

TOM BENSON

Owner/General Partner



New Orleans and the Saints entered a new era in 1985. That was the year that Tom Benson obtained control of the state's NFL team.

Great things have been happening ever since.

In 1987, the Saints broke through for a first-ever winning record and playoff appearance. Last season, New Orleans again returned to the winning ways established a year earlier. The Saints, although missing the playoffs in a tiet-reaker, posted a 10-6 record, identical to the Super Bowl champion 49ers.

Tom Benson has many qualities that have made him successful in his numerous business interests. He utilized many of those qualities in the formation of his Saints team.

A solid businessman but unfamiliar with the operation of a professional sports franchise, Benson followed with the Saints his rule of thumb in the other businesses he controls — find capable people, give them the responsibility and authority, and let them perform. Enter Jim Finks to direct the transformation of the Saints into winners.

The rest is history, and more history is made each successful season.

"There is a difference between wanting to win and having to win," Benson explained. "In our case, we have to win. We have to put in the extra effort that leads to achievement. When you have to win, you really look for the extra things that can make you successful."

His peers are aware of his ability as a businessman. Despite his short tenure among the fraternity of NFL owners, Benson has been named as chairman for the league's most focal and influential group, the NFL's Finance Committee.

Longtime Benson associates will attest that he has built an empire from ground-zero with a roll-up-the-sleeves work ethic and a personal tenacity that makes things happen.

He demonstrated those qualities in the protracted negotiations in the Spring of 1985, that led to the purchase of the franchise. Before the purchase was completed June 3, Benson had assembled a group of ten partners and formed a coalition of political, business and community leaders. Through months of setbacks, he continued to orchestrate the monumental task of guiding the sale to completion, a goal that many, even some involved in the project, thought impossible.

Doing the impossible has long been a Benson trademark. He continues to move progressively ahead into the challenges of new business opportunities on many fronts.

Benson was born in New Orleans in 1927 and grew up on the edge of the city's sprawling 9th Ward. He was educated at St. Aloysius High School (now Brother Martin) and Loyola University. As a youngster, he played sandlot football at St. Roch Park and earned spending money delivering the Times Picayune newspaper.

After studying business and accounting at Loyola, the young Benson went to work as a bookkeeper for the Cathey Chevrolet Co. in New Orleans in 1948.

By 1956, at age 29, Benson was on his way to San Antonio, Texas to manage a Chevrolet dealership as a junior partner. Six years later he took full control of the dealership and established the Tom Benson Chevrolet Co. That acquisition, combined with Benson's confidence and determination, spawned what is today the Benson Automotive World, a multi-dealership organization based in New Orleans with outlets in San Antonio, Corpus Christi and Kerrville, Texas. He currently serves on several advisory boards of General Motors Corp.

He also has extensive real estate and banking interests, including the Pontchartrain Bank and its ten branches in the New Orleans area.

Appreciative of the fact that New Orleans, its schools, business community and people gave him his start, Benson and his brothers, Jerome and Larry, established the Free Enterprise Resource Center at Brother Martin High School in honor of their parents, Tom Sr. and Carmen. He has also sponsored chairs in free enterprise at two universities, and is director of the chair at St. Mary's University.

He serves his college alma mater on the President's Council of Loyola University. Benson has received many honors for his community involvement, a few of which are: American Tradition award from the B'nai Brith Foundation of the United States; Rev. Jaques E. Yenni Award for Community Service from Loyola University; N.A.D.A. Northwood Institute Award for Outstanding Service to Education; Brotherhood Award of the National Conference of Christians and Jews; Order of St. Louis Medallion for dedication to church from the Archdiocese of New Orleans; 1986 Brother Martin High School Alumnus of the Year; Honorary Doctor of Science and Business from Cleary College (Ypsilanti, Mich.), 1986; Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters from Loyola University, 1987, and an Honorary Doctor of Laws from the Northwood Institute in Dallas, 1989.

He is one of four children and the grandnephew of the late Herbert Benson, a local architect who helped design Tulane Stadium and was one of the founders of the annual Sugar Bowl football game.

In addition to his home in New Orleans, Benson also has a 2,000-acre ranch near that of the late president Lyndon Johnson where he maintains a stable of race horses that carry his black and gold colors to several Louisiana tracks. Part of the ranch is a game preserve, a refuge for exotic deer, antelope and other species. He has also developed a prestigious herd of Angus cattle.

