MEDIA INFORMATION

Credentials

Credentials will be distributed on a game-by-game basis and should be requested in writing on company letterhead by the editor of Sports Editor of your company. Requests should be faxed to the Mystics Communications department and submitted at least 24 hours in advance. Press and photo credentials are issued to accredited media members and will admit the bearer to the press room, locker rooms and press seating in the arena during the designated time periods. Credentials may be picked up at the press gate located at the corner of 6th and G Streets of Verizon Center, two-and-a-half hours before tip off. Credentials must be visibly worn at all times.

Press room

The press room will be open two-and-a-half hours before game time, during and following the game. The professional intent of the press room is to provide a meeting and working place for writers, reporters, broadcasters and game personnel. Any abuse of the press room and/or press privilege will result in forfeiture of your press pass. The working area of the press room is equipped with a fax machine, telephone, statistics, post-games quotes and other WNBA information.

Locker room

In accordance with WNBA policy, both the Mystics and the visiting locker rooms will be open to members of the media for a 30-minute period ending 60 minutes before the start of a game, and again, after every game for a 30-minute period starting no later than ten minutes following the end of the game. Head Coach Julie Plank will meet with the media following the game in the interview room directly next to the press room. No autographs are allowed by credentialed media. Violation of this policy will result in forfeiture of your press pass.

Photographers

Limited space is available at each end of the court for both television and still photographers holding proper credentials. Photographers must stay in the designated areas and are asked to be considerate of spectators seated directly behind them.

Meals

A meal will be served in the press room prior to each nationally televised game.

Game Notes and Statistics

Pre-game press notes, media guides and line up sheets will be available in the interview room prior to each game. Game statistics will be distributed to the working media during the game and will be available in the press room.

LINCOLN HOLDINGS, LLC

In the spring of 1999 Lincoln Holdings LLC purchased 100% of the Washington Capitals (held in the name of Lincoln Hockey LLC, a wholly owned subsidiary of Lincoln Holdings) and, together with a subsequent purchase, approximately 44% of Washington Sports and Entertainment Limited Partnership (WSELP). WSELP owns 100% of the NBA Washington Wizards, Verizon Center and the Baltimore-Washington Ticketmaster franchise. In 2005 Lincoln Holdings purchased the WNBA's Washington Mystics from WSELP. Lincoln Holdings has a right of first refusal on the sale of any of the individual teams or other assets, as well as an option to purchase Abe Pollin's majority interest in WSELP.

All of the current partners of Lincoln Holdings are extremely active in the Washington-area business community.

Dick Patrick, along with Ted Leonsis, is one of the original partners in Lincoln Holdings LLC, which was formed in the spring of 1999. A mainstay for the Washington Capitals' franchise for more than two decades, the owner, president and alternate governor continues to lead the club with his tireless effort and intense desire to continue a family tradition – engraving the Patrick name onto the Stanley Cup.

Patrick, who joined the Capitals prior to the 1982-83 season, guides the organization on a daily basis. The former chairman of the NHL Finance Committee, Patrick has been instrumental in the Capitals' long-term success as a franchise both on and off the ice. Patrick was a leader in the conception and development of the Kettler Capitals Iceplex, the team's state-of-the-art training center and office building that opened in 2006 in Arlington, Va.

Born in 1946 in Victoria, B.C., Patrick grew up in the United States. He earned his undergraduate degree from Dartmouth College and a law degree from the Washington College of Law at American University. He has developed commercial real estate in the Washington, D.C., area for more than 20 years and, while raising children who have skated within local youth hockey programs, he has been instrumental in increasing the Capitals' involvement in youth programs throughout the area.

Jack Davies was the founder and president of AOL International and now serves on the board of directors of Scholastic, the global children's publishing and media company. Prior to joining AOL in 1993, Davies was managing director of Citicorp's London-based consumer mortgage business after serving as vice president, Europe, for RCA Records. He began his career at General Electric where he held numerous senior consumer marketing positions. Davies earned an MBA in Marketing (1973) and a BA in Political Science (1972) from the University of Rochester.

Active in philanthropy in the D.C. area, Davies serves on a number of boards including the Board and Executive Committee of Venture Philanthropy Partners. In addition he is on the board of See Forever

Foundation, CharityWorks and The Washington Scholarship Fund.

Richard D. Fairbank is founder, chairman and chief executive officer of Capital One Financial Corporation, a broadly diversified financial services company ranked 130th on the Fortune 500. Mr. Fairbank founded Capital One in 1988 based on his belief that the power of information, technology and testing could be harnessed to bring highly customized financial products directly to consumers. Headquartered in McLean, Va., Capital One is the seventh-largest bank in the United States, offering a broad spectrum of financial products and services to consumers, small businesses and commercial clients. With the company's newly acquired subsidiary, Chevy Chase Bank, F.S.B., Capital One has approximately 1,000 branch locations in New York, New Jersey, Louisiana, Texas, Maryland, Virginia, and the District of Columbia. Additionally, Capital One has international businesses in the United Kingdom and Canada.

Capital One has been widely recognized for its entrepreneurial culture, progressive work place, and community engagement. Recently, Capital One has been named to: Fortune's "100 Best Companies to Work For," Fortune's "20 Great Employers for New Grads," BusinessWeek's "Best Places to Launch a Career," Working Mother's "100 Best Companies" and DiversityInc's "Top 50 Companies for Diversity." Capital One also was named to Fortune Magazine's list of "Top Companies for Leaders," ranking second in North America and fifth globally. Under Fairbank's leadership, Capital One has demonstrated a strong commitment to philanthropy and volunteerism, supporting a number of area programs focused on community redevelopment and youth education, including DC Cares, the DC College Access Program and Junior Achievement. Fairbank has been recognized for his community and industry leadership, including his 2008 appointment to the President's Council on Service and Civic Participation. He also was honored as a 2008 Washington Business Hall of Fame Laureate and was named "2006 Banker of the Year" by the American Banker. Fairbank holds an MBA from the Stanford Graduate School of Business and a bachelor's degree in economics from Stanford University.

Raul Fernandez is the chairman of ObjectVideo, a private technology company that develops video analytics software for automated security surveillance. He is also a special advisor to General Atlantic Partners, a growth equity firm with over \$17 billion under management. Fernandez founded Proxicom, an internet services company he started in 1991 with \$40,000 in savings. After taking Proxicom public in 1999 and growing the business to more than \$200 million in revenue, he sold it to Dimension Data in 2001. Fernandez also serves on the board of Liz Claiborne; TROW, a Toronto-based engineering and consulting firm; ValueOptions, the nation's largest independent behavioral healthcare company; Network Solutions, the leader in web-based domain name and related services and Capital Acquisition Corporation, a \$250

million telecommunications, technology and media-oriented special purpose acquisition company.

Fernandez, a native Washingtonian, has been active on the non-profit and technology policy fronts. In 2001, Fernandez was appointed to, and continues to serve on, the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology. An executive producer of the film "Kicking It," he holds a bachelor's degree in economics from the University of Maryland.

Michelle DiFebo Freeman is the owner and an active board member of the Carl M. Freeman Companies, with offices in Olney, Md., and Fenwick Island, Del. The Freeman Companies has over 60 years in a variety of real estate ventures, currently with special expertise in land acquisition, land planning, development and redevelopment for award-winning, amenity-rich residential communities and neighborhood shopping centers. Notable real estate developments and redevelopments by the Freeman Companies include Sea Colony, the Village at Bear Trap, Bayside (including a Jack Nicklaus Signature Golf Course) at the Delmarva Shore, The Tidewater Inn in Easton, Md., and Olney Village Center and Cabin John Center and Mall in Montgomery County, Md.

