WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2000

- * If the **Saints** win 8 games in 2000, they will have 200 all-time wins.
- * **DE Joe Johnson** needs 8 sacks to move into 10th place all-time with the **Saints**. He currently has 29.5 sacks 169 yards lost, which is 7.5 sacks behind Bob Pollard (1971-77), who had 37 sacks.
- * If **TE Cameron Cleeland** leads the **Saints** in receptions in 2000, he will become the first tight end in team history to do so twice.
- * If **T William Roaf** appears in all 16 contests, he will move into 18th place on the **Saints** all-time list of games played with 124.
- * If **Roaf** is named to the 2000 Pro Bowl, he will become the 1st **Saints** player to have been voted to seven overall, surpassing K Morten Andersen and LB Rickey Jackson, each of who were voted six times.
- * **WR Jake Reed** needs 14 receptions for 400 career.
- * **Reed** needs 876 receiving yards for 7,000 career.
- * If **CB Steve Israel** appears in 7 games in 2000, he will have appeared in 100 career.
- * **QB Jeff Blake** needs 7 touchdown passes to reach 100 for his career.
- * **Blake** needs 3 rushing yards for 1,500 career.
- * **Blake** needs 256 completions for 1,500 career.
- * If **K Doug Brien** appears in 6 contests in 2000, he will have appeared in 100 career.
- * **Brien** needs 14 PAT's for 200 career.
- * **LB Mark Fields** needs 43 tackles to have 500 career.
- * If **TE Andrew Glover** appears in 12 games, he will have appeared in 150 career.
- * If **S Darren Perry** appears in 15 contests in 2000, he will have appeared in 125 career games.

- * **QB Billy Joe Tolliver** needs 109 completions for 1,000 career.



THE FLEUR DE LIS

The Fleur de Lis, the emblem that the Saints wear on their helmets, is a symbol from the Court of Louis XIV. It is a French word that stands for "flower of the lily."

The Fleur de Lis is a symbol of New Orleans which was adopted during the French occupation of Louisiana, from 1682 through 1762.

Traditionally, it has been used to represent French royalty, and in that sense it is said to signify perfection, light, and life.

Due to its three "petals," the fleur-de-lis has also been used to represent the Holy Trinity.



TOM BENSON

Owner


Entering his 16th season as owner of the New Orleans Saints, Tom Benson remains one of the National Football League's most widely respected and influential leaders. Benson has built his NFL reputation through a record of accomplishments and service to the league and his community. Benson's involvement in the NFL began innocently in 1984 when he learned that the Saints were about to be sold to out-of-town interests that would move the team from New Orleans. Benson understood the economic impact and general importance of the franchise to the city. In 1985, Benson spearheaded the effort to save the franchise from leaving the city. On May 31, 1985, ownership of the Saints was officially transferred to Benson. Prior to his ownership, the Saints had not had a winning season nor had they won a divisional title. Just two seasons after taking over the ownership of the franchise, Benson's success and leadership in his previous endeavors paid dividends with the Saints. In 1987, the Saints posted a 12-3 record, finishing second in the NFC West and earning the franchise's first playoff appearance. In 1990, the Saints once again finished second in the NFC West earning its second playoff appearance. The following year, the Saints won the NFC West. During that time, Benson identified the right ingredients to bring the city its first winning team.

On December 7, 1999, Benson promised Saints fans "to take whatever steps necessary to reestablish the Saints as a winning franchise". On January 5, 2000, he took his boldest step as owner as the restructuring of the organization began immediately with the search for a new General Manager and Head Coach as he once again reiterated his pledge to "reestablish the Saints as a winning franchise."

In subsequent weeks, Benson fulfilled his promise by hiring Randy Mueller to lead the football operations, Arnold D. Fielkow to lead the business operations and Head Coach Jim Haslett to lead the team on the field. The end result has been one of the most productive and busiest offseasons in the team's history. The Saints are now widely considered one of the most improved teams in the league based on the moves Tom Benson implemented.

Above and beyond his leadership with the Saints, Benson's vision has paid dividends for the city of New Orleans. During his tenure as Saints owner, the city has hosted three of eight Super Bowls and most recently he spearheaded the efforts to secure the Super Bowl for New Orleans in the year 2002, a windfall for the city of New Orleans and the surrounding region totaling well into the hundreds of millions of dollars in economic impact.

Benson has played an important role within the NFL community. He is a member of the league's Finance committee, a member of the Audit committee, International committee and the NFL's Legislative committee.



He was a leader in the process that expanded the league to include the Charlotte and Jacksonville franchises and he negotiated the most recent contract to extend the services of Commissioner Paul Tagliabue.

Benson was born in New Orleans in 1927 and grew up on the edge of the city's sprawling 9th Ward. One of four children of Tom Sr. and Carmen Benson, he was educated at St. Aloysius High School (now Brother Martin) and Loyola University. As a youngster, he played football for St. Roch Park and earned spending money delivering the Times-Picayune newspaper.

In 1945, Benson served in the U.S. Navy aboard the U.S.S. South Dakota and has remained particularly close to this branch of our armed forces. He is the only enlisted man to ever serve on the Board of Trustees of the Pensacola Naval Museum, and most recently was honored with an award from the crew of the submarine U.S.S. Louisiana. Upon his return, he began to pursue his studies in business and accounting at Loyola, after

which he went to work as a bookkeeper for the Cathey Chevrolet Co. in New Orleans in 1948.

By 1956, at age 29, Benson was on his way to San Antonio, Texas to manage a Chevrolet dealership as a junior partner. Six years later he took full control of the company and established the Tom Benson Motor Company. That acquisition spawned what became Benson Automotive World, a multi-dealership organization with 33 franchises and outlets in New Orleans, San Antonio and Corpus Christi. In 1972, Benson entered the banking business and eventually took his banking network public as Benson Financial World. Throughout the mid-90's, Benson sold the majority of his businesses in Texas and Louisiana to concentrate fully on operating the New Orleans Saints.

Appreciative of New Orleans' schools, business community and people, Benson and his brothers, Jerome and Larry, established the Free Enterprise Resource Center at Brother Martin High School in honor of their parents. He has endowed chairs in free enterprise at St. Mary's University and banking at Incarnate Word College. He served on the President's Council of Loyola University, his alma mater.


Community service to at-risk youth has been a hallmark of Benson's tenure as team owner. A few examples have included: Benson Hoops, the often emulated midnight basketball program in the inner city; Saints Flag Football in New Orleans middle schools; the Saints Venture Fund & Impact Grants program in conjunction with United Way and a Play Football program for underprivileged kids. He has guided the Saints' support of football at all levels in the region, from playgrounds through high school and college programs to the Sugar Bowl and Bayou Classic. On April 11, 2000, Benson was recognized by the Nokia Sugar Bowl Chapter of the National Football Foundation and the College Hall of Fame with the Distinguished American Award.

Benson has received several honors for his community involvement, a few of which are: American Tradition Award from the B'nai Brith Foundation of the U.S.; Rev. Jacques E. Yenni Award for Community Service from Loyola University; N.A.D.A. Northwood Institute for Outstanding Service to Education; Brotherhood Award of the National Conference of Christians and Jews; Order of St. Louis Medallion for Dedication to Church from the Archdiocese of New Orleans; 1986 Brother Martin Alumnus of the Year; Insigne Verbum Award from Incarnate Word College; Honorary Doctor of Science and Business from Cleary College; Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters from Loyola University; and Honorary Doctor of Laws from Northwood University. His continued generosity to Loyola University was made evident on October 15, 1999, when the Gregory R. Choppin Chemistry Wing was dedicated. Benson led the \$2 million renovation of the project and dedication with a cash donation of \$550,000 and then matched subsequent corporate donations.

Benson additionally spearheaded the effort to establish a one million dollar Jim Finks Chair at the Louisiana State University School of Medicine. With his encouragement, NFL owners and NFL Charities contributed to the endowment of the chair. The Jim Finks Chair was established to promote optimal sports performance in athletes at all levels.

Under his ownership, the New Orleans Saints have been recognized in 1998 and 1999 as one of the top-five most charitable professional organizations by the World Sports Humanitarian Hall of Fame.

Benson and his wife, the former Grace Trudeau of New Orleans, share a family of five children: Renee, Donn, Susan, Rick and Mimi, plus six grandchildren.

RANDY MUELLER

General Manager of Football Operations



Randy Mueller was named General Manager of Football Operations for the Saints on January 27, 2000. He oversees all aspects of the Saints football operations which includes coaching, college and professional scouting, contract negotiations, player programs, athletic training, video, equipment and all other football-related matters.

Since joining the Saints, Mueller has revitalized the organization and set in place a plan to insure the future success of the franchise. He named Jim Haslett, a successful defensive coordinator with the Pittsburgh Steelers, as Head Coach on February 3. Mueller then turned

his sights on the Saints roster and bolstered the team with several acquisitions. Identifying the need for a quarterback, he signed Jeff Blake within one hour of the start of the free agent period. On offense, he landed WRs Jake Reed and Joe Horn and TE Andrew Glover. On defense, he signed LB Charlie Clemons, who was a key member of the Super Bowl champion St. Louis Rams, and DT Norman Hand from San Diego. He also resigned unrestricted free agent offensive lineman Tom Ackerman to start at the left guard spot next to perennial Pro Bowler William Roaf.

Mueller then continued his overhaul of the franchise as he presided over the Saints selections in the NFL Draft. He addressed the need for a key defensive lineman with the selection of DE Darren Howard in the second round as part of nine picks overall.

Mueller came to New Orleans from the Seattle Seahawks, where he spent the last 17 seasons, most recently as the team's Vice President/Football Operations from June 1, 1995 until his appointment with the Saints. In his tenure with the Seahawks, he managed the club's football operations including player personnel, scouting and contract negotiations. He joined the Seahawks in June, 1983, as an assistant in pro personnel and was promoted to pro personnel director in 1990.

While Mueller was with Seattle, the franchise won the AFC Western Division title in 1999 and made their first playoff appearance since 1988. During this time, he was responsible for bringing starters WR Joey Galloway, T Walter Jones, G Pete Kendall, DE Phillip Daniels, LB Anthony Simmons and CB Shawn Springs to the Seahawk lineup. Jones was a starter on the 2000 AFC Pro Bowl team, the first offensive lineman in Seattle history to be selected to the game. Springs was a member of the 1998 AFC Pro Bowl team after posting seven interceptions during the season.

Active in the free agent market, Mueller brought Pro Bowlers RB Ricky Watters and LB Chad Brown and C Kevin Glover to Seattle. The acquisition of Brown in 1997 paid dividends as he led the team in tackles in each of the past three seasons and was a Pro Bowl selection in 1998 and 1999.

Other free agents acquired by Mueller in Seattle were CB Willie Williams, who has 372 tackles and 16 interceptions in his seven-year career, G Brian Habib, who started every game for the Seahawks in the past two seasons, and S Darryl Williams, a 1997 AFC Pro Bowl choice who played in all but three games in his eight-year NFL career.

As a college quarterback, Mueller had a stellar four-year career at Linfield College in McMinnville, Oregon. As a senior, he led Linfield to the 1982 NAIA Division II National Championship. In the title game against William Jewell College, he led the Wildcats to a 33-15 victory and was selected the game's most valuable offensive player. He was also the offensive MVP in Linfield's semifinal victory over Westminster College.

While at Linfield, he earned honorable mention Little All-America honors from the Associated Press and was an all-District and all-Northwest Conference award winner.

A native of St. Maries, Idaho, Mueller was a three-sport athlete (football, basketball and baseball) at St. Maries High School.

He and his wife, Lori, have a daughter, Riley. His brother, Rick, is Director of Player Personnel for the Saints organization.

ARNOLD D. FIELKOW

Director of Administration



Arnold D. Fielkow joined the New Orleans Saints in January 2000, assuming responsibilities as Director of Administration. In this capacity, he serves as the Saints' top senior management official on the administrative/business side and oversees all aspects of administration: marketing, finance, governmental affairs and public relations.

He most recently was President and General Counsel of the Southern League of Professional Baseball Clubs. During his six-year tenure, Fielkow oversaw the construction and renovation of six new ballparks and introduced marketing and business programs which catapulted the Southern League into one of the most respected leagues within

Minor League Baseball. Through Fielkow's programs, franchise values appreciated by nearly 100%. Fielkow was also elected to serve as President of Minor League Baseball's Double A Association in 1996, an office he held from 1996-98.

