HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

1959

November 29 — Franchise awarded to William H. Sullivan, Jr.

December — Nine other equal owners announced, including Joseph E. Sullivan, Dan Marr, Paul Sonnabend, the late Edgar Turner, Ed McMann, Dean Boylan, Dom DiMaggio, John Ames, Jr., and the late George Sargent.

Mike Holovak becomes first executive hired as Director of Player Personnel.

1960

January—Ed McKeever named General Manager. Contest held that produced name of Patriots. Red, white and blue chosen as official colors. Lou Saban named Head Coach.

Became first professional sports club to issue public stock. William Kemble elected to represent 1600 non-voting stockholders.

July 4 — Fittingly opened first training camp at University of Massachusetts in Amherst. More than 300 players passed through camp before completion.

July 30 — Defeated Buffalo 28-7 in the first AFL pre-season game ever played.

August 14 — Presented first professional sports event ever held in Harvard Stadium, losing preseason charity contest to Dallas Texans.

September 9 — Played league's first regular season game and dropped 13 to 10 decision to Denver at Boston University Field. 21,597 fans welcomed pro football back at Boston after 11-year absence.

November 18 — Drew AFL's first sellout crowd with 27,123 for 24 to 10 loss to Houston.

1961

January — Engineered league's biggest trade to date, acquiring Babe Parilli and Billy Lott from Oakland Raiders in return for Alan Miller, the late Dick Christy and Hal Smith.

October 10 — Mike Holovak replaced Lou Saban as head coach after 2-3 start. Mike introduced shotgun quarterback system, alternating Parilli and Butch Songin each play and had 7-1-1 for rest of season, but Houston went unbeaten to clinch Eastern title by one game. Parilli took over as No. 1 quarterback for last three games. Gino Cappelletti, converted to split end, won first of five scoring titles.

1962

April — George Sargent died suddenly and his share of ownership was taken over by his brother Francis, present Lieut. Governor of Massachusetts.

A George Sargent Memorial trophy was established to go annually to Patriot player who best exemplified qualities of the deceased owner.

Forrester (Tim) Clark took over interests of John Ames.

Holovak added new staff of Asst. Coaches in Art Spinney, Marion Campbell, and Fred Bruney.

Opened home season with 34 to 21 win over Houston at Harvard Stadium before 32,276 fans, comprising a record Boston crowd up until that time. Nick Buoniconti made first start in this game.

Babe Parilli suffered broken collar-bone in 10th game when Pats were leading Eastern Division by half-game. Ultimately lost title by same margin on final weekend.

1963

Bill Sullivan elected President of AFL for first of two straight terms that were highlighted by signing of new five-year, \$36,000,000 TV contract with National Broadcasting Co.

Shifted home field to Fenway Park.

Played home opener at Boston College to complete cycle of appearing at three Greater Boston universities with large enough playing accommodations.

December 28 — Won Eastern Division title with 26 to 8 triumph at Buffalo in AFL's only division playoff in history.

1964

Lost championship game in San Diego, 51-10.

Mike Holovak named General Manager in addition to Head Coach.

Tom Addison elected first president of Players' Association.

Compiled best season's record of all time with 10-3-1 mark, but lost Division title with 24 to 14 defeat by Buffalo in final regular season game before new Boston record crowd of 38,021 in blizzard at Fenway Park.

Gino Cappelletti, who set new scoring record of 155 points that still stands, was named AFL's Most Valuable Player.

Babe Parilli was unanimous selection as All-League quarterback.

1965

Club offices moved from original site at 522 Commonwealth Ave. to 78 Lansdowne St., adjacent to Fenway Park.

Jim Nance is signed out of Syracuse.

Despite first losing season in Holovak regime, Nick Buoniconti sweeps individual honors as unanimous All-league middle linebacker and winner of both Sargent and 1776 Club awards.

1966

Rommie Loudd joins coaching staff as first member of his race to achieve that position in AFL. David H. McConnell and Robert C. Wetenhall of New York joined list of owners after purchasing interests of Dean Boylan and Dom DiMaggio.

June 8 — Merger with National Football League is announced with Bill Sullivan having served on three-man AFL committee that effected marriage.

Led Eastern Division in quest of first Super Bowl until final weekend of season when upset by Jets in New York.

Set new Boston attendance record of 39,350 for 14 to 3 win over Buffalo.

Holovak named Coach-of-the-Year; Jim Nance the AFL's Most Valuable Player; Babe Parilli Comeback-of-the-Year; and Gino Cappelletti won fifth scoring title.

