Tom BENSON OWNER



It has been over two decades since Tom Benson assumed ownership of the New Orleans Saints, and it's no coincidence that this period ranks as the most successful and dynamic in franchise history. During the tenure, Benson has emerged as one of the NFL's most influential leaders by dedicating himself to service to the club, the league and the community.

His effort, vision and determination have been the driving influences in the club's transformation within the NFL, the city and the surrounding area. Friends immediately cite his untiring work ethic as a defining virtue, because he works hard and enjoys his work. He has great loyalty to his business associates and employees, many who have worked at his side for over 40 years. But Benson isn't all business, as he's quick

to laugh and has a great respect for family and friends. The native New Orleanian also understands the responsibility of putting his resources back into the community to help those less fortunate.

His impact goes far beyond his leadership of the team and within the league. While the club's success has invigorated the area's pride since his arrival, Benson has also built the Saints into an economic powerhouse for the entire region, and his integrity and compassion have transformed the organization into a community leader.

Benson has built his reputation through a record of accomplishment and service to the State of Louisiana, the City of New Orleans, the Gulf South region and the NFL. The Saints have been consistent winners, as Benson's unwavering goal remains for the club to annually rank among the most-admired franchises in all of professional sports.

Prior to his arrival, the Saints and their fans had never enjoyed a winning season, won a division title or experienced the thrill of a playoff victory. Football was a new business for Benson when he purchased the club, but he was a quick learner, and he followed his life-long philosophy of finding the right people and putting them in charge.

Just a year after he was able to put his management group in place, New Orleans stormed to a 12-3 record in 1987 and the city hosted its first playoff contest. In 1990, the Saints captured an NFC playoff berth again, and the following year the club won its first division title. In 1992, New Orleans went 12-4 and marched into the postseason. And in 2000, the Saints won the NFC West crown and won their first playoff contest.

Dedication, hard work and integrity have made Benson among the most trusted and valued figures in the NFL. He plays a key role in many capacities, including as Chairman of the NFL Finance Committee. It's his third stint in one of the league's most influential positions, and evidence of the esteem he is held in by fellow NFL owners.

His involvement in the league started in 1985, when Benson learned that the Saints were on the brink of being sold to out-of-town interests who were going to move the team. While football was one of his interests, the sport had yet to become one of his passions.

But as one of the area's top businessmen, Benson recognized the economic and social importance of the Saints to not only the city, but the entire region. So he spearheaded the effort to keep the Saints. And unlike others, it wasn't just an emotional plea, as he put all of his resources on the line to purchase the club and preserve it for Louisiana.

And while his work within the organization and the Saints' turnaround is well documented, his efforts have also paid dividends for the city and the surrounding area.

OWNERSHIP

During his tenure as Owner, the city has hosted four Super Bowls. Each time New Orleans has been chosen, Benson has been the top advocate of the campaign to secure the contest. Each Super Bowl has been an economic windfall for the area that totals over \$300 million, not to mention the exposure and the NFL's charitable contributions.

Then there is his commitment to the region's schools and people, as community service is one of the true hallmarks of Benson's years with the Saints. Millions of dollars – not to mention donations of goods and services – have funneled to the entire Gulf South region.

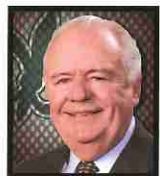
In 1945, Benson served in the U.S. Navy aboard the U.S.S. South Dakota and has remained close to this branch of the armed forces. He is the only enlisted man to ever serve on the Board of Trustees of the Pensacola Naval Museum and has been honored with an award from the crew of the submarine U.S.S. Louisiana. A leading advocate for the National World War II Memorial in Washington D.C., Benson was also a major contributor to The National D-Day Museum.

Because of those efforts and others – including the introduction of Saints Flag Football in middle schools, the Saints Venture Fund and Impact Grants Program for underprivileged kids and Benson's support of football from playgrounds to the Bayou Classic – the World Sports Humanitarian Hall of Fame has twice recognized the club as one of the five most charitable professional organizations.

In addition, Benson brought Arena Football to the city with the New Orleans VooDoo in 2004, one of the league's most successful expansion franchises. His granddaughter, Rita Benson LeBlanc, is the Chief Operation Officer and was named AFL Executive of the Year as the club won the AFL Southern Division title in its first season.

Through ownership of the Saints, it has been Benson's long-term goal to place the City of New Orleans, Louisiana and the Gulf Coast region at the forefront of pro sports and to have his team support the community in economic, civic and charitable efforts. And through two decades, that goal has consistently been met – both on the field and off.

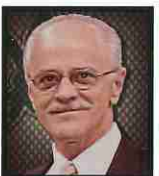

Stanley Rosenberg

One of Tom Benson's most trusted advisers, Rosenberg has been an associate of the Owner's for over 40 years. In addition to his role as Mr. Benson's attorney, Rosenberg has assisted in representing the club in negotiations with the state and has offered experienced counsel in the selection of the Saints' key hires since 1985.

Tom Roddy

Born in Houma, La., Roddy has a long association with Mr. Benson in both the banking and automotive businesses. He has overseen the day-to-day operations of Benson Management Company as well as Benson Financial Corp. Roddy has also been a member of the Owner's search teams for key hires by the club in the past.

Ryan LeBlanc

LeBlanc, Mr. Benson's grandson, oversees the daily operation of the sprawling, 2,500-acre Benson Farm and Ranch – known nationwide as a premier hunting destination – in Johnson City, Texas. The ranch features a herd of over 200 Black Angus cattle and has purchased, bred and raced over 100 thoroughbred horses.

MILESTONES

1985 Ownership of club officially transferred to Tom Benson on May 31. Benson becomes managing general partner of the Saints. With training camp almost a month away, Benson maintained the team management group that he inherited.

1986 The Benson influence really begins, as the Owner puts his management team in charge of the franchise. His first hire: Jim Finks as president/general manager on Jan. 14. Jim Mora is named the club's 10th head coach two weeks later.

1987 The Saints post a franchise-best 12-3 record – including victories in the final nine contests and make the playoffs for the first time.

1988 Saints finish 10-6, posting consecutive winning seasons for the first time.

1989 Benson appointed Chairman of the league's most influential group, the NFL Finance Committee, a position he kept before stepping down in the mid-1990s.

1991 New Orleans clinched its first-ever division championship at 11-5 as the Superdome hosts its first playoff game.

1992 Saints post a 12-4 record and host a playoff game for the second-straight year. Benson assumes sole ownership of the club.

1996 Marking a first for the organization, the coaches, players and staff are housed under one roof with the opening of the team's state-of-the-art facility.

1999 Benson promises the club's fans he will "take whatever steps necessary at the end of the season to make the New Orleans Saints a winning franchise."

2000 New Orleans wins the NFC West with a 10-6 record. The Saints win their first playoff game, a 31-28 thriller over St. Louis in the Superdome. Coach Jim Haslett wins NFL Coach of the Year.

2001 New Orleans hosts fourth Super Bowl during Benson's tenure as Owner.

2003 Benson again appointed Chairman of the Finance Committee; Construction of new indoor practice facility and other improvements is finished before camp; Benson moves Saints' annual training camp back to New Orleans.

2004 The Saints notched the 150th win since Benson assumed ownership with a 28-25 overtime victory at St. Louis.

Rita Benson LeBLANC OWNER/EXECUTIVE

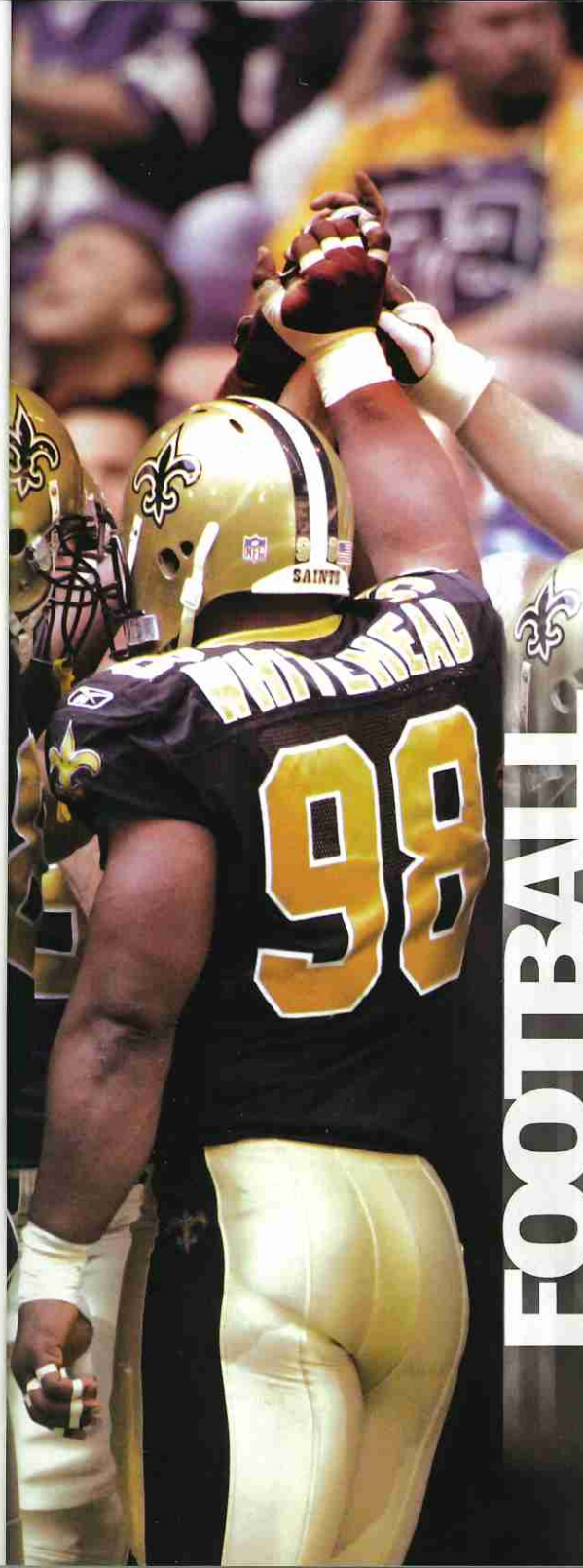
Rita Benson LeBlanc acts as liaison between the Saints, the New Orleans community and the gulf south region coordinating business development projects and special events. She has spearheaded stadium research, club fiscal responsibility and marketing initiatives. In her tenure with the Saints, she has progressed in gaining experience while working through the football business - varying from pro personnel in football operations to ticket sales and youth programs. LeBlanc is also member of the Saints Board of Directors representing the club at NFL ownership meetings.

Her well-rounded NFL experience has included time with the League office in New York, the NFL Properties Publishing Group in Los Angeles and NFL Films in Mount Laurel, N.J. In her endeavors throughout the league, she has participated in the selection process for the Teacher of the Year Program, was staff editor for a season of *Gameday* magazine, provided production assistance on several Emmy-nominated NFL Films projects and received recognition from the U.S. Secret Service for aiding in the protective mission during Super Bowl XXXVI.

LeBlanc also serves as Owner/Executive for the New Orleans VooDoo. She has been a highly-involved contributor to AFL owner's meetings and a member of the AFL Properties Committee as well as the AFL Television subcommittee. LeBlanc has been instrumental in defining the brand, creating the organization's image and building the VooDoo's unique experience for the franchise's highly-successful first two seasons. For those efforts, she was named the Arena Football League's Executive of the Year in 2004. The excitement continued in 2005 with a powerful VooDoo season of growing fan loyalty and increased local sales.

Additional accolades and involvements in the New Orleans area include; New Orleans Magazine 2004 Top Female Achievers, one of *New Orleans CityBusiness'* Women of the Year for 2004, *Gambit Weekly's* Forty Under Forty as one of New Orleans' outstanding achievers and she was honored by Magic 101.9 as one of 2005's Leading Women in Business. She is a member of the Board of Trustees for Loyola University and a board member for the Shirley Landry Benson PACE Center at St. Cecilia.

LeBlanc is a graduate of Texas A&M University with a B.S. in AgriBusiness, and a certificate in International Business from the Mays School of Business. She was a member of the inaugural class of the NFL Managers Program at Stanford University's Executive Education Graduate School of Business, and LeBlanc also attended the 2004 CitiGroup Private Bank's Wealth Management - The Next Generation program in New York for global clients. She is an advisory director to the Board of Directors for Lone Star Capital Bank, N.A. in San Antonio, Texas.

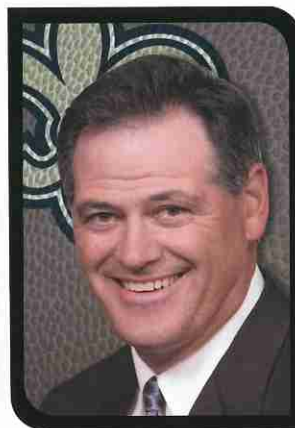

Mickey LOOMIS EXECUTIVE VICE- PRESIDENT/GENERAL MANAGER

His objective is simple: To build and maintain a Super Bowl-winning team in New Orleans. Relying on polished leadership skills, a keen attention to detail and a myriad of lessons learned from over two decades in the NFL, Executive Vice-President/General Manager Mickey Loomis has proven to be a natural for the legion of responsibilities that come with directing the Saints toward that objective.

Always cool in his approach, Loomis possesses a combination of talents and experiences that mesh seamlessly with the everyday duties of his position. He oversees all aspects of the club's football operations, including coaching, player personnel, salary cap management, contract negotiations, equipment, video, athletic training and public relations. He also serves as General Manager of the New Orleans VooDoo of the Arena Football League.

Though his title and authority have evolved during his stint in New Orleans, Loomis continues to follow the same fundamental beliefs that have defined his NFL tenure: Have confidence in those around you, carefully consider every option and be assertive and resolute with each decision.

In assembling a team, Loomis believes in building through the draft and complementing the roster through free agency. His background in managing the salary cap helps immensely in that effort, because in today's NFL landscape cap management cannot be separated from personnel decisions. Loomis understands how the two areas connect when completing a roster and the Saints have never been hounded by cap restraints since he took control of the franchise, evidenced by the active role the club has taken every year in the free-agent market under his stewardship.

Since taking over as General Manager, Loomis has signed Coach Jim Haslett to a long-term contract extension, inked QB Aaron Brooks to a new deal and courted leading free agent acquisitions such as DT Brian Young, T Wayne Gandy, TE Ernie Conwell, P Mitch Berger, G Jermaine Mayberry and S Dwight Smith. The Saints have also drafted a wealth of top contributors, including DE Charles Grant, C LeCharles Bentley, WR Donte' Stallworth and DE Will Smith.

Loomis was the guiding force in the construction at the team's headquarters in 2003, a needed facelift that has given the Saints one of the NFL's best training areas. The world-class structure now includes an indoor practice facility, a new weight room and a full-service cafeteria. The locker room, training room and team meeting areas were also redesigned and improved.



GENERAL MANAGER

Loomis brings a blend of experiences to his position. In his former post as Director of Football Administration, he handled contract negotiations with free agents and draft picks and also managed the club's salary cap structure. From draft meetings to post-practice evaluation sessions, Loomis has been a trusted voice among the Saints' highest management circle since he arrived in 2000 and his views have proven to be as savvy as his approach.

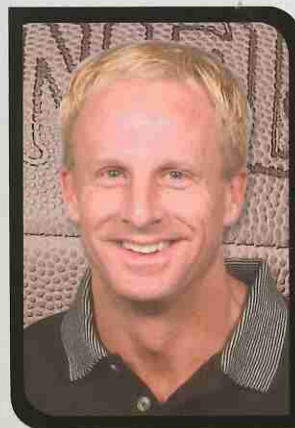
Prior to joining the Saints, Loomis spent 15 years with the Seattle Seahawks, most recently as executive vice-president from 1992-98. He originally joined the Seahawks staff in October 1983, was promoted to vice president/finance in 1990 and then to executive vice president in 1992.

A native of Eugene, Ore., he graduated from Willamette High School in 1974 and played basketball at Northwest Christian College. Loomis earned his undergraduate degree in accounting from the University of Oregon and also holds a master's degree in sports administration from Wichita State University.

Loomis has two children: A son, Alex, and a daughter, Katherine.



COACHING STAFF



Jim HASLETT
HEAD COACH

Coach Jim Haslett, who has notched 42 regular-season victories and the first playoff win in franchise history since being hired in early 2000, enters his sixth season as Head Coach of the New Orleans Saints.

