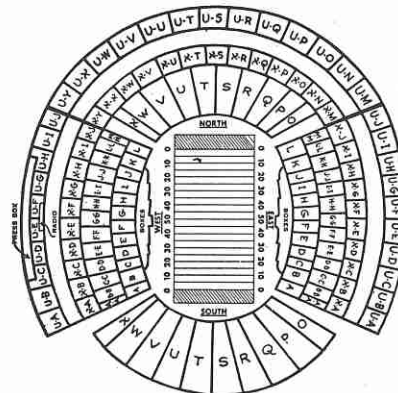

JOHN W. MECOM, JR., President

The 31-year old John W. Mecom, Jr. is pro football's youngest owner and certainly one of the most vital men associated with professional sports.

It is John's announced goal to bring a title contending team to the New Orleans area, and he has built an organization to see that challenge become reality. He takes an active role in all club activities, and is the team's most rabid fan during game action.

Last fall, Mecom underwent major surgery, and thus missed his first Saints game — three of them in fact, as the team played on successive weeks in Philadelphia, St. Louis and Dallas — but there's little chance that he'll miss any more unless he's once again under strict medical orders.

The Mecom family business interests include oil, hotels, plastics and ranches. Mecom, Jr. works with his father as his assistant and co-owner. In addition, John serves on the Board of Regents of Loyola University and is a member of the board of directors for Louisiana and Southern Life Insurance Company.

He attended the University of Oklahoma and the University of Texas and is a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. During his undergraduate days at Oklahoma, John met his wife, the former Katsy Mullendore of Pawhuska, Okla. They were married in 1962, and have three children, John III, 6, Katsy Kathleen, 3½, and Mary Elizabeth, 2½. The family maintains a residence in Houston, but spends a great deal of time in New Orleans.

Outside of football, John's favorite sport is boat racing. He owns two power boats, the Saint and the Sinner. For a time, he owned race cars and owned the 1966 Indianapolis 500 winner driven by Graham Hill.

But that event would not be the high point of that year for the Mecoms — because it was late in December of 1966 when the National Football League named them the principal owners of the newly-based franchise in New Orleans. And **that** was the beginning of the Saints.



VICTOR E. SCHWENK, General Manager

Victor E. Schwenk is the first employee of the New Orleans Saints, and is in his third year as the team's administrative head. Schwenk was hired by John Mecom, Jr. in December, 1966 as the Saints' Director of Player Personnel, and in that capacity saw the youngest NFL team through its original veteran allocation selections as well as its first two college drafts.

Schwenk became General Manager of the Saints in the spring of 1968 and continues to direct the multitudinous duties of the administrative side of professional football.

His association with the National Football League began in 1954 when he joined the Los Angeles Rams as a part-time personnel scout. Schwenk later served the Rams as Director of Player Personnel (1963), and offensive coach (1964). In 1966, he became general manager for the Edmonton Eskimos, but because of illness in his family, he returned to Los Angeles and served as a special game scout under Coach George Allen of the Rams for the 1966 season. Mecom's bid on behalf of the Saints followed.

Schwenk began his football career at UCLA, and later transferred to Occidental College. Following his college days, he spent 10 years as head coach on the high school level in California. From 1960 through 1963, he served as head coach of Occidental where he compiled a 23-12 record and won two conference titles.

Vic and his wife Arlene have three daughters and make their home in Metairie.



TOM FEARS
HEAD COACH

If 1970 continues to bring Tom Fears good fortune in the form of a winning season for the New Orleans Saints, the year will have been one of phenomenal success.

It began on a high note in January when Fears was picked to coach the Eastern Conference squad in the NFL's Pro Bowl game. Just a few weeks later, Fears learned of his election to Pro Football's Hall of Fame. His induction occurs in Canton, Ohio (site of the Hall of Fame) on August 8 when the Saints face the NFL champion Minnesota Vikings in a pre-season game.

In each of his three seasons as head coach of the Saints, the team has bettered by one their won-loss record and continues to set the pace for expansion teams. The '67 Saints were 3-10; in '68, 4-9-1; and posted a 5-9 report in 1969. That adds up to a three-year total of 12 victories, 29 losses and one tie.

