gradishar, Tom Jackson, Rick Upchurch, and Louis Wright. MARCH—Only 146 season tickets are not renewed for 1980, virtually assuring the club of its 11th consecutive sellout campaign. OCTOBER5—Randy Gradishar returns interception 93 yards for a touchdown vs. Cleveland, the longest such return in team history and the NFL's longest for 1980 season. OCTOBER 13—Fred Steinfort kicks 57-yard field goal, tying record for third-longest kick in NFL history.

1981

JANUARY—Fred Steinfort is named by Pro Football Weekly as that publication's Golden Toe Award winner for the 1980 season, having tied for the league lead with 26 field goals. FEBRUARY 25—Edgar F. Kaiser, Jr. is introduced as the new owner of the Denver Broncos, having purchased the club from principal owners Gerald H. Phipps and Allan R. Phipps. MARCH 10—Grady Alderman is named new General Manager and Dan Reeves is named as the new Head Coach. MARCH—The Broncos are sold out for their 12th consecutive season. SEPTEMBER—Craig Morton throws four touchdown passes in each of two consecutive games, vs. Baltimore and San

Diego, a first in franchise history. Wide receiver Steve Watson ties a team record with three touchdown receptions against the Colts on September 20. NOVEMBER 22—Watson catches a touchdown pass at Cincinnati to set a new team record with 13 TD catches in one season. DECEMBER 20—Watson gains 82 yards on receptions at Chicago, establishing a new Bronco single season mark with 1,244 reception yards. Individually, Morton set single season records for yards gained (3,213), yards passing (3,195), and average gain per play (8.37), while Watson led the AFC in reception yardage and in touchdown receptions (13).

1982

JANUARY 31—The Broncos are represented in the Pro Bowl game by Randy Gradishar, Bob Swenson, Bill Thompson, and Steve Watson. MARCH—Only 49 season ticket accounts have not been renewed for 1982, virtually assuring the Broncos of their 13th consecutive sellout season in Mile High Stadium. SEPTEMBER 21—The NFL Players Association begins the first regular season strike in NFL history, resulting in the cancellation of games for eight consecutive weeks. DECEMBER 3—Hein Poulus is named Vice President and General Manager of the Broncos. DECEMBER 19—Rick Upchurch returns a punt 78 yards for a touchdown against Kansas City to tie the all-time pro football record of eight career touchdowns on punt returns.

1983

JANUARY 3—Final NFL statistics show Rick Upchurch as the NFL's punt return leader with a 16.1 average and Luke Prestridge as the league's leading punter with a 45.0 mark. FEBRUARY 6—The Broncos are represented in the Pro Bowl game by Randy Gradishar, Luke Prestridge, and Rick Upchurch. MARCH 15—Only 89 season ticket accounts have not been renewed for 1983, virtually assuring the Broncos of their 14th consecutive sellout season in Mile High Stadium. MAY 2—In the biggest trade in franchise history, Denver acquires quarterback John Elway, the first player taken in the NFL draft, and signs him to a five-year contract. DECEMBER 11—Elway throws three fourthquarter touchdown passes to erase a 19-0 deficit and lead the Broncos to a 21-19 playoff-clinching win over Baltimore. This marks the fourth Bronco appearance in playoff competition. DECEMBER 24—Denver loses the wild card game at Seattle. 31-7.

1984

JANUARY 29-Randy Gradishar makes his seventh Pro Bowl appearance. Louis Wright also was named to the AFC Pro Bowl team, but was unable to play because of a fractured finger. MARCH-Only 146 season ticket accounts have not been renewed for 1984, virtually assuring the Broncos of their 15th consecutive sellout season in Mile High Stadium. MARCH 23-Pat Bowlen is introduced as the new owner of the Denver Broncos, assuming the title of President and Chief Executive Officer. NOVEMBER 18-The Broncos beat Minnesota 42-21 for the club's 10th straight victory, a team record. John Elway ties a Denver record throwing five touchdown passes in the game. DECEMBER 15-Denver wins its 13th game of the season, the most in Bronco history, and captures the AFC West crown with a 31-14 win over Seattle. Sammy Winder finishes the season with 1,153 yards rushing, and Steve Watson gains 1,170 yards receiving - the first time Denver has had 1,000-yard performers in both categories in the same season. DECEMBER 30-Pittsburgh defeats Denver 24-17 in a divisional playoff game.

1985

JANUARY 27—Sammy Winder represents the Broncos in the NFL Pro Bowl. FEBRUARY 18—Owner Pat Bowlen names John Beake as General Manager and Dan Reeves as Vice President of the club. MARCH—Only 82 season ticket accounts have not been renewed for the 1985 season, virtually assuring the Broncos of their 16th consecutive sellout season in Mile High Stadium.

