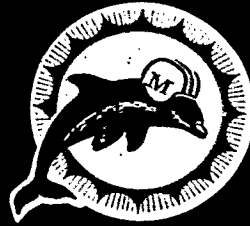


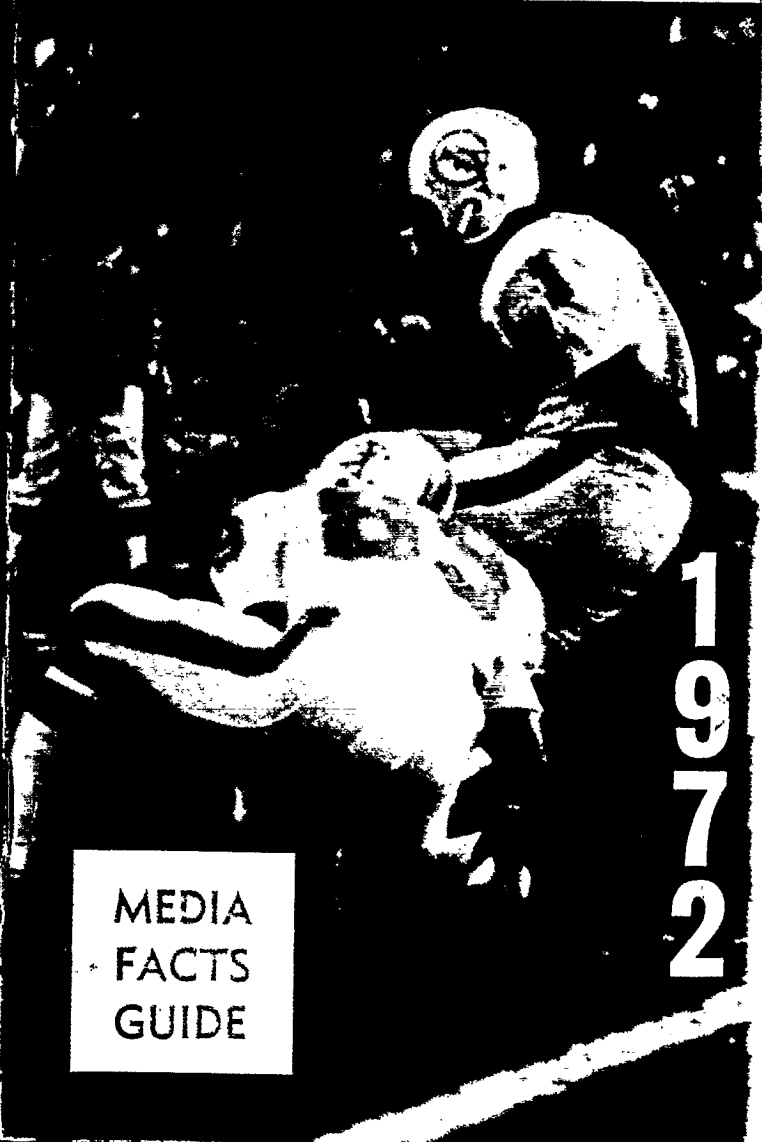

For Don Quixote, it was just a dream . . . but for Joseph Robbie, it was more than a dream. It was a desire, a goal; indeed it was his life.

Back in 1965, the reactions were varied when this Minnesota attorney proposed professional football for Miami. Sure, the critics said, Miami has supported the NFL Playoff Bowl, but this guy is trying to give us "the other league."

Undaunted, Joseph Robbie put together an organization which was granted an AFL expansion franchise for the 1966 season. "My goal," Robbie announced as far back as the first year of the club's existence, "is to build a championship team. By doing that, we'll do well at the gate."

Washington Post Sports Editor Shirley Povich bridged the six years when he recently wrote: "George Allen (Washington's miracle worker) has been upstaged. Joe Robbie . . . has moved in on him . . ."

"The genius of the Dolphins head man is now visible in big numbers. His team's spiraling season ticket sales tell that Robbie in 1970 . . . (acquired) . . . a new and successful head coach, plus 43,708 more customers to each of the Dolphins' home games . . ."

"Robbie turned Dolphin history completely around. The transformation was instant."

The formative years were highly complicated and difficult ones for the 55-year-old Dolphin leader. His team was

DON SHULA
Head Coach and Vice-President



Don Shula is just nine triumphs away from joining an elite group of eight men who have managed the magical plateau of 100 or more victories as a pro football head coach. And, should he reach the plateau this year, he would become the first coach in pro history to win 100 or more in the first 10 years of his coaching career.

There must have been some doubt in his mind in February, 1970, that that goal would be within his grasp in 1972, for he had just left the highly successful Baltimore Colts and come to Miami, where the team had finished 3-10-1 a year earlier. "Don't expect miracles," Shula warned.

The 42-year-old, five-time "Coach-of-the-Year" used good, solid coaching to take the Miami Dolphins from the cellar to the Super Bowl in two years. It was no miracle.