Setting records is nothing new for Fears. He became the first and only player ever to lead the NFL in receiving in his rookie season with the Los Angeles Rams (1948), and he continued to lead all receivers for the next two seasons. Fears caught 51 passes as a rookie, then broke Don Hutson's then-standing record with 77 catches in 1949. The next year, he broke his own record with 84 receptions. Fears continued playing with the Rams through the 1956 season.

Before joining the Rams, Fears spent two years at Santa Clara (1941-42), three years in the U.S. Air Force during World War II, and two years at UCLA in 1946 and 1947. While participating in the Air Force's pilot training program, he captained the famed Second Air Force's Super-bomber eleven in 1944 and 1945.

He began his coaching career in 1959 under Vince Lombardi at Green Bay. Fears rejoined the Rams as an assistant coach for the 1960 and 1961 seasons, and then returned to Lombardi and the Packers in 1962 where he remained through the 1965 season. Fears became the Atlanta Falcons' chief offensive coach for their initial season in 1966,

and his opportunity to guide a team of his own came in early 1967 when he secured the head post with the New Orleans Saints.

In April, 1970, Fears was made responsible for the Saints player personnel department by the team's owners. He named his former chief defensive aide Jack Faulkner to direct the scouting operation which is now headquartered with the coaching staff at the team's facilities in Metairie, La.

The coaching staff has been reorganized with Ed Biles now assigned to defensive duties while linebacker coach Jerry Smith has been named defensive coordinator. The other Saints assistant coaches continue their '69 assignments.

Fears is a native of Los Angeles where he was born December 3, 1923. He and his wife LuElla have six children—Kathleen 17, Patrick 16, Katie 15, Danny 14, Jono 12 and JoJo 9.

THE COACHING STAFF

BRAD ECKLUND, Offensive Line

One of the vastly improved facets of the New Orleans Saints must be the offensive line, and the man behind those men up front is Brad Ecklund who is in his third year with the Saints.

Ecklund's vast experience in the pro coaching ranks began with his duties with the Dallas Cowboys from 1960 to 1963. The next two years he served as an NFL scout, and then joined the Atlanta Falcons for the 1966 and '67 seasons.

He played his college ball at the University of Oregon (1940, and '46-'48), and then turned to pro ball, first with the New York Yankees (1949-51). He remained with the All-America Conference team when it became the Dallas Texans in 1952, and played his final year of pro ball in '53 when the team moved to Baltimore. He was an outstanding center and played in the original Pro Bowl game against the Cleveland Browns.

Following his playing days, he coached at the high school level in Oregon for four years, then served as an assistant at the University of Oregon.

Born May 9, 1922 at Los Angeles, Calif., Ecklund and his wife Ruth are parents of Sterling 23; daughter Daryl Lynne 19, and Brant 17.

DON HEINRICH, Offensive Backfield

Heinrich is in his second year with the Saints, carefully selected by Tom Fears to guide the offensive backs.

Don was an All-American at the University of Washington where he was the nation's leading passer in 1950 and 1953. He quarterbacked

the New York Giants (1954-59), the Dallas Cowboys (1960) and the Oakland Raiders (1962), and in-between and since as an assistant coach. He was a player-coach with the '60 Cowboys, then coached for the Giants in 1961. Heinrich was involved in four NFL championship games with the Giants — '56, '58 and '59 as a player, and again in 1961 as a coach. His next post was with the 1964 Los Angeles Rams, and then he scouted for the just-forming Atlanta Falcons in 1965. A three-year stint ('66-67-68) with the Pittsburgh Steelers preceded his joining the Saints staff.

Heinrich, born in Chicago on Sept. 19, 1930, and his wife Barbara have three sons and one daughter — Lauri 15, Kyle 13, Mike 11 and Kurt 8.

BILLY RAY BARNES, Receivers

Receiver coach Billy Ray Barnes joined the Saints' staff in 1969 after serving as head coach of the Charleston (W. Va.) team of the Continental Football League. His 1968 team posted an 8-3 record.

