

U.S. BANK STADIUM SETS PUBLIC-PRIVATE BLUEPRINT



Following more than a dozen years of discussion at the State Capitol and four years of design and construction, the Vikings and the Minnesota Sports Facilities Authority officially opened U.S. Bank Stadium on July 22, 2016, marking the completion of the largest construction project in state history and the celebration of a true public-private partnership that has helped reshape the East Town neighborhood in Minneapolis.

In total, the design and construction of U.S. Bank Stadium involved more than 300 Minnesota businesses, with approximately 90% of the \$1.1 billion construction dollars, or more than \$700 million flowing back to Minnesotans. Approximately 8,000 construction workers spent nearly four million hours on the project, peaking at 1,500 workers on site daily. Even prior to opening the world's largest pivoting glass doors, more than \$1 billion in surrounding development has been generated, further creating and enhancing a vibrant and robust downtown.

In conjunction with the workforce and development impacts, U.S. Bank Stadium immediately began securing national and international events that will bring immeasurable exposure and significant return for Minnesota, including the 2016 International Champions Cup, the 2018 Super Bowl, and the 2019 NCAA Final Four.

From a design perspective, the innovative stadium boasts unique features to any venue in the country, including the largest transparent ETFE roof of a sports facility in the nation, as well as five of the world's largest glass doors, ranging from 75 to 95 feet high and each 55 feet wide. The ETFE roof, combined with nearly 200,000 square feet of glass, gives fans the best of both worlds: an outdoor feel with protection from the elements.

Despite its 1.75 million square foot imprint and 66,200 capacity, the stadium's interior offers an intimate feel, putting fans closer to the action with some of the closest seats and suites in the NFL. Seven levels, including two concourses with 360-degree circulation and views into the bowl, are connected with escalators, elevators, stairs and a continuous ramp. Two of the highest quality video boards in the NFL anchor the east and west end zones and are set low to the field, making it easy for all fans to shift their eyes from the action on the field to the content on the boards.

With each design element the Vikings philosophy was clear: ensure that every fan touchpoint is a memorable one. Local food and beverage favorites, robust technology to keep fans connected, and special projects like the Vikings Voyage, the Legacy Ship and an extensive art collection will all enhance the game experience and further unify the team and its fans.

U.S. BANK STADIUM FEATURES UNIQUE DESIGN

Evoking images of ice floes colliding on frozen lakes or the jagged geology that once defined nearby St. Anthony Falls, the authentic design of U.S. Bank Stadium responds to the climate rather than works against it. While the ability to shed snow was of the utmost importance, the stadium's sharp angles and expansive amounts of glass also continue the Minneapolis-St. Paul community's trend toward progressive and modern expression.

The architects behind the design are Dallas-based HKS, who also designed Lucas Oil Stadium, home of the Indianapolis Colts, and AT&T Stadium, home of the Dallas Cowboys. Together with the Vikings and the Minnesota Sports Facilities Authority, HKS focused on three critical points: showcasing local and team heritage through state-of-the-art technology and amenities, creating an outdoor experience with protection from the Minnesota elements, and providing fans with an intimate connection to the team.

Rather than pursue a retractable roof, the design team developed a solution that gives fans the best of both worlds with the only ETFE (ethylene-tetra-fluoro-ethylene) roof on a sports facility in the United States. Comprising more than 240,000 square feet, or 60% of the roof, the transparent ETFE is designed to let light in like glass but is lighter, more economical and self-cleaning.

Adding to the outdoor feel is the 200,000 square feet of glass throughout the building, including the stadium's entire west wall. Within the 27 stories of glass are five of the world's largest doors ranging from 75 to 95 feet high and each measuring 55 feet wide. With the ability to pivot open in less than 10 minutes, the doors contribute to the overall outdoor environment by creating natural air flow.



U.S. Bank Stadium also features a strong connection to downtown Minneapolis. The stadium is integrated into the city's complex skyway system, allowing fans to access the stadium's northwest corner via the enclosed, climate-controlled walkways from nearly any point in the downtown core. A light rail station directly outside the stadium's west side serves as the connecting point for the City's Green Line and Blue Line, and a 30-foot wide pedestrian walkway extends from the light rail platform over the tracks directly to Medtronic Plaza, allowing large groups of fans to move safely to the stadium. Those connections and the stadium's urban location were major factors in the state securing Super Bowl LII in 2018 and the 2019 NCAA Final Four even prior to the building's opening.

MYSTIC LAKE'S CLUB PURPLE HIGHLIGHTS CLUB SEATING

The most unique and dynamic club at U.S. Bank Stadium, Mystic Lake's Club Purple offers not only some of the best seats in the house, but also serves as a fantasy football player's dream. Located in the northwest corner of the stadium, the club features an outdoor balcony on the exterior of the stadium that features firepits and showcases an incredible view of The Commons park and the downtown Minneapolis skyline. On the inside of the club, lounge couches, loge boxes and club seats allow fans to stay on top of the action. During breaks in the game action, fans sitting in Club Purple can receive updates on fantasy football stats and scores from around the NFL from hots located in the space. Club Purple includes all-inclusive food and beverage options from the club's open display kitchen where they can witness "celebrity chef"-style cooking. There are five other club areas throughout the stadium in addition to six different suite options for fans.

Hyundai Club - Boasting 2,800 seats, the Hyundai Club is situated between the 30-yard lines on the stadium's north side. Included in the Hyundai Club are the closest seats from the sidelines in the NFL, just 41 feet away from the game action. The club itself is located directly above the seating area. Aside from the close seats, the key feature of the Hyundai Club are the 25 high-definition televisions providing fans an unparalleled viewing experience.

Delta Sky360 Club - Located on the field level directly next to the Vikings locker room, fans sitting in the Delta Sky360 Club will have an up-close-and-personal experience with Vikings players before and after games as they will have exclusive access to the Vikings tunnel. Located between the 20-yard lines on the stadium's south side, fans will watch the game in an energetic setting behind the Vikings bench, having access to a field-level patio.

Medtronic Club - Perched in the upper half of the lower concourse, the Medtronic Club offers fans incredible views of the fields as it's located between the 30-yard lines. The Medtronic Club is the most exclusive of the six club areas at U.S. Bank Stadium with only 1,100 seats.

Buffalo Wild Wings Club and FMP Club - Located across from each other on the stadium's north and south sides, the Buffalo Wild Wings Club and FMP Club feature state of the art media that provide the image of fire and ice. The nearly 3,000 seats between the two club spaces provide fans with incredible views of the entire building.

Suites - The six suite areas that fans can choose from include Turf, Loft, Touchdown, Norseman, Valhalla and Norseman Lounge.



U.S. BANK STADIUM AWARDED MAJOR EVENTS

Prior to opening its doors, U.S. Bank Stadium was awarded two of the largest sporting events held annually in the United States - Super Bowl LII on February 4, 2018 and the 2019 NCAA Men's Final Four.

After being selected as one of three finalists to host Super Bowl LII in February 2018, the Minnesota Super Bowl Bid Committee delivered a successful presentation to all 32 NFL owners during the NFL's Spring League Meetings in Atlanta and was awarded the game on May 20, 2014. Centered on the theme, "Built for the Bold," the presentation highlighted the new, iconic and bold stadium as a centerpiece and included the many bold moves Minnesotans have made in creating a destination that is ready to host the world's biggest game.

"We are thrilled to bring the Super Bowl back to Minnesota," said Richard Davis, chief executive officer of U.S. Bank and bid committee co-chair. "We succeeded in making the best case to the NFL owners by pointing out the many strengths our region offers - a tremendous entertainment and hospitality industry, 17 Fortune 500 companies, great airports and strong connectivity with both our light rail and skyway systems, and perhaps most important, a new, iconic stadium that will be among the best in the country."

"We appreciate the collaborative effort from Minnesota's business and community leadership in putting together this winning bid," said Vikings Owner/President Mark Wilf. "It was evident to me and my brother Zygi that NFL owners were extremely impressed with everything Minnesota has to offer, and we have no doubt they will be even more excited with what the community will deliver in February 2018."

In addition to Super Bowl LII, the NCAA awarded the new stadium the 2019 Men's Final Four on November 14, 2015. This will mark the third time that the NCAA Final Four has taken place in the state of Minnesota with the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome hosting the event in 1992 and 2001.

"Strong public-private collaboration, along with an outstanding stadium design, has allowed Minnesota to already secure two of the world's largest sporting events, both of which will offer unique opportunities to showcase this region on a national and international stage," Wilf said.

The first sporting event at U.S. Bank Stadium, an international soccer match held on August 3, featured Italian power AC Milan against Premier League's Chelsea FC in the International Champions Cup.



VIKINGS EMPHASIZE STADIUM TECHNOLOGY

In order to ensure the best possible game day experience for every fan who walks through the doors of U.S. Bank Stadium, the Vikings placed an emphasis on building a wealth of technological innovations, including a mobile app that seamlessly integrates team and stadium content and makes the stadium technology easily accessible and user friendly.

"Technology was considered from the start to be a key part of the stadium design," said Vikings Vice President of Corporate and Technology Partnerships John Penhollow. "Our core premise was to make technology relevant and useful for our passionate fan base, as well as for our football and game day operations groups. We wanted to build a system that would be flexible enough to accommodate constantly changing technology for years to come."

The core of the unmatched technology begins with the local area network created and built by CenturyLink that connects the stadium's key infrastructure. The stadium also features a neutral host distributed antenna system built by Verizon, which allows all fans regardless of their carrier to have cellular access.

New Vikings Mobile App Brings Stadium Technology Into The Palm of Your Hand

To help elevate the new technology at U.S. Bank Stadium, the Vikings looked to VenueNext to develop a new mobile app that brings the stadium technology directly into fans' hands.

Designed to take fans from their home to the stadium and back, the app gives fans the ability to find their seats, as well as restrooms and concessions through turn-by-turn navigation when connected to stadium Wi-Fi. Nearly 2,000 beacons installed throughout the stadium enhance the app's wayfinding features, while the digital ticketing feature allows easier access into the building as well as complete control of tickets from anywhere. In addition to in-game Vikings content, the app connects fans with the rest of the NFL for fantasy football tracking, real-time stats and scores from other games.

Making the app unique compared to other venues is the combination of team content and stadium utility features, eliminating the need to toggle between apps. In year one, the team is exploring express pick-up, as well as in-seat ordering, from the stadium app in select areas of the stadium with the eventual goal of expanding those services to all fans.

In addition to cell service, fans can easily connect to the stadium's Wi-Fi system with 1,300 access points distributed throughout the stadium. Designed and installed by CenturyLink and AmpThink, the Wi-Fi system includes access points built into the handrails of the lower bowl seating sections to allow for enhanced connectivity for fans sitting close to the field.

Vikings fans stay connected to the action with content distributed to 2,000 high-definition televisions located throughout the stadium, including 16 video walls. With a full state-of-the-art 4k production room, U.S. Bank Stadium features 4k technology that brings sharp images to all video boards and televisions, making U.S. Bank Stadium the first NFL facility to implement a full 4k, IP-based video production system.

Two video boards located just above the main concourse anchor the east and west end zones and are purposely situated closer to the field than most stadiums to allow fans to see replays and in-game entertainment by simply shifting their eyes. Totalling more than 12,500 square feet combined, the new boards immediately stand out to fans. At 8,160 square feet, the west video board is the 10th largest in the NFL and 13 times larger than its predecessor at the Metrodome, while on the opposite end of the field, the east end zone board measures 50 feet high by 88 feet wide.

LEGACY SHIP WELCOMES FANS TO U.S. BANK STADIUM

Even before fans step inside U.S. Bank Stadium, there will be no mistaking which NFL team plays in the building, thanks to a dramatic 160-foot long Legacy Ship that sits as a cornerstone of the three-acre Medtronic Plaza on the stadium's west side.

Inspired by legendary Viking longboats, the Legacy Ship is composed of contemporary metals, stone, concrete and wood and includes landscaping and theatrical lighting. The ship's figurehead is an abstract dragon that stands 43 feet above the ground.

The highlight feature of the Legacy Ship is a 2,000-square foot curved LED video board that serves as the ship's sail and the stadium's marquee. Measuring 40 feet tall by 50 feet wide, the mast's curved shape emulates a strong wind pushing the ship forward. The ship also includes seating and stainless steel railings, along with a timeline exhibit of historical Vikings moments. Eight shields featured on the hull and measuring five feet in diameter recognize U.S. Bank Stadium's Founding Partners.

Making the Legacy Ship even more unique is the incorporation of thousands of commemorative fan bricks that occupy approximately 3,500 square feet of the ship's deck. Established in 2014, the Legacy Brick program allowed Vikings fans a chance to etch their name in history with a personalized paver, and helped fund the construction of the stadium plaza and features. The more than 14,000 fans who purchased one of three designs also received a brick and a map displaying the location of their paver on the plaza.

"The Legacy Bricks were a perfect opportunity to recognize the passionate fans who have supported this team for more than 50 years," said Vikings Owner/President Mark Wilf.

Complementing the Legacy Ship and further emphasizing the Vikings tradition on Medtronic Plaza is The Horn, an aesthetically striking sculpture consisting of two gold and purple flowing ribbons that intertwine to resemble the Gjallarhorn sounded prior to Vikings games. Paid for privately by Medtronic and located just 85 feet from the world's largest pivoting glass doors, the sculpture is more than 100 feet long, 25 feet high and 30 feet wide and weighs over 38 tons. The Horn is constructed of structural tube steel and plate steel framing, and painted metal panels; the inside surfaces of both ribbons are polished and seamless stainless steel mirrors. Embedded LED lighting will ensure the sculpture remains visible at night.



LOCAL ARTWORK ON DISPLAY IN U.S. BANK STADIUM

To honor and celebrate Minnesota's talented artists and craftsmen within U.S. Bank Stadium, the Vikings commissioned nearly 40 local artists to contribute to an extensive art collection throughout the building. Funded privately by the Vikings and the Wilf family, the collection includes 350 pieces of original work and 250 oversized photographs that reflect Vikings history and Minnesota culture.

"The team is always focused on ways to celebrate the community and our fans," said Vikings Owner/Chairman Zygi Wilf. "Soliciting and funding this collection of art from Minnesotans is another way to connect with the community in a very unique way that not only Vikings fans, but all stadium users, can enjoy. The partnership also continues the theme of utilizing Minnesotans throughout the design and construction of U.S. Bank Stadium."

Three prominent Vikings alumni – Matt Blair, Carl Eller and Jim Marshall – along with Hall of Fame Head Coach Bud Grant, contributed to the art collection.

Known as an avid photographer during and after his playing days, Blair's behind-the-scenes access and keen photographic eye led to his capturing a rare glimpse of Vikings history. His photos provide fans with a unique and poignant view into one man's career and the team for which he played. Eller's ceramic bowl sculpture representing Minnesota lakes and molded to give the effect of water and motion, pay homage to the Land of 10,000 Lakes, while Marshall's recreation of the "Silver Eagle," which he consistently drew on his playing gear during his 17-year Vikings career, brings fans back to the time he dominated Vikings opponents.



Along with photographs and sculptures, two wall murals span the north and south concourses of U.S. Bank Stadium. Minnesota artist Greg Gossel's pop-inspired mural on the stadium's south side represents the rich and storied history of the Vikings franchise. Titled "The Vikings are Coming!" the piece measures 17 feet tall by 85 feet high and incorporates vintage ticket stubs, game programs and other team artifacts.

The selection process of U.S. Bank Stadium's art collection began in January 2015 when nearly 1,100 artists submitted their portfolios and previous works. California-based Sports & the Arts assisted in the curation and placement process.

- 2,000** High-definition televisions that will be spread throughout the stadium, ensuring viewing capabilities for fans at all times.
- 1,300** Wi-Fi access points scattered within the stadium. "Clam shell" access points will be located within the hand rails of stadium sections connecting all fans even in the seating bowl.
- \$1.1 billion** Total cost of U.S. Bank Stadium. The Vikings contributed \$602 million -- including more than \$125 million in additional funding from the original team/private \$477 million commitment. The State of Minnesota and City of Minneapolis combined to contribute \$498 million to the project.
- 41** Feet from the sidelines to the closest seats in the house, bringing fans closer to the action than any other NFL stadium.
- 30** Months of construction from start to finish. Ground was broken on the new building on December 3, 2013, and the keys to the building were delivered from Minnesota-based Mortenson Construction on June 17, 2016, six weeks ahead of schedule.
- 272** Feet to the tallest point of the building. Standing nearly 30 stories tall, U.S. Bank Stadium peaks at the stadium's west prow.
- \$1 billion** Development in no less than 20 projects announced in the area surrounding U.S. Bank Stadium, generated since the stadium project was announced.
- 1,500** Workers on site at the peak of the construction process. Nearly 8,000 construction workers that contributed to the construction of U.S. Bank Stadium.
- 350** Pieces of commissioned artwork will be on display inside U.S. Bank Stadium, including two large murals on the north and south walls of the main concourse. In addition, 250 framed photographs will be hung throughout the new building.
- 40** Artists from the state of Minnesota were commissioned to be a part of the stadium's high-quality art collection. Included in the collection are three former players -- Matt Blair, Carl Eller and Jim Marshall -- and legendary head coach Bud Grant.
- 300** Minnesota-based companies were involved in the construction of U.S. Bank Stadium. Led by construction manager Mortenson Construction. More than 90% of the companies that had a hand in building the new stadium are based in Minnesota.
- 33** Escalators are located throughout the building, connecting fans to the seven levels of the stadium. In comparison, the Metrodome had zero escalators.
- 11** Elevators will allow fans to seamlessly transition between the seven levels of U.S. Bank Stadium.



EIGHT COMPANIES JOIN AS STADIUM FOUNDING PARTNERS

On June 15, 2015, U.S. Bank, the fifth-largest commercial bank in the United States, and the Vikings announced a 20-year partnership and introduced U.S. Bank Stadium. The announcement highlighted two prominent and storied Minnesota institutions coming together with a focus on strengthening the economic and social well-being of the state and the Minneapolis-St. Paul community.

Since the U.S. Bank Partnership, the Vikings have added the following eight Founding Partners that will help provide a superior experience for stadium users and align with the Vikings efforts to have a positive impact on the community and the state:

In an effort to minimize bottled water use at U.S. Bank Stadium, Pentair-filtered drinking water will be available at water-filling and drinking stations throughout the stadium concourses, as well as in the suites and clubs. At the stadium, a combination of Pentair's proprietary advanced filtration technologies will further enhance the taste and quality of the incoming city water.
- Polaris** Polaris' extensive offering of powersports, motorcycles, utility and work vehicles will be featured in and around U.S. Bank Stadium on Vikings game days.
- Verizon** Helping fans stay connected throughout the game, Verizon will feature branded charging stations throughout U.S. Bank Stadium. The neutral host distributed antenna system in the stadium ensures all building users have cell phone capabilities.

There have been many changes on and off the field for the Minnesota Vikings since the team's inception, but the organization's steadfast commitment to children has always remained the same.

In light of the organization's commitment to community, the Vikings Children's Fund (VCF) was established in 1978 and has since raised over \$10 million to give back to those in need. The VCF is a means for Vikings players, coaches, alumni, cheerleaders, staff and their families to focus their community support to help children.

The VCF distributes grants to health, education and family services organizations benefiting children.

In 2015 the VCF provided nearly 80 grants to nonprofit organizations and has donated more than \$5 million to support the University of Minnesota Department of Pediatrics, which boasts highly-skilled pediatricians and excels in break-through research.

ZYGI WILF

OWNER/CHAIRMAN

Zygi Wilf enters his 12th season as an owner of the Minnesota Vikings in 2016. The Wilf family has transformed the organization since the onset of purchasing the club in 2005. Zygi and his brother Mark's continued focus has been on creating a world class organization that can consistently win and sustain success while providing the best fan engagement experiences in the NFL and making a positive impact on the Minneapolis/St. Paul community and the State of Minnesota.

One of the most significant developments in their history is the new state-of-the-art U.S. Bank Stadium that was completed and opened in July 2016. As the largest construction project in state history, the new stadium employed nearly 8,000 construction workers and already has had a significant economic impact on the region, sparking nearly 20 development projects and serving as a multi-use facility capable of hosting more events than any stadium in the country. Under Zygi's stewardship, the franchise delivered a historic public-private partnership to build the multi-use stadium that will serve as the centerpiece of an economic development package for the state and region and a transformation of East Town. Since passing legislation in 2012 that included a \$477 million team/private contribution, the Wilfs have since guaranteed an additional \$125 million toward the project as they remain committed to investing in the state's economy and dedicated to providing a world-class showcase for Minnesota's sporting future.

Another of their most compelling achievements came on the heels of the December 2013 new stadium ground breaking, as Minnesota defeated New Orleans and Indianapolis in a bid to bring Super Bowl LII to the new stadium in February 2018. Wilf served as Honorary Co-Chair of the Minnesota Super Bowl Bid Committee and led a determined campaign focusing on conversations with NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell and other NFL owners and creating terrific collaboration with Minneapolis business and civic leaders in their efforts. The result was Minnesota being named host of Super Bowl LII on February 4, 2018, over the other finalists – New Orleans and Indianapolis. Minnesota will host the event for the second time, the previous being Super Bowl XXVI on January 26, 1992, and Wilf continues to serve as Honorary Co-Chair of the Minnesota Super Bowl

Host Committee.

The team has continued to pave a path critical to their core values, enhancing their already strong reputation as an NFL leader in community relations activities. Zygi and the Vikings fully embrace what the Vikings mean to the fabric of the Minneapolis/St. Paul region and are heavily involved in business and civic endeavors and have a particular dedication to children's health issues. In February 2015, Zygi and his brother Mark donated \$5 million to the University of Minnesota to create the Wilf Family Center. The Center, designed to be the intellectual center of children's health care in the Midwest, will have an impact extending far beyond the region's borders.

In addition, Mark and Zygi and the Wilf Family Foundation have provided significant grants and donations to numerous charitable causes throughout the state of Minnesota and have also made a positive impact through their donations around the world.

Zygi and Mark lead an ownership group that closely mirrors the structure by which they have led their business ventures with Garden Homes Development, a nationwide leader in retail, commercial and private residential development. Joining Zygi in the Vikings venture are his brother, Mark, cousin, Leonard, son, Jonathan, and nephew, Jeffrey, along with associates from outside the family.

The journey for Wilf from avid New York Giants fan sitting in the bleachers of Yankee Stadium in the 1960s to taking over the leadership of one of the NFL's proudest franchises has been marked by bold and well-founded business decisions, commitment to family and employees, and dedication to community. Wilf was recognized in 2013 with the Fritz Pollard Alliance's Tank Younger Award in honor of his commitment to hiring and promoting minority candidates on the football and business side of the Vikings franchise.

Wilf, the son of Joseph and Elizabeth Wilf, emigrated with his parents from Europe to the United States in the early 1950s and settled in New Jersey. He attended nearby Fairleigh Dickinson University, earning a bachelor's degree in economics and later graduated from New York Law School in Manhattan. Wilf, and wife, Audrey, have four children.

MARK WILF

OWNER/PRESIDENT

Heading into his 12th season of ownership in 2016, Vikings Owner/President Mark Wilf has led a transformation of the Minnesota Vikings organization. Wilf, along with his brother Zygi, oversees the management and strategic planning of every department within the Vikings. Most recently, Wilf led two of the most significant initiatives in the team's history with the completion of U.S. Bank Stadium and the successful bid to bring Super Bowl LII to Minnesota, both creating a significant impact on the community and state.

The Wilfs have dedicated their focus to three primary areas since taking ownership of the Vikings in 2005: building a winning football team and bringing a Championship to Minnesota, providing the best game day experience possible for Vikings fans, and positively impacting the Minneapolis-St. Paul community and the entire state of Minnesota. The Vikings have made strides in all facets, including establishing what will be one of the best game day experiences in the NFL following the construction of a state-of-the-art, multi-use U.S. Bank Stadium in downtown Minneapolis. The stadium, which gained state approval in May 2012, opened in July 2016 and gives Vikings fans one of the most premiere stadiums in the world in which they can continue the proud tradition of an imposing home-field advantage.

As the largest construction project in state history, the new stadium created thousands of jobs and has had a significant economic impact on the region, both during construction and as a multi-use facility capable of hosting more events than any stadium in the country.

Prior to the stadium's opening, the facility has already secured two of the world's marquee sporting events – the Super Bowl and the NCAA Final Four. Wilf served as Honorary Co-Chair of the Minnesota Super Bowl Bid Committee and spearheaded conversations with NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell and other NFL owners which led to Minnesota being named host of Super Bowl LII in February 2018. Minnesota will host the event for only the second time, the previous being Super Bowl XXVI on January 26, 1992. Wilf now serves as Honorary Co-Chair of the Minnesota Super Bowl Host Committee.

Wilf embraces his role as a steward of the franchise and understands that the Vikings have been a valuable part of the fabric of life in the region since 1961. Philanthropy has been ingrained in the Wilf family for generations and Mark and Zygi have brought that same commitment and involvement to Minnesota, with a particular dedication to children's health, most notably with their recent \$5 million donation to

the University of Minnesota Masonic Children's Hospital to create the Wilf Family Center. The Center is designed to be the intellectual center of children's health care in the Midwest, with impact extending far beyond the region's borders.

In addition, Mark and Zygi and the Wilf Family Foundation have provided significant and impactful grants and donations to numerous charitable causes throughout the state of Minnesota. Under the Wilfs, the Vikings have implemented multiple community initiatives, including the Annual Playground Build in a neighborhood of need and the Second Harvest Heartland Summer Lunch Program, which has helped supply more than two million meals to underserved children during the summer months. Mark created the Annual Playground Build and it has become a tremendous Vikings tradition. The Wilfs have actively encouraged every player on the roster to take part in team community service events and in nine of the 10 previous seasons, all 53 players have participated in Vikings community outreach.

A longtime supporter of the Jewish community, Mark and his family are among the largest financial supporters of Yad Vashem, the Holocaust memorial museum in Israel. Mark has previously served as the National Campaign Chairman for the Jewish Federations of North America (JFNA) and was recently appointed by JFNA to lead a new initiative that addresses the needs of impoverished Holocaust survivors living in the United States.

Throughout their professional lives, the Wilfs have worked tirelessly to treat everyone associated with their businesses as members of the family. That structure has led to national prominence in their business ventures with Garden Homes Development, a nationwide leader in retail, commercial and private residential development, and has been prominent in their ownership of the Vikings.

Mark earned his bachelor's degree from Princeton University, where he served as the radio voice of Princeton Tigers football and basketball. He later graduated from the New York University School of Law before becoming a principal in the family business. Mark currently serves on several boards, including Vanderbilt University, the NYU School of Law and Princeton Varsity Club. He also serves on the NFL's Business Ventures Committee.

Mark and his wife Jane, who is also heavily involved in philanthropic activities, have four children.

Wilf and his wife, Beth, have four children and are active members of the community through the Metropolitan Museum of Art, Central Park Conservancy and Metropolitan Opera. Wilf was appointed by President Clinton to the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Council in January 1997 and spearheaded the construction of the Metrowest Campus of UJA-Federation in East Hanover, NJ. He and his family reside in New York City.





Rick Spielman enters his 5th season as General Manager of the club and 10th overall with the Vikings in 2016, the 26th season he has worked in the NFL.

The 2016 season will be a monumental one in Vikings history as the club enters the new state-of-the-art U.S. Bank Stadium and is coming off a successful 2015 campaign boasting a roster of young, talented core players.

Spielman joined the Vikings as Vice President of Player Personnel on May 30, 2006 and directed scouting, free agency and draft preparations for the club before taking on General Manager duties for 2012. Spielman has climbed the ranks of NFL personnel departments with Detroit, Chicago and Miami prior to joining the Vikings. Spielman's tenure with all 3 franchises has been highlighted by drafting impact players throughout the seven rounds and making key trades and free agency acquisitions. Spielman's teams have won 6 divisional titles and advanced to the playoffs 10 times.

The Vikings have drafted players who have made immediate impacts on the club under Spielman's direction. The team has used 12 picks in the 1st round since Spielman joined the club to select Adrian Peterson (2007), Percy Harvin (2009), Christian Ponder (2011), Matt Kalil (2012), Harrison Smith (2012), Sharif Floyd (2013), Xavier Rhodes (2013), Cordarrelle Patterson (2013), Anthony Barr (2014), Teddy Bridgewater (2014), Trae Waynes (2015) and Laquan Treadwell (2016). Of those drafted from 2007-15, all 11 were starters in their rookie seasons, 7 were All-Rookie selections, 4 were Pro Bowlers as rookies, Peterson and Harvin were each named Associated Press Offensive Rookie of the Year and Patterson was a 1st-Team Associated Press All-Pro, only the 2nd rookie position player in team history to achieve the honor, joining Randy Moss in 1998. Rookie K Blair Walsh in 2012 joined Moss and Patterson as the only rookie All-Pro selections in team history. Under Spielman's drafting, a total of 13 Vikings have earned All-Rookie honors, highlighted in 2015 by 3 players earning All-Rookie honors- LB Eric Kendricks (2nd round draft pick), DE Danielle Hunter (3rd round) and WR Stefon Diggs (5th round).

Since Spielman began directing the Vikings drafts and personnel from 2007-15, the Vikings drafted 11 players (Peterson, Rice, Harvin, Rudolph, Walsh, Kalil, Patterson, Griffen, Smith, Barr, Bridgewater), signed 2 as free agents (Brett Favre, Jerome Felton) and acquired 1 in trade (Jared Allen) who have gone on to earn Pro Bowl honors.

The Vikings have had multiple 1st-round picks in 2012, '13 and '14, the 1st time in team history to achieve the feat and the Vikings 7 selections in the 1st round is the most in the NFL over that 3-year span, ahead of Cleveland and St. Louis with 5 each. In 2013, the Vikings had 3 picks in the 1st round for only the 2nd time in team history, and became the 1st NFL team with 3 picks in the 1st round since 2001.

In 2015, the Vikings took the NFC North title away from 4-time defending champion Green Bay on their home field in the regular season finale, posting an 11-5 mark and hosting a Wild Card playoff game against Seattle. The Division title was the 1st in Minnesota since 2009 and the team got big contributions from the rookie class. Kendricks became the 1st rookie to lead the team in tackles since the inaugural season in 1961 and Diggs became the 1st rookie to lead the team in receptions. Barr, Bridgewater, Griffen, Peterson, and Smith earned Pro Bowl honors in 2015.

The 2014 Vikings had rookie 1st-rounders Barr and Bridgewater both earn Player of the Week accolades and Bridgewater was named the QB of the All-Rookie team by PFWA and voted by fans as the Pepsi Rookie of the Year. Griffen

led the team with 12.0 sacks and earned NFC Defensive Player of the Month honors in September. In his 1st season on the 53-man roster, former practice squad WR Adam Thielen was a key special teams contributor and emerged on offense late in the season. Thielen was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week against Carolina after blocking a punt and returning it for a TD. Barr was tabbed as NFC Defensive Player of the Week at Tampa Bay when he returned a FR for a TD on the 1st play of OT for the win. Bridgewater twice earned Pepsi Rookie of the Week, vs. Atlanta in his 1st career start and vs. Carolina.

In 2013, Patterson re-wrote the Vikings and NFL record books and showcased his unique play-making ability. He tied an NFL record for the longest play in league history and notched the longest KO return in NFL history with a 109-yard score vs. Green Bay (10/27/13).

The 2012 Vikings relied heavily on contributions from the rookie class and newly-acquired free agents. Rookie 6th-rounder Blair Walsh kicked his way into the club and NFL record books en route to All-Pro, Pro Bowl and All-Rookie honors, setting an NFL record by hitting 10 FGs of 50+ yards and broke the Vikings rookie scoring record with 141 points. Peterson ran for 2,097 yards to finish 9 yards shy of the NFL single-season record.

In 2008 the Vikings engineered a pre-draft trade to land Allen from Kansas City, who has earned All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors in 2008 and 2009. The club signed Favre as a free agent entering 2009 and the veteran QB directed one of the most exciting seasons in team history and set career-bests in several offensive categories. The 2009 Vikings boasted an NFL-best 10 players who earned Pro Bowl honors.

