JOSEPH ROBBIE Managing General Partner



On January 19, 1974, Joseph Robbie, Managing General Partner of the Miami Dolphins, stood in front of a tuxedo-clad throng in Washington, D.C., and accepted the coveted Timmie Award. The citation read:

Touchdown Club of Washington, D. C. Board of Governors Award presented to Miami Dolphins for extraordinary achievement NFL 1970-73 54 wins 11 losses I tie

The man up front accepting the award was the man behind the record — Joseph Robbie, who met and conquered the challenge of professional football, Miami-style.

But, while he likes to revel in the euphoria of the immediate past that not only includes the amazing four-year record but victories in Super Bowl VII and VIII, Robbie always looks

ahead.
"Every day of my life I strive to have new goals," he says.

Dolphins' Coach Don Then he is likely to chuckle, point to Dolphins' Coach Don Shula, and laughingly aim for the target for the future:

"Now I want to strive for consistency."

That is Robbie's way of putting his finger on the Dolphins' goals following the amazing, historic climb from the difficulties of a new expansion franchise to an unprecedented winner while pulling together a city of diverse people in one massive source

"Community leaders have told me that the Dolphins are the

DONALD F. SHULA Head Coach - Vice President



Whenever Don Shula, the head coach of the Miami Dolphins, is asked to assess his place in history, he usually sidesteps the issue diplomatically by saying that historic assessments are made by historians.

But then Don Shula has made the historians' job easy, requiring only a quick review of the 1972 and 1973 seasons to establish his place among all the coaches who have prowled pro football's sidelines.

For during 1972 and 1973, Don Shula reached plateaus never before climbed in the history of organized pro football, which stretches all the way back to 1920 and the formation of the association that later became the National Football League.

During 1972, Don Shula accomplished two unprecedented feats:

—Directed the Dolphins through a 17-0 season, the first time any team ever had gone through regular season and post season action without a defeat.

Brought his victory total to 105, becoming the first coach in the NFL to ever reach the 100-victory circle in his first 10

During 1973, Don Shula added these accomplishments:

Became the first coach to win three consecutive American Conference championships and appear in three Super Bowl games in succession.

Became only the second coach in history — the late Vince Lombardi was the other — to win successive Super Bowls, which the Dolphins did by defeating Minnesota 24-7 in Super

—Added a 12-2 regular season record to 1972's perfect 14-0 mark for a two-year won-lost record of 26-2, the best in NFL history.

In addition, he lifted his four-year record since taking over at Miami to 46-9-1 in regular season games and 8-2 in post-season

ASSISTANT COACHES

MONTE CLARK Offensive Coach

Monte Clark has coached the Dolphins' offensive line for four years — and the Dolphins have led the AFC in rushing three times. In 1972, the Dolphins set an NFL rushing record and last year ranked second.



In 1973, the line led the NFL in pass protection (only 13 sacks) and all five regulars received post-season honors, either first or second team All-AFC or selection to the Pro Bowl. Guard Larry Little was an All-NFL choice. Clark's line also produced the holes that led to a rushing record in Super Bowl VIII.

sive responsibility. He already is recognized as one of the

Clark came to Miami after 11 years as a top lineman in the NFL. After being graduated from USC where he was captain be became it and the company of the compan tain, he began his pro career as a defensive lineman with San Francisco. Traded to Dallas in 1962, he was moved to offensive tackle. He went to Cleveland in 1963 and was the starting right tackle in four NFL title games.

Clark was born in Fillmore, Calif., played high school ball in Kingsburg, Calif. He and his wife, Charlotte, live in southwest Miami with their three sons, Bryan, Randy and

Eric.

VINCE COSTELLO **Defensive Coach**

Vince Costello, an outstanding linebacker for the Cleveland Browns and the New York Giants during his playing days, comes to the Dolphins for his first season after five years as an assistant coach with the Cincinnati Bengals.

One of Costello's prime re-



sponsibilities will be to work with the linebackers. Head Coach Don Shula says: "I was very impressed with Vince as a player, and more recently with the fine job he did in developing the young Cincinnati line-backers. He has all the qualifications necessary to replace a man of the caliber of Bill Arns-parger." Arnsparger left to Arnsparger left to become the head coach of the

New York Giants.

Costello played for the Browns for 10 years and with the Giants for two seasons. He was on several championship teams at Cleveland.

A graduate of Ohio University, Costello joined the Browns in 1956 after having played three seasons of minor league baseball. He is a member of the Ohio U. Hall of

A native of Magnolia, Ohio, Costello and his wife, Sally Ann, have six children — Carol, Kay, David, Ann, Susan and Mary Ann.

