

OWNERSHIP



TOM BENSON

OWNER

Tom Benson's pronouncement upon taking on ownership of the New Orleans Saints that he would one day bring a championship to his hometown came to fruition on February 7, 2010 when his Saints defeated the Indianapolis Colts, 31-17, in Super Bowl XLIV.

The Saints' successful march to the National Football League's Championship level has been the crown jewel of many highlights that the franchise has experienced both on and off the field since 2006. This period, featuring the Super Bowl title, two NFC Championship appearances, three division championships and five playoff berths, combined with a commitment to rebuild and enhance the Gulf South region, has embodied the testament and realization of the principles that Mr. Benson has instilled in the Saints' organization throughout his 30 years of team ownership.

The essential qualities and directives of Mr. Benson's ownership tenure of the Saints have been unadorned – direct all of his efforts and resources towards bringing the fans what have been consistently new levels of success on the football field, all the while supporting his hometown and the entire region by investing in the community. Mr. Benson has understood since purchasing the club in 1985 that the Saints are part of the fabric of the Gulf South: a cornerstone of the region economically and he has made them a leader in charitable causes.

Mr. Benson's tenure of ownership has been a period defined by historic advancements in successes, whether it be measured by victories, playoff appearances, Mercedes-Benz Superdome attendance figures, national television coverage, positive economic impacts both locally and regionally, as well as serving as one of the most philanthropic and charitable citizens in the city's rich and colorful history. He is also the owner of the National Basketball Association's New Orleans Pelicans.

During his ownership and leadership of the Saints, Mr. Benson has helped drive the evolution of the team's legion of fans support that reached new heights with the Mercedes-Benz Superdome being sold-out on a season ticket basis for every campaign since 2006, with a waiting list of over 73,000 people. By the end of the 2015 regular season, the consecutive sellout streak will extend to 101 games. These supporters turned out in record numbers to welcome the Saints home from their Super Bowl victory for a downtown New Orleans parade that exceeded 800,000 spectators.

While his work within the organization and the Saints' turnaround is well documented, his efforts have also paid dividends for the city and the surrounding area. During his ownership tenure, the city has hosted five Super Bowls, including Super Bowl XLVII, which was played on February 3, 2013, following a vote by NFL owners after Mr. Benson directed a successful campaign during the annual league meetings in 2009. He's been the driving force behind each campaign to secure the contest. Each Super Bowl has been an economic windfall, the most recent totaling \$480 million, not to mention the exposure and charitable contributions the NFL makes during Super Bowl week that extends for generations.

Mr. Benson has made the objectives of success, support and investment in the region not only his personal direction daily, but the core values of the entire organization. Not surprisingly, success has followed, both on the field and off. When he purchased the team, the Saints entered the most compelling and memorable period in franchise history. Prior to his arrival, the club's fans had never enjoyed a winning record, celebrated a division title or experienced the thrill of playoff victories.

Mr. Benson's impact was immediate. Two years after assuming the reins of the organization, the Saints hosted their first playoff contest. After multiple winning seasons, playoff berths and division titles since, the franchise has reached new heights, topped by the Super Bowl title.

His dedication to the Gulf South region has been among Mr. Benson's most rewarding endeavors. Since 2005, the New Orleans native has positioned the Saints as a leader in the recovery of the region in the wake of Hurricane Katrina, the worst natural disaster in our nation's history. The club was among the first major businesses to return to New Orleans, and in 2006 had a thrilling season that became an inspiration for a region on the mend. In 2010, through his leadership, the club established the Saints Gulf Coast Renewal Fund, which raised over \$1.5 million through the raffle of a Super Bowl ring and the 2012 raffle of Saints and Pelicans gameday experiences. Over \$1 million has been distributed to charities, such as the local chapters of the Second Harvest Food Bank and Catholic Charities to help provide support of those affected by the 2010 oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico and Hurricane Isaac. The efforts of the organization have continued to lift the community, with the team serving as an economic engine and a pacesetter in philanthropic contributions.

Under Mr. Benson's guidance, he and the Saints have been a focal point for healing and restoration – annually putting millions in charitable contributions, goods and services back into the entire Gulf South. He pledged the club's commitment to the region was firm and lasting, with his focus on building a stronger and more unified city. It's a direction that continues to evolve and expand.

Some of Mr. Benson's most ambitious projects to date have occurred in New Orleans' Central Business District, directly adjoining the Mercedes-Benz Superdome, starting with his 2009 purchase of the formerly vacant and blighted Dominion Tower. As part of the agreement, Benson and his family also purchased the unoccupied New Orleans Centre. The two important commercial spaces, which were vacant since Katrina struck the Gulf Coast in 2005, have returned the CBD into a more vibrant and viable sector of New Orleans and revitalized an area that was largely ignored for four years. The newly renovated Benson Tower has served as a boon to this important business corridor, while "Champions Square", which made its debut in 2010 adjacent to the former mall, is continually being developed and enhanced with the ultimate objective of producing a world-class sports and entertainment destination.

Mr. Benson's economic investment plan, which included 2009 agreements on both a private and public level, has revitalized the Mercedes-Benz Superdome area, and the agreement with the state included a dramatic modernization of the stadium which was completed in 2011. Following the debut of the renovations, the Saints, under Mr. Benson's leadership, and Mercedes-Benz USA reached a 10-year agreement to rename the facility the "Mercedes-Benz Superdome." The stadium upgrades and rebranding with his help include a legion of new enhancements that have significantly improved the fan experience for all events at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome and kept the building competitive with new facilities across the country.

Since its opening in 1996, Mr. Benson has strived to keep the club's practice facility in Metairie among the NFL's elite. In 2003, an indoor practice facility and cafeteria were constructed, along with significant upgrades to the team's locker room, training room and weight room. Significant expansions and a remodeling in 2012 and 2013, assured that the facilities would remain at the top level of professional sports teams, while housing the full capabilities of two major league sports clubs.

Mr. Benson's vision of what an NFL club should be off the field – proactive, with a positive impact on the prosperity of the community and the charities that support the less fortunate – has been the determining factor of the Saints' approach.

The Saints' owner has not only reached out by supporting charities, but also by recognizing that the future of the area's economy depends on keeping major businesses and employers in the Gulf South locally-owned. His philosophy is to rebuild the economy by developing the infrastructure of the region from the inside, and Mr. Benson has made two other large investments in the city's future, encouraging a number of other businesses to follow his example.

In 2008, he purchased WVUE, making FOX-8 the only network-affiliated television station in the New Orleans market that is wholly locally owned. After researching the trends of the media industry, Mr. Benson discovered television stations have increasingly become parts of national media conglomerates, and his focus remains on keeping Louisiana businesses, such as WVUE, owned by those with ties to the state.

In June, 2012, Mr. Benson continued his commitment to the Gulf South by purchasing the NBA Hornets franchise, which was successfully rebranded as the Pelicans. His objectives in ownership of the basketball team are the same as his stewardship of the Saints: to produce a team on-the-court that will compete for championships every year, while making a significant positive impact off-the-court in the community.

Since 2006 – when New Orleans captured the nation's imagination by winning the NFC South and advancing further into the postseason than ever before – the Saints have been symbolic of the region's resolve and grit, though Benson, as usual, chooses to work quietly in the background.

His tenure as owner has been defined by honesty, dedication, loyalty and commitment to the city, region, Saints and the NFL. When Mr. Benson initially became interested in purchasing the club in 1985, he was motivated by the threat of out-of-town investors planning to move the club from New Orleans. He was certainly a fan of the game and the Saints, but the sport had yet to become one of his passions.

As one of the area's top businessmen, Mr. Benson recognized the importance of the team to the region and immediately spearheaded the effort to keep the Saints. But unlike others at the time, it wasn't just an emotional plea. He pooled all of his resources, purchased the club in 1985 and preserved the Saints for the team's legion of fans across the area. And the once-rampant speculation that the club was moving immediately ceased.

While Mr. Benson's initial motivation for purchasing the team was to ensure it did not leave New Orleans, all of the Saints' best seasons have come since his arrival, and his goal remains for the club to rank among the most admired franchises in all of sports, a feat that took a monumental step forward with the Saints' first-ever NFC and NFL championships in 2009 and their continued success.

Following the 2009 season, ESPN The Magazine ranked the Saints first among professional sports organizations, based on several criteria.

Benson's significant contributions in the sports, business and charitable arenas have been recognized by several honors. Since becoming involved with the Saints, his accomplishments have been recognized through his induction into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame (2014), the Junior Achievement Business Hall of Fame (New Orleans Chapter-2013), the Saints Hall of Fame (2012), the San Antonio Business Hall of Fame (2011) and the Texas Business Hall of Fame (2007). In 2015, he was honored by New Orleans CityBusiness as one of the region's 35 "Driving Forces" for his contributions to the community since Hurricane Katrina.

So perhaps the Saints' successes in the years since were to be expected. Football was a new business for Mr. Benson when he arrived on the scene, but he was a quick learner and followed his lifelong professional philosophy of finding the right people and giving them the freedom to handle their responsibilities.

Mr. Benson also immediately emerged as one of the most trusted and valued figures in the league. He has played a key role in many capacities, including serving three stints as Chairman of the Finance Committee, one of the league's most difficult, time-consuming and influential positions, his most recent term ending in 2013. The assignment is evidence of the respect and esteem in which successive NFL commissioners and his fellow NFL owners hold him.

Always a supporter of those who have made the game of football great, In 2014 Mr. Benson pledged two significant gifts totaling \$11 million to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, the largest gift by an individual in the Hall's history. \$10 million has been earmarked for the immediate renovation of the Hall's on-site stadium, which hosts the annual Enshrinement Ceremony, the NFL Hall of Fame game, two college teams and two high school teams in Canton, Ohio. In his honor, the field has been renamed "Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium." The additional \$1 million is the first donation towards the establishment of the Hall of Fame's Legends Landing program, a mixed-use residence that will include room for Hall of Famers and former NFL Players. In 2010, he served as the presenter for Rickey Jackson's induction into the Hall of Fame.