Michelle is also the founding president and chairman of the board of the Joshua M. Freeman Foundation. The Joshua M. Freeman Foundation was created in 2007 to conceptualize, construct and operate sustainable facilities that support the arts, the environment and athletic achievement. Michelle has also served as the president and chairman of the board of the Carl M. Freeman Foundation since 2007. The Carl M. Freeman Foundation has been proudly giving grants and guidance since 1960 to hundreds of nonprofit organizations in Maryland, Virginia, Washington, D.C., Delaware and West Virginia. Michelle is a founding member of Venture Philanthropy Partners and is currently serving on the boards of The Washington National Opera, CharityWorks and YouthAIDS. She has three children ranging in ages from 5 to 18.

Sheila C. Johnson, a successful entrepreneur and impassioned philanthropist, is CEO of Salamander Hospitality, LLC, overseeing a growing portfolio of luxury properties including The Woodlands Resort & Inn in Summerville, S.C., Innisbrook Resort & Golf Club in Innisbrook, Fla., and Salamander Resort & Spa in the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains in Middleburg, Va., which is poised to become one of the most unique retreats in the world when it opens in early 2011. Johnson is president and managing partner of the WNBA's Washington Mystics. She has long been a powerful influence in the entertainment industry as a founding partner of Black Entertainment Television (BET) and most recently as a film

producer. Her film A Powerful Noise premiered at the 2008 Tribeca Film Festival in New York. On March 5, 2009 A Powerful Noise premiered in more than 450 theatres throughout the country to celebrate International Women's Day.

In 2006 Johnson was named global ambassador for CARE, a leading humanitarian organization fighting global poverty by empowering women because they have the unique power to help entire communities escape poverty. "Sheila's I Am Powerful Challenge" was instrumental in helping raise funds for CARE's important work. Johnson is also a member of the Council on Foreign Relations. An avid supporter of the arts and an accomplished violinist, Johnson dedicates her time to organizations that create opportunities for children to express and explore their creativity. She serves as chair of the Board of Governors of Parsons The New School for Design in New York and sits on the boards of VH1's Save the Music Foundation, Americans for the Arts, the Jackie Robinson Foundation, and the University of Illinois Foundation.

Richard Kay is currently chairman of SENTRILLION Inc., a "TS" (Top Secret) border security, cyber-security, information assurance and healthcare managed services company. He is the former founder, chairman and CEO of OTG Software, a data storage software company that he founded in 1992. OTG became the leader in online data storage solutions. OTG was acquired by Legato Systems in 2002 and Kay remained on the board of directors until the acquisition of Legato Systems by EMC in 2003.

Kay currently serves on the board of directors of the University of Maryland School of Engineering. He is a special partner with ABS Capital, a multibillion dollar equity investment firm focused on healthcare, IT and media companies. Kay is also an honorary member of the board of directors of Venture Philanthropy Partners. He and his family work closely with various charities.

Jeong H. Kim is the 11th president of Bell Labs, the communication industry's most heralded research organization. His background ranges from being a CEO of a high technology start-up to senior executive of a Fortune 500 corporation. Kim's early career encompassed computer design, satellite systems design and data communications and included seven years as a nuclear submarine officer in the U.S. Navy.

Kim holds a Ph.D. in Reliability Engineering from the University of Maryland, a Master's degree in Technical Management and Bachelor's degree in Electrical Engineering and Computer Science from Johns Hopkins University. Kim currently serves on the boards of the Johns Hopkins University, Stanford University's Freeman Spogli Institute of International Studies, and Global Internet Ventures. He is a member of the National Academy of Engineering and the NASDAQ Listing and Hearing Review Council, and was named one of the 10 most influential Asian Americans in business for 2005 by the U.S. Pan Asian American Chamber.

Mark D. Lerner, representing members of the Lerner | Cohen | Tanenbaum family, is a principal owner of the Washington Nationals Baseball Club and a principal of Lerner Enterprises, a Rockville, Md., based real estate development, management and investment company founded in 1952 by his father, Ted Lerner. Lerner Enterprises development activity is mainly concentrated in the Washington, D.C., metropolitan area. Some of the company's major projects include White Flint, White Flint North, Washington Square at 1050 Connecticut Avenue, NW, 20 M Street, SE, 2000 Tower Oaks Boulevard, The Corporate Office Centre at Tysons II, Dulles Town Center, Fallsgrove Village Center and the Greenbelt Marriott Hotel, among many others. Lerner also has developed and manages many residential communities in the Washington, D.C., area. In addition, Lerner Enterprises is a partner in Chelsea Piers, a 30-acre sports and entertainment complex located on the Hudson River in New York City.

Lerner and his family have been involved in many worthwhile causes including the Charles E. Smith Jewish Day School, Hebrew University of Jerusalem, The George Washington University, Georgetown Day School, The Scleroderma Foundation of Greater Washington, Jewish Community Centers of Greater Washington and the District of Columbia, JCC Maccabi Games, The United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, Imagination Stage, ADL In Concert against Hate, YouthAids, Juvenile Diabetes, Junior Achievement, Food and Friends and the Washington Nationals Dream Foundation, among many others. He currently serves as a trustee of the Jewish Community Center of Greater Washington, a member of the board of Hillel at The George Washington University and the advisory board of Israel Bonds.

George P. Stamas is a senior partner in the Washington and New York offices of the international law firm Kirkland & Ellis LLP. A graduate of the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania (1973) and the University of Maryland Law School (1976), Stamas began his career as a special counsel in the Enforcement Division of the Securities & Exchange Commission. He has been listed in Chambers USA: America's Leading Lawyers and Best Lawyers in America for many years and was previously named by The American Lawyer as one of the leading 45 lawyers in America under the age of 45.

Stamas was the former vice chairman of the board of Deutsche Banc Alex Brown, Inc., a founding board member of FTI Consulting (NYSE), and also serves on the boards of NexCen Brands, Inc., Gridpoint Technologies, Medicity, Inc., and MidOcean Partners. He is also a venture partner of New Enterprise Associates and is active in numerous local and national civic affairs. In addition to being a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, he is on the board of the Shakespeare Theatre Company, Leadership 100, Caves Valley Golf Club, the Baltimore Orioles, and is an Archon of the International Order of St. Andrew.

Ted Leonsis

Ted Leonsis is known as one of the country's premier businessmen and a pioneer in the Internet industry, holding numerous leadership positions at AOL in his 15-year tenure, including vice chairman and president. He currently serves as AOL's vice chairman emeritus. He is a professional sports team owner; founder and chairman of Web 2.0 start-up SnagFilms; chairman and investor in Clearspring Technologies and Revolution Money; a film producer; a private-angel investor; an active board member; and a committed philanthropist.

Leonsis recently founded and launched SnagFilms, a Web 2.0 company that brings the best nonfiction films to a global web audience. He is also the chairman of Clearspring Technologies, the leading provider of cross-platform widget services; as well as Revolution Money, an innovative new Web 2.0 payment platform and credit-card service. Revolution Money is a subsidiary of Revolution LLC, the investment company created by Steve Case.

Leonsis is the founder, chairman and majority owner of Lincoln Holdings LLC, a sports and entertainment company that holds ownership rights in several Washington, D.C., entities, including 100% of the Washington Capitals and the WNBA's Washington Mystics. Lincoln Holdings also owns approximately 44% of Washington Sports and Entertainment Limited Partnership (WSELP), which owns the NBA's Washington Wizards, D.C.'s Verizon Center and the Baltimore-Washington Ticketmaster franchise.

