

Hurricane Katrina Relief Fund





Tom BENSON OWNER/PRESIDENT

Over two decades ago Tom Benson assumed ownership of the New Orleans Saints, stepping in when out-of-town investors were primed to move the club from his hometown. It's a similar approach to his recent efforts in the wake of Hurricane Katrina, returning the team to New Orleans as promised after a year of turmoil.

Benson has positioned the Saints as a leader in the entire region's recovery – with the franchise serving as both a vital economic engine as well as a symbol of the area's resolve in rebuilding.

Never has his leadership and determination been more evident than in 2005, when the team was forced to move from New Orleans after the Gulf South was ravaged by the worst natural disaster in U.S. history. The Saints evacuated to San Antonio, an involuntary, sudden move to keep pace with an NFL season that was set to kick off just days later. In this time of duress, Benson's resiliency maintained the franchise as a viable entity as the entire organization's operation was hastily packed and relocated.

It was his dedication to the NFL, the club and its employees that kept the team moving forward in this time of unprecedented distress. There was no blueprint to follow, as no professional franchise had ever dealt with a similar situation, and the transition was even more intense on the eve of the season opener.

Without assistance, Benson shouldered the responsibility both financially and with warmth, including subsidizing a legion of Saints employees because of the move. He also quickly established The Saints Hurricane Katrina Relief Fund to send support back home to the community.

But it was to be expected. Since he became owner, it's no coincidence the period ranks as the most successful and dynamic in franchise history. And during that tenure, Benson has emerged as one of the league's most influential leaders by dedicating himself to service to the club, the league and the community.

He is married to the former Gayle Marie LaJaunie, a native of New Orleans. The couple was engaged in September of 2004 and married Oct. 29 of that year. Because of Benson's personal and business relationships, over 2,000 guests attended a three-day celebration, with a party at the New Orleans Museum of Art followed by a Catholic Mass at the Immaculate Conception Memorial Chapel.

Benson's vision of what an NFL club should be – proactive, with a positive

impact on the prosperity of the community and the charities that support the less fortunate – is the determining factor of the Saints' approach during these months of recovery. His integrity and compassion have transformed the organization into a community leader, a true hallmark of the Benson era. Annually the Saints put more than \$5 million back into Greater New Orleans and the Gulf South in cash, goods and services. Because of those efforts the World Sports Humanitarian Hall of Fame has twice recognized the club as one of the five most charitable professional organizations.

Benson has built his reputation through a record of accomplishment and service to Louisiana, the City of New Orleans, the Gulf South region and the NFL. The Saints' best seasons have come since his arrival, and Benson's unwavering goal remains for the club to rank among the most-admired franchises in all of sports. He has worked tirelessly toward that mission since becoming owner in 1985.

Prior to his arrival, Saints fans had never enjoyed a winning record, celebrated a division title or experienced the thrill of a playoff victory. Football was a new business for Benson upon purchasing the club, but he was a quick learner and he followed his life-long philosophy of finding the right people and putting them in charge.

A year after he was able to put his management group in place, New Orleans stormed to a 12-3 record in 1987 and the city hosted its first playoff contest. In 1990, the Saints captured a playoff berth again, and the following year the club earned its first division title. In 1992, New Orleans would go 12-4 and marched into the postseason again. And in 2000, the Saints won the NFC West again and the club's first playoff contest.

Benson also emerged as one of the most trusted and valued figures in the league. He has played a key role in many capacities, including three stints as Chairman of the Finance Committee, one of the league's most difficult, time-consuming and influential positions. The assignment is evidence of the respect and esteem he is held in by fellow owners.

His involvement in the league started in 1985, when Benson learned the Saints were on the brink of being sold to out-of-town interests who planned to move the team. While football was certainly one of his interests, the sport had yet to be one of Benson's passions.

But as one of the area's top businessmen, Benson recognized the economic and social importance of the club, so he immediately spearheaded the effort to keep the Saints. And unlike others at the time, it wasn't just an emotional plea, as he pooled all of his resources to purchase the club and preserve it for Louisiana.

While his work within the organization and the Saints' turnaround is well documented, his efforts have also paid dividends for the city and the surrounding area. During his tenure as owner, the city has hosted four Super Bowls. Each time New Orleans has been chosen to host the NFL's biggest game, Benson has been the driving force in the campaign to secure the contest. And each Super Bowl has

been an economic windfall that totals over \$300 million, not to mention the exposure and charitable contributions that the league makes during Super Bowl week.

In 1945, Benson served in the Navy aboard the U.S.S. South Dakota and has remained particularly close to this branch of the armed forces. He is the only enlisted man to serve on the Board of Trustees of the Pensacola Naval Museum and has been honored with an award from the crew of the submarine U.S.S. Louisiana. A leading advocate for the National World War II Memorial in Washington D.C., Benson was also a major contributor to The National D-Day Museum in New Orleans, with his pledges helping fund the Pacific Exhibit Grand Opening and the Midway Theater.

Through ownership of the Saints, it has been Benson's long-term goal to place the city of New Orleans, the State of Louisiana and the Gulf Coast region at the forefront of professional sports and to have his team support the community in many other economic, civic and charitable efforts. And through two decades, that goal has consistently been met – both on the field and off.



BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Stanley Rosenberg

One of Tom Benson's most trusted advisers, Rosenberg has been an associate of the Owner's for over 40 years. In addition to his role as Mr. Benson's attorney, Rosenberg has assisted in representing the club in negotiations with the state and has offered experienced counsel in the selection of the Saints' key hires since 1985.

Tom Roddy

Born in Houma, La., Roddy has a long association with Mr. Benson in both the banking and automotive businesses. He has overseen the day-to-day operations of Benson Management Company as well as Benson Financial Corp. Roddy has also been a member of the Owner's search teams for key hires by the club in the past.

Ryan LeBlanc

LeBlanc, Mr. Benson's grandson, oversees the daily operation of the sprawling, 2,500-acre Benson Farm and Ranch – known nationwide as a premier hunting destination – in Johnson City, Texas. The ranch features a herd of over 200 Black Angus cattle and has purchased, bred and raced over 100 thoroughbred horses.

MILESTONES

1985 Ownership of club officially transferred to Tom Benson on May 31. Benson becomes managing general partner of the Saints. With training camp almost a month away, Benson maintained the team management group that he inherited.

1986 The Benson influence really begins, as the Owner puts his management team in charge of the franchise. His first hire: Jim Finks as president/general manager on Jan. 14. Jim Mora is named the club's 10th head coach two weeks later.

1987 The Saints post a franchise-best 12-3 record – including victories in the final nine contests and make the playoffs for the first time.

1988 Saints finish 10-6, posting consecutive winning seasons for the first time.

1989 Benson appointed Chairman of the league's most influential group, the NFL Finance Committee, a position he kept before stepping down in the mid-1990s.

1991 New Orleans clinched its first-ever division championship at 11-5 as the Superdome hosts its first playoff game.

1992 Saints post a 12-4 record and host a playoff game for the second-straight year. Benson assumes sole ownership of the club.

1996 Marking a first for the organization, the coaches, players and staff are housed under one roof with the opening of the team's state-of-the-art facility.

1999 Benson promises the club's fans he will "take whatever steps necessary at the end of the season to make the New Orleans Saints a winning franchise."

2000 New Orleans wins the NFC West with a 10-6 record. The Saints win their first playoff game, a 31-28 thriller over St. Louis in the Superdome. Coach Jim Haslett wins NFL Coach of the Year.

2001 New Orleans hosts fourth Super Bowl during Benson's tenure as Owner.

2003 Benson again appointed Chairman of the Finance Committee; Construction of new indoor practice facility and other improvements is finished before camp; Benson moves Saints' annual training camp back to New Orleans.

2004 The Saints notched the 150th win since Benson assumed ownership with a 28-25 overtime victory at St. Louis.

2005 After Hurricane Katrina ravaged the Gulf South on the verge of the NFL's opening weekend, Benson was forced to move the club's entire operation. Under his leadership, the Saints were able to continue the season, including holding four games in Baton Rouge. The Saints returned to Louisiana in early 2006 and have been a leader in the region's recovery.



Rita Benson LEBLANC OWNER/EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT

Owner/Executive Vice President Rita Benson LeBlanc is the chief executive of the administrative and marketing side of the Saints organization. Few positions with the club come with more responsibility or such a wide-range of duties.

LeBlanc has taken an innovative approach in directing the team's marketing development – leading the Saints to reach a new record in season-ticket sales in 2006 – government affairs, sales, community relations and youth programs. But her ownership capacity expands those responsibilities, making LeBlanc unique in league executive circles.

She is also a rare member of the NFL community because of her varied experiences. LeBlanc has worked her way up the club's hierarchy while spending time in almost every department during her years – from player personnel to ticket operations. That background and perspective influences the entire organization as LeBlanc spearheads the team's myriad of efforts in marketing and sales.

LeBlanc was a key part of the management team that led the club through 2005, when the organization was forced to evacuate from New Orleans and move its base of operations several times. It was a period of extraordinary demands that had previously never been considered by a sports franchise – and each decision by Owner Tom Benson, LeBlanc and the executive staff was made for the good of the organization, the team and its employees.

Since taking on the additional title of executive vice president earlier this year, LeBlanc has been a driving force in the club's leadership role in rebuilding Louisiana following Hurricane Katrina. This has included a coordinating capacity in the continued refurbishing of the storm-ravaged Superdome and planning the details and fan interaction programs for the 2006 season. LeBlanc has restructured the organization's business and marketing departments, establishing a progressive approach to expand the focus to the entire region. She has overseen the implementation of new technology to assist in ticket purchases and reached out to the community with youth clinics and the team's expansive charitable efforts.

She works in concert with Mr. Benson on business, financial and team matters. As a member of the Saints Board of Directors, LeBlanc represents the club at NFL Ownership Meetings, acts as a liaison between the Saints, New Orleans and the Gulf South region, coordinates special events and heads stadium research. Her daily workload in her ownership obligations also includes monitoring the club's

fiscal responsibility, maintaining communication with the NFL and formulating the long-range planning of the team's marketing initiatives.


In addition to LeBlanc's past experience in all areas of Saints operations, her well-rounded NFL tenure has included time with the League office in New York, the NFL Properties Publishing Group in Los Angeles and NFL Films in Mount Laurel, N.J. In her endeavors throughout the league, she has participated in the selection process for the Teacher of the Year Program, was staff editor of Gameday magazine, provided production assistance on several Emmy-nominated NFL Films projects and received recognition from the U.S. Secret Service for aiding in the protective mission during Super Bowl XXXVI.


LeBlanc also serves as Owner/Executive Vice President of the New Orleans VooDoo of the Arena Football League. The team had unprecedented success in its first two seasons, and she was instrumental in defining the brand, creating the club's aggressive image and building a unique game-day experience. She has been highly-involved at the AFL Owner's Meetings and is a member of the AFL Properties Committee as well the league's television subcommittee. For those efforts, LeBlanc was named the AFL Executive of the Year in 2004. Though the team was forced to go on hiatus for the 2006 season due to the affects of Hurricane Katrina to the New Orleans Arena, the club will resume play in 2007.

