Tom BENSON OWNER

It has been 18 years since Tom Benson officially assumed ownership of the New Orleans Saints, a period that not coincidentally ranks as the most successful and thrilling period in club history for the team and its fans. During that tenure, Benson has emerged as one of the NFL's most respected and influential leaders. But his impact goes beyond his importance within the team and the league. His vision and hard work has made the organization a leading economic force in the entire region, and Benson's integrity and compassion has made the club an outstanding example of positive community leadership.

Benson has built his reputation through a record of accomplishment and service to the State of Louisiana, City of New Orleans, the Gulf South region and the NFL. The Saints have been consistent winners on the field since his arrival, as Benson's unwavering goal has remained for the club to annually rank among the most admired franchises in all of pro sports.

Prior to his ownership, the Saints and their fans had never enjoyed a winning season, won a division title nor experienced the excitement of a playoff victory. But just a year after Benson assumed the reins of the franchise, New Orleans stormed to a 12-3 record in 1987 and the Superdome hosted its first NFL playoff game. In 1990, the Saints captured an NFC Wild Card berth again, and the following year the club won its first NFC West title. In 1992, New Orleans would go 12-4 and march into the playoffs. And in 2000, the Saints captured the NFC West crown and won the first postseason contest in team record books.

His dedication, hard work, integrity and the success of the Saints has made Benson one of the most trusted and valued figures in the NFL community, where he plays a key role in many capacities, including as Chairman of the NFL Finance Committee. It's his second stint in one of

Under Benson's guidance, New Orleans has twice captured division titles, gone to the postseason five times and won the first playoff game in franchise history to cap a record-filled 2000 season.

The Saints have a .519 winning percentage (70-65) in the Superdome since 1986. In the years before Benson installed his first management team to head the Saints, the club posted a winning percentage of .362 (50-87-1) from 1967-85. The club has posted a .500 record or better in the Superdome for 11 years under Benson's ownership.

Despite the club having reached a .500 overall record only once before 1986, the Saints have reached the milestone nine times since, including five years with 10 or more victories.

The Saints have had 53 players voted to the Pro Bowl since 1986, while only 20 players represented New Orleans in the postseason all-star game in the 19 seasons before Benson took control of the franchise. The Saints have also had 38 players earn first-team All-Pro honors since 1986, while only 14 players won the honor before that season.

the league's most influential positions, as he also chaired the committee in the 1990s.

His involvement in the league started innocently enough in 1985, when Benson learned that the Saints were on the verge of being sold to out-of-town interests who were primed to move the team from New Orleans. As one of the area's top businessmen, Benson understood the economic and social impact and importance of the franchise to not just the city, but the entire region. So in 1985, he spearheaded the effort to keep the Saints. And unlike others, it wasn't just an emotional plea – Benson put his resources on the line to purchase the club and preserve it for Louisiana.

And while Benson's work within the organization is often cited, his efforts have also paid dividends for New Orleans and the surrounding area. During his tenure as Owner, the city has hosted four Super Bowls. Each time, Benson has been the leading advocate of the city's campaign to secure the game. And each Super Bowl has represented an economic windfall for the area that totals over \$300 million, not to mention the substantial charitable contributions that the league makes to the host city during Super Bowl week.

Then there is his commitment to the region's schools and people, as community service has been a true hallmark of Benson's tenure with the Saints. Recently, he set an unprecedented goal

of giving back \$50 million to the Gulf South community over the next decade. Since implementing a system that has centralized all donation efforts, the club has already provided well over \$5 million in donations, goods and services.

In 1945, Benson served in the U.S. Navy aboard the U.S.S. South Dakota and has remained particularly close to this branch of the armed forces. He is the only enlisted man to ever serve on the Board of Trustees of the Pensacola Naval Museum, and has been honored with an award from the crew of the submarine U.S.S. Louisiana. A leading advocate for the National

Recently, Benson set an unprecedented goal of giving back \$50 million to the Greater New Orleans and Gulf South community over the next decade. The Saints are well on their way to reaching that lofty mark, as the club has provided well over \$5 million to the surrounding area in monetary donations, goods and services.

Benson has spearheaded a full-scale partnership with the military that includes everything from discounted game tickets to mentoring efforts with the military's Adopt a School Program. He and his fellow NFL Owners combined to contribute \$1 million toward the construction of the National World War II Memorial in Washington D.C. Locally, Benson is a member of the Board of Directors for the D-Day Museum.

World War II Memorial in Washington D.C., Benson was also a major contributor to The National D-Day Museum in New Orleans, with his pledges helping fund the Pacific Exhibit Grand Opening and the Midway Theater. He also serves on the museum's board of directors.

Because of those efforts and others – including Saints Flag Football in area middle schools, the Saints Venture Fund and Impact Grants Program for underprivileged kids and Benson's support of football from the smallest playgrounds to the Bayou Classic – the World Sports Humanitarian Hall of Fame has twice recognized Benson's team as one of the five most charitable professional organizations.

Through ownership of the Saints, it has been Benson's long-term goal to place the city of New Orleans, the State of Louisiana and the Gulf Coast region at the forefront of professional sports and to have his team support the community in many other economic, civic and charitable ways. And through 18 years, that goal has consistently been met – both on the field and off.

MILESTONES

- 1985** Ownership of the club officially transferred to Tom Benson on May 31. Benson becomes managing general partner of the Saints. Because training camp is a little more than a month away, Benson maintained the team management group that he inherited.
- 1986** The Benson influence really begins, as the Owner puts his management team in charge of the franchise. His first hire: Jim Finks as president/general manager on Jan. 14. Jim Mora is named the club's 10th head coach two weeks later.
- 1987** The Saints post a franchise-best 12-3 record – including victories in the final nine contests – as New Orleans makes the playoffs for the first time. After the season, two Benson hires, Jim Finks and Jim Mora, win Executive and Coach of the Year honors, respectively.
- 1988** Saints finish 10-6, posting consecutive winning seasons for the first time in team history.
- 1989** Benson appointed Chairman of the league's most influential group, the NFL Finance Committee, a position he would keep before stepping down in the mid-1990s.
- 1990** Saints earn NFC Wild Card berth, marking the second postseason appearance in club record books.
- 1991** New Orleans clinched its first-ever division championship at 11-5 as the Superdome hosts its first playoff game.
- 1992** Saints post a 12-4 record and host a playoff game for the second-straight year. Benson assumes sole ownership of the club.
- 1993** Finks diagnosed with lung cancer, in his absence Benson temporarily takes over the general manager position.
- 1995** Groundbreaking begins for new Saints practice facility on Airline Drive in Metairie.
- 1996** Marking a first for the organization, the coaches, players and staff are housed under one roof with the opening of the team's state-of-the-art training facility.
- 1999** Benson promises the club's fans he will "take whatever steps necessary at the end of the regular season to make the New Orleans Saints a winning franchise."
- 2000** Former Saints assistant coach and defensive coordinator Jim Haslett hired as the 13th head coach in club history. New Orleans wins the NFC West with a 10-6 record as the club goes from last to first in the division. The Saints win their first playoff game, a 31-28 thriller over St. Louis in the Superdome. Haslett wins NFL Coach of the Year.
- 2001** New Orleans hosts its fourth Super Bowl during Benson's tenure as Owner. Benson announces he will bring another professional sports franchise to New Orleans with the start an Arena Football League team, the New Orleans Voodoo.
- 2003** Benson again appointed Chairman of the league's Finance Committee; Construction of new indoor practice facility with improved locker room and weight room begins and to be finished before training camp; Logo and lead management group for the VooDoo announced.

Rita LeBlanc begins her third full-time season with the Saints in a new role as Finance & Business Executive. In addition to acting as an advisor to the Saints Board of Directors, LeBlanc will continue representing the Club at NFL Ownership meetings as well as in the greater New Orleans community. LeBlanc also acts as a liaison for varying special events, league-level relations and business development projects. In this role she has spearheaded efforts toward stadium research, Club fiscal efficiencies and international soccer exhibition youth programs. LeBlanc also

planned the Ownership social gala during Super Bowl XXXVI attended by VIPs including former President George H. W. Bush, among other programs and activities.

LeBlanc has pursued a career in sports entertainment since 1998 with NFL internship programs at the Saints, the NFL headquarters in New York, the NFL Properties Publishing group in Los Angeles and NFL Films in Mount Laurel, N.J. She returned to the Saints full-time in 2001 and since has worked in Football Operations, assisted the offensive coaching staff with game preparation, coordinated marketing efforts and business office projects. She has also contributed during stints with the team in the public relations, video and ticket office departments.

With the addition of the New Orleans VooDoo to the Saints' sports portfolio, LeBlanc has taken a key position as the Director of Marketing and Special Events. She has energized the brand building of the new franchise both locally and nationally through ongoing partnerships and promotions. LeBlanc will take a lead role in creating the high intensity AFL gameday experience.

LeBlanc is a graduate of Texas A&M University with a Bachelor's in AgriBusiness and a minor in International Business. She represented the Saints in June of 2003 in the first NFL Managers Program at the Stanford University Executive Education Graduate School of Business.

EXECUTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT ADMINISTRATION

Arnold D. Fielkow enters his fourth season with the Saints, having recently been promoted to Executive Vice-President with a new contract through 2006. In this capacity, he serves as the club's top senior management official on the administrative/business side and oversees all aspects of administration: marketing and sales, governmental affairs, community relations and youth programming.

During his tenure with the Saints, Fielkow has been instrumental in improving the team's influence both nationally and locally throughout the Gulf South region. Upon joining the Saints, Fielkow immediately restructured the Saints business and marketing efforts, with an emphasis on enhancing the club's ticket, suite, sponsorship and special event sales.

Under his leadership, the Saints have sold out 22 consecutive games in the 70,000-seat Louisiana Superdome, including a complete sell-out of the two 2002 preseason games for the first time in club history. Over the past three seasons, the club has also reached a virtual sellout of the 137 Superdome box suites and has seen a three-fold increase in corporate sponsorship sales through the new Patron Saints Partners program.

Understanding the importance of regional marketing for the organization, Fielkow also created and implemented the most comprehensive regional sales operation in major league professional sports, with nine on the ground sales representatives put in place around a four-state area surrounding the city of New Orleans. In just three years, regional sales have jumped from eight percent to 25 percent of the Saints' overall business.

In addition to his business work, Fielkow also led the Saints negotiation and legislative team in its recently-completed agreement with the State of Louisiana. This 10-year agreement, which helped ensure the club's future presence in New Orleans, was the culmination of a multi-year effort by Mr. Benson, Fielkow and other members of the organization. Under the agreement, the Saints will receive significant financial inducements over the next decade, including funding for the recent construction of the new indoor practice facility at the Saints training facility in Metairie. This agreement was overwhelmingly approved by the Louisiana legislature in April 2002 and signed into law by Gov. Mike Foster on April 18, 2002.

Fielkow has also initiated a number of innovative business/marketing projects, including the NFL's first Fan Advisory Board, a Saints-led international trade mission to Honduras, a marketing partnership with the legendary Harlem Globetrotters, Football 101 mini-camps both for the Saints female fan base and the Hispanic community, a Business Breakfast series with the top 200 business leaders in New Orleans and throughout the Gulf South, Draft Day and Monday Night Football cruises and a Saints ticket sales Radio-a-thon. Fielkow has also overseen tremendous growth in the Saints youth programming, high-

lighted by its involvement in the NFL's Junior Player Development program. Teaming with the NFL and the Orleans Parish School Board, the Saints have been instrumental, through the JPD program, in returning tackle football to the New Orleans public middle schools.

Prior to joining the Saints, Fielkow was President and General Counsel of the Southern League of Professional Baseball Clubs. During his six-year tenure, Fielkow oversaw the construction and renovation of six new ballparks and introduced marketing and business programs that catapulted the Southern League into one of the most respected leagues within Minor League Baseball. Fielkow was also elected to serve as President of Minor League Baseball's Double A Association in 1996.

