

## **JOSEPH** ROBBIE

#### Managing General **Partner**



in his comprehensive survey of "Sports In America," the Pullitzer Prize-winning author James A. Michener observed:

"The majority of owners I have met are like Joe Robbie of Miami, real devotees, men and women to whom the building of a respectable team becomes a passion, and they add luster to the sporting scene . . . In the end, they are willing to make extraordinary sacrifices in order to build a winner, and their loyalty to their team often excels that of their players.'

Joseph Robbie has parlayed cunning and persistence into shaping one of the most successful sports franchises in America. In the 1970s his Dolphins have the best winning percentage (.744) in the National Football League and two Super Bowl championships,

Robbie, at age 62, draws from a seemingly bottomless reservoir of energy. He is vigorously involved in his community and his greatest pleasure would be a Super Bowl XIII victory in the Orange Bowl.

Yet he has insisted that the integrity of his team will never be the price for victory. Robbie demonstrated it in the 1977 scandal which sent Dolphin defensive lineman Randy Crowder and Don Reese to jail for selling cocaine to undercover police. Robbie swiftly suspended the players despite some critics waving the Fifth Amendment's presumption of innocence.

Football players owe a unique obligation to the children who idolize them, to the fans who support them and to the community in which they live," Robbie said.

"I don't believe in winning at all costs. If I thought the two players whom I suspended would make the difference between winning and losing the Super Bowl, I'd still act as I did.

"We want to win and we're going to win. But we're going to do it in the right way and with the right people."


To which New York Daily News columnist Larry Fox responded, " . . . the Joe Robbie we prefer to remember in this case is the man who laid his principles on the line of scrimmage soon after the players were arrested."

While he advocates building a new 70,000-seat stadium in South Florida rather than futilely renovating the aged Orange Bowl, Robbie showed his willingness to defer to a greater community need.

"An indoor arena should have priority over a new football stadium," he said. "I think it's the most important community need to provide sports for this area. I know that I hurt my own case in saying this, but it's true."

Robbie commissioned The McNulty Company in 1976 to prepare plans for a new stadium with chairback seats and adequate parking and proved to skeptics that it could be constructed for \$26.5 million exclusive of land costs.

Now as a direct result of Robbie's enlightened opposition to Orange Bowl renovation, Metro government assembled a Sports Facilities Commission to obtain guidance.



"That proposal has been described as Robbie's 'stadium in the sky,' but it would not surprise me all that much if it becomes a reality," Miami News football analyst Charlie Nobles wrote. "It's Robbie's nature to work that much harder when he's an underdog."

The inevitable setbacks in the course of building the Dolphins from a 1966 expansion club to a three-time Super Bowl participant were no great obstacles in the eyes of Robbie. In the first two years of the franchise, the Dolphins averaged only 25,551 and 27,120 tickets sold and struggled with 29,963 and 32,335 the following two years. On the field, the Dolphins managed a 15-39-2 record.

Robbie needed a winner. "We have no oil wells or hotel chains or inherited money with which to support professional football in Miami," he later said.

But he had a gold mine Feb. 18, 1970 when he introduced Don Shula as the new head coach. There have been a dizzying 96 changes of head coaches in the NFL since the start of the 1970 season; Robbie still has made the smartest move of them

Immediately in 1970 the Dolphins were transformed from a 3-10-1 outfit to a 10-4 playoff qualifier.

"If we hadn't been persistent and hadn't been patient; if we hadn't looked down the tunnel and hadn't seen the light, this franchise might have moved," Robbie said. "I didn't intend to move and I didn't appreciate constantly having to deny we were moving."

Robbie, a former South Dakota legislator and Minneapolis lawyer, saw the Dolphins reach the Super Bowl in their sixth year of operation. Once defeated in the title game, the Dolphins rebounded to post an unprecedented 17-0 perfect record in 1972 and the best two-year mark in NFL history (26-2) after Super Bowl triumphs over Washington and Minnesota.

The apathy of the early years was transformed into hysterical support with 22 consecutive sellouts (excluding preseason games) and 74,961 season tickets sold in 1973 — an NFL record.

"The Miami Dolphins broke the old bugaboo by proving that South Florida is a big-league community," Miami Herald columnist Charles Whited wrote. "It took a born crapshooter such as Joe Robbie, of course, to risk everything on the high stakes. When the Dolphins started, even the best banking brains in Miami refused to share Joe Robbie's brash confidence. But he paved the way; the two world football championships galvanized this town like nothing before or since; and we yearn for a return to those halcyon days."

And echoed Miami News managing editor Howard Kleinberg, the team is "the one single factor that has brought the people of this community together in a feeling of accomplishment and pride."

Robbie's contribution to the community is not always as direct as the more than \$1 million in charitable donations on behalf of the Dolphins since 1966. He was a key figure in helping Paramount Pictures film "Black Sunday" in Miami and thus pump \$3 million into the local economy.

"The politicians wanted to kill us," film director John Frankenheimer said. "If it had not been for a few people in the press and Joe Robbie . . . we would've gone elsewhere."

Robbie works actively on the Board of Trustees for both Jackson Memorial Hospital and the United Way, and he is

# DONALD F. SHULA Head Coach



"Instead of comparisons claiming Don Shula is the closest thing to Vince Lombardi, it should be said the other way around."

Don Shula has become to coaching what his unbeaten 1972 Dolphins are to team accomplishment: the standard of excellence by which all others are measured.

More than being the winningest active coach in the National Football League, Shula has made his mark on the game as a motivator, an innovator and, especially, a teacher. He molded five rookies into a 1977 defensive unit which allowed the second-lowest total of points in the AFC, and he produced a 10-game winner from a team ranked outside the contenders.

Shula, 48, has put together a record of 164-57-5 in his 15 seasons (eight in Miami), and in 1978 he should pass his tutor Paul Brown (170-108-6) into third place on the all-time list for NFL victories.

Sporting News columnist Larry Felser observed, "This is going to outrage the Vince Lombardi cult. It won't make Paul Brown's admirers joyous, either. But it says here that Shula is the greatest football coach in the history of the professional game . . . Lombardi never did what Shula did (in 1977). Neither did Brown. Neither did any other pro coach.

"Shula took very ordinary talent in one of the toughest divisions in the NFL and had a piece of the lead going into the last two weeks of the season."

It was the 11th time in 15 seasons that Shula's team has won at least 10 games.

His "ultimate" achievement was the NFL's first unbeaten, untied record of 17-0 in 1972 — in only the third season of Shula's transformation of a 3-10-1 team. His incredible two-year record of 32-2 including Super Bowl conquests in 1972 and 1973 probably will never be equalled.

Five times his teams have built unbeaten streaks of 10 or more games. His defenses have led the NFL three times in fewest points allowed (1964, 1972, 1973).

In 1963 Shula had become the youngest head coach, at age 33, in NFL history and he guided the Baltimore Colts to a 71-23-4 record for seven seasons. Baltimore fans in 1977 voted Shula the coach of the Colt's Silver Anniversary team.

Shula's resourcefulness was magnified in 1965 when injuries sidelined quarterbacks John Unitas and Gary Couzzo, so that halfback Tom Matte wore the "playbook" on his wristband and quarterbacked an upset victory that earned a cochampionship.

