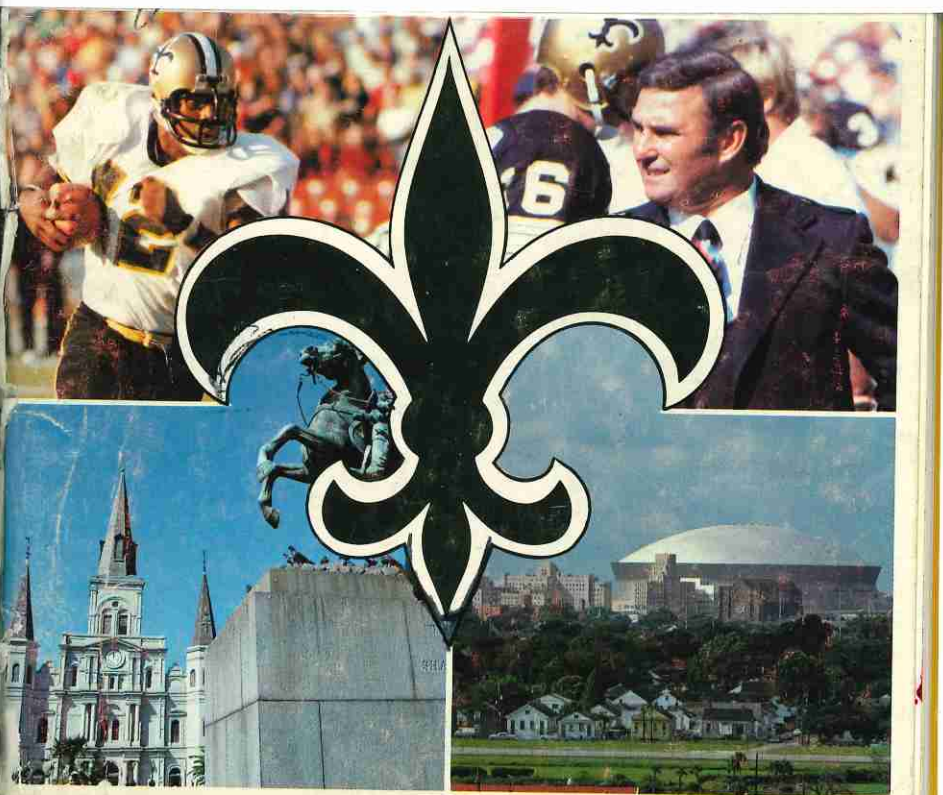
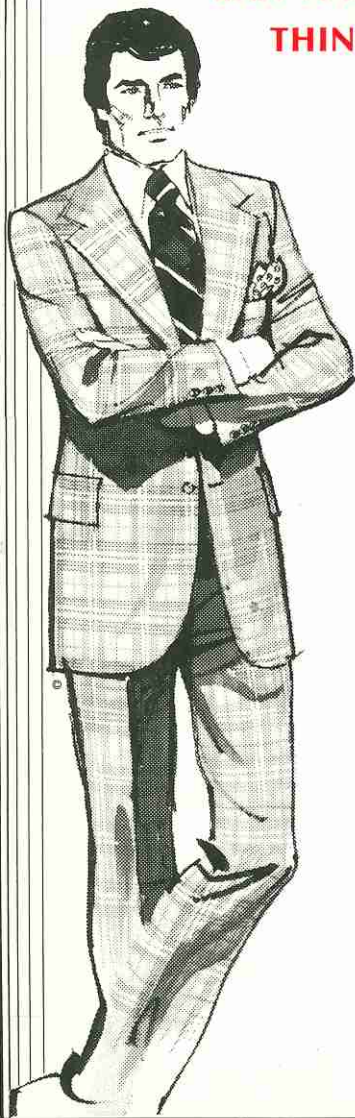