Community involvement has been the hallmark of the Benson era since he became the owner of the team, and because of those efforts the World Sports Humanitarian Hall of Fame has twice recognized the club as one of the five most charitable professional organizations. Benson was selected by the Volunteers of America as the winner of its annual Good Samaritan Award in Philanthropy in recognition of his work in the wake of Hurricane Katrina. In 2010, he was honored by Loyola University with the school's Integritas Vitae Award, the New Orleans school's highest honor. The award is annually presented to an individual who exemplifies the qualities Loyola seeks to instill in its students. The recipient is chosen for displaying high moral character and selfless service, without expectation of material reward or public recognition, and adhering to the principles of honesty, integrity, justice and the preservation of human dignity. In addition, Mr. Benson was honored by the New Orleans chapter of CRIMESTOPPERS with the James J. Coleman Corporate Partner Award for his continued support of the national non-profit organization that works with law enforcement agencies in their work to identify and apprehend criminals.

For his humanitarian and philanthropic endeavors that have positively affected the lives of so many individuals and groups, Mr. Benson was honored in 2012 by the Catholic Church with an Oblate Doctor of Human Letters (to a person who has achieved the human purpose for which Divine Providence Placed Him on Earth) certificate that honors his "realities of the most noble of human endeavors, weighted by criteria arising from the deepest human values." The certificate also honors "excellence in the area of life where excellence makes the most difference," and further cites his "attributes and accomplishments that come closest to what God would be interested in honoring." In 2012, Mr. Benson and his wife, the former Gayle Marie LaJaunie, a fellow native of New Orleans, received from Pope Benedict XVI the Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice award – for outstanding service to the Church and the Pontiff, the highest Papal award granted to a lay person.

Mr. and Mrs. Benson are also personally involved in several charitable endeavors, including supporting local and regional causes. Mr. and Mrs. Benson have also funded the building of a football stadium located on the University of Incarnate Word Campus, known as Gayle and Tom Benson Field. The school's team took to the field for the first time in 2009 and will continue to grow and build their foundation with Benson's unwavering support. In addition, the Benson family also established an endowment fund at Central Catholic High School in San Antonio that is dedicated to the memory of the late Robert Carter Benson, who graduated from the school in 1962. Tom Benson also donated the Benson Memorial Library at Central Catholic. In 2012, Mr. and Mrs. Benson established the Brother Nicholas, S.C. Building Endowment to support Brother Martin High School (formerly St. Aloysius, from where he graduated). In 1986, his alma mater honored Mr. Benson as their Alumnus of the Year. Educated at Loyola University New Orleans, Mr. Benson has made a pledge for the construction of a new Jesuit Center in 2010, contributed to the creation of the Jesuit Social Research Institute in 2008 and helped fund the first phase of construction of a chemistry wing in 1999. In recognition of their longstanding support of Catholic education, Mr. and Mrs. Benson received the St. Elizabeth Ann Seton

Award from the National Catholic Educational Association in 2010. In March, 2012 they were inducted by Tulane University into the Paul Tulane Society, recognizing their significant generosity to the school. In supporting the school's construction of an on-campus stadium, the Green Wave will start playing on "Benson Field" in September.

A cancer survivor, Mr. Benson has also worked closely with the Ochsner Foundation Hospital in New Orleans with the establishment of the Tom and Gayle Benson Cancer Center, a \$20-million treatment complex.

Supporting the efforts of former Saints safety Steve Gleason and his Team Gleason organization which helps provide people with ALS and other debilitating conditions and environment where they can live vital and productive lives with meaningful freedom and independence, Mr. and Mrs. Benson recently committed \$5 million to the Team Gleason House for Innovative Living at the New Orleans St. Margaret's facility.

In 1945, Mr. Benson served in the Navy aboard the U.S.S. South Dakota and has remained particularly close to this branch of the armed forces. He is the only enlisted man to serve on the Board of Trustees of the Pensacola Naval Museum and has been honored with an award from the crew of the submarine U.S.S. Louisiana. In 2007, Mr. Benson was honored by the U.S. Navy Memorial with the Lone Sailor Award, presented to those who exemplify the core values of honor, courage and commitment. In 2009, Benson was presented with U.S. Army's Army Strong Award in recognition for his position in the community while demonstrating leadership and Army Values on a daily basis.

A leading advocate for the National World War II Memorial in Washington D.C., Mr. Benson was also a major contributor and past director of The National D-Day Museum in New Orleans, with his pledges helping fund the Pacific Exhibit Grand Opening and the Midway Theater. In 2011, he was among five NFL owners honored with an American Spirit Award by the museum for service in the war.

BENSON COMMUNITY SERVICE

Tom Benson's greatest impact over the last 29 years has been in the community, and the club's charitable involvement has been among his most rewarding endeavors personally since 1985. He realized immediately the Saints could be more than just a football team to the region, and that the club's players, coaches and staff were pacesetters when it came to volunteerism, involvement, donations and charitable outreach.

As a corporate citizen, the Saints annually put millions of dollars back into the community in financial support, in-kind donations, charitable appearances and the donation of goods and services – not to mention the club's critical role in economic impact and development.

Benson and the Saints have been honored repeatedly during his years as Owner for the support and care of charitable and civic causes, including the Volunteers of America selecting him as the winner of the annual Good Samaritan Award in Philanthropy in 2008. In 2010, Benson was awarded Loyola University of New Orleans' highest honor as the recipient of the Integritas Vitae Award, given to an individual who exemplifies a commitment to community service.

Mr. Benson and his family have helped raise over \$2.5 million for community causes through the Saints Hurricane Katrina and Gulf Coast Renewal funds.

Annually, the club has also partnered with local youth-oriented charities such as the Boys & Girls Clubs, Special Olympics, Boy and Girl Scouts of America and the United Way to reach as many children as possible. And over 45 foundations and agencies receive monetary donations from the Saints each year – organizations as diverse as Make-A-Wish Foundation, the American Heart Association, the United Negro College Fund, Habitat For Humanity, the New Orleans Police and Justice Foundation, the Second Harvest Food Bank and Catholic Charities.

Mr. Benson has helped lead the Pelicans to lead the community in battling coastal erosion and the loss of the Gulf South's wetlands. The Pelicans and the Audubon Nature Institute are focused on education, as they will execute an outreach program that visits schools and festivals with Audubon's Wetlands Express and AquaVan to give students the opportunity to learn about coastal restoration in a fun and engaging manner. Each year, the Pelicans host a charity gala – Toast for the Coast – to raise funds to protect the Gulf Coast.

Additionally, the Pelicans are focused on helping students in the Gulf Coast live a healthy and active lifestyle in an effort to end childhood obesity and prevent Louisiana youth from starting to use tobacco products through their Junior Training Camp program presented by Smoothie King, Ochsner and Tobacco-Free Living.

With the support of their partners, the Pelicans host two junior training camps each week for children between the ages of seven and 12. Each junior training camp will reach up to 150 students, giving them the opportunity to participate in basketball-related drills and games, learn about nutrition and enjoy the Pelicans' game day experience at school.

In addition to consistently supporting charities, Mr. Benson has also been a leading advocate for New Orleans and the Gulf South. He lends his support in attracting new events to the city, and the club has worked in conjunction with the Greater New Orleans Sports Foundation and other local entities to bid and receive the 2012 NCAA Men's Final Four Basketball Championship and the 2013 Women's Final Four.

Upon the announcement of his purchase of the New Orleans Pelicans franchise in the spring of 2012, the city was awarded the 2014 NBA All-Star Game.

New Orleans' leading advocate of the successful bid to host Super Bowl XLVII, which was played in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on February 3, 2013, Benson remains committed to work on behalf of the city to land future Super Bowls, because of the financial impact and positive global exposure they are able to shed on the city and the state.

BENSON MILESTONES



1985: Ownership of the Saints officially transferred to Tom Benson on May 31 and he becomes managing general partner of the club.

1986: The Benson influence begins as the owner puts his management team in charge of the franchise, hiring Jim Finks as president/general manager and Jim Mora as head coach.

1987: The Saints post a franchise-best 12-3 record—including victories in the final nine contests—and make the playoffs for the first time.

1988: The Saints finish 10-6, posting a double-digit victory total again and achieving consecutive winning seasons for the first time.

1989: Mr. Benson appointed Chairman of the league's most influential group, the NFL Finance Committee, a position he kept for three separate stints, before most recently stepping down in 2013.

1990: After winning six of their last nine games, the Saints earn their second playoff appearance by finishing second in the NFC West.

1991: New Orleans clinched its first division championship with an 11-5 record and capture the NFC West.

1992: The Saints post a 12-4 record and host a playoff game for the second-straight year. Mr. Benson assumes sole ownership of the club.

1993: The Saints finish second in the NFC West, with the club recording its seventh-straight non-losing season.

1996: Marking a first for the organization, the coaches, players and staff are housed under one roof with the opening of the team's state-of-the-art facility in Metairie.

2000: New Orleans wins the NFC West with a 10-6 record. The Saints win their first playoff game, a 31-28 thriller over St. Louis in the Superdome.

2002: The city hosts its fourth Super Bowl during Mr. Benson's tenure as owner. Mr. Benson promotes Mickey Loomis to general manager of football operations.

2003: Mr. Benson again appointed Chairman of the Finance Committee; Construction of new indoor practice

facility and other improvements are finished before training camp, as the club holds camp in Metairie for the first time in franchise history.

