Monumental Sports & Entertainment also manages MedStar Capitals Iceplex, the state-of-the-art training facility for the Capitals and EagleBank Arena on George Mason University's campus. In conjunction with the District of Columbia and Events DC, MSE is a partner in a new sports and entertainment facility in Southeast DC on the St. Elizabeth's East campus that opened in September 2018. Facility highlights include MedStar Wizards Performance Center, the brand-new training facility for the Wizards, Go-Go and Mystics, and a 4,200-seat arena which will serve as the new home of the Mystics and Go-Go. 

Monumental Sports & Entertainment

Ted Leonsis is founder, chairman, majority owner and CEO of Monumental Sports & Entertainment, which owns the NHL's 2018 Stanley Cup Champion Washington Capitals, NBA's Washington Wizards, 2019 WNBA Champion Washington Mystics, the NBA G League's Capital City Go-Go and the NBA2K League's Wizards District Gaming. Leonsis is a co-owner of aXiomatic, which has controlling interest in global esports franchise Team Liquid. Monumental also owns the 20,000-seat Capital One Arena and operates MedStar Capitals Iceplex, the Capitals' training facility, and George Mason University's EagleBank Arena.

An integrated media, technology, sports and entertainment company, Monumental also runs Monumental Sports Network, a first-of-its-kind regional sports network for digital, mobile and over-the-top (OTT) platforms. Monumental and NBC Sports Washington, part of the NBC Sports Group, have developed an advanced media partnership that includes NBCSW's exclusive media rights to the Capitals and Wizards, and saw Monumental become an equity partner in NBCSW. NBC Sports Group has also invested in Monumental Sports Network, creating a cross-equity leadership structure.

As part of a joint venture with the D.C. mayor's office and Events DC, Monumental unveiled a brand-new sports and entertainment facility in Southeast DC on the St. Elizabeth's East campus, which opened in the Fall of 2018. The facility features a cutting-edge 4,200-seat arena for the Mystics and the Go-Go, as well as a top-of-the-line practice facility for the Wizards, the MedStar Wizards Performance Center.

As cofounder and partner at Revolution Growth, a \$1 billion set of investment funds, Mr. Leonsis and his partners make a select group of speed-up capital investments in businesses each year, typically investing \$25-50 million per deal.

Mr. Leonsis is a nationally recognized entrepreneur, investor, philanthropist and award-winning filmmaker, who has won Peabody and Emmy awards. He sits on a variety of boards, including American Express and Groupon, and is the former vice chairman and president of AOL.

Sheila C. Johnson

Vice Chairman Monumental Sports & Entertainment, President & Managing Partner Washington Mystics

Sheila C. Johnson is founder and CEO of Salamander Hotels & Resorts (SHR), a collection of luxury properties with over \$200 million in revenue in 2018. It is ranked #4 in Minority-Owned Companies in the Washington DC Metro area.

SHR includes the equestrian-inspired Salamander Resort & Spa in Middleburg, Virginia, opened in 2013 and has been awarded the esteemed Forbes Five Star rating. The collection features two of the top golf resorts in Florida: Hammock Beach in Palm Coast and Innisbrook in Tampa Bay (home of the annual PGA Valspar Championship at the acclaimed Copperhead course), as well as the Henderson Beach Resort in Destin, Florida, and the new Hotel Bennett in Charleston, South Carolina, which opened in January 2019. Until recently, SHR managed Reunion, a golf resort in Orlando, Florida. SHR orchestrated a successful turnaround of Reunion, helping position the property for its eventual sale.

As Vice Chairman of Monumental Sports & Entertainment, Ms. Johnson is the only African-American woman to have ownership in three professional sports teams: the NBA's Washington Wizards, the NHL's Washington Capitals (2018 Stanley Cup Champions), and the WNBA's Washington Mystics, for which she serves as President and Managing Partner. She also served on the Executive Committee of the United States Golf Association where she spearheaded efforts in increasing diversity in the game of golf.

In 2017, Ms. Johnson was named on Forbes Magazine's Top 50 America's Richest Self-Made Women. And in 2016, she co-founded WE Capital, a venture capital consortium to support and empower female-led enterprises that can advance transformational social change. She also serves on the board of the Greater Washington Partnership, which seeks to strengthen the region's global position as a center for commerce and innovation.

A fervent supporter of education and the arts, Ms. Johnson serves on the Board of Governors of Parsons The New School for Design in New York, and is a member of the Leadership Council at Harvard Kennedy School's Center for Public Leadership. She is also a board member of the Jackie Robinson Foundation.

A strong believer in the value of athletics as a vehicle for women's empowerment, she also helped found Street Soccer USA's Lady Salamanders program, which helps low-income and homeless young women find their inner strength through sport. Ms. Johnson served as global ambassador for CARE, a leading humanitarian organization that combats global poverty by empowering women. She also served as a member of Accordia Global Health Foundation's International Council, rallying support for the foundation's efforts to overcome the burden of infectious diseases in Africa. In recognition of her humanitarian efforts, she was honored with the Eleanor Roosevelt Val-Kill Medal in 2012. She is a 2018 recipient of the Lincoln Medal Award alongside Jack Nicholson - given to individuals for their accomplishments and personal attributes.

An accomplished violinist, Ms. Johnson received a Bachelor of Arts in music from the University of Illinois, as well as honorary degrees from numerous other institutions. She lives in Middleburg, VA, is married to the Honorable William T. Newman, Jr. and has two children.

Dick Patrick, Vice Chairman and Chief Operating Officer, President, Washington Capitals

Dick Patrick has been part of the Washington Capitals organization since 1982 and is one of Ted Leonsis's original partners when Monumental Sports & Entertainment was formed in 2010. Mr. Patrick is president of the Capitals and vice chairman of Monumental Sports & Entertainment. For the first five years of MSE's existence, Mr. Patrick also assumed initial responsibility as chief operating officer and was involved in all facets of operating not only the Capitals but also the Washington Wizards, Washington Mystics and Capital One Arena. He has served as president of the Capitals' franchise for more than two decades.

For three generations the family name of Patrick has been synonymous with the sport of hockey and the National Hockey League. Patrick's grandfather, Lester Patrick, was the longtime coach and general manager of the New York Rangers. In his honor, the Lester Patrick Trophy is awarded annually for "outstanding service to hockey in the United States." Patrick's father, Muzz, and uncle, Lynn, both played on the 1940 New York Rangers team that captured the Stanley Cup. In 2012 Dick Patrick was awarded the Lester Patrick Trophy for his contributions to hockey in the United States.

Before Patrick's arrival, the Capitals never had advanced to postseason play. In his 30-plus seasons with the club, Washington has qualified for the playoffs 26 times – including the team's run to the Stanley Cup finals in 1998 and the Presidents' Trophy-winning club in 2009-10.

Born in 1946 in Victoria, B.C., Patrick grew up in the United States. He earned his undergraduate degree from Dartmouth College and a law degree from the Washington College of Law at American University. He has developed commercial real estate in the Washington, D.C., area for more than 20 years and, while raising children who have skated within local youth hockey programs, he has been instrumental in increasing the Capitals' involvement in youth programs throughout the area.

Mr. Patrick was a leader in the conception and development of Medstar Capitals Iceplex, the team's state-of-the-art training center and office building that opened in 2006 in Arlington, Va.

Raul Fernandez, Vice Chairman

Raul Fernandez is Vice Chairman and Owner of Monumental Sports & Entertainment, a private partnership which owns the NBA's Washington Wizards, the NHL's Washington Capitals, the WNBA's Washington Mystics, the AFL's Washington Valor and Baltimore Brigade, and owns and operates the Capital One Arena in Washington, DC. Mr. Fernandez also serves as a special advisor to General Atlantic Partners, a growth equity firm with more than \$8 billion under management. He previously served as Chairman and CEO for ObjectVideo, a leading developer of intelligent video surveillance software, which he recently sold to Alarm.com. Mr. Fernandez brings more than two decades of executive experience scaling innovative and rapidly growing technology companies.

Mr. Fernandez is well known in the technology industry and the Washington, DC area as the founder of Proxicom, which under his leadership evolved into a leading global provider of e-commerce solutions for Fortune 500 companies. Founded in 1991, he grew the company to over 2,000 consultants and \$200 million in revenue before taking Proxicom public in 1999. He later sold the company to Dimension Data in a deal worth nearly \$450 million. Mr. Fernandez has been profiled by The Wall Street Journal, Fortune, Forbes, CNBC, The Industry Standard, The Washington Post, and CNN.

Mr. Fernandez, a native Washingtonian, is an active philanthropist in D.C. regional nonprofits, focusing his energy primarily on educational reform. In 2000 he co-founded Venture Philanthropy Partners (VPP), a philanthropic investment organization based in Washington, DC. Mr. Fernandez is also the Chairman of Fight for Children, and a board member of DC College Access Program (DC-CAP), the DC Public Education Fund, and the Fernandez Foundation.

Mr. Fernandez is an active technology investor in disruptive companies, including Undercover Colors, SyncThink, Radius Networks, Cloud9 eSports, Professional Fighters League (MMA), and Snap+Style Business, a mobile SaaS styling platform that empowers brands and their associates to engage customers using curation, personalization and conversion features that deliver proven results. He also serves on the board of Kate Spade & Company (formerly Liz Claiborne), AtSite Inc., a technology company that reduces risk and increases productivity in client facilities and real estate across North America, and Perfect Sense Digital, a company that drives innovations in web and mobile development for corporations worldwide.

Mr. Fernandez holds a bachelor's degree in economics from the University of Maryland.

David T. Blair is chairman of Accountable Health Solutions Inc., which is based in Rockville, Md. Accountable Health Solutions is a healthcare services company that develops technology-enabled solutions to improve quality, increase efficiency and reduce costs in the delivery of healthcare. From its founding in 1998 through 2012, Mr. Blair served as chairman and chief executive officer of Catalyst Health Solutions Inc., a Fortune 500 company. Catalyst was acquired by SXC Health Solutions in 2012 for \$4.8 billion.

Through their family foundation, Mr. Blair and his wife, Mikel, support a number of local and national philanthropic organizations. He also serves as a board member and acts in an advisory capacity to several corporations. The Blairs reside in Potomac, Md., with their six children.

Scott Brickman is CEO of The Brickman Group, the largest commercial landscape maintenance firm in the U.S. The company, which has more than 10,000 employees and more than 170 company-owned and operated branches serving 30 states, provides quality commercial landscape services to thousands of office parks, hotels, cemeteries, healthcare facilities, retail centers, homeowners associations and schools around the country. Joining the company in 1986 Mr. Brickman progressively advanced to oversee operations in their Northeast, Mid-Atlantic and Southeast division before being named CEO in 1998 at the age of 35.

Outside the company, Mr. Brickman has served as a board member and in an advisory capacity to many organizations, including Kellermeyer Building Services, ICON, Sequel Health Services and Kratos Global Strategies. He and his company have been the recipient of numerous awards, including Ernst and Young's Entrepreneur of the Year Award. The Brickman Group was recognized with the Society of Financial Professionals' National Capital Business Ethics Award. Mr. Brickman and his wife, Patrice, are involved in many philanthropic causes, including Neediest Kids and Visible Men, where Mr. Brickman sits on the Board, the National Center for Women and Children, Stepping Stones Shelter, the Barbara Bush Foundation Celebration of Reading and the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

Neil D. Cohen is the CEO of Snapfish.com and president and chief executive officer of District Photo Inc., which is the largest direct-to-consumer digital print, variable data printer and gift fulfillment service in the world. Mr. Cohen started with the company in 1976 and has been president and CEO since 1989. The company, which has facilities in Beltsville, Md.,

Chambersburg, Pa., Phoenix and Newton Abbott in the United Kingdom, provides services to most major online providers, major retailers and to its company-owned brands. Prior to the digital revolution, District Photo was the largest independent mail order and wholesale photo film processor in the United States and the United Kingdom.

Mr. Cohen, a native of Washington, D.C., is the past president of the Photo Marketing Association International. He is also involved in numerous business groups, including the World Presidents' Organization, and a wide range of philanthropic organizations serving children's needs, education, faith-based organizations and health-related causes, frequently holding committee or chair responsibilities in these groups.

Jack Davies was the founder and president of AOL International and now serves on the board of directors of Scholastic, the global children's publishing and media company. Prior to joining AOL in 1993, Mr. Davies was managing director of Citicorp's London-based consumer mortgage business after serving as vice president, Europe, for RCA Records. He began his career at General Electric where he held numerous senior consumer marketing positions. Mr. Davies earned an MBA in marketing (1973) and a bachelor's degree in political science (1972) from the University of Rochester.

Active in philanthropy in the D.C. area, Mr. Davies serves on a number of boards, including the Board and Executive Committee of Venture Philanthropy Partners. In addition he is on the board of See Forever Foundation, CharityWorks, Teach For America - DC Region and The Economic Club of Washington, D.C.

Richard D. Fairbank is founder, chairman and chief executive officer of Capital One Financial Corporation, a broadly diversified financial services company ranked 124th on the Fortune 500. Mr. Fairbank founded Capital One in 1988 based on his belief that the power of information, technology and testing could be harnessed to bring highly customized financial products directly to consumers. Headquartered in McLean, Va., Capital One is the eighth largest bank in the United States, offering a broad spectrum of financial products and services to consumers, small businesses and commercial clients. Additionally, Capital One has international businesses in the United Kingdom and Canada.

Mike Thibault

Head Coach & General Manager

Mike Thibault was named the head coach/general manager of the team on December 18, 2012. Under his tutelage, Washington is coming off winning the organization's first WNBA championship.

During the 2019 season, the team displayed one of the greatest offenses in WNBA history, posting the WNBA's highest offensive rating ever at 112.9. The Mystics made their second consecutive WNBA Finals appearance (2018-2019) and is coming off their best two-year stretch in franchise history, with the team going 48-20 over the past two seasons, and a franchise-best 26-8 record during the 2019 season.

Numerous players have continued to see growth under Thibault's direction, with forward Elena Delle Donne earning her second Most Valuable Player honor last season and forward Emma Meesseman became the first reserve player in WNBA history to be named Finals Most Valuable Player.