"You set a goal to be the best and then work hard every hour, every day striving to reach that goal. If you allow yourself to settle for anything less than No. 1, you're cheating yourself."

The magic of this dynasty-builder has taken Miami — both the city and its team — by storm. Miamians who once could get a 40-yard-line ticket on game day, no longer have that luxury, because advance sales have hit record levels.

As for the team, All-League offensive guard Larry Little best typifies the Miami feeling. When this year's schedule was announced, someone cautioned Little, "Wow, it's gonna be rough playing Minnesota twice in 22 days."

"Look," Larry retorted, "they got to play US twice in 22 days."

Such is the spirit of Donald F. Shula, head coach, vice president and limited partner of the defending American Football Conference champion Miami Dolphins.

Shula's record at Miami is both unprecedented and unexpected. Through two seasons he is 20-7-1, having taken a 10-4 team to the playoffs in 1970 and a 10-3-1 team to the Super Bowl last year. By comparison, Miami was just 15-39-2 in its initial four years before Shula.

At Baltimore, he had a 71-23-4 mark, which was the best record of any NFL coach during those seven years. Over-all, he has an enviable 91-30-5 record, which is 75.2 percent or three wins in four outings. Playoff-wise, Shula is 6-5, including NFL and AFC championship victories and four playoff triumphs. He is 0-2 in Super Bowl competition and would like to change that as soon as possible.

Shula also has the distinction of having been involved in two sudden death playoffs, including the 82 minute, 40

second triumph at Kansas City last year. With Baltimore's Tom Matte as his substitute-quarterback, he dropped a similar decision to Green Bay in 1965.

For his outstanding achievements, Shula has been named the most outstanding coach in five of his nine years as a head coach.

Coach-of-the-Year recognition first came to Shula in 1964, in his second year at the Colts' helm. Baltimore and Los Angeles had identical 11-1-2 records in 1967 but the Rams got the division championship because of scoring more points in the two meetings between the two teams. It was fitting that Shula and George Allen, then the L.A. mentor, shared 1967 "Coach-of-the-Year" honors. The accolade came to Shula for the third time in 1968 and has come in each of his two Miami seasons.

A native of Painesville, Ohio, Shula was a rugged defensive back in the NFL for seven years — two with

ASSISTANT COACHES

BILL ARNSPARGER

Head Defensive Coach, Linebackers

In discussing the work Bill Arnsparger has done at Miami, one has only to look at the points-allowed statistics: in 1969 (the last pre-Arnsparger year), 332; in his first season here, 1970, just 228, and last year an amazing 174.

Arnsparger is part of the Don Shula system. They began working together as assistant coaches at the University of Kentucky in 1959. Bill joined Shula at Baltimore in 1964 and they've been side-by-side ever since.

Arnsparger had the responsibility of developing young linebackers Mike Kolen and Doug Swift when he came here, and they, of course, have played a key role in Miami's success, working as bookends for the great Nick Buoniconti.

Arnsparger is a native of Paris, Ky., where he played football at Paris High. Following a Marine tour of duty during WWII, he played tackle at Miami (O.) University.

His first coaching assignment was the offensive line at

his alma mater. He later coached at Ohio State U. (1951-53), Kentucky (54-61) and Tulane (62-63).

Arnsparger (born Dec. 16, 1926) and his wife Betty Jane have two children, David and Mary Susan, and live in Miami Lakes.

HOWARD SCHNELLENBERGER

Head Offensive Coach, Receivers

Charged with guiding the offense and working with the Miami receivers, Howard Schnellenberger is entering his seventh year as a pro coach. Prior to coming to Miami in 1970, he had served the Los Angeles Rams. Like head coach Don Shula and Bill Arnsparger, Schnellenberger received his early training as an assistant coach at the University of Kentucky.

Following a prep career at Louisville Flaget High and an All-America college career as a Kentucky end, Schnellenberger played for Hamilton in Canada for a year, served a year in the Army and then played the 1958 season for Canada's British Columbia.

He then returned to Kentucky as a stepping stone to Bear Bryant's staff at Alabama in 1961. He was the offen-

sive coach of the 1964 and '65 National Champions. His pro career began the next season at L.A., where he guided the offensive ends until he rejoined Shula here.

Schnellenberger has been a strong voice in Miami's ball-control, which has been tops in the AFC for two straight years. Last year, his charges gained 2,429 yards for a bruising 5.0 yards-per-carry average. Bob Griese was the AFC's leading passer, gaining 2,089 yards on 55.1 percent of his 263 passes (145 completions). And, with 4,518 net yards, passing and rushing the Dolphins were the No. 2 total offense team in the AFC.

Schnellenberger and his wife Beverlee Ann live in Miami Lakes with their three sons, Stephen, Stuart and Tim.

MONTE CLARK

Offensive Line

Monte Clark knew when he came to Miami in 1970, it would be no easy task to form the Miami offensive line, which had allowed its top quarterback to be sacked 53 times in just nine games. He decided to take the mental

approach: make the players believe in what they're doing and establish a sense of pride.

It worked.