TOM KEANE **Defensive Backfield**

Tom Keane is the only Dolphin assistant coach who has been with the team its entire history — from the expansion team losses in the early years to consecutive Super Bowl championships.



As the defensive backfield coach, Keane's job is to build a strong pass defense, which he has — reflected by the fact the Dolphins set an NFL record in 1973 by allowing only five TD passes. In addition, strong safety Dick Anderson tied for the NFL individual lead in interceptions with eight. During the regular season, Keane's defensive backs were credited with 17 of Miami's 21 interceptions.

Keane is a 17-year pro coaching veteran. He began with the then Chicago Cardinals in 1956, moved to Calgary in the Canadian League in 1960. From 1961 through 1964 he was head coach and general manager of Wheeling in the United League. He also had one year at Pittsburgh before coming to the Dolphins in 1966.

As a collegian, Keane was the freshman quarterback on Ohio State's 1944 national championship club. After Navy service in World War II, he played two more seasons for West Virginia. As a pro defensive back, he was with Los Angeles in 1948, Dallas in 1952, Baltimore in 1954, and the ardinals in 1955 before a knee injury ended his career. With Baltimore, he was the first Colt to gain all-league status.

Keane was born in Bellaire, Ohio. He and his wife, Mary, live in southwest Miami and have four children, Candi, Tom, Tim and Mary.

BILL McPEAK Offensive Coach

Bill McPeak, whose pro coaching career spans 16 seasons, came to the Dolphins a year ago from the Detroit Lions. Last season he worked with Miami's offense and his main

responsibility was the pass. Because of a serious off-season illness, McPeak's responsibilities this year will depend on his health and availability.

"McPeak has been in every phase of the game - he's been a player, assistant coach, and head coach," says Head Coach Don says Head Coach Don

A star at the University of Pittsburgh, McPeak played for the Pittsburgh Steelers from 1949 through 1957, beginning his coaching career his last two years



with that club. He was with Washington from 1959 to 1965. the last five years as head coach, and then joined the Lions

Bill was born in New Castle, Penn. He has one daughter, Leslie Ann.

MIKE SCARRY **Defensive Line**

Mike Scarry enters the 1974 season with a quarter century of coaching to his credit. He has been the builder of the defensive line since 1970, and, under his tutelege, the Dolphins last year tied for the AFC lead in quarterback

sacks with 45.



Two members of the front four were singled out - end Bill Stanfill was All-NFL, and tackle Manny Fernandez was second team All-AFC and also the John Unitas Unsung Hero Award winner. End Vern Den Herder and tackle Bob Heinz were consistent performers.

Scarry began his coaching career at one of his alma maters, Western Reserve in 1948-49, and

continued at Santa Clara (1950-52), Loras, Iowa (1953), Washington State (1954-55), Cincinnati (1951-62), and Waynesburg (Pa.) College his first alma mater (1963-65). He played at Waynesburg for three years (including a

performance in the first college game to be televised), then finished his work for a degree while playing for the Cleveland Rams. He entered the pro coaching ranks with Washington (1966-68), and scouted for San Francisco in 1969 before coming to the Dolphins.

"Mo" began his pro playing career in 1944 after two years in the Army with the Cleveland Rams as a center and line-backer. He captained the Rams in 1945 to the NFL title. When the Rams moved to Los Angeles, Scarry, working for his degree, remained in Cleveland and joined the Browns of the All America Conference. He was the captain of the Browns in 1946 and thus in two years captained teams in two different leagues to championships.

Scarry is a native of Duquesne, Pa. He and his wife, Eliza-

beth, live in southwest Miami and have eight children.

BOB SCHNELKER Receivers' Coach

Bob Schnelker joins the Dolphins with 11 years of National Football League coaching experience prior to becoming a member of the World Champions. Schnelker coached two seasons at San Diego, one at Los Angeles and eight at Green Bay during the Packers' championship era.



The passing game will be his main responsibility as he works directly with Head Coach Don Shula with the wide receivers and the tight ends.

An alumnus of Bowling Green, Schnelker was drafted by Cleveland in 1953. He moved to New York and was a standout tight end in the Giants' champion-ship era (1954-60). He ended his

playing career in 1961 at Minnesota and Pittsburgh. He played in five NFL title games and two pro bowls.

Schnelker was born in Galion, Ohio. He and his wife, B. J., have three children.