After five years of carefully rebuilding the roster following a six-season stretch (1994-99) where the Saints only posted 32 wins, Haslett's overall victory total - 43 including the playoffs - and

winning percentage (.524) already rank second in team record books among the 13 head coaches in club history.

To get his message across, he fosters teamwork while relying on this foundation of beliefs: Intensity for four quarters, endless preparation and a dedication to the basics of blocking and tackling. In an NFL era where the makeup of a team can change dramatically each year because of free agency, Haslett's ability to rapidly create a winning, united atmosphere within those who were once football strangers ranks among his greatest strengths.

Though his focus remains firmly on the future, the Saints' successes over his first five seasons cannot be ignored. Never has his gritty leadership and single-minded determination been more evident than in 2004. After a spate of injuries hamstrung the team early and a trio of defeats came by a touchdown or less, Haslett rallied New Orleans to four-straight victories over the final month and on the cusp of a playoff berth. Though the Saints ranked among the conference's hottest teams, the club was left on the outside of the postseason by the league's tie-breaker system.

The offense again sparkled in 2004, ranking among the team's all-time top 10 in scoring - as the Saints have each year since Haslett's arrival. New Orleans scored three touchdowns or more in 11 games, and QB Aaron Brooks, RB Deuce McAllister and WR Joe Horn combined to give the Saints one of the top three-position combined yardage seasons in club history.

In 2003, Haslett molded a roster full of inexperienced youngsters, including eight new starters sprinkled throughout the lineup, into a formidable unit. New Orleans bounced back from a 1-4 start to win seven of the final 11 contests - with three of the four defeats coming by a touchdown or less - as Haslett held the club together during a difficult beginning to keep the Saints in playoff contention until the 16th week of the season.

The offense had another record-breaking season, setting club marks for third-down conversions (106), third-down conversion percentage (46.3) and fewest

interceptions thrown (eight) while RB Deuce McAllister emerged as one of the NFL's best players. And on defense, New Orleans held 11 opponents to 20 points or less and gave up an average of 12 points per game in December.

Despite having 10 new starters in 2002, the Saints posted a 9-7 record that included a pair of memorable victories over the Super Bowl XXXVII-Champion Tampa Bay Buccaneers. New Orleans led the NFC with a team-record 432 points that season, while the special teams emerged as one of the league's most opportunistic units.

Observers predicted a lengthy rebuilding project when Haslett arrived in 2000, but the strong-willed coach ignored that timetable and the expectations surrounding the Saints have grown with his demanding standards.

Haslett's keen attention to detail and commitment to preparation are best reflected in the way New Orleans has performed on the road under his leadership. The Saints are 23-16 (.600) in enemy stadiums since Haslett's arrival - the best road winning percentage in team history for a head coach - despite the club having dropped the previous 14 away games before he was hired.

Haslett led New Orleans to the NFC West title and a playoff victory in 2000. The team put an exclamation point on an eventful season with a 31-28 triumph over the St. Louis Rams to notch the first-ever playoff win in New Orleans. With that victory, Haslett had led the Saints to greater heights in his first season than the previous 12 head coaches in franchise history combined. Following that historic effort, Haslett was a unanimous selection for NFL Coach of the Year.

Haslett's 42 regular-season victories ranks second in club history, trailing only Jim Mora's 93 wins from 1986-96. And by entering his sixth season in 2005, Mora is the only head coach who has led the Saints for a longer period.

A 23-year veteran of the NFL as a player and coach, Haslett was hired by New Orleans on Feb. 3, 2000. With the reputation as a player's coach who accepted little nonsense, Haslett's coaching star had been on the rise in league circles for years. He spent 1997-99 as defensive coordinator for the Pittsburgh Steelers, where his aggressive schemes helped create some of the NFL's most dominating units. He tutored a defense that led Pittsburgh to the AFC Championship game in 1997.

This is Haslett's second tour of duty in New Orleans. He spent two years with the Saints, as linebackers coach in 1995 followed by a stint as the defensive coordinator under Mora in 1996. In his first season as coordinator, New Orleans improved from 22nd to 13th in the NFL in defense.

From 1993-94, Haslett was linebackers coach for the Los Angeles Raiders. In 1993, the Raiders posted a 10-6 record, while current Saints linebackers coach Winston Moss had one of his best seasons. Haslett's contributions helped push the Raiders' defense to a top 10 ranking both years. From 1991-92, Haslett was defensive coordinator for the Sacramento Surge of the World League. In 1992,

the Surge won the WLAF title. Serving on Haslett's staff that year as a defensive assistant was Rick Mueller, now the Saints' Director of Player Personnel.

Haslett opened his coaching career in 1988, handling linebackers at the University of Buffalo. A year later he was promoted to defensive coordinator and served in that capacity for two years.

The bedrock of Haslett's coaching principles was forged during his stellar playing career. After being drafted out of Indiana University of Pennsylvania in the second round of the 1979 NFL Draft by the Buffalo Bills, Haslett was voted the Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year. He played eight seasons with the Bills - earning All-Pro honors in 1981 - and finished his career in 1987 with the New York Jets.

Haslett played defensive end at IUP, where he was a four-time All-American. He enrolled at IUP and joined the football team as a walk-on, yet still set school records with 20 sacks and five fumble recoveries in a season. As a senior Haslett even took over as punter and averaged 41.5 yards. His career was recognized with his induction into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2001.

Born Dec. 9, 1955, in Pittsburgh, Haslett and his wife, Beth, have two daughters, Kelsey and Elizabeth, and a son, Chase.

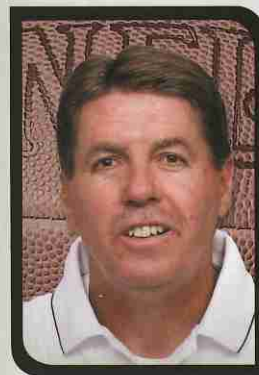

Mike SHEPPARD OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Since arriving in New Orleans in 2002, Mike Sheppard has only strengthened his standing as one of the game's finest teachers of quarterbacks and offensive strategy. Respected in coaching circles for his technical expertise and communication skills, he was promoted to offensive coordinator in February after a lengthy search by Coach Jim Haslett, who found the most qualified candidate on his staff.

Over the last three years under Sheppard's guidance, starting QB Aaron Brooks progressed each season. He tossed 72 touchdowns with only 39 interceptions in that span. Brooks had 3,810 yards last season, including six games with 250 or more yards.

After setting a club record with 27 touchdown passes in 2002, Brooks had a sterling encore in 2003 by tossing 24 TDs with eight interceptions. The plus-16 difference between touchdowns and interceptions was the best in club history. Brooks also posted a career-high 88.8 passer rating to rank third in the NFC and was twice named the conference's offensive player of the week.

Before coming to New Orleans, Sheppard spent 2001 as offensive coordinator of the Buffalo Bills. Under his guidance the Bills finished 13th in the NFL in total offense.

Sheppard spent 1999-2000 as quarterbacks coach for the Seattle Seahawks under head coach Mike Holmgren. Twice in 1999 under Sheppard's tutelage, QB Jon Kitna earned AFC Offensive Player of the Week. Prior to arriving in Seattle, Sheppard served from 1997-98 as offensive coordinator for the San Diego Chargers.

In 1996, Sheppard coached wide receivers coach for the Baltimore Ravens and was given play-calling duties under head coach Ted Marchibroda for a unit that finished third overall in the league. Sheppard first entered the NFL with the Cleveland Browns in 1993 as tight ends coach before tutoring wide receivers from 1994-95.

Prior to joining the NFL, Sheppard served one year as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at the University of California in 1992. Before his stint at Cal, he spent eight years as head coach at New Mexico (1987-91) and Long Beach State (1984-86). Sheppard has also spent time on coaching staffs at Kansas, Idaho State, BYU, Cal Lutheran and U.S. International.

A native of Tulsa, Okla., Sheppard earned a bachelor's degree from California Lutheran University in 1973, as well as a teaching credential in 1975. He received his master's degree in 1982 from BYU. Mike and his wife, Cathie, have four children - Chrissi, Brian, Shelby and Macall - and a grandson, Christian.

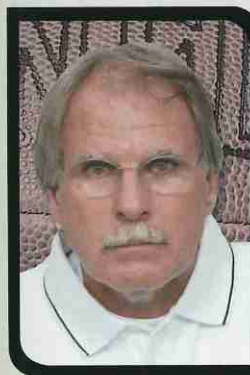

Rick VENTURI DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

For over two decades he has been a constant in NFL coaching circles, holding nearly every title in that span, working with some of the league's top coaches and earning a reputation among his peers as one of the game's leading strategists and teachers. During his career, he has spent countless hours on practice fields, in meeting rooms, studying film and pacing the sidelines, a work ethic that has kept Rick Venturi among the innovators during the steady evolution of defensive strategy.

In 2005, he enters his 10th season in New Orleans and fourth as defensive coordinator. Fueled by a limitless supply of intensity and competitiveness, Venturi has earned the respect of players and fellow coaches by consistently cutting out the clutter and breaking every player's responsibilities down into their simplest form. He will rely on those skills again this season as he tutors a youthful unit.

Last year, the Saints posted 37 sacks and created 31 turnovers, including 18 fumble recoveries. DE Charles Grant had a career-high 10.5 sacks, and young players such as DE Will Smith, LB Courtney Watson and LB James Allen became top contributors. The unit solidified over the season's final month, allowing an average of 15.3 points in the last four games.

While working a slew of new starters into the line up of an inexperienced defense in 2003, Venturi's unit improved nearly every week. Over the last 12 games, the Saints' defense gave up only 207 points (an average of 17.2 points). During that span, New Orleans held five opponents to two touchdowns or less and the defense did not allow an opposing wide receiver to score a TD for the rest of the year after the fourth quarter at Tampa Bay on Nov. 2. The defense - which held 11 opponents to 20 points or less - also improved as the season progressed, as over the final four games the defense surrendered a scant 48 points.

In 2002, the club featured one of the league's most opportunistic units by tying for third in the NFL with 38 takeaways (20 interceptions, 18 fumble recoveries).

Venturi was promoted to defensive coordinator after serving as defensive backs coach from 2000-2001, a position he also held in New Orleans in 1998. Venturi was also assistant head coach from 1997-2001. While he stopped serving in that capacity in 2002 to concentrate fully as defensive coordinator, the additional title was a reflection of the respect for Venturi held by Jim Haslett and the entire coaching staff.

In his final two seasons as a position coach prior to being elevated to coordinator, Venturi's secondary was one of the strengths of a unit that annually ranked among the league's toughest defenses. In 2000, the Saints ranked 10th in the NFL in pass defense and ninth in the league with 20 interceptions.

Venturi first brought his expertise to the defensive backfield in 1998. That season, the Saints secondary scored five of a team-record nine defensive touchdowns while posting an NFC-high 21 interceptions. In 1999, Venturi served as linebackers coach, the same position he held when he joined the Saints in 1996. In his first year in New Orleans, Venturi was promoted to head coach eight games into the season and held the club together during a difficult period. With a new coaching staff in 1997, he was retained as linebackers coach and first took on the additional duties of assistant head coach.

Prior to joining the Saints, Venturi spent two years working under head coach Bill Belichick with the Cleveland Browns, first as secondary coach in 1994 and as defensive coordinator/linebackers coach the following season.

The formative years of Venturi's NFL career were spent with the Colts. He joined Baltimore as an assistant in 1982 and remained with the club through 1993. He began 1991 as defensive coordinator/linebackers coach before taking over as interim head coach with 11 games remaining. He also served as defensive coordinator with the Colts in 1984 and 1992-93.

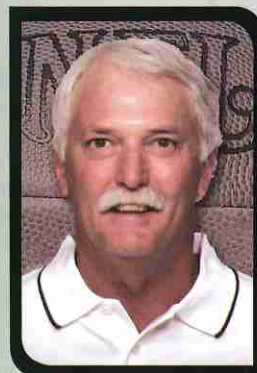
Venturi played quarterback and defensive back at Northwestern University, where he earned a dual degree in physical education and history and later added a master's degree in education. His first coaching stop was at his alma mater in 1968. From 1973-76, he was at Purdue before moving on to Illinois for the 1977 season. He returned to Northwestern in 1978, where at 31 he was hired as the youngest head coach in Big 10 history. He stayed at that position with the Wildcats for three years, and in 1981 he landed his first job at the pro level with the CFL Hamilton Tiger-Cats.

Off the field, Venturi enjoys riding motorcycles and owns two bikes. Born Feb. 23, 1946, in Taylorville, Ill., he and his wife, Cheri, have a daughter, Marin, a son, Jason, and a grandson, Aiden.

AL EVEREST SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

By stressing teamwork, aggressive tackling and opportunistic play, the Saints' special teams have established a tradition of top-notch play over the last five seasons under Al Everest. Over the last five years, his hard-charging units have ranked among the NFL's best and set a slew of club records.

In 2004, the club had five players win NFC Special Teams Player of the Week awards, the most in franchise history for a single season. Included in that total was four-straight over the final four contests, which tied the NFL record for the most consecutive winners since the inception of the award in 1993. P Mitch Berger was voted for the honor following the victory at Dallas, Dec. 12, RB Aaron Stecker took home the award after the Dec. 19 win at Tampa Bay, WR Michael Lewis earned the accolade following the victory over Atlanta, Dec. 26, and DE Tony Bryant capped the streak after the triumph at Carolina in the finale.

K John Carney was also named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week after tying a team record with five field goals at St. Louis, Sept. 26. Also last season, Lewis became the team's all-time punt return leader and had a 96-yard kickoff return for a touchdown. Stecker added a 98-yard kick return for a TD and Berger was voted to the Pro Bowl after leading the league in net punting average at 39.5.

In 2003, Carney established a team record with 22-straight contests with a field goal, Berger led the league in net punting average and the Saints notched three-straight games with a blocked field goal, the longest such streak in the NFL since 2000.

In 2002, the Saints had three touchdown returns, blocked five kicks and a forced interception for a TD while rushing a punt. Carney set a club scoring record with 130 points and Lewis set an NFL record with 2,432 combined kickoff and punt return yards. The Saints also set a team record by allowing an average of 5.5 yards on 38 punt returns. Everest was named 2002 NFL Special Teams Coach of the Year in a vote by his peers and *The Dallas Morning News* listed New Orleans as having the league's No. 1 special teams in the publication's annual ranking.

In 2001, the Saints led the NFC in average drive start, featured the conference's most accurate kicker and ranked among the leaders in kickoff return average.

Everest brings 34 years of coaching experience to his post, arriving in New Orleans in 2000 after a four-year stint in the same capacity at Arizona. In 1999, the Cardinals ranked third in the NFL in defensive punt return coverage, fifth in opponent's net punting average and second in field goal defense. In 1998,

Arizona had four game-winning field goals on the final play.

Everest relies on a diverse background, having worked on both sides of the ball and around the globe. He served as athletic director and football coach at the American School Foundation in Mexico City from 1976-80, and baseball coach at U.S. International University from 1981-87. He then entered the pro ranks, coaching in Italy from 1988-91. Everest also spent part of 1991 as a scout for the Pro Spring Football League, before serving as secondary coach with the Arkansas Miners in 1992.

In 1992, Everest was offensive coordinator of the San Antonio Force in the Arena Football League. He returned to Italy in 1993 before coaching at The Colony (Lewisville, Texas) HS. In 1995, Everest was special teams coordinator of the CFL Birmingham Barracudas.

A two-year starter at safety at SMU from 1970-71, Everest earned a master's degree from North Texas, and a Doctorate of Education from U.S. International. His father, Andy, was an assistant with the Saints under Bum Phillips from 1981-85. Born Aug. 22, 1950, Everest has two daughters, Michelle and Kaycee.

John "Jack" HENRY ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH-RUNNING GAME COORDINATOR

For over a decade he has been polishing the skills of NFL offensive linemen, building a reputation around the league as one of the game's most respected assistant coaches by stressing toughness, assignment responsibility and attention to detail. Jack Henry will now bring those same traits to the club's rushing efforts, as he was promoted this year by Coach Jim

Haslett to associate head coach/running game coordinator. This newly-formed position allows him to use his expertise in a key part of the team's offensive attack.

Henry, who arrived in New Orleans with Haslett in 2000, will be the chief advisor to offensive coordinator Mike Sheppard in all facets of the ground attack

and bring his understanding of fundamentals and techniques to the game plan. Henry will also continue to tutor the offensive line, working with assistant offensive line coach Jim Pyne. Henry's additional title of associate head coach is a reflection of the respect and regard held for him by the entire coaching staff.