Following the 2013 season, his first season with Washington, Thibault earned his third WNBA Coach of the Year recognition.

The winningest coach in WNBA history, Thibault has led Washington to the playoffs the past three consecutive seasons and to six total postseason appearances (2013-2015, 2017-2019). During the 2017 playoffs, Washington made it past the first round of the playoffs for the first time in 15 years.

Prior to joining the Mystics, Thibault was the head coach of the Connecticut Sun where he was twice named WNBA Coach of the Year (2006, 2008) and led the team to eight playoff appearances and two WNBA Finals. He set numerous milestones during his time with the Sun, including becoming the second coach in WNBA history to reach 200 wins, the third-fastest coach in league history to reach 100 wins (doing so in 159 games) and the fourth WNBA head coach to work at least 300 regular season games. From 2003 through 2008, Thibault and the Connecticut Sun won 127 regular season games, tying with the Detroit Shock for the most victories during that six-year span. The Sun were one of two teams to have six consecutive winning seasons.

Connecticut posted consecutive 26-8 records in 2005 and 2006, which are still the best regular season results for an Eastern Conference team. Thibault assisted in the blockbuster trade that sent Lindsay Whalen and the No. 2 pick in the 2010 WNBA Draft to Minnesota in exchange for second-year guard Renee Montgomery and the No. 1 pick in 2010, which the team used to select Tina Charles. Under Thibault's tutelage, Charles was named the league's MVP in 2012.

Thibault joined the professional coaching ranks in 1978 as a scout for the Los Angeles Lakers and was quickly promoted to Director of Scouting and assistant coach in 1980.

During his tenure with the Lakers, the team won two NBA Championships. From 1982-1986, he served as the Director of Player Personnel and assistant coach for the Chicago Bulls when the organization selected Michael Jordan, Charles Oakley and traded for John Paxson.

Thibault served as the general manager and head coach of the Omaha Racers of the Continental Basketball Association (CBA) where his team captured the league's title in 1993. During his tenure with the Racers, the team made eight consecutive playoff appearances, and Thibault was named the 1993 Sportsman of the Year by Omaha broadcasters. He ranks sixth on the CBA all-time coaching victory list (236). Thibault also coached the Calgary 88's of the World Basketball League (WBL) where he received Coach of the Year honors in 1988. Following his time in Omaha, Thibault was a scout for the Seattle Sonics and immediately prior to joining the Sun in 2003, he was an assistant coach with the Milwaukee Bucks for four seasons. Thibault has had an extensive collaboration with USA Basketball. He most recently served as an assistant coach to the women's National Team that won gold during the 2008 Beijing Olympics. He was on the coaching staff of the 2006 National Team that captured bronze during the World Championships, was the head coach of the men's team that won the gold medal at the 1993 FIBA World Championship qualifying tournament and was also at the helm of the men's team that won the silver medal at the 1995 Pan American Games.

Mike and his wife Nanci have been staunch supporters of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation since Mike's days with the Omaha Racers. In 2007, the Thibaults were co-chairs of GREAT STRIDES, the primary fundraiser of the CF Foundation's Connecticut Chapter.

The Thibaults have carried their support of the local community where they live and play by donating tickets to every Washington Mystics game to community organizations.

Mike and Nanci have two children. Eric is an assistant head coach with the Mystics while Carly is an assistant coach at the University of Minnesota.

Eric Thibault
Associate Head Coach

Eric Thibault is in his eighth season as an assistant coach with the Washington Mystics and his second as associate head coach. Thibault has helped lead the team to six postseason appearances, including Washington's back-to-back trips to the WNBA Finals in 2018 and 2019, and the first title in franchise history in 2019. As part of his responsibilities the past seven years, Thibault has directed much of the player development, with an emphasis on coaching the guards, including Natasha Cloud, who was a candidate for Most Improved Player of the Year in 2018, and Ariel Atkins, a member of the 2018 All-Rookie team.

He has had stints with Virginia Commonwealth University and the Connecticut Sun. During the 2012-13 season, Thibault assisted with the recruiting process and player development for VCU and played an integral role in the team's transition to the Atlantic-10 conference. As a member of the Sun's coaching staff, Thibault was responsible for preparing reports on opponent personnel, conducting individual workouts with players, managing season statistics, constructing opponent film edits, and scouting opponents. He has also worked on the floor with WNBA All-Star point guards Kara Lawson, Lindsay Whalen, Ivory Latta and Kristi Toliver. Thibault was also a key member of the coaching staff that assisted the Sun during their playoff run in 2012.



ASJHA JONES
Assistant Coach

Asjha Jones enters her third season with the Washington Mystics, and her first as assistant coach. Jones has played a prominent role in developing the team's post players in past years. Jones attended the University of Connecticut from 1998-2002, where she reached three Final Fours and won two NCAA championships (2000,2002). Jones was selected in the first round (4th overall pick) by the Washington Mystics in the 2002 WNBA Draft, where she spent two seasons prior to being traded to the Connecticut Sun, where she played from 2004-2012. Jones reached two Finals with the Sun and was selected to the All-Star team in 2007 and 2009. After missing a season due to injury, Jones came back to play for the Minnesota Lynx where they won the WNBA Championship in 2015.

Jones was also selected to play for the USA basketball team, winning a Gold Medal at the 2010 World Championships in the Czech Republic and the Olympic Gold in 2012 in London. Jones is one of just 11 women to win a WNBA title, Olympic Gold Medal and NCAA Championship.

Jones also spent several years overseas during her professional career, where she played seven years in Russia and in a variety of other countries. In 2012, she took her Spanish team to the EuroLeague Finals and was named the MVP.




EMMA SKINKER

MYSTICS TIMELINE

October 1, 1997 - Washington, DC, is selected as a potential city for a WNBA team. The city must meet certain WNBA expansion criteria including season ticket sales, marketing and advertising commitments.

November 11, 1997 - The NBA approves the selection of Washington as the home of an expansion team for the 1998 WNBA season. Washington Sports and Entertainment, which runs the NBA's Washington Wizards and NHL's Washington Capitals, will operate the team and home games will be played at MCI Center.

December 16, 1997 - In keeping with the magical theme of the Washington Wizards, WSELP Chairman Abe Pollin announces that Washington's WNBA team will be called the Mystics.

December 29, 1997 - Jim Lewis, who coached at George Mason University for 14 seasons, is named the Mystics first head coach.

January 21, 1998 - The Mystics logo is unveiled. The team colors are blue, black and bronze.

January 27, 1998 - Nikki McCray and Alessandra Santos de Oliveira are introduced as the first two players on the Mystics' inaugural roster.

February 18, 1998 - With the first pick in the expansion draft, the Mystics select Heidi Burge, formally of the L.A. Sparks. The Mystics also add Penny Moore (Charlotte Sting), Deborah Carter (Utah Starzz), and Tammy Jackson (Houston Comets).

March 9, 1998 - The WNBA announces that the Washington Mystics will have the third pick in the WNBA Draft on April 29.

March 25, 1998 - Cathy Parson is named assistant coach of the Washington Mystics.

June 10, 1998 - The Mystics announce their opening day roster of Deborah Carter, Murrell Page, Alessandra Santos de Oliveira, Keri Chaconas, Nikki McCray, Rita Williams, Penny Moore, Tammy Jackson, Adrienne Shuler, Leila Sobral, Heidi Burge, and La'Shawn Brown.

June 19, 1998 - The Mystics set a WNBA attendance record, hosting a sellout crowd of 20,674 for the home opener against the Utah Starzz. With an 85-76 victory, the Mystics record the first-ever franchise win.

July 23, 1998 - Mystics relieve Head Coach Jim Lewis of his coaching responsibilities. Assistant Coach Cathy Parson takes over his responsibilities on an interim basis.

August 18, 1998 - The Mystics set a new WNBA record for attendance in their inaugural season. Close to 240,000 fans attended the Mystics 15 home games.

October 28, 1998 - After finishing their inaugural season 3-27, the Mystics are awarded the first pick in the 1999 WNBA Draft.

February 18, 1999 - Nancy Darsch is named head coach of the Mystics.

March 3, 1999 - The Mystics name Melissa McFerrin assistant coach.

April 29, 1999 - The WNBA and its players sign the league's first collective bargaining agreement.

May 4, 1999 - With the first pick in the 1999 WNBA Draft, the Mystics select Chamique Holdsclaw. Rounding out their picks are Shalonda Enis, Andrea Nagy and Jennifer Whittle.

May 11, 1999 - Jenny Boucek is hired as assistant coach.

July 6, 1999 - Chamique Holdsclaw and Nikki McCray are selected as starters for the WNBA Inaugural All-Star Game.

July 14, 1999 - USA Basketball selects Nikki McCray and Chamique Holdsclaw to participate on the USA Basketball Senior Women's National Team.

August 21, 1999 - The Mystics finish the 1999 season 12-20, narrowly missing the playoffs. They improve their record by nine wins.

August 28, 1999 - Chamique Holdsclaw is named the 1999 WNBA Rookie of the year.

September 5, 1999 - Chamique Holdsclaw is named to the All-WNBA Second Team.

January 19, 2000 - The Mystics acquire F Vicky Bullett from Charlotte in a trade that sends F Shalonda Enis and the Mystics' third-round draft pick during the 2000 WNBA Draft to Charlotte.

April 7, 2000 - Tyrone Beaman is hired as an assistant coach.

April 25, 2000 - With the second and 18th picks in the 2000 WNBA Draft, the Mystics select Tausha Mills and Tonya Washington.

July 14, 2000 - Nancy Darsch resigns as head coach of the Washington Mystics. Wizards Director of Player Personnel Darrell Walker is named interim head coach for the remainder of the 2000 WNBA season.

August 9, 2000 - The Mystics finish the 2000 regular season 14-18, and qualify for the playoffs.

August 14, 2000 - The Mystics lose to the New York Liberty in the first round of the playoffs, 0-2, ending their 2000 season, the most successful to date.

December 20, 2000 - Mystics General Manager Melissa McFerrin announces Tom Maher as head coach for the 2001 season.

February 6, 2001 - The Mystics hire Marianne Stanley as an assistant coach.

April 20, 2001 - The Mystics select guard Coco Miller in the first round (9th overall) pick of the 2001 WNBA Draft. The Mystics also select F/C Tamara Stocks (25th overall), G Jamie Lewis (41st overall) and F Elena Karpova (44th overall).

June 3, 2001 - Opening night at the MCI Center, the Mystics unveil their third consecutive WNBA Attendance Champions banner in front of 17,310 fans. The Mystics honor Katherine Graham and Leslie Visser at halftime for paving the way for women in the media. The Mystics beat the Seattle Storm 68-63.

June 25, 2001 - The WNBA announces that the Mystics and the MCI Center will host the 2002 All-Star Game.

July 3, 2001 - The Mystics' 72-69 win over the Seattle Storm makes WNBA history as the longest WNBA game. It took four overtimes and two hours and 46 minutes to complete.

July 8, 2001 - Chamique Holdsclaw is the top vote getter in the 2001 WNBA All-Star balloting. Holdsclaw receives 105,006 votes. Holdsclaw and Nikki McCray are selected as starters for the Eastern Conference All-Star Team.

July 10, 2001 - The Mystics activate Markita Aldridge and Tamara Stocks and place Chamique Holdsclaw (stress-related reaction in her right foot) and Cass Bauer-Bilodeau (right knee chondromalacia) on the injured list.

July 21, 2001 - The team activates Chamique Holdsclaw and places Markita Aldridge on the injured list with a left knee effusion.

August 8, 2001 - The Mystics celebrate their one millionth fan during the game against the Miami Sol. The Mystics are the first WNBA team to reach one million fans in just four seasons.

December 5, 2001 - The Mystics acquire the fourth overall selection in the 2002 WNBA Draft as well as the 36th overall pick and F Angie Brazier in exchange for the 17th and 49th overall selections and G Nikki McCray. With the trade, the Mystics hold two first-round picks (third and fourth) and two third-round picks (33rd and 36th) in the 2002 Draft.

January 4, 2002 - Melissa McFerrin and Tom Maher resign as general manager and head coach, respectively.

April 4, 2002 - Washington Sports and Entertainment President Susan O'Malley announces the hiring of Marianne Stanley as head coach of the Mystics and Pat Summitt as the team's player personnel consultant.

April 19, 2002 - The Washington Mystics select Stacey Dales-Schuman (third overall pick), Asjha Jones (fourth overall pick), LaNisha Cartwell (33rd overall pick), and Teresa Geter (36th overall pick) in the 2002 WNBA Draft.

April 29, 2002 - The Mystics announce Linda Hill-MacDonald and Ledell Eackles as assistant coaches.

January 31, 2003 - Marianne Stanley renews her contract with the Mystics.

April 24, 2003 - With the eighth pick in the 2003 WNBA Dispersal Draft, the Washington Mystics select Jenny Mowe, formerly of the dissolved Portland Fire team.

April 25, 2003 - With the seventh overall pick in the 2003 WNBA Draft, the Washington Mystics select Aiysha Smith. In the second round, the Mystics select Zuzana Zirkova with the 21st overall pick. In the third round, the Mystics select Trish Juhline with the 32nd overall pick and Tamara Bowie with the 36th overall pick.

May 6, 2003 - Pat Summitt renews her contract with the Washington Mystics to serve as player personnel consultant.

May 31, 2003 - Chamique Holdsclaw scores her 2,000th point and 1,000th rebound in the same game. She is the first player to do so.

June 13, 2003 - Murriel Page surpasses the 1,000-rebound mark when she pulls down a game-high 11 rebounds vs. Connecticut.

June 30, 2003

Chamique Holdsclaw is named a starter on the All-Star Team for the fifth time. She has been selected to the All-Star Team every season since her rookie year in 1999.

January 6, 2004 - The Mystics select Chasity Melvin with the second pick in the 2004 WNBA Dispersal Draft.

January 21, 2004 - Marianne Stanley and Linda Hill-MacDonald resign as head coach and assistant coach, respectively.

February 10, 2004 - The Mystics sign Chasity Melvin.

