TOM BENSON

Owner/General Partner



Tom Benson is accustomed to winning. Therefore, it was no surprise to him that his Saints turned the corner in 1987, making the playoffs and sporting one of the NFL's best won-lost records.

Winning in the world of business is a familiar posture for owner/general partner Tom Benson. Winning in the National Football League is a new challenge for the man that has made successful business after business with the same formula.

True to form, the Saints under Benson's tutelage entered a new era in 1987, that of the contender for which New Orleans and Louisiana have longed for 22 years.

"Saints fans have waited a long time for a winner in New Orleans," Benson said. "Not only were we a winner in 1987, but we will continue to build this organization until it is the very best in the NFL. Our jobs are not through yet.

"There is a difference between wanting to win and having to win," he explained. "In our case, we have to win. We have to put in the extra effort that leads to achievement. When you have to win, you really look for the extra things that can make you successful. We will continue to look for those things. We'll find them, too."

Longtime Benson associates will attest that he has built an empire from ground-zero with a roll-up-the-sleeves work ethic and a personal tenacity that makes things happen.

He demonstrated those qualities in the protracted negotiations in Spring, 1985, that led to the purchase of the franchise. Before the purchase was completed June 3, Benson had assembled a group of ten partners and formed a coalition of political, business and community figures. Through months of setbacks, he continued to orchestrate the monumental task of guiding the sale to completion, a goal that many, even some involved in the project, thought impossible.

Doing the seemingly impossible has long been a Benson trademark. He continues to move progressively ahead into the challenges of new business opportunites on many fronts.

Benson was born in New Orleans in 1927 and grew up on the edge of the city's sprawling 9th Ward. He was educated at St. Aloysius High School (now Brother Martin) and Loyola University. As a youngster, he played sandlot football at St. Roch Park and earned spending money delivering the Times Picayune newspaper.

After studying business and accounting at Loyola, the young Benson went to work as a bookkeeper for the Cathey Chevrolet Co. in New Orleans in 1948.

By 1956, at age 29, Benson was on his way to San Antonio, Texas to manage a Chevrolet dealership as a junior partner. Six years later he took full control of the dealership and established the Tom Benson Chevrolet Co. That acquisition, combined with Benson's confidence and determination, spawned what is today Benson Automotive World with 36 different franchises at 25 dealerships, 15 of which are in New Orleans, 10 in Texas. He currently serves on several advisory boards of General Motors Corporation.

He also has extensive real estate and banking interests, including the Pontchartrain Bank with 9 New Orleans-area offices.

Appreciative of the fact that New Orleans, its schools, business community and people gave him his start, Benson and his brothers, Jerome and Larry, established the Free Enterprise Resource Center at Brother Martin High School in honor of their parents, Tom Sr. and Carmen. He has also sponsored chairs in free enterprise at two universities, and is director of the chair at St. Mary's University.

He serves his college alma mater on the President's Council of Loyola University.

Benson has received many honors for his community and business achievements, a few of which are: American Tradition Award from the B'nai Brith Foundation of the United States; Reverend Jaques E. Yenni Award for Community Service from Loyola University; N.A.D.A. Northwood Institute Award for Outstanding Service to Education; Brotherhood Award of the National Conference of Christians and Jews; Order of St. Louis Medallion for dedication to church from the Archdiocese of New Orleans; 1986 Brother Martin High School Alumnus of the Year; Honorary Doctor of Science and Business from Cleary College (Ypsilanti, Michigan); Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters from Loyola University and is the American Import Auto Dealers Association Dealer of Distinction for 1988.

He is one of four children and the grandnephew of the late Herbert Benson, a local architect who helped design Tulane Stadium and was one of the founders of the annual Sugar Bowl football game.

In addition to his home in New Orleans, Benson also has a 2,000-acre ranch near that of the late president Lyndon Johnson, where he maintains a stable of race horses that carry his black and gold colors to several Louisiana tracks. Part of the ranch is a game preserve, a refuge for exotic deer, antelope and other species. He has also developed a prestigious herd of Angus cattle.

