



CHAIRMAN

VICTOR K. KIAM II

Victor K. Kiam II began his ownership of the New England Patriots on a high note. After Kiam and Bill Sullivan completed the transaction on October 28, 1988, the Patriots scored a dramatic 30-7 win over the Chicago Bears and presented Kiam with the game ball.

The victory spearheaded a three-game winning streak over the Miami Dolphins (home and away) and the New York Jets. After losing to the Indianapolis Colts, the team went on to beat the Seattle Seahawks and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. With Kiam as owner, the team is 6-2.

Going into his first full season as majority owner of the team, Victor is one of America's leading entrepreneurs and is president and chief executive officer of Remington Products, Inc., the only American manufacturer of electric shavers and the only leveraged buyout listed in the book **The 100 Best Companies To Work For In America**.

Mr. Kiam purchased Remington in March, 1979. In addition, he has acquired Franzus Company, a U.S.-based manufacturer of travel appliances; Remington Apparel, the second largest tie company in America; Lady Remington Jewelry, a party plan distributor of fashion jewelry; PIC Design Corp., manufacturer of precision industrial components; and Remington Rand, an office equipment and electronics company.

From 1971 to 1977, Kiam was chairman and chief executive officer of Benrus Corporation, a diversified manufacturer of industrial components and consumer products. He and his wife founded the Friendship Collection, the largest importer of jewelry, antiques and artifacts from the People's Republic of China, in 1977.

Kiam began his career as a salesman with Lever Brothers Co. in 1951. He rose to Marketing Director before joining International Latex Corporation (Playtex) as Regional Sales Manager.

He is the author of the best selling book **Going For It! How To Succeed As An Entrepreneur**, an international best seller, published in 1987. He will be publishing his second book, titled **Live To Win! Achieving Success In Life and Business**, which will include a chapter about the Patriots purchase, in November.

While football is his favorite spectator sport, Victor enjoys playing tennis. Victor, who was ranked #1 in doubles in the over-50 and over-55 senior player tennis categories, has a career highlight victory over former Wimbledon finalist Gottfried von Cramm. Now, Kiam hosts the Remington International Family Tennis Tournament, the only international sports event involving family play. The tournament is played in 15 countries including the USSR, People's Republic of China, United Kingdom and Australia and has 30,000 entrants.

On top of managing his companies and the tennis tournament, Kiam serves on the International Football League Committee, which is exploring the possibility of setting up football franchises in Europe, and the NFL Properties Executive Committee.

In addition to serving on NFL committees, Kiam has received many awards, including Man of the Year from the Massachusetts State Troopers, the Kate Smith Award for his efforts on behalf of the United States Savings Bonds program and the Humanitarian of the Year Award from the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. In previous years, he has been named 1982 National Business & Commerce Father of Year, 1987 International Marketing Executive of the Year and 1988 Northwood Institute Outstanding Business Leader Award. He holds doctor of law degrees from Hampshire College and George Washington University.

Kiam received an honorary Doctorate of Science degree in Business Administration in May at Bryant College's 126th Commencement, where he was the speaker.

Born in New Orleans on December 7, 1926, he earned his B.A. from Yale University, a Certificate of Languages from the University of Paris in 1949 and an MBA from Harvard Graduate School of Business in 1951.

The 62-year-old Kiam resides in Stamford, CT with his wife, Ellen. He has three children: Lisa Durkin, Tory and Robin.



VICE CHAIRMAN

FRANCIS W. MURRAY

There are two important dates — April 6th, 1986 and October 28th, 1988 — when talking in terms of Francis W. Murray getting together with the New England Patriots. April 6th was the date that Mr. Murray's group, NEP Partners, purchased a three-year option to buy the Patriots.

And then on October 28th of last year, the deal was completed. Mr. Murray joined with Victor K. Kiam II and William H. Sullivan, Jr. to form KMS Limited. Mr. Kiam is the majority owner of the Patriots with 51 percent, and Mr. Murray holds the other 49 per cent.

There's one more time that should be pointed to concerning the new owners of the Patriots. It was June of 1988. It was then that Mr. Sullivan, the team founder, introduced Mr. Murray to Mr. Kiam, thus paving the way for the two to share in the ownership of the team that represents the New England region.

Mr. Murray, the sole shareholder of FWM Corporation, the co-owners of the Patriots, is a 1965 graduate of the University of Pennsylvania's highly regarded Wharton School. A Philadelphia native, Mr. Murray continues to have ties with his alma mater, serving on the University's President's Council as well as being an Associate Trustee of the College.

His business career began while a student at Pennsylvania, serving as the Comptroller of a small Pennsylvania insurance company. Upon graduation, he took a management position with the financial consulting firm of Horwath and Horwath (now known as Laventhal and Horwath, a national accounting firm). He then joined Certain-Teed Manufacturing Company as an assistant to the Vice President of Finance. These activities formed the basis for his pursuit of an entrepreneurial career.

Presently, Mr. Murray is President of a private New York City investment firm that specializes in the acquisition of mid-size companies. The company has interests in firms involved in Publishing, Health Care, Chain Restaurant Development, Franchising and Real Estate.

An interesting aside to Mr. Murray's business pursuits is his involvement with the Patriots' own Doug Flutie. Mr. Murray was among the millions who watched the great Boston College vs. Miami game that culminated with the famous "Hail Mary" pass. While aware of Doug's great college career, Murray was inspired by Doug's attitude and leadership during that game.

He remembers the look on Doug's face, as captured by CBS-TV after Miami went ahead and left just 22 seconds on the clock. Doug's confidence and composure explained the outcome of the game. The fact that Mr. Murray is the owner of Flutie's Pier 17, one of New York City's busiest restaurants, explains a little bit about Mr. Murray. He considers anything possible and pursues winners, whether it's a quarterback or an entire football team.


Although he hails from Philadelphia, Mr. Murray has a solid commitment to the preservation of the Patriots for the New England region. His idea to acquire the franchise was two-fold: to succeed to its ownership and to guarantee its survival in New England. Even in his first meeting with Victor Kiam, Mr. Murray was comfortable that his new partner held the same objectives.

That done, Mr. Murray is now pursuing a goal to obtain an expansion franchise for the city of St. Louis, Missouri. In fact, the Patriots and the Seattle Seahawks play a preseason game in St. Louis this year to help showcase the city and the continuing interest the city has in the sport. If St. Louis does not obtain a franchise, he looks forward to a long and positive relationship with the Patriots through his co-ownership of the team.


Away from the business world, Mr. Murray breeds thoroughbred race horses as an avocation — something he has been doing for 15 years. He is a member of the Aronimink Golf Club in Newtown Square, Pennsylvania.

Mr. Murray and his wife, the former Patricia Anne Quinlan, have two sons — Francis Xavier and Timothy Patrick. Young Fran, a Cornell graduate, is an administrative executive with the FWM Corporation. Tim, a recent high school graduate, will attend the University of Pennsylvania this fall.

Jim Murray, Mr. Murray's brother, is the former General Manager of the Philadelphia Eagles (from 1974-83). A co-founder of the Ronald McDonald House (in 1972), Jim is President of the Ronald McDonald House International Advisory Board. He received the Ray Kroc Award for his contribution to that program.



PRESIDENT



WILLIAM H. SULLIVAN, JR.

The baton was passed from William H. 'Bill' Sullivan to the hands of Victor K. Kiam II and Francis W. Murray last October 28th as Kiam became the majority owner and Murray the minority shareholder of the New England Patriots.

But the man who founded the Patriots in 1959 is a man still very much involved. He remains as the team's president, lending his experience and expertise when and where needed — especially at the league owners meetings when important issues hit the floor.

Bill Sullivan's wish concerning the Patriots has always been a constant — to give the fans of New England a team it could be proud to call its own. And that dream came true with the meeting between the Patriots and the Chicago Bears in the New Orleans Superdome for Super Bowl XX. Another one of those cherished moments came to Mr. Sullivan on May 23rd, 1986 when Mr. Sullivan was able to hand out AFC Championship rings to the members of the Board of Directors, the coaches, the players and other team and Sullivan Stadium workers.

Prior to Mr. Sullivan starting up the Patriots, New England had been a graveyard for more than a half-dozen professional football teams, but Bill changed that. Through his untiring efforts and perseverance, Bill not only fielded a team in the newly-formed American Football League, he has guided the development of the franchise into becoming one of the most popular and competitive clubs in the NFL.

On November 18, 1959, Bill was awarded the eighth franchise in the fledgling American Football League. He has made an impact on the nation's No. 1 sport since that great day. From 1961 to 1964 he was President of the AFL and served on the television committee that authored a \$36 million contract with NBC to guarantee survival of the young league. He was a key member of the AFL's team that hammered out the merger format with the NFL.

Mr. Sullivan has served on numerous NFL committees, including the NFL Films Committee (since 1970). It was also in 1970 that he became the Chairman of the NFL Properties Committee. He is now a consultant to the NFL Properties Committee.

Since starting his love affair with pro football, Bill has traveled through many valleys and over many peaks. By undaunted determination and a boundless capacity for hard work, he kept the Patriots alive until locating the team in its present 61,000-seat Sullivan Stadium home (named Sullivan Stadium from previous Schaefer Stadium on June 29, 1983) and assumed full control of the franchise by purchasing 88 percent of the voting stock on Nov. 17, 1975 and all of the nonvoting stock on Dec. 8, 1976.

Bill graduated from Boston College in 1937 and served as Publicity Director at his alma mater from 1938-1940. Mr. Sullivan is a loyal supporter of Boston College, not only the school's fine athletic teams, but the academic environment as well. In 1941 he went to Notre Dame as special assistant to the Director of Athletics. After a hitch on the staff of the U.S. Naval Academy, he joined the Boston Braves baseball team as Director of Public Relations in 1946. During his six-year tenure with the Braves he conceived the "Jimmy Fund" that has since grown to be an internationally known cancer research program studying leukemia in children.

In 1955 he joined Metropolitan Petroleum Co. and became President of the firm three years later. He continued his rise in the corporate world 20 years later when he was named executive vice president of the parent Pittston Corporation, a position he held until his retirement from the national energy giant in the spring of 1981.

Mr. Sullivan is on the board of directors for Air Express International, the oldest air freight forwarding company based in the United States (headquartered in Darien, CT). He is also on the board of directors for Brynwood Partners, a New York City investment firm. In addition, he is on the board of the Hundred Club of Boston, which assists the families of Boston firemen and policemen as well as the families of Massachusetts State troopers and Massachusetts State Registry officers who have lost their lives while on duty. Mr. Sullivan was one of the founders — in 1960 — of the Hundred Club.

In addition, Mr. Sullivan is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Dana Farber "Jimmy Fund" and of the Sponsor's Committee of Simmons College for "Sports for Simmons." Mr. Sullivan also received an honorary Doctorate of Science degree in Business Administration from Bryant College in 1980.

Bill and his wife, the former Mary Malone, are the parents of three sons, Charles (Chuck), William H. III and Patrick, as well as three daughters, Kathleen Sullivan Alioto, Jeanne Sullivan McKeigue and Nancie Chamberlain. Mr. and Mrs. Sullivan are the grandparents of 15 children.

VICE PRESIDENT

BUCKO KILROY

Francis J. "Bucko" Kilroy has been employed in almost every conceivable capacity in the NFL as he enters his 47th year with the league. After serving four years as General Manager, he was promoted to the position of Vice President on February 16, 1983 and concentrates his efforts in player personnel and development. In that capacity, he continues to stress his highly regarded scouting philosophy to "leave no stone unturned" in searching for talent.

Born in Philadelphia, he established himself as one of the city's premier schoolboy athletes before departing for South Bend and the University of Notre Dame. His stay there was short as he returned to his hometown to attend Temple University where he went on to become one of the greatest linemen in the school's history. For his efforts on the collegiate gridiron, Bucko was inducted into the Temple Hall of Fame in 1976.

Bucko began his NFL career with his hometown Philadelphia Eagles in 1943 and played there 13 straight seasons. During that time, he once played in 146 consecutive games (league record at the time) and was selected as an all-pro at both offensive guard (1947-49) and middle guard (1952-54). He gained additional honors for his pro grid exploits as he was elected to the NFL's all-decade team for the 1940's and inducted into the Helms Hall of Fame.


He made a gradual entry into the coaching ranks by serving the Eagles for three seasons as a player/coach before assuming the full-time role of line coach for six more NFL campaigns. In addition to coaching, he also served as the club's player personnel director, making him one of the five original talent scouts in the league.