Barnes, born May 14, 1935 at Landis, N. C., graduated from Wake Forest in 1956. He joined the Philadelphia Eagles as a running back in 1957, and appeared in three Pro Bowl games as well as the 1960 championship game. Barnes joined the Washington Redskins in 1962 and led them in rushing that year. He played the '63 season with Washington, then played for the Minnesota Vikings in 1964 and 1965.

Billy and his wife Janice have twin daughters — Billi Raquel and Lani Michelle, born Nov. 9, 1968.

JERRY SMITH, Defensive Coordinator

Smith joined the Saints staff in 1969 as linebacker coach, and will continue as their mentor as well as assuming additional duties on Fears' 1970 staff.

He was born Sept. 9, 1930 at Dayton, Ohio, and played his college ball at Wisconsin from 1948 through 1951. He was named an All-Big Ten tackle in '51, and played in the East-West Shrine game. Smith was drafted and signed by the San Francisco 49ers and played two seasons before entering military service. In 1956, he joined the Green Bay Packers as a defensive end. For the next two years, he worked for a brokerage firm, and then returned to football in 1959 as a line coach at Dayton.

Jerry broke into professional football coaching in 1960 with the Boston Patriots as defensive line and linebacker coach. He moved to the Buffalo Bills as offensive line coach in 1962, and the Bills won the AFL championship in '64 and '65 and finished first in the Eastern Division in 1966. He remained in Buffalo through the '68 season, and then joined the Saints.

Jerry and his wife Shirley have four children, Diane 9, Jeffrey 8, Brian 7, and Meghan 5.

ED KHAYAT, Defensive Line

Ed Khayat is the only "original" among the Saints assistants having coached the defensive line since the team's formation in 1967.

Ed, born Sept. 14, 1935, is from Moss Point, Miss., and attended Millsaps College (Jackson, Miss.) and Perkinson (Miss.) Junior College. He then transferred to Tulane to complete his last two years of college football.

He was signed by the Washington Redskins as a free agent in 1957, and thus began a nine-year playing career in the National Football League. Ed played with the Redskins in 1957, 1962 and 1963 and with the Philadelphia Eagles from 1958 through 1961 and again in 1964 and '65. He completed his playing career with the Boston Patriots in 1966. As a professional, he played both defensive end and defensive tackle.

Ed and his wife Deborah have one son, Ed., Jr., born Nov. 2, 1968.

ED BILES, Defensive Backs

Ed Biles, in his second year with the Saints, has been reassigned to defensive backfield duties. He formerly had served as Fears' administrative coordinator.

Biles served Xavier of Ohio from 1956 to 1961 as an assistant coach, and was elevated to head coach at Xavier in 1962. During his seven years at the Cincinnati school, Biles compiled a 39-28-2 record and after his 1965 team posted an 8-2 record, was named Catholic College Coach of the Year. He coached wide receiver Dan Abramowicz, and guard John Shinnars as collegiates.

A graduate of Miami of Ohio, Biles began his coaching career at Woodward High School in Cincinnati in 1953. He was born Oct. 18, 1931 at Glendale Ohio.

Biles and his wife Jackie have three sons, Mike 17, Jim 16 and Jay 8, and daughter Sherrie, 12.

WARREN ARIAIL, Trainer

Ariail is a three-year man with the Saints, charged with keeping the team in the best possible condition. Before coming to New Orleans in the spring of 1968, he had been head trainer at Indiana since 1961.

The son of a retired Methodist minister, Warren was born in Eutawville, S. C. He graduated from Wofford College and completed his studies at the School of Eastern Physical Therapy in New York City. He is an overseas veteran of four years with the U. S. Marines during World War II.

Warren has served as head athletic trainer at Wofford, Wake Forest and Iowa State in addition to Indiana. He worked with the U. S. Olympic wrestling team in 1960 during that team's training period in this country. He was the trainer for the East squad in the 1970 Pro Bowl game.

A member of the National Athletic Trainers Association, he has served as their executive exhibits chairman for 11 years and has also been on the board of directors and program chairman for that organization.