In addition to Lincoln Holdings, Leonsis has investments and/or sits on the board of directors for several companies: Algentis LLC; Beacon Capital Strategies LLC; Bridgevine Inc.; Capitol Acquisition Corp; GridPoint; LaunchBox Digital; Triporati; Mahalo.com; MediaBank; Groupon.com; Mevio; MobilePosse; ObjectVideo; SB Nation; TidalTV; and Zedge. Leonsis is also on the board of directors of Georgetown University, his alma mater, and is listed as one of the institution's most distinguished alumni by numerous publications.

Leonsis is a film producer having conceptualized and produced "Nanking," a documentary film that tells the story of the Japanese invasion of Nanking, China, in the early days of World War II. "Nanking" made its world premiere at the 2007 Sundance Film Festival, where it was awarded the Documentary Editing Award, and was released by THINKFilm in December 2007. The film won a Peabody Award and was nominated for three Emmy Awards. The film aired on HBO and is available on DVD. While at the 2007 Sundance Film Festival, Leonsis coined the phrase "filmanthropy" to describe a new category of filmmaking that sheds light on important issues around the world and activates discussion as well as new volunteers and new funds to benefit a social cause. Leonsis is also the producer of "Kicking It," another example of filmanthropy, which debuted at the 2008 Sundance Film Festival. "Kicking It" aired on ESPN and Netflix.

Leonsis recently published a book, "The Business of Happiness: 6 Secrets to Extraordinary Success in Work and Life," which examines what actually makes people happy. Business and financial success doesn't necessarily yield happiness, but happiness certainly can lead to professional and personal success. The book examines the six tenets to a happiness, shares relevant anecdotes that readers can apply not only at work but also in their everyday personal lives. Everyone wants to be happy and successful at what they do, and Leonsis' book provides the roadmap to achieving that happiness.

Leonsis is a committed philanthropist and is very involved with numerous charities, including Best Buddies, Hoop Dreams, See Forever Foundation, Venture Philanthropy Partners, YouthAIDS and others through the work of the Leonsis Foundation.

He once served as mayor of Orchid, Fla. Among his many honors, Leonsis has been named Washington's Businessman of the Year, a Washingtonian of the Year, one of the 20 most influential people in sports, one of America's most creative executives and a top 10 entrepreneur of the year. Leonsis blogs daily at TedsTake.com. Originally from Brooklyn, N.Y., and later, Lowell, Mass., he now lives in McLean, Va., and Vero Beach, Fla., with his wife and two children.

Sheila C. Johnson

Sheila C. Johnson is a successful entrepreneur and impassioned philanthropist. As a partner in Lincoln Holdings, Ms. Johnson is the only African-American woman to have ownership in three professional sports teams, the WNBA's Washington Mystics, the NBA's Washington Wizards and the NHL's Washington Capitals. Ms. Johnson is President and Managing Partner of the Mystics.

As CEO of Salamander Hospitality, a company she founded in 2005, Ms. Johnson oversees a growing portfolio of luxury properties. Woodlands Inn, in Summerville, SC, is one of only a handful of properties in North America to receive the prestigious Forbes Five Star and AAA Five Diamond ratings for both lodging and dining. In 2008, Travel + Leisure selected Woodlands as the #1 hotel for service in North America and #3 in the world (it was the only US hotel ranked in the Top 10). In 2007, Ms. Johnson acquired Innisbrook, a Salamander Golf & Spa Resort. Set on 900 acres, this 72-hole resort in Innisbrook, FL hosts the annual PGA TOUR's Transitions Championship and the LPGA Legends Tour Open Championship. The company is also building the much-anticipated Salamander Resort & Spa, located in the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains in Middleburg, VA.

Ms. Johnson is a partner in ProJet Aviation, a comprehensive aviation service company specializing in aviation consulting, aircraft acquisitions, management, and charter services based in Winchester, VA. She is also a partner in Mistral, the makers of fine bath, body and home products.

Ms. Johnson has long been a powerful influence in the entertainment industry as a founding partner of Black Entertainment Television (BET) and most recently as a film producer. In partnership with other investors, her first film, *Kicking It*, premiered at the 2008 Sundance Film Festival in Park City, UT. She executive produced her second film, *A Powerful Noise*, which premiered at the 2008 Tribeca Film Festival in New York, and her third film, *She Is The Matador*. Her latest film, *The Other City*, about the HIV/AIDS crisis in Washington DC, will premiere at the Tribeca Film Festival in April 2010.

In 2006 Ms. Johnson was named global ambassador for CARE, a leading humanitarian organization fighting global poverty by empowering women because they have the unique power to help entire communities escape poverty. "Sheila's I Am Powerful Challenge" was instrumental in helping raise funds for CARE's important work. Ms. Johnson is also a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.

2009 TEAM NOTES

Change Has Come to D.C.

The Mystics had a busy off-season hiring a new general manager, Angela Taylor, and a new head coach, Julie Plank. Point guard Lindsey Harding came to D.C. in a trade with the Minnesota Lynx. Matee Ajavon was selected second overall by the Mystics in the 2008 dispersal draft after the Houston Comets folded. Chasity Melvin rejoined the Mystics after signing as a free agent. In the 2009 WNBA draft, the Mystics selected Maryland guard Marissa Coleman with the second overall pick.

Mystics Milestones

Several Mystics veterans have reached milestones this season. Forward Monique Currie reached her 500th career rebound, posting four rebounds in the Mystics loss against the New York Liberty on September 13. Mystics forward Nakia Sanford recorded her 100th career block, posting two blocks against the Detroit Shock on August 11. Guard Alana Beard surpassed her career 3,000 points when she led all scorers with 18 points in the Mystics loss against the Connecticut Sun on August 9.

A Conference Connection

A league-high six Washington Mystics competed collegiately in the Atlantic Coast Conference, including Alana Beard (Duke), Marissa Coleman (Maryland), Monique Currie (Duke), Lindsey Harding (Duke), Crystal Langhorne (Maryland), Chasity Melvin (N.C. State). Additionally, two Mystics' assistant coaches, Vicky Bullett (Maryland) and Trudi Lacey (N.C. State), battled on Tobacco Road.

Marissa Coleman was 19th in the league in three point field goal percentage .363... Monique Currie was 26th in the league in free throw shooting, shooting .803 from the line... Beard finished third in the league in steals with 2.32 a game... Chasity Melvin was ranked 15th in blocks with .85 per game... Harding was second in the league in minutes per game with 35.1... Coleman was ranked eight in points per game among rookies with 6.1, ninth in rebounds with 2.7 and fourth in three point field goal percentage with .363... The Mystics were ranked fourth in the league in rebounding... third in the league in steals... ninth in the league in points per game, all improvements from the 2008 season...

Most Improved

Forward Crystal Langhorne led the team in rebounding with 7.9 rebounds per contest, the third highest average in the WNBA. Langhorne ranked second in the league in offensive rebounds pulling down 3.0 rebounds per game. She also averaged 29.8 minutes per game and 12.0 points per game, ranked third on the team in scoring. In 2008, Langhorne averaged 15.6 mpg, 4.8 ppg and 4.0 rpg.

Growth All Around

The Mystics were named the DC Chamber of Commerce's Emerging Business of the Year. Washington led the WNBA in attendance in 2009, averaging over 11,300 fans per game.

January 27, 1998 - Nikki McCray and Alessandra Santos de Oliveira are introduced as the first two players on the Mystics' inaugural roster.

