

PRESIDENT AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

PAT BOWLEN President and Chief Executive Officer

Pat Bowlen was introduced as the majority owner of the Denver Broncos on March 23, 1984, and that announcement triggered a new era in franchise history, one which has coupled success on the playing field with enthusiasm for an even brighter future.

He immediately put his own mark on the Broncos, establishing a solid administration and creating a positive atmosphere that was a major factor in the team's success both on and off

The team responded with a 13-3

record and the American Football Conference Western Division championship in 1984, following that up with an 11-5 record that just barely kept the Broncos out of the playoffs last year.

Meanwhile, Bowlen saw the Broncos' consecutive home game sellout streak stretch to 120 straight regular and postseason games through the end of the 1985 campaign, as Denver led the entire National Football League in actual in-stadium attendance during both of those campaigns. The Broncos drew 589,500 to Mile High Stadium last year and had 585,233 in attendance the previous year.

Having established a solid foundation, Bowlen took a dramatic step toward the future during the past off-season, spearheading a bold plan to construct 60 luxury Penthouse Suites atop the west

side of Mile High Stadium.

Bowlen, 42, and the Bowlen family acquired 100% ownership of the Broncos in July of 1985. He is active in day to day operations of

Born in Prairie du Chien, Wis., he attended high school there and went on to the University of Oklahoma, where he earned degrees in both business (1965) and law (1968).

Bowlen has real estate and natural resource holdings in Alberta, as well as real estate holdings in Colorado, Arizona, and California.

He is President and Director of Batoni-Bowlen Enterprises Ltd. and Bowlen Holdings Ltd., both of Edmonton, as well as Bowlen Holdings, Inc., which is a California firm. Bowlen also is Chairman of the Board and Director of Hambledon Estates Limited.

In addition, he is President and Director of Landsea Oil and Gas Ltd., College Plaza Development Ltd., Renaissance Development Ltd., and B.B.M. Properties Ltd. Bowlen serves as a director for several firms, including Regent Drilling Limited and Northern Development Company Limited of Edmonton.

An outstanding athlete in his own right, he has competed in the Ironman Triathlon-an event in which one must swim 2.4 miles, ride 112 miles on a bicycle, and run 26.2 miles, all consecutivelyas well as in other triathlon races and several marathons.

Bowlen is a member of several clubs and societies, including the Young President's Organization, the Canadian and Edmonton Bar Associations, and the Law Society of Alberta.

In addition to his Denver home, he also maintains residences in Honolulu, Hawaii and Edmonton, Alberta.





VICE PRESIDENT/HEAD COACH

DAN REEVES Vice President / Head Coach

Dan Reeves has established himself as one of the leading coaches in the National Football League and stands as the winningest coach in the Denver Broncos' history as he prepares for the 1986 season, having taken Denver to a 45-28 record (a .616 percentage) over his five seasons at the club's helm. Only six NFL coaches have recorded 40 wins or more in that five year period, with Reeves obviously included in that group.

His 1985 edition set 13 team and 11 individual single season Bronco records, including most points scored (380), most touchdowns scored (45), and most yards of total offense (5,496).

He has had winning campaigns in four of his five seasons here and has made the playoffs twice, winning the AFC West title in 1984. Last year his team narrowly missed a third straight playoff appearance, losing out by virtue of the NFL's tiebreaking formula despite an 11-5 record that was tied for third best in the entire league.

Despite the disappointment of failing to make the playoffs in 1985, Reeves in the last two years has posted two of the three best records in franchise history. His 13-3 mark in 1984 gave Denver its highest victory total ever and garnered numerous Coach of the Year honors for the Bronco mentor (Kansas City 101 Club, Pro Football Weekly, Sports Illustrated, Football News, College and Pro Football Newsweekly).

He also finished second in the UPI AFC Coach of the Year balloting in 1983, a season in which he paced the Broncos to a 9-7 mark

and a wild card playoff berth.

Reeves, who enters his sixth season at the Broncos' helm this year, was the youngest coach in the NFL when he assumed command of the club in 1981, guiding Denver to a 10-6 record and barely missing a playoff berth in that inaugural campaign.

Reeves had been a member of the Dallas coaching staff since 1970, when he undertook the difficult dual role of player-coach for two seasons. He was a fulltime offensive backfield coach in 1972, but spent 1973 in private business before rejoining the staff again as backfield coach in 1974.

In 1977, he took on the job of offensive coordinator, in which his duties included coaching the guarterbacks and wide receivers.

A native of Americus, Ga. (1/19/44), Reeves began his pro career as a free agent running back for the Cowboys in 1965. He had been a quarterback as a college player at South Carolina and was inducted into South Carolina's Hall of Fame eight years ago.

An all-purpose offensive back during his eight seasons (1966-72) on the Dallas roster, Reeves finished his career as the Cowboy's fifth all-time leading rusher, despite a series of injuries that slowed him in the later stages of his career.

He rushed for 1,990 yards and 25 touchdowns, and caught 129

passes for 1,693 yards and 17 TDs.

Because of his collegiate quarterback background, Reeves was also a respected halfback option passer, completing 30 such attempts for a pair of TDs during his career. In addition, he returned some kickoffs and punts along the way, and played in the NFL championship games of 1966, 1967, and 1970. He has played or coached in five Super Bowls.

Reeves and his wife Pam are the parents of three children, daughters Dana (9/21/65) and Laura (9/19/70), and son Lee

(11/4/67).

GENERAL MANAGER

JOHN BEAKE General Manager

John Beake enters his second season as General Manager and his eighth campaign overall with the Denver Broncos in 1986, his 17th season in professional football as either administrator or coach.

As General Manager, he is responsible for all day-to-day operations of club administration, which includes the area of contract negotiations, a field in which he has considerable experience.

Beake was the first NFL general manager to sign all his club's 1985 draft choices, and he plays a vital role in player acquisition via trades and free agent signings.

All of Denver's administrative depart-

ment heads report directly to John Beake, who coordinates the movement of each department with the counsel of Dan Reeves and team owner Pat Bowlen. Together, the three embody the major decision-making element of the Denver Broncos.

John was Assistant General Manager in 1984 and was the Broncos' Director of Football Operations the previous year, so his role as General Manager is the culmination of a steady rise within the organization.

He joined the Broncos in 1979 as the Director of Pro Personnel and became Director of Player Personnel in 1981, having concentrated on the coaching aspects of the game prior to coming to Denver.

As assistant coach for the Kansas City Chiefs from 1968 through 1974, John was the offensive backfield coach for the Chiefs when they defeated the Minnesota Vikings to win Super Bowl IV in New Orleans. He also coached the running backs at New Orleans in

On the college level, he coached at Penn State in 1961-62 and was the offensive coordinator at Colorado State University in 1975. John coached on the high school level for six years prior to joining the Penn State staff in 1961.

He has a degree from Trenton State College in New Jersey and a master's degree from Penn State.

An avid skier, he is an annual participant in the Winter Park Pro-Am Ski Race to benefit the handicapped skiers program in Colorado.

John and his wife, Marcia, have three children, Jerilyn, Chip, and Christopher, and the family makes its home in Fort Collins.



MARVIN BASS **Special Assistant**

With over 40 years experience as a coach and administrator in college and profootball, Marvin Bass this year is in his fourth campaign in the position of special assistant. He served the Broncos in that capacity in 1982-83, and was the head offensive line coach in 1984.

Bass came to Denver from the Canadian Football League, where he had been defensive coordinator of the Calgary Stampeders from 1978-

1981.

A native of Norfolk, Virginia who was an All-American at William and Mary in 1942, he elected to go into college coaching after graduation and joined the staff at his alma mater in 1944.

In addition to William and Mary, Bass coached on the college level at North Carolina, Georgia Tech, South Carolina, and the University of Richmond. While head coach at South Carolina Bass coached Dan Reeves, who was the starting quarterback for the Gamecocks.

On the pro level, he was on the Buffalo Bills staff from 1969-71 and spent two years with the Birmingham franchise in the World Football League, including one season as head coach (1975). After the WFL ceased operations Bass rejoined the Buffalo Bills, this time as Director of Pro Scouting from 1975-77, prior to moving to Calgary in 1978.

Marvin and his wife, Audrey, have one son, Randy, and two grand-

sons. Lee and Rhett.

JOE COLLIER **Assistant Head Coach/Defense**

The senior member of the Denver Broncos' coaching staff, Joe Collier was promoted to the position of assistant head coach/defense prior to the 1982 campaign. Recognized as the mastermind of Denver's strong defensive unit, Collier begins his 18th season with the Broncos in 1986.

Collier is one of only four original AFL coaches still active in the NFL. He is the only active coach who has

spent all 26 years with AFL or AFC teams. Collier was on Lou Saban's staff at Western Illinois from 1957 through 1959, then moved with Saban to the Boston Patriots in 1960-61, and on to Buffalo in 1962.

He served as head coach of the Bills in 1966-67-68, then rejoined Saban's staff with the Broncos in 1969.

Collier was an All-Big Ten selection as an end during his college days at Northwestern, and played in the Senior Bowl and the East-West Shrine game. Drafted by the New York Giants, he chose instead to spend the next two years in the Army, after which he joined the coaching ranks at Western Illinois.

Joe and his wife, Shirley, have three children, Julie, Lisa and

Joe.



CHAN GAILEY Special Teams/Tight Ends

Chan Gailey is in his second season as the Denver Broncos special teams coach and this year will be coaching the team's tight ends as well. He came to the club from Troy State in Troy, Ala., where he was head coach from 1983-84, winning the NCAA Division II national championship in 1984. Last year he was a defensive assistant in addition to coaching the Bronco special teams.



Gailey began his coaching career as the defensive backfield coach at Troy State in 1976-78, before moving on to the Air Force Academy as the Falcons' secondary coach in 1972. Gailey rose to the position of defensive coordinator with the Falcons in 1981, and returned to Troy State in 1983.

A native of Americus, Ga., Gailey earned 12 varsity letters at Americus High School before entering the University of Florida, where he earned his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1974. He earned three letters at Florida, two as a quarterback and one as a special teams player.

Gailey served as a graduate assistant at Florida in 1974 and 1975, with the Gators going to the Sugar Bowl in 1974 and the Gator Bowl the following year.

Chan and his wife Laurie have two sons, Tate and Andrew.

ALEX GIBBS Offensive Line

Alex Gibbs is in his third year as offensive line coach for the Broncos, coming to the club from the University of Georgia, where he was offensive line coach in 1982-83.

Prior to moving to Georgia, he was the offensive coordinator at Auburn from 1979-81, also working as the offensive line coach and as quarterback coach during his tenure there.

ack coach during his tenure there. Gibbs also is a former offensive co-

ordinator and line coach at Ohio State (1975-78), and he has held coaching positions at West Virginia (1973-74), Kentucky (1971-72), and Duke (1969-70).

He began his career as the head coach at Mount Airy (N.C.) High School from 1966-68, where his teams won three conference championships and two state titles.

A graduate of Davidson College in 1963, Gibbs earned his master's degree from the University of North Carolina in 1964.

Alex is married (Woo) and has five children, daughter Sandy and sons Steve, David, Chuck and Mark.

STAN JONES Defensive Line

One of the leading linemen in the National Football League in his playing days, Stan Jones is marking his 33rd consecutive year in pro football in 1986.

This is the 16th season as defensive line coach of the Broncos for Jones, who is on his second tour of duty in the Mile High City.

Jones served on the Bronco staff under Lou Saban from 1967 to 1971,



spent the next four years with Saban in Buffalo, then rejoined the Broncos in 1976.

Jones was an All-American tackle at Maryland in 1953 and was named the nation's Lineman of the Year. In 1977, he was named to the Atlantic Coast Conference's 25-year All-Star team. He has been honored by the Maryland Alumni Association as Man of the Year, and is a member of Pennsylvania's Sports Hall of Fame.

He played 12 years with the Chicago Bears and one with the Washington Redskins, gaining All-Pro honors as an offensive guard four times and appearing in seven Pro Bowls.

Stan and his wife, Darlis, have a daughter, Sherrie, and two sons, Kevin and Tony.

AL MILLER Strength/Conditioning


Al Miller will be in his second season as the Broncos' strength and conditioning coach in 1986. He came to Denver from the University of Alabama, where he was the strength coach from 1982-84.

Prior to moving to Alabama Miller was the strength and conditioning coach at Northeast Louisiana in 1981 and Mississippi State in 1980. He spent 1979 in private business, after

working as linebacker and strength coach at Northwestern Louisiana in 1974-78. Miller coached on the high school and junior high school levels in 1970-73.

Miller, a native of El Dorado, Ark., received his bachelor's degree from Northeast Louisiana, graduating from the school in 1970. He earned a master's degree from Louisiana Tech in 1974.

Al and his wife Janis have a son, Carey Brian, and a daughter, Lisa.



Myrel Moore will be in his 11th season on the Denver Broncos' coaching staff in 1986, and this campaign will mark his ninth as the club's linebacker coach. He coached the linebackers in 1983-85 after having rejoined the Broncos as an offensive line coach in 1982

His previous stint in Denver came from 1972-77. Moore coached the offensive line and special teams in

1972, then took over as linebacker coach the following year. He was a tight end and linebacker at the University of California-Davis from 1954-56 and played defensive back for the Washington Redskins in 1957-58 before beginning his coaching career.

