JOHN W. MECOM, JR., President



Building an organization to insure his announced goal to bring a title contending team to the New Orleans area, John W. Mecom, Jr., continues as one of the most vital men associated with professional sports.

At 35 still pro football's youngest owner, Mecom assumes an active role in club activities and has become a task-master at dividing his time among his many business interests which include oil and sulphur, hotels, plastics and ranches. Although the Mecom interests are headquartered in Houston, Texas — his native state — John maintains an apartment atop the Saints' headquarters on Lee Circle in New Orleans, the building which also houses the Mecom oil interests in Louisiana.

In addition to his many business interests, Mecom is also involved in as many local and civic projects as time will permit, including serving on the Board of Regents of Loyola University. He's been an avid fan of both boat and automobile racing for many years and owned the 1966 Indianapolis 500 winner driven by Graham Hill.

But there's no doubt that his major interest is the Saints and not even that 1966 Indy victory overshadowed what happened in December of that year — the granting of the franchise to the Mecoms, thus beginning the quest for the ultimate in professional football, the National Football League championship.

Into his ninth year as President of the New Orleans Saints, Mecom noted the progress made in 1974 when the team equalled its best record of 5-9 and gave head coach John North the goahead to add a Special Teams coach (Billy Ray Barnes) to the Saints' coaching staff. He then agreed with North and Executive Vice-President Richard F. Gordon, Jr., to move training camp to Thibodaux in an effort to find a campsite closer to the New Orleans' environment which would offer a closer proximity for

players and staff to their families and at the same time afford the Saints' fans a greater opportunity to watch the Saints in training.

Mecom attended the University of Oklahoma and the University of Texas and is a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon.

While attending the University of Oklahoma, John met Katsy Mullendore of Pawhuska, Okla., and married her in 1962. They have four children: John III, 11; Katsy Kathleen, 8½; Mary Elizabeth, 7½; and Kathleen, 4½.

All of the Mecom family are very much a part of the Saints' scene every Sunday the club is at home in the fall.

RICHARD F. GORDON, JR., Executive Vice-President

A former astronaut, Richard F. Gordon, Jr., turned to pro football management in January of 1972 at the request of Saints' owner John W. Mecom, Jr., and has become a respected voice among National Football League executives.

In overseeing the entire Saints organization, Gordon has stressed maximum cooperation from all Saints employees, resulting in a more efficient football operation.

Among his duties are the signing of some player contracts and supervising front office management. Furthermore, it was Gordon who carried the ball for the club in the negotiations with the Louisiana Superdome Commission.

A 45-year-old native of Seattle, Washington, Gordon received his Bachelor of Science degree in Chemistry from the University of Washington in 1951 and received his wings as a naval aviator in 1953.

Active in many civic and charitable organizations in New Orleans, Gordon has served as Chairman and Co-Chairman of the Louisiana Heart Fund, Chairman of the March of Dimes (Mother's March), Honorary Chairman for Muscular Distrophy and has also been on the Board of Directors for the Boy Scouts of America and Boy's Club of Greater New Orleans.

With the National Aeronautic Space Administration (NASA) the last eight years of his military career, Gordon logged a total of 315 hours and 53 minutes in space. His first space venture was the 3-day Gemini 11 mission on Sept. 12, 1966, in which he and command pilot Charles Conrad set a new altitude record of 850 miles. It was during this flight that he performed two periods of extra-vehicular activity.

After serving as a backup command module pilot for Apollo

IX, Gordon occupied the command module pilot seat on Apollo XII in November of 1969. The 10-day flight of Apollo XII was man's second lunar landing and demonstrated the first precision lunar landing. Prior to retirement from NASA, Gordon was the back-up crew commander for Apollo XV and the department head for advanced projects in the Astronaut office.

Among the many awards and citations Gordon received during his military career are the NASA's Distinguished Service Medal, Exceptional Service Medal, two Navy Distinguished Flying Crosses, the Navy Distinguished Service Medal and numerous awards from countries throughout the world. He achieved the rank of Captain in the U. S. Navy prior to retirement.

Married to the former Barbara J. Field of Seattle, Wash., Gordon has six children: Carleen, 21; Richard, 19; Lawrence, 17; Thomas, 16; James, 15 and Dianne, 14. They live in Metairie, La.

HARRY HULMES, Vice President-Administration

This will be Harry's eighteenth year in the National Football League and his sixth with the Saints. He'd come to New Orleans in February, 1970 as the assistant to the general manager and director of public relations. In January, 1972 he was named vice president of administration, a capacity in which he gets involved in a wide variety of duties, including the signing of veteran and rookie players and the handling of public relations functions.

During the twelve years prior to his joining the Saints, the 48-year-old Hulmes served the Baltimore Colts in just about every possible off-the-field capacity, commencing in 1958, when the Colts won their first of two successive world championships. A graduate of the University of Pennsylvania, where he majored in journalism, he got started in sports as the assistant business manager of the Baltimore Orioles in 1954. Two years later he

took over as sports information director at Bucknell University, after which it was back to Baltimore and the Colts. From Philadelphia, Pa., he served three years with the U. S. Navy before entering Penn.

Harry and his wife, Barbara, and three children, Linda, 20; Terry, 16; and Richie, 12, live in Metairie, La.

JOHN NORTH, The Head Coach

Moving into his third season as the Saints' third head coach in history, John North has continued to surround himself with "my kind of players and coaches."

His "type of players and coaches" are those type of people who like to win.

North's attitude towards winning has never faltered, from his playing days at Vanderbilt and Baltimore through his coaching career. And, perhaps, it was his winning attitude which led Saints' owner John W. Mecom, Jr., to select North as the team's head coach in 1973.

Two consecutive 5-9 seasons do not reflect the progress the Saints have made under North's direction. Experts generally agree that North has, through keen evaluation of his draft choices, trades and free agent acquisitions, brought in the best talent the Saints have ever had.

A native of Gilliam, La., the 53-year-old North graduated from Vanderbilt, where he played end in 1942 and, after serving in World War II with the Marines, 1946-47. Drafted by the Baltimore Colts, he played in the National Football League for three seasons.

North entered the coaching profession in 1951 at Tallassee, Ala., then moved into the college ranks in 1953 as assistant coach at Tennessee Tech. In 1956, he joined Blanton Collier's staff at Kentucky, which included such NFL notables as Don Shula (now head coach at Miami), Bill Arnsparger (now head coach of the New York Giants), Howard Schnellenberger (now offensive coordinator at Miami), Ermal Allen (now a Special Assistant to Tom Landry with the Dallas Cowboys) and Bob Cummings (now defensive line coach with the Saints).

In 1962, North became an assistant coach at Louisiana State University, working with the offensive line and pass receivers before moving into the pros in 1965 when he was named offensive backfield coach of the Detroit Lions. He came to New Orleans as offensive coordinator and coach of wide receivers in 1973,

being named Saints head coach after four pre-season games of that year.

North and his wife, Blondell, have two children — Martha Ann and John P. III — and live in Metairie, La.

THE COACHING STAFF

BOB CUMMINGS, Defensive Line Coach

Team defensive records have been shaken unmercifully since Bob Cummings assumed his coaching duties just prior to the 1973 season.

His defensive line sacked enemy aerialists 37 times in 1974, aiding the Saint defensive unit in holding the opponents to only 263 points, a new team low for the second straight year.

A teammate of head coach John North at Vanderbilt, where he graduated in 1946, Cummings began his coaching career at Isaac Litton High School in Nashville, Tenn., (1946-53), then moved into the college ranks at Vanderbilt (1954-57) and Georgia Teach (1958-59).

He and North were reunited on the Kentucky staff (1959-62) before Cummings moved to Vanderbilt again (1962-65) and Miami (1965). From 1966-72, Cummings was head coach at Hendersonville (Tenn.) High School.