February 18, 1998 - With the first pick in the expansion draft, the Mystics select Heidi Burge, formally of the L.A. Sparks. The Mystics also add Penny Moore (Charlotte Sting), Deborah Carter (Utah Starzz), and Tammy Jackson (Houston Comets).

March 9, 1998 - The WNBA announces that the Washington Mystics will have the third pick in the WNBA Draft on April 29.

March 25, 1998 - Cathy Parson is named assistant coach of the Washington Mystics.

History:

On April 24, 1996, women's basketball announced "We Got Next" as the NBA Board of Governors approved the concept of a Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA) to begin play in June of 1997.

Since that day in 1996 there have been many firsts for the WNBA:

Val Ackerman -- the first president of the WNBA

Sheryl Swoopes -- the first player signed to the WNBA

Cynthia Cooper -- the league's first Most Valuable Player

Houston Comets -- the first WNBA Champions

Lisa Leslie -- the first WNBA player to dunk (7/30/02 vs. Miami)

Lauren Jackson -- the first international player to win MVP (2007)

Candace Parker -- the first rookie to earn the league's MVP honor (2008)

Sylvia Fowles -- the first goaltending call (vs. LA 6/3/2008)

The inaugural WNBA season tipped off on June 21, 1997, with the New York Liberty taking on the Los Angeles Sparks at the Great Western Forum in Inglewood, California. A crowd of 14,284 watched as Sparks' guard Penny Toler scored the first basket in WNBA history. The Liberty defeated the Sparks, 67-57.

A Growing Game: The influence of the WNBA can be seen in the explosive growth of organized women's basketball over the past 12 seasons. An estimated 100 million women play basketball worldwide, and our league reflects this trend, featuring 23 international players from 16 countries and territories at the end of the 2008 season. Female AAU youth basketball participation has increased +277 percent since 1990 (from 28,840 to 108,758 players). Female high school basketball participation has increased 18 percent since 1990 (from 387,802 to 456,967 players). And female NCAA basketball participation has increased 43 percent since 1990 (from 10,551 to 15,096 players).

All-Star Game

This summer's marquee event "WNBA vs. USA Basketball: The Stars at the Sun" will showcase the world's best female basketball players under one roof when the WNBA's top talent faces the USA Basketball Women's National Team. This special event, hosted by the WNBA and the Connecticut Sun, will take place at the

Mohegan Sun Arena in Uncasville, CT on Saturday, July 10. ESPN will broadcast the game with tip-off set for 3:30 p.m. ET. The USA Basketball squad will be coached Geno Auriemma.

The 2009 WNBA All-Star Game was held at Mohegan Sun Arena in Uncasville, Conn. on Saturday, July 25. It was the ninth such game in league history, and second played at Mohegan Sun, and was played in front of a sellout crowd of 9,518. The West beat the East 130-118 in the highest scoring All-Star Game in WNBA history. Swin Cash of the Seattle Storm claimed MVP honors. Cash, who tallied an All-Star record 22 points on 10-of-16, was one of five former UConn Huskies who were participating in the game.

Inspiring Coach

The Inspiring Coach Award is an annual honor introduced in 2007 to honor coaches who have positively influenced athletes across numerous levels and whose achievements leave an indelible mark on sports as a whole. The University of Tennessee's Pat Summitt earned the honor in 2009 for her profound impact on female athletes and her demonstrated commitment, passion, and dedication to work, family, and community. Previous winners include Kay Yow and Jody Conradt.

Inspiring Women

The Inspiring Woman Award is an annual honor that celebrates an individual who, on a daily basis, demonstrates her ability to inspire others through her commitment, passion and dedication to work, family, and community. Past honorees include Emmy-award winning journalist Cokie Roberts, Good Morning America's Robin Roberts, Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice, and the WNBA All-Decade Team.

Dawn Staley Award

The Dawn Staley Community Leadership Award was announced in 2006 and is now presented annually to the player who best exemplifies the characteristics of a leader in the community and reflects Staley's contagious leadership, spirit, charitable efforts and love for the game. Tamika Catchings won the inaugural award in 2007 while Tamika Raymond was named the winner for 2008. A member of the WNBA's All-Decade Team, Staley, who retired following the 2006 season, established herself as one of the greatest ambassadors in women's basketball history, while also demonstrating outstanding leadership qualities as a coach on the collegiate level and as a philanthropist and humanitarian.

New partners in 2008 included such major companies as Kia Motors, IHOP and Pitney Bowes. HP, Starwood Hotels and Resorts and "Got Milk?" all joined the WNBA as partners for the 2009 season.

The WNBA's marketing partners utilize the league to support women's sports and reach its strong fan base of women, families, and young girls through advertising in WNBA nationally televised games, national promotions, player endorsements, and special events. Through the WNBA's extensive, highly integrated relationship with adidas, the sporting goods and apparel giant not only serves as the official outfitter of the WNBA – having unveiled new uniforms across the league in 2007 – but also as the presenter of the 2007, 2008, and 2009 WNBA Drafts and in 2008 became the first-ever presenting partner of the WNBA's entire postseason, including both the playoffs and Finals.

Two WNBA teams entered the 2009 season as forerunners in the league's Marquee Partnership program, which includes multiyear deals featuring branded sponsorship of game jerseys – the Phoenix Mercury partnering with LifeLock, a giant in the identity theft industry, and the Los Angeles Sparks partnering with Farmers Insurance Group.

Attendance /TV Ratings

The WNBA concluded the 2009 regular season with its third consecutive year of increased attendance and second consecutive year of increased viewership on ESPN2. The WNBA regular

season on ESPN2 concluded with an average of 269,000 viewers, up 8 percent versus 2008 (248,000 viewers). Regular-season games on ESPN2 saw increases in key demographics, including men 18-34 (+9 percent), men 18-49 (+14 percent), and men 23-54 (+23 percent).

For the 2009 WNBA Finals presented by adidas, average viewership on ESPN2 jumped 76 percent from 2008. The five-game series featuring the Indiana Fever and Phoenix Mercury also featured three sellouts and the highest total attendance figure (82,018) in WNBA Finals history.

The WNBA has one of the top five Facebook fanbases among sports leagues, with more than 275,000 fans (www.Facebook.com/wnba).

The WNBA's broadcast coverage in 2009 included live national telecasts of 29 regular-season and postseason contests on ESPN2 and ABC, and another 50 games on NBA TV, as well as games streamed on ESPN360.com.

In addition, fans watched more than two million streams of live and archived games through WNBA LiveAccess, a new feature on WNBA.com that provided fans with free access to more than 200 live game Webcasts – the league's most comprehensive offering – throughout the season.

In July 2007, the WNBA signed a new, eight-year TV deal with ESPN that tips off in 2009 and runs through 2016, the WNBA's 20th season. The agreement, which calls for ABC, ESPN and ESPN2 to telecast WNBA games, includes rights fees, a first for any women's pro team sports league in the U.S.

Global Reach

Now in its second decade, the WNBA has a wide impact on overseas markets. In 2009, for the third straight year, WNBA games and programming reached a record 203 countries in 32 languages, surpassing the previous total of 198 countries. Included were television agreements in six new countries: Argentina, Bulgaria, Jamaica, Pan Africa, South Korea and China. In addition, for the fourth consecutive year, fans in China were able to view WNBA action via live Webcasts on NBA.com/china.