2005: After Hurricane Katrina ravaged the Gulf South on the verge of the NFL's opening weekend, Benson was forced to move the club's entire operation. Under his leadership, the Saints were able to continue the season, including holding four games in Baton Rouge. The club established the Hurricane Katrina Relief Fund, raising over \$1 million.

2006: The team returns to Louisiana, with Mr. Benson positioning the club as an emblem of the state's resolve and determination in rebuilding. The Saints—selling out on a season-ticket basis for the first time—win the NFC South title under the guidance of new head coach Sean Payton and the spark of free agent acquisition Drew Brees, finishing at 10-6. The victory total included a memorable, 23-3 win over Atlanta in the reopening of the Superdome. The team advanced to the NFC Championship for the first time in franchise history. Payton and Loomis were consensus choices for the NFL Coach of the Year and NFL Executive of the Year awards respectively.

2008: Mr. Benson purchases WVUE, making FOX-8 the only network-affiliated television station in the New Orleans market that is wholly locally owned. The Saints defeat the San Diego Chargers at London's Wembley Stadium, playing in their first regular season game outside the United States.

2009: In what Mr. Benson considers part of his legacy in Louisiana, the New Orleans native reaches an agreement with the state through 2025 that will create a new Sports Development District downtown, including a completely renovated Mercedes-Benz Superdome. The Benson family purchased and redeveloped two properties—each adjacent to the Superdome—an economic windfall for the region without any new taxes. New Orleans is selected by the NFL to host Super Bowl XLVII, to be played on February 3, 2013, with Mr. Benson serving as the city's leading advocate in the campaign. It is the fifth time New Orleans will host the Super Bowl since he's owned the club. On the field, the Saints enjoy their most successful season in franchise history. New Orleans sets a club record for victories with a 13-3 regular season, capturing the NFC South title. The Saints then hosted the NFC Championship game for the first time and advance to their first Super Bowl with a 31-28 overtime victory over the Minnesota Vikings on January 24, 2010. New Orleans then defeated the Indianapolis Colts, 31-17, on February 7, 2010, in Super Bowl XLIV at Sun Life Stadium in South Florida to give the Saints their first-ever NFL title.

2010: Sparked by a six game winning streak, the Saints finish 11-5 and qualify for the playoffs, making back-to-back postseason appearances for the first time since 1992.

2011: The club's completely renovated stadium makes its debut as the Mercedes-Benz Superdome, following a 10-year naming rights and sponsorship agreement with the automaker. The Saints enjoy an eight-game winning streak to end the regular season and finish 13-3, capturing their second NFC South title in three seasons. The team sets the NFL single-season record for total net yardage, while Brees and RB Darren Sproles set the NFL's single-season passing yardage and all-purpose yardage records.

2012: Continuing his longstanding commitment to the Gulf South region and the City of New Orleans, Mr. Benson agrees to purchase the National Basketball Association's New Orleans Pelicans. The Saints practice facility undergoes a multimillion dollar renovation and expansion, which will house both the NFL and NBA clubs under one roof. Brees sets an NFL record that stood since 1960, as he threw a touchdown pass in 54 consecutive games.

2013: The city of New Orleans hosts Super Bowl XLVII on February 3, the 10th time the Crescent City has hosted the league's championship game (tied for first with South Florida) and the fifth time during Mr. Benson's ownership tenure.

2014: The Pelicans make their debut under the team's new namesake on Wednesday, Oct. 30 at Opening Night against the Indiana Pacers. New Orleans and the Pelicans hosts the 2014 NBA All-Star festivities from Feb. 14-16 for the second time in six years. For the first time in its history, the home of New Orleans' NBA team has naming rights as the New Orleans Arena becomes the Smoothie King Center as the locally-born company makes the ultimate commitment to the city.

2015: The Pelicans make the postseason for the first time under Mr. Benson's ownership. The team finishes the regular season 45-37, marking both the first winning season and playoff appearance since the 2010-11 season. The postseason run is the first under the new Pelicans identity.

EXECUTIVE OFFICER

New Orleans Saints and Pelicans Executive Officer Gayle Benson, a New Orleans native and the wife of Saints and Pelicans Owner/Chairman of the Board Tom Benson, is an accomplished business professional and philanthropist with strong ties to the local community.

Mrs. Benson began her professional career as a manager for noted New York-based costume jeweler Celebrity Jewelry. Throughout the course of her employment in the jewelry business, she oversaw and managed the daily operation of 40 sales associates. She then branched out into real estate development which allowed her to successfully integrate her passion for interior design with property management. Her first real estate transaction occurred in 1978 when she purchased a home in New Orleans' Irish Channel and then sold the property eight months later. She would go on to purchase, manage and eventually sell several more properties, primarily in the city's Uptown district.

In 1975, Mrs. Benson began a 30-year career in the design industry, an interest where she achieved tremendous success. Throughout the course of her career she was recognized with numerous professional awards and served as an inaugural member on the Louisiana State Board of Licensing for four years. Notable professional accomplishments for Mrs. Benson's design skills included her guidance and expertise on storied New Orleans grocery chain Schwegmann's Giant Grocery locations throughout Southeastern Louisiana, as well as the design of the Mercedes-Benz automotive dealership on St. Charles Avenue and the Acura dealership on River Road. Her expertise in design and renovation covered the gamut from furniture selection, lighting, accessories, painting, wallpaper, drapery as well as construction consultation.

Mrs. Benson's professional successes extended further than grocery store and automotive dealership sectors though, as she also spearheaded major renovations ranging from the public spaces, suites, the General Manager's quarters, as well as the guest rooms for the New Orleans Hyatt Regency Hotel. Her impressive accomplishments led to renovations for other notable New Orleans hotel clients that included the Hilton Riverside, the Fairmont (now the Roosevelt), the Ritz-Carlton, the Royal Orleans Hotel, The Omni, the Marie Antoinette Hotel and the Hotel de la Monnier.

In 2000, Mrs. Benson worked with the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on renovations to the iconic New Orleans landmark's third and fourth level public spaces, in addition to renovations on select suites. She also owned and developed a commercial real estate building on the corner of Laura and Octavia Streets, a women's clothing private enterprise called "Toujours la Ligne" and a designer's showroom called "Designers Resource" which served as a wholesale location for designers and architects seeking to purchase fabric, wall coverings and accessories. The Men of Fashion Committee recognized Mrs. Benson during her career as one of the "Top Ten Best Dressed Women in New Orleans".

A long-time advocate of faith-based causes and spirituality, Mrs. Benson has been a longtime trusted and valued member of the local Catholic community. She's served on Archbishop's Community Appeal campaigns for four different Archbishops over the course of the past 20 years, one of her many contributions. She has also worked tirelessly with the Archdiocese of New Orleans' Catholic Charities organization and its umbrella agencies that feature nearly 50 programs and three affiliated ministries that deliver health and human services to the poor and vulnerable in the eight civil parishes which the Archdiocese serves, as well as food and nutrition services statewide.

Mrs. Benson has also worked closely with St. Louis Cathedral's Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) program, as well as with the same program at the Holy Name of Jesus Parish. She serves as a proud member of the Board of Trustees for the Oblate School of Theology, as well as on the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre and is a noted friend of the St. Louis Cathedral Board. She also works closely with the Missionary Oblates Partnership and the Sisters of St. Cecilia Congregation Planned Giving Advisory Committee.

Mrs. Benson's support of the Church has been recognized on numerous occasions. She has received the Medal of the Order of St. Louis Award for her dedication to the Church. She and Mr. Benson received the Elizabeth Seton Award in 2010, which is dedicated to those who have served the National Catholic Education Association through personal or professional philanthropy or volunteer service that has positively impacted Catholic education in the nation. In 2012, they received from Pope Benedict XVI the Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice award-for outstanding service to the Church and the Pontiff, the highest Papal award granted to a lay person. Currently, Mrs. Benson is helping lead a campaign called "I Will Give You Shepherds," which plans to renovate the second floor of the historic Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans.

In addition to faith-based causes, Mr. and Mrs. Benson have enriched the New Orleans community through several additional endeavors, including philanthropic work in the health and wellness, education and arts sectors.

Mr. and Mrs. Benson have shown their commitment to the health and wellness of the New Orleans community with the Gayle and Tom Benson Cancer Center on the main campus of Ochsner Medical Center in Old Jefferson. The center was built following a generous gift to the area's leading health service network of hospitals and clinics. In addition to serving on the board at Ochsner, Mrs. Benson has led two-consecutive 100-plus volunteer committee members in hosting the Moonlight and Miracles event – the organization's annual gala to benefit the Ochsner Cancer Institute. The 2014 event raised over \$1.25 million to support cancer patients in the region.

Supporting the efforts of former Saints safety Steve Gleason and his Team Gleason organization which helps provide people with ALS and other debilitating conditions an environment where they can live vital and productive lives with meaningful freedom and independence, the Bensons committed \$5 million to the Team Gleason House for Innovative Living at the New Orleans St. Margaret's facility in 2014.

The Bensons have been committed leaders in education-focused philanthropic endeavors that include gifts to Brother Martin High School, St. Andrews Village, St. Mary's Dominican High School, Jesuit High School, Tulane University and Loyola University. Mr. and Mrs. Benson established an endowment fund at Central Catholic High School in San Antonio, Texas dedicated to the memory of son, Robert Carter Benson, who graduated from the school in 1962. The Bensons also established Gayle and Tom Benson Stadium and Benson Fieldhouse at University of the Incarnate Word (UIW) in San Antonio. Mrs. Benson serves on the Board of Directors for both UIW and Tulane, as well as Archbishop Hannan and St. Mary's Dominican High Schools.

In 2012, the Bensons made two significant gifts to enhance local institutions. They established the Brother Nicholas, S.C. Building Endowment to support Brother Martin (formerly St. Aloysius, Tom Benson's alma mater). They also donated \$7.5 million towards the construction of an on-campus football stadium at Tulane, appropriately named "Benson Field". The Bensons are members of the Paul Tulane Society, recognizing their significant generosity to the school.