A native of Portland, Tenn., Cummings, 53, and his wife (Sarah) live in Metairie, La. They have five children — Robert, Jr., of Nashville, Tenn., Joe, now serving in the U. S. Navy at New London, Conn., William of Mt. Juliet, Tenn., Mrs. Scott Wilson of Metairie, La., and Peter, of Nashville, Tenn.

BUD WHITEHEAD, Defensive Backfield Coach

The greybeard of the Saints' coaching staff in time of service, Whitehead joined the staff in 1971 after coaching the of-

fensive backfield in 1969-70 at Florida State University, where he graduated in 1961 after a brilliant college career, leading the nation in pass interceptions in 1960.

From 1961-68, Whitehead was a defensive back for the San Diego Chargers of the American Football League, playing all four defensive backfield positions. During his career, he intercepted a total of 15 passes and played in four AFL championship games, including a 51-10 title victory over the Boston Patriots in 1963.

A native of Marianna, Fla., Bud and his wife (Diana) have three children — Brian, 11; Todd, 7 and Lisa 5.

DOUG SHIVELY, Linebacker Coach

A 1959 graduate of Kentucky, Shively played under Saint head coach John North while a Wildcat and the impression was not lost on North, who called on Doug to take charge of his linebackers prior to the start of the 1974 season.

The son of the late Bernie Shively, longtime athletic director at the University of Kentucky, Doug began his coaching career at Port Arthur (Tex.) High School in 1959, leaving there to move into the collegiate ranks at Virginia Tech in 1960. In 1966, he returned to his Alma Mater and in 1970 joined the staff at Clemson.

In 1973, he served on the athletic staff at North Carolina under Bill Dooley.

Shively, 37, and his wife (Patsy) live in Metairie, La., with their three children — Chip (13), David (12) and Kelly (9).

WIMP HEWGLEY, Offensive Line Coach

A former paratrooper and service team coach, Hewgley joined the Saints last season after three years with the New York Jets and quickly earned the respect of the Saints' offensive linemen.

A tackle and end at Wyoming where he earned all-conference honors winning the Land Award as the outstanding Cowboy athlete in his senior year (1958), Hewgley entered the coaching profession at Worland, Wyo., High School where his team won the state championship. He returned to his alma mater in 1960 as the freshman coach and after two seasons became offensive line coach there. In 1967, he assumed a similar post at Purdue and was named Weeb Ewbanks' offensive line mentor with the Jets in 1971.

Hewgley is married (Kay) and they have two sons, Troy (12) and Todd (7). They live in Harahan, La.

ROBERT LEDBETTER, Offensive Backfield Coach

A native of Tupelo, Miss., Ledbetter is a 14-year veteran of the coaching ranks and, in his first season with the Saints a year ago, molded the team's running backs into record breakers as they set a seasonal rushing record, 1974 yards in 503 attempts, another team record.

Ledbetter's coaching career began in 1960 in the Memphis, Tenn., school system. In 1966, he shifted into the college ranks as backfield coach at Southern Illinois University, where he remained until being named head coach at Norfolk State in Norfolk, Va., in 1972.

A 1960 graduate of Mississippi Industrial College where he was a tackle for three seasons, Ledbetter is married (Delores) and lives in Metairie, La., with their son, Donnie (3).

JIM (RED) PHILLIPS, Coach of Wide Receivers

A former National Football League receiving leader with the Los Angeles Rams, Phillips joined the Saints coaching staff in 1974 after two seasons with Florida State University.

A native of Alexander City, Ala., Phillips earned a shot at a pro career while playing at Auburn University (1954-57), being drafted by the Rams where, in 1961, he led the NFL in receptions, netting 78 catches for 1,092 yards and five touchdowns. Following seven seasons with the Rams, Red concluded his brilliant career with the Minnesota Vikings from 1965 until his retirement in 1967.

In 1968, Phillips entered the coaching profession with the Atlanta Falcons as the receiver coach, moving to San Diego in a

similar capacity with the Chargers from 1969-71 before joining the staff at Florida State.

The 39-year-old Phillips lives in Metairie, La., with his wife (Mickey) and three children — Jim Jr. (16), David (14) and Jan (11).

LAMAR McHAN, Quarterback Coach

A 1953 graduate of the University of Arkansas, McHan spent 10 years in the National Football League, quarterbacking the Chicago Cardinals (1954-58), Green Bay Packers (1959-60), Baltimore Colts (1961-62) and San Francisco 49'ers (1963), appearing in relief roles for Johnny Unitas and John Brodie during his latter years.

This wealth of experience was invaluable to Saint quarter-

backs a year ago.

McHan entered the coaching profession in 1965 at Greenville, Miss., High School as backfield coach and baseball coach. In 1969, he moved to Northern Arizona University and came to the Saints after three seasons (1971-72-73) at the University of Texas-Arlington.

McHan and his wife (Barbara) live in Metairie, La., with their three children — Lance (12), Lisa (10) and Megan (5).

BILLY RAY BARNES, Special Teams Coach

Barnes begins his second tour of duty with the Saints this season, having served as receiver coach in 1969-70.

A 1956 graduate of Wake Forest, Barnes was drafted No. 2 by the Philadelphia Eagles in 1957 and, in nine-years in the NFL, with stops at Washington and Minnesota, totaled 3,421 rushing yards, 29 touchdowns rushing, 153 pass receptions and nine touchdowns receiving.

He entered the coaching profession as the head coach of the Charleston, W. Va., team in the Continental Football League in 1968, where his team finished 8-3. Upon leaving the Saints, Barnes reported to the Atlanta Falcons where he was the offensive backfield coach from 1971-74.

Born in Landis, N. C., Barnes and his wife (Janice) have twin daughters, Billi Raquel and Lani Michelle, 6. They live in Metairie, La.

ERNIE HEFFERLE, Director of Pro Personnel

Serving as the "eyes" of the Saints searchings for personnel

among the NFL teams that could benefit the Saint coaching staff, Hefferle brings 35 years of coaching on all athletic levels to this all-important position.

À graduate of Duquesne University, Hefferle began his coaching career at South Huntington Township (Pa.) High School in 1937, shifting to Tarentum (Pa.) High School in 1941, where he was interrupted by three years in Navy Pre-Flight training in 1943-44-45, returning to Tarrentum in 1946, prior to going to the University of Pittsburgh in 1951, the first of three tenures at Pitt.

In 1959, after serving as freshman coach and then as end coach at Pitt, he joined the staff of the Washington Redskins as offensive line coach. Following two years as head coach at Boston College in 1960-61, he returned to Pittsburgh as offensive line coach in 1962-64 before returning to the pros in a similar capacity with the Steelers (1965) and Miami Dolphins (1966-69). In 1970, he went back to Pitt as the offensive line coach and joined the Saints in 1973.

Hefferle and his wife (Betty) live in Kenner, La. They have two married daughters, Mrs. Yvonne Cadwallader of Las Vegas, Nev., and Mrs. Cheryle Hahnfeldt of San Francisco, Calif., and a daughter, Jean, 22, teaching school in Pittsburgh, Pa.

BOB WHITMAN, Director of Player Personnel

Into his second year as Director of Player Personnel, Whitman's career spans 18 coaching campaigns and seven years as a scout.

Whitman's coaching career began at St. Francisville, (La.) High School following his graduation in 1950 from Tulane University. His experience as athletic director and head football coach at St. Francisville proved invaluable to him in his next assignment in a similar capacity at Perkinston Junior College at Perkinston, Miss.

After a year at Perk, Whitman shifted his base of operations back to New Orleans, joining the Tulane staff in 1952 as a freshman coach, moving up to the varsity staff as an assistant coach in 1954. In 1962, he assumed the head coaching position at East Jefferson High School in Metairie, La., where his teams never had a losing season.