Before his Southern League career, Fielkow served for three years as Deputy Commissioner and General Counsel of the Continental Basketball Association, the official developmental league of the NBA. During his tenure, he negotiated new player and referee development agreements with the NBA and helped the League reach record attendance levels. He also introduced and administered several new programs, including a national television agreement with ESPN2, a CBA national radio contract, and a multi-game exhibition series involving former Lakers' great Magic Johnson. He was also elected to the Board of Directors of USA Basketball.

Fielkow began his professional career as a practicing attorney in Chicago, and eventually co-founded the suburban Chicago law firm of Grossman, Solomon, & Fielkow, P.C. This firm concentrated its practice in the areas of sports, insurance, banking and real estate law. Fielkow began his sports career as part of his law practice when he was appointed Commissioner of the NCAA Division I North Star Conference (currently the Mid-Continent Conference).

The Chicago-based conference was the last all-female conference at the Division I level. Fielkow was successful in securing the conference's first-ever automatic bid to the NCAA Division I basketball tournament. Fielkow is a member of the Illinois and Wisconsin Bar Associations and has authored several legal and sports-related articles/publications, including "Civil Rico: The Insurers Fight Back" and "CBA: A World of Opportunity".

Fielkow has immersed himself in the New Orleans community by serving on the Board of Directors for the Greater New Orleans Chamber of Commerce, MetroVision, United Way, Each One, Save One, the World Trade Center, Touro Hospital Foundation, Greater New Orleans Sports Foundation and Tulane University's Hillel Foundation. Fielkow was also an executive committee member of the Super Bowl XXXVI Host Committee and is an active youth coach in the Uptown New Orleans Carrollton youth program.

A native of Appleton, Wis., Fielkow is a 1981 graduate of the University of Wisconsin - School of Law and earned his B. A. degree with honors from Northwestern University. In 1978, Fielkow was selected as a member of the prestigious Phi Beta Kappa honorary society and has been presented with a "Who's Who" citation recognizing his achievements.

He is an avid sports fan, having played tennis on the collegiate level and was selected to the silver-medal winning United States men's basketball team at the 15th Maccabiah Games in Israel.

He and his wife, Dr. Susan Fielkow, have three sons, Justin, Michael and Steven.

Mickey LOOMIS

EXECUTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT/

He balances an unflappable approach to major decisions, attention to detail and polished leadership skills. Matched with 20 years of NFL experience in making major decisions, this combination of traits has made Mickey Loomis a natural for the legion of duties that come with directing the New Orleans Saints on a daily basis, and he has proven to be skilled executive since assuming the post of General Manager of Football Operations last year.

He was promoted again by Owner Tom Benson in October of 2002, earning the additional title of Executive Vice President to go along with General Manager. Though his title and responsibilities have evolved during his stint in New Orleans, Loomis continues to follow the same fundamental beliefs that have defined his NFL tenure: Have confidence in those around you, consider every option and be assertive and resolute with each decision.

In a move that stabilized the club's future, Benson signed Loomis to a contract extension last October that runs through 2006, with options to extend. Loomis, who had previously served as the club's Director Football Administration from 2000-2002, oversees all aspects of the organization's football operations, including coaching, player personnel, salary cap management, contract negotiations, equipment, video, athletic training and public relations.

Loomis hit the ground running after taking over the General Manager post last May. His immediate responsibilities last year were many: Sign Coach Jim Haslett to a long-term contract extension, ink QB Aaron Brooks to a new deal and get the club's nine draft picks signed before the opening of training camp. Haslett agreed to a new contract in August, and the club signed Brooks to a six-year extension a few weeks later. Eight of the team's nine draft picks were under contract by the start of camp, and top pick WR Donte' Stallworth signed two days later.

The first complete offseason of Loomis' tenure was just as busy, as the Saints have been very active since the team closed 2002 at 9-7. In free agency, the Saints signed top tackle Wayne Gandy and bolstered the defense by nabbing CB Ashley Ambrose and LB Orlando Ruff. The club also pulled off three shrewd trades, with the Saints acquiring Minnesota backup QB Todd Bouman for a 2003 sixth-round pick, dealing for LB Derrick Rodgers from Miami and stockpiling for the future by sending T Kyle Turley to St. Louis for a second-round choice in 2004. Loomis also engineered a swap of No. 1 picks during the NFL Draft to bring highly-coveted DT Johnathan Sullivan to the Saints.

Loomis has also been a guiding force in the off-season construction at the team's headquarters, a needed facelift that has given the Saints one of the NFL's most extensive training areas. The world-class structure now includes an indoor practice facility, a new weight room and a cafeteria. The locker room, training room and team meeting areas have also been redesigned and improved.

Loomis brings a blend of experiences to his position. In his former post, he handled contract negotiations with free agents and draft picks and also managed the club's salary cap structure.

Prior to joining the Saints, Loomis spent 15 years with the Seattle Seahawks, most recently as Executive Vice President from 1992-98. He originally joined the Seahawks staff in October 1983, was promoted to vice president/finance in 1990 and then to executive vice president in 1992.

Loomis earned his undergraduate degree in accounting from the University of Oregon and also holds a master's degree in sports administration from Wichita State University.

Ball arrived in New Orleans after spending the 2001 season as the Director of Football Administration for the Washington Redskins. In that position, Ball assisted then-Head Coach Marty Schottenheimer with the daily responsibilities and administrative duties of running an NFL organization. His wide-ranging duties included managing the salary cap as well as overseeing team operations, equipment, video and athletic training departments and their respective budgets.

Nagaoka is a graduate of the University of Washington, with degrees in Communications and Japanese Literature.



As the team's top personnel executive, Director of Player Personnel Rick Mueller is the point man in the Saints' never-ending effort to keep the roster stocked with talented players. He is responsible for coordinating all aspects of player evaluation, from grading highly-coveted NFL free agents to scanning the waiver wire to scouting college prospects. His duties also include supervising and coordinating the organization's contingent of college and pro scouts, and his efforts peak each year by running the club's draft room.

Entering his fourth season in New Orleans, Mueller has helped shape the club's last three drafts and free agent classes, which now make up the foundation of the team. On offense, that haul includes RB Deuce McAllister, who was selected to the Pro Bowl last year after rushing for 1,388 yards and scoring 16 TDs, WR Donte' Stallworth, who hauled in a club rookie-record eight touchdowns in 2002, and G LeCharles Bentley, a starter and unanimous All-Rookie pick following last season.

On defense, the Saints have selected DE Charles Grant, who had seven sacks as a rookie in 2002, LB Sedrick Hodge, who started all 16 games last year, and LB James Allen, a top special teams contributor as a rookie who will vie for a starting spot this season.

Mueller came to the team after spending six years with the Jacksonville Jaguars, where he was instrumental in that team's rapid rise from an expansion franchise in 1995 to AFC power. From 1996-99, Jacksonville captured two AFC Central Division titles and played in two conference championship games. Mueller served as the Jaguars' Director of College Scouting in 1998-99 and was in charge of his first college draft in 1999. Prior to being promoted to that position, Mueller was Jacksonville's college scout for the Western United States.

In 1993, Mueller served as Director of Player Personnel and wide receivers coach for the CFL Sacramento Gold Miners. In the spring and summer of 1992, he worked as defensive assistant and special teams coach for the World League's Sacramento Surge. In that assignment, Mueller worked alongside then-defensive coordinator Jim Haslett. The Surge finished with an 8-2 record and captured the World Bowl Championship.

Following that season, Mueller served as one of five pro scouts for the World League. Working for the Surge was Mueller's first pro assignment after serving as a graduate assistant at Washington State University from 1990-92 where he was quarterbacks coach, head junior varsity coach and recruiting coordinator.

While at Washington State, he coached Buffalo Bills quarterback Drew Bledsoe, who was the first overall pick in the 1993 draft and a three-time Pro Bowl pick. Mueller began his football career as a training camp assistant with the Seattle Seahawks from 1985-90.

A graduate of the University of Puget Sound, Mueller was a three-year starter at quarterback. He received a bachelor's degree in communications in 1990 and attended graduate school studying communications at Washington State from 1990-92. Mueller and his wife, Andrea, have twin sons, Chase and Rhett.




Rick THOMPSON




Mike FAULKNER

Andy WEIDL AREA SCOUT





Patton has two children: Cameron (13) and Alexis (7).







He and his wife, Elaine, live in Mandeville. They have three children, Tracy, Tony and Amy, along with four grandchildren.





Ricky PORTER DIRECTOR OF PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Ricky Porter is in his fourth year with the Saints as Director of Player Development. In his position, Porter acts as the player's primary liaison with coaches and management. Porter also provides a comprehensive career development program to create a smooth transition for players who are both coming into or adjusting to life after professional football. Included in those efforts are life skills training seminars, continuing education opportunities for players to complete their college degrees, career internships, financial education classes and family assistance.

Porter's duties aren't limited to off-field responsibilities. He has also taken a key role in helping develop the talents of the Saints' kick and punt returners, including 2002 Pro Bowl pick Michael Lewis.

Before coming to New Orleans, Porter served for three years on the Denver Broncos' coaching staff, starting in 1997 as an offensive assistant. He spent the 1996 season in the same capacity with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Prior to his stint in Tampa Bay, Porter worked as a scout for National Football Scouting in 1995, where his main responsibility was assessing talent in the Ohio Valley region.

Porter has had previous NFL coaching experience with Buffalo (1991), New Orleans (1993) and Detroit (1994) through the league's Minority Coaching Fellowship Program. His first full-time experience came at his alma mater, Slippery Rock State, where he coached the running backs and special teams in 1990-91 before moving on to handle the same responsibilities at Kent State from 1992-93.


Porter played five years in the NFL with Detroit (1982), Baltimore (1983) and Buffalo (1987-90). He also played for the USFL's Memphis Showboats in 1985 and the CFL's Montreal Alouettes from 1986-87.

A member of the Slippery Rock Sports Hall of Fame, Porter was the first player ever drafted from the Division II school, chosen by Detroit in 1982, after leading the nation in rushing as a senior. He also played for the Rockets' baseball and track teams. In 1990, he put his baseball skills to use as a member of the Baltimore Orioles' AAA Rochester Red Wings. Porter holds a bachelor's degree in communications from Slippery Rock and a master's degree in athletic administration from Kent State.

A native of Sylacauga, Ala., Porter grew up in Baltimore, Md., where he was a three-sport standout at Milford Mill High School. He is a member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. Ricky and his wife, Carla, have two sons, Armani Vaniko and Otavio Vantaj.

Jim HASLETT HEAD COACH

Coach Jim Haslett, who has led the club to 26 regular-season victories and the first playoff win in franchise history since being hired in early 2000, enters his fourth season as Head Coach of the New Orleans Saints. With the foundation of the team taking shape after three years of retooling the roster, Haslett enters 2003 already ranked second in winning percentage (.541) among all 13 coaches in team record books.

Observers predicted a lengthy rebuilding project when Haslett arrived, but he has ignored that timetable and the expectations surrounding the Saints have grown with his demanding standards. Haslett just keeps pushing forward, including signing a multi-year extension last August which keeps the strong-willed coach under contract with New Orleans through 2006, with options to extend.

To get his message across, he fosters teamwork while relying on intensity, a zeal for preparation and a dedication to the basics of blocking and tackling. In an NFL era where the makeup of a team can change dramatically each year because of free agency, Haslett's ability to rapidly create a winning atmosphere among those who were once football strangers ranks among his greatest strengths.

