



MISSION STATEMENT

Believing that youth represent the community's future, the Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation is committed to serving the greater Jacksonville area through strategic financial, networking and volunteer support benefitting economically and socially disadvantaged youth and families. By building upon our city's strengths, we seek to realize the positive potential of our young people in need. In doing so, we aim to serve as a model to other sports franchises.

PROGRAMS:

The Jaguars Foundation's innovative programs have been nationally recognized, including stories in the *New York Times*, *Forbes*, *Grantmanship Center* magazine, *St. Anthony Messenger* and the syndicated "Disgood File" radio program.

GRANTMAKING: From March 1996 through June 2001, the Jaguars Foundation allocated more than \$3.7 million in grants. This level of giving is among the top few in professional sports. The Foundation has a fair and objective evaluation process to determine support. Grants have been allocated to serve such needs and opportunities as the establishment of a mobile vision-screening van, an after-school tennis and mentoring program, a series of child-abuse prevention services, a therapeutic arts program for youth recovering from drug addiction and a domestic violence education program for children.

HONOR ROWS: This unique program, now in its seventh year, uses seats at Jaguars home games as incentives for agencies, young people and volunteer mentors to set and achieve ambitious but realistic goals. Goal-setting involves academic achievement, behavioral improvement and providing public service. It provides for flexibility and creativity by allowing agencies to determine how best to use seats as motivational goals. All applications are reviewed by a diverse volunteer committee. In 2001, more than 4,100 seats have been awarded to 36 agencies. In addition to seats, Honor Rows participants receive a free meal, a T-shirt, hat, pledge card, certificate and special recognition by the Weavers, fans and on the Jumbotron at ALLTEL Stadium during home games. All Honor Rows youth earning a seat fulfill a pledge to remain alcohol, tobacco and drug free. The Jaguars Foundation partners with Reebok, ALLTEL and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation in support of this program and with the United Way to mobilize volunteers to ensure the overall safety and enjoyment of Honor Rows participants. The Jaguars Foundation received the 1996 Governor's Community Investment Award for this program.

GENERAL CHARITABLE USE SEATS: Honor Rows is the largest of several Jaguars Foundation programs using Jaguars game seats for charitable purposes. Other programs include the HabJax volunteers, Sailors Aweigh (for youth whose parents are on deployment with the Navy), the Tom Coughlin Jay Fund Foundation (for families with children who have leukemia), youth football, support for volunteers and other organizations. During the 2001 season, the Jaguars Foundation will allocate 11,800 seats for charitable purposes to home games, with a total in-kind value exceeding \$400,000.

PLAYBOOKS READING INITIATIVE: This innovative program inspires young people to read "Playbooks," in which Jaguars owners, players, coaches, cheerleaders and staff list and describe

books that they found particularly motivating as youth or as adults today, began in 1996. Today, "Playbooks" can be accessed on the Internet at www.playbooks.org. This interactive website is utilized by libraries and youth serving agencies to promote reading. The site includes timely updates of favorite books from new players. To encourage reading, children can e-mail brief book reports to Jaguars mascot Jaxson de Ville and compete for prizes. In addition, youth can receive a copy of "Playbooks" at local libraries by obtaining or showing their public library card. Players, cheerleaders and Jaxson de Ville have visited dozens of schools, libraries and youth-serving agencies encouraging youth and parental reading. The Foundation received WTLV Channel 12's "Top of the Class" Award for "Playbooks."

STRAIGHT TALK: The Straight Talk program is designed to reduce the incidence of teen pregnancy and the spread of AIDS and other sexually transmitted infections (STIs). Under the leadership of Foundation Chair/CEO and Jaguars co-owner Delores Barr Weaver, an unprecedented media partnership, including radio, newspaper, Internet sites, billboard outlets and every Jacksonville television station, collaborate to give teens and their parents candid information on sex, STIs and the consequences faced by sexually active teenagers. A major feature of Straight Talk is a televised town hall forum "Teens & Sex...the Real Truth," that is broadcast on all Jacksonville television stations. The program aired live in 1995, 2000 and 2001, and will continue to air annually. This year's co-hosts were actress Sherri Jackson from the television series "Moesha," Miss Jacksonville 2001 Alja Jackson, and Jacksonville broadcast personality Jennifer Candelmo, along with local radio personalities, a guest panel of medical and legal experts, and an all-teen studio audience. The show was watched in 100,000 homes (Nielsen ratings). The Foundation's Straight Talk website at www.jacksonville.com, created in partnership with the Florida Times-Union, which includes a question-and-answer section, had more than 12,250 views during two-week period when the show was broadcast.

In addition, public service announcements featuring Jaguars players run on local TV stations and the Jumbotron at Jaguars home games. The Foundation also produced a teen pregnancy prevention videotape, "Teen Sex...In Their Own Words," for distribution to local agencies and schools. Finally, \$500,000 in multi-year grants was awarded, in partnership with the Weaver Family Foundation, to local programs specifically dealing with teenage pregnancy and STI prevention.

ANTI-TOBACCO INITIATIVE: The team and the Foundation have taken a nationally recognized leadership position in the local and professional sports community against youth tobacco use. ALLTEL Stadium is smoke-free and has never engaged in tobacco advertising or product sales. Additionally, the Jaguars Foundation has partnered with the nation's largest private health care supporter, the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, to reduce youth tobacco use, sending a clear message that smoking is neither "cool" nor conducive to athletic performance. This novel effort involves "Jaguars Don't Smoke" scoreboard and concourse signage at the stadium, showing a vibrant color jaguar squashing a pack of cigarettes under its paw. This image also appears on autograph cards used by athletes, coaches and cheerleaders. Further, this initiative involves public address announcements during games, as well as television public service announcements. The Jaguars set an exceptional precedent as the first team in the NFL to have tobacco advertising removed from the back cover of the team's "GameDay" program. Since then, the entire league has followed the Jaguars lead and removed that ad.

NIKE/JAGUARS FOUNDATION COMMUNITY SCHOLARS PROGRAM: Nike and the Jaguars Foundation have established what is now a \$500,000 scholarship fund. In partnership with the University of North Florida, the Nike/Jaguars Foundation Community Scholars program is a novel scholarship program that involves UNF honors students in mentoring incoming inner-city students who have participated in the Honor-Rowns program. Student candidates are nominated by their youth agency, and scholarship recipients receive full tuition for four years. Furthermore, the scholarship program provides mentorship support before and during the student's college experience, increasing their chances for lasting academic, volunteer and professional success.

Delores Barr Weaver, a native of Columbus, Georgia and co-owner/partner of the Jaguars, is a woman possessed by the opportunity to make a difference in her adopted hometown of Jacksonville. Delores has a sincere interest in many areas of need, and through the Weaver Family Foundation, she and husband, Wayne, have supported the work of many local agencies. The Weavers have been married 46 years and have two children, Brad and Leigh, and an 11-year-old granddaughter, Morgan. Leigh is the artist of TOUCHDOWN, the 16-foot-long and six-foot-high bronze jaguar that stands outside the West Touchdown Club at ALLTEL Stadium.

Delores is committed to helping families and young people in the Jacksonville community lead self-sufficient, meaningful lives. Under her leadership, all seven Jacksonville television stations and their affiliates, as well as the local newspaper, have joined in partnership to address the problem of teen pregnancy, AIDS and increased male responsibility. Teen pregnancy is a major personal concern for Delores and is being addressed by the Foundation and local media in the effort to develop a quality prevention program for teens and to heighten awareness of adults in Jacksonville.

When asked about being a member of the public speaking circuit, Delores laughs and says, "It is interesting to note that until November 30, 1993, no one seemed to care what I was interested in, what good work I might be doing or what I had to say." Then she gives the credit to the Jaguars, who "open the doors and I must walk through as many as I can." As to accomplishments, Delores is most proud of the Jaguars Foundation and the impact it has already made on behalf of economically and socially disadvantaged children in the greater Jacksonville area. For Delores, the Foundation was a dream come true in September 1994. In March 1995, six months before the Jaguars played their first game, the first grants were made to eight local agencies in the amount of \$140,000, and through June 2001, the Foundation has allocated more than \$3.7 million in grants. When talking about the Foundation, she is quick to credit the Jaguars partners for their generous financial support and the staff for their commitment to supporting programs that will have a long-term impact.

In addition to her concerns for Jacksonville's children, Delores has set a personal goal to help level the playing field of life for women and minorities. She is dedicated to eliminating sexism, racism and classism from the hearts, minds and vocabulary of our society.

Locally, Delores serves on the City of Jacksonville Juvenile Justice Comprehensive Strategy Board, the Governing Boards of the Jacksonville Community Foundation, LaVilla Cultural and Heritage Association, USO Council and WJCT Public Broadcasting, and she serves as Trustee of Fresh Ministries and the United Way of Northeast Florida. She served as Advisory Board Chair 2000 and 2001 for Ronald McDonald House and also serves on The Bridge of Northeast Florida's Advisory Board. Delores is a staunch supporter of the three local domestic violence shelters: Betty Griffin House, Hubbard House and Quigley House, as well as Planned Parenthood, and, a member of The International Women's Forum. Delores co-chaired the HabJax Golf Tournament, which in six years will have built 25 houses for deserving families who have earned a "hand up." The 2001 tournament was the most successful to date, raising more than \$247,000 with a net profit in excess of \$222,000. The 25 houses built represent a total contribution of \$820,000 since the first tournament in 1996. Building on this success, she will chair the Delores Barr Weaver HabJax Golf Tournament with the vision of building even more houses over the next six years. Delores says, "We can build houses for children, but then we must pray they will have a family to make it a home."

Nationally, Delores is a member of the Governing Boards of Martha Graham Dance Company and NFL Charities, both of New York, and the Dana-Farber Marathon Challenge and the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute of Boston, where Delores and Wayne have created the Claudia Adams Barr Program in Basic Cancer Research in memory and honor of her mother who lost her battle with cancer in 1957. Delores refers to cancer as her only known enemy and believes the answer to cures and the eventual elimination of that dreaded disease will be found at the workbench of research. The Weavers were instrumental in creating the Marathon Challenge, which provides an opportunity for participants in the Boston Marathon to raise funds for the work of the Barr Program. Since its inception in 1990, the Challenge has raised over \$12.6 million.

And yes, Delores was a football fan long before the Jaguars. She attends every game, and is as excited and nervous as Wayne on game day.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, JAGUARS FOUNDATION

Peter Racine joined the Jaguars Foundation in 2000 as director of programs, and assumed the position of executive director in March 2001.

For the past 20 years, he has served in non-profit agencies for abused, neglected, homeless, and run-away children, including eight years as executive director of the Northeast Florida Exchange Club Center for the Prevention of Child Abuse. From 1987 to 1992, as executive director for Covenant House in Honduras, he established the agency's overseas programs for street children in that country. Prior to that, he worked at Covenant House in Houston, New York and Toronto. Racine has collaborated in various national and international demonstration initiatives, including Community Partnerships for Protecting Children, sponsored by the Edna McConnell Clark Foundation; Early Childhood Violence Prevention Project, funded by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention; and Outreach to Urban Street Children, supported by the European Economic Community.

Racine received his B.A. at Rutgers, and his M.T.S. at Catholic Theological Union in Chicago. He and his wife, Kelly, have a daughter, Miriam.



CHAIRMAN AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Wayne Weaver is a man driven by a challenge. In six years under his ownership, the Jaguars have grown from an expansion team into one of the most successful franchises in the NFL. Thus, the club's 7-9 record in 2000 has forced a renewed vigor as he strives to guide his team back to the league's upper echelon.

"In the National Football League, you have to have the attitude that you won't accept anything less than winning," Weaver says. "It's disappointing when you have a season like we had last year. But I believe, if you look at our football team, that we probably have more talented athletes on this roster than any other team in the NFL. If you add the young players and the speed that we've added, I think we're going to be a very competitive football team this year. What I like is that nobody is expecting much of us this year. I think we're going to surprise a lot of people."

And that is nothing new for the Jaguars. In 1993, Weaver shocked the skeptics by winning an NFL expansion franchise for the city of Jacksonville. In 1994, he hired a winning coach in Tom Coughlin. In 1995 he presided over the building of one of the NFL's showpiece stadiums and four victories for his inaugural team. In 1996 he watched his second-year dream team win two playoff games — the victory over the Denver Broncos is one of pro football's biggest upsets ever — and reach within one game of the Super Bowl. In 1997 Weaver saw his Jaguars win 11 games, more than any third-year NFL team has ever won. In 1998 he presided over a division championship and the franchise's first-ever home playoff game. In 1999, the Jaguars finished with the NFL's best record, a 14-2 mark that is tied for the fourth-most victories ever in league history, as the Jaguars hosted the AFC Championship game. And in 2000, Weaver helped bring a Super Bowl to Jacksonville, as the city was selected by his fellow owners to host Super Bowl XXXIX on February 6, 2005.


As the Jaguars head into their seventh season, they are the most successful expansion franchise in NFL history. Champions of the AFC Central Division in 1998 and '99, they qualified for the playoffs four straight seasons from 1996 to '99. Those kinds of milestones are the result of Weaver's commitment to winning. Every year a new mountain to climb. Every year a new success. Every year even higher dreams. One goal remains: a Super Bowl championship.

One of the nation's most successful entrepreneurs, Weaver brought his enthusiasm and business acumen to Jacksonville, a city that was yearning for professional football. He wanted a model franchise and a team that would contend for the playoffs in a short time. He also wanted success both on and off the field, with a Foundation that is the envy of the league and players whose character is the pride of the city.

Weaver serves as the Jaguars' chairman and chief executive officer, overseeing the day-to-day operations of the team while allowing his hand-picked staff the autonomy to do its jobs. That's the Weaver way, and it has long proven to be a winning way.


On March 18, 1993, J. Wayne Weaver was introduced as the managing general partner of Touchdown Jacksonville, the group that was trying to win an expansion franchise for the city. Fewer than nine months later, the Jacksonville Jaguars were born.

Weaver has been called a dreamer. He is. But he also makes dreams happen. In winning the NFL's 30th franchise on November 30, 1993, Weaver led Jacksonville to what has been called one of the greatest upsets in sports history and the fulfillment of Jacksonville's more than 15-year dream of an NFL franchise. Another of Weaver's huge upsets was the awarding of the 2005 Super Bowl to Jacksonville on November 1, 2000. Jacksonville Mayor John

Delaney credited Weaver for helping get the game, saying, "You had to have a great facility, a good city, a new arena. But clearly, it was Wayne's relationships that did it." And Eagles owner Jeff Lurie said, "Our confidence in Wayne in delivering a great Super Bowl is very high."

But if football is his passion, Weaver also takes pride and joy in his other businesses. He is the acknowledged leader in the women's shoe industry.

He is chairman and the Weaver family is majority owner of Shoe Carnival, Inc., one of the nation's fastest-growing shoe retailers. Based in Evansville, Ind., Shoe Carnival, Inc., is a retail family shoe company with \$450 million in annual revenue. Weaver has nurtured Shoe Carnival from modest beginnings of four stores in 1985 to a current portfolio of 175 stores.

In July 1995, as the Jaguars went to their first training camp, Weaver became the majority owner, chairman and chief executive of LC Footwear, LLC with the acquisition of the company from Liz Claiborne, Inc. LC Footwear is a wholesale distributor to upscale department stores across the country. Headquartered in Jacksonville, the company is opening Liz Claiborne retail shoe stores nationwide and should have 45 stores open by the end of 2001. In fewer than five years under Weaver, it already has annual revenue in excess of \$110 million. Previously, Weaver was co-owner, president and CEO of Nine West Group, Inc., the leading designer and marketer of women's footwear, from 1978 to its initial public offering in February 1993. Nine West is credited with revolutionizing the women's shoe market, as sales grew under Weaver's leadership from \$9 million in 1978 to more than \$550 million in 1993.

Throughout his business career, Weaver has maintained a commitment to philanthropic endeavors. Since the awarding of the Jaguars franchise, Wayne and Delores have focused their charitable efforts through the Weaver Family Foundation and the Jaguars Foundation, in addition to their long-standing commitment to the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute in Boston. Wayne and Delores serve on the Institute's Board of Directors, and they support the Boston Marathon Challenge, which has raised \$12.6 million for the Claudia Adams Barr Program in Basic Cancer Research. The Barr Program is named in memory of Delores' mother.

