ON THE COVER

For the first time in seven years, the Patriots sent three players to the Pro Bowl in 1994. Bruce Armstrong (78) made his third appearance, starting at left tackle for the AFC squad. Ben Coates (87), who set an NFL reception record for tight ends with 96 catches, made his first appearance as a starter and Drew Bledsoe (11) made his first Pro Bowl appearance in just his second season in the NFL. Interview Requests: All interview requests for Patriots players, coaches or members of the administration must be channeled through the Patriots public relations department. Head coach Bill Parcells will address the media during press conferences on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday and following each game throughout the season. Players will be available during their lunch break in the Patriots Stadium Club on the same days. The locker room will be open from 11:45 a.m. till 12:30 p.m. Any media member in need of locker room access will be escorted by a member of the Patriots public relations staff.

Credential Requests: All credential requests must be submitted in writing to Don Lowery at least one week in advance. Accredited media will be issued credentials on a priority basis, based on size of affiliation. Arrangements to pick up individual game credentials can be made with Don Lowery during the week of the game. All remaining credentials will be left at Press Will Call outside the press elevator at Gate 4.

Walking Directions from the Stadium to the Locker Room: An escort will be provided for members of the media with five minutes remaining in the game. After that, please take the press elevator to the ground level and continue north (straight ahead) when exiting the stadium. Continue down the hill and enter, showing your media credential, at Gate 1 (visitor locker room ramp). Both locker rooms will be open to the media after a brief cool down period following the game.

- June 15 Deadline for club to withdraw qualifying offer to restricted free agents and still retain exclusive negotiating rights by substituting tender of one-year contract at 110 percent of previous year's salary.
- July 15 Signing period ends at 4 p.m. for unrestricted free agents to whom June 1 tender was made by old club, transition players, and franchise players who are subject to the rules for transition players. **Owner and

Robert Kraft begins his second season as owner of the New England Patriots after leading the organization through a historic turnaround during one of the most exciting seasons in the 35 years of the franchise's existence.

Kraft's fulfillment of his commitment to provide the team with the resources to make it a competitive National Football League franchise has helped the team reach a level of popularity unmatched since its founding. In his first year of ownership, the Patriots announced a complete sellout for the season prior to the 1994 home opener – assuring that every game would be televised throughout the local region for the first time in Patriots history. What fans saw was a season-ending seven game win streak that put the Patriots in the playoffs for the first time since 1986.

The excitement generated by the team's performance in 1994 propelled season ticket sales to an unprecedented level. On March 30, 1995, season ticket sales were capped at 59,000, allowing just over 1,200 tickets per game to be sold on an individual basis. Those tickets were released for sale on Saturday, April 29 and, within 30 minutes, all 12,000 seats were sold. It is the first time in franchise history that the team has been completely sold out for every game, including both preseason games.

Kraft has strong personal ties to the Patriots. He became a fan of the Boston Patriots in the early '60s when the American Football League franchise played at Fenway Park. When the team moved to Foxboro, Kraft became a season ticket holder, which he has held since 1972. He still credits Patriots games at Foxboro as some of his warmest memories of raising his family.

A native of Brookline, Mass., Kraft attended local public schools before entering Columbia University on an academic scholarship. While attending Columbia, he also played football. Upon graduation, he received a fellowship to attend the Harvard School of Business, where he earned a master's degree in business administration.

Kraft began his business career with the Rand-Whitney Group, Inc. of Worcester, Mass., a company he later acquired. In 1972, he founded International Forest Products, a trader of paper commodities which does business in over 80 countries around the world. Together, Rand-Whitney and International Forest Products comprise one of the largest privately-owned paper and packaging companies in the United States.

In addition, Kraft is president of the International Forest Products Group of Companies, which has manufacturing operations in Europe, South America, Asia and the Middle East. From 1986 to 1991, he was president and a major shareholder of the New England Television Corp., the parent company of WHDH-AM and WHDH-TV, then the CBS network affiliate in Boston. He is currently the chairman of Chestnut Hill Management, a money management firm which specializes in high-return equities. In addition to owning the Patriots, he also owns the stadium in which they play – Foxboro Stadium. The stadium is New England's premier family entertainment venue and has been the host of




many major music acts over the past several years, including the Rolling Stones, Aerosmith and Elton John. In 1994, Foxboro Stadium was one of nine venues nationwide to host the World Cup, soccer's premier event. Since then, Kraft has taken ownership of the Boston franchise in the newly formed Major League Soccer, which will begin play in the spring of 1996.

Kraft has had a long-time interest in sports. In the 1970s, he was the owner of the Boston Lobsters professional tennis team and recruited the legendary Martina Navratilova to join the squad. Navratilova went on to win her first Wimbledon after Kraft brought in tennis coach Roy Emerson to train the international tennis star.

Over the past 20 years, Kraft and his wife, Myra, have been very active in charitable and civic affairs. He serves on the Executive Committee of the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute. Kraft serves on the Board of Overseers of the Boston Symphony Orchestra. He is also a trustee of Columbia University and serves on the Board of Directors for the Harvard Business School. He is the recipient of honorary degrees from Boston University, Curry College and Suffolk University.

Jonathan A. Kraft, entering his second season with the Patriots, was appointed Vice President and Owner's Representative on January 21, 1994. He was a key figure in the negotiations which led to the purchase of the franchise. In addition to his role with the Patriots, Kraft will continue as the Chief Executive Officer of Rand-Whitney Containerboard, the only paper company in the world which manufacturers products from 100 percent post-consumer waste and 100 percent post-consumer waste water. He will continue to serve as a director for both the Rand-Whitney Group and International Forest Products.


Kraft played the lead role in securing the 1991 and 1992 National Earth Day concerts at the stadium. He has been the chief negotiator for the stadium in securing the appearances of a number of major musical acts, including The Rolling Stones, Aerosmith, Elton John and Billy Joel. BILL PARCELLS



Head Coach

Bill Parcells became the 12th head coach of the New England Patriots on January 21, 1993. At a press conference that day, Parcells discussed his objective upon returning to New England to finish his coaching career.

"I want to improve the Patriots to the point where we can compete for a championship," stated the two-time Super Bowl champion. "I pledge to the fans and the players that I won't rest until we approach that goal."

What sounded like a lofty goal for a coach who had just inherited a 2-14 team now appears within reach after just two seasons under his direction.

The rebuilding process began the day Parcells took command. Committed to bringing New England an NFL championship, Parcells immediately began assembling a solid foundation of young talent from which to build. His first order of business was to acquire a strong, young quarterback to lead the Patriots, which he did with the selection of Drew Bledsoe, the first pick in the 1993 NFL draft.

His Patriot auditions led to the acquisition of over 30 new players for the 1993 season. He and his staff worked diligently to assemble the new talent and to develop it into a cohesive unit. The Patriots showed weekly progress throughout the season and improved in nearly every statistical category from the previous year. In 1992, the Patriots ranked 27th in the league in offense and 19th in defense. In just one season, they improved to 12th offensively and 13th defensively. One of the most telling turnabouts attributed to Parcells was the elimination of penalties upon his arrival. In 1992, New England was one of the two most penalized teams in the league (111 penalties for 1,051 yards). One year later, they boasted the fewest penalties in the league (64 for 468 yards). The weekly improvement during the season culminated into a season-ending four-game win streak, the team's longest season-ending streak since 1976.

In 1994, fans saw the development of the young talent Parcells had assembled transcend from a 3-5 team at midseason into a 10-6 playoff team. After scoring 26 unanswered points in a 26-20 overtime victory vs. the Minnesota Vikings (11/13/94), the Patriots launched a season-ending seven-game win streak. The streak catapulted the Patriots from worst in the AFC East standings into a tie for first and a wild-card playoff berth.

For the Patriots, it was their first winning season in six years and their first postseason appearance since 1986. Parcells' ability to rebuild the team from a 2-14 record in 1992 into a playoff team just two seasons later led to a number of postseason accolades for the veteran coach. At season's end, Parcells carted off seven Coach of the Year honors from Associated Press, the Maxwell Club and various football publications.

The season-ending victory over Chicago (12/24/94) not only



clinched a playoff berth for the team, but it also cast Parcells among the elite in his profession as he became just the 25th coach in NFL history to register 100 career victories. Having accomplished that milestone in just 10 seasons in the NFL reflects the success he has enjoyed. Entering the 1995 season, only Don Shula (337 wins), Dan Reeves (138), Marv Levy (127) and Marty Schottenheimer (108) have more career victories among active coaches. In addition, Parcells is only one of three active coaches to have claimed multiple NFL titles (1986 and 1990), along with Shula (with Miami in 1972 and 1973) and San Francisco's George Seifert (1989 and 1994).

His first head coaching opportunity was presented to him while serving as an assistant coach on Ray Perkins' New York Giants coaching staff. Following the 1982 regular season, Perkins resigned as the team's head coach and was named the successor to Paul "Bear" Bryant at the University of Alabama. Parcells was then promoted from defensive coordinator to fill the head coaching vacancy.

In 1983, Parcells inherited a team that was coming off losing records in eight of their previous nine seasons and had been to the playoffs just once in 20 years. As if that were not enough to overcome, the club was besieged by injuries, as 25 players spent a portion of their season on the injured reserve list. Those injuries were a major factor in the Giants' league-leading 58 turnovers that season.

Yet, the hurdles the first-year head coach had to overcome on the field were minute in comparison to those he had to endure off the field. The tragic chain of events began in October of 1983 when Parcells lost his backfield coach and friend, Bob Ledbetter, who died of a sudden stroke. That was followed by the passing of former Giant running back Doug Kotar and the deaths of both of Parcells' parents within six weeks of each other late in the season.

That year, the team finished with a 3-12-1 record – last in the division. Arguably, it was the toughest year a rookie coach has had to endure in modern NFL history. Despite that, Parcells prevailed and following the season began working diligently to rebuild the franchise.

In 1984, the Giants began their metamorphosis. Between the years 1984 and 1990, New York recorded six winning seasons, including five trips to the playoffs and two Super Bowl Championships. During his eight seasons, Parcells totaled an 85-52-1 career record (.620 winning percentage), second among the winningest coaches in Giants history, behind the legendary Hall of Famer Steve Owen (151-100-17).

In an effort to prevent another injury-prone season, Parcells initiated a year-round conditioning program. The program had an immediate effect, reducing the number of players listed on injured reserve from 25 in 1983 to only seven in 1984. The Giants finished second in the NFC East with a 9-7 record and qualified for a wild-card playoff berth. Parcells notched his first playoff victory in his first attempt, with a 16-13 decision over the Los Angeles Rams. The following week, the Giants lost a hard-fought game to the eventual Super Bowl champion San Francisco 49ers, 21-10. In recognition of his accomplishments, Parcells earned NFC East Coach of the Year honors by *Pro Magazine* and finished second in two major NFL Coach of the Year polls one to the 49ers' Bill Walsh and the other to Seattle's Chuck Knox.

In 1985, New York finished 10-6 and returned to the playoffs. In the first round they avenged their 1984 playoff loss with a 17-3 victory over the defending champion San Francisco 49ers. The following week, the Giants were again ousted from the playoffs by the eventual Super Bowl champion, the Chicago Bears. The back-to-back playoff appearances was a task that no other Giant coach had accomplished in over 20 years.

In 1986, Parcells' Giants registered their greatest single-season record ever with 17 wins and only two defeats. They also set a club mark



by winning 12 consecutive games, which culminated with a 39-20 triumph over the Denver Broncos in Super Bowl XXI. In three playoff games, the Giants set an NFL record for cumulative margin of victory with a 102-23 advantage. Parcells was named NFL Coach of the Year in nearly every major publication in the country, a fitting tribute for the spectacular season that he had masterminded.

In 1989, Parcells again earned NFL Coach of the Year honors from NFL Films and NFC Coach of the Year honors from the *Washington Post* for his 12-4 first-place finish. The following season, Parcells led New York's triumphant return to the Super Bowl, winning a dramatic 20-19 decision over the Buffalo Bills. Following the 1990 championship season, Parcells learned of a threatening heart condition and on May 15, 1991 resigned from coaching.

Prior to accepting the Patriots head coaching responsibilities in 1993, Parcells spent two seasons as an NBC Sports football analyst. In the fall of 1991, he served as a studio host with Bob Costas, O.J. Simpson and Will McDonough. The following year, he returned to NBC as a game analyst and provided color commentary alongside veteran play-by-play announcer Marv Albert. Parcells' broadcast career was postponed when physicians gave him the medical "green light" to resume his coaching career, which the Patriots made possible by offering him their head coaching responsibilities on January 21, 1993.

The Oradell, N.J. native was a member of the first graduating class at River Dell (Oradell) High in 1959. He was a three-sport letterman, starring in basketball, football and baseball. He captained and earned all-league honors in each of the respective sports. The tri-sport captain saw double-duty in football, as a quarterback and linebacker, and in baseball as a pitcher and catcher.

He attended Colgate in 1960, then transferred to Wichita State (1961-63), where he excelled as a linebacker. In a game against Tulsa, Parcells ravished the Golden Hurricane backfield, compiling 20 tackles and six sacks. He earned All-Missouri Valley Conference honors as a senior and played in the 1963 Blue-Gray and 1964 College All-Star Games. Opting for a coaching career, rather than playing professionally, he joined the staff at Hastings College (Neb.) in 1964 as a defensive assistant. He returned to his alma mater in 1965 to coach the defensive line, before joining Tom Cahill's staff at West Point as the linebacker coach in 1966. After coaching Army's Black Knights for four seasons (1966-69), he directed the linebackers at Florida State for three years (1970-72). He then went on to serve as defensive coordinator at both Vanderbilt (1973-74) and Texas Tech (1975-77). He received his first head coaching assignment at the Air Force Academy in 1978, where he piloted the Cadets to a 3-8 record.

Parcells left the collegiate circuit in 1979 to accept an assistant position on Ray Perkins' staff with the New York Giants. Personal matters forced Parcells to resign from the Giants prior to the season.

