



JOE ROBBIF **PRESIDENT**



This season Dolphins owner Joe Robbie keeps a promise he once made to his 27 fellow NFL owners. His promise was that if they would award the 1989 Super Bowl to Miami, he would have a luxury stadium in place in which to play the league's premier game.
On Jan. 22, 1989, Super Bowl XXIII will be played in Miami and it will

be played in Joe Robbie Stadium!

On March 14, 1985, even before ground had been broken and permanent financing granted on Robbie's proposed new stadium, his colleagues had the confidence in him to award the 1989 Super Bowl to Miami. They knew that whatever it would take for Joe Robbie to obtain financing and get his stadium built in time, he would get it done.
In voting the game to Miami, the NFL owners also agreed to revisit a

city with a rich tradition of Super Bowls (five of the first 13 were played there), but a city which they previously had elected not to return to since 1979, in large part because of antiquated state of the Orange Bowl.

Had Joe Robbie not been determined to build a new stadium in Miami, it is unlikely that the city ever would have seen another Super Bowl.

However, for Robbie, getting the Super Bowl to come to Miami and his stadium was but one of the many battles he faced along the way in construction of the state-of-the-art facility.

When he first announced plans to build his own privately financed stadium at the Dolphins' 1984 awards banquet, the announcement was met with laughter and skepticism by many of those in attendance.

Today, the "dream" has come true. Joe Robbie Stadium is real, existing for all of South Florida to enjoy, and the joke is on those same people who laughed at plans for a new stadium only years before. What once was a sand dune where motorcyclists raced and refuse was dumped, is now a tropical garden. The \$115-million facility will stand for decades to come as a lasting monument to the will and courage of the man whose name it

"The mocking challenge in Miami was, 'If Joe Robbie wants a new stadium, let him build it himself. I suppose that's what first got my interest. I don't think I'd have built it if they hadn't told me it couldn't be done," the Dolphins owner once said.

If not for Joe Robbie's dedication to the cause, his will to oppose the bureaucrats of local government, the Dolphins would have had no choice other than to continue playing in the Orange Bowl or move to another city.

In order to avoid either of these two scenarios, Robbie was forced to put everything he had ever obtained - including the Dolphins franchise up as collateral to assure completion of the stadium project. "I wouldn't fault anybody for not laying everything on the line to build a new stadium, he said. "This is just my perverse nature. I once figured it out on a pocket computer. I'll have everything paid for by 2016." He will be 100 that year.

To be sure, many in the sports world have taken note of Robbie's tremendous accomplishment in getting the stadium built despite the adversity he faced.

"I think Joe Robbie is a trailblazer. This is a very exciting new development," said Chicago Bears president Michael McCaskey, who is using Joe Robbie Stadium as a model for a football stadium he would like to see built in the Windy City.


"Joe Robbie never bowed to the packs of bureaucrats and free-loading politicians who tried to bribe him into staying in the decaying Orange Bowl," said Norris Anderson, long-time columnist for Football News. "Name me another man in football today who could privately build a \$115-million stadium without leaning on public funds. Joe Robbie did. He is the toughest man, pound for pound, I have ever met in football.

Joe Robbie is a man of iron will from a small town in South Dakota, whose character was born out of challenge and struggle in the early years of his life. The Robbie family was forced to overcome the Great Depression in the face of financial poverty. The struggle was difficult and the rewards few, but the challenge was met by young Joe through hard work, honesty and self-initiative.

The tone had been set for Joe Robbie's life.

By the time he was 50, Robbie already had made a significant contribution to society in the areas of politics, government administration, public service and trial law. Most men would have been satisfied with that much. Not Joe Robbie.

In 1965, Robbie contacted AFL Commissioner Joe Foss, a former

classmate at the University of South Dakota, about a client's interest i an expansion franchise for Philadelphia. Foss turned down the idea c Philadelphia, but suggested Miami as a possibility.

When his client was not interested in South Florida, Robbie himself tool up the project. With only a successful trial lawyer's income and a family of 11 children to support, the odds were against his raising the \$7.5-millior

On top of the fee, Robbie had to overcome a virtual embargo on pro football imposed by the Orange Bowl Committee and the University o Miami, as well as adverse sentiment among AFL owners who preferred

Still he remained undaunted and did the leg work and research in preparation for the franchise application. Robbie gained a powerful ally in then-Miami Mayor Robert King High, who had received a total endorse ment of him from then-Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, and followed that by recruiting show business personality Danny Thomas to be his

The AFL awarded Robbie and Thomas the franchise on Aug. 16, 1965. Robbie took over operation of the franchise as managing general partner and turned himself to the next challenge - building a championship team from the ground up.

From the word go, things were a struggle for the league's budding franchise and its bright new mind. Disappointment abounded, on the field and in the stands, as the team had a losing record of 15-39-2 and an average attendance of less than 29,000 over the first four years.

Thomas had sold out his interest in the Dolphins in 1967, and additional problems later arose when one of the limited partners secretly negotiated to move the team to Seattle. Robbie was quick to respond, recruiting five Miami investors to buy out the dissident partner's share and ensure the franchise remained in the city. Robbie had saved professional football in

Still, there were many skeptics as Robbie continued to make assurances that the Dolphins were in Miami to stay and that they would be a championship team one day. Those who really knew Joe Robbie never

He took strong action in 1970, releasing the team's head coach, George Wilson, and hiring Don Shula, who had taken Baltimore to two NFL

The following season, Shula took the players Robbie and personnel director Joe Thomas had acquired in the first four years and turned the Dolphins into 10-4 playoff qualifiers from 3-10-1 losers in 1969.

In the last 18 years, the Dolphins either have won or shared first place in the division 13 times. Since the merger of the two leagues in 1970, Miami has recorded the best regular-season won-lost record in the NFL, becoming one of the most recognized franchises in all of sports history.

Making his Dolphins into a championship team had been an obsession of Robbie. Pulitzer Prize-winning author James A. Michener recognized the importance of this, describing it in his book "Sports in America."

"The majority of owners I have met are like Joe Robbie of Miami, real devotees, men and women to whom the building of a respectable team becomes a passion, and they add luster to the sporting scene ... In the end, they are willing to make extraordinary sacrifices in order to build a winner, and their loyalty to their team often exceeds that of their players.

One of the upcoming challenges for Robbie is to one day bring major league baseball to his new stadium. Compliments like the one recently paid him by New York Yankees owner George Steinbrenner should go a long way towards helping his chances. "I'm a Joe Robbie fan, and I've been one for quite a while," Steinbrenner said. "He's one of those guys who knows what sports is all about."

An avid soccer fan as well, Robbie's involvement with the sport is extensive. He is chairman of the 1994 World Cup Founders Club, a group which worked to bring soccer's premier event to the United States. He also is majority owner and chairman of the American Soccer League's Fort Lauderdale Strikers. In addition, Robbie had a long-time affiliation with the Minnesota Strikers of the Major Indoor Soccer League.

Robbie does not limit his energies to the area of sports, however. He involves himself personally in a number of civic endeavors. In addition, the Dolphins, under Robbie's direction, have given some \$2 million to charitable organizations in the community that supports them.

Through the years, the awards presented to him and the positions of

public service he has held reveal a side of Joe Robbie that can be lost in the shadow of the success of the Dolphins.

Presently, he sits on the board of trustees of the Public Health Trust at Jackson Memorial Hospital in Miami after serving as chairman of the board in recent years. In addition, he is chairman of the board of trustees of Pop Warner Little Scholars and also sits on the board of directors of the Florida 4-H Foundation and Camillus House. In the past, he has served on the board of governors as executive vice-chairman of St. Jude's Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, the board of governors of the annual Victor Awards for the benefit of the City of Hope National Medical Center, American Health Foundation and St. Leo College.

Recently, he was a member of the Site Selection Committee of the Democratic National Committee for the party's 1988 convention.

Robbie also has served on the board of directors of the United Way of Dade County, Catholic Service Bureau, Dade County Association for Retarded Citizens, Crippled Children's Society of Dade County and Miami Society of Autistic Children. In addition to previous work with the Heart Fund and Easter Seals, he also is an honorary member of the American Indian Scholarships, Inc.

In his native South Dakota, Robbie gives money for scholarships at all private colleges, in addition to sponsoring the Most Valuable Player awards for the state's high school football championships. For his many efforts in the Coyote state, Robbie was inducted into the South Dakota Hall of Fame in 1985.

In Florida, the Dolphins owner annually presents the Joe Robbie Award to the state's high school athletic director of the year.

In 1974, the Touchdown Club of Washington awarded Robbie the prestigious Timmie Award for "extraordinary achievement" by the Dolphins over a four-year period. He also has received the Junior Achievement Award from the Business Leadership Hall of Fame, the Gold Key Award from the National 4-H Congress as a distinguished alumnus, United States Jaycees Hall of Leadership Award, Order of the Knights of St. Gregory (a papal honor), the Humanitarian Award from the Big Brothers and Big Sisters of Greater Miami (currently is on the organization's board of advisors), Owner of the Year Award by Minneapolis-St. Paul businessmen and the Football News' Man of the Year Award.

But perhaps no award sums up the challenge and struggle of Joe Robbie's lifetime better than the rare Horatio Alger Award, given to him in 1979. It is an honor bestowed on giants of the free enterprise system, as well as U.S. presidents, in recognition of outstanding careers developed through "personal effort out of hardship."

Fellow NFL owners long have recognized Robbie's unique blend of astute business practices and human compassion, twice electing him to serve on the NFL Management Council. He served from 1972-77 and has been a member once again since 1983. He also has served on the NFL Properties Committee.

Said New England Patriots president Billy Sullivan, who has been in pro football since 1959:

"Joe Robbie gave to the fans of South Florida one of the truly great franchises in the NFL. He has put frosting on the cake with his state-of-the-art facility, which provides a superb stage for the presentation of the greatest show on earth, NFL football. His stadium project is the finest contribution that any owner in my lifetime has made. He is an All-Pro in any man's language and he has enriched our society in an unparalleled manner.

Born July 7, 1916, in Sisseton, S.D., Robbie got an early start in the business world. He was earning money as a by-lined sports editor of the local Sisseton Journal-Press by the time he was 14. In 1934, he interrupted his senior year of high school to enroll in the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) and went to work in the Black Hills area of South Dakota.

His education was not forgotten, though. Robbie had promised both his mother and himself that he would go back to school after CCC camp. He fulfilled that promise, graduating in 1935 and going on to college - the only one from his Depression-year class to do so.

Robbie entered Northern State Teachers College in Aberdeen, S.D., with nothing more than a small amount of financial aid from a debate scholarship.

The day after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, Robbie volunteered as an enlisted man in the United States Navy. He rose through the ranks to become an officer and participated in five South Pacific theatre invasions. He received the Bronze Star for his service.

At war's end, Robbie returned to South Dakota to attend the University of South Dakota Law School, graduating with his juris doctorate in 1946.