Shula brought discipline to the Biscayne College training camp in 1970. He proposed an unthinkable schedule of four-a-

day workouts, and he sought precision in every move. Five rookies including a 12th-round draftee and a Canadian Football League reject became starters on defense.

The Dolphins sprang to a 4-1 start in 1970 including firstever victories over Oakland and the New York Jets. Then after enduring a shaky midseason (Shula resolutely kept his faith in quarterback Bob Griese), the Dolphins erected a six-game winning streak for a 10-4 record and a wild-card playoff berth.

Shula had laid the foundation of a perennial contender, and in 1971, the Dolphins won their first of four consecutive AFC East championships with a 10-3-1 mark. On Christmas Day in Kansas City, pro football's longest game (82 minutes, 40 seconds) ended with Garo Yepremian's winning 37-yard field goal in the second overtime. A week later, the Dolphins stymied the Unitas-led Coits, 21-0, on the same Poly-Turf where Baltimore had won Super Bowl V the previous January.

Dethroning the Colts had launched the Dolphins on a string of AFC titles. But a dissappointing 24-3 loss to the Dallas Cowboys in Super Bowl VI filled Shula and his players with greater purpose, and in 1972, the Dolphins would attract headlines as the "Greatest Team Ever."

Shula had claimed 38-year-old quarterback Earl Morrall from the waiver list in April, and when Griese suffered a broken ankle in the fifth game, Morrall took control for 11 victories. The Dolphins rewrote the NFL rushing record (2,960 yards), and with a regular-season record of 105-30-1, Shula became the first NFL coach to win 100 games in his first decade. George Allen (97), Vince Lombardi (96) and Paul Brown (92) were close.

Surprisingly, the unbeaten Dolphins were three-point underdogs to Washington in Super Bowl VII. Shula elected to go with a healthy Griese, and the Dolphins dominated the Redskins, 14-7, for the coach's first NFL crown.

"This is the ultimate," Shula described the perfect season. If anything could compare with it, it was the overpowering manner in which Shula's team repeated as champions, The Dophins crushed three playoff opponents, 85-33, including a 24-7 rout of the Minnesota Vikings in Super Bowl VIII at Houston.

"I'm just a guy who rolls up his sleeves and goes to work," Shula says. "I don't have peace of mind until I know I've given the game everything I can because the whole idea is to somehow get a winning edge. Sometimes it takes just a little extra somerthing to get that edge. But you have to get it."

He was born Donald Francis on Jan. 4, 1930 and was raised in Painesville, Ohio. He was a running back at John Carroll University in Cleveland, and in 1950, he gained 125 yards as the Blue Streaks upset Syracuse, 21-15.

He was the only rookie on Paul Brown's defending NFL champion Cleveland Browns in 1951 until Shula's college teammate Carl Taseff joined the club at midseason. Shula intercepted four passes as a rookie. Then he was involved in a 15-man trade with the Colts in 1953, and he played four seasons in Baltimore (1953-56) and one season in Washington (1957) as a cornerback. He had 21 career interceptions for 267 yards.

Shula's coaching system was greatly influenced by his first pro boss, Paul Brown, a 21-year veteran of the NFL who retired after the 1975 season at age 67.

"Paul Brown offered more than fundamentals," Shula explains. "He brought something special into pro coaching. I think that if you want to pinpoint Paul Brown's contribution to

football, it was his ability to teach. When you learned something from Paul Brown, you never forgot it."

Shula entered the coaching ranks with an assistant's job at Virginia (1958) and Kentucky (1959), and he joined the NFL's Detroit Lions in 1960 under George Wilson. The Lions posted records of 7-5, 8-5-1 and 11-3 with Shula as defensive coordinator.

Then in 1963 he succeeded Weeb Ewbank as head coach at Baltimore, and in the 15 seasons which have followed, Shula has reached the championship game five times with two victories.

For all the energies he channels toward football, Shula is a devoted family man. He and former Dorothy Barfish (married July 19, 1958) have five children — two boys and three girls — David 19, Donna 17, Sharon 16, Annie 14 and Mike 13. David was the 1977 salutatorian at Hollywood Chaminade High and now a sophomore defensive back at Dartmouth College.

Shula takes an active leadership in the league, serving the past four years on the select four-man NFL Competition Committee, thus helping to introduce rules changes and evaluate all aspects of the game.

He has a similarly active role in community affairs. In 1975 Shula served as the Florida Crusade Chairman for the National Cancer Society and co-chairman of the Jerry Lewis March Against Dystrophy. In 1976 he was named to the National Board of the Jesuit Program for Living and Learning.

He is a member of the National Sports Committee for both the Multiple Sclerosis Society and the Muscular Dystrophy Association, board member of the Heart Association of Greater Miami and board member of "Who's Who in National High School Athletics."

In February 1977 he was presented the Silver Medallion Brotherhood Award by the Florida Region, National Conference of Christians and Jews. Barry College honored him in March 1977 with the Light of Flames Leadership Award. He holds an honorary doctorate in humanities from John Carroll University in 1973 and received an honorary degree from Biscayne College in 1974.

Currently he is serving as honorary chairman for the Belen Jesuit Intercultural Fund campaign to build a new school.

# BILL ARNSPARGER Asst. Head Coach, Defense 15th Season, 7th with Dolphins Born Dec. 16, 1926

Bill Arnsparger molded the Dolphin defense of Super Bowl years by beginning with a handful of rookles in 1970, and he directed a reconstruction project in 1977 using five rookles as starters.

His enthusiastic, disciplined defense was responsible for triumphs over AFC East preseason favorites Baltimore and New England without allowing a touchdown, and the Dolphins were one of only five NFL teams to permit fewer than 200 points.

Arnsparger, 51, nicknamed "One More Reel" for his constant scrutiny of films, was awarded the Dolphins' game ball in Super Bowl VIII after a remarkable 1973 season during which Miami yielded only 150 points. The '73 Dolphins set modern NFL records of allowing only 1,290 yards passing and five touchdown passes; they sacked opposing quarterbacks 45 times, strung 13 consecutive scoreless quarters and shut out Baltimore for the fourth straight time.

Arnsparger's association with Coach Don Shula stretches back to 1959 as assistants at Kentucky, then 1964-69 at Baltimore and 1970-73 at Miami. Three times in those 10 pro seasons, Arnsparger's defense led the NFL in scoring defense.

He was named head coach of the New York Glants in 1974, and his teams posted a 7-28 record including 5-9 in 1975. Arnsparger rejoined the Dolphins at midseason 1976.

He had spent 14 years in college coaching — Miami of Ohio, 1950; Ohio State, 1951-53; Kentucky, 1954-61, and Tulane, 1962-63 — before combining talents with Shula.

Arnsparger was a high school lineman at Paris, Ky., under Blanton Collier, who later became head coach (1963-70) of the Cleveland Browns. Arnsparger spent two years as a Marine sergeant before returning to school as an offensive tackle at Miami under Woody Hayes.

He and his wife Betty Jane (married 8-24-57) live in Miami Lakes with their son David (8-6-65) and daughter Mary Susan (2-29-68).