Benson and his wife, the former Grace Trudeau of New Orleans, share a family of six children: Rene LeBlanc, Tootsie Benson, Donn Walker, Susan Stucke, Rick Walker and Mimi Walker.

JIM FINKS

President/General Manager



As an administrator in the sports world, Jim Finks is rivaled by few.

Testimony to that fact is his consideration by league owners as a candidate for football's highest office — that of NFL commissioner.

Jim Finks was named president and general manager of the Saints franchise Jan. 14, 1986, bringing with him a background of success as a player, coach, scout and administrator that spanned 37 years in sports.

Before his arrival, the Saints had not had a winning season. Under Finks, New Orleans has experienced two consecutive winning

campaigns, and has participated in a first-ever playoff game.

In 1987, the Saints posted a 12-3 record, second-best in the entire NFL, and

played in the NFC wild card game.

For his leadership of the Saints during the team's first winning season and playoff appearance, Finks was selected by The Sporting News, Football News, and the Touchdown Club of Washington, D.C. as the NFL's Executive of the Year for 1987.

Though the 1988 Saints had the same 10-6 record as NFC West counterparts San Francisco and the Rams, they missed the playoffs in a tiebreaker process.

The Saints have in the last three seasons become a team in the Finks mold,

and are well down the road to building a winning tradition.

During a ten-year association with the Minnesota Vikings, Finks brought that NFC Central club to the top of the professional game. He joined the Vikings in 1964 as general manager. He became vice president in 1969 and executive vice president, 1973. Upon arrival in Minnesota, Finks hired then-unknown Bud Grant to coach the Vikings. That was just one of many calculated moves that would take the team to two Super Bowls (Jan. 1970 and 1974) during Finks' tenure, and establish the foundation for two more Vikings appearances in the title game. During his final four seasons with the Vikings (1970-73), the team achieved 47 victories. Following Minnesota's second Super Bowl appearance, Finks resigned.

In 1968, Finks had served on the first NFL negotiating committee that met with the players association. After leaving the Vikings, he served full-time with the NFL Management Council until his appointment to the staff of another NFL team.

Finks was named executive vice president, general manager and chief operating officer of the Chicago Bears just two days before the 1974 season opener.

The Bears situation was similar to that which he found on his arrival in Minnesota, a franchise with few accomplishments over several seasons. He spent that first season observing, evaluating and planning. By 1977, the Bears were in the playoffs for the first time since 1963.

Following the 1982 season, Finks moved from the Bears to the Chicago Cubs were he served as team president through the successful 1984 campaign for the National League East title.


In 1985 he served as a senior consultant with the Chicago-based public relations firm of Hill and Knowlton.

Finks entered the NFL as a rookie quarterback in 1949 from Tulsa University. The Steelers were the only team in the NFL to still employ the single wing, and Finks played defensive back until 1952 when Pittsburgh converted to the T-formation. Finks became the starting quarterback that year and went on to the Pro Bowl. He also played professional baseball, 1949-50.

He retired as an NFL player following the 1955 season and joined Notre Dame as backfield coach on Terry Brennan's staff.

He served as assistant coach and scout for Calgary in the CFL the following season and took over as general manager of the Stampeders in late 1957. He remained with the Stampeders until joining the Vikings in 1964.

A native of Salem, Ill., Finks was born Aug. 31, 1927. Finks and his wife Maxine reside in Metairie. They have four sons: Jim, David, Dan and Tom.



JIM MORA

Head Coach



It's no accident that success has followed Jim Mora. From his USFL beginnings to three years at the helm of the Saints, Mora's teams have been recognized for their winning tradition and solid play.

His accomplishments with the Saints cannot be taken lightly, for he is the only coach in team history to post a career slate with more

wins than losses.

The Saints' first-ever winning season and playoff appearance came in 1987, when Mora led the team to a 12-3 record, second-best in the NFL, and a NFC wild-card playoff berth. New Orleans followed that with a 10-6 slate in

1988, narrowly missing another playoff spot.

The Saints' on-field performance in 1987 earned Mora a clean sweep of Coach of the Year honors.

Knowledge of the game is important for an NFL head coach, but history has proven that so much more is necessary to transform talent and hard work into success each Sunday in a competitive. balanced league.

Jim Mora has such qualities.

Organization, hard work, perseverance, character. These Mora traits serve him well as a head coach. Inkeeping with a personal tradition to improve, Mora points to the next challenge with a rare enthusiasm exhibited by only the most successful of leaders.

