MISSION STATEMENT

Believing that youth represent the community's future, the Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation is committed to serving the greater Jacksonville area through strategic financial, networking and volunteer support benefiting economically and socially disadvantaged youth and families. By building upon our city's strengths, we seek to realize the positive potential of our young people in need. In doing so, we aim to serve as a model to other sports franchises.

FOUNDATION'S GRANT AWARDS TOP \$11.6 MILLION

When the Jaguars were named as the 30th franchise in 1993, the Weaver's vision was to give back to the community in a substantial manner. The Foundation was announced on September 14, 1994, and awarded its first grants in March of 1995, well before the team played its first game. Through a fair and objective evaluation process, grants are allocated to serve the needs of economically and socially disadvantaged youth in Northeast Florida. Last year, 37 grants totaling \$1,057,850 were awarded to local non-profit agencies, including grants for the Foundation's Straight Talk and Youth Anti-Obesity initiatives. Total grant making since 1995 is more than \$11.6 million. This level of giving is among the top few in professional sports.

PROGRAMS:

STRAIGHT TALK™: Straight Talk is a unique partnership with local media, the National Campaign to Prevent Teen Pregnancy and co-sponsor Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Florida to help prevent teen pregnancy, HIV/AIDS and other sexually transmitted infections. Under the leadership of Foundation Chair and CEO, and Jaguars owner, Delores Barr Weaver; WJXT 4, WJCT PBS 7, WTLV ABC 12, WCWJ CW 17, WJXX ABC 25, WAWS FOX 30, WTEV CBS 47, Comcast Cable, The Florida Times-Union / Jacksonville.com, Clear Channel Outdoor and PRI Productions collaborate to produce an annual prime time television town hall forum, "Teens & Sex...the Real Truth." The show offers candid information on teens and sex and the consequences faced by sexually active teenagers.



Broadcast each May (National Teen Pregnancy Prevention Month), the 2008 show was produced by WJCT PBS 7 and hosted by local broadcast personality Jennifer Candelino. Jaguars players Tony Pashos, Maurice "Mo" Williams, Joe Zelenka, Paul Spicer and Kenny Petway were featured along with ROAR Cheerleader, Laurie, radio personality DJ Dr. Doom, and panel of experts including adolescent health expert Dr. John Montgomery and Julie Schlaw with the State Attorney's Office; with a special performance by Jacksonville native and Revolution Art national recording artist, "Jade", performing a song she wrote to close out the show. The show and other information can be accessed year-round at www.straighttalk.jacksonville.com created in partnership with The Florida Times-Union/jacksonville.com.

Additionally, the Foundation, as part of its grant making, has partnered with the Weaver Family Foundation to award more than \$1.9 million in Straight Talk grants to local programs specifically dealing with this issue.

HONOR ROWS®: This unique program, now in its 14th year, uses seats at Jaguars home games as incentives for youth ages 9 to 17 to set and achieve ambitious but realistic goals. Youth can earn their seat to a game if they achieve specific goals in the areas of academic improvement, personal behavior, volunteer community service, and nutrition and physical fitness activities. In addition, all Honor Rows youth pledge to remain free from illegal drugs, alcohol and tobacco. Nearly 4,300 seats will be awarded in 2008 to 38 nonprofit agencies. A volunteer committee reviews all Honor Rows proposals. At





the game, participants receive a meal, Honor Rows t-shirt and hat, and special recognition by the Weavers and fans. The United Way of Northeast Florida mobilizes game-day volunteers who ensure the overall safety and enjoyment of the participants.

In addition to the Honor Rows, the Jaguars Foundation awards seats to other charitable organizations, including Habijax for volunteer recognition; US Navy/Sailors Aweigh for youth whose parents are on deployment; inner-city youth football associations; Ronald McDonald House guest families and others that meet Foundation guidelines for support. Each season, the Foundation allocates approximately 11,800 seats for charitable purposes with an in-kind value exceeding \$430,000.

THE OFFICIAL PLAYBOOKS® READING PROGRAM: Through a partnership with Pepsi and local public libraries, this award winning innovative program inspires young people to read.



The 2008-09 Official Playbooks booklet features Jaguars owners, Head Coach, players and cheerleaders with books to “exercise your body and mind,” focusing on books that promote healthy living. Youth can pick-up a copy of Playbooks during the football season at any area public library. Playbooks can also be accessed year-round at www.jaguars.com.

Also, many of the Foundation grants include reading components. Additionally, since 2003, through a partnership with the nonprofit FIRST BOOK, major book publishers and local co-sponsors, the Jaguars Foundation has distributed more than 450,000 new children’s books into the homes of low-income families as part of Mayor Peyton’s goal to distribute one million books to Jacksonville’s children.

CHILDHOOD OBESITY PREVENTION: In partnership with Wolfson Children’s Hospital, the NFL, the American Heart Association (AHA), and the Duval County Public Schools, the Jaguars Foundation is in year two of a three year pilot program to fund programs that address the risks of poor nutrition and lack of physical fitness which can lead to childhood obesity. Utilizing a fitness curriculum created by the NFL and the AHA entitled “What Moves U,” and working with select local nonprofits and 6th grade students, programs offer both educational and hands-on activities designed to prevent and reduce the occurrence of childhood obesity. Part of the Foundation’s grant making includes more than \$500,000 in youth anti-obesity grants that will be awarded over the three year pilot program.



ANTI-TOBACCO INITIATIVE: The team and the Foundation have taken a nationally recognized leadership position in the local and professional sports community against tobacco use. The signature “Jaguars Don’t Smoke” logo, showing a vibrant Jaguar squashing a pack of cigarettes under its paw, appears on the scoreboard and signage throughout the stadium; Jaguars’ publications and autograph cards; and on television.

The stadium has never engaged in tobacco advertising or product sales. The Jaguars set an exceptional precedent as the first team in the NFL to have tobacco advertising removed from their game-day program, since followed by the entire league.

AWARDS AND RECOGNITION: The Jaguars Foundation was the proud recipient of the 2006 Steve Patterson Sports Philanthropy Award from The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the Sports Philanthropy Project for outstanding leadership in philanthropy in professional sports, both for our work in Jacksonville and our leadership in guiding other professional teams in the development of grant making and other programs in their local markets. The Foundation’s Straight Talk program received the 2005 Wilmer Shields Rich Bronze Award for Excellence in Communications by the Council on Foundations. In 2003, the Jaguars Foundation was named Jacksonville’s Outstanding Foundation by the Association of Fundraising Professionals–Florida First Coast Chapter; and also received the Governor’s Community Investment Award in recognition of its juvenile justice crime and youth violence prevention programs for youth. Other awards include: Florida Department of Education’s Commissioner’s Business Recognition Award (2001); Bridge Builder Award (1997); WTLV-12 Top of the Class Award (1996) for Playbooks; Governor’s Community Investment Award (1996) for Honor Rows, and Grantmakers in Health Award (1996 and 1995). The Jaguars Foundation’s innovative programs have been recognized in national media, including the January/February 2005 issue of FOUNDATION News and Commentary, as well as in articles in the New York Times, Forbes, Grantsmanship Center Magazine, St. Anthony Messenger, and on ESPN and the “Osgood File” radio program.

DELORES BARR WEAVER CHAIR/CEO, JAGUARS FOUNDATION



Delores Barr Weaver, a native of Columbus, Georgia and co-owner/partner of the Jaguars, is a woman possessed by the opportunity to make a difference in her adopted hometown of Jacksonville. Delores has a sincere interest in many areas of need and through the Weaver Family Foundation, she and husband, Wayne, have supported the work of many local agencies. The Weavers have been married 53 years and have two children, Brad and Leigh, an eighteen-year-old granddaughter, Morgan and a five-year-old grandson, Nash. Leigh and her friend, Beau Gage, are the artists of TOUCHDOWN, the 16' long and 6' high bronze jaguar that stands outside the Crown Royal Touchdown Club located on the west side of Jacksonville Municipal Stadium.

Delores is committed to helping families and young people in the Jacksonville community lead self-sufficient, meaningful lives. Under her leadership, all seven local television stations and their affiliates along with Comcast Cable, Cox Radio, Clear Channel Radio and Outdoor, as well as the local newspaper and their website Jacksonville.com, have joined in partnership to address the problem of teen pregnancy, AIDS, and increased male responsibility. Teen pregnancy is a major personal concern for Delores and is being addressed by the Foundation and local media in the effort to develop a quality prevention program for teens and to heighten awareness of adults in Jacksonville. The annual Straight Talk program is broadcast each May during National Teen Pregnancy Prevention Month. In addition, the Jaguars Foundation, in partnership with the Weaver Family Foundation, has also awarded in excess of \$1.9 million dollars in grants to local programs specifically addressing the issue of teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted disease.

When asked about being a member of the public speaking circuit, Delores laughs and says, "It is interesting to note that until November 30, 1993, no one seemed to care what I was interested in, what good work I might be doing or what I had to say." Then she gives the credit to the Jaguars who "open the doors and I must walk through as many as I can." As to accomplishments, Delores is most proud of the Jaguars Foundation and the impact it has made on behalf of economically and socially disadvantaged children in the greater Jacksonville area. For Delores, the Foundation was a dream come true in September, 1994. In March 1995, six months before the Jaguars played their first game, grants to eight local agencies in the amount of \$140,000 were made and through June, 2008, the Foundation has allocated more than \$11.6 million in grants. When talking about the Foundation, she is quick to credit her Jaguars partners for their generous financial support and staff for their commitment to supporting programs that will have a long-term impact.

In addition to her concerns for Jacksonville's children, Delores has set a personal goal to help level the playing field of life for women and minorities. She is dedicated to eliminating racism, sexism and classism from the hearts, minds and vocabulary of our society.

Locally Delores served on the Governing Board of WJCT Public Broadcasting from 1996 to 2004 and is now an Honorary Board Member while serving on the WJCT Foundation Board. She is also Trustee Emeritus of the United Way of Northeast Florida and supports the Cathedral Arts Project, Inc., Dreams Come True, Ronald McDonald House and The Bridge of Northeast Florida as a member of their Advisory Boards.

As a very concerned citizen in regard to public education, she and husband, Wayne, have committed \$1.2 million to bring Teach for America to Jacksonville beginning in the 2008/09 school year. In addition and after a ten year tenure as a Board of Trustees member of the Community Foundation, she now serves as a member of its Quality Education for All Forum. Delores is a staunch supporter of the four local domestic violence shelters: Betty Griffin House, Hubbard House, Micah's Place and Quigley House, as well as Planned Parenthood, and is a member of the Women's Giving Alliance. She served as chair of the Delores Barr Weaver Golf Tournament benefiting HabiJax, Jacksonville's affiliate of Habitat for Humanity from 1996-2006. Since its inception in 1996, the tournament sponsored 65 houses, representing a cash contribution in excess of \$2.2 million.

Delores is the Founder of FRIENDS of HabiJax. Through the Florida Sales Tax Refund Program to build low-income housing, a total of 25 organizations are designated Charter Members of FRIENDS and together they have sponsored 148 houses with an additional 5 houses by other FRIENDS entities for a total of 153 houses. The golf tournament and FRIENDS sponsored a total of 218 houses, representing a cash contribution to HabiJax in excess of \$7.9 million. Delores says, "We can build houses for children, but then we must pray they will have a family to make it a home." Under Delores' guidance, the Weaver Family Foundation has contributed over \$18.6 million to Jacksonville agencies and organizations, of which \$1.5M has been contributed to United Way of Northeast Florida and an additional \$500,000 is committed over the next two years. The Weavers also contributed \$1 million to United Way of America for designated programs directed toward Hurricane Katrina Relief.