In 1980, he resumed his coaching career as the New England Patriots' linebackers coach on Ron Erhardt's staff. The following season, Parcells left New England to return to the New York Giants as Perkins' defensive coordinator and linebackers coach. Prior to his arrival, the Giants had allowed 425 points to the opposition in 1980. In his first season with the Giants, Parcells installed the 3-4 defense, revamped the secondary and produced a defensive unit which allowed only 257 points and finished the year ranked third in the league. New York posted a 9-7 record, the first winning season recorded in nine years, and qualified for the playoffs for the first time since 1963. The following year, the Giants finished with a 4-5 record during the strike-shortened 1982 season. Following the season, Coach Perkins announced his resignation and the Giants named Parcells as his successor. Nearly 10 years later, the two coaches were reunited when Parcells



named Perkins as his offensive coordinator.

He was born Duane Charles (Bill) Parcells on August 22, 1941, in Englewood, N.J. Bill and his wife, Judith, have three daughters; Suzy, Jill and Dallas, and one grandson, Kyle.

PARCELLS VS. THE NFL

In 10 NFL seasons, Parcells has already accrued 100 career victories and won two NFL titles. He has claimed at least one victory against 27 of the 30 NFL teams (he has not yet coached against the New York Giants or either of the two expansion teams, Carolina and Jacksonville). Of those 27 teams, only six hold series advantages. He has experienced his greatest individual series success against the Cardinals with a 12-4-1 record (.735 winning percentage). In terms of divisional opponents, Parcells has enjoyed his greatest success against the NFC Central (.739). Below is a team-by-team and division-by-division look at Parcells' record vs. the NFL:

**"MR. DECEMBER"**

Bill Parcells has enjoyed much success during his 10-year coaching tenure. Over the years, his teams have always played their best when it counts the most – at the end of the season. It is this trait that has earned Parcells the moniker "Mr. December."

In 1986, his Giants were undefeated during the month of December en route to a playoff sweep and Parcells' first of two Super Bowl Championships.

When Parcells joined the Patriots in 1993, the team had only won 41.5 percent of their games during the month of December in the history of the franchise. Between 1990 and 1992, the Patriots won only two of 13 games (13 percent). That trend has since been reversed.

Since Parcells' arrival, the Patriots are 7-1 in the month of December and were one of only two teams in 1994 to go undefeated during the month. The team now has a 51-63 overall record during the month.

If you dismiss his "rookie" season, his winning percentage improves from 65.9 to 71.1 percent. Since 1986, his overall December record is 22-6, a winning percentage of 78.6.



COACHING: Maurice Carthon, now in his second season as an assistant coach, joined the New England Patriots coaching staff on February 8, 1994. Carthon, a punishing blocking back during his eight-year NFL career, was a member of Bill Parcells' 1986 and 1990 Super Bowl Championship teams with the Giants. During his career, Carthon never missed a game due to injury. His only absence in eight seasons was due to an illness in the family. His determination and work ethic as a player was an important factor in his hiring. In 1994, Carthon served as an offensive assistant, with an emphasis on the running back position. In 1995, he will assist newly appointed running back coach Charlie Weis and special teams coach Mike Sweatman.


PLAYING: During his career, Carthon was revered as one of the premier blocking backs in the NFL. He completed his eight-year NFL career with 300 carries for 950 yards and two touchdowns. He was also credited with 745 yards and a touchdown on 90 receptions. Statistically, his best performance came in 1986 when he rushed for an NFL career-high 260 yards and helped the New York Giants claim the first of two NFL titles during his seven-year tenure with the Giants. His NFL single-game career high came in 1990 when he gained 67 yards on 12 carries against the Phoenix Cardinals. He began his professional career in the United States Football League after being drafted by the New Jersey Generals in the eighth round of the 1983 USFL draft. In three seasons with the Generals, Carthon rushed for 2,102 yards and 20 touchdowns while being counted upon to block for the league's all-time leading rusher, Herschel Walker. In 1984, Carthon started all 18 games and finished the season with a professional career-high 1,042 yards rushing and 11 touchdowns. He made the successful transition to the NFL in 1985, when he signed with the New York Giants as a free agent and started eight of the 16 games. In seven seasons with the Giants, Carthon played six seasons for Bill Parcells and helped him claim two NFL championships. He ended his playing career as a member of the Indianapolis Colts in 1992 and retired following that season. As a collegian, Carthon twice earned All-Southland Conference honors while starring at Arkansas State. He was voted team captain his senior year and led the team in rushing with 682 yards.

PERSONAL: Maurice Carthon was born on April 24, 1961 in Chicago, Ill. A basketball and football star at Osceola (Ark.) High, he was voted state MVP in basketball and earned all-conference honors in football. While at Arkansas State, he earned his undergraduate degree in physical education and science. After winning his second Super Bowl with the Giants, Carthon was honored by his hometown as the Osceola Man of the Year. Maurice, 34, is single.

COACHING: Romeo Crennel, a veteran of 14 NFL seasons and two Super Bowl Champions, joined the Patriots' coaching staff on January 25, 1993 when he was named the defensive line coach. In his first season with the Patriots, Crennel led a resurgent defensive front which made significant progress throughout the year. During the Patriots' season-ending four-game win streak, the defensive line responded by only allowing an average of 84.5 rushing yards per game. In 1994, the Patriots defense finished 19th against the rush and 16th against the pass, despite having one of the smaller units in the league. This season, Crennel will continue to instruct the defensive line, a position he began coaching in 1990 as an assistant with the New York Giants. During his 12-year (1981-92) coaching tenure in New York, the Giants made six playoff appearances, won three NFC Eastern Division championships and two Super Bowls. Crennel entered the professional ranks in 1981, along with Parcells, as an assistant on Ray Perkins' staff in New York. His coaching contributions helped lead the Giants to their first winning season in nine years and the first playoff berth since 1963. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Western Kentucky in 1970 and continued as a full-time assistant from 1971-74. His first association with Parcells came the following year, when Crennel joined the Texas Tech coaching staff as a defensive assistant. Parcells was the defensive coordinator at Tech during Crennel's three-year stint (1975-77). In 1978, he was named the defensive end coach at Ole Miss. He remained at Mississippi for two seasons before being named the defensive line coach at Georgia Tech in 1980. The following season, Crennel left the collegiate ranks and was re-united with Parcells as an assistant on Perkins' staff with the Giants.


PLAYING: A four-year letterman at Western Kentucky, Crennel starred as a defensive lineman. As captain of the team, he earned all-conference and MVP honors in 1969.

PERSONAL: Romeo Crennel was born June 18, 1947 in Lynchburg, Va. He was a high school standout at both Fort Knox (Ky.) High and at Central High (Amherst, Va.). He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education at Western Kentucky and received his master's degree in education while serving as a graduate assistant in 1970. COACHING STAFF

COACHING: Al Groh, a veteran of seven NFL seasons and one Super Bowl Championship, was named defensive coordinator and linebackers coach on January 25, 1993. In his first season with the Patriots, the defense improved in nearly every statistical category, finishing sixth in the AFC in total defense. In addition, Groh's linebacking corps provided the foundation for the defense. Together, the unit recorded 21.5 of the team's 34 quarterback sacks. In 1994, the Patriots led the league in total takeaways with 40. The opportunistic defense recovered 18 fumbles and intercepted 22 passes which resulted in 115 of the Patriots' 351 points scored in 1994. In addition, the defense recorded 39 sacks, up five from the previous year. Prior to joining the Patriots, he coached the linebackers on Bill Belichick's Cleveland Browns staff in 1992. From 1989 to 1991, Groh served as a defensive assistant with the New York Giants. In his first season as a member of Bill Parcells' coaching staff (1989), the Giants claimed the divisional title with a 12-4 record. The following year, the Giants defended their division title and triumphed over the Buffalo Bills 20-19 in Super Bowl XXV. During his 30-year coaching career, Groh has coached at nearly every level of competition and has instructed positions on both sides of the ball. His coaching success has hastened his ascent from his high school beginnings, through the collegiate ranks, to the professional level. During that time, Groh has served as a head coach, defensive coordinator, offensive coordinator and special teams coach. He began his coaching career in 1966 at Albemarle High in Charlottesville, Va. From 1968 to 1969, both Groh and Parcells coached as assistants on Tom Cahill's staff at Army. He left West Point in 1970 when he was presented an opportunity to return to his collegiate alma mater. He remained at Virginia for three seasons (1970-72) as a defensive assistant. From 1973 to 1977, Groh served as an assistant at the University of North Carolina, where he helped lure a standout recruit by the name of Lawrence Taylor. He left North Carolina in 1978 to become Parcells' defensive coordinator at the Air Force Academy, followed by a season at Texas Tech in 1980. Groh was named the head coach at Wake Forest 1981 and became the second-winningest coach in Deacon history during his six-year tenure (1981-86). He first joined the NFL elite in 1987 as an assistant with the Atlanta Falcons, but returned to the collegiate level the following season (1988) as the offensive coordinator at South Carolina. He held that position for one season before returning to the NFL with the New York Giants (1989).


PLAYING: Groh was a four-year letterman at the University of Virginia and played three seasons as an outside linebacker.

PERSONAL: Al Groh was born July 13, 1944 in New York City. He starred as a scholastic athlete at Chaminade High in Mineola, N.Y. He earned his bachelor's degree in commerce at the University of Virginia in 1967, while lettering in football and lacrosse. Al and his wife, Anne, have three children, Michael (12/19/71), Ashley Anne (7/18/74), who attends Bowling Green, and Matthew (5/27/80).

FRED HOAGLIN



Offensive Line

COACHING: Fred Hoaglin, a veteran of 17 NFL seasons and two Super Bowl Championships, joined the Patriots as the offensive line coach on January 25, 1993. In his first season with New England, the Patriots offensive line improved significantly. The line allowed only 23 sacks on the year, second in the NFL and 42 fewer than the 65 sacks allowed in 1992. Last year, the line allowed only 22 sacks for the top-rated passing team in the NFL. Left tackle Bruce Armstrong received all-star recognition and was voted to his third Pro Bowl. Prior to joining the Patriots, the former NFL all-pro center coached the New York Giants offensive linemen for eight seasons (1985-92). Six of those years (1985-90) were spent as an assistant on a Bill Parcells' staff, which won two Super Bowls and qualified for the playoffs four of the six seasons. Prior to joining the Giants, Hoaglin handled the offensive line chores for the Detroit Lions for seven seasons (1978-84). The offensive line received much of the credit for paving the way to an NFL rushing title in 1981.


PLAYING: The Cleveland Browns selected Hoaglin, an offensive lineman from the University of Pittsburgh, in the sixth round of the 1966 NFL draft. He made the team and later broke into the starting lineup his rookie year. He put together an iron-man string of 69 consecutive starts in the late '60s with the Browns. A versatile player, Hoaglin was capable of playing any position on the offensive line, but he spent the majority of his 11-year career at center. Hoaglin received one of the highest honors an NFL player can receive in 1969 when his peers elected him to the Pro Bowl. He played seven seasons in Cleveland before being traded to Baltimore in 1973. He spent the following two seasons in Houston (1974-75) before ending his career with the 1976 NFL expansion Seattle Seahawks. Hoaglin was a starter as both a center and linebacker at the University of Pittsburgh and was selected to play in the North-South All-Star game his senior year.

PERSONAL: Fred Hoaglin was born January 28, 1944, in Alliance, Ohio. In addition to his gridiron success, he also earned two varsity letters in golf while at the University of Pittsburgh and still considers it his favorite hobby. Hoaglin earned his bachelor's degree in industrial engineering in 1968. Fred and his wife, Janet, have two children - Patricia Compton (3/5/68) and George III "Rick" (9/23/70) - and two grandchildren - Andrew (5/28/87) and Kristina Compton (4/11/89).

CHRIS PALMER



Wide Receivers

COACHING STAFF

COACHING: Chris Palmer, a veteran of five NFL seasons, was named wide receivers coach on January 27, 1993. In 1994, the Patriots made history when five players caught more than 50 passes apiece. Tight end Ben Coates led all receivers and set a franchise record with 96 receptions, followed by Michael Timpson's 74 receptions – the most by a Patriots wide receiver since Stanley Morgan caught 84 passes in 1986. Running back Leroy Thompson added 65 receptions, followed by Vincent Brisby's 58 catches (904 yards) and Kevin Turner's 52 grabs. Palmer joined the Patriots in 1993 after three seasons (1990-92) as the receivers coach for the Houston Oilers. During that time, Houston boasted the top-ranked passing offense in the league and, in 1992, Palmer tutored a triumvirate of Pro Bowl receivers – Curtis Duncan, Ernest Givins and Haywood Jeffires. His move to the Patriots marked his return to the Northeast, where many Bostonians remember him from his head coaching days at Boston University. Palmer installed the "Run 'n Shoot" offense during his two seasons (1988-89) at Boston and produced one of the area's most exciting collegiate programs. In 1989, the Terrier offense ranked 10th in the nation, highlighted by a passing offense which averaged 284.6 yards per game. Prior to coaching at Boston University, Palmer held the head coaching responsibilities at the University of New Haven. In two seasons (1986-87), the Chargers posted consecutive 8-2 records. In 1987, the team set records for consecutive wins (8) and points in a season (267), each of which have since been surpassed. In 1986, New Haven finished second in the nation in passing offense and broke 54 school records. Palmer's first professional coaching experience came in 1983 as the offensive line coach for the Montreal Concordes of the Canadian Football League. In 1984, Palmer accepted the opportunity to coach in the United States Football League as the receivers coach for the New Jersey Generals. That season, the Generals finished with a 14-4 record and qualified for the playoffs. The following season, Palmer was promoted to quarterbacks coach and offensive coordinator and helped orchestrate one of the league's most potent offenses. Palmer's offensive arsenal featured quarterbacks Brian Sipe and Doug Flutie in the same offensive backfield with Herschel Walker and Maurice Carthon. That season, Walker set a professional football single-season rushing record with 2,411 yards. Palmer began his coaching career as a collegiate assistant at the University of Connecticut in 1972. He coached the defensive line for three years (1972-74) before accepting his first offensive assignment in 1975 as the wide receivers coach at Lehigh. The following season, Palmer was named the offensive coordinator at Colgate, where he coached for seven years (1976-82). In 1977, the Red Raiders led the nation in offense with a per-game average of 486 yards.