# TOM KEANE Defensive Backs, Punting 15th Season, 13th with Dolphins Born Sept. 7, 1926

Tom Keane shuffled his defensive secondary in 1977 and in dramatic improvement, the Dolphins surrendered only 10 touchdown passes — half as many as were allowed during the injury-riddled 1976 season.

Keane tutored rookie Norris Thomas at left cornerback and moved cornerback Tim Foley to strong safety, thus fortifying the pass defense.

Keane, 52, has coached the Dolphin secondary since the club's inception in 1966 and the team has averaged 21 interceptions (268 in 13 years). Only four other NFL assistants have coached with the same club as long as Keane — Jim Myers (1962) and Ernie Stautner (1966) of Dallas and Oille Spencer (1962) and Tom Dahms (1963) of Oakland.

In Keane's first year, the Dolphins stole 31 passes (still a record) and ranked second in the American Football League. In 1973 the Super Bowl champions allowed only five

touchdown passes.

Keane, a former All-Pro safety for the Baltimore Colts in 1953, holds the Colt record with 11 interceptions that season. He had swiped 10 passes in 1952. He also averaged 42.8 yards punting and he held the ball for Bert Rechichar's 56-yard field goal that stood as an NFL record for 17 years.

He was a freshman quarterback and tailback for unbeaten Ohio State in 1944, and after a 20-month stint as a seaman in the South Pacific, Keane played at West Virginia. He skipped his senior year to be drafted by Los Angeles (1948-51), then was traded to the short-lived Dallas Texans (1952) and went to Baltimore (1953-54) in the franchise move.

Keane played with the Chicago Cardinals (1955) and his career ended with a knee injury suffered while tackling Tank Younger in a 1956 preseason game. He coached with the Cardinals (1957) and the Calgary Stampeders (1960) of the Canadian Football League.

In 1961 he became head coach of the Wheeling Ironmen of the United Football League, and after winning two championships, he moved to Pittsburgh (1965) as an assistant. The following year he came to Miami.

He and his wife Mary (married 7-5-52) live in Miami and have two daughters and two sons — Candi (3-21-54), Tom (5-27-56), Tim (2-13-60) and Mary (2-21-67).



JOHN SANDUSKY
Offensive Line, Running Game
20th Season, 3rd with Dolphins
Born Dec. 28, 1925

John Sandusky has maintained the excellence of the Dolphins' All-Pro offensive line in his two seasons in Miami. It required patient application during an agonizing 1977 preseason when two starters were sidelined with unusual injuries and another was traded.

Sandusky then brought veteran tackle Mike Current into the blocking wall, and the Dolphins ranked fifth in the NFL with 2,366 yards rushing. Miami topped 200 yards on the ground six times.

His 19 seasons of NFL coaching are the most for a Miami assistant.

Sandusky, 52, has the unique distinction of having served in four different capacities in the old College All-Star Game in Chicago. He played with the All-Stars (1950) and coached

them (offensive line, 1958); he played with the NFL champions (Cleveland, 1951 and 1955) and coached them (Baltimore offensive line, 1969, and defensive line, 1971).

He was offensive line coach under Don Shula for seven years (1963-69) with Baltimore. In fact, Shula tried to bring Sandusky to Miami in 1970 but the Colts' coaching staff was restricted. Sandusky stayed with the Colts to coach the defensive line (1970-72) with a Super Bowl V victory under Don McCafferty.

Sandusky's first NFL assignment had been the Colts' defensive line (1959-62) under Weeb Ewbank, so he spent

seven years on defense and 12 years on offense.

When McCafferty was fired after a 1-4 start in 1972, Sandusky was elevated to head coach. He posted a 4-5 record including two losses to the unbeaten Dolphins. Sandusky next spent three years (1973-75) with the Philadelphia Eagles' offensive line.

That was a homecoming for the former All-American tackle from Villanova. He went both ways at tackle for Cleveland (1950-55) when the Browns played in six consecutive NFL championship games, winning three titles, and he spent one year with Green Bay (1956). He began his coaching career as a Villanova assistant (1957-58).

He and his wife Ruth (married 3-31-51) live in Cooper City and have four sons and a daughter — John (1-4-52), James (6-21-53), Ruth (10-5-55), Joseph (1-30-59) and Gerry (9-5-61)



MIKE SCARRY
Defensive Line, Run Defense
12th Season, 9th with Dolphins
Born Feb. 1, 1920

Mike Scarry, a veteran of 30 years in coaching, laid a new foundation for the Dolphins' defense in 1977 by developing talented rookle linemen A.J. Duhe and Bob Baumhower. With Scarry's guidance, Duhe swept every NFL Defensive Rookle of the Year award.

The run defense allowed 662 fewer yards in 1977 than the injury-torn defense of 1976, and only one team gained more than 180 yards rushing against the Dolphins. And for the first time since 1973, the Dolphins allowed fewer than 200 points.

Scarry was elected to the NAIA Hall of Fame in 1964 in recognition of his playing days as a center and linebacker at Waynesburg (Pa.) College. He played in the first game ever televised (Waynesburg vs. Fordham in New York, 1939). After two years in the Army, "Moe" was center for the Cleveland Rams (1944-45) in the old All-American Conference.

He began an 18-year college coaching career at Western Reserve (1948-49) and moved to Santa Clara (1950-52), Loras (1953), Washington State (1954-55) and Cincinnati (1956-62) before becoming head coach at Waynesburg (1963-65). His Yellow Jackets posted a record of 17-8-1 including two West Penn Conference titles, and he recruited and developed the Waynesburg squad which went unbeaten and won the NAIA championship in 1966.

In 1969 he was named to the Waynesburg College Hall of Fame for both football and basketball.

Scarry moved into the pro ranks with the Washington Redskins (1966-68) under Otto Graham and he spent the 1969 season as a scout for San Francisco. Coach Don Shula hired him for the Dolphins' staff in 1970.

He and his wife Elizabeth (married 1-27-43) live in Miami and have eight children, five boys and three girls — Sally Beth, Mike, Patricia, Tom, Maggie, John, Jim and Dennis.



### **HOWARD SCHNELLENBERGER** Receivers, Passing Game 13th Season, 7th with Dolphins Born March 16, 1934

Howard Schnellenberger, the offensive strategist of the Dolphins for six of the past eight seasons, has charted a versatile passing attack which ranked first in the NFL with 22 touchdowns in 1977.

His top pupils, Nat Moore and Duriel Harris, are as dangerous a pair of wide receivers as anyone's. They combined for 86 catches for 1,366 yards and 17 touchdowns last season — the best marks for a tandem in Dolphin history. Paul Warfield and Howard Twilley had combined totals of 69 receptions, 1,345 yards and 15 TDs in 1971.

Schnellenberger, 44, also helped devise the game plans that carried the Dolphins to a perfect 17-0 record in 1972.

He was hired by Don Shula in 1970 after coaching the receivers at Los Angeles (1966-69) under George Allen.

He became head coach of the Baltimore Colts in 1973 and posted a 4-10 record. He was dismissed after an 0-3 start in 1974 and the Colts finished 2-12. Schnellenberger returned to the Dolphins in 1975, replacing Bob Schnelker.

Schnellenberger earned all-state basketball honors at Flaget High in Louisville and Ali-American recognition as an end at Kentucky in 1955 with quarterback Bob Hardy. He played two seasons in the Canadian Football League with an intervening year in the Army.