Over the last five seasons, Henry has balanced an aggressive approach to taking on defenders with proper blocking techniques. His hard-nosed units have set the tone for RB Deuce McAllister to become the first player in club history to post three-straight 1,000-yard seasons. Each season Henry has molded his crew of blockers into a cohesive unit, despite weathering a slew of injuries.

Last year, Henry guided LeCharles Bentley in his transformation from right guard to center, and Bentley was voted an alternate for the Pro Bowl. He also integrated G Montrae Holland into the unit as the starting right guard. The Saints averaged over 100 yards rushing per contest and provided protection for QB Aaron Brooks to pass for 3,810 yards.

In 2003, the offensive front was one of the team's most consistent areas despite Henry having to shuffle injured players in and out of the lineup. The line paved the way for the Saints to rush for 2,000 yards, convert a team-record 106 third downs and allow just 36 sacks, the club's lowest total since 1996. McAllister rushed for nine-straight 100-yard games and 1,641 yards, the fourth-consecutive season where New Orleans has featured a 1,000-yard rusher. That accomplishment - now boosted to five-straight - is a first in club history, and none of it was possible without Henry's group clearing the way up front.

Bentley was selected to the Pro Bowl in 2003, the first Saints' guard to be voted to the postseason all-star game since 1987.

Before joining Haslett's staff, Henry was offensive line coach for the Detroit Lions from 1997-99. In Henry's first season, the Lions boasted the NFL's second-ranked rushing offense, highlighted by Barry Sanders' 2,053 yards. It is one of only five times in NFL history that a running back reached the 2,000-yard milestone.

A coaching veteran of over 30 years, Henry spent 1996 as offensive line coach for the San Diego Chargers. Prior to joining the Chargers, Henry spent 1993-95 as the offensive line coach at the University of Pittsburgh. His first NFL assignment was tutoring the Pittsburgh Steelers offensive line under Hall of Fame coach Chuck Noll in 1990-91.

Henry previously served as the assistant director of athletics, associate head football coach and offensive coordinator at his alma mater, Indiana University of Pennsylvania (IUP) from 1986-89. He was inducted into the IUP Athletic Hall of Fame in 1997.

He also worked at seven other colleges in his career, coaching the freshman offensive line at West Virginia in 1970, followed by a stint at Edinboro in 1973 (offensive line and wrestling coach), Louisville in 1974 (offensive line),

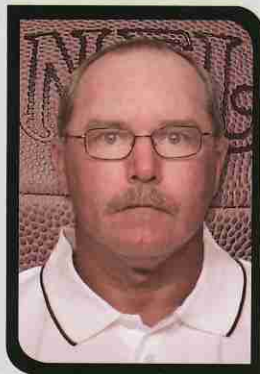
Millersville in 1975-76 (offensive coordinator), Southern Illinois in 1977 (offensive line), West Virginia in 1978-79 (offensive line), Appalachian State in 1980 (offensive coordinator) and Wake Forest in 1981-85 (offensive coordinator/offensive line coach). His first coaching job was at Blairsville (Pa.) High School.

Henry, who began his playing career as a linebacker at Penn State from 1964-65, played guard for IUP in 1967-68 before graduating in 1969. He was the captain of the school's famed 1968 Boardwalk Bowl Championship team.

Henry is a native of Houston, Pa. He and his wife, Carol, have two children: Chad, an area scout for the Detroit Lions who is married to the former Holly Gordon, and Jacqueline.

Willy ROBINSON SENIOR DEFENSIVE ASSISTANT-SECONDARY

The Saints added a proven, experienced strategist to the coaching staff upon the hiring of Willy Robinson in January. Robinson, the defensive coordinator of the San Francisco 49ers in 2004, will be in charge of the secondary and also lend his expertise and perspective to coordinator Rick Venturi in the weekly preparation for each opponent.

Robinson led a young defense in San Francisco after a four-year stint (2000-03) as defensive backs coach for the Pittsburgh Steelers. Under his guidance, Pittsburgh's secondary forged a reputation as one of the league's most aggressive units. The Steelers went to the playoffs twice in that span - including advancing to the AFC Championship in 2001 - and had 66 interceptions.

Entering his 10th season, Robinson arrived in Pittsburgh after serving as defensive coordinator and secondary coach at Oregon State in 1999, where he tutored the No. 1 ranked defense in the Pac-10. Prior to joining the Beavers staff, Robinson was the secondary coach for the Seattle Seahawks from 1995-98 and worked with a pair of All-Pros: CB Shawn Springs and S Daryl Williams.

COACHING STAFF

Robinson opened his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Fresno State (1978), then accepted a position at San Jose State for a season working with the outside linebackers. He returned to Fresno in 1980 and spent 14 years at the school in various capacities, including tutoring the secondary (1980-86), outside linebackers (1987-89) and defensive backs/special teams (1990-91). He was promoted to co-defensive coordinator in 1988 and held the post alone in 1992. In 1994, Robinson was secondary coach for the University of Miami.

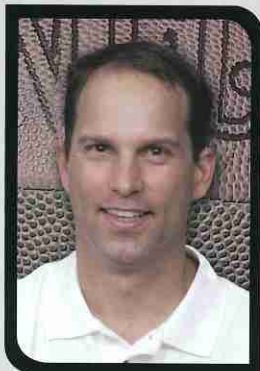

He was also involved in draft-day decision making and roster moves, and in 1997 the Dragons captured the World Bowl Championship.

Beake spent NFL off-seasons working in NFL training camps, picking up experience on both sides of the ball. In 2000, Beake worked as an intern under defensive coordinator Gregg Williams with the Tennessee Titans. In 1999, he was a Green Bay Packers intern under offensive coordinator Sherman Lewis. Greg **BROWN** DEFENSIVE ASSISTANT/ CORNERBACKS

Greg Brown, a 15-year NFL coaching veteran, enters his fourth season with the Saints and his third as defensive assistant/cornerbacks coach. He was promoted to his current spot after spending 2002 as defensive assistant/quality control, and has since been responsible for tutoring the club's platoon of cornerbacks. He coordinates his efforts with senior defensive assistant/secondary coach Willy Robinson.

In 2004 Brown led a unit that was among the most consistent areas of the defense, despite melding the talents of newly-acquired Mike McKenzie and veteran Fakhir Brown into the starting unit. McKenzie finished with a team-high five interceptions while playing in just 11 games, while Brown became one of the leaders of the secondary with his solid play.

But developing top-notch secondary play has been Brown's specialty throughout his coaching career, and he brings a wealth of experience in working with NFL defensive backs. Before coming to New Orleans, Brown spent the previous two years coaching the secondary of the Atlanta Falcons. Before that stint, Brown served as the defensive backs coach for the San Francisco 49ers in 1999, with S Lance Schulters earning Pro Bowl honors that season.

Brown spent 1997-98 as secondary coach of the Tennessee Oilers. In 1997, the Oilers had one of the league's top safety tandems, with Blaine Bishop being voted to the Pro Bowl and Marcus Robertson earning All-Pro honors. Brown also tutored Tennessee CB Samari Rolle, one of the AFC's top comebacks.

From 1995-96, Brown served as secondary coach at San Diego. Under his guidance, the Chargers finished with top-five rankings both years in fewest yards allowed per completion, and Brown tutored S Rodney Harrison, who has emerged as one of the league's best safeties. In 1994, he had his first stint with Atlanta as defensive backs coach and the Falcons finished second in the NFL with 23 interceptions.

Brown's NFL coaching career began in 1984, when he was hired as a defensive quality control assistant at Tampa Bay. Brown assisted on the offensive side in 1985 and served as tight ends coach in 1986.

Brown also worked on three college coaching staffs as secondary coach: Wyoming (1987-88), Purdue (1989-90) and Colorado (1991-93). Brown coached a pair of Jim Thorpe Award Winners in Deon Figures and Chris Hudson at Colorado, and the Buffalos led the nation in pass defense in 1992.

Rock GULLICKSON STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Superior conditioning has been one of the cornerstones of the Saints' success over the last five seasons and a tribute to the efforts of strength and conditioning coach Rock Gullickson. His work in New Orleans has also received notice from his peers, as Gullickson was presented the 2000 President's

Award by the Professional Football Strength and Conditioning Society.

Gullickson was a top advisor in the planning and layout of the new weight room that is connected to the Saints' indoor practice facility, including the installation of a nutrition bar for the players as well as a padded, multi-use area for stretching, plyometrics and abdominal work.

Gullickson came to the Saints in 2000 after an accomplished career in the college ranks. He arrived in New Orleans after spending 1998-99 at the University of Louisville. Prior to that, Gullickson served as the head strength and conditioning coach at the University of Texas from 1993-97. Before taking over that position, Gullickson served in a similar capacity at Rutgers from 1990-92.

A 1978 graduate of Moorhead State (Minn.), Gullickson was an Associated Press Division III All-American guard for the Dragons. Following graduation, Gullickson remained at Moorhead State for a season as strength coach before moving to Mayville (N.D.) State for two years as strength coach, assistant football, and head track and field coach.

In 1981, Gullickson was named strength coach and weight training instructor at South Dakota State, where he received his master's degree. In 1982 at Montana State, he became the first full-time strength and conditioning coach in the history of the Big Sky Conference. Prior to joining the Jaguars, Knott coached at Greenville (Ill.) College, where he was the defensive coordinator and in charge of recruiting. He has also coached at Mt. San Antonio Junior College (Calif.) in 2000, Indiana University (1997-99) and Whittier (Calif.) College in 1994-95.

He began his coaching career in 1992 at Ashland (Ore.) High School. In 1996, he served as a juvenile probation officer in Medford, Ore., and in 1993 was a counselor at Leroy Boys Home in La Verne, Calif.

Knott was a strong safety at Oregon Tech in 1988 after playing junior college football at Mt. San Antonio J.C. He received a bachelor's degree at Southern Oregon State and earned a master's degree at Indiana.

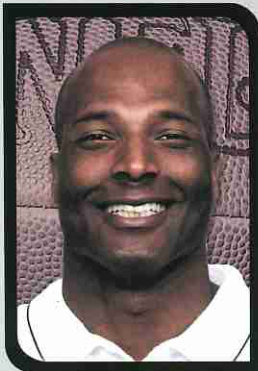

Winston MOSS LINEBACKERS

He was a standout linebacker in the NFL for 11 years and forged a reputation during that span as a hard-hitting, disciplined player who brought leadership, consistency and toughness to the field. Winston Moss, the Saints' linebackers coach since 2000, tutors the players at his position by following the same principles he is remembered for as a player.

In 2005, Moss enters his fifth full year at linebackers coach and sixth season in New Orleans. He has quickly built a tradition of fine linebacker play within the defense since being promoted to his current post near the end of 2000 following the departure of John Bunting to become the head coach at the University of North Carolina. Moss initially joined the Saints staff as defensive assistant/quality control coach.

In 2004, Moss tutored a revolving cast of young players and created a solid unit. Rookie LB Courtney Moss and veteran LB Orlando Ruff combined to post 140 tackles, and Moss integrated rookie LB Colby Bockwoldt and fourth-year veteran LB James Allen into the starting lineup on the outside over the last half of the season, with positive results. In 2003, several players distinguished themselves under the guidance of Moss, including LB Derrick Rodgers, who recorded a career-high 107 tackles, an interception and two fumble recoveries.

Moss opened his coaching tenure in 1998 as defensive quality control coach for the Seattle Seahawks, the club he finished his NFL career with after a three-year stint starting in 1995. His playing career also included stops with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1987-90) and the Los Angeles Raiders (1991-94). While with the Raiders in 1993, Saints' head coach Jim Haslett was Moss' position coach. Moss had a team-high 102 tackles that season and was elected the Raiders' recipient of the Ed Block Courage Award.

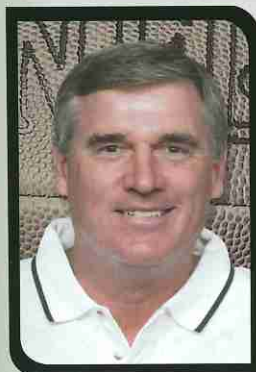
During his 11-year career, Moss appeared in 155 games, started 146 contests and recorded 768 tackles, 20.5 sacks and five interceptions. He was a three-time defensive captain and a recipient of the 1996 NFL Players Association Unsung Hero Award.

Bob PALCIC TIGHT ENDS

He leads with a tireless work ethic, a quality that has proven to be contagious to the players under his direction since tight ends coach Bob Palcic arrived in New Orleans in 2000.

A gritty dedication to doing things right has been the foundation of his efforts since the start of his coaching career, a relatively simple approach that has consistently produced quality performances in those under Palcic's tutelage over the last 30 years.

That tradition has continued in New Orleans within the stable of tight ends. Palcic is entering his sixth season with the Saints, and his efforts have helped make the position an integral part of the offense in both the running and passing attacks. Last season, the platoon of tight ends produced 44 receptions for 438 yards and four touchdowns.

Palcic arrived in New Orleans in 2000 after serving as the offensive line coach of the Cleveland Browns in 1999. He coached tight ends for the Detroit Lions in 1997-98 and was the offensive line coach of the Atlanta Falcons from 1994-96.

Before joining the NFL ranks, Palcic helped guide UCLA to a Rose Bowl berth in 1993, where he tutored present Baltimore Ravens All-Pro tackle Jonathan Ogden. He spent 1992 at USC, coaching All-American tackle Tony Boselli.

His two years in Los Angeles followed a six-year stint (1986-91) at Ohio State. The Buckeyes captured a share of the Big Ten title in Palcic's first season. He coached the offensive line at Arizona for two seasons (1984-85) before joining the Ohio State staff.

In addition to his college and NFL coaching tenures, Palcic coached in the Canadian Football League with the Toronto Argonauts (1982-83). In that span the

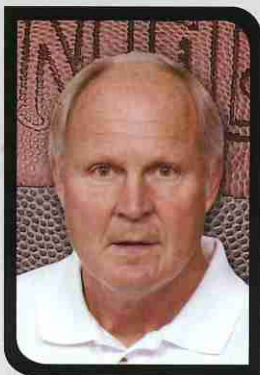

John PEASE DEFENSIVE LINE

An 18-year NFL coaching veteran, John Pease brings a high-energy approach fused with toughness to his second stint in New Orleans as defensive line coach. He was hired by Coach Jim Haslett before last season to help a talented cast of young players up front realize their potential and become the backbone of the defense. Pease's experience, enthusiasm and intensity made him a perfect fit for the assignment.

In 2004, DE Charles Grant had the finest season of his brief career. He posted 10.5 sacks and led the defensive front with a career-high 113 tackles, adding three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. DE Will Smith, the club's No. 1 pick last year, had a sparkling rookie season with 7.5 sacks and a team-leading five forced fumbles. And Pease integrated prized free agent DT Brian Young into the front four, and the veteran finished fourth on the team with 86 tackles.

Pease spent 1986-94 in New Orleans in a similar position with former Coach Jim Mora. During that span, he directed formidable lines that were key components of defenses that led the team to three playoff appearances in his final five seasons with the club. In those years, Pease tutored top performers in franchise history such as DT Wayne Martin, DE Joe Johnson, DE Frank Warren, DT James Geathers, DT Jim Wilks and DE Renaldo Turnbull.

Before returning to New Orleans, Pease had served as assistant head

coach/defensive coordinator of the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2002, with his unit surrendering an average of 19.6 points per game. As assistant head coach, Pease's additional duties included coordination of the team's off-season strength and conditioning program as well as assisting Coach Tom Coughlin in the duties and logistics of minicamps, practice schedules and training camp.

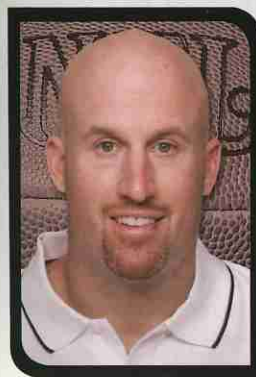
He has long been considered one of the league's top defensive line coaches. While holding that position for the Jaguars from 1995-2001, Jacksonville averaged over 42 sacks a season over his six years.