Just as he has been innovative and proactive in business, Weaver has taken a leading role in supporting and promoting the NFL's youth football initiatives. He was the first team owner to appoint an employee dedicated to growing youth football, a move that is being followed by other NFL teams. Through support of the Pop Warner Junior Jaguars Bowl, the National Football Foundation Coaching Academy and many other events and programs, the Jaguars have established their commitment to the Jacksonville community and its young people in many ways. He is also chairman of the NFL Properties executive committee and is active on many other league committees.

Weaver is past chairman of the Fashion Footwear Association of New York. He also serves on the boards of Stein Mart, the Cummer Museum of Arts and Gardens, and the Alliance for World Class Education.

Weaver was born on January 14, 1935 in Columbus, Ga. A high-school graduate, he rose through the ranks of Brown Group, Inc., a major St. Louis-based shoe company. After serving as senior vice president, he departed in 1978 to become president and CEO of Nine West. Wayne and Delores live in Jacksonville. They have been married for 46 years and have a son, Bradley, a daughter, Leigh, and a 11-year-old granddaughter, Morgan. An avid sportsman and skier, Weaver ran the Boston Marathon in 1991 to support the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute.

HOYGHUE

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, FOOTBALL OPERATIONS

One of the brightest young executives in professional sports, Michael Huyghue has directed the Jaguars' football operations from start-up in 1994 through the franchise's first six seasons. He has been selected twice as one of the Top Under 40 Sports Executives by *Sports Business Journal*.

In each of the Jaguars' seven seasons, Huyghue has set the pace for all of the league's teams when it comes to signing players. In fact, in 1995 the team's first rookie class was signed collectively on June 1 — a first in the NFL.

Huyghue (pronounced "hewg") was one of the first people Wayne Weaver sought after gaining the franchise in November 1993. Huyghue joined the Jaguars in March 1994 as vice president of football operations, and he was promoted to senior vice president in 1996. He is also a member of the team's executive committee.

Huyghue oversees all football operations for the Jaguars, with primary responsibility for negotiating player contracts and administering the salary cap, as well as overall team budget and administration. He also plays an active role in league-wide administrative affairs, serving on the Management Council's working committee and the college relations advisory committee, and he is a trustee of the NFL Players Insurance Trust.

Huyghue was previously the Detroit Lions' vice president of administration and general counsel. He oversaw the day-to-day administrative responsibilities, negotiated player contracts and was instrumental in guiding the Lions to the NFC Central Division championship in 1993. In 1992 Huyghue served as vice president/administration and general counsel for the World League. During the 1991 season he was the general manager of the Birmingham Fire, which he directed to the North American West Division Championship.

From 1987 to '90, Huyghue was labor relations counsel to the NFL's Management Council, where he advised the then-28 member clubs on interpretation and enforcement of Collective Bargaining Agreement provisions between the league and the NFL Players Association. Rounding out his labor experience, Huyghue also served briefly in the legal department of the NFL Players' Association in 1987.

Huyghue earned a bachelor's degree in communication arts from Cornell University, where he excelled in baseball and was a three-year starter at wide receiver on the football team. He went on to earn a juris doctor degree from the University of Michigan Law School in 1987 and is a member of the State Bar in New York, New Jersey, Michigan and Florida. Huyghue was also elected to serve as a member of the Board of Trustees at Cornell and locally at Edward Waters College. He is very active in the Jacksonville community and is a board member of the Urban League, the YMCA, Communities in Schools and several others.

Huyghue was born September 21, 1961, in Windsor, Conn. He and his wife, Kimberly, have two daughters, Kristen Nicole and Kathryn Leigh, and a son, Tyler Jacob.

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, MARKETING

Dan Connell oversees all team marketing efforts, including sponsorships, communications and broadcasting, as well as interaction with the NFL office on marketing issues and city public relations. He is also a member of the team's executive committee.

Connell and the Jaguars' marketing department were featured in a May, 2000 issue of *Sports Business Journal*. "The integrated marketing approach the Jaguars have wielded is a textbook description that any professional sports entity would be wise to emulate."

Connell joined the Jaguars on March 16, 1994, but his involvement with the team pre-dated his hiring. As executive vice president of First Union Bank of Jacksonville, he was instrumental in rallying the Jacksonville business community in support of the city's expansion bid. His creativity and effort were instrumental in making possible Jacksonville's club seat drive in which NFL NOW! sold more than 10,000 premium seats in just 10 days in August 1993, a \$75 million show of community support that the NFL expansion committee was not able to overlook.

During his 31 years as a resident of Jacksonville, Connell has been deeply involved in the community, serving on various boards. In 1997 he was chairman of the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce and a commissioner on the Jacksonville Economic Development Commission. He presently serves on the board of trustees for The Bolles School, is a member of the First Union National Bank Advisory Board and is a trustee of Longleaf Partners Fund Trust. He is director emeritus and past president of the University of North Florida Foundation, Inc.

Connell received a bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Florida in 1970. He and his wife, Mary, have two sons, Andrew and Russell.

Bill Prescott is the vice president/chief financial officer for the Jaguars. He is also responsible for team financial and tax matters and interaction with the NFL and city of Jacksonville on financial matters. He is also a member of the team's executive committee.

Prescott also oversees the financial operations of other Wayne Weaver-related entities, such as Liz Claiborne Shoes, the DAR Group, the Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation and the Weaver Family Foundation.

Prescott has been involved with the Jaguars since their inception and has also handled the Weavers' finances since 1980. Prescott met Weaver while he worked as a tax manager for Deloitte & Touche. In 1989, Prescott joined Grill, Gilhuly, Prescott & Co. CPAs as a partner, where he continued to work with Wayne and Delores Weaver.

A native of the Bronx, N.Y., Prescott is a graduate of Pace University with a degree in accounting and a master's degree in taxation. He is a member of the American Institute of



Certified Public Accountants, the Connecticut Society of CPAs, the Financial Executive Institute and the financial advisory committee at Edward Waters College. He holds CPA licenses in both Connecticut and Florida. His hobbies include tennis, sailing and skiing. Prescott was born May 7, 1956. He has two sons, Christopher and Michael. While there, he represented Wayne Weaver and Touchdown Jacksonville during the expansion process. Vance is also of counsel with the Jacksonville office of Foley & Lardner, which serves as the primary law firm of the Jaguars. In private practice, Vance emphasized corporate and transactional work.

Vance did his undergraduate studies at the University of Rochester, where he received a bachelor's degree in economics in 1969. While at Rochester, he played varsity baseball and was captain of the varsity basketball team. He received his juris doctor degree in 1973 from Columbia, where he was a Harlan Fiske Stone Scholar.

Hired more than a year before the team's first game, Dan Edwards is responsible for overseeing all aspects of the Jaguars' internal and external communications, from media relations and publications to the content for the team's award-winning Internet site (www.jaguars.com). In January 2001, his responsibilities were expanded, and he now also oversees the team's in-house broadcasting department.

Now in his 18th season in the NFL and his eighth year with the Jaguars, Edwards was



named executive director of communications on May 4, 1994. Formerly the public relations director for the Pittsburgh Steelers (1985-93), he brought to the Jaguars 10 years of NFL experience working with the Pittsburgh Steelers, Miami Dolphins and the league office.

After receiving a scholarship from NFL Charities and serving as a public relations intern in the NFL office in 1984, Edwards spent the 1984 season working in publicity for the Miami Dolphins, who played in Super Bowl XX that year. In 1985 Edwards joined the Steelers as assistant public relations director, and in 1987 he was named director of public relations. In 1991, the Steelers' public relations department received the coveted Pete Rozelle Award, which is presented annually by the Pro Football Writers of America to the NFL's top PR staff. Edwards' Jaguars staff in both 1996 and '98 was voted one of three finalists for the award. He has also worked for the NFL Super Bowl staff at 14 Super Bowls in addition to the 1990 Pro Bowl.

Prior to entering the NFL, Edwards worked in professional baseball, spending one season as an administrative assistant with the Eugene (Ore.) Emeralds, a single-A affiliate of the Cincinnati Reds. He played football and baseball for Montgomery College (Md.) before transferring to the University of Oregon. 

HEAD COACH

The Jaguars enter the 2001 season with a tremendous challenge facing head coach Tom Coughlin: Guide the Jaguars back to a winning season and the playoffs.

And, to Coughlin, the goal of winning the Super Bowl is still foremost in his mind.

Coughlin has spent the entire offseason planning and strategizing the return of the Jaguars to the forefront of the NFL. Anything less is unacceptable to the man who had guided the fortunes of the team since its inception.

The Jaguars' success in Coughlin's first six seasons as head coach have whetted the appetites of Jaguars fans and raised the level of expectations as the team prepares for Year Seven and another run at the Super Bowl. This year, players returned to ALLTEL Stadium to read a new sign that hangs prominently in the Jaguars' team meeting room: "Let us lay awhile and bleed, and we'll rise to fight again."

"That's the message," says Coughlin. "We have some players who have played here all six years in which our franchise has been in operation, and they're not happy about last year. Our great loyal fans have not missed what has happened here in six years. It is an anomaly that we were 7-9 in 1999. So I'm as excited about this season as I've ever been in my life for a season to begin. If it were to start tomorrow, it wouldn't be too soon for me."

In six seasons as head coach of the Jacksonville Jaguars, Tom Coughlin has etched a record as impressive as anyone who has ever coached in the National Football League.

With 56 regular-season victories and 60 total wins in the franchise's short history, Coughlin has quickly moved into the elite of NFL head coaches — past and present.

■ His 56 victories rank ninth among current NFL head coaches (the eight above him have all coached at least one more season).

■ His winning percentage of .583 is higher than all but six active coaches.

■ He's more than halfway to joining an impressive list of the 24 coaches who have at least 100 career regular-season victories in the NFL.

■ Including playoffs, he averages 10 wins per season, more than all but five of the 24 coaches who have 100 career wins (Don Shula, Joe Gibbs, George Seifert, John Madden and Vince Lombardi).

And Coughlin won those 60 games while building the Jaguars from nothing into one of the NFL's most successful franchises and a team that has played in the AFC Championship game twice in its six-year history. The guiding force behind the success of the team is Coughlin. His quest for success permeates the organization, and his drive is embedded in his players. His standards are high; his goals are even higher.

"I've never seen somebody who wants to win so badly as coach Coughlin," said All-Pro wide receiver Jimmy Smith, "but it carries over to us. And that's what you need to get to the ultimate plateau."

In seven years since becoming the Jaguars' first and only head coach, Coughlin has quietly become the league's third-longest-tenured head coach among those with the same team. Only Minnesota's Dennis Green and Pittsburgh's Bill Cowher, with nine seasons each, have been coaching their current team longer than Coughlin.

In 1995, the Jaguars won four games, more than any previous expansion team in NFL

history. In 1996, they went to the playoffs and advanced all the way to the AFC Championship game. In 1997, they won a then-team-record 11 games. In 1998 they won 11 more games, including their first division championship in addition to their first home playoff game. And in 1999 the Jaguars had the NFL's best record, 14-2, and advanced to the AFC Championship game again. They slipped to 7-9 last year, which only seems to motivate Coughlin all the more.

Under Coughlin, who is known as an offensive mastermind, the Jaguars have compiled an impressive list of statistical accomplishments. They have led the NFL in both passing yards (4,367 in 1996) and rushing yards (2,091 in 1999). In fact, in 1999, the Jaguars not only were No. 1 in rushing, but they had the league's leading receiver, a feat that has only been accomplished by one other team in NFL history (the 1954 San Francisco 49ers).

Coughlin laid the foundation for a winning team in Jacksonville by preaching discipline and hard work, and his tenacity and determination quickly turned a new franchise into the most successful expansion team in NFL history.

Firm, fair, honest and demanding are the four words that describe Coughlin best. "I have very high levels of expectations, and I think players need that," he says. "Players want discipline; they want organization. We emphasize responsibility and accountability, and all the little things that help you win in the long run."

The proof is in the team's myriad of successes. In five seasons, comparisons can be made against the elite teams of the NFL: The Jaguars are one of only seven NFL teams to qualify for the playoffs at least four times in the last five years. Since 1997, they have the second-best record in the NFL, a 43-21 mark that is tied with Denver, two games behind Minnesota. Dating back to 1996, the Jaguars have the third-best record at home (32-8, behind only Green Bay and Denver), and they are tied with the best record on the road (20-14, tied with Minnesota and Tennessee). Of active NFL coaches, Coughlin has the fourth-best record in division games and the sixth-best mark in home games.

With 14 victories during the 1999 season, the Jaguars tied for the fourth-most victories in NFL history, and they hosted the AFC Championship game. Three years earlier, in 1996,

Coughlin's Jaguars won seven straight games and advanced to their first AFC Championship game, just one victory short of the Super Bowl in only the 35th game in the franchise's history. Jacksonville's 30-27 victory over Denver in that season's playoffs is widely acknowledged as one of the biggest upsets in pro football history. Coughlin was named the 1996 AFC Coach of the Year by United Press International.

Coughlin was named head coach of the Jacksonville Jaguars on February 21, 1994, the hand-picked choice of owner Wayne Weaver. "One of the things I was tremendously impressed with was Tom's discipline, attitude and decisiveness of how he would build this franchise," Weaver said. "It was apparent to me that Tom was not only a brilliant football coach, but he's also an extraordinarily bright man who understands the organization, administration and detail that are needed to build something from the beginning."

A veteran of 32 years in the coaching profession, Coughlin had 25 years of coaching experience before he took over the Jaguars, including seven years as a college head coach and seven seasons as an NFL assistant coach.

He spent the 1984 and '85 seasons as the wide receivers coach for the Philadelphia Eagles, and he was with the Green Bay Packers in 1986 and '87 as the receivers coach. He served with the New York Giants from 1988 to '90 as the receivers coach, contributing to the Super Bowl XXV victory over Buffalo in his last season with the Giants. In 1993, Coughlin was offered the opportunity to return to the Giants as their head coach, but he declined the job so he could continue building the Boston College football program.

Coughlin's arrival in Jacksonville followed three seasons (1991-93) as head coach at Boston College, where he turned a struggling football program into a Top 20 team. Posting a 21-13-1 record in those seasons, Coughlin capped his Boston College tenure with a 9-3 record in 1993 which included eight consecutive wins, a 41-39 defeat of No. 1-ranked Notre Dame and a victory over Virginia in the Carquest Bowl. His last Boston College team was ranked 13th in the Associated Press poll and 12th in the USA Today/CNN coaches poll, despite beginning the season with an 0-2 start. He led Boston College to an 8-2-1 record in 1992, including a Hall of Fame Bowl berth, after posting a 4-7 mark in his first season.

It was at Boston College where Coughlin met Jay McGillis, a special young player who died of leukemia at the age of 21. In 1996 Coughlin started the Jay Fund Foundation in honor of McGillis, and in the last six years the annual Tom Coughlin Jay Fund Foundation Celebrity Golf Classic has awarded a total of \$786,000 to Jacksonville-area pediatric leukemia patients and their families, as well as patients of other childhood cancers.

"It's hard enough to undergo a family crisis of health. But on top of that to have the questions of whether or not the family can function as a unit because of impending bills, that has to be catastrophic," said Coughlin. "So I think whatever we can do along those lines is a great thing — and in Jay's name."

Coughlin began his coaching career in 1969 as a graduate assistant at Syracuse, his alma mater. The next season he began a four-year stint at Rochester Institute of Technology, where he served as head coach from 1970 to '73, compiling a record of 16-15-2. Coughlin returned to Syracuse under Frank Maloney in 1974 and held the position of offensive coordinator from 1977 to '80, directing an offense that led the Orangemen to a berth and victory in the 1979 Independence Bowl, Syracuse's first postseason appearance in 13 years.

In 1981 Coughlin went to Boston College for the first time, as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under Jack Bicknell. He helped the Eagles win their first bowl bid in 40 years while coaching Doug Flutie, the 1984 Heisman Trophy winner. In 1983, Coughlin's last season as a Boston College assistant coach, the team earned the Lambert-Meadowlands Trophy as Eastern Champion, the first won by the Eagles since 1942.

Coughlin's playing career began as a standout scholastic star at Waterloo (N.Y.) Central High School in his hometown. He attended Syracuse University, where he was a three-year letterman for legendary coach Ben Schwartzwalder from 1965 to '67. A wingback for the Orangemen, Coughlin played alongside All-America backs Larry Csonka and Floyd Little. He played in the 1966 Gator Bowl in Jacksonville against Tennessee. As a senior in 1967, he broke the Syracuse single-season pass receiving record, which had stood since the 1950s. An excellent student, Coughlin also won Syracuse's Orange Key Award that year as the university's outstanding scholar athlete. He graduated in 1968 with a bachelor's degree in education, and in 1969 he received his master's degree in education.