Kilroy was one of the founders — along with Phoenix Cardinals owner William V. Bidwell — of the National Football Scouting combine, now in its 10th year. There are 16 teams that participate in the scouting service. In addition to offering a different set of eyes for potential NFL players, the National Football Scouting combine and BLESTO, a nine-team scouting service, run the annual tryout camp for the top prospects each year in Indianapolis.

In 1962, Bucko was named Director of Player Personnel for the Washington Redskins and then moved to the Dallas Cowboys in 1965 to become a "super scout" with that organization. During Bucko's five-year tenure with the Cowboys, the team won five straight divisional championships, an indication of his impact on the team's scouting success.

Having developed a reputation as one of football's finest scouts, Bucko was named Player Personnel Director of the Patriots in 1971. He faced a monumental challenge of revamping and revitalizing a scouting operation that had shown little success in prior years. Under his direction, the Patriots' scouting department became one of the finest in the NFL and played an integral part in the Patriots' upsurge that brought them playoff appearances in 1976 and 1978.

A natural choice for the position, Bucko was appointed General Manager on April 6, 1979. In that capacity, he directed the Patriots' day-to-day business operation, was responsible for all contract negotiations and guided the implementation of a state-of-the-art computer system for the Patriots' operation. He also played an instrumental role in planning the building of a grass practice facility and an in-house film lab.



GENERAL MANAGER

PATRICK SULLIVAN

One of the finest compliments that can be given to someone in the chair of general manager of a major league sports franchise is that he is a good manager of people.

Patriots' general manager Patrick J. Sullivan, who has been the GM of the Patriots since February 16, 1983, has a unique way of handling people. He sometimes gets his point across by telling the person a joke, or a story. He sometimes gets his point across by stating it straight-on, firmly.

Either way, he is able to get the most out of his workers.

Another thing about Patrick is the fact that he's not afraid to fold up his sleeves and get to work — even if it's stuffing and sealing envelopes. Or working all night long to make sure a player's contract is completed, so that the player doesn't miss any training camp time. It makes no difference. Patrick will dig in and get the job done.



One more thing about Patrick that tells you a great deal — he is the man who named Raymond Berry the team's head coach (midway through the 1984 season). Berry is the most successful coach the franchise has ever had.

Patrick has gained the respect of players, fellow league executives and fans, alike. As the head of the Patriots' organization, Patrick has the responsibility of handling and overseeing all player contract negotiations and coordinating the day-to-day operations of the club. He also plays an active role in dealing with the public and the media (he has had his own radio talk show the last several years).

Ever since his father, William H. "Bill" Sullivan, Jr., was awarded the newly-founded AFL's eighth and final franchise in November of 1959, Patrick has been an active and important member of the Patriots' organization.

The youngest of Billy and Mary Sullivan's six children, Patrick began his Patriots' career as an eight-year-old ballboy and then spent time assisting the training staff and ticket office staff while attending Wellesley (MA) Public Schools.

Patrick graduated from the Browne and Nichols Prep School (Cambridge, MA), where he played football as a 5-10, 170 lbs. defensive lineman in 1971 and then enrolled at his father's alma mater, Boston College. While at BC, Patrick worked in the Promotions Department at Boston's WSBK-TV (Channel 38).

In 1976, he graduated with a B.S. in English and then joined the Patriots on a full-time basis.


His first full-time role with the Patriots was on the Stadium Operations staff. Less than a year later, in February of 1977, he traded in his work clothes for a jacket and tie and was named Publicity Assistant. Three months later, he returned to the Stadium Operations Department, but this time as Stadium Manager. At the age of 24, Patrick earned the responsibility for the day-to-day operation of Sullivan Stadium and the Patriots' office facility.

In April, 1979, when Bucko Kilroy was appointed General Manager to replace the departed Chuck Fairbanks, he chose Patrick to be Assistant General Manager, a position he assumed on May 18, 1979. For the next four years, Patrick assisted Kilroy in a variety of duties, including the development of a state-of-the-art computer system for the entire Patriots' operation, the installation of an in-house film lab (last year updated to a video lab), the construction of a grass practice facility and overseeing a multi-million dollar improvement program at Sullivan Stadium. Patrick also negotiated player contracts for veterans, rookie and free agents, alike—as he still does.

Patrick is also involved in many charities. He is on the board of trustees for the Mass. Chapter of the Arthritis Foundation and the Mass. chapter of the American Liver Foundation, as well as being on the board for the New England Sports Museum. He is on the Board of Directors for the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation. And he is on the Board of Overseers for the Boys and Girls Clubs of Boston as well as the Sports Tennis Club.

Born on November 23, 1952, Patrick is married to the former Lynne Massari of Hamden, CT and they are the parents of a seven-year-old son, Garrett Patrick, and twin boys, Terrance William and Kyle Louis (2½ years old). Lynne is also quite active in charities — the Patriots' Wives Organization, the Arthritis Foundation and the American Liver Foundation, among others.

HEAD COACH



RAYMOND BERRY

One of the NFL's greatest all-time receivers, Raymond Emmett Berry has done a very impressive job during his time of pacing the Patriots' sideline as head coach.

In the four and a half years he has been the team's head coach (he was named on October 25th, 1987), Berry has mustered the finest winning percentage (.606) in the club's history. In putting together a 43-28 record, Berry has never seen any of his teams finish below the .500 mark.

In his first two full seasons as the team's head coach, the 56-year-old Berry (born in Corpus Christi, Texas on February 27, 1933) did something that no one before him had ever done—take the team to back-to-back playoff berths. In 1985, the Patriots journeyed all the way to Super Bowl XX as a wildcard team. In order to reach the Super

Bowl, New England went out and won three playoff games on the road (beating the Jets, Raiders and Dolphins, in that order)—the first time that had ever been done in the NFL. In addition, the victory over the Jets marked the first NFL playoff win for the Patriots, who came into the league in 1970 from the AFL.

Berry, the ninth coach in Patriots' history, has seen his teams go right to the wire in quest of a playoff berth the last two seasons. Last season, the Patriots finished 9-7, rebounding from a 2-4 start. The Patriots won five consecutive games (and six of seven)—including notching wins over previously-unbeaten Cincinnati and the Chicago Bears. New England was 7-1 in home contests.

The defense was especially impressive in 1988. It was fifth in the league in total defense, and third in the league in pass defense. It gave up only 13 or fewer points in seven games. Also, the Patriots were tied for the best third-down defense in the league (29.1 percentage, tied with Minnesota).

New England's running game made an impressive leap from the 1987 to 1988 season, moving from 20th in the league (118.1 average) to seventh in the league last year (132.5 average per game). It should also be pointed out that the Patriots played the second toughest schedule in the league in 1988 (opponents had a 54.2 winning percentage).

The Patriots went 11-5 in both the 1985 and 1986 regular seasons. In 1986, the record was good enough for the AFC East title. There have been only two other times that the Patriots finished with 11 wins in a season, with the others coming in 1976 and in 1978 with Chuck Fairbanks the coach each of those years (11-3 in 1976 and 11-5 in 1978).

In 1986, the Berry-coached Patriots tied the club record for consecutive wins by winning seven straight. The season prior, the Patriots had a six-game winning streak at one point. New England mustered an impressive 7-1 road record in 1986.

Before Berry came to the club as the head coach, the Patriots had always had the reputation of being a tremendously talented team—but a team that would often lose to less talented clubs. Berry changed that around by preaching a one-game-at-a-time philosophy to his players, that "we've only got one game this week, so let's concentrate on that one game" kind of talk.

It has obviously worked.

In 1988, New England had the fewest number of penalties in the league (64) and the least penalty yardage (506). Also in 1988, the team was fourth in the NFL in takeaways/giveaways with +11.

Last year, New England had the third-lowest fumbles-lost in the NFL — second-lowest in the AFC — with 10 fumbles-lost.

In 1986, the Patriots were the second highest scoring team in the NFL with 412 points. They were fourth in the league in passing with 3,954 yards. They were first in the NFL in field goals-scored with 32. They were tied for first in the league in fewest turnovers with 24. There's more—in 1986, the team was second in the league in percentage of passes completed (61.0%), was second in fewest interceptions thrown (13) and was third in the league in number of passes completed (340).

In addition, the 1986 season saw the club place third in the league for touchdowns scored via return (six), tied for second in fumbles recovered (19), tied for second in fewest touchdowns via returns allowed (six) and third in fewest touchdowns allowed via the pass (5).

The Patriots have had 18 players selected to the Pro Bowl in Berry's four full seasons. Eight of those 18 players selected came after the 1985 season (that number, eight, is the most the franchise has had in one season while in the NFL; only the Chicago Bears, the other Super Bowl participant, had more).

Berry has won a great deal of recognition for his handling of the Patriots. In 1988, he was given the Order of the Leather Helmet Award for the solid lifestyle he leads on and off the field, as chosen by the AFL Alumni Executive Committee. After the 1985 season, he was picked as the league's Coach of the Year by *College and Pro Football Newsweek* as well as the Lombardi Committee. He was on the receiving end of the AFC Coach of the Year award by UPI, the Pro Football Writers, the *Football News*, the "101" Club out of Kansas City and also won the Massachusetts State Police Junior Olympics Man of the Year.

In his first game as a head coach at any level—on October 28, 1984 at Sullivan Stadium—Raymond spearheaded the club to a win, a 30-20 verdict over the New York Jets. The Berry-coached Patriots mustered a 4-4 record and the franchise finished with a 9-7-0 mark during the 1984 season.

COACHING YEARS: Upon leaving the playing field, Raymond joined the Dallas Cowboys coaching staff for the 1968 and 1969 seasons. He then left the NFL ranks to coach collegiately at the University of Arkansas from 1970-72.

After three years with the Razorbacks (23-10-1 team record while Berry there), he returned to the NFL by serving as an assistant coach on the staffs at Detroit (1973-75) and Cleveland (1976-77) before joining Chuck Fairbanks' staff with the Patriots in 1978. When Fairbanks left the Patriots, Raymond stayed as the receivers coach on Ron Erhardt's staff until 1981.

During his four-year stint as Patriots' receivers coach, Raymond tutored the newly-emerging receiver threat, Stanley Morgan, who had been drafted in 1977, a year before Berry's arrival in New England. Since then, Morgan has become the Patriots' all-time leading receiver in terms of receptions, touchdowns and yardage.

Raymond also coached Harold Jackson, who became the NFL's third-ranked all-time reception yardage leader and the eighth top receiver in NFL history. In 1979, both Morgan (1,002) and Jackson (1,013) became the first Patriots ever to surpass the 1,000-yard receiving mark in a season. Jackson is now the Patriots' receivers coach.

In 11 years as an assistant NFL coach, teams Berry was associated with finished with a 90-70-2 record and went to the playoffs three times.

After leaving the Patriots and the NFL after the 1981 season, Raymond worked for Bald Eagle Association of Wellesley, MA, a real estate company responsible for the operation of a year-round resort in the Sugarbush area of Vermont. Upon sale of the resort a year later, Raymond became national sales manager of premium accounts for Freedom Industries, a manufacturer of such soft good items as caps and hats.

PRO PLAYING CAREER: A tireless worker and great technician, Raymond became popular as the favorite target of passing great Johnny Unitas during his 13-year career with the Baltimore Colts. When he retired in 1967, he was the NFL's leading pass receiver with 631 receptions for 9,275 yards and 68 career TDs. He played in five Pro Bowl games and was named All-Pro three times. It should be pointed out that Berry gained his incredible yardage despite being a medium-range receiver. His number of catches is presently fifth best ever in the NFL while his pass-receiving yardage is eighth best and his career TD catches rank him 15th.

Five years after his retirement (the quickest one can be voted in), he was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame (July 28, 1973).

Raymond was not known for his blinding speed (ran 40 in 4.8). He wasn't physically over-powering (187 pounds), and he didn't stand several inches taller (6-2 in height) than the defenders trying to stop him. He also had less than perfect vision; he had to wear contact lenses when he played because he was nearsighted and he had a cranky back that sometimes left his legs an uneven length.

Berry, taken in the 20th round by the Colts in the 1954 draft, used three things to become the outstanding receiver he was—unusual jumping ability, a pair of fantastic hands and a dogged sense of purpose that would allow him to become nothing less than the very best.

There have been—and there are today—many receivers who are naturally more talented than Berry. Yet few ever approached the standards of proficiency that became habit for Raymond.

