THE PAUL D. BOWLEN MEMORIAL BRONCOS CENTRE

On March 5, 1990 the Denver Broncos moved into the Paul D. Bowlen Memorial Broncos Centre, the new, state-of-the-art headquarters for the National Football League team. The complex is named for the Bronco owner's late father and is the culmination of Pat Bowlen's desire to maximize a positive working environment for his team, which was the only American Football Conference club to appear in the three Super Bowls during the 1980's.

The training facility is situated on 13.5 acres in the rapidly expanding Dove Valley Business Park in south Arapahoe County, and it includes an administrative building, two full-size practice fields, and a smaller workout field.

The Bowlen Broncos Centre is a two-story building totaling 59, 000 square feet, well over twice the size of the team's previous facility. The ground floor houses the main entry, visitors area and trophy display area, and media room, in addition to the play related facilities, which encompass the locker room, meeting rooms, training area, weight room, equipment room, and video department.

It is on the second level, which is accessible through two stairways adjacent to the lobby area, that most of the administrative offices are located. These include the offices for Pat Bowlen, Wade Phillips, and John Beake, as well as those of all assistant coaches and football operations personnel. The second floor is divided into one wing for administrative offices and another for coaches and meeting rooms. The Broncos' extensive computer operation also is located on the second floor.

There is ample practice space now available for use by the Broncos, as both practice fields are 100 yards and one of them has a unique design system which includes underground wiring that prevents the turf from freezing and thus allows the Broncos to practice year round on unfrozen natural grass. The complex also includes a smaller, 50-yard workout field and the Broncos' indoor "bubble," which houses a 70-yard artificial turf field.

The expansive weight room and training room are among the largest in the entire league, and the Bowlen Centre also includes a separate building which houses two racquetball courts for training and leisure use by players and staff members.





PRESIDENT AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

PAT BOWLEN President and Chief Executive Officer

The 1993 season is the dawn of a new era both for the Denver Broncos and the National Football League, and Broncos' owner Pat Bowlen has played an integral role in both, having selected a new head coach in Wade Phillips and playing a pivotal role in the creation of the new collective bargaining agreement that has changed the face of professional football.

Bowlen's choice of Phillips immediately proved to be extremely popular, and the Broncos' dynamic chief executive followed that up by quickly becoming a major player in the league's new free agency. Under Bowlen's leadership

Denver was very aggressive in the marketplace, signing running backs Rod Bernstine and Robert Delpino, and offensive linemen Don Maggs and Brian Habib. In addition, Bowlen signed superstar quarterback John Elway to a new four-year contract that places the Hall of Famequality signalcaller at the pinnacle of the NFL's salary structure.

Bowlen made all these moves with one goal in mind – to aggressively position the Broncos for yet another run at a Super Bowl

championship for the Mile High City.

Entering his 10th season as the President and Chief Executive Officer of the Broncos, Bowlen presides over a franchise that by any standard has been one of the National Football League's most successful in this time frame. He has watched the Broncos play 12 postseason games in nine years of ownership, with all regular and postseason games sold out at Mile High Stadium.

While the Broncos had a disappointing 8-8 record last year, in 1991 they had the greatest turnaround in team history, finishing with a 12-4 record that included the American Football Conference Western Division title and the fourth AFC Championship Game appearance of Bowlen's vibrant ownership.

Having missed the Super Bowl by just four points as recently as 1991 and making several bold personnel moves this offseason, Bowlen's focus for the coming year is to once again put his team in line to contend for the AFC Championship that it won in 1986, 1987, and 1989. Denver was the only AFC franchise to make three Super Bowl appearances in the 1980's and without question Pat Bowlen provides the organizational thrust that has served as the catalyst to the Broncos' outstanding record.

Bowlen's Broncos represented the AFC in Super Bowls XXI (Pasadena), XXII (San Diego), and XXIV (New Orleans). In addition, Denver has had just one losing campaign during the past nine years, that being the very disappointing 5-11 season in 1990.

No one sets higher standards for the Broncos than Pat Bowlen himself, whose unchanging goal is to have his franchise annually regarded among the finest in pro football, with victory being the measuring stick for that success. Thus, the goal of Denver's dynamic and energetic chief executive remains firmly set on capturing the world championship that so far has eluded the Mile High City.

The Broncos once again will pursue a championship season from their new headquarters, the Paul D. Bowlen Memorial Broncos Centre, a 59,000-square-foot state-of-the-art office and training complex in Arapahoe County's Dove Valley location. The move into this

new facility, which came on March 5, 1990, accomplished one of Bowlen's significant goals, that being to upgrade the Broncos' working facility and in so doing solidify the foundation for continued success.

Bowlen's nine years of ownership have resulted in the best home record (57-15) in the AFC. Bowlen finished second in *The Sporting News* 1987 Executive of the Year balloting.

A member of the National Football League owners' Finance, Broadcasting, and Management Council Executive Committees, he presides over a franchise that has won four division crowns and, has had regular season win totals of 13, 11, 11, 10, 11, and 12. In fact, six of the seven finest campaigns in team history have come during the Bowlen regime.

Pat Bowlen was introduced as the majority owner of the Denver Broncos on March 23, 1984, and that announcement triggered a new era in franchise history, one which has coupled success on the playing field with enthusiasm for an even brighter future.

He immediately put his own mark on the Broncos, establishing a solid administration and creating a positive atmosphere that was a major factor in the team's success both on and off the field.

The team responded with a 13-3 record and the American Football Conference Western Division championship in 1984, following that up with an 11-5 record that just barely kept the Broncos out of the playoffs in 1985.

Meanwhile, Bowlen has seen the Broncos' consecutive home game sellout streak stretch to 180 straight regular and postseason non-strike games through the end of the 1992 campaign, as Denver led the entire National Football League in actual in-stadium attendance over that nine-year period. The Broncos have drawn over 5.1 million fans to Mile High Stadium from 1984-92, tops in the NFL.

Having established a solid foundation, Bowlen took a dramatic step toward the future during 1986 with the construction of 60 luxury Penthouse Suites atop the west side of Mile High Stadium.

Bowlen and the Bowlen family acquired 100% ownership of the Broncos in July of 1985. He is active in day to day operations of the football club. Born in Prairie du Chien, Wis., he attended high school there and went on to the University of Oklahoma, where he earned degrees in both business (1965) and law (1968).

Bowlen has served as the Honorary Chairman of the Colorado Relay Classic to benefit St. Joseph's Hospital (1985-92), the Colorado Special Olympics (1986-92), and the 1989 Centennial Scholarship rally at the University of Northern Colorado in Greeley. Along with being honorary chairman of the Special Olympics, he is this year's Outstanding Celebrity. He was also Co-Chairman of the Rose Medical Center Critical Care Campaign from 1986-89.

In addition, Bowlen was elected to the University of Denver Board of Trustees in 1987, and is active on several committees including Trustee Affairs and Buildings and Grounds, and has served on the Institutional Advancement Committee and Institutional Advancement/ University Relations subcommittee. He was also named to the Colorado Academy Board of Trustees in 1991.

He is a member of the Board of Directors of the Denver Broncos Youth Foundation, and was the 1992 honoree at the American Ireland Fund dinner.

He also serves on the Board of Trustees of the Hawaii Maritime Center. Bowlen has real estate and natural resource holdings in Alberta, as well as real estate holdings in Colorado, Arizona, and California.

Bowlen also is Chairman of the Board and Director of Hambledon Estates Limited, and Northern Development Company Limited of Edmonton.

An outstanding athlete in his own right, he has competed in the Ironman Triathlon – an event in which one must swim 2.4 miles, ride 112 miles on a bicycle, and run 26.2 miles, all consecutively – as well as in other triathlon races and several marathons.

Bowlen is a member of several clubs and societies, including the Young President's Organization, the Canadian and Edmonton Bar Associations, and the Law Society of Alberta.

GENERAL MANAGER

JOHN BEAKE General Manager

The Denver Broncos have enjoyed a long-standing reputation as one of the National Football League's most successful franchises both on and off the field, and a key factor in that success has been the contribution of General Manager John Beake, who has a pivotal role in developing and maintaining front office stability as one of the team's strengths.

A member of four Super Bowl teams during his pro football career, John Beake worked closely with team President Pat Bowlen and Head Coach Wade Phillips this offseason in assembling the organization that represents the Broncos and the Mile High City.

Denver was one of the most active teams in the NFL's new free agency marketplace, signing four players in Denver's drive for championship contention once again.

Well into his third decade in pro football, John Beake enters the 1993 campaign in his 15th year with the Denver Broncos and his ninth season as the National Football League club's General Manager. Overall, this marks John's 25th season in professional football as either coach or administrator, as the Broncos couple success on the playing field with their 24th consecutive sellout campaign at Mile High Stadium. Beake has perhaps the broadest range of experience of any NFL general manager, the only one in the NFL who has coached championship teams on the pro, college, and high school levels, as well as having served in a wide range of administrative roles.

As General Manager, he is responsible for all day-to-day operations of club administration, with special concentration in the area of player contract negotiations, an area in which he has considerable experience. He also personally directs the Broncos' contractual relationships with the City of Denver, local radio, and television entities.

John Beake's prominence in the Broncos' hierarchy is paralleled by continuing respect within the National Football League. Active in the NFL's international development, his involvement is one of the keys to the Broncos being among just four teams (along with Miami, San Francisco, and the Los Angeles Rams) to have been selected for American Bowl games in London, Tokyo, and Berlin, not to mention the integral role he played in Denver being the only American Football Conference club to win three conference crowns and thus make three Super Bowl appearances (XXI, XXII, and XXIV) in the 1980's.

In 1991 John was named to the Board of Directors of the World League of American Football. As a key member of the Board of Directors for the World League, he spent a considerable portion of that offseason lending administrative guidance to the WL offices in New York and Dallas. John was instrumental in determining the methodology by which 101 NFL players were provided to the WL for its 1992 campaign. Along with his commitment to the World League, John serves as chairman of the NFL International Working Group, which is primarily comprised of other NFL general managers and player personnel directors. He is also a member of the NFL College and Pro Relations Committee.

One of his most visible recent Bronco accomplishments has been to provide a key leadership role in the construction of and move into the team's new training facility, the Paul D. Bowlen Memorial Broncos

Centre, a 59,000-square foot state-of-the-art complex in Arapahoe County. This project, several years in the planning stages, was the fulfillment of one of John's key goals as the Broncos general manager.

John continuously works with the City of Denver on issues concerning the lease, capital improvements, and fan comfort. Some of the completed improvements at Mile High Stadium include the renovation of the Stadium's press box and the new theatre-styled seats throughout the Stadium. These projects represent the general manager's desire to continually improve the game-day experience at Mile High Stadium.

In addition to contract involvement, one of John's prime areas of interest is working closely with city and state representatives on a variety of community concerns. For the past five years, John has served as the chairman of the Red Ribbon Campaign, a strong educational anti-drug, chemical and substance abuse association that works in conjunction with the Colorado Federation of Parents. He is also a member of the Presbyterian/St. Luke's Healthcare Systems Board of Directors.

An avid skier, he is very active with the National Sports Center for the Disabled, which is funded by the Winter Park Ski Resort and the Broncos Challenge. John is an annual participant in the Winter Park Pro-Am race to benefit the handicapped skiers program in Colorado.

As part of the continuing plan to broaden the team's community role and strengthen a family spirit within the club, he annually schedules events which include the involvement of the Performing Arts Center, the Colorado Ballet, and Opera Colorado.

John was Assistant General Manager in 1984 and was the Broncos' Director of Football operations the previous year, so his position at the helm of the club's administration is the culmination of a steady rise within the organization.

He joined the Broncos in 1979 as the Director of Pro Personnel and became Director of Player Personnel in 1981, having concentrated on the coaching aspects of the game prior to coming to Denver.

As assistant coach for the Kansas City Chiefs from 1968 through 1974, John was the offensive backfield coach for the Chiefs when they defeated the Minnesota Vikings to win Super Bowl IV in New Orleans. He also coached the running backs at New Orleans in 1976. On the college level, he coached at Penn State in 1961-62 and was the offensive coordinator at Colorado State University in 1975.

Upon receiving his master's degree from Penn State in 1962, John coached for six years at the high school level, where his teams lost just four games. He has a bachelor's degree from Trenton State College in New Jersey, in addition to his graduate degree from Penn State.

John and his wife, Marcia, have three children, Jerilyn, Chip, and Chris.

HEAD COACH

WADE PHILLIPS Head Coach

A new era in Denver Broncos history began on January 25, 1993, when Wade Phillips became the 10th head coach in team annals.

Phillips, 45, signed a three-year contract in moving into the head coaching slot from his previous position as defensive coordinator, a role he filled very successfully from 1989-92.

The popular new head coach wasted no time in putting his stamp on the Broncos, quickly putting together a coaching staff that includes seven members who have previously been head coaches in college or pro football.

Phillips also played a pivotal role in several key roster moves, including the

acquisition of running backs Rod Bernstine and Robert Delpino and offensive linemen Don Maggs and Brian Habib under the National Football League's new free agency system.

Under Phillips' leadership as defensive coordinator the defense led the American Football Conference in fewest points allowed in two of the past four seasons (1989 and 1991), and the 1991 12-4 Denver team was paced by a defensive unit that led the AFC in 12 different categories. Among the categories in which the Broncos led the AFC were fewest points (235), fewest TDs (20), fewest rushing TDs (eight), fewest passing TDs (12), most sacks (52), most interceptions (23), fewest passing yards (2,755), and lowest third down conversion percentage (31.1%).

In 1989 he was the mastermind of a defense that led the NFL in fewest points allowed (226) and allowed the fewest rushing yards in the AFC (1,580). His new-look defense that year ranked second in the conference in both quarterback sacks (47) and takeaways (43), and allowed a total yardage figure (4,407) that was second best in the AFC and third in the NFL.

In addition to his role as defensive coordinator, Phillips assumed the capacity of interim head coach during the 1990 preseason period, posting a win over Indianapolis while in that position.


Going into his fifth overall season with the Broncos, Phillips came here from Philadelphia, where he was the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach for the Eagles from 1986-88. Under Phillips in 1988 the Eagles were second in the NFL in turnovers (44) and second in interceptions (32) as they won their first division title since 1980.

He served as defensive coordinator at New Orleans from 1981-85 and was the interim head coach for the final four games of the 1985 season (1-3 record). During his tenure at New Orleans the Saints led the NFC in defense in 1983 and led the NFL in pass defense in 1983 and 1984. Overall, the Saints finished among the top five in the NFL defensively in three of his five seasons.

Prior to joining the Saints, Phillips spent five seasons at Houston, coaching the linebackers (1976) and defensive line (1977-80). The Oilers made three playoff appearances during that period.

Phillips began his coaching career at his alma mater, the University of Houston, in 1969 and then coached at Orange (Texas) High School for three years before moving to Oklahoma State (1973-74) and Kansas (1975).

The son of former NFL coach Bum Phillips, Wade was born in Orange, Texas (6/21/47) and attended Portes Neches-Groves High



School. He went on to be a three-year starter at linebacker at Houston under head coach Bill Yeoman.

An extremely civic-minded and popular individual, he has concluded his third year as Honorary Chairman of the Provenant Health Partners' Sack'Em project, a charity fund raiser for Flight for Life.

Wade and his wife Laurie have two children, Tracy, 20 and Wesley, 14.



ASSISTANT COACHES

VERNON BANKS Strength and Conditioning

Vernon Banks is in his first season as the Broncos' strength and conditioning coach, having come to Denver from the University of Wyoming, where he headed the Cowboys' strength and conditioning program in 1992.

Banks, 36, previously was the assistant strength coach on the college level at Colorado (1990-91), Stanford (1987-90), Wyoming (1986-87), and Houston (1985-86).

A 1981 graduate of Texas A&M in parks and recreation management, Banks played cornerback for the Aggies after transferring from Blinn (Texas) Junior

College. Banks completed all his course work toward a master's degree in exercise science at the University of Houston in 1986.

A native of Alvin, Texas (5/24/56), Banks lettered in football and track at John Foster Dulles High School in Stafford, Texas. He is a threetime state champion powerlifter, winning titles in Wyoming (1987) and California (1989 and 1990).

Vern and his wife Mary reside in Aurora.



Defensive Line Assistant/ Strength and Conditioning Assistant

Barney Chavous is in his fifth season with Denver, assisting Ernie Stautner with the defensive line and Vernon Banks with the strength and conditioning program. He was a coaching intern in 1988, working in the same areas.

Chavous, 40, was a defensive end with Denver from 1973-85 and is second in team history with 72 quarterback sacks.

He was the Broncos' second-round draft choice in 1973 and is one of only four people to play in 13 or more seasons with Denver.

Chavous was all-conference and defen-

sive most valuable player at South Carolina State, where he was a three-year starter.

A native of Aiken, S.C. (3/22/51), Barney and his wife Odessa have four children, sons Shedric and Barney Amon, and daughters Jasmine and Nikeya Monique.



JIM FASSEL

Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks

Jim Fassel is in his first year as the Denver Broncos' offensive coordinator and guarterbacks coach after having been with the New York Giants for two years, as quarterbacks coach in 1991 and offensive coordinator in 1992.

For Fassel, 43, his arrival in Denver marks a reunion with Broncos' quarterback John Elway, as Denver's new offensive coordinator recruited Elway to Stanford University and was his coach for Elway's entire college career.

Prior to joining the Giants Fassel (pronounced FAHS-el) was the head coach at the University of Utah from 1985-89

A former collegiate and NFL quarterback himself, Fassel began his coaching career in 1973 as an assistant at Fullerton Junior College, then became a player-coach in the World Football League with Hawaii. He then moved on to Utah as quarterbacks-receivers coach in 1976, then spent two seasons (1977-78) as offensive coordinator at Weber State.

Fassel coached at Stanford for five seasons (1979-83), including his last four as offensive coordinator, then was named offensive coordinator for the Portland Breakers in the USFL in 1984 before being named head coach at Utah in 1985.

He actually has coached three Broncos quarterbacks, including Elway at Stanford, former Bronco Steve DeBerg at Fullerton JC, and ex-Bronco Norris Weese with the WFL's Hawaii Hawaiians. Other NFL quarterbacks coached by Fassel on the college level include Turk Schonert at Stanford and Scott Mitchell at Utah.

A native of Anaheim, California (8/31/49), Fassel was a standout quarterback at Anaheim High School before going to Fullerton JC, where he quarterbacked that club to a 25-1 record over two seasons, winning the national junior college title in 1967. Fassel then went on to play at the University of Southern California prior to concluding his college playing career at Long Beach State in 1971, where he led the 49ers to the PCAA championship, ultimately being drafted by the Chicago Bears in 1972.

He also was with the Houston Oilers and San Diego Chargers before ending his playing career.

Jim and his wife Kathryn have four children, John, 19, Brian, 17, Jana, 14, and Mike, 12. Jim is an avid golfer and tennis player.



MAURICE (MO) FORTE **Wide Receivers**

Mo Forte is in his sixth season with the Denver Broncos and his first coaching the wide receivers, as he coached the club's running backs during his first five National Football League campaigns. Forte came to Denver from North Carolina A & T State University, where he was head coach from 1982-87. Forte led the Aggies to a 9-3 record and the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference championship in the 1986 campaign.

Forte, 46, had been an assistant coach for 12 years at major college programs prior to going to North Carolina A&T. His

previous coaching career included stints at Arizona State (1980-81), Michigan State (1978-79), Duke (1976-77), and Minnesota (1970-75).


With Forte coaching the Broncos' running backs, Denver was one of just 12 teams ever to have three straight 1,000 yard seasons produced by two different backs (Bobby Humphrey and Gaston Green).

The 1978 Michigan State team won the Big 10 title and the 1981 Arizona State club established a number of Pac-10 records

While at Michigan State he coached two-sport star Kirk Gibson (1978) and in 1980 three of his Sun Devil players (John Mistler, Melvin Hoover, and Ron Washington) were drafted by NFL teams.

A native of Hannibal, Missouri (3/1/47), Forte was a starting running back at the University of Minnesota, from which he graduated with a bachelor's degree in education in 1971.

Mo has a daughter, Dawn.



Bishop Harris is in his first season with the Broncos as running backs coach in 1993, coming to the Mile High City from North Carolina Central, where he was the head coach for the past two seasons.

Although this is his first year on the Denver staff, Harris is familiar with the Broncos organization, having spent two summer training camps (1989-90) in Greeley working with the coaching staff.

Harris, 51, was on the staff at the University of Minnesota from 1986-90, coaching the outside linebackers in his first two years with the Golden Gophers

before becoming assistant head coach and running backs coach for

the latter three campaigns.


An all-conference defensive back at North Carolina Central, Harris began his coaching career on the junior and senior high school levels from 1963-71. JOHN LEVRA Offensive Line

John Levra is in his first season as the Broncos' offensive line, coming to Denver from Chicago, where he coached the Bears' defensive line for the past seven years.

Levra, 55, is a coaching veteran of both sides of the line of scrimmage who is coming into his 13th season in the NFL. Levra was in Chicago from 1986-92, after serving five years as offensive backfield coach for the New Orleans Saints (1981-85). He was the offensive coordinator for the Saints in 1985 during Wade Phillips' four-game tenure as head coach.



Following a playing career at linebacker for Pittsburg (Kansas) State, Levra coached at Kansas high schools for seven years (1959-65). His first college job was at New Mexico Highlands, where he was an assistant (1966) and later head coach (1967-70), posting a 35-4-1 record.

Levra moved to Stephen F. Austin State University as head coach and athletic director (1971-74), where his teams were 18-5 in his final two seasons and made the only bowl appearance in school history.

He became offensive coordinator at the University of Kansas (1975-78) and North Texas State (1979) before entering the pro ranks as defensive line coach for the British Columbia Lions in 1980.

A native of Arma, Kansas (10/2/37), John and his wife Rosie have two children, Gina and Craig.

ALVIN REYNOLDS Assistant Defensive Backs/ **Quality Control**

Alvin Reynolds is in his first year as a defensive assistant for the Broncos, concentrating on the defensive backfield in his coaching duties in addition to performing quality control assignments for the NFL club.

Reynolds, 33, came to the Broncos from Indiana State University, where he was on the coaching staff for 10 years (1983-92), the last three as assistant head coach and recruiting coordinator in addition to being secondary coach for the Sycamores.

A four-year strong safety who received

Heisman Trophy mention as a senior at Indiana State, Reynolds followed his playing career by serving one year as a graduate assistant at ISU, being elevated to a full-time coaching position the following year.

In addition to his role as assistant head coach and recruiting coordinator, Reynolds had various other off-the-field administrative roles, including working with the ISU athletic academic coordinator.

Reynolds was president of the ISU University Club and the Charles T. Hyte University Center, and his group involvements included the Indiana Democratic state convention, the Indiana State employee search committee, the President's Commission on Ethnic Diversity, Indiana Black Expo, and the Minority Student Retention Programs

A native of New Orleans (6/24/59), he has a bachelor's degree in business management and a master's degree in political science from Indiana State.

Reynolds has one son, Alvin, Jr., age eight.



HAROLD RICHARDSON

Special Assistant to the Head Coach/Offense

Harold Richardson is in his fifth year on the Broncos staff and his first in the capacity of offensive assistant, a role which primarily involves quality control and administrative assistance in the area of player personnel. Richardson joined the Broncos as the special teams coach in 1989 and coached that unit for four seasons, also coaching the team's tight ends in the last two seasons.

Richardson, 48, came to the Broncos from Colorado State University, where he was defensive coordinator in 1987 and 1988. Prior to that he served as receivers

and special teams coach with the NFL New Orleans Saints (1981-85).

Working on the collegiate level (1972-80), Richardson coached at North Texas State, Texas Christian, Oklahoma State, and Southern Methodist, where he began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1971.

A native of Houston, Tex. (9/27/44), Richardson earned a bachelor's degree in finance from Southern Methodist in 1968.

Harold and his wife Ramona have a son, Blake Lee.

RICHARD SMITH Special Teams/Linebackers

Richard Smith is in his first season as the Broncos' special teams' coach and also is assisting in coaching the linebackers, coming to Denver after five seasons coaching the special teams for the Houston Oilers. last year assisting with the offensive line as well.

In 1990-91 Smith also had assisted in coaching the linebackers, and he had coached the team's tight ends in 1988-89, prior to the 1990 introduction of the runand-shoot offense in Houston.

His trademark as special teams coach at Houston was producing units noted for

hustle, desire, and hard-hitting play. That unit, which helped pace the Oilers into the playoffs all five years, blocked 18 punts from 1988-92, including one against the Broncos last year. They tied the then-NFL record for blocked punts in a season with five in 1988, then followed up with four more in 1989, plus four blocked kicks each in 1990 and 1991.

The Oilers in 1992 led the entire NFL both in kickoff coverage with a 15.7 mark and in gross punting average with a 46.9 figure. They ranked in the NFL's top four in net punting average in 1990 and 1991, and were in the top six in punt return and kickoff return defense.

Smith went to Houston from the University of Arizona, where he coached special teams in 1987, and he was the special teams/outside linebackers coach for Joe Kapp at California from 1984-86. He was the defensive line coach at Fullerton State from 1981-83, helping the Titans win the PCAA title in 1983. He began his coaching career as the offensive line coach at Rio Hondo (California) College from 1979-80.

A native of Los Angeles (10/17/55), Smith received his bachelor's degree from Fresno State. He was an offensive lineman at Rio Hondo before transferring to Fresno State in 1976, with the Bulldogs winning the PCAA title in 1977.

Richard and his wife Patti have four children, daughters Morgan, age 12, Aimee, four, Whitney, two, and son Travis, seven.



ERNIE STAUTNER Defensive Line

Pro Football Hall of Famer Ernie Stautner is in his third year as the Broncos' defensive line coach in 1992.

Stautner, 68, served as the Dallas Cowboys' defensive line coach from 1966-88, and he was that club's defensive coordinator from his third season on (1968-88).

Under the direction of Stautner, the Cowboys consistently fielded excellent defenses and produced a number of Pro Bowl stars in the defensive line. The Cowboys' famed "Doomsday Defense" began to emerge shortly after Stautner's arrival as defensive line coach in 1966.



Most recently, he was the head coach of the Dallas Texans in the Arena Football League in 1990, being named Coach of the Year in leading his club to the Arena Bowl championship game.

He began his coaching career as a player-coach for the Steelers in 1963, became a full-time coach there in 1964, and was on the Washington Redskins' staff in 1965.

Stautner was an All-NFL defensive end and tackle with the Pittsburgh Steelers, where he played for 15 years (1950-64). A veteran of nine Pro Bowls, he was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1969, his first year of eligibility. In 1982 he was voted to the Steelers' 50th anniversary team.

Born in Cham, Bavaria (4/20/25), Stautner grew up in Albany, N.Y. Following the World War II Marine Corps hitch (1943-46), he enrolled at Boston College and developed into a two-way star lineman.

Ernie has three children, Joe, Terri, and Carol.

LES STECKEL **Tight Ends**

Les Steckel is in his first season coaching the Broncos' tight ends and H-backs, joining the National Football League team after a two-year stint as the offensive coordinator at the University of Colorado.

Steckel, 46, began his coaching career at Colorado, first as a graduate assistant with the defense in 1972 and then coaching the tight ends and receivers from 1973-76.

He was the offensive line coach at Navy in 1977 and moved into the pro ranks the following year, joining the San Francisco 49ers as their receivers coach.


Steckel was with the Minnesota Vikings from 1979-84, serving as the Vikings' head coach in his final campaign there.


Following his stint in Minnesota Steckel coached the guarterbacks and wide receivers for the New England Patriots from 1985-88, playing a key role in the Patriots' 1985 Super Bowl campaign. He was the offensive coordinator at Brown University in 1989 and did not coach in 1990.

A decorated Vietnam veteran as an infantry officer, Steckel was commissioned as a second lieutenant at the conclusion of Officer's Candidate School and currently is a colonel in the United States Marine Corps Reserve. He also was a two-year starter at tailback for the Quantico Marines during his military career.

