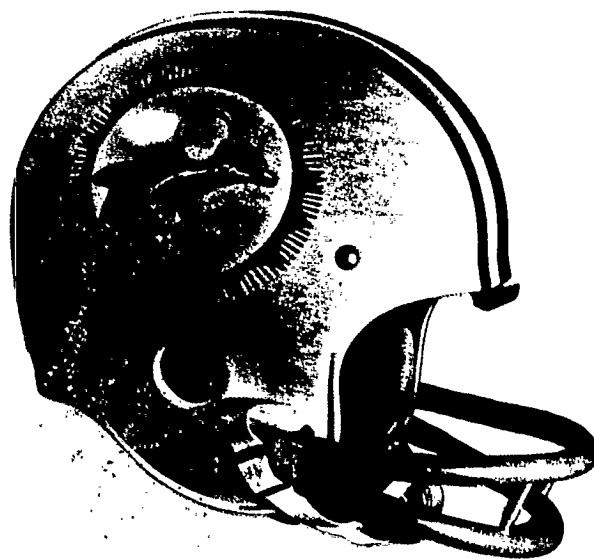
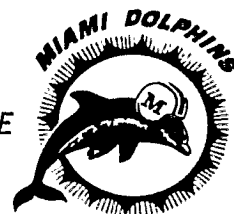

Prospects in General

Experience is a word coaches and managers use in varying ways when describing their prospects for an upcoming season . . . either they talk about having a little more experience than the year before, or, perhaps, not as much.

As for the Miami Dolphins, the number one asset going into season number two is the fact that we are all more experienced. We were all new a year ago, including being new to each other.

Now, with the exception of the rookies, the coaches and players are well aware of each other, and so you must consider the Dolphins a much more experienced club. Put it in another and maybe simpler way . . . last year, we were all freshmen together . . . this year, we're sophomores . . . and there isn't a football coach in America, high school, college or the pros who wouldn't prefer a sophomore team over a freshman aggregation.

Staying on the subject of assets, strong points if you will, the situation seems to call for repeating what I said a year ago . . . that we would be in pretty good shape with reference to defensive backs and also receivers . . . Last year, the defensive backs came through, and the receivers would have been better if their ranks hadn't been so decimated by injuries. Matter of fact we'd have been better period in 1966 if we hadn't been so hard hit by injuries.

So, getting down to particulars, we think we have pretty good defensive backs not only with reference to such veterans as Willie West, Jimmy Warren, Bobby Neff and Dick Westmoreland, but also that we have some better than fair rookies fighting for jobs. The final cuts in the defensive backs category are going to be a bit difficult to make.

As for our list of receivers, Tight End Dave Kocourek was our leader last year in pass receptions and he's the tenth top receiver in the history of the AFL. Veterans Frank Jackson and Bo Robertson looked all right on occasions last year, but were much handicapped by injuries. Karl Noonan had a pretty good rookie year. Howard Twilley missed most of the season because of injuries. But keep in mind that he still holds the collegiate record for the most receptions in one year, 134 set two seasons ago at the University of Tulsa. John Roderick was side-

lined with a back injury early last year, and there is still some question about his status. Rookie Jack Clancy, a top red-shirt draftee, looks like a real prospect. At the University of Michigan, last year, he set a new Big Ten pass-receiving record with 50 grabs (breaking the record of 40 set by Noonan, two seasons before, at Iowa). Doug Moreau, on the taxi squad most of last season, and little Jack Harper, free agent from the University of Florida, are two other possibilities.

The running back position should be stronger. Joe Auer was our leading rusher and most valuable player last year. He returns, and battling with him for the first string job will be Abner Haynes, who came to us in a trade from Denver. Abner is the third leading rusher in the AFL and has other outstanding statistical credentials. Both men are good pass receivers, and have done well in the past on kickoff and punt returns.

Fullback is something of a question mark, but we've been impressed with the attitude in training camp of a second-year men Sam Price and George Chesser and veteran Billy Joe.

It is our hope that the offensive line will be stronger. A rookie, Jim Riley, second draft choice, could be helpful. At Dotson, a 265-pounder, is being tried at offensive tackle after working as a reserve defensive tackle most of last season. Norm Evans, at tackle, Tom Goode, at center, and Billy Neighbors at guard, are steady performers. Maxie Williams has been moved from left tackle to left guard. Depth in the offensive line could still be a problem.