Spielman began his NFL career as a scout with Detroit in 1990 and worked with the club in college scouting for 5 seasons before adding pro scouting duties in 1995 and '96. He moved to Director of Pro Personnel for the Bears from 1997-99 before joining the Dolphins in 2000 as Vice President of Player Personnel. He was promoted in 2002 to Senior Vice President-Football Operations/Player Personnel and eventually General Manager in 2004. Spielman left the Dolphins during the 2005 off-season and worked with ESPN as an NFL analyst before joining the Vikings. While with Miami for 5 seasons, the team had a winning record 4 times, won the AFC East in 2000 and went to the playoffs in 2000 and 2001 but missed the playoffs in 2002 and 2003 despite 9-7 and 10-6 records respectively.

Spielman got his first taste of NFL personnel analysis as a college scout with Detroit from 1990-94 and added pro scouting responsibilities for his final 2 seasons (1995-96) in the Motor City. The Lions enjoyed one of the finest stretches in franchise history in the early 1990s, winning a pair of NFC Central titles in 1991 and 1993 and the team advanced to the playoffs in 1991, '93, '94 and '95. The 1991 team set a franchise record with a 12-4 regular season mark, hosted and won a playoff game for the first time since 1957 and advanced to the NFC Championship Game against Washington, losing out on the chance to play in Super Bowl XXVI at the Metrodome.

Following Spielman's playing career at Southern Illinois from 1983-86 he was invited to training camp with the San Diego Chargers (1987) and Lions (1988). His younger brother, Chris, was a Pro Bowl LB who played 11 NFL seasons with Detroit (1988-95) and Buffalo (1996-98).

Spielman has a bachelor's degree from Southern Illinois and a master's from Ohio State. He and his wife, Michele, have been active with children's charities. The couple has adopted six children, Juan, Luis, Ronnie, J.D., Omie and Whitney.



KEVIN WARREN

CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER

Kevin Warren was named Chief Operating Officer of the Minnesota Vikings on February 12, 2015. Warren's extensive experience in all business facets of the organization create the perfect foundation for him to lead the business operations of the organization. Warren will continue to create strategic efforts for all departments and, along with Mark Wilf and Zygi Wilf, set the strategic vision for the business components of the franchise. Warren enters his 18th NFL season and 12th with the Vikings in 2016.

Since being promoted to COO, Warren has continued to play a critical role in all business, legal and operational facets related to U.S. Bank Stadium. Warren has been involved in every aspect of the design, construction, business, legal and operational components of the new stadium. Warren has also played a key role in the design, development and planning of the new Minnesota Vikings headquarters in Eagan.

Under Warren's vision and leadership, the Vikings restructured the organization, hiring or promoting 10 employees to Vice President, 3 of which are women, specifically focusing on creating departmental synergies and collaboration, improving communication, developing leadership initiatives, implementing a platform focusing on women's initiatives and building a world-class franchise focused on the tenants of hard work, ethics, community service and a "best-in-class" mentality.

Warren is the highest-ranking African-American executive working on the business side for a team in the NFL and is the first African-American COO in NFL history. In September of 2013, Warren's reputation and NFL experience were recognized when he was named a member of the NFL Committee on Workplace Diversity, which is committed to enhancing and promoting diversity at every level of the NFL.

Prior to joining the Vikings, Warren worked with the international law firm of Greenberg Traurig from 2003-05. He spent 2001-03 with the Detroit Lions as Senior Vice President of Business Operations & General Counsel.

Before joining the NFC North, Warren worked from 1997-2001 with the St. Louis Rams and was with the organization when they won Super Bowl XXXIV. During his tenure with St. Louis, Warren served as Vice President of Football Administration in 2001 after working as Vice President of Player Programs & Football Legal Counsel from 1997-2000.

Warren's first exposure to sports law came after he graduated from Notre Dame Law school. He worked at a law firm that specialized in representing universities charged with NCAA violations. Warren also later worked as a sports and entertainment attorney/agent, representing various professional athletes, entertainers and broadcasters as the founder of Kevin Warren and Associates.

As a freshman on the University of Pennsylvania basketball team, Warren was a member of the Quakers' Ivy League championship team in 1982. A native of Tempe, AZ, Warren subsequently enrolled at Grand Canyon University in Phoenix, where he earned his undergraduate degree. While at Grand Canyon, he excelled both in the classroom and on the basketball court. Warren scored 1,118 points during his career at Grand Canyon and earned GTE/CoSida Academic All-America honors as a senior along with NAIA Academic All-America honors and NAIA District 7 Basketball Team honors as both a junior and senior. In March 2012, Warren was inducted into the Grand Canyon University Athletics Hall of Fame, the 16th individual inducted and only the 5th basketball player to earn the prestigious honor in the University's history.

Warren earned his bachelor's in business administration from Grand Canyon University in 1986, his MBA from Arizona State University in 1988, and his Juris Doctorate degree

from the University of Notre Dame School of Law in 1990. Warren is a licensed attorney with the State Bar of Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota (House Counsel-Rule 10), and the District of Columbia.

Several members of Warren's family have helped fuel his life-long passion for sports, including his father, the late Dr. Morrison Warren, Sr., who played professional football for the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1948 during the era of the All-American Football Conference, before the league was merged with the NFL. The senior Warren would go on to be the first African-American President of a major college bowl game when he was named President of the 1982 Fiesta Bowl Board of Directors and was recently named one of Arizona State University's 50 Greatest Football Players. Warren's oldest brother, Morrison, Jr., was one of the first African-American scholarship athletes at Stanford, playing football for the Cardinal in the early 1960s, before a severe knee injury cut short his promising athletic career.

Philanthropy is an integral part of Warren's life and he and his wife Greta are active members of the Minneapolis-St. Paul community. In December 2014, Kevin and Greta created Carolyn's Comforts in conjunction with the University of Minnesota Masonic Children's Hospital and are donating \$1 million to honor the legacy of his sister Carolyn Elaine Warren-Knox who passed away of brain cancer in October of 2014. Since the inception of Carolyn's Comforts, nearly 100 financial grants have been made to families in need.

In 2012, the Warren family "adopted" Lucy Craft Laney Community School in Minneapolis, which is predominantly African-American and has 98% of its student population coming from underserved communities. Over the past four years, the family has donated nearly 3,000 backpacks filled with school supplies for the entire school year to every student. In addition to the backpacks and school supplies, the family has also purchased basketball uniforms for both the boys and girls basketball teams, school uniforms for some individual students and donate their time mentoring students at Lucy Laney.

Warren places a priority on civic leadership and engagement, serving on several boards throughout the Twin Cities and has been recognized for his leadership in the business and charitable community. Twin Cities Business Journal has honored Warren with the Corporate Counsel Award for Private Company-Large in 2015 and in 2006 as a Minority Business Leader. Warren has been recognized four times with the Vikings by the Fritz Pollard Alliance with their Salute to Excellence Award. His professional associations include serving on the Super Bowl LII Host Committee and the Board of Directors of Grand Canyon Education, Inc. (NASDAQ: LOPE). He is a member of the Notre Dame Law School Advisory Council. He also serves Of Counsel at the international law firm of Norton Rose Fulbright. In March 2016, Warren was asked by President Eric Kaler to serve as a member of the selection committee to hire the next Athletic Director at the University of Minnesota. His civic roles include being on the General Board of the YMCA of the Twin Cities, the Page Education Foundation and the University of Minnesota's Medical Foundation Board of Directors along with the UofM's Medicine and Health Board of Overseers. Warren is a Life Member of the Fiesta Bowl Board of Directors.

Warren and his wife, Greta, who holds a bachelor's degree from Kansas State University, have a daughter, Peri, a student-athlete at Occidental College, and a son, Powers, a student-athlete at Minnetonka High School. The Warren family resides in Chanhassen, MN.



LESTER BAGLEY

EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT- PUBLIC AFFAIRS AND STADIUM DEVELOPMENT

Lester Bagley brings three decades of public affairs and communications experience to his role as the Vikings Executive Vice President of Public Affairs and Stadium Development. Currently in his 12th year with the Vikings, Bagley oversees the team's public relations, public affairs, community relations and charitable giving initiatives.

The Vikings and sports fans throughout the Upper Midwest will embark on a thrilling new chapter in 2016 as state-of-the-art U.S. Bank Stadium opens and ushers in a new era for Vikings football. The striking addition of U.S. Bank Stadium to the Minneapolis skyline will vault the community to center stage for marquee events from international soccer and blockbuster concerts to Super Bowl LII and the NCAA Final Four. An outstanding fan experience awaits at U.S. Bank Stadium with best-in-class amenities and cutting-edge technology that place the facility with the best in the world. Fans will be treated to the closest seats to the action in the NFL, unrivaled food and drink offerings and a wide variety of seat and suite options that connect fans to the heartbeat of the Vikings.

Bagley was instrumental in securing the support and financing that brought the new stadium to fruition. The \$1.1 billion facility, the largest construction project in Minnesota history, has been enhanced through an additional \$125 million of Vikings ownership investment since the initial building began, bringing the total team/private investment to over \$600 million. Bagley spearheaded the public discussion and advocacy for the stadium during difficult political and economic conditions to secure the agreement to finance and construct the new stadium. On May 10, 2012, the Minnesota House and Senate passed stadium legislation that was significantly impacted by the coalition of elected officials, sports fans and business, labor and community leaders that Bagley led. Four days later Governor Mark Dayton signed the bill into law. Bagley was honored alongside Governor Dayton and stadium bill authors Senator Julie Rosen and Representative Morrie Lanning with the "Public Policy Achievement" award as part of Minnesota's Leaders in Public Policy 2012. Following passage of the stadium bill, Bagley was part of the Vikings leadership team that designed and built this progressive architectural marvel.

In 2014, Bagley led the Vikings involvement to secure Super Bowl LII to be played February 4, 2018 at U.S. Bank Stadium. Bagley worked with Vikings ownership and management, and Minnesota corporate and civic leaders to create the Super Bowl

bid and secure the support of the NFL for the pinnacle event to be held in Minnesota. Bagley currently serves on the Minnesota Super Bowl Host Committee's Executive Board with Richard Davis/U.S. Bank, Doug Baker/Ecolab, Marilyn Carlson Nelson/Carlson, Michael Langley/GreaterMSP, and Maureen Bausch, CEO of the Minnesota Super Bowl Host Committee.

Bagley's role on the Vikings management team and working relationship with the Wilf family ownership group includes the next facility project on the club's horizon, planning and designing the new Vikings headquarters in Eagan, MN that gained approval from the Eagan City Council on June 21, 2016. The new home for the team will bring the entire organization under one roof and accentuate Ownership's desire to build a first-class atmosphere in pursuit of World Championships.

In addition to leading Vikings communications and community relations, Bagley oversees the Vikings Children's Fund and Youth Football Programs. The Minnesota Vikings are one of the most active and community-engaged teams in the NFL, a key tenant of the organization.

Before joining the Vikings, Bagley operated Bagley Public Affairs from 1999-2005. The Minneapolis firm specialized in issues management, public relations and public affairs. From 1993-99, Bagley served as associate director and helped lead the Minnesota Business Partnership, the public policy organization comprised of the chief executive officers of 100 of Minnesota's largest companies. He also spent five years working in public affairs and public relations in Washington D.C.

A native of Barron, WI, Bagley began college at the University of Minnesota before graduating from the University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA) with a bachelor's degree in political science. He served as a White House intern and studied at the University of Oxford during his undergraduate days.

Bagley currently sits on the Executive Board of the Minnesota Super Bowl Host Committee, and serves on the boards of the Downtown East Commons Implementation Committee, the Public Affairs Council, the Minneapolis Regional Chamber of Commerce, and the Vikings Children's Fund.

Bagley and his wife Wendy, who has a bachelor's degree from the College of St. Catherine, reside in Minneapolis with their sons Michael and Charlie.



The Vikings will embark on another voyage for the 2018 season when the team moves to its new headquarters in Eagan, MN. The 200-acre parcel will house all Minnesota Vikings football and business operations under one roof. The state-of-the-art facility will replace the current Winter Park facility which was opened in 1981.



ROB BRZEZINSKI

EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT- FOOTBALL OPERATIONS

Rob Brzezinski enters his 24th season in the NFL and 18th with the Minnesota Vikings in 2016. Brzezinski provides the Vikings broad-based management expertise and the value of being one of the most experienced NFL executives in the modern (post 1992) Collective Bargaining Agreement era.

Brzezinski has been with teams that have finished .500 or better in 16 of his 23 NFL seasons and 11 playoff seasons.

The Vikings benefit from Brzezinski's extensive knowledge and strategic salary cap management and a philosophy that has aided in the retention of core players, the addition of key free agents and the overall talent and depth of the team. Brzezinski's role as lead negotiator on high-profile contracts during his career includes more than 20 first-round draft picks and landmark deals for such players as Randy Moss, Daunte Culpepper, Antoine Winfield, Steve Hutchinson, Kevin Williams, Jared Allen, Brett Favre, Adrian Peterson and Harrison Smith. Brzezinski has negotiated contracts during his career totaling more than \$1 billion.

Brzezinski joined the Vikings in 1999 as Director of Football Administration and was promoted to Vice President of Football Administration in 2001. He was elevated to his current position as Executive Vice President of Football Operations in 2014.

Prior to joining the Vikings, Brzezinski spent 6 seasons (1993-98) with Miami where he rose to Staff Counsel/Salary Cap.

Brzezinski was actively involved in the Vikings 2014 Head Coaching search and works closely with General Manager Rick Spielman and Head Coach Mike Zimmer on all football-related matters and strategic planning. Brzezinski's key responsibilities include salary cap management, negotiation of player contracts, football operations/administration and CBA compliance.

Brzezinski has extensive NFL management experience, has worked as the top football executive, and has experience in managing the business operations of an NFL franchise and, while in Minnesota, transformed a substantial salary cap deficit into a long-term competitive advantage. Brzezinski has had the privilege of working for some of the most successful and decorated head coaches in NFL history, including Don Shula, Jimmy Johnson and Dennis Green.

In 2004 Brzezinski was invited to participate in the NFL-Stanford Program for Managers at the Stanford Graduate School of Business, an NFL program to promote development of leaders within the League.

In Miami, Brzezinski assisted in managing business affairs, salary cap administration, player contract negotiations, operations and legal affairs. In his tenure, the Dolphins compiled a 55-41 regular-season record and made the playoffs four times.

Brzezinski earned degrees from Nova Southeastern University in Fort Lauderdale, a Juris Doctorate in 1995 and a Bachelor of Science in education in 1992. In addition, Brzezinski is a member of the Florida Bar. Brzezinski and his wife, Leah, who has earned a doctoral degree in education, have 5 children: Ki, Grace, Jae, Anna and Rose. The Brzezinski family, who reside in Edina, founded a school in 2014 in Minnesota dedicated to educating students who are twice exceptional and are very active in the community raising money and awareness for adoption-related causes.



STEVE LACROIX

EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT & CHIEF MARKETING OFFICER

In his 16th season with the Vikings, Steve LaCroix serves as the team's Executive Vice President & Chief Marketing Officer, a role in which he oversees all aspects of Vikings-generated revenues and marketing initiatives. He leads the team's Corporate & Technology Partnerships, Ticket Sales & Operations, Partnerships Activation & Special Projects, Corporate Development & Guest Relations, Content & Production and Marketing & Fan Development departments. LaCroix's sales and marketing team was responsible for the transition of fans, corporate partners and the Vikings game-day experience to TCF Bank Stadium located on the University of Minnesota campus over the two years prior to the new stadium's opening.

Following the passage of stadium legislation in 2012, LaCroix immediately began a significant role on the Vikings stadium team, assisting with the design and construction process. He is also directing all sales, marketing and revenue-generating initiatives for the new facility set to open in 2016, including Naming Rights, Founding Partnerships, technology solutions and brand integration opportunities as well as overseeing multiple new offerings related to season tickets, premium seating, club seats and suites located in the stadium.

As the lead negotiator for Naming Rights, LaCroix and the Vikings joined U.S. Bank to announce a 20-year partnership and introduce "U.S. Bank Stadium" on June 15, 2015. The announcement highlighted a natural partnership between two prominent and storied Minnesota institutions that have extensive histories within the state and long traditions of being significant community advocates for Minnesota. With the goal of securing a prominent, first-class Minnesota-based company, the Vikings targeted and ultimately only engaged with U.S. Bank in this endeavor. The partnership also includes a \$1,000,000 "Places to Play" program, a statewide, grant-making initiative focused on investments in the community facilities that contribute to the quality of life, including parks, playgrounds, trails and athletic facilities.

In 2014, together with Van Wagner Sports & Entertainment, the third party assisting the Vikings in the sales process, LaCroix developed and managed the opening of the New Stadium Preview Center and its adjacent downtown offices. The Preview Center, a 7,500 square-foot interactive space designed to give Vikings fans their first detailed look at the new stadium and the future game experience, is the largest ever built by an NFL team. Overlooking the stadium site, the Preview Center has hosted over

10,000 visits since its opening. LaCroix and the Vikings continue to explore all avenues to ensure the new stadium provides the premier fan experience for Vikings fans.

In his Minnesota tenure, LaCroix has led a variety of additional new initiatives, including the team's introduction of an enhanced Norseman logo and new uniforms in 2013, the second uniform change under LaCroix's leadership. The club has also brought radio and television broadcast rights in-house and started year-round weekly television and radio programming. The Vikings have had multiple full re-designs of vikings.com and opened Vikings Locker Room official retail stores across the Twin Cities. Fans have been treated to the introduction of Viktor the Viking, the official team mascot, and the Skol Line drum line. Under LaCroix, he Vikings sellout streak reached 144 games at Mall of America Field.

Also included in LaCroix's accomplishments is the launch of the Vikings Entertainment Network (VEN) in 2009. LaCroix helped take VEN to the next level with a first-class production studio at Winter Park, which was unveiled during the 2010 season and plays host to weekly TV and radio shows throughout the year. The studio is the home for Vikings-exclusive content creation for vikings.com.

LaCroix has served on the NFL Club Business Working Group comprised of eight club executives to help shape strategies for implementing league and club initiatives. LaCroix has also served for several years on the Steering Committee of the National Sports Forum, the industry's leading annual conference.

LaCroix's charitable involvement includes serving as

Treasurer of the Vikings Children's Fund, which has raised and distributed over \$10 million since 1978. LaCroix also serves on the Minnesota Super Bowl Host Committee Advisory Board, the University of Iowa Marketing Institute Board, the Minneapolis Downtown Council Board of Directors, the Board of Directors of Hunger Related Events/Taste of the NFL, a national hunger relief organization and the Minnesota chapter of Positive Coaching Alliance, a national non-profit working to transform the culture of youth sports with a mission to develop "Better Athletes, Better People."

Prior to joining the Vikings, LaCroix worked as the Director of Sponsorship Sales for Pacers Sports and Entertainment in Indianapolis, IN, from 1999-00. His main responsibilities included overseeing the corporate sales efforts for the National Basketball Association's Indiana Pacers, the WNBA's Indiana Fever and other sports and entertainment events held at Conseco Fieldhouse, for which he negotiated the naming rights deal. Conseco Fieldhouse (now renamed Bankers Life Fieldhouse) is widely considered one of the premier venues in the NBA and elevated the Pacers into the top third of the league in local revenue, despite being the NBA's fifth-smallest market. LaCroix's tenure with Pacers Sports & Entertainment began in 1991 as an intern in ticket sales.

LaCroix earned his bachelor's degree at the University of Iowa and his master's at Western Illinois University. Steve and his wife, Sue, who holds her bachelor's degree in nursing from the University of Iowa, have two children - Katie and Alex. The LaCroix family resides in Orono.



STEVE POPPEN

EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT & CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER

Currently in his 18th season with the Vikings in 2016, Steve Poppen serves as the team's Executive Vice President & Chief Financial Officer. In his role, Poppen is responsible for all financial aspects of the team, including business planning, budgeting, day-to-day financial and administrative operations, human resources, facilities, and U.S. Bank Stadium project financing.

Poppen plays a key part in the new Vikings headquarters and training facility that is underway in Eagan following City Council approval in June 2016. As a project leader on the facility, Poppen is involved daily with financing, design, construction and cooperating with city, county and regional governing bodies to keep the project on track.

For several years Poppen played a lead role in the Vikings attempts to pass new stadium legislation, an exhaustive effort that culminated with Governor Mark Dayton signing the stadium bill into law on May 14, 2012. Since the passage of stadium legislation, Poppen continues to serve on the Vikings stadium team, assisting with the design and construction process and helping negotiate the team's use agreement and development agreement, as well as other documents governing the construction and operation of the new publicly-owned facility. Poppen also oversees the Vikings efforts to finance the over \$600 million team/private commitment to the project. In 2013, he helped secure \$375 million in loans from the NFL and a bank syndicate led by U.S. Bank as part of the team contribution, a significant step forward for the stadium project.

The passage of the stadium bill not only secured the team in Minnesota but also gave Vikings fans a premier venue to watch their team beginning in the 2016 NFL season. Along with Vikings football, the multi-purpose facility has been designed to host national and international events, including NCAA basketball, a Super Bowl and concerts, as well as high school and amateur sports and other community events. Even before the stadium's doors open for the first time, Minnesota secured Super Bowl LII in February 2018 and the NCAA Final Four in 2019.

U.S. Bank Stadium promises to be an elite stadium in the

NFL. The design features for which the Vikings fought include the most fan-friendly and most technologically-advanced stadium in the League. It will provide an indoor-outdoor experience that is ideal for the Greater Minneapolis/St. Paul market. The progressive architectural design will be a signature element on the Minneapolis skyline.

A native of Watertown, SD, Poppen spent eight years as a Certified Public Accountant in the business assurance group of PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP in Kansas City before joining the Vikings. In 2006, Poppen participated in the NFL-Stanford Program for Managers at the Stanford Graduate School of Business, a program developed by the NFL to promote growth of leaders within the League. Poppen helped engineer dramatic renovations to Winter Park during the 2006 offseason that featured a total remake of the locker room and equipment facilities and an upgrade of the athletic training areas. In 2009, he joined the NFL's Green Committee to enhance environmental awareness among clubs and has been key in the Vikings Planet Purple initiatives to operate the franchise in a more Earth-friendly way.

Poppen received his bachelor's degree in accounting from Evangel University in Springfield, MO, in 1991. Poppen played football at Evangel, an NAIA member of the Heart of America Athletic Conference. Poppen is an active member of his community, Poppen served on the board of Minnesota Adult and Teen Challenge, a faith-based drug and alcohol rehabilitation program for Minnesota adults and teens, from 2002-2012. Poppen retired from the board in 2015 of the Minneapolis Downtown Council and Downtown Improvement District's Executive Committee, an organization promoting business development in downtown Minneapolis. He holds a position with the Minnesota State Fair Foundation board of directors, including serving as the chair of the Audit Committee. The State Fair Foundation was created to preserve and improve the historic Minnesota State Fair buildings and grounds and support State Fair educational, scientific and agricultural programs. Poppen also served on the Entertainment Subcommittee of the Downtown 2025 working

group of Minneapolis civic and business leaders focused on a progressive future for downtown. Poppen also serves on the board of directors of Kansas City-based M3Sixty Administration LLC, a business that provides fund accounting, fund administration and transfer agent services to the mutual fund industry.

Poppen and his wife, Christy, who holds a bachelor's degree in elementary education from Evangel, have four children – Natalie, Andrew, Nathan and Avery. The Poppen family resides in Chanhassen.

Jonathan Wilf is in his 11th season as a member of the Vikings ownership group and his 3rd as the team's Executive Vice President - Strategic Planning and Business Initiatives. In his vice president position, Wilf serves on the Vikings management team and plays a leadership role in developing revenue-generating initiatives for the organization as well as enhancing and expanding technology applications within the Vikings and at U.S. Bank Stadium. Wilf serves on the new stadium development team and with the planning of the new team headquarters in Eagan.

In addition to his leadership role with the Vikings, Wilf is a partner in Garden Homes, the family-owned, nationwide leader

in retail, commercial and private residential development based in Short Hills, N.J. He holds an engineering degree from the University of Pennsylvania, where he studied computer science, and a J.D. from the Benjamin N. Cardozo School of Law of Yeshiva University. Wilf is actively engaged in philanthropy as a trustee of the Wilf Family Foundations and has a passion for supporting causes that involve children and education. A lifelong sports fan, Wilf enjoys skiing, hiking and golfing. He resides in New Jersey with his wife, Rachel, son, Miles and daughter, Claire.

PART OF THE FABRIC OF MINNESOTA SINCE 1961

The following excerpt explains the early stages of the Vikings franchise as chronicled in the Minnesota Vikings 1961 Press, Radio, TV Guide:

Twin Cities football enthusiasts began their quest for professional football some 12 years ago, and it was on January 28, 1960, that their efforts were culminated with the announcement – from Miami, Florida, where the National Football League owners were in session – that Minnesota was being granted a franchise for 1961. At the same meeting, Dallas was accepted to start play in 1960.

The franchise was granted just ten days after E. William Boyer, president of the Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce, had made an official presentation to the league on behalf of statewide Minnesota interests.

Besides Boyer in the founding group were: Max Winter, promoter and restaurateur, H.P. Skoglund, president of North American Life and Casualty Company; Ole Haugrud, Duluth businessman, and the Northwest Publications, Inc., publishers of the St. Paul Dispatch and Pioneer Press, through its president, Bernard H. Ridder, Jr.

They decided to start with an original outlay of one million dollars, of which the Minneapolis sources would put up \$600,000; St. Paul \$300,000 and Duluth, representing the rest of the state, \$100,000.

Upon acquiring a franchise, the group hired Joe Thomas, former scout with the Los Angeles Rams, to scout the country in preparation for the 1961 draft meeting, and went on a nationwide search to find a general manager. This ended with the selection of Bert E. Rose, who was at the time the public relations director for the Rams. From September, 1960, when Rose reported, until July, 1961, such details as hiring a coaching and front-office staff, contracting for radio and television, establishing a ticket operation, drafting, selecting and signing players, and many more, have - or will be - accomplished in order to put the Vikings on the field in 1961.



The Vikings arrival in Minnesota in 1961 was greeted with excitement from the sports and business community. The Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce welcomed members of the club as they prepared to take the field for the first time.

Mike Zimmer enters his 3rd season as Vikings Head Coach in 2016 with a team gaining confidence and a roster full of young talent hungry to build on the foundation that begun in 2014. The team moves into state-of-the-art U.S. Bank Stadium poised for sustained success.

Zimmer was hired as the 9th head coach in Vikings history on Jan. 15, 2014. A veteran defensive coordinator, Zimmer enters his 23rd season on an NFL sideline in 2016.

In his 2nd season leading the Vikings in 2015, Zimmer piloted the club to an NFC North title and a Wild Card Playoff berth. The team played clean, smart football down the stretch and won 3 in a row to end the regular season, capturing the division crown at Green Bay and taking the title from the 4-time defending NFC North champs. The Vikings 11-5 mark tied for the 2nd-best record since 2000, gave the Vikings their 1st North crown since 2009, and the club gained valuable playoff experience. Minnesota was the least-penalized team in the NFL with 88 and lowest penalized offense in the NFL, with only 30 on the season.

The 2015 Vikings earned their success with a strong running game and stingy defense. Adrian Peterson led the NFL in rushing for the 3rd time in his career en route to 1st-Team All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors. Teddy Bridgewater continued to grow in his role as a playmaker and engineering the offense, improving throughout his 2nd pro season. The defense improved to #13 in total defense, jumping from the #25 rush defense to #17. The Vikings defense ranked 5th in the NFL by allowing only 18.9 points per game. It marked the 4th time in the past 5 seasons a Zimmer defense ranked in the top 5 in NFL points allowed.

The Vikings rookies made strong contributions for the 2nd straight season. The club was led in tackles by rookie LB Eric Kendricks and in receiving by WR Stefan Diggs. Rookie DE Danielle Hunter ranked 2nd on the team in sacks, and the team tied a franchise record by having 6 rookies start in a game, at Arizona.

The 2014 Vikings turned to Bridgewater to start 12 games of his rookie season, and he responded with a 6-6 record, going 3-2 in his final 5 starts, and set virtually every franchise record for a rookie QB. Defensively, the 2014 Vikings improved from #31 in total defense to #14 in the NFL with a new lineup. The Vikings #7 ranking in the NFL in passing defense was the highest finish since the 1993 season when the club was #6. The Vikings had a 113-point improvement in offensive points allowed from 2013 to 2014, the biggest improvement in the NFL in that span.

In his NFL tenure, Zimmer has been a part of 12 playoff teams and teams that have won 8 Division titles. He coached the Cowboys DBs when Dallas won Super Bowl XXX over Pittsburgh after the 1995 season. From 2009-13, Zimmer's Bengals defenses ranked in the NFL's top 10 in total defense 4 times, climbing to #3 in 2013. From 2011-13, the Bengals ranked #2 in the NFL with 139 sacks (46.3 per season) and allowed 18.8 points per game, ranking #4 in the NFL in points allowed. The 2013 Bengals posted 20 INTs, the 5th-best mark in the NFL.

Zimmer's arrival in Cincinnati for the 2008 season signaled a franchise turnaround on the defensive side of the ball. The Bengals notched top-10 defensive rankings in 2009, '11, '12 and '13 after only cracking the NFL's top 10 once in 18 seasons prior to Zimmer joining the team. During his tenure, Zimmer coached

Geno Atkins as he became one of the top DTs in the NFL, earning consensus All-Pro honors in 2012 and Pro Bowl berths in 2011 and 2012. In 2013, LB Vontaze Burfict continued his rise from an undrafted rookie free agent in 2012 to a Pro Bowler in 2013. Atkins became the 1st Bengals defensive lineman since Tim Krumrie in 1988 to earn a Pro Bowl trip, and Burfict was the 1st Bengals LB to be honored since Jim LeClair in 1976. Over the 2012 and 2013 seasons, the Bengals had 4 different players earn AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors - Michael Johnson, Carlos Dunlap, Atkins and Burfict.

Zimmer led top-10 defenses for Dallas in both a 4-3 and 3-4 scheme. The 2003 Cowboys defense ranked #1 in the NFL with only 253.3 yards per game allowed. During Zimmer's tenure in Dallas as DBs coach (1994-99) and defensive coordinator (2000-06) the team ranked in the top 5 of NFL scoring defense a total of 6 times. The 1995 Cowboys hoisted the Lombardi Trophy in Super Bowl XXX with a win over Pittsburgh, and one of Zimmer's pupils, CB Larry Brown, won the Super Bowl MVP award with a pair of INTs in the game. Brown is 1 of only 3 DBs to earn Super Bowl MVP honors in the history of the game.

Before moving to the NFL ranks, Zimmer spent 15 seasons coaching at the collegiate level. He spent his final 5 seasons in the college ranks as defensive coordinator at Washington State from 1989-93. Zimmer was at Weber State from 1981-88, serving as defensive coordinator from '83-88. He entered the profession at Missouri as an assistant from 1979-80.

Zimmer played QB and later LB at Illinois State, earning a degree in physical education. He has 3 children - son, Adam, and daughters, Corri and Marki. Adam is coaching the Vikings LBs after having spent time with Kansas City, New Orleans and Cincinnati as an assistant LBs and DBs coach. The father and son have each both earned Super Bowl titles with Adam's coming after the 2009 season when the Saints won Super Bowl XLIV over Indianapolis. Coaching is a family tradition with the Zimmer as Mike's father, Bill, earned Illinois Hall of Fame honors as a prep football and wrestling coach. Zimmer played football, baseball and wrestled at Lockport Township High School in suburban Chicago. Both Bill and Mike Zimmer have been inducted into the Lockport Hall of Fame, and Bill is also in the Bradley University (Peoria, IL) and Illinois High School Halls of Fame.

Vikki Zimmer, Mike's wife of 27 years, passed away in Cincinnati on Oct. 8, 2009. The Pro Football Writers of America recognized Zimmer overcoming the tragedy and the Bengals #4 ranked defense playing a key role in winning the AFC North title by voting him the winner of the Halas Award for the season, an annual award presented to the individual in the NFL that overcame the most adversity to succeed.