Before his Southern League career, Fielkow served for three years as Deputy Commissioner and General Counsel of the Continental Basketball Association, the official developmental league of the National Basketball Association. During his tenure, he negotiated new player and referee developmental agreements with the NBA and helped the League reach record attendance levels. He also introduced and/or administered new programs throughout the League, including a national television agreement with ESPN2, a CBA national radio contract, and a multi-game exhibition series involving former Lakers' great Magic Johnson. Fielkow also presided over the CBA's international department which over a three year period generated nearly \$1 million in revenue through player contract assignments. He was also elected to the Board of Directors of USA Basketball during his CBA tenure.

Before joining the CBA, Fielkow served as Commissioner of the NCAA Division I North Star Conference (currently the Mid-Continent Conference). The Chicago-based conference was the last all-female conference at the Division I level. Fielkow was successful in securing the conference's first-ever automatic bid to the NCAA Division I basketball tournament.

Fielkow began his professional career as a practicing attorney in Chicago, and eventually co-founded suburban Chicago law firm of Grossman, Solomon & Fielkow, P.C. This firm concentrated its practice in the areas of sports, insurance, banking and real estate law. Fielkow is a member of the Illinois and Wisconsin Bar Associations, as well as the Sports Lawyers' Association and American Bar Association's Forum Committee on the Entertainment and Sports Industries. He has authored several legal and sports-related articles/publications, including Civil Rico: The Insurers Fight Back and CBA: A World of Opportunity, and served as the lead counsel in several federal and state appellate cases.

A native of Appleton, Wisconsin, Fielkow is a 1981 graduate of the University of Wisconsin – School of Law and earned his B.A. degree with honors from Northwestern University. In 1978, Fielkow was selected as a member of the prestigious Phi Beta Kappa honorary society and has been presented with a "Who's Who" citation recognizing his achievements.

He is an avid sports fan, having played tennis on the collegiate level and was selected to the silver-medal winning United States men's basketball team at the 15th Maccabiah Games in Israel.

He and his wife, Dr. Susan Fielkow, have three sons, Justin, Michael and Steven.


In his job with the Saints, Bailey is responsible for scouting and evaluating talent on the Saints and around the National Football League, as well as the NFL Europe League.



JIM HASLETT

Head Coach



Jim Haslett was named the 13th head coach of the Saints on February 3, 2000, following three seasons as the defensive coordinator of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Haslett, a 16-year veteran of the NFL as a player and coach, played a major role in the Steelers being one of the most dominating defensive units in the NFL, allowing just seven 100-yard individual rushing performances during the regular season in the past three years, including just two from 1997-98.

Prior to joining the Steelers, Haslett spent two seasons with the Saints. He worked as the linebackers coach in 1995, and was promoted to the defensive coordinator position in 1996. Haslett's NFL coaching career began in 1993 with the Los Angeles Raiders, where he served two seasons as Art Shell's linebackers' coach.

In his first season in Pittsburgh in 1997, the Steelers finished 6th in the NFL in total defense, including 1st against the rush (82.4 yards a game). The Steeler defense was tied for 1st in the AFC in takeaways (34), 2nd in interceptions (20), and tied for 2nd in sacks (48). Three Steeler defenders were named to the Pro Bowl on the 1997 squad. Nose tackle Joel Steed earned his first Pro Bowl berth, as he served as a neutralizing force along the Steelers 3-4 defensive front, perennial Pro Bowl safety Carnell Lake made his fourth Pro Bowl that season, leading the team in sacks with six, and linebacker Levon Kirkland returned to the Pro Bowl for the second consecutive year, producing a team-high 126 tackles (95 solo), and 5.0 sacks.

Haslett's 1998 Steeler defense finished 12th in total defense (13th and 18th versus the rush and pass respectively). Under Haslett's tutelage, Kirkland produced the highest tackle total (137) of his career, and Jason Gildon's 11.0 sacks were tied for the 4th highest total in the AFC. Pittsburgh was 11th overall in 1999; 26th against the run, and 4th against the pass. Haslett once again helped produce outstanding seasons out of his linebacker corps. Earl Holmes had a career high 144 tackles (109 solo). Levon Kirkland was named the team's Most Valuable Player for the second consecutive year with a 123 tackle effort. Jason Gildon led the team in sacks for the second consecutive year with 8.5.

During his tenure in New Orleans from 1995-96, Haslett guided a young defensive unit that blossomed from a 25th and 22nd ranking in 1994 and 1995, respectively, to 13th in his first full season as defensive coordinator, including 3rd against the pass (177.1 yards a game), and 4th in the NFC in sacks (41). In 1996, Saints' linebackers Winfred Tubbs and Mark Fields produced breakout years, leading the team with 115 and 112 tackles, respectively. Defensive end Joe Johnson also saw his best season as a professional up to that date, registering 59 tackles (50 solo), 7.5 sacks for 33 yards lost and three forced fumbles.

During his tenure with the Los Angeles Raiders from 1993-94 as linebackers coach, Haslett helped the Raiders to a top-10 ranking in the NFL in total defense during both seasons (10th-1994, including 9th against the rush, 9th-1993, including 5th against the pass). In 1993, the Raiders finished with a 10-6 record, while current Saints defensive assistant/quality control coach Winston Moss had his best season to date under Haslett with 102 tackles, making him the Raiders leading tackler. In 1994, middle linebacker Greg Biekert led the Raiders in tackles with 99 in his first season as a starter, while Rob Fredrickson was named an All-Rookie team selection for his 94 tackle effort.

From 1991-92, Haslett was the defensive coordinator for the Sacramento Surge of the World League. In 1992, the Surge won the WLAF championship. In Sacramento, Haslett helped develop defensive end Michael Sinclair, who became one of the dominant pass rushers in the NFL with the Seattle Seahawks.

Haslett started his coaching career in 1988, handling the linebackers at the University of Buffalo. He was promoted to defensive coordinator in 1989 and served in that capacity for two years.

Haslett was chosen in the second round of the 1979 NFL Draft by the Buffalo Bills. His playing career spanned nine seasons, including the first eight with the Bills. In 1979, Haslett was named All-Rookie and was the Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year. He was voted to the Pro Bowl in 1980 and 1981. Haslett concluded his NFL career in 1987 with the New York Jets.

A four-time All-American as a defensive end at the Indiana University of Pennsylvania (1975-78), Haslett graduated with a bachelor's degree in elementary education.

Born Dec. 9, 1955 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, Haslett and his wife, Beth, have two daughters, Kelsey and Elizabeth, and a son, Chase.



MIKE McCARTHY, Offensive Coordinator



Mike McCarthy enters his first season as an offensive coordinator in the NFL after spending 1999 with the Green Bay Packers as their quarterbacks' coach. McCarthy brings 14 years of coaching experience to the post with an extensive background working in offenses that place a premium on the passing game and precision quarterback play.

While coaching the quarterbacks in 1999, the Packers ranked 7th overall in passing and 9th overall in total offense in the NFL with QB Brett Favre passing for 4,091 yards, his third season of 4,000 or more passing yards, one of only four quarterbacks to do so in NFL history. Under McCarthy's guise, Favre also recorded six 300-yard plus passing games, second best behind Rams QB Kurt Warner (9) in the NFL in 1999. Favre also extended his NFL record for most consecutive seasons completing 300 or more passes in 1999 (8).

Prior to working with the Packers, McCarthy worked for the Kansas City Chiefs for six years. In his last four years with the Chiefs (1995-98), he served as quarterbacks' coach. His signal callers surrendered only 52 interceptions, the lowest total in the AFC and the second lowest in the NFL overall. Using three different starting quarterbacks (Steve Bono, Elvis Grbac, and Rich Gannon); the Chiefs played to a 42-22 record during those four seasons. McCarthy's first two years with the Chiefs were spent as offensive assistant/quality control, again working with Chiefs quarterbacks, Hall of Famer Joe Montana and Dave Krieg.

Before joining the Chiefs, McCarthy coached at the University of Pittsburgh from 1989-92 under then head coach Paul Hackett. He spent his first three years coaching quarterbacks, before heading up the wide receivers in 1992. During his stay at Pittsburgh, McCarthy oversaw the progress of Alex Van Pelt, who graduated as Panthers' record-holder for passing yards for season (3,163 in 1992) and career (11,267); in passes attempted and completed for season (245 of 407 in 1992) and career (867 of 1,503), all records previously held by Dan Marino for ten years. McCarthy embarked upon his coaching career in 1987, tutoring linebackers at Fort Hays (Kan.) State.

A collegiate tight end, McCarthy was a two-time all conference selection (1985-86) at Baker University in Baldwin City, Kan. McCarthy captained the school's 1986 team, an NAIA Division II National Championship runner-up.

RON ZOOK, Defensive Coordinator



Ron Zook enters his first year as a defensive coordinator in the NFL. He comes to the Saints after spending the 1999 season with the Kansas City Chiefs, where he coached the defensive backs. Prior to the 1999 season, he spent 1996-98 as the special teams coach for the Pittsburgh Steelers.

In 1999, the Chiefs led the NFL with a +21 turnover ratio and ranked 2nd in the league with 45 takeaways after posting just a +1 mark in takeaways in 1998. The Chiefs defensive backs recorded six defensive touchdowns as part of their NFL-leading nine on the year. The Chiefs defense posted 25 INTs, which included a stretch of 11 straight games with an interception for the first time since 1986, and had two or more picks in eight of the team's 16 regular season games. Chiefs cornerback James Hasty finished tied for the NFL lead in interceptions with 7 (98 yards), while his counterpart Cris Dishman finished tied for sixth in the AFC with 5 (95 yards).

During his three years with the Steelers, Zook's squad did not suffer a single blocked punt, and finished 1998 as the NFL's 3rd best kickoff coverage group, permitting just 18.9 yards per return.

While Zook was successful overseeing the Steelers' special teams, coaching defense is truly his forte, highlighted by a distinguished five year career (1991-95) at the University of Florida. As the Gators' defensive coordinator from 1991-93, Florida ranked fifth in the nation in rushing defense in 1993 and ninth in 1991. In addition to coaching linebackers in 1994, Zook served as Florida's special teams

coordinator and his squad responded by recording a school-record five blocked punts, two of which were returned for TDs. In 1995, he added the titles of associate head coach and strong safeties coach, while resuming his role as Florida's defensive coordinator, helping the Gators march to a third straight SEC crown.

Prior to his stint at Florida, Zook spent 1988-90 as defensive backs coach under John Cooper at Ohio State. Prior to a one year stint as defensive coordinator/assistant head coach for Virginia Tech in 1987, he coached defensive backs from 1984-86 under Johnny Majors at Tennessee. Zook also had stints as defensive coordinator for Kansas (1983) and Cincinnati (1981-82), after coaching defensive backs for Murray State (1978-80). Zook enjoyed a stellar career as a defensive back for Miami (Ohio) from 1972-75.



RICK VENTURI, Assistant Head Coach/Secondary



Rick Venturi brings with him 18 years of experience as a position coach, coordinator, assistant head coach, and head coach in the NFL, with three of the four coming at some point with the Saints.

In 2000, Venturi returns to coach the Saints secondary, a position he coached in 1998. Under his tutelage, the Saints secondary scored five of the team-record nine defensive touchdowns, and posted 20 of the Saints 21 interceptions on the season. In 1999 as linebackers coach, Venturi oversaw a breakthrough season for strongside linebacker Keith Mitchell, who recorded a team-leading and career high 104 tackles, as well as 3.5 sacks, 3 interceptions, and 14 pass defenses.

Venturi joined the Saints in 1996 as linebackers coach, but was elevated to head coach after eight games into the season. Venturi was named linebackers coach and asked to serve as assistant head coach for the 1997 season.

Prior to joining the Saints, Venturi spent two years with the Cleveland Browns, as secondary coach in 1994 and defensive coordinator in 1995, when he also worked with the linebackers.

The first 12 seasons of Venturi's NFL coaching career were spent with the Colts. He joined Baltimore as an assistant in 1982 and remained there through 1993. He began the 1991 season as defensive coordinator/linebackers coach before taking over as head coach with 11 games to play, after succeeding Ron Meyer. He also served as defensive coordinator with the Colts in 1984 and 1992-93.

Venturi played quarterback and defensive back at Northwestern University, where he earned his degree in physical education and history, and his master's in education. His first coaching stop was at his alma mater in 1968, where he spent the following five seasons. From 1973-76, he was on the staff at Purdue before moving on to Illinois for the 1977 season. He returned to Northwestern in 1978, where he served as the Wildcats' head coach for the next three years. In 1981, he got his first job at the professional level, with the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the Canadian Football League.

An avid biker, Venturi owns three motorcycles.

HUBBARD ALEXANDER, Wide Receivers



Hubbard Alexander joins the Saints as wide receivers coach after serving the last two seasons in the same position with the Minnesota Vikings. Prior to his stint with the Vikings, Alexander was the wide receivers coach with the Dallas Cowboys from 1989-97.

