






# WILLIAM H. SULLIVAN, JR.

## PRESIDENT

Until 1959 New England had been a graveyard for more than a half dozen professional football teams. William H. "Billy" Sullivan, Jr. changed that.

On November 18, 1959, Billy was awarded the eighth franchise in the fledgling American Football League. He has made an indelible impact on the nation's No. 1 sport since that great day. He did get a team on the field.



Since starting his love affair with pro football, Billy has climbed many mountains. By undaunted determination and a boundless capacity for hard work, he kept the Patriots alive until locating the team in its present 61,279-seat Schaefer Stadium home.

Billy graduated from Boston College in 1937, served as Publicity Director there from 1938-1940. In 1941 he went to Notre Dame as special assistant to the Director of Athletics. After a hitch on the staff of the U.S. Naval Academy, he joined the Boston Braves baseball team as Director of Public Relations in 1946.

Since 1958 Billy has been President of Metropolitan Petroleum Co. and just recently was promoted as vice-president of the parent Pittston Company, one of the nation's giants in the field of energy.

# CHUCK FAIRBANKS


## GENERAL MANAGER AND HEAD COACH

Charles Leo "Chuck" Fairbanks became the sixth in a line of Patriots' head coaches when he joined the organization in the capacity of general manager-head coach on January 26, 1973.

Coach Fairbanks came to the Patriots from a remarkably successful career as a college football coach during which he led Oklahoma to a fantastic 52-15-1 record over six years.

In 1976, after three patient years of rebuilding, led the Patriots to an 11-3 record, best in the history of the franchise, and into the playoffs for the first time in 13 years where they lost a last second tilt to the eventual Super Bowl Champion. Last year the Patriots barely missed a playoff spot via a 9-5 record that upped his five year mark to 35-35.

He began his career in 1955 as a student assistant at Michigan State's spring drills. His first head coaching assignment was at Ishpeming (Mich.) High School, 1955-57, and he moved to the collegiate ranks under Frank Kush at Arizona State where he served as defensive backfield coach from 1958-61. From 1962 to 64 he was backfield coach at Houston and in '65 he was named assistant head coach under Bill Yeoman. The following year he became defensive backfield coach at Oklahoma and took over the top post in 1967.





### **Offensive Coordinator / Running Backs**



Born 4-26-48 at Macon, Ga. . . great collegiate career at Texas Southern where he was a four year starter, two time all-conference choice . . . Patriots No. 2 draft choice in '71 who had a great game in the annual College All-Star affair . . . AP defensive lineman of the week honors for leading 34-13 upset win over Miami 12-5-71 . . . UPI all-rookie team in 1971 . . . standout season in '74 in which his 7½ sacks led team . . . honorable mention UPI all-AFC, rated among top defensive linemen in NFL by Pro Quarterback Magazine . . . Foxboro Jaycees MVP for '74 season . . . to prove versatility has started at three different positions for Patriots—DE, DT and LB . . . foot injury limited his play to nine games in '75, including eight starts . . . credited with five sacks . . . in 1976 he played major role in team leading the NFL in sack differential and least scored on team in AFC-East . . . took part in more plays (875) and had more tackles (47½) than any other defensive lineman while also turning in six sacks and a dozen pressures . . . in 1977 he played major role in Patriots No. 1 ranking among AFC defensive units as he contributed 9½ sacks to the teams' NFL high of 58 (had sensational 4½ sacks in big win over Atlanta). Had 43 tackles and took part in more plays (841) than any other defensive lineman as he started all 14 games.



Born 9-20-48 at Jasper, Texas . . . three year regular at Prairie View where he played both tackle and guard . . . originally selected by Los Angeles in the supplemental draft of 1970 . . . released by Rams, he signed on with Dallas and was subsequently picked up by the Patriots prior to the '71 season and served on cab squad . . . started seven games at guard in '72 . . . moved to tackle (played both sides) in '73 and started eight games while playing in 12 games . . . underwent successful knee surgery after '73 season . . . came back strong in '74, shifted from tackle to right guard and had great year . . . in 1976 gained national attention by revealing that a can of sardines was his lucky charm, accounting for new nickname . . . played major part in team being second best rushing club in NFL, best in Patriots' history . . . played important part in team's 1977 surge to the third best rushing team in AFC, and second best in the NFL in protecting their quarterback. Has started 53 of 56 games since joining team.

led team in tackles as junior, was second as sophomore . . . Knee injury forced him to sit out entire rookie season.