Opening his 35th season as a coach, Pease has spent 18 years in the NFL, 13 on the collegiate level and three years in the USFL. He began his full-time coaching career at Fullerton College in 1970 as linebackers coach (1970-72) and defensive line coach (1973). He also had stints at Long Beach State, Utah and Washington. From 1983-85, he was on the staff of the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars under Mora, with the Stars capturing the league's championship the final two seasons. When Mora was named head coach of the Saints, Pease joined him in New Orleans, where he stayed until being hired by the Jaguars in 1995.

A graduate of the University of Utah, Pease began his playing career at Fullerton Junior College, where he was a two-time JUCO All-American. He was inducted into the California Community College Football Coaches Hall of Fame in 1999. Pease transferred to Utah and was named All-Western Athletic Conference at wingback as a senior. From 1965-67, he served in the military in Puerto Rico and coached at Antilles High School. In 1968-69, he was a graduate assistant at Utah before moving to Fullerton the next year.

Born Oct. 14, 1943 in Pittsburgh, Pease and his wife, Chris, have two daughters, Tracy and Kristen, and four grandsons.

The Saints hired Jim Pyne to serve as assistant offensive line coach. He will work under the guidance of Jack Henry and be responsible for the day-to-day tutoring of the offensive line. The two coaches have worked together before, as Pyne worked under Henry's tutelage as an offensive lineman with the Detroit Lions in 1998.

Pyne had worked as offensive quality coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers for the last two seasons. In this position, he worked closely with offensive coordinator Bill Muir in the instruction and preparation of the offensive line. Pyne joined the Bucs' staff following a eight-year playing career along the offensive front in the NFL. He was originally drafted in the seventh-round by Tampa Bay in 1994, where he played until 1997.

In 1998, Pyne signed with Detroit, starting all 16 games at center, and the following year was the first pick of the 1999 expansion draft for the Cleveland Browns, where he started at left guard through 2000. In his stint with the Browns, Pyne was named Man of the Year, Lineman of the Year and was voted team captain in 1999 while earning a reputation as one of the club's strongest players. He was named to *Muscle & Fitness Magazine's* NFL All-Strength team three times. Pyne spent his final season with the Philadelphia Eagles, who advanced to the NFC Championship in 2001.

A four-year starter at center for Virginia Tech, Pyne was named a first-team All-American in 1993 and had his No. 73 retired. The offensive linemen meeting room at the school is now named in his honor. Pyne was also named the center on the Big East "All-Time" team and was honored with Virginia Tech's academic award for having the highest GPA on the team.

In 2003, Pyne was named to Milford (Mass.) High School's Hall of Fame, and in 2004 he was named to Virginia Tech's Hall of Fame.

Pyne graduated from Virginia Tech with a degree in marketing. Born Nov. 23, he and his wife, Crista, have a daughter, Sophia.

Jimmy ROBINSON WIDE RECEIVERS

A coaching veteran of over 20 years - including 2004, his first with the Saints - Robinson brings a proven track record of producing standout wide receiver corps and has built a lasting reputation around the NFL as a teacher and leader.

His impact was immediate in New Orleans, as Joe Horn and Donté Stallworth posted career records under Robinson's tutelage. Robinson was added to the Saints staff last offseason following a lengthy search by Coach Jim Haslett.

COACHINGSTAFF

The club's platoon of wide receivers were among the most consistent members of the offense, with Horn tying for the NFC lead with 94 receptions and recording a club-records in yardage (1,399) and receiving touchdowns (11). Stallworth also had career-highs with 58 catches for 767 yards and added five TDs. With eight 100-yard performances between them, the duo set a single-season record for the most times reaching the milestone for a pair of Saints targets.

Robinson arrived in New Orleans after serving as wide receivers coach for the New York Giants from 1998-2003, and under his guidance the team's wide receivers posted the most successful seasons in club history. WR Amani Toomer became the team's all-time receiving yards leader with 6,366 yards, and he established team records in 2002 with 82 catches and 1,387 yards. He also became the first player in Giants history to catch at least 70 passes for four-straight years (1999-2002) and have five-straight 1,000-yard seasons. In 2001, Giants wide receivers caught a team-record 186 passes for 2,680 yards and 15 touchdowns. And in 1999, Toomer and WR Ike Hilliard became the first pair in club record books to total more than 2,000 receiving yards.

Prior to joining the Giants, Robinson served as wide receivers coach for the Indianapolis Colts (1994-1997) and the Atlanta Falcons (1990-93). With the Colts he worked with WR Marvin Harrison, who became only the third rookie to lead the team in receiving. While in Atlanta, he guided Andre Rison and Michael Haynes to the top of the NFL's touchdown receptions list for a tandem in 1991 and 1992, and Rison and Mike Pritchard led the league again in 1993.

Robinson began his coaching career in the USFL as wide receivers/tight ends coach of the Memphis Showboats from 1984-85. He returned to his alma mater, Georgia Tech, as wide receivers coach from 1987-89.

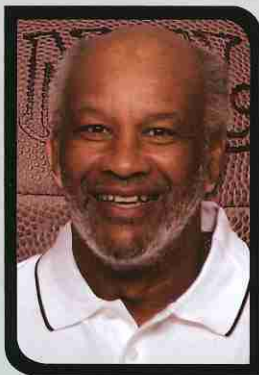
Robinson had a standout career at wide receiver for Georgia Tech from 1971-74, hauling in 101 passes for 1,633 yards and 13 touchdowns. He was selected to the school's Hall of Fame in 1981 and to the Yellow Jackets' all-time team in 1992.

Drafted by Atlanta in 1975, Robinson also played for the Giants from 1976-79. His stint with New York was perhaps his most productive as a player (Robinson led the club in receptions in 1977 and '78), and he scored the first touchdown in Giants Stadium on a 30-yard pass from Craig Morton against the Dallas Cowboys on Oct. 10, 1976. He also played for San Francisco (1980) and Denver (1981) before moving into coaching. Born Jan. 3, 1953 in New York City, Robinson and his wife, Karen, have four children: Jamie, Jessica, Jim and Katie.

Johnny **ROLAND** RUNNING BACKS

The Saints added a sharp mind to the coaching staff in January in hiring Johnny Roland as running backs coach. With 27 years of NFL coaching experience, Roland has tutored some of the league's greatest running backs and has served on the staffs of seven clubs. He has also been on the staffs of two teams who have advanced to the Super Bowl.

Roland arrived in New Orleans after working in a similar position for the Green Bay Packers in 2004. Both of his top pupils at Green Bay – RB Ahman Green and FB William Henderson – were voted to the Pro Bowl, with Green rushing for 1,163 yards.

From 1997-2003, Roland was running backs coach for the Arizona Cardinals, where he worked with all-time rushing leader RB Emmitt Smith. Roland's career has been highlighted by tutoring several other top rushers, including RBs Walter Payton and Neal Anderson with the Chicago Bears – from 1983-92, where Roland picked up a Super Bowl XX ring with the Bears' victory at the Superdome – RB Jerome Bettis (with the St. Louis Rams in 1995-96) and RB Wilbert Montgomery (with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1977-78).

In the 1980s with the Bears, Chicago running backs led the league in rushing four times. From 1984-88, the club averaged 160.9 yards per contest on the ground and made the playoffs five-straight years.

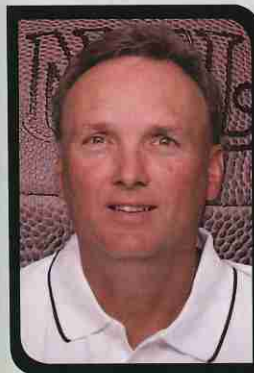
Roland is entering his 35th year in the NFL, including eight seasons as a player. He played seven years with the St. Louis Cardinals (departing as the club's all-time leading rusher) and one season for the New York Giants. He was named the NFL's "Rookie of the Year" in 1966 and in 103 career games rushed for 3,750 yards and 28 touchdowns and hauled in 153 passes for six touchdowns. Roland earned trips to the Pro Bowl following the 1967-68 seasons.

He was an All-American while at the University of Missouri, starting at both halfback and cornerback and earning a degree in business administration. Born May 21, 1943 in Corpus Christi, Texas, Roland has two sons: Johnny Jr. and James, and a daughter, Cynamon.

Turk **SCHONERT** QUARTERBACKS

After the promotion of Mike Sheppard to offensive coordinator, Coach Jim Haslett hired Turk Schonert as quarterbacks coach. He is a 19-year veteran of both coaching and playing the position in the NFL.

Schonert last served on the New York Giants staff in 2003. He held the same position for the Carolina Panthers in 2001, and directed the passers for the Buffalo Bills from 1998-2000. Schonert opened his career as quarterbacks coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 1992-95.

Schonert entered the NFL as a ninth-round draft choice of the Chicago Bears in 1981 after a record-breaking career at Stanford, and he was known for his resourceful approach to the game. He never played for Chicago, but was signed by the Cincinnati Bengals that season, where he stayed for six years.

He was traded to Atlanta in 1986, and returned to Cincinnati from 1987-89. In 10 seasons he played in 72 games with 12 starts, completing 311 of 504 passes for 3,788 yards and 11 touchdowns. Schonert was 7-5 as a starter, and played in Super Bowls XVI and XXIII while with the Bengals.

As a senior at Stanford, Schonert led the nation in passing efficiency (164.5) and the Pac 10 in touchdown passes (19). He also set a school record for completion percentage at 67.1.

A native of Torrance, Calif., Schonert was born Jan. 15, 1957 and played in the Little League World Series in Williamsport, Penn. in 1968. He and his wife, Beth, have two sons, Jake and Hayden, and a daughter, Camery.

NFL CAREER - After five seasons in New Orleans (2000-04), Brooks ranks second in club history in every major passing category - including yards (16,274), attempts (2,340), completions (1,323) and touchdowns (107) - and first with an 81.5 passer rating. He has emerged as one of the NFL's top quarterbacks since 2001, with 98 touchdown tosses over that span and over 3,500 yards each season. Brooks has thrown for over 250 yards in a team-record 28 regular-season games, and in 30 contests including the playoffs. In 2004, he completed 309 of 542 attempts for 3,810 yards, with 21 touchdowns and 16 interceptions. It was the fourth-straight season where he had over 20 touchdown passes and over 3,500 passing yards, with both streaks signifying the best in Saints record books. Since arriving in New Orleans, he has emerged as one of the NFL's top comeback artists by engineering 16 game-winning drives in the fourth quarter or overtime, including five in 2004. Brooks took over as the team leader in 2000 in relief of injured starter Jeff Blake in Week 11 (vs. Oakland, 11/19/00), started the following week and has not missed the opening snap since. Brooks has played in 72 regular-season games with the Saints, including starting the last 69 contests. His 441 passing yards vs. Denver (12/3/00) is the highest single-game total in franchise history, and Brooks is also the only Saints quarterback to rush for over 100 yards in a contest (108 vs. San Francisco, 12/10/00). New Orleans is 16-7 in the 23 career games where Brooks has posted a passer rating of 100 or more.

After his fourth year as a starter last year, Brooks has recorded four of the top seven marks for total offense in a season by a Saints' player: A club-record 4,190 in 2001, 3,983 (third) in 2004, 3,828 in 2002 (sixth) and 3,721 in 2003 (seventh).

His career ratio between touchdown passes (107) and interceptions (67) is plus-40. With 24 scoring passes and only eight interceptions in 2003, his plus-16 difference set a record for Saints QBs, breaking the single-season record he first established in 2002 (plus-12, 27 TDs, 15 interceptions).

With 98 touchdown passes since 2001 - including 21 last season - Brooks has thrown for more TDs over a four-year span than any Saints quarterback. Including nine in eight games in his first season with New Orleans, Brooks had 86 from 2000-03 to also rank second. QB Archie Manning is a distant third over a four-year stretch (63 from 1977-80).

Brooks is also a threat when running with the ball. His 358 rushing yards in 2001 is the highest single-season total by a Saints quarterback, and his four rushing touchdowns last season led all NFL quarterbacks.

Has opened 69-straight regular-season games since taking over as the starter in Game 12 of 2000. Brooks shattered the franchise's single-game records for attempts and completions vs. Denver on Nov. 21 by hitting on 34 of 60 passes. He closed the year with 2,340 career attempts and 1,323 completions, trailing only QB Archie Manning (3,335, 1,849) in each category.

Brooks ranks first in club history with 28 regular-season games of 250 or more yards passing, a milestone he has also crossed twice in the postseason. The quarterback had seven contests with 250 or more passing yards in 2004 to move past the former record of 23 set by Manning.

Brooks has started 69 consecutive games – the third longest streak in the league behind Green Bay's QB Brett Favre and QB Peyton Manning of Indianapolis – and joined Denver QB Jake Plummer as the lone two quarterbacks to attempt every pass in 2004 for his team. Brooks also led all NFL quarterbacks with a career-best four rushing TDs, giving him 11 for his career. The only Saints quarterback with more career rushing TDs is Archie Manning (18).

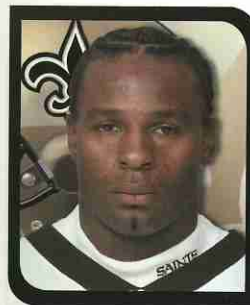

QB Aaron Brooks has ranked among the NFL's top comeback artists since taking over as the starter in 2000, leading 16 drives in the fourth quarter and OT to lead the Saints to victory from either a deficit or tie. A look back:

- **Dec. 19, 2004: Saints 21, Buccaneers 17** – Brooks found WR **Joe Horn** on a four-yard scoring toss to cut the deficit to three, then led a 41-yard march, including a 13-yard run on 4th-and-12. A seven-yard TD strike with 32 seconds left to clinch the win.
- **Dec. 12, 2004: Saints 27, Cowboys 13** – With the score knotted at 13-13, Brooks led an 11-play, 73-yard drive, which ended with a four-yard TD by RB **Deuce McAllister**. Up by a touchdown, Brooks would later add a 31-yard TD strike to Horn.
- **Nov. 14, 2004: Saints 27, Chiefs 20** – Brooks led a five-play, 72-yard drive, completing all three passes on the march, including a 42-yarder to Horn for a TD.
- **Sept. 26, 2004: Saints 28, Rams 25** – Brooks led New Orleans 38 yards in four plays in the final 24 seconds to set up a field goal to force overtime. In OT, Brooks completed three passes and had a 12-yard scramble to set up K **John Carney's** game-winner.
- **Sept. 19, 2004: Saints 30, 49ers 27** – Brooks posted a 127.0 rating, and his last of three TD passes was a 16-yard strike to WR **Donté Stallworth** with 1:01 remaining.
- **Nov. 30, 2003: Saints 24, Redskins 20** – Washington went ahead by three early in the fourth quarter and the Saints took over at the Redskins 40. Brooks scrambled for a first down and tossed a 15-yard TD strike on the victory drive.
- **Nov. 16, 2003: Saints 23, Falcons 20** – Brooks completed four of five late in the fourth quarter to set up the field goal to force overtime. He then directed a 37-yard drive in three plays to set up Carney's 36-yard, game-winning field goal.
- **Nov. 2, 2003: Saints 17, Buccaneers 14** – With the score tied, the Saints took over at their 28 with no timeouts and 2:08 left. Brooks completed five-straight to set up a 47-yard field goal by Carney with 13 seconds left.
- **Nov. 10, 2002: Saints 34, Panthers 24** – Trailing by four with 3:31 left, Brooks led a 95-yard drive for a TD. On the next possession, a 38-yard pass to Stallworth set up a short TD pass to the wideout with 31 seconds remaining.
- **Oct. 20, 2002: Saints 35, 49ers 27** – Down by 11, Brooks tossed two fourth-quarter TDs to Horn within a span of 1:25 to erase the deficit.
- **Sept. 22, 2002: Saints 29, Bears 23** – Though the Saints once trailed by three TDs, New Orleans was still behind, 23-21, with 4:31 left. Brooks led 73-yard TD march in 2:31, capped by a 29-yard scoring pass to Stallworth.
- **Dec. 2, 2001: Saints 27 Panthers 23** – Behind 23-20, Brooks engineered a four-play, 74-yard drive, capped by a 17-yard TD pass to Horn for the win.
- **Oct. 28, 2001: Saints 34, Rams 31** – Tied 31-31 with four minutes left, Brooks led a drive that ate up 3:59 to set up a 27-yard field goal.
- **Oct. 14, 2001: Saints 27, Panthers 25** – Brooks drove the Saints 82 yards in 1:48, with RB **Ricky Williams** running for a one-yard TD as time expired.
- **Dec. 10, 2000: Saints 31, 49ers 27** – Brooks engineered a 68-yard drive in 3:14, capped by a one-yard TD by RB **Terry Allen** with 46 seconds remaining.

