Joe Robbie is the reason the Dolphins are in Miami. He is the reason that the Dolphins are approaching season number six with their operation a success.

He is the number one fan of the Dolphins. He is a man in motion. During the course of a game, he may be in the press box, or visiting with a fan in an end zone seat, or on the sidelines.

A championship team is, and has been, Robbie's goal ever since he obtained the first American Football expansion franchise for Miami in the summer of 1965. Since that time, he has made all of the team's major administrative decisions in his position of Managing General Partner. The biggest step forward came last year when the Dolphins had their first winning season and advanced to the playoffs in the American Football Conference.

His has been a strong impact on pro football in the few years he has been in the game. His was a strong voice in the realignment of teams in the AFC in the new NFL of 1970. He has served as chairman of the AFL Players' Relations Committee which represented the owners in negotiations with the league's players' association. He has been a member of the Chicago Tribune All-Star Game Committee Committee.

Through Dolphin charity games and other activities, he has been responsible for raising and contributing more than \$300,000 which has gone to such recipients as the Crippled Childrens' Society, Variety Childrens' Hospital, Goodwill Industries, Boystown of South Florida, Big Brothers, U. S. Olympic Fund, Archbishop's Charities. Operation Self-Help, University of Miami, Biscayne Col-

PROSPECTS IN GENERAL

The Miami Dolphins are hoping this will be a season of seconds. This is understandable. Last year, in the fifth of their "expansion team" existence, it was a season

The fifth year has to be referred to as the Don Shula The fifth year has to be referred to as the Don Shula year. It was his first. Here are some of the results first winning season (10.4) . . . first appearance in the playoffs (beaten by Oakland, 21.14) . . . first time the Coach was selected "Coach of the Year" (by The Sporting News, voting by fellow NFL Coaches, and by Pro Football Weekly, voting by sports writing correspondents in the 26 NFL cities) . . . first time to win three games in a row (they won four early in the year and finished off the regular season with six straight triumphs) . . first time to lead league (AFC) in holding the combined opposition to the lowest number of total points, 228 . . . first time to lead league (AFC) in holding the combined opposition to the lowest number of total points, 228... first time the Dolphins led the league (AFC) in rushing offense... first time one player was the best at his position in the National Football League, place-kicker Garo Yepremian was successful on 22 of 29 field goal attempts for a success average of .759... it was the first time the Dolphins beat Baltimore, the WORLD CHAMPIONS, winning two of three games, including one in pre-season Dolphins beat Baltimore, the WORLD CHAMPIONS, winning two of three games, including one in pre-season . . . first time to beat Oakland (the Dolphins won the only regular season game, 20-13) . . . first time to beat the New York Jets (they won both games) . . . first time a player scored three touchdowns in a game, Jim Kiick against Buffalo . . . and attendance-wise, it was the first year that they drew more than 70,000 at a home game (which they did four times including once in pre-season) . . . an added note on the subject of attendance . . . In . . . an added note on the subject of attendance . . In 1969, they averaged 34,688 at home during the regular season, and this was the previous Dolphin's high . . . in 1970, for seven regular season games at home they averaged 62,877.

Coach Shula's outlook: "We hope for continued improvement in all areas because of having one year of experience with a new system, plus the one year of experience gained by the many rookies that made the team last year.

As for potential strengths . . . the running game (the Dolphins were first in the AFC) . . . the passing of QB Bob Griese, helped by a fine group of receivers . . exceptional ability of return men with reference to the kicking game, Jake Scott on punts and Mercury Morris on kickoffs . . the place-kicking of Garo Yepremian . . and as for defense, it is to be remembered that the Dolphin's defense allowed the fewest number of points in the AFC, 228.

Concerning weakness . . . questionable depth . . . lack of size in linebackers . . . and the pass rush needs to be

In civic work in Miami, he has twice served as General Chairman of the Easter Seal Campaign. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the Crippled Childrens' Society, the Board of Trustees of Biscavne College, the Board of Directors of Boystown of South Florida, the Advisory Board of Florida Memorial College, and the Board of Governors of St. Jude Childrens' Research Hospital in Memphis, Tennessee. He has served as Chairman of the Biscavne College Fund Raising Drive, as Co-Chairman of the Greater Miami Summa Campaign for Notre Dame and is currently National Alumni Fund Raising Chairman for Northern State College. He delivered the 1971 commencement address at Northern State College and received the Alumni Award for Excellence.