He combined his dogged determination to success with a keen mind that perfected a scientific approach to the art of pass receiving that was far ahead of its time. Many of his techniques are now more or less common-place in pro football. But when Berry first started to employ his methods of preparedness, he was truly a pioneer in perfecting a specialized pro football skill.

His brightest day as a pro is also reflected in the record book. When the Colts defeated the New York Giants in the famous overtime championship game in 1958, Raymond caught a startling number of passes, 12 passes for 178 yards. Both records still hold as firm as the Rock of Gibraltar for a championship game.

In overtime—in what many consider the finest pro game ever played—Johnny Unitas again got the Colts going and again Berry provided the big catches, two of them for 33 yards as Baltimore drove to the historic winning TD (23-17 score on 12-8-58 before 64,185 onlookers).

He led the NFL in receiving in both 1958 (56 for 794 yards) and 1959 (66 for 959 yards), and also in 1960 (74 for 1,298 yards). All three years, he was an all-NFL choice and a Pro Bowl selection. In that three-year stretch, Raymond caught an amazing 196 passes for 3,051 yards and 33 TDs. Although Berry didn't lead the league in 1961, he did catch a personal single-season high of 75 passes (for 873 yards).

Naturally, because Raymond was just a 20th round draft choice by the Colts in 1954, he wasn't given much of a chance to stick, let alone make it big, when he reported for the 1955 training camp. But the Colts didn't have many good offensive ends, and Raymond caught the coaches' eyes by hustling at all times.

Raymond caught 13 passes as a rookie, but he wasn't given much of a chance to make it in Year No. 2. But his dedication was beginning to become more and more evident and he stuck for the 1956 season. That was the year that Unitas also made it as a Colt, and for the next dozen years, he and Berry would team as the most prolific pass-catch combination in pro football annals. Almost 600 of Berry's catches came with Unitas throwing the ball.

Berry retired at the age of 34 with 10 Baltimore records, including TDs in a game (3, done twice), TDs in a season (14), TDs in a career (68), most receiving yardage in a game (224 vs. Washington on 11-10-57), most receiving yardage in a season (1,298 in 1960) and most receiving yardage in a career (9,275).

Berry, who had six 100-plus games in 1960 for a Baltimore record (he had 23 in his career for another team record), is second in Colt history for most consecutive games catching at least one pass (38 from 12-28-58 to 10-1-61; Lenny Moore is tops with 43).

In his 13 years as a pro, Berry played for two head coaches—Weeb Ewbank from 1955-1962 and Don Shula from 1963-67.

Berry, it should be pointed out, had only one fumble in his pro career. He felt he cost his SMU team a berth in the Cotton Bowl his senior year because he fumbled inside the opponents' 30 yard line. He then promised himself that he would never do it again.

HIGH SCHOOL/COLLEGE YEARS: It is important to understand the beginning of the Raymond Berry story. His father, Raymond (the elder, but coach Berry is not a junior), was a very successful high school football coach in Paris, Texas for more than 30 years ("He's the finest coach I ever played for," says young Raymond). Young Raymond didn't even play as a high school regular until his senior year (caught 12 passes that year).

Raymond weighed only 153 pounds when he enrolled for a year of junior college ball at Schreiner Institute in Kerrville, Texas. There he caught 32 passes for eight TDs and earned a scholarship shot at SMU. Ironically, Berry was a better defensive player than offensive when he enrolled at SMU. He caught only five passes in a non-lettering sophomore year and then followed up with 16 catches as a junior and 12 as a senior (33 catches in his collegiate career). He scored only one TD in high school and only one in three years at SMU.

PERSONAL: Berry is active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes organization. In his years out of pro ball—1982, 1983 and part of 1984—he would often give Sunday Chapel Service to NFL teams that were visiting to play the Patriots.

Raymond and his wife, Sally, have lived in Medfield, MA, since 1978 and are the parents of a son, Mark, and two daughters, Suzanne and Ashley.

Mark is in his second year as a graduate assistant coach at Vanderbilt, where he was a member of the football team (as a wide receiver). He is working on his MBA at Vanderbilt while coaching. Suzanne is teaching in the area, having gained her diploma from Boston College. Ashley is a junior at Vanderbilt.



FOR THE RECORD...

The Patriots had their offense get within the 20-yard line 42 times in 1988. The Patriots scored TDs 24 times (57.1%), with 17 TDs via the run and seven on the pass. There were nine field goals made out of 14 attempts. There were three interceptions and one failed fourth-down attempt.

The Patriots' opponents had their offense get within the 20-yard line 41 times, coming away with 25 TDs (61.0%), with 18 rushing TDs and seven passing TDs. The opponents tried 12 field goals and cashed in on 11. There were two interceptions thrown and one failed fourth-down attempt.

ASSISTANT COACHES



DON BLACKMON Assistant Linebacker

Now in his second year as an assistant coach—after playing for the Patriots from 1981-87—Don Blackmon retired as a player on April 25th, 1988 due to numerous neck problems. Blackmon assists Don Shinnick with the linebackers.

Blackmon, who played the right outside linebacker position for the Patriots, came to the club out of Tulsa University as a fourth-round draft pick in 1981. He started 72 of the 89 games in which he appeared.

Blackmon, the only player in Patriot history to have two safeties in one season (in 1985 vs. the Green Bay Packers on September 8th and at Tampa Bay on October 27th), had 541 tackles (277 solos) in his career. He had 30½ sacks, six fumble recoveries and 19 pass deflections. In addition, he had five interceptions for 63 yards (12.6 average) with a long return of 39 yards, done in 1983. He also had 10 forced fumbles.

In six playoff games over his career, he had 31 tackles (21 solos), four sacks and 10 pass deflections.

In 1987, Blackmon played in—and started in—four games. He was placed on the Injured Reserve (IR) list on November 11th after suffering a neck injury late in the Los Angeles Raiders-New England game played at Sullivan Stadium on November 1st. Blackmon, who had suffered a neck injury in college and in 1981, his first year as a pro, had surgery performed on his neck at the University of Florida in Gainesville.

Blackmon, a Fort Lauderdale, Fl., native, had 31 tackles (17 solos) during the 1987 season. His best game came vs. Miami—the season-opener on September 13th—when he had 13 tackles (eight solos) and knocked down three passes. He followed that with nine tackles (five solos) against the Jets on September 21st, had four tackles (two solos) at Indianapolis on October 25th and had five tackles (two solos) vs. the Raiders.


In 1986, Blackmon finished as the team's fifth top tackler with 84 hits (40 solos) in starting 15 of the 16 regular season games (missed at Pittsburgh on October 19th due to knee injury). In addition, he was third on the team in sacks with seven and a half for 56 yards. His best season came in 1984 when he finished with 136 tackles (65 solos), in addition to picking up six sacks and 11 quarterback pressures. He had a career-high eight sacks in 1985.

Blackmon was a three-time All-Missouri Valley Conference selection in college. A three-year starter, he recorded 40 tackles for minus yardage (239 total yards) as a senior to set a team record and was named the conference's Defensive Player of the Year.

The 31-year-old Blackmon (born March 14, 1958 in Pompano Beach, Fl.) and his wife, Jacqueline, have two daughters, Candice (7) and Tiffany (4), and one son, Don II (2½).

FOR THE RECORD...

The Patriots kicked 13 field goals last season (six by Teddy Garcia and 10 by Jason Staurovsky). The longest was a 50-yarder by Garcia vs. Minnesota on September 11th. There were two other field goals longer than 40 yards (47-yarder vs. Jets on September 4th and 43-yarder at Green Bay on October 9th — both by Garcia). The average length on field goals-made was 33 yards.



JIMMY CARR **Defensive Backfield**

Jimmy Carr, who is in charge of the team's defensive backfield, is in his fifth year with the Patriots.

Before coming to the Patriots, Jimmy was the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach for the Denver Gold of the USFL in 1984 and 1983. You have to look long and hard for a person with more on-the-field experience than Jimmy Carr. He has spent 28 years in

the NFL, with nine coming as a player and the other 19 as an assistant coach.

His NFL coaching career started in 1966 with the Minnesota Vikings (1966-68, handling the defensive backs). He then went with the Chicago Bears in 1969 (was the defensive coordinator and defensive backfield coach). From 1970-72, he was the defensive coordinator and defensive backfield coach with the Philadelphia Eagles, handling those same duties with the Chicago Bears in 1973 and 1974 and the Detroit Lions in 1975 and 1976.

Jimmy was named the Buffalo Bills' linebackers coach in 1977, before going with the San Francisco 49'ers in 1978 as the team's defensive coordinator and defensive backfield coach. Carr returned to the Vikings, serving as the defensive backfield coach from 1979-81.

A native of Kayford, West Virginia, Jimmy attended Morris Harvey College (located in Charleston, W.V.; college now known as the University of Charleston). A physical education major, he played running back, defensive back and linebacker through his college days. Morris Harvey took part in three bowls in his four years. They beat Lebanon Valley in the Burly Bowl in Jimmy's freshman year, beat East Carolina in the Elks Bowl his junior year and lost to the University of Tampa in the Cigar Bowl his senior year of 1954. Jimmy also played three years of baseball and two years of basketball in college. He was elected into the school's Hall of Fame in 1986.

Carr began his pro playing career with the then-Chicago Cardinals as a running back in 1955. After serving a hitch in the U.S. Army, Carr returned to the Cardinals for the 1957 season. He played one year of Canadian football (Montreal in 1958) and then returned to the NFL as a defensive back with the Philadelphia Eagles, playing from 1959-63.

In 1960, Jimmy helped the Eagles win the World Championship (10-2 record, beating Green Bay by a 17-13 score). He had another thrill that season when he broke a 10-10 tie vs. the NY Giants at Yankee Stadium by returning a fumble 38 yards for a fourth quarter touchdown. The Eagles won the mid-season game, 17-10.

Jimmy completed his playing days with the Washington Redskins in 1964 and 1965, playing the linebacker position his final two seasons. The 56-year-old Carr (born March 25, 1933) and his wife, Lila Lee, have been married 29 years. They have two children, Ken (29) and Gwen (24).

Ken graduated from Wheaton College in 1983 and graduated from the Trinity Evangelical Seminary in December of 1987. A Second Lt. in the Air Force Reserves, he is an Air Force chaplin. Gwen is a graduate of Colorado State University after attending the University of Missouri for three years; she majored in journalism/public relations. Her husband, Mike Jensen, is a cameraman for KUSA, the ABC television station in Denver.

FOR THE RECORD...

Using the baseball won-loss formula, Tony Eason has 25 wins, 19 losses and two no-decisions in 46 starts — and in relief, he has a 1-1-2 mark. Steve Grogan has a 71-51-3 record in starts and 3-0-8 record in relief. Doug Flutie has a 7-3-0 record in starts and 1-0-0 in relief.



BOBBY GRIER Offensive Backfield

Bobby Grier, who is in charge of the team's offensive backs, has been on Raymond Berry's staff since just prior to the 1985 season. This is his fifth year with Berry as the team's head mentor. But he was on the coaching staff before.

This is the second time that Grier has been an assistant coach with the Patriots. He was the team's offensive backfield coach under

Ron Erhardt in 1981 (named March of 1981). Bobby was named a college scout with the Patriots seven months later (July of 1982), and was in that capacity with the organization until Raymond Berry summoned him to the sidelines. Grier and Berry were assistant coaches on the Erhardt staff in 1981.

A native of Detroit, he began coaching at the college level in 1974 when he joined George Mans' staff at Eastern Michigan as the offensive backfield coach. He was with Mans for two years at Eastern Michigan, and with Ed Chlebek at EMU for two years. When Chlebek was named head coach at Boston College in January of 1978, Grier became the BC offensive backfield coach.

He coordinated the team's offensive game plan there. He helped turn around a BC program that was 0-11 his first season, moving to 7-4 his final year. At BC, one of his recruits was standout receiver Brian Brennan, now with the Cleveland Browns.

Grier was the offensive coordinator at Northwestern University under coach Dennis Green for several months in 1982, before leaving to rejoin the Patriots.

He was an outstanding running back at the University of Iowa, graduating in 1964. A three-year starter in college, he was named honorable mention All-Big Ten as a junior and senior. He led the team in rushing as a senior with 406 yards on 98 carries (4.1 average).

Upon graduating from college, he began his coaching career as an assistant at Kettering (Michigan) High School. Following four years at Kettering, he was head coach at the Martin Luther King High School for the 1970-73 seasons. His 1973 team won the Detroit City title with a 9-1 record.

