JOHN W. MECOM, JR.

President

The Saints' President and principal owner, John W. Mecom, Jr. is totally involved with the New Orleans Saints, and dedicated to the organization's avowed purpose of bringing the very best professional football production to the second-year team's devoted fans.

Since Mecom was awarded the NFL's franchise in New Orleans, in December, 1966, he has devoted all his efforts into building a successful operation. The NFL's youngest owner, 29, takes an active role in the administration of the club's activities; he may frequently be found working out with the players (and to those who don't recognize him, he's often mistaken for one); and he's the team's most interested fan during the games. As one NFL player observed, "He seems to have more fun out of his team than any other owner."

Mecom has also become vitally involved in New Orleans and Louisiana business and civic activities. Though the Mecoms maintain a home in their native Houston, the family spends a majority of their time in New Orleans. In addition to the Saints, the family has extensive oil and sulphur holdings in Louisiana.

John serves on the Board of Regents of Loyola University and is a member of the board of directors for Louisiana and Southern Life Insurance Company. Among the major awards the young sportsman has received recently are the V.F.W. Sportsman of the Year (1967), and the Pioneer Award presented by the 100% Wrong Club of Atlanta.

The Mecoms' (John, Jr. works with his father as his assistant and co-owner) varied business interests, in addition to those already mentioned, include hotels, ranches, plastics, pump manufacturing, and a wildlife preserve.

John W. Mecom, Jr. attended the University of Oklahoma and the University of Texas, and is a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. During undergraduate days at Oklahoma, John met his wife, the former Katsy Mullendore of Pawhuska, Okla. They were married in 1962, and have three children, John W. Mecom III, 4, Katsy Kathleen, 1½, and Mary Elizabeth, born in April. 1968.

Outside of football, his favorite sport is racing. He's an expert speedboat driver, and most auto racing fans are aware of his success as the owner of some famed Indianapolis 500 entries. He currently serves on the board of directors of the United States Auto Club.

Although John W. Mecom, Jr. is the principal stockholder, more than 20 Louisianans long prominent in sports, civic and business circles hold shares in the NFL's newest club.



VICTOR E. SCHWENK
General Manager

The first major employee hired by the Saints, Victor E. Schwenk, was named the club's general manager in March. Schwenk had served as director of player personnel since December of 1966, and therefore was instrumental in helping to build the new team by supervising the expansion 1raft, and serving through two collegiate drafts.

Schwenk began his football career at UCLA where he was a member of the 1947 Rose Bowl team which was defeated by Illinois, 45-14. He later transferred to Occidental College. Upon completion of college, he entered the coaching field as head coach at Colton High School and San Marino High School for 10 years. From 1960 through 1963, he served as head coach of Occidental where he compiled a 23-12 record and won two conference titles.

He began his association with the National Football League in 1954, working with the Los Angeles Rams as a part-time personnel scout. In 1963, he was appointed the Rams' Director of Player Personnel, and in 1964, he was appointed offensive coach. In 1966, Schwenk accepted the position of general manager for the Edmonton Eskimos of the Canadian League.

Because of illness in his family, he returned to Los Angeles and served as special game scout under Coach George Allen of the Rams for the 1966 season. At the close of this season, he joined the Saints.

Schwenk and his wife, Arlene, have three daughters and make their home in Metairie, a suburb of New Orleans.



TOM FEARS
Head Coach

Tom Fears, in his first head coaching position, took charge of the expansion New Orleans Saints and painstakingly molded them into a competitive, respected entry during the team's first year in the National Football League.

Fears started his coaching career in 1959 at Green Bay under Vince Lombardi, but he switched to the Los Angeles Rams in 1960 and 1961. Then he was back at Green Bay in 1962 and he remained there through the 1965 season, when he joined the staff of the Atlanta Falcons as chief offensive coach.

More than one NFL star can credit a good part of his success to the work Tom Fears put into helping him become a great player. At Green Bay, it was Boyd Dowler, who was rookie-of-the-year in 1959, and Ron Kramer, an all-pro tight end in 1962 and 1963. At Los Angeles, it was Del Shofner, who won all-pro honors for the first time in 1960, and Red Phillips, an all-pro receiver and pass catching-leader in 1961. In time, perhaps a Saints receiver will be added to this impressive list.