He was given the 1971 Good Samaritan Award by the Variety Club of Miami. Together with Coach Shula and the Miami Dolphins, he recently received the award from the Florida District of the American Advertising Federation . . "in recognition of their spectacular achievements in the National Football League's 1970 season which attracted nationwide attention to our State and contributed immeasurably to advertising all Florida."

The Dolphins' head man is a native of Sisseton, South Dakota. He began his college days at Northern State Teachers' College, Aberdeen, S.D., later transferring to the University of South Dakota. While a student at the university, he was a national debate champion. In addition, he was elected student government president of both schools, and president of both the South Dakota Student Federation and the statewide Collegiate Press Association. He received his AB and LLB degrees from the University of South Dakota

the University of South Dakota.

Immediately following the bombing of Pearl Harbor, Robbie enlisted in the Navy, took part in five South Pacific theatre invasions, and received the Bronze Star for his efforts. He served until late 1945.

Prior to opening his first law practice in Mitchell, S.D., Robbie served on the teaching staffs of the College of St. Catherine and Dakota Wesleyan University. In 1951 he became regional director of the Office of Price Stabilization in Minneapolis.

In 1948, he was elected to the South Dakota Legislature and served as both a State Representative and minority leader of the Democratic Party. He quickly moved into the state chairmanship of the Democratic Party, a position he held from 1948-50. He ran for governor of South Dakota on the Democratic ticket in 1950.

Always active in urban affairs, he was author of the law which created the Minnesota Municipal Commission and chaired that body under the appointment of three governors from different political parties from 1959-65. He was a charter member of the Twin Cities Metropolitan Planning Commission, and he also served as the legal counsel to the Minnesota Legislative Committees and later for the United States Senate hearings on the Urban Affairs bills during the Kennedy Administration.

In 1965, Robbie served as a personal representative for Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey on the Inaugural Committee which planned the inauguration of

Joe Thomas has been talent director in building two expansion teams into title contenders in the NFL.

He was the first employee hired by the Miami Dolphins when the franchise was established in 1965, and previously had been player personnel director with the Minnesota Vikings.

Thomas' judgement of playing talent is based on years of experience as both a player and a coach, prior to moving into the front office of pro football.

As a player, he was an end at Ohio Northern University in Ada, Ohio, close by his hometown of Cortland. After graduation, he had a tour of Navy duty, obtained a master's degree and studies toward a doctorate at Indiana U.

His coaching career began in the high school ranks, at New Albany and Rensselear in Indiana, with stints at Indiana U. and DePauw University on the collegiate level. He coached in the pros at Baltimore and Los Angeles of the NFL and at Toronto in the Canadian League.

His player scouting duties for the Dolphins includes representation for the team in BLESTO-V, the pro scouting organization which includes such other NFL clubs as the Chicago Bears, Detroit Lions, Pittsburgh Steelers, Buffalo Bills, Baltimore Colts, as well as the Vikings.

Included among the present Dolphin squad who became standout players after being overlooked as early draft choices are the likes of tackle Norm Evans, picked in the AFL expansion draft after being a 14th round pick of Houston; punter-receiver Larry Seiple, a seventh round pick in 1967; defensive tackle Manny Fernandez, signed as a free agent in 1968; running back Jim Kiick, a fifth round draft pick in 1968; safety Jake Scott, a seventh round pick in 1970; linebacker Mike Kolen, a 12th round choice in 1970; guard Bob Kuechenberg, signed as a free agent in 1970; defensive back Lloyd Mumphord, a 16th round draft selection in 1969; and wide receiver Karl Noonan, a free agent in 1966.

He and his wife, Judi, are the parents of a one-year-old daughter.

When Don Shula was accorded "Coach of the Year" honors after his initial 1970 season as head coach of the Miami Dolphins, it marked the fourth time in his eight year coaching career in professional football that he had received such an accolade.

For seven seasons prior to coming to the Dolphins on February 18, 1970, he had been the head coach of the Baltimore Colts, and three times he was picked as NFL 'Coach of the Year''.

At the conclusion of this past season as the Dolphins had their first winning campaign in their five year history, he was selected 'Coach of the Year' by The Sporting News (voting by his fellow NFL coaches) and by Pro Football Weekly (voting by sports writers in the 26 NFL cities).

The year 1970 was a turn-around one for the Miami Dolphins. In 1969, they had won three games, lost ten and tied one. In Shula's first year, they won ten and lost four, and earned a place in the American Football Conference playoffs.