Born in Northampton, Pennsylvania (7/1/46), Steckel grew up in the Lehigh Valley area, where he attended Whitehall High School prior to attending the University of Kansas, where he lettered twice at tailback. Steckel also was a Golden Gloves boxing champion in 1966.

Les and his wife Chris have three children, daughter Lesley, 12, and sons C.T., 15, and Luke, eight, and the family resides in Louisville.





Charlie Waters takes over as the Broncos' defensive coordinator in 1993, his sixth season in the Mile High City. Waters has 19 years of NFL experience, having joined the Denver staff in 1988 as special teams coach. In 1989 he took over as the defensive backfield coach, a position in which Waters was able to draw from his experiences as one of the game's finest defensive backs during his own 13-year NFL playing career.

Waters played for the Dallas Cowboys from 1970-1982 and was a three time Pro Bowl choice in 1976, 1977, 1978, in addi-

tion to being voted All-NFL the same years. A versatile athlete, he was a quarterback-turned wide receiver in college, and spent the first five years in the pros at corner and free safety, before anchoring the Cowboys secondary at strong safety.

An inductee into both the Clemson and South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fames, Waters was superb in the playoffs for the Cowboys. He holds the existing NFL career record for most interceptions in the playoffs (nine) and most in a single game NFC (three). He is third in Dallas history in career regular season pass thefts with 41.

"I knew Charlie would experience success as a coach," says Hall of Famer Tom Landry, "because as a player he was always prepared. He left nothing to chance. Charlie's last seven years at strong safety were like having a coach on the field. He coordinated our defense... this coach-like preparation enabled him to reach his fullest potential and thus provided great satisfaction as a coach."

A native of Miami, Florida (9/10/48) and raised in North Augusta, South Carolina, Charlie graduated from Clemson University in 1970. He and his wife, Rosie, have three sons, Cody, Ben, and Cliff.



JOHN PAUL YOUNG Linebackers

John Paul Young is in his first season coaching the Broncos' linebackers, joining the Denver staff from his previous position as head coach of the Dallas Texans of the Arena Football League, leading the Texans to a division title in 1992.

Young has over 30 years experience as a coach and the 1993 campaign will be his 12th in the National Football League. Although new to Denver, Young has had a long coaching relationship with Head Coach Wade Phillips, as this marks their ninth season on the same NFL staff. They previously worked together in Houston and New Orleans.



His first position in the NFL was that of linebackers and special teams coach for the Houston Oilers, under head coach Bum Phillips, from 1978-80. He was on the New Orleans Saints' staff in the same position from 1981-85, assuming the position of defensive coordinator when Wade Phillips was named the Saints' interim head coach for the final five games of the 1985 season.

Young was defensive coordinator of the Kansas City Chiefs from 1986-88, and served as linebackers coach at Texas Tech from 1989-91.



He began his coaching career at his alma mater, the University of Texas at El Paso (1962-63), before a three-year stint (1964-66) at Jacksonville (Fla.) High School. Young returned to the college ranks in 1967, coaching at Southern Methodist for two seasons (1967-68) prior to becoming the defensive coordinator at Oklahoma State in 1969.

Young was the linebackers coach and also managed the stadium,


fields, and athletic dorm at Texas A&M from 1970-77.

BOB FERGUSON Director of Football Operations/ Player Personnel

Bob Ferguson is in his first season as the Broncos' Director of Football Operations/ Player Personnel, and as such is in charge of the team's entire college and professional scouting department. He works very closely with Head Coach Wade Phillips and General Manager John Beake in making determinations relative to player acquisition.

He was largely responsible for Denver's very aggressive approach to free agency this year, an attitude that resulted in Denver signing running backs Rod Bernstine and Robert Delpino, along with



offensive linemen Don Maggs and Brian Habib.

Ferguson, 42, is in his 17th season in the National Football League, coming to Denver from the Buffalo Bills, where he had a key role in the development of the very talented Bills roster during his eight seasons with that club.

He joined the Bills in 1985 and had several positions in player personnel, culminating in Ferguson being named Assistant General Manager/Director Pro Personnel in 1989, a position in which he continued until coming to the Mile High City.

A native of Federal Way, Wash. (11/5/50), Ferguson began his NFL career with the Seattle Seahawks as Director of Sales and Special Events, handling a number of duties during his tenure there from 1975-79, and then moved into a scouting combine (serving Buffalo, Dallas, San Francisco, and Seattle) as an area scout from 1981-83. He joined the Cowboys to handle performance testing (1984-85) prior to going to Buffalo.


RONNIE HILL Assistant Director of Player Personnel

School, also coaching at Kalles Junior HS in Puyallup (Wash.) and again at South Mercer Island Junior HS.




He began his career as a highly successful prep coach in football and track at Kansas City (Missouri) Central High School for five years, winning five consecutive state track titles.







Steve Atwater earned his third consecutive Pro Bowl berth in 1992, and was also named All-NFL (AP, NEA, PFW/PFWA, TSN,) and All-AFC (Football News). He led the secondary and was second on the team with 151 total tackles, (73 tackles and 78 assists), and also posted two interceptions, a sack, 12 passes defensed, two fumble recoveries, and two forced fumbles. Atwater sat out the season opener against the Raiders (9/6) with a sprained ankle but rebounded to post 17 total tackles in week two against the Chargers (9/13), one of nine games in which he recorded double figures in tackles. Atwater had a big game at Buffalo (12/12), recovering a fumble and intercepting a pass. In 1991 he earned his second straight Pro Bowl berth after a season in which he tied for the team lead with a careerhigh five interceptions and finished second on Denver's AFC-leading defense in total tackles with 150. Atwater was also named All-NFL (AP, Pro Football Weekly, College and Pro Football Newsweekly secondteam) and All-AFC (Football News, Pro Football Weekly). For the season he registered 83 tackles, 67 assists, 11 passes defensed, a sack, a forced fumble, and a fumble recovery. Atwater was named the AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance against the Seahawks (9/15) in which he had 10 total tackles, picked off a pass, and recovered a fumble. He was in double figures in total tackles nine times that year, with a high of 14 vs. Phoenix (12/15). In post-season play Atwater had 17 total tackles and three passes defensed, and he intercepted a pass vs. Houston (1/4). He made his first appearance in the Pro Bowl after a tremendous 1990 campaign in which he finished second on the Broncos' defense with 173 total tackles, including a team-high 112 solo tackles, despite missing one game due to injury. For his efforts he was also named All-NFL(College and Pro Football Newsweekly 2nd team, Newspaper Editors Association - 2nd team) and All-AFC (UPI, Football News), and was voted by his teammates as Denver's most valuable defensive player. In addition, Atwater also posted two interceptions, four passes defensed, two forced fumbles, and a quarterback sack, while also registering 10 total tackles on special teams. From his strong safety position Atwater posted five of Denver's top 10 single game tackle totals, including a personal high of 18 vs. Pittsburgh (10/14), and had 12 or more total tackles in nine games. He cemented his reputation as a hard hitter after a thunderous collision with Kansas City's Christian Okoye in a nationally televised Monday night game (9/17). Atwater sat out the game vs. Seattle (9/23) with a rib strain and saw limited action against the Chargers (12/16) after suffering torn rib cartilage early in the first half. Atwater was named NFL All-Rookie (Pro Football Weekly, College and Pro Football Newsweekly) for a fine campaign in 1989. He made an immediate impact as the Broncos' first-round pick, taking the place of former defensive captain Mike Harden at free safety and combining with strong safety Dennis Smith to form one of the NFL's most physical safety tandems. Atwater started every regular season game and led the Bronco defense with 86 first hits. He was second on the squad with 129 total tackles and also claimed three interceptions, 10 passes defensed, and a fumble recovery. Atwater had two interceptions in the week three contest against the Raiders (9/24), the second setting up the game-clinching field goal. He had six games with 10 or more total tackles, including a high of 12 vs. San Diego (10/8).

COLLEGE: Atwater was a three-time All-Southwest Conference selection and two-time All-American at the University of Arkansas. He became the Razorbacks' all-time interception leader with 14 over his four active campaigns. He went to the school as a wishbone quarterback but was moved to the secondary as a redshirt freshman. Atwater closed out his college career with an appearance in the Senior Bowl, a game in which he had two interceptions.

PERSONAL: Steve and his wife Letha reside in the Denver suburb of Aurora. A native of Chicago, Ill., he was all-conference and league MVP as a wishbone quarterback at Lutheran North HS in St. Louis Mo., where he was named the school's top scholar-athlete. Steve lettered three times in football, once each in baseball and track, and four times in basketball, garnering all-league, all-district, and All-America honors in that sport. He was selected to play in the McDonald's All-Star Classic, but missed the contest due to the chicken pox. He enjoys playing and training with his dog, as well as playing pool, fishing, basketball, and bowling. Steve is involved with the Shiloh House and had several speaking engagements across the country during the off-season. Steve's cousin Mark Ingram is a wide receiver for the New York Giants.

Rod Bernstine came to the Broncos as a free agent from the San Diego Chargers in the 1993 off-season, and figures to play an important role in the Broncos' new offensive scheme. The 1992 season was difficult for Bernstine because of injuries. In the week seven game vs. Indianapolis (11/1/92) Bernstine rushed for 150 yards on 23 carries before leaving the game in the fourth quarter with a shoulder injury. For his efforts Bernstine was awarded AFC player of the week honors, but he was also placed on injured reserve. Prior to game seven

Bernstine led the Chargers in rushing. He returned to the active roster prior to game 14 against Cincinnati (12/13/93). In the following week's game vs. the L.A. Raiders (12/20/93) he sprained his right ankle which forced him to see limited action in the season finale against Seattle (12/27/93). Bernstine's injury problems continued into the playoffs. On his first carry in the Wild Card game against Kansas City (1/2/93) he sprained his left ankle forcing him out of the contest, and he was inactive for the Divisional playoff game vs. Miami (1/10/93). Bernstine was drafted by San Diego as a tight end with the 24th pick in the 1987 draft. He spent the 1987 season as an understudy to Kellen Winslow catching four passes for 31 yards, including a 10 yard touchdown pass from Dan Fouts against Cleveland (11/1). Bernstine showed his toughness on special teams and his teammates rewarded his efforts by voting him the Chargers' Outstanding Rookie of the Year. In 1988 Bernstine played the entire year at tight end before suffering a knee injury (12/4/88). He finished the season tied for fifth on the team with 29 receptions for 340 yards. He accounted for the two longest plays from scrimmage for the team in 1988 with 57 and 59 yard catches. His big day during the 1988 season was a nine-reception game vs. San Francisco (11/27/88) which was a team high in the 1988 season. In 1989 Bernstine took his first snaps at running back but was still vital to the Charger passing game. He led the team in receptions weeks two through four with his big day being an eight reception game against Houston (9/17/89). After suffering a sprained knee versus the Broncos (10/8/89), Bernstine was placed on injured reserve for the remainder of the season. The 1990 season saw Bernstine establish himself as a running back, saving his best performance for the last game of the year. In the season finale against the Raiders, he rushed 27 times for 114 yards, finishing the season with 124 carries for 589 yards, with a 4.8 yard average and 4 touchdowns. In 1991 Bernstine finished second on the team and seventh in the AFC in rushing with a career-high 766 yards on 159 carries (4.8 average). Tyrone Braxton turned in another fine performance last season, his fourth as Denver's starting left cornerback. He led the team with 16 passes defensed and had totals of 56 tackles, 43 assists, and two interceptions. Braxton played very well in the week two clash with the Chargers (9/13), netting 11 total tackles and four passes defensed. Braxton made a successful comeback in 1991 from a knee injury that caused him to miss most of the previous campaign. He once again served as Denver's starting left cornerback and marked his return by intercepting a pass for a touchdown in the season opener vs. Cincinnati (9/1). In regular season play Braxton had 57 tackles, 35 assists, 12 passes defensed, four interceptions, a sack, a forced fumble, and a fumble recovery. He had a big game against New England (12/1), posting six tackles, three passes defensed, and a sack. In postseason play Braxton had seven tackles and seven assists, and intercepted a pass in the AFC Championship Game at Buffalo (1/12). He tore the medial collateral ligament in his right knee in the third game of the 1990 season, and underwent surgery to repair the injury. Braxton registered 17 total tackles, an interception, and two passes defensed before being hurt. Braxton had a tremendous season in 1989, playing cornerback for the first time in his career. He started every game for the Broncos and ranked sixth in the AFC with a team-leading six interceptions, while also pacing Denver's defense with 14 passes defensed. In regular season play Braxton posted 77 first hits, 34 assists, two forced fumbles, and two fumble recoveries. He helped set the tone for the Broncos' defensive resurgence that season when on opening day vs. Kansas City (9/10) he intercepted a pass on the Chiefs' first play from scrimmage and returned it for 34 and a touchdown. Braxton set up a Denver touchdown with a 35-year fumble return against Washington (11/20), and racked up 12 tackles and an interception at Seattle (10/22). He had a good season in 1988 as one of the leaders on Denver's special teams and as a reserve defensive back. Braxton closed out that campaign with 39 total tackles, five passes defensed, two interceptions, a fumble recovery, and a quarterback sack. In 1987 he played in the final two regular season games and all three postseason contests, spending the first 13 weeks of the season on injured reserve with a shoulder injury suffered in the preseason. Primarily a special teams player in the regular season, he posted three first hits and two assists in the postseason, and was named Denver's special teams most valuable player for his performance in the divisional playoff game vs. Houston (1/10). He was Denver's 12th-round draft pick in 1987, the second to last player taken.

COLLEGE: Braxton was a defensive back and punt return specialist at North Dakota State, earning all-conference honors as a senior after posting 128 tackles, an interception, and two fumble recoveries. As a junior he led the conference with five interceptions and a punt return average of 15.0, earning him second-team all-conference honors. Braxton was a member of the North Central Conference champion outdoor 400-meter relay squad that competed in the national championship.

Mike Croel started every game at outside linebacker last year and had 66 tackles, 31 assists, while also posting five sacks, four passes defensed, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery. Against Kansas City (10/4) Croel had a sack and forced a fumble, and had 2.5 sacks vs. San Diego (9/13). He set the tone for Denver's defense when he threw Jeff Hostetler for a 10-yard loss on the first play of the game against the Giants (11/15). Brad Daluiso (DAAH-loo-ee-so) proved to be a valuable defensive weapon for Denver in 1992 with his booming kickoffs and he also performed well in two games in which he was called in to handle the punting chores. For the season he kicked off 65 times with 53 touchbacks, a .815 percentage, and had only 12 returned, by far the lowest total in the NFL. Robert Delpino came to the Broncos in the 1993 offseason as an unrestricted free agent from the Los Angeles Rams. He is in his sixth season as a pro and has amassed some impressive numbers at the running back position. Delpino is known to be an excellent allpurpose player, and showed off his skills in the first game of the 1992 season against Buffalo (9/6/93). In regular season play he led the team with 17 passes defensed, while also posting 21 tackles, 17 assists, three interceptions, and a fumble recovery. Dimry turned in one of the key plays of the year when he intercepted a Steve DeBerg pass at Kansas City (11/17) and returned it 26 yards for his first pro touchdown. In the season finale at San Diego (12/22) he had five passes defensed and an interception to earn game MVP honors. Dimry started against Houston in the Divisional Playoff Game (1/4) and his post-season stats show eight tackles, four assists, and a pass defensed. He played three seasons with Atlanta after joining the team as a fifth-round draft choice in 1988. In 1990 he started 12 of 16 games played and recorded career highs in interceptions (five) and tackles (55), with 12 passes defensed.

COLLEGE: Dimry earned a spot in the starting lineup as a sophomore at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas, although injuries as a junior and senior slowed his final two seasons. In 31 games he intercepted three passes, one for a touchdown, made 101 tackles, deflected 19 passes, and had a pair of sacks.

PERSONAL: Charles and his wife Francine have two daughters, Erin (7/18/91) and Carlee (8/5/92), and the family makes its home in Oceanside, Calif. A native of San Diego, Calif., he graduated from Oceanside (Calif.) HS. His father was a member of a 440-relay team that set a San Diego city record, a record that still stands.

Shane Dronett had an impressive NFL debut in 1992, playing well enough to move into the starting line-up for the final two games of the campaign. He closed out the season third on the team with 6.5 sacks, while also posting 30 tackles, 23 assists, five passes defensed, two fumble recoveries, and a forced fumble. Midway through the season he had two sacks against the Jets (11/8) and the following week forced and recovered a fumble against the Giants (11/15).

COLLEGE: Dronett was a first-team All-American and a two-time all-conference choice during his sterling career at the University of Texas. A consensus All-Southwest Conference player as a senior, Dronett posted 72 tackles (44 solo), 25 quarterback pressures, four blocked kicks, four forced fumbles, and nine passes broken up. John Elway enters his 11th NFL season in 1993 after leading the Broncos through a decade of success. During Denver's Elway era (1983-92), the Hall of Fame caliber quarterback has spurred his team on to three victories in four AFC Championship Games, five AFC Western Division titles, and six playoff berths.

Since Elway's rookie season the Broncos have posted the NFL's fifth best record (98-60-1, .619), a mark just one-half game behind the AFC-leading Miami Dolphins. No team can match Denver's sterling home record in that time period, which stands at 63-17 (.788).

Elway in 1992 became just the 15th quarterback in NFL history to reach the 30,000-yard plateau in passing. Despite playing in just 12 games he was voted by teammates as Denver's offensive MVP, the sixth such honor of his career.

Elway's career totals show 30,216 passing yards and 2,282 rushing yards, which combine for a total offense mark of 32,498 yards. He holds or is tied for 19 regular season team records, including most touchdown passes (158), highest average gain per rush (4.61), and lowest career interception avoidance percentage (.036). His rushing total ranks sixth in team history, just 104 yards behind fifth-ranked Bobby Humphrey, and seventh among all-time NFL quarterbacks. He holds an NFL record with seven consecutive campaigns (1985-91) with over 3,000 yards passing and over 200 yards rushing.

Elway now has a 96-57-1 (.627) overall record as a starting quarterback, but can claim a 92-51-1 (.642) record, including playoffs, since becoming the Broncos' permanent starter in the first game of

1984. He has an 89-52-1 (.630) career regular season record as a starter, including a home record of 57-15 (.792).

In his career, Elway has engineered 31 fourth-quarter, game-saving drives, and the team has a record of 30-0-1 in the contests. Those games include 24 fourth-quarter, game-winning drives and seven fourth-quarter, game tying drives. (See complete listing of drives on page).

He has completed 45 passes of 50 or more yards as a Bronco and has 17 regular season (19 overall) 300-yard passing games. He has had 29 overall games with 300 or more yards of total offense and Denver

is 19-9-1 in those contests.

In postseason play Elway has started 12 of 13 games and has completed 200 of 384 passes for 3,019 yards, with 16 touchdowns and 17 interceptions. He has gained 349 yards on 66 rushing attempts, scoring four times.

ELWAY NAMED 1992 EDGE NFL MAN OF THE YEAR

John Elway was named the 1992 Edge NFL Man of the Year for his work with the Elway Foundation, a non-profit organization which has raised over \$1,000,000 that was directed toward the prevention and treatment of child abuse throughout Colorado. Elway was presented with the Man of the Year trophy on January 28.

Among the groups assisted by the Elway Foundation are Family Focus and the Kempe Children's Foundation. The Elway Foundation in 1991 alone raised over \$400,000. Elway is also a member of the Mayor's Council on Physical Fitness and has served as chairman of the National Kidney Foundation for the Rocky Mountain region.

The Edge NFL Man of the Year award is truly unique in that it is the only league-sponsored award that recognizes a player's off-the-field community service work as well as his playing excellence. Perhaps the most prestigious of all NFL awards, it has been in existence since 1970.

1992: Elway completed 174 of 316 passes for 2,242 yards, with 10 touchdowns and 17 interceptions. He gained 94 yards and scored twice on 34 rushing attempts. He missed games 11 through 14 because of a bruised tendon in his right shoulder, suffered while running for a first down against the Giants (11/15). Elway earned two AFC Offensive Player of the Week honors last year, grabbing the first one for his performance on opening day. Against the Raiders (9/6) he drove Denver 85 yards in seven plays to score the winning points with 55 seconds left, a score set up by a 48-vard pass to Arthur Marshall. His second player-of-theweek honors came after he threw two touchdown passes in the final two minutes to give Denver a 20-19 victory over Kansas City (10/4). Elway passed for 311 yards in that game, his only 300-yard effort of the season. In week two against San Diego (9/13) Elway threw two TD passes and scored on an eight-yard run. Against the Jets (11/8) he threw an 80-yard touchdown pass to Arthur Marshall, his longest regular season TD pass ever. He turned in a sterling performance against Houston (10/18), directing a three-play, 80-yard drive for the winning score with less than two minutes remaining in the game.

1991: Elway completed 242 of 351 passes for 3,253 yards, a total ranked sixth in the AFC and ninth in the NFL. He threw 12 touchdown passes and tied a career low with just 12 interceptions. He had 36 pass completions of 20+ yards, nine of 40+, five of 50+, and four of 60+. Elway was third on the team with 258 yards rushing, and his six TDs led the team and set a new career single season high. He was bothered throughout the second half of the season by a shoulder problem that was corrected by arthroscopic surgery in the 1992 offseason.

Against Cincinnati in the season opener (9/1), Elway threw for 262 yards and two touchdowns, scored two rushing TDs, and caught a 24-yard pass from Steve Sewell. Against Kansas City (10/20) he combined with Mark Jackson for a 71-yard gain on a fourth-and-13 play to set up the winning field goal. Elway had his only 300-yard passing performance of the year in Denver's loss at Houston (10/6), with 301 yards. His heroics were never more evident than in the Broncos' 26-24 Divisional Playoff Game victory over Houston (1/4). He rallied Denver from a 21-6 deficit, and on a drive in which he completed a fourth-down pass to Michael Young for a first down, he drove his team to a

touchdown to cut the Oilers' lead to one point at 24-23. Houston's next drive stalled but a punt gave the Broncos the ball on the two. Twice Elway converted fourth down plays, first on a seven-yard run and later with a 44-yard pass to Vance Johnson, to set up Denver's winning field goal. For the game Elway completed 19 of 33 passes for 257 yards, with one TD and one interception, and rushed six times for 39 yards. In the AFC Championship Game loss at Buffalo (1/12) he completed 11 of 21 passes for 121 yards and an interception before having to leave the game in the fourth quarter with a thigh injury.

1990: Elway completed 294 of 502 passes in 1990, (a .586 completion percentage that stands as the highest of his career), for 3.526 yards, 15 touchdowns, and 14 interceptions. He gained 258 yards on 50 rushing attempts and scored three touchdowns on the ground. Elway turned in several gutsy performances last season, and played some of his best games in the midst of Denver's six game losing streak, including a 328-yard, two-TD performance at Kansas City (12/9). That performance was his 17th career 300-yard game and the 27th time in which he totaled over 300 yards of total offense. Denver is 18-8-1 in those games. Elway had three of his top six career completion percentages in 1990, with a high of .800 at Minnesota (11/4), and also tied his personal single game completion mark with 30 vs. Seattle (9/23). Elway and wide receiver Vance Johnson combined on Denver's most memorable play of the season when on fourth and 10 against Kansas City (9/17) they connected on a 49-yard pass that set up a last second game-winning field goal attempt. He also set a new regular season rushing high with a mark of 52 yards against the Raiders (12/2).

1989: Elway in 1989 led Denver to its third AFC Championship in four years. He completed 223 of 416 passes for 3,051 yards, with 18 touchdowns and 18 interceptions, and he rushed for 244 yards on 48 carries, scoring three times. Elway had one 300-yard passing game in the regular season, passing for 344 yards and two TDs in the Broncos' overtime win at Seattle (10/22). He led Denver to a 38-0 halftime lead against the Seahawks (11/26) after passing for 217 yards and four TDs. In the divisional playoff game vs. Pittsburgh (1/7/90) Elway completed 12 of 20 passes for 239 yards, including completions of 51 and 37 yards, and rushed for 44 yards, with one run of 32 yards. He had one of the best performances of his career in the AFC Championship Game against Cleveland (1/14), totaling over 300 yards total offense for the third time in a conference title game. He completed 20 of 36 passes for 385 yards and three TDs. Elway combined with Michael Young on a 70-yard scoring play, completed a 43-yard pass to Steve Sewell, threw a 39-yard TD pass to Sammy Winder, and gained 25 of his 39 rushing yards on one play. In Super Bowl XXIV (1/28) he completed 10 of 26 passes for 108 yards and scored Denver's only TD of the game on a three yard run.

1988: In 1988 Elway threw for 3,309 yards and rushed for 234 yards despite being bothered for most of the season by several nagging injuries. He was voted by teammates as Denver's most valuable offensive player for the fourth straight year, sharing the award with running back Sammy Winder, following a campaign in which he completed 274 of 496 passes, with 17 touchdowns and 19 interceptions. He had his only 300-yard passing game of the season against the Raiders (12/4) with

324 yards and two touchdowns.

1987: Elway was named the NFL's Most Valuable Player (AP) and the AFC's starting quarterback in the Pro Bowl after turning in a tremendous season in 1987, a year in which he became the first AFC signal caller since Terry Bradshaw (1978-79) to lead his team to consecutive conference crowns. Elway was named All-NFL (The Sporting News, NEA, AP-second team) and All-AFC (UPI, Pro Football Weekly, The Football News), in addition to being tabbed as the AFC MVP (NFLPA), AFC Player of the Year (The Football News), AFC Offensive Player of the Year (UPI, Kansas City 101 Club), and Colorado Pro Athlete of the Year (Colorado Sports Hall of Fame). He was dynamic in the AFC Championship Game against the Browns, completing 14 of the 26 passes for 281 yards and three TDs, while

also rushing 11 times for 36 yards. In Super Bowl XXII he completed 14 of 38 passes for 257 yards, ran for 32 yards on three carries, and became the first quarterback in Super Bowl history to catch a pass, a 23-yarder from Steve Sewell. Elway's 56-yard scoring strike to Ricky Nattiel on Denver's first play from scrimmage provided the earliest TD in Super Bowl history (elapsed time of 1:57). He was voted the Broncos' offensive MVP for a regular season performance in which he completed 224 of 410 passes for 3,198 yards, an average of 267 yards per game, with 19 TD passes. Elway had four 300 yard passing games that year, a team record. He led all AFC quarterbacks in rushing for the fourth straight season was second on the team with a career-high 304 yards, scoring four times.

1986: Elway led the Broncos to their first AFC Championship in nine seasons in 1986, while earning his first Pro Bowl berth. He was honored with the Seattle Gold Helmet Award (Professional Football Player of the Year) and received the King of the Hill award from the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame, in addition to being named honorable mention All-NFL (AP) and All-AFC (UPI-second team). Along with his 18 TD passes that year, Elway also scored on an 11 -yard run and a 23-yard pass reception from Steve Sewell that is the longest TD catch by a full-time starting QB in NFL history. His best statistical game of the season came against the Giants (11/23) when he passed for 336 yards and led the team with 51 yards rushing. Elway directed one of the greatest drives in NFL postseason history in pacing Denver to a 23-20 overtime win over Cleveland for the AFC title. He completed 22 of 38 passes for 244 yards and a TD, that coming on a five-yard strike to Mark Jackson that capped a 15-play, 98-vard drive that tied the game at the end of regulation. In overtime Elway drove the team 60 yards in nine plays to the winning field goal. In Super Bowl XXI Elway completed 22 of 37 passes for 304 yards and one TD, also scoring on a four-yard run.

1985: Elway took some spectacular steps forward in 1985, as the Stanford graduate rewrote the Denver record book Elway set Bronco single season records for attempts (605, which led the NFL and fell just four passes short of the NFL record of 609 held by Dan Fouts), completions (327, second in the NFL), passing yards (3,891, second in the NFL), total rushing and passing plays (656, first in the NFL), and total offense (4,414, also first in the league).

1984: Elway led the Broncos to a 12-2 record in his 14 regular season starts in 1984. He completed 214 of 380 passes for 2,598 yards, with 18 TDs and 15 interceptions. Not only was his passing a factor in his leadership of the offense, but he finished third on the team in rushing with 237 yards.

