



Robert C. McNair is perhaps best known in the business community as the founder of Cogen Technologies, which was sold in 1999 to Enron Corp. Cogen was the largest privately owned cogeneration company in the world with aggregate capacity of 1,400 megawatts. Today, he retains ownership in a 345-megawatt plant in New York and a 50-megawatt plant in West Virginia.

Mr. McNair now serves as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of The McNair Group, headquartered in Houston, Texas, where he oversees an investment portfolio including cogeneration assets in the eastern United States. Mr. McNair also owns Palmetto Partners, Ltd., a private investment company that manages the McNairs' public and private equity investments, and is Chairman of the McNair Foundation. In June 2000, Mr. McNair formed a biotechnology capital fund, Cogene Biotech Ventures, where he serves as Chairman.

Committed to bringing a National Football League team to Houston, Mr. McNair formed Houston NFL Holdings in 1998. On October 6, 1999, the NFL announced that the 32nd NFL franchise had been awarded to Mr. McNair, returning football to the City of Houston in the year 2002 and Super Bowl XXXVIII in 2004. On September 6, 2000, at an event held in downtown Houston, Mr. McNair

announced the name of the NFL team - the Houston Texans.

Mr. McNair's two football-related hires have been lauded throughout the league. He hired former Washington Redskins general manager Charley Casserly within three months of securing the franchise. Casserly helped build three Super Bowl winners over a 23-year career in Washington. Mr. McNair then hired Dom Capers as the first head coach of the Texans. Capers previously served as head coach of the expansion Carolina Panthers, leading them to the NFC Championship Game in just their second season of existence.

Stonerside Stable, a major thoroughbred horse farm in Kentucky, is also among the latest McNair successes. A 1,500-acre thoroughbred horse farm and racing stable, Stonerside is home to more than 150 racehorses, broodmares, yearlings and weanlings. In 1999 Mr. McNair was elected to the Board of Directors of the Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders Association and in 2001 to the Board of the Breeders' Cup.

Mr. McNair is a current or past member of the Boards of Trustees of a number of institutions including Rice University, Baylor College of Medicine, the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston Grand Opera, the Greater Houston Partnership,



the Free Enterprise Institute and the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas.

Mr. McNair is a member of the Texas Business Hall of Fame and a recipient of the Anti-Defamation League's Torch of Liberty Award, the Northwood University Outstanding Business Leader Award and the Association for Private Enterprise Education's Herman W. Lay Memorial Award. He recently received the Distinguished American Award from the Houston Chapter of the National Football Foundation and the Distinguished Citizen Award from the Rotary Club of Houston. In April 2002 The South Main Center Association presented McNair with the

prestigious City Builder Award. He also is a founder of the Cotswold project, a revitalization project focused on downtown Houston.

Born in Tampa, Fla., Mr. McNair has been a resident of Houston since 1960. He graduated from the University of South Carolina in Columbia in 1958 with a Bachelor of Science degree. In 1999, Mr. McNair received an honorary doctor of humane letters degree from the University of South Carolina. He is an Elder at Memorial Drive Presbyterian Church. McNair and his wife, Janice, have four grown children and 12 grandchildren.



Philip Burguières, one of Houston's most innovative leaders, serves as Vice Chairman of the Houston Texans.

Burguières also serves as Chairman and CEO of EMC Holdings, LLC, an investment management company specializing in oil services and exploration and production industries. Additionally, he serves as Chairman Emeritus of Weatherford International, an international energy company. Until 1996, Burguières was Weatherford International's Chairman and Chief Executive Officer.

Prior to joining Weatherford in 1990, Burguières was Chairman, President and Chief Executive Officer of Panhandle Eastern Corporation. He worked for 20 years at Cameron Iron Works, Inc., an international oil service company, where he served as Chairman and CEO for ten years.

Burguières is also on the board of directors at McDermott International, Newfield Exploration Company and J.P. Morgan Chase. He also serves as Chairman of the Board of Directors of The J.M. Burguières Co., Ltd. (a family-owned limited

partnership). He is a member of the National Petroleum Council and the World's Presidents' Organization and is past president of the Petroleum Club of Houston and the Petroleum Equipment Suppliers Association and past chairman of the National Ocean Industries Association. In May of 2000, Burguières was awarded the prestigious Ima Hogg Award from the Mental Health Association of Greater Houston. He is a Director of Catholic Charities, The Mental Health Association, M.D. Anderson Cancer Hospital and The Texas Heart Institute.

A native of Franklin, La., Burguières graduated with a bachelor's of science degree in mechanical engineering from the University of Louisiana, where a Chair in the engineering department has been named in his honor. He was a recipient of his alma mater's Outstanding Alumni Award in 1992. He served in the U.S. Navy for four years, reaching the rank of Lieutenant. Burguières received his master's in business administration from the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Business. He and his wife Cheryl have two children.

Vice Chairman

Chuck Watson, one of the Texans' limited partners, also serves as the club's Vice Chairman along with Philip Burguières

Watson was the chairman and chief executive officer of Dynegy Inc. He established NGC Corp., Dynegy's predecessor, in 1985 and served as president until becoming chairman and chief executive officer in 1989.

Watson serves on the National Petroleum Council and is a member of the Texas Governor's Business Council. He is a board member of Baker Hughes Inc. and a founding member of the Natural Gas Council. Watson is a board member and serves on the executive committee of Edison Electric Institute (EEI) and is on the Board of Trustees for the Baylor College of Medicine. In June of 2001, Watson was named Master Entrepreneur of the Year by Ernst & Young and in October of 2001, Watson was inducted into the Texas Business Hall of Fame.

Educated in business and economics at Oklahoma State University, Watson served as chairman, trustee and governor of the OSU Foundation. He is a board member of Theater Under the Stars, Houston 2012 Foundation, Hobby Center for the Performing Arts, and the Greater Houston Partnership. He served as the chairman of the Alexis de Tocqueville Society 1998-99 Campaigns for the United Way of the Texas Gulf Coast and as citywide chairman of the United Way's 1999-2000 fundraising campaign.

Watson and his wife, Kim, have also served as co-chairpersons of several community organizations and currently are co-chairs of the Cypress Creek Foundation for the Arts and Community Enrichment. In 1998, Child Advocates named the Watsons "Family of the Year." The Watsons have three children and have been Houston residents for the past 21 years.



Starting from scratch? Charley Casserly's been there.

It was 1977 and Casserly jumped out of bed one morning in a cold sweat. The 27-year-old had quit his job as a high school teacher and coach in Wilbraham, Massachusetts. He had agreed to take a one-year internship with the Washington Redskins that paid nothing and didn't guarantee a full-time job at its conclusion. Plus, Casserly had no furniture, just \$500 in the bank and 120,000 miles on his car.

"I was wondering 'What on earth have I done?'" Casserly says. "But I had already quit my job. There was no turning back. I had to go."

Casserly headed to Redskin Park, got a room at an area YMCA for eight bucks a night and went about his work. He scouted, broke down film, cut players, fetched George Allen a milkshake from time to time, anything that the legendary head coach asked him to do. After the season concluded, Casserly declined an offer to move to the Los Angeles Rams with Allen and accepted a scouting position with Washington. Four years later, the Redskins promoted him to assistant general manager and the club went on to capture Super Bowl XVII. In 1990, he was elevated to general manager, a position he held for 10 years. Not bad for a high school coach who 23 years ago was just looking to get his foot in the door.

Now Casserly gets to start from scratch again and it's a challenge that he eagerly embraces. On January 19, 2000, Casserly

was named Senior Vice President/ General Manager of Houston's NFL expansion franchise. He heads all football operations for the NFL's newest team.

"We are so fortunate to be able to attract a world-class football man like Charley Casserly," Texans founder Bob McNair says. "Charley did it all with the Redskins -- he assembled playoff teams and Super Bowl champions. His knowledge of the NFL and football personnel is impeccable. We really did our homework and talked to many owners, general managers and coaches in the NFL about Charley. Quite simply, they all raved about his abilities and his knowledge."

"This is an exciting time for this franchise and an exciting time for the city of Houston," Casserly says. "Bob McNair was aggressive in landing this expansion club and we will be equally aggressive in building this team. Football is a vital part of Houston's heritage. And by starting a team from scratch, we are offering something that our fans will relate to. They can watch us develop from an expansion club getting its feet wet to a legitimate championship contender."

Over his 23 years with the Redskins, Casserly was known for his tireless work ethic and a keen eye for football talent. Washington went to four Super Bowls during his tenure, winning three. Most recently, Casserly is largely credited for assembling the Redskins roster that captured the 1999 NFC Eastern Division title. In addition, his personnel acumen allowed the Redskins to stockpile three first-round

draft choices in the April 2000 draft and utilize a substantial amount of cap room to sign free agents. After leaving the Redskins, Casserly worked for NFL Films and ESPN Radio.

Casserly's abilities and intense knowledge of the game were chief reasons why NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue appointed him to the NFL's prestigious Competition Committee. While serving as GM of the Redskins, Casserly's work on the committee was a driving force behind the revival of instant replay in the NFL.

During his early years with the Redskins as a scout, Casserly unearthed free agents Joe Jacoby and Jeff Bostic, who were original members of the famed "Hogs" offensive line and key components of Washington's first two Super Bowl teams. Jacoby was selected to four Pro Bowls and Bostic made one trip to Honolulu.

In 1987, Casserly faced perhaps the biggest challenge of his Redskins career when NFL players went on strike. League owners decided on replacement players, sending personnel men scrambling to fill roster spots. With about a week to assemble a full complement of replacement players, Casserly put together a team that won all three of its games before the strike ended, including a Monday Night win against a Dallas team that featured a number of its star players. That experience was the subject of the Warner Bros. feature film, "The Replacements," starring Keanu Reeves and Gene Hackman.

When he was elevated to general manager in 1990, Casserly sustained the Redskins' history of uncovering high-quality players in the later rounds of the draft. He used a fifth-round pick in 1990 to select Southwest Louisiana quarterback Brian Mitchell. Washington then converted Mitchell to a running back/kick returner, where he later joined Jim Brown as the only players in NFL history to lead the league in combined net yards four times. In 1996, Casserly plucked Auburn running back Stephen Davis in the fourth round. Davis paced the NFC in rushing in 1999 with 1,450 yards. In 1997, Casserly tabbed Texas A&M wide receiver Albert Connell in the fourth round. Connell enjoyed a breakthrough 1999 campaign with 62 catches for 1,132 yards.

And during the 1999 off-season, Casserly made moves that immediately benefited the Redskins, First, he traded three draft choices to Minnesota signal-caller Brad Johnson. The eight-year veteran responded with a Pro Bowl season, throwing for 4,005 yards and 24 TDs. Casserly then fired the shot heard 'round the league on draft day, acquiring all of the New Orleans Saints' 1999 selections, plus their first and third-round picks in 2000. To do so, Casserly simply swapped the Redskins' fifth selection in the first round for New Orleans' 12th choice. He still managed to obtain the player that Washington wanted, ultimately selecting Georgia cornerback Champ Bailey with the seventh pick in the first round. In part for those efforts, Sports Illustrated, Pro Football Weekly and USA Today named Casserly their Executive of the Year.