It shouldn't have been surprising that Fears could turn out such outstanding receivers, because as a player, Fears knew few equals. He became the first and only player ever to lead the NFL in receiving in his rookie season and he did it in his first three. He caught 51 passes as a rookie and then broke Don Hutson's then-standing record with 77 catches in 1949. The next year, Fears broke his own record with 84 receptions. He continued playing with the Rams through the 1956 season.

Fears' pre-pro days include two years at Santa Clara in 1941 and 1942, three years in the U. S. Air Force during World War II, and two years at UCLA in 1946 and 1947. Fears, who participated in the Air Force's pilot training program, captained the Second Air Force's famous Superbomber eleven in 1944 and 1945.

Born December 3, 1923, in Los Angeles, Fears and his wife, LuElla, have six children. They are Kathleen 15, Patrick 13, Katie 14, Denny 12, Jono 10, and JoJo 8.



GEORGE DICKSON Chief Offensive Coach

Head man of the Saints' offensive coaching staff is George Dickson, a veteran of 19 years of coaching and Tom Fears' first choice as an assistant on the Saints' staff.

Dickson, born September 27, 1924, in Boston, played halfback and quarterback behind Johnny Lujack and George Ratterman at Notre Dame, graduating in 1950. Before his college grid days, he had served with the U.S. 101st Airborne Division in the Battle of the Bulge at Bastogne. He was also middleweight boxing champion in the 101st Airborne division and at Notre Dame.

As a coach, Dickson has served as an assistant at Notre Dame, Oklahoma, Southern California and the College of the Pacific as well as some smaller colleges and junior colleges. He served under Frank Leahy at Notre Dame, where he coached Paul Hornung and Ralph Guglielmi. He served under Bud Wilkinson at Oklahoma and, at COP, he coached Dick Bass.

Dickson was an assistant coach with the Oakland Raiders of the American Football League in 1960 and 1961 and then was with the Denver Broncos as a defensive backfield coach in 1964 and 1965. He moved to the Atlanta Falcons as an offensive coach last year and became the Saints' first assistant coach just one day after Fears received his appointment as head coach.

Dickson is single.



WALT YOWARSKY Offensive Line Coach

Second-year man on the Saints' offensive coaching staff is Walt Yowarsky, an original member of the Minnesota Vikings' coaching staff who worked six years with the Vikings under Coach Norm Van Brocklin.

Yowarsky was an outstanding tackle for the University of Kentucky during his college days and was named the Most Valuable Player in the January, 1951, Sugar Bowl game when the Wildcats upset Oklahoma, 13-7, to end a 33-game Sooner win streak.

Walt was drafted as a second-round choice by the Redskins in 1951 and he played until early in the 1952 season, when he entered the Air Force for two years. He served in West Germany as an air base athletic officer and also coached the line for an Air Force eleven.

He rejoined the Redskins in 1954 and in 1955 he was traded to Detroit as part of a four-player deal. Midway in the 1955 campaign, New York acquired Yowarsky and he played with the Giants until mid-1958, when he went to San Francisco to conclude his playing career. Before starting his coaching stint at Minnesota, Yowarsky served the Giants two years as a scout and assistant coach.

A native of Cleveland, Yowarsky is 40. He and his wife, Bobbie, have two children, Michael 10, and Lisa 7.



BRAD ECKLUND
Interior Offensive Line Coach

The only addition to the Saints' coaching staff for 1968 is Brad Ecklund whom Fears charged with interior offensive line coaching duties this spring.

For the past two seasons, Ecklund served on the staff of the Atlanta Falcons as offensive line coach. He entered professional football coaching in 1960 with the Dallas Cowboys as both offensive and defensive line coach. In 1964 and '65, he served as an NFL scout for the Central Eastern Personnel Organization (CEPO).