CARL TASEFF Offensive Backfield

Carl Taseff has been the offensive backfield coach of the Dolphins for four years and in three of those seasons Miami led the AFC in rushing. In 1972, headed by the three-man backfield of Larry Csonka, Mercury Morris and Jim Kiick, the Dolphins set a NFL rushing



record of 2,960 yards. That same year, for the first time in NFL history, two members of the same backfield, Csonka and Morris, each went over 1,000 yards rushing.

A former teammate of Head Coach Don Shula at John Carroll University, and in the pros at Cleveland and Baltimore, Taseff rejoined Shula when the latter became the Dolphins' head

coach in 1970. Taseff came to Miami after spending two

years in the CEPO scouting organization.

As a pro player, Taseff was with Cleveland in 1951 and 1952, and Baltimore from 1953 through 1961. He finished his playing days with Buffalo in 1962. He still is in the Baltimore record book for the longest punt return (90 yards for a touchdown), and the longest return of a field goal attempt (99 yards).

Taseff was born in Cleveland. He has two daughters, Cyn-

thia Sue and Susan Alice.

PERSONNEL DEPARTMENT

A. PAT PEPPLER **Director of Pro Scouting**

Pat Peppler is expreienced at working with veteran foot-ball players on a championship team — he came to Miami from Green Bay, where he was Personnel Director during the Packers' prime years and was assistant to the General

Manager in 1971.



Peppler joined the Dolphins in the spring of 1971 following a nine-year stint at Green Bay. His major responsibilities at Miami are negotiations with veteran ball players at contract time and keeping himself informed about the abilities of all veteran players throughout the league.

Peppler attended Michigan State University where he lettered in baseball and basketball. After graduating in 1948, Peppler played pro baseball briefly before beginning a support of the property of the prope briefly before beginning a successful career coaching in the East Lansing area. He coached state championship teams in football before taking a position as assistant coach at North Carolina State for eight years, working with centers and

linebackers. In 1962, he switched to Wake Forest and in 1963 went to Green Bay as Director of Player Personnel.
Peppler is married and has six children. The family lives in Plantation.

BOBBY BEATHARD Director of Player Personnel

With football in his blood, it was only natural that Bobby Beathard turn to a front office position when his career as a player ended.

Beathard was a quarterback and safety prospect at Wash-ington and Minnesota and then



hooked on with San Diego — for five games - in 1960. At that point in time he discovered the field of scouting.

His major responsibility at Miami is co-ordinating the scouting efforts of four other talent seekers. They deal only with the colleges and work closely with the results of the computer scouting firm BLESTO-VIII to continue the development of

good young talent for the Miami Dolphins.

Beathard came to Miami in 1972 after four years as a member of the Atlanta Falcons scouting force. Prior to that he was a scout for Kansas City and an aide to Al Davis when Davis was commissioner of the American Football League.

Beathard is the father of four children — three sons and a daughter. He lives on Key Biscayne.

BOB LUNDY

Trainer

A member of the original Dolphins' staff, Bob Lundy is back as head trainer after a one-year absence. The 1974 season will mark his 14th in professional football, six with Detroit and eight with Miami.



Born in Wollaston, Mass., Lundy attended North Quincy High School and then obtained a degree in physical education at Boston University. He started his training career at Boston U. and then moved on to Indiana, where he also took advanced courses in the field. He spent four more years on the college scene, at the University of Detroit, before joining the Lions. Lundy lives in South Miami

with his wife, Alice, and three sons.

DAN DOWE **Equipment Manager**

Head equipment manager of the Dolphins since 1968, Dan Dowe joined the original cast of the club in 1966 as assistant equipment manager.

A native of Brighton, Mass., he graduated from Brighton

High School, where he participated in all sports.

A Navy veteran of WWII, he formerly worked for the Ray-theon Corp. in the industrial electronics field, for the Martin Co. as an aerospace lab technician and as a police officer for the Miami Beach suburb of Bal Harbour before joining the Dolphins.

Dowe and his wife, Virginia, live in North Miami along with

first enterprise the people of Miami have ever been totally behind," says Robbie. "There are 1.2 million people in Dade County (Miami) and two million more on the Gold Coast (50 miles in either direction) and most of them are working people. They buy their cars on time, have a few beers on payday and pull for the Dolphins every time out.

Our football team belongs to people who never had a team of their own before. We get 91 per cent of our fans from within 50 miles of the stadium. They're mostly working people whites, blacks, Latins. There's a deep empathy between them

and the team.