1983: Elway started 10 games in 1983, including the first five before being replaced by Steve DeBerg and five more after DeBerg was injured. While Elway did not have impressive stats as a rookie, finishing 1 7th among AFC passers, he carried a tremendous emotional burden, having come to the NFL as the most publicized college prospect since Joe Namath in 1965. Elway was the first player chosen in the 1983 draft and joined the Broncos by trade with Baltimore on May 2.

COLLEGE: John concluded his college career with five major NCAA Division 1-A records and nine major Pac-10 marks. Elway completed 62.1 percent of his career passes (774 of 1,243, both NCAA highs) for 9,349 yards and 77 touchdowns, while setting an NCAA record for the lowest percentage of passes intercepted in a career (3.13 percent). As a senior, John was a consensus All American and finished second in Heisman Trophy balloting while setting virtually every Pac-10 and Stanford career record for total offense and passing. A two-sport star, John played baseball for the New York Yankees' Oneonta (N.Y.) single-A farm club in 1982, hitting for a 318 average and knocking in a team-high 24 runs batted in. He was the Yankees' first selection in the 1981 summer draft. He hit.349 with nine homers and 50 RBI in 49 games in his final college baseball season as a sophomore. Elway has a degree in economics from Stanford.

PERSONAL: John and his wife Janet have three daughters, Jessica Gwen (10/17/85), Jordan Marie (6/1/87), Juliana (3/7/91), and a son, Jack (8/11/89). The family makes its home in Englewood, Colo. A native of Port Angeles, Wash., Elway was the most highly recruited prep athlete in the nation in 1979 and was listed on Parade, Scholastic Coach, Football News, and National Coaches Association All-America teams. He had an unparalleled football-baseball career at Granada Hills HS. John was 129 of 200 for 1,837 yards and 19 TDs as a senior, while leading the baseball team to the Los Angeles City championship with a .491 batting average and a 4-2 pitching record. He completed 60 percent of his high school passes for 5, 711 yards and 49 TDs. The Kansas City Royals selected him in the 1979 summer draft, although he already had signed a national letter of intent with Stanford. John's father, Jack, coached his son in the East-West Shrine contest in which John earned Offensive MVP laurels, and is currently a member of the Broncos' scouting department.

Simon Fletcher comes into the 1993 season on the verge of becoming the Denver Broncos' all-time leader in quarterback sacks. He enters his ninth NFL campaign with 72 sacks, tied for second in franchise history with former defensive end and current Denver assistant coach Barney Chavous. They are one and one-half sacks behind team leader Rulon Jones, who amassed 73.5 sacks in his nine years with the Broncos. In 1992 Fletcher earned his second career team defensive MVP award after recording 16 sacks to set a new single season record for the club. He broke the previous mark of 13.5, set in 1986 by Jones and tied by Fletcher in 1991. His total ranked second in the AFC behind San Diego's Leslie O'Neal, who had 17, and was the fourth highest mark in the NFL. He was Denver's sack leader in each of the past five seasons, also a first in team annals, and shares the team single-game sack record of four with Karl Mecklenburg. Having never missed a game in his pro career, Fletcher is second among all active Broncos in consecutive games in consecutive games played (124) and started (95). Last year he led the team with five forced fumbles and topped all non-defensive backs with nine passes defensed. He registered 64 tackles and 35 assists as well. He had at least one sack in each of the last seven games of the campaign, including three and one-half at Seattle (11/30) and two each vs. the Giants (11/15), Seahawks (12/20), and Chiefs (12/27). In addition, Fletcher had two and one-half sacks in Denver's victory over Houston (10/18), a game in which he also broke up two passes and forced a fumble. Fletcher led the Broncos in sacks in 1991 for the fourth straight season, the first player in team history to accomplish that feat. His 13.5 sacks tied the club record set by Rulon Jones in 1986 and ranked second in the AFC. That season Fletcher had at least a half sack in the final 10 regular season games and had two-sack performances vs. Pittsburgh (11/3) and at San Diego (12/22). In addition to the sacks, he also posted 46 tackles, 43 assists, three passes defensed, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery. Fletcher was named AFC Defensive Player of the Month for December. In postseason play he registered 14 total tackles and Denver's only sack. In 1990 Fletcher led Denver with 11 sacks, and had 55 tackles, 42 assists, a team-high four forced fumbles, a fumble recovery, and a pass defensed. At Minnesota(11/4) he tied a team record with four sacks and he had two games in which he forced two fumbles. Fletcher set a new career high and ranked fourth in the AFC with 12 sacks in 1989. He had two or more sacks in three games, including a two and one-half sack performance at Cleveland (10/1). In addition, that year he had 61 first hits, 44 assists, three forced fumbles, two passes defensed, and a fumble recovery. He had 13 total tackles at Seattle (10/22) and 12 at Kansas City (11/12). Fletcher had a tremendous season in 1988 and was voted Denver's Most Valuable Defensive Player by his teammates. He led the team with a career high nine guarterback sacks, a figure tied for sixth in the AFC. Three times in 1988 Fletcher was named the Broncos' overall player of the game and was honored as the defensive player of the

game twice. Against Cleveland (11/13) Fletcher posted 11 total tackles, including two sacks, and he forced and recovered a fumble. In addition to the nine sacks. Fletcher's season totals show 115 total tackles, his first interception as a professional, and six passes defensed. He had a fine season in 1987 as Denver's starting strong outside linebacker, his first campaign ever as a linebacker. Bronco coaches moved him from defensive end after the 1986 season to take advantage of his size and ability to drop off into pass coverage. Fletcher's top performances in the 1987 regular season included an 11-tackle, one-sack game against Green Bay (9/20), a 12-tackle game against the Raiders (11/22), and a strong performance vs. Kansas City (12/19) in which he netted two quarterback sacks fumble recovery. He closed out regular season play with 49 first hits, 21 assists, and four sacks. Fletcher was impressive in post-season play, registering 10 first hits in Super Bowl XXII (1/31) and five first hits and a sack in the AFC Championship Game vs. Cleveland (1/17), while posting six quarterback harassments in the three games. He played in every game in 1986, starting twice (at Philadelphia on 9/21 and as an outside linebacker vs. Washington on 12/13) and finishing the campaign with 43 tackles, two passes defensed, and two fumble recoveries. Fletcher blocked a key field goal attempt in a Bronco win over the Raiders (11/2) and deflected an extra point in Denver's one-point win over the Redskins (12/13). He saw action in both AFC playoff games and in Super Bowl XXI, contributing seven tackles and two assists during post-season play. Fletcher played in all 16 games in 1985 and increased his playing time as the season went on, making his first pro start at Pittsburgh (12/1). Denver's second pick in the second round, Fletcher finished the season with 17 total tackles and one quarterback sack, that coming in the season finale at Seattle (12/20).

COLLEGE: Simon was a three-year starter at the University of Houston, where he posted 209 total tackles, including 30 tackles for losses and 14 quarterback sacks. Fletcher also defensed 10 passes during a career in which he started 33 of the 37 games in which he played for the Cougars. As a senior he had 11 tackles for losses and eight sacks despite playing the last six games with a pinched nerve in his shoulder. He started at both right tackle (1982 and 1984) and right end (1983) during his college career, which he closed out with a Cotton Bowl appearance against

Boston College.

PERSONAL: Simon is married (Pinkie) and has two daughters, Ashley Nicole (1/12/84) and Neomi Patrice (1/25/88), and the family makes its home in Aurora, Colo. He earned letters in both football and track at Bay City HS, and has an older brother who played football at Texas A&I.

Wymon Henderson in 1992 tied for the team lead with four interceptions, returning one 46 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets (11/8), his second scoring return in three years. While he was Denver's starting right cornerback for most of the season, Henderson saw a series of injuries limit his playing time in the latter stages of the campaign. He did not play vs. Dallas (12/6) because of injuries to his right thigh and hamstring and played sparingly in the final three weeks of the season. Henderson closed out the year with 42 tackles. 12 assists, 10 passes defensed, and a forced fumble. He holds the Broncos' all-time best interception return average with a mark of 23.8. Henderson started all 16 regular season games and the AFC Championship Game at Buffalo (1/12) in 1991. He sat out of the Divisional Playoff Game vs. Houston because of a knee injury suffered in the season finale at San Diego (12/22). In regular season play Henderson posted 53 tackles, 29 assists, two interceptions, and eight passes defensed. He had 10 tackles vs. Pittsburgh (11/3) and returned an interception 53 yards at Kansas City (11/17), setting up a Denver field goal. Seven of his 12 career interceptions have been with the Broncos and he has started 46 of 47 games played with Denver. Henderson started 15 games for Denver in 1990 at right cornerback sitting out the game at Indianapolis (10/1) with torn rib cartilage. He was one of three Bronco defenders with two interceptions, including one at Detroit (11/22) that was returned 49 yards for his first touchdown as a pro. In addition, he was in on a career-high 88 tackles, and had five passes defensed and a fumble recovery. His best games of the campaign came against the Raiders, as he was named the Broncos' defensive MVP in the season opener in Los Angeles (9/9) and had 12 total tackles and blocked an extra point attempt in the rematch in Denver (12/2). Henderson in 1989 started every game except the season finale at San Diego (12/24), although he came in on the second play from scrimmage. Mike Horan is expected to enter training camp fully rehabilitated from a knee injury suffered in the seventh game of the 1992 season. He tore a ligament in his right (non-kicking) knee while attempting to make a tackle following a blocked punt against Houston (10/8). He was having an excellent season prior to the injury, punting 37 times for a 45.4 average, with seven punts landing inside the 20, and just one touchback. Horan is entering his 10th NFL season and his eighth campaign with Denver. With the Broncos he has punted 374 times, third most in club history and just three behind Luke Prestridge. His punting average of 42.5 is third in team annals. An extremely accurate punter, Horan has placed 149 of 557 punts inside the 20 (.268), and has a +105 career inside the 20/touchbacks differential. Horan punted 72 times in 1991 for a 41.8 average, which ranked eighth in the AFC, with 24 punts inside the 20 and just eight touchbacks. His net average of 36.7 was fourth best in the conference and sixth in the NFL. He had one punt blocked at Houston (10/6), and ran nine yards for a first down in the season finale at San Diego (12/22). Horan has a career average of 42.1 on 520 punts. Horan, who holds the first and third best single game averages in team history, punted five times for a 55.0 average at New England (10/27), the fourth best effort. He had a punt of 71 yards in that game, his longest regular season punt as a Bronco. In post-season play punted eight times for a 40.4 average, with four punts inside of the 20. At Buffalo in the AFC Championship Game (1/12) tied an NFL post-season record, and set the AFC title game mark, with a 76-yard punt. Horan led the NFL in 1991 with a career-high punting average of 44.4 yards and a net average of 38.9 yards. He earned All-NFL(College and Pro Football Newsweekly) and All-AFC (Football News, UP1 - 2nd team) honors for his efforts. Horan punted 58 times and displayed his accuracy with 14 punts inside of the 20 and only six touchbacks. He had a gross average of 45 yards or better in seven games, with a high of 55.8 on five punts vs. San Diego (12/16) and had a net average of 40 yards or better in eight games. His average against the Chargers stands as the third best mark in team history. and he also holds the top single game average of 57.2 against the Raiders (9/26/88). Horan was named second-team All-NFL (College and Pro Football Newsweekly) following the 1989 season. He punted 77 times for a 40.4 average, a figure ranked sixth in the AFC, and had a net average of 34.3, 24 punts inside of the 20, five touchbacks, and a long kick of 63 yards. Horan had the lowest percentage of punts returned (.364) in the NFL, and demonstrated his punting accuracy over the final 11 weeks of the regular season when he placed 18 punts inside of the 20 and had just two touchbacks. He averaged 47.0 yards on five punts vs. Philadelphia (10/29), 46.7 yards on six punts against the Raiders (9/24), and in the AFC Championship Game vs. Cleveland (1/14) he punted five times for an average of 46.4 yards, with a long punt of 61 yards. He earned his first NFL Pro Bowl berth in 1988 after leading the league with a net punting average of 37.8. He was also honored as All-NFL (AP, PFWA, The Sporting News, College and Pro Football Newsweekly, Sports Illustrated, World Almanac second team) and All AFC (UPI, Football News). Horan's overall punting average of 44.0 ranked third in the NFL, and he placed 19 kicks inside the opponents 20-vard line, with only two touchbacks in 1988 set a team record with a 57.2- yard average vs. the Raiders (9/26), a game in which he had punts of 70, 67, and 56 yards. Vance Johnson in 1993 comes into his ninth NFL campaign ranked third in team history with 367 receptions and fifth with 5,008 yards. He finished last year's campaign fifth on the team with 24 catches for 294 vards and two touchdowns. Johnson was on injured reserve for the first four games of the year after tearing a pectoral muscle in training camp, and also missed the game vs. Seattle (12/20) because of a strained hamstring. His first catch of the year was a game-winning, 12-yard TD reception with 38 seconds left in the game vs. Kansas City (10/4). Johnson has caught more TD passes (30) from John Elway than any other player. In 1991 he rebounded from a slow start to lead the team in receptions over the final month of the campaign. He closed out the regular season with 21 catches for 208 yards and three touchdowns, and ranked seventh in the AFC with a 7.3 average on 24 punt returns. After suffering a preseason knee injury, Johnson spent the first four weeks of the season on injured reserve and was on the Broncos' inactive list for games six and seven. Although he had just four receptions through the first 11 weeks of the year, Johnson had 16 in the final four regular season contests. He was the Broncos' postseason reception leader as well, catching 10 passes for 178 yards and a score in two games, while also returning three punts for 36 yards. Against Houston in the Divisional Playoff Game (1/4), he caught five passes for 78 yards, and two of those receptions were pivotal to the outcome of the game. Johnson was on the receiving end of a 10-yard pass from John Elway for the Broncos' first points of the day. Denver's winning field goal was set up by a pass from Elway to Johnson that gained 44 yards on a fourth-and-10 play from the Bronco 35. In the AFC Championship Game at Buffalo (1/12), Johnson caught seven passes for 100 yards to lead all receivers in the contest. In 1990 he finished second on the team with 54 receptions for747yards and three touchdowns, and also returned 11 punts for an 8.4 average and six kickoffs for 126 yards. Johnson tied his single game high with nine receptions vs. Seattle (9/23), the Broncos' top mark in 1990. He also led the team with a 150-yard performance vs. Kansas City, (9/17), a game in which he caught a fourthdown, 49-yard pass from John Elway that helped set up the gamewinning field goal. Johnson had an outstanding season in 1989, as he became the first Bronco to catch more than 70 passes since Lionel Taylor in 1965. Johnson set career highs with 76 catches for 1.095 yards and seven touchdowns. His reception total tied for fourth in the AFC and ninth in the NFL, while his yardage total ranked ninth in the conference and 12th in the league. He accounted for six of Denver's top eight receiving days in 1989 and had five or more receptions in eight games, with nine against both Philadelphia (10/29) and Phoenix (12/16). Johnson was on the receiving end of six of the team's 15 longest pass plays, including receptions of 68 and 69 yards. He had six receptions for a career-high 154 yards and two TDs against Seattle (11/26), all coming in the first half. That game marked his third 100-yard effort of the season and his first two-TD game ever. He caught nine passes for 148 yards and a score vs. Philadelphia (10/29)

and five for 145 yards and a score at Cleveland (10/1). Johnson was Denver's primary punt return in the last half of the 1989 season and closed out the campaign with 12 returns for a team-high 9.8 average. Johnson led all Denver receivers in the postseason, with 12 catches for 197 yards and a score, and he returned seven punts for a 7.6 average. Against Pittsburgh in the divisional playoff game (1/7) he had three receptions for 85 yards and a TD and caught seven passes for 91 yards in the AFC Championship Game vs. Cleveland (1/14). In Super Bowl XXIV (1/28) he caught two passes for 21 yards. Johnson led the team in 1988 with 68 catches (6th AFC, T15th-NFL), the eighth highest single season total in Bronco history, and gained 896 yards (9th-AFC, 20th-NFL). In the game against the Raiders (9/26), Johnson combined with Elway for an 86-yard pass play, tying the Bronco record for longest non-scoring completion. Johnson was the only Bronco that season to record a catch in every game, and he gained 50 or more yards on receptions in nine of 16 games. He had an outstanding 1987 campaign despite missing most of two regular season games with a dislocated shoulder, suffered early in the Dec. 6 contest vs. New England. He led the team with 684 yards on 42 catches and scored seven touchdowns to tie for the team lead. Johnson gained over 80 yards on receptions in six games, including a 115-yard per-performance against the Los Angeles Raiders (11/22), and tied a team record by scoring a TD by reception in six straight games. In the divisional playoff game vs. Houston (1/10), Johnson caught four passes for 105 yards before being sidelined with a groin in jury. The injury kept him out of the AFC Championship Game but he returned to action in Super Bowl XXII. He turned in a tremendous performance in the 1986 postseason, completing his comeback from an early season knee injury. After a dazzling exhibition in the final preseason game vs. the Los Angeles Rams, in which he caught 11 passes for 195 yards and a score, he injured a knee in the season opener, had arthroscopic surgery, and spent four weeks on injured reserve. He finished the regular season with 31 receptions for 363 yards and two touchdowns, rushed five times for 15 yards, and returned three punts and two kickoffs. Johnson led the team in the 1986 post-season with 12 catches for 235 vards and two TDs. In the divisional playoff game vs. New England (1/4) he caught four passes for 89 yards and scored on a 48-yard pass from John Elway. After a three-catch performance in the AFC Championship Game at Cleveland (1/11) he led all receivers in Super Bowl XXI with five receptions for 121 yards, including a 47-yard TD pass from Elway. He had a fine season in 1985 as he made the conversion from running back to wide receiver and set new Bronco rookie records for receptions (51) and reception vardage (721 yards). He led the team in punt and kickoff returns as well, and his 1,757 all-purpose yards were tops among all NFL rookies. His receiving totals placed second on the team, although Johnson did not become a full-time starter until week 10. He registered Denver's high-vardage mark that year with 116 yards on six catches vs. Kansas City (12/14), and he recorded three of the top six yardage marks for the team, including 96 yards at Atlanta (9/22) and 92 yards vs. San Francisco (11/11). Johnson scored three touchdowns, with the longest being a 63-yard catch and run against the Falcons. Denver's first pick in the second round of that year's draft, Johnson ran a 4.36 40-yard dash in rookie camp.

COLLEGE: Vance was the University of Arizona's key player at tailback in his four years with the Wildcats, finishing fourth in school history in all-purpose yards (3, 442), fifth in scoring (168 pts.), and sixth in receptions (78). He closed out his college career with appearances in the Senior Bowl and the East-West Shrine game, where he caught seven passes and threw a touchdown pass. As a junior, Vance led the PAC-10 in touchdowns with 13, 10 of them rushing. He was a 1982 All-PAC 10 selection and led the team that season in rushing (433 yards) and kickoff returns (27.2 avg.). Vance set several Arizona freshman records and was named to Blue Chip Magazine's second-team All-American freshman squad. A great track athlete as well. Vance won the 1982 NCAA long jump championship with a 26'-11½" effort, and

in addition captured the 1984 PAC-10 long jump title, finishing second in the NCAA that year. He was an alternate in the long jump on the 1984 Olympic team, missing the team by one inch. He was chosen to compete with the American Olympic team in the spring of 1985 in Monaco, France, but decided to pass up the opportunity because of his football career. He majored in commercial art.

He scored 22 touchdowns as a senior and had a 9.1 yard rushing average while gaining 1,382 yards. He set school records in the long jump, high jump, 100 and 220-yard dashes, and was Arizona's long jump champion in 1980. He was an all-state football selection in 1980.

Greg Kragen enters his ninth NFL campaign as one of the NFL's campaign as one of the NFL's premier nose tackles. One of the key players on Denver's defense, last year he was fifth on the team with 107 total tackles (66 tackles, 41 assists) and set a personal high with five and one-half sacks. He also knocked down three passes and forced two fumbles. Kragen had a tremendous game at Philadelphia (9/20), netting 16 total tackles and a sack, and had the first two-sack game of his career vs. the Giants (11/15). Since Denver went to the 3-4 alignment in 1976, the team has had just two fulltime starting nose tackles, Rubin Carter (1976-86) and Kragen (1986-92). He had an outstanding season in 1991, and earned All-NFL (Sports Illustrated) and All-AFC (UPI) honors, as well as the Broncos' Bob Martin Award, which is voted on by the local media. He had 61 tackles, 31 assists, and a careerhigh 3.5 sacks during the 1991 season. Kragen had an excellent game vs. Kansas City (10/20) in which he registered eight tackles, four assists,

and a seven-vard sack. In the postseason he had nine tackles, one assist, and two passes defensed. He also had an interception in the AFC Championship game at Buffalo. In 1990, he led all of Denver's defensive linemen with 46 tackles and 35 assists, while also tallving two sacks. three forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, and five passes defensed. Kragen had a fine game at Buffalo (9/30) with nine tackles and two forced fumbles and at Kansas City (12/9) he totaled six tackles, four assists, and a fumble recovery that set up a Bronco touchdown. Kragen had a tremendous season in 1989 and was rewarded with his first Pro Bowl appearance. He started 14 regular season games and all three postseason contests at nose tackle, sitting out weeks five and six with a sprained knee. Kragen closed out the season with 43 tackles, 29 assists, a team high four fumble recoveries, two sacks, and two passes defensed. He was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance at Kansas City (11/12), a game in which he had six tackles, a sack, and a 17-yard fumble return for Denver's only touchdown. Kragen was named the team's defensive player of the game five times in 1988, including three times in a four week stretch. In Los Angeles against the Raiders (12/4) he was in on 13 tackles and had two sacks and at San Francisco (10/9) he had 10 first hits and five assists, and set up the Broncos' game-tying touchdown with a fumble recovery late in the fourth quarter. Kragen's season totals show a team-high 101 first hits. 39 assists, two and one-half sacks, four passes defensed, and a fumble recovery. He began the 1987 campaign as a back up at nose tackle but returned to a starting role before the Oct. 26 game at Minnesota and started all but one of the remaining games. He was named defensive MVP for his performance against the Raiders (11/22), in which he tallied five first hits, four assists, and an eight-vard sack, and he had a 14-tackle game two weeks later vs. New England (12/6). Kragen closed out the regular season with 48 first hits, high among defensive linemen, 30 assists, two sacks, and a fumble recovery. His postseason totals show 11 first hits, nine assists, and four quarterback harassments, earning defensive MVP honors for his performance vs. Cleveland in the AFC Championship Game (1/17). Kragen moved into the starting nose tackle spot in the third week of the 1986 season and started every game thereafter, including both playoff games and Super Bowl XXI. He finished the regular season with 60 total tackles and a team-leading three fumble recoveries. Kragen played as Rubin Carter's back-up at nose tackle and on special teams in 1985, recording two sacks that year, including one in his first game as a professional at the Los Angeles Rams (9/8). He joined the Broncos as a free agent in 1985 after being one of the club's last training camp cuts in 1984.

Greg Lewis closed out the 1992 season third among Denver rushers with 268 yards and four touchdowns on 73 carries, and also had four receptions for 30 yards, both career highs. Lewis had his two top rushing days of the season in starts vs. Dallas (12/6), gaining 59 vards, and at Buffalo (12/12), where he rushed for 47 yards and one TD. Tommy Maddox started four games and took snaps in three others in 1992 after joining the Broncos as the team's first round draft choice. Maddox started in place of John Elway in weeks 11 through 14 and also played at Washington (10/12), vs. the New York Giants, and in the season finale at Kansas City (12/27). For the season Maddox completed 66 of 121 passes, a .545 percentage, for 757 yards, with five touchdowns and nine interceptions. He rushed nine times for 20 yards. In his first pro action, at Washington, Maddox completed two of eight passes for 10 yards, with one interception. With his appearance against the Redskins, he became the youngest quarterback (21 years, two months) to throw a pass in the NFL since Elmer Angsman of the Chicago Cardinals in 1946. After Elway was injured in the second

quarter of the Giants game, Maddox came in to complete nine of 13 passes for 134 yards, leading Denver to 13 second-half points. The following week he made his first pro start, against the Raiders (11/22), and completed 18 of 26 passes for 207 yards, with two interceptions. He threw his first career touchdown pass the next week, at Seattle (11/27), connecting with Mark Jackson. In weeks 13 and 14 he alternated snaps with Shawn Moore. Against Dallas, Maddox threw interceptions on Denver's first two drives, but compensated by hitting Jackson and Vance Johnson with touchdown passes on the Broncos' next two possessions. Maddox completed 10 of 17 passes in the game for 104 yards, with three touchdowns and four interceptions. At Buffalo (12/12) he threw for 122 yards and a score, while completing 13 of 28 passes, and also rushed for 15 yards.

COLLEGE: Maddox in 1991 was a first team sophomore All-American (in his third year at UCLA) and led the Bruins to a 9-3 record and a victory in the John Hancock Bowl. In the Bruins' 12 games he completed 209 of 343 passes for 2,681 yards and 16 TDs. Selected first team All-Pac 10 (Football News) and a UPI All-American honorable mention. Maddox was the first player in Pac-10 history to have passed for at least 5,000 yards by the end of his sophomore year. He is the only quarterback in UCLA history to pass for at least 350 yards twice in a career, and is the only one to pass for over 330 yards three times. The only UCLA quarterback to have passed for over 2,500 yards twice, he was just the fourth Pac-10 QB to have cracked the 2,500 barrier more than once (John Elway did it three times at Stanford). In his 23 collegiate career, Maddox completed 391 of 670 passes (.584) for 5.363 yards and 33 TDs. As a redshirt freshman in 1990 he led the Pac-10 in total offense and earned first team Freshman All-American honors. On the season he passed for 2,682 yards, the highest freshman total in Pac-10 history and the second best mark in school annals.

PERSONAL: Tommy and his wife Jennifer make their offseason home in the Denver suburb of Aurora. A native of Shreveport, La., he was first team all-state, all-metro, and all-American (Parade and Super Prep magazines) at L.D. Bell HS in Hurst, Tex., where he was rated the top quarterback prospect in the nation. He was chosen the Southwest Texas High School offensive player of the year and was selected district and area most valuable player while serving as team captain in his senior year. An outstanding all-around prep athlete, Tommy lettered twice in football and three times each in basketball and baseball. In basketball he was first team all-state and all-metro and was named area offensive player of the year as a senior. In baseball, he compiled a record of 7-1 as a pitcher and batted .415 as a senior, twice garnering all-district and all-area honors as well. Tommy was a history major at UCLA.