GETTING DEFENSIVE

In his tenure as an NFL defensive coordinator, Mike Zimmer's units have ranked in the NFL's top 10 in yards allowed 7 times and have ranked in the top 10 of points allowed in the NFL 6 times. Zimmer's Dallas unit in 2003 had the NFL's #1-ranked defense in yards. In 3 seasons (2011-13), Zimmer's Bengals ranked in the top of yards and points allowed each season as the team advanced to the playoffs 3 straight times. Prior to Zimmer's arrival in Cincinnati in 2008, the Bengals defense had only cracked the NFL's top 10 during 1 season in the previous 18. The 2013 Bengals ranked #3 and #4, respectively, in yards and points in the NFL but led the AFC in both. Dallas had the #1-ranked defense in yards allowed in Zimmer's 1st season (1994) when he coached DBs and had the NFL's #1-ranked passing defense in 1994 and '97.

CLIMBING THE COACHING LADDER

**2014- Minnesota Vikings**

Mike Zimmer was named the 9th head coach in Vikings history on Jan. 15, 2014. Zimmer rebuilt the Vikings defense in his 1st 2 seasons, helping the Vikings earn their 1st NFC North Crown since 2009 during the 2015 season. The Vikings finished 11-5 during Zimmer's 2nd season as head coach and had 5 players earn Pro Bowl honors.

**2008-13 Cincinnati Bengals**

Zimmer contributed to a Bengals resurgence that helped the team make the playoffs in 4 of his 6 seasons, including three consecutive from 2011-13. The Bengals won the AFC North in 2009 and 2013. The Bengals defense ranked in the NFL's top 10 in 4 of his 6 seasons, topping at #3 in 2013.

**2007 Atlanta Falcons**

In his one season with Atlanta, Zimmer coordinated the Falcons defense and oversaw top individual performances from CB DeAngelo Hall with 5 INTs and DE John Abraham with 10.0 sacks.

**1994-06 Dallas Cowboys**

Serving as secondary coach from 1994-99 and defensive coordinator from 2000-06, Zimmer tutored some of the top defensive players in the NFL and earned a ring in Super Bowl XXX over Pittsburgh. Zimmer coached under Barry Switzer, Dave Campo, Chan Gailey and Bill Parcells, working as coordinator under Gailey and Parcells. In 2003, Zimmer led the Dallas defense to the #1 ranking in the NFL. The Cowboys advanced to the playoffs 7 times in his 13 seasons.

**1989-93 Washington State University**

Zimmer spent 5 seasons directing the defense at Washington State, following Mike Price as he moved to take over the Cougars program. In 1992 the Cougars notched a 9-3 record and won the Copper Bowl over Utah. The bowl game was the 3rd for Washington State since the 1930 season and started a run of 5 bowl berths in 10 years for the school.

**1981-88 Weber State University**

Zimmer joined the Weber State staff under Head Coach Mike Price as a position coach and was promoted to defensive coordinator after 2 seasons. While at Weber, he coached with current Vikings DL coach Andre Patterson. The 1987 squad tied for the Big Sky Conference title and advanced to the 2nd round of the Division I-AA playoffs.

**1979-80 University of Missouri**

Zimmer got his first taste of coaching at Missouri, helping the Tigers to 7-5 and 8-4 marks, respectively, and earning berths in the Hall of Fame Bowl and Liberty Bowl.



GEORGE EDWARDS

The Vikings defense under George Edwards has made steady improvements in the past 2 seasons. His ability to get production out of young players and pair schemes to play to the strengths of his personnel has the Vikings poised for a top-10 defense.

Edwards' stint with the Vikings marks his 3rd as an NFL defensive coordinator after working in Washington (2003) and Buffalo (2010-2011) in the same capacity. The 2016 season will be Edwards' 19th season in the NFL and 27th season as a coach, all spent on the defensive side of the ball.

The 2015 Vikings won the NFC North and hosted a Wild Card Playoff game, highlighted by a stingy defense that jumped to #5 in the NFL in points allowed at 18.9 after ranking #11 in 2014. For the 1st time since the inaugural season in 1961, the team was led in tackles by a rookie when LB Eric Kendricks posted 105 stops. A fellow rookie, DE Danielle Hunter, ranked 2nd on the team with 6.0 sacks, the 2nd-highest total among 2015 NFL rookies and the most by a rookie defensive lineman. The Vikings defense was honored with 3 NFC Defensive Players of the Week - DT Linval Joseph vs. St. Louis, CB Terence Newman at Oakland and Everson Griffen at Green Bay. Kendricks and Hunter were each named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team.

Inheriting the defense that allowed the most points per game and 2nd-most yards per game in 2013, Edwards helped turn the Vikings defense around in 2014, his 1st season as defensive coordinator. With the help of rookie LB Anthony Barr, 1st-year starter Griffen and S Harrison Smith, the Vikings had the NFL's most-improved defense in 2014, allowing 71 fewer offensive points per game in 2014 than in 2013. With a revamped defense that included 8 new starters, Edwards helped numerous Vikings have breakout seasons. Griffen, in his 1st year starting, recorded a career-best 12.0 sacks. Griffen was named the NFC Defensive Player of the Month in October 2014 after recording 6.0 sacks and a forced fumble in a 4-game span. Smith led the Vikings defense with 5 interceptions and was the only player in the NFL with 3+ interceptions and 3.0+ sacks. Edwards played an instrumental role in the development of Barr, a rookie 1st-round pick (#9 overall). Before missing the final 4 games with a knee injury, Barr recorded 99 tackles, 3.0 sacks, 2 FR and 3 FFs. Barr was named the NFC Defensive Player of the Week in Week 8 after forcing and recovering a fumble in DT and returning it for a TD. Free agent pickup DT Tom Johnson notched a career-high 6.5 sacks as he found a home on the Vikings line after a journeyman career.

Edwards returned to Miami for his 2nd stint as LBs coach for the 2012 and 2013 seasons. In both seasons, Edwards led 2 starting LBs with at least 100+ tackles. In 2013, newcomers Philip Wheeler (118) and Dannell Ellerbe (101) finished 1st and 3rd on the team in tackles, respectively. Karlos Dansby (133) led the team in 2012 with Kevin Burnett (110) finishing 2nd in team tackles. The Dolphins rush defense ranked 13th in the NFL in 2012.

Edwards served as Defensive Coordinator with the Buffalo Bills in 2010 and 2011. While with the Bills, Edwards led a base 3-4 defense; however, the unit was flexible and played out of multiple fronts throughout his tenure. During his time with the Bills, defensive tackle Kyle Williams emerged as a defensive presence and was named to his 1st Pro Bowl after producing

career numbers in sacks (5.5) and fumble recoveries (2) in 2010. Also under Edwards' watch in 2010, the Bills' pass defense allowed an average of 192.0 passing yards per game to rank 3rd in the AFC, while producing 9 fumble recoveries to tie for 4th in the AFC and forcing 12 fumbles to tie for 5th in the AFC.

From 2005-2009, Edwards was the LBs coach for the Miami Dolphins. His first 3 years with Miami were spent tutoring the LBs before focusing on the inside linebackers in 2008. Under Edwards, Zach Thomas was selected to the Pro Bowl following both the 2005 and '06 seasons and was named as the NFL Alumni Linebacker of the Year for the 2006 season.

Edwards spent the 2004 season as the Cleveland Browns LBs coach. Before that, Edwards was with the Washington Redskins for the 2002 and 2003 seasons. In 2003, Edwards was named the defensive coordinator for the 1st time in his career. Following the '03 season, LB LaVar Arrington and CB Champ Bailey were selected to the NFC Pro Bowl squad. In 2002, Edwards served as the Redskins' assistant defensive coordinator/LBs coach, as Arrington accounted for the most productive season of his NFL career with 107 tackles and 11 sacks and earned his 2nd consecutive Pro Bowl berth. In addition, each of the team's starting LBs, which also included Jesse Armstead and Jeremiah Trotter, surpassed the 100-tackle plateau.

Edwards entered the NFL with the Dallas Cowboys and remained there from 1998-2001. Serving as the LBs coach, Edwards worked under Defensive Coordinator Mike Zimmer, who led the Cowboys' defensive attack. Under Edwards' guidance, Dexter Coakley, a 3rd-round draft choice in 1997, was selected to the Pro Bowl twice over the 4-year span (1999, 2001), as he was Dallas' 2nd-leading tackler all 4 years.

Before making the leap to the NFL ranks, Edwards held collegiate assistant posts at Florida (1990-91), Appalachian State (1992-95), Duke (1996) and Georgia (1997). During his lone season at Georgia, Edwards tutored a defensive line which included a pair of freshmen in Richard Seymour and Marcus Stroud, both of whom would be selected in the 1st round of the 2001 NFL Draft.

A 4-year letterman at Duke University, Edwards was twice named the special teams captain and an honorable mention All-ACC selection at linebacker in 1989.

A native of Siler City, N.C., Edwards and his wife, Jami, have a son, B.J.

Mike Priefer enters his 6th year with the Vikings organization as the special teams coordinator. The 15-year NFL coaching veteran has held the same title with the Denver Broncos and Kansas City Chiefs in years past.

Priefer's special teams units are known for creating big-play opportunities. Since entering the NFL, Priefer has seen his units account for 23 scores (11 KOR, 7 PR, 3 blocked punts, 1 botched fake FG and 1 safety). He has also seen his squads block 23 kicks (9 punts, 9 FGs, 5 PATs) since 2002. Since Priefer joined the Vikings in 2011, Minnesota is tied with the Eagles for the most special teams TDs with 11 (6 KOR, 3 PR and 2 blocked punts) over that 5-year span.

Since joining the NFL, Priefer has helped David Tyree (ST), Chris Hanson (P), Blair Walsh (K) and Cordarrelle Patterson (RS) earn Pro Bowl nods. Both Walsh and Patterson were named 1st-team All Pro as rookies in 2012 and 2013, respectively. Priefer went to the playoffs with the Giants in 2005 (NFC East Champions), 2006 with Kansas City (Wild Card), 2012 with the Vikings (Wild Card) and 2015 (NFC North Champions). In 2012, Priefer was named Special Teams Coach of the Year as voted on by his NFL counterparts, and his units ranked #1 in the NFL by the acclaimed *Dallas Morning News* special teams rankings.

In 2015, the Vikings ST special teams units were again among the NFL's best. For the 2nd time in the last 3 years, the Vikings led the NFL in kick return average. Patterson led the way with a 31.8 kick return average. He also tied for the NFL lead in KR TDs with 2. Patterson is 1 KR TD shy of tying the team career-record (5, Percy Harvin). Patterson was selected as an All-Pro by the PFWA. PR Marcus Sherels continued to be one of the most reliable and elusive return men in the league. Sherels took back his franchise-best 3rd PR for a TD when playing at Chicago (11/1/15). He earned NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for his performance against the Bears. Since 2012, Sherels only trails Darren Sproles (4) in PR TDs. Since 2013, Sherels leads the NFL in PR average with an 11.4 clip edging out Antonio Brown (11.2) from Pittsburgh. The former Gopher has the most 50+ yard punt returns in team history with 5. His 10.2 career PR average is currently 2nd all-time behind Mewelde Moore (10.4). P Jeff Locke continues to hold the career-best net punting average for Minnesota with a 38.7 net average. Locke stopped 23 punts inside the 20 in 2015. As a group, the Vikings ranked 5th best in the NFL with 5.24 yards per punt return allowed. K Blair Walsh led the NFL with 34 FGs, two of which came as a game-winner - at Chicago (11/1/15) and vs. St. Louis (11/8/15). Walsh has 5 career game-winning FGs. His 34 FGs in 2015 was the 2nd most in team history. In 2015, Walsh connected on 6 FGs of 50+ yards, 2nd-best in the NFL behind Robbie Gould (7). Since 2012, Walsh leads the NFL with 23 FGs of 50+ yards and has the 3rd-most FGs (121). Walsh earned NFC Special Teams Player of the Week Honors vs NYG (12/27/15) for his 5-FG performance. In the NFC North Division-clinching win at Green Bay (1/3/16), Priefer's punt unit successfully converted a first down and gained early momentum when WR Adam Thielen took a fake punt 41 yards into Packers territory to set up the first score of the game. On the season, rookie CB Trae Waynes led the way with 14 special teams tackles.

In 2014, Priefer's special teams units showcased a young nucleus of return men, a long-range kicker and an improving punter. The Vikings special teams were ranked 10th in the NFL by the annual report by the *Dallas Morning News*. His kick return unit ranked 2nd in the NFL in starting position at the 25.1 yard line. The opponents' kickoff return average was 4th-lowest in the league with only a 20.7 kick return average. Patterson and Sherels continued to be one of the NFL's most

dangerous return tandems. Patterson was tied for 6th in the NFL, and ranked 2nd in the NFC, with his 25.6 kick return average. Sherels' 11.0 punt return average was 6th in the NFL and 3rd in the NFC. During Week 13 vs. Carolina (11/30/14), the Vikings punt block unit moved into the NFL record books for becoming just the 5th team in NFL history to block 2 punts and return both for TDs in the same game. It was the 1st time in team history with 2 blocked punt TDs and the 1st blocked punt TD since 1986. Thielen blocked the 1st punt and returned it 30 yards for the TD, becoming only the 4th Viking to block, recover and score in team history and the 1st since 1973. 2 drives later, LB Jasper Brinkley blocked another punt and DE Everson Griffen scooped up the ball and returned it 43 yards for the TD, the longest blocked punt return TD in team history. Thielen won NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for his performance. Safety Andrew Sendejo led the team with 13 special teams tackles and also set a team record for the longest rush on a fake punt when he gained 48 yards to set up a Vikings TD at Chicago (11/16/14).

In 2013, the Vikings showcased the #1 KR man in the NFL, Patterson, and the #2 PR man in Sherels. Patterson was named 1st team All-Pro and selected to the Pro Bowl after his record-breaking season. Patterson was also named NFC Special Teams Player of the Month for September and NFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his Week 8 performance vs. Green Bay. The rookie broke the Vikings single-season kick return record with 1,393 kick return yards, on 43 returns, and a 32.4 return average with 2 KR TDs, leading the NFL in all categories. The 32.4 KR average is 4th-highest in the NFL since the 1970 merger and highest since 1985. Patterson tied the single-season team-record with 2 KR TDs (105t, 109t), also leading the NFL. Patterson's 109-yard KR

TD (10/27/13 vs. GB) was the longest kick return in NFL history. With two returns of 105+ yards, Patterson is tied for the most plays over 105 yards in NFL history with Ed Reed and Jacoby Jones. The Vikings average starting position was the 27.2-yard line in 2013, the best starting position in the NFL since the NFL moved kick-offs to the 35-yard line in 2010. Not to be outdone, Shereels set the team record with a 15.2 PR average, good for 2nd in the NFL. Shereels returned 22 punts for 335 yards with a long return of 86 yards for a TD against the New York Giants (10/21/13), the 2nd PR TD of his career, tying a franchise record. Shereels recorded 119 punt return yards against the Giants, a Vikings record for a single game. Shereels posted 2 returns (86t, 50) over 50 yards in 2013, most in a single-season by a Vikings punt returner. Jeff Locke closed out the season well and set the team rookie record with a gross punting average of 44.2 yards per punt. His 39.2 net average ranked 3rd in team history. Walsh set the franchise record with his 12th career 50+ yard FG (9/29/13 vs. Pit), passing Ryan Longwell in only his 2nd NFL season. His 12 consecutive 50+ yard FGs was also an NFL record. By connecting on 4 50+ yard FGs in 4 consecutive games (12/16/12-9/8/13), Walsh set an NFL record for most consecutive games with a FG over 50 yards. Walsh was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his efforts during Week 12 at Green Bay after going 4-4 on FGs and recording 5 touchbacks.

The 2012 season saw the Vikings special teams units reach new heights. The Vikings punt and kick return coverage units allowed 0 TDs on the season while ranking 3rd in the NFC with an opponent start average at the 20.8 yard line. Priefer's KOR unit ranked 2nd in the NFL with a 24.6 average start following kickoffs. Walsh made NFL history going 10-10 on FGs of 50+ yards while being selected to his 1st Pro Bowl along with being named 1st-Team All Pro by the AP. Walsh tacked on another NFL record with 3 50+ (50.51, 53) FGs in a game (at St. Louis, 12/16/12). Walsh set a Vikings record with 53 touchbacks in 2012 and tied the longest FG in franchise history with a 56 yarder (at Houston, 12/23/12). Walsh's 53 touchbacks and 92.1 FG % (35-38) were NFL rookie records. To bookend the season, Walsh connected on game-tying (55) and game-winning (38) FGs in Week 1 vs. Jacksonville, the 1st rookie kicker in NFL history to hit game-tying and game-winning FGs in his 1st NFL game. In Week 17, Walsh set the Vikings to the playoffs with a 29-yard FG against Green Bay (12/30) as time expired. Walsh was named ST Player of the Week 3 times in 2012 while being the NFC ST Player of the Month in December.

The return game shined in Week 4 at Detroit (9/30) where KR Percy Harvin took back the opening kickoff 105 yards for a TD. Not to be left out, Shereels returned a punt 77 yards for his 1st NFL TD in the victory over the Lions. As a unit, the Vikings committed the fewest turnovers (0), made the most FGs (35) and allowed the fewest points (0) in the NFL on special teams. The *Dallas Morning News* ranked the Vikings special teams as tops in the NFL.

Priefer could not have asked for a better start to the 2011 season, his 1st in Minnesota. Harvin took the opening kickoff, Week 1 at San Diego, 103 yards for a TD. Harvin later made NFL history in Week 12 at Atlanta when he returned a kickoff 104 yards before being stopped at the 3-yard line. It was the longest non-scoring play in League history. The Vikings set a team record in 2011 with a 26.9 average on KORs, good for 2nd in the NFL.

In his 1st year as the Broncos special teams coordinator in 2009, Priefer led a unit that placed 3rd in the league in average opponent drive start after kickoffs (22.9-yard line) and featured 2 AFC Special Teams Player of the Month winners (K Matt Prater and KR/PR Eddie Royal).

Royal in 2009 became only the 11th player in NFL history to have both a kickoff and punt return for a TD in the same game (at San Diego, 10/19/09) while placing 7th in the league in punt return average (11.2 yds.). Prater finished the year making 19 of his final 20 FG attempts and tied for the 3rd-most FGs for a season in club history (30).

Before joining the Broncos, Priefer coordinated Kansas City's special teams from 2006-08 following stints as an assistant special teams coach with the NY Giants (2003-05) and Jacksonville (2002).

During his 3 seasons as the Chiefs' special teams coach from 2006-

08, Priefer helped Dustin Colquitt register, at the time, the 3rd-best net punting average (39.2 yds.) and the 6th-best gross average (44.8 yds.) in the NFL for that period. Colquitt's net averages for each of his 3 seasons under Priefer ranked as the top-3 single-season performances in Chiefs history, at that time.

Kansas City also placed 5th in the AFC in opponent PR average (8.2 yds) in Priefer's 3 seasons and blocked a total of 4 kicks (3 punts, 1 FG) during that period.

In 2008, Colquitt ranked 7th in the NFL in net average (39.2 yds.) under Priefer's guidance with the Chiefs, who also scored a TD that year on an opponents botched fake FG attempt. Priefer's kickoff coverage unit was one of the league's best a year earlier with Kansas City finishing the 2007 season 5th in the NFL in opponent average drive start after kickoffs (26.1-yd. line).

During Priefer's 1st season with the Chiefs in 2006, Colquitt set a franchise season record with a 39.3-yard net average that led the NFL. Priefer's special teams also tied for the NFL lead with 2 blocked punts, including 1 returned for a TD, and accounted for 1 PR TD (Dante Hall, 60 yds.).

Serving as the assistant special teams coach with the Giants from 2003-05, Priefer helped WR David Tyree thrive on special teams and helped him earn a trip to the Pro Bowl after the 2005 season as a special teamer.

Priefer entered the NFL coaching ranks with the Jaguars in 2002 as their assistant special teams coach. That season, Hanson earned the 1st Pro Bowl selection of his career after leading the AFC in both gross (44.2 yds.) and net (37.6 yds.) average.

From 1994-2001, Priefer coached special teams at the collegiate level, working for Navy (1994-96), Youngstown State (1997-98), VMI (1999) and Northern Illinois (2000-01).

Priefer's instruction at Northern Illinois helped WR Justin McCareins earn MAC Special Teams Player of the Year honors in 2000. His 19.1 punt return average was 3rd best in the nation. Along with coaching the Huskies' special teams, Priefer coached DTs during his 2 seasons at NIU.

He spent a season at VMI in 1999, coaching its special teams and inside LBs, after a 2-year stint at Youngstown State under Head Coach Jim Tressell. He worked with the special teams, tackles and tight ends at Youngstown State and was part of its Division I-AA National Championship squad in 1997.

Priefer began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Navy in 1994, instructing its special teams that season before coaching its LBs and defensive line from 1995-96. He also coached special teams and served as defensive coordinator for Navy's junior varsity team from 1995-96.

A QB and WR on Navy's junior varsity and lightweight teams from 1985-88, Priefer flew helicopters as a Naval officer for 5 years (1989-94) after his graduation. His work included tours of duty on USS America in the Persian Gulf and the Mediterranean Seas.

Priefer earned a bachelor's degree from the US Naval Academy from 1989 and received a master's degree from the University of Maryland in 1997.

Priefer was born in Cleveland and moved frequently as a coach's son, graduating from high school in Green Bay. He is married to Debbie, and the couple has four children: Samantha, Michael Jr., Wilson and Katie.

Norv Turner enters his 32nd season of NFL coaching in 2016 and his 3rd as Offensive Coordinator of the Vikings. A veteran head coach and coordinator, Turner has 15 seasons as a head coach under his belt, and as offensive coordinator for Dallas, he helped the Cowboys win Super Bowl XXVII (vs. Buffalo, 1992) and XXVIII (vs. Buffalo, 1993).

The 2015 Vikings continued to grow offensively with 2nd-year QB Teddy Bridgewater leading the way and benefited from the return of All-Pro RB Adrian Peterson to the lineup. Peterson led the NFL with 1,485 yards on the ground and scored 11 rushing TDs en route to AP 1st Team All-Pro honors and his 7th career Pro Bowl berth. The Vikings rode the #4-ranked rushing attack in the NFL to an 11-5 mark, the NFC North title for the 1st time since 2009 and a home Wild Card playoff berth. The Vikings also featured the least-penalized offensive unit in the NFL and had the 4th-fewest turnovers in the league.

The offense overcame injuries to starters at C and RT during the preseason and fielded a shuffled O-line that started all 16 games and the playoff game as a unit - the only group in the NFL to do so. Along with Bridgewater's accuracy, the offense found a playmaker in All-Rookie WR Stefan Diggs, who became the 1st Vikings rookie to lead the team in catches in club history.

In his 1st season with the Vikings, Turner's offense hit its stride during the second half of the season after a myriad of circumstances led to early struggles. Turner led Bridgewater to the best season for a rookie QB in team history. Bridgewater was thrust into the starting lineup after starting QB Matt Cassel suffered a season-ending foot injury in the 3rd game of the season. Bridgewater set virtually every franchise rookie passing record and had the 3rd-best completion percentage (64.6%) and the 7th-highest passer rating (85.2) in a season in NFL history by a rookie.

Before joining the Vikings, Turner most recently served as offensive coordinator in Cleveland for the 2013 season and had 8 total seasons as a coordinator with other teams - Dallas (1991-93), San Diego (2001), Miami (2002-03), San Francisco (2006) and Cleveland (2013). His 3 stints as a head coach came with Washington (1994-2000), Oakland (2004-05) and San Diego (2007-12). Turner has amassed a 114-122-1 record in the regular season as a head coach and has a 4-4 mark in postseason play, earning playoff berths in 4 seasons as head coach. During his head coaching career, Turner has won 4 division titles, adding 3 more division crowns as an assistant and 7 more playoff seasons as an assistant. Turner won his 100th career game as a head coach in the 2011 season opener against Minnesota in San Diego.

Since 2007, Turner's teams have ranked in the NFL's top 5 in offensive points 3 times, and the 2010 Chargers notched the #1 offense in the league with a 395.6 yards per game output. Turner's system has produced the NFL's leading rusher on 5 different occasions - Emmitt Smith (1991-93), Ricky Williams (2002) and LaDainian Tomlinson (2007). With Cleveland in 2013, Browns WR Josh Gordon led the NFL with 1,646 yards and 9 TDs on 87 catches in only 14 games, doubling his yardage output from the season before. Gordon joined Michael Irvin as WRs under Turner who led the NFL in receiving. Since 1991 when Turner joined Dallas as offensive coordinator, he has had backs rush for 1,000+ yards 15 times and boasted a 1,000-yard receiver 15 times. In 10 of those seasons, Turner's offenses have produced a 1,000+ rusher and receiver in the same season 7 times, and he has had a pair of 1,000+ receivers on a team 2 times.

Turner honed his coaching skills at USC from 1976-84 under Head Coach John Robinson. Robinson had been on the Oregon staff when Turner was a QB for the Ducks from 1971-74. Turner's 1st taste of coaching came as a graduate assistant in 1975 at

Oregon before joining Robinson at USC. Turner coached WRs, DBs, QBs and was offensive coordinator for the Trojans during his tenure when the team won the 1978 national championship and won 4 Rose Bowls. In 1980, Turner coached the DBs at USC, a group that included future 1st-round draft picks Ronnie Lott, Dennis Smith and Joey Browner, who later starred for the Vikings, along with future NFL head coach Jeff Fisher.

Turner joined Robinson's LA Rams staff (1985-90) and was part of a successful program, winning the NFC West in 1985, earning 4 trips to the playoffs in 6 seasons with the club and working closely with pioneering Rams Offensive Coordinator Ernie Zampese. In 1991, Turner began a 3-season stint as offensive coordinator for Dallas, helping future Hall of Famer Troy Aikman develop into one of the NFL's greats. In Turner's 1st season, Smith led the NFL in rushing and Irvin led the NFL in receiving, the 1st time since the 1970 merger that teammates led the league in each category, a feat only achieved one time since (Indianapolis, 1999). Smith led the NFL in rushing each season under Turner and in 1993 earned NFL MVP honors, the only Dallas player to win the award. The Cowboys won consecutive Super Bowls following the 1992 and 1993 seasons.

The foundation Turner laid in Dallas helped him earn the head coaching job in Washington from 1994-2000, posting 4 winning seasons, claiming the NFC East in 1999 and advancing to the NFC Divisional Playoffs. Turner went on to serve as head coach in Oakland (2004-05) and most recently San Diego (2007-12), where he won 3 straight AFC West titles (2007-09) and finished 2nd in the Division the other 3 seasons, advancing to face New England in the 2007 AFC Championship game and posting a 56-40 record in regular-season action. Turner was honored as USA Today NFL Coach of the Year in 2009.

Turner was raised in the Bay Area suburb of Martinez, California and attended Alhambra High. The Turners were mentored by their mother, Vicky, a single parent who battled multiple sclerosis. As a standout QB and DB, Turner earned a scholarship to Oregon where he was a 3-year letterman for the Ducks (1972-74). Turner's brother, Ron, was an NFL coach with Chicago, Indianapolis and Tampa Bay and currently is head coach at Florida International University, returning to the college ranks where he had been head coach at Illinois and San Jose State. Turner and wife, Nancy, have 3 children. The eldest, Scott, serves on the Vikings coaching staff, working with the QBs after working as an assistant coach with Carolina (2011-12) and Cleveland (2013). A nephew, Cameron Turner, served on the Vikings coaching staff in 2011-12 and is currently with the Carolina Panthers.

Ryan Ficken enters his 10th season with the Vikings in 2016 and will return as the club's special teams assistant, working with Special Teams Coordinator Mike Priefer for the 4th consecutive season. Previously, Ficken worked with the Vikings WRs, assisting WR coach George Stewart from 2009-12.

In 2015, the Vikings special teams units were once again among the NFL's best. For the 2nd time in the past 3 years, the Vikings led the NFL in kick return average. KR Cordarrelle Patterson led the way with a 31.8 kick return average. He also tied for the NFL lead in KR TDs with 2. Patterson was selected as an All-Pro by the PFWA. PR Marcus Sherels continued to be one of the most reliable and elusive return men in the league. Sherels took back his franchise-best 3rd PR for a TD when playing at Chicago (11/1/15). He earned NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for his performance against the Bears. Since 2012, Sherels only trails Darren Sproles (4) in PR TDs. As a group, the Vikings ranked 5th-best in the NFL with a 5.24 yards per punt return allowed. K Blair Walsh led the NFL with 34 FGs, two of which came as a game-winners - at Chicago (11/1/15) and vs. St. Louis (11/8/15). His 34 FGs in 2015 was the 2nd-most in team history. In 2015, Walsh connected on 6 FGs of 50+ yards, the 2nd most in the NFL behind Robbie Gould (7). Walsh earned NFC Special Teams Player of the Week Honors vs. NYG (12/27/15) for his 5-FG performance.

In 2014, the Vikings kick return unit ranked 2nd in the NFL in starting position at the 25.1 yard line. The opponents' kickoff return average was 4th-lowest in the league with only a 20.7 kick return average. Patterson tied for 6th in the NFL, and ranked 2nd in the NFC, with his 25.6 kick return average. Sherels' 11.0 punt return average was 6th in the NFL and 3rd in the NFC. Walsh added 5 FGs of 50+ yards during the season. During Week 13 vs. Carolina (11/30/14), the Vikings punt block unit moved into the NFL record books for becoming just the 5th team in NFL history to block 2 punts and return both for TDs in the same game. It was the 1st time in team history with 2 blocked punt TDs and the 1st blocked punt TD since 1986. Thielen blocked the 1st punt and returned it 30 yards for the TD, becoming only the 4th Viking to block, recover and score in team history and the 1st since 1973. 2 drives later, LB Jasper Brinkley blocked another punt and DE Everson Griffen scooped up the ball and returned it 43 yards for the TD, the longest blocked punt return TD in team history. Thielen won NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for his performance. Safety Andrew Sendej led the team with 13 special teams tackles and also set a team record for the longest rush on a fake punt when he gained 48 yards to set up a Vikings TD at Chicago (11/16/14).

Ficken's 1st season as the special teams assistant, 2013, was a record-breaking year. The Vikings showcased the #1 KR man in the NFL, Patterson, and the #2 PR man, Sherels. Patterson was named 1st-team All-Pro and selected to the Pro Bowl after his record-breaking season. Patterson was also named NFC Special Teams Player of the Month for September and NFC Special Teams Player of the Week for Week 8 vs. Green Bay. The rookie broke the Vikings single-season kick return record with 1,393 kick return yards, on 43 returns, and a 32.4 return average with 2 KR TDs, leading the NFL in all categories. The 32.4 KR average is 4th-highest in the NFL since the 1970 merger and highest since 1985. Patterson's 109-yard KR TD (10/27/13 vs. GB) was the longest kick return in NFL history. The Vikings average starting position was the 27.2-yard line in 2013, the best starting position in the NFL since the NFL moved kick-offs to the 35-yard line in 2010. Sherels set the team record with a 15.2 PR average, good for 2nd in the NFL. Sherels returned 22 punts for 335 yards with a long return of 86 yards for a TD against the New York Giants (10/21/13), the 2nd PR TD of his career. Sherels recorded 119 punt return yards against the Giants, a Vikings record for a single game. Sherels posted 2 returns (86t, 50)

over 50 yards in 2013, the most in a single-season by a Vikings punt returner. Rookie P Jeff Locke turned it on late and set the team rookie record with a gross average of 44.2 yards per punt. His 39.2 net average ranked 3rd in team history. Walsh set the franchise record with his 12th career 50+ yard FG (9/29/13 vs. Pit), passing Ryan Longwell in only his 2nd NFL season. His 12 consecutive 50+ yard FGs was also an NFL record. By connecting on 4 50+ yard FGs in 4 consecutive games (12/16/12-9/8/13), Walsh set an NFL record for most consecutive games with a FG over 50 yards. Walsh was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week for Week 12 at Green Bay after going 4-4 on FGs and recording 5 touchbacks.

The 2012 Vikings battled injuries to the receiving corps throughout the season but Ficken helped the team go 10-6 and earn a Wild Card playoff berth. Leading receiver Percy Harvin missed the final 7 games of the season with injury but hauled in 62 receptions in the opening 9 games for a 6.9 receptions per game average.