We've postponed getting around to our most important question. Who will be the quarterback? The answer to that will, I hope, evolve itself in our pre-season games. We intend to take a good look at everyone, and then most likely go with whomever we think is the best when the regular schedule gets underway.

Bob Griese, number one draft choice, from Purdue, missed the first three weeks of practice because of being in Chicago for the All Star game. In another all star contest, Jon Brittenum, a high red shirt draft choice from Arkansas, was chosen the outstanding player in the Atlanta All America game. Rick Norton, injured most of last year, and John Stofa, who did so well in last year's exciting finale, the 29-28 win over Houston, technically are holdovers. But between them, they have played in a total of only seven games. So, in effect, we have four rookies battling for the post.

We've mentioned the defensive backs, and overall we might add that the defense generally performed adequately last year, and certainly contributed their

share to our three victories . . . as many wins as ever achieved by an expansion team in pro football.

At defensive end, we have experience. Ed Cooke, who had an excellent season in 1966, LaVerne Torczon and Mel Branch are the holdovers. Whit Canale was with us for part of last season, but handicapped by injuries. Dan LaRose and Bob Petrich are two veterans who have joined us via trades. The battle between these vets will be a most interesting one.

Tom Nomina and Rich Zecher are returning veterans at the defensive tackles, and the former seems to have mended well from the shoulder injury suffered near the end of last year. John Richardson, from UCLA, is a leading rookie draftee, and free agent Steve Mass is a possibility.

All three first team linebackers return. Frank Emanuel, in the middle, was our outstanding rookie last year. We feel the former Tennessee all-American is going to be a real good pro. Tom Erlandson had a good season at left linebacker, and the right linebacker Wahoo McDaniel, though a veteran, was at a new position, and up until being injured late in the season, gave us a good team effort. Second year men Bob Bruggers and Jack Thornton, the latter injured most of last season, also return. Jerry Hopkins, who came to us in a trade from Denver, looks promising. He adds depth to the linebacking corps, and is in contention for a first team spot.

That completes a rundown. Early in our practice period, I said we were two weeks ahead of a comparable period last year . . . We intend to stay ahead. We feel we're an improving club.

The Coaches



GEORGE WILSON
Head Coach

George Wilson is a real veteran of pro football, having been associated with the game for 30 years as a player, assistant coach, and head coach. And before that he was a star in high school, prep school and college football.

The Wilson football story began on the sandlots of Chicago, and his first organized competition came when he played for Austin high school in his native Windy City. Then came a year at St. John's Military Academy, in Wisconsin, before matriculating at Northwestern University where he was a Big Ten standout at end. He was graduated from Northwestern in 1937.

His pro career began that fall with the Chicago Bears, and from 1937 through 1946 he was a star end for Coach George Halas' team. In those 10 years he caught 111 passes for 1,342 yards and 15 touchdowns. He also ran for three TD's, once with an intercepted pass.

In 1947 and 1948, he was an assistant coach with the Bears. He began a most successful association with the Detroit Lions in 1949. He was first an assistant coach through the 1956 season. He became head coach in 1957.

In his very first year as head man, the Lions won the National Football League championship, and George was named NFL "Coach of the Year." In most of his eight seasons as head coach of Detroit, he was associated with winning teams. For three straight years, 1960-62, the Lions finished second in the rugged Western Division, and each time capped this by winning the Playoff Bowl, in Miami.

In eight years under Wilson, the Lions won 57 games, lost 45, and tied six.

In 1965, George was an assistant coach with the Washington Redskins. On Jan. 29, 1966, Managing Partner Joseph Robbie announced that Wilson had been named head football coach of the Miami Dolphins.

In making the announcement Robbie said: "George Wilson has had one of the brightest records in professional football. He has coached a champion and is capable of producing another. He played in the Big Ten in his college days, and since then has had almost three decades with the pros during its period of development as America's most exciting sport. George Wilson is still a young man looking for new worlds to conquer. There is just such a challenge for him in Miami."