The oldest of seven children, Thomas Richard Coughlin was born August 31, 1946 in Waterloo, N.Y. He and his wife, Judy, have two daughters, Kelli and Katie, and two sons, Brian and Tim, and a daughter-in-law, Andrea (Tim's wife).



Bonamego, 37, joined the Jaguars from the U.S. Military Academy, where he was an assistant coach for six years. At Army, Bonamego was the special teams coach and recruiting coordinator from 1994 to '98 after serving as an assistant outside linebackers coach in 1993. He was the running backs and special teams coach at Lehigh in 1992, and he served at Maine from 1988 to '91, two years as a graduate assistant and two years in charge of wide receivers and special teams. He was the head coach at Mt. Pleasant (Mich.) High School in 1987, and he began his career as a player-coach with the Verona (Italy) Redskins in 1986.

Bonamego was born August 14, 1963 in Waynesboro, Pa. He received a degree in health fitness in 1987 at Central Michigan, where he lettered twice at wide receiver and quarterback. He earned a master's degree in physical education from Maine in 1992. A native of Paw Paw, Mich., he and his wife, Paulette, live in Neptune Beach with their children Javier (2/28/97) and Giovanni (7/12/01).

In his first three seasons as the Jaguars' secondary coach, Perry Fewell has been fortunate to work with Dick Jauron and Dom Capers, both former secondary coaches who were the Jaguars' defensive coordinator before moving on to head coaching jobs with NFL teams.

In those three seasons, Fewell's units have broken a number of team records, and he heads into 2001 with a secondary that includes a solid quartet of starters in cornerbacks Fernando Bryant and Aaron Beasley and safeties Carnell Lake and Donovin Darius. Bryant and Darius were named to All-Rookie teams in their first seasons, and in 1999 Lake was the team's first Pro Bowl defensive back and Beasley set the team's single-season interception record. That season, the Jaguars' secondary had 15 of the team's 19 interceptions.

In Fewell's three seasons with the Jaguars, the team's pass defense ranking improved from 24th in 1997 to 23rd in '98, third in '99 and 14th in 2000, and the number of passing



touchdowns allowed by the defense declined from 24 in 1997 to 23 in '98, 18 in '99 and 23 in 2000.

Fewell was named the Jaguars' secondary coach on February 16, 1998. Now in his 17th year in coaching, the 38-year-old Fewell joined the Jaguars from Vanderbilt, where he served as secondary coach from 1995 to '97 and also as assistant head coach in 1997. That year, Vanderbilt had its best overall defense in school history and led the Southeastern Conference for the first time ever. Fewell was largely responsible for the development of Corey Chavous, who was selected by Arizona with the 33rd pick in the 1998 draft.

Fewell attended South Point High in Belmont, N.C., where he played football and participated in track. He went to Lenoir-Rhyne College, graduating with a degree in business administration in 1985. He lettered four years in football and was named the team's Most Improved Player in 1983. Following his playing career he spent one year as a graduate assistant at his alma mater.

Fewell was a graduate assistant at the University of North Carolina in 1985 and '86. He was the defensive backs coach at Army in 1987, then coached wide receivers at Kent State for four years before returning to Army as the defensive line coach from 1992 to '94. He was born September 7, 1962 in Gastonia, N.C. He and his wife, Kathleen, live in Jacksonville.

Greg Finnegan is in his fourth season as the Jaguars' assistant strength and conditioning coach. He assists in the development and implementation of the Jaguars' speed, strength and conditioning program.

He was named to his position on February 10, 1998. Finnegan, 32, previously was the director of strength and conditioning at Boston College. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Kansas State in 1992. In 1994, he moved on to become an assistant strength coach at Boston College.

Finnegan was born February 21, 1969 in Toledo, Ohio. He earned a degree in nutritional science in 1992 from Cornell University, where he was an All-Ivy League center and a captain of the football team. He earned a master's degree in exercise physiology in 1994 from Kansas State. Finnegan is a member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association, as well as the American College of Sports Medicine. He has written several articles focusing on a variety of topics such as nutritional supplements and football training.

Considered perhaps the top special teams coach in professional football, Frank Gansz enters his second season as the special teams coordinator of the Jaguars.

Gansz came to the Jaguars on February 24, 2000, joining the organization from the Super Bowl champion St. Louis Rams, where he spent the previous three seasons. He left the Rams shortly after helping the team to its victory in Super Bowl XXXIV and joined the Jaguars a few weeks later so he could work with Tom Coughlin, with whom he coached on the Philadelphia Eagles staff in the 1980s.

Gansz was named the NFL's Special Teams Coach of the Year in 1999, an honor he also received in 1989. A former head coach of the Kansas City Chiefs, Gansz is in his 24th season of coaching in the NFL and 37th season in all.

In 1999, the Rams' special teams units scored three touchdowns and led the NFL in kickoff returns, and Tony Horne led the league with a 29.7-yard average. St. Louis ranked 14th in punt return average (9.6) and was fifth in punt coverage (6.7). In addition, placekicker Jeff Wilkins set an NFL record for most extra points in a season without a miss (64). In 1985, when Gansz was assistant head coach/special teams for Kansas City, the Chiefs blocked or deflected an NFL-record 10 kicks and scored five touchdowns. The special teams helped Kansas City claim its first playoff berth in 15 years by scoring all 24 points in a 24-19 victory over Pittsburgh in the season finale.


Gansz was the Chiefs' head coach in 1987 and '88. He was the special teams coach of the Detroit Lions from 1989 to '93, a period in which Mel Gray developed into the NFL's all-time leader in combined kick return yardage. In 1989, he was named Special Teams Coach of the Year by his peers. He was the assistant head coach/special teams for the Atlanta Falcons from 1994 to '96.

Gansz's NFL career began in 1978 as special teams coach for the San Francisco 49ers. He coached special teams and tight ends for Cincinnati in 1979 and '80, Kansas City in 1981 and '82 and Philadelphia from 1983 to '85.

After serving as a pilot in the U.S. Air Force for nearly seven years, Gansz began his coaching career at the Air Force Academy, before moving on to stints at Colgate, Navy, Oklahoma State, Army and UCLA.

Born in Altoona, Pa., Gansz attended Taylor-Allderdice High in Pittsburgh. He was inducted into the Western Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in 1999. He played center and linebacker for the Naval Academy from 1957 to '59 and graduated in 1960. Gansz and his wife, Barbara, have two children: Frank Jr. (who is the special teams coach of the Kansas City Chiefs) and Jennifer, and three grandsons: John, Jeff and James Pearson.

Paul Haynes joined the Jaguars as the defensive quality control coach on February 28, 2000. He replaces Lane Kiffin, who is now the tight ends coach at Southern California.

Haynes, 31, assists the defensive coaching staff in all aspects of game preparation, including scouting reports, opponent breakdown and writing the playbook. He also assists in coaching the secondary.

He joined the Jaguars from Kent State, where he was the assistant head coach/safeties coach in 2000 after one season as the school's secondary coach. He spent the 1997 and '98 seasons at Northern Iowa, where he coached running backs and the secondary. Prior to that, Haynes was the secondary coach at Ferris State in 1995 and '96, a graduate assistant coach at Bowling Green in 1994, and an assistant coach at St. Francis DeSales High School in Columbus, Ohio, in 1993.

Haynes played safety at Kent State from 1987 to '90, earning a scholarship after walking on. He was team captain as a senior and second-team All-Conference as a junior and senior. He earned a bachelor's degree from Kent State in criminal justice and attended graduate school in guidance and counseling at Bowling Green. He is a native of Columbus, Ohio.



Fred Hoaglin has been around the NFL longer than any member of the Jaguars' coaching staff — 35 years dating back to 1966 when he was a rookie center with the Cleveland Browns. But the 2001 season with the Jaguars will be a memorable one for Hoaglin, who plans to retire following the season and move into his dream house in Hilton Head, S.C.

Hoaglin was one of the NFL's best offensive line coaches before joining the Jaguars in 1997 as tight ends coach. His acumen teaching blocking has helped the Jaguars surpass 2,000 yards rushing each of the last three seasons (the only NFL team to do so), as the team has had great success running in two-tight end sets behind the blocking of Kyle Brady and Damon Jones. But Hoaglin has also overseen huge improvements in the team's passing game to its tight ends. In 2000, Brady not only shattered his own career highs, but he broke all of the Jaguars' records for receptions and yards receiving by a tight end.

Hoaglin joined the Jaguars from the New England Patriots on February 11, 1997, coaching tight ends for the first time in his career after serving as an offensive line coach for the previous 19 years. Now in his 24th season as an NFL assistant coach, Hoaglin has been a member of three Super Bowl staffs, winning twice as the offensive line coach

for the New York Giants in Super Bowls XXI and XXV.

Hoaglin was drafted in the sixth round by the Cleveland Browns in 1966, and he broke into the starting lineup as a rookie. A versatile player, he spent the majority of his 11-year career at center. In 1969, his peers elected him to the Pro Bowl, and he put together a string of 69 consecutive starts in the late 1960s. He played seven years in Cleveland before being traded to Baltimore in 1973. He spent the following two seasons (1974-75) with the Houston Oilers before finishing his career in 1976 with the expansion Seattle Seahawks.

After retiring as a player in 1976, Hoaglin was hired by the Detroit Lions in 1978, coaching there through 1984. In 1985, he was hired by Bill Parcells in New York and a year later the Giants won their first Super Bowl. Hoaglin remained with the Giants through 1992, coaching on a second Super Bowl championship team in 1990, along with Tom Coughlin, who was then the Giants' receivers coach. Hoaglin re-joined Parcells in New England in 1993, coaching the Patriots' offensive line for four seasons. The Patriots allowed only 102 sacks in Hoaglin's four seasons.

Hoaglin was a starter at both center and linebacker at the University of Pittsburgh and was selected to play in the North-South All-Star game his senior year. He also earned two varsity letters in golf while in college. He received a degree in industrial engineering in 1968. He was born January 28, 1944 in Alliance, Ohio. He and his wife, Janet, have two children: Patricia Compton (3/5/68) and George III "Rick" (9/23/70); a daughter-in-law, Jocelyn Hoaglin; a son-in-law, Derek Compton, and two grandchildren: Andrew (5/28/87) and Kristina Compton (4/11/89).

The Jaguars are the only NFL team to have rushed for more than 2,000 yards each of the last three seasons, and in that time they have run for the most touchdowns in the NFL (59). Those facts are due much to the coaching of Jerald Ingram, the team's soft-spoken assistant who is quickly becoming regarded as one of the best in the NFL at his position. Since the inception of the Jaguars franchise, the running backs have always been coached by Ingram.

The Jaguars were once known primarily as a passing team, but they led the NFL in rushing in 1999, totalling 2,091 yards behind the tandem of Fred Taylor and James Stewart. In 2000, Taylor, despite missing three-and-a-half games, rushed for a team-record 1,399 yards and had nine consecutive 100-yard games, tied for the third-longest streak in NFL history. In 1998, the Jaguars ran for a team-record 2,102 yards behind Taylor, who set 29 team records. Ingram is equally adept in coaching the total game for the team's running backs, notably blocking and pass receiving. In fact, running backs have two of the three longest touchdown receptions in team history.

In 2001, the Jaguars will once again be led by Taylor, who is one of the top breakaway threats in the NFL, and he is backed up by youngsters Stacey Mack and Shyrone Smith. The team's fullback will be a first-year player, but there's no reason the Jaguars won't be among the NFL's elite running teams again in 2001.

Ingram was named to the Jaguars' coaching staff on March 3, 1994 after three seasons as running backs coach at Boston College under Tom Coughlin. Ingram, 40, is in his 18th year of coaching. Following his college days as a running back at the University of Michigan, Ingram was a graduate assistant at Michigan in 1984. In 1985 he joined the Bell



State coaching staff as tight ends coach, followed by five seasons as running backs coach. In Ingram's last three seasons at Ball State, the team posted a 22-10-2 record, the best among the nine Mid-American Conference schools. In 1991, Ingram joined Tom Coughlin's Boston College staff.

Ingram earned three letters and was a member of five bowl teams as a fullback for Michigan from 1979 to '84. He played for the Wolverines' two Big Ten champion squads that advanced to the Rose Bowl, in addition to playing in the Sugar, Gator and Bluebonnet Bowls. Ingram graduated from Michigan in 1984 with a degree in general studies.

Ingram was born December 24, 1960 at Wright Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton, Ohio and grew up in Beaver, Pa. He and his wife, Kathleen, have a son, Julian (7/27/97), and they live in Jacksonville.

In 2000, all of Mike Maser's abilities as an offensive line coach were put to the test, as a rash of injuries decimated the offensive line early in the season. But, by the end of the year, Maser's starting line — which featured a rookie in Brad Meester, a first-time starter in Todd Fordham, two players who weren't even with the team in training camp in Jeff Smith and Brenden Stal, and perennial All-Pro Tony Boselli, who still wasn't 100 percent following a 1999 knee injury — had developed into a solid group that protected quarterback Mark Brunell and paved huge holes for running back Fred Taylor.

Boselli, Meester and Smith are back in 2001, and they will be joined in the starting unit by Zach Wiegert (who was injured at midseason of last year) and most likely second-round draft choice Maurice Williams at right tackle.

The Jaguars are the only NFL team to have rushed for more than 2,000 yards each of the last three seasons (leading the league in 1999), and the team has rushed for more than 200 yards in a game four times in the last two years.

Maser, 54, joined the Jaguars' staff on March 3, 1994 following 13 seasons at Boston College, the last three under Tom Coughlin. Maser is a veteran of 32 seasons in coaching.

A guard in college, he began his coaching career in 1969 as a student assistant at the University of Buffalo. In 1970, he coached for one year at Darien High School in Darien, Conn. A service veteran, Maser coached at the U.S. Military Academy Prep School at Fort Belvoir, Va. In 1971 and '72, in 1973, he was the assistant offensive line coach at Marshall, and then he spent five years as offensive coordinator and head of recruiting for Bluefield State College in West Virginia. In 1979 and '80, Maser was an assistant under Jack Bucknell at Maine, and in 1981 he joined Bucknell's staff at Boston College. When Coughlin was named head coach at Boston College in 1991, he retained Maser as offensive line coach. During Maser's tenure at Boston College, the team played in six bowl games.

Maser attended the University of Buffalo, where he was a three-year starter at guard. He graduated in 1970 with a bachelor's degree in health, physical education and recreation. In 1974 he received a master's degree in physical education from Marshall University. Maser was born March 2, 1947 in Clayton, N.Y. He and his wife, Barbara, have three grown children, daughter Brigitte and sons Greg and Brian.

Garrick McGee enters his second season as the Jaguars' offensive quality control coach. He was named to his position on March 1, 2000. McGee, 28, assists the offensive coaching staff in all aspects of game preparation, including scouting reports, opponent breakdown and writing the playbook. He also assists coaching the quarterbacks.

McGee spent the 1999 season as the wide receivers coach at the University of Northern Iowa, coaching players who set several school and conference records for total offense, yards passing and touchdown passes. He coached at Langston University from 1996 to '98, serving as defensive backs coach, quarterbacks coach and then special teams coordinator and wide receivers coach.

McGee played quarterback at the University of Oklahoma, where he was the Big Eight Offensive Newcomer of the Year in 1994, when he set school single-season records for pass attempts and completions and finished second in passing yards and total offense. He ranked fourth in the Big Eight and 43rd nationally in total offense. McGee played at Northeast Oklahoma A&M in 1993, where he was honorable mention JUCO All-America. He was redshirted at Arizona State in 1991 and he started two of four games played in '92 under Bruce Snyder and then-ASU quarterbacks coach Bob Petrino, who is now the Jaguars' offensive coordinator. He earned a bachelor's degree from Oklahoma in 1996.

He was All-City and All-State as a junior and senior at Booker T. Washington High in Tulsa, Okla., where he played for his father. McGee was born on April 6, 1973 in Kansas City, Mo. He lives in Jacksonville.