NFL CAREER - In five seasons with the Saints, the four-time Pro Bowl pick has emerged as one of the NFL's most consistent wide receivers and has shattered several team records in the process. No player in club history approaches Horn's five-year totals of 428 catches for 6,289 yards and 45 touchdowns. The 10th year veteran had one of his finest seasons in 2004, tying for the NFC lead with 94 catches (the ranking is the highest for a Saints player,

and the total tied the club record he first established in 2000) and finishing second in the conference with a career-high 1,399 yards (another Saints all-time best). Horn also hauled in a team-record 11 TDs to rank fifth in the NFC - the second-straight year he has had double-digit touchdown totals, a feat unequalled by a Saints' player. He has 24 games with at least 100 yards receiving for New Orleans, a club mark for reaching the milestone, and enters 2005 second in career totals in nearly every other major receiving category.

NFL CAREER - McAllister has been one of the NFL's most productive running backs over the last three seasons, rushing for over 1,000 yards each year (a first in club history) as the centerpiece of the Saints offensive attack. He ranks second in team record books with 4,194 rushing yards and 31 touchdowns and is first with 22 100-yard games, including a franchise record nine-straight contests in 2003. New Orleans is 14-8 when he reaches the milestone, and McAllister has added 165 receptions for 1,262 yards and four touchdowns. 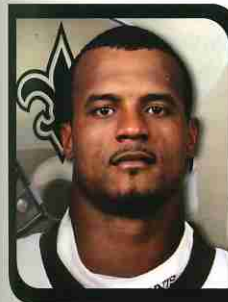
ORIGIN OF THE FLEUR DE LIS

The Fleur de Lis, the emblem most closely associated with the New Orleans Saints and worn on the team's helmets, is a symbol from the Court of Louis XIV. A French word that stands for "Flower of the Lily," the Fleur de Lis is also a symbol for the City of New Orleans.

The Fleur de Lis was adopted during the French occupation of Louisiana from 1682-1762.

Traditionally, it has been used to represent French royalty, and in that sense, it is said to signify perfection, life and light.

Due to its three petals, the Fleur de Lis has also been used to represent the Holy Trinity.

COLLEGE CAREER - Ranked as unquestionably the top offensive lineman in the 2005 NFL Draft, the Saints moved up to take this two-time All-American and 2004 Outland Trophy winner, given to the nation's best blocker. New Orleans swapped their 2005 first-round pick (16th overall) and a third-round choice in 2006 for Brown in a draft-day trade with the Houston Texans. He did not allow a sack in 2004, and only one in 2003. He led Oklahoma in blocking consistency for two years, and earned the highest grade among the school's blockers in 20 of his final 26 contests. As a senior, he helped the Sooners average over 462 yards of offense and led the team with 130 knockdown blocks. Brown was a consensus All-Big 12 pick for his last three years.

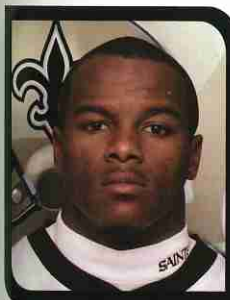

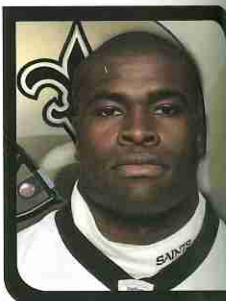

COLLEGE CAREER - A rangy, strong wide receiver who battled a myriad of injuries (ankle, groin, hamstring, hip and appendicitis) during his career, but was extremely productive when healthy. Lyman petitioned the NCAA for a sixth year of eligibility but was denied and entered the NFL Draft. He injured his left knee in August camp prior to the 2000 season, but played in 11 games that year and caught a career-high 19 passes for 313 yards (16.5 avg.) and two touchdowns. Lyman sat out the 2001 opener vs. Illinois after having an appendectomy during fall camp. He played in nine games, totaling nine receptions for 106 yards (11.8 avg.) and a TD. Chase then missed 2002 after suffering a preseason dislocated finger and two days later suffered a torn hamstring. He sat out 2003 spring drills while recovering from that hamstring surgery, but played in 10 games, finishing with 12 catches for 256 yards (21.3 avg.) and a touchdown. In 2004, he was having a banner early season and provided a great spark with his ability to stretch the field. But against USC, he suffered a torn ligament in his left knee, undergoing surgery and closing his career after only four games. 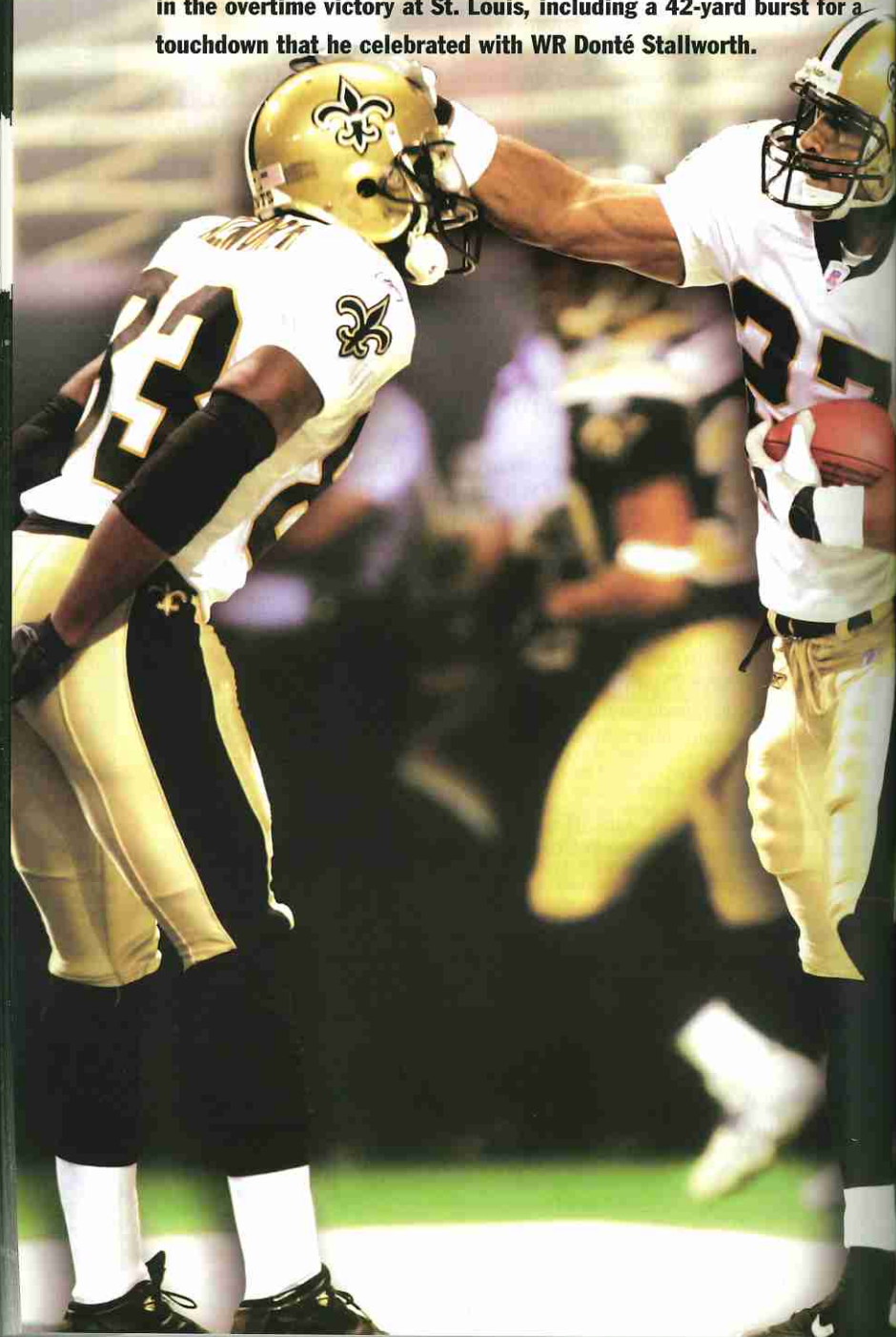

The Saints fell to a winless team for the second-straight week in a game where a 10-point scoring burst in an 18-second stretch of the second quarter by the Buccaneers left New Orleans unable to reclaim the lead.

Tampa Bay won despite losing starting QB **Chris Simms** to a sprained knee in the first quarter. He was replaced by QB **Brian Griese**, who completed 16 of 19 passes for 194 yards, with a 45-yard TD to TE **Ken Dilger** in the third quarter.

The Saints got a memorable performance from RB **Deuce McAllister**. Playing with a heavily-wrapped ankle from the injury he had sustained three weeks earlier, McAllister pounded out 102 yards on 21 carries against Tampa Bay's rugged defense.

New Orleans took a 7-3 lead in the second quarter when QB **Aaron Brooks** found TE **Boo Williams** for a 17-yard touchdown pass to cap a three-play, 40-yard drive.

But moments after a 53-yard field goal by Tampa Bay K **Martin Gramatica**, CB **Ronde Barber** scooped up a fumble by McAllister and returned it 18 yards for a touchdown. The sudden 10-point swing gave the

Bucs a 13-7 lead at halftime.

Tampa Bay would add Dilger's touchdown grab in the third quarter. The Saints would rally with 10-straight points to get within a field goal, but the Buccaneers ran out the final 3:42 of the contest.

Riding the right arm of a strong performance by QB **Aaron Brooks** as well as a key fourth-quarter fumble return for a touchdown, the Saints snapped a three-game losing streak with a road victory at Oakland.

While RB **Deuce McAllister** rushed for a pair of touchdowns, the running game struggled during the contest. But Brooks completed 23 of 39 passes for 282 yards and a TD. His top target was WR **Joe Horn**, who had nine grabs for 123 yards. It marked the 21st 100-yard game for Horn since arriving in 2000.

The Saints rebounded from an early 10-0 deficit to earn their fourth victory of 2004 after sterling performances from their top three players on offense: QB **Aaron Brooks**, RB **Deuce McAllister** and WR **Joe Horn**.

Brooks rushed for one TD and completed 15 of 27 for 259 yards and a touchdown, including a 57-yard strike to Horn, who had five catches for a season-high 167 yards and a TD. McAllister averaged 7.9 yards per rush, finishing the game with 127 yards and a TD on 16 attempts.

The Saints put together another gritty defensive performance and recorded a kickoff return for a touchdown for the second-straight week in a victory over the NFC South-leading Atlanta Falcons at the Superdome.

A resurgent defense held its third-straight opponent to less than 20 points, limiting Atlanta to 267 yards and an average of 3.9 yards per play. The unit also posted two interceptions, a fumble recovery and three sacks.

DE **Tony Bryant** sacked Falcons QB **Matt Schaub** for a safety in the first quarter. On the following possession, K **John Carney** capped a 51-yard drive with a 22-yard field goal to give the Saints a 5-0 lead.

Atlanta would answer with a field goal, and an interception followed by another field goal pushed the Falcons ahead by a point.

But the Saints would score the game's first touchdown on the next drive, marching 80 yards in 11 plays –

including four catches for 58 yards by WR **Joe Horn**. QB **Aaron Brooks** capped the drive with a one-yard TD.

New Orleans would strike again early in the third quarter, taking the opening kickoff of the second half 70

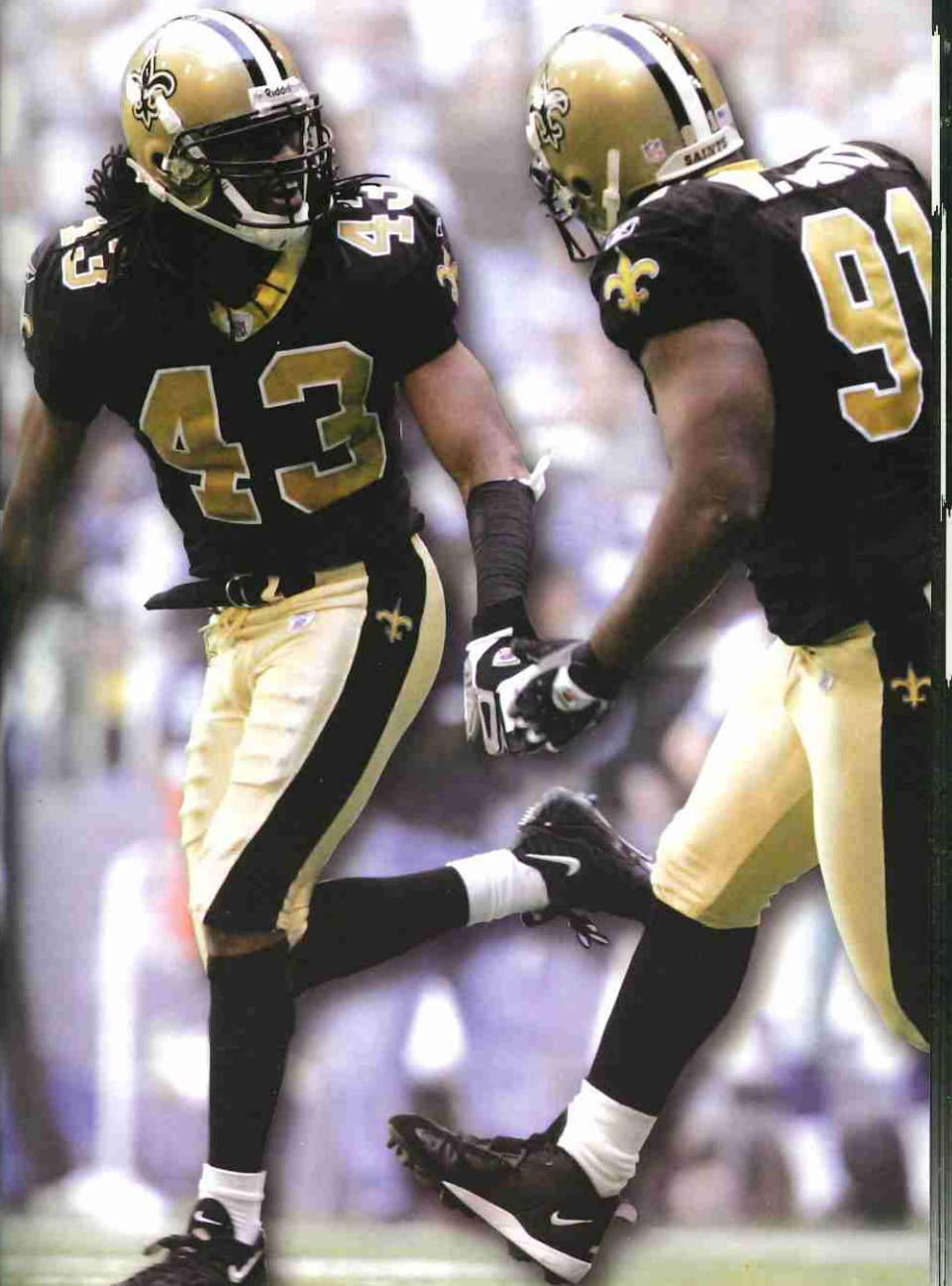

DE Will Smith, the Saints' No. 1 pick lived up to his draft status by bringing energy and a hard-nosed approach to the pass rush. He had a key forced fumble in the fourth quarter at Tampa Bay that set up the Saints' game-winning march, and also helped spring WR Michael Lewis for a 53-yard punt return earlier in the quarter with his downfield blocking. Smith ranked third on the club with 7.5 sacks, a total that led all rookies in the NFC. Smith really came on over the last half of the season, recording 36 tackles, 5.5 sacks, four forced fumbles and a fumble recovery in the final eight games. He caused a fumble in each of the last four contests, becoming the first player in club history to achieve that feat.

A highly-respected executive within the club and an advisor on all major decisions, Senior Football Administrator Russ Ball enters his fourth season with the Saints and 17th in the NFL. His position comes with a wide spectrum of responsibilities, including salary-cap management and contract negotiations. He also coordinates different areas of the day-to-day football operations with Executive Vice-

President/General Manager Mickey Loomis and Coach Jim Haslett.

Ball arrived in New Orleans after spending 2001 as the Director of Football Administration for the Washington Redskins. In that position, Ball assisted then-Head Coach Marty Schottenheimer with the daily responsibilities and administrative functions of running a NFL organization. His wide-ranging duties included managing the salary cap as well as overseeing team operations, video and athletic training departments and their respective budgets.