LeBlanc believes in the importance of active community stewardship. An advocate for economic growth and development for New Orleans and the entire Gulf South region, LeBlanc is a member of the New Orleans Business Council. She has supported the cause of coastal preservation through Women of the Storm and The Coast Guardians. She also represents the Saints on the United Way Board of Trustees, bringing together NFL exposure and resources for hands-on support of local organizations.

Contributing in the scope of education LeBlanc serves on the Board of Trustees of Loyola University. On a personal level, LeBlanc is on the board for the Shirley Landry Benson PACE Center at St. Cecilia, a facility named after her maternal grandmother and dedicated to the care of the frail and elderly. She is also a founding member of the Oblate Missionary Partnership.

Executive Vice President/General Manager Mickey Loomis is responsible for the club's entire football operations, including coaching, player personnel, salary cap management, contract negotiations, equipment, video, athletic training and public relations.

Loomis was promoted to General Manager in 2002 and earned the additional title of Executive Vice President later that year. His title and authority have evolved but he has been a part of the club's highest management team since arriving in 2000. In his former post as Director of Football Administration, Loomis handled contract negotiations and managed the salary cap.

In 2005, Loomis helped lead the club through unprecedented challenges for an NFL organization. His influence guided the players and staff through a sudden evacuation from New Orleans and several moves of the team's base of operations.

Once the year came to a close, Loomis immediately began rebuilding the team. His first move was hiring Sean Payton as head coach. Once the free agency period opened the club made a number of key signings, landing QB Drew Brees to lead the offense. And in the NFL Draft the Saints selected RB Reggie Bush and a handful of other prospects.

Loomis also serves as the General Manager of the New Orleans VooDoo of the Arena Football League. He was a guiding force in the construction at the Saints' headquarters in 2003, a facelift that has given the Saints one of the NFL's best training facilities.

Prior to joining the Saints, Loomis spent 15 years with the Seattle Seahawks, including as executive vice president from 1992-98. He joined the Seahawks staff in October 1983, was promoted to vice president/finance in 1990 and to executive vice president in 1992.

A native of Eugene, Ore., Loomis has an undergraduate degree in accounting from the University of Oregon and a master's degree in sports administration from Wichita State University.

Loomis has two children: A son, Alex, and a daughter, Katherine.

Entering his 10th season in the NFL and 19th as a coach, Sean Payton was hired as the 14th head coach in Saints history on Jan. 18, 2006 after being a member of the Dallas Cowboys staff since 2003.

Prior to his final season with the Cowboys, Payton was promoted to assistant head coach/passing game coordinator and was responsible for the team's play-calling. For the previous two years with the club he had been assistant head coach/quarterbacks. Prior to joining the Cowboys in 2003, he was with the New York Giants (1999-2002) and the Philadelphia Eagles (1997-98).

Since 2000, each QB under Payton's guidance has thrown for over 3,000 yards. The three quarterbacks he tutored in Dallas – Drew Bledsoe last season, Vinny Testaverde in 2004 and Quincy Carter in 2003 – all surpassed the milestone. In 2005, Bledsoe completed 300 of 499 passes for 3,639 yards and 23 touchdowns. The yardage total ranks third in club history and the veteran quarterback posted an 83.7 passer rating, among the highest of his career.

In 2005, the Cowboys had the NFL's 13th-ranked offense, finished tied for second in the NFC with 318 first downs and ranked fifth in the conference in third-down efficiency (40.5). When Payton arrived in Dallas the Cowboys had ranked 31st in passing the previous year but immediately improved to 17th the following season. Over the last two years, the team ranked 15th in the league.

The Cowboys went to the playoffs in Payton's first season and Carter became the first Dallas quarterback to throw for over than 3,000 yards since 1997. The club also finished as one of only three teams to have a trio of targets with at least 550 receiving yards.

Payton came to Dallas after four years with the New York Giants, the last three as offensive coordinator. The Giants had one of the NFL's most productive offenses and QB Kerry Collins posted franchise-record passing numbers. Behind his career-high and club-record 4,073 passing yards, the Giants finished 2002 as the NFL's sixth-ranked offense, the team's highest ranking since 1985.

Payton solidified his reputation as one of the game's top offensive minds in 2000. In his first season as coordinator, the Giants captured the NFC title and went to Super Bowl XXXV. New York scored 328 points – the club's highest total since 1990 – finished 13th in the NFL in offense and jumped from 24th to 11th in rushing.

Payton was first assigned play-calling duties prior to a game against the Jets on Dec. 5, 1999. In that game, the Giants scored 41 points and gained 490 yards –

both season-high totals – and he retained that assignment over the final five games. Appointed the offensive coordinator the following season, over the next three years the Giants passing attack continually improved, ranking 13th in the NFL in 2000, tied for eighth in 2001 and sixth in 2002. In the decade prior to Payton's arrival, the Giants hadn't ranked above 20th.

The Giants players under his guidance during those years flourished. WR Amani Toomer caught 311 passes, including a club-record 82 in 2002. He became the first player in club history to catch at least 70 passes in four seasons (1999-2002), and the first Giants wideout to have four-consecutive 1,000-yard seasons. RB Tiki Barber set a franchise record for total yards in 2000 with 2,085. With 1,387 yards in 2002 – the second-highest total in club history – Barber finished second in the NFC in rushing.

Payton joined the Giants as quarterbacks coach on Feb. 3, 1999. Prior to joining the Giants, he spent 1997 and 1998 as Philadelphia's quarterbacks coach.

Payton wrapped two coaching stints at San Diego State University (1988-89 and 1992-93) around a stop at Indiana State (1990-91). During his second stretch with the Aztecs, Payton was running backs coach, working with Heisman Trophy runner-up Marshall Faulk, now with the St. Louis Rams, before becoming quarterbacks coach.

Following the 1993 season, Payton moved to Miami of Ohio (1994-95) where he was quarterbacks coach prior to being promoted to co-offensive coordinator. He spent 1996 as quarterbacks coach at Illinois prior to entering the NFL with Philadelphia.


Payton earned a degree in communication at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, then the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. The three-time AP All-American selection had brief pro stints with Chicago of the Arena Football League, Ottawa of the Canadian Football League and the Chicago Bears in 1987. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000.

Born Dec. 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton and his wife, Beth, have a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor Thomas.

Doug Marrone enters his first season in New Orleans as offensive coordinator/offensive line coach. Hired Jan. 27, 2006, he will supervise the offense as well as coach the club's linemen.

Marrone was with the New York Jets for the last four seasons (2002-05) as offensive line coach. Over that span Marrone molded a unit of both veterans and young players into one of the club's most consistent position groups despite injuries. He helped develop the talents of several new starters last year, including C/G Jonathan Goodwin, a 2006 free-agent acquisition of the Saints.

In 2004, the offensive line paved the way for the Jets to finish third in the NFL in rushing yards (2,388) and second in rushing first downs (135) as the offense posted one of the highest rushing averages (4.5) in club history. RB Curtis Martin led the league in rushing with 1,697 yards and posted nine 100-yard performances.

In 2003, the offensive line helped the offense average 5.3 yards per play and 4.0 per rushing attempt. In Marrone's first season with the Jets the line led the way for the offense to rush for 1,618 yards, despite having two new starters.

During Marrone's four-year stretch with New York, the Jets played in four playoff games (two in 2002 and a pair in 2004). In those postseason contests, the Jets notched 539 rushing yards on 121 carries, averaging 4.43 yards per attempt.

Marrone arrived in New York after spending 2001 at the University of Tennessee, serving as tight ends and tackles coach. Marrone spent a season at the University of Georgia (2000) after serving from 1995-99 at Georgia Tech.

During his stint with the Yellow Jackets, Marrone served as the director of football operations (1995), tight ends coach (1996) and the offensive line coach (1997-99). In 1999, the Yellow Jackets finished first nationally in total offense, averaging 509.4 yards and 40.7 points per game. Georgia Tech participated in a bowl game each season from 1997-99.

He began his coaching career in 1992 at Cortland (N.Y.) State as a tight ends coach before serving one-year stints as offensive line coach at the U.S. Coast Guard Academy (1993) and Northeastern University (1994).

Marrone was selected in the sixth round in 1986 by the Los Angeles Raiders and played in two seasons in the NFL; first with the Miami Dolphins in 1987 and



with the Saints in 1989. Marrone also had stints with Pittsburgh, Dallas and Minnesota before closing his career with the NFL London Monarchs (1991-92).

A three-year letterman at Syracuse (1983-85), Marrone returned to the school and graduated in 1991. He and his wife, Helen, have two daughters, Madeline and Anne, and a son, Mack.

Gary GIBBS
DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

When Sean Payton was hired, the first coach he sought for his staff was Gary Gibbs, who accepted the position as the Saints' defensive coordinator less than a week later. The hire set the foundation for the future in filling out the coaching staff, as Gibbs immediately brought experience, communication skills and energy to his new position.

Gibbs came to New Orleans after spending the last four years as the linebackers coach for the Dallas Cowboys, where he served on the same staff as Payton from 2003-05. It was his first NFL assignment after accumulating 22 years of college coaching experience, including six as head coach at the University of Oklahoma.

During Gibbs' tenure in Dallas, the linebackers were one of the club's most productive position groups and led an aggressive, opportunistic defense. Each year under his direction, linebackers finished at the top of the club's tackle charts and posted some of the best totals in franchise history.

In 2005, Gibbs played a key role in the Cowboys' transition to a 3-4 defensive alignment. With young players and first-year starters playing key positions, the linebackers still led the unit and were the defense's top playmakers. In his first year in Dallas after being acquired in a trade on the eve of the regular-season opener, recent Saints' free agent acquisition Scott Fujita had 58 tackles, a pair of sacks and two forced fumbles while starting the last eight games.

The Cowboys' three starting linebackers finished 2004 ranked in the top six on the team in tackles. Dat Nguyen was the club leader with 135 stops and added a career-high three interceptions. In 2003, the linebacker corps led the Cowboys

defensive charge with the top two tacklers on the squad. In Gibbs' first season in Dallas, LB Dexter Coakley led the club with 173 stops, the second-highest total in franchise history.

Gibbs joined the Cowboys following consecutive one-year stints as the defensive coordinator at LSU (2001) and the University of Georgia (2000). During his lone season in Baton Rouge, the Tigers compiled a 10-3 record, took the SEC title and won the Nokia Sugar Bowl. Gibbs' defense ranked 21st nationally against the run and led the SEC with 18 interceptions. In his year at Georgia, the Bulldogs ranked 19th in the nation in total defense and 12th in scoring defense by allowing just 18 points per game.

He spent 23 years at the University of Oklahoma as a player, assistant and head coach. During that time, the Sooners played in 16 bowl games and won three national titles. In his six seasons as the head coach (1989-94), Gibbs guided the Sooners to three bowl games and an overall record of 44-23-2. After taking over the program, Gibbs continued the school's tradition of success, improving Oklahoma's record each of his first three seasons. In 1991 the Sooners won the Gator Bowl, and in 1993 Oklahoma won the John Hancock Bowl.

Gibbs began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Oklahoma in 1975 and was promoted to linebackers coach three years later. In 1981, Gibbs was named defensive coordinator and he held that post until taking over as head coach in 1989. During his stretch as defensive coordinator, the Sooners captured the 1985 national title, and their defense led the nation three straight years (1985-87).