In 2011, Harvin set career highs in receptions with 87, receiving yards with 967, and tied a career high with 6 receiving touchdowns. His 87 receptions was also ranked 6th in the NFL.

Harvin improved on his rookie season in 2010. At just 21 years old, he became the youngest player in franchise history to lead the team in receiving with 871 yards on 71 catches and 5 TDs.

In 2009, WRs Sidney Rice and Harvin had breakout seasons for the Vikings. Both players were honored as Pro Bowlers, and Harvin became the 2nd Viking in 3 seasons to be named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year. Rice developed as a playmaker and became only the 3rd Vikings WR to post a 1,300-yard receiving season. Harvin tied for the NFL lead among rookies in receptions and yards and ranked 2nd in team history with 60 catches as a rookie.

In 2008, Adrian Peterson led the NFL with 1,760 yards rushing and Chester Taylor led all NFL RBs with 25 catches on 3rd down. Peterson became the 1st Vikings RB to lead the NFL in rushing, and Taylor's 45 catches were a career high.

The 2007 Vikings offense ranked #1 in the NFL in rushing offense. Peterson had a legendary rookie year, including breaking the NFL's single-game rushing record after going for 296 yards against San Diego on 11/4/07 and earning NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year. Peterson finished with 1,341 yards, 12 TDs and was named the Pro Bowl MVP.

Ficken served as an offensive graduate assistant with UCLA in 2006. He worked extensively with Jim Colletto and the offensive line. Ficken broke down opponents' game film, gave opponent reports to the offensive staff and coached the defensive scout team.

Ficken earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from ASU. He was a member of the Sun Devils football team for 2 seasons and received the Scholar-Athlete Award and was a member of Gamma Beta Phi, the National Scholastic Honor Society.

Ficken is currently finishing graduate school to obtain his master's in comparative education at UCLA. Ficken and his wife, Andrea, reside in Eden Prairie with their son, Wyatt.

Hank Fraley enters his 3rd season on the Vikings coaching staff in 2016 after helping lead an offensive line group in 2015 that overcame adversity to help propel 1 of the top rushing attacks in the NFL. Fraley played 11 seasons in the NFL and made his pro coaching debut in 2014 after a pair of seasons coaching collegiately.

In 2015, the Vikings line paved the way for Adrian Peterson to lead the NFL in rushing with 1,485 yards and ranked #4 as a team in the NFL. The Vikings offensive line started all 16 games and the playoff matchup as a unit, the only line in the NFL to do so. The group lost veteran starters C John Sullivan and RT Phil Loadholt to injury in the preseason and had to shuffle the lineup to start the season with only LT Matt Kalil returning to the same spot as the 2014 season. The ground game powered the Vikings to an 11-5 mark and the 2015 NFC North title.

The 2014 Vikings line was plagued by injuries throughout the campaign but protected rookie QB Teddy Bridgewater as he learned on the job, taking over starting duties in the 4th week of the season. The Vikings line lost 3 starters by the end of the season and had only 2 players start all 16 contests. The team started 5 different offensive line combinations during the season and only started the original starting 5 for the opening 3 games of the season.

Fraley helped the University of San Diego notch an 8-3 mark to tie for 1st in the Pioneer League in 2012, and in 2013 the San Jose State squad went 5-3 in the final 8 games to notch a 6-6 season mark, capping the season with an upset win over #16 Fresno State. He coached 2nd-Team All-Mountain West Conference C Nicholas Casper and honorable mention honoree G Ryan Jones with San Jose in 2012 and had 3 USD linemen honored with All-Pioneer honors in 2012.

Fraley played from 2000-05 with Philadelphia, 2006-09 with Cleveland and in 2010 with St. Louis. A stalwart on the Eagles line as the team went to 4 consecutive NFC title games and advanced to Super Bowl XXXIX against New England, Fraley started 123 of his 142 career regular season games. Fraley played and started in 10 career playoff games. A durable player, Fraley started 119 of the 120 regular season games he played from 2001-08. Fraley was primarily a C but started games at C, G and T during his NFL career after joining Philadelphia as a rookie free agent out of Robert Morris in 2000.

In Fraley's first 4 seasons as a full-time starter with Philadelphia, the team won 4 straight NFC East titles and advanced to the NFC title game 4 times, winning in 2004 over Atlanta to advance to Super Bowl XXXIX. The Eagles went 48-16 in regular season play from 2001-04 and posted some of the top individual performances in club history. In 2004, QB Donovan McNabb set a team record with a 104.7 passer rating, a completion percentage of 64.0 and threw for 3,875 yards, a team record at the time. McNabb's 31 TDs in 2004 ranks 2nd in team history. Fraley and the Eagles O-line protected McNabb as he went to the Pro Bowl each season from 2001-03 and also played a key role for Philadelphia TE Chad Lewis (2001-02), WR Terrell Owens (2004), RB Michael Westbrook (2004) and TE Mike Bartrum (2005) to earn Pro Bowl berths. During his career, Fraley paved the way for a 1,000-yard rusher in 4 seasons, including back-to-back performances by Cleveland's Jamaal Lewis in 2007 and '08, Duce Staley with Philadelphia in 2002 and Steven Jackson with St. Louis in 2010. Acquired by trade in 2006 by Cleveland, Fraley played under former Vikings line coach Jeff Davidson and started all 16 games in '06 despite joining the team only 8 days before the season opener. In 2007, Fraley was named a Browns offensive captain and helped the unit rank 3rd in franchise history with 402 points and 5,621 net yards.

A standout at Robert Morris in Pittsburgh, Fraley had his #75 retired by the school in 2001 and is the 1st RMU alum to play in the Super Bowl. He was enshrined in the school's Hall of Fame in 2006 and honored by the Northeast Conference in 2010. Fraley was an All-Northeastern Conference choice from 1997-99, and the squad won conference titles each season.

Fraley and wife, Danielle, have 4 sons, Trent, Mason, Travis and Beau, and 1 daughter, Scarlett, and reside in Chaska.

The Vikings have 2 coaches on the 2016 staff who began their lives in the NFL as players and will face their old clubs in 2016.

Vikings DBs coach Jerry Gray was a standout DB for the Los Angeles Rams while assistant OL coach Hank Fraley spent most of his playing career with Philadelphia from 2000-05 but ended his career with St. Louis in 2010, so he faces a pair of his old franchises. Fraley started 123 of his 142 career games and helped the Eagles advance to Super Bowl XXXIX in Jacksonville, another venue on the schedule in 2016. The Vikings travel to Philadelphia on 10/23/16. Gray was the 21st overall pick in 1985 out of Texas by the LA Rams and went on to earn 4 Pro Bowl berths (1986-89) and was tabbed 2nd-Team All-Pro 2 times (1986, '89). The Viking host the LA Rams in the preseason finale on 9/1/16. A pair of Vikings coaches, George Stewart and Robert Rodriguez spent time with NFL teams on injured reserve or practice squad, but did not see game action.

Entering his 3rd season with the Minnesota Vikings, Jonathan Gannon serves as the team's assistant DBs/defensive quality control coach.

The 2015 Vikings won their 1st NFC North title since 2009 and hosted a Wild Card Playoff game, highlighted by a stingy defense that jumped to #5 in the NFL in points allowed at 18.9 points per game after ranking #11 in 2014. Under Gannon's tutelage, the Vikings secondary continued to make strides, which included S Harrison Smith receiving Pro Bowl recognition, marking the 1st time a Vikings DB has been named to the Pro Bowl since 2010 when CB Antoine Winfield received the honor.

In Gannon's 1st season helping guide the Vikings DBs, the unit improved in a number of statistical categories, jumping from 31st in passing yards per game in 2013 to 7th during the 2014 campaign. Additionally, the Vikings DBs recorded 12 interceptions during the 2014 campaign, doubling their 2013 total of six interceptions. The Vikings defense posted the league's largest defensive improvement from 2013 to 2014, as the unit allowed 113 fewer points than it did in 2013.

Gannon came to the Vikings after spending the 2012 and 2013 seasons as the Titans defensive quality control coach under current Vikings DBs coach Jerry Gray.

From 2009-11, Gannon worked in personnel for the St. Louis Rams. He started as a college scout with the Rams, working for National Football Scouting in 2009 and 2010, before serving as a pro scout with the Rams in 2011. As a pro scout, Gannon was responsible for scouting upcoming opponents and evaluating pro personnel.

Gannon received his 1st NFL experience as a defensive quality control coach under Mike Zimmer while with the Atlanta Falcons in 2007. He served as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, the University of Louisville, during the Orange Bowl championship season in 2006. During his final 3 years as a student at the University of Louisville, Gannon served as a student assistant for the football team. Gannon was a DB for 1 season at Louisville before suffering a career-ending hip injury.

Gannon is a native of Cleveland and was an all-state defensive back and a standout on the basketball court, as well, at St. Ignatius High School. He and his wife, Gina, and son, Rocco, reside in Minneapolis.

Jerry Gray enters his 20th season coaching in the NFL and 3rd season as the Vikings DBs Coach in 2016 with a track record of success as a player and coach with 29 years in the League. Gray has served as a defensive coordinator twice, with the Buffalo Bills (2001-05) and Tennessee Titans (2011-13), and played for 9 seasons as a standout DB. Gray has also tutored the DBs for the Seattle Seahawks (2010), Washington Redskins (2006-09) and Titans (1999-2000). Gray has 3 times contributed to a top-10 scoring defense as the Vikings allowed the 5th-fewest points (18.9 points per game) in 2015, his 2011 Titans unit ranked 8th in the NFL, allowing 19.8 points per game and in 2000 with the Titans as the DBs coach, allowing only 11.9 points per game, ranking 2nd in the NFL.

With a deep background of playing and coaching DBs, Gray brings experience to an emerging Vikings secondary Gray helped S Harrison Smith to the 2016 Pro Bowl, marking the 1st time a Vikings DB has received Pro Bowl honors since 2010 when CB Antoine Winfield received the honor.

The 2015 Vikings won the NFC North and hosted a Wild Card Playoff game, highlighted by a stingy defense that jumped to #5 in the NFL in points allowed at 18.9 after ranking #11 in 2014. In addition to Smith receiving Pro Bowl honors, CB Terence Newman was named NFC Defensive Players of the Week following his 2-INT performance at Oakland, which were the most INTs in a game by a Vikings CB since Brian Williams recorded 3 vs. Detroit in 2003.

In Gray's 1st season guiding the Vikings DBs, the unit improved in a number of statistical categories, jumping from 31st in passing yards per game in 2013 to 7th during the 2014 campaign. Additionally, the Vikings DBs recorded 12 interceptions during the 2014 campaign, doubling their 2013 total of 6. The Vikings defense posted the league's largest defensive improvement from 2013 to 2014 as the unit allowed 113 fewer points under this coaching staff than it did in 2013.

Smith had a career year with the help of Gray and was the only player in the league to record 3+ interceptions and 3+ sacks, the 4th time in team history a Vikings DB has recorded 3 or more sacks and 3 or more interceptions in a season, the first time since Williams did so in 2003. Smith led the Vikings with 120 total tackles, breaking LB Chad Greenway's streak of 6 consecutive seasons leading the team in tackles, becoming the first Vikings DB to lead the team in tackles since DB Corey Chavous posted 108 total tackles in 2003.

Vikings CB Xavier Rhodes made strides in his second NFL season with the help of Gray, finishing with 18 pass breakups, which was tied for the 4th-most pass breakups in the NFL during the 2014 campaign, and recorded his 1st career interception.

While coaching the DBs in Tennessee, Gray helped 2nd-year CB Samari Rolle and veteran S Blaine Bishop earn Pro Bowl and All-Pro honors in 2000 while the unit ranked 1st in the NFL in fewest passing yards and total yards allowed.

Following his 1st stint with Tennessee, Gray was named the Bills defensive coordinator. His defenses in 2003 and 2004 both ranked 2nd in the NFL for yards allowed and each were rated in the top 10 in points allowed. In 2004 his defense led the NFL in takeaways (39) and ranked 3rd in sacks (45).

Under Gray's tutelage as the secondary coach for the Redskins, Sean Taylor grew into one of the NFL's best young defenders and earned Pro Bowl honors in 2006. Taylor tragically passed during the 2007 season and was selected to the Pro Bowl and selected All-Pro in 2007 posthumously. During his lone season in Seattle, Gray helped rookie S Earl Thomas to an impressive debut, starting all 16 games and grabbing 5 interceptions.

A year after retiring as a player, Gray received his 1st coaching job with Southern Methodist as the secondary coach. After a 2-year stint with SMU, Gray was hired by the Tennessee Oilers as the defensive quality control coach while the team played in Memphis in its 1st season relocated from Houston.

As a player, Gray was a 4-time Pro Bowler (1986-89) and twice earned 2nd-Team All-Pro honors from the AP (1986, '89) during his 9-year NFL career as a CB. Gray, who finished with 28 career interceptions, was named the NFL's Defensive Back of the Year by the NFLPA in 1989 and won Pro Bowl MVP honors in 1990. Gray was a 1st-round selection (21st overall) by the LA Rams out of the University of Texas in 1985. Gray was the 3rd DB selected in the 1985 Draft and part of a 1st round that year that included future Hall of Famers Bruce Smith, Chris Doleman and Jerry Rice.

While at Texas, Gray was a 2-time consensus All-American and 2-time Southwest Conference Defensive Player of the Year as a S. Gray currently ranks 3rd all-time in Longhorn history with

16 career interceptions. Gray recorded 7 interceptions during the 1984 season, the 2nd most in a single season in school history. Gray was named to the Texas All-Time Team and All-Decade Team for the 1980s. Gray was inducted to the College Football Hall of Fame in 2013, becoming the 17th Longhorns player to make it into the Hall of Fame.

A native of Lubbock, Texas, Gray and wife Sherry have two sons - Jeremy, who played football at SMU and currently serves as an intern in the Vikings personnel department, and Jayden. Gray started the Jerry Gray Foundation in 2002, providing scholarships to the underprivileged to attend college and actively support youth in Lubbock.

VIKINGS-RAMS RENEW RIVALRY

The Vikings will welcome an old nemesis to U.S. Bank Stadium to wrap up the 2016 preseason, a club that has a storied history competing against the Vikings - the Los Angeles Rams. The franchise began in 1937 in Cleveland, moved to Los Angeles for the 1946 season and stayed in southern California through the 1994 season, moving to St. Louis for the 1995-2015 campaigns. The Rams will wrap up the 2016 preseason slate with the 2nd game at U.S. Bank Stadium on Sept. 1.

Including playoff action, the Rams and Vikings have met 44 times with the Vikings holding a 26-16-2 all-time series advantage. The Vikings have played the Rams 7 times in the playoffs, tied with Dallas for the most in club history. The 1961 expansion Vikings were assigned to the NFL's Western Conference, joining Baltimore, Chicago, Detroit, Green Bay, Los Angeles and San Francisco. In that debut season, the Vikings played 5 preseason games against Western Conference foes and played 12 games against Western Conference foes and a pair of games against Dallas from the Eastern Conference. The Vikings struggled to a 3-11 mark to finish in the bottom of the conference, 1 game behind LA, who the Vikings topped 42-21 on 12/3/61 for their 3rd and final win of the season.

During the 1970s the teams were bitter rivals that met in the playoffs 4 times in 5 seasons. The Vikings won NFC Championship games over the Rams in 1974 to go to Super Bowl IX and in 1976 to go to Super Bowl XI. Both Championship game meetings were at Met Stadium in Bloomington. The teams also squared off in the NFC Divisional Playoffs in 1977 and '78 with the Vikings winning the '77 meeting in Los Angeles. The Vikings 1st playoff win was a 12/27/69 victory over the Rams in the NFL Divisional Round playoffs en route to the club winning the final NFL title before the 1970 merger and advancing to Super Bowl IV.

The founding figures of the Vikings had strong Rams ties. The club tabbed Rams PR Director Bert Rose to serve as the Vikings 1st General Manager and Norm Van Brocklin parlayed a successful 12-year career as a QB into being named the 1st Head Coach in Vikings history, a playing career that began with the Rams from 1949-57. The 1st Vikings game at Met Stadium was the 1961 preseason finale against the Rams on 9/10/61, a 21-17 Rams win.



Entering his 4th season with the Vikings in 2016, Jeff Howard will assist the coaching staff with preparation and have a more hands-on role on the defensive side of the ball, specifically helping the LB corps.

In the club's 2nd season under Head Coach Mike Zimmer, the Vikings defense continued to improve in every statistical category, helping Minnesota to its 1st playoff berth since 2012. Howard aided the Viking defense, which allowed the 5th-fewest point (18.9 ppg) during the 2015 regular season and forced 22 turnovers, jumping from 25th in the league in turnovers in 2014 to 19th in 2015. 6 Vikings defenders received recognition during the 2015 campaign, highlighted by 6th-year DE Everson Griffen, 4th-year S Harrison Smith and 2nd-year LB Anthony Barr being named to the Pro Bowl. Additionally, DT Linval Joseph was named NFC Defensive Player of the Week for his Week 9 performance against the Rams, LB Eric Kendricks received NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month praise from the league for the month of October and CB Terence Newman was named the Week 10 NFC Defensive Player of the Week for his 2-INT performance at Oakland.

During the 2014 season, the Vikings defense improved from 32nd in points per game in 2013 to 13th in points per game in 2014. Minnesota also improved its passing yards per game from 31st in the league in 2013 to 7th in 2014. From 2013 to 2014, the Vikings allowed 113 fewer points, the largest scoring defense improvement in the NFL.

Howard transitioned from his on-field playing days at Eastern New Mexico, where he earned All-American honors for his play and academics, to coaching at Odessa Permian HS in Odessa, TX. Howard was on staff from 2007-10, during which he assisted the secondary and LBs before becoming the defensive coordinator in 2009-10. Howard was on the Texas Tech staff from 2011-12, serving in the defensive quality control role in 2011 and coaching the safety position in 2012.

Howard played LB for Eastern New Mexico from 2001-04 and was a 4-time Academic All-Lone Star Conference member. Howard earned 1st Team All-Lone Star Conference honors as a LB in 2003-04 while capping his career by being named a 2004 AFCA Division II All-American and graduating Cum Laude with degree in biology and chemistry. Howard had his jersey retired by Eastern New Mexico in 2006 and entered ENMU Hall of Honor in 2011.

Andrew Janocko (juh-NO-coe) enters his 2nd season with the Vikings and 4th in the NFL in 2016, serving as the club's offensive quality control coach. Janocko works closely with the TE group and Offensive Coordinator Norv Turner along with several other assistant coaches to prepare the offense for practice and opponents. Janocko brings NFL experience to the position, having held a similar role with Tampa Bay from 2012-13.

In addition to his work on the offensive game plan throughout the week, Janocko also conducts scout team meetings and coaches the scout team regularly during practices. His preparations with the scout team served the Vikings 1st-team offensive and defensive units daily throughout the 2015 season. As part of the offensive coaching staff in 2015, Janocko helped aid a unit that ranked 5th in the NFL in total rushing, headlined by Adrian Peterson's league-leading 1,485 rushing yards.

Janocko arrived in Minnesota after coaching QBs at Division II Mercyhurst during the 2014 season. At Mercyhurst, Janocko guided Brendan Boylan to 3 Pennsylvania State Athletics Conference West Division Offensive Player of the Week honors and a Division II National Player of the Week honor. Boylan started the season as the backup in Janocko's quarterback group but took over the starting job in the 3rd game of the season and helped lead the Lakers to a 7-1 record as a starter. Boylan finished the season 192-of-319 (60.2 percent) for 2,952 yards, 29 TDs and 8 INTs.

From 2012-13, Janocko received his first experience coaching at the NFL level when he served as an offensive assistant with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. While in Tampa Bay, Janocko was responsible for working with then-Head Coach Greg Schiano and Offensive Coordinator Mike Sullivan in coordinating practice schedules and breaking down film. In 2012, Janocko had a

hands-on role with the quarterbacks and kick returners before working with WRs and KRSin 2013.

Janocko served as a graduate assistant under Schiano at Rutgers in 2011. He worked directly with the QB unit, helping true freshman signal-caller Gary Nova lead Rutgers to its best record since 2006. Other responsibilities for Janocko at Rutgers included handling the communication between center and quarterback, and opponent film breakdown.

A 3-year letter winner at Pitt, Janocko served as a backup QB and holder on special teams. Janocko spent his 1st 2 seasons as a walk-on before earning a scholarship his final 2 seasons. He was a member of the Panthers QB unit when Vikings QB Coach Scott Turner served as the team offensive assistant (2008-09) and WRs coach (2010). A 3-time member of the Big East All-Academic Team, he graduated from Pitt in 2010 with a degree in history and minor in political science.

A native of Clearfield, PA., Janocko was the starting QB at Clearfield Area High School, where his father, Tim, served as the head coach. He led the school to a pair of district championships and was a 2-time Pennsylvania Football News All-State honoree. Janocko was recently engaged to his fiancée Natalie and is scheduled to be married in the summer of 2017.

Andre Patterson returns to lead the Vikings defensive line in 2016, his 5th season overall with the club. Patterson brings 34 years of coaching experience, 13 in the NFL, to the Vikings defensive line. He reunited in Minnesota with Head Coach Mike Zimmer, as they worked together in Dallas from 2000-2002 with the Cowboys defense and at Weber State in 1988.

Patterson earlier worked for the Vikings as the DL coach in 1998-99. Patterson has coached at each level, working as a high school head coach, 15 years as a college head coach and assistant and 13 seasons as an NFL coach.

The 2015 defensive line showcased talented veterans along with ascending youth. DE Everson Griffen led the team with 10.5 sacks (4th in NFC) on his way to his 1st career Pro Bowl. Griffen posted back-to-back seasons with double-digit sacks, ranking 6th in the NFL with 22.5 sacks since the start of the 2014 season. Spelling Griffen and veteran DE Brian Robison (5.0 sacks) was Danielle Hunter, the youngest player in the NFL. Hunter, a 3rd-round selection out of LSU, ranked 2nd in the NFL for sacks by a rookie with 6.0. He posted the 2nd-most sacks on the Vikings and 5th-most by a rookie in team history. NT Linval Joseph was a dominant force in his 2nd year as a Viking, and he led the DL with 71 tackles. Joseph (Week 9 vs. STL) and Griffen (Week 17 at GB) earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors. Hunter was named to the All-Rookie team by the PFWA. DT Tom Johnson continues to flourish in Minnesota and added 5.5 sacks following up a career-best 6.5 in 2014. Since 2014, Johnson ranks 6th in the NFL in sacks by a DT with 12.0. 3rd-year starting DT Sharrif Floyd added 2.5 sacks and 37 tackles. Both Griffen and Floyd sacked Russell Wilson in the Wild Card contest vs. Seattle. The DL accounted for 30 of the 43 team sacks during the regular season. Only 5 RBs reached 100+ rushing yards in 2015. The defense ranked 5th in the NFL, only allowing 19.3 points per game.

Patterson's front 4 featured 3 new starters in 2014 with Griffen, Floyd and Joseph joining Robison and appearing in a combined 62 out of 64 games as a unit. Griffen had a career year in his 1st season starting and led the team with 12.0 sacks and 21.0 TFLs. Griffen's 12.0 sacks ranked 2nd in the NFC and 4th in the NFL for DEs. Griffen was named NFC Defensive Player of the Month for October when he led the NFL in DL tackles with 20 and posted a NFC-best 6 sacks in a 4-game span. Floyd produced a career-high 4.5 sacks, while Johnson registered a career-high 6.5 sacks in 2014; he had 5 sacks during the previous 3 seasons in New Orleans. Johnson's 6.5 sacks tied for 8th-most in the NFL by a DT and tied for 5th best in the NFC. The defense's 41 sacks tied for 9th in the NFL and tied for 4th in the NFC. As a defensive unit, the Vikings allowed 113 fewer offensive points, the biggest improvement in the NFL in 2014. The 2014 defense allowed 20.3 PPG, which ranked 13th in the NFL and was a major improvement from the 32nd-ranked defense that allowed 27.4 in 2013.

Patterson served as the assistant head coach/DL coach in 2013 with Florida International University, his only season with FIU, working under Head Coach Ron Turner, the brother of Vikings offensive coordinator Norv Turner.

From 2010-2012, Patterson served as the defensive coordinator at UTEP. Patterson's most successful season at UTEP came in 2011 when the Miners recorded 10 more sacks than the previous year in 1 fewer game. Their TFLs also jumped up by double digits during the 2011 season. In 2010, the UTEP defense yielded fewer than 300 yards in 4 games for only the 3rd time since 1977. For the first time in 20 years, the Miners held 8 opponents under 24 points.

Patterson was the assistant head coach/DL coach from 2008-2009 at UNLV. Patterson's highlight win with the Rebels came in 2008 when topping the #15th-ranked Arizona State Sun Devils 23-20.

From 1997-2006, Patterson worked in the NFL mainly as a DL coach. He joined Mike Shanahan's Broncos staff for the 2005 and 2006 seasons. Patterson was a part of the 13-3 Broncos team in 2005 that reached the AFC Championship game. The defense created 36 turnovers, 5th-most in the league, and their +20 turnover differential was 2nd-best in the NFL. In 2005, the Broncos run defense allowed 85.2 yards per game, 2nd-best in the NFL. The 16.1 points allowed per game was tied for 3rd. In 2006, the Broncos allowed 19.1 points per game which was good

for 8th overall.

In 2003 and 2004, Patterson was the Cleveland Browns DL coach under Head Coach Butch Davis. The Browns defense finished 12th overall in points allowed in 2003.

From 2000-2002, Patterson was the Cowboys DTs coach. From the 2000-01 seasons, Dallas' run defense improved from 32nd in the NFL to 13th. The defense allowed 57.9 fewer rushing yards per game in 2001. The Mike Zimmer-led defense finished the 2001 season ranked 4th in yards allowed with 287.4. In 2002, Patterson's unit added La'Roi Glover and Patterson helped send him to his 3rd consecutive Pro Bowl.

Patterson's 1st stint in Minnesota was for the 1998-99 seasons. Patterson coached the DL during the Vikings 15-1 season in 1998 when they lost to Atlanta in the NFC Championship. The offense garnered all of the headlines, but the defense finished the season ranked 6th overall in points allowed and 11th against the run. DT John Randle earned Pro Bowl honors in 1998 under Patterson. The Vikings made the playoffs again in 1999 but fell to the St. Louis Rams, the eventual Super Bowl Champions, in the NFC Divisional Round.

Starting his NFL career in 1997, Patterson joined Pete Carroll and the New England Patriots as a defensive assistant. The Patriots won the AFC East in his only season with the club. The defense allowed 289 points during the season, tied for 8th best in the NFL. The Patriots allowed the 5th-fewest rushing yards per game with 101.0 at their average.

His 1st and only collegiate stint as a head coach came at Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo from 1994-96. Patterson led his team to a League title in 1994 and was named American West Conference Coach of the Year. The 1994 season was Cal Poly's 1st season jumping to Division 1-AA. Patterson was 17-16 in his 3-year tenure at Cal Poly.

From 1992-93, Patterson was the DL coach for Washington State under Head Coach Mike Price. The Cougars went 9-3 during the 1992 season and won the Copper Bowl 31-28 versus Utah. They finished ranked #15 in the country.

Patterson made a 2-year stop in the Ivy League when serving as the DL coach at Cornell from 1990-91. The 1990 Cornell team won the Ivy League Championship.

Patterson served as the defensive coordinator at Western Washington in 1989. The year before, he coached the defensive line at Weber State for the 1988 season serving under then-Defensive Coordinator Mike Zimmer. Patterson was the Head Coach as St. Monica High School in California in 1987. From 1983-86 he was the defensive coordinator at Renton High School in Washington. Patterson began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Montana, in 1982.

A native of Richmond, CA, Patterson and his wife, Donna, reside in suburban Minneapolis with their daughter, Ashmera and son, Andre, Jr. Patterson earned his bachelor's degree in Secondary Education from Montana in 1983. He played collegiately as an offensive lineman at Contra Costa College and Montana before suffering a career-ending knee injury.



Drew Petzing enters his 3rd season with the Minnesota Vikings as the Assistant WRs Coach in 2016. Petzing has spent time aiding both the RBs and WRs corps during his 1st 2 seasons with the Vikings. Petzing works closely with Offensive Coordinator Norv Turner and his staff. Petzing brings a diverse background from collegiate and pro football to the Vikings staff.

Petzing spent his 2nd season with the Vikings mainly helping WRs coach George Stewart on the practice field, as well as assisting the offensive coaching staff in general. In 2015, Petzing helped assist a WR corps with a blend of experience and youth. Stefon Diggs, who was a 5th-round selection out of Maryland, became the 1st rookie in club history to lead the team in receptions (52), despite being inactive for the 1st 3 games of the season. Diggs also led the Vikings with 720 receiving yards, the most by a rookie since Percy Harvin's 790 in 2009. The 22-year-old burst onto the scene, recording at least 6 receptions and at least 85 yards in his 1st 4 games in the NFL. Diggs was named the PFWA's All-Rookie team and was 2nd among all rookies in receiving yards, trailing only Amari Cooper, the 4th-overall pick in the 2015 NFL Draft. Veterans Mike Wallace and Jarius Wright contributed 39 and 34 receptions, respectively.

In his first season with the Vikings, Petzing worked primarily on the field with the Vikings RB corps, a position group that saw two different RBs lead the team in rushing, including rookie RB Jerick McKinnon, who finished the 2014 campaign with the 3rd-most rushing yards by a rookie. The 3rd-round selection out of Georgia Southern who primarily played an option QB in college, posted 538 rushing yards in his debut season. The rookie finished tied for 5th in the NFL among RBs with more than 100 carries by averaging 4.8 yards per attempt.

Petzing spent the 2013 season with the Cleveland Browns working as a football operations intern focusing primarily on the offensive side of the ball. He served on the Browns staff that included Vikings Offensive Coordinator Norv Turner and QBs coach Scott Turner.

Prior to working for the Browns, Petzing served as the OLBS coach at Yale for the 2012 season.

He spent the 2010 season at Boston College as the recruiting graduate assistant before moving on the field as the defensive graduate assistant in 2011.

After graduating from Middlebury College in 2009, Petzing spent a year with Harvard as a volunteer assistant.

Petzing spent his first 2 years at Middlebury as a DB on the football team but suffered injuries which ended his playing career. During his time at Middlebury, he was teammates with future Super Bowl-winning K Steven Hauschka, who began his NFL career as a rookie free agent with the Vikings. He spent the final 2 years as a volunteer student assistant before graduating from Middlebury in 2009 with a degree in economics and minors in math and philosophy.

Griffen posted back-to-back seasons with double-digit sacks and ranks 6th in the NFL with 22.5 sacks since the start of the 2014 season. Spelling Griffen and veteran DE Brian Robison (5.0 sacks) was Danielle Hunter, the youngest player in the NFL. tionally, and tied for second nationally in KORs returned for TDs (2) and already holds the UTEP career record in that category with 4 TDs in his first 2 collegiate seasons. In 2011, LB Isaiah Carter finished with 54 tackles and was named All-Conference USA honorable mention, for the second-consecutive season.

The former Miner ranks in the top 5 among UTEP's all-time leading tacklers with 443 career tackles, including 33 TFLs. He led the Western Athletic Conference in tackles in 3-of-4 seasons with the Miners and was named the WAC Defensive Player of the Year following his senior season in 2004, after being credited with 121 tackles and 16 TFLs and was selected to play in the 2005 East/West All-Star Game.

In his professional playing career, Rodriguez spent time with the Carolina Panthers and Tennessee Titans (2005), before playing for Cologne in the NFL Europa (2006) and the Calgary Stampeders of the CFL (2006-07).

A native of El Paso, TX, Rodriguez was a standout RB at Montwood High School, earning All-City Offensive MVP as a senior. Rodriguez and wife, Holly, have a son, Caleb.

Pat Shurmur enters his 18th season of NFL coaching in 2016 and his 1st season leading the Vikings tight end group. Of his 18 seasons in the NFL, Shurmur has 2 full seasons of head coaching experience and 5 as an offensive coordinator. During his NFL coaching career, Shurmur has been a part of teams that have qualified for the playoffs 8 times, won 6 division crowns and posted 1 Super Bowl appearance.