Not only has Miami had the top rushing attack in the AFC for two years, its quarterbacks were sacked just 25 times during the entire 1971 season. Further evidence is a statement by All-Pro guard Larry Little. While discussing the 1972 schedule, someone pointed out he'd have to go against the Minnesota Vikings twice in 22 days. "Yeah," he said. "They got to go against Miami twice in 22 days."

Clark has not only built a formidable offensive front five, he's developed a good "bench" and no longer worries about spelling a player for one or two plays. His replacement will do the job just as well.

Clark came to Miami after 11 years as a top lineman in the NFL. He began his pro playing career as a defensive player for San Francisco as a fourth round draft choice from Southern California. Traded to Dallas in 1962, he was moved to the offensive tackle slot. He went to Cleveland in 1963 and was starting right tackle in four NFL title games. He gave up the game he began in 1959 after the '69 season, to come to Miami as a coach.

While here, he's also aided in Miami's recruitment of several ex-Browns, including Jim Langer and Bob Matheson.

Clark was born in Fillmore, Calif., on Jan. 24, 1937. He played ball at Kingsburg (Calif.) High and went on to become captain of the 1958 USC team, his senior year.

Clark and his wife Charlotte live in Southwest Miami with their three sons, Bryan, Randy and Eric.

TOM KEANE
Defensive Backfield

Tom Keane is the only member of the Dolphin coaching staff who remembers first-hand the early Dolphin days. He joined the club in 1966.

As the defensive backfield coach, he has the responsibility of building a strong corps of pass defenders. Last year, he set the mold of Jake Scott, Dick Anderson, Curtis Johnson and Tim Foley, who had a combined total of six years' service when the 1971 season opened. The quartet allowed just 10 touchdown passes, a team low, and they also picked off 15 interceptions.

Keane is a 16-year veteran, having begun his coaching career in 1956 with the then-Chicago Cardinals following a knee injury which cut short his eight-year playing career in 1955. He moved to Calgary in the CFL in 1960 and was head coach and general manager of Wheeling in the United League from 1961-64. He became an assistant at Pittsburgh in 1965 before coming to Miami.

His college playing career began as a freshman starting quarterback for Ohio State's 1944 national champions, followed by two years at West Virginia U. after service in the Navy during WWII.

In the pros, he was a defensive back in the NFL starting with Los Angeles in 1948, then in 1952 with both Dallas and Baltimore, making All-Pro with the Colts in 1953. In 1955, he was traded to Chicago where the knee injury finished his career.

He was born Sept. 7, 1926, at Bellaire, Ohio. He and his wife Mary live in Southwest Miami and have four children, Candi, Tom, Tim and Mary.

MIKE SCARRY
Defensive Line

When Mike Scarry answered the call of Don Shula and returned to the coaching ranks in 1970, he brought 21 years' experience to the operation. Mike had been scout for the Rams, 49ers and Cowboys in 1969, before he came to Miami to shore up the defensive line.

Prior to that time, he had combined 17 years of college coaching, three seasons as a pro coach and pro playing experiences in both the NFL and All-America Conference into a reputation as one of the best in defensive knowledge.

"Mo" began his coaching career as head coach at his alma mater, Western Reserve, in 1948-49 and continued at Santa Clara (1950-52), Loras (Ia.) College (1953), Washington State (1954-55), U. of Cincinnati (1956-62), and as head coach at the school he played for, Waynesburg (Pa.) College (1963-65). From Waynesburg, he went into the pro ranks as defensive line coach for the Washington Redskins from 1966 thru 1968.

A native of Duquesne, Pa., where he was born on Feb. 1, 1920, Scarry was a standout center and linebacker at Waynesburg in his college days and played in the first televised football game against Fordham in 1939. He went into the Army in 1942, and entered pro football after leaving the service in 1944. He was graduated from WR in 1947.

He had the unusual honor of being captain of two teams in two different leagues which won league championships. In 1945, he was captain of the Cleveland Rams, winners of the NFL title, and in 1946 when the Rams moved to Los Angeles, he became captain of the first Cleveland Browns team, coached by Paul Brown, in the All-America Conference.

He was second team all-pro in the NFL in 1945 and first team All-AAC in 1946.

He and his wife, Elizabeth, have eight children.

CARL TASEFF
Offensive Backfield

One might think it's easy being the offensive backfield coach for the Miami Dolphins with "pupils" like Larry Csonka and Jim Kiick.

But, for Carl Taseff — who doubles as the team's advance scout of coming opponents — it's no easy task. "I only get to see the Dolphins on Monday nights and the late-season Saturdays," Taseff says.

A former teammate of Head Coach Don Shula's at John Carroll University and in the pros at Cleveland and Baltimore, Taseff rejoined Shula here after serving the CEPO scouting firm for two years. His success here is pointed up by Miami's fantastic offensive statistics, which have included being No. 1 in rushing in the AFC the past

two years. In addition, Kiick and Csonka have shown rare form both as rushers and pass receivers.