Gary Moeller was named defensive coordinator on February 6, 2001, replacing Dom Capers, who is now the head coach of the expansion Houston Texans. Moeller joined the Jaguars from the Detroit Lions, where he had served as the interim head coach from November 6 until January 25, when he was replaced by Marty Mornhinweg.

Moeller, 60, had been the Lions' linebackers coach since 1997, and he added the duties of assistant head coach in 2000. As interim head coach, he replaced Bobby Ross, who retired at midseason. The Lions were 4-3 during Moeller's stint as head coach, winning the first three games, including a 31-21 victory over the eventual NFC champion New York Giants, which was the Giants' last loss before the Super Bowl.

As the Lions' assistant head coach, Moeller helped Ross in administrative and consult-



ing matters, as well as attending team salary cap meetings. His linebacking corps featured Pro Bowler Stephen Boyd (who played for Coughlin at Boston College) and 1999 No. 1 draft pick Chris Claiborne. His first NFL job was as the tight ends coach of the Cincinnati Bengals in 1995 and '96.

Moeller was the head coach at the University of Michigan from 1990 to '94, succeeding the legendary Bo Schembechler. He produced a record of 44-13-3 in his five years as head coach, his teams won three Big Ten championships, were victorious in four bowl games in five appearances on New Year's Day (including the 1993 Rose Bowl), had five straight appearances in the top 20, and had an undefeated 9-0-3 mark in 1992. Under Moeller, Michigan won a Big Ten-record 19 consecutive conference games from 1990 to '92 and went unbeaten in 22 straight Big Ten games from 1990 to '93 to set another conference mark. By winning the Big Ten title in his first season as head coach, Moeller joined Fritz Crisler, Bernie Oosterbaan and Fielding Yost as the only coaches in school history to accomplish the feat.

Moeller began his coaching career in 1964 at Bellfontaine (Ohio) High School, where he spent three years before becoming an assistant to Schembechler at Miami of Ohio in 1967. He moved to Michigan with Schembechler in 1969, serving as defensive ends coach. He was promoted to defensive coordinator in 1973, and his 1974 and '76 defensive units led the nation in scoring defense. In 1977, at age 36, he was named head coach at the University of Illinois. Following three seasons at Illinois, he returned to Michigan in 1980 as quarterbacks coach. He also held both the defensive and offensive coordinator positions during his second stint at Michigan.

A three-time letter winner at Ohio State under Woody Hayes, Moeller played center and linebacker for the Buckeyes from 1960 to '62. A native of Lima, Ohio, he was the Ohio State team captain in 1962. Moeller and his wife, Ann, have three daughters: Susan Weeks, Amy Hevel and Molly Edwards, and a son, Andy, who lettered three times as a linebacker at Michigan and is currently the school's tight ends/tackles coach.



After two seasons as the Jaguars' quality control coach, John McNulty was promoted to wide receivers coach in 2000, and he coached two of the most prolific receivers in the NFL in Jimmy Smith and Keenan McCardell. In a game at Baltimore, Smith set team records with 15 catches and 291 yards (the fifth-highest total in NFL history), and he caught 91 passes for 1,213 yards in earning his fourth consecutive trip to the Pro Bowl. Meanwhile, McCardell set career highs with a team-leading 94 receptions for 1,207 yards in having his best season ever.

In addition to former first-round draft choice Sean Dawkins, McNulty also tutors two young players in R. Jay Soward and Alvis Whitted, and is working with them to reach their fullest potential. Soward and Whitted are talented players of whom much is expected in 2001.

McNulty, 33, began his coaching career as a graduate assistant under Gary Moeller at the University of Michigan in 1991, and he worked with the team's defensive line in 1993 and the wide receivers in 1994. In 1994, he coached the Big Ten's leading receiving duo of Amani Toomer (New York Giants) and Mercury Hayes (former Atlanta Falcon). While at Michigan, the team won two Big Ten titles, earning trips to the Rose Bowl against Washington both years. In the 1991 game, the Wolverines were defeated by Mark Brunell's



Huskies, while in 1992 Michigan earned the victory. McNulty also coached in the Holiday Bowl (1994) and the Hall of Fame Bowl (1993). In 1995 he joined the staff at the University of Connecticut working with wide receivers and special teams. He coached 1,000-yard receivers in 1995 and '97 and an All-American in 1997.

McNulty was born May 29, 1968 in Scranton, Pa. and was a high school standout at Abington Heights High in Clarks Summit, Pa. He graduated from Penn State in 1990 with a degree in business management and business law. He played four years as a safety at Penn State under Joe Paterno, playing in bowl games each of his four seasons. McNulty and his wife, Kimberly, reside in Jacksonville Beach.

Jerry Palmieri has been the strength and conditioning coach of the Jaguars since they began play in 1995. Palmieri was selected by the Professional Football Strength and Conditioning Coaches Society to receive the 1999 Coach of the Year Award, honoring his contributions to his profession.

Under Palmieri's guidance, the Jaguars have had nearly 100 percent attendance for their four-day-a-week offseason conditioning program over the last seven years. That has helped the team reap the benefits of his program, in which players have annually set personal bests for strength, speed and other conditioning aspects which ultimately produce more powerful athletes. In this year's offseason conditioning program, the team's average body fat decreased by 1.5 percent, vertical jump increased 1.14 inches, and the average player's bench and incline increased by 22 pounds. The Jaguars have 24 veteran players who can squat more than 600 pounds and 28 veterans who can power clean more than 300 pounds.

Palmieri's philosophy is two-fold. Intangibly, he uses a scriptural verse: "Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might ..." (Ecclesiastes 9:10). Each athlete is challenged to work hard and reach his fullest potential — tangibly, its strength and power. Palmieri's goal is to help each athlete increase in size, strength and speed, which ultimately produces a more powerful athlete. "Coach Coughlin wants our team to play physical on the field," says Palmieri. "Our job is to make our players more physical and more powerful, so that their play will be physical in competition."

Palmieri joined the Jaguars on January 11, 1995 after having served as director of strength and conditioning operations at Boston College since 1993, where he was hired by Tom Coughlin. Prior to his stint at Boston College, Palmieri spent six years overseeing the strength and conditioning program at Kansas State. He began his career as a strength coach in 1982 at North Carolina, followed by three years at Oklahoma State. In addition to his coaching experience, Palmieri has taught college physical education classes and written articles about strength and conditioning for national publications. He has also produced videos on strength and speed training and is active with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

A 1980 graduate of Montclair State, Palmieri received a master's degree in exercise physiology from the University of North Carolina in 1984. He is a three-time Golden Gloves champion (1976-78) and competed in international competition as a member of the 1978 and 1979 USA Boxing Teams. He was born October 30, 1958 in Englewood, N.J. Jerry and his wife, Ellen, have a son, Tony (12/18/85), and a daughter, Annamarie (10/2/87).

The strength of the Jaguars' defense has always been the play of its defensive line, which has been coach by John Pease since the team was first built in 1995. Pease is regarded as one of the top defensive line coaches in the NFL, and his efforts were rewarded in 2001 when he was promoted by Tom Coughlin to serve as the Jaguars' assistant head coach. Pease's expanded duties include coordination of the team's offseason strength and conditioning program, as well as assisting Coughlin in the organization and logistics of the April minicamp and the June pre-camp, as well as administrative assignments involving scheduling and training camp.

A constant to a Pease-coached defensive line is that he rotates seven or eight players throughout every game at both tackle and end, keeping his players fresh for the entire 60 minutes of each game. Under Pease, the Jaguars are always among the league sack leaders, averaging 42 sacks per season since 1996. But Pease's front four is also sturdy against the run — in the last five years, only three other teams have allowed fewer than the 50 rushing scores given up by Jacksonville.


Pease, 57, was named defensive line coach on January 12, 1995 following nine seasons as defensive line coach for the New Orleans Saints. He is a veteran of 31 years in coaching, a career that also includes 13 years at the college level and three in the USFL.

Pease began his fulltime coaching career at Fullerton College in 1970, as linebackers coach (1970-72) and defensive line coach (1973). He also had stints at Long Beach State, Utah and Washington. From 1983 to '85, he was on the coaching staff of the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars of the USFL along with Dom Capers under head coach Jim Mora. The Stars won the USFL championship in 1984 and '85. When Mora was named head coach of the Saints, Pease joined him in New Orleans, where he was from 1986 until joining the Jaguars in 1995. The Saints were a playoff team three of Pease's last five seasons.

A graduate of the University of Utah, Pease began college at Fullerton Junior College, where he was a two-time Junior College All-America selection. He was inducted into the California Community College Football Coaches Hall of Fame in 1999. He transferred to Utah and was named All-Western Athletic Conference as a senior wingback. From 1965 to '67, he served in the military in Puerto Rico and coached at Antilles High School. In 1968 and '69, he was a graduate assistant at Utah prior to moving to Fullerton the next year.

Pease was born October 14, 1943 in Pittsburgh. He was on the training camp roster of the Los Angeles Rams after his final collegiate season. He has two daughters, Tracy and Kristen, and four grandsons, Stephen, Greg, Ty and Kyle. He lives in Jacksonville with his wife, Chris.

After two seasons as the Jaguars' quarterbacks coach, Bob Petrino was promoted to offensive coordinator this year, taking over the play-calling duties from head coach Tom Coughlin.

He becomes the third offensive coordinator on Coughlin's staff in seven years, after the first two left to become NFL head coaches. Kevin Gilbride was the team's first offensive coordinator in 1995 and '96 before being named head coach of the San Diego Chargers. Chris Palmer was the offensive coordinator in 1997 and '98 prior to being chosen as head coach of the Cleveland Browns. Coughlin took on play-calling duties for the 1999 and 2000 seasons after Palmer's departure.

Petrino, 40, is in his 19th year in coaching, including 10 previous seasons as an offensive coordinator at the college level. In addition to overseeing the offense, Petrino will continue to coach the quarterbacks — Mark Brunell and backups Jamie Martin and Jonathan Quinn, all of whom have led the Jaguars to victories. Under Petrino's tutelage, Brunell ranked fourth and sixth in the AFC in passing in 1999 and 2000, respectively, and last year Brunell tied his team record with 20 touchdown passes, while passing for 3,640 yards, his second-highest total in six seasons in Jacksonville.

Petrino joined the Jaguars on February 10, 1999 following 16 years coaching in college football. In 1998, he was the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at the University of Louisville, where he coached quarterback Chris Redman, now with the Baltimore Ravens. Petrino has been the coordinator of teams that led the nation in total offense at three collegiate levels: NAIA, Division I-AA and Division I.

He was the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Utah State from 1995 to '97, and the latter two seasons the team's offense ranked ninth in the nation. In 1994, Petrino spent one season as the offensive coordinator at the University of Nevada, where his offense ranked second in the nation in yards and third in scoring. In 1994, Nevada became, at that time, only the third team in NCAA history to have a 3,000-yard passer, a 1,000-yard rusher and a 1,000-yard receiver.

He began his coaching career in 1983 as a graduate assistant at Carroll College (Mont.), and he spent one season as quarterbacks coach at Weber State in 1984. He returned to Carroll College as offensive coordinator and produced the NAIA's top-ranked offense in both 1985 and '86. In 1987 Petrino returned to Weber State, coaching tight ends and wide receivers for two years. He then spent three seasons as the offensive coordinator at the University of Idaho and two seasons as the quarterbacks coach at Arizona State.

Petrino attended Carroll College in Helena, Mont., where he was a NAIA All-America quarterback and led the team to three consecutive Frontier Conference championships and was named the league's Most Valuable Player in 1981 and '82. He received a degree in mathematics and physical education from Carroll College in 1983.

Petrino comes from a coaching family. His father, Bob Petrino, is a member of the NAIA Coaches Hall of Fame after having served for 29 years as head coach at Carroll College. Bob's brother, Paul, is in his third season as the quarterbacks coach at Southern Mississippi.

Petrino was born March 10, 1961 in Lewiston, Mont. He and his wife, Becky, have four children: Kelsey (11/27/86), Dominic (5/5/88), Bobby (3/24/90) and Katie (10/3/91). They live in Jacksonville.

Lucious Selmon, a former All-America defensive lineman for Oklahoma, was named outside linebackers coach on January 17, 1996. Selmon, 50, joined the Jaguars after serving as outside linebackers coach at Oklahoma, where he coached the previous 18 years.


He is primarily responsible for coaching the team's strongside linebackers, which this year will be Kevin Hardy, who moves over from weakside linebacker, where he was the team's leading tackler last year. It's a reunion for Selmon and Hardy, the 1996 No. 1 draft choice and the team's highest-selected defensive player ever, who were together in 1996 and '97 before Hardy moved to the weakside. As a rookie, Hardy exceeded expectations by making 130 tackles (second on the team), as well as 5.5 sacks and two interceptions, and he was named to the NFL All-Rookie team.

The oldest of the three famed Selmon brothers who were all consensus All-Americans at Oklahoma, Selmon graduated in 1974 with a degree in special education. He was a letterman from 1971 to '73 and was a teammate with his younger brothers, Dewey and Lee Roy, for one season. As a senior in 1973, Selmon served as team captain and was a finalist for the Heisman Trophy, runner-up for the Outland Trophy and the Lombardi Award, Defensive Player of the Year in the Big Eight Conference and Chevrolet Player of the Year.

After his college career, Selmon played in the World Football League for the Memphis Southmen in 1974 and '75. He returned to Oklahoma in 1976 to begin his coaching career as an assistant on Barry Switzer's staff. From 1976 to '83 Selmon was the defensive line coach before serving as outside linebackers/defensive ends coach from 1984 to '94. Selmon coached under Switzer for 13 seasons and was retained on head coach Gary Gibbs' Oklahoma staff in '99. In 1989 and '90, Selmon spent training camps working with the coaching staff of the Denver Broncos. During that time he helped coach the Broncos' linebackers and defensive ends.

Selmon was born March 15, 1951 in Muskogee, Okla. and raised in Eufaula, Okla. He attended Eufaula High and was named All-State as a junior and senior.


INSIDE LINEBACKERS COACH

One of only four assistant coaches who have been with the Jaguars since 1994, a year before the franchise's first game, Steve Szabo has been a fixture coaching the team's inside linebackers (middle and weakside) in the 4-3 "under" defense.

His linebackers have led the team in tackles each of the club's first six seasons, and Kevin Hardy, who played on the weakside the last three years, has developed into one of the league's leading tacklers. In 1999, his fourth season,



Hardy led the Jaguars in tackles, set a personal record (and team best for the position) with 10 sacks and was named All-Pro and to the Pro Bowl. Last year, Szabo also coached free agent acquisition Hardy Nickerson and rookie third-rounder T.J. Slaughter in the middle, as well as veteran Brant Boyer when the team went to a nickel defense for most of the final six games.

This year, because Kevin Hardy moved back to strongside linebacker, Szabo will most have a new starter at weakside linebacker (either Slaughter or rookie Eric Westmoreland) to go with Nickerson on the inside.

Szabo joined the Jaguars' coaching staff on March 3, 1994 after three seasons as defensive coordinator at Boston College. Now in his 33rd year of coaching, Szabo spent 25 seasons at the college level, including three years as a college head coach.

A former college running back and defensive back, Szabo began his coaching career in 1969 at Johns Hopkins followed by stops at Toledo, Iowa, Syracuse, Iowa State, Ohio State, Western Michigan, Northern Iowa and Colorado State. From 1985 to '87 Szabo was head coach at Edinboro (Pa.) University.

After serving two seasons as defensive coordinator under Earl Bruce at Colorado State, Szabo joined Tom Coughlin's Boston College staff in 1991. In all, Szabo coached in a total of nine bowl games representing five different colleges.

As a halfback and defensive back at the U.S. Naval Academy from 1961 to '64, Szabo was a teammate of Heisman Trophy winner Roger Staubach. As a junior in 1963, Szabo played on the Navy team that ranked second and played for the national championship in the Cotton Bowl. He also played lacrosse for three national championship teams at the Naval Academy. Szabo graduated in 1965 with a bachelor's degree in naval science. After graduation he was stationed at Quantico from 1965 to '69, where he continued playing football for the Marines.

Szabo was born September 11, 1943 in Evergreen Park, Ill. He has two children from a previous marriage, Christine (5/12/72) and Mike (1/26/75), and he and his wife, Patti, have a son, Zack (7/28/88).

RICK

REIPRISH

DIRECTOR, PLAYER PERSONNEL

Rick Reiprash is the Jaguars' top personnel executive, overseeing both the pro and college scouting departments as well as the annual college draft. He has been instrumental in the Jaguars' success in the draft since the team's inception and in veteran player procurement since he was promoted to director of player personnel in 1998.