Moore joined the staff at Santa Ana JC in 1959 and became head coach in 1963 before moving on to the University of California, where he coached from 1964-71 as the defensive coordinator.

He was on the Oakland Raiders' staff as their linebackers coach in 1978-79 before returning to the Broncos as a scout in 1981.

Myrel is married (Sondra) and has four children, daughters

Michelle, Meagan, and Mayce, and a son Michael.



NICK NICOLAU Running Backs

Nick Nicolau once again will coach Bronco running backs this year, having assumed that role in 1982 after joining the club as a special assistant the previous season.

A veteran of 28 years as a coach on every level—high school, small college, major college, and both the NFL and Canadian Football League—Nicolau came to Denver from the New Orleans Saints, where he coached in 1980.

He was Director of Player Personnel and running back coach at Montreal (CFL) in 1978-79, with the Alouettes winning the conference championship and playing in the Grey Cup both years.

Nicolau was a running back at Southern Connecticut State College and began his coaching career there in 1960 after coaching in high school for two years

in high school for two years.

Nick graduated from Southern Connecticut after serving in the United States Marine Corps. He went on to earn a master's degree from Indiana University and a doctorate from Springfield College.

Nicolau and his wife Eleanor have four daughters, Tracy, Shari, Vickie, and Wendy, and two sons, Duane and Randy.

MIKE SHANAHAN Offensive Coordinator/ Quarterbacks and Wide Receivers

Mike Shanahan is in his third season with Denver and his second as offensive coordinator, having come to the club from the University of Florida, where he was the offensive coordinator and assistant head coach in 1983.

Shanahan had been Florida's offensive coordinator since 1980, and in 1983 the Gators set an NCAA offensive record with 4,540 total yards, pro-

ducing a 9-2-1 mark. Starting quarterback Wayne Peace set a national mark under Shanahan's tutelage, completing 70.7 percent of his passes.

A native of Oak Park, III., Shanahan graduated from Eastern Illinois in 1974 and earned a master's degree there in 1975.

He began his coaching career at Oklahoma in 1975-76, serving as an offensive backfield and receivers coach for the Sooners.

Shanahan was Northern Arizona's offensive backfield coach in 1977 and served as offensive coordinator at Eastern Illinois in 1978 and at Minnesota in 1979.

Mike and his wife, Peggy, have two children, son Kyle and daughter Krystal, and the family makes its home in Aurora.

CHARLIE WEST Defensive Backs

Charlie West, who concluded his NFL playing career as a Bronco defensive back in 1978-79, is in his fourth year as the club's defensive backfield coach in 1986.

West came to Denver from the University of California, where he coached outside linebackers and coordinated special teams in 1982. He spent the previous season as the defensive backfield coach at Macalester College in St. Paul, Minn.





He had a 12-year NFL career that began with Minnesota from 1968-73 and continued with Detroit from 1974-77 before West was traded to the Broncos.

West graduated from the University of Texas-El Paso in 1968. Charlie and his wife, Barbara, have two children, son Michael and daughter Sandra.

SCOUTING STAFF

REED JOHNSON Director of Player Personnel

Reed Johnson, who enters his sixth season with the Denver Broncos in 1986, is the Director of Player Personnel for the NFL club and as such is in charge of Denver's entire scouting program.

He came to Denver as special teams coach in 1981 and served as Coordinator of Pro Scouting in 1982 before taking over as the Broncos' Coordinator of College Scouting from 1983-85.

Johnson spent eight years as a scout for the Dallas Cowboys before coming to Denver. Prior to his stint with Dallas, he was an assistant coach on the college level at New

Mexico, Oklahoma State, and Tulsa.

A graduate of the University of Colorado, Johnson played in the Buffaloes' defensive backfield for four years and was a member of the school's Big Eight championship team in 1961.

He coached high school football in Texas for five seasons, including four at Highland Park High School in Dallas, where Johnson himself had played on a state championship team in 1957.

Reed has two daughters, Jill, 21, and Holly, 19. He and his wife Peggy reside in Denver.

CARROLL HARDY Director of Pro Personnel

Carroll Hardy, the Director of Pro Personnel for the Broncos, begins his 23rd year with the club in 1986.

A 10-letter winner at the University of Colorado, Hardy is considered one of the greatest athletes ever to play in the state of Colorado.

He played pro football for the San Francisco 49ers and major league baseball with the Cleveland Indians, Boston Red Sox, Houston Astros, and Minnesota Twins, in 1960 earning a

niche in sports history by becoming the only man ever to pinch hit for Ted Williams.

A native of South Dakota, Hardy is a member of the Sports Halls of Fame in both South Dakota and Colorado.

Carroll and his wife, Janice, have three children, Jay, Jill, and Lisa, and make their home in Boulder.

Keith Bishop had another fine season as the Broncos' starting left guard in 1985, starting all but two games at that position (he missed the Miami and Houston games due to a knee injury). He again was one of the key members of a Bronco line that allowed 38 quarterback sacks, second fewest allowed by Denver (35 in 1984 was the fewest) since the 1973 campaign. Steve Busick had another outstanding season in 1985, again leading all linebackers in tackles with 81 and ranking as one of just eight Broncos to start all 16 games last year. Rubin Carter has played more games at nose tackle (147) than any other player in NFL history. He has played exclusively at that position since the Broncos went to the 3-4 defense for the 1976 season, his second year in the NFL. Barney Chavous, the senior member of Denver's defensive line corps, now has played in 182 games, the most by any player in Bronco history. John Elway took some spectacular steps forward in 1985, as the Stanford graduate rewrote the Denver record book and was named by his teammates as the Broncos' most valuable offensive player. Elway set Bronco single season records for attempts (605, which led the NFL and fell just four passes short of the all-time record of 609 held by Dan Fouts), completions (327, second in the NFL), passing yards (3,891, second in the NFL), total rushing and passing plays (656, which led the NFL), and total offense (4,144, which led the NFL). In addition, Elway rushed for 253 yards, which led all AFC quarterbacks for the second straight season, and his career rushing average of 4.71 per carry is the highest in franchise history. He had a franchise high of three 300-yard games while throwing for over 250 yards seven times. Elway had a four-TD game, three three-TD games, and two two-TD games, finishing the season with a streak of seven consecutive games in which he threw at least one TD pass. His 22 scoring passes marked the team's second best single season figure ever, and he now is 25-9 (.735) in his last 34 starts and 27-14 (.658) overall as a starting NFL quarterback. Bronco coaches feel that Elway gained confidence and continued to develop his strong leadership qualities in 1985, now having led Denver to a 23-7 record

(.767) over the 1984-85 campaigns, with that two-year victory total second only to Dan Marino's at Miami. Last year he set personal single-game highs in attempts (50 vs. San Diego, 11/17), completions (28 vs. San Diego, 11/17 and vs. New Orleans, 9/15), vards (432 at Seattle, 12/20), rushing yards (49 at Indianapolis, 10/13), and interceptions (five vs. Kansas City, 12/14). He has thrown for 8,152 yards, good for second place among all-time Bronco quarterbacks, and the one-time Stanford All-American has the third best interception avoidance mark in Denver history (.042). He led the Broncos to a 12-2 record in his 14 1984 regular season starts. finishing eighth among AFC passers (214 completions in 380 attempts for 2,598 yards and 18 touchdowns). Not only was Elway's passing a factor in his leadership of the offense, but he finished third on the team in rushing with 237 yards. Elway tied the franchise record with five scoring passes in a single game (vs. Minnesota on 11/18/84) and posted his only 300-yard game of the campaign against the Patriots (315 on 11/4/84). In the team's final regular season game at Seattle, he gained 43 yards on nine carries in pacing Denver to the division title. Elway was not able to start two games due to injury and sat out one altogether (10/28 at Los Angeles Raiders). He has worked very hard in the Bronco weight room to build up his upper body, and is considered to be both heavier and stronger than he was during his first two seasons. Elway started 10 games overall in 1983, including the first five before being replaced by Steve DeBerg and five more after DeBerg was injured at Seattle (11/6). Elway did not have impressive stats as a rookie, finishing 17th among AFC passers, but he carried a tremendous emotional burden all season, having come into the NFL as the most publicized college prospect since Joe Namath in 1965. John struggled for much of the season before putting outstanding performances back to back in December against Cleveland and Baltimore, both Denver wins and the latter of which clinched a playoff spot for the Broncos. He completed 16 of 24 for 284 yards and two touchdowns against the Browns and the following week brought Denver back from a 19-0 deficit with three fourth quarter scoring passes, leading the Broncos to a 21-19 win. He completed 23 of 44 for 345 yards in that game, all single game highs for his rookie year. Elway was the first player selected in the 1983 NFL draft and joined the Broncos by trade on 5/2/83. An exceptional pure passer, his talents were honed by the pro-style offense employed by Stanford.

COLLEGE: John concluded his college career with five major NCAA Division 1-A records and nine major Pac-10 marks. Elway completed 62.1 percent of his career passes (774 of 1,243, both NCAA highs) for 9,349 yards and 77 touchdowns, while setting an NCAA record for the lowest percentage of passes intercepted in a career (3.13 percent). He passed for over 200 yards in 30 of 42 games. As a senior, John was a consensus All-American and finished second in Heisman Trophy balloting while setting virtually every Pac-10 and Stanford career record for total offense and passing. In 1982 he passed for over 2,500 yards for an NCAA record third straight season capping his career as the East-West Shrine Offensive Player of the Game. He threw for two or more TDs in all but three games as a senior. As a junior Elway received All-America recognition and was named All-West Coast first team by UPI. John was the first sophomore ever named Pac-10 Player-of-the-Year and also the first sophomore ever named a first team All-American (The Sporting News). He compiled amazing 1980 statistics, completing 65.4 percent of his attempts for 2,889 yards and 27 TDs. In limited action as a freshman he completed 50 of 96 attempts for 544 yards, setting a school record for freshmen by hurling six TD passes. A two-sport star, John played baseball for the New York Yankees' Oneonta (N.Y.) single-A farm club in 1982, hitting for a .318 average and knocking in a team-high 24 runs batted in. He was the Yankees' first selection in the 1981 summer draft. He hit .349 with nine homers

and 50 RBI in 49 games in his final college baseball season as a sophomore. Elway has a degree in economics from Stanford.

PERSONAL: John and his wife Janet have a daughter, Jessica Gwen (10/17/85), and the family makes its home in Aurora, Colo. He is a member of the Mayor's Council on Physical Fitness and is Chairman of the National Kidney Foundation for the Rocky Mountain Region. A native of Port Angeles, Wash., Elway was the most highly recruited prep athlete in the nation in 1979 and was listed on Parade, Scholastic Coach, Football News, and National Coaches Association All-America teams. He had an unparalleled footballbaseball career at Granada Hills HS. John was 129 of 200 for 1,837 yards and 19 TDs as a senior, while leading the baseball team to the Los Angeles City championship with a .491 batting average and a 4-2 pitching record. He completed 60 percent of his high school passes for 5,711 yards and 49 TDs. The Kansas City Royals selected him in the 1979 summer draft, although he already had signed a national letter of intent with Stanford. John's father, Jack, now is the head coach at Stanford. Jack coached his son in the East-West Shrine contest in which John earned Offensive MVP laurels.

Simon Fletcher played in all 16 games last year and increased his playing time as the season went on, making his first pro start at Pittsburgh (12/1). Steve Foley had another fine year as Denver's starting free safety in 1985, moving within striking distance of Denver's all-time interception record. Foley picked off three passes last year, including two in the season opener at the Los Angeles Rams (9/8), to give him a career total of 42, one short of the team record held by Goose Gonsoulin. He now ranks third in the NFL among active interceptors behind Donnie Shell of Pittsburgh (47) and Seattle's Dave Brown (45). Foley was bothered early in the season by a knee injury, although he continued to start. Against Houston (10/6) he suffered a shoulder sprain and spent the next four weeks on injured reserve. In addition to his three interceptions, Foley posted 48 total tackles and seven passes defensed. Foley was one of only eight Broncos to start all 16 games in 1984, intercepting six passes to tie Mike Harden for the team lead. Foley also scored his first pro touchdowns in 1984 on a 40-yard interception return at Seattle (12/15) and a 22-yard fumble return on the first play from scrimmage against Green Bay (10/15) in a Monday night blizzard. He ranked second on the team and first among defensive backs in tackles with 167 and he broke up 10 passes. Foley intercepted five passes in 1983 while leading the defensive backs in tackles with 124 despite missing two games with an ankle injury. He returned to the starting lineup at free safety that year after having missed virtually all of 1982 due to a broken right forearm suffered in a goal line collision with San Diego wide receiver Wes Chandler on opening day. Foley was Denver's interception leader for four straight years (1978-81) and in 1981 picked off five passes in his first full year as a free safety. His shift to free safety for the eighth game of the 1980 campaign marked the second position change of his career - he was a college quarterback at Tulane. Drafted by the Broncos in 1975, he opted instead for the WFL as a quarterback, eventually was shifted to the defensive backfield at Jacksonville and subsequently came to Denver as an experienced defender. led the team in tackles with 82 and in passes defensed with 18, tying for the team lead in interceptions for the second consecutive season with five. He returned those five thefts for a team-high 100 yards, including one for a 42-yard game-clinching touchdown at Pittsburgh (12/1). Harden is one of only eight Broncos to start every game in each of the last two campaigns. In 1984 he tied for the team lead in interceptions with a career-high six and also led the team in passes defensed with 18, scoring the first touchdown of his career on a 45-yard interception return against Kansas City (9/23). In 1983 Harden moved from safety to cornerback and finished the year leading the AFC in interception return yards with 127, and his average of 31.8 was the highest in the NFL among players with four or more interceptions. Harden began the 1982 season as Denver's nickel back and became the club's starting free safety in the second week of the season, starting four games before a knee sprain sustained in practice forced him to miss the campaign's final four games. Harden played in five games and was in on 51 tackles in addition to making two interceptions and recovering a fumble. He played in every game of his first two pro seasons, primarily as a valuable special teams performer, making his first three starts late in the 1981 campaign. Harden was second on the club in kickoff returns with 11 in 1981.