That deep empathy, that bringing together of people in support of the aqua and orange is best reflected in the fact that the Dolphins stand No. 1 all-time among the NFL's 26 teams in sea-

son ticket sales for a single season.
It all began on August 16, 1965, when Robbie was formally granted a franchise for Miami, a city that had failed in its only previous attempt to support pro football. But Robbie determined that Miami could do it, although he found himself involved only by fortuitous circumstance. An attorney by profession, Robbie only came into the picture when one of his clients expressed interest in a franchise for Philadelphia.

Joe Foss, then the commissioner of the AFL, and I had been classmates in college and our friendship went a long way back," says Robbie. "When I approached Joe about a Philadelphia franchise, he told me the stadium there was in litigation. He said there would be a good chance of getting a team for Miami but not for Philadelphia. I told my client. He was not

interested in Miami.

'So I decided to apply for the franchise there. The rest is his-

tory.'

History shows years of struggle before the ultimate success story was finally written. It wasn't even until 1968, in their third season, that the Dolphins fans supported Robbie's vision that the struggle would wind up in success.

The date was August 31, 1968. The lure was the Baltimore Colts, with Johnny Unitas at quarterback. The response was a crowd of 68,125 fans rushing to the Orange Bowl to see the Dol-

phins tangle with the Colts.

"That's when I knew beyond all doubt that we would succeed

in our struggle," Robbie remembers.

While that 1968 game showed Robbie Miami would support pro football in a manner which it had to in order to keep the product viable, possibly the most important decision made by Robbie didn't occur until 1970.

The actual date involved then was February 18, 1970, the day Robbie presented Don Shula as the new head coach of the Dolphins. The Robbie-Shula combination clicked instantly. That first season Shula took a team that had a 3-10-1 record the year before and turned it into a 10-4 winning record in 1970.

A year later the Dolphins captured the American Conference championship and on January 14, 1973, reached the pinnacle of success by beating Washington 14-7 in Super Bowl VII for the championship of the National Football League. The Dolphins made it two in a row by beating Minnesota 24-7 in Super Bowl VIII.

Robbie's success story, however, isn't limited to the Dolphins. He is and has been a key executive in the NFL's inner councils, currently serving as one of six owners on the Execu-

tive Committee of the NFL Management Council.

But Joseph Robbie's interests don't stop with football. He believes in working with and for his community. "If we expect this area to support us," he emphasizes, "we must support the area." And, in the years he has run the Dolphins, Robbie has

run all around Florida immersing himself in one worthy cause after another.

Section of the section of the section

Robbie, who is a member of the Greater Miami Chamber of Commerce and United Fund Board of Directors, the Board of Directors of Jackson Memorial Hospital, and the Downtown Kiwanis Club, has through pre-season charity games and other activities been responsible for the contribution of approximately one million dollars for such benefactors as the Crippled Children's Society, Variety Children's Hospital, Goodwill Industries, the Greg Stead Fund, Boystown of South Florida, Big Brothers, Archbishop's Charities, Operation Self-Help, Kiwanis Youth Foundation and the complete financing of the Miami Dolphins-Larry Little Summer Camp for underprivileged children.

He also is chairman of the Executive Committee of the Metro Dade Community Relations Board and is general campaign chairman for the Heart Association of Greater Miami. He twice headed the Easter Seal Campaign and serves on the Board of Directors of the Dade Foundation.

Through Robbie and because of his interest in community support of higher education the Dolphins have also helped Biscayne College, Barry College, the University of Miami, Florida Memorial College, and Miami Dade Community College. Biscayne College has conferred on Robbie an honorary Doctor of

Laws Degree.

Robbie, 57, is a native of Sisseton, South Dakota. He began his college years at Northern State Teachers' College in Aberdeen, South Dakota. He later transferred to the University of South Dakota, where he became a national debate champion. In addition, he was elected student government president of both and the president of the South Dakota Student Federation and the statewide Collegiate Press Association. He received his AB and LLB degrees from the University of South Dakota.

Immediately following the bombing of Pearl Harbor, Robbie enlisted in the Navy, took part in five South Pacific theatre invasions, and received the Bronze Star for his efforts.

He served until late 1945.

During his early law practice, Robbie served on the teaching staffs of the College of St. Catherine and Dakota Wesleyan University. In 1951 he became regional director of the Office of Price Stabilization in Minneapolis.

In 1948, he was elected to the South Dakota Legislature and served as both a State Representative and minority leader of the Democratic Caucus. He was state chairman of the Democratic Party from 1948 to 1950. He ran for governor of South

Dakota as the Democratic candidate in 1950.