The first Shula season was very much one of first for the Dolphins . . . first time the coach selected "Coach of the Year" . . . first time to win three games in a row (they won four early in the year and finished off the regular season with six straight triumphs) . . . first time to lead the league (AFC) in holding the combined opposition to lowest number of total points . . . first time to beat Oakland, Baltimore, and the New York Lets.

lar season with six straight triumphs) . . . first time to lead the league (AFC) in holding the combined opposition to lowest number of total points . . . first time to beat Oakland, Baltimore, and the New York Jets.

At Baltimore, Shula's teams won 71 games, lost only 23 and four ties. This was a winning percentage of .755 and for those seven years (1963-1969) it was the best record in the NFL. Add his Dolphins mark of ten wins and four setbacks, and his eight year head coaching totals are 81 victories, 27 defeats and four ties, a winning percentage of .750.

Coach-of-the-Year recognition first came to Shula in 1964, in his second year at the Colts helm when his team won 12 games and lost two, and this included an 11-game winning streak which gave them the Western Division championship. In 1965, when they tied for the Western Division crown, and in 1966, the Colts gained Playoff Bowl victories. The 1967 season was somewhat frustrating in that their only loss, in the final game, to the L.A. Rams, cost them the Coastal Division title. The Colts and Rams had identical records, 11-1-2, but the Rams got the division championship because of scoring more points in the two meetings between the two teams. It was fitting that Shula and George Allen, then the L.A. mentor, shared 1967 "Coach of the Year" honors. The "Coach of the Year" accolade came to Shula for the third time in 1968 when the Colt won 13 games, lost one, won the Western Division crown, and the NFL title before the campaign ended in the well-remembered Super Bowl loss to the New York Jets.

A native of Painesville, Ohio, Shula was a rugged defensive back in the NFL for seven years—two with Cleveland, four with the Colts, and one with the Redskins in that order. As he entered the coaching field, he first served one year at the University of Virginia as an assistant and another at University of Kentucky. At Kentucky, two of his fellow assistant coaches were Bill Arnsparger and Howard Schnellenberger. Arnsparger, who had been on his staff at Baltifore, and Schnellenberger were the first two aides hired by Shula after taking the Miami job.

Shula entered the pro coaching field with the Detroit Lions in 1960 where he worked as an assistant to George Wilson, the man he was eventually to succeed with the Dolphins. Of his Detroit experience, Shula says: "I've always been thankful for the years I had to work with George Wilson."

In college days, Shula was a halfback at John Carroll University, in Cleveland, and the other halfback was Carl Taseff, now the Dolphins offensive backfield coach. Shula and his wife Dorothy are the parents of five chil-

BILL ARNSPARGER Head Defensive Coach, Linebackers

Bill Amsparger continued a separate long coaching relationship with Don Shula in 1970 when he was the first assistant coach named for the Dolphins after Shula moved to Miami from Baltimore.

Arnsparger had been the defensive line coach at Baltimore under Shula since 1964 and prior to that time both had served as assistant coaches at the University of Kentucky for the 1959 season.

As chief defensive strategist coach of the linebackers, Arnsparger's knowledge and coaching skills helped the Dolphins in 1970 to cut their points allowed the opposition from 332 in 1969 to just 228, best in the league.

He also had the key responsibility of developing young linebackers Mike Kolen and Doug Swift into highly regarded starters.

A native of Paris, Ky., Arnsparger, born December 16, 1926, played football at Paris High School, served in Marine Corps during World War II, and played tackle at Miami (O.) University following the war.

His initial coaching assignment as as an assistant for one year at Miami as offensive line coach, followed by positions at Ohio State U. (1951-53), Kentucky (1954-61), Tulane (1962-63) and then joining the pros at Baltimore.

Arnsparger and his wife, Betty Jane, have two children, David and Mary Susan. The family lives in Miami Lakes.

HOWARD SCHNELLBERGER Head Offensive Coach, Receivers

The head of the Dolphins' offensive coaching corps, Howard Schnellenberger is the third member of the assistant coaching staff at the U. of Kentucky in 1959 to help guide Miami's present pro team. The other two being Don Shula and Bill Arnsparger.

Schnellenberger's first coaching assignment was at Kentucky that year, although he was not a stranger to the Wildcats. His high school play was at Louisville (Ky.) Flaget and he was an All-America end at Kentucky, graduating in 1956. After college, he played with Hamilton of the Canadian League in 1956, spent a year in the Army, then played for British Columbia in the CFL in 1958.

From there he went to Kentucky and in 1961 joined Bear Bryant's staff at the U. of Alabama, becoming offensive coach of Alabama's national champions of 1964 and 1965.

He moved into the pro coaching ranks in the 1966 season as the offensive end coach of the Los Angeles Rams.