Nationally, Delores is a member of the Governing Boards of NFL Charities, New York, Taste of





the NFL/Hunger Related Events, Minnesota, the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute and the Dana-Farber Marathon Challenge, Boston. Delores and Wayne created the Claudia Adams Barr Program in Basic Cancer Research at the Dana-Farber in memory and honor of her mother who lost her battle with cancer in 1957. Delores refers to cancer as her only known enemy and believes the answer to cures, and the eventual elimination of that dreaded disease, will be found at the workbench of research. The Weavers were instrumental in creating the Marathon Challenge, which provides an opportunity for participants in the Boston Marathon to raise funds for the work of the Barr Program. Since its inception in 1990, the Challenge has raised over \$38 million.

And yes, Delores was a football fan long before the Jaguars; she has not missed a game in the thirteen year franchise history, and readily admits she is both nervous and excited on game day. She knows the best is yet to come on both the field of life and the football field.

PETER RACINE
EXEC. DIRECTOR, JAGUARS FOUNDATION



Prior to joining the Foundation in September of 2000, Peter Racine developed and administered programs for abused, neglected, homeless and runaway children, including eight years as Executive Director of the Northeast Florida Exchange Club Center for the Prevention of Child Abuse. From 1987 to 1992, as Executive Director for Covenant House in Honduras, Central America, he established programs for Honduran street children. Prior to that, he helped begin Covenant House programs for homeless and runaway youth in Houston and Toronto after working at their New York City site. Racine has partnered with various national and international initiatives, including: Community Partnerships for Protecting Children with the Edna McConnell Clark Foundation; Early Childhood Violence Prevention Project with the U. 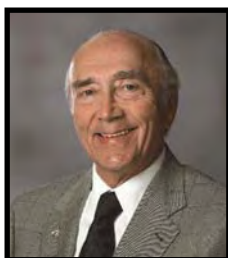

CHAIRMAN AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER



With two playoff berths in the last three seasons, the Jaguars are becoming a regular once again in postseason play. Under Wayne Weaver's leadership, the team has established itself among the NFL's best, ranking sixth among the league's 32 teams over the last 12 seasons with a 109-83 (.568) regular season record. In the last four years the Jaguars also rank sixth in the league with a 40-24 mark, trailing only New England, Indianapolis, San Diego, Pittsburgh and Seattle during that time.

Advancing to the playoffs four times in the first five seasons, and adding two division titles and two appearances in the AFC Championship game, the Jaguars quickly became the most successful expansion franchise in league history after joining the league in 1995.

The 2007 season marked resurgence for the Jaguars as the team posted an 11-5 regular season record and advanced to the second round of the playoffs. Claiming the team's first postseason win in seven years, the Jaguars' 31-29 Wild Card victory over the Steelers marked the first time in league history that a visiting team won in Pittsburgh twice in one season. The promising campaign ended, however, the following week in a 31-20 Divisional Playoff loss to the 16-0 Patriots.

"Our resolve grows greater every year to compete for and win a championship," Weaver says. "I believe in what we are doing, and our recent success indicates that we are getting closer to achieving our goal, which is to win our division and win a championship. At the same time we strive to properly represent Jacksonville on the playing field and in our community."

In 2006 the Jaguars posted a third consecutive non-losing season, finishing at 8-8 with seven losses by seven points or less. In 2005 the Jaguars were 12-4 in the regular season, the second-best mark in franchise history, and qualified for the postseason after a five-year playoff drought.

On November 30, 1993, Weaver and his partners surprised the football world by winning an NFL expansion franchise for the city of Jacksonville. In 1994 Weaver presided over the building of one of the

NFL's showpiece stadiums, and in the 1995 inaugural season the Jaguars expansion team took the field.

In 1996 Weaver saw his young team win seven consecutive late-season games, including two playoff victories in Buffalo and Denver, and advance to with-in one win of the Super Bowl. That year's playoff victory over the Broncos is regarded as one of pro football's greatest upsets.

The 1997 Jaguars won 11 games, more than any third-year NFL team had ever

won, and in 1998 the Jaguars claimed their first AFC Central division title as the franchise hosted its first-ever home playoff game. In 1999 the Jaguars finished with the NFL's best record, a 14-2 regular season mark, as the team hosted the AFC Championship game in Jacksonville.

In hosting Super Bowl XXXIX in Jacksonville on February 6, 2005, Weaver put an exclamation point on the first decade of NFL football in Jacksonville. The smallest city to host the league's crown jewel, Jacksonville saw its leaders and citizens rally together to create a successful and memorable Super Bowl experience.

A highly successful entrepreneur throughout his business career, Weaver brought with him to Jacksonville great energy, enthusiasm and keen business acumen. He wanted a model football franchise and a team that would contend





for the playoffs in a short time. Weaver serves as the Jaguars' chairman and chief executive officer, overseeing the day-to-day operations of the team while allowing his staff the autonomy to do its jobs. That's the Weaver way, and it has long proven to be a winning way.

But if football is his passion, Weaver also takes pride and joy in his other businesses. He is chairman and the Weaver family is majority owner of Shoe Carnival, Inc., one of the nation's fastest-growing shoe retailers that is based in Evansville, Ind. He also serves as chairman and CEO of Liz Claiborne Shoes, a wholesale distributor to upscale department stores across the country that is headquartered in Jacksonville. Previously Weaver was co-owner, president and CEO of Nine West Group, Inc., the leading designer and marketer of women's footwear.

Throughout his business career, Weaver has maintained a commitment to philanthropic endeavors. Since the

awarding of the Jaguars franchise, Wayne and Delores Weaver have focused their charitable efforts through the Weaver Family Foundation and the Jaguars Foundation.

Weaver is a member of four NFL committees: Finance, Investment, Business Ventures, and Compensation. He is past chairman of the Fashion Footwear Association of New York, and also serves on the boards of Stein Mart, the Jacksonville Zoo and the Alliance for World Class Education.

Weaver was born on January 14, 1935 in Columbus, Ga. A high-school graduate, he rose through the ranks of Brown Group, Inc., a major St. Louis-based shoe company. After serving as senior vice president, he departed in 1978 to become president and CEO of Nine West.

Wayne and Delores live in Jacksonville. They have been married for 53 years and have a daughter Leigh, a son Bradley, and two grandchildren, Morgan and Nash.



Paul Vance

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, FOOTBALL OPERATIONS/GENERAL COUNSEL



Paul Vance has served as senior vice president of football operations since November, 2001 after serving as general counsel to the team since the inception of the Jaguars. He is one of 15 current staff members who joined the franchise in 1994. Vance is responsible for the Jaguars' salary cap strategy and player contract negotiations. He also oversees the team training, medical, video and equipment departments as well as team travel and logistics.

In 2002 he was credited with developing, with former Coach Tom Coughlin, the plan to solve the Jaguars salary cap problems for the 2002 season. The plan involved the drastic but necessary decision to offer Pro Bowl tackle Tony Boselli, Gary Walker and Seth Payne to the Houston Texans in the Expansion Draft, as well as the implementation of fiscal restraint in player contracts and acquisition for the 2002 and 2003 seasons.

Since taking over in 2001, Vance has been responsible for the negotiation of extensions to retain many current veterans who form the core of the team, such as Rashean Mathis, Fred Taylor, John Henderson, Vince Manuwai, Daryl Smith, Brad Meester, Maurice Williams, Rob Meier, Paul Spicer, Greg Jones and David Garrard, and contracts with free agents who joined the Jaguars, including Brian Williams, Reggie Hayward, Mike Peterson, Tony Pashos, Jerry Porter and Drayton Florence. Notable rookies signed during this period include John Henderson, Reggie Williams, Matt Jones, Mercedes Lewis, Maurice Jones-Drew, Reggie Nelson and Justin Durant.

After the coaching change was announced at the end of the 2002 season, Vance assisted owner Wayne Weaver in the identification and interview of prospective candidates. The process led to the signing of head coach Jack Del Rio and vice president of player personnel James Harris. Del Rio, Harris and Vance have established a close working rela-

tionship that emphasizes consideration and balance of all coaching, player personnel and salary cap aspects in the player acquisition and roster building process.

Prior to joining the Jaguars, Vance had been in private practice for 21 years in Connecticut. While there, he represented Wayne Weaver during the expansion process. Since coming to Jacksonville, he has been of counsel with the Jacksonville office of Foley & Lardner, which serves as the primary law firm of the Jaguars. He graduated from the University of Rochester in 1969 with a degree in economics. While at Rochester, he played varsity baseball and captained the school's basketball team. He received his J.D. in 1973 from Columbia, where he was a Harlan Fiske Stone Scholar.

Among his community activities, he is a member of the Advisory Board of the Florida Coastal School of Law, he has been a member of the board and the executive committee of the Alliance for World-Class Education, a coalition of business and charitable interests formed to support efforts to improve public school education in Jacksonville. He has also been a member of the Business Advisory Council of the University of North Florida's Coggin School of Business. He also previously served on the board and executive committee of Jacksonville's Museum of Science and History and of the MaliVai Washington Kids Foundation. He has also served as a member of the steering committee of Downtown Visions, Inc., which successfully organized a business improvement district in downtown Jacksonville.

A native of Buffalo, N.Y., Paul and his wife, Jane, live in Jacksonville. They have four children: daughters, Kerry and Jamie, and sons, Jordan and Derek.





Bill Prescott SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, STADIUM OPERATIONS/CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER



Bill Prescott is the senior vice president, stadium operations/chief financial officer for the Jaguars. He is responsible for managing the Jaguars areas of Jacksonville Municipal Stadium as well as stadium concession operations on a year-round basis. Prescott serves as the liaison for the Jaguars and the City of Jacksonville on lease matters and SMG facility and game day operations issues.

Prescott oversaw the design and construction of the recent \$63 million renovation of Jacksonville Municipal Stadium. All of the renovations were completed in time for Super Bowl XXXIX, which was played on February 6, 2005.

As CFO, he oversees the financial operations and information technology of the team. Prescott interacts with the NFL on financial and business matters. He also serves on an NFL committee to review the best practices of financial and business operations.

Prescott is also responsible for the financial operations of other Wayne

Weaver-related entities, such as the DAR Group, the Jacksonville Jaguars

Foundation and the Weaver Family Foundation. He has been involved with the Jaguars since their inception and has also handled the Weavers' finances since 1980.

A native of the Bronx, N.Y., Prescott is a graduate of Pace University with a degree in accounting and a master's degree in taxation. Prescott is a member of the board of directors of Visit Jacksonville, a professor at the University of Phoenix, and former chairman for the Mohawk District of the Boy Scouts of North Florida, an urban scouting program serving the at-risk youth of Jacksonville. Prescott was born May 7, 1956. He has two sons, Christopher and Michael and a step-daughter Nikki. He and his wife, Kim, live in Ponte Vedra Beach.

Tim Connolly SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT



Tim Connolly joined the Jaguars in March of 2003 as the team's Vice President of Development. He was responsible for the Jaguars' Super Bowl XXXIX project, an initiative to help fund the capital improvements to Alltel Stadium for the 2005 Super Bowl. In October of 2004, Connolly was named senior vice president, business development and now directs the ticket sales/marketing, ticket operations/customer service, and the creative services and game day operations teams in addition to developing and sustaining new branding and business opportunities.

Connolly previously spent two years with the Minnesota Vikings and seven years with the Kansas City Chiefs. He served as executive vice president and general manager of the Vikings in 1998 and '99. The Vikings posted a 25-7 regular season mark (the most Vikings wins ever in back-to-back seasons), earned two playoff appearances and participated in the NFC championship game (1998 season). While a member of the Kansas City

Chiefs' front office from 1989 through 1995, the Chiefs won 72 regular season games and 3 playoff games. The Chiefs posted an 8-7-1 record in 1989; only their second winning season in 15 years, and then earned six consecutive playoff appearances between 1990-1995, including the AFC Championship Game in 1994. During this six year stretch, the Chiefs recorded more wins and playoff appearances than in any other six-year period in Chiefs history.