Always active in urban affairs, he was author of the law which created the Minnesota Municipal Commission and chaired that body under the appointment of three governors from different political parties from 1959-65. He was a charter member of the Twin Cities Metropolitan Planning Commission, and he also served as the legal counsel to the Minnesota Legislative Committees and later for the United States Senate hearings on the creation of the Department of Urban Affairs in the Cabinet during the Kennedy Administration.

In 1965, Robbie served as the personal representative for Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey on the Inaugural Committee which planned the inauguration of both Humphrey and President Lyndon B. Johnson. He currently is chairman of the

Dade County Democratic Executive Committee.

Robbie and his wife, Elizabeth, had 11 children. Their daughter, Kathleen, lost her life in a drowning accident at Acapulco in 1971 at the age of 22. The family has established scholarships for underprivileged students in her memory. The family makes its home in Miami Shores.

action while annexing Coach of the Year honors for the seventh time in his 11-year tenure with the Baltimore Colts and the Dolphins.

At Baltimore, he had a 71-23-4 record, for an over-all mark of 117-32-5 that has left little doubt that he is, at age 44, right at the top of his profession.

What great design and/or philosophy has brought the coach of the Miami Dolphins to that juncture of history?

None. At least that's the way Shula feels about it.

"I'm no miracle worker and don't make me out to be one," Shula says. "I don't have a magic formula that I'm going to give to the world as soon as I can write a book. I'm not a person with a great deal of finesse. I'm about a subtle as a punch in the

And then, he often concludes with the following statement, as close as he ever comes to a statement of philosophy:

"I'm just a guy who rolls up his sleeves and goes to work. I don't have peace of mind until I know I've given the game everything I can, because the whole idea is to somehow get an edge. Sometimes it takes just a little extra something to get that edge. But you have to get it.

"If you allow yourself to settle for anything less than No. 1,

you're cheating yourself."

That attitude has carried Shula throughout his coaching career, which began as an assistant at Virginia and Kentucky after a seven-year turn as a defensive back in the NFL with Cleveland, Baltimore and Washington.

The school-of-thought to which he was constantly subjected - and reveled in - was the Paul Brown school. It has become

a part of the Shula system.
"Paul Brown offered more than fundamentals," Shula explains. "He brought something special into pro coaching. I think that if you want to pinpoint Paul Brown's greatest contribution to football, it was his ability to teach. When you learned something from Paul Brown, you never forgot it."

That Shula has that same ability is obvious from a statement made by quarterback Bob Griese when he was asked about the Dolphins amazing flip-flop in Shula's first year — from a 3-10-

I record in 1969 to 10-4 in 1970.

"Our club was ready to go," Griese said emphatically, adding succinctly: "We were just looking for somebody to take us."

Shula advanced to pro status following his one year terms at Virginia and Kentucky when he began serving with the Lions in 1960 under George Wilson, the man who became the Dolphins' first coach and the man whom Shula ultimately replaced.

In 1963, Shula obtained his first head coaching assignment at Baltimore, and turned in an 8-6 record. Not one of his teams since has ever lost more games than it has won, and not one of his teams has ever had a record that wasn't better than the one compiled his rookie season.

Shula spent seven years directing the Colts, compiling the 71-23-4 record under his guidance, including a 13-1 record in 1968 that astounded pro football's world. The Colts also had one other season when they lost only one game, 1967, when they

put together an 11-1-2 mark.

Shula personally was rewarded during those two seasons by being selected Coach of the Year, an honor that first came to him in 1964 (his second year with the Colts, who had a 12-2 record that season), and also has been bestowed his four seasons in Miami.

In 1970, Shula left Baltimore for Miami, becoming head coach and vice president. He purchased a home in Miami Lakes for his family - wife Dorothy and five children, David, Donna, Sharon, Anne and Michael.

Then he went to work on the Dolphins, quickly instilling his own brand of organization for a team that had been a loser ever since its formation in 1966.

The Dolphins immediately turned around in 1970, gaining the play-offs before losing to Oakland, then in 1971 compiled a 10-3-1 record that eventually brought them the Eastern Division title in the American Football Conference after a playoff victory over Kansas City and a title game victory over Baltimore.

In 1972, pro football's world was astounded by the 17-0 mark put together under Shula's guidance by the Dolphins. It was the first world championship for the club and the coach,

and Shula cherished it.