1967

Mrs. George Sargent became first woman director.

Faced NFL opposition for first time by entertaining Baltimore Colts and Washington Redskins in preseason contests at Harvard Stadium.

Mike Holovak given new five-year contract as general manager and head coach.

Rommie Loudd named Director of Player Personnel, another "first" for his race.

Produced another "first" when first five games were played on road.

Fifth game was scheduled "home" opener played in San Diego (second time in year) when Fenway Park was unavailable because of Red Sox in World Series.

Despite 3-10-1 figures, set record for last-place club by placing seven players on East All-Star squad that edged West at Jacksonville, Fla.

1968

Mrs. George Sargent passed owner's interest to son Lee, a decorated Vietnam veteran.

New Directors elected included Phil David Fine, Charles J. Richardson and Bernard Baldwin.

Ed McMann resigned as Director.

Fifth annual Ecumenical Game announced for Labor Day, Sept. 2, at Harvard Stadium with Philadelphia Eagles as opponents.

Announced that scheduled "home" opener with New York Jets will be played Sept. 22 at Birmingham, Ala.

1969

A new era began when Clive Rush was hired as Vice President and Head Coach, January 30.

George H. Sauer was named the new General Manager February 12.

Training camp opened July 10 at the University of Massachusetts in Amherst, a move back to the site of the first camp.

PRESIDENT

They said it couldn't be done; they said nobody could do it after three previous dropouts . . . make a pro football team go in Boston, that is. And so, in 1959, when William H. Sullivan, Jr. of Wellesley announced proudly that he had obtained a franchise for Boston in the fledgling American Football League and would field a team in 1960, he seemed to be the only one in town who thought he could make a go of it.

Now in 1969, the Patriots are still going strong.

To overcome the early hardships and later obstacles, he called on all the knowledge he gained from his extensive previous background in sports.

That scope included a stint publicist for Frank Leahy's Boston College Sugar Bowl national champions and then on to Notre Dame with Leahy as his special secretary. Then came the service in World War II with a term as information officer at the U.S. Naval Academy.

From there, it was on to a post as Public Relations Director of the baseball Braves during their pennant-winning and attendance-setting records of the late '40's during which Bill and Jim Britt launched the Jimmy Fund.

To this, Bill added personal qualities of eternal optimism, persistence, salesmanship, vision and never flagging determination.

On the local level, the last nine happy years have seen the Pats become universally accepted as a major league outfit.

The Patriots' president has figured in many of the major steps of progress the league has taken to the top. In addition to serving two terms as president of the league, he was vitally involved in arranging the television contract with NBC that shot new life into the AFL. He also played crucial roles in pension matters, expansion and, most recently, in the merger and eventual realignment of the two pro football leagues. He was elected this year for the tenth successive time to the presidency of the Patriots.

If anybody is entitled to be Mr. President, it is Bill. He is also President of Metropolitan Petroleum Company and several associated industries.

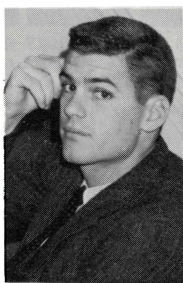
Bill has seen his 3 years of labor on pro football's merger committee come to fruition. The merger will be a reality next year with Baltimore, Cleveland and Pittsburgh becoming members of Boston's division.

Bill and his wife Mary live in Wellesley. Three of his six children, Kathy, Bill III and Pat, also reside with their parents. Son Chuck is now Captain Charles Sullivan, U.S. Army, and has been stationed in Korat, Thailand. 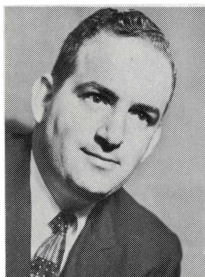

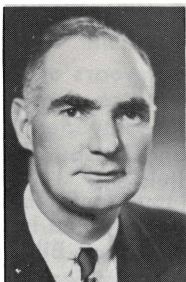
Paul Sonnabend, Vice President and Treasurer

CLIVE RUSH

**Vice President and
Head Coach**

Clive Rush came to the Boston Patriots as head coach on January 30 of this year. At that time he assumed the challenge of building a team that has won only seven games in the last two seasons, into a team that will eventually be a winning one. "We must be realistic about the future," the Pats' new head man said, "it took us six years to build a winner in New York. It will take time here too. Our immediate aim," he continued, "is to strengthen our team and our organization. That will come from hard work—and lots of it."