He was with the Rams until 1970 when he renewed his coaching association with Don Shula by directing the Dolphins' offensive strategy and also serving as coach of receivers.

Under Schnellenberger, the Dolphins' ball-control offense developed into the AFC's top in rushing, with 2,082 yards, and the passing attack was second best in pass completions, with 53.2 per cent. The balance of the Dolphins' attack is indicated by the near-even yardage recorded by rushing (2,082) and passing (1,957).

Schnellenberger and his wife, Beverlee Ann, live in Miami Lakes and they have three sons, Stephen, Stuart and Tim.

MONTE CLARK Offensive Line

Monte Clark began his coaching career last season with the Dolphins and drew the tough task of forming a solid offensive line that would both protect the passer and perform the task of making the running game go.

As a rookie coach, he performed admirably.

The number of times that a quarterback was tackled attempting to pass dropped from 53 in the 1969 season to 36 last year, with seven of those in the first game., while the rushing attack was No. 1 in the AFC. (This was achieved despite some injuries, particularly at the end of the season, when two inexperienced men, Bob Kuechenberg, at left guard, and Carl Mauck, at center, were starters in the last three regular season games, as the Dolphins were needing every victory in order to make the playoffs.)

Clark switched to the coaching ranks last year after 11 years as a top lineman in the NFL. He began his pro playing career as a defensive man for the San Francisco 49'ers in 1959 as a fourth round draft pick from his alma mater, Southern California. He was traded to the Dallas Cowboys for the 1962 season and moved into an offensive tackle slot, then traded to Cleveland for the 1963 season where he was a starting right tackle for the Browns in four NFL title games. The 1969 season was his last as a player.

Clark was born in Fillmore, Calif., on January 24, 1937, and played high school ball at Kingsburg, Calif. He matriculated at Southern California and was captain of the Trojans his senior year, 1958.

He married the former Charlotte Palm in 1957 and they have three sons, Bryan, Randy and Eric, making their home in Southwest Miami.

TOM KEANE Defensive Backfield

Tom Keane is the lone holdover on the Dolphins' staff from the original crew of assistants that started with the club in 1966.

As the defensive backfield coach, he had the responsibility of developing a young crew of backs into a mature corps of pass defenders: rookies Jake Scott and Curtis Johnson, second-year man Lloyd Mumphord and three-year veteran Dick Anderson. The foursome performed so

well, with 21 interceptions among them, that only 17 aerial touchdowns were scored on the team, as compared to 25 the season before and a new team record was set for fewest TD passes.

Keane is a 15-year veteran, having begun his coaching career in 1956 with the then Chicago Cardinals, following a knee-injury that cut short his playing career after the 1955 campaign. He went to Calgary in the Canadian League in 1960, was head coach and general manager of Wheeling in the United League 1961-1964; an assistant with the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1965 before the all-new Miami Dolphins staff in 1966.

His college playing career began as a freshman starting quarterback for Ohio State's 1944 national championship team, followed by two years at West Virginia U. after service in the Navy during World War II.

In the pros, he was a defensive back in the NFL, starting with Los Angeles in 1948, then in 1952 with both Dallas and Baltimore, making all-pro with the Colts 1953 thru 1955 when he was traded to Chicago, when the knee injury finished his playing time.

He was born September 7, 1926 at Bellaire, Ohio. He and his wife, Mary, live in Southwest Miami and have four children, Candi, Tom, Tim and Mary.

MIKE SCARRY Defensive Line

Mike Scarry returned to coaching last year to bring 21 years of experience to the Dolphin's staff. He had served as a scout for the Rams, 49'ers and Cowboys during the 1969 season. Prior to that time, he had combined 17 years of college coaching, three years as a procoach and pro playing experiences in both the NFL and the old All-America Conference into a reputation as one of the best in defensive knowledge.

Mo—as he is called by many—began his coaching career as head coach at Western Reserve in 1948 and continued at Santa Clara (1950-52), Loras (Ia.) College (1953), Washington State (1954-55), U. of Cincinnati (1956-62), and as head coach at his alma mater, Waynesburg (Pa.) College (1963-65). From Waynesburg, he went into the pro ranks, as defensive line coach for the Washington Redskins from 1966 thru 1968.

A native of Duquesne, Pa., where he was born on February 1, 1920, Scarry was a standout center and line-backer at Waynesburg in his colltge days and included among his memoirs is the rare feat of playing in the first televised football game, Fordham vs. Waynesburg in 1939.