In July of 1968, Whitman joined the Saints as a player personnel scout, achieving the rank of chief scout in September of 1971 and assuming directorship at the close of the 1973 season.

Bob and his wife (Miriam) live in Metairie, and have six children at home — Mickey, 21; Gerry, 20; Wayne, 19; Kenny, 18; Joan, 16 and Laura 4. Two, Bob, Jr., and Judy, are now married and living with their families.

JOE BLAYLOCK, Player Personnel Scout

The personable Blaylock marks his 25th year as a coach or scout this year, having entered the coaching field in 1950 as assistant coach at Perkinston (Miss.) High School following his graduation from Mississippi Southern College (now the University of Southern Mississippi).

In 1952, Joe became an assistant coach at Perkinston Junior College. In 1956, he assumed the position of head coach and athletic director at Magnolia (Miss.) High School where his teams won their conference title in 1956 and 1957, repeating this distinction in a similar capacity in 1958 and 1959 at Spring Hill (La.) High School.

Advancing into the collegiate ranks in 1960, Blaylock served as assistant coach under Andy Pilney at Tulane in 1960-61 and then, after four years on the staff at Texas Tech, he returned to Tulane under Jim Pittman in 1966. He joined the Saints scouting staff in 1970.

Joe and his wife (Opal) live in Metairie and have two children, Mrs. Rhonda Nuss, also of Metairie, and son Jody, 19.

DIXIE WHITE, Player Personnel Scout

White joined the Saints in 1972 after eight illustrious seasons as head coach at Northeast Louisiana, where his teams compiled a 31-45-1 record, including a 7-3 mark in 1966 when his team was ranked ninth nationally.

A native of Grand Saline, Texas, White graduated from Texas Tech and began his coaching career at Lubbock, Tex., High School — his alma mater — in 1946, shifting to Denison, Tex.,

High School in 1948.

In 1949, he became an assistant coach at Mid-Western University in Wichita Falls, Tex., and assumed the head coaching position there in 1951, compiling an 11-9-1 record in two seasons. Following stops at the University of Idaho in 1953 and Stephen F. Austin College in Nacogdoches, Tex., in 1954, he served as an assistant coach at Arkansas from 1955-61 and L.S.U. from 1962-1963.

White, one of two Saints scouts serving with the Galaxy combine of which the Saints are a member, covers seven states in his task — Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Iowa and Missouri.

White and his wife (Ann) have three children — Togar, Kenneth and Judy — and live in Elkhorn, Neb.

HAMP COOK, Player Personnel Scout

One of two Saints scouts serving with the Galaxy combine of which the Saints are a member, Cook joined the Saints staff in 1973 and is currently manning an area including western Tennessee and western Kentucky, part of Northern Michigan and all of Illinois, Indiana and Wisconsin.

A 1955 graduate of Mississippi Southern College (now the University of Southern Mississippi), Hamp served as a student coach in 1955 while earning his Masters Degree in Physical Education in August, 1956.

A native of Georgianna, Ala., where he graduated from high school, Cook served as an assistant coach at Moss Point (Miss.) High School in 1956-57. SAINTS TO TRAIN AT NICHOLLS STATE

Nicholls State University in Thibodaux, La., will be the site of the New Orleans Saints' training camp in 1975.

Founded in 1948 as Francis T. Nicholls Junior College, Nicholls became a university by Act 93 of the 1970 Louisiana Legislature. The 166-acre campus houses five academic colleges, a graduate school, an evening division and a division of general studies. In addition, the campus is served by 300 acres of farm land for its agriculture programs and nearly 50 acres of marshland for use in research work in the coastal studies and marine studies programs.

The student population has risen from 1,016 in 1960 to an enrollment of over 6,000.

Since 1964, twenty major buildings projects have been initiated on the Nicholls campus, including eight dormitories, seven academic buildings and expanded student union and cafeteria and the construction of new athletic facilities.

Among the athletic facilities which the Saints will enjoy are spacious air-conditioned carpeted locker rooms, a fully-equipped training room with sauna bath, tartan surfaced weight room and amphitheater style meeting room, not to mention the "showplace" of the facility, John L. Guidry Memorial Stadium that seats 13,000 spectators.

The dormitory which will house the Saints at Nicholls is a motelstyle complex, boasting suites for four players to a suite, two persons to a room and each room with a private access as well as being centrally heated and air-conditioned.

While at Nicholls, the Saints will also be able to utilize Stopher Gym, a 4,500-seat gymnasium, in case of inclement weather.

Nicholls is approximately 60 miles West of New Orleans (via Highway 90 and Highway 1), allowing Saints' media and fans greater accessibility to the camp than ever before.

PRO: This slender, sure-handed pass-catcher was just starting to make an impression in training camp last summer when he was shelved by a shoulder separation during the fifth pre-season game against the New York Jets. The subsequent surgery sidelined him for the entire season. Now fully rehabilitated he's ready to take another shot at it — and his chances aren't bad.

COLLEGE: As a Nebraska senior in 1973 Frosty caught 27 throws for 524 yards and eight touchdowns — to place fifth in the school's history with a career total of 971 yards. PRO: After spending last season with New York and Charlotte in the World Football League, Al has returned to the NFL. Signed originally as a free agent by Dallas in 1971, he was traded to Detroit and was activated for seven games without getting into game combat. The next two years, however, he appeared in 20 contests, catching seven passes for 101 yards and two touchdowns. He was traded by the Lions prior to the start of the 1974 campaign to Denver, who released him . . . His speed is good and he has a slick assortment of moves for both long and medium depth aerials.

PRO: In his two NFL campaigns "the Bomber" has gotten into the maximum 28 games, sometimes at defensive end and more often last fall as defensive tackle, which is where he's listed this year. On the field for 150 plays in 1974, he included a sack and a fumble recovery among his accomplishments, while acquiring more valuable experience at a position that was completely foreign to a stand-up college lineman. Work with the weights has developed his upper body strength. There remains the possibility that he could be a prominent candidate for the wide-open left end job this season.

COLLEGE: An All-Big Ten selection in 1972, he started all but one 1971 game during his junior and senior seasons, accounting for 140 tackles — 18 of them for losses, broke up four passes and recovered four fumbles. Holds a degree in economics.

PRO: A most fortunate pick-up by the Saints after last season's opening game, Tom went on to lead the NFC with a 42.1-yard average. He was only one-tenth of a yard off the NFL title.

One of his boots travelled 71 yards and ten of them were either downed or out of bounds within the opponents' ten yard line. His accuracy proved invaluable to the New Orleans overall efficiency in 1974. He was also a holder for Saints placekicks . . . The New York Giants had drafted Blanchard on the twelfth round in 1971 and he immediately became the club's regular punter, averaging 41.7 yards on 169 kicks during his three years in New York.

COLLEGE: A three-year quarterback-punter at Oregon, where one of his favorite passing targets was current Saints receiver Bob Newland. He maintained a college career punting average of 41.7 yards and also threw for four touchdowns in one game and in another, vs. Army in 1969, he completed 22 of 32 aerials for 262 yards. While serving as team captain in his senior year he was sidelined by a knee injury.

Always a boisterous blocker, he was frequently employed to fill out the full-house backfield or as a second fullback in short yardage situations. He has retained his great value on the various special

COLLEGE: A second-team All-Big Ten selection as a Michigan senior, he was credited with two fumble recoveries, two pass interceptions and 61 tackles in his wind-up campaign with the Wolverines.

PERSONAL: Attended St. John High School in Toledo, Ohio . . . As a high school tailback he led his city league in rushing as a senior . . . At Michigan he earned a BA in speech — radio and television, and was active in that area in Los Angeles during the past off-season.

