

All Miami Dolphins' fans know that we are an expansion team.

Therefore, our ever increasing legion of fans were most encouraged last January 5th when they watched the Dallas Cowboys beat the Minnesota Vikings, 17-13, in the Pro Playoff Bowl, in the Miami's Orange Bowl.

This having been the battle of the runners-up in the National Football League, it meant that Dallas and Minnesota just missed winning the NFL title and just missed being the senior circuit's representative in the Super Bowl that was to take place at the same site a week later.

Why should this have been so encouraging to the fans of the Miami Dolphins?

Well, the Cowboys from Dallas and the Vikings from Minnesota are expansion teams. Just like the Dolphins, they were formed by drafting a number of players from the other teams in their league. Dallas started in 1960, Minnesota a year later.

Keep in mind that the Dolphins are going into the fourth year of competition. It might be interesting to compare our Miami team with Dallas and Minnesota in the first three seasons of play. Dallas won nine games. Minnesota 10 . . . and the Dolphins have won 12. (Editor's note: A three-year expansion record).

We like to think the Dolphins fans have reason to be encouraged. And to add a spark to this encouragement, we'll make a prediction consistent with those made in the past. In 1966, we said: "We'll be competitive!" In 1967, and 1968, we made the same prediction: "We'll win more than we did last year!" (Editor note: "The Dolphins won three games in 1966, four in 1967, and five in 1968 . . . a listing of records of all modern expansion teams can be found on page 17).

So, at the risk of sounding monotonous, we'll say with reference to 1969: "We'll win more than we did last year!"

What about 1969? Well, to start out, we think we had an excellent draft last January. But before talking about our new boys, it is only fair to speak about our veterans.

We think our number one strong point is quarterback Bob Griese. He is a good one, and we cannot emphasize that too strongly. In the next two years he'll compare with anybody in pro football. He has a good strong arm. He can run when he has to. He's a keen student of the game, and a leader. His teammates have confidence in him, and so does the coaching staff.

We have good receivers, and a certain amount of depth in this department. Karl Noonan took over at split end last season after Jack Clancy was sidelined for the year

FITZGERALD AWARD

The Miami Dolphins will honor the outstanding rookie of the 1969 training camp through the presentation of the first annual Thomas Fitzgerald Memorial Award.

The Fitzgerald Award honors the late sports writer of the Miami News who covered the Dolphins from their beginning until shortly before his death on January 18, 1969.

The award, in the form of an engraved wristwatch, will be voted on by those writers who regularly cover the Dolphins' pre-season practice sessions.

with a pre-season knee injury. Clancy had set a rookie AFL record in 1967 with 67 receptions. Last season, Noonan caught 58 passes for 760 yards, and most important, 11 touchdown grabs. This latter figure tied for the league lead (with Warren Wells, Oakland).

This season it is our tentative plan to have a recovered Clancy (at split end) and Noonan (at flanker) both as starters as wide receivers. Jim Kiick, a great rookie last year, was our second best receiver with 44 receptions, but I'll get back to him when talking about running backs. Howard Twilley, who caught more passes than any other collegian in his senior year at Tulsa, caught 39 last year. He's hard-nosed, has good hands, needs to stay free of injury. Gene Milton came along fast near the end of last season, caught a 38-yarder for a touchdown against the Jets that was a beauty. He's done the 100 in 9.4. Jimmy Hines, the Olympic sprint champ, was a taxi man with us last year after winning a gold medal in Mexico City. He's really starting from scratch at training camp. As for speed, he's done the 100-yard dash in the world record time of 9.1, and is the holder of the World's record in the 100-meter dash at 9.9. His jersey number with us is 99.

Doug Moreau, at tight end, is a fine receiver (27 catches for 365 yards, three touchdowns), and we are aware that he is also a possibility as a wide receiver. Jim Cox, bothered by injuries last season, has considerable potential, and our punter, Larry Seiple, can also perform at tight end.

Regarding runners, Kiick was our leader, gaining 621 yards in 165 attempts. In the final AFL statistics, he was seventh in rushing, 10th in pass receiving, the only player in the league to be among the first ten in both categories. He was our rookie of the year last season. We hope he is our sophomore of the season in 1969. Next best was Larry Csonka, rookie fullback, our number one draft choice after the 1967 collegiate campaign. Though twice sidelined by head injuries, the former Syracuse all-America picked up 540 yards in 138 attempts, and not incidentally, six touchdowns. He also caught 11 passes, including one for a touchdown. Our third leading rusher, believe it or not, was quarterback Griese . . . 230 yards on 42 scrambles for a 5.5 average. Stan Mitchell, who alternated with Csonka at fullback, but was sidelined for a month with an appendectomy, carred 54 times for 176 yards.