The 46-year-old Grier (born November 10, 1942 in Detroit) and his wife, Wendy, will have been married 24 years come September of 1988. They have two sons, Chris (19) and Michael (14). Chris is a recent graduate of Holliston (Mass.) High School, where he was the football team's quarterback. He is now attending the University of Massachusetts as a freshman (plays football). Mike is considered to be one of the top young hockey players in Massachusetts.

RAY HAMILTON Assistant Defensive Line

Now in his fifth year as a coach, Ray Hamilton, a starting nose tackle for the Patriots from 1973-1981, was hired to help defensive line coach Eddie Khayat during training camp in 1985. He had no previous coaching experience, but Raymond Berry liked what he saw. Hamilton was named a part-time staffer and then on September 24th, 1987, added as a full-timer.

As a player, although he was a two-time All-Big 8 selection at Oklahoma, Hamilton was not selected until the 14th round of the 1973 draft. Despite being selected so low in the draft, he moved immediately into the starting lineup as a left defensive end in 1973 and set a team record for quarterback sacks by a rookie with seven (record was broken by Garin Veris, who had 10 in 1985).



Hamilton, who retired prior to the 1982 season, started all 14 games his rookie campaign and went on to start 110 consecutive games through November 2nd, 1980 (his 110 straight starts were a team record until 1985 when CB Raymond Clayborn started his 111th straight game vs. Buffalo on October 13th).

Ray was moved to nose tackle in 1974 when the Patriots went to a 3-4 alignment. He had five sacks that season. He had six more sacks in 1975 and made two fumble recoveries, one going for a 23-yard TD in a 24-17 loss at St. Louis (on 11-2-75).

Hamilton had tremendous seasons in both 1976 (when the Patriots won the AFC East title with an 11-3 record) and 1977. He took part in more than 600 plays during 1976, recording 6½ sacks, two fumble recoveries and 45 solo tackles (second among the team's defensive linemen). Hamilton led the defensive line with 44 solos in 1977 and added a career-high 9½ sacks (second on the team) with 10 quarterback pressures.


Ray continued his fine play in 1978, finishing the season with 85½ total tackles (first on the defensive line), five sacks, 14 QB pressures and a career-high three fumble recoveries. In 1979, he had 68½ tackles, six sacks and 11 QB pressures. In 1980, he topped the defensive line with 50 solo tackles (also second on team with eight sacks for 71 yards).

No longer a starter in 1981 (he did make 39 tackles, with 30 solos), he had a half sack that season, bringing his career total to 53½ before retiring at the close of the season.

Owner of a bachelor's degree in marketing (Oklahoma, 1973) and a master's degree in Public Administration (Suffolk University, 1977), Hamilton and his wife, Paula, have owned and operated their own printing company — Hamilton Printers, downtown Boston — since 1982. They have two sons, Kadar (13) and Damon (10). Hamilton, an avid tennis player, is an accredited tennis official who has worked several professional tournaments in the Boston area.

A native of Oklahoma City, OK, the 38-year-old Hamilton was born Jan. 20, 1951.

HAROLD JACKSON **Receivers**



Harold Jackson, the Patriots' receivers coach, is going into his fifth season on the Patriots' coaching staff. He was the club's assistant receivers coach his first season, in 1985, before being named to his present position the following year.

Jackson played 17 years in the NFL, catching 579 passes for 10,372 yards (17.9 average) with 76 touchdowns from his wide receiver spot over those years.

Jackson's number of catches rank 10th best in the league's history, his career yardage via the pass ranks fifth best and his career touchdown catches rate him tied for 10th (with Hall of Famer Fred Biletnikoff). Jackson, who took part in five Pro Bowls (in 1969, 1972, 1973, 1975 and 1977), had 29 100-plus yard receiving games in his career, for sixth best in NFL history.

Harold played with the Los Angeles Rams in 1968 and 1973-77, with the Philadelphia Eagles 1969-72, with the Patriots from 1978-81 and with the Seattle Seahawks in 1983.

An 11th-round draft choice by the Rams in 1968 out of Jackson State University, Harold had his finest pro season in terms of passes caught in 1969 with the Eagles when he had 65 catches for 1,116 yards (17.2 average) with nine touchdowns. That was his second year—his first full, after having played just two games in 1968—in the NFL. He also led the league in that department in 1972 when he caught 62 passes for 1,048 yards (16.9 average) with 13 touchdowns for the Eagles; he also led the league in yards via the catch that season. He returned to the Rams (as part of the deal for QB Roman Gabriel) the following

year, 1973, and led the league in average per catch with a 21.9 norm (874 yards in 40 catches) and in touchdowns with 13.

As a Patriot, Jackson was coached by Berry for four seasons. Over that time, he caught 156 passes for 3,162 yards (20.3 average) with 18 touchdowns. He is the 12th top receiver in Patriot history in passes caught and is fourth in yards via the pass. He had his best season with New England in 1979 with 45 catches for 1,013 yards (22.5 average) with seven touchdowns. That 1,000-plus season is just one of four in the team's history. Jackson had three 1,000-yard seasons in his career (1969, 1972 and 1979).

Jackson had eight 100-plus games as a Patriot (best vs. Vikings in 1979, 147 yards on five catches). Harold had a three TD day (49, 44, 28 yards) against the Jets (9-9-79) in a 56-3 Patriot win. There was a point in which Harold had started 167 consecutive games, but that streak ended when the Patriots entered their game at Houston on 11-10-80 with a double TE formation (was the only offensive play he did not take part in the rest of that game).

He had a nine-catch outing while playing for the Eagles, for 161 yards against Dallas on September 17, 1972 (best day as a Ram came vs. New Orleans in 1977 when he caught eight passes for 127 yards and 2 TDs). In 1973 (10-14), he had his finest day in terms of yards caught, with 238 yards (in seven receptions) against Dallas while playing for the Rams; he had four TD catches that game. Harold had his longest catch come against the Giants, a 79-yarder, on 10-11-70.

The 43-year-old Jackson (born January 6, 1946 in Hattiesburg, MS) has a son, Terry (24), and twin daughters, Yolanda and Rolando (12). Terry owns a detailing company in Hattiesburg, Miss.



EDDIE KHAYAT (Pronounced Kl yat)

Defensive Line

There is plenty of NFL in Eddie Khayat, having coached in the league for 22 years. Khayat, who is in his fifth year in charge of the Patriots' defensive line, came to the Patriots from the Detroit Lions where he coached from 1982-84. He was with the Baltimore Colts for five years prior to that, serving as defensive line coach there as well. Eddie became a coach in 1967 with the New Orleans Saints through the 1970 season. He then moved to the Philadelphia Eagles in 1971, and became the team's head coach three games into that season and was the head mentor throughout the 1972 campaign.

He was an assistant coach under coach Don McCaffrey with the Detroit Lions in the 1973 and 1974 seasons (was with Raymond Berry as an assistant coach there), with the Atlanta Falcons in 1975 and 1976 under Marion Campbell, and with the Baltimore Colts from 1977-79, under coach Ted Marchibroda and 1980-81 under coach Mike McCormack. Khayat was on the staff of the Colts team that won the AFC East title in 1977 with a 10-4 record. In 1982 and 1983, his Lions teams went to the playoffs, winning the NFC Central championship with a 9-7 record.

Over his years, he has coached such players as Hall of Famer Doug Atkins (Saints), Claude Humphrey (Falcons), Dave Rowe (Saints), Mike Barnes and John Dutton (Colts) and Doug English and Bill Gay (Lions). All were selected to the Pro Bowl. In 1977, one of his players, Mike Barnes, was selected winner of the Mac Truck Award, the best defensive lineman in the league as selected by the players.

Eddie is known for his abilities as both a teacher and motivator. Khayat came into the pro game as a free agent defensive end and defensive tackle for the Washington Redskins in 1957, then moved to the Philadelphia Eagles in 1958-61 (with Patriot defensive backfield coach Jim Carr as members of the World Champion 1960 Eagles team), and was back with the Redskins for the 1962 and 1963 seasons.

He was coached by such fine mentors as Mike Holovak (Patriots), Nick Skorich and Buck Shaw (Eagles), Joe Kuharich (Redskins and Eagles) and Bill McPeak (Redskins).

He made a return to the Eagles for the 1964 and 1965 seasons, and ended his playing days with the Boston Patriots in the AFL in 1966.

A 1957 graduate of Tulane University, Ed was an offensive and defensive end at Millsaps College in 1953, at Perkinston Junior College in 1954 and at Tulane from 1955-56.

Eddie's younger brother, Bob, was a placekicker for the Redskins in 1960, '62 and '63. He was selected to the Pro Bowl his rookie season. Bob is in his first year as the Director of the NCAA Foundation, following years of being Vice Chancellor of the University of Mississippi. He raised more than 40 million dollars for Ole Miss.

The 53-year-old Khayat (born September 14, 1935 in Moss Point, Mississippi) and his wife, Deborah, have been married 23 years. They are the parents of two boys, Ed, Jr. (20) and Bill (16). Ed is a senior psychology major at Millersville (Pa.) State College. Bill is a junior at York (Pa.) Catholic High School, where he plays football, basketball and baseball.



GUY MORRISS **Offensive Line**

After serving as the team's assistant offensive line coach in 1988, Guy Morriss takes over the offensive line coaching helm this season (named January 9th, 1989). Morriss was named the team's assistant offensive line coach on August 23rd, 1988, the day after he officially hung up his helmet after 15 years of pro ball.

Morriss, who started 173 of the 217 games he played in over his pro career, takes over the offensive line coaching spot from Rod Humenuik, who now holds that position with the New York Jets after four years with the Patriots.

Morriss, a long-snapping specialist in his time with New England, played for the Patriots for four seasons after joining the team as a free agent during the 1984 training camp. He wore the Patriots uniform for 59 games (22 starts). Prior to coming to the Patriots, Morriss played in 158 games (151 starts) during an 11-year career with the Philadelphia Eagles.

He went to Philadelphia as the team's second-round draft choice out of Texas Christian University (TCU) in 1973. Morriss, who hails from Colorado City, Texas, was an All-NFC selection in 1981 while with the Eagles and played on six playoff teams — two with the Patriots (1985 and 1986) and four with Philadelphia (1978, 1979, 1980, 1981) — and two Super Bowl teams (in 1980 in Super Bowl XV with the Eagles and in 1985 in Super Bowl XX with the Patriots).

Morriss, who started 89 consecutive games for the Eagles between 1976 and 1983, is listed in the Eagles' record book for most consecutive games-played, with the 157 figure putting him fourth on the list.

While in college, Morriss was a three-year letterman and was selected to the All-Southwest Conference team as a guard. He was team captain as a senior and went on to participate in the Senior Bowl game, the coaches All-America game, the college all-star game and the Blue-Gray game. He was a physical education major at TCU.

Morriss was an all-star tight end at Sam Houston High School in Arlington, Texas.

The 38-year-old Morriss (born May 13, 1951 in Colorado City, Texas) and his wife, Jackie, have five daughters — Colleen (20), Melanie (16), Kerry (15), Savannah (2) and Austin Leigh (born May 13, 1989). The Morrisseys reside in Wrentham, Mass.

Morriss enjoys hunting and owns World Champion show horses.



JOHN POLONCHEK (Pronounced Pole LAWN check) **Special Assistant To The Head Coach**

John Polonchek is in his fifth year on the Raymond Berry staff, coming to the staff from the Los Angeles Raiders, where he was a scout during the 1984 season.

In his position as special assistant to Berry, Polonchek is in charge of working with the computer department in scouting the opponents as well as looking for tendencies in the Patriots' game.

This is his second time with the Patriots, having served as the team's quarterbacks coach from 1975 to 1980 under Chuck Fairbanks and Ron Erhardt. John then became the quarterbacks coach for the New Jersey Generals of the USFL under Fairbanks in 1983 and Walt Michaels in 1984.

Polonchek had his coaching start in 1950 as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Michigan State University, under then-head coach Biggie Munn. He was in the Air Force from 1952-55, where he played and coached. John left the Air Force with the rank of Lieutenant. He then went back to MSU as an assistant coach under then-head coach Duffy Daugherty, coaching the freshmen and coaching the varsity running backs from 1956-58.

He then went to the University of Colorado where he coached the offensive and defensive backs from 1959-61. John then went into business in Denver while working as a part-time scout for the Raiders and the Jets of the AFL. He joined the Jets on a full-time basis in 1966.