In Alexander's 11 seasons coaching in the NFL, his teams have compiled a 109-67 (.619) regular season record, a 14-5 (.737) playoff mark, made eight playoff appearances, won six division titles, been to five NFC Championship games, and won three Super Bowl championships. Three different wide receivers (Cris Carter, Michael Irvin, and Randy Moss) have combined for nine Pro Bowl appearances under the guidance of Alexander.

In 1999, Moss led the NFC in receiving yards (1,413), and Carter finished 2nd in the NFC in receptions (90) and 5th in receiving yards (1,241), while both were voted to the Pro Bowl. In his first season with the Vikings in 1998, Alexander guided the duo of Carter and Moss to an NFL record for touchdown catches by a receiving tandem with 29. Moss led the NFL in touchdown receptions with 17 while Carter finished fourth with 12. The Vikings offense racked up a NFL record for points in a season (556).

Alexander spent nine seasons (1989-97) with the Cowboys, where between 1992 and 1995, they dominated the NFL with a 49-15 regular season record and a 12-3 playoff record, winning three Super Bowls. During his tenure with the Cowboys, Alexander coached Michael Irvin to five consecutive Pro Bowl appearances (1991-95).

Alexander coached 10 seasons (1979-88) at the University of Miami. After coaching tight ends from 1979-84, he moved over to coach wide receivers and molded one of college football's most famous receiving units with Brian Blades, Brett Perriman, and Michael Irvin. All three were among the first 52 players selected in the 1988 NFL Draft. Alexander also won national championships with the Hurricanes in the 1983 and 1987 seasons.

Before joining the Hurricanes, Alexander spent five seasons as an assistant at Vanderbilt (1974-78), and spent nine seasons as a highly successful high school coach in Memphis, Tenn. He started his coaching career at Tennessee State (1962-63). A three-year starter at the center position at Tennessee State (1958-61), he earned All-America Honors as a senior and was signed as a free agent by the Cowboys. He received a degree in Health and Physical Education.

DAVE ATKINS, Running Backs



Dave Atkins returns to the Saints as running backs coach after serving the team in the same capacity in 1996. After leaving the Saints in 1996, he served as the tight ends coach of the Minnesota Vikings from 1997-99.

At Minnesota, Atkins helped mold current Saint TE Andrew Glover into one of the team's most potent offensive weapons. In 1998, Glover set career-highs in receptions (35), receiving yards (522), and touchdown receptions (5).

As running backs coach for the Saints in 1996, Atkins coached RB Ray Zellars, who rushed for 174 yards-then the third most in Saints history-against Chicago (10/13). He finished the year with 475 yards rushing in only nine games. From 1994-95, Atkins served as offensive coordinator in Arizona. In 1994, the Cardinals led the NFL in time of possession (32:37). In 1995, fullback Larry Centers set a league record for catches by a offensive back with 101 to earn his first trip to the Pro Bowl. In addition, Garrison Hearst rushed for 1,070 yards.

In 1993, Atkins joined New England as running backs coach. In his only year there, the Patriots

averaged 111.3 rushing yards per game, including a 1,088-yard effort by Leonard Russell, who finished second among AFC running backs that season.

Atkins broke into the NFL ranks with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1986, where he worked with numerous facets of the offense during his seven-year stay, including running backs (1986-90), special teams (1991), and tight ends (1992). During his tenure, the Eagles finished in the top ten in the NFL in rushing offense five times, including a no. 1 ranking in 1990, when they averaged 159.8 yards a contest.


A two-year stint as an assistant at Burges High School in El Paso, Texas preceded Atkins' initial college post, at his alma mater in 1979. He worked with the running backs and in the kicking game for two seasons at UTEP before joining the staff at San Diego State in 1981, where he spent the next five years.

JOE BAKER, Secondary/Special Teams Assistant



Joe Baker enters his first season with the Saints as secondary/special teams assistant and fifth in the NFL after spending the 1999 season coaching outside linebackers and special teams at the University of Wisconsin.

In his position, Baker, a native of Hamilton, NY, is responsible for a multitude of functions, assisting both secondary coach Rick Venturi and special teams coach Al Everest.

At Wisconsin in 1999, the Rose Bowl champion Badgers led the Big Ten in kickoff return average, kickoffs, field goal percentage, and finished second in net punt average and field goal block percentage.

Prior to his one year coaching at Wisconsin, Baker served with the Jacksonville Jaguars as assistant special teams coach from 1995-98. While with the Jaguars, he served under special teams coordinator Larry Pasquale, in addition to serving as administrative assistant to head coach Tom Coughlin. In 1997, the Jaguars' special teams were ranked the NFL's best by the Dallas Morning News, and the two kickers, punter Brian Barker and placekicker Mike Hollis, were voted to the Pro Bowl. Prior to Jacksonville's inaugural 1995 season, he had served as the Jaguars' manager of football operations.

A wide receiver at Princeton, Baker was on the school's Ivy League champion team in 1989. He has worked in coaching and administrative positions for the last nine years. In 1991, Baker was the player personnel coordinator for the World League's Birmingham Fire.


Baker also served as a consultant and scout for the World League until joining the coaching staff at Samford University in Birmingham, Ala. in January, 1993. While at Samford, he coached running backs and wide receivers in addition to his duties in recruiting.

JOHN BUNTING, Linebackers



After serving as defensive co-coordinator and linebackers coach of the 1999 Super Bowl Champion St. Louis Rams, John Bunting joins the Saints staff in 2000 as linebackers coach.

He was one of the architects of the NFL's 6th-ranked defense in 1999, marking the second consecutive year the Rams defense finished in the NFL's top 10 (10th-1998), improving from 1997 (17th), his inaugural year with the Rams. In St. Louis, he coached Saints linebacker Charlie Clemons, who played a key role in the Rams' 1999 Super Bowl run with five solo tackles, two sacks, and one forced fumble in the playoffs. He helped develop LB London Fletcher, who led the Rams in tackles in 1999, after the Rams originally signed him as a free agent from Division III John Carroll University in 1998. He also helped develop LB Mike Jones, who led the Rams with three defensive touchdowns in 1999 and made a touchdown-saving tackle in Super Bowl XXXIV, helping the Rams secure their first NFL title since 1951.

Prior to his stint with the Rams, Bunting worked four years as an assistant coach with the Kansas City Chiefs, serving as linebackers coach (1995-96) and as a defensive assistant (1993-94). Bunting was head coach of Rowan College in Glassboro, NJ (1987-92), leading the Profs to back-to-back Division III playoff berths in 1991 and 1992. Bunting was defensive ends coach at Brown University (1986). His first coaching experience came with the USFL's Baltimore Stars as linebackers coach (1985).

Bunting played 11 seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles (1972-82), starting 119 of 133 career games, and concluded his playing career with the Philadelphia Stars of the USFL (1983-84).

Bunting's wife, Dawn, was head coach of the women's basketball team at Rowan (N.J.) College, and coached the girls' team at Visitation Academy in St. Louis to the Missouri State final four in 2000. They have two children, a daughter, Kimberly, and a son, Brooks.

FRANK CIGNETTI, JR., Quarterbacks



Frank Cignetti Jr., in his first season as quarterbacks coach with the Saints, brings 11 years of coaching experience to the team.

Cignetti joins the Saints after spending 1999 with the Kansas City Chiefs as the club's offensive assistant/quality control coach. He joined Kansas City after spending nine seasons coaching at his alma mater Indiana University of Pennsylvania (IUP). With the Chiefs, Cignetti was responsible for analysis and self-scouting of the club's offense, as well as the evaluation of video and computer data.

Prior to joining the Chiefs, Cignetti enjoyed a successful coaching career at perennial NCAA Division II powerhouse Indiana University of Pennsylvania, which earned six NCAA playoff berths during his tenure, including national championship game appearances in 1990 and 1993. He spent the 1997-98 campaigns as the Indians offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach after tutoring quarterbacks and wide receivers from 1995-96. He originally joined the IUP staff in 1990 as wide receivers coach, before shifting to the secondary for the 1993 and 1994 campaigns.

Cignetti began his coaching career at the University of Pittsburgh in 1989 under then head coach Mike Gottfried. He joined the Panthers staff after a four-year playing career as a strong safety for IUP from 1984-87. He earned all-conference honors as a junior, and was a member of the school's first-ever NCAA Division II playoff team as a senior in 1987.

A member of a football family, Cignetti is the son of current IUP head coach Frank Cignetti, who also served as head coach of the University of West Virginia from 1976-79. His brother Curt is in his first season at North Carolina State as tight ends coach.

A Pittsburgh, Pa., native, Cignetti was born October 4, 1965. He and his wife, Ellen, have a daughter, Alyssa.

SAM CLANCY, Defensive Line



Former NFL defensive end Sam Clancy joins the Saints as defensive line coach, his first coaching position in the NFL, after coaching in NFL Europe for five seasons, and an 11-year playing career.

Clancy joined the staff of NFL Europe League's Barcelona Dragons in 1995. In 1999, the Dragons fell to the Frankfurt Galaxy in World Bowl 1999, and captured the World Bowl title in 1997. He assisted in the development of Saints DT La'Roi Glover, who led the Saints in sacks in 1998 and 1999, DT Keith Taylor, a former linebacker, who has parlayed his experience into successful seasons with Kansas City and Denver. In 1996, Barcelona's defensive line recorded only two sacks in the first five games, but posted 17 in the last five contests.

Clancy was originally drafted in the 11th round by the Seattle Seahawks in 1982. After playing with Seattle from 1982-83, he played with the Cleveland Browns from 1985-88, and closed out his career with the Indianapolis Colts from 1989-93. During his career, he recorded 30 sacks in 152 games. His finest season came in 1990, when he led the Colts with 7.5 sacks and 48 tackles (30 solo). He also played two seasons in the USFL, with the Pittsburgh Maulers in 1984, and the Memphis Showboats in 1985.

Clancy did not play a single down of football in college at Pittsburgh, but was a four-year basketball letterman, and a member of the 1979 U.S. gold medal team at the Pan American games under Bob Knight, and a 1981 third round pick of the Phoenix Suns.



AL EVEREST, Special Teams



Al Everest begins his first season as Saints special teams coach, carrying 29 years of coaching experience. He comes to New Orleans after a four year stay as the special teams coach of the Arizona Cardinals.

Everest's special teams units with the Cardinals have been consistently ranked among the league's best. In 1999, the Cardinals ranked third in the NFL in defensive punt return coverage, fifth in opponent's net punting average, and second in field goal defense. They also featured the leading punt returner in the NFC and the 7th best kickoff returner in the conference. The Cardinals punter ranked sixth in the NFC in average yards per punt. In 1998, Cardinals kickers booted four game-winning final-play field goals. Only 7.4 percent of punts were touchbacks which ranked third in the AFC.

Everest bought a diverse background to the Cardinals in 1996. After one season as a graduate assistant at Southern Methodist University, one at North Texas State, and two years as defensive backs coach at Cameron (Okla.) University, Everest spent 1976-80 as the athletic director and head football coach at the American School Foundation in Mexico City, 1981-87 as head baseball coach at U.S. International University, and 1987 as defensive coordinator for his brother, Tom, at Escondido (Calif.) High School.

Everest then entered the professional ranks, coaching at the professional level in Italy from 1988-90, as an assistant with the Legnano Frogs. He served as head coach of the Pesaro Angels in 1991. Everest also worked in the Pro Spring Football League as a talent scout in 1991, and as a secondary coach with the Arkansas Miners in 1992. When the PSL folded in 1992, Everest served as offensive

coordinator on Head Coach Dick Nolan's staff with the San Antonio Force of the A.F.L. Everest then returned to Italy for the 1993 season before serving as assistant coach at Colony High School in Lewisville, Texas. Everest served as the special teams coordinator for Head Coach Jack Pardee of the CFL Birmingham Barracudas in 1995. His special teams units ranked among league leaders and were instrumental in the club's 10-8 record and a berth in the CFL playoffs in their inaugural season.

A two year starter at free safety at Southern Methodist in 1970-71, Everest also earned a master's degree from North Texas, and a doctorate of education from U.S. International.

Born August 22, 1950 in El Paso Texas, Everest's father Andy, served as an assistant on Bum Phillips' Saints coaching staff from 1981-85. He and his wife, Melissa "Lee" have two daughters, Michelle Katherine and Kaycee Fae.

ROCK GULLICKSON, Strength & Conditioning



Rock Gullickson will be entering his first season as strength and conditioning coach with the Saints, after spending 1998-99 in the same capacity at the University of Louisville.

