August 16, 1974, is the Tenth Anniversary of the award of the AFL franchise in Miami to Joseph Robbie and Danny Thomas. Since then, Mr. Robbie has been responsible for the total operation of the Miami Dolphins. He has made every major administrative decision in the ten-year history of the franchise. During this period, the Dolphins have completed nine regular seasons in the AFL and the expanded NFL.

Since the merger, the Dolphins have the best record in professional football over the past five years. They have won the AFC Championship three times and are one of the only two teams to appear in three Super Bowls and to win two World Championships.

The Miami Dolphins, under Mr. Robbie's executive leadership, are the most successful expansion franchise in the history of professional sports.

Joe Robbie is a native of Sisseton, South Dakota. He attended Northern State College in Aberdeen and received his Bachelor of Arts and Doctor of Jurisprudence degrees from the University of South Dakota. He majored in history while studying liberal arts. He served as student president of Sisseton High School, Northern State College and the University of South Dakota, twice served as president of the South Dakota Student Federation, was the first student to participate in editorial management of the Exponent (student newspaper) at Northern State College, served as sports editor of the Exponent and later the Volante at the University of South Dakota and was publicity director of Northern State College during his final two years as a pre-law student in Aberdeen.

He was sports editor and had his own by-lined sports column in his hometown weekly newspaper, the People's Press (later the Sisseton Journal-Press) from the age of 14.

Joe Robbie won the National Debate Championship in 1939 which was accompanied during his college career by State and Regional championships in oratory, debate and extempora-(Continued on page 13)

DONALD F. SHULA Head Coach — Vice President



Whenever Don Shula, the head coach of the Miami Dolphins, is asked to assess his place in history, he usually sidesteps the issue diplomatically by saying that historic assessments are made by historians.

But then Don Shula has made the historians' job easy, requiring only a quick review of the 1972 and 1973 seasons to establish his place among all the coaches who have prowled pro football's sidelines.

For during 1972 and 1973, Don Shula reached plateaus never before climbed in the history of organized pro football, which stretches all the way back to 1920 and the formation of the association that later became the National Football League.

During 1972, Don Shula accomplished two unprecedented feats:

—Directed the Dolphins through a 17-0 season, the first time any team ever had gone through regular season and post season action without a defeat.

-Brought his victory total to 105, becoming the first coach in the NFL to ever reach the 100-victory circle in his first 10 years. During 1973, Don Shula added these accomplishments:

—Became the first coach to win three consecutive American Conference championships and appear in three Super Bowl games in succession.

—Became only the second coach in history — the late Vince Lombardi was the other — to win successive Super Bowls, which the Dolphins did by defeating Minnesota 24-7 in Super Bowl VIII.

-Add a 12-2 regular season record to 1972's perfect 14-0 mark for a two-year won-lost record of 26-2, the best in NFL history.

Many times historians should consider what an individual tried to do and not necessarily what he accomplished. The 1974 season was one of those former occasions.

Assistant Coaches

MONTE CLARK Offensive Coach (Offensive Line-Running Game)

After eleven years as a top lineman in the NFL, Monte Clark began his coaching career here in Miami in 1970, when Don Shula came to the Dolphins as head coach. At first he was labelled the offensive line coach. Two years ago this was changed to offensive coach. He is



responsible mostly for the running game. The offensive line has led the AFC in rushing three times. In 1972 the Dolphins set a new NFL rushing record and in 1971 they were second. These latter marks were accomplished with offensive linemen who for the most part had been released, waived, or traded by other NFL teams. Each of the starting offensive linemen have been named to the Pro Bowl over

the last two years.

In college he captained Southern California. He began his pro career with San Francisco as a defensive lineman. When he moved to Dallas he also moved to the offensive line, and later with Cleveland was the starting offensive right tackle in four NFL title games.

He was born in Fillmore, California, played high school ball in Kingsburg, California. He and his wife, Charlotte, live in Kendall with their three sons, Bryan, Randy and Eric.

DON DOLL Defensive Coach (Linebackers-Pass Defense)

A native of Los Angeles, Don Doll was a star at the University of Southern California in the mid and late 40's. Following graduation, he was a regular defensive back for four years with the Detroit Lions, and later played with the Wash-



Rams. He comes to the Dolphins after one year as assistant coach at Baltimore, three at Green Bay, five at Washington, one at Los Angeles and two at Detroit. He also spent four years as the offensive and defensive backfield coach at Notre Dame.

Don and his wife, Diana, have five children, Steven, Wendy, Kevan, Heidi and Michael. They

live in Emerald Hills, north of Miami.

TOM KEANE Defensive Backfield Coach

Tom Keane is the only Dolphin coach who has been with the team all the way from the losing expansion team days to consecutive Super Bowl titles. As the defensive backfield coach he naturally works on the



pass defense and it is noteworthy that the Dolphins set an NFL record in 1973, only allowing five touchdown passes. His two safetymen, Jake Scott and Dick Anderson, have been consistent All-League selections. 1.