Casserly is determined to build a similar track record in Houston. He has already crafted one of the league's best scouting staffs.

"The scouting staff is crucial for any expansion franchise," Casserly says. "Mr. McNair has provided us the means to assemble one of the most experienced staffs in the NFL. Seven of our scouts have worked more than 20 years in the league. Every scout with NFL experience has been on a division winner or a playoff team. Eight scouts have been to a Super Bowl."

The Texans have also hired a proven head coach in Dom Capers, who previously





guided the expansion Carolina Panthers to the NFC Championship Game in just their second season.

"I've always been an admirer of Dom Capers," Casserly says. "Dom has the unique experience of having gone through an expansion franchise but that isn't why we hired him. We hired him because he's an excellent football coach and he had great success with an expansion franchise."

In all, Casserly can boast a football staff with 28 Super Bowl rings. That is not by accident. "You win with people," Casserly says.

Those people include players, and Casserly helped build a solid foundation for the Texans in the expansion draft, acquiring four Pro Bowlers and nine starters among the team's 19 selections. "I am very impressed with how this organization has been put together from top to bottom," NFL.com's Gil Brandt wrote on the day of the expansion draft. "I don't know how it could have been done any better."

Houston further boosted its talent base by signing a solid core of unrestricted free agents and selecting 12 players in the col-

lege draft, including Fresno State quarterback David Carr, the top overall selection. In all, the Texans can expect 90 players for their first training camp, putting preparation at a premium for Casserly.

"In putting this organization together, you have to do the best job you possibly can," Casserly says. "We're not going to have the continuity with players at the outset so we'll need a solid organization to maintain us through a changing situation."

Casserly began his career as an assistant coach at Cathedral High School in Spring-field, Massachusetts, from 1969-72 before moving to a similar post at his alma mater, Springfield (MA) College from 1973-74. He returned to Cathedral High School to serve as the school's athletic director for two years before becoming head football coach at Minnechaugh High School from 1975-76. He holds a bachelor's degree in education and a master's degree in guidance from Springfield College, where he also played football. He is a member of the Springfield College Sports Hall of Fame.

A native of River Edge, N.J., Casserly and his wife of 22 years, Beverley, have a daughter, Shannon, who is attending Southern Methodist University. The family lives in Houston.





STEVE PATTERSON

Senior Vice President and Chief Development Officer



As senior vice president and chief development officer of

the Houston Texans, Steve Patterson oversees all of the club's negotiations for the lease, design, financing and construction of Reliant Stadium. He is also the driving force in planning and implementing the design and construction for the Texans training facility and related infrastructure.

Reliant Stadium, Houston's new 1.9 million square foot state-of-the-art sports showcase, boasts the world's first retractable fabric roof football stadium with a grass playing surface. The roof can open and close to adjust to weather conditions, resulting in year-round, climate-controlled comfort.

Patterson joined Houston NFL Holdings in September 1997 to help lead Bob McNair's efforts to bring the NFL to Houston after spending more than three years as president, general manager and governor of the Houston Aeros of the International Hockey League. Under Patterson's leadership, the Aeros doubled the previous league record for season tickets sold and ticket revenue while setting additional marks for ticket and merchandise sales. For his efforts, Patterson was named the 1995 winner of the Andy Mulligan Trophy as the league's Executive of the Year.

In addition to his roles with the Aeros, Patterson also served as the president of and partner in the Arena Operating Company, which manages and operates Compaq Center, Houston's premier sports and entertainment facility. He coordinated the six-year, \$7.5 million naming rights and

sponsorship deal with the Compaq Computer Corporation and the \$5 million renovation of the arena.

Patterson joined the Aeros following a nine-year stint with the NBA Houston Rockets, during which he was the chief architect of the 1993-94 Rockets squad that captured the first World Championship in franchise history. Patterson was the club's general manager and alternate governor from 1989-93. Patterson led the club's successful bid to host the 1989 NBA All-Star Game, which still holds the all-time attendance record of 44,735. In 1992, he negotiated, produced and promoted the NBA's first games in Mexico, drawing sellout crowds of more than 19,500 to the Sports Palace in Mexico City.

Born and raised in Beaver Dam, Wis., Patterson graduated with honors from the University of Texas Business School in 1980 and UT Law School in 1984.

Patterson currently sits on the Board of Texas Special Olympics and the Sam Houston Area Boy Scouts. He is a member of the State Bar of Texas and the American Bar Association, the Sports Lawyers Association and the Texas Lyceum.

He and his wife, Yasmin, are the parents of two sons, Austin and Dylan, and a daughter, Leila.


Marilan Logan joined the Texans as the team's controller in Feb-

Dom Capers built a gridiron winner where stock car racing and college basketball reign supreme. Now he takes another shot in a place where football is king.

And while he knows the task ahead is a daunting one, the Texans head coach is determined to see it through.

"I look at this job as not only an exciting opportunity but also a tremendous challenge," he says. "I know the type of work that's involved in building an expansion team. You have to work hard, have a plan and not take shortcuts.

"What really impresses me about Bob McNair is that he has a vision for the Texans. He understands that we have to earn the right to win in this league and it doesn't happen overnight."

The Texans introduced Capers as their first head coach on Jan. 21, 2001. The former Carolina Panthers head coach signed a six-year contract.

Capers served as the defensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars during the 1999 and 2000 seasons. Prior to his stint in Jacksonville, he spent four seasons as head coach of the Panthers, guiding that expansion franchise from its infancy to a playoff berth.

"Dom's experience with an expansion team at Carolina played a significant role in this decision," McNair says. "He did a remarkable job with the Panthers and has

a reputation throughout this league as a strong tactician and motivator.

"Our plan was to wait until 2001 to hire a head coach. But we soon determined that Dom was the perfect fit and you have to strike while the iron is hot."

Capers compiled a 30-34 record in four seasons with the Panthers. The Panthers' 7-9 record set an NFL mark for most victories by an expansion team. Carolina also posted the first four-game winning streak in expansion history, the first winning home record by an expansion club and the first win over a defending Super Bowl champion (San Francisco) in expansion annals.

In 1996, the Panthers shook up the league by winning their final seven regular-season games, resulting in a 12-4 record and the NFC West title. Carolina then defeated defending Super Bowl champion Dallas in the divisional playoffs before bowing to Green Bay in the NFC Championship Game at Lambeau Field. The Panthers, riding a defensive unit that ranked second in the league in points allowed, posted a 9-0 home record (including playoffs). Eight Panthers played in the Pro Bowl. Capers was named Coach of the Year by the Associated Press, among numerous other honors.

"I've always been an admirer of Dom Capers," Texans general manager Charley Casserly says. "Dom has the unique experience of having gone through an expansion franchise but that isn't why we hired him. We hired him because he's an excellent football coach and he had great success with an expansion franchise."

The Panthers posted records of 7-9 and 4-12 the next two seasons, resulting in Capers' dismissal. The Jaguars signed him six weeks later and the hiring paid immediate dividends.

Under Capers, the Jaguars improved from 25th in the NFL in total defense in 1998 to fourth in 1999. Jacksonville also yielded the fewest points (217) in the NFL, an average of 13.6 points per game. Since the advent of the 16-game schedule in 1978, only 11 teams had allowed fewer points in a season. Capers' unit set club records for sacks (57) and interceptions (19), while tying the team mark record for takeaways (30). Three Jaguars defenders made the AFC Pro Bowl squad (DE Tony Brackens, LB Kevin Hardy and S Carnell Lake), marking the first time any Jacksonville defensive player had earned a trip to Honolulu. Capers was named NFL Assistant Coach of the Year by Pro Football Writers of America/Pro Football Weekly and USA Today. In 2000, the Jaguars ranked 12th in the league in total defense and again tied the club single-season record for takeaways with 30.

Capers arrived in Houston one year before the Texans began building their roster, a luxury he did not have in Charlotte. The early start enabled him to quickly tab former Browns head coach Chris Palmer as his offensive coordinator and develop a working relationship with Houston's veteran scouting staff.

"I do think it's been an advantage to arrive a year early," Capers says. "There are just so many things you have to address when you're starting from the ground level that you wouldn't necessarily have to address with an existing team. Everything we're doing, we're doing for the first time so it's critical that we have everything spelled out in all areas of our operation." Capers' attention to detail is legendary in league circles. He has recorded the date, time and details about every event in his day since his late father, Eugene, gave him his first leather-bound notebook for Christmas in 1981.

"He was my toughest critic, but also my biggest supporter," Capers says. "And he always believed that you got back out of things what you put into them. If you come in every day, expend all the energy you have and do things right, opportunities will present themselves.

"Since the first day I started coaching, that's the approach I've tried to take."

Capers cut his NFL teeth with veteran NFL head coach Jim Mora. After winning two USFL titles with the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars, Mora accepted the Saints' head coaching position in 1986 and brought Capers along with him as defensive backs coach. Capers served in that capacity through the 1991 season, helping the Saints to the first three playoff berths in franchise history.

Capers has helped four different teams lead the league in sacks and rank either first or second in scoring defense.

Capers then accepted the defensive coordinator's post with the Pittsburgh Steelers, helping the team win two AFC Central titles. In his three seasons with the Steelers, no team in the NFL yielded fewer touchdowns. LB Greg Lloyd and CB Rod Woodson made three consecutive trips to the Pro Bowl under Capers' watch.

Capers began his coaching career in 1972 at Kent State, where he was a graduate

The Texans named former Cleveland Browns head coach Chris Palmer as the team's first offensive coordinator on February 2, 2001.

Palmer spent the previous two seasons as head coach of the expansion Browns, leading Cleveland to a 2-14 mark in its inaugural season and an injury-ravaged club to a 3-13 record in 2000.

"We're fortunate to get a person with Chris Palmer's experience and background," Texans head coach Dom Capers says. "Not only is he an outstanding coach and offensive coordinator, but his experience going through the expansion process the last two years will also be of great value to us."

Palmer, a 13-year NFL coaching veteran, is best known for developing quarter-backs, including Browns fourth-year QB Tim Couch, the top pick in the 1999 NFL Draft.

Palmer spent the 1997 and 1998 seasons as the offensive coordinator on Tom Coughlin's staff in Jacksonville. He helped the Jaguars claim the AFC Central Division title in 1998 as the club approached the 400-point mark in both seasons (394 in 1997, 392 in 1998).

Palmer served as an instrumental tutor to Pro Bowl QB Mark Brunell, who has developed into one of the most explosive

quarterbacks in the NFL. In 1997, Brunell led the AFC with a 91.2 passer rating and made the Pro Bowl. But Palmer's influence on Jacksonville's other young signal-callers was also evident. Five Jaguars QBs (Brunell, Rob Johnson, Steve Matthews, Jamie Martin and Jonathan Quinn) won at least one game for Jacksonville under Palmer's guidance.