"This is," he said, "the ultimate."
Having reached the ultimate, Shula and the Dolphins made it two in a row in 1973 with another world championship, duplicating the feat achieved before only by Lombardi's Green Bay

"I never thought the thrill of winning our first championship could be duplicated," Shula said after Super Bowl VIII, "but winning two in a row is even more satisfying - the achievement, in my mind, even greater.

And Shula leaves no doubt about the target for 1974 - an-

other world championship.

"One of the hallmarks of excellence in sports is the Triple Crown," Shula says. "What we want to dedicate ourselves to this year is winning a third Super Bowl and becoming the NFL's first Triple Crown winner.'

PROSPECTS IN GENERAL

What now?

That's the question being asked in pro football's circles whenever the subject of the Miami Dolphins is raised.

It is being asked because the Dolphins have conquered the worlds they have set out to conquer the last two seasons, stringing together 17-0 and 15-2 over-all records while winning Super Bowl VIII and Super Bowl VIII.

Those victories enabled the Dolphins to duplicate a feat accomplished before only by the Green Bay Packers, who won Super Bowl I and Super Bowl II. And, while they were not intended to do so, those victories also provide the answer for the "what now?" question.

The target now is No. 3, or as Coach Don Shula puts it: "One of the hallmarks of excellence in sports is the Triple Crown. What we want to dedicate ourselves to this year is winning a third Super Bowl and becoming the NFL's first Triple Crown winner."

The team that will be reaching for that unprecedented third consecutive NFL championship figures to be virtually the same as the one that marched through the 1972 and 1973 seasons in such astonishing fashion. Here's how Shula views the club in a position-by-position rundown:

QUARTERBACKS —"Bob Griese, injured most of the 1972 season, came back for another super year in 1973. He is one of the great quarterbacks, directs the offense very well, is an excellent passer, and at 29 he is still a young man who is always in top condition. Earl Morrall, who directed us towards the Super Bowl a year ago, when Griese was out for two-thirds of the season, was our back up man in 1973. He was not called upon too often, but the coaches and players knew that this steady, dependable veteran was ready to step in if anything happened to Griese. We hope that Earl will return in 1974. Don Strock, a fifth-round draft choice a year ago, with spectacular college passing statistics, spent the 1973 season as a reserve, absorbing the Dolphins' offense. We think he benefitted from this experience, and from being with our coaches in the coaches' booth at all our games."

RUNNING BACKS -- "Our three-man backfield worked to our advantage again last year. Larry Csonka, Mercury Morris and Jim Kiick are exceptional football players. Csonka, at fullback, was the constant. For the third straight year, Zonk surpassed 1,000 yards rushing, and then put together a record-breaking performance in the Super Bowl (145 yards rushing). With his size and strength, he is also a fine blocker. Mercury, most likely, would also have surpassed 1,000 yards if he had not been held out of the last regular season game because of an injury. He had 954 yards and 10 touchdowns. He also set a club single game rushing record (197 yards against New England). Jim Kiick was "old reliable" once again. He is a consistent runner, and he caught 27 passes. Charley Leigh and Don Nottingham add depth and are good special teams men. Offensive backfield coach Carl Taseff is one of many who feels that draftee Benny Malone, from Arizona State, comes in with excellent credentials."

RECEIVERS - Paul Warfield is always a threat to go all the way. His season total of 29 receptions was not extraordinary, but keep in mind that II were for touchdowns, including an NFL record-tying performance of four in the final regular season game against Detroit. Marlin Briscoe returns as our other first team wide receiver. When he got his chance last year, he came through and was the leading receiver with 30 receptions. He also did a fine job blocking. Howard Twilley and Ron Sellers are two experienced receivers who were bothered by injuries last year. Bo Rather picked up experience as a reserve. Offensive coach Bill McPeak, whose primary concern is the passing game, looks forward to the arrival of two draft choices Nat Moore as a wide receiver prospect, and Andre Tillman as a tight end. Jim Mandich had a good year at tight end, with veteran Marv Fleming being hampered by injuries.

CFFENSIVE LINE — "The players' association honored guard Larry Little as the outstanding offensive lineman in the AFC in 1970, 1971 and 1972. Last year he was joined by guard Bob Kuechenberg, center Jim Langer and tackles Norm Evans and Wayne Moore, as the players' association recognized the entire offensive line as a unit. Offensive line coach Monte Clark also points to the fact that Little, Langer and Moore were selected for the Pro Bowl. Kuechenberg performed most courageously in the playoffs, playing with a slight fracture in his lower left arm. Moore and Little stayed in there consistently despite being bothered by injuries. Veterans Doug Crusan (tackle) and Irv Goode (guard-center), and last year's rookie, Ed Newman (guard), return. Chuck Bradley, our top draft choice in 1973, who missed the season because of injury, will be back at the center position."