Taseff was ideal for the position with the Dolphins in the first season on complete merger of the AFL and NFL, as his coaching and playing experience included stints in both leagues.

As a player, he was with Cleveland for 1951 and 1952 and Baltimore from 1953 through 1961 in the NFL, finishing out his playing career with Buffalo in the AFL in 1962.

For one year he was out of football, in the insurance field, before reentering the game as an assistant coach with New England of the AFL in 1964. In 1965, he switched to Detroit of the NFL until 1968 when he joined CEPO scouting organization.

Taseff was born September 28, 1928, in Cleveland. He has two daughters, Cynthia Sue and Susan Alice.

PERSONNEL DEPARTMENT

BOBBY BEATHARD Player Personnel Director

With football in his blood, it was only natural that Bobby Beathard turn to a front office position when he was cut as a player.

Beathard was a quarterback and safety prospect at Washington and Minnesota and hooked on with San Diego—for five games—in 1960. That was back in the late 50s and early 60s. Since then, he's discovered a world of happiness in the field of scouting.

His major responsibility at Miami is coordinating the scouting efforts of three other full-time scouts and a pair of part time talent-seekers. They deal only with college material and will be working closely with the results of the computer scouting firm BLESTO-VIII to continue the development of "good, young talent for the Miami Dolphins."

The 35-year-old Beathard, older brother of St. Louis quarterback Pete, came to Miami after four years as a member of the Atlanta scouting force. Prior to that he was a scout for Kansas City and an aide to Al Davis when he was commissioner of the American Football League.

An honorable mention All-America at Cal Poly (Calif.),

Beathard is the father of four children—three sons and a daughter. Divorced, he lives on Key Biscayne.

A. PAT PEPPLER Director of Pro Scouting

Pat Peppler is well-experienced at working with veteran ball players on a championship team: he came to Miami from Greey Bay, where he was Personnel Director during the Pack's prime years and assistant to the General Manager in 1971.

His major responsibilities at Miami are negotiations with veteran ball players at contract time and keeping up with every player in the league, so as to know who's worthy of consideration when waiver lists come out.

He considers his major accomplishment at Green Bay the 1965 draft when the Pack drafted and signed three first-round picks: Donnie Anderson, Jim Grabowski and Gale Gillingham.

Peppler, 40, joined the Miami club in the spring of 1971, following a nine-year stint at Green Bay. During that time he was in charge of all scouting and player selection in the college draft, as well as working with the veterans at contract time.

A three-sport star at Shorewood (Wisc.) High, Peppler attended Michigan State University where he lettered in baseball and basketball.

After graduating in 1948, Peppler played pro baseball briefly before beginning a successful career coaching in the East Lansing area. He coached state championship teams in football before taking a position as assistant coach at North Carolina State for eight years, working with centers and linebackers. In 1962, he switched to Wake Forest and in 1963, went to Green Bay as Director of Player Personnel.

Peppler is married and has six children, Pam, Sue, Walter, Terry, John and Jim. The family lives in Plantation.

BOB LUNDY Trainer

A member of the original Dolphin staff, Lundy is starting his seventh season as the team trainer. It is also his 13th season in professional football, having served for six years as assistant trainer with the Detroit Lions before coming to the Dolphins.

Born in Wollaston, Mass., the 36-year-old Lundy attended North Quincy (Mass.) High School and obtained a degree in physical education at Boston U.

He started his career as a trainer at Boston U.; later was an assistant trainer at Indiana U., where he also took advance courses in the field. He also spent four years as

head trainer at the University of Detroit, leaving there to join the Lions.

Lundy lives in South Miami with his wife, Alice, and three sons, Bobby, Billy and David.

DAN DOWE Equipment Manager

Head equipment manager of the Dolphins since 1968, he joined the original cast of the club in 1966 as assistant equipment manager.

A native of Brighton, Mass., he graduated from Brighton High School, where he participated in all sports.

He formerly worked for the Raytheon Corp. in the industrial electronics field, for the Martin Co. as an aerospace lab technician and as a police officer for the Miami Beach suburb of Bal Harbour before joining the Dolphins.

A Navy veteran, he saw four years of destroyer duty during WWII, taking part in invasions in North Africa, Normandy and Okinawa, where his ship was hit by a suicide plane in 1944.

Dowe and his wife, Virginia, live in North Miami, along with their young son, Darin.

struggling on the field and not doing much better at the gate. 1969, for example, saw the club slump to a dismal 3-10-1 record. Average home attendance for seven games was less than 35,000.

The man who had brought this dream so close (the AFL-NFL merger had already begun) knew that something had to be done. He put on his thinking cap and came up with the man whose seven-year coaching record was the best in the game for those years, Donald F. Shula. He gave the Baltimore Colt genius the one thing he wanted: part ownership of a pro football team.

The Dolphins were on their way, with Joseph Robbie lighting their path to the American Football Conference playoffs in 1970 and the Super Bowl in 1971. The Dolphins have now broken every past record for season-ticket sales in the NFL and will play to 10 straight sellouts in the Orange Bowl this year.