Prior to his arrival in Minnesota, Shurmur spent the previous 3 seasons as the offensive coordinator of the Philadelphia Eagles, his second stint with the club. He arrived in 2013 when he was hired by then 1st-year head coach Chip Kelly. In their 1st season together, the 2 orchestrated one of the most efficient offenses in the NFL, setting team records in points (442), total net yards (6,676), touchdowns (53), passing yards (4,406) and fewest turnovers (19) en route to an NFC East title. The Eagles also set an NFL record with 99 plays of 20+ yards and became the 1st team since the 1991 Buffalo Bills to lead the league in rushing while ranking last in time of possession.

Widely respected around the league for his craft in developing young quarterbacks, Shurmur guided QB Nick Foles to a breakout season in 2013, throwing for 27 touchdowns and only 2 interceptions while posting the 3rd-best QB rating (119.2) and 3rd-lowest interception percentage (0.63%) in NFL history. Foles also became just the 7th player in league history to throw for 7 touchdowns in a game during a matchup against the Oakland Raiders.

In 2014, Shurmur oversaw an offense that broke a team record by scoring 474 points, breaking the prior mark of 442 set in 2013. The 2014 Eagles also set team records with 54 TDs, 390 completions, 4,581 gross passing yards, 8 300-yard passing games and 356 first downs. Shurmur served as the interim head coach for the 2015 regular season finale after the dismissal of Chip Kelly the previous week. He helped guide the Eagles to a 35-30 victory over the New York Giants to help the Eagles solidify second place in the NFC East.

Before joining the Eagles, Shurmur served as the head coach of the Cleveland Browns from 2011-12, the first head coaching opportunity in his NFL career. He was the 13th head coach in franchise history, and the 6th since the franchise's revival in 1999. In his 1st year as the Browns head coach, he helped develop a draft class in which all 8 members saw action in the regular season, 3 of whom started all 16 games. He also mentored QB Colt McCoy, who in his 2nd season, posted a career-best 2,733 yards and 14 touchdown passes in 2011.

Shurmur's opportunity in Cleveland resulted after a successful 2-year stint as the offensive coordinator of the St. Louis Rams (2009-10). He helped the Rams improve to a 7-9 record following a 1-15 season in 2009, the second-biggest turnaround in the league that year. Shurmur guided the Rams to improvements in nearly every offensive category including total yards, time of possession and 3rd-down percentage. The top pick in the 2010 NFL Draft, QB Sam Bradford set NFL rookie records for completions (354) and attempts (590), while his 3,512 passing yards were the 2nd-most by a rookie in league history at the time (now 3rd) en route to NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year honors under the direction of Shurmur. Prior to a successful season through the air in 2010, Shurmur helped RB Steven Jackson capture the NFL rushing title in 2009 with 1,416 yards on the ground.

Shurmur's NFL coaching career began during his 1st stint in Philadelphia, (1999-2008), where he spent 10 seasons with the club. He served as the team's QBs coach from 2002-08 and helped guide Donovan McNabb to three Pro Bowl berths during his tenure. In 2004, Shurmur mentored McNabb to the most productive season of his career, as he set franchise records in passer rating (104.7) and completion percentage (64.0). McNabb also became the 1st quarterback in NFL history with 30-plus touchdowns (31) and fewer than 10 interceptions (8) in a single season. McNabb's career year helped Philadelphia reach its 1st Super Bowl appearance (XXXIX) since 1980.

Shurmur's 1st 3 seasons in Philadelphia (1999-01) were spent as TE's coach, where he developed 3-time Pro Bowler Chad Lewis. From 2000-01, Lewis combined for 110 receptions, 1,157 yards and 9 touchdowns. His reception total ranked 4th among all NFL tight ends during that 2-year span, while he was tied for 4th in touchdowns and 5th in receiving yards.

Before joining the Eagles, Shurmur spent the 1998 season at Stanford University as the OL coach. That year, the Cardinals offensive line allowed the fewest sacks per pass attempt in the Pac-10 and helped 1st-year quarterback Todd Husak become only the 3rd quarterback in school history to throw for more than 3,000 yards.

Prior to Stanford, Shurmur instructed the TE's, special teams and OL at Michigan State University from 1990-97. The Spartans sent 3 TE's (Ty Hallock, Duane Young and Mitch Lyons) to the NFL under Shurmur's guidance and KR Derrick Mason set a school career record with 2,575 yards.

A 4-year letterman at Michigan State, Shurmur earned All-Big Ten conference honors and All-America honorable mention accolades as a senior in 1987. He played G and LB as a freshman and started at C the next 3 seasons. He served as co-captain as a senior when the Spartans defeated USC in the Rose Bowl. Shurmur earned a master's degree in financial administration and was the 1st graduate student football player at the University.

A native of Dearborn Heights, MI, who attended Divine Child High School, Shurmur comes from a football background. His uncle, the late Fritz Shurmur, coached in the NFL for 24 years and served as the Green Bay Packers defensive coordinator from 1994-98, helping that club win two NFC Championships and Super Bowl XXXI.

Shurmur and his wife, Jennifer, have 4 children - daughters Allyson, Erica and Claire, and a son, Kyle.

Tony Sparano joined the Vikings as OL coach for 2016 and is in his 3rd decade of coaching, 17 of those in the NFL. A former NFL head coach, Sparano has worked with Mike Zimmer in the past and the pair share a passion for teaching the game and getting the most out of their players. Zimmer shared a sideline with Sparano while both coached in Dallas under Bill Parcells from 2003-06.

Prior to the Vikings, Sparano coached TEs in San Francisco. The 49ers offense went through a myriad of changes throughout the preseason and regular season, but the TE group was a steady source of productivity. Starter Vance McDonald tied for 3rd on the club in receptions and joined fellow TE Garrett Celek to each notch 3 receiving TDs, also good for a tie for 3rd on the team.

Under Sparano's direction for the final 12 games of the 2014 season, the Raiders finished with a 3-9 record, including wins in 3 of their last 6 contests. Offensively for the Raiders, rookie QB Derek Carr became the only quarterback from the 2014 draft class to start each of his team's 16 regular season games. Among all rookie QBs in NFL history, Carr ranked 2nd in completions (348), tied for 5th in passing touchdowns (21) and 10th in passing yards (3,270). In addition, he threw just 12 interceptions, tied for 4th-fewest among all passers with at least 500 attempts in 2014. Defensively, Sparano inherited a team that was ranked 17th in opponent's yards per carry average (4.31), and over the 12 weeks following his promotion, the Raiders ranked 8th (3.83). The team also finished the season ranked 22nd in rushing yards per game allowed (119.4), despite ranking 31st (158.3) before Sparano took over.

In 2013, Sparano served as Oakland's assistant head coach/OL coach and tutored a shuffling unit that paved the way for 4 different players to rush for 100 yards in a game, becoming the first team to achieve the feat since 1978 (KC - five players). Sparano elevated the run game to new heights in his first season, raising the rushing yards per game average from 88.8 (2012) to 125.0 (2013).

Prior to joining the Raiders, Sparano served as offensive coordinator for the New York Jets in 2012, following a 4-year stint as head coach of the Miami Dolphins (2008-11).

From 2008-10, Miami posted a 15-9 record on the road, which was tied for the 3rd-best road record over that span. Under Sparano's guidance, WRs Brandon Marshall and Davone Bess combined for the most receptions by any duo in Dolphins history, while TE Anthony Fasano set career highs in receptions, yardage and touchdowns. In his 1st season as Miami's head coach, Sparano guided the Dolphins to an 11-5 record and the AFC East title, following a dismal 1-15 season in 2007. His 10-game improvement earned him 2008 NFL Coach of the Year honors by the NFL Alumni and the Pro Football Weekly/Professional Football Writers of America and is tied for the largest single-season improvement in wins in NFL history (Indianapolis Colts - 1998-99).

Sparano was a member of the Cowboys coaching staff from 2003-07, where he held several offensive positions, including tight ends coach (2003-04), offensive line/run-game coordinator (2005) and assistant head coach/offensive line (2006-07). When Sparano was the primary play-caller in 2006, the Cowboys finished 5th in total offense (360.8 yards per game). In addition, the unit's 425 points scored was the 4th-highest total in the NFL. In 2004, Sparano helped develop TE Jason Witten into one of the league's best TEs. Witten hauled in 87 receptions for 980 yards and 6 touchdowns in his 2nd season to become the first Dallas tight end to make the Pro Bowl since 1995.

Prior to 2 1-year stops as a TEs coach with Marty Schottenheimer's Redskins in 2001 and Tom Coughlin's Jaguars in 2002, Sparano helped launch the Cleveland Browns. In 1999, Cleveland's 1st year back in the NFL, Sparano served as an offensive quality control coach. He spent the 2000 season in charge of the Browns' offensive line.

Sparano made the jump to the NFL after 5 years as head coach of his alma mater, Division II New Haven (1994-98), where he compiled a 41-14 record (.745) and 4 winning campaigns. He guided the Chargers to a pair of NCAA playoff berths. His 1st coaching position was at his alma mater from 1984-87 on the offensive line before a 6-year stint with Boston University coaching the Terriers' OL from 1988-89, before serving as offensive coordinator from 1990-93.

In 1997, his 12-2 New Haven club led the country in scoring offense (42.8 points per game) and ranked 2nd in scoring defense (11.6) before losing in the National Championship. In his final season at Boston University, his 12-1 program secured the Yankee Conference and advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA playoffs.

A native of West Haven, CT, Sparano was the starting center for the University of New Haven, playing for the club from 1978-81, helping the squad to its first undefeated season in school history in 1979. Sparano is a member of the New Haven Football Hall of Fame.

Sparano and his wife, Jeanette, have 3 children - sons Tony and Andrew, who each played football at Albany, and daughter, Ryan Leigh. Sparano and his wife also have 2 grandchildren, Tony and Gabriella.

Entering his 11th season with the Vikings in 2016, Kevin Stefanski will move over to RBs after coaching the TEs the previous 2 seasons. Stefanski takes over a RB group that ranked 4th in the NFL in rushing in 2015, headlined by Adrian Peterson, who secured the NFL rushing title with 1,485 yards on the ground.

Under Stefanski's guidance, the TE unit enjoyed a successful 2015 campaign. TE Kyle Rudolph started all 16 games for the second time in his career and finished with a career-high 495 receiving yards. He scored a team-high 5 touchdowns and topped 100-yards receiving in a game (vs. Green Bay, 11/22) for the first time in his career. Stefanski also led 4th-year TE Rhett Ellison, who started 9 games, caught 1 TD and recorded a career-long 41-yard reception at Arizona (12/10). Rookie 5th-round pick TE MyCole Pruitt also had a contributing role on offense under Stefanski's tutelage, starting 3 games and catching 10 passes for 89 yards. The team opened in a 3-TE set twice during the final month of the season.

In Stefanski's 1st year tutoring the TEs in 2014, all 3 of the Vikings top TEs - Kyle Rudolph, Rhett Ellison and Chase Ford - caught TDs from Vikings QB Teddy Bridgewater on the season. The TE trio averaged 10.6 yards per catch and all 3 were in the starting lineup during the season.

Prior to overseeing the TE group, Stefanski served as the Vikings assistant QBs coach. Injuries led to Stefanski working with 3 different QBs who started at least 1 game during the 2013 season, with both Matt Cassel and Christian Ponder seeing action in 9 games. Cassel, in his 1st season with the Vikings, led the team with 1,807 yards, 11 TDs and an 81.6 passer rating. Behind a season-best 123.4 passer rating, Cassel led the Vikings to their 1st victory of the season in his 1st start with the club vs. Pittsburgh (9/29/13) in London, England.

The Vikings 2012 season exceeded outside expectations by going 10-6 and earning a berth in the playoffs as a Wild Card. The team continued to develop throughout the season, and Ponder grew as a signal caller as the season went on. Ponder's improved play in the final month of the season was a key element of the Vikings going 4-0 down the stretch to earn a playoff spot. Ponder's career-best game came vs. Green Bay (12/30) in the regular season finale in a must-win situation to make the postseason. He set a career-best with a 120.2 passer rating and tied his career high with 3 TD tosses. Ponder did not throw an INT in the final 3 games and had 8 games during the season without throwing a pick. He notched a completion percentage of 70.0%+ in 5 games and had 4 games with a passer rating of 100+. Ponder became the 7th Vikings QB to win 10 games as the starter.

The 2010 campaign was challenging to the Vikings as injuries derailed any consistency the team could build. The Vikings started 3 different QBs, including rookie Joe Webb for the final 2 games of the regular season on the road. QB Brett Favre started the opening 12 games of his 20th NFL season before injuries severely limited him to 1 more start in the final 4 games. Veteran backup Tarvaris Jackson started 1 game against the NY Giants but suffered a season-ending injury in that contest. Webb relieved Favre in the 1st half of the *Monday Night Football* game vs. Chicago (12/20) and started the final 2 outings, engineering an upset win at NFC East champion Philadelphia. Webb became only the 2nd Vikings QB to win his 1st start as a rookie and ran for TDs in consecutive weeks.

In 2009, Stefanski had a hands-on role in one of the most successful offensive seasons in Vikings history. The team improved dramatically in the passing game and developed new playmakers in prominent roles. Stefanski and the offensive staff helped veteran free agent Favre mesh with the offense despite reporting to the team in mid-August.

Stefanski spent 2006-08 working directly with then-Head Coach Brad Childress on administrative duties and special projects. Stefanski became acquainted with Childress during Philadelphia Eagles training camp in 2005 while working with the team's operations department.

Stefanski spent the 2005 season at his alma mater, the University of Pennsylvania, as assistant director of football operations. He coordinated all aspects of the Quakers' day-to-day operations of the football team.

A team captain as a senior in 2004, Stefanski was part of one of the most successful stretches in the history of the Quaker football program. The team won Ivy League titles in 2000, 2002 and 2003, and the squad went undefeated in league play during 2002 and 2003.

Twice honored as an Honorable Mention All-Ivy choice in 2002 and 2004, he was named Penn's Defensive Rookie of the Year as a freshman in 2000. During Stefanski's tenure, the squad posted a 42-7 overall record and a 32-3 mark in Ivy play. As a senior, the Quakers went 10-0 to become the 1st undefeated Penn team in a decade.

Stefanski holds a bachelor's degree in communications from Pennsylvania and attended St. Joseph's Prep in Philadelphia. The Stefanski family has made a name in athletics as Kevin's father, Ed, was a standout in basketball at Penn and has held executive positions with the NBA's New Jersey Nets, Philadelphia 76ers, Toronto Raptors and Memphis Grizzlies.

Stefanski and wife, Michelle, reside in Edina with their children, Will, Gabe and Juliet.

George Stewart enters his 10th season on the Vikings staff in 2016 and his 28th season of NFL coaching. The Vikings WR corps benefits from Stewart's decades of experience and ability to put players in the best situations to succeed.

In 2015, Stewart led a WR corps with a blend of experience and youth. Stefon Diggs, who was a 5th-round selection out of Maryland, became the 1st rookie in club history to lead the team in receptions (52), despite being inactive for the 1st 3 games of the season. Diggs also led the Vikings with 720 receiving yards, the most by a rookie since Percy Harvin's 790 in 2009. The 22-year-old burst onto the scene recording at least 6 receptions and at least 85 yards in his 1st 4 games in the NFL. Diggs was named the PFWA's All-Rookie team and was 2nd among all rookies in receiving yards, trailing only Amari Cooper, the 4th overall pick in the 2015 NFL Draft. Veterans Mike Wallace and Jarius Wright contributed 39 and 34 receptions, respectively.

In 2014, Stewart took on the task of developing 1st-year wideouts Adam Thielen and Charles Johnson while continuing to utilize the talents of veterans Greg Jennings, Cordarrelle Patterson and Wright during the 2014 season. Johnson, a mid-season signing from Cleveland's practice squad, emerged as a threat with 31 receptions for 475 yards and 2 TDs in 12 games for the Vikings. After spending the entire 2013 season on the Vikings practice squad, Thielen caught 8 passes for 137 yards, including a 44-yard touchdown in the Vikings' season-finale victory vs. Chicago. In Stewart's 2nd year working with 9-year veteran Jennings, Jennings again led the Vikings in receptions (59), receiving yards (742) and touchdowns (6). The highlight of the season for Stewart's group came in the Vikings overtime win vs. NY Jets (12/7) when Wright caught a short pass from rookie QB Teddy Bridgewater and took it 87 yards for the game-winning score.

In 2013, Stewart once again helped a rookie WR burst into the NFL. Patterson earned 1st-Team All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors as the NFL's best KR, but his offensive skills shined late in the season. Patterson finished with 3 receiving TDs in the final 4 games and was tied for 1st on the team with 4 receiving TDs on the season. The 3 rushing TDs by Patterson broke a team record for most rushing TDs in a season by a WR and marked the most by an NFL WR since the 1970 merger. The 50-yard TD run vs. Detroit (12/29/13) was the longest scoring rush by a WR in franchise history. Patterson's 45 receptions and 469 receiving yards were 3rd-best behind veterans Jennings and Jerome Simpson. Jennings led the team with 68 receptions for 804 yards and 4 TDs. Simpson turned in a career-high 726 receiving yards with 1 TD on 48 receptions. The Vikings offense finished the season 13th in the NFL, the highest the Vikings have ranked since reaching the NFC Championship in 2009.

The 2012 squad was forced to groom new talent to contribute to the passing game after leading receiver Percy Harvin was sidelined for the final 7 games. Stewart prepared rookie Wright to step into action in Harvin's absence and catch 22 passes in the final 7 games with a pair of TDs and reel in the longest Vikings pass plays of the season - a 65-yarder vs. Green Bay (12/30) and a 54-yard grab vs. Detroit (11/11) on his 1st career reception.

During his Vikings tenure, Stewart has coached Harvin to 2009 Rookie of the Year honors and Sidney Rice to a Pro Bowl berth in 2009. The 2011 season saw Harvin's production increase even more, as he set career-highs in receptions with 87 and receiving yards with 967. He also tied his career-high for receiving TDs with 6. His 87 receptions ranked 6th in the NFL. Harvin also set team records for most rushing yards in a season by a WR with 345 and most career rushing yards by a WR with 587.

The 2009 Vikings became only the 2nd team in NFL history to have 6 players catch 40+ passes in a season. Rice enjoyed a breakout season, and Harvin established himself as multi-talented offensive threat. Rice's 1,312 yards ranked 2nd in the NFC in 2009, and he became only the 4th Vikings WR in team history to eclipse the 1,300-yard mark. Rice's 201 yards vs. Detroit ranks as the 4th-best single-game mark in Vikings history.

Stewart was able to get Harvin acclimated to the pro game and spurred him to NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year and Diet Pepsi Rookie of the Year. Harvin tied for the NFL rookie lead in receptions and yards. Harvin excelled on offense and special teams, earning a Pro Bowl berth as a return man and setting

a new Vikings record with 2,081 total net yards. His 60 catches ranked 2nd only to Randy Moss' 1998 debut season when he had 69 receptions in Vikings history for rookie catches.

In 2008, the Vikings WRs contributed to much of the success of an improved passing attack. The Vikings led the NFL with 13 TDs through the air of 20+ yards. Bernard Berrian had a career year, setting highs in yards with 964 and TDs with 7.

Throughout Stewart's coaching career, he has been fortunate to learn from some of the game's all-time greats, beginning both his playing and early coaching careers under college legend Lou Holtz. Stewart went on to work in the NFL side-by-side with Chuck Noll, Sam Wyche, George Seifert and Dan Reeves, all men who led teams to the Super Bowl.

During Stewart's tenure in Atlanta, the team won the NFC South title in 2004 and advanced to the NFC Championship game against Philadelphia.

Prior to joining Atlanta, Stewart was an integral part of the San Francisco 49ers' success from 1996-2002, as the team advanced to the playoffs 5 times in those 7 seasons. In 1997, the 49ers won the NFC West with a 13-3 mark and eventually lost to Green Bay in the NFC Championship game. Stewart tutored Terrell Owens, J.J. Stokes and Tai Streets, with Owens making Pro Bowls and All-Pro in 3 straight seasons from 2000-02. Owens broke a 50-year-old NFL record when he caught 20 passes for 283 yards against the Bears in 2000 en route to his career-best day.

Stewart's 1st taste of NFL coaching came in Pittsburgh from 1989-91, where he coached special teams on Noll's staff. In his debut season in 1989, he helped Rod Woodson to a Pro Bowl as a return man. Following Pittsburgh, Stewart went on to spend 4 years coaching Tampa Bay special teams, where he helped K Mike Husted earn All-Rookie honors in 1993.

Before making the move to the NFL, Stewart spent several years in the college ranks, making his final stop as the Notre Dame LBs coach from 1986-88. Under Holtz's tutelage, the Irish steadily improved from the coach's opening season in '86 to become national champions in 1988, a year in which the team finished 12-0 and defeated West Virginia in the Fiesta Bowl.

Stewart and Holtz began working together in 1983, when Stewart got his start in coaching as an Arkansas graduate assistant, working with the Razorbacks' TEs. When Holtz moved from Arkansas to Minnesota as the Golden Gophers head coach in 1984, Stewart accompanied him as the offensive line coach, his 1st exposure to the state where he would return in 2007. In 2 short seasons, Holtz and his staff quickly turned the Gophers program around, finishing 7-5 in 1985 and winning the Independence Bowl over Clemson, the 1st bowl victory for the Gophers since the 1962 Rose Bowl.

Stewart was a standout guard for the Razorbacks from 1977-80 and helped the squad share the 1979 Southwest Conference title. The team played in 4 straight bowl games during Stewart's playing tenure as Arkansas returned to national prominence under Holtz. Stewart was an All-SWC honoree as a junior in 1979, served as a team captain in 1980 and earned a spot on the Arkansas Team of the Decade for the 1970s. He signed with the Kansas City Chiefs in 1981 but spent the season on injured reserve.

Stewart has a bachelor's degree in education from Arkansas and is a native of Little Rock, AR, where he graduated from Parkview High School in 1977.

Scott Turner enters his 3rd season with the Minnesota Vikings and his 6th in the NFL in 2016. Turner will continue to tutor the Vikings QBs, specifically starter Teddy Bridgewater, in the 3rd year under Offensive Coordinator Norv Turner.

Under the direction of Turner, Bridgewater continued to show strides being selected to his 1st Pro Bowl in his 2nd season in the NFL and his 1st as a full-time starter. Bridgewater, who led the team to its 1st NFC North Championship since 2009, bumped his passer rating up from 85.2 to 88.7 and threw 3 fewer INTs while playing in 3 more contests than his initial season. With 17 wins, Bridgewater tied Brett Favre and Warren Moon for the most wins in team history among QBs in their 1st 2 seasons with the club. Bridgewater had a signature game vs. Chicago (12/20/15) in Week 15 throwing for a career-high 4 TDs and rushing for another TD, becoming the 1st Viking to account for 5 TDs in a game since QB Daunte Culpepper threw for 5 at New Orleans (10/17/14).

Turner led Bridgewater to the best season for a rookie QB in team history. Bridgewater was thrust into the starting lineup after starting QB Matt Cassel suffered a season-ending foot injury in Week 3. In Bridgewater's 1st career start vs. Atlanta in Week 4, the rookie threw for a season-best 317 yards and guided the offense to pile up 558 net yards, the 4th-most in team history, in a 41-28 win. Bridgewater set virtually every franchise rookie passing record and had the 3rd-best completion percentage (64.6%) and the 7th-highest passer rating (85.2) in NFL history for a rookie. Bridgewater finished 259-of-402 for 2,919 passing yards, 14 TDs and 12 INTs, as well as 47 rushes for 209 yards and a TD.

In his lone season as the Cleveland Browns WRs coach in 2013, Turner guided 2nd-year WR Josh Gordon to the best receiving season in Browns history and one of the best in NFL history. Despite appearing in just 14 games, he became the 1st player in Browns history to lead the NFL in receiving yards (1,646), which ranks 10th in NFL history. He finished 6th in NFL history and 1st in the league in 2013 with 117.6 receiving yards per game, becoming the 1st player since Tory Holt in 2003 to lead the league in both receiving yards and receiving yards per game. In a game against Pittsburgh (11/24/13), Gordon set a Browns single-game record with 237 receiving yards and broke his own record the following week with 261 yards against Jacksonville (12/1), becoming the 1st player in NFL history with back-to-back 200-yard receiving games. His 261 receiving yards against the Jaguars tied for 12th-most in NFL history.

Turner entered the NFL coaching ranks in 2011 as the Carolina Panthers Offensive Quality Control Coach, a position he held for 2 seasons. With 6,237 offensive yards in 2011, the Panthers had 2,102 more yards than when they accumulated 4,135 yards in 2010, making the jump to 7th in the NFL after being last the previous season. The Panthers also scored 31 more offensive TDs in 2011 than they did in 2010. In 2011, QB Cam Newton earned Offensive Rookie of the Year, and his 14 rushing TDs broke an NFL record for most rushing TDs by a QB. Turner worked closely with Panthers Offensive Coordinator Rob Chudzinski preparing for upcoming opponents.

Prior to joining the Panthers, Turner spent 3 seasons at the University of Pittsburgh, 2 as an offensive assistant and his last as WRs coach. In his final season, Turner coached 1st-Team All-Big East WR Jonathan Baldwin, who was a 1st-round draft pick in 2011 (#26 overall). Turner was a member of the coaching staff during Baldwin's 3 seasons at the school as he finished with the 8th-most receiving yards (2,337) and tied for the 8th-most receptions (128) in school history. Pittsburgh finished with a combined 27-12 record, including a 2-1 record in bowl games, during Turner's 3 seasons with the program.

Turner spent the 2006-07 seasons at the prep level, coaching at South County Secondary School in Lorton, VA, after 1 season as a graduate assistant at Oregon State in 2005.

He earned a degree in psychology from the UNLV in 2006 where he was a 3-year letterman as a QB (2002-04). Turner comes from a family with strong coaching ties as his father, Norv, is the Vikings Offensive Coordinator and uncle, Ron, is the Head Coach at Florida International University. Scott's cousin, Cam, serves as the assistant WRs coach for the Carolina Panthers and spent 2 seasons as the Minnesota Vikings assistant to the head coach from 2011-12.

Turner, his wife, Robyn, son, Harrison, and daughter, Rose, reside in Eden Prairie.

Adam Zimmer enters his 3rd season as the Vikings LBs coach in 2016. Zimmer has contributed to the immediate success of 3rd-year LB Anthony Barr and 2nd-year LB Eric Kendricks, who were each drafted by the Vikings in 2014 and 2015, respectively.

The 2015 Vikings won the NFC North and hosted a Wild Card Playoff game, highlighted by a stingy defense that jumped to #5 in the NFL in points allowed at 18.9 after ranking #11 in 2014. Under Zimmer's watch, Barr elevated his game in his 2nd year in the NFL to become a Pro Bowl-caliber player and was the 1st Vikings LB to become a Pro Bowler since 2012 when Chad Greenway received Pro Bowl honors. Additionally, the Vikings 2nd-round selection, Kendricks, became the 2nd rookie in franchise history to lead the team in tackles (105 total tackles), a feat that was last accomplished by Rip Hawkins in 1961.

Not to be outdone by his younger counterparts, Greenway snared a Philip Rivers pass in the Vikings 31-14 win over the Chargers and returned the INT 91 yards to pay dirt. The 91-yard return was the 5th-longest INT return in team history and the 6th-longest INT return by a LB in NFL history.

3 of the top 5 tacklers for the Vikings during the 2015 campaign were the three starting LBs in Kendricks (105 tackles), Greenway (86 tackles) and Barr (80 tackles).

During his initial season with the Vikings, Zimmer helped Barr, who was the 9th-overall selection in the 2014 NFL Draft, splash onto the scene, leading the Vikings in tackles through the first 12 games before he was shut down for the season due to injury. Barr, who is relatively new to the position, having played FB for 2 years in college before switching to LB and immediately contributed, starting every game he played in recording 99 tackles, 4.0 sacks, 2 forced fumbles and 3 passes defended. Barr's 99 tackles ranks as the 5th-most in team history among rookies. The UCLA product was named NFC Defensive Player of the Week in Week 8 after recording 8 tackles, 1.0 sack, 1 pass defended and stripping, recovering and returning a fumble 27 yards on the first play of OT for a game-winning TD at Tampa Bay (10/26/14).

In his 1st season as an NFL position coach, Zimmer saw contributions from across the board. Veterans Greenway and Jasper Brinkley started 12 and 11 games, respectively, and helped solidify an otherwise inexperienced group. Greenway totaled 115 tackles while Brinkley corralled 85. 2nd-year LB Gerald Hodges saw the first significant playing time of his young career, starting 7 games and amassing 73 tackles. Hodges scored the fastest defensive TD in team history by intercepting Geno Smith of the Jets and returning the ball 27 yards for a TD 12 seconds into the game. Audie Cole, who mainly played special teams throughout the year, made his lone start in the season finale and performed well, leading the Vikings in tackles with 14 in a defensive effort that held the Bears to 9 points.

Before joining the Vikings, Zimmer spent the 2013 season with the Bengals and has previously worked with New Orleans (2006-09) and Kansas City (2010-12).

In his lone season with the Bengals, Zimmer, who served as the assistant DBs Coach, helped lead one of the top secondaries in the NFL. Despite facing the 5th-most passing attempts in the NFL, the Bengals allowed the 4th-fewest passing yards. The 5.9 yards-per-passing attempt the Bengals defense allowed was the 2nd-best in the NFL, trailing only Seattle. There were 7 different Bengals defensive backs who recorded an interception, and the group finished with 14 total, which was more than 11 teams had total. The Bengals tied for 5th in the NFL with 20 INTs during the 2013 season.

A coach for 4 playoff teams in his 9 seasons in the NFL, including the Bengals in 2013, Zimmer was also a member of the New Orleans Saints coaching staff in 2009 when they defeated Indianapolis 31-17 in Super Bowl XLIV. Prior to joining the Vikings, all 3 teams he has been with have won a Division title, combining for 4 total.

Prior to joining the Bengals, Zimmer served as defensive assistant/assistant LBs coach for the Chiefs for 3 seasons. In 2012, his final season in Kansas City, Zimmer coached Tamba Hali, Justin Houston and Derrick Johnson to spots in the Pro Bowl. It marked the 1st time in Chiefs history that 3 LBs were named to the Pro Bowl in the same season. Houston finished the season 5th amongst NFL linebackers with 10.0 sacks. Hali and Johnson both earned Pro Bowl honors in 2011, the 1st time the Chiefs had sent multiple LBs to the Pro Bowl since 1972.

In Zimmer's 1st season with Kansas City, the Chiefs won the AFC West title with a 10-6 record. Hali had one of the best seasons by a LB in Chiefs history, finishing with the 2nd-most sacks by a LB in franchise history (14.5). The Chiefs run defense improved in 2010, allowing 46.2 fewer rushing yards per game than they did in 2009, moving up from 31st in the NFL in 2009 to 14th in 2010.

Zimmer spent 4 seasons with the New Orleans Saints and added duties as the assistant LBs coach in 2009. During their championship season in 2009, the Saints defense had the 2nd-most takeaways in the NFL (39), and Jonathan Vilma earned Pro Bowl honors.

The Saints won the NFC South and advanced to the NFC Championship Game against Chicago in 2006, Zimmer's 1st season in the NFL. The 2006 season saw the Saints improve in both offensive yards allowed and offensive points allowed. The Saints gave up 51 fewer points and improved from 27th to 13th in the NFL in scoring defense. The Saints defense gave up 5 fewer yards per game and finished 11th in the NFL in yards allowed.

Zimmer was a safety for Trinity University in San Antonio, TX, from 2002-05 and graduated in 2006. Zimmer is the son of Vikings Head Coach Mike Zimmer, and 2016 marks the 3rd season the father and son have worked together. Adam (1/13/84) was born in Ogden, UT while his father served as an assistant coach at Weber State University.

Brent Salazar enters his 1st season with the Minnesota Vikings, serving as the team's head strength and conditioning coach. Salazar comes to Minnesota after having spent the previous 9 seasons with the Kansas City Chiefs as an assistant strength and conditioning coach.