Arthur Marshall was one of Denver's rookie stand-outs in 1992 and was named NFL All-Rookie (Football News, Pro Football Weekly/PFWA. College and Pro Football Newsweekly) for his performance. He ranked third in the AFC and sixth in the NFL with a 10.6 average on 33 punt returns and was fourth on the Broncos' receivers list, catching 26 passes for 493 yards for a team-leading average of 19.0. He gained 56 yards on 11 rushing attempts and returned eight kickoffs for 132 yards. Karl Mecklenburg in 1992 closed out his 10th NFL campaign ranked fourth on the team in total tackles with 116 (81 tackles, 35 assists), his fifth straight season with over 100 tackles. He was second in sacks with seven and one-half and is now fourth in team history with 69 sacks, three behind both Simon Fletcher and Barney Chavous, and four and one-half behind franchise leader Rulon Jones. Mecklenburg also posted three passes defensed and two forced fumbles. In the season opener against the Raiders (9/6) he sacked Jay Schroeder, forcing a fumble that was returned by Michael Brooks for Denver's first points of 1992. He earned his fifth career Pro Bowl berth and All-AFC honors (UPI) for another fine season in 1991. He started every game from his customary inside linebacker position and finished third on the team in both sacks (nine) and total tackles (130). In regular season play he had 73 tackles, 57 assists, three passes defensed, and a forced fumble. He had six sacks in the final four weeks of the year, including a two-sack performances vs. New England (12/1) and Phoenix (12/15). Mecklenburg turned in a big play in the season opener vs. Cincinnati (9/1), sacking Boomer Esiason and forcing a fumble to take the momentum out of the Bengals' comeback drive. The following week he had 19 total tackles and a sack against the Raiders (9/8). In Denver's two postseason games last year he recorded 12 tackles and four assists. Mecklenburg played most of the 1990 season opposite Simon Fletcher at outside linebacker, but moved back to his customary inside position late in the season. One of only five Bronco defenders to start in each game that year, Mecklenburg ranked third with 116 total tackles, and had five quarterback sacks. Mecklenburg scored a touchdown vs. Seattle (9/23) on a fumble return, returned another for 22 yards against the Chiefs (9/17), registered his first career safety against Green Bay (12/30) in the season finale, and blocked a PAT attempt vs. Cleveland (10/1). He earned his fourth Pro Bowl berth in five years in 1989, but was unable to play in the game because of a

knee injury sustained in Super Bowl XXIV. He was also named firstteam All-Pro (AP), first team All-AFC, and the AFC Defensive Player of the Month for November. Under Denver's new defensive system, Mecklenburg was allowed to concentrate on his inside linebacker position, and he finished the regular season as the Broncos' leader in total tackles with 143. (83 first hits and 60 assists). Mecklenburg also recorded 7.5 sacks, and had four fumble recoveries, three passes defensed, and two forced fumbles. He had 10 or more total tackles in nine games, including a high of 15 vs. San Diego (10/8), and returned a fumble for 23 yards and his first touchdown as a pro at Phoenix (12/16). Mecklenburg started 15 games that year, missing the season opener because of a knee injury. He started the first three games of the 1988 season but fractured his right thumb on the last play of the contest at Kansas City (9/18), a game in which he posted an astounding total 16 first hits and was named Denver's defensive and overall MVP. Mecklenburg did not suit up the following week and saw only limited action at San Diego (10/2), but returned to form over the next three weeks, posting 42 total tackles and a sack in that period. He reinjured the thumb at Pittsburgh (10/23) however, and spent the next six weeks on injured reserve. Mecklenburg returned to the active roster for the final two weeks of the season and closed out the season with two 12-tackle performances. His season totals show 78 first hits, 24 assists, and a pass defensed. Additionally, he had one-and-a-half sacks. Mecklenburg earned his third straight starting berth in the NFL Pro Bowl in 1987 and was voted by teammates Denver's Most Valuable Defensive Player. He was further honored as All-NFL (NEA, AP 2ndteam) and All-AFC (UPI, Pro Football Weekly). Mecklenburg was named the Broncos' most valuable defensive player of the game four times in the 1987 campaign, and was selected as the AFC defensive player of the week following his performance vs. New England (12/6), netting two interceptions, six first hits, three assists, and two quarterback harassments. He closed out the season with totals of 81 first hits, 16 assists, three interceptions, two forced fumbles, and seven sacks, tying Rulon Jones for the team lead in sacks. Through the 1985-87 seasons Mecklenburg and Jones combined for 60 sacks. He had 19 total tackles in the postseason, including one-and-a-half sacks in Super Bowl XXII (1/31). Mecklenburg was named AFC Player of the Year by the Football News in 1986, in addition to being honored as All-NFL (AP, Sports Illustrated, NEA, Pro Football Writers of America, The Sporting News, Pro Football Weekly) and All-AFC (UPI, Pro Football Weekly, Football News). In 1986 he recorded 9.5 sacks, 83 first hits, and 127 total tackles, with all figures ranking second on the team. Mecklenburg also posted three passes defensed, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery, and had two games with 2.5 sacks, at the Raiders (11/2), and vs. New England (9/28). Mecklenburg had 30 total tackles during the postseason, including a team-high 13 in Super Bowl XXI. Mecklenburg was one of the NFL's biggest success stories in 1985, and his superb play resulted in his being named a starter in the Pro Bowl, where he led the AFC with 11 tackles. He did not become a fulltime starter until the 10th week of the campaign but finished with a Bronco record 13 quarterback sacks, (broken by Rulon Jones in 1986). Mecklenburg had two team record four-sack games (vs. New Orleans on 9/15 and at Pittsburgh on 12/1), earning All-NFL (AP, Sports Illustrated, The Football News, Pro Football Writers of America, Newspaper Enterprise Association, and College and Pro Football Newsweekly-second team), and All-AFC (UPI) honors for his efforts. His great versatility enabled the coaching staff to move him around considerably in the Denver defense, and Mecklenburg played seven positions during a campaign in which he also led the team in forced fumbles (five) while posting 65 total tackles and defensing four passes. He displayed his versatility in that Pittsburgh game, lining up at every defensive position except cornerback and safety. Mecklenburg in 1984 made an immediate impact in his conversion to linebacker from defensive end during a campaign that saw him record seven sacks, high among linebackers, and two interceptions for a club leading 105 vards. Mecklenburg was used largely on third down and passing down situations in 1984, but also saw some action as a defensive end. He played in all 16 games in 1983, posting 24 tackles and two sacks after joining the Broncos as their 12th round draft pick.

COLLEGE: Karl earned second team All-Big Ten Honors (AP and UPI) as a senior at Minnesota. He started his college career at Augustana College (South Dakota), but transferred to Minnesota in

1980, sitting out that season as a redshirt. Shawn Moore saw action at quarterback in three games, including the contests vs. Dallas (12/6) and at Buffalo (12/12) when he alternated snaps with Tommy Maddox. Reggie Rivers emerged as one of Denver's key offensive performers in 1992. He moved into the starting fullback position midway through the season and ended the campaign second on the team in rushing with 282 yards and three touchdowns on 74 carries. 

Derek Russell played in 12 games with Denver in 1992, starting seven, but dislocated his left thumb at Seattle (11/30) and spent the final four weeks of the campaign on injured reserve. Russell caught 12 passes for 140 yards last year and also returned three kickoffs for a 23.7-yard average. His career stats show 33 receptions for 457 yards and a score and an average of 19.1 on 10 kickoff returns. Steve Sewell spent the entire 1992 campaign on injured reserve after breaking his left ankle in training camp. He had perhaps his best season as a pro in 1991. He tied his career high and was second on the team with 38 receptions, rushed for 211 yards and two TDs, and completed a 24-vard pass to John Elway on opening day. Sewell gained 40 yards rushing against Phoenix (12/15), including an eight-yard TD run and a 19-yard scamper that set up the winning touchdown. He had a run of 26 yards vs. New England (12/1) that tied his longest ever. Sewell set a new career standard with 10 receptions at Houston (10/6), and set up a Denver field goal with a 60-yard reception at Cleveland (12/8). Sewell had eight rushing attempts for 51 yards in the postseason and also caught 10 passes for 106 yards. In the Divisional Playoff Game victory over Houston (1/4) he gained 48 yards on just four carries, including a 19-yard run, and caught three passes for 28 yards. Sewell was dynamic in the AFC Championship Game (1/12), catching seven passes for 78 yards. In seven seasons with the Broncos Sewell has rushed for 917 yards and two scores. He is 12th in team history with 187 receptions. 20 behind #10 Gerald Willhite, and is 11th with 2,354 reception yards. He had a good season in 1990, although he spent four weeks on injured reserve after dislocating a shoulder while lifting weights. He closed out the season with 26 receptions for 268 yards and 17 carries for 46 yards and three touchdowns. He picked up a first down by reception 17 times that season. Sewell's best receiving day came vs. Seattle (9/23) when he had six catches for 53 yards, and in his best rushing performance of the year he rushed for 21 yards and a score on four carries at Indianapolis (10/21). In 1989 he led all NFL running backs for the second straight year in average per catch, with a mark of 16.6. He finished third on the team with 25 receptions, good for 416 yards and three scores, and he picked up a first down on 19 of his catches. Sewell rushed just seven times for 44 yards that year, but picked up three first downs on the ground. He had five catches for 84 yards at Kansas City (11/12), including a 30-yard reception off of a shovel pass that set up the winning field goal. He had three receptions for 72 yards vs. Pittsburgh (11/5), including one for 56 yards. Sewell caught five passes for 77 yards in postseason play, with three for 55 in the AFC Championship Game vs. Cleveland (1/14). He closed out the 1988 season fourth on the team in both rushing and receiving. He gained 135 yards on 32 rushing attempts, scoring once, and set career highs with 38 receptions for 507 yards and five TDs. Sewell was named Denver's offensive player of the game vs. Seattle (9/4) after catching five pass for 81 yards and rushing for 16 yards. He was named the Broncos' overall player of the game at Indianapolis (10/31) after posting six receptions for 82 yards and two scores, including a 48-yard TD reception, and rushing once for 25 yards. Sewell also had a 68-yard TD catch vs. Atlanta (10/16). He had a good season in 1987 despite sitting out the final five regular season games on injured reserve with a fractured jaw. For the season he rushed 19 times for 83 yards and two scores and caught 13 passes for 209 and a TD. Sewell

caught a 72-yard touchdown pass in the season opener vs. Seattle (9/13) and the following week against Green Bay (9/20) scored on a two-yard run to send the game into overtime. He had his best game of the season vs. Chicago (11/16), tying his career high of five receptions for 78 yards and scoring the winning touchdown on a fouryard run. Sewell was injured the following week against the Raiders (11/22) and didn't return to the active roster until the playoffs. In postseason action he rushed seven times for seven yards, scoring a TD in the AFC Championship Game (1/17), and caught eight passes for 92 yards, including four for 41 yards in Super Bowl XXII (1/31). He also completed a 23-yard pass to John Elway in the game. In 1986 Sewell rebounded from a midseason injury to close the season on a high note for Denver. He threw a 23-yard touchdown pass to John Elway in the season opener against the Raiders (9/7), and when Vance Johnson was placed on injured reserve after that contest, Sewell played almost exclusively at wide receiver for the next five weeks. In week three at Philadelphia (9/21) he caught five passes for 87 yards, including one for 40 yards, all personal career highs. Sewell went down with a shoulder injury vs. San Diego (11/9) and spent the next five weeks on injured reserve. He returned to the active roster to play in the regular season finale at Seattle (12/20), and closed out the campaign with 23 carries for 123 yards and one score, and 23 receptions for 294 yards and a touchdown. He played in all three postseason contests, rushing six times for 13 yards and catching eight passes for 100 yards, including a key 22-yard pass from Elway that moved the team to midfield on the Broncos' 98-yard scoring drive in the AFC Championship Game at Cleveland (1/11). He had a fine debut as Denver's first-round draft choice in 1985, finishing third on the team in rushing despite not having an attempt until the seventh game of the year. He finished with 82 carries for 275 yards and four touchdowns, including two at Pittsburgh (12/1). Sewell had his best day at Kansas City (10/27), gaining 64 yards on 20 carries. He performed well coming out of the backfield as a receiver as well, snaring 24 passes for 224 yards and one score, a 54-yard pass from Gary Kubiak at San Diego (11/3). Sewell had his best day receiving in the season finale at Seattle (12/20), catching five passes for 62 yards. He also returned one kickoff for 29 yards that year. Bronco coaches are impressed with his overall athletic ability, great attitude, and dedication.

COLLEGE: Steve was the most versatile athlete on the Oklahoma squad, starting all but a few games in his four years there. He earned second-team All-Big Eight honors as a senior, rushing for 577 yards and gaining 315 yards on receptions, while scoring seven touchdowns. Steve's career statistics show 170 carries for 1,113 yards (a 6.5 average), 33 receptions for 550 yards, and 14 touchdowns. Sewell was voted the Don Key Award, the highest honor a Sooner player can receive. The award is given to the player who annually exhibits all the positive physical, mental, and academic traits of college football. He closed out his college football career with an appearance in the Orange Bowl. Steve also ran track as a sophomore and was selected Academic All-Big Eight in 1982.

Shannon Sharpe led all Denver receivers in 1992 with a career-high 53 receptions for 640 yards and two touchdowns. Shannon and his brother Sterling of the Green Bay Packers became the only brother combination in NFL history to lead their respective teams in receiving in the same season. Sharpe had two 100-yard receiving games last year, catching seven passes for 109 yards at Buffalo (12/12) and nine for a career-high 118 yards vs. Kansas City (10/4). He also had nine receptions at Washington (10/12) and had seven in the season finale at Kansas City (12/27). Sharpe, who was in the starting line-up 12 times in 1992, also set a new career high with a 55-yard reception at Cleveland (9/27). Sharpe was converted from wide receiver to H-back in 1991 and had a fine season, catching 22 passes for 322 yards and a touchdown and also gaining 15 yards on a reverse. He made half of his receptions in the final three weeks of the campaign, with 11 catches for 159 yards. Sharpe established new career highs at Cleveland (12/8) with four receptions for 59 yards, and had four catches the following week vs. Phoenix (12/15). On special teams he posted a team-high 12 tackles, with five assists and two knockdown blocks. Sharpe appeared in Denver's starting line-up nine times during the regular season. He closed out the postseason with six catches for 60 yards, with three for 20 against Houston (1/4) and three for 40 at Buffalo in the AFC Championship Game (1/12). Denver's seventh round draft choice in 1990, Sharpe saw more playing time as the season progressed and closed out the year with seven receptions for 99 yards and a score. He had his top receiving game at Kansas City (12/9) with three catches for 41 yards and his first professional touchdown. Sharpe was also one of the Broncos' top special teams performers, netting 16 total tackles, six knockdown blocks, and a forced fumble.

COLLEGE: Sharpe had a tremendous career at Savannah State College, where he was a three-time All-American, All-Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, and all-state selection, as well as the three-time conference offensive player of the year. Sharpe closed out his college play with 192 receptions for 3,744 yards, a 19.5 average, and 40 touchdowns. He ended his career with appearances in the East-West Shrine and Blue-Gray all-star games. Sharpe set school records for most consecutive games with a reception (39), with a touchdown (14), and for most games with over 100 yards receiving (17). As a senior he caught 61 passes for 1,312 yards and 18 TDs, and had three games with more than 200 yards receiving and one game with four touchdown catches. Sharpe was a criminal justice major.

PERSONAL: Shannon is single with a daughter, Shannen Kaley (4/3/93), and makes his home in Glenville, GA., where he attended Glennville HS and was all-county, all-region, and all-area in football. In addition to four letters in football, he lettered three times in basketball and four times in track, setting a Georgia state class A record in the triple jump (48-3) as a junior, and breaking that mark as a senior (49-5). He won the regional triple jump title three straight years and the regional discus throwing title twice. Shannon was also a two-time all-area selection in basketball, and he scored over 1,000 points in three seasons, and averaged 30 points and 15 rebounds as a senior. He once scored 52 points in a game and once grabbed 27 rebounds in a game. His brother Sterling was an All-American at South Carolina and has earned All-NFL status in both of his first two NFL seasons with the Green Bay Packers. Shannon has several cousins who played college football, and he lists his hobbies as fishing, basketball, weight lifting, and his two Rottweilers, Kane and Killian.

Dennis Smith in 1993 will become one of only six players, along with teammate Ken Lanier, to play in a 13th season with the Denver Broncos. Last season Smith was named by teammates as the Broncos' most inspirational player and became the first Denver player ever nominated a second time for the Ed Block Memorial Award For Courage. One of the NFL's hardest hitters, Smith started in every game last season and registered a career-high 120 total tackles (68 tackles, 52 assists), a mark that boosted his career tackle total to 1,033. For the second straight season Smith tied for the team lead in interceptions with four, while also netting 12 passes defensed, two fumble recoveries, and a blocked field goal. Smith was named the Broncos defensive most valuable player for his performance against the Raiders on opening day (9/6), posting 17 total tackles and breaking up two passes. Smith is fifth in team history with 27 interceptions and is 10th in both games played (158) and started (144). He had a tremendous season in 1991 and was rewarded with his third straight. and fifth career, Pro Bowl appearance and the Broncos' Most Valuable Defensive Player award. He played in every game for the first time since his rookie season and delivered a steady barrage of thundering hits on opponents throughout the campaign. Smith tied for the team lead with a career-high five interceptions and was fourth on the defense with 110 total tackles. In addition, he had 12 passes defensed. a forced fumble, and a fumble recovery, and was third on the team in the postseason with 18 total tackles. Against the Patriots (12/1) Smith picked off two passes, recovered a fumble, and broke up three passes, and he was Denver's defensive player of the game vs. Seattle (9/15). In 1990 he earned his fourth Pro Bowl berth and started all 15 games in which he played, sitting out the week three game vs. Seattle (9/23) with a sprained ankle. He finished fourth on the team with 110 total tackles and led the squad with eight passes defensed. Smith also posted one interception, two fumble recoveries, and a forced fumble. He had a big part in Denver's victory over San Diego (12/16) that ended a six game losing streak when he racked up nine tackles and three assists, and broke up two passes. He earned his third Pro Bowl berth after a dynamic 1989 campaign. He was voted by teammates as Denver's defensive most valuable player and earned All-NFL (AP second team) and All-AFC (Pro Football Weekly, UPIsecond team) honors, and was the AFC Defensive Player of the Month for October. He started all 14 regular season games in which he played, sitting out against the Raiders (12/3) with a groin injury and at Phoenix (12/16) with a pinched nerve in his neck. In regular season play he led the team with six forced fumbles and had 47 first hits, 35 assists, two interceptions, 11 passes defensed, three fumble recoveries, and a blocked field goal. Smith set up a Denver score with one of two forced fumbles at Washington (11/20) and had a tremendous game at Seattle (10/22) with seven first hits, seven assists, an interception that set up the winning field goal, two passes defensed, a forced fumble. and a fumble recovery. He started all three postseason games and

had two interceptions in the AFC Championship Game vs. Cleveland (1/14). Smith started in 11 games in 1988 but spent four weeks on injured reserve with a hamstring injury. He was named Denver's defensive player of the game in the season opener vs. Seattle (9/4), when he posted 10 first hits and two assists. Smith earned overall player of the game honors in Los Angeles against the Raiders (12/4) after registering 10 total tackles and a fumble recovery. Smith's 1988 season totals show 83 first hits, 23 assists, one sack three passes defensed, two forced fumbles, and two fumble recoveries. He had a difficult 1987 campaign. playing in just six games and spending seven weeks on injured reserve. He was named Denver's defensive MVP of the game for his performance in the season opener vs. Seattle (9/13) where he posted six first hits and an assist, returned an interception for 15 yards. and forced and recovered a fumble while playing with a cast on his hand to protect a broken finger suffered in the preseason. He had surgery on the finger following the next week's game against the Packers (9/20), in which he registered 10 total tackles and a fumble recovery. Smith posted his second interception of the season vs. Detroit (11/1) but sat out the next week with a sprained knee. He broke his right forearm early in the contest against the Raiders (11/22) and did not play again until the AFC Championship Game (1/17). Against Cleveland he had seven first hits and two assists, and followed that up with a 13tackle performance in Super Bowl XXII (1/31). He earned his second straight Pro Bowl appearance in 1986, this time as a starter, and was named All-AFC (Pro Football Weekly) and honorable mention All-NFL (AP). He started every game in which he played, missing the games vs. New England (9/28) and at San Diego (10/12) with a groin pull. Smith led the team with 12 passes defensed and posted 88 total tackles, including 66 first hits, two forced fumbles, one fumble recovery, a nineyard sack, and an interception, that vs. Seattle (10/26). Smith broke a bone in his shoulder in the 1986 season opener vs. the Raiders (9/7) but turned in a solid performance in the next two games despite the injury. He did not play in the first playoff game but returned to start both the AFC Championship Game and Super Bowl XXI, finishing postseason play with 12 first hits and three assists. Smith made his first Pro Bowl appearance in 1985 and was named All-NFL (College and Pro Football Newsweekly) and All-AFC (UPI-2nd team) for his efforts. despite missing three games due to injuries. His three interceptions for the year all came against the Los Angeles Raiders (12/8), and he was second on the team with 17 passes defensed. Smith had four quarterback sacks that year and he blocked two field goals vs. San Diego (11/17), the second of which came in overtime and was returned for a game-winning touchdown by Louis Wright. Smith was hampered early in the year by a sprained shoulder suffered in the season opener against the Los Angeles Rams (9/8), sitting out in weeks two and three. He also missed the game at San Diego (11/3) with a pulled thigh muscle. Smith had another fine season as Denver's starting strong safety in 1984, and was named All-NFL (Pro Football Weekly, College and Pro Football Newsweekly) and All-AFC (Pro Football Weekly, UPI-2nd team). Smith started all 15 games in which he played, sitting out the contest against Seattle (11/25) with a pinched nerve in his left shoulder, and he recorded three interceptions and nine passes defensed to go along with his 92 tackles and three sacks. Smith turned in one of the biggest plays of that season against New England (11/4) when he scooped up a Mosi Tatupu fumble and raced 64 yards for the winning score with less than two minutes remaining, his first touchdown as a professional. In 1983 Smith recorded professional highs of four interceptions, 114 tackles, and five quarterback sacks despite missing two games with a knee sprain. Smith led all club defensive backs in tackles with 65 in 1982 and as a rookie accounted for three turnovers to go along with 45 tackles. Dennis started the last three games of the 1981 campaign at right cornerback, and Bronco coaches have utilized him occasionally as a wide receiver in obvious long passing situations because of his great jumping ability. He made his first pro interception at Chicago in 1981 and returned it 65 yards, the longest

interception return by a Bronco in the past six years. He took over as Denver's strong safety in 1982 and started eight of the nine contests in that strike-shortened campaign. Bronco coaches feel that Smith has the ability to dominate at strong safety and are looking forward to an outstanding performance from him again in 1991.

COLLEGE: Dennis earned four letters in football and three more in track at Southern California, making several All-America teams following his senior season. His four-year totals included 205 tackles and 16 pass interceptions, including a team high of seven in 1978. Smith played in the Rose Bowl following the 1978 and 1979 seasons and in the Bluebonnet Bowl after the 1977 campaign. He demonstrated his athletic prowess as a seven-foot high jumper for the Trojan track team.

PERSONAL: Dennis and his wife, Andree, have two children, a daughter, Tiffany Diamond (1/26/84), and a son, Armani Joseph (6/1/87), and the family makes its home in Hollywood, Calif. Basketball and playing piano are Dennis' favorite hobbies. He works in the offseason with his own corporation with his father-in law (contractor), as a partnership. Smith lettered twice as a wide receiver and defensive back at Santa Monica HS, also earning three prep letters in track and one more in basketball.

David Treadwell is the most accurate field goal kicker in Denver Broncos' history with a percentage of .780 and is third among all-time Denver scorers with 429 points. In his four-year career he has converted 99 of 127 field goal attempts and 132 of 136 extra points, and he holds four of the top 10 single-season field goal percentages in team annals. He needs to make one more field goal, the 100th of his career, to qualify for ranking among the all-time leaders in the NFL. Treadwell made 20 of 24 field goal attempts in 1992 and his FG percentage of .833 ranked second in the AFC and third in the NFL. and stands as the third-highest mark in team history. He also made all 28 extra point attempts and tied for eighth in the AFC with 88 total points. He accounted for all of Denver's points in a 12-0 victory at Cleveland (9/27) and comes into 1993 with a streak of six consecutive field goals made. Treadwell scored over 100 points for a third straight season in 1991 and his total of 112 ranked third in the AFC and sixth in the NFL. He tied a Denver record with 27 field goals, equaling his 1989 mark and that of Gene Mingo in 1962, and his overall field goal percentage of .750 was sixth highest in the conference. He had four field goals against Kansas City (10/20), scoring most of the Broncos' points in a 19-16 victory and the next week accounted for all of Denver's scoring in a 9-6 win at New England (10/27). In the AFC Divisional Playoff Game vs. Houston (1/4) Treadwell kicked the winning field goal with 20 seconds left in the game. He also had a 49yard field goal in the game, a new Bronco postseason record. He ranked third in the AFC and sixth in the NFL with 109 points in 1990. He was successful on 34 of 36 PAT attempts and on 25 of 34 field goal attempts. Treadwell kicked last-second, game-winning field goals in both weeks two and three, and kicked field goals of 49 yards against San Diego (12/16) and Seattle (12/23). Treadwell earned a Pro Bowl berth in 1989, his first professional season, after leading the AFC in scoring with 120 points, the third highest total in team history. He was also named All-AFC (UPI, Pro Football Weekly, Football News) and NFL All Rookie (Football News), and was selected as Denver's special teams Most Valuable Player by his teammates. Treadwell converted a team record-tying 27 of 33 field goals and his .818 percentage led the conference and was second highest in the NFL, and he converted 39 of 40 extra point attempts, missing his final try of the regular season. His longest field goals of the year were of 46 yards, coming at Buffalo (9/18) and vs. San Diego (10/8). He was successful on his first 11 field goals of the season before missing a 54-vard effort against San Diego (10/8), and converted 25 of 26 field goals of 41 vards or less. Treadwell kicked four field goals at Buffalo and three in three other contests. He scored 10 or more points in seven games and had two game-winning field goals, including one in overtime at Seattle (10/22). In postseason play Treadwell scored 23 points, converting all eight extra point tries and five of six field goal attempts. He made three of four field goal attempts in the AFC Championship Game vs. Cleveland (1/14), missing a 54-yard attempt. Treadwell attended Denver's training camp in 1988 but did not make the final roster, and subsequently signed with Phoenix. He was obtained by the Broncos via trade on May 30, 1989.

COLLEGE: Treadwell was a first-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference selection and a consensus first-team All-American as a senior at Clemson University. Additionally, he earned Academic All-ACC and All-America honors as an electrical engineering major. Treadwell closed out his

college career with an appearance in the Hula Bowl.

PERSONAL: David and his wife Kimberly make their home in Denver. Born in Columbia, S.C., he lettered three times and was an all-city selection in soccer at the Bolles School in Jacksonville, Fla. David did not play football in high school. He is involved with a Make A Wish Foundation program called "Kicks For Kids." He is in his second year at the University of Denver's College of Law. A junior executive with Dow Chemical Co. in the 1990 offseason, David enjoys music, cars, golf, and cycling.

Kenny Walker started 15 games in 1992 at right defensive end, sitting out the contest vs. Houston (10/18) because of Denver's defensive scheme against the Oilers' run-and-shoot offense. Walker's season totals show 21 tackles, 23 assists, two fumble recoveries, one and onehalf sacks, and a pass defensed. In the 1992 offseason Kenny was honored with the prestigious Most Courageous Athlete Award by the Philadelphia Sportwriters' Association and he testified before Congress on behalf of the National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders. David Wyman came to the Broncos late in the 1993 offseason as an unrestricted free agent from the Seattle Seahawks. Wyman is in his seventh season as a pro, and is coming off a productive 1992 season. He started the first 11 games at middle linebacker for the Seahawks before inujuring an arch while making a goal line tackle against Kansas City (11/22). The foot injury caused him to miss the last five games of Seattle's season. Wyman finished the 1993 season with 83 tackles, which led the team at the time of his injury. He was a second round draft choice of the Seahawks in 1987. He played in four games with no starts as a rookie. Seattle had reached an agreement to trade Wyman to San Francisco in November of 1987, but a shoulder injury caused him to fail the 49er's team physical, which voided the trade. 

Melvin Bonner was one of the best big play receivers in college football, posting regular season career totals of 92 receptions for 1,984 yards, a 21.6 average, and 19 touchdowns. His bowl game stats show seven catches for 198 yards (28.3) and two TDs, bringing his overall figures to 99 receptions for 2,182 yards (22.0) and 21 scores. Bonner had a fine senior year in 1992, catching 39 passes for 818 yards, a 21.0 average, and 11 touchdowns. He was an All-

Southwest Athletic Conference first team selection as a senior for the Bears. His 92 receptions and 1,984 receiving yards both rank third on Baylor's all-time list. As a senior he was an All-American second team choice (The Poor Man's Guide to the NFL Draft) and an all-Southwest Conference first team pick as well, leading the Bears with 39 catches for 818 yards (21.0) and 11 TDs. Bonner caught two passes for 75 yards and a 33-yard score vs. Colorado. His career long reception of 80 yards came against Georgia Tech, as he had five receptions for 174 yards in that contest. He tied the school record with three TD catches vs. Utah State, and had 10 receptions, three for TDs, against Texas Christian. He set a John Hancock Bowl record with 166 yards on five catches, scoring on receptions of 61 and 66 yards in that game against Arizona State. In 1991 Bonner was all-SWC first team (Football News, Dallas Morning News, Austin American-Statesman), leading the Bears with 34 catches for 836 yards (24.6) and four TDs. As a junior he hauled in a 74-yard scoring bomb vs. Colorado, and added a 75-yard TD catch against Missouri. In 1990 he caught 11 passes for 227 yards (25.2) and four TDs, and in 1989 he was a reserve redshirted as a freshman in 1988. A native of Hempstead, Texas, Bonner was an all-district 24-3A first team pick as a receiver and second team choice as a free safety at Van Vleck (Tex.) HS. He was a two-time All-Greater Houston selection and member of the Nifty 50 Squad (Houston Chronicle), lettering twice in football, three times in basketball, and four times in track. He also earned all-district and all-state hoop honors, and was named male track athlete of the year. A radio/television major at Baylor, Melvin's brother, Rodney, was a teammate at Van Vleck HS and at Baylor (1988).