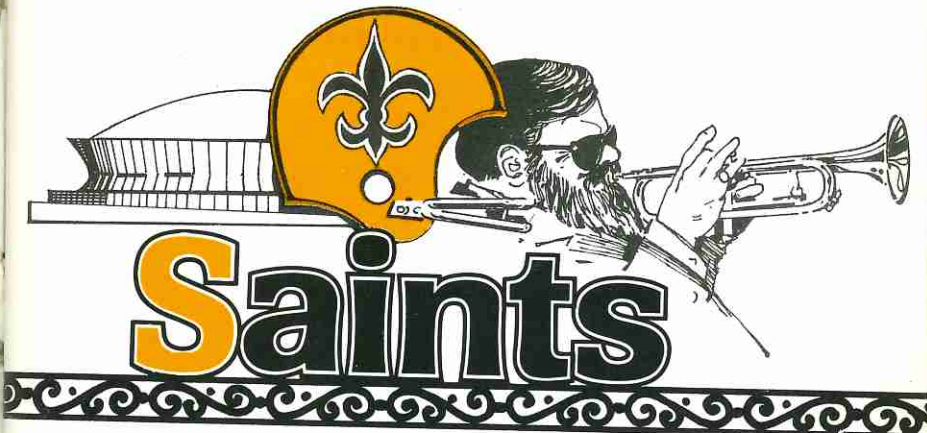

John W. Mecom, Jr.

President



John W. Mecom Jr. was awarded the New Orleans Saints franchise on Dec. 15, 1966. At 27 he was the youngest club president in National Football League history.

The Saints are Mecom's avid interest, but most of his time is spent managing the Mecom family business network of oil, sulphur, ranches and hotels. The elegant Warwick Hotel in Houston is a

Mecom enterprise. John also owns one-half interest in the Le Pavillon Hotel in New Orleans.

Mecom has the Saints involved in New Orleans civic projects. The Saints and Lions Clubs of Louisiana co-sponsor an annual charity game. This year the Saints are donating a portion of a game receipts to help build locker rooms for high school athletes at Tad Gormley Stadium in City Park.

Mecom was born in Houston, Tex., on Oct. 11, 1939. He attended the universities of Oklahoma and Texas. He played freshman football at Oklahoma. He is a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. At Oklahoma he met his future bride, Katsy Mullendore of Pawhuska, Okla.

The Mecoms reside in Houston with their four children—son John III, 14, and daughters Katsy Kathleen 11, Elizabeth 10 and Kathleen 7.

HANK STRAM

Head Coach and Vice President



A winning tradition and a reputation for coaching excellence are the trademarks of Hank Stram, Head Coach and Vice President of the New Orleans Saints.

Owner John Mecom Jr.'s selection of the dynamic and innovative Stram as his team's fourth head coach in the Saints ten-year history in 1976 provided the NFL's Crescent City franchise with the kind of leadership expected of pro football's third winningest active coach.

In his fifteen year tenure with the Dallas Texans/Kansas City Chiefs Stram compiled an illustrious record of 124 wins, 76 losses and 10 ties that included the winning of the 1962 AFL Championship and the 1970 Super Bowl.

Stram's Dallas Texans won their first American Football League crown in 1962 in that league's first sudden death clash with the Houston Oilers. Following that, Stram's Chiefs played in two Super Bowls.

Stram has been the recipient of either AFL or AFC Coach of the Year honors on four separate occasions — 1962, 1966, 1968, and 1970. The man charged with the task of making the Saints a competitive team currently ranks eighth in all-time coaching victories and is third behind Don Shula of Miami and Tom Landry of Dallas among active NFL coaches in all-time victories.

ATHLETIC HISTORY

A native of Gary, Indiana where he was an All-State halfback at Lew Wallace High, Stram entered Purdue University on a football scholarship in 1941.

After his first varsity season, Stram was invited to play in the College All-Star Game. However, he had enlisted in the Army reserve in the spring of 1943 and was called to active duty two months before the game was to be played. He remained in the service for three years,

returning to Purdue in 1946. In 1948 he was graduated with a B.S. in Physical Education.

Stram won seven monograms at Purdue, four in baseball and three in football. In his senior year he received the coveted Big Ten Medal which is awarded to the conference athlete who best combines athletics with academics.