Keane has been coaching in pro football for 18 years. He began with the Chicago Cardinals in 1956 when a knee injury ended his career with that team. His next move was to Calgary in the Cana-

dian League in 1960. From 1961 through 1964 he was coach and general manager of Wheeling in the United League. He then had one year with the Pittsburgh Steelers before coming to Miami in 1966.

In college he started as a quarterback on Ohio State's National Championship 1944 club. Then came Navy service in World War II which was followed by two years at West Virginia. His pro career, as a defensive back, began with the Los Angeles Rams in 1948. Then came Dallas in 1952, Batis more in 1954 before the injury in 1956 ended his playing days with the Chicago Cardinals. With Baltimore he was the first Colt to earn All-League honors and two of his teammates with that team are now coaching associates, Don Shula and Carl Taseff.

He was born in Bellaire, Ohio. Now he and his wife, Mary, live in southwest Miami and have four children, Candi, Tom, Tim and Mary. Tom, Jr. attends and plays football at Waynesburg College.

MIKE SCARRY Defensive Coach (Defensive Line-Run Defense)

Mike Scarry is in his 26th year as a coach and his sixth as tutor of the Dolphins' defensive line. He came to Miami in 1970 when Don Shula became the head coach. Last year, with his defensive line helping more than considerably, the Miami



Dolphins were second in the American Football Conference in the important statistic of fewest points scored against — 216.

Other 1974 statistics that highlight the work of the defensive line, show that the Dolphins tied with Pittsburgh in the AFC in fewest touchdowns allowed rushing, and they were third in the Conference in sacking the quarterback with 31.

Individually among his men end

Bill Stanfill was again an All-League and All-Conference and the other three regulars, end Vern Den Herder and tackles Bob Heinz and Manny Fernandez, were consistent performers, although the latter was sometimes handicapped by injuries.

Scarry began his coaching career at one of his alma maters, Western Reserve, 1948-49; continued at Santa Clara, 1950-52; Loras, 1953; Washington State, 1954-55; Cincinnati, 1956-62; and Waynesburg, his first alma mater, 1963-65. In pro coaching he was with the Washington Redskins, 1966-68, and scouted for San Francisco in 1969 before coming to Miami. He also spent several summers helping coach the College All-Stars.

He was born in Duquesne, Pennsylvania, and after a standout high school athletic career, he enrolled at Waynesburg College where he played three years (and this included an appearance in the first college game to be televised), then finished work for a degree, later at Western Reserve, while playing for the Cleveland Rams. His pro playing career began with the Rams in 1944, after two years of Army service. He captained the Rams in 1945 to the NFL title. The next year, when the Rams moved to Los Angeles, Scarry remained in Cleveland to play for the Browns (and continue work for his degree) and captained the Browns to the All America Conference championship.

Mike and his wife, Elizabeth, live in southwest Miami and they have eight children.

HOWARD SCHNELLENBERGER Offensive Coach (Receivers-Passing Game)

Howard Schnellenberger returns this year to the Miami Dolphins, a team he helped prepare to two Super Bowl games. These were the Miami teams of 1971 (defeated in the Super Bowl by Dallas) and 1972 (the end of the perfect 17-0 cam-

.

(the end of the perfect 17-0 campaign with a victory over Washington).

After the Washington Super Bowl victory, Schnellenberger was named Head Coach of the Baltimore Colts where he spent the last two seasons.

He originally came to the Dolphins in 1970, being named the offensive coach with particular emphasis on handling the receivers in the passing game. It is in this same capacity that he returns

this season.

Schnellenberger is a native of Louisville, Kentucky, and was an All-American end at the University of Kentucky. He played two seasons in the Canadian League with one year of U.S. Army service in between. He was an assistant at the University of Kentucky in 1969 where another assistant was Don Shula. He was an assistant at the University of Alabama from 1961 to 1965 and helped coach three national championship teams. Then he was receiver's coach of the Los Angeles Rams until he joined Shula in Miami in 1970.

Schnellenberger and his wife, Beverlee Ann, live in Miami Lakes with their three sons, Stephen, Stuart and Tim.

CARL TASEFF Offensive Backfield Coach (Kicking Game)

Carl Taseff has long been associated with Head Coach Don Shula. They are both natives of the Cleveland area and in college were teammates at John Carroll University. In the pros they were teammates at both Cleveland and Baltimore. They



were drafted in the same year, 1951, by Cleveland and were traded at the same time, 1953, to Baltimore. , ar,

He was with the Colts through 1961 and finished his playing career with Buffalo in the AFL in 1962. After a year of being out of football, he re-entered the game as an assistant coach with New England of the AFL in 1964. From 1965 through 1968, he was an assistant coach with the Detroit

Lions. Then he had two years with the CEPO scouting organization, a scouting combine that works for several NFL teams.

Shortly after Shula was named head coach of the Dolphins in 1970, he appointed Taseff as offensive backfield coach. In three of the five years he has been the offensive backfield coach, the Dolphins have led the AFC in rushing.