Wilson's is very much a man's man, and one who has good rapport and the respect of his players. High on his list of coaching accomplishments has to be his work with the Dolphins in their first season. In achieving three victories, he equalled the record of the most wins ever attained by an expansion team in pro football.

Wilson's wife Claire was his high school sweetheart. They attended Austin high and later Northwestern together. They have five children, four boys and a girl. The oldest, Mrs. Sue Berwick lives in Miami. Next is George, Jr., a Dolphins quarterback. Third in line is Mrs. Lyne Wagner, who resides in Detroit. At home are the two youngest daughters, Kathy, who enters St. Leo's College, on the West Coast of Florida this year, and Laurie, an eighth-grader.

ERNIE HEFFERLE
Offensive Line Coach

Ernie Hefferle was a high school and college gridiron star. He has had a long career of coaching at first high school, then college and pro levels. He has been the head coach of a major college.

It is therefore the more interesting now that he is with the Miami Dolphins that his greatest football thrill came in Miami's Orange Bowl. This was on New Year's Day, 1937—the Duquesne team of which he was a member was playing Mississippi State. The latter had a six point lead going into the closing moments of the game. It was then that the Duquesne quarterback unleashed a long pass which Ernie caught and went in for the touchdown. The point was added and Duquesne had a one point victory.

Ernie is originally from Herminie, Pennsylvania. His dad was a coal miner. Ernie attended Sewickley Township High School before matriculating at Duquesne, a Pittsburgh institution that no longer fields a football team. It had been his early goal to get into coaching.

After being graduated from Duquesne in June of 1937, Ernie began his coaching career in Pittsburgh area high school and stayed with the preps until 1950 when he became an assistant at the University of Pittsburgh. He remained at Pittsburgh through the 1958 season. He spent the 1959 season as an assistant with the Washington Redskins. He was head football coach at Boston College in 1960 and 1961. He returned to the University of Pittsburgh as an assistant coach for the next three years, and in 1965 was an assistant with the NFL Pittsburgh Steelers.

Ernie is in his second year with the Dolphins and his job is that of preparing the offensive line—the huskies whose blocking make the running and passing patterns become yard gaining actualities.

Ernie is married to the former Betty Ovsec, of Greensburg, Pa., and they have three daughters, Mrs. Yvonne Cadwallader, of Las Vegas, Nevada, Cheryle, a Miami school teacher, and Jean, a sophomore at Palmetto high school.

BOBBY WALSTON

Receiver and Place Kicking Coach

Bobby Walston is the second leading scorer in the history of the NFL and this is proof aplenty that he is regarded as one of the greatest who ever played in the pro ranks.

In a 12 year NFL career, all with the Philadelphia Eagles, Bobby scored 881 points—46 touchdowns, 365 points after and 80 field goals (only Cleveland's

Lou Groza with 1,273 points has scored more.) He also has his share of Philadelphia Eagles' records. Foremost of course is most points in one season, 114, and most points for one game, 25.

When he retired from the Eagles at the end of the 1962 season, he had completed nineteen football seasons through high school, college and the pros, having missed just one game. With the Eagles, he was twice named All-Pro.

Bobby, who will be 39 on October 17th, is from Columbus, Ohio. He was an outstanding all-around high school athlete in Columbus before enrolling at the University of Georgia. At the Athens, Georgia institution he majored in Physical Education, receiving his Bachelor of Science degree in education. He was one of the most versatile athletes in the school's history, participating in basketball, boxing, baseball and track in addition to earning All-Conference and All-America honors in football.

Upon retiring from the Eagles' squad in 1962, he was appointed chief scout for the Philadelphia team. In 1964 he assumed the duties director of player personnel, a job he left to join the Dolphins' coaching staff in July 1966.

With the Dolphins, he is directly responsible for the pass receivers and place kickers.

Bobby was married on June 9, 1951 to the former Lynell Woodcock. They have one daughter, Bobbie Lynell, 15; two sons, Mark Steven, 12, and Michael Robert, 8.

JOHN IDZIK

Offensive Backfield Coach

John Idzik is a young man of 39, but has already had 16 years of football coaching experience—12 years in college, two years in service and two years professional.

John is from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, attended Northeast Catholic High School in that city. He captained the football team and also played baseball. He played four years varsity football as a half-back, 1947-1950, for the University of Maryland under the late Jim Tatum. He was selected to play for the South in the North-South game after his senior campaign.

