

IN MEMORY OF DAVID WOODLEY



The Miami Dolphins 2003 Media Guide is dedicated to the memory of former quarterback David Woodley, who died on May 4, 2003. Woodley was an eighth-round draft choice of Miami in 1980 and played four years with the team (1980-83), helping the Dolphins to a berth in Super Bowl XVII against Washington. He spent the final two years of his career (1984-85) with Pittsburgh before retiring from professional football.

ON THE COVER

Running back Ricky Williams and defensive end Jason Taylor had record-setting seasons in 2002 en route to sharing the Dolphins' Most Valuable Player award. Williams broke the club's single-season rushing record which had stood since 1978 by amassing 1,853 yards and 16 touchdowns on 383 attempts, as he became the first Dolphin ever to lead the NFL in rushing. Taylor compiled 18.5 sacks, which tied the Dolphins' single-season mark and was the highest figure by a Dolphin since the statistic became official in 1982. He also became the first Dolphin ever to lead the league in sacks.



H. Wayne Huizenga

Owner/Chairman of the Board



H. Wayne Huizenga began his active involvement in South Florida sports on March 7, 1990, when he purchased 15% of the Miami Dolphins and a 50% interest in Joe Robbie Stadium, now called Pro Player Stadium. That involvement was finalized on January 24, 1994, when he acquired the remaining 85% of the Dolphins and the additional 50% of the stadium, leaving him with 100% ownership of both entities.

Mr. Huizenga is a board member, founder and past Chairman of AutoNation, Inc., the nation's largest automotive retailer. He is also a board member and past Chairman of the Board of Republic Services (a non-hazardous solid waste collection company), Extended Stay America (owner of 450 hotels), and Boca Resorts, Inc. (a leisure-time, recreation, resort and entertainment company).

He is also Chairman of Huizenga Holdings, Inc., and is the sole or majority owner of several service businesses. He has numerous real estate interests throughout Florida that include office buildings, warehouses, shopping centers and underdeveloped properties as well as the Marriott Harbor Beach Resort Hotel. Mr. Huizenga was responsible for bringing major league baseball to South Florida in 1993, serving as chairman of the Florida Marlins through 1998, and under his direction the Marlins won the World Series in 1997. He also brought the National Hockey League to South Florida, serving as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of the Florida Panthers for the first eight years (1993-2001) of that team's existence, including the 1995-96 season when they reached the Stanley Cup finals.

Previously, Mr. Huizenga was Vice Chairman of the Board of Viacom, Inc. and Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of Blockbuster Entertainment Corporation.

In January, 1971, Mr. Huizenga co-founded Waste Management, Inc. (now WMX Technologies, Inc.) which today is the world's largest waste collection and disposal company. He served as President, Chief Operating Officer, Vice Chairman and Director. Mr. Huizenga resigned from the company in May, 1984 to pursue other business interests.

Mr. Huizenga then directed Blockbuster Entertainment Corporation into a position of world leadership in the video rental industry, serving communities in all 50 states and 26 countries. In 1994, Blockbuster Entertainment Corporation was sold to Viacom for \$8.5 billion.


Business and academic groups have honored Mr. Huizenga seven times as "Entrepreneur of the Year," including the 1995 award given by Success Magazine. He is a five-time recipient of Financial World Magazine's "CEO of the Year" and was named the 1993 "Business Leader of the Year" by Georgetown University's Business School.

Among his other awards are the Horatio Alger Award in 1992, and the Gordon Grand Fellow Award, the highest non-academic award that Yale University bestows. Mr. Huizenga also received the Fort Lauderdale Sun-Sentinel's 1989 Excalibur Award for business leadership. He was named the University of Missouri-Kansas City's International Entrepreneur of the Year in 2002. He was inducted into the Video Hall of Fame in 1991 and named Time-Billboard Magazine's "Man of the Year" in 1990 for his contributions to the growth and development of the video retail industry. In 1996, he was inducted into the Florida Sports Hall of Fame and the Greater Miami Sports Hall of Champions.

Mr. Huizenga's community involvement honors include the 1994 "Humanitarian of the Year" by the National Conference of Christians and Jews. In addition, he and his wife, Marti, were recognized as "Outstanding Philanthropists of the Year" by the Greater Broward/Fort Lauderdale chapter of the National Society of Fund Raising Executives. He was also honored by the Fort Lauderdale NAACP for his contributions to its programs. His effort to help build a homeless center in Ft. Lauderdale was recognized when he was awarded the Private Sector Award in 1999 by the National Alliance to End Homelessness. Mr. Huizenga sits as a board member of many civic organizations, including the Florida Council of 100, the Broward Economic Development Board, the Salvation Army of Broward County, the Boys and Girls Club of Broward County, and is a past Chairman of the Florida Council on Economic Education.

Mr. Huizenga and wife Marti live in Fort Lauderdale. They have four children: Wayne, Jr., Ray, Scott, and Pam, and six grandchildren, Savannah, Wayne III, Shelby, Chloe, Gerritt and Ainsley.

Eddie J. Jones President



Eddie J. Jones, in his 36th season in the NFL, was named President of the Dolphins on January 16, 1996, after previously serving as the team's Executive Vice President and General Manager (1990-95) and as Vice President of Administration and Finance (1988-89). In his current capacity, Jones directs the business operation of the Dolphins and acts as the team's representative at all National Football League meetings.

During his tenure with the Dolphins, Jones has received numerous honors for his contributions to both the Dolphins organization and the South Florida community. Most recently, in 2001, Jones was selected to the LSU Alumni Hall of Distinction, an honor reserved for individuals who have brought credit and distinction to the school. Additionally, in 1999, Jones, in a unanimous selection by the Dolphins players, was honored with a special courage award from the Ed Block Courage Award Foundation, which recognizes individuals in the NFL who display courage in the face of adversity.


Jones was president and chief operating officer of the New Orleans Saints from 1982-85. He currently serves on the NFL's Employee Benefits Committee and is a Trustee of the Bert Bell player pension plan.

A 1963 accounting graduate of LSU, Jones began his professional career as a CPA with Arthur Andersen & Co. He began his NFL career as business manager of the Saints in 1968.

An Air Force veteran, the Houston native and his wife, Marilyn, have three children, Wendy, Todd and Jeff, and three grandchildren, Connor, Ashkon and Ian.

Now in his 23rd season with the Dolphins, Bryan Wiedmeier was named as the club's Executive Vice President/Chief Operating Officer on January 28, 2002. In that capacity, he is responsible for the day-to-day operation of the business side of the organization. He also continues to oversee the club's salary cap administration and player contract negotiations.

Wiedmeier's NFL career began in 1981 with the Dolphins, serving in the business operations of the team and the stadium. Wiedmeier has served as Assistant General Manager (1990-94), Vice President - Administration (1995-99) and Senior Vice President-Business Operations (2000-01).

Wiedmeier currently serves on the NFL Management Council's Working Club Executive Committee and is a Trustee of the NFL Player Insurance Trust.

Wiedmeier earned his J.D. degree from the University of Miami School of Law in 1989 and is a member of the Florida Bar. He received his B.A. degree in business from Carroll College in Montana where he was a captain and three year starter at center for the football team.

A resident of Miramar, he and his wife, Mary K., have five children, Lauren, Victoria, John, Danielle, and Matthew.



Bill Galante is beginning his tenth season with the Dolphins and Pro Player Stadium. As Senior Vice President - Operations, Galante is responsible for the supervision of the ticket office for the Dolphins and Pro Player Stadium, while overseeing several business aspects, including special events, internet, publications and facility operations.

Galante spent his first six years in Miami overseeing Pro Player Stadium ticket sales, including the last three seasons as Vice President - Ticket Sales and Operations. During that time, he also oversaw the ticket operations of the Florida Marlins, including their inaugural season in 1993 and their World Championship season in 1997. He began his career with the Chicago Cubs in 1983.


He and his wife, Barbara, live in Plantation with their son, Christian.

DOLPHINS PRO BOWL TOUCHDOWNS

In the 2003 Pro Bowl, Dolphins running back Ricky Williams scored on a pair of one-yard runs as he was named the MVP in the AFC's 45-20 route of the NFC. He became just the fourth Dolphin to account for a touchdown in the NFL's annual All-Star contest. Prior to that, the most recent Dolphin to have accounted for a touchdown in the Pro Bowl was wide receiver Mark Clayton, who caught a nine-yard touchdown pass from Buffalo's Jim Kelly in the 1991 game. The others who have achieved this feat are tight end Ferrell Edmunds, who had a five-yard scoring reception from Seattle's Dave Krieg in the 1989 game, and Hall of Fame wide receiver Paul Warfield, who caught a 32-yard TD pass from Dolphins teammate Bob Griese in the '74 contest.

Harvey Greene is in his 15th season with the Miami Dolphins, having been named as Senior Vice President - Media Relations in January of 2002. He and his staff are responsible for implementing the team's media policy on both a local and a national level.

During his tenure with the Dolphins, Greene and his staff twice were recipients of the Pete Rozelle Award (1993, 1999), an annual honor awarded by the Professional Football Writers of America to the NFL's best PR department. In addition, Greene also has worked on the NFL public relations staff at 13 of the past 14 Super Bowls and at the 1992 Pro Bowl.

Prior to joining the Dolphins, Greene spent almost four seasons as the Director of Media Relations for the New York Yankees (1986-89), and three years as Director of Public Relations and Broadcasting for the Cleveland Cavaliers (1983-86), where he twice won the McHugh/Splaver Award (1984, 1985) as the outstanding PR Director in the NBA. He also served as an Assistant Venue Press Chief for the men's and women's basketball competition at the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles and for the 1994 Soccer World Cup, and supervised media center operations for figure skating and short-track speed skating at the 2002 Winter Olympic Games in Salt Lake City.

Greene, an avid runner who has completed ten marathons (including the Boston and London Marathons four times each), resides in Parkland.

TAYLOR, THOMAS ON USO/NFL TOUR

This past May, Dolphins defensive end Jason Taylor and line-backer Zach Thomas took part in a USO/NFL Tour in which they visited various military bases and hospitals throughout Germany.

While in Germany, the players spent time visiting soldiers at Rhein Main Air Force Base, the Heidelberg military community and the Kaiserslautern military community (K-Town), including Landstuhl Regional Medical Center, where many wounded American service people have received medical attention following Operation Iraqi Freedom.

In June, Taylor as part of a similar tour in which he visited Kuwait and Iraq, including Baghdad, along with Eagles running back Duce Staley and a group of entertainers which included Robert DiNiro, Alyssa Milano, Gary Sinise, John Stamos, Rebecca Romijn-Stamos, Wayne Newton, Kid Rock and Lee Ann Womack.



In his fourth season with the Dolphins, Jim Ross was named as Senior Vice President - Sales and Marketing for the team and Pro Player Stadium in January of 2002. Ross is responsible for the sales, marketing and promotional efforts for both the stadium and the Dolphins.

Ross re-joined Wayne Huizenga's sports properties after a season as President of AFL Properties of the Arena Football League. Prior to joining the AFL, Ross spent the previous four seasons (1996-99) as Vice President of Sales and Marketing for the Florida Marlins, including their World Championship season of 1997. With the Marlins, he oversaw the club's day-to-day sales and marketing operation, including season and group ticket sales, sponsorships, promotions, and in-game entertainment. He also has held marketing and promotional positions with the New York Mets (including Vice President of Marketing) as well as with Sports Illustrated and World Wide Ski Corporation.

Ross currently serves on the NFL's Marketing Committee, in addition to the Hugs and Kisses Board of the Miami Children's Hospital and the Genetic Disease Foundation. He also serves on the Florida Atlantic University MBA Sports Management Advisory Board.

Ross resides in Miami with his wife, Elisa, their son, Alexander, and daughter, Emily.

MIAMI DOLPHINS LOGO

The most recent modification to the Dolphins' logo was made prior to the 1997 season. This marked just the third logo change in the 36-year history of the franchise, and the first since 1972.

The original logo featured the dolphin jumping in front of a sunburst using the team's base colors (aqua, coral and white). In 1972, the dolphin was repositioned in front of the sunburst and the aqua color was strengthened. In 1997, the traditional logo and colors were kept as a base, while the sunburst on the logo was accentuated and the dolphin was strengthened with a stronger definition of its shape. In addition, the sunburst was more prominently displayed with the elimination of the hashmarks around the sun's perimeter, while the dolphin's features were accentuated by navy highlights.



Dave Wannstedt was named Head Coach of the Miami Dolphins on January 16, 2000. He became the fourth head coach in club history, joining Jimmy Johnson (1996-99), Don Shula (1970-95), and George Wilson (1966-69). Wannstedt originally signed a three-year contract, was signed to a one-year contract extension through the 2003 season on February 2, 2001, and another one-year extension through 2004 on February 13, 2002.

Wannstedt is in his 29th season of coaching at major colleges and in the NFL. He has been on 19 winning teams, ten bowl teams, six NFL playoff teams and one Super Bowl champion. In his nine seasons as an NFL head coach, he has taken his team to the playoffs three times and twice has won a playoff game while advancing to the Divisional round. In addition, he has won nine or more games in five of those seasons. As a college assistant, Wannstedt's teams had a 106-45-4 record, including a 6-4 mark in bowl games. Combined with a 7-5 mark in NFL playoff games, his overall postseason record is 13-9.

In Wannstedt's three years as Dolphins head coach, Miami was one of only seven teams to record nine win seasons in each of those three years. His 31-17 regular season record in his three years as Miami's head coach is tied for the fifth best record among NFL head coaches in that span:

In the 2002 season, Wannstedt guided the Dolphins to a 9-7 record. Along the way, his team produced seven Pro Bowl players, including six on defense. His defense was ranked third in the NFL, allowing just 291.0 yards per game. Offensively, the Dolphins ranked second in the NFL in rushing, the team's highest ranking since they ranked first in rushing in 1972. His personnel moves also proved valuable. He acquired Ricky Williams in a trade with New Orleans, who then became the first Dolphin in club history to lead the NFL in rushing. He also made key offseason acquisitions of veterans Larry Chester, Jamie Nails, Jay Williams, and Rob Burnett. Despite not having a first or second round draft choice, the Dolphins were able to select rookies Seth McKinney and Randy McMichael in the draft, who both contributed to the team in their first season. Wannstedt followed that by retaining 21 of 22 starters heading into the 2003 campaign, and strengthened the squad by signing veterans such as Junior Seau, Sammy Knight, Terrell Buckley, Brian Griese, Derrius Thompson, and Jeff Zgonina.

In 2001, Wannstedt guided the Dolphins to an 11-5 record and a berth in the NFL playoffs as an AFC Wild Card representative. It marked the second time in Wannstedt's first two seasons at the Dolphins' helm that he took the team to the playoffs, and the Dolphins were one of only three teams in the AFC to make a repeat performance in postseason play. In addition, coupled with his 11-5 mark in 2000, Wannstedt's two-year regular season record of 22-10 was tied for the second best record among NFL coaches over that two-year span. By guiding the Dolphins to at least ten wins in each of those two years, it marked the first time Miami put together back-to-back ten win seasons since the 1984-85 campaigns. For his efforts, he received his second consecutive Florida Sports Award as the state's Pro Coach of the Year.

As he did in 2002, Wannstedt fashioned one of the best defenses in the league in 2001, as the Dolphins finished fifth in total defense in the NFL. In addition, Wannstedt guided the Dolphins to five fourth-quarter comebacks, just one shy of the club record of six. In the fourth quarter, the Dolphins outscored their opponents 142-55, and the point differential of plus-87 was the best in the NFL in 2001.

Wannstedt's personnel moves leading up to the 2001 season also provided immediate dividends, adding players such as James McKnight, Todd Perry, Chris Chambers, Morlon Greenwood, Travis Minor and Jamar Fletcher to the team.

In 2000, his first season as the Dolphins' head coach, Wannstedt led the team to an 11-5 record and the AFC East championship, his first division title, and the first by the Dolphins since 1994. Wannstedt's 11 wins were the most he recorded in his seven previous years as a head coach, and the Dolphins' 11-5 record was the team's best mark since 1992. In addition, with the Dolphins having gone 9-7 in 1999, the two-game improvement under Wannstedt in 2000 was Miami's largest since the team went 11-5 in 1992 after going 8-8 the previous year. As a measure of the team's success in 2000, the Dolphins sent seven players to the Pro Bowl, the most since 1984, when the team advanced to the Super Bowl.

Wannstedt's reputation as an outstanding defensive coach was underlined in 2000 as the Dolphins finished third in the NFL in defensive points allowed, giving up a total of 226 points, the fewest ever allowed by a Dolphins team in a 16-game season. Under Wannstedt, the Dolphins also recorded an NFL high 28 interceptions, and their plus-15 takeaway/giveaway ratio was the best by a Dolphins team since 1983. Overall, it was the fourth best mark in franchise history.

Following the regular season, Wannstedt led the Dolphins to the AFC Divisional Round of the playoffs, defeating the Indianapolis Colts, 23-17, in overtime in a memorable first round game. For his efforts in 2000, Wannstedt won a "Terry" Award as NFL Coach of the Year by FOX analyst Terry Bradshaw and received consideration for NFL Coach of the Year honors. In addition, he received the Florida Sports Award as the Pro Coach of the Year in the state of Florida for 2000.

Prior to being named Miami's head coach in 2000, Wannstedt served as the Dolphins' Assistant Head Coach under Jimmy Johnson in 1999. In that capacity, he had a broad range of coaching responsibilities working with the team's offensive, defensive, and special teams staffs, as the Dolphins qualified for the postseason and won their first road playoff game since 1972 while advancing to the AFC Divisional Round game. In addition to his coaching duties, Wannstedt also was involved in the team's college and pro personnel evaluation process as well.

His current tenure with the Dolphins actually is Wannstedt's second tour of duty with the team. Prior to the start of the 1989 season, he served as Miami's linebackers coach for seven weeks under Don Shula before being named by Johnson as defensive coordinator with the Dallas Cowboys that February.

Before joining the Dolphins in 1999, Wannstedt served the previous six years (1993-98) as Head Coach of the Chicago Bears. In those six seasons in Chicago, Wannstedt posted 41 wins, the third most victories by a coach in the club's storied 80-year history. His teams posted back-to-back winning seasons in 1994 and 1995, but working with three personnel directors in six years resulted in major roster changes that ultimately affected the club's foundation that Wannstedt established.

In 1996, the Bears finished strongly, winning five of nine games after the bye week despite a rash of injuries that resulted in 19 different starters on offense and 18 on defense during the course of the season. In addition, they posted a 6-2 record at Soldier Field, recording their best home mark since 1991.

In 1995, the Bears again posted a strong finish en route to a 9-7 record, winning their final two games for the first time since 1986. Chicago's 4-4 mark in the NFC Central Division was their best mark since 1991. The club also led the NFL in fewest penalties for the second straight season. Just minutes after the Bears finished the year with a 20-14 win over Philadelphia, they were denied a playoff berth when the Atlanta Falcons upset the San Francisco 49ers to claim the final wild card spot when playoff tiebreakers separated the teams that finished 9-7.

In 1994, Wannstedt led the Bears back to the playoffs after a three-year hiatus. The team's 9-7 regular season mark earned them a wild card berth which led to a first round upset of NFC Central champion Minnesota at the Metrodome, the first road playoff win by Chicago since 1984. Wannstedt was named NFC Coach of the Year by Football News, UPI and Kansas City's 101 Club and was among the top three finishers for the NFL Coach of the Year by AP, Pro Football Writers, The Sporting News, Pro Football Weekly and Football Digest.

The Bears were one of four NFC Central teams in the playoffs in 1994, a berth earned after a four-game winning streak at midseason moved the team from 4-4 to 8-4. The Bears posted a season-high 35 points in beating the Vikings in the Wild Card game before losing to the eventual Super Bowl champion San Francisco 49ers the next week on the road in a Divisional Round contest. Six of Chicago's seven losses in 1994 were against playoff teams, and among the Bears' wins were triumphs over four-time defending AFC Champion Buffalo and at Miami.

In 1993, Wannstedt's first season in Chicago, the Bears finished with a 7-9 record highlighted by two impressive winning streaks. After an 0-2 start, the Bears won three straight games, including a 17-6 win against the then undefeated Philadelphia Eagles (4-0) at Veterans Stadium. A four-game winning streak, which included a NFL-first three road wins in 12 days, had Chicago in a first place tie in the NFC Central with four games remaining. The Bears were in the midst of the playoff chase until the 17th week of the season as the team improved two games from their 5-11 record in 1992, the season before Wannstedt arrived in Chicago. In just his first year as a head coach, Wannstedt was among the top vote getters for the NFL Coach of the Year Award.

Wannstedt's stint as defensive coordinator of the Dallas Cowboys (1989-92) under Jimmy Johnson marked his first coaching position in the NFL. In Dallas, he took over a defense that had ranked 20th in the league the year prior to his arrival. By 1990, his defense led the league against the pass and was 18th against the run, and he was named The National's NFL Assistant Coach of the Year. In 1991, the Cowboys improved to ninth against the run as they made the playoffs for the first time since 1985. Wannstedt's success made him a finalist for the Pittsburgh Steelers head coaching position following the 1991 season, prompting Johnson to give him the additional position of Assistant Head Coach in January, 1992.

In 1992, Wannstedt's defense was the youngest in the NFL yet ranked first in the league, allowing an average of just 245.8 yards per game, including just 77.8 yards rushing. The exclamation point to his tenure in Dallas came in Super Bowl XXVII when his defense forced nine turnovers as the Cowboys routed the Buffalo Bills, 52-17. Overall, the Cowboys improved from a 1-15 team when Wannstedt became defensive coordinator in 1989 to a 16-3 World Championship club in his final season in Dallas.

Wannstedt began his coaching career in 1975 as a graduate assistant coach at the University of Pittsburgh under his college coach, Johnny Majors. Jimmy Johnson joined the Panthers' staff in 1977, and in 1979 Wannstedt followed Johnson to Oklahoma State, where Johnson had taken the head coaching position. Wannstedt served as defensive line coach with the Cowboys from the 1979-80 seasons before being promoted to defensive coordinator in 1981, a spot he held for two years. He then served on Ted Tollner's staff at USC as defensive line coach for three seasons (1983-85) before re-joining Johnson as the defensive coordinator at the University of Miami. In his three seasons in that position (1986-88), Miami's defense held opponents to a 2.2-yard average per carry, yielded an average of 10.9 points per game and averaged 48 sacks a season. In 1987 the Hurricanes won the national championship, posting a perfect 12-0 record including an Orange Bowl win over Oklahoma. Overall, his defenses in Miami produced 11 players who were drafted by the NFL, including five in the first two rounds.

Wannstedt is a native of Pittsburgh, where he attended Baldwin High School. He then earned a bachelors degree in physical education and a masters in curricular supervision at the University of Pittsburgh, where he played offensive tackle (1970-73). He captained the team his senior year at Pitt, which featured freshmen Tony Dorsett and Matt Cavanaugh. He was selected by the Green Bay Packers in the 15th round of the 1974 draft but spent the season on Injured Reserve with a neck injury. The next year he began his coaching career when he joined Majors' staff at Pitt.

Wannstedt and his wife, Jan, reside in Davie, where they are both active in many local charitable, church, and community projects. They have two daughters, Keri and Jami.



DON SHULA'S COACHING LONGEVITY

Former Dolphins Head Coach Don Shula was one of only four coaches in NFL history to have coached the same team for 20 or more consecutive seasons. Shula (1970-95) completed 26 seasons with the Dolphins. Green Bay's Curley Lambeau (1921-49) and Dallas' Tom Landry (1960-88) share the record with 29 seasons each, while Pittsburgh's Chuck Noll (1969-91) and the N.Y. Giants' Steve Owen (1931-53) coached 23 years with their teams.

Norv Turner is entering his second season as the Dolphins' Assistant Head Coach/Offensive Coordinator after being named to the post on February 5, 2002, by Head Coach Dave Wannstedt. With the Dolphins, Turner now is in his third coaching stint with Wannstedt. Both were members of former Dolphins Head Coach Jimmy Johnson's Dallas Cowboys coaching staff from 1991-92, where Turner was the offensive coordinator while Wannstedt served as defensive coordinator, as they helped lead the Cowboys to a victory in Super Bowl XXVII following the 1992 season. In addition, Wannstedt and Turner were on the same University of Southern California coaching staff from 1983-84.

In Turner's first season with the Dolphins, the team's rushing game ranked second in the NFL, as it amassed an average of 156.4 yards per contest. This represented a 21-spot improvement from the previous season and it was the highest finish for a Dolphins team since 1972, when they topped the league in that category. The 2,502 total rushing yards were the third-highest total in team annals, and the most since 1973. Ricky Williams led the way with a Dolphins single-season record and NFL-high 1,853 yards and 16 touchdowns. It marked the ninth time in Turner's 12 seasons as either a head coach or a coordinator that a running back surpassed the 1,000-yard rushing mark. In addition, the Dolphins ranked 12th in the NFL in scoring (23.6 points per game) and second in the league in red zone efficiency (64.3%). The Dolphins also placed 15th in the NFL in total offense (337.0 yards per game), the highest finish for a Miami team since 1997. Under Turner's tutelage, quarterback Jay Fiedler compiled a passer rating of 85.2, the best mark by a Dolphins quarterback since 1996.

Turner joined the Dolphins after spending the 2001 season as the offensive coordinator with the San Diego Chargers. Under Turner's guidance, the Chargers' offense improved to the 11th-best unit in the NFL after having finished 28th overall the season prior to his arrival.

Before joining the Chargers, Turner spent the previous seven seasons (1994-2000) as the Head Coach with the Washington Redskins, where he also served in the role as offensive coordinator. During Turner's seven-year tenure in Washington, he led the Redskins to a regular-season record of 49-59-1, including a 10-6 mark in 1999 as the Redskins claimed their first NFC Eastern Division title since 1991. They went on to defeat the Detroit Lions, 27-13, in an NFC First-Round Playoff game, before dropping a one-point decision (14-13) at Tampa Bay in the Divisional round. That season, the Redskins' offense finished the year as the league's second-ranked unit. He guided the Redskins to a record of 7-6 in 2000 before being released with three games to play in the season. The Redskins' final three losses under Turner were by a total of six points, while their six losses over these first 13 games came by an average of less than four points.

Turner got his start in the NFL coaching ranks as an assistant with the Los Angeles Rams in 1985. Serving as the team's receivers coach, the Rams' offense finished third, fourth and third, respectively, from 1988-90, his final three seasons with the club. Following Turner's tenure in Los Angeles, Jimmy Johnson named him offensive coordinator of the Dallas Cowboys in 1991. Turner took over a Cowboys offense that ranked 28th in 1990 and helped lead them to consecutive NFL rankings of fourth overall in 1992 and 1993, as they captured back-to-back Super Bowl titles.

Throughout his coaching career, Turner has helped to mold some of the top skilled position players in the NFL. As receivers coach with the Rams (1985-90), wide receiver Henry Ellard twice surpassed the 1,000-yard receiving mark, with an NFL-high 1,414 in 1988 and 1,382 the following year, placing him fourth in the NFL. In his final three years with the Rams (1988-90), tight end Pete Holohan averaged 53 catches a season and finished second among NFC tight ends in receiving in two of those three years. As offensive coordinator with the Dallas Cowboys from 1991-93, running back Emmitt Smith led the NFL in rushing all three years. In addition, both quarterback Troy Aikman and wide receiver Michael Irvin finished in the top three in the NFL in passing and receiving, respectively, twice apiece. Also during Turner's tenure in Dallas, Jay Novacek led all NFL tight ends in receiving twice and averaged more than 57 receptions a season over that three-year period. During his seven-year stint as Head Coach with the Redskins, the team had a 1,000-yard rusher four times and a 1,000-yard receiver on five occasions. Under Turner, three different Redskin quarterbacks surpassed the 3,000-yard passing plateau, including Brad Johnson, who finished fourth in the NFL with 4,005 yards in 1999, the second-highest total in Redskins history. That same year, running back Stephen Davis led the AFC with 1,405 yards rushing, while two different receivers went over the 1,000-yard receiving mark. In 2001, Chargers running back LaDainian Tomlinson led all NFL rookies with 1,236 yards rushing and ten touchdowns on 339 attempts, while also catching an NFL rookie-best 59 passes. His rushing total ranked fifth in the AFC and ninth in the NFL. In addition, quarterback Doug Flutie threw for 3,464 yards and wide receiver Curtis Conway had 71 receptions for 1,125 yards, marking just the second time in team history that the Chargers have had a 3,000-yard passer, a 1,000-yard receiver and a 1,000-yard rusher in the same season.

Turner began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at the University of Oregon in 1975. The following year, he moved on to the University of Southern California where, for the next nine seasons, he served as the Trojans' receivers coach (1976-79), defensive backs coach (1980), quarterbacks coach (1981-83), and offensive coordinator (1984). In 1980, Turner tutored what is regarded as one of the finest defensive backfields in college football history. It included Ronnie Lott and Dennis Smith, both NFL first-round draft choices in 1981, and Jeff Fisher, a seventh-round draft pick in '81. During Turner's nine-year tenure at USC, the Trojans won all four Rose Bowls in which they appeared, and took part in six bowl games overall, winning five of them. The 1978 team went 12-1, including a victory over Michigan in the Rose Bowl, and claimed the National Championship.

Norval Eugene Turner was a three-year letterman (1972-74) as a quarterback at the University of Oregon, spending two seasons behind NFL Hall of Fame quarterback Dan Fouts. Turner and his wife, Nancy, have three children, Scott, Stephanie and Drew. Scott is a quarterback at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas, where he is playing under former Rams and USC Head Coach John Robinson. Stephanie is a student and actress who lives in Los Angeles.



Keith Armstrong Special Teams



Keith Armstrong is entering his third season as the Dolphins' special teams coach, having been named to the post on January 15, 2001 by Head Coach Dave Wannstedt.

Last year, the Dolphins' special teams units ranked eighth in the NFL in punt return defense, allowing an average of 7.0 yards per return. They also were seventh in the league in kickoff return average, having amassed a 23.5-yard average. The Dolphins are one of only six NFL teams and one of three from the AFC who have not allowed a punt return or kickoff return for a touchdown over the last two years. The Dolphins also ranked in the top ten in both average drive start after kickoffs (T4, 31.0) and opponent's average drive start after kickoffs (8, 27.3), one of only four NFL teams to accomplish this feat last year, and the only one from the AFC.

In Armstrong's first season in Miami, the Dolphins ranked in the top ten in the NFL in both punt return defense (first) and kickoff return defense (ninth), one of only five NFL teams to achieve this feat. The Dolphins yielded a minuscule 4.5 yards per punt return, placing them first in the league. Miami also led the AFC and was fourth in the NFL as their opponents' average drive start following kickoffs was the 26.2 yard line.

Armstrong came to the Dolphins after serving the previous four seasons (1997-00) in the same role with the Chicago Bears. In 2000, Chicago's special teams blocked a pair of opponent field goal attempts while also ranking fourth in the NFL in punt return defense, allowing an average of just 7.0-yards per return. In 1998 and 1999, the Bears' special teams unit ranked fourth overall in the NFL based on a formula consisting of numerous categories. In 1999, his group recovered six fumbles and blocked an NFL-high four field goals. In 1998, the Bears' special teams units led the league in points scored (26) and blocked kicks (four). In Armstrong's four seasons, the Bears ranked in the top ten in the NFL in punt return average, punt coverage and kickoff coverage twice each. In 1999, they led the league in kickoff coverage, having allowed an average of just 16.6 yards per return.

Armstrong first started in the NFL with the Atlanta Falcons in 1994, where he coached the safeties for two years before being promoted to secondary coach in 1996.


A four-year letterman (1983-86) as a running back and defensive back at Temple University, Armstrong started his coaching tenure as a graduate assistant at his alma mater in 1987. He went to the University of Miami (Fla.) in 1988 where he worked with the defensive backs and special teams on a staff that was headed by former Dolphins Head Coach Jimmy Johnson and also included current Head Coach Dave Wannstedt and offensive line coach Tony Wise. Armstrong spent one year with the Hurricanes before joining the Akron staff as receivers coach in 1989. A one-year tenure there preceded his move to Oklahoma State, where he served three years (1990-92) as secondary coach under current Dolphins tight ends coach Pat Jones, then OSU's head coach. His final collegiate post came as linebackers and special teams coach at Notre Dame in 1993.

Armstrong, who grew up in Levittown, Pa., attended Bishop Egan High School in Philadelphia. He and his wife, Kathleen, have two daughters, Kaitlin and Kristen.

Jim Bates Defensive Coordinator

Jim Bates is entering his fourth season as the Dolphins' defensive coordinator. He was named to the post by Head Coach Dave Wannstedt on January 24, 2000. Prior to joining the Dolphins, Bates spent the previous four years (1996-99) with the Dallas Cowboys, including each of the last two as that team's Assistant Head Coach/Defensive Line. He was the Cowboys' linebackers coach from 1996-97.

In Bates' three seasons guiding the Dolphins' defense, Miami finished no lower than sixth in the NFL in total defense. This includes a number three ranking last year, when Miami permitted an average of only 291.0 total yards per game. They also yielded just 301 points, the top figure in the AFC and fourth in the NFL. The unit was recognized by having six players selected for the Pro Bowl (Tim Bowens, Sam Madison, Brock Marion, Patrick Surtain, Jason Taylor, Zach Thomas), the most Miami defenders ever to earn this honor in the same season. In fact, in Bates' three seasons in Miami, seven different Dolphin defenders have been chosen to the Pro Bowl a total of 13 times.

In 2001, the Dolphins led the NFL in pass defense, as they allowed an average of just 176.8 yards a game. Under Bates' guidance two Dolphins defenders (Madison and Thomas) were selected to the Pro Bowl. In addition, the defense set club records in 2001 with five interception returns for touchdowns and six total returns for scores.

In Bates' first season as defensive coordinator, the Dolphins ranked fourth in the AFC and sixth in the NFL in overall defense, allowing an average of 289.8 yards per outing. They were third in the conference and fifth in the league in pass defense, permitting an average of 181.3 yards a contest. In addition, the Dolphins yielded an average of only 14.1 points per game, the third-best mark in the NFL. Their 226 total points allowed were the fewest points ever allowed by a Dolphins team in a 16-game season. Bates' unit also exhibited aggressiveness by forcing 41 turnovers, which ranked third in the AFC and fourth in the NFL. This included an NFL-high 28 interceptions. Following the 2000 season, five players (Trace Armstrong, Madison, Marion, Taylor, Thomas) from Bates' defense were selected to play on the AFC Pro Bowl squad.

Before joining Dallas in 1996, Bates spent one year as defensive coordinator with the Atlanta Falcons (1994) and one season (1995) as the secondary coach with the Cleveland Browns, his second stint with that team. He was Cleveland's linebackers coach in 1991 and their defensive ends coach from 1992-93.

Bates got his start in the pro coaching ranks as defensive coordinator with the San Antonio Gunslingers of the USFL in 1984. He was promoted to Head Coach for the 1985 season and served one year in that post. He was the defensive coordinator with the Arizona Outlaws of the USFL in 1986 before the league folded. He also was an assistant with the Detroit Drive of the Arena League in 1988. Following that, he was the linebackers coach at the University of Tennessee in 1989 and the defensive coordinator/secondary coach at the University of Florida in 1990.

Bates began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at the University of Tennessee in 1968. After a stint as Head Coach at Sevier County (Tenn.) High School, he coached the freshmen at the University of Southern Mississippi in 1972. He moved on to Villanova University for the next two years where he was the Wildcats' offensive line coach in 1973 and the linebackers coach the following season. A two-year stop (1975-76) as linebackers coach at Kansas State and a one-year tenure (1977) as secondary coach at West Virginia preceded Bates' appointment as secondary coach at Texas Tech in 1978. He added the title of defensive coordinator in 1980 and spent the next four years in that post for the Red Raiders.

Bates was a linebacker at the University of Tennessee from 1964-67. He and his wife, Beverly, reside in Dania Beach. Bates has two sons, James and Jeremy, one grandson and two granddaughters. James, a former linebacker at the University of Florida, was a defensive captain on the Gators' 1996 National Championship team and now works as a sportscaster. Jeremy played at Rice University and is currently the offensive quality control coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.



DOLPHINS SEND 144 PLAYERS TO PRO BOWL

Since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, a Dolphin has been selected to play in the Pro Bowl a total of 144 times, including seven last year, which is tied for the second-most in franchise history, trailing only the eight selections for the 1985 game. Over the course of those 33 seasons, 89 offensive players, 49 defensive players and six special teams players have been chosen. The position that has been represented the most is guard, which has occurred on 19 occasions. The only seasons since 1970 that the Dolphins did not have a player selected to the Pro Bowl were 1980 and 1997.

Clarence Brooks is entering his fourth season as the Dolphins' defensive line coach. He was named to the position by Head Coach Dave Wannstedt on January 24, 2000. Brooks joined the Dolphins after spending the 1999 season in the same post with the Cleveland Browns.

This marks Brooks' second coaching stop with Wannstedt, having worked for him from 1993-98 as defensive line coach with the Chicago Bears.

Last season, the Dolphins were second in the AFC and tied for fourth in the NFL with 47 sacks, the third-highest total in club history. Defensive linemen accounted for 41.5 of the total, including 18.5 by Jason Taylor and 9.5 by Adewale Ogunleye, making them the most productive sack tandem in the NFL last year. Taylor's total led the league and tied a franchise single-season record, as he was named a starter to the AFC Pro Bowl squad. In addition, the Dolphins tied for fifth in the NFL in run defense (97.1 yards per game), due in large part to the tackle tandem of Tim Bowens and Larry Chester. Bowens was also a Pro Bowl selection.

In 2000, defensive ends Trace Armstrong and Taylor combined for 31 sacks, ranking them as the most productive sack tandem in Dolphins history and the top duo in the NFL in 2000. Armstrong's 16.5 sacks led the AFC and were tied for second in the NFL, while Taylor's total of 14.5 was second in the conference and fifth in the league. Both were named as starters to the AFC Pro Bowl squad, the first time that teammates have been chosen to start at defensive end in the Pro Bowl since the 1992 season (1993 Pro Bowl) when Philadelphia's Reggie White and Clyde Simmons were picked.


Prior to joining the Bears in 1993, Brooks spent the previous three seasons (1990-92) as the defensive line coach at the University of Arizona. That followed a nine-year stay (1981-89) at Syracuse University. He spent his first six years there tutoring the outside linebackers for the Orangemen, and his final three seasons as defensive line coach. His initial full-time coaching post came in 1976, overseeing the defensive ends at the University of Massachusetts, a position in which he served four seasons. In addition, during the summer of 1989, Brooks worked in the Dallas Cowboys' training camp as part of the team's minority coaching fellowship program.

Brooks was an offensive guard at the University of Massachusetts from 1970-72, and was the team captain his final season. He and his wife, Justa, have a son, Jason, and a daughter, Adrienne.

Joel Collier enters his tenth season with the Dolphins and his sixth as running backs coach, having been named to the position on February 11, 1998.

During Collier's stint tutoring the team's running backs, two different Dolphins have surpassed the 1,000-yard rushing mark, including Lamar Smith (1,139 in 2000) and Ricky Williams (1,853 in 2002).

Last season, Williams broke through with the finest performance of his four-year NFL career with an NFL-high 1,853 yards rushing, the highest single-season total in Dolphins history and the eighth-highest figure in league history. Williams was a starter for the AFC Pro Bowl squad, the first Dolphins running back to be named to the all-star squad since the 1978 season when Delvin Williams earned the honor.

Also during Collier's tenure as running backs coach, he has tutored three different players who finished among the top five rookie rushers in the NFL in their respective rookie seasons.

As a defensive assistant with the Dolphins from 1994-97, Collier assisted in coaching the team's linebackers and in the overall football operation. In 1997, Collier worked extensively with rookie linebacker Derrick Rodgers, a third-round draft choice who garnered several all-rookie accolades, including Sports Illustrated's Defensive Rookie of the Year.

Collier joined the Dolphins after having worked three seasons (1991-93) in various capacities with the New England Patriots. He served in the pro scouting department in 1993 and worked as assistant running backs and wide receivers coach from 1991-92.

Collier joined the Patriots after serving as an offensive assistant with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1990. Prior to his experience with the Bucs, Collier worked two years with the quarterbacks and running backs as a graduate assistant at Syracuse University.

A three-year starter at inside linebacker at Northern Colorado, Collier was an academic All-North Central Conference performer. He received his bachelor's degree in social science education.



Robert Ford

Robert Ford enters his 13th season as an NFL assistant and his sixth with the Dolphins. He was named the team's wide receivers coach in 1998.

Ford has been instrumental in the development of Chris Chambers, who led all NFL rookies in 2001 with 48 receptions for a team-high 883 yards and seven touchdowns, as he established Dolphins single-season rookie records for receiving yards and receiving touchdowns. He was a consensus all-rookie selection, as he led all NFL rookies in receiving that year. Chambers topped the team's receiving chart last year with 52 catches for 734 yards and three touchdowns. Over his first two seasons combined, Chambers has tallied 100 receptions for 1,617 yards and ten touchdowns. His yardage total is the third-most by a Dolphin after his first two years with the team, while his reception figure is fourth.

In Ford's five previous seasons overseeing this position, five different wide receivers have surpassed the 50-catch plateau in a season.

Ford first broke into the NFL as an assistant with the Dallas Cowboys in 1991. During his seven seasons tutoring the club's tight ends, Jay Novacek was voted to the Pro Bowl five times (1991-95). From 1991-95, Novacek recorded 280 receptions, more than any other NFL tight end during this five-year span. Ford also spent the summer of 1990 with the Cowboys as part of the club's minority coaching fellowship program.

Prior to joining the Cowboys, Ford spent 16 seasons as an assistant at both the high school and collegiate levels. He began his coaching career in 1973 at Saginaw (Michigan) High School. He embarked on his collegiate tenure the following year, tutoring the wide receivers at Western Illinois where he spent 1974-76. That was followed by stops at New Mexico (1977-79), Oregon State (1980-81) and Mississippi State (1982-83). His first pro job came as receivers coach with the Houston Gamblers of the USFL in 1985. Ford returned to the collegiate ranks where he held posts at Kansas (1986), Texas Tech (1987-88) and Texas A&M (1989-90) preceding his NFL stint.


A native of Belton, Texas, Ford earned his degree in education from the University of Houston and his master's in athletic administration from Western Illinois. At Houston, where he played wide receiver from 1970-72, Ford led the Cougars in receiving, punt returns and kickoff returns in his final season. He is the only player in NCAA history to account for two 99-yard receptions. Ford and his wife, Janice, have two sons, Bobby and Jason. The family resides in Pembroke Pines.

John Gamble enters his tenth season with the Dolphins as strength and conditioning coach, having been named to the position on March 16, 1994. Gamble has the primary responsibility in the area of strength and conditioning for the club.

In his position, Gamble is responsible for the organization and implementation of the programs for the team's overall conditioning development. Brad Roll, the club's assistant strength coach, assists Gamble with the implementation of the programs and his interaction with the Dolphins' training and medical staffs. Gamble was named by the Professional Strength Coaches Society as its 1998 Coach of the Year.

Gamble joined the Dolphins after having served ten years (1984-93) as the head strength coach at the University of Virginia. He also served two seasons as assistant strength coach (1982-83) and one year on a part-time basis (1981) at Virginia. He was named 1985 Strength Coach of the Year by the National Strength and Conditioning Association. At Virginia, Gamble helped develop such future NFL stars as Jim Dombrowski, Jeff Lageman, Herman Moore and Ray Roberts.

Gamble served an eight-year stint as state director for the National Strength and Conditioning Association and was named Outstanding State Director for Region II in 1984.

A world renowned powerlifter, Gamble was the number-one ranked powerlifter in the world in the 275-pound class from 1981 to 1983. His personal records for total pounds in three lifts while competing in the United States Powerlifting Federation was 2,270 pounds, and he has personal bests of full squat, 892 lbs.; bench press, 573 lbs.; and dead lift, 826.5 lbs. in those three lifts. Gamble was inducted into the U.S. Weightlifting Hall of Fame in York, Pa. in June of 1999.

Gamble played linebacker at Hampton Institute and was a first-team Black College All-America selection. He also earned All-Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association honors in football and in track and field.



Judd Garrett

Offensive Quality Control/Quarterbacks



Judd Garrett is entering his seventh season as an NFL assistant and his fourth with the Dolphins after spending the previous three seasons (1997-99) as an offensive assistant with the New Orleans Saints. In his role with the Dolphins, Garrett is in charge of quality control on the offensive side of the ball, while also assisting in various coaching responsibilities with the team's quarterbacks.

Garrett was a three-year starter (1987-89) as a running back at Princeton University, where he was named the Ivy League Player of the Year and a Division I-AA All-American his senior season. He was selected by the Philadelphia Eagles in the 12th round of the 1990 draft, and after being released by the Eagles in training camp, Garrett spent the 1990 season as an assistant coach at Princeton. He went on to play with the London Monarchs of the World League from 1991-92. In his first year there, he led the league in receptions and was an All-League pick. His 71 receptions in 1991 stood as a league record until the 2000 season. After spending the 1993 season on the Dallas Cowboys' practice squad, Garrett played two years in the Canadian Football League, with the Las Vegas Posse in 1994 and the San Antonio Texans in 1995. He coached one year (1996) at his prep alma mater, University High School in Cleveland, Ohio, prior to joining the Saints.

Garrett is continuing his family tradition in the NFL. His father, Jim, is a scout with the Dallas Cowboys. His older brother, John, is a scout with the Cincinnati Bengals, while another older brother, Jason, is a quarterback with the New York Giants. Judd and his wife, Kathy, who was an All-America soccer player at Princeton, have two sons, Calvin (7/31/93) and Campbell (3/31/98), and two daughters, Frances (4/12/95) and Kassity (1/2/03).



DOLPHINS PERFECT IN 1972

The 1972 Dolphins continue to hold the distinction of being the only unbeaten, untied team through the playoffs. Miami went a perfect 17-0 in winning Super Bowl VII. In that season, the Dolphins became the first team to lead the NFL in scoring offense and defense in the same season since the 1970 merger of the AFL and NFL. Since that time, the only other team that has led the NFL in both points scored and points allowed was the 1996 Super Bowl champion Green Bay Packers.

Pat Jones Tight Ends



Pat Jones begins his eighth season as the Dolphins' tight ends coach after being named to the position in 1996. Jones joined the Dolphins after spending 1995 training camp, pre-season and the regular season opener as an offensive line specialist with the Chicago Bears. Prior to that, he spent 11 seasons as head coach at Oklahoma State University (1984-94) and 22 years at the collegiate level. Overall, he has been in the profession for 33 years.

Last season, Randy McMichael became the first rookie tight end in Dolphins history to start every regular season game. A fourth-round draft choice, McMichael finished the season third on the team in receptions (39), second in receiving yards (485) and first in receiving touchdowns (four). His receiving totals all were second among NFL rookie tight ends in 2002.

Jones led Oklahoma State to a 62-60-3 record during his tenure in Stillwater and was at the helm during the school's only 10-win seasons (1984, 1987 and 1988) in its football history. He led the Cowboys to four bowl games (1984 and 1985 Gator Bowl, 1987 Sun Bowl and 1988 Holiday Bowl) with three victories during his 11 seasons. Jones finished as the school's all-time winningest coach and 11th-most successful coach all-time in Big Eight history. He was twice named Big Eight Coach of the Year (1984 and 1992) and was National Coach of the Year by Football Yearbook in 1984.

Jones coached nine All-Americans at OSU, including Thurman Thomas, Hart Lee Dykes, Leslie O'Neal and Barry Sanders. Dykes ended his career as the all-time leading receiver in Big Eight history, O'Neal was a Lombardi Award finalist in 1985, and Sanders won the Heisman Trophy in 1988. At OSU, Jones also tutored current Pittsburgh Steeler All-Pro linebacker Jason Gildon.

Jones became Oklahoma State's head football coach when Jimmy Johnson left to become head coach at the University of Miami in 1984 and he was promoted from assistant head coach/defensive coordinator. Jones' inaugural season at OSU saw the Cowboys achieve its highest national ranking (second in the UPI poll and third in the AP ratings) prior to a regular-season finale against Oklahoma for the Big Eight title. The Cowboys finished the season with ten wins and a final ranking of fifth in UPI and sixth in AP. Jones' ten wins marked just the third time in conference history that a rookie head coach had achieved that milestone, as he joined Oklahoma's Barry Switzer and Colorado's Chuck Fairbanks. In addition, his Cowboys teams finished three other seasons ranked in the Top 20 with finishes of 17th in 1985, 11th in 1987 and 11th in 1988. During his tenure at OSU, Jones also coached in the 1986 Japan Bowl, the 1988 Hula Bowl, and the 1992 Blue-Gray Game.


Jones began his coaching career in the Little Rock (Ark.) public schools in 1969 before moving on to the collegiate level as assistant defensive line coach at Arkansas under then-defensive coordinator Jimmy Johnson (1974-75). He also made stops as defensive ends coach at Southern Methodist (1976-77), defensive ends coach at Pittsburgh with Johnson in 1978, and defensive ends coach/defensive coordinator at Oklahoma State (1979-83), before taking the head coaching position at OSU in 1984.

Raised in Little Rock, Ark., Jones played collegiately at Arkansas Tech in 1965 before transferring to Arkansas for 1966-67 as a walk-on linebacker and nose guard.

Bill Lewis Defensive Nickel Package



Bill Lewis is in his eighth season with the Dolphins after being named defense nickel package coach in 1996. Lewis joined the NFL coaching ranks after 32 years (1963-94) of coaching at the collegiate level. He teams with Mel Phillips in tutoring the Dolphins' defensive backs.

Lewis spent 1995 as athletic director at The Marist School in Atlanta after three seasons as head coach at Georgia Tech from 1992-94. Prior to his stint at Georgia Tech, Lewis served as head coach at East Carolina for three seasons (1989-91), during which time he led the Pirates to an 11-1 record and a victory in the Peach Bowl over North Carolina State following the 1991 season. At the conclusion of the '91 campaign, Lewis received National Coach of the Year honors from A.F.C.A., UPI and Scripps-Howard.

Lewis began his coaching career at East Stroudsburg (Pa.) State in 1963 and made stops as defensive backs coach at Pittsburgh (1966-68), Wake Forest (1969-70), Georgia Tech (1971-72) and Arkansas (1973-76). He became head coach at Wyoming in 1977 and spent three years at the helm of the Cowboys. He began a nine-year stint at the University of Georgia in 1980 as defensive backs coach before occupying the job of defensive coordinator in his last eight seasons with the Bulldogs.

While in Athens, the Bulldogs won the 1980 National Championship and during his nine years at the school, Georgia appeared in nine straight bowl games and won three Southeastern Conference titles. He coached 23 All-SEC honorees and seven All-Americans.


Lewis was a four-year letterman at quarterback at East Stroudsburg (Pa.) State from 1959-62 and earned Little All-America honors during his playing days. In addition, Lewis spent two years in the Detroit Tigers' minor league system as a pitcher.

Bernie Parmalee Assistant Special Teams/Offensive Assistant



Bernie Parmalee is in his second season as a member of the Dolphins' coaching staff and the first in his current role after serving as assistant special teams coach last year. He embarked on his NFL coaching career in 2002 after a nine-year playing career, including the first seven (1992-98) with the Dolphins and the final two (1999-2000) with the Jets. In his position with the Dolphins, Parmalee assists Keith Armstrong with the Dolphins' special teams, while also breaking down film on the offensive side of the ball.

During his career, Parmalee played in 134 games, starting 26 of them. He rushed for 2,179 yards and 17 touchdowns on 567 carries, caught 168 passes for 1,485 yards and three touchdowns and returned 16 kickoffs for an 18.1-yard average. Parmalee made Miami's roster as an undrafted rookie free agent in 1992. In his seven seasons with the club, he amassed 1,959 yards rushing and 15 touchdowns on 513 attempts, and totaled 144 receptions for 1,306 yards and three scores. His rushing figure is 11th on the Dolphins' all-time chart entering the 2003 season. He led the team in rushing two straight years with 868 yards (216 atts., 6 TDs) in 1994 and 878 yards (236 atts., 9 TDs) the following year. In addition, Parmalee established himself as one of the league's premier special teams players during his tenure, having recorded 122 tackles on coverage units, including 31 in 1997 and 30 in 1998.


Parmalee was a four-year starter (1987-90) at Ball State where he is the school's all-time leading rusher with 3,483 yards and 26 touchdowns. He earned his degree in business administration from the Muncie, Indiana school.

Mel Phillips enters his 19th season as a coach for the Dolphins, teaming with Bill Lewis in coaching the secondary for the eighth consecutive year. During his first 11 years with the club, Phillips served as defensive backs coach. His 18 straight seasons with the same team is tied for the fourth-longest current streak among NFL coaches.

Under Phillips, Dolphins defensive backs have had a knack for coming up with the big play, having returned 13 interceptions or fumbles for touchdowns over the last eight years. In Phillips' 18 previous seasons, the team's defensive backs have brought back a total of 24 interceptions or fumbles for touchdowns.

Last year, three-fourths of the Dolphins' starting secondary were selected for the AFC Pro Bowl squad, including cornerbacks Patrick Surtain and Sam Madison, and free safety Brock Marion, marking the first time in team history that three defensive backs were chosen for the Pro Bowl in the same season.

In 1998, Miami registered an NFL-high 29 interceptions, the second-most in team history, trailing only the 32 from 1978. In 2000, Phillips' unit again led the league in interceptions, snaring 28 enemy passes, including an AFC-high seven by strong safety Brian Walker. Cornerback Madison and free safety Marion were voted to the AFC Pro Bowl squad, the first time since 1974 that two Dolphins defensive backs were chosen for the Pro Bowl in the same season. All four starters in Miami's secondary tallied at least five interceptions in 2000, as the Dolphins became the first NFL team since the 1981 Tampa Bay Buccaneers to have at least four players record five or more interceptions in the same season. In 2001, for just the third time in club history, the Dolphins led the NFL in pass defense as they allowed an average of only 176.8 yards per contest. Phillips has been instrumental in the development of Madison, who now has been voted to the Pro Bowl each of the last four years, and Surtain, who was voted as a starter to last year's Pro Bowl squad. They are the only two Dolphin cornerbacks ever to be chosen to the Pro Bowl. In addition, Madison has recorded 25 interceptions over the last five years, tied for the second-most in the NFL during this five-year stretch.

Before coming to Miami in 1985, Phillips previously held the same position for five seasons with the Detroit Lions (1980-84).

A native of Shelby, N.C., Phillips played 12 seasons for the San Francisco 49ers (1966-77), including eight as a starter at strong safety. A tenacious hitter during his playing days, his career statistics include ten interceptions for 106 return yards (including a 35-yard TD in 1970). Phillips twice won the 49ers' Len Eshmont Award, symbolic of the team's most valuable player. Following his retirement from the 49ers, Phillips worked for the city of San Francisco's juvenile probation department until joining the Lions.


Collegiately, Phillips attended North Carolina A&T, where he played both ways as a defensive back and a running back. As a senior, he rushed for 648 yards and 11 touchdowns on 100 carries, and also caught 19 passes for 277 yards and four scores. That season (1965), A&T won the conference championship and Phillips intercepted two passes and rushed for two TDs in the title game. Phillips also lettered for the swimming and track teams at A&T.

Mel and his wife, Patricia, have two daughters, Paulette (6/4/67) and Yvette (5/9/73) and live in Miami Lakes.

Glenn Pires is entering his first season as the Dolphins' assistant defensive line coach after being named to the post by Head Coach Dave Wannstedt on February 13, 2003. In his role with the Dolphins, Pires will assist defensive line coach Clarence Brooks while also handling quality control on the defensive side of the ball.

A veteran of seven NFL seasons, Pires joins the Dolphins after spending each of the past two years (2001-02) as linebackers coach with the Detroit Lions. He got his start in the NFL coaching ranks tutoring the linebackers with the Arizona Cardinals in 1996, and spent the next five years in that post.

Pires was a four-year letterman (1976-79) as an offensive lineman at Springfield (Mass.) College. After earning his bachelor's degree in education from the school in 1980, he embarked on his coaching career as an assistant at Melrose (Mass.) High School. In 1983, he went to Syracuse as a graduate assistant and served the next two years with the Orangemen. After earning his master's degree in education from Syracuse, Pires got his first full-time position in the collegiate ranks coaching the linebackers and defensive line at Dartmouth College in 1985. After four years at the Ivy League school, he returned to Syracuse in 1989 where he served as both defensive line coach (1989-90) and outside linebackers coach (1991-94). A one-year stint (1995) as outside linebackers coach/recruiting coordinator at Michigan State University preceded his jump to the NFL.



The 2003 season will be the eighth that Brad Roll and Strength and Conditioning Coach John Gamble have worked alongside one another. Roll was named assistant strength and conditioning coach in 1996. He joined the club after three seasons as the head strength coach with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. In addition to his duties with the team's strength program, on gamedays Roll is responsible for charting formations and personnel for the Dolphins' defense in the coaching booth.

Roll joined the Bucs as strength and conditioning coach in 1993 and was instrumental in helping to develop and implement the club's offseason conditioning program. He went to Tampa Bay after spending the 1989-92 seasons in a similar capacity at the University of Miami. While at UM, the team won the national championship in 1989 and 1991, and Roll worked with players such as Cortez Kennedy, Russell Maryland, Warren Sapp and Leon Searcy.

Prior to his arrival at Miami, Roll was the strength and conditioning coach at the University of Kansas from 1987-88, and while at the school, he worked closely with KU's 1988 national championship basketball team, which included Head Coach Larry Brown and forward Danny Manning, who currently is playing in the NBA. From 1981-86, Roll served as the first full-time strength and conditioning coach at the University of Louisiana-Lafayette and he was a graduate assistant at Stephen F. Austin, his alma mater, in 1980.

Roll played collegiately at Blinn (Texas) Junior College and Stephen F. Austin, where he was a center. He holds bachelor's and master's degrees in education. He also studied at the Moscow (Russia) Sports Institute during the summers of 1985 and 1986, as well as with the German Olympic weightlifting coaching and training staff in Leipzig in 1987.

Roll serves as treasurer of the National Football League Coaches Association, and is the team representative for the organization. Roll is also a member of the board of the Biscayne Institute of Miami, an organization that serves as an after-school program for at risk teenage girls.



Bob Sanders Linebackers



Bob Sanders is entering his third season as an NFL assistant after spending the previous 22 years as an assistant at the collegiate level, including the final 11 years (1990-00) at the University of Florida.

In Sanders' two seasons tutoring the Dolphins linebackers, Zach Thomas has been voted to the Pro Bowl both times and has registered the two highest single-season tackle totals of his career. He also has overseen the development of Morlon Greenwood, a third-round draft choice in 2001 who has started 26 games over his first two seasons and has registered 70 tackles in each of his two years.

Sanders coached virtually every position on the defensive side of the ball during his stint in Gainesville, including the 2000 season as the Gators' assistant defensive coordinator/linebackers coach. At Florida, Sanders was a part of five SEC championship teams, including the 1995 club that claimed the national title. While at Florida, the Gators ranked in the top ten in rushing defense in eight of his 11 seasons, including the three best performances in school history. They also finished first in the SEC in quarterback sacks four straight seasons (1996-99). In 1994, Sanders was named the SEC's Assistant Coach of the Year.

While at the University of Florida, Sanders tutored nine players who earned All-America accolades. He also coached such future first round draft choices as DE Kevin Carter, LB Jevon Kearse and DE Huey Richardson.