WNBA rosters for the 2009 season featured 18 international players from 11 countries and territories. Among the league's international contingent are the Seattle Storm's Lauren Jackson (Australia), Indiana Fever's Tammy Sutton-Brown (Canada), San Antonio Silver

Stars' Sophia Young (St. Vincent), and Los Angeles Sparks' Ticha Penicheiro (Portugal).

Ownership

Seven WNBA teams now fall under the independent ownership model: the Atlanta Dream, Chicago Sky, Connecticut Sun, Los Angeles Sparks, Seattle Storm, Tulsa Shock and Washington Mystics.

With the announcement on Oct. 20, 2009 that the Detroit Shock would relocate to Tulsa, Okla., Tulsa Pro Hoops L.L.C. will begin play in 2010 and is led by Bill Cameron and David Box. Force 10 Hoops, L.L.C., the entity owned by Seattle businesswomen and civic leaders Anne Levinson, Ginny Gilder, Lisa Brummel and Dawn Trudeau, purchased the Seattle Storm on Feb. 28, 2008. In October, 2009, Kathy Betty purchased the Atlanta Dream. In addition, the Los Angeles Sparks opened the 2007 season with new ownership after Kathy Goodman and Carla Christofferson, two long-time season ticket holders, bought the Sparks on Dec. 7, 2006. They joined Sheila Johnson's Washington Mystics, Michael Alter's Chicago Sky, and the Mohegan Tribe's Connecticut Sun as independently owned WNBA franchises.

Seven women serve as owners of WNBA teams: Dr. Sheila Johnson (Washington Mystics); Kathy Goodman and Carla Christofferson (Los Angeles Sparks); Kathy Betty (Atlanta); and Anne Levinson, Ginny Gilder, Lisa Brummel and Dawn Trudeau (Seattle Storm). An eighth, musical artist Michelle Williams, formerly of "Destiny's Child," is a minority owner of the Chicago Sky.

Johnson, a co-founder of Black Entertainment Television, became the WNBA's first African-American female owner on May 24, 2005 when she joined Ted Leonsis' Lincoln Holdings LLC, which in turn purchased the Washington Mystics from Washington Wizards' owner Abe Pollin.

Key Highlights

Diana Taurasi won both the 2009 WNBA MVP award and the 2009 WNBA Finals MVP award. Lisa Leslie of the Los Angeles Sparks became the first WNBA player to capture the regular-season, All-Star and Finals MVP awards during the 2001 season.

In 2008, Candace Parker became the first WNBA player to win Rookie of the Year and Most Valuable Player of the Year in the same season. The first selection in the 2008 WNBA Draft, she earned both honors after leading the league in double-doubles and rebounds per game, while also ranking second in blocks per game and fourth in points per game. She also became just the second player (Lisa Leslie), to dunk in a WNBA game.

While Diana Taurasi of the Phoenix Mercury won her first WNBA MVP award in 2009, there have been several repeat honorees. Lisa Leslie of the Los Angeles Sparks earned the award in 2006, 2001, and 2004. Leslie joined the Houston Comets' Sheryl Swoopes as the only players in WNBA history to capture MVP honors three times. Two players have won the award twice in a career: Houston's Cynthia Cooper (1997, 1998) and Seattle's Lauren Jackson (2003, 2007). The others to capture MVP honors are Yolanda Griffith (then with Sacramento in 1999) and Los Angeles' Candace Parker (2008, when she became the first rookie in league history to earn the award).

Taurasi rewrote the WNBA scoring records in 2006 when she led the league with 25.3 points per contest, became the first WNBA player to top 800 points in a single season (860), and the single-season mark for three-point field-goals (121) and the single-game mark for points (47, a number later equaled by the Storm's Lauren Jackson in 2007).

There is only one player who has reached 6,000 points in her WNBA career. Lisa Leslie, who retired following the 2009 season, ranks at the top of the WNBA's all-time scoring leaders with 6,263 points. The players who have passed the 5,000 point plateau are Tina Thompson, Katie Smith, and Lauren Jackson.

Lauren Jackson became the youngest (26 years, 77 days) and fastest (209 games) to score her 4,000th career point on July 27, 2007. However, that record was broken when Diana Taurasi reached the same milestone on July 27, 2009 in just 197 games.

Sheryl Swoopes, who earned MVP and Defensive Player of the Year honors in 2000 and 2002, made WNBA history with the league's first triple-double (14 points, 15 rebounds, 10 assists) vs. the Detroit Shock on July 27, 1999.

WNBA Cares

Winning streak comprises Lobo's 35-0 senior season at the University of Connecticut, 60-0 as member of U.S. Olympic Team and 5-0 as a member of the Liberty. The streak ends at 102.
August 30, 1997	The Houston Comets become the first WNBA Champions, employing the unstoppable Cynthia Cooper and a suffocating defense for a 65-51 victory over the New York Liberty at The Summit.
October 1, 1997	The WNBA announces that franchises in Detroit and Washington will join the fold as expansion teams for the 1998 season.
April 22, 1998	The league announces the addition of expansion teams in Orlando and Minnesota for the 1999 season, bringing the total number of teams to 12.
June 19, 1998	Los Angeles Sparks center Lisa Leslie sets a WNBA record by pulling down 21 rebounds in the Sparks' victory over the New York Liberty.
June 21, 1998	Lisa Leslie notches her seventh-straight double-double, setting a WNBA record.
July 18, 1998	Houston's Cynthia Cooper becomes the first player to reach 1,000 points during Comets' 75-44 rout of the Sacramento Monarchs.
July 29, 1998	Sacramento Monarchs guard Ticha Penicheiro dishes out 16 assists in a 75-67 loss vs. the Cleveland Rockers to set a WNBA record.
August 29, 1998	In Game 2 of the WNBA Finals, the Houston Comets, trailing the Phoenix Mercury 1-0 in the best-of-three series, erases a 12-point deficit in the final 7:24 to force overtime. Houston wins the series and claims its second of four titles.

July 14, 1999	Whitney Houston sings the National Anthem in front of an electrified crowd on hand at Madison Square Garden to witness the Inaugural WNBA All-Star Game. The West defeats the East 79-61 and Lisa Leslie is named MVP.
July 27, 1999	Sheryl Swoopes records the WNBA's first triple-double with 15 points, 14 rebounds and 10 assists in an 85-46 win over Detroit at the Compaq Center.
September 4, 1999	New York Liberty guard Teresa Weatherspoon nails a shot from beyond the midcourt line with 2.4 seconds remaining to give the Liberty a 68-67 victory over the Houston Comets in Game 2 of the WNBA Finals. The shot sends the series to a decisive Game 3, which the Comets win to claim their third straight WNBA title.
June 7, 2000	Cleveland Rockers forward Eva Nemcova ends her record-streak of 66 consecutive free throws with a miss against Orlando. Nemcova did not miss from the foul line from June 14, 1999 to June 5, 2000.
July 17, 2000	The West defeats the East 73-61 at the 2000 WNBA All-Star Game, hosted by the Phoenix Mercury at America West Arena. Houston's Tina Thompson captures MVP honors.
August 25, 2000	Cleveland Rockers guard Suzie McConnell Serio is named the recipient of the first Kim Perrot Sportsmanship Award presented by American General, named in honor of Houston's Kim Perrot, who died of cancer in 1999.
August 26, 2000	Cynthia Cooper turns in a clutch performance to earn her fourth WNBA Finals MVP as the Houston Comets claim fourth straight title by defeating the New York Liberty. In Game 1 at Madison Square Garden, Cooper converts a crucial three-point play with 25.4 seconds remaining to push the Comets' lead to five. In Game 2, she scores six of her 25 points in overtime and nine of Houston's final 18 points. It marks Cooper's last appearance in the WNBA Finals. She retires as the WNBA's all-time scoring leader.