He also played baseball at Maryland and when he was graduated in 1951, received the TEKE trophy for having made the biggest contribution to Maryland athletics among his classmates.

In 1951, he was assistant coach at his alma mater, and then he put in two years of service in the U.S. Marines. He had the opportunity to both play and

coach in service football. In 1954 and 1955 he was backfield coach at the University of Tennessee. In 1955 he was backfield coach of the Ottawa Rough Riders in the Canadian Professional League. From 1956 through 1959 he served a second term as assistant coach at Maryland. In 1960-61, he was an assistant coach in charge of offense at the University of Detroit. In 1962 through 1964 he was head coach at Detroit. When Detroit discontinued football in 1964, he became chief assistant and offensive coach at Tulane. He was named the offensive backfield coach of the Dolphins in February, 1966.

John and his wife, the former Joyce Hoppensteadt have three children, Cindy 8, John 6 and Joyce 2.

LES BINGAMAN
Defensive Line Coach

Les Bingaman was a football player who played on championship teams in high school, college and in the pros.

Originally from MacKenzie, Tennessee, Bing moved to Gary, Indiana when he was 14.

In 1941, playing for Lew Wallace High School, Les and his teammates brought the Indiana State Championship home to Gary. In his senior year at the University of Illinois, the Illini won the Big Ten title and also the 1947 Rose Bowl game. During his seven years as a devastating middle guard with Detroit in the NFL, the Lions won three Western Division and two National League Championships.

Three times Bing was named to the All-NFL Team and with his tremendous size and quickness, he helped revolutionize pro football defenses.

It was while a player with the Lions that Bing began friendship with Dolphin head coach, George Wilson, who was then an assistant coach at Detroit. Later, with the Lions from 1960 through 1964, he

was the team's defensive line coach working under head coach Wilson.

Bing was married last February 14th to the former Betty Ann Beauchamp.

BOB PELLEGRINI
Linebacker Coach

Bob Pellegrini was an All-America as a collegian at the University of Maryland and he followed this with nine standout years in the National Football League—the first five with the Philadelphia Eagles and four with the Washington Redskins.

At Maryland he was the center on offense and a linebacker on defense. In the pros he has concentrated on defense and a year ago when he joined the Dolphins, he was merely moving from demonstrating linebacking as a player to the teaching of linebacking as a coach.

He is 32, 6'3", weighs 240 and still looks trim enough to be taken for a player.

Pellegrini is well acquainted with the Orange Bowl (where the Dolphins play their home games) as he twice made Miami bowl appearances while at Maryland. He was here as a sophomore. He co-captained the 1955 team which came to the Orange Bowl on January 1, 1956. Both times they lost to Oklahoma, 7-0 (on Jan. 1, 1954) and 20-6.

Also in 1956 he was chosen as the outstanding player in the Chicago All-Star game. He also played in the Senior Bowl game in January 1956.

He became acquainted with Dolphins' head coach George Wilson when the latter was an assistant coach at Washington in 1965. Shortly after Wilson was named the head coach of Miami (Jan. 1966), he selected Pellegrini as his linebacker coach.

Bob was born in Yatesboro, Pennsylvania and attended Channock Valley High School in that town before entering the University of Maryland.

He and his wife, Antoninette have three children, Pamela 5, Michael 3½ and Bobby Joe, 1½.

TOM KEANE
Defensive Backfield Coach

Like most of the other members of the Dolphins' coaching staff, Tom Keane gained all of his professional playing experience in the National Football League and also coached in the NFL prior to coming to Miami as defensive backfield coach.

He played for the Los Angeles Rams, Baltimore

Colts and Chicago Cardinals. He twice won All-Pro honors as defensive halfback.

Keane, 40, is a native of Bellaire, Ohio. He was an all around athlete at Bellaire High School prior to his enrollment at West Virginia University. He was an outstanding quarterback at that institution and while there in 1947, was also the second leading collegiate punter in the country.

After serving in the Navy, where he was aboard a troop landing ship in the South Pacific, he entered professional football. He was with the Los Angeles Rams from 1948 to 1951 and with them played on two division and one league championship teams.