But Joseph Robbie isn't satisfied. Having tasted success and seen its by-products (25,000 screaming fans greeting you at the airport after winning the longest game in history), Robbie wanted more. The 1971 Football News "Man-of-the-Year" set his sights on Super Bowl VII.

What kind of a man, one wonders, would have the tenacity to tackle one problem after another and keep his pledge to a city by staying rather than selling the franchise.

He has been a strong impact on pro football in the few years he has been in the game. His was a strong voice in the reassignment of teams in the AFC in the new NFL of 1970. He has served as chairman of the AFL Players' Relations Committee which represented the owners in negotiations with the league's player's association. Currently he is one of six owners on the NFL Management Council Executive Committee. He has been a member of the Chicago Tribune All-Star Game Committee. He was also named Owner-of-the-Year by the Twin Cities Minute Men.

He is a religious man . . . a family man . . . a devoted husband . . . a community builder . . . and one of the most determined businessmen in the nation.

In the seven years the Dolphins' managing general partner has lived in Miami, he has become involved in one worthy cause after another. Recently, he donated \$14,000 worth of life-saving equipment to the Heart Association of Greater Miami on the condition it be used at every Orange Bowl game played as a further protection for anyone who might be felled.

He has contributed scholarships to the University of Miami, and through Dolphin pre-season charity games

and other activities, the member of the Greater Miami Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors has been responsible for raising just under one-half million dollars for such area benefactors as the Crippled Children's Society, Variety Children's Hospital, Goodwill Industries, the Greg Stead Fund, Boystown of South Florida, Big Brothers, Archbishop's Charities, Operation Self-Help and the Gold Coast Sports Camp for underprivileged children.

Realizing a need for community involvement in higher education, Robbie and the Dolphins have also helped the Biscayne College, Barry College and Florida Memorial College. In addition, Robbie's sense of responsibility doesn't stop with the South Florida boundaries. He has long been a donor to the U. S. Olympic Fund.

Robbie is a native of Sisseton, South Dakota. He began his college days at Northern State Teachers' College in Aberdeen, S. D. He later transferred to the University of South Dakota and it was there he became a national debate champion. In addition, he was elected student government president of both schools and president of both the South Dakota Student Federation and the statewide Collegiate Press Association. He received his AB and LLB degrees from the University of South Dakota.

Immediately following the bombing of Pearl Harbor, Robbie enlisted in the Navy, took part in five South Pacific theatre invasions, and received the Bronze Star for his efforts. He served until late 1945.

Prior to opening his first law practice in Mitchell, S. D., Robbie served on the teaching staffs of the College of St. Catherine and Dakota Wesleyan University. In 1951 he became regional director of the Office of Price Stabilization in Minneapolis.

In 1948, he was elected to the South Dakota Legislature and served as both a State Representative and minority leader of the Democratic Party. He quickly moved into the state chairmanship of the Democratic Party, a position he held from 1948-50. He ran for governor of South Dakota as the Democratic candidate in 1950.

Always active in urban affairs, he was author of the law which created the Minnesota Municipal Commission and chaired that body under the appointment of three governors from different political parties from 1959-65. He was a charter member of the Twin Cities Metropolitan Planning Commission, and he also served as the legal counsel to the Minnesota Legislative Committees and later for the United States Senate hearings on the Urban Affairs bills during the Kennedy Administration.

In 1965, Robbie served as a personal representative for Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey on the Inaugural Committee which planned the inauguration of both Humphrey and President Lyndon B. Johnson.

He holds the distinction of being the first recipient of the J. Ernest O'Brien Award given in 1966 by the National Association of Tobacco Distributors to the outstanding state trade association executive in the United States.

Here in Miami, Robbie is active in the Downtown Kiwanis Club and is a member of the La Gorce Country Club, the Palm Bay Club and the Jockey Club.

Robbie and his wife Elizabeth have 10 children. The family makes its home in Miami Shores.

Prospects In General

1971 . . . it was a very good year.

The Don Shula system clicked almost to perfection. Bob Griese-to-Paul Warfield for the bomb; Larry Csonka up the middle; Jim Kiick doing it all; Nick Buoniconti with another great tackle; Garo Yepremian kicking another . . . the list appears endless.

The Dolphins went 10-3-1 in the regular season, to lead the Eastern Division of the American Football Conference; then beat Kansas City, 27-24, in the longest game in history to gain a championship berth with Baltimore.

Another Dolphin took the spotlight in this game. Safety Dick Anderson returned an interception 62 yards as six Dolphins — Jake Scott, Mike Kolen, Tim Foley, Doug Swift, Bill Stanfill and Bob Heinz, in that order — threw picture-perfect blocks to allow Anderson to score. Miami beat Baltimore, 21-0, for the American Conference championship.

In just six years, the Dolphins had accomplished something no other club that young had managed: get to the Super Bowl.

With winning comes individual acclaim, and the Dolphins were accorded their share, as 12 players, the coach and the managing general partner were all honored following the season.