Though his focus remains firmly on the future, the Saints' successes over his first three seasons cannot be ignored. Despite having 10 new starters in 2002 the Saints posted a 9-7 record, including a pair of memorable victories over the Super Bowl XXXVII-Champion Tampa Bay Buccaneers. New Orleans led the NFC with a team-record 432 points, while the special teams also sparkled as one of the NFL's most opportunistic units.

Haslett's keen attention to detail and commitment to preparation are best reflected in the way New Orleans has performed on the road. The Saints are a stellar 16-8 in enemy stadiums since Haslett's arrival, despite the club having dropped the previous 14 away games before he was hired.

Haslett led New Orleans to the NFC West title and a playoff victory in 2000. The team put an exclamation point on an eventful season with a 31-28 triumph over the St. Louis Rams on Dec. 30, 2000 for the first playoff win in New Orleans. With that victory, Haslett had led the Saints to greater heights in his first season than the previous 12 head coaches in franchise history. Following that historic effort, Haslett was a unanimous selection for NFL Coach of the Year.

COACHING STAFF

Haslett's 26 regular-season victories ranks second in club history for a coach after his initial three years, trailing only Jim Mora's 29 wins from 1986-88. The Saints have been defined by an attacking defense and a hard-nosed offense during Haslett's tenure by posting 158 sacks over the last three seasons while averaging a robust 373 points.

A 19-year veteran of the NFL as a player and coach, Haslett was hired by New Orleans on Feb. 3, 2000. With the reputation as a player's coach who accepted little nonsense, Haslett's coaching star had been on the rise in league circles for years. He spent 1997-99 as the defensive coordinator for the Pittsburgh Steelers, where his aggressive blitzing schemes helped create one of the NFL's most dominant units. He tutored a defense that led Pittsburgh to the AFC Championship in 1997.

This is Haslett's second tour of duty in New Orleans. He spent two years with the Saints, first as the linebackers coach in 1995 followed by a one-year stint as the defensive coordinator

under Mora in 1996. In his first season as coordinator, New Orleans improved from 22nd to 13th in the NFL in defense.

From 1993-94, Haslett was the linebackers coach for the Los Angeles Raiders. In 1993, the Raiders posted a 10-6 record, while current Saints linebackers coach Winston Moss had one of the best seasons with a team-high 102 tackles.

From 1991-92, Haslett was the defensive coordinator for the Sacramento Surge of the World League. In 1992, the Surge won the WLAF title. Haslett opened his coaching career in 1988, handling linebackers at the University of Buffalo. A year later

he was promoted to defensive coordinator and served in that capacity for two years.

The bedrock of Haslett's coaching principles was forged during his stellar playing career. After being drafted out of Indiana University of Pennsylvania in the second round of the 1979 NFL Draft by the Buffalo Bills, Haslett was voted the Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year. He played eight seasons with the Bills – including earning All-Pro honors in 1981 – and finished his career in 1987 with the New York Jets.

Haslett played defensive end at IUP, where he was selected as an All-American. He enrolled at IUP and joined the football team as a walk-on, yet still set school records with 20 sacks and five fumble recoveries in a season. As a senior Haslett even took over the team's punting duties and averaged 41.5 yards per kick. His collegiate career was recognized with his induction into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2001.

Born Dec. 9, 1955, in Pittsburgh, Haslett and his wife, Beth, have two daughters, Kelsey and Elizabeth, and a son, Chase.



Mike McCARTHY

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

After just three seasons in New Orleans, Mike McCarthy has already logged more success than any offensive coordinator in club history. Known for creating innovative attacks with quick-strike potential as well as chain-moving power, McCarthy's offenses have improved each year while blazing a wide path through the Saints' all-time record books.

McCarthy has led an offensive revival in New Orleans by relying on an uncompromising attention to detail, skilled game-planning and a dedication to the principles of the West Coast offensive system. Since 2000, the Saints have emerged as one of the NFL's most explosive and consistent offenses. Last season, the team shattered club records by scoring 432 points and 49 touchdowns, both NFC-leading totals.

Those weren't the only new marks established by the offense last season, as McCarthy put the Saints' legion of playmakers in position to have success on a weekly basis. QB Aaron Brooks set a club record with 27 touchdown passes. WR Joe Horn posted a team-record six 100-yard receiving days – part of a record eight 100-yard games recorded by the wide receiver corps – while fellow WR Donte' Stallworth hauled in eight touchdown grabs, more than any rookie in club history.

Setting new records and scoring points has been a familiar refrain for the Saints offense since McCarthy arrived. New Orleans finished 10th in the NFL in total offense in 2000 and 2001, marking the first time since 1979 that the club closed a season ranked among the NFL's top 10. Following the 2000 season, McCarthy was chosen as the NFC Assistant Coach of the Year by USA Today.

When McCarthy arrived in New Orleans, the Saints hadn't had a wide receiver reach 1,000 yards in eight years. But Horn has averaged over 1,300 yards the last three seasons, and in 2002 he teamed with Stallworth and Jerome Pathon to combine for 172 catches for 2,429 yards and 19 TDs. Also, upon McCarthy's hiring, the team hadn't had a running back post a 1,000-yard rushing season in a decade, but a Saints' running back has reached the mark in each of the last three seasons, including RB Deuce McAllister's conference-high 1,388 yards in 2002. That total included eight 100-yard performances, and his 13 rushing touchdowns tied a club record.

Brooks, who McCarthy first tutored as quarterbacks coach in Green Bay in 1999 during the passer's rookie season, has developed into one of the NFL's most dangerous young quarterbacks. In 37 career starts, Brooks has passed for over 250 yards 16 times and has tossed 62 touchdowns (already third all-time in team history). In 2000, Brooks stepped in for an injured Jeff Blake – who was off to one of the best seasons of his career – and passed for a team record 441 yards in one contest and rushed for 108 yards a few weeks later.

The success of both quarterbacks proves that McCarthy's system hasn't been held back by a constant influx of new personnel nor the efforts of opposing defenses, as the Saints have recorded nearly 16,000 yards of total offense since 2000, the highest three-year total in franchise history. In 2002, New Orleans joined the New York Giants as the only teams to have

a 3,500 yard passer, 1,300 yard rusher and 1,300 yard receiver.

But piling up impressive numbers is nothing new for offenses that McCarthy has been involved with, as he has emerged as one of the NFL's most promising young coaching minds. Though only 39, he has worked with some of the game's most accomplished coaches and players, with each helping shape McCarthy's offensive philosophy.

While coaching quarterbacks at Green Bay in 1999, the Packers ranked seventh in the NFL in passing and ninth overall in total offense, with quarterback Brett Favre passing for 4,091 yards.

McCarthy also spent six seasons with the Kansas City Chiefs, serving as quarterbacks coach for the last four years. As an offensive assistant in 1993-94, he worked closely with Hall of Fame quarterback Joe Montana. As QB coach from 1995-98, McCarthy's signal callers threw just 52 interceptions – the lowest total in the AFC during that period despite Kansas City using three starting quarterbacks over that span (Steve Bono, Rich Gannon and Elvis Grbac).

Before joining the Chiefs, McCarthy coached at the University of Pittsburgh from 1989-92 under head coach Paul Hackett, renowned as an innovator in West Coast offenses. McCarthy spent his first three years working with the quarterbacks before tutoring the wide receivers during his final season at the school. McCarthy's top pupil at Pittsburgh, NFL veteran QB Alex Van Pelt, broke Dan Marino's school records for career and single-season passing yards.

A collegiate tight end, McCarthy was an all-conference selection (1985-86) at Baker University (Kan.). McCarthy captained the school's 1986 team that finished as an NAIA Division II National runner-up. After his playing career, McCarthy joined the coaching staff at Fort Hays State (Kan.) as a graduate assistant from 1987-88.

The Pittsburgh, Pa., native was born Nov. 10, 1963, and has a daughter, Alexandra.



Rick VENTURI

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

For over two decades he has been a constant in NFL coaching circles, holding nearly every title in that span and earning a reputation among his peers as one of the game's top defensive strategists and teachers.

During his career, he has spent countless hours on practice fields, in meeting rooms, studying game film and pacing the sidelines, a work ethic that has kept defensive coordinator

Rick Venturi among the league's innovators during the steady evolution of defensive strategy.

In 2003, he enters his eighth season on the Saints' coaching staff and second as defensive coordinator. Venturi has earned the respect of players and fellow coaches by consistently cutting out the clutter and breaking every player's responsibilities down into their simplest form. He will rely on those skills again this season, as New Orleans could feature up to seven new starters on a youthful defense.

While working four new starters into the lineup in 2002, the Saints emerged as one of the NFL's most opportunistic defenses under Venturi's guidance. With 20 interceptions and 18 fumble recoveries, New Orleans tied for third in the league with 38 takeaways. Last year also signaled the emergence of rookie DE Charles Grant with seven sacks and young LB Sedrick Hodge, who posted a career-high 88 tackles.

Venturi was promoted to defensive coordinator after serving as the Saints' defensive backs coach from 2000-2001, a position he also held in 1998. Venturi had also held the title of assistant head coach since 1997. While he stopped serving in that capacity in 2002 to concentrate fully on the defense, the additional title was a reflection of the respect for Venturi held by Jim Haslett and the entire coaching staff.

In his final two seasons as a position coach prior to being elevated to coordinator, Venturi's secondary was one of the strengths of a unit that annually ranked among the league's toughest defenses. In 2001, CB Fred Thomas first emerged as a consistent starter before turning in the top performance of his career last season. In 2000, the Saints ranked 10th in the NFL in pass defense and ninth in the league with 20 interceptions.

Venturi first brought his expertise to the defensive backfield in 1998. That season, the Saints secondary scored five of a team-record nine defensive touchdowns while posting an NFC-high 21 interceptions.

In 1999, Venturi served as linebackers coach, the same position he held when he joined the Saints in 1996. In his first season in New Orleans, Venturi was elevated to head coach only eight games into the season and held the club together during a difficult period. With a new coaching staff in 1997, he was retained as linebackers coach and first took on the added duties of assistant head coach.

Prior to joining the Saints, Venturi spent two years with the Cleveland Browns, as secondary

coach in 1994 and defensive coordinator/linebackers coach in 1995.

The first 12 seasons of Venturi's NFL coaching career were spent with the Colts. He joined Baltimore as an assistant in 1982 and remained with the club through 1993. He began the 1991 season as defensive coordinator/linebackers coach before taking over as interim head coach with 11 games remaining. He also served as defensive coordinator with the Colts in 1984 and 1992-93.

Venturi played quarterback and defensive back at Northwestern University, where he earned a dual degree in physical education and history and added a master's degree in education. His first coaching stop was at his alma mater in 1968.

From 1973-76, he was on the staff at Purdue before moving on to Illinois for the 1977 season. He returned to Northwestern in 1978, where he served as head coach for three years. In 1981, he got his first job at the professional level with the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the Canadian Football League.

Off the field, Venturi enjoys riding motorcycles and owns three bikes. Born Feb. 23, 1946, in Taylorville, Ill., Venturi and his wife, Cheri, have a daughter, Marin, and a son, Jason.



Origin Of The Fleur de Lis

The Fleur de Lis, the emblem most closely associated with the New Orleans Saints and worn on the team's helmets, is a symbol from the Court of Louis XIV. A French word that stands for "Flower of the Lily," the Fleur de Lis is also a symbol for the City of New Orleans.

The Fleur de Lis was adopted during the French occupation of Louisiana from 1682-1762. Traditionally, it has been used to represent French royalty, and in that sense, it is said to signify perfection, life and light.

Due to its three petals, the Fleur de Lis has also been used to represent the Holy Trinity.



Hubbard **ALEXANDER** WIDE RECEIVERS

Perhaps no assistant coach has developed and tutored more outstanding wide receivers than Hubbard Alexander, who has worked with a fleet of heralded pass-catchers over the last 14 NFL seasons that have ranked among the best in the league.