Last fall, Mrs. Benson served as one of the chairs for NOMA's Odyssey Ball in 2014, as the event raised over \$700,000 – the most in the gala's history. The funds raised help ensure the museum's ability to present world-class exhibitions, public programs, and educational initiatives. Mrs. Benson was also involved in the NOMA (New Orleans Museum of Art) project "Art for Art's Sake" and is a member of the museum's advisory board.

In the fall of 2014, Mr. and Mrs. Benson were recognized by the Anti-Defamation League with the A.I. Botnick Torch of Liberty Award. Mrs. Benson was also recognized by the Girl Scouts of Louisiana East as a Woman of Distinction for her leadership and service to others.

Mrs. Benson was born in New Orleans and grew up in Old Algiers. Mr. and Mrs. Benson were married on October 29, 2004 in San Antonio at the Immaculate Conception Church. Mrs. Benson attended St. Joseph, St. Anthony and Holy Name of Mary High School before graduating from Martin Behrman High School in 1966.



DENNIS LAUSCHA

PRESIDENT

Dennis Lauscha, who was named president of the Pelicans in 2012, oversees the club's financial operations, government affairs, marketing, ticket and suite sales, legal, stadium, digital, analytics, community affairs, human resources, information technology and facilities departments. He has also served as president of the New Orleans Saints since 2012. He is a representative for both clubs at NFL and NBA Owner's Meetings.

Lauscha first joined the Saints as treasurer in 1998 and later earned the additional titles of vice president, senior vice president and executive vice president. In addition to his duties with the Saints and Pelicans, the New Orleans native maintains multiple roles within other holdings of Tom and Gayle Benson, maintaining a role in the management of New Orleans FOX affiliate WVUE-TV, and Zelia, LLC.

Lauscha's collaborative style, financial acumen and long-term view has played a key role as a member of a contingent that has negotiated agreements for both the Saints and Pelicans with the state of Louisiana that has resulted in long-term lease agreements, continuous improvements to their playing and practice facilities, revitalization of the areas around them and generated revenue for the state without any new taxes for citizens.

In 2009, Lauscha helped negotiate the partnership with Louisiana Governor Bobby Jindal that continues the Saints' commitment to the state through 2025. The deal included Mr. Benson purchasing and redeveloping the former New Orleans Centre, which has been transformed into Champions Square and the Benson Tower property adjacent to the Mercedes-Benz Superdome, with the stadium itself undergoing extensive renovations and improvements. Since playing a key role in Mr. Benson's purchase of the Pelicans in 2012, Lauscha has helped broker agreements with the state to upgrade the team's playing and practice facilities. Following successful negotiations, the Pelicans are committed to the state through 2024 and the Smoothie King center has undergone \$50 million in renovations and improvements.

In 2015 Lauscha helped negotiate an agreement with the state that will result in \$40 million in enhancements for fans of both clubs. The Mercedes-Benz Superdome will debut new state-of-the-art video boards in 2016, while a new center-hung HD video scoreboard will be installed in the Smoothie King Center for the 2015-16 season. Lauscha has also played a key role in finalizing 2011 and 2014 ground-breaking naming rights and sponsorship agreements for both teams' playing facilities with Mercedes-Benz USA and Smoothie King.

Lauscha was instrumental in the 2003 expansion of the Saints training facility. He later oversaw a renovation and expansion of the facilities and administrative offices for the Saints and Pelicans from 2012-13, while directing the construction of a basketball practice facility. The clubs are now housed on the same site, featuring some of the top facilities in professional sports.

Lauscha is committed to help attract major sporting events to New Orleans. He's a key member of the team that actively pursues future Super Bowls for New Orleans – and was instrumental in landing Super Bowl XLVII, which was played on Feb. 3, 2013 at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. The city has been invited to bid again for the 2019 and 2020 games. Following Mr. Benson's 2012 purchase of the Pelicans, the city was awarded an NBA All-Star Game, which was played on Feb. 16, 2014 at the Smoothie King Center.

In 2008, Lauscha was also a primary member of the negotiating team during the purchase of WVUE, and has since helped steward the station's growth in the New Orleans market.

Active throughout the community, Lauscha currently serves on the Visiting Committee of the Loyola University School of Business, as a member the NBA's Team Advisory Council of Presidents, the Stuart Hall School Board of Trustees and on the New Orleans Museum of Art Board. Lauscha has completed terms as board president of the Preservation Resource Center, president of the regional chapter of the Boy Scouts of America and as a member of New Orleans Mayor Mitch Landrieu's Blight Transition New Orleans Task Force, the Super Bowl XLVII Host Committee and the NBA All-Star Game Host Committee.

His dealings with the teams, state officials and local organizations have provided an opportunity for community involvement. His professional and charitable work was recognized by New Orleans CityBusiness, when Lauscha was selected as one of the 40 Most Influential Members of the Community. The honor is bestowed on those who are laying the groundwork for a better city. In 2010, he was named the Alumnus of the Year by Loyola University of New Orleans' College of Business and was named to the 2010 Class of Role Models by the Young Leadership Council. He was honored by the Allstate Sugar Bowl Chapter of the National Football Foundation/College Football Hall of Fame

with its 2014 Distinguished American Award. In 2015, Lauscha was honored to give the commencement address to the graduates of the University of New Orleans.

After basketball at and graduating from Jesuit High School, Lauscha attended the University of Alabama, earning a bachelor's degree in business. He has also received a master's of business administration from Loyola University in New Orleans and is a licensed Certified Public Accountant. He has also completed the NFL Managers Program at Stanford University's Executive Education Graduate School of Business. Prior to joining the Saints, Lauscha worked as the club's auditor for four years while working for a national accounting firm.



BEN HALES

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT OF MARKETING & BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

Ben Hales was named senior vice president of marketing and business development for the New Orleans Saints and New Orleans Pelicans in June of 2012 and oversees marketing initiatives for both teams. Hales, who enters his 16th season with the Saints and fourth with the Pelicans, spent seven seasons as the team's vice president of marketing and business development.

On a daily basis, Hales directs the Saints' marketing and creative efforts, as well as community initiatives and game and event presentation. He's also intricately involved in both clubs' critical planning of short-term and long-range marketing efforts. Hales' duties also entail stadium operations

at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome, broadcasting partnerships, promotions, advertising, special events and youth programs.

During the 2012-13 NBA season, the Hornets franchise announced that they would re-brand following the season and become the New Orleans Pelicans. Hales was instrumental in the re-branding efforts from start to finish, helping to first conceptualize the look to represent the Pelicans namesake and leading the planning for the official announcement in January 2013.

In 2011, Hales finalized a ground-breaking ten-year naming rights deal for the stadium with Mercedes-Benz. Throughout his tenure, he has helped create and implement a variety of innovative opportunities for local and national partners to build relationships with the club, including the development of Patron Saints Partners, a premium sponsorship program. Under his direction the club has added a sponsorship and fulfillment department, to ensure corporate partners receive the highest level of service.

The Saints have continued to increase the number and variety of television and radio programs after Hales assumed the role of the club's primary programming negotiator. In addition to three weekly in-season television programs, the Saints now produce numerous specials that have aired on three different local television stations throughout each season.

In 2006, the Saints achieved the first season ticket sellout in team history, a feat the team has equaled each season since then. The club was named the 2006 Marketer of the Year by the American Marketing Association's New Orleans regional chapter and also received the 2007 MAX Award for its 2006 "Winning Is An Attitude" advertising campaign.

Hales joined the Saints in 2000 as a corporate sales account executive. In 2001, he was promoted to corporate sales and broadcasting manager before becoming a director the following year and assuming the responsibilities of business and marketing operations.

Prior to joining the Saints, Hales worked in television advertising in the New Orleans market. In addition to his community efforts on behalf of the team, Hales is a member of the board for GNO, Inc., the New Orleans City Park Board of Commissioners and the People's Health Champions Selection Committee while also serving on the Super Bowl Bid Executive Committee and the NCAA Final Four Committee. Hales has also recently served on the Super Bowl XLVII Host Committee Executive Committee and NBA All-Star Host Committee.

In 2013, Hales was honored as a Young Leadership Council (YLC) Role Model and was named as one of The Gambit's 40 under 40 in 2012.

A native of New Orleans and a longtime Saints terrace and plaza level season ticket holder before joining the club, Hales earned a degree in English from the University of Mississippi in 1996.

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT OF SALES

Michael Stanfield was named senior vice president of sales for the New Orleans Saints and New Orleans Pelicans in June, 2012, overseeing all ticket sales efforts and operations for both franchises.

Entering his 16th season with the Saints and fourth with the Pelicans, Stanfield is responsible for all of the consumer marketing efforts – directing the sale of season and group tickets, developing sales executives to the next level in their field, supervising the lease of the Mercedes-Benz Superdome and Smoothie King Center luxury suites, managing food and beverage for both facilities, overseeing the sale of all team merchandise as well as maintaining the clubs' high standards of customer service and retention.

Since taking over leadership of the Pelicans' ticket sales and merchandising efforts, the organization has seen an increase in season-ticket sales and merchandise sales that were the second-biggest growth in the NBA in 2013, followed by another significant increase in 2014.

Under his direction, the Saints have surpassed the majority of the club's ticket sales milestones, including selling out on a season-ticket basis for the first time in franchise history in 2006 – a feat that has reached eight-straight seasons. In addition the club has leased every Superdome suite since the beginning of the 2008 campaign. Saints official merchandise has grown annually into one of the NFL's top sellers. Stanfield also supervises the ticket, suite sales and box office personnel on a daily basis, in addition to serving as the food and beverage service liaison with the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

Since Stanfield's arrival in 2000, the Saints have sold out every contest in the Superdome but one. Prior to the 2006 season, an innovative season-ticket marketing program fueled the rise of filling the stadium on a season-ticket basis. Fans on all economic levels were reached in an effort to retain existing accounts while cultivating new ones, and those efforts built a waiting list that has continued to grow for season tickets for the first time in franchise history. In 2014, the team established a single-season regular season attendance record for games played at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome with 584,900 fans attending Saints games.