Polonchek coached the Oakland Raiders' running backs from 1967-71 under John Rauch and John Madden, with the team making the playoffs all but one of those six years (lost to Green Bay in Super Bowl his first season). He was with the Packers as receivers coach from 1972-74, before going to the Patriots in 1975.

Polonchek (born in Granastov, Czechoslovakia, leaving that country at age six) grew up in East Chicago, Ind. He and his wife, Joan, have been married for 34 years. They have three children—John, Jennifer and Jeanna—and four grandchildren.

Young John is an associate professor of finance at Oklahoma State University. Jennifer is a marketing executive in the Saturn division of General Motors. Jeanna is a certified athletic trainer at a sports medicine clinic in Gloucester, Mass.



KEITH ROWEN **Special Teams/Tight Ends**

Keith Rowen joined the Patriots' coaching staff on January 26th, after four years — from 1985-88 — as the special teams/assistant offensive line coach with the Indianapolis Colts.

Rowen began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Stanford. He followed that with two seasons (1975-76) as the school's defensive line and special teams coach, before moving to Long Beach State University as the offensive line coach from 1977-78. He followed that with five seasons, from 1979-82, as the offensive line/special teams coach at the University of Arizona.

Rowen had his first pro coaching position come as the offensive line/offensive coordinator with the Boston/New Orleans Breakers of the United States Football League (USFL). He was with the club for the 1983 and 1984 seasons, before moving to the Cleveland Browns, where he was the club's running backs coach in 1984.

As a football player, Rowen lettered three seasons as an offensive guard at Stanford. He was selected an All-American by The Football News. In addition, he was picked to the All-PAC-8 squad, the All-Coast squad by the Associated Press and United Press International and was named an Academic All-American.

He was taken in the 11th round of the NFL draft by the Philadelphia Eagles and remained with the team until the last cut. Rowen began his coaching career at that time. Rowen, who majored in political science while an undergraduate, gained his Master's degree from Stanford in 1977 and then went on to get a doctorate in athletic administration from USC.

Keith has football coaching in his genes. His dad, Dr. Vic Rowen, is the head coach at San Francisco State University. In 32 years as a head coach, the elder Rowen has put together a 129-166-10 record (117-156-10 record since 1961 at Div. II San Francisco; was 12-10-0 in three seasons at Defiance College).

Keith, 36 (born September 2nd, 1952 in New York, N.Y.), is married to the former Sheri Andrews of Laguna Beach, Calif. They have three daughters — Mandee (8), Holly (5) and Kelly (1).



DON SHINNICK **Linebackers**

Don Shinnick is in his fifth year on Raymond Berry's staff. Berry added his former Baltimore Colts roommate as linebackers coach in early January of 1985, bringing the former linebacker from Columbia, Missouri, where Don was an insurance man since leaving coaching in 1981. He was the head coach at Central Methodist College (Fayette, Missouri) for three seasons, and was a coaching consultant for that school in 1982.

His pro coaching started in 1970 with the Chicago Bears as a defensive backfield coach. He came to the Bears under coach Jim Dooley to put in a true zone defense for the Bears (the team had never used a true zone defense before he came there). After two years with the Bears, he moved to the St. Louis Cardinals in 1972, where he was the team's linebackers coach.

In 1973, he joined the Oakland Raiders where he coached the linebackers through the 1977 season. The Raiders didn't have a defensive coordinator in his years on the John Madden-coached team, but Shinnick played a key role in drawing up the team's defensive plans. Over his five years with the Raiders the team reached the playoffs each season, including winning the Super Bowl in 1976 with a 32-14 win over the Vikings.

Shinnick, known for his ability to instruct, has coached such people as Dick Butkus and Ted Hendricks in his years with the pros.

A native of Kansas City, Missouri, Shinnick played at San Pedro (CA) High School before starring at UCLA (Named to San Pedro Hall of Fame in 1985). He played a different position each season in college (offensive guard, defensive back, running back and linebacker, in that order). He was an honorable mention All-American as a senior.

He played 13 years—all as a starter—for the Baltimore Colts as the team's number two draft choice. Over his years in the NFL, he intercepted 37 passes, an all-time NFL record for linebackers. In 1959, Don tied for the Colts team lead in interceptions with seven (for 70 yards).

He played on four championship teams from 1957 to 1969. He has coached on two other Super Bowl teams—with the Patriots and the Raiders. He was coached by such standout mentors as Don Shula, Chuck Noll, Weeb Ewbank and Madden over his NFL career.

Don has been giving church service meetings to the Boston Red Sox and visiting baseball teams as well as the Boston Celtics and visiting basketball teams since coming to the area.

The 54-year-old Shinnick (born May 15, 1935 in Kansas City, Missouri) and his wife, Marsha, have been married 31 years. They have five boys—Joel (29), Josh (26), Peter (24), Adam (19) and Christopher (13). Joel is on the professional motorcycle racing circuit. Josh, who played football at UCLA, is in his third year of Law School (McGeorge Law School, a branch of University of Pacific). Peter is a recent University of Colorado graduate, where he was an offensive lineman on the football team. Peter was a graduate assistant coach at the University of Richmond last year and this season is a graduate assistant at the University of Arkansas. Adam, who led Eastern Mass. High School football players in scoring for two years, is now a sophomore at Penn State. Don has two grandchildren.



JERRY SIMMONS **Strength and Conditioning**

Now in his second year as the team's strength and conditioning coach, Jerry Simmons came to the Patriots in June of 1988, replacing Dean Brittenham, who held the position from 1985-87.

Simmons, a native of Elkhart, Kansas, came to the pros from the University of Southern California (USC), where he was that school's strength and conditioning coach for five years (since 1983-84 school year).

In his position with the Patriots, Simmons is in charge of making sure the Patriots field the best conditioned and the strongest team in the league. He also works with trainer Ron O'Neil and assistant trainer Jim Pluemer in helping to rehabilitate injured players.

While at USC, Simmons oversaw the operation of the school's 7,300-square-foot strength and conditioning facility. He also designed the weight room. In addition, he developed a year-round individual strength and conditioning program for all the school's athletes. During the 1984 Summer Olympics held in Los Angeles, Simmons—who was a nominee for Strength Coach of the Year in 1983, 1984 and 1988—was a strength training site director.

Prior to going to USC, Simmons served two years (1981-82 and 1982-83 school years) as the strength and conditioning coach at Rice University. He designed Rice University's first strength and conditioning facility.

A 1977 graduate of Fort Hays (Kan.) State University with a bachelor's degree in physical education, he began his coaching career at Fort Hays State in 1978 as an assistant strength coach and graduate assistant working with linebackers. In 1978, he also earned a master's degree in physical education and secondary education.

He left coaching in 1979 to work on a farm (still owns it with his two brothers and sister). In 1980, he returned to Fort Hays as a full-time coach in charge of linebackers and ends, as well as conditioning. He also was the school's head junior varsity coach. He moved to Clemson University as assistant strength coach in May of 1980, and remained there until June of 1981 when he moved on to Rice.

Simmons played football (linebacker) for two years at Fort Hays State. In his senior year he won all-state honors. Fort Hays won the conference title in Jerry's senior year. Before attending Fort Hays State, he attended Garden City (Kan.) Junior College. In high school at Elkhart (Kan.) High School, he was a three-year all-conference and all-area choice at linebacker.

The 35-year-old Simmons (Born June 15, 1954 in Elkhart, Kansas) and his wife, Rebecca, have two sons, Joe (6) and Jordon Lynn (1½), and a daughter, Jennifer Jo (4).



RICHARD WOOD Quarterbacks

Richard Wood is in his first season as the Patriots' quarterbacks coach. Named to the Patriots' staff on January 19th, Wood had been with the Kansas City Chiefs as the receivers coach during the 1987 and 1988 seasons.

Wood broke into the coaching game in 1967 as the assistant freshman coach at the University of Georgia. He became the school's head freshman coach the following year. In 1969

and 1970, he was the receivers coach with the Oakland Raiders, before going to the University of Mississippi as the receivers-quarterbacks coach from 1971-73.

In 1974, he was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach of the Cleveland Browns. In 1976 and 1977, he was the quarterbacks coach with the New Orleans Saints, before moving to the Atlanta Falcons as that team's quarterbacks coach between 1978-82. In 1983, Wood was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach with the Philadelphia Eagles.

While working in private industry for one year (1986), Wood became a volunteer coach at Auburn University. He helped give his alma mater a passing game during the spring and oversaw things during the season.

Auburn went 10-2 under coach Pat Dye in 1986, and beat USC, 16-7, in the Citrus Bowl (held in Orlando, Fl.). In putting in the passing attack for Auburn, the team went from a 45.7 passing percentage in 1985 (and just five touchdowns) to a 56.5 completion percentage and 10 touchdowns.

As a collegian, Wood played both the defensive back and quarterback positions at Auburn. The team went 9-0-1 in 1958 and finished fourth in both the AP and UPI rankings.

In the pros, Wood played with six different teams in seven seasons. A 12th-round draft choice of the Baltimore Colts in 1959, he was a reserve quarterback with the club through the 1961 season. He went on to play for the San Diego Chargers and the Denver Broncos (1962), the New York Jets (1963-64), the Oakland Raiders (1965) and the Miami Dolphins (1966).

Wood is the answer to a couple of trivia questions: Along with being a backup to Unitas, Wood was the Jets' starting quarterback before Joe Namath came to the pros, and he was the first starting quarterback in Miami Dolphins history.

The 53-year-old Wood (born February 29th, 1936) is a native of Lanett, Alabama. He and his wife, Peggy, have two children, Bart and Rhonda.

FOR THE RECORD...

The Patriots had 15 rushes of 15 yards or more in 1988, with the longest coming on a 52-yard pickup by John Stephens at Denver on December 17th. Stephens had 10 of the team's 15 long-distance runs. There were six runs of 20 yards or more with Stephens having five of them.

There were 26 New England pass plays that traveled 20 yards or more, with the longest being an 80-yarder from Doug Flutie to Irving Fryar vs. Chicago on October 30th. There were eight plays 30 yards or longer, with Flutie on the tossing end of five of those plays.

New England's opponents had 25 runs of 15 yards or longer, with Andre Reed of Buffalo going the longest at 36 yards at Buffalo on October 23rd. There were nine runs that were 20 yards or longer.

The longest pass play against the Patriots was a 51-yard TD, going from Houston's Cody Carlson to Allen Pinkett on September 25th at Houston. There were 33 pass plays of 20 yards or longer (nine of 30 yards or longer).

ESPN

The Patriots have been on ESPN each of the two years — they have a 1-1 record — the cable television network has done NFL games. In fact, the very first ESPN telecast of an NFL regular-season game had the Patriots in it.

It came on November 8th, 1987 in East Rutherford, N.J., vs. the New York Giants. The Giants were in front, 14-0, at halftime, but the Patriots came charging back, only to have the air escape from their balloon when All-Pro linebacker Lawrence Taylor picked off a New England pass — on a first down with slightly more than one minute remaining and the ball on the Giants' 17-yard line.

New England had an equally-thrilling game last year before the ESPN cameras. The Patriots came away with a 6-3 verdict over the host Miami Dolphins on November 20th. Placekicker Jason Sturowsky had all the New England points, from 22 and 34 yards out.

ROBERT DURKIN **Vice President — Administration**

Robert Durkin, who joined the Patriots organization during the 1988 season after Victor K. Kiam II acquired his interest in the team in late October, is responsible for the team's front office administration, including finance, marketing and stadium operations. In addition, he counsels players in matters relating to schooling and post-football careers.

Prior to joining the Patriots, Durkin worked at Remington Products for eight years in various capacities, including financial, real estate, public relations and publicity.

Durkin, a native of San Francisco, graduated from the University of California at Berkeley in 1966. After serving in the Air Force, he attended Columbia Business school, where he obtained an MBA in finance in 1971.

After obtaining his MBA, Durkin worked for Citibank in New York City for four years, specializing in lending to the real estate industry. He left Citibank in 1974 to begin developing real estate in Texas and Connecticut. In 1978, he founded Sunhouse, Inc., a Nashua, N.H.-based manufacturer of solar energy equipment.

Born on June 29, 1944, Durkin is married and has four children — Michael (21), Pat (19), Christopher (14) and Jennifer (6). His wife, Lisa, is a publisher of NFL-licensed books which use football as a basis for teaching educational concepts to children ages 4-12.