Jason Elam was a superb combination kicker in college, holding virtually every school and conference scoring record at the University of Hawaii. He finished his career with 77 field goals, just three shy of Jeff Jaeger's NCAA record of 80. Elam holds the Western Athletic Conference scoring record with 395 points, and made 30 of 43 field goal attempts of 40 yards or more. Elam had a career field goal percentage of 79.0, connecting on 79 of 100 attempts, with

his longest field goal being a 56-yarder, and he made 157 of his 160 conversion attempts for the Rainbows. His career punting figures

show 84 punts for a 43.5 average. In 1992 Elam was an All-American first team choice (Kodak, and The Poor Man's Guide to the NFL Draft) and an all-WAC first team pick as well, making 16 of 25 field goals and 44 extra point tries for 92 points. He punted 49 times for a 44.5 average. He had his career-longest punt of 78 yards in the Rainbows' 6-3 win over the Air Force Academy. In the Hawaii win over Texas-El Paso Elam kicked a 55-yard field goal, had a 68-yard punt, and completed a pass for 22 yards on a fake punt. In 1991 Elam was the team most valuable player, in addition to being a scholar-athlete pick for the second time and academic all-WAC for the third straight season. He scored 85 points as a junior on 19 of 24 field goals and 28 of 30 conversions, punting for a 42.1 average as well. He kicked four field goals vs. Wyoming, including a season-long 55-yarder. In 1990 Elam was having a banner campaign until suffering a right groin pull vs. Utah, missing the rest of the season and being granted a medical redshirt. He made all five of his field goal attempts in 1990. Rondell Jones in 1992 was a first team All-American and All-Atlantic Coast Conference selection, establishing himself as one of the country's top safeties. A durable athlete who started 38 regular season games at North Carolina, Jones had four-year totals of 350 tackles, including 212 solo and 138 assists, with three pass interceptions and 19 passes broken up for the Tar Heels. In 1992 Jones was first team All-American and all-Atlantic Coast Conference

(The Poor Man's Guide to the NFL Draft), leading the team with a careerhigh 110 tackles (63 solos), also causing two fumbles and deflecting six passes for the Tar Heels. He had 14 tackles and forced a fumble vs. Florida State. In 1991 Jones was an all-ACC second team pick, starting 10 games at free safety and posting 88 tackles (51 solos), also deflecting five passes. In 1990 he was named the Tar Heels' outstanding defensive back, starting every game and finishing with 80 tackles (50 solos). Against Georgia Tech Jones had 14 tackles and a pass interception, and he delivered a career-high 19 tackles vs. Clemson. In 1989 Jones started six games and had 72 tackles (48 solos), recovering three fumbles and intercepting two passes for the Tar Heels, A native of Sunderland, Md., Jones was a two-time all-county selection as a defensive back and all-conference first team on both offense and defense in his senior year at Northern (Sunderland) HS. He played tailback, safety, wide receiver, defensive end, and quarterback on the prep level, earning county MVP and Washington Post allmetro second team honors. In his final season Jones had 12 rushing TDs, five interceptions, nine quarterback sacks, and three blocked kicks. Overall, he lettered three times in football and track and twice in basketball. An all-county basketball player, Jones also was selected the Top Field Events performer three consecutive years. Rondell was an industrial relations major at North Carolina.

TONY KIMBROUGH WR 6-2, 192 DOB: Sept. 17, 1970 Draft Choice #7b



Tony Kimbrough comes to the Broncos after a great senior season in which he caught 35 passes for 900 yards, a 25.7 average, and six touchdowns for Jackson State. Kimbrough's career statistics show 46 receptions for 1,178 yards, a 25.6 average, and eight scores. His longest catch in college was a sensational one-handed 75-yarder over Tennessee State as a senior for the Tigers. In 1992 Kimbrough was a third team All-American and all-Southwestern

Athletic Conference selection by The NFL Draft Report. He had four 100-yard games as a senior, including a four-reception, 158-yard game vs. South Carolina State. In 1991 Kimbrough played in seven games, catching two passes for 80 yards, and in 1990 he established himself as a dangerous big-play threat despite limited action. He played in eight games but had seven catches for 146 yards (20.9 average) and one TD. Kimbrough had a 68-yard reception and scored on a 22-yard catch against Southern University. In 1989 he caught two passes for 52 yards and one TD in 1989, and was a redshirt freshman in 1988. A native of Weir, Miss., Kimbrough was an all-state selection as a wide receiver during his final two years at Weir (Miss.) HS. Born Antonius Kimbrough, Tony was a criminal justice major at Jackson State.

GLYN MILBURN RB 5-8, 177 DOB: Feb. 19, 1971 Draft Choice #2

Glyn Milburn was one of the most exciting open field runners in college football during a college career in which he accounted for 6,049 all-purpose yards during three years at Stanford. He is an extremely fast and explosive player who was one of the most dangerous and versatile in college football during the last three years. An excellent receiver, Milburn also is an exceptional punt returner who took three punts all the way for touchdowns in 1992. His career rushing

yards of 2,263 rank third in Cardinal history, and he added 1,558 reception yards, 1,186 on kickoff returns, and 1,042 returning punts, scoring 24 touchdowns in those three years. He enrolled at Oklahoma and played there in 1988 before transferring to Stanford, where he was a redshirt transfer in 1989. His total college stats, including his season at Oklahoma, are 2,387 rushing yards, 1,512 receiving, 1,303 on kickoff returns, and 1,161 on punt returns, and 25 TDs. As a senior he rushed for a career-high 851 yards (a 4.8 average and eight touchdowns), caught 37 passes for 405 yards (an 11.0 average and two TDs), returned 15 kickoffs for 316 (a 21.1 mark), and had a remarkable 17.3 punt return average (34 returns for 589 yards and three TDs, his longest a 79-yarder vs. Oregon State. Milburn in 1992 was a first team All-American (Associated Press and The Poor Man's Guide to the NFL Draft) and the first player in Stanford history to return three punts for TDs in one season, just one short of the NCAA record. He holds the school record with four career punt return TDs. He had numerous singlegame highlights in 1992, including 199 rushing yards vs. Notre Dame, a 75-yard punt return TD vs. UCLA, a 79-yard punt return against Oregon State, and a 76-yard punt return TD in the "Big Game" vs. California. Milburn rushed for 111 yards and two TDs against Northwestern and scored three TDs against Washington State. In 1991 he was an All-Pac 10 second team choice, finishing third in the league in all-purpose rushing, averaging 137.6 yards per game. He gained 654 yards with three TDs on 143 carries (4.6 average) and was second on the team with 41 receptions for 467 yards (11.4) and three scores. He averaged 9.3 yards on 20 punt returns and 23.0 on 12 kickoff returns as a

junior, against Colorado gaining 106 yards on nine carries and 50 yards on seven catches. His 92-vard reception vs. Washington State was the second longest in school history. Against Southern Cal as a junior he rushed for 67 yards and added 54 more on three receptions. In 1990 Milburn was an All-American third team pick (The Poor Man's Guide). also earning honorable mention from Football News, Associated Press, and UPI. He added All-Pac 10 first team honors and was an academic All-Pac 10 choice as well. Milburn in 1990 set a school record with 2,222 all-purpose yards, second highest figure in conference history, ranking behind Marcus Allen's 2,559 yards in 1981. He led the team with 729 yards and two TDs on 152 carries (4.8 average), led the Cardinal with 64 receptions for 632 yards (9.9 average) and two scores, and returned 24 kickoffs for 594 yards (24.8 average), the third best total in Cardinal history. He added 267 yards with a TD on 24 punt returns (11.1 average). Among his almost innumerable highlights was his performance vs. San Jose State in which he had eight catches for 163 yards and a score, 12 carries for 37 yards, and 316 all-purpose vards. Milburn had 299 all-purpose yards vs. Washington, including a 57-yard punt return TD, and he was named the Pac-10 offensive player of the week for his game against Cal, when he ran for a careerhigh 196 yards with a 53-yard TD on 24 attempts, 66 yards on nine catches, and 123 yards on four kickoff returns. His 196 yard effort vs. the Golden Bears was the eighth highest game total in school history. In 1989 Milburn transferred from Oklahoma and was a redshirt that season. In 1988 at Oklahoma he was named to The Sporting News' freshman honor roll and was named the school's top freshman scholarathlete, with a 3.8 grade point average. Milburn gained 124 yards with a TD on only eight tries, as his 15.5 average was the best on the team. He also returned 22 punts for 119 yards (5.4 average) and six kickoffs for 117 yards (19.5). He scored one TD at Oklahoma, recovering a fumble in the end zone vs. Kansas. A native of Santa Monica, Calif., Milburn was a prep All-American selection by Super Prep magazine, earning second team honors from USA Today at Santa Monica HS, in addition to being named a member of the Long Beach Press Telegram's "Best of the West" team. He was a "Western Top 100" pick by the Tacoma Morning News Tribune, was all-state first team by California Football magazine, and was cited as Super Prep Far West offensive player of the year, Ocean League player of the year, West Side back of the year, California offensive player of the year (Los Angeles Times). Milburn was the Southern Conference co-player of the year, and an All-CIF first team pick. National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame scholar-athlete award winner, as a senior running for 2,718 yards in 1987, setting a state prep season record. He set another record with 38 rushing TDs, adding a score on a punt return, leading the state in scoring that year with 234 points. JEFF ROBINSON DE 6-4, 265 DOB: Feb. 2, 1970 Draft Choice #4



Jeff Robinson was an All-American first team selection (Kodak, Walter Camp, Associated Press and The Poor Man's Guide to the NFL Draft) in 1992, also being named All-Big Sky Conference first team for the third straight year and the conference defensive most valuable player for the second time (1990 and 1992). Robinson's career totals show a remarkable 57.5 quarterback sacks and 16 passes broken up, along with 277 tackles. Regarded by many as college

football's premier pass rusher below the NCAA Division 1-A ranks, Robinson's great senior year included 13.5 quarterback sacks to go along with 79 tackles (58 solos), 35 pressures, six forced fumbles, five passes broken up, and 27 tackles for losses. In 1991 Robinson was a second team All-American (Associated Press) and again was All-Big Sky first team, recording 77 tackles (75 solos) and ranking with the nation's leaders in sacks (20), pressures (35), and tackles for losses (28 for 167 yards). He broke up seven passes in his junior year. In 1990 Robinson earned not only his All-Big Sky honors and Big Sky defensive MVP award, but also was named an all-conference academic selection. Brian Stablein had an outstanding career at Ohio State, catching 80 passes for 1,199 yards and three touchdowns. As a senior Stablein caught 51 passes for 612 yards and two scores, also returning 16 punts for 99 yards for the Buckeyes. He earned Ohio State's Paul Warfield award in each of the last two years, given annually to the team's outstanding receiver, and in 1992 was named All-American second team and All-Big 10 first team (The Poor Man's

Guide to the NFL Draft). His 51 catches ranked fourth in the Big 10. As a senior his best game was a nine-reception performance vs. Wisconsin. In 1991 Stablein was All-Big 10 honorable mention, catching 25 passes for 363 yards and ranking third in the conference in punt returns with 18 for 154 yards (8.6 average). Stablein had at least one reception in every game as a junior. In 1990 Stablein caught 10 passes for 161 yards (16.1 average) and a TD. Clarence Williams in 1992 was an All-American honorable mention and All-Pac 10 Conference first team choice by the Football News, catching 19 passes for 237 yards. Williams has career stats of 94 receptions for 1,256 yards and three touchdowns. He also was All-Pac 10 in both 1991 and 1990, as a junior catching 31 passes for 389 yards (12.5 average), also carrying the ball five times for 20 yards. Williams had a season-high eight catches for 113 yards in the Southern

California game. His best season in terms of receptions was 1990, when he caught 43 passes for 627 yards, a 14.6 average, and three TDs. Williams had six receptions for 106 yards, including a 28-yard score, vs. Texas Christian, and had seven receptions for 83 yards, with one TD, vs. California. Clarence was selected a class AAA all-state selection as a tight end and linebacker by the Washington Sportswriters Association while playing at Renton HS in Seattle. He was a Western 100 pick by the Tacoma News Tribune, adding Northwest Top 24 honors as his team was ranked number one in the state his final season. Clarence was a two-way all-state player as a junior, adding all-league honors as a defensive back. He also lettered in basketball. baseball, and track. His older sister, Toni, also attended WSU and participated in track. Clarence was a sports management major at Washington State.

DAN WILLIAMS DE 6-4, 290 DOB: Dec. 15, 1969 Draft Choice #1

Toledo



Dan Williams was regarded as one of the premier pass rushers in the NFL draft, and was selected by the Broncos as the 11th pick in the first round. He will come into his first pro training camp as a candidate for the starting spot at right defensive end, which was the position he played throughout his college career. An All-American and first team All-Mid American Conference choice by the Football News, Williams posted 13 sacks as a senior to go along with 104 tackles

(59 solo), and 33 quarterback pressures. He also deflected five passes and forced one fumble. He had 13 tackles and three sacks against Western Michigan, and vs. Kent State was in on 13 tackles, had two pass deflections, and blocked a punt. For his career at Toldeo, Williams had 256 tackles, 143 solo and 113 assists, 28 quarterback sacks and 80 pressures in leading the Rockets' defense. In 1991 he finished with 78 tackles (52 solos), had five sacks, forced two fumbles, and recovered one. Williams was chosen the MAC defensive player of the week after posting 11 tackles (eight solos) with two sacks for losses of six yards, a pair of stops behind the line of scrimmage, a fumble recovery, and a forced fumble in a win over Western Michigan. In 1990 he nailed down

a starting job at right defensive end, recording 74 tackles (32 solos) with a team-high 10 sacks and 17 stops for 87 yards lost. He closed out his first year at Toledo with nine tackles, a sack, a pass deflection, and a fumble recovery vs. Arkansas State. Williams began his career at Tennessee State in 1988 before transferring to Toledo, spending 1989 as a redshirt transfer before nailing down a starting job in 1990 and starting for all three years. At Tennessee State in 1988 he had 23 tackles (15 solos), two pressures and two sacks, bringing his college totals to 279 tackles (158 solos), 30 sacks, and 82 QB pressures. Bom Daniel Williams II in Ypsilanti, Mich., he lettered once in both football and basketball at Ypsilanti HS, earning all-conference, all-metro, and all-area honors on the gridiron. Dan was a criminal justice major at Toledo.

KEVIN WILLIAMS RB 6-1, 212 DOB: Feb. 17, 1970 Draft Choice #5

UCLA



Kevin Williams is regarded as a superb athlete blessed with outstanding speed and will be looked at by the Broncos both as a running back and wide receiver. As a senior Williams carried for 582 yards on 115 carries (a 5.1 average) and scored five times, also catching one pass for eight yards, bringing his final career stats to 2,163 yards (a 5.5 average) and 21 touchdowns rushing, also catching 22 passes for 166 yards and one TD as a collegian. Williams combined

both strength and outstanding speed for the Bruins, earning All-Pac 10 honors in both his junior and senior years. In 1992 he opened the season with 124 yards rushing vs. Cal-Fullerton, sprinted 78 yards for a touchdown against Washington State, and had 95 yards in the Oregon game. He closed out his college career with 23 carries for 99 yards and TDs of one and 18 yards vs. Southern California. In 1991 Williams was an All-Pac 10 conference second team pick, leading conference with 1,141 yards and eight touchdowns on 191 carries (6.0), the fifth best year in school history, also catching 21 passes for 143 yards (6.8 average) and a score. He tied a UCLA record set by ex-Bronco Gaston Green with five games for over 130 yards rushing as a junior, including 151 yards with a 45-yard TD jaunt vs. Arizona. Williams had a career-high 210-yard performance on 30 attempts, with a 17-yard TD run, against Oregon. In 1990 Williams rushed for 112 yards and two TDs on 27 carries (4.1 average). In 1989 Williams was a member of The Sporting News' freshman honor roll and was cited as UCLA's rookie of the year. He shared the tailback duties that year and finished with 380 rushing yards and six TDs on 85 carries (4.5 average), catching three passes for 28 yards and returning 12 kickoffs for 261 yards (a 21.8 average). He gained 70 yards vs. Southern Cal and had 80 vs. Oregon State. He was a redshirt freshman in 1988 and was named UCLA's outstanding scout team player. Williams lettered in track after the 1989 football season, and despite only two weeks of training before the Pac-10 meet won the 100-meter dash (10.65). He also competed during the 1989 outdoor season, winning the conference title in the 100 meter. Born Kevin Deleon Williams in Marshall, Texas, he lettered three times in both track and football and twice in basketball at Spring (Tex.) HS, where he was an All-American pick by Super Prep, USA Today, The Sporting News, and All-Star Sports. Williams served as team captain and picked up all-state, all-district, and Gatorade Circle of Champions Texas Player of the Year honors as he rushed for 1,339 yards and 12 TDs in only eight games, missing three due to injury. An all-district and all-region first team hoop choice, Williams averaged 19 points per game and also participated in track, specializing in the 100 (10.48) and 200 (21.09) meters and long jump. Kevin was a history major at UCLA.

In addition to the squad limits described above, there also is an overall roster limit of 80 players that is applicable to players on a team's Active, Inactive, and Exempt Lists, and any players on the Practice Squad and on the Reserve List as Injured, Physically Unable to Perform, Non-Football Illness/Injury, and Suspended.

Reserve List

The Reserve List is a status for players who, for reasons of injury, retirement, military service, or other circumstances, are not immediately available for participation with a club. Players on Reserve/Injured are not eligible to practice or return to the Active/Inactive List in the same season that they are placed on reserve.

Players in the category of Reserve/Retired or Reserve/Did Not Report may not be reinstated during the period from 30 days before the end of the regular season through the postseason.

Trades

Unrestricted trading between the AFC and NFC is allowed in 1993 through October 19, after which trading will end until 1994.

NFL TERMINOLOGY

The term NFL Rookie is defined as a player who is in his first season of professional football and has not been on the roster of another professional football team for any regular-season or postseason games. A Rookie is designated by an "R" on NFL rosters. Players who have been active in another professional football league or players who have NFL experience, including either pre-season training camp or being on an active roster for fewer than three regular-season or postseason games, are termed NFL First-Year Players. An NFL First-Year Player is designated by a "1" on NFL rosters. Thereafter, a player on an NFL active roster for at least six regular-season or postseason games is credited with an additional year of NFL playing experience.

DENVER 17, LOS ANGELES RAIDERS 13

DENVER, COLO., Sept. 6 - John Elway led the Broncos on a last-minute comeback drive to beat the Raiders, 17-13, in a nationally televised Sunday night season opener. Los Angeles reached the Denver 34 on its first possession, but Jay Schroeder was sacked by Karl Mecklenburg, and fumbled. Michael Brooks scooped up the loose ball and rambled 54 yards for a touchdown. The Raiders next two possessions ended in turnovers, first on a Le-Lo Lang interception and then by an Alton Montgomery recovery of a fumble that was forced by Brooks. However, Denver could not convert the turnovers into points, and midway through the second guarter Los Angeles tied the score on a one-yard run by Nick Bell. The Raiders took a 10-7 lead with just seven seconds left in the first half on a 41-yard Jeff Jaeger field goal. Early in the third quarter, Jaeger nailed a 34yard field goal to increase the Raider lead to 13-7. DENVER 12, CLEVELAND 0

CLEVELAND, OHIO, Sept. 27 - Four David Treadwell field goals provided the margin of victory as Denver shut out the Browns, 12-0, before 78,064 in Cleveland Stadium. The Broncos rushed for a season-high 188 yards, including fine performances by running backs Reggie Rivers (66 yards), Gaston Green (57), and Greg Lewis (44). The Broncos built up a time of possession of 34:28, including a whopping 19:40 in the second half. DENVER 20, KANSAS CITY 19

DENVER, COLO., Oct. 4 - John Elway threw two touchdown passes with less than two minutes to play to lift the Broncos to a 20-19 victory over Kansas City. Elway's touchdown passes to Mark Jackson and Vance Johnson ended a scoring drought that saw the Broncos fail to score a touchdown in 12 consecutive quarters. Elway passed for 311 yards and H-back Shannon Sharpe set career highs with nine receptions for 118 yards. Dave Kreig of the Chiefs completed over 70 percent of his passes for 301 yards and one TD, but the powerful Kansas City ground game was held to just 90 yards. After a scoreless first quarter, Kansas City got on the board first on a 50-yard pass from Krieg to Willie Davis, a play that culminated an eight-play, 94-yard drive. Denver's next possession resulted in a 41-yard David Treadwell field goal with just over five minutes remaining in the first half. The Chiefs were able to add a field goal prior to halftime after their final possession of the quarter was kept alive by a pass interference penalty. Both teams traded field goals on their first possessions of the third quarter, and late in the period, KC kicker Nick Lowery missed a 49-yard attempt. That led to a Treadwell attempt of 31 yards, which was blocked by Dan Saleaumua. The Chiefs capitalized, driving 60 yards in 13 plays to score on a 26-yard field goal. On the Broncos' next play from scrimmage, Elway was sacked by Neil Smith and fumbled, and Smith recovered on the Denver 16. The Chiefs were unable to move the ball and settled for another field goal, making the lead 19-6 with five minutes left in the game. On Denver's next possession, Elway moved the team downfield, taking 14 plays to go 80 yards and score on a 25-yard pass to Jackson with 1:55 remaining. The ensuing kickoff was returned only to the KC5, and after the Chiefs failed to get a first down, they punted. Arthur Marshall fumbled his catch of the punt, but scooped the ball up and returned it 28 yards to the KC 27. Three plays later, with 38 seconds remaining, Elway hit Vance Johnson from 12 yards out and Treadwell added the winning extra point.

DENVER, COLO., Oct. 18 - Reggie Rivers' 20-yard scoring run with 1:34 left capped a three-play, 80-yard drive that gave Denver a 27-21 victory over Houston. After the Broncos' first possession of the day stalled, Bubba McDowell blocked Mike Horan's punt and Houston recovered on the Denver 14. (Horan was hurt on the play and was replaced by Brad Daluiso, who finished the day with four punts for a 48.5 average.) On second down Warren Moon hit Ernest Givins for eight yards and a score. Early in the second quarter, Arthur Marshall set up a Denver field goal with a 25-yard punt return. Denver's next possession ended with a 67-yard scoring run by Gaston Green, the longest run by a Bronco in 20 years, and Denver held on to a 10-7 lead at halftime. DENVER 27, NEW YORK GIANTS 13

DENVER, COLO., Nov. 15 - Rookie quarterback Tommy Maddox subbed for an injured John Elway and led the Denver Broncos to three second-half scoring drives in Denver's 27-13 win over the New York Giants. The Broncos' offense gave up no sacks and set a season-high mark in total yardage (379 yards), while the defense netted five sacks and allowed just 159 total yards, (including 39 net pass yards), the lowest opponent total of the season. Mike Croel set Denver's defensive tempo on the first play of the game, sacking Jeff Hostetler for a 10yard loss. After a New York punt and a 16-yard return by Arthur Marshall, Denver needed eight plays to go 40 yards and score on a two-yard run by Reggie Rivers. The Giants went three plays and out on their next possession and an 18vard punt return by Marshall set the Broncos up on their own 29. A five-yard penalty and a 15-yard run by Gaston Green gave Denver a first down on the Bronco 49. On third-and-10, Elway eluded the rush and threw a pass to Mark Jackson, who caught the ball on the west side of New York's 45 and headed northeast, eventually making it into the endzone. With Denver up 14-0, Hostetler drove the Giants 68 yards in 12 plays, and Matt Bahr kicked a 30-yard field goal. Six plays into the Broncos' next possession, Elway took off on a nine-yard run, but was hit on his right shoulder and left the game. Maddox came into the game, but was unable to sustain the drive. Six plays into the next Giants' possession, Greg Kragen sacked Hostetler, who fumbled, and Shane Dronett recovered for Denver on the New York 37. Three plays later, Elway was intercepted and reinjured while helping to make the tackle. That turnover led to a 38-yard field goal by Bahr, cutting Denver's lead to 14-6 at halftime. The Broncos held the ball for 12:06 in the third quarter. Their first possession, bouved by Maddox passes to Rivers (31 yards) and Jackson (33 yards), took nine plays to go 74 yards and end with a 25-yard David Treadwell field goal. The next Giants' possession stalled, but the Broncos drove to another field goal, this one of 46 yards, to take a 20-6 lead into the fourth quarter. Four plays into the Broncos' next drive, Greg Lewis fumbled and Greg Jackson recovered on the Denver 40. Five plays later Hostetler ran around right end for a five-vard score to bring the Giants within a touchdown of Denver at 20-13. On the ensuing kickoff, a 30-yard return by Marshall and a 15-yard personal foul penalty set Denver up on the Bronco 47. On first down, Maddox hit Jackson for a 24-yard gain, and two plays later Green ran up the middle for 23 yards. On second-and-goal from the New York two, Lewis ran up the middle for a score.

SEATTLE 16, DENVER 13 (OT)

SEATTLE, WASH., Nov. 30 - The Broncos' record fell to 7-5 after losing a 16-13 overtime decision to Seattle. For the second straight week, Denver was without the services of guarterback John Elway, who was sidelined with a bruised right shoulder. Seattle's final possession of the first half began at the Denver 35 with 2:21 on the clock. Alton Montgomery returned the ensuing kickoff 64 yards to the Seahawk 26. setting up a 30-yard field goal by David Treadwell. Midway through the final quarter Seattle reached the Bronco 22, but on a first-and-10 play, Keith Traylor stripped the ball from Chris Warren and Jeff Mills recovered for Denver on the Denver 15.

KANSAS CITY 42, DENVER 20

KANSAS CITY, MO., Dec. 27 - The Chiefs' defense returned three Denver turnovers into touchdowns in Kansas City's 42-20 win over the Broncos. The loss knocked Denver out of playoff contention and dropped the club's final season record to 8-8. The teams traded punts for much of the first quarter before the Broncos mounted the first scoring drive. A 62-yard flea-flicker pass from John Elway to Arthur Marshall set up Elway's 12-yard touchdown pass to Reggie Johnson with 1:05 left in the first quarter. Early in the second quarter Kansas City took advantage of a 29yard Denver punt, driving 44 yards in eight plays to score on 12-yard pass from Dave Kreig to Jonathan Hayes. Five plays into Denver's next possession, Elway was hit as he was throwing by Derrick Thomas, and the errant pass was intercepted by Bennie Thompson. He lateraled to Charles Mincy, who scored on a 32-yard return. Kansas City reached the Bronco seven just before halftime, but Dennis Smith intercepted a Krieg pass to halt the scoring threat. Three plays into the second half, Elway was intercepted by Dale Carter, who returned the ball 36 yards for a score, giving the Chiefs a 21-7 lead. On Denver's next drive, a 52yard pass from Elway to Shannon Sharpe helped set up a 27-yard field goal by David Treadwell. The Broncos' next drive stalled at the Denver 26, but when Dale Carter mishandled a punt, Alton Montgomery recovered for the Broncos on the KC seven. The Denver offense could only get as close as the two-yard line and had to settle for another field goal, cutting the lead to 21-13. On the Chiefs' next offensive play, from their own 20, Krieg connected with Willie Davis for a 45-yard gain, and a 15-yard face mask penalty gave Kansas City a first down on the Bronco 20. Two plays later Krieg completed a pass to Fred Barnett, who reached the Deriver one before being stripped of the ball by Dennis Smith. Steve Atwater recovered the fumble at the Denver two. On third and 10, Elway dropped back to pass but was sacked by Thomas and fumbled. Thomas recovered in the end zone for a TD, increasing the Chiefs' lead to 28-13. The Chiefs took their next possession at the Denver 13, after the Broncos fumbled on a fourth down play. Three plays into the drive Krieg threw a five-yard touchdown pass to Hayes. Behind quarterback Tommy Maddox, Denver drove 78 yards in six plays, scoring on a one-yard run by Greg Lewis. An onsides kick was recovered by Kansas City's Kerry Cash, who returned it to the Denver eight. One play later Christian Okoye bowled into the end zone for the final score of the game.