Sanders began his collegiate coaching career as an assistant at Georgia Tech in 1978. After spending one year as a high school head coach in 1979, Sanders re-joined the college ranks as an assistant at East Carolina University in 1980. Following a three-year stint as defensive line/linebackers coach with the Pirates, Sanders spent the next two seasons (1983-84) as linebackers coach at the University of Richmond. From 1985-89, he was as an assistant at Duke University, where he was co-defensive coordinator while also working with the team's defensive ends and outside linebackers. In his final season at Duke, the Blue Devils claimed the ACC championship as they posted a record of 8-4, the school's first conference title since 1965.

Sanders is a native of Jacksonville, N.C., where he prepped at Jacksonville High School. He went on to play collegiately at Davidson College, from 1973-75, and received his degree in political science from the school. Sanders and his wife, Kathie, have two daughters, Lindsay and Sarah, and a son, Robby.

Tony Wise Offensive Line

Tony Wise was named the Dolphins' offensive line coach on January 15, 2001 by Head Coach Dave Wannstedt. Wise, a veteran of 14 seasons in the NFL coaching ranks, served in the same capacity with the Carolina Panthers for two seasons (1999-00) prior to his arrival in Miami.

Last season, the Dolphins' offensive line paved the way for a running game which was first in the AFC and second in the NFL, averaging 156.4 yards per contest. The unit also allowed only 25 sacks, fourth-fewest in the AFC and seventh in the NFL.

In 2001, the Dolphins' offensive line allowed just 27 sacks, tied for fifth-fewest in the NFL.

Over the last two years combined, the Dolphins have permitted only 52 sacks, the third lowest total in the AFC and fifth in the NFL.

In Wise's first year with the Panthers, the offensive line led a rushing attack that averaged 4.3-yards per rush attempt, the fifth-best figure in the league. Prior to his stint in Carolina, Wise worked with Wannstedt for six years with the Chicago Bears. He was the team's offensive line coach from 1993-94, and added the title of assistant head coach from 1995-98. In four of those six seasons, the Bears ranked in the top ten in the NFL in fewest sacks allowed, including a number one finish in 1995 (15 sacks).

Wise embarked on his NFL coaching career in 1989 with the Dallas Cowboys, and guided that club's offensive line through 1992. In his final season there, Wise's unit allowed the second-fewest sacks in the NFL (23) as Dallas captured the first of two straight Super Bowl titles.

Wise began his coaching career in 1973 tutoring the outside linebackers at Albany State. He then spent a year each at Bridgeport, Central Connecticut and Washington State, before moving on to the University of Pittsburgh, where he served from 1977-78, and worked with former Dolphins Head Coach Jimmy Johnson, Wannstedt and current Dolphins tight ends coach Pat Jones. Wise joined the Oklahoma State staff in 1979, and had a five-year stint with the Cowboys. During that time, Johnson was the head coach, and both Wannstedt and Jones served on the staff as well. He then spent one year at Syracuse (1984), before re-

joining Johnson and Wannstedt at the University of Miami from 1985-88, where he was part of the Hurricanes' 1987 National Championship team.

From 1969-72, Wise was an offensive lineman at Ithaca College, where he also lettered in lacrosse. He also played on the school's hockey team. Prior to that, he attended Shaker High School in his hometown of Latham, N.Y.



Rick Spielman begins his fourth season with the Dolphins and the second in his current position after spending his first two years with the club as Vice President-Player Personnel (2000-01). Spielman joined the Dolphins from the Chicago Bears, where he served as that club's Director of Pro Personnel since 1997.

In his role with the Dolphins, Spielman is responsible for overseeing college scouting, the college draft, pro scouting, free agency and the day-to-day player personnel evaluations on both levels. He also monitors the Dolphins' salary cap and contract negotiations, and oversees all the non-coaching football operations and support staff.

Since his arrival in May of 2000, Spielman has used free agency, trades and the waiver system to bring in such players as Ricky Williams, Larry Chester, Jamie Nails and James McKnight, all of whom have made critical contributions to Miami's success over the past three seasons. In addition, under Spielman's direction, the club has been able to sign many key performers to long-

term contract extensions, including Sam Madison, Patrick Surtain, Olindo Mare, Jason Taylor, Jay Fiedler and Zach Thomas. This offseason, Spielman engineered the trade for perennial All-Pro linebacker Junior Seau from the Chargers, in addition to signing several key veteran free agents such as Marco Battaglia, Terrell Buckley, Brian Griese, Sammy Knight, Charlie Rogers, Derrius Thompson and Jeff Zgonina.


The first two Dolphin drafts under Spielman's direction (2001-02) have yielded three starters, including WR Chris Chambers LB Morlon Greenwood and TE Randy McMichael.

Prior to joining the Bears organization in 1997, Spielman spent seven seasons in the player personnel department of the Detroit Lions, including the final two (1995-96) as a pro scout and advance scout. He also was responsible for scouting college players during his tenure in Detroit.

A linebacker at Southern Illinois University from 1983-86, Spielman attended NFL training camps with both the San Diego Chargers (1987) and Detroit Lions (1988) before earning his master's degree from Ohio State in 1989.

A native of Massillon, Ohio, Spielman is the older brother of Chris Spielman, a former Pro Bowl linebacker with the Detroit Lions (1988-95) and Buffalo Bills (1996-98). Rick and his wife, Michele, are active with several philanthropies, most notably the American Cancer Society and "His House", which houses foster children in Miami. The couple has two sons, Ronnie and J.D., and a daughter, Whitney. They reside in Davie.

Ron Labadie Director of College Scouting



Ron Labadie was named the Dolphins' Director of College Scouting on May 9, 2001. He was promoted to the post after spending his first 11 years (1990-2000) with the club scouting the midwestern states for the Dolphins.

In the Dolphins' first draft under Labadie (2002), four of the team's five draft picks appeared on the 53-man roster, while a fifth spent the season on the practice squad. In addition, the Dolphins signed two undrafted free agents who were on the roster at season's end.


Labadie joined the Dolphins after serving as head football coach and athletic director at Adrian College. A 1971 graduate of Adrian, Labadie returned to the school as head football coach in 1982. In his eight seasons as head coach of the Bulldogs, he posted a 53-20 (.730) collegiate record. He guided the Bulldogs to MIAA Championships in 1983, 1988 and '89, as well as leading his team to NCAA Division III playoff berths in 1983 and 1988. He was given the additional responsibilities of Director of Athletics for Men in May, 1985.

Before returning to Adrian, Labadie served as head football coach at Marshall (Mich.) High School (1974-81), where he compiled a 42-30 overall record, including a 39-15 mark over his last six years. Under Labadie, Marshall captured Twin Valley Conference Championships in 1976 and '77.






Grier started with the Patriots as an intern in 1994. He joined the club on a full-time basis the following year, and served as a regional scout until joining the Dolphins.

Johnathon Stigall College Scout





In 2000, Egues was named the Athletic Equipment Managers Association (A.E.M.A.) District III Equipment Manager of the Year.



LEAST WORN UNIFORM NUMBERS

Uniform No. 8 was the last number never to have been worn by a Dolphin in a regular season game. Punter Klaus Wilmsmeyer earned that distinction in 1998. In fact, Nos. 8, 12 and 39 are the only three jersey numbers donned by only one player in the 37-year history of the franchise. Quarterback Bob Griese (1967-80) was the only Dolphins player ever to wear No. 12, which was retired on May 6, 1982. Running back Larry Csonka (1968-74, 79) wore No. 39, which was retired on December 9, 2002.

David Hack begins his 19th season with the Dolphins as the club's video director after having served 11 seasons as an assistant in the department. Hack and his assistant, Robert Hack, have the responsibility for providing the coaching and player personnel staffs with their audio/visual needs. They videotape all practices and games and maintain an extensive tape and film library.

During his 29 years with the Dolphins, Hack has shot two Super Bowls and also coordinated the team's video operations on international trips to London, Berlin, Tokyo and Mexico City. He and Robert have also been selected by the NFL to shoot numerous college bowl and all star games, including the Orange Bowl, CarQuest Bowl and Senior Bowl All-Star games. In addition, Hack serves as the AFC East representative to the NFL Video Director's quality control committee.

One of the longest tenured Dolphins employees, Hack holds the distinction of being the only person to be in attendance for all of former quarterback Dan Marino's 242 regular season and 18 playoff games (other than Marino).


Hack and his wife of 28 years, Connie, reside in Pembroke Pines and have two children, Heather (24) and Brett (21).







assistance that the Dolphins are able to provide comes from the teamwork of alumni, coaches, players, cheerleaders, T.D. (the Dolphins mascot) and front office personnel working together toward the common goals of helping those in need, and supporting the community that has always been there to support the Miami Dolphins.

MIAMI DOLPHINS FOUNDATION

The Miami Dolphins Foundation was established in 1995 as the fundraising arm of the Miami Dolphins Football Team. The Dolphins, through the Foundation, have made a commitment to the betterment of South Florida youth through a direct focus on, but not limited to, educational, health, social and community service issues.



The Miami Dolphins Foundation contributes, whenever possible, to charitable groups that are compatible with the philosophy of the Foundation. Resources for contributions are procured through various fundraising events throughout the year.

EDUCATIONAL PARTNERSHIPS

The Miami Dolphins understand that the education of our South Florida youth is of utmost importance. It is for this reason that the Dolphins have partnered with both Broward and Miami-Dade County Public

Schools on several extensive programs.

- **Student of the Week Program** – working in conjunction with Pro Player Stadium, the Miami Dolphins honor a selected student from each of the partner schools at all eight of the team's regular season home games. The students are selected by their principals and teachers for their citizenship and classroom achievements. In recognition of their accomplishments they are presented with a plaque by Marti Huizenga, wife of Dolphins owner Wayne Huizenga, during an on-field presentation.

- **Teacher of the Year Awards** – one teacher from each partner school is selected as a Teacher of the Year and is recognized for their accomplishments during a pre-game, on-field presentation.

- **Pro Player Stadium/Miami Dolphins Scholarship** – a \$1,000 scholarship is awarded annually to both a Miami Carol City High School and Miramar High School senior who demonstrates strong community service along with a solid academic performance. A \$500 honorable mention scholarship is also awarded.

DAILY BREAD FOOD BANK

The Miami Dolphins have an ongoing relationship with the Daily Bread Food Bank, an organization that provides food to the needy throughout South Florida. The Miami Dolphins team up with the Daily Bread Food Bank on the following projects:

- **Canned Food Drive** – each year the "Make A Difference at the Holidays" canned food drive is held at a Dolphins home game prior to Thanksgiving. This year's canned food drive will take place prior to the game against the Washington Redskins on Sunday.

Each NFL team selects ten finalists, with each finalist receiving grants of \$1,000 for their organization. Those ten finalists are then narrowed down to a winner. The winner receives a \$10,000 grant to their organization.





The Miami Dolphins' 1997 addition might have been their biggest – literally. The club unveiled "T.D.," its new mascot, on Friday, April 18, 1997, the first "official" mascot in the history of the franchise. The 7-foot tall mascot made its public debut at the team's Draft Day Party at Pro Player Stadium on April 19, 1997. In addition, the mascot performs at every Dolphins home game.

When the mascot was first unveiled, it was without a name. The club held a "Name the Mascot" contest that drew over 13,000 entries covering all 50 states and 22 countries, with 529 different names suggested. The name "T.D." was first submitted by Sara Fernandez of Miami, and when that name was selected by the Dolphins organization, she won two tickets to Super Bowl XXXII for her winning entry, which was announced at the annual Dolphins Awards Banquet on June 4, 1997.

The club had a live dolphin, "Flipper," who was situated in a fish tank in the open end of the Orange Bowl during the team's early years, and "Dolfan Denny," who prowled the sidelines for many seasons. However, this marks the first time the club actually has an official mascot, one who participates in many of the team's programs in addition to his gameday activities.

PERFECT DOLPHINS HONORED



PRO PLAYER STADIUM

Pro Player Stadium, South Florida's home to the Miami Dolphins and Florida Marlins, is in its 17th season as the premier sports and entertainment facility in the country. This state-of-the-art open-air complex hosted its first football game in August, 1987, its first regular season Major League baseball game in April, 1993 and stages world class events throughout the calendar year. Pro Player Stadium is one of only four facilities in the country to host NFL football and Major League Baseball in the same venue.

HISTORY

Now in its 17th year of operation, the 75,000 seat, state-of-the-art, open-air facility, originally called Dolphin Stadium, was the first of its kind to be constructed entirely with private funds, costing 115 million dollars when it was completed in 1987. The late Joe Robbie led the financing campaign to build "Joe Robbie Stadium" for the Miami Dolphins of the NFL. JRS revolutionized the economics of professional sports when it opened that year. Inclusion of a Club Level, along with Executive Suites, helped to finance the construction of the stadium. Season ticket holders committed to long term agreements and in return they received first-class amenities in a state-of-the-art facility which is still used as a model for new facilities across the country.

On March 7, 1990, H. Wayne Huizenga, then Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of Blockbuster Video and Huizenga Holdings Inc., agreed to purchase fifty percent of Joe

Robbie Stadium and became the point man in the drive to bring Major League Baseball to South Florida. That effort was rewarded in July of 1991, when South Florida was awarded a National League expansion franchise. On January 24, 1994, Mr. Huizenga acquired the remaining fifty percent of the stadium to give him 100% ownership. Since 1991, over 80 million dollars have been spent to upgrade and renovate the stadium. The improvement and revitalization of the building under Huizenga allowed the stadium to remain the finest sports and entertainment facility in the United States.

On August 26, 1996, Pro Player, the sports apparel division of Fruit of the Loom, sponsored the renaming of Joe Robbie Stadium as Pro Player Stadium. They became the first sports marketing and products company to entitle a stadium or arena.

The first football game in Joe Robbie Stadium was held on August 16, 1987, when the Miami Dolphins met the Chicago Bears in a preseason battle. The game also marked the 22nd anniversary of the Dolphins franchise. The stadium hosted the National Football League's premier game, Super Bowl XXIII, on January 22, 1989. It marked the return of the Super Bowl to South Florida after a ten year absence. A second Super Bowl was hosted when Super Bowl XXIX was played in the facility on January 29, 1995, and the Super Bowl returned to Pro Player Stadium on January 31, 1999, when the facility hosted Super Bowl XXXIII.

Major League Baseball officially began in South Florida in the spring of 1993 as the Florida Marlins opened their inaugural campaign as a National League team. On April 5, 1993, the "new" look of Pro Player Stadium as a baseball facility was unveiled to the public for the first time as the Florida Marlins hosted the Los Angeles Dodgers. The Marlins began their existence by finishing the first day in first place with a 6-3 win over the Dodgers.

In 1997, Pro Player Stadium hosted four World Series games between the Marlins and the Cleveland Indians, including Game One on Oct. 18, 1997, the first Series game ever played at the stadium, and Game Seven on October 26, 1997, which the Marlins won, 3-2 in 11 innings, to capture their first World Championship.

Before the arrival of the Marlins, the stadium had played host to thirteen spring training games that attracted 370,000 fans and paved the way for baseball in South Florida.

Behind the scenes, Pro Player Stadium underwent renovations to accommodate Major League Baseball and the Florida Marlins. The conversion included the installation of retractable seating on the north side of the stadium, the construction of the baseball press box in the southwest corner of the facility, the building of the baseball dugouts, the addition of 660 new lights for suitable night play and the installation of a hydraulic disappearing pitcher's mound. The stadium also features a synthetic warning track designed to absorb water. At the time, the only other facility to feature this type of track was Oriole Park at Camden Yards, home of the Baltimore Orioles. The renovation also included the construction of the Florida Marlins clubhouse and other amenities to accommodate baseball at Pro Player Stadium.

On the field, Pro Player Stadium is equipped with a Prescription Athletic Turf (PAT) system which provides draining for its natural grass, and during February and March of 1995, the old PAT system was removed, and a new advanced mechanical drainage system was installed. At a cost of one million dollars, the new system provides three times the drainage capacity of the old system and ensures a firm dry playing surface within half an hour's time after as much as a three inch per hour rain fall.

LOCATION

The stadium is located at 2269 Dan Marino Boulevard in Miami, only one mile south of the Dade-Broward County Line. The 160 acre site stands midway between downtown Miami (16 miles) and downtown Fort Lauderdale (18 miles).

WORLD CLASS EVENTS

Pro Player Stadium displays its versatility every year by hosting a wide variety of events. Along with Miami Dolphins football and Florida Marlins baseball, college football takes the field with the Florida Atlantic University Fighting Owls as well as the FedEx Orange Bowl (which played host to the national championship game in 1998 and 2001). Super Bowl XXXIII was held at Pro Player Stadium on January 31, 1999. Major League Baseball's premier event, the World Series, was played at Pro Player Stadium in 1997.

Pro Player Stadium has also played host to numerous concerts, featuring entertainers such as Pink Floyd, Elton John/Billy Joel, the Rolling Stones, Chicago, Genesis, Gloria Estefan, Guns & Roses, The Who, Hall & Oates, Rod Stewart, Paul McCartney, New Kids on the Block, the Three Tenors World Tour, U2 and 'N Sync.

Other events held in the past at Pro Player Stadium include international soccer games featuring the United States World Cup Team, high school football, Monster Truck Shows, and numerous trade shows.

EXECUTIVE SUITES

Pro Player Stadium's 183 suites offer luxury and comfort in the ultimate setting to watch any event. The ten, twelve, sixteen, twenty four and thirty two seat suites have been completely renovated and offer DirecTV access, multi-feed sound systems, refrigerators, ice-makers and private telephone services. Uniformed Suite Captains provide personal service in each suite during the events. Distinctive Gourmet, a Boston Concessions division, caters the suites with a delectable, wide-variety of food and beverages from which to choose.

CLUB LEVEL SEATING

Located on the second level, the 10,200 club level seats provide exceptional luxury with the most space and leg room available in the stadium, featuring seats 21" wide (compared to the 19" wide general seating). The Club Seats lead to air-conditioned lounges with full-service bars and concession areas. The protective overhang, along with wait-staff service, also are unique elements of the club level.

HALL OF CHAMPIONS

Pro Player Stadium was proud to introduce the new Hall of Champions during the 1997 Miami Dolphins season. Located in the east endzone area of the Club Level, the Hall of Champions allows groups of 50 to 270 to experience a Miami Dolphins football or Florida Marlins baseball game in style. In addition to club level amenities and entertainment, the Hall of Champions offers interior and exterior seating, a full bar with bartender, a private elevator and many other exclusive privileges.

DINING

Full service concession facilities, managed by Boston Concessions, are available on all levels and include Pizza Hut and Carvel Ice Cream and Yogurt. The stadium was recently recognized by Sports Illustrated for the high quality of its food and beverage service.

VISIONS FOR THE FUTURE

Pro Player Stadium will continue to enhance the fan experience by its commitment to capital improvements. These continuing upgrades and renovations will heighten the guest experience by providing increased comfort, new amenities and better service.

STADIUM HISTORY

- Mar. 5, 1976 – Consultants are hired to do feasibility study for South Florida stadium.
- July 21, 1976 – Preliminary plan for 70,000-seat stadium is unveiled.
- Nov. 15, 1977 – Miami voters reject \$15 million bond issue for Orange Bowl renovations.
- May 22, 1978 – Committee estimates to Dade County a cost of \$40 million to build a new Orange Bowl next to the old one with financing coming from a resort tax and ticket surcharge.
- Feb. 19, 1979 – County attorney rules resort tax money cannot be used to build a new Orange Bowl.
- March, 1979 – National Football League rejects Miami as a Super Bowl site until stadium situation is rectified.
- Dec. 22, 1981 – Dolphins owner Joe Robbie reveals that he is negotiating to develop privately a stadium at Lake Lucerne in north Dade County.
- Nov. 2, 1981 – Voters in Dade and Broward counties overwhelmingly defeat a sales tax increase which would go toward building a new stadium.
- Dec. 14, 1983 – City of Miami voters reject sales tax increase to renovate the Orange Bowl.
- Mar. 5, 1984 – Dolphins owner Joe Robbie announces plans to build a new multi-purpose stadium in north Dade County at the team's annual awards banquet.
- Mar. 13, 1984 – City of Miami voters reject raising taxes to pay for \$55 million bond issue to repair the Orange Bowl.
- May 10, 1984 – Dolphins owner Joe Robbie begins campaign to market Dolphin Stadium executive suites and club seats.
- July 3, 1984 – Metro Commission accepts 160 acres donated by Emil and Lawrence Morton at Lake Lucerne, then leases it to Dolphin Stadium Corporation for 99 years.
- Dec. 6, 1984 – Metro commissioners unanimously agree to let Dolphins owner Joe Robbie sell \$85 million in tax exempt bonds to finance his stadium project.
- Jan. 8, 1985 – Dolphins owner Joe Robbie announces that he is ready to spend two million dollars for stadium blueprints and engineering studies.
- Mar. 14, 1985 – At the NFL meetings in Phoenix, Dolphin Stadium is named as the host site for Super Bowl XXIII (1989).
- July 22, 1985 – Clearing of stadium site begins.
- Sept. 9, 1985 – South Florida Regional Planning Council recommends approval of proposed Dolphin Center.
- Sept. 26, 1985 – Metro Commission approves development order and zoning request of Dolphin Center.
- Dec. 1, 1985 – Groundbreaking ceremonies for Dolphin Stadium take place.
- Dec. 19, 1985 – Foundation permit is issued to Dolphin Stadium Corporation by Dade County.
- Dec. 26, 1985 – First concrete is poured at stadium site.
- Dec. 31, 1985 – Dolphins owner Joe Robbie obtains construction loan and is granted permanent financing for the new stadium.
- June 3, 1986 – Dolphins owner Joe Robbie plants a ceremonial 30-foot Royal Palm tree to begin a million-dollar beautification project for neighborhoods near Dolphin Stadium.
- Aug. 27, 1986 – Topping Out Ceremonies take place at Dolphin Stadium as highest point of construction is reached.
- Feb. 3, 1987 – Metro Commission unanimously passes a resolution recommending that Dolphin Stadium be named after its builder, Joe Robbie.
- April 30, 1987 – Tim Robbie, designated spokesman for the Robbie children, announces that Dolphin Stadium has been renamed "Joe Robbie Stadium."
- Aug. 2, 1987 – An estimated 40,000 people attend Family Day at Joe Robbie Stadium, the general public's first opportunity to see the new facility.
- Aug. 16, 1987 – The Miami Dolphins play host to the Chicago Bears in the first game ever played in Joe Robbie Stadium. The Bears put a damper on the festive evening with a 10-3 preseason victory in front of 63,451 fans. The date also marks the 22nd anniversary of the Dolphins franchise.
- Oct. 11, 1987 – The Dolphins' "replacement" team records a 42-0 shutout win over the Kansas City Chiefs in the first regular-season game at JRS.
- Mar. 4, 1988 – The first soccer game ever played at JRS takes place as part of the Marlboro Soccer Cup of Miami. The U.S. National team defeats Millonarios of Colombia, 2-1, in the match before 14,877 fans.
- Mar. 11, 1988 – The first baseball game ever played at JRS takes place in front of 24,247 spectators, then the largest crowd ever to see a major-league game in the state of Florida. The Los Angeles Dodgers defeat the host Baltimore Orioles, 10-8, in the exhibition contest. The following night, the Montreal Expos beat

the Orioles, 9-3, with 17,830 in attendance. Seven home runs are hit each night as a temporary 30-foot wall in left field compensates for a distance of 272 feet down the foul line.

- April 16, 1988— A technical inspection team from FIFA, soccer's international governing body, visits JRS as part of the United States' bid to host the 1994 World Cup.
- July 3, 1988 – The first concert ever held at JRS takes place. "Happy Birthday America '88" features performances by Rod Stewart, Hall and Oates and Chicago.
- Jan. 22, 1989— The first Super Bowl ever held at JRS takes place. The game marks the first-time since Super Bowl XIII (January 21, 1979) that the NFL's Championship game is played in Miami. The San Francisco 49ers defeat the Cincinnati Bengals, 20-16.
- Mar. 7, 1990 – H. Wayne Huizenga, Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of Blockbuster Video and Huizenga Holdings, Inc., agrees to purchase fifty percent (50%) of Robbie Stadium Corporation (the parent company of Joe Robbie Stadium), as well as a fifteen percent (15%) limited partnership interest in the Miami Dolphins.
- April 14 & 15, 1990 – Nearly 100,000 people pack the stands in Joe Robbie Stadium over a two-day period to see former Beatle Paul McCartney perform live in concert.
- April 17, 1990— The Blockbuster Bowl, college football's newest post-season bowl game, is officially certified by the NCAA. The bowl is scheduled to kickoff its inaugural matchup on December 29, 1990, at Joe Robbie Stadium.
- Dec. 29, 1990— The Florida State Seminoles defeat the Penn State Nittany Lions, 24-17, in the inaugural Blockbuster Bowl at JRS before a capacity crowd of 74,021.
- Jan. 5, 1991 – Dolphins host the Kansas City Chiefs in the first NFL playoff game ever played in JRS. The Dolphins come back to defeat the Chiefs, 17-16.
- Jan. 28, 1991 – Seats are removed on the north side of JRS to begin renovating for baseball.
- March 26, 1991 – H. Wayne Huizenga and the Robbie family jointly purchase 42 acres adjacent to JRS. In addition, Huizenga purchases two additional lots, totaling 65 acres. The lots were purchased from the estates of Emil and Lawrence Morton.
- March 30, 1991— The New York Yankees and the Baltimore Orioles play an exhibition game before 67,654 fans at Joe Robbie Stadium – the largest crowd ever to watch a baseball game in a non-Major League city. The Yankee-Oriole game the following day draws 57,359, giving the two-game series at JRS a total attendance figure of 125,013.
- May 23, 1991 – At the NFL meetings in Minneapolis, Joe Robbie Stadium is selected as the host site for Super Bowl XXIX, to be played on January 29, 1995.
- June 10, 1991— The National League expansion committee recommends South Florida (Joe Robbie Stadium) and Denver to Major League Baseball's ownership committee as the two sites for National League expansion. The two teams will begin play in 1993.
- July 18, 1991 – Major League Baseball officially awards South Florida a National League expansion franchise, the Florida Marlins, who will begin play in 1993 at JRS.
- Jan. 25, 1992— The U.S. World Cup soccer team faces the Soviet National Team (C.I.S.) before a South Florida record soccer crowd of 30,386.
- Jan. 17, 1993— The Dolphins host the Buffalo Bills in the first AFC Championship Game ever played at JRS. The Bills defeat the Dolphins 29-10 and advance to Super Bowl XXVII.
- April 5, 1993 – In the first regular season baseball game ever played at JRS, the Florida Marlins win their inaugural game, defeating the Los Angeles Dodgers, 6-3.
- Jan. 24, 1994— H. Wayne Huizenga acquires remaining 50% of Joe Robbie Stadium and the additional 85% of the Miami Dolphins, leaving him with 100-percent ownership of both the stadium and Dolphins.
- Jan. 25, 1995— The second Super Bowl game held at JRS takes place. In Super Bowl XXIX, the San Francisco 49ers defeat the San Diego Chargers, 49-26.
- May 11, 1996 – Al Leiter of the Marlins pitches the first no-hitter in JRS history, shutting out the Colorado Rockies, 11-0.
- Aug. 26, 1996— Pro Player, the sports apparel division of Fruit of the Loom, sponsors the renaming of Joe Robbie Stadium to Pro Player Stadium for \$20 million over a 10-year period.
- Oct. 31, 1996 – At the NFL meetings in New Orleans, Pro Player Stadium is selected as the host site for Super Bowl XXXIII, to be played on January 31, 1999.
- Dec. 31, 1996— The Nebraska Cornhuskers defeat the Virginia Tech Hokies, 41-21, in the first FedEx Orange Bowl played at Pro Player Stadium.
- March 8, 1997— Pro Player Stadium plays host to the Three Tenors concert (Luciano Pavarotti, Placido Domingo, Jose Carreras).

- Oct. 18, 1997 – Pro Player Stadium hosts its first ever World Series game, as the Florida Marlins defeat the Cleveland Indians, 7-4, in Game One.
- Oct. 25, 1997 – The Pro Player Stadium crowd of 67,498 to watch the Marlins defeat the Indians in Game Six is the largest to see a World Series game since 1954.
- Oct. 26, 1997 – Edgar Renteria's single in the bottom of the 11th inning of Game Seven of the World Series drives in Craig Counsell to give the Marlins a 3-2 win and the World Championship.
- Jan. 31, 1999 – The third Super Bowl game held at Pro Player Stadium takes place. In Super Bowl XXXIII, the Denver Broncos defeat the Atlanta Falcons, 34-19.
- Jan. 3, 2001 – The Oklahoma Sooners defeat the Florida State Seminoles, 13-2, in the FedEx Orange Bowl to win the National Championship.
- Aug. 2, 2001 – Pro Player Stadium plays host to the 'N Sync concert.

Including bye weeks, the Dolphins have been at or above the .500 mark during the regular season for 103 straight weeks dating back to the final week of the 1996 season, the longest current streak in the NFL. No other team can claim to have a streak that precedes the 1999 season. Oakland owns the second-longest current streak, having been at or above the break-even mark for 52 straight weeks, dating back to the final week of the 1999 season.

On July 11, 1993, the Miami Dolphins officially moved into their brand new training facility at Nova-Southeastern University in Davie, Florida, from their long-time base at St. Thomas University.

The ten million dollar state-of-the-art facility covers 93,452 square feet and incorporates the latest technology and advances that were utilized in the design of other NFL training facilities.

The Dolphins' training center not only houses the team's football operation personnel and the club's administrative staff, but it also serves as the site of the club's preseason training camp and all off-season conditioning programs as well.

The facility includes a large locker room area, sauna and steam rooms, a therapy swimming pool, a cold plunge pool, whirlpools, and one of the largest weight training rooms in the NFL.

In addition to the physical training needs, modern support facilities also were constructed. Those include lounges, conference rooms, equipment rooms, laundry areas, video editing labs, an auditorium that functions as a site for major press conferences as well as for full team and staff meetings, a dance studio for the team's cheerleaders, and the Dolphins Pro Shop, which sells official team merchandise.

Administrative offices, located on the second floor, include the head coaches' office with an adjacent conference room overlooking the practice fields. Offensive and defensive coaches' offices flank these areas. Other office space exists for personnel and administrative staff members.

At the rear of the facility are two full-sized grass football fields, which were constructed utilizing the Prescription Athletic Turf (PAT) system that also is used for the field at Pro Player Stadium. That system incorporates underground pipes and electronic pumps to remove water from the fields when natural drainage is not adequate.

With a primary emphasis to design the complex in a "fan-friendly" manner, a bleacher structure adjacent to the fields was constructed, utilizing elements of Pro Player Stadium itself. When the stadium was revised to accommodate baseball, large sections of seats from the stadium were removed. Those sections were relocated to the Nova facility as part of the new complex. As a result, the bleacher facility at Nova can accommodate 2,500 spectators, including 600 in chair-back seats, for open practice sessions and other special events. The structure also provides fans permanent amenities such as concession areas, a merchandise pro shop, ticket windows, and rest rooms.

DOLPHINS POST THREE PLAYOFF SHUTOUTS

The Miami Dolphins recorded a 31-0 win over the San Diego Chargers on January 10, 1993, in an AFC Divisional Playoff game. The Dolphins became just the fifth AFC team since the 1970 merger of the American and National Football Leagues to record a shutout in the playoffs. Amazingly, Miami has recorded three of the seven AFC playoff shutouts by having also earned a 14-0 win over the N.Y. Jets

on January 23, 1983, and a 21-0 win over the Baltimore Colts on January 2, 1972. The only other AFC playoff shutouts were by the New York Jets (41-0 over the Indianapolis Colts on January 4, 2003), Oakland Raiders (27-0 over the Miami Dolphins on January 6, 2001), the San Diego Chargers (17-0 over the Kansas City Chiefs on January 2, 1993) and the Baltimore Colts (17-0 over the Cincinnati Bengals on December 26, 1970).


DE JAY WILLIAMS . . .

DUAL 100-YARD RECEIVING GAMES



In the 37-year history of the franchise, the Dolphins have had 18 dual 100-yard receiving games, 20 including playoffs. The most frequent duo has been Mark Clayton and Mark Duper, who combined for four dual 100-yard receiving games. Overall, Clayton was part of eight such games while Duper was in seven. The most recent game in which the Dolphins had two receivers surpass the 100-yard mark occurred on November 25, 2001 when Oronde Gadsden accumulated 118 yards on eight receptions and Chris Chambers totaled 101 yards and two scores on five catches against the Bills at Ralph Wilson Stadium. It marked the third time in Gadsden's four-year career that he has been a part of a dual 100-yard receiving game, with the first two occasions coming in 1999.

DOLPHINS ARE BEST

Since the 1970 merger of the National and American Football Leagues, the Miami Dolphins are the winningest team in professional football. The Dolphins, who own a regular season record of 324-178-2 (.645) and an overall mark of 344-197-2 (.635), have the best regular-season and overall winning percentage of any NFL team during that span.

DOLPHINS NAME

Mariners, Marauders, Mustangs, Missiles, Moons, Sharks, Suns. None of those other names suggested to the American Football League expansion franchise in 1965 could raise a fin to the runaway winner.

"Dolphins" was submitted by 622 entrants in a contest which attracted 19,843 entries and more than a thousand different names. The dozen finalists were delivered to a seven-member screening committee of local media.

The bottlenose dolphin, an intelligent creature with an irresistible built-in grin, has inspired wonder for centuries. Plutarch observed 1,900 years ago that the dolphin "is the only creature who loves man for his own sake." Every trainer will have a tale of the dolphin's cleverness and ingenuity, and scientists are fascinated by a dolphin's natural equipment which far surpasses the range of Navy sonar equipment.


"The dolphin is one of the fastest and smartest creatures of the sea," Joe Robbie said in announcing the team name on October 8, 1965. "Dolphins can attack and kill a shark or a whale. Sailors say bad luck will come to anyone who harms one of them."

Mrs. Robert Swanson of West Miami won two lifetime passes to Dolphins games with her nickname entry. The tiebreaker was picking the winner and score of the 1965 game between the University of Miami and Notre Dame. It ended in a scoreless tie.

Underwent arthroscopic surgery prior to the season, on April 29, 2002 for loose body removal and a joint debridement in his left knee . . . 1999 – Started 15 of the 16 games in which he played at left defensive tackle . . . Finished with 45 total tackles (28 solo), 1.5 sacks for 5.5 yards lost and a pass defended . . . 

PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONORS: Buckley has been cited as AFC Defensive Player of the Week three times in his career . . . He earned the honor most recently on October 8, 2000 as a member of the Denver Broncos when he recorded two interceptions against the San Diego Chargers . . . That marked his first NFL weekly honor since December 7, 1997 against Detroit as a member of the Dolphins . . . In that game, Buckley amassed eight tackles and intercepted two Scott Mitchell passes in Miami's 33-30 win . . . He also was honored for his effort in the final week of the 1995 season, when he recorded six tackles, an interception and two passes defended against the Rams in St. Louis . . . Buckley was one of three Dolphins to earn AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors in 1997 (Shawn Wooden vs. Indianapolis, 8/31; Derrick Rodgers at N.Y. Jets, 10/12).





The Dolphins hold NFL records for most seasons leading the league in fewest sacks allowed (10 — 1973, 1982-90) and most consecutive seasons leading the league in the same category (1982-90). In addition, during the 1988 and '89 seasons the Dolphins also set an NFL record by not allowing a quarterback sack in 19 consecutive games. The streak far outdistanced the previous NFL mark of five straight games, which was accomplished on many occasions. In 1988, Miami also set an NFL sack record by allowing only seven sacks in the 16-game season.

GAME HIGHLIGHTS – VS. DETROIT (SEPT. 8): Caught three passes for 36 yards, including a nine-yard TD reception from Jay Fiedler in season-opening 49-21 win vs. Detroit . . .

AT KANSAS CITY (SEPT. 29): Hauled in six passes for 102 yards, the fourth 100-yard receiving game of his career . . . Had a long catch of 38 yards, his third-longest reception of the season . . . Six catches marked the second-most receptions of his career, and now are tied for the third-highest total . . .

VS. NEW ENGLAND (OCT. 6): Had six receptions for 62 yards, including a seven-yard scoring catch from Jay Fiedler which gave the Dolphins a 14-0 lead in their 26-13 win over the defending Super Bowl champion Patriots . . .

VS. OAKLAND (DEC. 15): Turned in his second 100-yard receiving game of the season and the fifth of his career with seven catches for 138 yards, including a long catch of 40 yards, his second-longest reception of the season . . . Reception total tied a career-high that he first set on December 22, 2001 at New England, while his yardage total represented a career-best, surpassing his previous high of 124 yards achieved in that same Patriots game from last year . . . Also had a pair of catches of 29 yards apiece . . . Of his yardage total on the day, 117 came in the first half as he became the first Dolphin to have 100 yards receiving in a half since Chambers had 108 yards in the second half at New England on December 22, 2001 . . .

AT MINNESOTA (DEC. 21): Had two receptions for 58 yards, including a season-long 59-yard TD catch from Jay Fiedler on the game's fifth play from scrimmage . . . It was the second-longest pass play by the Dolphins in 2002 and the second-longest catch in Chambers' career . . .

In addition, it was the highest by a Dolphin (minimum of 24 receptions) since Mark Duper put together a 19.6-yard norm (67-1,313) in 1986 and Mark Clayton accounted for a 19.2-yard average that same year (60-1,150) . . . Chambers' average per catch of 18.4 also marked a new Dolphins rookie record, surpassing the previous mark of 17.4, first set by TE Ferrell Edmunds in 1988:

ROOKIE OF THE MONTH: Chambers was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month for November . . . In four games that month, caught 14 passes for 293 yards and four touchdowns . . . Amassed more than 100 yards receiving in two of those four games . . . Became the third Dolphins rookie to win such an honor, joining LB Zach Thomas (October, 1996) and T Todd Wade (October, 2000) . . .

POSTSEASON HONORS: Was a consensus all-rookie selection . . . Was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by both Football News and Football Digest . . . In a vote of South Florida media and fans, was named the Dolphins Newcomer of the Year for 2001, the first rookie to earn this honor since Jason Taylor in 1997 . . .

NFL RECORD FOR CONSECUTIVE HOME WINS

The Dolphins hold the NFL record for most consecutive home games won. Miami won 27 straight regular-season home games (31 overall) at the Orange Bowl from 1971-74.

PRO CAREER

2002 – Signed a one-year contract with the Dolphins as a free agent on March 6, 2002 . . . Was perhaps the top comeback story in the NFL in 2002 . . . Returned to the playing field after missing each of the previous three seasons (1999-2001) following a severe knee injury in which he nearly lost his leg in a beach flag football game during Pro Bowl week in Hawaii following the 1998 season . . . Played in 12 games, all in a reserve role for Miami in '02 . . . Was inactive for four contests . . . Was fourth on the team with 107 yards rushing and a touchdown on 20 attempts . . . Caught 18 passes for 126 yards and a score . . . Added one tackle on special teams . . . Had most productive outing in season-opener vs. Detroit (9/8), which marked his first NFL game since January 3, 1999 at Jacksonville as a member of the New England Patriots in an AFC First-Round playoff game . . . In the Lions contest, rushed for 20 yards on a season-high four carries, including a one-yard TD run, and caught a season-high four passes for 38 yards, including a four-yard scoring catch from Jay Fiedler . . . The two scores tied for his personal single-game high achieved on two previous occasions (vs. Kansas City, 10/11/98; vs. San Francisco, 12/20/98) . . . The four catches tied for the second-highest total of his career . . . When he hauled in the four-yard TD reception with 3:59 to play in the third quarter, it marked his first touchdown since he had a five-yard TD run on December 20, 1998 against San Francisco . . . Edwards also became the first Dolphin to record a rushing touchdown and a receiving touchdown in the same game since the 2001 season-opener, on September 9 at Tennessee, when Lamar Smith had a four-yard run and a 65-yard reception . . . Rushed for a season-high 34 yards on just three carries, including a season-long 19-yard run, in Monday night game at Green Bay (11/4) . . . Was inactive for each of the final four regular season games . . .

POSTSEASON HONORS: For his comeback, Edwards was named Sports Illustrated's Comeback Player of the Year . . . Finished second in the Associated Press Comeback Player of the Year voting, trailing only Pittsburgh QB Tommy Maddox . . . Also was the winner of the "George Halas Award", as presented by the Pro Football Writers of America, and was the Dolphins recipient of the Ed Block Courage Award.

2001 – Went to training camp with New England in 2001 . . . Did not play in any preseason games before being waived on August 24, 2001.

2000 – Was placed on New England's Reserve/Non-Football Injury list on August 22, 2000, where he spent the entire season.

1999 – Following the '98 season, sustained a severe left knee dislocation during an all-star beach flag football event during the week of the Pro Bowl in Hawaii . . . Was placed on the Patriots' Reserve/Non-Football Injury list on August 31, 1999, where he spent the entire season.

F I N S F A C T

Robert played cornerback his first two years at the University of Georgia before making the move to running back, where he rushed for nearly 2,000 yards in just two years.



1998 – Started 15 of the 16 games in which he played during his rookie season . . . Rushed for 1,115 yards and nine touchdowns on 291 attempts . . . Added 35 receptions for 331 yards and three scores . . . His 1,115 yards represented the eighth-best rushing performance in franchise history at the time (now ninth) and he became just the fifth Patriot to rush for over 1,100 yards in a season (now sixth) . . . It ranked tenth overall in the AFC and second among rookie rushers, trailing only Jacksonville's Fred Taylor (1,223) . . . Reception total was third on the team behind Ben Coates (67) and Terry Glenn (50) . . . His 12 total touchdowns was the fifth-highest single-season total in Patriots history (now sixth), tying Mack Herron's 1974 season total . . . It placed him third in the AFC behind Terrell Davis (23) and Fred Taylor (17) . . . Led the team in rushing in 14 of the 16 games and either led or shared the lead as a receiver in four others . . . Made his NFL debut at Denver (9/7), as he split time with Sedrick Shaw . . . Didn't start, but led the team in rushing with 50 yards on 13 carries, scoring his first career touchdown on a one-yard run in the second quarter . . . Made his NFL starting debut the following week in the home opener vs. Indianapolis (9/13) . . . Finished the game with 107 yards of offense, including 71 yards on three receptions (23.4 avg.) and scored on another one-yard run late in the game to give the Patriots a 29-0 advantage in a 29-6 final . . . Broke free for a season-long 53-yard run vs. Tennessee (9/20) and finished the game with 92 yards on just 12 carries (7.7 avg.) and scored on another touchdown run, extending his streak to three games . . . Scored on an eight-yard run the following week at New Orleans (10/4) and finished just three yards shy of his first 100-yard rushing game in a 30-27 victory over the Saints . . . Posted his first 100-yard game the following week vs. Kansas City (10/11), as he rushed for 104 yards on 23 carries (4.5 avg.), and scored for the fifth consecutive week, on a one-yard run in the first quarter . . . Also caught three passes for 32 yards, including a diving 15-yard touchdown which put the Patriots ahead 17-0 in a 40-10 win over the Chiefs . . . It was his first career touchdown reception and the first multiple touchdown game of his career . . . Set an NFL record in his sixth week, vs. New York (10/19), when he scored a touchdown in his sixth consecutive game as a pro . . . No player in NFL history had ever started their careers with touchdowns scored in each of their first six games . . . For the second week in a row, he rushed for 104 yards and a touchdown and also had four receptions for 24 yards . . . His record-breaking touchdown run converted a fourth-and-goal from the one . . . Recorded a single-game high of 196 yards rushing at St. Louis (12/13), which was the fourth-highest single-game total in Patriots history and was the fourth-highest total in the NFL in '98 . . . Accounted for three of his four longest runs in that game, from 53, 47 and 36 yards out . . . Carried the ball 24 times in that game, tying a season-high, giving him an 8.2-yard average per attempt that day . . . Fourth and final 100-yard game came the following week in a playoff clinching victory over San Francisco (12/20) when he rushed for 101 yards on 24 carries and scored on a five-yard run . . . Also added four receptions for 52 yards and scored the game's opening touchdown on a 19-yard catch from Scott Zolak . . . It was his second multiple touchdown game of the season . . . Had a season-high five receptions vs. Atlanta (11/8) . . . Rushed for 28 yards on 17 carries and caught three passes for 33 yards in a First-Round Playoff loss at Jacksonville (1/3/99) . . . First of two first-round draft choices (18th overall) of New England in 1998, with a choice obtained from the Jets as part of the compensation package for the signing of RB Curtis Martin as a restricted free agent . . .

POSTSEASON HONORS: Earned postseason all-rookie team honors from Pro Football Weekly, College & Pro Football Weekly, Football Digest and Football News . . . Also selected as the Shaw's Supermarkets 12th Player Award.

COLLEGE

Was a four-year letterman (1993-94, 1996-97) at Georgia . . . Was recruited as a cornerback in 1993, but made the transition to running back after two years as a defensive back . . . Started 18 of 22 games . . . Finished his collegiate career by rushing for 1,955 yards and 27 touchdowns on 371 carries (5.3 avg.) . . . Rushing total ranks 11th all-time among Bulldog career leaders despite playing the position for just over two seasons . . . His career average of 5.3-yards per carry ranks eighth in school history and his 27 career rushing touchdowns ties him with Tim Worley for fifth place . . . Started seven of nine games as a senior in 1997 and rushed for 830 yards and 12 touchdowns on 142 attempts, and was a second-team All-America selection and a first-team All-Southeastern Conference choice . . . Rushed for a career-high 186 yards and two touchdowns on 19 carries (9.8 avg.) vs. Kentucky . . . Touchdown runs were 44 and 80 yards . . . His 80-yard run was the longest of his career and the longest since Worley went 89 yards vs. Florida in 1985 . . . His 186-yard rushing total was the most by a Bulldog back since Garrison Hearst collected 246 yards against Vanderbilt in 1992 . . . Was voted team captain prior to his junior season . . . Started nine of 11 games at running back that year . . . Led the team in rushing with 800 yards

and nine touchdowns on 184 carries (4.4 avg.) . . . Caught 23 passes for 199 yards (8.7avg.) and a touchdown . . . Returned two kickoffs for 27 yards (13.5 avg.) . . . Won the starting job at running back in 1995 after making the switch from cornerback during fall drills . . . Sustained a fractured bone in his foot during the second game of the season vs. Tennessee and missed the rest of the season . . . Was granted a medical redshirt . . . Prior to the injury, had rushed for 325 yards and six touchdowns on 45 attempts . . . Started all 11 games at right cornerback his sophomore season of 1994 and recorded four interceptions . . . Majored in consumer economics.

PERSONAL

Has a fiancée, Tracy Henderson, with a daughter, Journee Monae . . . Tracy played basketball at the University of Georgia and currently plays for the Cleveland Rockers of the WNBA . . . Played running back and defensive back at Washington County High in Sandersville, Ga., and was voted the Georgia Class AA Defensive Player of the Year by the Atlanta Journal-Constitution . . . Earned all-state and all-county honors after gaining 1,661 all-purpose yards and 14 touchdowns as a running back, while recording 145 tackles, including eight sacks and eight interceptions as a defensive back during his senior year . . . Also blocked three punts, three PATs and three field-goal attempts during his final campaign, while leading the team to a 14-1 record and the Class AA State Championship game . . . Is the oldest of four children . . . Younger brother, Terrence, was a senior wide receiver at the University of Georgia last year and finished as the school's all-time leading receiver . . . Terrence signed with Atlanta as an undrafted free agent this offseason . . . Has assisted in building houses for Habitat for Humanity . . . Participated in the Miami Dolphins Fishing Tournament benefiting the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation . . . Full name is Robert Lee Edwards III, born October 2, 1974 in Tennesse, Ga.

DETROIT (SEPT. 8): Completed 18 of 27 passes for 207 yards with three touchdowns and no interceptions in season-opening 49-21 win over the Lions, the Dolphins' 11th straight victory on opening day . . . Three scores tied a personal high that he achieved on three previous occasions, most recently on December 10, 2001 against Indianapolis . . . Compiled a season-best passer rating of 126.6 . . .

AT INDIANAPOLIS (SEPT. 15): Hit on 13 of 18 passes for 187 yards with two touchdowns and one interception . . . Put together a passer rating of 119.4, his second-best figure of the year . . . Fiedler led the Dolphins on an 80-yard scoring march which resulted in his two-yard TD run with five seconds to play . . . On the game-winning drive, Fiedler completed five of seven passes for 70 yards, including a nine-yard completion to Detric Ward on fourth-and-three from the Raiders' 18 . . . In addition, Fiedler also scored on a two-yard run with 16 seconds to play in the first half, as he became just the third quarterback in Dolphins history to rush for two touchdowns in the same game, joining David Woodley (at Rams, 11/9/80) and Kyle Mackey (at N.Y. AT N.Y. JETS (OCT. 14): Hit on 23 of 34 passes for 213 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions, marking his second-highest completion total of the season, and tying for the

third-highest attempt figure . . . Also rushed for 27 yards on two attempts, including a season-long 26-yard run . . .

AT SEATTLE (OCT. 28): Was 15 of 21 for 213 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions . . . Completion percentage of 71.4 was a season-high . . . Completed all four of his pass attempts, totaling 73 yards, including the touchdown, in the fourth quarter . . . Was six of seven for 128 yards with one TD in the second half . . . It marked his second fourth-quarter comeback win of the season, the third of his career during the regular season and fourth overall, including playoffs . . . Also led the team in rushing that day with a season-high 41 yards on eight carries . . . With the Dolphins facing a third-and-13 from their own 17 with 1:44 to play, had a key 16-yard run which produced a first down and allowed the Dolphins to run out the clock . . .

VS. CAROLINA (NOV. 4): Connected on 20 of 33 passes for 287 yards with one touchdown and one interception in the Dolphins' 23-6 victory . . . His 20 completions went to eight different receivers . . . Was awarded a game ball on offense . . .

AT INDIANAPOLIS (NOV. 11): Hit on 17 of 29 passes for 259 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions . . . Both TD passes went to rookie WR Chris Chambers, from 74 and 29 yards out . . . It marked the fifth multiple touchdown game of his career (sixth including playoffs) . . . The 74-yard completion was the longest of his career and was the longest by a Dolphin since Dan Marino hit FB Stanley Pritchett for a 74-yard scoring pass on September 15, 1996 against the N.Y. Jets at Pro Player Stadium . . . His second TD strike was a 29-yarder to Chambers with 7:44 to play in the game, and gave the Dolphins a 27-24 lead as they went on to win by that same score . . . It marked the third fourth-quarter comeback win that Fiedler had led in 2001, the fourth of his career during the regular season, and fifth overall, including playoffs . . .

VS. N.Y. JETS (NOV. 18): Was 24 of 36 for 188 yards with no touchdowns and two interceptions in the Dolphins' 24-0 loss . . . Both interceptions were returned for touchdowns — a 60-yarder by Aaron Glenn and a 63-yard return by Victor Green . . . It was the first time that an opponent had two interception returns for touchdowns against the Dolphins since October 17, 1999 at New England when Andy Katzenmoyer picked off a Dan Marino pass and went 57 yards for a touchdown, and Ty Law intercepted a Damon Huard attempt and took it 27 yards for a score . . .

AT BUFFALO (NOV. 25): Completed 18 of 31 passes for 260 yards with three touchdowns and no interceptions . . . Also rushed for 28 yards on four carries . . . Three touchdown passes tied a career-high that he first set on December 3, 2000, also at Buffalo . . . It marked the sixth multiple touchdown game of his career (seventh including playoffs) . . . All three occurred in the fourth quarter as the Dolphins entered the period trailing 21-10 . . . First one came four seconds into the quarter on an eight-yard pass to TE Jed Weaver, closing the Bills' lead to 21-17 . . . After Buffalo took a 27-17 lead at the 8:16 mark, Fiedler came back to hit Chris Chambers for a 22-yard scoring strike with 4:07 to play, making it a 27-24 game . . . After the Dolphins tied the game on an Olindo Mare 39-yard field goal with 1:11 remaining, the Dolphins recovered a fumble on the ensuing kickoff at the Bills' 42, and three plays later, Fiedler found Chambers in the end zone for a 32-yard TD pass . . . Overall in the fourth quarter, Fiedler completed 8 of 12 passes for 123 yards and three touchdowns . . . It marked the fourth-quarter comeback win that Fiedler had led in 2001, the fifth of his career during the regular season, and sixth overall, including playoffs . . .

VS. DENVER (DEC. 2): Led the Dolphins to a 21-10 come-from-behind victory by completing 18 of 28 passes for 176 yards with one touchdown and no interceptions . . . Lone TD of the game came on an 11-yard pass to Chris Chambers, 1:15 into the fourth quarter, closing the Broncos' lead to 10-7 . . . It marked the fifth fourth-quarter comeback win that Fiedler had led in 2001, the sixth of his career during the regular season, and seventh overall, including playoffs . . .

VS. INDIANAPOLIS (DEC. 10): Was 18 of 26 for 191 yards with three touchdowns and no interceptions in Miami's 41-6 Monday night win . . . The win marked his 20th win as a starter in 28 total starts, as he became the sixth fastest quarterback to reach 20 wins as a starter since 1980 . . . The three touchdown passes tied a career-high that he had set on two previous occasions, including once in 2001 (at Buffalo, 11/25) . . . It marked the seventh multiple touchdown game of his career (eighth including playoffs) . . . Tossed a pair of scoring strikes to rookie WR Chris Chambers for the third time in 2001 and the second time against the Colts . . . Also had a nine-yard touchdown run in the game, his third scoring run of the year, tying him with David Woodley (1980) for the second-highest single-season rushing touchdown total by a Dolphins quarterback . . . In addition, QB Ray Lucas had a two-yard TD run in the Colts game, marking the first time in Dolphins history that two quarterbacks had a rushing touchdown in the same game . . .

AT SAN FRANCISCO (DEC. 16): Completed 16 of 28 passes for 149 yards with no touchdowns and three interceptions in the Dolphins' 21-0 loss . . . Led team in rushing with 33 yards on four carries, including a long run of 21 yards, his second-longest of the season . . .

When Zack Bronson intercepted a Fiedler pass attempt on the Dolphins' first offensive series of the game, it snapped a string of 95 straight pass attempts that he had not thrown an interception, a span which included three full games . . .

AT NEW ENGLAND (DEC. 22): Hit on 21 of 37 attempts for 320 yards with one touchdown and no interceptions . . . Yardage total is the highest of his career, surpassing his previous best of 317 yards, which he accounted for as a member of the Jacksonville Jaguars on January 2, 2000 against Cincinnati . . . It also marked the second 300-yard passing game of his career . . . With the Dolphins, it was the 11th time that he had attempted a pass in a game and not been intercepted . . . Of those 11 occasions, it was the first time that the Dolphins had lost . . .

VS. ATLANTA (DEC. 30): Was 16 of 29 for 191 yards with two touchdowns and one interception . . . Nine-yard completion to Travis Minor in the second quarter put him over the 3,000-yard passing mark for the season, just the second Dolphin (Dan Marino) to achieve that feat . . .

VS. BUFFALO (JAN.6): Completed nine of 16 passes for 110 yards with one touchdown and no interceptions . . . His TD pass came on a 16-yard strike to James McKnight and was Fiedler's 20th of the season, as he joined Dan Marino (13 times) and Bob Griese (twice) as the only quarterbacks in Dolphins history to throw 20 or more TD passes in a season . . . With the Dolphins, it was the 12th time that he had attempted a pass in a game and not been intercepted, with the team improving its record to 11-1 in such contests . . . Also rushed for 24 yards and one touchdown on seven carries, including an 18-yard TD run, his fourth rushing touchdown of the season, tying him with David Woodley (1981) for the most rushing touchdowns by a Dolphins quarterback in a season . . .

PLAYOFFS: Was 15 of 28 for 122 yards with no touchdowns and one interception in First-Round Playoff loss to Baltimore (1/13/02) . . . Led team with 16 yards rushing on three carries.

2000 – Signed a three-year contract with the Dolphins as an Unrestricted Free Agent from Jacksonville on February 17, 2000 . . . Started all 15 games in which he played . . . Finished the year by completing 204 of 357 passes for 2,402 yards with 14 touchdowns and 14 interceptions . . . Also was second on the squad in rushing with 267 yards and one touchdown on 54 attempts . . . His yardage total was the second-highest figure ever for a Dolphins quarterback in a season at the time (now third) . . . Fiedler was inactive for one game in 2000, on November 26 at Indianapolis due to a pinched nerve in his neck sustained the previous week against the N.Y. Jets (11/19) . . . Went 10-5 as a starter in the 2000 regular season . . . Missed each of the first three preseason games due to a hip injury . . . Underwent arthroscopic surgery to repair a labral tear in his right hip on August 3, 2000 . . . The surgery was performed by Dr. Marc Philippon at Holy Cross Hospital in Fort Lauderdale . . . Also underwent surgery following the season, on January 12, 2001, to repair an extensive tear of his left rotator cuff . . . The surgery was performed at the Hospital for Special Surgery in New York by Dr. Steven O'Brien . . .

CONSECUTIVE GAMES WITHOUT AN INTERCEPTION: Fiedler went 92 straight pass attempts, covering a five-game span (games 8-11 and 13), along with part of a sixth (14) without throwing an interception . . . The streak began on October 29 against Green Bay and ended on December 10 against Tampa Bay when Bucs LB Jamie Duncan picked off a Fiedler pass and returned it 31 yards for a touchdown (The streak counts a November 19 game against the Jets when Fiedler was forced from the game following the first play from scrimmage with an injury) . . . Those five full games established a new Dolphins record and broke the previous mark of four, formerly held by Bob Griese (games 5-8 in 1971) and Dan Marino (games 4-7 in 1997) . . .

GAME HIGHLIGHTS – VS. SEATTLE (SEPT. 3): Made his Dolphins debut in a starting role and led the Dolphins to a 23-0 victory . . . Completed 15 of 24 passes for 134 yards with one touchdown and no interceptions . . . Became the first Dolphin other than Dan Marino to start a season-opener at quarterback since David Woodley in 1983 . . . Also became the first Ivy League graduate to start a season-opener at quarterback since Columbia's Marty Domres opened for Baltimore in the 1974 opener, on September 15 at Pittsburgh . . . Fiedler's touchdown pass in the Seahawks game, his first as a Dolphin, was a 16-yard strike to Oronde Gadsden . . .

VS. BALTIMORE (SEPT. 17): Completed 11 of 16 passes for 160 yards with one touchdown and one interception . . . Hit on all seven of his attempts, totaling 121 yards, with a touchdown in the second half of the contest . . .

AT CINCINNATI (OCT. 1): Was 14 of 21 for 155 yards with two touchdowns and one interception . . . Both of his touchdown passes went to Oronde Gadsden (7 and 21 yards) . . . It represented the first multiple-touchdown game of his career in the regular season and his second overall, including playoffs . . . Also rushed for a season-high 45 yards on four carries, including a career-long 30-yard run, which was the longest by a Dolphins quarterback since Scott Mitchell had a 32-yard run on November 14, 1993 at Philadelphia . . .

VS. GREEN BAY (OCT. 29): Completed 16 of 25 passes for 158 yards with one touchdown and no interceptions . . . Game began a streak of five straight games and 92 pass attempts in

which he did not throw an interception . . . Also rushed for six yards on five carries, including a one-yard TD run, which marked the first rushing TD of his career and the first rushing TD by a Dolphins quarterback since December 27, 1998 when Dan Marino scored on a three-yard run at Atlanta . . .

AT DETROIT (NOV. 5): Connected on 13 of 18 passes for 112 yards, as he put together a season-best 72.2 percent completion mark . . . Also rushed for 42 yards on eight carries . . .

AT SAN DIEGO (NOV. 12): Completed 13 of 20 passes for 160 yards, including a 61-yard strike to Oronde Gadsden, marking his longest completion of the season . . .

VS. N.Y. JETS (NOV. 19): Was forced from the game permanently following the first play from scrimmage when he was sacked by Jets LB Mo Lewis and suffered a pinched nerve in his neck with resultant symptoms in his right arm as well as a mild right A/C sprain . . .