Gibbs was a linebacker at Oklahoma from 1972 to 1974, a span that saw the Sooners post a 32-1-1 overall mark and finish No. 1 in the nation in 1974 – with Gibbs recording 114 tackles as a starter. The Sooners ranked second in the nation in 1972 and finished third the following year. Before joining the coaching staff at Oklahoma, Gibbs went to training camp with the New England Patriots as a free agent in 1975.

He earned his undergraduate degree in marketing from Oklahoma in 1974 and his master's degree in business from his alma mater in 1976. A native of Beaumont, Texas, Gibbs lettered in both football (linebacker) and baseball (shortstop) at Spring Branch (Texas) HS. He and his wife Jeanne, have two daughters, Whitley and Jordan.

Revered as one of the NFL's most accomplished special teams coaches, John Bonamego was an important, early addition to the Saints coaching staff. With a reputation as a detail-oriented coach with a history of building solid, opportunistic coverage and return units and cultivating consistent production from the kicking game, Bonamego's teaching skills will be used to form the bedrock of the Saints' special teams.

Bonamego is entering his 19th year as a coach and eighth in the NFL. He was hired by New Orleans after coaching the special teams in Green Bay from 2003-05. Bonamego's units with the Packers placed in the top 10 in two of the past three years in the annual NFL special teams rankings formulated by *The Dallas Morning News*.

In 2005, Green Bay had the league's longest punt return for a touchdown (85 yards vs. Chicago). The Packers didn't allow a return touchdown, blocked a pair of PATs, a field goal attempt and ranked fifth in the NFC in punt return average.

Green Bay was one of only four teams in the NFL to not surrender a return touchdown or have a kick blocked in 2004 and the Packers placed in the top 10 in *The Dallas Morning News* rankings for a second-straight year. The Packers allowed only 20.2 yards on kickoffs and ranked sixth in field goal percentage (85.7). That season the club also had four game-winning field goals – the most for an NFL team since the NFC/AFC merger.

In 2003 – Bonamego's first season in Green Bay after being hired by Coach Mike Sherman – *The Dallas Morning News* put the Packers eighth in the NFL in special teams. In league rankings, the Packers finished fourth in field goal percentage, fifth in kick return average (26.7) and did not allow a blocked punt or field goal. Green Bay blocked a field goal and a punt in the same season for the first time since 1997 and won the NFC North title.

Bonamego came to the Packers after spending four years (1999-2002) at Jacksonville with Coach Tom Coughlin, including his final season as special teams coordinator. In 2002 Bonamego's units placed third in the rankings by *The Dallas Morning News*. The special teams blocked four kicks (two field goals and a pair of punts) and led the AFC in kick coverage (19.5). That year the Jaguars also led the AFC in gross and net punting average and were one of only two NFL teams to not allow a return touchdown or a blocked kick.

Bonamego (pronounced bohn-ah-MAY-go) joined the Jaguars in 1999, with Jacksonville posting an NFL-best 14-2 record that season. He worked for three

years as assistant special teams coach under Larry Pasquale (1999) and Frank Gansz (2000-01) – considered two of the league’s best special teams strategists. Bonamego was promoted in 2002 following the retirement of Gansz.

He arrived in Jacksonville after six seasons at Army, where Bonamego first assisted in coaching the outside linebackers (1993) before leading the special teams and recruiting efforts from 1994-98. He broke into college coaching at Maine, where he spent four years, two as a graduate assistant (1988-89) and two as wide receivers/special teams coach (1990-91). Bonamego worked at Lehigh in 1992, coaching running backs and assisting with special teams, which recorded three special teams TDs that season.


Born Aug. 14, 1963 in Waynesboro, Pa., Bonamego earlier spent a season coaching at Mt. Pleasant (Mich.) HS and a year as a player-coach in Europe with the Verona (Italy) Redskins.

A former wide receiver and quarterback at Central Michigan, he earned a degree in health fitness from in 1987, then received his master’s degree in physical education from Maine in 1992.

Joe Vitt was a key addition to the coaching staff as assistant head coach/linebackers. A constant over his coaching career has been developing players by relying on his skills as a communicator and teacher, primarily working with linebackers over the last 10 years.

Vitt comes to the Saints after proving his mettle yet again in 2005 when thrust into the role of interim head coach for the final 11 games for St. Louis. He held the Rams together during a difficult period after previously holding the title of assistant head coach/linebackers. It was part of a two-year stint with St. Louis

where he also turned a handful of young defenders into a solid linebacker corps that paced the team in tackles each season.

He joined the Rams after serving in Kansas City from 2000-03. It was with the Chiefs where he first worked with recent Saints free-agent signing Scott Fujita, a fifth-round pick who developed into one of Kansas City’s top defenders and led the club in tackles for two seasons.

Vitt took over the linebacker corps in Kansas City after tutoring the defensive backs for Green Bay in 1999, molding a legion of rookies and young players into a formidable unit that doubled the Packers’ previous-year total by picking off 26 passes. One of the players he developed was CB Mike McKenzie, who was selected to several all-rookie teams that year and is now with the Saints.

From 1995-98, Vitt was linebackers coach for Philadelphia. In 1998, his group helped the Eagles lead the NFL in pass defense, allowing 170 yards per game. Vitt was assistant head coach and defensive backs coach with the Rams under Chuck Knox from 1992-94 for the franchise’s final three seasons in Los Angeles.


Vitt spent 10 seasons with the Seattle Seahawks (1982-91), holding several titles during that stretch. In 1982 he was defensive quality control coach/assistant strength & conditioning coach. From 1983-87 Vitt was quality control/assistant linebackers coach, and from 1988-91 he tutored the safeties.

Vitt, who was born in Syracuse, N.Y. and grew up in Blackwood, N.J., played four years at linebacker for Towson State and in 1974 was part of a squad that went undefeated. He was inducted into the Towson State Hall of Fame. Vitt entered the NFL coaching ranks with the Baltimore Colts as assistant strength/quality control coach from 1979-81.

Vitt is married to Linda, with two children, Joe, Jr. and daughter, Jennifer.

George HENSHAW SENIOR ASSISTANT/RUNNING BACKS

He's been an assistant in the NFL for 18 years and a coach for 36 seasons, a span where George Henshaw has tutored nearly every position group on offense, served as an assistant head coach and as an offensive coordinator. He takes over in New Orleans as running backs coach, and his experience and the respect he is held in within league circles is evident in his additional title as senior assistant.

Prior to coming to New Orleans, Henshaw spent nine seasons (1997-2005) with the Tennessee Titans, the last six as assistant head coach/offense. In 2000, the Titans represented the AFC in Super Bowl XXXIV. As assistant head coach/offense, Henshaw assisted in game-planning the offensive attack as well as coached the tight ends.

In the years Henshaw was with the Titans, the tight ends were an integral part in Tennessee's offense, with the group accounting for 149 receptions in 2005—the second-highest single-season combined total for a tight end corps in league history.

The Titans' tight ends caught 845 passes over the last nine seasons, the most in the NFL during that span. In eight of those nine seasons, the group recorded at least 70 receptions. During his time in Tennessee, Henshaw also groomed TE Frank Wycheck, who led the team in receptions five times and was voted to three Pro Bowls. In his final season, Wycheck became the fourth tight end in NFL history to record 500 career receptions.

Henshaw served as the offensive coordinator of the New York Giants from 1993-96. During that stretch, the Giants had one of the NFL's best running games, including a league-high average of 138.1 yards per game in 1993. Before joining the Giants, Henshaw spent five years (1988-92) with Denver, including as offensive coordinator/ wide receivers coach in his final season. Prior to that, Henshaw coached wide receivers in 1991, and the offensive line from 1988-90. In those years the Broncos won two AFC West titles and appeared in Super Bowl XXIV.

Henshaw was the head coach at the University of Tulsa in 1987 before arriving in Denver. He began his coaching career at his alma mater of West Virginia from 1970-75 before moving on to Florida State. He spent three years (1976-78) as defensive line coach and four years (1979-82) as offensive line coach.


From 1979-82 Henshaw also served as offensive coordinator, and in his first two years at that position FSU had a record of 21-1, and he helped head coach Bobby Bowden implement one of the best offensive systems in the country.

From 1983-86, Henshaw served as offensive coordinator for the University of Alabama. During that span, the Crimson Tide had one of the SEC's best offenses, and in his first season at the school Henshaw's unit led the SEC in scoring and total offense by averaging 424.4 yards per contest.

Born Jan. 22, 1948 and a native of Midlothian, Va., Henshaw is a 1970 graduate of West Virginia. He and his wife, Kathleen, have three children: Michael, Matthew and Kerry. Michael was a four-year football letterman at West Virginia and just completed his master's degree. Matthew was a four-year letterman at tight end at Florida State from 2002-05 and was signed by the Seattle Seahawks and will attend training camp with the club. Kerry is an honors student at the University of Alabama.

Dennis ALLEN ASSISTANT DEFENSIVE LINE/ DEFENSIVE ASSISTANT

Dennis Allen joins the Saints after a four-year stint with the Atlanta Falcons where he spent the last two years as a defensive assistant/quality control with an emphasis on working with the defensive line. In the previous two years, Allen was in charge of defensive quality control while helping tutor the secondary. This season with New Orleans he will assist Marion Hobby in coaching the defensive line.

Over the last two years in Atlanta, the Falcons' defense was paced by the play of the front four. In 2004, Atlanta led the NFL for the first time in club history with 48 sacks and the unit sent DE Patrick Kerney to the Pro Bowl. Last season DT Rod Coleman represented the club in the postseason all-star game and the Falcons notched 37 sacks.

In 2002, Allen's first year with the Falcons, when he assisted in coaching the defensive backfield, the club tied for third in the NFL with 24 interceptions and improved from 30th vs. the pass in 2001 to 16th the following year.

Allen worked as the secondary coach for the University of Tulsa (2000-01) before heading to the NFL. Prior to his stint at Tulsa, Allen was on the coaching staff for four years (1996-99) at Texas A&M as a graduate assistant, working pri-

marily with the school's secondary.

A native of Hurst, Texas, Allen earned four letters for Texas A&M as a safety from 1992-95 and started the final 21 games of his career. A memorable highlight was a fourth-quarter interception that clinched an 18-9 victory over Texas in 1993, sending the Aggies to their third-straight Cotton Bowl. He collected Southwest Conference Defensive Player of the Week honors after intercepting two passes in a 36-14 win over Oklahoma in 1994.

As assistant wide receivers coach/quality control, Carmichael worked alongside wide receivers coach James Lofton in the instruction and preparation of the wideouts. San Diego finished 10th in offense in 2005 for the second-straight year.

Carmichael joined the Chargers in 2002 after spending the year before as quality control coach for the Washington Redskins. In 2000, he was the tight ends and offensive assistant coach for the Cleveland Browns. From 1995-99, Carmichael was the quarterbacks coach at Louisiana Tech. He began his coaching career as the assistant offensive line coach at the University of New Hampshire in 1994, with the Wildcats winning the Yankee Conference championship.

He was promoted with the additional title of assistant athletic director in 2003.