Warren and his wife, Sue, are the parents of two daughters and a son.

Assisting Ariail in the Saints' training room is Dean Kleinschmidt. Dean graduated this year from Indiana, and was Warren's assistant during his student days.

CHUCK ZIOBER, Equipment Manager

The most recent addition to Fears' staff is Chuck Ziober, picked this spring to become the Saints' equipment manager.

No stranger to the task, the 49-year-old Ziober served as the equipment manager for the Denver Broncos in 1964 and '65. He spent 1966 and '67 with the Miami Dolphins, and since then has been a salesman for a sporting goods company—mixing in a tour of duty with the San Diego Toros professional soccer team in 1968. With that organization, he served as equipment manager, assistant general manager and trainer.

After attending high school in Irvington, N. J., Ziober played baseball for Newark, an AAA team in the New York Yankees chain, for two years, then served 23 years with the Marines.

Ziober and his wife Peggy had been living in Dover, N. J.

JACK FAULKNER, Director of Player Personnel

After serving three years as the Saints chief defensive coach, Jack Faulkner was elevated this spring to his current position by Coach Tom Fears.

Faulkner is a native of Youngstown, Ohio and a graduate of Miami of Ohio where he lettered in football, baseball and track. At Miami, he began a long association with Sid Gillman, now the general manager of the San Diego Chargers.

He joined Gillman's staff at the University of Cincinnati in 1949, and remained with him when Gillman became head coach of the Los Angeles Rams in 1956. In 1960, Gillman took over the then Los Angeles Chargers and Faulkner went along. In 1962, Faulkner was named head coach and general manager of the Denver Broncos and guided them to their best season ever (7-7) that year and was named AFL Coach of the Year.

After leaving the Broncos, he served a year as defensive backfield coach of the Minnesota Vikings (1965), and then saw duty in the personnel and scouting departments of the Los Angeles Rams in 1966.

The Faulkners (wife, Betty) have two children, Cathy 18, and Jon 7.

Faulkner's personnel staff includes chief scout Henry Lee Parker, and personnel scouts Joe Blaylock, Ray Jenkins, Ray Newman, Charlie Shepherd and Bob Whitman.

HENRY LEE PARKER, Chief Scout

Henry Lee Parker has been affiliated with the Saints' scouting department since the team's beginning in 1967. He served the first year under Vic Schwenk, and was elevated to chief scout when Schwenk was named general manager in 1968. He directed the Player Personnel department in 1968 and 1969, and remains with the staff under the new organization of the scouting department.

Parker is a native of Holly Springs, Miss. and played college football at Mississippi State. Upon graduation in 1948, he spent one year coaching at Corinth (Miss.) High School and seven years at Natchez High School. He joined the coaching staff at Mississippi State in 1956 and remained there for 11 years.

He and his wife Martha Ann have two daughters, Susan 18 and Kathy 11.

SAINTS 1970 TRAINING CAMP

The New Orleans Saints will train at Bowling Green University, Bowling Green, Ohio. Rookies and selected veterans report July 15, with the balance of the veteran players checking in July 18. The Saints will remain at Bowling Green until Aug. 28, after which they return to their New Orleans facilities.

HARRY HULMES,

Assistant General Manager and Director of Public Relations

Harry Hulmes, veteran pro football executive, serves as assistant to the general manager and director of public relations for the New Orleans Saints.

Hulmes began his career with the Baltimore Colts in 1958 when he was appointed business manager of the NFL organization. In 1961 he was appointed publicity director and in 1967 he was elevated to the post of general manager after the death of Joseph Campanella. Hulmes retained this position during the Colts' 1968 NFL Championship and their participation in the 1969 Super Bowl. In January of 1970 he was made assistant general manager, a position he held at the time of his appointment by the New Orleans Saints.

Prior to joining the Colts, Hulmes was athletic publicity director for Bucknell University and was assistant business manager for the Baltimore Orioles baseball organization. A native of Philadelphia, he was graduated from the University of Pennsylvania and is a three-year veteran of the United States Navy.