Mora brought impeccable credentials to New Orleans in 1986 as he embarked on his first year as an NFL head coach. He inherited a Saints team that needed many questions answered coming off a 5-11 slate in 1985. System-

atically, he sought to answer those questions.

In that first season, the Saints finished 7-9, respectable for a first-year coach and staff, but far below the standards set by Mora. In 1987, the landmark season in the Crescent City, the Saints had the longest winning streak in the NFL, nine games. That eclipsed the previous team record of three consecutive victories.

To follow the 1987 season with another solid year would prove that, finally, New Orleans had a contender in the NFL. Mora and his club posted a 10-6

record in 1988, identical to the league-champion 49ers.

"We've come a long way since that first season," Mora said. "But, it's not important where we've been at this point. It's where we're going.

"We want to be the best team in the NFL. To do that, we have to improve in every category — offense, defense, special teams, coaching, administration.

"In football, either a team gets better or it gets worse. There is no standing

still. We are working to get better."

As head coach of the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars 1983-85, Mora posted an astonishing 48-13-1 record, guided his team into the championship game all three years, won the league championship in 1984 and 1985 and was named coach of the year in 1984.

Those accomplishments, as well as his reputation as a hard-working, businesslike competitor, made Mora much in demand when NFL coaching openings were announced after the 1985 season. He had several offers to turn the fortunes of NFL clubs as head coach. But of four NFL openings for a head coach, Mora was attracted to New Orleans. He was one of eight candidates personally interviewed by president/general manager Jim Finks.

"I was impressed with the Saints ownership and organization, the plan for the franchise and the people," Mora said of his choice. "Mr. (Tom) Benson wants to win, and he knows what it takes to be a winner. Jim Finks has a great track

record in the NFL."

Mora spent 23 years coaching in the college and professional ranks before embarking on his first experience as a pro head coach. In addition to his tenure as head coach of the Stars where he became the winningest coach in the league, he worked in seven different college and NFL organizations before join-

ing the Saints January 28, 1986.

A native of Los Angeles and the son of a television film editor, Mora played tight end and defensive end four years at Occidental College. His teammate and roommate, presidential candidate Jack Kemp, became a standout quarterback with the Buffalo Bills on his way to a career in public service. After completing his B.A. in physical education in 1957, Mora was assistant coach four years and head coach three years at his alma mater. He later earned a master's degree in education at USC.

In 1967, Mora joined John Ralston's staff at Stanford as linebackers coach. There he became friends with Dick Vermeil, quarterbacks and receivers coach on the same staff, who would later lead the Philadelphia Eagles to the Super

Bowl.

Ralston would later describe Mora as having "the executive ability to run General Motors."

After a single season at Stanford, Mora moved to the University of Colorado in 1968 where he coached all phases of defense in six years on Eddie Crowder's staff.

In 1974, Mora joined Vermeil, then head coach at UCLA, as linebackers

The following season, Mora moved to Don James' staff at the University of Washington as defensive coordinator and served in that capacity three seasons

before making the jump to the National Football League.

In 1978, Mora joined the Seattle Seahawks as defensive line coach and remained with the AFC club until 1982 when he was named defensive coordinator of the New England Patriots. Mora's defensive unit played a major role in the

Patriots' march to the playoffs that year.

Mora in 1983 guided his first Stars team to a 16-4 record and a narrow miss in the league championship game, a loss to the Michigan Panthers, 24-22. The following year, Mora's team went 19-2 and defeated the Arizona Wranglers 23-3 for the title. In 1985 the team achieved a 13-7-1 mark and beat Oakland, quarter-backed by Bobby Hebert, for the championship 28-24.

"I'm right where I want to be, right where I want to coach," said Mora. "And I like this challenge. We have a tremendous opportunity here in New Orleans."

Already the most successful coach in team history, Mora has compiled a 29-19 (.604) record in his three years with the Saints, including one playoff game.

Born May 24, 1935 at Glendale, California, Mora and his wife, Connie, have three sons, Jim, an assistant coach with the San Diego Chargers, Michael and Stephen.

1989 STAFF BIOGRAPHIES

JIM MILLER, Vice-President of Administration



Now in his fourth season with the Saints, Jim Miller joined the club from the NFL Management Council just prior to the start of the 1986 campaign.