As for his playing performances, he is still in the Baltimore record book for most yards punts returned in a game, 148; most yards punt returns in career (1953-61), 826; longest punt return, 90 yards (TD); and longest attempted field goal return, 99 yards (TD).

 \vec{T}_{aseff} is the father of two daughters, Cynthia Sue and Susan Alice.

PERSONNEL DEPARTMENT

GEORGE YOUNG Director of Pro Scouting

George Young is in his first year with the Miami Dolphins and is Director of Pro Scouting. He previously had three years as an assistant coach with the Baltimore Colts and also had experience as that team's Director of Player Personnel. He has

also done a great deal of scouting in pro football.

A native of Baltimore, he is a graduate of Bucknell University and has done graduate work and has Master Degrees from both Loyola College (Baltimore) and John Hopkins University.

At Bucknell he earned Little All American honors as a lineman and was drafted by the Dallas Texans.

In Baltimore he was a successful

head football coach at Calvert Hall and City College High School before joining the Baltimore Colts organization. He and his wife, Kathryn, now live in Hollywood Hills, Florida.

BOBBY BEATHARD Director of Player Personnel

Bobby Beathard came to the Miami Dolphins as Director of Player Personnel after four years as a member of the Atlanta Falcons scouting organization. Before that he was a scout for Kansas City and an aide to Al Davis in the latter's brief term as commissioner of the American

Football League.

As a pro player he was a quarterback and safety prospect at Washington, Minnesota and San Diego. His college playing days were spent at Cal Poly.

As Director of Player Personnel, it is his responsibility to coordinate the work of the Dolphins other tull time scouts and to work closel, with the results of the computing scouting firm, BLESTO VIII,

to aid in the development of good young talent for the Dolphins.

Beathard is the father of four children, three sons and a daughter. He lives on Key Biscarne.

BOB LUNDY

Trainer

Bob Lundy was a member of the original Dolphin organization, being hired head trainer back in 1966. He returned to the Dolphins last year after a one season absence which was spent in real estate work.



He was had 14 years as a trainer in professional football, eight with Miami and six with Detroit.

He is a native of Wollaston, Massachusetts, attended North Quincy High School and obtained a degree in physical education at Boston University. He started his career as a trainer at Boston University and then moved to Indiana chiversity where he took advanced courses in the field. He

also spent four years as the trainer at the University of Detroit before joining the Lions.

Lundy lives in South Miami was his wife, Alice, and three sons, Bobby, Billy and David.

JUNIOR WADE Assistant Trainer

Junior Wade was a part time assistant trainer for the Dolphins during the last two summer training camps. He joins Miami this year as a full-time member of the staff and comes to the Dolphins after having been trainer and baseball coach



at Davidson College. Before that he was the trainer at South Carolina State and at Fayetteville State.

He is a native of Aiken County, South Carolina, was a basketball, baseball and football player at Jefferson High School in Bath, South Carolina, and played baseball at South Carolina State. He received both his undergraduate and masters degrees from South Carolina State.

He is married and he and his wife, Constance, have one son, Aaron.

DAN DOWE Equipment Manager

Dan Dowe was on the original staff of the Dolphins in 1966 as Assistant Equipment Manager. He became the Head Equipment Manager in 1968.



He is a native of Brighton, Massachusetts, where he was an all-around athlete at Brighton High. He was in electronics work in the Boston area and also worked as a police officer in the Miami Beach suburb of Bal Harbour before joining the Dolphins.

In World War II, he was in the Navy and saw four years of destroyer duty, taking part in invasions in North Africa, Normandy and Okinawa.

Dowe and his wife, Virginia, live in North Miami with their son

Darin.

neous speaking. He was a member of the all-state high school newspaper staff selected to publish the Sioux Falls Argus-Leader during the South Dakota Education Association Convention in his senior year in high school. He earned almost all of his college expenses from campus jobs.

Mr. Robbie enlisted in the Navy the morning after the attack on Pearl Harbor, on December 8, 1941, and was on active duty eleven days later. He served for four years from 1941 to 1945, He participated in five amphibious invasions in the Philippines and Borneo and was awarded the Bronze Star for leading assault waves ashore during these amphibious operations and for administrative accomplishment.

After serving as South Dakota Democratic State Chairman in 1948 and for two years in the South Dakota Legislature, he was nominated as the Democratic candidate for governor in 1950, losing the final election after Joe Foss had been narrowly defeated in the Republican primary. Joe Foss remained in South Dakota to be elected governor in 1954 and later to become Commissioner of the American Football League.