COLLEGE: Mike was All-Big Ten in 1978 and 1979, closing out his college career with an appearance in the Japan Bowl. A four-year letterman at Michigan, Harden led Wolverine defensive backs in tackles with 50 as a senior and posted seven career interceptions. He also returned punts in college, handling 24 for a 7.4 average, and graduated from Michigan with a degree in political science.

Mark Haynes was acquired from the New York Giants on April 29 (draft day), in exchange for Denver's second round draft choices in 1986 and 1987, and for a sixth round choice which the Broncos earlier had obtained from Tampa Bay. In joining the Broncos Haynes returns to an area in which he has many close ties, having been a star performer at the University of Colorado. One of the NFL's most proficient cornerbacks over the last several years, Haynes had perhaps his best season in 1984, earning All-NFL accolades for the fourth straight year and being voted into the Pro Bowl for a third straight season. He had his best production ever in the area of interceptions, registering a career high of seven for 90 yards returned, the second best total in the NFC. Additionally, he had 39 tackles and two fumble recoveries during that campaign and was noted for his leadership in the Giants' young secondary. Haynes went down with a knee injury in the next to last game of the season and missed the playoffs and Pro Bowl due to that injury. The injury did not require surgery and he returned healthy for 1985, although he sat out the first part of last year before ultimately returning to play in five 1985 games for the Giants, starting one. He also did not play in one game, thus totaling six games for which he was on New York's active roster. He sustained a groin injury and subsequently spent the last portion of the 1985 campaign on New York's injured reserve list. The Giants' number one draft choice in 1980 (and the eighth player selected in the entire NFL draft), Haynes became an almost instant star in his second pro season, winning All-NFL first team honors (Pro Football Weekly, NEA, Sports Illustrated), and followed that up in 1982 with a second straight All-NFL season, in addition to being named as a starter in the Pro Bowl for the first time. In 1983 he recorded three interceptions and started in the Pro Bowl for the second straight campaign. Haynes scored his only NFL touchdown in the Giants' 1981 playoff victory over Philadelphia when he recovered a fumble in the end zone. Through his first five pro seasons Haynes missed just three games.

COLLEGE: Mark was a unanimous All-American choice at the University of Colorado in his senior season, and was an All-Big Eight selection twice. He won four varsity letters as both a cornerback and safety, concluding his career with 256 tackles, eight fumble recoveries, five interceptions, and three blocked kicks. He had a 97-yard interception return for a touchdown vs. Army in 1977 and had 18 tackles in one game vs. Iowa State that same season. Haynes was a co-captain in his senior year and was selected to play in both the Hula Bowl and Senior Bowl games.

PERSONAL: Mark and his wife Victoria have two daughters, Iman (4/28/83) and Jasmine (11/4/85), and they make their home in Upper Saddle River, N.J. Paul Howard played in every game at his customary right guard spot in 1985, the fifth consecutive year in which he saw action in every contest. Howard was one of the fixtures in an offensive line that helped pave the way for new Denver records in total offense (5,496 yards) and touchdowns (43). Over the last two seasons the line has allowed its lowest sack totals (35 in 1984 and 38 last year) since 1973, and Howard has been a mainstay at right guard. Ricky Hunley is expected to challenge for a starting position in 1986. He played primarily on special teams in 1985 and was that unit's statistical leader. As a reserve linebacker he registered 19 tackles and two passes defensed. Hunley made his first professional starts against Houston (10/6) and the Los Angeles Raiders (11/24). He came to the Broncos by way of trade from Cincinnati in the middle of the 1984 campaign and played in the final eight games of the season, as well as in the playoff game against Pittsburgh, seeing most of his action on special teams. Hunley was the seventh player taken in the 1984 player draft, but opted not to sign at that time.

Tom Jackson was named by his teammates as the Broncos' most inspirational player once again in 1985, despite missing the first four games of the season on injured reserve due to a training

camp knee injury. Jackson missed most of training camp and ultimately underwent an arthroscope on August 22, rejoining the active roster for the fifth game of the season and working his way back into the starting lineup in week 10 (11/11 vs. San Francisco). Overall, Jackson started five games and was in on 28 tackles last year, the fifth consecutive campaign in which he earned the club's most inspirational player award—he is the only Bronco ever to have won the honor. In 1984 he started every game and finished fourth on the team in tackles with 141, also recording six quarterback sacks and defensing 13 passes, the latter figure leading all club linebackers. He was named second team All-NFL by College and Pro Football Newsweekly and also earned All-AFC honors from Pro Football Weekly and UPI (second team). Jackson also was cited by the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame as its pro athlete of the year for 1984. He has 20 career interceptions, a figure which ties him with the retired Randy Gradishar for the all-time club record among linebackers, and his 431/2 career sacks rank as fifth highest in team annals. A big play performer throughout his Bronco career, Jackson has returned three interceptions for touchdowns in the NFL, including a 73-yarder to clinch a critical win against Baltimore in the 1977 Super Bowl campaign. His total of seven interceptions in 1976 is Denver's single season record by a linebacker, and Jackson's career interception return yardage of 340 and his return average of 17.0 both are team highs by a linebacker. He has made three appearances in the Pro Bowl (1977, 1978, and 1979) and has been named first team All-Pro twice (1977 and 1978). Jackson was named by his teammates as Denver's defensive most valuable player in 1974, 1976, and 1977. He is third in Bronco history in games played (175) and games started (163), and is one of only three players to have performed in a Bronco uniform for 13 years.

COLLEGE: Tom was one of the most publicized players in the history of the University of Louisville, having made All-Missouri Valley Conference for three consecutive years, and being named the Missouri Valley Conference Player of the Year twice, as a sophomore in 1970 and again as a senior in 1972. Butch Johnson had a fine year in 1985, recording 19 receptions for 380 yards and three touchdowns. His 20.0 average per catch was high on the team. Johnson caught a touchdown pass in each of the first three games, including a 65-yard flea flicker pass from John Elway vs. New Orleans (9/15) that was the Broncos' longest of 1985. He started eight games last year and ended the season on a strong note, catching four passes for 69 yards in the season finale at Seattle (12/20), thereby ending a six-week period in which he did not have a reception. Johnson recorded his professional highs in receptions (42), yards (587), touchdowns (six), and starts (nine) in 1984, his first season with the Broncos. He came to Denver in a preseason trade with the Houston Oilers, who had acquired him several months earlier from the Dallas Cowboys. Johnson, who is going into his 11th NFL season, also established new personal single-game highs in 1984 against New England (11/4) with nine catches for 156 yards, which was the best performance of any Bronco receiver during that campaign. Johnson had his best year with the Cowboys in 1983 with 41 receptions for 561 yards and three touchdowns. He played in five NFC championship games with Dallas and is also a veteran of two Super Bowls. Against Denver in Super Bowl XII he caught two passes for 53 yards, including a 45-yard touchdown pass from Roger Staubach that helped to secure the Cowboy win. Johnson led Dallas in punt and kickoff returns from 1976 through 1978. A third round draft choice of the Cowboys in 1976, Johnson that year tied the NFL record for most punt returns in a game (nine) against Buffalo on 11/15.

COLLEGE: Butch led the nation in receiving in 1975 at California-Riverside with 67 catches for 1,027 yards in only eight games. He was named All-American and team most valuable player that season with the Highlanders. Butch finished his college career

with 139 receptions and 17 touchdowns.

Vance Johnson had a superb season in 1985, as the speedster made the conversion from running back to wide receiver and set new Bronco rookie records for receptions (51) and reception yardage (721 yards). He led the team in punt and kickoff returns as well, and his 1,757 all-purpose yards were tops among all NFL rookies. His receiving totals placed second on the team, although Johnson did not become a fulltime starter until week 10. He registered Denver's high-yardage mark last year with 116 yards on six catches vs. Kansas City (12/14), and he recorded three of the top six yardage marks for the team, including 96 yards at Atlanta (9/22) and 92 yards vs. San Francisco (11/11). Johnson scored three touchdowns, with the longest being a 63-yard catch and run against the Falcons. Denver's first pick in the second round of last year's draft, Johnson ran a 4.36 40-yard dash in rookie camp, a Bronco record.

COLLEGE: Vance was the University of Arizona's key player at tailback in his four years with the Wildcats, finishing fourth in

school history in all-purpose yards (3,442), fifth in scoring (168 pts.), and sixth in receptions (78). He closed out his college career with appearances in the Senior Bowl and the East-West Shrine game, where he caught seven passes and threw a touchdown pass. Rulon Jones made his first Pro Bowl appearance and was named both All-NFL (Pro Football Writers of America, Sports Illustrated, The Sporting News, AP-second team, Newspaper Enterprise Association-second team) and All-AFC (UPI) in 1985, also being named by his teammates as the Broncos' defensive most valuable player. Jones totaled 68 tackles, tops among defensive linemen, 10 quarterback sacks, and three fumble recoveries last year. He had a streak of six straight games in which he posted at least one sack and was named by the NFL as the AFC defensive player of the month for October, recording a sack in each of the four games that month. Last year he and linebacker Karl Mecklenburg combined for 23

sacks, a new Denver record for two players in a single season. Jones is third in Bronco history in sacks, accounting for 48 in his six Denver campaigns. In 1984 he led the team with 11 sacks and paced Denver's pass rush unit to a club record 57, again leading all team linemen in tackles with 105. Jones scored his first pro touchdown in 1984, scoring on a five-yard fumble return at Detroit (10/7), and blocked a field goal vs. Kansas City (9/23). He has started 41 straight games, the third longest streak among active Broncos, and now has started the last 70 games in which he has played. Jones became a starter with three games left in his rookie season and has been there ever since. He missed four games in the 1983 campaign with a knee injury but still posted 72 tackles and four sacks. He had 91/2 sacks in 1981, and in the previous season earned All-Rookie honors (UPI, Pro Football Weekly) as he paced the squad with 111/2 sacks, the most by any Bronco since 1971. Denver's first pick in the 1980 draft, Rulon's best single-game sack performance was against Oakland at Denver in 1980, when he recorded three sacks and seven tackles. Jones has also been credited with two safeties in his

COLLEGE: Rulon was a four-year letterman and starter at Utah State, where he missed only one game during his collegiate career. In 1979 he was selected to second team spots on both the AP and NEA All-America squads and was named honorable mention by UPI. As a senior he was All-Pacific Coast Athletic Assn. and was named PCAA Defensive Player of the Year. Rulon's best college performance was a game against Fresno State in which he posted 15 tackles and three sacks. Jones played in the East-West Shrine Game and the Senior Bowl.

Rich Karlis had a somewhat disappointing season in 1985 but is expected to bounce back strong for another outstanding campaign this year. Karlis scored a career high 110 points last year but

connected on just 23 of 38 field goal attempts, with that .605 percentage ranking as the lowest of his four-year pro career. Nevertheless, his career field goal percentage of .731 going into 1986 still stands as the all-time Bronco record, and he now is third in scoring (355 total points) among all-time Denver players, needing just 54 more points to pass Gene Mingo and move into second place. He began the 1985 season by connecting on his first nine attempts, which coupled with his four straight successes at the end of 1984 regular season gave Karlis a team record 13 consecutive field goals. Karlis had a fine season as the Broncos' placekicker in 1984, connecting on 21 of 28 field goal attempts and pacing the club in scoring with 101 points, the first 100-point season of his career. Karlis holds three of the four best single season percentages in club annals. He has connected on 76 of 104 field goal attempts as a professional and is the only Denver kicker ever to reach the .800 level in accuracy, a feat which he twice has accomplished. In 1984 Karlis hit the goal posts with game-tying field goal attempts in consecutive games (11/25 vs. Seattle and 12/2 at Kansas City), but rebounded strongly to finish the season with four consecutive successful attempts, including a game-winning kick vs. San Diego on 12/9. Karlis had five games in which he kicked three field goals in 1984, and followed that up with three more last year. He twice has connected on 50-yard attempts as a pro, last year vs. San Diego (12/9) and in 1983 vs. Cleveland (12/4). Karlis was named to the Football Digest All-Rookie team in 1982 and connected on the first 11 field goal attempts of his pro career. A barefoot, soccer-style kicker, Karlis emerged from a 478-player free agent walk-on camp in May of 1982 to win the kicking job. He was in the Houston Oilers training camp in 1981.

COLLEGE: Rich earned three letters at Cincinnati and led the Bearcats in scoring as a senior with 41 points, including 12 extra points and 10 of 15 field goal attempts, six from beyond the 40-yard line. Primarily a kickoff specialist as a sophomore and junior, Karlis had a successful 50-yard field goal attempt as a senior. He has his degree in economics from Cincinnati.