DICK STEINBERG **Director of Player Development**

Regarded as one of the NFL's top talent hunters, Dick rejoined the Patriots' organization when he was named Director of Player Development on February 9, 1981. In his capacity, he is responsible for the overall scouting of players, as well as the team's trade negotiations. He also assists in the signing of players.

Steinberg rejoined the Patriots after departing his position as a scout to become Director of College Scouting for the Los Angeles Rams in June, 1976. He remained in that post until being promoted to the position of Director of Player Personnel, a post he held until June, 1980.


After his four year stay with the Rams, Steinberg joined then-General Manager Steve Rosenbloom as Vice President of Player Personnel with the New Orleans Saints. Steinberg later resigned that post on January 20, 1981 before rejoining the Patriots.

The talent he has selected has taken part in two Super Bowls—Super Bowl XX in 1986 (the Patriots) and Super Bowl XIV in 1980 (the Rams).

Steinberg is a member of the NFL Pro-College Relations Committee, with this his third year.

A native of Philadelphia, Steinberg played football and majored in Physical Education and Health at Temple University. In addition to serving a two-year tour of duty with the U.S. Army in France, Steinberg served as a high school coach at Philadelphia's Roman Catholic High (1960-61) and at Staunton (VA) Military Academy (1961-64). He then entered the collegiate coaching ranks as an assistant at Vanderbilt (1964-1967) and Kansas State (1967-69).

Following a brief stint as a scout with the Dallas Cowboys in 1969, Steinberg spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Southern Mississippi (1970-71) before joining the Patriots as a personnel scout under then-Director of Player Personnel Bucko Kilroy. Steinberg served with the Patriots from 1972 to 1976 before departing for the Rams.



BILL MCPEAK **Director of Pro Scouting**

Keeping track of pro football talent for the Patriots' organization is one of the NFL's most knowledgeable football men, Bill McPeak.

A star at the University of Pittsburgh, McPeak played for the Pittsburgh Steelers as a defensive end from 1949-57. During that span, McPeak played in the 1953, 1954 and 1957 Pro Bowls.

During the final two years of his tenure at Pittsburgh, McPeak began his 17-year NFL coaching career. In 1959, he joined the Washington Redskins, staying with the 'Skins until 1965. Of his seven seasons with that club, the final five were as head coach. Included on his staff at Washington was player personnel director Bucko Kilroy, now the Patriots' Vice President.

McPeak joined the Detroit Lions in 1967 as offensive coordinator, a post he held until he went to the Miami Dolphins in 1973.

While with the Dolphins as an offensive coach, the Dolphins won Super Bowl VIII, their second consecutive Super Bowl win and third straight Super Bowl appearance.

After suffering a serious illness during the 1974 off-season, McPeak remained out of the NFL on a full-time basis until being named to his present position on July 23, 1979.

When first named as general manager on April 6, 1979, Bucko Kilroy stated that one of his top priorities was to hire a pro scout, and he was elated to have the qualified McPeak join the Patriots' organization. Since that time, McPeak has been responsible for scouting present and prospective professional football talent both on film and in game situations.



JOE MENDES **Director of College Scouting**

For nine years, Joe Mendes has contributed tremendously to the Patriots' scouting department — three years as a personnel scout and the last six years as the team's director of college scouting.

As the director of college scouting, Mendes assists Dick Steinberg, the team's director of player development, in coordinating the activities of the Patriots' college scouting department.

He works closely with the club's data processing department in developing the computer programming for the entire scouting department and is active in player contract signings. He spends the majority of his time on the road evaluating college players across the country.

Mendes began his association with Steinberg in 1978 when he started his full-time NFL scouting career with the Los Angeles Rams. In 1980, he followed Steinberg to New Orleans, where he worked one year as a scout for the Saints before coming to New England in 1981.

A native of Ferndale, California and an avid Boston Celtics fan, Mendes got into the scouting business in 1977 when he worked for Pro Scout, Inc., a scouting service that evaluates pro personnel.

The 37-year-old Mendes (born June 25, 1952) graduated in 1974 from Chico State University and worked for a year on his alma mater's coaching staff. He then spent a season with the Hawaii franchise of the World Football League as a special assistant coach, after which he spent the 1976 season working with the football program at the University of California.





PERSONNEL GUIDE

(NOTE: New Collective Bargaining contract being negotiated).

WAIVERS: The waiver system is a process by which player contracts or NFL rights to players are made available by a club to other NFL Clubs. During this process, a club may make a claim to obtain the player or "waive" its right to do so — thus the term "waiver." Claiming clubs are assigned players on a priority based upon the inverse of won-lost standings. The claiming period is normally ten days during the offseason and 24 hours from early July through December. In some circumstances, a club is allowed another 24 hours to rescind its action (recall of waiver request) and/or the claiming club to do the same (known as a withdrawal of a claim). If a player passes through waivers unclaimed or not recalled, he becomes a free agent. Under the Collective Bargaining Agreement, from February 1 through October 11 any veteran who has acquired four years of pension credit may, if about to be assigned to another club through the waiver system, reject such assignment and become a free agent.

INJURED RESERVE: This is a reserve list category that may be used for the player by a club if the player is injured in a practice session or game of his club in any year, after having passed the club's physical examination in that year. If a player fails the club's initial physical examination, he is not available for reserve/injured; the club may instead use the procedure of Physically Unable to Perform or Non-Football Injury/Illness, whichever is applicable. The following applies to players who are placed on Reserve/Injured with "major" (four week) injuries: 1) A player placed on Reserve/Injured prior to or concurrent with the final roster reduction may not return to his club's Active List in that season under any circumstances. Clubs may request waivers on such players at any time or retain them on their Reserve/Injured List for the rest of the season. Such players may not practice. 2) Players placed on Reserve/Injured after the final roster reduction will be eligible to return to the club's Active List after a minimum of six games, either by free activation or by procedural recall waivers. Clubs will be permitted five free activations during the regular season. For such players, clubs will have two options: option one is to begin practice after a minimum of four weeks, and option two is to begin practice after a minimum of six weeks on Reserve/Injured. **Option 1:** If a player begins practice after a minimum of four weeks, the club is permitted to practice the player for a maximum of two weeks, after which it must either return him to the Active List or request waivers, unless he has been injured. If injured, the player may be retained on Reserve/Injured, but he will not be eligible to practice or to be activated thereafter. **Option 2:** If a player begins practice after a minimum of six weeks on Reserve/Injured, the player is eligible to practice for the rest of the season, but he counts against the club's Developmental Squad limit of six players. For players who are placed on Reserve/Injured with "minor" (less than four weeks) injuries, they must be placed on waivers as soon as they are healthy.

RESERVE LISTS: Clubs are limited to a year-round roster limit of 80 players on the following combined lists: Active, Inactive, Reserve/Injured, Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform, Reserve/Non-Football Injury-Illness, Reserve/Suspended, Developmental Squad, Exempt and Future. The 80-player limit will not include any players on the following lists: Reserve/Retired, Reserve/Did Not Report, Reserve/Left Squad, Reserve/Military, unsigned draft choices, unsigned Veteran Free Agents, Unprotected players, and players who have been declared ineligible to participate (suspended) by the Commissioner.

TRADES: Unrestricted trading is allowed between clubs through the Tuesday following the sixth regular season game (October 17, 1989) and does not resume again until February 5, 1990.

ACTIVE ROSTER SIZES: The team owners decided in May of 1988 to stick with the 45-man active roster during the season, but added a two-man inactive squad from which the team can pick its 45 active players each week. Clubs must declare an Active List of 45 players and an Inactive List of two players no later than one hour prior to kickoff of each game. In 1985, the owners had decided to go back to the 45-man rosters, the number the rosters were set at from 1978-81. In 1982, the limit was raised to 49. From 1975-77, each club was permitted 43 players on the active roster, while in 1974 the active roster limit was 47 players. The first roster limitation rule permitted 16 players per club in 1925.

ROSTER CUTDOWN DATES: All NFL clubs must reduce their active roster totals to 60 players on August 29, 1989 and to the final total of 45 players and a two-man inactive squad on September 4, 1989.

DEVELOPMENTAL SQUAD: On September 5th, 1989, clubs may establish a Developmental Squad of up to six players by signing free agents. Only rookies or first-year players (players who have been active in another professional football league or whose NFL experience is limited to training camp or fewer than three games on an Active List during the regular season or postseason) will be eligible for the Developmental Squad. If a club signs a player on its Developmental Squad to its Active List, it must either use one of its five free activations or request procedural recall waivers. No player can be moved directly from a club's Active List to its Developmental Squad. Such players must first be waived and terminated, then signed to a club's Developmental Squad. Clubs may not replace any injured Developmental Squad player until the club terminates him. Even if unable to practice, injured Developmental Squad players will continue to count within the six-player limit. Clubs are permitted to terminate a Developmental Squad player at any time, and the club may sign another player to its Developmental Squad. The League's waiver system will not apply to such termination.

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

1959

Nov. 16 American Football League's eighth and final franchise is awarded to William H. Sullivan, Jr.
Nov. 22 Northwestern RB Ron Burton is selected as first draft choice and Syracuse RB Gerhardt Schwedes is made first territorial choice.

1960

Feb. 8 Lou Saban is appointed first head coach.
Feb. 20 As the result of a public contest, the team nickname of Patriots is chosen. The Patriots also announce that the team colors will be red, white and blue.
April 1 Boston University Field is named as the Patriots' first home.
April 2 Patriots become first pro team in history to issue public stock.
April 19 Uniformed Patriot centering football (creative work of Boston—Worcester cartoonist Phil Bissell) is adopted as team logo.
July 4 Team opens first training camp at UMass, 350 players attend.
July 30 In the AFL's first ever preseason game, Patriots defeat Buffalo 28-7 at War Memorial Stadium. Patriots DE Bob Dee recovered fumble for the league's first TD.
Aug. 14 Patriots play their first home game ever at Harvard Stadium, a 24-14 loss to the Dallas Texans before 11,000 fans.
Sept. 9 In their first regular season game, the Patriots open with a 13-10 loss to Denver at B.U. Field before a crowd of 21,597.
Sept. 16 DB Chuck Shonta recovered a fumble on the final play of the game and ran for a TD to give the Patriots their first win ever by a 28-24 margin over the N.Y. Titans at the Polo Grounds in New York.

1963

Oct. 11 Patriots play their first game in Fenway Park and beat Oakland, 20-14.
Dec. 28 With a 26-8 victory over Buffalo, the Patriots win the AFL's Eastern Division title in the league's only playoff game ever held.

1964

Jan. 5 Lost AFL title game, 51-10, to the Chargers at San Diego.

1970

April 4 Foxboro selected as new site of Patriots' home.

1971

Mar. 22 Team is renamed New England Patriots.
Aug. 15 Sullivan Stadium, at the time known as Schaefer Stadium, is dedicated with Patriots first game there. Gino Cappelletti kicked a 36-yard FG for the first points scored in the stadium as the Patriots topped the NY Giants, 20-14, before 60,423 fans.

1972

Feb. 17 Made financial history by paying first cash dividend of 15 cents per share.

1973

Jan. 26 Chuck Fairbanks is named head coach and general manager.

1975

Nov. 7 President William H. Sullivan, Jr. became the first majority owner in club history when he purchased additional voting stock to give him 88 per cent of the franchise's voting stock.

1976

July 10 Patriots open their training camp for the first time at Bryant College in Smithfield, RI after spending the summers of 1969-75 at UMass/Amherst.
Dec. 8 Non-voting stockholders approve offer of \$15 per share made by Billy Sullivan to purchase all non-voting stock.
Dec. 18 Lost AFC wild card playoff game to the eventual Super Bowl Champion Oakland Raiders, 24-21, in the final ten seconds of play.

1977

Aug. 20 Work completed on installation of new surface (Super Turf) in Sullivan Stadium.

1978

Sept. 3 Mrs. William H. (Mary M.) Sullivan, Jr. elected to the Patriots Board of Directors.

Dec. 10 Patriots clinch their first outright divisional championship in the club's history with a last minute 26-24 victory over Buffalo at Foxboro.

Dec. 31 Patriots lose 31-14 to Houston in first playoff game ever played in Foxboro.

1979

April 2 Patriots announce that Head Coach and General Manager Chuck Fairbanks has been released from his contract to assume duties as Head Football Coach at the University of Colorado.