The 38-year-old Rush has been the top aide to Head Coach and General Manager Weeb Ewbank with the World Champion New York Jets for the last six years. He was the chief architect of the offense that led the Jets to the AFL title, the Super Bowl crown and their current spot as pro football's best.

Rush got his start in football at Miami of Ohio, a school that has probably produced more successful head coaches than any other in the nation. The impressive list of those associated with the school includes Ewbank, Paul Brown, Red Blaik, Woody Hayes, Sid Gillman, Paul Dietzel, Ara Parseghian, Johnny Pont, Jim Root, Bo Schembechler, Carmen Cozza and others.

As a varsity receiver he held as many as 14 different all-time school records. After graduating, he went with the Green Bay Packers as a receiver, defensive back and punter. He played for one year and roomed with former Pats' quarterback Babe Parilli.

Rush then began his coaching career under Hugh Devore at Dayton in 1953. He next moved to Ohio State under Woody Hayes and while he was there the Buckeyes won Big Ten titles in 1955 and 1957. They also wound up the '57 campaign by winning the National Championship and the Rose Bowl.

The Pats' new head man continued building for the future as he joined Bud Wilkinson at Oklahoma in 1958. The Sooners went on to win the Big Eight crown and the Orange Bowl. He then returned to his home state for a three year stint as head coach at the University of Toledo.

When Sonny Werblin purchased the Jets in 1963, Rush left the college ranks. He was the first man Ewbank selected for his staff when Weeb took over as the Jets' chief. He coordinated the New York offense under Ewbank and, in addition to his work with Namath, concentrated on the Jets' receivers. He gained special praise for his work with Don Maynard and George Sauer, Jr., who developed to become the highest ranked pair of receivers in pro football in statistical achievements.

On January 12 of this year, Rush reached the pinnacle of his coaching career thus far. He saw the offense he had helped to build lead the way to a 16-7 win for the Jets over the National Football League champion Baltimore Colts. His team became number one in pro football.

The Patriots' new head man is a native of Springfield, Ohio. He, his wife Jeanne, and their four children, Wendy, Jeff, Doug and Jay, now reside in Wellesley.

**George H. Sauer,
General Manager**

George H. Sauer, the new General Manager, is a native of Lincoln, Nebraska, and graduated from the University of Nebraska in 1934 where he was All-American fullback as a senior. He led the West to a 12-0 victory over the East in the 1934 Shrine East-West game, scoring both touchdowns, and was named the outstanding player of the game. He captained the college All-Stars that same year when they played a scoreless tie with the Chicago Bears. He later returned to both games as an assistant coach.

For the next three years he played with the Green Bay Packers who won the National Football League Championship in 1936.

He then came to the University of New Hampshire as the youngest college head coach in the country at that time and served at the Durham, New Hampshire, college for four years.

In March of 1942 he entered the Navy and his tour of duty included serving eighteen months aboard the aircraft carrier Enterprise, attaining the rank of Lt. Commander.

Upon his separation from the service, he became the head coach for two years at the University of Kansas which shared the Big Eight Conference title both years and went to the Orange Bowl once.

He was lured from Kansas to the Naval Academy by his former Navy commanding officer, Captain Tom Hamilton, and coached the Middies to a memorable tie with Army in 1948.

Sauer later moved to Baylor for the next eleven years serving the whole time as athletic director and six of those years as head football coach. He took Baylor to the 'Gator Bowl and Orange Bowl—and is Baylor's biggest winning coach of the modern era. The fifty-six-year-old Sauer was installed in the College Football Hall of Fame in 1954.

He began his front office professional career late in 1961 when he became general manager and assistant coach of the then New York Titans. He held those positions until 1963 when the Titans became the Jets in an almost complete re-organization. Sauer, in fact, was the only front office employee retained by the new owners, and he has served the last six years as their Director of Player Personnel.

He has been given much credit for securing virtually all the players who made up the Jets' Super Bowl champions.