AT BUFFALO (DEC. 3): Was 13 of 21 for 214 yards and a career-high three touchdowns in leading the Dolphins to their first win in Buffalo since 1996 after missing the previous week at Indianapolis (11/26) . . . Set a new team record by not throwing an interception in his fifth straight game . . .

VS. TAMPA BAY (DEC. 10): In a game that was played in a steady rain, was 13 of 28 for 175 yards with no touchdowns and a career-high four interceptions . . . His first interception of the game was snared by Bucs linebacker Jamie Duncan in the first quarter and returned 31 yards for a touchdown . . . It ended a string of 92 straight pass attempts and five consecutive games in which Fiedler did not throw an interception . . . Sustained a left shoulder injury in the contest that he played with for the remainder of the year . . .

AT NEW ENGLAND (DEC. 24): Led the Dolphins to their first AFC East title since 1994 by completing 30 of 45 passes for a season-high 264 yards with one touchdown and no interceptions . . . Completion and attempt totals marked career-highs . . . Dolphins trailed 24-17 in the fourth quarter before Fiedler led two consecutive scoring drives in the final period, including one that ended with an Olindo Mare 49-yard field goal with nine seconds to play . . . On those two drives, Fiedler completed 11 of 14 passes for 100 yards . . .

PLAYOFFS: Started both playoff games following the 2000 season . . . Completed 37 of 71 passes for 361 yards with one touchdown and six interceptions . . . In First-Round victory over Indianapolis (12/30), hit on 19 of 34 passes for 185 yards with one touchdown and three interceptions . . . Also rushed for 43 yards on seven carries . . . Lone touchdown pass in the game was a nine-yard strike to Jed Weaver on third-and-goal with 34 seconds to play in regulation, as the Dolphins tied the game at 17 apiece before going on to record a 23-17 overtime victory . . . In the fourth quarter and overtime of that game, Fiedler was 10 of 16 for 106 yards with one touchdown and no interceptions, while also rushing for 27 yards on four attempts . . . In the Colts game, became the first Ivy League quarterback to start an NFL playoff game since the Rams' Jeff Kemp started against the N.Y. Giants in a Wild Card game on December 23, 1984 . . . Was 18 of 37 for 176 yards with no touchdowns and three interceptions in Divisional contest at Oakland (1/6/01) . . . The three interceptions tied the club's single-game postseason record, also held by David Woodley and Dan Marino.

1999 – Signed with Jacksonville as a free agent on April 16, 1999, four days after Minnesota withdrew their qualifying offer as a Restricted Free Agent . . . Appeared in seven regular season games with the Jaguars in 1999, including one start . . . Completed 61 of 94 passes (64.9%) for 656 yards with two touchdowns, two interceptions and a passer rating of 83.5 . . . Entered game vs. Cleveland (10/17) in third quarter after starter Mark Brunell sustained a rib injury . . . With Jaguars trailing 7-6 at the time, led the team to 17 points over the final three possessions of the game . . . Finished by completing 12 of 14 passes for 113 yards with one touchdown and no interceptions . . . First NFL touchdown pass came on an eight-yard completion to tight end Kyle Brady, which gave Jacksonville a 13-7 lead with 1:47 left in the third quarter . . . Also carried the ball three times for 27 yards in the Browns contest . . . Played the entire second half in Jacksonville's next game, two weeks later at Cincinnati (10/31) . . . Hit on six of nine passes for 69 yards with no touchdowns and no interceptions, and a long of 23 yards to Jimmy Smith . . . Replaced an injured Brunell in second quarter at Tennessee (12/26) . . . 



2001 – Started all 14 games in which he played . . . Was inactive for two games with a hamstring injury . . . Caught 55 passes for 674 yards and three touchdowns . . . Reception total tied with James McKnight for the team-lead, while yardage figure ranked third . . . Marked the second consecutive season in which he led or shared the team-lead in receptions . . . Led team in receptions seven times during the course of the year, and in receiving yardage on five occasions . . . 

The Dolphins are 85-32 (.726) when a home game has been televised in the Miami area. When a road game has been televised in the city of the opposing team, Miami is 56-86 (.394).



THE ORANGE BOWL


The 1986 season marked the end of an era for the Miami Dolphins as the team played its final season in the Orange Bowl. In 21 years, the Dolphins posted a 110-38-3 (.738) regular-season record.

In the playoffs, Miami was 10-4 at the 75,206-seat Orange Bowl, giving the team a 120-43-3 (.736) mark in all games played there.

Miami played in the Orange Bowl from the team's initial season in 1966 through the 1986 campaign. From 1966 to 1969, the Orange Bowl had a grass playing field. The playing surface was changed to Poly-Turf in 1970, was replaced in 1972 and finally removed in March, 1976, so that Prescription Athletic Turf could be installed.

The Orange Bowl has been the site of many great sporting events, including five Super Bowls, the annual Orange Bowl Classic, Olympic soccer matches and championship boxing matches.

2002 GAME HIGHLIGHTS – AT SAN FRANCISCO (SEPT. 15): Had his most efficient outing of the season in the second week when he completed 14 of 19 passes (73.7%) for 119 yards with two touchdowns and no interceptions as he led the Broncos to a 24-14 win over the 49ers . . . Put together a season-high passer rating of 124.7, the third-highest figure of his career . . . In the process, moved past Frank Tripucka (1,277) into third on the Broncos' all-time list for pass attempts . . .

JETS (NOV. 5): Completed 22 of 35 passes for 327 yards with two touchdowns and an interception as he tied a franchise record (now tied for second) with his third straight 300-yard passing game, equaling the mark of John Elway, who did it twice (1993-94, 1996) . . . It was his fifth overall on the year, tying the club's single-season standard (Elway, 1995) . . . Both touchdowns went to Ed McCaffrey . . . On third down in the game, completed 13 of 16 passes (81.3%) for 225 yards and two touchdowns . . . VS. SAN FRANCISCO (DEC. 23): Returned to the starting lineup for season finale, but was only able to play part of the first series before leaving the game because of pain in his shoulder . . . Completed both of his pass attempts, totaling 14 yards, before leaving the game . . .

AT BALTIMORE (DEC. 31): Was inactive for First-Round Playoff game with the shoulder injury.

1999 – Played in 14 games, starting 13 . . . Completed 261 of 452 (57.7%) passes for 3,032 yards with 14 touchdowns, 14 interceptions and a long of 88 . . . Rushed 46 times for 138 yards and two touchdowns with a long of 23 . . . With 3,032 passing yards, became just the eighth quarterback in the NFL since 1970 to pass for more than 3,000 yards in his first year as a full-time starter . . . Due to a sore shoulder, missed two games and played in a reserve role in another . . . Was named the Broncos' starting quarterback on August 30 after completing 68 of 101 passes (67.3%) for 716 yards with six touchdowns, one interception and a passer rating of 103.4 in five preseason contests . . . Underwent surgery on his right shoulder following the season, on January 5, 2000 . . .

GAME HIGHLIGHTS – VS. MIAMI (SEPT. 13): Made first NFL start, in a Monday night contest . . . Completed 24 of 40 for 270 yards with three touchdowns, no interceptions and passer rating of 105.2 . . . First touchdown pass of his NFL career came on his sixth attempt of the season, a 61-yard strike to Ed McCaffrey . . . In fact, all three scoring tosses on the night went to McCaffrey (11.4 yards) . . .

AT OAKLAND (OCT. 10): Recorded first win as an NFL starter when he connected on 17 of 29 passes for 234 yards with one touchdown and an interception in a 16-13 decision . . . Directed the first fourth-quarter game-winning drive of his NFL career as he led the Broncos

on an 11-play, 63-yard drive that resulted in a Jason Elam 26-yard field goal with 10:18 remaining in the contest . . .

VS. GREEN BAY (OCT. 17): Connected on 19 of 31 (61.3%) for a season-high 363 yards with two touchdowns and an interception in a 31-10 triumph, marking his first back-to-back victories as an NFL starter . . . Compiled a season-best 110.0 passer rating . . . His yardage total was the 11th-highest single-game figure in Broncos history, and the most by a first-year starter . . . Had an 88-yard shovel pass to Byron Chamberlain in the game, the longest completion of his career, the longest non-scoring pass play in franchise history, and the seventh-longest overall . . . It also was the longest pass play in the AFC and tied for third in the NFL in 1999 . . . Also rushed for his first NFL touchdown in the contest, a two-yard run in the fourth quarter . . . For his performance, was named AFC Offensive Player of the Week, the first such honor of his NFL career . . .

AT NEW ENGLAND (OCT. 24): Was 25 of 38 for 316 yards with one touchdown, no interceptions and a passer rating of 100.3 . . . Had a rushing touchdown for the second week in a row when he scored from seven yards out . . . Became the first Broncos first-year starter to exceed the 300-yard passing mark in back-to-back games . . .

AT SAN DIEGO (NOV. 7): Dressed but did not play for the first of two straight games due to a sore shoulder . . .

VS. OAKLAND (NOV. 22): Returned to action in a reserve role in Monday night game . . . Entered the game in the fourth quarter and guided the Broncos to a 27-21 overtime victory as he completed six of 14 passes for 60 yards . . . With the Broncos trailing 18-15 entering the fourth quarter, led Denver to field goals on two of his three fourth-quarter drives, with the second coming on a Jason Elam 53-yard field goal with just seven seconds to play after the Raiders had taken a 21-18 lead one minute earlier . . . Broncos won the game on an Olandis Gary 24-yard TD run 2:40 into the overtime period . . .

VS. KANSAS CITY (DEC. 5): Returned to the starting lineup and completed 20 of 36 for 227 yards with no touchdowns and an interception . . .

AT DETROIT (DEC. 25): Was 22 of 30 for a season-high 73.3% completion mark in 17-7 victory.

1998 – Was designated the Broncos' third quarterback for 14 of the 16 games in his rookie season . . . Saw his first NFL action in week five vs. Philadelphia (10/4), as he replaced Bubby Brister in the fourth quarter . . . Went on to complete one of three passes for two yards with one interception, while also being credited with four rushing attempts for minus-4 yards . . . First NFL completion was good for two yards to RB Vaughn Hebron . . . Was active for the Broncos' Monday night game at Kansas City (11/16) as the backup to starter Bubby Brister, with John Elway being designated Denver's third QB because of strained rib cartilage . . . Was designated as the third quarterback for all three of Denver's postseason contests, including 34-19 win over Atlanta in Super Bowl XXXIII (1/31/99) at Pro Player Stadium . . . Played in all four games during the preseason and completed 27 of 50 passes (54.0%) for 372 yards with two touchdowns with one interception . . . Helped lead the Wolverines to their first national championship in 49 years as a senior in 1997, earning first-team All-Big 10 Conference honors . . . Directed the Wolverines to a 12-0 mark and a share of the national championship with Nebraska, as Michigan capped their season by defeating Washington State, 21-16, in the Rose Bowl, as Griese turned in an MVP performance by completing 18 of 30 passes for 251 yards with three touchdowns and an interception . . . Was a finalist for the Davey O'Brien Award and the recipient of the National Football Foundation & Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete Award . . . On the year, completed 193 of 307 passes (62.9%) for 2,293 yards with 17 touchdowns and only six interceptions, breaking the previous school single-season records of 189 completions and 296 passes, first set by Todd Collins in 1993 . . . Also lettered in basketball, where he averaged 10 points per game . . . Added another letter in golf . . . Father, Bob, played 14 years with the Dolphins (1967-80), helped the team to three Super Bowl appearances (1971-73 seasons) and two titles (1972-73), and was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1990 . . . Bob and Brian would become just the second father-son combination in team history, joining LB Rudy Barber (1968) and FB Kantroy Barber (1999) . . . During the 2002 season, opened "Judi's House" in Denver, which helps kids who have had a parent die cope and grieve with the situation . . . The house is a tribute to his mother, Judi, who died from cancer in 1988, when Brian was 12 . . . Holds an annual golf tournament in Michigan to benefit C.S. Motts Children's Hospital . . . The money raised goes to help kids attend sporting events, purchase wheelchairs and provide housing for the parents of some of the children . . . 2001 – Started all 16 games at strong safety . . . Led the team in interceptions (six) and fumble recoveries (five) . . . 

PRO CAREER

2002 – Was re-signed to a four-year contract on March 1, 2003 . . . Played in all 16 games for the first time in his career, starting 12 of them . . . Rushed for two yards on three carries . . . Finished fourth on the team with 34 receptions for 233 yards and three touchdowns . . . Reception total equaled a career-high that he first set in his rookie season of 1999 . . . Touchdown total matched the figure that he attained over his first three years in the league combined . . . Also proved to be a key lead blocker for Pro Bowl running back Ricky Williams, who led the NFL with a Dolphins single-season record 1,853 rushing yards . . . There have been eight individual 1,000-yard rushing seasons in Dolphins history, and Konrad has blocked for two of them, including the 2000 season when he started 14 games as Lamar Smith ran for 1,139 yards . . . In season-opener vs. Detroit (9/8), posted four receptions for a season-high 35 yards . . . The four catches are tied for the third-highest receiving total of his career, while the yardage figure was the third-highest total as well . . . Only catch the following week at Indianapolis (9/15) was a nine-yard TD reception from Jay Fiedler . . . The score gave the Dolphins a 14-0 lead in their 21-13 victory over the Colts . . . His receiving touchdown, along with Ricky Williams' ten-yard scoring catch from Fiedler, marked the first time two Dolphin running backs had at least one touchdown reception each in a game since December 12, 1988 vs. Cleveland, when Jim Jensen and Lorenzo Hampton both caught a touchdown pass from Dan Marino . . . Had four catches for 28 yards, including a six-yard scoring catch from Fiedler, at Kansas City (9/29) . . . Accounted for the Dolphins' lone touchdown at N.Y. Jets (11/10) on a four-yard grab from Ray Lucas . . . Collected a season-high five catches, totaling 27 yards, in Monday night win vs. Chicago (12/9) . . . Reception total that night led the team.

2001 – Played in 12 regular season games, starting nine of them . . . Was inactive for four contests . . . Rushed for 22 yards and a touchdown on five carries, and caught five passes for 52 yards and a score . . . Sustained a left ankle sprain vs. Oakland (9/23) and was inactive for each of the next two contests (at St. Louis, 9/30 and vs. New England, 10/7) . . . Had two receptions for 13 yards, including an five-yard TD catch from Jay Fiedler, vs. Carolina (11/4) . . . It marked the second touchdown of his career and his first since his NFL debut, when he caught a 12-yard TD pass from Dan Marino in the 1999 opener, on September 13 at Denver . . . At Syracuse, Rob was given the honor of wearing uniform No. 44 throughout his four-year career, the same jersey worn by former Syracuse and NFL running back greats Jim Brown, Ernie Davis and Floyd Little.

2000 – Started 14 of the 15 games in which he played . . . Was inactive for one contest . . . Rushed for 39 yards on 15 carries and caught 14 passes for 83 yards . . . Established himself as one of the better blocking fullbacks in the league in his first year as a full-time starter . . . Contributed to the resurgence of the Miami running game, which amassed 1,894 yards on the year, the most by a Dolphins team since 1984 . . . Also led the way for Lamar Smith, who rushed for 1,139 yards, the second-highest single-season total ever by a Dolphin at that time (now third) . . . Had numerous key blocks during the course of the year which helped spring Smith loose for 14 rushing touchdowns, also the second-highest single-season figure in club history at that time (now third) . . . Had a season-high 19 yards rushing on seven attempts in season-opener vs. Seattle (9/3) . . . Tallied a season-high two receptions on five occasions . . . Was inactive vs. Buffalo (10/8) with right knee and ankle sprains sustained the previous week at Cincinnati (10/1) . . . Johnson's touchdown run, it marked the first time in club history that two rookies scored in the initial game of the year . . . Along with a touchdown run by Karim Abdul-Jabbar in the Broncos contest, it marked the first time since September 3, 1995 vs. the N.Y. Jets that three Dolphin running backs scored in the same game (Bernie Parmalee, Irving Spikes, Keith Byars) . . . Was awarded an offensive game ball for his performance . . . Opened each of the first five contests of the season . . . Caught three passes for 48 yards, including a season-long reception of 25 yards, vs. Buffalo (10/4) . . . Was inactive vs. Philadelphia (10/24) . . . Closed out the season with ten catches for 68 yards, including a long of 18, at Washington (1/2/00) . . . His reception total in the Redskins game marked a new club rookie record, surpassing the previous mark of nine first set by Kirby on December 19, 1993 against Buffalo . . . It also tied for the third-most ever by a Dolphin in the regular season and tied for fourth-most overall, including playoffs . . . In addition, it tied for the most by a Dolphin in 1999 . . . 



PRO BOWL: Was an alternate for the AFC Pro Bowl squad, and made the team after teammate Patrick Surtain could not play because of a knee injury . . . One of seven Dolphins selected, the most by a Dolphins team since the 2000 season when they had seven representatives as well . . . For Madison, it was his fourth straight trip to the Pro Bowl . . . Along with LB Zach Thomas, they are the first Dolphins selected to four straight Pro Bowl squads since T Richmond Webb earned the honor seven times in a row, from 1990-96 . . . They became the first Dolphin defenders chosen to the Pro Bowl four consecutive times since LB John Offerdahl was voted five straight seasons (1986-90) . . . Recorded one of six interceptions on the day for the AFC as they came away with a 45-20 victory.

2001 – Started all 13 games in which he played at right cornerback . . . Was inactive for three contests . . . Along with Zach Thomas, served as a co-captain on defense . . . Finished the year with 30 total tackles (23 solo), two interceptions and 13 passes defended . . . Part of the No. 1 ranked pass defense in the NFL in 2001, one which yielded an average of only 176.8 yards a contest . . . Registered a season-high six tackles in opener at Tennessee (9/9), when he also came up with an interception . . . It marked the fourth interception of his career off Titans QB Steve McNair, his most off any quarterback, just ahead of Drew Bledsoe (3) and Peyton Manning (3) . . . Also was a second-team Associated Press All-Pro selection and a Pro Football Weekly All-AFC pick . . . Along with LB Zach Thomas, who was also chosen to his third straight Pro Bowl in 2001, they were the first Dolphins to be voted three years in-a-row or more since T Richmond Webb earned the honor seven consecutive times (1990-96) . . . Madison and Thomas became the first Dolphin defenders to be chosen three or more straight times since LB John Offerdahl (1986-90) . . . 2000 – Signed a seven-year contract extension through the 2007 season on June 21, 2000 . . . Started all 16 regular season games at right cornerback . . . Finished the year with 40 total tackles (38 solo) . . . Came up with five interceptions, 16 passes defended, two fumble recoveries and three forced fumbles . . . Scored one touchdown on the year via a fumble return . . . Key part of a defensive unit which ranked third in the AFC and fifth in the NFL in pass defense, allowing an average of only 181.3 passing yards a game . . . Also part of a defense that amassed an NFL-high 28 interceptions, tied for the fourth-highest single-season total in team history . . . Underwent surgery following the season, on February 13, 2001 . . . Had surgery to remove bone spurs from his right ankle . . . In addition, Madison was a first-team All-Pro choice by the Associated Press, Pro Football Weekly, The Sporting News, Football Digest and USA Today . . . Was a second-team All-Pro pick by College & Pro Football Newsweekly . . . Also was selected to the "All-Iron" team, as chosen by CBS analyst Phil Simms . . . Was the recipient of the Dolphins Jasper MVP by the Florida Sports Awards . . .

GAME HIGHLIGHTS: In season-opener vs. Seattle (9/3) came up with two interceptions as the Dolphins held the Seahawks to 72 net passing yards in a 23-0 victory . . . Returned one of the interceptions 34 yards, the third-longest return of his career . . . It marked the fifth multiple-interception game of his career . . . Recorded a season-high five tackles at Minnesota (9/10) when he also defended a pass and forced a fumble . . . Had three tackles, a pass defended and a fumble recovery vs. Buffalo (10/8) . . . Scooped up a Sammy Morris fumble and raced 20 yards into the end zone to give the Dolphins a 22-13 lead with 4:45 to play in the game . . . Notched interceptions in games at N.Y. Jets (10/23), at San Diego (11/12) and at Buffalo (12/3) . . . Had three tackles, a pass defended and a forced fumble at Detroit (11/5) . . . Forced fumble occurred when he stripped Lions RB Larry Foster of the ball at the Dolphins' 3, the ball rolled into the end zone and Dolphins CB Patrick Surtain recovered . . . Recorded four tackles, a fumble recovery and a forced fumble vs. Indianapolis (12/17) . . . Started both playoff games following the 2000 season at right cornerback . . . Was credited with eight tackles (6 solo) and a pass defended.

1999 – Started all 16 regular season games at right cornerback . . . Finished with 52 total tackles (43 solo) and a team-high seven interceptions for 164 yards, including a touchdown . . . Also tied for the team lead with 15 passes defended . . . Tackle total tied for ninth on the team . . . In a vote of his teammates, was voted as permanent co-captain on defense, along with linebacker Zach Thomas . . . Underwent arthroscopic surgery following the season, on February 10, 2000 to remove loose bodies from his left knee . . . The surgery was performed by Dr. Dan Kanell at Holy Cross Hospital in Fort Lauderdale . . .

INTERCEPTIONS: Tied for the NFL-lead in interceptions, along with Baltimore's Rod Woodson, Kansas City's James Hasty, Tampa Bay's Donnie Abraham and Philadelphia's Troy Vincent . . . Became the third Dolphin to lead or share the league lead in interceptions . . . Dick Westmoreland had an AFL-high ten in 1967 and Dick Anderson led the NFL with eight in 1973 . . . His seven interceptions are tied for the ninth-highest total by a Dolphin in a season, and he now owns two of the nine highest single-season interception totals in club history . . . Had two games of two or more interceptions in 1999 with three vs. Tennessee (11/7) and two vs. Arizona (9/19) . . . From 1998-99, Madison totaled 15 interceptions, the most by a Dolphin in consecutive seasons, surpassing the previous best of 14, achieved by both Dick Westmoreland (four in 1966, 10 in 1967) and Jake Scott (eight in 1974, six in 1975) . . .

POSTSEASON HONORS: Was selected as a starter to the AFC Pro Bowl squad, joining kicker Olindo Mare and linebacker Zach Thomas on the team . . . The three representatives marked Miami's most since the 1995 season when they had four selections . . . It was the first Pro Bowl of Madison's career . . . Overall, he became the fourth Dolphins defensive back to be named, joining Dick Anderson (1972-74), Jake Scott (1971-75), and Tim Foley (1979), and the first cornerback . . . In addition, Madison was a first-team All-Pro selection by the Associated Press, USA Today, Sports Illustrated, The Sporting News, Pro Football Weekly and Football Digest . . . He also was chosen as the NFL Alumni Association's Defensive Back of the Year . . . In a vote of the South Florida media and the fans, Madison was chosen as the team's Dan Marino MVP award winner for 1999 as well . . .

PLAYER OF THE WEEK: Was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week three times in 1999 . . . He was cited for his performances in wins vs. Arizona (9/19), at New England (10/17) and vs. Tennessee (11/7) . . . They were the first three AFC weekly honors of his NFL career . . . Since this award was first given out by the NFL in 1984, Madison was just the second player to win it three times in the same season, joining Cincinnati safety David Fulcher, who came away with the award three times in 1989 . . .

GAME HIGHLIGHTS: Had three tackles and two interceptions that he returned a total of 29 yards (15 and 14 yards) vs. Arizona (9/19) . . . It marked the third multiple-interception game of his career . . . Was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week his performance, the first such honor of his career . . . Was credited with four tackles at New England (10/17) when he held Patriots wide receiver Terry Glenn without a reception . . . That effort earned Madison his second AFC Defensive Player of the Week Award of the season . . . Had three tackles and three interceptions that he returned a total of 101 yards, including a career-long return of 42 yards, in 17-0 victory vs. Tennessee (11/7) . . . It was the fourth multiple-interception game of

his career and marked a new career-high, earning him his third AFC Defensive Player of the Week award of the year . . . His three interceptions tied for the second-most in a game in Dolphins history, a figure achieved seven previous times in the regular season, most recently by Louis Oliver on October 4, 1992 at Buffalo, and eight times overall, including playoffs . . . The three interceptions are surpassed only by the team-record of four, set by Dick Anderson on December 3, 1973 against Pittsburgh . . . Madison's 101 return yards currently is the fourth-highest single-game total in club history and the most since Oliver amassed a club-record 170 yards in that Bills contest in 1992 . . . Had a season-high eight tackles with an interception and two passes defended vs. New England (11/21) . . . Had three tackles and an interception that he returned 21 yards for a touchdown vs. Indianapolis (12/5) . . . It was the first touchdown of Madison's career and it was the 16th interception of his career, tying him with J.B. Brown for 11th on the Dolphins' all-time list . . . Started both playoff games following the 1999 season at right cornerback . . . Recorded seven tackles and two passes defended.

1998 – Emerged as one of the best young cornerbacks in the NFL in his first season as a starter . . . Opened all 16 regular season games and both playoff contests at right cornerback . . . Finished the regular season ranked fourth on the team with 59 total tackles . . . Led club with 23 passes defended . . . Tied for team lead, along with Terrell Buckley, and tied for second in the AFC and in the NFL with eight interceptions . . . Also notched one sack during the course of the year . . .

INTERCEPTIONS: Picked off eight passes in 1998 (114 yards in returns), seven more than his total from his rookie season of 1997 . . . In addition, along with Terrell Buckley's eight interceptions, the pair combined for 16 interceptions on the year, the highest figure by a tandem from the same team in the NFL in 1998 and also tied for the ninth highest in the NFL since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger:



In his career Mare is 154-179 (86.0%) of field goals from less than 50 yards . . . He also has made 76 of his last 80 field goal attempts from less than 40 yards away, dating back to 1998 . . . 2001 – Was re-signed to a six-year contract through the 2006 season on March 1, 2001 . . . Played in all 16 regular season games . . . Connected on 19 of 21 field goals and 39 of 40 PATs for a team-high 96 points . . . Conversion rate on field goals of .905 was the best in the NFL in 2001 and marked a new Dolphins single-season record . . . Of his 73 kickoffs on the year, 12 went for touchbacks, tied for the second-highest total in the AFC and in the NFL . . . Dolphins led the AFC and were fourth in the NFL as their opponents' average drive start was the 26.2 . . . Was a first-alternate for the AFC Pro Bowl squad . . .

2000 – Converted 28 of 31 field goals and 33 of 34 PATs for a team-leading 117 points in 2000 . . . Point total ranked fourth in the AFC and ninth in the NFL . . . 90.3% success rate on field

goals not only marked a new team single-season standard to that point (now second), but also was third-best in the AFC and fifth in the NFL . . . Of his 72 kickoffs, seven went for touchbacks . . . Also had three tackles on kickoff coverage . . .

SCORING: On December 10 against Tampa Bay at Pro Player Stadium, Mare went over the 100-point plateau for the season, marking the second straight year and third time in his NFL career that he attained this mark . . . He also became the first Dolphin to post consecutive 100-point seasons since Pete Stoyanovich had six in-a-row from 1990-95 . . . Garo Yepremian (3, 1971-73) is the only other Dolphin to have three or more 100 point seasons . . . Point total in 2000 is tied for the fifth-highest single-season point figure in club history, and Mare now owns three of the seven highest single-season point totals in franchise history:

FIELD GOALS: Mare's 28 field goals in 2000 were second in the AFC and tied for fifth in the NFL . . . In addition, it tied for the fourth-highest single-season total in Dolphins history . . . Mare now owns three of the six highest single-season field goal totals in club history:

CONSECUTIVE FIELD GOALS: After connecting on each of his first 11 attempts of the 2000 season, Mare missed wide left on a 44-yard attempt in the second quarter of a Monday night game at N.Y. Jets (10/23) . . . Following that miss, he went on to convert each of his next 16 attempts, ending with a 47-yard attempt that went wide right in the third quarter of the season finale at New England (12/24) . . . That streak of 16 straight successful field goals is tied for the second-longest streak in club history, along with Garo Yepremian . . . Mare holds the record with 19 consecutive successful field goals, a feat he achieved in 1999:

2000 POSTSEASON HONORS: Following the season, Mare was an All-Pro selection by USA Today . . .

2000 GAME HIGHLIGHTS: Recorded 13 points on 3-4 FGs and 4-4 PATs at N.Y. Jets (10/23) . . . Had two field goals of longer than 40 yards (42,44) . . . His 42-yarder was the 100th field goal of his career and qualified him among the NFL's all-time leaders in field goal accuracy . . . Registered a season-high 15 points on 4-4 FGs and 3-3 PATs at Buffalo (12/3) . . . Point total also tied for the second-highest output of his career . . . Four field goals marked a season-best and tied for the second-highest single-game total of his career, while also tying for the third-highest single-game total in club history . . . Scored nine points on 2-4 FGs and 3-3 PATs in season finale at New England (12/24) . . . Hit first attempt of the game, from 47 yards out, to extend his streak of successful field goals to 16, tied for the

second-longest in Dolphins history . . . Streak was snapped when he missed wide right on a 47-yard attempt in the third quarter, just his second miss of the season . . . Missed wide left on a 28-yard attempt in the fourth quarter, the shortest miss of his NFL career . . . With the scored tied at 24 apiece with nine seconds to play, came on to convert a season-long 49-yarder to give the Dolphins a 27-24 victory and the AFC East title . . . It was his first fourth quarter or overtime game-winning kick of the year and the sixth of his career . . . Of the six, it marked his longest . . . Hit on 1-2 FGs and 2-2 PATs in the playoffs following the 2000 season . . . Missed a 38-yarder and made good from 38 yards in First-Round victory vs. Indianapolis (12/30) . . . Did not have an attempt in Divisional contest at Oakland (1/6/01).

1999 – Had the most prolific season of any kicker in Dolphins history . . . Converted 39 of his 46 field goal attempts for a success rate of 84.8%, including a long kick of 54 yards . . . His 39 field goals and 84.8% accuracy mark both were team single-season records (accuracy mark now third) . . . Field goal total also represented a new NFL single-season record and were the most in the league in 1999. . . It was the third time that a Dolphin led or shared the NFL lead in field goals . . . Pete Stoyanovich twice tied with Chip Lohmiller for that distinction, with 31 in 1991 and 30 in 1992 . . . Overall on the year, hit on a career-high three field goals of 50 yards or longer . . . Connected on all 27 of his PATs, giving him 144 points for the season, establishing a new club single-season standard in that category as well . . . Point total was second-most in the NFL in 1999, one point shy of Indianapolis' Mike Vanderjagt, who had 145 . . . In addition 20 of his 84 kickoffs went for touchbacks, the second-most touchbacks in the NFL in 1999, trailing only Jacksonville's Steve Lindsey, who had 22 . . . Also recorded four tackles on special teams and punted once for 36 yards . . .

POINTS: Posted a Dolphins single-season record 144 points in 1999, eclipsing the old mark of 124, first set by Pete Stoyanovich in 1992. . . Mare notched a season-high 21 points on October 17 at New England . . . That total is the third-most in a game in Dolphins history and is the most by a kicker . . . It trails the team-record 24 accounted for by both Paul Warfield (vs. Detroit, 12/15/73) and Mark Ingram (at N.Y. Jets, 11/27/94) . . . In addition, his 144 points are tied for the seventh-most by an NFL player in a season without scoring a touchdown:

FIELD GOALS: In 1999, Mare broke the Dolphins and NFL single-season record for field goals with 39 . . . The club record had been held by Pete Stoyanovich, who kicked 31 in 1991 . . . The NFL mark had been held by John Kasay, who booted 37 with Carolina in 1996:

Mare's season-high for field goals came in the Dolphins' 31-30 victory at New England on October 17, when he converted all six of his attempts . . . His total of six made in that game is a Dolphins single-game record, surpassing the old mark of five, previously held by Garo Yepremian, who achieved the feat at Buffalo on September 26, 1971 . . . The six field goals are tied for the fourth-most in a game in NFL history:

In addition, four of his field goals in the Patriots game were from 40 yards or longer, tying the NFL record for the most field goals from that distance in a game in NFL annals, a mark which had last been achieved by Washington's Chip Lohmiller at Dallas on September 9, 1991 . . . The Patriots game was Mare's fourth straight with four or more field goals, setting a new NFL record and breaking the old mark of three, which had been held by Boston's Gino Cappelletti (1964), the Jets' Jim Turner (1968), Houston's Al Del Greco (1993) and Minnesota's Fuad Reveiz (1994) . . .

CONSECUTIVE FIELD GOALS: Starting with Miami's third game of 1999, on October 4 against Buffalo, through the their seventh contest, on October 31 at Oakland, Mare converted a club-record 19 straight field goals, eclipsing the previous team mark of 16, first set by Garo Yepremian in 1978 (games 8-16) . . . Mare's record streak started with a 30-yard field goal in the Bills contest and ended when a 46-yarder in the Raiders game missed wide right . . . He tied Yepremian's record of 16 with a 37-yard field goal against Philadelphia on October 24, and set the mark with a 54-yard field goal on his next attempt in the Eagles game . . . Mare also tied the club record for consecutive games with a field goal, when he accounted for a field goal in 20 consecutive games, starting with the Dolphins' seventh game of 1998, on October 25 against New England, through Miami's tenth game of 1999, on November 21 against New England . . . He tied the record first set by Yepremian, who achieved the feat from 1970-72 . . . Mare's streak ended on Thanksgiving Day at Dallas, on November 25, when he missed all three field goal attempts . . .

LONG FIELD GOALS: Including playoffs, Mare converted four field goals of 50 yards or longer in 1999 . . . His four field goals of 50 yards or longer is tied for the most ever by a Dolphins kicker from that distance in a season, along with Pete Stoyanovich, who did it in 1991 . . . Mare's 54-yard field goal on October 24, 1999 against Philadelphia is the longest of his career, is tied for the second-longest by a Dolphin in the regular season and tied for the third-longest overall, including playoffs . . . His 53-yarder the previous week at New England is tied for the second-longest of his career and tied for the fourth-longest by a Dolphin in the regular season, and fifth overall including playoffs . . .

PLAYER OF THE WEEK/MONTH: In 1999, Mare was selected as the AFC Special Teams Player of the Week on two occasions . . . He was cited for his performance in Miami's 31-30 victory over the Patriots in New England on October 17 . . . It was the first NFL weekly honor of his career and it marked the first time a Dolphins kicker had won such an award since Joe Nedney did it in week 16 of the 1996 season . . . He also was selected following Miami's 12-9 victory over San Diego on December 19 when his four field goals accounted for all of the Dolphins' points . . . In addition, Mare was named the AFC Special Teams Player of the Month for October during which time he posted 65 points on 20 of 21 field goals, including a long of 54 . . . During this five-game span, he accounted for at least three field goals in all five contests, including four in three outings . . . He is the first Dolphin ever to win AFC Special Teams Player of the Month honors . . .

POSTSEASON HONORS: Mare was voted to the first Pro Bowl of his career following the 1999 season . . . He joined fellow Dolphins, CB Sam Madison and LB Zach Thomas on the team . . . The three selections marked Miami's most since the 1995 season when the club had four players chosen . . . Mare became the second Dolphins kicker ever to be selected, joining Garo Yepremian, who was a member of the AFC squad in 1978 . . . In addition, he became only the third Dolphins special teams player (now four) to be selected, along with P Reggie Roby, who made the AFC team in 1984 and 1989 . . . Mare was named a first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press, USA Today, The Sporting News, Football Digest, Pro Football Weekly, and College & Pro Football Newsweekly . . . Mare also was named the NFL Alumni Association's Special Teams Player of the Year for 1999 . . .

GAME HIGHLIGHTS – VS. ARIZONA (SEPT. 19): Scored 13 points by converting four of his five field goals and his only PAT . . . Hit on field goals of 39, 51, 48 and 44 yards . . . Missed from 42 yards away . . . His four field goals are tied for the second-highest total of his career and are tied for the third-most ever by a Dolphin in a game . . . The 51-yarder was a career-

long at the time and now is the fifth-longest of his career . . . It was the first time in Mare's career that he converted three field goals of 40 yards or longer in a game . . .

VS. BUFFALO (OCT. 4): Notched 12 points as he connected on all four of his field goal attempts, from 30, 44, 26 and 26 yards away . . . The four field goals matched his single-game career-high at the time and now is tied for the second-best of his career and the third-most by a Dolphin . . .

AT INDIANAPOLIS (OCT. 10): Had his third straight game with four or more field goals, tying the NFL record also held by Boston's Gino Cappelletti (1964), the Jets' Jim Turner (1968), Houston's Al Del Greco (1993) and Minnesota's Fuad Reveiz (1994) . . . Hit field goals from 37, 27, 21 and 43 yards out, and accounted for 14 points on the day . . . His 43-yarder with 3:20 to play brought the Dolphins to within six points of the lead at 31-25, as Miami went on for a 34-31 victory . . .

AT NEW ENGLAND (OCT. 17): Posted a career-high 19 points on 6-6 field goals and 1-1 PATs . . . Connected from 20, 33, 45, 45, 41 and 53 yards out . . . His point total is the most-ever by a Dolphins kicker in a game, and is third-most overall, trailing only the 24 points accounted for by both Paul Warfield (vs. Detroit, 12/15/73) and Mark Ingram (vs. N.Y. Jets, 11/27/94) . . . His six field goals marked a new Dolphins single-game record, surpassing the old standard of five, first set by Garo Yepremian on September 26, 1971 at Buffalo . . . It also tied for the fourth-highest single-game total in NFL history, trailing only the seven accounted for by three different players . . . It was the fourth consecutive contest in which Mare converted four or more field goals, establishing a new NFL record . . . His 53-yard field goal is tied for the second-longest of his career, is the tied for the fourth-longest in club history during the regular season, and tied for fifth overall, including playoffs . . . In addition, that 53-yard kick came with 2:45 to play and brought the Dolphins to within five points of the lead at 30-25, as they went on for a 31-30 victory . . . It was the first time in Mare's career that he connected on four field goals of 40 yards or longer, and the second time that he hit three or more from that distance . . .

VS. PHILADELPHIA (OCT. 24): Registered ten points on 3-3 field goals, as he made good from 37, 37 and 54 yards out . . . His final field goal in that game was a career-long 54-yarder, tying for the second-longest in Dolphins history during the regular season, and tied for third overall, including playoffs . . . In addition, it was the second-longest field goal in the NFL in 1999, trailing only a 55-yarder by Denver's Jason Elam . . . The 54-yarder also was his 17th consecutive successful field goal, establishing a new Dolphins record previously held by Garo Yepremian, who connected on 16 straight in 1978 (games 8-16) . . .

AT OAKLAND (OCT. 31): Scored ten points by hitting on 3-4 field goals and 1-1 PATs . . . Field goals came from 21, 34 and 44 yards away . . . Missed wide right on his third attempt of the game, a 46-yarder, snapping a string of 19 straight successful field goals, a new Dolphins record . . .

VS. NEW ENGLAND (NOV. 21): Converted both field goal attempts (19 and 23 yards) and all three PATs . . . It marked the 20th straight game dating back to 1998 that Mare had accounted for a field goal, tying Garo Yepremian's club record . . .

VS. INDIANAPOLIS (DEC. 5): Posted ten points on 2-2 field goals and 4-4 PATs . . . His second field goal in the game, a 32-yarder with 36 seconds to play, was his 31st of the season, tying Pete Stoyanovich's club single-season record that Stoyanovich had set in 1991 . . . The field goal also tied the game at 34-34, although the Colts went on for a 37-34 victory with a field goal on the last play of regulation . . .

AT N.Y. JETS (DEC. 12): Recorded eight points on 2-2 field goals and 2-2 PATs . . . Connected on field goals of 24 and 33 yards out . . . His first field goal of the game, a 24-yarder with 2:48 to play in the first quarter, was his 32nd of the season, breaking Pete Stoyanovich's club single-season field goal record of 31, which Stoyanovich had set in 1991 . . .

VS. SAN DIEGO (DEC. 19): Amassed 12 points on 4-4 field goals, as he hit from 32, 21, 30 and 31 yards out . . . His 30-yard field goal with 6:06 remaining in the game tied the game at 9-9, while his 31-yarder with 3:22 left provided the Dolphins with the winning margin in a 12-9 victory . . . It was Mare's first game-winning kick of the season and the fifth of his career . . . The 31-yarder also was his 37th field goal of the year, tying the NFL single-season record for field goals, which was first set by Carolina's John Kasay in 1996 . . . Mare's first field goal of the game, a 32-yarder in the first quarter, gave him 124 points on the season, tying Pete Stoyanovich's club record for most in a season (1992) . . . His second field goal of the game, a 21-yarder in the second quarter, broke Stoyanovich's record . . .

VS. N.Y. JETS (DEC. 27): Was 1-2 on field goals and 4-4 PATs, for a total of seven points . . . His 37-yard field goal was his 38th of the season, eclipsing John Kasay's NFL single-season record of 37 field goals that Kasay set in 1996 . . .

PLAYOFFS: Appeared in both playoff games following the 1999 season . . . Registered nine points on 2-2 field goals and 3-3 PATs . . . Both field goals came in First-Round victory at Seattle (1/9), from 32 and 50 yards out . . . Two field goals are tied for the third-most ever by

a Dolphin in a playoff game . . . The 50-yard field goal is the fourth-longest in Dolphins postseason history and was the longest by a Dolphin in the playoffs since Pete Stoyanovich hit a 51-yarder in the AFC Championship game on January 17, 1993 against Buffalo.

1998 – Played in all 16 regular season games and both playoff contests . . . Turned in an excellent sophomore season by converting 33 of his 34 PATs and 22 of his 27 field goals, including a long kick of 48 . . . Led the Dolphins and tied for tenth in the AFC in scoring with 99 points . . . Also punted three times for a 38.3-yard average with a long of 43 on the year . . . Accounted for two successful inside kicks on the season . . . Went through a stretch of seven games (7-13) where he connected on 14 consecutive field goals . . . On the year, 13 of his 72 kickoffs went for touchbacks, placing him in a tie for third in the AFC for touchbacks . . . Also registered four special teams tackles during the course of the season . . .

GAME HIGHLIGHTS: Notched seven points in Miami's 13-7 win vs. Buffalo (9/13) when he connected on both field goals (33 and 27 yards) and his only PAT . . . Hit his only field goal attempt at N.Y. Jets (10/4), from 46 yards out, marking his third-longest field goal of the season . . . Punted three times for 115 yards, a 38.3-yard average with a long of 43 in Monday night game at Jacksonville after punter Klaus Wilmsmeyer sustained a right groin strain . . . Hit on all four of his field goals vs. New England (10/25) . . . Those four field goals started a string in which he converted 14 consecutive field goals . . . In fact, accounted for all 12 of Miami's points in the club's 12-9 overtime victory . . . First field goal in that game was from 48 yards out, his longest of the season . . . Connected on a 25-yarder with 49 seconds left in regulation, tying the game at nine and sending it into overtime . . . Hit a 43-yard field goal 4:36 into the overtime period to give the Dolphins a 12-9 victory . . . It marked the fourth game-winning field goal of his career and his second in overtime . . . Was awarded a special teams game ball for his performance in the Patriots game . . . Connected on two of four field goals at Oakland (12/6) . . . Hit his first attempt of the game, a 25-yarder with 3:36 to play in the first quarter, extending his consecutive field goal streak to 14, two shy of Garo Yepremian's club record of 16 straight, which was established in 1978 . . . Missed wide right on a 46-yard attempt in the second quarter to end the streak at 14 . . . Had a successful inside kick in games vs. N.Y. Jets (12/13) and at Atlanta (12/27) . . . Appeared in both playoff games following the 1998 season . . . Connected on his only PAT and four of his five field goal attempts with a long of 40 . . . In First-Round victory over Buffalo (1/2/99), posted ten points on 1-1 PATs and 3-4 FGs . . . Three successful field goals tied a Dolphins playoff record also held by Uwe von Schamann, who kicked three field goals in Super Bowl XIX against San Francisco on January 20, 1985 . . . In the Bills game, he hit from 31, 40 and 23 yards out, while his miss was from 28 yards.

1997 – Played in all 16 games as a first-year player . . . Led the Dolphins in scoring with 117 points . . . Was 28 of 36 on field goal attempts and 33 of 33 on PATs . . . On the year, 21 of his 78 kickoffs went for touchbacks, the second-most touchbacks by a kicker in the AFC and tied for fourth in the NFL . . . Strong leg on kickoffs helped the Dolphins achieve a 23.9 for their opponents' average drive start, tied for first in the AFC and sixth in the NFL . . . Point total tied for fourth in the AFC and was tied for the fourth-highest single season scoring total ever by a Dolphin (now tied for fifth) . . . Mare's point total was the most ever by a Dolphins rookie or first-year player . . . In addition, Mare's 28 field goals was the highest single-season total for a rookie or first-year player in club history, surpassing the former mark of 22, achieved by Fuad Reveiz in 1985 . . . Mare's 28 field goals tied with Garo Yepremian (1971) for the third-highest single-season total in franchise history to that point (now fourth):

GAME HIGHLIGHTS: Made his NFL debut in season opener vs. Indianapolis (8/31) and scored ten points, going three of three in field goals and hitting on his only PAT . . . Field goals were from 23, 34 and 19 yards out . . . Was called upon for punting duties after John Kidd sustained a right hamstring injury after his first punt of the game . . . Came on and punted five times for a 47.0-yard average with a long of 53 . . . Two of his punts were downed inside the

five yard line . . . It marked the first time that a non-punter punted for the Dolphins since September 14, 1992 against Cleveland, when Pete Stoyanovich punted twice for 90 yards, replacing an injured Reggie Roby (knee) . . . The following week against Tennessee, scored ten points on three of four field goals, making good from 23, 22 and 29 yards out, and missing from 25 yards . . . Converted his only PAT . . . 29-yard field goal came with 2:15 elapsed in overtime to give the Dolphins a 16-13 victory . . . Was four of four in field goals, converting from 24, 31, 22 and 34 yards at Green Bay (9/14) . . . Four field goals marked the most ever by a Dolphins rookie or first-year player, and tied with eight others for the second-most overall at the time . . . Was one of two in field goals and hit both PATs vs. Kansas City (10/5) . . . Lone field goal was a 26-yarder with 5:40 remaining in the game to break a 14-14 tie, as the Dolphins held on for the 17-14 triumph . . . Converted only field goal attempt - from 25 yards away - and was three of three in PATs in Miami's 27-24 loss at New England (11/23) . . . Dolphins almost came back from a 27-3 third-quarter deficit in part due to a pair of successful inside kicks by Mare in the fourth quarter . . . Had another inside kick that was recovered by the Dolphins, but it was nullified due to a penalty . . . Tied his season-high with four field goals vs. Detroit (12/7), converting from 19, 33, 21 and 42 yards . . . Point total of 15 in that game was a season-best . . . 42-yard kick as time expired snapped a 30-30 tie and gave the Dolphins a 33-30 victory before an ESPN Sunday night national audience . . . In season finale vs. New England (12/22), made good from 50 and 41 yards, while missing from 51 yards . . . Marked the first 50-yard field goal of his career, and the only time in 1997 he hit on two field goals of 40 yards or longer . . . Was the first time a Dolphin had kicked a field goal of 50 yards or longer since December 17, 1995, when Pete Stoyanovich kicked a 50-yarder at Buffalo . . . 

2001 – Re-signed with the Dolphins to a two-year contract on June 9, 2001 . . . Started all 15 games in which he played at free safety, was inactive for one . . . Finished third on the team with 97 total tackles (66 solo) . . . Snared a team-high five interceptions for 227 yards in returns and two touchdowns . . . All five INTs occurred over the final seven games of the season . . . Also defended seven passes, recovered a fumbled and forced two fumbles . . . Part of the NFL's top-ranked pass defense, one which yielded an average of 176.8 yards per contest . . . Returned 17 kickoffs for a 21.8-yard average with a long of 55 on the year as well . . . PLAYER OF THE WEEK: Was named the AFC Defensive Player of the Week for games played December 9-10, 2001 for his performance vs. Indianapolis on December 10 . . . It was Marion's first Player of the Week Award in his nine-year NFL career . . . He was the second Dolphin to earn Defensive Player of the Week accolades in 2001, joining linebacker Zach Thomas, who was cited following the Dolphins' 31-23 season-opening win at Tennessee on September 9 . . . Marion earned the AFC Defensive honor when he recorded ten tackles against the Colts and had two interceptions for 78 yards in returns, a fumble recovery and a forced fumble . . . He had three of the Dolphins' season-high four takeaways in that contest, and those three resulted in a total of 14 Dolphin points . . . First interception of the year came in season-opener vs. Seattle (9/3), when he picked off a Jon Kitna pass as the Dolphins recorded a 23-0 victory . . . Tallied ten tackles the following week at Minnesota (9/10), when he accounted for his second interception in as many games by snaring a Daunte Culpepper pass and returning it 14 yards . . . Topped the team's tackle chart with 11 stops in Monday night game at N.Y. Jets (10/23) . . . In that contest, also returned seven kickoffs for 193 yards, a 27.6 average . . . Tied for second on the team with 100 total tackles (66 solo), marking the third straight year and fourth time in the last five seasons that he attained the 100-tackle plateau . . . The most recent game in which the Dolphins had two runners surpass the 100-yard mark occurred on October 5, 1975 at Green Bay when Mercury Morris rushed for 125 yards on 31 attempts, while Don Nottingham ran for 102 yards and three touchdowns on 21 carries.

PRO CAREER

2002 – Along with QB Jay Fiedler, served as a co-captain on offense . . . Started all 16 games at center . . . Took part in every offensive snap in 12 of 16 contests . . . Missed just 14 plays over the course of the year . . . Part of a line that paved the way for a running game that was first in the AFC and second in the NFL, averaging 156.4 yards a contest . . . CAREER INTERCEPTIONS: Taylor has come up with three interceptions in his career, the second-highest figure ever by a Dolphin defensive lineman, trailing only Kim Bokamper's six career interceptions . . .

PLAYER OF THE WEEK/MONTH: Taylor was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week on two occasions in 2002 . . . He was cited for his performances in wins at Denver (10/13) and vs. Oakland (12/15) . . . They marked the first two Player of the Week awards in his career . . . He also became the first Dolphins defensive lineman to earn Defensive Player of the Week accolades during the regular season since the award was instituted in 1984 (Trace Armstrong did win the honor following a 1999 First-Round playoff game at Seattle) . . . With his two AFC Defensive Player of the Weeks awards in 2002, it marked the second straight year and the third time in the last four seasons that a Dolphin defender won AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors two or more times in the same season; cornerback Sam Madison earned the award on three occasions in 1999, while linebacker Zach Thomas won the award twice in 2001 . . . Taylor also was named AFC Defensive Player of the Month for both October and November . . . In three games in October, Taylor had 15 tackles, four sacks for 52 yards in losses, two forced fumbles and a pass defended . . . GAME HIGHLIGHTS - AT INDIANAPOLIS (SEPT. 15): Established a season-high with eight tackles . . .

VS. N.Y. JETS (SEPT. 22): Recorded four tackles including one sack . . . Added two passes defended, a forced fumble, and a fumble recovery . . .

VS. NEW ENGLAND (OCT. 6): Tied for second on the club with six tackles, including two sacks, as he tackled Patriots quarterback Tom Brady twice for a total of 22 yards in losses . . . 2000 – Started all 16 games at right defensive end . . . Registered a career-high 68 total tackles (46 solo), including a career-best 14.5 sacks for 92 yards lost . . . Also had an interception, four fumble recoveries, a forced fumble and five passes defended . . . Tackle total ranked sixth on the team and first among linemen . . . PRO BOWL: Was voted as a starter to the AFC Pro Bowl squad, the first such honor of his NFL career . . . Was one of seven Dolphins to be voted to the game, the most representatives from the Dolphins since the 1984 season . . . Was voted as a starter along with Armstrong, the first time that teammates have been chosen to start at defensive end in the Pro Bowl since the 1992 season (1993 Pro Bowl) when Philadelphia's Reggie White and Clyde Simmons were picked . . .

POSTSEASON HONORS: Following the season Taylor was selected as a first-team All-Pro by AP, Pro Football Weekly, The Sporting News and USA Today . . . Was a first-team All-AFC choice by Football News . . . Was a second-team All-Pro by College & Pro Football Newsweekly . . . Was named the Dolphins' Most Valuable Player in a vote of South Florida media and the fans . . . His sack of Akili Smith at Cincinnati (10/1/00) and subsequent forced fumble, fumble recovery and 29-yard touchdown return was voted as the Outstanding Defensive Play of the 2000 season in a vote of fans on NFL.com . . .

Also came up with six special teams tackles on the year . . . Sack total tied with Derrick Rodgers and Tim Bowens for second on the squad . . . GAME HIGHLIGHTS: Made his NFL debut in season-opener against Indianapolis (8/31) when he started at right defensive end . . . Tied for second on the team with a season-high ten total tackles . . . Included in that total was the first sack of his career, as he dropped QB Jim Harbaugh for an eight-yard loss . . . Tallied seven tackles, including an eight-yard sack of QB Neil O'Donnell, at N.Y. 

PRO CAREER

2002 – Signed a five-year contract extension through the 2008 season on March 28, 2003 . . . Started all 16 games at middle linebacker . . . Along with CB Sam Madison and DE Jason Taylor, was chosen as a tri-captain on defense in a vote of his teammates . . . Led the team in tackles for the sixth time in his seven seasons . . . Set a new career-high for tackles as he posted 195 total stops (124 solo), surpassing his previous best of 180, achieved in both 1996 and 2001 . . . It also marked the second-highest single-season total in franchise history, trailing only the 217 tackles that Steve Towle accumulated in 1976 . . . Represented the seventh time in his seven NFL seasons that he reached the 100-tackle plateau . . . Recorded double-digit tackle figures in a game 13 times during the course of the season, including a string of 11 in a row (4-14) . . . CAREER INTERCEPTIONS: Over the course of his seven-year career, Thomas has intercepted 12 passes, second all-time among Dolphins linebackers, trailing only Earnie Rhone, who had 14 . . . Of his 12 career interceptions, four have been returned for touchdowns: a 34-yard TD return of a Neil O'Donnell interception on September 9, 2001 at Tennessee; a one-yard return of a Donald Hollas interception on December 6, 1998 at Oakland; a 17-yard return of a Kordell Stewart pass on September 20, 1998 vs. Pittsburgh; and a 26-yard return of a Chris Chandler pass on November 17, 1996 at Houston . . . Thomas has four of the seven interception returns for touchdowns by a linebacker in club history, the other three being by Tom Erlandson (26 yards at Denver on December 4, 1966), A.J. Duhe (35 yards in the AFC Championship game against the N.Y. Jets on January 23, 1983) and Robert Jones (14 yards at Oakland on December 6, 1998). . . Thomas' four interception returns for scores is a Dolphins record, one ahead of Dick Anderson, who accounted for three . . . 2001 – Started all 15 games in which he played at middle linebacker . . . Tied a career-high (since surpassed) that he first set in his rookie season of 1996 with 180 total tackles (112 solo) . . . Added three sacks for 27 yards lost, two interceptions for 51 yards and a touchdown, two forced fumbles and six passes defended . . . Topped the team's tackle chart on 12 occasions during the course of the year . . . Along with CB Sam Madison, was chosen as a co-captain on defense in a vote of his teammates . . . In opener at Tennessee (9/9), led team with 12 tackles while also picking off a Neil O'Donnell pass and returning it 34 yards for a touchdown, the tenth interception of his career and his fourth for a touchdown, breaking the club's career mark which he had shared with Dick Anderson . . . He was the first Dolphins defender to win the award since S Brian Walker in Week 11 of 2000 (at San Diego, 11/12) . . .

POSTSEASON HONORS: Was chosen as a reserve for the AFC Pro Bowl squad, although he was not able to play . . . It marked his third consecutive selection, and along with CB Sam Madison, who also was picked, they became the first Dolphins to earn this honor three or more seasons in a row since T Richmond Webb went seven straight years (1990-96) . . . They were the first Dolphins defensive players to be picked three consecutive times since LB John Offerdahl was voted five straight times (1986-90) . . . Was named a second-team All-Pro by the Associated Press . . . Was named the team's MVP in a vote of South Florida media and fans . . . Named as the captain of the "All-Iron Team" as selected by CBS analyst Phil Simms . . . In addition, Thomas was honored with the first PFWA Dolphins Chapter "Good Guy" Award, which is presented annually to a player for his cooperation with the media.

Despite missing five full games with the injury, finished second on the team with 100 total tackles (64 solo) . . . Added 1.5 sacks, an interception, two passes defended and a fumble recovery . . . Led the team in tackles on six occasions and reached double-digit tackle totals four times during the course of the year . . . Recorded a game-high 11 tackles, including a half-sack, in season-opening shutout win over Seattle (9/3) . . .

Posted a team and season-high 12 stops two weeks later in 19-6 win over Baltimore (9/17) . . . Notched nine tackles and a fumble recovery in 10-3 victory over New England (9/24) before leaving the game early with a sprained right ankle . . . Returned to action in 22-13 win vs. Buffalo (10/8) and topped team's tackle chart with seven . . . Re-aggravated his sprained right ankle at N.Y. Jets (10/23) when he registered nine tackles . . . Was then inactive for each of the next four games: vs. Green Bay (10/29), at Detroit (11/5), at San Diego (11/12) and vs. N.Y. Jets (11/19) . . . Returned to the field for 17-14 win at Indianapolis (11/26) and led the team with ten stops . . . Was credited with seven tackles, including his only sack of the year, vs. Tampa Bay (12/10) . . . In season-ending win at New England (12/24), which clinched the AFC East title for the Dolphins, turned in a nine-tackle performance, which included his only interception of the year . . . That came with 3:44 to play in the game when he picked off a Drew Bledsoe pass, leading to the Dolphins' game-winning drive that culminated with an Olindo Mare field goal . . . The interception also was the ninth of his career, moving him past Nick Buoniconti, Larry Gordon and Bob Matheson into sole possession of second on the Dolphins' career list for interceptions among linebackers, trailing only Earnie Rhone (14) . . . Started both playoff games following the 2000 season at middle linebacker . . . Led the team in the postseason with 19 total tackles (14 solo), including 12 in Divisional contest at Oakland (1/6/01) . . .

PRO BOWL: Was selected by Raiders Coach Jon Gruden as the "need" player for the AFC Pro Bowl squad . . . It marked Thomas' second straight Pro Bowl selection, becoming the first Dolphins linebacker selected to play in the Pro Bowl in consecutive seasons since Bryan Cox from 1994-95 . . . In addition, Thomas was one of seven Dolphins to play in the Pro Bowl following the 2000 season, the most representatives by the team since they also had seven following the 1984 campaign . . .

1999 – Signed a new five-year contract through the 2003 season on February 12, 1999 . . . Started all 16 regular season games at middle linebacker for the second straight year and third time in his four NFL seasons . . . Led the team in tackles for the fourth consecutive campaign, as he tallied 167 total stops (117 solo), a figure which was the second-most of his NFL career to that point, now fourth . . . It also ranked as the fifth-highest in Dolphins history, now seventh . . . Was selected to the first Pro Bowl of his career, and started in the game . . . Thomas became the third Dolphin in team history to lead the club in tackles four or more straight seasons, joining Nick Buoniconti (1969-73) and Bryan Cox (1992-95) . . . In a vote of his teammates, was selected as a permanent co-captain on defense along with cornerback Sam Madison . . . Also had one sack, an interception, a forced fumble and a career-high 12 passes defended . . . Led the team in tackles 13 times during the course of the season and recorded double-digit tackle totals nine times . . . Led the Dolphins with 12 tackles, including his only sack of the season, in opener at Denver (9/13) . . . Tallied 12 stops the following week vs. Arizona (9/19) when he also intercepted a Jake Plummer pass and knocked down three passes . . . The interception was the eighth of Thomas' career, tying him for second all-time among Dolphins linebackers, along with Nick Buoniconti, Larry Gordon and Bob Matheson, and trailing only Earnie Rhone, who had 14 . . . Had 11 tackles, a pass defended and a forced fumble at Indianapolis (10/10) . . . The forced fumble occurred when he stripped the ball from Edgerrin James on first-and-goal from the one . . . Daryl Gardener picked up the loose ball and returned it 33 yards to the 35 . . . Had 14 tackles in consecutive weeks, vs. Tennessee (11/7) and at Buffalo (11/14) . . . Two weeks later, notched a season-high 16 stops on Thanksgiving Day at Dallas (11/25) . . . Registered 15 tackles vs. San Diego (12/19) . . . Started both playoff games following the 1999 season at middle linebacker . . . Led the team in the postseason with 19 total tackles (16 solo), including a sack and two passes defended . . . Had nine tackles and the first sack of his postseason career in First-Round victory at Seattle (1/9/00) . . .