After graduation, he also had the unusual honor of being captain of two pro teams in two different leagues

who won league championships. In 1945, he was captain of the Cleveland Rams, winners of the NFL title, and in 1946 when the Rams moved to Los Angeles, he became captain of the first Cleveland Browns team, coached by Paul Brown, in the All America Conference.

Ht was second team all-pro in the NFL in 1945 and first team all-AAC in 1946.

He and his wife, Elizabeth, have eight children.

CARL TASEFF Offensive Backfield

Returning to the coaching ranks last season after two seasons with CEPO, one of the pro scouting organizations, Taseff had the enviable task of blending the power running of Larry Csonka and Jim Kiick with the swift speed of Mercury Morris.

The results were outstanding, with Csonka the No. 2 runner in the AFC, Kiick No. 7 and Morris coming through with the best rushing average (6.8) for any player with at least 50 carries for tht season.

Taseff was ideal for the position with the Dolphins in the first season on complete merger of the AFL and NFL, as his coaching and playing experience included stints in both leagues.

As a player, he was with Cleveland for 1951 asd 1952 and Baltimore from 1953 theough 1961 in the NFL and then finishing out his playing career with Buffalo in the AFL in 1962.

For one year he was out of football, in the insurance field, before reentering the game as an assistant coach with Boston of the AFL in 1964. In 1965, he switched to Detroit of the NFL until 1968 when he joined CEPO scouting organization.

Like other members of the Dolphin staff, he has had close contacts with Don Shula, having played with the Miami head coach at John Carroll University and with both the Browns and the Colts.

Taseff was born September 28, 1928 in Cleveland.

In addition to his offensive backfield duties, he is also responsible for scouting upcoming opponents each week.

He has two taughters, Cynthia Sue and Susan Aliie.

BOB LUNDY Trainer

A member of the original Dolphin staff, Lundy is starting his sixth season as the team trainer. It is also his 12th season in professional football, having served for six years as assistant trainer with the Detroit Lions before coming to the Dolphins.

Born in Wollaston, Mass., the 35-year-old Lundy attended North Quincy (Mass.) High School and obtained a degree in physical education at Boston U.

He started his career as a trainer at Boston U.; later was as assistant trainer at Indiana U., where he also took advance courses in the field. He also spent four years as head trainer at the University of Detroit, leaving there to join the Lions.

Lundy lives in South Miami with his wife, Alice, and three sons, Bobby, Billy and David.

HOWARD TWILLEY, used mainly against bump-and-run type of defense to take advantage of his quickness . . had several big games . . . a great blocker in running

KARL NOONAN, when called upon, delivered in clutch situations . . . he's the only Dolphin to have played in every regular season game for five years . . . also holds for extra points and field goals . . .

WILLIE RICHARDSON, started with the Dolphins late, coming in a trade after training camp was virtually over, and was bothered by a hamstring. However, he showed some of his form of the past, particularly against the Philadelphia Eagles, and in the play-off game against Oakland . . .

OTTO STOWE, Miami's top draft choice, last January. An all-Big Eight star from Iowa State, he has good speed, is an excellent receiver, and was rated extremely high in all scouting reports . .

. . MARV FLEMING, he was very instrumental in the development of the Dolphins running game. Coach Shula believes he's as good a tight end blocker as there is in football, and he's a fine possession receiver .

JIM MANDICH, good as a blocker on short yardage and offensive goal line situations when Dolphins frequently use two tight ends. Should continue to develop

LARRY SEIPLE . . . Versatile! He's the team punter, can play tight end, be used as a wide receiver, or a defensive back, and in college was a running back . . .

Offensive line . . . Coach Shula points out, "Our running game went from worst in the AFL to best in the AFC, and the offensive line deserves its share of the credit. Our style was a hard-nosed running attack and an accurate passing game triggered by Bob Griese. There was also great improvement in protection for the passer.

DOUG CRUSAN, tackle . . . his progress helped in the improvement of the offensive line . .

NORM EVANS, tackle . . . still rather young at 28, but now a seven-year veteran. He received the award last December as team's unsung hero, which lets you know that he's the steady, dependable sort . . .

MAXIE WILLIAMS, guard . . . bothered by injuries in the latter stages of the season, but made his contribution, especially when he filled in at center in the Atlanta game .

LARRY LITTLE, guard . . . selected as the team's best offensive lineman. Coach Shula says: "He showed signs of becoming one of the outstanding offensive lineman in pro football. He has everything that it takes. With a year's experience in our system, he should begin to get all-league recognition." This has already started, as the

NFL Players Association named him the best offensive lineman in the AFC . .