Prior to joining the Jaguars in 1997, Palmer spent four seasons on Bill Parcells' staff in New England. As the Patriots' quarterbacks coach in 1996, Palmer retooled the mechanics of Drew Bledsoe, who ended the season leading the NFL in passing attempts and completions and finishing third in passing yards and touchdowns. The Patriots defeated Jacksonville in the AFC Championship Game to advance to the Super Bowl for the first time in 11 years and Bledsoe made his second Pro Bowl. When Palmer was the Patriots' wide receivers coach in 1994, the team set an NFL first when five different players caught more than 50 passes.

Palmer's first NFL coaching experience came with the Houston Oilers, where he was wide receivers coach from 1990-92 under Jack Pardee. During Palmer's three-year stay in Houston, the Run 'N Shoot Oilers boasted the top-ranked passing offense in the NFL. Four Oilers wide receivers - Curtis Duncan, Ernest Givins (twice), Drew Hill and Haywood Jeffires (twice) - made the Pro Bowl during

Palmer's three seasons in Houston.

Palmer was the head coach at Boston University from 1988-89, installing the Run 'N Shoot offense and producing one of the country's most prolific units. He was the head coach at the University of New Haven in 1986 and 1987, where the Chargers posted consecutive 8-2 records and set more than 50 school records.

Palmer's first professional coaching experience came in 1983 when he was the offensive line coach for the Montreal Concordes in the Canadian Football League. In 1984, he coached receivers for the USFL's New Jersey Generals, and the following season he was promoted to quarterbacks coach and offensive coordinator. That year, Palmer's offense featured QBs Doug Flutie and Brian Sipe and RB Herschel Walker, who set a professional football single-season rushing record with 2,411 yards.

Palmer launched his coaching career as an assistant at the University of Connecticut in 1972, coaching the defensive line and wide receivers. In 1975, he moved to Lehigh as the wide receivers coach. The following season he was named the offensive coordinator at Colgate, where he coached for seven years (1976-82). In 1977, the Red Raiders led the nation in offense, averaging 486 yards per game.

Palmer played quarterback for Southern Connecticut State from 1968-71 and was selected to the New Haven Gridiron Club following his senior season. He earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees at SCSU, where he was recently inducted into the school's athletic hall of fame. He is also a member of the hall of fame at the University of New Haven and Immaculate High School.

A native of Brewster, N.Y., Palmer and his wife, Donna, have two children, Mark and Kristin, and one granddaughter, Annette Grace. The couple lives in Houston.

Vic Fangio enters his first season as defensive coordinator for the Houston Texans after serving in the same capacity for the Indianapolis Colts the past three seasons. Fangio is thus reunited with Texans head coach Dom Capers - he served as Carolina's defensive coordinator during Capers' four-year stint as head coach of the Panthers.

Fangio tutored a young defense that helped the Colts post a 29-19 record over three seasons with two playoff berths and one AFC East title after the club was 6-26 the previous two seasons. In his first season in Indianapolis, the Colts jumped from 29th in the league to 15th in total defense. His 2000 defense racked up 42 sacks, the most for the Colts in 11 years, and ranked 15th in points allowed.

Fangio orchestrated one of the league's more fearsome units in Charlotte, helping the Panthers win the NFC West title in just their second season. In 1995, the expansion Panthers tied for seventh in the NFL in total defense and ranked sixth in scoring defense, 10th in rushing defense, fifth in takeaways and second in defensive passer rating. Fangio's defense allowed just 218 points in 1996, ranking second in the NFL as Carolina posted a 12-4 mark. That unit also ranked 10th in total defense, first in third down defense, first in sacks, second in first downs allowed and fifth in takeaways. The Panthers yielded just five touchdowns and 56 points in the second

half, breaking Chicago's 1985 record of 71 points. Fangio's 1997 unit ranked seventh in points allowed, sixth in first downs allowed and ninth in pass defense. His 1998 group ranked seventh in the NFL in takeaways.

Like Capers, Fangio cut his professional coaching teeth under veteran NFL head coach Jim Mora, his head coach in Indianapolis. Mora hired Fangio as a defensive assistant for the USFL's Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars in 1984. After winning two USFL titles, Fangio followed Mora to the New Orleans Saints as outside linebackers coach for eight seasons. He spent 1994 as the Saints' linebackers coach. During his tenure in the Crescent City, Fangio helped five different linebackers - Rickey Jackson, Vaughn Johnson, Sam Mills, Pat Swilling and Renaldo Turnball - reach a combined 16 Pro Bowls. The Saints' defense cracked the league's top 10 in total defense four times and the NFL's top 10 in rushing defense six times, including a first-place finish in 1989. New Orleans advanced to the playoffs for the first time in 1987, making return trips in 1990, 1991 and 1992.

Fangio launched his coaching career in 1979 at his alma mater, Dunmore (PA) High School, coaching linebackers for one season before becoming defensive coordinator. He was defensive coordinator at Milford Academy in 1982 before moving on to the University of North Carolina, where he coached for one season. Fangio was inducted into the Northeast Chapter of the Pennsylvania Hall of Fame in 1993.

Joe Marciano enters his first season as special teams coordinator for the Houston Texans after spending the previous six seasons in the same capacity for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Regarded as one of the league's top coaches in his field, Marciano has directed special teams for 16 NFL seasons.

In Houston, Marciano is reunited with Dom Capers, with whom he spent his first nine professional coaching seasons, and his brother, Tony, who will serve as the Texans offensive line coach.

Under Marciano, the Bucs boasted one of the NFC's most consistent special teams units. Tampa Bay blocked 20 kicks, registered nine of the 10 longest punt and kickoff returns in club annals and recorded 10 NFC Special Teams

Player of the Week awards during his six seasons.

Kicker Martin Gramatica, who signed a seven-year extension with Tampa Bay during the off-season, posted remarkable numbers during his first three NFL seasons. Gramatica nailed 84 of 101 field goal attempts (counting playoffs) and earned a Pro Bowl berth in 2000, breaking his own club single-season records in points scored (126), field goals (28), consecutive field goals (16), 50-plusyard field goals (5) and extra points (42). Also in 2000, Tampa Bay set a team mark and tied a league mark by blocking seven kicks (four field goals, three punts), returning two for touchdowns.

In 1999, starting linebacker Shelton Quarles broke a 10-year Bucs single-





season record with 31 special teams tackles. Punter Mark Royals finished third in the NFC with a franchise-best gross average of 43.13 yards. Royals' net average of 37.4 ranked second in the conference. Meanwhile, Gramatica set single-season team marks in points (106) and field goals (27), hitting 84.4 percent of his field goal attempts. Tampa Bay opponents averaged just 17.6 yards per kickoff return, which set a club record for lowest opponent kickoff return average.

In 1998, Marciano's charges set singleseason club marks in both kickoff return average (23.7) and punt return average (13.7). In 1997, wide receiver Karl Williams finished as the NFC's secondleading punt returner and the Bucs finished first in the NFL in opponent net punting and opponent field goal percent-

Marciano joined the Bucs after spending the previous 10 years as the special teams coach for the New Orleans Saints. For the first nine of those campaigns, he also coached the team's tight ends. In 1995, the Saints ranked third in the league in lowest punt return average allowed (6.5) and sixth in lowest kickoff return average permitted (19.8). During Marciano's New Orleans tenure, he coached three special teams players who were selected for the Pro Bowl (Morten Andersen, Tyrone Hughes, Bennie Thompson).

Marciano's first professional football job came as the special teams/tight ends coach for the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars of the USFL, helping the club win two league championships. Marciano joined the Stars after spending 1982 as the tight ends/special teams coach at Temple.

In 1981, Marciano tutored the tight ends for Joe Paterno at Penn State. There, he coached future NFL offensive lineman

Ron Heller who played TE for the Nittany Lions. Marciano also coached tight ends at Villanova (1980) and Rhode Island (1978-79). He began his college coaching career overseeing the tight ends at East Stroudsburg University in 1977. Marciano coached at Wyoming Area High School in West Pittston, Pa., in 1976.

A native of Dunmore, Pa., Marciano was a quarterback at Temple, where he earned his bachelor's degree in health and physical education. He is an avid fisherman who has conducted various fishing tournaments and has appeared on numerous ESPN fishing shows. In 1993, Marciano was inducted into the Northeast Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame. He is single and now resides in Houston with his son, Joseph.

Kippy Brown enters his first season as wide receivers coach for the Houston

Texans. Brown, a 10-year NFL coaching veteran, most recently served as head coach of the XFL's Memphis Maniax.

Prior to his stint in Memphis, Brown spent one season with the Green Bay Packers as their running backs coach, helping Ahman Green break through with his first 1,000vard rushing campaign.

Before arriving in Green Bay, Brown spent four seasons with the Miami Dolphins under Jimmy Johnson, the final two seasons as offensive coordinator. Brown arrived in Miami as the running backs coach, helping Karim Abdul-Jabbar set a club rookie record with 1,116 rushing vards. In the process, Abdul-Jabbar became the first Dolphins back to crack the 1,000-yard barrier in 18 years. The following season, Abdul-Jabbar tied for the NFL lead in rushing touchdowns with 15.

Johnson elevated Brown to offensive coordinator in 1998, where he worked with future Hall of Fame quarterback Dan Marino. The Dolphins earned a wild card berth in both of Brown's seasons calling the plays.

Brown served one season as the running backs coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1995. Prior to that, he returned to the University of Tennessee, serving two seasons as the assistant head coach and wide receivers coach. The Volunteers outscored their opponents 847-383 over those two seasons en route to an 18-6 mark. Brown helped tutor future No. 1 draft pick Peyton Manning as a freshman.

Brown's first NFL coaching stop came in New York, where he spent three seasons (1990-92) as the running backs coach for the Jets. In 1991, the Jets ranked fifth in the league in rushing and advanced to the

playoffs for the first time in five seasons. Brown's initial stint at Tennessee was as wide receivers coach from 1983-89. He helped develop such prolific Vols receivers as Anthony Miller, Tim McGee, Alvin Harper and Carl Pickens. Prior to arriving in Knoxville, Brown coached wide receivers at Louisville, including future Dolphins standout Mark Clayton.

Brown launched his coaching career at his alma mater, Memphis State, coaching running backs in 1978 and wide receivers in 1979-80. Brown was a starter for the Tigers at quarterback. He graduated from MSU in 1977 with a degree in communications. Brown prepped at Sweetwater (TN) High School, leading his charges to the consecutive state titles in 1972-73.

A native of Memphis, Tenn., Brown and his wife, Deon, have two children, Jerome and Jennifer. The couple lives in Houston.

Grantham's charges registered 96 sacks over three seasons, helping the Colts post a 29-19 record and advance to the playoffs twice. Indianapolis' 10-win improvement from 1998 to 1999 marked the greatest one-season turnaround in league history. In 1999 and 2000, the Colts posted 56 sacks, the highest two-year total for the club since it moved to Indianapolis.