Over the last three seasons Alexander has molded the Saints' wide receiver corps into one of the league's most productive units. But with Alexander's track record it should have been expected. Four players under his guidance – the Saints' Joe

Horn, Minnesota's Cris Carter and Randy Moss and Michael Irvin of Dallas – have combined for 11 Pro Bowl invitations. In 2002, the Saints' wide receivers produced a club-record eight 100-yard games (Horn had six, with Donte' Stallworth and Michael Lewis adding one each). The top three wideouts, Horn, Jerome Pathon and Stallworth, combined for 172 catches for 2,429 yards and 19 TDs. Stallworth set a club record for rookies with eight TDs.

With Minnesota in 1999, both Moss and Carter were voted to the Pro Bowl, with Moss leading the NFC in yards (1,413) and Carter finishing second in catches (90). In 1998, the tandem set an NFL record with 29 TD grabs. Alexander spent nine seasons (1989-97) with the Cowboys, tutoring Irvin to five Pro Bowls (1991-95). Alexander coached for 10 seasons (1979-88) at the University of Miami and won National Championships in 1983 and 1987.

A three-year starter at the center at Tennessee State, Alexander earned All-America honors as a senior and was signed as a free agent by the Cowboys. Born Feb. 14, 1939, Hubbard and his wife, Gloria, have three sons: Todd, Chad, and Bard.

Dave **ATKINS** RUNNING BACKS

Starting in 1990, a long decade went by in New Orleans without a 1,000-yard rusher. Running backs coach Dave Atkins arrived in 2000 and the Saints have had a back reach the milestone each year since. It marks the first time in club history that New Orleans has had a player achieve the feat for three-straight seasons.


Last season signaled the emergence of RB Deuce McAllister, who led the NFC with 1,388 yards, posted eight 100-yard

performances and scored 16 TDs. McAllister was voted a starter in the Pro Bowl. In 2001, the Saints posted 1,712 rushing yards, and in 2000 New Orleans ranked eighth in the NFL in rushing with 2,068 yards, the highest the club has ranked since finishing third in 1987.

Atkins served in the same capacity with the Saints in 1996. Prior to joining Haslett's staff, Atkins served as tight ends coach of the Vikings from 1997-99. He also brings offensive coordinator experience, serving in that capacity for Arizona (1994-95). In 1993, Atkins joined New England as running backs coach and he broke into the NFL with Philadelphia in 1986 and coached running backs (1986-90), special teams (1991), and tight ends (1992).

After playing three years of pro football, Atkins started his coaching career at his alma mater, Texas-El Paso, in 1979. He worked with the running backs and the kicking game at UTEP before going to San Diego State in 1981, where he spent the next five years. Born May 18, 1949, Atkins and his wife, Cynthia, have a son, Dave Jr., and a daughter, Jasmine.

Recently promoted to secondary coach, Joe Baker is entering his fourth season in New Orleans. He spent 2002 as the Saints' secondary assistant and his first two seasons assisting both the secondary and special teams. In his new position, Baker is responsible for tutoring the team's safeties and coordinating the efforts of the entire secondary.

In 2002, the Saints' defensive backs posted 17 of the club's 20 interceptions and also recovered five fumbles. In 2001, the Saints special teams made positive strides in several categories as Baker assisted special teams coach Al Everest. In 2000, Baker's first season with the Saints, the special teams units improved in almost every area and the secondary jumped to 10th in the NFL in pass defense.

Baker spent 1999 coaching linebackers and special teams at Wisconsin. He served from 1995-98 with the Jacksonville Jaguars as assistant special teams coach and administrative assistant to Coach Tom Coughlin. In 1995, Baker served as the Jaguars' manager of football operations.

A wide receiver at Princeton, Baker graduated in 1991, and that year was named the player personnel coordinator for the World League's Birmingham Fire. He served as a scout for the World League until joining the coaching staff at Samford University in 1993. Born June 29, 1969 in Glen Ridge, N.J., Baker and his wife, Jill, have a daughter, Mia.


Greg BROWN SECONDARY/CORNERBACKS

A 13-year NFL coaching veteran, Greg Brown enters his second season with the Saints and first as secondary/corner-backs coach. He was promoted after spending 2002 as defensive assistant and will be responsible for tutoring the cornerbacks. Before coming to New Orleans, Brown spent two years coaching the secondary at Atlanta. He served as defensive backs coach for San Francisco in 1999 and spent 1997-98 as secondary coach of the Tennessee Oilers.

From 1995-96, Brown was secondary coach at San Diego. In 1994, he had his first stint with Atlanta as defensive backs coach and the Falcons ranked second in the NFL with 23 interceptions. Brown's NFL coaching career began in 1984, when he was defensive quality control assistant at Tampa Bay. He assisted on offense in 1985 and served as tight ends coach in 1986.




Sam CLANCY DEFENSIVE LINE

In the three years since Sam Clancy has arrived, the Saints have quickly built a tradition of top-notch defensive line play. This season, New Orleans will again feature a hard-nosed group in the trenches, with Clancy's experience and teaching skills supplying the leadership to a youthful unit.

The Saints defensive line has posted 107.5 sacks since 2000 under Clancy's guidance, including 29.5 in 2002. In 2001, the line helped the Saints rank seventh in the NFC vs. the run and recorded 29.5 sacks. In 2000, the Saints led the NFL with 66 sacks, 48.5 generated by the defensive front. Prior to coming to New Orleans, Clancy coached in NFL Europe for five seasons, and had an 11-year NFL playing career. He was drafted in the 11th round by the Seattle Seahawks in 1982. He played with Cleveland from 1985-88, and closed his career with Indianapolis from 1989-93. Clancy also played in the USFL in 1984-85.

Clancy did not play college football at Pittsburgh but was a four-year basketball letterman and a member of the 1979 U.S. gold medal team at the Pan American games. Clancy was a 1981 third-round pick of the NBA's Phoenix Suns, but opted for the NFL. Born May 29, 1958 in Pittsburgh, Pa., Clancy and his wife Terri, have three sons, Sam Jr., who just finished his rookie season as a forward for the NBA's Philadelphia 76ers, Samario, and Samarcus, a stepson, Evann, and a daughter, Samantha.

The units had three touchdowns off returns, five blocked kicks and a forced interception while rushing a punt to score the game-winning touchdown at Tampa Bay in the opener.

But those were just a few of the special teams' accomplishments under Everest's direction. K John Carney posted the highest scoring total in club history with 130 points. Everest had developed the skills of Michael Lewis since early in 2001 and saw the speedy kick returner blossom last season when Lewis set an NFL record with 2,432 combined return yards and scored three touchdowns. The Saints' coverage units set a team record by allowing an average of 5.5 yards on 38 punt returns.

The Saints' conditioning is an important reason for the team's success over the last three seasons and a tribute to the work of strength & conditioning coach Rock Gullickson. His work in New Orleans has received notice from around the league, as Gullickson was presented the 2000 President's Award by the Professional Football Strength and Conditioning Coaches Society.

Gullickson came to the Saints in 2000 after spending 1998-99 at Louisville. Gullickson also served as the strength and conditioning coach at Texas from 1993-97 and worked in a similar capacity at Rutgers from 1990-92. A 1978 graduate of Moorhead State (Minn.), Gullickson remained at the school for a year as strength coach before moving to Mayville (N.D.) State for two seasons. In 1981, he was named strength coach and weight training instructor at South Dakota State. In 1982, he became the first full-time strength and conditioning coach in the Big Sky conference when he went to Montana State. Gullickson was the state of Montana power lifting champion from 1983-86 and he captured the Northwest U.S. Championship in 1985. Born April 11, 1955 in Moorhead, Minn., Gullickson is married (Terry).

John "Jack" HENRY OFFENSIVE LINE

He's been working with NFL offensive linemen for a decade, building a reputation as one of the league's most respected assistant coaches by stressing toughness, blocking technique, assignment responsibility and the value of working in unison.

Entering his fourth year in New Orleans, John "Jack" Henry is charged once again with forming a hard-nosed unit up front that sets an aggressive tone for the offense.

Henry will do so by again molding a group consisting of both returning veterans and a slew of newcomers into a cohesive unit. The line met that challenge in 2002, paving the way for Deuce McAllister to rush for an NFC-high 1,388 yards while the offense piled-up a franchise-record 432 points. Henry's offensive front has created holes for three-straight 1,000-yard rushers since 2000, a first in team record books.

In 2002, Henry tutored second-round pick LeCharles Bentley, guiding the rookie's transformation from college center to NFL guard. Bentley responded by being chosen All-Rookie by several media outlets, a testament to the player's effort and Henry's teachings. In 2003, the coach will insert new starter Wayne Gandy into the lineup at left tackle, while also developing promising draft picks Jon Stinchcomb and Montrae Holland.

Before joining Coach Jim Haslett's staff, Henry served as offensive line coach for the Detroit Lions from 1997-99. In Henry's first season in Detroit, the Lions boasted the NFL's No. 2 rushing offense, highlighted by Barry Sanders' 2,053 rushing yards. It is one of only four times in NFL history that a running back reached the 2,000 yard mark.

A coaching veteran of over 30 years, Henry spent 1996 as offensive line coach for the San Diego Chargers. His first NFL coaching assignment was tutoring the Pittsburgh Steelers offensive line under Hall of Fame coach Chuck Noll in 1990-91.

Henry previously served as the assistant director of athletics, associate head football coach and offensive coordinator at his alma mater, Indiana University of Pennsylvania (IUP) from 1986-89. He was inducted into IUP's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1997. Henry who began his collegiate playing career as a linebacker at Penn State from 1964-65, played guard for IUP in 1967-68 before graduating in 1969.

Henry is a native of Houston, Pa. He and his wife, Carol, have two children: Chad, an area scout for the Detroit Lions, and Jacqueline, a recent graduate of the University of New Orleans now enrolled in the school's master's program.





Prior to coming to New Orleans, Langsdorf spent three seasons with the CFL Edmonton Eskimos, serving as


offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach from 2000-2001 after coaching the wide receivers in 1999.

A standout linebacker in the NFL for 11 years whose rugged playing career was defined by leadership, consistency and toughness, Winston Moss tutors the Saints' linebacker corps relying on those same principles.

It's his third year at the position and fourth in New Orleans, as he opened his coaching tenure with the club as defensive assistant/quality control coach and was promoted to his current post near the end of 2000.

Last season, both veteran and inexperienced linebackers distinguished themselves under Moss' guidance. In his 10th season, Darrin Smith posted a career-high 123 tackles and added 3.5 sacks. And in his first year as a starter, Sedrick Hodge established himself at the other outside spot by ranking fifth on the squad with 88 tackles and recording eight passes defended. In 2003, Moss will integrate the diverse talents of Derrick Rodgers, James Allen, free-agent acquisition Orlando Ruff and third-round pick Cie Grant into the unit.

Since taking over the position following the departure of John Bunting to become the head coach at the University of North Carolina during the 2000 season, Moss has been building a tradition of fine linebacker play within the New Orleans defense. In 2001, his first full year on the job, the Saints' linebacker corps posted a combined 17 sacks and featured three of the club's top six tacklers. Moss started his coaching career in 1998 as the defensive quality control coach for the Seattle Seahawks.

Moss played with the Seahawks from 1995-97. His NFL career also included stops with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1987-90) and the Los Angeles Raiders (1991-94). While with the


Raiders in 1993, Saints' head coach Jim Haslett was Moss' position coach. Moss led the Raiders with 102 tackles that season and was elected the 1993 Raiders recipient of the Ed Block Courage Award in a vote by his teammates.

During his 11-year career, Moss appeared in 155 games, started 146 contests and recorded 768 tackles, 20.5 sacks and five interceptions. He was a three-time defensive captain and a recipient of the 1996 NFL Players Association Unsung Hero Award.