Dalrymple has been certified by the National Strength & Conditioning Association since 1991 and has been honored as a finalist for the organization's coach of the year in 1995, 1997, 1999, 2003 and 2006. He is one of only two NFL coaches in his field to be certified by the Collegiate Strength & Conditioning Coaches Association as a Master Strength & Conditioning Coach.



As Sean Payton entered the process of hiring his coaching staff, the new head coach looked for teachers with enthusiasm and expertise to lead each position group. Several, including defensive backs coach Tom Hayes, have also been coordinators in the past, bringing added experience and perspective to their units.

Hayes, the defensive coordinator at Stanford last season, has over 30 years of experience in the NFL and college. Prior to his stint at Stanford, Hayes has been a defensive coordinator at UCLA, Oklahoma and Kansas and coached the defensive backs of the Washington Redskins for five years.

Over his coaching career, Hayes has been a key component of teams that compiled a 10-3 record in bowl games, including three Rose Bowl victories. He has developed the skills of numerous all-conference and All-Americans and tutored 26 defensive backs who moved on to NFL rosters – including five No. 1 picks.

A list of the NFL standouts Hayes has worked with includes CBs Darrell Green, Cris Dishman and Champ Bailey while with the Redskins. At UCLA Hayes was a key part of establishing the school's history of top-notch – and NFL-bound – safeties by tutoring Kenny Easley, James Washington, Eric Turner and Carnell Lake. In his stint at Texas A&M, Hayes coached CB Kevin Smith.

Prior to coming to Stanford, Hayes spent the 2001 season at Kansas. He was the Jayhawks' defensive coordinator and secondary coach and for the final three games of the season he was interim head coach.

From 1995-99, Hayes served as the secondary coach of the Washington Redskins, working with a pair of Pro Bowl picks in Green and Dishman. He tutored Bailey in 1999 and the rookie was a Pro Bowl alternate.

Before joining the Redskins, Hayes spent four years (1991-94) as the defensive coordinator at Oklahoma, coaching under current Saints defensive coordinator Gary Gibbs. Before joining the Sooners staff, Hayes was assistant head coach at Texas A&M (1989-90). His previous experiences included nine seasons at UCLA (1980-88) – the last seven as defensive coordinator – a stretch where the Bruins won four Pac-10 titles.



Hobby comes to New Orleans for his first NFL assignment after serving in the same capacity at Clemson in 2005. It was the latest in an 11-year college coaching career where Hobby has established himself as a top-notch teacher and motivator. Last season Clemson ranked 11th in the nation in points allowed and posted a bowl victory.

He joined the Tigers after a six-year stint at Mississippi (1999-2004) where he served as defensive line coach and was part of the rapid improvement in the Rebels' fortunes on the field, as they compiled a 44-29 record during his tenure and ranked fourth in the nation in rushing defense in 1999.

Hobby entered coaching in 1995, working with the defensive tackles at Tennessee-Martin. A year later he went to Southwest Louisiana for two seasons (1996-97), tutoring defensive tackles in 1997 and serving as head strength & conditioning coach his first season at the school.

In 1998 he returned to his alma mater, Tennessee, to serve as an assistant strength

and conditioning coach. The Volunteers won the national championship that year.



On every level of the game, few can match the stable of wide receivers Curtis Johnson has helped produce over the last decade. He has returned to the city where he was born and raised to continue that tradition.

Johnson's reputation as a coach who helps players reach their potential doesn't come without effort, as

few coaches are more hands-on in their teaching methods or bring more energy to the practice field.

Johnson arrives in New Orleans after serving as the wide receivers coach at the University of Miami from 1996-2005. The group of standouts under his direction while at Miami and his prior stop at San Diego State includes some of the top wide receivers over the last decade. Among those he has tutored are NFL No. 1 picks Andre Johnson, Santana Moss, Reggie Wayne, Yatil Green and Darnay Scott. Miami WR Sinorice Moss was selected in the second round by the New York Giants this year.

At Miami, Johnson was part of a staff that went to nine bowl games and won the

2001 National Championship. He polished the skills of at least one All-Big East performer each season from 1996-2005, including Johnson – the third overall pick by Houston in 2003 – and Santana Moss, who became the Hurricanes' all-time leader in receiving yardage before making the Pro Bowl last year for Washington. Wayne ranks first in school history in catches and has posted consecutive 1,000-yard seasons at Indianapolis.

In his five-year stint at San Diego State (1989-93) Johnson landed some of the school's biggest recruits, including 2000 NFL MVP and fellow New Orleans native Marshall Faulk as well as Scott, who completed his eight-year NFL career with 408 grabs and 37 TDs. Each year Johnson was with the Aztecs the school had an all-conference performer at wide receiver.

Johnson began his coaching career as a receivers coach at Lewiston (Idaho) High School in 1984, serving for three seasons before holding a similar position at the University of Idaho. He spent 1987 and 1988 at the school before becoming receivers coach at San Diego State. His next stop was at Southern Methodist in 1994 before becoming wide receivers coach at the University of California, where he spent 1995 before arriving in Miami.

Johnson attended the University of Idaho and graduated in Physical Education in 1985. Born in New Orleans and a graduate of St. Charles HS, Johnson has four children, Janene (24), Kiejon (21), Curtis III (15) and Aaron (13).

TIGHT ENDS

Tight ends coach Terry Malone arrived in New Orleans after a nine-year stint with the University of Michigan, including the last four seasons as the Wolverines' offensive coordinator/tight ends.

Malone worked at Michigan from 1997-2005, and during his tenure as coordinator the school had 14 All-Big 10 selections and four All-Americans. The Wolverines had back-to-back conference Player of the Year winners (Chris Perry, 2003 and Braylon Edwards, 2004). During Malone's nine seasons at the school, Michigan won five Big 10 championships and appeared in eight New Year's Day bowl games.

COACHING STAFF

In 2004, the offense ranked second in the Big 10 and 24th in the nation in scoring by averaging over 30 points per contest. The Wolverines were led by Rimington Trophy co-recipient David Baas and Biletnikoff Award winner Edwards. QB Chad Henne became the first true freshman in Big 10 history to lead his squad to a conference title and was the first to start a Rose Bowl.

In 2003, Malone was named a finalist for the Broyles award, recognizing the top college assistant. It was a fitting honor, as the Wolverines tied for 12th nationally in scoring (35.4 avg.) and 15th in total offense (446.7 avg.) while setting school records in every passing category. Michigan led the Big Ten in passing offense per game (270.8 avg.) for the first time since 1948 set school marks for total yards (5,807) en route to the Big Ten title.

Malone began his years at Michigan as offensive line coach, with the Wolverines winning the 1997 national title in his first season. His offensive line allowed a conference-low 18 sacks. He would tutor the offensive front until being promoted to offensive coordinator in 2001.

Michigan had three NFL draft picks in 2001, including No. 1 picks Steve Hutchinson and Jeff Backus and second-rounder Maurice Williams. The offensive linemen from that group paved the way for RB Anthony Thomas to break all of the Wolverines' rushing yardage and touchdowns records.

Two Malone-coached players have been recognized as the Big Ten Offensive Lineman of the Year: Jon Jansen (1997) and Hutchinson (2000). Hutchinson became just the fourth player in conference history to earn All-Big Ten first team honors after all four years.


Malone arrived at Ann Arbor after spending 1996 as offensive line coach at Boston College on the staff of Head Coach Dan Henning. Prior to that season, Malone was an assistant at Bowling Green from 1986-95 and coached the offensive line or tight ends for all 10 seasons. He took on the additional responsibility of offensive coordinator.

Before returning to his alma mater, Holy Cross, in 1985 to tutor the tight ends, Malone opened his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Arizona.

A native of Redford, Mich., Malone went to Holy Cross and started four seasons at tight end. Malone was the Crusaders' captain as a senior. He earned a degree in history from Holy Cross (1983). Malone and his wife, Ann, have four children, Kara, Patrick, Ryan and Natalie.

Evidence of the importance of special teams play to Coach Sean Payton, Greg McMahon was added to the staff in February to serve as assistant special teams coach, giving the club a two-man staff for the return, coverage and kicking units. He works closely with special teams coordinator John Bonamengo and joined the Saints after a one-year stint as tight ends/special teams coach at East Carolina.

In 2005, McMahon played a key role in ECU's improvement on special teams and offense. The Pirates place-kicker, Robert Lee, finished in the top 20 in the nation in field goal accuracy (17 of 19) and had a pair of solid return men. As tight ends coach, McMahon was part of an offensive staff that directed East Carolina to the fourth-highest passing total in school history (2,816 yards) and averaged over 393 total yards per contest.

Prior to 2005, McMahon spent 13 years at the University of Illinois (1992-2004), working primarily with the special teams, tight ends and wide receivers. In 1997, he took on the additional responsibility of overseeing the special teams. His efforts were integral in Illinois making four bowl appearances and twice appearing in the final national rankings, and in 2001 the school finished 10-2 and captured the Big Ten title.

Based on the records his units established, the play of the special teams during McMahon's years at Illinois are unmatched in school history. Illinois blocked 16 kicks from 2001-04 and accounted for nine touchdowns. K Neil Rackers, now with the Arizona Cardinals, and punt return yardage leader Eugene Wilson (New England Patriots) both benefited from McMahon's guidance. Players under his direction included the school leaders in career punting average, single-season scoring and all-time punt return yardage.

McMahon, 46, came to Illinois in 1992 from Nevada-Las Vegas, where he spent two years as special teams coordinator as well as coaching offensive tackles and tight ends. He also had stints with Valdosta (Ga.) State, Southern Illinois, North Alabama and Minnesota.

As a defensive back at Eastern Illinois, he was a member of two teams that played for the NCAA Division II National Championship. The Panthers won the title in 1978 and went to the championship game again two years later. McMahon earned a degree in psychology from EIU in 1983.

McMahon and wife, Linda, are the parents of sons Drew and Sam and daughter Lisa. Drew is currently a member of the Illinois football program.

John Morton begins his first season in New Orleans as offensive assistant/passing game coach. He is responsible for assisting head coach Sean Payton as well as the entire offensive staff in the passing game and game preparation.

Morton brings a diverse coaching resume to his position, including extensive NFL postseason experience. While with Oakland from 1997-2004, the Raiders appeared in Super Bowl XXXVII and a pair of AFC Championship Games (2001 and 2003). Morton was also a member of the AFC coaching staff for the 2001 Pro Bowl.

He comes to the Saints after serving as the passing game coordinator/wide receivers coach under head coach Jim Harbaugh at the University of San Diego in 2005. The Toreos recorded an 11-1 record, captured the Pioneer Football League championship and ranked first in NCAA Division I-AA in total offense.

Morton arrived at USD after spending seven seasons in several capacities with the Raiders, including 2004 as tight ends coach under head coach Norv Turner. During the 2002-03 seasons he was a senior offensive assistant/assistant wide receivers coach under head coach Bill Callahan and offensive coordinator Marc Trestman. From 1998-2001, Morton was offensive quality control/assistant wide receivers coach under head coach Jon Gruden and wide receivers coach Fred Biletnikoff. In that position, Morton worked with Jerry Rice and Tim Brown, two of the finest and most prolific wide receivers in NFL history.