DENVER BRONCOS YOUTH



RANDY GRADISHAR President

Randy Gradishar begins his second year in 1985 as President of the Denver Broncos Youth Foundation. In his position Gradishar works with the needs of youth and youth-serving organizations in the Denver area and the state of Colorado.

Gradishar graduated with a B.S. in Education from the Ohio State University in 1974, where he also played football (including two Rose Bowl ap-

pearances) under Coach Woody Hayes. He was the first draft choice of the Broncos in 1974 and played ten years without missing a game. He was voted the NFL Defensive Player of the Year in 1978 and was selected to seven Pro Bowls.

Before retiring from football in 1983, Randy completed a variety of aptitude, temperament and career tests. This confirmed he is happiest as well as best suited and most qualified to help people, and he has chosen to invest his energies in helping to meet the needs of youth leaders and the young people of our area.

Randy and his wife Janet are the parents of two daughters, Paige and Meredith, and a son, Mark. The family resides in the Denver suburb of Littleton.

The Denver Broncos Youth Foundation (DBYF) is a non-profit organization which was founded and incorporated in 1982 to meet the physical, mental, social and spiritual needs of young people by working in conjunction with existing youth-serving organizations to leverage available energy and resources to assist Colorado's young people and youth leaders. The "buzz word" of the Denver Broncos Youth Foundation which most accurately describes the focus of energy is the word "catalyst".

Although the Broncos Youth Foundation is a separate entity from the Broncos Football Club, Pat Bowlen, the Broncos' owner, serves on the DBYF Board of Directors and has allowed the Foundation the continued use of the Bronco name, as well as providing office space for DBYF. The Broncos Football Club makes an annual donation to DBYF from the Charity Game (first pre-season game). Contributions are also received from corporations and individual donors.

During its first year, the Broncos Youth Foundation has worked with a variety of youth leaders and youth-serving organizations, i.e., Drug & Alcohol, 4-H and other Leadership Programs, High School Journalists, Handicapped Programs, Urban, Minority, Prison and Juvenile Delinquent Programs, and various Christian youth organizations. DBYF has also given limited financial support to new programs and in some cases, existing programs in order to serve youth more effectively.

MILE HIGH STADIUM

Mile High Stadium, home of the Denver Broncos, once again was filled for every home date during the 1984 National Football League regular season. The Broncos brought their consecutive regular season sellout streak to 109 games and concluded 15 years of sellouts at Mile High Stadium.

Expansion of the stadium, begun in 1975, was completed for the 1977 season to give the Broncos the seventh largest home facility in the league.

Denver voters passed a \$25 million bond issue in 1974 to expand and improve the stadium from its capacity of 51,706 to 75,100. The stadium held 63,532 for the 1976 season, halfway through the

Making Mile High Stadium unique, however, is its movable east stands. The east stands move in a single section which, when fully extended, is in a horseshoe configuration for football. When the section is retracted, the stadium is in position for baseball.

The dynamics involved in the move are fascinating. First, bear in mind that the east stands section is a three-tiered structure, 535 feet long, 135 feet tall and 200 feet deep, weighing nearly nine million pounds. Second, the stands must be moved a distance of 145 feet.

How is it done? The answer, says DMJM-Phillips-Reister, the engineering-architectural firm in charge of the project, is water.

More than 90,000 square feet of runways serve as the operating surfaces over which the stands will move. Water is pumped onto the runways and form a .003 inch sheet upon which the stands rest. Hydraulic rams then push the stands forward at the rate of three feet per minute, making the move last somewhere around two hours.

Originally called Bears Stadium, the facility was built in 1948 for the Denver Bears of baseball's old Western League, with long-range plans to utilize it for football as well. When Denver became a charter member of the American Football League in 1959, the south stands (8,100 seats) and portable east stands (9,616 seats) were added to give a capacity of 34,657 for football.

After Denver voters turned down a stadium bond issue to build an all-purpose metropolitan stadium in 1967, a non-profit group began a fund-raising drive with the goal of purchasing the stadium for the city.

In February of 1968, the group bought the stadium from Rocky Mountain Empire Sports for \$1.8 million and presented it to the city of Denver. A 16,000-seat upper deck was immediately constructed over the west stands, raising the capacity to over 50,000 for the 1968 season. In December of 1968, the stadium was renamed Denver Mile High Stadium.

B. One game with each of teams #1-4 of the four-team division in the AFC -Home: AFC Central #2 and AFC Central #4; Away: AFC Central #1 and AFC Central #3. Total: four games.