While attending South Dakota, he was elected student body president. Coupled with his election to the same position at Northern State a few years earlier, Robbie may hold the distinction of being the only person ever chosen student body president at two different schools. Both schools subsequently have conferred an honorary doctorate degree upon him, as have five other colleges and universities.

Robbie also has served his alma mater by being national fund-raising chairman for the Dakota Dome, a \$7.2-million arena at the University of South Dakota.

After being admitted to the South Dakota bar, Robbie started his law practice in Mitchell, S.D. Within two years time, he had been elected a representative to the South Dakota State Legislature, had served as State Democratic Chairman and was the candidate for governor on the Demo-

In 1951, his friend Hubert H. Humphrey encouraged Robbie to move his young family to Minneapolis. There, he was regional director of the Office of Price Stabilization for four states from 1952-53. He also became known as one of the best and most successful trial lawyers in the region.

Robbie would go on to combine politics with his law practice. He ran strongly against nationally-known and veteran Congressman Dr. Walter Judd in 1956 and 1958, despite the fact that Judd represented the solidly-Republican Fifth Congressional District.

Robbie received national recognition as chairman of the Minnesota Municipal Commission, which he presided over from 1959-65. He had drafted the bill, passed into law by the Minnesota Legislature, which created the commission. Other states subsequently have used that legislation as a model.

A devoted family man, Robbie remains close to his family despite the busy schedule he keeps. Wife, Elizabeth, is a Dolphins vice president, while three sons also hold positions with the team. Mike is responsible for the overall operation of the franchise as the team's executive vice-president and general manager, Tim oversees several departments as vice president of public affairs and Dan is director of sales and promotions for Joe Robbie Stadium. Daughter, Lynn, previously coordinated all interior decoration of the stadium's club level. Other Robbie children include sons Brian (who works on the Dolphins broadcast team of flagship station WIOD) and Kevin, and daughters Diane (Truly), Janet (Glode) and Deborah (Olson).

In the coming years, it will be common knowledge throughout the sports world that it was Joe Robbie who set the standard by building the first football stadium financed entirely with private funds, a feat pulled off against the greatest of odds.

And, because Joe Robbie will continue to meet the challenges of the day, who knows what more he might accomplish in the future.

DON SHULA HEAD COACH

"I'm just a guy who rolls up his sleeves and goes to work. I don't have peace of mind until I know I've given the game everything I can.

"The whole idea is to somehow get an edge. Sometimes it takes just a little extra something to get that edge, but you have to have it."

He has walked the sidelines for 25 years as one of professional football's most respected figures. But the fire and the desire to succeed still burn deeply in the heart of one of the game's greats.

His name is "Shula" and his job title is "coach." Yes, one could say that the two words are synonymous.

Don Shula moves into his 26th year as a head coach in the NFL in 1988 and his goal is the same as it has been in each of his seasons - to win it all.

"We're coming off two years where we've been a combined 16-15 and I'm not too happy about it," Shula says.

"We've got to improve and get back to being a good football team. We want to win again.'

And Shula knows something about winning.

Shula is pro football's winningest active coach with a 271-114-6 overall mark (.701 winning percentage)

Shula is second only to the immortal George Halas (325) on the all-time NFL coaching win list

- Shula is the only coach to guide a team through an undefeated season (17-0 in 1972)
- Shula has appeared in more Super Bowls (six) than any coach
- Shula is the only coach to reach the Super Bowl three straight seasons (1971-73)
- Shula is the youngest coach to win 100 games
- Shula is the youngest coach to win 200 games
- Shula's career winning percentage (.701) is the best among the NFL's all-time top-10 coaches
- Shula owns the best regular-season winning percentage (.713) among all active NFL coaches
- Shula is the only coach to present two players for induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in the same year (Larry Csonka and Jim Langer, 1987)

Shula would measure a coach's success by yardsticks other than victories and championships, although he has miles of achievements in those ways. Of greater importance to pro football's most celebrated winner is something intangible. What matters most is one's integrity as a

"If I'm remembered for anything as a coach," Shula says, "I hope it's for playing within the rules. I also hope it will be said that my teams showed class and dignity in victory or defeat."

Shula has become to coaching what his unbeaten 1972 Miami Dolphins are to team accomplishment: the standard of excellence by which all others are measured.

But there is an intriguing footnote to the record Shula has carved in his 25 years of pacing the NFL sidelines. This statistic speaks volumes about his coaching ability and his style - the Dolphins have been the leastpenalized team in the NFL during Shula's seasons in Miami.

Shula was voted Coach of the Decade for the 1970s by the Pro Football

Hall of Fame's 25-member selection committee, and his Dolphins have reached the playoffs five more times in the 1980s.

His "ultimate" achievement was the NFL's first unbeaten, untied record of 17-0 in 1972 in only the third season of Shulas transformation of the Dolphins from a struggling American Football League franchise to an NFL power. His incredible two-year record of 32-2, including Super Bowl

conquests in 1972 and 1973, probably never will be surpassed.

Maybe because Shula never regarded an unbeaten season as impossible, the feat became a reality.

With teams in Baltimore and Miami, Shula has built six unbeaten streaks of 10 or more games, and no other coach has more than two 10-game streaks. His .691 winning mark in 18 seasons in Miami (198-88-2) parallels his .728 percent success in Baltimore (73-26-4) from 1963 to

The Dolphins have either won or shared first place in the AFC East 13 times in the 18 years under Shula, and have reached the playoffs 12 times. His Dolphins were almost invincible at the Orange Bowl with an 111-26-1 record (.808), including an NFL-record 31-game winning streak at home from 1971 to 1974. A remarkable 18 times in 25 seasons, Shula's teams have won at least 10 games.

Shula, 58, has made a mark on the game as an innovator of defensive complexities and situational substitutions, and he has a reputation as a great motivator. Certainly, other coaches can develop brilliant strategy and exhort their players to perform at peak. But Shula seems to surpass others in his skill as a teacher.

"The important thing is not what Don Shula knows or what any of my assistant coaches know," Shula says. "The important thing is that we can transmit to the people we're responsible for. They're going to be tested on Sunday afternoon, and the fact that we win on Sunday afternoon indicates that we're getting through to them. That's what coaching is - the ability to

Twice with the Dolphins, in 1970 and 1977, Shula has deployed five



rookies in the starting defense and won 10 of 14 games each season. And for those exigencies brought on by injuries to his starting quarterback, Shula has more solutions. Backup quarterbacks for the Dolphins have a 27-7-1 record under Shula since 1970.

He cultivates a winning attitude in preseason success which reads 92-31-4 (.740), including 32-4-1 at Baltimore and 60-27-3 at Miami.

He had been the youngest head coach, 33, in NFL history when the Colts picked him in 1963 after Shula's three years as defensive coordinator of the Detroit Lions. In the old NFL, the Colts reached the title game in 1964 and 1968 after 12-2 and 13-1 campaigns, and the 1967 Colts posted an 11-1-2 record. Those three powerhouse teams averaged almost 30 points per game offensively.

Shula's resourcefulness is best documented in 1965 when injuries sidelined Colt quarterbacks John Unitas and Gary Cuozzo, and halfback Tom Matte wore the "playbook" on his wristband and directed a 20-17

upset at Los Angeles.

Shula transformed a 3-10-1 Dolphin team into a playoff qualifier his first season in Miami and laid the foundation for a perennial contender. In 1971, the Dolphins won their first of four consecutive AFC East titles, and on Christmas Day in Kansas City, the NFL's longest game (82 minutes, 40 seconds) ended with Garo Yepremian's winning 37-yard field goal in the second overtime. A week later, the Dolphins stymied the Unitas-led Colts 21-0 on the same Orange Bowl field where Baltimore had won Super Bowl V the previous January.

Dethroning the Colts launched the Dolphins to three consecutive AFC championships - a feat unequalled in either conference since the 1970 merger. But a disappointing 24-3 loss to the Dallas Cowboys in Super Bowl VI filled Shula and his players with greater drive, and in 1972 the

Dolphins attracted headlines as the "Greatest Team Ever.

Shula had claimed 38-year-old Earl Morrall from the waiver list in April of 1972, recalling Morrall's leadership of the 1968 Colts. When quarterback Bob Griese suffered a broken ankle in the fifth game, Morrall took charge for 11 straight victories. The Dolphins rewrote the NFL rushing record (2,960 yards), and with a regular-season record of 105-30-5, Shula became the first NFL coach to win 100 games in his first decade. Later in his career, he was to accomplish the even more impressive feat of winning 200 games in his first 20 seasons as an NFL boss.

Surprisingly, the unbeaten Dolphins were three-point underdogs to the Washington Redskins in Super Bowl VII. Shula elected to go with a healthy Griese, and the Dolphins dominated the Redskins 14-7 for the

coach's first NFL crown.

No less impressive were the 1973 Dolphins, losing only twice in 17 games. The Dolphins set a modern NFL record by allowing only 1,290 yards passing and only five touchdown passes, and they overwhelmed three playoff opponents, 85-33, including a 24-7 rout of the Minnesota Vikings in Super Bowl VIII.

Another three-game surge in the playoffs, this time a 76-26 blitz, earned the AFC Championship in the strike-shortened 1982 season and landed the Dolphins in Super Bowl XVII. Miami held a four-point lead in the fourth quarter before Washington broke a long touchdown run that sparked a

27-17 Redskin victory.

Donald Francis Shula was born January 4, 1930, in Grand River, Ohio, and was raised in Painesville, Ohio. He was a running back at John Carroll University in Cleveland, and in 1950 he gained 125 yards when

the Blue Streaks upset Syracuse, 21-15.

Shula was the lone rookie on coach Paul Brown's defending NFL champion Cleveland Browns in 1951 (until Shula's college teammate Carl Taseff joined the Browns at mid-season). Shula and Taseff were involved in the largest trade in modern NFL history, a 15-player deal with Baltimore in 1953, and Shula played four seasons with the Colts (1953-56) and one season at Washington (1957) at right cornerback. He had 21 career interceptions for 247 yards in seven seasons.

Shula entered the coaching ranks with an assistant's job at Virginia (1958) and Kentucky (1959), and he joined the NFL's Detroit Lions in 1960 under coach George Wilson – a man he later replaced in Miami. The Lions posted a 26-13-1 record with Shula as the defensive coordinator.

In 1963, Shula succeeded Weeb Ewbank as head coach at Baltimore, and in the 25 seasons which have followed he has reached the NFL's championship game seven times with two victories.

Today, he takes an active role in NFL leadership, serving since 1975 on the select NFL Competition Committee which evaluates and recommends changes in playing rules.

Shula has given considerable time, plus financial and emotional support, to several area charities. The Don Shula Scholarship Foundation was created in 1978 and has awarded scholarships at several Florida colleges. He also funds scholarships in the sports administration program at St. Thomas University, the location of the Dolphins' training complex. Shula also has been active in the American Cancer Society, March of Dimes, American Red Cross, United Way and Catholic Charities.