He began his coaching career with the Chicago Cardinals as defensive backfield coach in 1957. In 1960, he was defensive coach for Calgary in the Canadian League. From 1961 through 1964, he served as head coach and general manager of the Wheeling (W. Va.) Ironmen of the United Football League where his teams won championships in 1962 and 1963. He was defensive backfield coach of the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1965.

Tom is married and he and his wife have four children, Candy 14, Tommy 11, Tinny 7, and Mary, born last February.

BOB LUNDY

Trainer

Bob Lundy is in his second term of serving as a trainer under head coach George Wilson. Prior to coming to the Dolphins, he was assistant trainer for the Detroit Lions for four years, the first three of which Wilson was Detroit's gridiron boss.

Bob is a native of Wollaston, Massachusetts and is a 1955 graduate of Boston University where he majored in physical education. He was an assistant

trainer at Indiana University and at his alma mater, Boston University before spending five years as the head trainer of all sports at the University of Detroit.

The 31 year old Lundy is married and he and his wife have two young sons.

CHARLES "CHUCK" ZIOBER

Equipment Manager

A native of Irvington, New Jersey and a star high school athlete, Chuck Ziober realized the fulfillment of a boyhood dream when he signed a contract as a catcher with the New York Yankees in 1941. That year he played 22 games with the Yanks farm team in Newark, N. J. However, a sore arm ended his baseball career.

Then came four years of World War II service with the U.S. Marines, a good part of which was spent in the European theater. After his discharge, he reported to the Yankees in spring training in 1946. But again, a sore arm ended his potential major league baseball career and shortly thereafter he reenlisted in the Marines.

He retired from the Marines in 1964 as a Master Sergeant after 23 years of service. He did considerable playing and coaching in both football and baseball while in service.

Prior to becoming equipment manager of the Dolphins in February 1966, he had held down a similar position for two football seasons with the Denver Broncos.

Chuck is married and makes his home in Miami.

JOSEPH ROBBIE
Managing Partner

The man most responsible for the existence of the Miami Dolphins as a major league football franchise is Joseph Robbie. And since the franchise has become a reality, since August of 1965, he has worked around the clock with one objective in mind, a championship team for the fans of Miami.

Helped by his longtime friendship with Joe Foss, then the Commissioner of the American Football League, and in partnership with famed comedian Danny Thomas, Robbie secured the franchise and Miami thus became the ninth team in the AFL, a circuit which had its first season in 1960.

The position is a fitting one for a life long sports fan. And that is what Mr. Robbie has been. When he was 14-years-old, he was the sports editor of the Sisseton Journal Press, in Sisseton, S. D., the town where he was born on July 7, 1916.

He received both his AB and LLB degrees from the University of South Dakota. While in college, he was president of the student government at both Northern State Teachers College (where he spent part of his undergraduate days) and the University of South Dakota. He was also a national debate and oratory champion while a student at the University of South Dakota.

Mr. Robbie enlisted in the United States Navy on December 8, 1941, and served until late in 1945. He received the bronze star and served in five invasions in the South Pacific. He later served as an intelligence officer in the active Naval Reserve.

He began his law practice in Mitchell, S. D., and while there was Democratic State Chairman and a representative in the South Dakota legislature. He moved to Minneapolis in 1951 to become Regional Counsel of the Office of Price Stabilization and later served as Regional Director.

In 1965, Mr. Robbie served as personal repre-

sentative of Vice-President Hubert H. Humphrey on the Inaugural Committee which planned the ceremonies and events for the Inauguration of President Johnson and Vice-President Humphrey.

Mr. Robbie is a lawyer admitted to practice in Minnesota, South Dakota, and before the Supreme Court of the United States. He is a member of the Board of Governors and Executive Committee of St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, Tenn., and National Vice-President of ALSAC which supports St. Jude Hospital.

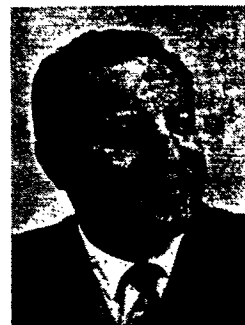
Mr. and Mrs. Robbie have eleven children, ranging in age from four to 23 years. The Robbies reside in Miami Shores.