COACHING: Johnny Parker, a veteran of 11 NFL seasons and two Super Bowl Championships, was named the strength and conditioning coach on January 25, 1993. His first assignment as strength and conditioning coach was to develop a year-round conditioning routine for the players to utilize during the offseason to help prevent injuries in the fall. Much to the credit of his program and the work ethic of the players, the Patriots survived the 1993 season nearly injury-free, an amazing recovery from the injury-plagued '92 season. Following the 1994 season, the Professional Football Strength and Conditioning Coaches Society named Parker the recipient of their President's Award, given annually to the top strength and conditioning coach in the NFL. Parker downplayed the award, stating, "In a team sport, there are no individual honors. Any honor is a reflection on the efforts of the entire team." Parker's ability to motivate players to participate in a year-round training program has been the key to his success over the years. Parker originally joined Bill Parcells' staff with the New York Giants in 1984 and made an immediate impact on the team with the initiation of his conditioning program. Prior to Parker's arrival, the Giants were decimated by injuries. Twenty-five players spent time on the injured reserve list in 1983 as the team struggled through a 3-12-1 season. That number was cut to seven in 1984 - Parker's first season with the Giants. He began his coaching career as linebackers coach for Indianola Academy followed by a three-year stint (1974-76) at South Carolina as the squad's strength and conditioning coach. The following three years (1977-79) were spent at Indiana in a similar capacity. Parker implemented his conditioning program at Louisiana State in 1980, followed by four seasons at Mississippi (1981-83). His first professional assignment came in 1984 when he was hired by Parcells to join him in New York.

PERSONAL: Johnny Parker was born February 1, 1947, in Greenville, S.C., and raised in Shaw, Miss. He graduated from Shaw High, then matriculated to Ole Miss, where he earned his bachelor's degree in 1968. Parker continued his education with a master's degree from Delta State University. He visited the Soviet Union in 1983 and again in 1986 to study the methods of the Russian Olympic trainers and has incorporated a number of their techniques into his strength and conditioning practices. Johnny married the former Jane Cline of Covington, Ind. in 1979.

RAY PERKINS



Offensive Coordinator/

COACHING: Ray Perkins, a veteran of 16 NFL seasons, was named offensive coordinator on January 25, 1993. In April of 1993, the Patriots made quarterback Drew Bledsoe the first selection in the draft. In just two seasons, Perkins has helped cultivate Bledsoe into one of the league's premier passers. In 1994, the Patriots boasted the league's top-rated passing offense and set franchise records by completing 405 of 699 passes for the year. Perkins' hiring in 1993 marked his return to the team that gave him his first NFL assignment in 1974 and had once drafted him in 1966. Since then, Perkins has coached on both the NFL and collegiate levels and has gained 14 years of head coaching experience along the way. In eight NFL seasons as a head coach, he registered a 43-77 overall record. He began coaching at Mississippi State in 1973. The following year, he joined Chuck Fairbanks' staff as receivers coach for the Patriots. He left New England after four seasons (1974-77) to accept the offensive coordinator duties for the San Diego Chargers (1978), where he instructed an offensive arsenal featuring quarterback Dan Fouts, wide receiver Charlie Joiner and running back Lydell Mitchell. The following year, Perkins was named the head coach of the New York Giants. By 1981, Perkins had assembled a staff in New York that included Bill Parcells (defensive coordinator) and Romeo Crennel (special teams) as assistants and led the Giants to their first winning season in nine years. In 1983, Perkins left the Big Apple to return to his alma mater as the successor to Paul "Bear" Bryant at the University of Alabama. In four seasons (1983-86), he led the Crimson Tide to three bowl appearances and accumulated a 32-15-1 record. He returned to the NFL in 1987 to serve as the head coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1987-90). In 1992, Perkins returned to coaching after a year's absence to head the Arkansas State staff, where he coached for one season before returning to the NFL with the Patriots.

PLAYING: Perkins was selected by both the Boston Patriots in the fifth round of the 1966 AFL draft and the Baltimore Colts in the seventh round of the 1966 NFL draft. The sure-handed receiver chose to play for the Colts and corralled 93 passes for 1,538 yards and 11 touchdowns in six seasons (1967-72) with the Colts. He was a member of two Super Bowl teams, including the 1971 Super Bowl championship team, before a knee injury forced him into an early retirement in 1972. He was recruited to Alabama as a fullback in 1962 by the late Bear Bryant. A head injury in spring drills led to brain surgery and caused his position transformation from fullback to wide receiver. After redshirting in 1963, Perkins completed one of the finest receiving careers in Crimson Tide history. His 63 receptions for 908 yards and nine touchdowns were thrown from three All-American quarterbacks; Joe Namath (1964), Steve Sloan (1965) and Kenny Stabler (1966). Alabama rolled up a 30-2-1 record during Perkins' career (1964-66), including national championships in 1964 and 1965. Perkins co-captained the 1966 squad while earning consensus All-America acclaim and SEC Player of the Year honors.


PERSONAL: Walter Ray Perkins was born November 6, 1941, in Mt. Olive, Miss. He was blessed with tremendous athletic ability and was an outstanding prep athlete in football, basketball, baseball and track. He earned All-



American honors as a fullback at Petal (Miss.) High and in his only season playing hoops, he was a first-team all-state selection. While at Alabama, Perkins also competed in track as a member of the Crimson Tide's relay team and as a sprinter. He was inducted into the Alabama Hall of Fame in 1990. Ray is the father of two sons, Tony, a graphic arts designer in Tuscaloosa, Ala., and Mike, the video director for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

MICHAEL POPE

COACHING: Michael Pope, a veteran of 12 NFL seasons and two Super Bowl Championships, joined the New England Patriots coaching staff on February 8, 1994. During the 1994 season, Pope tutored the team's running backs – a group responsible for a franchise record of 137 of the team's NFL record 405 receptions in 1994. On January 27, 1995 he was assigned to instruct the tight ends, a position he has coached 10 of his 12 seasons in the NFL. Prior to joining the Patriots, he served two seasons (1992-93) on Dave Shula's staff with the Cincinnati Bengals. In 1993, Pope was promoted to offensive coordinator after serving the 1992 season as the Bengals' tight ends position coach. He joined the Bengals staff after serving nine seasons with the New York Giants. He made his NFL coaching debut as an assistant special teams coach on Bill Parcells' original staff in New York in 1983. In 1984, Pope accepted the tight end responsibilities and has since coached four players – Zeke Mowatt (1983), Mark Bavaro (1985), Howard Cross (1989) and Tony McGee (1993) – who were selected to the NFL's All-Rookie team. During his Giants tenure, Pope groomed one of the game's all-time greats, tight end Mark Bavaro, who helped lead the Giants to Super Bowl Championships in 1986 and 1990. Pope began coaching at Lenoir (N.C.) High in 1964. He later coached at high schools in Charlotte, N.C., Jacksonville, Fla., and Lake Wales, Fla. and twice guided his teams to the Florida State High School Championship game. He progressed to the collegiate ranks in 1970 as a graduate assistant at Florida State. It was at Florida State that Pope first coached on the same staff as Parcells, who was the Seminoles linebackers coach at the time. Pope spent five seasons at Florida State before rejoining Parcells at Texas Tech in 1975. He served as an assistant coach and recruiter at Texas Tech through 1977. In 1978, Ole Miss head coach Steve Sloan hired Pope as his receivers coach, where he drew the dual responsibility of coaching the punters and kickers as well. Pope remained at Ole Miss through the 1982 season. In 1983, Parcells hired Pope when he was assembling his staff with the New York Giants.

PLAYING: Pope played quarterback at Lenoir Rhyne College, where he won all-conference honors three consecutive seasons. Pope led the team to three divisional championship games and claimed one national title.



COACHING: Dante Scarnecchia, now in his 14th NFL season and 12th with the Patriots, was named to Bill Parcells' staff on January 27, 1993. Scarnecchia's area of concentration in 1995 will be at the linebacker position. When Parcells selected his staff in 1993, Scarnecchia was the only Patriot assistant retained from the 1992 coaching staff. From 1991 to 1992, he coached the tight ends and special teams on Dick MacPherson's staff. On November 4, 1992, MacPherson fell ill and appointed Scarnecchia to serve as the team's spokesman in his absence. Scarnecchia fulfilled the obligation for seven of the Patriots' final eight games and held the responsibilities of the head coach for both of the Patriots' victories in 1992. Scarnecchia originally joined the Patriots and made his NFL coaching debut in 1982 as a member of Ron Meyer's staff. He coached the tight ends and special teams for the Patriots for seven seasons (1982-88) before moving on to Indianapolis with Ron Meyer in 1989. He rejoined the Patriots in 1991 after spending two seasons (1989-90) as the Colts' offensive line coach. His coaching career began in 1970 as the offensive line coach at California Western University. He moved to Iowa State in 1973, where he served as the assistant offensive line and defensive backfield coach. He spent the 1975 and 1976 campaigns at Southern Methodist University, before becoming Pacific University's offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator (1977-78). In 1979, Scarnecchia coached at Northern Arizona and then accepted an opportunity to return to Ron Meyer's staff at SMU as the offensive line coach in 1980. In 1982, Meyer was hired as the head coach of the New England Patriots and Scarnecchia was among a number of the SMU assistants who were added to his staff.



COACHING: Michael Sweatman, a veteran of 11 NFL seasons and two Super Bowl Championships, was named the special teams coach for the Patriots on January 25, 1993. Prior to joining the Patriots, he spent eight seasons (1985-92) with the New York Giants, including six seasons (1985-90) as a member of Bill Parcells' staff. Sweatman joined the NFL coaching fraternity in 1984 as the outside linebackers/special teams coach of the Minnesota Vikings. A two-time all-conference linebacker at Kansas, Sweatman received his first coaching opportunity as a graduate assistant with the Jayhawks in 1968. In 1969 he joined the Marine Corps and served four years of active duty as an infantry officer. In 1969, he played linebacker for the Quantico Marines football team, and in 1970, he was asked to coach one of the Marine teams - the Okinawa Devil Dogs. During his final two years of active duty, he served as an assistant coach for the Quantico Marines (1971-72). He rejoined the Kansas staff as an assistant in 1973. From there, Sweatman accepted assistant coaching opportunities at Coffeyville (1975-76), Tulsa (1977-78), Kansas (1979-82), and Tennessee (1983) before his introduction to the NFL with the Minnesota Vikings in 1984.



COACHING: Bob Trott, now in his fifth NFL season, was named defensive backs coach on January 27, 1993. In 1994, the Patriots' secondary accounted for 17 of the team's 22 interceptions and 24 of the team's league leading 40 takeaways. In addition, the Patriots were also credited with 4.5 sacks from corner blitzes throughout the '94 campaign. Trott joined the Patriots after two seasons (1991-92) as a defensive assistant on Ray Handley's staff with the New York Giants. Prior to 1991, Trott had gained 15 years of coaching experience on the collegiate level. His coaching career began in 1976 at the University of North Carolina. After two seasons as an assistant for the Tar Heels, he moved on to the Air Force Academy, where he served as the outside linebackers coach during Bill Parcells' first year as the head coach in 1978. He continued at the Academy through the 1983 campaign, coaching the outside linebackers from 1978-80 and the defensive backs from 1981-83. Trott left the Academy to assume the defensive backfield duties for the University of Arkansas in 1984 and was promoted to defensive coordinator in 1989. In six seasons as an assistant on Ken Hatfield's Razorback coaching staff (1984-89), Arkansas appeared in six straight postseason bowl games, highlighted by a dramatic 18-17 victory over Arizona State in the 1985 Holiday Bowl, and two Southwest Conference Championships (1988-89). He left Arkansas in 1990 to become the defensive coordinator for the Clemson Tigers. That season, the Tigers led the nation in total defense by allowing opponents to only 217 yards per game. It was the first time that Clemson had ever earned that distinction. In addition, Clemson led the Atlantic Coast Conference in nine defensive categories and finished second in the NCAA national rankings for rushing and scoring defense. The Tigers finished the season with a shutout victory (30-0) over Illinois in the Hall of Fame Bowl (1/1/91). In 1991, Trott joined the professional ranks with the defending champion New York Giants as a defensive assistant.

PLAYING: Trott earned three varsity letters as a defensive back at the University of North Carolina and graduated in 1976 with a degree in business. The scholar-athlete received all-academic recognition his senior season.

PERSONAL: Robert Trott was born March 19, 1954, in Concord, N.C. and raised in Kannapolis, N.C. He starred as a prep athlete and earned all-conference recognition as a wide receiver and defensive back at A.L. Brown High in Kannapolis, N.C. In his new assignment, he will coach recent free agent signee David Meggett, who Weis coached for two seasons in New York. In 1994, Weis assisted in the development of tight end Ben Coates, who set a franchise and an NFL tight end reception record with 96 catches. Coates earned All-Pro recognition and earned his first trip to the Pro Bowl. Prior to joining the Patriots, Weis served a three-year assignment (1990-92) with the New York Giants, including one season on the staff of Bill Parcells. Upon the completion of his undergraduate studies, Weis began a coaching and teaching career at Boonton High in New Jersey in 1979. He coached football, basketball and baseball, while also teaching English. In 1980, he moved to Morristown (N.J.) High, where he assumed similar responsibilities. He moved up to the collegiate ranks in 1985 as an assistant at South Carolina (1985-88). In 1989, he returned to New Jersey to accept the head coaching responsibilities at Franklin Township High, which he directed to the New Jersey State Championship title. During the '89 season, Weis assisted Tim Rooney in the New York Giants' pro personnel department. That opportunity presented him with the chance to display his knowledge of the game, which led to his hiring in 1990 by Bill Parcells as a defensive assistant and assistant special teams coach. In 1991, Ray Handley assigned Weis to direct the Giants' running backs, which he did through the 1992 season.