A member of the Class of 1951 at John Carroll, Shula helps to sponsor an academic chair of studies in his name at his alma mater. The chair, funded at \$1 million through major private gifts added to Shula's own

commitment, is in the University's Department of Philosophy.

in the last two years Shula has drawn rave reviews for his work as a studio analyst during the AFC playoffs for NBC's NFL Live. He also has provided color commentary on the Super Bowl each of the last two years for British TV. On Jan. 17, 1987, Shula and his Dolphin staff (including son David, the team's assistant head coach) coached the winning South squad in the Senior Bowl in Mobile, Ala. One of his quarterbacks in that game was son Mike, then a QB from the University of Alabama.

Shula especially values his family life and his Catholic faith. He and the former Dorothy Bartish have been married 30 years (7/19/58) and have

raised five children – two boys and three girls.

Oldest son David, 28, and his wife Leslie have two sons, Danny and Christopher. David joined the Dolphin coaching staff late in the '82 season. He starred collegiately at Dartmouth, where he set all of the pass receiving records for the Big Green. After earning his degree in history, David played for a season with the Baltimore Colts.

Mike, a former all-state quarterback at Columbus High School in Miami, enjoyed an outstanding career as signal caller for the Crimson Tide of Alabama. Mike, who graduated with a degree in labor management, is an offensive assistant coach for Tampa Bay after a one-year playing career

The Shulas oldest daughter, Donna, was married in 1984 to Joe Janach and they have two children, Alex and Lindsey. Another daughter, Sharon, graduated from the University of Miami and Florida State's College of Law and is now an attorney in Miami. Youngest daughter, Annie, graduated from St. Thomas University and is a teacher at Sabal Palm Elementary School in North Miami Beach.

Pat Kelly, who supervised stadium operations at famed Yankee Stadium for 20 years, moves into his second season as director of stadium events for Joe Robbie Stadium.

Kelly, who began his career at Yankee Stadium in 1967, served as stadium manager and then vice president of stadium operations before joining the Dolphins. His main responsibility was the efficient operation and maintenance of all of Yankee Stadium's facilities.

While at Yankee Stadium, he supervised the Pope's Mass, numerous American League playoff and World Series games, the All-Star game, championship boxing events and New York Giants football (1967-73).

Kelly served in the United States Navy before spending 24 years with the New York City Police Department. Married to the former Oatherine Conway, they are the parents of two children. The couple



ASSISTANT COACHES

DAVID SHULA



Assistant Head Coach. Quarterbacks/Passing Game

College: Dartmouth NFL: Seventh Season Dolphins: Seventh Season Born: May 28, 1959

David Shula begins his seventh season with the Dolphins and serves Miami as its assistant head coach, in addition to being in charge of the passing game and quarterbacks. In a relatively short time, Shula has become one of the brightest and most respected young coaches in professional football. Three years ago he added the responsibility of assistant head coach and has become more involved in the overall football operation. This past February he relinquished his duties concerning the team's receiving corps to new receivers coach Larry Seiple.

After three years as the Dolphins' receivers coach, Shula was given the added duties of working with Miami quarterbacks in 1985. He proved he takes after his famous father in two important characteristics

- hard work and dedication.

Last year the Dolphins again enjoyed success through the air as Miami was first in the league in passing as a team for the second straight season, and Dan Marino was second in the AFC in the individual rankings. In addition, rookie Troy Stradford (13th) and Mark

Clayton (17th) were among leaders in AFC receiving.

In 1983 (David's first full season), the results of his endeavors were very apparent. During the '82 off-season, Shula spent considerable time with wide receiver Mark Duper and incoming rookie quarterback Dan Marino. The results were that Duper, a seldom-used player in '82, emerged as the Dolphins' first-ever 1,000-yard receiver, and Marino emerged as perhaps the finest rookie QB in NFL history. In the '83 off-season, Shula redirected much of his energies toward another second-year receiver, Mark Clayton, while continuing to work with Duper and Marino. The results again were spectacular as Clayton set club records for receptions and yards with Duper close behind. Much of his energy this season will be directed toward the further development of James Pruitt and Scott Schwedes.

The 29-year-old Shula became a permanent member of the team's coaching staff in January, 1983, following a one month temporary assignment to replace Wally English. At the time of his hiring, Shula was a first-year law student, and thus had to decide whether to pursue

a legal or a coaching career.

Shula spent one season (1981) as a return specialist/wide receiver for the Baltimore Colts. On Sept. 27, 1981, Shula met Shula as son David's Colt club competed against father Don's Dolphin team. Miami

won in Baltimore, 31-28.

Shula was a two-time All-Ivy League selection at Dartmouth (1978-80) and holds all major Big Green receiving records, including most career catches (133) and most career receiving yardage (1,822). He started every game during his varsity career, and as a senior caught 52 passes (school record) for 758 yards. Born on May 28, 1959, in Lexington, Ky., David graduated from Dartmouth in 1981 with a B.A. in history. Shula was also a two-sport letterman at Hollywood's Chaminade High School.

David and his wife, Leslie (married 6/5/82), live in Miami Lakes with

their sons, Danny (10/9/83) and Christopher (2/5/86). The Shulas are expecting their third child this September. Shula has been involved in the "Say No to Drugs" program in the off-season.

TOM OLIVADOTTI



Defense College: Upsala NFL: Fourth Season

Dolphins: Second Season Born: September 22, 1945

Tom Olivadotti begins his second season as the man responsible for the Dolphins' overall defense. Olivadotti came to the Dolphins after spending two seasons (1985-86) with the Cleveland Browns as an

In his first year with Miami, the number of big plays allowed by the Dolphins decreased dramatically. Miami was first in the AFC (and third in the NFL) in fewest yards allowed per completion (11.63). In 1986, the Dolphins had given up 13.19 yards per completion, 12th in the AFC

The Long Branch, N.J., native made an impressive NFL coaching debut three years ago when he handled the Browns' outstanding linebacking corps. In 1986 he was in charge of Cleveland's defensive backs - one of the main reasons the Browns came within one game of the Super Bowl. Cleveland had the best record (12-4) in the AFC

Olivadotti is familiar with Miami - he spent four seasons as a defensive coach at the University of Miami, serving the last three years as defensive coordinator. The Hurricanes captured the national championship in Olivadotti's last season (1983). He then followed head coach Howard Schnellenberger (a former Dolphin assistant) to Louisville with the understanding that he could leave if a pro coaching ob arose, which it did with the Browns.

Olivadotti played defensive back and receiver in four years as a tarter at Upsala College in East Orange, N.J., and also participated in baseball and track. While coaching at New Jersey high schools Pope Pius (1967-68), Long Branch (1968-71) and Red Bank Catholic (1971-72), he also played semi-pro ball for five seasons.

He then moved on to Salesianum Prep School in Wilmington, Del., as head coach (1972-75) before moving up to the college ranks beginning at Princeton (1975-77) as tutor for linebackers and the offensive line. Later (1978-79) he coached linebackers at Boston College and also organized the entire defense.

Olivadotti, who has a business degree, resides in Cooper City with his wife, Karen (married 6/15/68), and their two children, Kari Anne 9/30/70) and Kirk (1/1/74).

Defensive Backs

College: North Carolina A&T NFL: Ninth Season

Dolphins: Fourth Season Born: January 6, 1942

Mel Phillips moves into his fourth season as defensive backs coach for the Dolphins. Three years ago, in only his first season with Miami, Phillips saw his DBs tie for third place in the AFC in interceptions. A rash of injuries hurt the Miami secondary in '86 but Phillips has high hopes for the '88 campaign.

Before coming to Miami, the 46-year-old Phillips previously held the same position for five seasons with the Detroit Lions (1980-84).

Known for his outstanding rapport with his players, Phillips coached in Detroit under then-head coach (and former Dolphin assistant) Monte Clark. With Miami, Phillips works with a defensive backfield rich in experience that features quality veterans like Don McNeal, William Judson, Glenn Blackwood, Paul Lankford and Bud Brown. He also has some outstanding young talent in Reyna Thompson, Mike Smith, Jarvis Williams and Rodney Thomas.

Phillips, a native of Shelby, N.C., played 12 seasons for the San

Francisco 49ers (1966-77), including eight as a starter at strong safety. A tenacious hitter during his playing days, his career statistics include 10 interceptions for 106 return yards (35-yard TD in 1970). Phillips twice won the 49ers' Len Eshmont Award, symbolic of the team's most valuable player. Following his retirement from the 49ers, Phillips worked for the city of San Francisco's juvenile probation department until joining the Lions.

Collegiately, Phillips attended North Carolina A&T, where he played both ways as a defensive back and a running back. As a senior, Phillips rushed for 648 yards on 100 carries for 11 touchdowns, and also caught 19 passes for 277 yards and four scores. That season (1965), A&T won the conference championship and Phillips intercepted two passes and rushed for two TDs in the title game. Phillips also lettered for the swimming and track teams at A&T.

Mel and his wife, Patricia (married 1/23/65), live in Miami Lakes with their daughters, Paulette (6/4/67) and Yvette (5/9/73). He was born on Jan. 6, 1942, in Shelby, N.C.

JOHN SANDUSKY



Offense, Offensive Line College: Villanova NFL: 30th Season Dolphins: 13th Season Born: December 28, 1925

Like many of the men who played for him, John Sandusky is 24

regarded as "one of the best in the business." Sandusky - and his offensive line - just keeps getting better. A veteran of three decades of NFL coaching (he begins his 30th campaign in '88), Sandusky starts his 13th year with the Dolphins looking for continued success. In 1987, the Dolphin offensive line allowed the fewest QB sacks (13) in the NFL for the sixth straight season.

Under Sandusky's guidance the Dolphin offensive line has rewritten the NFL record book. In 1987 Miami increased its league-record string of consecutive seasons leading the NFL in fewest QB sacks to six (1982-87). The Dolphins also hold the record for most seasons leading the league in fewest sacks - seven. Miami also led the NFL in passing in 1987.

Despite his assistant coaching title, he is also quite knowledgeable about defense, having spent seven of his 30 seasons coaching the other side of the line of scrimmage. In four of the past five campaigns, eight Dolphin offensive linemen have been singled out for some type

of post-season honors.

The 62-year-old Sandusky joined the Dolphins in 1976 after spending three seasons (1973-75) as an assistant coach for the Philadelphia Eagles. Prior to that, he was a coach for the Baltimore Colts from 1959-72, including the 1963-69 seasons under then-Colt head coach Don Shula. When Shula moved to Miami in 1970, he attempted, but was unable, to bring Sandusky with him. Sandusky was on the Colt staff for their two Super Bowl appearances in games III and V.

When Don McCafferty was fired as Baltimore's head coach after winning only one of the first five games in 1972, Sandusky became the Colt boss and led his charges to four victories in their final nine games. Two of Sandusky's losses that season were to Shula's unde-

feated Dolphin team.