JOE THOMAS
Executive Assistant and Director of
Player Personnel

After managing partner Joseph Robbie acquired the Miami Dolphins' franchise, the first person he hired — in October 1965 — was Joe Thomas, to begin preparations for the building of Miami's AFL football squad.

It was the second time that Thomas was handed such an assignment. In 1960, he was the first person hired by the Minnesota Vikings and as director of player personnel, it was his job to build the Vikings into an NFL contender.

As a result of his work with the Vikings and the past two years with the Dolphins, Thomas is recognized as a most astute judge of football talent. A year ago, before the merger of the AFL and NFL, he was able to sign 11 of his top 20 collegiate draft choices. The thirty-one veterans he selected from other AFL teams in the expansion draft, included 19 who had been regulars and several who had gained all-league recognition.

Charlie Callahan

Thomas, 45 and a bachelor, is a native of Warren, Ohio. He was graduated from Ohio Northern University in 1943. He holds both a masters and doctors degree from Indiana University.

An outstanding end at Ohio Northern, Thomas also played end for the Navy's Great Lakes team. His end coach there was Weeb Ewbank, now coach of the New York Jets.

Following his tour of Navy duty, Thomas began his coaching career as a high school football mentor in New Albany and Rensselaer, both in Indiana. He began his college coaching at DePauw in Indiana where he was an assistant in football and basketball and head football coach. After four years at DePauw, he moved to Indiana University as an assistant in football and basketball. Thomas joined the ranks of professional coaches in 1954 as an assistant to Ewbank, then head coach of the Baltimore Colts. Thomas also spent time as an assistant with the Los Angeles Rams and the Toronto Argonauts before being hired by the Vikings.

CHARLIE CALLAHAN
Publicity Director

Twenty years of publicizing Notre Dame football teams provided Charlie Callahan with the background to do an important job for the new Miami Dolphins.

Now a resident of Miami like nearly all the Dolphin personnel, Callahan keeps busy all-year round spreading the message of the Dolphins.

A native of Lexington, Massachusetts, and 1938 graduate of Notre Dame, the 51-year-old Callahan served in several other sports publicity positions in addition to his alma mater. He was director of sports publicity at the New York World's Fair, director of publicity for the New York Americans and the New York Yankees, both members of the old American Football League. He began his long association with Notre Dame following Army Air Corps duty in World War II.

The Callahans have a son, Michael, 13.

TOM GRIMES
Publicity Assistant

A native Miamian and veteran Florida newsman at age 30, Tom Grimes joined the Dolphins in July. He spent 6¼ years as sports editor of the Pompano Beach Sun-Sentinel, for which he covered all 18 Miami Dolphins games in 1966.

A 1958 graduate of the University of Miami, Grimes worked on all four student publications plus assisting the sports information department. He began his newspaper career as a copy boy at the Miami Herald in 1954 and kept busy as an assistant in the sports department for five years while in college. During a two-year Army tour, Grimes was assigned to the sports information office at the United States Military Academy. He also was publicity director for the Florida Football League in 1962.

Married, Grimes makes his home in Pompano Beach.

JACK MCGOWAN
Ticket Manager

Jack McGowan is Mr. Sports Ticket in South Florida, serving for eight years as ticket manager for the Orange Bowl game, the Playoff Bowl game and numerous other Orange Bowl contests, before coming to the Dolphins in January, 1966.

McGowan's early experience in handling tickets came while working for the Madison Square Garden office. He is a native of New York City, but has lived in Miami for 18 years.

Most Valuable

Halfback Joe Auer was a unanimous selection as the Miami Dolphins' Most Valuable Player for 1966. The Trenton, N. J., native, who played high school football in Miami and college ball at Georgia Tech, was the team's top rusher and scorer (54 points) and ranked seventh in the American Football League in kickoff returns. A 6-foot-1, 205-pounder who will celebrate his 26th birthday October 11, Auer opened the season with a 95-yard kickoff return touchdown and ended it with a 14-yard pass reception for a winning score. He was the only back to carry the football in all 14 games and finished with 416 yards and four of Miami's five touchdowns rushing. Auer also caught 22 passes for 263 yards, returned 28 kickoffs 698 yards for a 24.9 average and brought back five punts 99 yards for a 19.8 average.