Prior to his stint in Indianapolis, Grantham served three seasons as the defensive line

coach at Michigan State. He added the title of assistant head coach in his final season in East Lansing. MSU ranked 19th in total defense in 1996 and 13th in 1997, making consecutive bowl trips.

Grantham spent six seasons (1990-95) at his alma mater, Virginia Tech, the final two as defensive line coach. In 1995, the resurgent Hokies ranked first nationally in rushing defense, fifth in scoring defense and 10th in total defense. Tech racked up 50 sacks en route to the Big East title and a Sugar Bowl triumph over Texas. Grantham coached defensive ends and inside linebackers from 1990-91 and defensive tackles from 1992-93.

Chick Harris enters his first season as runbacks ning coach for the

Houston Texans after spending the past seven seasons in the same capacity for the Carolina Panthers. Harris is thus reunited with Dom Capers, who hired Harris before the Panthers' inaugural season in 1995.

Harris can boast two decades of NFL coaching experience, which served him well in Charlotte, where injuries forced the Panthers to suit up a bevy of running backs, from Tshimanga Biakabutuka to Richard Huntley to Brad Hoover to Fred Lane to Anthony Johnson to Derrick Moore. Harris' attention to detail and encouragement helped each of those young backs succeed at the highest level. Harris helped Carolina set an expansion record with seven wins in 1995, then helped the Panthers reach the NFC Championship Game the following season.

Harris joined the Panthers after spending three seasons with the Rams in Los Angeles, the last season as offensive coordinator. In 1993, Harris helped rookie running back Jerome Bettis earn NFL Co-Rookie of the Year honors after rushing for 1,429 yards and seven touchdowns.

Prior to his stint with the Rams, Harris served nine seasons as the offensive backfield coach for the Seattle Seahawks. Seattle advanced to the AFC Championship Game in Harris' initial season and made three other playoff appearances during his tenure. In 1988, Harris helped Curt Warner establish a single-season franchise record with 1,481 rushing yards.

Harris launched his NFL coaching career with the Buffalo Bills in 1981, coaching two seasons. He entered the coaching profession at Colorado State in 1970, coaching three seasons before heading to Long Beach State. After one season with the 49ers, Harris joined the Detroit Wheels of the World Football League in 1974. He then moved on to the University of Washington, where he spent six seasons, helping the Huskies to two bowl wins, including a Rose Bowl triumph over Michigan.

Harris lettered in football and track at Northern Arizona, where he is a member of the Lumberiacks' athletic hall of fame. Linebackers Coach



Reggie Herring enters his first season as the linebackers coach for the

Houston Texans after serving as the defensive coordinator for Clemson the past five seasons. He signed on as the defensive coordinator at Ole Miss after the 2001 season before assuming his current post in Houston.

Before he was named defensive coordinator at Clemson, Herring tutored the Tigers' linebackers unit for three seasons and kept that position after taking over the entire defensive corps.

In 2000, Herring and his defense played a key role in the Tigers' 9-3 record and No. 14 national ranking. Clemson ranked 18th in the country against the rush and 23rd in scoring defense. Just one year earlier, Herring's defense led the ACC in quarterback sacks with a school record total (47) and also ranked 17th in the country in passing efficiency defense. That season, the Tigers faced five of the top eight-rated passers in the country.

In his five years as defensive coordinator, Clemson ranked in the Top 20 in the nation in rushing defense three times,

including a No. 6 ranking in 1997. Many players have flourished under Herring, including Keith Adams, a 2000 Butkus Award finalist who earned first-team All-America honors for two consecutive seasons while setting Clemson records for season tackles for loss (35), sacks (16) and tackles (186).

Prior to his eight-year stretch at Clemson, Herring was the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Texas Christian for two seasons. He previously spent six years at Auburn as linebackers coach, helping the Tigers reach five bowl games, including two Sugar Bowls (1988, 1989). Herring launched his coaching career in 1981 at Oklahoma State as a defensive graduate assistant. He was elevated to linebackers coach the following season, spending a total of five seasons in Stillwater and helping the team to three bowl games.

Herring was a three-year starter at line-backer at Florida State. In his four years with the Seminoles, FSU posted a 38-6 record while making three bowl appearances (two Orange, one Tangerine). He played on three FSU teams that finished the season with a top 15 AP ranking, including a No. 6 finish in 1979 and No. 5 finish in 1980. As a senior, Herring earned

Jon Hoke enters his first season as the Houston Texans defensive

backs coach after spending the past three seasons as defensive coordinator at the University of Florida.

Hoke replaced current University of Oklahoma head coach Bob Stoops at Florida in 1999, initially serving as defensive coordinator and secondary coach. In 2000, he added the title of assistant head coach.

Under Hoke, the Gators went to three consecutive New Year's Day bowl games (Citrus, Sugar, Orange), won the 2000 Southeastern Conference championship and finished as high as No. 3 in both national polls (2001). Hoke's ball-hawking defensive units forced 88 turnovers over three seasons.

Last season, Florida led the SEC in total defense, scoring defense, first downs allowed, passing efficiency defense and third-down conversion defense. UF ranked ninth nationally in total defense, fifth in scoring defense, 12th in rushing defense and 13th in passing defense - the only SEC school to rank in the top 15 in all four categories. The Gators yielded just 19 touchdowns, the fourth-fewest in the country, and only five aerial scores, tying

national champion Miami for fewest nationally.

In 2000, Hoke's defense led the country with 40 turnovers. His 1999 unit ranked ninth in the nation in rushing defense and paced the conference with 43 sacks.

Hoke arrived in Gainesville after five seasons tutoring the defensive backs at Missouri. The Tigers earned bowl bids (Holiday, Insight.com) in Hoke's last two seasons, thanks in large part to a defense that forced 48 turnovers, leading to 208 points. Hoke helped Mizzou rank 22nd in the nation in scoring defense in 1998, yielding UM's fewest points in 15 years. Hoke also coached the Tigers' kick block team, which blocked 11 extra points, seven punts and five field goals in his five seasons in Columbia.

Prior to coaching at Missouri, Hoke spent four years at Kent State, coaching defensive backs all four seasons and adding the title of defensive coordinator in his final season. He coached defensive backs and special teams at San Diego State from 1987-88 and launched his coaching career in the same capacity at Bowling Green in 1983, helping the Falcons win the Mid-American Conference title with an 11-0 mark in 1985.

Hoke was a four-year letterman at Ball State (1976-79), earning All-MAC honors





as a defensive back. He earned a bachelor's degree in physical education before playing in 11 games for the Chicago Bears in 1980.

A native of Kettering, Ohio, Hoke and his wife, Jody, have four children - Mallory, Kyle and twins Kendall and Carly. The family now lives in Houston.

Tony Marciano enters his first season as offensive line coach for

the Houston Texans after spending the past four seasons as tight ends coach for the Indianapolis Colts.

In his four seasons with the Colts, Marciano tutored one of the most productive tight end duos in the league in Marcus Pollard and Ken Dilger. Pollard posted a career-high 47 receptions for 739 yards and eight touchdowns in 2001. Dilger hauled in 150 passes and scored 18 times over his four seasons under Marciano. Both players earned their first trip to the Pro Bowl in February, though Pollard couldn't play due to injury.

Prior to his stint with the Colts, Marciano spent three seasons as the offensive line coach for the Canadian Football League's Calgary Stampeders, adding offensive coordinator duties for his final season. He spent the 1994 campaign as the offensive line coach for the Toronto Argonauts.

Before joining the professional coaching ranks, Marciano spent two years at Kent State as its assistant head coach/offensive line coach. He launched his college coaching career at Texas Christian, serving as the assistant offensive line coach for two seasons, as well as the strength and conditioning coach. Steve Marshall enters his first season as the assistant offensive line coach

for the Houston Texans after spending the past two years as the University of Colorado's offensive line coach. Marshall also led the Buffaloes' offensive field goal/PAT and kickoff return units on special teams.

Marshall's 2001 offensive line paved the way for CU's mammoth, 380 rushing-yard performance against then-No. 2 Nebraska in a 62-36 upset win in Boulder. Marshall's unit also played a key role in the Buffaloes' win over Texas in the Big 12 Championship the next week that sent Colorado to the Fiesta Bowl. Under Marshall, the offensive unit ranked eighth nationally in total rushing, 20th in total offense and was second in total offense in the Big 12 Conference.

Prior to his dual years in Colorado, Marshall spent two seasons as the North Carolina offensive coordinator and served as the instructor of the Tar Heels' offensive line. Although the North Carolina offensive unit was beset by injuries, he played a significant role as the team increased its scoring against six common opponents

from the previous year. Before his stint in Chapel Hill, Marshall served in the same capacity for Texas A&M during the 1997 season. He came to College Station from UCLA where he tutored the Bruins offensive line for one year.

From 1993-95, Marshall led the Tennessee offensive line and spent his last year as the team's offensive coordinator. He was also the running game coordinator from 1994-95. The Volunteers earned two bowl bids (Gator, Citrus), while Marshall's offensive line protected quarterback Peyton Manning and paved the way for running back James Stewart. It marked the second occasion in Marshall's 22-year collegiate coaching career that he spent time in Tennessee, the first being from 1980-81 when he served as a part-time assistant offensive line coach.

Before coaching at Tennessee, Marshall spent six seasons as the Virginia Tech offensive coordinator/offensive line coach under Frank Beamer, whom he served under in the same capacity at Murray State for two seasons prior to his stint with the Hokies. In 1984, Marshall led the offensive line and tights ends at his alma mater, the University of Louisville. Before his return to Louisville, Marshall coached the offensive line and kicking





team at Marshall for two seasons. He launched his coaching career as the offensive line coach at Plymouth State in 1979.

Marshall has coached 194 Division I-A games as well as seven bowl games, four on New Year's Day (two Citrus, one Cotton, one Fiesta). He has also been a mentor to All-America and Outland Trophy winner Kris Farris and All-America Jim

Pyne, two of his 13 eventual NFL players.

Marshall was a one-year letterman both at guard and tight end at Louisville, playing in the Independence Bowl as a junior. He earned a bachelor's degree in both history and physical education.

CHUCK BANKER Director of Pro Scouting



Chuck Banker was hired in February 2000 as Houston's first director of pro scouting. Banker

has 21 years of NFL experience, both in player personnel/scouting and as an assistant coach.

In his current post, Banker oversees Houston's pro scouting department, which will include scouting players on the other 31 NFL teams, as well as monitoring the talent in the Canadian Football League (CFL), and the Arena Football League (AFL).

Banker came to Houston after spending the previous three years (1997-99) as the scouting coordinator for the Washington Redskins. It was Casserly, then the Redskins' GM, who hired him for what was his second stint with Washington. Prior to that, Banker worked for the Philadelphia Eagles for three years, first as the team's director of player personnel (1994-95) before being promoted to director of scouting in 1996. With the Eagles, Banker was responsible for evaluating pro and college players, and for making recommendations on potential player acquisitions through free agency, trades and waivers. Philadelphia posted two 10-win seasons during Banker's tenure.