From 1999-2000, Ball served as Senior Football Administrator for the Minnesota Vikings, where he was responsible for assisting with player contracts and salary cap management. Before arriving in Minneapolis, Ball spent 10 seasons in Kansas City, serving as the Chiefs' assistant strength and conditioning coach for his first eight seasons and spending the final two years working under Schottenheimer in football operations.

Prior to joining the Chiefs, Ball served as head strength and conditioning coach at the University of Missouri from 1982-88. He was a four-year letterman as a center at Central Missouri State University.

Ball earned a masters degree in human performance from the University of Missouri in 1990, after receiving an undergraduate degree from Central Missouri State in 1981. He and his wife, Diana, have two children, Joe and Andrea.

Entering his sixth season in New Orleans, Director of Player Personnel Rick Mueller has helped shape the club's last five drafts and free-agent classes, which now form the foundation of the team.

From grading NFL free agents to studying college prospects, Mueller serves as the Saints' point man in the never-ending effort to stock the clubs' roster.

As the organization's top personnel executive, Mueller is responsible for all aspects of scouting and evaluation. His duties include supervising and coordinating the organization's legion of college and pro scouts, and his efforts peak each year by running the Saints' draft room.

Mueller came to the team following a six-year stint with the Jacksonville Jaguars, where he was instrumental in their rise from expansion franchise in 1995 to AFC powerhouse. Mueller served as the Jaguars' Director of College Scouting in 1998-99 and was in charge of his initial draft in 1999. Prior to being promoted, Mueller was a college scout for Jacksonville.

In 1993, Mueller served as Director of Player Personnel and wide receivers coach for the CFL Sacramento Gold Miners. In 1992, he worked as defensive assistant and special teams coach for the World League's Sacramento Surge. In that assignment, Mueller worked alongside then-defensive coordinator Jim Haslett. The Surge finished 8-2 and captured the World Bowl Championship.

Following that season, Mueller was one of five pro scouts for the World League. Working for the Surge was his first pro assignment after serving as a graduate assistant at Washington State from 1990-92, where he served as quarterbacks coach and recruiting coordinator. While at the school, he tutored QB Drew Bledsoe, who was the first overall pick in the 1993 draft by New England and has been a three-time Pro Bowl pick.

A graduate of the University of Puget Sound, Mueller was a three-year starter at quarterback. He received a bachelor's degree in communications in 1990 and also attended graduate school, studying communications while coaching at Washington State from 1990-92. Mueller and his wife, Andrea, have twin sons, Chase and Rhett, and a daughter, Emry.

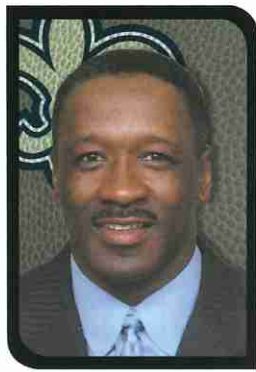


James NAGAOKA DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS

Included in those efforts are life skills training seminars, continuing education opportunities in the quest for college graduation, career internships, financial education classes and family assistance. His duties aren't limited to off-field responsibilities, however, as Porter has also taken a key role in developing the talents of the team's kick and punt return specialists, including 2002 Pro Bowl pick Michael Lewis.

Porter has a well-rounded football resume: He served for three years on the Denver Broncos' coaching staff, starting in 1997 as an offensive assistant and spent 1996 in the same capacity with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Prior to that, Porter worked as a scout for National Football Scouting in 1995, assessing talent in the Ohio Valley region.

Porter also has previous NFL coaching experience with Buffalo (1991), New

A member of the Slippery Rock Sports Hall of Fame, Porter was the first player drafted from the Division II program when he was chosen by Detroit in 1982. As a senior, he led the nation in rushing while also participating on the school's baseball and track teams. In 1990, he was a member of the Baltimore Orioles' AAA Rochester Red Wings.

Porter holds a bachelor's degree in communications from Slippery Rock and a master's degree in athletic administration from Kent State.

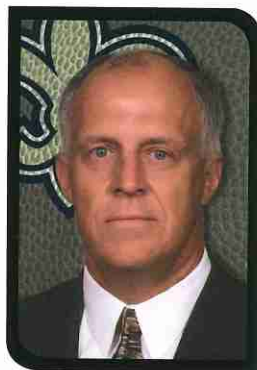

DIRECTOR OF COLLEGE SCOUTING

Rick Reiprish, a knowledgeable addition to the Saints' personnel department who joined the club in 2004, brings 26 years of NFL experience to his post as college scouting director. His responsibilities include coordinating the club's staff of scouts and evaluating hundreds of college prospects in preparation for the yearly draft.

Reiprish joined the Saints following an eight-year stint (1994-2002) with Jacksonville, where he was one of the architects of the Jaguars' rapid ascension to the top of the AFC. He was responsible for the team's drafts since its inaugural effort in 1995, selecting such stalwarts as T Tony Boselli, DE Tony Brackens, RB Fred Taylor, S Donovan Darius and CB Fernando Bryant. Of the team's seven first-round picks from 1995 to 1999, each became a starter, more than any other NFL team in that span.

Originally hired as the Jaguars' director of college scouting on May 15, 1994, Reiprish was promoted to director of player personnel in 1998. He was responsible for the pro and college scouting departments, including directing the scouting of college players and the draft as well as the evaluation of veteran free agents.

Reiprish joined the Jaguars after working for the Seattle Seahawks for 10 years (1984-94), first as an area scout before being promoted to Eastern Scout Supervisor in 1989. He began his scouting career as a Southeast scout with BLESTO from 1979-82. From 1982-84, he was a personnel scout for the Kansas City Chiefs.

Reiprish coached wide receivers and running backs at Austin Peay State University (1973-76) before going to East Tennessee in 1977, where he coached quarterbacks and running backs. In 1978, he was offensive line coach at North Alabama.

Born Sept. 14, 1950 in Shamokin, Pa., Reiprish graduated from Villanova in 1972 and earned a master's degree in education-administration and supervision from Austin Peay in 1974. He and his wife, Janet, have a son, Andrew.

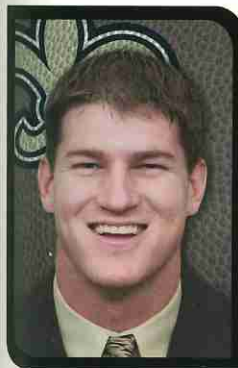
Rick THOMPSON

He was recently married to his wife, Evette. Patton has two children: Cameron (15) and Alexis (9).



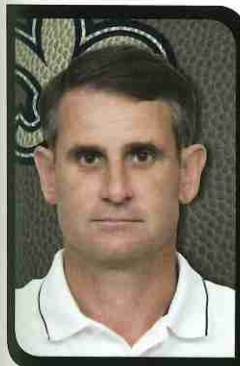
Duane BROOKS

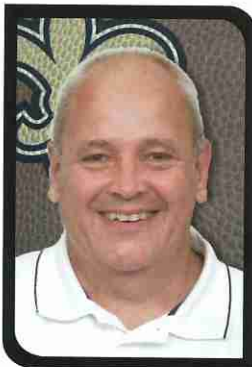

Arnold D. Fielkow enters his sixth season with the New Orleans Saints, having been promoted to Executive Vice President in 2004. In this capacity, he serves as the top senior management official of the administrative/business departments, including marketing and sales, governmental affairs, community relations, business media relations and youth programs.

Fielkow has been instrumental in improving the team's influence both nationally and locally throughout the Gulf South. Upon joining the Saints, Fielkow immediately restructured the Saints business and marketing efforts, with an emphasis on enhancing the club's ticket, suite, sponsorship and special event sales.

Under his leadership, club records were established in 2003 with season ticket sales as well as total attendance. The club has also been successful in reaching a virtual sellout of the 137 Superdome box suites and has seen a three fold increase in corporate sponsorship sales through its new Patron Saints Partners program Fielkow established. He also created and implemented one of the most comprehensive regional sales operations in all of professional sports, creating a presence over a four-state area. Since beginning this effort in 2000, regional sales have jumped from 8% to 30% of the club's business ventures.

In addition to his administrative duties, Fielkow also led the club's efforts in negotiations with the State of Louisiana. A 10-year agreement reached with the State in 2002 helped ensure the club's continued presence in New Orleans and provided for the construction of a state-of-the-art practice facility at the Saints' headquarters. This agreement, which provides for significant financial inducements over the next decade, was overwhelmingly approved by the Louisiana legislature and signed into law by former Louisiana Governor Mike Foster on April 18, 2002.

Fielkow has initiated a number of innovative business/marketing projects, including the NFL's first Fan and Community Advisory Boards, Saints-led international trade missions to Central America, marketing partnerships with the Harlem Globetrotters and the PGA's HP Classic of New Orleans, Football 101 mini-camps for the team's female fan base and the Hispanic community, a Business Breakfast series with the top 200 business leaders in New Orleans and the Gulf South, Draft Day and Monday Night Football cruises, and a Saints ticket sales Radio-a-thon.

Fielkow has also overseen tremendous growth in the Saints youth programming, highlighted by its involvement in the NFL's Junior Player Development program and the administration of summer youth clinics throughout greater New Orleans. Teaming with the NFL and the Orleans Parish School Board, the Saints have been instrumental in returning tackle football to the city's public middle schools.

For his efforts, Fielkow was selected to receive the prestigious 2004 TOP Award ("Ten Outstanding Person") and the 2003 Sanchez to Sanchez to Smith Award issued by Family Service of Greater New Orleans and the Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, respectively.

Prior to joining the Saints, Fielkow was involved in Major League Baseball's player development system by serving as President and General Counsel of the historic Southern League of Professional Baseball Clubs and as President of Minor League Baseball's AA Association. During his six-year tenure, Fielkow oversaw the construction and renovation of six new ballparks and introduced marketing and business programs that catapulted the Southern League into one of the most respected leagues within Minor League Baseball.

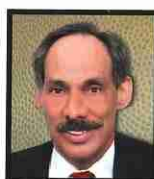

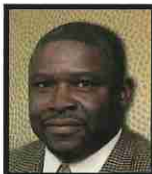

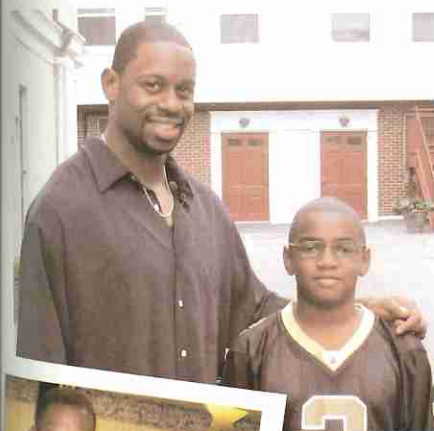

Saints Making A Difference



Game day at the Louisiana Superdome comes on Sunday, when the New Orleans Saints charge onto the field in front of 68,000 fans and fight to tackle the opposition, move the chains and score touchdowns. But everyday is game day in the club's community relations efforts, and the Saints put in the same energy and drive they do on the field when working to positively impact the people living in New Orleans and across the Gulf South region.

The Saints remain dedicated to making big plays in the community every day. Starting with Owner Tom Benson and moving on down through the coaches, players and staff, the organization feels a responsibility to give back. With that in mind, the Saints make a concerted effort to be visible and accessible members of the community, with a hands-on approach toward charitable outreach. But these

efforts are sparked by more than the desire to be seen – the Saints are firmly focused on making a positive, lasting impact.

The club understands that our children represent the community's hope for the future, and thus the Saints have targeted youth programs and education as the primary impact areas in giving back to New Orleans and the Gulf South region. Saints players visit New Orleans area schools each week during the regular season to stress the importance of education to students as part of the club's Domino's Pizza/WWL Radio Literacy Program. The club also partners with youth-oriented charities such as the New Orleans Recreation Department, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Boys & Girls Clubs, the New Orleans Police Department's "COPS for Kids" program, the Fellowship Foundation and the NFL YET Center.

During the NFL's 17-week regular season in 2004, more than 200 charitable appearances were made by Saints players, coaches and staff. Included in that number were weekly player visits to Children's Hospital of New Orleans, Starbright World – a

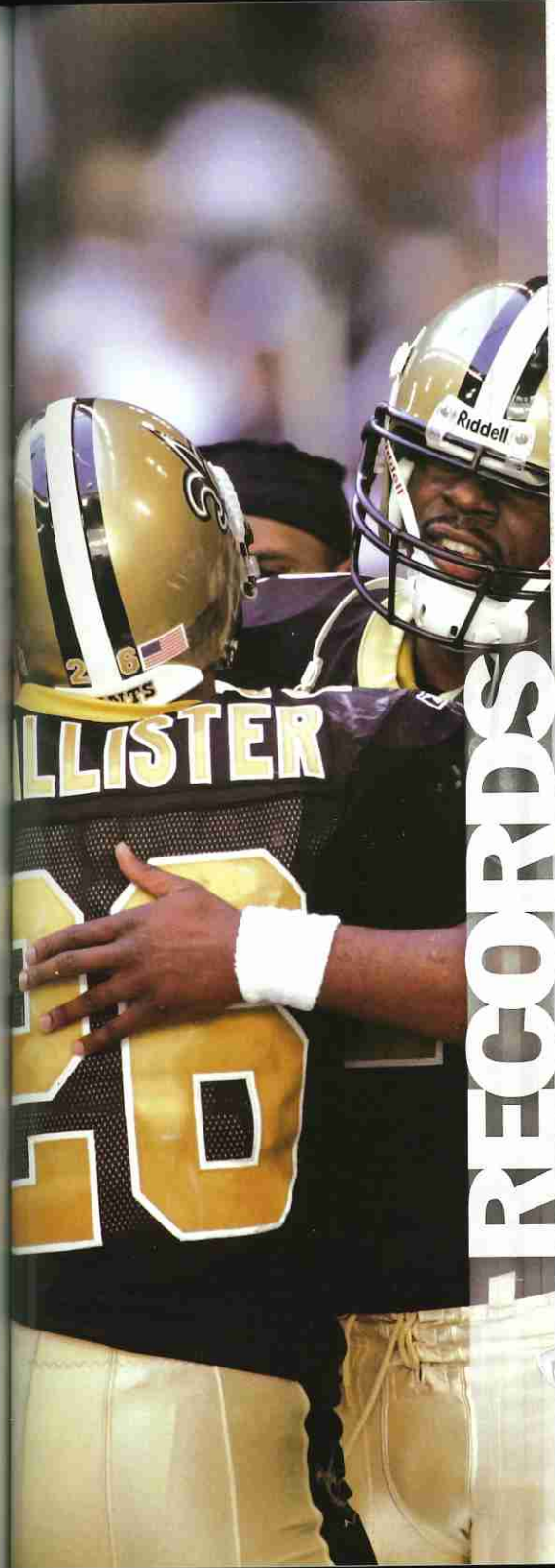
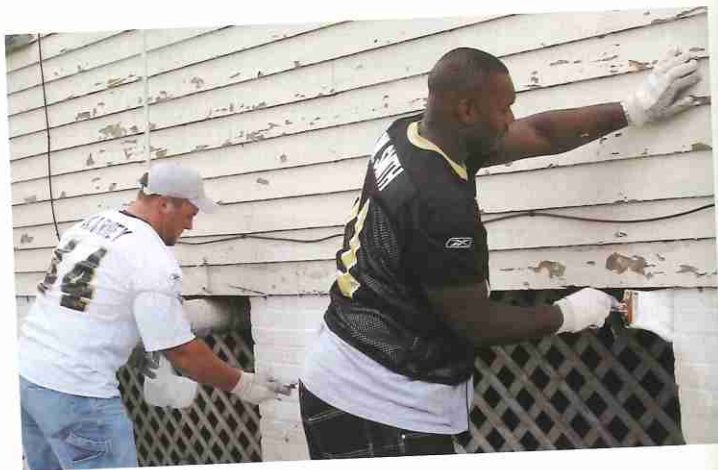
widely-recognized computer video conference program – unites other NFL teams in charity as patients and players from New Orleans chat in cyberspace with their counterparts from children’s hospitals in other NFL cities. The Saints pioneered this program and it has since been implemented in many cities across the league.