Then in 1959 he joined the staff of Blanton Collier at Kentucky (along with Shula), and in 1961, he began a five-year stint at Alabama under Paul Bryant. The Bear had coached Schnellenberger at Kentucky in 1953.

Directing the Alabama offense, Schnellenberger guided quarterback Joe Namath (1962-64) while the Crimson Tide compiled records of 10-1, 9-2 and 10-1. Then in 1965 with quarterback Steve Sloan under Schnellenberger's wing, Alabama won the national championship with a 9-1-1 mark and an Orange Bowl victory over Nebraska.

He and his wife Beverlee Ann (married 5-2-56) live in Miami Lakes with their three sons — Stephen (1-27-60), Stuart (1-10-61) and Tim (11-2-68).



**CARL TASEFF** Offensive Backs, Special Teams 12th Season, 9th with Dolphins Born Sept. 28, 1928

Carl Taseff, offensive backfield coach since joining the Dolphins in 1970, has developed a stable of quality running backs which has kept Miami among NFL leaders in rushing.

Taseff's group ranked fifth in the NFL with 2,366 yards rushing in 1977, and four backs topped 400 yards. Four of his five runners were "minibacks" under 5-foot-10. With the acquisition of Delvin Williams, Taseff's backfield in 1978 could be as strong as in Super Bowl seasons. The Dolphins lead the NFL in rushing in the eight-year 1970s with 19,167 yards.

Taseff, 50, scouted Dolphin opponents for three years (1970-72), for which he was experienced with the CEPO scouting combine in 1968 and 1969.

He had played nine years (1953-61) as left cornerback for the Baltimore Colts, and Taseff set Colts records with a 90yard punt return for a touchdown Oct. 14, 1956 against Green Bay (four returns for 148 yards). He holds an NFL record with a 99-yard return of a Walt Michaels field-goal attempt Dec. 12, 1959 against Los Angeles. Still on the books are his Baltimore

career records of 112 punt returns for 826 yards, and he never fumbled a punt.

Taseff starred as a running back at John Carroll University in his native Cleveland and he scored 22 touchdowns in 1950. He and Don Shula played in the same backfield for Coach Herb Eisele, and they were roommates with the Cleveland Browns (1951-52) and Colts (1953-56).

He concluded his pro career in 1962 with Buffalo of the American Football League, and after a year in the insurance field, he became a defensive coach with the AFL Boston Patriots (1964) and the NFL Detroit Lions (1965-66).

He lives on Key Biscayne and he has two daughters, Cynthia Sue 22 and Susan 18.



**GEORGE YOUNG** Dir. of Pro Scouting. Asst. Coach 4th Season with Doiphins Born Sept. 22, 1930

George Young can recite the depth charts of all NFL teams in his capacity of Director of Pro Scouting. He joined the Dolphins in 1974 scouting Miami opponents, and in March 1975 he was promoted.

His duties include the negotiation of veteran and rookle contracts, the study and evaluation of all NFL players for trade and waiver acquisitions, and the scouting of opponents prior to Dolphin games.

Young's responsibilities also extend to coaching, analysis of Dolphins and opponents, and presentations to the squad and special teams.

He had worked as a full-time scout for the Baltimore Colts in 1968 and 1969, then became the Colts' offensive line coach in 1970 when the Colts were Super Bowl V winners. He was promoted to Personnel Director (1971-72) and he was the offensive coordinator under Coach Howard Schnellenberger in 1973.

Young, 47, was an educator and coach for 15 years at Calvert Hall and City College high schools in Baltimore. His teams won six Maryland Scholastic Association championships, five of those at City College where he compiled a 60-11 record.

In January 1968, when Coach Don Shula and his Baltimore staff were working the Pro Bowl, Shula asked Young to look at films and evaluate players for the college draft.

"I gave him the key to the office," Shula said, "and when we got back from the Pro Bowl, he had evaluated all the players and gave us reasons to accept or reject them. He was very organized, and as it turned out, very accurate."

Young was a Little All-American and All-East tackle for Bucknell in 1951 and the team's captain. He holds two Master's degrees — one from Johns Hopkins and another from Loyola College in Baltimore.

He and his wife Lovey live in Hollywood Hills, Fla.



CHUCK CONNOR
Director of Player Personnel
1st Season with Dolphins
Born July 7, 1937

Chuck Connor conducted the Dolphins' 1978 draft only 10 weeks after being hired as Director of Player Personnel in February. He had been the Southeast regional scout for the BLESTO combine, which provides college player evaluations to nine NFL teams including the Dolphins.

Connor worked the past three seasons (1975-77) for BLESTO and was promoted to regional scout in 1977. BLESTO has 8 area scouts, 3 regional scouts and one national scout.

He was a two-way end at the University of Cincinnati (1955-59) before he began a 15-year coaching career at Montour High near Pittsburgh. Connor was head coach for eight of those 15 years, and his 1967 team was undefeated. He taught at Montour in 1974 while also coaching the defensive secondary at Carnegie-Melion University.

Connor had done player evaluations from films for the Pittsburgh Steelers while at Montour, and in 1975, he moved his family from McKees Rock, Pa., to Stone Mountain, Ga.,near Atlanta to work for BLESTO.

He and his wife Dorothy (married 6-27-59) have four children — Chuck (4-23-60), Mike (1-16-65), Karen (6-20-66) and Scott (7-29-76). Oldest son Chuck is a senior linebacker at Parkview High, and the family won't move to Miami until he graduates next summer.



STEVE CROSBY
Asst. Dir. of Player Personnel
2nd Season with Dolphins
Born July 3, 1950

Steve Crosby, whose career as a running back with the New York Giants was halted by knee and ankle injuries, began scouting for the Dolphins in 1977. He was promoted to Chuck Connor's top assistant in 1978.

Crosby, like Dolphin fullback Don Nottlingham, was a 17th-round draft choice when the Glants picked him in 1974. He had gained 1,891 yards the previous two seasons at Fort Hays (Kan.) College. As a rookle, he gained 55 yards on 14 carries, and he quick-kicked once for 60 yards. He appeared in 15 games in three injury-plagued seasons (1974-76) with the Giants.

Crosby played eight-man football in his hometown Pawnee Rock, Kan., and one of his cousins is Dolphin linebacker Rick Dvorak. Crosby and his wife Ellen (married 6-27-69) live in Golden, Colo., with their son Bradley (10-19-70).



BOB LUNDY Trainer 12th Season with Dolphins Born March 28, 1936

Bob Lundy, the original trainer of the Dolphins, has supplied injured players with bandages and encouragement since 1966. He and assistant Junior Wade have guided more than 20 players to successful rehabilitation of surgical knees the past three years.

Last season the Dolphins had five knee operations and another three in the offseason, bring the total to 25 knee operations in a three-year period. Worst siege of injuries occurred in 1976 when 22 players missed a combined total of 144 games and 10 players were listed on injured reserve during the course of the season. Eight of the 11 knee patients passed their physical exams to open the 1977 training camp.

Lundy, 42, was recognized for his treating the wounded when the Doiphins presented him with a game ball after clinching a fourth consecutive AFC East championship in 1974. It may be the only time an NFL trainer has been so honored.