BOB DeMARCO, center . . . a veteran who came to the Dolphins in a trade with the Pittsburgh Steelers (his previous 9 seasons had been with the St. Louis Cardinals, and he went to the Steelers in pre-season) . . .

BOB KUECHENBERG was a starter at guard at the end of the season, as was CARL MAUCK, at center; JIM LANGER, guard, and WAYNE MOORE, tackle, are also good young offensive line prospects . . .

Quarterbacks . . . BOB GRIESE . . . he had an excellent year considering he was working with a new system. In the opinion of Coach Shula, there are not many quarterbacks that mentally could have accomplished what he did in 1970. Shula feels that he is an extremely accurate passer and an exceptional quarterback who knows how to run an offense, and the Dolphins mentor feels he is one of the fine young signal-callers of pro football...

JOHN STOFA . . . Coach Shula feels he is a good back-up quarterback. He is strong, has an accurate arm and is a fiery competitor . .

GEORGE MIRA . . . hardly a new name on the Miami scene, as he was a famous player at the University of Miami. With the addition of Mira to the squad Coach Shula said: "We now have three quarterbacks who have all proven that they can win.'

Running Backs . . . LARRY CSONKA . . . he has gained more ground rushing than any other member of the Miami Dolphins in the five year history of the team. He has gained more in one year (Three years total, 1,980 yards in 462 carries, and last year, for a Dolphins record, 874 yards in 193 tries). Coach Shula: "Csonka is coming off a fine year. His brutal play, both as a runner and a blocker, helped give the Dolphins the style they were so successful with late in the year."

JIM KIICK . . . he has gained more yards rushing and pass-receiving than any other member of the Dolphins and pass-receiving than any other member of the Dolphins in the five year history of the team (In his three years... rushing, 1,854 yards, and receiving, 1,362 yards). He was the only player in the AFL, in 1968, and the only one in the AFC, last year, to rank in the top ten in rushing and pass-receiving, being 7th in the former and 10th in the latter, both seasons. Coach Shula: "He's a money ball player, being at his best in the clutch. He has a high percentage of getting the job done on third down plays." percentage of getting the job done on third down plays, either as a runner or receiver.

MERCURY MORRIS . . . he achieved the status of alternate regular last year (with Csonka and Kiick) as the season developed, after having missed all of training camp, and the early regular season games because of a leg injury. He finished the season with a fine rushing average of 6.8 yards, as he carried 60 times for 409 yards. He caught 12 passes for 149 yards and in his specialty. He caught 12 passes for 149 yards and in his specialty, he returned 28 kickoffs for 812 yards, including a 96-yard TD return. Coach Shula on Mercury: "He was hampered by a training camp injury, but came back to give our offense an exciting new dimension."

STAN MITCHELL . . . in his sixth season with the Dolphins, HUBERT GINN, who played mostly on the special teams last year, third year man BARRY PRYOR, draft choice LEROY BYARS, and free agents

MANNY FERNANDEZ . . . defensive tackle, according to Shula he is "something special." Shula adds: "He is a defensive tackle without great size who has the ability to rush the passer." Fernandez, who came to the Dolphins as a free agent, has been picked as the "best defensive lineman" in each of his three years with the team. As a rookie, he was a defensive end, and the last two seasons, a defensive tackle.

BILL STANFILL . . . a defensive end, the Dolphins number one draft choice two years ago, was the team's rookie of the year in his first season . . . last season he was bothered by a dislocated thumb in the early going. Potentially, a top defensive lineman . .

JIM RILEY . . . a defensive end, is going into his fifth season, has been a regular in most of the last four campaigns . .

JOHN RICHARDSON . . . defensive tackle, also goes into season five, and most of the time has been a first stringer . . .

FRANK CORNISH . . . a big guy, 285, who had most of his previous experience with the Chicago Bears, and in his first starting assignment with the Dolphins was awarded the game ball. BOB HEINZ, 270, another defending the starting assignment with the Dolphins was fensive line veteran may also be tried at offensive tackle in early training camp . . .

Coach Shula has indicated that more work is needed to get the job done in the defensive line, and that he was disapppointed that his men didn't get to the passer more often. Rookies expected to be looked at closely are DALE FARLEY, second round pick from West Virginia, who can play either defensive end or linebacker, VERN DEN HERDER, a rangy football-basketball playing defensive end from Central Iowa (ninth round) and big RON MAREE, 285-pound defensive tackle (10th round) from Purdue. Free agent MAULTY MOORE, 265, from Bethune-Cookman, is another possibility. Bethune-Cookman, is another possibility.