Now in his 23rd year in the NFL, Reiprash (pronounced RY-prish) has overseen the seven drafts that built the nucleus of a team that has been to the playoffs four times, with two trips to the AFC Championship game. Since overseeing all player personnel matters the last three years, Reiprash has guided the acquisition of players such as Hardy Nickerson, Carnell Lake, Gary Walker, Kyle Brady, Zack Wiegert and Jeff Smith.

Reiprash was hired as the Jaguars' director of college scouting on May 15, 1994. He has been responsible for drafts that have brought to the Jaguars players such as Tony Boselli and Rob Johnson in 1995; defensive stars Kevin Hardy, Tony Brackens and Aaron Beasley in 1996; defensive linemen Renaldo Wynn and Seth Payne in 1997; All-Rookie team members Fred Taylor and Donovan Darius in 1998; and cornerback Fernando Bryant, another All-Rookie choice, in 1999. In 2000, all 11 of the team's draft choices made the team, with several of them playing key roles.

Of the Jaguars' 57 draft choices in the first six years, 48 made the team (four others played on other teams) and 24 of them have started games in Jacksonville. Of the team's seven first-round draft choices from 1995 to '99, every one became a starter (more than any other NFL team in that time), and all but one of the team's nine first-round picks in team history are still with the club (running back James Stewart was lost as a free agent last year).

Working under head coach Tom Coughlin, Reiprash has direct responsibility for the pro and college scouting departments, which are headed by Fran Foley and Gene Smith, respectively. Reiprash continues to direct the scouting of college players and the annual draft, as well as trades and the evaluation and procurement of veteran free agents.

He joined the Jaguars after serving 10 years with the Seattle Seahawks from 1984 to '93. Reiprash began his scouting career as a Southeast area scout with BLESTO from 1979 to '82. From 1982 to '84 he was a personnel scout for the Kansas City Chiefs before going to Seattle as an area scout. He was named the Seahawks' Eastern scout supervisor in 1989. Reiprash coached receivers and running backs at Austin Peay State University from 1973 to '76 before going to East Tennessee in 1977, where he coached the offensive backfield and quarterbacks. In 1978 he was the offensive line coach at North Alabama.

Reiprash received a degree in education from Villanova University in 1972 and earned a master's degree in education-administration and supervision from Austin Peay State University in 1974. He was born Sept. 14, 1950 in Shamokin, Pennsylvania. He and his wife Janet live in Ponte Vedra Beach and have a son, Andrew.

FOLEY

DIRECTOR, PRO SCOUTING

Fran Foley was named director of pro scouting on May 12, 1998 following four years as the assistant director of pro personnel. He is responsible for the scouting and evaluation of the players on every NFL team, advance scouting of Jaguars opponents and player procurement during the NFL free-agent signing period and the regular season. Foley's off-season duties include the scouting of NFL players, as well as those in the Arena League and the CFL (and in 2001 the XFL).

He joined the Jaguars on March 3, 1994, from Boston College and was one of Tom Coughlin's earliest staff hires. During his three years at BC, Foley coordinated the Eagles' recruiting efforts, one of the top ranked in the nation.

Foley began his stint at Boston College in 1991, serving as tight ends and kickers coach in addition to handling recruiting duties. He was the position coach for former Jaguar Pete Mitchell (now with the Detroit Lions). His last two years were focused on personnel recruiting and team logistics. Prior to joining the coaching staff at Boston College, Foley had stints at Rutgers University as tight ends/specialists coach in 1986 and operations director from 1987 to '90. He also worked at The Citadel, coaching defensive ends in 1985 and at Colgate University as defensive line coach in 1984, when he began his college coaching career.

Foley attended Framingham (Mass.) State College, where he played offensive tackle from 1980 to '83. He graduated in 1984 with a bachelor's degree in English literature. His high school coach at Worcester (Mass.) Academy is current Green Bay Packers head coach Mike Sherman.

Foley is also director and treasurer of the Tom Coughlin Jay Fund Foundation, which, in the last six years, has raised \$786,000 for Jacksonville-area pediatric leukemia patients and their families, as well as patients with other childhood cancers. DIRECTOR, COLLEGE SCOUTING

After six years as a college scout for the Jaguars, Gene Smith was promoted to director of college scouting on May 8, 2000, and he guided the team's NFL draft for the first time this year. His responsibilities include the scouting and evaluation of hundreds of college players on an annual basis, as well as directing a staff of six college scouts.

Smith was previously the team's college scout responsible for the southeast United States. He joined the Jaguars on May 1, 1994 and was originally the team's scouting representative for the northeast with the BLESTO scouting combine, which he joined in February 1994. He was the southeast regional scout for BLESTO in 1995 before becoming college scout for the Jaguars. Smith had previously been an assistant coach at the college level for eight years. He worked at Edinboro University from 1989 to January 1994, serving as an assistant coach, recruiting coordinator, and strength and conditioning coordinator. From 1986 to '88 Smith worked at Ohio University, where he began his college coaching career as a graduate assistant and later served as an assistant coach.

Smith graduated from Heidelberg University, serving as captain of the football team while playing as a defensive end. He graduated in 1986 with a degree in education and in 1987 received his master's degree in athletic administration from Ohio University. He has completed post-grad-



use work as well.

ASSISTANT DIRECTOR, PRO SCOUTING

Will McClay was named assistant director of pro scouting for the Jaguars on June 11, 2001. His responsibilities include scouting NFL teams the Jaguars do not play over the course of a season, some advance scouting, and working with and hosting unrestricted free agents in the spring.

Before joining the Jaguars, McClay served for a year as the player personnel director of the XFL's Orlando Rage and as a consultant and XFL scout. 
CHIEF MEDICAL OFFICER





WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2001

- The Jaguars to have a winning season again for the fifth time in seven years in the NFL.
- Fred Taylor to add to two consecutive game scoring streaks that were alive at the end of last season: seven straight games scoring a touchdown and four straight games with a rushing touchdown.
- Mark Brunell to surpass 20,000 yards in passing. He heads into the season with 19,117 yards. Brunell can also add to his team-record current streak of nine consecutive games with at least one touchdown pass.
- Tony Boselli to be voted to his sixth consecutive Pro Bowl, and Jimmy Smith to be voted to his fifth consecutive Pro Bowl.
- Jimmy Smith can stay on top of the NFL in both receptions and receiving yards since 1996 (he leads the league with 450 catches and 6,599 yards the last five seasons). In addition, Smith can surpass the 500-reception mark with 28 catches in 2001 (he enters the season with 472 receptions).
- Kevin Hardy can lead the team in tackles for the fourth consecutive season. Also, Hardy can extend his team-record streak of having played in 49 consecutive games.
- Keenan McCardell to surpass the 500-reception mark for his career. He heads into 2001 with 486 catches.
- Tony Brackens to lead the Jaguars in sacks for the third consecutive season.
- Sean Dawkins to catch 50 or more passes for the seventh consecutive season.
- Camell Lake to start all 16 games for the ninth time in his career.
- Mike Hollis to continue his string of having scored more than 100 points in five straight seasons.
- Jimmy Smith and Keenan McCardell to tie the NFL record with four seasons in which both players have had 1,000-yard receiving seasons. The record is currently held by Minnesota's Cris Carter and Jake Reed.
- Jimmy Smith to have his sixth consecutive 1,000 yard season receiving and to move alone into fifth place all time. He is currently tied with Michael Irvin for the fifth-longest streak in NFL history with five consecutive years.
- Hardy Nickerson to be named to the sixth Pro Bowl of his career.
- Kyle Brady to set career highs for receptions and receiving yardage for the fourth straight season. He had 64 receptions for 729 yards last year.
- Aaron Beasley to make at least one interception, which would give him one in six straight seasons, a team record. He can also maintain his team career record (he has 12).
- David Leaverton to become only the second punter in franchise history (placekicker Steve Lindsey actually punted for an injured Bryan Barker in the 2000 season opener, but Barker has been the sole punter for all six Jaguars seasons).
- Mike Hollis to move up the all-time scoring list of active players. He is currently 13th with 681 career points, two points behind Cary Blanchard. Hollis can also move into the top 50 all-time scoring list. He starts the 2001 season in 67th place.
- The Jaguars to make it a perfect 8-0 all time against the Cleveland Browns.

"I thought what he had accomplished in 2000 coming off his injury, and the courage he displayed, was remarkable. He never complained about his circumstance, although you could see it. He told me in the summer, in one of those fist-pounding deals that 'I'm starting the first game and I'm going to play every game for the entire season,' and he did it. He was a great warrior, and what he did was a tremendous example for all players of the power of the will. He was remarkable."

Finalists in the contest to name the NFL's expansion team in Jacksonville included Sharks, Stingrays and even Panthers, but it was "Jaguars" that was ultimately selected and announced on December 6, 1991. Utilizing the services of the marketing experts from NFL Properties' Creative Services division and with the partners of Touchdown Jacksonville, the enthusiastic fans of Jacksonville finally had a name to call what just less than two years later would become the 30th franchise to join the NFL.

Although thousands of entries were received when a contest was held to name the team, a majority of hundreds agreed with the name "Jacksonville Jaguars." Of those who submitted the name Jaguars, Jacksonville resident Ray Potts was randomly selected as the contest winner and for his contribution was provided a trip to the Super Bowl that year.



DID YOU KNOW?

The Jacksonville Jaguars are the only team in the NFL that has its training camp and practices and plays all of its home games at one facility — ALLTEL Stadium. In other words, the only time Mark Brunell ever leaves his locker is for the 10 road games each season. The rest of the year (even for the offseason conditioning program), Brunell never has to leave his locker.

The Jaguars hold their training camp and all in-season practice sessions at Forrell Fields, which is adjacent to ALLTEL Stadium (and practically underneath the south endzone scoreboard).

Every other NFL team either holds training camp at another site or plays its home games at a stadium separate from its practice facilities.

The Jaguars won their season opener for the fifth straight year by defeating the Cleveland Browns 27-7 on the road. It marked the 50th win in franchise history, even though the Jaguars had seven players sidelined with injuries. The Jacksonville defense held an opponent to single-digit points for the ninth time in 17 games under defensive coordinator Dom Capers, as well as stifling the Browns most of the game. Cleveland managed only nine first downs and 249 yards on offense. Jaguars QB Mark Brunell had the 17th 300-yard passing game of his career, as he hit on 24 of 34 passes for 301 yards and one touchdown. WR Keenan McCardell caught nine passes for 115 yards against his former team, Kyle Brady tied his then-career high for receptions and set a then-personal best for receiving yards, and Jimmy Smith scored his first touchdown of the season. The Jaguars even managed 119 yards rushing behind backup RBs Stacey Mack and Chris Howard, each of whom scored his first career touchdown.

The Jaguars lost a heartbreaker to the eventual Super Bowl champion Baltimore Ravens, when they allowed 32 points in the second half, including the winning touchdown with 41 seconds to play. The Jaguars scored on 5 of 7 first-half possessions and Baltimore on 5 of 8 in the second half. Jimmy Smith caught 15 passes for 291 yards — the fifth-most receiving yards in a game in NFL history — and three touchdowns, and Mark Brunell passed for 386 yards, third most in Jaguars history. But the Jaguars squandered a 23-7 halftime lead in losing to the Ravens for the first time in nine games in the series. With Fred Taylor out and Stacey Mack hobbling, the Jaguars started third-string RB Chris Howard, but they managed only 46 rushing yards, forcing Brunell to throw 50 times, second most in team history. Mike Hollis added a team-record-tying five field goals on five attempts. But the defense allowed its second most points ever in the second half, as Baltimore QB Tony Banks threw a Ravens-record five TD passes in leading the come-from-behind win. The Jaguars' 36 points was their most ever in a loss, eclipsing the previous high of 31 on December 10, 1995 to Indianapolis.

The Jaguars got the first shutout in franchise history by defeating the Cincinnati Bengals 13-0 at ALLTEL Stadium. The Jaguars held the Bengals to 230 yards on offense and 14 first downs in winning their home opener and 30th game in their last 34 at home. Mark Brunell threw a first-quarter touchdown pass to Keenan McCardell, and Steve Lindsey — kicking for an injured Mike Hollis — added two field goals for the Jaguars. The Bengals never got closer to the end zone than the 26-yard line, and they missed two field goals in a steady rain that fell most of the game due to the approach of Hurricane Gordon. The Jaguars made five sacks (two by Gary Walker) and had four takeaways in shutting down the Cincinnati offense. McCardell caught 10 passes for 106 yards, his second 100-yard game of the season and 15th of his career. The Jaguars scored on their second and third possessions of the game, then were kept scoreless until late in the fourth quarter when Lindsey notched his second field goal. Brunell and McCardell hooked up midway through the first quarter, but officials initially ruled that his catch was out of bounds. The Jaguars challenged the call, which was overruled in favor of a touchdown. On the ensuing kickoff, Erik Storz forced a fumble of Cincinnati's Tremain Mack and Kiwaukee Thomas recovered. Three plays later, Lindsey kicked his first NFL field goal, a 30-yarder, for the 10-0 lead. The Bengals' longest drive of the game was just 47 yards and they entered Jaguars territory only three times in the game.

The Jaguars were defeated by the Indianapolis Colts 43-14, losing their first game ever on "Monday Night Football." The Jaguars allowed 440 yards passing by Colts QB Peyton Manning and 533 total yards by the Indianapolis offense, both single-game records by a Jaguars opponent as they were outscored 22-0 in the second half and handed one of their biggest defeats ever. Jimmy Smith caught two first-half touchdown passes from Mark Brunell — Smith's fifth and sixth scores of the season — but the Jacksonville offense gained only 52 yards in the second half (minus-27 on their first five possessions) and was unable to score. After missing the first three games, Fred Taylor returned to the lineup and rushed for 57 yards, all but one yard in the first half. But the Jaguars' defense could not slow down Manning, who completed 23 of 36 passes and drove Indianapolis to seven scores (the Colts also had a safety). Brunell completed 21 of 36 passes for 229 yards. But, on the first five possessions of the second half when the game was on the line, he was only 1 for 6 for three yards, with three sacks. He threw for 72 yards on the final drive that ended in his second interception. On Indianapolis' first series, the Colts jumped out to a 7-0 lead on a 76-yard pass from Manning to Marvin Harrison that was the longest play against the Jaguars in two years and the second-longest pass ever. Smith's first TD reception tied the score at 7-7 in the second quarter. Indianapolis then scored two touchdowns before Smith's second TD catch narrowed the lead to 21-14 at the half.

The loss was only the Jaguars' fifth at home during the regular season in the last five seasons and the first ever at home to the Steelers. It marked the team's second straight loss and third in the last four games. The Jaguars gained only 206 yards on offense — their sixth-lowest output ever — but 90 of those came on the final drive that resulted in their only touchdown. Their 26 rushing yards were their fewest ever in a game, and they tied a team low with just one rushing first down. Jacksonville didn't fare much better passing the ball, as Mark Brunell was sacked seven times, tying a team record that was set twice in 1995 and once in '96. The Jaguars took a 3-0 lead in the first quarter after Donovan Darius blocked Josh Miller's punt and Greg DeLong recovered on the 4-yard line. However, the Jaguars could not reach the end zone and had to settle for a 19-yard field goal by Steve Lindsey. On Pittsburgh's next possession, Fernando Bryant intercepted Kordell Stewart, who was making his first start of the season, but again the Jaguars couldn't advance the ball. The Steelers scored a touchdown on their third possession of the first quarter and never relinquished the lead. In the first quarter the Jaguars had no first downs and minus-4 yards and were penalized seven times.

But the defense had only two sacks (both by Aaron Beasley) and came up with just one takeaway. Steve Lindsey kicked a career-long 49-yard field goal but also missed a 31-yarder. The Jaguars lost two straight games at home for the first time since 1995 and dropped just their fifth of their last 19 division games.

The Jaguars lost their fourth straight game 27-13 to the Titans at Adelphia Coliseum to fall to 2-5 for the season, matching the worst start in franchise history. Just before halftime, the Jaguars drove inside Titans territory and Keenan McCardell caught a pass over the middle but fumbled the ball into the end zone when he was hit on the one-yard line while trying to score. After being held to two field goals in the first 59 minutes of the game, the Jaguars scored a touchdown on their final possession, with Anthony Johnson running for a touchdown from two yards out. It marked the first TD drive led by Mark Brunell in 14 quarters, since the second period of the September 25 game at Indianapolis. Mike Hollis converted both of his field goal attempts in his return to the lineup after missing four games with back surgery.