Benson and his wife, the former Grace Trudeau of New Orleans, share a family of six children: Rene LeBlanc, Tootsie Benson, Don Walker, Susan Stucke, Rick Walker and Marian Walker.

JIM FINKS

President/General Manager



In New Orleans, the presence of Jim Finks was never more apparent than in 1987, when the team broke through for its first-ever winning season and a playoff berth.

Such accomplishments are far from unfamiliar to the man that has had an instrumental part in the construction of five Super Bowl teams.

Jim Finks was named president and general manager of the Saints franchise Jan. 14, 1986, bringing with him a background of success as a player, coach, scout and administrator that spanned 37 years in sports.

In addition to his duties as head of the franchise, Finks is also part-owner of the team. His charge is to make the Saints a consistent winner. He has proven, with two other NFL franchises, and at various other stops, that he is capable of achieving that goal.

Taking over a team that had never appeared on the bright side of .500 in the National Football League had to be among the stiffest of challenges in sports. But in only Finks' second season, the Saints posted a 12-3 record, the second-best mark in the NFL.

In recognition of Finks' abilities and the advancement of the Saints under two short years of his leadership, he was selected by The Sporting News, Football News, and the Touchdown Club of Washington, D.C. as the NFL's Executive of the Year for 1987.

Solid, competitive teams are a Finks trademark. Give everyone in the organization a target. Build with an eye to the future. Minimize mistakes. Be patient, Don't look for the "quick fix." Keep focused on the ultimate goal.

During a ten-year association with the Minnesota Vikings, Finks brought that NFC Central club to the top of the professional game. He joined the Vikings in 1964 as general manager. He became vice president in 1969 and executive vice president, 1973. Upon arrival in Minnesota, Finks hired then-unknown Bud Grant to coach the Vikings. That was just one of many calculated moves that would take the team to two Super Bowls (Jan. 1970 and 1974) during Finks tenure, and establish the foundation for two more Vikings appearances in the title game. During his final four seasons with the Vikings (1970-73), the team achieved 47 victories. Following Minnesota's second Super Bowl appearance, Finks resigned.

In 1968, Finks had served on the first NFL negotiating committee that met with the players association. After leaving the Vikings, he served full-time with the NFL Management Council until his appointment to the staff of another NFL team.

Finks was named executive vice president, general manager and chief operating officer of the Chicago Bears just two days before the 1974 season opener.

The Bears situation was similar to that which he found on his arrival in Minnesota, a franchise with few accomplishments over several seasons. He spent that first season observing, evaluating and planning. By 1977, the Bears were in the playoffs for the first time since 1963.

Following the 1982 season, Finks moved from the Bears to the Chicago Cubs were he served as team president through the successful 1984 campaign for the National League East title.

In 1985 he served as a senior consultant with the Chicago-based public relations firm of Hill and Knowlton.

Finks entered the NFL as a rookie quarterback in 1949 from Tulsa University. The Steelers were the only team in the NFL to still employ the single wing, and Finks played defensive back until 1952 when Pittsburgh converted to the T-formation. Finks became the starting quarterback that year and went on to the Pro Bowl. He also played professional baseball, 1949-50.

He retired as an NFL player following the 1955 season and joined Notre Dame as backfield coach on Terry Brennan's staff.

He served as assistant coach and scout for Calgary in the CFL the following season and took over as general manager of the Stampeders in late 1957. He remained with the Stampeders until joining the Vikings in 1964.

A native of Salem, Ill., Finks was born Aug. 31, 1927. Finks and his wife Maxine reside in Metairie. They have four sons: Jim, David, Dan and Tom.

JIM MORA

Head Coach



Winner.

That's a one-word description of Jim Mora. It sizes him up well. But it in no way begins to tell the story of the most successful head coach in New Orleans Saints history.