As for the veterans in the offensive line . . . four of them have started almost every game for three years. Maxie Williams has performed at both guard and tackle. We're figuring on him as a guard candidate when training camp begins. He's steady, as is Tom Goode, who has started every Dolphins game and has a total of 98 straight AFL playing appearances to his credit. Billy Neighbors, at guard, has been in pro football a number of years. He's always been a starter and does a good job. Norm Evans, at tackle, was picked as our best offensive lineman last year, the second time in three years he has carned this honor. He's a good football player who gets better every season. Doug Crusan, at tackle, was a top draft choice and worked onto the first team as a rookie. He did a pretty good all-round job and will be better with a year's experience.

We need improvement in the defensive line. Manny Fernandez did a good job as a rookie end and was picked as our best defensive lineman last year. Veteran Mel Branch, at end, is steady, and gives you 100 per cent.

Jim Riley, at end, and John Richardson, at tackle, were sophomores, so to speak, last season, and both need to return to the good form they showed as rookies. In fairness, both were bothered a bit by injuries last year. So was rookie Jim Urbanek, at tackle, and we are hoping that he can play up to his potential. Freddie Woodson, who over two years has had most of his experience at offensive guard and on the special teams, will get a good chance at defensive tackle. Admittedly, some of our top draft choices have an excellent opportunity to win jobs in the defensive line.

We'll be greatly disappointed if fans don't consider linebacking the most improved part of our ball club. We think the getting of middle linebacker Nick Buonoiconti from Boston is the most important trade since the Dolphins have been in existence. He's been a five-time All-AFL linebacker. He can really find the man with the ball. Randall Edmunds had a good rookie season, last year, at left linebacker. We think Frank Emanuel will fill the bill on the right side. We're moving Frank from the middle and we think it will be to his advantage. At the same time, we're aware that he led the squad in tackles last year while operating in the middle. Ed Weisacosky came to us during the season last year, and we think the ex-University of Miami lad has promise. The rookies, however, can gain a spot or two here.

As for the deep defensive backs . . . well, at the corners we think Jim Warren and Dick Westmoreland are two real good ones. Both have been first stringers since the Dolphins first season, although Dick was sidelined for awhile last year with a shoulder separation. Dick Anderson, who performed at both strong and weak safety, was deadlocked with George Atkinson of Oakland for "Defensive Rookie of the Year" honors, according to the Associated Press. We expect him to do as well in season number two, and he is slated for the weak safety spot. Bobby Petrella, who will be going into his fourth season, along with all the other original Dolphins, will be the man to beat out for the strong safety position. All of these predictions, however, are being done with the idea of being helpful to the press. In actuality, it must be stated that very, very few of our men can think that they have a first team position cinched. One other person worthy of mention among the deep defenders is Bobby Neff. He can play any of the four positions, and is good on the special teams, particularly on punt and kickoff returns.

As for our good draft of last January, we concentrated in the early rounds on defense. Four of the first five men picked were defensive players. Bill Stanfill, the number one selection, was one of the great defensive linemen in the collegiate ranks. We'll try the former Georgia all-America at defensive end. Bob Heinz, choice number two from the University of the Pacific, will be tested extensively at defensive tackle. Norman McBride, from the University of Utah, the fourth selection, could very well be in the thick of things in the linebacker battle. The same goes for our first number five pick, Willie Pearson, from North Carolina A&T, as a defensive back. Our second fifth round selection, Karl Kremser, from Tennessee, may be the answer to our place-kicking problems. Offense was not forgotten in the draft. Hardly. The number three choice was running back Eugene (Mercury) Morris, of West Texas State. He's the greatest ground-gainer in the history of collegiate football. For his three years, he gained 3,388 yards and this is an NCAA career record.

Dolphins Officials



JOSEPH ROBBIE Managing General Partner

I N his almost four years as a Miami resident, Joseph Robbie has become an active participant in civic enterprises, and to the sports "man on the street" he is well known as the person who brought a major league professional franchise to the City of Miami.

He is the Managing Partner of the Miami Dolphins. the majority controlling stockholder of the team, the bossman, so to speak. He has made every major administrative decision as the team has become the winningest expansion team in modern pro football history, based on its first three years of existence. He is dedicated to one goal: A championship football team for Miami.