Originally a second-round pick by the Buccaneers in 1987, Moss played his college football at the University of Miami (Fla.), where he was part of the Hurricanes' 1984 National Championship team.

Bob PALCIC TIGHT ENDS

By leading with a tireless work ethic, tight ends coach Bob Palcic has instilled a gritty dedication to doing things right in the players he has worked with since the start of his coaching career. That simple approach has consistently produced quality performances in those under Palcic's guidance over the last 30 years, a tradition that has continued in New Orleans.

In 2003, Palcic welcomes the talents of top free-agent acquisition Ernie Conwell to his stable of tight ends. The standout from St. Louis only adds to a talented group that includes the dependable work of veterans David Sloan and Walter Rasby and the developing skills of Boo Williams. The combination of those four players is expected to make the position an integral part of the Saints' offensive attack.

Palcic is entering his fourth season with the Saints. He arrived in New Orleans in 2000 after serving as the offensive line coach of the Cleveland Browns in 1999. He coached tight ends for the Detroit Lions in 1997-98, where Palcic first worked with Sloan. Prior to his stay in Detroit, Palcic was the offensive line coach of the Atlanta Falcons (1994-96).

Before joining the NFL ranks, Palcic helped guide UCLA to a Rose Bowl berth in 1993, where he tutored present Baltimore Ravens All-Pro tackle Jonathan Ogden. He spent 1992 at Southern California, where he coached All-American tackle Tony Boselli.

His two years in Los Angeles followed a six-year stint (1986-91) at Ohio State. The Buckeyes captured a share of the Big Ten title in Palcic's first year in Columbus. He coached the offensive line at Arizona for two seasons (1984-85) before joining the Ohio State staff.



Palmieri joined the Jaguars in 1995 after having served as director of strength and conditioning operations at Boston College since 1993. Prior to his stint at Boston College, Palmieri spent six years overseeing the strength and conditioning program at Kansas State. He began his career as a strength coach in 1982 at North Carolina, followed by three years at Oklahoma State.



QUARTERBACKS

Now entering his 11th NFL season, Mike Sheppard only strengthened his reputation as one of the league's finest teachers of quarterbacks in 2002, his first year in New Orleans. Under his guidance, QB Aaron Brooks threw a franchise-record 27 touchdowns and posted the highest full-season passer rating of his career. Respected in coaching circles for his expertise and communication skills, Sheppard further developed all of the club's quarterbacks

by instilling a commitment to fundamentals and confidence in the pocket.

Brooks had a banner year in 2002 while taking a step forward as one of the league's elite passers, recording the fifth-highest total in club record books with 3,572 passing yards while leading an offense that set a club-record with an NFC-high 432 points.

Before coming to New Orleans, Sheppard spent the 2001 season as the offensive coordinator of the Buffalo Bills. Under his guidance the Bills finished 13th in the NFL in total offense.

Sheppard spent 1999-2000 as the quarterbacks coach with the Seattle Seahawks under head coach Mike Holmgren. Twice in 1999 under Sheppard's tutelage, QB Jon Kitna earned AFC Offensive Player of the Week honors. Prior to arriving in Seattle, Sheppard served two seasons (1997-98) as the offensive coordinator for the San Diego Chargers under head coach Kevin Gilbride.

Sheppard spent the 1996 season as wide receivers coach with the Baltimore Ravens and was given the play-calling duties under head coach Ted Marchibroda for an offense that finished third overall in the NFL. Sheppard first entered the NFL with the Cleveland Browns in 1993 as the tight ends coach before tutoring the wide receivers from 1994-95.

Prior to joining the NFL, Sheppard served one year as the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at the University of California in 1992. Before his stint at Cal, he spent eight years as a college head coach at New Mexico (1987-91) and Long Beach State (1984-

86). Sheppard has also spent time coaching at Kansas, Idaho State, BYU, Cal Lutheran and U.S. International.

A native of Tulsa, Okla., Sheppard earned his bachelor's degree from California Lutheran University in 1973, as well as a teaching credential in 1975. He received his master's degree in 1982 from BYU. Mike and his wife, Cathie, have four children – Chrissi, Brian, Shelby and Macall.

Saints Making A Difference

While the New Orleans Saints have been a leader in the community since Tom Benson assumed control of the franchise, the last two years have signaled a renewed commitment by the club toward becoming charity-minded in nearly every endeavor of the organization. Those efforts were sparked by Benson's unprecedented goal of giving back \$50 million over the next decade.

With the lofty mark that Benson established in mind, all donation efforts for the organization have been centralized in a comprehensive tracking system by the Community Affairs Department. The club substantially increased player participation in the


region by utilizing its two greatest resources:

volunteerism and financial support. Since implementing this system of giving funds, goods and services, the Saints have provided well over \$5 million to the Greater New Orleans and the Gulf South community.

There is a strong feeling of responsibility toward the community that resonates throughout the club. This is an organization that prides itself on giving back. And it isn't just an emotional plea – the Saints consistently step forward with the resources necessary to make a difference.

But aside from simply possessing a desire to make an impact in the greater New Orleans and Gulf South community, the Saints organization acts upon those intentions and moves to make its community a better place each and every day. Whether through financial support, charitable appearances or just lending an oversized helping hand, the New Orleans Saints are there.

The Saints have made a concerted effort to improve their visibility in the community with a hands-on approach toward philanthropic involvement. These efforts were sparked by more than a desire to be seen – the Saints have focused on making a positive, lasting impact. All involved with the club understand that our children represent our community's hope for the future and the Saints are stressing the importance of education and positive lifestyle choices. The team has targeted youth programs and education as the primary impact areas in giving back to New Orleans and



the entire Gulf South region.


A Saints' player visits a New Orleans area school each week during the regular season to stress the importance of education to students as part of the club's literacy program. The club also works to help youth-oriented charities such as Big Brothers/Big Sisters, the New Orleans Police Department's "C.O.P.S. for Kids" program, the NFL Youth Education Town Center and Angels' Place. During the NFL's 17-week regular season, more than 200 charitable appearances were made by Saints players and staff.

Included in that number were weekly player visits to Children's Hospital of New Orleans, where the Saints contributed more than \$125,000 in donations to the hospital and its patients last year. Starbright World – a widely-recognized computer video conference program – unites other NFL teams in charity as patients and players from New Orleans chat in cyberspace with their counterparts from children's hospitals in other NFL cities. The Saints pioneered this program and it has since been implemented in many cities across the league.

The Saints also reach out to thousands of youngsters each year through programs like the Gatorade Junior Training Camp, Saints Experience and the Outback Steakhouse Tackle Football Program. The club is highly involved with the NFL's Junior Player Development Program in New Orleans Public Schools, and supports all of the league's youth initiatives. As part of the National Football Foundation's "Play It Smart" program, the Saints also placed an "academic coach" in a local, inner-city high school to help its football team excel in academics, just as on the field.

And while supporting youth and education is the club's chief focus in the community, the Saints haven't limited their resources. In 2002 the team hosted the first-ever "Taste of the Saints" gala to benefit Second Harvesters Food Bank – raising more than \$10,000. The club also made a \$150,000 donation to the United Way through a player and staff campaign.

Saints players also provide hundreds of unfortunate families a holiday dinner with all the trimmings as part of the team's annual Thanksgiving benefit. In addition, more than 20 players took unfortunate families on holiday shopping sprees at their own expense. These events were organized by the Saints Community Affairs Dept., as was an NFL Community Quarterback banquet. At this event, \$25,000 in grant money was awarded to charitable organizations supported by volunteers that were recognized as "community quarterbacks."

NFL CAREER – While Carney has consistently ranked among the NFL's most productive and accurate kickers since 1990, the 14-year veteran has taken his considerable skills to a new level since opening a second chapter of his career in New Orleans when he was signed as a free agent during training camp in 2001. Carney has converted 87.9 percent of his field goal attempts since coming to the Saints (58 of 66). In 2002, Carney turned in his most accurate full season since 1994 (31 of 35, .886) and set a club record with 130 points. Cajun Connection



COLLEGE CAREER – New Orleans moved up in the first round to get Sullivan, who was rated among the top handful of players on the Saints’ draft board. The club sent the 17th and 18th overall picks to Arizona for the sixth-overall selection. As part of the trade, New Orleans and the Cardinals also swapped second-round picks, with the Saints getting the 37th overall selection and Arizona taking the 54th overall pick. The Saints also received the Cardinals’ fourth-round pick (102 overall) in the trade...The selection marks the seventh time that the Saints have picked a player from Georgia in the NFL Draft and one of two Bulldogs chosen by New Orleans in 2003, as the team added T Jon Stinchcomb in the following round...Picked at sixth overall, Sullivan’s selection is the highest for a defensive tackle in club history and the first interior defensive lineman that

Sullivan’s selection marks the third consecutive year – and the fourth-straight No. 1 pick – that the Saints chose an SEC standout with their first overall draft choice, joining Mississippi RB Deuce McAllister (23rd overall, 2001) and Tennessee WR Donte’ Stallworth (13th overall, 2002). The Saints also chose Georgia DE Charles Grant in the first round in 2002 (25th overall).

The Saints have selected sixth overall one other time in club history: 1986, G/T Jim Dombrowski.

Sullivan’s selection is the highest for a defensive tackle in club history. The previous high pick by the Saints of an interior defensive lineman was Mike Fultz, selected in the second round in 1977 (34th overall)

Sullivan is one of eight defensive lineman picked by New Orleans in the first round, joining defensive ends Charles Grant (2002), Joe Johnson (1994), Renaldo Turnbull (1990), Wayne Martin (1989), Shawn Knight (1987), Joe Campbell (1977) and Kevin Hardy (1968).

At the time of his selection, Sullivan was the seventh player chosen from the University of Georgia: Grant (2002), S Terry Hoage (1984), WR Lindsay Scott (1982), G Nat Hudson (1981), T Paul Fersen (1973) and G Royce Smith (1972). Of those seven, four were first-round picks: Sullivan (6th overall), Grant (25), Scott (13) and Smith (8).

the team has chosen in the first round...A two-year starter who declared for the NFL draft after his junior year, Sullivan recorded 154 tackles (85 solo), nine sacks for minus-53 yards, four passes defensed, two fumble recoveries and a forced fumble in his career...He started 23 of 35 games at Georgia...Sullivan follows the Bulldogs’ recent line of blue-chip defensive linemen to the NFL, following DE Charles Grant (New Orleans), DT Marcus Stroud (Jacksonville) and DE/DT Richard Seymour (New England).

2002 Honors

PRO BOWL: The Saints had four players selected to the NFC Pro Bowl squad: **WR Joe Horn, RB Deuce McAllister, WR Michael Lewis** as kick returner and special teams ace **RB Fred McAfee**. Horn and McAllister started for the NFC. Horn, picked for the postseason all-star game for the third-straight year, led the Saints with 88 catches for 1,312 yards, while McAllister led the NFC with 1,388 rushing yards. Lewis set an NFL record with 2,432 combined yards of punt and kickoff returns and returned two kickoffs and a punt for a touchdown. McAfee, a 10th-year veteran, was the leader of a special teams unit that was one of the NFL's best in punt and kickoff coverage.

ALL-PRO: Lewis was the lone Saints player selected to the All-Pro team chosen by the Associated Press, and the first from the club to make the team since 2000.

HOW THE NFL PASSER RATING IS DETERMINED

The NFL rates its passers for statistical purposes against a fixed performance standard based on statistical achievements of all qualified pro passers since 1960. The current system, adopted in 1973, provides a means of comparing passing statistics from one season to the next. The system is used to rate all passers, not only quarterbacks, and therefore should be referred to as passer rating (not quarterback rating).