Connolly is recognized in NFL circles for building strong front office teams and delivering record-level stadium revenues. In 1999, the Vikings sold the most season tickets in the franchise's 39-year history - 16,000 more than the previous season. In Kansas City, Connolly served as the Chiefs' executive vice president and chief operating officer. He played a key role in the franchise's turnaround effort. When Connolly arrived in Kansas City in 1989,





the Chiefs had 25,000 season ticket owners and an average attendance of 47,500 per game. By 1991 Arrowhead Stadium reached sold-out status, beginning a consecutive sell-out streak that has reached 100-plus games. By 1994 the Chiefs led all NFL teams in attendance, and would continue to do so through the end of the decade, averaging almost 77,000 per game.

Connolly began his business career in 1971 with the IBM Corporation and was recognized frequently as a top sales performer and manager. In January of 1986

he was named president and CEO of Bell Atlantic's Cellular Phone Company. In 1987 Bell Atlantic (now Verizon) became the first major cellular company in the world to achieve profitability.

Connolly is a 1971 graduate of George Washington University, is very active in the community and has served on several boards including the Ronald McDonald House (Jacksonville, FL and Washington, D.C.) and the Governors Small Business Advisory Board (New Jersey).

A native of San Diego, CA, Connolly resides in Jacksonville with his wife.

James Harris

VICE PRESIDENT, PLAYER PERSONNEL



James Harris, vice president of player personnel for the Jaguars since early 2003, is affectionately known as "Shack" to almost everyone familiar with him. Harris is responsible for all player acquisitions, including the annual college draft, free agency, undrafted player signings and the scouting and signing of players from other professional leagues.

Harris and his personnel staff, working closely with Jack Del Rio and the coaching staff, have made significant contributions to the Jaguars roster through the acquisition of several key players. This includes notable first-round draft picks, Reggie Williams, Mercedes Lewis and Reggie Nelson; second round picks Rashean Mathis, Greg Jones, Daryl Smith and Maurice Jones-Drew, as well as several key late-round selections and veteran free agents; including Josh Scobee, third round pick Vince Manuwai and Tony Pashos.

A veteran with over 30 years experience in the NFL, Harris was one of a handful of blacks drafted at quarterback. In 1969, he was selected in the eighth round by Buffalo, where he played quarterback from 1969-71. His 12 seasons in the league included time with the Los Angeles Rams (1973-76) and San Diego Chargers (1977-81). During his stint with the Bills, Harris was the first black in league history to open a regular season as a starting quarterback. In 1976, Harris led the NFC with an 89.8 passer rating, highlighted by a 436-yard passing day against the Miami Dolphins that season. He was named MVP of the 1975 Pro Bowl after throwing for two TDs in a 14-13 victory over the AFC. Following his active playing days, Harris embarked on a per-

sonnel career that spans over two decades. His NFL career began in 1987, where he served as a scout for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers for five years. He then went on to serve as assistant general manager of the New York Jets (1993-96), before being named director of pro personnel for the Baltimore Ravens in 1997 where he spent six years and earned a Super Bowl ring with the Ravens' victory in Super Bowl XXXV in 2000.

Harris is the recipient of numerous awards from various sports entities and charitable organizations, including recognition by Sports Illustrated naming him as one of the top 50 most influential minorities in sports (May 2003; June 2004) and an award from Black Enterprise as one of the 50 most powerful blacks in sports. He was awarded the Fritz Pollard Alliance's Paul "Tank" Younger award in March, 2006 for his efforts to level the playing field and improve life for minorities. Also, later that year, he founded the Shack Harris Doug Williams Foundation, a non-profit, tax-exempt organization dedicated to creating opportunities for economically disadvantaged youth. To date, the Shack Harris Doug Williams Foundation has raised over \$400,000 in support of underprivileged youth. In February 2007, he was featured along with other members of the Field Generals in ESPN's "Third and a Mile: The Trials and Triumphs of the Black Quarterback" by William Rhoden and in 2008, he was honored with the Onyx Awards Achievement in Sports by Onyx Magazine

Harris' early years in sports were equal-





ly impressive. He was recruited and played for one of college football's greatest coaches, the legendary Eddie Robinson of Grambling State. In each of Harris' four seasons with the Tigers (1965-68), the team won or shared the SWAC title. He was named MVP of the 1967 Orange Blossom Classic and was named Pittsburgh Courier Player of the Year in 1968. As a legendary athlete at Carroll High School in his hometown of Monroe, La., Harris received two-time All-State honors as quarterback of the Tigers. He also led Carroll to two undefeated seasons and a State Championship.

Harris earned a bachelor's degree in education and was subsequently nominated as a distinguished alumnus for his

contributions to American society during his NFL career. He is an inductee of the SWAC Hall of Fame, the Grambling Athletic Hall of Fame and the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He is a member of the Fritz Pollard Alliance and a founding member of the Field Generals: The African American Quarterbacks Club, a non-profit group founded by and composed of NFL greats dedicated to teaching and preserving the history of the African American quarterback.

Harris was born in Monroe, La. on July 20, 1947. He has two sons, James and Aaron and two daughters, Felicia and Ashley. Harris and his wife, Vickie, reside in Jacksonville.

Dan Edwards

VICE PRESIDENT, COMMUNICATIONS AND MEDIA



Dan Edwards, the Jaguars' vice president of communications and media, marks his 25th NFL season and his 15th year with the Jaguars in 2008. He is responsible for overseeing all aspects of the Jaguars' communications division, which includes media relations, community relations, publications, broadcasting, and the team's web site, www.jaguars.com.

Edwards joined the Jaguars on May 4, 1994 following nine years with the Pittsburgh Steelers. In 2003 the organization's community relations department and Internet content were added to his responsibilities when he was promoted to vice president. He is one of 15 current staff members who have been with the franchise since 1994.

Previously the public relations director for the Steelers (1987-93), Edwards began his career in 1984 as a public relations intern in the NFL office in New York. He spent the 1984 football season working in publicity for the Miami Dolphins before joining the Steelers in 1985. He has also worked for the NFL on its Super Bowl PR staff at 20 of the past 23 Super Bowls in

addition to the 1990 Pro Bowl.

Prior to entering the NFL, Edwards worked in professional baseball as an administrative assistant with the Eugene (Ore.) Emeralds, a single-A affiliate of the Cincinnati Reds. He played football and baseball for Montgomery College (Md.) before transferring to the University of Oregon.

Edwards received his undergraduate degree in business administration/management from the Lundquist College of Business at the University of Oregon in 1981, and a master's degree in sports administration/facility management from Ohio University in 1984. Edwards has recently served as an adjunct professor in sport communication at the University of North Florida.

Born January 15, 1959 in Denver, Edwards and his wife Tricia have four children: sons Christian and Preston and daughters Danielle and Victoria.

The Jaguars' 40-24 regular season mark over the last four years ranks as the sixth-highest winning percentage in the National Football League. Through five seasons under Jack Del Rio, the Jacksonville defense ranks fourth in yards allowed (300.1 per game) and points allowed (18.2), while the offense is sixth in rushing yards (135.2) and second in fewest turnovers (114). In 2008 Del Rio's squad is coming off a resurgent campaign in which the team posted an 11-5 regular season record to earn its second playoff berth in three years, in addition to the franchise's first playoff win since the 1999 season.

Earning a league-wide reputation for playing smart and tough, the Jaguars in 2007 became the first team in NFL history to win in Pittsburgh twice in one season, and the club also finished the campaign with an all-time franchise low in penalties. Along the way the offense averaged 357.4 yards per game to rank seventh in the league while scoring a franchise-record 411 points including at least 24 points in 10 consecutive games. The offense turned in a team-record seven games with 400 or more yards while the defense held opponents to 17 points or less in 10 games.

"Each year as we continue to build this roster these players develop a greater concept of team," Del Rio says of his 2008 unit. "As the players continue to give great effort and great energy and great preparation, we get closer to our goal of becoming champions."

Del Rio was named the second head coach in Jaguars history on January 17, 2003. Now in his 23rd year in the NFL and his 12th in coaching, Del Rio has played for, coached with, and learned from some of the best coaches in all of football. He was recruited to play at Southern California by John Robinson, and in the NFL he played under Bum Phillips, Jim Mora, Frank Gansz, Jimmy Johnson and Dennis Green.

Among other notable coaches he teamed with during his 11-year playing career are Dom Capers, Dave Campo, Dave Wannstedt, Tony Dungy, Monte Kiffin, Tom Moore, Norv Turner, Butch Davis and Mike Tice. As an assistant coach for six seasons, Del Rio worked on the staffs of Hall of Famer Mike Ditka, Super Bowl winner Brian Billick, and Super Bowl participant John Fox. Among those he was on coaching staffs with are Marvin Lewis, Mike Nolan and Mike Smith.

Del Rio, 45, had the second-longest playing career among the league's nine current head coaches who played in the NFL. The others – which include all three AFC South rivals – are Jim Zorn (12), Herman Edwards (10),

Gary Kubiak (9), Ken Whisenhunt (9), Dick Jauron (8), Jeff Fisher (5), Tony Dungy (3) and Sean Payton (1).

In 2006 Del Rio was appointed to serve as a member of the NFL Coaches Sub-committee to the powerful NFL Competition Committee. He has participated in many hours of committee meetings and discussions to help advance the game.

Del Rio led the 2006 Jaguars to their third consecutive non-losing season at 8-8, despite losing 15 players to injured reserve when nine key players missed a total of 100 games due to injury. The Jaguars were 5-3 against playoff teams and had seven losses by seven points or less. Among the highlights were a team-record 2,541 rushing yards (158.8 per game) and just 30 sacks allowed on offense. The defense registered the highest ranking in team history at second overall, made a team-record 20 interceptions, and posted two shutouts.

In 2005 the Jaguars won eight of their last nine regular season games, including four straight on the road, en route to a 12-4 record and a Wild Card playoff berth. Among the team's highlights was the league's sixth-ranked defense which was also sixth in points allowed, 19 defensive interceptions, and a first-place ranking in opponent starting field position. On offense the team increased scoring by 100 points over the previous year and had a team-record and NFL-low six interceptions thrown. The unit ranked fifth in the league in time of possession and second in turnovers.

Del Rio posted the team's first winning record in five seasons along with a second-place finish in the division, the team's highest since 1999, in leading the Jaguars to a 9-7 mark in 2004. Among the notables that year were first-ever road wins at The Coliseum, The RCA Dome and Lambeau Field. The defense led the league in red zone efficiency, ranked seventh in scoring defense, and was 11th in yards allowed. The special teams, which ranked last in the NFL the year before, made significant improvement in jumping 16 spots to rank 16th.

In taking over the Jaguars in 2003, Del Rio was the architect of a defense that improved to sixth overall in the NFL and second against the run. He inherited a team that had not been in the top 10 in total defense since 1999, ranking 20th in 2002. The defense allowed only one 100-yard rusher in 2003, while the offense allowed just 28 sacks, the fewest in

team history, and Fred Taylor rushed for a team-record 1,572 yards. The Jaguars' 5-11 record included six losses by seven points or less.

The improvement on defense was no coincidence since Del Rio was only one year removed from taking the Carolina Panthers defense from last in the league to second overall as defensive coordinator of the Panthers in 2002. Coming off a 1-15 season, the Panthers defense allowed 290.4 yards per game, led the NFL in fewest rushing yards per attempt, and ranked second in fewest yards per play, third down efficiency, and sacks. The Panthers allowed the fifth-fewest points in the league, did not allow a 300-yard passer, and didn't yield a 100-yard rusher until the season finale.