He came to Miami with the formation of the franchise and has worked every season except 1973 when he sold real estate. He graduated from Boston University in 1958 and was the assistant trainer at Indiana University while in graduate school. He became the head trainer at Detroit University (1960-63)

while also serving as assistant trainer of the NFL's Detroit Lions, and in 1964, he became a full-time assistant with the Lions.

He and his wife Alice (married 6-2-62) live in Miami with their three sons Bobby (3-30-63), Billy (6-30-66) and David (1-30-70).



### **DAN DOWE Equipment Manager** 13th Season with Dolphins Born Sept. 16, 1924

Dan Dowe nas been fitting uniforms, customizing helmets and lugging trunks of equipment for the Dolphins since the team's inception in 1966. He started as the assistant equipment manager and was promoted to equipment manager in

As lord of the locker room, Dowe has to keep pace with ripped jerseys and broken facemasks. Offensive tackles average six torn jerseys per season, and twice a year, Dowe changes all the hardware on all helmets.

He is the first man to arrive and the last man to leave in

stowing the Dolphins' gear.

Dowe, 54, is a native of Brighton, Mass. He served 41/2 years aboard the destroyer USS Forest in World War II, and the ship was hit by a kamikaze plane. As a civilian he worked in industrial electronics in Boston and then as a police officer in Bal Harbour, a Miami Beach suburb.

He and his wife Virginia (married 6-8-57) live in Hollywood Hills with their son Darin (9-14-69).



JUNIOR WADE **Assistant Trainer** 4th Season with Doiphins Born Feb. 2, 1947

Junior Wade, a hard worker in his behind-the-scenes role as assistant trainer, came to the Dolphins in 1975 after coaching Davidson College to its best basebail record (21-15) in history. The Wildcats owned a victory over 1975 College World Series runnerup South Carolina.

He first worked in the Dolphins' training camps in the summers of 1973 and 1974 while he served as assistant trainer at Davidson. He was promoted to the baseball head coaching job in 1975.

Wade, 31, is a native of Bath, S.C., and was a three-year baseball letterman at South Carolina State. After earning his master's degree, he went to Fayetteville (N.C.) State as a trainer and guidance counselor.

He and his wife Constance (married 12-30-70) live in Hialeah with their son Aaron (2-25-72).



#### **MILT DAVIS** College Area Scout 1st Season with Dolphins Born May 31, 1929

Milt Davis, an educator as well as a talent scout, has been eyeing college athletes in a 14-state West region sifce 1967. He scouted for the Baltimore Colts from 1967 to 1976 and last season for Los Angeles.

Davis, who has received his doctorate in administrative education from UCLA, is a counselor and biology professor at Los Angeles City College. He earned an M.A. in zoology from UCLA and is an avid bird-watcher.



Charlie Callahan, one of the bestknown sports publicity men in the country, can chronicle the Dolphins' growth from a 1966 expansion club to a National Football League champion.

Callahan, 62, was the second man hired by Joseph Robbie in the formation of the franchise. A native of Lexington, Mass., he had spent 20 years (1946-65) as the Sports Information Director at Notre Dame University where he publicized five Heisman Trophy winners.



He handles daily Dolphin reports from training camp and arranges player interviews. He and his wife Betty, an elementary school teacher, live in Miami with their son Mike.

#### **BOB KEARNEY, Public Relations Director**

He and his wife Pamala, a bank systems analyst, live in Miami with their daughter Heather, 2.




#### TOM PIPPET, Marketing Director

president of Catholic Charities. He has served on the Board of Governors of the Greater Miami Chamber of Commerce and on the Boards of Directors for Boystown, Crippled Children's Society and the Heart Association. Robbie also serves on the National Board of Directors of the American Health Foundation and of the U.S.O.

His managerial skills were recognized by his NFL colleagues as he has served on the six-member Executive Committee of the NFL Management Council and he was chairman of the AFL Player Relations Committee.

He was presented the prestigious Timmie Award from the Touchdown Club of Washington in 1974 for the "extraordinary achievement" by the Dolphins over a four-year period (54-11-1) through three Super Bowl appearances. He was named Pro Football Executive of the Year by the Long Island Athletic Club in 1972, and he was designated Football Man of the Year in 1971 by both the Football News and the Minutemen Club of the Twin Cities. Pop Warner Junior League Football named him Football Father of the Year in 1976 in recognition of his support of charities and educational institutions on a nationwide basis.

Robbie has been national fund-raising chairman for the Dakota Dome project, a \$7.2-million arena which had its groundbreaking at his alma mater of South Dakota in 1976. He also is engaged in a \$5-million fund-raising drive for Biscayne College.

He has exhibited leadership qualities as student body president of both colleges he attended — Northern State Teachers College in Aberdeen, S.D., and the University of South Dakota in Vermillion. He was a national debating champion in 1939 and earned his law degree from South Dakota in 1946. His education was interrupted by Navy duty during World War II, and he received the Bronze Star for his part in five South Pacific invasions.

He practiced law in Mitchell, S.D. (1946-51) when he served as Democratic State Chairman, state representative and 1950 gubenatorial candidate. He moved to Minneapolis in 1951 to become Regional Counsel for the Office of Price Stabilization, and later he served as director of a four-state area, supervising 500 employees. He was a charter member of the Twin Cities Metropolitan Planning Commission, and he drafted the law which created the Minnesota Municipal Commission for which he was chairman from 1959 to 1965.

In 1965, a client Robbie met on a Florida vacation was interested in an American Football League expansion franchise for Philadelphia. Robbie inquired of AFL Commissioner Joe Foss, a college classmate of Robbie's.

"He (Foss) told me the stadium was in litigation," Robbie recalls. "He said there would be a good chance of getting a team for Miami but not for Philadelphia.

"I told my client, and he wasn't interested in Miami. So I decided to apply for the franchise there. The rest is history."

Robbie contacted entertainer Danny Thomas, whom he had known since 1959 while serving on the Board of Directors of St. Jude's Hospital in Memphis. Robbie and Thomas filed a formal application and were awarded an AFL franchise for \$7.5 million.

Robbie was born July 7, 1916 in Sisseton, S.D. He married Elizabeth Ann Lyle at Beresford, S.D., December 28, 1942. They have had 11 children (nine are living, two are deceased). The Robbies live in Miami Shores with their three youngest sons Brian 18, Danny 17 and Kevin 15.

If the Miami Dolphins transmitted a mild shock to National Football League opponents in 1977, they may deliver a bigger jolt in 1978.

The offense has boosted its amperage with a breakaway running back. The defense has been rewired with energetic youth. And the dynamism of Don Shula will assure maximum output.

Even with a 10-4 record last season, the Dolphins were locked out of the playoffs while three teams with 9-5 records nevertheless qualified. Shula and proud veterans of Super Bowl championship teams are keenly motivated after three straight absences from the playoffs.

To get there, the Dolphins have added zip to a rushing attack which relied mostly on zap. Shula paid "a stiff price" to acquire Delvin Williams from the San Francisco 49ers, but the Dolphins now have a speedster who gained 1,203 and 931 yards the past two seasons.

Another year of maturity by the defense should strengthen the Dolphins' championship bid. Six starters have been culled from the last three college drafts, and the other five starters wear Super Bowl rings. That combination of spirit and savvy enabled the Dolphins to rank second in AFC scoring defense in 1977.