January 8, 2007	The WNBA holds a Dispersal Draft to disseminate the players from the Charlotte Sting. The Chicago Sky select guard Monique Currie with the first overall selection.
January 30, 2007	Rule changes are announced for the 2007 season and include the following: the backcourt rule requires offensive teams to bring the ball across the mid-court line within eight seconds rather than 10 seconds; the timeout rule requires that officials grant requests for a timeout (full or 20-second) by a player in the game or the head coach; and the teams will now be able to designate 11 active players and up to two inactive players on playoff rosters, with the ability to activate any inactive players on a game-by-game basis.
January 31, 2007	The WNBA Board of Governors approves the sale of the Houston Comets to Hilton Koch/Hilton Acquisitions, LLC.

April 4, 2007	The 2007 WNBA Draft presented by adidas takes place in Cleveland, marking the second straight year that the draft was held immediately following the NCAA Women's Division I Championship Game and conducted in the same city as the Final Four. The Phoenix Mercury make Lindsey Harding the top overall pick before trading her to the Minnesota Lynx in exchange for Tangela Smith. The fast-paced draft earned a place in league history when Jessica Davenport, the second overall pick, was subsequently traded from San Antonio to New York in exchange for all-star guard Becky Hammon and a future selection. It marked the first time in WNBA history that the top two picks were traded on Draft Day.
July 15, 2007	The 2007 WNBA All-Star Game, the league's eighth such contest, is played in front of a sellout audience on July 15 at the Verizon Center in Washington, D.C. A crowd of 19,487 fans witnessed the East defeat the West, 103-99, as Cheryl Ford of the Detroit Shock clinched the MVP honors. A key highlight of the All-Star festivities in 2007 was the second annual All-Star Salute: Inspiring Women Luncheon, featuring keynote speaker and Secretary of State Dr. Condoleezza Rice.

July 15, 2007	Signaling a major milestone in its second decade, the WNBA reaches an eight-year agreement with ESPN to have ABC, ESPN and ESPN2 televise games through the 2016 season. The agreement was announced in conjunction with the 2007 WNBA All-Star Game by Donna Orender, WNBA President, and John Skipper, ESPN Executive Vice President, Content. The agreement extends the WNBA's relationship with ESPN, which began with the league's inaugural season in 1997, to 20 seasons.
July 24, 2007	Seattle's Lauren Jackson scores 47 points in a 97-96 overtime loss to the Washington Mystics, tying Diana Taurasi for the WNBA record for most points in a single game.
July 27, 2007	Lauren Jackson scores her 4,000th career point during a 89-75 win over the Indiana Fever, becoming the youngest and fastest player in league history to reach the milestone. Jackson reaches the milestone in 209 games.
September 5, 2007	Lauren Jackson is named MVP of the league for the second time in her career after having also earned the honor in 2003. Jackson led the WNBA in scoring, rebounding and double-doubles and was also named the WNBA's Player of the Week on five occasions. Jackson joined Lisa Leslie, Sheryl Swoopes and Cynthia Cooper as the only players in WNBA history to capture multiple MVP honors.
September 16, 2007	The 2007 WNBA Finals see the Phoenix Mercury win their first-ever championship behind the play of Diana Taurasi, Penny Taylor and Cappie Pondexter, who was named Finals MVP. The Mercury capped the most exciting WNBA season ever by defeating the defending champion Detroit Shock in five games. It marked the first time that a the WNBA Championship has been won on the road, and Mercury head coach Paul Westhead became the first head coach to win both a WNBA title and an NBA title (1980, Los Angeles Lakers). Total attendance for the 2007 WNBA Finals between the Phoenix Mercury and the Detroit Shock was 74,178, establishing a new all-time WNBA Finals record. In addition, Game 5's crowd of 22,076 at The Palace of Auburn Hills tied the all-time, single-game attendance record for the WNBA Finals (also set on Sept. 16 2003 of the 2003 WNBA Finals, Los Angeles at Detroit).
October 17, 2007	WNBA President Donna Orender announces that the City of Atlanta was awarded a WNBA expansion team for the 2008 season. The new team will be owned and operated by Atlanta businessman J. Ronald Terwilliger.
October 23, 2007	The Los Angeles Sparks win the seventh annual Draft Lottery and earned the top pick in the 2008 WNBA Draft. The Sparks won the lottery for the first time in franchise history, after tying the Minnesota Lynx for fewest wins in 2007.
January 23, 2008	The Atlanta expansion franchise unveils their team name, logo and colors. The Atlanta Dream's color scheme will consist of sky blue and red.
January 28, 2008	The WNBA and the WNBAPA sign the league's third collective bargaining agreement covering six seasons, commencing with the 2008 season and continuing through 2013.
January 29, 2008	Rule changes are announced for the 2008 season and include the following: the inbound rule will permit a player to pass the ball anywhere (frontcourt or backcourt) on the court during the final minute of the fourth period and the final minute of any overtime period; players not occupying lane spaces shall now remain behind the three-point line (above the free-throw line extended) during free-throws; and instant-replay rules will now require automatic video reviews by the officiating crew in the case of flagrant fouls that result in ejections and other player altercations.

February 28, 2008	Force 10 Hoops, L.L.C., the entity owned by Seattle businesswomen and civic leaders Anne Levinson, Ginny Gilder, Lisa Brummel and Dawn Trudeau, purchases the Seattle Storm. Seven WNBA teams now fall under the independent ownership model: the Atlanta Dream, Chicago Sky, Connecticut Sun, Houston Comets, Los Angeles Sparks, Seattle Storm and Washington Mystics.
April 4, 2008	North Carolina State Head Coach Kay Yow is honored with the WNBA's Inspiring Coach Award during the Women's Final Four activities in Tampa, Florida.
April 9, 2008	The 2008 WNBA Draft presented by adidas takes place in Tampa, marking the third year that the draft was held immediately following the NCAA Women's Division I Championship Game and conducted in the same city as the Final Four. Candace Parker, Sylvia Fowles and Candice Wiggins were selected as the top three overall picks.
May 17, 2008	Candace Parker of the Los Angeles Sparks nearly posts a triple-double in her pro debut on vs. Phoenix. She had 34 points, 12 rebounds and 8 assists. Her 34 points broke the record for a rookie in a debut game.
May 29, 2008	On May 29 in a double-overtime loss at Indiana, Candace Parker becomes the first player in WNBA history to record a 5x5, which is total of five or more in five different categories. Parker had 16 points, 16 rebounds, six blocks, five assists and five steals.
June 6, 2008	Tina Thompson of the Houston Comets becomes just the second player in WNBA history to reach the 5,000 point milestone, joining Lisa Leslie.
June 22& 24, 2008	Candace Parker dunks in back-to-back games, joining Lisa Leslie as the only players to have dunked in a WNBA game.
June 28, 2008	Lisa Leslie of the Los Angeles Sparks becomes the first WNBA player to record 3,000 career rebounds.
July 30, 2008	Robin Roberts, co-anchor of ABC News' Good Morning America, is honored as the recipient of the 2008 WNBA Inspiration Award. Roberts is the keynote speaker at the WNBA Inspiring Women Luncheon in San Francisco, an event that also honored the U.S. Olympic Women's Basketball Team and served as a final send-off to the Beijing for the Olympic Games.
July 28-Aug. 27, 2008	The WNBA stops play to give players the opportunity to compete in the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing, China. The U.S. Olympic Women's Basketball Team defeated Australia in the gold medal game, while Russia defeated China for the bronze. The United States has now won four consecutive Olympic gold medals.
August 31, 2008	Katie Smith of the Detroit Shock reaches the 5,000 career point milestone, joining Lisa Leslie and Tina Thompson.
September 5, 2008	Ticha Penicheiro of the Sacramento Monarchs becomes the first player in WNBA history to record 2,000 career assists.
October 3, 2008	Los Angeles Sparks forward Candace Parker is named the Hanns-G 'Go Beyond' Rookie of the Year as well as the WNBA Most Valuable Player presented by T-Mobile. It marks the first time a rookie won both awards in the same

year. The top overall pick in the 2008 WNBA Draft, Parker capped a season in which she also earned All-WNBA First Team honors, two Hanns-G 'Go Beyond' Rookie of the Month Awards (May and July), one Player of the Week Award (Aug. 31) and the Peak Performer Rebounding Award.