COACHING BACKGROUND

Immediately upon graduation, Stram joined Purdue's coaching staff and served the next eight years as backfield coach under head coach Stu Holcomb. In 1956 Stram coached at Southern Methodist University and then spent the following two seasons at Notre Dame under Terry Brennan. A one-year stint as an assistant at the University of Miami (Florida) preceded Hunt's naming him to head his new A.F.L. Dallas Texans.

During his 12 years in the college ranks, Stram gained the reputation as one of the country's most imaginative teachers of offensive football. He is credited with the development of four All-American quarterbacks — Dale Samuels and Len Dawson of Purdue, George Izo of Notre Dame and Fran Curci of Miami.

Stram has enlarged upon his reputation as a top offensive tactician and innovator since he joined the pro ranks. His use of the moving quarterback pocket is one of the most talked about developments in pro football. In 1967 he added the Tight End I to the Chiefs offensive arsenal. This formation has the tight end shift out of the backfield to either side of the line, thus creating indecision on the opposing team's defensive backfield.

Stram made his mark as a defensive strategist in 1962 when he successfully employed his now famous "stack" defense. In the "stack" Kansas City can present the appearance of being in anything from a three-man to a seven-man front. The various alignments that the "stack" make possible create a different look to the opposing quarterback, change blocking assignments and open the door for a variety of defensive stunts. Several professional clubs have added versions of the "stack" to their defensive repertoire as a result of Stram's success.

CHAMPIONSHIPS

In 1962 when the Chiefs were the Dallas Texans they won their first A.F.L. Championship with a thrilling 20-17 six quarter victory over the Houston Oilers in the second longest football game ever played. The

game was not decided until Tommy Brooker kicked a 25 yard field goal 77 minutes and 54 seconds after the game had begun.

1966 was the second year a Stram-led team captured the AFL flag. The Chiefs defeated the Buffalo Bills 31-7 to earn a berth opposite the Green Bay Packers in the First World Championship Game of Pro Football — Super Bowl I.

The AFL's ten year history came to a close in 1969. Stram guided the Chiefs to an 11-3 season and the fourth qualifier spot in the League's Inter-divisional Playoffs. The Chiefs outscored the New York Jets 13-6 and went on to defeat the Oakland Raiders 17-7 for their third League crown.

The highlight of Stram's illustrious career came on January 11, 1970, when the Chiefs defeated the Minnesota Vikings 23-7 for the World Championship of Professional Football.

He has been involved in the two longest games in pro football history — the AFL title battle in 1962 and the famous 1971 Christmas day, six-quarter divisional playoff against Miami.

ALL STAR GAMES

Following his first AFL Championship in 1962, Stram coached the Western Division All Stars to a 21-14 victory.

In 1967 Stram was given the honor of coaching the South All Stars in the Senior Bowl game in Mobile, Alabama. His team was victorious, winning 34-21 over the North.

Following the 1968 season, Stram coached the Western Division to a 38-25 victory over the Eastern Division in the AFL All Star game. Stram's team trailed 19-3 in the first half but scored 25 points after intermission to win the game.

In addition, Stram's Chiefs upheld the honor of pro football's champions with their division victory over the College All Star's in the 1970 Chicago classic.

AWARDS

Following Stram's first AFL Championship in 1962, he was named "Pro Football Coach of the Year." Stram received a host of national awards following the 1966 season. He was named the AFL's Coach of the Year by the Associated Press, The Washington Touchdown Club, the Dapper Dan Club of Pittsburgh and the Helms Athletic Association. The Rockne Club honored him as Pro Football's Coach of the year.

After the Chiefs posted a 12-2 record in '68, Stram was again voted the AFL's Coach of the Year by Associated Press, United Press International, Pro Football Weekly, the Pittsburgh Dapper Dan Club and the Washington Touchdown Club.