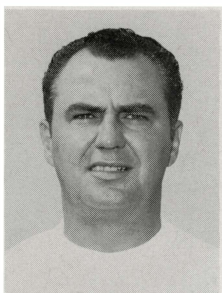

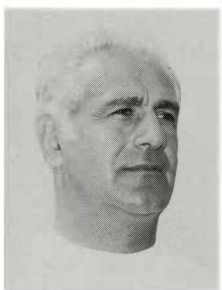

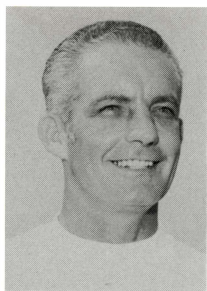
JOHN MAZUR

Defensive Backfield Coach

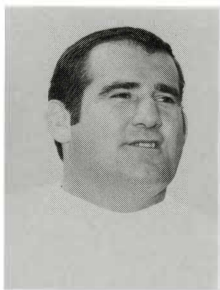

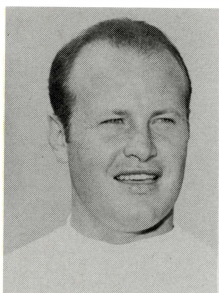

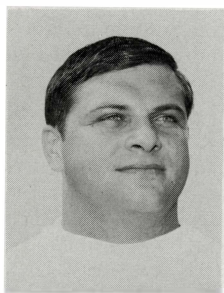

ED. NOTE: (The information below contains excerpts from a column by John Gillooly at the Boston Record American. Although the column was written over nine years ago its message is still as pertinent now as it was then. Gerry Moore has helped the Patriots become an integral part of the Boston scene in these nine years.)

He's a bit shy of six feet tall and he weighs less than 190 pounds but the Patriots yesterday signed on a man who can be of as much value to them as Gone Ron Burton, the back you see now and next see in the end zone.

The name is Gerry Moore and yesterday he was appointed director of public relations by Patriots president Billy Sullivan, who didn't wait ten days choosing his pitchman. It was Moore from the start. No one else was considered for the tub on which Moore will thump out rhythmic and expert releases.

Moore Has the Background

But I, for one, consider the Patriots downright lucky to be able to have a man of Moore's competence available. You don't find Moores too frequently. Here's the perfect prefabricated press-agent, with all the skills and the shining personality.

"I did some thinking about it, sure," said Moore, press secretary to Lt. Gov. Bob Murphy for the past three years and in a good position under the golden dome. "But I was in newspaper and associated businesses for 26 years and my enthusiasm for sports never did rub off. This is like coming home. This could be the most fantastic sports story of our time — the development of the Boston team in the American Football League and I'm fascinated to be playing a part in it."

A graduate of Boston Latin and Boston College, where he was a top scholar-athlete captaining the golf team and goal-tending for the hockey team,

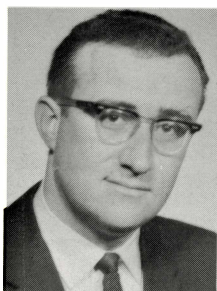
Moore began his journalistic career as a sophomore at the Heights. He was student correspondent for the Herald, working his way through at 25 cents per inch of space.

Moore did a hitch on the Transcript after graduation and then the Globe lured him. He was there 12 years and then spent three in the Navy as a lieutenant. After a year as tournament director for the PGA, he returned to the Post in 1947 and was a star sports writer, handling top assignments with a fine flourish, until that newspaper foundered in 1956.

Thereupon he joined Lt. Gov. Murphy and this little pinch of politics should be just sufficient to make him the complete diplomat. Take a veteran of the press and sprinkle him with a few flakes of politics and you have precisely what the Patriots needed, Gerry Moore, who can have just about everything he desires in this department. Indeed, should the Patriots lose a game I'll feel reluctant to say so. I'll blame it on the weather or injuries or bad luck or something.

(Moore recently was named one of the seven top all-around athletes coached by Charles Fitzgerald during the latter's tenure at Boston Latin from 1922 through 1958).

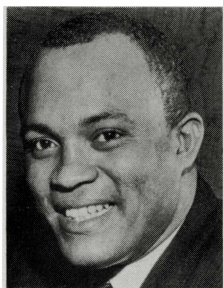


JACK NICHOLSON

Director of Player Personnel

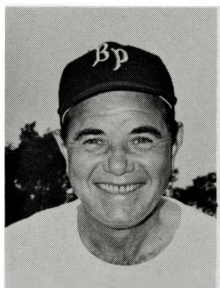

He conducted the 1969 college draft for the Pats and has spent most of the rest of this year traveling throughout the country scouting prospects from this coming season's collegiate seniors.

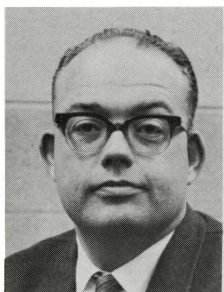
Rommie, his wife Betty and their children, Rommie, Jr. 12 and Cheryl Lynn 10, live in Taunton, Mass.