Banker's first association with the Redskins lasted from 1987-94. He coached Washington's special teams for Joe Gibbs for two seasons (1987-88), helping the club capture Super Bowl XXII. From 1989-94, he served as a scout for the Redskins, and was a part of the organization that won Super Bowl XXVII. Banker accepted his first NFL position as an assistant coach under Jim Hanifan with the St. Louis Cardinals from 1980-85 (special teams 1980-84, running backs 1985), and then worked as the assistant head coach/defensive ends coach at Iowa State in 1986.

Prior to coaching for the Cardinals, Banker was the defensive coordinator at Boise State from 1976-79. From 1974-75, he was the head coach at Viewmont High School in Bountiful, Utah. Banker coached the offensive line at the University of Utah from 1971-73 after serving as the head coach (1970) and defensive coordinator (1968-69) at Westminster College in Salt Lake City. From 1966-67, Banker was the linebackers coach at Utah after beginning his coaching career in a similar capacity at Glendale (CA) Junior College.

Banker earned a bachelor's of science degree in physical education from Westminster College after previously attending Cal State-Los Angeles. He has two daughters, Christy and Sara, and a son, Bryan. Chuck and his wife, Mary, reside in Missouri City.

overseeing all aspects of New England's pro and college scouting departments, player evaluations, free agency and the annual NFL draft. From 1995 until being promoted to his most recent post, Grier served as the team's director of player personnel. He worked as the Patriots' director of college scouting from 1993-95.

From 1985-92, Grier was New England's running backs coach, working under three different head coaches (Raymond Berry, Rod Rust, Dick MacPherson). The '85 squad captured the franchise's first AFC championship before losing to the Chicago Bears in Super Bowl XX. That season, Grier's backs had 2,331 rushing yards, including 1,227 by Houston native Craig James. Grier was a college scout for New England from 1982-84 after spending '82 as the offensive coordinator at Northwestern for head coach Dennis Green. Grier's first NFL position came in New England in 1981 when he was the running backs coach under Ron Erhardt.

Grier spent 1978-80 as the running backs coach at Boston College under Ed Chlebek, helping the team improve from 0-11 to 7-4. Grier's initial college coaching post came at Eastern Michigan where he coached the running backs for George Mans and then Chlebek from 1974-77. From 1970-73, Grier was the head coach at Detroit's Martin Luther King High School where his team captured the city championship in '73 with a 9-1 mark. Grier's first coaching assignment came as an assistant at Kettering (MI) High School from 1966-69.

Grier is a native of Detroit, Mich. He holds a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education from Iowa, where he was a three-year starter at running back as well as a two-time Honorable Mention All-Big Ten selection. As a senior, Grier led the Hawkeyes in rushing. He and his wife Wendy live in Houston. They have two sons, Chris, who is a regional scout for the Miami Dolphins, and Michael, who plays for the NHL's Edmonton Oilers.

He had spent a year in private business (1985) after working for the Buffalo Bills from 1980-84. While with the Bills, McCalmon spent three years as a special assignment assistant before working as the club's special teams coach under head coach Kay Stephenson from 1983-84. 
GEORGE SAIMES National Scout



TEXANS TEAM HISTORY

1997

June 18: The NHL bypasses Chuck Watson and Bob McNair's efforts to bring an expansion hockey club to Houston. The pair moves on to their next project - returning the NFL to Houston.

July 3: Houston Oilers owner Bud Adams gets the green light to move his team to Nashville, Tennessee. U.S. District Judge Lynn Hughes signs the final consent judgment in the lawsuit against the team after all parties involved agree to a settlement.

October 15: NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue praises the early plans of Bob McNair and Houston for an expansion franchise at the NFL Owners' Meetings.



October 17: In reaction to Tagliabue's comments, officials from the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo (HLS&R) say they will push for the building of a domed stadium that the Rodeo will share with an NFL team, as opposed to renovating the Astrodome. It marks the Rodeo's first public statement in support of McNair's efforts.

1998

March 23: The NFL expansion committee awards an expansion team to Cleveland. McNair, Harris County Judge Robert Eckels and Mayor Lee Brown meet with Tagliabue for the first time as a group at the owners' meeting held in Houston.

May 7: Los Angeles-based entertainment broker Michael Ovitz announces he will spearhead a \$750-million proposal to build a stadium in Carson, California, in an effort to bring the NFL back to L.A.

June 30: Tagliabue and NFL Stadium Committee head Jerry Richardson visit Houston to see plans for the city's retractable-roof stadium, meeting for several hours with McNair, Houston Sports Authority Jack Rains, Brown, Eckels and HLS&R president Jim Bloodworth.

September 25: The HLS&R votes unanimously to approve paying a \$1.5 million annual lease to use the proposed retractable-roof NFL stadium.

October 27: Tagliabue announces that NFL owners will have a decision on the league's newest expansion team by April.



1999

February 16: The NFL Expansion Committee meets, but does not pick a winning bidder from the three finalists. Tagliabue says the decision will come within a month.

March 16: The NFL Expansion Committee votes 29-2 to give Los Angeles until September 15 to work out a feasible stadium and ownership plan. If L.A. cannot get a plan together, the committee will then recommend Houston for the 32nd franchise.

May 25: Ovitz unveils a new plan for a 60-acre spread of parks, parking garages and a new stadium where the Los Angeles Coliseum currently sits. The plan impresses the NFL, but the league remains concerned about a lack of financial planning for the proposed project.

June 3: In a two-hour meeting with Tagliabue, McNair is encouraged to step up his efforts for an expansion team.

July 28: Los Angeles presents an exclusive negotiating agreement to the NFL but the league does not sign it, stating that it does not address the financial situation behind the New Coliseum at Exposition Park.

September 9: NFL executives tell the Houston group to be prepared to come to the owners' meetings in Atlanta on October 6.

September 28: Marvin Davis, one of the bidders for the Los Angeles franchise, bows out of the expansion race.

October 6: The National Football League owners vote 29-0 to award the 32nd NFL franchise to Houston and Bob McNair for a record amount of \$700 million.

November: McNair and Houston NFL executives start the first of 40 separate focus group sessions, which eventually total 500 individual participants. The sessions are conducted not just in Houston, but in Galveston, Austin, Beaumont, San Antonio and Corpus Christi as well. Fans are asked for their opinions on the image of Houston and its sur-

rounding areas, the image of the NFL and the expectations for the Houston franchise.

November 24: Houston NFL debuts its "transition" logo, which serves as the organization's mark until a team name is selected, and the corresponding official logo, team colors and uniform are developed. The "transition" logo is created by NFL Properties, the New York-based licensing and marketing arm of the NFL.

2000

January 19: Houston NFL hires Charley Casserly as Executive Vice President/General Manager. Casserly comes to Houston after 23 years with the

Washington Redskins, the last 10 as general manager. The Redskins captured Super Bowls XVII, XXII and XXVI during his tenure in Washington.

February: The National Football League and the club begin researching and developing computerized designs for potential logos. Additional focus groups are conducted in Houston and San Antonio.

March 2: Houston NFL announces that its team name search has been narrowed to five choices: Apollos, Bobcats, Stallions, Texans and Wildcatters. The five names were determined after several months of research conducted jointly by Houston NFL 2002 and National Football League Properties. That research included multiple focus group studies performed in both English and Spanish in not only Houston, but also in numerous surrounding markets such as San Antonio, Austin, Galveston and Beaumont.


March 9: Houston NFL 2002 celebrates the official groundbreaking of the new stadium that will house the team when it begins play in 2002. The 69,500-seat state-of-theart facility will be the world's first retractable-roof football stadium. Houston NFL 2002 will be a co-tenant of the new stadium with the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Participants in the groundbreaking ceremony include Bob McNair, NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue, Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo President Mike Wells, Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association Commissioner Steve Hatchell, Houston Mayor Lee Brown, Harris County Judge Robert Eckels, Harris County Commissioner (Precinct 1) El Franco Lee, Harris County Sports & Convention Corporation Chairman Mike Surface and Harris County-Houston Sports Authority Chairman Billy Burge.

April: The list of five team names is shaved to three - Apollos, Stallions and Texans.

Color logo designs are presented to focus groups for feedback.

August 10: McNair and other club officials view the final proofs of the selected team logo at Giants Stadium in East Rutherford, New Jersey. NFL Properties conducts television and photo testing of the logo as well.

September 6: The NFL's 32nd franchise is officially christened the Houston Texans before thousands at a downtown rally on Texas Avenue. NFL commissioner Tagliabue introduces McNair, who then unveils his team's name, colors and logo to the crowd. The ceremony, televised live on ESPN2, includes simultaneous unveilings in Austin and San





Antonio. McNair then heads to Enron Field, where he throws out the first "pitch" (actually a Texans football) to Houston Astros Owner Drayton McLane before the Astros play the Florida Marlins.

September 7: The Texans are honored by the Texas Sports Hall of Fame in Waco. Club officials present the Hall of Fame with a Texans helmet, football and other merchandise, which is placed in a display case in the football wing of the Hall of Fame.




October 26: Reliant Energy acquires the naming rights for Houston's new state-of-theart football stadium and the sports, entertainment and convention complex currently known as the Astrodomain Complex. Reliant Energy's 32-year agreement to acquire the naming rights for five different buildings and the complex is the most comprehensive naming rights agreement in history. Reliant Park will be a partnership of mutual support between the Harris County Sports and Convention Corporation, the Houston Texans, RodeoHouston and Reliant Energy. The facilities at Reliant Park will include Reliant Stadium, Reliant Astrodome, Reliant Arena, Reliant Hall and Reliant Center.

November 1: At its owners' meetings in Atlanta, the NFL announces that Reliant Stadium will host Super Bowl XXXVIII on February 1, 2004. Houston becomes the seventh city to host multiple Super Bowls. Rice Stadium hosted Super Bowl VIII in 1974. Jacksonville is awarded Super Bowl XXXIX and Detroit earns Super Bowl XL.

2001

January 21: The Texans introduce Dom Capers as the club's first head coach. Capers comes to Houston from Jacksonville, where he served the previous two seasons as the Jaguars' defensive coordinator. From 1995-98, Capers was the head coach of the expan-



sion Carolina Panthers, leading the team to the NFC West title and a berth in the NFC Championship Game in 1996.

February 2: Chris Palmer is hired as the Texans' first offensive coordinator. Palmer spent the previous two seasons as head coach of the expansion Cleveland Browns.


May 22: The NFL formally unveils its realignment plan for the 2002 season at league meetings in Chicago. The league will feature eight four-team divisions. The Texans are placed in the AFC South with Indianapolis, Jacksonville and Tennessee.

June 12: Bob McNair and Titans owner Bud Adams each donate \$100,000 to the Red Cross in an effort to aid Houston flood victims. NFL Charities matches the donation. More than 20,000 Houston-area families were displaced from their homes by raging flood waters the previous weekend.