In civic work in Miami he is on the Board of Directors of the Crippled Children's Society, and last spring was the General Chairman of their Easter Seal Campaign. He is also on the Board of Directors of Boystown of Florida, and a member of the Advisory Board of Florida Memorial College, and the Administrative Board of Biscayne College. He is chairman of the Challenge I Fund Raising Campaign for Biscayne College and Co-Chairman for Greater Miami of the SUMMA Campaign for the University of Notre Dame. He is also a member of the Board of Governors and Executive Committee of St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, Tennessee, He is a member of Downtown Miami Kiwanis, La Gorce Country Club, the Palm Bay Club and the Jockey Club.

Although a relatively new owner in pro football circles, his was a strong voice in the recent realignment of teams in the American Football League-National Football League

merger. In pro football, he is Chairman of the AFL Players' Relations Committee which represents the owners in negotiations with the Players' Association. He is also a member of AFL-NFL Committee on the Chicago Tribune All-Star Game.

Now a resident of Miami Shores, Mr. Robbie is a native of Sisseton, South Dakota.

He is frequently heard as a speaker on TV, and at many sports banquets in the Miami area as he expouses the cause of the Dolphins. He has had good preparation as a speaker, too. When he was a student at the University of South Dakota, he was a national debating and oratory champion. And he has had many years of experience as a trial lawyer.

Mr. Robbie began his collegiate studies at Northern State Teachers College in South Dakota and continued them at the University of South Dakota. He was president of the student government at both schools, and of the South Dakota Student Federation and the South Dakota Collegiate Press Association. He finished his law studies after returning from service in World War II. He was a college teacher at the College of St. Catherine and Dakota Wesleyan University.

Mr. Robbie enlisted in the United States Navy on December 8, 1941, and served until late in 1945. He received the Bronze Star and served in five invasions in the South Pacific.

He began his law practice in Mitchell, South Dakota. He moved to Minneapolis in 1951, where he became 4-state Regional Director of the Office of Price Stabilization, supervising 500 employees. Mr. Robbic is a lawyer admitted to practice in Minnesota, South Dakota, and before the Supreme Court of the United States.

In 1965, Mr. Robbie served as personal representative of Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey on the Inaugural Committee which planned the ceremonies and events for the Inauguration of President Johnson and Vice President Humphrey.

In 1966, Mr. Robbie was the first to be presented the J. Ernest O'Brien Award as the outstanding state trade association executive in the United States by the National Association of Tobacco Distributors.

Befitting an owner of a football team, Mr. Robbie and his wife Elizabeth are the parents of 11 children.

JOSEPH THOMAS

Executive Assistant and Director of Player Personnel

The first person hired by President and General Manager Joseph Robbie, after he acquired the Miami Dolphins franchise in late summer of 1965, was Joe Thomas.

It was the second time that Thomas was handed such an assignment. In 1960, he was the first person hired by the Minnesota Vikings, as director of player personnel.

As a result of his work with the Vikings and the past three years with the Dolphins, Thomas is recognized as a most astute judge of football talent.

Thomas, 47, and a recent bridegroom, is a native of Warren, Ohio. He was graduated from Ohio Northern University in 1943. He holds both a masters and a directors degree from Indiana University.

An outstanding end at Ohio Northern, Thomas also played end for the Navy's Great Lakes team.
Following Navy duty,

Following Navy duty, 'Thomas began his coaching career as a high school football mentor in Indiana.

He began his college coaching at DePauw. After four years at DePauw he moved to Indiana University as an assistand in football and basketball. Thomas entered pro football coaching in 1954 and served as an assistant at Baltimore, L. A. Rams, and Toronto before going to Minnesota.

Mr. Sibley is Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Jockey Club in Miami and of Ocean Reef Resort. He is a member of the Board of Directors of Western Union and is eminent in business in Rochester, New York, as well as the Miami area.

Mr. Morrison is the former Senior Vice President of Pan American World Airways where he developed the Latin American division. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the First National Bank of Miami.

For his work in the Latin American division of Pan American Airways, he received decorations from the following countries: Panama, Nicaragua, Dominican Republic, Haiti, Guaternala, Honduras, Venezuela and Cuba.

Mr. Callahan is President of the Jenks Metal Company, Vice Chairman of the Dade County Metropolitan Transit Authority, former Chairman of the Florida Chapter of the Young Presidents' Organization of Florida and Vice President of the Greater Miami Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. McLamore is founder and President of the Burger King Corporation and is a member of the Board of Directors of the Pillsbury Company.

GEORGE WILSON

Head Coach

George Wilson has been in pro football 33 years as a player, assistant coach and head coach. And earlier, he was a gridiron star in high school, prep school and college.

He first played for Austin High School in his native Chicago. Then came a year at St. John's Military Academy, in Wisconsin, after which he enrolled at Northwestern University. With the Wildcats, he was a standout at end. He was graduated from Northwestern in 1937.