The Saints also reach out to thousands of youngsters each year through programs like the Gatorade Junior Training Camp, Saints Experience and the Outback Steakhouse Tackle Football Program. The club is highly involved with the NFL’s Junior Player Development Program in New Orleans Public Schools, and supports all of the league’s youth initiatives. Over the summer in 2004, the Saints teamed up with the United Way for Greater New Orleans to provide 15 two-day youth football and life skills clinics, free of charge.

And while supporting youth and education is the club’s chief focus in the community, the Saints haven’t limited their resources. In 2004 the team hosted the Taste of the Saints Celebrity Dinner and Fashion Show – raising more than \$30,000 for United Way and Second Harvesters Food Bank. The club also worked closely with the Council on Alcohol and Drug Abuse for Greater New Orleans, the American Red Cross in Southeast Louisiana, the Fore!Kids Foundation, and Bridge House. Millions of dollars were placed back into the community by the Saints through the donation of cash, goods and services.

Saints players also provide hundreds of unfortunate families a holiday dinner with all the trimmings as part of the team’s annual Thanksgiving benefit at Dryades YMCA. In addition, several Saints players took unfortunate families on holiday shopping sprees at their own expense.

Whether through financial support, in-kind donations, charitable appearances or just lending an oversized helping hand, the New Orleans Saints are there for the Greater New Orleans and Gulf South community.

SPECIALIZING IN SPECIAL TEAMS

Five Saints special-teamers were voted NFC Special Teams Player of the Week in 2004, the highest total in club history. New Orleans closed the season with four-straight winners over the final month, a first for the club and tied for the most consecutive winners in the NFL since the inception of the award in 1993 (tied with the Kansas City Chiefs, as WR Dante Hall won the award in Weeks Two through Five in 2003).

Sept. 26: Saints 28, St. Louis Rams 25 – K John Carney earned the award after tying a club record with five field goals, including the 31-yard game-winner in overtime. Carney also had 52- and 53-yard kicks in the first half.

Dec. 12: Saints 27, Dallas Cowboys 13 – P Mitch Berger took home the honor for the first time in New Orleans after punting five times for a 46.0-yard average. He kept the Cowboys backed up in their own territory by dropping five punts inside the 20.

Dec. 19: Saints 21, Tampa Bay Buccaneers 17 – RB Aaron Stecker was voted the winner after a 98-yard kickoff return for a touchdown, the Saints' first since 2002 and first on an opening kickoff since the club's debut season in 1967.

Dec. 26: Saints 26, Atlanta Falcons 13 – WR Michael Lewis earned the award following a sparkling performance against the Falcons that included a 96-yard kickoff return for a touchdown. Lewis had three kickoff returns for 122 yards, returned five punts for 40 yards – including a 25-yard burst – and also raced downfield to down a punt at the Atlanta 1 in the first quarter, leading to a safety three plays later.

Jan. 2: Saints 21, Carolina Panthers 18 – DE Tony Bryant became the fourth-straight Saints special teamer to win the honor after blocking what could have been the game-tying field goal on the final play of the victory. Bryant steamed through a pair of Panthers to reject a 60-yard field goal as time expired.

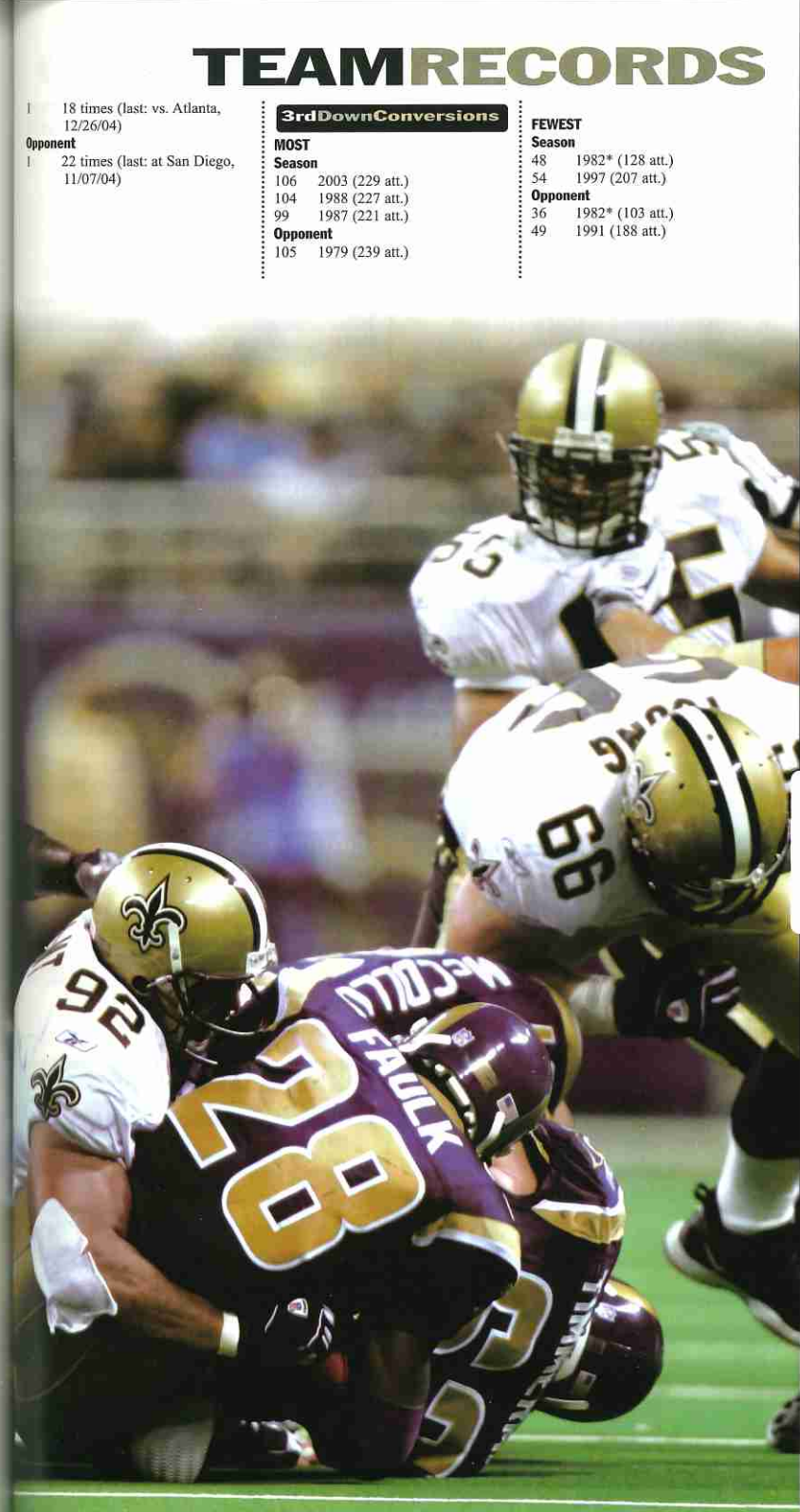

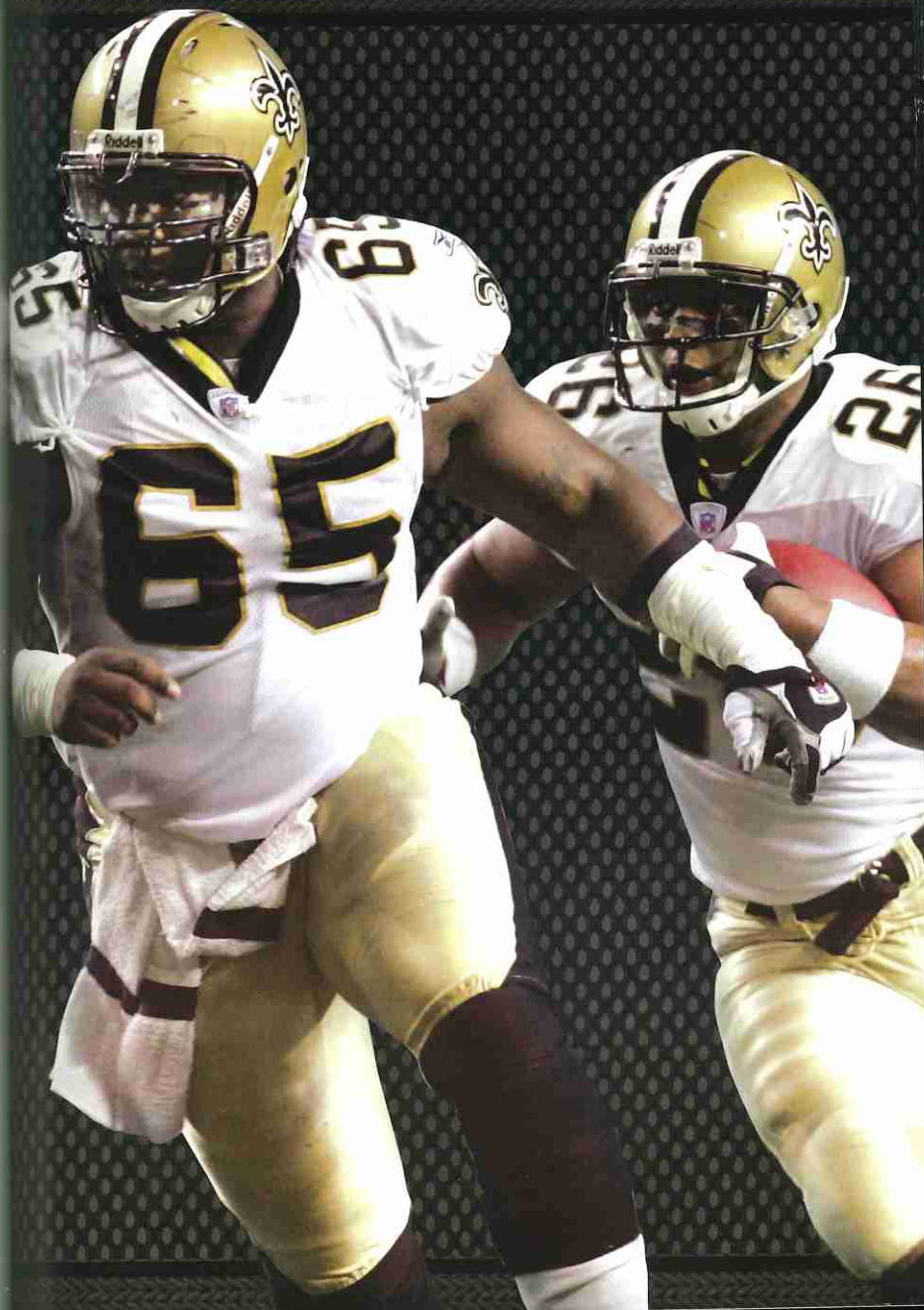

The choice was acquired from Arizona after New Orleans traded the Cardinals its two first-round picks (17th and 18th overall). As part of the deal, the two clubs also swapped second-round picks and the Saints received Arizona's fourth-round selection; **May 13** - Owner **Tom Benson** announces he will bring an Arena Football expansion franchise to the city, the New Orleans VooDoo; **Sept. 28** - RB **Deuce McAllister** rushes for 101 yards on 17 carries vs. the Indianapolis Colts, beginning a franchise-record streak of nine-straight 100-yard performances; **Oct. 19** - Saints post the third-highest scoring total in franchise history with a 45-17 romp over Atlanta at the Georgia Dome; **Nov. 2** - Saints win third-straight over defending Super Bowl-Champion Buccaneers at Tampa Bay, 17-14. John Carney added three field goals and a trio of PATs, giving him 1,446 career points to move into 10th on the NFL's all-time scoring list; **Sept. 26** - In the only overtime game of the season, a 28-25 win at St. Louis, **Brooks** led the Saints 38 yards on four plays in the final minute to set up a game-tying field goal by **Carney** to send the contest into OT. **Carney**, who was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his efforts, connected on a 31-yard attempt on the Saints' opening possession of overtime to seal the road victory. It was the 13th come-from-behind victory of the quarterback's career. **Oct. 4** - Acquired CB **Mike McKenzie** in a trade with the Green Bay Packers. The Saints sent a second-round pick in 2005 and QB **J.T. O'Sullivan** to the Packers and received **McKenzie** and a future conditional draft choice. **Nov. 14** - RB **Deuce McAllister** rushes for 127 yards on 16 attempts in 27-20 victory vs. Kansas City. WR **Donté Stallworth** finished 2004 with a career high in receptions and receiving yards. He finished the year with 58 receptions for 767 yards and five touchdowns, the most since his rookie year in 2002, when he had eight TDs. For his career, **Stallworth** has 125 grabs for 1,846 yards and 16 touchdowns. Of those scoring catches, 11 have been from 25 yards or more. Four of **Stallworth's** TD catches have been game winners, including two last season: vs. San Francisco, Sept. 19 and at Tampa Bay, Dec. 19.

RUSHING TO THE TOP

With 1,074 yards on 269 carries last year, RB Deuce McAllister became the first player in club history to rush for over 1,000 yards in three-straight seasons. McAllister had a career-high 1,641 yards in 2003 and 1,388 in his breakout season the year before.

The fourth-year veteran closed the season with 4,194 career rushing yards. During the course of the year, McAllister moved past RB Ricky Williams (3,129, 1999-2001), RB Chuck Muncie (3,386, 1976-80), RB Rueben Mayes (3,408, 1986-88, 90) and RB Dalton Hilliard (4,164, 1986-93) on the team's all-time rushing chart. McAllister trails RB George Rogers (4,267, 1981-84) by a scant 73 yards to become the top rusher in Saints history. He also moved up to third in career rushing attempts with 961, trailing only Rogers (995) and Hilliard (1,126).

With five in 2004, McAllister increased his total for most 100-yard rushing performances by a Saints player to 22, with the team posting a 14-8 record when he reaches the milestone. He also ran for a touchdown in a four-game stretch (Oct. 17 vs. Minnesota until Nov. 14 vs. Kansas City), setting his career-high for consecutive contests with a TD. McAllister had six scoring runs during the span and nine in 2004. He moved into second place in rushing touchdowns with 31 moving past Mayes (23), FB Tony Galbreath (27, 1976-80), and Muncie (28). Hilliard leads the category with 39 career rushing touchdowns.

Finally, McAllister needs 74 yards, 166 attempts and nine rushing touchdowns in 2005 to become the club's all-time leader in each category.

COMEBACK RUSH

RB Deuce McAllister showed his leadership against Tampa Bay Oct. 10 by coming back from the high ankle sprain he suffered vs. San Francisco (Sept. 19) weeks ahead of time to return to the starting lineup. He ground out 102 yards on 21 carries against the Bucs and had another top performance in the win over the Chiefs, rushing for 127 yards on 16 carries. He added an even 100 Nov. 28 at Atlanta on 23 attempts and had 128 on 29 carries against the Falcons Dec. 26. He finished 2004 by rushing for a season-high 140 yards, including a 71-yard burst, on 28 carries at Carolina Jan. 2 - marking his club-record 22nd 100-yard game. He rushed for a touchdown in four-straight contests (from vs. Vikings, Oct. 17 until vs. Chiefs, Nov. 14), a career-best for consecutive games with a TD, and had six scoring runs during that span.