August 15: The NFL announces its new schedule rotation for 2002. In addition to their home-and-away series with AFC South rivals Indianapolis, Jacksonville and Tennessee, the Texans will host Baltimore, Cincinnati, Dallas, the New York Giants and the fourthplace team from the AFC East (Buffalo) in 2002. Houston will then travel to Cleveland. Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, Washington and the fourth-place team from the AFC West (San Diego).

September 25: The Texans unveil their team uniforms before a crowd of 12,000 fans in downtown Houston. Local dignitaries and numerous Texan celebrities join Bob McNair on stage for the ceremony. The Houston Texans Cheerleaders also make their debut.

November 5: The Texans hold their first player workouts, evaluating a group of defensive backs. December 29: The Texans sign 10 players to the first contracts in club history. The team's first players are running back Michael Basnight, safety Leomont Evans, tackle Robert Hicks, defensive tackle Jason Nikolao, quarterback Mike Quinn, fullback Matt Snider, cornerback



Jason Suttle, linebacker Casey Tisdale, safety Kevin Williams and tackle Jerry Wisne.

2002

January 14: The Texans hire former Indianapolis Colts defensive coordinator Vic Fangio as their first defensive coordinator.







February 18: The Texans selected T Tony Boselli, T Ryan Young, CB Aaron Glenn, DT Gary Walker, LB Jamie Sharper, WR Jermaine Lewis, CB Marcus Coleman, DT Seth Payne, G Matt Campbell, S Matt Stevens, G Jeremy McKinney, T Ryan Schau, RB Charlie Rogers, TE/LS Sean McDermott, DE Jabari Issa, WR Avion Black, QB Danny Wuerffel, LB Brian Allen and TE Johnny Huggins in the expansion draft.


March 4: The Texans execute the first trade in club history, shipping QB Danny Wuerffel to Washington in exchange for DT Jerry DeLoach.

March 6: The Texans sign their first unrestricted free agent, inking former Colts offensive lineman Steve McKinney.

March 25: The Texans launch their off-season program at Reliant Astrodome. All 65 players report.

April 20: The Texans select Fresno State quarterback David Carr with the first overall selection of the 2002 NFL Draft. Carr flies back to Houston from New York that afternoon to sign a seven-year contract. He is the first of 12 players Houston selects over seven rounds.

April 26: The Texans open their first mini-camp with 99 players, including 25 rookies. April 28: The Texans launch their first Texans Outreach Tour, taking players to Austin, Beaumont, College Station, Corpus Christi and Lufkin over a five-day stretch.



Expansion Draft

The Texans held their expansion draft at the George R. Brown Convention Center in downtown Houston on Monday, Feb. 18, 2002. The two-hour event was televised live on ESPN. The Texans selected a total of 19 players. The first eight selections were present at the draft.

"I think anyone from Houston has to feel like this is a great day to be a Texan," Texans founder Bob McNair said. "We're excited about the quality of players and we think it's a solid foundation that we're building here."

Houston's 19 selections came from 14 NFL teams. The average age of the players selected was 26.3 years old, and the average NFL experience of the selected players was 4.9 seasons.



Clint Murchison, Jr. and Bedford Wynne were awarded an expansion franchise on January 28, 1960, at the annual league meetings in Miami Beach. They had already hired a coach a month earlier - Giants defensive assistant Tom Landry. The Cowboys were designated a "swing" team for their initial season, meaning they would play each team once. The 12 existing clubs froze 25 players from their respective rosters. Dallas was allowed to select three players from each club for a total of 36 players. The Cowboys nearly won their first two contests before taking some severe lumps. Dallas managed to tie the Giants in their second-to-last game before finishing 0-11-1. But in the next four drafts, the Cowboys would select the likes of Bob Lilly, Lee Roy Jordan, Mel Renfro, Bob Hayes and Roger Staubach.

Minnesota was granted an expansion franchise by NFL owners at the annual league meeting in Miami Beach on January 28, 1960. The ownership group - consisting of Max Winter, E. William Boyer, H.P. Skoglund, Ole Haugsrud and Bernard H. Ridder, Jr. - named Bert Rose as the team's first general manager later that summer. Rose came up with the nickname "Vikings," then tabbed former NFL QB Norm Van Brocklin as head coach. Minnesota was allowed to select three unprotected players from each existing NFL team except Dallas, which had just completed its first season. In the Vikings' first regular-season game, third-round pick Fran Tarkenton came off the bench to lead Minnesota to a stunning upset over Chicago. Tarkenton completed 17 of 23 passes for 250 yards and four scores. The Vikings wouldn't taste victory again for nearly two months but finished a respectable 3-11 on their maiden voyage. Minnesota won its first division title seven years later.

On June 30, 1965, the NFL awarded an Atlanta expansion franchise to Rankin Smith, a 41-year-old executive vice president of Life Insurance Company of Georgia. The price was \$8.5 million. Norb Hecker left Vince Lombardi's staff in Green Bay to become the Falcons' first head coach. The Falcons were allotted three picks from each of the 14 other NFL teams, which were asked to leave 11 players unprotected. Atlanta selected Outland Trophy winner Tommy Nobis out of Texas with the first pick of the college draft. Atlanta dropped its first nine games of the 1966 season before rallying to win three of their last five contests. The Falcons' initial victory was a 27-16 triumph over the Giants at Yankee Stadium. Atlanta yielded more than 31 points per game during its first season.

On November 1, 1966, the NFL awarded an expansion franchise to New Orleans. John Mecom, Jr., of Houston is designated majority stockholder and president of the club on December 15. The team is dubbed the Saints on January 9, 1967, due in part to the fact that the team was awarded to the city on All Saints' Day. New Orleans was allowed to pick three unprotected players from each existing team except Atlanta, which had kicked off the previous season. The Saints are handed a bizarre schedule, one in which they twice play three consecutive games at home and twice play three consecutive games on the road. New Orleans drops its first seven games before defeating Philadelphia at Tulane Stadium. The Saints would not post a winning record until 1987 and earned their first playoff win following the 2000 season.

Tampa was awarded the league's 26th franchise on April 24, 1974. Later that year, Jacksonville attorney Hugh Culverhouse gains ownership. Tampa Stadium is enlarged from 46,700 seats to 72,000 seats to accommodate the Buccaneers. John McKay, who won four national titles at USC, is named head coach on October 31, 1975. McKay would need every ounce of his legendary sense of humor to survive what would transpire over the next two years. The Bucs, placed in the AFC West for their inaugural season, lose all 14 games. Tampa Bay was then moved to the NFC Central for the 1977 campaign, but the losses still mounted. The Bucs dropped their first 12 games of the 1977 season before beating New Orleans 33-14. But McKay's patience paid off. Just two seasons later, Tampa Bay won the NFC Central Division title and advanced to the NFC Championship Game, starting a run of three playoff appearances in four seasons.

The NFL granted Seattle an expansion franchise on June 4, 1974, 19 months after construction began on the Kingdome. Lloyd W. Nordstrom heads the ownership group. The Seahawks tab Vikings defensive line coach Jack Patera as their first head coach. Seattle and Tampa Bay each stock their roster with 39 allocated veterans. The Seahawks drop their first five contests before facing the Bucs in what was dubbed the Expansion Bowl. LB Mike Curtis blocked a FG attempt with 42 seconds left to preserve a 13-10 victory. Seattle would later beat Atlanta at home before losing its final five games. But the Seahawks would win five games the following season, then race to a 9-7 mark in just their third NFL campaign.

More than 17 years after expanding to 28 teams, the NFL finally added a 29th club, awarding the Carolinas a franchise on October 26, 1993, at league meetings in Chicago. The Panthers, headed by former Colt Jerry Richardson, would be based in Charlotte and begin play in 1995 at Clemson University. Carolina tabbed Steelers defensive coordinator Dom Capers as their first head coach. The Panthers then stockpiled their roster with 35 unprotected players, then hit the free agent market, signing 17 unrestricted free agents. The plan to go after veteran players paid immediate dividends. After losing its first five games, Carolina reeled off four consecutive wins, starting with a home victory over the Jets. The Panthers finished their first season 7-9, setting an NFL record for most victories by an expansion team. The following season, Carolina would advance to the NFC Championship Game, its lone playoff appearance to date.

Jacksonville, considered an NFL underdog for most of the proceedings, beat out the likes of Baltimore, St. Louis and Memphis to secure its first major professional sports franchise. The league awarded its 30th franchise to Jacksonville on November 30, 1993, in Chicago. The Jaguars hired Boston College head coach Tom Coughlin as their first head coach three months later. Jacksonville selected 31 players in the expansion draft and inked nine unrestricted free agents. But the Jaguars' most important move was their first trade, when they sent third and fifth-round picks to the Packers for QB Mark Brunell, who now has three Pro Bowl trips to his credit. Jacksonville won four games in its inaugural season, overshadowed a bit by Carolina's seven victories. But in 1996, the Jaguars parlayed a 9-7 mark into a wild-card berth and advanced to the AFC Championship Game. They made the playoffs the next three seasons, securing two AFC Central Division titles in the process.






NFL expansion took an odd twist on September 8, 1998, when the league awarded its 31st team to Al Lerner, the chairman and CEO of MBNA. That team was the Cleveland Browns, a franchise that dates back to 1950 but was moved to Baltimore and renamed the Ravens after the 1995 season. The new Browns were allowed to keep all the history from their previous years. Cleveland named Jaguars offensive coordinator Chris Palmer as their head coach, then selected 37 players in the allocation draft. With the first pick in the college draft, they tabbed Kentucky QB Tim Couch, who became a starter in Week 2. But the new Browns struggled during their initial season, allowing the most points in the league and scoring the fewest. Cleveland won its first game at New Orleans on a Hail Mary pass, then scored a sweet victory at Pittsburgh on a last-second FG.

The city of Houston has always been on the cutting edge of stadium development. Houston first introduced the Astrodome, which opened in 1965 as the world's first dome stadium. The trend continues in 2002 with the debut of Reliant Stadium.

On March 9, 2000, ground was broken on the new home for the Texans and

RodeoHouston. Reliant Stadium, which stands adjacent to Reliant Astrodome, is the first retractable-roof stadium in the National Football League. The 69,500-seat stadium, covering 1.9 million square feet, will feature 44,000 seats on the sideline.

There will be 8,200 club seats and 166 luxury suites. Those luxury suites are the closest to the field in the NFL.

With the innovation of the retractable roof, Houston will have outdoor NFL action for

the first time since Super Bowl VIII between Miami and Minnesota at Rice Stadium in 1974. The roof is made of translucent Teflon-coated fiberglass fabric, and takes 10 minutes to open and close. When opening, the roof splits at the 50-yard line and docks in the end zones. The roof can withstand winds as strong as 140

miles per hour when closed and secured. The climate-controlled stadium also features a natural grass-playing surface. The grass is grown on eight-foot square trays, then transported to the stadium.