Mora came to New Orleans in 1986, and went to work transforming the Saints into a team in his own image and likeness.

Determined. Tireless. Demanding. Thorough. Organized. Fair. Goal-oriented. Tough. Respected.

More descriptions of Mora, all as accurate as his aim on the task of making the Saints an

NFL force to be reckoned with ad infinitum.

To Saints fans, the 1987 season was a pleasing one; a nine-game winning streak, the first winning season, the second-best record in the NFL, a first-ever playoff berth.

Jim Mora was pleased, too. But he wasn't satisfied.

In keeping with a personal tradition to improve, Mora points to the next challenge with a rare enthusiasm exhibited by only the most successful of leaders. That simple progression of moving to the next task at hand has proven workable in both the college and USFL ranks, and the same has seen the Saints move from virtually nowhere to the upper echelon of the NFL in just two short seasons.

The Saints' on-field performance in 1987 earned Mora a clean sweep of Coach of the Year honors.

Mora brought impeccable credentials to New Orleans in 1986 as he embarked on his first year as an NFL head coach. He inherited a Saints team that needed many questions answered coming off a 5-11 slate in 1985. Systematically, he sought to answer those questions.

If 1986 was an indication of what to expect of the Saints, 1987 demonstrated

that things happen quickly where Mora is concerned.

"We have to continue to work hard," Mora said. "If we don't find a way to work harder, we will get left behind. The other teams in the NFL are working to get better. We have to work twice as hard as the good teams just to catch up."

As head coach of the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars 1983-85, Mora posted an astonishing 48-13-1 record, guided his team into the championship game all three years, won the league championship in 1984 and 1985 and was named coach of the year in 1984.

Those accomplishments, as well as his reputation as a hard-working, businesslike competitor, made Mora much in demand when NFL coaching openings were announced after the 1985 season. He had several offers to turn the fortunes of NFL clubs as head coach. But of four NFL openings for a head coach, Mora was attracted to New Orleans. He was one of eight candidates personally interviewed by president/general manager Jim Finks.

"I was impressed with the Saints ownership and organization, the plan for the franchise and the people," Mora said of his choice. "Mr. (Tom) Benson wants to

win, and he knows what it takes to be a winner. Jim Finks has a great track record in the NFL. There is a tremendous opportunity here in New Orleans."

Mora, 53, spent 23 years coaching in the college and professional ranks before embarking on his first experience as a pro head coach. In addition to his tenure as head coach of the Stars where he became the winningest coach in the league, he worked in seven different college and NFL organizations before join-

ing the Saints January 28, 1986.

A native of Los Angeles and the son of a television film editor, Mora played tight end and defensive end four years at Occidental College. His teammate and roommate, presidential candidate Jack Kemp, became a standout quarterback with the Buffalo Bills on his way to a career in public service. After completing his B.A. in physical education in 1957, Mora was assistant coach four years and head coach three years at his alma mater. He later earned a master's degree in education at USC.

In 1967, Mora joined John Ralston's staff at Stanford as linebackers coach. There he became friends with Dick Vermiel, quarterbacks and receivers coach on the same staff, who would later lead the Philadelphia Eagles to the Super

Bowl.

Ralston would later describe Mora as having "the executive ability to run General Motors."

After a single season at Stanford, Mora moved to the University of Colorado in 1968 where he coached all phases of defense in six years on Eddie Crowder's staff.

In 1974, Mora joined Vermiel, then head coach at UCLA, as linebackers coach.

The following season, Mora moved to Don James' staff at the University of Washington as defensive coordinator and served in that capacity three seasons before making the jump to the National Football League.

In 1978, Mora joined the Seattle Seahawks as defensive line coach and remained with the AFC club until 1982 when he was named defensive coordinator of the New England Patriots. Mora's defensive unit played a major role in the

Patriots' march to the playoffs that year.