PERSONAL: Rich and his wife Dena make their home in the Denver suburb of Aurora. He worked with Sill-Terhar Ford during the off-season. He is a graduate of Salem HS in his native Salem, Ohio. Rich is extremely active in community service work and in both 1984 and 1985 was the Broncos' Lite Beer NFL Man of the Year, finishing among the top five in the national competition. Rich in 1984 started a program called Points for People, which raises money for The Family Tree, an organization that provides shelter for abused women and children. Rich raised \$65,000 through Points for People in 1984 and also was the 1984 Boy Scouts Service Award winner. Last year the Points for People program raised \$125,000. He has worked for the benefit of numerous organizations, including Children's Hospital and Multiple Sclerosis.

Clarence Kay showed tremendous improvement as a receiver in 1985, leading Bronco tight ends with 29 receptions for 339 yards, both of which are career highs. Kay, who is considered by Denver coaches to be one of the best blocking tight ends in the NFL, also set personal single game highs in receptions (four vs. Miami, 9/29) and reception yards (52 at Pittsburgh, 12/1). Gary Kubiak continues to play very well in relief of John Elway but saw only limited action at quarterback in 1985, completing two of five passes for 61 yards in his three appearances. He threw a 54-yard touchdown pass to Steve Sewell at San Diego (11/3), and after Elway was injured in the season finale at Seattle (12/20) Kubiak drove the Broncos into range for the winning field goal, getting the final six yards on a quarterback draw. He now holds Denver's career record for interception avoidance with a mark of .020, throwing just two interceptions in 102 attempts, as well as the single season record, set in 1984 when he threw just one interception in 75 attempts for a mark of .013. Kubiak turned in a strong performance in 1984, starting two games in place of an injured John Elway and seeing duty in five more. He led the Broncos to a thrilling 22-19 overtime win over the Los Angeles Raiders (10/28), completing 21 of 34 passes for 206 yards and two touchdowns in his second start

of the season. He suffered a concussion in his first start of the year at Chicago, knocking him out of the game. Kubiak also engineered a 75-yard drive that led to the winning score against Cincinnati (9/2) after Elway was injured. He also recorded a 20-yard reception against Buffalo (10/21) and scored on a three-yard run in the same game. As a rookie in 1983 Kubiak started in place of a flu-ridden Elway against Seattle (11/20), leading the Broncos to a 38-27 victory. He threw a 78-yard touchdown pass to Steve Watson and ran eight yards for another score in that game. For the season, he played in four games and he directed two fourth guarter scoring drives in the regular season finale at Kansas City (12/18). An eighthround draft choice of the Broncos, Kubiak has impressed coaches with his knowledge of the game and his leadership abilities.

COLLEGE: Gary Kubiak made the Players' All-Southwest Conference team in 1982 and earned appearances in the Blue-Gray and Hula Bowl games for a season in which he led the SWC in attempts (324), completions (181), percentage (55.9), yardage (1,948), touchdowns (19), and total offense (1,885). Karl Mecklenburg was one of the NFL's biggest success stories of 1985, and his superb play resulted in his being named a starter in the Pro Bowl, where he led the AFC squad with 11 tackles. Mecklenburg did not become a fulltime starter until the 10th week of the campaign but finished with a Bronco record 13 quarterback sacks, including two team record four-sack games (vs. New Orleans on 9/15 and at Pittsburgh on 12/1) in his performance, earning All-NFL (AP, Sports Illustrated, The Football News, Pro Football Writers of America, Newspaper Enterprise Association, and College and Pro Football Newsweekly-second team), and All-AFC (UPI) honors for his efforts. His great versatility enabled the coaching staff to move him around considerably in the Denver defense, and Mecklenburg played seven positions during a campaign in which he also led the team in forced fumbles (five) while posting 65 total tackles and defensing four passes. He displayed his versatility in that Pittsburgh game, lining up at every defensive position except cornerback and safety. Last year Mecklenburg combined with Rulon Jones for 23 sacks, a new Bronco record for two players in a single season, also ranking high in club special teams statistics. Mecklenburg was one of 1984's biggest surprises, making an immediate impact in his conversion to linebacker from defensive end during a campaign that saw him record seven sacks, high among linebackers, and two interceptions for a club-leading 105 yards. Mecklenburg was used largely on third down and passing down situations in 1984, but also saw some action as a defensive end. He played in all 16 games in 1983, posting 24 tackles and two sacks after joining the Broncos as their 12thround draft pick.

COLLEGE: Karl earned second team All-Big Ten Honors (AP and UPI) as a senior at Minnesota. He started his college career at Augustana College (South Dakota), but transferred to Minnesota in 1980, sitting out that season as a redshirt.

Dennis Smith made his first Pro Bowl appearance in 1985 and was named All-NFL (College and Pro Football Newsweekly) and All-AFC (UPI-2nd team) for his efforts, despite missing three games due to injuries. His three interceptions for the year all came against the Los Angeles Raiders (12/8), and he was second on the team with 17 passes defensed. Smith had four quarterback sacks last year. In 1983 Smith recorded professional highs of four interceptions, 114 tackles, and five quarterback sacks despite missing two games with a knee sprain. Smith led all club defensive backs in tackles with 65 in 1982 and as a rookie accounted for three turnovers to go along with 45 tackles. Dave Studdard had another fine season as Denver's starting left tackle in 1985, stretching his consecutive games played streak to 105, which ties Steve Watson's total as the longest streak among active Broncos. Studdard had his streak of 63 consecutive starts snapped vs. Seattle (10/20) due to an ankle sprain, marking just the fifth time in his seven years with Denver that he failed to start. Studdard had a superb season in 1984, allowing just one quarterback sack at his difficult left tackle position. He was a key member of the Denver offensive line that gave up the fewest number of sacks (35) since 1973. Studdard returned to his tackle position in 1983 after a year's experiment at guard. Andre Townsend is expected to battle for a starting spot on Denver's defensive line in 1986 after a season in which he split playing time with starter Barney Chavous at the right defensive end position. He recorded his first professional start in the 1985 season opener at the Los Angeles Rams, and went on to play in all 16 games. Townsend was in on 30 tackles last year, high among reserve linemen, and he posted five sacks for the second straight year, including two at Atlanta (9/22). Against Miami (9/29) Townsend knocked down two passes and became the first player in 1985 to sack Dan Marino. Townsend had a good rookie season as Denver's first choice in the 1984 draft registered five sacks, which led all reserve linemen, and 51 tackles. He played primarily at defensive end in 1984 and had his best game against New England, when he sacked the quarterback twice and was in on 13 tackles. Townsend has impressed Bronco coaches with his outstanding play in shortvardage and goal-line situations.

COLLEGE: Andre was a three-year starter at the University of Mississippi, where he earned second team All-Southeastern Conference honors in his junior and senior years and was a third-team Football News All-America selection in his final collegiate campaign. He was named defensive MVP against Air Force in the 1983 Independence Bowl and also had an excellent game in the Senior Bowl that year, registering two sacks and blocking the game-tying extra point attempt in the South's 21-20 victory. Steve Watson led the Broncos in receiving once again in 1985 with 61 catches for 915 yards and five touchdowns, failing to reach the 1,000 yard mark for the first time in three years, mostly due to Denver's more diversified passing attack. He had five games last year with over 80 yards receiving, with his season high of 97 yards coming vs. Kansas City (12/14). He now has caught at least one pass in 47 straight games, the second longest streak in team history, and from 1981-85 only Green Bay's James Lofton has gained more yards on rceptions than Watson's 5,017. He now needs just three more catches to reach the 300 mark. In his seven years with Denver Watson has caught 297 passes for 5,246 yards, both figures fourth highest in club history, for 32 touchdowns, and is second in team history with 16 games of 100 yards or more. He has played in 105 consecutive games for Denver, never having missed one as a professional, and that total ties Dave Studdard for the team lead among active players. Watson had a tremendous season in 1984, catching his pro high of 69 passes (sixth in the AFC) for 1,170 yards (fourth in the AFC), averaging 17.0 yards per catch and scoring seven touchdowns while recording his third 1,000-yard campaign. Watson combined with running back Sammy Winder to give Denver 1.000-yard performers in both receiving and rushing for the first time in franchise history. Watson's sterling 1984 performance included three regular season 100-yard games and one more in the playoffs, giving him a career total of 16. In the Broncos' division playoff game against Pittsburgh (12/30) he caught his pro high of 11 passes for 177 yards. Watson was named by his teammates as Denver's offensive most valuable player in 1984, an honor which he also received in 1981 and 1983. Watson had a brilliant season in 1981, leading the AFC in reception yardage with 1,244 and pacing the entire NFL in reception touchdowns with 13. His rise to prominence was one of the NFL's most remarkable stories in 1981, as the former free agent from Temple moved into the starting lineup in the second week of the season and rewrote the Bronco record books. He caught 60 passes and set new team records for reception yards (the previous record was 1,235, set by Lionel Taylor in 1960) and TDs (the previous record was 12 by Taylor in 1960). His 13 TDs tied the Denver single season total recorded by Floyd Little in 1972 and 1973. He was named All-AFC by UPI and earned a trip to the Pro Bowl in 1981. Watson has had 16 100-yard games, with his high yardage total of 183 coming at Los Angeles against the Rams in 1982, also posting his single game regular season reception high of 10 in that contest. He has caught touchdown passes of 95 and 93 yards, and holds the Denver record for longest nonscoring reception with an 86-yard play against Kansas City in 1981. Steve caught three TD passes against Baltimore in 1981, scored twice in three other games, and had a streak of at least one TD pass in five straight games that year. Not drafted, Watson signed with Denver in 1979 and has played in every Bronco game since then, being used primarily as a special teams player in his first two years.

COLLEGE: Steve was a four-year letterman at wide receiver for Temple and was selected to the All-East team, playing in the East-West Shrine Game to close out his college career. He also won three letters and two conference championships as a long jumper, graduating with a degree in parks administration.

PERSONAL: Steve and his wife Pam have a daughter, Brittany (6/21/86) and the family makes its home in Aurora, Colo. Steve and his wife worked during the off-season with the Samaritan Shelter and chaired the organization's Buy-A-Brick campaign, which helped finance a new shelter for the homeless. Watson was a nine-letter man at St. Mary's HS in Wilmington, Del., earning three each in football, basketball, and track. He was the honorary chairman of the American Cancer Society in Colorado for 1982 and also has been involved in promotional work for the Children's Hospital of Denver, the March of Dimes, and the Multiple Sclerosis Foundation.

Gerald Willhite had another good year as an all-purpose performer in 1985 despite a knee injury that hampered him throughout the season. He rushed 66 times for 237 yards and three touchdowns, including two at Kansas City (10/27) before suffering a concussion that caused him to leave the game. Against the Los Angeles Raiders (11/24) Willhite posted the best rushing totals of his career with 85 yards on 24 carries. He was third on the team in receptions with 35 for 297 yards and a score, and also returned 16 punts for a 10.4 average, Denver's highest last year, returning two kickoffs as well. Since joining the Broncos in 1982,

Willhite has accumulated 3,043 all-purpose yards. He had a fine season in 1984, ranking second on the club in rushing with a career-high 371 yards, third in reception yardage with 298, and his 200 yards in punt returns was the team high. Willhite, in 1984, had Denver's longest run from scrimmage (52 yards), longest punt return (35 yards) and kickoff return (40 yards), as well as the team's second longest reception (63 yards). A versatile athlete, he holds the Bronco career rushing average record by a running back with a 4.5 mark. Willhite had a disappointing season in 1983, missing the first eight regular season games with a strained hamstring. He led the team that year with a rushing average of 4.4 yards per carry and his 10.9 average on 10 receptions was tops among all backs who had 10 or more catches. As Denver's first-round draft choice in 1982, Willhite led the club in rushing with 347 yards, and he racked up 974 all-purpose yards in his strike-shortened rookie season.

COLLEGE: Gerald made honorable mention All-America and earned All-Pacific Coast Athletic Association honors as a senior at San Jose State, finishing his career as the leading ballcarrier in Spartan history. Willhite rushed for 2,364 yards in two seasons, also catching 107 passes for 927 yards and scoring 28 touchdowns. He had two consecutive seasons with over 1,000 yards rushing and more than 50 receptions, making him one of only two players ever to accomplish that feat. Gerald capped his college career with appearances in the East-West Shrine Game and the Olympia Gold Bowl. He also made All-PCAA in 1980 and was the conference's offensive player of the year as a junior. Willhite transferred to San Jose State from American River JC in Sacramento, which was where he first played organized football as a freshman. A recreation major, he also lettered four times in track as a sprinter.