Miller's responsibilities with the Saints include negotiating player contracts, overseeing all club administrative offices and serving as club liaison with the NFL and Management Council offices.

Miller started his professional career as a writer

at the Louisville Courier Journal, 1970-71. He covered the NFL as a writer for the Baltimore Evening Sun 1972-81.

Miller joined the Management Council as director of information. He was the NFLMC spokesman during the 1982 players' strike.

In 1983, he was appointed director of administration, advising clubs on contract matters, coordination of Management Council special projects, and various other duties.

A native of Clark Station, Kentucky, and graduate of the University of Kentucky, Miller also holds a master's degree from the University of Maryland. He and his wife, Bonnie, live in Mandeville with their daughter, Lindsay.

BILL KUHÄRICH, Director of Player Personnel



Bill Kuharich in 1987 was presented the stiffest challenge of his football career, the assembly of a replacement squad. The group constructed by Kuharich and his staff posted a respectable 2-1 record, and kept the Saints in the thick of the division championship race until the end.

Kuharich joined the Saints in 1986 from the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars of the USFL as director of pro personnel. He was elevated to his

present position prior to the 1986 season.

A graduate of Middlebury College in Vermont, Kuharich started his football career as a graduate assistant coach at Brown University in 1976. His first fulltime post came as offensive backfield coach at Hawaii in 1977. Stops at Georgetown (1978), St. Lawrence (1979), and Columbia (1980) followed.

When the USFL started, Kuharich went to Philadelphia as administrative aide to the general manager. He was named assistant general manager/director of player personnel in 1983. The Stars played in all three of the league's championship games and won the USFL title twice.

Both college and pro scouting, professional league player movement and evaluation, and self-scouting are duties of Kuharich's position with the Saints.

Born March 25, 1953 in Skokie, Illinois, Kuharich is the son of the late Joe Kuharich, head coach at Notre Dame, the Washington Redskins and Philadelphia Eagles. Kuharich and his wife, Betsy, live in Destrehan.

CARL SMITH, Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks



Under Carl Smith, the Saints in 1987 scored the most points in club history, and led the NFL in time of possession. Last season, the team finished second in time of possession.

Smith joined the Saints staff in 1986 from the staff of the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars. Smith directed the Stars' quarterbacks and wide receivers 1984-85 after a year as special teams coach.

Smith started his coaching career as graduate assistant at his alma mater, Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo in 1971. He moved to the University of Colorado as graduate assistant in 1972, and earned his first fulltime post as linebacker coach for the Buffaloes in 1973 where he worked with Saints head coach Jim Mora.

In 1974, Smith joined the staff at the University of Southwestern Louisiana as defensive line coach. He coached defensive backs for the Ragin' Cajuns 1975-76, then switched to the offensive side of the ball as offensive coordinator 1977-78. He served at Lamar University 1979-81, and was named offensive coordinator at North Carolina State in 1982.

Smith was born April 26, 1948 at Wasco, California. He and his wife, Dianne, live in Kenner with their two sons, Tracy and Tyler.

SAINTS RETIRED NUMBERS

Only two numbers on the Saints roster have been retired. Defensive end Doug Atkins, the former University of Tennessee All-America, joined the Saints in 1967 and retired in 1969. All-Pro running back Jim Taylor played in a Saints uniform during the 1967 season. Both Atkins' no. 81 and Taylor's no. 31 are retired. Atkins and Taylor are both members of the NFL's Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio.

STEVE SIDWELL, Defensive Coordinator/Inside Linebackers



Under Steve Sidwell, the Saints defense last year ranked fourth in the entire NFL in points allowed (283).

Sidwell begins his fourth season with the Saints. He came to New Orleans from the Indianapolis Colts, where he coached the defensive line in 1985.

All-conference at linebacker at the University of Colorado, Sidwell started his coaching tenure

as linebacker coach 1966-73 at his alma mater, working there with Jim Mora. He moved to the University of Nevada-Las Vegas, assuming the additional duties of defensive coordinator, 1974-75. In 1976, Sidwell was named defensive coordinator at Southern Methodist and held that post until 1981.

Sidwell's first pro coaching spot came in 1982-84, when he served as linebacker coach for the New England Patriots. The first season was served under Mora, the Patriots' defensive coordinator.