Harry and his wife Barbara have three children, Linda 15, Terry 11 and Richie 7.

EDDIE J. JONES, Business Manager

Eddie Jones became business manager of the Saints in January, 1968 after working closely with the club as a member of a New Orleans accounting firm.

Jones, 32, is a native Texan, but moved to Denham Springs, La. in 1951 and was graduated from high school there in 1956. He served in the USAF from 1956 to 1960, then enrolled at LSU (Baton Rouge) and received an accounting degree in 1963. He became a C.P.A. in 1965.

Eddie and his wife, Marilyn, have one daughter, Wendy, and live in Metairie.

HENRY SIMONEAUX, Ticket Manager

A native New Orleanian, Simoneaux has directed the Saints ticket operation since the team's formation in January, 1967.

Henry, 38, graduated from Behrman High School in 1950 and immediately became assistant to the ticket manager at Tulane. He served in the Army from 1952 to 1954, then returned to Tulane as ticket manager. In 1956, he became a draftsman at an oil company, but returned to Tulane in 1961 as ticket manager and assistant athletic business manager.

Mrs. Simoneaux is the former Earline Ory, and they have one son, Henry III, age 10.

ERBY AUCOIN, Director of Photography

Aucoin joined the Saints in the summer of 1968 to establish the team's photographic operation, and has built it into a set-up unique in professional football. He personally shoots all of the team's coaching footage, and then processes, edits and distributes the film. Erby also does the majority of the still photography, including processing and printing, and directs a sizeable staff of professional photographers on game coverage.

One of his men, Bob Dennie, won 1970's Hall of Fame photo contest in the color action category, and another, Chris Harris, was feted by the New Orleans Art Directors Club for color action photography.

Erby is a former newspaper and television photographer, and is himself a winner of more than 40 photo awards.

He is a 1957 graduate of LSU, and a native of Napoleonville, La. He and his wife Rosalie have eight children.

JIM TAYLOR, *Administrative Assistant*

Jimmy Taylor, one of pro football's great running backs, has continued his association with the Saints following his retirement from playing in 1968. He has done scouting for the club, and this year will serve as the team's advance publicity man on road trips.

Taylor was Green Bay's second draft choice in 1958 after playing two seasons with LSU and leading the SEC in scoring both seasons. As a Packer, he established the record for most consecutive seasons with 1000 or more yards rushing with five, 1960 through 1964, and was AP's Player of the Year in 1962 when he scored 19 TD's. He holds many additional Green Bay and NFL records.

After playing out his option in 1967, he signed with the Saints and was their leading rusher during that first season.

Jim and Dixie Taylor make their home in Metairie, and have two children, Jo Beth 12, and Chip 7.

TOMMY WALKER, *Entertainment Director*

Impressario of the Saints' famed pre-game and halftime shows is Tommy Walker who began his association with the Saints in Aug. 1967.

For 12 years, Walker was director of entertainment and customer relations at Disneyland. He now has his own firm, Tommy Walker Productions, in Anaheim, Calif. from which he directs several pageants and a variety of special assignments each year.

Early this year, Tommy directed the pageantry of the Super Bowl game, and also staged the first Sugar Bowl parade.

During his college days at U.S.C. (class of 1948), Walker doubled as Drum Major of the Trojan Band and placekicker on the varsity football team, and it was here that he wrote the popular "Charge" song and won fame as "Tommy Trojan".

After service, Tommy resumed his association with U.S.C. and became Director of the Trojan Football Band, culminating his career with the 1955 Rose Bowl Game.

Walker and his wife Marge live in Anaheim and have three daughters.

PATRICIA L. CROSS, *Public Relations—Publications*

Pat joined the Saints in May, 1967 as public relations assistant, and has since been charged with the Saints' publications responsibilities. She has worked for the past eight years in pro football public relations.

In 1962, Pat joined the staff of the AFL Dallas Texans, and moved with the team to Kansas City in 1963. In 1966, she resigned to accept a similar post with the Houston Oilers, and then came the move to New Orleans and the Saints.

She is a native Missourian, and a journalism graduate of the University of Missouri.