Steve Wilson had another fine year in 1985, posting three interceptions, 12 passes defensed, and a fumble recovery. He started four of the first five games of the season when injuries struck the defensive backfield, but missed the next two contests with a sprained ankle. He had two interceptions at Pittsburgh (12/1), playing almost the entire game for the injured Louis Wright. Although he has played primarily in a backup role since arriving in Denver in 1982, Wilson's 14 interceptions in that time frame tie him with Steve Foley and Louis Wright for second highest on the team. He intercepted four passes in 1984 and led all reserve defensive backs with 48 tackles. All five of Wilson's interceptions in 1983 came during his three weeks as a starter, including a career-high three in Denver's 38-27 win over Seattle. Wilson was also second on the team in kickoff returns with 24 for 485 yards and a 20.2 average, and he also caught 12-yard pass in Denver's playoff loss to the Seahawks. Wilson joined the Broncos one game into the 1982 season and intercepted two passes, one of which came in the closing seconds to secure a win over the Los Angeles Rams. Originally signed by Dallas as a free agent wide receiver, Wilson led the Cowboys in punt returns in 1979 while catching three passes for a 25.3 average. He converted to cornerback in 1980 and started 11 games there, intercepting four passes in the regular season and two more in the playoffs. He led the Cowboys that year in passes defended with 41 and started the first four games of 1981 before being displaced by Everson Walls. Wilson moved back to wide receiver in 1982, but was a late cut and subsequently joined the Broncos. He is an excellent athlete, as his pro experience on offense, defense, and special teams indicates. He has missed just three games in his pro career.

COLLEGE: Steve finished his four-year Howard University career as the Washington, D.C. school's all-time leading receiver and kick returner. Sammy Winder led the Broncos in rushing for the third straight season in 1985, as he recorded 166 attempts for 715 yards and now has rushed for 2,883 yards in his four seasons with Denver, the third highest total in Bronco history. He scored eight touchdowns (all rushing) to pace the squad and equal his previous career total of eight touchdowns on the ground. Winder also caught 31 passes for 197 yards, setting a personal single game high at Indianapolis (10/ 13) with 63 yards on five receptions. He suffered a knee injury vs. San Diego (11/17) and underwent arthroscopic surgery on the following day, then starting at Pittsburgh (12/1) just 13 days later. A tough competitor, Winder was an opening day starter for Denver despite missing most of training camp due to an appendectomy. Winder had an outstanding season in 1984, as the Southern Mississippi back rushed for over 1,000 yards and was tabbed as Denver's lone representative in the Pro Bowl. His 1,153 yards rushing ranked third in the AFC and 11th in the NFL, and was the second highest total in Bronco history. Winder was the first Bronco back since Otis Armstrong in 1976 to reach the 1,000-yard plateau, and he also set Denver records for number of attempts in a season (296) and in a single game (34 at Los Angeles Raiders, 10/28). Winder was second highest on the team in receptions as well, catching 44 passes for 288 yards, and his 1,441 total yards from scrimmage ranked second in the conference. He ran for two 100-yard games and had four more games in which he gained over 90 yards on the ground. Winder was also second on the team in touchdowns scored with six. Winder moved into a starting role in 1983, rushing for 757 yards despite missing two whole games and virtually all of another with a sprained ankle. He was ranked 12th in the AFC and his rushing total was the eighth highest in Bronco history. Winder's best day as a pro came that year at Houston, where he rushed 29 times for 165, the third highest single game total in Bronco history. He recorded his longest run from scrimmage as a pro with a 52-yard jaunt at Houston. Two weeks earlier he had rushed for 119 yards against the Los Angeles Raiders, which was the first time since 1980 that a Bronco back had gone over 100 yards in a game. Winder was drafted by the Broncos in the fifth round in 1982 and he rushed for 259 in his strike-shortened rookie season.

COLLEGE: Sammy was an extremely productive player at Southern Mississippi, setting school career records for rushing attempts (736), rushing touchdowns (39), and points (234). The second all-time leading Southern Mississippi rusher, he gained 3,114 yards there and led the nation in scoring in 1980 with 20 TDs for 120 points. A two-time All-South Independent selection and honorable mention All-America, Winder had nine 100-yard games in his career and had a personal high of 175 rushing yards against Memphis State in 1981. He earned four college letters.

PERSONAL: Sammy is single and makes his off-season home in Jackson, Miss. He graduated from Ridgeland HS in his native Madison, Miss., lettering three times as a fullback and four times in track and field. Sammy lists hunting and fishing as his favorite hobbies.

Ken Woodard will battle for a starting linebacker job in 1986 after seeing the most extensive playing time of his career in 1985. He started the first nine games of the year in place of the injured Tom Jackson, and shared time with Jackson thereafter. Woodard led all Orange Crush linebackers in first hits with 70 last year and had three quarterback sacks as well. He recorded the only interception by a non-defensive back in the campaign, ending Kansas City's final

drive (12/14) in Denver's 14-13 win. Woodard played in every game for the fourth straight season, never having missed a contest as a pro. He had a fine campaign in 1984 as well. Woodard recorded his first career interception at Detroit (10/7), his hometown, and returned it 27 yards for a touchdown. Woodard started against Cincinnati (9/2) and at Chicago (9/9), and finished the season with 49 tackles, three quarterback sacks, and three passes defensed. A consistent member of Denver's special teams, Woodard was named by teammates as that unit's most valuable player for the second consecutive year in 1984. He played in every game in 1983, making his first professional start against San Diego, in place of the injured Tom Jackson. He was credited with two quarterback sacks and he recovered a fumble while playing at his right outside linebacker position. Woodard, a tenth round draft choice in 1982, has been timed at 4.5 seconds in the 40-yard dash.

Jim Wright set personal highs in receptions (28) and reception yards (246) in 1985, scoring three touchdowns and starting 12 of the 16 games in which he played. Wright once again was the starting H-back in the Broncos' one-back formation, and he now has played that position almost exclusively for the past two years. Last year he tied his single game high of five receptions in a game vs. New Orleans (9/15). Louis Wright had an excellent season in 1985 and was named to the Pro Bowl for the fifth time in his career, also receiving All-AFC honors (UPI) for a campaign in which he tied teammate Mike Harden for the club lead in interceptions with five, Wright's five Pro Bowl honors mark the franchise high for a defensive back. He scored a game-winning touchdown on a 60-yard return of a blocked field goal attempt vs. San Diego (11/17) in overtime. Wright suffered a knee sprain during the 1985 preseason and sat out the opener at the Los Angeles Rams (9/8), also missing most of the game at Pittsburgh (12/1) with a bruised thigh. He defensed 15 passes and was in on 44 tackles last year. Wright has started all but five of the games in which he has played in 11 seasons with Denver and is fourth in team history in games started (145) and seventh in games played (150). Wright had another outstanding season in 1984, giving up only one touchdown pass in the regular season and scoring his first touchdown since 1977. Wright was named All-NFL by the Sporting News and Pro Football Weekly and earned second team honors from the College and Pro Football Weekly and NEA. He made the Pro Football Weekly All-AFC squad and was a second team All-AFC selection by UPI, and was named most valuable defensive player by his teammates for the second time in the last four years. Wright saw only limited action in the 1984 preseason due to a strained calf and a pulled thigh muscle that hampered him throughout training camp. He played but did not start in the season opener against Cincinnati (9/2), but he went on to start every game after that. Against Green Bay in a nationally televised contest Wright scored on a 27-yard fumble return on the Packers' second offensive play from scrimmage (Steve Foley scored on a fumble return on Green Bay's first play). He also recorded an interception in 1984 and broke up 14 passes. Wright had a careerhigh six interceptions in 1983 and was named to the Pro Bowl for his efforts, also having been named to the team in 1977, 1978 and 1979. He enters his 12th season as a Bronco with 23 career interceptions and 11 fumble recoveries. A first-round draft choice by Denver from San Jose State in 1975, Wright has recorded a 4.4 second time in the 40-yard dash.

COLLEGE: Louis had an outstanding two-year career at San Jose State after transferring from Bakersfield JC, lettering twice as a defensive back and capping his career with appearances in the East-West Shrine Game and the College All-Star Game. He was an All-Coast football selection, and also won two letters as a 9.6 sprinter in the 100, posted a 21.2 time in the 220, a 47.6 in the 440, and had a long jump of 25'7" for the track team. Clubs participating in postseason competition will be granted an additional free re-activation. Players not meeting the four-week requirement may not return in the same season to the Active List of the club which originally placed them on Reserve, but may be assigned through the waiver system to other clubs. Players in the category of Reserve/Retired may not be reinstated during the period from 30 days before the end of the regular season on through the postseason.



Dendy rushed for 89 yards and two TDs vs. The Citadel in the season opener and added 59 yards and a score against Georgia, finishing the cam-

paign with 560 yards and six TDs, while also catching 17 passes for 182 yards, a 10.7 average, and one score. Dendy also led the

Known as a big-play performer throughout his South Carolina career, Dendy seldom carried the ball more than 10 times a game due to the veer offensive formation employed by the Gamecocks, yet he accounted for 3,317 total career yards and an average of over six yards each time he handled the ball, including 26 touchdowns in his four-year career. 

Orson Mobley last year earned first team All-West Virginia Conference honors while leading Salem College with 39 receptions for 501 yards, a 12.8 average, and three touchdowns. He also punted 59 times for a 36.2 average and scored on a 49-yard run from punt formation after a bobbled snap from center. In his junior year Mobley was second team all-conference, catching 18 passes for 294 yards, a 16.3 average, and one score. He punted 38 times for a 39.0 average as a

RAYMOND THOMAS (Ray) PHILLIPS, JR. LB 6-3, 240 DOB: July 24, 1964 North Carolina State



Ray Phillips played defensive end at North Carolina State in 1985 and finished with 62 tackles, including two quarterback sacks, six other tackles for lost yardage, one forced fumble, and six pass deflections. He lettered each of his four years and did not redshirt for the Wolfpack and closed out his college career with an appearance in the North-South Shrine Game. He moved to end from defensive tackle after a junior campaign in which he led the defensive line in tackles with 87, includ-

ing 57 unassisted, four sacks, and six other negative yardage tackles, earning second team All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors for his junior season. Phillips recovered a fumble in mid-air and returned it 80 yards for a score against Furman in 1984. He also had a very good sophomore campaign with 59 stops. 
Joe Thomas ended his college career as one of the top receivers in the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) and NCAA-IAA, with career statistics of 192 receptions for 2,192 yards and 36 touchdowns. GAME-BY-GAME REVIEW

LOS ANGELES RAMS 20, DENVER 16

ANAHEIM, CA., Sept. 8 - The Los Angeles Rams handed Denver its first opening-day loss in three years, winning 20-16. The Rams scored on their first possession with a 36-yard Mike Lansford field goal. Denver's Mike Harden recovered a Los Angeles fumble late in the first quarter, and that led to a 24-yard field goal by Rich Karlis. Later in the second period the Rams recovered a fumbled punt return and two plays later went up 10-3 on a twoyard pass from Dieter Brock to David Hill. On Denver's next possession, John Elway drove the Broncos 57 yards in four plays, scoring on a 28-yard pass to Butch Johnson. Karlis' extra point attempt hit the left upright, giving the Rams a 10-9 lead. Free safety Steve Foley's interception of a Brock pass on the Rams' next play led to a 25-yard touchdown pass from Elway to Clint Sampson that put Denver up 16-10 just before halftime. The Rams dominated play in the second half behind running back Charles White's 83 yards. Denver's Gene Lang fumbled on the Rams' 35-yard line early in fourth quarter and Los Angeles drove to the Broncos 16, scoring on a Lansford field goal of 33 yards. The Rams took the lead on their next possession, driving 80 yards in 11 plays and scoring on an eight-yard run by White with 1:57 left in the game. Denver, needing a touchdown to win the game, got as far as the Rams' 29 but failed to score.

DENVER 34, NEW ORLEANS 23

DENVER, CO., Sept. 15 - Denver evened its 1985 record at 1-1 with a 34-23 victory over the New Orleans Saints before 74,488 fans at Mile High Stadium. Denver was led on offense by John Elway, who threw for 353 yards and four touchdowns, and on defense by Karl Mecklenburg, who recorded four of Denver's six quarterback sacks. The Broncos opened the scoring five minutes into the contest on a 65-yard flea-flicker touchdown pass from Elway to wide receiver Butch Johnson. Denver mounted a six-play, 67-yard drive late in the first period and scored on a 26-yard Elway to Clint Sampson pass with only 12 seconds gone in the second quarter. Later in the period the Broncos, buoyed by a 33-yard pass interference penalty, scored again on an Elway pass, this one to running back Gene Lang from ten yards out. New Orleans took only two plays to move the ball 65 yards as the Saints scored on a 39-yard pass from Dave Wilson to Jeff Groth. The extra point failed, leaving the score at 21-6 in favor of Denver. Kicker Rich Karlis nailed a 43-yard field goal on the last play of the first half to give Denver a 24-6 advantage at halftime. A New Orleans field goal early in the third quarter narrowed the Bronco lead to 24-9, but Elway engineered a drive covering 80 yards in six plays that culminated in a two-yard touchdown pass to Clarence Kay. The Saints scored two more touchdowns but managed only two first downs in the game's final ten minutes as Denver's defense stymied their comeback attempt.