Joe Robbie moved on to Minnesota in 1951 to become Regional Director of the Office of Price Stabilization in an area covering Minnesota, South Dakota, North Dakota and Montana. He served as Mid-West Chairman of the fund-raising drive to construct the Harry S Truman Library in Independence. Missouri, and was the Democratic candidate against Congressman Walter Judd. He drafted the law which established the Minnesota Municipal Commission to prevent further fragmentation of local government in metropolitan areas. He became first chairman of the Minnesota Municipal Commission in which capacity he served from 1959 to 1965 when he entered professional football. During these years he served as Counsel to the Minnesota Legislature on matters of local and metropolitan government and to the Senate Government Operations Committee in Washington when the creation of the Cabinet Department of Urban Affairs was considered during the Kennedy administration. This Department was later created under President Johnson as the Department of Housing and Urban Development and Mr. Robbie was invited to the White House to witness the signing of the Act.

He was one of the three men in charge of the Inaugural of President Lyndon B. Johnson and Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey in 1965.

Joe Robbie contacted Joe Foss, a classmate at the University of South Dakota and a legislative colleague in the South Dakota House of Representatives, at the request of a client in 1965 concerning AFL expansion. Joe Foss told him that Franklin Field in Philadelphia was tied up in litigation and would not be available for an AFL expansion franchise but he recommended to Joe Robbie that he apply for a franchise in Miami where he was then representing legal clients. Commissioner Foss described Miami as the best open city not then having a pro football team. This was before Atlanta or New Orleans were granted expansion franchises in the NFL.

In addition to serving as Managing General Partner with complete responsibility for all operations during the entire history of the Miami Dolphins, Mr. Robbie has been active in a broad spectrum of civic and community affairs. He has served as Chairman of the Dade County Community Relations Board and as a member on the Board of Directors of United Way of Dade County, Heart Association of Greater Miami, Boys Town of South Florida, Crippled Children's Society of Dade County and on the National Board of Directors of the American Health Foundation. He is on the Board of Trustees of the Dade Foundation, Jackson Memorial Hospital, Third Century, U.S.A. and the Pop Warner Junior League Football. He has served on the Board of Governors of the Greater Miami Chamber of Commerce and St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis since 1959. He is a member of the Council of Advisors of Florida International University and the Board of Advisors of Florida Memorial College. He has served as a member of the Board of Trustees of Biscayne College, Chairman of the Alumni Fund-Raising Campaign of Northern State College, National Chairman of the Fund-Raising Campaign to build Dakota-Dome at the University of South Dakota and as a member of the National Fund-Raising Campaigns of Notre Dame University and Carleton College.

He has been on the college faculty of St. Cathrine's in St. Paul, Minnesota, and Dakota Wesleyan in Mitchell, South Dakota.

Mr. Robbie has been awarded the U.S. Navy Citation for Meritorious Service, the Good Samaritan Award from the Variety Club, the Silver Medallion from the National Conference of Christians and Jews, an Honorary Doctor of Laws degree from Biscayne College, and an Honorary Fellowship by Hebrew University of Jerusalem. He has been cited as a distinguished alumnus by Sisseton High School, Northern State College and the University of South Dakota and has been installed in the South Dakota Sports Hall of Fame by the South Dakota Sports Writers Association and in the Northern State College Sports Hall of Fame.

Mr. Robbie has been recognized as Pro Football Executive of the Year by the Long Island Athletic Club in 1973, as NFL Owner of the Year by the Minneapolis-St. Paul Minute Men in 1971 and as Football Man of the Year by the Football News also in 1971.

He was married in 1942 to Elizabeth Ann Lyle. The Robbies have had eleven children, who now range from 12 to 31 years of age. Their daughter, Kathleen, was drowned at Acapulco in 1971 and they have established scholarships in her honor for Indian students at colleges in South Dakota.

Mrs. Robbie is a general partner in the Miami Toros of the North American Soccer League and serves as Vice President of the Miami Dolphins.

Miami won its division for the fourth straight year and participated in the playoffs for the fifth consecutive season. Although the Dolphins lost to Oakland, 28-26, some feel Shula proved once and for all that coaching consists of something more than diagraming plays. The word is motivation.

Although hampered by injuries (Shula refuses to use this as an alibi under any circumstances), the Dolphins finished with an 11-3 record, marking the ninth time in 12 seasons of coaching that Shula's teams have won at least 10 games. It also marked the fifth straight season that Miami, all under Shula, won at least ten games.

Even with the many problems, including the constant attention by the media of Dolphin players going to the World Football League in 1973, Shula kept his sense of humor.

One story illustrates Shula's ability to laugh, even after a tough defeat.

Miami lost a heart-breaking game to Washington, 20-17, when veteran quarterback Sonny Jurgensen took the Redskins in for the winning touchdown late in the fourth period.

The next day at a press conference, certain writers kept saying, "If Jurgensen hadn't completed that pass or if Jurgensen hadn't completed that pass." So it went for a few minutes.

Shula looked at the writers and said, "This all reminds me of the time Jimmy Brown (Cleveland fullback) gained a million yards against the Colts. The next day Coach Weeb Ewbank tried to rationalize. He said, 'Take away Brown's 90-yard run and then take away his 60-yard run. And his 50-yard run. And his 40-yard run. Heck, he then averaged just two yards a rush."