POSTSEASON HONORS: Was voted to the first Pro Bowl of his career, and started in the game, joining fellow Dolphins cornerback Sam Madison and kicker Olindo Mare . . . The three selections marked the most by the Dolphins since the 1995 season when the team had four players chosen . . . He became the sixth Dolphins linebacker to be selected, and the first since Bryan Cox in 1995 . . . In addition, Thomas was a first-team All-Pro selection by the Associated Press . . . Also in a vote of his teammates, Thomas was the winner of the Dolphins Leadership Award for 1999, the first player in team history to win the award more than once.

1998 – Started all 16 regular season games at middle linebacker . . . Finished the year with 160 total tackles (124 solo), two sacks for 16 yards lost, three interceptions for 21 yards in

returns, including two for touchdowns, two forced fumbles and ten passes defended . . . Marked the third straight year in which he led the team in tackles, just the fourth Dolphin to achieve that feat and the first since Bryan Cox did it from 1992-95 . . . Tackle total was the seventh-highest single-season mark in club history (now tenth) . . . Led the Dolphins' tackle chart on ten occasions over the course of the season, including nine games with double-digit tackle marks . . . Was named the AFC Defensive Player of the Month for September when he totaled 37 tackles, a sack, an interception return for a touchdown and two passes defended, in helping Miami to a 3-0 record during the month . . . Led the team with 13 tackles in season-opening win at Indianapolis (9/6) . . . Topped team's tackle chart with 13 stops, including a sack, vs. Buffalo (9/13), when he was awarded a defensive game ball . . . Led club with 11 tackles in 21-0 victory vs. Pittsburgh (9/20) . . . Also picked off a Kordell Stewart pass and ran 17 yards for the second touchdown of his career . . . Was awarded a defensive game ball for his performance in the Steelers game . . . Had ten tackles and a forced fumble at Jacksonville (10/12) . . . Led team with 12 tackles vs. New England (10/25) . . . Notched a team and season-high 19 stops at Buffalo (11/1), when he also forced a fumble . . . Posted a team-high 12 tackles, to go along with a forced fumble, in victory at Carolina (11/15), when he earned a defensive game ball . . . Tied for team lead with ten tackles, and added three passes defended, at New England (11/23) . . . Recorded a team-high nine tackles, including a sack, vs. New Orleans (11/29) . . . Led the team with nine tackles at Oakland (12/6) . . . Also intercepted two passes, one of which he returned for a one-yard touchdown . . . His two interceptions were among six on the day for the Dolphins, tied for the most in team history . . . It marked the second time in 1998 and the third time in his career that he returned an interception for a touchdown, tying Dick Anderson's all-time Dolphins record . . . Along with Robert Jones' 14-yard interception return for a score, it tied the team's single-game record of two interception returns for touchdowns, which had been accomplished three times previously, most recently on December 16, 1983 against the N.Y. Jets . . . Thomas earned a defensive game ball for his performance against the Raiders . . . Started both playoff games following the 1998 season at middle linebacker . . . Led the team in the postseason with 20 total tackles (16 solo), a fumble recovery and a pass defended . . . Had a team-best eight tackles, in addition to a fumble recovery, in First-Round victory over Buffalo (1/2/99) . . . Also led team with 12 stops in Divisional contest at Denver (1/9/99) . . .

INTERCEPTIONS: Thomas' three interceptions in 1998 are tied for the second-highest single-season total for a linebacker in Dolphins history (behind four interceptions by linebacker John Bramlett in 1967); Thomas also had three interceptions during the 1996 season . . . Thomas returned two interceptions for touchdowns on the year . . . He had a 17-yard return for a score against Pittsburgh on September 20 when he picked off a Kordell Stewart pass, and brought another one back one yard for a touchdown on December 6 at Oakland when he snared a Donald Hollas pass . . . Thomas' two interception returns for scores in the same season is tied with three others for the most in team history . . . Those three are Bill Stanfill (1969), Dick Anderson (1973) and Mike Kozlowski (1983) . . . Of the group, Thomas is the only linebacker . . .

POSTSEASON HONORS: Earned numerous honors following the 1998 season . . . Was named the NFL Alumni Association's Linebacker of the Year . . . Was a first-team All-Pro selection by the Associated Press, USA Today, College & Pro Football Newsweekly and Football Digest . . . Was chosen to the 1998 All-Madden Team . . . Also was selected the winner of the team's Leadership Award in a vote of his teammates.

1997 – Started all 15 games in which he played at middle linebacker . . . Was inactive for the season-opener vs. Indianapolis (8/31) while still recovering from a fractured left fibula sustained in a preseason game against Denver in Mexico City (8/4) . . . Still led the team in tackles for the second straight year, with 149 total stops (107 solo), marking the second consecutive season in which he topped the 100-tackle plateau . . . That figure is now the 12th-most in franchise history . . . Also came up with a half-sack, an interception and ten passes defended, which were second-most on the squad and first among linebackers . . . Added one stop on special teams . . . Led the team in tackles on eight occasions, and finished with double-digit tackle totals nine times . . . Made regular season debut vs. Tennessee (9/7) and was second on the team with ten tackles . . . Led club with 11 stops at Green Bay (9/14) . . . Topped team with 12 tackles at Tampa Bay (9/21), when he picked off a Trent Dilfer pass and returned it ten yards for his only interception of the year . . . Tallied a team-high 11 tackles at N.Y. 1996 – Started all 16 games at middle linebacker as a rookie . . . Finished as team's leading tackler with 180 tackles (131 solo), while adding two sacks, three interceptions, two fumble recoveries, two forced fumbles and five passes defended . . . Also recorded two special teams tackles and had one kickoff return for 17 yards . . . His three interceptions tied with eight others for second-most by a Dolphins linebacker in club history, surpassed only by John Bramlett, who had four interceptions in 1967 . . . Posted a season-high 16 tackles against Seattle (10/6), when he also defended a pass, forced a fumble and recovered one . . . Topped team with 12 tackles at Buffalo (10/13), while adding a sack and first career interception, as he snared a Jim Kelly pass and returned it 11 yards . . . Matched his season-high with 16 tackles at Philadelphia (10/20) . . . Led team with ten tackles at Houston (11/17) and came up with an interception, picking off a Chris Chandler pass with 10:42 left in the game and returning it 26 yards for his first career NFL touchdown, giving the Dolphins their first lead of the contest at 20-17 en route to their eventual 23-20 victory . . . It was the third interception return for a touchdown by a linebacker in team history (and second ever in the regular season), the other two being by Tom Erlandson, a 26-yard TD return at Denver on December 4, 1966, and by A.J. Duhe, a 35-yard TD return in the AFC Championship game against the N.Y. Jets on January 23, 1983 . . . Tied for club-high with 14 stops against N.Y. Giants (12/8) . . . Came up with an interception and 27-yard return against Buffalo (12/16) in Monday night contest, marking his second interception of a Kelly pass in as many games against the Bills . . . Fifth-round draft choice (154th overall) of Miami in 1996 . . .

AMONG TACKLE LEADERS: Thomas led the Dolphins in tackles 12 times in 1996 and finished second twice . . . He recorded double-digit figures in tackles in 11 of his 16 games . . . Became only the third Dolphins rookie in club history to record 100 or more tackles (LB Steve Towle had 164 tackles in 1975 and LB John Offerdahl had 135 tackles in 1986) . . . He also is only the third rookie in franchise history to lead the team in tackles, joining Towle in 1975 and Offerdahl in 1986 . . . Thomas' 180 tackles is the highest single-season total by a Dolphins rookie, surpassing Towle's former club rookie record of 164 tackles which he set in 1975 . . . In addition, Thomas led all NFL rookies and finished ranked sixth among all NFL players in tackles in 1996:

PRO CAREER

2002 – Was acquired by Miami from New Orleans on March 8, 2002 in exchange for a first-round draft choice in 2002 (25th overall) and a conditional third-round pick in 2003 . . . That pick became a first round choice (18th overall) when he reached the 1,500-yard rushing mark in 2002 . . . In the trade, the teams also swapped positions in the fourth round of the 2002 draft . . . Started all 16 games in his first season with the Dolphins . . . Became the first Dolphin to lead the NFL in rushing with 1,853 yards and 16 touchdowns on 383 attempts . . . It marked just the eighth time that a Dolphin reached the 1,000-yard rushing mark in a season, and he became the sixth different player to do it . . . Also caught 47 passes for 363 yards and one touchdown . . . Reception total was second on the squad and yardage figure was fourth . . . 2,216 total yards from scrimmage were second-most in the AFC and in the NFL, trailing only Kansas City's Priest Holmes (2,287) . . . 17 total touchdowns tied for second in the AFC and third in the NFL . . . Was the first Dolphins running back to start all 16 games since Sammie Smith in 1990 . . . Accounted for 103 first downs on the season (89 rushing, 14 receiving), the third-highest figure in the AFC and in the NFL . . . On the year, established seven Dolphins single-season records and two single-game standards in regular season play . . .

RUSHING YARDS, ATTEMPTS & TOUCHDOWNS: In 2002, Williams established the club's single-season records for rushing yards, attempts and touchdowns . . . His 1,853 yards broke Delvin Williams' 14-year old yardage record of 1,258, which he set in 1978 . . . His 383 attempts surpassed the previous mark set by Lamar Smith, who had 313 carries in 2001 . . . His 16 rushing touchdowns were one more than the total that Karim Abdul-Jabbar amassed in 1997:

FINS FACT

Last year, Ricky became the first Heisman Trophy winner ever to play for the Dolphins in the regular season. Prior to his arrival, former University of Florida quarterback Steve Spurrier, the 1966 Heisman winner, spent one week with the Dolphins in the preseason of 1977 before being released on September 12. The Dolphins also traded for Colorado running back Rashaan Salaam, the 1994 recipient, on April 22, 1999. The trade, however, never was finalized because of Salaam's health.

100-YARD RUSHING GAMES: Williams accounted for ten 100-yard rushing games in 2002, shattering the Dolphins single-season record of five, formerly held by Delvin Williams (1978) . . . This included a season-high 228 yards at Buffalo on December 1, which represents a club single-game record . . . He reached the single-season mark when he accounted for 143 yards and two touchdowns on 29 attempts in a 30-3 win over San Diego on November 24 at Pro Player Stadium, his sixth 100-yard rushing game of the year . . . In fact, his ten 100-yard rushing games are tied for the second-highest total by a Dolphin in a career, along with Mercury Morris . . . They trail only Larry Csonka, who accounted for 15 100-yard rushing

LONG PLAYS: Williams erupted for numerous long plays during the course of the season, having accounted for four of the six longest plays from scrimmage by the Dolphins in 2002 . . . In addition last season, Williams accounted for each of the four longest plays from scrimmage of his four-year NFL career, and six of his top nine . . . Overall on the year, he had 23 runs of 15 yards or longer and two receptions of 25 yards or longer . . . PLAYER OF THE WEEK/MONTH: During the course of the 2002 season, Williams was named AFC Offensive Player of the Week on two occasions, the second and third times in his career that he has come away with an NFL weekly honor . . . His first AFC Offensive Player of the Week honor came for the games of November 24-25, following his performance against San Diego on November 24 in which he led the Dolphins with 29 carries for 143 yards and two touchdowns and added two catches for eight yards . . . It marked the first time that a Dolphin was named AFC Offensive Player of the Week in the regular season since the 2000 season-opener when running back Lamar Smith earned that honor against Seattle . . . He also was named as AFC Offensive Player of the Week for the games of December 8-9, following his performance in a Monday night win against Chicago on December 9, in which he rushed for 216 yards and two touchdowns on 31 carries . . . He became just the third Dolphin to earn AFC Offensive Player of the Week accolades two or more times in the same season during the regular season, joining quarterback Dan Marino, who did it on five occasions (1984, 1985, 1988, 1989, 1999) and quarterback Scott Mitchell, who won the honor twice in 1993 . . . Williams' first weekly award of his career occurred in 2001 as a member of the Saints when he was named NFC Offensive Player of the Week in the season's fourth week as he rushed for 136 yards and a touchdown on 30 carries and caught five passes for 42 yards in a win against Minnesota . . . In addition, Williams was named NFC Offensive Player of the Month for October, 2001 as a member of the Saints, when he rushed for 411 yards and two touchdowns on 99 carries, and caught 22 passes for 157 yards in four games . . .

PRO BOWL: Was one of seven Dolphins selected to the 2002 AFC Pro Bowl team, the most in the AFC . . . It marked his first career Pro Bowl appearance . . . He became the first Dolphins running back to be named to the Pro Bowl since Andra Franklin was chosen in 1982 (Keith Byars was selected as a fullback in 1993) . . . Overall, Williams is the sixth running back in team history chosen to the Pro Bowl, along with Byars (1993), Larry Csonka (1970-74), Franklin (1982), Mercury Morris (1971-73), and Delvin Williams (1978) . . . GAME HIGHLIGHTS – VS. DETROIT (SEPT. 8): In his Dolphins debut, rushed for 111 yards and two touchdowns on 20 attempts, marking the 13th 100-yard rushing game of his career . . . Did not play at all in the fourth quarter as the Dolphins held a 42-14 lead entering the final period . . . His touchdowns came on runs of one and two yards . . . It marked the 12th 100-yard rushing game by a Dolphin in a season-opener and was the ninth-highest by a Dolphin on opening day . . . It also was the fifth-best rushing total by a Dolphin in his debut with the team . . . His two rushing touchdowns and his two overall touchdowns both were tied for the second highest single-game total of his career . . .

AT INDIANAPOLIS (SEPT. 15): Accounted for back-to-back 100-yard rushing games with 132 yards on 24 carries . . . Also caught two passes for a team-high 62 yards . . . This included a career-long 52-yard reception and a ten-yard TD pass from Jay Fiedler . . . Coupled with his 132 yards rushing the previous week at Indianapolis, his 283 yards rushing in those two contests was the most by a Dolphin in back-to-back games to that point, breaking the former team record of 273 yards rushing in consecutive games that was set by Bernie Parmalee in 1994 (150 yards rushing on Oct. 16, 1994 vs. L.A. Raiders and 123 yards rushing on Oct. 30, 1994 at New England) . . . Williams also had 110 yards rushing in the second half of the game, becoming the first Dolphin to rush for 100 or more yards in a half since Lamar Smith had 109 yards rushing in the first half against the Jets on October 23, 2000 in New York . . .

AT KANSAS CITY (SEPT. 29): Ran for 66 yards and a touchdown on 14 carries, and tallied a team-high seven receptions for 60 yards . . . Reception total marked a season-high and is tied for the third-highest figure of his career . . . Yardage figure was his second-best of the year and is the fifth-highest of his career . . .

VS. NEW ENGLAND (OCT. 6): Accounted for his fourth 100-yard rushing game of the year and the 16th of his career with 105 yards on 36 attempts . . . His 36 carries marked a season-high and stand as the third-highest total of his career . . . In addition, the 36 carries are the most ever by a Dolphin in the regular season and the second most ever overall, including playoffs, surpassed only by Lamar Smith's 40 carries in an AFC First Round Playoff game against Indianapolis on December 30, 2000 . . .

AT DENVER (OCT. 13): Led the Dolphins with 49 yards rushing and two touchdowns on 20 attempts . . . Added four receptions for 30 yards . . . His touchdowns came on runs of ten and two yards as the Dolphins recorded a 24-22 victory before an ESPN Sunday night audience . . . His two rushing touchdowns and his two overall touchdowns both tied for the second-highest single-game total of his career . . .

VS. BALTIMORE (NOV. 17): Rushed for 102 yards on 26 attempts and two touchdowns . . . Led the Dolphins in receiving as well with five catches for 28 yards . . . It was his fifth 100-yard rushing game of the season (17th of career), as he tied Delvin Williams' club single-

season record for most 100-yard rushing games first set in 1978 . . . His touchdowns came on runs of two and four yards . . . The two rushing touchdowns and his two overall touchdowns both tied for the second highest single-game total of his career . . . It was the third time on the season and the sixth time in his career that he had two rushing touchdowns in a game . . . For Williams, it began a streak of four straight games with a pair of rushing touchdowns . . .

VS. SAN DIEGO (NOV. 24): Rushed for 143 yards and two touchdowns on 29 carries and caught two passes for eight yards . . . His touchdowns came on runs of one and 12 yards . . . It was his sixth 100-yard rushing game of the season (18th of career), as he eclipsed Delvin Williams' team single-season record of five, which had been set in 1978 . . . In addition, Ricky Williams went over the 1,000 yard rushing mark for the season in the contest, reaching that plateau in 11 games, tying Delvin Williams for the fewest games in a season to reach 1,000 yards rushing; Delvin Williams reached 1,000 yards rushing in 11 games in 1978 . . . His two rushing touchdowns and his two overall touchdowns both tied for the second highest single-game total of his career . . . It was the fourth time on the season and the seventh time in his career that he had two rushing touchdowns in a game . . . For his efforts in that contest, Williams was named AFC Offensive Player of the Week for games of November 24-25 . . .

AT BUFFALO (DEC. 1): Turned in the most prolific rushing day in Dolphins history with 228 yards and two touchdowns on 27 attempts . . . His rushing total represents the highest single-game rushing total of his career, breaking his former single-game best of 179 yards rushing on 40 carries on October 31, 1999 against Cleveland as a member of the New Orleans Saints, and it marked his first career 200-yard rushing game . . . It also was a new Dolphins record for most yards rushing in a single game, breaking the overall club record of 209 yards on 40 carries, set by Lamar Smith on December 30, 2000 against Indianapolis in an AFC First-Round Playoff game, and breaking the Dolphins regular season single-game rushing record, set by Mercury Morris with 197 yards rushing on 15 carries on September 30, 1973 against New England . . . It also was the second highest single-game rushing total in a loss in NFL history, surpassed only by O. J. Simpson's 273 yards rushing on November 25, 1976 as a member of the Buffalo Bills in their 27-14 loss at Detroit . . . Williams also set a new Dolphins single-season rushing record, breaking Delvin Williams' former club record of 1,258 yards that he set in 1978 . . . In that contest, Ricky Williams had 121 yards rushing in the first half, marking the second time in 2002 that he surpassed the 100-yard rushing mark in one half . . . He then had 107 yards rushing in the second half of the game, making the third time in '02 that he recorded 100 or more yards rushing in a half . . . In addition, his total of 224 yards rushing after three quarters is the highest rushing total in NFL history after three quarters of play . . . It was his seventh 100-yard rushing game of the season and the 19th 100-yard rushing game of his career . . . His touchdowns came on a 45-yard run on the Dolphins' first play from scrimmage and a 55-yard run in the third quarter . . . The 55-yard run is the second-longest run of his career and the 45-yard scamper is tied for the fourth-longest . . . It marked the fifth time in 2002 and the eighth time in his career that he had two rushing touchdowns in a game . . .

VS. CHICAGO (DEC. 9): In a Monday night win over Chicago, rushed for 216 yards and two touchdowns on 31 carries, marking his second consecutive 200-yard rushing performance and the fourth straight game in which he posted a pair of rushing scores . . . His touchdowns came on runs of 15 and 63 yards . . . The 63-yard run marked a career-long . . . His rushing total represents the second highest single-game rushing total of his career and the second highest single-game total in Dolphins history . . . It was the second highest single-game rushing figure in Monday Night Football history, surpassed only by the 221 yards by the Raiders' Bo Jackson on November 30, 1987 at Seattle . . . It also was the most yards rushing by an individual against the Bears in that team's history . . . It was his fourth straight 100-yard rushing game, setting a new club record for most consecutive 100-yard rushing games . . . Overall, it was his eighth 100-yard rushing game of the season and the 20th of his career . . . It was the sixth time in '02 and the ninth time in his career that he had two rushing touchdowns in a game . . . For his efforts, Williams was named as AFC Offensive Player of the Week for the games of December 8-9.

VS. OAKLAND (DEC. 15): Put together his fifth consecutive 100-yard rushing game by compiling 101 yards on 27 attempts . . . It was his ninth 100-yard rushing game of the season and the 21st of his career . . . Also had five receptions for 39 yards . . . In the contest, surpassed Lamar Smith as the club's single-season leader for most rush attempts, which Smith had set in 2001 with 313 . . . Did not have a touchdown, snapping his string of four straight games with a score . . .

AT NEW ENGLAND (DEC. 29): Rushed for 185 yards and two touchdowns on 31 attempts . . . Added two receptions for seven yards . . . His 185 yards rushing is the fourth-highest single game rushing total in Dolphin history (fifth, including playoffs) . . . It was his tenth 100-yard rushing game of the season and the 22nd of his career . . . The ten 100-yard games in a career

... tied him with Mercury Morris for the second-most ever by a Dolphin . . . In the game he set a new Dolphins club record for most rushing touchdowns in a season . . . He tied the mark of 15, first set by Karim Abdul-Jabbar in 1997, with his eight-yard run in the first quarter . . . He set the record with a 14-yard TD in the second quarter . . . It was the seventh time in '02 and the tenth time in his career that he had two rushing touchdowns in a game.

2001 – Started all 16 games in which he played with the Saints . . . Rushed for 1,245 yards and six touchdowns on 313 carries, and caught 60 passes for 511 yards and one score . . . It marked the seventh 1,000-yard rushing season in Saints history, and the first time it had been achieved in back-to-back seasons . . . He joined George Rogers (1981, 1983) as the only players in Saints history to rush for 1,000 yards two times . . . Rushing total was the fourth-highest single-season total in Saints history at the time (now fifth) . . . It also ranked fourth in the NFC and eighth in the NFL in '01 . . . Was third in the NFC and fifth in the NFL with 1,756 total yards from scrimmage . . . Reception total was the second-most by a running back in Saints history, trailing only the 74 catches by Tony Galbreath in 1978 . . . Reception figure also tied for 19th in the NFC and tied for sixth among conference running backs . . . Totaled 77 first downs on the year (58 rushing, 19 receiving), fourth in the NFC and tied for eighth in the NFL . . . Rushed for 136 yards and a touchdown on 30 attempts and caught five passes for 42 yards vs. Minnesota (10/7) in the Saints' 28-15 victory . . . For his efforts, was named the NFC Offensive Player of the Week for the first time in his career . . . The following week at Carolina, compiled 147 yards rushing and a score on 31 carries, and tallied four receptions for 31 yards in a 27-25 win . . . Had a season-long 46-yard run in the game . . . Score came on a one-yard TD run as time expired to provide New Orleans with the winning margin . . . Had 51 yards rushing on 21 carries while tying a career-high with nine receptions for 65 yards vs. Atlanta (10/21) . . . Rushed for 77 yards on 17 attempts and had four receptions for 19 yards at St. Louis (10/28) . . . In four games during the month of October, totaled 411 yards rushing and two touchdowns on 99 attempts (4.2 avg.) and caught 22 passes for 157 yards . . . For his performance, was named NFC Offensive Player of the Month . . . Rushed for 121 yards on 24 carries and had three receptions for 52 yards at San Francisco (11/11), as he surpassed Mario Bates into sixth on the club's all-time rushing list . . . Ran for 120 yards, including a 14-yard TD, on 28 carries, and had four receptions for 48 yards the week afterwards vs. Indianapolis (11/18) . . . Rushed 27 times for 102 yards and had four receptions for 72 yards, including a season-long 42-yard catch, vs. Carolina (12/2), as he moved ahead of Tony Galbreath into fifth on the Saints' career rushing chart . . . In just three years with the Saints, compiled 3,129 yards rushing, good for fifth on the team's all-time rushing chart.

2000 – Started all ten games in which he played . . . Missed each of the final six games of the year with a broken left ankle . . . Rushed for 1,000 yards and eight touchdowns on 248 attempts and caught 44 passes for 409 yards and one score . . . It marked the sixth 1,000-yard rushing season in Saints history, and he became just the fifth different player to accomplish the feat . . . Rushing total ranked 12th in the NFC and 23rd in the NFL . . . At the time of his injury, with six games still to play, his 1,000 rushing yards were second-most in the NFC while his 1,409 total yards from scrimmage also were second in the conference . . . At San Diego (9/10), rushed for 50 yards on 24 attempts and caught four passes for 27 yards, including a 13-yard TD catch from Jeff Blake for his first NFL touchdown reception . . . Rushed for 107 yards on 23 carries the following week at Seattle (9/17), commencing a string of five games in a row in which he reached the 100-yard rushing mark . . . Tied a team mark by rushing for 128 yards and a touchdown on 30 carries at Chicago (10/8), his third straight 100-yard rushing effort, tying George Rogers (1981), Wayne Wilson (1983) and Dalton Hilliard (1989) for that honor . . . In addition, the Bears game marked the first of five in a row that he tallied a rushing touchdown . . . Rushed 38 times for 144 yards and two touchdowns, and had three receptions for 35 yards vs. Carolina (10/15), as he established the club record for consecutive 100-yard rushing games at four . . . Also had a 34-yard completion to Keith Poole in the Panthers contest, his first NFL completion . . . The week afterwards at Atlanta (10/22), ran for a season-high 156 yards and three touchdowns on 29 carries, as he registered his fifth straight 100-yard rushing game . . . The three rushing touchdowns tied a club record that had previously been achieved by six others, most recently by Mario Bates at L.A. Rams on December 4, 1994 . . . Although the streak ended the following week at Arizona (10/29) with 54 yards rushing and a TD on 21 attempts, turned in the best receiving day of his career with nine catches for 92 yards . . . Rushed for 81 yards and a touchdown on 27 carries vs. San Francisco (11/5) . . . The score came on a one-yard run in the second quarter, marking the fifth straight game in which he had a rushing touchdown, tying the club record first set by Hilliard in 1989 . . . Compiled 93 yards on 16 attempts at Carolina (11/12) . . . Final carry was a two-yard run in the fourth quarter as he reached 1,000 yards rushing for the season . . . Sustained a broken left ankle on the play

and was inactive each of the final six regular season games and NFC Wild Card Playoff game vs. St. Louis (12/30) . . . Saw limited action in a reserve role in Divisional Playoff contest at Minnesota (1/6/01) . . . Had six carries for 14 yards and one reception for two yards.

1999 – Started all 12 games in which he played as a rookie . . . Rushed for 884 yards and two touchdowns on 253 attempts and caught 28 passes for 172 yards . . . It stands as the third-best rushing figure by a rookie in Saints history, trailing only the 1,674 yards by George Rogers in 1981 and the 1,353 yards by Rueben Mayes in 1986 . . . It was the tenth-highest rushing total in the NFC and 20th in the NFL in 1999 . . . It was the most by a rookie in the NFC and third-most among NFL rookies, trailing only Indianapolis' Edgerrin James (1,553) and Denver's Olandis Gary (1,159) . . . First career 100-yard rushing game occurred in his sixth NFL game when he rushed for 111 yards on 25 attempts at N.Y. Giants (10/24) . . . In the process, became the first Saints rookie to rush for 100 yards since Mario Bates had 141 yards on 22 carries vs. Atlanta on November 13, 1994 . . . Followed up that performance by registering 179 yards on 40 carries vs. Cleveland (10/31), marking the third-highest single-game rushing total in Saints history and the second-best by a rookie . . . His 40 attempts represented a new club single-game best, as he surpassed the previous mark of 35, held by both Earl Campbell (at Minnesota, 11/24/85) and Dwight Beverly (at St. Louis, 10/11/87) . . . Became the first Saint since Bates in 1995 to account for 100 rushing yards in consecutive games . . . First-round draft choice (5th overall) by New Orleans in 1999 with a choice obtained from Washington in a draft-day trade-up, in which the Saints surrendered their six remaining picks in the 1999 draft, and first- and third-round draft choices in 2000.

Started 46 of the 48 games in which he played during his four-year career (1995-98) . . . Played fullback his first two years before shifting to tailback for his final two seasons . . . Rushed for 6,279 yards and 72 touchdowns on 1,011 carries and caught 85 passes for 927 yards and three scores . . . Finished his collegiate career as the owner of 20 NCAA rushing records, including most rushing yards (6,279), all-purpose yards (7,206), highest average per carry (6.2), rushing touchdowns (72), total touchdowns scored (75), 200-yard rushing games (11; tied Marcus Allen of Southern California (1978-81) for points scored (452), games with a touchdown (33) and games with two or more scores (21) . . . Also finished with 44 school records . . . Rushing total now ranks second in NCAA history, trailing only former University of Wisconsin star and current New York Giant Ron Dayne (6,397) . . . Averaged 182.5 yards rushing a game over his final two seasons . . . Had at least one reception in 41 of 46 career regular season games . . . As a senior in 1998, rushed for a career-best 2,124 yards and 27 touchdowns on 361 attempts . . . Was a unanimous All-America and All-Big 12 Conference first-team choice . . . Was the recipient of the Heisman Trophy, Maxwell Award, Walter Camp Foundation Player of the Year Award, the first-ever Associated Press National Player of the Year Award, Football News Offensive Player of the Year Trophy and The Sporting News Player of the Year Award . . . Became the first player to earn back-to-back Doak Walker Award (given to nation's top running back) honors in 1998 . . . Also was named the conference's Offensive Player of the Year . . . Became the eighth player in the history of college football to rush for more than 2,000 yards in a single season . . . Rushing total ranked fifth on the Division I-A season-record list . . . His 27 TDs ranked third on the NCAA season-record list . . . Set NCAA records with two 300-yard rushing games, and 668 rushing yards and 11 TDs during a two-game period . . . Reached the 200-yard rushing mark five times during the regular season in addition to the Cotton Bowl . . . Against Rice, ran for 318 yards and six TDs (31, 16, 17, 29, 27 and 41 yards), adding 32 yards on four catches . . . Followed with 350 yards on 37 carries with five scores, including a 68-yarder against Iowa State . . . To honor former Heisman Trophy winner Doak Walker, Williams chose to wear uniform No. 37 on October 10, 1998 against Oklahoma at the Cotton Bowl . . . Williams rushed for 139 yards and two touchdowns on 31 carries in the Longhorns' 34-3 victory over the Sooners . . . Ran for 1,893 yards and 25 touchdowns on 279 attempts and had 20 receptions for 150 yards as a junior in 1997 . . . Was a consensus All-America and All-Big 12 Conference first-team choice . . . Was the winner of the Doak Walker Award . . . Finished fifth in voting for Heisman Trophy . . . Was the Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year . . . Led the nation in rushing (172.1 yards per game), and scoring (13.8 points per game) . . . Ranked second in the country with an average of 185.7 all-purpose yards per game . . . Rushing total set the school's single-season mark formerly held by Earl Campbell (1,744 yards in 1977) . . . Attained the 1,000-yard rushing mark on just his 168th carry, reaching that plateau faster than any Longhorn back in history . . . Rushed for 200

Broke Earl Campbell's Texas freshman rushing record (928 yards in 1974) . . . Was an All-Southwest Conference second-team pick . . . Shared SWC Offensive Newcomer of the Year honors with teammate Shon Mitchell . . . Majored in elementary education.

Also played linebacker . . . Concluded his prep career with 4,129 yards and 55 TDs . . . Was an All-State and All-League pick as an outfielder in baseball . . . Batted .340 with 26 stolen bases as a senior and .333 with 31 stolen bases as a junior . . . Wrestled in the heavyweight division and also ran track, where he qualified for the state finals in the 400-meter relays . . . Following high school, was selected in the eighth round of the 1995 draft as an outfielder by the Philadelphia Phillies . . . 

Since the 1970 merger of the American and National Football Leagues, Miami is the only NFL team to twice open up a season with 10 or more consecutive wins. The Dolphins did it in 1972 (14 wins) and 1984 (11 wins), while five other teams have accomplished a 10 or more game season-opening winning streak on one occasion — Minnesota in 1975 (10 wins), Chicago in 1985 (13 wins), N.Y. Giants in 1990 (10 wins), San Francisco in 1990 (10 wins), Washington (11 games) in 1991 and Denver (13 games) in 1998.


DOLPHINS RECORD IN HOME OPENERS

In addition, the Dolphins own a 29-4 (.879) record in home openers since the 1970 merger of the National and American Football Leagues, which is the best of any NFL club over that time span, ahead of the Raiders (27-5-1, .833).

1984 DOLPHINS OFFENSE IS BEST IN NFL

In the 1984 season, the Dolphins established a number of NFL season records, including most yards gained (6,936), most yards gained by passing (5,018), most first downs (387), most touchdowns (70), most passing touchdowns (49) and most PATs (66). Five of the six marks still stand as NFL records. The only exception is yards gained passing, which was eclipsed by the 2000 St. Louis Rams (5,232).

CLAYTON, DUPER TO JOIN HONOR ROLL

Former Dolphins wide receivers Mark Clayton and Mark Duper – popularly known as the “Marks Brothers” - will become the 13th and 14th members of the Dolphin Honor Roll during induction ceremonies to be held at halftime the Dolphins-Eagles Monday night game on December 15 at Pro Player Stadium. The pair will be the first inductees since quarterback Dan Marino on September 17, 2000.

Combined, the duo totaled 1,030 receptions for 16,943 yards and 134 touchdowns from Dan Marino, as they accounted for almost 21 percent of Marino’s career completion total, nearly 27 percent of his career passing yards and 32 percent of his touchdown total. Clayton hauled in 538 passes for 8,468 yards and 79 touchdowns from the future Hall of Fame signal caller, while Duper snared 492 passes for 8,475 yards and 55 touchdowns. In fact, Marino and Clayton are second all-time in NFL history among quarterback-receiver scoring combinations, while Marino-Duper are tied for eighth.

OFF AND RUNNING

In 2002, running back Ricky Williams established the Dolphins' single-season record for 100-yard rushing games with ten. In those ten contests, the Dolphins were 8-2. Since 1996, including playoffs, the Dolphins are 23-4 (.852) in games when they have had a back rush for 100 yards or more. During this same span, they are 5-15 (.250), including playoffs, in games when an opposing player has reached the 100-yard plateau. In the 37-year history of the franchise, including both regular season and postseason, there have been 115 occasions when a Dolphins running back has reached the 100-yard rushing mark, with two players having accounted for 100 yards in the same game four times. In the 111 games when the Dolphins have had a 100-yard back, they have put together a record of 95-16 (.856). An opposing player has attained the 100-yard rushing barrier 113 times, with two players having done this in the same game once. In the 112 games when the opposition has had a player rush for 100 yards, the Dolphins are 34-78 (.304).

GAME 1

DOLPHINS 49, LIONS 21

The Dolphins recorded their second-most points as well as their second-largest margin of victory on opening day. The Lions got as far as the Dolphins' 35 on their initial series of the game, but were forced to punt after suffering a five-yard sack. The Dolphins then embarked on a nine-play, 90-yard drive that ended with a Ricky Williams one-yard touchdown run with 3:07 to play in the first quarter. The drive, which used 5:21 of the clock, marked the Dolphins' first scoring drive of 90 yards or longer since November 15, 1998. Jay Fiedler threw for 45 yards and the Dolphins were aided by a 28-yard pass interference penalty on the march. The Dolphins were forced to punt following their next drive, but Mark Royals' kick bounced off the leg of Detroit's Chris Cash where it was recovered in the end zone by Trent Gamble to give the Dolphins a 14-point advantage 14 seconds into the second quarter. Miami scored once again on their next series when Fiedler found rookie tight end Randy McMichael for a 16-yard scoring pass, capping a seven-play, 64-yard drive, which saw the same pair combine for a 22-yard pass on the initial play, putting the Dolphins in Lions territory. Detroit responded with a 14-play, 80-yard drive that ended with quarterback Mike McMahon taking it into the end zone from two yards out. McMahon threw for 58 yards on the drive. The Dolphins gained possession at their own 34 with 1:36 remaining in the first half and no timeouts. They traveled 66 yards in eight plays towards a Fiedler to Chris Chambers nine-yard scoring strike with eight seconds left in the half. After Robert Edwards opened the drive with a nine-yard burst, Fiedler threw for the final 57 yards, including a 14-yard completion to Edwards on third-and-10 from the Lions' 23. On the first play from scrimmage of the second half, Brock Marion intercepted a McMahon pass that he returned 28 yards to the Lions' 2, leading to a Ricky Williams two-yard touchdown run on the next play. The Lions added their second touchdown of the day with 6:19 to play in the third quarter when McMahon connected with Lamont Warren for a 13-yard score. McMahon accounted for 44 of the 55 yards on the drive as he completed all four of his pass attempts, totaling 35 yards, and had one rush for nine yards. The Dolphins began their ensuing drive at the Lions' 43 after Albert Johnson returned the kick-off 35 yards and the Lions were flagged for a 15-yard face-mask penalty. Five plays later, the Dolphins regained their 28-point advantage when Fiedler hit Robert Edwards for a four-yard TD pass, three plays after Williams broke loose for a 37-yard run to the Lions' 6. The Dolphins tallied their final points of the day 4:21 into the final frame when Edwards scored on a one-yard run, culminating an 11-play, 77-yard drive that used 6:39 of the clock. Travis Minor ran for 30 yards, including an 18-yard run to the Lions' 36, on the drive. Detroit countered with a Cory Schlesinger 2-yard TD run with 5:48 to play in the game. The key play was a 24-yard pass interference penalty on the Dolphins, putting the Lions at the Miami 2.

GAME 2

DOLPHINS 21, COLTS 13
September 15, 2002

RCA Dome
Indianapolis, IN

Miami recorded its fifth straight win over the Colts at the RCA Dome, marking the Dolphins' longest winning streak ever in any domed stadium. On the first series of the game, the Dolphins traveled 73 yards in nine plays en route to a one-yard touchdown run by Jay Fiedler. On third-and-six from the Colts' 40, Fiedler broke loose for an 11-yard run, and on the next play, Fiedler hit Randy McMichael for a 24-yard completion to the five-yard line, setting up Fiedler's touchdown run two plays afterward. The Colts were at the Dolphins' 38 on their initial possession of the game before Derrick Rodgers intercepted a Peyton Manning pass and returned it 21 yards to the Colts' 49. From there, the Dolphins embarked on a seven-play drive that ended with a nine-yard scoring pass from Fiedler to Rob Konrad on third-and-4, with 2:18 remaining in the opening quarter. The Colts were in the Dolphins end of the field on their next series as well before Jamar Fletcher intercepted a Manning pass at the Dolphins' 37, marking Fletcher's first career interception. The Colts came up with their first points of the afternoon with 4:03 to play in the first half on a Mike Vanderjagt 25-yard field goal, capping a 15-play, 74-yard drive that used 8:18 of the clock. Edgerrin James accounted for 37 yards on the march with seven rush attempts, while Manning and Marvin Harrison connected three times for 36 yards. Following the score, the Dolphins took over at their own 29, and on the first play from scrimmage, Fiedler hit Ricky Williams with a screen pass that Williams turned into a 52-yard gain to the Colts' 19. Three plays later, Fiedler and Williams combined for a ten-yard touchdown pass on third-and-1, with 1:53 left in the half. With the Colts at the Dolphins' 28 with less than a minute to play in the first half, Patrick Surtain intercepted a Manning pass in the end zone to end the threat. The Colts had a first-and-goal from the two-yard line midway through the third quarter before the Dolphins defense stuffed James on four straight plays. The Colts notched their first touchdown of the day when Manning hit Harrison for a 16-yard pass with 9:11 to play in the game, culminating an eight-play, 80-yard drive in which James rushed for 20 yards and added 20 more yards on a reception. The Dolphins also were penalized twice for nine yards on the drive. The Colts scored on their second consecutive possession when Vanderjagt connected on a 23-yard field goal with 2:54 to play, capping a 13-play, 71-yard drive. James caught three passes for 29 yards and rushed for six more yards on the march. Again, Miami was called for a pair of penalties, totaling ten yards. The Colts' final possession of the game started at their own 16 with 2:15 remaining. They traveled 78 yards to the Dolphins' 6 before Brock Marion broke up a Manning pass in the end zone on the game's final play. Williams became the first Dolphin to register back-to-back 100-yard rushing games since games 7-8 of 1994 when Bernie Parmalee accomplished the feat. With Williams and Konrad both accounting for receiving touchdowns, it marked the first time since 1988 that two different Dolphin running backs did this in the same game.

The Dolphins won for the 17th straight time at home in the months of August/September during the regular season, and snapped the Jets' eight-game winning streak in the series. The Jets got to the Dolphins' 29 on the opening series of the game, but Adewale Ogunleye sacked Vinny Testaverde on third-and-2, and New York punted on the following play. The Dolphins went ahead with 3:09 to play in the first quarter when Olindo Mare kicked a 53-yard field goal, equaling the second-longest field goal of his career. The Dolphins yielded their most points in the regular season since 1986 in their first trip to Arrowhead Stadium since 1991. Albert Johnson returned the game's opening kickoff 49 yards to the Dolphins' 48. After a six-yard reception by Rob Konrad and a 15-yard face-mask penalty put the Dolphins at the Kansas City 31, Ricky Williams picked up 29 yards on a screen pass to the one-yard line two plays later, setting up a Jay Fiedler one-yard touchdown run on the following play. The Chiefs equaled the count on the ensuing series when a nine-yard TD pass from Trent Green to Tony Gonzalez capped an 11-play, 83-yard drive. Gonzalez grabbed two passes for 39 yards on the march, including a 30-yard catch on third-and-6 to the Dolphins' 38, one of two third downs converted by the Chiefs on the drive. On the first play from scrimmage after the score, Marcus Patton recovered a Williams fumble at the Dolphins' 36, leading to a Morten Andersen 50-yard field goal four plays afterward. The Dolphins tied the contest on the following series when Olindo Mare converted a 42-yard field goal, culminating a 12-play, 56-yard drive in which Fiedler completed all six of his pass attempts, totaling 58 yards. Kansas City reclaimed the lead four plays later when Priest Holmes broke loose for a 25-yard touchdown run, 2:23 into the second quarter. The score occurred three plays after Green and Gonzalez combined for a 32-yard completion to the Dolphins' 37 on the opening play of the drive. The Chiefs scored for the fourth time in as many possessions when Green hit Johnnie Morton for an eight-yard TD pass. The score came two plays after Green connected with Eddie Kennison for a 46-yard completion to the Dolphins' 18. The Chiefs also were aided by two Miami penalties, both of which gave them a first down. The Chiefs began the drive at their own 42 after Eric Warfield intercepted a Fiedler pass. The Dolphins cut into the lead with 3:39 left in the first half when Mare connected on his second field goal of the day, from 29 yards out, capping a seven-play, 46-yard drive. The key play was a 30-yard run by Williams to the Chiefs' 27 on the first play. The Dolphins crept to within eight points of the lead on the final play of the first half when Mare made good on a 25-yard field goal after the Dolphins had taken over at their own 44 with 2:44 to play in the half. The Chiefs took a 15-point lead on the opening series of the second half when Green connected with Gonzalez for a 42-yard TD strike, 3:27 into the half. The Dolphins answered with a three-yard touchdown run by Williams 2:18 later. Miami opened the 72-yard scoring drive with Fiedler completing passes of 20 and 38 yards to Oronde Gadsden and Chris Chambers, respectively, followed by an 11-yard run by Williams. Gonzalez tallied his third touchdown of the game when he hauled in a six-yard pass from Green, 1:20 into the final period, culminating an eight-play, 61-yard drive. A 24-yard pass from Green to Holmes four plays prior to the touchdown put the Chiefs at the Dolphins' 23. The Dolphins got back to within eight of the lead 3:30 into the fourth quarter when Fiedler hit Konrad for a six-yard scoring pass, capping a 63-yard drive that used just five plays and 2:10 of the clock. The Chiefs then put the game out of reach by scoring the next ten points, with both scores occurring following Greg Wesley interceptions, giving him three on the day, tied for the most-ever against the Dolphins. The Chiefs took an 11-point advantage midway through the fourth quarter when Andersen hit a 24-yard field goal, four plays after Wesley returned an interception 42 yards to the Dolphins' 16. The Chiefs final score of the afternoon came with 5:48 remaining in the game when Green threw his fifth touchdown of the game, a three-yard toss to Billy Baber, two plays after Wesley brought his second interception back 16 yards to the Dolphins' 20.

The Dolphins registered their fifth straight win over New England in Miami, and their sixth victory in the last seven meetings overall. The Dolphins got to at least the midfield stripe on each of their first six possessions of the game. Miami was able to muster only 16 points off of that, however. Olindo Mare missed wide right on a 45-yard field goal attempt on the Dolphins' first series of the game after they had gained possession at their own 45. They rebounded on their following series when Jay Fiedler scored on an eight-yard run with eight seconds remaining in the first quarter, on third-and-goal. The PAT was blocked. The Dolphins started the drive at the Patriots' 39 after Jason Taylor stripped the ball from Tom Brady on a sack and Adewale Ogunleye recovered. Three plays after the touchdown, Patrick Surtain, playing for the first time in three weeks after missing each of the previous two games with a knee injury, intercepted a Brady pass at the Patriots' 29. That resulted in a seven-yard TD pass from Fiedler to Chris Chambers on third-and-goal, 3:22 into the second quarter. Mare had connected on a 36-yard field goal on fourth-and-10 from the 18, but the Patriots were assessed a nine-yard penalty on the kick, giving the Dolphins a first-and-goal from the 9. The Dolphins opened a 16-0 lead with 1:11 remaining in the first half on a Mare 40-yard field goal. The Dolphins got to the Patriots' 33 on the opening series of the second half, but that threat was thwarted when Tedy Bruschi forced the ball loose from Ricky Williams and Victor Green recovered the fumble at the Patriots' 32. That led to a 34-yard touchdown pass from Brady to David Patten. The pass for the two-point conversion was incomplete. The Dolphins answered two possessions later when Fiedler connected with Randy McMichael for a one-yard touchdown pass with 1:05 to play in the third quarter. The scoring pass capped a 10-play, 74-yard drive that consumed 5:29 of the clock and saw Fiedler complete five of six passes for 69 yards, including a 35-yard strike to James McKnight to the Patriots' 3. The Patriots were at the Dolphins' 33 early in the fourth quarter before Sam Madison picked off a Brady pass to end the drive and preserve the Dolphins' 17-point lead. New England responded with an eight-play, 80-yard drive that ended with a 25-yard TD pass from Brady to Patten with 4:41 remaining in the contest. The ensuing onside kick went out of bounds, and the Dolphins then moved 27 yards in eight plays to set up a 33-yard field goal by Mare. Williams established a Dolphins single-game regular season record with 36 rushing attempts, while also amassing his fourth 100-yard rushing game of the season.

In a Sunday night contest, the Dolphins won for sixth straight time over the Broncos, improving their record to 7-0-1 in the last eight meetings with Denver. The Broncos posted the first points of the game 2:51 into the contest on a Jason Elam 33-yard field goal. The score was set up by a 56-yard kickoff return by Kevin Kasper to the Dolphins' 39. On the first play from scrimmage, however, Pat Williams recovered a Lucas fumble at the 38, leading to a nine-play 34-yard drive that resulted in a Mike Hollis 46-yard field goal with 1:39 remaining in the first quarter. The Dolphins were at the Bills' 21 on the following series, but Nate Clements intercepted a Lucas pass and returned it 10 yards to the 24. Two plays afterward, Drew Bledsoe connected with Eric Moulds for a 70-yard touchdown pass. Miami answered with a 13-play, 46-yard drive that ended with an Olindo Mare 42-yard field goal, 4:57 prior to the half. Ricky Williams rushed for 28 of the 46 yards on the march. Buffalo re-gained the lead for good with 2:23 to play in the first half when Clements picked off his second pass of the day and brought it back 29 yards for a score. Travis Minor returned the opening kickoff of the second half 46 yards to the Bills' 46, and the Dolphins made it to the Buffalo 28 before Clements snared his third interception of the game, at the Bills' 8. The Bills could not capitalize off that turnover, but opened a ten-point advantage with 4:16 to play in the third quarter on Hollis' second field goal of the day, from 26 yards out, culminating a seven-play, 58-yard drive. The Dolphins got to the Bills' 35 on the ensuing series, but could not come away with any points as they failed to convert a fake field goal attempt on fourth-and-3. They were at the Bills' 35 two possessions later, but that threat came to an abrupt halt when London Fletcher recovered a Lucas fumble, the Dolphins' fifth turnover of the afternoon. Another Bills interception, this one by Eddie Robinson, came with just less than a minute to play in the game and made it six turnovers, the most by the Dolphins in a regular season game since 1998. That final turnover occurred one play after Hollis tallied his third field goal of the game, a 44-yarder with 1:12 left on the clock.

The Bills swept the season series from the Dolphins in a game where the fourth quarter was played in a driving snowstorm. With a game-time temperature of 25 degrees, it marked the eighth-coldest game in Dolphins history and the coldest since 1992. The Dolphins first possession of the game started at the Bills' 45 after they pinned Buffalo deep in its territory on the initial series of the contest, on the strength of two sacks. On Miami's first play from scrimmage, Ricky Williams broke loose for a 45-yard TD run to give the Dolphins a 7-0 lead. The Bills then marched 54 yards in 12 plays en route to a 39-yard field goal by Mike Hollis. Travis Henry rushed for 26 yards on five carries on the drive. The Dolphins took an 11-point lead just six seconds before the end of the first quarter on a one-yard TD pass from Ray Lucas to Jed Weaver. Williams went up the middle for a 17-yard gain on the first play of the drive, and then Lucas went on to complete all five of his pass attempts, totaling 42 yards. The Bills scored their first touchdown of the afternoon on a Drew Bledsoe two-yard run on third-and-goal, with 3:37 remaining in the opening half. The score capped an eight-play, 45-yard drive in which the Dolphins were penalized three times for 31 yards. The Bills claimed their first lead of the afternoon with 11 seconds to play in the first half when Bledsoe connected with Peerless Price for a 20-yard touchdown. The score occurred four plays after Ron Edwards stripped the ball from Lucas on fourth-and-4 from the Bills' 36. Chidi Ahanotu then recovered the fumble and returned it 17 yards to the Dolphins' 31. The Bills were at the Dolphins' 36 on their first series of the second half, but Jason Taylor sacked Bledsoe for a 12-yard loss on fourth-and-3. The Bills had an opportunity to go up by six points with 7:01 to play in the third quarter, but Hollis missed wide right on a 46-yard field goal attempt. Three plays afterward, Williams gave the Dolphins a 21-17 lead on a 55-yard burst up the middle. Buffalo answered two plays later on a 73-yard touchdown pass from Bledsoe to Price. The Bills went up by 10 points 2:34 later on as 57-yard TD pass from Bledsoe to Eric Moulds, one play after Antoine Winfield recovered a Randy McMichael fumble. Buffalo forced their second turnover in as many series when Nate Clements intercepted a Jay Fiedler pass and returned it one yard to the Bills' 39. Four plays later Bledsoe and Moulds hooked up for a 47-yard completion to the Dolphins' 3. That led to a Travis Henry one-yard touchdown run, three plays afterward, as Buffalo notched its third straight touchdown drive. Williams finished the day with 228 yards rushing and a pair of scores on 27 attempts as he broke two Dolphins rushing records. He surpassed Lamar Smith's single-game record of 209 yards, which was achieved in a First-Round Playoff game on December 30, 2000 against Indianapolis. He also moved past Delvin Williams as the clubs' single-season leader, as he eclipsed Delvin's mark of 1,258, achieved in 1978.

Miami recorded its 37th win on Monday Night Football, the most in MNF history. The Dolphins penetrated the Bears' 20 on their initial series of the game, but a fumble at the Bears' 7 ended the threat. On the next play from scrimmage, Brock Marion picked off a Jim Miller pass at the Bears' 38. That led to a four-play, 38-yard drive that ended with a Jed Weaver five-yard TD reception from Jay Fiedler, who was making his first start at quarterback since sustaining a fractured right thumb at Denver on October 13. The key play came on the first play of the drive when Fiedler connected with Chris Chambers for a 26-yard completion to the Bears' 12. The Dolphins had a chance to extend their lead early in the second quarter, but after Ricky Williams broke off an 18-yard run to the Bears' 12, Brian Urlacher stripped him of the ball and R.W. McQuarters recovered the fumble in the end zone. Miami doubled their advantage with 4:12 to play in the first half on a 15-yard scoring run by Williams, capping a seven-play, 84-yard drive in which Fiedler completed three of his four pass attempts, totaling 53 yards. Bobbie Howard intercepted a Fiedler pass on the first series of the second half, putting the Bears at the Dolphins' 36. That resulted in the Bears' first score of the night, a Paul Edinger 52-yard field goal, four plays afterward. The Dolphins took a commanding 18-point lead two plays later when Williams went over right tackle for a career-long 63-yard touchdown run. The Bears got as far as the Dolphins' 18 early in the fourth quarter, but were stopped by the Dolphins on fourth-and-1. Jamar Fletcher intercepted a Chris Chandler pass midway through the final period that he returned 30 yards to the Bears' 10. That led to an Olindo Mare 23-yard field goal four plays later. Mare added his second field goal in as many series, from 29 yards out, with 5:41 to play in the game, four plays after Adewale Ogunleye sacked Chandler, forced the ball loose and recovered at the Bears' 18. Chicago notched its lone touchdown of the night on a six-yard TD pass from Henry Burris to Marty Booker with 44 seconds remaining in the game.

Miami secured its sixth straight winning season, its tenth in the last 11 seasons and 26th overall. The Dolphins got on the board first on an Olindo Mare 25-yard field goal, 4:36 into the game, four plays after Jay Fiedler connected with Chris Chambers for a 40-yard completion to the Raiders' 11. The Dolphins started the scoring drive at their own 44 after Jason Taylor recorded a pair of sacks for 13 yards in losses on consecutive plays on the Raiders' opening drive. Oakland tied the game less than four minutes afterward on a Sebastian Janikowski 26-yard field goal. The drive began at the Dolphins' 13 when Anthony Dorsett recovered a Ricky Williams fumble. The Dolphins re-gained the lead on the ensuing series when Fiedler hit Cris Carter for a five-yard TD pass on third-and-goal. The five-play scoring drive began at the Raiders' 46 following a 41-yard kickoff return by Travis Minor. The first play was a 29-yard completion to Chambers, which put the Dolphins at the 17. The Dolphins took a 14-point advantage with 5:01 to play in the first half when Minor capped a 13-play, 97-yard drive that used 7:53 of the clock, with a four-yard touchdown run. Fiedler completed all five of his passes totaling 56 yards on the march, which was the Dolphins' longest since September 24, 1989 when they put together a 99-yard TD drive. The Raiders then responded with a nine-play, 48-yard drive that ended with a 38-yard field goal by Janikowski. Tyrone Wheatley carried the ball three times for 27 yards en route to the score. The Raiders' first series of the second half resulted in Janikowski's third field goal of the afternoon, from 45 yards out, closing Miami's lead to eight points. The Dolphins answered on their next possession with a 14-play, 57-yard drive that ended with a 27-yard field goal by Mare. The Dolphins converted three third downs on the drive. The Raiders scored their first touchdown of the game on the first play of the fourth quarter when Rich Gannon connected with Jerry Porter for a 20-yard TD pass, capping an eight-play, 80-yard drive in which Gannon completed seven of eight passes for 90 yards. Gannon and Porter combined for the two-point conversion. The Dolphins had a chance to expand their lead, but Mare's 40-yard field goal with 8:48 to play in the game went wide right. With less than five minutes to play in the game, Trent Gamble jarred the ball loose from Tim Brown on a punt return, and Ed Perry recovered at the Raiders' 39. That led to a 41-yard field goal by Mare, five plays later, with 2:28 to play in the game. The outcome was sealed when Patrick Surtain intercepted a Gannon pass and returned it 22 yards to the Dolphins' 40.

In a Saturday afternoon contest, the Dolphins dropped their fourth straight road game and their fifth in seven outings on the season. The Dolphins took a 7-0 lead on the game's fifth play from scrimmage when Jay Fiedler connected with Chris Chambers for a 59-yard TD pass. The Vikings got to the Dolphins' 20 on the ensuing series, but Sam Madison intercepted a Daunte Culpepper pass in the end zone to thwart the threat. Minnesota was at the Dolphins' 30 early in the second quarter, but Jay Williams stripped Culpepper of the ball on a sack, and Jason Taylor recovered at the Dolphins' 31. On the next play from scrimmage, however, Jack Brewer intercepted a Fiedler pass at the Vikings' 25. Minnesota then embarked on a 12-play, 58-yard drive that ended with a Gary Anderson 35-yard field goal with 4:21 remaining in the first half. Four plays later, Lance Johnstone recovered a James McKnight fumble at the Dolphins' 37. Minnesota made it as far as the Dolphins' 11 before a pair of penalties pushed them back 20 yards. Brock Marion then picked off a Culpepper pass in the end zone with 21 seconds left in the first half. The Vikings took the ball on the opening series of the second half and moved 78 yards in 13 plays, consuming 7:15 of the clock, en route to a Moe Williams three-yard TD run. Culpepper completed five of seven passes for 52 yards on the scoring march. The Vikings were assessed a 15-yard unsportsmanlike conduct penalty on the touchdown, forcing Minnesota to kick off from the 15. The Dolphins then took over at their own 44 and put together a 10-play, 56-yard drive that used 6:26 and ended with a three-yard TD pass from Fiedler to Jed Weaver, as Miami re-gained its four-point advantage. Two plays prior to the score, the Vikings were called for an unnecessary roughness penalty after they had stopped Miami on third-and-15 from the 16, giving the Dolphins a first-and-goal from the three-yard line. The Vikings responded with a nine-play, 80-yard drive that was capped by a 13-yard TD pass from Randy Moss to D'Wayne Bates on third-and-goal, 3:07 into the fourth quarter. The key play was a 60-yard completion from Culpepper to Moss three plays prior to the score, on third-and-14 from the Vikings' 30. The Dolphins tied the game on an Olindo Mare 25-yard field goal on the ensuing possession, with 6:09 to play in the game. The 10-play, 45-yard drive began at the Dolphins' 48 following a 45-yard kickoff return by Travis Minor. The key play was a 15-yard completion from Fiedler to Cris Carter on third-and-seven from the Dolphins' 36. The game-winning points came via the foot of Anderson, who booted a 53-yard field goal with 17 seconds on the game clock, capping a 12-play, 45-yard drive in which the Vikings converted on fourth-and-2 from the Dolphins' 45 four plays prior to the field goal. Culpepper completed all four of his pass attempts, totaling 39 yards, on the march. Taylor finished the game with 1.5 sacks, the eighth consecutive game in which he recorded a sack. It also gave him 18.5 on the year, tying him with Bill Stanfill (18.5 in 1973) for the top spot on the Dolphins' career chart.