Sandusky was an All-America tackle at Villanova University (1946-49) before joining the NFL's Cleveland Browns in 1950. He played both offensive and defensive tackle in six seasons in Cleveland as the Browns made it to the NFL title game in all six of those campaigns (three wins). Sandusky then played one year (1956) with the Green Bay Packers before beginning his coaching career at Villanova (1957-

Sandusky has the unique distinction of having served in four different capacities in the now-defunct College All-Star game in Chicago. He played (1950) and coached (1958) for the All-Stars, and also played (1951, 1955) and coached (1969, 1971) for the NFL champion-

ship team that annually opposed the collegians.

John remarried on 6/6/87 to the former Shirley Petti and the couple resides in Hollywood with her three children (Georgina, Jason and Jennifer). John has two sons (Jack and James) living in Baltimore, and a daughter (Ruth) who resides in Silver Spring, Md. Another son, Gerry, covers the Dolphins as a sportscaster for WSVN-TV in Miami. Another son, Joe, died in '78 of complications from pneumonia while a sophomore at Tulsa University. John was married to his first wife, Ruth, for 34 years before her death in December, 1985. John has four

LARRY SEIPLE



Receivers College: Kentucky NFL: Eighth Season Dolphins: First Season Born: February 14, 1945

The newcomer to the Miami Dolphins' coaching staff is an old familiar face - former Dolphin Larry Seiple. Seiple, who spent 11

seasons with Miami as a player, returns "home" in a new role as receivers coach.

Seiple joined the Dolphin sta" in late February after spending a year as a sales representative for a manufacturing company in the automo-

tive industry in Birmingham, Mch.

The Allentown, Pa., native crings seven years experience as an NFL receivers coach to Miam. He previously served as receivers coach with the Detroit Lions (1980-84), working under former Dolphins' assistant Monte Clark. He then moved on to Tampa Bay, where he was receivers coach from 1985-86. While in Detroit, Seiple was on a staff that also included current Miami defensive backs coach Mel

The 43-year-old Seiple began his coaching career at the University of Miami under another former Dolphin assistant, Howard Schnellenberger. Seiple was with the Hurrcanes during the '78 and '79 seasons.

Seiple's playing career with the Dolphins spanned 11 seasons (1967-77) after he made the team as a seventh-round draft choice out of Kentucky. He played in 149 regular-season games for Miami (eighthmost in team history) as a punter, tight end, wide receiver and running back. Seiple finished his career with 72 receptions for 935 yards (13.0 average) and seven touchdowns. His best season came in 1969 when he led the Dolphins in receiving with 41 catches for 577 yards (14.1 average) and five TDs. He also had 16 carries for 159 yards in his

Seiple still holds the Dolphins record for most career punts (633), and his career punting average (40.0 yards) is second only to the 43.7-yard average of current punter Reggie Roby. Seiple's most memorable exploit as a Dolphin came against Pittsburgh in the 1972 AFC Championship game when his daring 37-yard run on fourth down from punt formation set up Miam's first touchdown in a 21-17 victory.

He and his wife, Trudy (marned 6/4/66), live in Miami Lakes and have three children, Keri Lynn (6 10/67), Larry (7/10/69) and Lori Ann

DAN SEKANOVICH



Defensive Line College: Tennessee NFL: 12th Season Dolphins: Third Season Born: July 27, 1933

Dan Sekanovich, a veteran of more than a decade of NFL coaching, begins his third season as a member of the Miami Dolphins staff. The 55-year-old Sekanovich is in charge of the Dolphin defensive line. He spent three seasons (1983-85) as the assistant head coach/defensive line mentor of the Atlanta Falcons before coming to Miami. While with Atlanta he helped develop two top young linemen in Rick Bryan and Mike Gann. With the Dolphins, he will be working with young prospects

like TJ. Turner, Brian Sochia, John Bosa and Eric Kumerow.

Prior to his Atlanta post, Sekanovich developed one of the NFL's most feared defensive units, "The New York Sack Exchange," while defensive line coach for the New York Jets from 1977-82. In 1981, the Sack Exchange led the NFL in sacks with the defensive line getting

Before joining the Jets, the West Hazleton, Pa., native enjoyed his first professional coaching experience when he served on Mary Levy's staff (now head coach of the Buffalo Bills) for the Montreal Alouettes

of the Canadian Football League from 1973-76. Montreal captured the Grey Cup title in 1974 as Sekanovich coached both the offensive and

His collegiate coaching stops included: Kentucky (1971-72), Navy (1969-70), Pittsburgh (1968), Connecticut (1964-67) and Sus-

Sekanovich enjoyed a fine playing career (1951-53) at Tennessee

under General Bob Neyland, where he played as a defensive end.

Dan and his wife, Delores (married 11/27/65), have a son, Dan, Jr. (11/23/66), a senior at Wake Forest, and a daughter, Catherine (11/28/68), a sophomore at the University of Miami. They reside in Cooper

CHUCK STUDLEY



Linebackers College: Illinois NFL: 20th Season Dolphins: Fifth Season Born: January 17, 1929

Chuck Studley, a veteran of two decades of NFL coaching, moves into his second season as Miami's linebacker coach. For the previous three years (1984-86) Studley was in charge of the Dolphins' overall

The Dolphin defense has had a proud tradition of linebackers with men named Buoniconti, Matheson and Duhe. Studley hopes to continue that trend with veterans like Hugh Green, Bob Brudzinski, Mark Brown and Jackie Shipp and young standouts like John Offerdahl, Rick Graf and Eric Kumerow. In 1986, Offerdahl became the first Dolphin LB named as a starter in the Pro Bowl. He was named to the Pro Bowl again in 1987.

Studley, who joined the Dolphins on Dec. 27, 1983, had begun the '83 season as the defensive coordinator for the Houston Oilers. Following the team's 0-6 start, head coach Ed Biles resigned on Oct. 10, with Studley being tabbed as interim head coach. He took over the undermanned Oilers, guiding them to upsets over Detroit and Cleveland, and nearly one over Miami. Studley's Oilers led Shula's Dolphins in the fourth quarter of their Dec. 4 Astrodome encounter before the

Prior to his service in Houston, Studley spent the 1979-82 seasons as the defensive coordinator for the San Francisco 49ers. The '81 49er squad went all the way, capturing Super Bowl XVI with a victory over the Cincinnati Bengals. Before heading to California, Studley had been a Bengal assistant for 10 seasons (1969-78).

Studley, born in Maywood, Ill., was an All-America guard at the University of Illinois (1949-51), captaining its undefeated 1951 team that went to the Rose Bowl. He began his coaching career at Alton (III.) High School (1952-54) before returning to his alma mater to coach the Fighting Illini (1955-59). As a head coach, he led the University of Massachusetts to a Yankee Conference championship in 1960, then spent six years at the helm of the University of Cincinnati, helping the Bearcats to a pair of Missouri Valley titles.

Chuck and his wife, Peggy (married 6/24/50), live in Miami Lakes. They have six children (Carole, Doug, Susan, David, Mike and Steve)

CARL TASEFF



Offensive Backs
College: John Carroll
NFL: 22nd Season
Dolphins: 19th Season
Born: September 28, 1928

When Don Shula arrived in Miami in 1970, so too did Carl Taseff. Taseff and Shula's relationship dates back to their college days when they played in the same backfield together for coach Herb Eisele's John Carroll squad in Cleveland. They were also roommates in the NFL while both played for Cleveland (1951-52) and Baltimore (1953-56).

Taseff has coached the Dolphin offensive backs since coming to South Florida, and he's done it with great success. In fact, in the eight-year span from 1970-77, Taseff's backs ranked fifth or higher in NFL rushing on seven occasions. More importantly, Taseff has been able to change with the times. During the 1970s, the Dolphins employed a grind-it-out style that featured powerful fullback Larry Csonka. Since Dan Marino's emergence as Miami's air-oriented quarterback, Taseff's charges have become more a part of the passing game (ie. Lorenzo Hampton was second on the team in receptions in '86 and Troy Stradford led the team in '87). Stradford, a rookie last year, was 10th in the conference in rushing and 13th in the AFC in receiving. He earned numerous rookie-of-the-year awards.

Taseff came to Miami after spending two years working for the CEPO scouting combine (1968-69). Prior to that, he had coaching stints with the AFL's Boston Patriots (1964) and the NFL's Detroit Lions

As a player, Taseff was a star running back at John Carroll University, scoring 22 touchdowns in 1950. He began his pro career in 1951 with his hometown Cleveland Browns before beginning a nine-year term (1953-61) with the Baltimore Colts. A cornerback for the Colts, Taseff set a team record with a 90-yard punt return for a touchdown against Green Bay (10/14/56). He holds an NFL record with a 99-yard return of a Walt Michaels field goal attempt against the Rams (12/12/59).

After the Colts, Taseff played the latter part of the '61 season for Philadelphia before winding up his playing career with Buffalo in 1962. Overall, Taseff's career stats show 112 punt returns for 826 yards and no fumbles.

Carl and his wife, Lucy (married 11/18/78), live in Miami. He has two daughters, Cynthia Sue and Susan (both married), by a previous marriage. He also has three grandchildren.



DOLPHIN FACT

Despite having 92 players appear in the Pro Bowl since 1970, the Dolphins have never had a tight end or cornerback play

in the post-season all-star contest. Offensive guard is the position which Miami has been represented at most often (16 times, led by Bob Kuechenberg's six appearances). Surprisingly, despite the high number of appearances by the rest of the offensive line (also, 12 by centers), Dolphin offensive tackles have played in the Pro Bowl on only three occasions (Norm Evans twice, Wayne Moore once).

JUNIOR WADE



Strength and Conditioning College: South Carolina State

NFL: 14th Season Dolphins: 14th Season Born: February 2, 1947

One of the key figures in the Dolphin program is veteran strength and conditioning coach Junior Wade.

In his sixth season as the Dolphins' strength and conditioning coach, Wade also administers the team's successful off-season conditioning program and assists with the Miami special teams. Previously, Wade had served eight years as the club's assistant trainer. The promotion to assistant coaching status was a well-deserved reward for the affable Wade. As a trainer, he long had held the respect of the Dolphin players for his knowledge and his willingness to boost player morale by putting himself through the same rigorous rehabilitation as that prescribed for injured Dolphins.

Appointed to his present position on Feb. 15, 1983, Wade first joined the Dolphins as training camp assistant for the 1973-74 preseasons. He was hired by the Dolphins on a full-time basis in time for the 1975 campaign. Wade's past job experience includes having worked as an athletic trainer and guidance counselor at Fayetteville State and as the trainer for the St. Louis Cardinals' baseball farm team in Orangeburg, S.C.

Wade was also the head baseball coach and assistant trainer at Davidson College. In 1975, he led the Wildcats to a 21-15 record, the best mark the school had ever posted. A three-year letterman himself at South Carolina State, Wade also earned his master's degree in education. Following his graduation from SCSU in 1969, he worked as head trainer at the school for three years.