Blanda (22) by just one field goal ... enters the 1995 campaign ranked fourth in field goal attempts in playoff games with 25 (Blanda holds the record with 39) ... tied a playoff record as a member of the Giants with five field goals in the 1990 NFC Championship Game at San Francisco (1/20/91) ... in three seasons with the Giants, he set a team record for the highest field goal percentage for a career by converting 55 of 73 field goals (.753) ... he is tied for the fourth longest field goal in Giants' team history with a 54-yard kick vs. Houston (12/21/91) ... in nine seasons with the Browns, he set the team's career record for kicking accuracy by converting 74.1 percent of his kicks (143 of 193) ... led the Browns in scoring in eight of his nine seasons there ... enters the 1995 season as the team's elder statesman at the age of 39. **1994 (16/0, 1/0):** As the popular adage states, Bahr continues to improve with age ... in his 16th NFL season, and at the age of 38, Bahr turned in a career-high performance in 1994 with 117 total points ... his 27 field goals were also a career high ... it marked the fourth time in the veteran's distinguished career that he had topped the 100-point plateau ... he became the first Patriot to break the 100-point plateau in seven years (Tony Franklin scored 140 in 1987) ... was just the fourth Patriot in franchise history to score over 100 points, joining Gino Cappelletti (6 times), Tony Franklin (3) and John Smith (2) ... his 117 points ranked third in the AFC and fourth overall ... he converted 27 of 34 field goal attempts (.794) and was successful on each of his 36 extra point attempts ... converted all of his kicks within 30 yards (14 of 14) and 88.5 percent of his kicks under 40 yards (23 of 26) ... he was successful on each of his 14 field goal attempts on turf and only missed one on the road all season (18 of 19) ... was four-for-four in games when the Patriots were trailing by three or less ... scored on both field goal attempts and added an extra point in the wild-card playoff loss at Cleveland (1/1/95) ... moved ahead of brother, Chris (1,213 career points), with five extra point kicks in the season-opener at Miami (9/4) ... converted all four field goal attempts at Cincinnati (9/18) in a 31-28 win ... scored 11 points in a 23-17 victory at Detroit the following week (9/25) ... opened the season with seven consecutive field goals before missing, extending a streak from 1993 to 12 successful attempts, the second-longest streak in franchise history ... kicked a 33-yard game-winning field goal with :04 seconds remaining to give the Patriots a 17-16 victory over the Packers (10/2) ... scored 11 points in the Patriots' come-from-behind 26-20 overtime victory vs. Minnesota (11/13) ... connected on a 38-yard field goal as time expired at the half to make the score 20-3 and, trailing 20-17, hit a 23-yard attempt with just 14 seconds in regulation to send the game into overtime ... kicked field goals of 22, 37, 25 and 42 yards in a 12-10 victory over Indianapolis (12/11) ... his four-field goal effort was the second of the season and the fifth of his career. **1993 (14/0)(11/0-Philadelphia; 3/0-New England):** Released by the Giants prior to the start of the season, but was signed by Philadelphia on September 16 to replace an injured Roger Ruzek (pulled hamstring) ... converted all four PATs and both field goal attempts, including a 42-yarder with 4:57 remaining in the game for a 34-31 victory over Washington ... that kicking performance earned him the full-time kicking responsibilities ... he made his first five field goal attempts as an Eagle, but struggled at midseason, missing five of his last eight kicks before the Eagles released him on December 13 after 11 weeks with the team ... he signed with the Patriots the following day and held the kicking responsibilities for the final three weeks of the season ... in three games with the Patriots, he did not miss – converting 10 consecutive PATs and five field goals ... kicked two field goals (23 and 34 yards) in a 20-17 victory at Cleveland (12/19) ... split the uprights from 31 and 37 yards in a 33-27 overtime victory vs. Miami in the season finale (1/2/94). **1992 (12/0-Giants):** Converted 16 of 21 field goal attempts (.762) and 29 of 29 extra points to finish second on the Giants in scoring with 77 points ... played in the Giants' first 12 games and kicked field goals in consecutive games before going on injured reserve with a knee injury ... his 76.2 percent kicking accuracy ranked third in team history behind Ali Haji-Sheikh (.833 in 1984) and Raul Allegre (.769 in 1989). **1991 (13/0-Giants):** Kicked a 54-yarder, the longest field goal of his career, in the Giants' season finale vs. Houston (12/21) ... provided the winning margin in

Rams (1/20/80) ... kicked a clutch 21-yard field goal vs. the Browns (11/25) to tie the game with 24 seconds left in regulation to send the game to overtime ... he followed with a game-winning 37-yard kick with only :09 remaining in overtime to win 33-30.

Personal: Matthew David Bahr was born on July 6, 1956 in Philadelphia, Pa. ... he starred as a football and soccer player at Neshaminy Langhorne High in Langhorne, Pa. ... brother Chris kicked for the Cincinnati Bengals, Oakland-Los Angeles Raiders and the San Diego Chargers during his 14-year NFL career (1976-89) ... Matt earned his bachelor's degree in electrical engineering at Penn State and his master's degree in business administration at the University of Pittsburgh ... he was a four-year starter on the Penn State soccer team and was elected team captain his senior year ... remains extremely active in working with youth-related charities and organizations ... Matt and his wife, Maresa, have three children, two daughters, Lindsey Davies (12) and Caitlin Dorothy (8), and one son, Connor Matthew (2).


FOXBORO DEEP FREEZES

After two seasons in Pittsburgh, Bahr kicked for nine seasons in Cleveland, three seasons in New York, half a season in Philadelphia and now he is entering his second full season with New England. In his first game at Foxboro Stadium, Bahr was perfect, converting his only field goal attempt and all four extra points despite weather conditions with winds gusting to 43 mph and a windchill of minus 21 degrees. ... made his NFL debut in the third quarter at Cincinnati (9/18) and recorded his first career tackle — an 11-yard sack on David Klingler ... his only other tackle on the day came in the fourth quarter when he dropped Harold Green for a 1-yard loss on the Bengals' own 27-yard line ... received limited playing time behind veteran defensive end Mike Pitts, but did see action in many short-yardage situations and on special teams ... blocked a 38-yard field goal attempt by Kevin Butler during a 13-3 win over Chicago to help clinch the Patriots' first playoff berth in eight seasons ... blocked his second kick of the season the following week in the Patriots' playoff game at Cleveland when he batted down a 50-yard attempt by Matt Stover.



YOUNGEST QBs TO REACH 10,000-YARD PLATEAU

Drew Bledsoe was only 22 years old when he eclipsed the 7,000-yard passing plateau, the youngest in NFL history. At 23, he now needs just 2,951 yards this season to become the youngest player to reach the 10,000-yard plateau. The three youngest quarterbacks to reach that plateau are listed below. Interestingly, each of the QBs threw for over 300 yards in the game that pushed them over the 10,000-yard mark.

- The Patriots had five players who each had over 50 receptions in 1994, an NFL first. Ben Coates led that quintet with 96 receptions, a franchise and all-time NFL tight end reception record.
- To put those numbers into perspective, consider that in 1993, Ben Coates led the team with 53 receptions. That total was surpassed by four players in 1994.

STREAKING INTO 1995

Sam Gash played an important role in the Patriots' season-ending seven-game win streak by starting six of the seven games. His first start of the season was on Nov. 13, 1994 vs. Minnesota – the game which started the win streak. During the streak, the Patriots claimed victories over three playoff teams (Minnesota, San Diego and Chicago) and the elimination of the four-time defending AFC Champion Buffalo Bills. Closing out the regular season with a seven-game win streak gives the Patriots the longest active win streak in the league entering the 1995 season. The seven-game streak ties a franchise record which was accomplished in 1986, 1978 and during a two-year span from 1976 (six victories) to 1977 (one victory). To break that record, the Patriots will have to defeat the Cleveland Browns on opening day in Foxboro Stadium (9/4/95), something the Patriots have only been able to do in three of their previous 13 regular season games.

Pro Career GP/GS (20/0, 0/0): At 6-feet-7-inches, Moore is the tallest offensive lineman on the Patriots ... has played in 20 games over the past two seasons, including all 16 contests as a rookie. **1994 (4/0, 0/0):** Backed up the Patriots' three-time Pro Bowl left tackle Bruce Armstrong ... active



for five games in 1994 and played in four ... participated in short-yardage situations and on special teams in the first three games of the season at Miami (9/4), vs. Buffalo (9/11) and at Cincinnati (9/18) and in the season finale at Chicago (12/24).


1993 (16/0): Participated in all 16 regular season games ... saw action on special teams, as well as on the offensive line ... used as third tight end in short-yardage situations.

How Acquired: Marty Moore was drafted by the Patriots with the final selection (222nd player selected) in the 1994 NFL draft ... the Patriots acquired the pick as compensation from the Dallas Cowboys in exchange for quarterback Hugh Millen (4/26/93).

NFL Career GP/GS (regular season 16/4, postseason 1/1): Moore was the last player selected in the 1994 NFL draft, yet started the first three games of the season for the Patriots at inside linebacker – thus becoming the first "Mr. Irrelevant" player to start in his NFL debut. **1994 (16/4, 1/1):** Played in every game as a rookie ... started four regular season games and the Patriots' playoff game at Cleveland at right inside linebacker beside

Extra Points

- After his release from the Miami Dolphins, Brandon planned to enroll in law school. Those plans were postponed when the Patriots invited him to camp last summer and kept him on their active roster throughout the season.
- Brandon's father, Richard Moore, played football at Villanova (1965-68) and for the Green Bay Packers from 1969-71.
- Brandon collects antiques.
- During the 1995 offseason, Brandon worked an internship at Reebok in Stoneham, Mass.



Vincent Brown ... finished the season with 25 total tackles (16 solos), batted away two passes and forced two fumbles ... finished fourth on the team with 10 special teams tackles (four solos) ... started the first three games of the season replacing Todd Collins, who sustained a knee injury in the final preseason game ... in the season opener (9/4) he forced a Terry Kirby fumble on Miami's first offensive series, which was recovered by Myron Guyton at the New England 38-yard line and resulted in a Patriots touchdown ... finished his rookie debut with game highs in three categories – tackles (six), passes defensed (two, tied) and forced fumbles (one) ... recorded a season-high nine tackles (four solos) the following week vs. Buffalo (9/11) and recorded his second forced fumble in as many games ... recorded one defensive stop and one special teams stop in his third start (9/18) at Cincinnati ... played in a reserve role when Collins returned for the fourth game of the season ... was second on the team with 16 tackles after three games ... played mostly on special teams through Week 11, when Collins suffered a season-ending injury ... split time with David Bavaro at RILB for the final seven weeks of the season ... started in the season finale at Chicago and recorded two tackles ... started the Patriots' playoff game at Cleveland and finished with five tackles.

College: Moore completed his collegiate career (1989-93) with 462 tackles, two forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries, five interceptions with one touchdown and three quarterback sacks ... his 462 tackles ranked fourth on Kentucky's all-time list ... led Kentucky in tackles his last three seasons ... led the Southeastern Conference in tackles his sophomore and junior seasons ... started the final 34 games of his collegiate career ... selected first-team All-SEC as a senior (1993) ... recorded 116 tackles (81 solos), intercepted three passes (55 yards) and forced two fumbles ... selected second-team All-SEC by AP as a junior (1992) ... led the conference with 148 tackles, an average of 13.4 stops per game ... amassed a season-high 19 tackles at Cincinnati ... selected first-team Sophomore All-American by *Football News* ... led the SEC and set a Kentucky school record with 183 tackles, an average of 16.6 tackles per game ... ranked third nationally in total tackles with double-digit performances in every game ... registered 19 tackles in his first collegiate start, the 1991 season opener vs. Miami (Ohio) ... redshirted as a freshman.

Personal: Martin Neff Moore was born the son of Carol Ann Ruck on March 19, 1971 in Phoenix, Ariz. ... was a two-time all-district and all-region selection and earned all-state honors as a senior at Highlands High in Fort Thomas, Ky. ... earned three letters in football, playing middle linebacker and fullback ... rushed for 986 yards and 10 touchdowns as a senior, including a 268-yard effort with three scores in his prep finale vs. Bell County (Ky.) High ... led the Bluebirds to a 28-7 record during his three-year career ... also lettered in basketball ... majored in vocational education at Kentucky and had two 4.0 GPA semesters and graduated with a 3.3 cumulative GPA ... Marty is married to the former Wendy Ganote.

Extra Points

- Marty was the last player selected in the 1994 NFL Draft (222nd overall) and was bestowed the title of "Mr. Irrelevant '94." He became the first "Mr. Irrelevant" recipient to start in his NFL debut when he replaced Todd Collins in the starting lineup at Miami (9/4/94).
- Marty enjoys hunting and fishing.



How Acquired: Will Moore signed with the Patriots as an unconditional free agent on April 3, 1995 after playing three seasons with the Calgary Stampeders of the Canadian Football League.

CFL Career: Moore developed into one of the CFL's premier wide receivers in his last two seasons in the league ... accumulated 120 receptions for 1,913 yards (15.9 avg.) and 23 touchdowns in his career ... in

1994, he caught 44 passes for 792 yards (18.0 avg.) and 11 touchdowns while helping Calgary to a 15-3 overall record ... recorded a career-high 73 receptions for 1,083 yards and 12 touchdowns in 1993 in his first year as a starter ... caught six passes for 150 yards vs. Winnipeg (8/3/93) ... also totaled six receptions for 124 yards and two touchdowns vs. Sacramento (10/30/93) ... finished second on the team in receiving ... played on special teams and recorded three tackles on coverage units ... earned player of the game honors on three occasions ... would have been a contender for the Rookie of the Year award had it not been for the one game that he played in 1992, which made him ineligible for the award ... made five receptions for 57 yards despite bad weather in the Western Final playoff game ... played in all 18 games, plus both of Calgary's playoff games ... played in just one game in 1992 in Hamilton (11/1) ... caught three passes for 38 yards ... spent most of the season on the Stampeders' practice squad.

College: A four-year letterman at Texas Southern University (1988-91) ... ranks fifth among the school's all-time leading receivers with 129 career receptions for 1,924 yards and 24 touchdowns ... caught 29 of those passes for 427 yards and six TDs as a senior ... voted team's most valuable player in 1990 ... named the team's most outstanding offensive player in 1989.



How Acquired: Pat O'Neill was drafted by the Patriots in the fifth round (135th player selected) of the 1994 NFL draft ... the selection was acquired from Arizona, along with the Cardinals' fourth-round selection (121st overall - John Burke) in exchange for the Patriots' fourth-round selection (107th overall - Perry Carter).