New England denied the Dolphins a chance to win the AFC East title. Along with the Jets' 42-17 victory over Green Bay later in the day, the Dolphins were eliminated from the playoffs for the first time since 1996. The Patriots were at the Dolphins' 33 midway through the first quarter, when Zach Thomas recovered a Tom Brady fumble that was forced by Adewale Ogunleye, and returned it 22 yards to the New England 49. Miami then advanced to the Patriots' 33 before opting to punt on fourth-and-five. The Dolphins notched the first points of the game with 3:17 to play in the first quarter on an eight-yard TD run by Ricky Williams. The score occurred two plays after Chris Chambers picked up 45 yards on an end-around, which opened the 64-yard drive. The Dolphins made it two touchdowns in as many possessions with 8:52 remaining in the first half when Williams capped a nine-play, 87-yard drive with a 14-yard TD run, his 16th rushing touchdown of the year, a Dolphins single-season record. Including the scoring run, Williams rushed for 55 yards on five attempts on the drive. The Patriots cut the Dolphins' lead in half with 2:25 left in the opening half when Antowain Smith scored on a 11-yard run, culminating a seven-play, 58-yard drive. Miami responded with a six-play, 76-yard drive that ended with a 32-yard TD pass from Jay Fiedler to James McKnight, 1:06 prior to the half. The key play occurred on the second play of the drive when Williams broke loose for a 30-yard gain to the New England 46. The Patriots closed out the half with a seven-play, 47-yard drive that was capped by an Adam Vinatieri 41-yard field goal as time expired. New England got to within eight points of the lead with 3:37 to play in the third quarter on a 36-yard field goal by Vinatieri. The Patriots started the 11-play, 45-yard drive at their own 37 after Olindo Mare missed short on a 47-yard field goal attempt. The Patriots also converted a pair of third downs en route to the field goal. The Dolphins opened an 11-point advantage with 4:59 to play in the game on an Olindo Mare 28-yard field goal, six plays after Brock Marion intercepted a Brady pass that was first tipped by Thomas and returned it nine yards to the Patriots' 31. New England got the ball back at their own 32 and embarked on a 10-play drive that ended with a three-yard TD pass from Brady to Troy Brown with 2:46 to play in the game. Brady connected with Christian Fauria for the two-point conversion to close the margin to three points. After stopping the Dolphins at their own 11 on the ensuing series, the Patriots took over at the Miami 34-yard line with 2:11 left on the game clock. Four plays afterward, New England evened the contest on Vinatieri's third field goal of the afternoon, from 43 yards away with 1:09 to play, sending the game into overtime. The Patriots won the toss and began the period's only series at their own 40 after the kickoff went out of bounds. The Patriots then moved 43 yards in seven plays, setting up Vinatieri's game-winning field goal, a 35-yarder, 2:03 into overtime. The key play was a 20-yard pass from Brady to Kevin Faulk, which put the Patriots at the Dolphins' 25, four plays prior to the score.

HOME SWEET HOME

The Dolphins compiled a regular season record of 7-1 at Pro Player Stadium in 2002, marking the second straight year and third time in the last five seasons (1998) that they amassed this many home wins in one season. This record is tied for the sixth-best regular season winning percentage that the Dolphins have turned in at home, trailing only the five years in which they went undefeated (8-0 in 1985; 7-0 in 1972-74; 4-0 in 1982).

TAKE IT AWAY

For the Dolphins, the takeaway/giveaway ratio is the statistical category that has had the biggest correlation between wins and losses. Since 1996, the Dolphins are 48-12 in games where they have claimed the turnover battle, and 7-30 in games where their opponent has held the advantage in that department. In Miami's 67 regular season victories over the last seven years, the Dolphins are a combined plus-93 in the takeaway/giveaway ratio. In their 45 losses, they are a composite minus-67 in that category. This trend is even more pronounced over the last three years, during Dave Wannstedt's tenure as head coach. During this time (including playoffs), they are plus-41 in the takeaway/giveaway ratio in their 32 wins and minus-44 in their 19 losses. Their point differential off turnovers in their 32 wins is plus-145, while it stands at minus-204 in their 19 defeats.

The Dolphins dropped their preseason opener in a game that culminated two days of practices between these teams at Disney's Wide World of Sports Complex in Lake Buena Vista. The Bucs took a 7-0 lead 16 seconds into the game when Frank Murphy fielded the opening kickoff and went 95 yards for a touchdown. Miami made it into Tampa Bay territory on its second series of the game, but could not convert when Olindo Mare's 52-yard field goal attempt fell short of the crossbar. The Bucs took over at their own 42, and on the next play, Michael Pittman broke loose for a 38-yard run to the Dolphins' 20. Four plays later, though, Martin Gramatica's 34-yard field goal attempt missed wide left. Tampa Bay forged ahead by 14 points on the first snap of the second quarter when Rob Johnson found Keenan McCardell in the end zone for a four-yard TD pass, capping a six-play, 62-yard drive which started with a 20-yard pass from Johnson to Ken Dilger followed by a 15-yard unnecessary roughness penalty on the Dolphins. Miami came back to cut the lead in half with 7:01 to play in the first half on a five-yard scoring strike from Ray Lucas to Dedric Ward, culminating a nine-play, 80-yard drive that used 3:34 of the clock and saw Lucas complete four of six passes for 64 yards, including two for 52 yards to Robert Baker, with both completions coming on consecutive plays. The Dolphins re-gained possession at their own 40 with 3:40 to play in the half, and traveled 59 yards to the Bucs' 1 before John Howell recovered a Travis Minor fumble on first-and-goal with 55 seconds remaining. Tampa Bay was at the Dolphins' 20 on their initial series of the second half, but a sack of Bucs QB Shaun King by Adewale Ogunleye pushed them back to the 29, and Rob Hart's 48-yard field goal attempt was wide right. Following the miss, the Dolphins took over at their own 38 and were at the Bucs' 11 before Mare's 30-yard field goal try hit the right upright. Mare made good on his first field goal of 2002 on the second play of the fourth quarter when he hit on a 43-yarder, capping a six-play, 34-yard drive. After that, the Dolphins were able to run just nine offensive plays in the final period as Tampa Bay controlled the clock for 12:03 by recording seven first downs.

Miami earned its initial victory of the preseason in the first-ever game at Reliant Stadium. The Dolphins opened the scoring on a one-yard touchdown run by Ricky Williams with 6:20 to play in the first quarter. After initially being hit before the goal line, Williams spun off a would-be tackler into the end zone. A 22-yard pass from Jay Fiedler to Chris Chambers on third-and-10 from midfield highlighted the 13-play, 61-yard drive that used 7:07 of the clock. The Dolphins scored for the second time in as many series on the first play of the second quarter when Rob Konrad capped a seven-play, 68-yard drive with a four-yard touchdown run. The Dolphins recorded back-to-back wins in the preseason for the first time since taking their last three decisions of 2000. Miami opened the game with an inside kick that was recovered by Patrick Surtain. The Dolphins then traveled 40 yards in nine plays en route to an Olindo Mare 34-yard field goal. The key play

of the drive was a 22-yard completion from Jay Fiedler to Oronde Gadsden on third-and-9 that put the Dolphins at the Bears' 18. Chicago took the lead on the next play from scrimmage as Jim Miller hit Dez White for an 80-yard touchdown strike. After the Dolphins' next series resulted in a three-and-out, Adewale Ogunleye sacked Miller, forcing the ball loose which was recovered by Shawn Wooden at the Bears' 34. For Ogunleye, it was his seventh sack of the preseason, as he established a new Dolphins preseason record in that category. On the first play following the fumble recovery, Ray Lucas connected with James McKnight for a 13-yard pass, and three plays after that, Travis Minor scored on a 15-yard run, on third-and-4. Miami scored for the second time in as many series when Lucas and McKnight combined for a nine-yard touchdown strike, on third-and-goal, 4:12 into the second quarter. The score capped a 12-play, 80-yard drive in which Lucas completed six of eight passes for 62 yards. Chicago cut Miami's lead to three points on its initial possession of the second half when Adrian Peterson scored on a two-yard touchdown run, culminating an 11-play, 80-yard drive that consumed 6:01 of the clock. Peterson ran for 46 yards on seven attempts during the course of the drive. The Dolphins answered 4:41 later, with 11 seconds to play in the third quarter, when Obafemi Ayanbadejo went over right guard for an eight-yard touchdown run. Quarterback Sage Rosenfels completed all four pass attempts, totaling 48 yards, on the drive, including a 26-yard completion to Leonard Henry on the play prior to the score. The Bears narrowed the gap to just two points 6:33 into the final frame when Eric McCoo scored on a one-yard run on fourth-and-goal, which was followed by a pass from Ken Mastrole to Edell Shepherd for the two-point conversion. The 13-play, 60-yard drive had McCoo rushing for 32 yards on nine attempts. Chicago's final offensive series of the game ended at the Dolphins' 45 before being forced to punt. Miami was able to run out the final 3:45 of the game by converting a pair of third downs.

MONDAY NIGHT MADNESS IN MIAMI

In their history, the Dolphins have appeared on ABC Monday Night Football a total of 67 times, the most of any NFL team, and six games ahead of the Dallas Cowboys, whose 61 games are second-most in the 33-year history of MNF. In those 67 contests, the Dolphins have compiled a record of 37-30, including a home record of 31-16 (13-12 at Pro Player Stadium) and a road register of 6-14. Their 37 victories also are the most in the history of MNF, one ahead of San Francisco, who has posted 36 victories. Since the inception of MNF in 1970, 1989 has been the only year in which the Dolphins have not make at least one Monday night appearance.

1965

- March 3 – Minneapolis lawyer Joseph Robbie meets AFL Commissioner Joe Foss in Washington, and Foss advises Robbie to apply for an expansion franchise in Miami.
- May 6 – Joseph Robbie meets Miami Mayor Robert King High to ascertain the availability of the Orange Bowl stadium, and the mayor agrees to invite the AFL to Miami.
- June 7 – AFL Executive Committee votes to expand in 1966 at a meeting in Monmouth Park, N.J.
- Aug. 16 – AFL awards its first expansion franchise to Joseph Robbie and television star Danny Thomas for \$7.5 million.
- Nov. 27 – Miami picks Kentucky QB Rick Norton and Illinois RB Jim Grabowski in first round of AFL's college draft. Tulsa WR Howard Twilley is selected in 12th round.
- Dec. 16 – Miami Dolphins, Ltd. organizes as a Florida limited partnership. Joseph Robbie becomes Managing General Partner and Danny Thomas Sports, Inc., becomes the other general partner.

1966

- Jan. 15 – Miami picks 31 players from eight teams in AFL expansion draft. One of the draftees, T Norm Evans of Houston, would play 10 seasons at right tackle.
- Jan. 29 – George Wilson becomes first head coach after eight years coaching the Detroit Lions (57-46-6 and NFL champions in 1957) and one year as a Washington assistant.
- June 8 – AFL merges into NFL with Pete Rozelle as commissioner. An AFL-NFL championship game is scheduled for the next January followed by a common draft.
- July 5 – Dolphins open first training camp at St. Petersburg Beach as 83 players report.
- Aug. 7 – Training camp moves to St. Andrews School in Boca Raton, Fla.
- Sept. 2 – Joe Auer returns opening kickoff 95 yards for Dolphin TD in first regular-season game, but Oakland wins, 23-14, at Orange Bowl before 26,776 spectators.
- Oct. 16 – Dolphins end string of nine losses (four in pre-season) by defeating Denver, 24-7, for first win in franchise history.
- Oct. 23 – Miami earns club's first road win with a 20-13 decision over Houston at Rice Stadium.

1967

- March 14 – Miami picks Purdue QB Bob Griese in first round of common draft. Griese is the fourth player selected.
- June 1 – Joseph Robbie and W. H. Keland purchase the interest of Danny Thomas and agree to equalize present holdings in Miami Dolphins, Ltd., whenever either acquires outside holdings.
- Aug. 19 – Record crowd of 50,822 sees first interleague game, which Atlanta wins, 27-17.
- Sept. 17 – QB John Stofa breaks his right ankle shortly after scoring a TD, and rookie Bob Griese directs 35-21 victory over Denver at Orange Bowl. RB Abner Haynes gains 151 yards in season opener. Griese throws 68-yard TD pass to Joe Auer.
- Nov. 26 – Dolphins end eight-game losing streak by defeating Buffalo, 17-14, on a fourth-down, 31-yard TD pass from Bob Griese to Howard Twilley with 1:01 remaining.

1968

- Jan. 30 – Miami picks Syracuse FB Larry Csonka in first round of draft. Csonka is the eighth player selected.
- Aug. 17 – Dolphins gain first interleague victory, 23-7 over Philadelphia at Orange Bowl.
- Aug. 31 – AFL-record crowd of 68,125 at Orange Bowl sees Coach Don Shula's Baltimore Colts win interleague game, 22-13.
- Nov. 24 – Rookie strong safety Dick Anderson returns interception 96 yards for TD in 34-10 victory over Boston at Fenway Park.
- Dec. 8 – QB Bob Griese sets then-club records with 2,473 yards, 186 completions and 21 TDs for season after directing 38-7 victory over Boston at Orange Bowl. Griese misses final game due to bruised knee.

1969

- March 24 – Miami obtains all-time AFL middle linebacker Nick Buoniconti from Boston in trade for QB Kim Hammond and LB John Bramlett.
- May 10 – Pro football realignment for 1970 places Dolphins in AFC East with Boston, Buffalo, New York Jets and NFL's Baltimore.
- May 16 – Joseph Robbie becomes majority owner of Dolphins when he is joined by five Miami businessmen in purchasing the interest of W. H. Keland.
- July 2 – Miami obtains G Larry Little, a native of Miami, from San Diego in trade for CB Mack Lamb.
- Sept. 14 – QB Bob Griese passes for a then-record 327 yards and rookie Mercury Morris returns kickoff 105 yards for TD, but Dolphins lose season opener, 27-21 at Cincinnati.
- Oct. 26 – Dolphins notch first victory after 0-4-1 start as LB Nick Buoniconti helps restrict rookie O.J. Simpson to 12 yards on 10 carries. Miami wins 24-6 over Buffalo at Orange Bowl.
- Nov. 9 – Only 8,374 spectators brave a downpour at Boston College and FB Larry Csonka splashes 54 yards for TD in 17-16 victory over Patriots. QB Bob Griese injures right knee, putting him out for final five games.

1970

- Jan. 27 – Miami obtains WR Paul Warfield from Cleveland in trade for 1970 first-round draft pick.
- Feb. 18 – Don Shula, 40, becomes head coach and vice president after seven years coaching the Baltimore Colts (71-23-4). He succeeds George Wilson, who coached the Dolphins for four years (15-39-2).
- April 11 – Dolphins join scouting combine BLESTO-V.
- April 13 – NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle gives the Dolphins' 1971 first-round draft pick to Baltimore as compensation for loss of Don Shula.
- April 20 – Don Shula completes coaching staff with Mike Scarry (defensive line), Monte Clark (offensive line), Bill Arnsparger (defensive coordinator), Howard Schnellenberger (offensive coordinator), Carl Taseff (offensive backs) and holdover Tom Keane (defensive backs).
- April 25 – Don Shula meets 47 players for indoctrination camp at University of Miami.
- July 12 – Rookies report to new training headquarters at Biscayne College in North Miami.
- Aug. 29 – Record crowd of 76,712 sees fourth consecutive pre-season victory, 20-13 over Baltimore.
- Oct. 3 – Dolphins post first-ever victory over Oakland, 20-13, as WR Paul Warfield catches two TD passes.
- Oct. 10 – Dolphins post first-ever victory over New York Jets, 20-6, and QB Joe Namath (93-161 for 1,506 yards and 12 TDs in eight previous meetings), 20-6.
- Dec. 20 – Dolphins extend winning streak to six games and clinch franchise's first playoff berth with 45-7 victory over Buffalo at Orange Bowl.
- Dec. 27 – Dolphins drop a 21-14 decision to the Oakland Raiders at the Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum in club's first-ever playoff game.

1971

- Sept. 1 – Miami obtains LB Bob Matheson from Cleveland in trade for 1972 second-round pick and Matheson later becomes key to the 53 Defense.
- Oct. 17 – QB Bob Griese sets NFL record with three consecutive passes for TDs in first quarter of 41-3 victory over New England at Orange Bowl.
- Nov. 7 – Dolphins post first-ever shutout, 34-0 over Buffalo at Orange Bowl, although Bills gained 364 yards.
- Dec. 19 – Record regular-season crowd of 74,215 paid sees Dolphins win first AFC East title by defeating Green Bay, 27-6. FB Larry Csonka becomes club's first 1,000-yard rusher with 1,051 yards, and placekicker Garo Yepremian leads NFL with 117 points.
- Dec. 25 – Dolphins win longest game (82 minutes, 40 seconds) in pro football history, 27-24 at Kansas City, as Garo Yepremian kicks 37-yard field goal in second overtime of AFC semifinal playoff. The victory marked the first postseason win in franchise history.

1972

- Jan. 2 – Dolphins stymie Baltimore, 21-0, for first AFC Championship before 78,629 spectators at Orange Bowl. Colts are scoreless for first time in 97 games and strong safety Dick Anderson returns interception 62 yards for TD.

- Jan. 16 – Dallas rushes for 252 yards in defeating Dolphins 24-3 in Super Bowl VI before 81,035 spectators at Tulane Stadium in New Orleans.
- April 25 – Dolphins claim 16-year pro QB Earl Morrall, age 38, on waivers from Baltimore.
- Oct. 1 – Dolphins end season ticket sale at record 69,303.
- Oct. 15 – QB Earl Morrall replaces injured Bob Griese (broken right leg, dislocated ankle) at Orange Bowl and finishes 24-10 victory over San Diego for 5-0 record.
- Nov 12 – Don Shula becomes first NFL coach to win 100 regular-season games in 10 seasons as Dolphins smother New England, 52-0, with 501 total yards at Orange Bowl.
- Dec. 16 – Dolphins achieve NFL's first 14-0 regular-season record and break NFL rushing record with 2,960 yards by defeating Baltimore 16-0 at Orange Bowl.
- Dec. 31 – QB Bob Griese comes off bench in 7-7 battle in third quarter after 10-game absence and rallies Dolphins to 21-17 victory at Pittsburgh to repeat as AFC Champions.

1973

- Jan. 14 – Dolphins cap a perfect season in Super Bowl VII at Los Angeles by defeating Washington 14-7 for NFL's first unbeaten, untied record. A 28-yard TD pass from Bob Griese to Howard Twilley and interceptions by LB Nick Buoniconti and safety Jake Scott are key plays. Scott, who recorded two interceptions on the day, is named game's MVP, becoming the first defensive back to earn such recognition.
- April 18 – Dolphins surpass NFL record with 74,961 season ticket sales. Kansas City held old record of 72,855 in 1972.
- Sept. 30 – RB Mercury Morris sets single-game rushing record of 197 yards on 15 carries with three TDs (24, 70, 35) in 44-23 win over New England at Orange Bowl.
- Nov. 11 – Dolphins shut out Baltimore for fourth consecutive time, 44-0, as CB Tim Foley returns two blocked punts for TDs at Orange Bowl.
- Dec. 15 – WR Paul Warfield catches four TD passes (21, 7, 16, 4) from Bob Griese in first half of 34-7 victory over Detroit at Orange Bowl. Dolphins compile best two-year record (26-2) in NFL history.
- Dec. 30 – Dolphins rush for 266 yards in defeating Oakland 27-10 for unprecedented third straight AFC Championship at Orange Bowl.

1974

- Jan. 13 – Dolphins overpower Minnesota 24-7 in Super Bowl VIII at Rice Stadium in Houston for second consecutive NFL Championship. FB Larry Csonka gains 145 yards on 33 carries as Dolphins outscore three playoff foes, 85-33. Csonka is honored as game's MVP.
- Jan. 20 – Garo Yepremian kicks five field goals for AFC, including 42- yarder with 21 seconds remaining, for 15-13 victory in Pro Bowl at Kansas City. Yepremian becomes the first Dolphin to be named MVP of the Pro Bowl.
- March 31 – FB Larry Csonka, WR Paul Warfield and RB Jim Kiick sign \$3.3 million package deal in Toronto to play for John Bassett in World Football League.
- July 1 – NFL Players Association declares strike, and Dolphin Managing General Partner Joseph Robbie charges NFLPA with search and destroy mission.
- July 10 – Chicago Tribune Charities cancels July 26 College All-Star Game with Dolphins due to strike.
- July 17 – Seven veterans cross picket line: C Jim Langer, S Jake Scott, TE Jim Mandich, LB Bob Matheson, QB Earl Morrall and RBs Don Nottingham and Mercury Morris.
- Aug. 14 – Strike ends after seven weeks.
- Nov. 17 – Dolphins outlast Buffalo 35-28 at Orange Bowl on 23-yard TD by Don Nottingham with 19 seconds remaining; third time in season that Dolphins score winning points with less than 20 seconds to play.
- Dec. 2 – FB Larry Csonka gains 100 yards for 19th time with 123 yards in 24-3 victory over Cincinnati at Orange Bowl; is Miami's seventh consecutive win on Monday night TV.
- Dec. 15 – Dolphins rally from 24-point deficit to defeat New England 34-27 for 31st consecutive victory (excluding pre-season) at Orange Bowl. QB Earl Morrall passes for 288 yards as Miami closes with 11-3 record.
- Dec. 21 – Raiders spoil Dolphins' bid for third consecutive NFL Championship, 28-26, in AFC semifinal at Oakland on 8-yard TD pass from Ken Stabler to Clarence Davis with 26 seconds remaining.

1975

- Sept. 22 – Winning streak at Orange Bowl stops at 31 games after 31-21 loss to Oakland.

- Oct. 19 – Dolphins intercept Jets QB Joe Namath six times in 43-0 victory at New York.
- Oct. 22 – World Football League folds after losing \$30 million, but three ex-Dolphins remain under contract to John Bassett.
- Nov. 23 – QB Bob Griese suffers torn tendons in right foot during third quarter of 33-17 loss to Baltimore at Orange Bowl.
- Dec. 14 – Dolphins suffer 10-7 loss in overtime at Baltimore on 31-yard FG by Toni Linhart and miss qualifying for playoffs for first time in six years under Don Shula.

1976

- Jan. 22 – Prescription Athletic Turf (grass) approved for Orange Bowl stadium at a cost of \$244,500.
- March 30 – Seattle selects Dolphin original T Norm Evans in expansion draft; Tampa Bay selects LBs Bruce Elia and Doug Swift, who retires to enter medical school.
- Sept. 26 – Dolphins face QB Joe Namath of New York Jets for last time and post 16-0 shutout at Orange Bowl.
- Oct. 17 – WR Howard Twilley, last of Dolphin originals, surpasses 3,000 career yards with eight catches for 104 yards in 20-17 overtime loss to Kansas City at Orange Bowl.
- Dec. 5 – WR Freddie Solomon gains 252 yards in three-TD spectacular that includes 79-yard punt return, 53-yard pass play and 59-yard flanker reverse in 45-27 victory over Buffalo Bills at Orange Bowl.

1977

- March 14 – Dolphins agree to 10-year lease for use of Orange Bowl with three-year cancellation notice. New lease doubles rent to \$45,000 per game, but is less than City of Miami's proposed 10 percent of gross ticket sales.
- May 2 – QB Earl Morrall, age 43, who spent five seasons with the Dolphins, retires after a 21-year career. Morrall passed for 20,809 career yards and guided the Dolphins through most of undefeated 1972 season.
- Sept. 11 – QB Bob Griese, forced to wear eyeglasses because of problems with contact lenses, passes for two TDs in 27-21 pre-season victory at New York Giants.
- Nov. 24 – QB Bob Griese becomes first NFL quarterback since 1972 to throw six TD passes in a game, and Dolphins set records of 55 points and 503 yards in 55-14 rout on Thanksgiving Day at St. Louis.
- Dec. 5 – Rookie RB Leroy Harris gallops 77 yards for longest TD run in Dolphin history, capping a 17-6 victory over Baltimore at Orange Bowl.
- Dec. 15 – Maxwell Club of Philadelphia names QB Bob Griese as its Pro Player of Year.

1978

- Feb. 17 – Chuck Connor, 40, becomes Director of Player Personnel after three years of scouting for BLESTO. He succeeds Bobby Beathard, who resigned Feb. 7 to become general manager of the Washington Redskins.
- April 17 – Dolphins acquire RB Delvin Williams from San Francisco 49ers in exchange for WR Freddie Solomon, S Vern Roberson and picks in the first and fifth rounds of 1978 draft.
- Aug. 25 – QB Bob Griese suffers torn ligaments in left knee during 24-20 pre-season victory at Tampa Bay, and backup Don Strock guides Dolphins to 5-2 record before Griese returns as starter Oct. 22.
- Nov. 5 – A 17-point blitz in first quarter and five quarterback sacks enable Dolphins to upset defending Super Bowl champion Dallas Cowboys, 23-16 at Orange Bowl.
- Nov. 12 – Delvin Williams becomes first 1,000-yard rusher of 1978 with 144 yards and two TDs in 25-24 triumph at Buffalo, marking 18th straight win over Bills. Williams sets Dolphin record of 1,258 yards rushing in season.
- Dec. 10 – LB Larry Gordon intercepts three passes in 23-6 rout of Oakland Raiders at Orange Bowl to clinch wild-card berth in playoffs.
- Dec. 18 – Garo Yepremian ties NFL record with 16th consecutive field goal, capping 23-3 victory over New England and boosting Dolphins to 11-5 record.

1979

- Jan. 8 – Howard Schnellenberger, receivers and passing game coach, is named head coach at the University of Miami.
- Feb. 22 – FB Larry Csonka, 32, re-signs with Dolphins as a free agent after four-year absence in World Football League (1975) and with NFL's New York Giants (1976-78).

- Oct. 14 – Tony Nathan escapes on record 86-yard punt return for TD as Dolphins defeat Buffalo, 17-7, for 20th consecutive win in series.
- Nov. 29 – QB Bob Griese, benched in favor of Don Strock for second straight game, rallies Dolphins to 26 points in second half for 39-24 victory over New England as FB Larry Csonka scores three TDs.
- Dec. 9 – QB Bob Griese completes 17 of 22 passes for 229 yards in 28-10 win at Detroit which clinches AFC East title.
- Dec. 30 – Pittsburgh overpowers Dolphins with 20-point first quarter in 34-14 playoff victory at Pittsburgh, and Steelers eventually win Super Bowl XIV.

1980

- Sept. 5 – Don Shula signs four-year contract through 1983 season, canceling old pact which had one year remaining.
- Sept. 21 – QB Bob Griese wins his 100th game, coming off bench and passing for two TDs in fourth quarter for 20-17 victory at Atlanta.
- Nov. 9 – Rookie QB David Woodley passes for three TDs and runs for another two TDs in stunning 35-14 upset of defending NFC champion Los Angeles Rams at Anaheim.

1981

- Feb. 5 – Six-time All-Pro guard Larry Little, 35, retires following a 14-year career which included 12 years with the Dolphins. He ended with 152 career starts.
- June 25 – QB Bob Griese, the 14th passer in football history to eclipse 25,000 yards, retires following a 14-year career with the Dolphins. He had presided over 101 of the 135 victories in the club's history (101-62-3) and was consensus All-Pro in 1971 and 1977. The six-time Pro Bowl quarterback held records of 1,926 completions in 3,429 attempts, 25,092 yards and 56.2 percent passing accuracy. He guided Miami to Super Bowl triumphs in 1972 and 1973.
- July 1 – Dolphin linebacker Rusty Chambers is killed in an automobile accident in Hammond, La.
- Sept. 10 – Rookie Tom Vigorito rambles 87 yards for record punt-return TD as Dolphins crush Pittsburgh 30-10 before 74,190 fans, the largest Orange Bowl crowd since 1975.
- Sept. 27 – Coach and son clash as Shula Bowl I has Don Shula opposed by Baltimore rookie punt returner David Shula. Dolphins outlast Colts 31-28 for fourth straight win in Baltimore.
- Oct. 4 – Wide receiver Nat Moore sets Dolphin record (since broken) with 210 receiving yards (on seven catches) as Miami and New York Jets play to 28-28 tie.
- Nov. 1 – Shula Bowl II, as the Dolphins defeat the Colts and David Shula 27-0 in Miami.
- Nov. 8 – Don Shula captures 200th NFL coaching victory when linebacker Bob Brudzinski intercepts pass in overtime to set up Uwe von Schamann for 30-yard field goal in 30-27 triumph at New England.

1982

- Jan. 2 – Dolphins overcome 24-0 deficit but succumb in overtime, 41-38, to San Diego in highest-scoring playoff game in history. Rolf Benirschke ends four-hour struggle with 29-yard field goal. It is the first game in NFL history where two quarterbacks, Miami reliever Don Strock and San Diego star Dan Fouts, both passed for more than 400 yards. Orange Bowl crowd of 73,735 comprised fourth sell-out of season.
- Sept. 21 – NFLPA calls players strike with games not resuming until November 21.
- Dec. 12 – In one of the most bizarre incidents in Miami Dolphin history, a work release parolee (Mark Henderson) cleared a space on the snow-frozen turf at New England's Sullivan Stadium that enabled the Patriots to kick a late fourth-quarter field goal and win the game 3-0 before 25,716 fans.
- Dec. 27 – The incredible record of not having won in 16 years in the Orange Bowl continued as the Dolphins scored 20 unanswered points in the second half to defeat the Buffalo Bills 27-10.

1983

- Jan. 8 – For the first time in nine years, the Dolphins win a playoff game, defeating the New England Patriots 28-13 before 68,842 fans at the Orange Bowl.
- Jan. 16 – The Dolphins choke off the San Diego Chargers famed offense and defeat them 34-13 before 71,383 fans. The Chargers were held to only 247 yards in total offense, 203 yards below their league-leading average. The win enabled the Dolphins to reach their fourth conference title game in team history and the first since the 1973 season.

- Jan. 23 – A.J. Duhe sets an AFC playoff record with three interceptions, including one for a 35-yard touchdown romp, as the Dolphins defeat the New York Jets for the third time in one season to win the AFC crown, 14-0.
- Jan. 30 – In Pasadena, California, the Dolphins appear in their fourth Super Bowl, and in spite of leading with only 10 minutes to play, they lose 27-17 to Washington before a sell out crowd of 103,667 at the Rose Bowl and a TV audience estimated at 115 million. Fulton Walker sets a Super Bowl record with a 98-yard kickoff return for a touchdown as he returns four kickoffs for a total of 190 yards.
- April 26 – The Dolphins select quarterback Dan Marino in the first-round of the 1983 draft (27th player overall).
- June 25 – Starting linebacker Larry Gordon dies of a rare heart disease while jogging in Arizona at the age of 28. Gordon had been the Dolphins' first-round draft choice in 1976 out of Arizona State.
- Oct. 9 – Quarterback Dan Marino and wide receiver Mark Duper make their first-ever starts for the Miami Dolphins, with Marino passing for 322 yards and Duper netting seven catches for 202 yards. The offensive explosion produces 971 total yards between the Dolphins and Bills, with Buffalo winning the Orange Bowl encounter, 38-35 in overtime.
- Nov. 28 – Dolphin Owner Joseph Robbie announces the signing of Head Coach Don Shula to a multi-year contract.
- Dec. 2 – Bill Arnsparger, the Dolphins' Assistant Head Coach and mastermind of the team's defense, resigns to become the head coach at Louisiana State University. His resignation is effective at the end of the season.
- Dec. 16 – With starting QB Dan Marino sidelined for the second consecutive game, Don Strock again steps in to help lead Miami to a 34-14 Orange Bowl win over the Jets. Safety Mike Kozlowski breaks open a close game when he returns two interceptions for touchdowns in a 61-second span in the fourth quarter. WR Mark Duper catches four passes for 71 yards to become the first Dolphin receiver to go over the 1,000-yard mark in a single season.
- Dec. 27 – The Dolphins name 54-year-old Chuck Studley as their Defense Coach to replace Bill Arnsparger. Studley had spent the 1983 season as defensive coordinator and then interim head coach of the Houston Oilers.

1984

- March 5 – Miami Dolphin Owner Joseph Robbie announces plans to build a new multi-purpose stadium in north Dade County. Mr. Robbie also announces acquisition of the land and discusses possible stadium funding.
- June 24 – Running back David Overstreet is killed in an automobile accident in Winona, Texas.
- Oct. 7 – The Dolphins beat Pittsburgh 31-7 to move Head Coach Don Shula into third place on the NFL's list for all-time winningest coaches.
- Oct. 21 – Wide receiver Nat Moore catches a 19-yard TD pass from QB Dan Marino for the 58th touchdown of his Dolphin career, surpassing Larry Csonka's all-time club record of 57.
- Nov. 11 – The Dolphins remain the NFL's only unbeaten team as they improve their record to 11-0 (16 straight regular-season wins) with a 24-23 victory over Philadelphia. DE Doug Betters' block of an Eagle PAT with 1:52 remaining in the game seals the win.
- Dec. 2 – The Dolphins lose a 45-34 decision to the Raiders, but QB Dan Marino breaks the all-time NFL record for TD passes in a season with his 37th. His record-breaking touchdown pass, which came on a four-yard toss to Jimmy Cefalo in the first quarter, was the first of four on the day for Marino as he reached the 40-touchdown plateau. He also shatters Dolphin single-game records for most yards passing (470), most completions (35) and most attempts (57).
- Dec. 17 – Miami ends the regular season with the best record in the AFC (14-2) following a 28-21 victory over Dallas. WR Mark Clayton catches three touchdown passes to give him 18 for the season as he eclipses the all-time NFL mark in that category. Dan Marino becomes the first-ever NFL quarterback to pass for over 5,000 yards in a season as he ends up with 5,084. The most prolific passing season in NFL history also consists of 48 touchdown passes, 564 attempts, 362 completions and only 17 interceptions for a franchise record passer rating of 108.9. Both Clayton (73-1,389) and WR Mark Duper (71-1,306) surpass prior Dolphin records for receptions and reception yardage in one season.
- Dec. 20 – QB Dan Marino is named as the NFL's Most Valuable Player by the Associated Press.

1985

- Jan. 6 – The Dolphins defeat the Steelers 45-28 in the AFC Championship game in Miami to earn a berth in Super Bowl XIX.

- Jan. 8 – Joseph Robbie gives the go-ahead to prepare final plans and specifications to construct the new 75,000-seat Dolphin Stadium.
- Jan. 20 – The Dolphins drop a 38-16 decision to the San Francisco 49ers in Super Bowl XIX before 84,059 fans at Stanford Stadium in Palo Alto, California.
- Feb. 15 – Miami names 42-year-old Mel Phillips as its new defensive backfield coach. Phillips comes to the Dolphins after five seasons in the same capacity for the Detroit Lions.
- March 14 – Following a presentation led by Joseph Robbie to NFL owners at the league meetings in Phoenix, Miami is selected as the site for Super Bowl XXIII (1989).
- Sept. 29 – In a game billed nationally as “Marino-Elway I,” Miami’s Dan Marino wins this one over Denver, 30-26, completing 25 of 43 passes for three TDs and a season-best 390 yards. Veteran WR Nat Moore also produces his top performance of 1985 with the 12th 100-yard game of his career. WR Vince Heflin’s first-ever NFL TD, a 46-yard catch, proves to be the game-winner.
- Oct. 9 – The Dolphins acquire All-Pro linebacker Hugh Green from Tampa Bay in exchange for a first- and second-round draft pick in 1986.
- Nov. 10 – Wide receiver Mark Duper, in his first game back after being sidelined for seven weeks with a broken leg, establishes a Dolphin record with 217 reception yards. In addition, his 50-yard scoring catch from Dan Marino with less than a minute remaining gives the Dolphins a 21-17 win over the Jets and the start of an eight-game winning streak.
- Dec. 1 – Owner Joseph Robbie officially breaks ground on the new 75,000-seat Dolphin Stadium.
- Dec. 2 – Led by a swarming defense that produces six sacks and three interceptions, the Dolphins administer the only defeat to be suffered by the eventual Super Bowl champion Chicago Bears, 38-24. A season-high Orange Bowl crowd of 75,594 witness the Monday night affair.
- Dec. 8 – The Dolphins record a 34-24 victory over the Green Bay Packers at Lambeau Field. The mercury at kickoff registers 23 degrees, marking the coldest conditions in which the Dolphins have won a game in franchise history.
- Dec. 31 – Owner Joseph Robbie obtains the construction loan and is granted permanent financing for the new Dolphin Stadium.

1986

- Jan. 4 – The Dolphins rally from a 21-3 deficit to defeat the Cleveland Browns 24-21 in an AFC divisional playoff game. Miami is led offensively by Tony Nathan’s 10 receptions for 101 yards and rookie Ron Davenport’s two touchdowns.
- Jan. 12 – Despite 20 tackles by LB Bob Brudzinski, the Dolphins commit six turnovers and lose 31-14 to the New England Patriots in the AFC Championship game before 74,978 fans in the Orange Bowl. It marks Miami’s first loss in an AFC title game in six tries.
- Jan. 21 – Dolphin C Dwight Stephenson is named the recipient of the NFL’s Man of the Year award at a press conference in New Orleans. The award is in recognition of Stephenson’s outstanding performance on the playing field and in the community.
- Jan. 22 – The Dolphins announce the retirement of Defensive Line Coach Mike Scary, a member of Don Shula’s staff since 1970. Dan Sekanovich, formerly of the Jets and Falcons, is named to replace him.
- Feb. 19 – Miami appoints Receivers and Quarterbacks Coach David Shula to the position of Assistant Head Coach. In addition, the club names Mike Westhoff as the Special Teams/Tight Ends Coach.
- June 3 – Owner Joseph Robbie plants a ceremonial 30-foot Royal Palm tree to begin a million dollar beautification project near Dolphin Stadium.
- Sept. 6 – Dan Marino signs a multi-year contract to remain as QB of the Dolphins. Two days before, Marino’s wife, Claire, had given birth to the couple’s first child – Daniel Charles.
- Sept. 21 – Miami suffers a heart-breaking 51-45 overtime loss to the N.Y. Jets in the Meadowlands as Dan Marino reaches 1,500 career attempts to qualify as the NFL’s top-ranked passer of all-time. Marino finishes the afternoon 30 of 50 for 448 yards and six TDs. The six TDs are a personal high for Marino and tie the team record held by Bob Griese. Mark Duper (154) and Mark Clayton (174) each have over 100 yards receiving in the game. Standout LB Hugh Green suffers a knee injury which sidelines him for the season.
- Oct. 12 – In what was billed as “Marino-Kelly I,” the Dolphins and Dan Marino (24 of 41 for 337 yards) defeat the Buffalo Bills and Jim Kelly (20 of 28 for 218 yards, two INTs) 27-14 at the Orange Bowl.
- Nov. 24 – The N.Y. Jets enter the Orange Bowl with a nine-game winning streak and the league’s best record at 10-1. They leave with a 45-3 loss as Lorenzo Hampton rushes for 148 yards and two TDs on 19 carries (7.8 average) including a 54-yard TD run. Hampton’s 100 yards snap a streak of 36 regular-season games (41 overall) for Miami

without a 100-yard rusher. Marino completes a personal-high 80.6 percent of his passes (29 of 36) for 288 yards and four TDs.

- Nov. 25 – Less than 24 hours after the memorable 45-3 win over the Jets, General Manager Mike Robbie announces at a press conference that Don Shula has signed a multi-year contract to remain as head coach.
- Dec. 14 – Dan Marino sets an NFL career record with the seventh 400-yard game of his career as he passes for 403 yards in a thrilling 37-31 overtime win in Anaheim, Calif., over the playoff-bound L.A. Rams. Marino completes 29 of 46 with five TDs, including a 20-yarder to Mark Duper in OT to win the game. Marino is named AFC Offensive Player of the Week for his efforts.
- Dec. 22 – The Dolphins play their final game in the Orange Bowl – a 34-27 loss to the New England Patriots. New England captures the AFC East title with the win. The Dolphins finish 21 years in the Orange Bowl with an impressive 110-38-3 (.738) regular-season record. Marino sets NFL single-season records for completions (378) and attempts (623).

1987

- Jan. 8 – Four former Dolphins – Bob Griese, Larry Csonka, Jim Langer and Larry Little – are among a group of 14 finalists under consideration for the 1987 class of enshrinees for the Pro Football Hall of Fame, it is announced by the Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio.
- Jan. 10 – John Offerdahl is named Old Spice NFL Rookie of the Year
- Jan. 20 – Tom Olivadotti, an assistant for the Cleveland Browns, is named Defensive Coach for Miami. He is put in charge of the overall defense with the prime responsibility of pass defense. Chuck Studley is re-assigned as Linebacker Coach, with prime responsibility of run defense. Linebacker Coach Bob Matheson resigns.
- Jan. 27 – Former Dolphin greats Larry Csonka and Jim Langer are among a group of seven named to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. They join Paul Warfield as the only members of the franchise to earn the honor, with induction scheduled for August 8.
- Aug. 16 – The Dolphins play host to the Chicago Bears in the first game ever played in Joe Robbie Stadium. The date marks the 22nd anniversary of the Dolphin franchise. The Bears put a damper on the festive evening with a 10-3 preseason victory before 63,451. QB Dan Marino (dislocated ring finger on right hand) and LB John Offerdahl (torn right bicep) suffer injuries. Marino is out for three weeks; Offerdahl will miss the first six regular-season games.
- Sept. 22 – NFL Players Association goes on strike; the Dolphins' home contest with New York Giants (first regular-season game in Joe Robbie Stadium) on September 27 is cancelled because of strike.
- Oct. 4 – The Dolphins' "replacement" team takes the field for the first time, traveling to Seattle to meet the Seahawks. The Dolphins lose, 24-20.
- Oct. 11 – Miami's replacement team records a 42-0 shutout victory over the Kansas City Chiefs in the first regular-season game played in Joe Robbie Stadium. Safety Liffort Hobley (two interceptions, 55-yard fumble recovery for a TD, four tackles, two passes defended) is named AFC defensive player of the week for his efforts. Don Shula and Joe Robbie are given game balls by the replacement team following the contest in honor of Miami's first win in the new stadium. The next week (October 18), the replacement team loses its last game, 37-31 in overtime, to the N.Y. Jets at the Meadowlands.
- Oct. 25 – After four missed weeks of action (one game cancellation, three replacement games), the regular Dolphin players return to action. Miami loses 34-31 in overtime at home to the Buffalo Bills. The 21-point comeback by Buffalo is the best ever by an opponent against a Dolphins team.
- Nov. 1 – Don Shula wins his 250th regular-season game as the Dolphins defeat Pittsburgh 35-24 at Joe Robbie Stadium.
- Nov. 29 – The Dolphins suffer their first shutout loss (27-0 at Buffalo) since December 12, 1982 – the famous snowplow game at New England (3-0). The game also sees the end of Dan Marino's streak of 30 straight games with at least one touchdown pass. His string is second all-time to Johnny Unitas' 47.
- Dec. 20 – Miami picks up its final win of 1987 with a 23-21 victory over Washington at Joe Robbie Stadium. The Dolphins lose the following week (December 28) in the '87 finale to New England, 24-10, at home. The Redskins, meanwhile, go on to win Super Bowl XXII, 42-10 over Denver.
- Dec. 30 – RB Troy Stradford is named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by the Associated Press.

1988

- Jan. 14 – It is announced that former Dolphins QB Bob Griese is among a group of 15 finalists

under consideration for the 1988 class of enshrinees in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio.

- Feb. 29 – Former Dolphin Larry Seiple is named receivers coach. Seiple, who had been out of pro coaching for a year, had been receivers coach at Detroit (1980-84) and Tampa Bay (1985-86).
- July 11 – Training camp opens for the Dolphins at St. Thomas University as Head Coach Don Shula welcomes 109 players – the largest group of players in Shula's tenure as Dolphin head coach.
- July 31 – The Dolphins make their first ever trip abroad and take on the San Francisco 49ers at Wembley Stadium in London for the third-annual American Bowl. Miami comes from behind to defeat the 49ers, 27-21, before 70,535 British fans to open the pre-season.
- Sept. 18 – Miami registers its first win of the season in a 24-17 triumph over the Green Bay Packers. It marks Miami's 18th win in 23 home openers, including 13 straight years, and a 17-2 record under Don Shula. Dan Marino goes over the 20,000-yard mark in career passing yardage and becomes only the 45th quarterback in NFL history to do so.
- Oct. 9 – The Dolphins reverse history by defeating the Raiders, 24-17, at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum. It marks Miami's first win ever against the Raiders in their home stadium and the Dolphins' first victory over the Raiders in 10 years. The game is played in 96 degree heat - the warmest game in Dolphins' history.
- Oct. 16 – Miami wins its third consecutive game of the season as the Dolphins defeat the San Diego Chargers, 31-28. Quarterback Dan Marino throws for 329 yards and moves into sole possession of second-place on the NFL's career 300-yard passing games list with his 27th such game (behind only Dan Fouts with 51).
- Oct. 23 – Dan Marino records the second-best single-game passing yardage total in NFL history – 521 yards (Norm Van Brocklin holds the single-game record of 554 yards) and completes 35 of a team record 60 attempts, all to no avail as the N.Y Jets defeat the Dolphins, 44-30, at Joe Robbie Stadium.
- Oct. 30 – Shula Bowl III – Head Coach Don Shula and his assistant head coach and son, David Shula, are on the opposite side of the field of Mike Shula, a coaches' assistant for Tampa Bay, as the Dolphins defeat the Bucs, 17-14, in Tampa Stadium.
- Dec. 12 – Dan Marino becomes the first quarterback in NFL history to pass for over 4,000 yards four times in a career in the Dolphins' 37-31 win over Cleveland. He also throws for his 193rd career touchdown, setting a new Dolphin record and surpassing the total of former quarterback Bob Griese, who had previously held the mark. Marino tops the record that took Griese 14 seasons to accomplish in only six-plus seasons. Also, receiver Mark Clayton surpasses Nat Moore in the record books as he catches a pass in his 37th consecutive game.

1989

- Jan. 22 – Joe Robbie Stadium hosts Super Bowl XXIII only two-and-a-half years after its initial opening. San Francisco comes back in the final minutes of the game to defeat the Cincinnati Bengals, 20-16. The game marks the first time since Super Bowl XIII (January 21, 1979) that the NFL's championship game is played in Miami.
- Jan. 23 – Dolphin Linebackers Coach Chuck Studley resigns after five seasons with Miami.
- Jan. 25 – Former Miami Hurricanes defensive coordinator Dave Wannstedt joins the Dolphins coaching staff as linebackers coach.
- Feb. 27 – David Shula, the Dolphins' assistant head coach and passing game coordinator, and Dave Wannstedt, the team's linebackers coach, resign their position to accept new posts with the Dallas Cowboys.
- March 1 – George Hill is named the new linebackers coach for the Dolphins, while John Sandusky, the Dolphins' offensive line coach, is promoted to assistant head coach.
- March 6 – Gary Stevens, formerly of the University of Miami, is named quarterbacks/pass offense coach for the Dolphins.
- May 15 – Chuck Connor, the Dolphins director of player personnel for 11 seasons, announces his resignation to join the Atlanta Falcons as director of pro scouting.
- June 12 – Tom Heckert, formerly a college scout with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and Cleveland Browns, is named Miami's Director of College Scouting.
- Sept. 10 – Jim Kelly scores on a two-yard run on the game's last play to give the Buffalo Bills a 27-24 win over the Dolphins. The loss dropped Miami's record in season openers to 10-13-1 and in home openers to 18-5-1 and it also snapped a 13-game winning streak in home openers, which had been the NFL's longest active home opener winning streak.
- Sept. 17 – In Miami's 24-10 win at New England, Dan Marino throws his 200th career touchdown pass, becoming the 13th player in NFL history to throw for 200 TDs. It was just his 89th

- career game, and he reaches the 200 touchdown pass mark faster than any quarterback in NFL history.
- Oct. 8 – In Miami's 13-10 overtime win vs. Cleveland, Dan Marino goes over 25,000 yards passing in his career, becoming the 25th player in NFL history to reach the 25,000 yards passing milestone. Marino also breaks Bob Griese's Dolphin team record of 25,092 career passing yards.
 - Nov. 5 – Sammie Smith rushes for 123 yards in Miami's 19-13 win over the Indianapolis Colts, the third best single game rushing total ever by a Dolphin rookie. It also breaks a 27-game streak in which the Dolphins did not have a running back gain 100 or more yards.
 - Nov. 12 – Pete Stoyanovich kicks a team-record 59-yard field goal in a 31-23 victory over the New York Jets, a kick that also tied the third longest field goal in NFL history.
 - Nov. 19 – Miami defeats Dallas 17-14 in Shula Bowl IV, as Don Shula extends his record to 4-0 in Shula vs. Shula contests. This time Shula was opposed by son Dave, the Assistant Head Coach of the Cowboys. The win also was the Dolphins' sixth win in their last seven games and moved them into a first-place tie with the Buffalo Bills atop the AFC East.
 - Dec. 3 – Dan Marino goes over 3,000 yards passing for the year in Miami's 26-21 loss at Kansas City. It was his sixth season passing for 3,000 yards and he ties Dan Fouts' NFL record of six 3,000 yard seasons.
 - Dec. 24 – The Dolphins are eliminated from playoff contention with a 27-24 loss to the Kansas City Chiefs in the season finale at Joe Robbie Stadium. The game is played in 40-degree weather, the coldest home game in the history of the Dolphins.

1990

- Jan. 7 – Joseph Robbie, founder and owner of the Dolphins and the driving force behind the construction of Joe Robbie Stadium, dies of respiratory failure at age 73.
- Jan. 12 – The Miami Dolphins and Robbie Stadium Corporation undergo an organization realignment to ensure continued administration of both entities by the Robbie family. Tim Robbie becomes President of the Dolphins, Dan and Janet Robbie are named Executive Vice Presidents of the team, while Eddie Jones is named Executive Vice President and General Manager of the club. In addition, J. Michael Robbie is named Executive Vice President of Robbie Stadium Corporation.
- Jan. 19 – Dolphin President Tim Robbie announces that the Dolphins have signed Don Shula to a three-year contract to remain as head coach.
- Jan. 27 – Former Dolphin great Bob Griese is among a group of seven named to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The Dolphin quarterback becomes the fourth player in Miami history to earn the honor with induction scheduled for August 4.
- Feb. 7 – Monte Clark, former San Francisco and Detroit Head Coach and Dolphin Assistant Coach, is named Miami's Director of Pro Personnel, while Charley Winner is given expanded duties and is named the club's Director of Player Personnel.
- March 7 – H. Wayne Huizenga, Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of Blockbuster Video, purchases fifty percent of the Robbie Stadium Corporation (the parent company of Joe Robbie Stadium) as well as a fifteen percent limited partnership in the Miami Dolphins.
- Sept. 9 – Sammie Smith rushes for an opening-day record 159 yards and a touchdown as the Dolphins break a five-year losing streak in season openers with a 27-24 win at the New England Patriots.
- Sept. 16 – Team founder Joe Robbie is the first enshrinee on the "Dolphin Honor Roll" at Joe Robbie Stadium. The Dolphins record a 30-7 triumph over the Buffalo Bills, marking Don Shula's 200th career regular season win as the team's head coach.
- Oct. 18 – In Miami's 17-10 win over the New England Patriots, Don Shula coaches in his 400th career regular season game as a head coach in the NFL.
- Nov. 19 – During halftime of Miami's 13-10 loss to the Los Angeles Raiders, the team's four Hall of Fame enshrinees, Larry Csonka, Bob Griese, Jim Langer and Paul Warfield, are inducted into the "Dolphin Honor Roll."
- Nov. 25 – Miami improves its record to 9-2 and clinches the team's first winning season since 1987 with a 30-13 win over the Cleveland Browns. Also, Dan Marino goes over 30,000 yards passing in his career, becoming the 11th player in NFL history to reach the 30,000-yard mark. It is just his 114th career game, and he reaches the 30,000-yard plateau faster than any quarterback in NFL history.
- Dec. 9 – The Dolphins earn a 23-20 overtime win over the Philadelphia Eagles and clinch the team's first playoff berth since 1985.
- Dec. 16 – In Miami's 24-17 win over the Seattle Seahawks, Dan Marino goes over 3,000 yards passing for the year. It is his seventh season passing for 3,000 yards and he ties Joe Montana's NFL record of seven 3,000-yard seasons.

- Dec. 19 – Richmond Webb becomes the first rookie offensive tackle – and second rookie offensive lineman overall – to be selected to the NFL's annual Pro Bowl contest.
- Dec. 23 – Dan Marino throws his 20th touchdown pass of the season in Miami's 24-14 loss at the Buffalo Bills. It is his eighth season with 20 or more touchdown passes and he ties Johnny Unitas' NFL record of eight 20-plus touchdown seasons.

1991

- Jan. 5 – The Dolphins return to the playoffs after a four-year absence with a 17-16 win over the Kansas City Chiefs in Joe Robbie Stadium. In the contest, Pete Stoyanovich sets an NFL playoff record with a 58-yard field goal.
- Jan. 12 – Miami drops a 44-34 playoff decision at the Buffalo Bills. The teams combine for 78 points – the highest scoring non-overtime playoff game in history. The only higher scoring playoff was Miami's 41-38 overtime loss to the San Diego Chargers on Jan. 2, 1982.
- Jan. 24 – Monte Clark, the Dolphins director of pro personnel, announces his resignation.
- Jan. 27 – Larry Csonka is named to the NFL's all-time Super Bowl Silver Anniversary team.
- Feb. 2 – Richmond Webb is named NFL Rookie of the Year by The Sporting News.
- March 8 – Mike Shula joins the Dolphins as a Coaches' Assistant.
- March 26 – The Robbie Family and Wayne Huizenga purchase 107 acres of land adjacent to Joe Robbie Stadium for additional parking and future development.
- May 23 – At the NFL owners meetings in Minneapolis, Joe Robbie Stadium is selected as the site for Super Bowl XXIX (1995).
- Aug. 3 – The Dolphins make the longest road trip in team history as they travel 14,912 round-trip miles to Tokyo to battle the Los Angeles Raiders at the Tokyo Dome in American Bowl '91. Miami comes from behind to defeat the Raiders, 19-17, before 51,122 Japanese fans.
- Aug. 20 – Dan Marino signs a five-year contract extension to remain as quarterback of the Miami Dolphins.
- Sept. 22 – Don Shula captures the 300th win of his coaching career with Miami's 16-13 win over the Green Bay Packers. With career coaching win number 300, Shula joins the immortal George Halas (324 wins) as the only NFL coaches to win 300 or more games.
- Nov. 10 – In Miami's 30-20 win over New England, both Mark Duper and Mark Clayton surpass Nat Moore's team record of 7,547 career receiving yards. Duper is the first to move past Moore with a 17-yard reception in the first quarter, while Clayton passes Moore with a 32-yard touchdown catch in the fourth quarter.
- Nov. 18 – During halftime of Miami's 41-27 loss to the Buffalo Bills, former Dolphin great middle linebacker Nick Buoniconti is inducted into the Dolphin Honor Roll.
- Dec. 1 – Dan Marino sets an NFL record as he goes over 3,000 yards passing in a season for the eighth time in his career in Miami's 33-14 win over Tampa Bay. Marino entered the 1991 campaign with seven such seasons and was tied with Joe Montana for the record.
- Dec. 9 – Miami defeats Cincinnati 37-13 in Shula Bowl V as Don Shula extends his record to 5-0 in Shula vs. Shula contests. This time, Shula teamed with son Mike, a Dolphins coaches assistant, and was opposed by son David, the receivers coach for the Bengals. In the contest, Dan Marino sets an NFL record by throwing his 20th touchdown pass of the season. It is his ninth season with 20 or more touchdown passes. He entered 1991 with eight such seasons and was tied with Johnny Unitas for the record. Also, Mark Clayton breaks Nat Moore's team record for career TDs (75) and career receiving scores (74) with a 16-yard TD reception in the fourth quarter to give Clayton his 76th career score (75 catch, one punt return) and 75th receiving TD.
- Dec. 15 – Pete Stoyanovich breaks Garo Yepremian's single-season team record of 28 field goals in Miami's 38-30 loss to the San Diego Chargers. Stoyanovich boots his 29th of the year with a 24-yarder in the first quarter. He would go on to hit on 31 field goals during the 1991 season which tied for the league high with Washington's Chip Lohmiller.
- Dec. 22 – The Dolphins drop a 23-20 overtime decision to the New York Jets in a winner-take-all battle for the AFC's final wild card spot. Miami takes a 20-17 lead with just 44 seconds left in regulation on a one-yard scoring toss from Dan Marino to Ferrell Edmunds. However, the Jets move the ball and tie the game at 20-20 on a 44-yard field goal by Raul Allegre with no time left on the clock. New York wins the game in overtime on a 30-yard field goal by Allegre.

1992

- Feb. 1 – Former Dolphin All-Pro center Dwight Stephenson rejoins Miami as assistant offensive line coach.
- Feb. 3 – Hall of Fame defensive tackle Joe Greene is named as the Dolphins' defensive line coach. Greene replaced Dan Sekanovich, who announced his resignation.

- May 20 – Dolphins sign a long-term agreement to build a new training facility at Nova University in Davie, to be ready by the start of the 1993 training camp.
- June 1 – Charley Winner announces his retirement as Miami's Director of Player Personnel. Winner, who had served 37 years in the NFL as a coach and administrator, originally joined the Dolphins in 1981.
- June 4 – Tom Heckert is named as the Dolphins' Director of Player Personnel. Heckert had worked the previous three years as Miami's Director of College Scouting.
- June 12 – Tom Braatz, a 27-year NFL executive with the Atlanta Falcons and Green Bay Packers, is named as Miami's Director of College Scouting.
- July 17 – Don Shula signs a two-year contract extension to continue as the Dolphins' Head Coach through the 1994 season. The extension takes effect at the conclusion of Shula's current contract which expires following the 1992 season.
- Aug. 16 – The Dolphins travel 9,908 round-trip miles and earn a 31-27 preseason win over the Denver Broncos before a crowd of 60,813 fans at Berlin's Olympic Stadium. The game marks the third time overall and second consecutive season that the Dolphins have travelled abroad to play a preseason contest and the win improves Miami's record to 3-0 in games played on foreign soil. The Dolphins join the L.A. Rams as only teams which have recorded wins in contests played in each of the three American Bowl sites (London, Tokyo and Berlin).
- Aug. 31 – Miami's season opening contest, scheduled for September 6 at Joe Robbie Stadium against the New England Patriots, is rescheduled for October 18, the National Football League announces. The date change is made in the aftermath of Hurricane Andrew, which struck the South Florida area on August 25. Both teams originally were off that weekend, based on the NFL's 16-games-over-17-weeks schedule which allows each team one bye during the season. The Patriots and Dolphins will have their Open Week on September 6, which marks the beginning of the 1992 regular season.
- Sept. 29 – The Dolphins dip into the free agent market and sign perennial all-pro tight end Keith Jackson.
- Oct. 4 – The Dolphins improve to 4-0 and take over sole possession of first place in the AFC East for the first time in 34 weeks with a 37-10 win over the Buffalo Bills at Rich Stadium. The win snaps Miami's six-game losing streak to the Bills at Rich Stadium. The Dolphins' last triumph in Buffalo was a 34-24 win on November 16, 1986. With the win, Miami moves ahead of the second-place Bills (4-1) in the AFC East for the first time since the second week of the 1990 season. Individually, safety Louis Oliver records three interceptions and returns one of his INTs for a 103-yard touchdown. Oliver's return ties for the NFL's all-time longest interception return with a 103-yard return by San Diego's Vencie Glenn against Denver on November 29, 1987.
- Oct. 18 – Dan Marino throws four touchdown passes as Miami earns a 38-17 win over the Patriots at Joe Robbie Stadium in a game that is rescheduled from September 6 due to the effects of Hurricane Andrew. Marino throws four-or-more touchdowns in a game for the 17th time in his career and ties the all-time NFL record for most career games with four or more touchdown passes with Johnny Unitas.
- Nov. 16 – During halftime ceremonies of Miami's 26-20 loss to the Buffalo Bills, the 1972 Miami Dolphins team, holders of the only perfect season in NFL history and winners of Super Bowl VII, are honored and inducted into the Dolphin Honor Roll.
- Dec. 20 – The Dolphins clinch the team's second trip to the playoffs in the last three seasons with a 19-17 come-from-behind win over the New York Jets at Joe Robbie Stadium. In the contest, Dolphins quarterback Dan Marino throws the 290th touchdown pass of his NFL career and ties Johnny Unitas for second place on the NFL's all-time touchdown pass list.
- Dec. 23 – Dan Marino is named to his team-record seventh Pro Bowl team. He breaks the former team record of six Pro Bowl appearances which he shared with Bob Griese, Bob Kuechenberg and Jim Langer. In addition, Marino is named as a starter in the NFL's annual all-star game for the fifth time in his career and he ties the team record held by Jim Langer.
- Dec. 27 – The Dolphins clinch the AFC East title with a 16-13 overtime win over the New England Patriots at Foxboro Stadium. Miami closes the regular season with an 11-5 record and coupled with Buffalo's 27-3 loss at Houston later in the day, the Dolphins win the team's first division championship since 1985. In addition, the win marks the 300th regular season victory of Dolphins' Head Coach Don Shula's coaching career.