Ecklund played his college football at the University of Oregon although his career was interrupted by four years' duty in the Marines. In 1949, he played with the New York Yankees of the All-America Conference. The team became the Dallas Texans and he spent one year there. His final year, 1953, was spent in Baltimore. Ecklund was an outstanding center and played in the original Pro Bowl game against the Cleveland Browns.

Following his playing days, he coached at the high school level in Oregon for four years, and then served as an assistant at the University of Oregon before joining the pro ranks.

In announcing the addition of Ecklund to his staff, Fears pointed out that Ecklund has great teaching abilities and patience, and would be an asset to the Saints particularly after having served on the staffs of both the Cowboys and Falcons in their first seasons in the NFL.

The 46-year-old Ecklund and his wife Ruth have three children.



BOB SHAW Receiver Coach

Receiver coach Bob Shaw, came to the Saints from the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian League, where he had been head coach the last two seasons.

Shaw, 44, is a former all-America football and basketball at Ohio State. A big man at 6-4 and 240 pounds, he played professional basketball for the Toledo Jeeps in the NBA but football was his game, as can be evidenced by an eight-year pro playing career and a 15-year coaching career.

Bob was a member of the Cleveland mams world championship team in 1945 and later was a member of the Rams' western division championship team in 1949 after the Ramshad moved to Los Angeles. A broken neck suffered late in the 1947 season kept him out of action in 1948.

Shaw's greatest day as a professional football player came in 1950 when, as a member of the Chicago Cardinals team, he caught five touchdown passes, an NFL record that still stands. He played at Calgary in 1951 and 1952 and at Toronto in 1953.

After coaching high school football in Ohio, Shaw saw service as a head coach at New Mexico Military Institute, as an assistant coach with both the San Francisco 49ers and the Baltimore Colts and as a head coach with the Saskatchewan Roughriders before joining the Toronto staff.

Shaw, a native of Richwood, Ohio, and his wife, Mary, have two children, Webb 16, and Amy 9.



JACK FAULKNER Chief Defensive Coach

Jack Faulkner is the man Tom Fears selected to mastermind the Saint's defense.

Faulkner is a former head coach and general manager of the Denver Broncos of the American Football League. Faulkner guided the Broncos to their best season ever with a 7-7 record in 1962 and was named AFL Coach of the Year in that season.

After leaving the Broncos, Faulkner served a year as defensive backfield coach with the Minnesota Vikings and then saw duty in the personnel and scouting department of the Los Angeles Rams in 1966.

Faulkner, a native of Youngstown, Ohio, and a graduate of Miami University of Oxford, Ohio, lettered in football, baseball and track at Miami and, at the same time, began a long association with Sid Gillman, presently head coach-general manager of the San Diego Chargers.

Faulkner started his coaching career under Gillman as an assistant at the University of Cincinnati in 1955. When Gillman joined the Los Angeles Rams as head coach in 1956, Faulkner went as an assistant.

Gillman took over as head coach of the Los Angeles Chargers in the AFL's first year in 1960 and Faulkner went too. When the Chargers moved to San Diego, Faulkner did, too, but his long association with Gillman ended in 1962 when Faulkner joined the Denver staff.

Jack and his wife, Betty, have two children, Cathy 16, and Jon 5.



ED KHAYAT Defensive Line Coach

Youngest member of the Saints' coaching staff is Ed Khayat, named to assist Jack Faulkner as the Saints' defensive line coach.

Khayat, 32, is in his second year as a coach after an illustrious playing career in college and two professional football leagues.

A native of Moss Point, Miss., Khayat attended Millsaps College in Jackson, Miss., for one season and then attended one year at Perkinston, Miss., Junior College. He then transferred to Tulane to complete his last two seasons of varsity football.

Khayat was signed by the Washington Redskins as a free agent in 1957 and then spent nine seasons in the National Football League more or less shuttling back and forth between the Redskins and the Philadelphia Eagles.

Ed played with the Redskins in 1957, 1962 and 1963 and saw service with the Eagles from 1958 through 1961 and again in 1964 and 1965. He completed his active playing career with the Boston Patriots in the American Football League. As a professional, Khayat played both defensive end and defensive tackle and is well qualified to help develop the fledgling Saints' defensive forces.