NFL Career GP/GS (regular season 16/0, postseason 1/0):

O'Neill was the first punter selected in the 1994 NFL draft and proved to be worth the investment as he handled the Patriots punting and kickoff responsibilities throughout the season ... he has a very strong leg and

can be used on long field goal attempts ... missed his only field goal attempt of the season, a 47-yarder. **1994 (16/0, 1/0):** Selected to all-rookie teams by *Pro Football Weekly*, *College and Pro Football Newsweekly* and *Football News* ... honored as the 1776 Quarterback Club's Special Team Player of the Year ... averaged 41.2 yards on 69 punts with a net average of 35.7 yards ... 25 of his 69 punts landed inside the 20 ... booted a 67-yarder vs. Buffalo (12/18) his longest of the season and the second-longest in the NFL in 1994 ... earned AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for his effort against the Bills, which included three kicks for 143 yards, an average of 47.7 per kick ... had his best game at Detroit (9/25) when he punted four times for 217 yards (54.3 avg.) with a long of 62 yards and booted all six kickoffs into the end zone (two were downed) against one of the league's most dangerous return men, Mel Gray ... punted eight times vs. Green Bay (10/2) and Minnesota (11/13), his career high.

College: O'Neill lettered four seasons at Syracuse (1989-93) as a punter and handled both the punting and placekicking chores during his senior season ... handled the kickoff responsibilities throughout his collegiate career ... he took return men out of the game by kicking a total of 179 kickoffs into the end zone ... only 98 of his 261 kickoffs were returned (37.5 percent) ... totaled 170 punts for a 41.1-yard average and only had one punt blocked in four years ... earned GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-American honors ... earned third-team All-American honors and first team All-Big East Conference honors ... punted 44 times with a 44.3 yard average (1,950 yards) ... scored 61 points on 10 of 17 field goals and made all 31 extra point attempts ... converted all five extra point attempts and three field goals, including a career-long 50-yarder in the season opener vs. Ball State (9/4) ... ranked eighth in the nation with a 40.1-net yard punting average in 1992 ... boomed a 72-yard punt vs. Maryland in 1991 (a school record) and earned first-team all-conference honors ... redshirted as a freshman in 1989.

- Pat completed his first semester as a doctoral student at Syracuse's Institute for Sensory Research. He has a fellowship to pursue an advanced degree in neuroscience, which he plans to fulfill during the NFL's offseason.
- Won the Jim Nance Award for his work with children.
- When Pat was in high school, he attended a Matt Bahr kicking camp.



Personal: Patrick James O'Neill was born on February 9, 1971 at Scott Air Force Base in Illinois ... one of three sons of Peter and Alice O'Neill ... All-Mid Penn Conference first-team kicker and second-team punter at Red Land High in Harrisburg, Pa. ... earned York County All-Star honors as a senior ... converted 41 of 50 career PATs and eight of 15 field goals, with a long of 46 yards ... averaged 37.5 yards per punt ... played in the Pennsylvania "Big 33" All-Star game in 1989 ... earned all-conference honors and was a York County All-Star in soccer ... lettered in swimming and track ... recipient of the Pennsylvania Higher Education Award ... graduated second in a class of 309 students ... graduated with a degree in bio-engineering at Syracuse and returned in the 1995 offseason to work on his academic PhD ... single.

Transactions: Mike Pitts was signed by the Patriots on June 7, 1993 as an unrestricted free agent from the Philadelphia Eagles ... originally drafted by the Birmingham Stallions in the 1983 territorial draft ... selected by Atlanta in the first round (16th player selected) of the 1983 NFL draft ... signed with Falcons July 16, 1983 ... granted free agency February 1, 1987 ... re-signed with Falcons and traded to Philadelphia for DE Greg Brown (September 7, 1987)

Extra Points

- Mike's cousins include Charles Barkley (Phoenix Suns), Warren Kid (Philadelphia 76ers) and running back Ricky Porter (formerly with the Lions, Colts and the Memphis Showboats of the USFL).
- Mike owns a uniform apparel company named Pitts Athletics in Duluth, Ga.



... granted free agency February 1, 1991 ... re-signed by Eagles (8/15/91) ... granted unconditional free agency on March 1, 1993 ... signed with the Patriots on June 7, 1993 ... released (8/30/93) and re-signed (8/31/93) ... granted unconditional free agency (2/17/94) and re-signed March 4, 1994 ... granted unconditional free agency (2/15/94) and re-signed April 7, 1995.

NFL Career GP/GS (regular season 169/124, postseason 5/5): Pitts helped form one of the most dominant defensive lines in all of football (Pitts, Reggie White, Jerome Brown, Clyde Simmons) during his six seasons in Philadelphia ... now in his 13th season, he is the senior member of the Patriots' defense. **1994 (16/16, 1/1):** Started every game for the Patriots at left defensive end ... finished the season with 43 total tackles (33 solos) and a sack ... recovered two fumbles, forced another and batted down three passes ... recorded six tackles and had one of the team's two sacks on the day at Cleveland (1/1/95) in the Patriots' playoff game ... also recovered an Eric Metcalf fumble and blocked a 50-yard field goal attempt in the game ... posted five solo tackles and recovered a Jim Kelly fumble which resulted in a Patriots touchdown vs. Buffalo in the home-opener (9/11/94) ... registered four solo stops the following week and recovered a David Klingler fumble which resulted in a field goal in the Patriots' 31-28 victory over Cincinnati (9/18) ... recorded his 800th career tackle in the Patriots' 26-20 overtime victory vs. Minnesota (11/13) ... forced a Carwell Gardner fumble, which was picked up and returned 25 yards for a touchdown by Ricky Reynolds during a 41-17 victory at Buffalo (12/18). **1993 (16/15):** Opened the season as a reserve and recorded three tackles at Buffalo (9/5) ... started the next 15 games at left defensive end ... finished sixth on the Patriots with 75 total tackles, including three sacks ... forced his only fumble of the season when he stripped Thurman Thomas of the ball vs. Buffalo (11/7) ... recorded a season-high 12 stops vs. Seattle (9/19) ... dropped Jeff George for his first of three sacks as a Patriot at Indianapolis (10/31). **1992 (11/3-Philadelphia):** Played in 11 games for the Philadelphia Eagles, starting the final three at left defensive tackle ... helped the Eagles to an 11-5 regular season record and a return to the playoffs ... sustained a preseason back injury and started the season on injured reserve ... returned to the active list for Game Six and slowly worked his way back into the starting lineup ... registered his first sack of the season at Green Bay (11/15) ... caught Steve Young twice at San Francisco (11/29), the only sacks recorded by the Eagles, on consecutive plays ... started the following week vs. Minnesota (12/6) at left defensive tackle. **1991 (16/15-Philadelphia):** Played in all 16 regular season games, starting all but one ... finished the season with 100 tackles (58 solos), two forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and two sacks ... compiled a season-high 13 tackles vs. San Francisco (10/27) ... recorded one of the Eagles' team record 11 sacks vs. Dallas' Troy Aikman (12/15) ... considered one of the best run-stoppers in the league. **1990 (4/3-Philadelphia):** Registered three sacks in his first two games before suffering a left knee injury vs. Phoenix (9/16) early in the season ... named defensive player of the game in the season opener at New York (9/9) and followed with back-to-back first quarter sacks vs. Phoenix (9/16) before his injury in the fourth quarter ... underwent arthroscopic surgery (9/19) and returned to the active roster after 12 weeks of rehabilitation (12/21) ... started a week later at Phoenix (12/29) and in the Wild Card Playoff game vs. Washington (1/5/91) ... finished the season with 18 tackles (14 solos) and three sacks, despite playing in only four games. **1989 (16/16-Philadelphia):** Started every game and contributed seven sacks to help set a team record of 62 sacks on the season ... credited with two sacks vs. San Francisco (9/24) ... helped the Eagles to an 11-5 record ... finished the season with 110 tackles (63 solos), three pass deflections, two fumble recoveries, seven sacks and 47 quarterback hurries ... his fumble recovery against the Giants set up a game-winning touchdown. **1988 (16/16-Philadelphia):** Ranked fifth on the Eagles' defensive charts with a career-high 121 tackles (80 solos) and three pass deflections ... added 1.5 sacks with 42 quarterback pressures ... amassed a career-high 18 tackles (13 solos) in a clash at Cleveland (10/16) ... considered by then head coach Buddy Ryan as the Eagles' "most consistent defensive lineman." **1987 (12/6-Philadelphia):**



Acquired by the Eagles from Atlanta for defensive end Greg Brown (9/7) ... played in all 12 non-strike games and started the last five ... led the team with four fumble recoveries ... earned a game ball at New England (11/27) after he recorded two sacks and returned a fumble 21 yards to set up a touchdown. **1986 (16/0-Atlanta):** A defensive tackle in his first three seasons in the league, Pitts played out of position when the Falcons made the transition from the 4-3 to the 3-4 defensive alignment ... despite limited playing time, he still recorded 5.5 sacks and 34 tackles (24 solos) ... blocked the second field goal of his career at Cleveland (10/16). **1985 (16/16-Atlanta):** Recorded a career-high 7.5 sacks and finished the season ranked third on the team with 102 tackles (61 solos) ... intercepted his first and only career interception vs. the Rams (9/8) ... forced two fumbles and recovered another ... started every game for the Falcons. **1984 (14/14-Atlanta):** Started 14 games before a knee injury forced him to miss the final two games of the season ... finished the year with 88 tackles (51 solos) and 5.5 sacks. **1983 (16/4-Atlanta):** Played in every game with four starts as a rookie ... totaled 75 tackles and seven quarterback sacks while earning NFL all-rookie honors ... registered his first blocked field goal in a game at New Orleans (9/8) ... ravaged the New York Jets (10/23) for a career-high three sacks.

College: Played as a stand-up defensive end for the legendary head coach Paul "Bear" Bryant at Alabama ... was a backup to future NFL all-pro E.J. Junior (Cardinals, Dolphins) in his first two seasons before earning All-American honors himself as a junior and senior ... was a first-team All-American as selected by UPI, *The Sporting News*, *Football News* and *College and Pro Football Newsweekly* ... named second-team All-America by Associated Press ... invited to play in the Hula and Senior Bowl all-star games ... amassed 214 total tackles and picked off two passes during his career ... compiled 14 quarterback sacks as a junior, while totaling 22 career sacks for the Crimson Tide ... added 26 tackles for losses in his final two seasons.

CONTRACT EXPIRATION DATES

Unrestricted Free Agent: Any player with five or more accrued seasons shall become an unrestricted free agent when his contract expires. Such a player is free to negotiate with any club. Other clubs may sign an unrestricted free agent without penalty or restrictions.

Restricted Free Agent: Any player with three or more accrued seasons, but less than five accrued seasons shall become a restricted free agent when his contract expires. Such a player is free to negotiate and sign with any club. If a restricted free agent is lost to another team, compensation is due to the original team. (Compensation is subject to a variety of restrictions which are outlined in the Collective Bargaining Agreement).


Negotiating Rights of Players with less than Three Accrued Seasons: Any veteran player with less than three accrued seasons whose contract has expired may negotiate or sign only with his prior club if a tender is offered on or before March 1. If the club does not offer a tender by this date, the player shall be completely free to negotiate and sign with any other club.

The Patriots' performance against the Dolphins in the season opener resembled a throwback to their early AFL days. The two teams combined for a total of 874 passing yards, the third-highest total in NFL history. Heavy rains prior to kickoff, made for muddy conditions which forced each team to attempt two passes for every run.

The Patriots took an early lead after recovering a Terry Kirby fumble in the first quarter and converting it into a 1-yard touchdown run by Kevin Turner. The Dolphins answered with a 64-yard touchdown pass from Dan Marino to Mark Ingram with only 2:15 remaining in the half. Drew Bledsoe responded by orchestrating an eight-play, 68-yard scoring drive, capped by a 2-yard touchdown pass to Ben Coates. Pete Stoyanovich converted a 42-yard field goal as time expired in the first half, cutting the Patriots lead to four, 14-10.

The Patriots opened the second half poised to put the game out of reach when Bledsoe connected with Coates for 62-yard touchdown, the longest pass since Doug Fluite's 80-yard touchdown to Irving Fryar on Oct. 30, 1988. The two teams exchanged touchdowns in the third quarter and the Patriots maintained a 28-18 lead before Marino found Irving Fryar for a 54-yard touchdown completion. On their very next possession, Marino connected with Fryar on a 50-yard touchdown strike to give the Dolphins their first lead of the game early in the fourth quarter. Marino and Fryar connected on their third scoring strike, that gave Miami the 39-35 victory.

Bledsoe set personal passing highs with 51 attempts, 32 completions, four touchdowns and a long of 62. He also set a team record with 421 yards passing on the afternoon.

The Patriots scored 35 points in their second consecutive game, but lost to the Buffalo Bills by a final score of 38-35. It was another offensive shootout, as the Patriots totaled 467 yards offensively, but allowed 466 yards to the Bills.

Buffalo took an early lead in the game by scoring on each of their first two possessions. Quarterback Jim Kelly connected with Andre Reed on the Bills' first possession for a 37-yard touchdown, capping an 80-yard drive. On their ensuing possession, the Bills drove 89 yards on 11 plays and took a 14-0 lead. The Bills recovered a Kevin Turner fumble at their own 37-yard line, but Kelly was intercepted by Vincent Brown on the next play. The Patriots took advantage of the turnover, driving 42 yards on five plays, when Drew Bledsoe hit Ben Coates with an 18-yard touchdown pass, to cut the lead to 14-7.

Following a Buffalo defensive touchdown, the Patriots found themselves trailing 35-21, but clawed their way back into the game. The defense responded with a Maurice Hurst interception on the Bills' next drive. A Patriots comeback effort late in the fourth quarter fell short and the Patriots' lost 21-17 to the Los Angeles Raiders at a sold out Foxboro Stadium. The New England Patriots dropped their third consecutive game, 23-3, at the hands of the Miami Dolphins in front of 59,167 at Foxboro Stadium. The Patriots offense gained 188 yards of total offense and 142 net passing yards and were their lowest totals of the season. The loss was the Patriots worst in 20 games, when they lost 45-7 to the NY Jets on 9/26/93.