COLMAN, WAYNE C., 6-1, 220, Linebacker, 8th Year, Temple Born: April 13, 1946 at Ventnor, N. J. Joined Saints: Waivers (from Philadelphia), 1969

PRO: This vastly underrated performer was just about at his very best throughout the 1974 season, starting all 14 games on the right side and producing his usual quota of big plays, including two fumble recoveries and a pass interception — which helped preserve the 14-10 triumph over Philadelphia. Although lacking in overall physical qualifications — at 6-1, 220 — his knowledge of his position and the opposition makes him a formidable obstacle to any attack . . . The Eagles originally signed him as a free agent in 1968, then waived him to New Orleans the following season. He broke his leg in the fourth game, then took over as a number one linebacker in 1970 and he's now one of only three Saints to have been with the club that long.

COLLEGE: A defensive end at Temple where he earned All Mid-Atlantic Conference and All-Pennsylvania honors . . . Also participated in track and baseball. **PERSONAL:** Attended Atlantic City, N. J., High School. Resides in Ventnor, N. J. . . . Holds BS in Education degree . . . Married (Tonagee); two sons (Wayne Jr., 5, Douglas, 2) . . . Hobbies include surfing, rowing and fishing. Driver education teacher during off-season.

DAVIS, DAVE, 6-0, 175, Wide Receiver, 5th Year, Tennessee State Born: July 5, 1948 at Alcoa, Tennessee Joined Saints: Free Agent, 1974

PRO: Signed midway through last season, Dave saw action in six games for the Saints, most of it on the special teams. He was able to take up the receiving slack in the drills, however, and demonstrated that he just might be capable of pushing a starter for a job this season. In addition to his pass-catching talents he could also be employed to return punts . . . Green Bay's seventh draft choice in 1971, he served two years with the Packers before being released and picked up by Pittsburgh as a free agent in 1973. He played in two games for the Steelers.

Born: February 25, 1951 at Chicago, Illinois Joined Saints: Free Agent, 1974

PRO: In a step taken to bolster the freshman forces at training camp last summer quarterback coach Lamar McHan had the Saints enlist the aid of De Grenier, one of his former UTA charges.

During the pre-season action he netted 127 yards rushing (5.1 avg.) and earned a place on the roster. Participating in 12 contests he carried the ball 33 times for 110 yards (3.3 avg.) and caught four passes for 13 yards. A solid blocker and a powerful inside runner, Jack was frequently employed in the Saints' full-house, short-yardage backfield. He's expected to make a serious bid for one of the fullback assignments in 1975.

COLLEGE: Team captain at UTA as a senior, he gained All-Southland Conference acclaim.

PERSONAL: A product of Holy Cross High School in River Grove, Illinois, he now lives in Tempe, Arizona, where he's attending Arizona State University . . . Married (Deborah), one son (Chad Michael, $2\frac{1}{2}$).

DIDION, JOHN, 6-4, 255, Center, 7th Year, Oregon State Born: October 24, 1947 at Woodland, Calif. Joined Saints: Waivers (from Washington), 1970

PRO: After being cabbed through the last half of the 1970 campaign after being claimed from Washington, John was tested at linebacker by the Saints before taking over as the number one center at the start of the 1971 season. Another of those players who never seems to receive the praise he deserves, the rugged Didion is a competent blocker for the run and a strong pass protector. Injuries don't bother him and he maintains a high level of consistency in his play. He was voted the Touchdown Club's MVP Award by his teammates in 1974 . . . The Redskins had drafted him seventh in 1969.

COLLEGE: A unanimous first team All-American in 1968 . . . As a 1967 junior, he made the major 2nd team All-American selections . . . Played in 1968 East-West Game and 1969 Hula, Senior and Coaches' All-America Bowls.

PERSONAL: Earned a BS degree in Social Science . . . Married (Anne-Marie); one son (John, 4), one daughter (Catherine Sue, 1) . . . Worked with plumbing and heating company in the offseason, Ocean Park, Washington.

DORRIS, ANDY, 6-4, 240, Defensive End, 3rd Year, New Mexico State

Born: August 11, 1951 at Bellaire, Ohio Joined Saints: Trade with St. Louis, 1973

PRO: When starting left end Billy Newsome was injured late last season Andy got his chance to start the last two games, his first

in the NFL. In all, he played in each of the Saints' 14 outings after working in only one the previous year. Statistically, he was involved in two sacks and claimed two enemy fumbles last fall. A weight program and hard work in the off-season have added strength and pounds to the athlete who was initially installed as a linebacker by Cleveland in 1973. The Browns had just drafted him fourth, then traded him to St. Louis while still in training camp that summer. Early that same season the Cardinals swapped him to New Orleans for an eighth round choice. He goes to training camp this year as the leading candidate to inherit Newsome's vacated left end post.

COLLEGE: The only Aggie named to the All-Missouri Valley first team in 1972. Dorris was also voted New Mexico State's MVP for that season. He'd set a mark with four quarterback sacks in one game that fall.

PERSONAL: Attended Bellaire (Ohio) High School . . . Married (Mary Louise), one daughter (Meredith Renee, 3) . . . Now resides in Gretna, La. and is completing work toward business degree in college.

FEDERSPIEL, JOE, 6-1, 235, Middle Linebacker, 4th Year, Kentucky Born: May 6, 1950 at Louisville, Kentucky Joined Saints: Draft Choice No. 4a, 1972

PRO: In holding down the middle linebacking berth for the third straight year in 1974, Jarrin' Joe not only labored in all 14 games but logged more playing time than all but one of his defensive teammates. In the process he improved steadily as a tackler and diagnostician of the enemy's offensive plays, while accounting for a pair of sacks, a fumble recovery, a pass interception and even two kickoff returns for 20 yards. Always a furious hitter, he's expanded his range as his confidence has

increased. He'd broken in as a member of UPI's All-Rookie Team in 1972 although somewhat hampered by a sprained ankle and in 1973 he was sidelined for a game with a slight shoulder separation . . . The Saints snagged Federspiel on the fourth round pick that Philadelphia had turned over in the trade for running back Tony Baker.

COLLEGE: An All-SEC linebacker selection, he was honored as the South's best player vs. the North in the Miami Shrine Game — and he also participated in the Tampa All-American Bowl.

PERSONAL: Attended DeSales High School in Louisville, Kentucky. He's now living in New Orleans with his wife (Caroline).

FULLER, JOHNNY, 6-0, 185, Safety, 8th Year, Lamar Born: March 3, 1946 at Beaumont, Texas Joined Saints: Trade with San Francisco, 1973

PRO: Despite sitting out two early games with a leg injury the wiry veteran not only was the number one strong safety and a 12-game participant, but he also got into more plays than any of his secondary sidekicks. He continued to cover a lot of ground against the opposition's aerial assaults and twice decked the enemy's quarterback on the safety blitz. In addition, Johnny had a pass interception and a fumble recovery to his credit. An alert and aggressive player, he figures to go to training camp as the incumbent strong safety — and he'll be difficult to dislodge . . . The Saints had sent a future draft choice to San Francisco in 1973 to obtain Fuller. The 49ers had selected him on the fourth round in 1968.

COLLEGE: A three-time All-Conference choice at Lamar, where he also gained Little All-America honors as a senior, playing both split end and safety . . . He holds school records for the longest punt return, passes caught in a season and touchdowns in a season — he also earned four track letters.

PERSONAL: Attended South Park High School in Beaumont, Texas . . . Married (Sharon), one son (Ty, 4) . . . He lives in Los Altos, California and works as a counselor for juvenile delinquents at Log Cabin Ranch School in La Honda, California.