From 1999 to 2001, Del Rio served as linebackers coach for the Baltimore Ravens, helping the team win Super Bowl XXXV over the New York Giants. For those three years, in which the Ravens finished second in total defense three times, Del Rio coached the Ravens' talented linebacker corps which featured Peter Boulware, Jamie Sharper and Ray Lewis, the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year in 2000 and the MVP of Super Bowl XXXV. During the Ravens' 2000 season the defense set the NFL 16-game record by allowing only 165 points and recording four shutouts, one shy of the post-1970 record. The group also led the NFL with 49 forced turnovers. In the playoffs the unit allowed just one touchdown in four games.

Del Rio began his coaching career in New Orleans under Ditka, spending two seasons as assistant strength coach in 1997 and linebackers coach in 1998.

Del Rio was drafted in the third round (68th overall) by the Saints in 1985, when he was named to the NFL's All-Rookie team and earned the Saints' Rookie of the Year award. Following two seasons in New Orleans (1985-86), Del Rio played for the Kansas City Chiefs (1987-88), Dallas Cowboys (1989-91) and Minnesota Vikings (1992-95). He led the Vikings in tackles three straight years and played in the Pro Bowl following the 1994 season. Del Rio finished his career with 1,078 tackles, 12 quarterback sacks, 13 interceptions and more than 100 consecutive starts between 1989 and 1994. He went to the playoffs once with the Cowboys and three times with the Vikings.

Del Rio was a four-year starter from 1981-84 at Southern California, where he earned consensus All-America honors as a senior and was runner-up for the Lombardi Award. The Trojans were 30-15-1 during his four seasons, three times ranked among the top 15 teams in the country. He played in the 1982 Fiesta Bowl and was co-MVP of the 1985 Rose Bowl. He led the Trojans in tackles for a loss three years in a row and played in the East-West Shrine Game and the Japan Bowl. Del Rio finished his college career with 340 tack-

les, 58 tackles for loss, five fumble recoveries and one interception.

Drafted out of high school by the Toronto Blue Jays in 1981, Del Rio batted .340 while playing catcher on Southern California's baseball team in 1983 and '84. He was a teammate of current Arizona Diamondbacks pitcher Randy Johnson and former major league slugger Mark McGwire.

A graduate of Hayward (Calif.) High School, the alma mater of Bill Walsh, Del Rio starred in football, baseball and basketball. He holds a political science degree from the University of Kansas, which he earned while playing for the Chiefs. Born April 4, 1963 in Castro Valley, Calif., he and his wife, Linda, have three daughters, Lauren, Hope and Aubrey, and a son, Luke.

bers of the football team through establishment of a study hall and tutoring program.

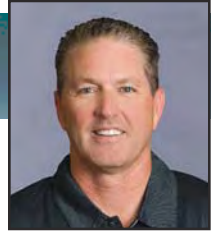

Dirk Koetter is in his second season as the Jaguars offensive coordinator. Koetter was named to the post on January 10, 2007. Koetter, known for his expertise of the passing offense, has 26 years of coaching experience.

Prior to joining the Jaguars, Koetter spent nine seasons as a head coach at the collegiate level. He previously served as head coach at Arizona State from 2001-06 and at Boise State from 1998-2000.

In his first season with the Jaguars, Koetter directed a record-breaking season by the offense. The Jaguars set the franchise single-season record for points (411, 25.7 avg.), touchdowns (50), touchdown passes (28) and yards per play (5.6). The Jaguars ranked seventh in the NFL in offense (357.4), tied for the second-highest ranking in franchise history. The Jaguars totaled 400-plus yards in a team-record seven games and scored 24 or more points in 10 consecutive games for the first time in team history. Quarterback David Garrard thrived in his first season as the starter as he ranked third in the NFL with a 102.2 passer rating and threw a NFL-low three interceptions. Wide receiver Reggie Williams set the franchise single-season record with 10 touchdown receptions.

Koetter led Arizona State to four bowl games in his six seasons and finished with a 40-34 record. While also serving as offensive coordinator, Koetter helped the Sun Devils average nearly 30 points per game over six seasons and the team was ranked in the top 20 in the nation in passing offense in five of his six seasons.

Koetter molded Arizona State's all-time leading passer in Andrew Walter, its top career receiver in Derek Hagan and the top tight end in Sun Devils history in Zach Miller during his tenure. Walter, who played his final three seasons under Koetter, left as the Pac-10's career leader for touchdown passes with 85, surpassing John Elway who threw for 77 touchdowns while at Stanford from 1979-82. Hagan, who was a third-round pick

of the Miami Dolphins in 2006, finished with a school-record 14 career 100-yard receiving games. Miller finished the 2006 season as the school's all-time leader in receptions and receiving yards for a tight end and was one of three finalists for the John Mackey Award.

In 2005, ASU finished second in the nation in total offense, averaging 519.1 yards per game and third in the nation with 373.4 passing yards per game. In 2004, Koetter led ASU to a 9-3 record and finished the season ranked 19th in the Associated Press Poll. After finishing 4-7 in his first season at ASU, Koetter directed the program to an 8-6 mark in 2002 and a berth in the Holiday Bowl.

Prior to taking over ASU, Koetter spent three seasons as head coach at Boise State where he compiled a 26-10 mark and two consecutive bowl victories. He was a two-time Big West Coach of the Year honoree and two-time conference champion. He served two years as the offensive coordinator at the University of Oregon (1996-97).

A native of Pocatello, Idaho, Koetter played four seasons at Idaho State where he was part of the program that won a Division I-AA national championship. Following his graduation, he became head coach at Highland High at age 23 where he compiled a career record of 19-4 and won the 1984 state championship.

He spent the 1985 season as offensive coordinator at San Francisco State and from 1986-88 as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Texas El Paso. Prior to taking over at Boise State, Koetter served as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Missouri from 1989-93 and offensive coordinator at Boston College (1994-95) and Oregon (1996-97).

Koetter, 49, and his wife, Kim, have two daughters, Kaylee and Kendra, and two





sons, Derek and Davis.

Gregg Williams was named defensive coordinator/assistant head coach, defense for the Jaguars on January 31, 2008. Williams is a veteran of 18 years in the NFL including three as a head coach.

In five of the last eight years, Williams' defenses have ranked in the top 10 in the league - including three top three's in the past five years - with three different teams.

Williams spent four seasons (2004-07) as assistant head coach/defensive coordinator with the Washington Redskins. From 2004-07, the Redskins ranked sixth in the NFL in defense (306.6), second in the NFC, and seventh in rushing defense (103.8). The Redskins allowed only 19.4 points per game during that span, the ninth-fewest in the NFL.

In 2005, the Redskins defense propelled the club to its first postseason appearance since 1999. The defense allowed only 11.7 points per game in the last six games. The defense finished ranked ninth in the NFL and sixth in the NFC. In his first season with the Redskins, Williams' unit ranked third in the NFL and first in the NFC. They also finished third against the rush and seventh against the pass in the NFL.

Before joining the Redskins, Williams spent three seasons as head coach of the Buffalo Bills. During his tenure in Buffalo, his defenses improved each of the three seasons. In 2003, the defense finished second in the NFL, improving from 15th in 2002 and 21st in 2001. Overall, the Bills' 2003 defensive and special teams units finished among the NFL's top-five teams in nine categories.

Williams spent 11 seasons with the Tennessee organization (1990-2000), including four seasons as the defensive coordinator from 1997-2000. He was hired in 1990 as a defensive quality control coach and was promoted to special teams coach in 1993. Before taking over as defensive coordinator, Williams spent three seasons (1994-96) as linebackers coach.

In 2000, the Titans' defensive unit led the NFL in total defense for the first time since joining the NFL and the 191 points allowed were the third-fewest in the NFL since the league adopted a 16-game schedule in 1978. The team also established the franchise's

single-season records for sacks (55), fewest passing yards allowed (2,424) and fewest touchdowns allowed (17). The Titans ranked first in the NFL from 1999-2000 with 109 sacks.

Prior to joining the NFL coaching ranks, Williams served as a graduate assistant at the University of Houston from 1988-89 under former Oilers and Redskins head coach Jack Pardee. From 1984-87, Williams was the head coach at Belton (MO) High School after beginning his coaching career as an assistant coach at Excelsior Springs (MO) High School.

At each stop along the way, Williams has been heavily involved in the community. Williams created the Gregg Williams Foundation, Inc. in 2004 to benefit the children in his hometown of Excelsior Springs, Mo.



The foundation's host website is www.greggwilliamsfoundation.org. For the past four years, he has hosted the Gregg Williams Tiger Golf Classic as well as a coaching clinic and seven-on-seven tournament with a lineman challenge with funds raised going towards the installment of new scoreboards for the high school gym, college scholarship programs, recreation parks, a practice field irrigation system and a newly formed Robotics Team within the school's science department.

Williams played quarterback and also played baseball at Northeast Missouri State where he earned a bachelor of science degree. He later earned his master's degree in education from Central Missouri State. Williams and his wife, Leigh Ann, have a daughter, Amy, and two sons, Blake and Chase.

Joe DeCamillis is in his second season as the Jaguars' special teams coordinator. DeCamillis, who is known as one of NFL's top special teams coaches, has 20 years of NFL coaching experience and he has spent the past 15 seasons as a NFL special teams coach.

The Jaguars ranked third in the NFL in 2007 in opponents average starting position after a kickoff (25.8) and fourth in fewest opponent kickoff returns of 20-plus yards (31). The Jaguars tied for first in the NFL by allowing only one punt return of 20-plus yards. Rookie Chad Nkang set a single-season franchise record with 30 special teams tackles while rookie Adam Podlesh assumed the role as the Jaguars punter to start the season.

A player on DeCamillis' special teams has returned either a punt or a kickoff for a touchdown in 13 of the last 14 seasons. Maurice Jones-Drew had a 100-yard kickoff return for a score at New Orleans in 2007.

DeCamillis, 42, previously directed the special teams for the Atlanta Falcons from 1997-2006 with the last three seasons as special teams coordinator. In DeCamillis' tenure, the Falcons punt coverage team allowed an NFL-low 6.1 yards per punt return and only one return for a touchdown. In addition, the Falcons had the third-most touchbacks (126), the second-most kickoff returns for touchdowns (8) and second-most total return touchdowns (13) during that span.

In 2006, the Falcons led the NFL as opponents had an average starting position of the 23.6-yard line. They ranked fourth in the NFL with 47 kickoff returns of 20-plus yards and second in allowing only 26 kickoff returns of 20-plus yards.

In 2005, the Falcons were one of four teams to be ranked in the NFL's top 10 in both kickoff coverage (1st) and punt cover-

age (8th). PK Todd Peterson made 18 consecutive field goals and had the second-highest percentage in franchise history. PR Allen Rossum finished second in the NFL in punt returns in 2004 (12.4) and was named to the Pro Bowl. The Falcons special teams ranked second in the NFL for kickoff and punt return units in 2003.

Jay Feely set the franchise record for most field goals (32) and most points (138) in a season in 2002 while punter Chris Mohr led the NFL in net punting average (38.7) in the same season. DeCamillis' punt return unit in 1999 had only 26 punts returned against them for 119 yards, which was the lowest in the NFL and 10th-lowest in the league since 1978. His 1998 unit surrendered only 112 punt return yards, the seventh-lowest in the NFL in a single season since 1978.

DeCamillis spent four seasons (1993-96) as special teams coach with the New York Giants under Dan Reeves. In 1996 with the Giants, his special teams led the NFL with 32 punts downed inside the 20-yard line and the punt return unit ranked sixth in the NFL (11.4 avg.) with two touchdowns scored.

DeCamillis started his coaching career in Denver as defensive quality control and assistant special teams coach from 1988-92.

DeCamillis was an all-state quarterback and wrestler at Arvada (Co.) High School and went on to become an All-America wrestler at Wyoming. DeCamillis and his wife, Dana, have two daughters, Caitlin and Ashley.