Miami still possesses the best over-all record (91-31-1) in the NFL in the 1970s — Shula's reign. The 48-year-old coach has won at least 10 games in 11 of this 15 pro seasons, and he has climbed to fourth place with 164 career victories.

Analyzing the Dolphins by position:

QUARTERBACKS — The consensus All-Pro quarterback, Bob Griese, will command a finely-tuned offense that could be as powerful as any in the NFL. Griese topped his Dolphin record with 22 touchdown passes in 1977, and the 40 touchdowns registered by the Miami offense were second only to Oakland with 41. Shula rated Griese "absolutely better than he ever was," and the Maxwell Club concurred by presenting the coveted Bert Bell Award to Griese as the Pro Player of the Year.

The bespectacled Griese, who has completed 59.8 per cent of more than 1,000 passes the past four seasons, displayed his deadly marksmanship on Thanksgiving Day at St. Louis. He fired six TD passes in a 55-14 rout, and he didn't play the fourth quarter.

Strong-armed Don Strock remains as Griese's quiet understudy with a notebook that started in 1973. Strock passed for four TDs in the 1977 preseason, and he has two victories over Buffalo (31-21 and 45-27) in starting assignments in 1975 and 1976.

By drafting consensus All-American Guy Benjamin of Stanford in the second round, the Dolphins acquired a talent they would have coveted by spending a first-round pick. Benjamin passed for 2,790 yards as a senior and 48 touchdowns in his career.

"I thought we were extremely fortunate getting through last season with two quarterbacks," Shula said, "and I never thought we'd get a quarterback of Benjamin's quality in the second round.

"Griese's coming off his best year, and hopefully he'll have less apprehension with the eye problems which plagued him before the 1977 season," the coach said. "In Strock we've got a

fine backup who's ready to step in and give us winning leadership."

RUNNING BACKS — While the Dolphins had touchdown gallops of 52, 60, 66 and 77 yards last season, a streaker like newcomer Delvin Williams will dramatize the offense's quick-strike capability in 1978. He was acquired April 17 from San Francisco in exchange for first-round and fifth-round draft picks along with wide receiver Freddie Solomon and safety Vern Roberson. (Drafting Benjamin, in effect, negated the loss of the first-round choice in the Williams deal).

Williams set a 49ers record of 1,203 yards in 248 carries and ranked third in the NFL in 1976 behind only Walter Payton and O.J. Simpson. He has scored 18 TDs in the past two seasons.

"Our backfield can be in the best shape in a long, long time," Shula said. "If Williams performs the way we think he can as a receiver coming out of the backfield, there won't be that much of a necessity to juggle Nat Moore, which will make him less susceptible to injury."

Four Dolphin runners gained more than 400 yards last season with sophomore Gary Davis (533 yards) and rookie fullback Leroy Harris (417 yards) in tandem the final five games.

The stable included Benny Malone, who had 533 of his 615 yards by midseason and then yielded to Davis.

Harris shared the fullback spot with skillful receiver Norm Bulaich and sturdy Don Nottingham. Bulaich rushed for 416 yards and caught 25 passes, and he has produced 1,872 yards (rushing and receiving) and 18 touchdowns in three Dolphin seasons.

Others competing in the backfield will be halfbacks Adolph Groves of Vanderbilt and Robert Turner of Oklahoma State and fullback Harry McCall, a 230-pounder from Chattanooga.

The Dolphins rushed for 2,366 yards in 1977 and ranked fifth in the NFL.

RECEIVERS — Shula has praised flanker Nat Moore as the "most versatile athlete" in the NFL, and there was convincing evidence in 1977 to support Shula's contention. Moore darted free for 12 touchdown catches (tops in the NFL) and also

scored on a flanker reverse — the 13 TDs broke the Dolphin

Moore, an All-Pro for the first time, snagged 52 passes for 765 yards and maintained a pace of 16.7 yards per catch in his four-year career.

And if tracking the elusive Moore wasn't exasperating enough for a defense, the look-alike on the other side, Duriel Harris, was creating havoc. Harris had a second-year haul of 34 passes for 601 yards and five TDs.

Third-round draftee Jimmy Cefalo of Penn State, who led the nation in punt returns with a 13.7-yard average excluding a 67-yard escape in the Fiesta Bowl, will provide depth.

Shula will explore the potential of Terry Anderson, a '77 rookie who will be given "a good shot to do the things Solomon had been doing for us as a receiver and kick returner."

Although the tight end in Miami's offense is less frequently a receiver, three-year regular Andre Tillman and Loaird McCreary are tempting 6-foot-5 targets. Tillman had a pair of TDs among his 17 catches, and his solid blocking was cited by Griese as a key to an improved offense.

"McCreary will get a lot of playing time in running situations with a double tight end," Shula said.

Seventh-round draftee Lloyd Henry of Northeast Missouri and free agents Mike Shumann of Florida State and Mike Green of Ohio University will add to the training camp competition at wide receiver, although Green will be bidding primarily for the punting job.

OFFENSIVE LINE — A combined 46 years of experience in the NFL trenches is represented by the Dolphins' five-man starting front, and it includes three All-Pros. That cohesiveness has enabled Miami to lead the NFL in rushing in the 1970s.

Jim Langer, the nonpareil center, and much-honored guards Larry Little and Bob Kuechenberg form the "strongest interior line in the league." Shula includes guard Ed Newman in that assessment (Newman has 16 starts in his five-year career as the "sixth man" in the line).

A critical move in solidifying the line was the 1977 acquisition of veteran tackle Mike Current from Tampa Bay, and left tackle Wayne Moore has strengthened his troublesome knee. Shula is hopeful that an intensive weight-training program for 6-foot-8 tackle Steve Young will enable the third-year man to battle for a starting position. In a valuable utility role, Wally Pesuit could fill at center, guard or tackle.

A pair of 265-pound tackles, Eric Laakso of Tulane and Karl Baldischwiler of Oklahoma, and center Mark Dennard of Texas A&M were acquired in the draft. Dennard topped the rookies with a 400-pound bench press.

**DEFENSIVE LINE** — With the outstanding 1977 rookles A.J. Duhe and Bob Baumhower along with third-round draftee Lyman Smith of Duke, Miami has assembled youth in the ongoing fortification of the defensive line.

We look forward to Duhe and Baumhower being even better as they gain more experience especially in the pass rush,' Shula said. Duhe led the Dolphins with seven quarterback sacks, and Baumhower set a Dolphin record for tackles by a lineman with 131 stops.

Baumhawer will need most of July and August to recover from cartilage surgery performed on his right knee in June.

Defensive captain Vern Den Herder, the left end, suffered knee damage in the 11th game after starting 81 consecutive games (88 including playoffs). His recovery from surgery will give the Dolphins a rock of consistency. Veteran tackle Bob

Heinz proved a capable substitute for Den Herder while '77 rookie John Alexander saw some late-season action at end. Also rebounding from knee surgery is veteran tackle Carl Barisich, and six-year veteran Council Rudolph was acquired in a July 7 trade with Tampa Bay.

In addition to draftee Smith, the Dolphins tapped 6-foot-7 250-pound Doug Betters of Nevada-Reno in a search for a strong pass rusher.