October 5, 2008	The 2008 WNBA Finals see the Detroit Shock sweep the San Antonio Silver Stars in three games. The Shock earned their third championship in six years. Detroit's Katie Smith was named Finals MVP.
December 2, 2008	The League announces that the Houston Comets, an original member of the WNBA, would suspend operations.
December 9, 2008	<p>The WNBA holds a Dispersal Draft of the Houston Comets players. Teams drafted in inverse order of their regular-season finish in 2008.</p> <p>The Atlanta Dream selected Sancho Lyttle with the first pick, the Washington Mystics chose Matee Ajavon with the second selection and the Chicago Sky took Mistie Williams with the third pick.</p>
December 9, 2008	The Atlanta Dream win the eighth annual WNBA Draft Lottery and earned the top pick in the 2009 WNBA Draft. The winning team had 420 chances out of 1,000 to receive the first overall selection. The lottery went exactly according to odds for the first time in WNBA history.
February 5, 2009	The WNBA Board of Governors votes to allow the expanded use of instant replay by game officials. The two modifications will allow referees to use instant replay 1.) to determine at any point during a game whether a field goal was correctly scored as a two- or three-point field goal, and, for the purposes of awarding the correct number of free throws, whether a shooter was fouled while taking a two- or three-point attempt and 2.) when the game clock malfunctions during a play concluding with no time remaining on the clock (0:00) at the end of any quarter or overtime period.
April 7, 2009	University of Tennessee head coach Pat Summit is named the recipient of the WNBA's Inspiring Coach Award.
April 9, 2009	The 2009 WNBA Draft presented by adidas takes place at the NBA Entertainment studios in Secaucus, NJ. Angel McCoughtry, Marissa Coleman and Kristi Toliver were selected as the top three overall picks.
May 13, 2009	WNBA LiveAccess, a new feature on WNBA.com that provides fans with free access to more than 200 live game Webcasts, is launched and allows fans around the world to access live game Webcasts on individual team Web sites.
June 1, 2009	The Phoenix Mercury announces a groundbreaking marquee partnership with LifeLock to launch the first-ever branded jersey in WNBA or NBA history. The LifeLock name will appear on the front of Phoenix Mercury player jerseys and on warm-up suits through the 2011 season.
June 5, 2009	The Los Angeles Sparks reach an agreement with the Farmer's Insurance Group of Companies to become the second team to secure a marquee partnership and wear branded jerseys. The Farmer's Insurance Group of Companies name and logo will appear on player jerseys.
June 14, 2009	Tamika Raymond is named the recipient of the 2009 Dawn Staley Community Leadership Award.
July 17, 2009	Sue Bird of the Seattle Storm reaches the 3,000-point plateau, becoming just the third player in league history to score 3,000 points and hand out 1,000 career assists. (Shannon Johnson and Vickie Johnson)
July 29, 2009	Cokie Roberts, political commentator for ABC News, senior news analyst for NPR News, and bestselling author, is honored as the recipient of the 2009 WNBA Inspiration Award. Roberts served as the keynote speaker at the WNBA Inspiring Women Luncheon in Chicago.

August 15, 2009	Lauren Jackson of the Seattle Storm scores her 5,000 th point against the Atlanta Dream, becoming the youngest and fastest player in league history to reach the milestone. Jackson joins Lisa Leslie, Tina Thompson and Katie Smith as the WNBA's 5,000 point scorers.

September 29, 2009	The Mercury's Diana Taurasi wins the WNBA Most Valuable Player Award presented by Kia Motors, marking the first MVP honor of her professional career. Taurasi tallied 20.4 points per game and recorded 20+ points in 20 games in 2009.
October 9, 2009	The Phoenix Mercury defeats the Indiana Fever to clinch the WNBA Championship for the second time in three years. Finals MVP Diana Taurasi, Cappie Pondexter and Penny Taylor led the Mercury and held off a late rally by the tenacious Indiana Fever for a 94-86 victory in the deciding Game 5. The 2009 WNBA Finals also featured three sellouts plus the highest total attendance figure (82,018) in WNBA Finals history. Overall, average attendance for the 2009 WNBA Playoffs increased 18.5% over 2008 (9,979 vs. 8,420).
October 20, 2009	The Detroit Shock relocates to Tulsa, Oklahoma under the ownership of Bill Cameron, David Box and Tulsa Pro Hoops, LLC. Nolan Richardson is named the team's general manager and head coach.
October 29, 2009	Kathy Betty becomes managing partner of the Atlanta Dream after the investment group Dream Too, LLC purchases the team from Terwilliger.
November 5, 2009	The Minnesota Lynx win the ninth annual WNBA Draft Lottery and earned the top pick in the 2010 WNBA Draft. Minnesota had 428 chances out of 1,000 to receive the first overall selection by virtue of owning New York's combinations (261) in addition to its own (167).
November 20, 2009	The Maloof Family announces that they will no longer operate the Sacramento Monarchs.
December 4, 2009	The WNBA Competition Committee and Board of Governors approves the expanded use of instant replay by game officials in the following situations: 1.) To determine at any point during the game whether a 24-second shot clock violation occurred prior to the release of a successful field goal attempt or prior to a foul being committed and 2.) To determine during the last minute of regulation play and the last minute of any overtime period which player last touched the ball prior to it going out-of-bounds or whether the ball was last touched simultaneously by two opponents.
December 14, 2009	The WNBA holds a Dispersal Draft of the Sacramento Monarchs players. The New York Liberty selected Nicole Powell with the first pick while the Minnesota Lynx chose Rebekkah Brunson second and the Connecticut Sun took DeMya Walker with the third selection. The Chicago Sky selected Courtney Paris and the San Antonio Silver Stars took Laura Harper to round out the top five picks. Teams drafted in inverse order of their regular-season finish in 2009.

The Tulsa franchise unveils their team name, logo and colors. The Tulsa Shock's color scheme will consist of black, red and gold.

April 8, 2010

The 2010 WNBA Draft presented by adidas takes place at the NBA Entertainment studios in Secaucus, NJ. Tina Charles, Monica Wright, Kelsey Griffin, Epiphanny Prince and Jayne Appel were selected as the top five overall picks.

FACILITY



VERIZON CENTER

Verizon Center, managed by Washington Sports & Entertainment, LP, is home to the NBA's Washington Wizards, the NHL's Washington Capitals, the WNBA's Washington Mystics, and the Georgetown Hoyas men's basketball team. Located in the heart of Chinatown in downtown Washington, DC, Verizon Center is only a few steps away from the White House and hosts more than 220 events and concerts each year.