Ed was married in May, 1966, to the former Miss Deborah Dearing.



J. D. ROBERTS Linebacker Coach-Scout

J. D. Roberts, the Saints' linebacker coach, joined the Saints in the spring of 1967 as a personnel scout. During the first training camp, Roberts began tutoring the linebackers, and assumed those additional duties during the 1967 season. He also scouts the Saints' opponents during championship play.

Roberts, 35, was born in Oklahoma City, but raised in Dallas where he attended Jesuit High School. He entered the University of Oklahoma, and was a member of their national championship team in 1950. He was an all-American guard, on both offense and defense, in 1952 and 1953, under Coach Bud Wilkinson.

After playing with Hamilton in the Canadian League in 1954, Roberts served in the Marines two years. He played in 1955 with the Quantico, Va. service team, and served the team in 1956 as player-coach.

He began his coaching career at the University of Denver as line coach in 1957. The next year, he returned to Oklahoma as an assistant coach.

In 1960, Roberts served as defensive coach at the U.S. Naval Academy, and moved to Auburn as offensive line coach in 1961. The next year, he joined the staff at the University of Houston where he served from 1962 through 1964.

Prior to joining the Saints, Roberts spent 1965 and 1966 scouting for the New York Jets.

Roberts and his wife June have five children.



WARREN ARIAIL Trainer

Warren Ariail assumed duties as the Saints trainer early in 1968 after many years of experience in college athletics. Ariail had been head trainer at Indiana since 1961.

The native of Eutawville, S.C., is a graduate of Wofford College and a veteran of four years' service with the Marine Corps in World War II. He has served as head athletic trainer at Wofford, Wake Forest College and lowa State University in addition to the University of Indiana. He also worked with the U. S. Olympic wrestling team in 1960 during that team's training period in this country.

Ariail and his wife Sue have three children, and are now making their home in New Orleans.



CHARLIE SHEPHERD Equipment Manager

The Saints' Equipment Manager is 30-year-old Charlie Shepherd, a native of Atlanta, Ga. Shepherd served as the Atlanta Falcon's assistant equipment man during 1966. Before his assignment with Atlanta, he was in the sporting goods business.

Charlie and his wife Mary Ann are the parents of Amanda Regina, 2.

HENRY LEE PARKER, Chief Scout



When former Director of Player Personnel Vic Schwenk assumed the role of Saints' General Manager, he elevated Henry Lee Parker to Chief Scout for the Saints. Parker had served under

Schwenk in that department since March, 1967.

Parker is a native of Holly Springs, Miss. He played college football at Mississippi State, and upon his graduation in 1948, spent one year coaching at Corinth (Miss.) High School, and seven years at Natchez High School.

He joined the coaching staff at Mississippi State in 1956, and remained there as an assistant for eleven years.

Parker directs the Saints' scouting force, and covers colleges in the South-eastern part of the country. Serving under Parker are three full-time scouts, Ray Newman, Dave Smith and Al Tabor, as well as three additional area scouts assigned by Quadra, a scouting combine shared by Dallas, Los Angeles, San Francisco, and New Orleans.

SAINTS FROM THE EXPANSION DRAFT, 1967

To assure the New Orleans Saints a nucleus of veteran players, the National Football League conducted an expansion draft on February 9-10, 1967. With the exception of Atlanta, which was exempted from the expansion draft because it was only in its second year of operation, each of the NFL clubs was allowed to freeze 29 players, thus leaving 11 players from their active 40-man roster to be selected by the Saints. The Saints selected one man from each team and then each club was allowed to freeze two more players. From the remaining list of unfrozen players, the Saints selected two more from each club, thus making a total of 42 veteran players selected in all. THE NEW ORLEANS SAINTS STORY, CHAPTER I

The City of New Orleans celebrates its 250th year of existence in 1968. During those 250 years, the city has seen times of trial, times of triumph, days of struggle, days of glory; she's experienced building, destruction, re-building, more construction—caused by war, natural disaster, neglect . . . all these. It's been a colorful hisory, full of highlights and turning points, ups and downs just as any great city. Many of its years have been marked with significance . . . but 1967 will certainly be remembered in a special way. For 1967 saw the coming of the Saints . . . that is, The NFL New Orleans Saints.