The 36-year-old Morton also spent 1997 working in the Raiders personnel department under owner Al Davis and senior assistant Bruce Allen. The experience came after Morton played wide receiver for the NFL Frankfurt Galaxy in the spring of 1997.

He originally signed with Oakland as an undrafted rookie in 1993 and spent parts



In 2005, the Texans' secondary allowed the second-fewest passing yards (3,521) in team history. In 2004, Oden's efforts were rewarded when Houston's secondary intercepted 18 passes, with CB Dunta Robinson leading all NFL rookies with six.

Oden tutored the defensive backs in 2003 at Eastern Michigan. He worked at East Carolina prior to his two seasons at EMU, serving as outside linebackers coach in 2000, secondary coach in 2001 and safeties coach in 2002. Each year he also was an assistant with the special teams.

Before to his stint with Eastern Michigan Oden spent two seasons at West Point

NFL CAREER – The Saints signed the key component for Coach Sean Payton’s offense by inking Brees to a six-year contract early in the free agency period. By bringing in one of the top free agents available, the Saints landed a leader in the prime of his career who has ranked among the NFL’s top quarterbacks over the last two years. Since 2004, Brees led the San Diego Chargers to a 21-11 record during the regular season while completing 585 of 900 passes for 6,735 yards with 51 touchdown passes and a scant 22 interceptions. His 65 percent completion percentage from 2004-05 is second to Indianapolis QB Peyton Manning, and he ranks fourth in the NFL in touchdown passes and fourth in interception percentage (2.4). A 2004 Pro Bowl selection, Brees departed as San Diego’s all-time leader for career completion percentage (62.2). In 2004, he led the Chargers to a 12-4 record and their first AFC title since 1994 by completing 262 of 400 passes (65.5 pct.) for 3,159 yards, with 27 touchdown passes and seven interceptions. He set a team record and finished third in the NFL with a passer rating of 104.8 and earned a host of awards, including the Associated Press Comeback Player of the Year.

NFL CAREER – In six seasons with the Saints, the four-time Pro Bowl selection has emerged as one of the NFL's most consistent wide receivers and has shattered several team records in the process. No player in club history approaches Horn's six-year totals of 486 catches for 6,943 yards and 46 touchdowns. Despite missing three games and the majority of another with a hamstring injury that limited his production in 2005, Horn finished second on the team with 49 catches for 654 yards and a touchdown. The 11th year veteran had one of his finest seasons in 2004, tying for the NFC lead with 94 catches (the ranking is the highest for a Saints player, and the total tied the club record he established in 2000) and finishing second in the conference with a career-high 1,399 yards – another Saints single-season best. Horn also hauled in a team-record 11 TDs to rank fifth in the NFC – the second-straight year he posted double-digit touchdown totals, a feat unequalled by a Saints' player. He has 25 games with at least 100 yards receiving for New Orleans, a club mark for reaching the milestone, and enters 2006 second in career totals in nearly every other major receiving category.

The most productive free-agent acquisition in club history has made an assault on the Saints' all-time receiving records since joining the Saints in 2000.

Horn has posted a team-record 25 games with 100 or more yards receiving, and the Saints are 18-7 when he reaches the milestone. He also has nine games with two or more touchdowns.

Four-time Pro Bowl pick – 2000, 2001, 2002 and 2004 – ranking as the lone skill position player in club history to be voted to the postseason all-star game so often.

He has recorded 46 touchdowns with New Orleans, the third-highest total in team record books.

Horn ranks as the only player in franchise history to record 75 or more catches in five-straight seasons, including tying for the NFC lead in 2004 with a team-record 94 grabs, a total he equaled in the 2000 season.

NFL CAREER – Returns to action in 2006 after missing the final 11 games of 2005 with a right knee injury. The sixth-year veteran was one of the NFL's most productive running backs from 2002-04, rushing for over 1,000 yards each year – the stretch of three-straight was a first in club history – as the centerpiece of the offensive attack. He ranks first in team record books with 4,529 rushing yards and having 23 100-yard games, including reaching the milestone in a franchise record nine-straight contests in 2003. Including 516 yards on a career-high 69 receptions, McAllister posted 2,157 yards from scrimmage that season to set a club record and rank second in the NFC. All of these accomplishments were a stunning encore to 2002, when in his first year as a starter he led the conference with 1,388 rushing yards, scored 16 TDs and was voted to his first Pro Bowl. McAllister is the lone Saints' running back to be voted to the Pro Bowl in consecutive seasons.

Emerged as one of the NFL’s top players in 2003, when he rushed for a career-high 1,641 yards, including nine-straight 100-yard performances. With 2,157 yards from scrimmage, McAllister became the first player in franchise record books to surpass 2,000 in a season.

Has posted 5,326 yards from scrimmage (4,438 rushing, 1,213 receiving) and 36 touchdowns since becoming a starter in the 2002, a span where he has appeared in 49 games.

Selected to the Pro Bowl in 2002 and 2003 and was voted an alternate in 2004.

During a particularly torrid stretch of 2003, McAllister became one of only a three players in NFL history to record over 190 yards from scrimmage in three-straight games, joining Hall of Fame RBs Walter Payton (1977) and Jim Brown (1962-63).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR

K **John Carney** enters this season ranked seventh on the NFL all-time scoring list. He needs 66 points to pass K Jan Stenerud (1,699 points) for sixth place and 78 to move past K Nick Lowery (1,711 points) for fifth. Carney can become only the second kicker in Saints History to make 150 field goals with the club. He needs 23 field goals made to reach the mark and join K Morten Andersen (302, 1982-94).

With 30 since 2001, DE **Charles Grant** needs 10 sacks to move into 10th on the clubs' all-time sack list to move past DE Bruce Clark (39.5 sacks).

WR **Joe Horn** needs three touchdown receptions to become the club's all-time leader in scoring catches, moving past WR Eric Martin (1986-93) with 48. Horn needs eight TDs to become the Saints' all-time leader in total touchdowns scored, moving past Martin and RB Dalton Hilliard (53, 1985-93)). Horn needs 14 receptions to become only the second player in franchise history to reach 500 receptions, joining Martin (532). He needs 47 receptions to pass Martin as the team's all-time leader in receptions and 912 yards to surpass Martin (7,854) for first in receiving yards. With 892 yards from scrimmage, Horn will pass Martin (7,865) to become the all-time leader in the category.

WR **Michael Lewis** needs 24 kickoff returns for 728 yards to become the Saints' all-time leader in both categories (CB Tyrone Hughes, 1993-96, 229 kick returns for 5,717 yards.) Lewis needs 14 punt/kickoff returns and 418 return yards to move past Hughes (345 for 6,777) into first for combined kickoff returns and yards.

RB **Deuce McAllister**, already the club's all-time rushing leader with 4,529 yards, needs 73 rushing attempts to surpass Hilliard (1,126) to move into first for all-time carries. McAllister, second in team record books in rushing touchdowns with 34, needs six to become the all time leader (Hilliard, 39).

! WORTHNOTING

COMING OF AGE

The Saints' No. 1 pick in 2004, DE **Will Smith** has become an impact player and is expected to be a leader of the defensive front this season. In 2005, Smith led the Saints with 8.5 sacks despite starting only nine of the 16 games he appeared in. Over his first two seasons, Smith has recorded 144 tackles (107 solo), 16 sacks, seven forced fumbles and a pair of fumble recoveries. Smith caused a fumble in five-straight contests (the last four of 2004 and the opener of 2005), becoming the first player in club history to achieve the feat. Including his 8.5 in 2005, Grant has the third-highest sack total for a Saints defender after their first two NFL seasons:

WHAT TO LOOK FOR

RB **Fred McAfee** has played in 118 games with the Saints. He needs to appear in two games to tie him for 20th on the all-time games played list with LB Vaughn Johnson (120, 1986-93)

WR **Donté Stallworth** enters 2006 ranked ninth on the club's all-time receptions list with 195. He needs 13 grabs to move past TE Henry Childs (207, 1974-80) for eighth. With 2,791 since 2001, Stallworth is primed to make a big jump on the club's receiving yardage list. He needs 11 yards to move past WR Wes Chandler (1978-81, 2,801) for seventh. With 434 yards this season, Stallworth will eclipse Childs (3,224), and he needs 967 to surpass WR Quinn Early (1991-95). With 1,059 yards in 2006, Stallworth will move past TE Hoby Brenner (1981-93) for fourth in team history.

CB **Fred Thomas** has 12 interceptions since joining the Saints in 2000. He is currently tied with S Frank Wattleet (1981-87) for 10th in team history and needs three interceptions to move into a tie for eighth with CB Ernie Jackson (1972-77) and S Brett Maxie (1985-93).

HEADING TO CAMP

The Saints are holding training camp this season at Millsaps College in Jackson, Miss. After holding their previous three camps at their Metairie training facility, the team will prepare for the coming season on the college campus and bring NFL football to the club's many fans in central Mississippi.

Jackson will be the sixth site for training camp since Tom Benson purchased the club in 1985. In addition to the team's headquarters, the Saints have also held camp in Ruston, La. (1985), Hammond, La. (1986-87), LaCrosse, Wis. (1988-99) and Thibodaux, La. (2000-02).

The entire squad will report to the Millsaps campus on Thursday, July 27, with practice beginning the following day. The team will remain in Jackson until the preseason game against the Indianapolis Colts at Mississippi Veterans Memorial Stadium on Saturday, August 26.

Millsaps College is an NCAA Division III school with a student enrollment of 1,123. The campus, located north of downtown Jackson, offers multiple natural grass fields for practice along with an artificial field similar to the one in the Louisiana Superdome.

NFC PLAYER OF THE WEEK AWARDS:

NFC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Oct. 9: Saints 19, Buffalo Bills 9 - DE Darren Howard was a top performer on a Saints defense that helped the team improve to 2-2. He posted five tackles, a pair of sacks, a forced fumble and batted down a pass in the win, aiding the Saints in limiting the Bills to 67 passing yards - the lowest total surrendered by New Orleans since allowing 20 passing yards against the Kansas City Chiefs on December 21, 1997. Howard helped the defense play its best in the fourth quarter, as the team did not allow a touchdown.

2005 NFC SPECIAL TEAMS PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Week 1: Saints 23, Carolina Panthers 20 - K John Carney booted three field goals (29, 48, 47), the final being the game-winning kick with three seconds remaining at Bank of America Stadium. He had 11 points in the contest. It was his fifth game-winning field goal with New Orleans since joining the club in 2001, and the 13th of his career. He also reached 460 career points with the Saints in the contest. It was the 10th time in Carney's career that he has booted a game-winner with less than 10 seconds remaining in a contest.

The Saints set an NFL record for having consecutive winners of the NFC Special Teams Player of the Week award when Carney was honored following the Week One victory. That streak came to a close when the club didn't have anyone win the award at the New York Giants in Week Two. New Orleans closed 2004 with four-straight winners, which was a first for the Saints and was tied for the most consecutive winners in the NFL since the inception of the award in 1993 (tied with the Kansas City Chiefs, as WR Dante Hall won the award in Weeks Two through Five in 2003).