Mike Tice is in his third season with the Jaguars as assistant head coach, his second season overseeing the tight ends. Tice joined the Jaguars on February 1, 2006 after spending 14 seasons with the Minnesota Vikings as a player and coach.

Tice, 49, has 27 years of experience in the NFL with 14 as a player and 13 in the coaching ranks. He has participated in 22 postseason games, 13 as a coach and nine as a player. He previously served as head coach of the Vikings from 2002-05. The Vikings posted

a winning record in three of four seasons under Tice including a playoff berth in 2004.

In Tice's two seasons with the Jaguars assisting the offense, the club has finished with the two highest offensive rankings since 2000. The Jaguars have rushed for the two highest totals in team history as they finished with 2,391 yards (149.4) in 2007 and





a franchise-record 2,541 (158.8) in 2006.

In 2007, the Jaguars finished the regular season ranked seventh in the NFL in offense (357.4), tied for the second-highest ranking in franchise history. The Jaguars set franchise single-season records for points (411, 25.7 avg.), yards per play (5.6 avg.) and touchdowns (50).

Tight end Mercedes Lewis emerged as a playmaker in 2007 as he finished with a career-high 37 receptions for 391 yards. In Tice's first season with the Jaguars, the club ranked 10th in offense, the highest ranking since 2000, and set the franchise record for rushing yards.

The Vikings finished in the top 10 in the NFL for total offense in six of the nine seasons Tice was on the staff. The Vikings set a NFL record for most consecutive games with 300-plus yards of offense (2002-04) with 36.

Tice had been associated with the Vikings since 1992 when he played three seasons (1992-93, 1995) as a tight end. He served as tight ends coach for Minnesota in 1996 and offensive line coach from 1997-2001 before being promoted to head coach.

Tice led the Vikings to the playoffs in 2004 and their first road playoff victory in franchise history with a win at Green Bay. Tice joined Jerry Burns as the only coaches in club history to win their playoff debuts. The Vikings set a team record in 2004 for net yards (6,339) and passing yards (4,754). Daunte Culpepper set numerous club passing records and produced one of the finest seasons in NFL history by a quarterback.

The Vikings finished with a winning record in 2003 for the first time since 2000. The Vikings led the NFL in offense for the first time in their history and sent four play-

ers to the Pro Bowl. In Tice's first season as head coach in 2002, the Vikings led the NFL in rushing for the first time in team history with 2,507 yards.

As an offensive line coach, Tice tutored five different players (Matt Birk, Jeff Christy, Randall McDaniel, Todd Steussie, Corey Stringer) to 10 Pro Bowl appearances. In 1998, the offensive line paved the way for a NFL-record 556 points and then-record 41 touchdown passes. Three offensive linemen from the Vikings started in the Pro Bowl in 1998, the first offensive line trio in club history ever selected to the Pro Bowl.

Tice had 107 receptions for 894 yards and 11 touchdowns in his 14-year career. In addition to playing for the Vikings, he spent 10 seasons with Seattle (1981-88, 1990-91) and one season with Washington (1989). Tice, who started 109 of 177 NFL games, played under legendary head coach Chuck Knox in his final eight seasons in Seattle. He originally retired following the 1993 season, but was signed by the Vikings in December of 1995 to help a tight end position decimated by injuries.

Tice was the recipient of the Byron "Whizzer" White Humanitarian Award in 1987. Tice played collegiately at Maryland where he started two seasons at quarterback. He was born February 2, 1959 in Bayshore, N.Y., and attended Central Islip High School in Long Island where he played for current Central Florida head coach George O'Leary. He and his wife Diane have two children, Adrienne and Nathan.

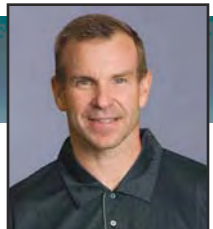

Mark Asanovich is in his sixth season as the strength and conditioning coach for the Jaguars and his 14th season as an NFL coach.

Asanovich, 49, oversees the Jaguars strength and conditioning program. The program emphasizes individual supervision of player workouts. It is his belief that players who are coached in the weight room will develop better results. The cornerstone of the program is to "maximize physical potential and minimize physical injury."

With the support of Jaguars owner Wayne Weaver, Asanovich oversaw a \$300,000 renovation of the Jaguars weight room before the 2003 offseason conditioning program. In 2008, several pieces of equipment were updated.

"Wayne Weaver has given us the

resources to win and Jack Del Rio and his staff have given us their support," Asanovich said.

"The players have responded and given great effort."

Asanovich has been a speaker for seven consecutive years at the Strong-S seminar in Tokyo that is organized by the renowned Japanese trainer Tatsuya Okawa. Several Jaguars players accompany Asanovich on the trip each year where they speak at selected universities and other venues.

In 2002, Asanovich was the assistant strength and conditioning coach of the Baltimore Ravens. He was the head strength and conditioning coach of the Tampa Bay



Buccaneers from 1996 through 2001, working under former coach Tony Dungy.

Asanovich spent the 1995 season as assistant strength and conditioning coach for the Minnesota Vikings. From 1987 to '95, he was the strength and conditioning coach at Anoka High School (Minneapolis, Minn.). In 1984, he began his coaching career as a graduate assistant coach at Ohio State, staying there two years. In 1986 he coached at The Citadel.

Asanovich has published several articles in his field of study and served as a member of the Minnesota Governor's Council on Health & Physical Fitness. He earned a bach-

elor's degree in education from St. Cloud State and a master's degree in exercise science from Ohio State.

Mark Duffner is in his third season as the linebackers coach for the Jaguars. Duffner was named to the post on January 31, 2006 after spending the previous three seasons in the same capacity for the Green Bay Packers.

Duffner has more than 32 years of coaching experience, including 11 seasons as a college head coach.

In both previous seasons with the Jaguars, Duffner tutored a rookie who was in the starting lineup because of injuries. Justin Durant was inserted into the starting lineup in 2007 with an injury to Mike Peterson and started eight games. Durant led the Jaguars in the postseason with 31 tackles, including 17 against Pittsburgh in the AFC Wild Card Game. Daryl Smith ranked second on the club with 117 tackles.

Clint Ingram stepped into a starting role as a rookie in 2006 and ranked second on the team and fourth among all rookies with 117 tackles. Smith ranked third in the NFL in 2006 with a career-high 170 tackles along with three sacks.

At Green Bay, Duffner played a major role in the development of 2003 first-round draft pick Nick Barnett. Green Bay's defense finished the 2005 season as the seventh ranked defense in the NFL (ranked No. 1 against the pass) and Barnett set the team record with 194 tackles (128 solo) and became the first Packer to lead the team in tackles for three consecutive seasons. In 2004, the Packers defense ranked first in the NFL in red zone defense, allowing only five conversions in 21 third down attempts (23.8 percent).

Duffner entered the NFL coaching ranks with the Cincinnati Bengals where he spent six seasons as linebackers coach (1997-2000) and defensive coordinator (2001-02). In 2001, the Bengals defense allowed the fewest points since 1989 and fewest yards per game since 1983. In addition, the

defense set a franchise single-season record for sacks with 48 in 2001.

Prior to joining the Bengals staff, Duffner was head coach at the University of Maryland from 1992-96. He posted a 20-35 overall record that included a 11-11 mark over his final two seasons, the school's best two-season record since 1984-85. Duffner helped the Terps achieve their first national ranking in nine years when the club ranked as high as No. 17 in 1995. In addition to the success on the field, Duffner improved Maryland's player graduation rate, with three classes in a row ranking among the nation's best (1994-96).

Duffner also served as head coach at The College of Holy Cross where he compiled a 60-5-1 mark that included two 11-0 records (1987 and 1991) during his six seasons. He was named national coach of the year five times while at Holy Cross and 'New England Coach of the Year' five times. The 1987 Holy Cross team was ranked No. 1 in the nation in Division I-AA by the Associated Press. Duffner initially served as defensive coordinator at the school from 1981-1985. He was inducted into the College of the Holy Cross Athletic Hall of Fame in May of 2008.

Duffner's coaching career began as a graduate assistant under Woody Hayes at Ohio State (1975-76) before serving as defensive coordinator at the University of Cincinnati (1977-80).

Duffner played collegiately at William & Mary and was later inducted into the school's Hall of Fame in 1990. He and his wife, Kathy, have three children: daughters Christina and Carolyn and son, John.

Les Ebert is in his fifth season as Jacksonville's assistant strength and conditioning coach. Ebert is responsible for assisting strength and conditioning coach Mark Asanovich in all areas of the club's strength and conditioning program, which emphasizes individual supervision of player workouts.

Ebert, 35, spent the 2003 season as a part-time assistant strength and conditioning coach in Jacksonville. Prior to joining the Jaguars, Ebert spent three seasons, from 1999 to 2001, as the assistant strength and conditioning coach with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

In his three seasons in Tampa Bay, Ebert helped establish arguably one of the fittest squads in the NFL. During his three-year span, the Buccaneers sent 21 players to the Pro Bowl including Warren Sapp, Derrick Brooks, John Lynch and Mike Alstott, who made three consecutive trips each. Each year the team got stronger as the year progressed. In the final nine games of the regular season from 1999 to 2001 the teams'

record was 8-1, 7-2, and 6-3. Those finishes led to three consecutive playoff appearances.

Born October 1, 1972 in Brainerd, Minn., Ebert was strength and conditioning coach at Blaine (Minn.) High School in 1998. In 1997, Ebert served as the Buccaneers' season long strength and conditioning intern.

Ebert earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from the University of Minnesota-Duluth and a master's degree in physical education from Emporia State University (Kan.). Ebert is a certified member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association.

Ebert played center and defensive end at Centennial (Minn.) High School. He and his wife, Rebecca reside in Orange Park with their son, Matthew.

Andy Heck

Former NFL player and collegiate coach Andy Heck is in his third season as offensive line coach and fifth season with the Jaguars.

Heck was promoted to offensive line coach for the Jaguars on February 1, 2006. Heck joined the Jaguars coaching staff on February 9, 2004 as the offensive assistant/assistant offensive line coach and spent the 2005 season as assistant offensive line coach.

In Heck's two seasons as offensive line coach, the line paved the way to the two highest single-season rushing totals in franchise history and two of three lowest sack totals. The Jaguars led the NFL from 2006-07 with an average of 154.1 rushing yards per game.

The Jaguars set the single-season franchise-record for rushing yards (2,541) in 2006 and allowed only 30 sacks, the second-fewest in team history. The Jaguars rushed for a franchise-record 375 yards against Indianapolis on December 10. In 2007, the line led the way for 2,391 rushing yards

(149.4), the most in the AFC and second-highest total in the NFL. The Jaguars allowed only 31 sacks, the third-fewest in franchise history.

Heck served three seasons on the University of Virginia coaching staff, the first two seasons as a graduate assistant and the final year as tight ends coach. Heck tutored All-America tight end Heath Miller, who set numerous Atlantic Coast Conference records for a tight end in receiving and scoring. An outstanding blocker, Miller was a first round pick of the Pittsburgh Steelers in 2005.

Prior to joining the Virginia staff, Heck played in the NFL for 12 seasons (1989-2000) as a standout offensive lineman. He finished his playing career with the Washington Redskins, where he played for two seasons. As the starting left tackle in 1999, he blocked for an offense that ranked

second in the NFL. From 1994 to 1998, he was a five-year starter for the Chicago Bears. In 1995, he gave up no sacks as part of an offensive line that yielded the fewest sacks in the NFL.

Heck was drafted in the first round (15th overall) by the Seattle Seahawks, where he was a unanimous All-Rookie selection in 1989. A five-year starter with the Seahawks, he played five seasons including three without missing a snap.

Heck's fifth grade teacher, Marylou Winkler of Annandale, Va., was named NFL Teacher of the Year in January of 1994, after being nominated by Heck. She received \$5,000 from the NFL and the school

received a \$10,000 scholarship in both of their names.