Jay Soward scored the Jaguars' only touchdown (the first of his career), but he also dropped passes and fumbled a punt that led to one of three Washington touchdowns that resulted from turnovers. Mike Hollis kicked three field goals, as the offense continued to have problems inside the red zone. Defensively, the Jaguars were without starters Ronaldo Wynn, Hardy Nickerson and Fernando Bryant, and Tony Brackens was ejected in the second quarter for kicking a Redskins player following one of the team's two takeaways.

The Jaguars struck back with 17 points in the second period, their most points in a quarter since Week 2, and 10 of them off Dallas turnovers. Mike Hollis kicked a 42-yard field goal. Brunell connected with Brady on a three-yard TD pass, and, with seconds left before halftime, Brunell found Whitted on a fade in the end zone.

The Jaguars were defeated 28-21 by the Seahawks at ALLTEL Stadium, their fourth straight loss at home. The loss dropped their record to 3-7, their worst after 10 games since their inaugural season of 1995. The Jaguars were stopped at the 1-yard line on the final play of the game with a chance to tie, and they were also stopped at the 1-yard line on two plays earlier in the fourth quarter with a chance to go up 28-21. Mark Brunell passed for 340 yards, Fred Taylor rushed for 103 yards, and Keenan McCardell and Jimmy Smith both gained more than 100 yards receiving. But the Jaguars' defense allowed the Seahawks to drive 67 yards for a touchdown and the lead with 2:01 remaining in the game, converting twice on third downs. Also, just before halftime, the Seahawks scored a touchdown in 1:03, converting on a fourth down. The Jaguars failed to score any points in the third quarter for the eighth consecutive game, and they had no points in the second half for the third straight game. They took a 7-0 lead on a two-yard run by Brunell in the first quarter, and then went up 21-7 in the second quarter following a 10-yard TD run by Taylor and a 67-yard TD pass to McCardell. From that point on, they were outscored 21-0, as Jon Kitna threw three touchdown passes. Losing a 14-point lead was the biggest ever at home, surpassing a 10-point lead that was blown to Tennessee in 1999.

Fred Taylor rushed for a team-record 234 yards and scored four touchdowns, as the Jaguars won their third road game of the season 34-24 over the Steelers in their final trip to Three Rivers Stadium. Taylor's rushing performance was at the time the 12th best in a game in NFL history and only 44 yards from the league's single-game record. He scored three touchdowns rushing and one on a pass reception, just one TD shy of the Jaguars' single-game record. Taylor's yardage was the most ever by a running back against the Steelers, topping O.J. Simpson's mark of 227 yards in 1975, and his four TDs tied the mark held by Jim Brown vs. the Steelers. Jacksonville scored 17 points in each of the second and third quarters, getting their first points in the third period since Week 2, and they took a 34-10 lead into the fourth quarter before the Steelers scored their final two touchdowns on scrambles by Kordell Stewart. Taylor rushed for more than 100 yards for the fifth consecutive game and became the first Jaguar to eclipse the 200-yard mark rushing. Mark Brunell passed for 190 yards and one touchdown, as the Jaguars relied on Taylor's running and a strong defensive performance. The Jaguars had five takeaways and five sacks — both season highs — and scored 24 points off Pittsburgh turnovers. The Steelers jumped out to a 7-0 lead, capitalizing on a fumble by Brunell that led to a TD pass to Hines Ward. On its next four drives, Jacksonville was forced to punt every time until getting on track early in the second quarter and scoring on six straight possessions. Mike Hollis added two field goals.

The Jaguars defeated the Browns 48-0 in the most dominating performance in franchise history. The victory was the Jaguars' third straight and fourth in their last five games, putting them at 6-7 for the season. Fred Taylor rushed for 181 yards — his seventh straight 100-yard game — and three touchdowns in leading the victory. But the Jaguars' defense was the star of the day, getting its second shutout ever and holding the Browns to two first downs and 53 total yards, both Jaguars records. The Jaguars lost to the Bengals 17-14 after allowing 10 points in the final 1:15, snapping a four-game winning streak and ending any chance of having a winning season. In a game played on a snowy, sloppy field, Jacksonville controlled most of the game until the final four minutes, when Cincinnati drove 80 yards for a touchdown and then recovered a fumble on the ensuing kickoff and converted a 27-yard field goal on the final play of the game. Until that time, the Bengals had gone eight straight possessions and not reached midfield, and they had gained only 151 yards in the first 56 minutes of the game. At the end of the game, Cincinnati ran off 15 straight plays on their two scoring possessions and gained 105 yards. Their other score was a 82-yard punt return for a touchdown by Peter Warrick in the third quarter — the first punt return TD ever allowed by the Jaguars. Fred Taylor ran for 110 yards, his ninth consecutive 100-yard rushing game, tying Walter Payton for the third-longest streak in NFL history. Taylor also scored on a five-yard run, and Jimmy Smith added a four-yard touchdown catch for Jacksonville, which could have increased its lead to 17-7 with 4:37 to play, but Mike Hollis slipped and fell while attempting a 28-yard field goal. The nine degree temperature and 25-below wind chill were the coldest ever for a Jaguars game. It was the Jaguars' first loss to the Bengals since 1997, snapping a streak of five straight wins.

The Jaguars lost their season finale 28-25 to the Giants to drop to 7-9 for the year, their first losing season since their inaugural season of 1996. The Jaguars led 10-7 going into the fourth quarter, but they surrendered three touchdowns to the No. 1 seed in the NFC, thwarting the comeback efforts of Mark Brunell, who threw two touchdowns in the final period. The Jaguars played most of the game without WR Jimmy Smith and RB Fred Taylor, who suffered injuries in the game. The Jaguars held Tiki Barber and Ron Dayne to 81 yards on 30 carries, but WR Amari Toomer did most of the damage with eight receptions for 193 yards and a touchdown. Taylor rushed for 52 yards — including a 44-yard TD run — but his streak of nine consecutive 100-yard rushing games ended. The Giants opened the scoring in the first quarter with a TD run by Barber. The Jaguars tied the game in the second period on Taylor's long run, then they took a 10-7 lead in the third quarter on Mike Hollis' 36-yard field goal. The Giants took the lead early in the fourth quarter on a Kerry Collins to Ike Hilliard TD pass. Following was a frantic finish that saw four touchdowns in the final 3:05. Collins threw his second TD pass, then Brunell hooked up with Kyle Brady on a five-yard TD pass. Next, Hollis' onside kick was returned for a touchdown by Jason Sehorn, in effect ending the Jaguars' hopes of a non-losing season. In the final minute, Brunell threw a 12-yard TD pass to Alvin Whitted, and then Sehorn recovered another onside kick to end the game and the Jaguars' season. The loss was the Jaguars' first ever in a regular-season finale and marked their earliest end to a season.



HISTORY

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

1989

Aug. 17 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, a partnership to lead the community effort to win an NFL franchise is formed. The group, led by Tom Petway, includes Jeb Bush, Hamilton Jordan, and Arthur "Chick" Shemer.

1990

April 4 — National Football League commissioner Paul Tagliabue announces that the League will expand by two teams no later than the 1993 season.

July 26 — The NFL Realignment and Expansion Committee recommends that the League expand by two teams for the 1993 season.

1991

Feb. 12 — In a unanimous vote, the Jacksonville City Council votes to commit \$60 million to renovate the Gator Bowl contingent upon the City being awarded an expansion football team.

May 15 — The NFL Realignment and Expansion Committee recommends that the League expand by two teams for the 1994 season, contrary to the July 26, 1990 vote.

May 22 — At the owners' meeting in Minneapolis, a plan is approved that will add two expansion teams to the League for the 1994 season.

May 30 — Florida Governor Lawton Chiles signs into law the Professional Sports Facilities Program, a state statute that provides state funding of up to \$2 million for 30 years for funding new sports facilities that operate in the state of Florida.

June 25 — The lease that includes the recently approved \$60 million package to renovate the Gator Bowl is approved by City Council.

July 17 — The NFL announces that it will accept applications for expansion teams.

Sept. 16 — The City of Jacksonville files an expansion application with the League, one of 11 cities to apply.

Oct. 1 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. submits its ownership application to the League. The nine-member partnership includes local businessman and Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. general partner Tom Petway. J. Wayne Weaver is one of the eight limited partners, along with Jeb Bush, Lawrence DuBow, Earl Hadiow, Preston Haskell, Sandy McArthur, Charles Towers and Ron Weaver.

Oct. 24 — David Seldin is named president and chief operating officer of Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd.

Dec. 6 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. announces that the team name will be the Jacksonville Jaguars if an expansion team is awarded.

Dec. 10 — Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. and City officials make the group's first presentation to commissioner Tagliabue and other NFL officials in New York.

1992

March 17 — At the League's annual winter meeting in Phoenix, the list of expansion candidate cities is cut from 11 to seven. Jacksonville is one of the seven; Nashville, San Antonio, Raleigh-Durham, and Honolulu are eliminated.

May 19 — The five finalists in the expansion race are named: Jacksonville, Charlotte, Baltimore, Memphis, St. Louis, Sacramento and Oakland are eliminated.

Oct. 20 — Citing complications surrounding the ongoing labor situation, the NFL votes to delay the expansion announcement to its 1993 fall meeting in Chicago and for expansion teams to begin play in 1995.

1993

Jan. 6 — A seven-year Collective Bargaining Agreement is reached between the League and its players. With the labor situation resolved, a new expansion timetable is expected in March.

March 18 — J. Wayne Weaver is introduced as managing general partner of Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd.

March 23 — The expansion race is officially resumed by the NFL.

April 12 — After a tour with Touchdown Jacksonville!, Ltd. representatives, NFL officials indicate

that additional renovations beyond those already planned would be necessary to renovate the Gator Bowl to NFL standards.

June 25 — Negotiations for a new lease between Jacksonville Mayor Ed Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. break down.

July 1 — Mayor Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. resume negotiations and agree on a plan that caps stadium renovation costs at \$112 million and protects the city from cost overruns. Mayor Austin sends the lease to City Council for approval.

July 21 — The Jacksonville City Council fails to approve the newly negotiated \$112 million stadium proposal. As a result, Weaver announces that Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. is ending its bid for an NFL expansion franchise.

July 22 — Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. closes offices and club seat and executive suite deposits are returned.

Aug. 20 — The Florida Times-Union reports that negotiations between Touchdown Jacksonville, Ltd. and the City have resumed, encouraged by the NFL and at the request of Times-Union publisher Carl Cannon and Chamber of Commerce chairman Adam Herbert.

Aug. 21 — Mayor Austin and Touchdown Jacksonville reach an agreement on a new stadium lease capping stadium renovation costs at \$121 million, \$53 million to come from City funds and \$68 million from team and team related sources. As project manager, Touchdown Jacksonville assumes responsibility for any cost overruns.

Aug. 22 — Facing the challenge of selling 9,000 club seats, a committee of civic and business leaders is formed called NFL Now!, headed by Carl Cannon and Adam Herbert.

Aug. 23 — The City Council votes 14-4 to approve the new lease.

Aug. 24 — With the new public/private partnership, Weaver and Mayor Austin meet with commissioner Taglialue, who welcomes Jacksonville back into the expansion race.

Aug. 25 — NFL Now! begins a 10-day drive to sell the required club seats.

Aug. 26 — Former Kansas City Chiefs defensive back Deron Cherry joins Touchdown Jacksonville as the ninth member of the ownership group.

Sept. 3 — Carl Cannon of NFL Now! announces that 9,737 club seats have been sold, a number that rises to 10,112 once all the applications are processed.

Sept. 21 — Weaver and other Touchdown Jacksonville officials make their presentation to the NFL finance and expansion committees.

Oct. 26 — In Chicago, League owners select the Carolina Panthers for an expansion team but delay the announcement of the second expansion city.

Nov. 30 (4:12 p.m. ET) — In Chicago, Jacksonville is awarded the 30th franchise in the National Football League.

Dec. 1 — A victory celebration in the Gator Bowl, as 25,000 Jaguars fans battle cold and rain to welcome Wayne Weaver, Jaguars officials, city officials and community leaders upon their return from Chicago.

Jan. 3 — Demolition of the Gator Bowl begins.

Jan. 6 — The Jaguars announce a season ticket sellout for their first three seasons. Over 56,000 season tickets are sold through Dec. 31, just one month after the awarding of the team.

Feb. 21 — Tom Coughlin is hired as head coach of the Jaguars. The former Boston College head coach and assistant with the New York Giants brings six of his assistants with him.

Aug. 24 — The Jaguars announce that they will hold their first training camp in 1995 at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

Sept. 14 — The Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation, Inc. is established, under the direction of Delores Barr Weaver and Dr. Gregory S. Gross.

Sept. 28 — The NFL announces specific plans to stock the expansion teams.

Nov. 1 — The Jaguars hold their first official workout at Bishop Kenny High School. Thirteen offensive linemen work out in front of 1,500 fans.

Nov. 2 — The NFL announces its plans for division alignment, putting the Jaguars in the AFC Central Division along with the Cincinnati Bengals, Cleveland Browns, Houston Oilers and Pittsburgh Steelers. The Carolina Panthers will join the NFC West Division.

Dec. 15 — The Jaguars sign the first 10 players in team history: WR Shannon Baker, LB Hillary Butler, DE Ferric Collins, OL Greg Huntington, RB Randy Jordan, DE Ernie Logan, OT Rickie Shaw, DE Jason Simmons, DE Ricky Sutton, DE Chris Williams.

Jan. 12 — Dick Jauron is hired as defensive coordinator. Jauron had spent nine years with the Green Bay Packers as an assistant coach in charge of defensive backs.

Jan. 14 — Kevin Gilbride is introduced as the Jaguars' offensive coordinator. He had previously been the assistant head coach/offensive coordinator of the Houston Oilers.

Jan. 20 — The Jaguars unveil their new logo and team uniform.

Jan. 21 — Larry Pasquale is hired as the team's special teams coordinator.

Feb. 14 — The Jaguars draft 31 players in the expansion draft. The first player selected is Arizona quarterback Steve Beuerlein. During the draft, the Jaguars acquire such veteran players as Desmond Howard, Keith Goganious, Damon Carrington, Reggie Cobb, Eugene Chung and Derek Brown.

Feb. 28 — The Jaguars sign their first unrestricted free agents: guard Shawn Bouwens and defensive linemen Joel Smeenge and Don Davey. Within 15 days, six more unrestricted free-agents are signed: cornerback Vinnie Clark, punter Bryan Barker, cornerback Mickey Washington, defensive tackle Kelvin Pritchett, defensive end Jeff Lageman and center Dave Widell.

March 23 — The Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation awards its first grants to eight local organizations totaling \$139,850.

April 21 — The first trade in Jaguars history: Jacksonville acquires quarterback Mark Brunell from the Green Bay Packers in exchange for draft picks in the third and fifth rounds of the 1995 draft.

April 22 — Southern California offensive tackle Tony Boselli becomes the Jaguars' first-ever selection in the college draft, the second overall pick. Later in the first round, running back James Stewart is chosen 19th overall after the Jaguars trade up in the round. The Jaguars select a total of 10 players during the two-day draft.

April 28-30 — The first minicamp is held on the practice fields adjacent to the new stadium.

June 1 — The Jaguars sign their entire first class of draft choices at the same time, an event unprecedented in NFL history.

June 2-8 — The second minicamp is held, with one practice session being conducted in front of 2,500 fans at Bishop Kenny High School.

June 10 — "The Roar of the Jaguars," the team's cheerleaders squad, is introduced at The Landing in downtown Jacksonville. The squad includes 36 cheerleaders.

July 6 — The Jaguars' first-ever training camp opens at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

July 29 — The Jaguars play their first preseason contest in the Pro Football Hall of Fame game in Canton, Ohio, but lose to the Carolina Panthers 20-14 when a last-minute drive ends at the Panthers' two-yard line.

Aug. 18 — Jacksonville Municipal Stadium opens, as the Jaguars host their first home pre-season game. However, they lose to the St. Louis Rams 27-10.

Sept. 3 — The Jaguars play their inaugural game in front of 72,363 fans but lose to the Houston Oilers 10-3.