Reliant Stadium will feature an open view of the playing field from the main concourse

and on the club level. The main concourse is 40 feet wide, which makes it the largest in the NFL. Each concession stand will feature multiple televisions enabling Texans fans to stay on top of the action at all times.

Reliant Stadium can also boast a larger than life scoreboard. Following the trend that was started with the Astrodome scoreboard, Reliant Stadium will house two of the largest in the league. Both will include out of town scores down

and distance, the game clock and a host of other traits. The video boards are the largest in the NFL.

The Texans front office is located at the south end of the stadium. The club's day-to-day operations will now be under one roof. Players will report to the stadium forin film sessions, practice, treatment

and training. The club's 10,000-squarefoot weight room is the largest in the league. The players can also take advantage of a three-lane lap pool adjacent to their locker room.

Houston's working media will have its own offices and library on the ground level of the stadium. Texans head coach Dom Capers will conduct his weekly and postgame press conferences from either of the two media auditoriums on the ground level. The stadium's press box is located on the fifth level on the west side.

Across the street, the Texans training facility features three grass practice fields. One field is lit for night sessions during training camp. The Texans also have an indoor practice field outfitted with Field Turf. The air-supported structure offers the team a seamless transition from outdoor to indoor practice in case of inclement weather. The state-of-the-art facility will also double as

the team's training camp headquarters. The players and coaches will be housed at the Radisson Astrodome. The Texans report July 20 for camp.

During the off-season, Reliant Stadium will be transformed for the Houston Live-stock Show & Rodeo. Two million patrons enter the Reliant Park grounds to enjoy the three-week Rodeo annually in late February/early March. RodeoHouston is the largest rodeo event in the United States.

Reliant Stadium will also host the 2002 Big 12 Championship Game this December and the Rolling Stones in late January. The NFL awarded Super Bowl XXXVIII to Reliant Stadium at the 2000 fall league meetings. The world's greatest sports spectacle will be played in Houston on Feb. 1, 2004. In addition, other events, such as concerts, conventions and motor sports, will be held at the stadium.



In September of 2000, the Infinity Broadcasting Corporation signed a 10-year agreement with the Houston Texans. Infinity currently owns four radio stations in the Houston market and received the exclusive right to broadcast Houston Texans football games and produce numerous ancillary programs featuring the team. Infinity will simulcast all Texans games on Country station 100.3 KILT-FM and SportsRadio 610 AM. Infinity/Houston radio stations Country 95-7 KIKK-FM and Business Radio 650 will be promotional partners with the Houston Texans as well. Infinity/Houston has built a radio network to broadcast Houston Texans games. The game broadcasts will include a three-hour pre-game show and a twohour post-game show hosted by Rich Lord, Charlie Pallilo and Lance Zierlein on SportsRadio 610.

In February of 2002, Marc Vandermeer was tabbed as the "Voice of the Houston Texans." Vandermeer brings a solid 13 years of radio broadcasting experience to Houston. Most recently, he spent the past three seasons as the voice of the University of Miami Hurricanes football and basketball teams. Prior to his stint in Coral Gables, Vandermeer worked at the University of Massachusetts and Central Michigan University. He currently serves as a talk show host on SportsRadio 610. Joining Vandermeer in the booth to provide analysis is former quarterback and Heisman Trophy winner Andre Ware. Ware, a native Houstonian, played his college football at the University of Houston and was a first-round draft pick of the Detroit Lions. After his football career, Ware made the jump into the broadcast booth as color commentator for the Houston Cougars before moving on

La Tremenda 1010 AM/100.7FM is owned and operated by Hispanic Broadcasting Corporation, which owns 47 radio stations in 13 of the top Hispanic markets in the U.S. In Houston, they also broadcast KLTN-FM (102.9 FM, Estereo Latino), KOVE-FM (106.5 FM, KLOVE), KQBU-FM (93.3 FM, Que Buena) and KPTY-FM (Party 104.9 FM).



An avid sports fan, Rolando Becerra will serve as the play-byplay voice for the Texans on La Tremenda. Becerra is the only Hispanic commentator to have done play-by-play broadcasts for four major sports: the Houston Astros (1986-1992), the Houston Rockets (1988-1993), the Houston Oilers (1995-1997) and the Houston Aeros (1999-2000).

Becerra, originally from Cuba, began his radio career in Miami in 1973. He's been a Houston resident and radio constant for more than 20 years. You can also catch him on KLAT-AM/FM as host of the The "Rolando Becerra Show", which airs Mon-

day through Friday from 2-4 p.m. Becerra has been married to his wife, Jenny, for 33 years and they are parents to four children: Barbra, Jason, Jaron and Megan.



Enrique Vasquez will handle color commentary duties for Texans broadcasts on La Tremenda. Vasquez returns to the Houston football scene after a two-year run doing color commentary for the Dallas Cowboys, where he also did play-by-play in the late 1990s. He has also done sports broadcasting for Fox Sports, covering everything from basketball to Olympics to Super Bowls. Some Texans fans and La Tremenda listeners may remember Vasquez as one of the Spanish broadcast voices for the Houston Oilers from 1992 to 1995.

Medical Glossary

A-C Joint - Aeromicelavicular joint; joint of the shoulder where aeromion process (of the scapula) and the distal end of the clavicle meet; most shoulder separations occur at this point.

Abduct - Movement of any extremity away from the body.

Abrasion - Any injury which rubs off the surface of the skin.

Abscess - An infection which produces pus; can be the result of a blister, callus, penetrating wound or laceration.

Achilles Tendon - The tendon at the back of the heel.

Abductor - Any muscle which moves a part toward the median axis of the body.

Adhesion - Abnormal adherence of collagen fibers to surrounding structures during immobilization following trauma or as a complication of surgery which restricts normal elasticity of the structures

Aerobic Exercise in which energy needed is supplied by oxygen inspired; required for sustained periods of hard work and vigorous exercise.

Anabolic Steroids - Testosterone, or a steroid hormone resembling testosterone, that stimulates

growth in the body as a whole.

Anaerobic - Exercise without the use of oxygen as an energy source; short bursts of vigorous exer-

Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL) - Ligament of knee attaching to anterior tibial plateau and posterior medial aspect of femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from com-

Anterior Compartment Syndrome - Condition in which swelling within the anterior compartment of the lower leg (comprising of muscles, nerves and arteries to the foot) jeopardizes the viability of the muscles and nerves within the compartment.

Anti-Inflammatory - Any agent which prevents inflammation (such as aspirin or ibuprofen),

Arteriogram - Film demonstrating arteries after injection of opaque medium (dye),

Arthrogram - X-ray technique for joints using air and/or dye injected in affected area (to show tom

cartilage or rotator cuff tears).

Arthroscope - An instrument used for visualization of the interior of a joint cavity; sometimes

Arthroscopy - Examination of the internal structures of a joint by means of surgical viewing appa-Aspiration - The withdrawal of fluids from a body cavity by means of a suction or siphonage appa-

Asymptomatic - Without symptoms.

Asymptomatic - Without symptoms.

Atrophy - To shrivel or shrink from disuse, as in muscular atrophy.

Avascular Necrosis - Death of a part due to lack of circulation (can occur in the elbow from throw-

Avulsion - A tearing away forcibly of a part of structure.

Axilla - The armpit.

Baker's Cyst - Indicates that there is trauma inside the knee joint that leads to excessive joint-fluid production; inflammation of the gastrocnemius bursa. Usually produces localized swelling behind

Bennett's Fracture - Fracture dislocation of the base of the first metacarpal (or the thumb).

Biceps - Muscle on the front of the upper arm responsible for blending the elbow.

Bone scan - "Radionuclide Imaging," which is useful to demonstrate stress fracture not evident on

Brachial Plexus - Network of nerves originating from the cervical vertebrae running down the arm.

Bruise - A discoloration of the skin due to an extravasation of the blood into the underlying tissues.

Burner - Common term for brachial plexus trauma in the neck. Usually results in burning or tingling sensation into the shoulder or arm when the neck is forced beyond the normal range of

motion.

C.P.R. - Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation; artificial establishment of circulation of the blood and movement of air into the lungs in a pulseless, non-breathing person.

Calcaneus - The heel bone.

Calf - Also know as gastrocnemius; muscle responsible for plantarflexing, or pointing the toes

Capsule - An enclosing structure which surrounds the joint and contains ligaments which stabilize

Cartilage - Smooth, slippery substance preventing two ends of bones from rubbing together and

grating.

Cellulitis - Inflammation of cellular or connective tissue.

Charley Horse - A bruise to the quadriceps resulting from a direct blow to the front of the thigh, characterized by intramuscular bleeding. No other injury should be called a charley horse.

Chondral Fracture - Fracture to the chondral (cartilaginous) surfaces of bone.

Chondremalacia - A roughening of the cartilage surface. Best known for the roughening of the underside of the kneecap.

Clavicle - The collar bone.
Collagen - A substance existing in commonly injured tissues of the body, including skin, cartilage,

Concussion - Jarring injury of the brain resulting in dysfunction. Can be graded mild, moderate or severe depending on loss of consciousness, amnesia and loss of equilibrium.

Concussion - An injury to the muscles and tissues caused by a blow from a blunt object.

Contision - An injury to the muscles and tissues caused by a blow from a blunt object.

Cortisone - An anii-inflammatory medication.

Costochondral - The cartilage that separates the bones within the rib cage.

Cyst - Abnormal sac containing liquid or semisolid matter.

Degenerative Joint Disease - Changes in the joint surfaces as a result of repetitive trauma.

Dehydration - Loss of body water.

Deltoids - Muscles at top of arm, just below shoulder.

Disc - A flat, round-like, plate structure usually referring to cartilage between vertebrae.

Dislocation - Complete displacement of joint surfaces.

Ecchymosis - Bleeding into the surface tissue below the skin, resulting in a "black and blue" effect.

Ectomy - Suffix connoting the affected part (e.g. meniscectomy, appendectomy).

Edema - Accumulation of fluid in organs and tissues of the body (swelling).

Effection - Accumulation of fluid, or the fluid itself, in various spaces in the body. Commonly found in the knee following injury.

Flectrolyte - Ionized salts in blood, tissue fluids and cells including salts of sodium, potassium and Electrolyte Drink - Fluid for replacing electrolytes, such as Gatorade Thirst Quencher.

EMG - Electromyogram test to check nerve function.

Epicondylitis - Inflammation in the elbow due to overuse of either the flexor or extensor muscles attaching to the medial or lateral epicondyle of the humerus.

Eversion - Turning outward.

Extension - Motion of straightening a joint.

Extensor - A muscle which upon contraction results in straightening a joint.

External Rotation - Lateral movement of a joint or extremity to the outside.

Fiexibility - The ability of muscle to relax and yield to stretch force.

Flexibility - The ability of muscle to relax and yield to stretch force.

Flexibility Exercise - A general term used to describe exercise performed by a person to passively or actively clongate soft tissues without the assistance of a therapist.