A 1989 graduate of Notre Dame, Heck received a bachelor's degree in American studies. A first-team All-American, he co-captained the 1988 national championship team that finished 12-0. Heck was a tight end for the first three seasons at Notre Dame before moving to tackle in spring drills in his senior season.

Heck was born January 1, 1967 in Fargo, North Dakota. He and his wife, Jennifer, have four children: Jonathan, Charlie, Molly and Evelyn, and live in Ponte Vedra Beach.

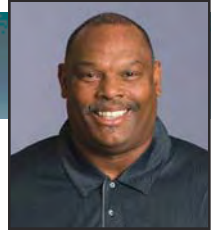

Donnie Henderson

Donnie Henderson is in his first season as the Jaguars' defensive backs coach. Henderson, a 25-year coaching veteran, was named to the post on January 25, 2008.

Henderson spent the 2007 season as a consultant to Cincinnati Bengals head coach Marvin Lewis. Henderson previously served as defensive coordinator for the Detroit Lions in 2006. The Lions ranked 10th in the NFL with 30 takeaways.

Henderson spent two seasons as the defensive coordinator for the New York Jets from 2004-05. In his first season with the Jets, the defense improved from 21st to seventh in NFL total defense, 23rd to fourth in points allowed and 28th to fifth in rushing defense. The team's 261 points allowed in 2004 was just 10 points more than the league-leading Pittsburgh Steelers, and it ranked third-best in team history. LB Jonathan Vilma was named the 2004 Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year.

In 2005, the Jets finished second in the NFL in total passing yards allowed (172.2 avg.) and ranked fifth with 21 interceptions. The Jets ranked fifth in the AFC, 12th in the NFL, as they allowed 308.8 yards per game.

Henderson, a Baltimore, Md. native, entered the NFL coaching ranks with the Baltimore Ravens where he spent five seasons (1999-2003). He was hired as the assistant defensive backs coach in 1999 and was promoted to defensive backs coach in 2000. From 2000-03, the Ravens ranked second in the NFL with 88 interceptions. He tutored a secondary that included three Pro Bowlers in S Rod Woodson, CB Chris McAlister and S Ed Reed.

In 2000, Baltimore set NFL defensive standards as they went on to claim the

Super Bowl title. The team established a NFL 16-game record for fewest points allowed (165) and fewest rushing yards allowed (970). The team set a franchise record with 23 interceptions and led the NFL with 49 takeaways. The secondary was responsible for 12 interceptions, six forced fumbles and six fumble recoveries.

Prior to joining the NFL coaching ranks, Henderson served as defensive backs and assistant head coach at the University of Houston in 1998. Henderson spent six seasons (1992-97) at Arizona State, coaching safeties from 1992-94 and defensive backs from 1995-97. He spent two years (1990-91) on the University of California coaching staff and was defensive backs coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of Idaho in 1989.

Henderson began his coaching career at his alma mater, Utah State, in 1983 as a graduate assistant. He took over the Aggies' linebackers in 1986 and was an assistant coach at Utah State from 1983-88.

Henderson played two seasons at Santa Monica Junior College before transferring to Utah State, where he earned first-team all-conference honors as a senior cornerback. He was selected by the Detroit Lions in the 1980 NFL Draft. He attended Locke High School in Los Angeles, Calif.

Nate Kaczor joined the Jaguars in 2008 as assistant special teams coach after spending the past 17 seasons as an assistant on the collegiate level.

Kaczor previously spent two seasons at Louisiana-Monroe where he served as tight ends coach (2006) and co-offensive coordinator (2007). The club ranked second in the Sun Belt conference in rushing offense in 2007 and averaged 23.5 points per game. The 23.5 points per game were the most in school history since 1993. In 2006, Zeek Zacharie earned first-team all-conference honors at tight end and was twice named national tight end of the week.

Kaczor served as co-offensive coordinator/tight ends coach at Idaho from 2004-05. In 2005, the Vandals passing game ranked 28th in the nation as they averaged 257.3 yards per game. Wide receiver Bobby Bernal-Wood ranked second in the nation in receptions per game and earned all-conference honors while quarterback Michael Harrington recorded the second-highest single-season completion percentage in school history.

Prior to his stint at Idaho, Kaczor spent four seasons at Nebraska-Kearney as off-

sive coordinator/quarterbacks coach from 2000-03. The school broke or tied 31 offensive records under Kaczor as they averaged 35 points and 442 yards per game during his tenure.

Kaczor began his coaching career at his alma mater, Utah State, in 1991. He spent nine seasons as an assistant at Utah State. During his tenure, the Aggies won three conference championships and participated in two bowl games.

Kaczor started at center for the Aggies as a senior and was team captain and earned all-conference honors in 1989. He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Utah State and later earned his master's degree in 2000.

Thom Kaumeyer, whose experience includes stints as a college defensive coordinator, junior college head coach and NFL player and assistant coach, joined the Jaguars in 2007 as assistant defensive backs coach.

Kaumeyer, a 16-year coaching veteran, spent the past six seasons as an assistant coach on the collegiate level. He previously served as defensive coordinator at Tulane in 2007. He was named defensive backs coach at Kentucky in January of 2008 before joining the Jaguars. In his one season at Tulane, the defense improved its national rankings in scoring defense, total defense and rushing defense compared to the 2006 season.

Prior to his stint at Tulane, Kaumeyer spent five seasons at San Diego State where he served as defensive coordinator (2002-05) and defensive backs coach (2006). During his tenure at San Diego State, Kaumeyer developed the defense into one of the best in the Mountain West Conference. In 2003, the Aztecs had the biggest defensive improvement in the country as they climbed from 95th in total defense in 2002 to eighth in 2003, from 91st in pass defense to fourth

and from 92nd in scoring defense to 13th.

The Aztecs finished second in the conference in red zone defense from 2004-05. Five San Diego State players were drafted from 2004-06 including linebacker Kirk Morrison, a two-time MWC Defensive Player of the Year honoree.

Kaumeyer spent two seasons on the Atlanta Falcons staff as defensive quality control coach from 2001-02. He assisted in all facets of the defensive game plan and also served as assistant secondary coach.

Kaumeyer had two stints at Palomar College where he began his coaching career as an assistant coach in 1991 before being promoted to head coach in 1994. He returned in 1998 and spent three seasons as defensive coordinator and special teams coach. From 1995-96, he served as head coach and oversaw football operations for Onward Kashiyama, LTD in Tokyo, Japan. The club advanced to the Tokyo Super Bowl in 1996.

A native of San Diego, Kaumeyer played



safety at Palomar College before transferring to Oregon where he played under former NFL head coach Rich Brooks for two seasons. At Oregon, he earned all-Pac 10 honors as a senior as he led the team with 101 tackles. He was selected in the sixth round of the 1989 NFL Draft by the Los Angeles Rams and spent time as a player with the Rams, Seattle and New York Giants over five seasons.

Ted Monachino was promoted to defensive line coach for the Jaguars on February 1, 2008. Monachino joined the Jaguars coaching staff as assistant defensive line coach on February 15, 2006.

Monachino, 41, has played a major role in the development of the Jaguars pass rushers the last two seasons. Paul Spicer tied his career-high with a team-high 7.5 sacks in 2007. In addition, the Jaguars defensive line led by Pro Bowler John Henderson helped the club rank seventh in NFL rushing defense in 2007 as they allowed 100.3 yards per game. The Jaguars allowed fewer than 100 rushing yards in nine of 16 games including a franchise-low 10 yards by Kansas City.

Prior to joining the Jaguars, Monachino spent five seasons as defensive line coach for Arizona State University from 2000-05. Monachino served on the staff at Arizona State under Jaguars offensive coordinator Dirk Koetter from 2001-05.

Terrell Suggs, a first-round draft choice of the Baltimore Ravens in 2003, played under Monachino and set the NCAA single-season record for sacks (24) and tackles for loss (31.5) in 2002. Suggs earned numerous national awards in 2002 including the Bronco Nagurski Award for the best defensive player in the nation, and the Rotary Lombardi Award for top interior lineman in the nation. In 2001, Suggs finished second

in the Pac-10 in sacks with 10 and third in tackles for loss. In 2003, true freshman Kyle Caldwell was named to The Sporting News Pac-10 All-Freshman team.

Monachino started his coaching career in the high school ranks in Missouri at Hannibal High School (1990, 1994-95) and Pacific High School (1991-93) before moving to the collegiate ranks. He served as an assistant coach at Texas Christian (1996-98), James Madison (1998-99), Southwest Missouri State (1999-2000) and Boise State (2000). In 2000, the defensive line helped Boise State lead the Big West in total defense, rushing defense and sacks.

A native of Council Bluffs, Iowa, Monachino was a three-year letterwinner in football at the University of Missouri where he graduated in 1990. Born October 15, 1966 in Council Bluffs, Monachino and his wife, Amy, have three children, daughter Mikalee and sons Sam and Michael.

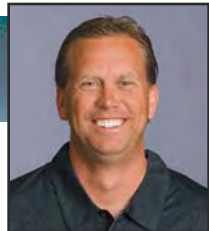

Todd Monken is in his second season as the Jaguars wide receivers coach. Monken, an 18-year coaching veteran, previously served as wide receivers coach/passing game coordinator at LSU from 2005-2006.

In his first season with the Jaguars, Monken played a major role in the development of the club's wide receivers as they finished with the most receptions and receiving yards since 2005. Jaguars 2004 first-round pick Reggie Williams produced a sin-

gle-season franchise record 10 touchdown catches and led the team with a career-high 629 receiving yards. Ernest Wilford had a career-high 45 receptions while Matt Jones and Dennis Northcutt ranked second on the club with four touchdowns.

During his tenure at LSU, Monken devel-





oped numerous receivers including Skyler Green, Dwayne Bowe and Craig Davis. Green was selected in the fourth round of the 2005 NFL draft by the Dallas Cowboys. Bowe combined with Davis and Early Doucet to form one of the nation's premier receiving corps in 2006. The trio combined for 180 receptions, 2,598 yards and 24 TDs. Bowe finished his career with 154 catches for 2,403 yards and a school-record 26 touchdowns. His 26 career TDs ranks eighth in SEC history.

Prior to his stint at LSU, Monken spent three seasons (2002-04) at Oklahoma State as pass game coordinator/wide receivers coach. In his three seasons at Oklahoma State, the Cowboys averaged over 32 points each season. Monken tutored 2004 first-round pick Rashaun Woods, who was selected with the 31st pick by the San Francisco 49ers. Woods was a two-time All-America honoree and concluded his career with 293 receptions for 4,414 yards and 42 touchdowns.

Monken helped engineer one of the nation's best passing attacks in his two sea-

sons (2000-01) at Louisiana Tech - one year as the running backs coach and the other as wide receivers coach. In 2001, Louisiana Tech ranked eighth in the nation in passing, averaging 313 yards through the air per game. A year earlier, Tech ranked seventh in the nation averaging 313 yards passing per game.

Monken, 42, spent seven seasons at Eastern Michigan (1993-99) with the last two as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. He also spent time at Grand Valley State (1989-90) and Notre Dame (1991-92).

A native of Wheaton, Illinois, Monken was a three-year letterwinner at quarterback for Knox College. He earned a bachelor's degree in economics and followed with a master's degree in education leadership from Grand Valley State. Monken and his wife, Terri, have one son, Travis.

Pola began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at UCLA (1992-93). He then spent three seasons as running backs coach at San Diego State and also worked as special teams coordinator in 1996. After two seasons as running backs coach at the University of Colorado, Pola returned to San Diego State and spent the 1999 season as linebackers coach.

A four-year standout at Southern California (1982-85), Pola started at fullback for four seasons after being moved from linebacker during his freshman year.

Pola comes from a big football family.