ED BLOCK COURAGE AWARD

The New Orleans Saints athletic training staff honored the efforts of the coaches, players and staff in the wake of Hurricane Katrina last season by selecting

the entire organization as the recipient of the 2005 Ed Block Courage Award. The honor is typically bestowed in a vote by teammates on a player from all 32 teams who best exemplifies the principles of sportsmanship and courage in the face of the adversity, but the club's athletic trainers decided in a group meeting that every employee of the Saints had fit that description following the storm and the organization's forced move to San Antonio. Awarding the honor to an entire staff was a first. The Ed Block Courage Award has become one of the most esteemed honors presented to an NFL player over its 28-year existence. Recipients embody everything that is constructive about pro athletes as they conduct themselves as positive role models within their communities and serve as an inspiration to their teammates. They are often players who have overcome devastating injuries or obstacles in their professional or personal lives to return to the playing field. In an unrelated honor bestowed upon the Saints, Patout and his staff - which includes assistant athletic trainers Kevin Mangum and Duane Brooks and training assistants Reggie Stone and Chad Hennessey - were voted the 2005 Athletic Training Staff of the Year by the Professional Football Athletes Trainers Society. Each NFL team's training personnel votes on the staff they believe is most deserving for outstanding service and treatment to the players.

The Saints equipment staff was also honored following the 2005 season, with the department being selected as the Whitley Zimmerman Memorial Award winner for 2005 in a vote by their peers. The annual award is presented to the NFL equipment staff that exceeds the usual demands of the profession with excellent service and by responding to adversity. Last season, the equipment staff - not responsible for all details that go into filling an NFL team's needs, from uniforms to transporting the gear for road trips to the practice field arrangement - overcame extraordinary challenges and issues in the forced evacuation from New Orleans because of Hurricane Katrina. The staff - Equipment Manager Duane Simmons, Assistant Equipment Manager Glennon "Silly" Powell and equipment assistants Eddie Falgout, John Baumgartner and Corey Gaudet - were forced to move their base of operations several times. The equipment staff made a seamless transition on each occasion.

K John Carney was voted NFC Special Teams Player of the Week following the Saints' 23-20 victory in the season opener at Carolina. Carney's 47-yard kick was his fifth game-winner since he joined the club in 2001.

In a game that became a national storyline following the club's forced evacuation from New Orleans in the wake of Hurricane Katrina, the Saints earned an inspirational victory at Carolina. The opening-day win was a first for the Saints since 2002.

The outcome was decided by K **John Carney**, who drilled a 47-yard field goal with three seconds left at Bank of America Stadium. Carney's FG capped a six-play, 49-yard drive after Carolina had tied the contest with 1:04 remaining on a 46-yard FG by K **John Kasay**.

The Panthers knotted the score at 20-20 on a pair of kicks by Kasay, but Carney's third FG was the difference.

The Saints took the opening kick and capped a 15-play, 80-yard drive with a four-yard TD run by RB **Deuce McAllister** for a 7-0 lead.

Carolina tied the game on their first possession, driving 83 yards on nine plays. QB **Jake Delhomme** hit WR **Steve Smith** on a 33-yard touchdown pass to cap the drive.

New Orleans reclaimed the lead

with 4:37 to go in the second quarter, when McAllister rushed for his second TD, bulling into the endzone from two yards out for a 14-7 advantage.

! GAMENOTES

Game balls for the memorable victory were presented by the organization to the city of New Orleans and the entire Gulf Coast region.

Including the final four games of 2004, DE **Will Smith** caused a fumble for the fifth-straight game, becoming the first player in club history to do so.

TE **Ernie Conwell** tied a career high with six grabs for 71 yards, despite leaving with a concussion and displaced jaw in the third quarter.

In the third quarter, an interception by CB **Jason Craft** set up a 29-yard field goal by Carney for a 17-7 lead.

Late in the quarter, the Panthers pulled within three when RB **Stephen Davis** ran for a short touchdown with 21 seconds to play.

Carney's second field goal, a 48-yarder, extended the New Orleans lead to 20-14 with 11:56 remaining in the contest.

New York QB **Eli Manning** completed 13-of-24 passes for 165 yards and a TD while RB **Tiki Barber**, who finished with 22 carries for 83 yards, ran for a touchdown and turned a reception into another TD.

New Orleans lost its first fumble on the opening kickoff on a lateral, setting up a quick TD for the Giants.

After the Saints were forced to punt on their next possession, the Giants drove 76 yards in 11 plays. Manning capped the drive with a six-yard strike to Barber for the TD with 10:23 remaining in the half.

New Orleans marched 86 yards in six plays, capped by an acrobatic catch by WR **Joe Horn** for a 21-yard TD with 14:11 to play in the second

quarter as New Orleans cut the Giants lead to 14-7.

Barber had a 12-yard TD run with 1:54 left in the second quarter, and **K John Carney** added a 21-yard FG right at the half.

GAMENOTES

RB Deuce McAllister took over the top spot (4,268 yards) on the club's career rushing list. The record came on a seven-yard gain with 10:23 remaining in the opening quarter.

The Saints responded to a first-quarter, 37-yard Peterson FG with a 24-yard touchdown run by RB **Antowain Smith** and a FG by K **John Carney** to take a 10-3 lead.

Atlanta had two returns for TDs in the half's final 4:04, with CB **DeAngelo Hall's** 66-yard return of a Smith fumble and LB **Denario Williams'** 59-yard touchdown off a

blocked field goal as time expired. Smith tied the game with his second TD run in the third quarter.

! GAMENOTES

For the 18th time since 1990, the outcome between the NFC South rivals was decided by a TD or less.

The Saints tied a club record with 32 first downs, previously set vs. Atlanta on Jan. 2, 1983. New Orleans had 456 total yards to Atlanta's 266 overall.

The Saints recorded a total of 211 net rushing yards, the most for New Orleans since a 216-yard output at San Francisco Dec. 10, 2000.

Atlanta QB **Michael Vick** found FB **Justin Griffith** for a 12-yard scoring pass to take a 24-17 lead early in the fourth quarter. New Orleans tied the game when QB **Aaron Brooks** connected with WR **Donte' Stallworth** for a 27-yard strike.

Atlanta RB **Warrick Dunn** gave Atlanta a 31-24 lead with a 21-yard TD run with 4:37 left. New Orleans tied the game when Brooks found Henderson and set up the dramatic ending.

A 21-point fourth quarter and a controversial play that went against New Orleans prior to the two-minute warning combined to sink the Saints in a game where the club had initially jumped out to a 14-0 lead.

Touchdown receptions by WR **Donte' Stallworth** and WR **Az-Zahir Hakim** gave the Saints a 14-7 lead when the fourth quarter began, but the Rams rallied to go ahead 21-17, after a five-yard TD run by WR **Kevin Curtis** with 5:58 left in the game.

In the Saints' ensuing fourth-quarter drive, a defensive holding penalty on St. Louis gave the Saints a first down at New Orleans 42. With 2:10 remaining, Brooks went up top for TE **Ernie Conwell**, an apparent completion where replays appeared to show the tight end had possession of the ball as he fell at the Rams 33.

The ball was taken from his hands by St. Louis S **Mike Furrey**, who raced 67 yards for a TD with 1:55 left

and ended New Orleans' attempt for its fourth straight win at the Edward Jones Dome.



GAME NOTES

The Saints had won three straight at St. Louis prior to 2005. Before the Rams victory, the host team in the series had lost the last six regular-season games.

The Saints converted 5-of-6 third downs in the first quarter but were just 1-of-10 for the rest of the contest.

The Saints out-gained the Rams, 332-298 and had 75 plays to St. Louis' 57.

Because the play began prior to the two-minute warning, there was no automatic replay and the Saints could not challenge because the club was out of timeouts.

Brooks completed 18 of 39 passes for 230 yards with two TDs and an interception. His top target was Hakim, who had six grabs for 100 yards and a TD against the team he played for from 1998-2001.



Russ BALL

VICE PRESIDENT OF FOOTBALL ADMINISTRATION

In the NFL, two qualities form the bookends of each club's yearly efforts to build the most talented team — personnel evaluation and making each contract fit within the structure of the salary cap. With the Saints, Vice President of Football Administration Russ Ball has the complicated responsibility of making those contracts work within the salary cap's confines.

From veteran free agents to re-signing young players, Ball has been an important part of the Saints having one of the healthiest cap positions in the NFL. A contributing factor in the club's success been Ball's research of contracts and cap statistics from not only the Saints but from around the league.

His primary duties are monitoring the salary cap, contract negotiations and roster management — including confirming the Saints are in compliance with NFL and Management Council rules and regulations — but Ball is also a highly-respected executive within the club and an advisor on all major football decisions. Entering his fifth season with the Saints since joining the club in 2002 and 18th in the league, Ball also coordinates different areas of the football operations and is involved in the administrative functions of running the franchise.

Ball arrived in New Orleans after spending 2001 as director of football administration for the Washington Redskins. In that position, he assisted then-head coach Marty Schottenheimer in handling the football responsibilities of a franchise. His duties included managing the salary cap as well as team operations — including overseeing the video, athletic training, equipment, strength & conditioning and player development departments as well as their respective budgets.

From 1999-2000, Ball served in a similar capacity for the Minnesota Vikings, where he was responsible for assisting with player contracts and salary cap management as senior football administrator. Before arriving in Minneapolis, Ball spent 10 seasons in Kansas City. He started his career with the Chiefs as assistant strength & conditioning coach, a position he held for eight years. In his final two seasons with the Chiefs, Ball worked under Schottenheimer in football operations.

Prior to joining the Chiefs, Ball served as head strength & conditioning coach at the University of Missouri from 1982-89. He was a four-year letterman as a center at Central Missouri State University. Ball was selected by the Saints in 2005 to attend the NFL Managers Program at Stanford University's Executive Education Graduate School of Business. He earned a masters degree in human performance from the University of Missouri in 1990, after receiving an undergraduate degree from Central Missouri State in 1981. He and his wife, Diana, have two children, Joe and Andrea.



Rick MUELLER

VICE PRESIDENT OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

Vice President of Player Personnel Rick Mueller spearheads the Saints' continuous efforts to build a talented, productive roster of players. Those duties range from evaluating current and future NFL free agents to studying college prospects. Mueller is responsible for all aspects of scouting and evaluations, with duties that include supervising and coordinating the organization's college and pro scouts and his responsibilities peak each year when running the Saints' draft room.

Entering his seventh season in New Orleans, Mueller has helped shape the club's last six drafts and free-agent classes, which now form the foundation of the team. Mueller came to the team following a six-year stint with the Jacksonville Jaguars, where he was instrumental in their rapid rise from expansion franchise in 1995 to AFC powerhouse.

From 1996-99, Jacksonville captured two AFC Central Division titles and played in a pair of conference championships. Mueller served as the Jaguars' Director of College Scouting in 1998-99 and was in charge of his initial college draft in 1999. Prior to being promoted, Mueller was Jacksonville's college scout for the Western United States.

In 1993, Mueller served as Director of Player Personnel and wide receivers coach for the CFL Sacramento Gold Miners. In the spring and summer of 1992, he worked as defensive assistant and special teams coach for the World League's Sacramento Surge. The Surge finished 8-2 and captured the World Bowl Championship.

Following that season, Mueller was one of five pro scouts for the World League. Working for the Surge was Mueller's first pro assignment after serving as a graduate assistant at Washington State University from 1990-92 where he served as quarterbacks coach, head junior varsity coach and recruiting coordinator. Mueller began his career as a training camp assistant with the Seattle Seahawks from 1985-90.