Prior to working at Louisville for the past two seasons, Gullickson served as the strength and conditioning coach at the University of Texas from 1993-97. While at Texas, Gullickson oversaw the efforts of former Longhorn Heisman Trophy Winner and present Saint RB Ricky Williams from 1995-97. Prior to joining the Longhorn program in 1993, Gullickson served as the strength and conditioning coach at Rutgers from 1990-92.

A 1978 graduate of Moorhead (Minn.) State, Gullickson was an

Associated Press Division III All-America guard for the Dragons.

Following his graduation, Gullickson remained at Moorhead State for one season as strength coach before moving on to Mayville (N.D.) State for two seasons as strength coach, assistant football, and head track and field coach.

In 1981, Gullickson was named strength coach and weight training instructor at South Dakota State, where he received his master's degree.

In 1982, he became the first full-time strength and conditioning coach in the history of the Big Sky Conference when he went to Montana State.

Gullickson remained at Montana State for eight years planning and designing the school's facility and assisting in the team's 1984 Division 1-AA National Championship.

Montana's powerlifting champion from 1983-86, Gullickson won the Northwest U.S. Championship in 1985. He is also a member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association.

JACK HENRY, Offensive Line



Jack Henry, a coaching veteran of over 30 years, is in his first year as the offensive line coach for the Saints.

Henry spent the 1997-99 seasons as offensive line coach for the Detroit Lions. In 1997, the Lions boasted the NFL's 2nd-ranked rushing offense as part of the league's 2nd-ranked total offense, highlighted by Barry Sanders' 2,053 rushing yards, only the third time up that point a running back had reached the 2,000 yard mark. In 1998, the rushing offense ranked 10th in the NFL. He also held the same position with the San Diego Chargers in 1996.

Prior to joining the Chargers, Henry spent 1993-95 as the offensive line coach at the University of Pittsburgh. His first NFL coaching assignment was tutoring the Pittsburgh Steelers offensive line under Chuck Noll in 1990-91.

Henry previously served as the assistant director of athletics, associate head football coach and offensive coordinator at his alma mater, Indiana University of Pennsylvania (IUP) from 1986-89. He also was inducted into IUP's Athletic Hall of Fame in September 1997. Additionally, Henry has served six stints at six other colleges in his coaching career. He began by coaching the freshman offensive linemen at West Virginia in 1970, followed that by moving to Edinboro in 1973 (offensive line and wrestling coach), Louisville in 1974 (offensive line), Millersville in 1975-76 (offensive coordinator), Southern Illinois in 1977 (offensive line), West Virginia in 1978-79 (offensive line), Appalachian State in 1980 (offensive coordinator), and Wake Forest in 1981-85 (offensive coordinator/offensive line coach). His first coaching job was at Blairsville (Pa.) High.

Henry, who began his collegiate playing career as a linebacker at Penn State from 1964-65, played guard for Indiana University of Pennsylvania in 1967-68, before graduating in 1969. He was the captain of IUP's 1968 Boardwalk Bowl championship team.

Marcus received the Michael S. Bond Scholarship Award for Football Dedication at Ithaca as a senior in 1989.





BOB PALCIC, Tight Ends



Bob Palcic, a 27-year coaching veteran, begins his first season coaching the Saints' tight ends. After a distinguished college coaching career, 2000 marks his 7th year as an NFL coach.

In 1999, Palcic served as the offensive line coach of the Cleveland Browns. He coached tight ends for the Detroit Lions in 1997-98. Prior to his stay in Detroit, Palcic was the offensive line coach with the Atlanta Falcons from 1994-96.

Before joining the NFL ranks in 1994, Palcic enjoyed considerable success as an offensive line coach on the collegiate level, most recently helping guide UCLA to a Rose Bowl berth in 1993.

Prior to his stint at UCLA, he spent one season (1992) at Southern California following a six-year stay (1986-91) at Ohio State. The Buckeyes captured a share of the Big Ten title in 1986. He coached the offensive line at Arizona for two seasons (1984-85) before joining the Ohio State staff.

In addition to his college and NFL coaching tenures, Palcic coached in the Canadian Football League for two seasons (1982-83). He tutored the offensive line of the Toronto Argonauts, helping lead the Argonauts to two Grey Cup appearances, including a championship in 1983.

Palcic began his coaching career at his alma mater, Dayton, in 1974. He coached Dayton's defensive ends and offensive linemen for two years (1974-75) before moving on to Ball State for two years (1976-77). In his first year at Ball State, the Cardinals won the Mid-American Conference Championship. In 1978, Palcic began a four-year stint (1978-81) as the offensive line coach at Wisconsin, a position he held until moving on to Toronto. Palcic played linebacker at Dayton from 1968-70.

Pettley spent the 1987 season with the Washington Redskins roster. Prior to joining the Redskins, he was a three-year letterman as an offensive guard at Missouri. He was the Tigers' co-captain in 1985 and 1986. He was named his team's MVP, made the All-Big Eight second team, played in the Blue-Gray Classic and was a Big Eight All-Academic first team selection in 1986.

After six years with the Jacksonville Jaguars, Rick Mueller was named director of player personnel on April 26, 2000. He will be responsible for coordinating all aspects of player evaluation, including both pro and college scouting.

Mueller played an instrumental role in Jacksonville's rise from an expansion franchise in 1995 to becoming one of the elite teams in the NFL. During this period, the Jaguars recorded a 49-31 regular season record, which is the best winning percentage (.613) of the 31 NFL teams, culminating with a 14-2 record in 1999, the best in the NFL.

Qualifying for the postseason the past four seasons, the Jaguars won two AFC Central division championships and appeared in two AFC title games.

Prior to joining the Saints, Mueller most recently served as Jaguars' director of college scouting since 1998. He was in charge of his first college draft in 1999 in which the Jaguars selected cornerback Fernando Bryant, who started all 16 games for the Jaguars, defensive tackle Larry Smith, who played an important role on the defensive line rotation and six other players. In 2000, he was in charge of a draft which saw the Jaguars select wide receiver R. Jay Soward in the first round and ten other players.

Mueller was previously the team's college scout responsible for the western United States. He joined the Jaguars on June 4, 1994 after spending the 1993 season as director of player personnel for the Canadian Football League's Sacramento Gold Miners. Mueller spent the spring and summer of 1992 with the World League's Sacramento Surge, serving as defensive assistant and special teams coach. The Surge went 8-2 and capped the season as World Bowl champions. With the Surge, Mueller assisted in the development of Seattle Seahawks defensive end Michael Sinclair and St. Louis Rams linebacker Mike Jones. Following the World League season, Mueller served as one of five pro scouts for the World League. From 1990 to '92, Mueller worked for Washington State University as graduate assistant quarterbacks coach, head junior varsity coach and recruiting coordinator. At Washington State, he helped develop quarterback Drew Bledsoe, who was the first overall pick in the 1993 draft and is a three-time Pro Bowler for the New England Patriots. He began his football career as a training camp assistant with the Seattle Seahawks from 1985 to '90.

A graduate of the University of Puget Sound, Mueller was a three-year starter at quarterback and served as team captain for the varsity football team. He received a bachelor's degree in communications in 1990 and earned a master's in organizational communications from Washington State in 1992. Mueller was born December 4, 1967 in Spokane, Wash. He and his wife, Andrea, have twin sons, Chase and Jaret.

RICK THOMPSON, College Scouting Coordinator




Rick Thompson begins his first year with the New Orleans Saints as college scouting coordinator. In his position, he will oversee all activities of college scouting.

Mondock served as the Seahawks college scouting director in 1998, and served as eastern scouting supervisor from 1994-97 an area scout in 1999. Prior to working for the Seahawks, he spent eight seasons with the Indianapolis Colts, joining the Colts in June 1986, from BLESTO, where he had been the combine's western region scout.

Mondock has 22 years of high school and college coaching experience. He served as head coach at Washington and Jefferson College in Washington, Pennsylvania, from 1972-82, and was a high school head coach at both Southern Columbia County and Ridgeway High Schools in Western Pennsylvania from 1962-70.

He holds an undergraduate degree from Lock Haven State College in Lock Haven, Pennsylvania, and a Masters Degree from West Virginia University in Health and Physical Education. Pat and his wife, Kathleen, have a blended family of seven grown children.



MATT BOOCKMEIER, Area Scout



MARK SADOWSKI, Area Scout



After this date and through 3 p.m. (CDT) on November 16, Old Club has exclusive negotiating rights with its unsigned Unrestricted Free Agents. First practice at training camp in Thibodaux, La.

July 22 – Black and Gold intra-squad scrimmage at John L. Guidry Stadium on Nicholls State University campus at 11 a.m. (CDT).

July 29 – Saints at New York Jets, Meadowlands, 7 p.m. (WWL-TV). Saints return to Thibodaux after game.

July 31 – Hall of Fame Game, New England Patriots vs. San Francisco 49ers at Canton, Ohio (ABC).

August 1 – Training camp practices with the Jacksonville Jaguars in Jacksonville, Fla.

August 4 – If a Drafted Rookie has not signed with his club by this date, he may not be traded to any other club in 2000.

August 5 – Saints at Minnesota Vikings, Metrodome, 7 p.m. (WWL-TV). Saints return to Thibodaux after game.

August 12 – Saints at Indianapolis Colts, Ross-Ade Stadium at Purdue University, 7 p.m. (WWL-TV). Saints return to Thibodaux after game.

August 16 – Saints break camp and return to New Orleans from Thibodaux.

August 17 – Touchdown Club Welcomes Saints Luncheon, Hyatt Regency New Orleans, 12:30 p.m.

August 21 – Roster cut-down to maximum of 65 players on Active List by 3 p.m. (CDT).

A player cannot participate on the Practice Squad for more than two seasons.

September 3 – Saints regular season opener, vs. Detroit Lions, Superdome, 12 Noon (FOX).

September 19 – Priority on multiple waiver claims is now based on the current season's standings.

October 10 – NFL Trading Deadline. All trading ends by 3 p.m. (CDT).

October 11 – Players with at least four previous pension-credited seasons are subject to the waiver system for the remainder of the regular season and post-season.

November 7 – Deadline for clubs to sign by 3 p.m. (CDT) their drafted players, franchise and transition players and restricted and unrestricted free agents to whom June 1 tender was made. If such players are not signed by this date, they are prohibited from playing in the NFL in 2000.







Converted 148 consecutive PATs, dating back to 10/9/94, and 88 consecutive with the Saints until snapping his streak in the 1999 season-opener. Ranks second all-time on the Saints with 407 career points scored. Ranks first all-time in team history in field goal success rate with 83.3% from 1995-99 (100/120). Has converted second-most field goals in team history (100). Had not missed a field goal of under 40 yards since 9/29/96, at Baltimore, a string of 34 straight, before pushing a 38-yard attempt wide left, vs. Atlanta, 10/10/99, which marks the third-longest string in franchise history. Is tied for first in the NFL among active kickers, converting 70.0% field goal attempts of 50+ yards. Conversion percentage also is tied for second-best all-time. 



PRO: Originally a second round draft choice by the Saints (40th overall) in the 1998 NFL Draft. Good blend of size and strength. **1999** — Saw action in 11 games, starting eight on the year...dressed, but did not play at Jacksonville, 11/21, and was inactive for games 1, 6, 9 and 16...time missed was due to various injuries...finished fifth on the team with 26 receptions...yardage total of 325 yards was fourth on the club...scored lone receiving touchdown vs. St. Louis, 12/12, on his only reception of the game...seven receptions vs. Tennessee, 10/17, was tied for the game and team-high...84 yards receiving in the Titans game also marked a season best. **1998** — Turned in one of the most prolific seasons by a tight end in team history...had a team-leading 54 receptions for 684 yards, which ranked second on the squad...was voted a second alternate to the NFC Pro Bowl team...six receiving touchdowns ranked first on the team and tied WR Danny Abramowicz (1967) for the most touchdown receptions by a rookie and tied for second in touchdown receptions by a tight end in team history...54 receptions tied the team's rookie record, and were the second-most in team history by a tight end (Wesley Walls, 57 - 1995)...in week 17, was nominated for NFC Offensive Player of the Week when he caught a team season-high 10 receptions vs. Buffalo, 12/27, for 112 yards and a touchdown, which was just the second time in team history two players had 100+ yards receiving in the same game...had a game-winning 33-yard touchdown reception in overtime at Indianapolis, 9/27...caught a touchdown pass in six games on the year...was voted to numerous all-rookie teams.

COLLEGE: Left Washington ranked sixth among tight ends on the school's career-record list with 50 receptions...was an All-Pac 10 Conference first-team choice in 1997, starting 10 games, catching 19 passes for 276 yards (14.5 avg.) and two touchdowns...also lettered on the Huskies' baseball team as a first baseman, starting 24 of 28 games in 1994, batting .278 with three home runs...in 1993, helped the team compile a school season-record 48-16 mark as it advanced to the regional finals in the NCAA Championships...batted .400 in five games...sociology major.