LINEBACKERS -"The main loss in this department is that of Bill Arnsparger, our defensive coach, who had direct charge of the linebackers. He is now the head coach of the New York Giants. Vince Costello is the new linebacking coach. He comes well recommended, after having been with Paul Brown and the Cincinnati Bengals. Veteran Nick Buoniconti returns at middle linebacker for his 13th pro season (the last six in Miami). The outside starting returnees, Doug Swift and Mike Kolen, are more youthful, but each is going into his fifth season, and over the past four years have made strong contributions to the Dolphins' progress. Bob Matheson, No. 53, is known for the 53defense, and for his versatility - he can play defensive end, any of the linebacking positions, and also contributes on the special teams. Larry Ball and Bruce Bannon are young reserves who also played on the special teams. Jesse Powell is another reserve linebacker and special teams' man. He has had four years experience but missed most of last year with injuries.'

DEFENSIVE LINE —"Manny Fernandez, at tackle, is entering his seventh season, tackle Bob Heinz and end Bill Stanfill, their sixth, and end Vern Den Herder, his fourth, and in the case of all it has been entirely with the Dolphins. Despite their considerable experience, they are a group of young men, with Manny the oldest at 27. Reserve tackle Maulty Moore is in his third year, and tackle Larry Woods was on the taxi squad most of last year after previous experience with Detroit. From the

draft could come defensive line depth, which I'm sure coach Mike Scarry would welcome. Our first round draft pick was Donald Reese, a defensive end from Jackson State. Ends Randy Crowder (Penn State) and Gerry Roberts (UCLA) and tackle Jesse Wolf (Prairie View) were selected in later rounds."

DEFENSIVE BACKS —"Corners Curtis Johnson, Tim Foley and Lloyd Mumphord and safeties Jack Scott and Dick Anderson have been playing together now for four seasons, and defensive backfield coach Tom Keane is happy about the fact they set a record in limiting the opposition to five touchdown passes last year. They have an average age of only 26. Mumphord has also made a big contribution on the special teams. Charley Babb has two years of experience at safety, and Henry Stuckey one as a corner. Jeris White was a high draft choice."

KICKING GAME —"We're happy with our kickers, place-kicker Garo Yepremian and punter Larry Seiple. They are among the best in their specialties. Seiple, in addition, can do many things, play tight end or wide receiver, was a running back in college, and could be an emergency defensive back. Our special teams were a bit below par in pre-season, but improved with the addition of Nottingham and Bannon. Scott and Leigh are good deep punt receivers with Anderson handling the short boots. Morris and Leigh rate highly as kick-off returners. Draft choice Nat Moore is a candidate for both punt and kickoff return work."

FUTURE DOLPHINS OPPONENTS

As a member of the Eastern Division of the American Football Conference, Miami is scheduled to play eight games each year with the four other teams in its conference—Baltimore, New England, Buffalo, and the New York Jets. These games are on home-and-home basis.

In addition, the Dolphins annually will meet six clubs from outside the AFC East at sites to be determined. Here is the line-up of future Miami foes:

He is one of only five players in history to accomplish that. He finished with 1,003 yards in 219 carries and scored five touchdowns. He also caught seven passes. The Pro Football Writer's Association named him the Super Athlete of the Year. As expected, he was named to just about every All-NFL team and to the Pro Bowl. In the offseason he became a national personality with frequent appearances on network television variety shows.

Pro Bowl. Earlier in his career, he was twice picked for the AFL All-Star game. He was the second highest rated passer in the AFC in 1973 (Ken Stabler, Oakland, had a higher rating) as he hit on 116 of 218 passes for a completion percentage of 53.2 for 1,422 yards and 17 touchdowns. AUGUST 16 — Miami receives first AFL expansion franchise, with Joseph Robbie and Danny Thomas as recipients.

JULY 5 — Dolphins open first training camp at St. Petersburg Beach; 83 players.

AUGUST 6 — Dolphins play and lose first game ever, 38-10, at San Diego before 25,712.

AUGUST 12 — Dolphins play and lose first home game at the Orange Bowl, 33-0, to Kansas City before 36,366.

SEPTEMBER 2 — Joe Auer returns opening kickoff 95 yards for TD in first regular season game. Oakland wins, 23-14, before 26,776 at Orange Bowl.