DENVER 44, ATLANTA 28

ATLANTA, GA., Sept. 22 — Denver scored 17 points in the final quarter to break open a close game and capture a 44-28 victory over the Atlanta Falcons. The Broncos scored five plays into their first possession of the game on an electrifying 63-yard pass from John Elway to rookie Vance Johnson. The Falcons tied the score six minutes later when linebacker John Rade intercepted an Elway pass and returned it 38 yards for a touchdown. Denver jumped ahead early in the second quarter on a 17-yard pass from Elway to Clint Sampson but Atlanta mounted a 15-play, 75-yard drive on their next possession, scoring on a one-yard run by Gerald Riggs. The Broncos answered back with a scoring drive of their own. Elway hit Steve Watson on Atlanta's one-yard line for a 47-yard gain, and Sammy Winder ran it in on the next play to give the Broncos a 21-14 halftime lead. Atlanta quarterback Steve Bartkowski fired a 62-yard touchdown pass to Billy Johnson on the first play of the third period to tie the score at 21-21. Denver's next two possessions resulted in Rich Karlis field goals of 42 and 25 yards. The Falcons moved ahead 28-27 on the last play of the third quarter on another Bartkowski to Johnson touchdown pass, this one from six yards out. Denver got the ball three times in the fourth quarter and scored on every possession. First, Gene Lang powered his way over for a two-yard TD to put the Broncos into the lead for good. Lang finished the day with 77 yards on 17 carries, both career highs. The Orange Crush stopped Atlanta on a fourth down and five from the Denver 42, and the ensuing drive by Denver resulted in a 47-yard field goal by Rich Karlis. Denver's Steve Wilson, who started his third straight game because of injuries in the secondary, recovered a Stacey Bailey fumble on the Atlanta 41 with just five minutes left in the game. Elway engineered a 59-yard, nine-play drive and threw his third TD pass of the day, his ninth of the year, this one a 31-yard aerial to Butch Johnson. Elway's 291 passing yards on the day gave him 873 yards in just the first three games.

MIAMI 30, DENVER 26

DENVER, CO., Sept. 29 — The Miami Dolphins beat Denver 30-26 in the first meeting of the two AFC teams in Mile High Stadium since 1971. The game, which was hyped as the first John Elway-Dan Marino duel, was played in 29degree weather before a national television audience. Denver got the first big break of the game when Rulon Jones recovered a Miami fumble on the Dolphins' 25-yard line with five minutes left in the first quarter. Gene Lang ran for a 10-yard touchdown on the fifth play of Denver's drive. Miami struck back quickly on its next possession when Dan Marino hit receiver Nat Moore on the Denver 42 and he ran it in for the tying score. After the next Denver drive stalled on the Broncos 12-yard line, Miami got the ball on the Denver 43 and moved it into position for a 40-yard Fuad Reveiz field goal. After an exchange of punts, Elway took the Broncos 82 yards in eight plays with Sammy Winder scoring on a seven yard run to put Denver up 14-10. Miami added a field goal on its next drive and then grabbed the lead with 35 seconds remaining in the half on a 24-yard pass from Marino to Joe Rose. Denver got the ball with 0:29 left on the clock and, aided by an interference penalty, moved within field goal range. Rich Karlis missed on his first attempt but a Miami penalty gave him a second chance and he was successful from 43 yards out. The Broncos moved into the lead 23-20 after a one-yard run by Sammy Winder, which came at the end of a 10-play, 82-yard drive to open the second half. The extra point attempt failed. Marino threw his third TD pass of the day several minutes later, coming on a 46-yard catch-and-run by Vince Heflin, and then the Dolphins went up 30-23 on another Reveiz field goal. Denver had the ball twice in the game's final six minutes but could manage only a field goal on the first possession and Miami's Bud Brown intercepted an Elway pass to end Denver's last threat.

INDIANAPOLIS, IN., Oct. 13 — The Orange Crush defense held Indianapolis to 12 first downs and 237 total yards as Denver beat the Colts 15-10 in the Hoosier Dome. Denver moved into a position to score first with a little over three minutes left in the opening period but Rich Karlis's 43-yard field goal attempt sailed wide right. The Broncos got the ball back four plays later and John Elway hit Clint Sampson on a 45-yard pass to the Colts one-yard line, setting up a touchdown plunge by Sammy Winder. The Colts got the ball back when Eugene Daniel picked off an Elway pass and returned it to the Denver 49. Four plays later Pagel was sacked by Karl Mecklenburg and fumbled, with Rulon Jones recovering for Denver. The Broncos drove to the Indy 12yard line but Karlis was wide on a 28-yard field goal attempt. Indianapolis then mounted an 11-play drive but gave up the ball on downs with just 26 seconds remaining in the game.

DENVER 13, SEATTLE 10 (OT)

DENVER, CO., Oct. 20 - Rich Karlis kicked a 24-yard field goal with 5:41 left in overtime to give Denver a 13-10 win over division-rival Seattle. Denver's defense turned in a stellar performance with three interceptions and five quarterback sacks. The Orange Crush limited the Seahawks to just 77 yards passing in the game. Sammy Winder scored the game's first points on the ninth play of Denver's initial drive on a 36-yard run. Rich Karlis attempted three field goals in the second quarter but the first one was blocked and the other two (from 52 and 56 yards) were no good, giving Denver a slim 7-0 lead at halftime. Seahawk quarterback Dave Krieg fumbled on the first play of the third quarter and Karl Mecklenburg recovered for Denver but the Bronco offense could not advance the ball. Tony Lilly, starting in place of the injured Steve Foley, intercepted a Krieg pass on Seattle's next drive and, with the ball on Seattle's 28, Rick Karlis nailed a 45-yard field goal to put Denver up 10-0. After an exchange of punts, Seattle embarked on an eight-play, 56yard drive behind the running of Curt Warner, who gained 25 of his 136 yards on the series. Krieg completed the drive with a nine-yard touchdown pass to Steve Largent, who kept his consecutive games with a reception streak alive with the catch. DENVER 17, SAN FRANCISCO 16

DENVER, CO., Nov. 11 — Rich Karlis kicked a 24-yard field goal with 1:27 left on the clock to clinch Denver's Monday night victory over the Super Bowl champion 49ers. The game was played in 20-degree weather and a light fog hung over sold-out Mile High Stadium. After a one-yard San Francisco punt midway through the first period, Denver drove for a score with John Elway throwing a three-yard TD pass to Gene Lang. Later in the quarter, San Francisco got on the scoreboard with a 26-yard Ray Wersching field goal. After an exchange of punts Elway led an impressive drive that featured a 50yard flea-flicker bomb to Vance Johnson, who had been placed into the starting line-up for the game. Three plays after that pass, Elway threw his second TD pass of the night, this one for six yards to Steve Watson. On the Broncos' next series, punter Chris Norman snared in a high snap but was tackled on the Denver four-yard line. The Orange Crush held a valiant goal-line stand as San Francisco failed to score on four tries. The 49ers embarked on a nineplay 59-yard drive near the end of the first half when the game took a bizarre twist. As Wersching was about to attempt a field goal from the Denver 10, a snowball landed near holder Matt Cavanaugh, who bobbled the snap and threw an incomplete pass to end the scoring threat. The 49ers cut Denver's lead to 14-10 early in the third quarter on a 13-yard Joe Montana to Mike Wilson pass. On the Broncos' next play from scrimmage, Elway passed to Vance Johnson, but he deflected the ball into the hands of Ronnie Lott. Montana drove the 49ers into field goal range and Wersching's 22-yard effort pulled San Francisco within one point of Denver. The Broncos ran almost six minutes off the clock on their next series but San Francisco staged a goal-line stand and held Denver out of the end zone. San Francisco drove 35 yards in six plays midway through the final period and grabbed the lead on another Wersching field goal, this one from 45 yards with only 3:46 left in the game. Denver was faced with a third-and-13 from its own 27 on the next drive when Elway threw a long pass intended for Watson, but the ball hit Dwight Hicks in the back and he was charged with a 42-yard face-guarding penalty. The 49er defense rose up again, but on a third-and-10, Elway eluded a blitzing Ronnie Lott and fired a strike to Watson, who ran to the San Francisco nine. Four plays later Karlis nailed the game-winning field goal. The victory was head coach Dan Reeves's fifth straight over a defending World Champion, and the Broncos continued their mastery over NFC teams on Monday night games.

Undaunted, Elway led the Broncos down the field throwing four straight passes, including two crucial aerials to Watson and Clarence Kay. Sewell scored his second TD of the day on a 2-yard run with just 1:45 left in the game. Two plays into the Steelers' next drive. Harden stepped in front of a Woodley pass and scored the contest's final points. Denver did not give up a sack in the game and was led on defense by Karl Mecklenburg, who recorded his second four-sack performance of the year and played seven different defensive positions in the game.

LOS ANGELES RAIDERS 17, DENVER 14 (OT)

DENVER, CO., Dec. 8 — Denver saw a 14-0 halftime lead dissolve into a nightmare on Eliot Street as the Raiders beat the Broncos in overtime for the second time in three weeks in a contest played before 75,042, the largest crowd in Mile High Stadium history. The loss all but eliminated Denver from the playoffs. Denver drove 77 yards in 16 plays on its first possession with Jim Wright scoring on a five yard pass from John Elway, who completed six of eight passes on the drive. The Raiders' Lester Hayes picked off an Elway bomb several minutes later but the Los Angeles offense could not convert it in to a score. Denver's next series of downs ended with an interception as well, this one by Mike Haynes. The Raiders drove to the Denver eight but safety Dennis Smith intercepted a Marc Wilson pass in the end zone to stop the scoring threat. Minutes later Louis Wright halted another Raider drive with an interception. The Broncos then drove 71 yards in nine plays and scored on a one-yard plunge by Sammy Winder. Wilson fumbled on the Raiders' next play and Rulon Jones recovered for Denver with only 23 seconds left in the half. An interference penalty backed the Broncos to the Raider 18 and Rich Karlis's 35-yard field goal try sailed wide right as time ran out in the half. After Denver's opening drive of the third quarter stalled, the Raiders took only seven plays to move 63 yards and score on a three-yard Wilson to Todd Christensen. Elway was intercepted on the next Denver possession and the Raiders tied the score six plays later on a 15-yard run by Marcus Allen. Dennis Smith intercepted two more passes in regulation play but the Broncos could get no closer than their own 48 for the rest of the game. Denver won the overtime coin toss and elected to receive but wound up driving against a strong wind. Both teams traded punts and on Denver's third possession disaster struck. Elway was stripped of the ball and Greg Townsend recovered it on the Denver eight. Chris Bahr was sent into the game and kicked a 26-yard field goal to give the Raiders a 17-14 victory five minutes into overtime.

DENVER 14, KANSAS CITY 13

DENVER, CO., Dec. 14 - John Elway overcame a career-high five interceptions to lead the Broncos to a 14-13 win over the Chiefs in a nationallytelevised Saturday game. Elway's 301 passing yards were the high point in an otherwise lethargic performance from a Bronco team that was still feeling the effects of the bitter loss to the Raiders the week before, Kansas City scored first on a 32-yard field goal by Nick Lowery four minutes into the game. Denver took the ball all the way to the Kansas City three on the next possession but an interception foiled the Broncos' attempt for a touchdown. Later in the period Denver did score, driving 85 yards in 13 plays with Elway hitting Vance Johnson for an 11-yard touchdown pass. The Chiefs moved within one point of Denver on their first second-half possession when Lowery kicked another field goal. The next four Denver possessions ended with interceptions. The last pick-off led to a go-ahead Kansas City touchdown as Todd Blackledge threw a seven-yard TD pass to Stephon Paige with seven minutes left in the game. Denver got to the Kansas City seven on the next drive but Steve Sewell fumbled and the Chiefs recovered. Kansas City was unable to move the ball and punted to the Denver 41. Elway unleashed a 42-yard pass to Watson on the next play, bringing the Broncos to the Chiefs' 17. After a five-yard delay of game penalty, Elway passed for 12 yards to Vance Johnson. Five plays later Sammy Winder bulled in from the one to give the Broncos a slim 14-13 lead with 22 seconds remaining in the game. Ken Woodard intercepted a Blackledge pass to secure the win for Denver as time ran out. For the game, Vance Johnson caught six passes for 116 yards and Watson snared five passes for 97 yards, the two high yardage marks for the Broncos in 1985. Karl Mecklenburg's one sack in the game gave him 13 for the year, a new Bronco record.

DENVER 27, SEATTLE 24

SEATTLE, WA., Dec. 20 - John Elway turned in a brilliant performance against the Seahawks, completing 24 of 42 passes for 432 yards and a touchdown. His passing yardage total was the third highest in Bronco history and gave him 3,891 yards in 1985, the highest single-season total ever for a Denver quarterback. The first 20 minutes of the game were as frightening for the Broncos as their landing into fog-bound Sea-Tac Airport a day earlier. Seattle scored on its first possession with a 41-yard pass from Dave Krieg to Daryl Turner, and then went up 10-0 after adding a field goal early in the second quarter. The Broncos tried to punt after their next series of downs stalled but Sam Merriman blocked it and Terry Taylor returned it 15 yards for a touchdown. Denver finally got on the board with five minutes left in the half on a 17-yard pass from Elway to Steve Watson. The Broncos got the ball back with 1:41 remaining and Elway completed four of five passes to place the Broncos in field goal range. Rich Karlis nailed a 25-yarder as time ran out in the half. Denver was sacked five times in the first half but would not give one up in the final two quarters because of new blocking schemes and Elway's scrambling. Late in the third quarter Denver mounted a long drive that saw Elway complete three third down passes as well as a key fourth down pass. Gerald Willhite's one-yard scoring plunge with 13:11 left in the game tied the score at 17-17. Mike Harden intercepted a pass on the next Seahawk drive but Denver missed a go-ahead field goal. Seattle roared back behind the running of Curt Warner and went up 24-17 on a one-yard run by Warner on fourth down and inches. On the fourth play of the next Denver drive Elway scrambled around the left side of the field and fired a 60-yard bomb to Steve Watson, who caught it on the Seattle six. On fourth down from the Seahawk one-yard line, Steve Sewell powered his way into the end zone and Karlis's extra point tied the game. Seattle was unable to move the ball and punted to Denver with less than two minutes remaining. Elway hit Sewell on a 27-yard screen pass on Denver's first play, but was injured on the play and replaced by Gary Kubiak. The Broncos were soon faced with a third-andnine on the Seattle 32 when Kubiak ran a quarterback draw to the 26. Rich Karlis then kicked a 43-yard field goal to put the Broncos in the lead. Seattle mounted a frantic drive but Norm Johnson's last-second field goal attempt hit the right upright.