In addition, he lifted his five-year record since taking over at Miami to 57-12-1 in regular season games and 8-3 in post-season action. He has received Coach of the Year honors seven times in his 12-year tenure with the Baltimore Colts and the Dolphins.

At Baltimore, he had a 71-23-4 record, for an over-all mark of 128-35-5 that has left little doubt that he is, at age 45, right at the top of his profession.

What great design and/or philosophy has brought the coach of the Miami Dolphins to that juncture of history?

None. At least that's the way Shula feels about it,

"I'm no miracle worker and don't make me out to be one," Shula says. "I don't have a magic formula that I'm going to give to the world as soon as I can write a book. I'm not a person with a great deal of finesse. I'm about as subtle as a punch in the mouth."

And then, he often concludes with the following statement, as close as he ever comes to a statement of philosophy:

"I'm just a guy who rolls up his sleeves and goes to work. I don't have peace of mind until I know I've given the game everything I can, because the whole idea is to somehow get an edge. Sometimes it takes just a little extra something to get that edge. But you have to get it.

"I try to do it with mental preparation, and physical preparation, and in general with over-all preparation to accomplish the ultimate. Of course, I know that the people we play have the same goal — winning — so I try to put more effort in our preparation. You set a goal to be the best and then work hard every hour, every day striving to reach that goal.

"If you allow yourself to settle for anything less than Number One, you're cheating yourself."

That attitude has carried Shula throughout his coaching career, which began as an assistant at Virginia and Kentucky after a seven-year turn as a defensive back in the NFL with Cleveland, Baltimore and Washington.

The school-of-thought to which he was constantly subjected — and reveled in — was the Paul Brown School. It has become a part of the Shula system.

"Paul Brown offered more than fundamentals," Shula explains. "He brought something special into pro coaching. I think that if you want to pinpoint Paul Brown's greatest contribution to football, it was his ability to teach. When you learned something from Paul Brown, you never forgot it."

That Shula has that same ability is obvious from a statement made by quarterback Bob Griese when he was asked about the Dolphins amazing flip-flop in Shula's first year — from a 3-10-1 record in 1969 to 10-4 in 1970.

"Our club was ready to go," Griese said emphatically, adding succinctly: "We were just looking for somebody to take us."

Shula advanced to pro status following his one year terms at Virginia and Kentucky when he began serving with the Lions in 1960 under George Wilson, the man who became the Dolphins' first coach and the man whom Shula ultimately replaced.

In 1963, Shula obtained his first head coaching assignment at Baltimore, and turned in an 8-6 record. Not one of his teams since has ever lost more games than it has won, and not one of his teams has ever had a record that wasn't better than the one compiled his rookie season.

Shula spent seven years directing the Colts, compiling the 71-23-4 record under his guidance, including a 13-1 record in 1968 that astounded pro football's world. The Colts also had one other season when they lost only one game, 1967, when they put together an 11-1-2 mark.

Shula personally was rewarded during those two seasons by being selected Coach of the Year, an honor that first came to him in 1964 (his second year with the Colts, who had a 12-2 record that season), and also has earned this honor four of his five seasons in Miami.

In 1970, Shula left Baltimore for Miami, becoming head coach and vice president. He purchased a home in Miami Lakes for his family — wife Dorothy and five children, David, Donna, Sharon, Anne and Michael.

Then he went to work on the Dolphins, quickly instilling his own brand of organization for a team that had been a loser ever since its formation in 1966.

The Dolphins immediately turned around in 1970, gaining the play-offs before losing to Oakland, then in 1971 compiled a 10-3-1 record that eventually brought them the Eastern Division title in the American Football Conference after a playoff victory over Kansas City and a title game victory over Baltimore.

In 1972, pro football's world was astounded by the 17-0 mark put together under Shula's guidance by the Dolphins. It was the first world championship for the club and the coach, and Shula cherished it.

"This is," he said, "the ultimate."

Having reached the ultimate, Shula and the Dolphins made it two in a row in 1973 with another world championship, duplicating the feat achieved before only by Lombardi's Green Bay Packers.

"I never thought the thrill of winning our first championship could be duplicated," Shula said after Super Bowl VIII, "but winning two in a row is even more satisfying — the achievement, in my mind, even greater."

With the dream of a third straight Super Bowl victory buried at Oakland, Shula approaches the 1975 campaign with that fierce determination, always evident in his piercing eyes and his commanding voice.

As one player, who insisted on remaining unidentified, remarked, "We'll be back. Shula will make sure of that."

The coach this past year was Florida Crusade Chairman for the American Cancer Society.

PROSPECTS IN GENERAL

On February 18, 1970, Don Shula became the Head Coach of the Miami Dolphins and since that time they have had a regular season record of 57 wins, 12 losses and 1 tie.

In the same period they have won two Super Bowls, three American Football Conference Titles, four AFC East Division Crowns and qualified for the playoffs all five seasons.

In 1972 they had an unprecedented 17-0 record. Last year the regular season mark was 11-3.