In his first season with the Stars, 1983, Mora guided the team to a 16-4 record and a narrow miss in the league championship game, a loss to the Michigan Panthers, 24-22. The following year, Mora's team went 19-2 and defeated the Arizona Wranglers 23-3 for the title. Last season the team achieved a 13-7-1 mark and beat Oakland, quarterbacked by Bobby Hebert, now a Saint, for the championship, 28-24.

"I'm right where I want to be, right where I want to coach," said Mora. "And I like this challenge. We're not geniuses. I believe in working a football team as hard as we can. My job is to get the most out of our players, to get them to play

up to their potential."

Mora, born May 24, 1935 at Glendale, California, and his wife, Connie, have three sons: Jim (26), an assistant coach with the San Diego Chargers; Michael (24); and Stephen (20).

SAINTS RETIRED NUMBERS

Only two numbers on the Saints roster have been retired. Defensive end Doug Atkins, the former University of Tennessee all-American, joined the Saints in 1967 and retired in 1969. Jim Taylor, all-Pro running back, played in a Saints uniform in 1967. Both Atkins' no. 81 and Taylor's no. 31 are retired. Atkins and Taylor are members of the NFL's Hall of Fame.

1988 STAFF BIOGRAPHIES

JIM MILLER, Vice-President of Administration



Now in his third season with the Saints, Jim Miller joined the club from the NFL Management Council just prior to the start of the 1986 campaign.

Miller's responsibilities with the Saints include negotiating player contracts, overseeing all club administrative offices and serving as club liaison with the NFL and Management Council offices.

Miller started his professional career as a writer at the Louisville Courier Journal, 1970-71. He covered the NFL as a writer for the Baltimore Evening

Sun 1972-81.

Miller joined the Management Council as director of information. He was the NFLMC spokesman during the 1982 players' strike.

In 1983, he was appointed director of administration, advising clubs on contract matters, coordination of Management Council special projects, and various other duties.

A native of Clark Station, Kentucky, and graduate of the University of Kentucky, Miller also holds a master's degree from the University of Maryland. He and his wife, Bonnie, live in Mandeville with their daughter, Lindsay.

CARL SMITH, Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks



Under Carl Smith, the Saints scored the most points in club history, and led the NFL in time of possession in 1987.

Smith joined the Saints staff in 1986 from the staff of the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars. Smith directed the Stars' quarterbacks and wide receivers 1984-85 after a year as special teams coach.

Smith started his coaching career as graduate assistant at his alma mater, Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo in 1971. He moved to the University of Colo-

rado as graduate assistant in 1972, and earned his first fulltime post as line-backer coach for the Buffaloes in 1973 where he worked with Saints head coach Jim Mora.

In 1974, Smith joined the staff at the University of Southwestern Louisiana as defensive line coach. He coached defensive backs for the Ragin' Cajuns 1975-76, then switched to the offensive side of the ball as offensive coordinator 1977-78. He served at Lamar University 1979-81, and was named offensive coordinator at North Carolina State in 1982.

Smith was born April 26, 1948 at Wasco, California. He and his wife, Dianne, live in Kenner with their two sons, Tracy and Tyler.

STEVE SIDWELL, Defensive Coordinator/Inside Linebackers



Under Steve Sidwell, the Saints defense ranked fourth overall in the NFL, and were in the league's top five in 15 different statistical categories in 1987.

Sidwell begins his third season with the Saints. He came to New Orleans from the Indianapolis Colts, where he coached the defensive line in 1985.

All-conference at linebacker at the University of Colorado, Sidwell started his coaching tenure as linebacker coach 1966-73 at his alma mater, working there with Jim Mora. He moved to the

University of Nevada-Las Vegas, assuming the additional duties of defensive coordinator, 1974-75. In 1976, Sidwell was named defensive coordinator at Southern Methodist and held that post until 1981.

Sidwell's first pro coaching spot came in 1982-84, when he served as line-backer coach for the New England Patriots. The first season was served under Mora, the Patriots' defensive coordinator.