PITTSBURGH 24, DENVER 17

DENVER, CO., Dec. 30—Denver had two possessions in the final two minutes of the game but failed to score as Pittsburgh advanced to the Conference Championship game. Denver's opportunistic defense recovered two Steeler fumbles in the first quarter. The first one resulted in a Rich Karlis field goal attempt, but it sailed wide right. Pittsburgh fumbled on the next play, and the Broncos recovered again. That turnover led to a seven-yard touchdown pass from John Elway to Jim Wright. Pittsburgh scored on a 28-yard field goal on the first play of the second period, and just before intermission, the Steelers took the lead on Frank Pollard's one-yard TD plunge. Denver tied the game early in the third quarter on a 21-yard Karlis field goal. The Broncos regained the lead on their next possession, scoring on a 20-yard pass from Elway to Steve Watson. For the game, Watson gained 177 yards on 11 receptions. The Steelers mounted a scoring drive of their own, tying the game at 17-17 on a Mark Malone to Louis Lipps pass late in the quarter. Later, Pittsburgh's Eric Williams intercepted an Elway pass and returned it to the Denver twoyard line with only 2:45 left in the game. Pollard scored two plays later to give the Steelers the lead 24-17. Denver couldn't move the ball on its final two possession as time ran out.

1979 WILD CARD PLAYOFF GAME

HOUSTON 13, DENVER 7

HOUSTON, Tex., Dec. 23-Toni Fritsch kicked two field goals to provide the margin of victory as the Houston Oilers played strong second half defense and defeated the Broncos, 13-7, earning the Oilers advancement in the American Football Conference playoffs.

Fritsch opened the scoring with a 31-yard first period field goal, but Denver came back to take a 7-3 lead on a seven-yard pass from Craig Morton to running back Dave Preston, an 80-yard drive that took the Broncos 13 plays.

Houston went ahead to stay on a three-yard burst by Earl Campbell at 14:14 of the second period. However, Campbell was injured on the play and did not return to action in the second half. Oiler quarterback Dan Pastorini and wide receiver Ken Burrough also left the contest due to injuries, both early in the second half, putting a severe crimp in the Houston attack. But the Broncos were able to move the ball for only 216 yards total offense, and the tenacious Houston defense sacked Morton six times for 40 yards in losses as the Oilers held on to win.

Linebacker Bob Swenson intercepted a Gifford Nielsen pass at the Oiler 26yard line midway through the fourth period, but two sacks of Morton led to a 50yard field goal attempt by Fred Steinfort. Steinfort's kick hit the upright, and the Oilers later drove for a second field goal by Fritsch, this one of 20 yards, providing the final victory margin.

Denver drove to the Houston 27 at the two minute mark, but the Oiler defense again rose to the occasion to stifle the threat and secure the win, eliminating the Broncos from the playoffs.

PITTSBURGH 33, DENVER 10

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Dec. 30—Two fourth quarter touchdown passes by Pittsburgh quarterback Terry Bradshaw lifted the Steelers to a 33-10 victory over the Denver Broncos and into the American Football Conference championship game.

Bradshaw's scoring tosses included a 45-yard bomb to John Stallworth and a 38-yarder to Lynn Swann, capping a brilliant performance by the Pitts-

burgh passer.

The Broncos took the early lead on a 37-yard Jim Turner field goal, but Pittsburgh's Franco Harris ran one and 18 yards for touchdowns and Roy Gerela kicked a 24-yard field goal to give the Steelers a 16-3 advantage. Denver cut the margin to 16-10 on a three-yard Dave Preston TD, but Gerela kicked another field goal to make the halftime margin 19-10. Denver threatened to come closer in the third period, but Turner's 29-yard field goal attempt was blocked, and Bradshaw's passing sealed Denver's fate early in the final stanza. The Steelers rolled to 425 yards total offense, with Bradshaw accounting for 272 through the air, 156 on ten receptions by Stallworth. The eventual World Champion Steelers limited the Broncos' ground game to just 87 yards in earning the right to play the Houston Oilers for the AFC crown the following week.

1978 SUPER BOWL XII

DALLAS 27, DENVER 10

NEW ORLEANS, La., Jan. 15—The Dallas Cowboys evened their Super Bowl record at 2-2 by defeating the Denver Broncos 27-10 before a sellout crowd of 76,400, plus 90 million television viewers, the largest audience ever to watch a sporting event. Dallas converted two pass interceptions by safety Randy Hughes and cornerback Aaron Kyle into 10 points and Efren Herrera added a 35-yard field goal to give the Cowboys at 13-0 halftime advantage. The Denver offense had trouble getting untracked against the hard-hitting Cowboy defense. The Broncos lost three fumbles and were intercepted twice on their last five possessions of the first half. The Broncos came back momentarily at the outset of the third period. Craig Morton engineered a drive to the Cowboys 30-yard line from where Jim Turner booted a 47-yard field goal to make the score 13-3. After an exchange of punts, Dallas wide receiver Butch Johnson made a spectacular diving catch in the end zone to complete a 45-yard pass from Roger Staubach to put the Cowboys ahead 20-3. However, the momentum swung back to the Broncos as Rick Upchurch returned the kickoff 67 yards to the Dallas 26. On the second play of the series, Norris Weese relieved Craig Morton at quarterback. Morton, who was intercepted only eight times during the regular season, had thrown a Super Bowl record four interceptions. Weese guided the Broncos to a touchdown — a one-yarder by Ron Lytle — to cut the Dallas lead to 20-10 with 5:39 left in the third quarter. Dallas clinched

the victory when running back Robert Newhouse threw a 29-yard touchdown pass to Golden Richards on an option play with 7:04 remaining in the game. It was the first pass thrown by Newhouse since the 1975 regular season. The Cowboys offense amassed 325 yards while the defense limited the Broncos to 156 in a game which saw the Cowboys control the ball 38:34 to Denver's 21:26. Roger Staubach completed 17 of 25 passes for 183 yards while Harvey Martin and Randy White, who were named Co-MVPs, led the Cowboys defense which recovered four fumbles and intercepted four passes.

1978 AFC CHAMPIONSHIP

DENVER 20, OAKLAND 17

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 1-Denver quarterback Craig Morton threw two touchdown passes to Haven Moses as the Broncos defeated the defending NFL Champion Oakland Raiders 20-17 and moved into their first Super Bowl. Morton, who was drafted and spent nine-and-a-half years with the Cowboys, would face his former Dallas teammates after completing 10 of 20 passes for 224 yards. It would be the second meeting in five weeks for these two teams — Dallas won 14-6 in the regular season finale as Morton played only the opening series due to a bruised hip. On a sunny, 18-degree day before 74,982 Denver partisans, the Raiders scored on their initial possession as Errol Mann kicked a 20-yard field goal to climax an 18-play drive. Morton hit Moses on their first scoring hookup two plays later on a 74-yard touchdown bomb, and the Broncos were on top to stay. Denver took advantage of two Oakland turnovers in the second half to win its second game in three meetings with the Raiders during the 1977 season. Defensive end Brison Manor recovered running back Clarence Davis' fumble at the Oakland 17 and running back Jon Keyworth scored from the 1-yard line to increase the margin to 14-3 in the third quarter. Oakland quarterback Ken Stabler hit tight end Dave Casper on the first of two scoring passes to narrow the lead to 14-10 with 39 seconds elapsed in the final period. But on Oakland's next possession, linebacker Bob Swenson intercepted a Stabler pass and ran to the Raiders' 14. Morton then threw 12 yards to Moses for the Broncos' final touchdown. Oakland finished the scoring on the next series as Stabler threw 17 yards to Casper for the game's last touchdown. Denver controlled the ball for the final 3:08 and gave Red Miller the AFC title in his first year as a head coach. Moses, a 10-year veteran, had five receptions for 168 yards. The Denver defense, which was No. 1 against the rush in the NFL during the regular season, held the Raiders to 94 yards on the ground.

DENVER, Colo., Dec. 24—After ties at 7, 14, and 21, veteran Jim Turner kicked a 44-yard field goal to put Denver ahead to stay as the Broncos-in their first playoff game ever—beat the perennial AFC Central Champion Steelers. Leading 24-21, the Broncos capped their victory with two fourth-quarter interceptions by linebacker Tom Jackson, the last of which set up Craig Morton's 34-yard game-clinching touchdown pass to Jack Dolbin. Denver capitalized on a blocked punt and a fumble recovery for two scores in the first half, which ended 14-14. Morton and Steeler quarterback Terry Bradshaw traded touchdown passes in the second half before Turner's kick, Jackson's interceptions, and Morton's arm kept Pittsburgh from the AFC title game for the first time in four years. The Denver victory set up a third game between the AFC Western Champion Broncos and the AFC Wild Card Raiders, who split two regular season games.

BRONCOS IN HALL OF FAME

The Denver Broncos are represented in the Pro Football Hall of Fame by three individuals, including a former player, a former coach, and a former administrator.

Fred Gehrke, who was the Broncos' General Manager for four years (1977-1980) and a member of the team's staff for 16 years, was the first winner of the Hall of Fame's Pioneer award in 1972.

Gehrke, as a Los Angeles Rams' halfback in 1948, painted golden rams' horns on his team's helmets and thus started the trend toward today's colorful, uniquely-decorated helmets worn by all NFL teams.

Cornerback Willie Brown, inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1984, played for the Broncos from 1963-66 and was named All-American Football League in 1964, a season in which he intercepted nine passes, including a team-record four in one game (vs. New York, 11/15/64).

Doak Walker, who was the Broncos' receivers coach in 1966, this year is to be inducted into the Hall on the basis of his brilliant six-year career (1950-55) with the Detroit Lions.

The Pro Football Hall of Fame is located in Canton, Ohio.

DECEMBER 30—Denver loses in the playoffs to eventual Super Bowl champion Pittsburgh Steelers, 33-10.

SEPTEMBER 21—The NFL Players Association begins the first regular season strike in NFL history, resulting in the cancellation of games for eight consecutive weeks. DECEMBER 3—Hein Poulus is named Vice President and General Manager of the Broncos. DECEMBER 19—Rick Upchurch returns a punt 78 yards for a touchdown against Kansas City to tie the all-time pro football record of eight career touchdowns on punt returns.

1983

JANUARY 3—Final NFL statistics show Rick Upchurch as the NFL's punt return leader with a 16.1 average and Luke Prestridge as the league's leading punter with a 45.0 mark. FEBRUARY 6—The Broncos are represented in the Pro Bowl game by Randy Gradishar, Luke Prestridge, and Rick Upchurch. MARCH 15—Only 89 season ticket accounts have not been renewed for 1983, virtually assuring the Broncos of their 14th consecutive sellout season in Mile High Stadium. MAY 2—In the biggest trade in franchise history, Denver acquires quarterback John Elway, the first player taken in the NFL draft, and signs him to a five-year contract. DECEMBER 11—Elway throws three fourthquarter touchdown passes to erase a 19-0 deficit and lead the Broncos to a 21-19 playoff-clinching win over Baltimore. NOVEMBER 18-The Broncos beat Minnesota 42-21 for the club's 10th straight victory, a team record. John Elway ties a Denver record throwing five touchdown passes in the game. DECEMBER 15-Denver wins its 13th game of the season, the most in Bronco history, and captures the AFC West crown with a 31-14 win over Seattle. MARCH—Only 82 season ticket accounts have not been renewed for the 1985 season, wire tually assuring the Broncos of their 16th consecutive sellout season in Mile High Stadium. DECEMBER 20—Denver beats Seattle 27-24 to close out the season at 11-5. The Broncos set season records with total yards (5,496) and total points (380). John Elway, who threw for 432 yards against Seattle, set Denver records in total offense (4,144 yards) and passing yards (3,891) for the season, and Karl Mecklenburg's 13 quarterback sacks also set a new Bronco standard.

1986

FEBRUARY 2—The Broncos are represented by four players in the Pro Bowl - Rulon Jones, Karl Mecklenburg, Dennis Smith, and Louis Wright. FEBRUARY 26—Owner Pat Bowlen holds groundbreaking ceremonies for 60 luxury Penthouse Suites to be built atop Mile High Stadium's fifth level. MARCH—Only 127 season ticket accounts have not been renewed for the 1986 season, virtually assuring the Broncos of their 17th consecutive sellout season in Mile High Stadium.

DENVER BRONCOS YOUTH



RANDY GRADISHAR President

Randy Gradishar begins his third year in 1986 as President of the Denver Broncos Youth Foundation. In his position Gradishar works with the needs of youth and youth-serving organizations in the Denver area and the state of Colorado.