The Patriots scored first, converting an interception into a Matt Bahr field goal. Harlon Barnett intercepted a Dan Marino pass intended for Kieth Byars and returned it six yards to the Miami 45-yard line. Six plays later, Bahr kicked a 48-yard field goal, his longest of the season. Pete Stoyanovich followed suit with two field goals, 44 and 50 yards, in the second quarter and with seven seconds remaining in the half, Byars ran for a 1-yard touchdown. The touchdown was set up by a Jeff Cross interception, the Dolphins had the ball on the 29-yard line and seven plays later, Byars scored to make it 13-3 Miami.

The Dolphins opened the second half by driving 73 yards on 10 plays and Marino hit Byars for a seven-yard touchdown pass. Miami added to their total by kicking a 48-yard field goal at the beginning of the fourth quarter to seal the 23-3 victory.

The Patriots snapped their four game losing streak by overcoming a 20 point deficit to complete one of the greatest comebacks in Patriot history, defeating the Vikings, 26-20 in OT. The Patriots win stopped the Vikings four-game winning streak and dropped them to 8-3. The Patriots were led by QB Drew Bledsoe, who put on the greatest passing exhibition in NFL history, breaking NFL records for attempts, 70, completions, 45 and set a Patriots single-game passing yardage record with 426.

Minnesota opened the game by driving 80-yards on 10 plays and scored when Terry Allen ran in from two yards out. Minnesota continued to score at will, Warren Moon hooked up with Qaudry Ismail for a 65-yard touchdown pass and Fuad Reveiz nailed a 33-yard field goal to put them up 20-0. The Patriots did close out the first half by driving 48 yards in 58 seconds and enable Matt Bahr to kick a 38-yard field goal.

The Patriots turned to the "hurry-up" offense in the second half and Bledsoe connected with Ray Crittenden for a 31-yard touchdown, cutting the deficit, 20-10. While the Patriots offense started to come alive, the defense was able to shut the Vikings down. Bledsoe connected with Leroy Thompson for a 5-yard touchdown pass with 2:27 remaining in the game, cutting the lead to 20-17. The Patriots defense then forced the Vikings to punt after just three plays and with 1:51 remaining in the game. Bledsoe led his team 56 yards to the five-yard line with 18 seconds remaining and Bahr drilled a 23-yard field goal to send the game into overtime. In the extra session, the Patriots won the coin toss and nine plays later, Bledsoe, attempting his 70th pass of the afternoon, connected with Kevin Turner for the game winning 14-yard touchdown.

Butts, who was traded from the Charger during the offseason, scored from one yard out, and finished with 88 yards (his highest total of the season). The New England Patriots defeated the division rival Indianapolis Colts, 12-10 in front of a national television audience on ESPN. The victory was the Patriots third win in a row, lifting them into a three way tie for second place in the AFC East with the NY Jets and Buffalo Bills. Matt Bahr accounted for all 12 Patriot points, with four field goals. Drew Bledsoe, who completed 26 of 36 pass attempts for 271 yards, upped his season passing total to 3,526 to become the Patriots single-season passing leader in team history surpassing Babe Parilli's 3,465 yards in 1964.

Indianapolis started the fourth quarter with a 10-9 lead after Dean Biasucci's 50-yard field goal. On their next possession, the Patriots were lead by Bledsoe into field goal position. Bledsoe completed all five passes he attempted, including three to Ben Coates. Coates finished the game with a Patriot single-game record, 12 catches for 119 yards and reached the 1,000 yard mark for the first time in his career to become the first NFL tight end to gain over 1,000 yards since Todd Christensen's 1,153 in 1986. Bahr concluded the drive with his fourth field goal of the day, a 42-yarder to put the Patriots up 12-10. The Colts started to drive with 4:10 left in the game but on the fifth play of the drive, Don Majkowski was sacked by Willie McGinest and fumbled. The loose ball was recovered by Harlon Barnett and the Patriots ran the clock out to win their third game in a row, 12-10.

The Patriots defeated the Buffalo Bills 41-17 and moved one step closer to clinching a playoff spot. The Patriots, winners of five straight, while the Bills were losers five of their last seven games and for the first time since 1987, not make the playoffs.

As the game started, the Bills looked like their old selves, as they took command of the game, jumping out to an early 17-3 lead. Frank Reich, who replaced the injured Jim Kelly, led his team to three early scores. Reich threw a 26-yard touchdown to Nate Turner, Steve Christie kicked a 24-yard field goal and Carwell Gardner ran in from three yards, as the Bills built a 17-3 lead. However the Buffalo's 17 points were the only points scored by the Bills all day.

Drew Bledsoe, played one of his best games of the season, completing 22 of 31 passes for 276 yards, three touchdowns and no interceptions. As Bledsoe lead the offense down the field, the Patriots defense terrorized the Buffalo offense. The Patriots forced five turnovers (three fumbles and two interceptions) while four of the turnovers were converted into touchdowns. Maurice Hurst intercepted his seventh pass of the season and Ricky Reynolds recovered a fumble and returned it 25 yards for a touchdown. The 41 points scored by the Patriots were the most since they scored 42 against the Jets, 12/13/87.

The Patriots qualified for the playoffs for the first time in eight years when they defeated the Chicago Bears 13-3 at Soldier Field. The victory concluded a whirlwind season, one in which the Patriots won their final seven games to finish 10-6 and qualify for a wild-card birth in the playoffs. Drew Bledsoe connected with Leroy Thompson for a 3-yard touchdown with 2:32 remaining in the game, to put the game out of reach.

The Bears open the scoring in the first quarter at 3-0, when Kevin Butler kicked a 44-yard field goal, it turned out to be their only points of the game. The Patriots countered with a field goal of their own later in the first quarter when Matt Bahr drilled a 29-yarder. Bledsoe connected with Vincent Brisby for passes of 15 and 32 yards and the Patriots drove to the four-yard line where Matt Bahr kicked a 22-yard field goal to make the score 6-3.

The Patriots defense stifled the Bears, holding them to 80 total yards in the first half, but in the second half the Bears drove into field goal position twice. One of Butler's attempts was blocked by Troy Barnett while the other sailed wide left. The Patriots put together one more scoring drive, as they moved 51 yards in seven plays and scored when Bledsoe hit Thompson for a 3-yard score.

The Patriots fought valiantly but were defeated by the Cleveland Browns 20-13 in the wild card round of the NFL Playoffs. Each team reaquainted themselves with the playoffs, the Browns last trip to the postseason followed the 1989 season, while the Patriots was in 1986. The Browns were led by the arm of Vinnie Testaverde, who was playing in this first playoff game in his eight year career. He completed 20 of 30 passes for 268 yards, one touchdown and no interceptions.

While his counterpart was performing like a playoff veteran, Drew Bledsoe showed his inexperience, completing only 21 of 50 passes, including three interceptions (two in the fourth quarter). Although they were not playing at their best, the Patriots found themselves tied at 10 as halftime. Bledsoe connected with Leroy Thompson for a 13-yard touchdown and Matt Bahr kicked a 23-yard field goal.

Cleveland added a scoring strike from Testaverde to Mark Carrier and a Matt Stover 21-yard field goal in the second half and led 20-10. The Patriots drove 63 yards and Matt Bahr kicked a 33-yard field goal with 1:30 remaining in the game. The Patriots then attempted an onside kick which was recovered by Corwin Brown. Unfortunately, the Patriots were not able to put the ball in the end zone and were defeated, 20-13.

#73 JOHN HANNAH • G • Alabama • Inducted to Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1991 • Inducted to Patriots Hall of Fame (HOF) in 1991

Played entire career with the Patriots from 1973 through the Super Bowl season of 1985 ... regarded by many as the greatest guard to ever play the game and remains the only Patriot player to be inducted into Professional Football Hall of Fame ... one of two Patriots voted to the NFL's 75th anniversary team ... played in 183 games, fourth in franchise history ... missed only five games with injuries ... selected to nine Pro-Bowls (1976, 1978-85), a Patriots team record ... called "The Greatest Offensive Lineman of All Time" by *Sports Illustrated* in their August 3, 1981 cover story ... named Offensive Lineman of the Year for four straight years (1978-81) by NFL players ... powered an offensive line which helped set an NFL record with 3,165 rushing yards in 1978 – a record which has not been challenged in 17 seasons ... he was the first rookie offensive lineman in Patriots history to start in his NFL debut ... started first 13 games as a rookie after playing for the legendary Bear Bryant at Alabama ... fourth overall selection in 1973 draft.

PATRIOTS HALL OF FAME

There are currently eight former Patriots who have been inducted into the Patriots Hall of Fame. Of those, five players have had their uniform numbers retired – Gino Cappelletti (20), Steve Nelson (57), John Hannah (73), Jim Lee Hunt (79) and Bob Dee (89).



HISTORICAL DATES

1959

- Nov. 16 American Football League's eighth and final franchise is awarded to William H. Sullivan, Jr.
- Nov. 22 Northwestern RB Ron Burton is selected as first draft choice and Syracuse RB Gerhardt Schwedes is made first territorial choice.
- Dec. Mike Holovak is named director of player personnel. He is the first executive hired.
- Dec. 20 Clemson QB Harvey White becomes the first player to sign a Boston Patriots contract.

1960

- Feb. 8 Lou Saban is appointed first head coach.
- Feb. 20 As the result of a public contest, the team nickname of Patriots is chosen. The Patriots also announce that the team colors will be red, white and blue.
- April 1 Boston University Field is named as the Patriots' first home.
- April 2 Patriots become first pro team in history to issue public stock.
- April 19 Uniformed Patriot centering football (creative work of Boston—Worcester cartoonist Phil Bissell) is adopted as team logo.
- July 4 Team opens first training camp at the University of Massachusetts, 350 players attend.
- July 30 In the AFL's first ever preseason game, the Patriots defeat Buffalo 28-7 at War Memorial Stadium. Patriots DE Bob Dee recovered a fumble for the league's first touchdown.
- Aug. 14 Patriots play their first home game ever at Harvard Stadium, a 24-14 loss to the Dallas Texans before 11,000 fans.
- Sept. 9 In their first regular season game, the Patriots open with a 13-10 loss to Denver at B.U. Field before a crowd of 21,597.
- Sept. 16 DB Chuck Shonta recovered a fumble on the final play of the game and ran for a touchdown to give the Patriots their first victory with a 28-24 advantage over the N.Y. Titans at the Polo Grounds in New York.

1961

- Oct. 10 Mike Holovak replaces Lou Saban as head coach.
- Oct. 20 The Patriots' game with the Buffalo Bills at Boston University is postponed due to the threat of a hurricane. The game was played two days later (10/22) and the Patriots scored a 52-21 victory.
- Dec. 17 The Patriots ended the season with a 41-0 shutout over San Diego to finish with a 9-4-1 record, second in the AFL Eastern Division. The 41-point margin of victory remains the largest shutout victory in Patriots history.

1962

- Sept. 16 Opened the season at Harvard Stadium and beat the Houston Oilers 34-21. The Patriots played the remainder of their games at Boston University Field.
- Nov. 18 QB Babe Parilli suffers a broken collar bone in a game at Houston. The Patriots lost the game and their first-place standing in the division.
- Dec. 12 The Oakland Raiders claim one of the AFL's most shocking upsets with a 20-0 victory over the Patriots in the season finale. It was the Raiders' only victory of the season and knocked the Patriots out of championship contention.

1963

- Oct. 11 Patriots play their first game in Fenway Park and beat Oakland 20-14.
- Dec. 28 With a 26-8 victory over Buffalo, the Patriots win the AFL's Eastern Division title in the league's only season-ending tie-breaker game.

1964

- Jan. 5 The Patriots lose the AFL title game, 51-10, to the Chargers at San Diego.
- Dec. 20 Gino Cappelletti finished the season with 155 total points, currently ranking third in NFL history.

1966

- Rommie Loudd becomes the first African-American assistant coach in the AFL when Mike Holovak adds him to the Patriots' coaching staff prior to the 1966 season. The following season, Loudd was named director of player personnel.
- Dec. 17 Jim Nance rushes for 78 yards against the New York Jets in the season finale giving him 1,458 yards rushing for the season, a Patriots single-season team record. Nance was later awarded the league's Most Valuable Player honors.



1967

- Aug. 13 Patriots played the Baltimore Colts of the NFL in a preseason game. It was the first time the Patriots had played an NFL team. The Patriots lost the game 33-3.
- Dec. 17 Jim Nance finishes the season with 1,216 yards rushing and becomes the first player in AFL history to rush for over 1,000 yards in back-to-back seasons. He remains the only Patriot to have accomplished the feat.

1968

- Nov. 10 Gino Cappelletti became the first player in AFL history to score more than 1,000 points in his career. He reached the milestone on a 19-yard touchdown reception from Tom Sherman.

1969

- Jan. 30 Patriots appoint Clive Rush as vice president and head coach.

1970

- April 4 Foxboro selected as the new playing site for the Patriots.
- Sept. 23 Official ground-breaking ceremonies begin for the construction of the Patriots' new stadium in Foxboro, Mass. The stadium opened nearly one year later.
- Nov. 12 John Mazur replaces Clive Rush as head coach.

1971

- March 22 The Boston Patriots are renamed the New England Patriots.
- Aug. 15 The Patriots make their debut at Schaefer Stadium in Foxboro. Gino Cappelletti kicked a 36-yard FG for the first points scored in the stadium as the Patriots topped the NY Giants 20-14 before 60,423 fans.

1972

- Feb. 17 Made financial history by paying first cash dividend of 15 cents per share.

1973

- Jan. 26 Chuck Fairbanks is named head coach and general manager.

1975

- Nov. 7 President William H. Sullivan, Jr. became the first majority owner in club history when he purchased additional voting stock to give him 88 per cent of the franchise's voting stock.

1976

- July 10 Patriots open their training camp for the first time at Bryant College in Smithfield, R.I. after spending the summers of 1969-75 at UMass/Amherst.
- Dec. 5 Patriots defeat New Orleans 27-6 at Foxboro to qualify for their first NFL playoff appearance and their first playoff appearance since the 1963 AFL Championship game.
- Dec. 8 Non-voting stockholders approve offer of \$15 per share made by Billy Sullivan to purchase all non-voting stock.
- Dec. 18 Lost AFC wild card playoff game to the eventual Super Bowl Champion Oakland Raiders, 24-21, in the final 10 seconds of play.