The passer rating is made up of completion percentage, average yards per attempt, TD percentage and interception percentage. For example, to figure out the rating of a QB who was 345-for-567 passing for 3,970 yards, with 26 TDs and 14 INT:

- Completed 60.8465 percent of his passes.
(345 comp. / 567 att. = .60846 x 100 = 60.8465 - 30 x .05 = 1.5423 pts.)
- Averaged 7.0017 yards per attempt (3970 yards / 567 att. = 7.0017 - 3 = 4.0017 x .25 = 1.0004 pts.)
- Had a 4.5855 TD percentage (26 TD / 567 att. = .04585 x 100 = 4.5855 x .20 = .9171 pts.)
- Had a 2.4691 interception percentage (14 INT / 567 att. = .02469 x 100 = 2.4691 x .25 = .61728; 2.375 - .61728 = 1.7577 pts). The sum of the 4 steps is: (1.5423 + 1.0004 + 0.9171 + 1.7577) = 5.2175 points, divided by 6 (.86958) & multiplied by 100 (to make the rating more understandable) = 86.958 or 87.0 passer rating.

The maximum passer rating is 158.3 (2.375 x 4) = 9.500; 9.500 / 6 = 1.583333 x 100 = 158.3333.

The maximum a passer can receive in any individual category is 2.375 (stats greater than: 77.5 completion pct., 12.5 average yards gained per attempt or a 11.875 TD pct., or no greater than a 0.0 interception pct.). The minimum in a category is zero points (stats less than 30.0 completion pct., 3.00 average yards gained per attempt or a 0.0 TD pct. or no lower than a 9.5 interception pct.).

An important point: There is no allowance for sacks, as averages are based on gross yards (total passing yards, not net yards in which sack yardage is subtracted from gross yards) and pass attempts (pass attempts that did not result in a sack, not pass plays which is the sum of pass attempts plus sacks).

Historical Anniversaries for 2003

25th – June 11, 1978: QB Archie Manning won the NFL's Byron (Whizzer) White Award for his contributions to team, community and country.

25th – Aug. 5, 1978: Saints beat the Philadelphia Eagles, 14-7, in an exhibition game in Mexico City, the first NFL game played south of the U.S. border.

20th – Sept. 4, 1983: RB George Rogers set the team single-season rushing record with 206 yards on 24 carries in a 38-17 opening day win over the St. Louis Cardinals at the Superdome.

20th – Sept. 18, 1983: Saints defeated the Chicago Bears, 34-31, at the Superdome in OT for the first sudden-death victory in franchise history.

15th – Feb. 7, 1988: A club-record six Saints – K Morten Andersen, TE Hoby Brenner, G Brad Edelman, RB Rueben Mayes, LB Sam Mills, and CB Dave Waymer – were selected to the Pro Bowl.

30th – Nov. 4, 1973: Saints scored first shutout as they blanked Buffalo 13-0 in Tulane Stadium. New Orleans held Buffalo RB O.J. Simpson to his lowest rushing total of the season – 79 yards on 20 carries – as Simpson finished the year with then-NFL record 2,003 yards.

15th – Nov. 20, 1988: Saints score biggest win in franchise history with a 42-0 victory over the Denver Broncos. The win clinched the Saints' second consecutive winning season.

10th – Apr. 25, 1993: LB Pat Swilling was traded by the Saints to the Detroit Lions for their first- and fourth-round picks in 1993. The Saints picked T Willie Roaf with the eighth overall selection.

10th – May 19, 1993: A sports bill calling in part for renovations to the Louisiana Superdome and a new practice facility for the Saints passes state lawmakers in a vote in Baton Rouge.

10th – July 31, 1993: The Saints beat the Philadelphia Eagles, 28-16, in Tokyo, Japan, in the third international exhibition game the Saints participated in.

The Saints scored on their opening drive, an 11-play, 68-yard march that was sparked by a 40-yard completion from QB **Aaron Brooks** to WR **Joe Horn**. RB **Deuce McAllister** capped the possession with a four-yard touchdown run.

Green Bay scored on a field goal early in the second quarter. On the Packers' next possession, LB **Sedrick Hodge** recovered a fumble at the Packers 21. The Saints improved to 3-0 despite falling behind, 20-0, in the first half. QB **Aaron Brooks** tossed three touchdowns in the final three quarters, including 29-yard strike to WR **Donte Stallworth** that proved to be the game-winner with 1:11 remaining.

Chicago struck twice in the first quarter, driving to set up an early field goal and converting an interception into a 52-yard TD drive. The Bears would open the second quarter with another TD march, and pushed ahead, 20-0, with a 25-yard field goal with 11:47 left in the first half.

The Saints answered on their ensuing possession, marching 84 yards on eight plays. The drive was capped by a 16-yard scoring catch by WR **Jerome Pathon**. New Orleans would immediately get the ball back when the Bears mishandled the kickoff and the ball was recovered by the Saints at the Chicago 9. Two plays later, Brooks scrambled for a seven-yard TD.

After receiving the opening kickoff of the second half, the Saints drove 65 yards in

12 plays. Brooks found WR **Joe Horn** on a five-yard TD pass to give the Saints the lead for the first time.

The Bears would answer early in the fourth quarter with a 25-yard field goal to pull ahead, 23-21. That set up the Saints' 73-yard TD drive in the final three minutes.

Chicago would threaten in the game's final minute, but a late interception in the end zone preserved the Saints' victory.

The Saints notched their fourth victory of the season – and fourth over a 2001 play-off team – with a memorable win at home.

New Orleans took the early lead when **K John Carney** drilled a 40-yard field goal. The kick was set up by a fumble recovery on the Steelers' opening possession by DT **Grady Jackson**. The Saints would score again later in the quarter when QB **Aaron Brooks** capped a 78-yard drive with a 15-yard TD toss to WR **Jerome Pathon**.

The Steelers would respond on the next drive, marching 77 yards for a TD. WR **Michael Lewis** took the ensuing kickoff 33 yards, and Brooks and Pathon connected again on first

down for a 65-yard strike to the Pittsburgh 1. RB **Deuce McAllister** completed the quick scoring drive on the next play by leaping into the end zone.

Pittsburgh followed with another scoring drive, capped by QB **Tommy Maddox** throwing a two-yard TD pass.

The Saints continued the offensive surge in the second half, driving 69 yards in four plays early in the third quarter. Mc-

Allister ended the march with an exclamation point – a 52-yard TD run – to give New Orleans a 26-15 lead.

Pittsburgh would drive for a TD on its next possession, and **K John Carney** would add a field goal to give the Saints a 29-22 advantage heading into the final quarter.

RB Deuce McAllister had 123 yards and two touchdowns on 23 carries. His 52-yard scoring run was his longest TD carry of 2002.

WR Jerome Pathon's 64-yard catch was the longest career completion for Brooks.

The Saints scored 143 points in the first five games, the club's highest five-game total.

Early in the fourth quarter, Carney would add another field goal, but the Steelers marched 47 yards on eight plays for a TD on their final possession. S **Jay Bellamy** hauled in Pittsburgh's inside kick attempt, and the Saints ran out the clock.

"We scored almost every time we touched the ball," said Coach **Jim Haslett**. "It was the best performance by the offense since I've been here."

New Orleans improved to 5-1 with a game full of firsts for the Saints. It was the first time the team scored over 40 points since 1989 (a 41-6 win at the Colts) and WR **Michael Lewis** became the first player in team history – and only the seventh in NFL record books – to return a punt and a kickoff for a TD in the same game. And DE **Darren Howard** had three sacks in a contest for the first time in his three-year career.

While there were several new achievements, there was also a routine to the win. New Orleans remained one of the league's top road teams, improving to 14-6 since 2000. The offense again created big plays in bunches, producing seven plays of over 15 yards. And the defense was as opportunistic as ever with four interceptions.

The Saints also proved yet again that they could weather an opponent's comeback attempt and respond with more firepower, outscoring Washington, 14-6, in the final two quarters after the Redskins pulled within eight near the end of the first half.

The Saints jumped out to a 20-0 lead after two field goals by K **John Carney** and a pair of TD passes by QB **Aaron Brooks**. After a 75-yard TD drive by the Redskins, Lewis took a kickoff 90 yards for the first touchdown return of his career. Washington responded with another scoring drive and

an interception return for a TD to cut the Saints' lead to 26-21. Carney added a field goal at the end of the first half.

The third quarter was highlighted by an 83-yard punt return by Lewis following the Redskins' opening possession. On the first play of the fourth quarter, Brooks threw a 31-yard TD pass, and the outcome of the contest was no longer in doubt.

The Saints stormed back from an 11-point deficit at the start of the fourth quarter to defeat the 49ers. QB **Aaron Brooks** completed 23 of 35 passes for 254 yards and three TDs while also rushing for another score. He was named the NFC Offensive Player of the Week, and New Orleans improved to 9-0 when Brooks posts a passer rating of 100 or better.

Brooks wasn't alone in creating the fireworks, as the club's top three weapons made an impact. RB **Deuce McAllister** rushed for 139 yards on 21 carries, including a 53-yard run. WR **Joe Horn** added 109 yards on eight grabs with two TDs.

And the defense came up big in the final quarter by creating two turnovers.

New Orleans trailed, 17-10, at half-time. The Saints' scoring came on a four-yard touchdown by McAllister and a 46-yard field goal by K **John Carney**.

After Carney added another field goal

on the Saints' opening drive of the second half, San Francisco added to its lead with an eight-yard TD run by Hearst.

New Orleans responded with a 22-point fourth quarter, including the two TD

The club's 6-1 start ranks among the best in franchise history. The Saints were 7-1 in 1988 and 9-1 in 1991.

WR **Joe Horn** was especially productive in the second half, hauling in six passes for 79 yards and a pair of TDs in the final two quarters.

The Falcons handed New Orleans its second loss of the season on a game-winning, 47-yard field goal by K **Jay Feely** on the contest's final play. The Saints had trailed by nine points before driving for a field goal and a touchdown late in the fourth quarter to take a brief lead in the shootout.

New Orleans took a 10-0 lead in the first quarter after a 40-yard field goal by K **John Carney** and a one-yard TD plunge by RB **Deuce McAllister**. Atlanta rallied in the second quarter with touchdown runs by QB **Michael Vick** and RB **Warrick Dunn** to give the Falcons a 14-10 lead at halftime.

Atlanta added to its advantage early in the fourth quarter with another before McAllister shook loose for a 19-yard TD off a pass from QB **Aaron Brooks**. Following a Falcons field goal, Brooks found WR **Joe Horn** on a six-yard touchdown pass to give the Saints a 25-24 lead entering the final quarter.

Atlanta scored twice to open the fourth quarter on a 32-yard field goal by Feely and a 32-yard TD scramble by Vick. The Saints answered with an 11-play drive to set up a 40-yard field goal by Carney. On the Falcons'

The Saints committed a season-high six turnovers (three fumbles and three interceptions) while dropping their fourth game of the year. The loss marked the first time in 2002 that New Orleans suffered back-to-back defeats.

The Saints took the early lead after an interception by CB Dale Carter on Cleveland's opening drive led to a 33-yard field goal. The Browns would push ahead later in the first quarter when RB William Green scored on a one-yard touchdown run.

New Orleans would take the following drive 45 yards on nine plays, leading to a 27-yard kick by Carney. On the Saints' next possession, QB Aaron Brooks found WR Michael Lewis for a 41-yard catch-and-run to the Cleveland 14, but Brooks would fumble two plays later to end the drive.

The Browns would convert a muffed punt by Lewis into a TD, giving Cleveland a 14-6 lead at halftime.

The Saints put together their best drive of the game on their opening possession of the second half, marching 80 yards in 12 plays. The final play was a 17-yard TD burst by RB James Fenderson,

though the two-point conversion pass attempt failed.