Wilson's pro career began that fall with the Chicago Bears, and from 1937 through 1946 he was a star end for Coach George Halas' team. In those 10 years he caught 111 passes for 1,342 yards and 15 touchdowns. He also ran for three scores, once with an intercepted pass.

In 1947 and 1948, he was an assistant coach with the Bears. He began a most successful association with the Detroit Lions in 1949. He was first an assistant coach through the 1956 season. He became head coach in 1957.

In his very first year as head man, the Lions won the National Football League championship, and George was named NFL "Coach of the Year." In most of his eight seasons as head coach of Detroit, he was associated with winning teams. For three straight years, 1960-1962, the Lions finished second in the rugged Western Division, and each time capped this by winning the Playoff Bowl in Miami. In eight years under Wilson, the Lions won 57 games, lost 45 and ticd six.

In 1965, George was an assistant coach with the Washington Redskins. On January 29, 1966, President and General Manager Joseph Robbie announced that Wilson had been named head football coach of the Miami Dolphins.

High on Wilson's list of coaching accomplishments has to be his work with the Dolphins in their first three seasons. The 12 victories achieved in this period is the most ever in the first three years of an expansion team in major pro football circles. As a coach, Wilson is very much a man's man, and one who has good rapport and the respect of his players.

Wilson's wife Claire was his high school sweetheart. They attended Austin High and later Northwestern together. They have five children, four daughters and a son.

The oldest, Mrs. Sue Berwick, lives in Miami. George, Jr. is a Miami stockbroker and former professional football player. Third oldest, Mrs. Lynne Wagner, lives in Detroit. Daughter Kathy graduated from St. Leo's College this spring, and Laurie will be a high school sophomore at Lourdes Academy in Miami.

Quick quote from George Wilson on the 1970 realignment: "Like everybody else in the Dolphins organization, I'm most happy on the Baltimore Colts coming into our division, and the Cleveland Browns and Pittsburgh Steelers coming over to our side of the fence. But first we've got to worry about 1969."

LES BINGAMAN

Defensive Line

Lester Bingaman, defensive line coach, is generally given credit for helping revolutionize pro football defenses. A three-time all-pro performer during his seven years with the Detroit Lions, Bingaman was one of the first big, but quick defenders.

A native of MacKenzie, Tennessee, Bingaman played on championship teams in high school, college and in the pros. In 1941, playing for Lew Wallace High in Gary, Indiana, Bingaman and his teammates brought home the state championship. In his senior year at Illinois, the Illini won the Big Ten title and the 1947 Rose Bowl game. During his career with the Lions, Detroit won three Western Conference titles and two National League championships.

Bingaman was a third round draft pick of the Lions in 1948. It was while he was a player with the Lions that Bingaman formed a friendship with Dolphins head coach George Wilson. The latter was then an assistant coach at Detroit. Later, 1960 through 1964, Bingaman served as the Lions' defensive line coach under head coach Wilson.

When Bingaman first came to the Lions he was a twoway performer, playing guard and sometimes center on offense, and a middle guard on defense. But his fame spread later as a most effective middle guard. He came to the Dolphins in February, 1966. Bingaman is married and has one son.

JOHN IDZIK

Offensive Backs

John Idzik enters his 18th year as a coach this fall. Now in his fourth year as offensive backfield coach for the Dolphins, Idzik also has 12 years as a college coach and two in service football to his credit.

A Philadelphia native, Idzik was one of the most honored high school players in that city's history. He was offered baseball contracts by seven big league teams, but chose football at the University of Maryland. He won four straight football letters and three in baseball. In two Gator Bowl appearances with the Terps, Idzik intercepted four passes, the first pair off Georgia All-America Johnny Rauch, now coach of the Buffalo Bills.

Idzik began his coaching career at Maryland in 1951, then entered the Marine Corps for a two-year tour at Quantico and Parris Island. He was all-Marine as a half-back, quarterback and defensive back, in addition to coaching.

In 1954-55, he was backfield coach at the University of Tennessee. He also put in a stint with the Ottawa Rough Riders of the Canadian League before returning to Maryland as backfield coach in 1956.

Idzik moved to the University of Detroit in 1960, where he became head coach in 1962. When Detroit discontinued football in 1964, he became offensive coach at Tulane. He was named backfield coach for the Dolphins in February, 1966. Idzik is married and has two daughters and one son.

ERNIE HEFFERLE

Offensive Line

Offensive line coach Ernie Hefferle has been a coach for 32 years on high school, collegiate and professional levels. The son of a coal miner, Hefferle was born in Herminie, Pennsylvania, a town 20 miles east of Pittsburgh. He attended Sewickley Township High and Duquesne University. An end, in his senior year, he helped Duquesne upset a great Rose Bowl-bound Pittsburgh team, 7-0. He capped his career with a last-second, 72-yard pass reception and touchdown that downed Mississippi State 14-13 in the '38 Orange Bowl game.