1993

- Jan. 10 – The Dolphins earn a 31-0 win over the San Diego Chargers in the AFC Divisional Playoffs before a crowd of 71,224 at Joe Robbie Stadium. Miami's 31-point margin of victory is the largest by the team in a playoff game. The previous largest margin of

- victory in the post-season by the Dolphins was three 21-point wins as Miami had a 21-0 win over the Baltimore Colts on Jan. 2, 1972; a 34-13 win over the San Diego Chargers on Jan. 16, 1983; and a 31-10 win over the Seattle Seahawks on Dec. 29, 1984.
- Jan. 17 – The 1992 season comes to a close. Miami suffers five turnovers (two interceptions and three fumbles) as the team drops a 29-10 decision to the Buffalo Bills in the AFC Championship contest before a crowd of 72,703 at Joe Robbie Stadium. The attendance of 72,703 marks the largest crowd to witness a Dolphin game at JRS. The previous high was 71,224 which was set the previous week on January 10 to witness the Dolphins' 31-0 win over San Diego in an AFC Divisional Playoff game.
- Jan. 26 – Kim Helton is named the team's offensive line coach. John Sandusky, who served as assistant head coach/offensive line, remains with the team as assistant head coach and assumes the responsibility of coaching the tight ends. In addition, assistant offensive line coach Dwight Stephenson resigns to pursue his interests in the construction and real estate business.
- Jan. 30 – Former Dolphins great Larry Little is among a group of five named to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The former Dolphin guard becomes the fifth player in Miami history to earn the honor, joining RB Larry Csonka, QB Bob Griese, C Jim Langer and WR Paul Warfield.
- Feb. 7 – The Dolphin coaching staff leads the AFC to a 23-20 overtime win over the NFC in the Pro Bowl contest played in Honolulu, Hawaii.
- Feb. 11 – Mike Shula resigns as a coaches assistant and is named as tight end coach of the Chicago Bears.
- Feb. 22 – Tony Nathan, who spent the past five years as a coaches' assistant on the Miami Dolphins coaching staff, is promoted to offensive backs coach. In addition, Carl Taseff, who served as the team's offensive backs coach since joining the Dolphins in 1970, will become more active in other areas of the football operation, including personnel scouting and evaluation, and will maintain a continued involvement in various coaching responsibilities.
- May 21 – Kim Helton resigns as offensive line coach to become head coach at the University of Houston. John Sandusky, who served as offensive line coach from 1976-92, resumes his offensive line coaching responsibilities.
- June 1 – Rich McGeorge is named as assistant offensive line/tight ends coach of the Dolphins.
- June 4 – Dolphins hold last practice session at St. Thomas University, which had served as host to team's training facility since July 12, 1970.
- July 11 – Ribbon cutting ceremonies officially open the Dolphins' new training facility on campus of Nova University in Davie, Fla.
- Sept. 12 – Dan Marino surpasses the 40,000-yard passing mark during Miami's 24-14 loss to the N.Y. Jets. He joins Fran Tarkenton (47,003), Dan Fouts (43,040) and Johnny Unitas (40,239) as the only quarterbacks to gain 40,000 passing yards. Marino attains the 40,000-yard mark in only 153 regular-season games and accomplishes the feat faster than any QB in league history. The previous record for fastest ascent to 40,000 yards was 168 games by Dan Fouts.
- Oct. 10 – Scott Mitchell comes off the bench and replaces an injured Dan Marino (torn Achilles in right foot) and throws a pair of touchdown passes to lead the Dolphins to a 24-14 win at the Cleveland Browns. Mitchell enters the game just before halftime and completes 10 of 16 passes for 118 yards with two touchdowns and an interception. Mitchell is named as AFC Offensive Player of the Week for his performance against the Browns. Marino is placed on Injured Reserve on October 13 and misses the remainder of the season.
- Oct. 24 – Dan Marino misses his first starting assignment in 145 consecutive non-replacement regular season games as Miami earns a 41-27 win over Indianapolis. The game marks the first career NFL start at quarterback for Scott Mitchell as he hits on 12 of 19 passes for 190 yards with a touchdown. Mitchell becomes the eighth player to start at quarterback for the Dolphins since Don Shula was named head coach in 1970.
- Oct. 31 – Don Shula wins the 324th game of his coaching career and ties George Halas for the all-time record for most wins by an NFL head coach as Miami earns a 30-10 win over the Kansas City Chiefs. Shula achieves the coaching milestone in his 31st year (482nd game) of his NFL coaching career as compared to 40 seasons (506 games) for Halas to accomplish the feat. On the field, Scott Mitchell throws for 344 yards and three touchdowns and becomes the first Dolphin quarterback other than Dan Marino to pass for over 300 yards and throw three or more touchdown passes since David Woodley gained 408 yards and threw three scores on October 25, 1981, at the Dallas Cowboys.
- Nov. 14 – The Dolphins endure another quarterback injury as Scott Mitchell suffers a separated shoulder during Miami's 19-14 win at Philadelphia. The win enables Don Shula to record the 325th triumph of his coaching career as he becomes the winningest coach in NFL history surpassing George Halas. In the contest, Doug Pederson replaces

Mitchell and enters the game in the third quarter with Miami trailing 14-13. He guides the Dolphins to a pair of field goals and the defense holds the Eagles scoreless in the second half to garner the victory.

- Nov. 21 – Steve DeBerg becomes the third player to start at quarterback for the Dolphins in 1993 as he throws for 252 yards and a pair of touchdowns to lead Miami to a 17-13 win over New England. DeBerg, the NFL's oldest player, had joined the team just 11 days prior to the Pats game and was forced into his first start in place of the injured Scott Mitchell.
- Nov. 25 – The Dolphins post a come-from-behind 16-14 win over the defending and eventual Super Bowl champion Dallas Cowboys on Thanksgiving Day on a sleet covered field at Texas Stadium. Miami improves 3-0 on Thanksgiving as the team had posted victories at St. Louis (55-14 on November 24, 1977) and at Dallas (14-7 on November 22, 1973). In the contest, Miami trails 14-13 with just 15 seconds left in regulation and Pete Stoyanovich's 41-yard field goal attempt for the win is blocked by the Cowboys' Jimmie Jones. However, Dallas' Leon Lett attempts to pick up the loose ball and fumbles and Miami's Jeff Dellenbach recovers the ball on the one-yard line with three seconds remaining. Stoyanovich converts on his second chance and boots a 19-yard field goal on the game's final play to win the contest. The win improves Miami's record to an NFL best 9-2, but the team will fail to win another game during the remainder of the season.
- Dec. 13 – During halftime ceremonies of Miami's 21-20 loss to Pittsburgh, former Dolphin great and Hall of Famer Larry Little is honored and inducted into the Dolphin Honor Roll.
- Dec. 14 – Don Shula is named Sports Illustrated Sportsman of the Year. He is the first professional coach to receive the honor.

1994

- Jan. 2 – The Dolphins lose by a 33-27 count in overtime at New England. It is the fifth consecutive loss for the Dolphins and the team is eliminated from the playoffs later in the day as the Raiders rally from a 17-point deficit to win over Denver and qualify for the playoffs.
- Jan. 24 – The trustees of the Miami Dolphins sign a definitive agreement with H. Wayne Huizenga to purchase the Robbie family's interests in the Dolphin franchise. The agreement also includes an option for Huizenga to purchase the Robbies' interest in Joe Robbie Stadium.
- Feb. 8 – Joel Collier joins the Dolphins as a staff assistant, replacing Carl Taseff.
- March 16 – John Gamble is named as the Dolphins' strength coach.
- March 23 – The National Football League clubs approve transfer of the majority interests in the Miami Dolphins from the Robbie family to H. Wayne Huizenga at the annual league meetings in Orlando, Fla.
- June 28 – H. Wayne Huizenga's purchase of the Robbie Family's remaining 85% of the Miami Dolphins as well as their 50% share of the Joe Robbie Stadium is finalized. The closing leaves Huizenga with 100% ownership of both the Dolphins and Stadium.
- July 8 – The Dolphins and WIOD Radio (610 AM) announce the hiring of Bill Zimpfer as the team's play-by-play announcer and "Voice of the Dolphins." Zimpfer replaces Rick Weaver, who had served as play-by-play announcer for the Dolphins since 1970 and announced his retirement at the club's annual awards dinner on May 6, 1993. Zimpfer joins former Dolphin tight end and color analyst Jim Mandich in the broadcast booth.
- July 21 – H. Wayne Huizenga announces that he has entered into a new agreement with Head Coach Don Shula that extends through the 1996 season. Under the new contract extension, Shula assumes the position of Vice President/Head Coach, and also adds an ownership interest in the team.
- Sept. 4 – After missing the final 11 games of the 1993 season with a torn right Achilles' tendon, Dan Marino returns to action as he throws for 473 yards and five touchdowns to lead the Dolphins to a 39-35 win over the New England Patriots at Joe Robbie Stadium. Marino sets an NFL record by throwing for four or more touchdown passes in a game for the 18th time in his career, breaking his tie with Johnny Unitas, and also throws the 300th touchdown pass of his career to join Fran Tarkenton (343 touchdowns) as the only quarterbacks in NFL history with 300-plus career touchdowns.
- Oct. 2 – Shula Bowl VI makes sports history as it marks the first time in the history of the four major American professional sports (football, baseball, hockey and basketball) that a father and son battle as head coaches with Don Shula and the Dolphins taking on his son, Head Coach David Shula, and the Cincinnati Bengals. The elder Shula improves to 6-0 when coaching against teams which feature one of his sons as a coach or player as the Dolphins earn a 23-7 win over the Bengals.

- Oct. 16 – Bernie Parmalee receives two game balls – one for offense and one for special teams – for his performance in Miami's 20-17 overtime win against the Los Angeles Raiders. Parmalee rushes for 150 yards on 30 carries and adds a pair of tackles and a fumble recovery on special teams. In addition, the Dolphins reverse history in the all-time series against the Raiders as Miami records wins in consecutive games against the Raiders for the first time in the history of the series. Miami earned a 20-7 win over the Raiders on December 14, 1992, in the last meeting between the two teams.
- Nov. 13 – Chicago's Kevin Butler boots a 40-yard field goal with 54 seconds left in regulation and James Williams deflects a Dolphins field goal attempt with just seven seconds remaining in the game to give the Bears a 17-14 win over the Dolphins in Shula Bowl VII. Miami Head Coach Don Shula battles his son and Bears tight ends coach Mike Shula in the contest and it marks the first time that the elder Shula lost a game in which one of his sons, David or Mike, were either players or assistant coaches on the opposing NFL team.
- Nov. 27 – Quarterback Dan Marino makes history once again with his famous "Clock Play". With the Dolphins trailing the Jets by 18 points in the second half at the Meadowlands, Marino orchestrates a 28-point second-half outburst, including 22 straight to close the contest, as Miami claims a 28-24 victory. All four scores in the second half occur on Marino to Mark Ingram touchdown passes. The game winning points come on first-and-goal with just 22 seconds to play, when Marino approaches the line of scrimmage, appearing poised to clock the ball. However, he takes everyone in the stadium by surprise as he receives the snap, drops back and tosses an eight-yard touchdown pass to Ingram, who ties the Paul Warfield's single-game record of four touchdowns and 24 points, which Warfield achieved against Detroit on December 15, 1973.
- Dec. 7 – Don Shula suffers a torn Achilles' tendon in his right leg and undergoes surgery on the injury on December 9 by Dr. Peter Indelicato and Dr. Dan Kanell. He misses a regular season practice for the first time in his 25 seasons with the team. Shula returns to practice on December 10 and coaches for the remainder of the season on a golf cart.
- Dec. 12 – Bernie Parmalee rushes for 127 yards and scores a pair of touchdowns (one rushing and one receiving) as the Dolphins clinch a playoff spot with a 45-28 win over the Kansas City Chiefs at Joe Robbie Stadium. In the contest, Dolphins Head Coach Don Shula wins his 318th career regular season game and ties George Halas (318 regular season coaching wins) for the all-time record for most career regular season wins by an NFL coach. Center Dwight Stephenson is inducted into the Dolphin Honor Roll during halftime ceremonies.
- Dec. 25 – The Dolphins earn a 27-20 win over the Detroit Lions and clinch the AFC East title. Miami and the New England Patriots both finish with 10-6 records, however the Dolphins win the division title by virtue of a two-game head-to-head sweep over New England during the 1994 season. Dolphins Head Coach Don Shula wins the 319th regular season game of his coaching career and surpasses George Halas (318 regular season coaching wins) for the all-time record for most career regular season wins by an NFL coach. Miami plays on Christmas Day for the second time in team history with the only other Christmas game for the Dolphins being the longest game in NFL history as Miami earned a 27-24 playoff win in double overtime at Kansas City on December 25, 1971.
- Dec. 27 – Defensive tackle Tim Bowens is named NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year by the Associated Press. He becomes the first Dolphins player to win A.P.'s defensive rookie award since A.J. Duhe in 1977.
- Dec. 31 – Dan Marino throws a pair of touchdown passes to lead the Dolphins to a 27-17 win in a First-Round playoff contest against the Kansas City Chiefs at Joe Robbie Stadium. The game is billed as Marino-Montana III and the duel between the two future Hall of Famers lives up to its pregame hype. Marino completes 22 of 29 passes for 257 yards with two touchdowns and no interceptions and Montana counters by hitting on 26 of 37 passes for 314 yards with two scores and an interception. Marino sets an NFL playoff record as he throws for a touchdown pass in his 11th consecutive post-season game and moves past a tie with Montana (San Francisco/Kansas City) and Ken Stabler (Oakland) for the longest all-time streak in NFL post-season history.

1995

- Jan. 9 – Natrone Means rushes for 139 yards and a touchdown to lead the San Diego Chargers to a 22-21 win over the Miami Dolphins in an AFC Divisional Playoff contest at Jack Murphy Stadium. San Diego took a 22-21 lead with just 35 seconds left in regulation as Stan Humphries threw an eight-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Mark Seay. The Dolphins had one final chance to win the game as Dan Marino drove

the team to the Chargers' 30-yard line but Pete Stoyanovich's 48-yard field goal attempt with eight seconds left was wide right.

- Jan. 18 – Assistant head coach/offensive line John Sandusky announces his retirement. A veteran of over three decades of NFL coaching (he concluded his 36th season in 1994), Sandusky was one of only two coaches to serve as offensive line coach on a Don Shula coached team. Sandusky was offensive line coach with the Colts (1963-69) and Dolphins (1976-94) under Shula, while Monte Clark coached the offensive line with the Dolphins under Shula from 1970-75.
- Feb. 6 – Monte Clark is named as the team's offensive line coach. Clark enters his third tour of duty with the Dolphins, re-joining the team after having served as head offensive line coach at Stanford University during 1993-94.
- Feb. 9 – Dolphins Executive Vice President and General Manager Eddie Jones signs a two-year contract to remain in that capacity through the 1996 season.
- May 19 – The Miami Dolphins sign a two-year agreement with WCMQ radio (1210 AM) to be the Spanish radio outlet for Dolphins games. WCMQ replaces WQBA radio, which had been the team's Spanish station for the previous 13 seasons.
- Sept. 3 – The Dolphins open the season with an explosive offensive display in a 52-15 win over the N.Y. Jets at Joe Robbie Stadium. The 52 points are the second-highest single-game total in team history (behind 55 points at St. Louis on November 24, 1977). In addition, the game is played in 94-degree weather, making it the warmest home game in team history.
- Oct. 1 – The Shula coaching family again makes sports history as father and son battle as head coaches with Don Shula and the Dolphins taking on his son, Head Coach David Shula, and the Cincinnati Bengals. The elder Shula improves to 7-1 when coaching against teams which feature one of his sons as a coach or player with a 26-23 win at the Bengals.
- Oct. 8 – Dan Marino passes Fran Tarkenton (3,686 completions) to become the NFL's all-time leader in career pass completions with a six-yard toss to fullback Keith Byars during the Dolphins' 27-24 overtime loss at Joe Robbie Stadium. In the contest, Marino suffers knee and hip injuries which force him to miss the next two games (at New Orleans and at the N.Y. Jets).
- Nov. 12 – Dan Marino becomes the NFL's all-time career passing yardage leader as he jumps past Fran Tarkenton (47,003 career yards) with a nine-yard pass to Irving Fryar in the first quarter of the Dolphins' 34-17 loss to the New England Patriots at Joe Robbie Stadium.
- Nov. 26 – Dan Marino tosses a six-yard touchdown pass to fullback Keith Byars with 1:03 remaining in the first half for his 343rd career scoring pass and becomes the NFL's all-time touchdown pass leader (surpassing Fran Tarkenton's 342 TDs) during Miami's 36-28 loss at Indianapolis.
- Dec. 11 – Guard/Tackle Bob Kuechenberg is inducted into the Dolphin Honor Roll during half-time ceremonies of Miami's 13-6 win over Kansas City at Joe Robbie Stadium. In the contest, Dan Marino breaks the last of Fran Tarkenton's major passing records (6,467 career attempts) with an incomplete pass attempt to wide receiver Randal Hill in the fourth quarter. In addition, the game is a sellout and marks the second consecutive season and fourth time overall (also 1972-73) that every home game has been sold out and it is just the second time in team history (also 1973) that every game has been sold out before the television blackout deadline.
- Dec. 24 – The Dolphins post a 41-22 win at St. Louis to finish the regular season with a 9-7 record. The team clinches a playoff berth for the second consecutive season later in the day as the Denver Broncos come from behind late in the contest to win at Oakland and eliminate the Raiders from playoff consideration. Miami's win marks the 347th and final victory in the illustrious head coaching career of Don Shula.
- Dec. 30 – Miami's season ends following a 37-22 loss in an AFC First-Round Playoff Contest in Buffalo. The game is an offensive shootout as the teams combine for an NFL post-season record of 1,038 yards. Dan Marino leads the Dolphins by completing 33 of a career-high 64 pass attempts for 422 yards and a pair of scores, while WR O.J. McDuffie sets team playoff records with 11 catches for 154 yards. The game marks the final contest in Head Coach Don Shula's career.

1996

- Jan. 5 – Don Shula, the winningest coach in the history of the NFL, moves from his role as head coach of the team as he assumes another role within the Dolphins organization. He continues to serve as a partner to owner H. Wayne Huizenga and becomes Vice Chairman of the Board of Directors in addition to his status as a part-owner of the

- team. Shula leaves the sidelines with an overall record 347-173-6 in his 33 years as a head coach, including the last 26 years with the Dolphins (1970-95). He won Super Bowl titles with Miami in 1972 and 1973, posting a combined 32-2 record in those two seasons, and his 1972 team went 17-0, the only undefeated season in NFL annals.
- Jan. 11 – Jimmy Johnson signs a four-year contract to become head coach of the Dolphins, becoming the third head coach in club history, joining George Wilson (1966-69) and Don Shula (1970-95). Johnson joins the team with one of the most successful coaching records in football on both the professional and collegiate levels before spending the previous two years as an NFL analyst for FOX Sports. He is the first head coach in football history to win both a Super Bowl title (Dallas, 1992 and 1993) and a national collegiate championship (Univ. of Miami, 1987).
- Jan. 16 – Dolphins owner H. Wayne Huizenga announces that Eddie Jones has been named President and Chief Operating Officer of the team, and Jimmy Johnson has been named as the club's General Manager/Head Coach. Jones had spent the last six seasons with the team as the club's Executive Vice President and General Manager.
- Jan. 17 – The Dolphins name Cary Godette (defensive line), Pat Jones (tight ends) and Bill Lewis (defense nickel package) to the coaching staff. Prior to joining the Dolphins, Godette, who replaces Joe Greene, had served as defensive line coach for the Carolina Panthers in 1995, Jones was head coach at Oklahoma State University from 1984-94, and Lewis was head coach at Georgia Tech University from 1992-94.
- Jan. 19 – Kippy Brown joins the Dolphins coaching staff as running backs coach, replacing Tony Nathan. Brown had served as running backs coach with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1995) and N.Y. Jets (1990-92).
- Jan. 24 – Bob Ackles is named as the Dolphins Director of Football Operations. Ackles joins the team after serving as Director of Football Administration for the Philadelphia Eagles in 1995 and working three years with the Arizona Cardinals as Director of College Scouting (1992-93) and Assistant General Manager (1994).
- Feb. 16 – The Dolphins name Larry Beightol as assistant head coach/offensive line, replacing Monte Clark. In addition to his coaching the offensive line, Beightol also assumes additional administrative responsibilities involving the entire football staff. Beightol joins the Dolphins after having served as offensive line coach with the Houston Oilers (1995), N.Y. Jets (1990-94), San Diego Chargers (1989), Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1987-88) and Atlanta Falcons (1985-86).
- March 1 – The Dolphins name Kevin O'Neill as head athletic trainer and Brad Roll as assistant strength and conditioning coach.
- April 23 – Dan Marino, who broke every significant passing record in NFL history during the 1995 season, signs a three-year contract through the 1998 season to remain as quarterback of the Miami Dolphins.
- April 26 – The Jimmy Johnson era officially begins as the Dolphins take the field for the first time in mini-camp under the new Dolphins head coach.
- Aug. 26 – Pro Player, a sports apparel company, enters into a ten-year agreement with Joe Robbie Stadium, home of the Dolphins since 1987, to re-name the stadium Pro Player Park. The deal is worth \$2 million annually over the term of the contract.
- Sept. 1 – The Dolphins defeat the New England Patriots, 24–10 at Pro Player Park, in Jimmy Johnson's debut as head coach. Of the three head coaches in team history, Johnson is the only one to record a victory in his initial game. Also, rookie running back Karim Abdul-Jabbar rushes for 115 yards and a TD on 26 carries in Miami's victory over the Patriots, the first Dolphin rookie since Sammie Smith on November 5, 1989, against Indianapolis to rush for 100 yards. He also becomes the first player in Dolphins history to rush for 100 yards in his NFL debut.
- Sept. 10 – Pro Player Park is re-named Pro Player Stadium.
- Sept. 15 – On his 35th birthday, quarterback Dan Marino throws for 257 yards and three touchdowns as the Dolphins defeat the New York Jets, 36-27, at Pro Player Stadium. One of the scoring passes is a 74-yard strike to rookie fullback Stanley Pritchett, the longest completion to a Dolphins running back in team history. The win marks the third straight year and fourth time in the last five campaigns that Miami has opened the regular season with three consecutive victories.
- Oct. 27 – Quarterback Dan Marino plays in his 191st regular season game, against Dallas at Pro Player Stadium. In the process, he breaks Bob Kuechenberg's club career record for regular season games played of 190. The game is witnessed by 75,651 fans, the highest attendance figure in Pro Player Stadium history. The previous high was 75,129 for Super Bowl XXIII between San Francisco and Cincinnati on January 22, 1989. The former record for a Dolphins game was 73,080 for a November 20, 1995 contest against San Francisco.

- Oct. 29 – WQAM Radio (560 AM) signs a five-year contract for broadcast rights to the Dolphins, Florida Marlins and Florida Panthers. Dolphins football will be aired on WQAM beginning in the 1997 season and through the year 2001. The Dolphins' flagship station had been WIOD Radio since the team's inception in 1966.
- Oct. 31 – At the NFL fall meetings in New Orleans, the league awards the 1999 Super Bowl to the city of Miami. The game will be played at Pro Player Stadium.
- Nov. 10 – A 36-yard completion to O.J. McDuffie in the second quarter puts quarterback Dan Marino over the 50,000-yard mark for his career, the first quarterback in NFL history to reach that plateau. His eight-yard completion to Fred Barnett in the second quarter is the 4,000th completion of Marino's career, also making him the first quarterback in league history to achieve that feat. These accomplishments occur in a 37-13 victory over Indianapolis at Pro Player Stadium.
- Nov. 17 – The Dolphins defeat the Houston Oilers, 23-20 at the Astrodome, the 50th career regular season victory for head coach Jimmy Johnson.
- Nov. 25 – At halftime of a 24-17 loss to the Pittsburgh Steelers on Monday Night Football at Pro Player Stadium, former Head Coach Don Shula is inducted into the Dolphin Honor Roll. In that game, running back Karim Abdul-Jabbar rushes for 57 yards on 16 attempts, breaking the club's rookie rushing record of 711 formerly held by Andra Franklin (1981).
- Dec. 16 – On Monday Night Football, the Dolphins record a 16-14 victory over Buffalo at Pro Player Stadium, marking the first time since 1986 that Miami has swept the season series from the Bills. It's also the first time since December 22, 1985, that the Dolphins have defeated Buffalo in the month of December or January, snapping a seven-game losing streak against Buffalo in such games.
- Dec. 22 – In a season-ending 31-28 win at the New York Jets, running back Karim Abdul-Jabbar rushes for 152 yards and a TD on 30 carries. His performance is the fifth-highest single-game total in franchise history, and the second-most by a rookie. It is his fourth 100-yard rushing game of the year, establishing a new club rookie standard, also tying for the second-best mark in team annals. In the process, he also surpasses the 1,000-yard rushing plateau for the season, the sixth Dolphins player to achieve that feat and the first since Delvin Williams in 1978. Abdul-Jabbar's 1,116 rushing yards is the third-best single-season total in team history. He scores on a 17-yard run in the third quarter, his 11th rushing touchdown of the year, tying Ron Davenport's club rookie record, first achieved in 1985.

1997

- Jan. 14 – Miami Dolphins unveil a modified team logo and new uniforms for the 1997 season. The basic logo and team colors remain the same. The sunburst on the logo is more prominently displayed with the elimination of the hashmarks around the sun's perimeters, while the dolphin's features are accentuated by navy highlights. The home and road jerseys added a script "Dolphins" below the collar, and several subtle accents were added to the uniform to highlight and strengthen the team's traditional colors.
- Jan. 25 – Former head coach Don Shula (1970-95), the NFL's all-time winningest coach with 347 victories, is selected for induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio.
- March 11 – At the NFL spring meetings in Palm Desert, Calif., the NFL Owners approve limited cross ownership, finalizing H. Wayne Huizenga's ownership of the Dolphins.
- March 21 – Eddie Jones signs a two-year contract extension, which runs through 1998, to remain as the team's president and chief operating officer.
- April 17 – Les Koenning, wide receivers coach at Texas A&M the previous three seasons, is named as an offensive assistant.
- April 18 – The Dolphins unveil the first "official" mascot in team history during a press conference at the team's training facility. He makes his public debut on April 19 at the team's Draft Day party at Pro Player Stadium.
- June 3 – Doug Blevins is named as the team's kicking coach.
- June 4 – "T.D." is picked as the name of the Dolphins official team mascot, it is announced at the team's annual Awards Banquet. Sarah Fernandez and her two sons, Nelson and Vincent, win the "Name the Mascot" contest, and receive two tickets to Super Bowl XXXII in San Diego.
- June 13 – Dan Marino signs a one-year contract extension through the 1999 season.
- July 26 – Don Shula becomes the sixth former Dolphin to be enshrined into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. He is inducted along with Mike Haynes, Wellington Mara and Mike Webster.

- Aug. 4 – The Dolphins travel to Mexico City and earn a 38-19 preseason win over the Denver Broncos before a crowd of 104,629 fans at Estadio Guillermo Canedo. The attendance is the most to ever witness a Dolphins game, surpassing the previous high of 103,667 that saw Miami's 27-17 loss to the Washington Redskins in Super Bowl XVII on January 30, 1983, in the Rose Bowl. The game marks the fourth time overall that the Dolphins have travelled abroad to play a preseason contest and the win improves Miami's record to 4-0 in games played on foreign soil. Miami's previous American Bowl games had been in London (1988), Tokyo (1991) and Berlin (1992). The Dolphins became the first NFL team to win four American Bowl contests, and they also became the first team to win an American Bowl matchup in each of the three continents in which the games have been played.
- Aug. 31 – The Dolphins defeat the Indianapolis Colts, 16-10, at Pro Player Stadium in their 1997 season-opener. It's the Dolphins' first-ever regular season game in the month of August. It also marks their sixth consecutive opening-day victory.
- Oct. 5 – The Dolphins defeat the Kansas City Chiefs, 17-14, at Pro Player Stadium, marking the 300th victory in franchise history, including playoffs. The Dolphins become the second team from the old AFL to reach the 300-win plateau. The Oakland Raiders were the first.
- Oct. 27 – After the Dolphins built a 33-18 fourth-quarter lead, the Chicago Bears storm back for 18 unanswered points, including a Jeff Jaeger 35-yard field goal with 5:35 remaining in overtime, to come away with a 36-33 victory on a Monday night at Pro Player Stadium. It equaled the fourth-largest comeback win ever against Miami. The game originally was scheduled to be played on Sunday, October 26, but was pushed back due to Game 7 of the Marlins-Indians World Series.
- Nov. 17 – At halftime of a 30-13 win over the the Buffalo Bills on Monday Night Football at Pro Player Stadium, the Dolphins honor the 25th anniversary of the 1972 Dolphins team, holders of the only perfect season in NFL history and winners of Super Bowl VII.
- Nov. 23 – RB Karim Abdul-Jabbar scores three rushing touchdowns in a 27-24 loss to the Patriots in Foxboro. His third touchdown of the game comes on a one-yard run in the fourth quarter. It is his 13th rushing TD of the year, a new Dolphins record. His 12 rushing scores had been tied with Mercury Morris, Don Nottingham and Larry Csonka.
- Nov. 30 – The Dolphins record a 33-15 victory over the Raiders at the Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum. It's the first-ever win by Miami against the Raiders in Oakland after Miami had dropped each of their previous eight meetings there.
- Dec. 14 – The Dolphins are shut out, 41-0, by the Indianapolis Colts in the RCA Dome. The shutout snaps a streak of 162 consecutive games - the second longest active streak in the NFL at the time - in which the Dolphins had scored. The last time Miami had been held scoreless was on November 29, 1987, in a 27-0 loss at the Buffalo Bills.
- Dec. 22 – In the season finale against New England at Pro Player Stadium, left tackle Richmond Webb starts his 110th consecutive regular season game, a new Dolphins record. His 109 straight starts were tied with Jim Langer. The Patriots win the game, 14-12, giving New England the AFC East title. A win by the Dolphins would have made them AFC East champions, but instead they enter the playoffs as a Wild Card team where they must go on the road to face the Patriots the following week.
- Dec. 28 – The Dolphins drop a 17-3 decision to the New England Patriots in Foxboro in an AFC First-Round Playoff game, Miami's first postseason appearance under Head Coach Jimmy Johnson.

1998

- Jan. 24 – Former Dolphins center Dwight Stephenson (1980-87) is among a group of five who are elected into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.
- Feb. 11 – Dolphins Head Coach Jimmy Johnson announces the following changes to the team's coaching staff: Kippy Brown, the Dolphins' running backs coach for the last two years, is named as offensive coordinator, replacing Gary Stevens; Larry Seiple, formerly the club's wide receiver coach, handles the quarterbacks; Joel Collier, a defensive assistant since 1994, coaches the running backs; Robert Ford, tight ends coach with the Dallas Cowboys since 1991, takes over as Miami's wide receivers coach; and Randy Shannon, an assistant at the University of Miami (Fla.), serves as a defensive assistant on the staff.
- March 23 – Jimmy Johnson signs a one-year contract extension to remain the Dolphins General Manager and Head Coach through the year 2000. Johnson originally signed a four-year contract with the club on January 21, 1996.
- Aug. 1 – Center Dwight Stephenson becomes the seventh former Dolphin to be enshrined into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. He is inducted along with Anthony

Munoz, Mike Singletary, Tommy McDonald and Paul Krause.

- Sept. 6 – The Dolphins defeat the Indianapolis Colts, 24-15, at the RCA Dome, marking Miami's seventh straight opening day victory.
- Sept. 20 – The Dolphins shut out the Pittsburgh Steelers, 21-0, at Pro Player Stadium. It marks Miami's first shutout under Head Coach Jimmy Johnson and their first since November 8, 1992, when they defeated the Colts, 28-0, at the RCA Dome.
- Nov. 29 – In a 30-10 victory over the New Orleans Saints at Pro Player Stadium, quarterback Dan Marino throws three touchdown passes, all to O.J. McDuffie. The second one, a seven-yard strike in the fourth quarter, the 400th TD pass of Marino's career, the first quarterback in NFL history ever to reach that plateau.
- Dec. 21 – The Dolphins record a 31-21 victory over the Denver Broncos at Pro Player Stadium in front of an ABC Monday Night Football audience. The win is Miami's 34th on Monday night, as they surpass Oakland as the winningest team in MNF history.
- Dec. 27 – In a season-ending 38-16 loss to the Falcons in Atlanta, wide receiver O.J. McDuffie catches five passes for 82 yards. His second reception of the afternoon, a 28-yard catch in the second quarter, is his 87th of the season, surpassing Mark Clayton (86 in 1988) as the Dolphins' single-season reception leader. McDuffie finishes the year with an NFL-high 90 receptions, the first Dolphin ever to lead the league in this category.

1999

- Jan. 2 – The Dolphins defeat the Buffalo Bills, 24-17, in an AFC First-Round Playoff game at Pro Player Stadium. It represents Miami's first-ever playoff win under Head Coach Jimmy Johnson, and their first since December 31, 1994, when they posted a 27-17 victory over the Kansas City Chiefs in a First-Round contest at Pro Player Stadium.
- Jan. 14 – Dave Wannstedt, head coach with the Chicago Bears from 1993-98, is named the Dolphins' assistant head coach.
- Jan. 21 – Paul Boudreau is named offensive line coach, replacing Larry Beightol.
- March 2 – Eddie Jones signs a three-contract to remain as the team's President and Chief Operating Officer.
- June 15 – Dan Marino signs a two-year contract extension through 2001.
- Sept. 13 – The Dolphins defeat the two-time defending Super Bowl champion Denver Broncos, 38-21, in a season-opening Monday night game at Mile High Stadium. The win was the 300th during the regular season in Dolphins history.
- Oct. 10 – The Dolphins set a franchise record by posting 25 fourth-quarter points, and in the process erase a pair of nine-point deficits to earn a 34-31 triumph over the Colts at the RCA Dome. Quarterback Dan Marino throws a pair of touchdowns in the final period, including a two-yard strike to Oronde Gadsden with 27 seconds to play, lifting Miami to victory. It marks the 35th time in Marino's career that he has led the Dolphins back from a fourth-quarter deficit for a win.
- Oct. 17 – Dan Marino completes an eight-yard pass to Tony Martin in the first quarter against the New England Patriots at Foxboro Stadium. The completion, the first and only one of the game for Marino, puts him over the 60,000-yard passing plateau for his career, the only quarterback in NFL history to attain that mark. Marino leaves the game following the next series with a shoulder injury, forcing him to miss the next five contests. Damon Huard relieves Marino with the Dolphins trailing 7-0. After his first attempt in picked off and returned for a touchdown by Ty Law, Huard goes on to complete 24 of 42 passes for 240 yards with two touchdowns in leading the Dolphins to a 31-30 victory. The game-winning points occur on a five-yard TD pass to Stanley Pritchett with 23 seconds remaining in the game. The Dolphins become the first team in NFL history to win back-to-back road games when trailing by seven or more points after the third quarter.
- Oct. 24 – Against Philadelphia on October 24 at Pro Player Stadium, Dan Marino sits out the first of five straight games with a shoulder injury. The Eagles games snaps a string of 46 straight games in which Marino had started, the third-longest current streak among NFL signal callers at the time. Prior to this game, the last time Marino missed a game was on October 20, 1996, also against the Eagles, at Veterans Stadium.
- Dec. 5 – Former wide receiver Nat Moore becomes the 12th member of the Dolphin Honor Roll during halftime ceremonies against the Indianapolis Colts at Pro Player Stadium.
- Dec. 12 – Kicker Olindo Mare accounts for two field goals against the Jets at Giants Stadium. His first field goal of the game, a 24-yarder, was his 32nd of the season, breaking Pete Stoyanovich's club single-season records of 31, which Stoyanovich had set in 1991.
- Dec. 21 – Cornerback Sam Madison, kicker Olindo Mare and linebacker Zach Thomas are

named to the AFC Pro Bowl squad, the first selection for all three. Madison becomes the first cornerback in team history to be voted to the Pro Bowl squad.

- Dec. 27 – Kicker Olindo Mare boots a 37-yard field goal against the Jets in a Monday night game at Pro Player Stadium. The field goal was his 38th of the season, as he became the NFL's single-season field goal leader, surpassing John Kasay, who had amassed 37 field goals with Carolina in 1996.

2000

- Jan. 2 – In a 21-10 loss to the Washington Redskins at FedEx Field, Olindo Mare kicks a 39-yard field goal, his 39th and final of the 1999 season, extending his NFL record of most field goal made in a single season.
- Jan. 9 – The Dolphins defeat the Seattle Seahawks, 20-17, in an AFC First-Round Playoff game at the Kingdome, the final football game at the stadium. The win is Miami's first road playoff victory since they defeated the Pittsburgh Steelers in the 1972 AFC Championship Game at Three Rivers Stadium. Quarterback Dan Marino completes 17 of 30 passes for 196 yards with one touchdown and no interceptions in the victory, in which he guided a late drive that led to the game-winning touchdown with 4:48 remaining.
- Jan. 15 – The Dolphins drop a 62-7 decision to the Jacksonville Jaguars in an AFC Divisional Playoff game at ALLTEL Stadium. The contest would be the final one in the playing career of quarterback Dan Marino and coaching career of Jimmy Johnson.
- Jan. 16 – Jimmy Johnson, the Dolphins' General Manager/Head Coach since 1996, retires. Dave Wannstedt, the team's Assistant Head Coach in 1999, is named Head Coach.
- Jan. 24 – Jim Bates is named defensive coordinator, replacing George Hill. Clarence Brooks is named defensive line coach, replacing Cary Godette.
- Feb. 1 – Chan Gailey, the Head Coach with the Dallas Cowboys from 1998-99, is named offensive coordinator, replacing Kippy Brown. Randy Shannon, a defensive assistant with the Dolphins from 1998-99, is promoted to linebackers coach.
- Feb. 7 – Mike Shula, the offensive coordinator with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 1996-99, re-joins the Dolphins as quarterbacks coach, replacing Larry Seiple. Shula previously had served as an assistant on Miami's coaching staff from 1991-92. Judd Garrett is named as an offensive assistant, and Robert Nunn is named as a defensive assistant.
- Feb. 10 – Quarterback Dan Marino, the Dolphins' first-round draft choice in 1983 and the NFL's all-time leading passer, voids the final two years of his contract, thus becoming a free agent.
- Mar. 7 – The Dolphins sign 12-year veteran running back Thurman Thomas to a three-year contract as a free agent. Thomas, who played with Buffalo for each of the first 12 years of his career and was a member of four Bills Super Bowl teams, is the all-time leading rusher against the Dolphins.
- Mar. 13 – Dan Marino announces his retirement from professional football.
- Apr. 14 – The Dolphins unveil Dan Marino's permanent encased locker at the team's Nova Southeastern University training facility, the first of its kind in club history.
- Apr. 28 – The Dave Wannstedt era officially begins as the Dolphins take the field for the first time in minicamp under the new Dolphins head coach.
- May 3 – The Dolphins name Rick Spielman as Vice President-Player Personnel. Spielman had served as Director of Pro Personnel with the Chicago Bears since 1997.
- June 12 – Huizenga Holdings, Inc., the private company that represents many of the non-publicly traded business interests of the Huizenga family, announces that it retained the investment banking firm of Morgan Stanley Dean Whitter to explore strategic alternatives regarding the financial structure of the Miami Dolphins and Pro Player Stadium. Alternatives include the potential of additional investors in the team and the stadium, as well as naming rights for the stadium.
- Aug. 21 – The portion of N.W. 199 Street in front of Pro Player Stadium is re-named "Dan Marino Boulevard". The new address for the Dolphins' home becomes 2269 Dan Marino Boulevard.
- Aug. 23 – More than 50,000 fans show up at Pro Player Stadium for the public tribute to Dan Marino. The night's festivities include appearances by the five other members of the famed quarterback "Class of '83" – John Elway, Jim Kelly, Todd Blackledge, Tony Eason and Ken O'Brien – as well as former Dolphins Head Coach Don Shula and former Steelers quarterback Terry Bradshaw. The band "Hootie and the Blowfish" provide the musical entertainment, while the four-hour event concludes with a gala fireworks display.
- Sept. 3 – Jay Fiedler opens at quarterback in the Dolphins' season-opener against Seattle at Pro Player Stadium. Fiedler is the first quarterback to start on opening day for the

Dolphins other than Dan Marino since 1983. Fiedler completes 15 of 24 passes for 134 yards with one touchdown and no interceptions in the Dolphins' 23-0 win, the third shutout victory on opening day in franchise history and the first since 1983.

- Sept. 17 – The Dolphins defeat the eventual Super Bowl champion Baltimore Ravens, 19-6, in a game that was played through a steady rain at Pro Player Stadium. At halftime of the game, former quarterback Dan Marino has his jersey No. 13 retired, the second Dolphin ever to receive that honor. He also becomes the 13th member of the Dolphin Honor Roll.
- Oct. 8 – For the first time since September 21, 1997 at Tampa Bay, the Dolphins wear their white jerseys with white pants in a 22-13 victory over Buffalo at Pro Player Stadium.
- Oct. 23 – On a Monday night at the Meadowlands, the Dolphins hold a commanding 30-7 fourth-quarter lead over the New York Jets. The Jets, however, post 30 of the 37 points scored in the fourth quarter to send the game into overtime, where John Hall ended the four hour, ten minute epic with a 40-yard field goal, 6:47 into the extra period. It was the largest comeback win ever against the Dolphins, while it also marked the longest game in the 31-year history of ABC Monday Night Football.
- Dec. 10 – In a 16-13 loss to Tampa Bay at Pro Player Stadium, running back Lamar Smith rushes for 79 yards and surpasses the 1,000-yard rushing plateau for the season. Smith becomes the first Dolphin to accomplish the feat since Karim Abdul-Jabbar in 1996 and the fifth player overall to do it.
- Dec. 24 – The Dolphins earn a 27-24 victory over the Patriots on Christmas Eve at Foxboro Stadium to claim the 16th AFC East title in club history and the first since 1994. Thirty-five minutes following the apparent conclusion of the game, both teams were summoned back onto the field after it was determined that three seconds still remained with the Patriots having the ball at their own 40. Michael Bishop's final pass attempt of the game fell incomplete at about the Dolphins' 25.
- Dec. 30 – The Dolphins erase a 14-0 third-quarter deficit by scoring 23 of the next 26 points en route to a 23-17 overtime win against the Colts in an AFC First-Round Playoff game at Pro Player Stadium. It marks the second-largest comeback win in Dolphins postseason annals. The winning points are scored on a 17-yard run by running back Lamar Smith with 3:34 to play in the first overtime. It caps a day in which Smith set an NFL playoff record with 40 rushing attempts. His 209 rushing yards is the second-highest figure in NFL playoff history and the most-ever by a Dolphin (regular season or postseason) at the time.

2001

- Jan. 6 – The Raiders defeat the Dolphins, 27-0, in a Divisional Playoff game in Oakland. It is the first time that Miami has been shutout in 38 postseason contests.
- Jan. 15 – Keith Armstrong is named special teams coach, replacing Mike Westhoff, and Tony Wise is hired as offensive line coach, replacing Paul Boudreau.
- Jan. 27 – Former linebacker Nick Buoniconti, who anchored Miami's "No-Name" defense, leading the Dolphins to two straight Super Bowl victories, becomes the eighth former Dolphin to be elected into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, and the first defensive player.
- Feb. 2 – Head Coach Dave Wannstedt signs a one-year contract extension through the 2003 season.
- Mar. 1 – Bob Sanders is named linebackers coach, replacing Randy Shannon, who became the defensive coordinator at the University of Miami.
- Apr. 30 – Offensive tackle Richmond Webb, the Dolphins first-round draft choice in 1990 and a seven-time Pro Bowl selection, officially ends his tenure with the Dolphins when he signs a three-year contract with the Cincinnati Bengals as an unrestricted free agent.
- May 9 – Vice President of Player Personnel Rick Spielman signs a one-year contract extension through the 2003 season. In addition, Ron Labadie is promoted to Director of College Scouting, after serving as the Dolphins' midwest scout since 1990. Tom Braatz, the team's Director of College Scouting since 1992, is named as a scout, and John Crea is named as the Dolphins' midwest area scout.
- June 4 – George Paton is named Director of Pro Personnel, replacing Tom Heckert, Jr., who was named Director of Player Personnel with the Philadelphia Eagles.
- Aug. 4 – Former linebacker Nick Buoniconti is inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, the eighth Dolphin and first defensive player to earn that honor.
- Sept. 9 – The Dolphins record their tenth consecutive opening day victory with a 31-23 decision over the Tennessee Titans in Miami's first-ever visit to Nashville's Adelphia Coliseum. Among the Dolphins' four touchdowns on the night was a Zach Thomas 34-yard interception return for a touchdown, the fourth of his career, setting a new club all-time record.

- Sept. 13 – In the wake of the September 11 terrorist attacks, the NFL announces that it will cancel games for the weekend of September 16-17. The Dolphins game against the Buffalo Bills at Pro Player Stadium is re-scheduled for Sunday, January 6.
- Dec. 10 – The Dolphins earn a resounding 41-6 victory over the Indianapolis Colts on a Monday night at Pro Player Stadium, the last game that these two teams would play as AFC East opponents, prior to realignment in 2002. For the Dolphins, it was their 36th victory on Monday Night Football, as they surpassed San Francisco as the winningest team in MNF history.
- Dec. 16 – The Dolphins are handed a 21-0 shutout by the San Francisco 49ers at 3Com Park. Coupled with their 24-0 loss to the Jets at Pro Player Stadium on November 18, it marks just the third time in franchise history and the first time since 1970 that the Dolphins suffer two shutout losses in the same season.
- Dec. 22 – Playing their third game in 13 days, the Dolphins drop a 20-13 decision to the New England Patriots, in the last regular season game ever played at Foxboro Stadium.
- Dec. 30 – With a 21-14 win over Atlanta at Pro Player Stadium, the Dolphins clinch their fifth playoff appearance in a row, as they become the only NFL team to reach the postseason in each of the last five years, a span ranging from 1997-01.

2002

- Jan. 6 – In a game that was originally scheduled to be played on September 16, but cancelled because of terrorist attacks, the Dolphins clinch a home First-Round Playoff game with a 34-7 season ending win over Buffalo, just the fourth time in team history that the Dolphins have played a regular season game in the month of January. On the game's final play, Brock Marion picks off a Travis Brown pass and races 100 yards for a touchdown, as the Dolphins establish a club single-season record for interception returns for touchdowns (five) and defensive touchdowns (six).
- Jan. 28 – Bryan Wiedmeier is promoted to Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer and Rick Spielman is promoted to Senior Vice President – Football Operations/Player Personnel.
- Feb. 5 – The Dolphins name Norv Turner as their Assistant Head Coach/Offensive Coordinator, taking over from Chan Gailey, who had been named Head Coach at Georgia Tech. In addition to serving as Head Coach with the Washington Redskins from 1994-00, Turner also was the offensive coordinator with both Dallas (1991-93) and San Diego (2001).
- Feb. 13 – Head Coach Dave Wannstedt signs a one-year contract extension through the 2004 season.
- March 8 – The Dolphins acquire former Heisman Trophy winning running back Ricky Williams from the New Orleans Saints in exchange for a 2002 first-round draft choice and a conditional third-round pick in 2003. In addition, the teams swapped positions in the fourth round of the '02 draft.
- March 14 – The Dolphins and WQAM Radio sign a new two-year contract for the station to continue to serve as the team's flagship through 2003.
- March 26 – Howard David is named as the Dolphins' new play-by-play announcer. He joins Jim Mandich, who will continue to serve as the color analyst on the team's radio broadcasts on WQAM.
- June 5 – At the team's annual Kickoff Banquet, President Eddie Jones announces that former running back Larry Csonka will have his uniform jersey No. 39 retired during halftime ceremonies of the Dolphins' December 9 game against Chicago at Pro Player Stadium. Csonka will become the third player to receive this honor, joining QB Bob Griese (No. 12 on May 6, 1982) and QB Dan Marino (No. 13 on September 17, 2000).
- Sept. 8 – The Dolphins record their 11th consecutive opening day victory with a 49-21 decision over the Detroit Lions at Pro Player Stadium. Making his Dolphins debut, RB Ricky Williams rushes for 111 yards and two touchdowns on 20 carries, the fifth-highest rushing total by a player in his initial appearance as a Dolphin.
- Sept. 22 – The Dolphins snap an eight-game losing streak to the Jets with a convincing 30-3 win at Pro Player Stadium. The victory also marks the Dolphins' 17th straight at home during the regular season in the months of August/September. Ricky Williams rushes for 151 yards and a touchdown on 24 attempts, becoming the first player in team history to amass three straight 100-yard rushing games. Coupled with his 132-yard effort the previous week at Indianapolis, his two-game rushing total of 283 yards sets a new Dolphins record, surpassing the old mark of 273, which had been held by Bernie Parmalee since 1994. Williams will go on to break this two-game record three subsequent times during the course of the season.

- Oct. 13 – In their first of four prime-time appearances of the year, the Dolphins register a 24-22 win over the Denver Broncos in their first-ever visit to INVESCO Field at Mile High. Jason Elam's 55-yard field goal with 45 seconds to play gives Denver a 22-21 lead. Olindo Mare counters with a 53-yarder with six seconds remaining to lift the Dolphins to the victory. It marks the first time in NFL history that a kicker from each team has accounted for a field goal of 50 yards or longer with less than a minute to play in a game. Although he finished the game, quarterback Jay Fiedler sustains a fractured right thumb and misses the Dolphins' next five games and his next six starts. Wide receiver Oronde Gadsden, the team's leading receiver each of the previous two seasons (2000-01), suffers a wrist injury which sidelines him for the remainder of the year.
- Nov. 24 – Ricky Williams establishes a new club single-season standard with his sixth 100-yard rushing game of the season with a 143-yard, two-touchdown effort in a 30-3 victory over San Diego at Pro Player Stadium. He breaks the old mark of five, which was first set by Delvin Williams in 1978.
- Dec. 1 – In a 38-21 loss to the Bills in Buffalo, Ricky Williams further etches his name into the Dolphins' record book when he rushes for 228 yards and two touchdowns on 27 carries. This single-game total surpasses the previous record of 209 yards, set by Lamar Smith in a 2000 First-Round Playoff victory over Indianapolis. In the process, Williams also surpasses Delvin Williams' club single-season record of 1,258 yards, achieved in 1978. In addition, with Williams overtaking the 1,200-yard rushing mark, the conditional third-round draft choice in 2003 that the Dolphins sent to the Saints in the trade for Williams on March 8, now becomes a second-round pick.
- Dec. 9 – In a 27-9 victory over the Chicago Bears in a Monday night game at Pro Player Stadium, Ricky Williams becomes just the third player (fourth time) in NFL history to amass back-to-back 200-yard rushing games, as he runs for 216 yards and two touchdowns on 31 carries. He joins Hall of Famers O.J. Simpson (1973, 1976) and Earl Campbell (1980) as the only players to achieve this feat. His two-game rushing total of 444 yards is the fourth-most in NFL annals, while his 587 yards over the three-game span is third-most in league history. In the process, he breaks his own club record with his fourth consecutive 100-yard rushing performance. It also represents his fourth straight game with a pair of rushing scores. His total for the game gives him 1,500 yards for the season, as the second-round draft choice that the Saints get from the Dolphins as part of the trade now becomes a first-rounder in '03. At halftime of the game, former FB Larry Csonka has his jersey No. 39 retired, just the third Dolphin ever to receive that honor, joining quarterbacks Bob Griese (No. 12) and Dan Marino (No. 13). The rest of the 1972 "Perfect Team" is honored during the halftime festivities as well, as part of the 30th anniversary celebration of the 17-0 club that captured the franchise's first Super Bowl title.
- Dec. 15 – The Dolphins defeat the eventual AFC champion Oakland Raiders, 23-17, at Pro Player Stadium, as Ricky Williams extends his club-record streak of consecutive 100-yard rushing games to five with 101 yards on 27 attempts. Defensive end Jason Taylor leads the defensive charge with three sacks as he sets a Dolphins record with a sack in seven straight games.
- Dec. 21 – The Dolphins fall to the Vikings, 20-17, at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome on a Saturday afternoon. A win would have secured the AFC East title for the Dolphins over the weekend as New England is defeated by the Jets on Sunday. Jason Taylor is credited with 1.5 sacks as he ties Bill Stanfill's club single-season record for sacks with 18.5. He also extends his streak of consecutive games with a sack to eight. That streak will come to an end in the season finale the following week as he is shut out by the Patriots. Taylor's sack total leads the NFL in 2002, as he becomes the first Dolphin ever to achieve that feat.
- Dec. 29 – The Dolphins drop a 27-24 overtime decision to the Patriots in their first-ever visit to Gillette Stadium. The Patriots produce 11 points over the final 2:46 to send the game into overtime, where Adam Vinatieri's 35-yard field 2:03 into the extra period gives New England the victory. A win by the Dolphins would have given them the AFC East title. A win by the Jets over the Green Bay Packers later in the day makes the Jets the 2002 AFC East champions, thus eliminating the Dolphins from the playoffs for the first time since 1996. Ricky Williams rushes for 185 yards and two touchdowns on 31 attempts. His second score of the game occurs on a 14-yard run in the second quarter, his 16th rushing touchdown of the season as he establishes a new Dolphins single-season record for rushing touchdowns, surpassing the previous mark of 15 by Karim Abdul-Jabbar in 1997. Williams also finishes the year as the team's single-season leader for rushing yards (1,853), attempts (383), 100-yard rushing games (10) and total yards from scrimmage (2,216). His rushing total also leads the NFL, as he becomes the first Dolphin ever to earn that distinction.

2003

- Feb. 2 – Ricky Williams rushes for 56 yards and two touchdowns on 11 attempts, catches three passes for 18 yards while also forcing a fumble on special teams in the AFC's 45-20 victory over the NFC in the Pro Bowl in Honolulu. For his efforts, Williams is named the game's MVP, just the second Dolphin ever to win that honor, joining kicker Garo Yepremian who came away with the award in the 1974 game.
- Feb. 13 – The Dolphins name Glenn Pires as assistant defensive line coach, replacing Robert Nunn, who left to become defensive line coach with the Washington Redskins. Pires had spent the previous two seasons as linebackers coach with the Detroit Lions.
- March 28 – The Dolphins sign linebacker Zach Thomas to a five-year contract extension through the 2008 season.
- April 16 – The Dolphins acquire perennial All-Pro linebacker Junior Seau from the San Diego Chargers in exchange for a conditional 2004 draft choice.
- May 2 – Tom Braatz, a veteran of 38 seasons as an NFL front office executive, announces his retirement. Braatz had joined the Dolphins in 1992 as Director of College Scouting and spent his final two years with the club as a college scout. Chris Grier, the team's southeast college scout the past three years, is promoted to national scout.
- May 4 – Former Dolphin David Woodley (1980-83), an eighth-round draft choice in 1980 who started at quarterback for the Dolphins in Super Bowl XVII against Washington, passes away in his hometown of Shreveport, La.
- May 9 – Quarterbacks Coach Mike Shula, who played quarterback at the University of Alabama from 1983-86, is introduced as the school's head coach.
- June 9 – The Dolphins sign former Denver Broncos quarterback Brian Griese to a two-year contract. Griese is the son of former Dolphins quarterback, Bob, who played with the team from 1967-80 and led Miami to three Super Bowl appearances and two World Championships.

Oakland quarterback Daryle Lamonica unloaded an 82-yard touchdown pass to Rod Sherman with 9:34 left to play as Oakland spoiled the Dolphins' first appearance in the playoffs, 21-14, on a field oozing with mud. The Dolphins, who had won six consecutive games to finish the season 10-4 and gain a wild-card berth, took a 7-0 lead in the second quarter when Bob Griese fired a 16-yard strike to Paul Warfield in the end zone. Lamonica matched that TD with a 22-yard toss to Fred Biletnikoff only 1:50 before halftime. Raider right cornerback Willie Brown intercepted a wet and wobbly pass by Griese and fled 50 yards along the sideline for the tie-breaking TD. It came minutes after Jake Scott recovered an Oakland fumble at the Miami 10-yard line. The heave to Sherman was insurance. Only three plays earlier, Dolphin kicker Garo Yepremian missed a 24-yard field goal attempt for the second time in the game. Oakland's George Blanda also missed a 23-yarder.

Garo Yepremian ended 82 minutes and 40 seconds of an epic struggle by booting a 37-yard field goal with 7:40 elapsed in the second overtime, lifting the Dolphins past Kansas City, 27-24, on Christmas Day. The Dolphins battled from behind three times to tie the AFC West champions, the third time on Bob Griese's five-yard pass to tight end Marv Fleming with 96 seconds remaining in regulation. Kansas City running back Ed Podolak, who amassed 350 yards of all-purpose running, returned the ensuing kickoff 78 yards to the Dolphin 22 where Curtis Johnson missed a desperation tackle. With 35 seconds on the clock, Jan Stenerud missed a 32-yard field-goal try. Stenerud had a 42-yarder blocked by Nick Buoniconti in the fifth quarter, and Yepremian was short with a 45-yard effort. But Larry Csonka crashed 29 yards to the Chiefs 36, and that put Yepremian, the NFL's scoring leader, in position to win it. Goal posts were on the goal line; in 1974 the uprights were moved to the end line.

Three lightning plays and a persistent defense propelled the Dolphins into Super Bowl VI with a 21-0 rout of Baltimore before an all-time Orange Bowl record crowd of 78,939. Strong safety Dick Anderson intercepted a Johnny Unitas pass which was deflected by Curtis Johnson, and behind a wall of six open-field blocks, Anderson weaved 62 yards for a third-quarter touchdown. "My eyes were popping as I ran," Anderson said. "I've never seen so many people land on their heads." Before Anderson's convoy made it 14-0, the Dolphins staggered the defending Super Bowl champions when Bob Griese and Paul Warfield hooked up for a 75-yard TD pass. Warfield applied the clincher when he escaped 50 yards with a Griese pass, setting up a five-yard TD slam by fullback Larry Csonka. The Colts had not been held scoreless for 97 games over seven seasons. They were stopped at the Dolphin nine in the second quarter. Jim O'Brien missed two field-goal attempts and had another blocked by Lloyd Mumphord.