Flexion - Bending a joint, as in flexing the arm or leg.

Flexor - A muscle which upon contraction flexes or bends.

Fracture - Breach in continuity of a bone. Types of fractures include simple, compound, comminuted, greenstick, encomplete, impacted, longitudinal, oblique, stress or transverse.

Gamekeeper's Thumb - Tear of the ulnar collateral ligament of the humeral head and the labrum.

Glenohumeral - The shoulder socket, containing the glenoid, the humeral head and the labrum.

Glenoid - A cavity of the scapula into which the head of the humerus fits to the form of the shoulder joint (the shoulder socket).

Grein - Husting of the thick and should be contained in the shoulder socket.

Groin - Junction of the thigh and abdomen.

Hamstring - Muscle running from the buttocks to behind the knee. Often injured as a result of improper conditioning or lack of muscle flexibility. Muscle responsible for flexing the knee joint.

Heat Stroke - Condition of rapidly rising internal body temperature that overwhelms the body's mechanisms for release of heat.

Heat Exhaustion - Mild form of shock caused by loss of fluid and electrolyte from the circulation because of excessive sweating when exposed to heat.

Heat Cramps - Painful muscle spasms of arms or legs causes by excessive body heat and depletion of fluids and electrolyte.

Hematoma - A tumor-like mass produced by an accumulation of coagulated blood in a cavity.

Hip Pointer - Contusion to the iliac crest.

Humerus - Bone of the upper arm.

Isolinetic Exercise - A form of active resistive exercise in which the speed of movement of the limb is controlled by a pre-set rate-limiting device, such as Cybex, Biodex, etc.

Isometric (static) Contraction - A muscle contraction in which tension is developed but no mechanical work is done. There is not appreciable joint movement and the overall length of the muscle remains the same.

Isolinetic - A constant sneed and consistent resistance exercise.

Isokinetic - A constant speed and consistent resistance exercise.

Isotonic (dynamic) Contraction - A concentric or eccentric muscular contraction that results in movement of a joint or body part (lifting a free weight).

Itis - Suffix connoting inflammation (e.g. tendinitis, bursitis).

Joint Mobilization - Passive traction and/or gliding movements applied to joint surfaces that maintain or restore the joint play normally allowed by the capsule, so that the normal roll-slide joint mechanic can occur as a person moves.

Lateral Collateral Ligament (LCL) - Ligament of knee attaching lateral femoral condyle to the fibula head. It provides lateral stability to the knee.

Ligament - Band of fibrous tissue that connects bone to bone or bone to cartilage and supports and strengthens joints.

strengthens joints.

Lumbosacral - Region of low back comprised of lumbar and sacral spine.

Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) - Provides highly detailed pictures of the body's interior, using highly magnetic fields. MRI does not require radiation.

Malleolus - Rounded projections on either side of the ankle joint.

Medial - Pertaining to or near the middle.

Medial - Pertaining to or near the middle.

Medial Collateral Ligament (MCL) - Ligament of knee attaching to medial femoral condyle to medial tibia. It provides medial stability to the knee.

Meniscus - Crescent shaped cartilage usually pertaining to the knee joint.

Meniscus - In intra-articular procedure at the knee by which meniscus (fibrocartilage) is removed surgically.

Metacarpais - Five long bones of hand, just below fingers.

Metacarpais - Five long bones of foot, just below toes.

Mobilization - Passive stretching movements performed by a therapist at a slow speed slow enough that a patient can stop the movement.

Myositis - Inflammation of a muscle.

Necrotic - Relating to death of a portion of tissue.

Neuritis - Inflammation of a nerve.

Orthotic - Any device applied to or around the body in the care of physical impairment or disability, commonly used to control foot mechanics.

Osteochondritis Dissecans - A piece of bone and/or cartilage loosened from its attachment after

trauma and a cause of a lesion.

Osteomyelitis - An inflammatory disease of bone caused usually by infection with streptococcus or staphylococcus.

Parasthesia - Sensation of numbness or tingling, indicating nerve irritation.

Patella - The kneecap.

Patella - Chest muscles beneath the breast, leading up to shoulder.

Peroneal - Muscles of the lateral lower leg responsible for everting the foot.

Plantar Fascia - The tight band of muscle beneath the arch of the foot.

Plantar Fascia - The tight band of muscle beneath the arch of the foot.

Plica - A fold of tissue in the joint capsule and a common result of knee injury.

PNF (Proprioceptive Neuromuscular Facilitation) - An approach to therapeutic exercise based on the principles of functional human anatomy and neurophysiology.

Posterior Cruciate Ligament (PCL) - Ligament of the knee attaching to posterior tibial plateau and anterior lateral aspect of femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from going backward.

Quadriceps (Quads)- The four powerful muscles in the front of the thigh, responsible for extend-

Ouadriceps (Quads) - The four powerful muscles in the front of the thigh, responsible for extending the knee joint.

Radiography - Taking of X-rays.

Radius - Forearm bone on thumb side.

Reconstruction - Surgical rebuilding of an injured joint.

Reterred Pain - Pain felt in undamaged area of body away from actual injury.

Rotator cuff - Comprised of four muscles in the shoulder area; supraspinatus, infraspinatus, teres minor, and subscapularis. Often irritated by overuse.

S. C. joint - Stemoclavicular joint, articulation between the sternum and the clavicle.

Sacrolliac - Relating to the juncture of the hip bone and lower part of the spine.

Scan - Injection of radioactive fluid (equal in radioactivity to about one x-ray) which may then be displayed on a computer/monitor or film (e.g. bone scan).

Scapula - The shoulder blade.

Sciatic Nerve - Largest nerve in body located in back of leg which controls most of its function.

Sciatica - Irritation of the sciatic nerve, resulting in pain or tingling running down the inside of the cap.

cap. Sesamoid Bones - Lies within and adds strength to tendons as they cover bony surface. The most

Sesamoid Bones - Lies within and adds strength to tendons as they cover bony surface. The most commonly known is the kneecap.

Shin splint - A catch-all syndrome describing pain either in the front of the lower leg or on the inner aspect of the leg.

Spasm - Sudden, violent, involuntary contraction of a muscle.

Spleen - Large, solid organ responsible for the normal production and destruction of blood cells.

Spondyldits - Inflammation of one or more vertebrae.

Spondylois - Abnormal vertebrael fixation or immobility.

Sprain - A joint injury. A violent twisting, stretching, pulling or tearing of a ligament.

Strain - A muscle injury. The stretching, pulling or twisting of a muscle of a tendon.

Stress X-Ray - A continual x-ray taken when a portion of the body is stressed to its maximum to see if the ligaments are intact.

Stretching - Any therapeutic maneuver designed to lengthen (elongate) pathologically shortened soft-tissue structures and thereby increase range of motion.

Subluxation - Partial dislocation of a joint, Term usually implies that joint can return to normal position without formal reduction.

Synoyial Fluid - Lubricating fluid for joints and tendons, produced in synovium, or inner lining of the joint.

Synovitis - Inflammation of the synovium.

Talus - The ankle bone that articulates with the tibia and fibula.

Talus - The ankle bone that articulates with the tibia and fibula.

Tarsus - Arch of foot.

Tendinitis - Inflammation of the tendon and/or tendon sheath, often caused by chronic overuse and/or sudden injury.

Tendon - Fibrous tissue that connects muscles to other structures.

Tennis Elbow - General term for lateral elbow pain.

Tibia - Larger of the two bones in lower leg; weight-bearing bone.

Tomograph - A special type of x-ray apparatus that demonstrates the organ or tissue is a particular denth.

Trachea - The windpipe.

Trapezius - A flat triangular muscle covering the posterior surface of the neck and shoulder.

Triceps - Muscle of the posterior upper arm, opposite the biceps, that extends the elbow.

Turf Toe - Sprain of the metatarsophalangeal (MTP) joint of the great toe.

Turf Burn - Abrasion resulting from contact with artificial turf in which one or more layers of skin

Ulna - One of two bones in forearm; extends from point of elbow and found on outer (little finger)

<u>Ulnar Nerve</u> - Nerve in the elbow commonly irritated from excessive throwing or repeated trauma. <u>Wrist</u> - The junction between the two forearm bones (radius and ulna) and the eight wrist bones (trapezium, trapezoid, capitate, hamate, pisiform, triquetral, lunate and scaphoid).

Texans Media Policy

CREDENTIAL REQUESTS: Only credential requests from working media on specific assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication will be honored credential requests. Credentials will not be issued to free-lance writers or photographers unless requested by a recognized news organization or sports publication. All credential requests must be submitted in writing on company letterhead to Tony Wyllie, Vice President/Communications, Houston Texans, Two Reliant Park, Houston, TX 77054.

PARKING: Parking for Texans games also must be applied for via written request. The appropriate parking pass will be required for access to media parking lots on gameday.

MEDIA ENTRANCE AND WILL CALL: The media entrance is located at the press gate on Murworth/Kirby intersection on the West side of the stadium. The will-call window is located inside the press gate in the hallway next to the daily press workroom. The appropriate game credential must be presented at the media entrance for admission into the stadium. Game credentials not picked up in advance will be available on game day at the credential will-call window. The window will open three hours prior to kickoff.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photographers who are credentialed on a season-long basis for sideline access will be required to wear an armband. Photographers on a game-by-game basis will have a different credential. Sideline access for NFL games is limited to photographers on assignment for recognized or sports publication. No one except network television personnel and authorized game personnel will be admitted to the field without a camera. All field photographers must remain outside the bench areas and outside the yellow border surrounding the playing field.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS AND LOCKER ROOM ACCESS: Members of the media needing to conduct post game interviews will be given access to the Texans' and visiting interview rooms after the game, as well as the home and visiting locker rooms. NO STILL PHOTOGRAPHERS OR AUTOGRAPHS ARE ALLOWED IN THE TEXANS LOCKER ROOM. With six minutes remaining in the game take the media elevator the field level. With two minutes remaining in the fourth quarter, media members will be allowed on the field. NO INTERVIEWS ARE ALLOWED ON THE PLAYING FIELD. Dom Capers' post game interview session with the media will begin approximately 10 minutes following the conclusion of the game and will be held in the Texans team meeting room across from their locker room. Electronic media covering the press conference are asked to use the mult-box to ease congestion at the podium. Players also will be available approximately 10 minutes after the game when the locker room is open. The visiting head coach will be available in the visitor's interview room adjacent to the visiting locker room.

PRESS BOX: The press box phone numbers for home and visiting PR were not known at press time. Contact the Texans media relations office for more information.

DURING THE WEEK

MEDIA WORKROOM: The media workroom is located on the concourse level at Reliant Stadium across from the Texans locker room. The locker room is open to the media from 3:30-4:00 p.m. (CST) on Mondays, from 11:45-12:15 a.m. on Wednesdays and Thursdays, and from 2:15-2:35 on Fridays, All interviews should be arranged through the Texans media relations office, Interviews may be conducted in person or by phone. Please call in advance when possible to schedule.