February 17, 2004 - The Washington Mystics hire Michael Adams as the new head coach.

March 7, 2004 - Linda Hargrove joins the Mystics coaching staff as an assistant coach.

March 30, 2004 - Stephanie Ready joins the Mystics coaching staff as an assistant coach. Ledell Eackles also returns to the team as assistant coach.

March 25, 2004 - The Mystics trade F Asjha Jones to the Connecticut Sun in a three-team trade for Phoenix Mercury G Tamicha Jackson.





April 24, 1996	Women's basketball announces "We Got Next" as the NBA Board of Governors approves the concept of a WNBA.
August 7, 1996	Val Ackerman is named first president of the WNBA.
October 23, 1996	Houston Comets forward Sheryl Swoopes becomes the first player signed by the WNBA.
October 30, 1996	WNBA announces eight teams to compete in the inaugural season – Charlotte, Cleveland, Houston, Los Angeles, New York, Phoenix, Sacramento and Utah.
January 22, 1997	The league's first 16 players are allocated to teams, an elite group comprised of Olympians and collegiate stars.
April 19, 1997	WNBA and Spalding introduce the league's official orange-and-oatmeal game ball during WNBA Pre-Draft Camp at Disney's Wide World of Sports complex in Orlando.
April 28, 1997	Tina Thompson is the first No. 1 draft pick, selected by the Houston Comets in the inaugural WNBA Draft.
June 21, 1997	The New York Liberty and the Los Angeles Sparks tip-off the first WNBA game at the Great Western Forum in Los Angeles. Sparks guard Penny Toler scores the league's first basket at 19:01. New York wins 67-57.
June 23, 1997	Utah Starzz becomes first team to pass the 100-point mark in a 102-89 victory over the Los Angeles Sparks.
July 2, 1997	New York Liberty center Rebecca Lobo wins her 100th consecutive personal victory when the Liberty defeat the Houston Comets 70-67. Winning streak comprises Lobo's 35-0 senior season at the University of Connecticut, 60-0 as member of U.S. Olympic Team and 5-0 as a member of the Liberty. The streak ends at 102.
August 30, 1997	The Houston Comets become the first WNBA Champions, employing the unstoppable Cynthia Cooper and a suffocating defense for a 65-51 victory over the New York Liberty at The Summit.
October 1, 1997	The WNBA announces that franchises in Detroit and Washington will join the fold as expansion teams for the 1998 season.
April 22, 1998	The league announces the addition of expansion teams in Orlando and Minnesota for the 1999 season, bringing the total number of teams to 12.
June 19, 1998	Los Angeles Sparks center Lisa Leslie sets a WNBA record by pulling down 21 rebounds in the Sparks' victory over the New York Liberty.
June 21, 1998	Lisa Leslie notches her seventh-straight double-double, setting a WNBA record.
July 18, 1998	Houston's Cynthia Cooper becomes the first player to reach 1,000 points during Comets' 75-44 rout of the Sacramento Monarchs.
July 29, 1998	Sacramento Monarchs guard Ticha Penicheiro dishes out 16 assists in a 75-67 loss vs. the Cleveland Rockers to set a WNBA record.
August 29, 1998	In Game 2 of the WNBA Finals, the Houston Comets, trailing the Phoenix Mercury 1-0 in the best-of-three series, erases a 12-point deficit in the final 7:24 to force overtime. Houston wins the series and claims its second of four titles.
April 29, 1999	The WNBA and WNBPA reaches final accord as the league's first Collective Bargaining Agreement is signed.

- June 7, 1999** WNBA announces the addition of four expansion teams for the 2000 season – Indiana, Miami, Portland and Seattle. The WNBA family now includes 16 teams.
- June 29, 1999** The Sacramento Monarchs and the Minnesota Lynx combine for a WNBA-record 21 three-pointers (10 by Sacramento, 11 by Minnesota) in the Monarchs' 86-72 victory over the Lynx.
- July 14, 1999** Whitney Houston sings the National Anthem in front of an electrified crowd on hand at Madison Square Garden to witness the Inaugural WNBA All-Star Game. The West defeats the East 79-61 and Lisa Leslie is named MVP.
- July 27, 1999** Sheryl Swoopes records the WNBA's first triple-double with 15 points, 14 rebounds and 10 assists in an 85-46 win over Detroit at the Compaq Center.
- September 4, 1999** New York Liberty guard Teresa Weatherspoon nails a shot from beyond the midcourt line with 2.4 seconds remaining to give the Liberty a 68-67 victory over the Houston Comets in Game 2 of the WNBA Finals. The shot sends the series to a decisive Game 3, which the Comets win to claim their third straight WNBA title.
- June 7, 2000** Cleveland Rockers forward Eva Nemcova ends her record-streak of 66 consecutive free throws with a miss against Orlando. Nemcova did not miss from the foul line from June 14, 1999 to June 5, 2000.
- July 17, 2000** The West defeats the East 73-61 at the 2000 WNBA All-Star Game, hosted by the Phoenix Mercury at America West Arena. Houston's Tina Thompson captures MVP honors.
- August 25, 2000** Cleveland Rockers guard Suzie McConnell Serio is named the recipient of the first Kim Perrot Sportsmanship Award presented by American General, named in honor of Houston's Kim Perrot, who died of cancer in 1999.
- August 26, 2000** Cynthia Cooper turns in a clutch performance to earn her fourth WNBA Finals MVP as the Houston Comets claim fourth straight title by defeating the New York Liberty. In Game 1 at Madison Square Garden, Cooper converts a crucial three-point play with 25.4 seconds remaining to push the Comets' lead to five. In Game 2, she scores six of her 25 points in overtime and nine of Houston's final 18 points. It marks Cooper's last appearance in the WNBA Finals. She retires as the WNBA's all-time scoring leader.
- June 2, 2001** Houston's Van Chancellor becomes first WNBA coach to record 100 victories as the Comets defeat the Detroit Shock 74-73.
- June 7, 2001** Utah Starzz center Margo Dydek records the WNBA's second triple-double, setting a league record for blocked shots in the process as her 12 points, 11 rebounds and 10 blocks leads Utah to an 82-79 win over Orlando.
- July 3, 2001** Washington and Seattle battle through quadruple overtime – the longest game in WNBA history – before the Mystics edge the Storm 72-69.
- July 7, 2001** Minnesota Lynx guard Katie Smith sets the WNBA single-game scoring record with a 46-point performance, including six three-pointers, in a 100-95 overtime loss to Los Angeles.
- July 14, 2001** The West wins the 2001 WNBA All-Star Game in Orlando, defeating the East 80-72. Lisa Leslie earns her second All-Star MVP award.
- July 30, 2001** Lisa Leslie scores her 2,538th point to become the WNBA's career scoring leader, surpassing Cynthia Cooper.
- August 10, 2001** Katie Smith scores 22 points in Minnesota's 65-51 win over Seattle to break the WNBA single-season scoring record of 686 points set by Cynthia Cooper in 1999.

- August 11, 2001** Los Angeles becomes the first team to go undefeated at home for an entire season, finishing 16-0 at the STAPLES Center.
- August 27, 2001** The Charlotte Sting, after dropping the opener of the Eastern Conference Finals at home, go into Madison Square Garden and take both games against the Liberty to derail New York's hopes of making a third consecutive trip to the WNBA Finals. Charlotte advances to the Finals after a 1-10 season start.
- September 1, 2001** The Los Angeles Sparks claim their first WNBA Championship to give the city of Los Angeles a sweep of professional basketball titles in 2001. Lisa Leslie becomes the first WNBA player to capture all three MVP awards in the same season, joining NBA greats Shaquille O'Neal, Michael Jordan and Willis Reed as the only pro hoopsters to accomplish this feat.
- Sparks coach Michael Cooper becomes the first person to claim NBA and WNBA titles, having won five championships as a player with the Lakers.
- September 1, 2001** The WNBA welcomes its 10 millionth fan prior to Game 2 of the WNBA Finals at the STAPLES Center.
- November 13, 2001** The Seattle Storm win the first pick in the 2002 WNBA Draft in the inaugural WNBA Draft Lottery.
- June 4, 2002** Katie Smith becomes the WNBA's all-time career leader for three-pointers (233), surpassing Cynthia Cooper (232).
- June 5, 2002** Teresa Weatherspoon becomes the first WNBA player to record 1,000 assists during the Liberty's 60-59 victory over the Detroit Shock at Madison Square Garden.
- June 8, 2002** The Orlando Miracle and the Cleveland Rockers square off for the longest game in WNBA history. The Miracle claims a 103-99 victory in the 2:57 contest that spans three overtime periods.
- June 22, 2002** Utah Starzz forward Natalie Williams records the first 20/20 performance in WNBA history when she scores 22 points and grabs 20 rebounds in Utah's 77-61 win over the Sacramento Monarchs at ARCO Arena.
- July 15, 2002** The West earns its fourth straight victory in the 2002 WNBA All-Star Game in Washington, D.C., edging the East 81-76. Lisa Leslie takes All-Star MVP honors for the second straight year and third time in her career.
- July 22, 2002** Lisa Leslie becomes the first WNBA player to record 3,000 points during the Sparks' 92-84 victory over Orlando at the STAPLES Center. Leslie records 24 points and 21 rebounds (tying the league record she set on 6/19/98) in the victory.
- July 30, 2002** Lisa Leslie becomes the first WNBA player to dunk in a game when she throws down a one-handed breakaway layup with 4:44 remaining in the first half in Los Angeles' 82-73 loss to Miami at the STAPLES Center.
- August 9, 2002** Margo Dydek becomes the first WNBA player to record 500 career blocks.
- August 15, 2002** Washington Mystics forward Chamique Holdsclaw becomes the first player to lead the league in both scoring (19.9 ppg) and rebounding (11.6 rpg) in a single season.
- August 29, 2002** Los Angeles Sparks rookie guard Nikki Teasley nails the game-winning shot in the waning seconds of Game 2 of the WNBA Finals to give the Sparks their second consecutive WNBA Championship, defeating the New York Liberty.
- Lisa Leslie earns WNBA Finals MVP honors for the second straight year.

- October 8, 2002** The NBA Board of Governors votes to restructure the WNBA to allow individual team ownership, to allow teams to be owned by non-NBA owners and to be located in non-NBA markets.
- October 21, 2002** The WNBA announces that the Miracle will be relocated from Orlando to a city to be designated by the WNBA.
- November 27, 2002** The Miami Heat organization elects not to assume ownership of the Sol.
- December 5, 2002** The WNBA announces that the Utah Starzz will relocate to San Antonio for the 2003 season.
- December 30, 2002** The Portland Trailblazers organization elects not to assume ownership of the Fire.
- January 10, 2003** San Antonio announces "Silver Stars" as its official team name.
- January 28, 2003** The Connecticut Sun join the WNBA for 2003, as the Mohegan Tribe of Indians become the first non-NBA owner in league history. The Orlando Miracle become the Connecticut Sun.
- April 24, 2003** The WNBA holds the second annual Draft Lottery and a Dispersal Draft to disseminate players from the Miami Sol and Portland Fire. The Cleveland Rockers win the lottery, while the Detroit Shock make Ruth Riley, formerly of the Sol, the first selection in the Dispersal Draft.
- April 25, 2003** At 3 a.m., the WNBA and the WNBAPA sign the league's second Collective Bargaining Agreement. The agreement is for four years, with a league option for a fifth, and gives WNBA players the first free agency rights in the history of women's professional team sports.
- April 25, 2003** The league holds the 2003 WNBA Draft, and Cleveland takes Mississippi State's LaToya Thomas as the first overall pick.
- May 23, 2003** Chamique Holdsclaw breaks the WNBA record for rebounds in a game grabbing 24 in the Washington Mystics season-opening win over the Charlotte Sting. She also added 22 points and become the first WNBA player to record two 20-point, 20-rebound performances in a career.
- June 7, 2003** Seattle Storm center Lauren Jackson becomes the youngest player in WNBA history to reach the 1,000 point milestone at age 22.
- June 10, 2003** Minnesota's Katie Smith becomes the first WNBA player to record 300 three-point field goals in her career.
- July 12, 2003** The West captures its fifth straight WNBA All-Star victory at New York's Madison Square Garden by defeating the East All-Stars 84-75, while Los Angeles's Nikki Teasley earns MVP honors.
- August 25, 2003** Nikki Teasley finishes the year averaging 11.5 points, 6.3 assists, and 5.1 rebounds becoming the first player in WNBA history to average more than ten points, five assists, and five rebounds in a season.
- September 14, 2003** Seattle's Lauren Jackson becomes the first international player to win the WNBA's Most Valuable Player award.
- September 16, 2003** The Detroit Shock win their first WNBA title against the Los Angeles Sparks in front of a sell-out crowd and record attendance of 22,076. Detroit's Ruth Riley records a career high 27 points in Game Three and earns the series MVP.