Most of his work was confined to providing extra blocking on short yardage plays, while staying sharp as a pass-catcher during the daily drills. The potential is still there and no one would be surprised if he suddenly vaulted into tight end prominence . . . Green Bay had drafted Garrett on the 15th round in 1971 and the next season he started 12 games, plus a playoff contest. The Packers traded him to New Orleans for an eighth round pick for 1974 just before the trading deadline date in 1973.

PRO: A tenth round draft choice by San Francisco in 1973, he got into eight games for the 49ers that season, mostly on special teams where he demonstrated good speed and range. The 49ers released him a year ago.

COLLEGE: A defensive end, tight end and linebacker at Florida State, he was limited to four games as a senior by a variety of injuries. He was utilized most effectively on the kickoff return and coverage units.

PERSONAL: He was a standout in football, basketball and track at Samuel Wolfson High School in Jacksonville, Florida. He now lives in Tallahassee, Florida.

JACKSON, ERNIE, 5-10, 175, Cornerback, 4th Year, Duke Born: April 11, 1950 at Hopkins, South Carolina Joined Saints: Draft Choice No. 7, 1972

PRO: There was really no way that this dynamic defender could be shackled to the bench last fall, so after five games Ken Reaves was traded to St. Louis and Ernie regained the left cornerback slot that he'd held throughout 1972 and 1973. His four interceptions tied him for the team lead and gave him ten for three years. He also claimed an enemy fumble and continued to sting opposing receivers and ballcarriers with his tough tackling. Lack of size hasn't been much of a handicap to Jackson, as he compensates with his quickness and bursts of speed. Employed to return only one kick-off in 1974 — for 27 yards — he could be called upon to handle more of these assignments. As a NFL freshman in 1972 he included an 85-yard TD sprint with a

recovered fumble among his accomplishments and wound up on the UPI All-Rookie team.

COLLEGE: The only player in Atlantic Coast Conference history to be honored as both offensive and defensive player of the week in the same season — as he went both ways through the second half of the 1971 campaign, playing 75% of each game . . . As a senior Ernie intercepted four passes — returning two for touchdowns, ran back punts and kickoffs and averaged 7.6 yards for each of his 31 carries from scrimmage . . . He also specialized in blocking extra point and field goal attempts.

PERSONAL: Attended Lower Richland (South Carolina) High School . . . He received his degree from Duke in electrical engineering . . . Married (Ora) . . . He's living in Metairie, La., where he's employed as a liquor salesman.

PRO: With Joe Federspiel going all the way in the middle, Rick's activity was limited last season but he did get into every game, performing on the special teams and as an extra linebacker in some short yardage situations. He provided the Saints with a sound, knowledgeable reliefman in the middle — and off the field now serves as the club's player representative . . . Originally drafted 14th by Cleveland in 1971, he suffered a foot injury that necessitated surgery in 1972 and kept him on the taxi squad for most of the season. The Saints signed Kingrea upon his release by the Browns early in the 1973 campaign and he went on to see action in the last nine games.

COLLEGE: A two-year team captain at Tulane, he was the Green Wave's leading tackler each of those years and gained many post-season honors.

PERSONAL: Attended Baton Rouge (La.) High School . . . Married (Sharon), one son (Rock, 5) . . . He lives in New Orleans.

KUPP, JAKE, 6-3, 254, Guard, 12th Year, Washington Born: March 12, 1941 at Pasadena, California Joined Saints: Returned from Atlanta, 1968

PRO: With ten NFL campaigns logged, Jake retired at the close of the 1973 season. It was a short-lived hiatus as the veteran reported to training camp in time to regain his guard post, proceeding to start all 14 contests and turn in a commendable all-around performance. Prior to his retirement he'd been the Saints' offensive captain for three years. Although not the biggest guard in the league, he provides solid pass protection and remains a most capable blocker when pulling out to lead a ballcarrier outside the flanks. He's the only current Saint to have participated in the Pro Bowl, having served in the 1969 classic . . . Drafted ninth by Dallas as a tight end in 1964, he was shifted to guard, then traded to Washington in 1966, returning to tight end long enough to catch four passes for 28 yards. New Orleans claimed him from the Redskins in the 1967 expansion draft, then waived him to Atlanta that same year. The Falcons sent him back to the Saints in 1968.

COLLEGE: A linebacker and offensive end at Washington, he also served as team captain in his senior year . . . He was also a starting pitcher on the Huskies' baseball team.

PERSONAL: At Sunnyside (Wash.) High School he excelled in football, basketball and baseball . . . His home is now in Metairie, La. where he's employed as an executive director for Chateau Estates . . . Married (Carla), three sons (Randy, 10; Craig, 8; Kyle, 6).

LA PORTA, PHIL, 6-4, 256, Tackle, 2nd Year, Penn State Born: May 1, 1952 at Valley Stream, New York Joined Saints: Draft Choice No. 9, 1974

PRO: As a pro newcomer last autumn Phil got into six games while learning his trade at left tackle. Injuries to regulars also presented him with the opportunity to start the season opener. Ironically, a badly sprained ankle early in training camp robbed LaPorta of some essential pre-season game action. This year, in top condition, he should be able to make considerable progress

towards a steady job on the offensive line. He's had no recurrence of the knee problem that had hampered him as a Penn State senior.

COLLEGE: At Penn State he was a number one offensive tackle and played in the Cotton, Sugar and Orange Bowl games before concluding his college career in the Senior Bowl contest.

PERSONAL: Attended Central High School in Valley Stream, New York, where he was awarded eleven letters in football, wrestling and baseball. An All-American selection in the latter sport, he was also a two-time county wrestling champion . . . Majoring in therapeutic recreation, he eventually wants to be in business for himself . . . Married (Nancy).

LAWSON, ODELL, 6-2, 205, Running Back, 5th Year, Langston Born: December 30, 1948 at Ponca City, Oklahoma Joined Saints: Waivers (from San Francisco), 1973

PRO: In his ninth game last season Odell tore ligaments in his knee and was sidelined the rest of the way. He served as captain of the special teams for the second successive year and could have a lot of the same work in 1975 although he will once again be striving for heavy fullback duty . . . New England had selected him on the seventh round of the 1970 draft and he was voted the Patriots' number one rookie that season. After seeing part-time service in 1971 he was idle throughout 1972 before signing with San Francisco. The Saints claimed him when he was waived by the 49ers just before the start of the 1973 campaign.

COLLEGE: An All-Oklahoma College Conference selection as a sophomore and senior, he rushed for over 2,000 yards.

PERSONAL: Attended Ponca City (Okla.) High School . . . He's now living in New Orleans.

LEE, BIVIAN, 6-3, 200, Cornerback, 5th Year, Prairie View Born: August 3, 1948 at Austin, Texas Joined Saints: Draft Choice No. 3, 1971

PRO: A back injury sustained his first day in training camp set Bivian back far enough last summer to cost him his starting slot at right cornerback. He stuck with it, however, and was ready to resume his role when Terry Schmidt was knocked out with

a foot injury in the season's ninth contest. He bounced back in good form, providing far-ranging coverage in the secondary. This year he figures to be primed to assume a first string defensive post, utilizing his savvy and speed to help nullify the opposition's aerial assault.

COLLEGE: After being converted from quarterback to defensive back he led the SWAC with six interceptions as a sophomore . . . He gained All-SWAC acclaim each of his last three seasons and was a Little All-American pick while serving as team captain each of his last two years . . . In 1969 he shattered a Cotton Bowl record by racing 105 yards with an interception vs. Bishop . . . He was named Prairie View's MVP in 1970 and concluded that campaign by playing in the North-South Shrine Game in Miami.

PERSONAL: Attended Emile High School in Bastrop, Texas and holds a college degree in physical education and biology . . . Resides in New Orleans and work's for the N. O. Police Department . . . Married (Cynthia).