Joseph Robbie, the man who put the Miami Dolphins together and kept them driving for the top, was named football's Man-of-the-Year by the Football News and Owner-of-the-Year by the Minute Men of Minneapolis-St. Paul. Shula was accorded Coach-of-the-Year honors for the fifth time in nine years and Anderson, Buoniconti, Csonka, Bob DeMarco, Norm Evans, Manny Fernandez, Griese, Little, Morris, Scott, Stanfill, Warfield and Yepremian were honored.

In addition, the Dolphins established, extended or tied 148 individual and team records — a phenomenal figure for a six-year-old club.

By now, it has to be apparent that the Dolphins, and Miami fans relished the 1971 season (forget the Super Bowl!). The peak of fan excitement probably came when more than 25,000 fans were at the airport as the team returned from the Kansas City triumph.

But now it is 1972 and nobody is more aware of this than Robbie and Shula. On the business side, Robbie reports that the record-breaking season ticket sale will approach 70,000. In the initial season six years ago, it was 12,503. In the final pre-Shula campaign (1969) it was 17,478.

As for Shula, the man who gets to the office at 7:30 a.m. daily, let us get his report:

Offense

WIDE RECEIVERS — "If Paul Warfield isn't the greatest, then I don't know. We think he is. On the other side, a gutsy, not too big guy (by football standards), Howard Twilley has caught many important passes, and like Warfield is an excellent crack-back blocker. Karl Noonan, the only Dolphin who has played in every regular season game in the team's history, fills in well for Warfield, and we like the way he holds the ball for Garo. Otto Stowe, our top draft choice a year ago, was bothered by injuries and sickness in 1971. We think he has a great future. Jack Clancy returns from the taxi squad, and the draft choices at the wide receiver positions are Ed Jenkins (11th) from Holy Cross, and Al Hannah (16th) from Wisconsin." Prior to the printing of this guide, Marlin Briscoe became a Dolphin. He led the AFC in receiving in 1970 with 1,036 yards and was All-AFC.

INTERIOR LINE — "We go along with the strengthened belief that Larry Little, our right guard, is just about the best offensive lineman in the game. We also have great admiration for the work of Norm Evans (the last of the expansion draft picks) at right tackle. In the two play-off games leading to the Super Bowl he had to face Buck Buchanan and Bubba Smith. Doug Crusan, left tackle, and Bob Kuechenberg, left guard, had improved seasons last year. And the veteran on our squad, center Bob DeMarco, seemed to appreciate the Super Bowl appearance more than anybody. Jim Langer, guard or center, has been helpful the last two years. Wayne Moore, tackle, a big guy with potential, was bothered with injuries most of last season. Wayne Mass, also at tackle, lends experience. Bill Griffin, tackle, was on the taxi squad last season. Offensive linemen drafted were Al Benton, tackle (4th) from Ohio University, and Bill Adams guard (7th) from Holy Cross."

TIGHT ENDS — "We think Marv Fleming to be the best blocking tight end in the game of football today. He also caught some important passes for us, particularly the one, with 1:36 to play, in the Kansas City playoff, which tied the game, 24-24. Third-year man Jim Mandich, has a great future. He can block; he can catch passes. Veteran Larry Seiple is our punter, but we are aware that he can play tight end, and in his versatile way, several other positions. A new tight end prospect is Ashley Bell, of Purdue, who was drafted 12th."

QUARTERBACKS — "It has never been my way to go overboard on a young man, but how can you ask more of a person than what Bob Griese has done for us in the last two years? I think he is the best present-day pro quarterback. We acquired Earl Morrall from Baltimore on waivers and expect him to work hard in pre-season camp for the back-up spot. Earl's won a lot of ball games for me (at Baltimore). He's an intelligent quarterback and a fine individual. George Mira was in the wings last year and is coming off arm surgery during the off-season. We're going to take a long look in pre-season training at our taxi man of last year, Jim Del Gaizo. Craig Curry, a Coral Gables High grad who played at the University of Minnesota, was drafted eighth."

RUNNING BACKS — "We've never gone real strong on statistics, except for that one on the final scoreboard, but we do know that Larry Csonka became the first Dolphin to gain more than 1,000 yards (1,051) in one season, and that Jim Kiick for the fourth straight year was credited with more than 1,000 yards (1,076) rushing and

pass-receiving. Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid they are called. Also, and this is big also, there is Mercury Morris. We know he has been excellent on kickoff returns in his Dolphin career. We also know that he can run from scrimmage. Injuries have slowed Mercury at wrong times in the past two years, but this is another campaign. Hubert Ginn, Charley Leigh and Terry Cole are experienced running backs returning. Gary Kosins, drafted in the 3rd round, compiled interesting rushing statistics at the University of Dayton, and he has good size."

Defense

ENDS— "Bill Stanfill had a much improved season last year after being slowed by injuries in 1970. And Jim Riley, on the other flank, was certainly improved also. Vern Den Herder, a rookie in 71, was a reserve who also played on the special teams. Larry Ball was drafted in the fourth round from the University of Louisville."