PLAYOFF HISTORY

BUFFALO 10, DENVER 7 1991 AFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

ORCHARD PARK, N.Y., Jan 12 - The Broncos were denied their fifth AFC Championship, losing 10-7 to the Bills before 80,272 in Rich Stadium. Denver's defense shut down the high-powered Buffalo offense, limiting it to just 213 total yards and only 12 first downs, but the Bronco offense failed to capitalize on several first-half opportunities. Buffalo punted after its first two drives netted minus two yards. On the second play of the Bills' third possession, NT Greg Kragen deflected a pass at the line and turned and dove for the ball, making an interception on the Buffalo 29. After three plays gave Denver a thirdand-11 on the 30. David Treadwell's 47-yard field goal attempt sailed wide right. The defense rose up again to thwart the Bills and the Broncos began their next drive on their own 24. Fifteen plays into the drive, on fourth-and-19 from the Buffalo 24, Treadwell attempted a 42-yard field goal but the ball hit the right upright. Once again the Bills punted after failing to get a first down, and a 10-yard punt return by Vance Johnson set Denver up on the 50. On first down, QB John Elway threw a middle screen to RB Steve Sewell, who gained 26 yards to the Buffalo 24. The Broncos could move no closer than the 20, and David Treadwell's 37-yard attempt hit the right upright, ending the last scoring threat of the first half. Through the first two quarters Denver outgained the Bills 123 yards to 58, had nine first downs to Buffalo's three, and had a time of possession of 20:19, but at halftime the score stood at 0-0. The Bills' second drive of the third quarter began at their 20 and 11 plays later they faced a third-and-seven on Denver's 26. Kelly attempted to hit WR James Lofton but CB Tyrone Braxton intercepted the ball and returned to the Denver 19. On second-and-ten Elway attempted another middle screen to Sewell, but LB Carlton Bailey picked off the pass and ran 11 yards for a touchdown. The Broncos' first possession of the fourth quarter began with Gary Kubiak at quarterback, replacing Elway, who left the game with an injured thigh muscle. Kubiak drove Denver from its 21 to the Buffalo 23, but the Broncos failed to convert a fourth down attempt. The Bills then drove 50 yards in nine plays to score on a 44-yard field goal by Scott Norwood. Now down 10-0, Kubiak engineered a frantic drive in which Denver covered 85 yards in eight plays, and Kubiak scored a three-yard quarterback draw to pull Denver within three points. The ensuing onside kick was recovered by the Broncos' Steve Atwater, and Denver began its last chance drive on its 49 with 1:43 left on the clock and two time-outs. On first down, Kubiak hit Sewell for seven yards, but CB Kirby Jackson stripped the ball away and he recovered on the Buffalo 44. The Bronco defense forced the Bills to punt, but Denver could only reach the 50 as time ran out. Kubiak, playing his final game as a pro, outgained both Elway and Kelly, completing 11 of 12 passes for 136 yards.

DENVER 26, HOUSTON 24 1991 AFC DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF GAME

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 4 — The Denver Broncos advanced to their fourth AFC Championship Game in six years after defeating Houston 26-24 before 75,301 in Mile High Stadium. David Treadwell's 28-yard field goal with 20 seconds remaining capped a 12-play, 78-yard drive in which the Broncos converted two fourth down plays. On the first play of the game, QB Warren Moon connected with WR Haywood Jeffries for a 49-yard gain, giving the Oilers a first down on the Denver 21. Two plays later Moon hit Jeffries for 15 yards and a score, giving Houston a 7-0 lead with only 1:46 gone in the game. After a Denver punt, Moon again drove his team down the field and threw his second TD pass, this one for nine yards to WR Drew Hill. The Broncos started their next possession on their 35 and covered 65 yards in eight plays to score on a 10-yard pass from QB John Elway to WR Vance Johnson, but a fumbled snap on the conversion attempt left the score 14-6. On the sixth play of the ensuing Oilers' drive, Moon was intercepted by FS Steve Atwater, but a roughing the passer call nullified the effort. Three plays later Houston scored on a six-yard pass from Moon to WR Curtis Duncan. The next Oilers' possession ended when Atwater intercepted a pass and gave Denver the ball on its own 12 with 6:03 left in the half. In a drive that saw Elway complete all six passes for 64 yards, and Steve Sewell complete one to Johnson for 10, the Broncos covered 88 yards in 12 plays to score on a one-yard run by RB Greg Lewis, cutting the Houston lead to 21-13. Denver reached the Houston 30 on its first possession of the second half, but Elway was intercepted by CB Richard Johnson and the Oilers took over on their 33. That led to a 33-yard field goal attempt by Al Del Greco, but the ball sailed wide right. The Broncos then drove from their 20 to Houston's 31 and David Treadwell nailed a 49-yard field goal, the longest in Denver postseason history. Now up by only five at 21-16, the Oilers reached the Broncos' seven on their next drive, but had to settle for a 25-yard field goal. Denver started on its 20 and nine plays later faced a fourth-and-four from the Houston 41. Elway threw a short pass to WR Michael Young, who broke two tackles and was finally brought down on Houston's 15, a gain of 26 yards. Three plays later Lewis bowled over from one for his second TD of the day, making the score 24-23 in favor of Houston. The Oilers' next drive stalled and Greg Montgomery punted to the Denver two. With 2:07 and no time outs remaining, Elway hit Young for a 22-yard gain on first down, but three plays later the Broncos had a fourth-and-six on the 28. Elway dropped back, then scrambled left upfield and ran out of bounds a yard past the first down marker. Three straight incompletions again left Denver with a do-or-die fourth down situation. Elway again dropped back and scrambled left, but as he headed upfield he tossed a pass to Johnson, who ran to the Houston 21 for a 44-vard gain. RB Steve Sewell ran for 10 yards on first down, and two plays later Treadwell came on for the winning kick.

SAN FRANCISCO 55, DENVER 10 SUPER BOWL XXIV

NEW ORLEANS, LA., Jan. 28 - The San Francisco Forty-Niners captured their fourth World Championship with a 55-10 victory over Denver in Super Bowl XXIV, played in the New Orleans Superdome, San Francisco QB Joe Montana completed 22 of 29 passes for 297 yards and five touchdowns. three to WR Jerry Rice. The Forty-Niners scored two touchdowns in every guarter and outgained the Broncos 461 yards to 167. After stopping Denver on the game's initial possession, San Francisco drove 66 yards in 10 plays, scoring on a 20-yard pass from Montana to Rice. The Broncos next possession covered 49 yards in 10 plays and resulted in a 42-yard field goal by David Treadwell. After limiting the Niners to four yards on their next drive. Denver took possession on its own 49, but on first down RB Bobby Humphrey fumbled and DE Kevin Fagan recovered for San Francisco on the Niners' 46. That turnover led to a seven-yard TD pass from Montana to TE Brent Jones, and after a failed extra point attempt, San Francisco led 13-3 with three seconds left in the first quarter. The Broncos failed to cross midfield in the second period while the Niners scored on a one-yard run by RB Tom Rathman and a 38-yard pass from Montana to Rice. San Francisco was unable to move the ball to the initial drive of the second half, but Elway was intercepted on the first play of Denver's next drive and the Niners took possession on the Broncos' 28. On first down Montana threw a TD pass to Rice to put his team up 34-3. The next Denver drive also ended with an interception, leading to a 35-yard scoring pass from Montana to WR John Taylor. The Broncos, spurred by a 34-yard run by Humphrey, moved 61 yards in five plays and a penalty to score on a three-yard run by Elway. San Francisco roared back with an 11-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a three-yard TD run by Rathman. Following another Bronco fumble, RB Roger Craig plowed oneyard into the endzone to round out the scoring.

DENVER 37, CLEVELAND 21 AFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

DENVER, COLO., Jan. 14 - The Denver Broncos won their third American Football Conference Championship in four years with a dynamic 37-21 victory over Cleveland before 76,005 fans in Mile High Stadium. Broncos QB John Elway threw for 385 yards and three TDs, RB Sammy Winder tied a Denver postseason record with two touchdowns, and SS Dennis Smith nabbed two of the Broncos' three interceptions. Denver had 497 vards of total offense to the Browns' 256 and had a time of possession of 36:53. The Broncos took the opening kickoff and drove to the Cleveland one, but on third down, Elway's pitch to RB Bobby Humphrey was fumbled and the Browns' Andrew Stewart recovered on the eight. With five minutes left in the first quarter, Smith picked off a Bernie Kosar pass and returned it to the Cleveland 32. Denver moved to the Cleveland 12 but had to settle for a 29-yard field goal by David Treadwell. Neither team mounted scoring drives until the Broncos took possession on their own 18 with 6:54 left in the half. On first down Elway hit WR Mark Jackson for 12 yards, and three plays later he connected with WR Michael Young for a 70-yard touchdown play. The Browns took the opening kickoff to the second half and drove 70 yards in six plays, scoring on a 27-yard pass from Kosar to Brian Brennan. Denver roared right back on its next possession, going 80 yards in six plays and scoring on a five-yard pass from Elway to TE Orson Mobley. The key play on that drive was a 53-yard pass from Elway to Young. Cleveland was unable to move the ball and punted back to Denver. The Broncos moved from their own 40, and buoyed by a 25-yard run by Elway, covered 60 yards in six plays and scored a seven-yard run by Winder, making the score 24-7. The Browns needed just six plays to go 72 yards and score on a 10-yard Kosar-to-Brennan pass, and two plays into Denver's next drive, Cleveland's Felix Wright recovered a Denver fumble and returned it to the Bronco one. One second down Tim Manoa barreled over from the two, cutting Denver's lead to 24-21 with one second left in the third quarter. The Broncos shut out the Browns in the final quarter while posting 13 points. Their initial drive of the quarter covered 80 yards in six plays and ended with a 39-yard touchdown pass from Elway to Winder, Denver's Kip Corrington intercepted Kosar to set the Broncos up on the Cleveland 39. Denver got as far as the Browns' 17 but had to settle for a 34-yard Treadwell field goal. Smith grabbed his second interception to end the Browns' next drive, leading to a 31-yard field goal.

DENVER 24, PITTSBURGH 23 AFC DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF GAME

DENVER, COLO., Jan. 7 - The Denver Broncos advanced to their third AFC Championship Game in four years with a come-from-behind 24-23 victory over the Steelers before 75,868 in Mile High Stadium. Although Pittsburgh held the upper hand in total yards, 404 to 364, and time of possession, 34:14 to 25:46. Denver was able to mount a late fourth quarter drive and score the winning touchdown with just 2:27 remaining. The Steelers took the opening kickoff and drove 65 yards in 13 plays, scoring on a 32-yard Gary Anderson field goal. Late in the opening quarter Pittsburgh took possession at its own seven-yard line, but on first down RB Merrill Hoge ran for 45 yards to the Bronco 48. Quarterback Bubby Brister connected with RB Tim Worley for a 33-vard gain on the next play, and three plays later Hoge scored on a sevenyard run to put Pittsburgh up 10-0. The Broncos took their first possession of the second quarter and drove 75 yards in 12 plays to score on a one-yard plunge by RB Mel Bratton on third-and-goal. The Steelers roared back, traveling 77 yards in 12 plays to score on a nine-yard pass from Bristler to WR Louis Lipps. The Broncos got the ball back on their own 33 with 20 seconds left in the half. On first down, QB John Elway and WR Mark Jackson combined for 26 yards, and then Elway fired a 15-yard pass to WR Ricky Nattiel, giving Denver the ball on the Pittsburgh 26 with two seconds left. David Treadwell kicked a 43-yard field, making the score 17-10 in favor of Pittsburgh at halftime. Early in the third quarter, Denver NT Greg Kragen forced a Tim Worley fumble, and CB Tyrone Braxton recovered for the Broncos on the Steeler 37. On first down Elway hit WR Vance Johnson for a touchdown, tying the score at 17 apiece. Pittsburgh's next two possessions ended in Anderson field goals and the Steelers held a 23-17 lead in the early stages of the fourth quarter. After an exchange of punts the Broncos took possession on their own 29 with 7:06 left in the game. After a first down penalty, making it first-and-19 from the 20, Elway hit Jackson for 18 yards. On the next play, Elway handed off the RB Bobby Humphrey, who pitched the ball back to Elway, and he threw a 36-yard strike to Johnson, giving Denver a first down on the Steeler 26. Humphrey ran on the next four plays, gaining 24 yards and taking the ball to the two. On third-and-goal from the one, Bratton scored again and Treadwell's extra point gave Denver its first lead of the game with 2:27 laft. Pittsburgh got the ball on its own 20, but on third down Brister's signals were drowned out by the crowd and he mishandled the snap. Randy Robbins recovered for Denver on the Pittsburgh 18 and the Broncos were able to run out the clock to preserve the victory.

WASHINGTON 42, DENVER 10 SUPER BOWL XXII

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Jan. 31 — The Washington Redskins scored 35 points in the second quarter to power their 42-10 victory over the Broncos in Super Bowl XXII, played at San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium, Super Bowl MVP Doug Williams of Washington completed 18 of 29 passes for 340 yards and four TDs, while rusher Timmy Smith gained 204 yards on 22 carries, scoring twice, and wide receiver Ricky Sanders caught nine passes for 193 yards and two touchdowns. Overall, The Redskins gained 602 yards of total offense to Denver's 327. The Broncos took the early lead on their first play from scrimmage, a 56-yard bomb from John Elway to Ricky Nattiel, coming with just 1:57 gone in the game. Denver's next possession stalled at the Redskins' seven-yard line, as Rich Karlis put the Broncos up 10-0 with a 24yard field goal. In the second quarter, however, Denver's dreams of a World Championship were blown apart by Redskins. On Washington's first play of the quarter, Williams and Sanders combined for an 80-yard TD to bring the score to 10-7. The Redskins took the lead for good on the fifth play of their next possession when Williams hit Gary Clark for 27 yards and a score. Denver got as far as the Washington 26 on its next drive, but Karlis' 43-yards field goal attempt sailed wide left. Two plays later Timmy Smith scored on a 58yard run to increase the Washington lead to 21-10. The Redskins' next possession ended with a 50-yard Williams-to-Sanders TD pass, and minutes later, Williams and Clint Didier combined for a seven-yard TD pass to give Washington a 35-10 lead at halftime. The Broncos could move only as far as the Redskins' 48-yard line in the second half, while Washington closed out the scoring late in the game on a four-yard run by Smith.

DENVER 38. CLEVELAND 33 AFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

DENVER, CO., Jan. 17 - Denver's Jeremiah Castille recovered a Cleveland fumble on the Denverthree-vard line with just over a minute left in the game, halting a desperate drive by the Browns and preserving a victory for Denver. With the win, Denver became the first AFC Champion since the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1978-79 to win the conference in consecutive seasons. The Broncos were presented with the first scoring opportunity of the game when Freddie Gilbert caught a deflected Bernie Kosar pass on the contest's third play. Denver took four plays to go 18 yards, scoring on an eight-yard pass from John Elway to Ricky Nattiel. The Browns next drive reached the Bronco 45 before Kevin Mack fumbled, and it was recovered by Steve Wilson on the Denver 40. Two plays later Gene Lang took off on a 42-yard run, the longest in postseason history for Denver, taking the ball to the Cleveland 11. Six plays later, faced with a third-and-goal from the three, Elway's pass into the endzone fell incomplete, but Cleveland was penalized for holding, giving the Boncos new life at the Browns' one. Steve Sewell scored on first down to give Denver a 14-0 lead with 11 minutes gone in the first guarter. The Browns took 13 plays to move 64 yards for their first points of the game, scoring on a 24-yard Matt Bahr field goal. On the sixth play of the following Bronco drive, Elway scrambled for seven yards to the Denver 46, and a Cleveland penalty put the Boncos at the Cleveland 39. Four plays later Elway hit Ricky Nattiel for 21 yards, down to the Cleveland one, and Gene Lang carried it into the endzone to up Denver's lead to 21-3. Both teams missed field goals in the latter part of the first half, and the Broncos took their 18-point lead into the dressing room at halftime. After Elway was intercepted by Felix Wright four plays into the second half, Cleveland needed just three plays to go 35 yards and score on an 18-yard pass from Bernie Kosar to Reggie Langhorne. The

Broncos answered that four plays into their next drive, when on a third-and-10 from the Denver 20, Elway scrambled right and threw a pass to Mark Jackson, who was standing at the Bronco 25. Jackson evaded two tackles and sprinted for a touchdown to complete an 80-yard scoring play and give the Broncos a 28-10 lead. Kosar and the Browns roared right back, moving 80 yards in five plays to score on a 32-yard Kosar-to-Earnest Byner pass. After a Bronco punt, Cleveland engineered another scoring drive, going 42 yards in four plays and scoring on a four-yard run by Byner to narrow the Bronco lead to 28-24. Just before the end of the third period, Rich Karlis capped off a Denver possession with a 38-yard field goal. The Browns, however, moved 86 yards in nine plays to tie the score at 31-31 on a four-yard pass from Kosar to Webster Slaughter. After an exchange of punts, Denver began a drive at their own 25 with 5:14 left in the game. On first down, Elway threw a 26-yard pass to Nattiel, and three plays later, duplicated the play to take the ball to the Cleveland 20. On the next play Elway passed to Sammy Winder, who caught it at the 23 and rambled the rest of the way into the endzone to put the Broncos up 38-31 with just over four minutes left. Kosar and the Browns rallied back and got to the Denver eight-yard line with 1:12 remaining, when Byner ran to the three, but had the ball stripped by Castille, who recovered for the Broncos. Denver was forced into a fourth down situation with 13 seconds left, and punter Mike Horan carried the ball out of the back of the endzone for a safety, making the score 38-33 in Denver's favor. After the ensuing free kick, Cleveland attempted one pass before time ran out.

DENVER 34, HOUSTON 10 1987 AFC DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF GAME

DENVER, CO., Jan 10 - The Broncos advanced to the AFC Championship game after beating the Oilers 34-10, the largest margin of victory ever for the Broncos in postseason play. The Broncos were led to on defense by Mark Havnes and Karl Mecklenburg, who both picked up key interceptions, and on offense by quarterback John Elway (14 of 25, 259 yards, two TDs) and receivers Vance Johnson (four catches for 105 yards) and Clarence Kay (three catches for 57 yards and two TDs). Punter Mike Horan put the Oilers in a hole after the Broncos' first drive stalled, sending a punt to the Houston five-yard line, where two plays later, a lateral pass from Warren Moon to Mike Rozier was fumbled, and Steve Wilson recovered for Denver on the one. Gene Lang scored two plays later to give the Broncos an early 7-0 lead. Houston's next drive reached the Bronco 20-yard line before Mecklenburg intercepted a pass and returned it to the Denver 28. Elway hit Kay for 29 vards on the next play to move into Houston territory, and five plays later the same connection was made for a 27-yard touchdown pass, giving the Broncos a 14-0 lead. Both teams added field goals on their first drive of the second guarter to make the score 17-3 in Denver's favor. On the fourth Denver play after Houston's field goal, Elway threw a 55-yard bomb to Johnson to move the ball to the Oiler 11. Five plays later Elway hit Kay, again for a touchdown on a one-vard pass to up the lead to 24-3 with less than two minutes left in the half. Denver's first possession of the second half resulted in a Rich Karlis field goal. Houston then took 10 plays to reach the Denver seven, but Mark Havnes picked off a Moon pass in the end zone and returned it 57 yards, a Bronco playoff record. Houston's next drive reached the Bronco 11 but a pass on fourth down fell incomplete. The Ollers got the ball back three plays later when Patrick Allen intercepted an Elway pass, and that led to a 19-yard TD pass from Moon to Ernest Givins, cutting Denver's lead to 27-10. The Broncos' Kevin Clark recovered the onsides kick that followed, and Denver moved 52 yards in seven plays to score the final points of the game on a three-yard run by Elway.

NEW YORK GIANTS 39, DENVER 20 SUPER BOWL XXI

PASADENA, CA., Jan. 25 - The New York Giants broke open a close game with 24 unanswered points to open the second half, capturing a 39-20 win over the Broncos in Super Bowl XXI. The game, played before a crowd of 101,063 in Pasadena's Rose Bowl, featured outstanding performances by the two quarterbacks, Super Bowl MVP Phil Simms of New York (22 of 25, 268 yards, 3 TDs) and Denver's John Elway (22 of 37, 304 yards, 1 TD). The Broncos won the toss and opened their first drive on the Denver 24, taking eight plays to reach the Giants 31-yard-line. Rich Karlis scored the first points of the game with a 48-yard field goal, tying the Super Bowl record. New York roared right back with a nine-play, 78-yard scoring drive that culminated with a six-yard touchdown pass from Simms to tight end Mark Bayaro. On the possession, Simms was six-for-six for 69 yards, and running back Joe Morris gained 19 yards on just three carries. With five-and-a-half minutes remaining in the first quarter, the Broncos took possession on their own 42 after a 28-yard kickoff return by Ken Bell, Elway completed passes on the first three plays of the drive as Denver reached the New York 33. Two Giant penalties left the Broncos with a first-and-10 at the 12, and on third down, Elway called his own number, scoring from four yards out on a quarterback draw to give Denver a 10-7 lead. The Giants next drive stalled and the Broncos got the ball back at the 14-minute mark of the second quarter. On the third play of the drive, on third-and-18, Elway unleashed a 54-yard bomb to Vance Johnson, giving the Broncos a first down on the Giant 28. Seven plays later Denver had a first-and-goal at the New York one, but failed to score in three plays and Karlis was wide right on a 23-yard field goal attempt. Denver's Orange Crush defense stifled the next Giant drive at the New York 47, and after a punt, the Broncos got the ball back on their own 15. Controversy entered the game when, on second-and-twelve, Elway threw an apparent completion for a first down to Clarence Kay. The pass was ruled incomplete, and that decision was upheld after review of the television replay. On the next play, Giant defensive end George Martin sacked Elway in the end zone for a safety to pull New York within a point of Denver at 10-9. The Giant offense was unable to move the ball on its next possession and punted to Denver. Taking the ball at their own 37, Elway guickly hit Steve Watson for 31 yards and Gerald Willhite for 11 more to give the Broncos a first-and-10 at the Giant 21 with 43 seconds left in the half. Denver was able to get to the 16-yard-line, but Karlis was wide right on a 34-yard field goal attempt with 13 seconds left in the half. New York shot out of the starting blocks in the second half and never looked back, scoring on all three third quarter drives and outgaining Denver in the period 163 yards to two. With the score at 26-10, the Giants mounted a scoring drive on their first possession of the fourth quarter, and they went up 33-10 after Phil McConkey caught a deflected pass in the end zone, Simms's third TD stike of the day, Denver got the ball back at its own 16 and Elway moved the squad to the New York 10, as Karlis kicked a 27-yard field goal to make the score 33-13. The Giants took only five plays to move 46 yards for their next TD, a two-yard run by Otis Anderson which made the score 39-13. Elway took Denver down the field again and hit Vance Johnson with a 47-yard TD pass for the game's final

DENVER 23, CLEVELAND 20 OT AFC CHAMPIONSHIP

CLEVELAND, OH, Jan. 11 - Rich Karlis kicked a 33-vard field goal 5:48 into overtime to give the Broncos a 23-20 victory over the Browns. The game was played before a crowd of 79,915 people, who braved a wind chill of five degrees. Cleveland scored first, on the heels of a 14-play, 86-yard drive. Bernie Kosar threw a six-yard TD pass to Herman Fontenot with 5:19 left in the first quarter to put the Browns up 7-0. The next Cleveland drive ended when Ricky Hunley intercepted a Kosar pass, and he returned 14 yards to the Browns' 36. Although the Broncos' ensuing drive stalled, Kosar threw another interception, this one to Jim Ryan, and he returned the ball 26 yards to the Cleveland nine. Four plays later Karlis nailed a 19-vard field goal to make the score 7-3. Denver got another break on Cleveland's next play when Keven Mack fumbled and Ken Woodard recovered the ball on the Browns' 37. On first down John Elway rambled 34 yards, and two more rushes got Denver to the one-yard line. On fourth-and-goal Gerald Willhite plunged into the end zone to give the Broncos a 10-7 lead. Cleveland kicker Mark Moseley tied the score at 10 apiece with a 29-yard field goal with 20 seconds left in the first half. Both teams saw their first two possessions of the second half end in punts before Denver engineered the first scoring drive of the second half. Elway drove the Broncos 61 yards in 11 plays, and Karlis put Denver up 13-10 with a 26-yard field goal 12 minutes into the third quarter. The Browns wasted no time mounting a scoring march of their own. Mack rushed for 34 yards in a 10-play, 76-yard drive that culminated with a 24-yard Moseley field goal, knotting the score at 13-13. The Broncos next two possessions ended in punts, and when Cleveland got the ball on its own 48 with 6:40 left in the fourth quarter, the Browns struck quickly. On third-and-six from Denver's 48 yard line, Kosar threw a TD pass to Brian Brennan to give the Browns a 20-13 lead with 5:43 left in regulation. The ensuring kickoff rolled to the Denver two-yard line where Gene Lang fell on it. Pro Bowl-bound Elway then engineered the longest and most important drive of his four-year career. On the fifth play of the drive (on second-and-seven from the Broncos' 15), Elway rushed for 11 yards and a first down. He hit Steve Sewell for a 22-yard gain on the next play, and followed that with a 12-yard strike to Steve Watson to give Denver a first down on the Cleveland 40. After an incompletion and an eightyard sack, Elway threw a 20-yard pass to Mark Jackson, moving the team to the Cleveland 28. Another incompletion was followed by a 14-yard, Elway-to-Sewell pass, giving the Broncos a first down on the Brown's 14 with 57 seconds left. Elway's next pass was incomplete, and on second down he ran nine yards to the Cleveland five-yard line. On the next play, he hit Jackson for a TD, and Karlis's extra point tied the score at 20 with 39 seconds left in regulation. Cleveland was unable to move the ball as time ran out in the fourth quarter. The Browns won the overtime coin toss and elected to receive. Three plays into the drive, (on third-and-two from the Cleveland 38), the Orange Crush rose up to snuff Herman Fontenot for no gain. Cleveland punted and Willhite returned it to the Bronco 25, where the Denver juggernaut revved it up again. On second-and-five, Elway hit Orson Mobley for a 22yard gain, and three plays later Elway threw a 28-yard pass to Watson. Will first down on Cleveland's 22-yard line, the Broncos rushed three times to get to the 15, and on fourth down, Karlis hit the 33-yard game winner. Elway accounted for 300 total yards in the game, rushing for 56 and completing 22 of 38 passes for 244 yards. The Broncos kept alive a 1986 record of 13-0 when they scored 20 or more points. Denver also notched its 11th win on natural turf, losing only to San Diego at home on grass.