MANNING, ARCHIE, 6-3, 215, Quarterback, 5th Year, Mississippi Born: May 19, 1949 at Cleveland, Miss. Joined Saints: Draft Choice No. 1, 1971

PRO: Last season was a perplexing and disappointing one for the Mississippi redhead. A combination of a knee injury and illness reduced Manning's effectiveness and his playing time. Not since his ailment-plagued rookie campaign of 1971 had he thrown fewer passes and completed fewer for less yardage than last fall. And while his 7.3-yard rushing average was his best ever he was limited to a career-low 28 carries by his ailing knee, sustained in game number four. Archie was in his finest form in directing the Saints to upset victories over Philadelphia and Los Angeles. Even though his overall offense was hampered in

1974 he continued to progress as a leader on the field. A winter operation on the knee should solve any mobility problems and he figures to be ready to operate in high gear this season. Most all of the team's aerial records belong to Manning.

COLLEGE: During his three seasons as the Ole Miss signal-caller Archie connected on 412 of 761 aerials (.541) for 4,753 yards and 31 touchdowns — all school records . . . His three-year total offense of 5,576 yards represented a new SEC mark . . . An All-SEC pick in 1969-70, he was also an All-American selection in 1969, when he set an Ole Miss single game standard by accounting for 540 yards total offense — 436 via 33 pass completions — vs. Alabama . . . At the conclusion of his last two seasons he earned MVP recognition in the Sugar Bowl and Gator Bowl.

PERSONAL: Attended Drew (Miss.) High School . . . Married (Olivia), son (Cooper, one) . . . He toured the Far East with other NFL representatives in February, 1973 . . . Currently handling public relations duties for several companies in Louisiana and Mississippi.

PRO: Signed to augment the rookie candidates a year ago, Curtis surprised many observers by making a strong bid for a tight end assignment. He blocked well, got open and held onto the football, while showing fine downfield speed. His development came to a jarring halt when he tore ligaments in his knee in the opening pre-season game vs. Pittsburgh. Martin worked hard to completely rehabilitate his knee and should make this year's pitch for a job in top condition.

COLLEGE: A highly-regarded freshman at L.S.U., he dropped out of school to go to work and play semi-pro football in Louisiana.

PERSONAL: Attended South Lafourche High School in Galliano, La. . . . After shucking oysters in a restaurant he was employed by the New Orleans Police Department in a joint program with the city's public schools . . . Married (Kathie); son (Beau, 1).

MAXSON, ALVIN, 5-11, 205, Running Back, 2nd Year, S.M.U. Born: November 12, 1951 at Beaumont, Texas Joined Saints: Draft Choice No. 8, 1974

PRO: After first attracting attention as a booming blocker during last summer's training camp, Alvin was given his initial pro start in the fourth regular season game. He never sat on the bench again as he stampeded Saints' rivals for 714 yards via 165 carries (4.3 average) and caught 42 passes for 294 yards to lead the team in both rushing and receiving. He registered three touchdowns and set up quite a few other six-pointers. The swift-striking fullback established a pair of club records when he ground out a total of 148 yards and tore off a 66-yard TD trip in the 14-0 win over St. Louis. This year's New Orleans running attack will be constructed around this compact slasher, who has the power to break tackles and the speed to sweep the flanks. His down-the-stretch pace of 1974, 132 hauls for 616 yards (4.7-yard average) over the last nine contests, augurs favorably for a 1975 campaign that should find him starting - and lugging the ball — from the outset.

COLLEGE: A switch in offensive formations contributed to Alvin's netting "only" 744 yards rushing (6.2 average) as an S.M.U. senior after he'd piled up 1,012 and 1,005 yards as a sophomore and junior, respectively. He also led the Southwest Conference with 13 touchdowns in 1973, boosting his three-year career total to 25.

PERSONAL: Attended the famed Hebert High School in Beaumont, Texas, lettering in both track and football. He resides in Dallas, Texas.

McCLARD, BILL, 5-10, 202, Placekicker, 4th Year, Arkansas Born: October 15, 1949 at Purcell, Oklahoma Joined Saints: Free Agent, 1973

PRO: With the demand for field goals way down Bill didn't enjoy his most productive campaign in 1974. In his first full season as the Saints' regular placekicker he was called upon to attempt only 16 field goals in 14 games, making good on nine, which included two-for-two from beyond fifty yards — for 51 and 52 yards. He clicked on three of his last four attempts. At his best he is a powerful kicker with fine accuracy who can also consistently drive the ball deep on kickoffs . . . San Diego drafted him third in 1972 but used him only sparingly before releasing him in 1973. He moved to both Los Angeles and Atlanta without being activated before being signed by New Orleans and employed through the final eight games.

COLLEGE: An All-Southwest Conference selection at Arkansas in 1970-71, he made good on 125 of 133 extra points and 29 of 46 field goals during his college career, while also establishing NCAA career records with 212 points kicking and a 60-yard field goal vs. S.M.U.

PERSONAL: Attended Norman (Okla.) High School where he set Oklahoma schoolboy marks with a 56-yard field goal and a 61.6 shotput . . . Married (Cynthia) . . . Resides in Little Rock, Arkansas, where he's involved in commercial and industrial real estate.

McNEILL, ROD, 6-2, 219, Running Back, 2nd Year, U.S.C. Born: March 26, 1951 at Durham, North Carolina Joined Saints: Draft Choice No. 4, 1974

PRO: For the high-voltage McNeill 1974 was something of a

nightmare, as several injuries cut deep into his on-the-field activities. A pulled hamstring muscle probably did the greatest amount of damage as he carred the ball only 22 times in eleven games. His 90 ground yards (4.1 avg.) were far short of his anticipated contribution. He also caught five passes for 64 yards in his reserve role at halfback. Fully recovered from his physical miseries, Rod's expected to make a determined bid for a starting assignment in 1975. When operating at full strength he can do just about anything that could be desired of a halfback — running with speed, power and deception and catching most anything thrown his way.

COLLEGE: After recovering from a fractured hip in 1971 he went on to rush for 1,330 yards in his last two years at U.S.C., increasing his three-season output to 1,718 yards (5.1 avg.) and 14 touchdowns — to rank seventh on the Trojans' all-time list of ground-gainers, despite playing in a back-up capacity as a junior and senior.

PERSONAL: Attended Baldwin Park (California) High School . . . He earned a B.S. in business management at U.S.C. and is seeking a law degree.

MERLO, JIM, 6-1, 225, Linebacker, 3rd Year, Stanford Born: October 3, 1951 at Sanger, California Joined Saints: Draft Choice No. 4, 1971

PRO: In his second NFL campaign Jim started every Saints game and went just about all the way in each, firmly establishing himself as one of the league's better young left side linebackers. Although unable to add to the three interceptions of his rookie year, he did receive credit for a pair of sacks and a recovered fumble. While the opposition isn't likely to describe him as a physically punishing type of defender, due to his lack of great size, they are constantly aware of his presence — a tribute to his quickness, hustle and knowledge of his position. He's destined to improve with each performance.

COLLEGE: A junior college All-American at Fresno (Calif.) City College, he went on to earn All-West Coast honors and be voted Stanford's MVP as a senior, after which he played in the East-West Shrine Game and the Hula Bowl Game — being named the most valuable defensive player in the latter contest. He'd also seen action in the 1972 Rose Bowl Game.

PRO: As a rookie in 1974 Rick was introduced gradually into the pro linebacking routine, getting into only 74 plays, mostly behind Jim Merlo on the left side. He certainly demonstrated enough ability to indicate that he could handle either of the other two linebacking assignments. Over the 14-game grind he did distinguish himself on the special teams and doubtless could do so again if he's unsuccessful in breaking into the starting lineup — but don't wager against that happening. He spent much of the off-season building up his upper body via a weight program. The speed and quickness are already there.