TACKLES— "Manny Fernandez had another good year, and we hope he has another, and another. He is a strong one. Bob Heinz, who can play tackle or end, was invaluable last year. Huskies Frank Cornish and John Richardson give more veteran experience. Maulty Moore was a taxi man last season. As for the upcoming prospects, we are looking forward to seeing our No. 1 draft choice, Mike Kadish, from Notre Dame. We particularly like his size. Bill Davis, a defensive tackle from William and Mary was drafted 15th." Veteran Jim Dunaway came to Miami in a trade with Buffalo just before this publication went to press. He was a nine-year regular for the Bills.

LINEBACKERS— "Co-Captain Nick Buoniconti returns (the other co-captains were Griese and Little), and that means the Dolphins have an experienced middle linebacker. He's been in pro football nine years, and made All-League in the AFL six times. He has been the man calling Miami's defensive signals for three seasons. We think of Doug Swift and Mike Kolen as youngsters from our first Dolphins season. Both have excellent potential as outside linebackers. We're all going into our third Dolphin season. Bob Matheson, who came on a trade last year from Cleveland, was a back-up man at all three line-backing spots, and had one starting assignment. Jesse Powell, was also a reserve linebacker besides seeing service on the special teams. Willie Jones, from the University of Tampa was drafted 14th."

CORNERBACKS— "Curtis Johnson, Tim Foley, and Lloyd Mumphord all have young experience. Game by game, over the last two years, there have been many occasions to say kind words about all three. Defensive backs drafted include: Charles Babb (5th) from Memphis State; Greg Johnson (9th) from Wisconsin, and Vern Brown (17th) from Western Michigan."

SAFETIES— "Free safety Jake Scott is an extraordinary player and we're also high on strong safety Dick Anderson. Veteran Bob Petrella lends experience. A strong safety possibility is Archy Robinson, who was drafted 13th."

KICKERS— "How can we think there is anybody better than Garo as a place-kicker? Seiple is a steady punter. At the same time, we'll look over the new prospects at these two special positions real carefully. Remember, two years ago, a free agent by the name of Yepremian asked for an opportunity."

Cleveland, four with the Colts and one with Washington. As he entered the coaching field, he first served one year at the University of Virginia as an assistant and another at the University of Kentucky. He entered the pro coaching field with the Detroit Lions in 1960, serving as an assistant to George Wilson, Miami's first head coach.

Shula has been associated with many of his assistants for some time. At Kentucky, for instance, two of his fellow assistant coaches were Bill Arnsparger and Howard Schnellenberger. Arnsparger was also on his Baltimore staff and they were the first two aides hired for the Miami job.

As a halfback at John Carroll University in Cleveland, Shula played next to fullback Carl Taseff. And, while at Baltimore one of his teammates was Tom Keane.

Shula and his wife Dorothy are the parents of five children—David, Donna, Sharon, Anne and Michael. They make their home in Miami Lakes.

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

1965

AUGUST 16 — Miami receives first AFL expansion franchise, with Joseph Robbie and Danny Thomas as recipients.

OCTOBER — "Dolphins" is nickname for Miami team.

NOVEMBER — Mrs. Robert Swanson of West Miami winner of Miami's nickname contest; wins two lifetime passes to home games. 20,000 entries.

NOVEMBER 27 — Miami picks QB Rick Norton, Kentucky, and FC Jim Grabowski, Illinois, in first round of college draft. End John Roderick, SMU, first redshirt pick.

DECEMBER 16 — Miami Dolphins, Ltd., organized as a Florida limited partnership with Joseph Robbie as managing general partner; Danny Thomas Sports, Inc., as sole other general partner.

1966

JANUARY 15 — Expansion draft. Miami picks Dave Kocourek, Wahoo McDaniel, Billy Joe, Billy Neighbors first.

JANUARY 29 — George Wilson is first head coach.

JUNE 8 — Merger of AFL into NFL announced; Pete Rozelle as commissioner; common draft in 1967; World Championship Game at end of 1966 season.

JULY 5 — Dolphins open first training camp at St. Petersburg Beach; 83 players.

AUGUST 6 — Dolphins play and lose first game ever, 38-10, at San Diego before 25,712.

AUGUST 7 — Training site moves to St. Andrews School, Boca Raton.

AUGUST 12 — Dolphins play and lose first home game at the Orange Bowl, 33-0, to Kansas City before 36,366.

SEPTEMBER 2 — Joe Auer returns opening kickoff 95 yards for TD in first regular season game. Oakland wins, 23-14, before 26,776 at Orange Bowl.

SEPTEMBER 9 — George Wilson Jr. sets first Dolphin League record with 483 yards on 10 punts against New York Jets in Orange Bowl.

OCTOBER 16 — Dolphins win first ever, 24-7, over Denver.

DECEMBER 18 — John Stofa debuts for Dolphins and passes for four TDs to upset Houston, 29-28.

1967

MARCH 14 — Miami picks QB Bob Griese, Purdue, in first round of college draft. Griese first player taken by AFL team; fourth to go over-all.