CHRONOLOGY OF UNIFORM CHANGES

The following is a catalogue of uniform changes since the Saints' inception in 1966:

1967 — Gold pants with black and white striping; black jerseys with gold numerals and white trim with white and gold piping on sleeves; white jerseys with gold numerals and black trim with black and gold piping on sleeves. Gold helmet with black Fleur-de-Lis on either side, and black and white striping down the middle.

1969 — For preseason games exclusively — Black helmets with gold Fleur-de-Lis on either side and gold and white striping down the middle. Helmets have been gold ever since.

1971 — The color of the numerals changed. Black with gold trim on white jerseys and white with gold trim on black jerseys.

1975 — Pants were changed from gold to white with black and gold striping.

1976 — Black pants were introduced to be worn worn with white jerseys. Gold and white striping down the sides. Same white pants worn with the black jerseys. The facemask changed from grey to black.

1983 — Numbers changed to "San Diego-style" numerals. Thin border around the number with no direct contact between the number and the border. The second change was from socks with black and gold piping to solid black.

1986 — Gold pants with wide solid black stripes were initiated. The state Fleur-de-Lis patch appears on either side of the pants. The jersey was redesigned with TV numbers on the shoulders, and the state Fleur-de-Lis on either sleeve. The stripes on the sleeves were eliminated. The socks feature a wide gold stripe on a black background.

1989 NFL Rules Changes

Instant Replay will return for the 1989 NFL season.

At the NFL annual meeting in March at Palm Desert, California, club owners, for the fourth consecutive year, voted to utilize a limited Instant Replay system as an officiating aid. The vote was 24-4.

Replay was first adopted in 1986. It is used if there is indisputable visual evidence on videotape of an obvious error by a field official on plays limited to possession and goal line and out-of-bounds decisions.

The Replay system in 1989 remains the same as the 1988 version when the Instant Replay official was assigned to work with the same seven-man, on-the-field crew throughout the regular season.

In other action, a joint proposal by the Long-Range Planning and Finance committees regarding player personnel also was adopted. The committees' recommendation for the first time sets offseason roster limits and the creation of a developmental squad. It also addressed roster cutdown dates and injured reserve. The teams agreed:

Until May 31: No more than 90 players under contract.

- —June 1: No more than 80 players under contract.
- Roster cutdown to 60 players after third preseason game (August 29).
- Roster cutdown to 47 players Monday (September 4) prior to regular-season opener.
- Regular-season game roster of 45 players plus two inactive.
- —Developmental squad of six players maximum per club established after final cut to 47 and comprised of only rookies/first-year players who have passed through waivers.
- Players placed on injured reserve during the preseason may not return to same club that year; also may not practice.
- Players placed on injured reserve after the final cut may return after six games by free reactivation (each club has five) or procedural-recall waivers.
- —Two practice options: Option 1: After four weeks on injured reserve, player can practice for two weeks, then club must

waive or activate; Option 2: After six weeks on injured reserve, player can be activated, waived, or begin unlimited practice. If practicing, player must count against developmental squad total of six.

Also, the clubs approved the following:

- —Further clarified the roughing-thepasser rule by prohibiting a defender who has an unrestricted path to the quarterback from flagrantly hitting him in the area of the knees when approaching from any direction.
- —Specified that fouls which occur in the last five minutes of the fourth quarter as well as the last two minutes of the first half will result in the clock starting on the snap.
- Called for strong disciplinary measures against feigned injuries.
- —Any entering substitute who participates in a play must enter while the ball is dead and must move onto the field as far as the inside field numerals; in addition, the player or players replaced must have cleared the field on their own side (between end lines) prior to the snap or free kick.
- —Established a new set of procedures, including loss of team timeouts or a fiveyard penalty on the defense, to handle the problem of crowd noise which prevents the offense from hearing its signals.
- —Further liberalized blocking rule to permit a blocker to initially contact on or outside the opponent's frame of the body so long as the blocker works to bring his hands back on or inside the frame after initial contact.
- —Changed the simultaneous catch rule so that the offensive or defensive player who first controls and continues to maintain control of a pass will be awarded the ball even though his opponent later establishes joint control of the ball.
- —Prohibited the offense, while in the process of substitution or simulated substitution, from rushing quickly to the line and snapping the ball with the obvious attempt to cause a defensive foul. In such an instance, the umpire shall hold the snap, giving the defense a reasonable time to complete its substitution or if a defensive foul results, the flag will be picked up and the down replayed.




SAINTS ON PRESEASON TELEVISION