SUPER BOWL VI

A 252-yard rushing attack and sharp passing by Roger Staubach spurred the Dallas Cowboys to a 24-3 victory over the Dolphins at Tulane Stadium. Duane Thomas pranced 95 yards on 19 carries, fullback Walt Garrison added 74 yards on 14 carries and Staubach passed twice for touchdowns to Lance Alworth and Mike Ditka. Staubach, who was sacked twice in the first quarter, bounced back to complete 12 of 19 passes, and he scrambled from the Dolphin pass rush five times. The Dolphins were frustrated all day; in the first quarter, Larry Csonka lost a fumble and Bob Griese was chased by tackle Bob Lilly for a 29-yard loss. Griese also fumbled away a snap at the Dallas 16 in the fourth period. Although it was an intriguing 10-3 at halftime, the Cowboys marched 71 yards in eight plays after the kickoff, and Thomas swept three yards for the TD.

On the ropes in the fourth quarter after an unprecedented 14 victories, the Dolphins responded to a poised Earl Morrall and drove 80 yards for a touchdown with 4:56 to play for a 20-14 victory over the Cleveland Browns. Morrall, the NFL's leading passer after replacing the injured Bob Griese 10 weeks earlier, had completed only four passes for 38 yards. But he threw 15 and 35 yards to Paul Warfield, reaching the Browns 20, and a pass interference call against linebacker Billy Andrews put

the ball at the eight. Halfback Jim Kiick then bulled eight yards up the middle on a trap for the winning points. The triumph was sealed with a minute to play when Dolphin linebacker Doug Swift intercepted Cleveland QB Mike Phipps at the Dolphin 20. "This is the ultimate," Coach Don Shula said quietly after his unbeaten Dolphins dominated the Washington Redskins, 14-7, to cap a perfect season. It was Shula's first Super Bowl triumph in three tries. A record Super Bowl paid crowd of 90,182 saw the Dolphins surge to a 14-0 halftime lead even as one touchdown was nullified by an offside penalty. Miami intercepted three of Bill Kilmer's passes, and Manny Fernandez scuttled the Redskin running game with 17 tackles. An original Dolphin, Howard Twilley, eluded cornerback Pat Fischer to snare a 28-yard touchdown pass from Bob Griese in the first quarter. Griese's 57-yard TD bomb to Paul Warfield was erased by the penalty, but a 32-yard interception return by linebacker Nick Buoniconti set up the Dolphins' second score. Safety Jake Scott thwarted Kilmer with an end zone interception and 55-yard runback. The Redskins finally scored on a bizarre 49-yard fumble recovery by Mike Bass after a blocked field goal and attempted pass by kicker Garo Yepremian. Scott was named MVP.

Winning for the 32nd time in 34 games, the Dolphins repeated as Super Bowl champions and proved themselves "Best Ever" with a 24-7 rout of the Minnesota Vikings at Rice Stadium. There was no doubt from the beginning. The Dolphins swept 62 yards in 10 plays with the opening kickoff, scoring on Larry Csonka's five-yard smash. Minnesota punted, and the onslaught resumed with a 56-yard, 10-play Dolphin drive capped by Jim Kiick's one-yard plunge. It was 17-0 before the Vikings crossed their 40, and a fourth-down fumble by Minnesota's Oscar Reed was recovered by safety Jake Scott at the Dolphin six-yard line. A brilliant, diving catch by Paul Warfield netted 27 yards on a third-quarter TD drive that hiked the score to 24-0. Csonka finished with his best-ever total of 145 yards on 33 carries. The Dolphins rushed for 703 yards and outscored opponents 85-33 in the three-game playoff blitz. Csonka's yardage was a Super Bowl record and he was named MVP.

The Dolphins got as close as 20-7 with a seven-yard TD pass from Bob Griese to Duriel Harris in the third period, but Pittsburgh responded with a 69-yard TD drive. The Steelers marched 62, 62 and 56 yards for their first-quarter scores when quarterback Terry Bradshaw completed 8 of 10 passes, including touchdowns to John Stallworth and Lynn Swann, who was standing alone in the end zone. 1981 AFC PLAYOFF

CHARGERS 41, DOLPHINS 38 (OT) January 2, 1982

Orange Bowl Miami, FL

A record-setting showcase of the passing game resulted in NFL playoff marks for most points (79), most total yards (1,036) and most drama as the San Diego Chargers outlasted the Dolphins 41-38 in overtime. "The Miracle That Died" was the Miami Herald headline after the Dolphins rallied behind reserve quarterback Don Strock to overcome a 24-point deficit. The Pro Football Hall of Fame voted the contest as the "NFL's Game of the '80s." Strock completed 29 of 43 passes for 403 yards and four touchdowns, spurring the Dolphins to a 38-31 lead. A 12-yard sweep by Tony Nathan on the first play of the fourth quarter put the Dolphins on top. But Charger quarterback Dan Fouts, who passed for an NFL record 4,802 yards during the season, led an 82-yard drive capped by a 9-yard pass to James Brooks to tie the game with 58 seconds remaining. Five players had more than 100 yards in receptions, topped by Charger tight end Kellen Winslow with 13 catches for 166 yards. Fouts, who finished with 433 yards on 33 of 53 marksmanship, hooked up with Charlie Joiner for 39 yards to the Dolphin 10-yard line. Rolf Benirschke then kicked a 29-yard field goal to end the struggle after 13:52 of overtime. Benirschke had missed a 27-yard attempt eight minutes earlier, and Miami's Uwe von Schamann had two attempts blocked – a 43-yarder on the last play of regulation and a 35-yarder after 11:27 of overtime. It was the first game in NFL history in which two quarterbacks passed for more than 400 yards.

For the first time in nine years, the Miami Dolphins won a playoff game, defeating the New England Patriots 28-13. Dolphin QB David Woodley had one of his finest games, completing 16 of 19 passes for 246 yards and two TDs. He was a perfect 8-8 in the second half. The Dolphins had not experienced a playoff win since January 13, 1974, when they downed Minnesota in Super Bowl VIII. The Dolphins took command in the second quarter, putting together back-to-back TD drives of 76 and 79 yards that turned a 3-0 deficit into a 14-3 halftime advantage. The four Miami TDs came on a pair of two-yard passes from David Woodley to tight end Bruce Hardy, a one-yard run by Andrea Franklin and Woody Bennett's two-yard burst up the middle. Franklin finished with 112 yards on 26 carries, but lost the ball three times on fumbles. Two of those fumbles resulted in John Smith field goals of 23 and 42 yards for New England.

The Dolphins choked off the famed Charger offense and won 34-13. The Dolphin defense stopped the San Diego offense, holding it to a total of 247 yards – 203 yards below its league-leading average - while holding the Chargers scoreless in the second half. Dolphin defenders intercepted QB Dan Fouts five times, sacked him three times and held the Chargers to 15 completions for 191 yards – their lowest output since a January, 1982, playoff game in the ice at Cincinnati. The Dolphin offense kept Fouts and Company on the sideline by utilizing ball control that produced 80 plays to San Diego's 54 and an overwhelming time of possession advantage; the Dolphins had the ball for 40:46 to the Chargers' 19:14. Dolphin QB David Woodley guided his team to a 214-yard ground attack while connecting on 17-22 passes for 195 yards and two TDs. Woodley opened the scoring with a three-yard pass to Nat Moore in the first quarter and made it 14-0 by directing Miami 89 yards on 13 plays. Charger kickoff returner Hank Bauer fumbled a kickoff which was recovered by Uwe von Schamann at the Charger 23-yard line. Seven plays later, Woodley hit tight end Ronnie Lee on a six-yard look-in pass for the score. On the next kickoff, Dolphin rookie Rich Diana recovered a fumble by the Chargers' James Brooks, but this time Miami had to settle for a 29-yard von Schamann field goal. The Chargers scored two late TDs, one on a 28-yard pass from Fouts to Charlie Joiner and the other on Chuck Muncie's one-yard dive that ended the San Diego scoring. Von Schamann added a second field goal shortly before the end of the first half and Woodley scored on a seven-yard QB draw early in the fourth quarter.

interceptions, including one he returned for a 35-yard TD. The Dolphins set an NFL record by being the first team to have defeated the same team three times in a season – two times during the regular season and once in a playoff game. On nine occasions since the AFL-NFL merger, teams had met three times in a season – but no team had won all three games. Before a crowd of 67,396, the Dolphins' Woody Bennett rumbled seven yards up the middle to score the only points the Dolphins would need. That came in the third quarter after the teams had trudged through a scoreless first half on the soggy Prescription Athletic Turf.

SUPER BOWL XVII

The Washington Redskins, behind the power running of John Riggins, came from behind to win Super Bowl XVII in the famed Rose Bowl, beating Miami 27-17. Before the second-largest crowd for a Super Bowl – 103,667 fans – the Redskins took the lead for the first time with a little more than 10 minutes left on the clock. The game was marked by a Super Bowl record performance by Fulton Walker, who returned four kickoffs 190 yards, including a 98-yard TD that gave Miami a 17-10 halftime lead. It was the first kickoff returned for a TD in Super Bowl history and the longest kickoff return in playoff history. Riggins ran up 166 yards on 38 carries, both Super Bowl records. On a short-yardage play – fourth-and-one from the Redskin 43 with 10:01 to play – Riggins broke a tackle and scored on a 43-yard run. Riggins accounted for 181 total yards, five more yards than the entire Miami offense could manage in the game. In the first quarter, Miami jumped to a quick lead with a 76-yard David Woodley to Jimmy Cefalo pass for a TD.

The Miami Dolphins saw their season end on a sour note as they lost a 27-20 decision to the Seattle Seahawks in the first round of the AFC playoffs. Before 71,032 fans in the Orange Bowl, Dolphin rookie quarterback Dan Marino returned from his December 4 knee injury. On their second possession, the Dolphins launched a 12-play, 80-yard drive ending with a 19-yard TD pass from Marino to tight end Dan Johnson (PAT missed). A 59-yard return by Zachary Dixon on the ensuing kickoff led to a six-yard scoring toss from Seattle's Dave Krieg to Cullen Bryant with the extra point, giving the Seahawks a one point lead. Miami immediately retaliated, using a 17-yard Marino to Mark Duper hook-up to pave the way for a 32-yard circus catch by Duper for the touchdown. Early in the third quarter, a David Overstreet fumble in Seattle territory set the Seahawks up for a 55-yard TD march featuring a 28-yard completion from Krieg to Paul Johns, and culminating in a one-yard run by Curt Warner. Norm Johnson's 27-yard field goal early in the fourth quarter gave Seattle a 17-13 lead. The Dolphins managed to regain the lead at 20-17 following a Gerald Small interception (18-yard return) and Woody Bennett's two-yard run with only 3:43 remaining. However, the lead was shortlived as the Seahawks came right back to score on Warner's short run following a pair of Krieg to Steve Largent completions for a total of 56 yards. Miami's Fulton Walker then fumbled the Seattle kickoff, thus leading to a 37-yard Johnson field goal. Another Walker kickoff fumble iced the game for the Seahawks, who were participating in the playoffs for the first time in their eight-year history.

The Miami Dolphins, led by quarterback Dan Marino's three touchdown passes and a defense that shut out the opposition in three of four quarters, defeated the Seattle Seahawks 31-10 before 73,469 fans in the Orange Bowl. The Dolphins moved in front on their second possession and stayed there. Running back Tony Nathan keyed the 68-yard drive by gaining 38 yards on four carries, including the touchdown on a 14-yard run. A 26-yard Marino to Mark Clayton completion was the long play of the scoring march. A 32-yard interception return by Seattle's John Harris and a 25-yard pass from Dave Krieg to Steve Largent paved the way for Norm Johnson's 27-yard field goal that cut Miami's lead to 7-3. The Dolphins, however, came right back to score on their next series as a 20-yard reception by Woody Bennett preceded Marino's 34-yard scoring hook-up with Jimmy Cefalo. The Seahawks made it 14-10 at halftime when Largent scored on a 56-yard catch-and-run play. After Miami's defense had stopped Seattle on the Dolphin 24-yard line to open the second half, the Dolphins embarked on a 13-play, 76-yard TD drive that included a Bruce Hardy touchdown catch from three yards out. After the Seahawks' Jeff West managed just a seven-yard punt, Clayton made an acrobatic catch on a tipped ball in the end zone for a 33-yard TD. Miami closed out the scoring on Uwe von Schamann's 37-yard field goal in a drive that featured a 32-yard Marino to Hardy pass.

The Miami Dolphins, led by Dan Marino's 421 yards passing (four touchdowns) and Mark Duper's 148 yards receiving, advanced to Super Bowl XIX by defeating the Pittsburgh Steelers 45-28 in the AFC Championship Game before 76,029 fans in the Orange Bowl. The Dolphins scored on their first offensive series as they moved 67 yards in four plays following a William Judson interception, with the TD coming on a 40-yard pass from Marino to Mark Clayton. Pittsburgh's first score came on Rich Erenberg's seven-yard run that had been set up by Walter Abercrombie's 38 yards gained in the 66-yard march. A 26-yard Uwe von Schamann field goal preceded a 65-yard toss from the Steelers' Mark Malone to John Stallworth that gave Pittsburgh a 14-10 lead. The Dolphins then scored two TDs in the final 2:52 of the first half, the first score coming on a 41-yard reception by Duper. After Lyle Blackwood's interception, Marino hit TE Joe Rose for a 28-yard gain before Tony Nathan gave the Dolphins a 24-14 lead on a two-yard run. Miami then scored on its first three second-half possessions, leading off with Marino's 36-yard scoring strike to Duper. The Steelers closed the gap to 31-21 on Malone's 19-yarder to Stallworth (33-yarder to Louis Lipps in drive). Completions to Duper (41 yards), Nathan (20 yards) and Nat Moore (28 yards) then led to a one-yard TD dive by Woody Bennett. Moore then caught a six-yard touchdown pass before Wayne Capers closed out the scoring with a 29-yard TD reception.

SUPER BOWL XIX

The Miami Dolphins, unable to score in the game's final two quarters, dropped a 38-16 decision to the San Francisco 49ers in Super Bowl XIX before 84,059 fans in Stanford Stadium. The Dolphins were outgained in the contest by a 537-314 margin with the 49ers maintaining possession for 37:11. Miami opened the scoring on its first possession as Uwe von Schamann converted a 37-yard field

goal (key play – Dan Marino's 25-yard completion to Tony Nathan). San Francisco jumped ahead 7-3 when QB Joe Montana led the Niners on an eight-play, 78-yard drive that culminated in a 33-yard TD toss to Carl Monroe. The Dolphins scored their only touchdown of the game on their next series as two Marino completions to Mark Clayton (18, 13 yards) and a 21-yarder to Dan Johnson paved the way for Johnson's two-yard scoring catch. Touchdown runs of eight and two yards by Roger Craig and Montana's six-yard scamper gave San Francisco a 28-10 lead. Von Schamann then connected on field goals of 31 and 30 yards in the final 12 seconds of the first half to close the Dolphin deficit to 28-16. The 49ers upped their lead on their initial second-half possession on Ray Wersching's 27-yard field goal, before closing out the scoring on Craig's 16-yard scoring reception (key play – 40-yard Montana to Wendell Tyler pass play).

Most people had not given them much of a chance to win, but the 8-8 Cleveland Browns nearly upset the 12-4 Dolphins in the Orange Bowl. It would take two Ron Davenport touchdowns in the final 17 minutes to send Miami to a 24-21 victory and the AFC Championship Game against New England the following week. Fuad Reveiz put the Dolphins on the board early with a 51-yard field goal on Miami's first drive of the game. But Cleveland came back to score 21 unanswered points, and held a 21-3 advantage midway through the third quarter. Cleveland rookie quarterback Bernie Kosar, who had played two college seasons in the Orange Bowl for the University of Miami, hit Ozzie Newsome with a 16-yard touchdown pass for the Browns first points of the day. Earnest Byner (16-161) ran in from 21 yards out just before the half, and then he broke a 66-yard touchdown jaunt 3:38 into the second half. Just like that, the improbable began to look possible. Dan Marino connected with Nat Moore for a six-yard touchdown pass just over six minutes later and Miami had closed the margin to 21-10. Then it was time for Davenport (6-48) to show his stuff. First, he hit the hole for a 31-yard touchdown run late in the third period and then he closed the scoring and put Miami up for good, going over from one yard out with just 1:57 remaining in the game.

The New England Patriots garnered a bid to their first Super Bowl by snapping an 18-game losing streak to the Dolphins in Miami with a 31-14 triumph at the Orange Bowl. New England backs Craig James (22-105) and Robert Weathers (16-87) combined for 192 yards rushing and quarterback Tony Eason was on target with a 10-12 performance for 71 yards as the Pats set up a Super Bowl date with the Chicago Bears. After New England got on the board first with a Tony Franklin 23-yard field goal, the Dolphins stormed back for their only lead of the afternoon when Dan Marino passed 10 yards to Dan Johnson early in the second quarter. Eason brought New England right back with three touchdown tosses, and the Pats led 24-7 after three quarters. Dan Marino threw two fourth quarter touchdown passes to lead the Dolphins to a dramatic comeback-behind 17-16 playoff win over the Kansas City Chiefs before a crowd of 67,276 at Joe Robbie Stadium. In the final period, Marino hit on all eight of his pass attempts for 101 yards and two touchdowns. It was the 16th time in his career that Marino has engineered a fourth quarter comeback. Including the third quarter, Marino hit on his last ten pass attempts to lead the Dolphins back from a 13-3 deficit to a 17-16 win. The Chiefs opened the scoring in the first quarter when Charles Washington blocked a Reggie Roby punt and returned the ball to Miami's 37-yard line. However, Miami's defense stiffened and held the Chiefs to a 27-yard field goal by Nick Lowery. Miami kicker Pete Stoyanovich tied the score at 3-3 in the second period by booting an NFL playoff record 58-yard field goal. Stoyanovich's kick broke the previous record of 54 yards by Detroit's Eddie Murray on December 24, 1983, against San Francisco and it was the second-longest kick of Stoyanovich's career. The Chiefs took a 10-3 halftime lead by scoring on a 26-yard touchdown strike from Steve DeBerg to Stephone Paige. The Chiefs extended their lead to 16-3 on a pair of third quarter field goals by Lowery from 25 and 38 yards. In the fourth quarter, the Dolphins closed the score to 16-10 as Marino hit fullback Tony Paige with a one-yard touchdown pass. The key play in the drive was a two-yard run by Sammie Smith on a fourth-and-two from Kansas City's 45-yard line. The Dolphins forced the Chiefs to punt on their next possession and received the ball on their own 15-yard line with 10:39 left in the game. The Dolphins converted three third downs and drove to the Chiefs' 12-yard line with 3:28 left in the contest before Marino hit Mark Clayton with a 12-yard touchdown pass to give Miami a 17-16 lead. However, the Chiefs had a chance to win the game as they drove from their own 22-yard line to the Dolphin 34 before Lowery's 52-yard field goal attempt was just short.

The Miami Dolphins saw the 1990 season come to an end with a 44-34 loss to the Buffalo Bills in an AFC Divisional Playoff contest in the snow and ice at Rich Stadium. The game was an offensive shootout as the teams combined for 78 points, 48 first downs, 923 total net yards, 662 passing yards, 261 rushing yards, nine touchdowns and five field goals. Individually, Dan Marino (23 of 49 for 323 yards with three TDs and two INTs) and Jim Kelly (19-29-339-3-1) both passed for over 300 yards. Kelly became the only quarterback to throw for over 300 yards against the Dolphin defense in 1990. Mark Duper (three catches for 113 yards and a score) and Buffalo's Andre Reed (4-122-2) and James Lofton (7-149-1) all went over the 100-yard receiving mark. On the ground, the Bills' Thurman Thomas (32 carries for 117 yards and two TDs) and Miami's Sammie Smith (21-99) led the way. Buffalo dominated the first quarter and jumped out to a 13-3 lead. The Bills scored on their first possession as Kelly hit Reed with a 40-yard touchdown strike and the Dolphins answered the score with a 49-yard field goal to close the score to 7-3. Buffalo added a pair of Scott Norwood field goals – from 24 and 22 yards – to close the first quarter scoring. The Bills struck first in the second quarter on a five-yard run by Thomas to lead 20-3. Miami answered the score on its next possession as Marino and Duper combined for a 64-yard touchdown. The Bills came right back and scored as Kelly threw 13 yards for a score to Lofton to take a 27-10 lead. On their next possession Miami was forced to punt, however the Bills' Al Edwards fumbled the punt and Reggie Roby recovered for Miami on Buffalo's 47-yard line. Miami drove down to the two-yard line where Marino ran in for the score to narrow Buffalo's lead to 27-17 at the half. The Dolphins and Buffalo exchanged third quarter field goals as Stoyanovich hit from 22 yards and Norwood connected from 28 yards. Miami closed the score to 30-27 early in the fourth quarter as Marino threw a two-yard touchdown pass to offensive guard Roy Foster. It was the first reception and touchdown of Foster's career as he became the first offensive or defensive lineman to score an offensive touchdown in a post-season contest since Chicago Bears' defensive tackle William Perry rumbled in from a yard out in Super Bowl XX on January 26, 1986. However, the Bills struck back for 14 quick points to put the game away. First, Thomas scored his second touchdown of the game on a five-yard run. On the ensuing kickoff, Miami returner Marc Logan fumbled the ball and Norwood recovered for Buffalo on the Dolphins' 29-yard line. Two plays later, Kelly and Reed combined for a 26-yard scoring toss and a 44-27 lead. The Dolphins scored the final touchdown of the game with just 1:15 remaining as Marino hit Tony Martin with an eight-yard touchdown pass.

Miami cornerback Troy Vincent recorded a pair of interceptions and quarterback Dan Marino threw three touchdown passes to lead the Miami Dolphins to a 31-0 win over the San Diego Chargers in the AFC Divisional Playoffs before a crowd of 71,224 at Joe Robbie Stadium. Miami's 31-point margin of victory was the largest by the team in a playoff game. The previous largest margin of victory in the post-season by the Dolphins was three 21-point wins as Miami had a 21-0 win over the Baltimore Colts on January 2, 1972 in the Orange Bowl, a 34-13 win over the San Diego Chargers on January 16, 1983 in the Orange Bowl and a 31-10 win over the Seattle Seahawks on December 29, 1984 in the Orange Bowl. Overall, the Miami defense totaled four interceptions (also safety Louis Oliver and linebacker Bryan Cox), a forced fumble (by cornerback Stephen Braggs), a fumble recovery (by linebacker Dwight Hollier) and a sack (by defensive end Jeff Hunter). The Dolphins held the Chargers to just ten first downs (three rushing and seven passing), 202 yards of total offense (70 rushing and 132 passing) and three of 15 on third down conversions. The Chargers' 15 possessions ended in seven punts, four interceptions, twice on downs, once on a lost fumble and once at the end of the first half. Following a scoreless first quarter, the Dolphins exploded for 21 points in the second quarter to take a 21-0 lead at the half. Miami's 21 points in the second quarter was the most scored by the Dolphins in any quarter of a playoff game in team history. The previous team high for points in a quarter was 20 points which was scored by Miami in the second quarter against San Diego on January 6, 1983. Miami opened the scoring following a Vincent interception which gave the team possession on San Diego's 48-yard line. Marino led the Dolphins on a nine-play, 48-yard drive which was capped-off as Marino tossed a one-yard scoring pass to fullback Tony Paige. The Dolphins increased their lead to 14-0 later in the period as the team again gained possession of the ball following a Vincent interception and drove 37 yards and scored on a nine-yard connection from Marino to tight end Keith Jackson. Miami scored the final points of the first half as Marino again connected with Jackson and the tight end made a diving 30-yard reception in the end zone for the score. Jackson became just the fourth player in team history to record two touchdown receptions for the Dolphins in a playoff contest. Miami and San Diego played to a scoreless third quarter before the Dolphins scored the game's final ten points in the fourth quarter. Miami increased its lead to 24-0 early in the final stanza as kicker Pete Stoyanovich booted a 22-yard field goal. The Dolphins scored the final points of the game as running back Aaron Craver scored on a 25-yard run to increase the margin to 31-0.

The Miami Dolphins suffered five turnovers (two interceptions and three fumbles) as the team dropped a 29-10 decision to the Buffalo Bills in the AFC Championship Game before a crowd of 72,703 at Joe Robbie Stadium. Buffalo opened the scoring midway through the opening period as defensive end Bruce Smith sacked Miami quarterback Dan Marino and forced a fumble which was recovered by Bills linebacker Darryl Talley on the Dolphins' 47-yard line. Buffalo scored off the takeaway as Steve Christie converted on a 21-yard field goal. Miami tied the score at 3-3 later in the period as Pete Stoyanovich converted on a 51-yard field goal attempt. The Bills took a 10-3 lead early in the second period as quarterback Jim Kelly threw a 17-yard touchdown pass to running back Thurman Thomas. On Miami's next possession, Marino's pass attempt was batted in the air by Buffalo defensive end Phil Hansen and intercepted by Hansen on the Dolphins' 17-yard line. The Bills increased their lead to 13-3 as Christie kicked on a 33-yard field goal. Buffalo took a 20-3 lead early in the third quarter by capitalizing on another Miami turnover as kick returner Mike Williams fumbled the second half kickoff and Buffalo's Carwell Gardner recovered the ball on the Dolphins' 25-yard line. The Bills scored four plays later as running back Kenneth Davis ran into the end zone for a two-yard touchdown. Buffalo increased its lead to 26-3 as Christie hit on a pair of field goals from 21 and 31 yards. Miami closed the score to 26-10 as Marino connected with wide receiver Mark Duper on a 15-yard touchdown pass. With the TD pass, Marino extended his streak to ten consecutive playoff games with one or more touchdown passes which is tied with the Raiders' Ken Stabler (1973-77) for the NFL's all-time record for consecutive post-season games with a touchdown pass. In addition, Duper's touchdown reception was his fifth post-season touchdown catch and broke the team's playoff record for career touchdown receptions. Duper was tied with wide receiver Paul Warfield (four TDs on 34 career playoff catches) and tight end Bruce Hardy (four TDs on 26 catches). Buffalo closed the scoring later in the period as Christie converted his fifth field goal of the game with a 38-yarder.

Dan Marino threw a pair of touchdown passes to lead the Dolphins to a 27-17 win in a First-Round playoff contest against the Kansas City Chiefs before a crowd of 69,757 at Joe Robbie Stadium. The game was billed as Marino-Montana III and the duel between the two future Hall of Famers lived up to the pregame hype. Marino completed 22 of 29 passes for 257 yards with two touchdowns and no interceptions and Montana countered by hitting on 26 of 37 passes for 314 yards with two scores and an interception. The first half was an offensive shootout which was tied at 17-17 with neither team being forced to punt. Kansas City opened the scoring as Montana tossed a one-yard touchdown pass to tight end Derrick Walker. Miami answered the score on its first possession as Bernie Parmalee scored on a one-yard run. The Chiefs came right back to close the first quarter scoring at 14-7 as Montana threw a short pass to fullback Kimble Anders who turned the play into a 57-yard catch and run for the touchdown. Miami cut the score to 14-10 early in the second quarter as Pete Stoyanovich booted a 40-yard field goal. Kansas City upped their lead to 17-10 later in the quarter as Lin Elliott booted a 21-yard field goal. The Dolphins closed the first half scoring as Marino tossed a one-yard touchdown pass to tight end Ronnie Williams. The scoring pass set an NFL record as it marked Marino's 11th consecutive post-season game with a touchdown toss. He moved past a tie with Montana (San Francisco/Kansas City) and Ken Stabler (Oakland) for the longest all-time streak of playoff games with a touchdown pass in NFL history. The Dolphins dominated the second half and outscored the Chiefs by a 10-0 margin. Miami took their first lead of the ballgame at 24-17 on the first drive of the third quarter as Marino and Irving Fryar connected on a seven-yard touchdown pass. Miami increased its lead to 27-17 on a 40-yard field goal late in the third period. The Dolphins forced a pair of turnovers by the Chiefs in Miami territory to preserve the win. First, cornerback J.B. Brown intercepted a Montana aerial on the goal line to stop a drive and then safety Michael Stewart forced and recovered a fumble by Marcus Allen on the Dolphins' 34-yard line.

Natrone Means rushed for 139 yards and a touchdown to lead the Chargers to a 22-21 win over the Miami Dolphins in an AFC Divisional Playoff contest before a crowd of 63,381 at Jack Murphy Stadium. San Diego had the first scoring threat of the game as they drove down to Miami's 26-yard line, but Miami's Marco Coleman forced a fumble by Means to stop the drive. Following the takeaway, the Dolphins opened the scoring as Dan Marino capped a nine-play, 79-yard drive with an eight-yard scoring pass to tight end Keith Jackson. The Chargers closed the score to 7-3 on their next possession as John Carney booted a 20-yard field goal. Prior to the field goal attempt, San Diego had a first-and-goal from the Dolphins' six-yard line but the Miami defense stiffened and held the Chargers out of the end zone. The Dolphins increased their lead to 14-3 on their next possession as Marino and Jackson connected again in the end zone for a nine-yard touchdown pass. Jackson's two touchdown receptions in the contest tied Miami's all-time single-game playoff record, which was accomplished five previous times. San Diego answered the touchdown with another field goal as Carney connected on a 21-yard effort. Once again, San Diego had a first-and-goal on Miami's six-yard line and the Dolphin defense limited the Chargers to a field goal. Miami closed the first half scoring as Marino threw a 16-yard touchdown pass to Mike Williams with just 27 seconds left in the first half to take a 21-6 lead. San Diego opened the third quarter with a long drive which was halted when Means was held for no gain on a fourth-and-one play from Miami's one-yard line and the Dolphins took possession of the ball. However, on Miami's first play following the goal line stand, Dolphins running back Bernie Parmalee was tackled in the end zone for a safety to bring the score to 21-8. Following a free kick by Miami's John Kidd, the Chargers got the ball on their own 46-yard line and drove for a 24-yard touchdown run by Means to cut the score to 21-15. Miami had the ball for just one play — the safety by Parmalee — in the entire third quarter. San Diego took a 22-21 lead with just 35 seconds left in regulation as Stan Humphries threw an eight-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Mark Seay. The Dolphins had one final chance to win the game as Marino drove the team down to the Chargers' 30-yard line but Pete Stoyanovich's 48-yard field goal attempt with just eight seconds remaining was wide right.

The Buffalo Bills cruised out to a 24-0 halftime lead enroute to a 37-22 victory in an AFC First Round Playoff game in front of 73,103 fans at Rich Stadium. The contest proved to be the last game for Don Shula as head coach of the Dolphins. The Bills, led by running back Thurman Thomas' 158 yards, grounded out an AFC Playoff record 341 rushing yards, breaking the old mark of 318 set by the San Diego Chargers against Boston in 1963. Miami quarterback Dan Marino tied an NFL postseason record, with current teammate Bernie Kosar while he was a member of the Cleveland Browns in 1986, with 64 passing attempts and completed 33 (tied for second-highest in NFL postseason) of them for 422 yards (third-highest in NFL postseason). The two teams set a new NFL postseason record with 1,038 combined total net yards, breaking the old mark of 1,036 by the Dolphins and the San Diego Chargers in an overtime game in 1981. The Bills took an early 7-0 lead when Thomas scored on a one-yard touchdown run. Buffalo kicker Steve Christie put the Bills ahead 10-0 at the midway point of the first quarter with a 48-yard field goal. Buffalo needed just four plays to go 68 yards and took a 17-0 advantage when fullback Darick Holmes ran 21 yards for a touchdown with 9:54 left in the half. On the Dolphins' next possession, they drove to the Buffalo 40-yard line but Marino was hit by Bills defensive end Phil Hansen as he threw and the tipped ball was intercepted by linebacker Marlo Perry. It took Buffalo just 49 seconds to make the score 24-0 as Kelly connected with Steve Tasker on a 37-yard touchdown pass to cap a short three-play, 62-yard drive midway through the second quarter. The Bills added to their lead in the third quarter by driving 55 yards on ten plays and extended their lead to 27-0 when Christie booted a 23-yard field goal late in the third quarter. Miami got on the board when they took their next possession and drove 67 yards on nine plays and made the score 27-7 when Marino hit wide receiver O.J. McDuffie on a five-yard touchdown pass. The Bills increased their lead to 34-7 when they culminated a 61-yard drive with a 44-yard touchdown run by fullback Tim Tindale with 9:31 remaining in the game. The Dolphins cut the lead to 34-14 on their next possession as Marino connected with wide receiver Randal Hill on a 45-yard touchdown to close out a seven-play, 68-yard drive. The Bills answered with an eight-play, 44-yard drive that saw Christie kick a 42-yard field goal to make the score 37-14. Miami then took its next possession and marched 73 yards on eight plays and cut the lead to 37-22 when running back Terry Kirby ran one-yard for the score and a two-point conversion from Marino to McDuffie was good. The Dolphins then attempted an onside kick and safety Michael Stewart recovered at the Buffalo 49-yard line. However, Miami's last threat of the game was stopped when Marino was intercepted by Bills cornerback Ken Irvin at Buffalo's 13-yard line with 1:51 left in the game. McDuffie set a new club postseason record (tied with nine others for sixth-highest all-time in NFL postseason) with 11 receptions for 154 yards (a new Dolphin postseason record, surpassing Mark Duper's 148 yards vs. Pittsburgh in 1985).

The New England Patriots recorded their third win of the 1997 season over the Dolphins, and their fourth straight over Miami dating back to 1996, by holding Miami to just a field goal in their 17-3 triumph in a first-round playoff game at Foxboro Stadium. The loss was the Dolphins' third straight in the postseason. New England held Miami to 162 yards of total offense, the lowest total in the 32-game postseason history for the Dolphins, below a 176-yard performance against Washington in Supr Bowl XVII. In addition, the three points scored by the Dolphins equalled the fewest points scored by the team in a playoff game with a 24-3 loss to the Dallas Cowboys in Super Bowl VI. Overall, New England forced three Miami turnovers, while the Patriots did not commit any miscues and 14 of New England's 17 points resulted from a Dolphins turnover. The Patriots sacked Dolphins quarterback Dan Marino four times on the day and Marino was held without a touchdown for the first time in 14 career playoff games. Marino's 13 straight playoff games with a touchdown is an NFL record. The Dolphins got to the Patriots' 39 late in the first quarter, but were stopped on third and fourth-and-one. The Patriots had an opportunity to take a 3-0 lead early in the second quarter, but Adam Vinatieri missed wide left on a 48-yard field goal attempt. Three plays later, Chris Slade intercepted a Dan Marino pass and returned it 22 yards to the Dolphins' 29. That led to a 24-yard touchdown pass from Drew Bledsoe to Troy Brown three plays afterward, on third-and-five, 4:33 into the second quarter. New England took over at its own 40 with 2:16 left in the first half and drove to the Dolphins' 30 before Vinatieri missed wide right on a 47-yard field goal try with 30 seconds on the clock. On the second play of the second half, Todd Collins picked off a Marino pass and brought it back 40 yards for a touchdown. The Patriots extended their lead to 17 points with 1:58 left in the third quarter when Vinatieri capped a 15-play, 67-yard drive with a 22-yard field goal. The Dolphins got their only points of the game nine seconds into the fourth quarter, on an Olindo Mare 38-yard field goal. Miami had gained possession at the Patriots' 43 after a Corey Harris 40-yard kickoff return and a ten-yard tripping penalty on the Patriots. Corey Harris recovered the ensuing onside kick, and the Dolphins took over at their own 44. On the next play, however, Chris Canty stripped the ball from Marino and Chris Slade recovered at the Dolphins' 41. Miami got into New England territory on each of its last two possessions - getting as far as the 45 and 43 - but were stopped on fourth down on each occasion.

The Dolphins recorded their first playoff win since the 1994 season, snapping a three-game losing streak in the postseason with a 24-17 win in an AFC First-Round Playoff game over the Buffalo Bills at Pro Player Stadium. Doug Flutie connected with Eric Moulds for a 65-yard completion on the game's first play from scrimmage, but Terrell Buckley stripped the ball and Brock Marion returned the fumble 17 yards to the Dolphins' 29-yard line. That led to a 16-play, 57-yard drive which used 8:23 of the clock and ended with an Olindo Mare 31-yard field goal. Miami made it a 6-0 game on Mare's second field goal of the afternoon, from 40 yards out, 4:24 into the second quarter. The score capped an 11-play, 66-yard drive that consumed 6:22 of the clock. Mare attempted an onside kick on the ensuing kickoff that was recovered by the Bills' Dan Brandenburg. Three plays later, Buffalo took its first lead of the game when Thurman Thomas ran it in from one-yard out, two plays after Flutie and Moulds combined for a 37-yard completion to the Dolphins' five-yard line. Buffalo got to the Dolphins' six-yard line with 24 seconds remaining in the first half, but Marion picked off a Flutie pass and returned it 19 yards. A personal foul penalty on the Bills put the Dolphins at their own 35. Dan Marino then completed a 52-yard pass to Oronde Gadsden who then lateraled the ball to O.J. McDuffie, putting the Dolphins at the Bills' nine-yard line. Mare, however, hit the right upright on a 26-yard field goal attempt as time expired in the half. The Dolphins regained the lead at 13-7 on Karim Abdul-Jabbar's three-yard touchdown run with 2:32 left in the third quarter. Abdul-Jabbar rushed for 21 yards on the 52-yard drive, which was accomplished in 12 plays and saw the Dolphins connect on three third down conversions. Stanley Pritchett punched it in for the two-point conversion. Buffalo answered less than two minutes later with a 32-yard touchdown pass from Flutie to Moulds which tied the game at 14 with 48 seconds left in the third quarter. Miami got the ball back and embarked on a 17-play, 77-yard drive that ended with Mare's third field goal of the game, from 23 yards out, 5:15 into the fourth period. Four plays afterward, Jerry Wilson forced the ball loose from Andre Reed after a reception and Terrell Buckley recovered, returning it six yards to midfield. The Dolphins capitalized off that turnover when Marino connected with Lamar Thomas for an 11-yard scoring strike on third-and-seven with 3:32 remaining in the game, capping the eight play drive. The Bills took over at their own 20 and got to the Dolphins' 15-yard line before Steve Christie connected on a 33-yard field goal with 1:33 left in the game. Kurt Schulz recovered the ensuing onside kick for Buffalo, giving them possession at their own 31 with 1:30 to play. The first play of the drive was a 30-yard completion from Flutie to Moulds, putting the Bills at the Dolphins' 39-yard line. From there, Buffalo converted three consecutive third downs, giving them a first-and-goal from the Dolphins' five-yard line with 17 seconds remaining. Trace Armstrong then sacked Flutie, forcing the ball loose, which was recovered by Shane Burton to preserve the victory. Moulds finished the game with an NFL playoff record 240 receiving yards.

Miami failed to score a touchdown in its second straight road playoff game, as they dropped their seventh consecutive postseason road game overall, with a 38-3 loss to the Broncos at Mile High Stadium. After stopping the Dolphins on the first series of the game, the Broncos took over at their own eight and embarked on a 14-play, 92-yard drive that used 7:56 of the clock and ended with a Terrell Davis one-yard touchdown run with 5:55 left in the opening quarter. Davis ran for 38 yards on seven carries on the drive, and John Elway completed five of six passes for 48 yards. Denver took a two-touchdown advantage before the first quarter was over when Davis scored on a 20-yard run with 1:02 remaining in the opening period. The touchdown came three plays after Elway connected with Ed McCaffrey for a 33-yard completion to the Dolphins' 33-yard line. Miami answered with an 11-play, 76-yard drive that consumed 5:55 of the clock and ended with an Olindo Mare 22-yard field goal, 4:53 into the second quarter. Dan Marino completed six of seven passes for 55 yards on the march. Denver scored a touchdown on their third consecutive series when Derek Loville ran it in from 11 yards out with 4:39 left in the second quarter. The score capped an 11-play, 87-yard drive that used 5:28 of the clock. As a team, the Broncos rushed for 62 yards on the drive, including 47 yards by Davis. Davis broke loose for a 62-yard run to the Dolphins' 18-yard line on the first play of the second half, leading to a Jason Elam 32-yard field goal four plays afterward. Denver opened a 28-point advantage 1:37 into the fourth quarter when Elway combined with Rod Smith for a 28-yard touchdown strike. The Broncos finished off the scoring when Neil Smith recovered an Oronde Gadsden fumble following a reception and rumbled 79 yards for a touchdown.

In the last game ever played at the Kingdome, the Dolphins recorded their first road playoff win since 1972 with a 20-17 triumph over the Seattle Seahawks. The Seahawks' second possession of the game started at the Dolphins' 47 after Miami was forced to punt from its own four-yard line. From there, Seattle needed eight plays before Jon Kitna connected with Sean Dawkins for a nine-yard touchdown pass on third-and-three, with 6:18 to play in the first quarter. The score marked the second third-down conversion on the drive for the Seahawks. Kitna and Mike Pritchard hooked up for a pair of completions on the drive, totaling 29 yards. Brock Marion returned the ensuing kickoff 47 yards to midfield. The Dolphins then moved 37 yards in seven plays, leading to an Olindo Mare 32-yard field goal with 2:05 remaining in the opening quarter. The Seahawks re-gained their seven-point advantage with 45 seconds left in the first half on Todd Peterson's 50-yard field goal, which capped an eight-play, 49-yard drive that used 3:45 of the clock. The Dolphins took over at their own 40 on the opening possession of the second half after Peterson's kickoff went out of bounds. Led by Dan Marino, who completed all six of his passes, totaling 56 yards, Miami embarked on a ten-play, 60-yard drive that consumed 6:05 of the clock and ended with a one-yard touchdown pass from Marino to Oronde Gadsden on third-and-goal. The touchdown pass was the 31st for Marino in his playoff career, moving him past Terry Bradshaw into sole possession of second on the NFL's all-time postseason list. The key play on the march was a 27-yard completion from Marino to O.J. McDuffie on third-and-seven from the Seattle 46. Charlie Rogers took the ensuing kickoff and raced 85 yards for a touchdown to give Seattle the lead once again. The Dolphins pulled to within four points on Mare's 50-yard field goal with 2:22 to play in the third quarter, culminating a six-play, 32-yard drive in which Autry Denson rushed for 25 yards. The ensuing onside kick was recovered by Miami's Shawn Wooden, and the Dolphins took over at their own 42. Although they could not take advantage of that opportunity, Tom Hutton's punt that followed pinned Seattle at their own six. Down by four points with 9:09 to play, Miami gained possession at their own 15. On the third play of the series, they faced a third-and-17 from their own 8 when Marino hit Tony Martin for a 23-yard completion. From there, Miami marched the length of the field in just eight more plays, the final one being a two-yard TD run by J.J. Johnson with 4:48 to play in the game. Two plays prior to the score Marino connected with Gadsden for a 24-yard completion on third-and-10 from the Seahawks 29, giving them a first-and-goal from the 5. Seattle went three and out on their next series, and a Terrell Buckley interception with 23 seconds remaining ended any Seattle comeback hopes. The Dolphins dominated the second half of the game, as they gained 230 yards while holding Seattle to just 32 yards over the final 30 minutes of the game. Overall on the day, the Dolphins outgained Seattle by a 299-171 margin. They rushed for 108 yards while limiting the Seahawks to just 41 yards. The Dolphins held the ball for 34:48. Miami registered a club playoff record six sacks on the afternoon, including three by Trace Armstrong. Johnson finished the game with 86 yards rushing and a touchdown on 27 attempts. McDuffie and Martin each caught five passes.

The Dolphins allowed the most point in club history and suffered their worst defeat ever as well. The Jaguars took a 7-0 lead on an eight-yard touchdown pass from Mark Brunell to Jimmy Smith on the first series of the game, 4:28 into the contest. A 41-yard completion from Mark Brunell to Jimmy Smith to the Dolphins' 22 was the key play on the 73-yard drive, in which Jacksonville converted all three of their third down attempts, including the touchdown. On the next play from scrimmage, Aaron Beasley intercepted a Dan Marino pass and Jacksonville took over at the Dolphins' 41. From there, the Jaguars moved 14 yards, setting up a Mike Hollis 45-yard field goal, with 6:19 to play in the opening quarter. The Jaguars scored for the third time in as many possessions when Fred Taylor broke loose for a 90-yard touchdown run with 3:46 remaining in the first quarter. On the following play from scrimmage, Tony Brackens stripped the ball from Marino, Brackens recovered and went 16 yards for the score. On the first play of the second quarter, Jacksonville scored again on a 39-yard touchdown pass from Brunell to Taylor on third-and-14. The Jaguars gained possession at the Dolphins' 21 on their next series after Corey Chamblin blocked a Tom Hutton punt. That led to a James Stewart 25-yard TD run three plays later. Hollis added a 28-yard field goal 1:51 prior to the half. That score came five plays after Carnell Lake recovered a J.J. Johnson fumble at the Dolphins' 30. Miami got its first points of the game three seconds before halftime when Marino and Oronde Gadsden combined for a 20-yard TD pass, on third-and-10. Jay Fiedler connected with Jimmy Smith for a 70-yard touchdown pass, 2:57 into the third quarter, giving Jacksonville 48 points on the afternoon, marking the most points that Miami has ever given up in the postseason. Fiedler fired his second touchdown pass of the day with 6:19 to play in the third quarter when he hit Alvis Whitted for a 38-yard scoring pass. Jacksonville finished the scoring with a Chris Howard five-yard touchdown run 4:23 into the fourth quarter, one play after Donovan Darius recovered an Autry Denson fumble.

The Miami Dolphins recorded the second-largest comeback win in team playoff history as they rallied from a 14-0 halftime deficit to earn a 23-17 overtime win against the Indianapolis Colts at Pro Player Stadium. The Dolphins faced a fourth-and-six from the Colts' 39 on their first possession of the game, but could not convert. The Colts took over and marched 47 yards in seven plays, en route to a Mike Vanderjagt 32-yard field goal. The Dolphins made it to the Colts' 33 late in the first quarter, but on third-and-14, Chad Cota intercepted a Jay Fiedler pass in the end zone. Vanderjagt lined up to attempt his second field goal in as many series, but the run by holder Hunter Smith on the fake was short of the first down. On the next play from scrimmage, Chad Bratzke intercepted a Fiedler pass and returned it four yards to the Dolphins' four. That led to a seven-play, 17-yard drive that culminated with a Vanderjagt 26-yard field goal. Fiedler suffered his third interception in as many series three plays later when Cota picked off his second pass of the day, giving the Colts the ball at the Dolphins' 18. Two plays later, Peyton Manning connected with Jerome Pathon for a 17-yard score. That was followed by a Manning to Ken Dilger pass for the two-point conversion. The Dolphins had a chance to put their first points on the board with 31 seconds left in the first half, but Olindo Mare missed wide right on a 38-yard field goal attempt. The Dolphins opened the second half with an 11-play, 70-yard drive that ended with a two-yard scoring run by Lamar Smith, 6:51 into the half. Smith rushed for 42 yards on seven attempts on the march. The Dolphins cut the lead to four points 4:37 into the fourth quarter on a 38-yard field goal by Mare, which capped a nine-play, 53-yard drive. The Colts answered with a nine-play, 45-yard march which ended with a Vanderjagt 50-yard field goal. The Dolphins took over at their own 20 with 4:55 to play in the game, and marched the length of the field in 14 plays towards the game-tying score, a nine-yard touchdown pass from Fiedler to Jed Weaver on third-and-goal, with 34 seconds remaining in the game. Fiedler threw for 52 yards on the drive, as he completed six of 10 passes while also rushing three times for 15 yards. The Colts got into field goal position 5:44 into the overtime period, but Vanderjagt missed wide right on a 49-yard field goal attempt. The Dolphins took over at their own 39, and on the third play from scrimmage, they got into Colts territory at the 48 on a six-yard completion from Fiedler to Jeff Ogden on third-and-three. Eight plays later, Smith gave the Dolphins their third straight victory in the First Round of the playoffs on a 17-yard touchdown run with 3:34 left in overtime. Smith's 40 attempts represented a new NFL playoff single-game best. His yardage figure was the second-most ever in an NFL postseason contest.

The Miami Dolphins suffered the first shutout in the team's playoff history with a 27-0 loss to the Oakland Raiders. The Raiders got on the board first 3:34 into the contest when Tony James intercepted a Jay Fiedler pass and returned it 90 yards for a touchdown, the longest interception return ever against the Dolphins in the postseason. The score occurred after the Dolphins were at the Raiders' 16. The Raiders opened a ten-point lead with 4:52 to play in the first quarter on a Sebastian Janikowski 36-yard field goal, which capped an eight-play, 46-yard drive. Janikowski converted his second field goal in as many offensive series when he hit from 33 yards out, 6:24 into the second quarter. The 12-play, 78-yard drive was highlighted by a 32-yard catch-and-run by Terry Kirby to midfield. The Raiders took a 20-point advantage with 1:53 to play in the first half on a six-yard touchdown pass from Rich Gannon to James Jett on third-and-four. The drive began at the Dolphins' 43 after Charles Woodson recovered a Lamar Smith fumble that was forced by Tony James. Of the 43 yards on the march, Gannon scrambled for 19 yards. The final points of the day were scored on the Raiders' first possession of the second half when Tyrone Wheatley ran it in from two yards out, culminating a 12-play, 54-yard drive that used 6:50 of the clock. Gannon threw for 32 yards on the march, including a 12-yard completion to Tim Brown on third-and-seven, one play prior to the touchdown.

That resulted in a Matt Stover 35-yard field goal six plays afterward. Stover added his second field goal in as many series with a 40-yarder with 2:01 to play in the game. That three-pointer came 11 plays after a Duane Starks interception after the Dolphins had made it to the Ravens' 42-yard line. Baltimore rushed for 49 yards on eight attempts on the scoring drive.



DOLPHINS IN THE HALL OF FAME

Don Shula • Head Coach (1970-95), Vice Chairman (1996-2003)



On July 26, 1997, Don Shula capped an illustrious career when he was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, following his election into that shrine on January 25, 1997, his first year of eligibility. Shula's unanimous election to the Hall was the ultimate honor in a career full of record-setting accomplishments.

Starting with the 1996 season, Shula has served as Vice-Chairman of the Miami Dolphins, having been named to that position on January 5, 1996. This year marks his 34th season with the Dolphins, a tenure that started when he was named Head Coach of the club in 1970.

Shula's record as head coach of the Dolphins (1970-95) and before that as head coach of the Baltimore Colts (1963-69) is unmatched in National Football League history. In 1995 he concluded his 33rd season as an NFL head coach and his 26th season as head coach of the Dolphins. He owns a career record of 347-173-6 (.665), including a regular season mark of 328-156-6 (.676), and is the winningest coach in NFL history. On November 14, 1993 in Philadelphia, when the Dolphins defeated the Philadelphia Eagles 19-14, Shula won his 325th career game, moving him past the immortal George Halas (324-151-31) and setting an NFL record for most career victories, a mark once thought to be unreachable. Shula's 328 regular season wins also is an NFL record, surpassing Halas' former NFL mark of 318 regular season victories. Shula and Halas are the only NFL coaches to win 300 or more career games, as Shula recorded his 300th career win on September 22, 1991, with a 16-13 triumph over Green Bay in just his 29th year as an NFL head coach, as compared to 36 seasons for Halas to accomplish that feat.

In addition, Shula won Super Bowl titles in 1972 and 1973, one of only five coaches in NFL history to win consecutive Super Bowls. His 1972 team went 17-0, recording the only undefeated season in NFL annals. He has appeared in more Super Bowls (six) than any other coach, and is one of only two coaches (along with Buffalo's Marv Levy) to reach the Super Bowl three straight seasons (1971-73). He also advanced to the Super Bowl with the Dolphins in 1982 and 1984, as well as in 1968 as head coach of the Colts.

A remarkable 20 times in 33 seasons, Shula's teams reached the playoffs. His teams won at least ten games 21 times in those 33 years, and he suffered only two losing seasons (1976, 1988) in that span. He averaged more than ten wins per season in his career (347 wins in 33 years as a head coach), and he was the youngest coach to win 100, 200 and 300 games each.

During Shula's tenure with the Dolphins, from the time he replaced George Wilson on February 18, 1970 to become the franchise's second-ever head coach through his final season in 1995, his winning percentage of .658 (257-133-2) during that time was the best record in all of professional sports. The Dolphins either won or shared first place in the AFC East 15 times in the 26 years under Shula, and reached the playoffs 16 times. His ultimate achievement was the NFL's only unbeaten, untied record of 17-0 in 1972, capped by a 14-7 win over the Washington Redskins in Super Bowl VII. He won a second consecutive Super Bowl title in 1973, defeating the Minnesota Vikings 24-7 in Super Bowl VIII, and compiled an overall record of 32-2 in those back-to-back seasons, a two-year mark that has yet to be surpassed.

Before joining the Dolphins, Shula spent seven years (1963-69) as head coach of the Baltimore Colts. In that span he compiled a record of 73-26-4 (.728) and advanced to the playoffs four times, including two appearances in the NFL Championship Game, in 1964 and 1968 after 12-2 and 13-1 campaigns, respectively. He was the youngest head coach (33 years old) in the history of the NFL when he was named the Colts' head coach in 1963.

Shula succeeded Weeb Ewbank as head coach in Baltimore after serving three years (1960-62) as defensive coordinator of the Detroit Lions, with the team going 26-13-1 in that period. Shula entered the coaching ranks with an assistant's job at Virginia (1958) and Kentucky (1959) before joining the Lions.

Shula broke into the NFL as the lone rookie on Coach Paul Brown's defending NFL champion Cleveland Browns in 1951. He was involved in the largest trade in modern NFL history, a 15-player deal with Baltimore in 1953, and Shula played four seasons with the Colts (1953-56) and one season at Washington (1957) at right cornerback. He had 21 career interceptions for 247 yards in seven seasons. In college, he was a running back at John Carroll University in Cleveland, and in 1950 he gained 125 yards when the Blue Streaks upset Syracuse, 21-15.

Shula also contributed to the growth of the NFL off the field by serving from 1975 through 1995 (including the last two years in that span as co-chairman along with George Young of the New York Giants) on the league's influential Competition Committee, which evaluates and recommends changes in playing rules to make the game more open and exciting and to improve player safety.

In addition to his own election to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, Shula was further honored by being selected to present five other members for induction into the Hall (Larry Csonka, Bob Griese, Jim Langer, Larry Little, and Dwight Stephenson), including two (Csonka and Langer) in the same day.

Along with his football responsibilities, Shula always has given considerable time, plus financial and emotional support, to many area charities. The Don Shula Foundation, formed primarily to assist breast cancer research, was established as a tribute to his late wife, Dorothy. Shula also has been active in the American Cancer Society, March of Dimes, American Red Cross, the United Way, and Catholic Charities.

A member of the Class of 1951 at John Carroll, Shula helps fund a \$1 million chair in the University's Department of Philosophy. On September 27, 2003, John Carroll University showed its appreciation for Shula's support of the school by naming its new stadium Don Shula Stadium. Shula also has received honorary doctorate degrees from John Carroll, St. Thomas University, the University of Miami, and Florida Atlantic University.

Because of his success on the football field and his long-time civic and charitable service, Shula has received countless prestigious awards recognizing his contributions, including the 1993 Sports Illustrated Sportsman of the Year Award and the 1994 Horatio Alger Award. In addition, along with Ken Blanchard, in 1995 Shula co-authored "Everyone's A Coach," a highly acclaimed book that outlines the application of their managerial philosophies for business and personal success. Shula personifies those business principles himself, serving as an equity partner in two highly successful enterprises, Don Shula's Hotel and Golf Club along with Don Shula's Steakhouse, Inc.

Shula's oldest son Dave, 44, and his wife Leslie have three sons, Danny, Christopher, and Matthew. David served as the Head Coach of the Cincinnati Bengals from 1992-96, and when Don Shula's Dolphins played Dave Shula's Bengals on October 2, 1994 and October 1, 1995, both in Cincinnati's Riverfront Stadium, it marked the only two times in professional sports that a father and son faced each other as head coaches. Dave currently is President of Don Shula Steakhouse, Inc.

Shula's other son Mike, 38, was named the head coach at the University of Alabama on May 9, 2003. He had rejoined the Dolphins' staff as quarterbacks coach in 2000 after serving the four previous seasons as the offensive coordinator of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers; he also spent the 1991-92 seasons as a coaches' assistant under his father in Miami. Mike and his wife, Shari, have one daughter, Samantha.

Mike and Dave Shula presented their father for induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1997, becoming the first pair ever to present a Hall of Famer for induction.

Shula's oldest daughter, Donna, has five children, Alex, Lindsey, Tyler, and twins Calvin and Carly, and is married to Steve Cohen. Another daughter, Sharon resides in New York, while youngest daughter Annie lives and works in Broward County.

Shula and his wife, Mary Anne, reside in Miami and continue to be very active in charitable and community affairs. They were married on October 16, 1993, and their family together now includes eight children and 13 grandchildren.

SHULA'S MILESTONES

Don Shula passed the immortal George Halas to become the winningest coach in NFL history when he registered victory number 325 in Miami's 19-14 win at Philadelphia on November 14, 1993. Shula concluded coaching with a career record of 347-173-6 (.665). On December 25, 1994, in Miami's 27-20 win over Detroit, Shula won the 319th regular season game of his career and broke the NFL record for most regular season coaching wins by Halas (318 wins). Shula owned a 328-156-6 (.676) regular season record. In 1991, Shula joined Halas (324 wins) as the only NFL coaches with 300 or more career wins. Shula accomplished his milestone 300th career win with a 16-13 triumph over the Green Bay Packers on September 22, 1991. Shula won the 300th regular-season game of his coaching career with a 16-13 overtime win at New England on December 27, 1992.

Shula added another historic career milestone in Miami's 30-7 win over the Buffalo Bills on September 16, 1990, as he recorded his 200th regular season victory since joining the Dolphins in 1970. Shula joined Hall of Fame coaches Curley Lambeau (Green Bay), George Halas (Chicago) and Tom Landry (Dallas) as the only NFL coaches to earn 200 or more regular season wins with one NFL club.



Nick Buoniconti • 85 • Linebacker

Nick Buoniconti, the driving force of the Dolphins' famed "No-Name Defense," inspired his teammates with his outstanding play and fiery leadership. During his seven years with the Dolphins the team advanced to three straight Super Bowls (1971-73) and won twice (1972, 1973), with one of those wins coming after their unparalleled undefeated season in 1972. Buoniconti was only 5-11 and 220 pounds and was considered to be too small to play middle linebacker. However, as many coaches noted, he always "played bigger than his size" during a stellar 14-year career with the Dolphins and the Boston Patriots.

The first member of the Dolphins defense to be elected to the Hall of Fame, Buoniconti joined the team in 1969 after playing seven seasons with the Patriots. During his tenure with the Dolphins, he was named the team's Most Valuable Player three times (1969, 1970, 1973) and was named to the AFL All-Star game in 1969 and was selected to two Pro Bowls (1973, 1974) following the merger of the two leagues. In 1990, he was voted as a linebacker on the Dolphins' Silver Anniversary all-time team, and on November 18, 1991, he was enshrined on the Dolphin Honor Roll at Pro Player Stadium.

Before joining the Dolphins, Buoniconti helped the Patriots capture the 1963 AFL Eastern Division title, and he played in five AFL All-Star games. Overall in his 14-year career, he played in 183 games and recorded 32 career interceptions. He was named to the All-Time AFL team in 1970, and overall was named a first team All-AFL/AFC choice eight times.

A native of Springfield, Massachusetts, Buoniconti had an outstanding collegiate career at Notre Dame. Following his retirement from the Dolphins, he and his son, Marc, were the driving forces behind the establishment of the Miami Project to Cure Paralysis, one of the world's leading research and treatment centers for spinal cord injuries.

Buoniconti was elected to the Hall of Fame in 2001 after being named for the first time that year as a nominee from the pre-1976 era by the Hall's Seniors Committee.