As for linebackers, two good young ones, DOUG SWIFT, a free agent, and MIKE KOLEN, a 12th round draft choice, proved they belong a year ago, according to Shula, and both in the coach's opinion should improve with experience.

Veteran NICK BUONICONTI, in Shula's opinion, is "an exceptional linebacker, and gave the defense direction and leadership." Buoniconti is an all-time AFL linebacking choice, and after seven years at Boston, was the Dolphins most valuable player in 1969, and best defensive back

Farley, mentioned earlier, and DENNIS COLEMAN, sixth round choice from Ole Miss, are possibilities among the new men. Veteran TED DAVIS, taxi squad member RANDY EDMUNDS (a first stringer in 1969), DICK PALMER, JESSE POWELL (mostly special teams) and ED WEISACOSKY (on injured reserve last year) are holdowers with varying degrees of experience. holdovers with varying degrees of experience.

Concerning the cornerbacks, CURTIS JOHNSON, a rookic fourth round draft choice a year ago, became a first team man. Coach Shula says of Johnson: "He is one of our better athletes who was thrown in as a rookie and

he had some great plays, and also made some mistakes. I'm confident he has what it takes to be a fine corner-back."

And the second s

LLOYD MUMPHORD, a second year man, was the other starting corner most of the season and Shula has said: "He's a 'big play' cornerback, one who always contributes by making spectacular plays. He scored two touchdowns last year, one on an interception, and the other on the return of a blocked field goal."

TIM FOLEY, a third round draft choice in 1969, was bothered most of the season by injuries. However, he contributed on the special teams. He is considered to have a good potential. DEAN BROWN was active and also on the taxi squad last year. Seventh round draft choice RON DICKERSON will be given a good look at as a corner and as a safety. And so will LONNIE HEPBURN, 13th round, from Texas Southern.

At the safety spots, both returnees did well last year. JAKE SCOTT, at free safety, was the Dolphins "rookie of the year," and according to Shula: "He was a rookie who played like he had been back there all his life. His potential is unlimited." As a punt returner, the cold blooded Scott brought back 27 for 290 yards, including one for 77 yards and a TD in the late season Baltimore at at Miami game. at Miami game.

DICK ANDERSON, strong safety, will be entering season number four. He has intercepted more passes than any other Dolphin (19), and often makes a good return with his interceptions. He has a steadying influence in the deep defensive backfield, and his versatility extends to the return of punts and puiting.


Veteran BOB PETRELLA, an original Dolphin, returns for his sixth season, and aforementioned rookie draft choices Dickerson and Hepburn are also safety possibilities, as is Dean Brown.

Seiple, listed above among the tight ends, is steady as a punter, and Yepremian was excellent last year as a place-kicker.

The schedule doesn't get any easier. In the East division of the AFC, the Dolphins will be part of a fivesome that includes the Baltimore Colts, Super Bowl champs, the New England Patriots, one of the most improved teams in pro football, bolstered by quarterbacks Jim Plunkett and Joe Kapp, and this year the New York Jets will have Joe Namath back, and ditto the Buffalo Bills with reference to O. J. Simpson. The Bills also have QB Dennis Shaw, the AFC "Rookie of the Year" last season. This could possibly be the toughest and most exciting division in pro football in 1971. New teams for the Dolphins in the regular season will be the Los Angeles Rams, Green Bay Packers, Chicago Bears and Pittsburgh Steelers. The schedule doesn't get any easier. In the East division Bay Packers, Chicago Bears and Pittsburgh Steelers.

Ticket-wise, at this writing, things are going good for the Miami franchise. The 1970 season brought out the development of the hard core Dolphin Fan. The season ticket sale has gone over 40,000 . . . 50,000 is predicted before the opening of the first regular season game. Last year, the Dolphins had a previous all-time season ticket high of 26,161 . . . the year before it was 17,478 . . . the year before it was 14,924 . . . the year before it was 13,050, and in the rookie season of 1966, the season ticket sale was 12,503.

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

1970

JANUARY 17—Western All-Stars crushed an Eastern unit coached by Miami's George Wilson, 26-3, in AFL All-Star finale. Other Dolphin participants were Jim Kiick, Larry Little, Tom Goode, Bill Stanfill, and Nick Buoniconti.

JANUARY 27—Dolphins' traded first-round draft choice to Cleveland in exchange for Paul Warfield, star wide receiver of the Browns. Miami, selecting third among the 26 clubs, subsequently made Michigan tight end Jim Mandich its second-round pick.