Hefferle's coaching career started at South Huntington (Pa.) Township High (4 years) then progressed to Tarentum (Pa.) High (2 years). Three years of Navy Pre-Flight duty came next, then four more years at Tarentum. A bid to coach at the University of Pittsburgh lasted nine years—from 1950 through 1958.

In 1959, Hefferle joined the Washington Redskins as line coach. In 1960, he took over as head coach at Boston College and stayed two seasons. Another three-year stay at Pittsburgh came in 1962-64 before a switch to the professional Steelers in 1965. He joined the Dolphins in February, 1966. Hefferle is married and has three daughters.

TOM KEANE

Defensive Backs

Defensive backfield coach Tom Keane has been connected with pro football since he was 20 years old. That year, 1948, he reported to the Los Angeles Rams training camp for the first of his nine big league seasons. He became a defensive regular in his third year with the Rams, then was traded to the newly-formed Dallas Texans in 1952. When the Texans were moved to Baltimore in 1953, Keane went along, being named to the NFL all-pro team at left safety.

All-pro honors came again in 1954 at Baltimore. In 1955, Keane was traded to the Chicago Cardinals. A preseason knee injury ended his career prematurely in 1956.

The coaching career started then, with the Cardinals the first stop. Then came Calgary of the Canadian League, then a post as coach and general manager of the Wheeling Ironmen of the United League. Three years at Wheeling produced seasons of 8-4, 13-1 and 7-7 and two league titles.

In 1965, it was off to Pittsburgh as the Steelers' defensive backfield coach. He joined the Dolphins in early 1966 in the same capacity.

From Bellaire, Ohio, Keane attended high school at Linsly Military Institute before helping quarterback Ohio State to a national championship as a freshman in 1944. He then went into the service, spending 20 months in the Navy in the South Pacific. He returned to the University of West Virginia for the next two football seasons. In 1947, he finished second in the nation in punting with an average over 42 yards. Keane bypassed his final year of cligibility to sign with the Rams. Keane is married and has two daughters and two sons.







Danny Dowe

BOB LUNDY

Trainer

A veteran athletic trainer at age 33, Bob Lundy is responsible for injuries, diet and conditioning of the Dolphins. Now in his fourth season, he came to Miami from the Detroit Lions where he was assistant trainer for six years. During three of those years, Coach George Wilson was his boss with the Lions.

Lundy, a native of Wollaston, Massachusetts, played football at North Quincy High School. He graduated from Boston University in 1955 with a degree in physical education and has done advance work in this field at Indiana University.

Lundy began his training career at his alma mater, Boston University, later became assistant trainer at Indiana. He then became head trainer for all sports for four years at the University of Detroit. Lundy is married and has two sons.

DANNY DOWE

Equipment Manager

Equipment manager for the Dolphins is Danny Dowe, a native of Brighton, Massachusetts. Dowe played all sports at Brighton High and also participated in semi-pro baseball for four years.

He served four years on a destroyer during World War II, being involved in invasions of Normandy, South France, North Africa and in the Pacific. His destroyer was hit by a suicide plane off Okinawa in May of 1944, but Dowe was rescued.

He has worked in industrial electronics for Raytheon, Martin Company as an aerospace lab technician, plus 3½ years with the Bal Harbour Police Department. During the off season, Dowe works at Indian Creek Country Club.



EARL R. TRUAX, JR., Promotion Director, is in his second year as a member of the Dolphins administration staff. Prior to coming to the Dolphins he had been Promotion Director of the Miami Herald for seven years.



CHARLES M. CALLA-HAN, Publicity Director, was one of the first administrative aides to join the Dolphins when the club was formed over three years ago. His background includes 20 years as Director of Sports Publicity at the University of Notre Dame.



CHARLES GESINO, Promotions and Sales, came to the Dolphins in 1966 after five years as a minor league baseball executive. He also is a former promotions director Hialeah Race Course.



JOHN J. (JACK) McGOWAN, Ticket Director, is one of the outstanding ticket men in the country. His early experience came at Madison Square Garden. Prior to joining the Dolphins he had been the ticket man-

ager for the Orange Bowl Committee for eight years. Annually he handles tickets for the Baltimore Orioles during spring training. He also supervised tickets for the last two Super Bowl games.

WILLIAM L. JACKSON, Comptroller, is the newest member of the Dolphins administrative staff, joining the club on June 1. He previously had worked for Price Waterhouse Co. for three years in Pittsburgh.