PRO: Signed to an offer sheet by the Saints, 2/16/00, and was signed to a four-year contract, 2/19/00, after the St. Louis Rams declined to match the offer. Originally signed by the Rams, 2/19/97 as an unrestricted free agent, Clemons played three seasons in the Canadian Football League, for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers and Ottawa Rough Riders. A versatile player, can rush the passer and has been a standout on special teams. **1999** — Saw action in all 16 regular season games, with no starts...he recorded 44 tackles (28 solo), 3.0 sacks (20 yds.), one interception, five passes defensed, one fumble recovery and 16 quarterback pressures...he was tied for the team lead with 23 special teams tackles (all solo) and recovered a fumble on special teams...he also saw action in all three postseason games, with no starts...posted five tackles, 2.0 sacks, one forced fumble and two special teams tackles...collected a career-high eight tackles (four solo) vs. Atlanta, 9/26, to go with his pass defensed and quarterback pressure...posted five tackles (three solo) on defense, one sack (8 yards), one pass defensed, two quarterback pressures at Atlanta, 10/17...recorded a team and career-high four special teams tackles at New Orleans, 12/12...recorded his first career interception, vs. New Orleans, 11/28, (0 yards). **1998** — Played in all 16 games for the first time in NFL career...had career highs in tackles (13), sacks (two), passes defensed (two), quarterback pressures (five) and was second on the team in special teams tackles with a career-high 24...recorded first sacks of his career in week 3 at Buffalo, 9/20, with two...made season-high and career-high six tackles, including one tackle for loss, and two passes defensed, in week 2, vs. Minnesota, 9/13...made season-high and career-high four special teams tackles in week 9, at Atlanta, 11/1...made at least one special teams tackle in final nine games of the season and 14 of 16 overall. **1997** — Played in five games on defense and special teams...placed on injured reserve 11/26 with hamstring injury...recorded five special teams tackles on the year. **1996** — Started 14 games and finished with 37 tackles, six sacks, four passes defensed and two tackles for loss for Canadian Football League's Ottawa Rough Riders...named CFL Defensive Player of the Week after recording six tackles and four sacks against Saskatchewan, 10/13. **1995** — Played six games for the CFL's Winnipeg Blue Bombers and seven for Ottawa...traded to Ottawa after game nine...finished with 16 tackles, three sacks and two passes defensed for Blue Bombers...had 28 tackles and three sacks for Rough Riders. **1994** — Played and started seven games for Winnipeg...finished with 28 tackles.



PRO: Signed by the Saints, 4/16/98, after spending 1997 with the San Diego Chargers. Originally a third-round selection (60th overall) by the Miami Dolphins in the 1991 NFL Draft, played with Miami, 1991-94. Played with the Denver Broncos, 1995-96, before signing with San Diego for the 1997 season. A tough, durable blocker, he is known for his all-purpose contributions as a runner, blocker and receiver. **1999** — Saw action in 13 games on the year, starting 10...was inactive for three games...had 17 carries for 40 yards on the season and caught 19 passes for 154 yards...returned one kickoff for three yards...recorded a personal season-high four receptions vs. Carolina, 9/12 and vs. Tennessee, 10/17...51 receiving yards at NY Giants, 10/24, marked his season best. **1998** — Proved to be one of the most consistent players on the offense...started 10 of the 16 games he played in on the year...was second on the team with 180 rushing yards on 45 carries...two rushing touchdowns led the Saints...was fourth on the Saints and first among running backs with 33 receptions for 214 yards and two touchdowns...returned seven kickoffs for 212 yards (30.3 avg.), including a 100-yard touchdown return at Minnesota, 11/8, the 3rd-longest return in team history...also added a receiving touchdown and a career-best 49-yard reception in that game as part of his 180 total yards on the day...became first player in team history to have touchdowns rushing, receiving and on a kickoff return in a season...recipient of the Saints 1998 Ed Block Courage Award, as voted on by his teammates, for courage in the face of adversity...also added two special teams tackles and attempted a pass, which was incomplete. **1997** — Craver started five of 15 games played at fullback with Chargers in 1997...finished season with 20 carries for 71 yards (3.6 avg) and long of 22 yards...also caught four passes for 26 yards (6.5 avg.) and long of 20 yards...returned three kickoffs for 68 yards (22.7 avg.) and long of 27 yards...was tied for second on team with nine tackles on special teams...had season-high five carries for 22 yards versus Indianapolis, 10/26...had season-long 22-yard run at Cincinnati, 11/2...had season long 20-yard reception versus Seattle, 11/9. **1996** — Denver's starting fullback for 15 of 16 regular-season games and one postseason contest in 1996...rushed for 232 yards on 59 carries (3.9 avg.), with

long of 28 and two touchdowns...also caught 39 passes for 297 yards (7.6 avg.), with long of 31 and one touchdown...receiving touchdown was a then-career-long 39-yard catch and run at Seattle, 9/8...started first five games of season before partially tearing his posterior cruciate ligament at Cincinnati, 9/29...injury occurred on Denver's first play from scrimmage...was inactive for San Diego game, 10/6...returned to starting lineup against Baltimore, 10/20, and started all 10 remaining games...opened season with 59 yards on seven carries and caught one pass for seven more yards vs. New York Jets, 9/1...his 28-yard first-quarter run tied his career-long...in game 2 at Seattle, 9/8, Craver started at fullback and gained 92 total yards from scrimmage with 47 yards on nine carries (5.2 avg.) and 45 yards on four receptions (11.3), including career-long 39-yard touchdown pass from John Elway...caught game-high six passes for 32 yards in regular-season finale at San Diego...started at fullback and caught three passes for 17 yards in AFC divisional playoff game versus Jacksonville, 1/4/97. **1995** — Craver played in all 16 games, starting 12 of last 13 for Broncos...finished season with 73 carries for 333 yards (4.6 avg.) and five touchdowns...added 43 receptions for 369 yards (8.6 avg.) and one touchdown...his 43 receptions were 11 more than he had during his first four years in league...also returned four kickoffs for 35 yards (8.8 avg.), and made one special teams tackle...made transition in training camp from tailback to fullback following emergence of rookie Terrell Davis...Craver responded by providing outstanding blocking all season for Davis, who put up 1,000-yard season...Craver scored two touchdowns in game for first time in career versus Arizona, 11/15 when he rushed for one and also caught first-career touchdown pass...also helped make history in that game, catching 19-yard pass from John Elway with 5:29 remaining in game that pushed Elway over 40,000-yard passing plateau...in season finale at Oakland, 12/24, Craver started at fullback and had best game of his career, setting career highs for both rushes (20) and yards (108), in addition to catching four passes for 38 yards...also scored one touchdown on one-yard run in second quarter. **1994** — Craver played in eight games for Miami with six rushing attempts for 43 yards and 24 receptions for 237 yards...also had two carries for 13 yards and six receptions for 43 yards in two playoff games...made his 1994 Dolphins' debut in a special teams role at Cincinnati, 10/2...was waived when Dolphins signed Cleveland Gary, 10/4...resigned, 11/9 by Miami when Keith Byars was placed on I/R list with knee injury...set two career highs against Buffalo, 12/4 with seven receptions for 67 yards...tied for team lead in receptions with five for 55 yards against Kansas City, including 28-yarder...matched his career high in receiving yardage against Detroit on Christmas Day with 67 yards on five catches...was second on team with four catches for 35 yards - including postseason career-long 15-yarder - in AFC Wild Card Game against Kansas City, 12/31...in AFC Divisional Playoff loss at San Diego, 1/8/95, he had one carry for 10 yards and two receptions for eight yards. **1993** — Craver suffered torn anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee in preseason practice, 8/10...placed on I/R, 8/23 after undergoing reconstructive knee surgery, 8/19. **1992** — Craver played in six regular-season games and both playoff games for Miami in 1992...finished season with three carries for nine yards and added eight kickoff returns for 174 yards (21.8 avg.) and long of 44 yards against Seattle, 9/27...suffered hamstring injury versus New England, 10/18 and was placed on I/R, 10/21...activated from I/R, 11/7/93 and ended up second-leading rusher for Miami in playoffs with 85 yards and one touchdown on 10 carries...also had three catches for 28 yards...had best postseason game of his career against San Diego, 1/10/93, in AFC divisional playoff game by leading team in rushing with career-high 72 yards on eight carries with one touchdown on career-long 25-yard run...also had one reception for 13 yards...in AFC championship game against Buffalo, 1/17/93, Craver had 13 yards on two carries and two receptions for 15 yards...also returned four kicks for 48 yards. **1991** — Craver played in 14 games as rookie for Miami in 1991...finished season ranked third on team in rushing with 20 carries for 58 yards and one touchdown and added eight receptions for 67 yards...ranked eleventh in AFC in kickoff returns with 19.2 average...saw action on special teams in his NFL debut at Buffalo 9/1, and returned four kickoffs for 65 yards...had 11 carries for 37 yards and his first NFL touchdown on seven-yard run against Indianapolis, 9/8...had 49-yard kickoff return at New England, 10/6, which was longest return by Dolphins' player in over two years.

COLLEGE: Two-year starter at Fresno State after transferring from El Camino Junior College...finished his Bulldog career with 449 rushes for 2,251 yards (5.0 avg.) and 26 touchdowns...added 57 receptions for 421 yards (7.2 avg.) and two scores...was named all-Big West Conference as senior when he rushed for 1,003 yards and 17 touchdowns on 224 catches (4.5 avg.), caught 34 passes for 259 yards, and returned three kicks for 60 yards...Craver became first player in school history to gain 1,000 yards rushing in consecutive seasons, as he had gained 1,248 yards with nine touchdowns on 225 carries as a junior (all school records), earning him honorable mention all-America honors from Sporting News...also selected first-team all-Big West that season as he added 23 receptions for 162 yards (7.0 avg.) and one score...also set school records for consecutive 100-yard rushing games (four) and most 100-yard rushing games in one season (eight)...spent 1987-88 seasons at El Camino Junior College, joining school there two years after graduating from high school...from 1985-86 he coached basketball, football and baseball at local park in Compton, California...originally planned to attend El Camino to play baseball but suffered ankle injury during tryouts and decided to switch to football...carried 285 times for 1,355 yards (4.8 avg.) and 14 touchdowns in two seasons at El Camino...named first-team all-Mission Conference as sophomore in 1988 when he carried 181 times for 845 yards (4.7 avg.) and 12 touchdowns...also

had 10 catches for 121 yards and 15 kickoff returns for 510 yards (34.0 avg.), including 96-yard score...as freshman he carried 104 times for 510 yards (4.9 avg.) with two touchdowns.

PERSONAL: Born Aaron LaRenze Craver December 18, 1968, in Los Angeles, California...suffered from asthma attacks as child that limited his involvement in outdoor sports until he was 10...instead of sports, Aaron concentrated on academics and skipped sixth grade to jump directly into junior high school...at pre-draft workout in April, 1991, administered emergency first aid to Dallas Cowboys' running backs coach Joe Brodsky...Craver put warmup clothing under Brodsky's head and pinched his jaw to keep him from swallowing his tongue...Craver learned first aid in public health course he took at Fresno State...majored in liberal arts...Craver is one of seven children...Aaron and his wife, Dawn, have a son Jalen, and daughters, Kyndol and Maia ... the family resides in Huntington Beach, California.

PRO: Originally signed by the Saints as a rookie free agent, 6/10/97. Was waived, 8/18/97, but later re-signed to the practice squad, 11/19/97. Was signed to a one-year contract, 12/29/97. Signed a second one-year deal, 1/27/99. Spent the spring of 1999 with the Frankfurt Galaxy of NFL Europe, where he split time as the starting quarterback for the Galaxy, finishing near the top of NFL Europe in passing. **1999** — Was signed, 1/27, but was waived, 9/5...was signed to the active roster, 11/23 and designated as third quarterback for his first two games, at St. Louis, 11/28 and at Atlanta, 12/5. . .was inactive for the next two games, vs. St. Louis, 12/12 and at Baltimore, 12/19...saw action in final two games on the year, starting both...started and won his first NFL contest, vs. Dallas, 12/24...completed 16 of 27 passes for 278 yards and two touchdowns, with one interception, and rushed for another touchdown in Saints 31-24 victory, earning him NFC Offensive Player of the Week nomination...also was the starting quarterback for the season finale at Carolina, 1/2/00...threw a team season-high 49 attempts in that contest, completing 26 for 243 yards...set a new team record for most passing and running plays attempted at Carolina, when he combined for 57 (49 passing), eclipsing the mark of 56 (55 passing) set by Jim Everett, 9/25/94 at San Francisco...on the year, completed 42 of 76 for 521 yards and three touchdowns with five interceptions...also rushed 11 times for 72 yards and two touchdowns. **1998** — Spent the first five games of the season as the designated 3rd quarterback...was waived, 10/14, and signed to the practice squad, 10/15, where he spent the remainder of the season...in preseason action, completed 13 of 31 passes for 164 yards and one touchdown and two interceptions...also rushed five times for 45 yards. **1997** — Was signed as a rookie free agent, 6/10, and waived following training camp, 8/18, and later signed to the practice squad, 11/19, where he spent the remainder of the season...played for the Amsterdam Admirals of NFL Europe in the spring of 1998.