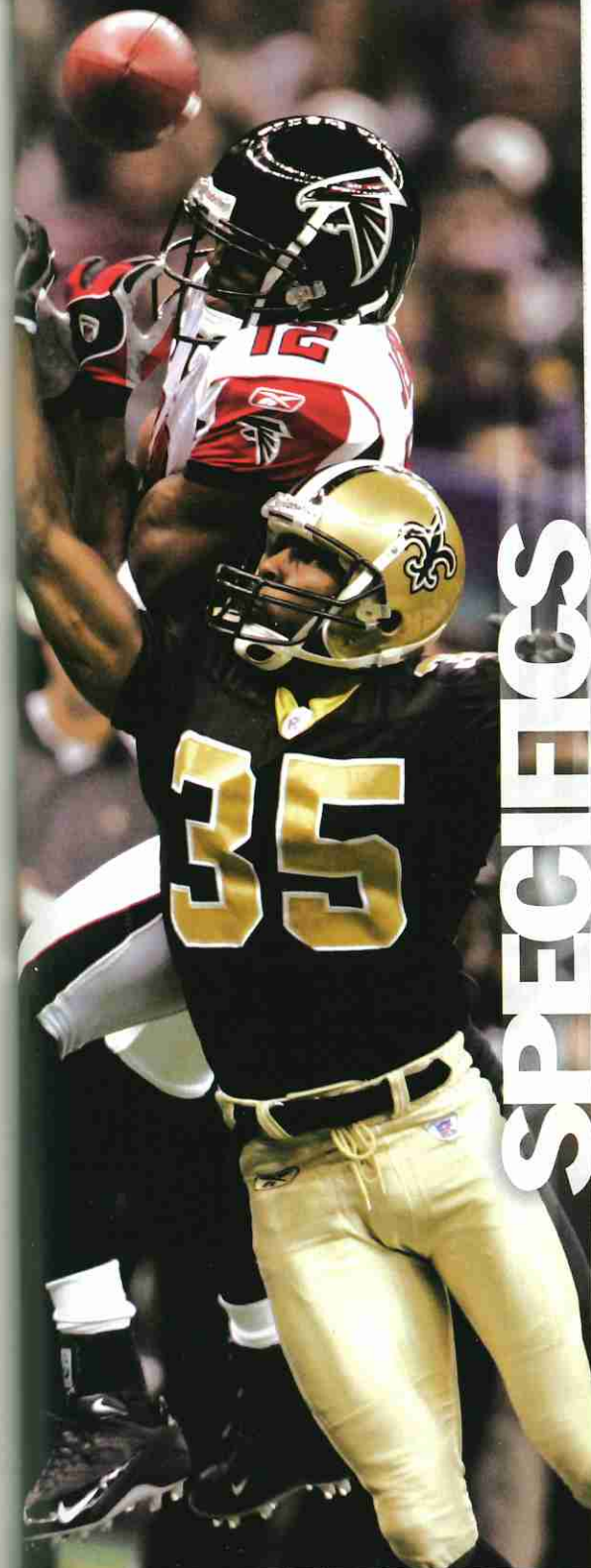

NFL SCHEDULE ROTATION

The NFL regular season scheduling rotation for the next seven seasons under the realignment plan that went into effect in 2002:

The interconference and intraconference divisional matchups – 14 of each season's 16 games – were determined last year following extensive analysis and discussion with NFL clubs. A key factor in deciding the initial schedules was the displacement of certain teams from their traditional divisions in the new alignment.

The Saints, who teamed with Atlanta, Carolina and Tampa Bay to create the newly-formed NFC South in 2002, play home-and-home with each of their divisional rivals (six games), the four teams from another NFC division on a rotating three-year cycle (four games), the four teams from an AFC division on a rotating four-year cycle (four contests) and two intraconference games based on the prior year's standings (two games against teams in the two NFC divisions the team is not scheduled to play that season. The division champions of each division will play against each other, and the second-, third- and fourth-place teams in a each conference are matched the same way).

The format adopted by the NFL in 2002 has several advantages:

- There is an increased common-opponent emphasis with every team in a division playing against 14 common opponents.
- All teams play each other on a regular basis, home and away, for a more consistent presentation of attractive games, eliminating the many schedule aberrations of the past.
- Teams are guaranteed to play all non-division opponents in their conference at least once every three years and at home at least once every six years.
- Every NFC team plays every AFC team once every four years and at home once every eight years.
- A team's record from the previous year has less of a bearing on its schedule, with only two opponents based on the previous year's standings, rather than the four of the previous system. Thus, the so-called "easy" fifth-place schedules have been eliminated.
- The division that a team is in will be less of a factor in a team's won-loss record with 10-of-16 games each season coming against non-division teams.

GRAB BAG

WR Joe Horn is the lone player in club history to have 75 or more grabs for five-consecutive seasons. Horn's 94 catches last season equaled the franchise-best total he first reached in 2000. He is also the only player in team record books with four 1,000-yard receiving seasons. Horn shattered another one of his club records with 1,399 yards last season, topping the 1,340 he had in 2000.

Entering his sixth season with New Orleans, Horn has a current streak of consecutive games with a reception at 93 contests, including the last 79 with the Saints. That is the franchise's second-longest stretch, trailing only WR Eric Martin, who holds the club record with at least one reception in 105 consecutive games (11/1/87 until 1/2/94).

When the 1st Wild Card team has been identified, the procedure is repeated to name the 2nd Wild Card, i.e. eliminate all but the highest-ranked club in each division prior to proceeding to step 2. In situations where 3 or more teams from the same division are involved in the procedure, the original seeding of the teams remains the same for subsequent applications of the tie-breaker if the top-ranked team in that division qualifies for a Wild Card berth.

Other Tie Breaking Procedures

1. Only 1 club advances to the playoffs in any tie-breaking step. Remaining tied clubs revert to the 1st step of the applicable division or Wild Card tie breakers. As an example, if 2 clubs remain tied in any tie-breaker step after all other clubs have been eliminated, the procedure reverts to step 1 of the 2-club format to determine the winner. When 1 club wins the tie breaker, all other clubs revert to step 1 of the applicable 2-club or 3-club format.
2. In comparing records against common opponents among tied teams, the best won-lost-tied percentage is the deciding factor since teams may have played an unequal number of games.
3. To determine home-field priority among division-titlists, apply Wild Card tie-breakers.
4. To determine home-field priority for Wild Card qualifiers, apply division tie-breakers (if teams are from the same division) or Wild Card tie-breakers (if teams are from different divisions).

SAINTS FACILITY

Since the expansion was completed prior to the 2003 season, the Saints' headquarters have been a top resource for the players and coaching staff, who have access to three full-sized outdoor fields, an indoor field, a renovated locker room, a state-of-the-art weight room and a full-service cafeteria. It's also a boon for the team's fans, who since 2003 have been able to attend the outdoor practices during the club's month-long training camp in the New Orleans area for the first time.

Because of the unpredictable weather of southeast Louisiana throughout the year, the club has long needed an indoor practice area. That need was filled in 2003 with the completion of one of the league's best facilities. No longer does the club have to regularly bus to alternative locations for practice, and other newly-built structures were included that complete the club's training area. Also on the Saints' 19-acre campus in Metairie is the recently-completed, 12,800 square-foot practice facility that houses the New Orleans VooDoo of the Arena Football League.

At 78 feet high, the indoor practice facility casts a long shadow over the entire property. The covered field is 220 feet wide by 420 feet long and has 6,375,600 cubic feet of air-conditioned space. There are 93,400 feet under roof covered in FieldTurf. A 250-seat cafeteria is connected to the lightning-protected facility, as is a 9,000 square-foot weight room with a cushioned floor. Over 8,000 square feet of maintenance and equipment storage was also added, and there are covered walkways connecting the indoor facility and cafeteria to the existing building. Outside of the VooDoo facility is a new, full-sized outdoor field covered in AstroPlay.

The existing building was also renovated two years ago. The team's locker room was doubled in size, with new lockers installed. A large, open area is in the middle so all lockers are visible for communication and interaction between the players and coaches. A player's lounge was built, and the existing medical and rehabilitation area was doubled in size. It now includes a treadmill pool facility for injury rehab work.

Other updated features of the Saints' facility include expansion of the ticket area and additional staff locker rooms. All of the renovated areas have freshly-carpeted floors emblazoned with the Saints' Fleur de Lis logo.

The entire club moved into the training facility at **5800 Airline Drive** in Metairie on April 15, 1996, marking the first time in club history that the team's players, coaches and staff were housed under one roof. The first floor is approximately 43,000 square feet and primarily serves the needs of the players. It also consists of a reception area, ticket office, media workroom and storage areas. Two symmetrically laid-out fields behind the building are planted with Bermuda grass and are surrounded by an asphalt, half-mile running track.

A 1,700 square foot auditorium, which sits on the first floor, can seat 110 players for team meetings and can be divided into two rooms. On either side of the auditorium are eight smaller team meeting rooms. Located on the second floor are offices for coaches, player personnel, video and the administrative staff.

From Baton Rouge/West

Take I-10 East to Clearview Parkway exit. Follow Clearview Parkway South to Airline Drive and turn right. Take Airline Drive for approximately 1.2 miles and the facility is on the left.

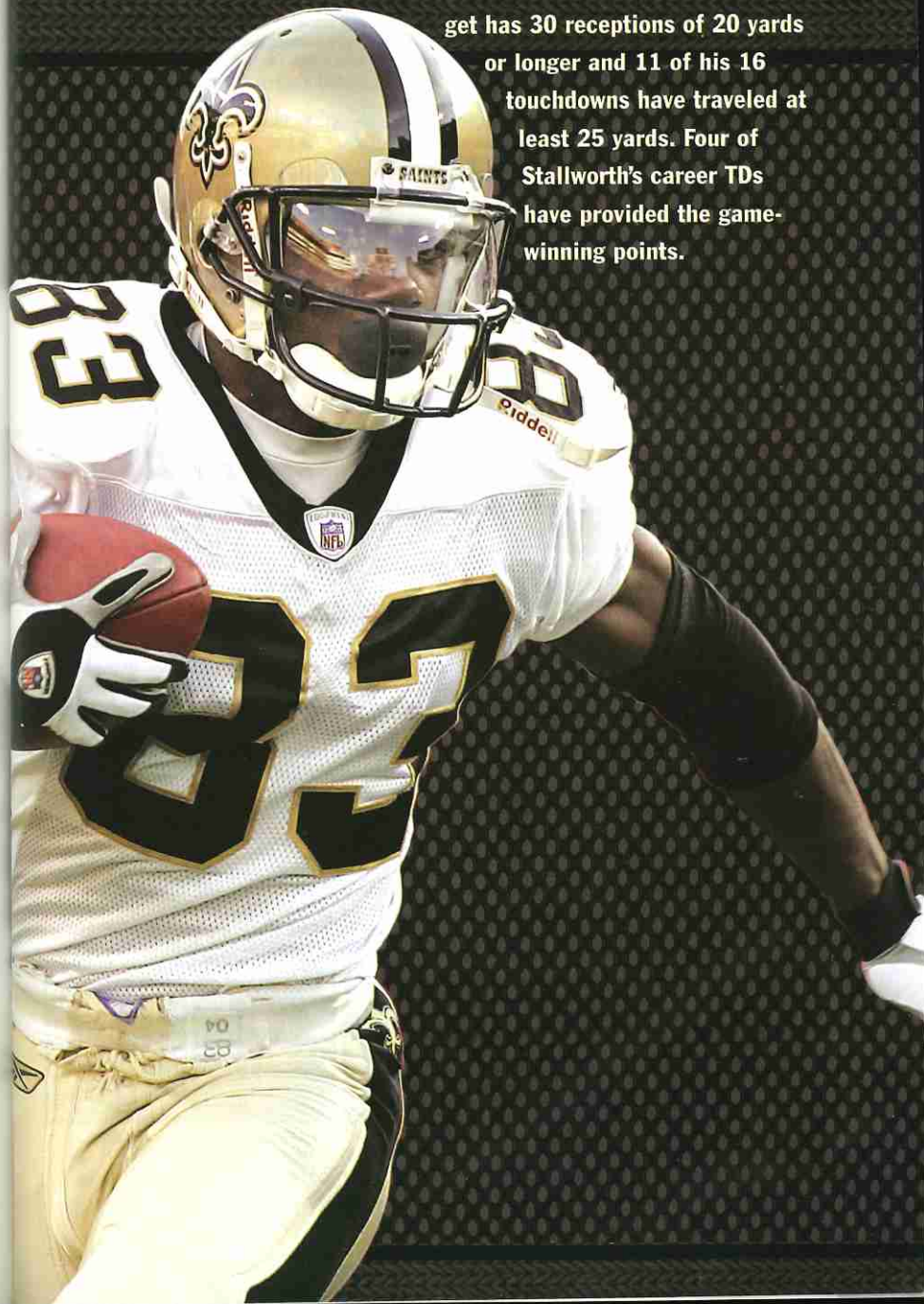

GAMEDAY MEDIA POLICIES

MEDIA GATE

Media entrance for Saints games at the Louisiana Superdome is located on the ground level of the Northwest Parking Garage (side nearest the Claiborne Ave. overpass) near the center of the building. The media entrance opens four hours prior to kickoff. Media Will Call is located at this entrance as well.

CREDENTIAL REQUESTS

Superdome press box space is reserved for the working news media. Requests should be made at least one week in advance and directed to Nick Karl, Media & Public Relations Assistant, New Orleans Saints, 5800 Airline Drive, Metairie, LA 70003. Please fax your request to (504) 731-1888 or e-mail your request to karnl@saints.nfl.com. Credential requests will not be honored on gameday. Press box media are not allowed on the field at any time, including pre-game and post-game. Interviews are not allowed with Saints players as they leave the field.

TELEVISION & RADIO

Network television, network radio and visiting radio are assigned numbered booths in the main press box. Spotters and statisticians are available upon request at least one week prior to the game. Television stations will be allowed to do pre-game live shots as well as post-game live shots from the South end zone only. TV talent will be asked to leave the field prior to kickoff.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Only accredited working photographers are allowed on the sidelines. They must wear a "field photo" arm band and shoot from behind the yellow-dotted line. The bench areas are off limits at all times. Photographers

should take special note of the usage conditions listed on the credential. Reporters are not permitted to accompany photographers on the sidelines until after both teams have cleared the field following the conclusion of the game. Grip passes will no longer be issued for home games, and those with yellow armbands must have a camera and will not be allowed to grip for photographers.

LOCKER ROOMS

FREEAGENCY/SALARYCAPQ&A

Q — What are the categories of free agency?

A — Players are either "restricted" or "unrestricted" free agents. Within those categories are also "transition" and "franchise" players.

Q — What is the difference between a restricted free agent and an unrestricted free agent?

A — Players become restricted free agents when they complete three accrued seasons and their contract expires. Unrestricted free agents have completed four or more accrued seasons with an expired contract.

Q — What constitutes an "accrued season"?

A — Six or more regular-season games on a club's active/inactive, reserved-injured or "physically unable to perform" lists.

Q — Other than accrued seasons, what determines a restricted free agent?

A — He has received a "qualifying" offer (a salary level predetermined by the Collective Bargaining Agreement between the league and its players) from his old club. He can negotiate with any club through April 15. If the restricted free agent accepts an offer sheet from a new club, his old club can match the offer and retain him because it has the "right of first refusal." If the old club does not match the offer, it can possibly receive draft-choice compensation depending on the amount of its qualifying offer. If an offer sheet is not executed, the player's rights revert to his old club on April 16.

Q — What determines an unrestricted free agent?

A — A player with four or more accrued seasons whose contract has expired. He is free to sign with any club, with no compensation owed to his old club, through July 22 (or the first scheduled day of the first NFL training camp, whichever is later). On July 23, his rights revert to his old club if it made a "tender" offer (110 percent of last year's salary) to him by June 1. His old club then has until the 10th week of the season (November 12) to sign him. If he does not sign by November 12, he must sit out the season. If no tender is offered by June 1, player can be signed by any club anytime throughout the season.

Q — What determines a transition player?

A — His club must offer a minimum of the

average of the top 10 salaries of last season at the player's position or 120 percent of the player's previous year's salary, whichever is greater. A transition player designation gives the club a first-refusal right to match within seven days an offer sheet given to the player by another club after his contract expires. If the club matches, it retains the player. If it does not match, it receives no compensation.

Q — What determines a franchise player?

A — A club can designate one franchise player in any given year. The salary level offer by a player's old club determines what type of franchise player he is. An "exclusive" franchise player -- not free to sign with another club -- is offered a minimum of the average of the top five salaries at the player's position as of April 15, or 120 percent of the player's previous year's salary, whichever is greater. If the player is offered a minimum of the average of the top five salaries of last season at his position, he becomes a "non-exclusive" franchise player and can negotiate with other clubs. His old club can match a new club's offer, or receive two first-round draft choices if it decides not to match.

Q — Can a club decide to withdraw its franchise or transition designations on a player? If so, can it then use them on other players?

A — A club can withdraw its franchise or transition designations and the player then automatically becomes an unrestricted free agent either immediately or when his contract expires. The club cannot name a new transition player (two were allowed in 1993, one in 1994 and one in the final year of the CBA). It can name a new franchise player the next year. A club can, though, designate a transition player in lieu of a franchise player at any time.

Q — What determines each team's salary cap? Is it always in effect?

A — The salary cap is the absolute maximum each club may spend on player salaries in a capped year. The cap is in effect 365 days a year. From March 1 to the day before the season begins, a club's top 51 salaried players count towards the cap, plus pro-rated signing bonuses, incentives, etc., but not base salaries of other players on the roster up to 80. Thereafter, all salaries on a club's roster count towards the cap.