Other awards for outstanding performances went to center Tom Goode, best offensive lineman; end Ed Cooke, best defensive lineman; free safety Willie West, best defensive back; and linebacker Frank Emanuel, rookie of the year. Auer was also named best offensive back.

OPPONENTS

WESTERN DIVISION

Kansas City Chiefs (11-2-1)

The AFL champion Chiefs of Coach Hank Stram are expected to a very strong club again. All the great ballplayers of '66 are back and some new top hands could plug any weakness for Kansas City, which scored 448 points while allowing just 276.

The offense revolves around quarterback Len Dawson, receivers Otis Taylor, Chris Burford and Fred Arbanas and running backs Curtis McClinton, Mike Garrett and Bert Coan. The defense is led by four all-AFL selections—end Jerry Mays, tackle Buck Buchanan, linebacker Bobby Bell and safety Johnny Robinson.

The defense could be bolstered with a big left tackle and a rugged right end. Offensively, center Mike Hudock has been acquired to back-up Wayne Frazier. A place-kicker to replace traded Mike Mercer is also a necessity.

Oakland Raiders (8-5-1)

The Raiders were a tough bunch over the final 10 games of the season, losing only twice. A strong defense kept Coach John Rauch's team in every game, with the front four of ends Ben Davidson and Issac Lassister and tackles Tom Keating and Dan Birdwell and defensive backfield of Dave Grayson and Kent McCloughan at the corners and Warren Powers and Rodger Bird at safeties the standouts. This group set an AFL record for least yards allowed passing.

The offense could move along the ground, with halfback Clem Daniels the leader. The line (tackles Harry Schuh and Bob Svihus, guards Wayne Hawkins and Jim Harvey and perennial all-AFL center Jim Otto) showed improvement.

Off-season trades brought quarterbacks Daryle Lamonica and Mickey Slaughter to battle with holdovers Cotton Davidson and Charley Green and rookie Rick Egloff of Wyoming. Glenn Bass is another newcomer from Buffalo, and he will join Larry Todd and Fred Biletnikoff to form the Raiders' receiving corps. Dainard Paulson (from New York) and Willie Brown (Denver) are also new, giving depth to the defensive backfield.

San Diego Chargers (7-6-1)

The Chargers were pressed to win more than they lost last season, but Coach Sid Gillman has reached out for help for the Californians. With Paul Lowe running at halfback and John Hadl firing passes, the Chargers have striking power. Lance Alworth is still the game's premier flanker and second-year split end Gary Garrison is a good one. The offensive line remains strong if unchanged, with Ron Mix and Ernie Wright at tackles, Walt Sweeney and Ed Mitchell at guards and Sam Gruneisen at center.

The Chargers' revamped defense may find three tradees in starting slots. End Tom Day (Buffalo), tackle Scott Appleton and linebacker Johnny Baker (Houston) are the trio. Day will contest the issue with holdover Howard Kindig and Ron Billingsley, a 6-8, 270-pound No. 1 draft pick from Wyoming. Appleton will be trying for a tackle spot along with George Gross, Steve DeLong and Jim Griffin. Baker figures to challenge Rick Redman for an outside linebacking job. Ken Graham and Les Duncan are outstanding defensive backs.

Competition should be stiff for the fullback and tight end slots, with Gene Foster and Jim Allison the backs and Jacque MacKinnon and Willie Frazier the receivers.

Denver Broncos (4-10)

A new start for the Broncos under former Buffalo mentor Lou Saban should keep the fans well occupied this season. Saban faces a big task to bring the Broncos up to the winning level, but he's got a long-term contract.

A series of trades has brought help for the lines, with Ernie Park (Miami), Rex Mirich (Oakland), Mitch Dudek (New York) and Dave Costa (Buffalo) now on hand. Park was the key man in the trade with Miami that also brought fullback Cookie Gilchrist.

The Broncos have adequate receivers in Bob Scarpitto and Al Denson. Tom Beer is a good prospect at tight end. Quarterbacking is an unsettled question also, with holdover Max Choboian and Scotty Glacken and Mailon Kent the top candidates.

Denver scored only 196 points last season, but a strong running game with Gilchrist and rookie Floyd Little of Syracuse could pep up the attack. Wendell Hayes and Charlie Mitchell are other runners. Rookies to watch are George Goeddeke of Notre Dame and Mike Current of Ohio State.