- September 23, 2003** Rebecca Lobo, one of three original WNBA players, (together with Sheryl Swoopes and Lisa Leslie) signed by the league, retires after a seven-year career.
- December 3, 2003** The Phoenix Mercury win the first pick in the WNBA Draft in the 2004 WNBA Draft Lottery.
- December 17, 2003** The Board of Governors announces three rules changes. The three-point line moves from 19' 9" to 20' 6¼", and the lane is widened from 12' to the NBA width of 16'. The 30-second shot clock resets to 20 seconds (as opposed to 30 seconds under the previous rule) when a defensive foul or other defensive violation occurs with less than 20 seconds remaining on the shot clock.
- January 6, 2004** The WNBA holds a Dispersal Draft to disseminate the players from the Cleveland Rockers. The Phoenix Mercury select forward Penny Taylor with the first overall selection.
- April 17, 2004** The league holds the 2004 WNBA Draft, and Phoenix takes the University of Connecticut's Diana Taurasi as the #1 overall pick.
- June 17, 2004** Ticha Penicheiro passes Teresa Weatherspoon to take over the number one spot in career assists.
- July 29, 2004** Lisa Leslie scores her 4,000th career point and becomes the first WNBA player to reach the milestone.
- August 2-31, 2004** The WNBA stops play to give players the opportunity to compete in the 2004 Olympic Games in Athens, Greece.
- August 5, 2004** USA Basketball defeats the WNBA All-Stars 74-58 as the two teams face-off in the historic game at Radio City Music Hall in New York City. The game was a send off for the US Women's National Team as they prepared to compete in the 2004 Olympic Games in Athens.
- September 10, 2004** Lisa Leslie records the WNBA's third triple-double, tying Margo Dydek's record for blocked shots in the process as her 29 points, 15 rebounds and 10 blocked shots leads Los Angeles to an 81-63 victory over the Detroit Shock.
- October 12, 2004** The Seattle Storm win their first WNBA title against the Connecticut Sun before a sell-out crowd of 17,072. For the first time in WNBA history, all three games of the WNBA Finals were sell-outs. Seattle guard Betty Lennox averaged 22.3 points for the three games on her way to earning the series MVP.
- December 1, 2004** The Charlotte Sting beat the odds to win the first pick in the 2005 WNBA Draft in the fourth annual WNBA Draft Lottery. Charlotte had only a 9.7 percent chance of capturing the first pick.
- February 8, 2005** NBA Commissioner David Stern announces that the WNBA will be expanding to Chicago for the 2006 season. The Chicago Sky becomes the second WNBA team to be owned and run by an entity outside of the NBA. In 2003, the Connecticut Sun became the first independently owned and operated WNBA team.
- February 15, 2005** Donna Orender is appointed by David Stern as the second president of the WNBA.
- April 16, 2005** The league holds the 2005 WNBA Draft, and Charlotte takes the University of Minnesota center Janel McCarville as the #1 overall pick.
- May 24, 2005** Sheila Johnson, co-founder of Black Entertainment Television, becomes the WNBA's first African-American female owner when she joined Ted Leonsis' Lincoln Holdings LLC, which in turn purchased the Washington Mystics from Washington Wizards' owner Abe Pollin.
- July 13, 2005** Katie Smith becomes the first woman in U.S. basketball history to score 5,000 points in her professional career (WNBA and ABL).

- August 18, 2005** Anne Donovan becomes the first female WNBA coach – and fourth overall in the league – to win 100 games.
- September 18, 2005** Sheryl Swoopes becomes the first three-time WNBA Most Valuable Player in league history.
- September 20, 2005** The Sacramento Monarchs clinch the 2005 WNBA Championship, bringing the city of Sacramento their first basketball title.
- October 24, 2005** The Minnesota Lynx beat the odds to win the first pick in the 2006 WNBA Draft in the fifth annual WNBA Draft Lottery. Minnesota had only a 16.7 percent chance of capturing the first pick.
- February 1, 2006** The WNBA announces the 2006 WNBA Draft and Pre-Draft Camp will be held in Boston, site of the NCAA Women's Final Four. The WNBA events will conclude a week-long celebration of women's basketball emanating from Boston.
- April 5, 2006** The league holds the 2006 WNBA Draft, and Minnesota takes the Louisiana State University's Seimone Augustus as the #1 overall pick.
- June 13, 2006** The WNBA All-Decade Team is selected by fans, a panel of national and WNBA-market media and the league's current players and coaches. The team is comprised of the 10 best and most influential players from its first 10 years of play. Players named are: Sue Bird, Tamika Catchings, Cynthia Cooper, Yolanda Griffith, Lauren Jackson, Lisa Leslie, Katie Smith, Dawn Staley, Sheryl Swoopes and Tina Thompson. Van Chancellor, who led the Houston Comets to consecutive WNBA championships in the league's first four seasons, was named the WNBA's Coach of Decade.
- July 12, 2006** The 2006 WNBA All-Star Game takes place at New York City's Madison Square Garden. Four rookies – Seimone Augustus, Cappie Pondexter, Sophia Young and Candice Dupree – are named All-Stars. The East squad, led by All-Star MVP Katie Douglas of the Connecticut Sun, earns its first-ever victory with a 98-82 decision. Off the court, the inaugural All-Star Salute: Celebrating Inspiration Luncheon is a key highlight of the festivities as former Secretary of State Madeleine Albright is the keynote speaker.
- June 23, 2006** In a game against the San Antonio, Los Angeles Sparks center Lisa Leslie scores the 5,000th point in her WNBA career and becomes the first player in WNBA history to reach that milestone.
- August 10, 2006** Diana Taurasi scores a WNBA single-game record 47 points in a triple-overtime game against Houston. Taurasi would also finish the 2006 season with new WNBA records for most points in a single-season (860) and highest scoring average in a single season (25.3).
- August 30, 2006** As part of the League's 10th Anniversary season, the WNBA Greatest Moment presented by AOL.com is unveiled during Game 1 of the 2006 WNBA Finals. Fans, who were able to log on to www.aol.com/wnba, voted Teresa Weatherspoon's half-court, buzzer-beater – a shot that propelled the New York Liberty to victory in Game 2 of the 1999 WNBA Finals and on to a deciding Game 3 against the Houston Comets – as their favorite moment in the WNBA's 10-year history.
- September 3, 2006** Lisa Leslie of the Los Angeles Sparks is named MVP for the third time in her career after having also earned the honor in 2001 and 2004. Leslie joined the Houston Comets' Sheryl Swoopes as the only players in WNBA history to capture MVP honors three times.
- September 9, 2006** The 2006 WNBA Finals see the Detroit Shock earn their second league championship when they topped the Sacramento Monarchs in the first WNBA Finals match up ever to reach a fifth and deciding game. The historic

- game featured a sellout crowd of 19,671 at Joe Louis Arena in Detroit, the second highest Finals crowd in WNBA history. Detroit's Deanna Nolan is named Finals MVP.
- October 26, 2006** The Phoenix Mercury wins the sixth annual Draft Lottery and earns the top pick in the 2007 WNBA Draft. It marks the first time that the team whose odds of winning the top pick were mathematically the smallest actually came away with the #1 pick.
- November 7, 2006** The WNBA announces the creation of the Dawn Staley Community Leadership Award. The award will be presented to the player who best exemplifies the characteristics of a leader in the community and will reflect Staley's contagious leadership, spirit, charitable efforts and love for the game.
- December 7, 2006** The WNBA Board of Governors approves the sale of the Los Angeles Sparks to an investment group led by Katherine E. Goodman and Carla J. Christofferson.
- December 13, 2006** The Charlotte Bobcats Organization announces that it will no longer operate the Charlotte Sting.
- January 8, 2007** The WNBA holds a Dispersal Draft to disseminate the players from the Charlotte Sting. The Chicago Sky select guard Monique Currie with the first overall selection.
- January 30, 2007** Rule changes are announced for the 2007 season and include the following: the backcourt rule requires offensive teams to bring the ball across the mid-court line within eight seconds rather than 10 seconds; the timeout rule requires that officials grant requests for a timeout (full or 20-second) by a player in the game or the head coach; and the teams will now be able to designate 11 active players and up to two inactive players on playoff rosters, with the ability to activate any inactive players on a game-by-game basis.
- January 31, 2007** The WNBA Board of Governors approves the sale of the Houston Comets to Hilton Koch/Hilton Acquisitions, LLC.
- February 16, 2007** Electronic Arts announces that six WNBA players are featured in a new videogame NBA STREET Homecourt. Sue Bird, Tamika Catchings, Lauren Jackson, Lisa Leslie, Sheryl Swoopes and Diana Taurasi are the first female professional athletes to ever be featured and go head-to-head with their male counterparts in a videogame.
- March 31, 2007** Former University of Texas Head Coach Jody Conradt becomes the inaugural recipient of the WNBA Inspiring Coach Award.
- April 4, 2007** The 2007 WNBA Draft presented by adidas takes place in Cleveland, marking the second straight year that the draft was held immediately following the NCAA Women's Division I Championship Game and conducted in the same city as the Final Four. The Phoenix Mercury make Lindsey Harding the top overall pick before trading her to the Minnesota Lynx in exchange for Tangela Smith. The fast-paced draft earned a place in league history when Jessica Davenport, the second overall pick, was subsequently traded from San Antonio to New York in exchange for all-star guard Becky Hammon and a future selection. It marked the first time in WNBA history that the top two picks were traded on Draft Day.
- July 15, 2007** The 2007 WNBA All-Star Game, the league's eighth such contest, is played in front of a sellout audience on July 15 at the Verizon Center in Washington, D.C. A crowd of 19,487 fans witnessed the East defeat the West, 103-99, as Cheryl Ford of the Detroit Shock clinched the MVP honors. A key highlight of the All-Star festivities in 2007 was the second annual All-Star Salute: Inspiring Women Luncheon, featuring keynote speaker and Secretary of State Dr. Condoleezza Rice.

- July 15, 2007** Signaling a major milestone in its second decade, the WNBA reaches an eight-year agreement with ESPN to have ABC, ESPN and ESPN2 televise games through the 2016 season. The agreement was announced in conjunction with the 2007 WNBA All-Star Game by Donna Orender, WNBA President, and John Skipper, ESPN Executive Vice President, Content. The agreement extends the WNBA's relationship with ESPN, which began with the league's inaugural season in 1997, to 20 seasons.
- July 24, 2007** Seattle's Lauren Jackson scores 47 points in a 97-96 overtime loss to the Washington Mystics, tying Diana Taurasi for the WNBA record for most points in a single game.
- July 27, 2007** Lauren Jackson scores her 4,000th career point during a 89-75 win over the Indiana Fever, becoming the youngest and fastest player in league history to reach the milestone. Jackson reaches the milestone in 209 games.
- September 5, 2007** Lauren Jackson is named MVP of the league for the second time in her career after having also earned the honor in 2003. Jackson led the WNBA in scoring, rebounding and double-doubles and was also named the WNBA's Player of the Week on five occasions. Jackson joined Lisa Leslie, Sheryl Swoopes and Cynthia Cooper as the only players in WNBA history to capture multiple MVP honors.
- September 16, 2007** The 2007 WNBA Finals see the Phoenix Mercury win their first-ever championship behind the play of Diana Taurasi, Penny Taylor and Cappie Pondexter, who was named Finals MVP. The Mercury capped the most exciting WNBA season ever by defeating the defending champion Detroit Shock in five games. It marked the first time that a the WNBA Championship has been won on the road, and Mercury head coach Paul Westhead became the first head coach to win both a WNBA title and an NBA title (1980, Los Angeles Lakers). Total attendance for the 2007 WNBA Finals between the Phoenix Mercury and the Detroit Shock was 74,178, establishing a new all-time WNBA Finals record. In addition, Game 5's crowd of 22,076 at The Palace of Auburn Hills tied the all-time, single-game attendance record for the WNBA Finals (also set on Sept. 16 2003 of the 2003 WNBA Finals, Los Angeles at Detroit).
- October 17, 2007** WNBA President Donna Orender announces that the City of Atlanta was awarded a WNBA expansion team for the 2008 season. The new team will be owned and operated by Atlanta businessman J. Ronald Terwilliger.
- October 23, 2007** The Los Angeles Sparks win the seventh annual Draft Lottery and earned the top pick in the 2008 WNBA Draft. The Sparks won the lottery for the first time in franchise history, after tying the Minnesota Lynx for fewest wins in 2007.
- January 23, 2008** The Atlanta expansion franchise unveils their team name, logo and colors. The Atlanta Dream's color scheme will consist of sky blue and red.
- January 28, 2008** The WNBA and the WNBAPA sign the league's third collective bargaining agreement covering six seasons, commencing with the 2008 season and continuing through 2013.
- January 29, 2008** Rule changes are announced for the 2008 season and include the following: the inbound rule will permit a player to pass the ball anywhere (frontcourt or backcourt) on the court during the final minute of the fourth period and the final minute of any overtime period; players not occupying lane spaces shall now remain behind the three-point line (above the free-throw line extended) during free-throws; and instant-replay rules will now require automatic video reviews by the officiating crew in the case of flagrant fouls that result in ejections and other player altercations.

- February 6, 2008** The WNBA holds an Expansion Draft to build the inaugural roster of the Atlanta Dream. The Dream selected one player from each team, including Betty Lennox, Katie Feenstra, Erika DeSouza and Kristin Haynie. The Dream also orchestrated trades for Iziane Castro Marques and Ivory Latta.
- February 28, 2008** Force 10 Hoops, L.L.C., the entity owned by Seattle businesswomen and civic leaders Anne Levinson, Ginny Gilder, Lisa Brummel and Dawn Trudeau, purchases the Seattle Storm. Seven WNBA teams now fall under the independent ownership model: the Atlanta Dream, Chicago Sky, Connecticut Sun, Houston Comets, Los Angeles Sparks, Seattle Storm and Washington Mystics.
- April 4, 2008** North Carolina State Head Coach Kay Yow is honored with the WNBA's Inspiring Coach Award during the Women's Final Four activities in Tampa, Florida.
- April 9, 2008** The 2008 WNBA Draft presented by adidas takes place in Tampa, marking the third year that the draft was held immediately following the NCAA Women's Division I Championship Game and conducted in the same city as the Final Four. Candace Parker, Sylvia Fowles and Candice Wiggins were selected as the top three overall picks.
- May 17, 2008** Candace Parker of the Los Angeles Sparks nearly posts a triple-double in her pro debut on vs. Phoenix. She had 34 points, 12 rebounds and 8 assists. Her 34 points broke the record for a rookie in a debut game.
- May 29, 2008** On May 29 in a double-overtime loss at Indiana, Candace Parker becomes the first player in WNBA history to record a 5x5, which is total of five or more in five different categories. Parker had 16 points, 16 rebounds, six blocks, five assists and five steals.
- June 6, 2008** Tina Thompson of the Houston Comets becomes just the second player in WNBA history to reach the 5,000 point milestone, joining Lisa Leslie.
- June 22 & 24, 2008** Candace Parker dunks in back-to-back games, joining Lisa Leslie as the only players to have dunked in a WNBA game.
- June 28, 2008** Lisa Leslie of the Los Angeles Sparks becomes the first WNBA player to record 3,000 career rebounds.
- July 30, 2008** Robin Roberts, co-anchor of ABC News' Good Morning America, is honored as the recipient of the 2008 WNBA Inspiration Award. Roberts is the keynote speaker at the WNBA Inspiring Women Luncheon in San Francisco, an event that also honored the U.S. Olympic Women's Basketball Team and served as a final send-off to the Beijing for the Olympic Games.
- July 28-Aug. 27, 2008** The WNBA stops play to give players the opportunity to compete in the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing, China. The U.S. Olympic Women's Basketball Team defeated Australia in the gold medal game, while Russia defeated China for the bronze. The United States has now won four consecutive Olympic gold medals.
- August 31, 2008** Katie Smith of the Detroit Shock reaches the 5,000 career point milestone, joining Lisa Leslie and Tina Thompson.
- September 5, 2008** Ticha Penicheiro of the Sacramento Monarchs becomes the first player in WNBA history to record 2,000 career assists.
- October 3, 2008** Los Angeles Sparks forward Candace Parker is named the Hanns-G 'Go Beyond' Rookie of the Year as well as the WNBA Most Valuable Player presented by T-Mobile. It marks the first time a rookie won both awards in the same year. The top overall pick in the 2008 WNBA Draft, Parker capped a season in which she also earned All-WNBA First Team honors, two Hanns-G 'Go Beyond' Rookie of the Month Awards (May and July), one Player of the Week Award (Aug. 31) and the Peak Performer Rebounding Award.