C. Home-and-home games with the other fifth place team in the AFC -Home: AFC East #5; Away: AFC East #5. Total: two games.

C. One game with each of the fifth place teaams in the NFC — Home: NFC Central #5; Away: NFC East #5. Total: two games.

Broncos Radio Network

For the 16th consecutive season, Denver's 50-thousand watt station KOA (850) will serve as the flagship station for the Denver Broncos game broadcast network.

Bob Martin, radio voice of the Broncos since 1964, will again be calling the play-by-play account of the games, with Larry Zimmer, who joined the broadcast team in 1971, again doing the color commentary.

Martin was named Colorado Sportscaster of the Year for the 16th consecutive year in 1984.

When making requests for working press credentials, please allow time for mailing. Press credentials are normally issued approximately 10 days before the game. Should transmission facilities be required, please arrange for same through local representatives.

WORKING PRESS: Admittance to the Broncos' press box is restricted to the WORKING PRESS ONLY. Credentials are marked with a row and seat number. Passes are non-transferable.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photographers are asked to take special note of the following conditions for use of press credentials, as set by the National Football League:

"This working credential is issued to an organization for the sole purpose of providing stadium access to an accredited individual who has a legitimate working function (media or game service) in connection with this game. It is non-transferable. Any unauthorized use of this credential subjects the bearer to ejection from the stadium and prosecution for criminal trespass.

Any secondary non-editorial use of any picture, film/tape or drawing of the game taken or made by the accredited organization or individual to whom this credential has been issued (including but not limited to use in advertising, sales promotion or merchandising) is prohibited without prior specific written approval of the National Football League. Additionally, television stations are prohibited from making available game film or tape to any other organization even though the planned use may be editorial in nature without advance written permission from the NFL or one of its member clubs. Such film or tape may be aired only by the specific station or entity to whom this credential is issued.

Television stations filming or taping NFL games recognize that any films or tapes may only be used in connection with a regularly scheduled television newscast within a seven-day period following the game and the film clip or taped portion of each such showing will not exceed two (2) minutes in length.

Additionally, television stations agree not to use more than six (6) minutes of filmed or taped "same-day" highlights from NFL games on any regularly scheduled news programs (i.e. no more than six minutes of highlights on Sunday night). This is the only exception to the two-minute limitation.

Television stations wishing to use NFL film or tape in any other manner must obtain written permission for such usage from the National Football League.

Acceptance of the credential constitutes agreement by the bearer and his organization to abide by the foregoing conditions. Thank you for your cooperation."

Sideline photo passes will be tightly controlled by the Public Relations Department and are generally limited to photographers shooting for a daily newspaper, wire service, or magazine of national circulation on specific assignment, or television station.

RADIO-TELEVISION: In making requests for broadcast credentials, please specify requirements for spotters and/or statisticians.

CODE-A-PHONÉ: The Broncos' Code-A-Phone will be in operation after the club begins training camp at the University of Northern Colorado in Greeley. New entries, generally including an interview with a player or coach, will be made daily at approximately 6:00 p.m. This recorded interview service will continue throughout the season. Please check with the public relations office for an updated telephone number.


STADIUM ACCESS: To get to Mile High Stadium, which is located at 19th Avenue and Eliot Street, take Interstate 25 to the Mile High Stadium Exit (19th Avenue Exit). The Press Box is located on the West side of the stadium.

DRIVING INSTRUCTIONS TO MILE HIGH STADIUM FROM STAPLETON INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT: Exit airport on Quebec North and continue to Interstate 70. Take Interstate 70 West to Interstate 25 South, which will be a left lane exit. Continue West on Interstate 25 South until you come to Mile High Stadium Exit (19th Avenue Exit).

DRIVING INSTRUCTIONS TO STAPLETON INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT FROM MILE HIGH STADIUM: Take one of two routes depending on your parking lot location. You can take 20th Avenue East to Clay Street, turning left at Clay and proceeding to 23rd Avenue. Take a right at 23rd Avenue and continue to Interstate 25 entrances. Another route (Northbound) would be to take 17th Avenue East, which will continue beneath an overpass and will take you directly to Interstate 25 north. The alternate South bound route would be to take 17th Avenue East, turning left at Bryant Street and proceeding to the Interstate 25 South bound entrance, approximately two blocks.

TRANSMISSION FACILITIES: The Broncos provide three complimentary telephones in the visitors area of the working press box for use with VDT or telecopier equipment. Only collect, credit card or third party billing calls can be made from these telephones. Should you wish a private telephone installed at your seat, the Broncos will be pleased to assign you a seat location and provide you with a contact for you to make the appropriate arrangements with the local telephone company.