COLLEGE: A Rose Bowl veteran at Ohio State, Rick was the Buckeyes' defensive captain and gained All-Big Ten honors as a senior. He'd been a tight end as a sophomore and the team's number two receiver, then shifted to linebacker as a junior and led the team with 112 tackles.

PERSONAL: Attended R. B. Hayes High School in Delaware, Ohio, earning nine letters in football, basketball and track . . . He majored in history in college and hopes to either go into law or teaching and coaching after the NFL . . . His home is in Columbus, Ohio.

PRO: After a slowed-down NFL introduction in 1974, induced by a pre-season knee sprain, Derland really hit his stride last fall, starting all 14 games and notching four quarterback sacks from his right tackle slot. Big and strong, he should continue to develop into one of the league's outstanding defensive linemen. The former Sooner usually remains in the middle of the Saints' wall when they shift into a three-man front . . . As a pro freshman he got into 13 contests as a reliefman at tackle.

COLLEGE: An All-American and All-Big Eight choice at Oklahoma, where he played both defensive end and tackle, Derland participated in two Sugar Bowl Games and also received the Gomer Jones Award as the Sooners' outstanding lineman.



He can and will swipe more enemy aerials. Further, he's a sound, sure tackler who's particularly adept at executing the safety blitz — being credited with two sacks and countless harassments of the opposition's quarterback. He's also been employed to call defensive signals and hold the ball for placekicks. The tough Irishman is also a stalwart leader who can keep the defense functioning on a high level . . . In 1974, too, Myers had to rebound from winter surgery on his knee and stomach.

PRO: This will be a critical year for the hard-working Newland, who must come back from a serious January knee operation. Typically, Bob played through most of last season with a painful knee without any slackening of his usual blistering pace. His 490 yards, 18.1-yards-per-catch average and 79-yard touchdown reception vs. Los Angeles were all high marks for the Saints in 1974. PRO: In his first NFL season Joel started every game from the beginning of the pre-season schedule, suffered no disabling injuries and missed very few plays during the course of the campaign. He utilized his size and speed to latch on to 41 passessecond best on the Saints to Alvin Maxon's 42 - for 455 yards (11.1 avg.) and four touchdowns (tops on the club). Inexperience cost him a few receptions along the way but he should be solving any problem in that area this year as he discovers additional methods to break into the open. His hands are good and he's a diligent workman, in practice as well as the game. There would appear to be no reason why he shouldn't attain pro stardom before too many more games have been played.

COLLEGE: In his last two seasons at Florida, laboring for a team that preferred to run the football, Parker grabbed 33 passes for 512 yards and four scores after pulling down ten tosses for 132 yards in his first varsity outing vs. Duke.

He's certainly one of the chief reasons that the Saints have concentrated so heavily on their ground attack over the past two years. Phillips has been idle for very few offensive plays since coming over from Cincinnati for two draft picks (third round and fifth round) just prior to the start of the 1973 campaign. He'd been used on a part-time basis by the Bengals in 1971 and 1972 after being a regular the previous two years and being named to The Sporting News' All-AFC team in 1970. The Bengals drafted him fourth in 1968 and used him as a defensive back in his first year.

COLLEGE: Phillips excelled as a defensive back at Michigan State.

PERSONAL: Attended Hebert High School in Beaumont, Texas being one of the school's and city's many products in the NFL . . . He lived in New Orleans through the past off-season, while rehabilitating from a knee injury . . . Married (Julie), one son (Jess 111).

PRO: The acknowledged leader of the Saints' defensive "Dynomite Gang", Bob's been the most solid rock in the club's front line over the past four years, starting and finishing all 56 games while annually leading his mates in tackles — made all over the field. Last fall he added nine QB sacks and two fumble recoveries to his long list of accomplishments. An All-Rookie team selection in 1971, he's made considerable progress since that season and is worthy of Pro Bowl acclaim. During the past season he opened each game at right end, a new position for him, then shifted over to his normal left tackle post when passing situations arose. More of the same is likely in store for him this year.

A torrid competitor, he never operates at less than full steam, being particularly active on special teams assignments . . . Detroit had drafted him on the ninth round in 1969. Although cabbed for a season by the Lions he became a part-time starter at guard before being released.

COLLEGE: An All-Pacific Coast first team choice as a senior, he had played at Bakersfield (Calif.) Junior College before transferring to Oregon State.

PERSONAL: Attended Bakersfield (Calif.) South High School . . . Married (Sharon), two sons (Wade 5, Regan, 3) . . . He's employed as an instructor at Bakersfield Junior College.

PRO: After arriving unheralded in the Saints' training camp a year ago, Terry promptly took over the right cornerback post and didn't relinquish it until a foot injury in the ninth contest forced him to the sidelines for the rest of the season. A sparkling pre-season effort was followed by an impressive league debut, as he intercepted four aerials in his first five games — returning one for a TD vs. Denver. He also had a fumble recovery to his credit. At the season's end he was rewarded with a berth on the All-Rookie team. A slick ballhawk with a knack for being in the right place at the right time, he's also a dependable tackler.

COLLEGE: The first Ball State athlete ever to participate in the East-West Shrine Game, Schmidt swiped an aerial in the 1973 contest after setting a school mark with 13 interceptions over three years, including five as a senior when he was voted MVP of his team. He was a first team College Division All-American choice by Kodak and the Football News. In high school and as a college freshman he'd been employed as a wide receiver.

Now, with valuable experience gained under fire and on the practice field, Scott could be counted upon to take over the offense at any time and run the show efficiently—with points as the payoff. He has the leadership qualities essential to handling the quarterback duties.

COLLEGE: During his three-year stint at Tennessee he threw for 32 touchdowns and a school record 3,461 yards . . . His 385 yards passing vs. Florida in 1970 represented a Vols single game mark . . . He was named the MVP in the 1971 Sugar Bowl Game.

PERSONAL: Attended Rossville (Georgia) High School . . . Lives in Knoxville, Tennessee and serves as a supervisor for the Tipton Distributing Company of Anheuser-Busch, Inc. . . . Married (Patricia).

He climaxed his rookie campaign by snaring a 1974 team high of nine passes for 83 yards and a score in the finale at San Francisco. His juggling receptions during the season caused some heart palpitations but he dropped very few while finishing with 32 catches for 466 yards and three touchdowns. An effective runner in the open, he also tallied a TD on a six-yard end-around sweep. He has the speed necessary to run the deep routes and needs only some added bulk to boost his blocking efficiency. Much of his past off-season was devoted to strengthening his upper body, while packing on some extra pounds. Seal could be the Saints' tight end for many years.

COLLEGE: In a three-year college career Paul pulled down 33 passes for 510 yards and six touchdowns — on a Michigan team that seldom put the ball in the air. As a senior he served as co-captain and was voted his team's MVP. COLLEGE: At North Carolina Central he intercepted 29 passes over four seasons and also ranked tenth nationally as a sophomore punt returner — averaging 18.7 yards for 15 runbacks.

STEVENS, HOWARD, 5-5, 165, Running Back, 3rd Year, Louisville Born: February 9, 1950 in Harrisonburg, Virginia Joined Saints: Draft Choice No. 16, 1973

PRO: A 14-game performer in 1974, Howard can make himself usefull in a variety of ways, but his chief contributions were made returning punts and kickoffs — as he established team seasonal marks last fall with 37 punt runbacks for 376 yards. THOMPSON, DAVE, 6-4, 260, Tackle-Center, 5th Year, Clemson Born: February 1, 1949 at Langdale, Alabama Joined Saints: Trade with Detroit Lions, 1974

PRO: A full-time starter at left tackle last season, Dave went the 14-game route despite some bothersome injuries that prevented him from operating at peak efficiency. In the process of getting the job done he solidified himself at his position and for the first time in his pro career he checked into training camp as the number one man at his post. In addition to being a formidable blocker for both passing and running plays, he's also a first class snapper for punts and placekicks and he could — and has — worked as a regular center or guard in the offensive wall. The Detroit Lions had drafted him second in 1971 and he served with them three years in a reserve capacity before being swapped on the day of the 1974 player draft to New Orleans with Detroit's first round choice for the Saints' first round selection and sixth round pick in 1975.