Debuted in December of 1997, the \$200 million sports and entertainment facility just celebrated its 11th anniversary having entertained over 26 million patrons with over 2,200 world-class sporting events, concerts and family shows. The arena has also become a catalyst for the downtown neighborhood by sparking a dramatic redevelopment effort to the tune of \$6.2 billion.

The first and second rounds of the 2008, 2002 and 1998 NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Tournament; the 2007 and 2002 WNBA All-Star games; the 2006 Washington Regional Round of the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Tournament; the 2005 ACC Tournament; the 2003 World Figure Skating Championships; the 2001 50th NBA All-Star game; and the 1998 NHL Stanley Cup Finals are only a sample of the world-class events held during the past 11 years in the building.

Concerts and family shows have included U2, Rolling Stones, Paul McCartney, Barbra Streisand, Bon Jovi, Prince, Tim McGraw & Faith Hill, Beyonce, Christina Aguilera, Andrea Bocelli, Disney on Ice, and The Wiggles. Continuing the tradition as a downtown destination, Verizon Center recently hosted the 2009 NCAA Division I Men's Hockey Championships (Frozen Four) for the first time.

Located within the arena are 108 luxury suites and a variety of concession stands and restaurants offering menu choices from Hunan Chinatown to Papa John's pizza to Dunkin' Donuts to hot dogs and pretzels to crab cakes and deli sandwiches. Additional amenities include the private Acela Club Restaurant for club seat and suite holders, the Johnnie Walker Coaches Club for Gold VIP season ticket holders, The Player's Club (private members-only club), Dewar's 12 Clubhouse open to the public an hour before and after events, The Greene Turtle Sports Bar & Grille, Fan Gear sporting goods store, and VIDA Fitness and Bang Salon.

Executive Suite/Party Suite

A great way to enjoy events at Verizon Center is to entertain some friends and family or business associates in one of our 108 luxury suites. Between 18 and 22 guests can enjoy the VIP treatment as they watch over 220 sporting events and concerts held annually at Verizon Center. The luxury suites offer an exclusive membership and access to the Acela Club restaurant, premium catering and food service, early and late entry to events, and countless other amenities including a private seating area, restroom and flat-screen television.

The Crown Royal Party Suite is another exciting option for entertaining up to 99 guests at one time. Whether you're looking to entertain a group of 34, 65 or 99 guests, this is the place. Guests of the party suite have access to premium catering and food service, a private glass-enclosed suite for meetings or hospitality purposes and, most importantly, a great view for the event. Another amenity of the party suite that makes it stand out from the rest of the suites at Verizon Center is the ability to rent it out on an event-by-event basis.

High Definition Scoreboard and Linear LED Boards

Debuted during the 2007–2008 season, the high-definition LED scoreboard is the first true indoor high-definition scoreboard of its kind for arenas. The center-hung scoreboard exclusively features the Diamond Vision LED Fascia, corner stat displays and video boards driven by ANC Sports' patent-pending VisionSOFT operating system. Sitting at 14 feet-5 inches high x 25 feet-2 inches wide, the new scoreboard provides the highest clarity of all the action, including video playback, and exhibits over 68 billion colors. The scoreboard features four 6mm video screens, four 10mm LED video matrixes measuring 5 feet x 25 feet, and two 20mm LED rings. Based out of Ocean City, MD, The Greene Turtle Sports Bar & Grille offers a selection for all at an affordable price.

Fan Gear

Fan Gear, located just inside Verizon Center's main lobby on F Street, is every patron's favorite place to shop, offering team merchandise for Verizon Center's own Washington Wizards, Washington Capitals and Washington Mystics. Merchandise can also be found for the Georgetown Hoyas men's basketball team.

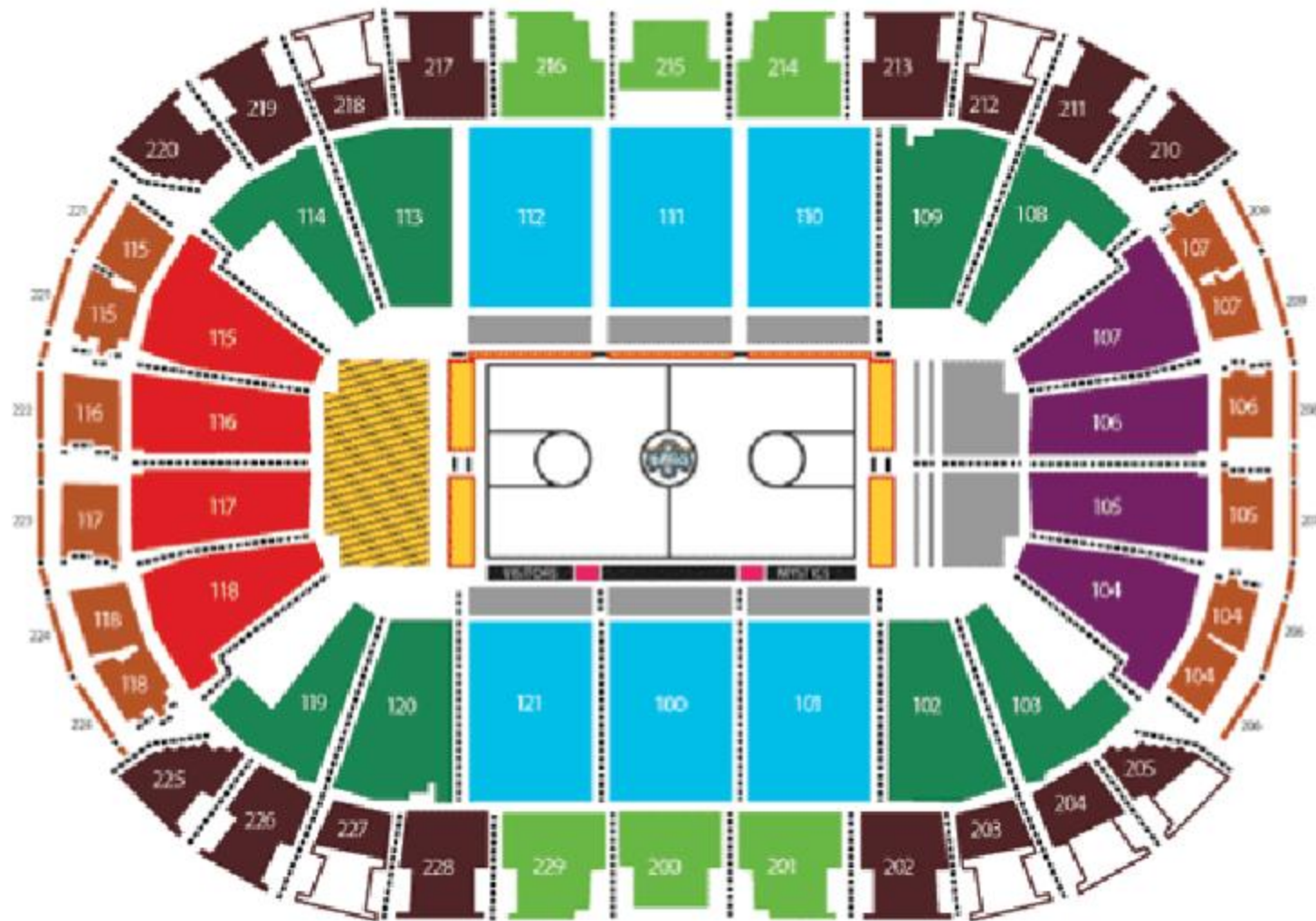
Vida Fitness and Bang Salon