Possesses excellent combination of size, strength and quickness. After playing all year at right tackle in his rookie season, was moved to the left side in 1994. Has evolved into one of the best tackles in the league. From 1993-96, had a string of 57 consecutive games in which he started, which ran through the ninth game of 1996. Has been named to six consecutive Pro Bowls, all as a starter, making him the only player in Saints history to have been named to the team six consecutive years. If he is named this year, he will surpass LB Rickey Jackson and K Morten Andersen to become the only Saints player to have been selected seven times. In 1999, Roaf became the 29th player in team history to have seen action in 100 contests. He has appeared in 108 career games with New Orleans, which ranks him tied for 22nd with the Saints. 


Head Coach Jim Haslett (l) and General Manager Randy Mueller (r) observe practice during the April 2000 minicamp.







SAINTS DRAFT CHOICES

The first combined AFL-NFL draft was held in 1967. A player's order of selection among the players drafted is designated by a number after his position. In 1967, the expansion New Orleans Saints received first and last choices in each round and one additional choice at the end of the second, third and fourth rounds.

On February 10, 1967, the Saints selected 42 players in an expansion draft, using the same procedures as in the formation of the Atlanta Falcons in 1966. The Falcons were exempted from the expansion draft in 1967, thus leaving 14 teams from whom the Saints selected players. The procedures that were in place for the Saints were: each of the other 14 NFL teams froze 29 players from its 40-man roster, leaving 11 players available to be selected by the Saints. The Saints chose one player from those 11 remaining on each team. Then, each team froze two additional players, leaving eight on each list, from which the Saints chose two more each.



The New Orleans Saints lost their fourth consecutive game, and the fourth in the final period, as the Titans scored 17 points in the final period to seal the victory. The Saints four losses have all come in the fourth quarter and have been by a combined 17 points. QB Billy Joe Tolliver, making his first start of 1999, passed for the seventh-best passing day in franchise history, going for 354 yards on 28-of-45 passing. Tolliver threw two touchdowns and two interceptions and was not sacked in the game. CB Ashley Ambrosio recorded his fourth interception as a Saint, giving him four through five games. The four picks are already the second-best season total of his career. The Saints got on the board first, when K Doug Brien connected on a 24-yard field goal. The Saints added to that lead when Tolliver found TE Scott Slutzker for a 10-yard touchdown pass. The Titans answered in the third quarter when QB Neil O'Donnell found FB Lorenzo Neal on a four-yard TD pass. Brien again connected, this time on a 42-yard attempt. The Titans then ran off 17 consecutive points, as WR Kevin Dyson was on the receiving end of O'Donnell's second touchdown pass. K Al Del Greco connected for a 19-yard field goal. CB Donald Mitchell then returned an errant Tolliver pass for a 42-yard score. The Saints mounted a late comeback, which resulted in a four-yard scoring pass from Tolliver to RB Lamar Smith. Tolliver's two-point conversion attempt to WR Brett Bech was successful, but the Saints could not convert Brien's onside kick attempt, and the Titans ran out the clock. The Saints piled up over 400 yards in total offense (409), the most since 11/22/98, when they had 401 against San Francisco.

WR Keith Poole was on the receiving end of a 1-yard TD pass from Billy Joe Tolliver to cut the lead to 24-16, but the Saints were unable to recover Brien's onside kick attempt with under a minute to play. The Saints as well as the nation saw the first two rushing touchdowns of RB Ricky Williams' career, as he ran for a 19-yard score and a one-yard score in an ESPN nationally-television contest Sunday night. Ricky's effort wasn't enough, however, as the Saints ultimately fell to the Jaguars, 41-23. The Saints battled the Jaguars toe-to-toe in the first half, as the teams left the field for halftime tied at 17. The Saints also posted 23 points on a Jaguars defense that entered the game tied for 1st in the NFL, and had allowed an NFL-low 79 points through their first nine games, an average of 8.8 per contest. The Jaguars defense also had not allowed a rushing touchdown in 1999, but the Saints ran for three, which included Williams' two scores and a one-yard plunge by QB Billy Joe Tolleriver. One week after posting a franchise-low 132 yards, the Jaguars offense amassed 494 yards, including 220 receiving yards by WR Jimmy Smith, the first player to have over 200 yards receiving in a game for a Saints opponent since 12/3/89, when Richard Johnson of Detroit had 248.

SAINTS 31, COWBOYS 24

December 24 at Superdome (47,835)

The Saints, under the direction of QB Jake Delhomme, defeated the Dallas Cowboys, 31-24, before a national TV audience on Christmas Eve. Delhomme, who had never taken a regular-season NFL snap prior to the game, completed 16-of-27 passes for 278 yards and two touchdowns. Delhomme also rushed for a touchdown, scoring from four yards out less than a minute into the fourth quarter to tie the score at 24. CB Fred Weary returned an Emmitt Smith fumble 58 yards for a touchdown on the Cowboys next possession to give the Saints the final margin of victory. Smith's fumble was caused by DT Robert Newkirk, signed three weeks ago from the Dallas Cowboys practice squad. Weary also provided the Saints momentum early in the game, intercepting a Troy Aikman pass, returning it 22 yards, setting up the Saints first touchdown of the game. Delhomme found WR Keith Poole on an 8-yard scoring pass shortly before the end of the first quarter and WR Eddie Kennison on a 51-yard pass into the third quarter to provide the Saints other touchdowns.

1999 Game Summaries

PANTHERS 45, SAINTS 13

January 2 at Ericsson Stadium (56,929)

QB Jake Delhomme could not rekindle the magic that enabled him and the Saints to defeat the Dallas Cowboys on Christmas Eve, as the Saints closed the 1999-2000 season at Ericsson Stadium, falling to the Panthers, 45-13. It marked the fourth loss in a row in the final game of the season for the Saints, and evened the 1999 series with the Panthers at 1-1. The Saints captured the first matchup of the teams this season, 19-10, 9/12/99 at the Superdome. Delhomme completed 26-of-49 passes for 243 yards and a touchdown, his third in two weeks, but also threw four interceptions, two of which led to Panthers scores. Leading the Saints was WR Keith Poole, who had 104 yards on six receptions, while WR Eddie Kennison matched Poole's reception total, catching six for 44 yards, one of which was a 3-yd. touchdown pass from Delhomme. The Saints sacked Panthers QB Steve Beuerlein six times, the second-highest total of the season. In the season-opener, the Saints posted seven sacks against Carolina. Delhomme also led the Saints in rushing, carrying the ball eight times for 78 yards and a score. LB Phil Clarke led the Saints with eight tackles (six solo), while LB Keith Mitchell recorded two sacks, raising his season total to 3.5. DE Brady Smith set a new career high, posting his sixth sack of the season. DE Willie Whitehead added to his career-best, posting his seventh sack on the year. DT La'Roi Glover recorded sack number 8.5, giving him 18.5 over the past two seasons, and 25 since 1997. LB Mark Fields added sack number four on the year. CB Ashley Ambrose added to his team lead in passes defensed, posting four. He finishes the season with 21.



CHRONOLOGY OF UNIFORM CHANGES

The following is a catalogue of uniform changes since the Saints' inception in 1966:

1967 — Gold pants with black and white striping; black jerseys with gold numerals and white trim with white and gold piping on sleeves; white jerseys with gold numerals and black trim with black and gold piping on sleeves. Gold helmet with black Fleur-de-Lis on either side, and black and white striping down the middle.

1969 — For preseason games exclusively — Black helmets with gold Fleur-de-Lis on either side and gold and white striping down the middle. Helmets have been gold ever since.

1971 — The color of the numerals changed. Black with gold trim on white jerseys and white with gold trim on black jerseys.

1975 — Pants were changed from gold to white with black and gold striping.

1976 — Black pants were introduced to be worn with white jerseys. Gold and white striping down the sides. Same white pants worn with the black jerseys. The facemask changed from grey to black.

1983 — Numbers changed to "San Diego-style" numerals. Thin border around the number with no direct contact between the number and the border. The second change was from socks with black and gold piping to solid black.

1986 — Gold pants with wide solid black stripes were initiated. The state Fleur-de-Lis patch appears on either side of the pants. The jersey was redesigned with TV numbers on the shoulders, and the state Fleur-de-Lis on either sleeve. The stripes on the sleeves were eliminated. The socks feature a wide gold stripe on a black background.

1991 — 25th anniversary patches were worn on the left shoulder.

1994 — For three games (3 through 5), the Saints wore their 1967 style uniforms for their "throwbacks games", a league-wide program commemorating the NFL's 75th Anniversary.

1996 — Traditional Fleur-de-Lis replaces state logo on jerseys and pants. Player name and numbers changed from screen-on type to "tackle twill" style, made of cloth and sewed onto jersey. Numbers changed to gold with black outline on white jerseys and gold with a white outline on black jerseys. Stockings changed from thick gold and black stripe over white to solid black over white.

1999 — On the white road jerseys, the numbers and lettering changed to black with gold outline, and pants changed from gold with black stripe to black with a gold stripe to complete the road uniform.

2000 — The only change to the road uniform will be the replacement of the black with gold stripe pants to the gold with black stripe pants. The white road jersey will remain the same with the numbers and lettering in black with gold trim.



1990

Aug. 5 — Saints beat Raiders, 17-10 in American Bowl in London's Wembley Stadium.

Dec. 31 — On New Year's Eve, a national television audience saw the Saints kick a last-second field goal to even their record at 8-8, reaching the .500 mark for the first time all season. More importantly, the win gave them the final NFC playoff berth and a game against Chicago the following week.

1991

Jan. 6 — Bears defeat Saints 16-6 in NFC wild card game in Soldier Field. Game is team's second playoff game in history, first on the road. Linebackers Vaughan Johnson and Pat Swilling represent the team in the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl, along with kicker Morten Andersen. DE Renaldo Turnbull ended the season leading NFC rookie defenders with eleven sacks. He is named to a number of all-rookie teams.

Sep. 8 — Saints defeat Kansas City, 17-10 for first 2-0 start in team history. Winning streak continued into week seven, the second longest ever.

Dec. 16 — A 27-0 win over the Los Angeles Raiders broke the four-game losing streak, clinched a playoff spot, and kept the Saints in the hunt for a division title.

Dec. 22 — In Phoenix, Saints beat Cardinals 27-3, and win their first-ever NFC West title. The Saints defense ended the regular season with the fewest points allowed in the NFL. They were second in the league in yardage allowed.

Dec. 28 — Vying for the team's first-ever playoff victory, the Falcons came from behind to defeat New Orleans, 27-20 in the Superdome.

1992

Four Saints were chosen for the NFC squad in the Pro Bowl. Linebackers Vaughan Johnson, Sam Mills and Pat Swilling were named as starters for the NFC, the most linebackers from one team in history. Special teamer Bennie Thompson also made the trip to Honolulu. A close, 22-14 win over Atlanta finishes a three-game, 11-day string, putting the Saints in the playoffs for the third consecutive year.

Dec. 3 — Saints clinch the home-field advantage in the NFC wild card game with a 20-0 win over the New York Jets in the Meadowlands.

1993

Jan. 3 — Leading 20-7 in the third quarter, the Saints saw the Philadelphia Eagles roar back to win the NFC wild card game, 36-20 at the Superdome. Philadelphia scored 26 points in the fourth quarter for the win. Six Saints, linebackers Rickey Jackson, Vaughan Johnson, Sam Mills and Pat Swilling, kicker Morten Andersen, and center Joel Hilgenberg participated in the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl in Honolulu. It tied the record as the most Saints players ever voted to the game.

Apr. 29 — At a press conference, Saints owner Tom Benson announces that president/general manager Jim Finks has been diagnosed with cancer. Finks entered the hospital April 26, after the end of the NFL draft. Benson takes over temporarily in Finks' position during his absence.

May 19 — A sports bill calling in part for renovations to the Louisiana Superdome and a new practice facility for the Saints passes state lawmakers in a vote in Baton Rouge.