MAY 20 — Dolphins conduct first tryout camp at St. Andrew's.

JULY 22 — Dolphins hold first public intrasquad scrimmage in Ft. Lauderdale, with 6,112 in Lockhart Stadium. Defense "won," 27-0.

JULY 29 — Dolphins score first-ever pre-season victory, 19-2, over Denver.

AUGUST 19 — First Inter-League game a 27-17 loss to Atlanta.
SEPTEMBER 17 — After four minutes in season-opener, QB John Stofa breaks his ankle and Griese takes over to beat Denver, 35-21.

1968

JANUARY 30 — Dolphins pick RB Larry Csonka, Syracuse, and OT Doug Crusan, Indiana, in first round of college draft.
AUGUST 17 — Dolphins win first-ever over NFL foe, 23-7 over Philadelphia.

1969

JANUARY 28 — Dolphins pick DT Bill Stanfill, Georgia, in first round of college draft.
MARCH 24 — Dolphins obtain LB Nick Buoniconti from Patriots in trade for QB Kim Hammond and LB John Bramlett.
MAY 16 — Robbie announces five prominent Miamians are now limited partners in ownership of the Dolphins. They are H. Earl Smalley, Harper Sibley Jr., Wilbur Morrison, Frank J. Callahan and James W. McLamore. Robbie becomes the majority owner of the franchise.
MAY 30 — Four additional limited partners in ownership of the Dolphins announced: William Snow Frates, Peter T. Fay, Robert L. Floyd and Ray H. Pearson.
JULY 23 — Morris S. Burk becomes a limited partner in the ownership structure.
SEPTEMBER 11 — Cornerback Lloyd Mumphord receives first Thomas Fitzgerald Memorial Award.
OCTOBER 4 — Dolphins tie Oakland, 20-20.
NOVEMBER 30 — Miami plays first regular season "home" game outside Miami, losing 38-23, to New England.

1970

JANUARY 27 — Miami trades first draft pick to Cleveland for WR Paul Warfield and subsequently end Jim Mandich, Michigan, is first man picked in draft (second round).
FEBRUARY 1 — AFL and NFL officially merge in accordance with terms of a 1966 agreement and the Dolphins become a member of the Eastern Division of the American Conference of the NFL.
FEBRUARY 18 — Don Shula is appointed head coach with additional title of vice president and with ownership in the team.
APRIL 11 — Dolphins join computer scouting firm, Blessto-VIII.
APRIL 13 — Dolphins' first-round draft choice next year awarded to Baltimore by Commissioner Rozelle as compensation for loss of Shula.
APRIL 25 — First pre-training camp Introdoctrination Camp is held by Shula and his staff for veterans, with rookies reporting one week later.
MAY 18 — TE Marv Fleming signs with Miami after playing out his option with Green Bay. By agreement, Jack Clancy is sent to Green Bay as compensation for Fleming.
JULY 12 — Rookies report to training camp at Dolphins' new training headquarters, Biscayne College, in North Miami.
NOVEMBER 30 — Miami becomes a part of Monday night football, beats Atlanta, 20-7.

1970 SEASON — First victories ever over Oakland, New York Jets (twice), Baltimore. Also, first post-season playoff game, against Oakland.

1971

JANUARY — Don Shula named pro "Coach-of-the-Year" by The Sporting News and Pro Football Weekly.
JANUARY 27 — Miami picks WR Otto Stowe, Iowa State, first (but second round) in college draft.
MAY 27 — Dolphin season ticket sales go over 40,000.
NOVEMBER 7 — Dolphins score first shutout win ever, 34-0 over Buffalo.
NOVEMBER 29 — Dolphins win eighth straight, 34-3 over Chicago, for club record and longest win streak of season in NFL.
DECEMBER 19 — 76,812, largest regular-season crowd ever to watch Dolphins, see team beat Green Bay, 27-6, to win first divisional championship.
DECEMBER 25 — Dolphins win longest game in pro football history. (82 minutes, 40 seconds), 27-24 over Kansas City, to gain AFC title berth.

1972

JANUARY 2 — Dolphins shut out Baltimore for first time in 97 games, 21-0, to win AFC title and gain berth in Super Bowl. Also largest home crowd ever, 78,629.
JANUARY 16 — Dolphins lose to Dallas, 24-3, in Super Bowl VI.
JANUARY — Honors bestowed on many Dolphins. Robbie is Football News "Man-of-the-Year"; Shula is Football News NFL "Coach-of-the-Year" and 13 players receive various honors: Dick Anderson, Buoniconti, Csonka, Bob DeMarco, Norm Evans, Manny Fernandez, Griese, Larry Little, Mercury Morris, Jake Scott, Stanfill, Warfield, Garo Yepremian.
FEBRUARY 1 — Dolphins pick DT Mike Kadish, Notre Dame, as first round draft choice.
APRIL 14 — Dolphins announce season ticket sales of 61,186, which eclipses all prior NFL records.