- October 5, 2008** The 2008 WNBA Finals see the Detroit Shock sweep the San Antonio Silver Stars in three games. The Shock earned their third championship in six years. Detroit's Katie Smith was named Finals MVP.
- December 2, 2008** The League announces that the Houston Comets, an original member of the WNBA, would suspend operations.
- December 9, 2008** The WNBA holds a Dispersal Draft of the Houston Comets players. Teams drafted in inverse order of their regular-season finish in 2008. The Atlanta Dream selected Sancho Lyttle with the first pick, the Washington Mystics chose Matee Ajavon with the second selection and the Chicago Sky took Mistie Williams with the third pick.
- December 9, 2008** The Atlanta Dream win the eighth annual WNBA Draft Lottery and earned the top pick in the 2009 WNBA Draft. The winning team had 420 chances out of 1,000 to receive the first overall selection. The lottery went exactly according to odds for the first time in WNBA history.
- February 5, 2009** The WNBA Board of Governors votes to allow the expanded use of instant replay by game officials. The two modifications will allow referees to use instant replay 1.) to determine at any point during a game whether a field goal was correctly scored as a two- or three-point field goal, and, for the purposes of awarding the correct number of free throws, whether a shooter was fouled while taking a two- or three-point attempt and 2.) when the game clock malfunctions during a play concluding with no time remaining on the clock (0:00) at the end of any quarter or overtime period.
- April 7, 2009** University of Tennessee head coach Pat Summit is named the recipient of the WNBA's Inspiring Coach Award.
- April 9, 2009** The 2009 WNBA Draft presented by adidas takes place at the NBA Entertainment studios in Secaucus, NJ. Angel McCoughtry, Marissa Coleman and Kristi Toliver were selected as the top three overall picks.
- May 13, 2009** WNBA LiveAccess, a new feature on WNBA.com that provides fans with free access to more than 200 live game Webcasts, is launched and allows fans around the world to access live game Webcasts on individual team Web sites.
- June 1, 2009** The Phoenix Mercury announces a groundbreaking marquee partnership with LifeLock to launch the first-ever branded jersey in WNBA or NBA history. The LifeLock name will appear on the front of Phoenix Mercury player jerseys and on warm-up suits through the 2011 season.
- June 5, 2009** The Los Angeles Sparks reach an agreement with the Farmer's Insurance Group of Companies to become the second team to secure a marquee partnership and wear branded jerseys. The Farmer's Insurance Group of Companies name and logo will appear on player jerseys.
- June 14, 2009** Tamika Raymond is named the recipient of the 2009 Dawn Staley Community Leadership Award.
- July 17, 2009** Sue Bird of the Seattle Storm reaches the 3,000-point plateau, becoming just the third player in league history to score 3,000 points and hand out 1,000 career assists. (Shannon Johnson and Vickie Johnson)
- July 29, 2009** Cokie Roberts, political commentator for ABC News, senior news analyst for NPR News, and bestselling author, is honored as the recipient of the 2009 WNBA Inspiration Award. Roberts served as the keynote speaker at the WNBA Inspiring Women Luncheon in Chicago.
- August 10, 2009** Lisa Leslie of the Los Angeles Sparks becomes the first player in WNBA history to record 6,000 career points.
- August 15, 2009** Lauren Jackson of the Seattle Storm scores her 5,000th point against the Atlanta Dream, becoming the youngest

and fastest player in league history to reach the milestone. Jackson joins Lisa Leslie, Tina Thompson and Katie Smith as the WNBA's 5,000 point scorers.

September 5, 2009 Diana Taurasi of the Phoenix Mercury scores her 4,000th point, eclipsing Lauren Jackson as the youngest and fastest player in league history to reach the milestone. Taurasi accomplishes the feat in 197 games.

September 26, 2009 Lisa Leslie tallies 22 points and 9 rebounds in the final game of her WNBA career as the Los Angeles Sparks are defeated by the Phoenix Mercury in the Western Conference Finals. Leslie had previously announced that 2009 would be her final season, and retires as the all-time WNBA leader in points (6,263) and rebounds (3,307).

September 29, 2009 The Mercury's Diana Taurasi wins the WNBA Most Valuable Player Award presented by Kia Motors, marking the first MVP honor of her professional career. Taurasi tallied 20.4 points per game and recorded 20+ points in 20 games in 2009.

October 9, 2009 The Phoenix Mercury defeats the Indiana Fever to clinch the WNBA Championship for the second time in three years. Finals MVP Diana Taurasi, Cappie Pondexter and Penny Taylor led the Mercury and held off a late rally by the tenacious Indiana Fever for a 94-86 victory in the deciding Game 5. The 2009 WNBA Finals also featured three sellouts plus the highest total attendance figure (82,018) in WNBA Finals history. Overall, average attendance for the 2009 WNBA Playoffs increased 18.5% over 2008 (9,979 vs. 8,420).

October 20, 2009 The Detroit Shock relocates to Tulsa, Oklahoma under the ownership of Bill Cameron, David Box and Tulsa Pro Hoops, LLC. Nolan Richardson is named the team's general manager and head coach.

October 29, 2009 Kathy Betty becomes managing partner of the Atlanta Dream after the investment group Dream Too, LLC purchases the team from Terwilliger.

November 5, 2009 The Minnesota Lynx win the ninth annual WNBA Draft Lottery and earned the top pick in the 2010 WNBA Draft. Minnesota had 428 chances out of 1,000 to receive the first overall selection by virtue of owning New York's combinations (261) in addition to its own (167).

November 20, 2009 The Maloof Family announces that they will no longer operate the Sacramento Monarchs.

December 4, 2009 The WNBA Competition Committee and Board of Governors approves the expanded use of instant replay by game officials in the following situations: 1.) To determine at any point during the game whether a 24-second shot clock violation occurred prior to the release of a successful field goal attempt or prior to a foul being committed and 2.) To determine during the last minute of regulation play and the last minute of any overtime period which player last touched the ball prior to it going out-of-bounds or whether the ball was last touched simultaneously by two opponents.

December 14, 2009 The WNBA holds a Dispersal Draft of the Sacramento Monarchs players. The New York Liberty selected Nicole Powell with the first pick while the Minnesota Lynx chose Rebekkah Brunson second and the Connecticut Sun took DeMya Walker with the third selection. The Chicago Sky selected Courtney Paris and the San Antonio Silver Stars took Laura Harper to round out the top five picks. Teams drafted in inverse order of their regular-season finish in 2009.

January 23, 2010 The Tulsa franchise, with new ownership that brought the team from its former home in Detroit, announces it will keep the name "Shock," and unveils a new logo and color scheme featuring black, red and gold.

April 8, 2010 The 2010 WNBA Draft presented by adidas takes place at the NBA Entertainment studios in Secaucus, NJ. Tina Charles, Monica Wright, Kelsey Griffin, Epiphanny Prince and Jayne Appel, respectively, were the top five selections.

- May 15, 2010** The newly relocated Shock – complete with new ownership, a new head coach in Nolan Richardson, new colors and a new logo – tip-off their first game in Tulsa, Oklahoma.
- August 8, 2010** Tina Thompson surpasses Lisa Leslie’s WNBA career scoring mark of 6,263, making her the highest scoring player in league history.
- August 13, 2010** Phoenix’s Tangelia Smith plays in her 411th career game, breaking Vickie Johnson’s previous record for most career games played.
- August 15, 2010** In a game against Indiana, rookie Tina Charles of the Connecticut Sun sets WNBA single-season records for most double-doubles and total rebounds in a single season.
- September 7, 2010** Atlanta’s Angel McCoughtry scores a WNBA Playoffs record 42 points in Game Two of the Eastern Conference Finals, a 105-93 victory over the New York Liberty. In that same game, New York’s Cappie Pondexter tallies 36 points. Their combined total of 78 points set a WNBA record for most total points by two players in the same post-season game.
- September 16, 2010** The Seattle Storm won the 2010 WNBA championship by defeating the Atlanta Dream 87-84 in Game 3 of the WNBA Finals in Atlanta’s Philips Arena. The Storm swept the Dream 3-0 in the best-of-five series and Seattle center Lauren Jackson, the league’s regular season MVP, was named MVP of The Finals. It is the Storm’s second championship and first since 2004.
- December 3, 2010** Donna Orender steps down as WNBA President to launch her own marketing, media and strategy company.
- February 28, 2011** As part of WNBA Live - Manchester 2011 – a new, multiyear partnership between the Manchester (Eng.) City Council and the NBA, WNBA and USA Basketball – it is announced that the Atlanta Dream will participate in the first WNBA game to be played in Europe. The game is set for May 29, 2011 vs. Standard Life Team GB (Great Britain’s national team) at Manchester Evening News Arena. The partnership will promote women in sport and encourage participation in team sports.
- March 3, 2011** At a press conference at the AT&T Center in San Antonio, the WNBA announces that the Silver Stars will host the 2011 All-Star Game for the first time in franchise history. The contest, set for Saturday, July 23, is to be the second WNBA All-Star Game played in a Western Conference venue and the first since the 2000 game was held in Phoenix.
- March 8, 2011** In honor of Women’s History Month and International Women’s Day, the WNBA officially announced plans to celebrate its 15th season. Among those would be the selection of the Top 15 Players and the Top 15 Moments in league history. Key among other planned celebrations would be a nationally televised game (ESPN2) in which the New York Liberty would visit the Los Angeles Sparks on June 21, fifteen years to the date of the league’s inaugural game in 1997 featuring those same two teams.
- March 28, 2011** Sheryl Swoopes, 40, returns to the WNBA, signing to play with the Tulsa Shock after a two-year hiatus. An inaugural member of the WNBA and a member of the league’s All-Decade Team selected in 2006, Swoopes resume includes four WNBA championships as a member of the Houston Comets (1997-2000), three league MVP awards (2000, 2002, 2005) and three Defensive Player of the Year honors (2000, 2002, 2003).
- April 7, 2011** The Washington Mystics sign a marquee partnership with Inova Health System, becoming the fifth WNBA team to have such a partnership. Players will wear Inova Hospital System’s name and logo on the front of their home and away jerseys during the 2011 WNBA season.

- April 7, 2011** The WNBA and partner adidas unveiled new uniforms for all 12 teams featuring Revolution 30 technology and women's basketball specific TECHFIT base layers.
- April 11, 2011** The WNBA becomes the first professional sports league to conduct its annual Draft at ESPN headquarters in Bristol, Conn. The Minnesota Lynx made Maya Moore the top overall selection of the 2011 WNBA Draft presented by adidas. Australian native Elizabeth Cabbage, selected second by the Tulsa Shock, and Courtney Vandersloot, tapped third by the Chicago Sky, rounded out the top three picks.
- April 21, 2011** Laurel J. Richie, a veteran of more than three decades in consumer marketing, corporate branding, public relations and corporate management, is appointed President of the WNBA, NBA Commissioner David Stern announced. Laurel leaves her post as Senior Vice President and Chief Marketing Officer for Girl Scouts of the USA to join the WNBA.
- June 21, 2011** The Los Angeles Sparks host the New York Liberty at STAPLES Center in the WNBA's 15th Anniversary Game, played 15 years to the day of the league's inaugural matchup between the same two teams in LA. The Sparks win, 96-91.
- July 23, 2011** In honor of the WNBA's 15th season, the league unveiled its "Top 15 Players of All Time" during a halftime ceremony live on ABC at the 2011 WNBA All-Star Game presented by adidas. With consideration given to on-court performance and ability, leadership, sportsmanship, and community service, as well as to contributions to team success and women's basketball, voting was conducted by fans, select national and WNBA-market media, and by current players and coaches. The players named were: Sue Bird, Tamika Catchings, Cynthia Cooper, Yolanda Griffith, Becky Hammon, Lauren Jackson, Lisa Leslie, Ticha Penicheiro, Cappie Pondexter, Katie Smith, Dawn Staley, Sheryl Swoopes, Diana Taurasi, Tina Thompson, and Teresa Weatherspoon.
- August 9, 2011** In a road game at the Phoenix Mercury, Minnesota Lynx all-stars Lindsay Whalen and Seimone Augustus become the 35th and 36th players to surpass the 3,000-point mark for their respective careers, but the first pair of teammates to eclipse the mark in the same game. In the process, Augustus also tied the Mercury's Diana Taurasi as the fastest player in WNBA history to reach 3,000 (151 games).
- August 22, 2011** The WNBA and Boost Mobile, an industry leader in no-contract wireless service, announced a landmark multiyear marketing partnership that made Boost Mobile the first league-wide marquee partner of the WNBA. As part of the deal, the Boost Mobile brand logo was subsequently featured on the front of the game jerseys of 10 of the WNBA's 12 teams. It marked the first time the WNBA had a league partner with jersey branding for multiple teams throughout the season other than adidas, the league's official outfitter.
- October 2, 2011** Despite falling to the host Minnesota Lynx in Game 1 of the WNBA Finals, Atlanta Dream forward Angel McCoughtry set Finals records for points in a quarter (19 in the third), points in a half (27 in the second), and consecutive points (14 from late in the first half into the third quarter).
- October 5, 2011** The Atlanta Dream's Angel McCoughtry surpasses the WNBA Finals record (set by her in 2010) for most points in a single game with 38 in a loss to the host Minnesota Lynx.
- October 7, 2011** In a celebration of its 15th season, the WNBA and partner Boost Mobile unveiled the Top 15 Moments in league history as voted by fans. The top moment was Teresa Weatherspoon's half-court shot at the buzzer to win Game 2 of the 1999 WNBA Finals for the New York Liberty and send that series to a decisive third game. Ranking second was the WNBA's first ever game (NY Liberty at LA Sparks, June 21, 1997); third was Sparks' center Lisa Leslie throwing down the first dunk in WNBA history in the first half of a game vs. the Miami Sol.
- October 7, 2011** The Minnesota Lynx captured their first WNBA title with a 73-67 win over the Atlanta Dream. Lynx guard/forward

Seimone Augustus was named Finals MVP after leading the Lynx to a sweep in the best-of-five series. Augustus posted 22 points and seven assists in Game 1 and had a franchise-playoff record 36 points in Game 2, including 15 in the fourth quarter.