Coach Don Shula said recently, "We felt last year it was tougher to stay on top than to get there. We did have the opportunity for three Super Bowl Championships in a row and in the 28-26 playoff loss to Oakland we gave it our best shot... some things are just not meant to be.

"Offensively we may have to change somewhat. However, Quarterback Bob Griese is intelligent and capable of adapting.

"Our opening regular season game with Oakland, the team that knocked us out last year, is a natural. It will make our training camp and pre-season campaign that much more purposeful."

As for prospects by position, here are the comments of Coach Shula:

QUARTERBACKS: Bob Griese, who had another outstanding year in 1974, is one of the truly great quarterbacks. He is a good director of the offense, a fine passer and still a relatively young man. Earl Morrall will always be remembered by Dolphin fans for coming off the bench to replace an injured Griese in the great season of 1972. He returns as a fine backup quarterback who certainly has more than his share of experience. (This will be his 20th season.) Don Strock has been a reserve for two years and has benefited in absorbing the Dolphin offense. Jack Graham of Colorado State is a draft choice as is Freddie Solomon of the University of Tampa. The latter is an all-round performer and can see service as a wide receiver and/or running back and is a possibility as a kick returner.

RUNNING BACKS: Mercury Morris, who was bothered by injuries most of 1974, is a talented running back as his rushing statistics of the two previous seasons (1972-73) will attest. Benny Malone had a great rookie season last year and we look for him to have a bright future. Don Nottingham has a great opportunity at the fullback spot and has always been a steady performer. Donny Anderson has come to us from St. Louis. He's a versatile player, has played some fullback, and he can come out of the backfield and eatch a pass. Stan Winfrey of Arkansas State, one of our two second-round draft choices, had excellent rushing statistics in college to bolster his consideration as a fullback possibility. The other second-round draft choice, Freddie Solomon, can be a running back, wide receiver or a quarterback. Phillip Kent of Baylor, Clyde Russell of Oklahoma, Skip Johns of Carson-Newman and Dwaine Copeland of Middle Tennessee (also a possible defensive back) are other running back possibilities from the ranks of the draftees.

RECEIVERS: Our receivers were bothered with injuries last year but first-year man Nat Moore picked up a lot of the slack and was voted the Dolphins' Rookie of the Year. Veteran Howard

Twilley, one of two remaining Dolphin originals (tackle Norm Evans is the other), had a good campaign and started nine games. Mel Baker showed promise as a rookie, especially in the final regular season game in which he caught four passes, two for touchdowns. We keep talking about draft choice Freddie Solomon and he definitely will get an intensive look as a wide receiver. Also drafted as wide receivers were Morris Owens, Arizona State, and Leonard Isabell, Tulsa. As for tight ends, Jim Mandich who is entering his sixth season, and Marv Fleming, who is entering his 13th, are two capable veterans. Jim McFarland is a newcomer to us after five years at St. Louis. We've known about him since his college days. He's a good blocker and has been used frequently in short vardage situations. Punter Larry Seiple can also be helpful at this spot and Andre Tillman, a second-round draft choice last year who was on injured reserve last season, will get a close inspection. Joe Jackson of Penn State was a tenth-round draft choice.

OFFENSIVE LINE: Norm Evans at tackle returns for his tenth season with the Dolphins. Larry Little at guard is entering his ninth pro campaign and this will be his seventh with the Dolphins. Both Bob Kuechenberg, guard, and Jim Langer, center, are six year men. All four earned All-League or All-Conference honors last year. At tackle Wayne Moore, bothered by a knee injury, returned to start the last three regular season games in 1974. Tom Wickert, a rookie a year ago, started three games as did Tom Funchess, a veteran who had joined the Dolphins after service with New England and Houston. Wickert can also play guard.

Ed Newman at guard, now in his third year, started four games last season. Doug Crusan at tackle, who was hurt on the last play of the opening game with New England last year, and then was on injured reserve for the rest of the campaign, returns this season. Irv Goode, who can play guard, center or tackle, will be going into his 13th season, his third with the Dolphins. There is great hope for tackle Darryl Carlton the number one draft choice from the University of Tampa. Also drafted this year were James Wilson, guard, Clark College: Joe Yancey, tackle, Henderson State; and Vernon Smith, center, Georgia.

DEFENSIVE LINE: Bill Stanfill, now entering his seventh season, was All-Pro again last year at defensive end and on the other extremity, highly-respected Vern Den Herder, who will be starting his fifth season, will also return. The veteran of the defensive line is reliable Manny Fernandez, at tackle who originally came to the Dolphins as a free agent. He is now going into his eighth season. Quiet and steady Bob Heinz at tackle will be a sevenyear man this season. Maulty Moore at tackle is a four-year man. Don Reese and Randy Crowder, as rookies last year, had experience at both end and tackle. Among the draftees is Barney Crawford, a tackle-end from Harding College.