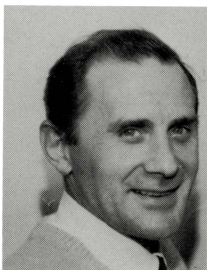
JOHN FITZGERALD

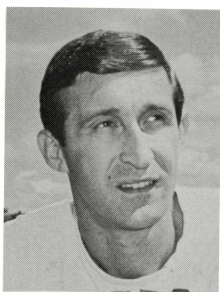

Associate Physician

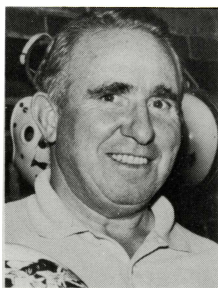

Patriots' Pre-Season Prospectus

When Clive Rush took over on January 30 of this year as the new head coach of the Boston Patriots, he offered an explanation of his move to Boston from a newly crowned World Championship team. "It took us six years of wins, losses, frustration, near misses and hard work to build a winner in New York. The challenge that was offered getting there was a special thing. Now we have another challenge here in Boston — a new and bigger one."

Rush's first assignment was to build a solid staff around him. He and Pats' President Bill Sullivan asked another of the World Champion Jets' top people, Director of Player Personnel George Sauer, to take over as General Manager. Rush brought offensive backfield coach John Mazur in from the Buffalo Bills; offensive line coach Bruce Beatty (Northwestern) and receiver coach Jerry Stoltz (Purdue) came in from the Big Ten.

Defensively, Rush tapped former Navy head coach Bill Elias as his defensive backfield coach; retained hard-nosed Jesse Richardson from the Pats' previous staff as defensive line coach; and added young John Meyer from the Houston Oilers to coach linebackers. This six man staff under Rush represents the largest in the Pats' ten years.

Boston's new head man, the most recent in a long line of successful pro coaches from Miami of Ohio, also promised changes would be made where necessary. "We'll do anything we need to in order to improve ourselves," he said, "and a complete re-evaluation of our personnel will be undertaken."

Changes came quickly. On one busy Monday afternoon, Rush made two trades within the Eastern Division — getting six players in exchange for two. Middle linebacker Nick Buoniconti went to Miami for quarterback Kim Hammond and linebacker John Bramlett; cornerback Leroy Mitchell went to Houston for another starting corner, Larry Carwell, and speedy receiver Charlie Frazier, halfback Sid Blanks and linebacker Ron Caveness.

The draft should also help. The Pats' 1969 choices added up to the biggest draft — as to the average size — in the league. A 6'3½", 236-pound norm was the case. Talent such as Ron Sellers, Mike Montler and Carl Garrett may be used immediately.

Since Clive Rush had so much to do with making the New York Jets offense go, it is not surprising to see what two positions now occupy much of his attention. "In order to have an effective offense, we must establish a number one quarterback during training camp," he said, "and if Jim Nance can come

back from his ankle operation, it will give that quarterback, his passing game and the offense as a whole, a real head start."

The Patriots opened training camp with four quarterbacks. They expect, however, to go with only two when the regular season begins. Returning will be the former Jet who opened the Pats' season in '68, Mike Taliaferro, and the surprising free agent from Penn State who finished it, Tom Sherman. Taliaferro, who was sidelined in October with a shoulder injury, played for Rush for four years in New York. He is familiar with the system. On the other hand, Sherman guided the Pats surprisingly well at times considering his lack of experience. He is a competitor.

Rush has taken further steps to strengthen the position. He is bringing in Kim Hammond from Miami. Hammond rates high as a thrower and was regarded at the time of the trade as "potentially the best backup quarterback available in the league." The fourth contender was 6'5" Onree Jackson, a rookie from Alabama A&M, who has been put on waivers. He has potential, which may be cultivated in the minors, but lacked experience.

Rush summed the situation up simply. "We have no number one quarterback at this moment and the position is open to the man who shows us the most," he said, "and all I know is that if we're going to win, we'll need a darn good man in there."

Then he spoke of the other phases of the offense. "The biggest improvements we hope we've gained would be at the wide receiver and outside running back spots," said Rush. "When we picked up Charlie Frazier from Houston we got super speed and," he added, "although Aaron Marsh was inconsistent as a rookie, he can be a good one if he wants to be." Frazier, Marsh and free agent Thomas "Glove" Richardson add a substantial long distance threat as wide receivers.