During his NFL career, Salazar has been a part of 2 Division Championships – Denver in 2005 and Kansas City in 2010. The 2005 Broncos went 13-3, finishing with the best record in the AFC, and won their first playoff game since winning Super Bowl XXXIII. The 2010 Chiefs rebounded from a 4-12 finish in 2009 to win 10 games and clinch their first division title since 2003.

In Salazar's 9 seasons in Kansas City, his talents were retained by 2 different coaching staffs, including 2 different head strength and conditioning coaches. He was part of 3 postseason appearances in his 9 seasons, including this past season, when the Chiefs won their 1st playoff game since 1993.

Prior to joining the Chiefs, Salazar served as the assistant director of athletic performance at the University of the Pacific in 2006. He was responsible for designing and implementing the training regimens for 7 different varsity sports during his time with the Tigers.

Salazar also gained a wealth of knowledge as a performance coach at Velocity Sports Performance in 2006. He was instrumental in preparing collegiate football players for the NFL Combine. He also worked with a wide variety of collegiate and professional athletes.

The Denver, CO, native served as a graduate intern at UNLV in 2005. Salazar assisted the Rebels' strength and conditioning staff in their regimen with the football team. He was directly

Eric Sugarman enters his 20th NFL season in 2016 and his 11th with the Vikings as the Director of Sports Medicine/Head Athletic Trainer. Sugarman has been part of 7 Division championship teams since 2000 and 9 playoff teams.

During his tenure with the Vikings, Sugarman and his staff have been instrumental in helping several players return from severe injury by creating or enhancing rehabilitation protocols. During the 2012 offseason, Sugarman and his staff worked with RB Adrian Peterson on his remarkable comeback from a severe knee injury in late December 2011. Peterson returned to action for the 2012 season opener and went on to exceed all outside expectations by rushing for 2,097 yards, the 2nd-best season in NFL history, and earning NFL Most Valuable Player and Offensive Player of the Year honors in the NFL along with 1st-Team All-Pro and Pro Bowl recognition.

Sugarman's staff has also overseen the rehabs of LBs Chad Greenway, Heath Farwell and E.J. Henderson, who each suffered season-ending injuries in their careers but returned to earn Pro Bowl berths.

With the Vikings, Sugarman supervises the evaluation and care of all injuries sustained. He and his staff implement and maintain proactive treatment and rehabilitation programs. Sugarman also oversees the Vikings nutrition program, where he works closely with the team chef and nutritionist.

The Vikings athletic training staff has broad-based experience in athletic training and has trained under some of the most respected professionals in their field. The staff prides itself on being proactive while using the most current concepts, modalities and principles. All the athletic training staff members are Performance Enhancement and Corrective Exercise Specialists credentialed through the National Academy of Sports Medicine. The Vikings staff has been trained in the Advanced Graston technique, a patented form of instrument-assisted soft tissue mobilization that works to effectively break down scar tissue and fascial restrictions. The staff has also attended a course in myofascial release techniques as well as Kinesio Taping techniques. Sugarman has worked closely in

the past with the Nike SSP team. He added a sensory station in the athletic training room, bringing many new vision training concepts to the Vikings team. Sugarman also has a strong working relationship with Starkey Hearing of Eden Prairie, allowing him to bring state-of-the-art hearing enhancement and ear protection to the team and staff.

Sugarman spent the 1997-99 seasons with the Chicago Bears and the 2000-05 campaigns with Philadelphia. Sugarman got his first taste of the NFL as a summer intern for the Bears' athletic training staff from 1993-95.

Sugarman earned his bachelor's degree in health and physical education with an emphasis in athletic training from West Chester University and went on to earn his master's degree in sports management at the University of Richmond. During his tenure at Richmond, Sugarman served as the graduate assistant athletic trainer for the Spiders football team and head athletic trainer for the Spiders' baseball squad. In 1994-95, Sugarman served as assistant athletic trainer at West Chester and worked as an instructor at the school. In 1996 Sugarman served as an athletic trainer in the Chicago Cubs organization.

Sugarman joined the Bears as an assistant trainer from 1997-99 before moving to the Eagles in a similar role in 2000. The Eagles were noted for progressive rehab programs. That athletic training staff played an integral part in helping Terrell Owens return from ankle surgery during the regular season in time for Super Bowl XXXIX.

Sugarman is an active member of the Professional Football Athletic Trainers Society. He currently sits on the Advisory Board of Orthology and is a member of the Twin Cities Duncans Club. Sugarman is also an American Heart Association Basic Life Support, AED and First Aid certified instructor. In 2003 he received the PFATS' "Big Heart" award for saving the life of a fellow Eagles employee by performing CPR. In 2010, Sugarman and former Vikings Head Coach Brad Childress were co-winners of the American Optometric Association's Eagle Award and in 2009 *ESPN Magazine* recognized him as the NFL's Most Irreplaceable Athletic Trainer. In 2011, Sugarman

was inducted into the Hazleton, PA Area Sports Hall of Fame. In 2013, the Vikings staff was recognized with the Excellence in Aquatics Award by HydroWorx in honor of their progressive use of aquatic therapy.

In 2014, Sugarman helped to implement a program to provide certified athletic trainers for football players in 13 public Minneapolis and St. Paul high schools, servicing over 600 players for practices and games. The program, in partnership with Twin Cities Orthopedics and Tria Orthopaedic Center and with funding help from the Vikings and the National Football League Foundation, will help to ensure the safety and welfare of young

players. Sugarman and his staff were awarded the Minnesota Athletic Trainers' Association Sports Medicine Enhancement Award for 2016 during the MATA Annual Meeting and Clinical Symposium for their role played in expanding access to certified athletic trainers for athletes at Minneapolis and St. Paul public high schools.

During Hunkele's tenure with the Eagles from 2000-05, he worked with NovaCare Rehabilitation as a staff physical therapist during the offseason and as an assistant with the team starting in the preseason through the remainder of the schedule. While working with the Eagles, Hunkele was part of Rick Burkholder's highly regarded staff and was exposed to some of the most progressive rehab programs and techniques at work in the NFL today.

Ryan formed a piece of plexiglass to fit into Mullaney's face mask and thus started a trend that would carry on to this day - the visor. Future Vikings would make the look standard, most famously future Hall of Famer Randall McDaniel.

GEORGE PATON

ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

George Paton enters his 10th season with the Vikings in 2016, serving as the club's Assistant General Manager and working closely with General Manager Rick Spielman to oversee personnel decisions for the team.

The duo have a long professional history together, having worked on the personnel staffs in Chicago and Miami before joining forces again in Minnesota. Paton's primary focus is to coordinate scouting and personnel functions within the Vikings Pro Scouting and College Scouting departments and oversee year-round personnel transactions.

From 2012-14 the Vikings were creative in gaining draft choice that allowed them to select 7 players in the 1st round and form the young foundation for the future of the team.

The 2015 Vikings leaned heavily on recent draft classes to go 11-5 and win the NFC North. The club had 3 draft picks named to the All-Rookie team - WR Stefon Diggs, LB Eric Kendricks and DE Danielle Hunter. Diggs became the 1st Vikings rookie to lead the team in receptions and Kendricks became only the 2nd rookie to lead the team in tackles and the 1st to do so since the 1961 expansion team.

In 2014, the Vikings drafted LB Anthony Barr (#9) and QB Teddy Bridgewater (#32) and Bridgewater earned Pepsi Rookie of the Year honors by fan voting and was named to the All-Rookie team. Barr started 12 games before being sidelined by injury and finished 4th on the team in tackles.

The 2012 Vikings benefitted from an influx of young talent and spurred the squad to a Vikings-record 7-win improvement over the previous season, finishing 10-6 and earning a Wild Card playoff berth. The Vikings landed 3 draft picks on the All-Rookie team- Matt Kalil, Harrison Smith, Blair Walsh- and a pair of rookies- Kalil and Walsh-garnered Pro Bowl honors.

The Vikings roster development through free agency, trades and the draft built the foundation for the back-to-back NFC North Champions in 2008 and 2009. The Vikings tied a team record with 10 players earning Pro Bowl berths in 2009, 5 were acquired by the draft, 4 by free agency and 1 via trade.

The 2009 team tied the 2nd-most wins in franchise history with a 12-4 mark in the regular season and advanced to the NFC Championship game for the first time since 2000.

Paton spent 6 seasons (2001-06) with the Miami Dolphins as Director of Pro Personnel. Paton began his career in the college and pro scouting departments of the Chicago Bears, rising to the position of Assistant Director of Pro Personnel in 2000.

A 4-year letter winner as a DB at UCLA from 1988-91, Paton was a part of a pair of Bruin bowl teams. He earned a bachelor's degree in history and went on to play in professional football leagues in Italy and Austria.

Paton (pronounced Payton) and wife, Barbara, have a daughter, Bella, and son, Beau.

RYAN MONNENS


DIRECTOR OF PRO SCOUTING

Monnens oversees the Vikings pro scouting efforts and is responsible for scouting NFL players, advance scouting of opponents, assisting with the pro scouting database and scouting other professional leagues.

Monnens spent 8 seasons as a pro scout after spending 3 seasons as a pro personnel assistant. He joined the Vikings as an intern in 1998 and spent the following 3 seasons in public relations with the club.

Monnens played WR at St. John's University in Collegeville, MN (1995-97) under legendary coach John Gagliardi, the all-time winningest coach in college football history. JAMAAL STEPHENSON

DIRECTOR OF COLLEGE SCOUTING

Jamaal Stephenson enters his 15th season with the Vikings in 2016 and enters his 3rd season leading the club's college scouting operations. In Stephenson's tenure, 13 Vikings rookies have earned All-Rookie accolades and 2, Adrian Peterson and Percy Harvin, have been named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year. In 2014 Teddy Bridgewater earned Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Year in fan voting. Since 2007, the Vikings have sent 5 rookie players to the Pro Bowl in their debut seasons- Cordarrelle Patterson (2013), Matt Kalil (2012) Blair Walsh (2012), Percy Harvin (2009) and Adrian Peterson (2007)

In 2009, Stephenson was promoted to Assistant Director of College Scouting after originally joining the Vikings in 2002 as a college scout. Stephenson has worked closely with former college director Scott Studwell since joining the Vikings and took over the college department for the 2014 season.

Stephenson was recognized by the Fritz Pollard Alliance with the NFC Scout of the Year award for the 2012 season, presented during the 2013 Scouting Combine in Indianapolis.

Stephenson joined the Vikings in 2002 after spending 2 years with the Houston Texans. In May of 2000, he was

hired as College Administrator for the Texans. During his time in Houston, he was in charge of scouting areas of Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana.

Prior to joining the Texans, Stephenson spent one year as a scouting assistant for the Washington Redskins. His duties included evaluations and producing scouting reports. In the spring of 1998, Stephenson coached defensive backs as a graduate assistant at UMass.

Stephenson is a native of Goldsboro, NC. He was a 2-time All-Ivy League honoree at Brown as a DB, and was also awarded the team's "Unsung Hero" Award. He earned his bachelor's in organizational behavior management in 1997, and his master's in sport management from Massachusetts in 1999. In 2003, Stephenson was selected to Brown's All-Decade Football Team for the 1990's. He was honored as part of the 125-year anniversary celebration of football at Brown University.


Stephenson and his wife, Emily, have sons, Noah and Julian, and a daughter, Gabrielle.

SCOTT STUDWELL

COLLEGE SCOUT/REGIONAL

A key part of the Vikings for 40 seasons in different capacities, Scott Studwell enters the 2016 season working with the Vikings college scouting efforts as a regional scout after serving from 2002-13 as Director of College Scouting.

Studwell is in his 5th decade with the team and is one of the most enduring figures in Vikings history. He enters his 23rd year in the team's Player Personnel department in 2014. Studwell retired from his 14-year playing career after the 1990 season (1977-1990) and spent a year as the Vikings Assistant to the President/Player Relations in 1991 before being named the Player Personnel Coordinator from 1992-2001 and named Director of College Scouting in 2002.

Studwell's place in team history was immortalized in 2009 when he was inducted into the Vikings Ring of Honor. A member of the Vikings' 25th, 40th and 50th Anniversary All-Time Teams, Studwell holds team records for tackles in a career (1,981), season (230 in '81) and game (24 vs. Detroit in '85), as well as solo tackles in a career (1,308). No other player in Vikings history has over 1,500 career tackles. According to team media guides Studwell has more tackles with one organization than any other player in NFL history. In addition, Studwell is one of only five Minnesota players to participate in over 200 games during his career. He also played in 12 playoffs contests, including NFC Championship Games following the '77 and '87 seasons. In '87 and '88 Studwell was voted to the Pro Bowl. In '89 he was named 2nd-team All-NFC by United Press International. He also was Minnesota's recipient of the Ed Block Memorial Courage Award in '87. After earning the starting MLB job in '80, Studwell led the Vikings in tackles the next 6 seasons. He also was the team's leading tackler in

'88 and '89. Studwell, who tied for the team lead in fumbles recovered three times ('82, '86, '88), finished his NFL career with 11 FRs and 11 INTs.

Drafted by Minnesota in the 9th round from Illinois in '77, Studwell finished his collegiate career as the school's second all-time tackler (342) behind Dick Butkus (374). In '76 Studwell recorded 177 tackles to surpass Illinois' season record, formerly held by Butkus. As a senior Studwell recorded 23 tackles against Purdue to tie the school's single-game record.

In '90 Studwell was named to Illinois' All-Century Team, joining Butkus and Ray Nitschke as the linebackers on that squad. Studwell earned 2nd-team All-America and 1st-team All-Big Ten honors in '76, and 2nd-team All-Conference mention in '75. Studwell also was the team's co-captain and co-MVP in '76, when he played in the Hula Bowl, East-West Shrine Game and Japan Bowl.

A native of Evansville, IN (8/27/54), John Scott Studwell starred at Evansville High School. In 2001 Studwell was elected into the Indiana Football Hall of Fame. He majored in commerce at Illinois. During his playing career, he sat on the Board of Directors of the Boys and Girls Clubs of Minneapolis. Scott and wife Jenny have two daughters, Jessie and Samantha, and a son Jack along with grandchildren Janie, Penny and JJ.

ROOKIES IN A RUSH

The Vikings 2015 draft class made key contributions on a team that went 11-5 and won the NFC North title. The club was led in receptions by rookie WR Stefon Diggs, making him the 1st Vikings rookie to lead the team in catches and he was joined on the defensive side of the ball by LB Eric Kendricks, who became only the 2nd rookie to lead the team in tackles, joining Rip Hawkins during the 1961 expansion season. The duo of Diggs and Kendricks were joined on the PFW/PFWA All-Rookie team by DE Danielle Hunter, who ranked 2nd in the NFL by sacks by a rookie.

Acevedo spent 5 seasons as Kansas City's area scout covering the Big 12 region. Prior to being an area scout with the Chiefs he was an assistant in the club's personnel department. Before joining the Chiefs personnel department, Acevedo

was RBs coach at Missouri Western in 1994 and '95. Acevedo was an assistant coach at San Francisco State, from 1985-89.

COLLEGE SCOUT/AREA

Reed Burckhardt covers the Northeast Region of the country as a College Scout/Area for the Vikings after spending 2 seasons as the club's Blesto Scout. Over the past few seasons, Burckhardt has gained experience within the franchise in several areas.

Burckhardt began with the Vikings as an intern in the operations department in 2009, interned with the Vikings scouting department in 2010 and grew into a full-time role with the team. His background in football included his tenure as a 3-year letterwinner as a backup QB at South Dakota State as the team transitioned from a Division II squad to Division I FCS (Division I-AA). The Jackrabbits capped their transition by winning the

2007 Great West Football Conference title. Following his playing career at SDSU, Burckhardt worked with the football staff in a part-time role with recruiting and assisted coaching the linebackers. He graduated in 2008 with a degree in business.

Burckhardt attended Russell-Tyler-Ruthton High School in rural Southwestern Minnesota where he was a football and basketball standout. He comes from a strong sports family. His father, Keith, was an assistant high school football and basketball coach for 11 seasons, highlighted by Russell High's 3 straight trips to the state 9-man football tournament, winning the state title in 1979. TERRANCE GRAY

COLLEGE SCOUT/AREA

Terrance Gray returns to the Vikings in 2016 for his 11th season as a College Scout/Area. In his role Gray will scout the Southeast Region of the country.

Gray comes to the Vikings from the Kansas City Chiefs where he served as the club's area scout of National Football Scouting (NFS) during the 2005 season and in preparation for the 2006 Draft. Prior to moving into scouting, Gray was the Chiefs Player Development Coordinator and worked in player personnel from June 2003 to June 2005. As a scout with Kansas City, Gray covered the Southwest.

Gray got his start in the NFL as an intern in 2002-03 in the League office working with Player and Employee Development and focused on the NFL's Continuing Education Program. Before his opportunity with the NFL, Gray worked as a student assistant in the Oregon State University's athletic

department in academic affairs as he finished his bachelor's degree in 2002.

Gray was a CB at Oregon State in 1999 and 2000 after transferring from Palomar (CA) Junior College where he was an All-America honoree and team captain. At Oregon State Gray was part of one of the Beavers' best seasons in school history as a senior, going 11-1 and ending the season ranked #4 in the nation after a 41-9 win over Notre Dame in the Fiesta Bowl. Gray played under former NFL head coach Dennis Erickson while at OSU.

A standout QB at Bayside High in Queens, NY, was the team MVP and a 1st-Team All-Queens choice by the New York Daily News. Gray and his wife, Kimberly, reside in Nashville.



KEVIN McCABE

COLLEGE SCOUT/AREA

Kevin McCabe enters his 15th season in 2016 with the Minnesota Vikings as a College Scout/Area, working in the Western portion of the country.

McCabe came to the Vikings after working with the St. Louis Rams as an area scout for 7 years (1995-2001) and volunteering with the Rams personnel department in 1994. During his tenure with the Rams, the team became known as one of the most potent offensive attacks in the NFL. In 1999 the Rams went 13-3 in the regular season and won Super Bowl XXXIV over Tennessee following a 4-12 campaign in 1998. In 2001, St. Louis posted a 14-2 regular season mark and lost Super Bowl XXXVI to New England in one of the most exciting Super Bowls in League history. In his final three seasons with St. Louis, the Rams amassed a 37-11 regular-season record,

won the NFC West title twice (1999, 2001) and finished as the Division runner-up in 2000.

McCabe began his career in 1985 as an assistant coach at his alma mater, John Muir High School in Pasadena, CA. McCabe coached on the prep level in the Los Angeles area until becoming strength and conditioning coordinator and assistant football coach at Pomona-Pitzer College. He stayed at the school from 1991-94. In 1993 McCabe coached overseas for the East City Giants in Helsinki, Finland.

McCabe is a native of Pasadena and earned a bachelor's degree in political science in 1985 from Princeton University, where he was a two-year letterman for the Tiger football team. Kevin and his wife, Anne, have sons, Torin and Keenan, and a daughter, Katherine. The family resides in Woodland, CA.



PAT ROBERTS

COLLEGE SCOUT/REGIONAL

In his 4th season with the Vikings in 2016, Pat Roberts brings a wealth of experience in the scouting field to the team and will serve as a College Scout/Regional for the club, covering the East and Southeast Region. Roberts spent 8 seasons with the Cleveland Browns from 2005-12 and originally entered the NFL in 1998 with Chicago and served in a variety of roles with the team. Roberts began with Cleveland as a national scout from 2005-08 before advancing to Director of College Scouting in 2009 and on to Senior National Scout from 2010-12.

Roberts was an in-house scout for the team in 1998 and spent 1999-2003 as the Bears' Northeast Area Scout before

COLLEGE SCOUT/REGIONAL



He was a member of the 1999 Rams staff when the team won Super Bowl XXXIV over Tennessee. Steven Price begins his 7th season with the Vikings personnel department, and enters his 4th season in 2016 as the club's BLESTO Scout. In his role he creates early stage evaluations on NFL level talent by evaluating college players in the Midwest region. Formerly a Pro Scout contributing league wide evaluations Price now applies this expertise to finding draft eligible talent at schools across the Big Ten, Big 12, and Missouri Valley Conference as well as Division II and Division III programs. Price served as a personnel intern for the Vikings in the 2010 and 2011 seasons.

Price began his NFL career at a young age as he worked in the Carolina Panthers equipment room from 2002-2005. In 2007, he interned in the Panthers public relations department.

Price would then join the Vikings staff for the 2008 season as an operations intern before attending graduate school. While with the Vikings, Price assisted the player development department aiding rookies in their transition to the NFL and preparing players for life after football.

A 2007 graduate of North Carolina A&T, Price majored in speech communication while walking-on to the football team in 2006. Between stints with the Panthers and Vikings, Price returned to school during 2009-2010 and received his MBA in sports management from San Diego State University. A Charlotte, NC native, Price attended Olympic High School. He is engaged and resides in Minneapolis.



JEFF ROBINSON

PRO SCOUT

In 2016, Jeff Robinson enters his 26th season with the Minnesota Vikings and serves as a Pro Scout. Robinson assists the personnel department with league-wide player evaluation and preparing scouting reports on upcoming opponents.

After joining the Vikings as a public relations intern in 1990, Robinson worked two seasons (1991-92) as a public relations assistant and three years (1993-95) as operations assistant. He moved into the scouting department in June 1996.

In 1989-90 Robinson was an assistant coach at North High School in Minneapolis.

A three-year starter at cornerback at Northwestern, Robinson served as a team captain and was selected honorable-mention All-Big Ten as a senior in 1988. In the Wildcats' 28-10 win over Illinois in 1987, he returned an interception 73 yards for a touchdown, which at the time was the 7th longest interception return in school history and the longest interception return by a Northwestern player since '63. As a starter in all 11 games at RCB as a sophomore, Robinson helped the Wildcats post their best record (4-7) since 1973. Northwestern also tied a school record for takeaways with 31 in '86. He was recruited by and played as a freshman for former Vikings Head Coach Dennis Green.

A native of Minneapolis, Robinson (4/16/67) was an honorable-mention All-America and a two-time All-Minneapolis Conference selection at North High School. He was a 2-time All-State pick in track and an All-City choice in basketball. A member of the National Honor Society in high school, Robinson was recognized by the Minneapolis Public School Athletic Department in '88.

Named one of the Outstanding College Students of America, Robinson earned a degree in organizational studies/business management at Northwestern. Since '91 he has served on the board of directors of the North Community YMCA. In 1995 and 1996 he hosted a college prep basketball camp for the top 30 varsity players in the Twin Cities. For the last 8 years Robinson has hosted the "Jeff Robinson Football Camp". He and his wife Cassandra have two daughters, Jassandra, Jaila and a son, Jeffrey II "Deuce" and live in Shakopee.



CONRAD CARDANO

PERSONNEL CONSULTANT

Conrad Cardano is in his 3rd decade with the Vikings in 2016, joining the team in 1987 after a successful stint in collegiate coaching and working in scouting for Blesto. Cardano is in his 3rd season as a Personnel Consultant for the Vikings after 25 years on the road scouting for the club.

Since joining the Vikings, Cardano has helped build a team that has made the playoffs 14 times, including NFC Central/North titles in '89, '92, '94, '98, '00, '08 and '09. The team has played in 4 NFC Championship Games during his tenure.

Prior to joining the Vikings, Cardano worked for 3 years (1984-86) for the Blesto Scouting Combine. From 1981-83 he coached at Eastern Kentucky, which won the Ohio Valley Conference title each of his 3 seasons. The Colonels captured the NCAA Division I-AA championship in '82, when they went 13-0. Cardano joined Eastern Kentucky after 2 seasons (1979-80) overseeing WRs at Marshall. His first collegiate coaching job came as offensive coordinator at Catholic University

from 1975-78. Cardano coached 2 years at Tuscola High in Waynesville, NC and Dover-Sherborn High in Dover, MA.

Cardano played quarterback for the Hagarstown Bears of the Seaboard Pro League from 1972-73. Cardano played QB at Western Carolina from 1967-70.

Born in Washington, DC, Cardano attended Bladensburg (MD) High School. He earned his bachelor's degree in health and physical education at Western Carolina. In 1982 Cardano received his master's in education administration and supervision from Bowie State College in Maryland. His wife's name is Gloria. Cardano has two sons - Christopher and Anthony.



PAUL WIGGIN

PERSONNEL CONSULTANT

In almost five decades as a player, coach and administrator in the National Football League, Paul Wiggin has been closely linked with the success of several teams.

In his role as a Vikings Personnel Consultant, Wiggin works with the department that is responsible for the evaluation all NFL players and advance scouting of the Vikings' upcoming opponents.

Wiggin first joined the Vikings in 1985 as defensive line coach in Bud Grant's final season as head coach. Wiggin coached the Vikings linemen from '85-91 under Grant and head coach Jerry Burns. He oversaw a line that featured future Hall of Fame DE Chris Doleman and All-Pro DT Keith Millard, who posted 21.0 and 18.0 sacks respectively in 1989, earning Millard NFL Defensive Player of the Year.

Wiggin's career included head coaching jobs at his alma

mater, Stanford, from 1980-83 on a team that included John Elway and Darrin Nelson. From 1975-77 Wiggin was head coach of the Kansas City Chiefs. His coaching career started in 1968 with the San Francisco 49ers defensive line.

As a standout DE for the Cleveland Browns from 1957-67, Wiggin never missed a game, playing in 146 straight. He earned Pro Bowl starts in 1965 and '67 and was named to the Browns all-time team. In 2008 he was inducted as a Cleveland Browns Legend, honoring the top players in franchise history. A 2-time All-America at Stanford, Wiggin was inducted to the College Football Hall of Fame in 2005. He has bachelor's and master's degrees from Stanford.

A native of Modesto (CA), Wiggin attended Manteca Union High. He and his wife, Carolyn, have three children and eight grandchildren.



JERRY REICHOW

PERSONNEL CONSULTANT

Jerry Reichow has seen the growth and development of the Minnesota Vikings with a front row seat since the team first took the field as a raw expansion outfit.

A standout player on the debut Vikings team in 1961, Reichow has worked over four decades with the team in a variety of personnel roles.

Reichow's eye for talent has played a key role in the success of the franchise and he has worked with all seven head coaches in Vikings history.

Reichow began in the Vikings front office in 1966 as Director of Player Personnel. He moved on to be Director of Football Operations in 1975 and Assistant General Manager, National Scouting in 1992. Reichow was a key contributor to the Vikings draft process throughout his career and the team developed a reputation for finding talent hidden in late rounds of the draft.


Originally joining the team in 1961 in a trade from Washington, Reichow played 1961-64 for the Vikings. He led the team in receiving in 1961 and '62, joined Hugh McElhenny in '61 as the first 2 Pro Bowlers in team history and his 11 TD catches '61 stood as the team record until Cris Carter broke it in 1995.

Reichow entered the NFL as a 4th-round pick in 1956 by Detroit, helping the Lions to the 1957 NFL title. Reichow was the 1955 Iowa Hawkeyes MVP. He left school as the school record holder in total offense and played in the Shrine Bowl and Senior Bowl as a senior. On the hardwood, Reichow helped the team to the Final Four in 1955.

A native of Decorah, IA, Reichow and his wife, Carolyn, have three children.



Jerry Reichow began working for the Vikings in 1966 after playing from 1961-64 and is in his 5th decade with the club in 2016.



BUD GRANT

CONSULTANT

Bud Grant holds a prominent place in the history of the Vikings franchise but also in the state of Minnesota. An icon of the sport and the team, Grant and the Vikings were synonymous for his 18 seasons as head coach of the club.

Grant retired as the winningest head coach in team history following the 1985 season, capping a career that would be honored with induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1994, making him the first person inducted into Canton and the Canadian Football Hall of Fame (1983). Grant's place among the giants of the game is marked by an NFL career regular season record of 158-96-5, winning 11 division titles and making 12 playoff berths in his 18 seasons leading the Vikings, capped with 4 Super Bowl berths. Grant won 290 total games in the NFL and CFL. Adding to his many honors throughout his career, the City of Minneapolis re-named a street adjacent to the new Vikings stadium as Bud Grant Way on December 1, 2014 and Grant was honored by the State of Minnesota when September 2, 1984 was declared Bud Grant Day. Grant's CFL coaching legend was immortalized in 2014 when a statue of him was unveiled at Winnipeg's new football stadium.

Grant's coaching career began in the CFL in 1957 with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers. Grant moved to the sideline for 10 seasons (1957-66) immediately after retiring as a player for the Blue Bombers from 1953-56 where he played both ways as a WR/DB and was a Western Conference All-Star 3 times. As a coach in Canada, Grant led Winnipeg to the Grey Cup 6 times, winning the title 4 times- 1958, '59, '61, '62.

During a playoff game against Saskatchewan, Grant snared 5 INTs to set a pro football record for a game. He entered pro football as a 1st-round draft pick with the Philadelphia Eagles

where he played for 2 seasons in 1951-52, ranking 2nd in the NFL in receiving in 1952. Grant had a 203-yard receiving day against the Dallas Texans in 1952 that still ranks as the 4th-best day in Eagles history. He was the 2nd-leading receiver in the NFL in 1952 before moving on to Winnipeg for the final 4 seasons of his pro football playing career.

Despite his many connections to Minnesota, Grant is a native of Superior, WI and graduate of Superior High. Upon graduation in 1945 he enlisted in the Navy and spent his basic training at Great Lakes Naval Station in Chicago where he played on a base football team coached by fellow Hall of Famer Paul Brown. Grant enrolled at the University of Minnesota where he would be a 3-sport standout in football, basketball and baseball, garnering 9 total varsity letters with the Gophers. He twice earned All Big Ten honors in football (1948, '49), was recognized as the team MVP and captain in both football and basketball for the Gophers, earning team MVP in basketball in 1948 and football in 1949. In 1950, Grant was honored as the Minnesota Athlete of the Half Century. He was sought after as a pro athlete, being drafted in the 1st round of the 1950 NFL draft, #14 overall, by the Philadelphia Eagles and also by the NBA's Minneapolis Lakers. He won a pair of NBA titles with the Lakers in 1950 and '51 before turning to football where he played in 1951 and '52 for the Eagles.

The Grant family is prominent in Minnesota in many areas. The patriarch of the Grant family, Bud's wife of 59 years, Pat, passed in the spring of 2009. Grant has 6 children, 19 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren, all of which live in the Minnesota area.



FRED ZAMBERLETTI

CONSULTANT - TEAM HISTORIAN

Fred Zamberletti has a long and storied history with the franchise and has had a hands-on role in building of the Vikings franchise with an expansion club in 1961 to a team that has become ingrained in the fabric of life of the Upper Midwest. Zamberletti had a streak being on hand for 1,049 consecutive Vikings games, dating to the start of the franchise in 1961, snapped in 2011 at Washington, but he bounced back to start a new streak the following week in the 2011 finale vs. Chicago.

Zamberletti has earned the respect and trust of countless players and staff during his tenure with the Vikings. In his time with the team Zamberletti has been a friend, brother, father figure and mentor to countless players, coaches and co-workers. When the team held Fred Zamberletti Day on December 20, 1998 before kickoff of the Vikings-Jacksonville Jaguars game, over 100 Vikings alumni turned out to celebrate with him. To the media he's known as "Trainer for Life." Former head coach Bud Grant acknowledged him as the "Cornerstone of the Vikings" and former General Manager Mike Lynn referred to Fred as "Mr. Viking." The players with respect and admiration refer to him as "The Man." To his friends and compatriots he is known as "The Voice of Reason." Zamberletti was the Head Trainer from 1961-98, Coordinator of Medical Services from 1999-2001 and currently Senior Consultant.

A successful entrepreneur and a man of deep religious beliefs, Zamberletti was a 1st Lieutenant in the U.S. Infantry. Following his graduation from the University of Iowa he served as chief physical therapist at Hibbing General Hospital in 1959 and head athletic trainer at the University of Toledo in 1960 before joining the Vikings at the team's inception in 1961.

Zamberletti is a native of Melcher, IA, and in addition to numerous professional awards he was inducted into the Minnesota Athletic Trainers Hall of Fame and was chosen Professional Athletic Trainer of the Year in 1986 by the Drackett Company of Cincinnati. He and the Vikings staff earned the 1996 NFL Athletic Training Staff of the Year. In 1999 he earned the Cain Fain Award at the NFL Physicians Sports Sciences Symposium and is an Honorary Fellow of the Minneapolis Sports Medicine Center.