April 16, 2012

The 2012 WNBA Draft presented by Boost Mobile takes place at ESPN headquarters in Bristol, CT, marking the second straight year that the draft was held on the campus of the league's broadcast partner. Stanford's Nnemkadi Ogwumike (Sparks), Tennessee's Shekinna Stricklen (Storm), Notre Dame's Devereaux Peters (Lynx), Tennessee's Glory Johnson (Shock), and Miami's Shenise Johnson (Silver Stars) are the top five picks.

June 3, 2012

Angel McCoughtry of the Atlanta Dream sets the WNBA's single-game mark for most successful free throws without a miss, going 17-for-17 vs. Chicago.

June 15, 2012

With a win over Phoenix on June 15, the defending champion Minnesota Lynx set a WNBA record for the best start to a season, going 10-0 out of the gate before being upended by Seattle.

June 16, 2012

Already the WNBA's career steals leader, Tamika Catchings also took over the top spot in league history for career free throws made when she hit six of eight from the charity stripe against Chicago.

June 17, 2012

Connecticut's Tina Charles, with 23 points and 22 rebounds at Atlanta, became the first player in WNBA history to log three 20-20 games in a career.

July 14-Aug. 15, 2012

The WNBA temporarily stops play to give players the opportunity to compete in the 2012 Olympic Games in London. The U.S. Olympic Women's Basketball Team – comprised of 12 WNBA players – defeated France in the gold medal game. The win gave the United States women their fifth consecutive Olympic gold medal and, dating back to the bronze medal game in 1992, stretched the team's winning streak to 41 games.

Sept. 18, 2012

Already the WNBA's all-time leading scorer, Tina Thompson (Seattle) became the first player in the history of the league to surpass 7,000 career points with her jump shot at the 9:03 mark of the second quarter of the Storm's victory over visiting Chicago at KeyArena. The milestone capped a season in which Thompson also became the first WNBA player to top 15,000 minutes played and 2,450 field goals made.

Aug. 28, 2012

A put-back basket against San Antonio by Minnesota Lynx center McWilliams-Franklin, moved the 14-year veteran and six-time All-Star into first place on the WNBA's career list for offensive rebounds, surpassing the 1,049 of Yolanda Griffith.

Sept. 22, 2012

Temeka Johnson of the Tulsa Shock finished the regular season with the league's best single-season mark in history for three-point FG percentage (.531, 34 of 64). On the same day, Ticha Penicheiro of the Chicago Sky plays the final game of her career and, with two assists, increases her WNBA career record to 2,599.

Sept. 26, 2012

The WNBA Draft Lottery (to determine the order of selection of the 2013 WNBA Draft) was held for the first time at ESPN's studios in Bristol, Conn., live during the 6 p.m. ET edition of SportsCenter. The Phoenix Mercury ultimately won the top pick, followed in succession by the Chicago Sky, Tulsa Shock, and Washington Mystics.

Oct. 21, 2012

Indiana defeated the defending champion Minnesota Lynx 3-games-to-1, giving the Fever its first WNBA championship in franchise history. Following Game 4, an 87-78 home win at Indianapolis' Bankers Life Fieldhouse, Indiana forward Tamika Catchings was named MVP of the WNBA Finals presented by Boost

Mobile. Catchings, a three-time Olympic gold medalist and the league's 2011 MVP, averaged 22.3 points, 6 rebounds, and 2 steals during the Finals.

Dec. 13, 2012

Following the league's Board of Governor's Meeting, the WNBA announces it will implement new rules regarding flopping and defensive three-seconds, while also extending the three-point line from 20 feet, 6 1/4 inches to 22 feet, 1 3/4 inches, consistent with the distance inherent in all FIBA competitions. The rules will go into effect beginning with the 2013 season.

March 28, 2013

The WNBA and ESPN announce an extension of their partnership for another six years, paving the way for WNBA games to be televised on ABC, ESPN, and ESPN2 through 2022. The announcement, made by John Skipper, President of ESPN, Inc. and Co-Chairman of the Disney Media Networks, and Laurel J. Richie, WNBA President, extends the WNBA's television relationship with ESPN to 26 years. With the deal, up to 30 live games will be televised on ABC, ESPN or ESPN2 each season, including exclusive telecasts of the WNBA Finals presented by Boost Mobile.

March 28, 2013

On the same day as the WNBA and ESPN announce an extension of their partnership, the league also introduced a new brand identity. The refreshed identity reflects how far the level of play has come in 16 years as stronger, more agile players have made the game more competitive. The cornerstone of the new WNBA visual identity is a more modern "Logowoman" -- the player silhouette within the logo -- that better embodies the athleticism and diversity of current WNBA players while leveraging the distinctive orange-and-oatmeal color scheme of the league's iconic game ball.

April 15, 2013

For the first time in the WNBA's 17 seasons, the league's Draft is televised live in primetime. The 2013 WNBA Draft presented by State Farm takes place for the third straight year at ESPN headquarters in Bristol, Conn., this time airing live at 8 p.m. ET on ESPN2. One of the most anticipated draft classes in league history is led by the "3 to See" -- Brittney Griner of Baylor, Elena Delle Donne of Delaware, and Notre Dame's Skylar Diggins. The Phoenix Mercury select Griner with the No. 1 overall pick; the Chicago Sky then take Delle Donne with the No. 2 selection, and the Tulsa Shock claim Diggins third.

May 27, 2013

While the WNBA's 17th season officially tipped off on May 24, it was a May 27 Memorial Day TV doubleheader on ESPN2 that introduced the "3 to See" -- Phoenix center Brittney Griner, Chicago guard/forward Elena Delle Donne, and Tulsa guard Skylar Diggins -- to WNBA fans. Griner, Delle Donne, and Diggins, the first, second, and third overall draft picks in the 2013 Draft, were the featured players as Tulsa first hosted the Washington Mystics and Phoenix then hosted Chicago.

May 27, 2013

Brittney Griner, the No. 1 overall pick in the 2013 Draft, registered two dunks in her very first game, becoming the first WNBA player ever to dunk multiple times in the same game.

June 8, 2013

The WNBA becomes the first U.S. professional basketball league to implement "Ref Cam" as part of a game telecast. A wireless, HD, mini point of view camera positioned at eye-level on game official Lamont Simpson, "Ref Cam" allowed viewers to virtually be on the court during the live ABC broadcast when Indiana hosted Phoenix.

July 6, 2013

Mike Thibault moved ahead of Van Chancellor to become the head coach with the most regular-season victories in WNBA history. Thibault reached the milestone with the Washington Mystics' 62-59 win over the Seattle Storm. The win was Thibault's 212th regular-season victory as a WNBA head coach.

July 27, 2013

The Los Angeles Sparks' Candace Parker was crowned MVP of the 2013 Boost Mobile WNBA All-Star Game after setting an All-Star Game record with 23 points, topping the mark of 22 set by Swin Cash in 2009. Parker shot 10-for-13 from the field and chipped in 11 rebounds. Leading into the All-Star Game, the Chicago Sky's Elena Delle Donne became the first rookie ever to lead all vote-getters for the event.

- August 18, 2013** Chicago's Sylvia Fowles became the first player in league history to post two 20-20 games in the same season. Fowles, who scored 20 points and added 21 rebounds vs. Connecticut on this date, had previously posted 24 points and 22 rebounds vs. Connecticut on May 31.
- September 8, 2013** Second-year guard Riquna Williams sets a WNBA single-game scoring record with 51 points in the Tulsa Shock's win at San Antonio. The 51-point effort surpassed the previous mark of 47 set by Phoenix's Diana Taurasi in 2006 and Seattle's Lauren Jackson in 2007.
- September 15, 2013** Guard Katie Smith, a veteran of 15 WNBA seasons and a seven-time WNBA All-Star, finishes her illustrious career ranked No. 1 in league history in three-point shots made (906); second in total points (6,452, trailing only Tina Thompson) and minutes played (15,725); fourth in free throws made (1,440); and fifth in field goals made (2,053).
- September 22, 2013** Forward Tina Thompson, the only player to play in each of the WNBA's first 17 seasons, plays her final game as Seattle is eliminated from the playoffs by Minnesota in the Western Conference Semifinals. The nine-time WNBA All-Star selection ended her career ranked as the league's all-time leader in points (7,488), field goals made (2,630), and minutes played (16,088); second in free throws made (1,480) and total rebounds (3,070); and fourth in three-point field goals made (748).
- October 10, 2013** After advancing to the WNBA Finals for the third consecutive season, the Western Conference champion Minnesota Lynx topple the Atlanta Dream 3-games-to-0, giving Minnesota its second WNBA title in franchise history and its second crown in a three-year span. Following an 86-77 Game 3 victory at Gwinnett Arena in suburban Atlanta, Lynx forward Maya Moore, the runner-up for the regular-season MVP award, is named the MVP of the Finals. The Georgia native averaged 20 points, 6 rebounds, and over two assists during the Finals series.
- December 10, 2013** The 13th annual WNBA Draft Lottery (to determine the order of selection of the 2014 WNBA Draft presented by State Farm) is conducted in a televised event live on ESPN during SportsCenter for the second straight year. The Connecticut Sun, which have 442 chances out of 1,000 to receive the first overall selection, the most of any of the four teams in the lottery mix, ultimately win the top pick, followed in succession by the Tulsa Shock, San Antonio Silver Stars, and New York Liberty.
- January 14, 2014** The WNBA's San Antonio franchise officially changes its nickname from Silver Stars to Stars.
- February 5, 2014** The WNBA and NBA Board of Governors unanimously approve the purchase of the Los Angeles Sparks by an investment group led by Earvin "Magic" Johnson and controlling owner of the Los Angeles Dodgers, Mark R. Walter. The investment group includes Dodger co-owners Todd L. Boehly, Robert L. Patton and Stan Kasten.
- March 7, 2014** The WNBA and WNBPA announce an agreement on a new collective bargaining agreement. The term of the contract is eight years, commencing in 2014, with both the WNBA and WNBPA holding the ability to opt out after the sixth year. Among the key elements in the new CBA is the expansion of rosters from 11 to 12 players per team. In addition, the new agreement, like the expired CBA, includes a revenue-sharing component should league revenues hit agreed upon benchmarks.
- April 14, 2014** The 2014 WNBA Draft presented by State Farm is televised live in primetime by ESPN2 from the floor of the Mohegan Sun Arena in Uncasville, Conn. Chiney Ogwumike of Stanford University is selected No. 1 overall by the Connecticut Sun and, in the process, makes history. Ogwumike and her older sister, Nneka – the No. 1 overall pick in the 2012 Draft by the Los Angeles Sparks – join NFL stars Peyton and Eli Manning as the only siblings selected with the top pick in a North American professional sports league draft. The Tulsa Shock made Baylor University's Odyssey Sims the No. 2 overall pick and the San Antonio Stars claim Notre Dame's Kayla McBride third.

LEAGUE TIMELINE

- July 19, 2014** Boost Mobile WNBA All-Star 2014 takes place at US Airways Center, marking the second time the All-Star event takes place in Phoenix. The first WNBA All-Star game to go into overtime is won by the East, 125-124, after the Indiana Fever's Tamika Catchings grabs a defensive rebound and dribbles the length of the floor to score the game-winning layup with 6.9 seconds to play in OT.
- Atlanta Dream guard Shoni Schimmel, who had been voted into the game as a starter by fans, lives up to her nickname, "Showtime Shoni," and becomes the first rookie ever to earn the All-Star game MVP award. Schimmel set All-Star records for points (29), made field goals (11), and made three-point field goals (7). Like Schimmel, Minnesota's Maya Moore (24 points) and Tulsa's Skylar Diggins (27 points) also surpassed the previous record for points in an All-Star game (23 by Los Angeles' Candace Parker in 2013).
- Aug. 5, 2014** The NBA's San Antonio Spurs announce they are hiring WNBA all-star guard Becky Hammon as an assistant coach under head coach Gregg Popovich. Hammon, then of the WNBA's San Antonio Stars and in the midst of her 16th season as a WNBA player, becomes the first full-time, paid female assistant coach in NBA history.
- Sept. 12, 2014** In the WNBA Finals, the Phoenix Mercury sweeps the Chicago Sky, 3-0, to win its third championship in franchise history. After taking the first two games of the best-of-five series at home by 21 and 29 points, respectively, the Mercury is led by guard Diana Taurasi, who scores 14 of her 24 points in the fourth quarter, and by forward Candice Dupree (24 points), as Phoenix edges host Chicago, 87-82, in Game 3. Taurasi, who is subsequently named Finals MVP for the second time in her career, breaks an 82-82 tie with an old-fashioned three-point play.
- April 16, 2015** For the second straight year, the WNBA Draft presented by State Farm® is held at Mohegan Sun Arena in Uncasville, Conn. With the No. 1 overall pick, the Seattle Storm makes Notre Dame guard and consensus All-American Jewell Loyd the first Fighting Irish player ever chosen with the top selection. The Tulsa Shock choose Sweden native Amanda Zahui B. of the University of Minnesota with the second overall selection, and the Storm uses its second pick in the top three on the University of Connecticut's Kaleena Mosquedea-Lewis. Loyd and Zahui B., each of whom leave college with eligibility remaining, enter the draft by virtue of turning 22 years of age during the 2015 calendar year.
- June 24, 2015** Chicago's Elena Delle Donne scores a career-high 45 points in a win over Atlanta. Coupled with her 40-point effort at Tulsa on June 6, she becomes only the fourth player in league history with two 40-point games in the same season. Delle Donne would go on to be named the 2015 WNBA MVP presented by Samsung.
- July 3, 2015** Becky Hammon, a former WNBA All-Star and current NBA assistant coach with the San Antonio Spurs, becomes the first female head coach in the NBA's Las Vegas Summer League when the Spurs announce she will guide their team. Seventeen days later, on July 20, Hammon leads the Spurs to the Summer League title, becoming the first female coach to win a Summer League title.
- July 20, 2015** Tulsa Shock majority owner Bill Cameron announces plans to relocate the WNBA team to the Dallas-Fort Worth area, the fourth-largest metropolitan area in the U.S. Cameron asks the WNBA to submit the request to the Board of Governors for approval.
- July 21, 2015** Atlanta Dream forward/guard Angel McCoughtry becomes the second-fastest player in WNBA history to reach the 4,000-point milestone, accomplishing the feat in her 206th game (only Diana Taurasi reached the plateau in fewer games – 197).
- July 23, 2015** The WNBA Board of Governors unanimously approves the relocation of the Tulsa Shock to the Dallas-Fort Worth metropolitan area. The team then finished the season in Tulsa, reaching the playoffs for the first time since relocating from Detroit prior to the 2010 season.