Jul. 14 — Saints President/General Manager Jim Finks resigns.

Sep. 30 — Saints sign a new lease with the Superdome which runs through 2018.

Oct. 3 — Saints defeat Rams 37-6 in Anaheim, improving their record to 5-0 and tying best-ever start in team history.

Dec. 28 — Three Saints, linebackers Renaldo Turnbull and Rickey Jackson, and punt/kick returner Tyrone Hughes were chosen to represent the NFC in the Pro Bowl, February 6 in Honolulu. Hughes is the fourth rookie in club history to receive this honor.

1994

May 8 — After battling lung cancer for more than a year, former President/General Manager Jim Finks passes away at his Metairie home at the age of 66.

1995

Jan. 26 — An early morning fire causes severe damage at the club's Saints Drive Practice Facility. The two alarm fire forces the team to move its operation out of the main building, which was constructed in 1967.

Feb. 5 — Defensive end Wayne Martin and tackle William Roaf represent the Saints at the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl in Honolulu, the fewest number of Saints selected to play in the game since 1985 (2).

Mar. 13 — The Superdome Commission approves the sale of \$14.5 million in bonds that will go toward the construction of a Saints practice facility in Metairie.

June 8 — Groundbreaking ceremonies are held for the Saints new practice facility on Airline Highway.

1996

Jan. 12 — Bill Kuharich, Director of Player Personnel from 1986-93 and Vice President of Football Operations, 1994-95, is named Vice President/General Manager.

Feb. 4 — Tackle William Roaf and cornerback Eric Allen represent the Saints at the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl in Honolulu.

Apr. 15 — For the first time in team history, the entire organization is housed under one roof with the move to the club's new facility at 5800 Airline Highway in Metairie.

Oct. 21 — After being defeated 19-7 by the Carolina Panthers a day earlier, Saints head coach Jim Mora, the longest tenured coach in all of professional sports, resigns his post, ending a 10 1/2 year tenure with the team. Mora, who led the Saints to their first winning seasons and playoff appearances, and the winningest coach in franchise history, ended his stay with a short statement thanking Tom Benson and the Saints fans for their support.

Oct. 23 — Rick Venturi, who had been the Saints linebackers coach and an interim head coach with the Indianapolis Colts in 1991, was named interim head coach.

Dec. 12 — Tackle William Roaf was named as an NFC starter in his third consecutive Pro Bowl. Defensive tackle Wayne Martin was chosen as an alternate to the squad.

1997

Jan. 28 — Bill Kuharich is named President/General Manager/Chief Operating Officer of the Saints. Kuharich names Mike Ditka head coach of the New Orleans Saints.

Nov. 16 — In the shortest overtime game in NFL history, the Saints defeat the Seattle Seahawks, 20-17, on a Doug Brien 38-yard field goal. The victory gives the Saints one more victory than the previous season en route to doubling 1996's win total.

1998

Aug. 5 — Head coach Mike Ditka is signed to a five-year contract extension, placing him under contract through the 2002 season.

1999

Jan. 21 — Dick Stanfel, who served as offensive line coach for the Saints, 1997-98, and 1976-80, also serving as head coach for the final four games of 1980, announces his retirement.

April 17 — The Saints acquire the fifth overall selection from the Washington Redskins in exchange for the Saints 1st and 3rd-7th round draft choices in 1999, and the Saints 1st and 3rd round choices in 2000. With the fifth overall selection, the Saints select Heisman Trophy winner RB Ricky Williams from the University of Texas. Williams signs an eight-year contract, 5/14.

May 19 — Charles Bailey is named Asst. General Manager/Vice President of Football Operations replacing Chet Franklin, who accepted a similar post with the Oakland Raiders.

2000

Jan. 5 — Saints Owner Tom Benson fires 22 employees, including President/General Manager Bill Kuharich, Head Coach Mike Ditka and Vice President of Government Affairs Terry O'Neil.

Jan. 27 — Following through on his promise of December 7, 1999 when he said "I will take whatever steps necessary at the end of the regular season to make the New Orleans Saints a winning franchise," Tom Benson hires Randy Mueller as General Manager of Football Operations and Arnold D. Fielkow as Director of Administration. Mueller joins the Saints from the Seattle Seahawks, where he spent 17 years in player personnel, including his last five as Vice President of Football Operations. Fielkow joins the Saints from the Southern League of Professional Baseball, where he served as President and General Counsel for six years.

Feb. 3 — Randy Mueller hires former Saints assistant coach and defensive coordinator Jim Haslett as the 13th head coach in franchise history, forming one of the youngest General Manager/Head Coach tandems in all of professional sports. Haslett spent the three previous seasons as defensive coordinator of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Feb. 11 — The Saints make the first signing of the NFL's Free Agency period, signing former Cincinnati Bengals QB Jeff Blake to a four-year contract.

Feb. 13 — The Saints sign WR Joe Horn, formerly of the Kansas City Chiefs, to a four-year contract.

Feb. 14 — The Saints sign two defensive backs, CB Chris Oldham from the Pittsburgh Steelers and DB Fred Thomas from the Seattle Seahawks.

Feb. 15 — The Saints re-sign unrestricted free agent Tom Ackerman to a four-year contract.

Feb. 16 — The Saints sign St. Louis Rams restricted free agent LB Charlie Clemons to an offer sheet, giving the Rams seven days to match the Saints offer.

Feb. 16 — The Saints name Mike McCarthy as offensive coordinator. McCarthy, who was originally named quarterbacks coach of the Saints, has worked with Brett Favre and Joe Montana, among others.

Feb. 19 — The Saints are informed that the Rams will not match the offer sheet placed on Charlie Clemons, making him the property of the New Orleans Saints, under a four-year contract. Additionally, the Saints sign TE Andrew Glover, a former Grambling State University star and Los Angeles Raiders and Minnesota Vikings standout, to a three-year contract.

Feb. 22 — The Saints sign former Grambling State University and Minnesota Vikings standout Jake Reed to a two-year contract one day after agreeing to contract terms. Reed, along with his former teammate Cris Carter, became the only wide receiver tandem in NFL history to each have over 1,000 yards receiving in four consecutive seasons (1994-97).

Feb. 23 — The Saints sign former San Diego Chargers DT Norman Hand to a five-year contract. Hand, widely considered one of the top run-stoppers in the NFL, gives the Saints their eighth free agent acquisition of 2000, marking their busiest offseason in club history and placing them at the top of the league in free agent activity.

Mar. 9 — The Saints name Nicholls State University in Thibodaux, La., as the new summer training camp home of the team. The Saints first trained in Thibodaux in 1975, and trained at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse from 1988-99.

Mar. 10 — The Saints enter into a new three-year partnership with WWL-AM (870) to broadcast all pre season and regular season Saints games. The Saints previous agreement with WWL-AM was signed in 1995 and continued through the 1999 season.

January 3, 1988 at Superdome (68,127)

In the Saints' first-ever playoff game, things started quickly, as the Vikings fumbled on the second play from scrimmage. Two plays later, it was 7-0 as Bobby Hebert hit Eric Martin for a 10-yard TD pass. But from there, it was all downhill as Minnesota scored 31 points in the first half, and never looked back. A crucial play in the game came on the final play of the first half, as Wade Wilson's "hail Mary" pass was caught by the Vikings' Hassan Jones in the end zone. Down 31-10, Dave Wilson relieved Bobby Hebert midway through the third quarter, but the results were similar. The Saints could not manage a first down rushing in the game, and were held to nine first downs overall. Meanwhile, the Vikings controlled the ball for over 41 minutes of the game. To make matters worse, Rueben Mayes tore knee ligaments that required surgery.

January 6, 1991 at Soldier Field (60,767)

The Bears got the first break of the day when John Mangum picked off a Steve Walsh pass at the Saints' 33 on the game's first series, setting up a Kevin Butler field goal. Chicago opened a 10-point lead when Mike Tomczak connected with James Thornton. The Saints took advantage of a Maury Buford 19-yard punt that landed at the Bears' 47, when Morten Andersen hit a field goal with 1:38 to play in the half. It was a costly scoring march, however, as Walsh was forced to leave the game with a separated shoulder. The Saints appeared to tie the score at 10 when Renaldo Turnbull blocked a Butler 45-yard field goal and Vince Buck scampered 61 yards for the score, but Robert Massey was flagged for lining up offside, nullifying the apparent TD. Seven plays later, Butler converted his second field goal. Following a Butler missed field goal attempt from 36 yards out, the Saints took over at their own 20 and traveled 59 yards before Andersen hit his second 3-pointer of the game to cut the Bears' lead to seven. Chicago iced the game on Butler's third field goal of the game with 2:37 to play. Shaun Gayle intercepted a John Fourcade pass on the next offensive play, sealing the Saints' fate. Sam Mills led the Saints defense with a game-high 12 tackles, while Turnbull tallied two sacks.

The Saints took the ball on their opening possession and traveled 78 yards in 8:57 towards a Bobby Hebert to Floyd Turner TD pass. The Saints looked as if they might open a 14-point lead, but Deion Sanders picked off an Hebert pass in the end zone on third-and-goal from the 3. Rickey Jackson stripped the ball from Chris Miller at the Saints' 48 on the first play of the second quarter, setting up a Morten Andersen field goal six plays later. The Falcons answered with an 80-yard drive that ate up 9:34 of the clock and ended with a Miller to Andre Rison touchdown. A Norm Johnson field goal with 37 seconds remaining in the half tied the score, but a Fred McAfee 39-yard kickoff return and a 26-yard completion from Hebert to Dalton Hilliard set up an Andersen field goal with no time left in the half. Atlanta took their first lead of the day when Miller connected with Michael Haynes for a TD 5:01 into the third quarter. New Orleans responded with a 19-play, 80-yard drive that used 10:49 of the clock and concluded with a Dalton Hilliard scoring run 50 seconds into the final frame. Atlanta tied the game when Johnson booted his second 3-pointer of the game midway through the fourth quarter, and scored the game winning points on a Miller to Haynes TD connection with 2:41 left to play. The Saints were driving at the Falcons' 35 with 1:10 to play, but Tim McKyer intercepted Hebert's pass. DE Frank Warren led the Saints' defensive charge with two sacks.

The Saints took a 10-point lead 4:04 later, three plays after Bobby Hebert opened a drive with a 20-yard completion to Quinn Early to the Eagles' 33, and two plays after Hebert connected with Vaughn Dunbar for a 24-yard strike. The first TD drive covered 64 yards in nine plays, and the second one was set up when Seth Joyner returned an interception 14 yards to the Saints' 26. Reggie White sacked Hebert in the end zone for a safety, four plays after the Birds' second touchdown, and Eric Allen returned an interception for a TD with 2:17 to play to ice the game.

2000 INSTANT REPLAY SYSTEM

The system begins with the replay booth receiving a "live" feed from the network television control truck covering the game.

The "technician" in front of the live-feed monitor cues up the live play by pressing the "make play" button on his console as the ball is snapped. That automatically puts the play on a "touch-screen monitor" positioned in front of the replay assistant. When a replay comes up from the truck, the technician presses a "make replay" button and that automatically pops up on the touch-screen monitor. The monitor can accommodate six replay angles of a single play.

The "replay assistant" is positioned in front of the touch-screen monitor. This person decides which replays will be relayed to the field monitor for review by the referee after a coach's challenge is issued, and whether an official's time-out will be called for a play review in the final two minutes of each half and overtime.

The "video operator," at the instruction of the replay assistant, will tap the touch-screen monitor (similar to a bank's automatic teller machine that prompts commands by the tapping of its screen) to transfer one of the replays to the booth's third monitor that is positioned between him and the replay assistant. The video operator can control the speed of the playback on this monitor by the turn of a dial. This is the monitor on which the replay assistant will view all replays. The video on this monitor is what the referee on the field will see.

The "communicator" is the replay booth's "eyes to the field." While the technician, replay assistant and video operator are doing their jobs, the communicator, stationed in back of the other three, is watching the field. He will advise the replay assistant - who is busy viewing the monitor - that "they're in the huddle," "they're on the line" and "the ball is snapped" so the replay assistant will know that the next play has started, negating the possibility of a replay. He will also report to the replay assistant if an official ruling (e.g. holding, illegal procedure, etc.) has been made on the field following a play that might eliminate the need for a replay.

The communicator also is the timer of the 90 seconds allocated to the referee to make a decision on a replay. Once 90 seconds are reached, the communicator will hit a red button on the console in front of the replay assistant that will automatically shut off the field-level monitor, signaling to the referee that the 90 seconds has expired and the review is over. The referee must then announce his decision.