Larry Csonka ranks as the Dolphins' all-time leading rusher with 1,506 carries for 6,737 yards (4.5 average) and 53 TDs. A five-time Pro Bowl selection, he put together three consecutive 1,000-yard seasons (1971-73) as Miami advanced to the Super Bowl each year. Csonka shined in those three Super Bowls, averaging 6.3 yards a carry and going over 100 yards rushing in two of them. Originally drafted in the first round out of Syracuse in 1968, he was named the MVP of Super Bowl VIII after carrying 33 times for 145 yards and two

touchdowns as the Dolphins steamrolled the Minnesota Vikings, 24-7, for their second straight NFL title. Called a "modern-day Bronko Nagurski" by Dolphin coach Don Shula, "Zonk" also played three seasons with the N.Y. Giants (1976-78) and one year with the Memphis Southmen of the World Football League (1975). His career rushing totals in the NFL, which place him 26th on the league's all-time rushing list, are: 1,891 carries for 8,081 yards (4.3 average) and 64 TDs. He was elected to the Hall of Fame in his second year of eligibility. In 1990, he also was voted the fullback on the Dolphins' Silver Anniversary all-time team and was named as a running back on the Super Bowl Silver Anniversary all-time team. On November 19, 1990, he was enshrined on the Dolphin Honor Roll at Pro Player Stadium. Csonka was further honored when his number 39 was retired by the team during halftime ceremonies on December 9, 2002, becoming the third Dolphin to have his number retired.

He was unquestionably the "thinking man's quarterback." Bob Griese, renowned for his poised leadership and ingenious play-calling, sustained the Dolphin offense with a flair for winning from 1967-80.

The bespectacled quarterback became the 14th passer in the NFL's exclusive 25,000-yard club in 1980. On the same day he reached that milestone, he suffered a shoulder injury which ultimately forced his retirement on June 25, 1981. His No. 12 jersey became the first to be retired May 6, 1982, in ceremonies at the Dolphins' annual awards banquet. In 1990, he was

also voted the quarterback on the Dolphins' Silver Anniversary all-time team, and on Nov. 19, 1990, he was enshrined on the Dolphin Honor Roll at Pro Player Stadium.

He had a .698 winning percentage (91-39-1) under Coach Don Shula. "Cornerstone of the franchise," Dolphin founder Joe Robbie called him. He was a consensus All-Pro quarterback in 1971 and 1977, made six appearances in the Pro Bowl and was voted the team's Most Valuable Player six times by South Florida media.

After becoming eligible for induction into the Hall of Fame in 1985, Griese was named as a finalist all five years before being elected to the Hall of Fame in 1990.

"He's probably the most unselfish guy I've ever been around," Shula said. "He got as much of a thrill calling the right running play for a touchdown as he did connecting on a bomb. That's just his makeup."



Jim Langer was the anchor of the Miami offensive line during the Dolphins' championship years of the 1970s. Coming out of South Dakota State in 1970, he was signed as a free agent by Cleveland but was released on the final cut. Langer was picked up on waivers by the Dolphins and, after spending most of the year on the taxi squad, played in the final five games of 1970, mainly on special teams. After serving as a backup at center the following season, in 1972 he won the starting job, which he would hold until sidelined with a knee injury in 1979. A consensus All-Pro from 1973-77, Langer was a six-time Pro Bowl selection (five times as a starter). He played in a club-high 128 straight games during his career and also had a team-record 109 consecutive starts (a record since

broken by Richmond Webb in 1997). Voted the team's Most Valuable Player by South Florida media in 1975, Langer also holds the distinction of having played every offensive down in the Dolphins' perfect 1972 season. Wanting to spend the final years of his career near his Royalton, Minn., home, at his own request Langer was traded to the Minnesota Vikings in 1980, where he played for two seasons (1980-81). He was elected to the Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility. In addition, on November 19, 1990, he was enshrined on the Dolphin Honor Roll at Pro Player Stadium.



A rumbling giant in the Dolphin trenches for 12 seasons, Larry Little's very presence in leading a sweep was an intimidating force in a Miami running attack which led the NFL during the 1970s at 2,372 yards per season. Coming out of Bethune-Cookman in 1967, Little entered the NFL as an undrafted free agent with the San Diego Chargers for a \$750 bonus. He was traded to the Dolphins on July 2, 1969, in exchange for Miami cornerback Mack Lamb, a former high school teammate. After having started just four games during his two seasons with the Chargers, Little emerged with the Dolphins and played in 158 regular season games with 152 starting assignments. He also started 12 playoff games for Miami and was a key ingredient of the Dolphins' back-to-back Super Bowl championship teams of 1972 and '73. Little earned All-Pro honors six times (1971-75 and 1977) and was a Pro Bowl selection on four occasions (1971-74). He was the first player in league history to be named as AFC Offensive Lineman of the Year three straight seasons (1970-72) by the NFL Players' Association. Little, who anchored the offensive line which helped set a then-NFL record with 2,960 rushing yards during the Dolphins' "perfect season" in 1972, was named by the National 1,000-Yard Club as the league's Outstanding Blocker for the '72 campaign. A native Floridian, Little was the first Dolphin player inducted into the Florida Sports Hall of Fame, on March 6, 1978. In 1990, he was voted as a guard on the Dolphins' Silver Anniversary all-time team. Little was elected into the Hall of Fame in his eighth year of eligibility after having been a finalist on three occasions. On December 13, 1993, he was enshrined on the Dolphin Honor Roll at Pro Player Stadium.

SHULA IS COACH TO HALL OF FAMERS

Hall of Fame and former Dolphins Head Coach Don Shula has had 14 of his former players enshrined into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. The most recent inductee was Nick Buoniconti, who played linebacker under Shula with the Dolphins from 1970-76, and entered the Hall in 2001. Of this group, seven played for Shula while he was Head Coach with the Baltimore Colts (1963-69), while seven were on his teams with the Dolphins (1970-95). This total of 14 is tied for the second-most players that an NFL head coach has had inducted into the Hall of Fame, along with Paul Brown and Vince Lombardi. They trail only George Halas, who had 25 players enshrined.



Dwight Stephenson spent his entire career with the Dolphins, and was considered by many to be the "best at his position ever" in the NFL. He was selected to five straight Pro Bowls (1983-87), and earned starting honors in four of those contests (1983-86). His four Pro Bowl starts is tied for the third-most in team history. Stephenson anchored an offensive line which allowed the fewest sacks in the NFL each of his seasons as a starter and enabled Miami quarterback Dan Marino to set numerous passing records. His playing career ended prematurely after suffering torn anterior cruciate and lateral collateral ligaments in his left knee against the New York Jets on December 7, 1987, when he was hit unexpectedly by Marty Lyons on a New York fumble return. Stephenson's greatest honor during his playing days came in 1985 when he was selected as the Miller Lite/NFL Man of the Year for his work in charity and community projects, the first Dolphin to win that award. Stephenson also served as an Assistant Offensive Line Coach on Don Shula's Dolphin staff in 1992. Before joining the Dolphins as a second round draft choice in 1980, he had an outstanding college career at Alabama, where he was called "the greatest center I have ever coached" by the late Paul "Bear" Bryant. He was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in his sixth year of eligibility after having been a finalist on five occasions. In 1990, he also was voted as the center on the Dolphins' Silver Anniversary all-time team, and on December 12, 1994, he was enshrined on the Dolphin Honor Roll at Pro Player Stadium.

Paul Warfield • 42 • Wide Receiver

Paul Warfield sandwiched two stints with the Cleveland Browns around a five-year career with the Dolphins. After spending his first six seasons in the NFL with the Browns (1964-69), Warfield was acquired by Miami in January of 1970 in exchange for a first-round pick in the upcoming draft. In his five seasons with the Dolphins, Warfield had 156

receptions for 3,355 yards (21.5 average) and 33 TDs – good enough to place him 16th on the team's all-time receiving list. A member of both the '72 and '73 Super Bowl championship teams, he was selected to play in the Pro Bowl all five years he was with the Dolphins (once as a starter), in addition to being named to the AFC squad twice with the Browns. Warfield, one of two Dolphins (along with Mark Ingram) in the team's history to score four touchdowns in one game, also played one season with the Memphis Southmen of the World Football League (1975) before finishing his career with Cleveland (1976-77). His career receiving totals in the NFL are: 427 receptions for 8,565 yards (20.1 average) and 85 TDs. His 85 touchdown catches is tied for the eighth highest career total in NFL history. He was elected to the Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility. In 1990, he also was voted as a wide receiver on the Dolphins' Silver Anniversary all-time team, and on November 19, 1990, he was enshrined on the Dolphin Honor Roll at Pro Player Stadium.



Dolphins secondary coach Mel Phillips embarks on his 24th season as an NFL assistant coach in 2003, with each of the last 18 having been with the Dolphins after he joined the team in 1985 following a five-year stint with Detroit (1980-84). This streak ties Phillips for third among NFL coaches for the longest current streak of having been with the same team. He trails only Pittsburgh running backs coach Dick Hoak (1972), 49ers physical development coordinator Jerry Attaway (1983) and Bengals running backs Jim Anderson (1984). He is tied with Bills strength and conditioning coach Rusty Jones and Lions defensive assistant Don Clemons.


No other player in the history of the Dolphins, either before or after Griese, wore No. 12 in regular season play.

Dan Marino's number 13 jersey became the second Dolphin uniform number to be retired, on Sunday, September 17, 2000, at halftime of the Dolphins-Baltimore Ravens game at Pro Player Stadium . . . He was also inducted into the Dolphin Honor Roll on that date . . . The only other Dolphin player to wear No. 13 was safety Jake Scott, who wore that number from 1970 through 1975 . . . Marino will be eligible to be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame with the Class of 2005 . . . He announced his retirement on March 13, 2000 . . . Marino ranks among the NFL's all-time top ranked passers . . . In his 17-year career, Marino played in 242 games (240 starts) and he is 4967-8358 (59.4%) for 61,361 yards, 420 touchdowns, and 252 interceptions for an 86.4 passing efficiency rating, which ranks sixth among the all-time passing leaders . . . Marino holds 37 Dolphins regular season team records (49 overall, including playoffs) and is tied for four others (six, including playoffs) . . . He holds 24 NFL regular season records and is tied for three others . . .

Marino also is among the winningest-ever quarterbacks in NFL regular season history, ranking second in all time regular season victories as a starter . . . His 16-13 overtime win vs. Tennessee on Sept. 7, 1997 tied him with Fran Tarkenton for second place on the all-time win list, and his 17-14 victory versus Kansas City on Oct. 5, 1997 moved him into sole possession of second place, trailing only Denver's John Elway:

In his career, with 8,358 attempts, Marino ranks first in NFL history in pass attempts, breaking Fran Tarkenton's NFL record of 6,467 attempts on Dec. 11, 1995 vs. Kansas City . . . Marino tied Tarkenton's record with a two yard completion to Eric Green in the fourth quarter of that game and broke the record with an incomplete pass intended for Randal Hill later in that quarter . . . With 4,967 pass completions, Marino ranks first in NFL history in completions, breaking Fran Tarkenton's NFL record of 3,686 completions on Oct. 8, 1995 vs. Indianapolis . . . Marino tied Tarkenton's record with a five yard touchdown pass to Irving Spikes in the first quarter of that game and broke the record with a six-yard completion to Keith Byars in the second quarter . . . With 61,361 yards passing, Marino ranks first in NFL history in total yards passing, breaking Fran Tarkenton's NFL record of 47,003 passing yards on Nov. 12, 1995 vs. New England on a nine-yard completion to Irving Fryar in the first quarter . . . With 420

touchdown passes, Marino ranks first in NFL history in touchdown passes, breaking Tarkenton's NFL record of 342 TD passes with a six-yard TD pass to Keith Byars in the second quarter on Nov. 26, 1995 at Indianapolis . . . Marino tied Tarkenton's record with a four-yard touchdown pass to O.J. McDuffie in the third quarter on Nov. 20 vs. San Francisco . . .

YARDAGE: Marino's 61,361 yards passing rank first on the NFL's all-time career passing yardage list . . . On Oct. 17, 1999 at New England, Marino's eight yard pass to Tony Martin (his only completion of the game) made him the first quarterback in NFL history to pass for 60,000 career yards . . . On Nov. 12, 1995 vs. New England, with a nine-yard completion to Irving Fryar in the first quarter, Marino passed Fran Tarkenton (47,003 career passing yards), breaking Tarkenton's NFL record for most career passing yards and moving into first place on the NFL all-time career passing yardage list:

Marino reached the 50,000, 40,000 and 30,000 yards passing plateaus faster than any quarterback in NFL history . . . Marino is the only quarterback in NFL history to have six 4,000-yard seasons (1984-86, 1988, 1992, 1994) . . . Warren Moon (four, 1990-91, 1994-95), Peyton Manning (four, 1999-2002), Dan Fouts (three, 1979-81), Brett Favre (three, 1995, 1998-99), Drew Bledsoe (three, 1994, 1996, 2002), Steve Young (two, 1993, 1998), and Kurt Warner (two, 1999, 2001) are the only other QBs to have multiple 4,000-yard seasons . . . Along with Fouts and Manning, he is the only other QB to pass for 4,000 yards in three or more straight seasons (1984-86) . . . Marino passed for 3,000 or more yards 13 times (1984-92, 1994-95, 1997-98) in his 17 seasons in the NFL . . . When he went over the 3,000-yard passing mark on Dec. 21, 1998 vs. Denver, it marked the 13th time he passed for 3,000 or more yards, breaking his tie with John Elway and re-setting the NFL record for most 3,000 yard seasons . . . Marino originally set the record for most 3,000 yard seasons in 1991, his eighth year of passing for 3,000 or more yards before Elway tied that record in 1996 . . . Before setting that NFL record, Marino had been tied with Joe Montana (1981, 1983-85, 1987, 1989-90) for the previous record of seven 3,000-yard seasons . . . Marino extended that mark to 11 seasons before being tied by Elway in 1996, and Marino now holds the NFL record alone by extending that mark to 13 seasons . . . Marino led the NFL in passing yards five times during a season, having accomplished that feat in 1984-86, 1988, and 1992 . . . Marino tied the NFL record for most seasons leading the league in passing yardage (five) with Sonny Jurgensen (1961-62, 1966-67, 1969) . . . Marino had 13 career 400-yard games (15, including playoffs) and the Dolphins were 8-5 in those 13 games (9-6 overall, including the playoffs) . . . Marino had 63 career regular season 300-yard games (67, including playoffs), and the Dolphins were 37-26 in those 63 300-yard games (38-29 overall, including playoffs) . . . Marino's 63 career 300-yard passing games extended his own NFL record for most career 300-yard passing games . . . He broke Dan Fouts' former NFL record of 51 career 300-yard games on Dec. 3, 1995 vs. Atlanta when Marino had 343 yards passing, the 52nd regular season game of 300 or more yards passing in his career . . . Marino tied Fouts' record of 51 regular season career 300-yard games when he had 333 yards passing on Nov. 12, 1995 vs. New England . . . Marino owns the top 11 and 42 of the top 50 passing yardage games in Dolphins history as well as 67 of the 81 300-yard passing games in club history . . .

TOUCHDOWN PASSES: Marino's first touchdown pass on Nov. 26, 1995 at Indianapolis, a six-yard TD pass to Keith Byars with 13:54 elapsed in the second quarter, was Marino's 343rd TD pass of his career, breaking Fran Tarkenton's former NFL record of most career touchdown passes (342), making Marino the league's all-time leader in career TD passes . . . Marino tied Tarkenton's record vs. San Francisco on November 20, 1995, with a four-yard TD pass to O.J. McDuffie in the third quarter . . . On Nov. 29th, 1998 vs. New Orleans, Marino's

INTERCEPTIONS: In his career, Marino did not throw an interception in 85 games (90, including playoffs) . . . The Dolphins were 62-23 in those 85 games in which he was not intercepted (66-24, including playoffs) . . . Overall in his career, Marino threw 30 interceptions that were returned for touchdowns, 29 in the regular season and one in the playoffs . . .

SACKS: For the first eight years of Marino's career (1983-90), the Dolphins allowed the fewest sacks in the NFL . . .

RUSHING AND RECEIVING: In his career, Marino rushed for a touchdown nine times in the regular season (ten, including playoffs): Dec. 27, 1998 at Atlanta, three yards; Dec. 12, 1994 vs. Kansas City, four yards; Sept. 26, 1993 at Buffalo, four yards; Dec. 15, 1991 at San Diego, 10 yards; Dec. 10, 1989 vs. New England, one yard; Oct. 15, 1989 at Cincinnati, one yard; Dec. 7, 1987 vs. N.Y. Jets, five yards; Nov. 20, 1983 vs. Baltimore, one yard; and Oct. 30, 1983 vs. L.A. Rams, two yards (and one playoff contest – Jan. 12, 1991 at Buffalo in AFC Divisional Playoff contest, two yards) . . . The Dolphins were 7-2 in those regular season contests (7-3 including playoff games) when Marino rushed for a touchdown . . . Marino caught one pass in his career, on Nov. 12, 1995 vs. New England, when he caught his own deflected pass for a six-yard loss . . .

SERVICE: On Sept. 13, 1999, at Denver Marino began his 17th year of service with the Dolphins adding to his club record for most seasons as a Dolphin . . . In 1998 he broke Bob Kuechenberg's former club record for most seasons as a Dolphin (15 seasons), which Kuechenberg originally set from 1970-84 . . . Marino played in 242 regular season games with Miami . . . Marino missed 23 games during his career due to injuries . . . Overall in those 23 games that he missed due to injury, the Dolphins were 12-11 . . .

NFL RECORDS: Overall, Marino holds 24 NFL regular season records and is tied for three others . . . In addition to the above records for attempts, completions, yardage and touchdowns, Marino holds NFL single season records for yards (5,084 in 1984) and touchdowns (48 in 1984) . . . Having led the NFL in attempts in 1984, 1986, 1988, 1992, and 1997, Marino set a new NFL record for most seasons leading the league in pass attempts (five) . . . He had previously been tied with three other quarterbacks (Sammy Baugh, Johnny Unitas, George Blanda) who led the NFL in that category four times each . . . Having led the NFL in completions from 1984-86, 1988, 1992 and 1997, Marino set a new NFL record for most seasons leading the league in pass completions (six) . . . He had previously been tied with Sammy Baugh, who led the NFL in that category in five seasons . . . Marino and Blanda (1963-65) are the only QBs to lead the NFL in completions three consecutive years . . . Having led the NFL in passing yards from 1984-86, 1988 and 1992, Marino joined Sonny Jurgensen as the only players to have led the NFL in passing yards in five seasons, and only Dan Fouts (1979-82) has led the league longer consecutively in yardage (four seasons) . . .

COMEBACKS: Over the course of Marino's 17-year career with the Dolphins, he brought the team back from a fourth quarter deficit a total of 37 times, with 21 fourth quarter triumphs at home and 16 on the road . . . Included in that total were three playoff games in which Marino led Miami back in the fourth quarter . . . Marino's total of 37 fourth quarter comeback wins does NOT include 13 additional games, (12 in the regular season and one in the playoffs), that Marino won when the Dolphins were tied (but never did trail) in the fourth quarter, ten at home (one playoff contest and nine regular season games) and three on the road; If those 13 fourth-quarter tied situations are included, then Marino led the Dolphins on a total of 50 game-winning drives (31 at home and 19 on the road) . . . With 37 fourth quarter comeback victories, Marino ranks second in that category: Denver's John Elway has 43 final period come-from behind wins:

In Marino's 37 career fourth quarter comebacks, he completed 280 of 441 passes (63.5%) for 3,710 yards with 29 touchdowns and eight INTs in the final stanza for a rating of 104.4 . . .

UNDER DON SHULA: Marino is one of ten quarterbacks to have started games when Don Shula coached the Dolphins, from 1970 through 1995, and his 184 regular season starts under Shula is the most by any Dolphins quarterback during that time:

Marino's 116 wins under Shula are the most victories by a head coach - quarterback combination in NFL history, surpassing the previous high of 107 wins recorded by Pittsburgh's Chuck Noll and Terry Bradshaw . . . HONORS: Marino won the AFC Offensive Player of the Week honor 18 times in the regular season (and 20 times overall, including playoffs), as well as two AFC Player of the Month Awards in his 17-year NFL career . . . It is the most times any player has won Player of the Week honors since the award was instituted in 1984 . . . John Elway is second with 15 awards

(in addition to two Player of the Month Awards), Joe Montana is third with 13 awards, while Boomer Esiason is tied for fourth with 12 awards (he also has two Player of the Month Awards) along with Steve Young and Jerry Rice . . . Marino won the AFC Player of the Week Award twice in the same season five times in his career (1984, 1985, 1988, 1989, 1999) . . . Including playoff games, Marino has won multiple weekly awards seven different years . . .

MAN OF THE YEAR AWARD: On January 28, 1999, Marino was named as the 1998 Sprint/NFL Man of the Year . . . It is the only league-sponsored award that recognizes player community service as well as excellence on the field . . . Off the field, Marino established the Dan Marino Foundation, which was created to benefit children's charities in South Florida . . . He hosted events throughout the year to raise money for the foundation . . . One major project was the newly created Miami Children's Hospital/Dan Marino Center in Weston, Florida that opened in 1998 and offers comprehensive health care to children with chronic medical needs . . . Marino also spearheaded the Dolphins' annual Thanksgiving turkey giveaway each year in conjunction with the Daily Bread Food Bank...Marino was the Dolphins' United Way representative in 1994-96 and has been a strong supporter of their programs . . . In 1998, Marino was chosen as one of three national spokesmen for the NFL's 25-year anniversary with United Way . . . Marino became the second Dolphin player to win the NFL Man of the Year Award; Dwight Stephenson won that honor in 1985 . . .

SOUTH FLORIDA AWARDS: In balloting of South Florida media for the Dolphins' Most Valuable Player Award, Marino won that award twelve times (1983-92, 1994-95) . . . Marino passed Bob Griese, who won that award six times (1967-68, 1970-71, 1974, 1977) . . . Marino won the MVP award each of his first ten years in the league (1983-92), and no other Dolphin has ever won more than two consecutive MVP awards . . . In addition, in 1995 Marino was named the winner of the Miami Dolphins' Leadership Award for the first time, an award presented annually to the Miami player chosen by Dolphin management and coaches for leadership on and off the playing field . . . Marino again won the Leadership Award in 1997, this time chosen by his teammates . . . Marino won the Dolphins' Outstanding Offensive Back award ten times (1983-90, 1992, 1994) . . . His ten years winning that award surpassed the former team high set by Larry Csonka (1970-74, 1979), who had won that award six times...In 1998 Marino was chosen by the Dolphins organization as the club's winner of the annual Community Service Award . . . It was the second time in Marino's career that he had been selected as the winner of this award, having also been honored in 1996 . . . Since the award was first instituted in 1987, Marino is one of only three players to be honored more than once (John Offerdahl, 1989-90 and Bryan Cox, 1994-95) . . .

PLAYOFF CAREER: In his playoff appearances, Marino extended his Dolphin career playoff records for most attempts, completions, yards passing, and touchdown passes, playing in 18 playoff games, while Bob Griese, runner-up in all four categories, played in 12 post-season contests:

Marino attempted 687 passes in his playoff career...He ranks second on the all-time NFL playoff list for most passes attempted; Joe Montana is first in NFL playoff history with 734 passes attempted . . . On Jan. 2, 2000, in an AFC Wild Card contest at Seattle, Marino moved into second place among the all-time NFL pass attempt leaders, passing John Elway, who had 651 attempts . . . Marino completed 385 passes in his playoff career . . . On Jan. 2, 1999, in an AFC Wild Card contest vs. Buffalo, he surpassed Jim Kelly (322) and John Elway to move into second place among the all-time NFL pass completion leaders; Joe Montana is first with 460 pass completions while Elway is third with 355 completions . . . Marino passed for 4,510 yards in his playoff career . . . On Jan. 2, 1999, in an AFC Wild Card contest vs. Buffalo, he surpassed Jim Kelly (3,863) and moved into third place among the all-time NFL passing yardage leaders; Joe Montana is first with 5,772 passing yards and John Elway is second with 4,964 yards passing:

Marino had four postseason games of 300 or more passing yards, which ties him with Kurt Warner, Warren Moon, Troy Aikman, and John Elway for the third highest total in postseason history, surpassed only by the five 300-yard passing games by Dan Fouts and the six 300-yard passing games by Joe Montana . . . Marino threw 32 touchdowns passes in his 18 postseason games, the second highest career total in NFL history . . . In an AFC Wild Card contest on January 9, 2000 at Seattle, Marino's one-yard TD pass to Oronde Gadsden moved him past Terry Bradshaw into second place:

Marino threw at least one touchdown pass in 16 of his 18 playoff contests, throwing a TD pass in his first 13 postseason contests before being held without a touchdown pass in an AFC Wild Card game on Dec. 28, 1997 at New England . . . He also failed to throw a touchdown pass in an AFC Divisional Playoff matchup at Denver on Jan. 9, 1999 . . . Marino's 13-game postseason streak with at least one touchdown pass establishes the NFL record for the most consecutive games with a touchdown pass, and he broke that record on December 31, 1984 vs. Kansas City when he threw a touchdown pass for the 11th consecutive game before extending the mark to 13 straight games following his two touchdowns at Buffalo in an AFC Wild Card playoff game on Dec. 30, 1995, before having that streak ended in an AFC Wild Card game at New England on Dec. 28, 1997 . . . Brett Favre tied that record in 2002:

PRO BOWL: Marino was selected to nine Pro Bowls (1983-87, 1991-92, 1994-95), including seven as a starter (1983-86, 1992, 1994-95), but due to injuries he was able to play in only two games (1984, 1992) . . . Marino's nine Pro Bowl selections set a Dolphins record for most career selections, surpassing the former record of six selections that had previously been set by quarterback Bob Griese (1970-71, 1973-74, 1977-78), center Jim Langer (1973-78), and guard Bob Kuechenberg (1974-75, 1977-78, 1982-83) . . . Marino's seven Pro Bowl starts set a Dolphins record for career starts, surpassing the former record of five starts that had previously been set by Langer (1973-77) . . . When Marino was selected to the Pro Bowl following his rookie season in 1983, he became the youngest quarterback ever selected to the Pro Bowl:

- Buffalo swept the season series in 2002 after Miami had accomplished the same feat the previous two seasons. In fact, the past four years have resulted in sweeps, as the Bills also captured the 1999 series. Despite having dropped both contests in 2002, the Dolphins have won four of the last six meetings and lead the all-time series by a 47-30-1 margin.
- The Bills' season sweep of the Dolphins in 2002 was their eighth time winning both regular season contests in the 37-year history of the series. Miami has won both games on 18 occasions, most recently in 2001, while the teams have split 11 times.
- The Bills' 38-21 victory at Ralph Wilson Stadium on December 1, 2002 snapped the Dolphins' two-game winning streak in Buffalo. Miami has not had a road winning streak in this series longer than two games since winning five consecutive contests in Buffalo from 1982-86. Overall, the Dolphins have posted a regular season mark of 21-16 at Ralph Wilson Stadium.
- Prior to dropping a 23-10 decision to the Bills on October 20, 2002 at Pro Player Stadium, the Dolphins had captured six out of the previous seven regular season contests in

this series played in Miami. The Bills' lone victory during this stretch came on October 4, 1999, as they handed Miami a 23-18 defeat. Overall, the Dolphins are 25-11-1 against the Bills at home during the regular season, and 1-1 in postseason games played in Miami.

- With 4,697 passing yards against the Dolphins, Bills quarterback Drew Bledsoe needs 206 yards to become the all-time leading passer against Miami, surpassing former Buffalo signal caller Joe Ferguson's 4,902 yards. In addition, Bledsoe needs two more touchdown passes to reach 27 for his career against Miami to overtake Ferguson's hold on the top spot with 26.
- Miami set the NFL record for consecutive wins over one team with 20 against Buffalo, from 1970-79.

- This will be the tenth regular season meeting between the Dolphins and Cowboys, with Miami holding a 6-3 advantage in the series. Dallas, however, has captured each of the last two meetings, a 20-0 Thanksgiving Day triumph on November 25, 1999 and a 29-10 win at Pro Player Stadium on October 27, 1996. Miami's last win in this series came on November 25, 1993 as Pete Stoyanovich's 19-yard field goal on the game's final play lifted the Dolphins to a 16-14 Thanksgiving Day victory at Texas Stadium.

- This will be the Dolphins' fifth Thanksgiving Day appearance, and the fourth against the Cowboys. Miami faced Dallas on Thanksgiving Day in 1973, 1993 and 1999, and squared off against the St. Louis Cardinals in 1977. The Dolphins are 3-1 in Thanksgiving Day games, with their only loss coming against the Cowboys in 1999.

- The Dolphins and Cowboys met in Super Bowl VI in New Orleans on January 6, 1972, with Dallas earning a 24-3 victory in the Dolphins' first trip to the NFL's championship contest. Miami would go on to win 18 straight games and 32 of their next 34 contests en route to back-to-back Super Bowl titles.

- Miami Head Coach Dave Wannstedt served as the defensive coordinator for Dallas from 1989-92, ultimately guiding that unit to a number-one overall ranking in his final season, which culminated with the Cowboys winning Super Bowl XXVII as their defense forced nine turnovers in a 52-17 rout of the Buffalo Bills.

• This will be the first ever regular season meeting between these clubs. The Dolphins are 19-11 in games where they play a franchise for the first time. Miami and Houston faced off in last year's preseason, on August 24, as the Dolphins handed the Texans a 24-3 loss in the inaugural game at Reliant Stadium.

• The Texans will make their first ever trip to Pro Player Stadium in 2003. The Dolphins are 19-10 all-time (regular season) when hosting a team for the first time. Since moving its home games to Pro Player Stadium in 1987, Miami is 20-9 (regular season) against teams making their first appearance there. The Jacksonville Jaguars are the only other NFL team not to have played a regular season contest at Pro Player Stadium.

• The last time an NFL team from Houston visited Miami was on November 22, 1992 when Dolphins kicker Pete Stoyanovich nailed a 52-yard field goal with two seconds remaining in regulation to lead Miami to a 19-16 win over the Houston Oilers at Pro Player Stadium.

• For the second time in as many seasons, Miami and Indianapolis will square off as non-divisional opponents. Prior to the NFL's realignment in 2002, the Dolphins and Colts met twice a year during the regular season every year since 1970 as members of the AFC East. Miami leads the all-time series 46-21.

• In last season's September 15 meeting at the RCA Dome, the Dolphins came away with a 21-13 victory. With that win, Miami has now won four consecutive games and eight of the last 10 over Indianapolis, including playoffs.

- Miami and New England split the season series in 2002 for the second consecutive season. The Dolphins began playing the Patriots twice a year during the regular season in 1967 and have split the series in 18 of those seasons. Miami swept the regular season series 13 times while New England has owned the series on four occasions. In 1966 and 1982, the teams faced off only once during the regular season, with the Patriots emerging victorious on both occasions. The Dolphins lead the regular season series 44-28 while the Patriots hold a 2-1 advantage in postseason contests.
- The Dolphins have recorded victories in five straight and 12 of the last 14 games against the Patriots at Pro Player Stadium. Overall, the Dolphins are 30-7 against the Patriots in games decided in Miami, including a 29-6 mark in the

regular season. Their record versus New England at Pro Player Stadium is 12-4. The Dolphins are 15-21 against the Patriots in New England during the regular season, including a 14-19 register at Foxboro Stadium.

- The Dolphins are 13-0 against the Patriots all-time in games played in Miami during the months of September and October. Each of the previous three games of this series (2000-02) staged in Miami has been in one of these two months, including October 6 of last year when the Dolphins recorded a 26-13 victory.
- The Patriots have hosted a December game in this series in each of the past three seasons, owning a 2-1 record in those games, including wins in two straight. Most recently, New England overcame an 11-point fourth quarter deficit to claim a 27-24 overtime win on December 29, 2002, spoiling Miami's chance to win the AFC East title and ultimately eliminating them from the playoffs.

- This game marks just the fifth meeting in the history of the series. The Giants hold a 3-1 advantage and are one of only six teams with an all-time winning record against the Dolphins. - The Dolphins lead the all-time series 6-4. The Redskins, however, won the most recent meeting, a 21-10 decision on January 2, 2000 at FedEx Field.

- The Redskins have not played in Miami since falling, 17-10, to the Dolphins on October 4, 1993 at Pro Player Stadium. Overall, the Dolphins boast a perfect 3-0 record at home in this series, while the Redskins are 3-2 when playing on their home turf.

- Miami and Washington have squared off in two Super Bowls. The Dolphins won Super Bowl VII on January 14, 1973, by a 14-7 score to preserve the NFL's only perfect season. The teams battled again for the NFL crown in Super Bowl XVII on January 30, 1983, with Washington winning the contest by a 27-17 score.

- This game will mark the second time the Dolphins have played a team whose head coach was once on Miami's roster. Redskins Head Coach Steve Spurrier spent one week with the Dolphins during the team's 1977 training camp. Miami will also face the Jacksonville Jaguars this season, whose first-year head coach, Jack Del Rio, went to camp with the Dolphins in 1996.

DOLPHINS ON THE AIR

WQAM

The 2003 Miami Dolphins' season marks the seventh with WQAM (560 AM) serving as the flagship station for the Dolphins' radio network. This year the network has over 20 stations covering more than 70 markets in Florida.

Handling the play-by-play and entering his second season as "The Voice of the Dolphins" is Howard David. David spent the previous 23 years doing play-by-play for the CBS/Westwood One Radio Network, including his last six seasons as the national voice of Monday Night Football on CBS, where he was part of the radio team that aired six Super Bowls. Prior to that, David spent eight years broadcasting Sunday Night Football for the network. His radio work for CBS also included college football and basketball, as well as national events such as the U.S. Open golf and tennis championships and the Olympics, including anchoring the CBS Radio Network's coverage of the 2002 Winter Olympic Games in Salt Lake City.

In addition to his work nationally, David spent 14 years broadcasting locally in both the NFL and the NBA. He was the radio voice of the New Jersey Nets (1987-94), Milwaukee Bucks (1994-97) and Boston Celtics (1997-01), while also handling the play-by-play for the New York Jets for four seasons (1998-01).

Joining David in the booth is analyst and ex-Dolphins favorite Jim Mandich. He is in his 12th year as the color commentator on Dolphin game broadcasts and was a member of the Dolphins' 1972 club that was the NFL's only undefeated team. In his eight seasons as a Dolphins tight end (1970-77), Mandich caught 121 passes for 1,406 yards (11.6 yards per

catch) with 23 touchdowns. He ranks 24th in Dolphins team history in receiving and is tied for 20th in club annals in scoring with 138 points.

In addition to his work on WQAM, Mandich also serves as a sports reporter for WPLG-TV and is a regular contributor to the station's popular "Sports Jam Live" show that airs during the football season.

WQAM is known for its outstanding sports programming, and is one of the leading sports and entertainment radio stations in the country. In addition to the Dolphins games, WQAM also broadcasts the games of the Florida Marlins, the Florida Panthers, and the University of Miami football, basketball and baseball contests. WQAM is the home of the popular "Howard David Show" in the morning, featuring the Dolphins' play-by-play broadcaster along with Steve Goldstein, followed by Scott Ferrall's morning talk show. Miami's leading talk show "The Neil Rogers Show" is heard mid-days. Dolphin analyst Jim Mandich follows Rogers with his talk show, while long-time South Florida sports personality Hank Goldberg handles the afternoon and hosts the weekly "Dave Wannstedt Show" with Dolphins Head Coach Dave Wannstedt. Former Dolphins Kim Bokamper and Joe Rose also host talk shows as part of WQAM's line-up.

WQAM carries extensive Dolphins programming on game-days, beginning with a four-hour pre-game show and culminating with a two-hour post-game wrapup. WQAM also broadcasts several Dolphin player features weekly plus live broadcasts from the team's training camp and carries comprehensive Dolphins updates during the season from their on-site reporter and talk show host Orlando Alzugaray.

RADIO UNICA

For the third straight year, Dolphins games, both home and away, will be broadcast in Spanish on Radio Unica, 1210 AM. This marks the 22nd consecutive season that Dolphins games will be broadcast in Spanish.

Rene Giraldo, who has been part of the Spanish broadcasts of Dolphins games for all 22 of those seasons, will handle the play-by-play for his 19th straight year after previously serving as a color analyst. He will be joined by color analyst Roly Martin, also a long-time member of the Dolphins' Spanish broadcast team.

PRESEASON TELEVISION

Three of the four Dolphins preseason games in 2003 will be telecast on WFOR-TV (Channel 4) in Miami-Ft. Lauderdale, WTVX (Channel 34) in West Palm Beach, and WTVK (Channel 6) in Fort Myers (just the two road games), while the other game will be televised nationally on CBS-TV.

The Dolphins' one preseason national telecast will come on Friday, August 22 against the Atlanta Falcons at Pro Player Stadium. That will be broadcast nationally on CBS-TV beginning at 8:00 p.m. (ET). It will be carried live locally on WFOR-TV and WTVX if the game is sold out 72 hours prior to kickoff; otherwise it will be blacked out.

The remaining three preseason games will be televised by WFOR-TV and WTVX, including two definite live telecasts. The first of those three games will be on Friday, August 8 when the Dolphins host the Super Bowl Champion Tampa Bay Buccaneers, starting at 7:00 p.m. (ET) at Pro Player Stadium. If the game is sold out 72 hours prior to kickoff, it will be shown live in the Miami-Ft. Lauderdale and West Palm Beach areas; otherwise it will be shown on a delayed basis. The Dolphins then meet the Jacksonville Jaguars in Jacksonville on Friday, August 15, starting at 7:30 p.m. (ET) in a game that will be televised live on WFOR and WTVX. Following their game against Atlanta, the Dolphins will conclude their preseason schedule on Thursday, August 28 at New Orleans in a game that will be carried live on WFOR-TV and WTVX starting at 8:00 p.m. (ET).

For the third straight season, Craig Bolerjack will handle the play-by-play for the games on WFOR. He is a member of CBS Sports' NFL broadcast team and also has handled college football and basketball for that network as well as for ESPN. Joining Bolerjack for the first two games as a color analyst will be former Dolphins great and Pro Football Hall of Famer Bob Griese, a member of ABC's lead broadcast team for college football. Another Dolphins Hall of Famer, Nick Buoniconti, who was the driving force of Miami's "No-Name Defense" and an analyst on HBO's "Inside the NFL" for 23 years, will handle the color for the Saints game. In addition, Nat Moore, the Dolphins' third all-time leading receiver and one of the most popular players in club history, again will handle color commentary for all three preseason games on WFOR. Kim Bokamper, a member of the WFOR Sports staff and a former Dolphins Pro Bowl linebacker, will join WFOR's broadcast team as a sideline reporter.

FINS-TV, the "official" show of the Miami Dolphins, airs every Saturday night at 7:00 p.m. and is hosted by NBC-6 Sports Anchor Joe Rose with contributions from reporters Andrea Brody and Guy Rawlings. Jeff Tavss is the producer.

Sunshine Network is the Miami Dolphins' exclusive regional sports network partner and is the largest regional cable network in the state of Florida – seen in over 5.9 million cable and satellite homes statewide.

This partnership provides year-round coverage of the Dolphins to more fans and viewers in Florida than ever before. From Pensacola to the Keys, Sunshine Network is the Florida sports fan's best statewide source for the latest Dolphins news and programming.

Sunshine Network replays, on a next-day basis, all non-national network preseason games statewide. Replays of "The Dave Wannstedt Show" can be seen Sundays on Sunshine Network.

Another highlight of the Dolphins/Sunshine agreement is the network's live statewide coverage each Monday of the team's afternoon news conferences. Sunshine Network also produces and airs a special live Thursday night show called "Dolphins Live! with Goldie and the Mad Dog" featuring South Florida radio personality Steve Goldstein and legendary Dolphins radio analyst Jim Mandich. The popular weekly program originates live from Dolphins headquarters in Davie. Various other programs and specials on the Dolphins air year-round on the network.

MEDIA INFORMATION

CREDENTIALS: Media representatives who do not have press credentials for the entire season (but will be working for an accredited media outlet on an immediate deadline) may request them on a single-game basis. Written credential requests must be made at least one week in advance to: Harvey Greene, Senior Vice President - Media Relations, Miami Dolphins, 7500 S.W. 30th Street, Davie, FL 33314 (954/452-7010). Reserved credentials can be picked up at the press gate, located outside Gate G of Pro Player Stadium, on the day of the game. ALL members of the media picking up credentials at the will call window must present a valid photo identification. In addition, all media members must show a valid photo identification upon entering the stadium.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photographers with accredited media outlets on an immediate deadline may request credentials on a single-game basis from the Dolphins' media relations department. Credentials **WILL NOT** be issued to freelance photographers unless granted special approval by the Dolphins. Field photographers are reminded to remain outside of the bench area. ALL photographers and runners are required to wear wristbands that must be obtained prior to the game in the Gate G lobby.

PRESS BOX: To get to the Pro Player Stadium press box, enter at Gate G. Go through two sets of doors and take the elevator to the third floor. Exit elevator and the broadcast booths are to the right. For the print section, make a left and exit the broadcast booth box into the club lounge area. Go 50 yards to the staircase and go to the lower level of the club lounge. The entrance to the print press box is just beyond the bottom of the stairs. Only credentials issued by the Dolphins will be honored for admittance to Pro Player Stadium.

LOCKER ROOMS: Admission to the home and visiting locker rooms is governed by each individual team. Only media representatives with proper credentials, granting locker room access or those stamped with "Locker Room Access," will be admitted. No one will be admitted to the locker rooms prior to the game. Both teams' locker rooms are located on the ground level on the west side of the stadium. From the print press box, take the elevator to the ground level. Out of the elevator, bear right and go through the double doors to the corridor. MEDICAL GLOSSARY

AC Joint – Acromioclavicular joint; joint of the shoulder where acromion process of the scapula and the distal end of the clavicle meet; most shoulder separations occur at this point.

Abduct – Movement of any extremity away from the midline of the body. This action is achieved by an abductor muscle.

Abrasion – Any injury which rubs off the surface of the skin.

Abscess – An infection which produces pus; can be the result of a blister, callus, penetrating wound or laceration.

Adduct – Movement of an extremity toward the midline of the body. This action is achieved by an adductor muscle.

Achilles' Tendon – The tendon at the back of the heel.

Adhesion – Abnormal adherence of collagen fibers to surrounding structures during immobilization following trauma or as a complication of surgery which restricts normal elasticity of the structures involved.

Aerobic – Exercise in which energy needed is supplied by oxygen inspired and is required for sustained periods of vigorous exercise with a continually high pulse rate.

Anabolic Steroids – Steroids that promote tissue growth by creating protein in an attempt to enhance muscle growth. The main anabolic steroid is testosterone (male sex hormone).

Anaerobic – Exercise without use of oxygen as an energy source; short bursts of vigorous exercises.

Anaphylactic Shock – Shock that is caused by an allergic reaction.

Anterior Compartment Syndrome – Condition in which swelling within the anterior compartment of the lower leg jeopardizes the viability of muscles, nerves and arteries that serve the foot. In severe cases, emergency surgery is necessary to relieve the swelling and pressure.

Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL) – A primary stabilizing ligament within the center of the knee joint that prevents hyperextension and excessive rotation of the joint. A complete tear of the ACL necessitating reconstruction could require up to 12 months of rehabilitation.

Anterior Talofibular Ligament – A ligament of the ankle that connects the fibula (lateral ankle bone) to the talus. This ligament is oft times subject to sprain.

Anti-Inflammatory – Any agent which prevents inflammation, such as aspirin or ibuprofen.

Arteriogram – A film demonstrating arteries after injection of a dye.

Arthrogram – X-ray technique for joints using air and/or dye injected into the affected area; useful in diagnosing meniscus tears of the knee and rotator cuff tears of the shoulder.

Arthroscope – An instrument used to visualize the interior of a joint cavity.

Arthroscopy – A surgical examination of the internal structures of a joint by means for viewing through an arthroscope. An arthroscopic procedure can be used to remove or repair damaged tissue or as a diagnostic procedure in order to inspect the extent of any damage or confirm a diagnosis.

Articular Cartilage – Cartilage lining the opposing surfaces of bones.

Aspiration – The withdrawal of fluid from a body cavity by means of a suction or siphonage apparatus, such as a syringe.

Atrophy – To shrivel or shrink from disuse, as in muscular atrophy.

Avascular Necrosis – Death of a part due to lack of circulation.

Avulsion – The tearing away, forcibly, of a part or structure.

Baker's Cyst – Localized swelling of a bursa sac in the posterior knee as a result

of fluid that has escaped from the knee capsule. A Baker's cyst indicates that there is a trauma inside the knee joint that leads to excessive fluid production.

Bone Scan – An imaging procedure in which a radioactive-labeled substance is injected into the body to determine the status of a bony injury. If the radioactive substance is taken up the bone at the injury site, the injury will show as a "hot spot" on the scan image. The bone scan is particularly useful in the diagnosis of stress fractures.

Brachial Plexus – Network of nerves originating from the cervical vertebrae and running down to the shoulder, arm, hand, and fingers.

Bruise – A discoloration of the skin due to an extravasation of blood into the underlying tissues.

Burner – Common term for brachial plexus trauma in the neck. Usually results in burning or tingling sensation into the shoulder or arm when the neck is forced beyond the normal range of motion.

Bursa – A fluid-filled sac that is located in areas where friction is likely to occur, then minimizes the friction; for example between a tendon and bone.

Capsule – An enclosing structure which surrounds the joint and contains ligaments which stabilize that joint.

Cartilage – Smooth, slippery substance preventing two ends of bones from rubbing together and grating.

CAT Scan – Use of a computer to produce a cross sectional view of the anatomical part being investigated from X-ray data.

Cellulitis – Inflammation of cellular or connective tissue.

Cervical Vertebrae – Group of seven vertebrae located in the neck.

Charley Horse – A contusion or bruise to any muscle resulting in intramuscular bleeding. No other injury should be called a charley horse.

Chondral Fracture – Fracture to the chondral (cartilaginous) surfaces of bone.

Chondromalacia – A roughening of the cartilage surface. Best known for the roughening of the underside of the kneecap.

Clavical – The collar bone; the bone connecting the breastbone with the shoulder blade.

Colles' Fracture – A fracture of the distal end of the radius with the lower end being displaced backward.

Concentric Muscle Contraction – A shortening of the muscle as it develops tension and contracts to move a resistance.

Concussion – Jarring injury of the brain resulting in dysfunction. It can be graded as mild, moderate or severe depending on loss of consciousness, amnesia and loss of equilibrium.

Contusion – An injury to a muscle and tissues caused by a blow from a blunt object.

Cortical Steroids – Used to suppress joint inflammation.

Cortisone – An anti-inflammatory medication.

Costochondral – Cartilage that separates the bones within the rib cage.

Cryokinetics – Treatment with cold and movement.

Cryotherapy – A treatment with the use of cold.

Cyst – Abnormal sac containing liquid or semi-solid matter.

Debridement – The removal of foreign material and dead or damaged tissue.

Degenerative Joint Disease – Changes in the joint surfaces as a result of repetitive trauma.

Deltoid Ligament – Ligament that connects the tibia to bones of the medial aspect of the foot and is primarily responsible for stability of the ankle on the medial side. Is sprained less frequently than other ankle ligaments.

Deltoid Muscle – Muscles at top of the arm, just below the shoulder, responsible for shoulder motions to the front, side and back.

Disc, Intervertebral – A flat, rounded plate between each vertebrae of the spine. The disc consists of a thick fiber ring which surrounds a soft gel-like interior. It functions as a cushion and shock absorber for the spinal column.

Dislocation – Complete displacement of joint surfaces.

Eccentric Muscle Contraction – An overall lengthening of the muscle as it develops tension and contracts to control motion performed by an outside force; oft times referred to a "negative" contraction in weight training.

Eccymosis – Bleeding into the surface tissue below the skin, resulting in a "black and blue" effect.

Edema – Accumulation of fluid in organs and tissues of the body; swelling.

Effusion – Accumulation of fluid, in various spaces in the body, or the knee itself. Commonly, the knee has an effusion after an injury.

Electrical Galvanic Stimulation (EGS) – An electrical therapeutic modality that sends a current to the body at select voltages and frequencies in order to stimulate pain receptors, disperse edema, or neutralize muscle spasms among other functional applications.

Electromyogram (EMG) – Test to determine nerve function.

Epicondylitis – Inflammation in the elbow due to overuse.

Ethyl Chloride – "Cold spray," a chemical coolant sprayed onto an injury site to produce a local, mild anesthesia.

Fascia – A connective tissue sheath consisting of fibrous tissue and fat which unites the skin to the underlying tissues.

Fat Percentage – The amount of body weight that is adipose, fat tissue. Fat percentages can be calculated by underwater weighing, measuring select skinfold thickness, or by analyzing electrical impedance.

Femur – Thigh bone; longest bone in the body.

Fibula – Smaller of the two bones in the lower leg; runs from knee to the ankle along the outside of the lower leg.

Flexibility – The ability of muscle to relax and yield to stretch forces.

Flexibility Exercise – General term used to describe exercise performed by a player to passively or actively elongate soft tissue without the assistance of an athletic trainer.

Fracture – Breach in continuity of a bone. Types of fractures include simple, compound, comminuted, greenstick, incomplete, impacted, longitudinal, oblique, stress, or transverse.

Gamekeeper's Thumb – Tear of the ulnar collateral ligament of the metacar-pophalangeal joint of the thumb.

Glycogen – Form in which foods are stored in the body as energy.

Grade One Injury – A mild injury in which ligament, tendon, or other musculoskeletal tissue may have been stretched or contused, but not torn or otherwise disrupted.

Grade Two Injury – A moderate injury when musculoskeletal tissue has been partially, but not totally, torn which causes appreciable limitation in function of the injured tissue.

Grade Three Injury – A severe injury in which tissue has been significantly, and in some cases totally, torn or otherwise disrupted causing a virtual total loss of function.

Hamstring – Category of muscle that runs from the buttocks to the knee along the back of the thigh. It functions to flex the knee, and is oft times injured as a result of improper conditioning or lack of muscle flexibility.

Heat Cramps – Painful muscle spasms of the arms or legs caused by excessive body heat and depletion of fluids and electrolytes.

Heat Exhaustion – Mild form of shock due to dehydration because of excessive sweating when exposed to heat and humidity.

Heat Stroke – Condition of rapidly rising internal body temperature that overwhelms the body's mechanisms for release of heat and could result in death if not cared for appropriately.

Heel Cup – Orthotic device that is inserted into the shoe and worn under the heel to give support to the Achilles tendon and help absorb impacts at the heel.

Hematoma – Tumor-like mass produced by an accumulation of coagulated blood in a cavity.

Hip Pointer – Contusion to the iliac crest.

Hot Pack – Chemical pack that rests in water, approximately 160 degrees, and retains its heat for 15-20 minutes when placed in a towel for general therapeutic application.

Humerus – Bone of the upper arm that runs from the shoulder to the elbow.

Hydrotherapy – Treatment using water.

Hyperextension – Extreme extension of a limb or body part.

Iliotibial Band – A thick, wide fascial layer that runs from the iliac crest to the knee joint and is occasionally inflamed as a result of excessive running.

Impingement Syndrome – Pinching together of the supraspinatus muscle and other soft tissue in the shoulder, which is common in throwing.

Inflammation – The body's natural response to injury in which the injury site might display various degrees of pain, sweating, heat, redness, and/or loss of function.

Internal Rotation – Rotation of a joint or extremity medially, to the inside.

Lateral Collateral Ligament (LCL) – Ligament of knee attaching lateral femoral condyle to the fibula head. It provides lateral stability to the knee.

Lesion – Wound, injury or tumor.

Ligament – Band of fibrous tissue that connects bone to bone or bone to cartilage and supports and strengthens joints.

Lumbar Vertebrae – Five vertebrae of the lower back that articulate with the sacrum to form the lumbosacral joint.

Malleolus – Rounded projection on either side of the ankle joint.

Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) – Imaging procedure in which a radio frequency pulse causes certain electrical elements of the injured tissue to react to this pulse and through this process a computer display and permanent film establish a visual image. MRI does not require radiation and is very useful in the diagnosis of soft tissue, disc, and meniscus injuries.

Medial Collateral Ligament (MCL) – Ligament of knee attaching to medial femoral condyle and to medial tibia. It provides medial stability to the knee.

Medial Retinaculum – The band of connective tissue that attaches to the medial structures of the knee joint, including the patella and patellar tendon.

Meniscectomy – An intra-articular surgical procedure of the knee by which all or part of the damaged meniscus is removed.

Meniscus – Crescent shaped cartilage, usually pertaining to the knee joint; also known as "cartilage." There are two menisci in the knee, medial and lateral. These work to absorb weight within the knee and provide stability.

Metacarpals – Five long bones of the hand, running from the wrist to the fingers.

Metatarsals – Five long bones of the foot, running from the ankle to the toes.

Myositis – Inflammation of a muscle.

Necrotic – Relating to death of a portion of tissue.

Neoprene – Lightweight rubber used in joint and muscle sleeves designed to provide support and/or insulation and heat retention to the area.

Neuritis – Inflammation of a nerve.

Orthotic – Any device applied to or around the body in the care of physical impairment or disability, commonly used to control foot mechanics.

Parasthesia – Sensation of numbness or tingling, indicating nerve irritation.

Patella – The kneecap. The patella functions to protect the distal end of the femur as well as increase the mechanical advantage and force generating capacities of the quadriceps muscle group.

Patella Tendinitis – Inflammation of the patella ligament; also known as "jumper's knee."

Patellar Femoral Joint – Articulation of the kneecap and femur. Inflammation of this joint can occur through: 1) acute injury to the patella, 2) overuse from excessive running particularly if there is an associated knee weakness, 3) chronic wear and tear of the knee, 4) as a result of poor foot mechanics. Patellofemoral irritation can lead to chondromalacia, which in its most chronic condition, could require surgery.

Peroneal Muscles – Group of muscles of the lateral lower leg that are responsible for everting the knee. Tendons of these three muscles are vital to the stability of the ankle and foot.

Phalanx – Any bone of the fingers or toes; plural is phalanges.

Phlebitis – Inflammation of a vein.

Plantar – Pertaining to the sole of the foot.

Plantar Fascia – The tight band of muscle beneath the arch of the foot.

Plica – Fold of tissue in the joint capsule and a common result of knee injury.

Pneumothorax – A collection of air or gas that enters the cavity surrounding the lungs as a result of a perforation through the chest wall or the cavity wall.

Posterior Cruciate Ligament (PCL) – A primary stabilizing ligament of the knee that provides significant stability and prevents displacement of the tibia backward within the knee joint. A complete tear of this ligament necessitating reconstruction could require up to 12 months of rehabilitation.

Quadricep Muscles "Quads" – A group of four muscles of the front thigh that run from the hip and form a common tendon at the patella; they are responsible for knee extension.

Radiography – Taking of X-rays.

Radius – Forearm bone on the thumb side.

Reconstruction – Surgical rebuilding of a joint using natural, artificial or transplanted materials.

Referred Pain – Pain felt in an undamaged area of body away from the actual injury.

Retraction – The moving of tissue to expose a part or structure of the body.

Rotator Cuff – Comprised of four muscles in the shoulder area that can be irritated by overuse. The muscles are the supraspinatus (most commonly injured), infra-spinatus, teres minor, and subscapularis.

Rotator Cuff Impingement Syndrome – A microtrauma or overuse injury caused by stress, and the four stages are:

1) Tendinitis with temporary thickening of the bursa and rotator cuff; 2) Fiber dissociation in the tendon with

permanent thickening of the bursa and scar formation; 3) A partial rotator cuff tear of less than 1 cm.; and 4) A complete tear of 1 cm. or more.

Sacrum - Group of five fused vertebrae located just below the lumbar vertebrae of the low back.

Scapula - Shoulder blade.

Sciatica - Irritation of the sciatic nerve resulting in pain or tingling running down the inside of the leg.

Sciatic Nerve - Major nerve that carries impulses for muscular action and sensations between the low back and thigh and lower leg; it is the longest nerve in the body.

Shin Splint - A catch-all syndrome describing pain in the shin that is not a fracture or tumor and cannot be defined otherwise.

Sorbothane - An energy absorbing polyurethane utilized in some foot orthotics to absorb shock forces of the foot.

Spasm (Theory) - Muscle soreness induced by exercise; is the result of reduced muscle blood flow, which results in pain.

Spleen - Large, solid organ responsible for the normal production and destruction of blood cells.

Spondylitis - Inflammation of one or more vertebrae.

Spondylolisthesis - Forward displacement of one vertebrae over another below it due to a developmental defect in the vertebrae.

Spondylosis - Abnormal vertebral fixation or immobility.

Sprain - Injury resulting from a stretch or twist of the joint and causes various degrees of stretch or tear of a ligament or other soft tissue at the joint.

Sternum - The breast bone.

Steroids - Any one of a large number of hormone-like substances. See Anabolic steroids and cortical steroids.

Stinger - Common term for plexus trauma in the neck.

Strain - Injury resulting from a pull or torsion to the muscle or tendon that causes various degrees of stretch or tear to the muscle or tendon tissue.

Stress Fracture - A hair-line type of break in a bone caused by overuse.

Stress X-ray - A continual X-ray taken when a portion of the body is stressed to its maximum in order to determine joint stability. This is a test utilized in some ankle injuries.

Stretching - Any therapeutic maneuver designed to elongate shortened soft tissue structures and thereby increase flexibility.

Subluxation - Partial dislocation of a joint. The term usually implies that the joint can return to its normal position without formal reduction.

Talus - The ankle bone that articulates with the tibia and fibula to form the ankle joint.

Target Heart Rate - A pre-determined pulse to be obtained during exercise when circulation is working at full efficient capacities.

Tarsals - Group of seven bones of the foot consisting of the calcaneal, talus, cuboid and three cuneiform bones.

Temporomandibular Joint (TMJ) - The articulation of the jaw and skull; considered by some to be vital in resolution of injuries throughout the body.

Tendinitis - Inflammation of the tendon and/or tendon sheath, caused by chronic overuse or sudden injury.

Tendon - Tissue that connects muscle to bone.

Tennis Elbow - General term for lateral elbow pain.

Thoracic - Group of twelve vertebrae located in the thorax and articulate with the twelve ribs.

Thoracic Outlet Compression Syndrome - A neuro-vascular disorder of the upper extremity common in throwing.

Tibia - Larger of the two bones of the lower leg and is the weight-bearing bone of the shin.

Tomograph - A special type of X-ray apparatus that demonstrates an organ or tissue at a particular depth.

Trachea - The windpipe.

Transcutaneous Electrical Nerve Stimulator (TENS) - An electrical modality that sends a mild current through pads at the injury site which stimulates the brain to release the natural analgesic, endorphin.

Transverse Process - Small lateral projection off the right side and left side of each vertebrae that functions as an attachment site for muscles and ligaments of the spine.

Trapezius - Flat triangular muscle covering the posterior surface of the neck and shoulder.

Triceps - Muscle of the back of the upper arm, primarily responsible for extending the elbow.

Turf Toe - Sprain of the metatarsophalangeal (MTP) joint of the great toe.

Ulna - Forearm bone that runs from the tip of the elbow to the little finger side of the wrist.

Ulnar Nerve - Nerve in elbow commonly irritated from excessive throwing.

Ultrasound - An electrical modality that transmits a sound wave through an applicator into the skin to the soft tissue in order to heat the local area for relaxing the injured tissue and/or disperse edema.

Valgus - Angulation outward and away from the midline of the body.

Varus - Angulation inward and toward the midline of the body.

Vasoconstriction - Decrease of local blood flow.

Vasodilation - Increase of local blood flow.

"Wind Knocked Out" - Syndrome describing a contraction of the abdominal nerve trunk, the solar plexus, as a result of an abdominal contusion.

Wrist - The junction between the two forearm bones (radius and ulna) and the eight wrist bones (trapezium, trapezoid, capitate, hamate, pisiform, triquetrum, lunate and scaphoid).

Zygoma - The cheekbone.