A graduate of the University of Puget Sound (Wash.), Mueller was a three-year starter at quarterback. He received a bachelor's degree in communications in 1990 and also attended graduate school, studying communications while coaching at Washington State from 1990-92.

Mueller and his wife, Andrea, have twin sons, Chase and Rhett, and a daughter, Emry.




James NAGAOKA

While he works primarily in the background, Director of Operations James Nagaoka oversees all aspects of the day-to-day functions and logistics of the football team, a wealth of duties that demands organization and a commitment to details.

He brings over 25 years of NFL experience to his post, including the last six seasons with the Saints. Nagaoka was promoted to his current position after serving as director of team logistics/box office manager following his arrival in New Orleans in 2000.

He is a graduate of the University of Washington, with degrees in communications and Japanese literature.



Ricky PORTER
DIRECTOR OF PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Providing a trusted channel for players in their dealings with coaches and management, Director of Player

Development Ricky Porter enters his seventh year with the Saints. He also provides a comprehensive career development program to build a smooth transition for players who are either coming into or adjusting to life following their NFL careers.

Included in those duties are life skills training seminars, continuing education opportunities for college graduation, internships, financial education classes and family assistance. His duties aren't limited to off-field responsibilities, however, as Porter also has a role in developing the talents of the team's kick and punt return specialists.

He has a well-rounded football resume: Porter served for three years on the Denver Broncos' coaching staff, starting in 1997 as an offensive assistant and spent 1996 in the same capacity with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Prior to that, Porter worked as a scout for National Football Scouting in 1995, assessing talent in the Ohio Valley region.

Porter also has previous NFL coaching experience with Buffalo (1991), New Orleans (1993) and Detroit (1994) through the NFL Minority Coaching Fellowship Program. His first full-time experience came at his alma mater, Slippery Rock State, where he coached running backs and special teams in 1990-91 before handling those duties at Kent State from 1992-93.

Porter played for five years in the NFL with Detroit (1982), Baltimore (1983) and Buffalo (1987-89). He also played for the USFL Memphis Showboats in 1985 and the CFL Montreal Alouettes from 1986-87.

A member of the Slippery Rock Sports Hall of Fame, Porter was the first player drafted from the Division II program when he was chosen by Detroit in 1982. As a senior, he led the nation in rushing while also participating on the school's baseball and track teams. In 1990, he was a member of the Baltimore Orioles' AAA Rochester Red Wings.

Porter holds a bachelor's degree in communications from Slippery Rock and a master's degree in athletic administration from Kent State.

Rick Reiprish, an experienced, knowledgeable addition to the Saints' personnel department in 2004, brings 27 years of NFL experience to his post as college scouting director. His responsibilities include coordinating the club's staff of scouts and evaluating hundreds of college prospects in preparation for each year's draft.

Reiprish joined the Saints following an eight-year stint (1994-2002) with Jacksonville, where he was an architect of the Jaguars' rapid ascension to the top of the AFC. He was responsible for each the team's drafts since its inaugural effort in 1995, selecting such stalwarts as T Tony Boselli, DE Tony Brackens, RB Fred Taylor, S Donovan Darius and CB Fernando Bryant. Of the team's seven first-round picks from 1995 to 1999, each became a starter, more than any other NFL team in that span.

Originally hired as the Jaguars Director of College Scouting in 1994, Reiprish was promoted to director of player personnel in 1998. He was responsible for the pro and college scouting departments, including directing the scouting of college players and the draft as well as the evaluation of veteran free agents.

Reiprish joined the Jaguars after working for the Seattle Seahawks for 10 years (1984-94), first as an area scout before being promoted to Eastern Scout Supervisor in 1989. He began his NFL career as a southeast scout with BLESTO from 1979-82. For the previous three years, he was a personnel scout for the Kansas City Chiefs.

Reiprish coached wide receivers and running backs at Austin Peay University (1973-76) before going to East Tennessee in 1977, where he coached quarterbacks and running backs. In 1978, he was offensive line coach at North Alabama.

Born Sept. 14, 1950 in Shamokin, Pa., Reiprish graduated from Villanova in 1972 and earned a master's degree in education-administration and supervision from Austin Peay in 1974. He and his wife, Janet, have a son, Andrew.




Ryan PACE





Dan SIMMONS
HEAD EQUIPMENT MANAGER

Known to all at the club's training facility as "Chief," equipment manager Dan Simmons is in his fourth decade of employment with the New Orleans Saints. In 2002, Simmons was honored by the organization for his 30th season with the club, becoming only the second employee to reach the level of service since the team's founding in 1967.

Following 2005, Simmons and his staff were selected in a vote by their peers for the Whitey Zimmerman Memorial Award, annually given to the NFL equipment staff that exceeds the usual demands of the profession with excellent service and by responding to adversity. Simmons was also the first recipient of the award in 1994.

The equipment staff overcame extraordinary challenges and issues in the forced evacuation from New Orleans because of Hurricane Katrina. After departing New Orleans, the club's base of operation moved three times, including a last stop at a high-school baseball stadium. The equipment staff made those moves nearly seamless for the team, and with four home games in Baton Rouge, nearly every contest demanded the packing and preparation of a road game.

Simmons was hired for his current position on April 1, 1973 and has been with the organization longer than any other current employee. He is responsible for the details that go into an NFL team's daily needs, including the purchase, upkeep and repair of equipment and uniforms for players and coaches, transportation of that equipment to and from all road trips and the daily practice field arrangement.

Dedication to an NFL team runs in his blood. His father, Bill, started the tradition by holding a similar post with the St. Louis Cardinals for 22 years. 



COMING OF AGE

The Saints' No. 1 pick in 2004, DE Will Smith has become an impact player and is expected to be a leader of the defensive front this season. In 2005, Smith led the Saints with 8.5 sacks despite starting only nine of the 16 games he appeared in. Over his first two seasons, Smith has recorded 144 tackles (107 solo), 16 sacks, seven forced fumbles and a pair of fumble recoveries. Smith caused a fumble in five-straight contests (the last four of 2004 and the opener of 2005), becoming the first player in club history to achieve the feat. Including his 8.5 in 2005, Grant has the third-highest sack total for a Saints defender after their first two NFL seasons:



In 2005 the Saints pass defense ranked third in the NFL, surrendering 178.1 yards per game to opponents. This was the team's highest ranking in that category since the team finished ranked third against the pass in 1996 (171.1).

No. 1 pick Jammal Brown started 13 games at right tackle and second-round pick Josh Bullocks started 13 games at safety. 

1985

Jan. 27 - LB **Rickey Jackson**, DE **Bruce Clark** and P **Brian Hansen** represent the Saints at the Pro Bowl; **Feb. 14** - Negotiations for the sale of the Saints between **John Mecom, Jr.** and Chicago's **A.N. Pritzker** broke off, suddenly thrusting **Tom Benson**, negotiating in a secondary position for several weeks, to the forefront; **March 12** - New Orleansian **Tom Benson** reached agreement with **John Mecom, Jr.** for the sale of the Saints; **April 26** - Saints traded RB **George Rogers** and their 5th, 10th, and 11th round selections in the 1985 draft to the Washington Redskins for their top draft pick; **April 30** - Saints select Tennessee LB **Alvin Toles** as their first selection in the NFL draft; **May 31** - Ownership was transferred from **John W. (Bum) Phillips** resigned as his son, defensive coordinator **Wade Phillips**, was named interim head coach, the ninth head coach in club history.

Jan. 14 - With Benson now able to insert his management team, **Jim Finks** is named president/general manager of the Saints and joined in franchise ownership; **Jan. 22** - Interim head coach **Wade Phillips** and assistant coaches were released from their duties; **Jan 28** - **Jim Mora** named the Saints' 10th head coach; **April 29** - Saints selected Virginia T **Jim Dombrowski** with their first pick in the NFL draft; **July 19** - RB **Earl Campbell** announced his retirement; **Sept. 21** - **Mel Gray** broke team record with 101-yard kickoff return for a TD at San Francisco ... the return was the Saints' first for a score since 1977; **Nov. 9** - Saints record fifth shutout in team history, holding L.A. April 28 - Saints selected Brigham Young DE **Shawn Knight** as their first pick in the NFL draft; **Aug. 17** - FB **Hokie Gajan**, who attempted to come back from a 1985 knee injury, retired following an injury to his other knee; **Sept. 21** - NFL Players Association announced that players would be on strike following the weekend's games; **Oct. 4** - Saints defeated the L.A. Rams 37-10 in Superdome before 29,745 fans in club's first replacement game ... It was later announced that the Saints will host the Atlanta Falcons Sept. 25 on Monday Night Football; **Feb. 15** - Twenty-seven Louisiana business leaders join together to support the New Orleans Saints' return to the Crescent City to form the Saints Business Council; **March 14** - The Saints agreed to terms with former San Diego Chargers QB **Drew Brees** to a five-year contract, perhaps the most notable free-agent acquisition in team history; Saints equipment staff selected as Whitey Zimmerman Memorial Award winner for 2005 in a vote by their peers; **April 29** - Saints pick RB **Reggie Bush** second overall in the NFL Draft. Selecting the Heisman Trophy winner sets off a flurry of excitement throughout the Gulf South area.


A look at the statistical milestones the Saints set or continued in 2005:

OFFENSE

- **TOTAL 1ST DOWNS:** 312 in 2005. The Saints reached 300 for the third time since 2000.
- **PASSING FIRST DOWNS:** 182 in 2005. Exceeded output from 2003-04 (177 each), and the highest since posting 202 in 1995.
- **TIME OF POSSESSION:** 30:32 in 2005. The club maintained an advantage in controlling the clock for the third time since 2000.
- **TOTAL NET YARDS:** With 5,031 in 2005, the Saints posted their sixth-straight season of 5,000 yards or more, extending the club-record for consecutive seasons in reaching the milestone.
- **TOTAL PLAYS:** With 1,017 plays last season, the Saints recorded over 1,000 plays for the sixth time over the last seven years (1989 in 2004).
- **RUSHING PLAY AVERAGE:** 4.0 in 2005, extending a club record to six-straight seasons with an average of 4.0 or better.
- **PASSING GAME AVERAGE:** By posting an average of 208.9, the club notched its seventh-straight season with 200 or more, extending the club record in achieving the feat.
- **PASS COMPLETIONS:** 308 in 2005, marking the third-straight season of 300 or more, setting a new club record (two, 1994-95).
- **PASS COMPLETION PERCENTAGE:** By averaging a 55.8 completion rate, the Saints posted their sixth-straight season of 54.0 or better, tying the club mark from 1978-83 and 1991-96.
- **PUNTING AVERAGE:** 43.2 in 2005, marking the third-straight season of 43.0 or better, the most since a club-record four straight from 1991-94.
- **NET PUNTING AVERAGE:** 38.7 last season, extending the club mark to three-straight seasons of 38.0 or better.