Stanfield has also helped oversee the institution of a direct mail and email database to generate ticket sales and excitement surrounding the club and initiated other creative promotional campaigns by using the club's ever-expanding social and new media platforms. The Saints have also been recognized as one of the top organizations in professional sports for their customer service initiatives and outreach programs, including being named the top professional sports organization by ESPN The Magazine in June, 2010.

In 2007, Stanfield completed the Stanford Business School's Executive Education NFL-Stanford Program for Managers, an educational program and honor known league-wide as an important training ground for promising executives.

In prior work experience, Stanfield was served as director of ticket sales for the Detroit Tigers in 1998 where the Major League Baseball club achieved a then-club record for ticket revenue over a two-year span. He previously served as the director of ticket sales for the International Hockey League's Detroit Vipers in 1997. He was a member of the ticket sales staff for the Florida Marlins expansion franchise in 1993.

Stanfield is on the Board of Directors for the Saints Hall of Fame, and served a member of the Super Bowl XLVII Host Committee and the 2014 NBA All-Star Game Executive Host Committee. He is currently serving as a participant in the Jefferson Leadership Class of Eight, whose mission is to develop a diverse network of dedicated business and community leaders with the capacity to improve the quality of life for all citizens in Jefferson Parish and the Greater New Orleans region. Stanfield is a graduate of St. Leo University (Fla.) and grew up in Warren, N.J. A sports industry public speaker, Stanfield has given presentations at many national events. He is also an active speaker at numerous youth foundations and professional groups throughout the Gulf South.

In 2006 - after being the key figure in the hiring of Sean Payton, the signing of Drew Brees and essentially rebuilding a team that would advance to the NFC Championship - Loomis was voted the NFL Executive of the Year by Pro Football Weekly/Pro Football Writers of America. He was also honored by the Sporting News as the George Young Executive of the Year, an award voted on annually by NFL front-office executives and owners.

Loomis has continued to build on the success of 2006, highlighted by five postseason appearances, three division titles and the Super Bowl victory. Over the past nine years, he has brought aboard a collection of players who have played a key role in New Orleans posting a 93-61 overall record through a combination of the draft, free agency and trades. He's also presided over the club's ability to retain their core players, re-signing several significant contributors to long-term contracts.

While his responsibilities have grown during his tenure with the Saints, Loomis has been a key figure in the highest management circle of the organization since arriving in 2000. Loomis joined the club as director of football administration, a post he held until 2002, handling contract negotiations, managing the salary cap and coordinating different areas of the football operations.

In 2005, Loomis helped steer the club through unprecedented challenges for an NFL team. He calmly guided the staff and players through a sudden evacuation from New Orleans in the wake of Hurricane Katrina, in addition to several moves of the club's base of operations.

Since 2003, Loomis has overseen two extensive renovations of Saints headquarters that have added an indoor practice facility, new weight room and cafeteria and completely renovated coaches and player personnel offices, meeting rooms and locker rooms, giving the club one of the NFL's top training complexes.

Prior to arriving in New Orleans, Loomis spent 15 years with the Seattle Seahawks, including as executive vice president from 1992-98. He joined the Seahawks in October, 1983, was promoted to vice president/finance in 1990 and to Executive Vice President in 1992.

A native of Eugene, Ore., Loomis has a degree in accounting from the University of Oregon and a master's degree in sports administration from Wichita State University.

DELL DEMPS

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT OF BASKETBALL OPERATIONS/GENERAL MANAGER

Dell Demps enters his sixth season with the New Orleans Pelicans after being named the fourth general manager in franchise history on July 21, 2010. It is Demps' first stint as general manager of an NBA franchise. The 2015 NBA Playoffs marked the second post-season berth the franchise has earned since Demps joined the Pelicans. In his first season with New Orleans, the team made the 2011 playoffs after missing the postseason the year prior.

Demps, 44, joined the Pelicans after five seasons with the San Antonio Spurs and three years as the General Manager of the Spurs' NBA Development League affiliate, the Austin Toros. Demps joined the Spurs at the start of the 2005-06 season as Director of Pro Player Personnel and was promoted to Vice President of Basketball Operations in 2010. With the Spurs, Demps won an NBA Championship (2007). In each of the five seasons that he was with San Antonio, the team won at least 50 games. Prior to joining the Spurs, Demps worked for the New York Knicks from 2003 to 2005 where he joined the organization as a scout and was promoted to the Director of Pro Player Personnel. Demps also spent two seasons as an assistant coach with the Mobile Revelers in the NBA Development League from 2001-2003 where the Revelers captured the 2003 Development League championship.

Demps attended the University of the Pacific where he was a four-year starter on their basketball team, earning All-Big West honors three times. As a senior, he averaged 19.0 points and 5.8 rebounds and earned his bachelor's degree in business administration. While playing professionally, each summer he returned to Pacific and completed his Master's in Business Administration in 1998. Demps is currently a member of Pacific's Eberhardt School of Business Advisory Board. He was also elected to the Pacific Athletics Hall of Fame in 2003.

Demps had a 10-year basketball career where he played all over the world. He played for three seasons in the NBA with Golden State Warriors, San Antonio Spurs and the Orlando Magic. In addition, he played professionally in the Continental Basketball Association (CBA), Philippines, France, Greece, Turkey, Croatia and Venezuela.

ALVIN GENTRY

HEAD COACH

On May 30, 2015, Alvin Gentry was named the head coach of the New Orleans Pelicans – the sixth in the franchise's history.

Prior to joining the Pelicans organization, Gentry served as the associate head coach of the Golden State Warriors, helping navigate the team to one of the best seasons in NBA History. The Warriors won a franchise record 67 games – good for the best record in the NBA – and earned a trip to the 2015 NBA Finals to face the Cleveland Cavaliers.

Gentry, 60, brings more than 35 years of coaching experience to the Crescent City. Gentry has previously served as the head coach of the Miami HEAT (1995), Detroit Pistons (1997-2000), Los Angeles Clippers (2000-2003) and Phoenix Suns (2008-2013). In 705 games, Gentry has amassed a career record of 335-370 (.475). During his tenure in Detroit, Gentry led the Pistons to the 1999 NBA playoffs during his only full season as head coach of the club. In Los Angeles, Gentry improved the Clippers' record by 16 wins during his first season in 2000-01 (31-51), and added another eight wins the following season (39-43), marking the franchise's best finish in nearly a decade. As head coach of the Suns, Gentry led the team to the 2010 Western Conference finals after a 54-28 regular season record – the fourth best in Phoenix franchise history.

Known for his offensive prowess, Gentry's 2009-10 Suns team led the NBA in scoring (110.2 points per game) as well as offensive rating (115.3), and finished fourth in pace of play (95.3), while being the only team in the league to connect on over 40-percent of their three-point field goal attempts (.412). During the 2013-14 season, Gentry served as the associate head coach of the Clippers, where Los Angeles led the league in both scoring (107.9 points per game) and offensive rating (112.1), while also finishing seventh in pace of play (95.9). This past season while with the Warriors, Golden State led the league in scoring (110.0 point per game) and pace of play (98.3), while finishing second in offensive rating (111.6).

A native of Shelby, N.C., Gentry was a college point guard at Appalachian State, where he graduated with a degree in management in 1977 before embarking on a coaching career. He earned his first opportunity as a graduate assistant at the University of Colorado during the 1977-78 season and landed a full-time assistant coaching job at Baylor in 1980 before returning to Colorado as an assistant coach from 1981-85. In 1985, Gentry joined Larry Brown's staff as an assistant at the University of Kansas, helping the Jayhawks capture the 1988 National Championship and then proceeding to follow Brown to the NBA as an assistant coach on his staff with the San Antonio Spurs. This will be Gentry's second stop in New Orleans, as he served as an assistant coach for Tim Floyd's staff during the 2003-04 season.

Gentry and his wife, Suzanne, have two sons, Ryan (17) and Jack (14). Alvin also has a daughter, Alexis (30), who lives in Denver.

DARREN ERMAN

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH

Darren Erman enters his first season with the Pelicans after being named associate head coach on June 2, 2015. Erman comes to New Orleans from the Boston Celtics where he served as an assistant coach under Brad Stevens, helping Boston's defensive rating improve from 18th in the league (107.7) in 2013-14 to 12th (104.5) in 2014-15, and advancing to the NBA playoffs after a one year absence.

Erman joined Stevens' staff by way of Golden State, where he helped transform the Warriors' defense into one of the best in the NBA. Serving as an assistant coach from 2011-14, Golden State improved every year on the defensive end during Erman's tenure. In the 2011-12 season, his first with the team, Golden State ranked 28th in opponent points per game (101.2) and 27th in defensive rating (109.1). In his second season the Warriors improved to 19th in the league in opponent points per game (100.3) and 14th in defensive rating (105.5), and moved to 10th in the NBA in opponent points per game (99.5) and 4th in defensive rating (102.6) in the 2013-14 season.

Prior to his time in Golden State, Erman served as a coaching assistant for four seasons with the Celtics, working under Doc Rivers, Tom Thibodeau and Lawrence Frank. During his first stint in Boston, the Celtics captured the 2008 NBA championship, and boasted one of the league's most prolific defenses, ranking within the top five in opponent points per game and defensive rating all four years.

A native of Louisville, Ky., Erman began his coaching career as a student coach at Emory University in Atlanta, where he graduated summa cum laude/Phi Beta Kappa in 1997. After graduating from Northwestern University Law School in 2000, he practiced law at Latham & Watkins before making the decision to pursue coaching.