Oct. 1 — The Jaguars get their first win 17-16 at Houston in the fifth week of the regular season — the third-fastest first victory in NFL expansion history and the fastest to earn a win on the road.

Oct. 8 — The Jaguars defeat AFC Central rival Pittsburgh Steelers 20-16 for their first home victory, the only time in NFL history an expansion team has ever defeated a team that would go on to play in the Super Bowl the same season.



A missed field goal by Atlanta's Morten Andersen on December 22, 1996 propelled the Jaguars into the playoffs for the first time ever.

Oct. 22 — The Jaguars record their third win of the season at Cleveland with a 23-15 victory.

Dec. 3 — Jaguars wide receiver Jeremy Smith scores a team-record three touchdowns three different ways at Denver — on a blocked punt, off a lateral on a kickoff return and on a pass reception — an extreme rarity in NFL history.

Dec. 24 — The Jaguars break the previous record for victories by an expansion team with a last-second 24-21 win over Cleveland in the Browns' final game before a three-year absence.

1996

Feb. 18 — Pittsburgh Steelers offensive tackle Leon Searcy becomes the first unrestricted free agent to sign with the Jaguars in 1996.

March 1 — Free agent Eddie Robinson signs from Houston, bolstering a young linebacker corps.

March 2 — Keenan McCardell, Cleveland's leading wide receiver in 1995, signs a free agent contract with the Jaguars.

April 20 — Illinois outside linebacker Kevin Hardy is selected with the Jaguars' first pick in the 1996 college draft, the second overall player chosen. By the early third round, the Jaguars also draft defensive end Tony Brackens, center Michael Cheever and defensive back Aaron Beasley.

July 19 — The Jaguars open their second training camp, their first at Fernell Fields at Jacksonville Municipal Stadium. The practice fields were named in memory of Roger Ernest Fernell Sr. in a morning dedication.

Sept. 1 — The Jaguars open their second season with a 24-9 victory over the defending AFC champion Pittsburgh Steelers. It marks the first game the Jacksonville defense does not allow a touchdown.

Sept. 22 — Mark Brunell throws for a team-record 432 yards and three touchdowns, but the Jaguars lose their first-ever overtime game 28-25 at New England.

Sept. 29 — In the first regular-season game between the two 1995 expansion teams, Jacksonville beats Carolina 24-14 as James Stewart runs for two TDs and the Jaguars rush for a team-record 179 yards.

Oct. 20 — Keenan McCardell catches 16 passes — tied for the third-highest total in pro football history — for a team-record 232 yards. However, despite breaking or tying 26 team records for single-game performances, the Jaguars lose at St. Louis 17-14.

Nov. 24 — The Jaguars win at Baltimore 30-27 for their first overtime victory on a 34-yard field goal by Mike Hollis.

Dec. 12 — Keenan McCardell becomes the first Jaguar voted to the Pro Bowl. Mark Brunell and Tony Boselli are later added as replacements, and Brunell goes on to win MVP honors in the Feb. 2 game in Honolulu.

Dec. 22 — The Jaguars clinch their first playoff berth in franchise history with a 19-17 victory over the Atlanta Falcons, as Morten Andersen's 30-yard field goal attempt goes wide left.

Dec. 28 — The first second-year expansion franchise in NFL history to play a postseason game, the Jaguars become the first team to defeat the Buffalo Bills in a playoff game in Rich Stadium. Natrone Means leads the way in the 30-27 victory by running for 175 yards.

1997

Jan. 4 — The Jaguars post the biggest upset in the NFL since Joe Namath led the Jets to victory in Super Bowl III, as they stun the football world and the Denver Broncos with a 30-27 victory. After flying back to Jacksonville, the team finds 40,000 fans waiting for them at 1:30 a.m. in Jacksonville Municipal Stadium.

Jan. 12 — The Jaguars' Cinderella season ends short of the Super Bowl, as Jacksonville is defeated by the New England Patriots 20-6 in the AFC Championship game. Jaguars turnovers led to 17 of the Patriots' 20 points in a game played in a wind chill of 0 degrees.

Jan. 23 — David Seldin resigns as Jaguars president but remains as a partner.

Feb. 5 — Chris Palmer is named offensive coordinator, replacing Kevin Gilbride who had become head coach of the San Diego Chargers.

March 5 — The Jaguars sign their only 1997 unrestricted free agent, Pittsburgh cornerback Deon Figures.

April 18 — ALLTEL Stadium becomes the new name for Jacksonville Municipal Stadium in a sponsorship agreement with the information technology and communications provider.

April 19 — Jacksonville selects defensive tackle Renaldo Wynn of Notre Dame with the 21st pick of the first round of the NFL draft. In all, the Jaguars draft seven players.

Aug. 9 — Quarterback Mark Brunell suffers a knee injury in a preseason game against the New York Giants and misses the next four games, including the first two of the regular season.

Aug. 31 — In his first NFL start, Rob Johnson leads the Jaguars to a 28-27 victory at Baltimore in the season opener. Johnson displayed incredible courage in returning twice from a severe ankle sprain, setting a team record with 20 completions in 24 attempts (83.3 percent), 2 TD passes and a 25-yard TD rushing.

Sept. 7 — The Jaguars win their home opener 40-13 over the New York Giants as Steve Matthews makes his first NFL start for an injured Rob Johnson. The Jaguars started 2-0 for the first time in team history and set a franchise record with 40 points. It marked the first time in 30 years that a team won twice with two different quarterbacks making their first start in consecutive games.

Sept. 22 — Mark Brunell returns and leads the Jaguars to a 30-21 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers in their first appearance on "Monday Night Football." Brunell threw for 306 yards, but the victory wasn't clinched until the final play, when Clyde Simmons blocked a 40-yard game-winning field goal attempt and Chris Hudson returned the ball 58 yards for a touchdown as time expired.

Oct. 12 — James Stewart rushes for five touchdowns in the Jaguars' 38-21 victory over the visiting Philadelphia Eagles. It marks only the fourth time in NFL history that a player scored five TDs rushing in a game and the first time since 1963, and Stewart became one of only 12 NFL players with five or more touchdowns in one game.

Dec. 11 — Five Jaguars are named to the AFC squad for the Pro Bowl: Tony Boselli, Bryan Barker and Mike Hollis as starters, and Mark Brunell and Jimmy Smith as backups.

Dec. 14 — The Jaguars clinch a playoff berth for the second straight year after defeating the Bills 20-14 in Buffalo one week before the end of the regular season. Keenan McCardell and Jimmy Smith both went over the 1,000-yard mark, becoming the eighth tandem in NFL history to have back-to-back 1,000-yard receiving seasons.

Dec. 21 — The Jaguars win their team-record 11th game of the season by defeating the Oakland Raiders. The victory gave the team a 4-4 mark on the road for the first time ever, and matched division-winner Pittsburgh's 11-5 record. It takes five tie-breaker steps to determine that the Steelers were the division champion.

Dec. 27 — The Jaguars' third season comes to an end in Denver, with the eventual Super Bowl-champion Broncos winning the Wild-Card playoff 42-17.

1998

Feb. 13 — Quarterback Rob Johnson is traded to the Buffalo Bills for the ninth pick in the first round and a fourth-round choice in the 1998 NFL draft.

Feb. 16 — The Jaguars sign Buffalo Bills linebacker Bryce Paup, an unrestricted free agent.

April 18-19 — The Jaguars draft 11 players, their most ever, in the NFL draft. Two players are selected in the first round: running back Fred Taylor from the University of Florida with the ninth pick; and safety Donovan Darius, from Syracuse, with the 25th choice.

May 12 — Rick Reipish, who had been responsible for the Jaguars' first four successful drafts, is promoted to director of player personnel. Fran Foley is named director of pro scouting, and Rick Mueller is named director of college scouting.

Sept. 20 — Running back James Stewart is injured on the Jaguars' second play of the game and lost for the season. But first-round draft choice Fred Taylor takes over and runs 52 yards for a touchdown on his first carry. The Jaguars defeat the Baltimore Ravens 24-10 for their third win of the season.

Oct. 12 — The Jaguars post a franchise-best 5-0 start, beating the visiting Miami Dolphins 28-21 on "Monday Night Football" when Mark Brunell and Keenan McCardell hook up for two touchdown passes in the fourth quarter. Fred Taylor ran for a 77-yard TD on the game's first play from scrimmage.

Nov. 1 — The Jaguars explode for a team-record number of points in a 45-19 victory at Baltimore. Jacksonville scored six TDs in the first half — the seventh most ever in a half in NFL history — as they jumped out to a 42-7 lead. Fred Taylor's 78-yard TD reception becomes the longest play from scrimmage in team history.

Dec. 13 — Mike Hollis becomes the most accurate field goal kicker in NFL history by making two attempts, giving him an 81.45 percentage in four seasons (101 of 124), dethroning Philadelphia's Chris Boniol.

Dec. 20 — The Jaguars clinch their first-ever AFC Central Division championship prior to kickoff of a Sunday night game at Minnesota, dethroning the Pittsburgh Steelers after a four-year run.

Dec. 28 — With a 21-3 victory over the Steelers on "Monday Night Football," the Jaguars win their 11th game for the second straight year and becomes the NFL's first expansion team to qualify for the playoffs three times in its first four seasons. Fred Taylor finishes the year with 17 touchdowns, tied for the third-most ever by a rookie in NFL history.

1999

Jan. 3 — In their first-ever home playoff game, the Jaguars defeat the New England Patriots 25-10. Mark Brunell returns after missing three games with an ankle injury to throw a TD pass and Mike Hollis kicks four field goals, as Jacksonville claims its first postseason win in two years.

Jan. 10 — The Jaguars' fourth season ends with a 34-24 loss to the New York Jets in the divisional playoffs.

Jan. 13 — Head coach Tom Coughlin is rewarded with a contract extension through the 2003 season.

Jan. 26 — Dom Capers, the former head coach of the Carolina Panthers, is named defensive coordinator, replacing Dick Jauron, who became head coach of the Chicago Bears.

Feb. 12 — On the first day of free agency, the Jaguars sign two unrestricted free agents: DT Gary Walker of the Tennessee Titans and S Carnell Lake of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Feb. 16 — The Jaguars sign TE Kyle Brady, a transition free agent from the New York Jets, to an offer sheet. The next day, the Jets decline to match the offer, making Brady a Jaguar.

April 24-25 — The Jaguars draft eight players in the NFL draft, including Fernando Bryant, a cornerback selected in the first round from Alabama.

Sept. 12 — The Jaguars open their fifth season with a 41-3 victory over the San Francisco 49ers at ALLTEL Stadium.

Nov. 7 — Jacksonville makes a team-record nine sacks and forces four turnovers in a 30-7 win at Atlanta.

Nov. 28 — The Jaguars score 23 points (three touchdowns, two two-point conversions) in the fourth quarter at Baltimore and leave with a 30-23 victory.

Dec. 11 — The Jaguars win their 11th consecutive game, setting a team record, as they defeat the Cleveland Browns 24-14.

2000

Jan. 2 — The Jaguars conclude the regular season with a 14-2 mark — the best record in the NFL — and head into the playoffs as the No. 1 seed in the AFC. Jimmy Smith catches 14 passes to finish the year with 116 receptions, the most in the league and the sixth-highest total in NFL history. The defense allows only 217 points, the 12th-least allowed since the 16-game schedule began in 1978.

Jan. 15 — The Jaguars trounce the Miami Dolphins 62-7 in the Divisional Playoffs in what would be the last game for Dan Marino and Jimmy Johnson. Jacksonville's 62 points and 55-point margin are the second most ever in NFL postseason history, and Fred Taylor's 90-yard run is the longest ever in an NFL playoff game.

Jan. 23 — Tennessee claims its third win of the season over the Jaguars in the AFC Championship game. Jacksonville led 14-10 at halftime before losing 33-14.

Feb. 10 — Tony Brackens is designated as a franchise player before the start of free agency.

Feb. 22 — Jacksonville signs middle linebacker Hardy Nickerson, an unrestricted free agent from the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

April 15-16 — The Jaguars select wide receiver R. Jay Soward from Southern California in the first round of the draft. Altogether, 11 players are drafted by Jacksonville.

Sept. 10 — Jimmy Smith catches 15 passes for 291 yards — the fifth-highest receiving total in

NFL history in a game against the Baltimore Ravens, who would go on to win the Super Bowl and set an NFL record for fewest points allowed in a 16-game season.

Sept. 17 — The Jaguars win their home opener 13-0 over Cincinnati, the first shutout in franchise history.

Oct. 29 — The Jaguars defeat the Dallas Cowboys 23-17 in overtime on a 37-yard TD pass from Mark Brunell to Alvin Whitted to snap a five-game losing streak.

Nov. 1 — At their annual fall meeting in Atlanta, NFL owners award Super Bowl XXXIX to the city of Jacksonville, which will host the game for the first time. The game will be played at ALLTEL Stadium on February 6, 2005.

Nov. 19 — Fred Taylor rushes for 234 yards, setting a Jaguars record and at the time what was the 12th-most rushing yards in a game in NFL history (and the most ever at Three Rivers Stadium), as the Jaguars beat the Steelers 34-24. Taylor scored four touchdowns in the game.

Nov. 26 — Jacksonville defeats Tennessee 16-13 on a last-second 38-yard field goal by Mike Hollis, ending a five-game losing streak to the Titans.

Dec. 3 — The Jaguars shut out the Browns 48-0 in the most dominating game in team history. Cleveland has only two first downs and 53 yards on offense. For the Jaguars, Fred Taylor runs for 181 yards and three TDs to pass the 1,000-yard rushing mark, Jimmy Smith surpasses 1,000 yards receiving for the fifth straight season and Mark Brunell reaches the 3,000-yard mark passing.

Dec. 17 — Fred Taylor rushes for more than 100 yards in his ninth consecutive game, tying Walter Payton for the third-longest streak in NFL history. However, the Jaguars lose on the road to the Bengals 17-14 after allowing 10 points in the final 1:15 of the game.

Dec. 23 — The Jaguars lose their season finale 28-25 to the Giants, finishing 7-9 and marking their first losing season since 1995.

2001

Jan. 12 — Bob Petrino, who has been the team's quarterbacks coach the last two seasons, is promoted to offensive coordinator.

Feb. 6 — Gary Moeller is named defensive coordinator, replacing Dom Capers, who became head coach of the Houston Texans. Moeller is a former head coach for the University of Michigan and interim coach of the Detroit Lions.

March 30 — The Jaguars sign quarterback Mark Brunell to a new four-year contract.

Feb. 15 — John Pease, who has been the Jaguars' defensive line coach since 1995, is promoted to assistant head coach.

April 20-21 — The Jaguars select defensive tackle Marcus Stroud from Georgia in the first round of the draft. A total of 10 players are drafted by Jacksonville.

September 22, 1996 — at New England 26, Jacksonville 25

After spotting New England a 22-0 lead, the Jaguars rallied in the second half, scoring three touchdowns on 51-, 41- and 61-yard receptions from Mark Brunell and a Mike Hollis field goal, to tie the score at 25-25. The Patriots had the only possession in overtime and won on a 40-yard field goal by Adam Vinatieri.

November 24, 1996 — Jacksonville 28, at Baltimore 25

The Ravens led at the end of the first half 16-10, and built a 25-10 lead going into the fourth quarter. After a touchdown pass from Mark Brunell to Pete Mitchell, the defense recovered a fumble at the Raven's 19-yard line. Brunell found Willie Jackson six plays later and Brunell ran in for the two-point conversion to tie the game at 25-25 with 1:24 remaining. The Jaguars won the toss, but were forced to punt. The Ravens fumbled, and Jacksonville drove down the field, with Mike Hollis winning the game with a 34-yard field goal.

October 26, 1997 — at Pittsburgh 23, Jacksonville 17

The Jaguars took a 10-0 lead into the second half, but Pittsburgh came back to take a 14-10 lead in the fourth-quarter. After a Brunell TD pass to Pete Mitchell, the Jaguars took a 17-14 lead. The Steelers scored a 19-yard field goal at the end of the fourth quarter to tie the game 17-17. The Steelers won the toss and scored on a 17-yard shovel pass from Kordell Stewart to Jerome Bettis.

October 29, 2000 — Jacksonville 23, at Dallas 17

The Jaguars ended a five-game losing streak with a 23-17 overtime road victory over the Cowboys, with Alvis Whited scoring on a 37-yard pass from Mark Brunell on the first series of overtime for his second touchdown of the game. Brunell threw for three TDs and tied a team record for passing accuracy, as he completed 20 of 24 passes. Kyle Brady caught 10 of those passes for 134 yards, both career highs, as he eclipsed the 100-yard mark for the second straight week.