HISTORY OF MIAMI DOLPHINS

1965

FEBRUARY 25—Joseph Robbie, Minneapolis lawyer, was requested by a client he was then representing in a business transaction in Miami to ascertain whether or not an AFL franchise was available for Philadelphia. He agreed to contact AFL Commissioner Joe Foss, a former college classmate and legislative colleague in South Dakota.

MARCH 3—Robbie met with Commissioner Foss at the Sheraton Park Hotel in Washington, D.C. After hearing Robbie's story, Commissioner Foss advised him to apply for a franchise in Miami as the best city for an expansion franchise in the American Football League. Commissioner Foss predicted at this luncheon that if an AFL expansion franchise were granted to Miami it would be one of the strongest franchises in the League within a few years.

Formal application was filed shortly thereafter with the American Football League for a franchise for Miami by Robbie and Danny Thomas, television star, with whom Robbie had been associated for nearly ten years in raising funds for the construction of St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis and in setting policy for the hospital on the Board of Governors.

MAY 6-Robbie met with the late Mayor Robert King High of Miami to ascertain the availability of the Orange Bowl Stadium. The next day he met with City Manager Melvin L. Reese to keep an appointment arranged by Mayor High to discuss availability of the Orange Bowl Stadium for Pro football games. Mayor High agreed to urge the American Football League to establish a franchise in Miami.

JUNE 4—Resolution 36723 was adopted by Miami City Commission directing Mayor High to confer with the AFL to express interest in designating Miami a sthe site of an AFL franchise.

JUNE 7—The AFL Executive Committee voted to expand by two teams for the 1966 season. Mayor High attended this meeting at Monmouth Park, New Jersey, and urged the AFL to locate in Miami.

JULY 8—The city manager was directed by the Miami City Commission to negotiate with the AFL officials for lease of the Orange Bowl

JULY 15—Resolution 36845 was adopted by the Miami City Commission directing the city manager to submit a letter of intent to the commissioner of the American Football League to lease the Orange Bowl Stadium to an AFL franchise.

AUGUST 16-Miami was awarded the first AFL expansion franchise with Robbie and Danny Thomas, television star, as recipients. The franchise cost 7.5 million dollars.

SEPTEMBER 21—Joe Thomas of the Minnesota Vikings was named executive assistant and director of player personnel.

In Dallas' sixth season, the Cowboys finished 7-7 (1965), then followed with 10-3-1, 9-5 and 12-2 records. In Minnesota's fourth season, 1964, it went 8-5-1. Minnesota was 7-7 in 1965 and 8-6 in 1968.

Those are the only winning seasons for the six expansion teams. The expansion teams have had five winning years, 19 losing ones and two at .500.

The overall record of the four, 3-year expansion teams is 37-122-7, a .233 winning percentage. The seasonal won and lost for all the expansion team goes: Dallas 3-5-1, Minnesota 2-5-1, Miami 0-3, Atlanta 0-3, New Orleans 0-2 and Cincinnati 0-1.

Dallas won the NFL Eastern Conference title in 1966 and 1967. Dallas also won the Capitol Division title in 1968. Minnesota won the Central Division title in 1968.

OCTOBER-"Dolphins" was selected as the nickname for the Miami

NOVEMBER-Mrs. Robert Swanson of West Miami was named winner of Miami's nickname contest, thus gaining two lifetime passes to home games. James Broome of Opa Locka was runnerup in the contest which attracted over 20,000 entries.

NOVEMBER 27—Miami selected quarterback Rick Norton of Kentucky and fullback Jim Grabowski of Illinois as first round picks in the college draft, which went 20 rounds. End John Roderick of SMU became Miami's first pick in the Red Shirt Draft, which went 11 rounds.

DECEMBER 16—Miami Dolphins, Ltd., was organized as a Florida limited partnership to own the Miami AFL franchise with Robbie as managing general partner and Danny Thomas Sports, Inc. as the sole other general partner.

1966

JANUARY 15-Charles Callahan reported as publicity director.

JANUARY 29-George Wilson was appointed as the Dolphins first

FEBRUARY 3—Coach Wilson appointed Les Bingaman defensive line coach, Ernie Hefferle as offensive line coach and Bob Pellegrini as linebacker coach.

FEBRUARY 16-John Idzik was appointed as offensive backfield coach and Tom Keane as defensive backfield coach.

FEBRUARY 21-Ralph Hawkins was named as coach of the receivers.

APRIL 7-Joe Foss resigned as AFL commissioner and Al Davis was elected to replace Foss

JUNE 8—Truce and merger were announced between the AFL and NFL, with Pete Rozelle as commissioner of both leagues and with a common draft in 1967. A World Championship Game at end of 1966 season was agreed upon.