His brother, Au Polamalu, played collegiate football at Penn State (1985-87). He has two nephews, Troy Polamalu (Pittsburgh Steelers) and Nicky Sualua (Dallas Cowboys, Cincinnati Bengals), who have played in the NFL, and three additional nephews who played Division I-A college football.

Prince, 43, spent two seasons as Falcons' offensive assistant (2004-05) before being promoted to assistant quarterbacks coach in 2006. Prince served under Falcons running backs coach Ollie Wilson from 2004-05 and the club led the NFL in rushing in each of those two seasons.

Prior to joining the NFL, Prince spent 15 seasons in the collegiate ranks. He served as wide receivers coach at Boise State in 2001-02 before adding the duties of passing game coordinator in 2003 under head coach Dan Hawkins. Boise State finished with a 13-1 record in 2003 and led the NCAA in scoring offense (43.0 points per game).

Prince spent three seasons (1998-2000) at Portland State in various capacities, including offensive coordinator, quarterbacks coach and wide receivers coach. During his

time on the collegiate level, Prince also served NFL internships with San Francisco (2000), San Diego (2001) and the 49ers again in 2002.

Mike Shula is in his second season as the Jaguars' quarterbacks coach. Shula has 20 years of coaching experience, 16 years in the NFL, and spent four seasons as head coach at Alabama.

Shula played a major role in the development of the Jaguars passing game in 2007 as the club set a single-season franchise record with 28 touchdown passes. Quarterback David Garrard produced career-high numbers in his first season as the starter as he ranked third in the NFL with a 102.2 passer rating and threw a NFL-low three interceptions. Garrard set the franchise single-season record for passer rating and highest completion percentage (64.0). He finished with the second-lowest interception percentage in any season for any quarterback in NFL history with 300-plus attempts at 0.92 (3 interceptions in 325 attempts).

Shula, who finished with a 26-23 mark in four seasons at Alabama, led the Crimson Tide to three consecutive bowl games including a 10-2 mark and invitation to the Cotton Bowl in 2005. Shula played a major role in the development of quarterback Brodie Croyle at Alabama. Croyle holds the school's career record for pass attempts, completions and yards. He set the school's single-season record with 2,499 passing yards in 2005 and was drafted by the Kansas City Chiefs in the third round of the 2006 draft.

Prior to becoming a head coach, Shula spent three seasons as quarterbacks coach for the Miami Dolphins from 2000-02 under

Dave Wannstedt. It was Shula's second stint with Miami as he spent two seasons (1991-92) as a Dolphins coaching assistant. Quarterback Jay Fiedler compiled a 21-10 record as a starter during Shula's tenure as Miami's quarterback coach. Fiedler became just the second quarterback in team history to surpass the 3,000-yard passing mark in 2002. He finished with a 60.7 completion percentage, the highest by a Dolphin since 1995.

Shula served four seasons as offensive coordinator with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 1996-99 under head coach Tony Dungy. The Buccaneers qualified for the playoffs in two of Shula's four seasons and in 1999 won the NFC Central Division and reached the NFC Championship game.

Shula began his NFL coaching career as offensive assistant for the Buccaneers from 1988-89 and spent the 1990 season as quarterbacks coach. He also spent time as tight ends coach for the Chicago Bears under Wannstedt from 1993-95.

A three-year letterman (1984-86) at quarterback for Alabama, Shula finished his career with a 32-15-1 record as a starter. He was a 12th-round pick of Tampa Bay in 1987 and remained on the roster for part of the 1987 season. He earned his bachelor's degree in labor relations in 1987. He is the son of former Miami Dolphins head coach Don Shula (1970-95), the winningest coach in





NFL history, and brother of former Cincinnati Bengals head coach Dave Shula (1992-96).

Shula, 42, and his wife, Shari, have three daughters, Samantha, Brooke and Ryan.

Tom Williams is in his first season as defensive assistant and second season with the Jaguars. Williams joined the Jaguars in 2007 as assistant special teams coach after spending the previous 11 seasons as an assistant on the collegiate level.

Williams served as co-defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at San Jose State from 2005-06. While at San Jose State, Williams engineered a defense that saw its points allowed decrease by 21.8 points from 2004 to 2006. The Spartans gave up 20.8 points per game in 2006, the lowest since the 1990 season. The Spartans finished with a 9-4 mark and a win in the New Mexico Bowl. In his first season with San Jose State, three linebackers finished among the WAC's top-10 tacklers.

Among the players Williams coached was New Mexico Bowl Defensive Most Valuable Player Matt Castelo, a 2006 second team All-WAC selection. The Spartans' middle linebacker was third in the country in tackles per game in 2005 and second in 2006.

Prior to joining San Jose State, Williams spent three seasons at Stanford (2002-04). He coached linebackers, served as the co-defensive coordinator in 2002 and 2003 and

was the associate head coach in 2004. Williams, a standout linebacker at Stanford, began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Stanford in 1994 under Pro Football Hall of Fame coach Bill Walsh. Williams spent the 1993 season on the 49ers' practice squad.

Williams, 38, spent three seasons (1996-98) at Hawaii including one season as defensive coordinator. Gene Smith EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, COLLEGE AND PRO PERSONNEL



Gene Smith was promoted to executive director, college and pro personnel this past January. He'll lead a staff of eleven scouts and assume the responsibilities of both the college and pro departments. His duties include the scouting and evaluation of hundreds of college and pro players on an annual basis, and the continued orchestration of the college draft process, along with directing pro free agency.

Smith is one of 15 staff members who joined the franchise in 1994. He has been a part of building Jaguars teams that have made eleven playoff game appearances, including two AFC Championship games.

After six years as a Jaguars college scout, Smith became the director of college scouting in 2000, and he has guided the team's NFL draft for the last seven years. Smith was previously the team's college scout responsible for the southeast United States. He joined the Jaguars on May 1, 1994 and was originally the team's scouting representative for the northeast with the BLESTO scouting combine, which he joined in February 1994. Larry Wright ASSISTANT DIRECTOR, PRO PERSONNEL



Larry Wright Jr. joined the Jaguars on February 1, 2003. As assistant director, pro personnel, Wright is responsible for evaluating players on NFL rosters, street free agents, college players, as well as players in other professional football leagues. He also assists in coordinating unrestricted free

agency coverage and assisting in advanced scouting of Jaguars' opponents.

Wright was the head coach at Ringgold (La.) High School in





2001 and '02, and previously was a graduate assistant at Grambling, a scouting intern with the Baltimore Ravens, and a volunteer strength and conditioning coach for the Grambling basketball team.

He also coordinates the post-draft college free agency process and has some additional pro personnel responsibilities.

Minge is one of 15 staff members who joined the franchise in 1994. Before joining the Jaguars, Minge spent 11 years as a college assistant coach and then 10 years as a recruiting coordinator. His college coaching career began in 1973 as defensive coordinator/inside linebackers coach at St. Joseph College (Ind.), where he had been a three-

year varsity letterman as a defensive back. He was a graduate assistant at Western Michigan from 1974 to '75, then served as defensive coordinator at Loyola Academy in 1976 before returning to Western Michigan as an assistant coach from 1977 to '81. Art Perkins EXECUTIVE SCOUT

Art Perkins is in his sixth season with the Jaguars, joining as their west coast regional scout on May 13, 2003. He begins his second season as an executive scout of the west region, scouting the top collegiate players throughout the region. The previous six years were spent as a regional scout with the Baltimore Ravens. Perkins' experience as a professional football player, coach, and administrator spans more than 30 years. He also has some additional pro personnel responsibilities.

A fourth-round draft choice of the Los Angeles Rams in 1962, Perkins was named to the All-Rookie team as a running back. 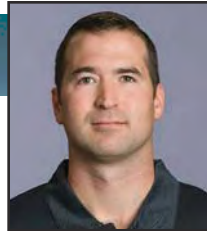
Prescott played safety for four years at Western New England College (Springfield, Mass.), where he holds a degree in sports management and a master's in business

He originally joined the Jaguars on May 15, 1994 as an account executive in corporate sponsorship. He was promoted director

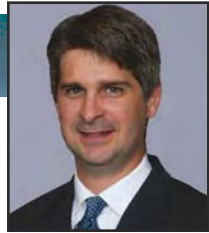

September 22, 1996 — at New England 28, Jacksonville 25

After spotting New England a 22-0 lead, the Jaguars rallied in the second half, scoring three





touchdowns on 51-, 41- and 61-yard completions from Mark Brunell and a Mike Hollis field goal, to tie the score at 25-25. The Patriots had the only possession in overtime and won on a 40-yard field goal by Adam Vinatieri.

November 24, 1996 — Jacksonville 28, at Baltimore 25

The Ravens led 25-10 going into the fourth quarter. After a touchdown pass from Mark Brunell to Pete Mitchell, the defense recovered a fumble at the Raven's 19-yard line. Brunell found Willie Jackson six plays later, and Brunell ran in for the two-point conversion to tie the game at 25-25 with 1:24 remaining. The Jaguars won the toss, but were forced to punt. The Ravens fumbled, and Jacksonville drove down the field, with Mike Hollis winning the game with a 34-yard field goal.

October 26, 1997 — at Pittsburgh 23, Jacksonville 17

The Jaguars took a 10-0 lead into the second half, but Pittsburgh came back to take a 14-10 fourth-quarter lead. After a Brunell TD pass to Pete Mitchell, the Jaguars took a 17-14 lead. The Steelers scored on a 19-yard field goal at the end of the fourth quarter to tie the game 17-17. The Steelers won the toss and scored on a 17-yard shovel pass from Kordell Stewart to Jerome Bettis.

October 29, 2000 — Jacksonville 23, at Dallas 17

The Jaguars ended a five-game losing streak with a 23-17 overtime road victory over the Cowboys, with Alvis Whitted scoring on a 37-yard pass from Mark Brunell on the first series of overtime for his second touchdown of the game. Brunell threw for three TDs and tied a team record for passing accuracy, as he completed 20 of 24 passes. Kyle Brady caught 10 of those passes for 134 yards, as he eclipsed the 100-yard mark for the second straight week.

November 14, 2004 — at Jacksonville 23, Detroit 17

The Jaguars continued their dramatic play with a 23-17 overtime win over the Detroit Lions at Alltel Stadium. David Garrard started his first game since 2002 in place of injured Byron Leftwich and led the team with 198 yards passing and two touchdowns. Jimmy Smith caught the game-winning 36-yard touchdown pass from Garrard in overtime. The Lions erased a 17-3 fourth-quarter lead with two Eddie Drummond touchdown returns.

September 25, 2005 — Jacksonville 26, at New York Jets 20

The Jaguars defeated the New York Jets 26-20 on a game-winning 36-yard touchdown pass from Byron Leftwich to Jimmy Smith at the Meadowlands. Both teams began the overtime with interceptions and after forcing the Jets to punt on their third drive, Leftwich threw 36 yards for the game-winner.

October 16, 2005 — Jacksonville 23, at Pittsburgh 17

The Jaguars defeated the Steelers 23-17 in Pittsburgh on a dramatic 41-yard interception return for a touchdown by Rashean Mathis in overtime. The Steelers won the toss and Quincy Morgan returned the kickoff 74 yards. On third down Maddox fumbled the snap and Reggie Hayward recovered the ball. The Jaguars stalled on offense and Chris Hanson recorded his team record-tying ninth punt of the game. Two plays later Mathis ended the game with his interception.

October 1, 2006 — at Washington 36, Jacksonville 30

Jacksonville erased a 10-point deficit in the fourth quarter to force overtime, but Washington scored on the opening possession of the extra period on a 68-yard touchdown reception by Santana Moss from Mark Brunell to claim a 36-30 win at FedExField.