FEBRUARY 1—The American and National Football Leagues officially merged in accordance with terms of a 1966 agreement, the Dolphins thereby becoming a member of the Eastern Division of the American Conference of the National Football League.

FEBRUARY 18—Joseph Robbie announced appointment of Don Shula as head coach, succeeding George Wilson. Shula, with additional aititle of vice president and with ownership in the team, promptly proclaimed intentions of hiring "a competent staff that will be the foundation for building a winning football team in Miami."

FEBRUARY 25—Announcement made by Shula that Bill Arnsparger had been hired as linebacking and head defensive coach. At same time, defensive line coach Les Bingaman was retained for work on special assignments. Howard Schnellenberger named receivers' and head offensive backs and scouting.

MARCH 2—Carl Taseff joined coaching staff as assistant and was assigned to offensive backs and scouting.

MARCH 9—Announcement made that Tom Keane would continue as defensive backfield coach under Shula.

APRIL 2—Plans for new permanent training facility at Biscayne College, commencing with 1970 season, unveiled by Managing General Partner Joseph Robbie.

APRIL 8—Monte Clark named offensive line coach.

APRIL 5—Nothe Clark named completion of his coaching staff with the particle of the particle

APRIL 11—Dolphins announced plans for enlarging men scooming system through affiliation with BLESTO-V, a highly computerized scouting combine.

APRIL 20—Shula announced completion of his coaching staff with the naming of Mike Scarry as defensive line coach.

APRIL 25—Forty-seven players, most of them veterans, underwent a special one-day indoctrination session at the University of Miami. The orientation program was repeated one week later for a contingent of rookies.

MAY 1—Shortly before expiration of inter-conference trading period, Dolphins completed two deals: Tom Beier to San Francisco for Lance Olssen and Dick Westmoreland to Minnesota for Bookie Bolin.

MAY 18—Marv Fleming signed Dolphin contract after playing out his option with Green Bay. By agreement with the Packers, Jack Clancy was sent to Green Bay as compensation for Fleming.

JULY 12—Rookies report for first day of training camp at Dolphins' new training headquarters, Biscayne College, in North Miami.

JULY 13—James L. Davis named as limited partner in ownership structure.

AUGUST 29—Dolphins score their first win over Baltimore, 20-13, at Orange bowl before 76,712. It was also Miami's fourth straight

AUGUST 31—Center Bob DeMarco came to the Dolphins from Steelers in trade for a draft choice (DeMarco had previously played eight years for the St. Louis Cardinals).

SEPTEMBER 16—Wide receiver Willie Richardson came to the Dolphins from Steelers in a trade for a draft choice.

OCTOBER 2—Linebacker Mike Kolen was named as the winner of the Thomas Fitzgerald Memorial Award presented annually to the outstanding rookie in training camp.

OCTOBER 3—Miami 20 Oakland 13—Dolphins score first win ever over Raiders, at Orange Bowl.

OCTOBER 10—Miami 20, New York Jets 6—Jets held to two field goals as Dolphins score first win ever over New York team.

OCTOBER 18—Garo Yepremian sets a club record of four field goals as Dolphins score first win ever over New York team.

OCTOBER 25—75,313 see Dolphins lose to Cleeveland, 28-0, at Orange Bowl. This was the largest regular season crowd to ever watch the Dolphins.

NOVEMBER 22—Miami 34, Baltimore 17—This victory at Orange Bowl took place only three weeks after Baltimore had beaten Dolphins 35-0 at Baltimore and was to prove most important in Miami's climb towards playoffs.

NOVEMBER 30—Miami 20, Atlanta 7 at Atlanta—Miami's first Monday night game (ABC-TV).

NOVEMBER 30—Running Back Larry Csonka gained 108 yards against Atlanta and one week later 115 yards against Boston.

DECEMBER 13—Miami 16, New York Jets 10 at Orange Bowl before 75,099 (the Dolphins thus swept the yearly two game series with the Jets after never having beaten them before).

DECEMBER 15—Quarterback Bob Griese and wide receiver Paul Warfield named co-winners of Dolphins Most Valuable Player Award for 1970.

DECEMBER 20—Miami 45, Buffalo 7 at Orange Bowl before 70,990—this victory cinched a playoff position for the Dolphins—first time ever in a playoff.

DECEMBER 20—Running back Jim Kiick sets club record with three touchdowns rushing against Buffalo.

DECEMBER 27—Oakland 21, Miami 14—Dolphins lose their first playoff game before 54,401 on a rather muddy field at Oakland.