The Pats' big number one choice was All-American and all-time record breaking collegiate receiver Ron Sellers. He may move into the lineup quickly where he will offer a 6'5" passing target. "He did everything possible at Florida State," said Rush, "and we just hope things continue to work out as well for him in the pros."

Sellers will be looking for a spot along with veterans Art Graham and Gino Cappelletti and last season's surprising free agent find from Cornell, Bill Murphy, Jr. Graham will be trying to get back in stride from two injury-riddled seasons that followed his outstanding 1966 effort. That year he caught more passes than have been caught by any Pats' receiver before or since. Cappelletti, the senior citizen among the Patriots, caught a touchdown pass against

San Diego last season that made him the first AFL player in history to score more than 1000 points in his career. Rookie Murphy fought his way from the taxi squad to a starting job in last season's late stages.

The tight end spot for Boston is a solid one. Jim Whalen was an All-AFL consensus selection in '68 and led all of the circuit's tight ends in pass receiving. In the season's early stages, the talented Boston Irishman was the only consistent spark in the team's sputtering offense. Coincidentally, the rookie who may back him up this year, 6'3", 225-pound Barry Gallup, broke all of Whalen's pass catching records at Boston College.

Then there is the need for an outside running threat. First year men like Carl Garrett and Bob Gladieux should join last year's rookie R. C. Gamble and former Houston Oiler Sid Blanks in a stiff battle for the halfback spot.

"Garrett is one of those promising prospects from a small school," said General Manager George H. Sauer, who signed the high draftee for the Patriots, "who feels that just because he didn't play for a major college, it doesn't mean that he can't be as good as any major college runner."

When Garrett was signed, he said simply, "My goal is to be better than O.J. Simpson and be the rookie of the year." Gladieux is smaller than Garrett, but was chosen for his "breakaway potential and ability to catch the ball." Although he lacks blazing speed and size, he did everything well at Notre Dame.

The returning starter, 6'3", 218-pound R. C. Gamble, opened his pro career last September with a 45-yard sprint to the game winning touchdown against Buffalo. After a less than brilliant middle of the season, Gamble finished strong in the absence of Nance. The big South Carolina State speedster may also play fullback. Strong safety candidate Dennis Devlin may also get a shot as a running back.

When Rush traded for Houston's Sid Blanks, he gained an experienced running back who was runnerup for Rookie of the Year honors in 1964. "We hope he can come back to something near that form in Boston," said Boston's new head man.

From this group will come the man to team with the big man in the Boston backfield—Jim Nance. The 235-pound two-time ground gaining champ of pro football is a big key to the Pats in 1969. After two seasons that established "Big Bo" as the game's premier power runner, he injured an ankle in a pre-season game. There went the cannon, the crunch, the thunder of the Patriots' offense. Now Nance is on the mend. He hopes to be at full strength when the season gets underway.

Boston's offensive line, especially on the left side, should be beefed up from intensified competition and a couple of possible changes. Returning are six veterans who have started, two second-year men, two former Patriots who had been waived and at least four good-sized draft choices.

The starting right side of the interior wall could be pretty well set. Center Jon Morris has never failed to make the Eastern All-Stars in any year since he turned pro. Guard Len St. Jean, regarded as one of the league's strongest men, and big tackle Tommy Neville, were voted the two most underrated players on the Boston team last year. Like Morris, each has also made the Eastern All-Stars. This trio could be reaching their peak as a unit in the next couple of years.

Veterans Charley Long and Justin Canale return on the left side. Long, always looked upon as a leader by the Patriots, may be a bigger factor this season than he has been since 1966. The powerful Canale replaced Long as the starting left guard last year.

Tommy Funchess was a starter at tackle last year and progressed reasonably well for a rookie. 6'6", 270-pound Paul Feldhausen was brought up as a tackle late in the season and will probably be used to back up on both sides.

Returning from waivers, Karl Singer will get another look somewhere in the interior line. He was the Pats' first draft pick in 1965, but has yet to make it.

From this year's draft list come three hopefuls with good size. The top man is second choice Mike Montler, a 6'4", 270-pound All-American from Colorado and the U.S. Marines. Another is fifth draft choice Rick Hackley, a 6'5", 275-pound pre-season All-American from New Mexico State. The third is 6'3", 250-pound boxer, weight-lifter and six position football player Steve Alexakos of San Jose State.

There may be fewer problems to solve over on defense, where the Patriots have enjoyed most of their strength and reputation.