The Jaguars Community Relations Department works as an extension of the team to develop and implement resourceful and valuable programs that contribute directly to the Jacksonville-area community. In addition to these efforts, the Jaguars Foundation also serves as the team's vehicle of change in the city, assisting at-risk youth and families through a variety of programs, including strategic grants. Under the leadership of Delores Barr Weaver, Jaguars Foundation Chair and CEO, the Jaguars Foundation focuses on support of programs serving economically and socially disadvantaged youth and families in Jacksonville. The Foundation has awarded more than \$11.6 million in grants in the Jacksonville area (Baker, Clay, Duval, Nassau and St. Johns counties) since 1995.

FOOD DRIVE

Since the team's inception in 1995, the Jaguars have organized an annual holiday food drive each fall in conjunction with the Food Bank of North Florida Second Harvest. Jaguars staff, players and coaches' wives along with players, cheerleaders and the team mascot volunteer to support this community-wide effort, which culminates with a food collection on a game day.

GATORADE JUNIOR TRAINING CAMP

The Jacksonville Jaguars Gatorade Junior Training camp is a free, year-round, grass roots program which is offered by the Jaguars for elementary school students between the ages of six and 12. This is a program which features educational benefits along with recreational opportunities which puts an emphasis on fun for the day rather than winning and testing skills.

HABIJAX

The Jaguars' annual Habijax homebuilding blitz takes place each spring. Led by Wayne and Delores Barr Weaver, Jaguars players, staff and cheerleaders invest sweat and labor into helping make the dream of a future homeowner a reality. Since 2001 the Jaguars have sponsored 16 houses for Habijax.

HOMETOWN HUDDLE

For more than 30 years the NFL and the United Way have partnered to help build stronger, healthier communities. Whether it's reaching out to disadvantaged youth or feeding the hungry, both are committed to raising public awareness of important social service issues. Each fall, the Jaguars partner with the United Way of Northeast Florida for a hands-on community service project called Hometown Huddle.

HOSPITAL VISITS

Jaguars players regularly make visits to Wolfson Children's Hospital to meet with kids, sign autographs or to push the Wolfie Wagon, a special cart that offers candy, soft drinks, books, balloons, and stuffed animals.

JAGUARS/MORGAN STANLEY COMMUNITY LEADER

Since 2001 the Jaguars and Morgan Stanley have partnered for this annual award presented monthly during the NFL season to the Jaguars player who demonstrates exemplary community involvement. Previous winners were Donovan Darius, Wali Rainer, Joe Zelenka, Ernest Wilford, Scott Starks and Alvin Pearman.

JAGUARS READERS

This is a special reading program at local elementary schools supported by Jaguars front





office staff since 1997. Staff members volunteer to spend an hour each week at the school where students read some of their favorite books.

JAGUARS ROOKIE CLUB

In June of 2003 the Jaguars established the Rookie Club for all incoming rookies. Its purpose is to assist in the transition from college to the NFL, and to introduce and involve first-year players, as a group, in charitable and civic activities.

MILITARY VISITS

Jaguars players make visits to both local military bases, Mayport Naval Station and NAS JAX. On these visits players sign autographs and are given behind-the-scenes tours to help them gain an appreciation for the service men and women returning or preparing to deploy overseas.

OPERATION BLESSING

Each November Jaguars players join volunteers from Wachovia and Winn-Dixie to off-load truckloads of groceries to be bagged and distributed. Since its inception in 1999, more than 23,000 families have been served on the Tuesday before Thanksgiving.

TASTE OF THE NFL

The Jaguars are one of a handful of NFL teams that host a local Taste of the NFL dinner to help raise money and awareness in the fight against hunger. Since beginning in 2003, more than \$530,000 has been raised for Food Bank of North Florida Second Harvest in Jacksonville.

WHAT MOVES U

The Jaguars, in partnership with the Jaguars Foundation, Baptist Health and the American Heart Association Jacksonville chapter, launched a pilot What Moves U program in 6th grade classrooms at selected schools. This awareness program includes a unique curriculum supplement designed to incorporate physical activity in classroom lessons and encourage physical activity to children.

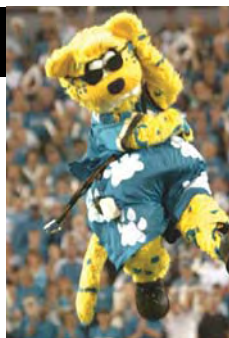

RADIO BROADCASTERS

Brian Sexton and former Jaguars defensive end Jeff Lageman are in their sixth season together calling all Jaguars games on WOKV AM & FM (690, 106.5). Sexton, 39, called every game in the Jaguars' first 13 seasons and is one of just a handful of observers who have witnessed every Jaguars game played. Sexton anchors the Jaguars Radio Network's coverage on game day and is also the host of 'The Jack Del Rio Show' on Tuesdays and 'Jaguars This Week' on Wednesdays on WOKV. He also hosts 'The Jack Del Rio Show' and 'The Coggin Pregame Show' on Sunday mornings prior to kickoff on WTEV-TV, CBS 47.

Lageman, 41 played for the Jaguars from 1995 to '98 and was the team's first captain. He started 37 of 40 games played in the Jaguars' first four seasons, making 175 tackles and 12.5 sacks. In 10 NFL seasons, including his first six with the New

York Jets, Lageman started 118 of 122 games played. He was a first-round draft choice of the Jets in 1989, the 14th player selected overall. After his retirement he joined the Jaguars' preseason TV booth as color analyst for the 1999 to 2002 seasons. He is a co-host of the 'Jaguars This Week' radio show along with Sexton and Vic Ketchman on Wednesday nights on WOKV. He also serves as co-host of 'Jaguars All Access' on WTEV, CBS-47.

PRESEASON TELEVISION

Three of the Jaguars' preseason games in 2008 will be telecast locally in Jacksonville on WTEV-TV, CBS 47, with the finale at Washington on Thursday, August 28 nationally broadcast on NBC. NFL Network broadcaster Paul Burmeister calls the play-by-play for the second year and former Jaguars Pro Bowl tackle Tony Boselli returns for his third tour as the team's preseason color analyst.

Boselli was the first draft pick of the Jaguars and played in 91 games in his six seasons in Jacksonville. He made five consecutive Pro Bowl starts and is the only former Jaguar to be inducted into the team's 'Pride of the Jaguars.'

THE PRIDE OF THE JAGUARS



Tony Boselli, the Jacksonville Jaguars' first-ever college draft choice, was the first member of the Jaguars franchise to be honored in The Pride of the Jaguars on October 8, 2006.

"Tony Boselli was the original Jaguar, and we are excited to recognize him," said Jaguars owner Wayne Weaver. "We are proud of Tony's contributions on the field for this organization, and we're proud of his contributions off the field for this community. We welcome the opportunity to have Jaguars fans thank Tony for what he has meant to Jacksonville and the Jaguars."

"The seven years I spent in Jacksonville as a member of the Jaguars team were truly memorable. I also would like to

thank all the Jaguars fans who made us feel so welcome when we first arrived in Jacksonville, and now that we have returned," Boselli said.

Boselli was the second player drafted overall in the 1995 college draft following an All-America career at Southern California. He started a then-team-record 90 of the 91 Jaguars games in which he played from 1995-2001 and was named to

the Pro Bowl five times.

Widely considered the best offensive tackle in the game, Boselli allowed only 15.5 sacks in seven seasons and was named second team on the NFL All-Decade Team for the 1990s.





JACKSONVILLE MUNICIPAL STADIUM

STADIUM



On August 18, 1995, when the Jacksonville Jaguars played their first home preseason game in their new stadium, it marked the first time in sports history that an expansion team had played its first home game in its inaugural season in a new stadium or arena. Not only that, but it was built faster than any major-league stadium had ever been built in North America.

In the short period of 19 1/2 months, the old Gator Bowl was demolished and a new stadium arose on the shores of the St. Johns River. And, very quickly, it was called the best stadium in the country. Just before the Jaguars kicked off their first regular-season game on September 3, 1995, NBC broadcaster Don Criqui said, "There isn't a better football facility in America." In its 10th year of operation, the stadium was the host site of Super Bowl XXXIX, the biggest single-day sporting event in the world. Jacksonville Municipal Stadium underwent a \$63 million renovation in preparation for Super Bowl XXXIX. Among the additions were the MPS Group Terrace Suite, a 25,000-square-foot sports bar called the Bud Zone, a 20,000-square-foot Sky Bar, 20 new escalators and four new elevators. A new secure perimeter fence was also installed around the stadium, along with

two new state of the art scoreboards and renovations to the clubs and suites.

The practice fields that were used from 1995 through 2003 were converted into a 400,000-square-foot entertainment zone adjacent to the stadium, known as the Pepsi Plaza. For Jaguars game days, this area includes tailgate cabanas for pregame hospitality, an interactive game area, and a stage for pregame and postgame entertainment.

Jacksonville Municipal Stadium signature features include the two Crown Royal Touchdown Clubs, which are located on the East and West sides of the stadium. The Crown Royal Touchdown Clubs and all 11,200 club seats are located at midfield, rather than being spread out horizontally through the stadium. Each Club provides more than 70,000 square feet of air-conditioned comfort with a variety of food and beverage selections. In all, 75 percent of the seats in Jacksonville Municipal Stadium are located on the sides, with just 25 percent behind the end zones.

Jacksonville Municipal Stadium seats 67,164, but additional temporary seats can be added behind the South End Zone — expanding the capacity to well over 82,000 — for the annual Florida-Georgia game and Super Bowl XXXIX.

MEDIA INFORMATION

CREDENTIALS: Credential requests are honored only for working media on specific assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication. Credentials are not issued to freelance writers or photographers unless requested by a recognized news organization or sports publication. Independent web sites cannot be credentialed. All credential requests must be submitted in writing on company letterhead to Dan Edwards, Vice President of Communications and Media, Jacksonville Jaguars, One Stadium Place, Jacksonville, FL 32202, or by fax to (904) 633-6055. Requests must be received at least one week prior to a home game.

PARKING: Parking in lots surrounding the stadium is limited. Every effort will be made to accommodate requests for parking passes, but parking cannot be provided for all credentialed media. The appropriate parking pass will be required for access to all stadium parking lots on game days. Television trucks which provide satellite, uplink or microwave functions will be parked in the TV truck compound near Gate 1, and a parking pass is required.

MEDIA ENTRANCE, CREDENTIAL WILL CALL: The media entrance at the stadium is Gate 1, at the southwest corner of the stadium. The appropriate game credential must be presented at the media entrance for admission to the stadium. Game credentials not picked up in advance will be available on game day at the media will-call window at Gate 1. The Media Will Call window will open three hours prior to kickoff. Parking passes will not be left at the Will Call window.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Sideline access for NFL games is limited to photographers on assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication. No one except network television personnel and authorized game personnel will be admitted to the field without a camera. All field photographers must remain outside the bench areas and outside the yellow border surrounding the playing field. The photographers check-in location is near the media entrance in the service hallway.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS AND LOCKERROOM ACCESS: Members of the media needing to conduct postgame interviews will be given access to the Jaguars' interview room after each game, as well as the home and visiting lockerrooms. Jaguars head coach Jack Del Rio conducts his postgame news conference in the team meeting room. The visiting head coach is available in a room off the visitors lockerroom.

DURING THE WEEK

MEDIA WORKROOM: The media workroom in the stadium is located just inside the media entrance. This room is available to working media during business hours throughout the week. High speed internet access, phones, Jaguars updates and NFL news releases, as well as other information is available.

JACK DEL RIO INTERVIEWS: Head coach Jack Del Rio conducts his weekly news conferences on Mondays and Wednesdays in the media workroom. Specific interview requests for Coach Del Rio and the assistant coaches must be made through the Jaguars communication department.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: The Jaguars lockerroom is open to accredited media for specific interview periods during the week. Players are normally available on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. All interviews should be arranged through the Jaguars communications department. Interviews may be conducted in person or by phone, but please call in advance to schedule.