April 6 Francis "Bucko" Kilroy named as the new general manager and former Patriots' offensive coordinator Ron "Fargo" Erhardt named as head coach.

July 13 Patriots' Vice President Charles W. "Chuck" Sullivan is promoted to Executive Vice President of the club.

Sept. 3 Former Patriots' wide receiver Darryl Stingley is named Executive Director of Player Personnel.

Oct. 23 Jeanne Sullivan McKeigue is elected as member of the club's Board of Directors.

Dec. 16 Patriots close out 1979 regular season with 27-23 victory over Minnesota. Harold Jackson (1,013) and Stanley Morgan (1,002) become first Patriot players ever to transcend 1,000-yard season receiving mark.

1980

Feb. 25 Paul Sonnabend resigns as Executive Director of the NFL Management Council and is appointed as Vice President and a member of the Board of Directors of the Patriots.

April 8 William H. "Billy" Sullivan, Jr., President of the Patriots, is re-elected as Chairman of the Board of NFL Properties.

1981

Nov. 29 FB Sam Cunningham, with 35 yards on nine carries against St. Louis at Foxboro, surpasses Jim Nance (5,323 yards on 1,323 carries) as the Patriots' all-time career rushing leader.

1982

Jan. 15 Ron Meyer, Head Coach at SMU from 1976-81, is named the eighth Head Coach in club history.

1983

Jan. 8 In their first playoff appearance since 1978, the Patriots lose to the eventual AFC Champion Miami Dolphins at the Orange Bowl, 28-13.

Feb. 16 General Manager Bucko Kilroy is promoted to the position of Vice President and Patrick Sullivan, Assistant General Manager for four years, is named General Manager.

May 17 William F. Finucane and Jeannette Allen Keefe are elected to the Patriots' Board of Directors.

May 23 Schaefer Stadium is renamed Sullivan Stadium in honor of the founder and driving force behind the Patriots franchise, William H. "Billy" Sullivan, Jr.

June 29 Sullivan Stadium is officially re-dedicated and the Boston Pops performs a concert in the stadium that is open free-of-charge to the public.

1984

June 1 The Patriots organize a Fan Advisory Board, a group of season ticket holders who will help advise the Patriots on how to make Sullivan Stadium a more exciting and more pleasant place to bring a family to watch an NFL game.

June 5 In the first-ever NFL Supplemental Draft, the Patriots selected slotback Ricky Sanders of the Houston Gamblers, running back Eric Jordan of the Oakland Invaders and quarterback Walter Lewis of the Memphis Showboats.

Aug. 10 Work on a new turf, SuperTurf, is completed on the field. It is the second time that surface has been used at Sullivan Stadium. The original SuperTurf was installed in 1977.

Oct. 25 Hall of Fame pass receiver Raymond Berry is named the head coach of the Patriots, replacing Ron Meyer. Berry, a former Patriots assistant coach, becomes the team's ninth head coach.

1985

July 26 Patrick J. Sullivan, William H. Sullivan III and Mrs. Nancie Chamberlain are elected to the Patriots' Board of Directors.

Oct. 13 Raymond Clayborn establishes a new team record for consecutive starts by starting his 111 straight game. Ray Hamilton had the old mark of 110, done from September 16, 1973 to October 26, 1980. (Clayborn's streak started on September 3, 1978. He ended the season with 121). Clayborn celebrated the record-setting day by scoring his first pro interception touchdown (27 yards).

Dec. 28 The Patriots defeated the New York Jets, 26-14, at Giants Stadium (East Rutherford, N.J.) in the AFC Wildcard game. With the victory the Patriots win their first NFL playoff game (The Patriots had an 0-3 NFL playoff record prior to the game).

1986

Jan. 12 The Patriots beat the Miami Dolphins, 31-14, thus winning the AFC Championship. In doing so, the Patriots ended an 18-game losing streak at the Orange Bowl. It was also only the second time the Patriots won at the Orange Bowl (1966 was the other time).

Jan. 26 The Patriots play in Super Bowl XX, going against the Chicago Bears in the Louisiana Superdome in New Orleans. The Bears win the game, 46-10. The game, shown on NBC-TV, was the third-rated Super Bowl with a 48.3 rating and a 70 share (one rating point represents 859,000 TV households; a share is the percentage of sets in use). Only the 1982 and 1983 Super Bowls had higher ratings. It was the most widely-watched TV show ever—with 127 million viewers (topping the previous high of 121,600,000 who watched the final MASH show of February 28, 1983). The previous high Super Bowl in terms of viewers was Super Bowl XIX between the 49ers and the Dolphins (115,880,000). Also, 300 million people in China watched the game on tape delay.

Jan. 27 Defensive end Julius Adams retires after 15 years (all with the Patriots). Adams, the team's number two draft choice in 1971 out of Texas Southern, was the oldest active defensive lineman in the league at age 37 when he retired. He started the final 12 games of the regular season, and all four post-season games in 1985. He has the club record for games played with 196 (John Hannah follows with 186).

June 30 John Hannah, who was selected to the Pro Bowl a team record nine times (next nearest on team, six), announces his retirement from the game. Second in the team's record book for games-played with 183 (Julius Adams has lead with 196), the standout offensive guard had been selected to the All-NFL 25-year team (from 1960-84).

June 12 Coach Raymond Berry, who led the Patriots to the AFC Championship and Super Bowl XX in his first full season as the team's head coach, signs new five-year contract.

Sept. 7 1985 AFC Championship banner raised at Sullivan Stadium in pre-game ceremony (prior to opening game vs. Indianapolis Colts). The banner is 10 feet wide and 15 feet long. Mr. William H. Sullivan, Jr. is joined by the governors from each of the New England states.

Sept. 21 QB Tony Eason throws for team record 414 yards (400 previous record, done by Vito 'Babe Parilli in 1964). The Patriots lost to Seattle, 38-31, in the game played in Foxboro. Eason was 26 of 45 with three TDs and no interceptions.

Dec. 7 WR Stanley Morgan establishes a new team record for catches in one season with his 67th catch of the season (had five catches in the day). Morgan, who finished the season with 84 catches, broke Derrick Ramsey's previous mark of 66 catches, done in 1984.

Dec. 31 NEP Partners purchase a three-year option to buy the Patriots.

1987

Sept. 13 Patriots become first NFL team to have its games on a French-speaking radio network on a regular basis. CKLM—a 50,000-watt station out of Laval, Quebec, Canada—was the flagship station (others were CJSA in Ste. Agathe, Que., CKSL in St. Jovite, Que., and CJER in St. Jerome, Que.). Pierre Donais was the announcer.

Sept. 13 Patriots begin four-year, five-million dollar contract with WHDH-Boston.

Nov. 29 Cornerback Raymond Clayborn ends his streak of having played in 161 straight contests—and started in 147 consecutive games—when he couldn't play vs. Philadelphia at Sullivan Stadium due to knee injury suffered week before vs. Indianapolis Colts on November 22nd. Clayborn, who went on IR on November 24th (spent rest of season on list), broke Gino Cappelletti's record of 152 consecutive games-played and Ray Hamilton's 110 consecutive starts.

1988

July 11 The Patriots retire the number 57 worn by 14-year linebacker Steve Nelson, who retired following the 1987 season. Nelson played in three

Pro Bowls and led the team in tackles eight years.

July 28 Victor K. Kiam II, the owner and chief executive officer (CEO) of Remington Products, Inc. of Bridgeport, Ct., agrees to purchase the team from William H. Sullivan, Jr.

Oct. 28 Victor K. Kiam II becomes majority owner of the Patriots. He will be chairman of the team. Francis W. Murray, the minority owner, is the vice chairman. William H. Sullivan, Jr., the founder and previous owner, remains as the team's president. The Kiam, Murray and Sullivan team is known as KMS Limited.

Dec. 4 Veteran wide receiver Stanley Morgan catches his 500th career pass, on a 19-yarder (26 seconds remaining in the first quarter) vs. Seattle.

1989

Jan. 6 Running back John Stephens named the Old Spice/NFL Rookie of the Year.





Ron Burton provided an inspirational boost for the Patriots as he heroically returned to play just a few weeks after disc surgery. Jack Rudolph led a Patriots defensive charge with 11 tackles while helping hold Buffalo's big back, Cookie Gilchrist to just 7 yards. Buffalo's only highlight of the day was a 93-yard scoring pass from Darryl Lamonica to Elbert Dubenion.

San Diego (Balboa Stadium), Jan. 5, 1964 —Charger Keith Lincoln and injuries to star FB Larry Garron (concussion), Houston Antwine (back) and Harry Crump (shoulder) spelled disaster for the Patriots as the 6 1/2 point favorite Chargers coasted to a 51-10 victory. Lincoln rushed for an amazing 206 yards on the ground and added 123 more yards in receptions. The Chargers ran up a 31-10 lead at the half, and added 20 more unanswered points in the second half to capture the AFL title.

1976 AFC DIVISIONAL PLAYOFFS OAKLAND 24, PATRIOTS 21

Oakland (Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum), Dec. 18 — The surprising Patriots, having finished a complete turnaround with an 11-3 record (3-11 in 1975), travelled to Oakland to meet the Raiders in their first playoff competition since 1963. The Patriots jumped in front of the Raiders 7-0 on a 1 yard run by Andy Johnson, but fell behind at the half 10-7 when Fred Biletnikoff hauled in a 31 yard scoring pass from Ken Stabler with just 39 seconds left on the clock. Steve Grogan engineered scoring drives on the Patriots first two possessions of the third quarter, running the Patriots lead to 21-10 at the end of three quarters of play. Oakland responded with a score on its first possession of the fourth period, a one yard run off left tackle by Mark van Eeghan. With the score at 21-17 in the Patriots favor, John Smith attempted a 50 yard FG with 4:12 remaining, but the kick was low and the Patriots hung on to a slim 21-17 lead. Ken Stabler rallied the Oakland squad, driving the Raiders from their own 32 after the Smith FG attempt, and hitting pay-dirt for the winning score with only 14 seconds to go. The drive was marred by a controversial roughing the passer call on Ray Hamilton. The Patriots had seemingly stopped the Raiders when a Stabler to Garrett pass on a 3rd and 18 from the Patriot 27 fell incomplete, but penalty flags were thrown and the Raiders had possession with a first and ten at the Patriot 13. Five plays later Stabler rolled around left end for the winning score and the Patriots dreams of a championship in their rags to riches season were over. The loss was the closest one in the playoffs for the Raiders on their way to their Super Bowl Championship. The Patriots were the only team to beat the Raiders (48-17 on 10-3-76) during the regular season as they registered at 13-1 record.

1978 AFC DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF HOUSTON 31, PATRIOTS 14

Foxboro (Schaefer Stadium), Dec. 31 — With the AFC East Division title tucked under their belts, the Patriots played host to the Houston Oilers in the first playoff game ever played at Schaefer Stadium. The Oilers earned the right to meet the Patriots after handing the Dolphins a 17-9 defeat at the Orange Bowl a week earlier. The Patriots had finished the season at 11-6, but were reeling from the controversy that started when Coach Chuck Fairbanks announced his resignation to accept the head coaching position at Colorado. The game found Fairbanks on the Patriots sidelines, however, but the last day of 1978 also proved the last day of the Patriots '78 season. Dan Pastorini completed 10 of 13 passes for 184 yards in the first half as the Oilers built a 21-0 lead at the intermission. Toni Fritsch added a 30-yard FG before the Patriots rallied with two TDs in the second half, on a 24-yard score on an option pass from RB Andy Johnson to WR Harold Jackson and the other on a 24-yard scoring strike from sub QB Tom Owen to TE Russ Francis. Owen had replaced starter Steve Grogan late in the first half. With the score Houston 24, Patriots 14, the Patriots began a late rally. Starting at their own 18, the Patriots started to move but Gregg Bingham picked off an Owen for Morgan pass and returned it to the Patriot 18, killing the drive and setting up an Earl Campbell 2-yard TD run that put the game out of reach. SS Doug Beaudoin had a big day on defense, making 8 tackles and adding 7 assists, while ILB Steve Nelson added 5 tackles and 5 assists.