The defensive line has probably been the most effective single unit for the Pats over the years. The talent there has been regarded as among the best in the league, leading the AFL in defense against rushing on four different occasions. "They always gave us plenty to think about when I was in New York," said Rush.

270-pound All-League tackle Houston Antwine, end Larry Eisenhower and a rough customer who plays all four spots up front, 260-pound Jim "Earthquake" Hunt, have been together in the front wall for seven years. As the tackle duo for much of that

time, Antwine and Hunt learned to work well together. Eisenhower, known in some quarters as the "Wild Man" because of an exceptional pass rush, is hoping for full recovery from the injured knee that knocked him out of action last year.

Number one draft choice Dennis Byrd moved into this veteran unit last season. Although he began his pro career at defensive end, he had more success when he moved inside to tackle where he had played as an All-American at North Carolina State. The man drafted immediately after Byrd may move in next to him at defensive end. Used as an offensive tackle last year, 6'6", 265-pound Tommy Funchess has exceptional speed and casts a long shadow. Byrd and Funchess would give the Pats more height on the pass rush than they've ever had.

Melvin Witt played well as a replacement for the injured Eisenhower despite the fact that he saw action in only one game as a rookie the year before. Ed Toner was also called up during the season to back up Hunt and Antwine at tackle. Two big rookies will come in to vie with Witt and Toner as the Pats try to add more depth. One is 6'5", 280-pound tackle Richard Lee from Grambling. The other is 6'3", 265-pound defensive end John (Bull) Cagle from Clemson.

The linebacker competition could be the most furious in camp. There could be at least a dozen candidates going for the available spots. Last year's two returning starters are left linebacker Ed Philpott and rookie middle linebacker Jim Cheyunski. The mustachioed Philpott led the team in tackles last year and, for the most of the season, led all AFL linebackers in interceptions. Cheyunski replaced the injured Nick Buoniconti in mid-season and now that Buoniconti has been traded to Miami, the ex-Syracuse defensive captain has a shot at the whole ball of wax. "He looks like he learned fast once he played regularly," said Rush.

The Pats traded for one-time All-Star John Bramlett. "Bramlett was supposed to be inconsistent, but we feel he is one of the toughest football players available, especially on his blitzing and special teams play," Rush added.

"In the middle, we'll have Cheyunski, along with Ron Caveness," he concluded, "and with Philpott on the left will be John Robert Williamson".

Caveness, obtained in a trade with Houston, has also had experience with Kansas City and is considered a good special teams man. Ilg has been with the Pats for two seasons and, like Cheyunski, had backed up Buoniconti. Rookie George Muse has been Grambling's middle linebacker for the last three years.

Williamson, like Bramlett and Caveness, is a tested veteran who is still young. Obtained from the Raiders in a trade last year, he also centers on punts.

The trio, all acquired by trade, give the Pats good depth. 240-pound Jim Vuono of Adams State and Joseph Leasy of Alcorn A&M's national defensive champs, both defensive ends in college, are first year candidates on the outside.

The Boston defensive backfield finished near the bottom in the early years of the AFL, but has moved steadily upward since 1967. That was the year Leroy Mitchell and John Charles moved in as rookie cornerbacks. Last year more speed was drafted. Rookies like Daryl Johnson, Art McMahon, Willie Porter and John Outlaw moved in. Unfortunately, Outlaw, the fastest of them all, was injured in training camp and missed the entire season.

Johnson replaced John Charles at right corner when Charles moved to strong safety. Don Webb, the senior man and one of the league's hardest hitters, opened at free safety. After he was injured, Art McMahon took over. Leroy Mitchell enjoyed an outstanding season at the remaining spot—left corner.

Now Mitchell has gone to Houston for four players. One of them, Larry Carwell, will be at left corner. "Carwell has the potential to replace Leroy," said Rush, "and although we felt Leroy was outstanding, when we watch Carwell we see the same ability." Carwell and Johnson will be backed up at the corners by Porter and Outlaw. Another Johnson, versatile veteran Billy, has played all positions in the secondary. Other candidates are rookies Dennis Devlin of Wyoming and Clarence Scott of Morgan State, both of whom will be tried at strong safety.

Another area of concentration will be that of special teams. New men like Bramlett and Caveness will help. So will a few of the big, fast rookies drafted in the middle and late rounds. Speed has been emphasized in the drafts Boston has had in the last two years.