LINEBACKERS — One of the strongest areas for the Dolphins, "a good blend of youth and experience," Shula says, is the linebacker corps.

The four-linebacker setup with 1976 first-round draftees Larry Gordon and Kim Bokamper on the outside and veterans Bob Matheson and Steve Towle on the inside was a solid unit last season. Rusty Chambers answered the call for 21/2 games when Towle suffered a shoulder separation.

Towle led the club with 138 tackles (his record was 214 tackles in 1976). The improvement of Gordon and Bokamper was significant, and Matheson had a career-high 130 tackles. By blitzing linebackers, most often Bokamper, to complement the three-man front, the Dolphins created much more pressure on the passer than was indicated statistically by 20 quarterback sacks. Miami allowed only 10 touchdown passes

When knee injuries claimed Earnest Rhone and Mike Kolen in the first half of the season, veterans like Larry Ball, Guy Roberts and Rick Dvorak were added for special teams. Rookie Bruce Herron appeared a good prospect until a training-camp knee injury forced him to wait another year.

The Dolphins may have found the "sleeper" in the draft by selecting Amherst's Sean Clancy, a quick hitter picked in the eighth round.

DEFENSIVE BACKS — When the Dolphins ranked 28th and last in the NFL in passing yardage allowed in 1976, Shula had to regroup the secondary. Cornerback Tim Foley was shifted to strong safety, veteran Curtis Johnson was reliable as ever on the right side and rookie Norris Thomas emerged as rousing hitter on the left side. "Thomas played as well as any cornerback in the league," Shula said, "and Foley really knit together the secondary."

Johnson had a team-leading four interceptions (19 in career), Thomas and Foley each had three steals and 11 passes defensed. A shoulder separation and later a broken collarbone stoped hard-luck Charlie Babb at free safety, but veteran Rick Volk shored up the position.

Reserve cornerback Charles Cornelius, a '77 free agent, is ready to challenge along with '78 draftee Gerald Small, swiftest of the rookies with a 4.5-second effort in the 40. Safeties Ted Burgmeier of Notre Dame and Zac Henderson of Oklahoma will make it more competitive for spots on the roster.

KICKERS — Placekicker Garo Yepremian, all-time scoring leader of the Dolphins, ranks second in the NFL in the career field-goal accuracy with 65.2 per cent success (161 of 247). The left-footed, soccer-style kicker has an outstanding 82.2 per cent accuracy (106 of 129) on Dolphin attempts inside the 39-yard liñe.

Mike Michel underwent surgery on his right foot after his '77 rookie season, and he could improve on his 38.2-yard punting average if he can win the job from veteran Larry Seiple. Michel is capable as a combination kicker (he booted field goals of 43 and 45 yards in a preseason game), and Seiple's versatility as a tight end makes him valuable.

#### MIAMI DOLPHINS NFL'S BEST RECORD SINCE '70 MERGER

Since the 1970 merger of the National and American Football Leagues, the Miami Dolphins have compiled the best over-all record (91-31-1) in the NFL. This includes an 8-3 mark in the playoffs. In seven of his eight seasons with the Dolphins, Coach Don Shula has won at least 10 games.

The Dolphins' winning percentage of .744 tops the records of Oakland (.738), Dallas (.729), Minnesota (.726) and Los Angeles (.683).

The Dolphins also swept three consecutive American Conference championships (1971-73), and no club in either conference has won three straight titles. Shula's team posted a perfect 17-0 record in 1972 on the way to back-to-back Super Bowl crowns (1972-73).

The Dolphins also possess the best interconference record in the NFL, winning 18 of 22 games with NFC opponents (Dallas also owns an 18-4 mark). Miami strung 11 consecutive victories against NFC foes from 1970 through 1973 in regular-season games.

Miami won 31 consecutive games at the Orange Bowl — an NFL home-field record — from Oct. 17, 1971 to Dec. 15, 1974 including four playoff games but excluding all preseason games. The Dolphins are 51-9 at home, 38-21-1 on the road and 2-1 on neutral sites (Super Bowls) during the 1970s. In regular-season games only, the Dolphins are 47-9 at home and 36-19-1 on the road in the 1970s.

"The concentration he shows catching deflected balls is uncanny." Shula says... his competitive zeal was evidenced when he played one week after suffering 10-stitch gash in webbing of right hand while catching a pass against Seattle... although he failed to snare any passes in that first outing, his hand was

"I was looking for a filling station to gas up" . . . he finished with 140 yards on 17 carries in biggest triumph of season, 17-6 over

Colts . . . he accumulated 417 yards on 91 carries, and in his first three NFL starts, he powered 324 yards . . . shoulder separation Oct. 9 sidelined him for two games and he joined roommate Gary Davis in starting backfield last five games . . . "A power back with open-field elusiveness is pretty rare, Shula says . . . he opened with 108 yards on 20 carries at Cincinnati . . . he caught 7 passes for 29 yards . . . he gained 125 yards on 31 carries in preseason and bumped another Arkansas State alumnus, Stan Winfrey, off roster . . . fifthround draftee, 123rd player in draft, was probably computer reject because of 5-foot-91/2 height, but former Player Personnel Director Bobby Beathard rated him "best fullback in the country" . . . teammates Kuechenberg, Langer and Newman tossed him into a pond twice at training camp because he didn't know words of Arkansas State fight song . . . veterans finally settled for "Jingle Bells" from bashful rookie . . . he ranked third on all-time Arkansas State rushing chart with 1.920 yards on 274 carries in only two seasons . . . as senior, he led nation with seven yards per carry, gaining 1,046 on 150 tries . . . twice All-Southland Conference, he had eight 100yard games and 13 touchdowns in 1975 . . . he also kicked off . he transferred to ASU from Fort Scott (Kan.) Junior College where he was tight end as freshman . . . born and raised in Savannah, Ga . . . he and wife Shirley (married 6-10-78) live in Miami.

B.A. in economics, he formed Creative Interiors of Florida in 1977, selling oil paintings . . . also director of sports marketing for National Airlines.

An awesome figure when leading sweeps and a hammer in the trenches, Little epitomizes the powerhouse style of the Dolphins in leading the NFL in rushing in the 1970s . . . he won All-NFL honors for the sixth time from Pro Football Writers in 1977 (also 1971-75) and he has won the honor five times from Associated Press . . . native Floridian was first Dolphin player inducted into Florida Sports Hall of Fame March 6 . . . "I rank this higher than any of the other honors I have gotten," he said . . . he has started three times in four Pro Bowl appearances, last in 1975 . . . one of fastest pulling guards to play game, he was named AFC's outstanding offensive lineman three times (1970-72) by Players' Association although media overlooked him in 1970 all-star voting . . . he has missed only two starting assignments in last 124 games (135 including playoffs), once at Shula's request to rest injured shoulder in 1973 and then with sprained knee in sixth game of 1977 . . . "A real inspiration for us," Shula says about offensive co-captain, "not just for the way he's performed but also for his influence on our younger players" . . . even at 6-foot-1, he unselfishly switched to right tackle during 1976 injury crisis and started four games with Dolphins winning three of them . he has played in 133 Dolphin regular-season games, trailing only punter Larry Seiple with 150. . . teammates call him