September 24, 1995 — Green Bay 24, at Jacksonville 14 — Sunday night (TNT)

The Jaguars lost their fourth straight game at the beginning of their inaugural season. They fell behind 17-0 before getting on the scoreboard in the fourth quarter with two touchdown passes from Mark Brunell to Willie Jackson. It was Brunell's second start at quarterback and the first time he had played against his former team.

December 15, 1996 — at Jacksonville 20, Seattle 13 — Sunday night (ESPN)

The Jaguars battled back from a 13-7 deficit by scoring on three consecutive fourth-quarter possessions to win their eighth game of the season. Jimmy Smith scored his second touchdown of the game on a pass from Mark Brunell, and Mike Hollis kicked two field goals. Tony Brackens started with 12 tackles, a sack, an interception, three tipped passes and his fourth takeaway of the season.

September 22, 1997 — at Jacksonville 30, Pittsburgh 21 — Monday night (ABC)

In the Jaguars' first appearance on "Monday Night Football," Mark Brunell returned from a pre-season knee injury to lead the Jaguars to the win. The Jaguars had a 17-7 lead at the half. After a Steelers touchdown and a Mike Hollis field goal, the Jaguars held on to a 20-14 lead. The

Steelers scored in the fourth quarter to take a 21-20 lead, but the Jaguars regained the lead with a Hollis field goal with 4:14 left. With six-seconds remaining in the game, the Steelers 40-yard field goal attempt was blocked by Clyde Simmons and returned by Chris Hudson 58 yards for a touchdown to end the game.

October 12, 1998 — at Jacksonville 28, Miami 21 — Monday night (ABC)

The Jaguars took a 14-0 lead on two Fred Taylor touchdowns — including a 77-yard run on the game's first play from scrimmage. Miami scored the game's next three touchdowns before Mark Brunell and Keenan McCardell hooked up for two TD passes in the fourth quarter. With just under 2:00 remaining and Miami driving, Tony Brackens stripped Dan Marino of the ball and fell on it to give Jacksonville its fifth victory to start the season.

December 20, 1998 — at Minnesota 50, Jacksonville 10 — Sunday night (ESPN)

The Jaguars clinched their first AFC Central Division title earlier in the day when the Oilers lost, but they were unable to celebrate after getting trounced by the Vikings. Rookie Jonathan Quinn made his first NFL start in the Metrodome, and the Jaguars played a solid first half, trailing only 12-3 at the break. But Minnesota scored 38 straight points in the second half before a late Jaguars touchdown. The 50 points was the most ever allowed by Jacksonville in a game.

December 26, 1998 — at Jacksonville 21, Pittsburgh 3 — Monday night (ABC)

The Jaguars closed out the 1998 regular season with a convincing win over Pittsburgh in front of a record crowd of 74,143. Rookie quarterback Jonathan Quinn got his first NFL victory and scored the game's first touchdown on a 15-yard run. Fred Taylor added two TDs (his 16th and 17th of the season), as the Jaguars held the Steelers to three points, the fewest ever allowed by Jacksonville in a game.

October 11, 1999 — Jacksonville 16, at New York Jets 6 — Monday night (ABC)

In their first-ever road appearance on "Monday Night Football," the Jaguars defeated the Jets behind three field goals by Mike Hollis and a touchdown and 96 yards rushing by James Stewart. The Jacksonville defense kept the Jets out of the end zone and held them to 230 total yards.

November 21, 1999 — at Jacksonville 41, New Orleans 23 — Sunday night (ESPN)

The Jaguars rolled up 494 yards and 41 points and pulled away in the second half with 24 consecutive points after a 17-17 tie. James Stewart scored twice, Mark Brunell threw two TD passes, Jimmy Smith caught nine passes for 220 yards and Reggie Barlow returned a punt for a score.

December 2, 1999 — at Jacksonville 20, Pittsburgh 6 — Thursday night (ESPN)

The Jaguars swept the Steelers for the first time behind Mark Brunell's 308 yards passing, James Stewart's career-high 145 yards rushing and 100-yard receiving games by Jimmy Smith and Keenan McCardell. Pittsburgh managed just 235 total yards (63 on the ground).

December 13, 1999 — at Jacksonville 27, Denver 24 — Monday night (ABC)

Mike Hollis kicked a 23-yard field goal on the final play of the game as the Jaguars came from behind to beat the Broncos for their 10th consecutive win of the season. Denver jumped out to a 14-0 first-quarter lead, before James Stewart and Fred Taylor combined for 153 yards and three TDs to lead the comeback.

September 25, 2000 — at Indianapolis 43, Jacksonville 14 — Monday night (ABC)

The Jaguars were defeated by the Colts 43-14 at the RCA Dome, losing their first game ever on "Monday Night Football." The Jaguars allowed 440 yards passing by Peyton Manning and 533 total yards by Indianapolis — both single-game records by a Jaguars opponent — as they were outscored 22-0 in the second half. Jimmy Smith caught two first-half TD passes, but the Jacksonville offense gained only 52 yards in the second half.

October 8, 2000 — Baltimore 15, at Jacksonville 10 — Sunday night (ESPN)

The Ravens were held to 193 yards and no touchdowns, but Matt Stover kicked five field goals for all of Baltimore's points. The Jaguars fumbled a team-record eight times (losing three of them) and were intercepted three times, in addition to having a wind-aided kickoff recovered by the Ravens and an apparent TD by Tony Brackens overruled. Mark Brunell failed to lead the Jaguars to a touchdown for the second consecutive game and was replaced by Jamie Martin in the fourth quarter.

October 16, 2000 — at Tennessee 27, Jacksonville 13 — Monday night (ABC)

In a rematch of the 1999 AFC Championship game, the Jaguars jumped out to a 3-0 lead, then saw Tennessee score the next 24 points in beating Jacksonville for the fifth straight time. Eddie George

gained 165 yards on 30 carries and scored one TD, and TE Frank Wycheck continued to haunt the Jaguars, with five catches and a TD. The Jaguars' lone touchdown came on their final possession.

November 19, 2000 — Jacksonville 34, at Pittsburgh 24 — Sunday night (ESPN)

Fred Taylor rushed for a team-record 234 yards and scored four touchdowns, marking the then-12th-best rushing performance in NFL history, as well as the most ever against the Steelers and the most by a Jaguar. Jacksonville had five takeaways and five sacks, with a 34-10 lead in the fourth quarter, after scoring 24 points off Pittsburgh turnovers.

The Titans responded with a nine-yard touchdown catch by Yancey Thigpen. Then the Jaguars took a 14-7 lead on a 33-yard TD run by James Stewart. But Reggie Barlow fumbled a punt that was recovered by the Titans and converted to a 34-yard field goal. The second half was all Tennessee, as the Titans scored 23 unanswered points and shut out the Jaguars. The Titans got a one-yard touchdown run by Steve McNair. Then came a safety of Mark Brunell safety, and on the free kick, Derrick Mason returned the ball 80 yards for a touchdown. The Jaguars could not recover, as they had three turnovers in the last 16 minutes of the game. Tennessee scored once in the fourth quarter for the 30-14 final score.



Returning for their seventh year of broadcasting Jacksonville Jaguars football on the Jaguars Radio Network are Brian Sexton and Matt Robinson. Sexton again handles the play-by-play, while Robinson adds analysis.

Sexton, 32, is the voice of the Jaguars. He is the host of several of the Jaguars' television and radio shows, including "Jaguars Reporters" (6:00 p.m. Mondays on WOKV), "Jaguars this Week" (6:00 p.m. Wednesdays on WBWL) and both the radio and television versions of "The Tom Coughlin Show" (6:00 p.m. Thursdays on WOKV and 11:30 p.m. Saturdays on WJXT-TV Channel 4). Formerly sports director at WOKV, Sexton came to Jacksonville from Wichita, Kan., where he served as assistant sports director at KNSS in 1993 and hosted various pregame and postgame shows in addition to handling play-by-play for the Wichita State University Radio Network. In April 2000, Sexton was a participant on the highly rated ABC-TV show "Who Wants To Be A Millionaire?" walking away with \$32,000. Sexton is chairman of the Ronald McDonald Discovery Board and a member of the volunteer committee of the River Bend District of Boy Scouts of America. He and his wife, Jennifer, who live in Atlantic Beach, have a son, Keegan.

Robinson, 46, a former NFL and USFL quarterback, has expertise on the other side of the microphone. A former University of Georgia star, he played six seasons in the NFL for the New York Jets, Denver Broncos and Buffalo Bills. Robinson came to Jacksonville in 1984 as captain and quarterback for the Bulls of the USFL. After his retirement in 1986, he remained in Jacksonville with several business interests in the area. In 1997, he broadcast two World League games for Fox Sports. Robinson, who was host and co-host of Jaguars television and radio programming through the team's first six seasons, is now the vice president of business development for Summit Contractors in Jacksonville, promoting new business, managing current business and marketing. Robinson sits on the board of trustees of the North Florida Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society, the St. Johns County United Way and Men for the Moment Ministry and is a member of the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce Sports Council. Robinson is a single father with five-year-old daughter Mattison.

Joining Sexton and Robinson on Jaguars radio broadcasts is field reporter Sam Kouvaris of WJXT-TV Channel 4. Cole Pepper and Vic Ketchman appear on the pregame show, and Pepper joins former Oakland Raiders star Pete Banaszak on the postgame show.

PRESEASON TELEVISION

Three of the Jaguars' four preseason games in 2001 will be telecast locally in Jacksonville on WJXT Channel 4, while the other game will be broadcast nationally on ESPN.

The Jaguars' first preseason game, on Friday, August 10 against the Carolina Panthers at ALLTEL Stadium, will be telecast live at 7:30 p.m. The Jaguars' first road game on Thursday, August 16 against the New York Giants in Giants Stadium will be broadcast nationally on ESPN at 8:00 p.m. The second home-game against the Kansas City Chiefs on Thursday, August 23 will air at 7:30 p.m., and the preseason finale on Thursday, August 30 against the Dallas Cowboys in Texas Stadium will be telecast at 8:30 p.m.

WJXT sports director Sam Kouvaris will be in his first season handling play-by-play for Jaguars' preseason games. Former Jaguars defensive end Jeff Lageman will enter his second season as the preseason color analyst. Joining Kouvaris and Lageman will be former Jaguars center Dave Widell, who will provide sideline reports during broadcasts.

Beginning this year, Sunshine Network will replay statewide, on a same-day delay basis at 11:30 p.m., all non-national network preseason games. The network will also feature a Monday night pre-game show, airing outside the Jacksonville market on December 3, when the Jaguars host the Green Bay Packers.

ALLTEL STADIUM



They said it couldn't be done. They said it wouldn't be ready. But on August 18, 1995, when the Jacksonville Jaguars played their first game in their new stadium, it marked the first time in sports history that an expansion team had played its first home game in its first season in a new stadium or arena. Not only that, but it was built faster than any major-league stadium had ever been built in North America.

In the short period of 19 1/2 months, the old Gator Bowl was demolished and a new spectacle arose on the shores of the St. Johns River. And, very quickly, it was called the best stadium in the country. Just seconds before the Jaguars kicked off their first regular-season game on September 3, 1995, NBC broadcaster Don Criqui said, "There isn't a better football facility in America." Now in its seventh year of operation, ALLTEL Stadium is still drawing raves.

And in another four years, on February 6, 2000, ALLTEL Stadium will be the host site of Super Bowl XXXIX, the biggest single-day sporting event in the world. The city of Jacksonville was awarded the game on November 1, 2000.

On April 18, 1997, Jacksonville Municipal Stadium was re-named ALLTEL Stadium after the Little Rock, Ark.-based wireless telecommunications and information services company that is listed in *Forbes* 500 and *Fortune* 500. ALLTEL also has a regional office in Jacksonville that employs more than 1,000 employees. Revenue from the 10-year grant of naming rights — a total of \$6.2 million — is shared equally between the Jaguars and the city of Jacksonville.

The stadium features two unique "signature" features, both of them state-of-the-art. The first are the two Touchdown Clubs, which are located on both sides, and the enormous twin 60-by-150-foot scoreboards with 24 by 32-foot Sony JumboTron screens.

The Touchdown Clubs and all 10,000 Club Seats are located at midfield, rather than being spread out horizontally through the stadium. Each Club — with entrances that are glass-enclosed, 100-foot-high atriums — provides more than 65,000 square feet of air-conditioned comfort with a variety of food and beverage selections. In all, 75 percent of the seats in ALLTEL Stadium are located on the sides, with just 25 percent behind the end zones.

ALLTEL Stadium seats 73,000, but additional temporary seats are added behind the South End Zone — expanding the capacity from 73,000 to well over 80,000 — for the annual Florida-Georgia game.

In addition to hosting at least a dozen football games every year, ALLTEL Stadium is quickly developing into a top venue for some of the world's top concerts. In the past few years, U2, Shania Twain, George Strait and *NSYNC have performed at the stadium, and the Billy Graham Crusade spent four days with sold-out shows at ALLTEL in 2000.

The construction of ALLTEL Stadium in the record 19 1/2 months was unprecedented. Twelve different consulting companies shaped the construction. Demolition began on the old Gator Bowl

on January 3, 1994, with approximately 90 percent of the old stadium torn down. In fact, the only portion salvaged was the west upper deck, which had been added in 1982.

A total of 121 subcontractors had a hand in the job ... all in all, thousands of people worked on the stadium from start to finish. And on Friday, August 18, 1995, ALLTEL Stadium opened its doors to more than 70,000 Jaguars faithful.

MEDIA INFORMATION

CREDENTIALS: Credential requests are honored only for working media on specific assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication. Credentials are not issued to freelance writers or photographers unless requested by a recognized news organization or sports publication. All credential requests must be submitted in writing on company letterhead to Dan Edwards, Executive Director of Communications and Broadcasting, Jacksonville Jaguars, One ALLTEL Stadium Place, Jacksonville FL 32202, or by fax to (904) 633-6055. Requests must be received at least one week prior to a home game.

PARKING: Parking in lots surrounding the stadium is limited. Every effort will be made to accommodate requests for parking passes, but parking cannot be provided for all credentialed media. The appropriate parking pass will be required for access to all stadium parking lots on game days. Television trucks which provide satellite, uplink or microwave functions will be parked adjacent to Gate 1, and a parking pass is required.

MEDIA ENTRANCE, CREDENTIAL WILL-CALL: The media entrance at the stadium is Gate 1, at the Southwest corner of the stadium. The appropriate game credential must be presented at the media entrance for admission to the stadium. Game credentials not picked up in advance will be available on game day at the media will-call window at Gate 1. The media will-call window will open three hours prior to kickoff. Parking passes will not be left at the will-call window.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Sideline access for NFL games is limited to photographers and videographers on assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication. No one except network television personnel and authorized game personnel will be admitted to the field without a camera. All field photographers must remain outside the bench areas and outside the yellow border surrounding the playing field. The photographers check-in location is near the media entrance on the service hallway.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS AND LOCKERROOM ACCESS: Members of the media needing to conduct postgame interviews will be given access to the Jaguars' interview room after each game, as well as the home and visiting lockerrooms. Jaguars head coach Tom Coughlin conducts his postgame news conference in the team meeting room. The visiting head coach will be available in a room off the visitors lockerroom.

DURING THE WEEK

MEDIA WORKROOM: The media workroom in the stadium is located just inside the media entrance. This room is available to working media during business hours throughout the week. Phones, Jaguars updates and NFL news releases, and other information is available. The phone number in the media workroom is (904) 633-6312.

TOM COUGHLIN INTERVIEWS: Head coach Tom Coughlin conducts his weekly news conference at 12:15 on Mondays in the media workroom. He is not available on Tuesdays, but is available to the media at 12:15 p.m. on Wednesdays and Thursdays.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: The Jaguars lockerroom is open to accredited media for specific interview periods during the week. On Mondays, players are available from 11:45 to 12:15, and on Tuesdays there is no availability, as this is the players' off day. The lockerroom is open to the media on Wednesdays and Thursdays from 11:45 to 12:15 and on Fridays at 1:15. All interviews should be arranged through the Jaguars' communications department. Interviews may be conducted in person or by phone, but please call in advance to schedule.