Junior, a native of Bath, S.C., lives in Miami with his wife, Constance (married 12/13/70), and sons Aaron (2/25/72) and Jason (2/24/80).

MIKE WESTHOFF



Special Teams, Tight Ends College: Wichita State

NFL: Sixth Season Dolphins: Third Season Born: January 10, 1948

Mike Westhoff begins his third year as a member of the Dolphins' coaching staff concentrating on special teams and tight ends.

Westhoff came to Miami after spending a year in the United States Football League with the Arizona Outlaws, where he was the offensive line coach for Frank Kush.



Before his one-year stint in the USFL, Westhoff spent three seasons under Kush with the Baltimore/Indianapolis Colts (1982-84). While with the Colts, his responsibilities included tight ends, special teams and weight training.

The 40-year-old Westhoff began his collegiate playing career at Wyoming in 1965, where he was a starting outside linebacker as a freshman. He then transferred to Wichita State, where he was a three-year starter at linebacker and center. He graduated from Wichita State in 1970 with a degree in history. He was the team's MVP as a junior and served as captain during his senior campaign.

Westhoff started his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at Indiana University, where he earned a master's degree in educational psychology in 1974. He was named as a full-time coach at IU in 75 before becoming offensive line coach at Dayton in 1976. Westhoff then took over as coach of the defensive line and linebackers at Indiana State in 1977. He then coached at Northwestern (1978-80) and Texas Christian (1981), working with the offensive line.

Born in Pittsburgh, he was raised in Bethel Park, Pa. Mike and his wife, Marilyn (married 1/25/70), reside in Fort Lauderdale with their

son John Thomas (4/27/81).

CHARLEY WIN



Director of Pro Personnel, **Administrative Assistant** College: Washington (Mo.)

NFL: 34th Season Dolphins: Eighth Season

Born: July 2, 1925

A veteran of 34 NFL coaching and front-office seasons, Charley Winner serves the Miami Dolphins as director of pro personnel and as an administrative assistant to Don Shula.

Four years ago, Winner was given the responsibility of negotiating most player contracts. That duty goes along with Winner's other tasks that include scouting upcoming Dolphin opponents, searching for free

agent talent and handling waiver and trade transactions.

Winner joined the Dolphins in 1981 after working one year for a cable television company. Prior to that, he enjoyed a distinguished coaching career which began in 1948 as an assistant under future father-in-law Weeb Ewbank at his alma mater, Washington University in St. Louis. He moved to Case Tech in 1950 under head coach Lou Saban, remaining there for four seasons. In 1954, Winner began his professional coaching career at Baltimore, again with Ewbank at the helm. From 1954-65, he coached Colt ends, defensive backs, linebackers and served as defensive coordinator. During his Baltimore stint, he coached a defensive back named Don Shula, later serving on Shula's staff when he became the Colt boss.

In 1966, Winner accepted the head coaching position of the St. Louis Cardinals, a post he held for five seasons. His teams had a 35-30-5 record, including an outstanding 9-4-1 mark in 1968. From 1971-72, Winner coached defensive backs for George Allen's Washington Redskins, whose '72 squad lost to the Dolphins in the Super Bowl. He was again reunited in 1973 with Ewbank, this time as an assistant for the New York Jets. Winner took over as Jet head coach the following year, posting a 9-14 slate in two seasons. He then

coached Cincinnati's defensive backfield from 1976-79. Under Winner's guidance, Bengal DBs had conference rankings of first (1976) and second (1978) during his tenure there.

A native of Somerville, N.J., Winner attended Southeast Missouri College for one year before being drafted into the service in 1942. A radio operator and gunner in the Air Force, he flew 17 missions over Germany, and once spent six weeks in a German POW camp. Following the war, he completed his education at Washington University, earning letters in football and track.

Charley and his wife, Nancy (married 6/23/50), live in Plantation. They have two daughters, Cinda and Lisa, and six grandchildren.

CHUCK CONNOR



Director of Player Personnel College: Cincinnati

NFL: 11th Season Dolphins: 11th Season Born: July 7, 1937

The man responsible for the scouting of college players and the Dolphins' preparation for the NFL draft is Chuck Connor. A veteran of a decade of service, Connor serves as director of player personnel for Miami and quietly has become one of the top men at his position in

Preparing for the annual draft is Connor's primary concern, and he has done that well during his Dolphin tenure, boasting 37 players from his first 10 drafts, including 19 in the last three, who remain on the team's roster heading into the 1988 preseason.

Three years ago, faced with no first-round selection and only the 24th pick (52nd overall) in the second round, Connor and his staff came up with a then-unknown linebacker from Western Michigan, John Offerdahl. At season's end Offerdahl was NFL Rookie of the Year. In 1986, five rookies made the squad and four started on defense at

Last season Conner and Co. pulled off another successful draft as nine of Miami's 13 selections made the '87 squad. John Bosa and Rick Graf were starters on defense, while standout RB Troy Stradford won numerous rookie-of-the-year awards after being chosen in the fourth

The McKees Rocks, Pa., native joined the Dolphins in February, 1978, after spending the previous three years scouting for BLESTO, one of the NFLs two scouting combines. In his last year with BLESTO, Connor had been promoted from area to regional scout, responsible for a nine-state area in the southeastern United States.

Connor began his career as a coach on the high school level, spending 15 years (1960-74) at Montour High near Pittsburgh. Eight of those seasons were spent as a head coach, with his 1967 squad going undefeated. In '74, he continued as a teacher at Montour while becoming the defensive backfield coach at Carnegie-Mellon University. While at Montour, Connor had begun evaluating players from film for the Pittsburgh Steelers, which eventually led to his BLESTO posi-

Chuck and his wife, Dorothy (married 6/27/59), live in Stone Mountain, Ga. They have four children, Chuck (4/23/60), Mike (1/16/65), Karen (6/20/66) and Scott (7/29/76).

MILT DAVIS



College Scout College: UCLA NFL: 22nd Season Dolphins: 11th Season Born: May 31, 1929

The veteran of the Miami Dolphins' collegiate scouting corps is Milt Davis, who since 1978 has been responsible for the western region. In addition to his scouting duties, Davis, who has over two decades of experience in the NFL, also assists the coaching staff during mini-camp and portions of summer training camp. He retired in June of 1987 after 28 years as a counselor and biology professor at Los

Davis began his scouting career in 1967 with the Baltimore Colts, continuing in that capacity until 1976. He spent the '77 season "beating the bushes" for the Los Angeles Rams before joining the Dolphins.

In four seasons as a Colt defensive back (1957-60), Davis twice tied for the NFL lead in interceptions and was an All-Pro selection in 1957. In his rookie season, Davis picked off 10 of his 27 career interceptions. He was a member of the Colts' 1958 and '59 teams that defeated the New York Giants for the league championship.

Richly educated, Davis received his undergraduate degree, a master's degree in zoology (he's an avid bird-watcher) and a doctorate in administrative education from UCLA.

Milt and his wife, Yvonne (married 1/18/58), live in Los Angeles. They have three children, Allison (2/19/59) and twins Brian and Hilary (5/21/62), and a grandson, Chance (4/3/84).

MIKE CARTWRIGHT

Prior to joining BLESTO, Colbert was the backfield coach and recruiting coordinator at Ohio Wesleyan for three years (1981-83). In 84 he aided Wesleyan as its head baseball coach.

From 1979 to '81, he served as a graduate assistant basketball coach and head baseball coach at Robert Morris College, where he pursued a master's degree in sports management. Before attending grad school, Colbert spent three months as an intern in the ticket office of the NBA's Detroit Pistons.

The Pittsburgh native earned his undergraduate degree in sports management from Robert Morris in 1979.

BOB LUNDY



Head Trainer

College: Boston University

NFL: 24th Season Dolphins: 22nd Season Born: March 28, 1936

For over two decades, the job of taking care of the Dolphin players' daily assortment of major and minor injuries has belonged to head trainer Bob Lundy. One of the most respected trainers in the NFL, Lindy is responsible for the day-to-day treatment of injured Dolphins coordination with team physicians. In conjunction with assistant

coach Junior Wade, Lundy also oversees the team's off-season condi-

Lundy keeps abreast of the latest advances in training technology through his regular attendance at NATA conventions. Perhaps his highest honor came in 1974 when Dolphin players awarded Lundy the game ball following Miami's fourth consecutive AFC Eastern Division title. One of his greatest personal highlights was when former Dolphin great Larry Csonka thanked Bob in his Hall of Fame induction speech in Canton, Ohio.

Lundy joined the Dolphins for their inaugural 1966 season under then-head coach George Wilson, and has been with the club for all but one of its campaigns (he sold real estate in 1973). When Don Shula took over as head coach in 1970, Lundy was retained and he has been manning the training room ever since.

A native of Wollaston, Mass., Lundy is a 1958 graduate of Boston University. While a graduate student at Indiana University, he served as the Hoosiers' assistant trainer before becoming the head trainer at Detroit University (1960-63). Lundy's first professional job came in 1964 when he served two seasons as the Detroit Lions' assistant

In May of 1986, Lundy was honored by the National Athletic Trainers Association with a "Twenty-Five Year Award," which is the most prestigious award in the training profession.

In the off-season, Lundy serves as host in a series of talks on corporate fitness, speaking to such corporations as Storer Cable and Southeast Bank.

Bob lives in Miami and has three sons, Bob, Jr. (3/30/63), Billy (6/30/66) and David (1/30/70).

BILL DAVIS



Assistant Trainer College: Davidson NFL: Sixth Season Dolphins: Sixth Season Born: April 8, 1954

In his sixth season as the Dolphins' assistant trainer is 34-year-old Bill Davis. Davis assists head trainer Bob Lundy with injury treatment and rehabilitation of Dolphin players. He has been a full-time member of the Dolphin staff since May, 1983, after spending five preseasons (1975-79) as a summer training camp assistant to Lundy.

Davis spent two weeks last March as a trainer at the Lipton Interna-

tional Tennis Championships on Key Biscayne.

Davis initially got involved in athletic training while he was a student at Davidson College. He aided current Dolphin assistant coach Junior Wade while Wade was baseball coach and assistant trainer for the Wildcats. While at Davidson, Davis and Wade worked under current NBA Charlotte Hornets' trainer Tom Couch. Davis received his B.A. degree from Davidson in 1976, and earned his NATA certification the following year.

In 1978, Davis got his master's degree in health and physica education from Tennessee Tech. The following fall, he was named athletic trainer for men at the University of Tennessee-Martin, a position he held until accepting his current post.

Bill and his wife, Linda (married 7/7/84), live in Cooper City with their four children - Kim, Bradley, Chas and Brook.

BOB MONICA



Equipment Manager College: St. Thomas NFL: Eighth Season Dolphins: Eighth Season Born: May 6, 1957

Bob Monica begins his fourth year as Dolphin equipment manager after four seasons as assistant equipment manager. Monica, a visible and popular figure around the Dolphins' training camp, is responsible for issuing and ordering all playing equipment for the team.