Born August 8, 1944 at Winfield, Kansas, Steve and his wife Katy have two sons, Brad and Scott. They live in Destrehan.

PAUL BOUDREAU, Offensive Line



Paul Boudreau is in his second season with the Saints after coming to New Orleans from the Edmonton Eskimos of the CFL.

A graduate of Boston College, Boudreau started his coaching career at Oxford High School in Boston, Massachusetts 1973-74. He moved to his alma mater as offensive line coach 1974-77. Stops at the University of Maine (1977-79), Dartmouth (1979-81), and Navy (1982) preceded his appointment to the Eskimos staff.

Boudreau and his wife, Joan have a son, Paul, and a daughter, Jill. They live in Destrehan.

DOM CAPERS, Defensive Backs



Under Dom Capers, the Saints led the NFL in interceptions following the 1987 season.

Capers is in his third season with the Saints, arriving after two seasons with Jim Mora at the USFL's Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars.

Lettering four years in football and baseball at Mount Union College, Capers opened his collegiate coaching career at Kent State as graduate assistant 1972-74. After a brief stint at the University of Washington in 1975, Capers accepted his first fulltime

post at the University of Hawaii, coaching defensive backs 1975-76.

Following tenure at San Jose State (1977), California (1978-79) and Tennessee (1980-81), Capers joined Earle Bruce's staff at Ohio State (1982-83). The Buckeyes made bowl appearances in both of Capers' seasons.

The Stars won the USFL championship game both of Capers' seasons coaching the defensive backs.

Capers was born August 7, 1950 at Cambridge, Ohio. He and his wife, Holly, live in Destrehan.

VIC FANGIO, Outside Linebackers



Vic Fangio is in his third season with the Saints, having joined Jim Mora in New Orleans from two seasons in the USFL.

Fangio, a graduate of East Stroudsburg University, started his coaching career at his high school alma mater, Dunmore High School, as linebacker coach in 1979. He was named defensive coordinator at Dunmore, serving in that capacity 1980-81. In 1982, Fangio worked as defensive coordinator at Milford Academy.

A year at the University of North Carolina coaching the defensive line preceded Fangio's appointment to the USFL Stars staff, where he served as defensive assistant and strength and conditioning coach.

Born August 8, 1958 at Dunmore, Pennsylvania, Fangio and his wife, Patty reside in Destrehan.

JOE MARCIANO, Tight Ends/Special Teams

Under Jim Skipper, the Saints' running game in 1987 ranked third in the NFL without a 1,000-yard rusher


Joining the Saints in 1986, Skipper coached running backs for the Stars 1983-85.

RULE CHANGES, 1988

The NFL competition committee has made the following changes in the playing rules for the 1988 season:

1. Permitted any player to bat, tip or deflect a pass in flight in any direction (including forward), while specifying that a pass in flight that is controlled or caught may only be thrown backward.

2. Reduced the penalty for running into the kicker from five yards and a first down to five yards only.

3. Clarified the intentional grounding rule.

4. Permitted consecutive time outs to be taken by opposing teams while reducing the length of the second time out to 40 seconds

5. Specified that only the fumbling player may advance a fumble during a try-for-point after touchdown.

6. Reduced the length of a team time out from one minute and 30 seconds to 40 seconds when television does not utilize the time out for commercial.

7. Established a standard system of two time intervals (45 seconds of 30 seconds) between plays.

8. Further clarified the pass interference rule.

CHRONOLOGY OF UNIFORM CHANGES

The following is a catalogue of uniform changes since the Saints' inception in 1966:

1967—Gold pants with black and white striping; black jerseys with gold numerals and white trim with white and gold piping on sleeves; white jerseys with gold numerals and black trim with black and gold piping on sleeves. Gold helmet with black Fleur-de-Lis on either side, and black and white striping down the middle.

1969—Preseason games only—Black helmets with gold Fleur-de-Lis on either side and gold and white striping down the middle. Helmets have been gold since.