Following the Chiefs Super Bowl Victory, Stram repeated as AFL Coach of the Year at the Washington Touchdown Club and the Dapper Dan Club of Pittsburgh. He was also voted Coach of the Year by 101 Sportswriters and Broadcasters throughout the country who comprised the selection committee for Kansas City's first annual Salute to Professional Football. The New York Chapter of the Pro Football Writer's Association named Stram their Super Man of the Year. He traveled to New York to receive the B'nai B'rith Man of the Year Award and was selected Hoosier Celebrity of the Year at the 13th Annual Celebrities Golf Tournament in Fort Wayne, Indiana. Stram's hometown of Gary, Indiana, honored him by establishing the Hank Stram-Tony Zale Scholarship Award.

In June of 1976 Stram was named Pro Coach of the Year by the National Black Sports Foundation. In December he received the Men of Fashion Award for Ten Best Dressed Men in New Orleans for 1976, and was also selected by The Football News as one of the Ten Best Dressed Men in Football for 1976.

BROADCASTING

Throughout the 1975 season, Stram earned considerable critical acclaim for his performance with CBS Television Sports in his role as an analyst commentator.

The dapper mentor brought the same penchant for detail and single-minded preparedness that characterized his coaching to his duties in the broadcast booth. Stram gave his audience an incisive look into the strategy of the contests he covered with the kind of personal touch that made viewing the game a fun thing.

As one of CBS' most valued announcers, Stram played a major role in that network's award winning coverage of Super Bowl X, an event which drew the largest audience in television history.

In so doing Stram became the first pro football personality to participate in the Super Bowl as both a winning coach and as a broadcaster.

PERSONALITY

Stram is in great demand as a speaker and travels countless miles during the off-season spreading the gospel of professional football. His hobbies include golf and paddle ball, both of which he plays exceptionally well.

Stram and his wife (Phyllis) have six children — Hank, Jr., 22; Dale, 21; Stu, 19; Julie, 18; Gary, 16; and Mary Nell, 14. The Stram family move into their new Covington, La., home in August.

HARRY HULMES

Vice President of Administration



A 20-year veteran of the National Football League, Harry Hulmes is one of its most highly-regarded executives.

Hulmes joined the Saints in 1970 as assistant to the general manager and director of public relations and was promoted to his present position in 1972. His duties include signing of veteran and rookie players, front office supervision

and liason with other NFL teams and NFL office.

A native of Philadelphia, Hulmes graduated from the University of Pennsylvania. He started in sports in 1954 as assistant business manager of the Baltimore Orioles, went to Bucknell University as sports information director in 1956 and joined the Baltimore Colts as director of public relations in 1958. Hulmes spent 12 years with the Colts and enjoyed two NFL championship seasons.

A Navy veteran, Hulmes and his wife, Barbara, reside in Metairie with their three children--Linda 22, Terry 18 and Richie 14.

EDDIE JONES

Vice President and Treasurer



Eddie Jones was promoted to vice president of the Saints in 1977.

Jones had served as treasurer since 1973 and business manager since joining the club in 1968. His executive ability has been sharpened by increasing responsibility in other Mecom financial enterprises as well as the Saints.

A native of Houston, Tex., Jones grew up in Louisiana in Denham Springs and was an all-state basketball player in high school. He graduated from LSU with a degree in accounting and worked for a New Orleans firm as a Certified Public Accountant before joining the Saints.

An Air Force veteran, Jones and his wife, Marilyn, have three children--Wendy 12, Todd 6 and Jeffery 4.

Coaching Staff



JOHN BEAKE, Offensive Backfield Coach

John Beake was the first assistant to be appointed by Hank Stram to his New Orleans staff in 1976.

Beake had served under Stram with the Kansas City Chiefs from 1968-74 and wears the 1970 Super Bowl Championship ring. In 1975 he was offensive coordinator at Colorado State University.

A native of Long Branch, N.J., Beake played center and tackle at Trenton State College. He earned a masters degree at Penn State and served as a graduate assistant to Coach Rip Engle. A successful high school head coaching record at Nyack, N.Y. (24-4-4 and three league titles) led to his big jump into pro football with the Chiefs.

Beake and his wife, Marcia, reside in Covington with their three children—Jerilyn 14, John 8 and Christopher 5.