The phenomenon of the Saints has been examined many times and no satisfactory explanation has yet been advanced. Suffice it to say, the Saints seemed to be a rallying vehicle for all of New Orleans, for all of the Gulf Coast region!

New Orleans is perhaps best known for the historic Vieux Carre or French Quarter, and for the madness that is Mardi Gras—Carnival for all it's citizens and millions of visitors. Now, New Orleans is also identified with the Saints . . . their football team.

Louisiana has long been a fertile territory for football at all levels . . . city and parish recreation department, high school, college. Some who had long sought a franchise in professional football for Louisiana thought the interest would spread to include this advanced level of gridiron competition. Few, if any, envisiond the impact that the Saints would have. Least of all, the New Orleans Saints themselves!

"Saints Fever" began its reign along about mid-summer when the first team representatives began training for their first NFL season. True, the interest had been apparent since the franchise was awarded to the city back on — take note — 'All Saints Day' (Nov. 1), 1966. The city being determined, the next step was naming the owner. This was accomplished in late December, 1966, when John W. Mecom, Jr. was named the principal owner for the NFL's newest. There followed, in quick succession, the actual dubbing of the team the "Saints"—there had been little doubt of the team's nametag from the outset — the hiring and building of the organization, the drafting of veteran players and collegiate aspirants, and finally, the first day of ticket sales. Louisianians responded with a record-shattering 20,000 sales the very first day of the public sale in early March. The season ticket sales figures climbed steadily for the next few months, finally closing at 33,400 before the Saints had thrown the first pass on home soil.

By the time that first pass was thrown, the Saints had completed their first training camp in San Diego and for the first time, had set foot in New Orleans as a team. That team, facing their sixth pre-season foe with the astonishing record of having won four of their first five contests, found an adoring city at their feet as they faced their final pre-season (Continued)

opponent, the Atlanta Falcons. It was a battle, but the Saints won that final pre-season game, too, by upsetting the young Atlanta Falcons, 27-14, before 67,486 wildly ecstatic fans at Tulane Stadium.

For their debut in New Orleans, the Saints' formally introduced New Orleanians to "Mardi Gras in Autumn." There were football fireworks for 60 minutes, and before and during the game, spectators were entertained with traditional jazz bands, fireworks displays specially designed for the occasion, flambeaux carriers, the appearance of "The King" himself . . . none other than part-owner and chief cheerleader, Al Hirt . . . in addition to the traditional ingredients of a football game — cheerleaders, precision marching routines and music by both high school and professional musicians. When the evening was over, it was a triumph for all.

The next week, Sunday, Sept. 17, the New Orleans Saints hosted the Los Angeles Rams in their first-ever (for keeps) NFL game. And unbelievably, the Saints took the game's opening kickoff and raced 94 yards for a touchdown The crowd noise was deafening!

The Saints lost the game—and were to lose for the next seven Sundays but they never lost their adoring fans. As a matter of fact, the scores of the games were seldom discussed. None would concede that winning was not important; rather, it was always "next week we'll get 'em." And finally, that day came . . . on Sunday, Nov. 5 in Tulane Stadium the Philadelphia Eagles bowed to the Saints, 31-24. Ironically, the smallest New Orleans crowd of the year was on hand for the historic moment, but their lusty cheers more than filled the cavern that is Tulane Stadium.

In the waning weeks of the '67 season, New Orleans won one more game on home grounds ... in their final home game, and again, the Falcons were victimized by their younger brothers. After that final home appearance, the 1967 Saints, team and coaches, remained on the field for a unique closing ceremony . . . and a sellout crowd of 83,437 stayed with them to cheer and relive the poignant moments of the Saints' first year. It was almost anti-climatic, but New Orleans had three games remaining before graduating to sophomore status.

And it was not for three more weeks, at their final game of the year, that they found the winning formula again. In D. C. Stadium on Dec. 17, the Saints convincingly defeated the Washington Redskins, 30-14, to close a most memorable year.