1977

- Aug. 20 Work completed on installation of new surface (Super Turf) in Schaefer Stadium.

1978

- Sept. 3 Mrs. William H. (Mary M.) Sullivan, Jr. elected to the Patriots Board of Directors.
- Dec. 10 Patriots clinch their first outright divisional championship in the club's history with a last minute 26-24 victory over Buffalo at home.
- Dec. 31 Patriots lose 31-14 to Houston in first playoff game ever played in Foxboro.

1979

- April 2 Patriots announce that Head Coach and General Manager Chuck Fairbanks has been released from his contract to assume duties as head football coach at the University of Colorado.
- April 6 Francis "Bucko" Kilroy named as the new general manager and former Patriots' offensive coordinator Ron "Fargo" Erhardt named as head coach.
- July 13 Patriots' Vice President Charles W. "Chuck" Sullivan is promoted to Executive Vice President of the club.
- Sept. 3 Former Patriots' wide receiver Darryl Stingley is named Executive Director of Player Personnel.
- Oct. 23 Jeanne Sullivan McKeigue is elected as member of the club's Board of Directors.
- Dec. 16 Patriots close out 1979 regular season with 27-23 victory over Minnesota. Harold Jackson (1,013) and Stanley Morgan (1,002) become the first and



second players, respectively, in Patriots history to transcend the 1,000-yard single-season receiving mark.

1980

- Feb. 25 Paul Sonnabend resigns as Executive Director of the NFL Management Council and is appointed as Vice President and a member of the Board of Directors of the Patriots.
- April 8 William H. "Billy" Sullivan, Jr., President of the Patriots, is re-elected as Chairman of the Board of NFL Properties.

1981

- Nov. 29 FB Sam Cunningham, with 35 yards on nine carries against St. Louis at Foxboro, surpasses Jim Nance (5,323 yards on 1,323 carries) as the Patriots' all-time career rushing leader.

1982

- Jan. 15 Ron Meyer, head coach at Southern Methodist University from 1976-81, is named the eighth head coach in club history.

1983

- Jan. 8 In their first playoff appearance since 1978, the Patriots lose to the eventual AFC Champion Miami Dolphins at the Orange Bowl, 28-13.
- Feb. 16 General Manager Bucko Kilroy is promoted to the position of Vice President and Patrick Sullivan, Assistant General Manager for four years, is named General Manager.
- May 17 William F. Finucane and Jeannette Allen Keefe are elected to the Patriots' Board of Directors.
- May 23 Schaefer Stadium is renamed Sullivan Stadium in honor of the founder and driving force behind the Patriots franchise, William H. "Billy" Sullivan, Jr.
- June 29 Sullivan Stadium is officially rededicated and the Boston Pops performs a concert in the stadium that is open free-of-charge to the public.

1984

- June 1 The Patriots organize a fan advisory board, a group of season ticket holders who will help advise the Patriots on how to make Sullivan Stadium a more exciting and more pleasant place to bring a family to watch an NFL game.
- June 5 In the first-ever NFL Supplemental Draft, the Patriots select slotback Ricky Sanders of the Houston Gamblers, running back Eric Jordan of the Oakland Invaders and quarterback Walter Lewis of the Memphis Showboats.
- Aug. 10 The Patriots install a new SuperTurf surface at Sullivan Stadium. The original SuperTurf was installed in 1977.
- Oct. 25 Hall of Fame receiver Raymond Berry is named the head coach of the Patriots, replacing Ron Meyer. Berry, a former Patriots assistant coach, becomes the team's ninth head coach.

1985

- July 26 Patrick J. Sullivan, William H. Sullivan III and Mrs. Nancie Chamberlain are elected to the Patriots' Board of Directors.
- Oct. 13 Raymond Clayborn establishes a new team record for consecutive starts by starting his 111 straight game. Ray Hamilton had the old mark of 110, done from September 16, 1973 to October 26, 1980. (Clayborn continued the streak to a club-record 161 consecutive games). Clayborn celebrated the record-setting day by scoring his first professional touchdown on a 27 yard interception return.
- Dec. 28 The Patriots defeated the New York Jets, 26-14, at Giants Stadium (East Rutherford, N.J.) in the AFC wild-card game. With the victory the Patriots won their first NFL playoff game (the Patriots had an 0-3 NFL playoff record prior to the game).

1986

- Jan. 12 The Patriots beat the Miami Dolphins, 31-14, thus winning the AFC Championship. In doing so, the Patriots ended an 18-game losing streak at the Orange Bowl. It was also only the second time the Patriots won at the Orange Bowl (1966 was the other time).
- Jan. 26 The Patriots play in Super Bowl XX, going against the Chicago Bears in the Louisiana Superdome in New Orleans. The Bears won the game, 46-10. The game, shown on NBC-TV, was the third-highest rated Super Bowl in history with a 48.3 rating and a 70 share (one rating point represents 859,000 TV households; a share is the percentage of sets in use). Only the 1982 and 1983 Super Bowls had higher ratings. It was the most widely watched TV show ever with 127 million viewers (topping the previous high of 121,600,000 who watched the final MASH show of February 28, 1983). The previous high Super Bowl in terms of viewers was Super Bowl XIX between the 49ers and the Dolphins (115,880,000). Also, 300 million people in China watched the game on tape delay.
- Jan. 27 Defensive end Julius Adams retires after 15 years (all with the Patriots).



Adams, the team's number two draft choice in 1971 out of Texas Southern, was the oldest active defensive lineman in the league at age 37 when he retired. He started the final 12 games of the regular season, and all four post-season games in 1985. He has the club record for games played with 210.

- June 30 John Hannah, who was selected to the Pro Bowl a team record nine times, announces his retirement from the game. He retires ranked fourth in the team's record book for games-played with 183.
- June 12 Coach Raymond Berry, who led the Patriots to the AFC Championship and Super Bowl XX in his first full season as the team's head coach, signs new five-year contract.
- Sept. 7 1985 AFC Championship banner raised at Sullivan Stadium in pregame ceremony (prior to opening game vs. Indianapolis Colts). The banner is 10 feet wide and 15 feet long. Mr. William H. Sullivan, Jr. is joined by the governors from each of the New England states.
- Sept. 21 QB Tony Eason throws for team record 414 yards (400 previous record, done by Vito "Babe" Parilli in 1964). The Patriots lost to Seattle, 38-31, in the game played in Foxboro. Eason was 26 of 45 with three TDs and no interceptions.
- Dec. 7 WR Stanley Morgan establishes a new team record for catches in one season with his 67th catch (had five catches on the day). Morgan, who finished the season with 84 catches, broke Derrick Ramsey's previous mark of 66 catches, done in 1984.
- Dec. 31 NEP Partners purchase a three-year option to buy the Patriots.

1987

- Sept. 13 Patriots become first NFL team to have its games on a French-speaking radio network on a regular basis. CKLM—a 50,000-watt station out of Laval, Quebec, Canada—was the flagship station (others were CJSA in Ste. Agathe, Que.; CKSL in St. Jovite, Que., and CJER in St. Jerome, Que.). Pierre Donais was the announcer.
- Sept. 13 Patriots begin four-year, five-million dollar contract with WHDH-Boston.
- Nov. 29 Cornerback Raymond Clayborn ends his consecutive games played streak at 161 when he couldn't play vs. Philadelphia at Sullivan Stadium due to knee injury suffered the week before vs. Indianapolis Colts on November 22nd. Clayborn, who went on IR on November 24th (spent rest of season on list), broke Gino Cappelletti's record of 152 consecutive games-played and Ray Hamilton's 110 consecutive starts.

1988

- July 11 The Patriots retire the number 57 worn by 14-year linebacker Steve Nelson, who retired following the 1987 season. Nelson played in three Pro Bowls and led the team in tackles for eight years.
- July 28 Victor K. Kiam II, the owner and chief executive officer of Remington Products, Inc. of Bridgeport, Conn., agrees to purchase the team from William H. Sullivan, Jr.
- Oct. 28 Victor K. Kiam II becomes majority owner of the Patriots. He will be chairman of the team. Francis W. Murray, the minority owner, is the vice chairman. William H. Sullivan, Jr., the founder and previous owner, remains as the team's president. The Kiam, Murray and Sullivan team is known as KMS Limited.
- Dec. 4 Veteran wide receiver Stanley Morgan catches his 500th career pass, on a 19-yarder (26 seconds remaining in the first quarter) vs. Seattle.

1989

- Jan. 6 Running back John Stephens is named the Old Spice/NFL Rookie of the Year.

1990

- Sullivan Stadium is renamed Foxboro Stadium.
- Feb. 27 Rod Rust is named the head coach of the Patriots, replacing Raymond Berry (who was relieved of his duties on Feb. 26). Rust, a former Patriots' defensive coordinator, becomes the team's 10th head coach.
- Mar. 14 Former Patriots offensive guard John Hannah and cornerback Mike Haynes are selected to the National Football League's All-1980s team, while current linebacker Andre Tippett was named to the second-team.
- Dec. 20 Sam Jankovich, the University of Miami's Athletic Director from 1982-90, is named the chief executive officer of the Patriots.



1991

- Jan. 7 Dick MacPherson is named head coach of the Patriots, replacing Rod Rust (who was relieved of his duties on Jan. 4). MacPherson, Syracuse University's head coach for the past 10 seasons, becomes the team's 11th head coach.
- May 3 The installation of a natural grass playing surface at Foxboro Stadium is completed.
- July 27 Former Patriots offensive guard John Hannah is inducted into the NFL Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio.

1992

- May 11 James B. Orthwein purchases the controlling interest of the Patriots from Victor K. Kiam. Orthwein becomes Chairman of the Board of the club while Francis W. Murray, the club's minority owner, becomes President. Sam Jankovich remains the Chief Executive Officer.
- May 21 Patriots begin two-year deal with WLVI-TV (Channel 56) that gives the station the right to televise the team's preseason games as well as a weekly in-season Patriots magazine show.
- August Gino Cappelletti and Nick Buoniconti are inducted into the Patriots Hall of Fame.

1993

- Jan. 9 Sam Jankovich, the Patriots' chief executive officer for the past two seasons, resigns
- Jan. 21 Bill Parcells is named headcoach of the Patriots, replacing Dick MacPherson (who was relieved of his duties on Jan. 8). Parcells, a two-time Super Bowl winner with the New York Giants, becomes the team's 12th head coach. In addition, Patrick Forte' is named Executive Vice President , Football Operations and James Hausmann is named Executive Vice President, Business Operations.
- Feb. 25 Patriots designate linebacker Vincent Brown as the club's first transitional player under the new Collective Bargaining Agreement.
- Mar. 31 Patriots Owner and Chairman James Orthwein unveils new logo and uniforms at a press conference at the Four Seasons Hotel in Boston. The new icon features a streamlined head of a minuteman while the primary color of the uniforms changes from red to blue.
- Aug. 18 Bob Dee, Jimmie Lee Hunt, Steve Nelson and Babe Parilli are inducted into the Patriots Hall of Fame.

1994

- Jan. 21 Robert K. Kraft becomes the Patriots fourth owner in the club's 35-year history with an agreement to purchase the team from James Orthwein.
- Feb. 25 The sale of the Patriots from James Orthwein to Robert K. Kraft becomes official.
- Feb. 26 Patriots fans respond to the sale by purchasing 5,958 season tickets, a Patriots single-day sales record.
- May 12 Andre Tippett is appointed director of player resources upon his announced retirement.
- June 1 Second-round draft choice Kevin Lee becomes the 10th and final 1994 Patriots draft choice to sign a contract. The 37-day signing period is the fastest reported to the league since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.
- Nov. 17 The Patriots announce WBCN - 104.1 FM as the team's new radio flagship station after reaching a three-year agreement.
- Dec. 24 The Patriots defeat the Chicago Bears 13-3, clinching the teams first playoff birth since 1986.

1995

- Jan. 1 The Cleveland Browns defeat the Patriots 20-13 in a first-round wild-card playoff game.
- Feb. 9 The Patriots announce Boston's ABC affiliate WCVB-TV (Channel 5) as their preseason television flagship station. WCVB will televise three preseason games and a weekly Patriots Show, hosted by Channel 5's Mike Lynch.
- Mar. 29 The Patriots publish their premier issue of "Patriots Football Weekly," the team's official newspaper.
- Apr. 29 For the first time in franchise history, every home game is sold out before the season begins as the remaining 15,000 tickets are sold individually to non-season tickets holders.

FREE AGENCY COMINGS AND GOINGS

The advent of unrestricted free agency has created a tremendous amount of player movement in recent years. The trend began in 1989, when the NFL owners and the NFL Players Association agreed on Plan B free agency, which allowed "unprotected players" the freedom to sign with any NFL club. The current Collective Bargaining Agreement went into effect on May 6, 1993 and continues through the 1999 season. Below are some definitions of three categories of free agency.

Unrestricted Free Agent: Any player with five or more accrued seasons shall become an unrestricted free agent when his contract expires. Such a player is free to negotiate with any club. Other clubs may sign an unrestricted free agent without penalty or restrictions.

Restricted Free Agent: Any player with three or more accrued seasons, but less than five accrued seasons shall become a restricted free agent when his contract expires. Such a player is free to negotiate and sign with any club. If a restricted free agent is lost to another team, compensation is due to the original team. (Compensation is subject to a variety of restrictions which are outlined in the Collective Bargaining Agreement).

Negotiating Rights of Players with less than Three Accrued Seasons: Any veteran player with less than three accrued seasons whose contract has expired may negotiate or sign only with his prior club if a tender is offered on or before March 1. If the club does not offer a tender by this date, the player shall be completely free to negotiate and sign with any other club.

Since the current CBA took effect in 1993, the Patriots have signed 20 players and only lost nine. Below are the year-by-year comings and goings. All players listed are unrestricted free agents unless otherwise indicated (see notes at the bottom of the page).