The 31-year-old Monica earned a B.S. in sports administration from Miami's St. Thomas University. He transferred to St. Thomas from Furman University in Greenville, S.C., where he had been attending college on a football scholarship. A native of Madison, N.J., Monica captained Madison High School's 1976 football state champions. In addition, he was New Jersey state wrestling champion in the 188 lb. division (1976). In 1975, Monica traveled with the USA Junior Olympic

Wrestling team to Germany and Bulgaria.

Prior to joining the Dolphins, Monica was a production manager for Electric Factory Concerts in Philadelphia. This past year (4/23/88), he narried the former Donna Beets. The couple resides in Pembroke Pines. One of Bob's personal highlights came when he appeared as a bartender in the Jan. 10, 1986, episode of "Miami Vice.

Equipment Assistant College: Florida International NFL: Eighth Season Dolphins: Eighth Season Born: March 29, 1962


Billy Herman enters his fourth season as equipment assistant for † 3 Dolphins after serving four years as an equipment aide. He assists e juipment manager Bob Monica in issuing and ordering team equip-

Last year Herman worked in the press room at Super Bowl XXII in San Diego as a public relations assistant. He also teamed with Dolphin All-Pro receiver Mark Duper to promote a testimonial dinner in December of 1987 honoring former Dolphin great Nat Moore.

A native of Miami, the 26-year-old Herman attended North Miami Beach High School, graduating in 1980. He attended Broward Community College for two years before receiving his B.S. in communications from Florida International University in 1985.

Herman, who also has written a feature story for the Dolphins which as published in GameDay magazine, is single and resides in Miami ikes. Herman is an avid golfer and plays in many charity events.

JOE ROBBIE STADIUM



The critics said it never could be done. But reality shows that the dream has come true.

The Miami Dolphins enter their second season of play in the new 74,930-seat Joe Robbie Stadium in 1988. Build at a cost of \$115 million, the state-of-the-art, open-air facility was the first of its kind to be constructed entirely with private funds.

After a highly successful opening year, much more is in store in the future. The National Football League's premier game, Super Bowl XXIII, comes to JRS on Jan. 22, 1989. The event will mark the Super Bowl's return to South Florida after a 10-year absence, and it's obvious the main reason for the return is JRS itself.

Built with world-class soccer in mind, JRS undoubtedly will be one of the primary sites chosen in the next year or two to play host to matches when the 1994 World Cup comes to the United States. "I have been to 98 countries and seen many stadiums, but this is the best," said Colombian Soccer Federation President Leon Londono, a member of the FIFA committee which will designate sites, after touring the facility last spring. "I have told (FIFA president) Dr. Joao Havelange about this stadium.

In its first 12 months of operation, Joe Robbie Stadium displayed its versatility by playing host to a wide variety of events other than Dolphin games. The Marlboro Soccer Cup of Miami and a concert featuring Rod Stewart, Hall and Oates and Chicago were just two events that the people of South Florida could attend at JRS.

Major league baseball also came to the stadium in the form of two exhibition contests on March 11-12. The first night, the L.A. Dodgers defeated the Baltimore Orioles, 10-8, in front of 24,247, the largest crowd ever to see a major-league game in the state of Florida. In the second game, the Montreal Expos beat the Orioles by a 9-3 score with 17,830 in attendance.

Both baseball games were played with a temporary 30-foot wall as the left field fence to compensate for a distance of 272 feet down the foul line. But should South Florida ever acquire a major-league team, the permanent seats on the stadium's north side would be replaced by retractable seating at a cost of several million dollars. The conversion, which can be accomplished in a matter of months, would give JRS an estimated capacity of 50,000, as well as a left field line measuring about 345 feet.

Dodgers manager Tommy Lasorda had nothing but good things to say about Joe Robbie Stadium's capability to serve as a baseball facility after watching his team play there in March. "You get those left field seats moved back and you're going to have a very beautiful place to play baseball," Lasorda said. "It's got the potential to be a heckuva baseball stadium. Joe Robbie did a great job on this place. If you can't enjoy this, you can't enjoy anything.

The stadium's namesake, Dolphins owner Joe Robbie, even states that his stadium will be the home to baseball on a full-time basis within the next several years. "I predict we will have a major-league team playing in this stadium as early as 1991 or 1992," says Robbie. "The two exhibition games played here last March will be marked as the time that really began the drive for major-league baseball in Miami. We're going to get it the first way we can, whether we purchase an expansion team or someone moves a team here."

Located one mile south of the Dade-Broward county line, Joe Robbie Stadium sits on a 160-acre site. It is 16 miles northwest of downtown Miami and 14 miles north of the Orange Bowl, the Dolphins'

The first football game in Joe Robbie Stadium featured Miami against Chicago in a preseason battle won by the Bears, 10-3, on Aug. 16, 1987 (the 22nd anniversary of the Dolphin franchise). Plans for the stadium first were announced on March 5, 1984. Clearing of the stadium site began on July 22, 1985, and groundbreaking ceremonies were held on Dec. 1, 1985 – just 20½ months prior to the first game.

Financing for the stadium is based largely upon the leasing of executive suites and club seats on 10-year leases. Executive suites, which seat 10, 12 or 16 people per box, range in price from \$29,000-\$65,000 per year. Each executive suite is fully furnished, including air-conditioning, carpeting, refrigerator, icemaker, lockable liquor cabinet, lounge furniture, two TV monitors and optional telephone hookup and catered food and beverage service. A suiteholder also receives two free parking spaces as well as four guest passes.

Club seats, which are priced from \$600-\$1,400 per year on a 10-year lease, are 21" wide (two inches wider than other seats in the stadium) with chairback and armrest. Club seats, whose patrons are cept cool by overhead vents which blow cold air down on them, are he only grandstand-style seating in the stadium underneath the overnang of the upper deck. Club seat holders also are guaranteed a parking space.

Only executive suite and club seat lessees have access to the air-conditioned stadium club, located behind the suites. The stadium club, which features a better food and beverage service than that found at concession stands, runs around the entire stadium. Holders of executive suites and club seats, who have the option to renew their lease over the life of the stadium, also have the right of first refusal on

their seats for all other events in the stadium except the Super Bowl. General seating in Joe Robbie Stadium is a 19" chairback seat with armrest, which compares favorably with the 17" bench seat of the Orange Bowl. Each seat offers an excellent view of the playing field s there are no obstructed seats in the stadium.

The stadium is easily accessible by the fan. Eight 25' wide ramps (two per corner) lead up to the upper deck. Also located on each corner are two escalators, one rising to the upper deck, the other to the club level. Executive suite holders also may access their seats by any one of four designated elevators.

There are a total of 14,970 parking spaces for cars and 254 for buses in the 140-acre on-site lot. There also is a helipad.

Comfort and convenience for the fan is the byword at Joe Robbie Stadium. In the general seating areas (100, 400 levels), there are 40 concession stands (each with a TV monitor so as not to miss a minute the action). Throughout the stadium, there are a total of 80 rerooms (40 men, 40 women). For added enjoyment of the game, two ant scoreboards each equipped with a color Sony JumboTRON video screen are located on the ends of the stadium.

The playing field is Prescription Athletic Turf (natural grass). Its drainage capacity is such that there would be a firm playing surface within 30 minutes of a 1" per hour rain.

Field lighting is 150-plus foot candles. The field lights also have the added feature of instant restrike capability. This means that the lights will go right back on after a power failure because they do not need a 20-30 minute warmup period as with some stadium lights.

Originally named Dolphin Stadium, the facility was renamed by the Pobbie children on April 30, 1987, for the man who had been the iving force behind its construction. "We have seen our father lay



JRS has played host to numerous soccer events.

everything he owns and everything he has accomplished on the line to build the stadium, putting himself in a real bind," said Tim Robbie, designated spokesman for the family. "If he had flunked the marketing test or the private financing test, the project would have been Joe Robbie's folly. So why not 'Joe Robbie Stadium?' Stadiums have been named in other places after people who have done a lot less to deserve it."

Indeed they have.







Miami had a balanced offensive attack, gaining 160 net yards passing and 164 net yards rushing. Ronald Scott and Clarence Bailey equaled what were singlegame team highs for '87 at the time with 55 yards rushing apiece. Tagliaferri was one of three receivers to catch four passes. The Dolphins picked up their first shutout since Dec. 22, 1985 (28-0 over Buffalo) with a 42-0 victory over the Kansas City Chiefs in the first regular-season game ever played in the new Joe Robbie Stadium. It was the fourth-largest margin of victory in Dolphin history (also accomplished on two other occasions). Miami's defense held the Chiefs to 132 yards total offense - the fourth-fewest total in Miami opponent history and the least since Sept. 2, 1979, when Buffalo gained only 121 yards. Ronald Scott became the first Dolphin to score three rushing TDs in a game (tying a team record) since Larry Csonka did it vs. New rushing IDs in a game (tying a team record) since Larry Csonka did it vs. New England in 1979. He had a season-high 99 yards on the ground on 18 carries. FS Liffort Hobley had a banner day defensively with two interceptions, a fumble recovery returned for a touchdown (55 yards), two passes defensed and four tackles. For his efforts, Hobley was named AFC defensive player of the week by the NFL. CB Trell Hooper added another defensive score with a 59-yard fumble when Rickey Isom scored the first TD in Joe Robbie Stadium history (and his first NFL TD) on a six-yard run. Scott then added a two-yard run in the second quarter and Miami led 14-0 at halftime. Scott added another score early in the quarter and Miamir led 14-0 at Hamirne. Scott added another score early in the third quarter before Hobley and Hooper had their returns to give Miamir a comfortable 35-0 advantage entering the final period. Miamirs defense held Kansas City to only eight first downs and 132 total yards (90 rushing, 42 passing).