The Browns would respond with a 79-yard TD drive. The Saints would march to the Cleveland 15 on the next possession, but the drive ended with an interception.

Though he dressed for the contest, RB Deuce McAllister did not play because of the sprained ankle that he suffered the week before at Atlanta.

QB Aaron Brooks had 318 passing yards, his highest total of the season. Brooks became only the fourth quarterback in club history to reach 8,000 career passing yards, moving into fourth all-time with 8,037 yards.

CB Fred Thomas intercepted Couch six plays later and returned it to the Cleveland 40, but the Saints had to settle for a 48-yard field goal to cut the Browns' lead to 21-15 with 10:14 remaining.

However, the Browns responded with a 13-play, 68-yard march that milked 6:49 off the clock. A 28-yard field goal pushed Cleveland's lead beyond a TD with 3:25 remaining, and an interception ended the Saints' final drive three plays later.

With a postseason berth for New Orleans on the line, the Bengals stunned the Saints with a 13-point fourth quarter to notch an upset victory at home. The defeat dropped New Orleans to 9-6.

After a 35-yard return by WR Michael Lewis on the opening kickoff, the Saints drove 37 yards on 11 plays to set up a 38-yard field goal by K John Carney.

The Bengals responded with a 59-yard drive that was capped by a TD pass. New Orleans surged ahead on its following possession. QB Aaron Brooks connected with WR Donte Stallworth on a 57-yard TD toss to give the Saints a 10-3 lead. It was Stallworth's eighth TD of 2002 and the 27th of the season for Brooks, a new club record.

The teams traded punts until an interception by CB Fred Thomas at the Cincinnati 48 set up a 43-yard field goal by Carney with 1:13 remaining in the first half.

Neither team scored in the third quarter, though Thomas had a second interception followed by a 43-yard return to the Bengals 35.

Cincinnati got its running game going in the final quarter, driving 69 yards on 13

plays on its first possession of the final quarter. FB Nick Luchey crossed into the end zone from one-yard out to tie the game, but the PAT was blocked by DT Grady Jackson.

The Saints had two more possessions before the Bengals put together another long

The Saints were held without a TD for the first time in 2002 in a defeat that dropped New Orleans to 9-7 and eliminated the team from the playoff race.

The Saints got on the scoreboard first when DT **Grady Jackson** recovered a fumble at the Panthers 12 early in the first quarter. Four plays later, K **John Carney** kicked a 30-yard field goal to give the Saints a 3-0 lead.

The teams traded turnovers throughout the first half until Carolina marched 45 yards on seven plays late in the second quarter. The drive was capped by a 15-yard TD pass with 51 seconds remaining in the second quarter.

The Saints cut the Panthers' advantage to one point early in the third quarter. On New Orleans' first possession of the second half, the club drove 48 yards on 10 plays to set up a 38-yard field goal by Carney. On the drive, QB **Aaron Brooks** found WR **Donte' Stallworth** for a 28-yard completion.

The Panthers responded with a 38-yard march that included three completions. K **Shayne Graham** booted a 50-yard field goal

to increase Carolina's lead to 10-6.

Despite a couple of promising drives, the Saints were unable to score again. New Orleans marched to the Carolina 38, 30 and

RB Deuce McAllister rushed for 117 yards on 28 carries, notching his eighth 100-yard performance of 2002. 


Cool Under Pressure

QB Aaron Brooks has been among the NFL's top comeback artists since taking over as the Saints' starting quarterback late in the 2000 season. A look back at the eight clutch comeback drives he has engineered in the fourth quarter over the last three seasons, including a trio of memorable performances in 2002 that led New Orleans to victories:

Nov. 26, 2000: Saints 31, Rams 24 at the Trans World Dome – Brooks led the Saints on an 85-yard march in the fourth quarter, capping the drive with a one-yard scoring plunge to become only the third passer in NFL history to defeat a defending Super Bowl Champion in his first league start.

Dec. 10, 2000: Saints 31, 49ers 27 at 3Com Park – Brooks engineered a 12-play, 68-yard drive in 3:14. The march ended with a one-yard touchdown run by RB Terry Allen with 46 seconds remaining to give the Saints an upset win. Brooks rushed for 108 yards on 11 carries in the contest, including a 10-yard scramble on fourth and four during the Saints' final possession to keep the drive alive. He became the only QB in NFL history to have a 400-yard passing game and a 100-yard rushing performance in the same season.

Oct. 14, 2001: Saints 27, Panthers 25 at Ericsson Stadium – Brooks drove the Saints 82 yards in 1:48, with RB Ricky Williams running around the left end for a one-yard touchdown as time expired.

Oct. 28, 2001: Saints 34, Rams 31 at the Dome at America's Center – With the score tied 31-31 with four minutes remaining, Brooks led a drive that ate up 3:59 and was capped by a 27-yard, game-winning field goal by K John Carney.

Dec. 2, 2001: Saints 27 Panthers 23 at the Superdome – With New Orleans trailing 23-20, Brooks engineered a four-play, 74-yard drive. The march was capped by a 17-yard TD pass to WR Joe Horn to give the Saints the win.

Sept. 22, 2002: Saints 29, Bears 23 at Memorial Stadium – Trailing 23-21 with 4:31 remaining, Brooks authored a seven-play, 73-yard TD march in 2:31. The drive ended with a 29-yard TD pass to WR Donte' Stallworth. Brooks then ran in the two-point conversion for good measure.

Oct. 20, 2002: Saints 35, 49ers 27 at the Superdome – Down by 11 entering the final quarter, Brooks tossed two fourth-quarter TDs to Horn within 1:25 to erase the deficit and lift New Orleans to victory.

Nov. 10, 2002: Saints 34, Panthers 24 at Ericsson Stadium – Trailing 24-20 with 3:31 remaining, Brooks engineered a 95-yard drive. A 38-yard pass to Stallworth set up a seven-yard TD to the rookie wide receiver with 31 seconds left in the game to give the Saints the win.

Many Happy Returns

Michael Lewis shattered the NFL record of combined kickoff and punt return yard-age with 2,432 yards in 2002 (breaking the mark of 2,187, set by WR MarTay Jenkins of Arizona in 2000). Voted to his first Pro Bowl and selected to the Associated Press All-Pro team, Lewis posted 1,807 yards in kickoff returns and 625 punt return yards - both totals were team records.

At Washington on Oct. 13, Lewis became the first player in club history to return a punt and a kickoff for a TD in a single game. He shook loose for a 90-yard kickoff return in the second quarter, then gave a stunning encore with an 83-yard punt return in the third quarter that tied for the longest in club record books (CB Tyrone Hughes vs. Philadelphia, 1993). His 286 return yards were the second-highest in team history for a game and he was voted NFC Special Teams Player of the Week.

Lewis took off on a 97-yard kickoff return for a touchdown vs. Minnesota to give him three TD returns in 2002, tying a team record (Hughes, 1993) for a single season. The 114 combined returns Lewis had (70 on kickoffs, 44 on punts) also set a new single-season club record, topping the 100 that Hughes posted in 1996.

The Specialists

Coached by Al Everest, the Saints special teams had a banner year in 2002. The units had three touchdown returns, five blocked kicks and a forced interception while rushing a punt for a game-winning touchdown in the opener. K John Carney posted the highest scoring total in club history with 130 points and drilled 31 of 35 field goal attempts, and KR Michael Lewis set an NFL record with 2,150 combined yards of kick and punt returns.

Two members of the special teams earned Pro Bowl honors - Lewis and coverage ace RB Fred McAfee - marking the first time since Tyrone Hughes in 1993 that a Saints player was voted to the postseason all-star game. And three players - McAfee (Week 1), Lewis (Week 6) and S Steve Gleason (Week 10) - were honored as NFC Special Teams Players of the Week.





1985

Jan. 27 - LB **Rickey Jackson**, DE **Bruce Clark** and P **Brian Hansen** represent the Saints at the Pro Bowl; **Feb. 14** - Negotiations for the sale of the Saints between **John Mecom, Jr.** and Chicago's **A.N. Pritzker** broke off, suddenly thrusting **Tom Benson**, negotiating in a secondary position for several weeks, to the forefront; **March 12** - New Orleanian **Tom Benson** reached agreement with **John Mecom, Jr.** for the sale of the Saints; **April 26** - Saints traded RB **George Rogers** and their 5th, 10th, and 11th round selections in the 1985 draft to the Washington Redskins for their top draft pick; **April 30** - Saints select Tennessee LB **Alvin Toles** as their first selection in the NFL draft; **May 31** - Ownership was transferred from **John W. Mecom, Jr.** to **Tom Benson** for the sale price of \$70.204 million. Benson becomes managing general partner of the Saints, opening the most successful era in club history; **Nov. 25** - Saints head coach **O.A. (Bum) Phillips** resigned as his son, defensive coordinator **Wade Phillips**, was named interim head coach, the ninth head coach in club history.

1986

Jan. 14 - With Benson now able to insert his management team, **Jim Finks** is named president/general manager of the Saints and joined in franchise ownership; **Jan. 22** - Interim head coach **Wade Phillips** and assistant coaches were released from their duties; **Jan 28** - **Jim Mora** named the Saints' 10th head coach; **April 29** - Saints selected Virginia T **Jim Dombrowski** with their first pick in the NFL draft; **July 19** - RB **Earl Campbell** announced his retirement; **Sept. 21** - **Mel Gray** broke team record with 101-yard kickoff return for a TD at San Francisco ... the return was the Saints' first for a score since 1977; **Nov. 9** - Saints record fifth shutout in team history, holding L.A. Rams' **Eric Dickerson** to 57 yards - including only nine in the 2nd half - in a 6-0 win ... the victory evened the Saints' mark at 5-5 after a 1-4 start; **Dec. 7** - RB **Rueben Mayes** broke the team's single-game record with 207 yards vs. the Miami Dolphins, but his final gain was called back along with the winning TD ... the Saints lost 31-27 thriller as Mayes finished with 203 rushing yards. **Dec. 21** - Saints finished season at 7-9 ... RB **Rueben Mayes** finished with 1,353 yards rushing (fourth in the NFL) and is named consensus Rookie of the Year ... He was named to the Pro Bowl along with LB **Rickey Jackson** and K **Morten Andersen**.

1987

April 28 - Saints selected Brigham Young DE **Shawn Knight** as their first pick in the NFL draft; **Aug. 17** - FB **Hokie Gajan**, who attempted to come back from a 1985 knee injury, retired following an injury to his other knee; **Sept. 21** - NFL Players Association announced that players would be on strike following the weekend's games; **Oct. 4** - Saints defeated the L.A. Rams 37-10 in Superdome before 29,745 fans in club's first replacement game ... QB **John Fourcade**, a New Orleans native, led Saints to the win with two TD passes; **Oct 15** - NFL Players Association announced that the strike is over, but not in time to play the coming weekend's games; **Oct. 18** - Saints beat Chicago, 19-17 on four **Florian Kempf** FGs in the final replacement game played by the Saints ... the replacements posted a 2-1 record; **Oct. 25** - Saints fall to San Francisco, 24-22 in a Superdome thriller ... following the game, head coach **Jim Mora** made his highly-publicized "coulda, woulda, shoulda" proclamation to the media; **Nov. 1** - On the franchise's 22nd birthday, Saints posted the largest margin of victory in team history, shutting out Atlanta 38-0 ... the win was the 1st in team-record nine consecutive triumphs to close out the season; **Nov. 29** - Saints held on with two magnificent goal-line stands in the final quarter to defeat the Pittsburgh Steelers, 20-16 ... the victory ensured Saints' first winning record ever; **Dec. 6** - Saints beat the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, 44-34 to lock up team's first playoff appearance; **Dec. 13** - Saints won seventh straight, 24-10 over the Houston Oilers which gave the Saints home field in the NFC Wild Card game; **Dec. 20** - Down 24-3 in the 2nd quarter, the Saints rallied behind backup QB **Dave Wilson** for a 31-24 win at Cincinnati, the biggest come-from-behind

In a clash between two of the NFL's top defenses, the Bears jumped ahead 10-0 and held off the Saints in an NFC Wild Card Playoff game at Soldier Field. The Bears went up 3-0 on a K Kevin Butler 33-yard FG after an interception. Chicago surged ahead by 10 points when QB Mike Tomczak connected with TE James Thornton on an 18-yard scoring pass. K Morten Andersen got the Saints on the scoreboard with a 47-yard FG with 1:38 remaining in the half. An offside call on New Orleans nullified a 61-yard return of a blocked Bears FG attempt in the third quarter. Chicago took advantage on the reprieve, driving to set up a 22-yard field goal to give the Bears a 13-3 advantage midway through the third quarter. The teams traded FGs in the final quarter, with Andersen drilling a 38-yard kick and Butler connecting from 21 yards out to produce the winning margin. Chicago RB Neal Anderson rushed 27 times for 166 yards and hauled in four passes for 42 yards as the Bears rolled up 365 total yards to the Saints' 193 yards of offense.