1982-1983
SUPER BOWL TOURNAMENT
MIAMI 28, PATRIOTS 13

Miami (Orange Bowl), Jan. 8, 1983 — Finishing seventh in the 14-team AFC field, the Patriots were slated to meet the second-seeded Miami Dolphins in the first round of the 1982-83 Super Bowl XVII Tournament. Before a sellout crowd, the Patriots got on the scoreboard first, taking an early second period 3-0 lead on a 23-yard FG by John Smith. Behind the precision passing of David Woodley (16 of 19, 234 yards, 2 TDs), the Dolphins scored four TDs while the Patriots could only muster another Smith FG (42 yards) through the first three periods. A spectacular defensive effort by the Dolphins limited the Patriots and Steve Grogan to 189 passing yards, sacking Grogan four times and intercepting him twice. FB Andra Franklin, the AFC's second leading rusher in regular season play, carried the ball 26 times for 112 yards to enable the Dolphins to control the ball for 35 minutes and 51 seconds. Making their first playoff appearance since 1978, the Patriots 49-man roster included only 16 players from the 1978 playoff squad. Starting SS Roland James was placed on the injured reserve list two days prior to the game with a knee injury and was replaced in the starting lineup by Keith Lee. Early in the game, starting DE Ken Sims sprained his left ankle and left the game. He later returned, but re-injured the ankle and left the game for good midway through the second stanza.

E. RUTHERFORD, N.J.—In downing the New York Jets, 26-14, the Patriots had heroes aplenty—Tony Eason's 12 of 16 passing for 179 yards, rookie defensive end Garin Veris with three sacks for 35 yards (Patriots had five as a team), interceptions from defensive back Fred Marion and Veris, a 15 yard fumble return for a touchdown by reserve linebacker Johnny Rembert and an NFL Playoff record tying four field goals by veteran placekicker Tony Franklin.

And those, quite frankly, were just a few of the many heroes that New England had in mustering its first playoff win in the NFL and its first playoff win in 22 years.

New England was in arrears just a couple of times in the game, both coming in the second quarter—a 7-3 score five seconds into the second quarter when Johnny Hector caught an 11 yard touchdown pass from quarterback Ken O'Brien, followed by a Pat Leahy PAT kick; and 7-6 after Franklin made a 41 yard field goal 4:04 into the second quarter.

New England scored 17 points on the four Jets turnovers (two touchdowns, one field goal).

The Jets were held to just 58 yards rushing in 21 carries for a 2.8 average and a long gain of seven yards while the Patriots ran for 99 yards in 39 carries for a 2.5 average with a long of 12 yards (both Craig James and Tony Eason had 12 yard runs). Freeman McNeil led the Jets in rushing with 41 yards on 16 carries and Craig James led the Patriots with 49 yards on 22 carries.

LOS ANGELES, CA.—The Patriots took advantage of three fumbles lost and three interceptions in defeating the home-standing Los Angeles Raiders, 27-20.

The Patriots scored their first touchdown, a 13-yd pass to Lin Dawson, thanks to a fumble recovery by rookie defensive back Jim Bowman (on the Los Angeles 21 yard line).

The Raiders narrowed the score to 7-3, due in big part to a blocked punt against Patriots kicker Rich Camarillo. The ball was recovered on the New England 16 yard line, and four plays later, Matt Bahr had a 29 yard field goal. The Raiders did take a 10-7 lead on their next possession, when quarterback Marc Wilson found rookie Jesse Hester for a 16 yard score.

Los Angeles went in front, 17-7, when a Mosi Tatupu fumble was recovered at the New England 19. Three plays later, Marcus Allen took a pitch right for an 11 yard touchdown. Not to be denied, the Patriots hustled back, making it 17-10, on an 80-yard, 10-play drive that ended with Craig James sweeping the left corner behind a block by John Hannah for a two yard touchdown run.

Ronnie Lippett's second interception of the day gave the Patriots a 45 yard field goal and a 17-17 tie. But the Raiders had the lead at halftime, 20-17, on a 32 yard field goal by Bahr. The rest of the scoring was done by the Patriots—a 32 yard field goal by Franklin 54 yards and 12 plays after Fred Marion had recovered a fumble on the New England 32 yard line and then right after that a fumble recovery in the endzone by Bowman off the kickoff return, thus making it 27-20.

The Patriots were still in the hunt with 1:41 left, however. The ball was on the Denver 10 yard line on a first and 10 situation. But when Eason faded back to pass he was immediately pressured by Broncos defensive end Rulon Jones—and was sacked for two points.



RADIO NETWORK



DALE ARNOLD

The radio tandem of Dale Arnold and Gino Cappelletti will be describing every play of every exciting New England Patriots game in 1989 over the 48-station Patriots' Radio Network.

Arnold, who will handle the play-by-play, is a 33-year-old New England-born announcer who was the smooth radio voice of the New Jersey Devils of the National Hockey League for the 1986-87 seasons. Prior to his work with the Devils, Arnold was the voice of the American Hockey League's Maine Mariners for six seasons. During that time, he was named Maine Sportscaster of the Year in 1982 and was the 1985 recipient of the AHL's MacKenzie Award, which is awarded to the person who best promotes their team and the league. Born in Bourne, Mass., Arnold lived in Brunswick, Maine for 18 years, including four years at Bowdoin College, which he graduated from in 1979. Arnold started working in radio at the age of 15 when he began doing high school football for WKXA in Brunswick, which eventually led to Bowdoin College football and hockey.

Cappelletti, the color analyst, had an outstanding playing career with the Patriots from 1960-70. As a wide receiver and kicker, he played in 152 consecutive games and established the Patriots' all-time career scoring mark of 1,130 points. After his brilliant career on the field, he quickly became recognized as an outstanding broadcaster. From 1972-78, he was the color analyst on the Patriots' Radio Network along with play-by-play announcer Gil Santos. In addition, Cappelletti also did color for all Boston College games during that same time span. In 1979 he jumped to the coaching ranks, serving as assistant coach in charge of special teams for the Patriots. After three seasons on the sidelines, he returned to broadcasting and spent three years as a weekend sports reporter for WBZ radio. In 1987 he returned to the announcing booth as color analyst for BC football.

The Patriots' Radio Network, headed by flagship station WHDH in Boston, is comprised of 48 stations. The network carries all of the Patriots' preseason and regular season games.



SULLIVAN STADIUM



There are new owners of Sullivan Stadium. The change took place over the just-passed off-season as Robert Kraft, president and one of the owners of WNEV-TV (channel 7, the CBS affiliate) in Boston and Boston businessman Steven Karp purchased the stadium from Stadium Management Corporation (SMC).

In addition to his work with Channel 7, Kraft is a very successful businessman, with the International Forest Products company in Boston (makers of corrugated boxes) one of his firms. Karp is a major developer of real estate, building malls and office complexes.

Sullivan Stadium has gone through some other changes through the years. One of the biggest was its name being changed. When it was built, the stadium was known as Schaefer Stadium, and then on May 23, 1983 it was changed to its present name, as part of a long-term, multi-million dollar marketing agreement between Anheuser-Busch, Inc. and SMC.

At that time, Charles B. Fruit, Vice President — National Media for Anheuser-Busch, said, "We have named this facility Sullivan Stadium as a tribute to the founder, owner and driving force of the Patriots, William H. Sullivan, Jr." Fruit also added that Sullivan and his family—one of the most prominent sporting families in America and New England—have made many contributions to the Greater Boston and Foxboro communities, and to the economic well-being of both.

Sullivan Stadium was originally built at the cost of \$6.7 million and financed through the private sale of more than 400,000 shares of stock in Stadium Realty Trust. The official ground breaking ceremony took place on September 23, 1970 and 326 days later (August 15, 1971) the first game was played at the new Foxboro facility. In that game, the Patriots posted a 20-14 win over the NY Giants before 60,423 fans.

With space to park 16,000 automobiles surrounding the stadium, the site covers an area of 15 acres and is as long as it is wide, 700 feet. In the process of excavating the bowl shape for the stadium, 250,000 cubic yards of earth was removed from the 35-feet deep hole. The J.F. White Construction Company of Newton, MA, then used 15,000 cubic yards of concrete and 660 tons of steel to erect the stadium.

Sullivan Stadium has had three different field surfaces during its existence with the newest installation being completed in 1984. In 1977, the original Poly-Turf surfaced was removed, an entirely new drainage system installed, the field crown raised four inches and the entire field was resurfaced with a SuperTurf carpet. During the 1984 field resurfacing project, SuperTurf was again used to cover the Sullivan Stadium floor. Lighting is provided by three towers with 324 mercury lamps (1500 watts per), 200 candle power per square foot on the playing field.

On November 6, 1981, the newly formed Stadium Management Corporation (SMC) headed by Patriots' Executive Vice President Chuck Sullivan, completed the purchase of the then-named Schaefer Stadium and its related assets from Stadium Realty Trust. During the ensuing off-season, SMC began a multi-million dollar renovation and improvement program. With the work being done by the stadium's original builder, J.F. White Construction Company, the stadium took on a new look. Featured in the program was the installation of a Diamond Vision full color instant replay video scoreboard, a 20,000 square foot addition to the Patriots' administrative building, a complete renovation of the stadium's restroom facilities and the addition of 42 stadium suites to the press box facility. Included in the press box renovation was the addition of two more levels to the original two (including a fully-modem media level) and the construction of two additional elevators to the existing one in service.

Prior to the major improvement work being completed, the stadium capacity was 61,297 for football. The new stadium capacity is now 60,794 and includes 6,103 endzone seats, 504 luxury seats, 5,604 sideline chairs, 675 corner chair seats and 47,908 sideline seats.

To the people of New England, the name Sullivan Stadium has meaning far beyond the Patriots Football Club. Boston College, for example, has played some of their biggest games here. In 1984, BC fans roared their excitement as the Doug Flutie-led team competed against North Carolina and Syracuse.


On yet another level of football, Sullivan Stadium continues to host the High School Super Bowl games. The outcome of Eastern Massachusetts' three largest divisional championships is determined on the Patriots' home ground.

Outside of football, the Stadium has presented popular entertainment extravaganzas on a regular basis during the spring and summer months. Over the past few years, such names as **The Police, David Bowie, Simon and Garfunkel, Willie Nelson, Madonna, Bob Dylan, U2, the Grateful Dead, Van Halen and Pink Floyd** have taken center stage there.

In addition, fans have echoed the roars of super-engines during **Truck/Traction Pulls** and **Supercross** events. Whole families have enjoyed the diverse entertainment offered at the traditional **New England Fair** and people of all nationalities happily participate in an annual **New England Irish Festival**. A significant **Pro Wrestling** event featuring such legends as Hulk Hogan and Rowdy Roddy Piper was also staged in 1985.

During the summer of 1988, in addition to the **New England Fair**, the Stadium hosted an **international soccer match** between Portugal and Italy.

This summer, the Stadium hosted **The Who** in addition to holding a drum and bugle competition — and there was even an opera, the **Aida Opera**.

BRYANT COLLEGE



Since 1976, the Patriots have conducted summer practice sessions at Bryant College in Smithfield, Rhode Island. Situated on a beautiful 295-acre campus located 12 miles northwest of Providence, Bryant offers a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration and Criminal Justice at the undergraduate level, as well as graduate programs in Business Administration and Science in Taxation. Bryant's enrollment includes 3,000 full-time day students and 2,850 evening students. More than 2,000 students reside on campus.

Bryant has a 126-year-old tradition of excellence in business education and relocated from a Providence campus in 1971. Since that time, the campus has expanded to accommodate an ever-increasing student enrollment. The focal point of the campus is the award-winning Unistructure (pictured above) that houses faculty and administrative offices as well as classrooms, a swimming pool, bank, U.S. Post Office, dining facilities and the Patriots' summer offices.

In 1981, a newly-completed Multipurpose Activities Center (MAC) was opened adjacent to the original physical education building. These structures provide the Patriots with expansive areas for their locker rooms, athletic training staff, equipment storage and the team's strength and conditioning center.

A new student union called Bryant Center opened in November of 1986, while a new freshman dormitory named Dormitory 15 opened in September of 1986. Bryant Center, a triangular, three-level structure, houses a variety of dining areas, several convenience stores, the campus bookstore, recreation rooms and student organization offices. Dormitory 15 houses more than 300 students.

In 1987, the college opened a computer lab, the Kossler Technology Center.

Roger Begin, the Rhode Island Lieutenant Governor, is a 1976 Bryant College graduate. Also, pro golfer Jim Hallett is a 1983 graduate and Steve Crowley, the money management editor for ABC-TV's Good Morning America, is a 1970 graduate.

Since moving their summer training site to Bryant, the Patriots have amassed a 113-73 regular-season record (60.7%), indicative of the fine preseason training facilities offered at the Smithfield campus.