LINEBACKERS: The real veteran on defense is middle linebacker Nick Buoniconti, who is going into his 14th season. Doug Swift, out the last half of last season with a shoulder injury and Mike Kolen, return as six-year veterans as outside linebackers. The versatile Bob Matheson (number 53) is going into his minth season, the last five with the Dolphins. He can play any linebacking position, also defensive end and is valuable on the special teams. Larry Ball, who can also play defensive end, is

entering his fourth campaign and Bruce Bannon his third. Drafted were Gerald Hill, Houston; Bruce Elia, Ohio State; and Steve Towle of Kansas.

DEFENSIVE BACKS: Safeties Jake Scott and Dick Anderson and cornerbacks Curtis Johnson, Tim Foley and Lloyd Mumphord have played together for five years. Charlie Babb has three years of experience at safety and Jeris White one year experience at the corner. From the draft list are Barry Hill, Iowa State; John Dilworth, Northwestern State; and James Lewis of Tennessee State.

KICKING GAME: Placekicker Garo Yepremian and Punter Larry Seiple are competent and reliable. Garo has many times been a game winner for the Dolphins. Seiple, in addition to punting, can play tight end or wide receiver, was a running back in college and could be an emergency defensive back. Dick Anderson, Donny Anderson and Don Strock can also do some punting. Drafted as a placekicker was Joe Danelo from Washington State. Nat Moore, Jake Scott and to a lesser degree Dick Anderson and Charlie Babb can handle punt returns and Moore, Mercury Morris and Benny Malone are competent on kickoff returns.

FUTURE DOLPHINS OPPONENTS

As a member of the Eastern Division of the American Football Conference, Miami is scheduled to play eight games each year with the four other teams in its conference — Baltimore, New England, Buffalo, and the New York Jets. These games are on home-and-home basis.

In addition, the Dolphins annually will meet six clubs from outside the AFC East at sites to be determined. Here is the tentative line-up of future Miami foes:

- 1976—Cleveland, Kansas City, Pittsburgh; Los Angeles, Minnesota, New York Giants
- 1977—Cincinnati, Houston, San Diego; Dallas, St. Louis, San Francisco

MIAMI DOLPHINS NFL'S BEST SINCE THE 1970 MERGER

The fairest test of supremacy among the 26 NFL teams is their comparative records in the five years since the AFL-NFL merger was accomplished.

During this period the Miami Dolphins have a 57-12-1 regular season record, the best in professional football. Along the way they have accomplished an unprecedented 17-0 perfect season.

The Dolphins are the only team to qualify for all five Play-offs. They won three consecutive AFC Championships on their way to three straight Super Bowl appearances. They won backto-back Super Bowl Championships. All of these are post-merger records. The Dolphins' 8-3 Playoff record tops major contenders - Dallas (7-3), Minnesota (4-4), Washington (2-4), Oakland (3-4), Pittsburgh (4-2), or San Francisco (2-3).

Against NFC competition, the Dolphins are 13-2, tops in inter-conference competition.

During this stretch, the Dolphins have lost only two home games in regular season competition. They have compiled a record of 31 consecutive victories in the Orange Bowl in regular season and post-season play. The last time the Dolphins lost in the Orange Bowl was to the New York Jets, 14-10, on October 3, 1971.

The Miami Dolphins also have acquired the best record in the history of NFL expansion with a 72-51-3 record in 9 seasons, compared with Dallas 116-86-6 in 15 seasons, Minnesota 98-91-7 in 14 seasons, Atlanta 42-80-2 in 9 seasons, Cincinnati 44-53-8 in 7 seasons, and New Orleans 30-77-3 in 8 seasons.

MIAMI DOLPHINS DRAFT

Bobby Beathard, Director of Player Personnel for the Miami Dolphins, doesn't hide his feelings concerning the team's player draft.

"I think this year's draft compares to last year's draft," says Beathard, who has been in the player-rating business for ten years with Kansas City, Atlanta and the Dolphins. "I think we got as many good players as we got last year, and last year's draft was outstanding."

The 1974 draft produced such standouts as wide receivers Nat Moore and Mel Baker, running back Benny Malone, offensive lineman Tom Wickert, defensive linemen Randy Crowder and Don Reese, and defensive back Jeris White.

"I agree with Coach (Don) Shula that the biggest asset of the players we drafted is speed," continues Beathard. "Last year, injuries forced us to use rookies immediately and we learned quickly that we had a good draft. Sometimes you must wait for a few years to learn whether you have a good draft or not. And this might be the case for the 1975 draft. But I think we had a real fine draft."

The Dolphins selected a total of 22 players including seven in the first five rounds. Darryl Carlton, a 6-6, 260 pound offensive tackle from the University of Tampa was the Dolphins' pick in the first round.

In the second round the Dolphins used their two picks for running back-wide receiver Freddie Solomon, a teammate of Carlton's at Tampa, and running back Stan Winfrey of Arkansas State.

Included in the Dolphins' selections were five linemen — four on offense and one on defense, a tight end, a kicking specialist, a quarterback, three linebackers, three defensive backs, two wide receivers, and six running backs including two who can play as wide receivers.