If needed, the communicator will also explain a referee's ruling to the TV truck and to the teams' public relations directors in the press box for dissemination to the media.

A "buzzer system" will be utilized to signal the call for a replay. Before the final two minutes, the head coach will buzz the referee and replay booth that he challenges a play and wants a review. Within the final two minutes, the booth will buzz the referee, calling for a replay. The head coaches will wear a belt pack containing a buzzer. When pressed, the buzzer will simultaneously signal the referee, umpire and replay booth that a replay is being requested.

There will be three replay monitors at field level in open-air stadiums. Two will be positioned at opposite 20-yard lines near the sideline wall. A third will be in a runway, for use if there is inclement weather. Two monitors will be used in domed stadiums.

As the referee approaches the monitor, his first replay will await him. His 90 seconds for a decision begins when he puts on the headphones that put him in contact with the replay booth.

2000 RULES OF REPLAY


COACHES CHALLENGE — Outside the final two minutes of each half, each team will be permitted two challenges per game that will initiate referee reviews. Each challenge will cost a team a time-out. If a challenge is upheld, the time-out will be restored, but the challenge will not. No challenges will be recognized from a team that has exhausted its time-outs.

FINAL TWO MINUTES OF EACH HALF — After the two-minute warning of each half, and throughout any overtime period, any referee review will be initiated by the replay assistant in the replay booth in the press box. He can initiate as many review requests as he thinks necessary, no matter how many time-outs the teams may have. No time-out will be charged for a review initiated from the replay booth.

REFEREE REVIEW — All replay reviews will be conducted by the referee on a field-level monitor after consultation with the other covering officials on the play. A decision will be reversed only when the referee has indisputable visual evidence that the call should be changed. The referee cannot initiate a replay in any instance.

TIME LIMIT — Reviews will be a maximum of 90 seconds, timed from when the referee puts on the headphones to the replay booth.

VIEWABLE PLAYS — The instant replay system will cover a variety of plays in three main areas - 1) sideline, goal line, end zone, and end-line plays; 2) passing plays; and 3) other detectable infractions, such as a runner ruled down not by defensive contact, and the number of players on the field.



Three or More Clubs

When the first Wild Card team has been identified, the procedure is repeated to name the second Wild Card, i.e. eliminate all but the highest-ranked club in each division prior to proceeding to step 2, and repeated a third time, if necessary, to identify the third Wild Card. In situations where three or more teams from the same division are involved in the procedure, the original seeding of the teams remains the same for subsequent applications of the tiebreaker if the top-ranked team in that division qualifies for a Wild Card berth.

SAINTS TRAIN AT NICHOLLS STATE



Founded in 1948 as Francis T. Nicholls Junior College, Nicholls State University brings together the diverse cultures and heritage found in South Central Louisiana. The campus, which fronts Bayou Lafourche, occupies 210 acres of land formerly part of the Acadia Plantation on the eastern limits of the city of Thibodaux. The University, which has a current enrollment of over 7,300 offers 85 two-year, four-year and graduate level programs through five academic colleges - Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, the Chef John Folse Culinary Institute, Education and Life Sciences and Technology. Nicholls State, which was designated a university by an act of the Louisiana Legislature in 1970, was the first university in the state to offer a seven-on, seven-off programs for those employed in the offshore oil industry and was the first public university in the state of Louisiana to undertake a strategic planning project, which is funded entirely by private donations.

Henderson and former Saints quarterback Archie Manning will handle play-by-play and color respectively for preseason contests.



GLOSSARY OF MEDICAL TERMS

Taken from the Professional Football Athletic Trainers Society (PFATS) 1998 Media Guide.

ATC — Athletic Trainer Certified; athletic trainers with this designation have passed the certification exam administered by the NATA.

A-C Joint — Acromioclavicular joint; joint of the shoulder where acromion process (of the scapula) and the distal end of the clavicle meet; most shoulder separations occur at this point.

Achilles Tendon — The tendon at the back of the heel connecting the calf muscle to the heel bone.

Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL) — Ligament of knee attaching to anterior tibial plateau and posterior medial aspect of femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from coming forward.

Anti-inflammatory — Any agent which prevents inflammation (such as aspirin or ibuprofen).

Arthroscope — An instrument used for visualization of the interior of a joint cavity; sometimes referred to as "scope."

Arthroscopy — Examination of the internal structures of a joint by means of surgical viewing apparatus (arthroscope) inserted into the joint.

Bone Scan — "Radionuclide Imaging," which is useful to demonstrate stress fractures not evident on routine x-rays.

Burner — Common term for brachial plexus trauma in the neck. Usually results in burning or tingling sensation into the shoulder or arm when the neck is forced beyond the normal range of motion.

CT Scan (Computerized Tomography) — Use of computed radiographic equipment to get a cross sectional image of an anatomical area. Is best to visualize bony structures. It is also referred to as a CAT scan.

Chondral Fracture — Fracture to the chondral (cartilaginous) surfaces of bone.

Chondromalacia — A roughening of the cartilage surface. Best known for the roughening of the underside of the kneecap.

Concussion — A trauma-related injury to the head usually resulting in excessive forces being rapidly applied to the head and/or cervical spine. This injury is usually due to a blow to the head from the ground or opposing player. This injury is graded as mild, moderate or severe depending on severity of changes of consciousness, memory and/or equilibrium.

Degenerative Joint Disease — Changes in the joint surfaces as a result of repetitive trauma.

Dehydration — Condition resulting from excessive loss of body fluid, where fluid output exceeds fluid intake. Symptoms usually arise when fluid loss is in excess of 2 percent of the person's body weight.

Edema — Accumulation of fluid in organs and tissues of the body (swelling).

Electrolyte Drink — Fluid for replacing electrolytes, such as Gatorade™ Thirst Quencher.

EMG — Electromyogram test to check nerve function.

Fracture — Breach in continuity of a bone. Types of fractures include simple, compound, comminuted, greenstick, incomplete, impacted, longitudinal, oblique, stress or transverse.

Groin — The upper and inner thigh where the adductor muscles originate that are responsible for moving the leg in an inward or adduction direction.

Hamstring — Muscle running from the buttocks to behind the knee. Often injured as a result of improper conditioning or lack of muscle flexibility. Muscle responsible for flexing the knee joint.

Heat Stroke — Condition of rapidly rising internal body temperature that overwhelms the nervous system's mechanisms for release of heat.

Heat Exhaustion — Mild form of shock resulting from inadequate replacement of fluids lost through sweating and uncontrolled increase in body core temperature.

Heat Cramps — Painful muscle spasms of arms or legs, likely caused by depletion of fluids and electrolytes.

High "Interosseous" Ankle Sprain — An injury to the interosseous membrane, which is the fibrous tissue that stabilizes the two bones of the shin (tibia and fibula). This injury is usually due to excessive ankle rotation along with accompanied trauma to the ligamentous structures of the ankle joint.

Interosseous Membrane — Uniting membrane between the tibia and fibula that forms a collagenous fibrous tissue. It has two functions: to serve as an origin for many of the muscles of the lower leg, and to transmit stress from the tibia to the fibula.

Lateral Collateral Ligament (LCL) — Ligament of knee attaching lateral femoral condyle to the fibula head. It provides lateral stability to the knee.

Ligament — Band of fibrous tissue that connects bone to bone or bone to cartilage and supports and strengthens joints.

Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) — Provides highly detailed pictures of the body's interior, using magnetic fields. It is especially useful in athletic injuries to visualize soft tissues such as ligaments and tendons.

Medial Collateral Ligament (MCL) — Ligament of knee attaching to medial femoral condyle and to medial tibia. It provides medial stability to the knee.

Meniscus — Crescent-shaped cartilage of the knee located between the femur and the tibia bones.

Plantar Fascia — The tight band of muscle and connective tissue beneath the arch of the foot.

PNF (Proprioceptive Neuromuscular Facilitation) — An approach to therapeutic exercise based on the principles of functional human anatomy and neurophysiology.

Posterior Cruciate Ligament (PCL) — Ligament of the knee attaching to posterior tibial plateau and anterior lateral aspect of femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from going backward.

Progressive Resistance Exercise (PRE) — An approach to exercise whereby the load or resistance to the muscle is applied by some mechanical means and is quantitatively and progressively increased over time.

Quadriceps (Quads) — The four powerful muscles in the front of the thigh, responsible for extending the knee joint.

Rotator Cuff — Comprised of four muscles in the shoulder area: supraspinatus, infraspinatus, teres minor and subscapularis. Often irritated by overuse.

S-C Joint — Sternoclavicular joint; articulation between the sternum and the clavicle.

Sciatic Nerve — Largest nerve in body located in back of leg which controls most of its function.

Sciatica — Irritation of the sciatic nerve, resulting in pain or tingling running down the inside of the leg.

Shin Splint — A catch-all syndrome describing pain either in the front of the lower leg or on the inner aspect of the leg.

Shoulder Separation — Refers to a sprain of the A-C joint where the tip of the clavicle may be elevated from its normal position of attachment on the acromion process.

Sprain — A joint injury. A violent, twisting, stretching, pulling or tearing of a ligament.

1st Degree — A stretching but no tear of a ligament. Athlete may be able to continue to play or usually return to play in a few days.

2nd Degree — A partial tear of a ligament. Bracing may be required. Athlete will usually miss one to four weeks.

3rd Degree — A complete tear of a ligament. Depending on ligament involved, bracing or even surgery may be required. Athlete is usually out from three weeks up to 12 months depending on course of treatment.

Stinger — Common term for brachial plexus trauma in the neck.

Strain — A muscle injury. The stretching, pulling or twisting of a muscle or tendon.

1st Degree — A stretching but no tear of a muscle or tendon. Athlete may be able to continue to play or usually return to play in a few days.

2nd Degree — A partial tear of a muscle or tendon. Athlete will usually miss one to four weeks.

3rd Degree — A complete tear of a muscle or tendon. Depending upon muscle or tendon involved, surgery may be required. Athlete is usually out from six weeks up to six months.

Stress X-Ray — A continual x-ray taken when a portion of the body is stressed to its maximum to see if the ligaments are intact.

Stress Fracture — A hair-line type of break in bone caused by overuse.

Stretching — Any therapeutic maneuver designed to lengthen (elongate) pathologically shortened soft-tissue structures and thereby increase range of motion.

Subluxation — Partial dislocation of a joint. Term usually implies that joint can return to normal position without formal reduction.

Tendinitis — Inflammation of the tendon and/or tendon sheath, often caused by chronic overuse and/or sudden injury.

Turf Toe — Sprain of the metatarsophalangeal (MTP) joint of the great toe.

NEW ORLEANS SAINTS FACILITY



On April 15, 1996, a first in New Orleans Saints history occurred when the entire organization moved into the club's new facility, located at 5800 Airline Drive in Metairie. It marked the first time ever that Saints coaches, players and staff have been housed under one roof.

The two story, 65,000 square foot facility, which is situated on a 19.2 acre tract, contains three practice fields. Two, which are laid out symmetrically, are planted with Bermuda grass and are surrounded by an asphalt, half-mile running track. The third field is made up of 70 yards of artificial turf and 50 yards of grass. Also outside is a full-length basketball court.

The first floor is approximately 43,000 square feet, and serves primarily the needs of the players. It also consists of a reception area, ticket office, media workroom and storage areas.

The lockerroom, which is completely carpeted, contains 75 lockers, each 44 inches wide. Adjacent to the lockerroom are a players lounge and shower area that includes a built-in whirlpool and cold dip pool, sauna room and steam room. The training room consists of nine treatment tables, a three-man taping station, three therapeutic whirlpools, one Hydro Track and Bidex rehabilitation equipment. The equipment room, which includes a loading dock making it accessible for 18-wheeler tractor trailers, is 3,600 square feet. The weight room, also fully carpeted, is 4,050 square feet.

A 1,700 square foot auditorium which sits on the first floor, can seat 110 players for team meetings, and can be divided into two rooms. On either side of the auditorium, are eight smaller team meeting rooms.

Located on the second story are offices for coaches, player personnel, the video department and administrative staff. It has the capacity for an additional 23,000 square feet.

From Airport: Turn left onto Airline Drive. Take Airline Drive for approximately 4-5 miles. Practice facility will be on the right.

From New Orleans/East: Take I-10 West to Clearview Parkway exit. Follow Clearview Parkway South to Airline Drive. Turn right onto Airline Drive. Take Airline Drive for approximately 1.2 miles. Practice facility will be on the left.

From Baton Rouge/West: Take I-10 East to Clearview Parkway exit. Follow Clearview Parkway South to Airline Drive. Turn right onto Airline Drive. Take Airline Drive for approximately 1.2 miles. Practice facility will be on the left.