DEFENSE

- **OPPONENT PASSING FIRST DOWNS:** The Saints allowed 145 first downs, the lowest total surrendered since giving up the same total in 1993.
- **OPPONENT TOTAL NET YARDS:** By giving up 4,994 yards on the season, the Saints allowed their lowest total since 2000 (4,743).
- **OPPONENT GAME NET YARDS:** 312.1, the lowest total allowed since 2000 (296.4).
- **OPPONENT NET YARDS RUSHING:** 2,145 in 2005, the lowest total given up since 2002 (1,991).
- **OPPONENT GAME RUSHING AVG:** 134.1 in 2005, lowest average for an opponent since 2002 (124.4).
- **OPPONENT PLAY RUSHING AVERAGE:** The Saints allowed an average of 4.3 per carry, the lowest since 2001 (3.9).
- **OPPONENT PASS COMPLETIONS:** 241 in 2005, lowest by an opponent in a non-strike season since allowing 239 in 1984.
- **OPPONENT OPPONENT PASSING TDS:** 20 in 2005. Total is the least since opponents had 20 in 2003.

NFL SCHEDULE ROTATION

The NFL regular season scheduling rotation under the realignment plan that went into effect in 2002:

The interconference and intraconference divisional matchups – 14 of each season's 16 games – were determined following extensive analysis and discussion with NFL clubs. A key factor in deciding the initial schedules was the displacement of certain teams from their traditional divisions in the new alignment.

The Saints, who teamed with Atlanta, Carolina and Tampa Bay to create the newly-formed NFC South in 2002, play home-and-home with each of their divisional rivals (six games), the four teams from another NFC division on a rotating three-year cycle (four games), the four teams from an AFC division on a rotating four-year cycle (four contests) and two intraconference games based on the prior year's standings (two games against teams in the two NFC divisions the team is not scheduled to play that season. The division champions of each division will play against each other, and the second-, third- and fourth-place teams in a each conference are matched the same way).

The format adopted by the NFL in 2002 has several advantages:

- There is an increased common-opponent emphasis with every team in a division playing against 14 common opponents.
- All teams play each other on a regular basis, home and away, for a more consistent presentation of attractive games, eliminating the many schedule aberrations of the past.
- Teams are guaranteed to play all non-division opponents in their conference at least once every three years and at home at least once every six years.
- Every NFC team plays every AFC team once every four years and at home once every eight years.
- A team's record from the previous year has less of a bearing on its schedule, with only two opponents based on the previous year's standings, rather than the four of the previous system. Thus, the so-called "easy" fifth-place schedules have been eliminated.
- The division that a team is in will be less of a factor in a team's won-loss record with 10-of-16 games each season coming against non-division teams.

SAINTS TRAINING FACILITY

Since the expansion was completed prior to the 2003 season, the Saints headquarters has been a top resource for the players and coaching staff, who have access to three full-sized outdoor fields, an indoor field, a renovated locker room, a state-of-the-art weight room and a full-service cafeteria.

Because of the unpredictable weather of southeast Louisiana throughout the year, the club has long needed an indoor practice area. That need was filled in 2003 with the completion of one of the league's best facilities. Unlike previously, no longer does the club have to regularly bus to alternative locations for practice, and other newly-built structures were included to complete and upgrade the club's training area. Also on the Saints' 19-acre campus in Metairie is the recently-completed, 12,800 square-foot practice facility that houses the New Orleans VooDoo of the Arena Football League.

At 78 feet high, the indoor practice facility casts a long shadow over the entire property. The covered field is 220 feet wide by 420 feet long and has 6,375,600 cubic feet of air-conditioned space. There are 93,400 feet under roof covered in FieldTurf. A 250-seat cafeteria is connected to the lightning-protected facility, as is a 9,000 square-foot weight room with a cushioned floor. Over 8,000 square feet of maintenance and equipment storage was also added, and there are covered walkways connecting the indoor facility and cafeteria to the existing building. Outside of the VooDoo facility is a new, full-sized outdoor field covered in AstroPlay.

The existing building was also renovated three years ago. The team's locker room was doubled in size, with new lockers installed. A large, open area is in the middle so all lockers are visible for communication and interaction between the players and coaches. A player's lounge was built, and the existing medical and rehabilitation area was doubled in size. It now includes a treadmill pool facility for injury rehab work.

Other updated features of the Saints' facility include expansion of the ticket area and additional staff locker rooms. All of the renovated areas have freshly-carpeted floors emblazoned with the Saints' Fleur de Lis logo.

The entire club moved into the training facility at **5800 Airline Drive** in Metairie on April 15, 1996, marking the first time in club history that the team's players, coaches and staff were housed under one roof. The first floor is approximately 43,000 square feet and primarily serves the needs of the players. It also consists of a reception area, ticket office, media workroom and storage areas. Two symmetrically laid-out fields behind the building are planted with Bermuda grass and are surrounded by an asphalt, half-mile running track.

A 1,700 square foot auditorium, which sits on the first floor, can seat 110 players for team meetings and can also be divided into two rooms with a slide-out wall. On either side of the auditorium are eight smaller team meeting rooms. Located on the second floor are offices for coaches, player personnel, video and the administrative staff.



SUPERDOME INFORMATION

Though the work will not be complete, for months stadium officials have been dedicated to making the Louisiana Superdome "football ready" for the Saints' home opener on ESPN's Monday Night Football against the Atlanta Falcons Sept. 25. The refurbishing and rebuilding of the stadium will continue throughout the season and a target date of August of 2007 has been established to finish the project.

The Superdome suffered tremendous damages and served as a shelter of last resort for New Orleans residents during Hurricane Katrina. The logistics and time spent for repairs also afforded an opportunity to incorporate significant improvements, enhancing the fans' experience.

The upgrades will include larger video boards in the two end zones, replacing the four scoreboards on the façade of the Terrace Level, and a new LED "ribbon" board on front of the East and West Club Level sidelines. Other changes include fully remodeled concession stands on all levels, an epoxy flooring system in the concourses and walk ramps and leatherette seats for Club Level members.

Before the 2007 NFL season, it is expected that the improvements will include refurbished box suites on both suite levels, and dramatic changes to the four large ballrooms, which serve as Club Rooms for the Saints' games.

The Saints' preseason game with the Baltimore Ravens on Aug. 26, was the last event hosted by the Superdome before the storm. With New Orleans under a mandatory evacuation two days later, the stadium served as a "refuge of last resort" to residents who were unable to leave the city.

Most estimates are that nearly 30,000 took refuge in the building, but when the city's power grid was knocked out, and the stadium was plunged into semi-darkness, with no air conditioning, ventilation or functioning plumbing. The evacuation process began Thursday after the hurricane and the last few departed on Saturday.

A team of experts soon began a thorough inspection of the damage. The building was found to be structurally sound, and repairs were estimated at \$139 million. Nearly 4,000 tons of trash and debris were removed, the roof was given a temporary seal and the remediation process began.

The study suggested that upgrades would be more cost-effective if undertaken while the building was under repair. Incorporating them into the construction schedule would also mean less down time or potential interruption of the future events. The report suggested that sufficient work could be accomplished to reopen the Superdome Nov. 1.

As the project advanced into the architectural stage, Dome managers SMG and Louisiana Stadium & Exposition District officials held numerous meetings and discussions with NFL and Saints representatives. On Feb. 5, 2006 (Super Bowl Sunday), the league made an announcement that the Saints would play the full 2006 regular-season schedule in the Superdome.

On April 6, NFL Commissioner Paul Tagliabue and Saints Owner/Executive Vice President Rita Benson LeBlanc announced the home opener against the Falcons would be moved to Sept. 25 for Monday Night Football.

SAINTS BROADCASTING

The New Orleans Saints have a number of team-affiliated media outlets. In addition to the weekly games broadcast on a regional radio network, the Saints have partnerships that produce weekly radio and TV programs as well as an Internet homepage.

RADIO

WWL (870 AM) is the flagship of the Saints Radio Network, and the station extends the weekly action of Saints football throughout the southeast. Jim Henderson handles the play-by-play duties, former Saint running back and scout Hokie Gajan provides color commentary for all regular season and playoff contests. Kenny Wilkerson reports from the sidelines. WWL also hosts the Sean Payton Show and the Front Office Show each week during the season.

Q — What are the categories of free agency?

A — Players are either “restricted” or “unrestricted” free agents. Within those categories are also “transition” and “franchise” players.

Q — What is the difference between a restricted free agent and an unrestricted free agent?

A — Players become restricted free agents when they complete three accrued seasons and their contract expires. Unrestricted free agents have completed four or more accrued seasons with an expired contract.

Q — What constitutes an “accrued season?”

A — Six or more regular-season games on a club’s active/inactive, reserved-injured or “physically unable to perform” lists.

Q — Other than accrued seasons, what determines a restricted free agent?

A — He has received a “qualifying” offer (a salary level predetermined by the Collective Bargaining Agreement between the league and its players) from his old club. He can negotiate with any club through April 15. If the restricted free agent accepts an offer sheet from a new club, his old club can match the offer and retain him because it has the “right of first refusal.” If the old club does not match the offer, it can possibly receive draft-choice compensation depending on the amount of its qualifying offer. If an offer sheet is not executed, the player’s rights revert to his old club on April 16.

Q — What determines an unrestricted free agent?

A — A player with four or more accrued seasons whose contract has expired. He is free to sign with any club, with no compensation owed to his old club, through July 22 (or the first scheduled day of the first NFL training camp, whichever is later). On July 23, his rights revert to his old club if it made a “tender” offer (110 percent of last year’s salary) to him by June 1. His old club then has until the 10th week of the season (November 12) to sign him. If he does not sign by November 12, he must sit out the season. If no tender is offered by June 1, player can be signed by any club anytime throughout the season.

Q — What determines a transition player?

A — His club must offer a minimum of the

average of the top 10 salaries of last season at the player’s position or 120 percent of the player’s previous year’s salary, whichever is greater. A transition player designation gives the club a first-refusal right to match within seven days an offer sheet given to the player by another club after his contract expires. If the club matches, it retains the player. If it does not match, it receives no compensation.

Q — What determines a franchise player?

A — A club can designate one franchise player in any given year. The salary level offer by a player’s old club determines what type of franchise player he is. An “exclusive” franchise player -- not free to sign with another club -- is offered a minimum of the average of the top five salaries at the player’s position as of April 15, or 120 percent of the player’s previous year’s salary, whichever is greater. If the player is offered a minimum of the average of the top five salaries of last season at his position, he becomes a “non-exclusive” franchise player and can negotiate with other clubs. His old club can match a new club’s offer, or receive two first-round draft choices if it decides not to match.

Q — Can a club decide to withdraw its franchise or transition designations on a player? If so, can it then use them on other players?

A — A club can withdraw its franchise or transition designations and the player then automatically becomes an unrestricted free agent either immediately or when his contract expires. The club cannot name a new transition player (two were allowed in 1993, one in 1994). It can name a new franchise player the next year. A club can, though, designate a transition player in lieu of a franchise player at any time.

Q — What determines each team’s salary cap? Is it always in effect?

A — The salary cap is the absolute maximum each club may spend on player salaries in a capped year. The cap is in effect 365 days a year. From March 1 to the day before the season begins, a club’s top 51 salaried players count towards the cap, plus pro-rated signing bonuses, incentives, etc., but not base salaries of other players on the roster up to 80. Thereafter, all salaries on a club’s roster count towards the cap.