- July 25, 2015** In a game featuring 10 first-time All-Stars, the Western Conference defeats the Eastern Conference, 117-112, in the Boost Mobile WNBA All-Star Game at Mohegan Sun Arena in Uncasville, Conn. Minnesota Lynx forward Maya Moore is named MVP, becoming just the second player (after Lisa Leslie) to win all three of All-Star Game MVP, WNBA MVP presented by Samsung (2014) and WNBA Finals MVP presented by Boost Mobile (2013). Moore scores an All-Star Game-record 30 points, surpassing the mark of 29 set by Atlanta's Shoni Schimmel in 2014).
- Indiana Fever forward Tamika Catchings – who enters the game as the career All-Star leader in minutes, made field goals, total rebounds and defensive rebounds – tallies eight points and moves ahead of Leslie as the all-time scoring leader in All-Star history. Catchings also moves into the top spot in WNBA All-Star Game history for the most selections (10) and most games played (9). Seattle guard Sue Bird, selected for the ninth time, plays in her eighth All-Star Game and moves into sole possession of second place in that category.
- July 28, 2015** Indiana's Tamika Catchings passes Diana Taurasi (6,722) for second place on the WNBA's all-time regular-season points list.
- July 31, 2015** Nancy Lieberman, a former WNBA player and head coach, becomes the second female hired as a full-time, paid NBA assistant coach when she joins the staff of the Sacramento Kings.
- Aug. 2, 2015** Seattle Storm guard Sue Bird becomes the first player in WNBA history to amass 5,000 points and 2,000 assists. She is the 13th player to reach 5,000 points.
- Sept. 24, 2015** The Seattle Storm wins the 15th annual WNBA Draft Lottery presented by State Farm® and earns the top pick in the 2016 WNBA Draft presented by State Farm®. The Lottery is conducted in a televised event at ESPN's headquarters in Bristol during halftime of Game 1 of the Western Conference Finals between the Phoenix Mercury and Minnesota Lynx on ESPN2. Seattle, which entered the Lottery with the most chances to land the top pick (442 out of 1,000), wins the drawing for the second time in a row. Five months earlier, Seattle had used the top pick in the 2015 Draft to select Notre Dame guard Jewell Loyd, who would become the 2015 WNBA Rookie of the Year presented by Samsung.
- Oct. 10, 2015** In Game 3 of the WNBA Finals presented by Boost Mobile, Lynx forward Maya Moore hits one of the biggest shots in WNBA history, a game-winning three-pointer at the buzzer that gives Minnesota an 80-77 win for a 2-1 series edge. Moore's buzzer-beater is the latest in a WNBA Finals game since the New York Liberty's Teresa Weatherspoon hit a half-court buzzer-beater on Sept. 4, 1999 to win Game 2 of the WNBA Finals in Houston and send that series to a third and final game against the Comets.
- Oct. 14, 2015** Led by center Sylvia Fowles, a midseason acquisition who would be named MVP of the 2015 WNBA Finals presented by Boost Mobile, the Minnesota Lynx topples the Indiana Fever in Game 5 of the best-of-five series. Minnesota wins its third title in five seasons (2011, 2013) behind head coach Cheryl Reeve and the team's core group of veteran All-Stars in Maya Moore, Seimone Augustus, Lindsay Whalen and Rebekkah Brunson. The Lynx clinches a title on its home court for the first time.
- Nov. 2, 2015** In an event held at the University of Texas at Arlington, majority owner Bill Cameron announces that the Tulsa Shock, newly relocated to the Dallas Metroplex, will begin play in 2016 as the Dallas Wings.
- Nov. 4, 2015** The WNBA announces that Laurel J. Richie, the third President in league history, will be leaving to pursue other interests, including serving as a board member of several for-profit and not-for-profit institutions. Richie ends a tenure that began on April 21, 2011.

- Feb. 10, 2016** Lisa Borders is appointed by NBA Commissioner Adam Silver as the WNBA's fourth President. Borders brings more than 25 years of experience in operations, marketing, government relations and public service. At the time of the announcement, Borders was serving as Chair of The Coca-Cola Foundation and Vice President, Global Community Affairs at The Coca-Cola Company.
- March 15, 2016** The WNBA and Verizon announce a new leaguewide marquee partnership, making the wireless provider the league's most prominent marketing partner. As the marquee partner of the WNBA, Verizon branding will be prominently displayed on the front of 10 WNBA team jerseys: the Atlanta Dream, Chicago Sky, Dallas Wings, Indiana Fever, Los Angeles Sparks, Minnesota Lynx, New York Liberty, Phoenix Mercury, Seattle Storm and Washington Mystics.
- April 14, 2016** The WNBA Draft presented by State Farm® is held at Mohegan Sun Arena in Uncasville, Conn. The Seattle Storm holds the first overall pick in the draft for the second consecutive year and selects University of Connecticut All-American Breanna Stewart, the first player in NCAA Division I history to be named Most Outstanding Player of the Final Four four times. For the first time in the history of the WNBA Draft, three players from the same school are selected with the top three picks – UConn's Stewart, Moriah Jefferson (No. 2 by the San Antonio Stars), and Morgan Tuck (No. 3 by the Connecticut Sun).
- May 9, 2016** The WNBA announces the launch of WNBA LEAGUE PASS, the new full-season, live-game out-of-market subscription package that will provide fans with access to SINGLE GAME and TEAM PASS options for the first time. The new live game service, formerly called WNBA LiveAccess, will be available through WNBA.com and the WNBA App on iOS and Android devices. For the first time, WNBA LEAGUE PASS will be available on Apple TV (4th generation) and Chromecast through the WNBA App, providing users additional ways to watch WNBA games.
- May 25, 2016** With 12 points against the Atlanta Dream, Tamika Catchings becomes the second WNBA player to record 7,000 career points, joining Tina Thompson as the only players in WNBA history to reach the plateau.
- June 11, 2016** Nneka Ogumike goes a perfect 12-for-12 from the field, breaking the record for the most field goal attempts made without a miss previously held by Seimone Augustus of the Lynx (11-11 in a 2007 game versus the Sparks). Ogumike's effort marks the first time in WNBA history a player makes at least 10 field goals with no misses, makes all of her free throw attempts and notches a double-double.
- June 14, 2016** The Minnesota Lynx defeat the Indiana Fever for their 11th straight win, becoming the first team in WNBA history to start a campaign 11-0, topping their own mark of 10-0 set in 2012.
- June 21, 2016** The Minnesota Lynx meet the Los Angeles Sparks at Staples Center in a historic battle of the unbeaten. The contest marks the first time in history that two teams from the WNBA, NBA, NFL, MLB, or NHL met with each team having 10 or more wins, no losses, no ties. The Lynx top the Sparks, 72-69, on a late three-point basket by Renee Montgomery with 2.9 seconds to play.
- June 21, 2016** In celebration of the WNBA's 20th season, and 19 years to the date of the league's inaugural game, the WNBA unveils the names of the 20 greatest and most influential players in its history. The announcement of the WNBA Top 20@20 presented by Verizon is made on ESPN's SportsCenter: Face-to-Face with Hannah Storm. The voting, conducted by a 15-member committee comprised of women's basketball pioneers, select members of the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame and Women's Basketball Hall of Fame, as well as select current and former WNBA head coaches and media members results in the following list of honorees: Seimone Augustus, Sue Bird, Swin Cash, Tamika Catchings, Cynthia Cooper-Dyke, Yolanda Griffith, Becky Hammon, Lauren Jackson, Lisa Leslie, Maya Moore, Deanna Nolan, Candace Parker, Ticha Penicheiro, Cappie Pondexter, Katie Smith, Sheryl Swoopes, Diana Taurasi, Tina Thompson, Teresa Weatherspoon, and Lindsay Whalen.

- June 25, 2016** Two years after her she retires from the WNBA to join the coaching staff of the NBA's San Antonio Spurs, the No. 25 jersey of Becky Hammon is retired by the San Antonio Stars. Hammon. The ceremony takes place just four days after Hammon – the Stars' all-time leader in assists, three-point field goals made, and points per game – is named one of the 20 greatest players in WNBA history.
- August 5, 2016** A record 26 current WNBA players begin competition in the Summer Olympics, representing the United States, Australia, Brazil, Serbia and Spain. This total surpasses the previous record of 22 in 2000.
- August 20, 2016** WNBA players reach new heights representing the United States in the Olympic games. Sue Bird, Tamika Catchings and Diana Taurasi join Teresa Edwards and Lisa Leslie as the only athletes in history with four Olympic gold medals in basketball. Brittney Griner becomes the 10th athlete to win Olympic gold, a FIBA World Championship title (2014), a WNBA crown (Phoenix Mercury, 2014) and an NCAA Championship (Baylor, 2012).
- September 9, 2016** Three-time WNBA MVP and four-time WNBA champion Sheryl Swoopes is enshrined in the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame alongside Shaquille O'Neal, Allen Iverson and Yao Ming in the Class of 2016. Swoopes becomes just the fourth WNBA player to join the Naismith HOF.
- September 21, 2016** The WNBA's historic 20th season scores the league's highest attendance in five years and includes record marks for WNBA digital, social media and retail.
- September 28, 2016** The San Antonio Stars win the 16th annual WNBA Draft Lottery presented by State Farm® and earn the top pick in the 2017 WNBA Draft presented by State Farm®. For San Antonio, which had entered the Lottery with the most chances to land the top pick, wins the Lottery for the first time in franchise history.
- October 10, 2016** Game 1 of the 2016 WNBA Finals was the most-watched Game 1 ever on ABC, with an average audience per Nielsen. The game, which featured a 78-76 buzzer-beating win by the Los Angeles Sparks over the Minnesota Lynx is the most-watched WNBA Finals Game 1 since 1998 across ABC, ESPN and ESPN2.
- October 20, 2016** In the first season of the new playoff format, whereby teams are seeded regardless of conference affiliation, the two teams with the top two regular season records – the top-seeded Minnesota Lynx and the Los Angeles Sparks, both from the Western Conference –stretch the best-of-five Finals series to a Game 5. The visiting Sparks defeat the Lynx, 77-76, at Target Center in Minneapolis on a basket by regular-season league MVP Nneka Ogumike with 3.1 seconds to play. Los Angeles' Candace Parker is named MVP of the Finals.
- April 1, 2017** Rebecca Lobo is inducted into the Basketball Hall of Fame as part of the Class of 2017. She is the fifth WNBA player to receive the honor.
- April 13, 2017** In WNBA Draft 2017 presented by State Farm, held at Samsung 837 in New York, the San Antonio Stars make NCAA women's all-time leading scorer Kelsey Plum of the University of the Washington the first overall pick.
- May 11, 2017** The WNBA and FanDuel announce a joint venture making FanDuel the official, one-day fantasy partner of the WNBA. The venture marks FanDuel's first partnership with a women's professional sports league and the WNBA's first official one-day fantasy offering. Over 2.2 million entries are submitted during the 2017 season.
- May 14, 2017** The first women's sporting event ever streamed live on the social media platform Twitter features the Phoenix Mercury hosting the Dallas Wings. It would be the first of 20 such "Twittercasts" for the WNBA in 2017.