A punishing tackler and tough one-on-one defender, he was biggest surprise among five Dolphin rookies on NFL All-Rookie defense in 1977 . . . he started last 10 games at left cornerback after Tim Foley shifted to strong safety . . . three interceptions for 23 yards, he also forced two fumbles, broke up 11 passes and blocked a field goal . . . Shula once remarked while reading weekly injury report, "He's always going to have something bruised - Whew! What a hitter!" . . . fifth-leading tackler with 95 stops (67 initial hits) . . . he recovered fumble on kickoff to set up clinching TD at Buffalo in season opener and also jarred football from grasp of Buffalo's Bob Chandler in memorable end-zone collision . . . other end-zone heroics included interception against San Diego and fumble recovery in 17-6 victory over Baltimore when he and fullback Leroy Harris were awarded game balls . . . "If you're my size (175 pounds) and you sit back and absorb all the blows, you'll get hurt," he says. touchdown catch at St. Louis was Bob Griese's record sixth TD in 55-14 rout and a textbook example of deep route by tight end . . . he buildozed two defenders on 15-yard TD against Baltimore which gave Dolphins lead in 17-6 victory . . . "Exceptional sense of timing and good explosion," Shula says . . . he has caught 35 passes for 359 yards and three TDs, but his blocking was instrumental in Dolphins' ranking fifth in NFL in rushing in 1977 . . . "That middleman Towle is an unbelievable player. He's going to be a terror," O.J. A sensational glider with game-breaking speed, he will inject more explosiveness into Dolphin running attack . . . he gained more than 2,100 yards rushing in past two seasons at San Francisco and was traded April 17 to Miami . . . 49ers received Dolphins' first and fifth draft picks plus wide receiver Freddie Solomon and safety Vern Roberson . . . he ranked third in NFL in 1976, behind only Walter Payton and O.J. Simpson, when he set 49ers record of 1,203 yards in 248 carries, and his 4.9 yards per carry led NFC . . . his encore was 931-yard effort in 1977, but 49ers' acquisition of Simpson March 24 made Williams expendable . . . he was traded on his 27th birthday . . . he covers 40-yard dash in 4.5 seconds . . "An experienced player who has proven himself as a ballcarrier, as a receiver and as a blocker," Shula says. "He's an exciting breakaway runner" . . . he has caught 80 passes for 812 yards and five touchdowns in last three seasons . . . he has 10 games of more than 100 yards rushing (two in 1975, five in 1976, three in 1977) . . . Pro Bowl in 1976 when he broke 49ers' rushing mark set by Joe (The Jet) Perry in 1954 . . in consecutive games against St. Louis (Oct. 31) and Washington (Nov. 7) in 1976, he gained 194 and 180 yards, respectively, but despite 481 yards total offense and six TDs by Williams, San Francisco lost both games . . . he bolted for TDs of 80 and 85 yards (latter a pass play) against Redskins . . . he had 82 yards on 15 carries including 40-yard spurt in 19-15 loss to Dolphins in 1977 . . . The all-time scoring leader of the Dolphins, elfin kicker could hit the 1,000-point mark before hanging up his left shoe . . . he is runnerup on the NFL all-time chart for field-goal accuracy with 65.2 per cent success (161 of 247) while Don Cockroft of Cleveland leads with 66.9 per cent (164 of 245) and Jan Stenerud of Kansas City is third at 64.5 per cent (247 of 383) . . . he has scored 732 points for Dolphins in eight seasons and 810 points in 10-year career which began with Detroit in 1966 . . . he is tied for 15th place with Cockroft on all-time scoring list while Pittsburgh's Roy Gerela has 814 points . . . all three should overtake Don Hutson (823), Pete Gogolak (863) and Bobby Waltston (881) approaching Top 10 in 1978 . . . On opposite sides of the defensive alignment, like bumper rails on a pinball machine, they were enforcers of the No-Name Defense which captured two Super Bowl crowns.

They hit with concussive force.

Dick Anderson, strongside safety for nine seasons, was a sly opportunist in his pass coverage. Five times he turned interceptions into touchdowns, and his 62-yard express against Baltimore in the 1971 AFC Championship game will endure as possibly the most memorable single play in Dolphin history

He was an All-Pro selection three times, and in 1973, he was named NFL Defensive Player of the Year — the highest honor ever bestowed on a Dolphin defender. Anderson swiped four passes, returning two for TDs, in a 1973 clash with Pittsburgh. No Dolphin has scored with an interception since the night he ravaged the Steelers.

Mike Kolen, weakside linebacker who arrived as a longshot rookie in 1970, was the 289th player drafted that year. He quickly won a reputation as a thumping tackler and the nickname "Captain Crunch."

He didn't wear his Christian faith on his sleeve, but by his example, the message was unmistakable. Kolen brought humanness to the huddle: once in 1975, he broke up a pass with a ferocious blindside tackle, then knelt over the failen opponent until trainers revived him.

Anderson and Kolen played their final games for the Dolphins in 1977, and the new centurions can only hope to have as significant an impact.



### DOLPHINS HOLD NFL TICKET RECORDS

The Miami Dolphins possess all five National Football League records for paid attendance in a single season, established in 1973 as defending Super Bowl champions. These records include:

 Total tickets sold for 14-game schedule, home and away, with 1,025,400. The only other team to surpass a million tickets was Buffalo in 1974 with 1,003,062.

 Total tickets sold for a 7-game home schedule with 551,000 for the sellout season averaging 78,714 per game.

 Total tickets sold for a 7-game road schedule with 474,400 averaging 67,771 per game.

 Total tickets sold for a complete season (17 games) with 1,255,535 averaging 73,855 per game.

 Total season tickets sold with 74,961. Closest to that figure were the New York Giants (73,846) and Denver (73,089) in 1977.

For the 60 games played at the Orange Bowl since 1970 (excluding preseason games), the Dolphins have sold 4,079,443 tickets for an average of 67,990 over an eight-year period.

The three highest turnstile counts for Dolphin games at the Orange Bowl are 78,939 with Baltimore in the 1971 AFC Championship game; 78,914 with the New York Jets in 1972; and 78,744 with Oakland in the 1975 season opener.

The record turnstile is 532,005 averaging 76,001 fans in 1972. When all home games in 1973 were shown on local television, the Dolphins averaged approximately 16,570 noshows per game.






### SOUTH FLORIDA MEDIA

### ORANGE BOWL STADIUM

For the fifth time in the 13-year history of the Super Bowl, the Orange Bowl will be the site of the NFL Championship game Jan. 21, 1979.

The stadium has a seating capacity of 75,449 but will approach 80,000 for the Super Bowl with the addition of bleachers in the east end

Prescription Athletic Turf was installed in March 1976 to replace the Poly-Turf of the previous six seasons.

The stadium was a Works Progress Administration project built in 1937 for \$325,000 with a seating capacity of 25,000. Some 12,000 bleacher seats were added in 1945, and in 1948, double-decking of the north and south stands boosted capacity to 60,000. Some 7,500 seats were added in 1949 with the sale of \$50 non-interest bonds, and capacity reached 68,500 in 1953. The west end zone was decked in 1968 to attain 75,000 seats, and from 1971 through 1976, bleachers in the east end zone (removed in 1977) gave a capacity of 80,045.