Recognized by the governor as an Honorary Ambassador of the State of Minnesota, Zamberletti has also received Minneapolis' Honorary Citizen Award. In 2011, Zamberletti was recognized by his alma mater, the University of Iowa, with the Distinguished Alumni Award.



Dreesen is responsible for the team that activates Vikings naming rights, founding partners, and team/club sponsorships. They work collaboratively across all departments in the club and MSFA to make ideas come to life. 

In December 2010, after the Metrodome roof collapsed, the Vikings were forced to relocate all fans and play their final home game at the University of Minnesota stadium. In 2013 his team relocated 50,000+ Season Ticket Members to the UofM for the 2014/2015 in preparation for the opening of U.S. Bank Stadium in 2016.

Huebner joined the Vikings after 12 years with the Minnesota Twins where he was in various sales positions and spent the final two years as the Director of Sales. VIKINGS ORIGINAL STARTING LINEUP

The Vikings have seen the NFL change dramatically over the years. The players who started the upset win over Chicago in the 1961 opener were a mix of future stars and aging veterans who were embarking on a new adventure with the NFL's fledgling franchise. The team started veteran signal-caller George Shaw instead of rookie phenom Fran Tarkenton, a footnote in history to Tarkenton's Hall of Fame career. Tarkenton came off the bench late in the 1st quarter to spearhead the Vikings to a win over the same Bears club that posted a dominating 30-7 win only two weeks prior in a preseason game played in Cedar Rapids, IA.

Tarkenton threw 4 TD passes and hit on 17-of-23 for 250 yards. The Vikings opened the scoring in the game with a Mike Mercer FG. Tarkenton connected with Bob Schnelker on the 1st TD pass of his career on a 14-yard toss. Tarkenton went on to throw TDs to Jerry Reichow from 29 yards, Hugh McElhenry from a yard out and ran for a 3-yard TD himself on a QB keeper. He rounded out the day with a 2-yard TD pass to Dave Middleton, and the upstart Vikings notched a 37-13 win.






U.S. Bank Stadium will cut an impressive figure against the downtown Minneapolis skyline and serve as the state-of-the-art home of the Minnesota Vikings beginning in summer 2016.

The most unique design feature of U.S. Bank Stadium will have fans thinking they are sitting outdoors, even on a cold Minnesota afternoon. The 248,000-square foot ethylene-tetra-fluoro-ethylene (ETFE) roof provides a compromise of an open-air stadium. The transparent material that makes up 60% of the stadium's roof is designed to let light in but is lighter and more economical than glass. The material will allow fans to experience an outdoor view in a climate-controlled environment.

The design of the roof is built to withstand even the worst winters Minnesota has to offer. The downward slopes that go east and west and north to south allows the stadium's roof to shed snow in a timely fashion. The material combined with the natural heat rise from the inside of the building helps the snow melt and shed off the roof into diverters along the edges of the roof.



Vikings fans won't have to look far from the field in order to catch instant replays at U.S. Bank Stadium. The stadium boasts two of the best-positioned LED video boards in the NFL. Located in both the east and west end zones, the video boards have been strategically placed as low as possible to eye level to ensure fans can simply shift their eyes from the field to the boards without head movement.

It will be hard for Vikings fans to not notice the video boards as soon as they enter the stadium. The larger of the two boards - manufactured by Daktronics in Redwood Falls, Minn. - measures 120x68, or 8,160 square feet. Placed on the west side of the stadium just beyond the five large pivoting glass doors, the board is 13 times larger than the Metrodome video boards.

DUNGY, FAVRE ENTER PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

A pair of 2016 Pro Football Hall of Fame inductees have strong Vikings ties and earn their busts in the hallowed ground of Canton, Ohio on August 6. The following night, the 2016 NFL season will kick off with the Hall of Fame game between the clubs that Dungy and Favre are most recognized with- Indianapolis and Green Bay.

Tony Dungy has a long history with Minnesota, beginning as a QB for the Golden Gophers from 1973-76 and eventually on to serving as Defensive Coordinator for the Vikings from 1992-95. The 1993 Vikings ranked #1 in total defense and the 1994 squad finished #1 in rush defense during Dungy's tenure. Dungy was tabbed by Tampa Bay to take over as head coach in 1996 after he had solidified his reputation as an innovative coach with great leadership skills during his 4 seasons with the Vikings. Dungy would go on to lead the Buccaneers out of decades of futility to make them a contender and later lead Indianapolis to the Super Bowl XLI crown. Dungy inherited a Tampa Bay club that had suffered 10+ losses in 12 of the previous 13 seasons before his arrival in 1996. In his 6 seasons with the Bucs he took the club to the playoffs 4 times. He went on to coach Indianapolis from 2002-08, winning 12+ games in each of his final 6 seasons and became the 1st African-American head coach to win a Super Bowl. His combined regular season and playoff record as a head coach was 148-79.

Brett Favre built his Hall of Fame career with the Vikings fierce Division rival Packers from 1992-2007 but played one of his finest seasons with the Vikings in 2009. The ironman of QBs, Favre played in 299 consecutive games and re-wrote the NFL record book during his career. He was a 3-time NFL MVP (1995, '96, '97), played in a pair of Super Bowls and won the title in Super Bowl XXXI to cap the 1996 campaign. An 11-time Pro Bowler, he played 20 seasons in the NFL with Atlanta, Green Bay, NY Jets and Vikings. Favre had 71,838 yards, 508 TDs, had 62 games over 300 yards and had a 186-112 record as a starter in the regular season. Favre's 107.2 passer rating in 2009 with the Vikings was the highest of his career and he threw his 500th career TD pass with the Vikings in 2010.





HISTORY

VIKINGS LORE

FRANCHISE FOUNDED – Minnesota was granted an NFL franchise at the league owners' meetings in Miami on Jan. 28, 1960. The team began play in 1961. The founding group consisted of Max Winter, E. William Boyer, H.P. Skoglund, Ole Haugsrud and Bernard H. Ridder Jr.

ROSE NAMED GENERAL MANAGER – In August 1960, former Los Angeles Rams Public Relations Director Bert Rose was named the team's first General Manager.

TEAM NICKNAMED – In one of his first moves with the team, Bert Rose recommended the nickname "Vikings" to the Board of Directors. The name was selected because it represented both an aggressive person with the will to win and the Nordic tradition in the upper Midwest.

FIRST COLLEGE DRAFT – On Dec. 27, 1960, RB Tommy Mason of Tulane was taken with the 1st overall choice and the first-ever draft pick utilized by the Vikings. Also selected that year were QB Fran Tarkenton (3rd round) and DB Ed Sharrock (5th round).

FIRST HEAD COACH – Norm Van Brocklin was selected as the first head coach in franchise history on Jan. 18, 1961. He retired as a player in 1960 after 12 seasons in the NFL as a Hall of Fame QB who led Philadelphia to the NFL title in his final season on the field in 1960. Known as "The Dutchman" his tenacious style was infamous as a player and coach.

EXPANSION DRAFT – Following the 1960 season, the Vikings were allowed to select 3 players from the roster of each team after each team was allowed to protect 30 of their 38 players.

Dallas, a 1960 expansion team, was exempt from this process. Among the future Vikings stalwarts selected in the Jan. 26, 1961 Expansion Draft were OL Gray Alderman (Detroit) and RB Hugh McElhenry (San Francisco).

ASSIGNED CONFERENCE – On April 12, 1961, the NFL assigned the Vikings to the Western Conference. Minnesota joined Baltimore, Chicago, Detroit, Green Bay, Los Angeles and San Francisco in the conference.

TRAINING CAMP OPENS IN BEMIDJI – The fledgling Vikings opened their debut training camp on the campus of Bemidji State University on July 7, 1961.

FIRST GAME – In the first game in franchise history, the Vikings played the Dallas Cowboys in a preseason game in Sioux Falls, SD, on Aug. 5, 1961. The Cowboys defeated the Vikings, 38-13.

FIRST HOME GAME – The Minnesota Vikings played the Los Angeles Rams in preseason action at Metropolitan Stadium in Bloomington, MN, on Sept. 10, 1961, the team's first game in the Twin Cities. The Rams defeated the Vikings, 21-17.

FIRST REGULAR-SEASON GAME – In a stunning upset, the Vikings defeated the Chicago Bears, 37-13, at Metropolitan Stadium in the Vikings' first NFL regular-season game on Sept. 17, 1961. Kicker Mike Mercer scored the first points in team history with a 12-yard field goal. Bob Schnelker scored the team's first touchdown on a 14-yard pass from Fran Tarkenton. In his NFL debut Tarkenton came off the bench to complete 17-of-23 passes for 250 yards and 4 touchdowns.

FIRST PRO BOWLERS – On Jan. 14, 1962, RB Hugh McElhenry and WR Jerry Reichow became the first Vikings to compete in the Pro Bowl. They were part of the Western Conference All-Stars who beat the Eastern Conference squad, 31-30, at the Los Angeles Coliseum.

FIRST ALL-PRO – In 1963 RB Tommy Mason, who was the team's first ever draft choice, was the first Vikings player to earn All-Pro recognition. He was a consensus pick after rushing for 763 yards and 7 touchdowns on 166 carries (4.6 avg.).

FINKS HIRED – On Sept. 11, 1964, Jim Finks was named the team's second general manager, succeeding Bert Rose, who resigned in June, 1964. Finks previously had served as general manager for Calgary of the Canadian Football League for 7 years.

FIRST WINNING SEASON – Minnesota won its final 3 regular-season games in 1964 to achieve the first winning season in team history with an 8-5-1 record. The Vikings tied for 2nd in the NFL Western Conference behind the Baltimore Colts.

MET EXPANDED – A new grandstand was constructed on the east side of Metropolitan Stadium that increased capacity from 41,200 to

47,200. The new seats were formally dedicated on Aug. 20, 1965, when Minnesota played Philadelphia in a preseason game.

NFL RE-ALIGNED – On Dec. 2, 1966, Minnesota, Chicago, Detroit and Green Bay were chosen to make up the newly-formed Central Division of the Western Conference of the NFL.

VAN BROCKLIN RESIGNS – After compiling a 29-51-4 record while leading the Vikings in their first six years of existence, Head Coach Norm Van Brocklin resigned in Feb. 11, 1967. His best season was 1964, when he led the team to a tie for 2nd place in the NFL Western Conference with an 8-5-1 record.

TARKENTON TRADED – On March 7, 1967, QB Fran Tarkenton is traded to the NY Giants for a 1st and 2nd-round choice in 1967, a 1st-round choice in '68 and a 2nd-round choice in '69. With the picks Minnesota selected Clinton Jones and Bob Grim in '67, Norm Vary in '68 and Ed White in '69.

GRANT NAMED HEAD COACH – Bud Grant was named the 2nd head coach in Vikings history on March 10, 1967. He came to Minnesota after leading the Winnipeg Blue Bombers to 4 Grey Cup titles in 10 years as head coach.

FIRST DIVISION TITLE – On Dec. 15, 1968, the Vikings defeated the Philadelphia Eagles, 24-17, at Franklin Field then retired to the dressing room to listen to the Chicago-Green Bay game on the radio. Minnesota needed the Bears to lose to clinch the Vikings' 1st Division title. Chicago tried to rally from a 28-10 4th quarter deficit but eventually fell 28-17.

FIRST PLAYOFF GAME – On Dec. 22, 1968, in the first playoff game in franchise history, the Colts defeated the Vikings, 24-14, in the Western Conference Championship Game at Baltimore's Memorial Stadium. Minnesota trailed 21-0 in the 4th quarter. The Vikings rallied but fell short.

SECOND DIVISION TITLE – On Nov. 27, 1969, the Vikings shut out Detroit, 27-0, at Tiger Stadium to clinch the franchise's 2nd division title. The victory over the Lions was the 10th of a 12-game win streak, the longest in NFL in 35 years. Minnesota finished the season with the NFL's best record (12-2) of '69.

FIRST PLAYOFF WIN – On Dec. 27, 1969, in the first NFL playoff game in Minnesota, the Vikings came from behind to defeat the LA Rams, 23-20, in the Western Conference Championship Game. Minnesota overcame deficits of 17-7 at halftime and 20-14 in the 4th quarter for the franchise's 1st postseason win.

FIRST NFL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME – The Vikings defeated the Browns, 27-7, in the NFL Championship Game on Jan. 4, 1970, at Metropolitan Stadium. Minnesota became the 1st modern NFL expansion team to win an NFL Championship Game. The Vikings dominated the game, leading 27-0 at one point.

FIRST SUPER BOWL – On Jan. 11, 1970, the Vikings lost to Kansas City, 23-7, in Super Bowl IV at Tulane Stadium in New Orleans. Not only was the game the 1st Super Bowl in franchise history, but it was the 1st Super Bowl played by a modern expansion team.

AFI-NFL MERGER LEADS TO RE-ALIGNMENT – In January 1970 the modern NFL was divided into the American Conference (AFC) and National Conference (NFC) with an Eastern, Central and

Western Division in each Conference. Minnesota is assigned to the NFC Central with foes Chicago, Detroit and Green Bay.

THIRD DIVISION TITLE – On Dec. 5, 1970, the Vikings defeated the Bears, 16-13, at Metropolitan Stadium to clinch their 3rd straight division title. Minnesota hosted San Francisco in a divisional playoff game but lost, 17-14. For the 2nd consecutive season, the Vikings had the league's best record with a 12-2 mark.

FOURTH DIVISION TITLE – On Dec. 11, 1971, the Vikings defeated the Lions, 29-10, at Metropolitan Stadium to clinch their 4th-straight division title. Minnesota finished the year with an 11-3 mark, which tied Dallas for the league's best record in '71. The Vikings lost to the eventual Super Bowl champion Cowboys, 20-12, in a divisional playoff game at Metropolitan Stadium.

PAGE NAMED NFL'S MVP – In 1971 Alan Page became the first defensive player to be named the Most Valuable Player of the National Football League by the Associated Press. Page headed a Vikings defense that held opponents to fewer than 10 points a game to lead the league in scoring defense for the 3rd consecutive year.

VIKINGS RE-ACQUIRE TARKENTON – On January 27, 1972 the Vikings traded Norm Snead, Bob Grim, Vince Clements and a 1st-round choice in '72 and '73 to the NY Giants for Fran Tarkenton.

BOYER DIES – On February 19, 1973 E. William Boyer passed away. He was one of the prime forces in the drive to bring an NFL franchise to Minnesota. Boyer was president of the Vikings from 1960-64 and sat on the Board of Directors for the first 12 years of the team's existence. He was replaced on the team's Board of Directors by his son-in-law Jack Steale.

FIFTH DIVISION TITLE – The Vikings began the '73 season with 9 straight victories and clinched the NFC Central championship before they even lost a game. Minnesota clinched the division crown by defeating Detroit, 28-7, at Metropolitan Stadium on Nov. 11, 1973. The Vikings finished with a 12-2 mark, which tied for the best record in the league that year.

SECOND SUPER BOWL – On Jan. 13, 1974, the Vikings played in the 2nd Super Bowl in franchise history against the Miami Dolphins at Rice Stadium in Houston, TX. The Dolphins prevailed, 24-7. Minnesota earned the trip to Super Bowl VIII by defeating Dallas, 27-10, in the NFC Championship game.

FINKS RESIGNS – After the 1973 season, Executive Vice President and General Manager Jim Finks resigned. Under Finks, who was hired in 1964, the Vikings won 5 division titles and appeared in 2 Super Bowls. He also hired Bud Grant as head coach in '67.

SIXTH DIVISION TITLE – On Dec. 1, 1974, the Vikings clinched the NFC Central crown by defeating the Saints, 29-9, at Metropolitan Stadium, while the Packers lost, 36-14, at Philadelphia. Minnesota tied for the best record in the NFC with a 10-4 mark.

THIRD SUPER BOWL – The Vikings played in their 2nd straight Super Bowl, losing to the Pittsburgh Steelers, 16-6, at Tulane Stadium in New Orleans on Jan. 12, 1975. Minnesota earned a trip to Super Bowl IX by defeating the Los Angeles Rams, 14-10, at Metropolitan Stadium on Dec. 29, 1974.

FRONT OFFICE CHANGES – In the spring of 1975, Max Winter, one of the team's founders and its president since 1965, took over active management of the franchise. In addition, Mike Lynn, who was hired as an assistant to the president on Aug. 15, 1974, was named the team's general manager.

SEVENTH DIVISION TITLE – The Vikings clinched their 3rd straight NFC Central title and their 7th division championship in 8 years on Thanksgiving Day Nov. 27, 1975, when the Lions lost to the Rams, 20-0. Minnesota won 10 consecutive games to start the season and finished the year with the best record (12-2) in the NFL. The Vikings were upset, 17-14, in the divisional playoffs at Metropolitan Stadium on Dec. 28, 1975, when the Dallas Cowboys scored on a last minute 50-yard touchdown pass.

TARKENTON NAMED LEAGUE MVP – Quarterback Fran Tarkenton was named the NFL's Most Valuable Player for 1975 after leading the Vikings to the league's best record (12-2). He led the NFC and finished 2nd in the NFL in passing with a 51.7 rating. He completed 273-of-425 passes for 2,994 yards and 25 TDs with 13 INTs.

HAUGSRUD DIES – Ole Haugsrud passed away on March 13, 1976. He was one of the prime forces in the drive to bring an NFL franchise to Minnesota. Haugsrud sat on the Board of Directors for 16 years of the team's existence. He was replaced on the team's Board of Directors by his widow Margaret Haugsrud.

EIGHTH DIVISION TITLE – The Vikings clinched their 4th consecutive NFC Central championship and their 8th division title in 9 years by defeating the Packers, 17-10, at Milwaukee County Stadium on Nov. 21, 1976. Minnesota finished the season with the best record in the NFC at 11-2-1.

FOURTH SUPER BOWL – The Vikings played in their 3rd Super Bowl in 4 years against the Oakland Raiders at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, CA, on Jan. 9, 1977. Minnesota lost, 32-14. The Vikings earned a trip to Super Bowl XI by defeating the Rams, 24-13, at Metropolitan Stadium on Dec. 26, 1976, in what ended up being the last Vikings playoff game at the Met.

KAPLAN NAMED TO BOARD – In 1977 team attorney Sheldon Kaplan was named to the Vikings Board of Directors. He replaced Bernard H. Rider, Jr., who was one of the team's 5 founders.

NINTH DIVISION TITLE – The Vikings clinched the NFC Central crown on the season's final weekend by defeating the Lions, 30-21, in Detroit on Dec. 17, 1977. Minnesota wrapped up its 5th straight NFL Central title and its 9th division crown in 10 seasons.

FOURTH NFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME – On Jan. 1, 1978 the Vikings played Dallas in their 4th NFC Championship Game in 5 years at Texas Stadium. Minnesota lost 23-6 to the Super Bowl champs.

CHANGES ON BOARD – John Skoglund and Vikings General Manager Mike Lynn were named to the team's Board of Directors replacing Margaret Haugsrud and H.P. Skoglund, who was one of the team's founders and passed away on November 5, 1977. Haugsrud joined the board in 1976, replacing her husband Ole, who passed away.

10TH DIVISION TITLE – Despite losing in the regular-season finale to the Raiders, 27-20, on Dec. 17, 1978, at Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum, the Vikings captured the NFC Central title when the Packers, who played at the same time as Minnesota, lost to the Rams, 31-14, at the LA Coliseum. It was the Vikings' 6th straight NFC Central crown and their 10th division championship in 11 years.

METRODOME GROUND BREAKING – In December, 1979, ground was broken for construction of the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome in downtown Minneapolis. The stadium, designed to house both the Vikings and Twins, was scheduled to open in April, 1982.

11TH DIVISION TITLE – Minnesota clinched its 7th NFC Central title in 8 years by defeating the Browns, 28-23, at Met Stadium on Dec. 14, 1980. It also was the Vikings' 11th division title in 13 seasons. Minnesota lost to the NFC Champion Eagles, 31-16, at Veterans Stadium on Jan. 3, 1981 in the divisional playoffs.

WINTER PARK OPENS – On May 15, 1981, the Vikings moved into a new facility in Eden Prairie that houses the team's offices, locker room and practice fields. The complex was named "Winter Park" after Max Winter, one of the Vikings

founders who served as the team's president from 1965-87.

FAREWELL MET – On Dec. 20, 1981, the Vikings hosted the Chiefs in Minnesota's final game at Metropolitan Stadium. The Vikings lost, 10-6. The final points at the stadium were scored on a 33-yard field goal by Minnesota kicker Rick Danmeier. The last Vikings touchdown at Met Stadium was scored on a 6-yard run by Ted Brown against Green Bay on Nov. 29, 1981.

METRODOME OPENS – The Vikings played their 1st game at the Metrodome in a preseason matchup against Seattle on Aug. 21, 1982. Minnesota prevailed, 7-3. The 1st touchdown in the new facility was scored by Joe Senner on an 11-yard pass from Tommy Kramer. The 1st regular-season game in the Metrodome was the 1982 opener on September 12, when the Vikings defeated Tampa Bay, 17-10. Ricky Young scored the 1st regular-season touchdown in the facility on a 3-yard run in the 2nd quarter.

12TH PLAYOFF APPEARANCE – In a strike-shortened 9-game 1982 season, the Vikings won 3-of-their-last-4 regular-season games to earn a post-season berth.

FIRST DOME PLAYOFF GAME – On Jan. 9, 1983, the Vikings defeated Atlanta, 30-24, in a 1st-round game that was the 1st playoff matchup in the Metrodome. Minnesota lost to the eventual Super Bowl Champion Redskins, 21-7, in the NFC semi-finals at RFK Stadium on Jan. 15, 1983.

GRANT RETIRES – On Jan. 27, 1984, Bud Grant retired as Head Coach of the Vikings. In 17 seasons Grant led Minnesota to 12 playoff appearances, 11 division titles and 4 Super Bowls. His career regular-season record was 151-87-5 (632).

STECKEL HIRED – Les Steckel, who was an offensive assistant with the Vikings for 5 seasons, was named the 3rd head coach in franchise history on Jan. 29, 1984. Steckel, who came to the Vikings in 1979 after working as an assistant with the 49ers, was the youngest head coach in the NFL in '84 at age 38.

GRANT RETURNS – On Dec. 18, 1984, Bud Grant was re-hired as head coach. He replaced Les Steckel who guided the team in 1984 after Grant retired following the 1983 season.

GRANT RE-RETIRES – On Jan. 6, 1986 following the 1985 season, Bud Grant retired as head coach of the Vikings. He originally retired after the 1983 season but returned in '85. At the time of his retirement he was the 6th winningest coach in NFL history with 168 career wins, including playoffs. In 18 seasons he led the team to a 158-96-5 regular-season record.

BURNS HIRED – Longtime Vikings assistant coach Jerry Burns was named the 4th head coach in team history on Jan. 6, 1986. He served as the Vikings offensive coordinator from 1968-85, when the team won 11 division titles and played in 4 Super Bowls.

TARKENTON ENSHRINED – On Aug. 2, 1986, Fran Tarkenton became the 1st player who spent the majority of his career with the Vikings to be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. He retired following the 1978 season with then NFL career records for passing yards (47,003), completions (3,686) and touchdown passes (342). He led the team to 6 NFC Central titles, 4 NFC Championship Games and 3 Super Bowls.

13TH PLAYOFF APPEARANCE – Despite a strike replacement unit that saddled the Vikings with 3 losses, the team made the playoffs as a wild-card entrant with an 8-7 record in 1987. It was the team's 1st postseason appearance under Jerry Burns, who was in his 2nd season as the Vikings head coach.

FIFTH NFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME – The Vikings played the Redskins in the NFC Championship Game on Jan. 17, 1988, at RFK Stadium. Trailing 17-10, the Vikings drove to the Redskins' 6-yard line with a little over a minute left in the game but failed to get the ball into the end zone. Minnesota upset New Orleans, 46-10, at the Superdome and San Francisco, 36-24, at Candlestick Park in the first 2 rounds of the playoffs to earn a trip to the conference title game.

BOARD ADDS MEMBERS – Four people were added to the Vikings Board of Directors in 1988. Joining Max Winter, John Skoglund, Jack Steele, Sheldon Kaplan and Mike Lynn were Wheelock Whitney, Jaye Dyer, Irwin Jacobs and Carl Pohlad. **PAGE ENSHRINED** – On July 30, 1988, Alan Page became the 2nd player who spent the majority

of his career with the Vikings to be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Drafted by Minnesota in the 1st round in 1967, Page made the Pro Bowl 9 times. In 1971 he became the 1st defensive player to be named the NFL's Most Valuable Player by Associated Press. Page played on teams that won 10 NFC Central titles and played in 4 Super Bowls.

14TH PLAYOFF APPEARANCE – The Vikings won 6-of-their-last-7 games in 1988 to earn a wild-card berth into the playoffs. Minnesota finished with an 11-5 record then defeated the Rams, 28-17, on December 26 in a first-round playoff game at the Metrodome. The Vikings fell the following week to eventual Super Bowl winner San Francisco at Candlestick Park.

REMAINING FOUNDER LEAVES BOARD – In 1989, Max Winter, the last of the original 5 Vikings' founders on the team's Board of Directors, left the board. He also served as the team's president from 1965-87. He was replaced on the board by Gerald Schwalbach.

WALKER ACQUIRED – On Oct. 12, 1989, the Vikings acquired Herschel Walker from Dallas for Issiac Holt, David Howard, Darrin Nelson, Jesse Solomon, Alex Stewart, a 1st-round choice in 1992, conditional 1st-round choices in 1990 and '91, conditional 2nd-round choices in 1990, '91 and '92, and a conditional 3rd-round choice in 1992. The final result of the trade gave the Vikings Walker, a 3rd (Mike Jones), 5th (Reggie Thornton) and 10th-round choice (Pat Newman) in 1990 and a 3rd-round choice (Pat Newman/Reed), while Dallas received all 5 players, a 1st, 2nd and 6th-round choice in 1990, a 1st and 2nd-round choice in 1991 and a 1st, 2nd and 3rd-round choice in 1992.

12TH DIVISION TITLE – The Vikings captured their 12th division title since 1968 by defeating the Cincinnati Bengals, 29-21, at the Metrodome in a Monday night game on Christmas Day in 1989. It also was Minnesota's 15th postseason appearance in the past 22 years. The Vikings finished the season with a 10-6 record but lost to eventual Super Bowl Champion San Francisco, 41-13, at Candlestick Park in the divisional playoffs on Jan. 6, 1990.

HEADRICK NAMED TEAM PRESIDENT – On Jan. 1, 1991, Roger Headrick became president and CEO of the Vikings. He replaced Mike Lynn as the person in charge of day-to-day operations of the club. In addition Headrick and Philip Maas replaced Jack Steele and Sheldon Kaplan on the board of directors.

BURNS RETIRES – On Dec. 3, 1991, Jerry Burns announced his retirement effective at the end of the season. In 6 seasons as Head Coach of the Vikings, Burns compiled a career record of 52-43 (.547). He also led Minnesota to 3 playoff appearances, including a division title and an NFC Championship Game.

CHANGES ON BOARD – On Dec. 16, 1991, the team's ownership structure was reorganized. Irwin Jacobs and Carl Pohlad sold their shares to a group consisting of Vikings President/CEO Roger Headrick, John Skoglund, Jaye Dyer, Philip Maas, Mike Lynn, Wheelock Whitney, James Binger, Bud Grossman, Elizabeth MacMillan and Carol Sperry.

GREEN NAMED HEAD COACH – On Jan. 10, 1992, Dennis Green was named the 5th Head Coach in team history. He came to Minnesota after turning around a struggling Stanford University football program as head coach there from 1989-91.

13TH DIVISION TITLE – On Dec. 20, 1992 the Vikings defeated the Steelers, 6-3, at Three Rivers Stadium to earn the franchise's 13th division title. It also was Minnesota's 16th playoff victory since 1968. Dennis Green also posted the most victories (11) and the 1st division title by a 1st-year head coach in team history. The Vikings lost to the defending Super Bowl champion Redskins, 24-7, in a 1st-round playoff game.

17TH PLAYOFF APPEARANCE – In 1993, for the first time since 1974, the Vikings won their final 3 regular-season games to earn a Wild-Card playoff berth. It was the team's 17th postseason appearance since 1968. Minnesota lost to the Giants, 17-10, in Giants Stadium in a first-round playoff game on Jan. 9, 1994.

MOON ACQUIRED – On April 14, 1994 the Vikings traded a 4th-round draft choice in 1994 and a 3rd-round draft choice in 1995 to the Houston Oilers for quarterback Warren Moon, who has

thrown for more yardage and touchdowns as a professional than any other player. He set team season records for passing yards (4,264) in '94 and for completions (377) and touchdown passes (33) in '95.

GRANT ENSHRINED – On July 30, 1994, Bud Grant was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. He coached the Vikings from 1967-83 then again in '85. During his tenure Minnesota made the playoffs 12 times, won 11 division titles and played in 4 Super Bowls. Grant was the first person to be elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame and the Canadian Football League Hall of Fame.

14TH DIVISION TITLE – On the final day of the 1994 regular season, the Vikings defeated the 49ers, 21-14, in a Monday night game to earn their 2nd NFC Central title in 3 seasons and their 3rd straight playoff berth. It also was Minnesota's 14th division title and 18th postseason appearance since 1968. Dennis Green became only the 7th NFL coach to lead his team to the playoffs in his first 3 seasons.

FINKS ENSHRINED – Former Vikings General Manager Jim Finks was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 25, 1995. During his decade with Minnesota, the team won 5 division titles and appeared in 2 Super Bowls. Finks passed away on May 8, 1994, and was inducted posthumously, represented by his family.

WINTER PASSES AWAY – Max Winter, who served as the owner and President of the Vikings from 1965-87, passed away on July 26, 1996. He was one of the prime forces bringing an NFL franchise to Minnesota and was a big factor in the building of the Metrodome and attracting Super Bowl XXVI to the Twin Cities.

19TH PLAYOFF APPEARANCE – On Dec. 15, 1996, the Vikings defeated the Buccaneers, 21-10, in the Metrodome. After a Washington loss to Arizona later that day, Minnesota was guaranteed a playoff berth for the 19th time since 1968 and the 4th in 5 seasons under Dennis Green. The Vikings lost, 40-15, at Dallas in a first-round game on Dec. 28, 1996.

20TH PLAYOFF APPEARANCE – On Dec. 21, 1997, the Vikings beat the Colts in the regular season finale to reach the playoffs for the 20th time in team history and the 5th time in 6 seasons under Dennis Green. The Vikings went on the road and came back from 16 points down to defeat the NY Giants 23-22 at the Meadowlands on Dec. 27, 1997. It was the biggest comeback win in team playoff history and the 5th biggest postseason comeback in NFL history. The following week the Vikings lost, 38-22, to the San Francisco 49ers at 3Com Park in the Divisional Playoffs on Jan. 3, 1998.

KRAUSE ENSHRINED – On Aug. 1, 1998, Paul Krause was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Krause played free safety with the Vikings from 1968-79 and the Redskins from 1964-67. He holds the NFL record for career interceptions with 81. Krause was selected to 8 Pro Bowls in his 15-year career.

BOARD AGREES TO SELL – On July 3, 1998, the Minnesota Vikings 10 owners voted unanimously to accept the bid of Texas businessman B.J. "Red" McCombs to purchase the Vikings.

NFL APPROVES McCOMBS – On July 28, 1998, the NFL owners unanimously approved Red McCombs' purchase of the Vikings, finalizing the change of ownership from the 10 previous owners to sole ownership by McCombs.

GREEN CONTRACT EXTENDED – Head Coach Dennis Green received a 3-year contract extension on September 5, the day before the 1998 opener vs. Tampa Bay.

VIKINGS 15 WINS BEST IN TEAM HISTORY – The Vikings won their 15th NFC Central Division title in 1998 and became only the 3rd team in NFL history to go 15-1 through the regular season with their 26-16 win at Tennessee in the regular season finale. The Vikings also established a new NFL scoring record with 556 points, breaking the mark of 541 set by the 1983 Redskins.