BUCK BUCHANAN, Defensive Line Coach

After an outstanding 13-year career as a pro player, Buck Buchanan turned to coaching in 1976. Appropriately he joined the New Orleans staff of Hank Stram, his coach for 12 years with the Kansas City Chiefs.

A 6-foot-7, 275-pound powerhouse defensive tackle, Buchanan was selected to the All-American Football League team in 1967-68-69-70. He played in two Super Bowl games—the historic first against Green Bay in 1967 and Kansas City's upset of Minnesota in New Orleans in 1970. He was voted the Chiefs' most valuable player in 1965 and 1967. He was inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame in 1968.

Buchanan and his wife, Elizabeth, reside in River Ridge with their three children—Eric 14, Dwaine 13 and Nicole 8.



DEAN KLEINSCHMIDT, Trainer

Dean Kleinschmidt was appointed head trainer of the Saints in 1971 when he was only 23 years old. He had joined the club as assistant trainer in 1969.

A native of Morgan, Minn., Kleinschmidt attended the University of Indiana and was a student trainer and staff assistant trainer. Since joining the Saints, he has served annually with Senior Bowl teams and periodically with Super Bowl teams. In 1976, he toured Sweden lecturing on training.

Kleinschmidt and his wife, Dianne, live in Metairie.



DAN SIMMONS, Equipment Manager

Dan Simmons followed in his father's footsteps when he became equipment manager of the Saints in 1973. Bill Simmons is the equipment manager of the St. Louis Cardinals.

A graduate of Meramec College in St. Louis, Dan worked for the Cardinals for two years after four years of service in the Navy.

Simmons and his wife, Elaine, live in Kenner with their three children—Tracy 7, Tony 4 and Ann Marie 2.



ERBY AUCOIN, Director of Photography

Master photographer, carpenter and chef, Erby Aucoin is a member of the Saints staff since 1968.

A native of Napoleonville, La., Aucoin graduated from LSU into an award-winning newspaper and television photographer. He made the Saints the first NFL club to have its own complete film laboratory. He operates the equipment from a trailer at the team's Metairie clubhouse.

Aucoin and his wife, Rosalie, reside in River Ridge. Of their eight children, four are at home—Albert 16, Deidra 13, Michelle 9 and Douglas 7.



SILKY POWELL, Assistant Equipment Manager

Glennon Powell, better known as Silky, joined the Saints in 1975.

A native of New Orleans, Powell had worked in physical education with the New Orleans Recreation Department and at Redemptorist High School. He is single and resides in New Orleans.



DAVE MANN, Special Assistant

Dave Mann joined the Saints in 1976 as special assistant to the head coach.

A native of Chicago, Mann graduated from Arizona State, where as a student he was field announcer for the Oakland A's during spring training and a ticket salesman for the Phoenix hockey team. In 1975, he worked for the

Washington Redskins as a public relations assistant.

BOB WHITMAN, Director of Player Personnel



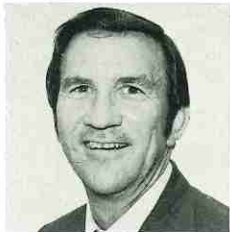
A native of New Orleans, Bob Whitman joined the Saints in 1968. From scout, he advanced to chief scout in 1971 and to his present position in 1974.

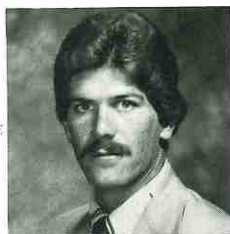
JERRY WYNN, Director of Public Relations

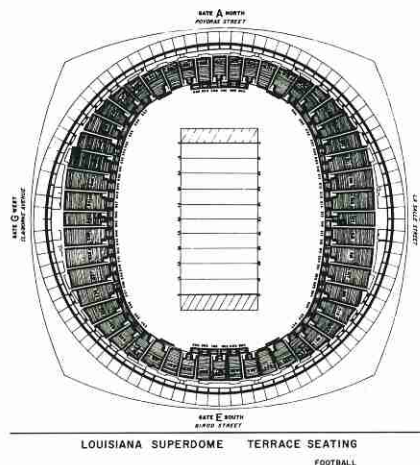