EASTERN DIVISION

Buffalo Bills (9-4-1)

The vaunted Bills' defense again was the major factor last season as Buffalo won its third straight Eastern crown and allowed the least points in the league (255). Jim Dunaway is a standout at defensive tackle and the linebacking (Mike Stratton, Harry Jacobs and John Tracey) is as effective as any in the league. There is solid depth and talent at the important cornerback post with the foursome of George Byrd, Tom Janik, Booker Edgerson and Charlie King.

The addition of players such as Art Powell, Tom Flores, Keith Lincoln and Mike Mercer should give Buffalo more offensive punch. A defensive end has to be found to replace Tom Day, traded to San Diego for Lincoln.

Either Flores or Jack Kemp could be at quarterback, according to Coach Joel Collier, who has declared the job up for grabs. Lincoln joins fullback Wray Carlton and 1966 Rookie of the Year, Bobby Burnett, as the teams' top runners.

Mercer will battle Booth Lusteg for the place kicker's spot. The big hope to fill Day's position is Remi Prudhomme, an offensive guard last year.

Boston Patriots (8-4-2)

Patriots Coach Mike Holovak has announced his plans, "My goal is to build the best defense in pro football." Reason for Holovak's pronouncement about the defense is that last season, for probably the first time in Boston history, the offense passed the defense. Veteran stars like quarterback Babe Parilli, flanker-kicker Gino Cappelletti, fullback Jim Nance, the record-breaking ground gainer, and split end Art Graham headed the surge. Graham enjoyed his first injury-free year and set a club record with 51 receptions. In addition, the offensive line developed, particularly on the right side, where Len St. Jean and Tom Neville took hold at guard and tackle.

Returning standouts on defense include Nick Buoniconti at middle linebacker, Houston Antwine at tackle and Larry Eisenhauer at end. Boston drafted 15 players and 11 were defensive specialists. John Charles of Purdue is the first defensive backfield specialist ever drafted No. 1 by an AFL club. He'll battle Jay Cunningham and holdovers Tom Hennessey and Don Webb.

New York Jets (6-6-2)

The Jets have strength in three main areas—the passing attack revolving around Joe Namath's firing to Don Maynard, George Sauer and Pete Lammons, the running game featuring Matt Snell and surprising Emerson Boozer and the front defensive four (ends Verlon Biggs and Gerry Philbin and tackles Jim Harris and Paul Rochester).

Namath, the quick-throwing quarterback, underwent a second operation on his right knee during the off-season. "We got some raw-boned farm boys who should help us up front," said Coach Weeb Ewbank. The No. 1 selection was Paul Seiler of Notre Dame, a 6-4, 255-pounder who will be tried at guard first but also can be used at tackle.

Battling for spots in the secondary are trade acquisitions Joe Krakoski (Oakland) and Solomon Brannan (Kansas City). Carl McAdams, the highly-rated Oklahoma star who sat out the 1966 season, could add strength to the linebacking corps. Holdovers are Al Atkinson, Larry Grantham and Ralph Baker, the latter out part of last year with torn leg tendons.

Houston Oilers (3-11)

For the first time since the American Football League started, George Blanda will not be a quarterback candidate with the Oilers. Young Don Trull gets the nod for Coach Wally Lemm's crew and the former Baylor star is a fine performer. He gave an indication of his ability last season when he set an AFL record for lowest interception percentage, .029. Trull has a standout receiver in speedster Charlie Frazier. A competent set of running backs may also be available in fullback Hoyle Granger (6.93 average as a rookie) and halfback Sid Blanks.

Houston's defensive line of Pat Holmes and Ernie Ladd at tackles and Don Floyd and Gary Cutsinger at ends is strong, and the offensive line is improving. Ode Burrell, switched from running back, and Larry Elkins are the top flankers.

Among the rookie hopes are linebackers George Webster of Michigan State and Pete Barnes of Southern and defensive backs Larry Carwell of Southern, Pete Johns of Tulane and Ken Houston of Prairie View. Miller Farr, obtained from San Diego for Scott Appleton and Johnny Baker, could be a defensive backfield regular.