PATRIOTS IN PRIME TIME – 1995

The Patriots are guaranteed of setting at least one franchise record in 1995 – most nationally televised games in one season. Including their pre-season game on TNT, the Patriots will play on five nationally televised games this season. The Patriots first regular season prime time contest is on October 8 when they host the Denver Broncos (TNT). It will be the Patriots' ninth consecutive season appearing on a nationally televised Sunday night game, but the first time in the franchise's history that they will host one. Two weeks later, the Patriots will host the Buffalo Bills on ABC's Monday Night Football. It will be the Patriots' first MNF game in eight seasons and their first time hosting a MNF game since 1981. 

CONSECUTIVE PRO BOWL APPEARANCES

Last season, the Patriots returned to Pro Bowl form after having a 17-year streak snapped in 1993. Bruce Armstrong, Drew Bledsoe and Ben Coates represented the team in Honolulu. The 17-year streak began in 1976 when four Patriots were selected – Russ Francis, Leon Gray, John Hannah and Mike Haynes – and continued through 1992 when Marv Cook made his second consecutive appearance.

John Hannah holds the Patriots record with eight consecutive Pro Bowl appearances, beginning in 1978. Jon Morris, who played center for the Boston Patriots during their AFL origins, had held the record with seven AFL All-Star Game appearances from 1964 through 1970.



(Note: If one team wins multiple-team tiebreaker to advance to playoff round, remaining teams revert to step 1 of applicable two-club format, i.e., either in division tiebreaker or Wild Card tiebreaker. If two teams in a multiple-team tie possess superior marks in a tiebreaking step, this pair of teams revert to top of applicable two-club format to break tie. One team advances to playoff round, while other returns to original group and step 1 of applicable tiebreaker).

The Patriots jumped in front of the Raiders 7-0 on a one-yard run by Andy Johnson, but fell behind at the half 10-7 when Fred Biletnikoff hauled in a 31-yard touchdown pass from Ken Stabler with just 39 seconds remaining in the first half. Steve Grogan engineered scoring drives on the Patriots first two possessions of the third quarter, running the Patriots lead to 21-10. Oakland responded with a score on its first possession of the fourth period, a one-yard run by Mark van Eeghan. With the score at 21-17. Ken Stabler drove the Raiders from their own 32 and scored with only 14 seconds to go. The drive was marred by a controversial roughing the passer call on Ray Hamilton. The Patriots had seemingly stopped the Raiders when a Stabler to Garrett pass on a 3rd and 18 fell incomplete. However, penalty flags were thrown and the Raiders had possession with a first and ten at the Patriot 13. Five plays later Stabler rolled around left end for the winning score and the Patriots dreams of a championship were over.

The game found Fairbanks on the Patriots sidelines, but the last day of 1978 also proved to be the last day of the Patriots '78 season. Dan Pastorini completed 10 of 13 passes for 184 yards in the first half while the Oilers built a 21-0 lead at the intermission. Toni Fritsch added a 30-yard FG before the Patriots rallied with two touchdowns in the second half. A 24-yard option pass from RB Andy Johnson to WR Harold Jackson and a 24-yard scoring strike from sub QB Tom Owen to TE Russ Francis were the only points they could muster. Owen had replaced starter Steve Grogan late in the first half. Trailing 24-14, the Patriots began a late rally. Starting at their own 18, the Patriots started to move but Gregg Bingham picked off an Owen for Morgan pass and returned it to the Patriot 18, killing the drive and setting up an Earl Campbell 2-yard TD run that put the game out of reach.

The Raiders narrowed the score to 7-3, due in big part to a blocked punt against Patriots kicker Rich Camarillo. The ball was recovered on the New England 16-yard line, and four plays later, Chris Bahr had a 13-yard field goal. The Raiders did take a 10-7 lead on their next possession when quarterback Marc Wilson found rookie Jesse Hester for a 16-yard score. After a Mosi Tatupu fumble was recovered at the New England 19, Los Angeles would move in front, 17-7 three plays later when Marcus Allen scored on a 13-yard touchdown run. Not to be denied, the Patriots fired back, making it 17-10, on an 80-yard, 10-play drive that ended with Craig James' two-yard touchdown run. Ronnie Lippett's second interception of the day led to a 45-yard field goal and a 17-17 tie. But the Raiders had the lead at halftime, 20-17, on a 32-yard field goal by Bahr. The rest of the scoring was done by the Patriots, a 32-yard field goal by Franklin, 54 yards and 12 plays after Fred Marion had recovered a fumble. Testaverde turned in a near-perfect performance to beat the Patriots. The eighth-year veteran completed 20 of 30 passes for 268 yards, with a touchdown and no interceptions in his playoff debut. Bledsoe, on the other hand, completed 21 of 50 passes for 235 yards and a touchdown, but threw three interceptions—two of which ended drives in the fourth quarter.

Trailing 10-7 in the second quarter, the Patriots drove 71 yards on 16 plays, positioning Matt Bahr for a game-tying field goal with only 30 seconds remaining in the half.

The Browns dominated the time of possession with two long third quarter drives, the second of which was capped by a 10-yard touchdown run by Leroy Hoard. The Browns added a Matt Stover field goal in the fourth quarter to take a 20-10 lead. The Patriots pulled within seven with 1:34 remaining in the game on a 33-yard field goal by Bahr. Corwin Brown recovered the ensuing onside kick at the New England 36-yard line, giving Patriots fans hope in the waining minutes. The drive stalled at the New England 48-yard line, where a fourth-and-10 opportunity failed on an incomplete pass and the Patriots lost 20-13.




PATRIOTS PRESEASON BROADCAST CREW

Directions to Foxboro Stadium

The New England Patriots administrative offices are located at the north end of Foxboro Stadium. Visitors should enter Gate P4. For more detailed directions, please call (508) 543-8200. Below are directions from both Logan and T.F. Green Airports.

From downtown Boston/Logan Airport: Stay in the center lanes when exiting the airport and follow signs to the Sumner Tunnel (toll) to I-93 south. Take **Interstate 93 south** to Exit 1 (to Providence) approximately 18 miles. Exit 1 puts you on **Interstate 95 south**. Follow I-95 south for 7.4 miles to Exit 9 (Wrentham), which exits onto Route 1 south. Continue on **Route 1 south** for four miles. Foxboro Stadium is on the left. For access to the administration building, enter lot P4.

From downtown Providence/T.F. Green Airport: T.F. Green will be under construction throughout the 1995 season. Leaving the airport, follow the detour signs to **Interstate 95 north** (to Boston). Continue on I-95 to Exit 6, which exits onto **Interstate 495 north**. Stay on I-495 north approximately three miles to the first exit. Take the **Route 1 north** exit (Exit 14) and continue approximately four-and-a-half miles. Foxboro Stadium is on the right.


Directions to the Patriots Practice Facilities

To the Grass Field: Leaving Foxboro Stadium, exit right onto Route 1 north. At the first intersection (.7 miles) take a right on North Street. You will cross a set of railroad tracks (1.1 miles). Take your first left after the railroad tracks (.3 miles). Take your next left (.1 miles). Grass field is straight ahead.

FOXBORO STADIUM



The site for the construction of Foxboro Stadium was selected for its proximity to three of New England's largest cities – Boston, Providence, R.I. and Worcester, Mass. Official ground breaking ceremonies for the stadium took place on September 23, 1970. Just 326 days later (August 15, 1971), the Patriots christened their new home by hosting the New York Giants in an exhibition game. The home field helped give them a 20-14 advantage over the Giants before 60,423 fans.

Robert Kraft established an ownership position with the facility in 1989. In the fall of 1993, Kraft became sole owner of the facility when he purchased his partner's interest in the stadium. Kraft's vision as owner has been to develop the facility into a nationally recognized family entertainment venue. By building and developing relationships with local officials and representatives of the music industry, Kraft and his associates have opened up the facility to more frequent samplings of diverse entertainment. In fact, Foxboro Stadium has hosted nearly three times as many special events in the past six years than it did during the first 20 years of operation.

National tours, like the Rolling Stones, The Who and U2, have drawn record crowds in Foxboro. The stadium has worked to create unique events for our region, such as The National Earth Day Concerts and the Walden Woods concert in 1993.

In 1990, the U.S. was awarded the rights to host the 1994 World Cup Soccer Championships. An initial list of the 35 prospective venues failed to include any Boston or New England site. Stadium management initiated the lobbying effort internationally to add Foxboro's name to the list. Joining forces with the tourism officials throughout the region ultimately led to Foxboro's selection as one of nine host sites for World Cup Games. Only Los Angeles and New York were awarded more than Foxboro's six games.

The World Cup has proven to be a harbinger for many successes in 1994. In addition to the World Cup, the stadium hosted eight national concert dates, the Drum Corps International Championships and has been named the host site for Major League Soccer, the new professional soccer league, which will begin play in 1996.



MEDICAL GLOSSARY

AC Joint - Acromioclavicular joint; joint of the shoulder where acromion process of the scapula and the distal end of the clavicle meet; most shoulder separations occur at this point.

Abrasion - Any injury which rubs off the surface of the skin.

Aerobic - Exercise in which energy needed is supplied by oxygen inspired and is required for sustained periods of vigorous exercise with a continually high pulse rate.

Anaerobic - Exercise without use of oxygen as an energy source; short bursts of vigorous exercise.

Anterior - In front of; the front surface

Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL) - A primary stabilizing ligament within the center of the knee joint that prevents hyperextension and excessive rotation of the joint. A complete tear of the ACL necessitating reconstruction could require up to 12 months of rehabilitation.

Anterior Talofibular Ligament - A ligament of the ankle that connects the fibula (lateral ankle bone) to the talus. This ligament is often times subject to sprain.

Anti-Inflammatory - Any agent which prevents inflammation, such as aspirin or ibuprofen.

Arthrogram - X-ray technique for joints using air and/or dye injected in affected area (to show torn cartilage or rotator cuff tears).

Bruise - A discoloration of the skin due to an extravasation of blood into the underlying tissues.

Burner - Common term for brachial plexus trauma in the neck. Usually results in burning or tingling sensation into the shoulder or arm when the neck is forced beyond the normal range of motion.

Cartilage - Smooth, slippery substance preventing two ends of bones from rubbing together and grating.

CAT Scan - Use of a computer to produce a cross sectional view of the anatomical part being investigated from X-ray data.

Charley Horse - A contusion or bruise to any muscle resulting in intramuscular bleeding. No other injury should be called a charley horse.

Concussion - Jarring injury of the brain resulting in dysfunction. It can be graded as mild, moderate or severe depending on loss of consciousness, amnesia and loss of equilibrium.

Contusion - An injury to a muscle and tissues caused by a blow from a blunt object.

Deltoid Muscle - Muscles at top of the arm, just below the shoulder, responsible for shoulder motions to the front, side and back.

Disc - A flat, round-like plate structure usually referring to cartilage between vertebrae.

Eccymosis - Bleeding into the surface tissue below the skin, resulting in a 'black and blue' effect.

Effusion - Accumulation of fluid, or the fluid itself, in various spaces in the body. Commonly, the knee has an effusion after an injury.

Femur - Thigh bone; longest bone in the body.

Fibula - The smaller of the two bones in the lower leg; runs from the knee to the ankle along the outside of the lower leg.

Fracture - Breach in continuity of a bone. Types of fractures include simple, compound, comminuted, greenstick, incomplete, impacted, longitudinal, oblique, stress or transverse.

Glycogen - Form in which foods are stored in the body as energy.

Hamstring - Category of muscle that runs from the buttocks to the knee along the back of the thigh. It functions to flex the knee, and is often times injured as a result of improper conditioning or lack of muscle flexibility.

Heat Cramps - Painful muscle spasms of the arms or legs caused by excessive body heat and depletion of fluids and electrolytes.



MEDICAL GLOSSARY

Humerus - Bone of the upper arm.

Inflammation - The body's natural response to injury in which the injury might display various degrees of pain, sweating, heat, redness, and/or loss of function.

Medial - Pertaining to or near the middle.

Medial Collateral Ligament (MCL) - Ligament of knee along the medial aspect that connects the femur to the tibia. It provides stability to the medial aspect of the joint.

Metacarpals - Five long bones of the hand, just below the fingers.

Metatarsals - Five long bones of the foot, just below the toes.

Myositis - Inflammation of a muscle.

Neuritis - Inflammation of a nerve.

Patella - The kneecap.

Patella Tendinitis - Inflammation of the patella ligament; also known as "jumpers knee".

Posterior Cruciate Ligament (PCL) - A primary stabilizing ligament of the knee attaching to posterior tibial plateau and anterior lateral aspect of femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from going backward.

Quadricep (Quads) - A group of four muscles of the front thigh that run from the hip and form a common tendon at the patella; they are responsible for knee extension.

Radiography - Taking of X-rays.

Reconstruction - Surgical rebuilding of the joint using natural, artificial or transplanted materials.

Rotator Cuff - Comprised of four muscles in the shoulder area that can be irritated by overuse. The muscles are the supraspinatus (most commonly injured), infraspinatus, teres minor and subscapularis.

Scapula - Shoulder blade.

Shin Splint - A catch-all syndrome describing pain in the shin that is not a fracture or tumor and cannot be defined otherwise.

Sprain - Injury resulting from a stretch or twist of the joint and causes various degrees of stretch or tear of a ligament or other soft tissue at the joint.

Sternum - The breast bone.

Strain - Injury resulting from a pull or torsion to the muscle or tendon that causes various degrees of stretch or tear to the muscle or tendon tissue.

Stress Fracture - A hair-line type of break in a bone caused by overuse.

Stress X-Ray - A continual X-ray taken when a portion of the body is stressed to its maximum in order to determine joint stability. This is a test utilized in some ankle injuries.

Tendinitis - Inflammation of the tendon and/or tendon sheath, caused by chronic overuse or sudden injury.

Tendon - Tissue that connects muscle to bone.

Tibia - Larger of the two bones of the lower leg and is the weight-bearing bone of shin.

Trachea - The windpipe.

Triceps - Muscles of the back of the upper arm, primarily responsible for extending the elbow.

Ulnar Nerve - Nerve in elbow commonly irritated from excessive throwing.

Vasoconstriction - Decrease of local blood flow.

Vasodilation - Increase of local blood flow.

"Wind Knocked Out" - Syndrome describing a contraction of the abdominal nerve truck, the solar plexus, as a result of an abdominal contusion.