1971-Color of the numerals changed. Black with gold trim on white jerseys and white with gold trim on black jerseys.

1975—Pants were changed from gold to white with black and gold strip-

1976-Black pants introduced to wear with white jerseys. Gold and white striping down the sides. Same white pants worn with black jerseys. Facemask changed from grey to black.

1983-Numbers changed to "San Diego-style" numerals. Thin border around the number with no direct contact between number and border. The second change was from socks with black and gold piping to solid black sock.

1985-Gold pants with wide solid black stripe. State/Fleur-de-Lis patch on side of pants. Jersey redesigned with TV numbers on shoulders, and State/Fleur-de-Lis on sleeve. Stripes on sleeve eliminated. Socks feature wide gold stripe in black background.

INSTANT REPLAY APPROVED FOR 1988

For the third consecutive year, NFL clubs have approved a limited system of Instant Replay on a one-year basis.

The system basically stays the same as in 1987 with the exception that the Replay Official will now be assigned to a regular officiating crew and will attend crew meetings the day before each game. League office personnel will no longer be used as Replay Officials. In 1987, there were 490 plays closely reviewed (defined as a contact to the field, but not necessarily stoppage of play). There were 57 reversals in 210 games for an average of one reversal in each four games. In 1986, there were 374 plays closely reviewed resulting in 38 reversals in 224 games.

In 1986, the system was approved by a 23-4-1 vote. In 1987, the vote was 21-7. In 1988, replay was cleared by a 23-5 margin.

The NFL has discussed Instant Replay in some degree or other since the early 1970s. The League experimented in 1976 and 1978 using two basic frameworks—an independent system using cameras, replay machines, and technicians separate from the network covering the game, and a "no frills" approach using existing television coverage.

In 1985, the NFL used the network feed of nine nationally televised preseason games to experiment with the basic system that later was adopted for 1986 and 1987. A total of 28 plays were examined closely in 1985 (17 confirmed call, 4 were inconclusive, 1 was reversed, and 6 had no replay shown).

What is the objective of this system?

The clubs feel that on certain plays the telecast viewed by the general public should be used to correct an indisputable error. The system will be used to reverse an on-field decision only when the Replay Official has indisputable visual evidence available to him that warrants the change.

Is the television network carrying the game part of the review process?

No. Although the Replay Official will be viewing the live network feed, there is no communication to television personnel as to what

plays to show or not to show.

What is the step-by-step procedure of play review?

The Replay Official will view game action and a play will be replayed immediately on one of the two monitors, while the other monitor continues to record the live feed.

The Replay Official makes a determination if further study of the play is needed. If not, there is no contact with the field and play continues without interruption.

If the Replay Official believes an error may have been made, the Umpire will be contacted via a headset.

The Replay Official will watch replay(s) on one or both monitors and complete his review within a reasonable period after the play is over.

The Replay Official will inform the Umpire of his decision, and the Referee will make the appropriate announcement on the wireless microphone.

The limited Instant Replay system concentrates on plays of possession or touching (e.g., fumbles, receptions, interceptions, mufts) and most plays governed by the sidelines, goal lines, end lines, and line of scrimmage (e.g., receiver or runner in or out of bounds, forward or backward passes, breaking the plane of the goal line).

However, the Instant Replay system will not include the following fouls: clipping: encroachment and offsides; grasp of facemask; false start; defensive pass interference; offensive pass interference; offensive holding and illegal use of hands; illegal batting or punching ball; illegal block on free kick or scrimmage kick; illegal crackback; illegal motion; illegal use of forearm or elbow; illegal use of hands by defense; illegally kicking the ball; illegally snapping the ball; intentional grounding: member of the punting team downfield early; illegal formation; palpably unfair act; piling on; roughing the passer; running into or roughing the kicker; striking, kicking, or kneeing; unnecessary roughness; unsportsmanlike conduct; and use of the helmet as a weapon.