SEPTEMBER 9 — George Wilson Jr. sets first Dolphins League record with 483 yards on 10 punts against New York Jets in Orange Bowl.

OCTOBER 16 - Dolphins win first ever, 24-7, over Denver.

1967

MARCH 14 — Miami picks QB Bob Griese, Purdue, in first round of college draft. Griese first player taken by AFL team; fourth to go over-all.

JULY 22 — Dolphins hold first public intrasquad scrimmage in Ft. Lauderdale, with 6,112 in Lockhart Stadium. Defense "won," 27-0.

JULY 29 — Dolphins score first-ever pre-season victory, 19-2, over Denver.

AUGUST 19 — First inter-League game, a 27-17 loss to Atlanta. SEPTEMBER 17 — After four minutes in season-opener, QB John Stofa breaks his ankle and Griese takes over to beat Denver, 35-21.

1968

JANUARY 30 — Dolphins pick RB Larry Csonka, Syracuse, and T Doug Crusan, Indiana, in first round of college draft.

AUGUST 17 — Dolphins win first-ever over NFL foe, 23-7, over Philadelphia.

1969

JANUARY 28 — Dolphins pick DT Bill Stanfill, Georgia, in first round of college draft.

MARCH 24 — Dolphins obtain LB Nick Buoniconti from Patriots in trade for QB Kim Hammond and LB John Bramlett.

MAY 16 — Robbie announces five prominent Miamians are now limited partners in ownership of the Dolphins. They are H. Earl Smalley, Harper Sibley Jr., Wilbur Morrison, Frank J. Callahan and James W. McLamore. Robbie becomes the majority owner of the franchise.

MAY 30 — Four additional limited partners in ownership of the Dolphins announced: William Snow Frates, Peter T. Fay, Robert L. Floyd and Ray H. Pearson.

JULY 23 — Morris S. Burk becomes a limited partner in the ownership structure.

AUGUST 15 — James L. Davis becomes limited partner.

1970

JANUARY 27 — Miami trades first draft pick to Cleveland for WR Paul Warfield and subsequently end Jim Mandich, Michigan, is first man picked in draft (second round).

FEBRUARY 1 — AFL and NFL officially merge in accordance with terms of a 1966 agreement and the Dolphins become a member of the Eastern Division of the American Conference of the NFL.

FEBRUARY 18 — Don Shula appointed head coach with additional title of vice president and with ownership in the team.

APRIL 11 - Dolphins join computer scouting firm, Blesto-VIII.

APRIL 13 — Dolphins' first-round draft choice next year awarded to Baltimore by Commissioner Rozelle as compensation for loss of Shula.

APRIL 25 — First pre-training camp Introdoctrination Camp is held by Shula and his staff for veterans, with rookies reporting one week later.

MAY 18 — TE Marv Fleming signs with Miami after playing out his option with Green Bay. By agreement, Jack Clancy is sent to Green Bay as compensation for Fleming.

NOVEMBER 30 — Miami becomes a part of Monday night football, beats Atlanta, 20-7.

1970 SEASON — First victories ever over Oakland, New York Jets (twice), Baltimore. Also, first post-season playoff game, against Oakland.

1971

JANUARY 27 — Miami picks WR Otto Stowe, Iowa State, first (but second round) in college draft.

NOVEMBER 7 — Dolphins score first shutout victory, 34-0 over Buffalo.

NOVEMBER 29 — Dolphins win eighth straight, 34-3 over Chicago, for club record and longest win streak of season in NFL.

DECEMBER 19 — 76,812, largest regular-season crowd ever to watch Dolphins, see team beat Green Bay, 27-6, to win first divisional championship.

DECEMBER 25 — Dolphins win longest game in pro football history (82 minutes, 40 seconds), 27-24 over Kansas City, to gain AFC title berth.

1972

JANUARY 2 — Dolphins shut out Baltimore for first time in 97 games, 21-0, to win AFC title and gain berth in Super Bowl.

JANUARY 16 - Dolphins lose to Dallas, 24-3, in Super Bowl VI.

FEBRUARY 1 — Dolphins pick DT Mike Kadish, Notre Dame, as first round draft choice.

APRIL 14 — Dolphins announce season ticket sales of 61,186, which eclipses all prior NFL records.

OCTOBER 1 — Dolphins end season ticket sale at 69,303, record.

OCTOBER 15 — Earl Morrall takes over for injured Bob Griese, finishes off San Diego victory for 5-0 record.