Their five of six pre-season victories set a record . . . many records, in fact. Their three win, eleven loss regular season record tied the modern-day NFL record for expansion teams. They would have liked to have set a record here too — but records will wait. They will come.

What the Saints did in 1967 was focus the attention of the sports world on a great Southern city . . . and New Orleans gave the Saints the happiest home any pro football team could wish.

It truly is a love affair in full-bloom.

And, Saints' fever rages on . . . we hope it never breaks.

SAINTS ENTERTAINMENT FEATURES

"Mardi Gras in Autumn" will once more be in evidence during the nine Saints home dates in Tulane Stadium. Entertainment Director Tommy Walker returns to New Orleans to continue the pre-game and halftime extravaganzas which thrilled the fans during the historic 1967 first season.

And, of course, Al Hirt — a part-owner of the Saints and their "biggest" cheerleader — and his band will be back for the majority of the home games.

Several outstanding high school and college musical and drill units will be special guest performers during the season. The popular Grambling (La.) College Band will return for the 1968 finale on December 15. The Saints-Vikings game on October 13 will be the date for the second "Salute to the Navy" Day, bringing famed Navy and Marine performing units to New Orleans.

THE SAINTS' DANCERS, a 48-girl unit, made their debut during 1967—and will be on the field for each 1968 game. Directed by Mrs. Phyllis Nelson, the volunteer unit has been rehearsing through the year. In July, Hollywood choreographer Tommy Mahoney held a week-long "training camp" for the girls, and their 1968 performances will indeed benefit.

THE SAINTS' CHEERLEADERS, fourteen area high school and college students, will again direct the end-zone cheering sections. Like the dancers, these young people — chosen by tryout in 1967 — are volunteers.

THE SAINTS' MASCOT, GUMBO, has grown from the pup of '67 to nearly 140 pounds of registered St. Bernard. Gumbo, given to the Saints and cared for by the Louisiana Restaurant Association, has been in training, too — and should be more acclimated to the excitement surrounding the Saints' home games in '68.

These, and other surprises — a Tommy Walker certainty — will make up the 1968 entertainment agenda.

WORKING PRESS INFORMATION

Working press credentials will be issued on a single-game basis, except in obvious cases where a season-long coverage is assured. Press box credentials will also serve to admit you to the dressing rooms after the games once the prescribed "cooling off" period established by the coaches has elapsed.

Complimentary tickets for non-working press are very limited, but will be distributed by the Public Relations Department.

Photographers

Photographers will be issued special sideline passes. Except in unusual circumstances, caption writers will not be permitted on the field. Credentials will be issued to daily newspapers, wire services and television stations; special assignment or free-lance photographers will be closely screened. All photographers must stay behind the restraining lines and will not be permitted to shoot pictures in front of the bench of either team.

Press Box Services

The Saints' statistical crew will supply the following information during each home game: play-by-play after each quarter, halftime, team and individual significant statistics, final team and individual statistics, scoring summary and participation listing, ball possession charts for both teams and defensive statistics.

Spotters for radio and television will be furnished on request. Each radio and television station using spotters will be responsibile for paying that spotter a reasonable fee for his services.

Food and refreshments will be served in the press box before each game and at halftime.

Access to the press box, located on the West side of the Stadium, is through the special press gate on the Willow Street side. Press credentials will be checked at this gate, as well as at the elevator to both levels of the press box.

THE SAINTS ON TELEVISION, 1968

For the '68 pre-season schedule, WWL-TV in New Orleans will telecast live all road games. The Saints' two home games will be video-taped for re-play the Sundays following. This pre-season TV schedule will be carried only by WWL-TV and not by the stations on the Saints' regular season TV network.

The Saints will appear before the cameras of the Columbia Broadcasting System in every one of their 14 regular-season games in 1968. Road games will be telecast on nine stations of the Saints' home-area network, including WWL-TV in New Orleans. Home games will be telecast by stations outside a 75-mile radius around New Orleans and to the home network area of the visiting team.