Last season's primary kick return man, Willie Porter, will be joined by two of the swift rookies, Outlaw and Garrett. Outlaw's 27.4 and Garrett's 24 yard averages on punt returns for a single season are among the highest in the last decade in college football.

This will probably be the youngest, biggest and fastest team the Patriots have ever fielded. But the team's effectiveness will be grounded on veterans and experience in many key areas. What faces Clive Rush and the rest of the "new look" Patriots is that every other team in the league has improved too.

"It will take a while . . . and an awful lot of hard work," said Rush as he lifted his own miniature model of the 1969 Super Bowl Trophy to admire it. "And this right here," he concluded as the glistening silver of the victor's cup held his gaze, "is what it's all about."

Highlights of last season's fine support included a trip to Buffalo to see the Pats' opening game and a sellout crowd at the Awards Dinner this year to honor Jim Whalen (Player of The Year), Houston Antwine (Unsung Player of the Year) and Tom Sherman (Rookie of the Year).

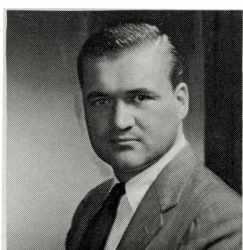
Both of these will be enlisting new members throughout the summer.

PRO FOOTBALL'S HALL OF FAME

The above display representing the Boston Patriots is among 26 such displays representing each of the 26 teams in pro football. This new series of exhibits is part of the latest addition to Pro Football Hall of Fame's Rotunda. The Hall, serving as a national pro football museum and library, is located in Canton, Ohio.

Among other significant Patriots' memorabilia now enshrined in another area of the Hall of Fame are the battle-battered helmet which former iron man defensive end Bob Dee wore for 107 straight games and the football caught by Gino Cappelletti for the touchdown that made him the first man in AFL history to score more than 1000 career points.

Once again the National Broadcasting Company will bring all the color and action of the American Football League to pro football fandom's rapidly increasing millions. The usual outstanding production and broadcasting teams are standing by to do the honors. Although the exact talent teams are subject to last minute change, from last year's lineup comes New England's own Curt Gowdy. Joining the Wellesley, Mass. resident doing play-by-play are expected to be veterans Charlie Jones and Jim Simpson and promising newcomers Jay Randolph and Bill Enis. Leading the color men are former New York Giant great Kyle Rote, former Duke All-America and Giants' tackle Al Derogatis, two other former pro football backfield stars, George Ratterman and Elmer Angsman and one-time All-AFL receiver Chris Burford.

NBC's Vice-President of Sports Carl Lindemann and Director of Sports Chet Simmons are in charge of a top staff that include game producers Lou Kusserow, Don Ellis, Roy Hammerman, Jim Marooney and Sam Kirschman. Til Ferdenzi and Curt Block handle publicity and information coordination.

Seminole ace racked up 3598 yards for all-time high . . . first team All-American as both junior and senior . . . tied another all-time record with five touchdown passes in one game (vs. Wake Forest in 1968) . . . led nation as a senior with 86 receptions for 1496 yards and 12 TDs . . . has played college football in pro-style offense . . . his head coach at Florida State, Bill Peterson, used one handed pass catching drills to improve Ron's concentration . . . "he was our leader out there", said C.U. head coach Eddie Crowder, "and he really could take charge" . . . selected to play in North-South Shrine, Hula Bowl and Senior Bowl post-season games . . . in Senior Bowl played his first game ever as a guard . . . "dominated his man all the way," said Pat's defensive line coach Jesse Richardson, "and looked like the best lineman on the field" . . . Simpson", says Garrett, "and be the AFL's Rookie of the Year" . . . a new national sports publication—Countrywide Sports—just picked Garrett as the 1969 Pro Football Draft's number one sleeper prospect . . . was 58th player picked in the overall draft . . . averaged nearly a first down a carry as a senior (8.3) . . . was first three-time Little All-American since Eddie Lebaron in the late forties . . . led nation in scoring as sophomore with 26 touchdowns . . . accounted for 418 points in college career . . . gained 3862 yards in four years as running back . . . had 7.4 yards per carry career average . . . career high of 1373 yards as a senior . . . top punt and kickoff return threat . . . averaged 24 yards per punt return . . . clocked in 9.7 for 100 yards . . . "has more killer instinct than anyone I've seen," says A&M Head Coach Marino Casem . . . 6'2", 225 pound linebacker prospect . . . top speed with 4.8 clocking for 40 yards . . . expected to add more weight . . .