COLLEGE: As a senior he was tagged "the best blocker in South Carolina" while playing at guard. He'd been a tackle as a sophomore and a center as a junior. Thompson also received All-American recognition in 1970.

COLLEGE: As a guard at Jackson State Emanuel progressed from most outstanding freshman to team captain in his senior season, when he also earned All-Conference and All-NAIA honors.

PERSONAL: Holds a B.S. degree in health and education . . . Attended U. S. Jones High School in Demopolis, Alabama, where he excelled in football and basketball and made the academic honor roll . . . He now resides in New Orleans where he is employed as a counselor in the public school system.



He had withdrawn from school in 1972 in order to compete in the Olympics. Larry holds every Purdue sprint standard, indoor and outdoor. He's run a wind-aided 9.1 in the 100 and 4.2 several times in the 40. As a Purdue receiver he caught 38 passes for 702 yards in 1974 and averaged 18 yards per reception throughout his college career . . . The scouts were impressed by his great deep speed, slick moves, intelligence and attitude. He has the good hands, concentration and toughness required to develop into a top pro receiver. In successive years he participated in the Orange Bowl, Cotton Bowl and Sugar Bowl . . . As a sophomore he had served as a reserve monster man for the Huskers after being red-shirted in 1971. John had been a two-time All-State fullback at Haxtun, (Colo.) High School and played that position as a college freshman. He graduated in May, 1975 with a degree in Animal Science.

MIKE LEMON, 6-2, 215, Linebacker, Kansas Born: February 26, 1951 in Topeka, Kansas Joined Saints: Draft Choice No. 6, 1975

An All-Big Eight (UPI) nose guard in college, Mike should be able to make the conversion to pro linebacker. He had been a two-year regular at Ellsworth Jr. College at Iowa Falls, Iowa prior to transferring to Kansas in 1972. At Sioux City's Heelan High School he had been an All-State football player, wrestler and trackman, specializing in the high jump and high hurdles . . . In the opinion of the scouts he is a strong and tenacious hitter with lots of pride in his work. Always an outstanding competitor, he's a quick and agile athlete who could excel on special teams as well as at linebacker. Last fall he led the Jayhawks' linemen with 106 tackles, including a team-high 15 vs. Oklahoma, and a season high of 12 behind the line of scrimmage for a 40-yard de-

He could be more elusive but added experience should improve his overall running ability. Steve has been working hard on his blocking and receiving and with time could develop into a genuine offensive threat . . . During his three seasons as a Tiger he lugged the ball 280 times for 1,311 yards, averaging 4.7 yards per trip . . . including 600 yards last autumn. *

MIKE STRACHAN, 6-0, 195, Running Back, Iowa State Born: May 24, 1953 in Miami, Florida Joined Saints: Draft Choice No. 9, 1975

In his first two college seasons Mike carried the ball 540 times for 2,364 yards and eleven touchdowns to earn the tenth spot on the All-Time Big Eight rushing list. As a senior and team captain, despite several leg injuries, he went on to top the All-Time Iowa State ground-gaining mark with 647 more yards. Strachan, which rhymes with brawn (and gone), rushed for 198 yards via 40 carries in a 1973 game with Colorado. He attended Jackson High School in Miami, Florida. According to the scouts, Mike has been able to pick up yardage both ways — as a power runner inside and as an elusive, swift (4.6) sweep specialist. The three-year All-Big Eight selection concluded his collegiate activity in the All-American Bowl in Tampa . . . He'll pursue a master's degree in Industrial Education.

The type of runner who could be utilized effectively at either halfback or fullback, Chuck is a slasher, with good balance and acceleration and 4.7 speed. He does everything all-out, being a dedicated worker and an outstanding leader. Chuck should also aid the Saints with his blocking and receiving. In last year's Blue-Gray Game he netted 70 yards on 15 carries. An All-American pick at Columbian High School in Tiffin, Ohio, Chuck proceeded to rush for 1360 yards (5.2 per carry) in his first two seasons at Michigan, adding 660 yards and seven TDs on 153 hauls in 1974. He's been active with the Campus Crusade for Christ. A psychology major, his long range plans could include a career in the seminary.

DANNY LEE, 6-1, 185, Punter, Northeast Louisiana Born: September 3, 1953 in Homer, Louisiana Joined Saints: Draft Choice No. 11, 1975

A strong-legged kicker with good timing and rhythm, Danny has the knack of getting the ball away quickly and punting the ball high. He has good hands and the athletic ability to adjust well on off-center snaps. After averaging 42.9 yards on 76 punts as a junior, he dropped off to 37.1 yards as a senior, when, as he said, "I was just pressing too hard for a higher average". A product of Minden, (La.) High School, where he also played split end, he's the brother of Baltimore Colts punter David Lee, who led the NFL in that department in 1966 and 1969. Danny, incidentally, surpassed David's collegiate punting marks. Married (Pam).

RON GUSTAFSON, 6-1, 185, Wide Receiver, North Dakota Born: October 8, 1952 in Duluth, Minn. Joined Saints: Draft Choice No. 12, 1975

Despite three operations on his right knee, Ron is still regarded as a fine pro prospect after leading his team with 26 catches for 439 yards, 506 yards via 20 kickoff returns, 164 yards on 14 punt runbacks and a total of 12 touchdowns in 1974. He has also been utilized as a running back — with 4.7 speed and good acceleration — churning for 232 yards (5.8 avg); while serving as team captain last season. An All-North Central Conference pick in 1973-74 and team captain last year, he snared 141 throws for 2,243 yards and 18 air TDs during his four-year varsity career . . . He'd been a four-sport standout at Duluth's Morgan Park High School . . . An Industrial Arts major, he played in the 1972 Camellia Bowl.

JIM UPCHURCH, 5-11, 195, Running Back, Arizona Born: October 30, 1950 in Apex, N.C. Joined Saints: Draft Choice No. 13, 1975

As a junior in 1973, Jim rushed for 1,184 yards, averaged 5.6 yards per carry and scored ten touchdowns, including a 232-yard performance against Texas-El Paso — an Arizona record. He went into the 1974 season with a two-year average of five yards per trip and proceeded to grind out 1,004 yards (4.6 avg.). His team's MVP in 1973 and 1974, he was also an All-Western Athletic Conference choice as a senior — and concluded the campaign with appearances in the East-West Shrine Game and the Hula Bowl. An All-American and a two-year MVP at Hogan High School in Vallejo, California, he attended UCLA before transferring to Arizona in 1971 . . . As a sophomore Grant had carried 47 times for 244 yards. A smooth runner, he has good drive, is an effective receiver and has improved as a blocker. His 4.6 speed could be beneficial to the Saints' ground game . . . An All-American and All-State choice at Stroud (Okla.) High School, he gained scholastic Big-Eight acclaim and wound up in last January's Hula Bowl Game . . . At Oklahoma he earned his degree in Finance.

MIKE McDONALD, 6-2, 210, Linebacker, Catawba College Born: June 20, 1953 in St. Augustine, Fla. Joined Saints: Draft Choice No. 16, 1975

With added weight and strength, Mike could develop into a pro linebacker. He has 4.8 speed, uses his body well and has the