Louisiana Sports Hall Of Fame

The Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame showcases the greatest names in state sports history. Founded in 1958 by the Louisiana Sports Writers Association, the Hall of Fame includes 222 competitors, coaches and administrators from the sports world whose accomplishments have brought credit to Louisiana, including eight former Saints players, coaches and staff members.

Players, coaches and administrators whose contributions to the Saints are notable are eligible for election by a 27-member LSWA committee four years after retirement. The membership roll includes 11 members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, three Super Bowl MVPs QB Terry Bradshaw, QB Doug Williams and WR Max McGee), five members of the National Baseball Hall of Fame, and four members of the Basketball Hall of Fame. Headquartered in Natchitoches, La., the Hall of Fame annually inducts seven members. This year, the inductees included former Saints Coach Jim Mora.

1967 Expansion Draft

Held Feb. 10, 1967

In what became the foundation of New Orleans' first NFL team, the Saints selected 42 players in an expansion draft, using the same procedures as in the formation of the Atlanta Falcons in 1966. The Falcons were exempted from the expansion draft in 1967, thus leaving 14 teams from whom the Saints selected players. The procedures that were in place for the Saints were as follows: Each of the other 14 NFL teams froze 29 players from its 40-man roster, leaving 11 players available to be selected by New Orleans. The Saints chose 1 player from those 11 remaining on each team. Then, each team froze two additional players, leaving eight on each list, from which the Saints chose two more.




The NFL regular season scheduling rotation for the next seven seasons under the realignment plan that went into effect in 2002:

The interconference and intraconference divisional matchups – 14 of each season's 16 games – were determined last year following extensive analysis and discussion with NFL clubs. A key factor in deciding the initial schedules was the displacement of certain teams from their traditional divisions in the new alignment.

The Saints, who teamed with Atlanta, Carolina and Tampa Bay to create the newly-formed NFC South in 2002, play home-and-home with each of their divisional rivals (six games), the four teams from another NFC division on a rotating three-year cycle (four games), the four teams from an AFC division on a rotating four-year cycle (four contests) and two intraconference games based on the prior year's standings (two games against teams in the two NFC divisions the team is not scheduled to play that season. The division champions of each division will play against each other, and the second-, third- and fourth-place teams in a each conference are matched the same way).

In 2003, the Saints as well as the remainder of the NFC South will play the teams from the NFC East (New Orleans will host the Dallas Cowboys and the New York Giants and travel to the Philadelphia Eagles and the Washington Redskins) and take on the teams from the AFC South (the Saints will host the Houston Texans and the Indianapolis Colts and travel to the Jacksonville Jaguars and the Tennessee Titans).

The two intraconference games are based on the Saints' third-place finish in the NFC South last year. So in 2003, New Orleans will host the third-place team from the NFC North (the Chicago Bears) and travel to the third-place team in the NFC West (the Seattle Seahawks).

The format adopted by the NFL in 2002 has several advantages:

- There is an increased common-opponent emphasis with every team in a division playing against 14 common opponents.
- All teams play each other on a regular basis, home and away, for a more consistent presentation of attractive games, eliminating the many schedule aberrations of the past. For instance, the Saints have not played a regular-season game at Green Bay since 1989, did not face the Indianapolis Colts from 1987-97 and did not travel to Miami from 1982-97.
- Teams are guaranteed to play all non-division opponents in their conference at least once every three years and at home at least once every six years.
- Every NFC team plays every AFC team once every four years and at home once every eight years.
- A team's record from the previous year has less of a bearing on its schedule, with only two opponents based on the previous year's standings, rather than the four of the previous system. Thus, the so-called "easy" fifth-place schedules have been eliminated.
- The division that a team is in will be less of a factor in a team's won-loss record with 10-of-16 games each season coming against non-division teams.

When the 1st Wild Card team has been identified, the procedure is repeated to name the 2nd Wild Card, i.e. eliminate all but the highest-ranked club in each division prior to proceeding to step 2. In situations where 3 or more teams from the same division are involved in the procedure, the original seeding of the teams remains the same for subsequent applications of the tie-breaker if the top-ranked team in that division qualifies for a Wild Card berth.

Other Tie Breaking Procedures

1. Only 1 club advances to the playoffs in any tie-breaking step. Remaining tied clubs revert to the 1st step of the applicable division or Wild Card tie breakers. As an example, if 2 clubs remain tied in any tie-breaker step after all other clubs have been eliminated, the procedure reverts to step 1 of the 2-club format to determine the winner. When 1 club wins the tie breaker, all other clubs revert to step 1 of the applicable 2-club or 3-club format.
2. In comparing records against common opponents among tied teams, the best won-lost-tied percentage is the deciding factor since teams may have played an unequal number of games.
3. To determine home-field priority among division-titlists, apply Wild Card tie-breakers.
4. To determine home-field priority for Wild Card qualifiers, apply division tie-breakers (if teams are from the same division) or Wild Card tie-breakers (if teams are from different divisions).

The Saints will be able to showcase their training camp workouts to their fans in New Orleans for the first time in 2003 in large part because of the recent construction of the club's state-of-the-art, indoor practice facility.

With the unpredictable weather of southeast Louisiana throughout the year, the club has long needed an indoor practice area. No longer will the Saints be regularly forced to bus to alternative locations for practice, and other newly-built facilities were included that help complete the club's training area.

A 250-seat cafeteria is attached to the lightning-protected indoor facility, as is a 9,000 square-foot weight room with a cushioned floor. Over 8,000 square feet of maintenance and equipment storage room has also been added, and there are covered walkways connecting the covered field facility to the existing building.

Also included in the construction was the completion of a new, full-sized practice football field outside of the building, bringing the total number of fields at the facility to four. Additional paved parking areas have been included for the players, staff and public.

The existing building has also been renovated. The team's locker room was doubled in size, with new lockers installed. A large, open area is in the middle so all lockers are visible for communication and interaction between the players and coaches. A player's lounge has been built and the existing medical and rehabilitation area has also been doubled. It now includes a treadmill pool facility for injury rehab work.

Other new construction in the club's building: Expansion of the ticket area, a new staff locker room, additional coach's lockers and a new draft room. Newly-renovated areas all have freshly-carpeted floors emblazoned with the Saints' Fleur de Lis logo.

The entire club moved into the existing training facility on April 15, 1996, marking the first time in Saints' history that the team's players, coaches and staff were housed under one roof. The two-story, 65,000 square foot facility at 5800 Airline Drive in Metairie is situated on a 19.2-acre tract.

The first floor is approximately 43,000 square feet and serves primarily the needs of the players. It also consists of a reception area, ticket office, media workroom and storage.

A 1,700 square foot auditorium, which sits on the first floor, can seat 110 players for team meetings and can be divided into two rooms. On either side of the auditorium are eight smaller team meeting rooms.

Located on the second floor are offices for coaches, player personnel, video department and administrative staff.





Credential requests will not be honored on gameday. Press box media are not allowed on the field at any time, including pre-game and post-game. Interviews are not allowed with Saints players as they leave the field.

TELEVISION & RADIO

Network television, network radio and visiting radio are assigned numbered booths in the main press box. Spotters and statisticians are available upon request at least one week prior to the game. Television stations will be allowed to do pre-game live shots as well as post-game live shots from the South end zone only. TV talent will be asked to leave the field prior to kickoff.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Only accredited working photographers are allowed on the sidelines. They must wear a "field photo" arm band and shoot from behind the yellow-dotted line. The bench areas are off limits at all times. Photographers should take special note of the usage conditions listed on the credential. Reporters are not permitted to accompany photographers on the sidelines until

after both teams have cleared the field following the conclusion of the game. Grip passes will no longer be issued for home games, and those with yellow armbands must have a camera and will not be allowed to grip for photographers.

LOCKER ROOMS

Q — What are the categories of free agency?

A — Players are either “restricted” or “unrestricted” free agents. Within those categories are also “transition” and “franchise” players.

Q — What is the difference between a restricted free agent and an unrestricted free agent?

A — Players become restricted free agents when they complete three accrued seasons and their contract expires. Unrestricted free agents have completed four or more accrued seasons with an expired contract.

Q — What constitutes an “accrued season?”

A — Six or more regular-season games on a club’s active/inactive, reserved-injured or “physically unable to perform” lists.

Q — Other than accrued seasons, what determines a restricted free agent?

A — He has received a “qualifying” offer (a salary level predetermined by the Collective Bargaining Agreement between the league and its players) from his old club. He can negotiate with any club through April 15. If the restricted free agent accepts an offer sheet from a new club, his old club can match the offer and retain him because it has the “right of first refusal.” If the old club does not match the offer, it can possibly receive draft-choice compensation depending on the amount of its qualifying offer. If an offer sheet is not executed, the player’s rights revert to his old club on April 16.

Q — What determines an unrestricted free agent?

A — A player with four or more accrued seasons whose contract has expired. He is free to sign with any club, with no compensation owed to his old club, through July 22 (or the first scheduled day of the first NFL training camp, whichever is later). On July 23, his rights revert to his old club if it made a “tender” offer (110 percent of last year’s salary) to him by June 1. His old club then has until the 10th week of the season (November 12) to sign him. If he does not sign by November 12, he must sit out the season. If no tender is offered by June 1, the player can be signed by any club at any time throughout the season.

Q — What determines a transition player?

A — His club must offer a minimum of the average of the top 10 salaries of last season at the player’s position or 120 percent of the player’s previous year’s salary, whichever is

greater. A transition player designation gives the club a first-refusal right to match within seven days an offer sheet given to the player by another club after his contract expires. If the club matches, it retains the player. If it does not match, it receives no compensation.

Q — What determines a franchise player?

A — A club can designate one franchise player in any given year. The salary level offer by a player’s old club determines what type of franchise player he is. An “exclusive” franchise player — not free to sign with another club — is offered a minimum of the average of the top five salaries at the player’s position as of April 15, or 120 percent of the player’s previous year’s salary, whichever is greater. If the player is offered a minimum of the average of the top five salaries of last season at his position, he becomes a “non-exclusive” franchise player and can negotiate with other clubs. His old club can match a new club’s offer, or receive two first-round draft choices if it decides not to match.

Q — Can a club decide to withdraw its franchise or transition designations on a player? If so, can it then use them on other players?

A — A club can withdraw its franchise or transition designations and the player then automatically becomes an unrestricted free agent either immediately or when his contract expires. The club cannot name a new transition player (two allowed in 1993, one in 1994 and one in the final year of the CBA). It can name a new franchise player the next year. A club can, though, designate a transition player in lieu of a franchise player at any time.