Gradishar graduated with a B.S. in Education from the Ohio State University in 1974, where he also played football (including two Rose Bowl ap-

pearances) under Coach Woody Hayes. He was the first draft choice of the Broncos in 1974 and played ten years without missing a game. He was voted the NFL Defensive Player of the Year in 1978 and was selected to seven Pro Bowls.

Before retiring from football in 1983, Randy completed a variety of aptitude, temperament and career tests. This confirmed he is happiest as well as best suited and most qualified to help people, and he has chosen to invest his energies in helping to meet the needs of youth leaders and the young people of our area.

Randy and his wife Janet are the parents of two daughters, Paige and Meredith, and a son, Mark. The family resides in the Denver suburb of Littleton.

The Denver Broncos Youth Foundation (DBYF) is a non-profit organization which was founded and incorporated in 1982 to meet the physical, mental, social and spiritual needs of young people by working in conjunction with existing youth-serving organizations to leverage available energy and resources to assist Colorado's young people and youth leaders. The "buzz word" of the Denver Broncos Youth Foundation which most accurately describes the focus of energy is the word "catalyst".

Although the Broncos Youth Foundation is a separate entity from the Broncos Football Club, Pat Bowlen, the Broncos' owner, serves on the DBYF Board of Directors and has allowed the Foundation the continued use of the Bronco name, as well as providing office space for DBYF. The Broncos Football Club makes an annual donation to DBYF from the Charity Game (first pre-season game). Contributions are also received from corporations and individual donors.

During its two years, the Broncos Youth Foundation has worked with a variety of youth leaders and youth-serving organizations, i.e., Drug & Alcohol, 4-H and other Leadership Programs, High School Journalists, Handicapped Programs, Urban, Minority, Prison and Juvenile Delinquent Programs, and various Christian youth organizations. DBYF has also given limited financial support to new programs and in some cases, existing programs in order to serve youth more effectively.

RING OF FAME

The Denver Broncos' Ring of Fame was inaugurated in 1984 to honor former players and administrators who played significant roles in Bronco history.

Four former players were inducted into the Ring in 1984, running back Floyd Little (1967-75), defensive end Rich Jackson (1967-72), receiver Lionel Taylor (1960-66), and defensive back Austin "Goose" Gonsoulin (1960-66).

In 1985, former owner Gerald H. Phipps became the first nonplayer to have his name placed on the Ring of Fame.

To be eligible for induction into the Ring, a player must have played for at least four years with Denver and be retired at least

MILE HIGH STADIUM

Mile High Stadium, home of the Denver Broncos, once again was filled for every home date during the 1985 National Football League regular season. The Broncos brought their consecutive regular season sellout streak to 117 games and concluded 16 years of sellouts at Mile High Stadium.

Expansion of the stadium, begun in 1975, was completed for the 1977 season to give the Broncos the seventh largest home facility

in the league.

Denver voters passed a \$25 million bond issue in 1974 to expand and improve the stadium from its capacity of 51,706 to 75,100. The stadium held 63,532 for the 1976 season, halfway through the project.

Making Mile High Stadium unique, however, is its movable east stands. The east stands move in a single section which, when fully extended, is in a horseshoe configuration for football. When the section is retracted, the stadium is in position for baseball.

The dynamics involved in the move are fascinating. First, bear in mind that the east stands section is a three-tiered structure, 535 feet long, 135 feet tall and 200 feet deep, weighing nearly nine million pounds. Second, the stands must be moved a distance of 145 feet.

How is it done? The answer, says DMJM-Phillips-Reister, the engineering-architectural firm in charge of the project, is water.


More than 90,000 square feet of runways serve as the operating surfaces over which the stands will move. Water is pumped onto the runways and form a .003 inch sheet upon which the stands rest. Hydraulic rams then push the stands forward at the rate of three feet per minute, making the move last somewhere around two hours.

Originally called Bears Stadium, the facility was built in 1948 for the Denver Bears of baseball's old Western League, with long-range plans to utilize it for football as well. When Denver became a charter member of the American Football League in 1959, the south stands (8,100 seats) and portable east stands (9,616 seats) were added to give a capacity of 34,657 for football.

After Denver voters turned down a stadium bond issue to build an all-purpose metropolitan stadium in 1967, a non-profit group began a fund-raising drive with the goal of purchasing the stadium

for the city.

In February of 1968, the group bought the stadium from Rocky Mountain Empire Sports for \$1.8 million and presented it to the city of Denver. A 16,000-seat upper deck was immediately constructed over the west stands, raising the capacity to over 50,000 for the 1968 season. In December of 1968, the stadium was renamed Denver Mile High Stadium.

B. Home: NFC Central #2, NFC Central #4; Away: NFC Central #1, NFC Central #3, Total: four games.

C. One game with each of the two other second place teams and each of the other third place teams – Home: AFC East #2, AFC Central #3; Away: AFC East #3, AFC Central #2. Total: four games.

THIRD PLACE TEAM IN AFC WEST

B. Home: NFC Central #1, NFC Central #3; Away: NFC Central #2, NFC Central #4. Total: four games.

C. One game with each of the two other second and third place teams in the conference - Home: AFC East #3, AFC Central #2; Away: AFC East #2, AFC Central #3. Total: four games.

FOURTH PLACE TEAM IN AFC WEST

B. Home: NFC Central #2, NFC Central #4; Away: NFC Cental #1, NFC Central #3. Total four games.

C. One game with each of the other first place and fourth place teams in the conference - Home: AFC East #4, AFC Central #1; Away: AFC East #1, AFC Central #4. Total: four games.

FIFTH PLACE TEAM IN AFC WEST

D. One game with each of team #1-4 of the four team division in the AFC (AFC Central) – Home: AFC Central #1, AFC Central #3; Away: AFC Central #2, AFC Central #4, Total: four games.

E. Home-and-home games with the other fifth place team in the AFC -

Home: AFC East #5; Away: AFC East #5. Total: two games.

F. One game with each of the fifth place teams in the NFC - Home: NFC East #5; Away: NFC Central #5.

Broncos Radio Network

For the 17th consecutive season, Denver's 50-thousand watt station KOA (850) will serve as the flagship station for the Denver Broncos game broadcast network.

Bob Martin, radio voice of the Broncos since 1964, will again be calling the play-by-play account of the games, with Larry Zimmer, who joined the broadcast team in 1971, again doing the color commentary.

Martin was named Colorado Sportscaster of the Year for the 17th consecutive year in 1985.

When making requests for working press credentials, please allow time for mailing. Press credentials are normally issued approximately 10 days before the game. Should transmission facilities be required, please arrange for same through local representatives.

WORKING PRESS: Admittance to the Broncos' press box is restricted to the WORKING PRESS ONLY. Credentials are marked with a row and seat number. Passes are non-transferable.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photographers are asked to take special note of the following conditions for use of press credentials, as set by the National Football League:

"This working credential is issued to an organization for the sole purpose of providing stadium access to an accredited individual who has a legitimate working function (media or game service) in connection with this game. It is non-transferable. Any unauthorized use of this credential subjects the bearer to ejection from the stadium and prosecution for criminal trespass.

Any secondary non-editorial use of any picture, film/tape or drawing of the game taken or made by the accredited organization or individual to whom this credential has been issued (including but not limited to use in advertising, sales promotion or merchandising) is prohibited without prior specific written approval of the National Football League. Additionally, television stations are prohibited from making available game film or tape to any other organi-

zation even though the planned use may be editorial in nature without advance written permission from the NFL or one of its member clubs. Such film or tape may be aired only by the specific station or entity to whom this credential is issued.

Television stations filming or taping NFL games recognize that any films or tapes may only be used in connection with a regularly scheduled television newscast within a seven-day period following the game and the film clip or taped portion of each such showing will not exceed two (2) minutes in length.

Additionally, television stations agree not to use more than six (6) minutes of filmed or taped "same-day" highlights from NFL games on any regularly scheduled news programs (i.e. no more than six minutes of highlights on Sunday night). This is the only exception to the two-minute limitation.

Television stations wishing to use NFL film or tape in any other manner must obtain written permission for such usage from the National Football League.

Acceptance of the credential constitutes agreement by the bearer and his organization to abide by the foregoing conditions. Thank you for your cooperation."

Sideline photo passes will be tightly controlled by the Public Relations Department and are generally limited to photographers shooting for a daily newspaper, wire service, or magazine of national circulation on specific assignment, or television station.

RADIO-TELEVISION: In making requests for broadcast credentials, please specify requirements for spotters and/or statisticians.

CODE-A-PHONE: The Broncos' Code-A-Phone will be in operation after the club begins training camp at the University of Northern Colorado in Greeley. New entries, generally including an interview with a player or coach, will be made daily at approximately 6:00 p.m. This recorded interview service will continue throughout the season. Please check with the public relations office for an updated telephone number.

STADIUM ACCESS: To get to Mile High Stadium, which is located at 19th Avenue and Eliot Street, take Interstate 25 to the Mile High Stadium Exit (19th Avenue Exit). The Press Box is located on the West side of the stadium.

DRIVING INSTRUCTIONS TO MILE HIGH STADIUM FROM STAPLETON INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT: Exit airport on Quebec North and continue to Interstate 70. Take Interstate 70 West to Interstate 25 South, which will be a left lane exit. Continue West on Interstate 25 South until you come to Mile High Stadium Exit (19th Avenue Exit).

DRIVING INSTRUCTIONS TO STAPLETON INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT FROM MILE HIGH STADIUM: Take one of two routes depending on your parking lot location. You can take 20th Avenue East to Clay Street, turning left at Clay and proceeding to 23rd Avenue. Take a right at 23rd Avenue and continue to Interstate 25 entrances. Another route (Northbound) would be to take 17th Avenue East, which will continue beneath an overpass and will take you directly to Interstate 25 north. The alternate South bound route would be to take 17th Avenue East, turning left at Bryant Street and proceeding to the Interstate 25 South bound entrance, approximately two blocks.

TRANSMISSION FACILITIES: The Broncos provide three complimentary telephones in the visitors area of the working press box for use with VDT or telecopier equipment. Only collect, credit card or third party billing calls can be made from these telephones. Should you wish a private telephone installed at your seat, the Broncos will be pleased to assign you a seat location and provide you with a contact for you to make the appropriate arrangements with the local telephone company.

POST-GAME TRANSPORTATION: Please advise Broncos PR personnel as soon as possible should you require transportation following the game. The amount of time you must wait will obviously decline as time goes by following the conclusion of the game. All taxis will make pick-ups curb side at the Ticket Office, which is located at 19th Avenue and Eliot Street. LIMITED INSTANT REPLAY SYSTEM TO BE USED IN 1986

At the NFL Annual Meeting in March 1986, the clubs adopted (by a 23-4-1 vote) a one-year system of limited Instant Replay of officiating calls for 1986.

The NFL has discussed Instant Replay in some degree or other since the early 1970s. The League experimented in 1976 and 1978 using two basic frameworks—an independent system using cameras, replay machines, and technicians separate from the network covering the game, and a "no frills" approach using existing television coverage.

In 1985, the NFL used the network feed of nine nationally televised preseason games to experiment with the basic system that later was adopted for 1986. A total of 28 plays were examined closely (17 confirmed call, 4 were inconclusive, 1 was reversed, and 6 had no replay shown).

What is the objective of this system?

The clubs feel that on certain plays the telecast viewed by the general public should be used to correct an indisputable error. The system will be used to reverse an on-field decision only when the Replay Official has *indisputable visual evidence* available to him that warrants the change.

Is the television network carrying the game part of the review process?

No. Although the Replay Official will be viewing the live network feed, there is no communication to television personnel as to what plays to show or not to show.

What is the step-by-step procedure of a play review?

The Replay Official will view game action and a play will be replayed immediately on one of the two monitors, while the other monitor continues to record the live feed.

The Replay Official makes a determination if further study of the play is needed. If not, there is no contact with the field and play continues without interruption.

If the Replay Official believes an error may have been made, the Umpire will be contacted (via a paging device worn at the beltline), and he then will use a walkie-talkie for further communication with the Replay Official.


The Replay Official will watch replay(s) on one or both monitors and complete his review within a reasonable period (probably 15-20 seconds) after the play is over. (If there is a time out, the Replay Official would not necessarily be restricted to the 15-20-second period.)

The Replay Official will inform the Umpire of his decision, and the Referee will make the appropriate announcement on the wireless microphone.

The limited Instant Replay system concentrates on plays of possession or touching (e.g., fumbles, receptions, interceptions, muffs) and most plays governed by the sidelines, goal lines, end lines, and line of scrimmage (e.g., receiver or runner in or out of bounds, forward or backward passes, breaking the plane of the goal line).

However, the Instant Replay system will not include the following fouls: clipping; encroachment and offsides; grasp of facemask; false start; defensive pass interference; offensive pass interference; offensive holding and illegal use of hands; illegal batting or punching ball; illegal block on free kick or scrimmage kick; illegal crackback; illegal motion; illegal use of forearm or elbow; illegal use of hands by defense; illegally kicking the ball; illegally snapping the ball; intentional grounding; member of the punting team downfield early; illegal formation; palpably unfair act; piling on; roughing the passer; running into or roughing the kicker; striking, kicking, or kneeing; unnecessary roughness; unsportsmanlike conduct; and use of the helmet as a weapon.