SIXTH NFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME – The Vikings hosted Atlanta in the 6th NFC Championship game in franchise history with a berth in Super Bowl XXXIII on the line. The teams played to a 27-27 deadlock during regulation, forcing the game to overtime where the Falcons claimed a 30-27 win. It was the first NFC Championship game played in the Metrodome.

22ND PLAYOFF APPEARANCE – The Vikings turned their 1999 season around, winning eight of the final 10 games to finish 10-6 and host a 1st-round playoff game vs. Dallas. Robert Smith set a team post-season record with 140 rushing yards in the 27-10 win over the Cowboys. The Vikings fell 49-37 to eventual Super Bowl XXXIV champion St. Louis in the Divisional Round at the TWA Dome.

CARTER NAMED MAN OF THE YEAR – Kris Carter was honored as the first recipient of the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award for civic involvement, charity work and displaying high character on January 29, 2000, in a ceremony during Super Bowl week in Atlanta. The award was re-named after Payton, a Hall of Fame running back who died in 1999.

SMITH BREAKS TEAM RUSHING RECORD – Robert Smith surpassed Chuck Foreman's 20-year-old career rushing record in the team's 28-16 win at Chicago (10/15/00). Smith ended his career with 6,818 yards. He also established a new team record with 1,521 rushing yards on the season and held the team record with 29 career 100-yard games at the time of his retirement.

40TH ANNIVERSARY TEAM ANNOUNCED – The Vikings celebrated their 40th season of NFL football in 2000, highlighted by a luncheon on November 30 to introduce the Vikings 40th Anniversary Team. That night the Vikings topped Detroit 24-17 and Kris Carter caught his 1,000th pass on a 4-yard TD from Daunte Culpepper. Carter was only the 2nd player in NFL history to record 1,000 career receptions.

16TH DIVISION TITLE – The Vikings overcame every critic's expectations in 2000 to post an 11-5 regular-season record, win the franchise's 16th NFC Central title and made the 23rd playoff appearance in team history, ending in the 7th NFC Championship game at Giants Stadium.

YARY ENSHRINED – On August 4, 2001, Ron Yary was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Yary played 14 seasons with Minnesota and played in 4 Super Bowls and 7 Pro Bowls during his career.

TICE REPLACES GREEN – On January 4, 2002, Mike Tice replaced Dennis Green on the sideline for the Vikings. Tice coached the 2001 regular season finale at Baltimore. Green assembled a 97-62 regular season record at the helm of the Vikings. Green led the team to 4 NFC Central Division titles and twice played in the NFC Championship game. Green's teams made the playoffs in 8 of his 10 seasons.

TICE NAMED HEAD COACH – On January 10, 2002 Mike Tice was named the 6th Head Coach of Vikings history. Tice is the 3rd of the 6 Vikings Head Coaches to be promoted from within the team's coaching ranks but is the 1st Head Coach to have played for the Vikings.

NFL RE-ALIGNS – The 2002 season marked the re-alignment of the NFL as the League expanded to 32 teams when the Houston Texans joined as an expansion franchise. The NFL re-aligned into 8 divisions of 4 teams each. The Vikings moved into the newly-formed NFC North after years in the NFC Central.

VIKINGS LEAD NFL IN RUSHING – The 2002 Vikings led the NFL in rushing for the first time in team history with 2,507 yards for the season, an average of 156.7 yards per game. The team also established an NFL mark by becoming the 1st team to make a successful 2-point conversion to win a game when Daunte Culpepper scored on a 2-point run with :05 remaining in the game

to give the Vikings a 32-31 win at New Orleans on December 15, 2002. Culpepper proved to be a dangerous runner himself in 2002, setting team records for attempts (106), yards (609) and rushing TDs (10) by a QB.

VIKINGS OFFENSE RANKS #1 – The 2003 Vikings became the 1st squad in franchise history to finish the season with the #1 ranked offense in the NFL, averaging 393.4 yards per game and scoring an average of 29.0 points per game.

ELLER ENSHRINED – On August 8, 2004, Carl Eller was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Eller, the Vikings career sacks leader, was a member of the vaunted Purple People Eaters defense.

WILF FAMILY TAKES OWNERSHIP – An investment group led by brothers Zygmunt and Mark Wilf were unanimously approved as the new owners of the Vikings by their fellow NFL owners on May 25, 2005. The Wilfs, owners of a real estate development company in New Jersey, took ownership in mid-June from former owner Red McCombs, who had owned the club since 1998. Joining the Wilfs ownership group is cousin Leonard Wilf, Reggie Fowler, David Mandelbaum and Alan Landis.

CHILDRESS TAKES THE HELM – The Vikings named Brad Childress the 7th head coach in the history of the franchise on January 6, 2006. Childress comes to the Vikings after seven seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles, spending the 2002-05 seasons as offensive coordinator.

THE VIKINGS UNVEIL NEW UNIFORMS – The franchise made the most dramatic change to its uniforms in the history of the team during the 2006 offseason. The team unveiled the new uniforms before an enthusiastic crowd at Mall of America on April 27, 2006.

VIKINGS SEND A LINEMEN TO PRO BOWL – The 2006 Vikings strong play along the defensive and offensive lines was recognized league-wide as C Matt Birk, G Steve Hutchinson, DT Kevin Williams and DT Pat Williams all earned Pro Bowl honors.

ROOKIE RUNS TO RECORDS – In only his 5th NFL game, rookie RB Adrian Peterson broke the team record for rushing yards in a game with 224 at Chicago (10/14/07). Three weeks later he topped that by setting the NFL single-game rushing record with 296 yards vs. San Diego (11/4/07). He went on to lead the NFC in rushing with 1,341 yards, was named All-Pro, NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year, started in the Pro Bowl and took home game MVP honors.

SOLID 7 EARN PRO BOWL TRIPS – The Vikings sent 7 players to Hawaii for the Pro Bowl, the most to earn the honor since the 2000 season. The team was represented by C Matt Birk, G Steve Hutchinson, 5 Darren Sharper, FB Tony Richardson, DT Kevin Williams, DT Pat Williams and RB Adrian Peterson.

BLOCKBUSTER TRADE LANDS ALLEN – The Vikings struck a deal with Kansas City to trade 2007 NFL sack leader DE Jared Allen to the club for the Vikings 1st-round (#17) pick in the 2008 Draft, a pair of 3rd-round picks in 2008 and a swap of 6th-round choices.

ZIMMERMAN ENSHRINED – On Aug. 2, 2008, T Gary Zimmerman was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Zimmerman started all 108 games he played for the Vikings.

VIKINGS CLAIM FIRST NFC NORTH TITLE – The Vikings rattle off 9 wins in their last 12 games to capture their 1st division title since 2000 and the team's 1st NFC North Championship since the NFC Central was realigned in 2002. The Vikings hosted a playoff game for the 1st time since 2000.

PETERSON LEADS NFL IN RUSHING – Second-year RB Adrian Peterson set a team record with 1,760 yards rushing to become the 1st-ever Viking to lead the NFL in rushing. Peterson broke the 100-yard barrier 10 times during the season and became just the 5th player in NFL history to rush for more than 3,000 yards in his 1st 2 seasons (3,101).

RUSHING DEFENSE DYNASTY – The Vikings became the first defense since the 1970 merger to rank No. 1 in the NFL against the run for 3 straight years. Minnesota gave up just 76.9 yards per game to lead the league.

VIKINGS LOSE FOUNDING FATHER – One of the Vikings original stockholders and most-adamant supporters, Don McNeely passed away in March of 2009. In addition to his role in helping build

the Vikings tradition, McNeely was revered as one of Minnesota's great philanthropists. McNeely was an ardent supporter of the arts and also donated large gifts to the Minnesota State Fair, St. John's University, the Warner Nature Center and the Como Conservatory.

McDANIEL ENSHRINED – G Randall McDaniel was inducted in the Pro Football Hall of Fame on August 8, 2009. McDaniel started 12 consecutive Pro Bowls (1989-2000), 202 consecutive games and missed only 2 games his entire career after being a 1st-round pick by the Vikings in 1988.

FAVRE SIGNS WITH VIKINGS – A long-time nemesis, Brett Favre signed with the Vikings on August 18, 2009. Favre went on to have the best statistical season of his career, throwing for 4,202 yards, 33 TDs and 7 INTs with a 107.2 passer rating, while also setting the NFL record for consecutive games started, a mark formerly held by Vikings legend Jim Marshall.

BACK-TO-BACK DIVISION TITLES – The Vikings finished the regular season with a 12-4 mark to capture its 2nd consecutive NFC North title. It marked the first time Minnesota achieved the feat since 1977-78.

HARVIN NAMED ROOKIE OF THE YEAR – Rookie WR/KR Percy Harvin burst on the scene and earned Associated Press Offensive Rookie of the Year and was also named Pro Football Weekly/PFWA Offensive Rookie of the Year and Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Year. Harvin set team records with 2,081 all-purpose yards and 2 TDs on kick returns, while sharing the NFL rookie lead with 60 receptions for 790 yards. He earned a Pro Bowl berth as a return man.

10 VIKINGS EARN PRO BOWL BERTHS – The Vikings led the NFL and tied a team record with 10 players earning Pro Bowl honors. The unit featured 4 players who made their 1st Pro Bowl-Heath Farwell, Bryant McKinnie, Sidney Rice and Percy Harvin. They were joined by Brett Favre, Steve Hutchinson, Adrian Peterson, Jared Allen, Kevin Williams and Antoine Winfield.

EIGHTH NFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME – The Vikings traveled to New Orleans in the 8th NFC Championship game in franchise history for a chance to play in Super Bowl XLIV in South Florida. The teams played to a 28-28 tie in regulation, forcing the game into OT where the Saints hit a 40-yard FG in the extra period to claim a 31-28 victory.

RANDLE ENSHRINED – DT John Randle was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on August 7, 2010 following a 14-year career, including 11 years as a Vikings (1990-2000). He was named to NFL Team of the Decade for the 1990s and led or tied for the team lead in sacks 9 times in his 11 Vikings seasons.

FRAZIER REPLACES CHILDRESS AFTER 10 GAMES – Defensive Coordinator/Asst. Head Coach Leslie Frazier took over coaching the team after 10 games in 2010 when Brad Childress was replaced. Frazier won his 1st game as Interim Head Coach on 11/28/10 at Washington.

ROOF COLLAPSE CAUSES CHAOS TIC 2010 – Heavy snows and inclement weather caused the Metrodome roof to collapse in the early morning hours of December 12, 2010, forcing the final 2 home games of the 2010 season to be moved from the facility. The Vikings played host to the NY Giants in Detroit at Ford Field on 12/13 and the club's final home game was played at the University of Minnesota's TCF Bank Stadium, a Monday Night Football contest against Chicago on 12/20. The team had a road game against Philadelphia postponed due to weather from Sunday night, 12/26, to Tuesday night, 12/28.

50 GREATEST VIKINGS CAPS 2011 SEASON CELEBRATION – Vikings legends reunited for a celebration of the storied history of the Vikings' franchise during a weekend of activities leading up to the Monday Night Football game versus Chicago on December 20, 2010. The team unveiled the 50 greatest Vikings and they were inducted to fans at halftime of the snowy game at TCF Bank Stadium. The snowy atmosphere was fitting and marked the first outdoor home game for the Vikings since the 1981 Met Stadium game on 12/20/81, 30 years to the day.

FRAZIER NAMED HEAD COACH – After serving as Interim Head Coach for the final 6 games of the 2010 season, Leslie Frazier was named the Head Coach on Monday, January 3, 2011, the day after the 2010 regular season finale. Frazier posted a 3-3 mark in the interim role and during

trying times as the team lost its home field due to a weather-related collapse of the Metrodome.

MADIEU WILLIAMS NAMED NFL MAN OF THE YEAR – On Feb. 6, 2011 Vikings 5 Madieu Williams became only the 2nd Vikings player, joining Cris Carter, to earn Walter Payton Man of the Year honors from the NFL.

ALLEN BREAKS TEAM SACK RECORD – DE Jared Allen had one of the best seasons for a pass rusher in NFL history in 2011. Recording 22.0 sacks, Allen broke Chris Doleman's team record of 21.0 sacks in a season and fell just 5 sack short of the NFL's single-season sack record.

SPIELMAN NAMED GENERAL MANAGER – On January 3, 2012, Rick Spielman was named the team's General Manager. He had previously been the Vikings Vice President of Player Personnel from 2006-2011.

DOLEMAN ENSHRINED – DE Chris Doleman was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 3, 2012 following a 15-year career, including 10 with the Vikings. His 150.5 sacks was ranked fourth all-time in the NFL at the time of his retirement.

NEW STADIUM DEAL APPROVED – In May 2012, a bill for a new Minnesota Vikings stadium was passed through the Minnesota legislature and signed by Governor Mark Dayton. Funded by the Vikings, the State of Minnesota, and the City of Minneapolis, the new stadium will be located on the current Metrodome site. Ground was broke for the stadium in December of 2013.

PETERSON POSTS EPIC SEASON – Adrian Peterson had a season for the ages, coming back from a severe knee injury at the end of 2012 to set a franchise record and post the 2nd-best rushing season in NFL history with 2,097 yards. Peterson broke Robert Smith's Vikings career rushing mark in the 1st game of the season. Peterson went on to become only the 3rd Vikings player to earn Associated Press MVP honors for his efforts along with AP Offensive Player of the Year, 1st-Team All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors.

TURNAROUND EARNS PLAYOFF BERTH – The Vikings rebounded from a 3-13 mark in 2012 to go 10-6 and earn a Wild Card Playoff berth in 2013, the biggest single-season win improvement in team history at +7.

CARTER ENSHRINED – WR Cris Carter was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 4, 2013. Carter holds the Vikings career receptions, yards and TDs records. Carter was a 4-time All-Pro and 8-time Pro Bowler during his 16 NFL seasons.

VIKINGS HOST REGULAR SEASON HOME GAME IN LONDON – The Vikings played the 1st regular season game in franchise history outside of the United States in a 34-27 win over Pittsburgh at London's Wembley Stadium in the International Series on September 29, 2013. The Vikings had previously played a preseason game at Wembley in 1983 against the St. Louis Cardinals.

ROOKIE CORDARRELLE PATTERSON SETS UNBREAKABLE RECORD – In only his 7th career game, rookie WR/KR Cordarrelle Patterson tied an NFL record for the longest play in league history and set the mark for longest KO return with his 109-yard TD vs. Green Bay on Oct. 27, 2013. The only other 109-yard play came in 2007 against the Vikings at Mall of America Field when Antonio Carmartie returned a Vikings missed FG 109 yards for a score.

GROUND BREAKING ON NEW STADIUM – Vikings ownership and management, state leaders and elected officials joined together to officially break ground on the new stadium building project on December 3, 2013.

ALL MALL OF AMERICA FIELD TEAM TEE UP – Fan voting on Vikings.com selected a 27-member team and head coach of Vikings alumni that played most of their careers with the club at Mall of America Field at HHH Metrodome.

LAST GAME IN THE DOME – After calling Mall of America Field at HHH Metrodome home for 32 seasons, the Vikings played the final game in the stadium in the 2013 season finale. Minnesota topped Detroit 14-13 to send the stadium out on a winning note.

MIKE ZIMMER HIRED AS NINTH COACH IN TEAM HISTORY – Cincinnati Bengals defensive coordinator Mike Zimmer was hired as the 9th coach in Vikings history on January 15, 2014. The veteran defensive coach comes to Minnesota with 20 seasons of NFL experience under his belt and a Super Bowl victory with Dallas.

MINNESOTA AWARDED SUPER BOWL LII AT NEW STADIUM IN 2018 – Minnesota's bid for Super Bowl LII was successful when selected on May 20, 2014 as the host community for the world-renowned event. The game itself will be played at the New Minnesota Stadium but the entire greater Twin Cities metro area will accommodate the week long festivities.

VIKINGS RETURN TO OUTDOOR FOOTBALL – On August 8, 2014 in a preseason game vs. the Oakland Raiders, the Vikings returned to the elements playing outdoors for 2 seasons at TCF Bank Stadium on the campus of the University of the Minnesota while the new Minnesota Stadium is being constructed with completion scheduled in time for the 2016 season. The Vikings went 5-3 at home in their first season outdoors since 1981.

ZIMMER ERA BEGINS WITH WIN – On September 7, 2014, Head Coach Mike Zimmer won his first game in dominating fashion beating the St. Louis Rams 34-6.

NEW MINNESOTA STADIUM SELECTED FINAL FOUR SITE IN 2019 – Announced on November 14, 2014, the iconic new Minnesota Stadium was awarded 2019 NCAA Men's Final Four to be held April 6-8, 2019. Minnesota was awarded the 2019 high profile event after a multi-year bid process.

BUD GRANT WAY UNVEILED – At an unveiling ceremony on December 1, 2014, the Vikings and the City of Minneapolis honored former Head Coach Bud Grant with a street named in his honor outside of the new Minnesota Stadium.

TINGELHOFF ENSHRINED – C Mick Tingelhoff was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on August 8, 2015. Tingelhoff played in 240 consecutive games and didn't miss a game in his 17-year career. Tingelhoff was a 7-time All-League selection and was named to 6 consecutive Pro Bowls. As a part of Tingelhoff's enshrinement, the Vikings will play the Steelers in the Hall of Fame Game scheduled for August 9. It will be the 4th time the Vikings have participated in the Hall of Fame Game.

ZIMMER CAPTURES 1ST NFC NORTH TITLE – The Vikings closed the 2015 regular season with 3 straight wins, including a 20-13 victory over the Packers at Lambeau Field in the finale on Jan. 3, 2016. The road win secured Minnesota's 1st NFC North title since 2009 and 1st playoff appearance since 2012.

ADRIAN PETERSON WINS RUSHING TITLE – For the 3rd time in his career, Adrian Peterson led the NFL in rushing yards running for 1,485 yards in 2015.

VIKINGS PLAY COLDEST GAME IN FRANCHISE HISTORY – The Vikings hosted the Seattle Seahawks on Jan. 10, 2016, in the Wildcard Round of the playoffs in the coldest game in franchise history. The temperature at kickoff was minus-6 degrees Fahrenheit with a wind chill of negative 25 with a capacity crowd at TCF Bank Stadium in the last outdoor game played in Minnesota.



Vikings fans embraced the coldest game in club history and filled TCF Bank Stadium for the Wild Card Playoff.

U.S. BANK STADIUM OPENS – Erected at the site of the Metrodome, U.S. Bank Stadium opened its doors in July of 2016. The stadium held Luke Bryan and Metallica concerts as well as an international soccer match in August of 2016.

U.S. BANK STADIUM HOSTS FIRST VIKINGS GAMES – The Vikings host the San Diego Chargers in a preseason contest played on Aug. 28, 2016 and the Green Bay Packers in the first regular season game at U.S. Bank Stadium in a primetime game on Sunday Night Football on Sept. 18, 2016.

Norm Van Brocklin - Named Vikings Head Coach on January 18, 1961...The former quarterback had retired from the NFL following the 1960 season after 12 professional seasons with the Los Angeles Rams (1949-57) and Philadelphia Eagles (1958-60)...The Dutchman led the Eagles to the NFL crown in 1960 and was the League MVP...Set an NFL record with 554 passing yards in the 1951 season opener...Threw for 23,511 yards and 173 TDs in his NFL career and played in 10 Pro Bowls...Inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1971...Coached 84 games with the Vikings with a 29-51-4 record...Went on to coach the Atlanta Falcons from 1968-73...Born March 15, 1926, in Elgin Butte, SD...Died May 2, 1983...Attended the University of Oregon where he was an All-American.

Bud Grant - Named Vikings Head Coach on March 10, 1967...Came to Minnesota following a successful coaching career in the Canadian Football League with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers, leading the team to 4 Grey Cup Championships and playing in the game 6 times...Coached the Vikings in 281 total games, retiring after the 1983 season only to be coaxed back to coach the team again in 1985 before retiring for good...Led Vikings to Super Bowl IV, VIII, IX and XI...Won 11 Central Division titles and made 12 appearances in the playoffs...Member of both the CFL and Pro Football Halls of Fame...Born May 20, 1927 in Superior, WI...Resides in Bloomington, MN...An avid outdoorsman who travels the world hunting and fishing.

Les Steckel - Named Vikings Head Coach on January 29, 1984...Coached the Vikings for the 1984 season, finishing 3-13...Served as an offensive assistant with the Vikings for 5 seasons prior to taking over head coaching duties...Came to Minnesota in 1979 after working on the San Francisco 49ers staff...Was the youngest Head Coach in the NFL in 1984 at age 38...Born July 1, 1946, in Whitehall, PA...Began his playing career at Kansas as a walk-on, playing 4 seasons for the Jayhawks as a running back...Worked for Senator Robert Kennedy's campaign as a volunteer following his 1968 graduation...Joined the Marine Corps and served as an Infantry Lieutenant, seeing combat in Vietnam...Left the service in 1972 and began his coaching career at Colorado, working with the Buffaloes from 1972-76, the US Naval Academy in 1977 and the 49ers in 1978.

Jerry Burns - Named Vikings Head Coach on January 6, 1986...Served as Vikings offensive coordinator from 1968-85, guiding the team to 4 Super Bowl berths and 11 Central Division titles...Served as Vikings Head Coach 6 seasons, 1986-91...Coached the team in 101 total games, going 52-43 in the regular season and 3-3 in the playoffs...Led the Vikings to the NFC Championship game in 1987, earning upset wins at New Orleans and San Francisco along the way before falling to the Redskins 17-10 in Washington...Won the NFC Central in 1989...Coached in 6 Super Bowls, 4 as Vikings offensive coordinator and 2 as the Green Bay Packers' defensive backs coach in Super Bowls I and II...Played QB for Michigan on the 1950 Rose Bowl team...Began his coaching career in 1951 at University of Hawaii...Head Coach at the University of Iowa from 1961-65...Born January 24, 1927...Resides in Eden Prairie, MN.

Dennis Green - Named Vikings Head Coach on January 10, 1992...Came to Minnesota after reviving the Stanford University football program, serving as Head Coach from 1989-91, the only Vikings Head Coach to come directly from the college ranks...Coached 171 total games in 10 seasons with the Vikings, leading the team to 4 Central Division titles and the NFC Championship game twice...Vikings made the playoffs 8 of Green's 10 seasons and the 1998 club set the NFL single-season scoring record at 556 points, averaging 34.8 points per game...An advocate of community involvement, Green initiated Community Tuesdays, which had players active in the Twin Cities on their day off, a concept that spread to the entire National Football League...Born February 17, 1949 in Harrisburg, PA...Named NFL Coach of the Year in 1992 by the Washington Touchdown Club and in 1998 by Sports Illustrated and the Maxwell Club.

Mike Tice - Named Vikings Head Coach on January 10, 2002 after serving as the team's coach for the final regular season game of the 2001 season...Became the 1st Vikings player to go on and serve as Head Coach...Enjoyed a 14-year NFL playing career as a TE, including 1992-93, '95 with the Vikings...Played in 177 career games with Seattle, Washington and Minnesota...Originally signed by Seattle as a rookie free agent QB in 1981...Born February 2, 1959, in Bayshore, NY...Began coaching career with Minnesota Vikings as TE coach in 1996...Coached offensive line from 1997-2001 and added title of Assistant Head Coach in 2001.

Brad Childress - Named Vikings Head Coach on January 6, 2006...Led Vikings to consecutive NFC North titles in 2008-09...Won first game with Vikings over Washington on Monday Night Football...Joined the Vikings after 7 seasons with Philadelphia, working from 2002-05 as the Eagles' offensive coordinator...Helped guide Eagles to Super Bowl XXXIX...Coached at University of Wisconsin from 1991-98...Got first taste of NFL coaching with Indianapolis Colts in 1985...Started coaching career at University of Illinois from 1978-84...Born June 27, 1956 and raised in Aurora, IL.

Leslie Frazier - Named Vikings Head Coach on January 3, 2011 after serving as Interim Head Coach for final 6 games of 2010 season, going 3-3...Finished 21-32-1 as Head Coach in the regular season...Made his first and only playoff appearance as Vikings head coach in 2012 after going 10-6...Led the team to the biggest single-season turnaround in team history and finished tied for 3rd in Coach of the Year voting...Won 1st game as interim coach at Washington (11/28/10)...Spent 2007-10 as Vikings Defensive Coordinator...The 1st Vikings Head Coach to come from a defensive background...Played for Division rival Chicago from 1981-86, starting at CB on Bears Super Bowl XX Championship team...Joined Bears as a rookie free agent in 1981 from Alcorn State...Entered NFL as assistant coach with Philadelphia in 1999...Began coaching career in 1988 at tiny Trinity College in suburban Chicago, starting the football program from the ground up as the 1st coach in program history...Part of Super Bowl winner with Chicago as a player and Indianapolis Colts as an assistant coach...Born April 3, 1959 in Columbus, MS.

Mike Zimmer - Named Vikings Head Coach on January 15, 2014...Went 18-14, including an 11-5 record at TCF Bank Stadium, in his first two seasons as a head coach...A 22-year NFL coaching veteran, had served as a defensive coordinator for the previous 14 seasons for Cincinnati (2008-13), Atlanta (2007) and Dallas (2000-06)...Has been a part of 12 playoff teams in his NFL tenure and teams that have won 8 Division titles...Coached the Cowboys DBs when the team won Super Bowl XXX over Pittsburgh after the 1995 season...His Bengals defenses since 2008 ranked in the NFL's top 10 in total defense 4 times, climbing to #3 in 2013...Had a top 7 defense 4 of the past 5 seasons with Cincinnati...Before moving to the NFL ranks, spent 15 seasons coaching at the collegiate level where he spent his final 5 seasons in the college ranks as defensive coordinator at Washington State from 1989-93...Was at Weber State from 1981-88 serving as defensive coordinator from 1983-88...Entered the coaching profession at Missouri where he served as an assistant from 1979-80...Played QB and then later LB at Illinois State...Has 3 children, son Adam and daughters Corri and Marki...Adam serves as the Vikings LBs coach...Vik, Vikki, passed in 2009...Born June 5, 1956 in Peoria, IL.







Quarterback...6' 0" 185 lbs...Georgia...18 seasons: Minnesota Vikings (1961-66, 1972-78) New York Giants (1967-1971)...Third-round pick, 1961...An instant star with 4 TD passes coming off the bench to beat the Bears 37-13 in the 1st game in franchise history vs. Chicago (9/17/61)...Dealt to New York Giants in 1967 and back to the Vikings in 1972 in stunning trades...At retirement, led lifetime NFL passers in attempts (6,467), completions (3,686), passing yards (47,003), TD passes (342)...1975 NFL Most Valuable Player...Rushed for 3,674 yards, 32 touchdowns...Led Vikings to 3 Super Bowls (VIII, IX, XI)...A 4-time All-NFL selection...Played in 9 Pro Bowls...Born February 3, 1940, in Richmond, VA...Inducted into the Vikings Ring of Honor on September 9, 1998.



HOMES OF THE VIKINGS



The Vikings played their home games for 21 seasons (1961-81) at Metropolitan Stadium. The team also played its games for 32 seasons (1982-2013) at Mall of America Field at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome. The Vikings then moved outdoors to the campus of the University of Minnesota for two seasons (2014-15) while U.S. Bank Stadium was being constructed. Ground breaking for the new facility took place in December 2013. The team begins play in U.S. Bank Stadium, located on the previous location of the Metrodome, for the 2016 season. U.S. Bank Stadium will play host to Super Bowl LII in February 2018, the 2nd Super Bowl that has been hosted by Minnesota.

The Vikings have called four stadiums "home" in their 55-year history: Metropolitan Stadium in Bloomington, Mall of America Field at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome in Minneapolis, TCF Bank Stadium on the campus of the University of Minnesota and U.S. Bank Stadium, located on the same site as the Metrodome in Minneapolis. On Sept. 10, 1961, the Vikings played their first-ever home game, a 21-17 preseason loss to the L.A. Rams at Metropolitan Stadium. Over 21 seasons the Vikings compiled a 97-59-4 record, including playoffs, at Met Stadium and possessed one of the most dominant home field advantages in professional football. On Dec. 20, 1981, the Vikings played the last game at the Met, a 10-6 loss to the Kansas City Chiefs. Capacity of the Met was 48,446 in the stadium's final year. The Vikings played their last season in the Metrodome in 2013 after the passage of a new stadium bill. The new Vikings stadium, U.S. Bank Stadium, was built on the Metrodome site with the Vikings playing their home games on the University of Minnesota's campus at TCF Bank Stadium from 2014-15.

The Vikings moved indoors in 1982 to the Metrodome in downtown Minneapolis. Seating capacity for the Metrodome was 64,134. It also featured two Sony Jumbotron replay screens and 115 private suites owned and operated by the Vikings. In 32 seasons at the Metrodome the Vikings owned a 168-92 record, which includes a 6-4 mark in NFL playoff action. The 2013 season marked the Vikings 32nd campaign of home games in the Metrodome, 11 seasons longer than the Vikings played at Metropolitan Stadium. The Metrodome had been host to many marquee sporting events, including Super Bowl XXVI, the 1987 and 1991 World Series, the 1985 Major League Baseball All-Star Game, the 1992 and 2001 NCAA Final Four basketball tournaments and the 1998 NFC Championship Game. The Metrodome also hosted NCAA Men's Basketball Regionals in 2000, 2003 and 2005.

During their two-year stay at TCF Bank Stadium, which has a capacity of 54,000, the Vikings totaled an 11-5 regular season record, giving them the highest win percentage all-time among teams in a temporary stadium and became the only team to secure a playoff berth while playing in a temporary stadium. The final game played at TCF Bank Stadium was the coldest game in Vikings history and the third-coldest game in NFL history with a kickoff temperature of minus-6 Fahrenheit.

Entering his 15th season in 2016 as the Vikings radio play-by-play voice is KFAN radio mid-day personality Paul Allen. Joining Allen as the color commentator is former Vikings LB and coach Pete Bercich.

Allen's run started as the Vikings Internet webcast play-by-play voice during the 2000 season and called one Vikings game during the 2001 season. He has become the "Voice of the Vikings."

Bercich returns for his 11th season with the broadcasts in 2016 and brings a decade of NFL experience from the field and sideline. A 7th-round draft pick by the Vikings in 1994, Bercich overcame the odds and played for the team from 1995-2000. A standout special teamer, Bercich parlayed his knowledge of the game into a coaching job with the team from 2002-05.

Joining Allen and Bercich from the sidelines will be former Vikings punter Greg Coleman. Coleman punted for the Vikings from 1978-87 and is the team's all-time leader in punts (721) and punting yards (29,391). He also ranks 2nd in punts inside the 20-yard line (154).

Entering his first season as part of the Vikings Radio Network broadcast, former Vikings LB Ben Leber will bring a new perspective to the team as he joins Coleman on the sidelines in 2016. Leber played for the Vikings from 2006-10 and has been a regular contributor to KFAN and VEN.

INTERVIEW REQUESTS: All interview requests for Minnesota Vikings players, coaches, executives or staff members should be directed to the Public Relations Department. Phone interviews should be arranged at least two days in advance and will be subject to availability. Head Coach Mike Zimmer will hold a press conference the day following games and Wednesday of a regular game week at Winter Park and will make a weekly conference call to speak with the opposing team's assembled media.

OPEN LOCKER ROOM PERIOD: The Vikings' locker room is open to accredited media during the week at scheduled times. Head Coach Mike Zimmer will address assembled media on Wednesday of a regular game week at Winter Park during this period. Television standups and live shots are prohibited during press conferences. Vikings players will also be available to the media with the assistance of Public Relations staffers of the Vikings. Players and coaches are not available for interviews on Tuesdays, the day before a game or on game day until after the game.

PRACTICE REGULATIONS: The Vikings practices at Winter Park on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday are open through individual drills to accredited media. Practices are open for filming through individual drills.

GAME CREDENTIALS: Credential requests are honored for accredited media on specific assignments and must be made through the Vikings' Public Relations Department. Credentials will not be issued to writers or photographers working on a free-lance basis unless the request is made by a recognized publication or news organization. Season-long credentials are issued in July; game-by-game credentials must be requested at least one week prior to each home game. Game day credentials may be picked up at the media entrance on the southeast side of the stadium starting three hours before kickoff.