ROBERT PACK

ASSISTANT COACH

Robert Pack enters his first season as an assistant coach with the New Orleans Pelicans under Alvin Gentry, his second stint with the organization. Pack spent the previous two seasons as an assistant coach with the Oklahoma City Thunder. Pack began his coaching career in New Orleans, serving as an assistant coach in the Crescent City during the 2009-10 season before spending three seasons with the Los Angeles Clippers in a similar role.

After going undrafted out of the University of Southern California, Pack enjoyed a 13-year NBA playing career in which he averaged 8.9 points, 4.6 assists and 2.0 rebounds in 552 career games with the Portland Trail Blazers, Denver Nuggets, Washington Wizards, New Jersey Nets, Dallas Mavericks, Minnesota Timberwolves and the New Orleans Hornets. Pack appeared in 28 games for New Orleans during the 2002-03 season, averaging 5.2 points and 2.9 assists.

Nicknamed "Pac-Man", Pack was a member of the 1991-92 Portland team that advanced to the NBA Finals and was a member of the 1993-94 Denver Nuggets' squad that made NBA history as the first No. 8 seed to defeat a No. 1 seed in the first round of the NBA Playoffs. Pack was the runner-up in the 1994 NBA All-Star Slam Dunk Contest in Minneapolis. Upon the conclusion of his NBA playing career, Pack played overseas in Lithuania and Spain from 2004-2006 before pursuing a career in coaching.

A native of New Orleans, Pack played collegiate basketball at the University of Southern California, ranking seventh on the Trojans' all-time assists list (319) in just two seasons, while becoming the fourth player in school history to record back-to-back 100 assist seasons. In two years at Southern California, he averaged 13.4 points and 5.6 assists per game.



PHIL WEBER

ASSISTANT COACH

Phil Weber enters his first season in New Orleans as an assistant coach. Prior to joining the Pelicans, Weber served as the head coach of the NBA Development League's Sioux Falls Skyforce, leading the Skyforce to the team's first ever division championship. Before Sioux Falls, Weber served as an offensive advisor for Miami during the HEAT's back-to-back championship runs in 2012 and 2013. During the 2012-13 season, Miami posted the highest offensive efficiency rating in the NBA at 110.3.

Weber has over 30 years of coaching experience in the college and professional ranks. Weber began his coaching career serving in the NCAA as an assistant coach at the University of Florida (1984-89), before moving on to Chaminade University (1990-91) and Iona College (1991-95). Weber made the transition to the NBA in 1999, serving as an assistant with the Phoenix Suns until 2008, where he coached alongside current Pelicans Head Coach Alvin Gentry. From 2008-12, Weber served as an assistant with the New York Knicks.

A native of Northport, N.Y., Weber led Long Island Lutheran High School to a New York State Championship. After high school, Weber played for legendary coach Jim Valvano at North Carolina State, where he was a member of the 1983 NCAA Championship team.

Weber resides in New Orleans with his wife, Lila.



FRED VINSON

ASSISTANT COACH

Fred Vinson begins his sixth season as an assistant coach with the New Orleans Pelicans. Prior to joining the Pelicans, Vinson was an assistant coach for the Los Angeles Clippers from 2007-09. In addition to his duties as an assistant coach, Vinson also served as director of player programs for the Clippers, where he was responsible for mentoring young players and easing their transition to the NBA.

Vinson played 13 years of professional basketball, including two NBA seasons with the Atlanta Hawks and Seattle SuperSonics. In addition to playing in the United States Basketball League, Continental Basketball Association and American Basketball Association, Vinson spent several years overseas with professional clubs in the Philippines, Israel, Venezuela, Poland and France. In 2003, Vinson was a member of the CBA Champion Yakima Sun Kings, in addition to being named a CBA All-Star that season. He also holds the record for most points in a game in Guaiquiries de Margarita (Venezuela) team history with 53.

Vinson graduated from Georgia Tech in 1994 with a degree in business management and was a three-year letterman for the Yellow Jackets. He also attended Chowan Junior College (North Carolina), where he was inducted into the school's hall of fame in November 2014 for the men's basketball team.



KEVIN HANSON

ASSISTANT COACH

Kevin Hanson begins his sixth season with the Pelicans, his third as an assistant coach after serving as the team's player development coach in his first three seasons.

Hanson joined the San Antonio Spurs in the summer of 2008 as an assistant video coordinator and was named the Spurs' player development assistant in the summer of 2010.

Born and raised in Huntington Beach, Calif., he led Ocean View High School to a CIF Championship. He played four seasons at University of San Diego, earning a bachelor's degree in communications and a minor in sociology. After college, he spent five seasons playing professionally overseas in Argentina and Germany.



ELVIS VALCARCEL

SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE HEAD COACH

Elvis Valcarcel begins his first season with the Pelicans as the special assistant to the head coach after spending the past two seasons with the Sacramento Kings serving as the team's video coordinator.

Before joining the Kings, Valcarcel was the video coordinator for the Phoenix Suns from 2009-13 after serving as the assistant video coordinator during the 2008-09 season. While with the Suns, Valcarcel also was an assistant coach for the Suns' NBA Summer League squad in 2010 and 2012 and did advance scouting in 2011 and 2012. Valcarcel was also the video coordinator for the Phoenix Mercury in 2009 when they won the WNBA championship. Prior to Phoenix, Valcarcel worked two years as an administrative assistant/video coordinator for the men's basketball program at Seton Hall University.

From Union City, N.J., Valcarcel earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Criminal Justice and Sociology from Rutgers University.



JAMELLE MCMILLAN

PLAYER DEVELOPMENT COACH

Jamelle McMillan begins his fourth season with the Pelicans, his third in the role of player development coach after serving as a coaching intern during the 2012-13 season. Prior to New Orleans, McMillan was the Director of Basketball Operations for Drake University. A four year player at Arizona State University, McMillan was a team captain and finished tied for 6th in school history with 122 games played. Additionally, his career 37.3% three-point shooting percentage ties for 10th all-time in Sun Devils history.

Born and raised in Seattle, Wash., McMillan is the son of Indiana Pacers lead assistant coach (and former Portland Trailblazers head coach) Nate McMillan. McMillan holds a bachelor's degree in communications earned in May 2011.



J.J. [JIMMY] POLK

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF BASKETBALL ADMINISTRATION

J.J. Polk enters his sixth season with the New Orleans Pelicans, his fourth as executive director of basketball administration after spending his first two seasons as director of player contracts and basketball administration. Mr. Polk joined the Pelicans after practicing law at Bryan Cave LLP for six years as an associate in the Real Estate and Banking Practice Group.

Prior to attending law school, Mr. Polk played professional basketball in Sweden, Latvia and China.

Mr. Polk received his Juris Doctor from the University of Illinois College of Law. Mr. Polk earned a political science and managerial studies degree from Rice University.



DAVID BOOTH

DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

David Booth begins his sixth season with the New Orleans Pelicans, his third as director of player personnel after serving as director of scouting in 2012-13 and regional scout from 2010-12.

Booth came to New Orleans from his alma mater, DePaul University, where he served as an assistant coach during the 2009-10 season. He received his first NBA experience as a regional scout with the Memphis Grizzlies from 2005-09 after a one-year stint as an assistant coach at Illinois Central Community College.

Prior to playing 13 years of professional basketball, Booth was a four-year letterman at DePaul from 1988-92, where he ranks among the program's top 10 in scoring, field goals, steals, free throws and blocked shots. He ranks second in school history with 1,933 career points and third all-time with 713 career field goals. Booth received a degree in communications from DePaul University in 1992. He and his wife, Melissa, have three children, Mariah, 24, Sydney, 20, and Brandon, 16.



SHANE KUPPERMAN

DIRECTOR OF BASKETBALL OPERATIONS

Shane Kupperman, a native New Orleanian, enters his seventh season with the New Orleans Pelicans. In his current role as director of basketball operations, Kupperman assists the general manager in the day-to-day management of basketball operations. In addition, his current responsibilities include salary cap management, roster management, and player evaluation at the collegiate, professional, and international levels. Kupperman previously served in a variety of roles with the Pelicans, including responsibility for the team's analytics efforts. Prior to joining the Pelicans, Kupperman served two seasons on the basketball staff at the University of Southern California under Head Coach Tim Floyd, during which USC won the PAC-10 Conference Tournament for the first time in school history. Kupperman began his basketball career while in college at Indiana University when he was a student manager.



MARC CHASANOFF

COORDINATOR OF PRO PLAYER PERSONNEL

Marc Chasanoff enters his sixth season with the New Orleans Pelicans, his third as coordinator of pro player personnel after previously serving as a pro scout, basketball operations assistant and video coordinator. Prior to coming to New Orleans, Chasanoff worked as a basketball operations intern with the Charlotte Bobcats.

Chasanoff, a Bradenton, Fla. native, went to Flagler College and received a degree in sports management and business administration.



DAN PURCELL

BASKETBALL OPERATIONS MANAGER

Dan Purcell enters his first season as the team's basketball operations manager after serving as basketball operations assistant for the Pelicans since 2013. Prior to joining the Pelicans, Purcell served as the director of basketball operations for the National Basketball Academy in Beachwood, Ohio.

Prior to joining the Pelicans, Graham was a graduate assistant for the Texas A&M men's basketball team while in graduate school following a three year playing career at A&M. Graham was part of the Aggies men's basketball teams that advanced to the Sweet Sixteen in 2006-07 and the second round of the NCAA Tournament in 2007-08 and 2008-09, graduating in 2009 with a degree in human resource development with a minor in business. Matt Whinrey begins his third season with the Pelicans, his second in the role of video coordinator after serving as the assistant video coordinator in 2013-14.