THROUGH THE DOLPHINS YEARS

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS 1965

AUGUST 16 — Miami receives first AFL expansion franchise, with Joseph Robbie and Danny Thomas as recipients.

NOVEMBER — Mrs. Robert Swanson of West Miami winner of Miami's nickname contest; wins two lifetime passes to home games. 20,000 entries.

NOVEMBER 27 — Miami picks QB Rick Norton, Kentucky, and RB Jim Grabowski, Illinois, in first round of college draft.

JULY 5 — Dolphins open first training camp at St. Petersburg Beach; 83 players.

AUGUST 6 — Dolphins play and lose first game ever, 38-10, at San Diego before 25,712.

AUGUST 12 — Dolphins play and lose first home game at the Orange Bowl, 33-0, to Kansas City before 36,366.

SEPTEMBER 2 — Joe Auer returns opening kickoff 95 yards for TD in first regular season game. Oakland wins, 23-14, before 26,776 at Orange Bowl.

SEPTEMBER 9 — George Wilson Jr. sets first Dolphins League record with 483 yards on 10 punts against New York Jets in Orange Bowl.

OCTOBER 16 - Dolphins win first ever, 24-7, over Denver.

1967

MARCH 14 — Miami picks QB Bob Griese, Purdue, in first round of college draft. Griese first player taken by AFL team; fourth to go over-all.

JULY 22 — Dolphins hold first public intrasquad scrimmage in Ft. Lauderdale, with 6,112 in Lockhart Stadium. Defense "won," 27-0.

JULY 29 -- Dolphins score first-ever pre-season victory, 19-2, over Denver.

AUGUST 19 — First inter-League game, a 27-17 loss to Atlanta. SEPTEMBER 17 — After four minutes in season-opener, QB John Stofa breaks his ankle and Griese takes over to beat Denver, 35-21.

1968

JANUARY 30 — Dolphins pick RB Larry Csonka, Syracuse, and T Doug Crusan, Indiana, in first round of college draft. AUGUST 17 — Dolphins win first-ever over NFL foe, 23-7, over Philadelphia.

JANUARY 28 -- Dolphins pick DT Bill Stanfill, Georgia, in first round of college draft.

MARCH 24 — Dolphins obtain LB Nick Buoniconti from Patriots in trade for QB Kim Hammond and LB John Bramlett.

MAY 16 — Robbie announces five prominent Miamians are now limited partners in ownership of the Dolphins. They are H. Earl Smalley, Harper Sibley Jr., Wilbur Morrison, Frank J. Callahan and James W. McLamore. Robbie becomes the majority owner of the franchise.

MAY 30 — Four additional limited partners in ownership of the Dolphins announced: William Snow Frates, Peter T. Fay, Robert L. Floyd and Ray H. Pearson.

JULY 23 — Morris S. Burk becomes a limited partner in the ownership structure.

AUGUST 15 - James L. Davis becomes limited partner.

1970

JANUARY 27 — Miami trades first draft pick to Cleveland for WR Paul Warfield and subsequently end Jim Mandich, Michigan, is first man picked in draft (second round).

FEBRUARY 1 — AFL and NFL officially merge in accordance with terms of a 1966 agreement and the Dolphins become a member of the Eastern Division of the American Conference of the NFL.

FEBRUARY 18 — Don Shula appointed head coach with additional title of vice president and with ownership in the team.

APRIL II - Dolphins join computer scouting firm, Blesto-VIII.

APRIL 13 — Dolphins' first-round draft choice next year awarded to Baltimore by Commissioner Rozelle as compensation for loss of Shula.

APRIL 25 — First pre-training camp Introdoctrination Camp is held by Shula and his staff for veterans, with rookies reporting one week later.

MAY 18 — TE Marv Fleming signs with Miami after playing out his option with Green Bay. By agreement, Jack Clancy is sent to Green Bay as compensation for Fleming.

NOVEMBER 30 — Miami becomes a part of Monday night football, beats Atlanta, 20-7.

1970 SEASON — First victories ever over Oakland, New York Jets (twice), Baltimore. Also, first post-season playoff game, against Oakland.

JANUARY 27 — Miami picks WR Otto Stowe, Iowa State, first (but second round) in college draft.

NOVEMBER 7 — Dolphins score first shutout victory, 34-0 over Buffalo.

NOVEMBER 29 -- Dolphins win eighth straight, 34-3 over Chicago, for club record and longest win streak of season in NFL.

DECEMBER 19 – 76,812, largest regular-season crowd ever to watch Dolphins, see team beat Green Bay, 27-6, to win first divisional championship.

DECEMBER 25 — Dolphins win longest game in pro football history (82 minutes, 40 seconds), 27-24 over Kansas City, to gain AFC title berth.

DECEMBER 31 - Bob Griese returns as Dolphins win American Conference title for second straight time, defeating Pittsburgh, 21-17.