JULY 1-Bobby Walston was selected to replace Hawkins, who moved to the Military Academy.

JULY 5—The Dolphins opened their first training camp at St. Petersburg Beach with 48players reporting. The first scrimmage was held that afternoon.

JULY 17-The remaining AFL veterans reported to camp.

JULY 25-Milt Woodard was named president of the AFL as Al Davis ended his tenure.

AUGUST 6—The Dolphins played their first game ever, losing, 38-10 at San Diego before 25,712 fans.

AUGUST 7-Training camp site was switched to St. Andrews School, Boca Raton, Florida.

AUGUST 12-Dolphins played their first home game at the Orange Bowl, losing, 33-0, to Kansas City, as 36,366 turned out. Defensive back Ross O'Hanley became the first Dolphin to go on injured reserve after a leg injury.

AUGUST 19—Defensive back Pete Jaquess was claimed from San Diego to become the first player acquired through waivers.

SEPTEMBER 2—The Dolphins opened their first league season against the Oakland Raiders in the Orange Bowl. Joe Auer ran back the opening kickoff 95 yards for a touchdown, but the Raiders won, 23-14. The crowd was 26,776.

SEPTEMBER 9—Punter George Wilson, Jr., set the first Dolphin league record with 483 yards on 10 punts against the New York Jets in the Orange Bowl.

OCTOBER 16—The Dolphins snapped a nine-game string of losses (four in the pre-season) by defeating the Denver Broncos, 24-7, before a crowd of 23,393.

OCTOBER 23-The Houston Oilers fell, 20-13, to the Dolphins at Rice Stadium, but quarterback Rick Norton was lost for the season with a broken jaw.

DECEMBER 18—John Stofa made his first start at quarterback a great one by passing for four touchdowns as the Dolphins upset Houston,

29-28, for their third victory. Total equalled record for wins by an expansion team.

1967

JANUARY 21-Willie West, Jimmy Warren, Ed Cooke and Tom Erlandson helped the East AllStars defeat the West, 30-23, at Oakland.

JANUARY 31-W. H. (Bud) Keland, of Racine, Wisconsin, joined the Dolphins as a limited partner.

MARCH 14—The Dolphins picked quarterback Bob Griese of Purdue and tackle Jim Riley of Oklahoma first and second in the initial combined AFL-NFL player draft which went 17 rounds. Griese was the fourth player taken in the draft and the first by an AFL team.

MARCH 23-Keland purchased the limited partnership interest of Martin M. Decker. Keland also acquired the limited partnership interests of George A. Hamid, Sr., and George A. Hamid, Jr. during this period.

MAY 20—The Dolphins conducted their first tryout camp at St. Andrew's School in Boca Raton.

MAY 24-Cincinnati was awarded the 10th franchise. Later, a group

headed by former Cleveland Browns' coach Paul Brown obtained the franchise.

JUNE 1-Robbie and Keland agreed to equalize their present holdings in Miami Dolphins, Ltd., and to equalize whenever either acquired outside holdings. They acquired the interest of George N. Gillett, Jr.

JULY 8—The Dolphins opened their second regular training camp at St. Andrew's with 35 rookies reporting.

JULY 22—The Dolphins held their first public intrasquad scrimmage at Lockhart Stadium in Ft. Lauderdale. A crowd of 6,112 watched defense take 27-0 "victory" under Coach Wilson's scoring system.

JULY 29—The Dolphins won their first pre-season victory in club history by defeating the Denver Broncos, 19-2, at the Rubber Bowl in Akron, Ohio, before 7,000.

AUGUST 19-The Dolphins' first Inter-league game resulted in a 27-17 loss to the Atlanta Falcons. Record crowd of 50,822 watched at the Orange Bowl.

AUGUST 22-Waivers were asked on Bo Roberson, Billy Joe, Ross O'Hanley, Al Dotson, Jim Davidson and LaVerne Torczon, cutting the Dolphins' roster of original AFL expansion picks to 16.

SEPTEMBER 8—Keland joined Robbie in acquiring the corporate stock previously owned by Danny Thomas in the corporate general partner in Miami Dolphins, Ltd.

SEPTEMBER 17—Dolphins opened their second season with a 35-21 win over the Denver Broncos ,but quarterback John Stofa broke his ankle and was lost indefinitely. Rookie Bob Griese took over after only four minutes of play.

NOVEMBER 26—The Dolphins snapped an eight-game losing streak by defeating Buffalo, 17-14, in the final minute on a pass from Bob Griese to Howard Twilley.