For the second straight season, the Dolphins traveled to the Meadowlands to face the Jets only to return home with an overtime loss. Miami dropped a 37-31 game in OT as Jets QB Pat Ryan passed eight yards to Eddie Hunter with 34 seconds left in the extra period. In 1986, the Dolphins suffered a 51-45 overtime loss in New York. It was the Cotts' first win over Miami since they moved to Indianapolis from Baltimore in 1984. The 19-point margin was notable as Miami's previous four losses in '87 had come by a combined total of 20 points. Colts RB Eric Dickerson became the first opposing rusher in '87 to gain over 100 yards on the ground against the Dolphins as he rolled up 154 yards on 30 carries (5.1 average) and added his first rushing TD as a Colt. Miami QB Dan Maring was held below the 50 percent completion most for each tellible. carries (5.1 average) and added his first rushing TD as a Colt. Miami QB Dan Marino was held below the 50 percent completion mark for only the fifth time in his career as hit on 14 of 34 (41.2%) for 194 yards, two TDs and one interception (only his 5th of the season). With his first TD toss versus the Colts, Marino moved into sole possession of second place on the all-time NFL list of consecutive garnes with at least one TD pass. Through this game, Marino had passed for a TD in 29 straight games – just ahead of Dave Krieg (28) but behind record-holder Johnny Unitas (47). The game was filled with penalties – 21 total flags (8 on Miami, 13 on the Colts). The 21 by both teams was the fourth-most in Dolphins history. Indianapolis rolled up 32 first downs – the third-most ever against Miami in a single game. Miami jumped out to an early 14-0 first-quarter lead on a six-yard TD run by RB Lorenzo Hampton and a four-yard TD pass from Marino to TE Dan Johnson. The Dolphins traveled to Buffalo and suffered a very disappointing 27-0 setback at the hands of the Bills. It was the first shutout for Miami since the infamous snowplow game at New England (3-0) on Dec. 12, 1982. The game also saw the end of Dan Marino's streak of 30 consecutive games with at least one TD pass. Marino's string is second all-time to Johnny Unitas with 47. The Dolphins were held to 23 yards rushing (all by Troy Stradford) – tying the team record for lowest single-game rushing total. Stradford, who had over 100 yards the week before against Dallas, carried the ball 15 times but was bothered by the slippery field conditions. Dan Marino had Miami's only other rushing attempt for no yardage. Marino suffered only the sixth sub-50 percent completion percentage game in his career (13 of 28 for 165 yards, 3 INTs). Miami had a season-low total of 13 first downs and was only 3 of 13 (23 percent) in third-down efficiency. The Dolphins had 11 drives in the game, resulting in five punts, three turnovers and three turnovers on downs. Punter Reggie Roby was the lone bright spot for Miami, punting five times for 241 yards and a 48.2-yard average. Roby also had a 77-yarder – the longest punt in Miami history. The Dolphins won their second game in a row and moved into a three-way tie for first place with a 28-10 win over the Eagles in Philadelphia. While Dan Marino (25 of 39, 376 yards, 3 TDs, 1 INT) paced the Dolphins offense, the Miami defense limited the Eagles to 15 first downs, 155 yards rushing and 155 yards passing. It marked the first time in the six-game series between the two clubs that the visiting team won. Fullback Ron Davenport was Miami's top rusher with 49 yards on 10 carries. Both totals were season-highs for Davenport. He also added a one-yard TD run - his first rushing score since 1985. Mark Clayton caught seven passes (two for scores) and went over 100 yards in receiving for the first time in '87. For the second straight week, Marino completed passes to nine different receivers. He had his 30th three-TD game. In addition, Marino went over 300 yards for the 25th time in his career, tying him with Sonny Jurgensen for third on the NFL's all-time list of 300-yard games. LB John Offerdahl paced the defense with 11 tackles (10 solo) and a QB sack. DOLPHINS 14-0 VS. 4 CLUBS

The Miami Dolphins have built a perfect 14-0 regular-season record against four clubs in the National Football League through the 1987 season.

Those teams which never have beaten Miami are Chicago (0-4), Green Bay (0-4), N.Y. Giants (0-1) and Phoenix (0-5). The Dolphins face both the Bears and Packers during the 1988 season.

Ten other NFL teams have beaten Miami only once in the regular season. Those teams are Atlanta (1-4), Dallas (1-4), Detroit (1-2), L.A. Rams (1-4), Minnesota (1-3), New Orleans (1-4), San Francisco (1-4), Seattle (1-2), Tampa Bay (1-2) and Washington (1-4). The Dolphins are scheduled to play the Vikings and Buccaneers in '88,

Miami set an NFL record with 20 consecutive wins over Buffalo from 1970 through 1979.

THE ORANGE BOWL

The 1986 season marked the end of an era for the Miami Dolphins as the team played its final season in the Orange Bowl. In 21 years, the Dolphins posted a 110-38-3 (.738) regular-season record.

In the playoffs, Miami was 10-4 at the 75,206-seat Orange Bowl, giving the team a 120-43-3 (.736) mark at the OB in all games.

The Orange Bowl has been the site of many great sporting events, including five Super Bowls, the annual Orange Bowl Classic and championship boxing matches.

- March 3 Minneapolis lawyer Joseph Robbie meets AFL Commissioner Joe Foss in Washington, and Foss advises Robbie to apply for an expansion franchise in Miami.
- May 6 Joseph Robbie meets Miami Mayor Robert King High to ascertain the availability of the Orange Bowl stadium, and the mayor agrees to invite the AFL to Miami.
- June 7 AFL Executive Committee votes to expand in 1966 at a meeting in Monmouth Park, N.J.
- Aug. 16 AFL awards its first expansion franchise to Joseph Robbie and television star Danny Thomas for \$7.5 million.
- Nov. 27 Miami picks Kentucky QB Rick Norton and Illinois RB Jim Grabowski in first round of AFL's college draft. Tulsa WR Howard Twilley is selected in 12th round.
- Dec. 16 Miami Dolphins, Ltd. organizes as a Florida limited partnership.
 Joseph Robbie becomes Managing General Partner and Danny Thomas Sports, Inc., becomes the other general partner.

- Jan. 15 Miami picks 31 players from eight teams in AFL expansion draft.
 One of the draftees, T Norm Evans of Houston, would play 10 seasons at right tackle.
- Jan. 29 George Wilson becomes first head coach after eight years coaching the Detroit Lions (57-46-6 and NFL champions in 1957) and one year as a Washington assistant.

The Dolphin defense stopped the San Diego offense, holding it to a total of 247 yards — 203 yards below its league-leading average — while holding the Chargers scoreless in the second half. Dolphin defenders intercepted QB Dan Fouts five times, sacked him three times and held the Chargers to 15 completions for 191 yards — their lowest output since a January, 1982, playoff game in the ice at Cincinnati. On a short-yardage play — fourth-and-one from the Redskin 43 with 10:01 to play — Riggins broke a tackle and scored on a 43-yard run. Riggins accounted for 181 total yards, five more yards than the entire Miami offense could manage in the game. LARRY CSONKA 1968-74, 1979

Csonka ranks as the Dolphins' all-time leading rusher with 1,506 carries for 6,737 yards (4.5 average) and 53 TDs. A five-time Pro Bowl selection, he put together three consecutive 1,000-yard seasons (1971-73) as Miami advanced to the Super Bowl each year. Csonka shined in those three Super Bowls, averaging 6.3 yards a carry and going over 100 yards rushing in two of them. Originally drafted in the first round out of Syracuse in 1968, he was named the MVP of Super Bowl VIII after carrying 33 times for 145 yards and two touchdowns as the Dolphins steamrolled the Minnesota Vikings, 24-7, for their second straight NFL title. Called a "modern-day Bronko Nagurski" by Dolphin coach Don Shula, "Zonk" also played three seasons with the N.Y. Giants (1976-78) and one year with the Memphis Southmen of the World Football League (1975). His career rushing totals in the NFL, which place him 12th on the league's all-time rushing list, are: 1,891 carries for 8,081 yards (4.3 average) and 64 TDs. He was elected to the Hall of Fame in his second year of eligibility.

JIM LANGER

1970-79

Langer was the anchor of the Miami offensive line during the Dolphins' championship years of the 1970s. Coming out of South Dakota State in 1970, he was signed as a free agent by Cleveland but was released on the final cut. Langer was picked up on waivers by the Dolphins and, after spending most of the year on the taxi squad, played in the final five games of 1970, mainly on special teams. After serving as a backup at center the following season, in 1972 he won the staring job, which he would hold until sidelined with a knee injury in 1979. A consensus All-Pro from 1973-77, Langer was a six-time Pro Bowl selection (five t "es as a starter), a Dolphin record. He played in a club-high 128 straight games curing his career and also had a team-record 109 consecutive starts. Voted the team's Most Valuable Player by South Florida media in 1975, Langer also hous the distinction of having played every offensive down in the Dolphins' perfex 1972 season. Wanting to spend the final years of his career near his Royalton. Minn., home, at his own request Langer was traded to the Minnesota Vikings in 1980, where he played for two seasons (1980-81). He was elected to the Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility.

PAUL WARFIELD

1970-74 inducted: 1983 Warfield san twiched two stints with the Cleveland Browns around a five-year career with the Delphins. After spending his first six seasons in the NFL with the Browns (1964-6: Warfield was acquired by Miami in January of 1970 in exchange for a irst-round pick in the upcoming draft. In his five seasons with the Dolphins, Warield had 156 receptions for 3,355 yards (21.5 average) and 33 TDs - good enough to place him ninth on the team's all-time receiving list. A member of both the '72 and '73 Super Bowl championship teams, he was selected to play r the Pro Bowl all five years he was with the Dolphins (once as a starter), in axcition to being named to the AFC squad twice with the Browns. Warfield, the on't Dolphin in the team's history to score four touchdowns in one game, also player one season with the Memphis Southmen of the World Football League (1975) before finishing his career with Cleveland (1976-77). His career receiving stals in the NFL are: 427 receptions for 8,565 yards (20.1 average) and 85 "Os. He was elected to the Hall of Fame in his first year of

He was unquestionably the "thinking man's quarterback." Bob Griese, renowned for his poised leadership and ingenious play-calling, sustained the Dolphin offense with a flair for winning from 1967-80.

The bespectacled quarterback became the 14th passer in the NFL's exclusive 25,000-yard club in 1980. On the same day he reached that milestone, he suffered a shoulder injury which ultimately forced his retirement on June 25, 1981. His No. 12 jersey became the first to be retired May 6, 1982, in ceremonies at the Dolphins' annual awards banquet.

He had a .698 winning percentage (91-39-1) under Coach Don Shula. "Cornerstone of the franchise," Dolphin Owner Joe Robbie called him. He was a consensus All-Pro quarterback in 1971 and 1977, made a team-record six appearances in the Pro Bowl and was voted the team's Most Valuable Player six

Since becoming eligible for induction into the Hall of Fame three years ago, Griese has each time been named as a finalist. It is only a matter of time before he joins the three other Dolphin players who hold a place in Canton.

"He's probably the most unselfish guy I've ever been around," Shula said. "He got as much of a thrill calling the right running play for a touchdown as he did

"The dolphin is one of the fastest and smartest creatures of the sea," Joe Robbie said in announcing the team name on October 8, 1965. "Dolphins can attack and kill a shark or a whale. Sailors say bad luck will come to anyone who harms one of them.'

Mrs. Robert Swanson of West Miami won two lifetime passes to Dolphin games with her nickname entry. The tiebreaker was picking the winner and score of the 1965 game between the University of Miami and Notre Dame — it ended in a scoreless tie.



WIOD

In 1988, the Miami Dolphins' radio network will consist of over 35 radio stations (over 80 markets) with Miami's WIOD (AM-610) again serving as the flagship station. WIOD has been the originator of Dolphin broadcasts since the team's 1966 inception. Known throughout South Florida as "Someplace Special for Sports," WIOD's Dolphin coverage is among the most comprehensive in the NFL.