DENVER 22, NEW ENGLAND 17 AFC DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF GAME

DENVER, CO., Jan. 4-Rulon Jones sacked Tony Eason in the end zone for a safety with 1:37 left on the clock to put Denverup 22-17 and halt the Patriots' final comeback drive. The playoff victory was the fist since Jan. 1, 1978 for the Broncos, when they defeated Oakland for the AFC Championship. The two teams traded punts in the first nine minutes of the game before Denver posed the initial scoring threat. Starting at their own 20, the Broncos took four plays to reach the New England 7, behind John Elway completions of 39 and 21 yards. On second-and-goal from the four, Elway rolled around the left side and was hit just short of the goal line. He was penalized (delay of game) for spiking the ball after the play, and that set Denver back to the six. Two plays later Rich Karlis nailed a 27-yard field goal to give Denver a 3-0 lead. New England mounted a seven-play, 87-yard drive later in the quarter, with Eason hitting Stanley Morgan for a 19-yard TD. The Broncos roared right back with a 13-play, 82-yard drive that was punctuated by a 22-yard TD run by Elway, giving Denver a 10-7 lead midway through the second quarter. The Patriots tied the score on the last play of the half with a 38-yard Tony Franklin field goal. Denver received the kickoff to open the second half and proceeded to chew up over nine minutes off of the clock. The Broncos ran the ball 11 times on the drive, which stalled on the Patriot five. Karlis's 22-yard field goal put Denver up 13-10. Five plays into the next New England drive, the Patriots took a page out of Dan Reeve's bag of tricks, scoring on a flea-flicker that ended with a 45-yard TD pass from Eason to Morgan to give Mengland its first lead of the game at 17-13. Denver jumped right back on top, traveling 86 yards in six plays to score on a 48-yard Elway-to-Vance Johnson pass on the last play of the third quarter. The two teams both punted three times in the fourth quarter, and the last one, a Mike Horan punt of 54 yards, backed New England to its own 10. On first down, Eason dropped back to pass but was sacked for a safety by Rulon Jones. Denver recovered the onsides free kick and held on to the ball to preserve the win.

HOUSTON 13, DENVER 7

HOUSTON, Tex., Dec. 23—Toni Fritsch kicked two field goals to provide the margin of victory as the Houston Oilers played strong second half defense and defeated the Broncos, 13-7, earning the Oilers advancement in the American Football Conference playoffs.

Fritsch opened the scoring with a 31-yard first period field goal, but Denver came back to take a 7-3 lead on a seven-yard pass from Craig Morton to running back Dave Preston, an 80-yard drive that took the Broncos 13 plays.

Houston went ahead to stay on a three-yard burst by Earl Campbell at 14:14 of the second period. However, Campbell was injured on the play and did not return to action in the second half. Oiler quarterback Dan Pastorini and wide receiver Ken Burrough also left the contest due to injuries, both early in the second half, putting a severe crimp in the Houston attack. But the Broncos were able to move the ball for only 216 yards total offense, and the tenacious Houston defense sacked Morton six times for 40 yards in losses as the Oilers held on to win.

Linebacker Bob Swenson intercepted a Gifford Nielsen pass at the Oiler 26yard line midway through the fourth period, but two sacks of Morton led to a 50yard field goal attempt by Fred Steinfort. Steinfort's kick hit the upright, and the Oilers later drove for a second field goal by Fritsch, this one of 20 yards, providing the final victory margin.

Denver drove to the Houston 27 at the two minute mark, but the Oiler defense again rose to the occasion to stifle the threat and secure the win, eliminating the Broncos from the playoffs.

Denver threatened to come closer in the third period, but Turner's 29-yard field goal attempt was blocked, and Bradshaw's passing sealed Denver's fate early in the final stanza. The Steelers rolled to 425 yards total offense, with Bradshaw accounting for 272 through the air, 156 on ten receptions by Stallworth. The eventual World Champion Steelers limited the Broncos' ground game to just 87 yards in earning the right to play the Houston Oilers for the AFC crown the following week.

1978 SUPER BOWL XII

DALLAS 27, DENVER 10

NEW ORLEANS, La., Jan. 15-The Dallas Cowboys evened their Super Bowl record at 2-2 by defeating the Denver Broncos 27-10 before a sellout crowd of 76,400, plus 90 million television viewers, the largest audience ever to watch a sporting event. Dallas converted two pass interceptions by safety Randy Hughes and cornerback Aaron Kyle into 10 points and Efren Herrera added a 35-yard field goal to give the Cowboys at 13-0 halftime advantage. The Denver offense had trouble getting untracked against the hard-hitting Cowboy defense. The Broncos lost three fumbles and were intercepted twice on their last five possessions of the first half. The Broncos came back momentarily at the outset of the third period. Craig Morton engineered a drive to the Cowboys 30-yard line from where Jim Turner booted a 47-yard field goal to make the score 13-3. After an exchange of punts, Dallas wide receiver Butch Johnson made a spectacular diving catch in the end zone to complete a 45-yard pass from Roger Staubach to put the Cowboys ahead 20-3. However, the momentum swung back to the Broncos as Rick Upchurch returned the kickoff 67 yards to the Dallas 26. On the second play of the series, Norris Weese relieved Craig Morton at quarterback. Morton, who was intercepted only eight times during the regular season, had thrown a Super Bowl record four interceptions. Weese guided the Broncos to a touchdown - a one-yarder by Ron Lytle - to cut the Dallas lead to 20-10 with 5:39 left in the third quarter. Dallas clinched the victory when running back Robert Newhouse threw a 29-yard touchdown pass to Golden Richards on an option play with 7:04 remaining in the game. It was the first pass thrown by Newhouse since the 1975 regular season. The Cowboys offense amassed 325 yards while the defense limited the Broncos to 156 in a game which saw the Cowboys control the ball 38:34 to Denver's 21:26. Roger Staubach completed 17 of 25 passes for 183 yards while Harvey Martin and Randy White, who were named Co-MVPs, led the Cowboys defense which recovered four fumbles and intercepted four passes.

1978 AFC CHAMPIONSHIP

DENVER 20, OAKLAND 17

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 1-Denver quarterback Craig Morton threw two touchdown passes to Haven Moses as the Broncos defeated the defending NFL Champion Oakland Raiders 20-17 and moved into their first Super Bowl. Morton, who was drafted and spent nine-and-a-half years with the Cowboys, would face his former Dallas teammates after completing 10 of 20 passes for 224 yards. It would be the second meeting in five weeks for these two teams-Dallas won 14-6 in the regular season finale as Morton played only the opening series due to a bruised hip. On a sunny, 18-degree day before 74,982 Denver partisans, the Raiders scored on their initial possession as Errol Mann kicked a 20-yard field goal to climax an 18-play drive. Morton hit Moses on their first scoring hookup two plays later on a 74-yard touchdown bomb, and the Broncos were on top to stay. Denver took advantage of two Oakland turnovers in the second half to win its second game in three meetings with the Raiders during the 1977 season. Defensive end Brison Manor recovered running back Clarence Davis' fumble at the Oakland 17 and running back Jon Keyworth scored from the 1-yard line to increase the margin to 14-3 in the third quarter. Oakland quarterback Ken Stabler hit tight end Dave Casper on the first of two scoring passes to narrow the lead to 14-10 with 39 seconds elapsed in the final period. But on Oakland's next possession, linebacker Bob Swenson intercepted a Stabler pass and ran to the Raiders' 14. Morton then threw 12 yards to Moses for the Broncos' final touchdown. Oakland finished the scoring on the next series as Stabler threw 17 yards to Casper for the game's last touchdown. Denver controlled the ball for the final 3:08 and gave Red Miller the AFC title in his first year as a head coach. Moses, a 10-year veteran, had five receptions for 168 yards. The Denver defense, which was No. 1 against the rush in the NFL during the regular season, held the Raiders to 94 vards on the ground.

DENVER, Colo., Dec. 24-After ties at 7, 14, and 21, veteran Jim Turner kicked a 44-yard field goal to put Denver ahead to stay as the Broncos-in their first playoff game ever-beat the perennial AFC Central Champion Steelers. Leading 24-21, the Broncos capped their victory with two fourth-quarter interceptions by linebacker Tom Jackson, the last of which set up Craig Morton's 34-yard game-clinching touchdown pass to Jack Dolbin. Denver capitalized on a blocked punt and a fumble recovery for two scores in the first half, which ended 14-14. Morton and Steeler quarterback Terry Bradshaw traded touchdown passes in the second half before Turner's kick, Jackson's interceptions, and Morton's arm kept Pittsburgh from the AFC title game for the first time in four years. The Denver victory set up a third game between the AFC Western Champion Broncos and the AFC Wild Card Raiders, who split two regular season games.

BRONCOS IN HALL OF FAME

The Denver Broncos are represented in the Pro Football Hall of Fame by four individuals, including a former player, two former coaches, and a former administrator.

Fred Gehrke, who was the Broncos' General Manager for four years (1977-1980) and a member of the team's staff for 16 years, was the first winner of the Hall of Fame's Pioneer award in 1972.

Gehrke, as a Los Angeles Rams' halfback in 1948, painted golden rams' horns on his team's helmets and thus started the trend toward today's colorful, uniquely-decorated helmets worn by all NFL teams.

Cornerback Willie Brown, inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1984, played for the Broncos from 1963-66 and was named All-American Football League in 1964, a season in which he intercepted nine passes, including a team-record four in one game (vs. New York, 11/15/64).

Stan Jones, whose 1991 induction honors a 1 2-year career with Chicago and Washington, gained All-Pro honors four times as an offensive guard and appeared in seven Pro Bowls. Jones coached Denver's defensive line for 18 years, from 1967-71 and 1976-88.

Doak Walker, who was the Broncos' receivers coach in 1966, was inducted into the Hall in 1986 on the basis of his brilliant six-year career (1950-55) with the Detroit Lions.

The Pro Football Hall of Fame is located in Canton, Ohio.

The Denver Broncos have retired two jersey numbers in their 13-year history, guarterback Frank Tripucka and running back Floyd Little.

Tripucka, who wore number 18, was Denver's first quarterback and called signals for the Broncos from 1960-63. He played in the American Football League all-star game in 1962 and passed for 7,676 yards in his Denver career.

Little, who wore number 44 for the Broncos as well as during his legendary college career at Syracuse, played in Denver from 1967-75 and is the team's all-time leader in rushing (6,323 yards) and total touchdowns (54). Little was All-AFL in 1969 and played in two AFL all-star games (1968, 1969) and three Pro Bowls (1971, 1972, 1973).

JANUARY — Flanker Al Denson, defensive tackle Dave Costa, center Larry Kaminski and cornerback Nemiah Wilson participate in AFL All-Star game.Lou Saban and staff coach the West stars. FEBRUARY — Civic drive to raise \$1.8 million ends successfully and City of Denver receives stadium as a gift after purchase of the facility from Empire Sports, Inc. by non-profit group. Construction begins on 16,000 seat upper deck that will raise capacity to 50,000 for 1968 season. SEPTEMBER 21 — Broncos move into new administrative building at 5700 Logan Street. SEPTEMBER 10 — Denver voters pass a \$25 million bond issue to expand and improve Mile High Stadium to over 75,000 seats. The stadium was projected to be finished in time for the 1976 regular season. SEPTEMBER 22 - The Broncos and the Pittsburgh Steelers play in the first regular season overtime game as a 35-35 score was present at the end of regulation play. Neither team scored in the sudden death period. NOVEMBER 28 — Before a television audience estimated at 35 million, the Broncos riddle the Detroit Lions 31-27 on Denver's first Thanksgiving Day game in Detroit. DECEMBER 8 — Denver assures itself of the team's second consecutive winning season and Otis Armstrong sets a single game rushing mark of 183 yards as the Broncos down Houston 37-14. DECEMBER 15 - Otis Armstrong finishes the season with 1407 yards and the NFL rushing title becoming one of a half dozen players ever to average more than 100 yards per game in pro football.

FEBRUARY — Expansion of Mile High Stadium begins, which will provide 63, 500 capacity for the 1976 season and an ultimate capacity of 75,000 in 1977. DECEMBER 14 — Floyd Little winds up his career as the seventh all-time rusher in the NFL with 6,323 yards.

1976

JANUARY 26 - Tight end Riley Odoms and linebacker Randy Gradishar are the Broncos representatives in the Pro Bowl in New Orleans. MARCH 28 Quarterback Charley Johnson announces his retirement from the National Football League after a 15-year career. Johnson led the club to its first two winning seasons in 1973 and 1974. JUNE 27 - Lyle Alzado is one of three finalists for the man of the Year Award and Rick Upchurch is honored as the American Conference Offensive Rookie of the Year by the NFL Players Association. SEPTEMBER 26 - Rick Upchurch ties an NFL record by returning two punts for touchdowns in a 44-13 win over the visiting Cleveland Browns. OCTOBER 24 - Rick Upchurch ties an NFL record with his fourth punt return touchdown of the season in a 35-26 win over Kansas City. NOVEMBER 7 — With two field goals and six extra points, Jim Turner becomes the fifth player in pro football history to surpass 1, 200 points. DECEMBER 12 — The Broncos stop Chicago, 28-14, for the ninth win of the season, highest total in Denver history. Otis Armstrong rushes for 116 yards to reach 1,008 for the season, his second 1,000-yard in his career. DECEMBER 18 - Fred Gehrke, long-time Bronco administrator, is named general manager.

1977

JANUARY 17 — Rick Upchurch and Otis Armstrong are the Bronco participants in the annual AFC-NFC Pro Bowl in Seattle. JANUARY 31 — John Ralston resigns as Head Coach of the Denver Broncos. FEBRUARY 1 — Robert (Red) Miller, a former Bronco assistant coach, is named as the team's eighth head coach. JUNE 12 — Lyle Alzado is named winner of the National Football League Players Association's Byron (Whizzer) White Award as the group's Man of the Year. OCTOBER 16 — Pushing their season record to 5-0, the Broncos use seven interceptions and a touchdown pass to kicker Jim Turner to trounce the defending world champion Oakland Raiders, 30-7. NOVEMBER 27 — In

a showdown of the two best records in the NFL, the Broncos get a 73-yard interception return for a touchdown by Tom Jackson to dump Baltimore, 27-13, and run their record to 10-1. **DECEMBER 4** — With a 24-14 win at Houston the Broncos clinch a playoff berth, first in the club's history. Later in the day, the Broncos clinch the AFC Western Division championship when the Raiders fall to the Los Angeles Rams. **DECEMBER 18** — The Broncos lose to Dallas in the regular season finale, 14-6, but post the best record in the history of the franchise, 12-2, tied with Dallas for the best in the NFL. **DECEMBER 24** — Before the largest crowd ever to watch a sporting event in the state of Colorado, 75,011, the Broncos stop the Pittsburgh Steelers in the first round of playoff action, 34-21.

JANUARY 1 — In a hard-fought game at Mile High Stadium, the Broncos dethrone the Raiders, 20-17, for the AFC championship and a trip to the Super Bowl in New Orleans. JANUARY 15 — Broncos fall to the Cowboys, 27-10, in the Super Bowl. JANUARY 23 — Lyle Alzado, Randy Gradishar, Tom Jackson, Billy Thompson and Louis Wright represent the Broncos in the Pro Bowl, the largest Denver contingent in history. MARCH — Only 143 season tickets are not renewed, a new all-time low. DECEMBER 3 — Broncos win by 21-6 score at Oakland, holding the Raiders without a touchdown for the second time in the season, and moving within one game of AFC West crown. DECEMBER 10 — Denver downs Kansas City, 24-3, winning second straight division championship, as QB Craig Morton goes 1 9-for-22 with 16 straight completions, both second best all-time NFL marks. DECEMBER 30 — Denver loses in the playoffs to eventual Super Bowl champion Pittsburgh Steelers, 33-10.

1979

JANUARY 29 — Broncos are represented by an all-time high of seven players in the NFL Pro Bowl, including Lyle Alzado, Randy Gradishar, Tom Jackson, Riley Odoms, Bill Thompson, Rick Upchurch, and Louis Wright. MARCH — Only 161 season tickets are not renewed, virtually assuring the Broncos of their tenth straight sellout season. OCTOBER 7 — Denver shuts out San Diego, 7-0, marking first time ever for Broncos to record two shutouts in one season. Denver had opened the campaign with 10-0 win over Cincinnati. NOVEMBER 11 — Rick Upchurch becomes the all-time pro football record holder in career punt return yardage. He set the record vs. New England, surpassing the late Emlen Tunnell's total of 2,209 yards. DECEMBER 17 — Denver clinches a playoff berth for the third straight year. DECEMBER 23 — Denver loses in wild card playoff game at Houston, 13-7.

1980

JANUARY 27 — The Broncos are represented in the Pro Bowl game by Randy Gradishar, Tom Jackson, Rick Upchurch, and Louis Wright. MARCH — Only 146 season tickets are not renewed for 1980, virtually assuring the club of its 11th consecutive sellout campaign. OCTOBER 5 — Randy Gradishar returns interception 93 yards for a touchdown vs. Cleveland, the longest such return in team history and the NFL's longest for 1980 season. OCTOBER 13 — Fred Steinfort kicks 57-yard field goal, tying record for third-longest kick in NFL history.

1981

JANUARY - Fred Steinfort is named by Pro Football Weekly as that publication's Golden Toe Award winner for the 1980 season, having tied for the league lead with 26 field goals. FEBRUARY 25 - Edgar F. Kaiser, Jr. is introduced as the new owner of the Denver Broncos, having purchased the club from principal owners Gerald H. Phipps and Allan R. Phipps. MARCH 10 -Grady Alderman is named new General Manager and Dan Reeves is named as the new Head Coach. MARCH - The Broncos are sold out for their 12th consecutive season. SEPTEMBER — Craig Morton throws four touchdown passes in each of two consecutive games, vs. Baltimore and San Diego, a first in franchise history. Wide receiver Steve Watson ties a team record with three touchdown receptions against the Colts on September 20. NOVEMBER 22 -Watson catches a touchdown pass at Cincinnati to set a new team record with 13 TD catches in one season. DECEMBER 20 - Watson gains 82 yards on receptions at Chicago, establishing a new Bronco single season mark with 1, 244 reception yards. Individually, Morton set single season records for yards gained (3, 213), yards passing (3, 195), and average gain per play (8.37), while Watson led the AFC in reception vardage and in touchdown receptions (13).

JANUARY 3 — Final NFL statistics show Rick Upchurch as the NFL's punt return leader with a 16.1 average and Luke Prestridge as the league's leading punter with a 45.0 mark. FEBRUARY 6 — The Broncos are represented in the Pro Bowl game by Randy Gradishar, Luke Prestridge, and Rick Upchurch. MARCH 15 — Only 89 season ticket accounts have not been renewed for 1983, virtually assuring the Broncos of their 1 4th consecutive sellout season in Mile High Stadium. MAY 2 — In the biggest trade in franchise history, Denver acquires quarterback John Elway, the first player taken in the NFL draft, and signs him to a five-year contract. DECEMBER 11 — Elway throws three fourth quarter touchdown passes to erase a 19-0 deficit and lead the Broncos to a 21-19 playoff-clinching win over Baltimore. This marks the fourth Bronco appearance in playoff competition. DECEMBER 24 — Denver loses the wild card game at Seattle. 31-7.

1984

JANUARY 29 — Randy Gradishar makes his seventh Pro Bowl appearance. Louis Wright also was named to the AFC Pro Bowl team, but was unable to play because of a fractured finger. MARCH — Only 146 season ticket accounts have not been renewed for 1984, virtually assuring the Broncos of their 15th consecutive sellout season in Mile High Stadium. MARCH 23 — Pat Bowlen is introduced as the new owner of the Denver Broncos, assuming the title of President and Chief Executive Officer. NOVEMBER 18 — The Broncos beat Minnesota 42-21 for the club's 10th straight victory, a team record. John Elway tied a Denver record throwing five touchdown passes in the game. DECEMBER 15 — Denver wins its 13th game of the season, the most in Bronco history, and captures the AFC West crown with a 31-14 win over Seattle. Sammy Winder finishes the season with 1,153 yards rushing, and Steve Watson gains 1,170 yards receiving — the first time Denver has had 1,000-yard performers in both categories in the same season. DECEMBER 30 — Pittsburgh defeats Denver 24-17 in a divisional playoff game.

1985

JANUARY 27 — Sammy Winder represents the Broncos in the NFL Pro Bowl. FEBRUARY 18 — Owner Pat Bowlen names John Beake as General Manager and Dan Reeves as Vice President of the club. MARCH — Only 82 season ticket accounts have not been renewed for the 1985 season, virtually assuring the Broncos of their 16th consecutive sellout session in Mile High Stadium. DECEMBER 20 — Denver beats Seattle 27-24 to close out the season at 11-5. The Broncos set season records with total yards (5,496) and total points (380). John Elway, who threw for 432 yards against Seattle, set Denver records in total offense (4,144 yards) and passing yards (3,891) for the season, and Karl Mecklenburg's 13 quarterback sacks also set a new Bronco standard.

1986

FEBRUARY 2 — The Broncos are represented by four players in the Pro Bowl - Rulon Jones, Karl Mecklenburg, Dennis Smith, and Louis Wright. FEB-RUARY 26 — Owner Pat Bowlen holds ground breaking ceremonies for 60 luxury Penthouse Suites to be built atop Mile High Stadium's fifth level. MARCH — Only 127 season ticket accounts have not been renewed for the 1986 season, virtually assuring the Broncos of their ah consecutive sellout season in Mile High Stadium. OCTOBER 12 — Broncos post a 31-14 win over San Diego to equal best start in team history with 6-0 record.

DECEMBER 13 — Denver, which had clinched AFC Western Division title by virtue of a Seattle win over Los Angeles the previous Monday night, clinched home field advantage for first playoff game by defeating Washington, 31-30. DECEMBER 20 — Broncos conclude regular season play with second straight 11-5 record. Thirty-five individual and team records were set by the Broncos in 1986. DE Rulon Jones was named the AFC Defensive Player of the Year by UPI, and LB Karl Mecklenburg was named the AFC Player of the Year by the Football News.

1987

JANUARY 4 — Broncos post a 22-17 playoff win over New England Patriots before 76,105, largest crowd ever to watch a Denver home game. JANUARY 11 — Broncos post a thrilling, 23-20 overtime win over the Cleveland Browns to win the AFC championship and earn a trip to Super Bowl XXI. JANUARY 18 - A crowd of over 63,000 attends a Mile High Stadium rally prior to team's departure for Pasadena. JANUARY 25 - The Broncos lose to the New York Giants by a 39-20 score in Super Bowl XXI, a game watched by 101,063 at the Rose Bowl and played before a national television audience of 127,000,000. In addition, the game was televised live in 53 other nations. JANUARY 26 - Over 100,000 fans welcome Broncos home in parade through downtown Denver, FEBRUARY 1 - Six Broncos play in the Pro Bowl game, including Keith Bishop, John Elway, Rulon Jones, Karl Mecklenburg, Dennis Smith, and Sammy Winder. MARCH - Only 58 season ticket accounts have not been renewed for the 1987 season, virtually assuring the Broncos of their 18th consecutive sellout season in Mile High Stadium, longest sellout streak in the AFC and second longest in the NFL. AUGUST 9 - The Broncos lose 28-27 to the Los Angeles Rams in American Bowl '87, a preseason game played in storied Wembley Stadium in London, England. SEPTEMBER 22 - The NFL Players Association goes on strike, resulting in the cancellation of games for the weekend of Sept. 28. OCTOBER 4 - Denver loses 40-10 to Houston in the first of three "replacement" games. NOVEMBER 29 - Denver grabs a 31-17 win over San Diego in the 400th game for both franchises. The contest also marks Dan Reeves' 100th game as the Broncos' head coach. DECEMBER 27 - The Broncos win their third AFC West title in four years after shutting out San Diego 24-0 in a blizzard. Denver finishes the season with a 10-4-1 record, the only team in the NFL to post eight 10-win seasons since 1977. QB John Elway is named NFL Most Valuable Player by AP.

1988

JANUARY 10 - The Broncos advance to the AFC Championship Game with a 34-10 victory over Houston before 75, 968 in Mile High Stadium. JANUARY 17 - Denver becomes the first AFC team to win consecutive conference championships since Pittsburgh of 1978-79 by defeating Cleveland 38-33. The game garnered a 91 television share in the Denver area, believed to be an all-time national viewing high. JANUARY 31 — The Broncos lose to Washington 42-10 in Super Bowl XXII in San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium. FEBRUARY 6 - Three players represent Denver in the Pro Bowl Game, Keith Bishop, John Elway, and Karl Mecklenburg. MARCH — The Broncos are virtually assured of their 19th consecutive sellout campaign as just 91 season ticket accounts are not renewed for the 1988 campaign. JUNE 3 - The Broncos acquire future Hall of Fame RB Tony Dorsett from the Dallas Cowboys in exchange for a future draft choice. The 1988 campaign will be Dorsett's 1 2th in pro football. SEP-TEMBER 26 - RB Tony Dorsett eclipses Jim Brown to become the second leading rusher in pro football history, trailing only Walter Payton, DECEMBER 17 - The Broncos close out the season with a 21-10 win over New England and a disappointing 8-8 record, marking the end of Denver's two-year reign as AFC champions. QB John Elway concludes the season with 3, 309 yards passing and 234 rushing to become the first player in football history to have four consecutive years with over 3,000 passing yards combined with over 200 rushing yards. Dorsett finishes the year second to Payton among football's all-time rushing leaders with 1 2, 739 yards.

1989

JANUARY 29 — P Mike Horan is the Broncos' lone representative in the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl Game. APRIL — The Broncos conclude season ticket renewals and waiting list additions for 1989, virtually assuring the team of its 20th consecutive sellout campaign at Mile High Stadium. NOVEMBER 26 — The Broncos clinch their third AFC West title in four seasons after a 41-14 victory at home against Seattle. DECEMBER 16 — Denver wraps up home field advantage for the AFC Playoffs with 37-0 win at Phoenix.

1990

JANUARY 7 - The Broncos advance to the AFC Championship Game with a come-from-behind 24-23 win over Pittsburgh. JANUARY 14 - The Broncos become the only AFC team to win three conference titles in the 1980s with a 37-21 victory over Cleveland in the AFC Championship Game. JANUARY 28 Denver loses 55-10 to San Francisco in Super Bowl XXIV in the New Orleans Superdome. FEBRUARY 4 — Three players represent the Broncos in the Pro Bowl; K David Treadwell, NT Greg Kragen, and S Dennis Smith, LB Karl Mecklenburg was selected to start in the game but could not participate because of a knee injury suffered in the Super Bowl. FEBRUARY 26 - The National Football League announces that the Broncos will face Seattle in an Aug. 4 preseason game in Tokyo, Japan. MARCH 5 - The Paul D. Bowlen Memorial Broncos Centre opens in southeast Denver, housing all of the team's office and training facilities. AUGUST 5 - The Broncos defeat the Seattle Seahawks by a score of 10-7 in American Bowl '90, played before a sellout audience in the Tokyo Dome in Tokyo, Japan. The game marks Denver's second appearance in an international game, having played the Los Angeles Rams in London in a 1987 American Bowl contest. NOVEMBER 22 - The Broncos drop a 40-27 game to the Detroit Lions in the Lions' annual Thanksgiving Day contest. marking Denver's fifth appearance in a Thanksgiving Day game, including four in Detroit and one in Denver(a 46-45 loss to the New York Titans in 1962). DECEMBER 30 — Running back Bobby Humphrey finishes the season with 1, 202 rushing yards, becoming one of just 10 backs to rush for over 1,000 yards in each of their first two NFL seasons. Mike Horan leads the entire NFL in punting (44.4) and in net punting average (38.9). The Broncos also boast the NFL's kickoff return leader in Kevin Clark who posts a 25.3 average.

1991

FEBRUARY 3 — Safeties Steve Atwater and Dennis Smith, along with running back Bobby Humphrey, appear in the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl game in Honolulu, Hawaii. It is the first appearance each for Atwater and Humphrey. JULY 27 — The Broncos lose 14-3 to Detroit in the Hall of Fame Game played in Canton, Ohio. Former Broncos assistant coach Stan Jones is inducted into the Hall. SEPTEMBER 1 — Denver records its biggest opening day win ever with a 45-14 pounding of Cincinnati. DECEMBER 8 — A 17-7 win at Cleveland clinches a playoff berth for the Broncos. DECEMBER 22 — Denver closes out the regular season at 12-4 and wins the AFC West title for the fifth time in eight years.