DECEMBER 10-Bob Griese led the Dolphins to a record 41 points and first triumph over San Diego, which scored 24. It was Miami's highest point total in 35 games, including pre-season.

DECEMBER 17—Dolphins scored record 28 points in the second quarter, went on to defeat the Boston Patriots for the first time, 41-32. It was the second straight home victory and the fourth of the season, bettering the 1966 win total.

DECEMBER 27—Quarterback John Stofa was traded to the new Cincinnati Bengals for first and second round bonus draft picks.

1968

JANUARY 21—Bob Griese, Jack Clancy, Dick Westmoreland and John Bramlett played for the East All-Stars in a 25-24 triumph over the West in Jacksonville.

JANUARY 30—The Dolphins selected Syracuse fullback Larry Csonka and Indiana tackle Doug Crusan in the first round of the college player draft.

JULY 19-The Dolphins opened their third training camp at St. Andrew's School, Boca Raton, with coaches, quarterbacks and middle

linebackers reporting. On July 22, 36 rookies and 19 veterans reported.

JULY 27—The Dolphins first ever rookie scrimmage at Boca Raton High School Field drew a crowd of 2,231 as an 88-play "game" ended in an 18-18 tie between the offense and defense.

AUGUST 4—The Defense edged the Offense, 17-12, in a controlled scrimmage in Fort Lauderdale before 5,000 fans.

AUGUST 11—The Dolphins opened their pre-season schedule with a 28-28 tie with Buffalo at Rochester ,New York. This was the first tie ever for the Dolphins.

AUGUST 17-The Dolphins gained their first victory over an NFL team, beating the Philadelphia Eagles, 23-7, before 40,067 in the Orange Bowl.

AUGUST 31—The Dolphins played before their largest crowd ever, 68,125, but lost to the Baltimore Colts, 22-13, in the Orange Bowl.

DECEMBER 1—The Dolphins enjoyed their greatest margin of victory ever in defeating Boston 38-7, in the Orange Bowl. It was also their fifth win, most ever in one season, and contributed to their three-year expansion team record of 12 victories.

1969

JANUARY 12-The New York Jets defeated the heavily-favored Baltimore Colts in the Super Bowl, 16-7, in the Orange Bowl Stadium before 75,377.

JANUARY 19—The West defeated the East in the AFL All-Star Game at Jacksonville, 35-28. Quarterback Bob Griese, split end Karl Noonan and halfback Jim Kiick represented the Dolphins in the East lineup. Kiick, on a two-yard rush, scored the first touchdown for the East. The crowd of 43,800 was aAnll-Star record.

JANUARY 28-All-America tackle Bill Stanfill of Georgia was Miami's first round choice in the college draft. The Dolphins drafted 11th and had 19 picks over the 17 rounds.

MARCH 24—The Dolphins obtained all-star middle linebacker Nick Buoniconti from the Boston Patriots in a trade for quarterback Kim Hammond and linebacker John Bramlett,

MAY 10—In the Pro football realignment the Cleveland Browns, Baltimore Colts and Pittsburgh Steelers were moved to the American Football League. The Colts joined Boston, Miami, Buffalo, and New

York in one division. The Browns and Steelers joined Houston and Cincinnati in another division for 1970. The third AFL section included San Diego, Oakland, Kansas City and Denver.

MAY 16-Managing Partner Joseph Robbie announced that five prominent Miamians have joined as limited partners in ownership of the Dolphins. The five are H. Earl Smalley, Harper Sibley, Jr., Wilbur Morrison, Frank J. Callahan and James W. McLamore. They joined Robbie in acquiring the interests formerly owned by W. H. (Bud) Keland, and Robbie became the majority owner of the franchise.

MAY 30-William Snow Frates, Peter T. Fay, Robert L. Floyd and Ray H. Pearson were announced as additional limited partners in ownership of the Dolphins with Robbie retaining majority ownership.

On all trips and at official functions, all Dolphins coaches and players wear emblematic Dolphins Jackets furnished by The Haggar Company of Dallas, Texas. Also, slacks worn by the Dolphins coaches at practice sessions are furnished by The Haggar Company. All of which is consistent with the fact that among the partners involved in the ownership of the Dolphins are Edward R. Haggar and Joseph M. Haggar, Jr.

ORANGE BOWL STADIUM

The Orange Bowl Stadium is the home of the Dolphins, the University of Miami Hurricanes and the famed Orange Bowl Game on New Year's Night. Dedicated in 1938, the City of Miami-owned Orange Bowl has been enlarged and modernized in where it now seats 75,500 fans. The all-time record atlendance at the Orange Bowl is 77,265, set at the University of Miami-Notre Dame game on November 25, 1967.