- June 18, 2017** In the closing seconds of the first half of the Phoenix Mercury's game at Staples Center vs. the host Los Angeles Sparks, Diana Taurasi passes Tina Thompson's WNBA mark of 7,488 career points to become the league's all-time points leader. While Thompson needed 17 seasons to achieve her total, it takes Taurasi just 13 seasons.
- July 22, 2017** Verizon WNBA All-Star 2017 marks the first time the city of Seattle hosts the league's All-Star Game. The Western Conference All-Stars defeat the Eastern Conference, 130-121, in front of a sellout crowd of 15,221 at KeyArena. Seattle Storm guard Sue Bird ties the legendary Tina Thompson for the most selections to the All-Star Game (10).
- September 1, 2017** In the first quarter of a road game at the Washington Mystics, Seattle Storm guard Sue Bird sets the WNBA record for career assists, surpassing the mark of 2,599 held by Ticha Penicheiro.
- September 3, 2017** The WNBA becomes the first major sport to have a game streamed live game on a music streaming platform (TIDAL). The game features the Dallas Wings hosting the New York Liberty.
- September 15, 2017** Video presence: For the first time, all 12 WNBA teams, plus All-Star rosters, are available in the new NBA Live 18 video game.
- September 24, 2017** The WNBA Finals tip off and, for the second straight year since the implementation of the new playoff format (whereby teams are to by record regardless of conference affiliation), the two WNBA teams with the best regular-season records – the top-seeded Lynx and the second-seeded Sparks – meet in the Finals.
- October 4, 2017** The Minnesota Lynx defeat the defending champion Los Angeles Sparks in Game 5 of the WNBA Finals, 85-76, at Williams Arena in the second consecutive Finals series to go the distance. Minnesota becomes the second franchise in league history with four championships – tying the Houston Comets, winners of the league's first four titles. Minnesota's championship, its fourth in seven seasons, is spurred by Finals MVP Sylvia Fowles, who scores 17 points and has a Finals-record 20 rebounds in Game 5. The 2017 WNBA Finals on ABC, ESPN and ESPN2 is the third most-watched WNBA Finals ever on ESPN networks averaging 559,000 viewers for the five-game series since the networks began exclusively televising the Finals in 2003.
- October 17, 2017** The WNBA and NBA Board of Governors unanimously approve the relocation of the San Antonio Stars to Las Vegas with MGM Resorts International serving as owner and operator of the team. It is announced that the team will begin play in Las Vegas during the 2018 season with the team's home arena being the Mandalay Bay Events Center.
- November 13, 2017** The Las Vegas Aces win the 17th annual WNBA Draft Lottery presented by State Farm® and earn the top pick in the 2018 WNBA Draft presented by State Farm®. The results of the Lottery, televised on ESPN2's SportsCenter, mark the third consecutive year in which a team with the most chances to win the Lottery emerges as the winner.
- December 11, 2017** In an event at the Mandalay Bay Resort and Casino in Las Vegas, MGM Resorts International unveils the name, logo and colors for its WNBA franchise. Named the Las Vegas Aces, the team will wear uniforms bearing the colors red, black and gold. Las Vegas' first major professional basketball team – formerly the San Antonio Stars – will begin play in its new home in the 2018 season. The Aces become the second major professional sports team in Las Vegas, following the NHL's Vegas Golden Knights, who began play in the city during the 2017-18 NHL season.
- April 12, 2018** In WNBA Draft 2018 presented by State Farm, held at Nike Headquarters in New York City, the Las Vegas Aces make four-time All-America pick and three-time Southeastern Conference Player of the Year A'ja Wilson of the University of South Carolina the first overall pick.



2020 WNBA COMMUNITY INITIATIVES

THE JUSTICE MOVEMENT (LAUNCHING)

The WNBA and WNBPA launched The Justice Movement and Social Justice Council. The mission of the Social Justice Council is to be a driving force of necessary and continuing conversations about race, voting rights, LGBTQ+ advocacy, and gun control amongst other important societal issues. The Social Justice Council will cultivate designated spaces for community conversations, virtual roundtables, player-produced podcasts, and other activations to address this country's long history of inequality, implicit bias and systemic racism that has targeted black and brown communities. With an intentional plan to educate, amplify and mobilize for action, the WNBA and the WNBPA will focus on engaging educators, activists, community and business leaders with players, team and league staff, and fans.

The work of the Social Justice Council will be led by players like Layshia Clarendon, Sydney Colson, Breanna Stewart, Tierra Ruffin-Pratt, A'ja Wilson and Satou Sabally, among others. Those who have proudly stepped up to champion and advise the players include Alicia Garza (Founder, Black Future Labs, political activist, and co-founder of Black Lives Matter), Carolyn DeWitt (CEO, Rock the Vote), and Beverly Bond (Founder/CEO, BLACK GIRLS ROCK! and Celebrity DJ). The expanded list of Social Justice Council members, advisors, and programming will be announced at a later date. Additional information on how teams can be involved will be distributed once available.

TEAM ACTIVATIONS

To build on the work already accomplished by teams and players and to create new meaningful opportunities, teams are encouraged to organize virtual activities for their fans that celebrate the inclusive nature of our game and the unique way it can bring together individuals from different backgrounds. Programming can include supporting nonpartisan civic engagement efforts (e.g. voter registration & education, census completion, and volunteer opportunities), community conversations, and engaging local law enforcement and elected officials. The league will continue to provide comprehensive resources, partnerships, and support to team and player efforts. HER TIME TO PLAY (ONGOING)

The WNBA, in partnership with AT&T, will host a series of Her Time to Play (HTTP) Virtual Community Conversations throughout the summer of 2020 focusing on women and girls in sports. Girls from community organizations (i.e. Black Girls Code, Women's Sports Foundation, etc.) will virtually attend a panel discussion comprised of leading female voices, including WNBA talent, who will discuss the challenges women and girls may face in the sports industry and in life. Panelists will provide insights into their life and careers, share strategies on facing adversity, and offer advice on overcoming self-doubt to reach their goals. HTTP events also include post-panel Q&A, mindfulness moments, and fitness activities. Teams should continue to support local school sports programs or community-based organizations for young women by sharing resources and content on social media assets.

WNBA FIT WEEK PRESENTED BY KAISER PERMANENTE (August 25 - 31)

WNBA FIT Week presented by Kaiser Permanente engages players, partners and community organizations to highlight the importance of leading a healthy life through mind, body, and spirit. As part of WNBA FIT Week, the WNBA and its teams will continue its WNBA Breast Health Awareness initiative. Teams should continue their partnerships with health and wellness organizations to raise awareness and share information through team communications and social media assets.

BREAST HEALTH AWARENESS

As a major component of WNBA FIT Week, teams will help raise awareness and inspire others in the fight against breast cancer. Longstanding partner, Bright Pink, will be highlighted on digital platforms to highlight the importance of assessing your risk for predominately female cancers. On July 29, the WNBA will look to feature a slate of BHA games and will use that day to highlight the work of all the teams in this space.

WNBA CARES COMMUNITY ASSIST AWARD PRESENTED BY STATE FARM (TBC)

WNBA players have a long history of being advocates for racial equality and social justice. With the current environment, players have been more vocal than ever about making a change. To support their important efforts in this space, the WNBA Community Assist Award presented by State Farm will be re-imagined for the first time ever to draw needed awareness and funds to an organization focused on systemic racism. The four monthly awards and one seasonlong award will be reimagined with details to follow. the WNBA's passion to make a difference in the community.

Programs:

Family-to-Family

For the ninth-straight year all three Monumental Sports & Entertainment sports teams collaborated on the Family-to-Family program, which the Wizards created more than 20 years ago. The program allows the Capitals, Mystics and Wizards to "adopt" families in need who are nominated by local schools and nonprofit organizations. During the 2019 holiday season 22 families were adopted by MSE Foundation.

The families selected for participation in the Family-to-Family program were nominated by local schools and nonprofit organizations,



including Martha's Table, Hendley Elementary School, Bright Beginnings and The Salvation Army National Capital Area Command.

Courage

MSE Foundation donated more than \$140,000 to Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors (TAPS) through its Courage Caps program presented by Telos Corporation. Courage Caps and T-shirts were sold at Capitals home games, online at WashingtonCaps.com and at the team stores at Kettler Capitals Iceplex and Capital One Arena. There were also a limited number of autographed Courage Caps and T-shirts available.

During the program launch, American players Taylor Chorney, Matt Niskanen, Brooks Orpik, T.J. Oshie and Nate Schmidt hosted nearly 130 surviving military children and adult loved ones who have found healing through TAPS at a skating party at Kettler Capitals Iceplex. Attendees participated in an hour-long skating session with the Capitals players, mascot Slapshot and Red Rockers.

During the past five seasons, Courage Caps allowed the Capitals to raise more than \$575,000 for Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors, a nonprofit organization that helps families of the fallen. Since its inception the Courage program has raised more than \$775,000 for worthwhile charities, including Our Military Kids, USO-Metro and The Fisher House Foundation. Through the program nearly 22,500 Courage hats have been sold in nine years and nearly 11,250 Courage T-shirts have been sold in seven years.

Playworks Washington, DC

MSE Foundation partnered with Playworks of Greater Washington DC, providing a \$25,000 grant and programming for the 2018-19 school year. Playworks is currently in 13 public and public charter schools in Washington, D.C., bringing safe, meaningful play to thousands of students every day.

Through this partnership, MSE Foundation hosts the annual Playworks Junior Coach Leadership Conference at Capital One Arena, sponsors basketball, hockey and football extravaganzas and hosts an MLK Day of Service volunteer project at a Playworks school.

Playworks of Greater Washington DC is a nonprofit organization whose mission is to improve the health and well-being of children by increasing opportunities for physical activity and safe, meaningful play throughout the school day. Playworks transforms schools by helping schools, and districts make the most of recess through on-site staffing, consultative support, professional development, free resources and more. Playworks currently partners with eight public and public charter schools serving 4,000 students and trains another 150 educators per month in the Washington metropolitan area.

D.C. Public Schools and District of Columbia College Access Program

All three Monumental Sports & Entertainment teams collaborated on MSE Foundation's partnership to "adopt" a local school through Serve DC – The Mayor's Office on Volunteerism and D.C. Public Schools (DCPS), which the Capitals became involved with in 2009. For the 2018-19 school year, MSE Foundation and its teams adopted Hendley Elementary School, a Title I D.C. Public School located in Ward 8 that serves nearly 500 children in PK3 through fifth grade.

MSE Foundation funded \$40,000 in college scholarships in our teams' names for DCPS and D.C. public charter school students through the District of Columbia College Access Program (DC-CAP). The Wizards \$10,000 scholarship is awarded to a male-student athlete basketball player, the Mystics \$10,000 scholarship to a female student-athlete basketball player, the Capitals \$10,000 scholarship to a student-athlete hockey player and the Valor \$10,000 scholarship to a D.C. student-athlete football player. Each student is awarded \$2,500 a year for four years. Applicants must have participated in organized basketball, football or hockey and write an essay about what inspired them to play, what lessons they learned from the sport and how those lessons will help them in college and the workforce.

DC-CAP is a nonprofit organization working in partnership with the District of Columbia Public and Public Charter School Systems that provides counseling and financial assistance to students who might otherwise never have the opportunity to attend or graduate from college. DC-CAP also works in partnership with the Office of the State Superintendent of Education (OSSE), the corporate community, colleges, universities and other college access programs. The overwhelming majority of students served by DC-CAP are from low-income, minority, single-parent households and are the first in their families to attend college.

Everybody Wins! DC

Monumental Sports & Entertainment staff members participate in the Everybody Wins! DC Power Lunch program, a literacy and mentoring program based in select elementary schools in the Washington metropolitan area. The goal of Power Lunch is to encourage children's interest in reading, expand their opportunities for success and facilitate meaningful volunteer contributions.

Through the Power Lunch program, MSE staff members, including employees from the Capitals, Mystics, Wizards, Valor and Capital One Arena, are paired with students at Garrison Elementary School in Washington, D.C., and Key Elementary School in Arlington, Va. Each week during the school year, MSE staff members take time out of their day to visit with their mentees, spending time reading



and sharing conversation during the lunch hour. MSE also hosts an employee book drive during the holidays to collect books that are donated to Everybody Wins! DC.

KaBOOM!

On Sept. 27, 2019, more than 200 volunteers from Monumental Sports & Entertainment, Eagle Academy Public Charter School and members of the Ward 8 community gathered on the grounds of Eagle Academy Public Charter School at Fairlawn to transform the once empty site into a kid-designed, state-of-the-art playground with the help of KaBOOM!, a national nonprofit focused on providing under-resourced communities with safe places to play. MSE participants included Founder, Chairman, Principal Partner and Chief Executive Officer Ted Leonsis; Wizards players Admiral Schofield and Ish Smith; and Vice President of Player Engagement for Monumental Basketball John Thompson III.

In 2011, the Capitals and So Kids Can partnered with KaBOOM! to create a Capitals-themed playground at Associates for Renewal in Education in Washington, D.C., and, in 2012, the groups combined their charitable might once again to build a playground with the Alexandria Redevelopment and Housing Authority at Hopkins-Tancil Court in Alexandria, Va. The first KaBOOM! playground was built 24 years ago in Washington, D.C.. Since then, KaBOOM! has engaged more than one million volunteers and thousands of community and funding partners, all of whom have played a vital role in helping develop health-oriented environments for children.

The new playground at Eagle Academy Public Charter School at Fairlawn, which features the Capitals, Mystics, Wizards and Go-Go in its design, is part of a broader effort led by Monumental Sports and KaBOOM! to ensure communities have great interactive play spaces for kids and families.

This project illuminates the core values of KaBOOM!, a national nonprofit dedicated to giving all kids - especially those living in poverty - the childhood they deserve through great, safe places to play. KaBOOM! inspires communities to make play the easy choice and works to drive the national discussion about the importance of PLAYces. KaBOOM! has collaborated with partners to build or improve more than 17,000 play spaces, engaging over 1.5 million volunteers and serving nearly 10 million kids.

Every KaBOOM! project also incorporates a unique flare of youthful creativity in its design. KaBOOM! gives children the opportunity to design the spaces they will play in. In July, kids from the surrounding community participated in Design Day, where they creatively drew their dream play space. Eagle Academy Public Charter School's new playground is based off their drawings and will provide thousands of kids in Washington, D.C., with a fun, safe place to play.

Flashes of Hope

Monumental Sports & Entertainment Foundation supports Flashes of Hope, helping to fund its Washington, D.C., and Northern Virginia chapters. As a part of the partnership, players from the Capitals, Go-Go, Mystics and Wizards participate in photo shoots with local patients with life-threatening illnesses from MedStar Georgetown University Hospital and Caps Fight Cancer partner organizations.

MSE Foundation donated more than \$31,000 to Flashes of Hope in 2018, raised through an auction held during the Capitals Hockey Fights Cancer night in November.

Flashes of Hope is a nonprofit organization that changes the way children with cancer and other life-threatening illnesses see themselves through the gift of photography and raises money for pediatric cancer research. Monumental Sports & Entertainment Foundation currently helps fund the Flashes of Hope chapters in Washington, D.C., and Northern Virginia.


Food 4 Families