Prior to joining the Pelicans, Whinrey was an NBA regional scout and basketball operations assistant for the Cleveland Cavaliers. After graduating with a degree in math and psychology from IUPUI in 2009, Whinrey worked as a student assistant coach for the men's basketball team before being named an assistant coach from 2010-2012.



DUANE BROOKS

HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER

Duane Brooks, who brings over two decades of experience in his field, enters his second season with the New Orleans Pelicans after spending the previous 13 seasons as the New Orleans Saints' assistant athletic trainer. Brooks is responsible for the health care, prevention and rehabilitation of injuries, daily training room operations and maintenance of the team's medical records. Brooks joined the Saints in 2002 after spending six seasons with Florida State University in a similar capacity. His contributions since have helped the athletic training staff earn several awards, including the 2007 Southeastern Athletic Trainers' Association (SEATA) Professional Athletic Trainers Award and both the Professional Football Athletic Training Society Staff of the Year and Fain Cain Memorial Award in 2006.

While at Florida State, Brooks was the assistant football athletic trainer and head athletic trainer for the baseball team. He traveled to the College World Series three times and was a member of a staff that participated in four national championship football games. Brooks completed summer internships with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1992, 1993 and 1996.

A member of both the National Athletic Trainers Association and the Louisiana Athletic Trainers Association, Brooks has a bachelor's degree from Florida A&M and earned his master's degree in athletic administration at Florida State.



JASON SUMERLIN

HEAD STRENGTH & CONDITIONING COACH

Jason Sumerlin enters his second season with the Pelicans, his first as the head strength & conditioning coach. In this role, Sumerlin will oversee the athletic development and training of Pelican players. Last season, Sumerlin was the assistant strength & conditioning coach for the club.

Prior to joining the Pelicans, Sumerlin spent five season serving as the assistant strength coach for the San Antonio Spurs, during which the Spurs made two appearances in the NBA Finals in 2013 and 2014, capturing the NBA Championship in five games over Miami in 2014.

A native of San Antonio, Sumerlin graduated from Texas Tech University in Lubbock, earning a degree in sports science with a minor in nutrition. While at Texas Tech, Sumerlin served as an assistant strength and conditioning coach for the football and golf teams.



MICHAEL RUFFIN

ASSISTANT STRENGTH & CONDITIONING/PLAYER DEVELOP-

A nine-year NBA veteran, Michael Ruffin enters his second year as player development coach for the Pelicans and his first as the assistant strength and conditioning coach. Selected No. 32 overall in the 1999 NBA Draft out of the University of Tulsa, Ruffin appeared in 414 career games with Chicago, Philadelphia, Utah, Washington, Milwaukee and Portland, and also played internationally in Spain.

A Denver native, Ruffin was a member of the gold-medal-winning United States team at the 1997 World University Games.



DAVID JOVANOVIC

EQUIPMENT MANAGER

David Jovanovic, an employee of the franchise since their inaugural season in 1988, returns for his 29th season with the Pelicans in 2015-16.

His responsibilities as the team's equipment manager consist of ordering and maintaining all of the team's equipment and maintaining the team's locker room. At home games, he ensures that the team and their opponents have everything they need for game preparation. In addition, he travels with the team to all preseason, regular season and playoff games and can be found in his usual seat at the end of the bench.

"Big Shot," as he is known by the players and staff, also directs the team's extensive ball boy program.

Along with his daily responsibilities with the team, he has also assisted with the original 1988 CBA tryouts for the team, the 1991, 2008 and 2014 NBA All-Star Games, training camp for the 1995 USA Women's Basketball Team that competed in Atlanta for the Summer Olympics, an exhibition game with the 1994 USA Men's Basketball Team that competed in the World Championships in Toronto as well as numerous NCAA Tournament Regionals and ACC Tournaments.

A native of Arlington, Va., Jovanovic attended Belmont Abbey College in Belmont, N.C., and earned his bachelor's degree in mathematics in 1988.



BASKETBALL/BROADCAST COMMUNICATIONS COORDINATOR

Trahant will also work with the director of broadcasting in fulfilling the day-to-day audio and video obligations to the team, as well as assisting the radio producer/host and radio/television broadcast talent on securing content for use in the Pelicans' home and away broadcasts, day-to-day operation of the radio studio and digital radio production needs.

He transitioned fully to the department prior to the 2014-15 season after serving as the New Orleans Saints/Pelicans Communications intern for the 2013-14 season. Trahant is a New Orleans native who graduated from Jesuit High School and Louisiana State University.

Matt Ryan enters his fourth season as the director of basketball communications for the New Orleans Pelicans. Ryan oversees many of the daily aspects of the department such as the media guide, credentialing, writing news releases, fulfilling player and staff interview requests both locally and nationally, while maintaining statistical upkeep of player performances. As Director, Ryan represents the department on all team travel including road trips, All-Star events, Summer League and the NBA Draft. He transitioned to the department in 2012 after beginning his career with the New Orleans Saints communications department prior to the 2011 season. Ryan is a New Orleans native who graduated from Jesuit High School and Tulane University.



LINDSEY MITCHELL

CORPORATE COMMUNICATIONS MANAGER

Lindsey Mitchell begins her ninth season with the Pelicans, her fifth as corporate communications manager. Mitchell moved to the corporate side of the department prior to the 2011-12 season after serving as the basketball communications coordinator for four years. Mitchell is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the team's corporate communications efforts and serves as the primary point of contact for all media outlets in regards to off-the-court initiatives. Additionally, she works with the Pelicans' marketing team to develop and execute effective strategic and tactical plans for external communications. In addition to her responsibilities with the Pelicans, Mitchell also serves as the primary contact for Gayle M. Benson in regards to speaking engagements and appearances, as well as charitable opportunities and relationships. Mitchell also recently began managing the Gayle and Tom Benson Charitable Foundation.

Mitchell started with the organization in August 2007 and spent four years on the basketball side of the department. In addition to her public relations role, Mitchell was also a contributor to the web site. A native of North Canton, Ohio, Mitchell spent a year as an assistant in the Rutgers Athletic Communications department. During her time with the Scarlet Knights, Mitchell served as the primary contact for seven sports and acted as the secondary contact for the women's basketball team, as well as helping execute the communications efforts for the football team.

Mitchell, a 2006 graduate of Bloomsburg University, worked for three years in the sports information department, while also participating in the Public Relations Student Society of America and chairing the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee. In four seasons as a member of the Huskies' tennis team, she helped the squad to three appearances in the NCAA Division II Sweet 16, as well as three conference titles.

Mitchell has served on the board and been a member of the New Orleans Press Club, an organization comprised of journalists, journalism educators and public relations professionals that holds events and workshops focused on networking and professional development.



WILL MCCLARAN

BASKETBALL COMMUNICATIONS MANAGER

Will McClaran enters his second season with the New Orleans Pelicans Basketball Communications department. McClaran is the department's primary game notes writer and is responsible for writing news releases, maintaining team statistical databases, organizing game day operations, fulfilling external and internal media requests and accompanying the organization on team travel.

Prior to joining the Pelicans, McClaran served as the director of public and community relations for the Maine Red Claws of the NBA Development League. Not a stranger to New Orleans, McClaran was a basketball communications intern with the franchise during the 2008-09 season.

A native of Portland, Maine, McClaran holds bachelor's and master's degrees in sport management from Nichols College (Dudley, Mass.), where he currently serves on the program's advisory board.

Media Credentials

Single game requests should be directed to the Pelicans communications office no later than noon the day before the game you wish to cover (Friday at noon for Sunday and Monday games). First-time requests must be in written form on company letterhead and received by the aforementioned deadline. Because of limited press seating, credentials and/or courtside seats cannot be guaranteed. Credentials are good for admittance to the press room, dining area, locker rooms and seating areas and may be picked up at the press entrance (located at the loading dock entrance, which is across the street from Lot #4 at the Smoothie King Center). Credentials must be worn at all times and are non-transferable. Any unauthorized use will subject the bearer to ejection from the arena and the forfeiture of the credential. An autograph request by a media member will also result in the forfeiture of the credential.

Press Parking/Press Gate

Working media should park in Lot #4 (off of Girod Street) and cross the street to enter the Smoothie King Center through the doors by the loading dock. You will be able to pick up your credential at a table in front of the security office windows upon entering the arena. Your name will be on a parking list held by the security guard at the entrance of the lot.

Press Room

The press room is located at the west end of the arena to the right of the loading dock areas and is open four hours before game time. We must limit press room usage to the working media and game staff only. We are not able to accommodate any family, friends or guests. Telephones, fax service, internet access, game notes, statistics, quotes and out-of-town scores are available in this area. Please use common courtesy in securing a quiet working environment in the press room.

Pre and Post-Game Interviews

In accordance with NBA policy, the locker rooms are open to members of the media until 45 minutes before the game and within 10 minutes after the game. Players and coaches are available for interviews at those times. Only working members of the media with valid credentials will be admitted to the locker room. Your cooperation is requested in maintaining a professional atmosphere in the locker room for pre and post game interviews. Per NBA policy, use of cellular phones in the locker room is prohibited. Head Coach Alvin Gentry will be available 105 minutes prior to tip-off outside the team's locker room and approximately 10 minutes following the game in the press room.

Game Notes and Statistics

Game notes and additional press materials are available in the press room three hours before each game. Statistics are distributed to the working media during the game and are also available in the press room. Post-game notes and quotes are distributed a short time following the completion of the game. Statistics monitors are provided at courtside for television and radio broadcasts as well as for print and television media.

Photographers

Season passes will be provided to accredited photographers from New Orleans area daily newspapers and television stations who plan on covering at least 30 of the Pelicans' 41 regular season home games. Weekly newspaper photographers will

be handled on an individual game basis. Photographs are also available from the communications department. Photographers must be on assignment for a publication to be credentialed. Limited space is available at each end of the court for both television and still photographers. Photographers must stay in the designated area. Photographers may not sit on equipment cases and live television cameras have first priority on location and right of way. All NBA league rules regarding photography apply.