WIOD begins its game-day coverage two hours before kickoff with "The Dolphin Express," including player features, key matchups in the upcoming game, plus other pertinent information from around the NFL. Also included in the pre-game package is "The Don Shula Show," featuring a preview of the day's contest by the Dolphin head

Following the game, "The Locker Room Show" keeps listeners up-to-date on all other games around the league and also includes interviews from both the Dolphin and opposing locker rooms with key players from that day's game.

Handling the play-by-play will be "The Voice of the Dolphins," Rick Weaver, who enters his 18th season with the Dolphins. Weaver, who serves as Vice President of Sports at WIOD, is in his 25th year of calling NFL action. Weaver, who is famous for starting the "white handkerchief" in 1971, previously broadcast games for Dallas, Chicago and San Francisco. Weaver is a 10-time recipient of the Florida Sportscaster of the Year award.

Weaver is most proud of his involvement with the "Rick Weaver Invitational Golf Tournament," held for the benefit of Special Olympics in Dade County. A native of Toledo, Ohio, the Ohio State graduate resides in North Miami with his wife, Bobbie.

Joining Rick in the booth will be color commentator Hank Goldberg. Goldberg, a Duke University graduate, is one of South Florida's most controversial sports figures. In addition to his WIOD duties, Hank works for an advertising agency and WTVJ-TV (Channel 4) in Miami.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photographers with accredited media outlets on an immediate deadline may request credentials on a single-game basis from the Dolphins' public relations department. Credentials WILL NOT be issued to freelance photographers unless granted special approval by the Dolphins. Field photographers are reminded to remain outside of the

PRESS BOX: To get to the Joe Robbie Stadium press box, enter at Gate G. Go through two sets of doors and take the exclusive press elevator to the press box. There are two levels: working press (level 2) and TV/radio/ coaches booths (level 3). Stairs and the elevator connect both levels. Only

credentials issued by the Dolphins will be honored for admittance to Joe Robbie Stadium.

LOCKER ROOMS: Admission to the home and visiting locker rooms is governed by each individual team. Only media representatives with proper credentials, stamped with "Locker Room Access," will be admitted. No one will be admitted to the locker rooms prior to the game. Both teams' locker rooms are located on ground level on the west side of the stadium. From the press box, take the elevator to ground level. Out of the elevator follow corridor to the left and go a quarter of the way around the stadium to locker rooms and interview room.

PARKING: Press parking at Joe Robbie Stadium is very limited. All parking requests must be directed to: Eddie White, director of publicity, (305-623-6262).

TELEPHONES: Any media member desiring to have their own press box telephone must order it directly from Thania Diaz, Southern Bell Special Services (lines) at (305) 883-1491. Instruments can be ordered from the Dolphins' public relations department, (305-623-6262).

COPY TRANSMISSION: Copy transmission is available at every Dolphin home game. The transmission representative is Tim Lippman, 16541 Blatt Blvd., Apt. 203, Ft. Lauderdale, FL 33326 (305-384-0620).

FIELD ACCESS: Only working newspaper and TV photographers and club/stadium officials are permitted on the field during the game. Press box passes will not be honored for field admittance at any time.

ADVANCING: Generally, the Dolphins request that the opposing team's public relations representative visit training camp on Thursday to coincide with the weekly media conference call.

PRACTICE: Regular-season practice sessions usually are held at 2:00 p.m. Tuesday through Friday, and at 11:00 a.m. on Saturday (home game). Practices normally are closed to out-of-town media unless special permission is granted by the coaching staff. To request permission, or to arrange any interviews, contact the Dolphins' public relations department. TV crews are allowed to shoot ONLY the first 10 minutes (stretching) of practice. The team locker room is open to the media for 45 minutes (lunchtime) Tuesday through Friday.

PERSONNEL GUIDE

WAIVERS: The waiver system is a procedure by which player contracts or NFL rights to players are made available by a club to other NFL clubs. During the procedure, the 27 other clubs either file claims to obtain the players or waive the opportunity to do so — thus the term "waiver." Claiming clubs are assigned players on a priority based on the inverse of the won-lost standings. The claiming period normally is 10 days during the off-season and 24 hours from early July through December. In some circumstances, a club is allowed another 24 hours to rescind its action (recall of waiver request) and/or the claiming club to do the same (withdrawal of claim). If a player passes through waivers unclaimed and is not recalled by the original club, he becomes a free agent. All waivers from July through December are no recall and no withdrawal. Under the 1982 Collective Bargaining Agreement, any veteran who has acquired four years of pension credit may, if about to be assigned to another club through the waiver system, reject such assignment and become a free agent.

ACTIVE LIST: The Active List is the principal status for players participating for a club. It consists of all players under contract, including option, who are eligible for preseason, regular-season and post-season games. Clubs are allowed to open training camp with an unlimited number of players but thereafter must meet the mandatory roster reductions prior to the season opener.

RESERVE LIST: The Reserve List is a status for players who, for reasons of injury, retirement, military service or other circumstances, are not immediately available for participation with a club. Injured reserve is a Reserve List category that may be used by a club if a player is injured in a practice session or game of his club after having passed the club's physical examination in that year. If a player fails the club's initial physical examination, he is not available for "Reserve/ injured;" instead, the club may opt to use either the procedure of "Physically Unable to Perform" or "Non-Football Injury/Illness" as applicable to the individual case. Players in the category of "Reserve/Injured" who were physically unable to play football for a minimum of four weeks from the date of going onto IR may be re-activated by their club upon clearing procedural recall waivers. Each club will have eight free re-activations for players meeting the four-week requirement, but only two of the free re-activations can be used for a player placed on "Reserve/Injured" prior to or concurrent with the final cutdown date of Aug. 29, 1988. Clubs participating in post-season competition will be granted an additional free re-activation. Players not meeting the four-week requirement may not return in the same season to the Active List of the club which originally placed them on IR, but may be assigned through the waiver system to another club. Players in the category of "Reserve/Retired," "Reserve/Did Not Report" or "Reserve/Veteran Free Agent Asked to Re-sign" may not be reinstated during the period from 30 days before the end of the regular season on through the post-season.

TRADES: Unrestricted trading is allowed between clubs through the Tuesday following the sixth regular-season game (Oct. 11, 1988) and does not resume again until Jan. 30, 1989.

ROSTER SIZES: As of July 1, roster size for the 1988 season was set at 47 players (listing two as inactive). During 1987, the roster size began at 45 players. Once the '87 players' strike began, that was changed to 45 with an unlimited number of players on an inactive list. Following the strike, roster size was 45 players with a five-man inactive squad. From 1985-86, roster size was set at 45 players, the same number it stood at from 1978-81. Between 1982 and 1984, the roster limit was at 49. From 1975-77, each club was allowed to have 43 players on the active roster. The first roster limitation rule went into effect in 1925 (16 players) and rose gradually until it reached 47 in 1974.

ROSTER CUTDOWN DATES: All clubs must reduce their active roster to 60 players by 4:00 p.m. EDT on Aug. 23, 1988, and to the final total of 47 players (listing two as inactive) by 4:00 p.m. EDT on Aug. 29, 1988.

INACTIVE ROSTER: Once the season starts, teams must declare their two-man inactive roster for each week by 4:00 p.m. on Saturday for a Sunday game and by 4:00 p.m. on Monday for a Monday night game.

INSTANT REPLAY

For the third consecutive season, NFL clubs have approved a limited system of Instant Replay on a one-year basis.

The system basically stays the same as in 1987 with the exception that the Replay Official now will be assigned a regular officiating crew and will attend crew meetings the day before each game. League office personnel no longer will be used as Replay Officials.

In 1987, there were 490 plays closely reviewed (defined as a contact to the field, but not necessarily stoppage of play). There were 57 reversals in 210 games for an average of one reversal in each four games. In 1986, there were 374 plays closely reviewed resulting in 38 reversals in 224 games.

In 1986, the system was approved by a 23-4-1 vote. in 1987, the vote was 21-7. In 1988, replay was cleared by a 23-5 margin.

The NFL has discussed Instant Replay in some degree or other since the early 1970s. The League experimented in 1976 and 1978 using two basic frameworks an independent system using cameras, replay machines and technicians separate from the network covering the games, and a "no-frills" approach using existing TV coverage.

In 1985, the NFL used the network feed of the nine nationally-televised preseason games to experiment with the basic system which later was adopted for 1986, 1987 and 1988. A total of 28 plays (17 confirmed call, 4 inconclusive, 1 reversed and 6 no replay shown) were examined closely in the 1985 experi-

What is the objective of this system?

The clubs feel that on certain plays the telecast viewed by the general public should be used to correct an indisputable error. The system will be used to reverse an on-field decision only when the Replay Official has indisputable visual evidence available to him that warrants the change.

Who will be involved?

The Replay Official (a veteran former NFL or collegiate official) will be positioned in a sideline Replay Booth, which will house two TV monitors and two high-speed VCRs plus radio communications to the on-field officials. The Replay Official makes the decision, although a Communicator (normally a member of the League Office staff) is present. A Technician also will be there to lend logistical help.

Why is the system referred to as "limited" Instant Replay?

This system will concentrate on plays of possession or touching (fumbles, receptions, interceptions, muffs) and most plays governed by the sidelines, goal lines, end lines and line of scrimmage (receiver or runner in or out of bounds, forward or backward passes, breaking the plane of the goal line). It also will be used to determine whether there are more than 11 men on the field.

Why aren't most fouls included in this system?

It is recognized that in most circumstances the on-field officials have the best vantage points involving fouls. It is for this reason that Instant Replay will not review a list of the following 26 fouls: clipping; encroachment and offsides; grasp of facemask; false start; defensive pass interference; offensive pass interference; offensive holding and illegal use of hands; illegal batting or punching ball; illegal block on free kick or scrimmage kick; illegal crackback; illegal motion; illegal use of forearm or elbow; illegal use of hands by defense; illegally kicking ball; illegally snapping ball; intentional grounding; member of punting team downfield early; illegal formation; palpably unfair act; piling on; roughing the passer; running into/roughing kicker; striking, kicking or kneeing; unnecessary roughness; unsportsmanlike conduct; and use of helmet as a weapon.

is the television network carrying the game part of the review process?

No. Although the Replay Official will be viewing the live network feed, there is no communication to television personnel as to which plays to show or not to

What is the step-by-step procedure of a play review?

The Replay Official will view game action and a play will be replayed immediately on one of the two monitors, while the other one continues to record


The Replay Official makes a determination if further study of the play is needed. If not, there is no contact with the field and play continues without interruption.

If the Replay Official believes an error may have been made the Umpire will be contacted via a headset.

The Replay Official will watch replay(s) on one or both monitors and complete his review within a reasonable period after the play is over.

The Replay Official will inform the Umpire of his decision, and the Referee will make the appropriate announcement on the wireless microphone.