1992

JANUARY 4 — The Broncos overcome a 21-6 deficit to defeat Houston 26-24 in an AFC Divisional Playoff Game. The winning field goal was set up by a drive that began at the Denver two. The Broncos converted two fourth down plays to keep the possession alive. JANUARY 12 - Despite a sterling effort by Denver's defense, the Broncos fall 10-7 to Buffalo in the AFC Championship Game. The Bills' high-powered offense managed just 213 yards and 12 first downs in the game. FEBRUARY 2 - Running back Gaston Green, linebacker Karl Mecklenburg, and safeties Steve Atwater and Dennis Smith represent the Broncos in the Pro Bowl. MARCH - The Broncos conclude season ticket renewals and waiting list additions for 1992, virtually assuring the franchise of its 23rd consecutive sellout season. Denver is also named a participant in America Bowl '92, to be played in Berlin. AUGUST 15 - The Broncos lose to the Miami Dolphins, 31-27, in American Bowl '92 in Berlin's Olympic Stadium. DECEMBER 28 — Denver Broncos President Pat Bowlen announces that the franchise will not renew the contract of Dan Reeves, thus creating a coaching vacancy in Denver for the first time since 1981. Reeves ends his Denver career with a record of 116-78-1.

1993

JANUARY 25 — Wade Phillips is hired as the 10th head coach in Bronco history, signing a three-year contract as head coach after four seasons as the Broncos' defensive coordinator.

THE DENVER BRONCOS YOUTH FOUNDATION

The Denver Broncos Youth Foundation (DBYF), a nonprofit organization, was established in 1982 to help meet the needs of young people from the physical, emotional, social and spiritual aspects of their lives. With this mission in mind, the DBYF works to provide leadership and to foster cooperation rather than competition among existing youth-serving organizations. Its efforts are aimed at creating awareness in Colorado communities about youth needs and at helping address those needs with available time and money.

The DBYF is funded by a broad base of public support which includes individuals and corporations. The Foundation enlists the support and resources of media, school districts, state and local governments, service clubs, para-church groups, and other youth organizations to address issues which impact primarily middle and high school age kids. The Youth Foundation focuses on four particular areas including drug and alcohol programs, educational programs, leadership programs and inner-city programs.

The DBYF enjoys a unique position around the State of Colorado through its affiliation with the Broncos. By utilizing the energy and enthusiasm for the Broncos name, the DBYF is able to capture the attention and imagination of local youth and youth leaders and focus community awareness on contemporary adolescent issues. Admittedly, no single organization can meet all the needs of young people; but the DBYF aims to play a significant role by unifying separate efforts—locally and statewide—and helping to create specific plans to meet those needs.

The Youth Foundation is separate from the Football Club, but Denver Broncos' owner, Pat Bowlen is a DBYF Board member.



JIM RYAN President

September 1, 1992, Jim Ryan assumed the position as President of the Denver Broncos Youth Foundation from Randy Gradishar. Having been a board member for 3 years, he is well informed and personally concerned about the needs of Colorado's youth. He has also served on several boards and advisory groups such as Centennial Task Force for Drug Free Youth and the Executive Network. Being a professional

athlete requires determination and commitment. These attributes, coupled with his regard for the direction of today's youth, have influenced him to invest much of his time speaking to groups of young people on self-esteem and drug and alcohol awareness.

Jim graduated from the College of William and Mary in 1979 with a BA in Business Management. There he played football, where he received numerous honors. Ryan signed as a free agent with the Broncos in 1979 and embarked on a 10 year career. He was a starting linebacker for 7 years, missing only one game. As a highlight of his career, Ryan was voted MVP in 1987 at the AFC Championship game which took the Broncos to the Super Bowl. Jim is a charter member of the Alumni Council.

Jim and his wife, Sara, have three sons, Ben, Jonathan and Sam.

RING OF FAME

The Denver Broncos' Ring of Fame was inaugurated in 1984 to honor former players and administrators who played significant roles in Bronco history.

Linebacker Tom Jackson (1973-86) entered the Ring of Fame in 1992.

Linebacker Randy Gradishar (1974-83) was the only 1989 inductee into the Ring of Fame, while quarterback Craig Morton (1977-82), wide receiver Haven Moses (1972-81), and kicker Jim Turner (1971-79) were inducted in 1988.

Former defensive back Billy Thompson (1969-81) was honored in 1987 and three players joined the elite group in 1986, quarterbacks Frank Tripucka (1960-63) and Charley Johnson (1972-75), and defensive end Paul Smith (1968-78).

In 1985, former owner Gerald H. Phipps became the first non player to have his name placed on the Ring.

Four former players were the original Ring of Fame inductees, running back Floyd Little (1967-75), defensive end Rich Jackson (1967-72), wide receiver Lionel Taylor (1960-66), and safety Austin "Goose" Gonsoulin (1960-66).

The Ring of Fame is on the facade of Mile High Stadium's east stands, just below the third level.

MILE HIGH STADIUM

Mile High Stadium, home of the Denver Broncos, has been filled for every regular season game since and including the 1970 season, with the exception of two replacement games played during the 1987 player's strike (both games were sold out before the strike). The Broncos have sold out 171 consecutive non-strike regular season games, and with postseason contests the total reaches 180 over the 23-year period.

Expansion of the stadium, begun in 1975, was completed for the 1977 season to give the Broncos the seventh largest home facility in the league.

Denver voters passed a \$25 million bond issue in 1974 to expand and improve the stadium from its capacity of 51,706 to 75,100. The stadium held 63,532 for the 1976 season, halfway through the project.

Bringing the stadium capacity to its present 76,273 in 1986 was the construction of the Penthouse Suites atop the west stands. There are 60 luxury suites which seat 14, 16, or 24 fans each, accessed by private elevators and fully serviced for every Bronco home game.

Making Mile High Stadium unique, however, is its movable east stands. The east stands move in a single section which, when fully extended, is in a horseshoe configuration for football. When the section is retracted, the stadium is in position for baseball.

The dynamics involved in the move are fascinating. First, bear in mind that the east stands section is a three-tiered structure, 535 feet long, 135 feet tall and 200 feet deep, weighing nearly nine million pounds. Second, the stands must be moved a distance of 145 feet.

How is it done? The answer, says DMJM-Phillips-Reister, the engineering-architectural firm in charge of the project, is water.

More than 90,000 square feet of runways serve as the operating surfaces over which the stands will move. Water is pumped onto the runways and form a .003 inch sheet upon which the stands rest. Hydraulic rams then push the stands forward at the rate of three feet per minute, making the move last somewhere around two hours.

Originally called Bears Stadium, the facility was built in 1948 for the Denver Bears of baseball's old Western League, with long range plans to utilize it for football as well. When Denver became a charter member of the American Football League in 1959, the south stands (8,100 seats) and portable east stands (9,616 seats) were added to give a capacity of 34,657 for football.

After Denver voters turned down a stadium bond issue to build an all-purpose metropolitan stadium in 1967, a non-profit group began a fund-raising drive with the goal of purchasing the stadium for the city.

In February of 1968, the group bought the stadium from Rocky Mountain Empire Sports for \$1.8 million and presented it to the city of Denver. A 1 6,000-seat upper deck was immediately constructed over the west stands, raising the capacity to over 50,000 for the 1968 season. In December of 1968, the stadium was renamed Denver Mile High Stadium.



BRONCOS RADIO NETWORK

For the 24th consecutive season, Denver's 50,000-watt station KOA (850) will serve as the flagship station for the Denver Broncos game broadcast network.

Larry Zimmer is in his 23rd consecutive season as a member of the Broncos' broadcast team and his fourth handling play-by-play. He was the color commentator from 1971-89. Zimmer has been named the Colorado Sportscaster of the Year three out of the last five years, including 1991. He also does play-by-play for the University of Colorado football team.

Joining Zimmer on the broadcast is Dave Logan, who will provide color commentary for his fourth year as a part of the KOA announcers team. He played with the Cleveland Browns from 1976-83 and the Broncos in 1984, and has been active in Denver sports radio since leaving the NFL. Logan was named the Colorado Sportscaster of the Year for 1992.

When making requests for working press credentials, please allow time for mailing. Press credentials are normally issued approximately seven days before the game. Should transmission facilities be required, please arrange for same through local representatives.

As a general rule, the Denver Broncos do not issue any types of press credentials to weekly newspapers or magazines, unless they are of national circulation on specific assignment.

It is understood that all credentials will be used for the purpose for which they were issued, without exception. Violation of this policy will subject the bearer to ejection from Mile High Stadium.

WORKING PRESS: Admittance to the Broncos' press box is restricted to the WORKING PRESS ONLY. Credentials are marked with individual identification. Passes are non-transferable.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photographers are asked to take special note of the following conditions for use of press credentials, as set by the National Football League:

"This working credential is issued to an organization for the sole purpose of providing stadium access to an accredited individual who has a legitimate working function (media or game service) in connection with this game. It is non-transferable. Any unauthorized use of this credential subjects the bearer to ejection from the stadium and prosecution for criminal trespass.

Any secondary non-editorial use of any picture, film/tape or drawing of the game taken or made by the accredited organization or individual to whom this credential has been issued (including but not limited to use in advertising, sales promotion or merchandising) is prohibited without prior specific written approval of the National Football League. Additionally, television stations are prohibited from making available game film or tape to any other organization even though the planned use may be editorial in nature without advance written permission from the NFL or one of its member clubs. Such film or tape may be aired only by the specific station or entity to whom this credential is issued.

Television stations filming or taping NFL games recognize that any films or tapes may only be used in connection with a regularly scheduled television newscast within a seven-day period following the game and the film clip or taped portion of each such showing will not exceed two (2) minutes in length.

Additionally, television stations agree not to use more than six (6) minutes of filmed or taped "same-day" highlights from NFL games on any regularly scheduled news programs (i.e. no more than six minutes of highlights on Sunday night). This is the only exception to the two-minute limitation.

Television stations wishing to use NFL film or tape in any other manner must obtain written permission for such usage from National Football League films.

Acceptance of the credential constitutes agreement by the bearer and his organization to abide by the foregoing conditions. Thank you for your cooperation."

Sideline photo passes will be tightly controlled by the Public Relations Department and are generally limited to photographers shooting for a daily newspaper, wire service, or magazine of national circulation on specific assignment, or television station.

RADIO-TELEVISION: In making requests for broadcast credentials, please specify requirements for spotters and/or statisticians.

STADIUM ACCESS: To get to Mile High Stadium, which is located at 19th Avenue and Eliot Street, take Interstate 25 to the Mile High Stadium Exit(19th Avenue Exit). The Press Box is located on the West side of the stadium.

DRIVING INSTRUCTIONS TO MILE HIGH STADIUM FROM STAPLETON INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT: Exit airport on Quebec North and continue to Interstate 70. Take Interstate 70 West to Interstate 25 South, which will be a left lane exit. Continue West on Interstate 25 South until you come to Mile High Stadium Exit (19th Avenue Exit).

DRIVING INSTRUCTIONS TO STAPLETON INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT FROM MILE HIGH STADIUM: Take one of two routes depending on your parking lot location. You can take 20th Avenue East to Clay Street, turning left at Clay and proceeding to 23rd Avenue. Take a right at 23rd Avenue and continue to Interstate 25 entrances. Another route (Northbound) would be to take 17th Avenue East, which will continue beneath an overpass and will take you directly to Interstate 25 north. The alternate South bound route would be to take 17th Avenue East, turning left at Bryant Street and proceeding to the Interstate 25 South bound entrance, approximately two blocks.

TRANSMISSION FACILITIES: The Broncos provide five complimentary telephones in the visitors area of the working pressbox for use with VDT or telecopier equipment. Only collect, credit card or third party billing calls can be made from these telephones. MEDICAL GLOSSARY

AC Joint — Acromicclavicular joint; joint of the shoulder where acromion process of the scapula and the distal end of the clavicle meet; most shoulder separations occur at this point.

Abduct — Movement of any extremity away from the midline of the body. This action is achieved by an abductor muscle.

Abrasion - Any injury which rubs off the surface of the skin.

Abscess — An infection which produces pus; can be the result of a blister, callus, penetrating wound or laceration.

Adduct — Movement of an extremity toward the midline of the body. This action is achieved by an adductor muscle.

Adhesion — Abnormal adherence of collagen fibers to surrounding structures during immobilization following trauma or as a complication of surgery which restricts normal elasticity of the structures involved.

Aerobic — Exercise in which energy needed is supplied by oxygen inspired and is required for sustained periods of vigorous exercise with a continually high pulse rate.

Anabolic Steroids — Steroids that promote tissue growth by creating protein in an attempt to enhance muscle growth. The main anabolic steroid is testosterone (male sex hormone).

Anaerobic — Exercise without use of oxygen as an energy source; short bursts of vigorous exercises.

Anaphylactic Shock - Shock that is caused by an allergic reaction.

Anterior Compartment Syndrome — Condition in which swelling within the anterior compartment of the lower leg jeopardizes the viability of muscles, nerves and arteries that serve the foot. In severe cases, emergency surgery is necessary to relieve the swelling and pressure.

Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL) — A primary stabilizing ligament within the center of the knee joint that prevents hyperextension and excessive rotation of the joint. A complete tear of the ACL necessitating reconstruction could require up to 12 months of rehabilitation.

Anterior Talofibular Ligament — A ligament of the ankle that connects the fibula (lateral ankle bone) to the talus. This ligament is oft times subject to sprain.

Anti-Inflammatory — Any agent which prevents inflammation, such as aspirin or ibuprofen.

Anteriogram - A film demonstrating arteries after injection of a dye.

Arthrogram — X-ray technique for joints using air and/or dye injected into the affected area; useful in diagnosing meniscus tears of the knee and rotator cuff tears of the shoulder.

Anthroscope — An instrument used to visualize the interior of a joint cavity.

Arthroscopy — A surgical examination of the internal structures of a joint by means for viewing through an arthroscope. An arthroscopic procedure can be used to remove or repair damaged tissue or as a diagnostic procedure in order to inspect the extent of any damage or confirm a diagnosis.

Aspiration — The withdrawal of fluid from a body cavity by means of a suction or siphonage apparatus, such as a syringe.

Atrophy — To shrivel or shrink from disuse, as in muscular atrophy. Avascular Necrosis — Death of a part due to lack of circulation. Avulsion — The tearing away, forcibly, of a part or structure.

Baker's Cyst — Localized swelling of a bursa sac in the posterior knee as a result of fluid that has escaped from the knee capsule. A Baker's cyst indicates that there is a trauma inside the knee joint that leads to excessive fluid production.

Bone Scan — An imaging procedure in which a radioactive-labeled substance is injected into the body to determine the status of a bony injury. If the radioactive substance is taken up the bone at the injury site, the injury will show as a "hot spot" on the scan image. The bone scan is particularly useful in the diagnosis of stress fractures.

Brachial Plexus — Network of nerves originating from the cervical vertebrae and running down to the shoulder, arm, hand, and fingers.

Bruise — A discoloration of the skin due to an extravasation of blood into the underlying tissues.

Bursa — A fluid-filled sac that is located in areas where friction is likely to occur, then minimizes the friction; for example between a tendon and bone.

Capsule — An enclosing structure which surrounds the joint and contains ligaments which stabilize that joint.

Cartilage — Smooth, slippery substance preventing two ends of bones from rubbing together and grating.

CAT Scan — Use of a computer to produce a cross sectional view of the anatomical part being investigated from X-ray data.

Cellulitis - Inflammation of cellular or connective tissue.

Cervical Vertebrae — Group of seven vertebrae located in the neck

Charley Horse — A contusion or bruise to any muscle resulting in intramuscular bleeding. No other injury should be called a charley horse.

Colles' Fracture — A fracture of the distal end of the radium with the lower end being displaced backward.

Concentric Muscle Contraction — A shortening of the muscle as-it develops tension and contracts to move a resistance.

Concussion — Jarring injury of the brain resulting in dysfunction. It can be graded as mild, moderate or severe depending on loss of consciousness, amnesia and loss of equilibrium.

Contusion — An injury to a muscle and tissues caused by a blow from a blunt object

Cortical Steroids — Used to suppress joint inflammation. Costochondral — Cartilage that separates the bones within the rib cage. Cryokinetics — Treatment with cold and movement.

Degenerative Joint Disease — Changes in the joint surface as a result of repetitive trauma

Deltoid Ligament — Ligament that connects the tibia to bones of the medial aspect of the foot and is primarily responsible for stability of the ankle on the medial side. Is sprained less frequently than other ankle ligaments.

Deltoid Muscle — Muscles at top of the arm, just below the shoulder, responsible for shoulder motions to the front, side and back

Disc, Intelvertebral — A flat, rounded plate between each vertebrae of the spine. The disc consists of a thick fiber ring which surrounds a soft gel-like interior. It functions as a cushion and shock absorber for the spinal column.

Disc, Intervertebral — A flat, rounded plate between each vertebrae of the spine. This disc consists of a thick fiber ring which surrounds a soft gel-like interior. It functions as a cushion and shock absorber for the spinal column.

Dislocation — Complete displacement of joint surfaces.

Eccentric Muscle Contraction — An overall lengthening of the muscles as it develops tension and contracts to control motion performed by an outside force; oft times referred to a"negative" contraction in weight training.

Eccymosis — Bleeding into the surface tissue below the skin, resulting in a "black and blue" effect

Edema — Accumulation of fluid in organs and tissues of the body; swelling. **Effusion** — Accumulation of fluid, in various spaces in the body, or the knee itself. Commonly, the knee has an effusion after an injury.

Electrical Galvanic Stimulation (EGS) — An electrical therapeutic modality that sends a current to the body at select voltages and frequencies in order to stimulate pain receptors, disperse edema, or neutralize muscle spasms among other functional applications.

Electromyogran (EMG) — Test to determine nerve function. Epicondylitis — Inflammation in the elbow due to overuse.

Ethyl Chloride — "Cold spray, " a chemical coolant sprayed onto an injury site to produce a local, mild anesthesia.

Fat Percentage — The amount of body weight that is adipose, fat tissue. Fat percentages can be calculated by underwater weighing, measuring select skinfold thickness, or by analyzing electrical impedance.

Femur Thigh bone; longest bone in the body.

Fibula — Smaller of the two bones in the lower leg; runs from knee to the ankle along the outside of the lower leg.

Flexibility — The ability of muscle to relax and yield to stretch forces.

Flexibility Exercise — General term used to describe exercise performed by a player to passively or actively elongate soft tissue without the assistance of an athletic trainer.

Fracture — Breach of continuity of a bone. Types of fractures include simple, compound, comminuted, greenstick incomplete, impacted, longitudinal, oblique, stress, or transverse.

Gamekeeper's Thumb — Tear of the ulnar collateral ligament of the metacarpophalangeal joint of the thumb.

Glycogen — Form in which foods are stored in the body as energy.

Grade One Injury — A mild injury in which ligament, tendon, or other musculoskeletal tissue may have been stretched or contused, but not torn of otherwise disrupted.

Grade Two Injury — A moderate injury when musculoskeletal tissue has been partially, but not totally, torn which causes appreciable limitation in function of the injured tissue.

Grade Three Injury — A severe injury in which tissue has been significantly, and in some cases totally, torn or otherwise disrupted causing a virtual total loss of function.

Hamstring — Category of muscle that runs from the buttocks to the knee along the back of the thigh. It functions to flex the knee, and is oft times injured as a result of improper conditioning or lack of muscle flexibility.

Heat Cramps — Painful muscle spasms of the arms or legs caused by excessive body heat and depletion of fluids and electrolytes.

Heat Exhaustion — Mild form of shock due to dehydration because of excessive sweating when exposed to heat and humidity.

Heat Stroke — Condition of rapidly rising internal body temperature that overwhelms the body's mechanisms for release of heat and could result in death if not cared for appropriately.

Heel Cup — Orthotic device that is inserted into the shoe and worm under the heel to give support to the Achilles tendon and help absorb impacts at the heel. **Hematoma** — Tumor-like mass produced by an accumulation of coagu-

lated blood in a cavity.

Hot Pack — Chemical pack that rests in water, approximately 160 degrees, and retains its heat for 15-20 minutes when placed in a towel for general therapeutic application.

Humerus — Bone of the upper arm that runs from the shoulder to the elbow.

Hydrotherapy — Treatment using water.

Hyperextension - Extreme extension of a limb or body part

Iliotibial Band — A thick, wide fascial layer that runs from the iliac crest to the knee joint and is occasionally inflamed as a result of excessive running. Inflammation — The body's natural response to injury in which the injury site might display various degrees of pain, sweating, heat, redness, and/or loss of function.

Internal Rotation — Rotation of a joint or extremity medially, to the inside.

Lesion — Wound, injury or tumor.

Ligament — Band of fibrous tissue that connects bone to bone or bone to cartilage and supports and strengthens joints.

Lumbar Vertebrae — Five vertebrae of the lower back that articulate with the sacrum to form the lumbosacral joint

Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) — Imaging procedure in which a radio frequency pulse causes certain electrical elements of the injured tissue to react to this pulse and through this process a computer display and permanent film establish a visual image. MRI does not require radiation and is very useful in the diagnosis of soft tissue, disc, and meniscus injuries.

Meniscectomy — An intra-articular surgical procedure of the knee by which all or part of the damaged meniscus is removed.

Meniscus — Crescent shaped cartilage, usually pertaining to the knee joint; also known as "cartilage." There are two menisci in the knee, medial and lateral. These work to absorb weight within the knee and provide stability.

Metacarpals — Five long bones of the hand, running from the wrist to the fingers.

Metatarsals — Five long bones of the foot, running from the ankle to the toes.

Myositis — Inflammation of a muscle. Necrotic — Relating to death of a portion of tissue.

Neoprene — Lightweight rubber used in joint and muscle sleeves designed to provide support and/or insulation and heat retention to the area

Neuritis - Inflammation of a nerve.

Orthotic — Any device applied to or around the body in the care of physical impairment or disability, commonly used to control foot mechanics.

Parasthesia — Sensation of numbness or tingling, indicating nerve irritation.

Patella — The kneecap. The patella functions to protect the distal end of the femur as well as increase the mechanical advantage and force generating capacities of the quadriceps muscle group.

Patella Tendinitis — Inflammation of the patella ligament; also known as "jumpers knee."

Patellofemoral Joint — Articulation of the knee cap and femur. Inflammation of this joint can occur through: 1) acute injury to the patella, 2) overuse from excessive running particularly if there is an associated knee weakness, 3) chronic wear and tear of the knee, 4) as a result of poor foot mechanics. Patellofemoral irritation can lead to chondromalancia, which in its most chronic condition, could require surgery.

Peroneal Muscles — Group of muscles of the lateral lower leg that are responsible for everting the knee. Tendons of these three muscles are vital to the stability of the ankle and foot.

Phalanx — Any bone of the fingers or toes; plural is phalanges. Phlebitis — Inflammation of a vein.

Plica — Fold of tissue in the joint capsule and a common result of knee injury.

Posterior Cruciate Ligament (PCL) — A primary stabilizing ligament of the knee that provides significant stability and prevents displacement of the tibia backward within the knee joint. A complete tear of this ligament necessitating reconstruction could require up to 12 months of rehabilitation.

Quadricep Muscles "Quads" — A group of four muscles of the front thigh that run from the hip and form a common tendon at the patella; they are responsible for knee extension.

Radiography — Taking of X-rays.

Radius - Forearm bone on the thumb side.

Reconstruction — Surgical rebuilding of a joint using natural, artificial or transplanted materials.

Referred Pain — Pain felt in an undamaged area of body away from the actual injury.

Retraction — The moving of tissue to expose a part or structure of the body.

Rotator Cuff — Comprised of four muscles in the shoulder area that can be irritated by over use. The muscles are the supraspinatus (most commonly injured), infraspinatus, teres minor, and subscapularis.

Rotator Cuff Impingement Syndrome — A microtrauma or overuse injury caused by stress, and the four stages are: 1) Tendentious with temporary thickening of the bursa and rotator cuff; 2) Fiber dissociation in the tendon with permanent thickening of the bursa and scar formation; 3) A partial rotator cuff tear of less than 1 cm.; and 4) A complete tear of 1 cm. or more.

Sacrum — Group of five fused vertebrae located just below the lumbar vertebrae of the low back.

Scapula - Shoulder blade.

Sciatica — Irritation of the sciatic nerve resulting in pain or tingling running down the inside of the leg.

Sciatic Nerve — Major nerve that carries impulses for muscular action and sensations between the low back and thigh and lower leg; it is the longest nerve in the body.

Shin Splint — A catch-all syndrome describing pain in the skin that is not a fracture or tumor and cannot be defined otherwise.

Sorbothane — An energy absorbing polyurethane utilized in some foot orthotics to absorb shock forces of the foot.

Spasm (Theory) — Muscle soreness induced by exercise; is the result of reduced muscle blood flow, which results in pain.

Spleen — Large, solid organ responsible for the normal production and destruction of blood cells.

Spondylitis — Inflammation of one or more vertebrae.

Spondylolisthesis — Forward displacement of one vertebrae over another below it due to a developmental defect in the vertebrae.

Spondylosis - Abnormal vertebral fixation or immobility.

Sprain — Injury resulting from a stretch or twist of the joint and causes various degrees of stretch or tear of a ligament or other soft tissue at the joint. Sternum — The breast bone.

Steroids — Any one of a large number of hormone-like substances. See Anabolic steroids and cortical steroids

Strain — Injury resulting from a pull or torsion to the muscle or tendon that causes various degrees of stretch or tear to the muscle or tendon tissue.—

Stress Fracture — A hair-line type of break in a bone caused by overuse.

Stress X-ray — A continual X-ray taken when a portion of the body is

stressed to its maximum in order to determine joint stability. This is a test utilized in some ankle injuries.

Stretching — Any therapeutic maneuver designed to elongete shortened soft.

Stretching — Any therapeutic maneuver designed to elongate shortened soft tissue structures and thereby increase flexibility.

Subluxation — Partial dislocation of a joint The term usually implies that the joint can return to its normal position without formal reduction.

Talus — The ankle bone that articulates with the tibia and fibula to form the ankle joint.

Target Heart Rate — A pre-determined pulse to be obtained during exercise when circulation is working at full efficient capacities.

Tarsals — Group of seven bones of the foot consisting of the calnavicular, talus, cuboid and three cuneiform bones.

Temporomandibular Joint (TMJ) — The articulation of the jaw and skull; considered by some to be vital in resolution of injuries throughout the body.

Tendinities — Inflammation of the tendon and/or tendon sheath, caused by chronic overuse or sudden injury.

Tendon — Tissue that connects muscle to bone. Tennis Elbow — General term for lateral elbow pain.

Tennis Elbow — General term for lateral elbow pain.

Thoracic — Group of twelve vertegrae located in the thorax and articulate with the twelve ribs.

Thoracic Outlet Compression Syndrome — A neuro-vascular disorder of the upper extremity common in throwing.

Tibia — Larger of the two bones of the lower leg and is the weight-bearing bone of the shin.

Tomograph — A special type of X-ray apparatus that demonstrates an organ or tissue at a particular depth.

Trachea - The windpipe.

Trascutaneous Electrical Nerve Stimulator (TENS) — An electrical modality that sends a mild current through pads at the injury site which stimulates the brain to release the natural analgesic, endorphin.

Transverse Process — Small lateral projection off the right side and left side of each vertebrae that functions as an attachment site for muscles and ligaments of the spine.

Trapezius — Flat triangular muscle covering the posterior surface of the neck and shoulder.

Triceps — Muscle of the back of the upper arm, primarily responsible for extending the elbow.

Ulna — Forearm bone that runs from the tip of the elbow to the little finger side of the wrist.

Ultrasound — Nerve in elbow commonly irritated from excessive throwing. **Ultrasound** — An electrical modality that transmits a sound wave through an applicator into the skin to the soft tissue in order to heat the local area for relaxing the injured tissue and/or disperse edema.

Valgus — Angulation outward and away from the midline of the body.

Varus — Angulation inward and toward the midline of the body.

Vasoconstriction — Decrease of local blood flow.

Vasodilation - Increase of local blood flow.

"Wind Knocked Out" — Syndrome describing a contraction of the abdominal nerve truck, the solar plexus, as a result of an abdominal contusion.

Wrist — The junction between the two forearm bones (radius and ulna) and the eight wrist bones (trapezium, capitate, hamate, pisiform, triquetral, lunate and scaphoid).

Zygoma — The cheekbone.