Meals

A pre-game meal is served in the room adjacent to the media workroom at the arena two and a half hours before each game. Beverages and snacks are available in the press room at halftime and following each game.

Practice Policy


The Pelicans practice facility is located at 5800 Airline Drive in Metairie, LA. Media should enter through the media entrance of the building (posted on the doors, located adjacent to the main entrance) and park in the general parking lot. Practices are closed to the public, but open for the final 15 minutes to the media. The players and coaches are available immediately following the practice for courtside interviews. Please contact the Pelicans communications department to confirm practice times and the availability of the players and coaches. Interviews lasting longer than five minutes should be scheduled in advance with the Pelicans communications department. Photographers and television crews may shoot the final 15 minutes of practice. There is a press area with phone access available to the media throughout practice.

Directions From the N.O. Airport (Louis Armstrong) to the Smoothie King Center


Follow airport access road to I-10 East. Go approximately eight miles, stay in the right lanes at I-10/I-610 split (after Bonnabel Blvd. Exit) and follow I-10 Eastbound towards downtown New Orleans. Go approximately three miles after the split, stay in the middle lanes and take the Superdome Exit. Turn right at the end of the ramp onto Girod Street. The arena is in the first block on your right. Driving time is approximately 30 minutes, but allow 45 minutes during rush hour.

Directions From Downtown N.O. to the Pelicans Practice Facility

Take I-10 westbound towards Baton Rouge. Exit 226 for Clearview Parkway South towards the Huey Long Bridge. Merge on to Clearview Parkway and turn right on to Airline Drive. Destination is 1.1 miles up Airline on the lefthand side. The duration of the trip is approximately 20 minutes. Please see above practice policy for parking and entrance instructions.

A center stage for all forms of entertainment, the Smoothie King Center is home to the Pelicans and is the setting for some of the music industry's top performers and acts. The 16-year-old arena (opened October 29, 1999) stands tall in the colorful mix of downtown New Orleans and is connected by two pedestrian ramps to the magnificent Mercedes-Benz Superdome. Built for \$112 million, the facility is managed by SMG, which provides facility services to 189 venues worldwide. With a seating capacity of 18,500 (16,867 for Pelicans games), the Arena contains 56 executive suites, HUB Club including 140 seats, and 2,800 club seats, maintaining and providing personal amenities specific to each suite. The Arena provides numerous amenities at various locations for the convenience of its patrons: 24 permanent stands for food and beverage, three permanent stands for merchandise, 18 women's restrooms and 14 men's restrooms on public concourses and a 5,000-car Superdome garage adjacent to the Arena. All seating and access are in compliance with ADA regulations.

IMPROVEMENTS

The Smoothie King Center is undergoing \$50 million in renovations. The first phase of upgrades, which was completed before the start of the 2013-14 season, include new club locations, an internal bandstand/bar area, suite renovations, interior club renovations, as well as the creation of exterior club space, expansion of the existing Capital One Club as well as the popular Hub Club, a new V-VIP area, a limited access Chairman's Club a grand new lobby, and expanded locker rooms. The second phase included exterior work and was finished prior to start of the 2014-15 season. The third phase, which will be completed prior to the start of the 2015-16 season, will be highlighted by a new, state-of-the-art video scoreboard.

LOCATION

The Smoothie King Center is located downtown, at the foot of a ramp from Interstate 10, the Mississippi River Bridge approach and the Pontchartrain Expressway; connected by two pedestrian ramps to the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

MANAGEMENT

Headquartered in Philadelphia, SMG provides facility services to 189 venues in 41 states, Puerto Rico, Canada and Europe, controls over 1.92 million entertainment seats worldwide, and manages over nine million square feet of exhibit space. For additional company information, visit www.smgworld.com.

CLUB SEATS

The Smoothie King Center has 2,800 club seats via seat licenses, all located in the middle sections of the lower bowl; 1,400 each side of the arena floor. All have oversized, cushioned seats with cup holders. Excellent access is provided to Club lounges (one on each side). Club seat holders have options for all Arena events.

EXECUTIVE SUITES

The Smoothie King Center has 56 executive suites; 16 have 18 theatre-style seats; all others have 12 theatre-style seats. Other amenities include a private concourse, refrigerators, wet bar, television sets with in-house TV and cable channels, access and membership to two club level lounges and preferred parking. The super suite remains one of the Arena's unique attributes. Named the HUB club (HUB International Ltd.), this super suite offers the convenience, comfort, and service of a private suite on a single-game basis. The HUB Club includes 140 seats and is newly furnished with the same plush carpeting, tables, chairs and TV monitors.

COURTSIDE CLUB

Accessed from the East Lobby on La Salle Street, the Courtside Club offers a lounge area, dining facilities, a patio area and a unique view of the team as it heads onto the court.

SCOREBOARDS/INFORMATION SYSTEM

The Smoothie King Center has a four-sided center-hung scoreboard and two Daktronics ProAd hustle boards located in each end zone and monitors throughout the concourses, suites and private dining areas.

PRESS FACILITIES

Media facilities include courtside seating, a working press area, an interview area and dining area provisions for uplink to satellite vans and state-of-the-art TV broadcast facilities.

LOCKER ROOMS

Along with the Pelicans locker room and visiting NBA locker room, the Arena is equipped with three additional locker rooms along with six dressing rooms and three production offices.

CONCESSION STANDS

The Smoothie King Center has 24 permanent concession stands plus numerous other portable units for the sale of food, beverages and souvenir items.

BOX OFFICE

The Smoothie King Center has full box office services, with 16 ticket windows at the main entrance on the Northwest corner of the facility plus six additional windows on the East end of the building. The box office phone number is (504) 587-3822.

ARENA FLOOR

The Smoothie King Center floor has 24,650 square feet of column-free space; 290 ft. long by 85 ft. wide, with retractable seating units in one end zone.

The New Orleans Pelicans relocated to a brand new, state-of-the-art practice facility prior to the start of the 2013-14 season. The Pelicans share the same campus as the NFL's New Orleans

Saints at 5800 Airline Drive in Metairie, LA, the only such arrangement in major North American sports. The \$16 million, 50,000 square foot practice facility houses a 32,000 square foot practice area that features two full-sized basketball courts, offices for coaches and basketball operations staff, and a team theatre for film review. The building also includes a 12,000 square foot area that contains the Pelicans' locker room, players' lounge, barber shop, equipment room, and training room. Since moving to New Orleans in 2002, the team has operated at a temporary setup at the Alario Center, a public multipurpose facility in Westwego, La.

FLEUR-DE-LIS

A most notable symbol of New Orleans, the Fleur-de-lis is also represented within the primary and secondary marks. Its roots lie within its French origin and the deep cultural heritage of our city and is thus displayed on the city's flag. The mark, however, came to mean much more after Hurricane Katrina devastated the region, and came to symbolize the heart and resolve of the city.

CRESCENT BASKETBALL

Coined the "Crescent City" in 1835, New Orleans derived its popular nickname as it was established along the semi-circle bend of the Mississippi River. The crescent shape is thereby represented in several of the marks.

Blue, gold and red are the colors represented in the flag of New Orleans.

PRIMARY - BLUE

Representative of the state flag of Louisiana. Traditionally represents liberty (as in the City of New Orleans flag).

SECONDARY - GOLD

The raucous embellishment and flourish that represents the spirited life of New Orleans. It's a color indicative of the city itself. It ties together this organization (shared color with the Saints), the rich and diverse history of the city and its culture of celebration. It's the color often found in the "crown" of pelicans and represented the championships we intend to win.

TERTIARY - RED

Red signifies fraternity, one blood or union, as with this team of players. It also represents the legend of the mother pelican pricking her own breast to feed her young in times of need, doing whatever it takes to endure. It's found on the throat of this powerful bird and provides a flash of intensity.

COMMUNITY INITIATIVES

The New Orleans Pelicans community efforts focus on two key initiatives critical to the future success and prosperity of the Gulf South region: the health and sustainability of our coastal wetlands and the health and fitness of our region's children.

In conjunction with our community and corporate partners, the Pelicans are executing several outreach programs that will positively impact and inspire the lives of individuals in our community.

The health of the coastal wetlands is vital to growth and success of the state and region. The Louisiana wetlands provide 30% of the seafood catch in the contiguous U.S. Our wetlands habitat is also home to a wide variety and number of wildlife and plants.

Over 80% of wetland loss in the United States occurs in Louisiana – the equivalent of 12 basketball courts is lost every 30 minutes. The Gulf Coast has lost more than 55% of the wetlands that were here when the first Europeans arrived in the 15th century – a loss of more than 100 million acres.

The New Orleans Pelicans and the Audubon Nature Institute continue to team up to help preserve Louisiana's coast and wetlands. The long-term partnership focuses specifically on educating students on the effects of coastal restoration on the Region, as well as inspiring them to take action to ensure the long-term health of the coast.

The Pelicans organization is an advocate for the health and wellness of children in the Gulf South. With the ongoing goal of helping kids find the excitement in being active, the Pelicans host their Junior Training Camp program presented by Smoothie King, and Ochsner Health System. Junior Training Camps engage students in activities focused on creating a fun and memorable basketball experience, while also being active and healthy.

The NBA recently announced its Jr. NBA presented by Under Armour initiative, the NBA's youth basketball participation program for boys and girls ages 6-14. The Jr. NBA teaches the fundamental skills as well as the core values of the game at the grassroots level in an effort to help grow and improve the youth basketball experience for players, coaches and parents.

As an extension of the Jr. NBA, the Pelicans have launched the Jr. Pelicans program. The team will host events throughout the season, including clinics for coaches and players.