High . . . won state decathlon and lettered in three sports . . . one of the best offensive players ever to play at ASU . . . played four different positions during varsity career (QB, Punter, WR, RB) . . . rushed for 1351 yards on 347 attempts (3.9 avg.) and scored 26 rushing TDs in four-year career . . . punted for last three years (145 punts, 5653 yds., 39.0 avg.) . . . caught 29 passes for 552 yards (19.0 avg.), 4 TDs . . . also team's leading passer last two seasons completing 61 of 134 (45.5 avg.) for 698 yards, 4 TDs, 7 interceptions . . . all-conference punter in 1972 . . . set Southland Conference scoring records in 1973 for one game (42 points on 7 TDs against Abilene Christian) and season (110 pts.) . . . in rookie year played 13 games as WR and special teams man, also caught longest pass of the season with 76-yarder against Dallas . . . in 1976 he was hottest receiver in training camp until knee injury interfered and forced him to miss six games . . . bounced back in 1977 and played in all but one game, principally in special teams.

Born 4-29-52 at Muskogee, Oklahoma . . . gained 1300 yards in varsity career at Kansas State as both fullback and halfback . . . teammate of QB Steve Grogan . . . led Wildcats in rushing as a junior with 608 yards (4th best in K-State history) . . . drafted on 10th round in 1974 by Buffalo . . . played in all 14 games as a rookie and first six games of 1975 before being waived by Bills . . . signed as free agent with Patriots 11/22/75 . . . played final five games for Patriots . . . earned starting assignment vs. NY Jets on 12/7/75 and rushed for 103 yards on 15 carries including 38-yard TD . . . caught longest scoring pass of season (62 yards) from Steve Grogan vs. Buffalo . . . 1976 big year for him as he contributed 721 yards (5.6 avg. best in NFL) to team's record 2948 ground yards . . . ranked as 21st best rusher in NFL, 12th in AFC . . . in late season drive towards playoff spot he had four games in a row over 100 yards including 177 against Denver, third best in club's history. Was 1976 Club "Unsung Hero" of the year . . . 1977 was his best year as a pro as he turned in 727 yards on the ground and another 152 on receiving. For second year in a row he earned the "Unsung Hero" award, this time from the Foxboro Jaycees. Ninth ranked rusher in AFC, only 18 in NFL produced more ground yardage.

# SCHAEFER STADIUM

Schaefer Stadium was built at the cost of \$6.7 million and financed through the private sale of more than 400,000 shares of stock in Stadium Realty Trust. The official ground breaking ceremony took place on Sept. 23, 1970, and 326 days later (Aug. 15, 1971) the first game was played at the new Foxboro facility in which the Patriots posted a 20-14 victory over the New York Giants before 60,423 fans.

With space to park 16,000 automobiles surrounding the stadium, the site covers an area of 15 acres and is as long as it is wide, 700 feet. In the process of excavating the bowl shape for the stadium, 250,000 cubic yards of earth were removed from the 35-foot deep hole. The J. F. White Construction Co. then used 15,000 cubic yards of concrete and 660 tons of steel to erect the stadium.

In 1976 the original Poly-Turf playing surface was removed, an entirely new drainage system installed, the field crown raised four inches, and the entire field resurfaced with a new Super-Turf carpet. Lighting is provided by three towers with 324 mercury lamps (1500 watts per), 200 candle power per square foot on the playing field.

Seating is constructed of aluminum with a capacity of 61,297. There are 5604 special box (chairs) seats, 48,710 seats on the sidelines, and 6983 end zone seats.

Through the 1977 season there have been 70 pre-season and regular season games played in Schaefer Stadium. A total of 3,745,166 fans (53,502 per game) have watched the Patriots games at Schaefer Stadium.


